METHODIST MOTIONS AND NOTIONS!

This Messenger should get to you on the day the Annual Conference adjourns. In writing about the sessions in advance, no one will predict what may occur during the reports and debates. It is safe to say that the weather in Fayetteville will be hot and humid, the college dining room noisy with chatter and the accompanying sounds of people enjoying both their meals and the fellowship, the halls crowded with Conference members doing their thing off the floor of the Conference rather than where they might make a serious contribution to the rather formidable task which is faced each year.

The wind-up comes with reading of appointments and a service of Holy Communion. Bishop Cannon takes his full responsibility for these parts of the session. Many of us - maybe all of us - are thankful that the appointment making process is opening up and that though inevitably some are disappointed - some churches, some pastors - we are spared the tension and the trauma that accompanied the "closed cabinet" system. Mistakes are made but usually they are errors of judgement, not of intention. Bishops are not considered infallible in their judgements as to appointments and I suspect that bishops consider that Staff-Parish Relations Committee members and District Superintendents are not infallible either!

No bishop or superintendent will knowingly consent to a bad appointment. Not only is there a matter of personal conscience and Christian commitment involved. There is also the fact that when bad choices are made, it is the bishop and the superintendents who justly receive much criticism and have to seek to correct the whole process. They therefore have a personal interest in the matter. In the same way, no superintendent will gladly welcome into his district a pastor who is known to be incompetent. Pastors come in so many shapes, sizes, and differing profiles of talents that the wonder is not that occasionally something less than superb appointments are made but rather that so often there is a matching of the needs of the congregation and the talents of the pastor.

The appointive system is the basic reason I am a Methodist pastor. The system that brings us to a church is the system that moves us elsewhere. Along the way, our lives are wonderfully blessed and enhanced by the gracious fellowship and loving sharing of life with many persons. We hope you find it the same way. Over the years this system has brought to every Methodist Church in eastern North Carolina at least a fair share of the leadership and service of many able men. Despite all that may be alleged against this system, it is still working with reasonable efficiency and good effect. God bless the memory of John Wesley and all who follow in his train for this way of pulpit supply! We rejoice in it and pray that you do also.

TO THE DUKE MEMORIAL CHURCH FAMILY: We thank you as we thank God for all the kindnesses and gracious acts that you have showered on us during our years at Duke Memorial. For your prayers, your concerns expressed in many ways, for things done for our blessing in ways spiritual as well as ways material, we are grateful. The luncheon on 30 May came near to being an overwhelming experience in the kind words spoken, in many expressions of appreciation and love, and in the most generous gift to us. We express our appreciation to all who were part of the day and especially to all who took the time and made the arrangements for the occasion. Thank you. God bless and keep you always.
