THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 a.m. and open with devotional exercises, and close at 12:30 p.m.

 The Memorial Services shall be held the first morning of the Conference immediately following the Communion Service and shall include the calling of the roll of the honored dead.

3. The nominating committee consisting of flve persons shall be appointed by the Bishop quadrennially.

4. No person shall be a member, concurrently, of more than two standing committees or commissions (except as provided for by the Discipline).

5. The Conference fiscal year shall end 20 days before the first day of the Annual Conference.

6. The pastors' reports shall be in the hands of the treasurer and statistician 15 days before the opening day of the Annual Conference.

7. The reports of all major commissions and committees shall be mimeographed and passed out at the seat of the Conference on or before the day the report is read.

8. The roll of Conference lay members shall be called at the opening day of the Conference.

9. The Treasurer's report shall be mimeographed and passed out at the meeting of the Conference.

10. The minutes of the Annual Conference shall be printed and distributed within 90 days after adjournment of the Conference.

11. All recommendations and memorials shall be presented to the Conference in duplicate form.

12. All motions from the floor shall be in writing when requested by the secretary of the Conference.

13. The program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a committee composed of the host pastor, the host district superintendent, the Conference lay leader, and two persons at large named by the nominating committee, in consultantation with the Bishop.

14. When a member wishes to speak he must arise and address the chair and shall not proceed until he is properly recognized by the presiding officer.

15. No member shall speak on any question more than once until all who wish to do so have spoken, nor shall a member speak more than ten minutes except by permission of the Conference.

16. Motions made and seconded, reports made and accepted are to be deemed the property of the Conference and cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the Conference.

17. All motions to lay on the table, to take from the table, shall be taken without debate, but the one who offers a formal motion or resolution shall have five minutes to close debate and this right shall not be forfeited by a motion ordering the previous question or to lay on the table.

18. All questions of privilege shall be decided by the president.

19. No member of the Conference shall be recognized who is outside the boundary of the Conference.

20. The following motions may take precedence of the original motion or precedence of each other in the order given here: (a) to adjourn to a given time; (b) to adjourn indefinitely; (c) to take up the order of the day; (d) to lay on the table; (e) to move up the order of the day; (f) to postpone to a given time; (g) to refer to a committee; (h) to amend; (i) to postpone indefinitely.

21. Any person voting with the majority may move a reconsideration, but such motion shall not be debatable.

22. The yeas and nays may be taken on any motion on the call of onethird of the members present.

23. These rules may be suspended by a two-third vote of the Conference.

24. These rules may be amended at any regular session of the Conference by a two-third vote, provided such amendments be presented in writing at least one day before action is taken.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

WINSTON DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Pastors, Members and Friends of the North Carolina Annual Conference, it is with a deep sense of gratitude to God, our Heavenly Father for his sustaining grace that permits me to stand before you, to make this my sixth and final report as District Superintendent of the Winston District. I count this a real honor and a very great privilege given me to serve in this capacity. I feel that the district has grown in the knowledge and wisdom of the church and that Gods' purpose and plan have been manifested in our work, as for me, your humble servant, I've been made strong in the faith; my vision is broader and my determination has been made strong therefore; my Christian Comrades; I retire from this position at this conference, a better worker, a better runner than I was six years ago. Yes, we as members of this Winston District can truly say, that God has blessed us and crowned our efforts with much success through each of these years.

It has been our custom and purpose at this point of our report, to pay special tribute to our many pastors, their wives and a great host of consecrated laymen and friends of the district for their most cooperative service and contributions to the work of the great church. Many thanks to you our worthy friends.

DISTRICT PROMOTION

It has been our opportunity and privilege to help promote two of the General Church Quadrennial; Programs. First, The Advance for Christ and His Church in the last quadrennial; and now the Local Church Emphasis and the Higher Education Emphasis for this quadrennial. Every charge of the district is studing the program materials of the Local Church Emphasis. Thus, we have twenty-two hundred and ninety-five booklets in the hands of the commissions members and several other members of the church. Accordingly, cur churches are setting goals that will require much improvement in every phase of its life.

DISTRICT EVANGELISM

We have encouraged the evangelistic program of the church, by cooperating with the General Board of Evangelism. Under the leadership of Dr. D. W. Lester we were able to have an Evangelistic Coaching Conference and secure men from the General Board known as the Seventy Evangelist during the summer session of our work. As the results of the promotion of this evangelistic program; we are reporting that most of our churches have experienced a substantial increase in membership.

BUILDING AND IMPROVEMENTS

Several churches of the district have either built new buildings or remodeled their old buildings until today, we have only three churches that may be termed in poor condition. All others are in good or at least fair condition. During this period we have built five new churches. Two on the Elkins-Jonesville Charge, one at East Thomasville, one at Red Bank on the Oak Grove Charge, and one at Walnut Cove. Two new parsonages, one at Asheboro and one at Elkin. Outstanding remodeling jobs have been done at St. John in Thomasville, two on the Madison Charge, Hayes and Withers Chapel, St. Stephens at Lexington, Mt. Pleasant, St. Mark and St. Andrews as you have seen. Our Jones Temple Church is now debt free as soon as the necessary papers can be processed with the Board of Missions. Our Brooks Memorial Church has reduced its indebtness to only about seven thousand dollars, and our Sts. Home Church indebtness is reduced to about eleven thousand dollars. In all of our building and remodeling program our churches have taken care of their obligations both local and benevolence in a way that is really remarkable.

FINANCIAL STATUS

Our financial success has been progressive and encouraging as our reports will show. Six years ago our district raised for World Service just a little more than two thousand dollars. This year it will report nearly four thousand dollars for World Service. Six years ago we reported a little better than seven hundred and fifty dollars for Pension. This year we will report nearly five thousand dollars for Pension. We have advocated in every charge a better support for our ministry. Thus most of our charges have had outstanding increases in pastor's salary. Brooks Memorial, Elkin-Jonesville Charge, Lexington-Midway, Asheboro, and St. John have all increased their pastor's salary by one thousand dollars or more. Several others have increased by two hundred to nine hundred dollars per charge during this same year.

CONFERENCES WORKSHOPS AND INSTITUTES

During cur tenure on the district we held several workshops of Choirs, conducted by Dr. D. L. Rideout, we held also under the leadership of Dr. Rideout a Sub-District workshop of the organization of the Local Church in Methodism. Temperance workshops were conducted with much success by Brother W. S. McLeod, our Conference Chairman of Temperance. Many District and Sub-District Youth Institutes and Rallies were conducted by Brother Brooks our District Director of Youth Work. Thus the work of youth in the district is at an all-time high.

I cannot close this report without giving due credit to the Ministers' wives of the district and Laymen of the district for their support given these six years. The christian spirit the fellowship of working together have lifted the spiritual standard of the district and have been united in one great fellowship of love. Therefore we join in with the hymn writer and say: "Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in christian love. The fellowship of kindred mind, is like to that above."

Now in conclusion, Bishop Love, we are so very happy to express our deepest and most sincere gratitude to you for your kindness and brotherly love. May God's richest blessings forever shine upon you and your family. Many thanks to you, our priestly ministers, and to our devoted laity for your excellent support.

GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Brother Ministers, Members of the Annual Conference, and Friends:

I am glad to report for another year in which we have witnessed the constant guidance and protection of the Holy Spirit.

The Ministers' families of the Greensboro District have passed through the year with only two or three families having any severe sickness. The Reverend J. H. Ledwell is still ill, with slight hopes of recovery. The Reverend R. W. Winchester, who is in the midst of a building program, was out for a while because of sickness, but possessed by a love for the cause and the ever presence of God, he has regained sufficient strength to continue to go forward.

Though it will be evident in the reports coming in from the Greensboro District, I must give credit where credit is due, and join the Ministers in saying that the reports are the results of the combined efforts of the more than three thousand Ministers and members of the Greensboro District. I am sure they would have me say further, that while we have not reached our goal, we have ever been mindful of the leadership of Him in whom we live, and move, and have our being.

Immediately after the Annual Conference last June, information began pouring in, and on through last winter we had the privilege of attending meetings which sought to inform us and secure our aid in furnishing leadership for each local church. We have been made to know that the quadrennial emphasis on the local church is something practical and workable in each local church, regardless if its size. Wherever the plan is accepted and given a fair trial, success will be experienced in every area of church life. It is a movement that reaches the mass through its mastery of each individual.

In conducting the "Self Study" (and this was done on each charge), in many places results were witnessed which were before unthough of. One is grieved, however, to find a few who will not read, nor take the advantage of the other sources of information which the church offers. I do not know of a time in the history of the church when so much has been done to prepare and secure the aid of each individual.

I attended the church-wide meeting of Bishops, District Superintendents and other church leaders who were called to Chicago in February and then a follow-up Area meeting called by our Bishop. I think one is safe in saying that the District Superintendents of the Baltimore Area are one in their determination to follow on as cur Bishop leads the way under Divine guidance.

GROWTH IN MEMBERSHIP

In many places on the Greensboro District, there has been an increase In membership, It is needless to say that wherever there is a growth in membership, there has been, also, a similar Spiritual growth. Reports from the following ministers—Reverends Douglas Moore, Durham; J. W. Gwynn, Oxford; C. C. Armstrong, Browning Chapel; and W. S. Berry, Newport News—have had probably the largest increase in membership. The major district-wide effort, however, has been to bring back in line the careless and indifferent members. Those who have had success in recreating interest in their indifferent members are the ones who have given time and effort to setting up the recommended organizations in the local church. It is here that Reverends W. T. Brown, J. E. Brower, J. D. Ashford, F. D. Morehead, I. C. Spinks, G. H. Caldwell, J. H. Minor, Eugene Black and W. L. Napper have done their greatest work.

BUILDING AND REMODELING

Any rightful consideration of building, will necessitate a look at the past six years. In this, many cf the ministers have surprised their own record. When I came to the district six years ago, Reverend W. E. Hairston was leading in the completion of Union Memorial Church, Greensboro, at a cost of around sixty thousand dollars; and he is now building on the foundation laid at Wesley Chapel, Reidsville, by the Reverend I. A. Friend, a church which will cost around thirty thousand dollars. Reverend W. N. Johnson, taking up where Reverend J. H. Minor left off, completed the church at Zicn's Hill and renovated the church at Saint James. Reverend T. C. Tarpley renovated the church at Saint James. Reverend T. C. Tarpley renovated the church at Saint James. Reverend T. C. Tarpley renovated the church at Shady Grove, built a church at Randleman, and is now renovating Cox Chapel. Reverend J. W. Gwynn, in connection with taking care of the debt of nine thousand dollars which he found at Oxford, has built a parsonage which compares favorably with anything we have in the conference. Reverend C. A. Barrett and R. C. Sharpe share almost equally in the erection of a twenty thousand dollar church built at Durham. Reverend R. M. Martin, called in during the year to take charge of a church for the first time, built and completed a church at a cost of around twelve thousand dollars which he found at New Goshen. Reverend F. D. Caldwell has built an annex at Mount Carmel, and has paid off a debt of fourteen hundred dollars which he found at New Goshen. Reverend F. D. Caldwell has built an annex at Mount Carmel, and cleared the debt at Warren Street. Reverend C. L. Gidney, having his church almost completely wrecked by a storm, has been successful in replacing it at a cost of a little more than twenty-two thousand dollars. Reverend R. W. Winchester, at a time in his life when most folk give up. has done probably the most spectacular thing of a lifetime: he has, within the past four years, with a membership of less than one hundred, completed a church at a cost of more than sixteen thousand dollars. Reverends J. W. Shuford, Beverly Brown and W. T. Lomax have busied themselves in taking care of debts which they inherited.

It is to the credit of the district that three lots are being secured on East Lee Street in Greensbboro, for a new church site and new congregation. Reverend Carter, employed by our Area to make surveys, has made the survey for this new project. His report will give a detailed description of the work being done.

I have tried in every way to make the proper use of the district staff. We are, therefore, indebted to the staff for much of the success we have had on the district. Mr. C. M. Winchester with his associate leaders— Mr. David Morchead and Mr. Arthur Crump—have given their usual support to the total program. Prof. V. J. Caveness, Director of Stewardship, Mrs. Dorothy Jones, President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service—can be counted upon to play well their part at all times.

SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

Bennett College, Allen School and Gammon Theological Seminary, will probably receive greater support than at any time. The growing influence which these schools have on the conference, together with the emphasis on higher education, will do much to assist in reaching the dollar mark per member. The Wesley Foundation set up by Reverends W. T. Brown at A. and T. College and Douglas Moore at Durham, must come in next year for support by the conference. To date, we have done nothing in this, but I am sure you agree with me—the time is at hand for us to act.

Bishop Love, striving with the other District Superintendents of the North Carolina Conference to follow your leadership as you have blazed the way, and having had the unstinted support of the ministers and laymen of the Greensboro District, I have enjoyed some of the happiest—and I trust most fruitful—years of my ministry. Now, in that I come to the end of my time on the district, I shall go gladly and willingly wherever I am placed, with a determination and a prayer in my scul to give of my best, and seek His guidance in the whole of my life.

Mrs. Phelps has joined with me in every way possible to serve during our term on the district. We are, therefore, one in our expression of thanks and gratefulness for the privilege which has been ours to enjoy your fellowship as we have endeavored to share with each other His blessings so richly bestowed upon us. It will be ours now to join you in another capacity, as we shall be privileged to continue the work of Kingdom building.

LAURINBURG DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Members and Friends, we humbly present our third Annual Report to the 99th Session of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church.

In our sick and tottering civilization where the cld social order is dying and the new social order is struggling to be born, there are both death and birth pains in evidence on many fronts. Our individual and group salvation must be based on three things: (1) Strengthening a vital faith in God through prayer and Bible reading, worship and Christian Education in the home and in the Church and practical Evangelism.

(2) Searching for truth to make us free—Jesus said, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free."

(3) Establishing a steadfast faith in God that will enable us to live the abundant life sustaining the right relationship with all mankind through love to Christ and our neighbors. We must love our way into the hearts of all who need us and to those we are priviledged to meet and serve as all men need our Saviour.

The spiritual insight and motivation which comes from God through Jesus Christ our Lord, will undergird and fortify us for living and serving in times like these. Our hearts must be full of radiant and profound gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His providential care and achievements of the people of twenty-two pastoral charges on the Laurinburg District. The Lord has wonderfully blessed us this year with bcuntiful crops, and there is and has been work for those who wanted it. During the conference year, for the most part, the people have good crops started again this year. The outlook is very promising. The seasons thus far have been excellent for the crops.

Sickness and death have not visited our immediate ranks, yet, it has visited the homes of two of our pastors, through the demise of the motherin-law of the Reverend J. L. Alfred and of the adopted daughter of the Reverend John McEachin.

The major activities of the Laurinburg District may be summarized under the following headings:

EVANGELISM

Believing that Salvation is the greatest human need and that the primary task of the Christian Church is redemptive and evangelistic, we have given evangelism priority in our District program. Therefore, we ordered for the churches on the district 302 Local Church Emphasis Booklets No. 1, A Better Record in Evangelism for our Church in Evangelism. We have further arranged for Dr. D. W. Lester to hold a coaching conference June 18th in order that our men will get some added help in techniques that may help them in aiding men and women to enter that richer experience in Christian Fellowship.

MISSIONARY ACTIVITIES

We have endeavored to develop the missionary spirit more fully to spread missionary information and to acquaint the churches with the causes, plans, literature, and the programs of the Board of Missions. The study books on the district are those recommended by the department. We have urged the commission on missions in the local churches to develop the missionary spirit and help to promote the Kingdom of God throughout the world by enlisting the active support of every member of the church in a study of the needs of the world in definite missionary service, and in regular contributions to the causes of missions and church extension. Despite some economic reverses, storms, hurricanes, and droughts, the God fearing and God loving men and women have nurtured a faith that will not shrink, though pressed by many a foe and they have gone steadily forward these three years. Our district has given larger support to the benevolent program of the Methodist Church this year. We have set as our goal for another year to reach by paying in full the World Service and Conference Benevolences. For this goal to become a reality on the District, we earnestly solicit your prayers.

EDUCATION

Advances have been made in the area of Christian Education. In addition to the District Youth Rally and Leadership School, workshops and one day meetings have been held at different times that have proved themselves to be very helpful. There was also placed into the local churches on the District, 1510 Local Church Emphasis Booklets, and at least one session of two hours of study and organization has been conducted in every church (but two) on the District by the Superintendent with no business exclusive of Christian Education. The interest was high to the end that many of the churches have asked for a second session in their church as they have not seen the interest and enthusism so high in many a-day, especially with the older people of the membership. They are desirous to study and learn the program of the church. It is evident that Christian Education has put strength into the muscles of our District. We are urging our ministers to teach with clarity, persuasiveness, and with power, and to make Christian Education a continuous process in the experiance of all persons. It is our plan to register at-least 150 young people in the District Leadership School in Laurinburg High School again this year, as we used that building last year with Reverend G. E. Hogue as the host pastor, and Mrs. L. B. Thompson as Dean of the school. It is our plan to have at least 30 in the Youth Assembly at Bennett College, July 1 to 5th. We are grateful for the splendid workshop on Alcohol directed by Reverend W. S. McLecd and the Reverend J. F. Sawyer as the district director. This was a most successful effort.

It was my great experience to witness one of the richest sessions on Christian Education at Mt. Olive Church in Lumberton May 26th. It was most revealing what God is doing with consecreated men, women, and young people. Some of the churches have very efficient commissions of education at work in their local churches and communities. We are hopeful that others will do likewise, realizing that one needs to know if they are to do.

FINANCE

We have labored to organize and activate the commission on finance and in every local church. With a commission on Christian Stewardship and Finance in every church, it ought to make systematic giving a regular practice and enable us to raise our claims with a greater degree of accuracy.

LOCAL CONCERNS

Some of the conditions under which some of our peeple are living and laboring are quile deplorable and especially the tenant farmers. Many of them are living on their next year's crops before Christmas. This will have to be handled with particular care and skill and a study is being made of some cases where we feel that we can get reliable help and information. At present I have no recommendations to make in this field and this mention is just to let you know that the church is concerned with the whole man, and when we are sure of our course, we will do something about it. We pray earnestly that our ministers will seek every opportunity to improve the economic conditions of our people. We should present to the local ministerial association or alliances the request to interceed through the improvement societies and Chamber of Commerce to give our young men and young women clerk jobs in the stores as we must become integrated in all phases of life before we can take our rightful places in this the greatest land of opportunity.

OPPORTUNITY FOR NEW CHURCHES

We do not have a church in the following towns—Kinston, Greenville, Jacksonville, Elizabethtown, Wadesboro, Wilson, Rocky Mount. All of these are good towns within the Laurinburg District, except Rocky Mount, which is just outside of our district.

Needs for New Churches where there are churches—Fayetteville, Laurinburg, Beaver Dam and Maxton. None of these congregation are able of themselves to build without the help of the Conference. I shall just speak on three emergency situations. First—Fayetteville. Certainly it is an old congregation and yet, the church is in a military area which is the fastest growing town in the state; with between 50,000 and 75,000 service men and their families. This has created an emergency for our church. The Methodist of the S. E. J. recognize this fact and in order that we may get a church, they are offering to raise and put into the building of that church \$60,000 to \$75,000 under one condition, that the General Board of National Missions will agree to a donation of \$5,000 and a loan of \$20,-000 for this project, if, and when the local white people raise the share of the money for a church to cost \$100,000 or more. The Conference Board of Missions are asked to use its influence with the General Board to this end. Galilee Church, Laurinburg, N. C., is in very bad condition and may fall-in even before we can raise the money with the help of our friends to build a new church.

Beaver Dam Church is in such a bad state of condition we will not be able to worship there this winter. I have sighted several pitiful conditions. Well, why don't you help yourself? You may ask. You will recall that for two years of the three years, drought in our section, the farmers did not make expenses-then the next two years, we had six devastiating hurricanes. Now, when our area was declared by the U. S. Government as a disaster area and the Federal Government sent into our area millions of dollars, the land owners got the money and the tenant farmers, who are our members, suffered like others and received no help. May I again call to your attention, in spite of the facts stated with reference to the drought and hurricanes with death and destruction, our loyal people, God bless them for the sturdy Christian fortitude, they are showing an increase, each year in their benevolent giving. With some incouragement, I believe within the next three years we will equal any district in the conference. As an emergency measure, I am asking you, Bishop Love, and the members of the conference to do what you can to help us get a church in Fayetteville. I have talked at length and coming to the churches, since pasters and people have done so well, I do not feel it necessary to give a lengthy report on each church. I am deeply grateful to both pastors and people for your loyal support to the program of the Methodist Church.

CHURCHES

Charlotte: Simpson Memorial, C. E. Strickland, Pastor—This pastor and people are working together in a most harmonious way. They have purchased property at the cost of \$47,500 and will move to their new location for their first service next Sunday, June 16, 1957. This has been their best year in many, many years.

Fairmont: Walter Davis, Pastor—Brother Davis has done a good job in acquainting his people with the program of the church and brings the best report since I have been on the District.

Fayetteville: John Wesley—R. B. McRae, Pastor. This pastor and people are working hard for a new church. They have raised over \$8,000 this year. They have cleared the lot and are ready to build when the money is available. In this project, we earnestly solicit your sympathetic understanding and help. Goldsboro: O. M. Graham, Pastor- Brother Graham and people are doing nicely.

Hamlet: M. McCallum, Pastor— Brother McCallum has done well at Hamlet. He went there six years ago and has worked out of that mountain of debts; and all debts have been paid. He deserves great commendation.

Hickory Bend: J. W. McRae, Sr., Pastor— Brother McRae has done his best to bring up a good report, and I think under the circumstances, he has done a good job.

John's Station and Piney Grove: J. H. McCallum, Pastor— This pastor and people are to be commended for the fine work done this year. The work was at a stand still when brother McCallum went back there this year. After three months the church and people were so different you would hardly believe they were the same. They really became transformed and you feel uplifted when you go there. They entertained the District Conference this year, and did an excellent job in this service.

Laurinburg, G. E. Hogue, Pastor—Brother Hogue has done well with these people and they are looking forward to a new church in the distant future. They have purchased a new site for their re-location, a tract of land consisting of $4\frac{1}{2}$ acres. This is a very attractive place for the new church.

Laurinburg Ct.: Miles Murphy, Pastor— This congregation has done very well under the leadership of Brother Murphy. Brother Murphy is one of the young men who came into the conference last year and is doing nicely.

Lumberton: D. H. McLean, Pastor— This church has had a great year. It is the one church on the district that has a year round radio program. In fact, Brother McLean is the Lumberton pastor.

Maxton and Beauty Spot: J. W. Feree, Pastor— Through strenuous effort, Brother Feree is doing nicely, and they have a fine group of young people at both places. The Beauty Spot Church is expecting to complete the work on the church before winter.

Millers: W. M. Cooper, Pastor — Both Pastor and the people have worked under great handicaps this year. We are looking forward to a better year for 1957 and 1958.

Mt. Zion and New Zion: B. F. Gleaves, Pastor— Brother Gleaves has not been well this year. It has been quite difficult for him to carry on. We are hopeful of a better year on this charge with improved conditions.

Pembroke and **Southern Pines:** E. C. Campbell, Pastor. Brother Campbell has not been able to do all he had hoped we would get done on this charge this year.

Philadelphia: D. C. Skeens, Pastor. Under the leadership of brother Skeens, these people have purchased a nice three room school building and three acres of land. They are using this building for the educational work. It has added so much to the life of the community.

Red Springs: I. A. Friend, Pastor— These people and the pastor have had a great time together, this year. They have done a lot of community work. Brother Friend is the community pastor for Red Springs.

Rowland and Salem: J. F. Sawyer, Pastor— Brother Sawyer is going steadily, and the charge is doing nicely. This is the best year since this pastor has been there.

Saint Mark: John Monroe, Pastor— Brother Monroe has done a good job in this small church in gathering up the children and it looks like this small membership will be on the increase next year.

St. Peter: J. W. McRae, Jr., Pastor— Brother McRae has done the best he can there, and yet, we are still hopeful for this place.

Sanford Ct.: J. L. Alford, Pastor- Mt. Olive is an up and coming church and they are raising money for a new church. In fact, they would like to get started on the church before the close of the new conference year. Brother Alford has done a good job there and the folk want him back.

Bolton: E. M. McLeod, Pastor— Brother McLeod has done the best he could there this year, being so far from home. It appears that with a much shorter distance he will be better off and could give the work more supervision.

Wilmington: John S. Mills, Pastor— Brother Mills and his wife have been giving the work all they had and are hopeful of building a membership that will be self supporting in the near future. We abandoned the big church that we were in at conference. All this year they have worshipped in the recreation center of the Robert Jervay Homes. This has probably hindered the progress of the growth, not being in a church building. Earlier in this report I spoke of several towns were we have no work at all. There were others where we are at present and need churches. This is one of the needy places, and yet, it looks hopeless unless, and until the Board of Missions of the conference can organize and put on a fund raising campaign for new buildings. It will be well for the conference to seriously consider such a program, as the tenant farming sections will need special help, if we are to expand. I want to ask the conference support to Wilmington (Advance Special)

Hoffman: John McEchain, Pastor— Hoffman has done well this year. They have struggled with a church debt and in view of the fact that this is a one Sunday a month place, only so much can be done. Brother McEachain is to be commended realizing that he lives a long way from the work and that they only have one Sunday a month.

FORWARD

And now Bishop Love and Brethren, again, I want to thank you for your patience in listening to the report of the Laurinburg Distict. In Closing, I give you these words:

Looking back over the Methodist achievements of the past we realize how great the debt of the present is to those who have gone before. Looking out upon the world in which we live we see doors of opportunity opening everywhere which none can shut although behind them lurks the adversary. "And looking within shall we see God's people willing in the day of God's power?"

An old epoch is closing. What may replace it no one with certainty can say. But we do know that "God has not deserted the world He created" and that "no cause is forlorn with Christ at its Head."

His Church it at an hour of decision. Shall we, like the Ephraimites "armed and carrying bows, turn back in the day of battle" or shall we join the company of those who "do not draw back, but march face for-ward."

We choose to go forward!

Let us therefore commit ourselves to Him who can do exceedingly abundant for us more than we can task or think according to the power that worketh in us, unto whom be glory in the Church through Christ Jesus. world without end. Amen.

WESTERN DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Ministers, Laymen and Friends of 99th Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Greetings!

Our second report as District Superintendent of the Western District is not merely a summary of achievements, during this eventful year, but an expression of thanks-thanks, first, to Almighty God for His sustaining grace and guidance for the completion of another year's work and to the faithful ministers and loyal laymen for the untiring labor and hearty cooperation in this first year of the Quadrennium.

Fortunately, death has not visited our ranks, and with few exceptions, everyone has been able to perform the regular services of his charge.

With the introduction of new methods and emphasis of the Church, it has been necessary for considerable planning and study in the implementations of the program of our great Church. It is abundantly clear that where this program has been followed, the local churches and charges will, by their reports to this Conference, show greatest achievements, in the various areas of service.

The Disciplinary requirements have been met in the holding of First and Fourth Quarterly Conferences on the several pastoral charges. However, my service has not been limited by the Law, but has had necessary extensions by additional meetings to get the job done.

Top among the media of study is the Kit Booklets and Self-Study Guide, Distribution of these have been made from the District Office and Publishing House. Many hours were spent across the District in presenting them, both in Quarterly Conferences and special meetings held for that purpose. However, the response to their use is less than satisfactory. Admittedly, it is rather difficult to study one's self, but we feel that it is highly rewarding.

The use of charts and audio-visual aids have also proven invaluable as we have traversed this widely despersed district.

Special mention should be made concerning the gains in membership, for the church cannot remain static and fulfill its mission in a confused and bewildered world, and a rapidly increasing world population. The ministers' reports will indicate these increases with a sense of humble pride. We boast of the fact that our recruitment for the ministry also exceed our former report a year ago. During the session of our District Conference, four young men were given licenses to preach. Three of these are in school or will enter this year to prepare themselves for Christian leadership. If the North Carolina Conference is to keep pace with the Methodist Church, we must never neglect this phase of the work.

High among the needs of our district is the replacement of many of our old and obsolete churches and parsonages with new ones. In this particular, not all of our dreams have come true; however, dreams never come true unless and until we wake up.

Scotts Chapel Church in Statesville is a concrete example of an awakening, for on a site near the old church, a beautiful, well-appointed brick sanctuary now stands. One minister said, as he looked at the new building, "I believe in miracles."

Sacrifices have been common-placed with the minister and loyal congregation of this church. They failed to see any sum of money they had to give to make possible this church. This project is complete to the most minute detail and completely equipped. It is easily the best appointed church for our people in that city. The pastor will report about twenty per cent increase in membership and all items of claims paid in full.

The cost of this church and equipment is more than \$21,000.

This brief statement, by no means adequately tells the success story of Scotts Chapel. An excelent job has been done and we hope others will "Go and do thou likewise."

Sorry to say that this is the only completed project during the year, which was in the planning stage a year age. However, Epworth Chapel, in Gastonia, was in the process of completing the Educational Unit when our last Annual Conference was held. This loyal congregation and minister raised considerable sums of money and made possible the grant from the Board of National Missions. This completed church is meeting the needs of this congregation and community in a remarkable manner.

Considerable sums of money are in building fund treasuries at Conover, Tuckers Grove, Motts Grove, Hunters Chapel, Galilee and Philadelphia at Stoney Point. McQueens Chapel at Conover has had the Ground-Breaking on the large and beautiful lot, purchased and paid for, to build a new church.

Within the next few months, the building should get underway.

Our building program has taken definite shape and there will be in the foreseeable future, other completed projects.

Neither time nor space will permit me to mention those churches and parsonages where improvements have been made or paid for during this year. Surely, we commend them for a job well done.

We are exceedingly happy to report that those churches having delinquent loans with the Board have had them rewritten and made current, and payments are being met promptly.

General and Conference Benevolences have caused us great concern. With an increase in World Service and the raising of the Reserve Pension Fund, we have put forth great effort and energy in meeting these objectives. A few charges have not done nearly as well as they should have. These however, are the exceptions and not the rule. More funds will be reported at this time than were reported this time last year.

We did not reach cur goals, but we are not desirous of moving it nearer. but put forth greater effort, work a little harder in the attainment of them.

Taking a look at the great program of the Church, we have a mixture of emotions, admiration for a well devised program, but the distance between where we are and where we are challenged to go is not very encouraging.

By every means within our reach, we shall endeavor to go forward with the capable leadership of the Methodist Church, who believe that the answer to the perplexing problems of our day is God. With the full commitment of ourselves to Christ and His Church, the apparantly unattainable can be attained. Let us, in the name of our Lord, fellow-workers, march on 'til victory is won for all men.

- 1. That the Centennial Celebration marking one hundred years of the existence of the North Carolina Conference be held at the time of the Annual Conference and at the seat of the Conference, in 1958.
- 2. That all sources for the history of the Conference be explored, including:
 - (a) The Statistical Department of the Methodist Church,
 - (b) All available copies of the Journals and records of the North Carolina Conference,
 - (c) Consultation with the older members of the Conference, and with such laymen as may have resource materials of the Conference sessions and personnel.
 - (d) Those living persons—like Bishops Jones and Shaw, Dr. Golden and others, who might shed light on the existence of the Conference.
- 3. That two sessions of the Conference in 1958—one afternoon and one evening service, be devoted to The Anniversary—one session for representations, addresses. etc. in a banquet; and one session in which a Pageant may be presented portraying in a visible form the organization and development of the Conference in its Centennial existence.

- 4. That we publish a brochure of sufficient size to carry pictures of as many of the Ministers and churches and official groups as may be secured, so arranged as to show the meager beginnings, the growth and development of the Conference in the manner of church buildings and parsonages in the Conference. That the price of this brochure be set at a cost that will pay for itself. They would be sold in all the churches of the Conference, and the proceeds shall go to the financing of the entire Centennial project.
- 5. That the Annual Conference underwrite this brochure project at an amount not to exceed \$600, from a special fund raised on the four districts of the Conference, and that this money be replaced in the treasury of the Conference, and the proceeds shall go to the financing of the
- 6. That to the sessions of this Annual Conference we invite a repesentative from each of the Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, and representatives from such other Conferences as may show interest.
- 7. That this Committee on Statistics and History be enlarged by recommendation of the Cabinet, by the appointing of such persons as may be able to help assemble materials; help organize the materials; and help train personnel to present this Pageant in 1958.
- 8. That rehearsals for the Pageant be held in Greensboro—preferably at Bennett College—so that the proper setting may be had for the final presentation.

REPORT ON THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY

Bishop Edgar A. Love, members of the 99th Annual Conference, Greetings! Some months ago the Town and Country Commission met in Greensboro, at Bennett College with three superintendents present, and we worked out a two day Annual Conference on Town and Country work. We also had the chairman and secretary on Evangelism who promised to join us in these two day conferences. At that time we secured four delegates from the three districts, Winston, Greensboro, and Laurinburg, named by each Superintendent of the three districts. And later Rev. T. H. Wootten, who was absent sent in his delegates. But because we were short of funds, we deferred it until this coming conference year.

Along with this conference, we desire to have two workshops, one for the young adults, and one for the rural youth, with all the small towns represented.

We request that the District Superintendents organize in their first quarterly conferences a committee in every church on the Lord's Acre in every small town as well as the rural churches.

We also ask that they set up a committee in each charge or church, known as the Farm and Home Committee, to encourage our young married people to stay on the farm, and set up a business as well as buy and maintain a farm. We feel that too many of our young people are rushing from the farms and crowding the city areas too much to live in comfort, and lead the abundant life. We further ask that the Annual Conference go on record in supporting these two days of Town and Country Conference, with workshops for both young adults and youth.

We feel that out of these two days of working together for the purpose of encouraging our farmers, to lead the Lord land, cattle, and other projects may be the means of starting a new spirit in rural church and home enterprise. We feel if this program of the Lord's acre, the Lord's hour wage, and hog, poultry, and other small projects will give the rural person a new status on the farm.

We know by other conferences and churches who are maintaining the program of the Lord's acre, along with many other projects, are able to build both churches and parsonages without much help from other sources.

We, therefore, request enough money to be set aside to make a trial of this program in this conference year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

Bishop Love and members of the N. C. Annual Conference, we are happy to be privileged to make this report to you at this time.

Our obligation and our opportunity have been constantly before us. There is no greater concern before the Christian church today than evangelism—the winning of souls to the Kingdom. The world is in a bitter struggle for life and personal liberty. The days of peace and spiritual concern are few and far between. We are a church of warm and enthusiastic heart. The fires have always burned on our hearths. The evangelistic messages of the Wesleys, the Whitfields, the Asburys, the Cokes, and hosts of others as they followed the pioneers wherever they landed strangely warmed the hearts and souls of these, and out of these developed great revival services whereby many souls were claimed for the Kingdom of God. These fires have been smoldering and buried among our ranks for a long time now, but it is high time that great religious campaigns were sweeping across the face of the church.

There are too many spiritually dead churches and members in our churches. It is our job to re-activate and enliven them. We are anxious to see in our conference every church become a spiritual dynamo. We must work more earnestly that every week might be considered a revival week in the church. The annual revival season is still with us, but they have lost their potency. We must go out as a church to re-capture these lost powers and harness them for the good of the church.

Our Board recommends:

That some type of family altar be set up in every home. The old slogan still holds, "Families that pray together will stay together." It is observed that our family life is rather broken and scattered. Too few families get to sit together for one meal a day or to attend church or religious services together. We call upon you to strengthen those broken ties.

That some type of devotional literature be a vital part of every family circle . . . the Upper Room is at the top of these. Methodism is the child of Evangelism. Unless we can in some manner have greater evangelistic concern and effort, thousands will be slipping between our fingers from us. The concern for others must deepen and not slacken among us. It must not flicker out. In many communities where our churches once flourished, many of the churches have been discarded, abandoned, or sold out to Holiness. They are doing what we could not do. How long shall we halt between two opinions? We challenge you to go back into these communities with evangelistic messages and bands and re-claim them for the church.

That everywhere prayer bands and cottage meetings be reestablished. The great trouble with us is that instead of holding prayer bands and study groups, we are holding gossip meetings. We are killing our churches by undue adverse publicity. The people in the streets have all the news in our church from our own members. Let us carry our church to God in prayer.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference, the Board of Social and Economic Relations submits the following report. We give God praise and thanks for his love toward us this year. We thank God for all improvements in human relations over the past year.

The report of the Board this year is in the form of recommendations growing out of the meeting of Conference Board Chairmen in Chicago in March of this year. The recommendations and proposals are as follows:

I.

- (Purpose and Functions of the Annual Conference Board of Social and Economic Relations)
- The Board must first prepare itself for work in its field through study and research, to gain an understanding of social forces, the problems of human need which they create, and the possible solutions to these problems;
- Then it must educate and inform the members of the churches of its province about these problems, and awaken in them the sensitivity of Christian conscience which will respond with concern and action;
- 3. Futhermore, it must so inform and train the people of the church that they may study and explore these problems individually and together, drawing the ethical implications from daily events, and applying Christian solutions wherever possible.
- 4. Since we live in a world of group pressures, and are too often their victims, the Board must seek to mobilize and motivate the churches to work together as a unfied body to achieve its goals and defend its rights.
- 5. Between sessions of the Annual Conference, the Board should speak and act in behalf of the Conference (wherever authorized) in incidents of crisis or opportunity.

II.

(The Area of our concern)

The Board of Social and Economic Relations is primarily concerned with human need and suffering, injustice, and inequality, exploitation and infringement, resulting from the faults or malfunctions of our domestic social institutions, and susceptible to solution or improvement through the use of social processes. Some typical areas of this kind are:

- 1. Brotherhood and Race Relations
- 2. Citizenship and Civic Affairs
- 3. Civil Rights and Religious Liberties
- 4. Economic Life and Industrial Relations
- 5. Public Morals
- 6. Famly Life and Welfare
- 7. Social Health and Welfare
- 8. Rural Consevation and Agriculture
- 9. Ethics in the Church

The Conference Board in cooperation with the General Board of Social and Economic Reations is asking that a representative from the Woman's Society of Christian Service be placed on the Board of Social and Economic Relations, particularly the secretary of Christian Social Relations. The Board also urges the District Superintendents to organize on their districts Boards of Social and Economic Relations. The Board further urges every local church to elect the optional fifth commission, Social Concerns. And in keeping with the current trend in the General Board, we urge the Conference to combine the efforts of the Board of Social and Economic Relations, the Board of Temperance and the Board of World Peace. We believe such a move would strengthen the work of the Conference in the total area of Christian human relations. The Board plans a conference on Christian Social Relations on every district next year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD PEACE

Introduction: Bishop Love and members of the North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church, your Board of World Peace wishes to submit the following report:

BRIGHT SPOTS IN INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS THIS YEAR

One bright spot in international relations this year was the way the United Nations acted during the Suez Crisis. We are thankful that the United Nations acted in such a strong way concerning this crisis, clearing the canal, establishing a small military force, and pursuading the three nations to withdraw their armed forces. We believe that an emergency police force should be made permanent and enlarged.

Another bright spot was the unanimous approval of the establishment of an International Atomic Energy Agency by the Eleventh General Assembly of the United Nations.

Still another bright spot in international relations this year was the birth of the independent state of Ghana in Africa. Ghana was formerly a British colony. It is now a member of the British Commonwealth of Nations. Thus, another mighty blcw has been struck at colonialism.

Still another bright spot of international significance this year was the recent signing of a statement by two thousand American scientists asking for international agreement to stop testing nuclear bombs. We quote the following excerpts from this statement:

"Each added amount of radiation causes damage to the health of human beings all over the world . . ."

"As scientists we have knowledge of the dangers involved and therefore a special responsibility to make those dangers known."

DISARMAMENT

Disarmament is a very important issue to churchmen in 1957. The trend toward more arms must cease and the trend toward disarmament must start. President Eisenhower is said to be anxious to work out some first steps at the meeting now being held in London so that he may submit the proposal to the Senate in the non-election year of 1957.

During the last 12 years the gap between the East and West on disarmament has been narrowing. Whereas in 1946 the United States favored the Baruch Plan for the international control of atomic energy, we have now given up that idea. Whereas in 1948 Russia wanted the abolition of atomic bornbs as the first step, it has now given that idea up. The proposal of the United States that there should be a ceiling on men in uniform (1,500,000 for Russia, United States, and China) has been accepted by Russia. President Eisenhower's proposal for aerial inspection has been accepted for a 1,000 mile strip along the iron curtain. Russia asks for inspection teams to be stationed in all transportation and military centers.

Some peeple question the sincerity of Russia in disarmament. We believe that there is sincerity on Russia's part. For more than 50 years Russia has talked disarmament and made proposals. The first modern disarmament conference was called by the Czar in 1899. Russians have made proposals when under the Czar and when under the Communists, when they were weak in the twenties and when they were strong in the fifties. They have made six proposals in the last several years. So much talk points to some sincerity.

Moreover, we believe that from the point of view of their own security, communist leaders would like to send men in uniform back to farms and factories in order to produce more food and consumer goods. We believe that basic communist strategy is not to conquer the world by weapons and bombs, but to propagandize, infiltrate, and initiate revolutions from within. For such methods they do not need bombers and bombs, battleships, and missiles.

Are American churchmen sincere about disarmament? Do all of us want it? Will we support the hand of our President when he lays a proposal before the Senate, or will we listen to the demagogues who may arise and cry out about patriotism, the duplicity of communists, and the need for preparedness? How will men who are working in plants making war materials think about it? How will persons in veterans' organizations think about it? By study and prayer, let us prepare ourselves in the church for a struggle concerning this issue. Disarmament is related to our relations with the People's Republic of China (Communist China), for this is a nation of 500,000,000 people which in the future will have great economic and military strength. We have no diplomatic relations with this China; she is not in the U. N. Do we not expect her to participate in the disarmament program? It would be foolish not to include her! If we want her cooperation in disarmament or other programs affecting the whole world, we must have diplomatic relations with her and work with her in the United Nations. Recognition of a nation does not imply approval of all that she does (we recognize Spain), but it dees mean that we know that she exists and that we are willing to negotiate with her.

Our goal in disarmament is a world which is bound together by law and limited world government, in which all nations are radically disarmed and the only military strength of any consequence is lodged in world authority, a strengthened United Nations.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Bishop Love and members of the Conference:

We have just reached the end of our first year's work. It has been a challenging and rivaling task. It has offered much to each of us as we have worked tirelessly at the job.

Having been organized at the last annual Conference, we began to meet regularly and promptly with very good attendance. Every member was alert and anxious to get the job done and well done.

Our first effort was to study the work of the Board, see its scope and its future. We were all concerned about the requirements that would be expected of the Board. Many resources were available for our uses. We set ourselves to the task and took no holiday.

In our study we found our Conference weak in most aspects of Christian Education. The various divisions—youth, adult, and children—had been woefully neglected. We had lost ground. This is no reflection on the former Board nor the workers. They did a good job with what they had to use. The fields had not been cultivated for lack of funds and workers. The church is now feeling the results. It has been several years since a conference wide assembly of youth, adults, or children for study and consecration. There have been no funds alloted for success in district training. The weak spots are showing their ugly heads all over the conference, and throughout the church. There have been so few, if any, young people going into Christian vocations from our ranks. Our linese of Christian workers are thinning out. What shall we do now? Where shall we go from here? Are we going to continue to go on half-hearted at this all-important task, or shall we awaken and arouse ourselves from lethargy and give ourselves diligently to the work?

Rise up, O men of God Have done with lesser things Give heart and mind and soul and strength To serve the King of Kings...

Our workers have been patient and hopeful. Shall the shadows completely dim their visions? They have had no funds with which to carry on. They could not meet the demands. We have demanded of them to make brick without straw. We have laid on the heavy loads. In an educational manner, we are merely playing Education.

We have secured one of the very best trained young men as Executive Secretary and then for lack of funds tied him to full-time church pastorage. He is trying to ride two horses at the same time in different directions. It cannot be done. We need to give adequate support to the Secretary and then we demand of him a well done job.

Thanks to the Conference leaders. As we met and planned for a Conference-wide Youth Assembly to meet at Bennett College in July, the Conference leaders agreed to underwrite our costs. Now the Assembly is assured, with the help of Bennett College. Our Treasurer reports that there has been but a meager offering coming from the **Rally Day** askings.

WESLEY FOUNDATIONS

A Foundation has been set up on the campus of A and T College in Greensboro under the guidance and direction of Rev. W. T. Brown. A Foundation is in the making on the campus of North Carolina College in Durham under the direction of Rev. Douglas Moore, Conference Executive Secretary. It is the hope and plan of the Board to have on each state or private school campus within our Conference such an organization.

That a Youth Rally be held annually and such other assemblies as may be associated therewith—

That the Conference go on record as giving hearty and enthusiastic support of the General Conference with emphasis on higher education in our conference work, this as a special emphasis of the work of our Conference Board of Education—

That the Conference go on record as giving its moral and financial support to the work of Youth Assemblies—

That Sunday, September 29th be set as Church School Rally Day-

That provisions be made for our Board of Education Conference-wide workers funds be allocated for this purpose—

As we face the new year, it is with joy and hope. We are ready to meet the challenge, and with your interest and support, the victory will be ours.

REPORT OF THE AREA ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY 1957

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

We have distributed for your review—for I am sure you have previously read it—the October, 1956 issue of THE MESSENGER, which contains the reports and actions of the Area Council of 1956, held in Union Memorial Church, Baltimore, October 9th to 11th.

If you will refer to my report, beginning on page four of this issue, you will find a summary of the financial operations of the Area office for the years 1953, 1954, and 1955. In previous reports to the annual conferences, I have tried to outline my activities as clearly as possible. I have said that it is difficult to give an accurate picture of my responsibilities, because of their variety and intimate association with office routine.

As the bishop's administrative assistant, I am required, because of his prolonged absences from his desk, to direct the affairs of the office. In a general sense, of course, I am expected to promote the work of the General Church in the four conferences of the Area—the Deleware, the East Tennessee, the North Carolina, and the Washington Conferences. Many pastors seem to have some difficulty remembering this, however, for I have been introduced in devious ways, such as "area secretary of the Washington Conference," or "secretary to the bishop of the Delaware and Washington Conferences," or even more confusingly as the "area secretary for the central jurisdictional Conference."

THE MESSENGER

Our Area paper, THE MESSENGER, is our chief medium of promotion, and as such, is sent automatically to pastors throughout the Area each month. We would like to urge pastors, however, as well as laymen, to be paid subscribers. We are reasonably proud of our little paper just as it is, but it could be infinitely better than it now is with better financial support. We desperately need paid-in-advance subscribtions. We believe that a minimum of five from each charge is certainly an attainable goal.

You will note, from my Area Council report, that we have had to subsidize THE MESSENGER each year to an extent well in excess of one thousand dollars. We have a promotional plan which we hope will greatly decrease this year's required subsidy. We thus estimate a subsidy of only \$600 this year.

Pastors, please be subscription agents for us in your parishes! Please let us hear from you frequently—with paid subscriptions!

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Our contact with district superintendents of the Area has been our secondary medium of promotion. All eighteen of them have been most coopertive in spirit and most responsive to suggestions and directions. I am usually able to visit in each annual conference several times each year, on various missions.

Last July 7-9, a most helpful and spiritually enriching retreat for district superintendents, conference executive secretaries, treasurers, secretaries, lay leaders, and Woman's Society presidents was held at the Morgan Christian Center, Baltimore. On March 5-7 of this year, in cooperation with the General Board of Education, Nashville, a seminar for district superintendents and executive secretaries was held at Sharp Street Church, Baltimore. We financed completely the first effort, and bore the larger share of the financial obligation of the latter.

GRACE CHURCH, CHATTANOOGA

We have given what support we could—from a distance—to the establishment of a new church congregation in the Alton Park section of Chattanooga, Tennessee, and in the subsequent acquisition of a very fine property for this group. The church, to be named **Grace Church**, is the first new church to be organized in this growing city among Negro Methodists in forty years.

DIRECTOR OF RESEARCH AND SURVEYS

I would like to call attention to a recommendation made in my report to the Area Council, which you will find on page five of the October, 1956, MESSENGER.

(I would like to say, parenthetically, that the Area Council is not a legislative body. It cannot order the Annual Conferences what to do. It can only recommend, and these recommendations are passed on to the Annual Conferences for consideration.)

The recommendation in question is that the Reverend Samuel M. Carter, who for several years has sesrved the Washington Conference most effectively as director of research and surveys, be employed to serve the entire Area in this capacity. The need for a competent person in such an office is a very great urgency, in view of expanding populations in our cities and and the obvious need in many instances of establishing new churches in our urban areas, as well as larger parishes in our rural centers. Scientific study cf population trends and the migratory habits of our people is needed that we may prepare the church to serve them adequately.

I recommend that this conference approve the Area Council action. The salary of the area director of research and surveys is provided for in the slight increase in Area Expense in the recommendation of your Commission on World Service and Finance.

QUADRENNIAL GOALS

Believing that the members of our local churches will produce more for Kingdom growth evangelistically and socially as well as financially, if their annual goals and achievements are set before them visibly, we have had printed for distribution by the district superintendents, a quadrennial "Goals and Achievements" chart. A chart is available for each local church in the Area. It is a self-evaluation poster, on which the church is to list at the beginning of each year its goals, and at the close of each year its achievements. We urge faithful use of this chart, that it may serve as an incentive to our people to advance yearly "for Christ and His Church."

OUR STATION WAGON

Through the good graces of the National Division of the Board of Missions, a new Chevrolet station wagon has been purchased for use in the larger parishes of the Area. The wagon, delivered to us recently, has been assigned to the Lexington Larger Parish, in the Washington Conference. We plan to share it equally with all larger parishes in the Area that may wish to make profitable use of it.

THE RURAL MINISTRY

This leads me to the observation that, as I travel through the Area and study the needs of our conferences, I am fully persuaded that none is greater than that of improved rural churches, with dedicated pastors who love the country and will be happy to stay there, if need be. Our small rural churches are served too often by men who all the while have their eyes set steadfastly toward the city church. This is an honorable objective, if an unselfish one, but surely there must be more men who will love the country and who will want to live in it; who will have specialized training for the rural ministry, and who will love country people and want to serve them.

We must dignify and glorify the country and the privileges and rewards of the rural ministry. These people are the backbone of the nation. Their churches should be as beautiful and as well kept as the city churches. Their programs should be challenging, geared to meet their needs and to answer their problems. They should be served by some of our strongest minds and noblest spirits. Let us remove forever the stamp of inferiority from the rural church and the rural pastor. Let them no longer be stigmatized as second, third, or fourth class churches and preachers, unless, like some of our city churches, they choose to do nothing and refuse to go forward.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, I wish to thank the pastors and laymen (and certainly the district superintendents) for their continued cooperation and personal kindnesses to me in my relations with them. As usual, I express my appreciation to Bishop ove, with whom I am privileged to work so closely as I am. I quote from my Area Council report, in the issue before you:

"I cannot say too often, either, that we have in him a great leader and a great man—and in that combination we have 'a consummation devoutly to be wished.' Many great leaders of history have broken down on the inside when the temptation was greatest or the crisis was most grave. But the great man never does. And we have seen Edgar Love hold together when most misunderstood, and love when most bitterly opposed, and keep silent when most unkindly attacked. Such is the measure of greatness."

It is a privilege and an honor to serve you. My only desire is to do that well—to love the brethren and to serve faithfully my Lord, proving a workman "who has no need to be ashamed."

DEPARTMENT OF RESEARCH AND SURVEY Baltimore Area, Methodist Church

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Dear Bishop and Conference of the Area:

It falls my lot to render my first report as Area Director of Research and Surveys to the four Conferences of the Baltimore Area. This office was made Area-wide during the 1956 session of the Area Council, meeting at Union Memorial Methodist Church, Baltimore, October 9-11, 1956. This confirmed the action of the 1955 session of the Area Council which created the office, but made no financial provision for its operation.

FIELD SERVICE

The Greensboro District, through its district Superintendent, Dr. G. M. Phelps, secured the services of this office to establish the need for a Methodist Church in a newly annexed section of the city of Greensboro. In a section in which no church is operating, a corner site, of three lots, 100X150 each, at the intersection of Ardmore Drive and Lee Street, was purchased by District funds for a new church. The interest and cooperation of Dr. D. R. Fletcher and the Division of National Missions has been secured and promised. During the week of April 28, 1957, a survey and study of the area and site was made. With the help of Mrs. Smith and four young women from Bennett College, a religious census was taken. The results show at least 250 prospective families for a new congregation. We need more superintendents like Brother Phelps to push the progress of Church extension in new areas. We regret to say that we had no calls from the Deleware Conference during this year, but we are scheduled to go to the Salisbury District shortly after the Conference year begins.

ADDITIONAL SERVICES

In this field of services I have been called to serve and work with civic, social agencies and federated church groups. During this year I have served as fellows:

- 1. Member of Department of Urban Work, National Council of Churches of Christ.
- 2. Member of Department of Town and Country Work, National Council of Churches.
- 3. Member of the Board of Missions of the Washington Conference.
- Member of the Commission on Comity Council of Churches for Maryland and Delaware.
- 5. Member of the Commission on Comity and Church Planning, Washington Federation of Churches, Washington, D. C.
- 6. Member of the Northwest Inter-agency Committee of Baltimore.
- 7. Board of Directors of Baltimore Branch NAACP.

On March 5th, 1957, I was appointed as one of the Technical Consultants to the Department of Research and Surveys of the Division of National Missions by Dr. Roy A. Sturm, Director, I have since learned that Bishop Love played a large part in this appointment.

REFLECTIONS

1. Urban Work: Some of the greatest cities in America, or for that part, in the world are found within the bounds of the Baltimore Area, New York—second city of the world, and first city of the Nation; Washington, D. C., Capital of our nation, and the financial and sometime political captital of the world; Philadelphia, third city in the nation; Baltimore second seaport of the nation; Pittsburgh, the nation's steel capital; Richmond, Winston-Salem, great tobacco marts; and Chattanooga in the foothills of the Cumberland Mountains. In spite of their differences, they have one thing in common, in that they are all experiencing populations of city planners and church administrators alike. We are faced with the task of remaking these old cities meet the needs of the 20th Century living. The age of the stage coach, ox cart and Conostoga wagon is gone. The age of the atten, automobile and jet plane is upon us. Mutiple housing is fast replacing the one-family house. "The Call of the Wild" has been replaced by the "Call of the City." Urban renewal and Redevelopment is in progress from New York to Chattanooga.

The City has become a mission field of great importance. My concern is, how prepared are we in these four Conferences of Methodism to serve adequately this "Present Age." We shall need to keep abreast with urban changes and have the message and program of the Kingdom for the people. Dr. Frederick A. Shippey in his book, "Church Work in the City," warns us that American Protestantism is in danger of losing the cities because we have not studied the city. In some cities the cults are eating us up. In many instances we have started little new work and have gotten into a rut in some of the established churches. The City Church can no longer become a Sunday institution. We are challenged by the large youth and young adults populations in our urban communities. The rising tide of divorce, crime, creeping slums and juvenile deliquency is a challenge to church as well as social agency. I ask you, how prepared are we to serve our church plants, preaching and pastoral ministry. lay activities, programs of Christian education and week day programs? What does your Conference, District and local Church reports show? What say ye Committee on Urban Life?

RURAL WORK

There are some people who will never leave the farms and open country. These too, must Methodism serve. Much of the territory in the Baltimore Area is rural. The changes of the 20th Century has struck the farm also. The tractor has succeeded the plow; the corn harvester has supplanted the husking bee and dirt farming has been followed by scientific farming. Smaller rural populations have brought these new farm inventions to take the place of so much manpower.

Yet in so many instances the rural church is still in operation in one room, one day a week. The little, weak, one-room District School has been taken over by the modern, up to date consolidated school, with modern eouipment and facilities, along with a well trained staff of teachers. The old teacher who was just one step ahead of her pupils has been ousted by the teachers college graduate.

Many of our rural parishes could be consolidated into larger parishes or group ministries, with a trained pastor and staff. If we could turn from serving the dead in the cemeteries to serving the living down the road, we would do better.

Greater cooperation is needed between the Conference Commissions on Town and Country Work, the Conference Boards of Missions and our Cabinets, to effect better service and programs for our rural areas.

TO OUR CONFERENCE BOARDS OF MISSIONS

More and more you will have to assume the larger share of the program of Church extension within the brunds of your Conferences. We cannot depend as much on the Division of National Missions as we have in the past. They are urging us to develop our own resources as much as possible. I know this is a great change from having an all day meeting just to lan how we will distribute maintanance money to poor charges. Far too long we have neglected the full injunction of the Discipline regarding the full work of a Conference Mission Board and settled for the "Maintanance Rut." When relocation problems arose and needs for additional parishs services came, we wrote Philadelphia and hoped the money would be forthcoming. We seemed to feel that the Division of National Missions was a cross-hybrid creature with the nature of a fairy godmother, King Midas and Santa Claus combined.

So I ask you at your next Annual Meeting to study Paragraphs 1295 to 1307 in the 1956 Discipline and see what a Conference Board of Missions should be doing, and, then let us go and do likewise.

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afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conference. In the year 1836, the General Conference set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned, there were From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and wo Conferences. Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolna Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, At the Confeernce of December 4, 1844, there were 10,495 white members and 3,100 colored. Without consuluing the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membersh p became a part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Sonte of the colored members entered the A.M.E. Church, some of the colored M.E. Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episopal Church as it returned to the State after the Civil War. Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and in 1865, when at the close of the War, the M.E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference. From the North Carolina Conference, the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.


