A TIME OF OPPORTUNITY

Meals on Wheels is an enterprise of Durham Congregation in Action in which Duke Memorial participates, both with workers and also in gifts. The interest and support of a widebased group now sees that 125 home-bound persons get a balanced, hot and adequate noon meal five days a week. Meals on Wheels now has a waiting list of about forty persons who need this service. All are certified within the operating lines of Meals on Wheels - just one thing is lacking to get this service to them.

That lack is something of which all of us have some and no one of us has it all - money! Each dollar given is matched by slightly over three dollars from government funds - which of course all of us have paid, not given! Our gifts to Meals on Wheels bring back to our community to persons in genuine need some of these dollars which otherwise go elsewhere.

In terms of economics, a number of recipients of this aid are thereby enabled to remain in their own homes in lieu of being institutionalized. They are thereby much happier and more a part of our community life as well as the simple fact that Meals on Wheels costs far less than the price of institutionalization. This is another of the instances where the Christian motivation for help to those in need coincides with our own self-interest in our community.

The first day of July is a deadline for increase in Meals on Wheels schedule for the remainder of 1979.
