SUMMER SERVICE

Lyon Park plays an important role in the lives of many children who live in the south-eastern section of Durham. For some of the kids it means a hot meal, for others something to do, and for all someone who cares. Lyon Park, located off Lakewood Avenue, has excellent recreation facilities and a community center which was built in 1957 by the city of Durham.

For the past four years, the city recreation department has sponsored summer recreation program for youths from 6 to 15 years of age. Ms. Lee is hired by the city to run the program, and she is assisted by two staff members. Each week day, Monday through Friday, approximately 175 kids participate in the program. The day is divided into a morning activity period from 9 AM to 1 PM and an afternoon period from 4 PM to 7 PM. Hot lunches are served free from 1 PM to 2 PM.

The children are divided into three age groups, and the activities are divided into four areas: 1) small table games (checkers, monopoly, etc.); 2) large table games (caroom, pool, etc.); 3) arts and crafts; and 4) sports (softball, basketball, horseshoes, etc.). Obviously, it is impossible for the three paid staff members to supervise all age groups in all activities. And that's why we need YOU.

Four area churches - Duke Memorial Methodist, Immaculata Catholic, Temple Baptist and First Calvary Baptist - have agreed to recruit volunteers to assist in the program for the next eight weeks. Our church's goal is to provide a minimum of one volunteer for part of each day, five days per week, for the next eight weeks. Volunteers are needed to teach and supervise games and sports. Help is needed in serving the lunches. Particularly, teachers of arts and crafts are needed.

If you are willing to volunteer please call the church office. You can specify the day, the part of the day, the age group, and the activity in which you wish to be engaged. You can work all day or part of a day. If you can teach a craft or art, indicate how many students you'd like in a class, what time you can be there and how long the class will last. The church will assist you in getting materials. This is an excellent opportunity for Christian community service. I urge you to support this project with your time and talents. Your rewards will be many, and your efforts sincerely appreciated.

OPENING FOR ALTAR FLOWERS: If you would like to put flowers in the sanctuary on July 10 please call the church office, 688-1901.

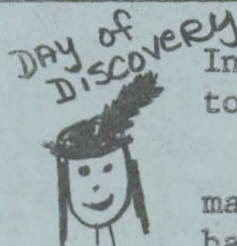
