# CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

# THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- 1. The Conference shall meet at  $9\!:\!00$  a.m. and open with devotional exercises, and close at  $12\!:\!30$  p.m.
- 2. The Memorial Services shall be held the first morning of the Conference immediately following the Communion Service and shall include the calling of the roll of the honored dead.
- 3. The nominating committee consisting of five persons shall be appointed by the bishop quadrennially.
- 4. No person shall be a member, concurrently, of more than two standing committees or commissions (except as provided for by the Discipline).
- 5. The Conference fiscal year shall end 20 days before the first day of the Annual Conference.
- 6. The pastors' reports shall be in the hands of the treasurer and statistician 15 days before the opening day of the Annual Conference.
- 7. The reports of all major commissions and committees shall be mimeographed and passed out at the seat of the Conference on or before the day the report is read.
- 8. The roll of Conference lay members shall be called at the opening day of the Conference.
- 9. The Treasurer's report shall be mimeographed and passed out at the meeting of the Conference.
- 10. The minutes of the Annual Conference shall be printed and distributed within 90 days after the adjournment of the Conference.
- 11. All recommendations and memorials shall be presented to the Conference in duplicate form.
- 12. All motions from the floor shall be in writing when requested by the secretary of the Conference.
- 13. The program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a committee composed of the Host Pastor, the Host Superintendent, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President, Woman's Society of Christian Service, Conference Secretary, and two persons named by the Nominating Committee, in consultation with the Bishop.
- 14. When a member wishes to speak he must arise and address the chair and shall not proceed until he is properly recognized by the presiding officer.
- 15. No member shall speak on any question more than once until all who wish to do so have spoken, nor shall a member speak more than ten minutes except by permission of the Conference.
- 16. Motions made and seconded, reports made and accepted are to be deemed the property of the Conference and cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the Conference.

- 17. All motions to lay on the table, to take from the table, shall be taken without debate, but the one who offers a formal motion or resolution shall have five minutes to close debates and this right shall not be forfeited by a motion ordering the previous question or to lay on the table.
  - 18. All questions of privilege shall be decided by the president.
- 19. No member of the Conference shall be recognized who is outside the boundary of the Conference.
- 20. The following motions may take precedence of the original motion or precedence of each other in the order given here; (a) to adjourn to a given time; (b) to adjourn indefinitely; (c) to take up the order of the day; (d) to lay on the table; (e) to move up the order of the day; (f) to postpone to a given time; (g) to refer to a committee; (h) to amend; (i) to postpone indefinitely.
- 21. Any person voting with the majority may move a reconsideration, but such motion shall not be debatable.
- 22. The yeas and nays may be taken on any motion on the call of one-third of the members present.
  - 23. These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the Conference.
- 24. These rules may be amended at any regular session of the Conference at least one day before action is taken.

# CONSTITUTION

# BOARD OF MANAGERS—BALTIMORE AREA PASTORS' SCHOOL THE METHODIST CHURCH

Herewith is transmitted the Constitution of the Board of Managers Baltimore Area Pastors' School—The Methodist Church, and adopted by the Board of Managers in session at Baltimore, Maryland, Sept. 11, 1957.

# ARTICLE I. NAME AND PURPOSE

Section 1. Name—The name of this Board shall be the Board of Managers of the Baltimore Area Pastors' School—The Methodist Church.

Section 2. Purpose—The purpose shall be to provide counsel, make plans, elect a dean and other officers, staff members and teachers (nominated by the dean), set up a budget, approve recommendations and reports, set the time and place of the Pastors' School and to transact any other business pertaining to the school.

# ARTICLE II. BOARD MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the Board shall consist of: The Resident Bishop and three members from each of the Annual Conferences of the Area. Two of the three conference representatives shall be nominated by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and elected by the Conference, the third representative shall be the Executive Secretary of Christian Education. They shall be elected at the first session of the quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium. They shall take office at the first meeting of the Board, called by the Resident Bishop, after each of the Annual Conferences shall have met.

# ARTICLE III. OFFICERS AND DUTIES

Section 1. Officers—The officers shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary and a Treasurer. Each conference shall be represented in, at least, one office. They shall be elected quadrennially from the membership of the Board at the first annual meeting of the new quadrennium, by a majority of the members of the Board, after being nominated by the Nominating Committee or from the floor.

Section 2. President—The President shall preside at meetings of the Board, countersign all checks drawn on the treasury, represent the Board when necessary and perform other duties normally performed by a president.

Section 3. Vice-President—The Vice-President shall preside and act in the absence of the President and assist the President when needed.

Section 4. Secretary—The Secretary shall record the minutes, send out notices of all meetings and keep the president and members informed of any matters germane to the Board or Pastors' School.

Section 5. Assistant Secretary—The Assistant Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary in his absence and shall assist the Secretary when necessary.

Section 6. Treasurer—The Treasurer shall have charge of all monies of the Board, deposit the same in an account known as "The Baltimore Pastors' School", and shall write and sign all checks. He shall disburse funds only upon written order signed by the Secretary with the exception of bills pertaining to the expense of the School session. In such cases the dean shall sign the order and report the same to the Secretary.

#### ARTICLE IV. MEETINGS

Section 1. Time—The Board shall meet annually on the first Tuesday in October. The place and hour to be determined by the President in consultation with the Resident Bishop. This date may be altered by the Executive Committee provided it shall be held in the Fall of the year. Special meetings may be called by the President or by a majority of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Quorum—Seven members shall constitute a quorum for transacting business not otherwise specified, provided at least one member from three conferences of the Baltimore Area is present.

#### ARTICLE V. COMMITTEES

Section 1. Committees—There shall be the following committees representative of each of the Annual Conferences and consisting of not less than four persons: Executive Committee, Nominating Committee, and Recommendations Committee.

Meetings of committees shall be regulated by the Board of Managers, and time and place of meetings shall be subject to the call of the chairman.

Section 2. Executive—The Executive Committee shall be composed of the elected officers and the Resident Bishop. The President and Secretary of the Board shall be the chairman and secretary of this committee. It shall act for the Board between meetings in matters that are necessary to be acted upon before the next Board meeting and report its action to the next Board meeting. It shall constitute the Finance Committee and recommend a budget to the Board after consultation with the dean. It shall have the financial records audited by a certified public accountant.

Section 3. Nominating—The Nominating Committee shall nominate the officers of the Board of Managers, the business manager, the dean and other administrative officers provided that others may be nominated from the floor. It shall be composed of one person from each Conference elected by the Board and shall elect its own chairman.

Section 4. Recommendations—The Recommendations Committee shall examine all reports, receive recommendations from members of the Board, officers of the school, the Department of Ministerial Education and other sources; counsel with the dean and others; and shall make any recommendations, as a result of the above procedure or otherwise, to the Board of Directors. The vice-president shall be chairman of this committee.

#### ARTICLE VI. PASTORS' SCHOOL

Section 1. Sessions—The time and place of the school sessions shall be set by the Board of Managers.

Section 2. Courses—Courses for the school shall be elected by the dean according to the procedure of the rules of the Department of Ministerial Education.

Section 3. Dean—The dean shall be elected at the first meeting of the new quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium, or until his successor is elected. He shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the incoming Board of Managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the administration of the school in keeping with the rules and recommendations of the Board of Managers and the Department of Ministerial Education. He shall submit a written report, by mail, of the school to the Recommendations Committee following the school session; and a written report in person at the next Board meeting; at the same time he shall submit nominations for the faculty of the coming school session.

Section 4. The Faculty—The faculty shall be nominated by the dean after consultation with the resident bishop and the director of the Department of Ministerial Education.

Section 5. Business Manager—The business manager shall be elected quadrennially at the first annual meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the business proceedings of the school in cooperation with the dean.

#### ARTICLE VII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Board meetings in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution of the Board.

#### ARTICLE VIII. METHOD OF AMENDING

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner:

A proposed amendment shall be submitted in writing to the secretary, at least sixty days before the annual meeting of the Board of Managers. The secretary shall send the same through mail to all of the members of the Board. The proposed amendment shall be submitted by the secretary to the Board in session and shall require a three-fourths vote of the members present and voting, for adoption.

Any part of this Constitution in conflict with the Discipline of the Methodist Church or the rules of the Department of Ministerial Education shall be amended after the Board of Managers reviews the same.

## Reports

#### REPORT OF THE GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Fellow Ministers, Laymen and Friends:

It is with a deep sense of gratitude that I stand before you to make my fourth report as District Superintendent in this Conference, having served three years on the Winston District, and this my first year on the Greensboro District. I am keenly aware of my indebtedness to almighty God for health, strength and guidance that have been mine through the year, and I hasten to acknowledge my humble gratitude to Him.

And to you, Bishop Love; accept my sincere thanks for the privilege of serving in this capacity under your administration, tempered with love and sympathetic understanding.

This has not been an easy year but a challenging, busy and thrilling one. I cannot adequately speak of the success of the district without speaking more eloquently than I am capable of every minister and his congregation.

Early, following the adjournment of the one hundred-second session of our Annual Conference, the ministers and lay workers of the district were called together at Union Memorial for the purpose of having the Quadrennial Program presented so as to inform the laymen of the part they are to play in its implementation. Most of the charges were well represented and challenged to the extent that our subsequent district meetings throughout the year were very meaningful.

Under the leadership of the Executive Secretary, Reverend J. T. Jones and Conference Secretary of Evangelism, Reverend O. W. Burwick and their coworkers, our laymen on the local church level have been able to gain a larger understanding of their responsibilities and the role they are expected to play as Christians engaged in kingdom building. We feel that these meetings have contributed significantly to the success of the district.

In our first quarterly conference the total program of the church was emphasized, e.g., the importance of availing oneself of all the means of grace for spiritual growth, the purpose and privilege of our benevolent giving; and the place and importance of the various Commissions to the total program of the church. Goals for increasing the membership were set by most of the churches, the figure for the district was above six hundred. At the fourth quarterly conferences it was revealed, however, that we had succeeded in reaching only the half-way mark towards the anticipated goal.

The time element compels me to reluctantly refrain from speaking of all the individual accomplishments. I must beg your indulgence, however, to permit me to hold up three or four accomplishments as highlights which are illustrative of the loyalty and fine work done by every minister under varying circumstances which he and his good people have labored.

Union Memorial, under the leadership of the Reverend G. M. Phelps, as a leading appointment in the North Carolina Conference, continues to forge its way towards the top. In spite of the minister's illness he gave guidance from his sick bed as an army general would give from his office.

At the fourth quarterly conference the reports showed that a budget of more than eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000) had been raised and all claims paid in full. Thirty-nine new members have been added to the church during the year. More than seven hundred dollars (\$700) have been raised to be applied to next year's indebtedness to the Board of National Missions.

St. Matthews, under the leadership of the Reverend John G. Corry, has purchased a modern, new parsonage at the cost of \$16,500.00. All claims were paid in full long before the conference. Twenty-nine new members were added to the church roll. It is our hope that every charge will be challenged to purchase or build a modern parsonage. This is one of the great needs of our district.

Basses' Chapel, under the leadership of the Reverend Liston Sellers has been challenged to break away from her sister church and assume the status of a station. This is a healthy undertaking for the church and the district. Basses' Chapel is now on its way to becoming one of the leading churches on the district.

The progress of New Goshen, stationed last year, is encouraging and is an example of the wisdom of such an adventure. Under the leadership of the Reverend Eugene Black they have raised something over ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) and paid all claims in full. The building fund is growing. Eighteen

new members were added to the church this year.

Several of the churches of the district are in the progress of building or remodeling, e.g., Mount Zion on the Zion Hill Charge and Saint Paul on the Chapel Hill Charge are in the struggle of building at great sacrifices. Leaksville has purchased a new church site and let its contract for a modern plant at an estimated cost of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000). Improvements in heating, furnishings and other equipment have been made this year which have enhanced the value of our property by several thousands of dollars.

enhanced the value of our property by several thousands of dollars.

While all the fine accomplishments include the women, this report would be incomplete without special mention of the W.S.C.S. Back of all that has been done, stands the distinct contribution of this organization and the ministers' wives. Again, may I say that their untiring devotion in the way of stewardship, expressed in both benevolences and evangelism, has had a telling effect in the

success of our district program.

It is with regret that we are forced to acknowledge the absence of Brother W. E. Tyler from this session of our Annual Conference, due to illness of several weeks' duration. Missing from the ranks of the women is Mrs. R. W. Winchester who passed to her reward during this conference year. She was a familiar figure to all conference goers, beloved and revered. May her spirit rest in peace.

In closing, may I repeat that every member has done a magnificent job under the circumstances which he has labored. What has been said in the way of high-lights is reflective of the dedication and loyalty of every member on the Greensboro District. Team work has brought whatever measure of success that has been ours this year. To my fellow-workers and to almighty God I am deeply grateful.

And for the wise counsel and wholesome advice so many of the pastors gave me. This is their report.

Knowing the responsibilities in the office of District Superintendent in the Methodist Church, and realizing my inability, I came into the office with a deep sense of humility, with a prayer in my heart for divine guidance, and saying with the apostle Paul "I can do all things through Christ who strengtheneth me."

It is my conviction that if a church is called by the name of the Methodist Church, it should be organized as such. Hence, I have striven this year to get the churches on the district organized according to the discipline of the Methodist Church. In many places I have been successful, and sad to say, in some places I have failed.

The supreme task of the church is to bring all men into living active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as divine Saviour, and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit; to gather them into the fellowship of the Church; to lead them to express their Christian discipleship in every area of human life that the Kingdom of God may be realized. Therefore, every church on the district except four, have an active Commission on Membership and Evangelism. Some charges have gained as many as forty members this year. We have a net gain across the district of 210.

The district is moving forward in the program of Christian Education. The major concern of Christian education is to reach persons with the kind of religious nurture that results in vital Christian living. It seeks to win persons to Christ and enable them to grow toward spiritual maturity in the full richness of Christian faith. Considering the fact that 60 per cent of all who join the church on profession of faith come through the Church School, we have placed great stress on the enlisting and training of additional Church School teachers. Our Christian Workers' School was held at the Galilee Church in Laurinburg. The attendance was good, with a dedicated faculty. The school was a success. Workshops have been held to assist local Commissions in becoming better informed about their task and how to do it with results.

We must serve our Lord by becoming faithful stewards. This will require a recovery of the New Testament conception of the role of the laity. When the New Testament describes the church as a royal priesthood. God's own people, it is not speaking of ordained clergy but of every disciple. Ministers and laymen are called to the same full and transforming experience of Christ. Mr. S. T. Brooks our District Director of Stewardship is leading the district in stewardship both by precept and example.

To lift up before the members of the church and also the secular world the Christian concern for personal, social, and civic righteousness, to analyze the issues which confront the nation and the world as well as the community and the person, and to propose Christian lines of action is what we are trying to do through the Commissions on Christian Social Concerns. For Christians, right and wrong in social situations depends on what they do to persons. Whatever enhances a man's life and worth as a child of God is right and should be encouraged. Whatever in any way or to any degree keeps a man from being all that God wants him to be is wrong and should be rejected and resisted by every follower of Christ.

As witnesses of Jesus Christ we must serve Him by intensifying our missionary obedience. In the face of our Lord's commission, "Go ye into all the world and make disciples of all nations," we must intensify our efforts to enlist a larger number of missionary candidates, increase the interest and concern of our people for the evangelization of the world. We have held before the young people of the district the importance of going into full-time Christian service. The only way to have enough ministers and missionaries to carry the work of

Christ through the Methodist church is to rear them in our homes and local churches. Every congregation with the membership of one hundred should be able to encourage one person every five years to go into full-time Christians service. Our District Director of Missions has kept before us the missionary program of the General Board. Our District Board of Missions has been organized, and has underwritten \$1,000.00 for Wilmington, \$700.00 for Fayetteville, and \$200.00 for Beaver Dam. We gave very liberally to the Bishop's Call for Africa.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service under the able leadership of Mrs. Emily Benton, in doing everything in its power to strengthen our local churches, both spiritually and financially. Our concern is to try to have in every church, no matter how small, a working society. With God's help we will do it.

Our District Lay leader, Mr. Bruce Hargrove, has called the laymen together every fifth Sunday this year. As a result of their study the laymen are becoming conscious of their responsibilities in the program of the church.

The building program on our district is encouraging. The Millers Chapel Church at St. Paul, N. C., completed a new modern church building last week, and the people are ready to go in as soon as the pastor returns. We have begun the new building in Wilmington after a long legal process. The chuch is going up now. Mr. Olive, on the Sanford Circuit, is ready to put the roof on their new church.

I have been blessed with perfect health this year. I have held two Quarterly Conferences on every charge on the district, and preached four times on every charge. I have not been sick one day. Most of the ministers have enjoyed the same type of health. Brother Hogue had to be out of his pulpit one Sunday due to sickness. Brother Miles Murphy had to undergo an operation, and also Brother Shivers. All others have had perfect health.

Late Thursday evening, March 2, and early Sunday morning, April 9, Mrs. Hogue and Mrs. Davis, respectively, the wives of Rev. Hogue and Rev. Davis, left to take up their abode in the heavenly country. It grieved us to see them go, but our Father called them to live with Him.

Bishop Love, members and friends of the One Hundred and Third Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference; this is the report of the Laurinburg District.

#### REPORT OF THE WINSTON DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Members and Friends of the North Carolina Annual Conference:

It is with a very deep sense of gratitude that I have come to this hour wherein I shall give an account of my stewardship as District Superintenden't of the Winston District, and a summary of the work done in the charges by the pastors and people. First of all, I count it a very high honor as well as a special privilege to have been permitted to serve with so great a people as the ministers and laymen of the Winston District. Many thanks to you, Bishop Love, for your wise counsel and brotherly love which you have extended to me during this my first year as a District Superintendent. I am indeed thankful to Almighty God for His divine presence as he has led us and blessed us in our efforts this year. The ministers and laymen of the Winston District have been wonderful in their cooperation, thereby making this report possible. To them, I am greatly indebted. One sad note: our ranks have been broken this year with the passing of Rev. Evangelist Frost.

#### District Meetings

The first District meeting was held with Saint John Methodist Church, Thomasville, N. C., June 30, 1960. It was well attended by the ministers and lay-

men from all points in the District. The program of the Church was presented and received as a great challenge. All apportionments for Benevolences were accepted.

On August 29th our second District meeting was held with St. Paul Methodist Church, Winston-Salem, N. C. Much time and attention was given to the study of the program of Evangelism and Christian Social Concerns. Financial reports were made on the following items: General and Jurisdictional Expense, Area Office Expense, Conference Journals and Chile Relief. This was a very profitable meeting.

October 21st was another high day on the Winston District. The ministers' wives held their annual District meeting at Wesley Chappel Church in Elkin, N. C. The program included a play: "The Bishop's Candle Stick," featuring members of the Interdenominational Ministers' Wives Alliance of High Point, N. C. The meeting closed with the reports from the ministers' wives for Pension and from the pastors on Benevolences. A fellowship dinner was served at the close of the meeting.

#### The District Conference

We held our District Conference May 12-13 with Oak Grove Methodist Church, Stoneville, N. C., Rev. H. A. Smith, pastor. We were royally entertained by the pastor and members. Our District Conference was highlighted by workshops on Evangelism, Christian Education, Christian Social Concerns and a Choir Concert by the District Choir under the leadership and direction of the District Music Committee, Mrs. Helen G. Cole, Chairman. The information and inspiration derived from the District Conference will carry over into next year, setting the stage for greater work.

#### Report of the District Music Committee

The National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians under the Jurisdiction of the Department of Music of the Division of the Local Church, of the Board of Education of the Methodist Church has come alive on the Winston District.

The Music Committee of the Winston District sponsored a Church Music Workshop and a District Choir Concert. Our main purpose was to bind the Winston District Musicians together in fellowship and to provide an opportunity to promote the exchange of ideas, techniques and rendition of sacred music. As we evaluate our year's work we can proudly say that:

- 1. Interest and awareness of good church music was certainly stimulated through dynamic leadership.
- 2. A great fellowship was noted among participants.
- 3. More interest was created in worship and sacred music in its various forms.
- 4. There was a desire and keen interest for further study.
- 5. A feeling of accomplishment in music was experienced.

#### Recommendations for 1961:

- Plan a meeting for all Directors of the Choirs in the Winston District soon.
   Purpose: To discuss aims of the organization, select and discuss music, and select workshop date.
- 2. Have a Church Music Workshop on the District level.
- 3. Plan a budget with the help of the District Superintendent.
- 4. Encourage larger participation of all choirs.
- 5. Have anthem or hymn of the month.

## The Woman's Society of Christian Service

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is well organized on the Winston District. With her love and devotion to so great a cause, it has been relatively easy for the President, Mrs. Marion W. Payne, to obtain the cooperation of the women throughout the District. The District meeting was so largely attended, the reporting so complete and the accomplishments so wonderful, that it was spoken of as having the resemblance of the Annual Conference of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. The Winston District Society led the Conference in its contribution for Missions.

#### District Youth Program

The Methodist Youth Fellowship is very much alive on the Winston District. Pastors and Youth Workers throughout the District are giving much time and attention to the Youth Program of the Church. The special service designed for young people on Student Day was conducted by the youths in most of our churches last Sunday. Our Annual District Youth Institute was well attended, June 20-24, 1960.

#### Evangelism

Much has been done in the field of Evangelism this year. In the Spring we had a week of Visitation Evangelism along with a preaching mission. The response was very gratifying. Nine pastoral charges participated. There was an exchange of ministers between the Winston and Greensboro Districts for the preaching mission. The pastors' reports will show the final results of the campaign and the follow-up.

#### Work in the Charges

Time will not permit me to speak of individual charges. For the most part, all of the charges on the Winston District have had a very profitable year. However, there are some noteworthy achievements which I should like to mention at this time. They are:

Brooks Memorial, Rev. W. S. McLeod, Pastor: Within ten years this pastor has led his people into paying their debt in full. Brooks Memorial is debt free.

Red Bank, Rev. Paul G. Carter, Pastor: For three months this pastor had only one member, but after three years the membership has increased to five adult members, who under Brother Carter's leadership have built and paid for a very nice little church, at a cost of more than \$6,000.00. On May 7, they burned the mortgage.

Madison, Rev. H. A. Smith, Pastor: This pastor and people will enter their beautiful new church in the very near future.

St. Paul, Rev. L. M. Mayfield, Pastor: Since the ground breaking, August 28, Rev. Mayfield has led this congregation into the completion of a new church which is completely facilitated, in the truest sense of the word, at a cost of more than \$200,000.00. This church, the pride of the North Carolina Conference, was opened Sunday, May 21st.

St. Andrews, Rev. J. W. Gwyn, Pastor: Under the leadership of Brother Gwyn this church has reached new heights in the community this vear. Fifty-three infants and children have received Christian Baptism and Thirty-seven Adult members have been added to the church.

Wesley Chapel, Elkin, N. C., Rev. J. B. Bethea, Pastor: This is another debtfree church, having recently dedicated their beautiful new Educational unit.

#### REPORT OF THE WESTERN DISTRICT

Bishop Love and members of the North Carolina Annual Conference

now assembled in the city of Charlotte, North Carolina:

I am happy to have this privilege of making this my fourth report as District Superintendent of the Western District of the North Carolina Conference of Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church.

In the middle of November, 1960, there was held in Chicago, Illinois, a District Superintendents' Convocation on the Quadrennial Emphasis of the Methodist Church. It was a glorious meeting. Each Superintendent was actually put into orbit. We came home filled with enthusiasm, with a determination to do

the best job we had ever done.

It was at the Area breakfast, given by Bishop Love, that he suggested our having a similar meeting on the Conference level. Our North Carolina Conference Convocation was held at Bennett College. We all can recall the tremendous

success of this one-day meeting.

During the 2nd and 3rd quarters, we, on the Western District, tried to graft upon the hearts of our people the Eight Thrusts that the Methodist Church has launched for the next four years. The theme: "Jesus Christ Is Lord" and "The Future Is Now," are upon the lips and hearts of all our ministers and laymen. We are praying that this psychological consciousness and spiritual fervor will be transformed into physical accomplishments.

#### Evangelism

The program of evangelism has been moving along steadily under the youthful but dynamic leadership of the Rev. Theodore Powell, District Secretary of Evangelism. Rev. O. W. Burwick, Conference Secretary of Evangelism, has also been a decisive factor in the steady movement and overall success of evangelism on the Western District. There is still a lot of room for improvement, for in many churches memberships have decreased instead of increasing; Sunday Schools are operating without competent instruction; members have almost solidified in a half-hearted devotion and in many cases the ministry lacks the power, zeal and persuasiveness that are the dynamo of evangelism. Perversely, we are continuing our efforts, knowing that "all things are possible if we only believe."

#### Education

In the past few years the Western District has boasted, not arrogantly, of its educational program. Last year we suffered a set-back because of the loss of three of our key persons in the field of Christian Education. The loss was so great that as of now we have not fully recovered.

In August of last year, we conducted a Christian Workers' School at Forest City, North Carolina, under the able leadership of Rev. Marshall McCallum. The attendance was comparatively small but those who were the recipients of the instruction were well benefited.

We feel we have done a good job in the field of higher education. We have paid over \$2,500 this year to our schools of higher learning.

#### Finance

Due to the lack of industries on our District, the economy fluctuates from one year to the next. However, our total finances of the District are fairly normal. We have raised for all purposes during the conference year of 1960-61 upward of \$16,000.00. We feel that our individual member-giving can be raised through a strong program of stewardship.

#### Our Ministry

We have 22 ministers on our District. As the pastor of these servants of God, I feel that they are sincerely dedicated to their work. However, the effectiveness of some is being hampered by the absence of wives. Eight of the 22 ministers have not as yet taken unto themselves a wife, which is almost in-

dispensable in the work of a Methodist preacher. We are hoping that in the near future this condition will be remedied.

Lay Activities

We have found on the Western District a wonderful person as our District Lay Leader. Mr. Herbert Gidney accepted this position and is willing to do all he can in the promotion of Lay Activities on the District. But with a lack of knowledge of the work, this year he has been unable to make much progress. We are looking forward, under his leadership, to a great improvement of the lay-program.

The W.S.C.S. is moving forward with great vigor. Mrs. Jettie Morrison, who at the beginning of the year was placed at the helm of the District Society, was elevated to the presidency of the Conference W.S.C.S. Through the years she has had a wonderful success in all phases and levels of the W.S.C.S. Mrs. P. Pearson replaced her as the president of the District W.S.C.S. and is doing a good job in the promotion of the women's work on the District. Much of the success in each local church can be traced directly to these Christian women.

#### District Conference

Our District Conference was held at the Durham Chapel Methodist Church in Shelby, North Carolina, April 28 and 29, 1961. The theme of the Conference was "Jesus Christ Is Lord." The Conference was well attended. On Friday evening we had representatives from Bennett College and Morristown College. Through the organization of the District Stewards, the District Conference pledged to build a District parsonage. It also planned on all-District meeting to be held June 24 at Denver, North Carolina. Some of the things that will be done at this meeting:

1. Organize a District Board of Missions and Church Extensions.

2. To explore the feasibility of a District Committee on Scholarships, and publish a quarterly District Paper, which will include complete and individual records of all local church activities.

#### Missions

Out of the final Convocation of the Home Missions Council (now a part of the National Council) came a statement of purpose, particularly as related to our home missionary task or mission, which needs to be assimulated in our contemporary thought.

"The Church owes its existence to the Good News. It is created and sustained by the ever renewed assurance that, in the life, sacrifice and victory of Jesus Christ, God has conquered the power of enmity, evil and death. This is indeed Good News. It has power to shatter the human heart with wonder and shake the world with hope.

"While the Church is brought into being by the Gospel, it ceases to be the Church unless it is the bearer of this Good News to all mankind. Thus the Church is given its mission. It is called to make known God's redeeming love

and bring all of life under the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

"The mission of the whole Church is also the mission of every congregation. The local church is a portion of the Christian Community resident in a given place, but called to accept the full commission of its Lord, to share its faith and life with the neighborhood, the nation, and the world. Mission boards, institutions, and missionaries are instruments by means of which the local church

extends its ministry to the farther bounds of its parish."

Our mission is clear. There is no justification for missing the way here. We know what our tasks are. At least, we are aware of the primary marching orders for the Church. As we go forward into a new year we look back in grateful appreciation to our Bishop and to all the ministers and their wives and laymen of the Western District for the many things that they did to make this report possible. Under the banner that proclaims that "Jesus Christ Is Lord," we move on with strength and vigor.

## REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

beginning June 19, 1961 and ending near May 15, 1962

Bishop Love, your commission on World Service and Finance of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church wishes to present its report for the coming Conference Year. The Commission has considered sincerely and prayerfully all requests, particularly where there has been request of increased budgets. We feel that it is in the interest of the Conference that items in our budget, where possible, without hindrance to work, remain the same.

- 1. The commission recommends for your action and determination here and now, the following budgets for the Conference year beginning June 19, 1961, and ending near May 15, 1962: \$33,233.00.
  - A. In addition to the \$33,233.00 the commission also recommends the amount of \$1.30 (one dollar and thirty cents) per church member for Higher Education and the Wesley Foundation.
  - B. That a Reserve Fund be established by setting aside 5% of all gross income of the conference. In addition to the 5% of all gross income of the Conference, the Commission also recommends that \$1,000 be apportioned to the several charges of the Conference annually, for this fund, until a total amount of \$5.000 has been established.

  - c. Jurisdictional Conference Expense
     740.00 or 2.24%

     d. Area Pastor's School
     800.00 or 2.41%

     e. Interdenominational Co-operation
     485.00 or 1.46%

     f. Area Expense
     3,555.00 or 9.81%

     g. Annual Conference Benevolences to be
  - - inat the regular Annual Conference Benevolences of \$8,040.00 be administered as follows:

      a. Home Mission Board (for promotional work and field cultivation within the conference) . . . . . . . \$ 6,500.00 or 75.23%
  - II. That the Cabinet make the apportionments for the individual charges on the basis of the ratio that other apportionments are made.
    - A. Treasurer's expenses shall not exceed \$600.00 (six hundred dollars).

      B. That the District Superintendents each receive a salary of \$4,500 (four thousand five hundred dollars) per year, travel expense items at \$500 (five hundred dollars) and district parsonage rent at \$600 (six hundred dollars), making a total of \$5,600 (fifty-six hundred dollars) to be prorated to each charge.

C. That the Episcopal Fund shall be an amount equal to 2% (two percent) of the pastor's cash salary.

D. That the Conference claimants shall be an amount equal to 15%

(fifteen percent) of the pastor's cash salary.

E. Special Church Extension-That an amount of fifteen thousand dollars be apportioned to the several charges as special cultivation to be used in new church and parsonage construction and repairs greatly needed on buildings now being used. Special consideration is requested for Norfolk, Va., and Charlotte mission.

- F. That we find a prepared executive secretary by next June to be appointed at the annual conference of June 1962. That this Executive Secretary receive a salary of \$4,000 (four thousand dollars) per year, travel expense items at \$600 (six hundred dollars). House allowance if married \$600 (six hundred dollars), if single \$300 (three hundred dollars); office supplies \$125 (one hundred twenty-five dollars); parttime office secretary \$300 (three hundred dollars); postage \$35 (thirtyfive dollars); expense for Conference and District Staff \$400 (four hundred dollars); making a total of \$6,060.00 (six thousand, sixty dollars) for the Board of Education.
- G. That the Greensboro and Winston Districts be given 27% of all apportionments and that the Western and Laurinburg Districts be given

23% of all apportionments.

H. That each charge of the Conference observe the special days as set forth by the General Conference.

I. That the Ministers' Wives be requested to continue their efforts in the interest of our Conference Reserve Pension Fund and that a special effort be made each year to report \$5,000,00 (five thousand dollars) on this Fund.

This report is on what our Commission has to offer to the local churches in the service of Radio and Film Commission. We have "THE WAY," and many films for children, "THE WAY" alone is being broadcast over 247 stations. In this series we have thirteen half-hour dramas from real life. Here we have the stirring stories about the problems of ordinary people. These are the sort of stories that are reported by newscasters day in and day out. Only our series go much deeper, having an added dimension and a well roundedness that is brought about by the application of the Christian gospel. In "THE WAY," life's tragedies and triumphs take on additional meaning when interpreted through the gospel of love. "THE WAY" is being shown as a live cast right now in many of our own communities.

Out of the thirteen series, we are noting a few of the ones we feel will be

more accepted by our group:

No. I. "AN EYE FOR AN EYE": Could we forgive and help someone who deliberately maimed us? This story is the direct teaching of our Christ, when He says, "Pray for those who mistreat us;" "Turn the other cheek;" "Give the cloak when sued for the coat;" and many others.

No. III. "GIVE US TOMORROW:" This one is trying to point out how we

should act when some tragedy happens to our loved ones.

No. V. "THE TELL TALE ARM:" This one attempts to show how we should treat our family and still succeed in our career. So many of us become too busy

to have time for our family.

No. VIII. "LABOR OF LOVE:" This film concerns itself with our interest in the community to the neglect of our family. Here again this picture is attempting to bring us face to face with our family responsibility regardless of our community interest.

No. X. "UNLAWFUL ENTRY:" This story deals with how we may deal with our past mistakes, when they are seen by our family or others who are

interested in us.

No. XII. "CEILING 500:" This one raises the question, "Must life lose pur-

pose when we have a dead-end job?"

No. XIII. This film is worthwhile considering because it attempts to give guidance as to how to face fatal illnesses with courage and faith.

All of these are great guidance instruments in our daily living and should be

used in and with all our congregations.

b) Giving encouragement to classes in church membership for boys and girls, youth, and adults

c) Seeking habits of individuals worship and family devotions for every individual and family in the church

d) Reactivating the lax and indifferent church members

3. Give full participation to the Quadrennial Emphasis on Spiritual Enrichment. (See Discipline, Paragraph 222.2) The Heart of the program is:

a) Proclamation of the Faith-"Jesus Christ Is Lord." b) Enlisting every Methodist to witness to this faith.

c) Winning individuals and families for Christ.

4. We recommend a week or a month's crusade culminating in the establishment of groups of "THE TWELVE".

5. The Bishops' Evangelistic Crusade, February 9-15, 1959, was the greatest and most successful concerted evangelistic effort to be conducted in the history of the Jurisdiction. The net gain was 10,667 new members. Therefore: We recommend that the Bishops' Evangelistic Crusade be repeated in 1962. The date, March 11-18, The Week of Preparation for Every Methodist.

6. We urge observance of Special Days for Evangelistic Outreach

1) World Wide Communion Sunday-October 1, 1961

The program of the Laymen of the North Carolina Conference is not growing and progressing as we would like or as we have planned. We are endeavoring that this shall not continue.

We urge each pastor to see that every church has a Methodist Men's Club,

and to further see that the charters are up to date at all times.

Every-Member-Canvass: The laymen are charged with the responsibility of taking the leadership with the Every-Member-Canvass. This is the most potent program yet for the betterment of the church organizational-wise and financially. Every church that has availed themselves of this program has been greatly pleased and benefited as a result.

Methodist Men's Conference: The North Carolina Conference is assured that at least eight (8) persons will be in attendance at the 3rd Methodist Men's Conference. Here we hope to gain the necessary stimulus and information that

afford us a more progressive program on the local church level.

We wish to thank the District and Associate Lay Leaders for the commendable job they have done. We are aware of the adversities they have labored under, but in spite of it all a good job is being done and a better job is our prayer.

I have visited on three of the four Districts for Methodist Men's meetings. I have installed officers at three (3) charges and delivered several speeches.

The Lay Leaders, both Conference and District, are available to you for whatever service you may desire of them for the promoting of the Laymen's Program, and we urge your utilization of their service.

We are thankful to you and to God for having had the opportunity to serve

you in this behalf.

#### STEWARDSHIP EMPHASIS in the 1960-64 Quadrennial Program

September through November 1961

The quadrennial theme, "Jesus Christ Is Lord," calls every member of the Methodist Church to new dedication and service as Christian stewards.

"Our lives are not our own. We are given talent and energy to administer for a time as part of our earthly training and testing. As multitudes of our people become faithful stewards and, as one part of their obedience and service of their Lord, set apart the tithe, Methodism will move with increased vigor and exert a more effective influence for Jesus Christ our Lord.

"Every outreach of Methodism, the world around, calls urgently for obedience

in stewardship."

In order to call members of the Methodist Church to new heights in Christian Stewardship, the Department of Stewardship and Finance of the General Board of Lay Activities, recommends the goals listed below. These goals were adopted after deliberate consultation with representatives of every jurisdiction in Methodism together with the entire staff of the General Board of Lay Activities, meeting in Evanston, January 9 and 10, 1961.

1. That every member of the Methodist Church shall be challenged to become

a committed tither.

 That the World Service asking of 15 million dollars per year during the 1960-64 Quadrennium shall be realized or exceeded.

3. That, as a minimum goal, the per capita giving of the members of the

Methodist Church be doubled by 1968.

 That our Church shall accept a long range goal in giving to Benevolences whereby we will give as much for others as for ourselves.

That our Methodist families shall be challenged to be good stewards in the writing of their wills whereby they will make provisions to aid the Benevolent causes of the Church.

The achievement of these goals should be considered not as the maximum but as the minimum undertaking. The world situation brings a note of urgency to every person who claims any allegiance to Jesus Christ. Let us exceed these goals in the spirit of Him who never calculated the cost but in the spirit of self-sacrifice offered the abundant life to all people.

#### CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

By W. T. Brown

The Quadrennial Emphasis Committee of the Council of Bishops has declared: "The Methodist Church sets its mind, heart, and energies to renew the springs of its faith, and engage in spiritual disciplines and discoveries to make Jesus

Christ the Lord of every phase of life."

What do Methodists mean when they talk about renewing their faith? They mean a fresh experience of Jesus Christ as Lord. This emphasis on experience is important. It means not only knowing about Jesus, but it means knowing Jesus through a personal experience of him. To experience Jesus is to be completely surrendered to him. To experience Jesus as Lord means our dependence upon the presence and power of the Holy Spirit as st forth in the New Testament. If we really know Jesus Christ as Lord, we will be compelled to be concerned about building a Christian society.

May I say here that I am afraid that in our efforts to build a better society we put too much emphasis upon pressure tactics and not enough upon the need for people who have been converted—who have received a transform-

ing experience of Jesus Christ.

The Methodist Church is concerned with three broad areas of social education and action. I shall discuss each of these briefly.

AREA NUMBER ONE: This area is the Division of Temperance and General Welfare. It is the responsibility of this Division to conduct research, education, and action centering around the following issues: alcohol problems, addiction to injurious habits such as use of tobacco and drugs, gambling, pornography, juvenile delinquency and crime, penal system and rehabilitation, mental health and medical care, problems of the aging, population and planned parenthood, traffic

safety, and capital punishment.

Since time will not permit me to discuss each of these issues, I shall discuss briefly the problem of alcohol. It is my conviction that the basic solution to the problem of alcohol is to get people to accept Jesus Christ as Lord. A transforming experience of Jesus Christ is the solution to this problem. Some years ago, the director of a large American Chemical Company sought help for his alcoholism from the famous Swiss psychiatrist, Carl Jung. Dr. Howard J. Clinebell, Jr., reporting on this case in his book, Understanding And Counseling The Alcoholic. says, "Dr. Jung went over his case very carefully and then told him that nothing but a religious conversion could give him any lasting help. The man returned to America where he received help in the Oxford Group Movement. Interestingly enough, he later became one of the 'pre-founders' of an amazing group that has given us the most convincing evidence of the therapeutic effectiveness of religion-Alcoholics Anonymous. This group has reclaimed from the scrap heap of society more than 130,000 'hopeless' alcoholics."

Another example of the power of religion to solve the problem of alcohol is given by Dr. E. Stanley Jones in his book, Conversion. He says of a Y.W.C.A. Secretary: "She told me she was inwardly shot to pieces, but had to keep up appearances of religion in her job. I told her that it takes twice as much power for an airplane to get off the earth as it does to fly, that the really difficult thing is to break with the old life of make-believe and of keeping up appearances. Once you are off and make a clean break it is easier. We prayed together, As we did so she opened her eyes in surprise and said: 'Why, I'm off!' She was! She opened her purse and handed me her liquor flask saying, "I won't need that any more'. Then her gold cigarette case, saying: 'You can sell that for missions! Then her sleeping pills: 'I won't need those crutches anymore.' And she didn't. Later she told me: 'When I look back on my past life it seems to belong to another person. I'm free-free from my frustrated past.' Christ stood between her and that past, and she couldn't see the past-she saw him."

Jesus Christ is Lord of the alcohol problem!

This brings us to a consideration of area number two. This area is the Division of Peace and World Order. It is the responsibility of this Division to conduct research, education, and action centering around the following issues: American foreign policy, the United Nations and related international organizations, disarmament and nuclear weapon control, space control, foreign aid, tariffs and trade, immigration and naturalization, military policy, and conscription legislation, and conscientious objectors and the draft.

Since space control is one of the most important issues in international rela-

tions today, I shall lift it up for brief discussion.

What are going to be some of the practical applications of man's going into outer space? Space experts are telling us that by the year 2,000 man will be traveling at speeds up to 50,000 miles per hour. At this rate of speed the moon will be only a few hours away. People will be able to work any where on earth and go home for dinner in the evening. With this kind of shrunken earth, we must become world citizens. In spite of differences, the people of the world will be forced to unite.

There is another practical application of man's venture into outer space. One of the great headaches of the farmer has been his uncertainty about the weather. If man could accurately forecast droughts, freezes, floods, and hurricanes he could save the farmer and consumer billions of dollars annually.

I believe that man will eventually develop weather reconnaissance satellites

which will enable him to make long-range weather forecasts.

I also believe that man will develop weather control space vehicles. Think of what this will mean to the agricultural economy of the world.

Jesus Christ is Lord of the international order!

We now come to a consideration of area number three. This area is the Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs. It is the responsibility of this Division to conduct research, education, and action centering around the following issues: Race relations, civil liberties, public policy on education, church and state, civic responsibility, labor-management relations, agriculture, conservation, government and private economic policy and practices, technological change, unemployment, housing and migrant labor.

What is the solution to race and economic problems? The only ultimate solution to these problems is for men to make Jesus Christ the Lord of their lives.

When men really know Jesus they will love and respect each other.

Our world today needs a revolution. It needs a revolution of love—a revolution in the hearts and minds of men.

Jesus Christ is Lord of the social order!

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PEACE AND WORLD ORDER THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

The Committee on Peace and World Order of the Conference Board of

Christian Social Concerns submits the following report.

It is the responsibility of this committee to conduct research, education, and action centering around the following issues: American foreign policy, the United Nations and related international organizations, disarmament and nuclear weapon control, space control, foreign aid, tariffs and trade, immigration and naturalization, military policy and conscription legislation, and conscientious objectors and the draft.

Since man's going into outer space is one of the most important issues in international relations today, let us consider some of the peaceful uses of outer

space.

What are going to be some of the practical applications of space power? Space experts are telling us that by the year 2,000 man will be traveling at speeds up to 50,000 miles per hour. At this rate of speed the moon will be only a few hours away. People will be able to work anywhere on earth and go home for dinner in the evening. With this kind of shrunken earth, we must become world citizens. In spite of differences, the people of the world will be forced to unite.

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I believe that man will eventually develop weather reconnaissance satellites which will enable him to make long-range weather forecasts.

I also believe that man will develop weather control space vehicles. Think

of what this will mean to the agricultural economy of the world.

With the coming of the high-altitude satellite, there is going to be faster social communication between the nations of the earth. Satellites are going to

give us our first world-wide communications system.

Donald Cox and Michael Stoiko, in their book, Spacepower, tell us that "A universal series of radio and television networks circling the globe will be possible as a result of simultaneous global ocean-spanning television with satellites acting as relay stations. For the first time, man will immediately be able to see as well as hear events taking place anywhere on the earth's surface. This fact should help diplomats prevent trouble spots from erupting into 'brush fire' wars or global conflicts."

One of the great questions today is: Will man be able to land safely on the moon? It seems reasonable to assume that he will.

What will be some of the advantages of such landing? The moon could serve as a space station for further exploration of the solar system and beyond. Again, the moon could serve as an international scientific research center. Since there is no atmosphere on the moon, it would be easier to observe the stars and the planets. Hence, important astronomical data could be relayed back to the earth.

A United Nations Moon Mission would be a real symbol of international cooperation.

## REPORT OF OBJECTIVES FROM THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND GENERAL WELFARE

Bishop Love, members of the Conference, delegates and friends:

In compliance with the direction of the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns, this report is prepared and submitted to present the objectives of the Committee on Temperance and General Welfare. This committee does not have a report of work done in the previous year since it did not function. Lack of function in the past year is attributed to two reasons. They are: Lateness in the conference year to become properly organized with the election of a chairman, and lack of funds necessary for operation.

In the ensuing year it is the desire and intention of this Committee on Temperance and General Welfare to follow the program emphases as prepared by the General Division of Temperance and General Welfare of the Methodist Church. This program is outlined as follows:

Fall: A local church and/or commission study of community social welfare needs. The text will be "Compassion and Community," by Haskel Miller. A Leader's Guide will be prepared listing additional resources and recommending andio-visuals.

Winter: Commitment Day and Christmas for Christ, both with a family emphasis. Paragraph 1536 of the Methodist Discipline states that the first Sunday in December shall be observed as Commitment day to enlist Methodists and to encourage others to commit themselves to personal abstinence from alcoholic beverages and to temperate living and to challenge church members to creative action for a sober home and social life.

Spring: National Council of Churches Emphasis on "Family In Rapid Social Change"

- 1. Cooperation with the Committee on Family Life in the Local Church.
- 2. Attendance at the National Methodist Family Life Conference. The Chairman of the Committee and other key members should attend. The dates are October 22-27, and the place is Cleveland, Ohio.
- A special study on Social Welfare Needs of Families In The Local Community. A new Blueprint will be prepared recommending study, analysis and action with specific resources.

Pastors and local church commissions on Christian Social Concerns desiring materials and information to execute their local church programs may obtain the same from The Methodist Building, 100 Maryland Avenue, N.E., Washington 2, D. C.

It is also the objective of this Committee to work with the District Secretaries of Christian Social Concerns and to lend support to The District Superintendents and ministers of the North Carolina Conference in establishing and executing effective programs in the Temperance and General Welfare Division

of Christian Social Concerns. In this area of endeavor we shall realize that Jesus Christ is Lord of all our lives.

#### BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT

The primary aim of Christian Education is to help growing personalities of all ages to become progressively Christ-like in spirit, thought and conduct. In attempting to develop this aim, the Board of Education has had the difficult task of attempting to "make brick without straw." It is the opinion of the Board of Education that the Conference needs a working philosophy of Christian Education, an adequate program of Christian Education based on this philosophy, and sufficient finance to support this program.

In order to accomplish this primary aim of Christian Education, a trained leadership is indispensable. No program or movement arises above its leader. If the North Carolina Conference is to survive, not to mention grow, it is imperative that we provide leadership training on the Conference, District, Subdistrict, and Local Church levels. We therefore recommend the following:

- 1. That the North Carolina Conference employ an Executive Secretary of the Board of Education on a full-time basis, beginning with the Conference year of 1962.
- 2. That the North Carolina Conference Commission on World Service and Finance include in the budget an apportionment for Christian Education in the Conference. The Board recommends the following:

#### Excerpts From The

## Report of the Interconference Commission on College and University Religious Work to the Methodists in North Carolina

The Interconference Commission on College and University Religious Work has a new name! Before this quadrennium, it was referred to as the Interconference Commission on Student Religious Work. Now, however, it is felt that there is more to the ministry on the campus than just ministering to the students, for often, the faculty members and staff also are recipients of our ministry.

Let us examine this initial word of our title, Interconference. When the General Conference of the Methodist Church delegates to the annual conferences its ministry to campuses, it requests that wherever there is more than one annual conference operating in a given state or similar region that the boards of education of the annual conferences appoint representatives to form an Interconference Commission. Hence, in North Carolina we now have an Interconference Commission composed of representatives of the three annual conferences of Methodism in this state; namely, the North Carolina Conference, and the Western North Carolina Conference both of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, and the North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction. There is an executive committee representing persons of all of the three conferences, and the three elected officers happen to come in this case from each of the three conferences.

Our ministry to the more than 16,000 Methodists who are studying in the nearly 60 colleges and junior colleges of North Carolina is a tremendous task.

The three annual conferences of Methodism in North Carolina invest some \$57,000 in program funds to carry on this ministry. In addition, they invest thousands of dollars for the extension of physical facilities.

The Interconference Commission has no money of its own. Rather, its task is to examine the needs of the Methodist ministry to campuses throughout the state and to present these needs to the annual conferences. This is done through appearing before the commissions on World Service and Finance. After the World Service commissions have made their recommendations, and these have gone through the annual conference business sessions, then the amounts of money which are allocated to the various campuses are sent through the Interconference Commission. It is the task of the Interconference Commission to, as conscientiously as possible, allocate funds to the various causes. In all three conferences, these funds are collected during one conference year and spent during the following conference year. Hence, we know at the first of each year, the amount of money that will be available during that year.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Mr. Chairman, and members of the Board of Education:

The role of Executive Secretary of the Board of Education in the North Caro lina Conference has been a difficult one to play this year. There are several reasons for this. One is the triple role in which the person in this office is cast; Two, the lack of anything that approximates adequate experience on the part of the Executive Secretary; Three, the absence of a working philosophy of, and an enthusiasm for a good program of Christian education in the Conference; Four, inadequate financial and moral support; Five, the seeming inability on the part of the Conference in general, to discern the values to be derived from an effective program of Christian Education. It is my conviction that once we are over these hurdles, the Conference will be on the road to progress in Christian education.

Very little has been done in the matter of program this year, because of the problems aforementioned, plus some others which I choose to call intangibles. Where the Executive Secretary lives is one example. Another reason for a lack of program is the fact that I am a newcomer to the office which has made it necessary for me to feel my way along, gathering information where I could find it. I have spent most of my time trying to determine exactly what it is I am supposed to be doing. There was very little to go upon in a way of records and program, or materials.

I have been able to do a few things, such as gathering ideas and materials out of which a program can be formulated. I have observed the educational needs of the Conference which can be used as a barometer for building a program. Some of the needs as I have observed are: Training for local church leaders such Commissions and Official Boards; Program Building in the local church; Music in the local church; The General Church Program; The Quadrennial Emphasis; Missions and Evangelism, Age Group Programs, and Leadership Training Opportunities. The name and address of the Church School Superintendents, the Membership Cultivation Superintendent, and the Chairman of the Commission on Education, should be sent to the Executive Secretary's office. Machinery should be set in motion immediately to meet these needs.

Some work has been done on districts this year in which I feel something was accomplished. The Laurinburg and Western districts held Christian Workers Schools. Some one hundred people were involved in these two schools. The Greensboro District held a seminar for local church leaders. The Youth Assembly at Bennett College brought together eighty young people who were engaged in study and fellowship.

The Board of Education cooperated with the Board of Evangelism in a joint thrust in the area of visitation.

It is my hope that a more adequate program which meets the needs of the several churches of our conference can and will be instituted another year. It is also my hope that a sufficient amount of funds will be available to support the program. Your conference program of Christian Education will be as strong or weak, adequate or inadequate, as you make it.

## REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION

## THE AGRICULTURAL AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE

Greensboro, North Carolina

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

I began my work as Director of the Wesley Foundation at the Agricultural and Technical College in September of this Conference year.

It is a great challenge to work as a religious leader among college students

in these days.

One of the achievements of the year was the offering of a non-credit course, entitled, "Religion on the Campus." The course dealt with such topics as "Religion and Scholarship," "Religion and the Natural Sciences," and "Religion and the Fine Arts."

In October, I attended a Fall Retreat sponsored by the North Carolina Methodist Student Movement at Camp Chestnut Ridge. A student delegate was

appointed to attend but could not be present because of illness.

From October 28 through October 30, the State Student Movement sponsored a "Conference on Racial Tensions" at Centenary Methodist Church in Winston-Salem. North Carolina. The Director and two students attended the Saturday, October 29, session of this Conference.

On November 16, the Director and five students presented a program at High Point College in High Point, North Carolina. We were invited to give this

program by the Methodist Student Fellowship at the college.

January 22-26, 1961 was Religious Emphasis Week at The Agricultural and Technical College. The Director and several students took part in the Religious Emphasis Week Program. We sponsored a question-answer session on the topic: "Is Christianity The Answer To The Problems of Our Time."

From Jaruary 27 through January 29, the State Methodist Student Conference was held at Duke University, Durham, North Carolina. The Director and four student delegates attended this Conference. The theme of the Conference

was, "The Mission of the Church in Higher Education."

On February 19, I preached at the Sunday evening Vesper Service at the Agricultural and Technical College. I spoke on the subject "How Shall We Think of Religion in this Scientific Age?

On Sunday, February 26, thirty students from High Point College came to visit us and presented an excellent discussion on some of the problems of college

students.

On February 19, we presented to the campus, Dr. William Brown, a missionary from Liberia, Africa. He spent a day on the campus interviewing students and faculty members. That evening, he spoke to a group of students and faculty members. His address dealt with the mission of the church in Africa, the Christien World Mission and opportunities for service in a world in revolution. He received an enthusiastic response,

On March 1, at the invitation of a group of students, I spoke on a panel discussion at Greensboro College. The topic for the panel was: "Economic and Social Problems In Race Relations." The moderator for the panel was Mr. William Sanders, cartoonist for the Greensboro Daily News. Other members of the panel were Mr. C. E. Garth, Professor of Sociology at Bennett College, and

Mr. Benjamin Wilson. Professor of English at Greensboro College.

In April, one of our students, Mr. Esli Holder, attended a week-long seminar in New York City. The title of the seminar was: "The Impact of Urbanization and Technology on Twentieth Century Man." The seminar was sponsored by The Commission on World Mission of the National Student Christian Federation. Mr. Holder's attendance was made possible by a scholarship which Bennett College shared with us. Bennett received two \$125 scholarships from the Woman's Division of Christian Service and decided to share one of them with us.

Miss Geneva J. Holmes, Dean of Women at A. and T. College and a member of our Board of Directors, and two students, Misses Patricia Fulton and Violet Lewis, will represent the Wesley Foundation at the Seventh National Methodist Student Movement Conference at the University of Illinois in Urbana, August 26-31, 1961.

The Misses Fulton and Lewis have been granted scholarships of \$46.25 to aid them in attending the Conference in Urbana. These scholarships, granted by the Department of Student Work of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, will cover registration, room, and board. The Wesley Foundation will pay the \$120 traveling expenses.

Next year, we plan to offer two non-credit courses, namely: "Christian Beliefs," and "Religion and Science." Other plans are for prayer cells in each dormitory, formal worship service twice each month, and a fellowship hour

twice each month.

I am happy to say that one student, Mr. Ralph Holland, made a decision to enter the ministry. After graduation from college, he plans to enter one of our Methodist Theological Schools.

Bishop Love, I thank you and all of those who made possible my work at the

Agricultural and Technical College this year.

#### REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

In the Name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen. Members of the Council and Friends:

It is with thanksgiving to God and with profound gratitude to all with whom I am privileged to work that I submit this—my fourth bi-quadrennial report to the Baltimore Area Council.

These have been eight eventful years for our Area under the leadership of Bishop Edgar Amos Love, one of Methodism's foremost episcopal leaders. Bishop Love has been fortunate in having as his cabinets in the respective Annual Conferences men of high dedication and great ability, who have led our churches forward in membership gains, in missionary vision, in Christian educational improvement, and in the awareness of their Christian stewardship responsibility.

We do not claim perfection for these cabinets. Every chain is said to have

a weak link. We Methodists do not claim perfection even for our bishops . . . and certainly not for their administrative assistants and their cabinets. All are human and subject to err; all have fallen short of the glory of God—but happily, when we have fallen, we have fallen forward, facing our goal—never retreating—and praying for strength to continue the fight.

Our pulpits, too, are manned by pastors of marked leadership. Here, too, we have, as can be expected, weak spots. Some have served beyond their time of genuine productivity, and some simply expect to be "carried to the skies on flowery beds of ease, while others fight to win the prize, and sail through bloody

seas.

But here are bright signs for the bright future: Our churches generally throughout the Area, are kept clean. At long last, in most places, we believe, even the country cemetery can be located, and our members can find the final resting places of their lost loved ones. The quality of worship is definitely on the upper level. In practically every urban church there is a fairly high type of weekly bulletin service. This is true also of most town and of many rural churches

We note with regret the loss of the East Tennessee Conference in our Area fellowship. By action of the recent Central Jurisdictional Conference, this conference is now a part of the new Nashville-Birmingham Area. Under the youthful and vigorous leadership of Bishop Charles F. Golden, we expect our East Tennessee Conference churches to be welded into a stronger unit—and we hope personally to see them unite with the Tennessee Conference to form a Methodist unit in that Great State.

This brings us to our first recommendation, involving our financial structure.

We recommend that our Annual Conference Area percentages be adjusted as follows:

 Delaware Conference
 40%
 (formerly 34%)

 Washington Conference
 40%
 (formerly 34%)

 North Carolina Conference
 20%
 (the same)

East Tennessee Conference was 12%

We recommend further that the Annual Conferences make these percentages retroactive as of the 1960 fiscal year, since we have received no support from the East Tennessee Conference this year. This would enable us to meet our obligations this year without embarrassment.

(The Area Expense budget for the quadrennium was presented to the Area Council of 1959 in Bluefield, W. Va., was adopted by the Council and passed on to the Annual Conferences, where it was further adopted by those respective bodies. The total is \$16,000 annually. The remaining \$4,000 required to operate the Area Office comes from General Promotion Funds.)

We urge the Annual Conferences to help us execute successfully the group insurance plan, operative in all three of the conferences. The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company has raid promptly all claims of deceased pastors to date: nine in the Delaware Conference, four in the Washington Conference. There have been no deaths among active pastors in the North Carolina Conference since the plan went into effect, September 1, 1959.

The Annual Ministers Wives Retreat has become one of our major promotional projects. It should be supported more largely by the churches, which should first be encouraged by the pastors to send their wives to this important conference. They will come home better equipped to assist you in your work,

Brothers.

THE MESSENGER struggles along, still woefully inadequately supported by our constituency. We do not have time to promote subscriptions and sales. We must depend on pasters, who themselves believe in the medium of the printed word, to be our promotional agents.

The Area Office is the center from which the life stream of our total Area program flows. We are anxious to serve the Area, through conferences, seminars, workshops, retreats and other ways. Please call upon us. Please read our mail

#### XIV Historical View

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conference. In the year 1836, the General Conference was set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned, there were two Conferences.

Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes from the Conference Journal for those years,

dom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became a part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some of the colored members entered the A.M.E. Church, some the Colored M.E. Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church as it returned to the State At the Conference of December 4, 1844, there were 10,495 white members and 3,100 colored. Without consulting the wiswhich is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and in 1865, when at the close of the War, the M.E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina

after the Civil War.

From the North Carolina Conference, the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices. Conference.




