Bro, Ed., as we called him professed religion early in life and joined Mt. Pleasant Bap:ist Church and was a member of same when he died. Two years ago he was licensed to preach the Gospel and was a faithful Sunday School worker, a consistent church member and a true and faithful member of the Masonic Fraternity.

We are grieved at the parting from our brother, but weep not as those without hope. We look forward to the day when we will meet to part no more. Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord.

Mt. Liberty has lost one member, brother, B. S. Chastain, age, 78 years. He lived a consistent member of the Baptist Church for a number of years. He bore his suffering with patience. Our loss is Heaven's gain, Farewell dear brother, till we meet again.

Shoal Creek Church has last three members. Brother Patton Jones bo. ned April 3rd 1836, lived a faithful member of the church for a number of years.

Sister Eliza Montgomery, wife of Elijah Montgomery, born March 14th 1833 and lived a faithful member of the church ever since a girl. Sister Mollie Jones, wife of Alex. Jones, age 56yrs, - lived a faithful member.

Macedonia No. 2 has lost one member, Bro. M. L. Cook, 31 yrs. of age. Was a member of the church for 6 years. Died March 25 1916, after a sickness of about 8 days. He was unmarried, but left many friends and relatives to mourn his loss.

Pleasant Grove has lost one, Elder M. J. Hall, joined the church November, 1858 and lived a consistent member of the church for 58 years, and died in the faith.

His death was an index to his life, he was a good citizen, a kind father and husband, and a lover of the cause of Christ. Among his last words to his family were "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course I have kept the faith". May God bless his dear companion and children, is our prayer.

Sister Victory James departed this life Aug. 9th 1916. She was a member of Pleasant Grove Church about 15 years just before her departure from this life to realize the great eternity. She stated that she was ready to go., and had no fears, and was ready to meet her Savior.

J. G. Hickey was born May 13 1836, and died Jan. 6th 1916, age, 79 yrs 7 months 23 days. His wife, who was Ruth Voyles, still survives. To the union, nine children were born of which 4 are still living viz: W. H. Hickey, T. D. G. L. and Bell. Bro. J. G. Hickey professed faith in Christ about 1886, and united with the Baptist Church at Collis, N. C. A few years later he join ed the church at Friendship and remained a member of that church up to his death.

Bro. Hickey was a quiet, orderly, member, a good citizen and as he grew in years, he grew in faith, saying to his children that his time on earth was short and he was ready. May it be so with all of us when the summons comes

Sister Amanda Montgomery, wife of John Montgomery and daughter of Milliam Collins, died in Aug. 1916, aged 48 years. She leaves seven children without father or mother.

Sister Susan Ingram, wife of Robert Ingram, was born Oct. 1839, and died May 29th 1916. Was a member of the Baptist Church about fifty years. She was stricken with paralysis and confined to her bed about 5 years, Her hope in Christ was strong till the hour of her death. She leaves husband and son to mourn her loss.

Sister Francis McTaggart was a member of Pleasant Grove Church when she died. She was about 80 years old when she died.

Sister Effic Pickelsimer, wife of Joseph Pickelsimer, born March 6th, 1881, and departed this life Feb. 29, 1916 age about 35 years. She professed faith in Christ when about fourteen years old and was a member of the Friendship Church until her death. She was a faithful Christiau, a loving companion and mother. She was loved by all who knew her. She leaves a husband and ten children together with many friends to mourn her loss,

Fairview has lost one Brother G W. Akin, who departed this life Feb 15 1916, at the age of 65 years 2 months and 17 days. The community in which he lived lost a good neighbor and citizen, one whose life is worthy to recommend He stood for truthfulness, honesty, and integrity at all times. Was ever ready to sympathise or contribute his means to any worthy cause. Not only this but he would speak a kind word to the erring ever advising them to do right, and serve God. Bro. Akin would not speak evil of any one, but could find something good about every person. Aug. 7th 1871 he was in the organization of Snow Hill Baptist Church, Now Fairview, and lived a consistent church member to his death.

He was a faithful Sunday School student and teacher

for a number of years. While on the bed of affliction, that old malady preying on his physical being, he was cheerful, trusting that he might recover to meet with his friends again in life, yet he often said if it was God's will he was ready. He possessed that never failing faith to the end.

He died as he lived—a Christian. Language is too frail to express our grief. Can we say more than to say "He served his generation and fell asleep"?

We the church extend our heart felt sympathy for the surviving brother, sister, daughters and host of grandchildren in the loss of a brother, father and grandfather.

Well may it be said that they are "Bereft indeed,"

Who can fathom the anguish of their hearts! God can answer their grief and heal the wounds. But let us not tarry at the grave and sweet associations of life when there are better things in sight

Bro Akin is not dead, but alive with Jesus and loved ones gone before.
