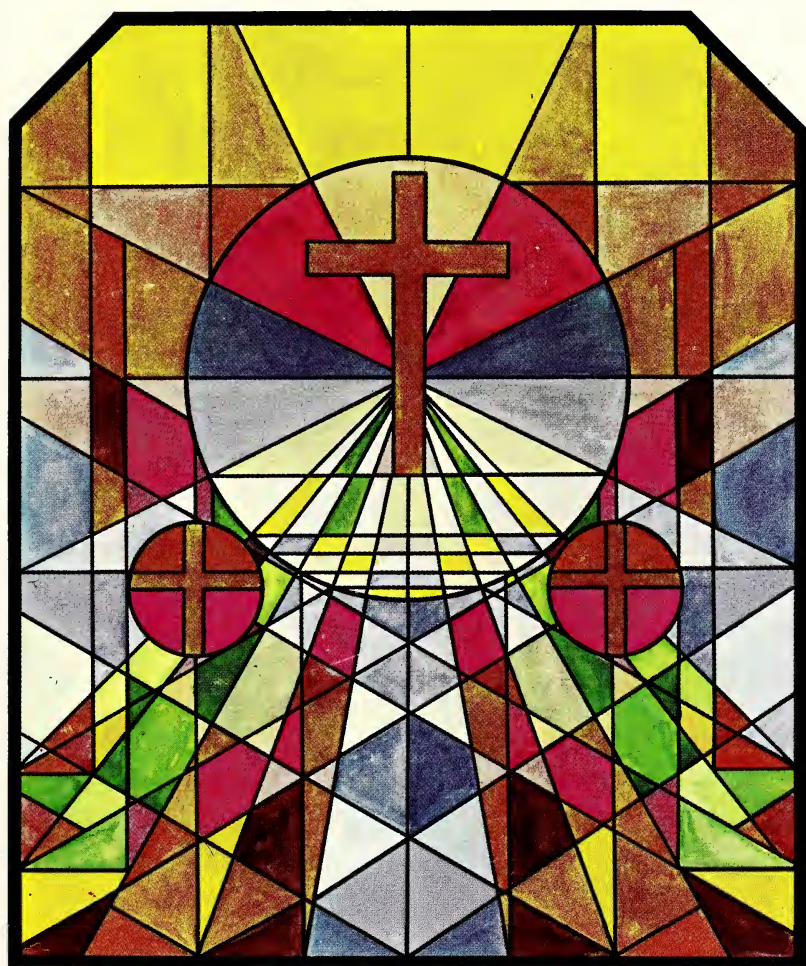

Rev. David B. Roberts

"THE MIRACLE OF THE UPHILL ROAD - AND THE ROAD WINDS UPHILL ALL THE WAY."

A story of the response of a crippled child, a handicapped young man, to the call of God, and a picture of God's grace working through the man.

The Rev. David Benjamin Roberts, former Superintendent of Missions of the French Broad Baptist Association, was born in Caldwell County, North Carolina. He attended Boiling Springs High School, now Gardner-Webb College, received a B. S. degree from Wake Forest University and a Th. G. degree from the Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky. He served 23 years as Superintendent of Missions of this Association. Sometime around the year of 1940, David fell in love with a beautiful young woman and God gave her the vision to see the lovable spirit of a man. They had one son, Benny, and their home was an enduring example of the beauty and happiness of a Christian family.

Twenty-three years of a good and faithful ministry - words cannot be found to convey the height, depth, width, length or the magnitude of this life in the hearts and lives of people in this area. His accomplishments, impossible to number, are well known, it seems that they are fast becoming a legend. They were discussed by individuals, cited by the press, noted by the churches, honored by the Association and the State and Southern Baptist Conventions. One day God looked down and saw Churches dotting the scene - His churches working for Him - yet churches with a need. This need was for guidance and leadership, for someone to help them realize that through closer cooperation they might abound more and more in the service of our Lord. God seeing this need placed His hand upon a man - a man saved by the marvelous grace of God, and kept by the power of an endless life to meet and fulfill this need. When David Roberts came to us he was with us in our weakness, fears and our anxieties. He was a treasure contained in an earthen vessel that the love of God, His power and excellency was manifested in our midst. David walked with God, and the sheep followed him. Those footsteps, so softly taken as he led his flock to fountains of living waters,

left footprints that time cannot erase. Someone timely and rightly so said, he tossed the Rock of Ages into an ocean of men. He loved and played with little children, he admired and had the total respect of the young people and adults marveled and were amazed at his Christian faith and the characteristics of Jesus Christ our Lord.

What we have witnessed and experienced thus far is only the beginning the first fruit of the harvest. This life shall live on and on in the lives of God's people. It will never, never die. He walked by faith, not by sight. He walked with God, he walked 23 years in our midst, and he continues to walk in our presence.

In Second Corinthians 5:1, Paul said, "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." David sent on much building materials for this building. Could he have done so, he would have sent building materials for you and me and thousands of other people. But every Child of the King has to send his own building material. O what a mansion David Roberts has!

Constitution

1974

ARTICLE I-Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II-Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.
2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.
3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

ARTICLE III-Membership

SECTION I. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches in this general area have been formally accepted as

members and who continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by naming messengers to the annual meetings; and by reporting to such annual meetings on forms provided by the Association.

2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make application in the following manner:

a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.

b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.

c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an annual meeting of the Association.

3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application. Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.

4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner.

a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.

b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session should be submitted to the Moderator of the Association.

c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has toward the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in annual session and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in annual session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

SECTION II. Membership of the Annual Meetings of the Association

1. The elected officers of the Association, all pastors of member churches, and provided they are members of member churches, all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the annual meetings.

2. Each member church is entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members above fifty, except that no church shall have more than ten messengers exclusive of the EX OFFICIO members designated above.

3. The EX OFFICIO members in attendance and the elected messengers presenting certification of their election by their churches shall constitute the official voting enrollment in any annual session.

ARTICLE IV-Officers

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Association shall be:

1. Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of Missions

(ex officio), Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, Director of Missions, and Director of Evangelism.

SECTION II. Election of Officers:

1. The Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee, this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the annual meeting.

2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.

3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the annual associational meeting.

2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.

3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.

4. All committee members appointed and elected in the annual session begin their work at the close of the annual meeting and continue through the next annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE V-Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers named in Article IV, and one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, with the Moderator as Chairman.

SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between annual meetings of the Association.

2. To carry out the plans laid at the annual session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the associational work.

3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

ARTICLE VI-Missions Committee

SECTION I. The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in annual meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

SECTION II. Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the annual meeting, or to a special called meeting of the Association.

2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North

Carolina Baptist State Convention.

3. It shall supervise the activities of, and work with, the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.

4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.

5. It shall advise any group seeking to organize a mission or church.

6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.

7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.

8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the annual meeting of the Association.

SECTION III. The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description for the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as ex officio member of all committees.

ARTICLE VII-Steering Committee

SECTION I. The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice Moderator as chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the associational letter.

SECTION II. The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work in the Association.

2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.

3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

ARTICLE VIII-Other Committees

SECTION I. The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees. at the annual associational meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next annual meeting.

SECTION II. Duties of these committees shall be:

1. Committee on Committees: To work with the Moderator in the annual session in the appointment of committees.

2. Nominating Committee: to nominate the associational officers and recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year. Nominees shall first have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.

3. Committee on Reports:

a. This Committee shall inform our people about the work they have been chosen to represent and lead in promoting it.

b. They shall make brief written reports to the annual associational meeting.

c. This committee consists of a member for each of the following phases of work: Evangelism, Cooperative Programs, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

4. Program Committee:

a. This committee shall prepare a printed program for the annual associational meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.

b. This committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.

5. Committee on Places and Preachers:

a. This committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next annual associational meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and the Missionary Sermon.

6. Constitutional Amendment Committee:

a. This committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular annual meeting.

b. This committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the associational work.

7. Committee on Resolutions:

a. This committee shall consider and present to the annual association meeting any resolutions referred to them.

b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.

8. Youth Committee:

a. This committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.

b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships and the like.

9. Ordination Committee:

a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, cooperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.

b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.

10. Seminary Extension Committee: they shall promote & direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director & Registrar annually. They shall appoint teacher in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

ARTICLE IX-Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

ARTICLE X-Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting on the second day. (this statement be amended to read as follows:).

1. This constitution may be amended in the following manner:

Notification of the proposed amendments shall be made in writing to each Church in the Association not less than thirty days, and not more than sixty days, prior to the annual meeting, such notification coming through the Associational office.

2. A copy of the proposed amendments shall be provided to each messenger present for the first session.

3. A first reading of the proposed amendment must be approved by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the first session of the annual meeting. All changes, if any, to the proposed amendment shall be presented to the assembly at the first session prior to this first reading vote.

4. A final approval of the amendment shall be by a two-third vote of all messengers present and voting at the second session of the annual meeting.

ARTICLE XI

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules

of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned.

Amended to read as follows:

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned, except where it may be in conflict with this Constitution.

ARTICLE XII (Added Addition)

Certified copies of this Constitution as amended shall be filed with the office of Superintendent of Missions, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, the Association Historian, and not less than one copy placed in a safety box in a local bank.

Proceedings

Thursday, August 5, 1976 - Night Session

(1) The one hundred sixty-ninth annual session of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order by Moderator Stanley Peek on Thursday, August 5 at 7 p.m. at Gabriels Creek Baptist Church.

(2) Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, Associational Music Director, led the congregation in singing "All Hail the Power" and "We're Marching to Zion."

(3) Rev. Orlando Hawkins, Pastor of Gabriels Creek Church, gave the devotions taking his scripture from Luke 23:27-46. Rev. Clell Fisher, Pastor of Locust Grove, closed the devotions with prayer.

(4) Roll Call of churches was made at this time by the clerk. There were 180 persons present.

(5) Rev. Ralph Hogan made a motion the program of the Association be adopted with any needed corrections or changes. The motion was seconded and the program was adopted.

(6) Rev. E. J. Jenkins recognized all visitors and new pastors. The following pastors have taken churches in the Association: David Mills (Hot Springs), Sibald Lambert (Piney Mountain), Clive Hensley (Laurel Chapel), Gene Edwards (Big Laurel), Joe Sprinkle (Alexander), Joe Honeycutt (Little Ivy), George Bryant (Mt. Pleasant), Wayne Briggs (Upper Rice Creek), and Troy Rogers (Little Creek). John Bussard (Madison Seminary) has returned to the Association as a pastor, and Brenda Buckner was called as Director of Christian Education at Mars Hill Church. There are presently eight churches without pastors.

(7) There was not a Constitutional Amendment Report given since no amendments were submitted.

(8) Rev. Brenda Buckner gave the Membership Report. A motion and second was made for the adoption of the report, and it was adopted.

(9) Rev. Jenkins pointed out that due to questions regarding the selection of church messengers this information was printed in the "Book of Reports" on page 26. Also, Rev. Jenkins reminded those who were interested in attending the Stewardship meeting sponsored by Wake Forest University to be held at Mars Hill Elementary School on August 12 at 6:30 and had not already sent in their cards should let him know immediately. It was announced the Pastor's Wives would meet on August 9 at 7:30 in the home of Zeola Hogan.

(10) Mr. Wade Huey gave the report on the North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging. He showed the inside floor plan and the outside design blueprints for the Asheville Home for the Aging. Rev. Ralph Cannon and Mr. W. A. Poole gave responses to the report. Rev. Cannon spoke on "Casting Me Not Off in Time of Old Age" and gave as an example Mr. and Mrs. George Tunstall who are now living in one of our Baptist homes. He stated the new Asheville home would accommodate 200 people with the first unit housing 50. He recognized the first pastor to send a check for \$1,500 to the Asheville Home--Rev. Worth

Emory of Ivy Hill Church. Rev. Poole stated he hoped to break ground for the new Asheville Home in October. The French Broad Baptist Association has set \$75,000 as their goal for the Asheville Baptist Home for the Aging which is the second highest goal in Western North Carolina. Mr. Poole stated he coveted the prayers and support of everyone and appreciated all the support given in the past. A motion and a second was made for the adoption of the Baptist Homes for the Aging Report, and it was adopted.

(11) Mr. Owen Fish made a motion for the adoption of the Baptist Literature and Biblical Recorder Reports. Mr. Woodrow Hill gave a response to the report. He stated the Biblical Recorder had ministered to Baptists for 144 years and now goes into 116,000 homes across the state. The motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(12) Special music was presented by the Gabriel's Creek Choir.

(13) Mrs. Charlie Clayton moved the adoption of the Cooperative Program Report. Rev. Luther Osment gave a response to the report. Rev. Osment stated that as a result of the Cooperative Program we now have 2,600 missionaries serving in 83 countries, and the Foreign Mission Board is projecting that these figures will be raised to over 5,000 missionaries in 120 countries. The specific goal of these missionaries is to give every person a personal invitation to respond to the Lord Jesus Christ. A second to the motion was made, and the report was adopted.

(14) Mrs. Locke Robinson made a motion the Woman's Missionary Union Report be adopted. The goal for the Associational Lottie Moon Offering was \$15,000. A total of \$16,121.93 was given which was an increase of \$2,415.22 over 1975. There were 27 churches who participated: the Beech Glen and Middle Fork G. A. group gave \$1,135. The goal for Annie Armstrong was \$6,500. A total of \$6,006.78 was given which was an increase of \$557.88 over 1975. Twenty-two of our churches participated in this offering. A second to the motion was made, and the report was adopted.

(15) Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in singing "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

(16) Rev. Peek led the congregation in the offertory prayer, and an offering of \$65.57 was taken.

(17) Special music was again presented by the Madison Seminary Youth Choir.

(18) Rev. Charles Rogers, Pastor of Upper Laurel Church, brought a challenging message entitled "First Southern Baptist Missionary" taking his scripture from Jonah 1:1-12.

(19) Rev. Ralph Cannon requested prayer for the Cecil Ray family as Mrs. Ray was presently in the hospital very sick.

(20) Rev. Charles Rector, Pastor of California Creek Church, adjourned the evening session with prayer.

Friday, August 6, 1976 - Morning Session

(21) The French Broad Baptist Association was again called into session at 9:30 a.m. at the Belva Baptist Church by Moderator Stanley Peek.

(22) Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in singing "Standing on the Promises."

(23) Rev. Gordon Ball, Pastor of the host church, brought the devotional taking his scripture from Jude and using the theme "Are We Willing to Decrease While Christ Increases?"

(24) Rev. Sue Fitzgerald, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, made a motion the Associational officers be elected. These were voted on and approved. The Missions Committee was then voted on and approved.

(25) Rev. Jenkins recognized Rev. Thomas O. High, Missionary-in-Residence at Mars Hill, and Rev. Calvin Knight from Baptist Hospital as our visitors.

(26) Miss Dorothy Sprinkle was recognized and extended a vote of thanks for her secretarial work in the Associational Office during this year.

(27) Rev. Jenkins requested that anyone who was planning to attend the

Stewardship meeting sponsored by Wake Forest University to be held at Mars Hill Elementary School on August 12 and had not sent in their cards should contact him immediately.

(28) A motion was made to adopt the Bible Camp Report. This was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(29) Rev. Charles Rector made a motion the Baptist Hospital Report be adopted. Rev. Calvin Knight spoke to the report. Rev. Knight stated the hospital has 23,000 patients besides emergency and outpatients; has 2,500 employees; and has an annual operating budget of \$48 million dollars. The hospital received \$412,000 from the special Mother's Day Offering given by our churches for which he expressed appreciation. Mr. Owen Fish also spoke to this report giving a personal testimony of what the hospital had meant to him when his wife was a patient there. The report was adopted.

(30) Rev. Sue Fitzgerald moved the adoption of the Christian Education Report. She stated that the Center for Christian Education Ministries is now a reality. She invited each person to use the center as a resource area. Rev. Bob Melvin spoke to the report. A second to the motion was made, and the report was adopted.

(31) The Department of Campus Ministry Report was adopted.

(32) Rev. John Bussard moved the adoption of the Annuity Report. Rev. Cecil Fox spoke to the report urging churches to place their pastors under the Annuity Board. A second to the motion was made, and the report was adopted.

(33) Mrs. O. E. Burnette moved the adoption of the Home, State, and Foreign Missions Report. Rev. Thomas O. High spoke to the report using Psalms 5:7 as his scripture. He is serving in Nigeria and has been there since 1956. He is one of 2600 missionaries serving in 82 countries. He is presently residing in Mars Hill and would be glad to speak with any groups. Contact him at 689-2788. The report was adopted.

(34) Mrs. Roberts led the congregation in singing "Footprints of Jesus."

(35) Rev. David Allman led in the offertory prayer, and an offering of \$46.31 was taken.

(36) The Digest of Church Letters was given by Mrs. Lester Murphey, Clerk, who moved the adoption of this digest with the addition of any statistics received on late letters. A second was made, and the digest was adopted.

(37) The Missions Committee Report was adopted as was the Recommended Associational Budget for 1976-77.

(38) Mr. Vance Edwards moved the adoption of the Treasurer's Report. A second to the motion was made, and the report was adopted.

(39) A move was made to adopt the Baptist Children's Homes Report. Mr. Hugh Starnes spoke to the report giving a brief summary of the services available through the Children's Homes. The report was adopted.

(40) Dr. Evelyn Underwood moved the adoption of the Historian's Report, and the report was adopted.

(41) The Belva Quarter provided special music.

(42) Rev. Worth Emory brought a very inspirational associational message taking his scripture from Ephesians 6:10 and using the theme "God's Provision for Christian Living."

(43) The morning session was then adjourned with prayer (which served as the lunch blessing) led by Rev. Cecil Fox.

AFTERNOON SESSION

(44) Mr. Owen Fish, Vice-Moderator, brought the final session of the French Broad Baptist Association to order.

(45) Dr. Hoyt Blackwell brought the devotional taking his scripture from Genesis 1:1. The hymn "There Is A Fountain" was sung by the congregation as a part of the devotional.

(46) The North Carolina Baptist Foundation Report was given by Rev. Edwin

Coates using the theme "Everything Is Made by Him."

(47) A motion was made by Mrs. Janie Franklin for the adoption of the Civic Righteousness Report. The motion was seconded, and the report adopted.

(48) Rev. David Allman moved the adoption of the Evangelism Report, and this report was adopted.

(49) A move was made by Miss Sadie Wallin that the Stewardship Report be adopted. The motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(50) Rev. Tom Greene spoke to the Cooperative Program Report which was given on Thursday Night. He expressed his thanks for the prayers and the support of the French Broad Association through the Cooperative Program.

(51) Rev. E. J. Jenkins gave the Superintendent of Missions Report. He stated some of the churches in our Association are being drawn toward an independent movement, and we should be aware of this problem. A motion and a second was made for the adoption of the report, and it was adopted.

(52) Rev. Jenkins made a motion the Sunday School Report be adopted. The motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(53) Mr. Walter Harrell moved the adoption of the Church Training Report. This motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(54) Rev. Sherman Tweed moved the adoption of the Brotherhood Report which was seconded and the report adopted.

(55) Rev. E. J. Jenkins gave the Vacation Bible School Report. He expressed thanks to Mars Hill Church for their support and to all those who made Vacation Bible School possible. The report was seconded and adopted.

(56) Mrs. Dorothy Roberts moved the adoption of the Music Report. The motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(57) A motion was made by Mrs. Nancy Allen that the Library Report be adopted which was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(58) Mr. Levi Metz gave a word of testimony on the Bible Camp. He spoke highly of the camp and encouraged people to give to help send children to the camp next summer.

(59) Rev. Stanley Peek made a motion the Executive Committee Report be adopted which was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(60) Mr. Owen Fish moved the adoption of the Steering Committee Report. He urged each church to elect two representatives to serve on this Committee stating that if we all worked together we would be assured of a better place in which to live. The motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(61) Rev. Lester Murphey moved the adoption of the Seminary Extension Report. The motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(62) Rev. Gordon Ball made a motion the Ordination Advisory Committee Report be adopted. He stated the newly ordained ministers would be asked to meet with the Committee again within six months so that the Committee might answer questions or help them in any way. The motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(63) Rev. Jenkins moved the adoption of the American Bible Society Report which was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(64) Rev. Lester Murphey moved the adoption of the Committee on Committee's Report with one correction: Miss Ruth Anderson is to replace Mrs. Bryan Wallin on the Resolutions Committee. The motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(65) Rev. Charles Rector moved the adoption of the Committee Report. He expressed thanks to those who gave reports this year. The motion was seconded, and the report was adopted.

(66) Rev. Jenkins gave the Places and Preachers Report. The 170th annual session will be held with Middle Fork Church on Thursday night, August 4, 1977 and Oak Ridge Church on Friday, August 5, 1977. The report was adopted.

(67) The Resolutions Report was read by Miss Sadie Wallin. A motion was made for its adoption. A second followed, and the report was adopted.

(68) The Memorial Service honoring our beloved dead was led by the clerk. She used scriptures taken from I Corinthians 15:51-58.

(69) Rev. Jenkins installed the new officers for the coming year.

(70) Highlights of the year for some of the churches and individuals were given at this time: Rev. Roger Slagle (Chapel Hill) stated the Lord had blessed them greatly. The church completed its building and the pastor had gone to full-time work with the church. Rev. Slagle thanked Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Franklin and others in his church for their help and support. Mrs. Joyce Burnette (Piney Mountain) stated they now had two youth choirs, three RA groups, two GA groups, a Monday Night Witnessing Program, and had had a Lay Revival. Rev. David Mills (Hot Springs) encouraged using our Associational Bible Camp. He stated the need to reach our young people was great and that this was only one way of reaching them. He thanked Rev. Jenkins for his work there, and encouraged everyone to start planning for next year's camp now. Rev. Ralph Hogan (Calvary) expressed his appreciation to the Association for allowing him to serve on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention. The General Board deals with problems all over the state. It seeks to meet the needs of the churches to the best of its ability with the funds available to do this.

(71) Rev. Jenkins expressed thanks to those who remained for the closing session of the Association.

(72) Mrs. Roberts led the congregation in singing "Blest Be the Tie."

(73) Mr. Grant McDaris gave the benediction and the 169th annual session of the French Broad Baptist Association was adjourned.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT

As of this printing, no churches have requested to be considered for membership in our Association during the past year and for this reason our Committee has no recommendation to make at this time.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Your North Carolina Baptist Homes have, in the past year, completed 25 years of growth and development. These have been good years, filled with the abundant blessings and goodness of the Lord. He has brought us from one home in March of 1951, to five homes and an excellent nursing facility, from one resident to 230 residents and patients. Hundreds have been ministered to during these years, many lives have been blessed, and families have been helped immeasurably.

The past year has been of special excitement and enthusiasm as we entered into the fund-raising effort to raise \$1,000,000 for the construction of the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville. In September, 1975, Brother Ralph Cannon, beloved pastor, and Trustee of the homes, was called by the Trustees to serve as Director of Development and Denominational Relations and has been leading the fund raising program for the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in a remarkable way. He reports that the response from our Baptist pastors and people in Western North Carolina has been most encouraging, and that there is every indication that we will reach the goal. We are grateful not only to those in Western North Carolina, but throughout the State, for the happy and successful response that we have experienced thus far as we move toward making this additional home available for our older people in one of the most beautiful spots in the world.

When completed, the Western North Carolina Home, in Asheville, will accommodate 50 people, and will bring the total capacity of our Baptist Homes and the Nursing Care Unit to 280. We now operate five other Homes, and a Nursing Care Unit--Resthaven, the Hayes Home, the Nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem; the Albermarle Home, in Albermarle; the Hamilton Home, in Hamilton, N.C.; the Yanceyville Home in Yanceyville.

In these homes the best of care is given, the compassion and love of Christ shared and underscored. The love gifts of North Carolina Baptists make this Christian care and concern possible through two very vital sources--The Cooperative Program, and the special offering for the homes, received on the third Sunday of February each year. Through these sources more than 35% of the homes' total income is provided, and the majority of the residents who cannot pay the full cost of care are supplemented. We are grateful for these life-sustaining gifts and thank every North Carolina Baptist who makes them possible!

Gifts this year, through these sources are greater than ever before, and if we are to meet the overwhelming needs of older people in our midst, we must double and triple our efforts, both in numbers ministered to, and in support of them.

Close at hand is another venture in the development of the home in which we're excited--the building of apartments on the site of the Hayes Home property in Winston-Salem. The first of these units is to be completed by the fall of 1977. Those interested in this phase of the ministry of Baptist Homes may contact Bill Poole, the Executive Director, of the homes for information.

Great things are in store for us in our homes for the Aging as we look to the future, and we covet the earnest prayer and the continual support of every North Carolina Baptist as we move ahead in this challenging ministry to older people in our midst.

BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

The Old Testament Prophet Hosea declared, "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge." Because of a great information void concerning truth, Jeremiah also cried out, "Publish and conceal not."

Just as in Old Testament days, communication still remains one of the most sensitive problems in our churches. Think for a moment--how many problems has your church had that could be traced to a lack of communication? Too many church members are misled because they are unformed, poorly informed, or misinformed. Churches must take initiative to provide accurate information if work in the local church, association, and convention continue to show progress.

Each year more churches understand the importance of providing the RECORDER for each family. When this is done, members become more responsive because they are better informed. Baptist have made encouraging progress in recent years through bold mission enterprises and this can be traced to better informed church members. Stewardship gains also go hand in hand with better communications. As an example, 79 of the 80 churches which led their associations in per capita mission gifts last year have a RECORDER club.

Each church needs to look at its budget carefully and then make provision to send the RECORDER to each family. Although nearly 1,100 churches in the state have the RECORDER in the budget, at least 500 more churches should take this step. Such action could be the difference between mediocrity and greatness in your church.

W. A. Criswell, Pastor of the First Baptist Church in Dallas, Texas urges all Baptists to "stay with the state paper. Increase its circulation. Send it to the homes of all people. The reward will be great."

Louie D. Newton of Georgia who has done more than any other person to interpret the value of Baptist state papers, said: "The investment any church can make in furthering the Kingdom of God is to put the Baptist state paper in the homes of the membership. These papers are the packhorses of every phase of denominational life."

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The faithful stewardship of individual Christians and the missionary vision of our churches, expressed through their support of the Cooperative Program enables Southern Baptists to maintain a growing World Mission Program. The stewardship theme for this year is "Bold Believers in Giving." Through the Cooperative Program we demonstrate our mission commitment.

For the Christian, commitment to the task that Jesus set forth involves a total way of life. This may be referred to as the Christian life style. One man said that as he turned his life over to the lordship of Christ and discovered the demands of discipleship, he suddenly realized that his house, his possessions, and his occupational skills belonged to Christ literally, and that they were to be used in trust to accomplish Christ's mission.

For the church, commitment to the bold mission task calls for a specific life style. Churches are stewards, too. The church must demonstrate a commitment to the missions task in the use of all possessions if it is to be true to the command of Jesus. Every church is challenged to increase annually the percentage of its income given through the Cooperative Program. Churches should consider prayerfully the 15 percentage increase suggested by the State Convention for Cooperative Program and the increase suggested by the Association for Associational Ministries.

Last year, 1126 churches increased their gifts through the Cooperative Program by 15% or more, and 4 associations in our state had 100 percent of

their churches giving through the Cooperative Program.

WE RECOMMEND:

1. That a stewardship chairman be elected in every church in our Association.
2. That a stewardship conference or Stewardship Decision Night be held for interested churches in order to make available to them guidance materials for use in their stewardship programs.
3. That every church conduct a stewardship emphasis this year.
4. Every church in the Association giving something through the Cooperative Program for world mission support, every month.
5. Every church in the Association increasing the percentage of the total budget income given through the Cooperative Program.
6. Every church in the Association giving the suggested amount for the support of the associational missions, every month.
7. Have a special prayer for some Cooperative Program ministry during every service in each church during the month of October.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

"Christian Stewardship" is a phrase frequently heard in staff meetings at Baptist Hospital. The hospital's leadership holds to a philosophy of administration based on stewardship and tries to pass this on to all employees. A continuing effort is made to help each employee, whatever his particular job, to realize that he is part of a team involved in a Christian ministry of healing. The difference this makes in the whole atmosphere of the hospital is evident to patients and visitors.

This sense of stewardship demands a continual updating and upgrading of medical procedures to assure patients the highest quality care. One of the most significant recent developments is the creation of the Department of Family Medicine. This department provides primary health care for a limited number of families, that is, the kind of all around, ongoing health care normally provided by a family physician. At the same time the department offers training in family medicine for physicians who will enter this field of practice. This will help to balance the trend of recent years toward increased specialization in the practice of medicine.

Many of the physicians training in family medicine are receiving part of their clinical experience in small towns and rural communities under the auspices of the Area Health Education Centers (AHEC), created by the state legislature. It is believed and hoped that some of them will choose to remain in these areas for their permanent practice.

Improvement of physical facilities is another expression of the hospital's sense of stewardship. In recent months renovation of the west and south wings of the hospital has been completed; construction has been completed on an addition to the water-chilling facilities; construction has begun on a 4-level parking deck in front of Reynolds Tower which will provide approximately 800 parking spaces for visitors; and construction has begun on a new building to house the new Department of Family Medicine.

The Pastoral Care Department continues to make its contributions toward the fulfillment of our stewardship. A chaplain is assigned to each area of the hospital and is responsible for providing a pastoral ministry to patients, staff and visitors in that area. There are capacity enrollments in all phases of the Clinical Pastoral Education programs. A third satellite has opened in Morganton during the past year.

Mother's Day gifts for the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$405,946.52 compared to a total of \$390,000.00 for the preceding fiscal year. Thirty-five churches of the French Broad Baptist Association gave a total of \$3,698.09.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

In this year when we are so conscious of our history, it is good for us to look at where our colleges fit into our heritage. According to a study of our Baptist State Convention the forming of the Convention and the establishing of a Baptist college went hand in hand. Wake Forest College was begun four years after the founding of the Baptist State Convention in 1830. Two more colleges, Chowan and Mars Hill, were begun before the Civil War. One was in the mountains and one on the coast. Before 1900 three more schools, Campbell, Meredith and Wingate were in operation. The seventh school for North Carolina to sponsor was Gardner Webb, begun in 1905. All of our colleges have been a

vital part of Baptist life in North Carolina.

If North Carolina Baptists own and operate seven colleges, that means we have a part in guiding them. This is correct, for each school is administered by a Board of Trustees elected by North Carolina Baptists at the annual convention. Leadership on the Convention level does not stop with the trustees. North Carolina Baptists saw that there needed to be overall guidance and direction for all the schools as they seek to work separately and together. In 1944 the Council on Christian Higher Education was formed. The Council membership is made up of college presidents, deans, chairmen of boards of trustees and the General Board's Committee on Christian Higher Education. Serving as ex-officio members are major officers of the Baptist Convention. Says Perry Crouch, "Since its beginning it has been an effective means of communication among the colleges and the Baptist State Convention." The Council is the only organization of its kind in the Southern Baptist Convention and is one of the oldest educational cooperatives in America. Robert Mullinax guides the work of the Council as executive secretary. Henry Crouch is the president.

We are grateful to the continued work of the trustees of each college and to the Council on Christian Higher Education for guiding the work of our colleges.

DEPARTMENT OF CAMPUS MINISTRY

Although there are almost thirty of us attempting some distinctly Christian witness as Baptists or with BSU on the campuses of North Carolina, we know that we cannot do the job alone.

There will be worship periods, study sessions, fellowship hours, mission opportunities, outreach and witness groups, and attempts to make our faith "applicable" to college life from Cullowhee to Wilmington. Students will give over \$7,000 for missions and send their fellows around the world as witnesses. Baptist faculty and local pastors will join us in teaching, leadership training and deepening of Christian commitments.

Of equal significance in reaching students, however, will be the work of pastors, Sunday School teachers and other committed Christians in the churches from which these persons come. It is our hope to work together in a number of ways during the coming year to strengthen each other and seek even more effective ways of service.

ANNUITY REPORT

It is very difficult to explain in a few paragraphs the scope of the Annuity Board Protection Program, but in order for a pastor to draw retirement or disability from Baptists even though he has been a preacher for a long time he or his church must pay into the plan. There are three retirement plans. PLAN A is a Southern Baptist Protection Plan. It is designed to provide certain types of benefits such as disability, widow, dependent children and education as well as retirement. PLAN B is a money accumulating plan deposited or credited to the individual's account. The funds are available to the participant or beneficiary in the event of retirement, disability or death. PLAN C funds are invested in select common stock. Three insurance plans are available. Life insurance, disability income insurance and medical

insurance. Each church should participate to protect its pastor at 10% of his wages which is a suggested amount to pay for retirement purposes. When paid by the church such amounts may be tax sheltered therefore not reportable for federal income purposes. We now have 20 churches who love their pastor enough to protect him in illness, disability, or retirement. More of our churches should follow suit. It is also protection for the church.

Benefits paid to retirees, widows and the disabled in 1975 amounted to \$15,734,003.00. During the Annuity Board's 58 years of existence, it has paid more than \$141 million in retirement and protection benefits.

In North Carolina 2667 staff members of 2140 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program - 2421 in the Family Benefit Section (Plan A), 1069 in the Age Security section (Plan B), and 240 in the Variable Benefit section (Plan C).

HOME, STATE AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

Southern Baptists came into being out of missionary conviction. The first churches in the South were the result of the belief that this vast new frontier should be evangelized for Christ. The need for food, shelter, medical care and social comfort are legitimate mission concerns. Many of the world's present four billion people are hungry, many are sick and without adequate medicine, many are ill-clothed and ill-housed, and many are bound by the fears of overpowering government, malignant nationalism, selfish political interests and unjust courts. The gospel speaks to all these conditions everywhere.

1975 marked the 50th anniversary of the Cooperative Program. This represented fifty years of cooperatively sharing Christ with the world. Southern Baptists have frequently been called a people on mission for God. This mission is best carried out through doing together those ministries which it would be impossible to perform individually. Cooperation of this magnitude is a unique feature of Southern Baptists. The Cooperative Program might well be called our trademark. It has proven to be a democratic, flexible, inexpensive way of world mission support. It has become the unified budget of the State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

All of the Cooperative Program funds originate with the local church. At the church level the members determine how much will be retained by the church and how much will be sent to the State Convention Office. At the annual State Convention the messengers from the local churches determined how the Cooperative Program funds are to be divided in that particular state. The "state" part of the Cooperative Program is divided between state missions and other ministries--colleges, social service institution, etc.

An effective, well-trained mission force of 2,200, for the most part supported and supervised in cooperation with the state mission boards, leads Southern Baptists in their home missions efforts to cross barriers with the gospel. This mission force has remained at or near the same figure for the fourth year, not because of a lack of volunteers, but because inflation cut away at the Home Mission Board's ability to finance a larger number. More than 150 qualified workers have contacted the board for appointment, but funds are not available.

For the first time, the total number of Southern Baptist foreign missionaries is 2,606 assigned to serve in 82 countries and territories. The 250 reinforcements for the missionary staff, in 1975, were the second highest ever in a calendar year. Reinforcements included 12 reappointments, 26 missionary associates, 77 missionary journeymen and 2 special project

medical workers. Net missionary personnel gain for the year was 68, the largest net gain in five years. The 2,606 includes 191 missionary associates, 148 journeymen, and 3 special project medical workers.

The Foreign Mission Board's programs of work around the world are described in functional terms as evangelism and church development, schools and student work, publication work, hospitals and medical care, and benevolent ministries. --A trust to the N. C. Baptist Foundation will be used for foreign missions. The interest of this trust will be paid annually through your church to Foreign Missions.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

The variety of services provided by the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina have been increased greatly in recent years. Western North Carolina has shared in this expansion made possible by the generosity of our Baptist people and other friends of the dependent child. Western North Carolina has provided many of our finest foster homes since the beginning of this program in the 1930's. This continues to be one of our finest services. We are constantly in need of more good foster homes and will welcome an opportunity to talk with people who would like to work with us in this program.

The Maternity Home in Asheville, opened in 1970, became the first agency-owned group facility in Western North Carolina. This has proved to be a much-needed and well-received service. Girls have been served from throughout North Carolina and beyond. It is recognized for its quality of care and Christian concern.

After several years of careful planning, generous giving, and hard work,

Broyhill Home became a reality in 1971. People in the western part of the State rose to the challenge and provided funds to purchase land and develop a campus with buildings and facilities for 60 children. This is the most modern, up-to-date facility of its kind in the nation. Many children find themselves in emergency situations in which they need help immediately. To serve this child we are developing emergency care homes. The Thermal Belt Youth Shelter at Forest City, now in its second year of operation, is proving beneficial to numbers of children in this area.

The Department of Child Development and Family Education is available to assist pastors and churches in planning and presenting wider services to strengthen, enrich, and support Christian family life. Members of the staff are available upon call to provide assistance in planning for day care, family education, and related interests.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In 1807, six churches in Western North Carolina joined together to form the French Broad Association. These churches were Little Ivy, Locust Old Fields, and New Found from the Holston Association in Tennessee and French Broad, Cane River, and Cane Creek from the Broad River Association in South Carolina. The territory covered by this Association included the area of what is now the fifteen westernmost counties in the State. As more people moved into the area new churches were formed and the Association membership grew in like manner. Finally it became desirable to organize more compact groups. The problems of traveling great distances made it difficult for delegates to attend Association meetings. The first such group formed from the French Broad was the Tuckaseegee Association, made up of the churches in what was then Haywood and Macon Counties. Some time after 1838 the Salem Association was formed and in 1849 the Roan Mountain Church and ten other congregations were dismissed from the French Broad Association to form the New Roan Mountain Association. In 1855 New Found and six other churches left the French Broad to form the New Found Association.

One final split in the French Broad Association occurred in 1827, when a group of seven churches left the original organization to form the Big Ivy Association. The division resulted from a conflict over the Calvinist doctrine of election and predestination. Early in the nineteenth century as a result of the Great Awakening the doctrine of salvation by conversion, of free-will (moral free agency), became popular. Numerous revivals were held throughout the country and in time the movement came to Western North Carolina, where it made many converts. Within the Association Stephen Morgan led the Calvinist faction and Garrett Deweese, Pastor of Middle Fork Church, led the free-will faction. In 1827 the Deweese faction left the parent organization and formed the Big Ivy Association. The new group grew rapidly as they were the more evangelistic in practice and within a few years the original seven churches had become twenty-five. By 1849, the differences over doctrine had been resolved and the wounds of separation healed to the point that Big Ivy petitioned for readmission to the French Broad.

The parent group heartily accepted the request and a reunion was effected. In voting to accept Big Ivy the French Broad added the following statement to its constitution: "This Association will discontinue and repudiate the doctrine of particular, personal, unconditional and eternal election or reprobation." In the end the free-will evangelistic faction had won the debate.

In 1900 the French Broad invited the New Found Association to unite with them. The New Found churches considered the invitation but decided to retain their own Association. Over the years a number of individual churches have moved from the New Found to join the French Broad Association.

The commitment to evangelism and the winning of souls to Christ involved the question of missions. In 1847 the churches were asked to send their views on the missionary question to the next meeting of the Association. It was found that not all churches were in agreement on a formal missionary program, although many of those within the opposing churches participated in missionary activities as individuals. Opposition to an organized missionary effort died, however, and in 1852 an associational organization of missions was established and the following motion adopted:

Believing as we do that the gospel mission is extended to the whole human family, and inasmuch as there are many places in the bounds of this Association which are destitute of Baptist preaching, we deem it expedient to appoint a Board of Managers, whose duty it shall be to recommend ministers to ride and preach among the destitute, and that we, as an Association adopt the best possible means of raising funds to sustain them.

The Board of Managers was at times known as the Committee on Destitution, Missions Committee, and the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions.

Two problems faced the Board of Managers, money and personnel. From time to time the Board would appoint a missionary to preach in "destitute" places as supply pastor, and to promote the idea of missions in all churches of the Association. A reoccurring problem, however, was how to support men in the field.

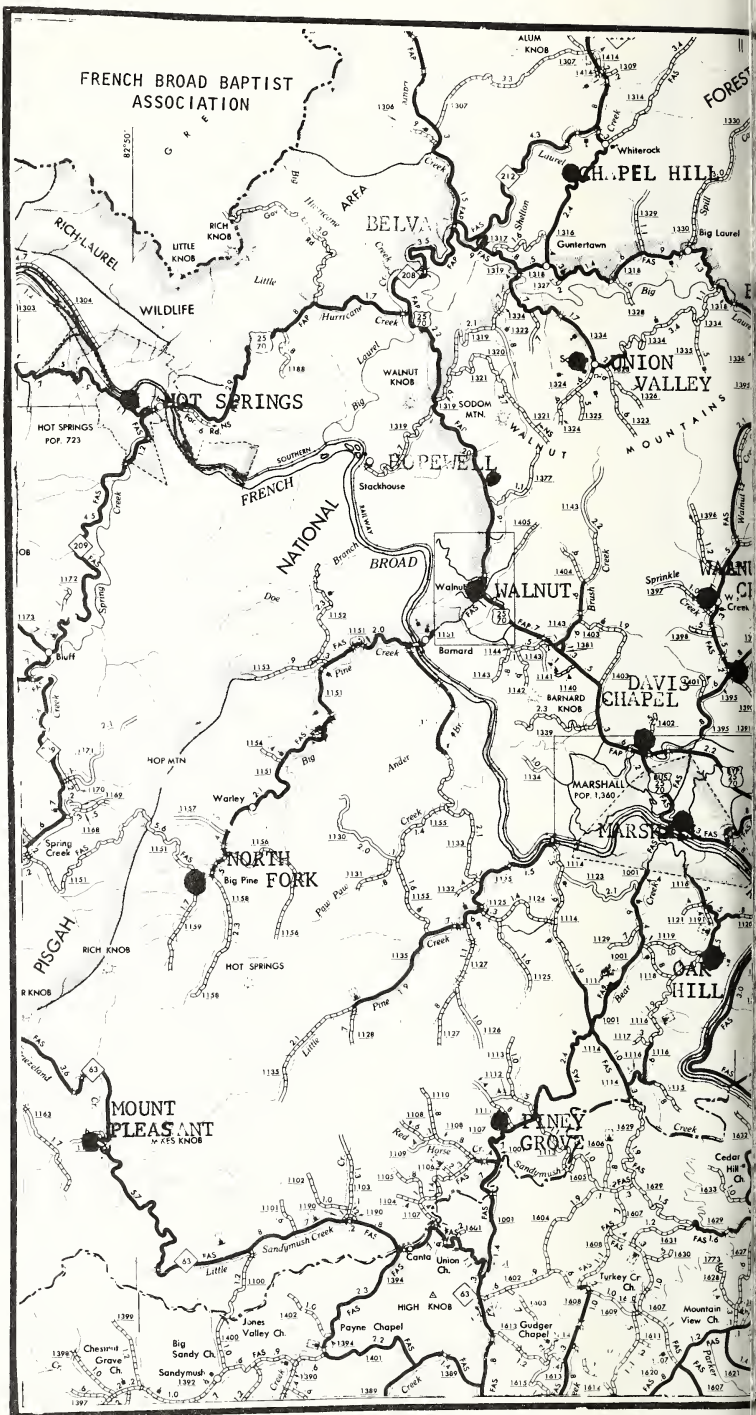
Reports from these missionaries illustrate the seriousness of the problem. The minutes of 1876 carried the following statements:

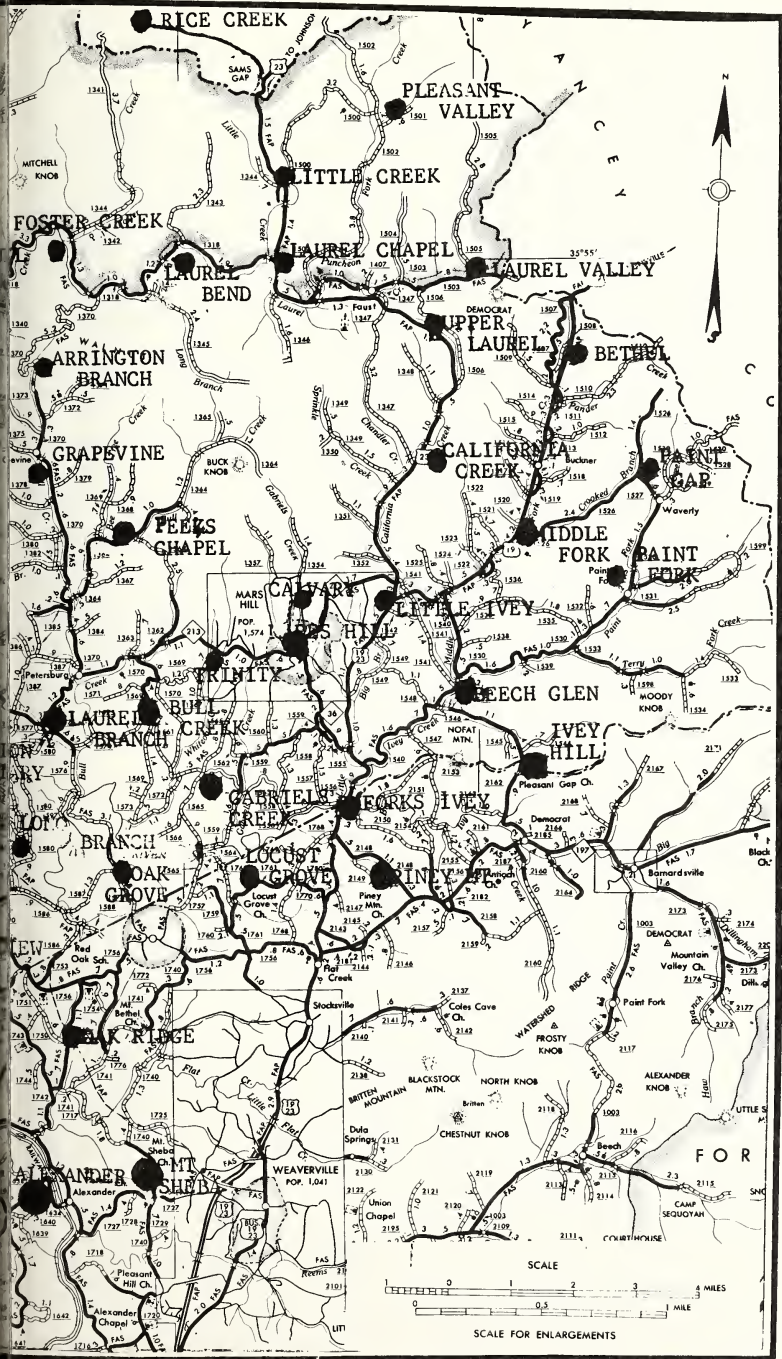
John Ammons worked 29 days, delivered 28 sermons, 42 professions, baptized 15, collected \$13.70 from Forks of Ivy, Bull Creek, Morgan Hill, Little Ivy, Big Ivy, Flag Pond and an individual contribution from S. Ammons. J. A. Bradley worked 110 days, preached 135 sermons, delivered 25 exhortations, travelled 1500 miles 198 conversions, 65 baptisms, constituted 1 church and 2 Sabbath Schools, received offerings of \$43.93.

The French Broad Association today cannot boast too loudly about its financial support of Association missions and the salary it pays the Superintendent of Missions but it has come a long way since 1876.

The Association has come a long way even within this decade. In 1969 members of the churches gave \$305,594; in 1975 they gave \$661,927. Gifts to the Cooperative Program were \$17,490 in 1969; in 1975, \$26,048. In 1969 the churches paid in salaries to pastors \$151,702; in 1975 this had grown to \$230,263. For missions the gifts have increased in like manner. Gifts to State Missions have increased from \$1,160 in 1969 to \$2,848 in 1975; for Home Missions from \$3,499 to \$6,046; and Foreign Missions from \$9,350 to \$15,660. Attendance in Sunday School has grown from an average of 2,548 each Sunday to 2,936 each Sunday. In 1975 there were 2,859 enrolled in Daily Vacation Bible Schools in 43 churches. Only three churches now meet in one-room buildings, and all churches have musical instruments to use in their services. Forty churches in 1975-1976 have full time pastors, in the sense that they have preaching services each Sunday. Some thirty churches have organized choirs to provide planned music each Sunday; twenty have music programs for the several age groups. Twenty churches now participate in the Annuity Program, helping to provide retirement for their pastors. For six years in this decade there has been an Association Camp for one week in the summer, with an attendance running between fifty and eighty children and adults. Church membership has increased from 5,802 to 5,929 in 1975, and this figure does not include the membership of two churches.

During the past year the following churches have made improvements on their buildings, equipment, and grounds: Bull Creek, California Creek,





Oak Ridge, Belva, Gabriels Creek, Oak Grove, Bethel, Little Ivy, Mount Sheba, Locust Grove, Peek's Chapel, Union Valley, Upper Rice Creek, Laurel Bend, North Fork and Calvary.

The following Pastors have resigned to take other positions or because of health: Donald Gasperson from Bethel; Dale Butler from Enon; Robert Felman from Mount Pleasant; Frank Plemmons from North Fork; Arthur Hensley from Peek's Chapel; Arlan Bullman from Union Valley; Bobby Penland and Clarence Robinson from Big Laurel; Jack Burnette from the Forks of Ivy; Howard Ogle from Oak Hill; Dearn Ammons from Beech Glen; Larry Brown and Kenneth Parker from Upper Rice Creek; Spencer LeGrand from Marshall; Troy Martin from Laurel Bend; H. L. Wilson from Little Creek and Ralph Hogan from Calvary.

The following new pastors have taken churches in the Association: David Mills at Hot Springs, Sibbald Lambert at Piney Mountain; Clive Hensley at Laurel Chapel; Gene Edwards at Big Laurel; Joe Sprinkle at Alexander; Joe Honeycutt at Little Ivy; George Bryant at Mount Pleasant and Wayne Briggs at Upper Rice Creek. We now have eight churches without pastors.

Association meetings were big events in the early years. It was an occasion for meeting friends whom one had not seen for a year and bountiful tables of food always added to the enjoyment. Those who lived at some distance spent the night with friends or members of the local congregation and the meeting became a real experience in good Christian fellowship. Moreover, the programs were generally concerned with doctrine and policy and delegates entered the debate with enthusiasm and sometime with "heat." As the years passed, however, committee reports, motions, and resolutions took most of the time and the meetings become less exciting. The bountiful tables of food still provided by the host churches help to make up for some of the hours of listening to reports. And, occasionally there is a "tilt" over some issue and it is quite evident that we are still Baptists, ready to defend our right under God to think for ourselves.

EVANGELISM REPORT

The most gigantic undertaking God has laid out for Christian men is to lead lost souls to Christ. To save a world He had to crucify His only begotten Son. In this saving program, He requisitioned all the powers of His Triune Deity, and He calls for the cooperation of every saved man. "Go into all the world and preach the Gospel."

The Division of Evangelism is continuing to cooperate with Brotherhood in Lay Revival Weekends. It has been our great pleasure to be involved in several this year and we are looking forward to growing support and interest throughout the year.

There was an overflow in attendance of more than 2,600 pastors and lay persons at the 30th Statewide Evangelism Conference at the Civic Center Auditorium, Asheville, February 2-4, 1976. The theme was "Freedom in Christ." The response from many persons indicated that this conference was one of the best in several years.

Lay persons and pastors continue to respond to the emphasis on lay witness training through Lay Evangelism Schools. During the past 4½ years, 14,284 youth and adults have participated in these schools from 1,150 churches and 62 associations. During the last evening of the 62 weeks of schools there have been 896 professions of faith made by youth and adults in their homes.

The 31st Statewide Evangelism Conference will be February 7-9, 1977 at the War Memorial Auditorium in Greensboro.

According to the report published May 1, 1976 in THE BIBLICAL RECORDER all of our churches reported as having contributed through special offerings; although not all our Churches reported as having given through the Cooperative Program.

We have a group of Girls in Action from Beech Glen and Middle Fork that have really given to others. This group raised \$1,135.00 for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, \$100.00 for the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, \$235.00 for Baptist Childrens Homes and \$90.00 for Cystic Fibrosis. This was done by sharing a tobacco crop, selling items in the community, and food at ball games. For their efforts they were awarded the Special Merit Youth Award for Western North Carolina for mission work. If a small number of girls can do this, what a challenge this should be to all members of the French Broad Association.

Perhaps other groups have done outstanding things during the past year that I do not know about. A letter was sent from your Stewardship Leader in the spring asking that you let her know of special stewardship activities in your church.

Human needs at home and abroad always seem greater than local resources. Jesus took the loaves and fishes and multiplied them. Our Lord can take what

we commit to Him and multiply and transform it in amazing proportion to meet human needs.

During this period of inflation let us remember that others are experiencing the same difficulties that we are. Let us remember that Jesus said "Freely ye have received, freely give." The Lord does not demand that we do great things for him, only that we are faithful with what he has given us. Each of us has been given a special gift in proportion to what Christ has given. SEMINARY EXTENSION REPORT

Seminary Extension is still a vital method of obtaining practical help about the Bible, preaching, and missions. 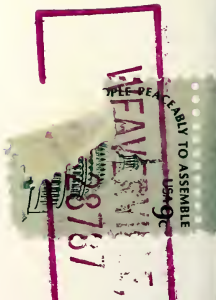

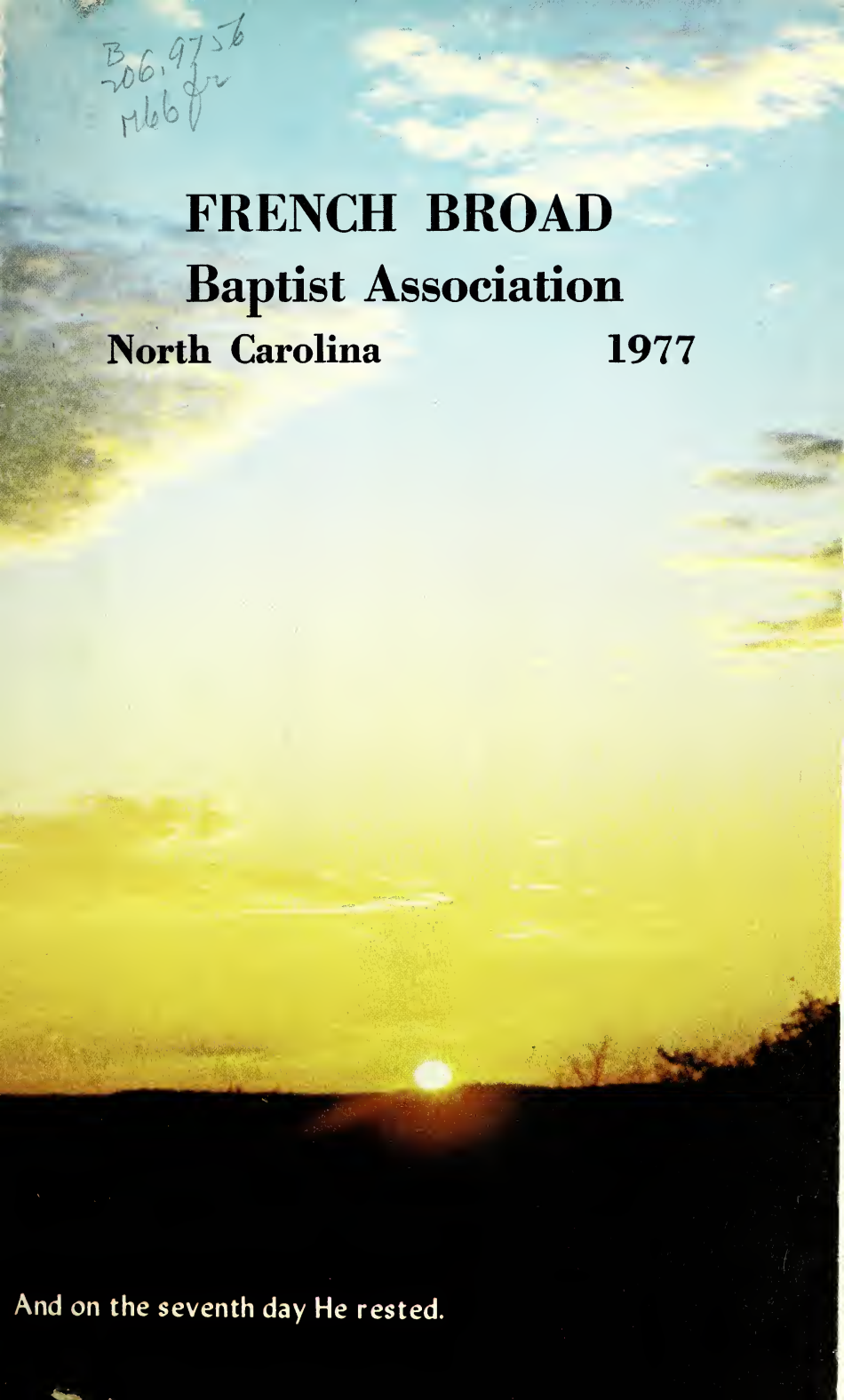

Constitution

1977

ARTICLE I—Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II—Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.
2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.
3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

ARTICLE III—Membership

SECTION 1. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches in this general area which have been formally accepted as members and which continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by naming messengers to the Annual Meetings; and by reporting to such Annual Meetings on forms which are provided by the Association.

2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make

application in the following manner:

a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.

b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.

c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an Annual Meeting of the Association.

3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application: Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the Moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.

4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner:

a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.

b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session shall be submitted to the Moderator of the Association and Chairman of the Executive Committee.

c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has toward the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in Annual Session and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in Annual Session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

SECTION II. Membership of the Annual Meetings of the Association

1. The membership of the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be composed of: The elected officers of the Association, all pastors who are members of churches in the Association, and all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the Annual Meeting.

2. Each member church is entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members above fifty, except that no church shall have more than ten messengers exclusive of the EX OFFICIO members designated above.

3. The EX OFFICIO members in attendance and the elected messengers presenting certification of their election by their churches shall constitute the official voting enrollment in any session.

ARTICLE IV—Officers

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Association shall be:

Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, the Chairman of Missions, the Chairman of Evangelism, and the Superintendent of Missions (EX OFFICIO).

SECTION II. Election of Officers

1. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee, this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the Annual Meeting.

2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.

3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the Annual Associational Meeting.

2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.

3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.

4. All committee members appointed and elected in the Annual Session begin their work at the close of the Annual Meeting and continue through the next Annual Session of the Association.

ARTICLE V—Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers named in Article IV, Section 1, plus one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, and the elected representative of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Committee.

SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between Annual Meetings of the Association.

2. To carry out the plans laid at the Annual Session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the Associational work.

3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

ARTICLE VI—Missions Committee

SECTION I. The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in Annual Meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

SECTION II. Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the Office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the Annual Meeting, or to a special called meeting of the Association.

2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

3. It shall supervise the activities of, and work with, the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.

4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.

5. It shall advise any group seeking to organize a mission or church.

6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.

7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.

8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

SECTION III. The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description of the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as EX OFFICIO member of all committees.

ARTICLE VII—Steering Committee

SECTION I. The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice-Moderator as Chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the Associational letter.

SECTION II. The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work in the Association.

2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.

3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

ARTICLE VIII—Other Committees

SECTION I. The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees at the Annual Associational Meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next Annual Meeting.

1. Committee on Committees: To work with the Moderator in the Annual Session in the appointment of committees.

2. Nominating Committee:

a. Nominate the Associational officers.

b. Name and recommend eleven members for the Missions Committee to be elected by the Association in the Annual Meeting.

c. Recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies

occurring during the year.

d. All nominees and recommended persons named by the Nominating Committee shall have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.

3. Committee on Reports:

a. This Committee shall nominate representatives who will correlate and report on the following phases of work: Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Hospitals, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

b. These representatives shall serve as leaders in the Association in correlating and promoting the work with their respective agencies.

c. Each of the representatives named shall make a brief written report to the Annual Associational Meeting informing the people about the work they have been chosen to represent.

4. Program Committee:

a. This Committee shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Associational Meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.

b. This Committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.

5. Committee on Places and Preachers:

a. This Committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next Annual Associational Meeting.

b. This Committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and Missionary Sermon.

6. Constitutional Amendment Committee:

a. This Committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular Annual Meeting.

b. This Committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the Associational work.

7. Committee on Resolutions:

a. This Committee shall consider and present to the Annual Associational Meeting and resolutions referred to them.

b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.

8. Youth Committee:

a. This Committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.

b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships and the like.

9. Ordination Committee:

a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, cooperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.

b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.

10. Seminary Extension Committee:

They shall promote and direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director and Registrar annually. They shall appoint teachers in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

ARTICLE IX—Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

ARTICLE X—Amendments

1. This Constitution may be amended in the following manner: Notification of the proposed amendments shall be made in writing to each church in the Association not less than thirty days, and not more than sixty days, prior to the Annual Meeting, such notification coming through the Associational Office.

2. A copy of the proposed amendments shall be provided to each messenger present for the first session.

3. A first reading of the proposed amendment must be approved by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the first session of the Annual Meeting. All changes, if any, to the proposed amendment shall be presented to the assembly at the first session prior to this first reading vote.

4. A final approval of the amendment shall be by a two-third vote of all messengers present and voting at the second session of the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE XI—Parliamentary Authority

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned, except where it may be in conflict with this Constitution.

ARTICLE XII—Amended Constitutional Copies

Certified copies of this Constitution as amended shall be filed with the Office of Superintendent of Missions, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, the Associational Historian, and not less than one copy placed in a safety box in a local bank.

Proceedings

Thursday, August 4, 1977—Night Session

(1) The one hundred seventieth annual session of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order by Moderator Stanley Peek on Thursday, August 4 at 7 p.m. at Middle Fork Baptist Church.

(2) The first order of business was to vote on whether to proceed with the annual meeting. According to the Constitution, there is an error in our meeting times. The annual meeting should be held one week later. A move was made to proceed, the move was seconded, and the vote carried.

(3) The congregation sang "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

(4) Rev. Lester Murphey, Pastor of the host church, gave the devotional taking his scripture from Acts 1:8. Rev. David Allman, Pastor of Long Branch, closed the devotions with prayer.

(5) Roll call of churches was made by the clerk. There were 167 persons present (123 messengers, 10 alternates, and 34 visitors).

(6) Dr. Evelyn Underwood, Chairman of the Program Committee, moved the adoption of the program. The move was seconded and passed. The Program Committee was recognized and thanked for their work on this program.

(7) Rev. E. J. Jenkins, Director of Missions, recognized all visitors and new pastors. There was one visitor present—Mr. Tom Greene with the Baptist State Convention in Raleigh. New pastors were Rev. Andrew Grindstaff, Pastor of Belva Church; Rev. Grey Fisher, Pastor of North Fork Church; Rev. Martin Fisher, Pastor of Chapel Hill; Rev. Jerry Keasling, Pastor of Upper Rice Creek; and Rev. Bruce Buckner, Pastor of Enon Church. All pastors were then recognized. There were twenty in attendance.

(8) The following announcements were made: a) Miss Sue Fitzgerald invited everyone to view the display of materials and literature to be set up during the day session at Oak Ridge Church. b) All pastors' wives were invited to the next Pastors' Wives Conference on Monday, August 8 at the home of Mrs. Worth Emory. c) All pastors were invited to Pastor's Conference on September 5 at Mars Hill College for an evening meal and tour of the Center for Christian Education Ministries.

(9) The following miscellaneous business was transacted: a) Mr. R. M. Lee, Chairman of the Constitutional Amendment Committee, read the amendments to the Constitution. Copies of the Constitutional Amendments were not available for the messengers as the Constitution states. However, a move was made to proceed with the adoption of the amendments. The move was seconded and passed. A move was then made to adopt the changes in the Constitution. The motion was seconded and carried. b) Mr. Wade Huey, Chairman of the Committee on Reception of New Churches, moved the adoption of that report, it was seconded and adopted. c) Dr. Underwood, Chairman of the Program Committee, made a motion ALL reports be adopted at one time in order to give more time for speakers. A time of discussion followed, the motion was seconded, and the reports will be adopted in a group.

(10) Mrs. Locke Robinson gave a presentation on Bold Missions in the French Broad Baptist Association. Mrs. Robinson stated the French Broad Baptist Association gave \$6,180.91 to home missions through the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering with 21 churches participating. Also the French Broad Baptist Association gave \$17,724.44 to foreign missions through the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering

with 28 churches participating.

(11) Mr. Tom Greene from the Baptist State Convention spoke asking that each person present do three things in two places. 1) Lead your church (and one other) to increase their pastor's salary according to the need. b) Lead your church (and one other) to give the suggested amount to the French Broad Baptist Association. c) Lead your church (and one other) to give from 10 to 50% of your undesignated offerings through the Cooperative Program.

(12) Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, Associational Music Director, led the congregation in singing an offertory hymn—"When We All Get to Heaven," and an offering of \$92.62 was taken. Rev. Peek gave the offertory prayer.

(13) Rev. Gerald Sprinkle, Pastor of Walnut Creek Church, brought a challenging sermon entitled "Statues that Have Been Our Songs in the House of the Lord" taking his scripture from Psalms 119:54.

(14) Rev. Ben Lee Honeycutt, Pastor of Oak Ridge Church, adjourned with prayer.

Friday, August 5, 1977—Morning Session

(15) The French Broad Baptist Association was again called into session at 9:30 a.m. at the Oak Ridge Church by Moderator Stanley Peck.

(16) Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in singing "Jesus Saves."

(17) Rev. Ben Lee Honeycutt, Pastor of the host church, brought the devotional taking his scripture from Ephesians 4.

(18) The following announcements were made: a) Miss Fitzgerald invited everyone downstairs at lunch to view the display of literature presented through the Center for Christian Education Ministries at Mars Hill College. b) The Ordination Council will meet at Forks of Ivy Church at 7:30 one day this week which will be announced later. c) An object of prayer was a hearing in Raleigh on that day regarding whether or not the ABC Store on Weaverville Highway would be licensed. Rev. Peck led the congregation in prayer for this hearing.

(19) The following business items were transacted: a) Mr. Wade Huey presented a motion made by the Executive Committee that Mrs. David B. Roberts be appointed Superintendent of Missions, Emeritus. The motion was seconded, and the vote was unanimous. b) Mr. Theodore Robinson presented a motion made by the Executive Committee to purchase a piece of property (approximately one acre or thereabouts) between Marshall and Mars Hill for an associational office. The motion was seconded and a discussion followed. A motion was made to amend the above motion by having a committee to select the site appointed by the Moderator and approved by the association at the afternoon session. The motion was seconded to amend the above and the vote was unanimous. The vote was also unanimous on the original motion.

(20) A motion was made that ALL printed reports be adopted at this time, a second was made and the reports were unanimously adopted.

(21) Guest speakers for the afternoon were: a) Sara Hobbs (Baptist Foundation). Ms. Hobbs spoke on "Stewardship." She stated the Baptist Foundation could be beneficial to individuals by helping to find a channel through which one can put his money where he wishes it to go and it can help in planning one's estate. b) Robert Abrams (Gardner-Webb College). Mr. Abrams extended his thanks for the support given to Gardner-Webb. He mentioned briefly the new "Deaf Ministry" Program being started at Gardner-Webb this year. c) Ralph Cannon (Homes for the Aging). Mr. Cannon stressed the need for everyone's prayers and support. He commended the French Broad Baptist Association for their contribution toward the

Asheville home on Richmond Hill. d) D. P. McFarland (Christian Action League). Mr. McFarland stated they were very pleased with the strong anti-pornography stand of the General Assembly. Liquor-by-the drink is still a major concern for CAL. He stated one could help the Christian Action League by adopting a resolution against liquor-by-the drink and sending this resolution to members of the House from your area and by sending a love offering to the Christian Action League. e) Robert Melvin (Mars Hill College). Mr. Melvin expressed his thanks for the continued support of the French Broad Baptist Association. f) Calvin Knight (Baptist Hospital). Mr. Knight stated three objectives of the Baptist Hospital: —Using their skills and facilities to minister to sick people. —Trying to keep the cost of hospital and medical care as low as possible. —Working to fulfil the Christian mission of bringing the healing art under our great “Healer.” g) Hugh Starnes (Baptist Children’s Homes). Mr. Starnes related the services offered by the Baptist Children’s Homes—Foster Home Program, Maternity Home, Emergency Care Home, and Group Care. Any one needing the care of Baptist Homes should call Broyhill Home. Individuals may help the Baptist Children’s Homes by giving through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Program, or memorials; by being clothing sponsors, house parents or foster parents; or by giving produce.

(22) A total of 241 persons registered for the Association today.

(23) Rev. Charles Buckner, our own missionary to Indonesia, gave a resume of his work there and extended his thanks for the help of the French Broad Baptist Association.

(24) The Oak Ridge Youth Choir presented special music.

(25) Rev. Joe Rice, Pastor of Grapevine Church, brought an inspirational associational sermon taking his scripture from Judges 7 and using the theme “On the Winning Side.”

(26) The morning session was then adjourned with prayer led by Rev. Jenkins.

AFTERNOON SESSION

(27) Mr. Owen Fish, Vice Moderator, brought the final session of the French Broad Baptist Association to order.

(28) Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in singing “Blessed Assurance.”

(29) Dr. Fred Bentley, President of Mars Hill College, brought the devotional using the theme “A Seeking God” and taking his scripture from Matthew 18:12-14.

(30) Rev. Jenkins asked the following persons to give the highlights of their church year: a) Rev. Sibbald Lambert—Piney Mountain—stated the church had completed new Sunday School rooms, had added growth in Church Training and Sunday School and are just thankful the Lord has blessed them. b) Miss Sharon Baker—Hot Springs—stated they were to receive bids for their sanctuary on Tuesday, and they are hoping to be in their new building by Thanksgiving. They have a very active youth program on Wednesday night with about 50 young people attending. c) Rev. Charles Rector—California Creek—stated they were now in their new building, had an excellent Vacation Bible School, and felt they had been blessed a great deal this year. d) Rev. Stanley Peek—Bull Creek—stated they were bricking their Sunday School wing and had purchased an organ. 3) Rev. Ben Lee Honeycutt—Oak Ridge—stated they were in their new building with it completely paid for and were planning to build a fellowship hall in the future. f) Dr. Bentley—Mars Hill College—stated that Southeastern Seminary is planning to set up a branch on Mars Hill campus for a Master of Divinity Program in September,

1978 provided there is enough interest (20 or more people). g) Rev. John Bussard—Madison Seminary—stated their church had grown in quality this year by being involved in the Billy Graham Crusade and Billy Hanks Discipleship classes. They celebrated their tenth anniversary in their present building and have turned the parsonage into a building for their youth. h) Rev. Bruce Buckner—Enon—stated they would be celebrating their sixtieth anniversary as an established church the following Sunday with a homecoming. i) Rev. Richard Price—Mars Hill—stated they had started a memorial fund for needy students at Mars Hill College. The church had given over \$500 to needy students in the last few months. j) Rev. Joe Sprinkle—Alexander—stated they had completed their fellowship hall, new Sunday School rooms, air-conditioned their church and blacktopped around it.

(31) Rev. Vincent Young, Pastor at Marshall Church, was recognized as a new pastor.

(32) Mr. Wade Huey was recognized as having attended the French Broad Associational Annual Meetings the longest of any person attending the meetings this year—30 years. Mr. Huey gave a testimony stating Mr. David B. Roberts was the one person who meant the most to him in those 30 years.

(33) Rev. Luther Osment, Area Missionary, brought an inspirational message using the theme "Working Together" and taking his scripture from Acts 1:7.

(34) Mrs. Ada Moore who attended the Southern Baptist Convention gave a summary of the meeting in Kansas City, Missouri. She stated there were 15,299 messengers from 35,073 churches in 50 states with North Carolina having the third largest group of messengers present.

(35) Rev. Jenkins stated the World Missions Conference will be meeting in our Association in September, 1978. He is hoping at least 40 churches will participate. This will give our Association 22 missionaries. A letter and application to be voted on is to be sent to each church by the end of November

(36) The following business items were brought: a) A clarification in the name of the Church Training Director for the coming year was made. Miss Martha Arrowood was to replace Mrs. Ruth Shepherd. b) A motion was made for the approval of the proposed Constitutional Amendments. This motion was seconded and the vote carried to incorporate these amendments into our constitution. c) The following committee was appointed to serve in the selection of a site for the Associational Office: Mr. Grant McDaris, Mr. Owen Fish, Mr. Harvey Franklin, Mr. Wade Huey, and Mr. Theodore Robinson. d) Rev. Jenkins stated the gavel for the Association has been misplaced. He felt it would be a good idea to get another one which had some significant or sentimental value. A discussion followed with several suggestions being made. A motion was made that Dr. Evelyn Underwood, Historian, take charge of getting a gavel by the next annual meeting. This motion was seconded and the vote carried. A discussion followed regarding persons to serve with Dr. Underwood in getting the gavel. A motion was made to amend the original motion as follows: Dr. Underwood would act as Chairman of the Committee and would appoint the persons to serve with her. The motion was seconded, and the vote carried. e) A motion was made that the French Broad Baptist Association go on record as opposed to liquor-by-the-drink and to let our members in the House—Ernest Messer and Liston Ramsey—know that we are opposed to it by sending them the following resolution:

Whereas, the citizens of North Carolina voted by a two and one-half to one majority against liquor-by-the-drink in the state-wide referendum on November 6, 1973, and

Whereas, we believe there has been no substantial change in this sentiment, and
Whereas, the State A.B.C. Board has estimated that with liquor-by-the-drink
there could be possibly 4,000 to 5,000 new outlets for the sale of whiskey in North
Carolina,

Therefore, be it resolved that we the members of the French Broad Baptist
Association, assembled in session on this 5th day of August, 1977, hereby do heartily
commend our elected representatives in the House for their opposition to this propos-
al and urge that they vote against such legislation in the 1978 special session.

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes
of this organization and a copy sent to each of the members of the House from this
district.

The motion was seconded, and the vote was unanimous. f) A recommendation was
made by the Executive Committee that the Association withdraw Foster Creek and
Pleasant Valley Churches from its membership. These churches do not wish to be a
part of the Association and have not responded with a church letter for five years.
The Constitution states that a church will be dropped from membership if it does
not respond with a letter in two years. A motion was made that these two churches
be withdrawn. The motion was seconded, and the vote carried.

(37) Mrs. Roberts led the congregation in singing "He Leadeth Me."

(38) Mrs. Roberts then read the names of our beloved dead, and there was a
moment of silent prayer in remembrance of them.

(39) Rev. Wesley Grant sang a hymn in memory of those who have gone from
our Association this year. He then brought a very enjoyable message using John 5:8
as his text. He closed by singing "I'll Fly Away."

(40) Several objects and requests for prayer were made at this time and some
testimonies were given.

(41) A request was made for Rev. Grant to sing "Have Thine Own Way, Lord,"
and a love offering was taken for him while he sang.

(42) Other testimonies were given and Rev. David Allman closed the final
session with prayer.

APPRECIATION

"Thou Art Faithful" belongs in the definition of Dorothy Sprinkle along with
other adverbs such as self-offering, dedicated, dependable, committed, etc. really a

SUGGESTED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP:

Section 1—Member Churches. Change to read: (1) This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist churches in this general area WHICH have been formally accepted as members and which continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association, by naming messengers to the annual meeting; and by reporting to such annual meetings on forms which are provided by the Association.

ARTICLE III, Section 1, change item 4-b to read:

A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session shall be submitted to the Moderator of the Association and Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section II—MEMBERSHIP OF THE ANNUAL MEETINGS OF THE ASSOCIATION: Change to read as follows:

The membership of the annual meeting of the Association shall be composed of:

1. The elected officers of the Association, all pastors who are members of churches in the Association; and all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the annual meeting.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS:

Section I. The officers of the Association shall be: Change to read: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, the Chairman of Missions, the Chairman of Evangelism, and the Superintendent of Missions (EX OFFICIO).

ARTICLE V. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

Section I. Change to read:

The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers names in Article IV, Section I, plus one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, and the elected representative of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention. The Moderator will serve as Chairman of the Committee.

ARTICLE VIII. OTHER COMMITTEES:

Section II. Duties of these Committees shall be:

2. Nominating Committee:

- (a) Nominate the Associational officers
- (b) Name and recommend 11 members of the Missions Committee to be elected by the Association in the annual meeting.
- (c) Recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year.
- (d) All nominees and recommended persons named by the Nominating Committee shall have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.

3. Committee on Reports:

- (a) This Committee shall nominate representatives who will correlate and report on the following phases of work: Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Hospitals, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

- (b) These representatives shall serve as leaders in the Association in correlating and promoting the work with their respective agencies.
- (c) Each of the representatives named shall make a brief written report to the annual associational meeting informing the people about the work they have been chosen to represent.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In planning my report this year I went back to the Minutes of 1877 to see what our churches were doing one hundred years ago. The Association, which included some churches in East Tennessee at that time, held its 17th Annual Meeting at Big Laurel Church for three days, Friday through Sunday, during the last week in August. Elder, W. T. Bradley, preached the opening sermon, using I Cor. 3:9 ("For we are laborers together with God") as his text. Four elders preached on Sunday, two at the morning session and two in the afternoon. Twenty-seven churches presented letters.

Most of us would agree that there was plenty of preaching but the reports of committees were less encouraging. The Committee on Missions reported that all efforts were "an entire failure on the subject of Home Missions." Two resolutions were passed to bolster the work. One provided for the taking of an offering at the close of the meeting, one half of it to go to the Western North Carolina Convention and the other half to Home Missions, which was at that time restricted to providing preachers for areas in the Association where there were no churches. The other resolution urged the churches to organize themselves as "missionary societies" to collect money for Home Missions.

A number of other resolutions were passed to deal with a variety of issues. One instructed the churches to use "nothing as a substitute for the juice of the vine" in observing the Lord's Supper. Another urged all churches to provide Sunday Schools for teaching the Bible. A third condemned the making, selling, or drinking of "ardent spirits."

Against this background the reports of 1977 show significant change. The gifts to missions for this year have been the greatest ever given through the churches of the Association. The Lottie Moon Offering for Foreign Missions was \$17,724.44; the Home Mission Offering, \$6,180.91. The reports on the Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Daily Vacation Bible Schools, and Seminary Extension classes speak for themselves. They indicate a greater interest in studying and learning to be effective workers in His Kingdom. The Association can very proud of the fact that the French Broad had more ADVANCED Daily Vacation Bible Schools this year than any Association in the state.

This year a number of churches have completed or initiated building and church improvement programs. California Creek has finished a beautiful new building; and Oak Ridge has completed the lovely new structure in which the Association will be meeting on Friday. Hot Springs is in the process of building a new church. Oak Grove has enlarged its sanctuary and bricked the entire building; Laurel Chapel has also brick veneered their building. Piney Mountain has added Sunday School rooms and is ready to enlarge their sanctuary. Big Laurel has added Sunday School rooms and built a rock wall across the front of the lot. Locust Grove has added a large fellowship hall. Gabriels Creek Church is in the process of adding new Sunday School rooms, a baptistry, a choir loft, and a fellowship hall. Little Ivy has paved a new parking lot. Little Creek Church and Upper Laurel Church have both bought trailer-homes for their pastors. Ivy Hill and Bull Creek have installed new organs.

A number of new pastors have come to serve in the Association. The one discouraging report, however, is that seven churches are at present without pastors. This has been a good year in our Association.

CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS

Proverbs 14:34 says, "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." As we take a look at our newspaper we shudder at the sinful and shameful happenings in America. The headlines read: murdered, stabbed, strangled, kidnapped, raped, highway fatalities and the like.

What can bring a change? I believe I can help. The prayer of masses changed God's wrath toward the children of Israel, sparing them total destruction. James 5:16 says: "The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much." This challenges each Christian citizen to stand both feet firm praying for God to be our leader, recognizing with God all things are possible.

I challenge us to get a list of our state and government officials and to call out their names to God daily.

"Too many citizens in our country," someone has said, "exercise only as much political freedom as the ordinary Russian citizen is permitted to have." Most national officials primarily consider two factors as they weigh decisions on legislation and policy: (1) They act on what they think is right. (2) They are sensitive to public opinion within their constituencies. Morally responsible citizens, then, have an obligation to be vocal constituents. "If the average member of congress received as many as a half-dozen letters scrawled in pencil on brown wrapping paper, it would be enough to change his or her vote on most issues," a government official, veteran of about 20 years on Capitol Hill, once said. He may have exaggerated, but his statement indicates that congress members want to know how ordinary people in their districts feel about public questions.

America suffers from a crisis in morality and integrity. Only as Christians live out their faith will a lost world be improved and changed. To that end the Christian must be dedicated.

How do you feel about liquor-by-the-drink? Those of us with young children, how about obscenity? How about the crowded prisons and boys dying in prison fires and stabbings? How about the stand Anita Bryant has taken on homosexuality; Does it bother you that child abuse and neglect is a real threat to our children? In the Governor's Proclamation for North Carolina awareness month, he states that an estimated 2,000 die in the nation each year due to abuse or neglect. In North Carolina since July, 1971 over 25,000 children have been abused or neglected, including at least 100 deaths. In Buncombe County 31 cases of abuse

alone was reported from 1975-1976. Then from July, 1976 (middle of month) to January, 1977 (middle of month) an increase of abuse showed 22 cases. In Madison County one official abuse case per year was the ratio only a little time ago. Now we have at least one abuse case each month and this is excluding all the child neglect cases. Are you aware that: 1.3 million Americans between 12 and 17 have "serious" drinking problems! 450,000 youngsters between 10 and 19 are considered alcoholics! One third of our high school students get drunk at least once a month! Three out of every four high school students drink. That's twice as many as just four years ago! Arrests of boys 18 and younger for intoxication have jumped 250% in the same period. Four out of 10 teenagers involved with alcohol are females! Where do you stand on these issues? Being quiet and uninvolved is a vote FOR any time.

HOME, STATE, AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

Emphasis Bold Missions Thrust—In Acts 1:8—But ye shall receive power, after the Holy Spirit is come upon you; and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth. Christ's disciples crossed barriers. Jerusalem represents the barrier of the city; Judea, the barrier of the region; Samaria, the barrier of race. The uttermost parts represent the barrier of scarce resources, both people and money.

The Cooperative Program is a voluntary way that Southern Baptists work together to spread the gospel. It is a democratic, flexible, and inexpensive way to finance denominational work. Over the years, it has become a united and continual appeal for Baptist Causes. What a unified budget is to a church, the Cooperative Program has become to the state conventions and to the Southern Baptist Convention.

The churches are on mission to people under the Lordship of Christ—Matthew 28:19-20; Acts 1:8. Churches in a cooperative plan express their mission beyond the local congregation. State Missions is interrelated by planning and financing with associations, the State Convention, and Home and Foreign Mission Boards. There is a ministry of State Missions expressed in evangelism through the local church, youth rallies, summer ministries, church programs, and stewardship promotion. State Missions is churches expressing a positive interest in Christian education.

State Missions is a multiplicity of special ministries too big for any one local church. These ministries to areas of need may be altogether supported by State Missions budgeting, or a cooperative budgeting arrangement of the local church, the association, the State Convention, and the Home Mission Board. Such specialized ministries include work at Cherokee and Pembroke, promotion and coordination of World Mission Conferences, supplement to associational budgets, support of part-time chaplaincies in several correctional institutions, assistance in witnessing to and enlisting for service Orientals and Spanish speaking peoples. A specialized ministry to the deaf includes evangelizing, teaching and counseling the deaf.

Also included is a cooperative plan for Seminary Extension and a rapidly growing Resort Ministry. Fruitland Baptist Institute is an area of State Missions. Our cities need Baptist centers and other expressions of Christian social and evangelistic concern. State Missions continues a specialized ministry with other races and promotes and supports a vigorous inner city ministry.

State Mission serves the pastor and the local church. New churches are encouraged by loans and grants of lot aid. Needy churches are given financial aid until they can become self-supporting. Pastors are directly helped through annuity supplements.

State Missions is a cooperative ministry to churches that need help and to people who need God.

The Home Mission Board works in all fifty states plus Puerto Rico and American Samoa.

More than 2,400 missionaries and office personnel serve full time for the Home Mission Board. The Home Mission Board also uses around 19,000 special workers on mission fields every year—youth groups and choirs, student summer missionaries, So-Journers, Campers on Mission and Christian Corps volunteers. The Home Mission Board endorses more than 1,500 men and women serving as chaplains in hospitals, institutions, industry and in the military.

More than half of all the home missionaries—more than 1,000—are language missionaries—ministering to Americans of non-English language and culture. About 300 home missionaries serve in Christian Social Ministries and between 350 and 400 receive church pastoral aid. The Home Mission Board's ministries are funded by Southern Baptists giving through two channels, the Cooperative Program and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering. Each one makes up about one half of the Home Mission Board's total budget.

The theme TOTAL MISSION THRUST: Global discipleship has been selected for a twenty-five year plan in Southern Baptist Foreign Missions. Total Mission Thrust ties in with and is an essential part of the Southern Baptist Convention's bold missions emphasis.

In 1976 the number of new missionaries broke all previous records, with the appointment of a total of 268 persons (including ten who were reappointed, thirty-two missionary associates, ninety-four missionary journeymen, and four special project medical workers.)

Through the Foreign Mission Board, Southern Baptists have carried on relief to 33 countries, but the largest effort was following the earthquake in Guatemala.

Currently more than 2,715 missionaries bear witness in approximately 84 countries. As money and personnel become available, the Foreign Mission Board stands ready to enter where missionaries have not been.

Associational Missions is a cooperative ministry. Matthew 28:19,20; Acts 1:8 (LET the CHURCH REACH OUT). This is the resounding call throughout our Association and all of the Southern Baptist Convention for 1977-79. We, in the French Broad, have had a good year in this effort, but 1978 will bring greater realization of this fact. With the coming Sunday School Emphasis, World Mission Conference, State Mission Emphasis and Deacons School along with the support of our institutions is truly going to be a great year ahead. As your Superintendent of Missions, I give praise and thanks to God for you and what you have done through your church for His kingdom's work. There are no words that can express my appreciation for those who helped with the work and contributions on the house

and those who have given me meat, vegetables, hay, etc. May God bless each and every one. I have tried not to take the Associational time to build yet I know I have not given as much to the Association as I could have and the following report will reflect this fact.

We have had the opportunity of visiting at least once in every church in the Association except one (Mars Hill). Churches in which I have had the privilege in working this year numbers 27, had the opportunity to supply in 6 and held Bible Schools in 6, preached 114 times, there has been 142 Associational meetings we have attended, conducted 21 radio programs, 9 funerals, 4 weddings, 4 school services, 7 services outside the Association, held 593 individual conferences, 78 group conferences, 98 committee meetings, had 33 conversions, baptized 11, traveled 18,222 miles, published 900 calendars of activities, 4,974 bulletins, 300 Vacation Bible School books, 200 Book of Reports, and 5,328 letters. We have published for churches and individuals outside the Associational Office in the neighborhood of 5,000 pieces of literature.

Dorothy Sprinkle has typed and done all the paper work. Her work in dedication to God's Kingdom here in our Associational Office is without measure and comparison. She works as though she receives \$6.00 per hour yet she has done it all gratis, that is for nothing. MY!!! MY!!! What dedication??? It's seldom we ever see it on this fashion. OH!!! if just more of us were like this.

This year has been a great year in the French Broad Association and it has in most cases broken our previous records but there is still much to be done and God would have us do it for His glory.

Would you please remember us and the work in your prayers each day.

The attendance at both clinics was very good. May 19, the same team taught the Age Group Books for Bible School at Bull Creek.

May 4, your Sunday School Director and Director of Missions attended a Sunday School Bible Teaching Learning Workshop at the First Baptist Church in Asheville.

May 16, from 1-5 o'clock, your Director attended a Sunday School Workshop with other directors and pastors at First Baptist Church in Asheville to study and make plans for an Associational Sunday School Workshop in September, 1977 with help from the State Office. The purpose of the workshop is to equip Sunday School workers for 1977-78 through spiritual emphasis, study of organization and materials for reaching and teaching, and intensive departmental planning.

What can we, as a church do to make this coming year one of the best ever? Before we begin to search for an easy, automatic formula examine these three verbs: Pray, plan and work. Pray—Pray about your Sunday School and your place in it. It is only through God's power that success is achieved and Bible study is made meaningful. Praying about the needs and plans of your Sunday School is the beginning of hope, assurance, and joy for 1977-78. Plan—To be ready for 1977-78, you need to plan for exciting, adventuresome times in your Sunday School. New classes, and improved teaching do not just happen; they must be desired, planned for, and worked at before they can be realized. To plan, you need people and materials. Our State Sunday School Department has put together much material to help Sunday School leaders lead their people in an aggressive year of Sunday School work. Involve your people and learn your materials. Work—You can pray, and you can plan, but if you stop there, you might as well quit. There is no substitute for dedicated work. If you really want a great year in Sunday School, you must

work at it. Your determination puts feet to your prayers and your plans. Commit yourself to pray more often, to plan more thoroughly, and to work harder to glorify God.

Our Sunday Schools should use the Bible as the text book and supplement it with Baptist Literature for each age group. Too our Sunday School informs its people of false "religions" which are making their way into our area.

If your Sunday School needs help on literature, training sessions for workers, or any other way the Association can help we will welcome the opportunity to be of assistance.

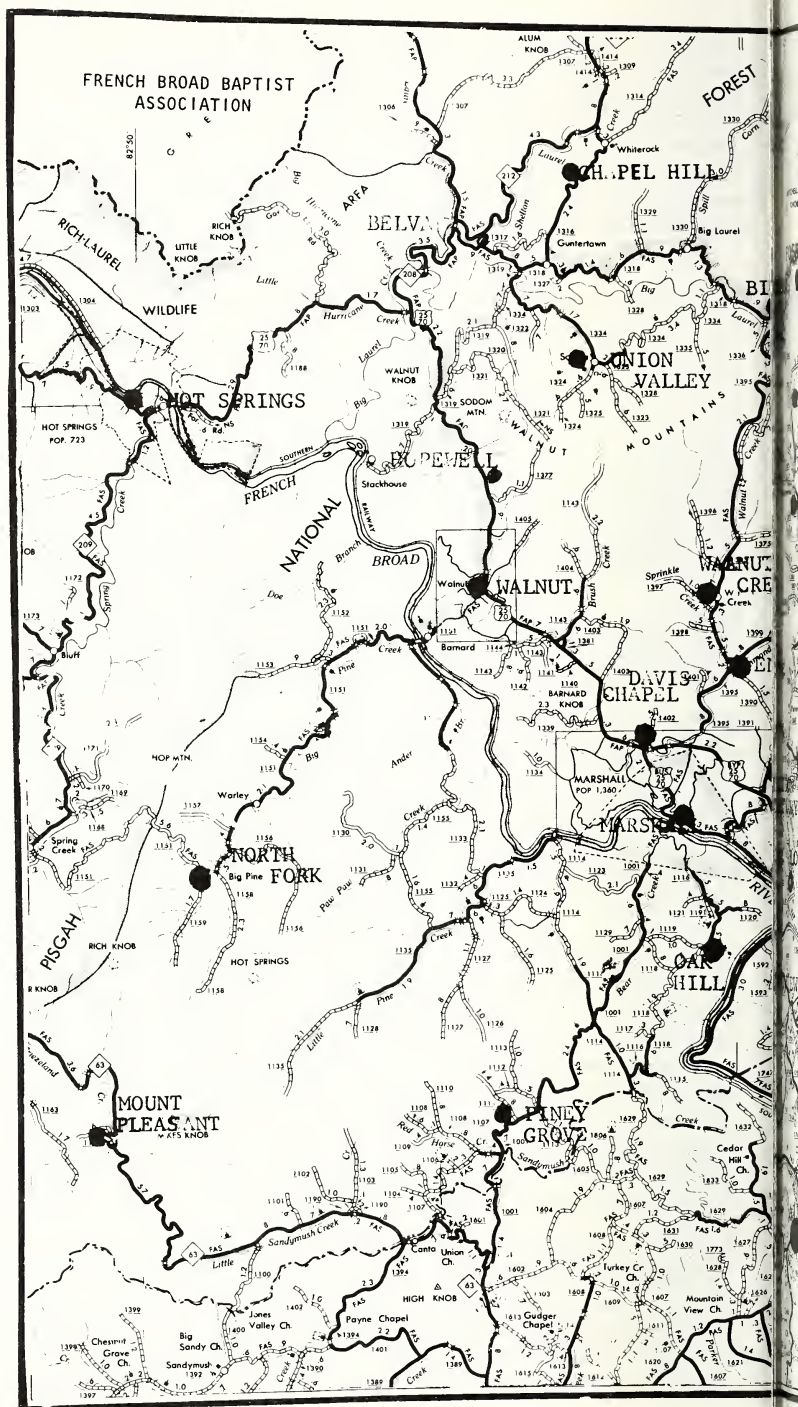

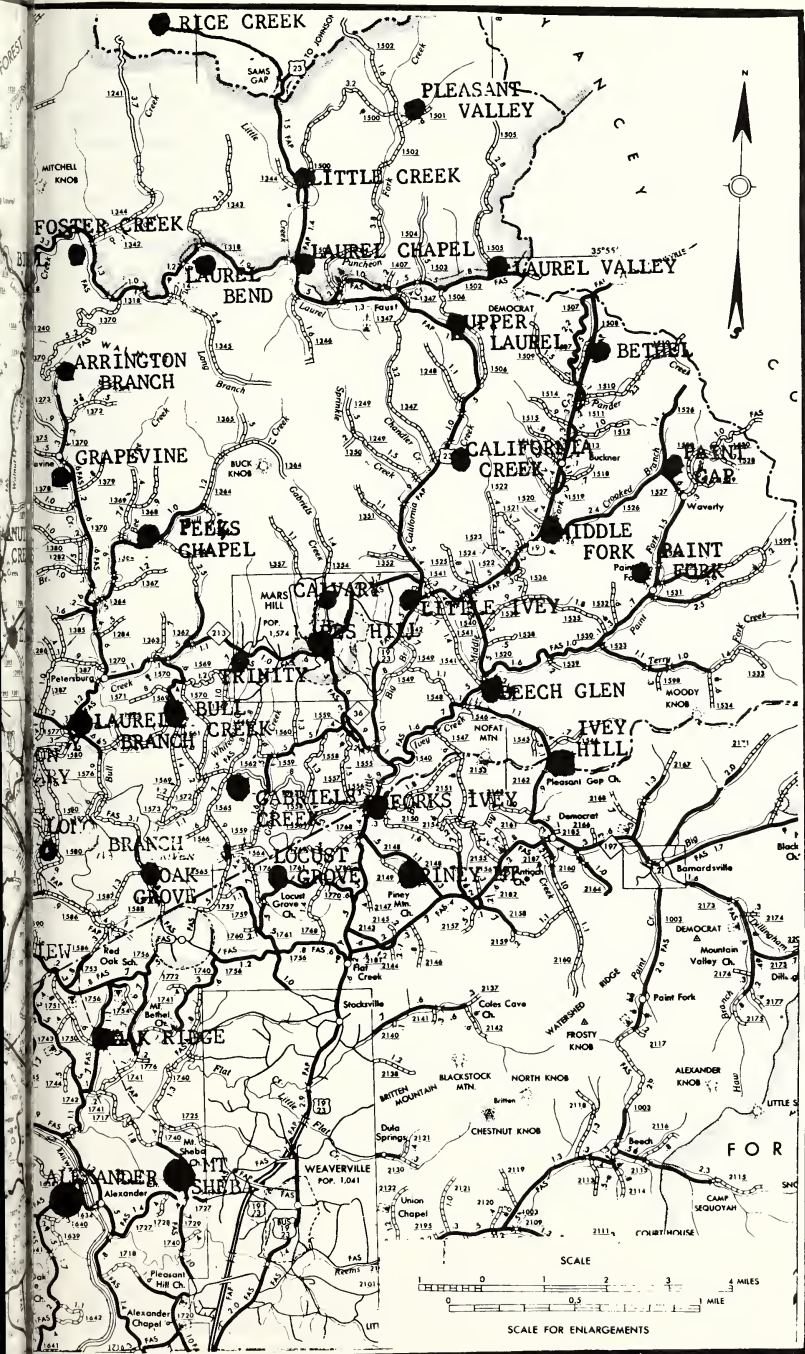
REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

PASTOR'S SALARY

The cost of living is still on the increase. There are no less sick in our church communities and no doubt, no less requirements of the pastor now than last year, or years past. But as we think of this, are we mindful enough of our pastors to see that they have the financial support required to take care of the extra expenses that are a part of his work as well as the expense of supporting his family.

If your pastor's income for example this past year was \$100.00 per week and he drove his car around 30,000 miles and you allow 10 cents per mile, his net "take home pay" would be \$2,200.00. Now subtract \$520.00 tithe. This leaves him \$1,680.00. Will he be able to buy food, clothing, pay utility bills, Social Security, insurance, provide an education for his children, medical coverage and doctor bills?

The Bible still teaches that those who preach the Gospel should live off the Gospel. It says the workman is worthy of his hire and that "thou shalt not muzzle the mouth of the ox that treadeth out the corn."

Let us ask ourselves this question. When my pastor retires from the active pastorate, will he be able to hold up his head in dignity because he is able to provide and pay for the necessities of life in his last years?

Regretfully, only 20 pastors in the French Broad Association are covered by the Southern Baptist Protection Program in retirement benefits.

I trust that this report will help us to realize our responsibility to the pastors of our Association as they tell the story of Jesus and carry on this great work.

ANNUITY REPORT

Today many private industries provide for their employees with "fringe benefits" in the form of hospitalization, disability and retirement benefits. Our Southern Baptist Convention has a program whereby the churches may provide for these eventualities for their church staff members.

In the French Broad Association as of this date we have twenty of our churches which are providing disability and retirement protection for their pastor and we provide this for Brother Jenkins. During the past year a number of churches were contacted with little response. Many of our churches have not seen the vision of their pastor as he nears the "end of that long road of ministry," brought on by retirement, disability or death.

I would hope that in the coming year many more of our churches will take a long hard look at their budgets and not forget the men who God places in their churches, communities and hearts. I am happy to report that one new church has been added to those already providing this little extra. Also one new pastor has entered the program which his church has been providing for preceding pastors.

NEW PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS YEAR: In 1976, the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention recommended a new retirement program which was approved by all the state Baptist conventions. The new program called the Southern Baptist Retirement Program will go into effect January 1, 1978.

Detailed information will be presented to churches in the early fall with a ROUTE 10 promotional theme, according to Darold H. Morgan, President of the Board.

The Board paid \$17,138,343 in benefits to 11,925 widows, retired or disabled members in 1976. During its 59 years of service, the Board has paid more than \$158 million in retirement and protection benefits.

A 13th check amounting to one month's income was mailed for the eleventh time to annuitants. The combined amount of this extra benefit came to \$830,525.

Most members benefit from a decision to increase the interest rate for figuring retirement benefits. Annuitants began receiving larger checks as of January 1, 1977.

For almost 45,000 members, the Board held in trust funds totaling \$472,218,669 for retirement benefits for the year ending 1976.

In North Carolina as of March 31, 1977, 2787 staff members of 2196 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program; 2491 in the Family Benefit Section; 1275 in the Age Security Section and 240 in the Variable Benefit Section.

The Annuity Board also administers life, medical and disability insurance programs, which reflected increases in membership.

All Southern Baptist colleges have been undergoing a serious reexamination of the Christian basis for education. Our seven North Carolina Baptist Colleges; Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest and Wingate have been a part of this study, looking at the responsibility of Christian education for the transmission of values. The colleges recognize the strong bond between our churches and our schools. They renew this covenant relationship in an even stronger pledge to God and to the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The following statements are part of the reaffirmation that were adopted by the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools to serve as guidelines for the study.

"As we look to the third century with confidence, we reaffirm our allegiance to the covenant relationship between our churches and our schools, a covenant which finds its unity in the purpose of God, the mind of Christ, the work of the Spirit, and the authority of the Scriptures, and which causes the churches and the schools to work together in freedom and faithfulness.

We further reaffirm that providing Christian education is, for Baptists, not optional, because it is our response to the mandate of our Lord to know and to teach the truth, and to the clear intent of the Scriptures that God shall not be left without a witness to the minds of the children

We reaffirm that Christian education rests upon the presupposition that all truth is of God

We reaffirm that in obedience to the clear teachings of Jesus Christ, we have a responsibility for helping to guide the student in the development of Christian character

We reaffirm our belief that a central duty of Christian higher education is to transmit Christian ethical and moral values both of precept and example

We reaffirm our commitment to the Bible as the all-sufficient guide of faith and practice."

These are only part of the affirmations. They are strong and show a real commitment on the part of our colleges. As the colleges have reaffirmed their covenant with the churches, we ought also to reaffirm our faith in our colleges. We ought to support them through our encouragement, through our prayers and through our money.

One southwide magazine, THE BAPTIST PROGRAM is full of guides to resources—new books as well as opportunities for study and leadership helps. "The Open Meeting," a regular feature of the magazine is an interesting open forum question with answers from writers giving different views.

SEARCH is a periodical which "seeks to explore current issues related to religious education, church music, administration and practical theology." It seeks to be "a platform for the exchange of important ideas and information."

Three important magazines give us perspective and stimulus to missions. They are HOME MISSION (missions in our own homeland), COMMISSION (foreign missions), WORLD MISSION JOURNAL (Brotherhood magazine) and ROYAL SERVICE (W.M.U. magazine). Unless we are informed we cannot pray or give or act wisely.

These are only a few of the periodicals available to us. They can help us to witness and serve as we are commissioned to do, and to do it in a better way. You may say, "They cost too much for our church to buy." Why not come by the Center for Christian Education Ministries and borrow the current issue to read and study. They are there to help you in your church.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

The past year in your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging has been one of the fullest and most exciting in the twenty-six years that the homes have been ministering!

Of keenest interest was the ground-breaking service for the new Western North Carolina Baptist Home, on the Pearson Estate on Richmond Hill, in Northwest Asheville, last October, when more than a thousand people from our Western North Carolina Baptist churches, as well as many others throughout the state, were present. It was a thrilling moment indeed when trustees, staff, and residents of the homes, pastors, and other church leaders latched on to ropes, attached to a huge bulldozer, pulled together and helped to move the first dirt at the site, heralding the beginning of the construction of your sixth Baptist Home for the Aging.

Construction is now underway for this lovely Western North Carolina Baptist Home, which will initially accommodate 50 people.

Another exciting venture is the construction of four duplex apartments at the site of the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem. These apartments will care for 16 additional persons and will be ready for occupancy in the fall of 1977. Sixty-six more people will be served in our Baptist Homes family in the next two years.

Gifts from our Baptist People have been very encouraging during the past year through the Cooperative Program and through the third Sunday of February offering. These sources supply 35% of the total budget of the homes and are used continually to supplement the care of the majority of the residents who cannot pay their full cost of care. They are love gifts indeed and are a life-line for those whose needs could not be met without them.

The needs of older persons in our society today are great and are overwhelming. Plans are in the making for an accelerated ministry in our North Carolina Baptist Homes that will touch an ever increasing number of persons.

These plans will call for a greater concern and commitment on our part than ever before. The future of our North Carolina Baptist Homes is as bright as the promises of God, and, in that future, the Lord, and these older people in our midst, will be looking to you to share in meeting the needs as we reach out and serve more of these dear ones who desperately need help.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The beautiful stained glass window in the front of Davis Chapel at Baptist Hospital has three large panels, each depicting an aspect of Christ's ministry: healing, teaching, and preaching. The window serves as a reminder to the staff that Baptist Hospital has also been commissioned to this three-fold task.

Persons with rare and complicated medical problems are referred to Baptist Hospital by their family physicians for treatment. Last year 158,863 visits were made in the hospital's Outpatient Department and the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics. There were 22,365 admissions to the hospital for a total of 193,942 patient days. These patients came from 90 counties in North Carolina, from 29 other states and from 3 foreign countries.

Baptist Hospital is also involved in teaching. In cooperation with the Bowman

Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University, it helped to train 1,188 students last year for careers in medicine and allied health fields.

In all of these ministries, Baptist Hospital is mindful of its Christian heritage and its strong tie with the Baptist State Convention. This tie is maintained and strengthened through the services of capable, dedicated trustees who are elected by and are responsible to the Convention. The tie is also strengthened through the financial support from the churches; last year, \$294,324 was received through the Cooperative Program and \$405,947 through the Mother's Day Offering.

Mother's Day gifts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1977, were \$411,225.56 compared to a total of \$405,946.52 for the preceding fiscal year.

In the French Broad Association there were thirty-eight churches contributing with a total of \$4,193. This is three more churches contributing than the year before and nearly a \$500.00 increase over last year.

Baptists of North Carolina provide a ministry of love and care to children, young people and their families. The program is more than rooms and meals and activities and recreation. It's more than buildings and grounds. The care of children is missions . . . reaching out with a helping hand; it is evangelism . . . sharing the joy of life in Christ; it is love and affection . . . the giving of hugs and kisses and friendship; it is education . . . teaching an appreciation for the finer things in life; it is restoration . . . enabling families to function again.

CAMPUSES at Mills Home, Thomasville, Kennedy Home, Kinston, Odum Home, Pembroke, and Broyhill Home, Waynesville-Clyde continue to serve as centers of service and operation in their respective areas of the state.

FOSTER HOME CARE, a statewide program of the homes, is vital to numbers of children needing special help. Additional foster homes are needed throughout the state. We welcome opportunities to talk with prospective foster parents about this area of service.

THE EMERGENCY SHELTER at Forest City is meeting a critical need in Western North Carolina. It provides a ready resource for children who need help immediately. During a period of one to ninety days, responsible planning is made for the child's future.

THE MATERNITY HOME in Asheville, opened in 1970, has proved to be a much-needed and well-received service. More than three hundred girls have been served from throughout North Carolina and beyond. It is recognized for its quality of care and Christian concern.

SOCIAL WORK AND FAMILY RESOURCE CENTERS enable us to work with families in providing services to children, family rehabilitation, family education and preventive services. These centers are located at Waynesville, Asheville, Charlotte, Thomasville, Burlington, Raleigh, Kinston, Fayetteville and Pembroke.

THE CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER on the Mills Home Campus at Thomasville provides a demonstration program for churches who are interested in establishing services for preschool age children in nursery school education, day care and kindergarten. We welcome opportunities to assist churches any place in the state who want to develop this type program.

Members of our staff are anxious to have you and members of your churches visit Broyhill Home. To see, observe and to feel in person what it is like to live in a children's home is to appreciate our child care ministry. Thank you for your dependable support in numerous ways. It shall be our purpose to keep this a dynamic ministry and to meet the needs of those whom we serve.

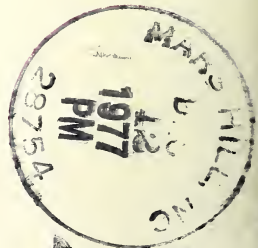

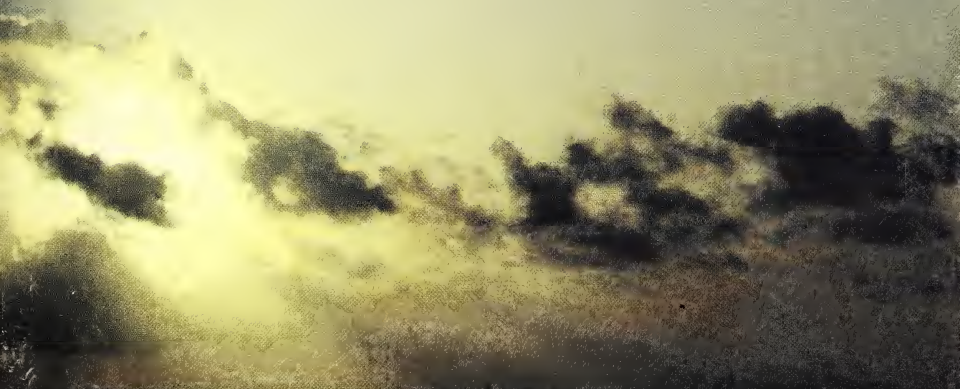

Constitution

1977

ARTICLE I—Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II—Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.
2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.
3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

ARTICLE III—Membership

SECTION 1. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches in this general area which have been formally accepted as members and which continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by naming messengers to the Annual Meetings; and by reporting to such Annual Meetings on forms which are provided by the Association.
2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make application in the following manner:
 - a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.
 - b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.
 - c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an Annual Meeting of the Association.
3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application. Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the Moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.
4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner:
 - a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.

b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session shall be submitted to the Moderator of the Association and Chairman of the Executive Committee.

c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has toward the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in Annual Session and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in Annual Session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

SECTION II. Membership of the Annual Meetings of the Association

1. The membership of the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be composed of: The elected officers of the Association, all pastors who are members of churches in the Association, and all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the Annual Meeting.

2. Each member church is entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members above fifty, except that no church shall have more than ten messengers exclusive of the EX OFFICIO members designated above.

3. The EX OFFICIO members in attendance and the elected messengers presenting certification of their election by their churches shall constitute the official voting enrollment in any session.

ARTICLE IV—Officers

SECTION I. The Officers of the Association shall be:

Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, the Chairman of Missions, the Chairman of Evangelism, and the Superintendent of Missions (EX OFFICIO).

SECTION II. Election of Officers

1. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee, this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the Annual Meeting.

2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.

3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the Annual Associational Meeting.

2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.

3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.

4. All committee members appointed and elected in the Annual Session begin their work at the close of the Annual Meeting and continue through the next Annual Session of the Association.

ARTICLE V—Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers named in Article IV, Section 1, plus one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, and the elected representative of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Committee.

SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between Annual Meetings of the Association.
2. To carry out the plans laid at the Annual Session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the Associational work.
3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

ARTICLE VI—Missions Committee

SECTION I. The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in Annual Meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

SECTION II. Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the Office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the Annual Meeting, or to a special called meeting of the Association.
2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.
3. It shall supervise the activities of and work with the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.
4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.
5. It shall advise, any group seeking to organize a mission or church.
6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.
7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.
8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

SECTION III. The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description of the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as EX OFFICIO member of all committees.

ARTICLE VII—Steering Committee

SECTION I. The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice-Moderator as Chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the Associational letter.

SECTION II. The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work in the Association.
2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.
3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

ARTICLE VIII—Other Committees

SECTION I. The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees at the Annual Associational Meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next Annual Meeting.

1. Committee on Committees: To work with the Moderator in the Annual Session in the appointment of committees.
2. Nominating Committee:
 - a. Nominate the Associational officers.
 - b. Name and recommend eleven members for the Missions Committee to be elected by the Association in the Annual Meeting.
 - c. Recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year.
 - d. All nominees and recommended persons named by the Nominating Committee shall have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.
3. Committee on Reports:
 - a. This Committee shall nominate representatives who will correlate and report on the following phases of work: Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Hospitals, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.
 - b. These representatives shall serve as leaders in the Association in correlating and promoting the work with their respective agencies.
 - c. Each of the representatives named shall make a brief written report to the Annual Associational Meeting informing the people about the work they have been chosen to represent.
4. Program Committee:
 - a. This Committee shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Associational Meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.
 - b. This Committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.
5. Committee on Places and Preachers:
 - a. This Committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next Annual Associational Meeting.
 - b. This Committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and Missionary Sermon.
6. Constitutional Amendment Committee:
 - a. This Committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular Annual Meeting.
 - b. This Committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the Associational work.
7. Committee on Resolutions:
 - a. This Committee shall consider and present to the Annual Associational Meeting and resolutions referred to them.
 - b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.
8. Youth Committee:
 - a. This Committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.
 - b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships and the like.
9. Ordination Committee:
 - a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, coöperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.
 - b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.
10. Seminary Extension Committee:

They shall promote and direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director and Registrar annually. They shall appoint teachers in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

ARTICLE IX—Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

ARTICLE X—Amendments

1. This Constitution may be amended in the following manner: Notification of the proposed amendments shall be made in writing to each church in the Association not less than thirty days, and not more than sixty days, prior to the Annual Meeting, such notification coming through the Associational Office.

2. A copy of the proposed amendments shall be provided to each messenger present for the first session.

3. A first reading of the proposed amendment must be approved by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the first session of the Annual Meeting. All changes, if any, to the proposed amendment shall be presented to the assembly at the first session prior to this first reading vote.

4. A final approval of the amendment shall be by a two-third vote of all messengers present and voting at the second session of the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE XI—Parliamentary Authority

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned, except where it may be in conflict with this Constitution.

ARTICLE XII—Amended Constitutional Copies

Certified copies of this Constitution as amended shall be filed with the Office of Superintendent of Missions, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, the Associational Historian, and not less than one copy placed in a safety box in a local bank.

Proceedings

Thursday, August 10, 1978—Night Session

(1) The one hundred seventy-first annual session of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order by Moderator Stanley Peek on Thursday, August 10 at 7 p.m. at California Creek Baptist Church. The meeting was brought to order with a gavel made by Brother Claxton Cohn from Bull Creek who fashioned it from the last wood remains of the old Laurel Seminary Church.

(2) The congregation sang "Amazing Grace" led by Jake Fender, Acting Music Director.

(3) Rev. Charles Rector, Pastor of the host church, gave the devotional taking his scripture from Ephesians 5:8 and using the theme "Ye Are the Light of the World."

(4) Roll call of churches was made by Mrs. Lester Murphey, Clerk. There were 150 persons present (129 messengers, 5 alternates, and 12 visitors).

(5) Mr. Wade Huey, Chairman of the Program Committee, was recognized. He made a motion the agenda be adopted and also that the written reports in the Book of Reports be adopted. A second to the motion was made, and the vote carried.

(6) Rev. E. J. Jenkins, Superintendent of Missions, recognized all visitors and new pastors. There were two visitors present—Mr. Ralph Cannon (Homes for the Aging) and Rev. Luther Osment (Western North Carolina Area Missionary). New pastors were Rev. Jake Fender, Little Creek; Rev. George Slagle, Alexander; Rev. Harold Lewis, Big Laurel; Rev. Ralph McDevitt, Hopewell; Rev. Cline Hensley, Laurel Bend; Rev. Merley Willis, Laurel Chapel; Rev. Bruce Murray, Laurel Valley; Rev. Jerry Keasling, Upper Rice Creek; Rev. Charles Rogers, Laurel Branch; Rev. David Allman, Upper Laurel; Rev. Ron Bryan, Calvary; and Rev. Jerry Jarrell, Minister of Education at Mar's Hill Church.

(7) The following announcements were made: a) Rev. Jenkins stressed the importance of all churches getting their reports in for the World Missions Conference. He recognized Big Laurel for having sent an offering even though they could not participate. b) Mrs. David B. Roberts presented a gavel to the Association which was a prized possession of the late David B. Roberts to be used in its general meetings. The gavel was made from a walnut tree cut from the property of the late George W. Truett, one of the great Christian preachers of our century. A move was made, seconded, and the vote was unanimous to accept the gavel as a gift.

(8) Miscellaneous business was then transacted. The following resolution was presented by the Executive Committee:

Whereas we are aware that there has been some disagreement in the operational control of our Baptist institutions.

And whereas we are aware that our people have been somewhat lax in selecting our trustees.

And whereas we recognize there are many and varied problems in running a Baptist institution, of which some are financial with the increasing inflationary cost spiral, the selection of personnel, and the maintenance of old and new facilities;

Now therefore we urge:

1. All Baptists be encouraged to participate to the fullest extent possible in the operation of our institutions.

2. That more opportunities be provided for the direct participation of Baptists in the operation of our institutions.

3. That more consideration be given to basic Baptist beliefs.

4. That the selection of our trustees and leaders should not be self perpetuating.

We believe the compromise worked out by the trustees of Wake Forest and the General Board does not correct the situation between our Baptist schools and the Convention. We hope a stronger stand will be taken by our Convention in the future and that our Baptist institutions will be more sensitive to the views of our Baptist people.

Rev. Jenkins gave an explanation of the resolution. A move was made and seconded that the resolution be adopted. A discussion followed. A vote was taken and the resolution was adopted.

(9) Miss Sue Fitzgerald presented the news that a gift had been given to the Center for Christian Education Ministries. This gift was films and cassettes on the Bible. The Bible is being read on the cassettes while being acted out in the films. These films and cassettes as well as a projector are available for use in each church.

(10) Rev. Luther Osment spoke on "Bold Missions Reaching Out" using Numbers 13 and Joshua 14 as scripture texts.

(11) Rev. Ralph Cannon spoke on the Homes for the Aging. He stated the Homes for the Aging received \$60,000 in offerings its first year which took care of 60 persons for the year. This past year the homes received \$289,000 in offerings which took care of only 48 persons for the year. The French Broad Association has pledged \$26,000 to the Asheville Home for the Aging. Presently \$500,000 is needed to complete the new building so all gifts will be greatly appreciated.

(12) Rev. Peek led in prayer.

(13) The California Creek choir presented the special music.

(14) The congregation sang an offertory hymn, "Love Lifted Me," and an offering of \$141.76 was taken. Rev. H. L. Wilson, Pastor of Bethel Church, gave the offertory prayer.

(15) Rev. Orlando Hawkins, Pastor of Gabriels Creek Church, brought a challenging sermon entitled "Opportunity," taking his scripture from Acts 8:25-39.

(16) Rev. Clell Fisher, Pastor of Locust Grove Church, adjourned with prayer.

Friday, August 11, 1978—Morning Session

(17) The French Broad Baptist Association was again called into session at 9:30 a.m. at Piney Mountain Church by Acting Moderator Ralph Hogan.

(18) Rev. H. L. Wilson, Acting Music Director, led the congregation in singing, "I Love to Tell the Story."

(19) Rev. Sibbald Lambert, Pastor of the host church, brought the devotional using the theme, "Look to the Children" and taking his scripture from Matthew 21:12. Dr. Hoyt Blackwell closed the devotional with prayer.

(20) The following visitors were introduced: Calvin Knight, Baptist Hospital; Bob Abrams, Gardner-Webb College; Hugh and Chris Starnes, Broyhill Children's Homes; Alfred Ayscue. BIBLICAL RECORDER.

(21) The following business items were transacted: 1) Mr. Ralph M. Lee, Chairman of the Nominating Committee made a motion the slate of officers presented by the Nominating Committee be adopted. The motion was seconded and carried. b) Mr. Wade Huey, Chairman of the Program Committee, moved the adoption of ALL printed reports. The move was seconded and passed.

(22) Guest speakers for the morning were: 1) Calvin Knight (Baptist Hospital) who stated the Baptist Hospital was trying to provide medical care as well as care of the whole person, both physically and spiritually. He expressed thanks for the help given Baptist Hospital. b) Hugh Starnes (Baptist Children's Homes) stated the Baptist Children's Homes provided four major services—(1) Group homes; (2) Maternity home; (3) Foster homes; and (4) Emergency care. He informed the congregation that one-fourth of the Baptist Children's Homes operating funds come from the Thanksgiving Offering. This year will be the last for the special Thanksgiving Offering so the Baptist Children's Homes are depending on you. He expressed thanks for the vegetables given by the French Broad Association for the Area Conference last year. c) Alfred Ayscue (BIBLICAL RECORDER), Pastor of Mt. Airy Baptist Church, stated the BIBLICAL RECORDER was the third largest publication in North Carolina and that it was reaching people for Christ. He urged each church to put the BIBLICAL RECORDER in its budget. At present in the Association, there are only four churches with the BIBLICAL RECORDER in their budgets, four who have clubs, and forty without any plan. d) Bob Abrams (Gardner-Webb College) related the work Gardner-Webb is doing with the deaf. There was one deaf student enrolled last year. This fall they are expecting five or six students. Mr. Jerry Potter is planning to live on the campus and help to develop the program. The campus radio station is ministering to the blind also through radio programs. Programs have also been opened for the aging. He thanked each one for the prayerful support and encouragement given. e) Bob Melvin (Mars Hill College) gave illustrations of persons who have attended Mars Hill College and how their lives have been affected.

(23) Dr. Hoyt Blackwell was recognized. He stated how glad he was to be a part of This Association.

(24) Mr. Ralph Lee led in prayer.

(25) The Piney Mountain Junior Choir presented the special music by singing, "Happiness," "God Is So Wonderful," and "Thank You Lord for Your Blessings."

(26) Rev. Clell Fisher, Pastor of Locust Grove Church, brought an inspirational doctrinal sermon using the theme, "Christ in You, the Hope of Glory" and taking his text from Colossians 2:27.

(27) The morning session was then adjourned with prayer led by Rev. Jenkins.

Afternoon Session

(28) Rev. David Allman, Acting Moderator, brought the final session of the French Broad Baptist Association to order.

(29) Rev. Vincent Young, Pastor of Marshall Church, brought the devotional taking his text from Acts 17:20-23.

(30) Rev. H. L. Wilson, Acting Music Director, led the congregation in singing, "Standing on the Promises."

(31) Rev. Jenkins asked the following persons to give the highlights of their church year: a) Mrs. Locke Robinson (Associational WMU Director) stated she was most thankful for souls won to the Lord. She also expressed appreciation for the bold giving through missions this year. The Annie Armstrong Offering was \$7,904.62, and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering was \$19,513.06. b) Rev. David Mills (Pastor of Hot Springs Church) stated they had completed the sanctuary for their church after 20 years without one. He was also thankful for the spirit in the Summer Bible Camp. c) Rev. Sherman Tweed (Pastor of Oak Grove Church) stated they had finished bricking their church, installed a baptistry, and extended their sanctuary. They were also very thankful for the four people who were baptized. d) Mr. Reed (Walnut Creek) stated they were thankful for the three baptisms they had during the year. Rev. Jenkins brought out the fact they had the strongest Church Training Program in the Association. e) Rev. H. L. Wilson (Pastor of Bethel Church) stated they were looking to the future for God's help and guidance. Rev. Jenkins indicated they had completed a choir loft, a baptistry, and Sunday School rooms.

(32) Rev. Jenkins then gave the following highlights for other churches in the Association: a) California Creek has totally paid for its building by love offerings. b) North Fork has bricked its church and this is totally paid. c) Locust Grove has completed a fellowship hall. d) Gabriels Creek has built a 20x60 building, a baptistry, and Sunday School rooms. e) Upper Rice Creek has paved its parking area. f) Little Ivy has paved its parking area. Rev. Jenkins urged everyone to pray for spiritual revival that new souls may be won to Christ.

(33) Rev. Tom Green spoke on the Cooperative Program. He stated that if a person witnessed to four persons per minute, 8 hours per day, it would take 70 years (without another person being born) to witness to all persons on the earth. It is our job to witness where we are, and then cooperate through our money and prayers so others may be won to Christ.

(34) The following business item was transacted: Rev. George Slagle made a motion the Association take vegetables to the Children's Home Area Conference on September 7. The motion was seconded and carried. Brother Vance Edwards donated the tomatoes last year. The other vegetables were purchased from Sprinkle-Shelton. The Health Department will not allow home canned goods.

(35) The digest of church letters was presented by the clerk. A motion was made that all letters received after the annual meeting be included in the digest. The motion was seconded and carried.

(36) Rev. Jenkins announced the World Missions Conference would be held September 3-10. Money for transportation of the missionaries to and from the World Missions Conference was needed from the churches who are participating. A love offering is to be taken during one of the services which will be pooled and divided among the missionaries. He also stated he needed the reports from each church.

(37) Rev. Jenkins then installed the officers for the new year. The Association has 64 major officers and over 200 leaders.

(38) A memorial service was conducted by Mrs. Lester Murphey, Clerk. The names of those who passed away during the past year were read. Rev. H. L. Wilson, Pastor of Bethel Church, closed the service with prayer.

(39) Rev. H. L. Wilson led the congregation in singing, "Rescue the Perishing."

(40) Rev. E. W. (Ebb) Jenkins brought a very inspirational sermon taking his text from Galatians 2:20.

(41) The final session was then closed with prayer.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

Our Association has had a good year. I am thankful for what has been accomplished in our churches. We have had a good spirit of cooperation.

We, like many others, were alarmed by the Wake Forest Trustees voting to receive federal aid against the will of our State Convention. We sent a letter to our Executive Secretary, Dr. Cecil Ray, to the General Board and to the Wake Forest Trustees expressing our disapproval of what the Trustees had done.

We have helped in preliminary planning for our World Mission Conference coming in September. We gave our support to our Associational Camp. We again voiced our protest against liquor-by-the drink. HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The year, 1977-1978, was a good year for the French Broad Association. A number of events and programs stand out as significant highlights in the record. The Pastor's and Deacon's Conference held at California Creek Baptist Church during the fall was one of the finest projects ever sponsored by the Association. The great need in most churches is for a board of deacons committed to the New Testament interpretation of deaconship and with the training to perform those duties. Dr. Hayne Rivers of the First Baptist Church in Union, South Carolina was not only an inspirational speaker but he also did an excellent job of explaining the Biblical teachings concerning this office in the church.

In January the Association responded to the needs of Jones Valley Baptist Church, of the New Found Association. On November 5 their church building was completely destroyed in a flood. At the request of the State Baptist Convention, men from the French Broad Association joined those from other adjoining associations to provide labor and several churches gave money to help rebuild the house of worship.

Graduation for the Seminary Extension Program was held at California Creek Church in June. This represented the satisfactory completion of a year of study for all those enrolled in the several classes, but it was a very significant day of triumph for the three who were graduated. These three who had completed all required courses were: the Rev. Worth Emory, Pastor of Ivy Hill Church; the Rev. Lester Murphey, Pastor at Middle Fork Church; and Mr. Van Jamerson, Deacon and Layman of the Upper Laurel Church.

The Association Day Camp held at Ivy Hill Church in July was another highlight for the year. More than seventy persons were enrolled for the week's program of study, fellowship, and good fun. This kind of camping experience provides much needed training for all ages, but especially for the children and youth of our churches. It also provides the Christian fellowship so often missed in a day when employment outside the home prevents the kind of visiting and knowing one's neighbors for which people used to have time.

The July trip to Canada, sponsored by the Home Mission Board, to help build a house of worship for the Discovery Baptist Church represents the kind of outreach taught by our Lord: Go ye into all the world

A number of churches in the Association had successful revivals this year. Piney Mountain alone reported thirty baptisms for the year.

Many Churches have made improvements in buildings and grounds. Bethel Church completed its fellowship hall and added a choir loft and a baptistry to the sanctuary. The Forks of Ivy Church put a new roof on its building. Gabriels Creek added two classrooms, a baptistry, and a large fellowship hall. Hot Springs built a new sanctuary. Laurel Branch erected a new sign, one made of brick. Little Creek purchased a mobile home to be used as a parsonage. Mount Pleasant completed some class rooms in the basement of its church. Mt. Sheba enlarged its sanctuary and finished the fellowship hall. North Fork is currently bricking its church house. Trinity has completed building a number of classrooms in the basement of its sanctuary. Enon renovated its auditorium and added a baptistry. Union Valley has put water in the church building and added restrooms. Upper Rice Creek renovated its entire church building.

There are a number of new pastors and pastors in new positions in the Association: Rev. George Slagle at Alexander, Rev. Harold Lewis at Big Laurel, Rev. Ronald Bryan at Calvary, Rev. Martin Fisher at Chapel Hill, Rev. Ralph McDevitt at Hopewell, Rev. Clyde Hensley at Laurel Bend, Rev. Charles Rogers at Laurel Branch, Rev. H. L. Wilson at Bethel, Rev. Merley Willis at Laurel Chapel, Rev. Bruce Murray at Laurel Valley, Rev. David Allman at Upper Laurel and Rev. Jerry Keasling at Upper Rice Creek. Rev. Frank Plemmons has returned to North Fork. The Rev. Jerry Jarrell has recently assumed the work of Minister of Education and Music at the Mars Hill Baptist Church.

A few churches are without pastors: Beech Glen, Little Creek, Long Branch, Madison Seminary, Oak Ridge, and Union Valley.

Last year the Association asked the Historian to secure a new gavel to replace the one that had been lost. Rev. Jenkins was successful in securing a piece of lumber from the old Laurel Seminary Baptist Church building which is no longer used since the congregation was disbanded about twelve years ago. Mr. Claxton Cohn has made a mallet from this lumber and we are happy to present the gavel to the Association. If any church, or individual, can locate a piece of lumber that has some historic connection with the Association or a church in the Association we would like to make at least one more gavel. Each mallet can be used at the times it will fit into the history of the meeting being held.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Baptist Hospital continues to find ways of enlarging and improving its care of patients.

During the past year, the Department of Family Medicine moved into new quarters. It is anticipated that with the larger area, the Family Practice Center will provide primary health care for more than 5,000 families by 1980. Also, the teaching program for resident physicians in Family Medicine will increase to 36 positions by 1980. Many of these physicians are expected to enter family practice in North Carolina.

Other improvements in patient care include the installation of a whole-body scanner and the opening of new and larger facilities for the Intensive Care and Intermediate Nurseries. The body scanner is particularly useful in locating and defining problems such as tumors in the chest, abdomen and pelvic areas; in determining the spread of disease from one organ to another; and visualizing aneurysms in the abdomen. The new nurseries have already played a significant role in reducing the infant death rate and in improving the chances of premature babies growing up without lasting effects from earlier medical problems.

Creation of a new Department of Patient Relations and the employment of a full-time director has also helped to improve the quality of patient care. The primary function of this department is to respond to specific concerns patients have regarding their hospital care and to act in behalf of patients and their families in resolving problems and meeting needs.

A closed-circuit television system will soon be carrying services from the hospital chapel, other devotional programs and educational programs to patient rooms. This system will also be used in staff education programs. The equipment was purchased with funds from the estate of Miss Olivia Hall who worked for Baptist Hospital for nearly a half-century.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to make a significant contribution to patient care as well as in clinical pastoral education, counseling and enrichment events. During recent months the department has begun another satellite center; this fourth satellite is in Charlotte and is operated in cooperation with the Mecklenburg Baptist Association. In April of this year, the Counseling Center received accreditation by the American Association of Pastoral Counselors.

In recent months, the Medical Center Challenge Program completed a successful fund campaign, over-subscribing its \$18-million goal. The final project in this program will be the replacement of the original hospital building, opened in 1923, with a new Focus Building which is scheduled for completion in 1980.

SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS REPORT

Bold Mission Thrust has been the theme in 1978 and will be the theme in 1979. The purpose is for each church to lead its members to perceive and accept their mission in enabling every person to hear and respond to the Gospel of Christ. This is the big picture: to increase the Sunday School enrollment, to baptize twice as many people, to support training and leadership in the church, to promote "Bold Going," "Bold Giving," doubling the church budget and a bold outreach. Thus our Association is gearing its leadership and planning its calendar to lead out and support the local church in this effort. A survey shows from 1972 through 1977 that we have increased in church membership 377 members or 7%. We have increased our cooperative gifts by \$4,630.00. This is a 20% increase. Our total mission giving \$31,000.00 which is 44% increase, our total church income is \$317,000.00 which is an 8% increase. The Sunday School has increased by 253, this is 6% increase. It takes 36 people in our Association to win one person to Christ. Thus our baptisms are way off. Nine churches reported no baptisms this year. We do have room for improvement in this Bold Mission Movement so under the leadership of the Holy Spirit let's join hands with the other leaders of North Carolina and move forward. This has been a good year in our Association and it has been the best year we have ever had in missions giving. Thanks to all the Associational officers and leaders.

The stewardship of my services this year in number looks mighty feeble but there doesn't seem to be any room or time for any other activity. The opportunities that have presented themselves are as follows: We have supplied in 4 churches as interim pastor, preached 107 messages, spoke 22 times, attended 52 Associational meetings, conducted 49 radio programs, had 6 funerals and 2 weddings, taught the Sunday School lesson 23 times, attended 14 services outside of our Association along with one revival and one World Mission Conference. We had 322 individual conferences and 68 group conferences and met with 84 committees, had 21 conversions, travelled 20,425 miles, published 900 calendars, 8,580 bulletins, 300 VBS books, 300 book of reports, 6,387 letters, 5,000 pieces of other material. All of this paper work, typing and printing, correlating and publishing was done by Miss Sprinkle who gave her time and talents without pay or remuneration of any kind and she did it all for the glory of her Saviour and not for the praise of men. Our Association, my work and the work of so many others will be greatly handicapped or impossible if it were not for her dedication. She has done most of the work for me but only God can pay her.

Our World Mission Conference is coming up. Our Bold Mission Conference is before us and the challenge of God's will is to each of us. Let's move under the leadership of the Holy Spirit and continue to do great things for the Lord.

HOMES FOR THE AGING

The past year has been the greatest, most exciting and most fruitful for your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging in the twenty-seven years that the homes have been ministering. We have a tremendous ministry to the aging and for our Lord in this great work of his. We are only in the beginning and we have much, much work to do in this area of Baptist endeavor. May we unite our thinking, our hearts, our all to this ministry through and for our love for Christ.

As of July 1, 1978, the new Western North Carolina Baptist Home on the Pearson Estate, Richmond Hill, in North West Asheville was approximately 50% finished. This is an exciting time and experience for Baptists in this area. Day by day the building is going up and should be finished some time after the first of January, 1979. At this time next year the home will be in full operation.

Much thought and consideration of the needs of elderly people have gone into the planning of this project by both the Building Committee and the architect. It has been designed and is being built in such a way as to require the very minimum amount of maintenance and repairs. We cordially invite all of you to visit the site, see the progress that is being made and have a first-hand knowledge of where your money is being spent.

This is the sixth Baptist Home for the Aging in the state, with construction and improvements being made at the other five. The needs of older persons in our society today are great and are overwhelming. Plans are in the making for an accelerated ministry in our North Carolina Baptist Homes that will touch an ever increasing number of persons. These plans will call for a greater concern and commitment on our part than ever before.

The future of our North Carolina Baptist Homes is as bright as the promises of God and, in that future, the Lord, and these older people in our midst will be looking to you to share in meeting the needs as we reach out and serve more of these dear ones who desperately need help.

We are in constant need of well qualified staff. This is particularly true of cottage parents and foster home parents. Join us in prayer that God will impress upon sufficient numbers of prospective workers that child care is a Christian vocation and that it affords wonderful opportunities for service.

We are deeply grateful for support of the Children's Homes which comes from our churches through the Cooperative Program, special gifts and the traditional Thanksgiving Offering.

The forthcoming Thanksgiving Offering is extremely important. This will be the last time that our people will have the challenge of making an over-and-above love offering to the Children's Homes at Thanksgiving time. As a part of the Bold Missions Thrust, the Thanksgiving Offering for the Children's Homes in 1979 will become a part of the North Carolina Baptist State Missions offering to be received each September thereafter.

To bridge the transitional gap next year, our trustees have set a goal of \$1,000,000 (one million dollars) through the 1978 Thanksgiving Offering. We are dependent upon our friends for financial support sufficient to carry on this ministry.

The French Broad Baptist Association provided all the tomatoes, corn, and beans for the Broyhill Fellowship Supper last fall and hope to do so again this year. Let me thank each one for your part in this great endeavor.

Our Southern Baptist Colleges got a good "report card" last year when the schools were examined by McGrath and Associates, one of the nation's leading evaluators of educational effectiveness. The schools, including Mars Hill College, were examined in every phase of life. Of the final report McGrath said: "These SBC institutions are in remarkably good shape, comparing them with other private institutions around the country. No other denomination, as a whole, can compare with Southern Baptists, as a group."

McGrath elaborated: "In the past 10 years, private institutions have increased their enrollment about 10 per cent on the average. Several denominations have lost enrollment. But Southern Baptists institutions have increased their total enrollment by 31 per cent in the past 10 years. There must be reasons for this growth. Our year long studies clearly indicated that one major factor in this growth among Southern Baptist schools is directly related to the clarity of their purpose and mission."

Mars Hill College was very much a part of this study, taking a good hard look at each part of campus life. Through this study, a greater commitment was made to the Christian faith as expressed in education. This was not just a verbal expression, but overtly through each phase of campus life. One expression of this is seen in the revamping of the dean of students office. Rev. Dennis Hill is the new Associate Dean of Admissions and Enrichment. The working philosophy of this department is that Christian nurture is all important. Christian nurture is important from the beginning conversation with each student when he or she talks about coming to Mars Hill and continues through his or her four years of college and graduation. The emphasis is on Christian growth and nurture from high school days to college alumni days.

The McGrath study findings reported: "While the distinctive purposes of Southern Baptist colleges may persuade them that their educational mission lies outside the 'mainstream' of American higher education, these same purposes, programs and experiences are becoming increasingly attractive to many thoughtful citizens across the nation who are dismayed by the moral confusion that is often reflected in our national policies." This kind of statement has helped us think through more clearly our mission. In the midst of our bold mission thrust, North Carolina Baptists are taking a harder look at how our colleges can help. WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

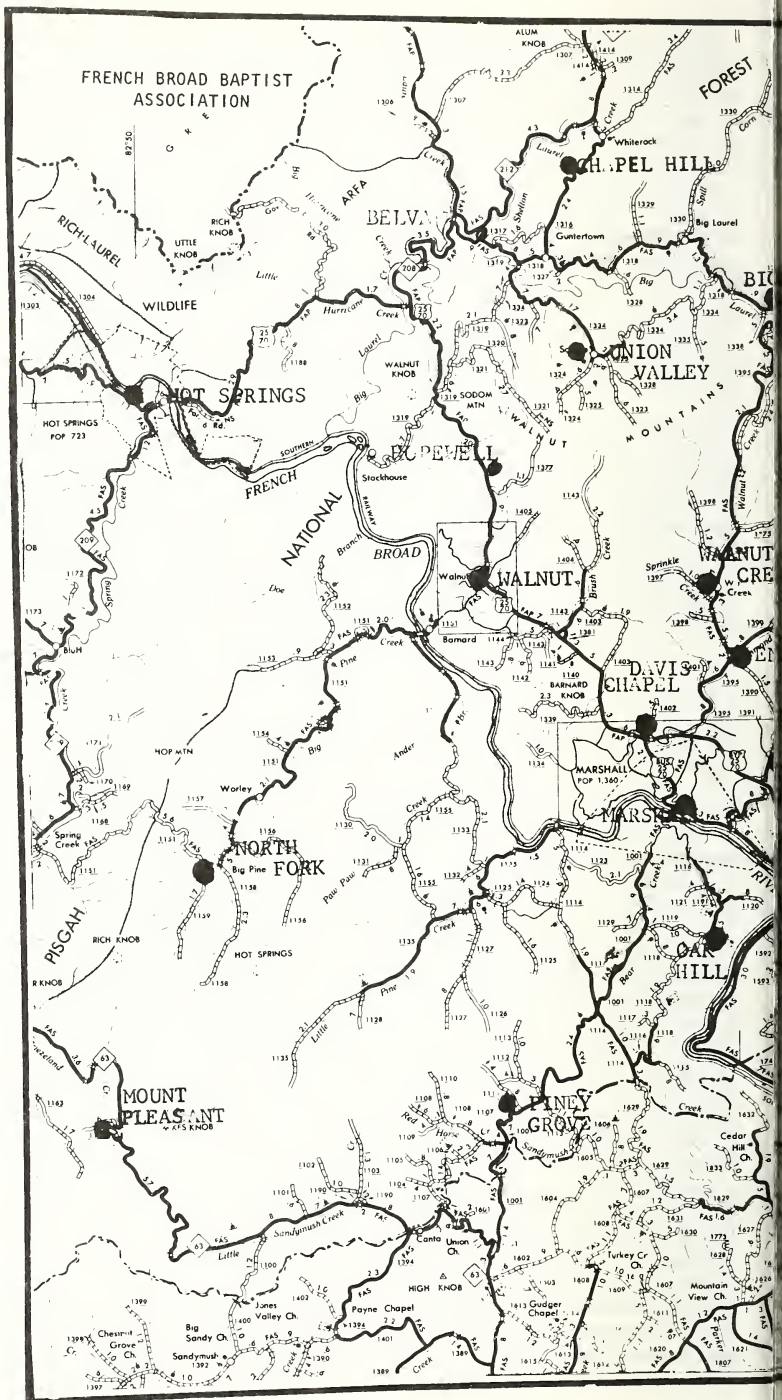

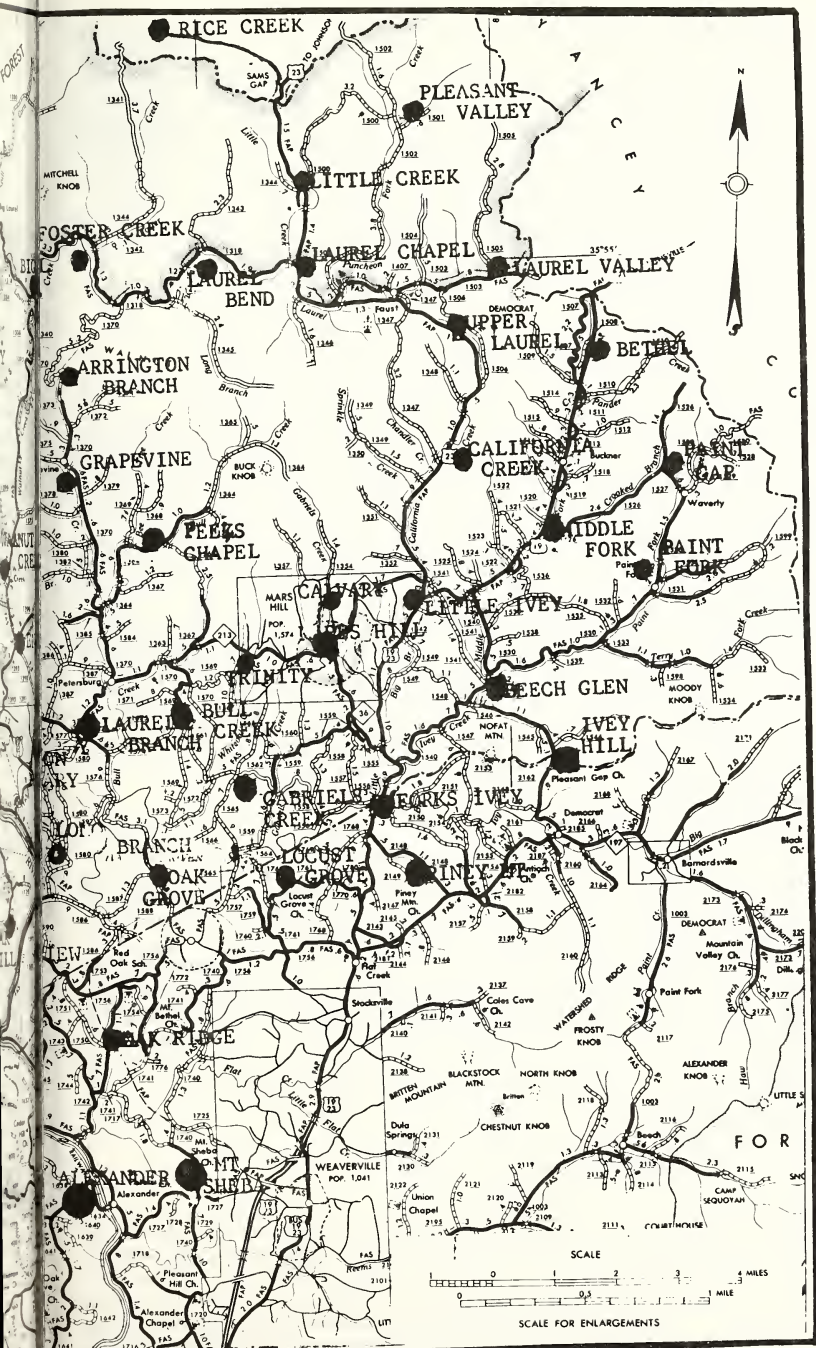

Apathy in associational work indicates deficiency in awareness of the real needs in the community and the participating churches. Church members with knowledge of the nature and mission of the church, who participate personally in discovering the pressing spiritual needs of the community, will be more eager to assist the association in responding appropriately to those needs. Faithful and generous support of associational ministries through the associational program should be a commitment belonging to every believer and to every church. Much can be said about a church by the place it gives to missions and mission support. When a church considers the support of associational missions as an extra, it is not fulfilling the primary purpose of the church. Being mission minded is essential to the church's being the church. Cooperative Program is not an extra; it is the plan through which Southern Baptists financially support their mission ministries. Associational Missions is essential.

Constitution

1977

ARTICLE I—Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II—Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.

2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.

3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

ARTICLE III—Membership

SECTION 1. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches in this general area which have been formally accepted as members and which continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by naming messengers to the Annual Meetings; and by reporting to such Annual Meetings on forms which are provided by the Association.

2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make application in the following manner:

a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.

b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.

c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an Annual Meeting of the Association.

3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application. Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the Moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.

4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner:

a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.

b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session shall be submitted to the Moderator of the Association and Chairman of the Executive Committee.

c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has toward the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in Annual Session and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in Annual Session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

SECTION II. Membership of the Annual Meetings of the Association

1. The membership of the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be composed of: The elected officers of the Association, all pastors who are members of churches in the Association, and all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the Annual Meeting.

2. Each member church is entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members above fifty, except that no church shall have more than ten messengers exclusive of the EX OFFICIO members designated above.

3. The EX OFFICIO members in attendance and the elected messengers presenting certification of their election by their churches shall constitute the official voting enrollment in any session.

ARTICLE IV—Officers

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Association shall be:

Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, the Chairman of Missions, the Chairman of Evangelism, and the Superintendent of Missions (EX OFFICIO).

SECTION II. Election of Officers

1. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee, this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the Annual Meeting.

2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.

3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the Annual Associational Meeting.

2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.

3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.

4. All committee members appointed and elected in the Annual Session begin their work at the close of the Annual Meeting and continue through the next Annual Session of the Association.

ARTICLE V—Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers named in Article IV, Section 1, plus one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, and the elected representative of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Committee.

SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between Annual Meetings of the Association.

2. To carry out the plans laid at the Annual Session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the Associational work.

3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

ARTICLE VI—Missions Committee

SECTION I. The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in Annual Meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

SECTION II. Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the Office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the Annual Meeting, or to a special-called meeting of the Association.

2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

3. It shall supervise the activities of, and work with, the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.

4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.

5. It shall advise any group seeking to organize a mission or church.

6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.

7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.

8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

SECTION III. The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description of the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as EX OFFICIO member of all committees.

ARTICLE VII—Steering Committee

SECTION I. The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice-Moderator as Chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the Associational letter.

SECTION II. The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work in the Association.

2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.

3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

ARTICLE VIII—Other Committees

SECTION I. The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees at the Annual Associational Meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next Annual Meeting.

1. Committee on Committees: To work with the Moderator in the Annual Session in the appointment of committees.

2. Nominating Committee:

a. Nominate the Associational officers.

b. Name and recommend eleven members for the Missions Committee to be elected by the Association in the Annual Meeting.

c. Recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year.

d. All nominees and recommended persons named by the Nominating Committee shall have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.

3. Committee on Reports:

a. This Committee shall nominate representatives who will correlate and report on the following phases of work: Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Hospitals, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

b. These representatives shall serve as leaders in the Association in correlating and promoting the work with their respective agencies.

c. Each of the representatives named shall make a brief written report to the Annual Associational Meeting informing the people about the work they have been chosen to represent.

4. Program Committee:

a. This Committee shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Associational Meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.

b. This Committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.

5. Committee on Places and Preachers:

a. This Committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next Annual Associational Meeting.

b. This Committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and Missionary Sermon.

6. Constitutional Amendment Committee:

a. This Committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular Annual Meeting.

b. This Committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the Associational work.

7. Committee on Resolutions:

a. This Committee shall consider and present to the Annual Associational Meeting and resolutions referred to them.

b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.

8. Youth Committee:

a. This Committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.

b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships and the like.

9. Ordination Committee:

a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate

for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, cooperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.

b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.

10. Seminary Extension Committee:

They shall promote and direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director and Registrar annually. They shall appoint teachers in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

ARTICLE IX—Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

ARTICLE X—Amendments

1. This Constitution may be amended in the following manner: Notification of the proposed amendments shall be made in writing to each church in the Association not less than thirty days, and not more than sixty days, prior to the Annual Meeting, such notification coming through the Associational Office.

2. A copy of the proposed amendments shall be provided to each messenger present for the first session.

3. A first reading of the proposed amendment must be approved by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the first session of the Annual Meeting. All changes, if any, to the proposed amendment shall be presented to the assembly at the first session prior to this first reading vote.

4. A final approval of the amendment shall be by a two-third vote of all messengers present and voting at the second session of the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE XI—Parliamentary Authority

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned, except where it may be in conflict with this Constitution.

ARTICLE XII—Amended Constitutional Copies

Certified copies of this Constitution as amended shall be filed with the Office of Superintendent of Missions, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, the Associational Historian, and not less than one copy placed in a safety box in a local bank.

PROCEEDINGS

Thursday, August 9, 1979 — Night Session

1. The one hundred seventy-second session of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order by Moderator Dr. Owen Fish on Thursday, August 9 at 7 p.m. at Walnut Missionary Baptist Church.

2. The congregation sang "O For a Thousand Tongues To Sing" and "Love Divine All Love Excelling" led by Church Music Director, Mrs. Dorothy Roberts.

3. Since the host church was without a pastor Rev. Ralph Hogan gave the devotions from Jeremiah 18.

4. Roll call of the churches was made by Mrs. Barbara Cutshall, Clerk. There were 138 persons present (104 messengers, 15 alternates, and 19 visitors).

5. Miss Sadie Wallin made a motion that the first 2 pages of the program be accepted. Rev. E. J. Jenkins suggested that the book of reports be read overnite by the people present and voted on the following day. Miss Wallin then restated her motion. It was seconded and the vote carried.

6. Rev. E. J. Jenkins, Superintendent of Missions, recognized all visitors and new pastors. New pastors were E. M. Pettit, Bull Creek; George Massey, Chapel Hill; Jake Fender, Little Creek; Steve Honeycutt, Long Branch; Roger Slagle, Mt. Pleasant; Claude Surrent, Oak Ridge; Jack Davis, Piney Grove; Bob Selman, Trinity; David Clark, Madison Seminary; David Smith, student minister, Mars Hill College.

7. Miscellaneous business was then transacted. Dr. Owen Fish pointed out three points: (a) the constitution called for an application for membership in the French Broad Baptist Association. Until now there had not been one. Rev. Jenkins and Dr. Fish had compiled one and were presenting one for adoption in the book of reports; (b) the motion was made that an annual sessions committee be established to study for one year the alternatives regarding the meeting times for the Association. There was a second and the motion carried. The Committee on Committees was then ask to submit a list of names the following session to be voted on to serve as this committee. (c) Mr. Fish then made mention of possible property that could be donated to the Association. It was felt that trustees should be appointed in case this did occur. The motion was made that the Committee on Committees bring at least three names to the second session to be voted on. It was seconded and the motion carried.

8. Ralph Hogan, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, was recognized. He read the report from this Committee and made a motion that they be approved. The motion was seconded and it carried.

9. No further business was transacted and the worship service began.

10. Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in "Have Faith In God."

11. The Walnut Baptist Choir provided a program of special music directed by Mr. C. N. Adams.

12. Rev. Sherman Tweed led in the offertory prayer. An offering of \$83.43 was taken.

13. Dr. Cecil Ray, a representative from the State Baptist Convention brought the evening message.

14. The Association was adjourned until 9:30 the following morning.

Friday, August 10, 1979 — Morning Session

15. The French Broad Baptist Association was again called into session at 9:30 a.m. at Calvary Baptist Church by Moderator, Dr. Owen Fish.

16. Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in singing "O Worship The King."

17. Rev. Ron Bryan, Pastor of the host church, brought the Associational Message from 2 Kings 7:3-9.

18. The following visitors were introduced: Bob Abrams, Gardner-Webb College; Luther Osment, Regional Missionary; Hugh Starnes, Broyhill Children's Home; Coy Privett, Baptist State Convention; Mr. & Mrs. Calvin Knight, Baptist Hospital; Jim Saul, Baptist Home For The Aging.

19. The following business items were transacted: (1) Wade Huey made mention of the Associational Budget found in book of reports on page 8. He ask that every church in Association give 3% of the offering plate dollar to the Association. (2) Dr. Fish entertained a motion to adopt the application form on page 33 of the book of reports. The motion was made and seconded. It carried. (3) The book of reports was then discussed. Rev. Jenkins stated that the Committed on Committees wished to change the Chairman of the Seminary Extension Committee from Miss Sue Fitzgerald to Rev. Worth Emory. (4) The Committee on Committees then proposed the following nominees for the Annual Session Committee: Leonard Baker, Vance Edwards, Dr. Evelyn Underwood, Rev. Clell Fisher, and Rev. Ralph Hogan. The Trustees were Wade Huey, Dr. Owen Fish, and Theodore Robinson. (5) Rev. Ralph Hogan, spokesman for the Nominating Committee, suggested that Dr. Evelyn Underwood be added to the list of Associational Officers as Historian. (6) The motion was made and seconded that the book of reports be adopted. The motion carried.

20. Mrs. Roberts than led the congregation in a Hymn "I Am Thine Oh Lord."

21. The guest speakers for the morning were: (1) Coy Privett spoke on the behalf of Biblical Recorder. (2) Robert Abrams spoke on the progress being made in the school for the deaf at Gardner-Webb College. (3) Luther Osment discussed the new State Missions Offering. (4) Hugh Starnes spoke of progress at Broyhill and also pointed out that our Association will be supplying vegetables for their open house. (5) Calvin Knight spoke of the improvement in chemotherapy at Baptist Hospital. (6) Jim Saul shared with the group experiences in the Home for the Aging. (7) David Smith discussed his plans for the growth of his ministry at Mars Hill College. (8) Coy Privett spoke again for the Christian Action League and challenged the group to be aware of legal problems that could arise.

22. Wade Huey was recognized and suggested an offering be taken to do away with Associational debt. The offering of \$293.03 was taken.

23. The Morning Session was adjourned.

Afternoon Session

24. Rev. Sibbald Lambert, Vice Moderator, brought the session to order.

25. Rev. E. J. Jenkins then pointed out highlights of the year for churches. (1) Gabriels Creek - new fellowship hall, baptistry, and Sunday School classrooms. (2) Bull Creek has completed a new building. (3) California Creek has new church completed. (4) Enon has elected a youth minister. (5) Hot Springs has all youth groups going as well as a new building. (6) Laurel Branch - two new rooms and baptistry. (7) Little Ivy - poured a parking lot. (8) Long Branch - two new Sunday School rooms and baptistry. (9) Madison Seminary - Pastor, David Clark, has a new baby girl. (10) North Fork - bricked outside of church. (11) Oak Grove - bricked outside and added to fellowship. (12) Oak Hill - Chain linked fence. (13) Oak Ridge - bought 2 acres of land - added a fellowship hall and pastorium. (14) Laurel Bend - Built a baptistry. (15) Peeks Chapel - purchased an organ.

26. The report from the Times, Place, and Preachers Committee was read and adopted.

27. The report from the Resolutions Committee was read and adopted.

28. The officers for the coming year were then installed.

29. The worship period then began with the singing of a hymn, "Near To The Heart of God," led by Mrs. Roberts.

30. Miss Sue Fitzgerald then gave a moving memorial service.

31. The afternoon message was brought by Rev. James Buckner, who spoke from Matthew 28:5-6.

32. The meeting was then adjourned.

PROGRAM GUIDE

INTRODUCTION:

This is the first year for the North Carolina Missions Offering. This united offering, approved by the 1977 Convention, combines the following previous offerings: State Missions, Children's Homes, Heck-Jones, Baptist Hospital, Homes for Aging, and Scholarships for Christian Education.

GOALS FOR 1979:

(1) Mission education; (2) Offering of \$2,000,000 which will be divided as follows:

State Missions - Mission Ministries	30% - \$600,000
Children's Homes	30% - \$600,000
Hospital	15% - \$300,000
Homes for Aging	15% - \$300,000
Heck-Jones - W.M.U.	5% - \$100,000
Christian Education - Scholarships	5% - \$100,000

THEME: "UNITED FOR MINISTRY"

The N. C. Missions Offering combines the efforts of the Convention's program and institution leadership in behalf of one unified program of mission education and special mission support. This dual purpose of education and support is evident in the September plans that call for the promotion of:

- (1) The offering goal of \$2,000,000
- (2) Mission education - this is a goal of helping Baptists know about and better understand the ministries of these offering causes.

This OFFERING GUIDE is designed for use by the pastor and the church offering committee. Suggestions are given about the use of offering materials and about church plans for promoting the offering.

MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

Your Missions Committee has met regularly this past year. Article VI of our Associational Constitution spells out the composition of and the duties and responsibilities of the Missions Committee. We have had the responsibility of making many decisions which we hope have been made through the leadership of the Holy Spirit. Also, we have promoted several projects which we feel were worthy causes.

We appreciate the opportunity of being asked and used by our Churches. We have promoted all of the work and have worked very close with the superintendent of Missions, realizing the tremendous amount of work he is doing. We who live and work close to Mr. Jenkins can realize to some degree the amount of work and activity that is involved in his office. We thank God for him.

The Association has received financial aid from the Baptist State Convention to carry on our mission work, for which we are very appreciative. Your Committee has very prayerfully considered the budget for this year. Due to inflation we are much concerned about our finances. There is no way a very effective Mission Program can be carried on with our present budget and income. Therefore, your Committee is recommending that each Church give three percent (3%) of the total offering plate dollar to Associational Missions. Missions are just as important here as elsewhere. This is a must if we have an effective Mission Program.

Bold Mission Thrust "The Big Picture"

With seeking and prayerful attitude leaders of our Convention have been made aware of God's challenge for our day. The goals that God has revealed for His people are unbelievable, seemingly impossible, awesome. Each goal will indeed frighten the weak of heart to turn away and cause the boarder-line

believer to move deeper to negative response. "Nothing is impossible with God" becomes more than just a catchy phrase, but rather the very cradle into which God has placed these goals. The Church leading its Members to perceive and accept their mission enabling every person to hear the Gospel and respond to the Gospel of Christ.

1. Bold Growing in Churches of North Carolina. Increase the Sunday School Enrollment by 150 thousand by 1982. Baptizing twice as many people in 1982 as we did in 1976.
2. Volunteerism. The Church will seek out the called and cooperate in the support of 5,000 Mission service corp projects.
3. By providing adequate Financial Resources. Doubling the gifts to the Cooperative Program, doubling the gifts to the Associational Mission Work, and double the church Budget.
4. The Church will lead its Members to understand the Biblical basis for missions. This can only be accomplished by prayer and Bible reading creating a spiritual atmosphere.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

It is with sincere gratitude that the American Bible Society acknowledges support from the Southern Baptist Convention for the Bible cause--and your part in making this possible. The report shows ways in which these funds were used.

We are excited when we report that over 500 million Scriptures were distributed in 1978. The seed is being sown and it falls on good soil over and over again.

Increases in Scripture distribution were dramatic in many areas of the world. Total Scripture distribution throughout 1978 by all of the Societies cooperating with the United Bible Societies reached 503,125,210 Bibles, New Testaments, Portions and Selections--a 23 percent increase over the previous year.

The accomplishments highlighted in this brief report are made possible because of gifts received from individuals and churches. Gifts from churches, denominations and agencies totaled \$1,668,148 for 1978 of which \$309,204 came

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The year, 1978-79, has been another good year for the French Broad Association. There have been a few set-backs such as the rained-out summer camp, but for the most part there has been steady progress in all church programs. Many committed persons have given freely of their time, energy, and money to promote the Kingdom's work.

One clear evidence of this commitment, and the meaning of the church for many people, is the continuing effort to improve church facilities. Big Laurel Church has completed four new Sunday School classrooms. Gabriels Creek Church has finished its fellowship hall and added two new Sunday School classrooms, also a baptistry in the sanctuary and is completely paid for. Hot Springs has completed its new sanctuary and installed all new furnishings and paved all parking lot. California Creek has not only finished its new building and paved a parking lot, but has also completed most of the payment for these. Laurel Branch has added a baptistry and two new classrooms. Locust Grove has added a beautiful large fellowship hall. Long Branch is installing a baptistry and adding two classrooms. Mt. Sheba has completed its fellowship hall. Oak Grove has bricked and completed the new additions to its sanctuary. Piney Mountain has converted the old masonic building into Sunday School rooms and North Fork has bricked its Church and installed two restrooms. The Forks of Ivy Church has put a new roof on its building. This was the first self-supporting roof in the County. Oak Ridge has purchased land across from Church.

During the year, three men have been approved for the ministry by the Ordination Council. Steve Honeycutt, presented by Long Branch Church, was ordained and has assumed duties with that Congregation. Clyde Stuart, presented by Hot Springs Church was approved and has accepted a call to serve the Ball City Church in the Newfound Association. Lane Meadows, presented by Little Ivy, was ordained and is now Pastor of Shady Grove Church in the Houstan Association in Tennessee.

A number of Pastors have moved from one church to another within the Association and a number of churches have called new pastors this year. Trinity called Bob Selman and Piney Grove invited Jack Davis to become its pastor. Claude Surrett has assumed leadership of the Oak Ridge Church. Charles Rogers moved from Laurel Branch to Mt. Sheba and Steve Honeycutt became Pastor at Long Branch. Jack Fender was called to serve at Little Creek. Joe Honeycutt moved from Little Ivy to Mt. Sheba and then from Mt. Sheba back to Little Ivy. George Massey has come back to Chapel Hill. Stanley Peek moved to the Beech Glen Church and E. M. Pettit took his place at Bull Creek. George Slagle is now at Alexander and Roger Slagle is now serving at Mt. Pleasant. Coach Wood is serving as supply Pastor at California Creek.

The Association has lost a number of good men this year and as a result a few churches are now without pastors. Lester Murphey at Middle Fork has accepted a Church in Yancey County and David Mills has given up his work in Hot Springs to return to the seminary for further study. Kenneth Lynch left Marshall Church after a brief stay. Ron Bryan has gone to Southeastern Seminary.

The Mission Thrust this past year has been the church leading its members to perceive and accept their mission in enabling every person to hear and respond to the Gospel of Christ.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

The 1979 Vacation Bible Schools were very successful. This year was started with Conference Leaders attending Ridgecrest. They were: Pre-School, Miss Betsy Clayton; Younger Children, Mrs. Barbara Sue Goldsmith; Middle Children, Miss Billie Jean Haynie; Youth, Rev. David Mills; Adult, Rev. Ralph Hogan; General Officers, Mrs. Nancy Cody; VBS Director, Charles Huey and Sunday School Director, Mrs. E. O. Burnette.

There were three Clinics for the purpose of training teachers to work in the local church. Most of the schools were 10-day schools achieving advanced or distinguished accreditation. We led the State Baptist Convention in distinguished schools last year and it appears we will do so this year. Only six Churches failed to report a Vacation Bible School. The attendance this year was 2,456.

Our day, as no other day, demands a knowledge of God's Word. Individuals and churches are confronted daily with issues that makes God's Word indispensable. Vacation Bible School provides pupils with understanding and helps them apply doctrinal and ethical teachings.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Although growth in bed capacity at Baptist Hospital has leveled off at just under 700 beds, there is continuing expansion of the hospital's services. This expansion results from new discoveries made through medical research, and is in response to the health care needs of people.

During the past year a 38-bed rehabilitation unit has opened to offer short-term services and family instruction to the disabled. The chief beneficiaries of this program are patients with strokes, arthritis, burns, longterm casts, joint replacement surgery, brain tumors, spinal cord injuries, hand injuries, and some cardiac problems.

A new six-bed burn unit is scheduled to open soon. This unit will permit the isolation of burn patients in a location where all required services are immediately available.

An automatic clinical analyzer, the first of its kind in the state, has been acquired and put into operation. This fully automated analyzer, which uses computer technology, can perform more than 200 tests. It analyzes blood serum and body fluids and provides results in less than eight minutes. These prompt and accurate results are of particular importance in critical care areas, such as the emergency room.

Another new ministry is a program of home visitation for children with cancer and their families. A team consisting of physicians, nurses, a psychologist and chaplains ministers to families during three critical periods: when a child has received a recent diagnosis of cancer, when a child is terminally ill, when a child has recently died.

Our chaplains lead worship services in Davis Chapel, which are relayed to all patient rooms by closed-circuit television. They also provide a pastoral ministry to patients, their families and to staff members; provide more than 15,000 hours of personal counselling annually; offer personal growth and enrichment events to hundreds of clergy and lay persons each year; and conduct the largest program of clinical pastoral education in the world. Ministries of the Pastoral Care department are made accessible to people across the state through satellites in Fayetteville, Raleigh, Morganton and Charlotte.

In recent months the hospital's oldest building - "Old Main" - has been torn down and a new six-story Focus Building is now rising on this site.

Gifts from the churches in the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$196,516, as compared to \$388,122 in the preceding fiscal year. These gifts are used to pay hospital bills for those who are not able to pay.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

Never in all my years of ministry, I cannot remember having been as busy and so many requests and obligations as there have been this year. I sincerely hope that it means only one thing that the service to the Churches has been better.

The following statistical report of activities of your Director of Missions is not intended to impress but only inform the people of our Association as to the work undertaking during the past year. The Lord has blessed and I regard these opportunities as privileges.

These opportunities were responded to as follows: We are ashamed to say that we have only visited 30 of the 48 Churches this year--most of the time has been consumed as supply pastor for eight Churches; we've tried to preach 103 times; spoke 23 other times; managed the radio program and conducted 20 programs; have had a part in 14 funerals and six weddings; taught 6 study courses; helped in 6 Vacation Bible Schools; promoted and led in Seminary Extension and supplied for 4 class periods; promoted and attended 56 Associational Meetings; conducted 23 services outside the Association as well as attended 26 other meetings; there were 378 individual conferences along with 56 group conferences with approximately 121 committee meetings with the able and competent assistance of our Office Secretary, Miss Sprinkle, (nothing would have worked this year without her); we have compiled and published 8,358 bulletins, 2,748 permit letters, 592 regular letters plus 300 books of reports. God bless you Miss Sprinkle--my what a contribution!!! I have traveled 23,225 miles in carrying out these duties not counting the trip to Canada. Truly the most precious results of the year's work were 33 individuals accepting Christ as their Saviour.

We have had a good and busy year in all phases of our work. Our Associational Leaders have shown renewed interest in improving the quality of leadership by attending most all leadership clinics and other special events throughout the Church Year. Here is the secret!!! Leaders doing what they were elected to do. The spirit and cooperation of our Associational Officers, Pastors, and Lay Workers from the Churches have been great.

Some of the outstanding needs in the Association for the coming year are--first a regular financial income from the Churches for which the Executive and Missions Committee and I endorses and recommends 3% of the offering plate dollar. We deeply appreciate the wonderful yearly support and the great Christmas Offering along with all the other considerations of the year. Second is an office building that is centrally located and modestly built with working space that is needed and third is a camp site for Christian Fellowship and Bible Study.

Let's pray for the year ahead, continuing to work together, training, spiritual growth, lifting up our Christian Fellow Workers. Through prayer and hard work let's all try to expand our Christian Ministries of redemption in the name of our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Pressure of the lobbyists and those not present to vote it carried 57 to 56 thus we have local options on liquor by the drink. This is disgusting and deplorable for the people in the State spoke loudly and plain in 1973 on this matter. This means we can face with many "brush fires" elections as in the days to come as we have in the past year.

We feel that the North Carolina Alcoholic Beverage Control Board is collaborating and assisting in the voting and the issuing of license and the promotion of alcohol throughout the State even in dry counties. The Forks of Ivy as a direct example. Liquor by the Drink pushers in campaigning after campaign have advocated that liquor consumption would decrease by Liquor by the Drink but the proof is in the reports. Sales are up 18% in the past three months. Legislators are definitely not the friend of the people. The State ABC Board makes all the rules and regulations and issues all the license and permits but our Legislators have made no effort in form of agents to enforce these rules regulations and no auditors for the purpose of auditing the records.

Study the voting record of your Legislators (House and Senate) and express your feeling to them directly and especially at the ballot box in 1980.

Since January 1, 1979, the Foundation staff with the assistance from Rev. James B. McQuere, retired Director of Missions of the South Fork Baptist Association, an intensive effort has been made through conferences over the State to familiarize as many pastors as possible of the helpful services provided by the Baptist State Convention through the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. The Foundation is available to assist individual Baptists with their estate planning, regardless of the size of the estate. Many of the most significant and meaningful gifts to support the Christian ministries through the denomination have been directed through the foundation as trustee. These services are available from the trained staff and their professional support (accounting and legal services) employed for this purpose without cost to individual participants. Where an individual desires to be a part of sharing the gospel beyond his or her lifetime, the establishment of a trust with the Foundation provides a tangible participation in such activities.

The Foundation has been actively engaged in assisting individuals is not only having their Wills redrafted, but also in the preparation and establishment of annuity trusts. Through such a trust, an individual or couple can place in trusts assets (such as property, cash or securities) and receive income for the remainder of their lives. After death, the income from the trust will be paid to the donor's choice (s) of Baptist missions work and/or institution. This method of giving provides the satisfying knowledge of being a faithful steward in utilizing resources more completely for the Lord's ministries, as well as, taking advantage of the laws of our land in reducing taxation on resources - both income and estates.

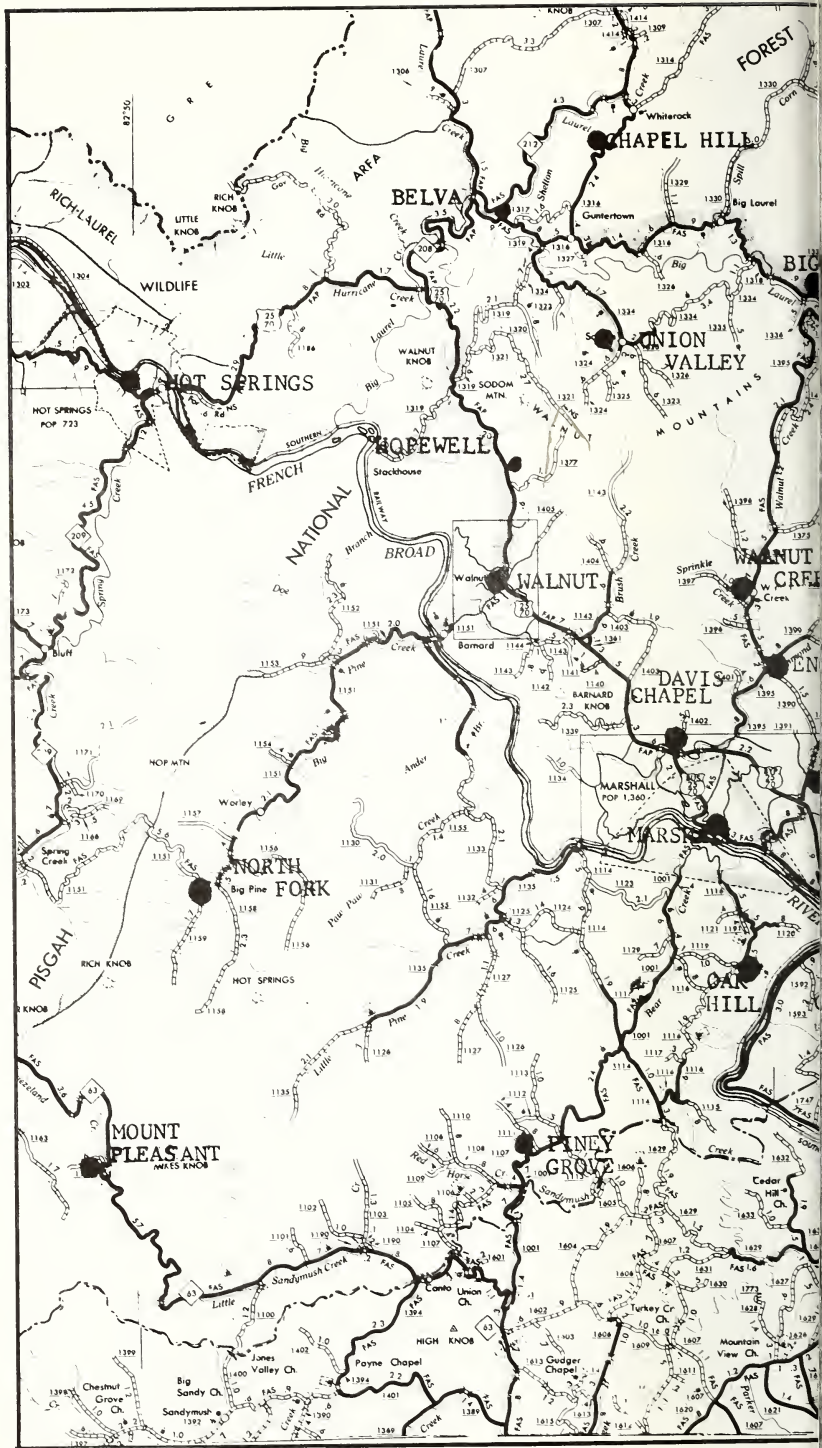

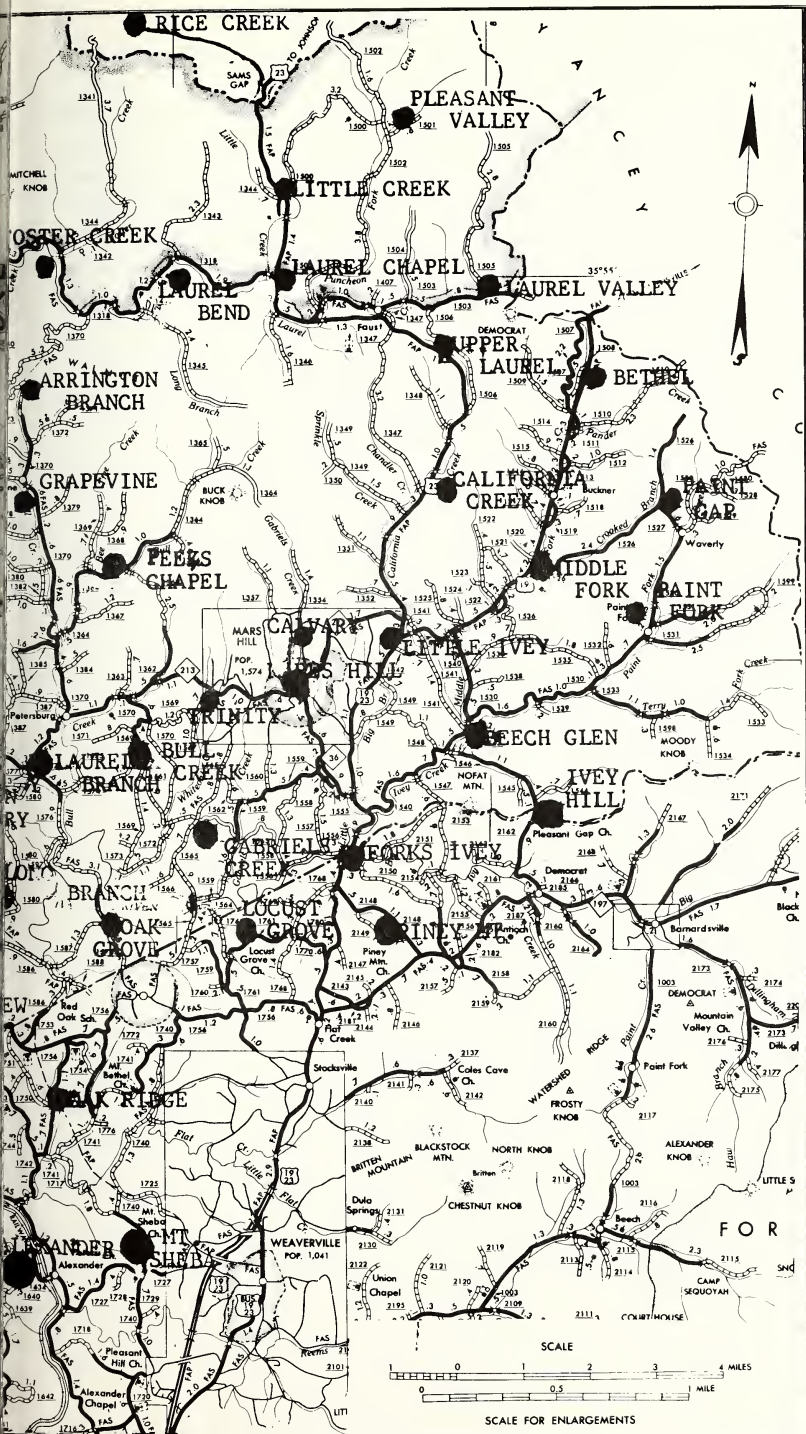
SEMINARY EXTENSION 1978-1979

For three days educators, theologians, mission personnel and lay people discussed the implications of bold education and bold missions in our world.

Our own Mars Hall College was well represented with Dean Richard Hoffman participating in the meeting. He reports there was good dialogue between the various groups as all participants struggled with the theme. The RELIGIOUS HERALD reports: "Topics ranged from factors in the contemporary world which influence mission and education to ways of fostering missionary spirit on college campuses to how Baptist schools can help in focusing attention on critical issues in world missions."

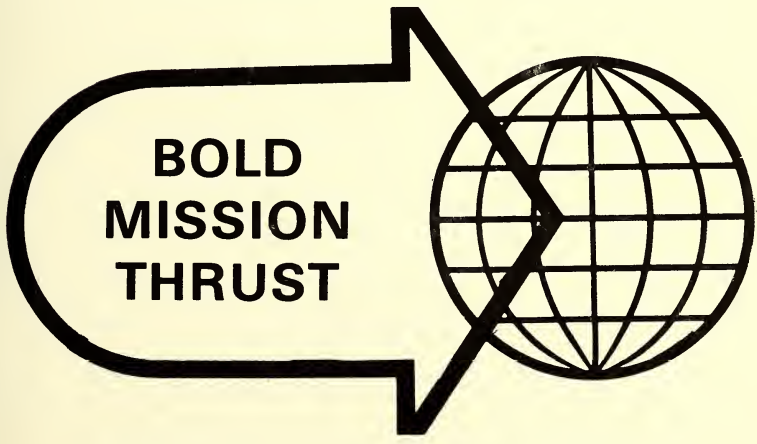

Constitution

1977

ARTICLE I—Name

The name of this body shall be the French Broad Missionary Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II—Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be:

1. To coordinate and promote fellowship and growth, missions, Christian education, and involvement in such service projects as the Association sponsors.

2. To cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in Kingdom advancement.

3. The churches that constitute the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies that voluntarily cooperate through the Association to promote the cause of Christ more effectively. The Association may advise and assist the churches in their work in ways and by means that are mutually agreeable between the churches and the Association.

ARTICLE III—Membership

SECTION 1. Member Churches

1. This Association shall be composed of duly constituted Missionary Baptist Churches in this general area which have been formally accepted as members and which continue in fellowship by cooperating in the purpose and work of the Association; by naming messengers to the Annual Meetings; and by reporting to such Annual Meetings on forms which are provided by the Association.

2. A church seeking admission to membership in the Association may make application in the following manner:

a. Decision to seek such admission shall have been determined by vote of the church in formal business session.

b. Copies of the Confession of Faith and the Covenant adopted by the church shall accompany the application.

c. Completed application shall be submitted to the Committee on Reception of New Members previous to the opening of an Annual Meeting of the Association.

3. The Committee on Reception of New Members shall report its findings to the Association on the first day of the annual session following its examination of any application. Upon favorable action on each application by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting on the second day, each church thus accepted will be enrolled as a member of the Association, and the Moderator will extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers present.

4. Should a member church decide to withdraw from the Association to join another association or to remain unattached, it should proceed in the following manner:

a. Decision to withdraw shall have been determined in formal business session.

b. A certified copy of the minutes of the formal business session shall be submitted to the Moderator of the Association and Chairman of the Executive Committee.

c. The Moderator shall appoint a committee to confer with the church as to reasons for its action and/or communicate any grievances the church has toward the Association.

d. The committee shall report its findings to the Association in Annual Session and upon favorable vote of two-thirds of the messengers present and voting on the second day, the church shall be dismissed.

5. The Association in Annual Session by a two-thirds majority of messengers present and voting may withdraw fellowship from a member church upon investigation and recommendation of the Executive Committee, when such church is adjudged to have ceased promoting the objectives of the Association, or when the church has failed to send its annual letter to the Association for two consecutive years. However, before the Association formally severs its relationship with a member church, it shall make a strong effort to work out problems and retain the church in fellowship. If a church does not report to the Association in a given year, the Association shall take the initiative to assist the church in meeting reasonable requirements for continuing fellowship with the Association.

SECTION II. Membership of the Annual Meetings of the Association

1. The membership of the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be composed of: The elected officers of the Association, all pastors who are members of churches in the Association, and all persons reporting on any phase of the work of the Association, shall be EX OFFICIO members of the Annual Meeting.

2. Each member church is entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members above fifty, except that no church shall have more than ten messengers exclusive of the EX OFFICIO members designated above.

3. The EX OFFICIO members in attendance and the elected messengers presenting certification of their election by their churches shall constitute the official voting enrollment in any session.

ARTICLE IV—Officers

SECTION 1. The Officers of the Association shall be:

Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Director, Brotherhood Director, Church Music Director, the Chairman of Missions, the Chairman of Evangelism, and the Superintendent of Missions (EX OFFICIO).

SECTION II. Election of Officers

1. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be elected as follows: the incumbent Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee, this committee shall present a slate of names to which may be added nominations from the floor. Such nominations shall be voted upon during the first session of the Annual Meeting.

2. The Missions Committee shall recommend a Superintendent of Missions when there is a vacancy; election shall be by majority vote of the Association, and for an indefinite period.

3. The Associational Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood shall select directors for their respective organizations, and recommend these persons to the Nominating Committee to be presented with the other nominees proposed for election.

SECTION III. Terms of office shall be as follows:

1. All elected officers shall take office at the close of the last session of the Annual Associational Meeting.

2. The duties of the Clerk serving during the current session are not ended, however, until the work of the session is completed and the minutes printed and distributed.

3. The Moderator may serve no more than four years consecutively.

4. All committee members appointed and elected in the Annual Session begin their work at the close of the Annual Meeting and continue through the next Annual Session of the Association.

ARTICLE V—Executive Committee

SECTION I. The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers named in Article IV, Section 1, plus one pastor and two lay members appointed by the new Moderator, and the elected representative of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Committee.

SECTION II. The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be from different churches at the time of election; the pastor and two lay members appointed by the Moderator shall be from three churches not already represented on the Committee.

SECTION III. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:

1. To act in behalf of the Association between Annual Meetings of the Association.

2. To carry out the plans laid at the Annual Session of the Association, as far as possible, and in line with the general policies and practices of the Associational work.

3. No obligations to exceed \$500 may be undertaken by the Executive Committee on behalf of the Association, without specific authority from the Association.

ARTICLE VI—Missions Committee

SECTION I. The Missions Committee shall be composed of a Director and eleven additional members recommended by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association in Annual Meeting. All mission work sponsored by the Association shall be under the supervision and direction of the Missions Committee.

SECTION II. Duties of the Missions Committee:

1. This Committee shall, when a vacancy occurs in the Office of Superintendent of Missions, recommend a successor based upon the approved job description, to the Annual Meeting, or to a special called meeting of the Association.

2. It shall work in cooperation with the Director of Missions of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

3. It shall supervise the activities of, and work with, the Superintendent of Missions in promoting the work of the Association.

4. It shall meet quarterly receiving written monthly reports from the Superintendent of Missions and make suggestions to him concerning the work of the Association.

5. It shall advise any group seeking to organize a mission or church.

6. It shall assist, upon request, churches with particular problems.

7. It shall maintain awareness of the mission needs of the churches in the Association and be ready to recommend ways in which these needs may be met.

8. It shall prepare and present a budget to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

SECTION III. The Missions Committee shall recommend to the Association for approval a job description of the Superintendent of Missions, who will serve as EX OFFICIO member of all committees.

ARTICLE VII—Steering Committee

SECTION I. The Steering Committee shall be composed of the Vice-Moderator as Chairman, the pastors of the member churches, and two lay members elected by each church and named in the Associational letter.

SECTION II. The responsibilities of the Steering Committee shall be:

1. To meet quarterly with the Executive Committee to consider the Kingdom work in the Association.

2. To assist in the promotion of the work of the Association in the churches.

3. To assist committee's reports in acquainting the churches with different phases of the work.

ARTICLE VIII—Other Committees

SECTION I. The following committees shall be composed of three or more members each. They shall be appointed by the Moderator and the Committee on Committees at the Annual Associational Meeting, to serve in the ensuing year and for the next Annual Meeting.

1. Committee on Committees: To work with the Moderator in the Annual Session in the appointment of committees.

2. Nominating Committee:

a. Nominate the Associational officers.

b. Name and recommend eleven members for the Missions Committee to be elected by the Association in the Annual Meeting.

c. Recommend to the Executive Committee replacements for vacancies occurring during the year.

d. All nominees and recommended persons named by the Nominating Committee shall have been consulted as to their availability for the respective positions.

3. Committee on Reports:

a. This Committee shall nominate representatives who will correlate and report on the following phases of work: Cooperative Program, Church Libraries, Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Hospitals, Homes for the Aging, Associational Stewardship, Home-State-Foreign Missions, Baptist Periodicals, American Bible Society, Christian Education, Civic Righteousness, Historian, and the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

b. These representatives shall serve as leaders in the Association in correlating and promoting the work with their respective agencies.

c. Each of the representatives named shall make a brief written report to the Annual Associational Meeting informing the people about the work they have been chosen to represent.

4. Program Committee:

a. This Committee shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Associational Meeting, which shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors.

b. This Committee shall, in the opening meeting, present the printed program for adoption with necessary adjustments.

5. Committee on Places and Preachers:

a. This Committee shall recommend the time and place or places for the next Annual Associational Meeting.

b. This Committee shall recommend the preachers and alternates for the Associational Sermon and Missionary Sermon.

6. Constitutional Amendment Committee:

a. This Committee shall consider and recommend changes in this Constitution which have been referred to them in the regular Annual Meeting.

b. This Committee shall recommend changes in this Constitution that become necessary for clarity and for the proper functioning of the Associational work.

7. Committee on Resolutions:

a. This Committee shall consider and present to the Annual Associational Meeting and resolutions referred to them.

b. They shall prepare and present any further resolutions deemed expedient to them.

8. Youth Committee:

a. This Committee shall work with, in advisory capacity, the youth of the Association.

b. They shall promote programs that are of interest to the youth, such as music festivals, camps, retreats, study courses, fellowships and the like.

9. Ordination Committee:

a. When so requested by a member church, they shall examine any candidate

for the gospel ministry, in matters of life, doctrine, personal faith, cooperation, and any others relating to the ministerial call.

b. Upon approval, they shall recommend the ordination of this candidate.

10. Seminary Extension Committee:

They shall promote and direct the Seminary Extension work. They shall appoint a Seminary Extension Director and Registrar annually. They shall appoint teachers in accordance with certification requirements of the Seminary Extension Department. They shall select centers, courses, and set the time for classes in this program.

ARTICLE IX—Annual Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be on Thursday and Friday following the first Sunday in August.

ARTICLE X—Amendments

1. This Constitution may be amended in the following manner: Notification of the proposed amendments shall be made in writing to each church in the Association not less than thirty days, and not more than sixty days, prior to the Annual Meeting, such notification coming through the Associational Office.

2. A copy of the proposed amendments shall be provided to each messenger present for the first session.

3. A first reading of the proposed amendment must be approved by a two-thirds vote of all messengers present and voting at the first session of the Annual Meeting. All changes, if any, to the proposed amendment shall be presented to the assembly at the first session prior to this first reading vote.

4. A final approval of the amendment shall be by a two-third vote of all messengers present and voting at the second session of the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE XI—Parliamentary Authority

The parliamentary authority for this Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order in its most recent revision available at the time of the meeting concerned, except where it may be in conflict with this Constitution.

ARTICLE XII—Amended Constitutional Copies

Certified copies of this Constitution as amended shall be filed with the Office of Superintendent of Missions, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, the Associational Historian, and not less than one copy placed in a safety box in a local bank.

PROCEEDINGS

Thursday, August 7, 1980 — Night Session

1. The One Hundred Seventy Third Session of the French Broad Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator Dr. Owen Fish on Thursday, August 7, 1980, at the Hopewell Missionary Baptist Church.
2. Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, Associational Music Director, led the congregation in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms."
3. Rev. Ralph McDevitt, Pastor of the Hopewell Church gave the devotions from Ezekiel 23.
4. A song "How Great Thou Art" was provided by Mrs. Irene Rector.
5. Roll call of the churches was made by the Associational Clerk. There were 154 persons present with 36 churches represented.
6. Don Caldwell, Chairman of the Program Committee, proposed that the Program and the Book of Reports be taken home and studied by the messengers. Then on August 8, 1980, in the second session, the Book of Reports, the Program, and the Amendments be adopted as printed. A motion for the proposal was made, second, and carried.
7. Rev. E.J. Jenkins, Superintendent of Missions, recognized all pastors and visitors. Visitors were: Luther Osment, N.C. Children's Home; Coy Privitt, Christian Action League; Ed Bullock, State Baptist Convention.
8. Miscellaneous business was then transacted. Dr. Owen Fish brought to the attention of the Association the Constitutional Amendment on page 29 of the Program, concerning the Trustees. Article 10 of the Constitution prohibited a motion at this years meeting but would be proposed at the next years meeting. Rev. E.J. Jenkins recommended on page 9 concerning the Committee on Reports, to combine Cooperative Program, Associational Stewardship, Home, State, and Foreign Missions Reports, due to the high cost in printing. A motion was made, second and discussion was then made upon the combination of these reports. The motion was then amended to consolidate the three Reports into one Report, this report to come under the name of the Stewardship Committee, and the three Committees to share in the report jointly. the amendment was carried. The original motion with the amendments was carried.
9. Coy Privitt, a representative from the Christian Action League and the Biblical Recorder then spoke on these categories.
10. Luther Osment, a representative from the North Carolina Children's Home spoke on this category.
11. Ed Bullock, a representative from the North Carolina State Baptist Convention and Lay Witness League spoke on these categories.
12. No further business was transacted and the worship service began.
13. The congregation sang "Blessed Be Thy Name" led by Mrs. Dorothy Roberts.
14. The offeratory prayer was made by Rev. Ralph McDevitt. The offering was \$171.18.

15. Rev. Guy Sluder brought the evening message from II Corinthians 3:1-6.
16. The Association was adjourned until 9:00 AM the following morning.

Friday, August 8, 1980 — Morning Session

17. The French Broad Baptist Association was again called into session at 9:00 AM at the Long Branch Baptist Church by the Moderator Dr. Owen Fish.

18. Mrs. Dorothy Roberts led the congregation in singing "Jesus Saves."

19. Rev. Steve Honeycutt gave the devotions from Psalms 46:1.

20. The congregation sang "He Leadeth Me and Standing on the Promises" led by Mrs. Dorothy Roberts.

21. Mr. John Smith, a representative from Mars Hill College, spoke on several points of interest.

22. Dr. Owen Fish, Moderator, pointed out specialties of Baptist as being characterized in independence, cooperation, and mission spirited. Dr. Fish also emphasized the Bold Mission Program. The thrust of this program is to enable every person in the world to hear and respond to the Gospel of Christ by the year 2,000. The second part of Bold Missions is to double our baptisms, double our conversions and to increase Sunday School growth by 22%.

23. The report of the nominating Committee was read by Rev. Ralph Hogan. Opportunity was given for nominations from the floor for nominees other than those from the report. No nominations were given from the floor. A motion was made to adopt the Nominating Committee's Report. The motion was second and carried.

24. The floor was open for corrections in the Book of Reports. Wade Huey was recognized and Mr. Huey asked for a correction to be made on the Mission Committee Report. The correction was to read, 40 people from the South Side Baptist Church in Florida came and helped in two Vacation Bible Schools, Chapel Hill, Middle Fork, and held a revival at Laurel Valley. A motion was made for the Book of Reports along with the corrections be accepted. The motion was second and carried.

25. The special speakers for the morning were: Calvin Knight from the Baptist Hospital; Emory Stokes from Wake Forest University; Hugh Starns from the Home for the Aged.

26. The congregation sang "I am Thine, O Lord" led by Mrs. Dorothy Roberts.

27. The report of the Committee on Places and Preachers was read by Rev. H.L. Wilson. The night session will be held at the Trinity Baptist Church with Rev. Joe Honeycutt to deliver the message and Rev. David Allman as the alternate. The day session will be held at the Marshall Baptist Church with Rev. Manson Warren to deliver the message and Rev. Sherman Tweed as the alternate. This report was adopted.

28. A motion was made to have a change in the program. The motion was second and carried.

29. Miss Sue Fitzgerald presented the Memorial Service.

30. Dr. Owen Fish announced that a total of 192 persons were present at both the night and the day session of the Associational Meeting.

31. Rev. Sibbald Lambert, vice moderator took charge of the meeting.
32. Highlights of the year were presented by Rev. E.J. Jenkins. Paint Gap has remodeled their church and other improvements were listed in the Historians Report.
33. The Report of the Resolutions Committee was adopted.
34. The new officers for the coming year were installed.

DIGEST HIGHLIGHTS

Baptism were 208. That's 96 more than last year; 14 churches showed no baptisms. To win one person to the Lord, it took 44 church members. That is 44 to 1. Other additions by letter were 257. That's a total of 104 more than last year; giving a membership of 8,968 which is a loss of 20 from last year. There were 84 deaths. The Sunday School enrollment was 4, 293. This is a gain of 194. There are 4,675 church members not enrolled in Sunday School and the average Sunday School attendance is 2,784. This is only 55% of the Sunday School enrollment on Sunday. The WMU has 531 members which is a loss of 100 from last year. Only 6 churches show a Brotherhood with 117 enrolled. Church Training there are 17 churches with 728 enrolled. Total receipts were \$921,229 which is \$169.00 more than last year. Association Gifts were \$16,378 which is \$2,988 more than last year but \$1,747 short of the recommended budget. Eleven churches did not contribute. Cooperative Program gifts were \$34,101 which is \$3,177 more than last year. 16 churches did not contribute. The grand total to missions is \$138,212 which is \$1,267 to missions more than last year.

We give God the Glory and man the credit for a job well done this past year.

We, in the French Broad Association, were honored by having Dr. Cecil Ray, General Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, along with his staff, to present the program. Your Committee has taken a stand against the sale of beer at Forks of Ivy and also the drug traffic which is taking its toll in our Association.

Our Associational Camp this year was held at the Carolina Association Camp grounds near Hendersonville, N.C. with more than 125 in attendance.

Your Missions Committee is recommending again that each church give three percent (3%) of the total offering plate dollar to Associational Missions. This is very necessary if we have an effective missions program.

The Church Training Department offers resources in evangelism, family life, Christian Doctrine, leadership, church and communities, and Christian Growth. Aside from these special training materials are available for training adult, children and youth as well as church leaders, deacons, pastors, church secretaries, and family ministries and special emphasis placed on Baptist Doctrines, Christian Homes, church music, foreign

and home series, stewardship, outreach and many others.

Adequate leadership is to make available and place in the hands of church members these resources that will help them improve their spiritual lives as well as those around them. We have a church material catalog that has 128 pages describing Baptist Periodicals to assist our people in significant spiritual growth and development. Our Southern Baptist Periodicals and Literature are the most fundamental, best written and the most for the money on the market today. Churches using offbrand literature are cheating their people. Its true "market unlimited" as far as material is concerned is available today from all types of publishing houses and different types of denominations but our Baptist Material excels them all. Southern Baptist materials should have priority in a Southern Baptist Church because it creates attitudes, sets the spiritual tones, determines policies, provides leadership, financial support, influences and charts the destiny of the church.

Faced with the same inflationary pressures that every family has these days, the Recorder has managed to get through another year without an increase in subscription rates. A church can still send the Recorder to resident families for only 7¢ a week per family, less than half the cost of a first class stamp and the best bargain in Christian literature to be found anywhere. Thus the Recorder is doing its best to hold the line by getting out a good paper at reasonable cost.

It has been another newsworthy year for Baptists and the Recorder has stayed on top of all that's happening. At the State Convention last November in Winston-Salem, a new relationship between the convention and Wake Forest University was approved. Messengers who attended were well informed and the issue was settled without serious division or controversy. This is just one illustration of how the Recorder informs North Carolina Baptists on vital matters affecting them. Nothing can take its place, certainly not the secular press which has so many denominations to cover.

Even though it was not a Baptist issue, the Recorder was able to set the record straight on an anonymous petition being circulated about a film supposedly about "the sex life of Jesus." Not only did the Recorder run news stories and editorials on this matter, it responded to numerous telephone calls. It was

able to tell people the truth about something that never did take place -- and the story was at least four years old anyhow.

Never has there been more misinformation circulated among our Baptist people. Those who do not receive the Recorder are easy victims for all types of misleading stories and rumors. Add to this the deliberate efforts of some groups to siphon off the loyalties and money of Baptist people and there's a strong case for sending the Recorder to every church family. See that your church makes this move in the coming year.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Since its founding 164 years ago, the American Bible Society has offered the peoples of the world more than 3 billion opportunities to read at least some portion of God's Word. Starting out with a distribution of 6,410 Bibles in 1816, the ABS has through the years steadily increased its ministry of sharing the Scriptures to reach its current annual distribution rate of more than 250 million Bibles, New Testaments, Portions and Selections.

In many overseas areas there were extremely encouraging increases in the number of people reached with God's Word. Following are some of the highlights of the Bible work made possible through your gifts in 1979.

AFRICA--It is a joy to report that more than one million Scriptures reached the people of Uganda during the year (an increase of 90 per cent). **ASIA**--Four areas of Asia more than doubled their distribution of Scriptures in 1979 over 1978: Burma, Nepal, Papua New Guinea and Syria. **LATIN AMERICA**--The newly published complete Bible in the Spanish "Version Popular" ("Dios Habla Hoy") helped to achieve a 10 per cent increase in Bible distribution in Latin America. **EUROPE**--The most significant developments in Bible work during 1979 occurred in Eastern Europe. 362,050 Scriptures were circulated in 1979 by the Bible Societies. **THE UNITED STATES**--The American Bible Society distributed 108,882,672 Scriptures in the United States alone during 1979.

TRANSLATIONS--Twenty-seven languages were added in 1979 to the list of languages and dialects in which at least one book of the Bible has been published. **NEW READER SCRIPTURES**--By the end of 1979 New Reader Scripture Selections had been published in 228 languages. Translation of these booklets had been completed in 315 languages and was proceeding in an additional 84 languages. **VOLUNTEERS**--The number of dedicated Christians who are devoting both time and effort to the Bible cause rose to over 35,000 Volunteers in 1979. **THE THANKS OF MILLIONS**--The tremendous advances achieved for the Bible cause during 1979 were made possible because of gifts received from organizations such as the Southern Baptist

Convention. Since 1968 gifts from the SBC have been as follows:

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

During the past year, our hospital has again received accreditation for the maximum period, two years, by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. Only about one-third of the hospitals in the nation receive the full two-year accreditation.

Our hospital is constantly upgrading its staff, facilities and equipment. In recent months, a carbon dioxide surgical laser has been added. The laser emits an invisible beam of light which vaporizes tissue, cutting and coagulating at the same time. It is used now for delicate surgery of the larynx, upper respiratory tract, and lung. It has potential, also, for surgery of other internal organs.

New ultrasound equipment provides improved accuracy in determining location and degree of blocked arteries. The department of dentistry is being expanded to meet an increasing need for specialty dental services. An occupational therapist has been added to the staff to help patients recover functional skills lost through accident or disease. A new instrument has been acquired for testing infants with suspected hearing loss.

The financial counseling section is now better prepared to assist those who need its services. Through a special arrangement with the Forsyth County Social Services Department, social workers and counselor for the state's Crippled Children's Program are now stationed in the hospital and are immediately available to patients.

The staff and trustees continue to make every effort to keep operating costs as low as possible. In this connection, our hospital recently became a charter member of the Sun Alliance, an organization of 22 large hospitals in nine southeastern states. A primary purpose of the alliance is to keep operating costs (and consequently, patient charges) as low as possible through group purchasing of capital equipment, the development and sharing of comparative data and management information, and possible group arrangements with specialized consultants.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to provide a pastoral ministry to hospital patients and their families, individual and group counseling in crisis situations, clinical pastoral education at several levels, and numerous events in human enrichment and development. During the past year, the department has begun a Minister's Care Plan, in which the Baptist State Convention provides financial assistance for ministers and/or their families who seek pastoral counseling through one of the department's regional centers. Also, the position of Chaplain to Medical Students has been elevated to a staff/faculty position.

The hospital staff is grateful to the Baptists of North Carolina for continuing financial support. During 1979, the hospital received \$400,500 through the Cooperative Program, and \$357,517 through the North Carolina Missions Offering and designated gifts.

Chartered in 1920, it was born out of a need to provide a channel for gifts and bequests which would be held in trust. Thus Baptist people were enabled to have a continuing part in support of every mission effort, every ministry of Baptist, even after their own deaths. Through these sixty years, your Baptist Foundation has received, administered, and distributed gifts to Baptist colleges, Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, foreign and home missions, state missions, Baptist Hospital, churches, associations, the Cooperative Program. The Foundation receives no money for its own use - it only serves as trustee for all these Baptist causes.

A second way the Foundation receives gifts to support Baptist causes is through charitable trusts.

The Foundation has received Memorial gifts to deceased loved ones. A fund to assist Fruitland Bible Institute has been created. Gifts of real estate for the support of Southeastern Seminary, local churches and foreign missions have been received.

During the past year, through the many ways it is able to accept gifts, new trusts have been established with combined assets of \$650,000. Additions to existing trusts, providing for scholarships, missions offerings, memorials and many other causes, were more than \$370,000. The audit of Foundation records for the year ending December 31, 1979 revealed total increase of assets for the year was \$1,018,681.00 with total assets of the Foundation being \$5,115,000. This is exciting when we remember it is all designated for Kingdom work through Baptist institutions and causes.

In the coming year, the Foundation will continue to emphasize stewardship and commitment.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The French Broad Association rejoices in the happy celebration of the 150th Anniversary of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. For many years the French Broad, along with other western associations, had few ties with the State Convention and its churches rarely cooperated with Convention programs. The long distance between the Mountains and Raleigh made it very difficult for representatives to attend Convention meetings and to become acquainted with the work. Better roads and better means of travel changed that and since the turn of the century ties have been strengthened and Western North Carolina churches have become influential members of the Convention. Meanwhile more and more people caught the vision of what can be accomplished through the cooperative efforts of many churches. With deeper insights into the vast possibilities for service in the Kingdom, churches within the French Broad, as in other western associations, have continued to grow spiritually and to extend their efforts far beyond the local communities.

Numbers of activities testify to this growth. The number of persons taking advantage of the study offered through Seminary Extension courses each year is a strong testimony to an increasing desire to be better prepared for church work. The annual Associational Day Camp indicates a broader understanding of the needs of youth in the area. The Camp this summer, held at Bear Walla Baptist Camp Ground near Hendersonville, was a memorable experience for all who attended. One hundred and twenty-four registered for the week. Four registered nurses, three qualified life guards, and enough adult counselors to provide one for every seven children gave efficient supervision. Each day's schedule included worship services, Bible study, mission studies, fellowship, and recreation. During the week there were seven professions of faith, forty rededications, and two personal commitments to mission work.

The fact that all but two churches in the Association had Daily Vacation Bible Schools this year and that at least eleven churches had weeks of Bible study in January give further evidence of a growing commitment to a full program of Christian education. A group of thirty-two young people and their counselors from the Southside Baptist Church in Jacksonville, Florida, assisted Chapel Hill, Middle Fork, and Laurel Valley Churches with their Bible Schools and revivals in June.

Nine local pastors attended the Evangelism Conference in Greenboro during January. Two attended the Pastor's Week of Study held at Mars Hill in July. Four churches observed Baptist Men's Day in January. Forty-seven persons attended the Anniversary Rally held at California Creek on May 1. In May twenty men joined two from Raleigh on a mission to help build the Temple Baptist Church in Moundsville, West Virginia. A number hope to return in August to complete the structure. A few churches have made donations to help new churches in Montana, Nevada, and Panama. Ivy Hill Baptist Church sponsored, and a number of churches helped finance, a volunteer missionary to work in Montana for several months during the year. Churches have continued to improve their facilities. Beech Glen has installed carpet and new

pews in the sanctuary. Mt. Sheba Church has added a bell tower to the front of the building. Long Branch Congregation has added brick siding and new windows to the whole building and remodeled the interior. Hopewell has a new roof and Big Laurel has five new Sunday School classrooms.

A number of churches have new pastors. Hot Springs has called the Reverend Arthur Ammons, Laurel Branch, the Reverend Jack Guffey, Marshall Church, the Reverend J.M. Minix, Walnut, the Reverend Sherman Tweed, Calvary Church in Mars Hill, the Reverend Tom Sawyer, Little Creek, the Reverend Joe Tomberlin, Chapel Hill, the Reverend E.W. Smith, Oak Grove, the Reverend Gordon Ball, Piney Grove, the Reverend Jimmy Buckner. California Creek Church ordained and called "Coach" Harrell Wood as its full-time pastor, he had been serving on an interim basis.

A few churches are without pastors at this time: Alexander, Enon, Laurel Valley, Locust Grove, and North Fork Churches.

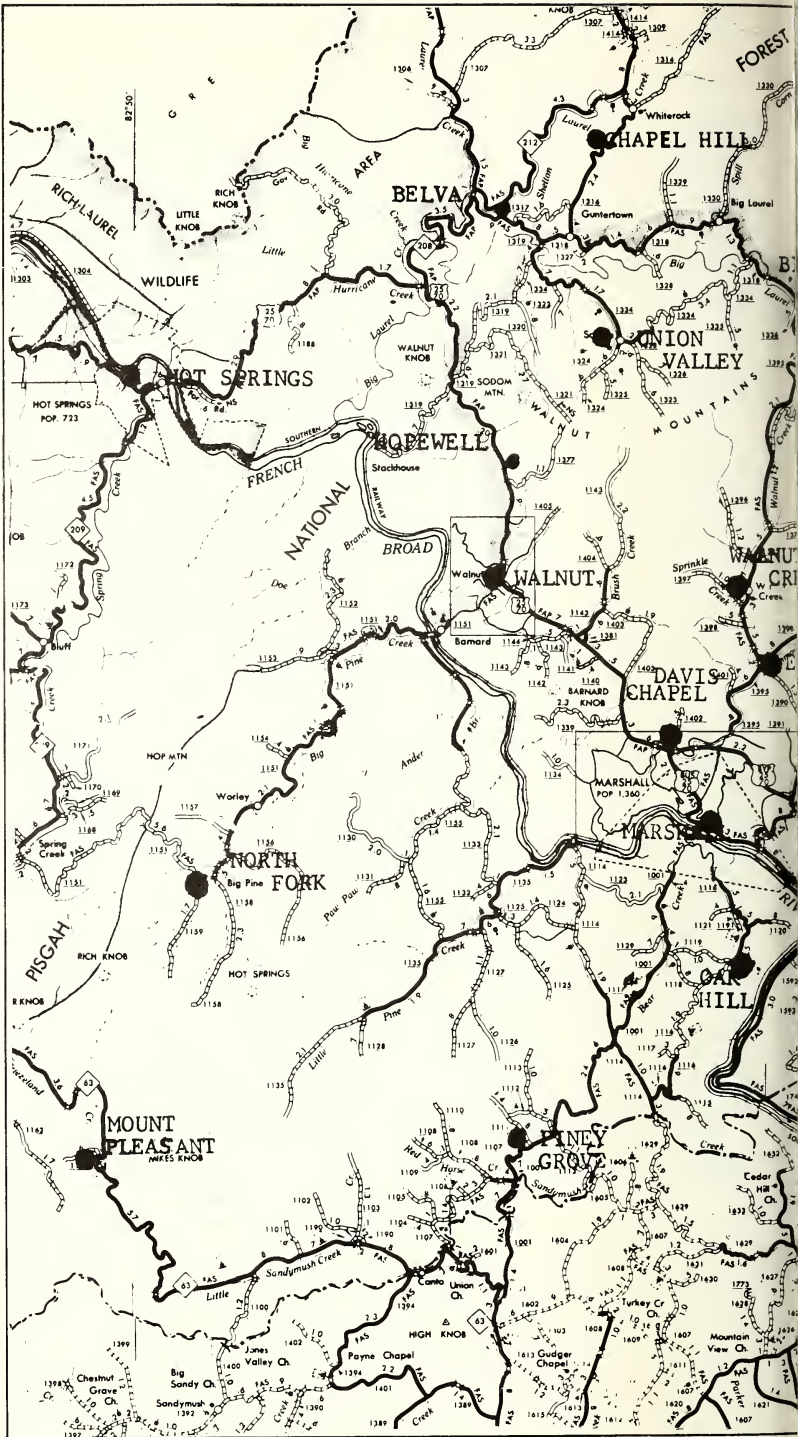

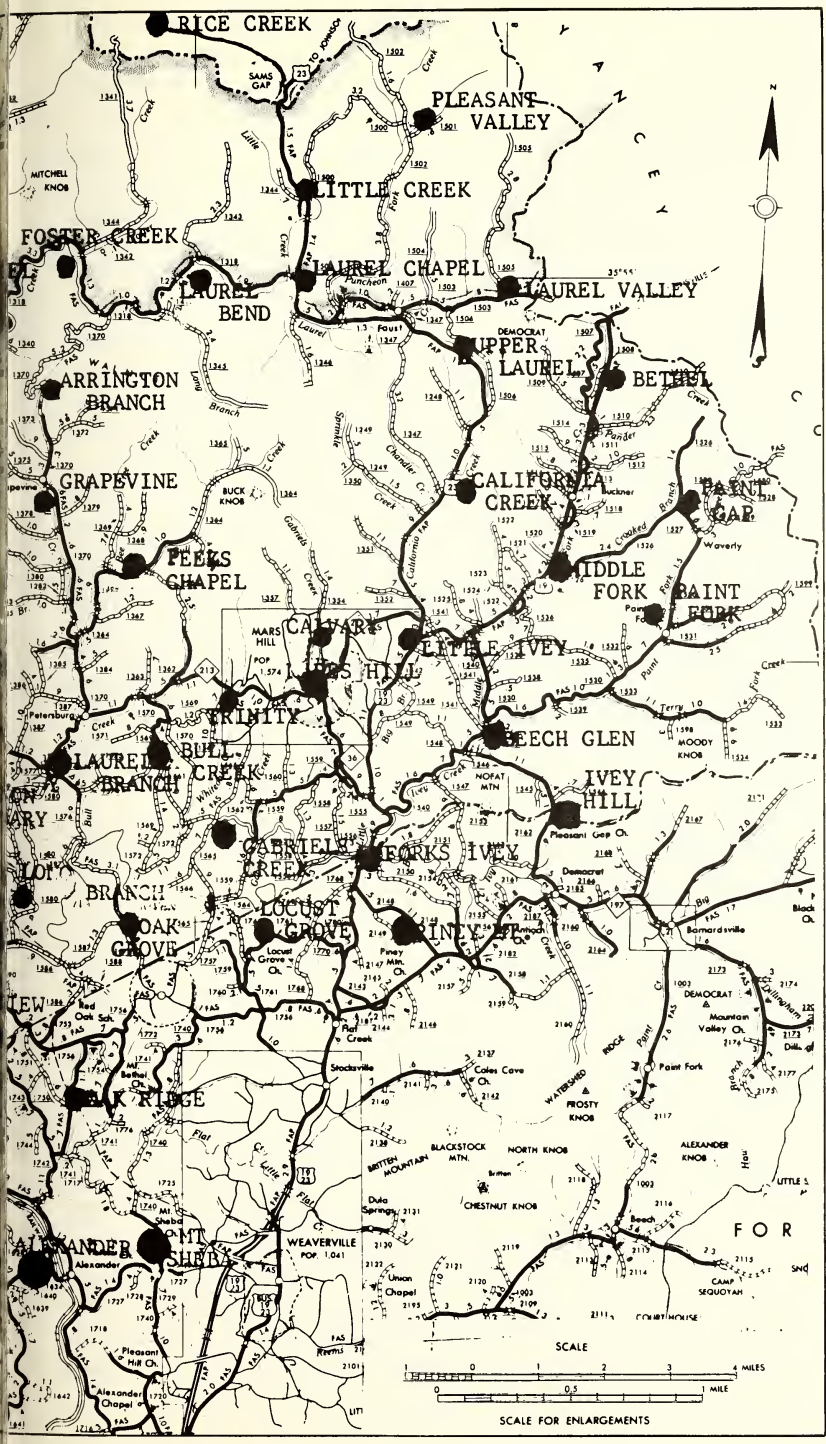

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

The French Broad Baptist Association is alive, well and responsive; this is true in terms of what it has accomplished this year and what it plans to do and the challenges that lie before us. As Director of Missions, I try to undergird certain priorities. The first priority being to support the pastoral leadership and the leadership of the church. Most of the activities and events engaged in was directly or indirectly designed to support these leaderships. Another priority was to cultivate the awareness of mission opportunities, personal, associational, home and foreign, to be realistic and have a genuine legitimate response. Mission education and involvement is essential to personal Christian growth. Another priority is pulpit selection committee; training and helps in sharing principles and procedures that enables the committee to operate more effectively but leaving the decision making totally in the hands of the committee and the local church.

The excitement of the Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong Offerings led by Mrs. Robinson and the WMU's was a blessing as we exceeded all previous records. The Executive Committee and Missions Committee recommends for the coming year that we seek to locate ground and build an office building for the Association; that we encourage to give 3% of the offering plate dollar; and for each pastor to participate in all the activities of the Association and seek to give our churches an understanding of the difference between the church, the Association, the State Convention and Southern Convention.

Eight practical Evangelism Conferences, related to helps for growing churches and discipling members, were held during the first afternoon session at the First Baptist Church, Greensboro. About 2,400 pastors and lay persons heard inspirational speakers at War Memorial Auditorium.

The 35th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held in Asheville during February 2-3, 1981.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

While serving Southern Baptist churches and agencies in 1979, the Annuity Board marked a period of "achievement, ministry and growth in practically every phase of its work," according to Dr. Darold H. Morgan, president.

Key statistical highlights in 1979 included:

1. A 13th Check amounting to 10 per cent of a year's benefit was mailed to most annuitants in December 1979.
2. A total of \$19,131,539 in retirement benefits was paid.

In North Carolina as of March 31, 1980, 3,046 staff members of 2,316 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program.

Through March 31, 1980, we had processed the following:

- 77 - Southern Baptist Retirement Program applications
- 14 - Applications for age retirement benefits
- 3 - Applications for disability benefits
- 6 - Widow's claims

In the French Broad Association 20 churches and 22 staff members are participating in the retirement program. Of this number 14 are still participating on the minimum of \$33.34 per month. There is a great need to upgrade this to 10% of total salary for staff members.

STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board works in all 50 States and Puerto Rico. More than 2,900 missionaries and special personnel serve full time. Home mission work is funded by the Cooperative Program and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering. This Offering is given in March.

Over 3,000 missionaries serve these countries in educational, medical, spiritual, and other ministries. Foreign Missions also distribute food to many hungry people throughout the world. This mission endeavor is supported by the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering and the Cooperative Program.

By praying for and giving to missions, we each become an instrument in carrying out the command of Christ to "Go Ye." We each have an opportunity to become "witnesses." Lets not fail to take advantage of every opportunity to become a part of the growing Kingdom of God. Give to Missions!!!

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

The seven Baptist Colleges of North Carolina; Campbell University, Chowan College, Gardner-Webb College, Mars Hill College, Meredith College, Wake Forest University, and Wingate College were begun as part of the mandate of Jesus Christ to go and teach. The Great Commission is the major motivation for both Christian Education and missions. Hand in hand these two parts of the life of the Church work together to bring persons into a saving relationship with Jesus Christ and to help persons grow in their faith and life commitment. The churches and the colleges must work together to accomplish these purposes. The covenant relationship between the two is based on the

purpose of God, the mind of Christ, the work of the Spirit and the authority of the Scriptures. Under the Lordship of Christ and within this covenant relationship the church and schools can work together in freedom and faithfulness.

To help correlate the programs of the various colleges, the Council of Christian Higher Education was established in 1946. Its purpose is to correlate the programs, develop uniform accounting procedures, and provide better communication between the colleges and the churches of the convention. The Council does not tell the colleges what to do, for each college is directed by a Board of Trustees elected by the Council. As Susan Ray says in her Book, BAPTISTS WORKING TOGETHER, "The real strength of each Council lies in this voluntary concept of community rather than competition." There are 42 members of the Council which includes 16 General Board Education Committee members, and presidents and chairman of trustees of the college. The convention president, General Secretary-treasurer of the Convention, President of the W.M.U. serve as ex-officio members along with Robert Mullinax, executive secretary of the Council.

The Council is continually seeking to help colleges as each school finds its unique way to serve.

SEMINARY EXTENSION

Today's Christians and Ministers faces problems unknown to their predecessors, throughout almost all of Christian History. More of our Sunday School Teachers, Pastors, and Church Leaders should take advantage of this opportunity of continuing education.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

We, the Constitution Committee, unaware of Article 10 which states proposed amendments should be brought to the attention of the church prior to the Annual Association, therefore, we present this amendment for your consideration and prayerful attention to be voted on at next year's Annual Meeting.

TRUSTEES - PROPERTY

Section 1. Title to all property, real or personal, owned and held by the Association, either outright or on special trust, with the exception of the Association's current operating funds, shall be vested in Board of Trustees, to consist of three persons (preferably a lawyer) who are members of affiliated churches. Trustees shall serve for three (3) years with one trustee rotating off each year and cannot be reelected as a trustee until one year has elapsed. One new trustee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at annual meeting.

Section 2. The Trustees shall appoint their own chairman and secretary.

Section 3. The Trustees of the Association, in addition to holding title to the Association's real and personal property, shall sign and execute all deeds, bills of sale, contracts, notes, mortgages, deeds of trust, and other papers and documents affecting the Association's property; upon authorization duly given at any regular or special meetings of the Association. The Trustees shall make reports to the annual sessions of the Association and at other times if required by the Executive Board.
