Conference Rules of Order

THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 a.m. and open with devotional exercises, and close at 12:30 p.m.
2. The Memorial Services shall be held the first morning of the Conference immediately following the Communion Service and shall include the calling of the roll of the honored dead.
3. The nominating committee consisting of five persons shall be appointed by the bishop quadrennially.

The program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a committee composed of the Host Pastor, the Host Superintendent, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President, Woman's Society of Christian Service, Conference Secretary, and two persons named by the Nominating Committee, in consultation with the Bishop, *Com. M. Y. F. President*
14. When a member wishes to speak he must arise and address the chair and shall not proceed until he is properly recognized by the presiding officer.
15. No member shall speak on any question more than once until all who wish to do so have spoken, nor shall a member speak more than ten minutes except by permission of the Conference.
16. Motions made and seconded, reports made and accepted are to be deemed the property of the Conference and cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the Conference.
17. All motions to lay on the table, to take from the table, shall be taken without debate, but the one who offers a formal motion or resolution shall have five minutes to close debates and this right shall not be forfeited by a motion ordering the previous question or to lay on the table.
18. All questions of privilege shall be decided by the president.
19. No member of the Conference shall be recognized who is outside the boundary of the Conference.
20. The following motions may take precedence of the original motion or precedence of each other in the order given here; (a) to adjourn to a given

time; (b) to adjourn indefinitely; (c) to take up the order of the day; (d) to lay on the table; (e) to move up the order of the day; (f) to postpone to a given time; (g) to refer to a committee; (h) to amend; (i) to postpone indefinitely.

21. Any person voting with the majority may move a reconsideration, but such motion shall not be debatable.

22. The yeas and nays may be taken on any motion on the call of one-third of the members present.

23. These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the Conference.

24. These rules may be amended at any regular session of the Conference at least one day before action is taken.

Constitution

BOARD OF MANAGERS—BALTIMORE AREA PASTORS' SCHOOL
THE METHODIST CHURCH

Herewith is transmitted the Constitution of the Board of Managers Baltimore Area Pastors' School—The Methodist Church, and adopted by the Board of Managers in session at Baltimore, Maryland, Sept. 11, 1957.

ARTICLE I. NAME AND PURPOSE

Section 1. **Name**—The name of this Board shall be the Board of Managers of the Baltimore Area Pastors' School—The Methodist Church.

Section 2. **Purpose**—The purpose shall be to provide counsel, make plans, elect a dean and other officers, staff members and teachers (nominated by the dean), set up a budget, approve recommendations and reports, set the time and place of the Pastors' School and to transact any other business pertaining to the school.

ARTICLE II. BOARD MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the Board shall consist of: The Resident Bishop and three members from each of the Annual Conferences of the Area. Two of the three conference representatives shall be nominated by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and elected by the Conference Education, the third representative shall be the Executive Secretary of Christian Education. They shall be elected at the first session of the quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium. They shall take office at the first meeting of the Board, called by the Resident Bishop, after each of the Annual Conferences shall have met.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS AND DUTIES

Section 1. **Officers**—The officers shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary and a Treasurer. Each conference shall be represented in, at least, one office. They shall be elected quadrennially from the membership of the Board at the first annual meeting of the new quadrennium, by a majority of the members of the Board, after being nominated by the Nominating Committee or from the floor.

Section 2. **President**—The President shall preside at meetings of the Board, countersign all checks drawn on the treasury, represent the Board when necessary and perform other duties normally performed by a president.

Section 3. **Vice-President**—The Vice-President shall preside and act in the absence of the President and assist the President when needed.

Section 4. **Secretary**—The Secretary shall record the minutes, send out notices of all meetings and keep the president and members informed of any matters germane to the Board of Pastors' School.

Section 5. **Assistant Secretary**—The Assistant Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary in his absence and shall assist the Secretary when necessary.

Section 6. **Treasurer**—The Treasurer shall have charge of all monies of the Board, deposit the same in an account known as "The Baltimore Pastors' School", and shall write and sign all checks. He shall disburse funds only upon written order signed by the Secretary with the exception of bills pertaining to the expense of the school session. In such case the dean shall sign the order and report the same to the Secretary.

ARTICLE IV. MEETINGS

Section 1. **Time**—The Board shall meet annually on the first Tuesday in October. The place and hour to be determined by the President in consultation with the Resident Bishop. This date may be altered by the Executive Committee provided it shall be held in the Fall of the year. Special meetings may be called by the President or by a majority of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. **Quorum**—Seven members shall constitute a quorum for transacting business not otherwise specified, provided at least one member from three conferences of the Baltimore Area is present.

ARTICLE V. COMMITTEES

Section 1. **Committees**—There shall be the following committees representative of each of the Annual Conferences and consisting of not less than four persons: Executive Committee, Nominating Committee, and Recommendations Committee.

Meetings of committees shall be regulated by the Board of Managers, and time and place of meetings shall be subject to the call of the chairman.

Section 2. **Executive**—The Executive Committee shall be composed of the elected officers and the Resident Bishop. The President and Secretary of the Board shall be the chairman and secretary of this committee. It shall act for the Board between meetings in matters that are necessary to be acted upon before the next Board meeting and report its action to the next Board meeting. It shall constitute the Finance Committee and recommend a budget to the Board after consultation with the dean. It shall have the financial records audited by a certified public accountant.

Section 3. **Nominating**—The Nominating Committee shall nominate the officers of the Board of Managers, the business manager, the dean and other administrative officers provided that others may be nominated from the floor. It shall be composed of one person from each Conference elected by the Board and shall elect its own chairman.

Section 4. **Recommendations**—The Recommendations Committee shall examine all reports, receive recommendations from members of the Board, officers of the school, the Department of Ministerial Education and other sources; counsel with the dean and others; and shall make any recommendations, as a result of the above procedure or otherwise, to the Board of Directors. The vice-president shall be chairman of this committee.

ARTICLE VI. PASTORS' SCHOOL

Section 1. **Sessions**—The time and place of the school sessions shall be set by the Board of Managers.

Section 2. **Courses**—Courses of the school shall be elected by the dean according to the procedure of the rules of the Department of Ministerial Education.

Section 3. **Dean**—The dean shall be elected at the first meeting of the new quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium, or until his successor is elected. He shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the incoming Board of Managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the administration of the school in keeping with the rules and recommendations of the Board of Managers and

the Department of Ministerial Education. He shall submit a written report, by mail, of the school to the Recommendations Committee following the school session; and a written report in person at the next Board meeting; at the same time he shall submit nominations for the faculty of the coming school session.

Section 4. The Faculty—The faculty shall be nominated by the dean after consultation with the resident bishop and the director of the Department of Ministerial Education.

Section 5. Business Manager—The business manager shall be elected quadrennially at the first annual meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the business proceedings of the school in cooperation with the dean.

ARTICLE VII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Board meetings in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution of the Board.

ARTICLE VIII. METHOD OF AMENDING

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner:

A proposed amendment shall be submitted in writing to the secretary, at least sixty days before the annual meeting of the Board of Managers. The secretary shall send the same through mail to all of the members of the Board. The proposed amendment shall be submitted by the secretary to the Board in session and shall require a three-fourths vote of the members present and voting, for adoption.

Any part of this Constitution in conflict with the Discipline of the Methodist Church or the rules of the Department of Ministerial Education shall be amended after the Board of Managers reviews the same.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE
COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Beginning June 10, 1963 and ending near May 15, 1964

Bishop Love, your Commission on World Service and Finance of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church wishes to present its report for the coming Conference Year. The Commission has considered sincerely and prayerfully all requests, particularly where there has been request of increased budgets. We feel that it is in the interest of the Conference that items in our budget, where possible, without hindrance to work, remain the same.

- I. The Commission recommends for your action and determination here and now, the following budgets for the Conference year, beginning June 10, 1963 and ending near May 15, 1964, \$34,784.65.
 - A. In addition to the \$34,784.65 the Commission also recommends the amount of \$1.30 (one dollar and thirty cents) per church member for Higher Education and the Wesley Foundation.
 - B. That a Reserve Fund be established by setting aside 5% of all gross income of the conference. In addition to the 5% of all gross income of the Conference, the Conference also recommends that \$1,000 be apportioned to the several charges of the Conference annually, for this fund, until a total amount of \$5,000 has been established.
 - C. For World Service General Administration and annual Conference Benevolence \$34,784.65
 1. To be administered in the following apportionments:

a. World Service	\$18,513.00	or 53.2%
b. General Administration	776.00	or 2.2%
c. Jurisdictional Conference Expense	740.00	or 2.1%
d. Area Pastor's School	800.00	or 2.3%
e. Interdenomination Co-operation	485.00	or 1.4%
f. Area Expense	3,555.00	or 10.2%
g. The Methodist Corporation	925.65	or 2.7%
h. Annual Conference Benevolence to be administered on a percent basis	8,990.00	or 25.9%
 2. That the regular Annual Conference Benevolences \$8,990.00 be administered as follows:

a. Home Mission Board (for promotional work and field cultivation within the conference)	6,500.00	or 72.3%
b. Board of Lay Activities	225.00	or 2.5%
c. Home Mission Board Expenses	600.00	or 6.7%
d. Commission on Town and Country wk.	150.00	or 1.8%
e. Board of Evangelism	200.00	or 2.2%
f. Com. on World Serv. & Finance	100.00	or 1.1%
g. Board of Christian Soc. Concern	300.00	or 3.3%
h. Home Life Commission	40.00	or .4%
i. Area Leadership School	400.00	or 4.4%
j. Methodist Television Ministry	350.00	or 3.9%
k. Methodist Information & Public Relations Commission	100.00	or 1.1%
l. Commission on Cultivation and Promotions	25.00	or .3%
- II. That the Cabinet make the apportionments for the individual charges on the basis of the ratio that other apportionments are made.

- A. Treasurer's expenses shall be \$1,000 (one thousand dollars).
- B. That the Conference Secretary shall receive an amount of \$300.00 (three hundred dollars).
- C. That the Statistician shall receive \$150.00 (one hundred fifty dollars).
- D. That the District Superintendents each receive a salary of \$5,000 (five thousand dollars) per year, travel expense items at \$500.00, and district parsonage rent at \$600.00 (six hundred dollars) making a total of \$6,100.00 (six thousand one hundred dollars) to be prorated to each charge.
- E. That the Episcopal Fund shall be an amount equal to 2% (two percent) of the pastor's cash salary.
- F. That the Conference claimants shall be an amount equal to 15% (fifteen percent) of the pastor's cash salary.
- G. Special Church Extension—That an amount of fifteen thousand dollars be apportioned to the several charges as special cultivation to be used in new church and parsonage construction and repairs greatly needed on buildings now being used. Special consideration is requested for Norfolk, Va. and Charlotte Mission.
- H. That we find a prepared Executive Secretary by next June to be appointed at the Annual Conference of June 1964. That this Executive Secretary receive a salary of \$4,000 (four thousand dollars) per year, travel expense items at \$600 (six hundred dollars), if single \$300 (three hundred dollars), office supplies \$125 (one hundred twenty-five dollars), part time office secretary \$300 (three hundred dollars), postage \$35 (thirty five dollars), expense for Conference Board \$200 (two hundred dollars) and District Staff \$200 (two hundred dollars) each, making a total of \$6,060.00 (six thousand sixty dollars) for the Board of Education.
- I. That the part time Executive Secretary this year shall receive a salary of \$900 (nine hundred dollars) per year, travel expense \$300 (three hundred dollars) and promotional expense \$100 (one hundred dollars) making a total of \$1,300 (thirteen hundred dollars) to be taken from the amount raised for an Executive Secretary in last year's apportionment.
- J. That the Greensboro and Winston Districts be given 27% of all apportionments and that the Western and Laurinburg Districts be given 23% of all apportionments.
- K. That each charge, of the Conference observe the special days as set fourth by the General Conference.
- L. That the Minister's Wives be requested to continue their efforts in the interest of our Conference Reserve Pension Fund and that a special effort be made each year to report \$5,000.00 (five thousand dollars) on this Fund.

REPORT OF THE GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Fellow Ministers, Laymen, and Visiting Friends:

As I come before you to make my sixth annual report as district superintendent, I am indeed grateful to Almighty God for health, strength, guidance and protection during my tenure in this capacity.

To you, Bishop Love, it is difficult to find words that would adequately express my appreciation for your having given me this opportunity to serve our great Church and my Conference in this position. I trust I have not failed you in the confidence placed in me.

To you, my brother ministers and laymen of both the Winston and Greensboro Districts, I feel indebted to you for the remainder of my days of

service in the North Carolina Conference. You have been most loyal to the program of the District, so much so, that I have taken great pride in the reports that I have been called upon to make; for this I am grateful. The warm reception and generous hospitality accorded me, by you, have made the years seem short and the work pleasant.

Shortly after the adjournment of the Annual Conference, ministers and lay leadership of the local churches were called together at what has become known as our "kick off" meeting. This one-evening-session was held at Union Memorial with most of the charges on the District having representatives in attendance. Those who participated on the program gave special attention and emphasis to the work and know-how of the Commissions on Stewardship, Evangelism, and, Social Concerns as they relate to the two hundred-twenty-fifth Aldersgate Celebration. This meeting set the tone for much of the accomplishment of the year's work.

In our quarterly rounds and conferences, I have constantly emphasized that our greatest success comes through the proper functioning of the various Commissions. I have been able to visit every charge each quarter, except the charges in Virginia. These I visited twice. In our first quarterly conferences, membership goals of eight hundred were set for the conference year. While our hopes and interest in evangelism were high, according to our last quarterly conference reports we reached less than half our goal.

We formed an organization known as The Greensboro District Ministers' Fellowship which met monthly, by invitation, in some section of the District. This organization served to keep us informed and working together as a unit as well as furnish enjoyable fellowship and stimulate our morale.

The response to both general and conference benevolences again this year has improved. The reports on these items, with the exception of a few churches will show a very substantial increase. The number striving for 100% has also increased this year. Again, I rejoice to say that the spirit in which these gains have been made is in keeping with a sense of stewardship.

Our District Conference marks one of the highlights of the District activity. The program led by the District leaders and conference officers was a challenge as well as were reports of work accomplished. Wesley Chapel was host to the conference. The Reverend W. L. Napper and his good people left no stone unturned in preparation for our coming.

The physical aspects of our District continue to progress. Last year I told you about new church edifices at Leaksville, Wentworth, Saint Paul, and Mount Zion. Wesley Chapel's new carpet and completion of educational unit; Mount Carmel and Holmes Grove purchasing new sites. To these I wish to add: Cox's Chapel, complete renovation both inside and outside making it a new structure. Garland Warren is the pastor. Jackson on the Brown Summit Charge, Sampson Bouie, minister, has raised over eight thousand dollars in the last two years; paid benevolences in full at the Bennett College Roll Call. Their plan is to start building in July. Bass' Chapel plans to begin its educational unit in July at a cost of twenty-three thousand dollars. Belvin Jessup is the minister. Chapel Hill Church on the Wesley Chapel Charge is awaiting the approval of plans to begin their new church building in July. W. L. Napper is the minister. New Goshen, under the leadership of Eugene Black, is progressing with their plans to build a new sanctuary. All of these projects are following the directions of the Board of National Missions. Reidsville, St. Paul, has completely renovated their building, put in new pews and pulpit furniture at a cost of more than eight thousand dollars. J. B. Bethea is the minister.

While the above congregations and ministers have been mentioned in their accomplishments in the area of improving the physical plants, there are others whose work in other areas deserves equal commendation, but as is always the case, time will not permit me to mention every individual achievement. Please indulge me, however, to say that the above mentioned highlights are reflective of the dedication and loyalty of the Greensboro

team. Without this kind of support from each minister I could not stand here proud, yet humble, and make such a report.

Last, but not least, on occasions such as this when making our report, there are two groups that stand out in our minds; the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Ministers' Wives. No words can describe the significant role they play in the success of the total program of the Church. Their support is reflected in special contributions as well as in a general way. This we shall be able to see in their special report of activities.

In conclusion, may I say all has not been easy. There have been long sleepless nights, long lonely drives, shoe-string budgets and a lot of headaches, but the reception accorded me, the loyal support and dedication of the ministers and laymen to the program of the Church, have made the work enjoyable and the time pass swiftly. The fellowship that I have enjoyed I shall always cherish with fondest memories.

To Bishop Love, for the privilege of serving in this office; for the team work of my fellow ministers and laymen; and to Almighty God who has blessed and sustained us all, I am eternally grateful.

REPORT OF THE LAURINBURG DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Members and friends of the One Hundred and Fifth Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Central Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, grace and peace be yours in fullest measure, through the knowledge of God and Jesus our Lord. His divine power has bestowed on us everything that makes for life and true religion; enabling us to know the One who called us by His own splendour and might. Through this might and splendour he has given us his promises, great beyond all price, and through them you may escape the corruption with which lust has infested the world, and come to share in the very being of God. To him be glory in the Church of Jesus Christ forever and ever.

I thank God through Jesus Christ for his care and keeping, and for the privilege of making this my third report for another year's work done on the Laurinburg District.

We have been blessed beyond measure this year. None of the parsonage families have suffered severe illness, some few were hit by the flu and common cold. Mrs. Townsend and I have enjoyed very good health.

There have been two additions to the ministers' families. Rev. and Mrs. Ferree are the proud parents of a new daughter, and Rev. and Mrs. Dungee welcomed another boy.

There is a sad note, however. On February 20, one of the retired supply ministers of the District, Reverend Huly Perry, passed to his reward, after several years illness.

Our District staff has worked hard toward the goal of maturity; and have not reached perfection, but we have tried.

Through mass evangelism, revivals, preaching missions, Holy Week Services, and time-honored methods, we have kept the fire burning on the Altar of our churches. We have a net gain of 173 full members, and a gain of 196 preparatory members.

The staff on Christian Education recognizes the paramount values of Christian education, and is seeking to increase the effectiveness of the teaching work of the church by emphasizing and promoting the following activities on the district:

1. Increase Church school membership and attendance.
2. Providing opportunities for leadership training on the local church level.
3. Providing guidance for improving and promoting Vacation Church Schools, and several services in Christian education.

We believe that wherever people have been informed and challenged, giving to world missionary enterprises has increased. Hence, our District Director of Missions, with his staff, has conducted Missionary institutes and given Missionary literature. Some of the churches have had Church-wide Schools of Missions.

Our Benevolences have increased over last year. Most of the churches have increased the pastor's salary for next year. Yet, the average congregation would be startled to know how small a proportion of the total income of its members goes into the work of the Kingdom of Christ. One more revival, only one more is needed, the revival of Christian stewardship, the consecration of money power to God. When this revival comes, the Kingdom of God will come in a day. We are trying hard to bring our District to the point where we will support the total program of The Methodist Church.

Christian love for one's neighbor is manifested as a concern for justice. It is impossible for one person to express his love, directly and individually, for each of the members of a race, a class, or a nation. He will, therefore, seek the common good of the group by furthering justice for them. It is time Christians stopped bleating about love and start doing something about justice. Our love for our neighbor is only sentimental talk unless it is expressed in the quest of justice for all. With boys and girls, men and women crying out for justice, by sit-ins, stand-ins, walk-ins, kneel-ins, and other ways, the church of Jesus Christ cannot stand by and do nothing to help them reach their goal. The church must interpret the gospel clearly, fairly, and frankly. It has a duty to help leaven society and to help reconcile men to one another and to God.

The Laurinburg District Staff of Youth Workers is giving careful guidance to our youth. Our Youth Rally brought together more than two hundred and twenty five youth from across the District for counsel on "The Major Problems Facing Youth". Our own Bishop was the principal speaker.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is moving forward under the leadership of Mrs. Mary Carroll.

Our laymen are becoming more and more informed and are doing a very good work.

We cannot over-emphasize the importance of the church, rightly understood. As the extension of Christ's work on behalf of the Kingdom, it is "the Body of Christ," and we are all part of it. We are the world's only Christ, and what we do is the only work of Christ in the world on behalf of the Kingdom. If the Kingdom is the hope of the world, then the Church is the hope of the world.

REPORT OF THE WINSTON DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Members of the North Carolina Conference and friends: It is with great pleasure that I have come to this hour wherein I shall make my third annual report as Superintendent of the Winston District. I am indeed grateful to almighty God for His fatherly goodness, His loving care, and His guiding hand, without which I could not have come to this hour. As I stand here at the end of another conference year, I am aware that greater accomplishments could have been ours had we but extended the horizon of our faith to include wider areas of services and responsibilities in the kingdom of God. Nevertheless, I am grateful for the accomplishments which we have made this year. The untiring efforts of the pastors and laymen of the District have made possible many gratifying experiences. And Bishop Love, your wise counseling and dynamic leadership have urged us on.

Evangelism

The work of evangelism and the evangelistic mission of the church have been our chief concern this year. First of all, we have been mindful of our own need for a deeper spiritual enrichment. This we have sought through personal worship, group fellowship and public worship. The pastors of the Winston District have sought to lead their congregations into an Aldersgate experience through special Aldersgate services. Under the leadership of the District Secretary of Evangelism, Reverend J. W. Jones, the Winston District has held quarterly meetings for the purpose of study and training for the chairmen and members of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism in our local churches. For the most part the results have been very gratifying and can be seen in the Commission's reports to the fourth quarterly conference. We have especially emphasized personal and visitation evangelism. A number of the pastors organized for a lay visitation program which was conducted March 17-22. We have set our goal for organizing "The Twelve" in every church on the Winston District.

Missions

We have not been able to organize any new church schools or congregations on our District this year. However, we have given full support to the program of missions. At our first District meeting last summer the askings for World Service and all other benevolences were given to and accepted by the pastors and charges of the District. Nine charges paid their accepted apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences in full. Nine charges paid 75% or more. Only four charges paid less. The Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild of the Winston District are still setting the example for the rest of the Conference in total giving for missions with \$1,759.88. Under the leadership of the district president, Mrs. Marion W. Payne, the Woman's Society of Christian Service is moving forward not only in financial giving for missions, but in conducting study courses which serve to help the entire church to better understand "Our Mission Today".

Education

The program of Christian Education on the District is moving forward. A very interesting District Youth Institute was conducted at Hoover's Chapel Methodist Church, Thomasville, N. C. July 2-6, 1962. Four persons have been chosen by the District to attend the Area Leadership School at Bennett College, June 24-29, to prepare for work on the District level in the promotion of youth activities and participation. Most of the churches of the District conduct an annual Vacation Church School. Christian Education week is observed and Church School Rally Day is promoted in every charge on the District.

The District choir has continued in its third year, ever striving to gain more knowledge of church music as it is related to our total church program. Under the direction of the District Music Committee, composed of Mrs. Helen G. Cole, Mr. D. W. Andrews, Jr. and Mr. J. Livingston, the Annual District Music Workshop was conducted from St. Paul Methodist Church, Winston-Salem, N. C. As this conference year comes to an end, we wish to keep in focus a few objectives that will ever remain and remind us "why we have choirs."

1. To create a conduct of life worthy of those who stand before others in the public worship of God.
2. To help to create an atmosphere of worship.
3. To lead the congregation in singing the praises of God correctly.
4. To carry forward the Christian message in music.
5. To show an appreciation of the great Christian music of the centuries:

The District Music Committee will present the District Choir in concert, Friday, 8:00 P.M., in this sanctuary (for your benefit).

The District Conference

Our District Conference was held May 11, 1963 in the beautiful new Lovell Chapel Methodist Church, Pilot Mountain, N. C. of which the Reverend Paul G. Carter is pastor. We were royally entertained. Our District Conference featured one hour discussions on Missions and the Commission on Missions led by The Reverend James T. Jones, and Christian Social Concern led by Reverends W. R. Crawford and G. A. Brooks. The District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications recommended two applicants for licenses to preach.

All has not been merry with us. Death left a note of sadness in our District and in the Conference in the passing of Brother W. S. McLeod.

Time will not permit me to make mention of every charge individually. For the most part, all the charges on the Winston District have had a successful year. However, there are a few things I should like to mention at this time. First of all, the ministers serving for the first year in their present appointments have done exceedingly well. They are: The Reverend James T. Jones, Brooks Memorial, High Point, N. C. and The Reverend Liston Sellers, Jr., Elkin-Jonesville Charge. The beautiful Piney Grove Church on the Elkin-Jonesville charge, led by its pastor, paid its debt in full, installed an organ, and was dedicated on Sunday, May 5, 1963. This charge is one of the charges which paid all claims in full.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

May I, at this time, give you a short report on the 10 million Methodists who will be meeting, representing their congregations, in small groups on the University of Minnesota's campus where, 1,200 are expected to attend the National Methodist Conference on the church in Town and Country, July 9-12. The 1,200 delegates expected will be chosen by their annual conferences.

This conference will be the highlight of the thrust on the small congregation under the Quadrennial Emphases for 1960-64, called by the Methodist Council of Bishops. The Town and Country Conference is being sponsored and planned by The Methodist Interboard Committee on Town and Country Work.

The church in Town and Country will "go national in a big way" at this conference. Glenn Randall Phillips raises these questions for you or us. Why is it important to project the image of the small church on so small a screen? What is the national conference? Who is invited? Where do we "go" from this Conference? As Methodist seeking to be informed, you have a right to ask these questions and expect answers: Why was such a conference planned?

A part of this answer is set forth in the form of the purpose:

"To explore the mission of the Church in town and country life with emphasis given to the small church and its ministry of clergy and laity, to the changing patterns of the population and culture in Town and Country areas, to the world revolution, and to the development of a cooperative and united ministry as our response to the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

It is found by many that a large-scale program is needed once each four years (quadrennium). In spite of the surge of population toward the city, 65% of the Methodist membership is to be found in towns of 10,000 or less. Our responsibility as a denomination is not to deny or forsake those who are still in the rural and small towns.

Now, the Interboard Committee on Town and Country Work is composed of six bishops, plus representatives from the following general boards—

Missions, Education, Evangelism, Lay Activities, and Christian Social Concerns and the Woman's Division of Christian Service. Now again, we may raise almost the same question. What is the National Conference on the Church in Town and Country?

1. **It is a study conference.** The curriculum is built around daily keynote messages that warm the heart, stimulate the mind, and invite further exploration.

(Opportunity is given in the larger divisional meetings to a consideration of the day's theme from the background of life in a certain kind of community, such as:

(a) Strictly rural—not related to urban factors: subgroups

(b) Decreasing population

(c) Increasing population

2. **Town centered or county seat type; subgroups:**

(a) Need development

(b) Changing community due to urban-related town and country and may be referred to "Urban" fringe area or suburban; and sometimes maybe a government project type.

This is a conference to bring life and enthusiasm to bear upon the work being done to town and country and to counteract feelings of frustration and defeat. To implement this purpose and to make possible a spiritual motivation, a period for Bible study and devotion is planned for the beginning of each day. In addition, the evening hours will feature hymn singing and great choral music. There are expected great messages from church and state to challenge anew the program of our churches in the rural and small town.

This is a program that should claim the attention of all our best leaders in the church so that we may win back, and keep all that are being lost, in our rural areas. If any be lost we may be able to trace them into our cities. Unless we can face the old problems with a new spirit, firm in the belief that "with God all things are possible," we have missed the meaning that our small towns expected to have from our meeting in Minneapolis and what was intended for us.

Our prayers of this Town and Country Commission are that we all will pray and dedicate our strength with all of its impact for this ministry to people wherever they are found—in open country, village, or urban center, here in America or in other lands around the world.

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

Theme: "Go Deeper In Order To Go Forward"

A Conference Program to Give "A United Witness Through A United Church." Recognizing twenty-five years of United Evangelism.

May 1963-May 1964

Bishop Love, Members of the Conference and Friends:

I recommend the following Program of Evangelism for the Conference year 1963-64.

A. OBJECTIVES:

1. We Must Go Deeper
 - a. To study the **Book of Acts** to find marching orders for our day
 - b. To let the Holy Spirit baptize us in Christ.
 - c. To offer guidance to Young Preachers who want to know the power of evangelism in their own life and ministry.
 - d. To encourage **Small Groups** for prayer, study and witnessing as the heart beat of our Methodist movement.
 - e. To challenge **ministers** to a greater concern for people and parish in a bolder evangelistic expression.
2. We Must Go Forward
 - a. To emphasize again the power of **The Pulpit** in calling men to Christ.
 - b. To stress **Lay Witnessing** as the genius of Methodism.
 - c. To undergird the **Recruitment Program** for the ministry.
 - d. To share with the **Conference Board of Education, a Campus Concern** for Jesus Christ as Lord and Master.
 - e. To use the **Church School** as an effective instrument in winning persons on profession of faith.
 - f. To discover through **Unconventional Evangelism** new methods to match a new day.
 - g. To follow the footsteps of Paul in **establishing new congregations.**

B. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE:

1. That the Board of Evangelism and the cabinet develop a "25th Anniversary Program and announce the date for the same at this session. And that this be a program for implementing and launching the 25th anniversary program year in the conference.
2. That the Conference Board of Evangelism and Board of Education work cooperatively on joint programs of "Evangelism through the Church School." We must find the answer to the question, "Why are we losing Members in the Children's Division of our Church Schools?"
3. That shortly after the annual conference the Board of Evangelism and the Board of Mission make a survey of every District in the Conference looking for desirable locations for establishing new congregations.
4. That the Conference Board of Evangelism seek ways to promote interdenominational evangelism.
5. That the Conference Board of Evangelism make available at the Conference and District meetings a comprehensive display of all available evangelistic materials published by **Tidings, Methodist Evangelistic Materials, and The Upper Room.**

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE DISTRICT:

1. Develop a United District Program, with the district divided into sub-districts and the sub-district leader become a member of the District Committee on Evangelism. This will increase your District Committee for more effective work in evangelism.

2. Conduct workshops on evangelism.
3. Continue and expand prayer and study groups for ministers, study the book of Acts to find marching orders for your district.
4. Develop an active and trained District Committee of Evangelism.
5. Study the feasibility of Unconventional Evangelism in the local committees and promote it. We must find a way to communicate the Gospel to the out-sider, this does not mean popularizing or watering down the gospel. Nor does it mean speaking in a condescending way to them. Rather we must communicate the gospel to their predicaments.
Lest we forget, communications with the outsider is in itself an incomplete act. Unless the outsider becomes an insider with Christ through the redemptive fellowship, communications have failed.
6. Use retreats and "day apart" programs to deepen concerns.

FOR THE LOCAL CHURCH:

1. The Commission on Membership and Evangelism, study the book of Acts during the months of July and August, for its marching orders.
2. That each local church conduct a Week of Christian Witnessing, in the month of September.
3. Promote Membership Preparation and Inquirer's Classes.
4. Expand the "small group" until it includes the entire Membership.
5. Set up a specific plan of assimilation of new members.
6. Stimulate family and individual worship in the home.
7. Give an invitation to Christian discipleship at worship each Sunday.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PEACE AND WORLD ORDER OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Bishop Love, Members and Friends of the Conference:

The Committee on Peace and World Order of the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns in submitting as its report a **Message To The People of China** from the Fellowship of Reconciliation.

We have been given permission by the National Council of the Fellowship of Reconciliation to use this message as our report.

The following is the message:

"The arid chasm of suspicion and hostility deepens and widens between our countries, and hopes for peace and a world in which all men may live in dignity decline at a corresponding rate. On both sides, men are busy searching for ways of justifying their own positions and painting those on the other side as devils with whom neither communication nor reconciliation is possible.

"We know that we speak for millions of our fellow citizens when we say that we reject this sad and hopeless interpretation of humanity's plight. It cannot lead to peace, but only to more hostility and ultimately to the final catastrophe of nuclear war. Surely no people anywhere deliberately hope for the inflicting of hunger, disease and death on hundreds of millions of the world's innocent, yet this is the direction in which both our countries seem impelled by the terrible angers of their ideological disagreements and political antagonisms.

"If there is to be hope, some on both sides must reach across the chasm with offers of trust and friendship. Some must essay the difficult task of re-establishing communication, of subverting enmity, of beginning the process of reconciliation.

"There are real differences between us that will not easily be resolved, and that must be dealt with in honesty and realism. We do not condone the acts of any government, yours or ours, that pervert the truth, incite hatred, or manipulate men's fears and hopes for political or military reasons. But beyond governments are men, and men must learn to work out their problems together, cooperatively, in understanding and the compassionate acceptance of our common failings.

"We do not defend the official position of our government with relation to your country, but believe strongly that it should be modified or changed at several points. For example—

. . . we believe that the United States should recognize the People's Republic of China and end its opposition to the seating of China in the United Nations;

. . . we seek an end to embargoes on trade and travel between our two countries;

. . . we urge the removal of any last vestiges of military threat against the government of China, whether directly or through an intermediary;

. . . we would like to see our government make open and vigorous proposals for common efforts to deal with humanity's fundamental problems, of food, population, health, and freedom.

"We hope that you will urge your government similarly to renounce military threats, to seek peaceful solutions of all issues, and common efforts to deal with humanity's problems.

"But these are matters that can be dealt with by governments only as the attitudes of men and women change toward each other. Official hostility both feeds and is fed by the fears and angers of the people. We appeal to men and women of China who share our concern for the re-establishment of friendship to join with us in expressions of that concern, both in words and in concrete acts.

"We call to your attention the Delhi-Peking Friendship March, in which two of the members of this National Council are participating;

"We propose the development of correspondence and the exchange of information and ideals between individuals in our two countries;

"We offer the suggestion of a visit by Christian leaders of this country to the Christian community in China, and a reciprocal visit by some of your people to ours.

"These things are small, but they would be a beginning. Let us make that beginning now, with no more delay."

THE REPORT OF THE DELEGATE TO THE 1962 CHURCHMEN'S STUDY TOUR OF EUROPE AND RUSSIA

Bishop Love, members and friends of the North Carolina Conference:

I stand before you with a sense of profound humility, to give an account of the trust you placed in me, which afforded me the opportunity to travel with thirty-three American clergymen and churchmen to Europe and Russia last Summer.

The Study Tour was sponsored by the Division of Peace and World Order of the Board of Christian Social Concerns.

The leader of the Study Tour was Dr. Soul, Executive Secretary for the Division of Peace and World Order of the Methodist United Nations Office.

The emphasis was upon conferences with persons who had information and insight to offer in the areas of religion, the United Nations, politics, culture, and world peace.

The time and money invested in the tour by members were carefully budgeted. Usually, there were conferences in the morning, sight-seeing in the afternoon, and free time or travel in the evening. We were interested in learning rather than sight-seeing. Discussions followed each address. We stayed long enough in most cities to obtain deep and memorable impressions.

The Itinerary

London: Five days in London were desirable because of the Wesleyan background of our church, the contributions of Britain to political freedom, and the vitality of the peace movement in England today. The first Sunday of the tour was spent in Wesley's Chapel.

Geneva: Our group visited the headquarters of the International Labor Organization, the World Health Organization, The World Council of Churches, and the International Red Cross.

Moscow: Here in the heart of the communist world, we had the experience of visiting many of the educational, cultural, and political institutions. A visit to the Kremlin and the University of Moscow, as well as the Orthodox Center at Zagorsk and the Baptist Church.

Other places on the itinerary were as follows: France, Belgium, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Kiev, Tashkent, Samarkant, Leningrad, Sweden, Finland, and the Hague.

The Walls of Berlin

Upon returning to America I formed the following conclusions:

The tension in Germany is very important and should be seriously studied by American churchmen, in order that permanent solutions may be found.

Agencies of the U. S. Government should cease to speak of part of Germany as "under Polish Administration" and recognize the permanence of the Oder-Neisse line.

I agree that the best solution for the present division of Berlin is to place the entire city under UN supervision.

I favor the recognition of the German Democratic Republic, believing that the unification of Germany must be worked out by the German States themselves.

"Peace And Friendship"

I believe that the people of the USSR sincerely desire peace and friendship with the United States.

I believe that the government of the USSR desires peace and disarmament because it recognizes the destructive nature of nuclear war, the advantage of reducing its expenditures for arms, and the wisdom of extending communism by methods other than international aggression.

Both the people and priests in the churches we visited received us warmly and courteously. They have confidence in the future of their faith even though they live in a country whose government is Marxist.

I believe that the leadership of Khrushchev is superior to that of Stalin, and is in the direction of greater political freedom, and should be more respected in the United States.

Having noted the faith, the freedom and democracy which England, Switzerland, Finland, and Sweden manifest by giving the Communist Party the same rights and opportunities as other political parties, I believe the people of the United States should manifest a similar faith in freedom and democracy.

In communist countries, we were deeply impressed by the strong emphasis upon racial equality. As an inter-racial group, we were frequently embarrassed by questions concerning race relations in the United States and by news reports from Albany, Georgia. Whereas we take satisfaction in gains in racial brotherhood, the communists judge us by an absolute standard. In a similar way, when Russians speak of gains in political freedom, we judge them by absolute standards.

I shall never forget the evening I stood in a little German Church in West Berlin and spoke to them on "The Horror of the Walls", but when I returned to America, I saw the horror of the walls of segregation as two of our tourist members and I stopped for food along the highway. If we really want to defeat Communism, there is only one way to do it. That way is so obvious one would be embarrassed to speak of it if it were not for the fact that it is the one thing that people who talk fighting communism generally fail to mention. We must construct a social order in which the goals of justice, mercy and morality take precedence over economic security, political power and technological progress, and we must freely, through voluntary association, pour into that social order the same spirit of service, self-sacrifice and common purpose that under the Soviet system is induced by party discipline. I said in Germany the Berlin Walls shall be broken down just like the walls of Jericho. Now let me say to you that the walls of segregation shall be broken down, but we need a Joshua, or should I say, a Martin Luther King. Persons who respond to the call of Christ in love and obedience enter a new kind of fellowship in the church where racial barriers are transcended. "For he is our peace who has made us both one, and has broken down the dividing walls of hostility."

The Study Tour gave me the greatest experience of my life. And I shall always be grateful to: the North Carolina, Western North Carolina Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, the North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction, the Hoover's and Brooks' charge and particularly to Bishop Edgar Love, for making it possible for me to make the Tour. And to all of you I say. "Peace and Friendship."

**REPORT OF JOINT BOARD OF EDUCATION ON HIGHER EDUCATION
NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE—June 6, 1963**

"The church's ministry of teaching is the nurturing of persons in the Christian Gospel. Through this ministry the church communicates to those who have grown up in the fellowship, as well as to new converts, the fundamental meaning of the Christian faith and life, and the nature of the Church and its mission in the world, to the end that they will commit themselves to Christ. Children are nurtured in the faith; youth are instructed not only as to the meaning of the gospel but also its relevance to their life-choices, adults are led to deeper insight into the meaning of life in Christ and into the impact of their faith for the common problems of our cultural life".

This board is dedicated to this ministry and hopes that every local church will become aware of the value of this ministry to its people.

This ministry cannot be developed unless there is a full-time program of Christian Education in our Conference. We voted two years ago to begin this full-time program, but have been unable to do so because of insufficient finance and lack of interest. In each of the two years, the Board's income has been only enough to support part-time work. The Conference Treasurer's Report, as of May 24, 1963, indicated that only two-thousand, three hundred and eighty-two dollars had been raised. While many churches have paid their apportionment in full, (to them, we are indeed grateful) others have scarcely paid anything. In light of these facts, we recommend continuation of our Christian Education Program on a part-time basis for another year and request permission to use one-thousand, eight hundred dollars (\$1,800.00) of funds received to finance this part-time program.

The Board has consulted with three (3) prospects for the full-time position as Executive Secretary. The office will be filled when the funds are available. So we urge the Bishop and the District Superintendents to exert every effort to impress upon pastors and laymen of the conference the importance of Christian Education in the conference and to make strenuous effort to raise the apportionment for the Conference Board of Education during the next Conference Year.

Program Recommendations

We still maintain that in order to accomplish the aim of Christian Education, a trained leadership is indispensable. No program or movement arises above its leader. If the North Carolina Conference is to survive, not to mention grow, it is imperative that we provide leadership training on the Conference, District, Sub-district and the Local Church levels. Such training has been and is provided in the Baltimore Area Leadership School which meets within the confines of our Conference; yet, we have not taken advantage of this opportunity to improve our work. We, therefore, recommend the following:

1. That at least one person from each local church attend the Baltimore Area Leadership School at Bennett College, June 24-29.
2. That the months of September and October be designated as Christian Education Months in the North Carolina Conference.
 - a. That a workshop for Conference Workers be held during this period.
 - b. That workshops for District and Local Church Workers be held during this period on each district.
 - c. That a special roll call for Conference Board of Education funds be held during the period of this emphasis.
3. That each district hold a District Leadership School; that no district hold a District Youth Assembly unless a District Leadership School is held.
4. That Leadership training week-ends be provided on each District.
5. That each District be properly organized.
6. That more effective use be made of the Executive Secretary in the local church situations.

7. That Church School Rally Day be observed in the Conference on September 29th.
8. That the District Superintendents invite the Executive Secretary to their Annual planning conference.
9. That the figure for Wesley Foundation and Christian Higher Education be listed on the District Superintendent's apportionment sheet to each church.
10. That continued emphasis be placed on the Race Relations Day Offering.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION

at

THE AGRICULTURAL AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE

Greensboro, North Carolina

Bishop Love, Members and Friends of the Conference:

I am very grateful for this opportunity to present to you a report on
the work of the Wesley Foundation at The Agricultural and Technical Col-
lege this year.

This has been the best year for the Foundation since I became director
three years ago. Student and faculty response has been unusually good.

Study Groups

Our study group program this year has been built around a bibliography
recommended by the Department of College and University Religious Life,
Board of Education of the Methodist Church. For an outline of the study
groups see page 57 of the 1962 Conference Journal.

Community of Lay Scholars

The Lay Scholars meet every Monday evening from 6:30 until 7:45.
The period from 6:30 until 7:30 is used for study and discussion. The period
from 7:30 until 7:45 is used for worship.

We have made an intensive study of the first three chapters of Genesis. These chapters deal with the creation and the fall.

We are now making an intensive study of the book of Job. Here we are dealing with the problem of suffering.

Worship

We are fortunate to have a director of religious activities at The Agricultural and Technical College. One of his main functions is to conduct worship services in the college chapel. These services are held each Sunday evening at 6:30. I have urged the members of the Wesley Foundation to participate in these services.

I have also urged the members of the Wesley Foundation to attend the worship services of Methodist Churches in the community.

Religious Emphasis Week

Each year Religious Emphasis Week is observed at the college. The theme this year was: "Religion's Responsibility in a Rapidly Changing World."

The speaker for this year's program was the Reverend James H. Hargett, Minister of the Congregational Church of Christian Fellowship, a United Church of Christ affiliate, Los Angeles, California.

The Reverend Mr. Hargett spoke on the following topics at the worship services:

- "A Christian Concept of Order and Change"
- "Racial Conflict in Order and Change"
- "Technological Conflict in Order and Change" and
- "Ideological Conflict in Order and Change"

Seminars were held on each of these topics. A number of members of the Wesley Foundation and I participated in the worship services and the seminars.

Extra Campus Activities

The director and two students attended the fall retreat held at Camp Chestnut Ridge on October 6-7, 1962. The retreat was under the sponsorship of the Methodist Student Movement of North Carolina. Two students attended the spring retreat at Camp Chestnut Ridge.

Four students and the director attended the Methodist Student Movement State Conference held at the First Methodist Church, Charlotte, North Carolina, February 1-3, 1963.

On Friday evening, March 1, 1963, the Wesley Foundation of Woman's College, University of North Carolina, invited Methodist students from Greensboro College, Guilford College, Elon College, Bennett College, and The Agricultural and Technical College to participate in an interracial program. I was guest speaker for the occasion. I spoke on the topic: "The Church as the Body of Christ." A discussion followed. This was indeed one of the deep religious experiences of my life.

I have attended five meetings of the Group Ministry of the Community of Lay Scholars this school year.

On Saturday, March 9, 1963, and Sunday, March 10, 1963, I attended two of the Wesley Lectures at the University of North Carolina. The lectures were delivered by Dr. Paul Lehmann, Auburn Professor of Theology at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. Dr. Lehmann spoke on "Theological Method Today," and "The Ethical Reality of Conscience." The lectures were under the sponsorship of the Wesley Foundation at Carolina.

This has been a great year.

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A STATEMENT TO THE CONFERENCE CHAIRMEN SECTION OF THE 1963 CONVENTION OF THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF METHODIST HOSPITALS AND HOMES

A crisis confronts the Methodist Church and it especially applies to those of us who bear a responsibility in the field of health and welfare.

The health and welfare needs of our society have so increased in complexity and intensity that it has become imperative for us to bring to a new focus our concerns and services. It has been exciting to see some of our institutions move beyond their four walls in the establishment of new forms of social service. People in the local church have been thrilled at the suggestions made to them of forms of non-institutional services that they might render in their own community. But now the coordinating council of The Methodist Church has determined that these services and these concerns must be discontinued. The Board of Hospitals and Homes at both the national level and the annual conference level are requested to restrict their plans and concerns to institutional services. We believe that in the process, the cause of Christ will suffer.

While there are administrative problems at the national level, our primary concern is for the cause of Jesus Christ at the local level. People are ministered to by people, in a local community and church and through a specific institution or agency. At this level there is a great concern. In the past this concern has led to the establishment of service institutions for the care of children and youth, for the aged and insecure, for the physically and mentally ill. This concern was further evidenced by the organization of Golden Cross to care for the indigent. It was expressed again in the development of new standards of Christian Service and the recruitment and training of skilled personnel. We believe that we must not lose this impetus that we have gained.

Instead, we must rally the skills and resources of our service institutions, our hospitals and homes, and ask them to continue to develop a more effective Methodist ministry of mercy. We must turn to the local church hospitals and homes, and ask them to continue to develop a more effective Methodist ministry of mercy. We must turn to the local church hospitals and homes stewards and secure their assistance and guidance, both in working with the present institutions and a developing non-institutional services in their own church and community.

To help do this we need the guidance and leadership of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes. We would recommend to the coordinating council and to the General Conference of The Methodist Church that steps be taken to clarify this relationship between the Board of Hospitals and Homes and the Board of Christian Social Concerns, and to direct the Board of Hospitals and Homes to renew its activity in the area of non-institutional services of health and welfare.

We would not presume to be competent to resolve all the administrative problems involved. However, we would relay one suggestion that has been made to us and in which we find validity. Perhaps, we should see a distinction between social welfare and social action. In this case, issues and controversy come under the direction of the Board of Christian Social Concerns. Direct service and welfare ministry should be the responsibility of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. Possibly the Division of Temperance and General Welfare should be transferred to the Board of Hospitals and Homes, thus completely unifying our social welfare agencies and concerns, and separating this from the area of social action, propagandizing and lobbying. We are not saying this latter role is unimportant. It is vital. But it ought not be confused with the Christian service that we are seeking to perform. And we are confident that this distinction will further the cause of Christ and His Church.

RESOLUTION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE
Realignment and Abolition of the Central Jurisdiction

Whereas the North Carolina Annual Conference in its one hundred and fourth session, went on record as regarding the statement of principles and recommendations of the Cincinnati Study Conference as a definitive criteria for the consideration of the proposal for transferring a local church or an annual conference from the Central Jurisdiction under the provision of Amendment IX, and,

Whereas, the Cincinnati Study Conference recommended that the Committee of Five "develop a proposal for presentation to the 1964 Jurisdictional Conference" for the re-alignment of annual conferences of the Central Jurisdiction "so that each conference will be located within the boundary of not more than regional Jurisdiction", and

Whereas the Committee of Five has proceeded to develop, for the consideration of annual conferences, a Study Document on Re-alignment of the Central Jurisdiction containing substance for its report and recommendation to the 1964 Central Jurisdictional Conference,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED:

1. That the North Carolina Conference endorses the principle and recommendations of re-alignment of conferences in effort to remove the Central Jurisdiction as a unit of organizational structure in the Methodist Church.

2. That the North Carolina Conference in giving its assent to the principle of proposed realignment of conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, does stipulate that:

- (a) The conferences transferring from the Central Jurisdiction shall be merged during 1964-68 quadrennium with conferences of the geographic jurisdiction in which they are located.
- (b) That the ministers transferred from the Central Jurisdiction shall be accorded the same status, rights and privileges accorded any other minister in the conference of the regional jurisdiction into which they are transferred.
- (c) When all, or a stipulated majority, of the annual conferences of an area in the Central Jurisdiction are transferred into the regional jurisdiction in which they are located, that the resident bishop of the area dissolved will be transferred into continuing regional jurisdiction in accordance with provisions of Article V of Division Three, and/or Amendment IX, of the Constitution of the Methodist Church, and

3. That inter-conference and inter-area meetings and study groups be formed during the first year of the 1964-68 quadrennium to study problems involved, make recommendations and plans for the creation of a suitable climate for the orderly transfer of churches and conferences from the Central Jurisdiction to the regional jurisdiction in whose boundary the transferrable units are located, and

4. That a copy of this resolution be sent to the secretary of the Committee of Five, W. Astor Kirk, and other persons and/or committees and agencies of the Methodist Church concerned with the re-alignment and abolition of the Central Jurisdiction as a unit of organizational structure in the Methodist Church.

XIV HISTORICAL VIEW

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conference. In the year 1836, the General Conference was set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference but when it adjourned, there were two Conferences.

Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the Conference of December 4, 1844, there were 10,495 white members and 3,100 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became a part of a new church, organized in May, 1945, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some of the colored members entered the A.M.E. Church, some the Colored M.E. Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church as it returned to the State after the Civil War.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and in 1865, when at the close of the War, the M.E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference.

From the North Carolina Conference, the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.
