I do appreciate the willingness of the NHA Executive Committee to give consideration to the matter which arose in the Annual Meeting of the Wesleyan Theological Society in regard to the phrase, "inerrant in the originals," which appears in the NHA Statement of Faith, and which is also a basis for membership in WTS.

I have taken note of your request "that the WTS send their suggestions for changing this phrase with a brief supporting the revision." I do not believe, however, that the Executive Committee of the WTS could do this apart from an authorization to do so by the Society.
