PROCEEDINGS OF THE PRIMITIVE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Friday, October 20th, 1899.

Introductory sermon was delivered by Eld. W. F. Gregory, Text: Matth. 16:18. After a short intermission the delegates assembled in the church. Song: "Brethren we have met again &c." Prayer offered by Eld. A. McKnight.

1st. Called for associational letters—sixteen were

handed in and read.

2nd. Invited newly constituted churches to seats with us, when Garden Creek church presented a letter which was read and her delegates seated.

3rd. Invited regular Baptist churches of our faith

and order to unite with us. None present.

4th. Elds. Simcox from the M't'n Union, and Mc-Knight from the Little River Association acted as tellers, who reported Eld. Wm. Miles, Moderator, George W. Miles, Clerk.

5th. Invited correspondents of our faith and order; when Eld. M. E. Simcox from the M't'n Union Association, Elds. A. McKnight, M. E. Pool and Isom Edwards from the Little River accepted seats.

6th. Invited Transients and visitors of our faith and order; when A. Hutchinson accepted a seat.

7th. On motion, authorized the Moderator to make all temporary appointments during this session.

8th. Appointed J. M. Brown, H. A. Wood and F. W. Norman with the delegates of this church to arrange preaching during this session.

9th. Appointed Elds. Eli Sebastian, W. F. Gregory, J. O. Wood and Brethren A. Caudill and J. P. Elledge committee of arrangements: invited Moderator, 'lerk and correspondents to sit with them.

10th. Appointed T. P. Hanks, F. M. Brooks and . Hanks committee on Finance.

th. Appointed A. Felts, O. L. Darnall and W. F. committee on Sabbath Schools.

Appointed J. M. Gentry, L. L. Wood and nings committee on Resolutions.

Appointed J. M. Brown to write a correster to the M't'n Union Association, L. M. Little River and H. C. Jennings to the Blue rave them ready for inspection to-morrow.

14th. A motion was made favoring a Temperance committee: Motion lost.

15th. Retain clerks of the various churches in our bounds as committee on obituaries.

16th. On motion, adjourned till 9 A. M. to-morrow. Song: "In all my Lord's appointed ways &c." Prayer by Eld. M. E. Pool. Benediction by Eld. Wm. Miles.

SECOND DAY.

Saturday, October 21st, 1899.

Spent several minutes in Devotional exercises.
Association called to order. Song: "Am I a soldier of the cross &c." Prayer offered by Moderator.

1st. Called roll of delegates and marked absentees.

2nd. Called on committee of arrangements to report, who reported and were discharged.

3rd. On motion, agree to dispose of items in the order they appear on Bill of arrangements.

4th. Read Constitution, Rules of Decorum and Articles of Faith.

5th. Extended an invitation to Transients and visitors of our faith and order.

6th. Called on corresponding Brethren to report. J. P. Cockerham visited the M't'n Union Association; Elds. W. F. Gregory and Eli Sebastian and Brethren L. L. Wood, C. Waddell, H. C. Jennings and J. A. Roberson the Little River; Bro. A. Caudill the Blue Ridge; Report received and Brethren discharged.

7th. Called on Brethren appointed to write corresponding letters to read them. Letters read and Brethren discharged.

8th. Appointed correspondents to sister associations, viz: J. A. Roberson, W. F. Gregory, L. L. Wood J. P. Cockerham and H. C. Jennings to the M't'n Union; L. L. Wood, C. Waddell, W. F. Gregory, J. W. Brooks-J. A. Roberson, J. M. Brown, Wm. Miles, C. L. Cheek and F. W. Norman to the Little River; A. Caudill, Eli Sebastian, J. O. Wood, H. C. Jennings and J. A. Roberson to the Blue Ridge.

9th. Called on committee on Sabbath schools to report; who reported, viz:

We, your committee, submit the following:

"1st. We think it best for each church to engage in Sabbath school work. 2nd. Let each school be free from pride, sectarianism and trashy literature. 3rd. Strive to make the youthful mind a store-house of good ideas and gospel truths."

Eld. W. F. Gregory, Ch'm. Com.

Report received and committee discharged.

10th. Called on Finance committee to report, who reported, received from the churches \$15.15, from Treasurer \$2.35. Report received and committee discharged.

11th. Called on committee of ministry to report, who reported for Saturday: 1st. Eld. M. E. Pool; 2nd Eld. M. E. Simcox. For Sabbath: 1st. Eld. Isom Edwards; 2nd. Eld. Wm. Miles; 3rd. Eld. A. McKnight.

Report received and committee discharged.

12th. Committee on Resolutions submitted the following, viz:

"Resolved, 1st. That all our members strictly adhere to our Constitution, Rules of Decorum and Articles of Faith. 2nd. That we have comfortable church houses. 3rd. That our ministers hold protracted meetings and otherwise preach together as much as possible. 4th. That the layety assist their ministers and the poor of our churches by prayer and contributions. 5th. That we return our thanks to the brethren, sisters and friends of this vicinity for hospitality shown us during this session."

J. Morgan Gentry, Ch'm. Com.

Report received and committee discharged.

13th. Called on committee on obituaries to report, who reported eleven, which are spread on our minutes.

14th. Ask our churches to considder the propriety of reducing the delegation of each church from five to three,

15th. On motion, spread our Articles of Faith upon these minutes.

16th. On motion, we ask the churces in our bounds to considder the advisability of locating a printing press, within the limits of our correspondence, to be used in the interest of our people, and make report to our next session.

17th. On motion, authorized the Secretary to mail (at the expense of this body) our corresponding letters and one minute for each church, to the clerks of each association with which we are in correspondence.

18th. On motion, allowed the Clerk \$2.35, the residue of last year's funds, for mailing last year's minutes.

19th. Appointed the clerk treasurer, and ordered that he superintend the printing, and distribution of 600 copies of these minutes and allow him 84.00 for his services.

20th. Appointed our next Association to convene with Bethel church, seven miles Northeast of Wilkesboro, N. C., on Friday before the fourth Lord's day in October, 1900. Eld. Wm. Miles to preach the introductory sermon and Eld. Eli Sebastian, alternate.

21st. On motion adjourned to time and place of our next association. Song: "Firmly I stand &c." Prayer offered by Eld. Isom Edwards. Benediction by Moderator.

SABBATH.

1st. Sermon by Eld. Isom Edwards. Text: Matthew 18:11. 2nd. Sermon by Eld. A. McKnight, Text: Genesis, 7:16. A large audience were in attendance to hear the word preached. We hope much good was done. Brethren and sisters pray the Lord to lead us by the Divine light of truth. Amen! CLERK.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1st. We believe in one only true and living God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace.

4th. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature by his own free will or ability.

5th. We believe that sinners are called, converted, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Spirit, and that all

who are thus regenerated and born again by the Spirit of God shall never fall finally away.

6th. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

7th. We believe that Baptism, the Lord's Supper and Feet-washing are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of those ordinances; and we believe the only true mode of baptism is by immersion.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgement, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

9th. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances of the gospel, except such as are regularly called, and come under the imposition of hands by the Presbytery.
