HERITAGE MONTH SPECIALS

Who likes to sing? Methodists once did - and many still do. Many of us feel that the singing at Annual Conference is the best part of the sessions. It has been said with some justice that the willingness to testify to God's grace in one's life begins with the willingness to sing of it. Charles Wesley wrote more than 6,000 hymns, many of them with as many as twenty stanzas. All of them were based on Scripture of Christian experience and all were vehicles for teaching Christian doctrine. Editors of our hymnals, plus our shortwinded habits in singing, have worked together to reduce the length of each of these hymns and also to delete some of the best Biblical material. Compare the text of "Hark, the Hermal Angels Sing" in our current Methodist Hymnal (No. 388) with that in The Cokesbury Hymnal (No. 218). I do not propose reversion to singing twenty stanzas; but I do seriously urge considering what is the meaning of the words we sing, understanding their Biblical frame of reference, and their message to us today.

Sunday, 20 May, as part of our Heritage Month and continuing what began on 29 April, our morning service will be a Wesleyan hymn festival. All of us can sing or at least try to do so; every one can look at words and follow along as others sing! This is not a choir festival! It is for the congregation's participation, enrichment and joy. I anticipate a wonderful morning.

Sunday evening in our sanctuary at 7:30, Marion Conner of Jacksonville, Florida will make us aware that Susannah Wesley, mother of the Wesleys, seems to be alive, vocal and visible in our midst. Her presentation of "Susannah Wesley" has been given in North Carolina several times. She is well trained and widely experienced in drama. With no props and only symbolic costume touches, Susannah appears, shares her life, grows old and shares her wisdom. Much of this monodrama is taken from Mrs. Wesley's writings plus letters to her from her children. Sharing in this monodrama is very near to an unforgettable experience.

A number of sister congregations have been invited. You will want to be on hand somewhat before the hour in order to be in the area where you like to sit and even more, so that you will see it from the beginning! Come, bring your family and friends. All of us will be glad.
