#### THE MOST BLESSED OF DAYS -- EASTER!

Easily at the middle of December we sing, "The most wonderful time of the year." The songs of Easter come easily to our lips and our minds. But so far as I know, save for the merchandising efforts, there is nothing connected with Easter that is comparable to the "secularizing" of Christmas. The legends and traditions that have grown up for the celebration of the birth of Christ have no parallel to the celebration of the resurrection of our Lord. Perhaps the reason is that all of us share in the fact of physical birth. We do not remember our own but as we come along in years, the experiences of parenthood enable us to appreciate in some measure what birth means.

But how do you measure or appreciate what the Resurrection means? Any "one time" experience, once in all history, defies really understanding what happened. I marvel at the imple way the Gospel writers detail the account. That they do not agree in all details by sharpens the unique nature of the Events. The simple statement, "He is not here; He is risen" says it all.

Rightly have men over the centuries sought in many ways to express what happened. We ought all so to strive even as we know that our efforts will bear only limited fruit at best. That no one of us can do anything perfectly should not prevent our undertaking to do all things as well as possible. Thus it is as we approach Easter, admitting the limitations of language, of understanding, of our minds, we should set ourselves to the joyful task of finding better ways to express our faith in Christ.

We may find ourselves finally in the position of a husband who became weary of the usual phrases of assurance to his wife that he did truly and wholeheartedly love her. He wrote page after page of rather florid prose and even inserted some poetry. But the higher grew the pile of sheets, the greater became his frustration. Finally he brought the whole thing to its conclusion with the realization that when he wrote "I love you" out of the truth of his life and the devotion of their years together, nothing else could be added for nothing else was needed. It was not simply the conventional words that made the difference. What really counted was the earnest confession which the words expressed.

So we come to Easter. The honest confession of our hearts, "He is risen" will say all that needs to be said. What more can we say? Dare we satisfy ourselves with less?
