Long ago I served a church where one of the elderly pillars of the church took an active dislike to me. This happened before I arrived so I was puzzled about it. His usual participation in worship was to stay at home and nod in his favourite rocker. Sometimes he came to church and nodded there! Most of the mornings in those years, I had three successive services, beginning each on time and being forced to wind up on time also. The elderly citizen was usually tardy perhaps because he figured he wasn't missing much anyway. One morning he arrived exactly on time. As I was moving toward the pulpit, he said in his slow way, "You might as well begin now 'cause you don't know whether nobody is coming or not." I had to chuckle — and admit that I did not in truth know whether any one was coming or not!

Weather, one's physical condition, commitments, fatigue—all these and many more factors shape our church attendance patterns. Some men I know cancel church services on the basis of prediction of foul weather. Others of us are stubborn and figure that we will have a service of worship for whoever can make it. I belong to the latter school. I suspect that major snowfall is a matter of history for us in the winter of 1979 — and lest I be a forecaster, let me add that I hope it is that way! As a matter of policy, unless I am physically prevented either by snow that absolutely immobilizes the whole town or by illness, services at Duke Memorial will be "on" so long as I am pastor. This does not invite any one to risk broken limbs, car smashes or pneumonia. It is rather a statement that for me, Sunday is the crown of the week. I look forward to it all week long and so far, a bit of bad weather hasn't snatched that joyful expectation and fulfillment from me.

I am grateful to those who made it to church through the snow and believe that I am understanding of those whose judgement was that they not come. God bless us, every one, wherever we are, every moment of our lives. See you Sunday!
