Boarding an airliner cannot compare to the thrill of boarding the long procession of cars in a train. In the town in which I grew up, located nearly mid-way from New York to Florida, seventeen cars could line up alongside the loading platform. There were several trains each day, each way. Always a crowd would watch the incoming train, the "stand", observe the speedy unloading and loading, hear the "b-o-o-o-ard" of the conductor and see his arm wave to the engineer in the distant locomotive and then carefully note the application of traction power —in that crowd were many people besides children and hangers—on with nothing better to do. In a real sense, those trains coming into our little town and then speeding away made a link with the "outside" world.

Now and then, some one could be seen who almost made it on time. Usually such people saw the rear platform receding in the distance and had the realization that one or two minutes delay along the way had cost them at least the wait for the next train. To those who gave the comforting word, "There'll be another train in four hours" or whatever was the time limit, I have often heard such frustrated travelers reply, "Yes, but my train is gone and I'll never get it."

A few experiences in life are unique and we hope they will so remain. Most of what happens to us comes in experiences that can be lived again but never quite repeated. Miss a television program and you have the prospect of re-runs, if only you can find them. On Derby Day, how many times did you see Seattle Slew win the race? In many relationships, we presume that what happens on a given day makes little difference because there will be a tomorrow to catch up on it.

Is it not more realistic and true to life to admit that what we miss at any one time is like the train disappearing down the track — "there goes my whatever it is"? What happens today is what can't be repeated; today will not be around again. There may be something like it but the today is gone, for good.

Remember Jesus' word: "Take no thought for tomorrow". One sound understanding of that word is that today is to be lived in His grace, love, wisdom, guidance to us. What's gone is gone for good. Let's live today - and love it as we love the Lord!
