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WHY GO ANYWAY?

Technology presents us with a dazzling future — if we can find our way into it and avoid destruction of the race and the planet with some of the more somber aspects of our "progress". One really shining aspect of this brave new world is the bringing into our homes of the events of the world. Not least of these privileges is that of having religious services set before us, in colour if we prefer, in black and white if that is our choice, and in all dimensions, from eight inches to twenty-five. They come on at our behest; if we wish to lower or to increase the volume of the preacher(s), a small knob enables that to be done. If the music is to our liking, we can enjoy it. If we dislike it or think that the sort of music used is unfitting for a worship service, it is not necessary to leave a building and go elsewhere — again, a small knob or button enables other choices to come before us for our inspection.

The preaching may be from pedestrian to super-eloquent. The preachers are not responsible to any supervising group in matters of faith and doctrine. They can soar to heights of imagination — and sometimes, fantasy — that are not part of the life of the "church". No group is necessary to validate their claimed credentials; degrees fly with the ease of dry leaves in an autumn wind.

Two things generally are asked of viewers or hearers. The first is important only if it represents an honest commitment to Jesus Christ from the hearer. Rather often, this is a secondary consideration. The chief goal is to "hear" from the viewer/listener, rather clearly put in terms of "hearing" from your bank account. Every church group and every religious group requires money to operate; Duke Memorial is no exception. It is incumbent on all of us to know something of the accountability as to use of funds contributed. Local churches publish their budgets and make regular reports to church groups or bodies on financial matters. What do we hear from the electronic church beyond grandiose building projects, claims of work done but usually without much substantiation of the claims made?

What is asked of you as you "participate" in such a "ministry"? Your check book is the answer. Our Lord Jesus taught that we are to serve God with heart, soul, mind and strength. Giving money is part of it and an important part, both for the cause to which money is given as well as for our own need to give. Churches ask much more — they ask for us — physically present and personally participating, using what we have and what we are in serving God through Jesus Christ. Duke Memorial is such a church. We commit ourselves to support this church with our "prayers, presence, gifts and service". The very act of getting up and out of the house is a first step in worship! These requirements involve all that we are. As you think of your soul and eternal destiny, do you want to settle for less than the most that God offers? I surely do not. You all come!
