Circuses have always fascinated me. When I was a child, the glitter and the pageantry were fascinating; I had no idea how demanding was the life of the performers. Having now another appreciation of the whole business, I marvel that any one, for any salary, will undertake the life of continual moving, exceedingly hard and often dangerous work, and continual cacophony of noise, movement and organized action. The difference between the way it looked to me as a child and what I see now is, I think, the ability to see under the glitter to the reality.

Many people come to Pentecost with something of the child's perspective of a circus. The account in Acts is exhilarating and puzzling at the same time. How often we come to a shattering halt over the esoterica of this account and fail to see what was taking place in the events of that far-off day. Those who yearn for a new Pentecost find themselves at times yearning for the "paraphernelia" of the day and drawing back from the reality. It is in the reality that we find the reason for this being one of the three great festivals of our faith in Jesus Christ.

That reality is that God gets through to people and that He has provided every means necessary that men may know Him and His way. It is in what this reality demands of us that many shrink back and either turn from the whole subject, or else prefer to concentrate on the "odd" behaviour of that day and avoid thinking about what was really taking place. The remembrance of a far-off event is only a historical celebration (though that can be very valuable) unless somehow, life is breathed into it and what happened long ago comes to have a real impact on us today. Pentecost promises this breathing in of life.

So we come to Pentecost 1977. What will God say to you on this special day? And, are you listening? I hope that together we can hear and respond.

PENSION PROGRAM FOR MINISTERS

Have you ever wondered how the United Methodist Church takes care of its pension program for Ministers? Each church contributes to the Pension Fund through the "single figure asking" and the Annual Conference sets the "per service year rate." The 1976 Conference set the annuity rate at \$82 per service year. This means that if a minister has served 40 years he would receive a pension of \$82 x 40 = \$3280 per year. Widows of ministers receive 70% and dependent children 25%.
