## Daily Proceedings

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### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The first session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Central Jurisdiction, convened in Galilee Methodist Church, Laurinburg, North Carolina, on Wednesday, November 6, 1940, at 2:15 p. m., Bishop A. P. Shaw presiding.

Hymn No. 381, "The Church's One Foundation," was sung, after which Rev. R. B. McRae led the Conference in prayer. The choir then led in singing Hymn No. 1, "Holy, Holy, Holy." The Bishop then led in reading from the regular order of worship for the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Dr. H. L. Ashe led the Conference in prayer, after which an offering of \$8.08 for emergency purposes was raised and given to the Treasurer.

The choir led the Conference in singing Hymn No. 140, "There Is a Fountain Filled with Blood."

The Bishop then delivered an exceedingly thoughtful and inspiring communion meditation, subject: "Making Religion Real," and a beautiful and impressive communion service was conducted by the Bishop, District Superintendents, and Dr. R. N. Brooks.

R. W. Winchester, speaking for the Conference, brought words of greetings to Bishop Shaw.

At the calling of the names of the deceased brethren: Retired Elders, H. O. Fredrick, A. B. McQueen, and G. W. Morehead; Effective Elders, R. T. Weatherby; Accepted Supply Pastors, W. G. Hoover, the Conference stood with bowed heads while Bishop Shaw led the Conference in prayer.

On motion of G. M. Phelps, J. E. Brower was elected Secretary with the privilege of nominating his assistants. He nominated the following who were elected: Rev. T. H. Wootten and Mrs. L. B. Haizlip.

On motion, P. I. Wells was elected Statistician, and nominated his assistants as follows, and they were elected: H. C. Gannaway, G. W. Patterson, G. E. Hogue, and Coy N. Williams.

The former Treasurer of the Conference, N. J. Pass, was asked to act as the Treasurer of the Conference until his successor be elected.

On motion of R. W. Winchester, W. S. McLeod was elected reporter to the Christian Advocate, Southwestern Edition.

On motion, Rev. C. W. Perry was elected Reporter to the Secular Papers.

**Bounds of Conference:** The first six rows of seats in the front pews and all the side seats on the main floor of the church was made the bounds of the Conference.

On motion, W. M. Wells was elected Postmaster.

The printed program for the Conference was adopted as the program of the Conference, with such adjustments as necessary to carry on the business of the Conference.

On motion, W. J. Cameron was elected Collector for the Book Concern.

**Welcome Addresses:** The following welcome addresses were presented:

For the ministers, Rev. J. W. I. Stunstal.

For the City Schools, Prof. J. C. Melton.

For the Local Church, Mrs. Louise Malloy.

**Response:** Prof. S. T. Brooks, who was chosen to speak for the Laymen, being absent, Rev. N. J. Pass proceeded with a splendid address appropriate for both ministers and laymen.

**Introductions:** Rev. J. W. Suber, L. W. Works, and T. D. McKinsey were introduced. On motion of R. W. Winchester, the visiting ministers were given the privilege to sit within the bounds of the Conference and accorded the courtesy of the floor.

Announcements were made, and a check of \$254.70 from the Book Concern was turned over to the Secretary by the Bishop.

Motion by R. C. Sharp prevailed that Friday, 11 o'clock, be made the time of Roll Call for Bennett College.

On motion of C. W. Perry, 9:00 o'clock was made the meeting hour for the business session of the Conference each morning, and 8:45 for the worship service.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. G. M. Phelps.

#### THURSDAY MORNING, NOVEMBER 7

Devotions were led by Rev. C. N. Williams.

Bishop Shaw called the Conference to order.

The Journal of the previous day was read and approved with the necessary corrections.



The characters of W. T. Lomax, G. M. Phelps, and R. B. McRae, District Superintendents, were passed, and each, in turn, read his report.

The characters of the Effective Elders and Supply Pastors of the Greensboro, Western, and Laurinburg Districts were passed, and each, in turn, made their report.

The lay delegates were asked by the Bishop to stand. The Bishop emphasized the need of greater co-operation of laymen and pastors in the work of the church.

The question of pro rating ministerial support was raised by Rev. R. C. Sharpe, Bishop Shaw asked that the Conference enforce the law of 5% of the pastor's cash salary for Conference Claimants and 2¼% for Episcopal Fund next year. The District Superintendents were asked to make the apportionments accordingly.

The following visitors were introduced: K. L. Jackson, Mt. Zion Church, Baltimore, Md.; J. J. Barnes, Baltimore; A. H. Whitfield, Washington; E. Adolf Haynes, Secretary, Washington Conference, Baltimore; Rev. Tomlinson, Pastor of the Baptist Church, this city; Mr. Hood, member of the Board of Publications; A. J. Mitchell, District Superintendent, North Baltimore District, Washington Conference; J. E. Dodson, District Superintendent of the Alexander District, Baltimore; C. S. Harper, Baltimore; S. A. Vergil, Baltimore; L. H. McArthur, Pastor of Zora Church, Philadelphia.

Mr. Hood, member of Board of Publications, spoke.

Rev. L. H. McArthur was presented and brought greetings from Zora Church, Philadelphia, and Delaware Conference.

Rev. A. J. Mitchell, District Superintendent, North Baltimore District, Washington Conference, was presented and brought greetings.

A question of privilege was called by W. M. Wells and he presented Rev. Tomlinson, Pastor of the Baptist Church, this city. He brought greetings for the Mayor and the ministers of the Baptist Churches of the city.

The hour having arrived for the memorial service for the following deceased: Retired Elders, H. O. Fredrick, A. B. McQueen, and G. W. Morehead; Effective Elders, R. T. Weatherby; Supply Pastors, G. Hoover; Widows, Mrs. Robert Smith, Mrs. J. C. Robbins, and Mrs. P. J. Cook, Rev. R. B. Rhyne announced Hymn No.

73, led the Apostles' Creed, and then presented Rev. J. W. Simpson, who delivered a very appropriate and thoughtful message on the subject: "Labor and Its Reward," at the close of which Rev. Simpson led the closing prayer.

### AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions were led by Rev. H. C. Gannaway.

The Bishop called the Conference to order.

The character of H. L. Ashe, District Superintendent of the Winston District, was passed and he read his report.

At the request of the Bishop, H. C. Gannaway led the Conference in singing.

The character of the Effective Elders and Supply Pastors was passed and they made their reports.

In the Statistical session, the Statistician and Treasurer received, in open Conference, the statistics from the pastors, after which the Bishop gave an encouraging address on the outlook of the Methodist Church under the Jurisdictional set-up.

The roll was called for Secretary, Treasurer, and Statistician's expenses. \$47.00 was received, which is \$15.67 each for Treasurer, Secretary, and Statistician.

Miss Julia Titus, Superintendent of Allen Home School, was presented and brought a very urgent plea for the school.

Benediction was pronounced by Dr. A. J. Mitchell.

### FRIDAY MORNING, NOVEMBER 8

Devotions were conducted by B. W. Stewart.

Bishop Shaw called the Conference to order.

The Journal of the previous day was read and approved.

Question 3 was called, and the answer "Yes" was given, but under the new name omitting the word "Episcopal," it appears necessary to investigate the incorporation of the church and make necessary changes. A committee of three was appointed as follows: R. W. Winchester, G. M. Phelps, and H. L. Ashe.

Question 4 was called, "What officers and persons holding money, funds, etc., are bonded and in what amounts?" S. A. Peeler and N. J. Pass, one thousand dollars each.

On motion of H. L. Ashe, a committee was appointed to audit accounts. They were named by the District Superintendents, one

from each district. The following were named: G. H. Caldwell, Chairman; W. E. Hairston, W. J. Cameron, Prof. A. B. Reynolds, and G. M. McMurry.

R. W. Winchester read from the minutes the statement concerning Mrs. P. J. Cook and presented bill for funeral expenses.

R. W. Winchester moved that the Secretary of the Board of Stewards, W. J. Camerson, request the Board to turn over all money accumulated from widows' allowance, on the funeral expenses. The motion prevailed.

Question 25 was called, "Who have been received by transfer?" W. O. Thomas from the Central Alabama Conference.

On motion of R. W. Winchester, the relation of D. A. Hill was changed from the retired to the effective relation.

Question 28 was called, "Who have been admitted on trial. (a) In studies of the first year?" Samuel L. Townsend was admitted on three-fourths vote of the Conference.

Question 29 was called, "Who have been continued on trial? In studies of the second year?" S. P. Holland and O. W. Burwick.

Question 32 was called, "What members are in studies of third year?" J. J. Patterson.

Question 33 was called, "What members are in studies of the fourth year?" B. W. Stewart.

Question 34 was called, "What members have completed the studies of the fourth year. (a) Elected and ordained Elders this year?" John Q. Dula. (b) "Elected and ordained Elders previously?" Lemon Mayfield. (c) "Elected and ordained Elders under the Seminary Rule?" Plenny W. Jinkins, Geo. H. McMurray.

Question 37, "Who have been left without appointment to attend school?" P. A. Taylor.

Question 39, "Who are the Accepted Supply Pastors?" See list.

Question 43, "Who have had their Conference membership terminated?" None.

Question 44, "Who are the Supernumerary ministers?" None.

Question 45, "Who are the Retired ministers?" J. J. Blanton, G. W. Byers, S. B. Cornelius, J. R. McNair, Dorsey McRae, Marcus Munday, A. E. Robinson, R. J. Ship, B. F. Thomas, E. I. S. Swann.

On motion of R. N. Brooks, the above named were continued in the retired relation.

Question 27 was called, "What ministers coming on credentials

from other Evangelical Churches are received?" The orders of Walter G. Hamilton were recognized from the Presbyterian Church. Motion prevailed that he be used as a Supply Pastor.

The orders of John J. Patterson were recognized from the A. M. E. Z. Church. He was admitted into full membership and placed in the studies of the third year.

Dr. Geo. M. Bell, of the Wyoming Conference, was presented and delivered a most inspiring address.

The order of the day was called, and the Conference proceeded with the Roll Call for Bennett College. The total of cash and food reported through the year was \$1,656.47.

The following visitors were presented: Dr. A. R. Howard, representing the Board of Temperance, South Carolina Conference; W. J. King, President of Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Ga.; Rev. L. W. Hedrick, East Tennessee Conference; Rev. N. T. Bowen, South Carolina Conference; and Dr. Charles L. Calkins, representing the Board of Pensions. Dr. Calkins presented a check from the Chartered Fund of \$50.00.

The Conference Lay Leader, Prof. C. A. Barrett, was presented and he, in turn, presented Bishop Shaw for an inspirational address to the laymen.

Rev. L. W. Hedrick, of the East Tennessee Conference, was presented and made a brief statement, and gave invitation to the Conference to send youth representatives to a Youth Conference to be held in Tennessee.

R. W. Winchester called attention to the Bennett College food and cash rally. Motion prevailed that this be had the Tuesday after Thanksgiving, December 3.

The Laurinburg Institute presented their chorus in the singing of two numbers to the delight of the Conference.

### FRIDAY AFTERNOON, NOVEMBER 8

Devotions were led by Rev. R. F. McCallum.

The Bishop called the Conference to order.

Question 42, "What ministerial members have died during the year?" H. O. Fredrick, A. B. McQueen, G. W. Morehead, R. T. Weatherby.

The motion of R. W. Winchester to extend the meeting time of the Conference was defeated by a vote of 47 against 44.

Motion by R. W. Winchester prevailed that we hold a Youth Conference beginning Saturday afternoon and closing Saturday night of the Annual Conference week. Amendment of H. L. Ashe was accepted that a Ways and Means Committee be appointed. The District Superintendents and Youth Committee were appointed.

Motion prevailed that all money collected for the sale of Minutes by the District Superintendents be turned over to the Secretary and that the Publishing Committee be responsible for the publication and distribution of the Minutes at the earliest possible date.

Question 22 was called, "Where shall the next session of the Annual Conference be held?" Mt. Pleasant, Winston-Salem, was unanimously chosen.

Dr. W. J. King, President of Gammon Theological Seminary, was presented and spoke.

The time having arrived for the anniversary of the Christian Advocate, Central Edition, Dr. R. N. Brooks, Editor, was called to the platform and expressed his gratitude for the enthusiastic support given him for the past quadrennium and, with complimentary words, presented the former Editor, Bishop A. P. Shaw, who ably represented the interests of the paper.

Motion of H. L. Ashe prevailed that before leaving the Conference, we roll up a subscription list equal to and surpassing, if possible, all previous records.

Question 10 was called, and the report from the Nominating Committee was made, naming David D. Jones as Conference Lay Leader. He was elected.

Benediction by Dr. Geo. M. Bell.

### SATURDAY MORNING, NOVEMBER 9

Devotions were conducted by Rev. B. L. Burge.

Bishop Shaw called the Conference to order.

The Journal of the previous day was read and approved.

A motion by C. W. Perry prevailed that an Annual Conference budget, to be set up by the Committee on World Service and Finance for education, with certain percentage for each school, namely: Bennett College and Allen High School.

Motion of R. W. Winchester carried that the District Superintendent's salary be an amount equal to 15% of the pastor's cash salary.

Dr. R. N. Brooks was asked to preside by the Bishop.

A report of the Committee on Temperance was read by the Secretary of the Committee. On motion of R. W. Winchester, the report was adopted.

Dr. Brooks, presiding officer, presented Dr. W. J. King, President of Gammon Theological Seminary. Dr. King raised the question: How far can a Conference go in training its ministry? He asked that the Conference raise a scholarship fund to be applied on the training of men to work with in the Conference.

Rev. B. F. Gleaves was asked by the Bishop to lead in singing Hymn No. 1, after which Bishop Shaw delivered a very practical and helpful address. Following this, he pronounced the benediction.

The Commission on World Service and Finance made its report, which was adopted. (See report.)

Motion of R. N. Brooks prevailed that the Bonding Committee fix the amount of the Treasurer's bond.

Motion by R. N. Brooks prevailed that the Trustees be given power to act concerning all abandoned property according to their best judgment, and make an inventory report of all abandoned property at the next Annual Conference.

On motion, P. I. Wells was elected Statistician.

The Conference Standing Committee were read by G. M. Phelps and, on motion, were adopted.

Motion prevailed to pay to the Trustees \$277.50 out of World Service Funds.

Motion carried that the printed Journal become the official record of the Conference, and that we print 1200 copies.

Motion carried that the Superintendents, S. A. Peeler, G. H. Caldwell, N. J. Pass, and the Conference Secretary, J. E. Brower, form the Publishing Committee.

Samuel L. Townsend, after listening to a very practical talk by Bishop Shaw and answering the required questions, was received into full membership.

The officers of the Woman's Society of Christian Service were called around the altar while Bishop Shaw led in an impressive installation service. (See list of officers.)

There were 1640 charter members enrolled in the Society at the time of the Conference organization.

Bishop Shaw presented Miss Dorothy Phelps, Youth Leader of the Conference, who made a very impressive report, challenging "All Methodist Youth."

Bishop Shaw suggested that a School of Ministerial Training be conducted for the Baltimore, Washington, East Tennessee, and North Carolina Conference with suitable location.

Rev. R. W. Winchester moved that after the services Sunday morning, including the Ordination Service and the reading of the appointments, that the Conference stand adjourned, sine die. The motion prevailed.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by Rev. H. L. Ashe.

### SUNDAY MORNING

At 10:00 a. m. the Love Feast, conducted by Rev. B. F. Thomas and Rev. Henry McNair, was a feast of spiritual inspiration.

At 11:00 o'clock the service began by singing Hymn No. 1, followed by Hymn No. 209 and the Apostles' Creed. Prayer was offered by Rev. H. L. Ashe, after which the choir sang, to the delight of the congregation, an anthem, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Lessons for the Ordination Service were read by the District Superintendents.

A collection of \$169.95 was given after a very timely appeal by Rev. R. W. Winchester.

I am persuaded that we have such an one in you, Bishop Shaw. Again we say, greetings to you! God bless you! Live forever!

This has been an eventful year for us in our church activities in the North Carolina Conference.

The spirit of unrest that dominates the civilized world has been manifested in our ranks. Between 20 and 30 changes have been made since the appointments were read in Raleigh at the last Conference by Bishop Clair. Notwithstanding all this, we have striven hard to adjust ourselves to our changing environments and, under the stress and strain that has been forced upon us, we, the pastors and lay members of the Greensboro District, have carried on; and our reports will show that we have not utterly failed; but have made many advances. The passing of Dr. Weatherby, our key pastor, was a great shock and a seeming setback to our District. But we were able to carry on to the end.

Four cardinal points have been kept continuously before us as ideal goals to be attained. They are, first:

#### I. EVANGELISM

I am persuaded that the most serious indictment that is against us as Protestant Christians is our inconsistency in our method of evangelizing the world. Probably the most damaging is the fact that most of us have taught our children to become prodigal sinners, by both precept and example. Then, in after years, have endeavored to wrest them out of the clutches of Satan's strangulation grip, by some spasmodic, race horse stampeding, annual mass revivals.

We have not registered any objections to the mass method of evangelism, but have encouraged it. For in our present situation, both mass and individual methods are important requisites. But notwithstanding all, we have endeavored to show the supreme importance of saving the child instead of taking the risk of saving the man after his life is steeped and stained with sin.

Religious education through the family altar, the church school, and the whole program of family and church activities is the one thing most needed.

#### II. STEWARDSHIP

Stewardship of life, of personality and of possession have been emphasized always as the only realities and practicalities of real, genuine Christian living. "Stewards with Jesus" has been our watchword.



## III. FINANCE

We have put special stress on the importance of meeting our financial obligation in harmony with the rules of the financial plan of our church group. The results will be told by the reports of our pastors.

## IV. TEMPORAL IMPROVEMENTS

Much reproving and improving have been done by our faithful, hard-working pastors. I wish to make very special mention of the new church erected on the Northwest Greensboro Charge under the leadership of Brother J. W. Simpson.

A new church building has been erected on the National Park Drive. It has been stormsheeted, covered, sub-floored, and basement finished sufficiently for worship this year, with very little debt.

Brother W. E. Hairston asked to be granted a leave of absence for one year in order to give him an opportunity to do some special work; later he accepted the pastorate of the Caswell Charge. This charge is in the best condition of its history. All three churches on the charge have made considerable improvements. Many other pastors have made improvements too numerous to mention in detail.

## CONCLUSION

We have endeavored to give special attention to every phase of the activities of our church program. We have given more than 50 stereopticon lectures with slides representing our division of Visual Education.

And now as we come to the end of our first year of our superintendence of our new Methodism on the Greensboro District, Central Jurisdiction, I am hoping to be permitted to present this brief summary of some of our achievements and labors. If we are reappointed to serve another year, by His help we shall labor more abundantly to hasten the coming of the Kingdom of Heaven in this world.

We, on the Greensboro District, realize that new occasions now teach:

Time makes ancient good uncouth.  
 We must upward, still onward,  
 To keep abreast with truth;  
 Yonder before us gleam the campfires.  
 We ourselves will pilgrims be,  
 Launch our Mayflower and sail boldly  
 Into life's wintry seas.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, LAURINBURG DISTRICT

Dear Bishop Shaw and Brethren of the North Carolina Conference:

I come to the end of my first year's work as District Superintendent of the Laurinburg District, with emotions that are more or less mixed. Eighteen years ago, at the last Annual Conference held in this church, I stood before this sacred altar and by the late Bishop Luther B. Wilson was admitted on trial in the Annual Conference. After eighteen years I stand here this morning as Superintendent on behalf of the District to welcome you to the District, and to say how glad we are, Bishop Shaw, to have you as our Bishop to lead us through this quadrennium. We stand ready and willing to follow your lead.

During the year I have felt the keen joy of trying to work for the Master, but there has come to me many times a depressing sense of my own unworthiness to meet the stress and strain of the day in which we live. When I think of the possibilities of the church, and the good that might have been accomplished in the lives of the people, and the small results that we have had in the face of our opportunities, I am faced with a sense of our inadequacy. I believe I stand shoulder to shoulder with the men of the District in this confusion of mind and confession of failure. We are conscious that in our own strength we are defeated for we fight against the powers of darkness but we rejoice in the thought that God will give us power from on high.

Going over the District in a faithful effort to do the work of a Superintendent, I have been conscious of the presence of God in my effort to carry on. I am happy, Bishop, that I have led the forces of Christ this year on the District. While there may be some who have not had a sweetening success in a material way, I have seen many manifestations of the spirit of the Christ in the lives of the ministers and to my mind Disciples never lived closer to their Lord than has been evidenced by patient consecration and devotion by some of the pastors and their wives. This devotion to Christianity has been matched by consecrated laymen who have been willing to serve in the interest of the Master's kingdom. Had our consecration been more perfect and our faith been more adventitious(?), the record of our achievement would have been greater. Our need is for a greater concern in saving the souls of the people.

This year has been a busy one, filled with perplexing problems and trying situations. The other District Superintendents have received me graciously, and have been willing to help me carry on in many tight places.

The Laurinburg District lays no claims to unusual achievements but has tried to maintain the high average of spiritual and material endeavors. The Laurinburg District reaches from Charlotte to Wilmington, a distance of 200 miles, and has 17 pastoral charges and 34 churches. Were I to point out the greatest need of the District, I would say it is better church buildings. I firmly believe that in this day of modern homes and schools we must have better church buildings if we are to thold our young people to the church. It is remarkable how some of the people have accomplished what they have under the conditions they have had to work. I have urged upon the pastors to beautify their churches and make them more attractive, and some of them have caught the spirit and this beautiful edifice in which we hold this session of our Conference has been paid out of debt and beautified by the sacrificial service of the pastor, Rev. W. M. Wells.

The beautiful church at Lumberton which was burned shortly after completion, without insurance, was repaired by Rev. W. J. Cameron and has been

cleared of all indebtedness. Several other churches have done some minor improvements and reduced their debts; some have been led by energetic pastors whose service has been just as sacrificial, but time will not allow me to mention them one by one. It is remarkable that they have been able to carry on as they have with so small support as the average minister receives. I am wondering if any other class of workers could carry on under the conditions the minister has to face. I am convinced that something must be done to awaken the laymen to their responsibility. We are looking forward to a more active organization of laymen in our district as a means of increasing their interest and activity in promoting the work of the District and the Conference. At the same time, among the ministers, there are those who follow the line of least resistance, satisfied to ring the bell on Sunday and wait until afternoon for the people to gather, and show no interest in the affairs of the community except their Sunday service; where, as leaders of the community, they must become interested in whatever may be the problems of the community and show them the Christian way out.

### CHANGE IN APPOINTMENTS

Upon coming to the District there were many changes that, of necessity, had to be made. It was found that the number of appointments that had to be adjusted outnumbered the available men, and Bishop Clair transferred the Rev. W. O. Thomas from the Central Alabama Conference and placed him at Johns and Salem. He came to his work the fourth Sunday in February and has been on the job and brings to this Conference a fine report. He has found a warm welcome on his return home.

Our District meetings have been profitable and inspiring and largely attended. Maxton was the scene of our group meeting which was called shortly after the close of the Conference. Quite a large group was there and we discussed every phase of the church work and laid plans to carry on during the year. Brother Gannaway and his good people gave us a fine entertainment.

The first of June a large number of young people, accompanied by their pastors, wended their way to the beautiful little city of Fayetteville, N. C., to attend the Young People's Institute. Rev. W. J. Cameron, the Dean, and a group of the finest trained young people to be found anywhere, led them in a fine leadership training study. We are planning larger activities among the youth of the District. I do not think that any finer group of young people ever stood at the door of the church than the young men and women with whom we are trying to build the church of tomorrow. In our contact with youth we are constantly trying to sound a new and deeper note. For if youth is to make its contribution and be the leaders of the church of tomorrow it must become Christ-conscious, and the Christ of Calvary must become the ideal of youth. As some one has put it: Youth has not done everything that it has been told to do, neither has youth done all it has been accused of doing. To this fine group Rev. J. L. Alford and the good people of Fayetteville proved themselves great entertainers in taking care of our needs.

July 24 our District Conference met at the beautiful Cool Spring Church on the Laurinburg Charge. Each session was inspiring and helpful and the presence of many visitors, who came with helpful messages, added to a great District Conference. The entertainment given by the Rev. W. M. Wells and the good people was all that could be expected.

Using the phrase of Bishop MacIntyre, the great Methodist eagle is sweeping over the world, born aloft upon these two wings, Evangelism and Education. In almost every charge a revival effort has been held, and no doubt some good

has been accomplished, but Christianity will never move forward as it should as long as all of our evangelistic effort is put into one week of revival meeting each year. There are congregations who lay claim to one certain week in each year and they argue to you that the Lord doesn't bless them on any other week. Like the lame man that sat at the pool, they believe that at this certain season the water is troubled and, unless they step in at that time, they miss their opportunity for twelve months. If a sinner can get by through that week, he can sit comfortably in almost any part of some of our churches without being disturbed for the next twelve months. When the minister makes each service an evangelistic service, then, and not until then, will this well worn custom and erroneous idea of the people, be broken down.

I don't know when, if ever, there were more of our young people entering college than at the present time. For the young women who seek the finer things of a college education, Bennett College is still the choice. Bennett College is still the pride of the North Carolina Conference as well as the general Church. We rejoice in its progress and have urged upon the ministers to give whole-hearted support. There are evidences that the giving for Bennett at this Conference, though far below what it should be, will surpass the giving of previous years.

One church in the District—Philadelphia Church in Richmond County—was wrecked by windstorm some time in the early summer and, through the help of the Board of Home Missions, there is in the process of being erected a very nice church at this, one of our best rural centers.

Death has dealt generally with us this year in regards to the number of those who have been called away. The ranks of our active ministry are unbroken, but one of our retired ministers, living in the District, Rev. A. B. McQueen, was stricken on Easter Saturday morning, and March 26 the gates to the Eternal City opened, and a tired heart stopped beating and a wearied soul went home to rest.

Two other retired ministers are living in the District, Rev. M. Mundy, at Maxton, and Rev. J. R. McNair, at Red Springs. These two fathers of the ministry are regular attendants at their respective churches, and always bring inspiration to their pastors, and in their lives the words of the Lord are realized. "At evening time it shall be light." For though they are in the evening of life they carry a ray of Sunlight to those who come in contact with them.

If joy is found in serving the Master and the church anywhere, it certainly is in our women's societies. They have been the backbone of our church work for a long time, and if, at any time, there is a decrease in their work, you can still read behind their report in letters and plain sacrifice.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service has been organized with several change, and we go from this Conference with a determination to see to it that there is one in every charge.

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

We have kept before the ministers and the people the financial obligation of the church, and we have had fine response. I cannot say at this time just how the report for World Service will compare with the reports of previous years, but I am quite sure the other reports are in advance of last year, thus giving us an increase in our giving for all causes of the church. There are times when it seems that the financial interest of the church outweigh the spiritual and we find ourselves putting it first; that is not as it should be. When we observe how sacrificial so many of our members are in their giving, we hear again the voice of the Master in the lovely loyalty of the church: "I have ten thousand souls who have not bowed their knee to the image of Baal. Out of a little, they give

much." We sing so beautifully, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord," but the singing is not so beautiful as the actual rallying of men and women that the church might continue. It is this spirit which enables me to report an increase in our giving this year. The challenge to move forward has been heard by the loyal hearts of the church.

We have held every Quarterly Conference this year and have visited every charge four times, and every church from three to four times. I have tried to make my visits helpful, and hope to make our Quarterly Conference the kind that people will want to attend. We lay no claim to perfection. We have doubtless made some mistakes but they were of the head and not the heart. This report, as most reports do, has dealt feebly with the least important items of our work. Who can record the influence of the churches in the city, the town, and in the country side. The church hungers for spiritualities. The need of the preacher is passion. The gift of God is power. We are praying that we may come a little nearer to this center the coming year.

I have never been more convinced than I am today of the need of the Christian church with its unique function of creating social and spiritual ideals, and cultivating personal religious experience. The ferment of the gospel meditated by men whose souls are on fire is the only hope for mankind. There is a great danger that some of us in our enthusiasm for the social emphasis may lose the true emphasis for which Methodism stands, without which we have no gospel that shall be sufficient for such a day as ours. When Mr. Richard B. Harrison, the famous Negro actor in "The Green Pastures," was stricken, he is reported to have said to Mr. Charles Wood, his understudy, these words: "Hold me up, Charlie. The world needs this play!" With equal conviction we can declare: The world needs this Gospel! For it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth. The world needs the church! For multitudes still depend upon it for faith and for training in the way of a higher life and a nobler service on behalf of all mankind.

Permit me in closing, Bishop, to express profound appreciation of the many kindnesses of churches and laymen, and especially the preachers with whom I have been privileged to labor. It is truly a great brotherhood.

May I close this, my first report of the Laurinburg District, with the words of Mr. Henry Coyle:

Before God's footstool to confess

A poor soul knelt and bowed his head.

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## REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, WINSTON DISTRICT

This has been an eventful year. Two General Conferences have claimed much of our time, attention and money.

We have given ourselves largely to the study of the new church with its increased and revamped program. Our goal has been to do more and know more and it is to this end we are dedicating our powers. We have not reached the goals toward which we are striving.

Every interest of the church has had full consideration and, notwithstanding what seemed to be a financial depression, the pastors' reports will show that World Service is at least holding its own. Bennett College is still claiming its rightful place in our thinking and actions. We never forget to give our unstinted support to that great institution. We are proud of the school, its accomplishments, and its great President, and will ever stand by it.

Our church paper is still an important factor in our church life. Its gifted Editor, Dr. Robert Brooks, is giving us a paper that is both informational and inspirational, both of which are needed now. I hope that the quota for each charge will be 100%.

The evangelistic program has been stressed. Most churches have held revivals with results that are by no means satisfactory. The increase in membership is too meager. We are hoping and praying for renewed and increased effort in Evangelism. The new program means just that and we should adjust ourselves to it. We feel forcibly the call for advance along all lines and must answer the call with a leadership true and tried. It is a dark day but faith points to a brighter tomorrow. It will come.

The church has raised the educational standard for the ministry to meet the needs of this hour, but the support is so inadequate that it is hard to get the finer type of young men to give themselves to the cause. We must appeal to our strong laymen to come to our rescue and give better salaries to those who are called to carry the Gospel to a lost world.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, WESTERN DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw, Fellow Members of the North Carolina Annual Conference, and Friends:

Bishop Shaw, I am both pleased and highly honored today to welcome you, as our resident Bishop. I welcome you on behalf of twenty-five or more ministers, and more than three thousand members comprising the Western District.

I count it also a rare privilege to make a report as District Superintendent in one of the most interesting years of our entire church life. As a result of unification we have had responsibilities beyond that of any other year, and yet we have gone forth looking upon it all as but another opportunity to do bigger and better service.

You are not expecting me to make a detailed report of my District. I shall, therefore, mention some of the outstanding things which have served as a means of injecting new life into practically every phase of our District work.

Our first task, after the Annual Conference, was an effort for Bennett College. To raise the desired amount we have asked each pastor to raise an amount equal to twenty-five cents for each member. This plan has made it easier for us to

do what we have done for the college, and is destined to rally the support of the entire District to the school.

Be it understood that the Western District is also looking forward to the day when Allen Home will be given a larger place in our Conference program. Hearty support has been given the women in closing out the Woman's Home Missionary Society and organizing the Woman's Society of Christian Service. We believe that the day has come when a pastor can no longer count himself a successful pastor who isn't able to pilot this new organization in his particular charge.

We have tried and raised, in most instances, the amounts that have been asked of us to raise to help finance the different causes made possible as a result of unification.

Most of us have made great sacrifices to attend the several meetings and to secure some of the literature announcing the new program of our church. We hail with delight and pledge our allegiance to the new slogan of a great church, "Forward Together."

That the time has come when the church paper must go to every Methodist home is clear at least to every thoughtful leader. These changes in our church life will mean but little to a people that do not read. We believe that if the laity is ever to know the larger opportunity which is given him in the new church he must read the church paper.

We work, pray and look forward to the day when we can secure a liberal contribution from each member for benevolences, and thereby raise all our missionary money through gifts rather than through suppers and the like, thus making possible a larger number in each local church to receive blessings as givers.

We sometimes feel that our efforts in evangelism have been so poor until they scarcely deserve mentioning—in Quarterly Conference after Quarterly Conference—to the question, how many conversions? We have received the answer, Not any. I hope that the evangelistic passion has not been lost. We do come, however, to this mount of privilege, seeking fellowship with our wise and consecrated leader (Bishop Shaw), who comes to us at a time when he is rich in experience, vigorous in both body and soul.

We come, therefore, to renew our allegiance to such leadership, and to work for a brighter and better day. We join the women of our church in their new slogan, "Up, This Is the Day."

## Historical View

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conferences. In the year 1836, the General Conference set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned, there were two Conferences.

Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the Conference of December 4, 1844, there were 19,495 white members and 3,190 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some of the colored members entered the A. M. E. Church, some the Colored M. E. Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church as it returned to the State after the Civil War.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and in 1865, when at the close of the War, the M. E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference.

From the North Carolina Conference, the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.
