A BONUS IN FOODS! A refund on food purchases, to benefit the needy? Can it be? Yes, it isright here in Durham. When you shop at Kroger food stores near the exit of each store is a box with a notice inviting you to place your cash register tape in it. What difference does it make? Just this difference - a committee from Pilgrim United Church of Christ collects these tapes, totals them and is paid a refund of one-tenth of one percent by Kroger's. This money is used only to buy food for the needy. Persons in need are referred to Pilgrim Church by the Durham County Department of Social Services and are there supplied with food. Distribution is on the basis of need only.

This is an act of concern which never adds one cent to your food bill but can in a meaningful way benefit the needy. A survey shows that only one in ten shoppers puts the tape in the collection box. Even so, in the last two years, more than \$5,000 worth of food has been purchased and distributed in this way, to aid the poor and needy.
