Historical Statement

THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

(Southeastern Jurisdiction)

I Composition: The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church is composed of:

- (1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
- (2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
- (3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.

II Organization: The Organizing dates of the three former Conferences were as follows:

- (1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church, 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina
- (2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia
- (3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.

Historical Notes

The original Journals of the North Carolina Conference for the years 1838 to 1882 are to be found in the Rare Manuscript Department of Duke University General Library, Durham, N. C., where they are deposited for safe-keeping and preservation under proper atmospheric conditions. Photocopies of these records were produced during the summer of 1965, and are in the office of the Conference Secretary, Methodist Building, Raleigh, N. C.

From the early beginnings to the year 1837 Methodism in the State of North Carolina was parcelled among the Holston, South Carolina, and Virginia Conferences. The Virginia Conference embraced territories in the north, east and central portions of North Carolina. The Holston Conference embraced the territory in the west adjacent to Tennessee. The South Carolina Conference included territories on the southern border of North Carolina.

A volume containing the condensed minutes of these three Conferences from 1837 as far back as records were available has been compiled and published (1966) and has been added to the Journal records of our Conference. This volume is designed to show the early history and alignment of Methodist Churches and Charges which were originally within the bounds of the three above-named Conferences.

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA
ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, or more than twice on the same question under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and later) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.

II. VOTING PROCEDURES

1. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.
2. Election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences: Only clerical members in full connection and elected and registered lay delegates may vote. (Alternate lay delegates may not vote except in the absence of the delegate and then only if they are duly registered in lieu of the delegate.) All votes must be cast in the bar of the conference as determined by the conference; votes must be cast upon the official ballots authorized by the conference; ballots shall be placed by individual delegates in ballot boxes; whereupon the bishop shall declare the balloting closed.

The official ballots furnished to the delegates shall be numbered consecutively and no vote shall be valid unless cast upon the ballot bearing the number designated by the presiding officer for such particular balloting. In the event a ballot is defaced, it may be exchanged at the secretary's desk for another ballot bearing the same number. Ballots furnished to lay delegates shall be different in color from those furnished to clerical delegates. Ballots shall be distributed to official delegates by the secretary at the time the presiding officer calls for the first ballot.

III. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
4. Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.

5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except those cases in which the *Discipline* directs otherwise. Near the end of each quadrennium, the Chairman or President of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall submit a list of qualified suggested nominees to the Bishop and his Cabinet for their consideration in the formation of new Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The nominees shall be consulted about their nominations. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference. At the beginning of each quadrennium all Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall elect their officers only after all their members have been properly notified of the organizational meeting.
7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
8. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
10. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 47, page 219, 1964 *Discipline*.
11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
14. Courtesies and Introductions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Introductions annually, at the first session of the Conference.
15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

IV. REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS, MOTIONS, AMENDMENTS

1. All reports to be presented to the conference shall be sent to the conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Coordinating Council and published in the conference calendar.
2. All resolutions to be presented to the annual conference affecting the structure, policy and function of any board or agency of the annual conference, shall be sub-

mitted in writing to the conference secretary with copies for all the delegates twenty-four hours prior to consideration by the annual conference, and not later than the second night session of the conference.

3. All motions presented to the annual conference, and amendments to any paper, shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the conference secretary at the time of presentation, or immediately following.

V. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in triplicate, to the conference secretary.
3. When necessary, substitutions shall be by election of the Quarterly Conference called upon authorization by the district superintendent. No person will be seated unless duly elected by the charge Quarterly Conference as the regular or alternate delegate. Notice of change in delegates must be sent to the Conference Secretary at once.

VI. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
2. Charge and church treasurers shall make final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on or before the date scheduled by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, and each pastor shall complete and submit Table II to the conference statistician on or before the opening date of the annual conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastor's reports.

VII. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The conference claimants, lay members of the conference boards, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other institutions and agencies of the General Church as he may deem advisable. Six copies including copy for lay delegate to annual conference shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.75 each, or single copies by mail at \$2.00 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VIII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be eleven.
2. A district conference shall be held annually, in each district, if authorized by the annual conference.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the district conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the *Discipline* as ex officio members.

4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.
5. The district superintendent of each district shall be required to furnish the conference treasurer as early as possible following the fourth quarterly conference an official copy of the apportionments of the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support, and a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the quarterly conferences. The figures furnished by the district superintendent to the conference treasurer shall be used by the statistician to compile his report to the annual conference. Two of these copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

IX. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference.

X. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

FIRST DAY, MORNING SESSION

Monday, June 12, 1967

At 10:15 the organist at St. Luke Methodist Church, Goldsboro, presented an organ prelude: "Pastorale," by Bach.

At 10:30 the Holy Communion was administered for the delegates to the Annual Conference, conducted by the presiding bishop, Bishop Paul N. Garber. He was assisted by the following district superintendents: T. B. Hough, O. L. Hathaway, H. G. Ruark, B. L. Davidson, Leon Russell, W. R. Stevens, R. G. Dawson, N. W. Grant, J. W. Page, V. E. Queen, and C. G. McCarver.

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Monday, June 12, 1967

The organist of St. Paul Methodist Church, Roger Searles, presented an organ prelude: "Voluntary on 100th Psalm Tune," by Purcell.

Conference Convened: Bishop Paul N. Garber, resident bishop of the Raleigh Area, called to order the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church at 1:30 in the afternoon of June 12, 1967. This is the one hundred and forty-second session, (twenty-ninth since unification of American Methodism in 1939) of the Conference. The 1967 session was convened in St. Paul Methodist Church, Goldsboro, North Carolina. The call to worship was given by Bishop Garber. The hymn No. 336, "And Are We Yet Alive?" was sung by the congregation, after which Leon Russell, host district superintendent, led in prayer. The Affirmation of Faith, the Apostles' Creed, was repeated in unison. Milton T. Mann sang "Great Peace Have They Which Love Thy Law," by Rogers.

Roll of the Conference: Bishop Garber called on W. C. Wilson, Conference Secretary, to call the roll of the Conference. He moved that registration cards as signed by the delegates be the official record of attendance at this session of the Conference. The motion was carried.

Our Honored Dead: Bishop Garber called Question 39a, "What ministers and ministers' wives have died during the year?" The Conference Secretary read the list. Ministers: W. D. Caviness, J. W. Dimmette, E. D. Dodd, W. H. Brown, W. C. Martin, C. W. Guthrie, M. Y. Self, J. J. Boone, H. C. Fraser, Holland L. Hale; Ministers' Wives: Mrs. J. J. Boone, Mrs. D. C. Geddie, Mrs. S. I. Starnes, Mrs. W. C. Lassiter, Mrs. S. A. Cotton, Mrs. A. S. Barnes, Mrs. E. R. Clegg, Mrs. H. L. Hendricks, Mrs. C. H. Caviness, Mrs. G. T. Adams.

He moved that the rules as published in the 1966 Conference *Journal* and as revised in the 1967 Book of Reports, be the rules for this session of the Conference. The motion was seconded and passed.

Bar of the Conference: G. S. Eubank moved that the entire sanctuary, including the balcony, be the bar of the conference. The motion was passed.

Program of Conference: G. S. Eubank made motion that the printed program, except as changed by the presiding officer, be the official program of the Conference. It was seconded and passed.

Announcements: W. C. Wilson made announcement regarding: (1) The making of motions, amendments, etc.; (2) Book of Reports; (3) Rules of the Conference; (4) Ordination Service.

Question 19: "Are all the ministerial members of the Conference blameless in their life and official administration?" was called. Bishop Garber called on H. B. Johnson who made the report of the Committee on Conference Relations. He reported that all are blameless in life and official administration.

Henry Goodwin, Southport, presented two resolutions with regard to Interracial Relations, asking to amend the Constitution. Bishop Garber ruled that resolutions to amend the Constitution were out of order since the Constitution was adopted by the General Conference.

R. S. Cushman spoke, asking the affirmative vote for the proposed merger. C. W. Robbins spoke, supporting the merger, stating the advantages of such merger. A. D. Byrd, Jr. spoke, stating that there seems to be some confusion about the merger plan, with special reference to Article IV, "Inclusiveness of the Church," Division One of the Constitution.

O. L. Hathaway pointed out the weaknesses in the proposed merger.

G. S. Eubank spoke about his work on a special joint committee set up by the E.U.B. and the General Conference of 1964 to study the ministry.

Jack Crum gave his interpretation of Article IV, Division One.

J. W. Page moved that the vote on union be by written ballot. It was seconded. The motion was defeated.

T. H. House requested that the chair call on someone to lead in prayer before the vote was taken. Bishop Garber called on Bishop Galloway to lead the prayer.

The vote was taken, and the result was: For: 343; Against: 108.

Commission on Christian Vocations: Bishop Garber called on J. C. Alexander, Chairman of the Commission, to lead in the presentation of the program. Mr. Alexander in turn requested Bishop Garber to present the speaker. Bishop Nolan B. Harmon was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Jack L. Hunter presented the report of the Commission and moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Promotion and Cultivation: Bishop Garber presented J. H. Bailey, Chairman of the Committee on Promotion and Cultivation, and asked him to preside. He stressed the need of financial help for the chaplains in Vietnam. Paul Boone, secretary to the Committee, made the report for the Committee. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Commission on Methodist Information and Public Relations: W. K. Quick made the report for the Commission. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Methodist Building: O. L. Hathaway made the report for the Methodist Building Committee. It was adopted.

Sustentation Committee: N. L. Jones reported for the Sustentation Committee. He moved the report be adopted, and it was done.

Message: Bruce Pate moved that "The Conference Secretary send an expression of our prayers, love and concern to the Reverend Kimsey King, Memorial Hospital, Chapel Hill, N. C." It was seconded and adopted by a standing vote. Bishop Garber then led in prayer. T. M. Vick explained plan now in operation at Edenton Street called the Kimsey King Fund, designed to help defray hospital expenses for Kimsey King. He invited contributions to the Fund. Bishop Garber then called on the father of Kimsey King, Jr., who spoke words of appreciation.

G. W. Blount moved that greetings be sent to H. K. King who is ill in Wake Memorial Hospital, Raleigh, N. C.

G. S. Eubank moved that greetings be sent to D. A. Petty who is ill at home in Rose Hill.

W. R. Stevens moved that greetings be sent to C. M. Triehart who is ill in Beaufort County Hospital, Washington.

The Conference approved that greetings be sent to each. Bishop Garber led in prayer for these ministers.

Special Appointments: Upon request of Bishop Garber, and in accordance with Disciplinary Par. 432.5, the Conference approved the special appointments. (See Appointments, Section III.)

Methodist Ministers' Credit Union: C. M. Mitchell made the report for the Methodist Ministers' Credit Union.

Committee on Annual Conference Corporations: Key Taylor made the report for the Committee on Annual Conference Corporations. It was adopted.

Announcements: F. O. Fitzgerald made announcement concerning meal tickets. G. S. Eubank made announcement about housing at Mount Olive College.

W. K. Quick moved that we have the result of the first clerical ballot as listed be read. It was seconded. H. G. Ruark made amendment that list be revised. It was seconded. The original motion was then lost.

Announcement: H. B. Johnson made announcement concerning Committee on Conference Relations.

Leon Russell made announcement about Committee on Courtesies.

G. S. Eubank made request about housing of guests.

Benediction: The first session ended with benediction by Vergil E. Queen.

FIRST DAY, EVENING SESSION

Monday, June 12, 1967

Beginning at 7:15 the organist of St. Paul Methodist Church rendered an organ prelude, "All Creatures of Our God and King," by Rowley.

Opening: The Conference convened at 7:30. with Bishop Paul N. Garber in the chair. He led the call to worship, and Hymn No. 26, "Holy, Holy, Holy," was sung. Bishop Garber led the evening prayer.

Result of First Clerical Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the first clerical ballot. N. W. Grant was elected a delegate to the General Conference on the first clerical ballot.

Words of Welcome: Bishop Garber called on the host pastor, G. S. Eubank, to present The Honorable Thomas R. Robinson Mayor of Goldsboro. He brought warm words of welcome on behalf of St. Paul Methodist

Church and the City of Goldsboro. Bishop Garber responded with sincere words of appreciation.

Anniversary of the Board of Missions: The anniversary of the Board of Missions was observed, with T. M. Vick, president, presiding. The Hand Bell Choir of St. Joseph Methodist Church, Pikeville, presented special music. Mrs. James Rose was the director of this choir. L. C. Vereen read the Scripture.

The Board Chairman presented Dr. J. Harry Haines, General Secretary, Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief. He then addressed the Conference, emphasizing the suffering multitudes around the world.

J. E. Garlington, Conference Missionary Secretary, presented the report of the Board. It was adopted. He then presented a plaque to T. M. Vick in appreciation for his service as chairman of the Board for the past eight years.

Board of College Visitors: J. Kern Ormond, Chairman of the Board of College Visitors, made the report for the Board. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Church Architecture: N. W. Grant submitted the report of the Bishop's Committee on Church Architecture.

Conference Calendar: C. P. Morris reported on the preparation of the Conference Calendar.

Question 48: "Where shall the next session of the Annual Conference be held?" was called. C. D. Barclift issued an invitation for the 1968 session to be held at Fayetteville, Hay Street Methodist Church and Methodist College, joint hosts.

Greetings: W. L. Maness moved that greetings be sent to W. J. Underwood, who is ill in Chatham Memorial Hospital, Siler City, N. C. It was adopted. W. L. Maness then led in prayer.

Result of Second Clerical Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the second clerical ballot. C. W. Robbins was elected a delegate to the General Conference on the second clerical ballot.

Third Clerical Ballot: The third clerical ballot was taken.

Announcements: J. W. Page made announcement concerning Resolutions and References.

R. G. Dawson, C. G. McCarver, L. C. Vereen, W. C. Wilson made announcements.

Benediction: Wayland Cook gave the benediction.

SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION

Tuesday, June 13, 1967

An organ prelude, "Fanfare-Improvisation on 'Azmon,'" by Wyton, was rendered by the organist of St. Paul Methodist Church, beginning at 8:15.

Conference Convenes: The morning session convened at 8:30 with Bishop Paul N. Garber, presiding.

Ordination Service: Bishop Garber presided at the Ordination Service. The processional hymn, No. 406, "Heralds of Christ," was sung. Bishop Nolan B. Harmon read the scripture and led in prayer.

Mrs. Floyd Johnson, Director of Music, Centenary Methodist Church, New Bern, sang, "Lord, Make Me An Instrument of Thy Peace," by Duncan.

Bishop Paul V. Galloway of the Arkansas Area preached the Ordination Sermon.

Consecration of Directors of Music and Directors of Christian Education: Bishop Garber called upon the Conference Secretary, W. C. Wilson, to call the names and present the persons to be consecrated as Ministers of Christian Education and Directors of Christian Education. Bishop Garber led the service for the consecration of the following as Ministers of Education: William Kirk McNeill and Fred Falls, Jr.; Director of Christian Education: Richard Jerome Williams.

Ordination of Deacons: Bishop Garber asked the Conference Secretary to call the names of those to be elected deacons and present them for ordination. Bishop Garber led the service of Ordination, and he was assisted in the Ordination by Bishop Harmon and Bishop Galloway. Those ordained were: (See lists, Condensed Minutes, Section III.)

Ordination of Elders: Bishop Garber called on the Conference Secretary to read the names of those to be elected elders, and present them for Ordination of Elders. Bishop Harmon led in the Ordination. The class was ordained by Bishop Garber, assisted by Bishops Nolan and Galloway, T. B. Hough, O. L. Hathaway, H. G. Ruark, B. L. Davidson, Leon Russell, W. R. Stevens, R. G. Dawson, N. W. Grant, J. W. Page, V. E. Queen and C. G. McCarver. Those ordained as elders were: (See lists, Condensed Minutes, Section III.)

Result of Third Lay Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the third lay ballot for delegates to the General Conference. Dr. Leo W. Jenkins was elected on the third ballot.

Fourth Lay Ballot: The fourth lay ballot was taken.

Result of Third Clerical Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the third clerical ballot for delegates to the General Conference. W. M. Howard was elected a delegate to the General Conference on the third clerical ballot.

Fourth Clerical Ballot: The fourth clerical ballot was taken.

Memorial Service: Bishop Garber read selected appropriate scripture verses, after which the organist rendered the prelude: "Adagio in A Minor," by Bach. Hymn No. 73, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," was sung. The prayer was led by J. Malloy Owen III. The North Carolina Conference Quartet composed of Milton T. Mann, R. Bruce Pate, Paul B. Scott and Wallace H. Kirby sang "The Righteous, Living Forever," by F. Mendelssohn-Bartholdy.

Bishop Garber called the questions: "What ministers have died during the year?" The Conference Secretary, W. C. Wilson, read the list as follows: Woodrow D. Caviness, Eff David Dodd, Joel Walter Dimmette, Charles W. Guthrie, William H. Brown, William C. Martin, Harry Carleton Fraser, Holland L. Hale, Marvin Y. Self, Joshua J. Boone. "What ministers' wives have died during the year?" The Conference Secretary read the list as follows: Mrs. W. C. Lassiter, Mrs. S. J. Starnes, Mrs. J. J. Boone, Mrs. C. H. Caviness, Mrs. D. C. Geddie, Mrs. G. T. Adams, Mrs. S. A. Cotton, Mrs. H. L. Hendricks, Mrs. A. S. Barnes, Mrs. E. R. Clegg.

A. L. Thompson gave the Memorial Address using the theme: "Their Ultimate Concern." Hymn No. 66, "Praise, My Soul, the King of Heaven," by Lyte, was sung, after which James H. Bailey gave the benediction.

Question 42: "What ministerial members have been retired?" was called. The answer was: H. F. Pollock, J. P. Pegg, I. J. Strawbridge, J. R. Regan, W. C. Wilson.

Question 38: "Who have had their conference membership terminated?" was called. (a) By voluntary location? The answer was: Albert Folds.

Question 41: "Who are granted sabbatical leave?" was called. The answer was: J. H. Waldrop, L. H. Dodson.

Result of Fourth Lay Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the fourth lay ballot for delegates to the General Conference. There was no election.

Fifth Lay Ballot: The fifth lay ballot was taken.

Commission on World Service and Finance: C. H. Mercer, Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, presided during the presentation of the report. He submitted Report No. 1.

R. W. Pritchard called attention to a conflict in Report No. 1. He made motion that the words "including travel" in the last line, page 111, Book of Reports, be deleted. It was seconded. The chairman did not accept the change. A. F. Fisher spoke in favor of district superintendents' expense being paid by the Conference. R. M. Gradeless moved that Article (a) under Section VII be deleted. The Bishop ruled that this did not pertain to the Pritchard motion, and asked that it be considered later. H. G. Ruark stated that the Commission consult the district trustees as to amount available. The vote was taken on the Pritchard motion. It was lost. R. M. Gradeless then moved that Article (a) under Section VII be deleted. It was seconded. He then spoke to the motion. G. S. Eubank asked for privilege to correct impression left by Gradeless concerning Minimum Salary.

J. N. Gibson spoke, asserting that he did not believe our people had such a low regard for our district superintendents. He then read paragraph 801 of the 1964 *Discipline*.

M. W. Lawrence spoke, expressing his opposition to the motion, and asked for support of the recommendation of the Commission.

Sidney Stafford spoke in opposition to the motion, and then called attention to the cost of living.

Jack Crum spoke, emphasizing the comparison of salary schedule in small churches to that in large churches. He opposed the motion and urged adoption of the Commission report. The vote was taken, and the Gradeless amendment was lost.

Result of Fourth Clerical Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the fourth clerical ballot for delegates to the General Conference. C. D. Barclitt, H. G. Ruark, and Leon Russell were elected delegates to the General Conference on the fourth clerical ballot.

Fifth Clerical Ballot: The fifth clerical ballot was taken.

Announcement: C. P. Morris made announcement concerning time of dinner meeting for Directors of Education.

Commission on World Service and Finance (continued): Report No. 1 of the Commission was adopted.

Report No. II was presented by the chairman, C. H. Mercer. He moved its adoption.

Result of Fifth Lay Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the fifth lay ballot. Mrs. Sam A. Dunn was elected a delegate to the General Conference on the fifth lay ballot.

Sixth Lay Ballot: The sixth lay ballot was taken.

Commission on World Service and Finance (continued): Douglas Byrd asked the chairman a question as to Interdenominational Fund. He then moved that the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund be included in the Section C with Special Offering not included in the single asking Figure. It was seconded, and the vote was taken. The motion was passed by a vote of: for, 119; against, 115.

C. S. Hubbard spoke, commending the Commission for the new system of finances as proposed.

Amos Stone asked the Commission chairman a question: "What about the question of charge failing to pay its part on the Pension Fund?" The chairman said it would be taken care of.

Kelly J. Wilson made amendment that the Commission provide each local church with a brief statement of each of the component parts of the Annual Conference budget, and that a sheet showing the amount in per cent be provided to each local church each year.

Report of the Commission No. III was presented by the chairman. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Commission on Minimum Salary: G. S. Eubank presented the report of the Minimum Salary Commission. He moved its adoption. T. H. House expressed gratitude for what the Minimum Salary has done for him. E. L. Earnhardt spoke, emphasizing the ideals that we have been working with. He stated that he supports the plan of the Minimum Salary Commission. He then said that he felt we ought to work toward a goal of every minister's salary being the same. R. M. Gradeless spoke commending the chairman for his emphasis on taking care of our ministers in the smaller charges. The report was adopted.

Result of Fifth Clerical Report: Bishop Garber announced the result of the fifth clerical ballot for delegates to the General Conference. There was no election.

Sixth Clerical Ballot: The sixth clerical ballot was taken.

Announcements: R. G. Dawson made announcement.

F. O. Hunt made report of the Methodist Foundation, Inc. It was approved.

Benediction: W. C. Wilson gave the benediction.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Tuesday, June 13, 1967

The organist of St. Paul Methodist Church presented a fifteen-minute prelude entitled, "Prelude on Hymn, 'Be Thou My Vision,'" by Johnson-Walter.

Conference Brotherhood: The annual meeting of the Conference Brotherhood convened at 2:15 with K. R. Wheeler, president, presiding. Hymn No. 174, "Rise Up, O Men of God!" was sung, after which N. L. Jones led in prayer. The president urged more of the young ministers and laymen to join the Brotherhood. J. K. Bostick, Secretary-Treasurer, made the report for the Brotherhood. He moved the adoption of the report. It was approved.

The following officers were nominated and elected: President, K. R. Wheeler; Vice-President, N. L. Jones; Secretary-Treasurer, J. K. Bostick.

Conference Convenes:

Board of Publications: Bishop Garber presented C. P. Bowles, Jr., of the Methodist Publishing House. He reported that more than 2,000,000 copies of the New Hymnal have been shipped. He presented a check for \$9,523.28 from the Publishing House to the Conference to be administered by the Board of Pensions.

Charter Fund: Bishop Garber announced the receipt of a check from the Board of Pensions Charter Fund in the amount of \$125.00 to be administered by the Conference Board of Pensions.

Result of Sixth Clerical Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the sixth clerical ballot. There was no election.

Seventh Clerical Ballot: The seventh clerical ballot was taken.

Result of Sixth Lay Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the sixth lay ballot. There was no election.

Seventh Lay Ballot: The seventh lay ballot was taken.

Conference Board of Trustees: J. W. Page presented the report of the Conference Board of Trustees. He moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted.

North Carolina Pastors' School: Paul Carruth made the report of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

Board of Hospitals and Homes: Bishop Garber requested J. L. Joyce, chairman, to preside during the anniversary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. Hymn No. 200, "The Voice of God Is Calling," was sung, and the prayer was led by E. R. Clegg.

J. W. Lineberger introduced Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Speight, house parents in one of the cottages at the Children's Home.

The children's chorus from the Methodist Home for Children was presented. A program of songs and scripture was presented.

Reports of the various institutions: Methodist Home for Children statement was made by John M. Cline. Methodist Retirement Home statement was given by Mr. R. Dillard Teer, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Retirement Home.

The report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes was made by J. B. Parvin, secretary of the Board. He then submitted the names of Mr. Charles E. Buie, Jr., T. B. Hough, and Mrs. N. A. Thomas to the list of trustees of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., terms to expire in 1970. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

The chairman of the Board presented O. L. Hathaway, who addressed the Conference on the work of our agencies and institutions.

Result of Seventh Lay Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the seventh lay ballot. There was no election.

Eighth Lay Ballot: The eighth lay ballot was taken.

Result of Seventh Clerical Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the seventh clerical ballot. R. S. Cushman was elected a delegate to the General Conference.

Eighth Clerical Ballot: The eighth clerical ballot was taken.

Board of Pensions: C. W. Everette, Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions, was requested by Bishop Garber to preside during the emphasis of the Board. He presented Dr. Edge Gamble of the General Board of Pensions, Evanston, Illinois, who brought greetings from the General Board. Norwood L. Jones introduced Mr. John T. McDowell, Director of Public Welfare, Forsyth County, Winston-Salem. He addressed the Conference on the theme: "A Challenge of Involvement for the Aged."

Result of Eighth Clerical Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the eighth clerical ballot. C. P. Morris was elected a delegate to the General Conference. This completes the election of clerical delegates to the General Conference.

First Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The first clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Result of Eighth Lay Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the eighth lay ballot. A. K. King, Sr. was elected a delegate to the General Conference.

Ninth Lay Ballot: The ninth lay ballot was taken.

Board of Pensions (continued): N. L. Jones, Secretary, made the report. A. F. Fisher made motion that Section 3 of Report No. 1 be deleted. R. W. Ponder asked Bishop Garber if this section is deleted, would this remove this matter of liens on the minister's retirement. The Bishop ruled that it would remove the lien. Ponder then spoke in favor of deletion of Section 3. Clarence Warren spoke in favor of the Fisher motion. Russell Stott asked about the possibility of changing the sentence. C. H. Mercer asked for someone on the Board to explain why Section 3 of Report No. 1 was placed in the report. N. L. Jones gave explanation, stating that many churches from year to year fail to pay their Conference Claimants Fund. Key Taylor asked Bishop Garber if the *Discipline* states "may" or "shall." Bishop Garber then read Paragraphs 1634 and 1624, 1964 *Discipline*. Bishop Garber asked Dr. Edge Gamble for his opinion on this matter. Dr. Gamble said most conferences followed the *Discipline*. J. W. Page commended the Conference Pension Board for its work and made amendment that the matter be restudied. Clarence War-

ren moved a substitute amendment, that the provision for the filing of liens against the minister's pension annuity to cover the unpaid balance of the church's apportionment for the Conference Pension Fund and the provision for levying interest against said unpaid balance be referred to the Judicial Council with the request that it rule upon their legality and that enforcement of these provisions by the Conference Board of Pensions be delayed until ruling has been made. Fisher accepted this substitute motion.

J. Malloy Owen III spoke. R. W. Pritchard stated that he thought this had already been settled. The Bishop said that it had not.

Bishop Garber stated that he does not declare that it is mandatory.

The Warren motion was adopted.

Result of Ninth Lay Ballot: Bishop Garber announced the result of the ninth lay ballot. Paul Hardin III was elected a delegate to the General Conference. This completed the election of lay delegates to the General Conference.

First Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The first lay ballot was taken for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Board of Pensions (continued): Report No. 1 was adopted. Reports No. 2 and 3 were presented by the secretary of the Board. They were adopted.

Report No. 6 was presented and adopted.

Report No. 4 withdrawn and replaced. A new plan was presented by the secretary. He moved its adoption. C. L. Warren asked question concerning "term" or "life" insurance. Paul Carruth urged that we take action in favor of Report No. 4. M. J. Cowell asked if the church refuses to pay its part, does the policy go into effect? The chairman said that if the church does not pay the premium the minister must pay it if he wants the insurance. Dr. J. S. Blair spoke for the plan. H. G. Ruark asked the Conference Treasurer what per cent of ministers and churches responded to the Hospitalization Plan of our Conference. He answered that it was about 90 per cent.

G. S. Eubank offered amendment to be placed at the end of plan that this policy be optional with the church and the minister. It was seconded. He then spoke to his amendment. T. H. House spoke against the Eubank amendment. R. W. Morgan asked that the proposal be read again.

Bishop Garber asked that we adjourn and bring this matter up again at the evening session.

Benediction: The benediction was given by Bishop Garber.

SECOND DAY, EVENING SESSION

Tuesday, June 13, 1967

At 7:15 the organist rendered a prelude, "Rise Up, O Men of God!" by Bingham.

Conference Convened: At 7:30 the presiding officer, Bishop Paul N. Garber, called the session to order. Hymn No. 1, "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing," was sung.

Result of First Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the ninth clerical ballot. There was no election of delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Second Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The second clerical ballot for Jurisdictional Conference delegates was taken.

Higher Education: Bishop Garber asked J. A. Auman to make a statement concerning higher education. He expressed appreciation for financial support given to the colleges of our Conference. He also stressed the urgency of the churches meeting their pledges. He then challenged all churches to pay quotas in full by the time Bishop Garber retires in 1968.

Anniversary of Board of Lay Activities: Bishop Garber asked Bishop Nolan B. Harmon to take the chair.

Roy L. Turnage, Conference Lay Leader, presided during the anniversary of the Board of Lay Activities. Elbert A. Ward, lay leader of the Goldsboro District, read the scripture and led in prayer.

The sanctuary choir of St. Paul Methodist Church sang the anthem, "Behold Now, Praise the Lord," by Titcomb.

John Turner, lay leader of the Elizabeth City District for eight years, was recognized by the chairman. Taylor Oakes, lay leader of the Rocky Mount District, was also recognized. J. T. Patrick introduced Dr. Paul Hardin III, Duke University Law School, who addressed the Conference on the subject, "Go Into All the World."

Mrs. Paul Hardin III was presented to the Conference by the Conference Lay Leader.

The presiding officer announced that Walter F. Anderson has been selected as the Layman of the Year. The Conference expressed its appreciation by a standing vote. Walter Anderson responded with moving words of gratitude. He was presented a plaque as the layman of the year.

The emphasis on Lay Witness Mission was presented by William S. Marley of St. Luke Methodist Church, Goldsboro. He explained what the Lay Witness movement is.

The report of the Board of Lay Activities was submitted by James F. Rogers. He moved its adoption, and it was adopted. He also announced that Roy L. Turnage had been re-elected Conference Lay Leader. The election was approved.

Chair: Bishop Garber resumed the chair.

Result of First Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the first lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference delegates. Those elected were Jasper Smith, Mrs. L. C. Vereen, A. C. Edwards, Wade Pierce, Eldridge Fergus, and John Meares.

Second Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The second lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference delegates was taken.

Presentation: G. S. Eubank escorted Mrs. Nolan B. Harmon to the front and presented her to the Conference.

Board of Pensions (continued): N. L. Jones read again Report No. 4. G. S. Eubank withdrew his motion that the adoption of the Insurance Plan become optional by both church and pastor. He then moved that district superintendents present the proposed plan in first round of quarterly conferences, and if 75% of charges approve, it go into effect in June 1968. C. Settle Bunn spoke in favor of the motion. E. M. Herndon of Durham spoke in favor

of the life insurance plan. C. W. Everett explained the feeling of the Board of Pensions in proposing life insurance plan. H. L. Watson spoke against the motion. J. W. Page spoke concerning the matter of charges accepting this plan. He favored the Eubank motion. W. K. Quick offered an amendment that this plan become effective January 1, 1968, after the first round of Quarterly Conferences. Eubank accepted this amendment to the motion. E. L. Earnhardt spoke, stating that he does not want the church to pay his insurance. J. F. Coble emphasized the sense of brotherhood. H. L. Swain spoke in favor of the motion. Paul Carruth expressed his favor for the plan as submitted by the Board. R. W. Ponder moved previous question. The motion was carried. J. W. Page moved that the vote be by orders. The motion lost. R. W. Pritchard asked if plan applies to 75% or 100%. Everett answered, 100%. E. L. Earnhardt asked if this Annual Conference can delegate this matter to Quarterly Conferences. The chair ruled that it could. The Eubank motion was voted on and was carried.

H. G. Ruark offered amendment that during the period when asking for premiums on life insurance group policy, the Board of Pensions be requested to study question of how weaker charges or pastors on minimum salary can be assisted so that those pastors may participate in the insurance program. It was seconded. He then spoke to the amendment. The amendment was approved. The original plan was approved.

Jack Crum presented resolution concerning increasing the salaries of the ministers in the North Carolina Conference. Upon motion of Jack Page, the Resolution was referred to the Commission on Minimum Salary for study.

Result of Second Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the second clerical ballot for Jurisdictional Conference. G. S. Eubank was elected a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Third Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The third clerical ballot for Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Crum Resolution (continued): J. W. Page made motion that the resolution be referred to the Minimum Salary Commission (cited above). R. W. Ponder made substitute motion that the resolution be referred *with favor* to the Minimum Salary Commission. It was seconded, and passed. Paul Hardin III spoke, expressed disfavor for the Page motion. O. L. Hathaway spoke against the resolution. J. W. Lineberger, Jr. spoke words of praise for the Minimum Salary Commission. J. W. Page asked for privilege of clarifying his position. George Megill expressed concern about the identification of the ministry with the life, problems, and needs of our people, and that he is not against the Page motion.

Personal Privilege: Paul Hardin III asked for personal privilege, to say that the Minimum Salary Committee is not the group to consider this resolution. W. K. Quick moved previous question on everything. It was carried. Page accepts the Ponder amendment. The Ponder motion was adopted by a vote of: for, 98; against, 77.

Announcements: Announcements were made by the Conference Secretary.

Benediction: E. L. Earnhardt gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, MORNING SESSION

Following the Call to Worship, Hymn No. 91, "When Morning Gilds the Skies," was sung. The prayer was led by the chairman. Bishop Nolan B. Harmon addressed the conference on the topic, "The Song of Methodism."

F. B. Joyner submitted the report of the Commission on Worship. He moved its adoption and it was adopted.

Result of Third Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Garber announced the result of the third clerical ballot for Jurisdictional Conference. C. H. Mercer was elected a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Fourth Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The fourth clerical ballot for the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Result of Second Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the second lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference. There was no election.

Third Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The third lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Greetings: Bishop Garber presented Dr. Trigg James, an Executive Secretary of the Jurisdictional Conference. Dr. James spoke to the Conference.

Anniversary of the Board of Education: W. M. Howard, Jr., president of the Conference Board of Education, presided during the anniversary of this board. He presented Dr. Wright Spears, President of Columbia College, Columbia, South Carolina, who spoke to the Conference on the theme, "The Grand Option."

Herman Winberry, Secretary of the Board, presented the report of the Board. Section A was presented and was adopted. Section B was presented and adopted. Section C was presented and adopted. Sections D and E were presented and were adopted. Section F was presented and approved. Section G was presented. It was adopted. Section H was presented and approved. Section I was presented and approved.

Recommendations for Wesley Foundation Boards and Campus-Church Relations Committees were presented and approved.

First paragraph, page 52, Book of Reports, is to be omitted and new section added as presented.

W. M. Howard expressed appreciation for services of Wesley Brogan who leaves the Conference Board.

Emphasis on the Inter-Conference Commission on College and University Religious Life was presented by J. G. Huggin, a member of the Western North Carolina Conference and chairman of the Inter-Conference Commission. Mr. Huggin then called on Miss Kay Ritchie, a student at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and a member of the Commission, to speak to the Conference.

Announcement: L. C. Vereen made an announcement concerning the Ministers' Wives' Luncheon. G. S. Eubank gave direction as to how to get to the place of meeting of ministers' wives.

Theological Schools: R. E. Cushman addressed the Conference on the theme of our Methodist Theological Schools, emphasizing especially the financial needs in this area of the church's responsibility.

District Conference Records: R. W. Ponder submitted the report for the Committee on District Records. It was adopted.

Ministerial Training and Qualifications: J. V. Early called attention to Ministry Sunday and Orientation Worship. He moved adoption of Report 1. It was adopted.

Publishing Interests: Aaron Tyson presented the report of the Committee on Publishing Interests. It was approved.

Methodist Board of Publication, Inc.: O. K. Ingram presented the report of the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc.

Result of Fourth Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the fourth clerical ballot for Jurisdictional Conference. There was no election.

Fifth Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The fifth clerical ballot for Jurisdictional Conference delegates was taken.

Result of Fourth Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the fourth lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference. James F. Rogers and D. S. Coltrane were elected delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Fifth Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The fifth lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

North Carolina Christian Advocate: Dr. James Stokes, Editor of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and a member of the Western North Carolina Conference, was presented by Bishop Garber. He addressed the Conference on the place of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* in North Carolina.

W. C. Wilson paid tribute to the editor and the Piedmont Press as high quality printers of our Conference publications in use during the Annual Session.

Approved Supply Pastors' School: O. K. Ingram presented the Report of the Approved Supply Pastors' School. It was adopted.

Duke Endowment: Bishop Garber called the attention of the Conference to the beneficent aid of the Duke Endowment to the Conference. A motion was made to send a word of thanks to the Duke Endowment. It was approved by a standing vote of the Conference, M. Wilson Nesbitt spoke briefly concerning the Duke Endowment,

Resolution: James F. Rogers presented a resolution concerning appreciation to the Conference Secretary for publication of the Book of Reports and the Conference *Journal*. He moved the adoption of the resolution. W. C. Wilson stated some of the problems involved in publication of the Book of Reports and Conference *Journal*. The resolution was adopted.

Result of Fifth Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the fifth lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference. There was no election.

Sixth Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: The sixth lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference delegates was taken.

Anniversary of Deaconess Board: Bishop Garber asked R. E. L. Moser, Chairman of the Deaconess Board, to preside during the anniversary of the Deaconess Board. H. S. Garris led in prayer. The chairman presented Miss Ethelynde Ballance, a deaconess and director of Christian Education in the Raeford Methodist Church. She then spoke to the Conference on the program of deaconess work throughout the whole church. The report of the Board was submitted by Miss Bernice Ballance. She moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Commission on In-Service Training for Pastors: W. K. Quick presented the report of the Commission on In-Service Training for Pastors. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Question 37: "Who have been transferred out?" was called. The answer was Leighton M. Wilson to the Florida Conference, effective June 1, 1967. (Question 37 called previously.)

Question 1: "Who are elected for the quadrennium: secretary? statistician? treasurer?" The answer was: Secretary, W. C. Wilson; Statistician: D. D. Traynham; Treasurer: M. J. Cowell.

Question 2: "Is the Annual Conference incorporated?" was called. The answer was, "No."

Question 3: "What officers having funds of the Conference have been bonded and in what amounts?" was called. The answer was:

Assistant to the Treasurer, \$25,000.

Others in various offices, \$10,000.

Superintendent of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$50,000.

Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions, Inc., \$50,000.

Question 4: "Have the Conference Boards, Commissions, Committees been appointed or elected?" was called. The answer was, "Yes."

Question 5: "Have the secretaries, treasurers and statisticians kept their respective records upon and according to the forms prescribed by the Methodist Church?" was called. The answer was, "Yes."

Result of Sixth Lay Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the sixth lay ballot for Jurisdictional Conference delegates. W. C. Chadwick was elected.

First Lay Ballot for Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: The first lay ballot for reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Announcements: W. K. Quick made announcements concerning the Duke Banquet.

Board of Pensions: N. L. Jones presented Report No. 7 of the Board of Pensions. It was approved.

Resolution: Vernon C. Tyson presented a resolution amending Rule 6 of Part III of the Rules of Order and Procedure. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented Fletcher Nelson, a member of the Western North Carolina Conference and now with promotional work of Duke Divinity School. He spoke briefly.

Question: G. R. McKenzie raised a question about change of Conference date and payment of salaries to ministers. C. S. Hubbard and James F. Rogers both spoke on this matter. Bishop Garber said that this problem would be dealt with in a statement to be formulated soon. Paul Carruth asked question about whether this applied just to salaries and to Conference funds. Bishop Garber said it was only on ministers' salaries.

Benediction: W. M. Wells gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, June 14, 1967

At 2:00 p.m. the organist of St. Paul Church played as a prelude, "Introduction and Allegro," by Stanley.

Opening: The Conference convened at 2:15 with Bishop Garber in the chair. Hymn No. 1, "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing," was sung. The prayer was led by L. A. Dillman.

Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations: Bishop Garber asked D. S. Coltrane, Chairman of the Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations, to present this cause to the Conference. He explained the structure of the Jurisdictional system as has been in existence in The Methodist Church. He then called attention to a resolution printed in the Book of Reports, pages 62-64.

O. L. Hathaway spoke concerning the assignment of bishops in the plan of elimination of the Central Jurisdiction.

Dr. J. S. Blair spoke in favor of the resolution stating that he feels that the church is ready for this action.

H. L. Swain expressed his opposition to the resolution. He expressed the view that this matter of elimination of the Central Jurisdiction is a personal matter, and not one of what is right or what is wrong.

Paul Carruth spoke in favor of the resolution. He made a plea for an equal opportunity church.

Graham Eubank moved the previous question. The motion carried.

The resolution was voted on, and the result was as follows: for, 308; against, 162. The resolution was adopted.

Result of Fifth Clerical Ballot for Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the fifth clerical ballot for the Jurisdictional Conference. C. W. Goldston was elected a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Sixth Clerical Ballot: The sixth clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Result of Seventh Lay Ballot for Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the seventh lay ballot for reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. The following were elected: Mrs. H. A. Davis, Charles McAdams, and W. K. Stewart.

Eighth Lay Ballot for Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: The eighth lay ballot for reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Personal Privilege: R. G. Dawson presented the following resolution: "On behalf of the members of the Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations, I would like to move that this Annual Conference commend Mr. D. S. Coltrane for his careful, dynamic and patient leadership of the North Carolina Annual Conference in this difficult area of Christian growth and brotherhood." The resolution was adopted.

Anniversary of Commission on Christian Social Concerns: Bishop Garber asked R. L. Fleming, Jr., chairman, to preside during the anniversary of the Commission on Christian Social Concerns. Hymn No. 470, "God of Grace and God of Glory," was sung, after which C. W. Robbins led in prayer.

The anthem, "Inflammatu" (from *Stabat Mater*) by Rossini was presented by the sanctuary choir of St. Paul Church. Mrs. Herbert Waldrop was soloist in the rendition of this anthem.

R. E. Cushman introduced Dr. Harold A. Bosley, Minister, Christ Church, New York City. Dr. Bosley spoke to the Conference on the theme: "Vietnam Today."

Report of the Board submitted as follows: (1) Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs submitted by C. W. Robbins. R. W. Pritchard made amendment that eighth paragraph, page 22, Book of Reports, beginning with "Its leadership is bigoted . . ." and ending with "totalitarian, police state" be deleted. Previous question asked for. It was carried. The vote on the Pritchard amendment was taken and the amendment was defeated. (2) Division of Peace and Order was submitted by C. V. Bryant.

T. M. Vick moved that the entire section entitled "Vietnam," page 24, be deleted, and that the following be used instead: "It is moved to delete the entire section under the title "Vietnam." Retain the title and insert in the place thereof: "Our armed forces are involved in combat in Vietnam to support the government of Vietnam against aggression from the North which seeks to overcome and subdue the people of South Vietnam. We request all Christian people to pray to our God in heaven that He work in the hearts and minds of all men involved, on all sides of this struggle, to bring about in His mysterious way, changes in conditions (militarily and politically) necessary to create the climate of peace and prosperity under a truly democratic government of the people, by the people, and for the people." We would also request His guidance of our own government and military establishment toward this end. We would also commend the work of our military chaplains and missionaries in Vietnam." It was seconded. C. V. Bryant spoke in support of the original report. H. L. Watson asked Bryant a question about the report. J. Malloy Owen III expressed hope that our Conference would not approve the various demonstrations against our government. Russell Stott urged the Conference to support the report of the Board. Arnold Pope expressed his dismay at the language used in the report of the Board. He urged the adoption of the Vick motion. Harmon Smith offered a substitute to the

substitute that we delete the section beginning with the last sentence, fifth paragraph, and ending with the words, "South Vietnamese governments" (bottom of page) page 24, Book of Reports. Also, beginning with the first sentence at top of page 25, Book of Reports, delete the balance of that paragraph and the second paragraph. The Smith substitute motion was voted on: for, 118; against, 108. Thus the substitute prevails. Division 2 was approved as amended by the Harmon Smith substitute motion. (3) Division of Alcohol Problems and General Welfare was presented by Louis Allen, Jr. It was adopted.

Resolution: R. E. Cushman presented a resolution concerning formation of Commission on Ecumenical Affairs. C. H. Mercer made motion that the word "shall" may read "may." It was accepted by Cushman. The resolution was adopted.

Result of Sixth Clerical Ballot for Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the sixth clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. J. V. Early was elected a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Seventh Clerical Ballot for Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: The seventh clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Result of Eighth Lay Ballot for Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the eighth lay ballot for reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. There was no election.

Ninth Lay Ballot for Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: The ninth lay ballot for reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Benediction: The benediction was given by W. R. Stevens.

Opening: The Conference convened at 7:25, with Bishop Paul N. Garber in the chair.

Announcement: Paul Carruth made an announcement concerning the Committee on Petitions to the General Conference.

Result of Ninth Lay Ballot for Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the ninth lay ballot for reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. Elbert Ward was elected a reserve delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Tenth Lay Ballot for Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: The tenth lay ballot for reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Blue Ridge Methodist Service Program: Bishop Garber presented the Reverend Arthur B. Pearce, program director of the Blue Ridge Methodist Service Program and a member of the Western North Carolina Conference, who spoke briefly to the Conference.

Anniversary of the Board of Evangelism: Paul C. Browning, Chairman of the Conference Board of Evangelism, was asked by Bishop Garber to preside at the anniversary program of the Board. Hymn No. 283, "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling," was sung, after which H. M. McLamb led in prayer. C. A. Simonton, Board Secretary, gave the report of the Board. Then he asked for H. M. McLamb to supplement the report. Paul Browning listed recommendations of the Board. They are: (1) Recommend the reappointment of H. M. McLamb as conference Executive Director of Evangelism. The conference approved the recommendation. (2) Recommend the reappointment of H. B. Jones and Robert J. Rudd as Approved Conference Evangelists. The conference approved the recommendation. Robert H. Gibbons sang "So Great Salvation."

Result of Tenth and last Lay Ballot for Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the tenth lay ballot for reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. Mrs. Troy J. Barrett was elected a reserve delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference. Roy Turnage spoke words of appreciation on behalf of all elected lay delegates and pledged their best for the Conference.

Board of Evangelism (continued): H. M. McLamb introduced the Reverend Ed Beck, Director, Department of Evangelists, General Board of Evangelism, Nashville, Tennessee. Mr. Beck then addressed the Conference.

Statement: Corbin Cherry made statement concerning the need of complete dedication and a closer walk with God, both among ministers and laymen.

Committee on Conference Relations: Allen Wentz reported in answer to the following questions:

Question 40: "Who are the supernumerary ministers and for what number of years consecutively has each held this relation?" was called. The answer was: C. Ray West, this year, 1967-68.

Question 41: "Who are granted sabbatical leave?" was called. The answer was: J. H. Waldrop, L. H. Dodson.

Question 42: "What ministerial members have been retired: (a) This year? J. P. Pegg, H. F. Pollock, J. R. Regan, I. J. Strawbridge, W. C. Wilson,

Question 43: "What Approved Supply Pastors have been retired?" (a) This year? No one. (b) Previously? Z. V. Cowan, W. J. Freeman, C. M. Kelly, P. M. Porter, J. M. Carroll, L. F. Harris.

Inter-Board Coordinating Council: W. M. Howard presented the report of the Inter-Board Coordinating Council. He moved the adoption of the report. R. W. Ponder moved that Section II, page 319, 1966 Conference *Journal* be placed in the report of the Inter-Board Coordinating Council, page 62, Book of Reports, 1967, in the place of all in the report after the second paragraph. Russell Stott asked question as to what prompted the Council to make changes. The Chairman said he could not speak for the whole Board.

Result of Eighth Clerical Ballot for Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the eighth clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. T. A. Collins, O. K. Ingram, and B. L. Davidson were elected delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Ninth Clerical Ballot for Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: The ninth clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Motion: J. A. Auman made motion that the names of all persons not receiving as many as ten votes be eliminated from the reading list. It was seconded and approved.

Report of Inter-Board Council (continued): W. K. Quick spoke in opposition to the Ponder motion. C. W. Goldston expressed his approval of the motion. Roy L. Turnage spoke in favor of the Council report. Kelly Wilson expressed his opposition to the Ponder motion. R. G. McKenzie moved the question. It was seconded and carried. The Ponder amendment was lost. The Council report was adopted.

Long-Range Planning Committee: W. S. Potter made report for the Long-Range Planning Committee. He moved the adoption. C. H. Mercer asked the chairman about District Superintendent travel. Mercer moved that the section on travel for District Superintendents be deleted. H. G. Ruark moved that all the report after "Report of Automobile Leasing Survey" be deleted and referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance. It was approved. The first part of the report was approved.

Parsonage Standards: Mrs. C. D. Barclift made the report for the Committee on Parsonage Standards. It was approved.

Question 6: "What is the report of the Statistician?" was called.

Bishop Garber called on D. D. Traynham, Conference Statistician, who gave the statistical report. The report was adopted. (See Sections V and VII.)

Result of Ninth Clerical Ballot for Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the ninth clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. There was no election.

Tenth Clerical Ballot: The tenth clerical ballot for delegates to the jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Announcements: Announcements were made by the Secretary.

Benediction: Paul Browning gave the benediction.

FOURTH DAY, MORNING SESSION

Conference Convenes: The Conference convened at 9:20 a.m. with Bishop Paul N. Garber in the chair.

Result of Tenth Clerical Ballot for Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the tenth clerical ballot for election of delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. There was no election.

Eleventh Clerical Ballot for Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: The eleventh clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Personal Privilege: O. L. Hathaway asked that greetings be sent to B. G. Childs and to the retired ministers unable to attend this Conference. It was approved.

Anniversary of Commission on Town and Country Work: Bishop Garber presented Garland Stafford, a member of the Western North Carolina Conference.

Reginald Ponder, Chairman, was asked to preside during this anniversary observance. Hymn No. 59, "We Gather Together," was sung, after which Paul G. Bunn read the scripture. George W. Johnson led the morning prayer. The North Carolina Conference quartet, composed of W. H. Kirby, Paul B. Scott, Bruce Pate, and Milton Mann, sang an anthem, "The Church's One Foundation."

Walter N. McDonald introduced M. Wilson Nesbitt, Director, the Work of Rural Church, the Duke Endowment, and a member of the Western North Carolina Conference. Mr. Nesbitt then addressed the Conference on the topic, "The Rural Church and its Witness."

Result of Eleventh Clerical Ballot for the Jurisdictional Conference: Bishop Garber announced the result of the eleventh clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. There was no election.

Twelfth Clerical Ballot for Delegates to Jurisdictional Conference: The twelfth clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Commission on Town and Country Work (continued): Roy Turnage spoke words of appreciation to Reginald Ponder and to a Mr. Tew of Lane's Chapel Church, Greenville District, for work done. Mr. Ponder is chairman of the Commission. Mr. Tew furnished replicas of Lane's Chapel and parsonage and placed them in the Book Room.

Mr. Turnage moved that a double number of Conference programs will be printed next year so that all visitors as well as delegates attending the Conference may have one. It was approved.

Charles Owens presented Reports 1, 2, and 3. They were adopted. Report

No. 4 was presented, and its approval was seconded. Rufus Smithson spoke against Report No. 4. Vernon Tyson moved the deletion of section "to the end that by the 1971-72 Conference year there be no charge with a total membership under 250 (church extension charges excepted)" at top of page 105, Book of Reports. W. N. McDonald and T. H. House spoke briefly. Reginald Ponder spoke words of explanation in favor of the report. Frank Lloyd offered an amendment to the Tyson amendment that the entire paragraph (No. 1), pp. 104-105, Book of Reports, be deleted. It was seconded. He spoke to the amendment. Paul Bunn spoke against the amendments. C. S. Bunn spoke against the amendments. G. R. McKenziie moved the previous question. The Conference defeated the Lloyd amendment. The Tyson amendment was defeated. Report 4 was adopted. Report No. 5 was presented and approved.

Petitions to General Conference: Paul Carruth, Chairman of Committee on Petitions to the General Conference, presented a petition dealing with appointment of supply pastors. Many of its members are fascistic, intolerant, murderous. Their aims are political. They want to get control of local, state, and national governments. They must be exposed for what they are: a conniving, inhuman, power-crazed rabble that would turn our country into a totalitarian, police state;" and that the following be inserted: "The leadership gives indications of bigotry and irresponsibility. They must be exposed to the light of publicity whenever their actions are illegal, immoral, or inhuman. The impact of Christian love and brotherhood must be maintained as a constant challenge to hatred and prejudice." The Tyson motion was approved.

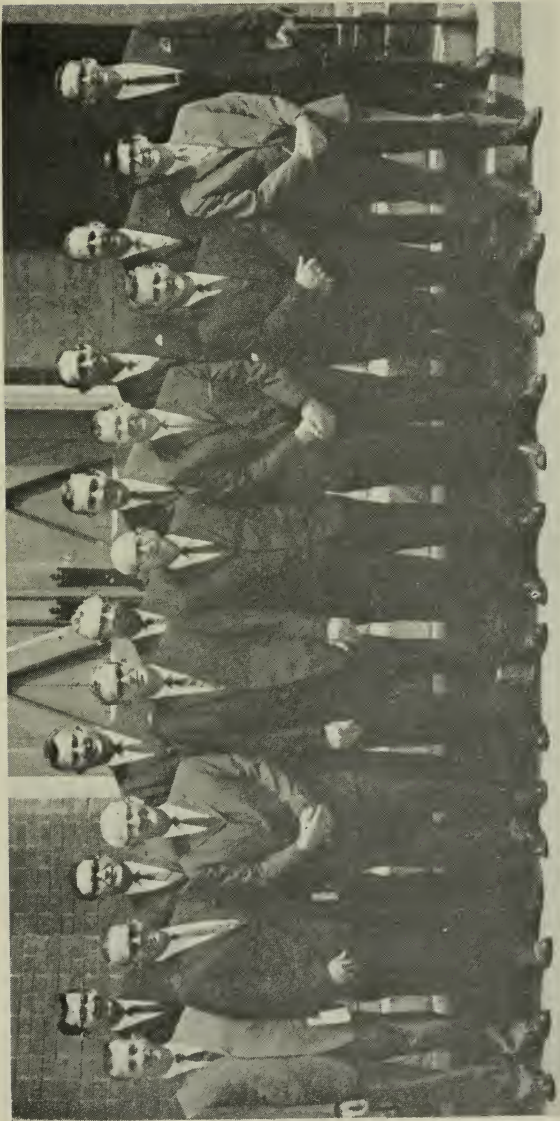

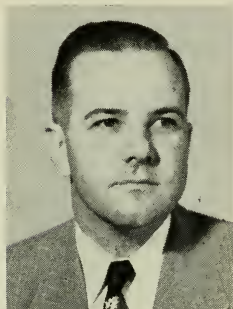

WOODROW DARLINGTON CAVINESS

1919 - 1966

I do not believe that death alone can take away a man. It only separates him temporarily from us. The indelible marks of his character, his dreams, his ideals live on through those of us whose lives he has touched. When death came to Woodrow Darlington (Woody) Caviness it succeeded only in his transition beyond the limits of our horizons. Woody was born on April 24, 1919, at Reidsville, N. C., son of the late Rev. and Mrs. C. H. Caviness. A son of the parsonage, he lived within the bounds of both the Western North Carolina and the North Carolina Conferences. He attended Louisburg College, received his A.B. degree from Wofford College, Spartanburg, S. C., and the B.D. degree from the Duke University Divinity School. He had additional training at the College of William and Mary, Williamsburg, Va., and the Naval Air Station, Great Lakes, Ill., in preparation for a commission to the chaplaincy of the Navy. He joined the North Carolina Conference in 1942 at Wilson and was ordained a Deacon and an Elder in 1943. Since admission his appointments have been at Franklin Memorial, Morehead City; Saint Luke, Goldsboro; Saint Paul, Durham; First Methodist Church, Havelock; and the Ayden Methodist Church which he was serving at the time of his death.



The accomplishments of this pastor-preacher were many. In 1950 he was assigned to Saint Luke Church in Goldsboro, a church that existed only in the minds and hearts of a few people. Under his leadership and guidance and through the ingenuity of his organizational ability, Saint Luke stands today as a monument to Christianity and a testimony to his love for people and concern for God's kingdom.

In every appointment Woody was active in the civic life of the community. At the time of his death he was a member of the Ayden Rotary Club, serving on four different standing committees. He also served as secretary of the Conference Board of Missions and served a term as president of the Duke Alumni Association.

Perhaps his main concern was young people, for in every church and every community he managed to have an active organization of youth. A layman in his church wrote, "He had a persistent way of searching out people and getting them involved in the life of the church. He showed a sense of dedication to the work of the church to an extent that is often rare even in the life of most ministers. It was a passion with him that could not be denied with anything less than the best he had to give."

Death came unexpectedly on September 10, 1966. Funeral services were conducted on September 12, at the Ayden Methodist Church by the Reverend W. R. Stevens, his district superintendent, and the Reverend L. T. Wilson. Interment was at Pleasant Grove Cemetery, Siler City, N. C. He is survived by his two children, Jan and Dale.

EFF DAVID DODD

1884 - 1966

Reverend Eff David Dodd was born February 11, 1884, in Clayton, Johnson County, North Carolina, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Dodd, and answered the summons to his heavenly Father on October 13, 1966. He leaves surviving him his wife, Nora F. Dodd, and two children: David, of Monroe, N. C., and Christine Johnson of Raleigh, N. C. Christian services were conducted for him in the Fuquay-Varina Methodist Church by the writer and the Reverend G. W. Crutchfield. His earthly remains were tenderly interred in Fuquay-Varina to await the resurrection.



Brother Dodd attended Trinity College (now Duke University), where he earned the A.B. degree. After having served three years as an accepted supply, he was admitted into the North Carolina Conference in 1912, at which time he was ordained Deacon and two years later received the ordination of Elder. He served faithfully for 36 years as an itinerant minister in our conference. In 1948 he retired and lived in Fuquay-Varina, N. C. until his death. After his retirement he was very faithful to the church in assisting the pastors, and taught a Sunday school class as long as he was able. He served quite a number of charges in the Conference, among them Williamston, Norlina, and Fuquay-Varina.

Who is capable of eulogizing one of God's servants? Who can evaluate the lasting fruit of his ministry? Who is able to express in human language the immortality of his ministry and influence? I cannot. His influence upon my own life is as eternal as the marching ages which are yet to come. The Holy Spirit guided him in helping me to find my place in the divine plan for my life which was, of course, in the ministry of the Methodist church.

E. D. Dodd was a good preacher. He proclaimed with profound sincerity *The Unsearchable Riches of Christ*. He knew what he believed, why he believed, and Whom he believed. Never was there a note of uncertainty with respect to the Saviorhood and Lordship of the Lord Jesus in his preaching. The psalmist said, "No man careth for my soul." He should have known Brother Dodd and he would have found a man who did care. For great was Dodd's compassion for souls. A union revival was held in Williamston during his pastorate there which stirred the town from center to circumference. He was the foremost leader in this united effort. Deep were his convictions as to the difference between right and wrong. With courage he proclaimed that which was right and denounced the evil of our day. In his last illness, while in the hospital, he witnessed to nurses and orderlies as to the saving power of Jesus.

I am sure that he has heard the words of commendation from his Lord: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things; I will make thee ruler over many."

JOEL WALTER DIMMETTE

1884 - 1966

Reverend Joel Walter Dimmette, the son of James F. Dimmette and Sarah Ann Wiles Dimmette, was born March 3, 1884, in Wilkes County near Wilkesboro, N. C. Death came December 7, 1966, at Rex Hospital in Raleigh, N. C. Funeral services were held in Cary Methodist Church and interment was in Lakeview Memorial Park, Greensboro, N. C. He gave good account of the eighty-two years God gave him upon this earth.



He attended the public schools of Wilkes County. Further preparation was made at Wake Forest College, Duke University, and Duke Divinity School. He prepared himself well, and applied his talents and training diligently.

On October 23, 1913, he was married to Miss Margaret Paulina Robinson of Stokes County. This was a wonderful marital relation, sealed with love and devotion. They were truly workers together with God and for God. I have visited but few homes where prayer was so real, so meaningful, and so effective. God gave to this couple five wonderful children and twelve grandchildren. Patty, now Mrs. I. U. Townsley, with her husband who is also a missionary, spent twenty years in the Belgian Congo. They are now located in New York City. William A. Dimmette is deceased. Joel Powell lives in Greensboro. Dr. Robert M. Dimmette, a pathologist, is in San Diego, Calif. Dr. James E. Dimmette, a gynecologist, is practicing in Dallas, Texas. Mrs. Dimmette is making her home in Cary, the place of their retirement.

For ten years Brother Dimmette was a public school teacher. In the schoolroom he cultivated the deep love that he always had for children and youth, a virtue that he never lost. Wherever he went he always had a wonderful response from the children and young people.

In 1918 he left the schoolroom and entered the ministry. That same year he joined the North Carolina Conference. During the active thirty-nine years of his ministry he served the following charges: Bladen, Shallotte, Vanceboro, Lakewood-Durham, Pink Hill, Leesburg, Graham, Cedar Grove, Swepsonville, Perquimans, Spring Hope, Aurora, Rockingham Circuit, Ellerbe, Laurel Hill, Central Laurinburg, Stedman, Princeton, Pine Level, and Faison. He retired from Faison in 1957, bought a home in Cary and lived there until the time of his death.

I met Joel Walter Dimmette in 1925 on the campus of Duke University. He was then, and remained through the years the embodiment of what I have always looked for in a minister: humble, a good preacher, devoted pastor, and a true evangelist. Through his ministry many people found their way to salvation. Stewardship always advanced under his ministry. He enjoyed improving church property or the building of a new church.

He loved home, and made his house a place of life and joy. Like Abraham of old he commanded his house after him, and all his children, with a multitude of friends, rise up and call him blessed.

There can be no finer tribute given than the following poem, "Straight and Tall," written by his son, Dr. James E. Dimmette, of Dallas, Texas:

STRAIGHT AND TALL

I knew a man with pride and honor, a man who was straight and tall.
 A man who fought for what he believed and was loved and respected by all.
 A man who was filled with love and sincerity, who lived his life for God.
 With an example of truth and a way of life that few have ever trod.
 A man who rose with a smile each morning, who gave his best each day.
 A man who gave me a life I could live and I am grateful he showed me the way.

I will never forget how he walked in the yard and often visited the flowers.
 A man that was filled with sunshine and hope and always welcomed the showers.
 He brought from the earth the best it had, but tilled his soil and seeded
 A way of life, a sense of strength that everyone wanted and needed.
 A life that was full of examples and truth, a salvation that one could live by,
 A spirit of hope, a life of faith that one could lie down and die by.

All men are created the same by God, it's what they *do* that makes the difference.
 And whether they accept their challenge of life with gratitude and reverence.
 This man had the same twenty-four-hour day, the same sun and moon that we do,
 But what he did with his life, what he made of his stay is what I shall try to live

CHARLES WATSON GUTHRIE

1888 - 1966

A carpenter named Jesus was called, was baptized by the Holy Spirit and served
 God in the role of the Son.

A carpenter named Charles was called, was baptized by the Holy Spirit and served
 God in the role of a son.

One in trade, one in calling, one in baptism, one in
 glory. Is not this the promise? Amen.

Charles Watson Guthrie was born November 17,
 1888, to Elijah and Fannie Guthrie of Carteret County.
 He died December 27, 1966, in Albemarle Hospital in
 Elizabeth City, North Carolina. His body was returned
 to his home and former pastorate in Wanchese where
 friends and family paid their last respects. This was in
 keeping with the pattern of this beloved man's ministry.

After being received on trial in 1918 into the Blue
 Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal
 Church, and serving the required year on the Bessemer
 City Circuit in Gaston County, this ex-carpenter and
 his new bride, Nanny, returned to his boyhood home
 to serve the Morehead City Circuit. Charles Watson, Jr.
 was born and lived only thirty days while they served
 this work. From Morehead City Circuit they were trans-
 ferred to Troy, where son Douglas O'Dell was born in

September 1923. A third son, Jack Donald, was born in November 1927, while Brother
 Charlie was in his second appointment to the Morehead City Circuit. Sam Long, the
 fourth child, was born at King's Mountain in 1930.

Charles and Nannie Guthrie and their sons moved like most traveling preachers, but
 loving laymen and understanding bishops kept the Guthries returning to familiar scenes.
 Charles Guthrie returned to three of his former charges, some more than once, because
 the members asked for his return; they loved him so much. He remained at his last
 appointment at Wanchese for nine consecutive years. His battle hymn was "A Charge



To Keep," and he lived it literally for forty years. After forty-two years of active service at the charges named above and at Swan Quarter, Pikeville, Newton, Northgate, Marshallburg, and Harmony, he retired. But retirement did not mean that Charlie Guthrie stopped work. He served as a supply pastor of the Methodist congregation at Avon, and even served as pastor of the Manteo Baptist Church until they could get a pastor. He served his last years as the associate pastor of the Kitty Hawk Charge preaching at Colington and Duck each month.

We who knew him and served with him in his last years could understand the power that had brought about his appointments and long tenures. Charles Guthrie was a pastors' pastor. The quiet strength of his spirit could fill a troubled soul with serenity the same way his glorious voice could fill a sanctuary with the gospel. His gentle humor taught us to laugh off our petty troubles and seek forgiveness for our "feverish ways." As one of the younger ministers of the county expressed it, "Brother Guthrie just waits for you to bring your troubles to him, and then he makes you leave them there." A master of the care of souls, a tough-spirited defender of the weak, and a beacon of love, Charles W. Guthrie was a pastor. His passing does not leave an emptiness in our lives so much as it does a sense of being led one more step onward in the faith in which he lived and died to live eternally.

WILLIAM HENRY BROWN

1874 - 1966

William Henry Brown was born October 23, 1874, to Peyton James Brown, Sr., and Maggie King Brown at Louisburg, North Carolina. Brother Brown was educated in the public schools of North Carolina and Trinity College, Duke University, Durham, North Carolina.



Brother Brown was admitted to the North Carolina Annual Conference on trial and ordained a deacon in Wilmington, North Carolina in 1902 and ordained an elder in 1906.

He served the following charges: Plymouth, North Gates, Roanoke Island, Gates Circuit, Aberdeen-Biscoe, St. John-Gibson, Mt. Gilead, West End Circuit, Jenkins Memorial, Oxford, Goldsboro Circuit, Four Oaks, Epworth, Jackson Springs. He also served as assistant Conference statistician for 29 years. Retirement from the active ministry from Epworth Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C., was in December 1936. He moved to Jackson Springs in Moore County, N. C., where he lived for more than twenty-five years. He entered the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, N. C. on August 25, 1961.

Brother Brown married Miss Margaret Hinton and there were born to this Christian union William Hinton Brown and Margaret Elizabeth Brown.

Death occurred at Duke Hospital on December 28, 1966. Funeral services were conducted at the West End Methodist Church, West End, N. C., by the pastor, Rev. J. D. Aycock, assisted by Rev. P. H. Mayfield and Dr. J. F. Coble, on December 30, 1966. He was buried in the West End Cemetery. Survivors include the wife, Mrs. Margaret Hinton Brown, Methodist Retirement Home, Durham, N. C.; one son, William Hinton Brown, Rutherfordton, N. C.; one daughter, Margaret Elizabeth (Mrs. J. R.) Warren, Lynchburg, Va., and three grandsons.

This faithful servant of Christ served the Methodists of eastern North Carolina with love, passion, and dignity. He was a forcible and practical gospel preacher and the peo-

ple heard him gladly and with profit. The response of his ministry from the people was one of warmth and friendliness. It was my privilege to be with Brother Brown and Brother Coble in district meetings across the conference as they represented the Methodist Retirement Home and I witnessed the love and affection of a former pastor and the people he served in the name of Christ and The Methodist Church.

In the twenty-five years of retirement at Jackson Springs, he preached for our Methodist brethren, for the Presbyterians, and was a great Christian to all people.

The six years at the Retirement Home were filled with contentment. He was one of the best witnesses for the Home. Many times I have heard him speak with firm and effective words about how much the Home meant to him and Mrs. Brown. He spoke as one with authority.

Brother Brown lived within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference for 92 years. He served the people and the conference with fidelity and lived to see great progress built upon the foundation of his ministry. He lived among us long enough to become the No. 1 minister in the Chronological Roll of the Conference and from the time he was admitted into the North Carolina Conference in 1902, this is the first time he has not answered the roll call (65 years). He will not answer the roll call for this year because he has answered the roll call in our Father's house. May the blessings of a wonderful husband, father, grandfather, and pastor fall upon us all who have had the privilege of sharing a great life lived among us for Christ's sake.

WILLIAM CHRISTIAN MARTIN

1882 - 1967

In his book, *Methodism in the Upper Cape Fear Valley*, Franklin Grill notes that the Methodist Conference meeting in New Bern in 1907 took two significant actions. It supported a resolution by Dr. M. T. Plyler to appeal to President Theodore Roosevelt to reinstate the motto "In God We Trust" on all coins. And it admitted William Christian Martin into full membership in the conference.



In 1882 in a small rural church in Northampton County, North Carolina, an infant boy was presented to the presiding elder, Dr. Christian, for baptism. When the question, "With what name shall I baptize this child?" was asked, the mother requested that he be named after the minister who was about to place his hands upon her son. And in that moment she also expressed her desire that the child give his life to the Methodist ministry as had the man for whom he was named. So it was that William Christian Martin of Northampton County received his name, was dedicated in Christian baptism, and gave his life to the Methodist church as one of the most effective ministers in the North Carolina Conference.

In the previously mentioned book, Mr. Grill has given an excellent account of the early life of Brother Christian Martin and the significance of his ministry on the Lillington Circuit to which he was first appointed in 1907, the same year that he was admitted into the conference. He held that charge for two years from 1907-1909 and Grill says, "From the standpoint of progress and opportunity, those two years of Martin's ministry on the Lillington Circuit were the finest in the three decades since the organization of the church (in Lillington). With an exceptional vigor and interest in his work, William Martin won the hearts of the people, built a new church at Lillington, and revitalized the life of some of the circuit churches." These were to be the characteristics of his entire life and ministry: progress, vigor, vitality, and building anew. As evidence of the great esteem in which he was held in Lillington, he was invited back to preach periodically from the time he left there until his death, 1967.

On June 10, 1908, the Reverend William Christian Martin took Miss Luzie Moss of Littleton as his wife. Their union was blessed with three sons who were the pride of their father's life: William Southgate of Aiken, S. C.; Dr. Benjamin Franklin of Winston-Salem; and William Christian, Jr., of Salisbury. Each has made a significant contribution in his chosen profession as befits the issue of such an outstanding sire. The couple had a long and fruitful ministry together until in 1944, when they were serving in Roxboro, Miss Luzie was taken by death. Two years later Martin married Elizabeth Raines of Abbeville, S. C., and she was his constant and faithful companion for the rest of his life.

In 1909 Martin was ordained as deacon and appointed to the work at Duke, or Erwin as it is known today. After Erwin he was appointed to Chadbourn and was ordained an elder in 1911. Subsequently, he served the Durham Circuit and West Durham (now Asbury Church), which was located just across the street from his old alma mater, Trinity College. Pastorates at Hay Street in Fayetteville, Fifth Avenue in Wilmington, and First, Henderson, followed with outstanding success in every area of organized church life. First Church, Henderson, is a memorial to his ability to get a difficult job done by winning the hearts of the people and then sending them out to work.

One of his closest friends who served with him for many years, and under him after he was appointed superintendent of the Wilmington District, Rev. Leon Hall, says, "W. C. had the ability to see what needed to be done, the vision to plan how to do it, and the drive to get the job done." His driving ambition was for his churches to excel, and under his leadership they all did. He was an eloquent orator in the pulpit like several of his contemporaries, but at public prayer he had few equals. "When he prayed it was as though he was reminding the Lord of a few things He might have forgotten," says Leon Hall. He did not move people with flowery phrases. He moved them to action. He was an evangelistic preacher of the old school and people responded in marvelous ways.

After six years on the Wilmington District Brother Martin went to Roxboro where, as was previously noted, his first wife died, he married his second wife and then moved to Beaufort where he became ill and had to leave after only two years. From Beaufort he and Mrs. Martin moved to Clayton where he suffered a severe heart attack and was forced to retire from active service. He and his wife built a small home in Clayton and he settled down to being an "active" retired minister. This writer knew him as a brotherly, alert, always helpful colleague and teacher supreme of the Lena Barbour Class in the Sunday school. I shall always be grateful that I had the opportunity to serve with him in Clayton.

On February 22, 1967, I was up town when I heard somebody say, "the preacher's had a heart attack!" No one had to tell me who the man was talking about. W. C. Martin was "Preacher" to everyone in Clayton. It turned out to be a fatal attack and he died a few hours later. We held his funeral in the last church he served, in Clayton, and laid his body to rest in his family plot at Montlawn near Raleigh.

Like Abraham he was "the friend of God" and that friendship was the guiding principle of his life.

HARRY CARLETON FRASER

1885 - 1966

Retired Army Colonel Harry Carleton Fraser, a member of the North Carolina Conference since 1917, died on December 26, 1966, in Pomona, California, after suffering a stroke.



He was born May 14, 1885, in Rochester, N. Y. He attended the Mount Hermon School at Northfield, Mass., Columbia University, and Iowa Wesleyan College, Mount Pleasant, Iowa, where later he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree. He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity.

For six years he served as a YMCA secretary in Manila, P. I. At the outbreak of World War I he joined the Army Chaplains' Corp and saw combat duty in Germany. He became a charter member of the American Legion. For service during World War II he was awarded the Legion of Merit. He organized the Air Force Chaplains' Corps and became its first chief of chaplains. He retired after thirty years service as an army chaplain. He was in charge of chaplains in Japan and Korea at the time.

After retiring from the army, he became assistant pastor and minister of visitation in the First Methodist Church of Glendale, Calif. He was co-organizer of the

Glendale YMCA International Club and an active member of the La Canada Kiwanis Club. His Claremont affiliations included the American Legion of LaVerne, the Methodist Church of Claremont, the University of Claremont, and the Masonic Lodge.

Funeral services were held at the Claremont Methodist Church, with Dr. Pierce Johnson, the pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Arlington National Cemetery.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Louise Schell Fraser; three daughters: Mrs. Elizabeth F. Ganns of St. Louis, Mo.; Mrs. Louise F. Holder of Memphis, Tenn.; and Mrs. Ruth F. Cloudt of Rock Springs, Texas, and eight grandchildren.

HOLLAND LUTHER HALE, SR.

1927 - 1967

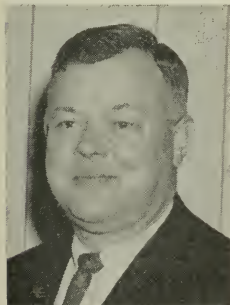
Holland Luther Hale, Sr. was born January 16, 1927, in Vansant, Va. He received his education in Grundy High School, Grundy, Va., Emory and Henry College, Emory, Va., Tennessee State College, Johnson City, Tenn., and Duke Divinity School, Durham.

Holland knew early in life what he wanted to do. He joined the Holston Conference in 1945 when he was 18 years old. His first appointment was Bradley Street Methodist Church, Bristol, Tenn. During this time he was also principal of Leemaster Elementary School. Later he was appointed to the Cedar Bluff Methodist Church and he became principal of the Cedar Bluff Elementary School. He then transferred to Duke University and the North Carolina Conference.

In his quiet, penetrating manner he founded one church that will forever be a monument to his ministry—Faymont Methodist Church—later renamed Asbury, in Fayetteville. He served in Fayetteville for five years. Then he moved to Rockingham. It was here he met Mrs. Dilys Rowlands Reece, a widow with three beautiful children, Susan, Kathy, and Elizabeth Ann.

Holland married Dilys and accepted the responsibility of caring for his stepchildren. Later his wife gave birth to their only son, who was named Holland Luther Hale, Jr.

After serving the West Rockingham-Zion charge for five years he was transferred to the Windsor charge where he served for four years. He then served Leesburg-Salem for



ten months until he suffered a fatal heart attack on April 11, 1967.

The words of the hymn, "Rise up, O men of God! Have done with lesser things; give heart and mind and soul and strength to serve King of kings," express the faith, character, and philosophy of Holland Hale, who served the North Carolina Conference for fifteen years.

There are certain privileged ones who carry a quality of strength and tranquility with them wherever they go, always able to bring forth the good in any situation. You listen to the calm, mature, gentle words of them and they bear your thought into a new realm of beauty, purity, and light.

Holland Hale was one of these privileged individuals. How well he understood the restlessness, the discontents, the impatience of youth. Always pressing forward trying to improve every church family he served. Always leaving his imprint on the lives of youth and adults and causing them to say, "I'm grateful that you were our minister and friend."

Holland was different from the average person in today's society. He was a man of sterling character and integrity. He was loyal and tender to his family, his friends, and to those who were in need. To a mind that sought justice and righteousness there was added a heart full of compassion. His friendship was as wide as the race of man.

He had an honest hatred of shame. He disliked the pious, synthetic religious aristocrat. He removed himself from the presence of those who were superficial, shallow, and insincere. He realized the cost was too high to his personal character and his integrity to ask for personal favors and high position in the affairs of the North Carolina Conference.

In these solemn moments when we pay tribute to our friends who have passed into eternity the question is asked, "What is greatness? Did he achieve success?"

Many have an idea that greatness and success are determined by those who have talents that astonish and dazzle the world. But this is not, in my estimation at least, the highest concept of greatness and success.

To me the equipoise of a well-balanced mind, the equilibrium of faculties well and evenly ordered, the luminous insight of a calm judgment are gifts which are as rarely found in one human being as the possession of the more dazzling though less solid qualities. And when these high qualities are found in a minister of God, combined with purity of soul, kindness of heart, generosity of disposition, elevation of purpose, and devotion to duty, this is what seems to me to be the highest concept of greatness—greatness which will be abundantly productive of happiness and glory and success to the people under such ministerial leadership.

Such was the character of Holland Hale, my friend.

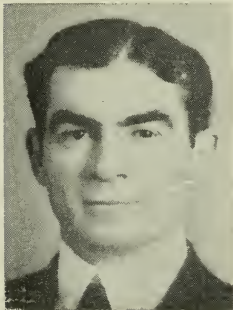

MARVIN YOUNG SELF

1881 - 1967

In the early morning of Saturday, May 13, 1967, Marvin Young Self, for sixty-five years a faithful minister of Jesus Christ, quit the scenes of earth and journeyed to the dwelling place that God has prepared for them that love him. With simple ceremony,

and amid an assemblage of friends and loved ones, the funeral service was conducted from the Methodist Church in Littleton, N. C., where he had some years earlier served as pastor, and where after retirement he had spent his remaining years. His body was laid to rest in Sunset Hill Cemetery, where sleep the bodies of friends and parishoners he had loved and served. All this is strikingly indicative of the man and his manner of life. At home amid familiar scenes, simple in faith, constant in his lov-upright in all his ways, this son of God came quietly to the climax of his career honored and loved by the people among whom he had lived and to whom he was both friend and minister.



Marvin Self was born in Lincoln County, N. C., February 4, 1881, the son of Isaac Ruffin and Mary Young Self. He was sprung from sturdy pioneer stock, the kind of men and women who carved for themselves homes out of the wilderness, and unfeignedly trusted in the greatness and goodness of God. His father was a soldier in the

Confederate Army during four years of that bitter and tragic war. His formal education was begun in Lincoln County schools and the Gastonia High School. Afterwards he was a student in Trinity Park Preparatory School and in Trinity College.

In 1902 Marvin Self was licensed to preach; was ordained deacon in 1906, and elder in 1912. He was received on trial into the North Carolina Conference in 1908, and continued an active member of this Conference until his retirement in 1953. His assignments included the following: Plymouth, Moyock, Garysburg, Warren, Scotland Neck, Norlina, Clayton, Hertford, Laurinburg, Asbury in West Durham, Bethel, Mount Olive, St. Paul, Farmville, and Littleton. Following his retirement, he for a time served churches in the vicinity of Littleton as retired supply.

In 1910, near the beginning of his itinerant ministry, Marvin Self was married to Mary Lucy Harrell of Sunbury. She was his faithful and devoted helpmeet for more than fifty years. She now survives him. He leaves one son, Samuel Harrell Self of Fredericksburg, Virginia, and three grandchildren, one of whom is presently in the armed service of his country.

Our Lord's words concerning Nathaniel are descriptive also of this other disciple whom he called many centuries later: "Behold, an Israelite in whom there is no hypocrisy." Pretense and vain display were foreign to his nature. He was my brother-in-law, and I knew him intimately across the years of his long and fruitful ministry. He was genuine to the core, and sincerity is an indispensable requisite of Christian character. As a pastor he was a gentle and understanding man, often in the homes of his people. He used to say in homely fashion that we do not know a person until we have warmed our feet at his fire. As a preacher, he held to the central verities of the gospel, unenticed by the fads of the day. In worship he led his people with quiet dignity, and thereby taught them to worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. He was a man of deeply-rooted convictions, and he did not compromise them to win popular approval. He might have said with a Hebrew psalmist, without pride or boasting, "I have walked in mine integrity." His life was above reproach. When he laid his armor down there was no blot on his escutcheon. None can measure the continuing influence of such a man as this.

JAMES JOSHUA BOONE

1881 - 1967

James Joshua Boone was born in Northampton County on October 1, 1881, the son of James William and Rebecca Jane Copeland Boone. He received his education in the public schools of Northampton County and Trinity College, Duke University.

After a long illness, Brother Boone died at Watts Hospital on June 5, 1967. Funeral service was held at Asbury Methodist Church on June 7, 1967. The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. S. G. Boone, and the Reverend W. B. Petteway. Burial services were concluded in Maplewood Cemetery, Durham, N. C.

The following are the names of his family who survive: two daughters, Mrs. Richard E. Davis, Mrs. Kedar F. Bryan, both of Richmond, Va.; one son, James J. Boone, Jr., Smithfield, N. C.; two brothers, John E. Boone and D. L. Boone, Jackson, N. C.; and two sisters, Mrs. Katherine Jones, Creeds, Va., and Mrs. Fannie Hall, Durham, N. C.

Brother Boone was admitted into the North Carolina Conference at New Bern in 1907 and was ordained a Deacon in 1910 and an Elder in 1913. He served the following charges: Ocracoke and Portsmouth, LaGrange, Mt. Olive Circuit, Snow Hill Circuit, Mt. Tirzah Circuit, Conway Circuit, Pittsboro Circuit, Creedmoor Circuit, Parkton Circuit, Erwin Circuit, Bailey, Rosemary, Smithfield, Graham, Hamlet, Enfield, Clark Street, and after retirement, Merritts-Orange.

There were many characteristics of this outstanding servant of God. He was first of all a preacher of the gospel of Jesus Christ. He enjoyed telling the story of God's love



for people. Sinners were converted under his preaching and people lived better where he served Christ. Second, he was a preacher of righteousness. The evils of his day received his attention. He was opposed to the use and sale of alcoholic beverages in any form.

Third, he had a great compassion for people in need. He ministered to the hungry, the lonely, and the desperate people. His ministry to the sick in homes and hospitals was outstanding. This constant visiting of the sick continued as long as his health would permit, and then he would ask, "who is sick or in trouble?"

Fourth, he was a family man. He loved his wife and children. He met their needs in love and kindness. They have honored him with their lives of service. During Brother Boone's long illness at home and in the hospital, the children returned his love by meeting all his needs.

There was one unusual way that he kept in touch with his friends. He sent a birthday card to thousands of them on their birthday. The Durham Methodist ministers honored him on his 85th birthday for his long and profitable ministry to our people.

1870 - 1966

In 1893 her husband received his first appointment in the Methodist Protestant Church. The end came in Martinsville Convalescent Home where she was admitted after having suffered a stroke. She was 96 years, one month and 10 days old. Her body rests beside that of her husband in the Moravian Church graveyard at Kernersville, N. C.

She was at home in the church, in the parsonage, or in another's home. She never remained a stranger after the first meeting. This was evidenced in many ways. She preferred to be called by her given name, Daisy, and even her children and grandchildren, as well as her friends, used this affectionate greeting.

Her husband once told Bishop Peele, who had offered him a promotion in appointment, that he felt there would be more objection to his wife's moving than there would be to his transfer. She never sought recognition, but served in humility. She didn't just *like* people, she *loved* them. The high esteem in which she was held by so many was demonstrated by those who drove from all over the state where she had lived and served, as well as those who came from other states—South Carolina, Georgia, Virginia, and elsewhere—to be present at her funeral service and to express their love and sympathy to the sorrowing family.

Both spirit and nature seemed to function in cooperation on the day of her passing. She had engaged in the regular devotions at the breakfast table with her husband, as was their custom. They had gone to Sunday school and church. The sky was bright, the sun was shining, and the congregation at the morning worship was encouraging. The first hymn had been sung, the Apostles' Creed had been recited, and the people had been called to prayer, when suddenly Daisy was called to her heavenly home. Her head rested in the lap of the lady who sat by her, and her husband knelt by her side. This method of departure was the most wonderful thing that could have happened to such a great Christian person. This is the way she deserved to go and we are grateful to our heavenly Father for this special arrangement.

She was living with her mother at the time of her marriage.

On April 19, 1911, she was married to the Reverend Cicero Harris Caviness of Reidsville, N. C. Brother Caviness was the father of four small children by a previous marriage—three girls and one boy. The day they were married Mrs. Caviness took into her heart and life these motherless children and truly became their mother.

To this union God gave five children—three boys and two girls. As the children grew and developed into men and women, one could not tell but that she was the mother of all of them so great was the love she gave to each one.

Brother Caviness was admitted on trial in the Western North Carolina Conference in 1899. After serving several charges he transferred to the North Carolina Conference in 1911, his first appointment being Ahoskie, 1911-1913. It was here that he moved his wife and his



four small children. Other appointments were Stonewall, 1913-1915; Newport, 1915-1919; Grifton, 1919-1921; Burgaw, 1921-1923; Bynum, 1923-1925; Elizabethtown, 1925-1927; Stedman, 1927-1930; Hemp, 1930-1931; and Lumberton Circuit, 1931-1933.

Upon his retirement the Cavinesses lived near Siler City until his death on November 8, 1950. For the next two years Mrs. Caviness lived in Siler City, then moved to Asheboro to live with her daughter, Mrs. Albert Monroe, continuing to live there until her death.

Today one marvels at the fortitude and ingenuity of the parsonage families of earlier years in the way they managed their living on such small incomes. But through the love and devotion of this gracious couple, nine children have assumed places of responsibility in our society and are helping to make our country a better land in which to live.

One son, W. D. (Woody) Caviness entered the ministry of The Methodist Church, serving effectively and lovingly until his sudden death in Ayden, September 10, 1966.

Mrs. Caviness is survived by eight children: Miss Myrtle Caviness, Carolina Beach; Mrs. A. L. Mansfield, Carolina Beach; C. H. Caviness, Jr., Los Angeles, Calif.; Mrs. J. C. Thompson, Warsaw; James W. Caviness, Siler City; Mrs. Leroy Pittman, Siler City; Mrs. Albert Monroe, Asheboro; and Paul W. Caviness, Portsmouth, Va.

After the death of Woody, Mrs. Caviness' health declined, and on November 4, 1966, she died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Albert Monroe, in Asheboro.

Mrs. Geddie joined her husband in a ministry that carried them to many communities in the North Carolina Conference. They received appointments to churches at Clinton, New Bern, Harrell's Store, Trenton, Maysville, Whiteville, and Kenansville. She was always a real helpmeet to her husband in his work and took an active part in the whole program of the church. She highly respected the Christian ministry as a sacred calling and answered criticisms toward the ministry by using the Biblical statement, "Touch not mine anointed."

Twelve children were born to this parsonage family. In a day when salaries were small and accommodations poor, this family did not enjoy the luxuries of life, but the

children did receive the great blessings of Christian influence and an example of righteous living. Unfortunately, in 1913 Brother Geddie was taken from his family by death. The oldest child in the family was only 22 years of age at the time of his passing. Mrs. Geddie had to assume the responsibility of becoming a provider for the basic needs of all these children. Also, she felt very keenly the desire to help each of these children to receive a college education. It was natural that this strong, gentle, Christian scholar with the warm sense of humor should be attracted by her spritely wit, keen intellect, artistic talent, loving nature and her total Christian commitment. Their marriage was blessed with four children: a daughter, Shirley LaGay, deceased; a daughter, Eloise, who teaches in Rocky Mount, North Carolina; a son, Harris Lindsay, Jr., who is a research chemical engineer in St. Louis, Mo.; and a son, Warren Aiken, who is a research physicist at the Rocket Center in Cumberland, Md. All of these children are living lives which reflect the Christian character, intellectual climate and abundant culture of their home. MRS. DAISY WOOTEN BARNES

1880 - 1967

Mrs. Daisy Wooten Barnes was born August 15, 1880, in Lenoir County, N. C., the daughter of James S. Wooten and his wife, Katherine Tart Speight. She grew up in Lenoir County and received her early education in the public schools in LaGrange. She continued her education at the Kinsey Seminary in LaGrange and studied voice in Lake George, N. Y.

Her marriage to Allen Kendrick Smith was a happy one but her husband died about two years later, leaving her with one child. She made her home in LaGrange and cared for her son until he went to college.

In 1925 she came to the Methodist Home for Children (which was then known as the Methodist Orphanage) to work as a matron, caring for children. She loved children, and for four years mothered the girls in McGee Cottage. In 1929 she became head matron and for five years gave guidance and encouragement to the other matrons in their work. For a number of years she conducted the "singing class" which went with the superintendent on Sundays to visit the churches of the Conference and to represent the orphanage.

In 1934 she was married to the Rev. A. S. Barnes who was superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage. With her marriage she surrendered her official position as

head matron and took the more responsible place as the superintendent's wife. She was a good homemaker and helpmate. She and her husband shared a great love for children. Together they devoted their lives to the children who came to live at the orphanage.

When her husband retired as superintendent of the orphanage in 1948 at the age of 75 the two of them went to live in a home in Raleigh provided by the trustees of the orphanage. Here they spent their remaining years together in happy companionship and in joyful service to others. On March 22, 1961, the Rev. A. S. Barnes died after a brief illness.

In spite of the infirmities of age and the gradual impairment of her vision and hearing, Mrs. Barnes was mentally alert and self-reliant. She continued to live in the home and carry on an active life. On February 11, 1967, she suffered a heart attack and was taken to Rex Hospital. For a while her condition improved steadily but complications developed and she departed this life March 27, 1967.

Funeral services were held in the Brown-Wynn Funeral Chapel in Raleigh on March 29, conducted by Rev. T. Marvin Vick, Jr., Rev. H. Arthur Phillips, Jr., and Rev. George W. Blount, ministers of Edenton Street Methodist Church. Interment was in the Wooten family plot in the cemetery in LaGrange, N. C. Graveside services were conducted by Rev. T. Marvin Vick, Jr., and Rev. J. W. Lineberger, superintendent of the Methodist Home for Children. Alumni of the Methodist Home for Children served as pallbearers. Her neighbors were honorary pallbearers.

Mrs. Barnes is survived by one son by her first marriage, Kendrick Smith, of Butte, Montana, and by two stepchildren, Speight Barnes of Tucson, Arizona, and Mrs. Maude Barnes Wells of Wake Forest.

"Miss Daisy," as she was affectionately known among the children and staff of the orphanage, was a strong but gentle character. She had learned through experience that growing children need both firm consistent controls and tender loving care. She learned to express both attitudes in such a way that children could benefit. Along with her husband, called "Daddy Barnes" by the children, she contributed much to the training and development of the children under her influence.

Mrs. Barnes was a woman of high ideals and great faith. She abhorred pettiness and trivialities. She had a strong will and accepted her responsibilities seriously. At the same time she held no grudges, was ready to forgive, had a great capacity for good humor, and appreciated her friends. She loved people, she loved life, and she enjoyed them to the fullest. She was a broad-minded person, sincerely interested in young and old, white and black, and profoundly concerned for the welfare of all. She was the champion and defender of the underprivileged, the disadvantaged, and the mistreated.

Mrs. Barnes was a dedicated Christian woman. She loved the Lord, she loved right-



eousness, and she loved the church. For many years she was a faithful and devoted member of Edenton Street Methodist Church. As long as her health would permit she attended the services and was active in the Woman's Society of Christian Service. When she could no longer attend the worship services in the church she always listened to the service broadcast on the radio and often called the preacher to comment about the service, and to encourage him.

How fitting the words of the writer of Proverbs: "Who can find a virtuous woman? for her price is far above rubies. The heart of her husband doth safely trust in her."

Section V

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

BURLINGTON DISTRICT

T. B. HOUGH, *Superintendent*

Another year ends, and the ministers and laymen of the Burlington District have done a magnificent job in promoting the total program of The Methodist Church. Their unity of effort, their intelligent planning, and their wholehearted devotion enabled them to utilize the dynamic leadership of both groups in achieving their ambitious goals.

Membership and Evangelism: The ministers cooperated in the VENTURE IN FAITH program in October, and many of our churches were warmed in heart. More than 300 have been received into the membership of the church on profession of faith, and from other denominations and from other Methodist churches. At the middle of April, we have received more than 600 into the membership of the churches of the Burlington District this Conference year. To accomplish this, our ministers have used filmstrips, workshops, and seminars to enlist the leadership of the church in a total effort of evangelism.

Christian Education: This year emphasis has been on the new literature. Each pastor has attended seminars and study groups in an effort to become familiar with the new curriculum. Each pastor has conducted study sessions for his teachers and officials in his own church. We feel that we are ready for it, and rejoice that it is almost unanimously accepted.

Christian Higher Education: We are working to complete our campaign for Christian higher education. Many of our churches have paid out in full. Many more are almost out in full. We hope to see the campaign brought to a successful conclusion in every church.

Missions: An intensive study on missions has been conducted throughout the district. A wonderfully planned mission program has been promoted by our district missionary secretary. He was able to get returned missionaries to go through the district, bringing news from other lands. This moved our people to respond to the call for help for others. They are developing a sympathetic outreach, and are directing their money to areas of their own choosing.

Women's Work: The 73 organizations of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, with 3,300 members, and six Wesleyan Service Guild organizations, with 178 members, are committed to the goal of producing Christ-centered witnesses, who study to show themselves approved of God. They received the Study Jewel last fall for reporting an unequalled program of study in the conference. Another deed the women rejoice over is a scholarship the women give to one of our young persons who is attending Louisburg College. Another highlight of the women's work this year was the Annual Meeting of the Wesleyan Service Guild at Front Street Methodist Church last spring.

Lay Activities: The laymen in this district are strengthening the program of lay activities all the time. Lay retreats, training sessions, prayer vigils are held all over the district. Some are on district level, but many are in local churches. The training program for certified lay speakers has become an annual requirement. We do not send out lay speakers who have not qualified for the privilege. The laymen further showed their interest by attending our lay rally 802 strong this year.

Building and Improvements: This year we dedicated the educational building at Mt. Vernon, on the Silk Hope Charge; the parsonage on the Burlington Circuit; education building at First Church, Pittsboro; the Fellowship Hall at Merritts; the organ and hymnals at First Church, Siler City. The first Sunday in June Hebron plans to open its magnificent sanctuary, which cost \$225,000 without furnishings. Soon after conference, Graham will open its unexcelled sanctuary. The design and splendor of this sanctuary make it unique in this part of the country. It will cost \$425,000 without furnishings. New parsonages are being built at Mt. Pleasant, Piney Grove-Hickory Grove, and Fairview. Pleasant Hill on the Pittsboro Circuit will be in a new educational building before conference. Grace Church in Burlington will be in a new addition to its educational building before conference. Faith and Friendship have air-conditioned their churches.

Finances: The district accepted its quota on World Service and Conference Benevolences again. We have paid out in full in every church the past two years. We have no

other plans for this year. The financial support of the ministers is up substantially for the coming year. At this time it is difficult to determine just how much the increase will be. As of now, it appears that the increase will be more than \$10,000 for our ministers in the coming year. Total cash paid in this year on new buildings and improvements, and on building debts will likely exceed \$275,000.

This superintendent is grateful for the wonderful cooperation by both pastors and laymen of the Burlington District. Working with them has enriched his life and ministry.

DURHAM DISTRICT

O. L. HATHAWAY, *Superintendent*

This has been a good year for the pastors and lay people working together in the churches of the Durham District. I count it both a privilege and a pleasure to share this report of the Durham District.

Membership and Evangelism: The report of April 15, 1966, revealed the fact that we have received into the membership 951 and lost 600, giving us a net gain of 351 members this year. We have baptized 117 infants.

Christian Education: The program of Christian education has been making the opportunities for introducing the new literature for youth and adults in special sessions for pastors.

Christian Higher Education: Our people have been trying to complete the college pledge. Some of our churches have paid out in full and others are planning to make an effort in the right direction. Our young people are enrolling in our colleges. There is a good relationship between our local churches and our colleges. The following churches have paid out their college pledge: Grove Hill Church of the Banks-Grove Hill Charge; Orange Church of the Chapel Hill Charge; Carrboro Church, Concord Church of the Concord-Oak Grove Charge; Massey Church and Maybrook Church of the Maybrook-Massey Charge; McMannen's Chapel Church; Gray Rock Church of the Gray Rock Charge; Mt. Sylvan Church; Hermon Church, Morrow's Chapel, Salem Church and Stovall Church, all of the Oxford Circuit; Parkwood Church; Bullock Church and Stem Church of the Stem-Bullock Charge; Union Grove Church and Mt. Tirzah Church of the Mt. Tirzah Charge.

Lay Activities: Lay activities under the direction of James T. Patrick and associates continue to grow in services to the Methodist churches. The lay rally this year brought together 1264 for a program at the Durham Civic Center. The Durham Lay Rally Scholarship Fund has helped John Graham, a ministerial student at North Carolina Wesleyan College this year. The lay work in the district is of great importance to the growth and progress of The Methodist Church.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. J. C. Wingate, the president, has completed another year of productive leadership. The societies continue to increase in giving and interest in the work of missions at home and around the world. We are represented in the meetings by our able and consecrated leaders.

Buildings and Improvements: Dedication services have been held for new organs at Long Memorial, Grace, Longhurst, Ca-Vel, and Trinity. A new organ has been given at Andrews Chapel. Consecration service for the new sanctuary was conducted by Bishop Paul N. Garber at McMannen's Church. Educational buildings have been completed at Allensville, Chapel Hill-Aldersgate, and New Bethel. Educational buildings are being constructed at Mt. Sylvan and Carrboro. Planning for new buildings continues at the following churches: Chapel Hill, Amity; Bahama, Warren's Grove, Oxford, Andrews Chapel and Duke Chapel. Renovations: Asbury Church is renovating the sanctuary and entrance. Mt. Sylvan has renovated its parsonage.

We have spent on buildings and indebtedness for churches and parsonages this year a total of \$538,633.00.

Land: Mt. Bethel at Bahama has added approximately two acres of land to the church property and one acre to the cemetery. Trinity has added land to its church property. Lots have been purchased for parsonages at Lakewood and Trinity in Durham.

Historical Road-marker: The erecting of a historical road-marker on December 11, 1966, for Mt. Bethel Church under the direction of the pastor, F. Belton Joyner, Jr., and Reverend William K. Quick, representing the North Carolina Historical Society. Bishop Paul N. Garber gave an address on Washington Duke. Mr. Duke became a member of Mt. Bethel Methodist Church at Bahama and we believe that the influence of Christ in this young life has and will continue to bless mankind for generations to come.

We give thanks for the wonderful spirit of growth and dedication of our pastors and people in their achievements of this year and wish them much success in the future.

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

HENRY G. RUARK, *Superintendent*

This report is an effort to summarize the work of the pastors and laymen of the 72 churches in the Elizabeth City District. To do so requires that we face both our strengths and our weaknesses, and to resolve to give ourselves more fully to the tasks to which Christ has called us.

We are heartened by the fact that, in contrast to the preceding year, there has been a net gain of 74 in church membership. Added to this is what we consider a significant effort to make the Christian witness to the multitudes of tourists who visit the Outer Banks in the summer. While this is an ecumenical undertaking, our pastors have taken the lead in developing the program. Careful records indicate that last year several thousand persons participated in the services in camping areas and in the religious film project on the beach at Kill Devil Hills. This summer we will have additional ministry in the camp grounds near Currituck Courthouse.

Again this year our lay speakers have filled all requests for services in the No Silent Pulpit program. The district lay rally was marked by a full church and a stirring challenge to lay witnessing. The district Woman's Society of Christian Service under the leadership of Mrs. C. Roy Miller, president, had an active year and it was they who effectively promoted the study on affluence and poverty. At the expiration of Mrs. Miller's term Mrs. Beulah Gaylord of Manteo was elected to succeed her. We would express our gratitude to Mrs. Miller for her faithful and effective service.

Improvements in church property continue. On the Kinnakeet Charge Fair Haven Church has been so completely rebuilt as to be a new building. St. John has cleared its indebtedness and is ready for dedication. Now a new parsonage is in the planning stage. Hatteras is making alterations to its parsonage estimated to cost \$5500. Pilmoor Memorial has built a new parsonage which with the lot is valued at \$22,000. Grace Church, on the Kitty Hawk Charge, has remodeled its sanctuary and added additional rooms. Educational buildings are under construction at City Road, Elizabeth City, and Gatesville. Cedar Grove on the Perquimans Charge has built an addition costing \$8,000. Meanwhile, other churches have spent \$45,000 on maintenance and improvements, and \$72,746 has been paid on indebtedness. Incomplete reports indicate that 19 of our charges are in better financial condition than at this time last year. We are hopeful that most, if not all, will be able to meet their conference obligations in full. Our churches have sent in \$7,225 for Advance Specials this year. For five years Manteo has led the district in Advance Specials, and its people as well as those of other churches who have participated in this extra benevolence are to be commended.

FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

BARNEY L. DAVIDSON, *Superintendent*

This has been another good year in our district. The following report of the 19,337 members and 57 ministers of our district is only partly given, for it would take many pages to list the detailed progress of our 72 congregations as we have worked for Christ and His Church. We give thanks for the leadership of the Holy Spirit which makes possible the continued growth of one of the great districts of Methodism. We are deeply grateful to Bishop Paul N. Garber for the inspiring leadership he gives all of us. No district superintendent could have a finer group of pastors and laymen with which to work than those that we have in the Fayetteville District.

Membership and Evangelism: During the week of April 9th we had our Venture in Faith and almost every charge had revivals at this time, or during this general period. During the year we have had 193 babies baptized, 469 joined on profession of faith, and 626 united with our churches by transfer or otherwise. This makes a total of 1,095 members received, with a net gain of 446.

Missions and Church Extension: Our churches have had an excellent program concerning missionary education with a charge-wide school of missions on the theme, "Affluence and Poverty — The Christian Dilemma" being held in most of the charges. An offering for our two new churches was taken at Christmas which amounts to over \$1,000. Two churches have done outstanding work in the N-1 program by going the 'second mile' in their assistance to smaller churches. Chestnut Street in Lumberton has not only provided teachers and workers for Asbury and Pineview but have given a large amount of money to aid Branch Street. Raeford is giving \$10,000 toward building a parsonage for two churches near Raeford which will become a strong two-point charge in the future.

A new church is being organized near Wagram and is to be named Mount Carmel. Five acres of land is to be given for this already flourishing church which has a growing Sunday school of over 40 members.

Christian Education: There are 72 church schools enrolling 12,880 pupils. Vacation Church Schools have been planned in our local churches. Christian education continues to be a major concern and emphasis in the district. The new literature has been well received and we believe will create new interest and enthusiasm in each local church.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. W. F. Scarborough is the president of this fine organization. It is an inspiration to hear at the Fourth Quarterly Conference of the tremendous amount of work that is being done in each local church by this splendid organization.

Stewardship and Finance: The churches across our district are to be commended for their loyalty to the financial needs of our Conference and around the world. There have been crop failure and various setbacks in some communities, yet these churches have gone ahead and met their obligations so that the work of the church does not suffer. We had three subdistrict meetings pertaining to the needs of our ministers and specifically lifting up the raising of pastors' salaries. Our churches are raising their pastors' salaries by \$21,000 for the coming year. Salaries have been increased by approximately 25% in the district over the past three years. An extensive fund-raising program for Camp Rockfish was held and \$25,000 was pledged for this fine camp, with Salem pledging \$6,000 of this amount.

Lay Activities: We have organized three new Methodist Men's Clubs. Under the excellent leadership of our district lay leader, Bob Allen, three subdistrict meetings, mentioned above, on raising ministers' salaries were conducted by four laymen. We had the largest attendance on record at our annual lay rally with 815 present.

Christian Higher Education: Many of our charges have already paid their college quotas and some have overpaid. Our goal is to have every charge paid in full by next Annual Conference.

Buildings and Improvements: Spring Hill now has one of the finest parsonages in our Conference valued at over \$50,000. Arran Lakes bought a new home valued at \$25,000. Trinity has a home that cost \$16,000. Bethesda has remodeled its parsonage. Raeford is giving Sandy Grove and Parker \$10,000 toward building a new parsonage.

Cumberland County is now the fastest growing county in North Carolina and we are trying to meet this challenge. Gardners relocated in this growth area and built a \$81,000 church on a five-acre site. Bethesda was the recipient of the Randolph E. DuMont Architectural Award. Pineview renovated its sanctuary at a cost of \$11,000. Cumberland moved into a new education building and is completing a new sanctuary, the total value of the entire project will be \$160,000. Branch Street moved into its new buildings valued at \$50,000. St. John has completed its new sanctuary and its property value is \$50,000. Regans is working on its Fellowship Hall. Churches which hope to begin construction on new buildings in the coming months are: Wesley Heights, a new sanctuary, \$225,000; Christ, a new sanctuary, \$135,000; Pleasant Grove has a new building to construct and Union Chapel hopes to begin a new education building soon. Sandy Plains is to build this coming year. St. Matthews is buying additional land and plans to build in the near future.

Many challenges face the ministers and the members of the Fayetteville District in the coming months as we have changes and growth in our four counties. There is a great spiritual hunger and the problems that we face will need a deeper commitment to Christ on the part of all of us, and I have faith that we will meet this challenge.

GOLDSBORO DISTRICT

LEON RUSSELL, *Superintendent*

No one could ask or hope for a more cordial welcome than we have received as we have tried to assume our duties as superintendent of the Goldsboro District, and certainly no group of pastors and laymen could have been more cooperative as together we have tried to promote the causes of the church. On every hand we have found the pastors and laymen of the district eager to work together that the causes of Christ's church might prosper in our hands, and for this we are deeply grateful.

Most of the real victories of the year cannot be recorded in statistical form, but some of them can be noted and we are listing below an inadequate summary of some of the accomplishments of the year in the life of the churches in certain areas of their work.

Evangelism: During the fall we sought to make preparation for our "Venture of Faith" evangelistic effort, and then in November simultaneous revivals were held. The result of these and other evangelistic endeavors has been a splendid net gain in church membership. Noteworthy achievement in this regard is evident on the following charges: St. Luke, Goldsboro, 62; New Hope, Goldsboro, 41; Wayne Circuit, 33; Whitley Memorial, Smithfield, 30; Clinton Circuit, 30; Jefferson, Goldsboro, 26; Mt. Carmel-Sauls-ton, 25; and Faison, 24.

Christian Education: Under the faithful leadership of our district staff we have made progress in our educational program. Careful work has been done to prepare our adults for the new adult curriculum and the response has been most encouraging. We have a very vital youth program throughout the district. There are active and well organized subdistricts as well as local organizations in most of the churches. All of our charges have planned Vacation Church Schools for the children for this summer.

The College Crusade has been kept before all of our churches and we are glad to report that they have raised more than \$26,000 during this year. First Church, Clinton, and Elizabeth Church have met their quota and have been added to the "honor roll." Significant amounts have been contributed by St. Paul, Goldsboro; Centenary, Smithfield; the Newton Grove charge and the Garris Church on the Airboro-Garris charge. Most of the churches are determined to continue their giving until their quota has been reached.

Missions: Five subdistrict training sessions for teachers were held by the District Missionary Secretary and the district leaders of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Following these workshops study classes were held in almost every local church. We have had an increase in the number of people who are members of the Ten Dollar Club, and three churches in our district—Whitley Memorial, Walker Memorial, and Westwood—have been recipients of Ten Dollar Club funds during the year. The district Woman's Society of Christian Service continues to strengthen our work in missions.

Lay Work: Elbert A. Ward, of St. Paul Church, became the district lay leader at the beginning of the conference year. His fine cooperation and dedicated service have made the work of our laymen more effective. He led a large group of men to the annual Laymen's Retreat at N. C. Wesleyan College, in August. He organized and conducted a Sunday afternoon training program for the laymen in September. St. Paul Church was filled with 586 laymen for the district lay rally in February. The No Silent Pulpit program was provided for the season of Lent.

Buildings and Improvements: One very tangible evidence of vitality and growth in our churches is seen in the building and improvement programs in which they are engaged. During the year Bishop Paul N. Garber led the formal opening service for the new educational buildings at St. Paul, Goldsboro. He has also led in the dedication of the handsome new parsonage on the Hopewell-Mt. Moriah charge and the renovated sanctuary at Keener. The Faison Church was dedicated in November.

During the fall and winter the new district parsonage was constructed at 617 Banks Avenue. The superintendent and his family moved into it early in February. It will be comfortable and adequate for the district superintendents and their families for many years to come. Other buildings completed this year have been the following: sanctuaries at Whitley Memorial (\$60,000) and Walker Memorial (\$30,000); and an educational building at Pikeville (\$30,000). Presently under construction is the renovated sanctuary at Pine Forest (\$62,000), the educational building at Mt. Carmel (\$20,000), and a church school annex at Wesley Church on the Sarecta-Wesley charge.

The following new buildings are in the planning stage: McGee and Epworth on the Clinton Circuit (\$65,000); Smith Chapel on the Browning-Smith charge (\$20,000); Westwood Church, in Goldsboro (\$50,000); Bethabara, on the South River charge (\$35,000); New Hope, Goldsboro (\$20,000); and a new parsonage for the Bethel-Rones charge.

Finances: Almost without exception the charges have increased their budgets for ministerial support for the coming year. At the time of this report, with some of the Quarterly Conferences yet to be held, the increase is more than \$11,000. The increase for World Service and Conference Benevolences will exceed \$4,900. We are confident that most of our charges will pay their budgets in full for this conference year. We are hopeful that all of them will.

This has been a good year for all of us on the Goldsboro District.

GREENVILLE DISTRICT

WILLIS R. STEVENS, *Superintendent*

The district superintendent makes this report with a very grateful heart for the devotion, loyalty, and support of all the ministers, their families, the district staff, and the remainder of the 16,000 Methodists across the Greenville District. Deep appreciation is also expressed to our good Bishop Paul N. Garber for his continuous inspiration and leadership in the promotion of the total program of Methodism among us. The other conference personnel and staff have also been a great source of help in all that has been accomplished.

Evangelism: The evangelistic program has revolved around the "Venture in Faith." Every charge of the district cooperated and participated in this program with wonderful results that continue to bear fruit. We are very grateful to the Rocky Mount District superintendent, the Rev. J. W. Page, and pastors of that district in the privilege of the exchange of pulpits, the Rocky Mount District pastors preaching in the Greenville District the week of October 9-14 and the Greenville District pastors preaching in the Rocky Mount District October 23-28. As a result of the evangelistic efforts, 829 new members have been added to the church rolls as of this report.

Christian Education: Emphasis on Christian education has centered in plans and preparation for "The New Day in Education." Preparation of our local church leaders was begun with two very effective workshops September 19-20 at Queen Street Church, Kinston, and First Church, Washington. The district retreat for ministers was held at St. James Church, Greenville, on February 1 with almost 100% attendance. We were together an entire day under the excellent leadership of the Rev. Christian White of Graham. The pastors and laymen are reporting wonderful response in the local churches.

The Williamston Church was privileged to be host to one of our Conference seminars on Baptism and Confirmation with a big majority of our district ministers present. This seminar proved to be very helpful for each of us.

St. James Church was the central meeting place for one of the Conference's Bishop's Membership Classes. A host of children, youth, and their leaders participated in this, along with those from other churches in the eastern area of the conference. We are very grateful to Bishop Garber and the Conference Commission on Worship for this most rewarding experience.

Many of the churches are reporting new interest and improvement in the entire program of Christian education in which they are seeking to meet the needs of the children, youth, and adults. Two Christian Workers' Schools have been conducted—one in the Snow Hill Subdistrict and the other in the Washington Subdistrict. The MYF has conducted both its fall and spring district rallies with good programs and attendance. Plans are being made for Vacation Church Schools in most all of the churches of the district. This year a Sunday afternoon Family Life seminar was conducted at St. James Church for the district with invitations going to the adjoining districts. This was an entirely new experience which was planned and led by the Rev. Wayne G. Wegwart, district director of Family Life. Very capable resource leaders had been selected for each discussion group, and the seminar proved to be very meaningful for all those who attended.

Christian Higher Education: Several churches of the district have completed their quota on the College Crusade and some of them are continuing to make payments. Others are receiving additional pledges, renewing payments on old pledges and some churches are beginning to set up an item in the budget for this purpose. Some of the renewed interest has come from a dinner meeting of the ten preachers and laymen at Kinston September 29 at which time Bishop Garber was the speaker with a most challenging and inspirational message.

Missions and Church Extension: A total program of missions is being promoted within the local churches, the subdistricts and across the district. Three very fine schools of Christian Missions were conducted November 14, 15 and 17 at Queen Street Church, Jarvis Memorial Church, and Belhaven. There was observed an increase in attendance and interest over the past year and, as a result, we are getting reports of many very good Schools of Missions in the local churches. The Woman's Society of Christian Service continues to grow with fine, well-prepared programs on the local church, subdistrict, and district level. The subdistricts and district are well staffed with very close-working relationship with local churches.

The Ten Dollar Club continues to secure new members and added support. A new church, Holy Trinity, was organized in Greenville on November 6 and is now reporting

a membership of 52. At present the church is meeting in the Masonic Temple and looking forward to the time it may qualify for a Ten Dollar Club call. The congregation is fully organized into a church school, a WSCS, a Methodist Men's Club, the Official Board with the commissions and committees and has set up a budget for next year with proportioned conference items for the 1967-68 conference year. The members are beginning to prepare their lot for building as soon as possible.

Lay Activities: The lay activities program is also closely woven in its program on the local church, subdistrict, and district level. The lay leadership is most inspiring and helpful to the district superintendent. There has been wonderful cooperation in planning and presenting the program throughout the district in such places as Methodist Men with new interest and new clubs, the No Silent Pulpit program, and the district lay rally. This year the attendance at the lay rally was over 100 more than any prior year in the district. The district superintendent is most grateful for interest and participation in the lay witness mission program and looks forward to the plans, with the emphasis on stewardship, for the next conference year.

Stewardship and Finance: The response to financial responsibilities has improved considerably this year. The Greenville District has remained in a prominent place among the top half of the districts throughout most of the year. Several of our churches continue to remain up to date in payments to benevolences and three of the churches are paid in full at the date of this report. Twenty-three of the churches have already increased their acceptance for another year in the amount of \$3,106.00. At this date, nineteen charges have increased salaries in the amount of \$7,435.00. It is evident that there is a renewal in commitment to Christian stewardship by most of our churches.

Buildings and Improvements: Most every charge had made improvements, renovations, or constructed new buildings of churches, education units, and/or parsonages. A total of \$211,692.00 has been raised for buildings and improvements. This is an increase over last year of \$52,525.00. Each of these deserves special mention. However, we lift up some of those that have planned or are constructing additions. St. James Church, Greenville, has constructed a new chapel costing \$50,000.00 with a uniquely beautiful stained glass window which features a sequence of historic Methodist scenes. A new parsonage was purchased for the Minister of Education. A parsonage for the pastor's family of the new Holy Trinity Church has been purchased. Queen Street Church, Kinston, has purchased a new pipe organ and renovated the choir loft. Westminster Church, Kinston, is completing the construction of a new \$40,000.00 education building. The construction of a beautiful new sanctuary and added education unit costing \$80,000.00 has been completed at Pink Hill. In fact, every charge in the district, except three, has reported considerable improvements on property and/or completion of debts on past construction projects.

Thus, through the coordinated efforts and wonderful response of the churches and pastors, the Greenville District becomes a big part of the North Carolina Conference.

NEW BERN DISTRICT

R. GRADY DAWSON, *Superintendent*

At the beginning of this report I want to express my very deep appreciation to the pastors and the members of the churches of the New Bern District for the fine cooperation and support they have given me during this past year. It is through their faithful services and the help of our heavenly Father that this report has been made possible. It is to them I give the credit for the progress that has been made in every area of the work of the church. I can give here only a brief outline of what has been accomplished in the district during the year.

Christian Evangelism has been given major emphasis throughout the year through "Venture in Faith" revivals, visitation evangelism, church membership classes, personal witnessing, church school evangelism, groups of the twelve, business men's prayer groups, lay revivals, and evangelistic preaching by the pastors. These efforts have borne fruit in the spiritual renewal of many church members and in the addition of new members to the churches. Up to this date, April 28, 994 new members have been received into the membership of the churches—436 on profession of faith, 558 by transfer and otherwise—with a net gain of 381. The present total membership of the district is 15,799. As a part of the evangelistic work of the pastors and of the church members, 59 revivals, 50 periods of visitation evangelism and 56 church membership classes have been held, and 201 babies baptized. I want to thank all who have participated in these evangelistic efforts and especially express appreciation to the Rev. I. E. Cook, the district secretary of

Evangelism, who has given such dedicated and dynamic leadership in this very vital area of work. The pastor and members of the Northwoods Methodist Church, Jacksonville, deserve special commendation for the outstanding work they have done in evangelism this year. Brother W. E. Eason has received a total of 232 new members up to this date with 184 net gain in membership.

Christian Education continues to be a deep concern and vital work of our pastors and churches, but in spite of the faithful work of our district education staff, headed by the capable leadership of the Director of General Church School Work, the Reverend Lawrence E. Lugar, the numerical gains in the church school, both in enrollment and in average attendance, have not kept pace with the gains in church membership for the district as a whole. To stimulate the work in this area and to better train and equip our church school workers, district and subdistrict workshops, Christian Workers' Schools, a Vacation Church School Institute, special training courses and planning retreats have been held during the year. The local church Commissions on Education have become better organized and more active. All of this endeavor has resulted in some gain in church school attendance and in the quality of teaching. However, much progress remains to be made in our church schools.

I feel that the new adult literature will be very helpful in reviving the adult division of our church school. Under the fine leadership of Rev. R. D. Shinkle and Rev. Lawrence E. Lugar, with the assistance of Rev. A. F. Fisher and the Rev. H. F. Leatherman, the ground work has already been laid for a good introduction to this new adult literature in an all-day teaching session with the pastors of the district. The pastors are now in the process of sharing this foundational background for the new literature with their adult teachers and workers. Plans are being made for an adequate training program to prepare the adult teachers and workers to use this new literature in an interesting and effective way in the adult classes. This training will be given in four subdistrict "How to Teach It" sessions.

Christian Higher Education and the adequate support of our Methodist colleges have been kept before our people during the year. In this area we have made some progress and a number of churches paid their accepted quota in full, but much work remains to be done in this area. It is encouraging, however, to note that most of our churches have expressed their expectations to pay their accepted quota in full by the end of this quadrennium.

The 1% Plan for ministerial education is being accepted either in part or as a whole by a number of the churches. Thus, the New Bern District will perhaps double its giving this year to this worthy cause.

The local church committees on Christian Vocations are also becoming more active. I want to give special commendation to the committee at Trinity Church, Jacksonville, to the pastor, and to Mrs. L. D. Hayman, who planned and executed a most effective Christian Vocations Institute in which the surrounding Methodist churches were invited to participate.

Missions and Church Extension are a very vital part of our total program of work. More and more of the local Commissions on Missions are becoming active and are endeavoring to plan and execute an informative and helpful program of missions in the local churches. Most of the pastors and Commissions on Missions conducted helpful studies or schools of mission using the church-wide study material on "Affluence and Poverty." The interest in and giving to mission specials are increasing in the district. This year the district will give approximately \$7,000 to Mission Specials. Next year this amount will be increased.

Continued interest in church extension is evidenced by new memberships in the Ten Dollar Club and also in the developing plans for new churches. At present negotiations are under way for three new church sites in Jacksonville and the surrounding area and a survey is being made in one of these areas to ascertain the need and readiness for the organization of a new church in the immediate future.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service continues to be one of the most active and vital agencies in the area of missions in our district. Under the fine leadership of the district president, Mrs. J. H. Ipock, the women's work is moving forward in a most effective manner.

Social Concerns are becoming a living concern of more and more of our people and more of the local church commissions are becoming active in the distribution of informative literature, in keeping this important area of work before the people, in special studies, and in local church activities. Many of the churches adopted resolutions opposing the "brown-bagging" bill and the proposed bill calling for liquor by the drink, and

copies of these resolutions were sent to our State Legislators. Many individual church members wrote letters requesting the legislators to vote against these bills. Much remains to be done in the area of Social Concerns but more of our churches and people are being awakened to the needs in this area.

Lay Activities in the district continue to grow in scope and effectiveness under the dedicated leadership of our district lay leader, Mr. Ernest Smith, and his faithful associates. Most of the Methodist Men's organizations in the district are active and doing good work. There was a good attendance at the Annual Conference Lay Retreat and the district lay rally. The 117 lay speakers are doing a fine job in the No Silent Pulpit program, and also in filling pulpits throughout the year in the absence or illness of the pastors. They have also helped in lay witnessing missions and in lay evangelistic programs. One of the most encouraging prospects for the spiritual renewal of the church is in the renewed interest of many of the laymen in evangelism and lay witnessing.

The Group Ministry in the northeastern section of Carteret County is a special co-operative ministry of ten churches and six pastors. Through this Group Ministry many growing and enriching programs and opportunities are made possible. Programs in church music, training classes, stewardship, local church commissions, youth work, and other areas of church work are planned and carried out with very helpful and effective results. This Group Ministry is made possible financially through a donation from the Duke Endowment under the direction of Dr. Wilson Nesbitt and the contributions from the ten participating churches. Under the fine leadership of Mr. Marvin Pake, president, and Rev. J. T. Fisher, general director, the Group Ministry program is rendering a much-needed and helpful service.

Stewardship and Finance: The giving of most of the churches continues to increase. In the area of Christian stewardship and tithing some progress has been made but much remains to be done in the development of a real stewardship vision and stewardship practice. During the four years prior to this year the amount unpaid on World Service and Conference Benevolences has been reduced from \$15,000 to \$3,600. This year we hope to meet our obligations in full. The increased askings on World Service and Conference Benevolences for next year will be accepted in full, and the pastors will receive an increase in salaries of between \$12,000 and \$15,000. This year the churches will raise for all purposes approximately \$800,000.

Buildings and Improvements: The planning and erection of new churches, education buildings, and parsonages in the New Bern District continues unabated, as is evidenced by the following list of activities and plans:

Buildings and renovations completed: Centenary Church in New Bern, extensive renovation of sanctuary and education building, with official opening held by Bishop Garber on March 12; Maysville, erection of a new sanctuary and education building, relocated on a new and spacious lot with official opening held by Bishop Garber on March 19; Harlowe, completion of enlarged and beautifully renovated sanctuary; Salter Path, completion of new education unit with a novel plan of financing by selling an album of sacred music produced by the church choir.

Buildings and renovations now under construction: Swansboro, a new sanctuary and education building relocated on a beautiful new lot; Harlowe, new education unit; Sea Level, extensive renovation of the parsonage.

Buildings in the planning stage: Trinity, Jacksonville, a new education unit; Midway, a new sanctuary and education building; Clarks, a new education building; Beech Grove, additional education unit; Broad Creek, relocation and a new sanctuary and education building; St. Peter's, a new parsonage; Trinity, New Bern, new parsonage; St. James, new education unit; Oriental, new fellowship hall; Gum Branch, renovation of education building; North River, new education unit; Epworth, new education unit; Dover, new sanctuary.

A number of lesser church and parsonage improvements have been made during the year. The total amount raised this year on debts, building and renovations has been approximately \$260,000.

The above figures and statements represent only a part of the achievements in the district during the past year. For these achievements reported and for many others unreported, I am happy to give credit to the presence and power of our heavenly Father in the lives of our people and to the faithfulness and hard work of the pastors and the good Methodists of the district. Our prayers and blessings are continually invoked in behalf of all the pastors and people of the district.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

NICHOLAS W. GRANT, *Superintendent*

Serious consideration of the real mission of the church in today's world has been an outstanding characteristic of the leaders of the Raleigh District in the past year. The quality of work which has been done by the 26,169 members of the 72 churches on the 53 pastoral charges has been most inspiring.

I wish in the beginning of this report to express appreciation for the genuine spirit of cooperation which has prevailed as laymen and ministers have worked together. Quality study, worship, and service have been the goals toward which we have worked. Bishop Arthur J. Moore once said, "We will not go much further in the work of the church unless we are willing to go deeper." This has been our conviction as we have projected our plans in the following areas:

Membership and Evangelism: Each minister and Commission on Membership and Evangelism was urged to plan the type of Venture in Faith program which would meet the need of the particular church, with full realization that even though there are certain basic needs in all churches, each would have its peculiarities. For example, the type of program in an area in which the population is declining would be quite different from that in the area of great population growth. Thirty-seven charges experienced a net increase in church membership, four had the same, leaving only twelve experiencing a decline in membership. On May 1, the pastors' reports revealed that 1,725 members had been received through all methods, giving a net increase of 3% in the district for the year. A Lay Witness Mission was held in the Louisburg Church.

Missions and Church Extension: Ninety authorized studies were held involving an attendance of over 4,000 persons. Outstanding was the cooperation of all groups within the church as they carried through the church-wide studies. The Ten Dollar Club and other special offerings in this field have been given special emphasis. Over five hundred of the conference total of approximately 2,600 members of the Ten Dollar Club are in the Raleigh District.

Education: The past months have found the leaders in this field making fine preparation for the new literature which will be inaugurated in September of 1967 in our adult classes of the church school. One hundred and fifty-four adult classes have used the special materials for the month of April in this preparation. Two hundred and seven persons attended Christian Workers' Schools. Many of our churches are working toward the completion of their quotas for College Capital Funds.

Christian Social Concerns: Many different projects have been carried through in this area by the charges of the district. The great majority of churches carried through at least one project.

Stewardship and Finance: At the beginning of the year the following goals were set concerning our financial responsibilities for the conference which are as follows: 50% paid by mid-year; 75% paid by District Conference, April 2; and each charge paid in full by the opening of Annual Conference. We have been gratified by the cooperation of many of the churches as they have achieved many of these goals. We are aware that much training is needed in the area of stewardship, especially with regards to the use of the pledge and regular giving systems. Only eight churches have their budgets underwritten by the pledge of their members. Several outstanding E. M. V.'s have been held through the help of dedicated laymen. A special word of appreciation is in order for the fine leadership of Dr. Hiram K. King and the representatives of the Department of Finance and Field Service of the Board of Missions.

Lay Activities: Mrs. W. M. Bryan, district president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and her co-laborers; Dr. J. E. Legates and his associate lay leaders have led us well in these areas of endeavor. Emphasis on a stronger local church leadership has been stressed. Every endeavor initiated has experienced marked progress over other years.

Buildings and Improvements: During the past months the churches have paid over \$200,000 on property indebtedness while launching other building programs.

Educational buildings have been completed at Raleigh: Westover Church, and Cary: First Church at a cost of \$230,000. Plans are ready for construction of facilities at Pleasant Grove, St. James, St. Marks at an estimated cost of approximately \$700,000.

Initial plans are being made for the renovation of the Macon Church and construction is under way at Rehoboth Church.

The Wake Forest Charge dedicated its parsonage on May 21, Edenton Street pur-

chased a new parsonage for its associate minister. Longview Church made extensive changes in its parsonage. Knightdale and the Warren Charge will begin construction of new parsonages soon.

Considering every angle of our work, we are happy to report that this has been a good year as we have worked together in an effort to build Christ's kingdom in the hearts of men and women, boys and girls near and far. For the cooperation of the laymen, ministers, and especially the connectional brethren who have assisted us in so many ways, we are most grateful.

ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT

J. W. PAGE, *Superintendent*

There are 48 pastoral charges, 82 churches, 50 preachers, and 20,909 members in the Rocky Mount District, and this report is a brief account of their stewardship for the 1966-67 conference year.

Membership and Evangelism: The Reverend T. R. Jenkins is the district secretary of Evangelism. The Rocky Mount District and the Greenville District cooperated in the "Venture in Faith" evangelistic program in October. The ministers of the Rocky Mount District were guest ministers in the churches of the Greenville District October 9-14, and the Greenville District ministers came to the Rocky Mount District October 23-28. This cooperative "Venture in Faith" was a very meaningful and rewarding experience for both districts. The program of evangelism was given emphasis in each of the churches throughout the year. Lay witness missions were held at Temperance Hall, First Church, Rocky Mount, and Clark Street. At the time of this report, April 19th, we have received 325 members on profession of faith and 294 by transfer. Members lost in the district: 397 by transfer, five by Quarterly Conference action, and 160 by death. As of April 19th there were 20,909 members in the Rocky Mount District, and this represents an increase of 148 over the previous year.

Missions and Church Extension: The Reverend J. Thomas Smith is the district missionary secretary and has given excellent leadership in this area. The mission studies on poverty and the Bible study were presented to the ministers and the leaders in five subdistrict meetings. Dr. Thomas A. Collins presented the study on poverty, and the district superintendent presented the Bible study. These two mission study courses were also given in many of the local churches of the district. Emphasis was given to the four levels of Advance Specials, and the program of Church Extension through the Ten Dollar Club was presented to both ministers and laymen.

Christian Higher Education: The need for continuing support of our Methodist colleges has been kept before our people. Many of the churches of the district are on the honor roll for having met their college crusade quota in full. It is the plan and purpose of the Rocky Mount District to make a serious effort to reach the full college crusade quota by the time of the 1968 Annual Conference. Special tribute is hereby paid to First Church, Rocky Mount, for having met its quota, and by doing so it has the distinction of having raised more for our colleges than any other church in the conference.

Church School Work: Under the capable and energetic leadership of R. L. Baldrige, district director of the general church school work, and with the dedicated help of O. W. Watson, a great deal of thought and work have gone into the program of preparing our people for the "New Day in Christian Education" on the adult level. Conrad Glass has given great assistance with the youth work in the district, and Wesley Brogan continues to give progressive leadership in the area of children's work. In a seminar at the Enfield Church on the New Day in Christian Education for Adults, the Reverend Walter McDonald did an excellent job of presenting this material to the ministers and other interested leaders in the district.

Lay Activities: Mr. L. Taylor Oakes, district lay leader, with the cooperation of the associate lay leaders, has given very fine leadership to the total program of the church. As a matter of fact, whatever has been accomplished in the Rocky Mount District this year would not have been achieved had it not been for the loyal support of all our laymen. The District Training session for the laymen was held in September in First Church, Rocky Mount. The lay rally on February 14th had the largest attendance in several years, and it was a very inspiring meeting. The dedicated lay speakers of the district did a most effective job with the No Silent Pulpit program during Lent.

Stewardship and Finance: There has been an increase in giving in the Rocky Mount District. The increase in the acceptance on salaries is over \$12,000.00 for the coming

year, and the increase on World Service and Conference Benevolences acceptance is about \$5,000.00. Both large and small churches are represented in this increase.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. L. G. Hooks, district president of the Woman's Society, continues to report goodly progress among the societies. Mrs. Emily T. Bullock, district secretary of the Wesleyan Service Guild, reports an excellent record by the employed women of the district. High praise is certainly merited by the women of these two organizations.

Building and Repairs: Two churches in the district were destroyed by fire this year—First, Roanoke Rapids, and Bethany in Milwaukee. Plans for rebuilding are well under way at First Church, Roanoke Rapids, and Bethany Church in Milwaukee has already been restored. Major repairs have been made at the following churches: Calvary, Corinth, Weaver's Chapel, Conway, Ebenezer, Hawkins Chapel, Littleton, Rich Square, McKendree, Temperance Hall, and Eden. A new piano was added at Speight's Chapel and Severn. Black Creek is planning a new education building. Plans for a new church are being developed at Shiloh on the Gaston Charge. Nashville has plans for remodeling the education building. A new education building at Jackson is in the late planning stage, and it will be under construction before very long. Painting and repairs are to be made at the Rehoboth Church on the Northampton Charge. Pinetops is raising funds for a new church sanctuary. A new church sanctuary is also being planned for the Scotland Neck Church. Plans are being made to build a new church at Lebanon on the Spring Church-Garysburg Charge. St. James Church has redecorated its sanctuary, and it is also in the process of building a new education building. A new parsonage is to be built at Halifax, and Spring Hope is making plans for a new parsonage. Major repairs and redecorations have been made at the following parsonages: Conway, Evansdale-Black Creek, Red Oak-Yorks, Springs Church-Garysburg, St. James, West Halifax, Whitakers, and Seaboard. The district parsonage has been redecorated and several much-needed improvements have been made.

SANFORD DISTRICT

VERGIL E. QUEEN, *Superintendent*

The Sanford District, under the guiding hand of a patient Providence, has reached the end of another Annual Conference year.

The Sanford District is made up of 83 local churches, arranged in 47 charges, and served by 48 pastors. These churches and their leaders herewith submit the following summation of their achievements over the past year.

Membership and Evangelism: During the year 68 protracted meetings were held; 39 Visitation Evangelism efforts attempted, and 54 Confirmation classes enrolling 364 persons were organized and completed. During the year 383 persons were baptized; 131 infants and 252 others. Total additions to church membership were: on profession of faith, 368; received from other denominations, 115; and by transfer from other Methodist churches, 299—a total of 782. According to progress reports from the pastors, this represents a net gain of 378 members.

Christian Education: There are 80 church schools with an enrollment of more than 14,000 pupils. There are 1,365 members of the Methodist Youth Fellowship. Vacation Church Schools have been planned for 66 local churches. The Christian Education Sunday offering amounted to \$1,050.00. Very considerable effort has been expended in preparation for the New Day Curriculum in Christian Education for Adults.

The United College Crusade has received special attention over the past year. Considerable progress has been made. The First Church of Rockingham has completed payments on its total goal of \$31,000.00. Attempts will be continued to conclude all quotas within the next year.

Missions: The outstanding advance in Missions is in the area of Missionary education. Planned Schools of Missions have been conducted in nearly every charge and the response has been most heartening. At the time of this writing, indications are that more than \$3,000.00 has been accepted on World Service and Conference Benevolences above the current year's acceptance. World Advance Specials amounted to \$4,479.00; National Advance Specials, \$835.00; while Conference Advance Specials came to only \$410.00. Over \$4,000.00 has been realized through the Ten Dollar Club over the past year. Special offerings were as follows: Fellowship of Suffering and Service, \$760.00; Thanksgiving Day offering, \$1,696.00; Special Christmas offering, \$963.00; Race Relations Day, \$510.00; TRAFCO, \$265.00; One Great Hour of Sharing, \$779.00; Mother's Day offering, \$434.00; and \$292.00 for miscellaneous benevolences.

There are 70 organized Woman's Societies of Christian Service, with over 3,000 members. These have pledged \$15,000 plus for their work. There are 10 Wesleyan Service Guilds with about 250 members who have pledged more than \$1,000.00 to their work.

Building Projects: Mt. Gilead has completed a general program of renovation and new furnishings at a cost of more than \$15,000.00. The churches of the district have paid out \$90,570.00 for general improvements over the past year, while over \$113,000.00 has been paid on old debts.

Parsonage building continues in the Sanford District. A new parsonage has been built at Ellerbe at a cost of more than \$20,000. Laurel Hill has completed a new parsonage costing \$29,000.00. A total of \$32,718.00 has been spent on parsonage improvements over the year—major improvements being made at Goldston and West Rockingham.

The Sanford district parsonage was completed and occupied during the past year.

Lay Activities: The laymen and preachers of the Sanford District were saddened at the untimely death of their beloved lay leader, Brother Joseph C. Stowe of Hamlet. However, the fine spirit of his heroic leadership carries on and a well integrated program of lay activities has been projected throughout the year. The lay leadership of the district has been assumed by Mr. T. Roy Phillips of Carthage. He is an able leader and is assisted by a full staff of associates.

The district lay rally attracted nearly 600 men this year.

An all-out attempt is being made to reconstruct those lapsed Methodist Men's organizations and to organize all churches where no Methodist Men's work has been undertaken.

Summation: Many challenges confront us; many forces disturb us. Ours is a sick society—a society in which the church teeters on the brink of either commitment or betrayal, wavering between a choice of embracing the world or its Saviour. The decision is not yet clear. Our forces are depleted, our enthusiasm is often luke warm, our little day is running out; but, thanks be to God who gives us the victory, we do not labor in vain. The Lord of the harvest will establish the work of our hands, and perhaps some future day will witness the glad consummation of the kingdom. Brethren, pray for us!

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Clyde G. McCarver, *Superintendent*

By the cooperative efforts of good ministers and devoted laymen, the following report is made possible. The endeavors of the Christian people of the Wilmington District have been directed toward the fulfillment of the directives indicated through the total program of the Conference. We have attempted to present all causes and to meet all opportunities. We are not satisfied, but we are grateful to be able to render this report of our stewardship.

Membership and Evangelism: Under the leadership of the Reverend C. B. Hutcherson, we have participated in the "Venture in Faith" program of the North Carolina Annual Conference Board of Evangelism. As of April 27, 1967, we have baptized 89 babies, baptized 154 others, received 251 on profession of faith, and received 334 by transfer.

Christian Education: The Reverend T. J. Whitehead, district director of general church school work, led a two-day Pastors' Retreat at Lake Waccamaw to study the program on the New Day in Christian Education program of the Annual Conference. The Reverend Kimsey King taught this study in an efficient and profitable manner. Our local congregations are cooperating in a fine manner to see that "The New Perspectives in Christian Education" will be set in each church school program next year. Many of our subdistricts are making the study in a cooperative thrust. Leadership Training Schools have been held throughout the district. Our church school enrollment is 8,979. The Reverend Henry Bizzell has given fine leadership in the Methodist Youth Fellowship work throughout the district. The entire district Christian education staff is to be commended for the splendid work which it has done.

Lay Activities: Our deeply dedicated lay leader and associate lay leaders have given dynamic leadership this year. We had one of the largest attendance records at the Annual Conference Lay Retreat for some time. Brother Wade Pierce has led us all in the work of lay activities in a splendid manner. Over four hundred laymen and ministers heard Dr. Carl Sanders gave a dynamic address on recapturing the goals of the true church. Our lay speaker program was a success throughout the district. Many commitments have been made as a direct result of this program.

Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild: Mrs. James Murdock and her district officers continue to give dynamic leadership and encouragement in this great work. Highest praise and deep gratitude is due the ladies of this wonderful "arm of the church." This extends to each local unit.

Building and Improvements: Pastors' reports indicate that we have spent in excess of \$155,000 in buildings and indebtedness for churches and parsonages. New parsonages are under construction at Chadbourn, Hallsboro, and Harrells. The last two will be ready for occupancy at Annual Conference. Shiloh on the Bolton Charge is building a new sanctuary. Carver's Creek will begin building a new sanctuary in the near future. A new education building has been built at Village Point on the Shallotte Circuit. Herring's Chapel on the Rocky Point Charge will soon begin to build a new sanctuary. Dedications have been made for the following: Education buildings at Rocky Point and Jordan on the Rocky Point Charge; parsonage at Bladen Circuit; sanctuary at Lebanon on the Bethel-Lebanon Charge. We are in the stage of making plans for new buildings at Southport, Clarketon, and Wesley Memorial.

Finances: The Wilmington District can be counted upon to come forth with her proper responses to the calls given in this area. Substantial raises have been made for the next year in the area of World Service and Conference Benevolences. While there are some congregations that have not as yet seen the privilege of true stewardship, the majority of our charges respond with a willingness and devotion which makes us to be both humble and grateful. We expect each charge to pay its full Conference budget by adjournment of the 1967 Annual Conference.

The Wilmington District continues to grow and we have so much for which to be thankful. Our district will yield to no one when it comes to dedication of pastors and people. It is a benediction to have the privilege of serving in this wonderful part of the kingdom. I offer humble and sincere appreciation to that fine group of Christians that makes the Wilmington District a joy to serve.

REPORT OF THE BISHOP'S COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

RALPH L. FLEMING, JR., *President*

INTRODUCTION

"The church from its beginning has believed in social welfare and moral reform, and has labored to bring the whole of life with all its activities, possessions and relationships into conformity with the will of God. The church is persuaded that in Jesus Christ alone are to be found the cure for industrial, economic and social ills, and salvation from the sins that beset and curse society and block its progress.

"The church, therefore, is convinced that it should minister to the physical, intellectual and social needs of those to whom it preaches the gospel of personal redemption, and should guide them in an intelligent and faithful endeavor to improve human conditions and to Christianize every area of human life. The church should cooperate with worthy

movements in the community, nation, and world for physical development, intellectual growth, social betterment, and spiritual enrichment."

—From *Basic Beliefs Regarding Social Issues and Moral Standards of the Evangelical United Brethren Church*.

The church is not at liberty to disregard the crises and problems that entangle men who must live together through this revolutionary age. Christ does set us free, but not that we may gain a life for ourselves by avoiding the tensions, the suffering, the struggles that harm us all and disintegrate the human community.

Christ frees us to be God's people in the world; he calls us to be a compassionate people, whose concerns for men are as all-inclusive as his own; a conscientious people, whose rebellions against inhumanity and justice are kindled by his angers; a reconciling people, whose deeds are informed and motivated by his spirit.

It has been said that everyone needs two conversions—one to Christ and one to the world. When we are penitent, our first and continuing movement is toward God but that movement also turns toward the world.

One clear mark of the church is this: it shows its love for God by serving his world. It is this turning to the world which saves church life from being trivial and introverted; for, be it remembered, whenever we do not act in our communities as we pray, men come to believe that we are not related to life, that faith has no consequences, and that the church is not relevant to the world's joys and pains. "The church that lives to itself will die by itself."

Rather than avoid the issues of the day, churches should speak and deal with them. Churches must not succumb to the paralyzing fear of controversy. The reasons why churches should deal with controversial issues are much the same as those for individual Christians. The church as the body of Christ ministering in the world cannot avoid involvement in controversy any more than could Jesus.

"The Methodist Church must view the perplexing times and problems which we face today in the light of the life and teachings of Jesus. Jesus taught us to love our neighbors and seek justice for them as well as for ourselves. To be silent in the face of need, injustice, and exploitation is to deny him.

"We believe that all persons have supreme value in the sight of God, and ought to be so regarded by us. We test all institutions and practices by their effect upon persons. Since Jesus died for the redemption of all men, we believe we should live to help save man from sin and from every influence which would harm or destroy him."

—From *The Methodist Social Creed*.

No aspect of the life of society or the individual's experience is outside or beyond the rule of God and therefore not outside or beyond the concerns of the church which is committed to seek, to interpret and to do his will in all of life.

Senator Charles Percy of Illinois speaking to a national organization in New York City recently called upon all churchmen to involve themselves in the social and political affairs of our time. "The church," he said, "must lead not only in religion but in life. It must minister not only to the spirit but to the whole man, the whole community. It must be relevant as well as reverent." Senator Percy raised two pertinent questions: "If the church is not to act as a troubled conscience, who will? If the church remains silent in the face of war and poverty and injustice, who will speak?"

What has been said often must be said again. The Christian church not only has the right but also the duty to study and comment upon issues, no matter how controversial, in the realm of politics, economics and social affairs, in view of its common faith in Jesus Christ as both Savior and Lord. For all matters of concern for human beings are matters of concern to the church and to the church's Lord.

THE PROGRAM FOR THE PAST YEAR

Under the authority of the *Discipline* and the recommendations of the 1966 session of the N. C. Annual Conference, the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns reports on the following activities:

1. Joint sponsorship and promotion of this year's church-wide mission study, "Affluence and Poverty: Dilemma Facing the Christian," with the Conference Board of Missions and the Conference WSCS at local, district and conference levels, has been a major project. The Board president taught at the Conference School of Mission at Methodist

College after attending the Regional Leadership School of Mission at Lake Junaluska. He also taught and spoke to many local and district studies involving over 800 persons.

2. Active Methodist opposition has been focused generally upon further liberalization of state liquor laws and specifically upon efforts to enact liquor-by-the-drink laws. The Board is grateful to the Conference and to the Commission on World Service and Finance for a supplementary appropriation which made possible a vigorous campaign to better inform Methodists and legislators on the liquor issues facing the state. This Board has cooperated with the Christian Action League and the N. C. Congress Against Whisky by the Drink has sponsored, with the W. N. C. Conference, Rev. Frank Turner of East Spencer, N. C., on numerous speaking engagements and activities. It has also written and published in cooperation with the W. N. C. Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns four pages of alcohol education material in the *N. C. Christian Advocate* and distributed over 25,000 booklets and leaflets throughout our Conference area.

3. Legislative education and action on behalf of the five legislative programs adopted by the 1966 N. C. Annual Conference session has been carried out by this Board. These included Licensing of Day Care Facilities, Privileged Communications between Clergymen and their Parishioners, Abolishment of the Death Penalty, Amendment of the Adoption Laws Assuring that Independent Placements of Children for Adoption shall begin with Legal Proceedings, and the Assurance of Privacy of Birth and Death Certificates. Board officers have cooperated closely with the State Legislative Council, the N. C. Council of Churches and Social Actions Director, Rev. Jack Crum, and other state religious groups in organizing and registering Christian opinion on behalf of these issues.

4. The Youth Annual Conference session at Methodist College last summer featured five workshops for over 300 young people on disarmament, Vietnam, Mainland China, the race problem and foreign aid, all of which featured leadership from the Board of Christian Social Concerns. This Board also shared in the sponsorship of Dr. Harold A. Bosley who was the A.C.S. speaker for the 400 teen-agers who attended. District youth rallies in five districts this year included officers of this Board leading groups of over 850 young people in Christian social concerns topics such as alcohol problems, peace in Vietnam, the Ku Klux Klan, and legislative problems.

5. The Board provided scholarship aid to two members of our Conference—Dr. Harmon Smith of the Duke Divinity School and Dr. Norman A. Desroisers, M.D., of Butner, N. C.—for the first National Methodist Convocation on Medicine and Theology held April 5-7 in Rochester, Minn.

6. The National Churchmen's Washington Seminar which met recently included over 200 participants. Rev. Paul Carruth of Raleigh and president of the Board, attended and received scholarship assistance.

7. A luncheon meeting on the theme, "Peace in Vietnam — Next Steps," was held at Duke University last summer and featured Dr. Harold A. Bosley who had just returned from Vietnam. Over 100 Conference ministers and Duke Supply Pastors' School students attended.

8. Dr. Cecil Robbins, a vice-president of this Board, is now an active member of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns and a member of the General Board of the National Council of Churches.

9. *Answering the Agitators* is the name of a booklet published by the Committee on Interdenominational Cooperation of the Southern California-Arizona Conference of the Methodist Church and which analyzes the National Council of Churches. This Board has mailed 150 copies to key lay and clergy leaders of the N. C. Conference.

10. Rev. Ralph Fleming, Jr., who is president of this Board, is chairman of the Committee on Legislation of the N. C. Council of Churches and a vice-president of the N. C. United Nations Association.

11. The N. C. Conference representation at last summer's Southeastern Regional Social Concerns Conference at Lake Junaluska was the largest group attending.

12. Officers of the Board cooperated with other citizens of our state in organizing the North Carolinians Against the Death Penalty.

13. Audio-Visuals: movies and filmstrips have been purchased by this Board in cooperation with our Conference TRAFICO, the Board of Missions and the Board of Education in the area of sex and morality, youth-adult communications, poverty and moral responsibility.

14. A mailing of materials related to the Vietnam crisis, which included the state-

ment of the Methodist Council of Bishops and other reprints, was sent to all Conference ministers.

15. A Board of Consultants made up of 26 persons with experience and competence in various areas of Christian Social Concerns has been set up by the Conference Board to strengthen and advise and assist in the development of a more effective conference program.

16. The Methodist Church Seminar on U. S. - China Relations," held at the United Nations Church Center in New York, was attended by Rev. Charles V. Bryant, vice-president of the Division of Peace and World Order. He has spoken to civic and club groups totaling over 330 persons.

17. The Southeastern World Affairs Institute held last summer at the Blue Ridge YMCA Assembly which this Board jointly sponsored with other N. C. organizations was attended by over 200.

18. The Governor's Conference on "Housing Problems for the Elderly" which was held recently in Durham included among its participants officers of this Board.

THIS YEAR'S JOINT STUDY AND ACTION PROJECTS

1. "Man and the Community," the Christian Social Concerns project to be planned with the local WSCS Christian Social Relations Secretary, is a survey of the interdependence and mutual responsibility of people of all nations in light of the revolutionary, social, economic, and political situations in the world. The study aims at examining the explosive situations of the world and considering what is required of affluent peoples, such as Americans, especially in the light of Christian obligations. The text is "Path to World Order" by Andrew Cordier and Dr. Kenneth Maxwell. (Order from Methodist Publishing House or Service Department, 100 Maryland Ave., N.E., Washington, D. C. 20002, for \$1.25. Study guide by Brady Tyson for 50¢ also.)

2. Action Project on Crime and Rehabilitation—titled "Get to Know Your Judges" is a project to acquaint local church leaders with the problems and opportunities of the courts of limited jurisdiction such as municipal court, county court, district court, or other name. Details and materials on this project are in *The Methodist Story*, May program planning issue.

3. Action Project—"Toward Security and Disarmament." See May program planning issue of *The Methodist Story* for further details and for information on Study-Discussion-Action packet on China, disarmament, strengthening the United Nations and world economic development. Write the General Board of Christian Social Concerns, 100 Maryland Ave., N.E., Washington, D. C. 20002, for details on a national seminar-conference visiting the United Nations and Washington, November 13-17 during the United Nations General Assembly disarmament debate.

Local churches and their Commissions on Christian Social Concerns will be encouraged to determine their own particular responsibility on these issues. They will be asked to find ways of keeping themselves informed on foreign policy issues, of registering Christian opinions with decision-makers and opinion-shapers at various levels of community, for initiating interfaith, interracial and international communications.

DIVISION OF HUMAN RELATIONS AND ECONOMIC AFFAIRS

These times call insistently for the full gospel. No limited, provincial message is adequate for this complex, sophisticated age. The church, if it is to be a potent force in our day, must minister to the total needs of man.

Methodism is peculiarly fitted for this hour. It has ever sought to search out human need and to be in the forefront of the battle for every cause that liberates the human spirit and helps man to be his best self. Thus, Methodist people today are concerned about race relations, civil liberties, civic responsibility, labor-management relations, education, church-state relations, agriculture, conservation, government, private and public economic policy and practice, changes brought about by science and technology, unemployment, housing and many other interests affecting human welfare. Its concern is global in scope. Wherever there is human need, Methodism speaks out.

The church is not merely a do-good organization. It does not assume that by changing man's environment the millennium will come. Man's problems are centered basically in human nature. Thus Methodism works to improve man's environment and his opportunities to develop his potential. But it seeks to change man's nature through Christ. And it is in this latter capacity that the church's ministry and message are needed so urgently for these times.

The Methodist Church joins many forces, both secular and spiritual, that are seeking to improve man's environment and opportunities. But its essential mission is much more radical, more revolutionary. Its purpose is to change human nature—to lift man out of self, out of rebellion, into the way of Christian love.

Therefore, the church must be critic and judge, priest and pastor, of all people. If at times it seems to identify itself with minorities or with the oppressed, it is because it is these who need its help the most.

The North Carolina Conference is urged to provide statesmanlike leadership in the area of race relations. The Board of Christian Social Concerns calls upon our Conference to vote at this session to receive into our Conference our fellow-Methodists of the Central Jurisdiction who reside within the bounds of our Conference. We call upon our

people not only to carry out the legal requirements of the merger, but to receive our Negro Methodists with genuine warmth and Christian brotherhood.

The Board of Christian Social Concerns commends once more the work of the Good Neighbor Council under the leadership of one of our own distinguished Methodist laymen, David S. Coltrane. It urges our pastors and laymen to cooperate with the Good Neighbor Council in its continuing efforts to improve interracial relations and especially as it seeks to improve job opportunities for our Negro citizens. The Board is grateful to Governor Dan Moore and others responsible for the strengthening of the Good Neighbor Council.

The Board also commends the North Carolina Council of Churches in its ministry to the large number of migrant workers who labor in our fields during the year. These are the really dispossessed. They need the ministry of the church. They need protective Federal and State legislation to improve their lot. We express appreciation to our ministers and laymen who are helping to give more dignity and security to migrant workers and their families.

We urge our Conference to vote overwhelmingly in favor of merger with the Evangelical United Brethren Church as a step toward further ecumenical relations and brotherhood. These two branches of the church have so much in common. Wholehearted merger will not only strengthen our Methodist witness, but will serve as an example to a divided and warring world.

We point out again the Ku Klux Klan as a dangerous and destructive force to racial harmony in North Carolina. This organization remains a threat to the progress and peace of our state and nation. The leadership gives indications of bigotry and irresponsibility. They must be exposed to the light of publicity whenever their actions are illegal, immoral, or inhuman. The impact of Christian love and brotherhood must be maintained as a constant challenge to hatred and prejudice. We urge state and local officials to watch closely the activities of this organization and to move firmly against any violation of the law on the part of the Klan or any other extremist groups.

We deplore the growing spirit of extremism in our midst. Many attacks by the radical right are being leveled against The Methodist Church, the National Council of Churches, the World Council of Churches and other agencies working for justice and brotherhood. Respected leaders of our two major political parties, honored leaders of the church, and prominent educators are being subjected to ruthless criticism. Many unsuspecting Methodists are being deceived by these false prophets. We call upon our preachers and laymen to examine carefully the sources of these attacks, to search out the facts and to keep their people informed.

Extremists on the right and on the left are girding for battle for the soul of America. We believe that both are un-American, undemocratic and offer only confusion and chaos. They should be exposed for what they are. All of us have a stake in the battle. Each Christian can help to keep before our nation its basic Christian ideals and democratic concepts. To sit on the sidelines, serenely and apathetically, is to aid the forces of totalitarianism. To vote, to work, to live creatively is to help keep our church and our nation free and strong.

THE DIVISION OF PEACE AND WORLD ORDER

Matthew 5:9 says: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the sons of God." Luke 19:41, 42 says, "And when he (Jesus) drew near and saw the city he wept over it, saying, 'Would that even today you knew the things that make for peace! But now they are hid from your eyes.'"

The Division of Peace and World Order is under a mandate from the *Discipline* of the Methodist Church to study and to act with reference to the following world problems: Foreign policy, United Nations and Related International Organizations, Disarmament and Nuclear Weapons Control, Space Control, Economic Aid and Technical Assistance, Tariffs and Trade, Immigration and Naturalization, Military Policy and Conscription Legislation, and Christian Overseasmanship.

This means that The Methodist Church is concerned about world peace and cooperation. In order to realize much, The Methodist Church believes that it is called upon to work actively to create the conditions for peace such as understanding, reconciliation, and good will among people; the relief of suffering; raising living standards; freedom for dependent people; elimination of ideological tensions; disarmament; and honest negotiations.

This Division of our Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns has concentrated its studies in only a few but vitally important areas of current and grave significance. Observations and resolutions are as follows:

Voluntary Military Service and Conscription

The Methodist Church has, for many years, firmly opposed a compulsory military training and service in peacetime (*Discipline*, Para. 1823, Sec. 9). The Biblical-theological-ethical basis for such an opposition is found in Christian concern for freedom, for human rights, and for the full and fair development of persons in responsible relations to others. We believe, therefore, the maintenance of a society free from the effects of the draft is more in keeping with this concern.

Since 1940, the United States has practiced military conscription, except for a few years after World War II. The drafting authority law is due to expire in 1967. Noting that conscription makes it possible for the President to expand the armed forces and send troops into other countries to engage in war without a Congressional declaration; that such an act on the part of one person's decision could possibly lead into a full-scale war; that conscription denies freedom for young men for a period of years, forcing them into a role they would not otherwise have chosen and delaying or jeopardizing their plans for education, vocation, or marriage; and that a voluntary system of raising manpower in peacetime would make it necessary for the Executive Department to consult Congress and hence the people, before embarking on a major war, we recommend a thorough review of alternative and voluntary measures in lieu of the present draft law.

Conscientious Objection

The *Discipline* of The Methodist Church, Par. 1823, Sec. 9, (c), 1964, provides Methodists with grounds for a statutory recognition of moral, philosophical, and humanitarian as well as religious motivation for conscientious objection to military service. Methodists also recognize other reasons for objections to compulsory military service as equally important, such as: moral, philosophical, and humanitarian.

The Biblical-theological-ethical basis for conscientious objection is found in the concept of "obeying God rather than man." As Methodists we believe in the power of conscience and believe that each man should have the opportunity to give conscience priority in any conflict with human authorities and institutions.

In a free society we believe that it is essential that every person should be encouraged to follow his conscience so long as it does not conflict with the rights and safety of other persons.

In the light of this we defend the right of any individual to dissent when coercion is being used to reduce his sensitivity to his conscience relative to moral, philosophical, and humanitarian concern.

We, therefore, urge our United States Government to make provision for non-combatant military duty for those conscientiously opposed to combatant duty and alternative civilian service for those who conscientiously reject participation in any military training or duty. We also go on record for urging recognition of other conscientious objectors to a particular war, declared or undeclared, or to the one confronted at the time of induction. Lastly, we urge our government to make provision for those in the Armed Forces who become conscientious objectors to obtain noncombatant status or to be honorably discharged through an orderly and expeditious process.

Anti-Ballistic Missiles

Recent reports from Russia indicate that the USSR is either constructing or planning the construction of anti-ballistic missiles to protect several of its large cities from a missile attack. Some of our government and military leaders have responded by urging that the U. S. enter into such an anti-ballistic program to defend our principal cities.

Many other governmental officials and other citizens question the effectiveness of such a project, as well as its multi-billion-dollar cost. We Methodists add to these questions the Christian ethic involved in the choice of what cities would we want to protect. What is to be done about those cities of people left unprotected? We also question whether or not such a project could ever be feasible since both countries would soon develop another missile that would be able to penetrate the anti-ballistic missile barrier.

We, therefore, urge our U. S. Administration to continue its resistance of pressure from those who would lead us into an acceleration of offensive weapons that could heighten tension, strengthen the spirit of militarism, and further divert our national resources and attention from the development in our own nation to free men from misery, hunger, and poverty.

Vietnam

It has been one year since our Annual Conference voted on and passed a statement that said, "We express our concern over the ever-widening gap between our country's popular expression of its desire to negotiate for peace and its continuous policy of military escalation in Vietnam. We are witnessing an unrelenting military expansion that has not decreased the conflict in any way proportionate to the increment of war action. It is going from bad to worse."

Today, a year later, it has gone from worse to worse. The situation in Vietnam has reached the point where most of our people are almost frantically seeking an early end to the involvement. In doing so, we must keep in mind the danger of allowing moral and ethical means to become sacrificed for the end. This is what is happening. The killing and maiming and the wanton destruction of property continue to escalate at an increasing pace until the whole world is aghast. This carnage must be condemned by Christians and other men of good will.

We, therefore, call upon our government officials to formulate a clear policy that will not infringe upon the Geneva Accords of 1954, that will give North Vietnam the opportunity to be put to a test of trust, and that will recognize all factions involved and allow them to be a part of the negotiations.

Bishops' Statement on Vietnam

The bishops of The Methodist Church have made a resolution on Vietnam which is consistent with the foregoing statement. In it they called for "no further escalation by any participants." They claim that "Nowadays we know that neither victory nor defeat, in the sense in which they were once understood, is possible for warring nations . . ." They readily recognized and encouraged "representatives of our church to assemble with other representative religious leaders of the Judeo-Christian tradition, and indeed of all the world's great religious traditions, to assess our common obligations to all humanity in this crucial hour and to deliberate on what initiatives people of all religious persuasions might undertake in order to avert disaster."

The bishops vigorously supported the United Nations Secretary-General U Thant in his attempts to bring the opposing sides in the Vietnam struggle together. They also endorsed the efforts of those persons and governments who are providing medical aid to all Vietnamese civilians wounded in the war. They call for an expansion of it. They pledge the Methodists' support by enlarging our relief efforts through church agencies.

Lastly, they urge "the major powers to commit themselves jointly to a program of massive economic rehabilitation in the torn and tortured land of Vietnam."

United Nations

Officially, The Methodist Church supports the United Nations along with most of the major denominations throughout the world. As Methodists and as Americans we recognize the U. N. as offering the most promise for the achievement of world peace and world understanding of any other international organization known to the world. We recognize, however, its limitations, but only because of the widespread misunderstanding and blind criticism of its role in brotherhood, health, education, economic betterment, and peace-keeping operations among the peoples of the world. This criticism and misunderstanding, we must recognize, often come from those people who abound in prejudice, hate, ignorance, or self-importance. We must offset this with more factual information and a greater appreciation for its strategic role than those who oppose it.

In a period of history when, for the first time, the entire world's basic needs can be supplied without taking some away from anyone else, poverty and starvation and the gross inequalities among peoples can literally be eliminated. All the peoples of the world can benefit mutually and permanently from science, technology, and affluence, the United Nations is needed more than ever.

East-West Relations

Through two agonizing decades of the "cold war" the churches have made suggestions for conciliatory policies by the U. S. government that could decrease East-West tensions. We rejoice that some of these policies have been adopted and we hail each move by either side that tends towards more rational and humane relations.

The recently ratified Consular Treaty with the Soviet Union is a case in point. We commend the Administration for negotiating this Treaty and the U. S. senators who voted

for its ratification, among them a Methodist from our Annual Conference, Senator B. Everett Jordan.

DIVISION OF ALCOHOL PROBLEMS AND GENERAL WELFARE

The assertion that the problems arising from the use of beverage alcohol are of concern to the Christian may seem self-evident to the Methodist familiar with the traditional stand of our denomination and its emphasis on total abstinence. Our very acceptance of this stand as being in the Methodist tradition and our efforts to perpetuate this tradition as a meaningful expression of our faith may quite paradoxically contribute to the dulling of our witness in this vital area of concern.

We find increasingly among the young people of our denomination a lack of awareness of this tradition. From whence should they have received such awareness of our tradition as indicia of our Christian concern and love for our fellowmen and as an expression of a disciplined Christian life? From a quarterly Sunday school temperance lesson? From an annual observance in one form or another of Commitment Day? From the Word received from our pulpits? From the precept and example of teachers in our church school? From precept and example in our homes? From whence? Most improbably will it be from the mores of an increasingly secular society.

We are uncomfortably aware of what we may superficially perceive to be a lack of sensitivity to these problems on the part of our Christian brethren of other denominations, but that which we may attribute to lack of concern by our brethren may be due in part to a failure of communication on our part in the making of an effective witness—a failure to speak meaningfully and a failure to hear and understand that which is spoken.

Our discomfort increases when we look about us and know that we are not without inconsistency in our own lives—within our own congregations—within our official boards.

Dare we say it? Dare we not say it? Dare we confess our shortcomings, our all too prevalent tendency to rely upon legalisms to bolster our faith, our very human and very basic and recurring failure to avail ourselves of God's grace in these areas wherein the law of love affords our only answer? Dare we, however fearfully, however tentatively, commence a meaningful dialogue with our youth, with our fellow Christians of other denominations, with those in our own congregations who love the Lord but somehow are uncertain as to whether and how to relate that love to the problems of beverage alcohol? Dare we not?

Is our ministry all-inclusive? Is it extending its concern unto "the least of these, my brethren" — to the weak and downtrodden — to the victims of alcohol in our community not just to the families and children, but to the alcoholic himself? Who ministers unto him? A.A.? The State Hospital? The mental health clinic? Who? Do we?

Are our enouncements to the legislature on the subject of control of beverage alcohol meaningful, intelligent, relevant, effective? Are we making maximum use of interdenominational cooperation in this area? Is the beam in our own eye so evident to others and imperceptible to ourselves that our attempted witness is frequently ignored?

How is our witness in this area relevant to the great ecumenical dialogue of our day? How will we react when we come face to face with the reality of a Christian faith which we fear cannot be reconciled with our tradition of abstinence? Can we be reconciled one to another in Christ, even as we ask to be reconciled unto him? Shall we defer unity in Christ until we achieve unconditional surrender? And pending this shall we trust that "God may perhaps grant that they will repent and come to know the truth?"

Can we—will we—do we put pride aside in these and other areas? Can we recognize the mighty power—God's power—Methodism has exercised and may yet exercise in its witness in this area of social concern—and do so with humility?

Are we yet ready to prayerfully seek answers to these questions? Are we ready to even ask the questions? With the help of God, let us do so. Let us ask questions of ourselves, of our fellow Christians, of our God—and let us listen. Let us ask, listen, pray, listen again, and go forth to serve Him anew in this area of Christian social concern.

Resolution on Capital Punishment

Our General Conference in 1964 and in prior years has repeatedly declared "We deplore the use of capital punishment."

Our Annual Conference in 1961 and in prior years has likewise repeatedly so declared itself to be of like mind.

"We believe that the death penalty is neither a morally justifiable nor socially effect-

ive form of punishment. The Christian gospel expressly forbids the treatment of another human being on the basis of 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' (Matthew 5:38). To define justice as retribution or retaliation is a sub-human concept."

—1960 General Conference of *The Methodist Church*.

"I do not favor capital punishment because I do not believe it is a deterrent to crime."

—Clinton Duffy, former warden of San Quentin Prison.

"In the twelve years of my wardenship I have escorted 150 men and one woman to the death chamber and the electric chair. In ages they ranged from 17 to 63. They came from all kinds of homes and environments. In one respect they were all alike. All were poor, and most of them were friendless. The defendant of wealth and position never goes to the electric chair or to the gallows."—Lewis E. Laws, late warden of Sing Sing Prison.

"I shall ask for the abolition of the punishment of death until I have infallibility of human judgment demonstrated to me."—Thomas Jefferson.

The whole Christian purpose is that of human redemption. The central theme of Christianity is that human personality is of infinite value in the sight of God. In Christ no one is beyond reach of spiritual reclamation. No matter how evil or depraved a person may be, punishment which denies this essential Christian principle debases the society in which it is administered.

Pre-meditated murder in the name of the state is bottomed upon vengeance—no more and no less—and as such is an indictment against the society in whose name it is decreed. The conscience of the individual citizen cannot be free of his involvement in this anachronistic survivor of the England of 1800 which killed in the name of the state for 350 different crimes — of the society of Charles Dickens which made an execution a public spectacle reminiscent of a Roman holiday when Christians died before the eyes of the body politic which allowed such savagery.

If we have eliminated 346 of these justifications for legal taking of the life of a child of God—if we no longer wish to witness the consequences of this "justice without grace"—then what justification is there to the elimination of three of the four remaining causes and the leaving of the fourth as a surviving unredeemable sin, or to further dilute or attempt to pass on or to share the responsibility for throwing the switch between judge, jury, or chief executive? The responsibility for each execution is not merely that of the judge, jury, or governor — no matter how the law is written. It is that of each of us as members of a free society and as Christians. Let us now be responsible and act responsibly.

We commend the leaders of our 1967 General Assembly who led the effort to repeal capital punishment, the committee which recommended repeal, and the legislators who voted for repeal. In the next General Assembly may they be joined by representatives of our people who gave careful consideration to repeal of capital punishment and could not on this occasion see fit to support the repeal effort.

We call upon our ministry and our laity to involve themselves with the cause which seeks removal of this means of punishment from our statute books by making their views known to the candidates for the General Assembly in the coming year and by continuing such involvement until capital punishment is no longer the law of the State of North Carolina.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Thirteenth Annual Meeting of the North Carolina Council of Churches was held at Winston-Salem, the Church Women United in North Carolina having their Assembly April 24-26, the Pastors' Conference taking up the day on April 25, and the Council's Assembly convening that evening and concluding the following day. At the Council's Assembly four new church bodies were received into membership, the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Annual Conferences of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the Shelton Church of the Brethren at Mount Airy, and the Mars Hill Baptist Church of Mars Hill. There are now thirty-nine member bodies, representing sixteen different denominations and having 6,723 local congregations, with over 1,350,000 communicant members. For the first time the Roman Catholic Diocese of Raleigh had an official observer present at the Council's Annual Meeting.

The Council's organizational structure is made up of Executive Board and Administrative Committee, an Advisory Conference, two Departments, two General Committees, and five Commissions under which are grouped 23 Program Committees. The Executive Board met on September 1 and November 22, 1966, and on April 25, 1967. The Advisory Conference, which is composed of the executives of the member bodies, met on February 7. The Department of Church Women United (note new name) had a splendid year under the leadership of Mrs. Ira C. Shelley of Greensboro.

In the area of finance, we are deeply gratified to report that the \$20,000 in new money needed to meet the minimum 1967 budget of \$49,168.10 was assured by noon on the day of the Council's Assembly. This was made possible by increased giving by the member bodies which have accepted in full or are moving toward full acceptance of the askings based upon the proportionate percentage plan of support, and by special pledges made by individuals and individual churches. Slightly more than \$6,000 is needed to assure the minimum budget for 1968, and it is confidently expected that increased giving from the member bodies will close that gap, putting the Council in the best financial condition in recent years. The proportionate percentage plan calls for each constituent group to contribute one-tenth of 1% of its total giving to current expenses and benevolences (not including capital building funds). The 1967 Distinguished Service Award went to Dr. and Mrs. Harold J. Dudley of Raleigh. Dr. Dudley is Chairman of the General Committee on Business and Finance.

In the area of Public Relations note is taken of the Richard Shelton Communications Awards for 1967 which went to *The Raleigh Times*, *The Jacksonville Daily News*, *The Chapel Hill Weekly*, Radio Station WAYN, Rockingham and Television Station WBTW, Charlotte. A special citation was given to Miss Virtie Stroup of *The Winston-Salem Journal* and *The Twin City Sentinel*. The weekly religious TV newscast, "News of the Church," sponsored by the Council, is now carried by WTVD, Durham; WBTW, Charlotte, WGHP-TV, High Point; and WFBC-TV, Greenville, S. C. The radio newscast, "The Week in Religion," continues over station WPTF, Raleigh.

Commission and Committee Programs

Under the head of Christian Social Action, the customary United Nations-Washington Study Tour for Ministers was conducted last April. The Commission planned the Church Conference on Peace which was held at the Myers Park Baptist Church in Charlotte on November 29, and the Fourth Seminar on State Legislation in Raleigh on February 28. Many other activities come under this Commission, such as the Conference on Technology in Our Community.

Under the head of Christian Education the Committee on College Work co-sponsored with the Southeastern Regional Committee on United Ministries a seminar for members of the Campus Ministry Committees of the participating denominations in Durham in November. Last fall a list of the approximately 1500 international students in the state was compiled and made available to persons wishing to extend hospitality to some of these students from abroad. The Council office has sent out letters for the Committee on Weekday Religious Education addressed to presidents of local councils of United Church Women and ministerial associations in communities where Bible is not taught in the public schools, inviting consideration of such a program.

The Committee on Ministry for Overseas Relief reports twenty-four collection depots for Church World Service in the State. This program is co-ordinated through the Council office for the CWS Center in New Windsor, Maryland. Steps are being taken to have organized CWS-CROP Committees in twenty-one counties in North Carolina; there are now three such committees.

The Committee on Annual Meeting planned the program for the 1967 Annual Meeting, the theme of the Pastors' Conference being "The Pastor and His Personal Problems."

The Committee on Evaluation and Long-range Planning, in addition to other matters, proposed a program of community organization and development with the Lunbee Indians and others in Robeson County. This program has been approved by the Executive Board, but is not yet to go into effect.

The Committee on Town and Country Church has been joined in sponsorship of this year's seminar by the Committee on the Urban Church, and N. C. State University itself is to be co-sponsor rather than one of its departments. This Seminar on Church and Community, scheduled for May 11 and 12 on the N. C. State campus, followed the theme, "Church and Community Improvement Through Better Communication and Motivation."

The Committee on Ministerial Associations and Councils of Churches has written to the presidents of 105 ministerial associations in the State urging consideration by their groups of the formation of local councils of churches which would include lay men and women.

The Committee on Recreation and the Committee on Evangelism are both proposing conferences in these two fields in 1967 or 1968.

Other Committee Activities

With two General Committees and twenty-three Program Committees, it is difficult to schedule meetings of all of them in the same year. Some of the other Program Committees, while not having met in the past year, have yet been active. The Committee on Audio-Visuals has worked out a scheme for the exchange of catalogues between denominational AV libraries in the State. Thus far four libraries have agreed to this plan. The Committee on Camping co-sponsored a Southeastern Regional Workshop for Church Camps, Conferences, and Assemblies at Camp Chestnut Ridge in April 1966, along with the Brotherhood Commission of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Conference Boards of Education of The Methodist Church in the Southeast, and the Division of Continuing Education of the Department of Recreation and Park Administration of N. C. State University. This Committee also co-sponsored the Tri-state Consultation on Camps and Conferences at Camp Calvin, Georgia, March 13-14, 1967, along with the Georgia and Florida Councils of Churches and the Department of Educational Development of the National Council. Under the head of Children's Work, which is now under the Committee on Family Life Education, the Council helped to promote a Regional Conference on the Church's Work with Children which was held at the FFA Camp near Covington, Georgia, in March 1966. The Chairman of the Committee on Family Life Education is serving on the Steering Committee of a group set up by the Carolina Population Center of UNC at Chapel Hill to work in the area of Family Life Education and Population. The Chairman of the Committee on Scouting has written to all of the Boy Scout executives in the State concerning chaplaincy service in the summer camps, urging such a program where it does not exist and making known the provision of training courses for such chaplains. Last year he sent to all Lutheran Church in America pastors in North Carolina a letter promoting Scouting in the churches. This message and its accompanying literature were sent out by the Council office to all Official Delegates of our member bodies. The Durham office furnishes information on councils of churches to Scouts working on the God and Country and Pro Deo et Patria programs.

The Committee on Ministry in the State and National Parks reported last summer the beginning of a summer religious ministry in Cape Hatteras National Seashores in addition to continuance of work at three points on the Blue Ridge Parkway. New work will be started this summer at Deep Creek Campground and Smokemont in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

The Committee on Research and Strategy stands ready to develop information needed by other committees in the promotion of their programs.

The bi-monthly *Church Council Bulletin* is published from the Council's Durham office. Subscriptions are free to members of the constituent bodies. Those not now receiving the paper are invited to send in their names and addresses for addition to the mailing list.

Bishop M. George Henry of the Episcopal Diocese of Western North Carolina came to the end of his term of office as President on April 26 and was succeeded by Dr. Samuel E. Duncan. President of Livingstone College at Salisbury and a member of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church.

The North Carolina Council of Churches affords the churches of this State their major agency for co-operative endeavor. Appreciation is expressed for the loyal support given by the Council's constituents during the past year.

We continue to have two active deaconesses in the North Carolina Conference—Miss Bernice Ballance, Church and Community Worker on the Salemburg Area Project, Salemburg, North Carolina, and Miss Ethelynde Ballance, Director of Christian Education, Raeford Methodist Church, Raeford, North Carolina. Two retired deaconesses reside within our conference—Miss Elizabeth Davis, Nashmont Rest Home, Rocky Mount, and Miss Mary Nichols of Wilmington.

In the spring, Miss Bernice Ballance attended a six-weeks training session for Church and Community Workers at Scarritt College in Nashville, Tennessee. While in Nashville, she also attended the meeting of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Deaconess Association.

Our deaconesses continue to interpret the deaconess relationship to youth groups and to members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service whenever called upon. Last fall, Miss Ethelynde Ballance had the opportunity to speak to a group of students from Methodist College in Fayetteville about the deaconess relationship and about opportunities for deaconess service.

During the past year there have been no candidates from our conference for the deaconess relationship, but at the present time, Miss Joan Kiernan, a former worker in the Pembroke area who is now studying at Scarritt College, is communicating with the Board of Deaconess Work, and is making plans to become a deaconess.

In this report, our Board wishes to pay tribute to the late Miss Mamiej Chandler, a deaconess who served long and well in our North Carolina Conference. We are mindful of the dedicated service she rendered for many years as Director of the Methodist Student Center in Greenville, North Carolina. We remember the pride with which she wore the deaconess pin, and we know that her devotion and commitment were examples of the deep meaning of the deaconess relationship.

Mamiej, as she was affectionately known, passed away at her home in Sumter, South Carolina on April 17th. As we remember her dedication, we of the North Carolina Conference Board commit ourselves anew to the tasks and opportunities before us.

I. Report for 1966-67

A. Nineteen Christian Workers' Schools were held last year in the following churches, areas, or subdistricts: Alamance (2), Chowan-Perquimans, Elizabeth City, Red Springs,

Snow Hill, Washington, New Bern, East Carteret, Vance, Raleigh, Wilson, Walter Peele, Rockingham, Sanford, Lake Waccamaw, Burgaw, Wilmington, and Fayetteville. These schools enrolled 1,183 persons and 944 received course cards of recognition. Six laboratory observation classes were held as a part of these schools with 290 persons enrolled and 143 received course cards. Three were one-teacher schools involving 104 persons. The school in Fayetteville was the Woman's Society of Christian Service School of Missions.

B. Sixteen persons attended the "Conference on the New Day in Christian Education" at Lake Junaluska last summer. Approximately 30 persons from the conference were involved in the Southeastern Leadership School and five district directors attended the "Workshop for District Directors of General Church School Ministry." Two district directors worked with Dr. Horace Weaver at Lake Junaluska on the special study unit, "Biblical and Theological Perspectives Undergirding Methodist Curriculum."

C. A training session for New Day leaders was held at Camp Chestnut Ridge in September involving 40 persons. This was the plenary workshop for 21 district meetings on "New Day in Christian Education" for pastors, adult workers, general officers, and chairmen of the Commissions on Education held in September with approximately 2,500 persons in attendance.

D. Sixteen ministers worked with the Reverend Joe Washington in September and Dr. Horace Weaver in December on the study, "Biblical and Theological Perspectives Undergirding Methodist Curriculum." A final manuscript and study guide was prepared to be used in the district training sessions for pastors. These sessions were held in January, February, and March:

1. Burlington District: two-day retreat, O. K. Ingram, instructor. Attendance: 27.
2. Durham District: One-day session; James I. Warren, instructor. Attendance: 40.
3. Elizabeth City District: four days (3½ hours per day); Dr. W. A. Kale, instructor. Attendance: 29.
4. Fayetteville District: two-day retreat; Warner Heston, Hugo Hodgkin, Wallace Kirby, instructors. Attendance: 42.
5. Goldsboro District: one-day session; Dr. Samuel J. Womack, instructor. Attendance: 35.
6. Greenville District: one-day session; Christian White, instructor. Attendance: 32.
7. New Bern District: one-day and evening session; Al Fisher, instructor, assisted by Lawrence Lugar and R. D. Shinkle. Attendance: 40.
8. Raleigh District: one-day session; James I. Warren, instructor. Attendance: 50.
9. Rocky Mount District: one-day session; Walter N. McDonald, instructor. Attendance: 53.
10. Sanford District: five days (3 hours per day); Dr. Samuel J. Womack, instructor. Attendance: 41.
11. Wilmington District: two-day retreat; S. Kimsey King, instructor. Attendance: 36.

E. The Executive Secretary participated in District Training Sessions for Boards of Church Locations and Buildings sponsored by the Conference Board of Missions and Duke Endowment. Five consultations with local churches on building and equipping for Christian education were conducted, and plans of approximately six additional churches were reviewed.

II. Recommendations for 1967-68

A. Leadership Training:

1. Christian Workers' Schools: In order to improve the quality of the schools, we suggest a variety of patterns to be followed by the Board of Managers.
 - a. Selection of courses could be made according to themes or emphases over a three- or four-year period in order to insure variety and progressions (see pages 8-10 of *Manual for Christian Workers' Schools*).
 - b. A one-theme school for leaders of all age groups with a plenary session to begin and interpret the theme, followed by application groups (see page 11 of *Manual*).
 - c. A one-theme school for various church leaders, following the pattern of plenary sessions and application groups (see pages 11-12 of *Manual*).
 - d. A two-term school, in the same year, with one term offering enrichment courses and the other term offering methods and laboratory courses.
 - e. A one-teacher school, with a number of these offered within a subdistrict area.
2. One-day consultations within a local church in order to help guide its education-

al ministry. These consultations would be conducted by the staff of the Board of Education, as well as by qualified members of the district staffs.

3. Quarterly sessions of church school teachers and workers for a workshop on the literature for the next quarter. This could be under the direction of the subdistrict Board of Managers of the Christian Workers' School.

4. Bible Conferences are recommended as additional training media.

5. We recommend that the Board of Education give serious consideration to setting up a conference-wide training for church school administrators in 1968-69, with emphasis on the role of the church school superintendent and the Commission on Education in the educational ministry of the local church.

6. We recommend that the Board of Education give authority to this committee to appoint a sub-committee to study the idea of some form of continuing education for church school teachers.

7. Because of the growing desire and sense of need on the part of pastors for continuing education, we recommend that the Annual Conference authorize the Board of Education to set up a study to determine the feasibility of an Annual Conference-wide Pastors' School for Enrichment and Continuing Education. A report should be brought to the 1968 conference.

B. Special Days:

1. Promotion Day in the Church School (August 27, 1967).

2. Christian Education Day (September 24, 1967) with a special emphasis on offering to support leadership training for a new curriculum. (Goal: an amount equal to one per cent of the pastor's salary).

3. Student Recognition Day (December 31, 1967).

4. Race Relations Sunday (February 11, 1968) with special offering for Paine College in Augusta, Georgia.

5. Methodist Student Day (June 9, 1968) with offering for Methodist Student Loan and Scholarship Fund.

6. World Service Sunday in the Church School (each fourth Sunday).

C. Executive Secretary:

Because of his leadership in the field of Christian education, not only in our conference but in the church at large, we express, on behalf of the church, our appreciation to Dr. Clarence Poe Morris. It was through his insight and initiative that the North Carolina Conference led out in preparation for the New Day in Christian Education, especially in training its ministers and laymen in the "Biblical and Theological Perspectives Undergirding Methodist Curriculum." We recommend his reappointment as executive secretary.

Section B

COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY WITH CHILDREN

MRS. JAMES AUMAN, *Chairman*

Progress Report for 1966-1967

Activities in the area of ministry with children have continued to center around specific training opportunities and enrichment programs. It is gratifying to see the development of volunteer leadership among district directors and other interested persons who have worked so faithfully and capably to assist in our ministry with children this year.

Eleven Vacation Church School Institutes were conducted to give assistance to teachers from local churches as they plan for vacation church school in the local church.

Four laboratory courses for children's workers were offered and of the 42 persons enrolled in these courses 20 received course cards of recognition.

One hundred ninety-one persons enrolled in Children's Courses in 13 Christian Workers' Schools. Of this number, 123 fulfilled the requirements of the course and received course cards of recognition.

In the area of camping the program continues to grow and there are always more applications for reservations for camp than we are able to fill. During the summer of 1966 there were a total of 757 elementary boys and girls in attendance at the three conference resident camps. Many other churches have been involved successfully in day camping.

Committees selected last year to work in special areas have continued to work on plans in their designated fields. The Committee on Weekday Nurseries and Kindergartens report a continuation of efforts to compile a list of Methodist nursery schools and kindergartens to be included in a general mailing from this group. The Committee on Ministry to the Blind initiated the use of tape recordings with blind students at Edenton Street Methodist Church. The committee, accompanied by church school teachers, visited the Governor Morehead School for the Blind to discuss mutual concerns in working with students from the school.

In the third year of the camping program for the mentally retarded there were 48 boys and girls enrolled for the week of resident camping at Don-Lee. This particular service has been a major factor in the development of other interesting and helpful activities for the retarded.

Interest and attendance were much improved this year in participation in the program of missionary education of children. Children's workers cooperated with the Conference Board of Missions in conducting institutes to introduce missionary education materials to workers with children.

There has been active participation by district directors in all places where their leadership was needed: camp counselors, teachers in Christian Workers' Schools, consultants for curriculum materials and for equipment and arrangement, and vacation church school planning.

Recommendations for 1967-1968

The Committee on Ministry with Children recommends the following emphases for the coming year of 1967-1968:

1. Vacation Church School Institutes to be held in each district during the period of March 26-April 25, and that vacation church school be held for Kindergarten, Elementary I-II, III-IV, V-VI. The district directors will be asked to conduct the class for vacation church school directors. The hours will be from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. District directors will arrange for a display of available materials, but materials will not be offered for sale at the institutes.

2. District directors will avail themselves of opportunities to study the missionary education materials, "Christ and the Faiths of Men" and "Japan." They will cooperate with the Study Committee of the Board of Missions in setting up training institutes to help church school teachers prepare to teach in local church schools of missions where children's groups are included.

3. The Committee on Weekday Nursery and Kindergartens be continued. Members of the committee will be Mrs. James Auman, Mrs. W. R. Stevens, and Mrs. Madge Oldham. This committee will be asked to plan for at least one meeting of Methodist nursery and kindergarten workers as well as being responsible for a general mailing of these workers including information about training opportunities for this group and other matters of interest to them.

4. The Ministry to Exceptional Children be continued:

a. That we continue to offer the resident camping program for the mentally retarded and increase our efforts to assist with church school classes for mentally retarded persons and to provide a ministry to their families.

b. The Committee on Ministry to the Blind be continued, with the Reverend J. Earl Richardson, Dr. Frank B. Thomas and Leslie Page to serve on this committee.

c. The Committee on Ministry to Deaf Children be continued, this committee to be composed of Mrs. J. C. Reynolds, Rocky Mount; Reverend Charles Hubbard and Mr. John Bissett.

5. In the area of Leadership Training, we recommend a series of concentrated training experiences to train children's workers for specific purposes.

a. We would suggest that weekend laboratory sessions be offered in areas heretofore unreached by the laboratory experience.

b. District directors will take leadership in planning one-night sessions to plan use of curriculum for the following quarter.

c. Curriculum sessions are to be conducted for teachers who have begun teaching since September 1964. The purpose of these sessions is to acquaint these teachers with the theology, educational, philosophy, resources, and format of the Children's Curriculum materials.

6. At least one conference-wide Laboratory School during the summer of 1968.

7. The district directors attempt to become better acquainted with the children's

workers in their districts by visitation programs, and by offering their services to churches needing their assistance.

The Children's Committee cannot close this report without saying, once again, that the efforts of our conference director have really been in evidence this year as he has worked to further his own training and at the same time has planned and guided the activities of this section of the Board of Education. We, as a committee, are proud of the academic accomplishments of Mr. Brogan as he receives his masters degree in Education from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in June. Along with carrying a full academic load, he initiated plans for the various activities of our committees, served as a resource person for many groups seeking assistance with curriculum equipment, arrangement, etc., and continued leadership training in many local churches. The committee certainly hopes that he will be back next year as our conference director, and we wish to express our appreciation for his continued leadership in our Ministry with Children.

Section C

COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY WITH YOUTH

W. A. GRAHAM, *Chairman*

Progress Report for 1966-1967

Enrollment in the Youth Division decreased 426 to 27,355 in the year 1965-1966.

Another choice of varied youth opportunities offered this past year with the following ministries being held (the record of attendance is listed beside each event): Moral Concerns Conference at Camp Don-Lee (32), Senior Camp at Camp Don-Lee (46), Workshop at N. C. Wesleyan College (212), Annual Conference session at Methodist College (431), and United Nations-Washington Study Tour (38). A total of 759 persons participated.

This year's Senior Summer Program will offer a choice of ministries. The program will consist of the "God's on Trial" seminar, S.O.S. (Social Outreach Seminar), Trail Hike, Senior Camp, Workshop, and Annual Conference Session.

In Junior High Camping 491 attended the Conference camps this past year.

In the area of leadership education, we can report that 10 courses were offered in Christian Workers' Schools, with 129 enrolled and 82 receiving credit. This report includes one Junior High Laboratory course. A Coaching Conference on the new youth course, "The Church's Ministry with Youth," was held in February with 19 persons attending.

The Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship was represented at the World Methodist Youth Conference and the World Methodist Conference by a past Conference president, Mr. Joe Mann of Sanford. The youth of the Conference supported our delegate by contributing money for his trip. We are also pleased to report that Joe Mann is currently serving on the Council of the National Conference of the Methodist Youth Fellowship. This is indeed an honor for Mr. Mann and for our N. C. Conference.

The past year a special committee on subdistricts completed its work and submitted a policy statement regarding the work of this beyond-the-local-church ministry. We feel that this statement sets some policies and makes some recommendations for the sub-district ministry. Such statements and recommendations have long been needed. Some recommendations will be reflected in the following section of this report. The entire policy statement is included at the end of this report.

Recommendations for Youth Work 1967-1968

1. That the Senior High United Nations-Washington Study Tour be held March 16-22, 1968.
2. That a youth mission study be held in each local church using the study materials, "Christ and the Faiths of Men."
3. That Missionary Education Institutes be held in each district for the purpose of providing training for teachers in the local church congregation-wide mission studies.
4. That the possibility be explored for conducting the Senior High Churchmen's European Study Tour during the summer of 1968.
5. That the Youth Council consider the possibility of planning a Work Camp.
6. That the Youth Council consider the possibility of conducting a week-long canoe camping experience.
7. That the Youth Council consider the possibility of scheduling another study tour on Contemporary Church Ministries as a part of its summer program.

8. That the possibilities for a weekend "Conversation on the Ministry" be explored with the Youth Council and the Conference Commission on Vocations.

9. That a pilot project be held at Carolina Beach during the Easter weekend in an attempt to bring a ministry to some of the youth who "migrate" to the beach during that time of year.

10. That the local churches be introduced to the "New Day in Youth Ministry," which would include information regarding new trends and philosophies of youth ministry as well as an introduction to the new youth curriculum materials.

11. That, in an attempt to reach more adult workers, the Convocation of Adult Workers with Youth be held on two weekends, April 26-28 at Camp Don Lee, and May 3-5 at Camp Chestnut Ridge. The convocation will help adults to explore in depth the implications that one of the main principles of the "New Day" ("Youth, too, are the church, today") will have for the local church youth ministry.

12. That the district youth rallies be held in March with the theme dealing with some aspect of the "New Day in Youth Ministry." A special two-hour session will be held for adult workers with youth (pastors, teachers, counselors, division superintendents, commission chairmen, and church school superintendents) at which time they will be introduced to the new trends of youth ministry and to the new youth curriculum.

13. That inner-district meetings be held the week of August 25-31, 1968, for all teachers and counselors as an attempt to help them use the new curriculum materials which will be used in local churches starting the first Sunday in September, 1968.

14. That all Christian Workers' Schools during 1967-1968 include the course, "The Church's Ministry With Youth," which deals with the new concepts of youth ministry.

-5. That the youth council explore the possibility of a weekend Arts Festival.

16. That a Review Coaching Conference be held for those persons who attended the coaching conference on "The Church's Ministry With Youth" so that they might be more fully prepared to teach the entirely new courses in youth ministry.

17. That a training workshop be held for subdistrict youth council members and adult counselors on September 1-2, 1967.

The following special report is submitted by the Committee on Ministry with Youth as a part of its report:

SUBDISTRICT MYF COMMITTEE REPORT

PREFACE

The feelings expressed in this report are based upon a study of the results of the Subdistrict Questionnaire distributed at ACS and Workshop and an evaluation of experimental patterns followed in the Goldsboro and Greenville Districts. As a result of its study and evaluation, the committee has arrived at two conclusions:

a. In general, as it now exists, the subdistrict is unmeaningful and ineffective as a part of the church's ministry with youth.

b. Under certain conditions, the subdistrict *can* confront youth with the ever-changing and ever-expanding aspects of the Christian faith. The confrontation will, in turn, call for an ever-growing commitment to Christ and His Church which expresses itself in the total life of the individual and the church as they live in the world.

PURPOSES

The committee feels the purposes of the subdistrict to be:

a. To provide experiences not readily available in local MYF's, such as films, plays, resource persons, social concerns, recreation, etc.

b. To provide opportunities in which the leadership and faith of youth peers can be witnessed.

c. To provide fellowship opportunities with Christians in a larger and more widely diversified group than is possible in local churches.

d. To serve as an interpreter of the scope and mission of the total church, lifting up "beyond the local church" opportunities (retreats, assemblies, rallies, camps, etc.), and needs (MY Fund, migrants, poverty, etc.).

e. To provide opportunities for local MYF's to share problems and ideas.

f. To demonstrate appropriate methods, procedures, and techniques through planning and program.

CONDITIONS

It is the committee's conviction that the subdistrict, like any other organization or structure, is meaningful and effective to the degree in which its purposes are achieved.

Conversely, we believe that the subdistrict is ineffective to the degree its purposes are not achieved. Therefore, it is imperative that the conditions necessary to achievement of purposes to be defined and met. The committee believes at least two conditions to be essential: *adequate leadership* and *quality programming*.

It is the thinking of the committee that adequate leadership (youth and adult) affirms the purposes of the subdistrict, can and will give time needed, is willing to grow in understanding of the counselor and officer role and shares leadership with each other.

Youth leaders need to understand the task of youth as laity responsible with adults for the church's ministry. In essence, the youth and adult roles and responsibilities are the same that is, to fulfill the mission of Christ and His church in the world. These contributions will vary in kind according to the extent of their skills and experience. Youth will cooperate with the adults in a team effort to provide a ministry of and to youth. It is hoped that youth leaders will take advantage of subdistrict, and district, and Conference training opportunities to equip themselves for their ministry.

After lengthy discussion, the committee agreed that it is most difficult for ministers or local MYF counselors to provide adequate adult leadership in the subdistrict. In the case of ministers, it is felt that too many demands are already made upon their time, and though a minister might agree to serve as adult leader, his involvement in other areas of the church's total ministry would severely limit his contribution to the subdistrict. Perhaps the subdistrict has a responsibility not to further extend this already over-extended leader. This condition in no way reflects upon any minister's willingness or ability to serve.

In considering the many demands made upon both the local MYF counselor and subdistrict counselor, the committee feels it unfair to request that they serve in both capacities. The consensus is that one person cannot adequately meet the formidable needs of two youth groups, and that one of the two would be slighted—not deliberately, but from necessity.

The second condition vital to the achieving of the subdistrict's purposes is *quality programming*. The meeting of this condition involves many things, but basically it has to do with adequate planning—long-range and immediate. Perhaps the most common judgment against the subdistrict is its failure in programming. All too often the meetings and activities are inadequately planned and thus are poorly conducted and as a result they become a negative demonstration. A possible contributing factor at this point is the frequency of subdistrict meetings. Recognizing the difficulty of coordinating a program to be executed by young people involved in the local church program and living in different locations, the committee believes the frequency of meeting to be a vital factor in the quality of programming. It is impractical to expect a subdistrict to plan and execute a meaningful program which calls for more than four to six general meetings a year. The time and demands needed to adequately prepare even this limited number of meetings often causes the subdistrict and the local church to compete for the loyalties, abilities, and time of the youth involved.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In light of the above conditions believed to be necessary for the achievement of subdistrict purposes, the committee makes the following recommendations:

1. Serious evaluation of the purpose and participation in subdistrict and district ministries (and those of other groupings) be conducted annually, and measurement be made of each subdistrict's ability to fulfill its stated purposes. (Local circumstances might dictate valid purposes not stated previously in this report.) On the basis of this study, a decision should be made each year regarding whether or not the subdistrict should exist as part of the Youth Ministry. Recommendations from this annual evaluation should be sent to the District Director of Youth Ministry.

2. Limited number of meetings enabling adequate planning to occur, making possible quality programming. A limited number of meetings would also free youth to participate in other experiences of high quality.

3. Voluntary involvement in the subdistrict by the local church. This freedom will eliminate attitudes of judgment toward local church MYF's which choose not to participate and will remove cause for guilt feelings on the part of those not participating.

4. Careful consideration of age-group involvement, with each subdistrict determining its own policy. Admittedly, such a policy might change as the population of the age group fluctuates.

5. Annual planning sessions for subdistrict and district leaders and officers. These sessions will plan programs, projects and choose dates for each year's undertakings. Such

advance planning will coordinate district and subdistrict work and will insure ample time for preparation and publicity. These sessions will also examine the purposes of district and subdistrict youth ministries (see Recommendation No. 1).

6. Adequate, clear, and early communication and dispersal of information to member MYF's is absolutely essential. Without this, the local MYF cannot adequately plan and participate in subdistrict happenings.

7. Provide curriculum materials for the subdistrict, giving suggestions and helps in planning, meetings, areas of study, etc. Though this is a pressing need, the church provides no subdistrict curriculum materials. Such materials need not contain helps for a limited number of meetings and should take into consideration the varying needs of different groups.

8. Provide training for subdistrict leaders. The desired goal is training opportunities for both adult and youth leaders offered at strategic locations and at times convenient to the persons needing to attend.

CONCLUSIONS

The Subdistrict Committee takes the position that it is impossible for a subdistrict to achieve the purpose mentioned in this report unless the above conditions are met. In instances when these conditions cannot be met, we believe the subdistricts should be discontinued until such time as the recommendations of this report can be carried out and its conditions can be met.

Section D

COMMITTEE ON ADULT MINISTRY

Progress Report for 1966-1967

1. Enrollment in the adult divisions of our North Carolina Conference church schools has decreased by 557 (from July 1, 1965, to June 30, 1966).

2. The Spiritual Life Retreat at Camp Rockfish, November 5-6, 1966, had 32 persons in attendance.

3. The following Adult Leadership Education enterprises were held:

(a) "Adult Learning in a Changing World" was taught in 14 schools with 419 persons enrolled and 265 receiving credit.

(b) One Adult Laboratory was conducted at Burlington with 16 persons enrolled and 10 receiving credit.

(c) One Bible Conference was held for the Goldsboro area churches, at St. Luke Church, Goldsboro.

4. Preparation for the New Day in Christian Education for Adults included the following activities:

(a) Planned and conducted Adult Group Activities as a part of the District Christian Education meetings on the "New Day."

(b) Cooperated with the Committee on General Church School Ministry in preparation of the special study book, *Look Unto the Rock: Biblical and Theological Perspectives Undergirding Methodist Curriculum*.

(c) Encouraged and participated in area and local church training sessions on special April unit, "Preparing for a New Day," which appears in present adult curriculum materials.

(d) Carried out on a subdistrict basis a campaign to inform pastors and local church adult workers about the new materials and the *Subdistrict Preview-Demonstration Workshops* actually using the new adult curriculum materials. The workshops are to be held between July 10 and August 15, 1967. An effort was made to see that delegates had copies of the new unit, "Man's Search for a Meaningful Faith," before attending the Subdistrict Preview-Demonstration Workshop.

(e) Conducted a training session June 9-10 at Methodist College to prepare the leaders who will be conducting the Subdistrict Preview-Demonstration Workshops in July and August, 1967.

Goals and Proposals

1. We recommend that the Quadrennial Goals listed in the 1964 *Journal* of the North Carolina Conference be continued as a point of reference in planning the ministries for adults in the conference year 1967-1968.

2. We continue to urge and welcome wholeheartedly all communication and cooperation between the leaders of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference and the North Carolina Conference in planning and participation in adult leadership education enterprises and activities.

General Recommendations for 1967-1968

1. That the Committee on Adult Ministry cooperate with the Committee on General Church School Work and other boards and agencies in continuing Bible Conferences and conferences for laymen and clergy on the nature and mission of the church and the ministry of the laity.

2. That adequate leadership, funds, and planning be provided for the establishment of new patterns of ministry to young adults not now being reached effectively by the church's ministry.

3. That local church adult groups continue to use Planbook for Adults as an aid to more effective Christian education of adults and help prepare for the effective introduction of new adult curriculum.

4. That all adults be informed of the special ministries to adults offered in the Family Camping enterprises at Camp Don-Lee and Camp Kerr Lake and the Spiritual Life Retreats scheduled at various times at Camps Chestnut Ridge, Don-Lee and Rockfish.

Continued Preparation for New Adult Curriculum

In order to train adult teachers to begin using the first unit of the new adult curriculum, "Man's Search for a Meaningful Faith," the following steps are urged:

1. That each local church purchase at least one *Adult Advance Leadership Kit* which will contain one study book, one book of selected readings, one resource packet, one objective of Christian education poster and several other helpful items.

2. That each local church Commission on Education and Adult Council thoroughly examine and acquaint themselves with the contents of this *Adult Advance Leadership Kit* and see that the leaders of every adult class and group have the opportunity to become thoroughly acquainted with its contents, also.

3. That each adult church school teacher be provided with copies of the study book, "Man's Search for a Meaningful Faith." (One copy is found in each *Advance Leadership Kit*).

4. That at least two persons from every adult church school class or group attend one of the *Subdistrict Preview-Demonstration Workshops* conducted across the conference in July-August, 1967. Here you will actually use the new adult curriculum materials unit, "Man's Search for a Meaningful Faith."

5. Begin using the new adult curriculum materials in September, 1967. Set up a class planning committee to plan for the first unit, "Man's Search for a Meaningful Faith," and begin work at least two weeks prior to beginning of unit. Involve as many class members as possible in leadership roles. Learn about and make use of the best methods of formal secular education and apply them to the process of Christian education. Work toward developing a climate of openness, concern, acceptance, serious sharing and study, a climate in which each person can give of his best and in which the Holy Spirit can work, instruct, and transform.

Ministers and Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants perform a vital service in the total ministry of the church. These men and women are charged with the responsibility of guiding the educational function of the local church where they are employed. They are also active in subdistrict, district, and conference-wide programs of Christian nurture.

Educational workers participate in a conference organization with these persons serving as officers: Miss Carol Vensel, president; Mrs. Clifton Smith, vice-president; and Mrs. Joan Sanders, secretary-treasurer. Our conference directors are also active in the statewide organization with members of the Western North Carolina Conference. Currently serving as president of the state fellowship is Mr. Leslie Page of the North Carolina Conference. A conference for all directors in North Carolina will be held in the spring of 1968 at Greensboro with emphasis upon the new curriculum for youth.

The committee makes the following recommendations for the coming year:

1. That the Board encourage educational assistants to work toward certification as an associate in Christian education through participation in the newly-developed four-year course of study. This course of study requires participation in one of the special seminars in each of four years. Each participation successfully completed earns one of the four seminar credits required for meeting the standards for associate in Christian education. These seminars will be offered annually to bring the resources of the graduate theological school to bear upon the task of giving full-time non-certified workers in education an opportunity to develop theoretical and practical skills in learning and teaching. Churches employing educational assistants are urged to assist in every way possible so that the educational assistant may receive the benefits of this graduate level training in Christian education.

2. That affiliation on the part of ministers and directors of education with the Methodist Christian Education Fellowship be encouraged by the Board. This newly-organized fellowship will be open to directors throughout Methodism with the following purpose: To interpret the role of the Christian educator in the total ministry of the church and to assist in developing, maintaining, and interpreting standards for the profession. To cooperate in providing professional training. To provide supportive strength, fellowship, and professional relationships. To enhance Christian education as a vocational commitment. To plan and coordinate experiences for continuing professional growth. To represent the MCEF in the ecumenical movement and to offer personnel and placement services.

3. That the Board endorse and support the Lay Employed Career Study initiated by the 1964 General Conference to study "the duties of and provisions for church lay workers." The committee responsible for the study will make its findings known at the 1968 General Conference. The committee, headed by Bishop Eugene Slater, is concerned with developing church-wide standards for lay career workers including pension plans and relationship to annual conferences.

4. That the Leadership and Laboratory School at Lake Junaluska receive the full support of each director and that local churches make available to directors and lay workers an opportunity to attend. The conference on "A Continuing Emphasis on a New Day in Christian Education" at Lake Junaluska, August 11-14, 1967, will be especially helpful for teams from local churches.

5. That directors in the North Carolina Conference be further informed concerning the 1967 meeting in November of the Methodist Conference on Christian Education. This conference, to be held in Dallas, Texas, will be a valuable experience for our directors. The local church will benefit as a result of the directors attending.

6. That the needs of certified ministers and directors of Christian education for continuing education be recognized by the local churches. Seminars at various theological schools have been established to help meet this need and others are scheduled for 1968.

7. That a one-day meeting for directors and educational assistants be held in the fall of 1967.

8. That the concerns of both the music ministry and education be recognized in the planning of future workshops so that a closer working relationship between workers in these two areas may be realized.

COMMITTEE ON CAMPS AND CONFERENCES

Progress Report for 1966

Camping, as a recreational outlet and as a learning experience, is considered by many to be one of the most important developments in the past few years. Evidences of this fact are seen in the growth of organized camping programs conducted by many organizations, and in the growth of sites available for family and group use. The Committee on Camps and Conferences of the Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference also recognizes the tremendous growth taking place, and is trying to meet the needs in this area in our Conference.

Since 1959 we have shown a steady growth from 2,487 persons to 7,931 persons involved in camping and retreat programs at our facilities. This represents an increase of 319% over an eight-year period, and an increase of 12% over the year 1965. But more than just figures, these represent persons who have entered into deeper spiritual relationships because of their involvement.

*Lay Persons

We look forward to another full summer camping program and the continued use of our retreat facilities that will further deepen the spiritual life and provide the recreational activities for the people of eastern North Carolina. Features of our campaign for 1967 will continue as they have in past years, with various camping periods from one to four weeks. The small group procedure and the use of each camp's natural resources to the best possible advantage continue to enrich the program.

Recommendations

In order that we may continue to provide the best possible facilities and program in our Conference camps, we submit these recommendations:

1. We request that each district superintendent appoint a district director of camping—either minister or layman—to keep local churches informed about our Conference camps and their programs, including personnel and financial needs, and to serve on the Committee on Camps and Conferences of the Board of Education.

2. We also recommend that the Conference undertake a financial crusade to meet the emergency and critical needs of our Conference camps, with an over-all goal of \$300,000, to be raised over a three-year period. This crusade will be sponsored and conducted by the Board of Lay Activities and the Committee on Camps and Conferences of the Board of Education according to the following plan:

A. Camp Crusade Plan

1. A district Crusade chairman and committee will be appointed in each district by the district superintendent and the district lay leader to organize and direct the crusade in their respective districts. Supplementary leadership will come from the two sponsoring agencies.

2. A Camp Crusade Committee will be appointed in each local church by the Official Board or Quarterly Conference to organize and direct the program in their respective churches.

3. Each district will be asked to direct its contributions toward one of our Conference camps as follows:

Camp Don-Lee: New Bern, Goldsboro, Greenville, Elizabeth City, and Wilmington

Camp Chestnut Ridge: Durham and Burlington

Camp Rockfish: Fayetteville and Sanford

Camp Kerr Lake: Raleigh and Rocky Mount

B. Camp Crusade Schedule

1. *Early Summer 1967:* Initial meeting of the district committee to make detailed plans for the district.

2. *September 18-29, 1967:* District Advance Gift Dinners.

3. *October 16-27, 1967:* District Promotional dinners with each church represented.

4. *Follow-up in each local church* under direction of the local church crusade committee.

C. General Information

1. There will be three-year pledges, payable 1967, 1968, and 1969. These pledges will be secured from individuals and groups, such as Methodist Men's Clubs, Sunday school classes, MYF's, local churches, and from companies and corporations.

2. There will be no quotas either for districts or local churches.

3. The Conference Boards of Lay Activities and Education will provide the executive leadership and initial expenses in the promotion of the crusade in each district. Additional expenses will be taken from the funds received.

4. Payments on pledges will be made to the Conference Treasurer, who will maintain a record of these payments by districts, local churches and individuals.

2. The Chairman of the Committee on Higher Education was authorized to appoint a sub-committee to study the possibility of increasing the College Sustaining Fund in the Conference Year 1968-1969, and also to study ways and means of securing additional Capital Funds after the completion of the current Capital Funds Crusade.

V. One Per Cent Plan for Ministerial Education

1. Because of the urgent need for qualified ministers to fill the pulpits of the Methodist Church and because provision for recruiting and educating ministers is an undeniable responsibility of the church, we continue to strongly urge support of the One Percent Plan for Ministerial Education. This plan helps provide scholarships and grants-in-aid to ministerial students and to increase the support of our seminaries. We urge our Bishop, the Conference Cabinet, and the pastors to give wide publicity to this plan, which will help greatly our support of Duke Divinity School.

2. The receipts from conferences for the One Percent Fund place our North Carolina Conference fourth from the bottom in the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

3. We request the North Carolina Conference to petition the General Conference to develop a church-wide program of increased support for theological education.

VI. College Development Crusade

1. Of the five million-dollar crusade, approximately \$1,350,000 remains to be collected. So far this year \$105,000 has been collected. There are 156 churches now on the honor roll for having paid their college quota in full. It now is the aim of the Association of Methodist Colleges to have every church finish its quota by the conference session of 1968.

2. We urge observance of College Day on Sunday, November 5, 1967, for the purpose of lifting up our colleges and the cause of Christian higher education.

VII. Amendment to the Charter of Methodist College

1. We recommend the following amendment to the Charter of Methodist College, Inc. in keeping with the recommendation of its Board of Trustees. This amendment is in accordance with Recommendation No. 9 of the Long-range Study of Christian Higher Education (*Journal North Carolina Conference*, 1966, p. 241) which reads: "The Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Education seek proper legal counsel regarding a method by which gift properties, not a part of or adjacent to the main campus of any of the colleges, can be accepted and disposed of without delay."

Amend Article VIII in the fifth line by adding after the word "corporation" the following words: "contiguous to or a part of the college campus" so that the amended clause shall read:

"provided, however, said Board of Trustees shall have full power to sell, convey, mortgage or otherwise dispose of any of the real estate owned by this corporation, contiguous to or a part of the college campus, upon consent and permission of the Executive Committee of the Board of Education of the said conference."

Amend Article VIII further by adding the following clause:

"provided further, that any other real estate now owned or acquired by this corporation may be sold, conveyed, mortgaged, or otherwise disposed of by the Board of Trustees without the consent and permission of said Executive Committee."

VIII. Consultations on Christian Higher Education With the Western North Carolina Conference

1. In accordance with the Recommendation No. 11 of the Long-range Study of Christian Higher Education (*Journal North Carolina Conference*, 1966, p. 241), consultations have been initiated with the Western North Carolina Conference. This recommendation reads: "Consultations be initiated by the Committee on Christian Higher Education with the appropriate person in the Western North Carolina Conference in regard to the present and future relationships of the two conferences in matters related to higher education, especially to Greensboro and High Point Colleges."

2. A committee appointed by the Chairman of the Committee on Christian Higher Education has conferred with the Western North Carolina Conference and there seems to be four possibilities open relative to our relationships:

- (1) Continue as we are.
- (2) Each Conference go its own way severing all present connections in Christian higher education.
- (3) Pool efforts between the two conferences on a statewide unified approach to the whole question of Christian higher education.
- (4) A modified form of cooperation between the two conferences.

3. Representatives from the Western North Carolina Conference agreed to seek conference action authorizing the appointment of a committee from that conference to join our conference in consultations looking toward a satisfactory and mutual agreement in this area.

IX. Amendment to the Charter of North Carolina Wesleyan College

Amend Article VIII in the fifth line by adding after the word "corporation" the following words: "contiguous to or a part of the college campus" so that the amended clause shall read: "provided, however, said Board of Trustees shall have full power to sell, convey, mortgage or otherwise dispose of any of the real estate owned by this corporation, contiguous to or a part of the college campus, upon consent and permission of the Executive Committee of the Board of Education of the said conference."

Amend Article VIII further by adding the following clause:

"Provided further, that any other real estate now owned or acquired by this corporation may be sold, conveyed, mortgaged, or otherwise disposed of by the Board of Trustees without the consent and permission of said Executive Committee."

INTERCONFERENCE COMMISSION ON COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY
RELIGIOUS LIFE

Under the chairmanship of Bishop Matthews a special committee of the General Board of Education was formed in 1964 to study the campus ministries of Methodism throughout the country. That study has been completed and the report is in. Your Interconference Commission is giving careful consideration to the findings, conclusions and recommendations of that significant report, and together with the campus ministers we will be shaping our work in the days before us by the direction we are able to gain.

The contemporary spirit of denominational cooperation is very much alive in the work of North Carolina Methodism on our campuses. New areas of common concern are discovered, and new ways of common action are resolutely devised. Where, for example, one denominational group has a good house in which students may meet and another does not have such a house, the one house may be employed for the service of both groups. At Duke University where a number of houses stand together cheek by jowl, students and leaders are now shaping programs to be participated in by all groups and meeting together at a particular time in the house that is best suited for such a program as is being offered.

It is sometimes felt that there is a division of purpose between the campus ministry and the local church. The Interconference Commission is by no means unaware of this feeling nor unconcerned by it. In our meetings we talk about it, sometimes at disproportionate length. Yet a hard look at the work over our state indicates, we think, that there is close cooperation, generally speaking, between the near-campus churches and the campus ministry. A word of tribute is in place here to the ministers and members of churches attended by students, for their interest in those students, and even in some notable instances for their contribution of substantial sums of money for the support of the campus program. The campus ministers and boards of directors are appreciative of this concern. Local church ministers preach to hundreds of students regularly and engage in counseling as needed to a degree not often recognized. The sober truth is that there is close cooperation between the local church and the campus ministries. The reason we have thought otherwise is that student groups and their leaders are more critical of the local church than others are, and people like those of us who come to Annual Conference are not as ready as we should be to look at ourselves or to be patient with our youthful critics.

The "cost-price squeeze" is having its effect on campus ministries. To carry forward our work along the lines we have followed these past years costs more than the three annual conferences are prepared to pay. Campus ministers are underpaid. Even meager secretarial assistance is often too expensive to employ. Program expansion is out of the question if it involves any additional costs. Yet the conference appropriations to the Interconference Commission remain about the same year by year. We are not complaining, just reporting. Having to make out with what we are now receiving, however, means an alteration in the pattern of our ministry. If we cannot employ more ministers, we shall ask for more volunteer help. If we cannot adequately furnish and maintain Wesley Foundation buildings we shall invite other denominational groups that do not have buildings to share and contribute to their maintenance. It appears we shall also be compelled to withdraw those small funds now appropriated to campus groups on church colleges and limit our funds to the Methodist work on state campuses.

A word of exhortation: Let us be aware that our campus ministry is an authentic ministry. The church at work on the campus is the same church engaged in the same

work as the church on the corner of Main and Maple. Let us be grateful to God that He calls men to the difficult ministry of the campus. And let us be grateful to Him also for the lay men and women who answer His summons faithfully to serve as directors of our campus ministries.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

THE PAST YEAR

We have dreamed, planned, worked and prayed for evangelism in our conference, seeking a Spirit-filled life for ourselves and our people. We have worked on every level from the local church, where evangelism has to be done, to the annual conference.

We led in planning and conducted the Orientation Workshop for pastors new to our conference. Our conference program and institutions were explained to the new ministers.

Our Conference Board continued to publish "The Good News" and mailed it bi-monthly to the pastors and chairmen of Commissions on Membership and Evangelism. We are pleased with the response and involvement of the chairmen as they learn and are reminded of the conference program of evangelism and feel close fellowship with other commission chairmen and the pastors.

Desiring to learn more of the spirit and methods of evangelism, the board director attended jurisdictional and national meetings at Junaluska and Nashville. The board president also attended the Council of Evangelism at Nashville. The director attended

and/or shared in most of the district conferences and district lay rallies, the Jurisdictional Layman's Conference at Junaluska and the Conference Layman's Retreat at Rocky Mount, district preachers' meetings, assisted in planning and conducting Lay Witness Missions, conducted three revivals, and preached in local churches as invited. We have desired to be a symbol and reminder and promoter of evangelism in the total life of all the churches.

We gave leadership to "A Venture In Faith" revivals in our conference, sharing in the jurisdictional plans. Some district simultaneous revivals were held in the fall and others in the spring. Many churches were spiritually invigorated by a hearty participation in the Venture.

The district secretaries of evangelism have been active in serving their districts. The 53 members of the board have been alert and active to represent the Board and promote the cause of evangelism as this has been possible.

PROGRAM OF EVANGELISM EXPLAINED

Pastors' Conference on Evangelism 1967-1968

Leaders for the 1966 Conference were Dr. John Church and Dr. Thomas A. Carruth. Many ministers stated that this conference helped them more than any they ever attended.

The 1967 Conference will be held August 29-31 at Methodist College. Leaders will be Dr. Harry Denman and Dr. James W. Sells.

We will continue to hold panel discussions of evangelism and spiritual life subjects pertinent to pastors, conducted by ministers of our conference who have demonstrated their abilities in the various areas of interest.

2. Lay School of Evangelism

Our first annual school was held at Methodist College, August 13-14, 1966. Featured speakers were Harold Rogers of the General Board of Evangelism and Dr. J. V. Early. Pertinent panels were conducted by ministers and laymen of the Conference.

This was our first effort on a conference-wide basis to train members of local church Commissions of Membership and Evangelism. The atmosphere was enthusiastic and contagious. The group voted to request such an annual effort.

Attendance trophies were awarded: Haymount Church, Fayetteville, for the largest attendance, and Trinity Church, Burlington, for most man-miles traveled. Total attendance was 150.

The 1967 school will be held at Methodist College, August 12-13. Leaders will include Reverend Charles Whittle of the General Board and Dr. Howard P. Powell.

3. Lay Witness Missions

The Lay Witness Mission continues to gather momentum, sponsored by the Board of Evangelism and the Board of Lay Activities.

The mission was fully explained at the Lay School of Evangelism, the Conference Layman's Retreat, and the Pastors' Conference on Evangelism.

Missions planned for 1966-1967 include:

Asbury, Durham; Bethel; Brogden; Goldsboro; Clark Street, Rocky Mount; Fifth Avenue, Wilmington; First Church, Rocky Mount; Newport; Piney Grove; Siler City; St. Luke, Goldsboro; Princeton; St. Paul, Durham; Temperance Hall; West End.

Reverend Hugh Lake was leader for a conference workshop for lay witnesses and coordinators, held January 27, at Fairmont Church, Raleigh. About 40 laymen and 20 ministers attended. A similar workshop is planned for 1967-1968.

The Executive Director and the Conference Lay Leader are gladly spending much time in helping local churches plan and conduct missions. Many church members are finding spiritual renewal and helping bring a new spirit to many churches.

4. A Holy Season of Love

The publication of the Lenten folder, "A Holy Season of Love," was continued in 1967 with the distribution of 24,000 copies.

We plan to continue this in 1968.

5. District Evangelism Workshops

A two-hour evangelism workshop will be held in the districts, in cooperation with the other conference agencies, as requested by the District Superintendents.

Our focus will be on the effective functioning of local church commissions on Membership and Evangelism.

Commission chairmen and other commission members will be invited to attend.

The workshops will be conducted by the Executive Director and the Secretaries of Evangelism.

There will be a display of evangelism materials at each workshop.

6. Evangelism and Devotional Literature

We keep about 250 of the most pertinent folders and books published by Tidings and The Upper Room of the General Board of Evangelism. This is sold in our office on a cost basis. Orders are filled promptly. You are invited to come and browse. A price list will be sent to those requesting it.

We have added to our stock manuals and other books to use in Lay Witness Missions.

We are convinced our people need to know more about Methodism, spiritual growth, evangelism—our conviction for promoting such literature.

REPORT OF THE N. C. CONFERENCE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Minutes of the 1966 Session

The "Bicentennial Year of American Methodism" will long be remembered as one of real significance within the North Carolina Conference. Nearly 2,000 persons viewed on successive nights at Wesleyan College a drama, "Methodism in North Carolina." Presented by the Wesleyan Players and Glee Club at Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount, the drama was a highlight of the 1966 Annual Conference.

A special citation was presented those churches deemed the oldest in each of the 11 districts. (Viz. 1966 Journal, pp. 246-248). A special citation was also presented the Centenary Methodist Church in New Bern, ascertained to be the oldest on the basis of available evidence, within the bounds of the N. C. Conference, SeJ.

The Rev. Tommy M. Faggart, one of the 12 circuit-riders who rode horseback to the Bi-Centennial, was recognized by the Historical Society.

Program Plans for the 1967 Session

The Anniversary celebration of the Historical Society at the 1967 session will feature an address by Dr. Leo W. Jenkins, president of East Carolina College in Greenville, and an active, concerned Methodist layman. Dr. Jenkins will speak on "The Church in Eastern North Carolina." We welcome this outstanding Methodist layman as he addresses the Annual Conference.

Activities

Of special significance during the year past were the unveiling of two Historical Markers by Bishop Paul N. Garber.

On the first Sunday in October, 1966 the Eden Church in Halifax County was the site of an historical observance attended by over 200 persons. Bishop Garber spoke at a service presided over by Dr. Ralph Hardee Rives, vice-president of the Society.

On December 18, 1966 the Mount Bethel Methodist Church in Bahama was filled to capacity for a service marking the church of historical significance for Methodism.

The Bahama marker reads, "Mount Bethel Methodist Church: Nondenominational meeting house built about 1750 by Nathaniel Harris. Was attended by Washington Duke. Methodist since 1808." Both markers were placed by the North Carolina Department of Archives and History.

A conference-wide historical rally was held at the Green Hill House near Louisburg in October. Over 100 persons attended the rally which featured an address by Bishop Garber and broadcast over radio.

The secretary continued to gather histories of local churches and urges each pastor to cooperate with District trustees to secure a history of each of the 840 churches in our N. C. Annual Conference.

The regular third Sunday preaching appointment at historic Whitakers Chapel near Enfield has continued. Officers of the Society have preached as have other ministers of the conference.

Recommendations

The Society requests the annual conference delegates to seek through the North Carolina Department of Archives and History, an historical marker for the grave of the late beloved Bishop William Walter Peele. Bishop Peele is buried in Scotland County in a family plot and we believe that his grave should be properly noted by a Highway Historical Marker.

We request permission to continue our work at Whitakers Chapel providing regular monthly services to the persons of that community.

We request that those persons who may have records of Methodist churches at home contact local Methodist pastors and inform them of such possession. The Conference Secretary, the Rev. W. C. Wilson, and the Society secretary would like to know of any records, documents, photos, etc. of special historical significance.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Report No. 1

TRUSTEES OF THE METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN, INC.

Part 1—A Review of the Year

The past year has been a momentous one for the Methodist Home for Children. The tradition of service to needy children and their families has continued. In addition, important decisions have been made looking to the future.

The Home has responded to the new certification program of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes and has been granted "affiliation" status which is the highest level of recognition available to any agency at present. The Home expects to qualify for a higher level of recognition when this is available.

The trustees have initiated a long-range planning program. Already the trustees Committees are deeply engaged in studying our present program as compared with the "Standards and Goals for Methodist Agencies Serving Children and Youth," the standards of the Child Welfare League of America and the standards of the North Carolina State Board of Public Welfare. A study has already been made by a representative of the State Board of Public Welfare. A study commission from the General Board of Hospitals and Homes will come at a date yet to be set. As a result of our self-study and the recommendations of professional people in the field of child care a development plan for the next ten or fifteen years will be structured.

The Trustees reached a decision on January 31 to sign the "Civil Rights Statement of Compliance." This has opened again the channels of cooperation and communication between the Methodist Home and the other agencies providing services to children in our area. We believe we can handle the problems related to the Civil Rights Compliance of the Home as they may arise. The Trustees and the administration of the Home are counting on the understanding, patience, and prayerful support of the people of the Conference in this matter.

The Duke Endowment report for the year ending September 30, 1966, shows nine child care agencies in North and South Carolina employing at least one graduate caseworker or four non-professional caseworkers. These agencies are attempting to

provide comparable services for children and their families. The average cost per child per day was \$6.35. The highest was \$8.62. The Methodist Home for Children was number seven down the list with an average cost per child per day of \$5.91. The Trustees and administration are practicing every economy possible, consistent with good care for the children. The cost ratio last year was the lowest since 1963. However, we spent more money and provided more days of care for children. To provide good care for children we must expect the average cost per child per day to increase.

The Trustees and the administration of The Methodist Home assume that the Conference expects the Home to provide high quality services for children, according to individual need. The most important factor in this service is the people who make up the staff. Without well-qualified staff personnel the job cannot be done. Recruitment of child care and professional staff is one of our most crucial problems. It is necessary to be able to pay salaries comparable to what these persons can earn in other employment. The rapid increase in salary ranges paid by competing employers has confronted us with a dilemma. We must make a radical increase in our salary scale or we cannot employ competent personnel.

Our projected budget for 1967-1968 anticipates an operating deficit of \$13,600. The operating deficit for the current year is expected to be about \$11,800. To maintain services at the present level will require an annual increase in expenditures sufficient to match the inflation of our economy. To serve more children, to improve the quality of our services and to employ competent staff will require much larger expenditures to meet the competition in the salaries paid in the Raleigh area by business and industry in general. The question must be answered: where is the money to come from?

We note with sadness the death of Mrs. Daisy Wooten Barnes which occurred on March 27, 1967. She was the widow of the late Rev. A. S. Barnes who served the Home as Superintendent for thirty-three years prior to his retirement in 1948. Mrs. Barnes had been actively identified with the Home since 1929 and had rendered great service through the years. To the family we extend our sincere sympathy.

The Board of Trustees is deeply appreciative of the work of Superintendent J. W. Lineberger. We have full confidence that under his able leadership the Home is increasingly ministering to the needs of the children, strengthening the staff, and expanding the program with wisdom and effectiveness. We commend him and his staff for their dedication and industry.

Report No. 2

THE METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES, INC.

There are many worthy causes supported through our Church but none of these are meeting a greater need than The Methodist Retirement Home in Durham. No one is more helpless than an elderly person who is alone. Many members in the Home would have no one to care for them if it were not for our Retirement Home.

Our Retirement Home offers facilities for retirement unsurpassed in North Carolina. At the same time, it is doing much Benevolent Work. Thirty-five percent of the 180 Members are paying less than the cost of their keep. Many are old age assistance recipients. Members range in age from 65 to 98 with an average age of 81 years. Many of the most needy applicants come from people who are nursing cases which The Home as a retirement home cannot accept.

Ten new apartments and an addition of thirty-six rooms to the Fowler Building recently completed are already filled. These enabled The Home to accept most of those on the waiting list but new applications continue to come at the rate of more than one per week.

The new construction—ten apartments, the thirty-six room addition to the Fowler Building (eight of these infirmary rooms) and the addition to the dining room, along with the necessary paving, major renovations to the kitchen and the furnishings for these new facilities cost in excess of \$600,000.00. Members occupying the apartments make Capital Gifts which will eventually pay for the apartments. As a result of a financial campaign by the Special Gifts Committee of the Board of Trustees under the leadership of Mr. L. P. Best, Chairman, to secure contributions from the Trustees and friends of The Home, the new construction was completed without additional mortgage indebtedness. The FNMA Mortgage now stands at \$418,343.56 while there is an equity of \$1,406,662.98.

During the past seven years the cost of operation, exclusive of interest and depreciation which represents room rent, has increased \$63.69 per Member month from \$135.08 in 1960-61 to \$198.77 in 1967-68. Nineteen dollars and four cents (\$19.04) of this increase has come within the past two years, for on February 1, 1967, The Home along with other health agencies came under the Federal Minimum Wage Law. Other causes for the increased cost of operation are a rise in the cost of foods, drugs and other supplies; an up-grading of staff (more RN's and LPN's have been added) and an effort to meet the demands of the Members (more individual attention, more transportation, a choice of meats at meals, etc.) It appears that there will be major increases in labor costs for the next several years.

Recent studies indicate that increased wages will increase the average hospital costs in the South \$10 to \$12 per day. Our labor costs will probably rise twenty-five percent in the foreseeable future.

Increased cost of operation will necessitate additional income from Members, the Conference, or elsewhere.

Though we do not know all the implications of Medicare the Members have been signed up for both parts of the Medicare program. This is helping the Members with hospitalization and surgical bills, but so far Medicare has meant little to The Home.

A study of The Methodist Retirement Home was made by the General Board of Hospitals and Homes of The Methodist Church. This study was made by Mr. Marshall Hjelte, Associate Consultant of Services to the Aging, at the request of the Board of Trustees. Many suggestions were made to improve coordinating the work of The Home. Compliments on The Home, the administration of The Home, its staff, its Members and its Trustees were given in the report. This has been extremely helpful to the work of The Home.

The program of The Home is carried out by an excellent staff of loyal and dedicated people who go the second mile in serving The Home's Members. The Home is fortunate in having the Reverend Harvey Johnson as Administrative Assistant.

The Trustees are largely responsible for the success of The Home for they have freely given of their time, talent and money. The leadership of Bishop Garber

and the members of his Cabinet as well as the financial support by the ministers and laymen of the Conference mean more than can be expressed in words.

Only You Can Meet the Needs

With the addition of another unit of apartments, The Home will have a capacity of 200, which seems ideal, and which will be maximum for the present facilities without major construction. The addition of a chapel will make the Home a complete unit. There is room on the thirty-nine acres of land in Durham for another home and a health center to be built in the future.

The Trustees of The Home feel that the time has come for the Conference to provide another home at a strategic location within the bounds of the Conference and has authorized the Long Range Planning Committee to negotiate with prospective donors of land and money for such a home. This home will be possible when the Conference is prepared to authorize a Capital Funds Campaign for this purpose or when some individual, family, church, local group, or District provides a large part of the finances for the first unit of this much needed home.

GOLDEN CROSS COMMITTEE

Section I

As the first year of our insurance program becomes history it is pleasing to report that about 90% of the members are participating. On October 14, 1966 there were eighteen (18) premiums not paid. This number has decreased as the year progressed, also the use of Golden Cross has decreased considerably.

Your Golden Cross Committee makes the following recommendations:

1. Golden Cross support be increased from sixteen dollars (\$16.00) to twenty dollars (\$20.00) per day.

2. The committee commends the Rev. Wesley Aitken for his dedicated leadership at Duke Medical Center, Durham, N. C., and recommends the Conference continue its support of the chaplain's program at Duke in the amount of four thousand two hundred dollars (\$4,200.00) for the Conference year 1967-1968.

Section II

1. The committee commends the Rev. J. C. Dunn of the Good Shepherd Home at Lake Waccamaw, N. C., and recommends that the Conference increase the support of the home from one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for the Conference year 1967-1968.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON IN-SERVICE TRAINING FOR PASTORS

The Committee reports to the Annual Conference a most productive year in the area of In-Service Training. Two Seminars were held in the Elizabeth City and Sanford Districts on *Biblical and Theological Perspectives Undergirding Methodist Curriculum*. Dr. W. Arthur Kale of Duke Divinity School taught in the Elizabeth City

seminar and Dr. Samuel Womack of Methodist College at the seminar which met in Rockingham. Dean of the Sanford District seminar was Dr. Joyce V. Early and Rev. Robert Bame served as Dean of the Elizabeth seminar. A total of 29 pastors in the Sanford District and 25 pastors in the Elizabeth City District received financial aid through In-Service Training funds. We are appreciative of the Rev. Henry Ruark and the Rev. Vergil Queen for their cooperation in both these ventures sponsored by the Committee in cooperation with the Conference Board of Education.

A third clinic on Alcoholism was held December 29-30, 1966 at Camp Chestnut Ridge for the Approved Supply Pastors. The Rev. F. B. Joyner, Jr., pastor of Mount Bethel, Bahama, was dean of this clinic and Dr. N. A. Desrosiers served as leader. A total of eleven pastors registered for the clinic although only five attended. Dean Joyner reported this to be a valuable experience for those participating pastors. The evaluation showed their enthusiasm for this opportunity of concentrated, in-depth training.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

I

The North Carolina Annual Conference of 1961 approved in principle a report providing for an organized approach to the task of in-service training of pastors and lay church workers (*Viz Journal*, 1961, p. 245).

II

At an inter-agency meeting on the local church, called by Bishop Paul N. Garber, on November 28, 1961, a motion was adopted providing for the appointment of a committee to study the in-service training needs of the pastors. (*Viz. Journal*, 1962, p. 298; *Journal*, 1964, pp. 250-251.) The Bishop appointed the committee on January 8, 1962. The following were named to serve on the committee: Dwight L. Fouts, C. Wade Goldston, M. W. Lawrence, C. P. Morris, W. K. Quick, C. W. Robbins, Key W. Taylor, J. W. Page, R. G. Dawson, L. S. Weaver and B. M. Fesire. The committee held its first meeting on March 30, 1962.

The study Committee presented to the 1962 Annual Conference the following resolution: "Be it resolved that our Bishop appoint a permanent committee to continue the study of the in-service training needs of the ministers of our Conference, and that this permanent committee be empowered to take appropriate action, as soon as feasible, to set up a practical program of meeting these needs." *Journal*, 1962, p. 298.) The resolution was adopted.

III

The Committee on In-Service Training for Pastors, authorized by the 1962 Annual Conference, was appointed by the Bishop on August 1, 1962. (*Viz. Journal*, 1963, p. 232.) Pilot projects were inaugurated.

The 1963 Annual Conference approved a resolution providing that this committee shall be a standing committee of the Conference, subject to re-election quadrennially. (*Viz. Journal*, 1963, p. 266.)

IV

In view of the continuing and enlarging task of the Committee on In-Service Training for Pastors, various Methodist agencies and various institutions will necessarily be enlisted in the work.

Therefore, the North Carolina Annual Conference hereby authorizes the Committee on In-Service Training Service for Pastors (hereafter to be called the Commission on In-Service Training) to be the operating and directing agency for in-service training of pastors. This Commission shall design and develop a program of in-service training for pastors, which program will adequately meet the various needs of the pastors of the local churches for continuing education.

1967-68 CLINICS

In cooperation with the district superintendents, we request the approval of Pastoral Counseling Clinics for the New Bern and Burlington Districts during the coming conference year.

LIAISON WORK

In view of the detailed responsibilities in setting up Clinics, we recommend that two men be designated as Liaison Workers to assist in arranging dates, types of clinics and securing leadership. For the Burlington, Durham, Raleigh, Fayetteville and Sanford Districts, we recommend the Rev. W. N. McDonald of Louisburg College. The Rev. William K. Quick is asked to serve in the Greenville, Rocky Mount, Elizabeth City, New Bern, Wilmington, and Goldsboro Districts.

FINANCIAL NEEDS

The Committee is appreciative of the Duke Endowment funds and the aid of Dr. Wilson Nesbitt. Funds to undergird In-Service Training have only been available for rural and small town pastors. It becomes imperative now that we find funds from the Annual Conference and/or other sources to afford continuing educational opportunities for our Methodist pastors.

REPORT OF INTER-BOARD COORDINATING COUNCIL

The North Carolina Annual Conference of 1966 adopted the report of the Study Committee of Ten which provided for the organization of an Inter-Board Coordinating Council. The Report stated that "The purpose of the Inter-Board Coordinating Council is to unify the planning and the administration of the program of the Annual Conference." The main work of the Inter-Board Coordinating Council during the Conference year has been devoted to a careful study of how the planning and administration of the program of the Annual Conference can be unified and progress has been made in this field.

It was soon ascertained, however, that in order to unify the planning and the administration of the program of the Annual Conference it would be impossible to make effective the changes suggested and desired as of the 1967 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference. At the meeting of the Inter-Board Coordinating Council on December 5, 1966 the following motion was adopted: "That we proceed with discussion of the work of the Council to unify our work and in view of our inability to get the job done by the 1967 Annual Conference, we request the Annual Conference to change the effective date to the 1968 session of the North Carolina Conference."

The Charter of the Inter-Board Coordinating Council states that "The Inter-Board Coordinating Council shall have the right to make changes in the alignment of responsibilities of executive personnel for the various conference agencies subject to the approval of the Annual Conference." The Inter-Board Coordinating Council, therefore, asks the Annual Conference for approval of the following items:

1. That the Board of Education be granted for staff personnel (a) an Executive Secretary; (b) a Director of Children's Work; (c) a Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministry; (d) a Director of Adult Ministry and Camping.

2. That there be an Executive Secretary and an Associate Executive Secretary for the entire work of the Board of Evangelism, the Commission on Town and Country Work and the Board of Lay Activities.

3. That the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education be responsible for any executive duties required by the Board of Christian Social Concerns.

4. That the Conference Secretary be responsible for any executive duties required

by the Board of Pensions, Public Relations and Methodist Information, Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, the Conference Historical Society, and the Conference Committee on Rules and the Committee on Conference Relations.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON INTERJURISDICTIONAL RELATIONS

The Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations met on April 7, 1967, and unanimously voted to recommend to the 1967 North Carolina Annual Conference, for adoption, the Resolution as amended and adopted by the General Conference of The Methodist Church in special session November 10, 1966.

RESOLUTION

For the Elimination of Racial Structure and Development of Greater Understanding and Brotherhood in The Methodist Church.

As amended and adopted by the General Conference of The Methodist Church in its special session November 10, 1966, Chicago, Illinois

To be presented to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for consideration and vote in their 1967 annual sessions.

1. By the adoption of this Resolution each Annual Conference, each Jurisdictional Conference, the General Conference, each College of Bishops and the Council of Bishops pledge their best efforts to eliminate as soon as possible all forms of racial structure from the organization of The Methodist Church, and further pledge to do everything possible to develop greater understanding and brotherhood in all aspects of church life and work.

2. Each Annual Conference and Jurisdictional Conference which has been part of a merger of churches or Conferences formerly separated by racial distinctions pledges its best efforts to work out all remaining adjustments, to use the ability of both clergy and laymen wherever they can be most effective in the work of the church, and to serve all people without regard to race.

Where such mergers have not yet been realized, each such Conference expresses its earnest determination to work toward such merger at the earliest possible date and hereby pledges to establish a Committee on Inter-Conference Relations composed of an equal number of ministers, laymen and youth to implement the recommendations and resolutions of this report and recommendation of the Plan of Action for the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction adopted by the 1964 General Conference and that each board and agency of the church be alert for opportunities to assist each committee in every possible way.

3. Whenever such mergers hereafter take place the continuing Annual Conference will:

a. Accept into its membership, with all the same rights, privileges, status and obligations, all ministerial members (whether on trial or in full connection) appointed to charges located geographically within the continuing Conference, and all ministerial members under special appointment or retired ministerial members who hold Quarterly Conference membership in a local church located geographically within the boundaries of the continuing Conference.

b. Insofar as possible, the ministerial and lay persons now serving on boards and agencies of both of the merging Conferences shall serve during the current quadrennium on like or similar boards and agencies of the continuing Conference, and thereafter membership in all such Conference boards and agencies shall be open to all persons on the basis of their qualifications without regard to race. In the event any disciplinary provision limiting the number of members of a board or agency should prevent the continuation of all members during the current quadrennium, the Cabinet shall determine which members

shall continue, in the spirit of this Resolution, being careful to provide for a continuing representation of both of the former Conferences.

c. Within the boundaries of such a continuing Conference opportunities for spiritual and intellectual growth in Christian service shall be made available to all without regard to race or color. Such equal opportunities shall be provided particularly in such aspects of Conference programs as its activities of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Wesleyan Service Guild, youth work, leadership training enterprises and the Board of Lay Activities.

4. Upon the adoption of this Resolution by the requisite vote in the North Carolina-Virginia Conference, each of the Western North Carolina, North Carolina, and Virginia Conferences, all of the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction and all of the Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference will be dissolved. Each church formerly part of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference shall thereupon be merged with and become part of the other of said Annual Conferences within the geographic bounds of which it is located.

5. Upon the adoption of this Resolution by the requisite vote in the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference, in each of the Holston, Tennessee, Memphis, Kentucky and Louisville Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, in all of the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, and in all of the Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference will be dissolved. Each church formerly part of the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference shall thereupon be merged with and become part of the other of said Annual Conferences within the geographic bounds of which it is located.

6. Upon the adoption of this Resolution, by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting in each of the Louisiana, Southwest, Texas and West Texas Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, in all of the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, and in all the Annual Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction, the bishop formerly serving the Southwestern Area of the Central Jurisdiction shall be transferred to the South Central Jurisdiction for residential and presidential service, and the Louisiana, Southwest, Texas and West Texas Conferences formerly part of the Central Jurisdiction will be Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction.

7. Upon the adoption of this Resolution by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting in each of the Central Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, Upper Mississippi and South Carolina Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction and in all of the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction and all of the Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, the bishops who are then serving the Atlantic Coast and Nashville-Carolina Areas of the Central Jurisdiction shall be transferred to the Southeastern Jurisdiction for residential and presidential service, and the Central Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, Upper Mississippi and South Carolina Conferences formerly part of the Central Jurisdiction will be Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction. The transfer and merger of Conferences under paragraphs 4 and 5, and the transfer of Conferences under paragraphs 6 and 7 will be effective upon the close of a special session of the Central Jurisdictional Conference of 1967, and the Central Jurisdiction will thereupon be dissolved.

8. By the adoption of this Resolution by the Southeastern and South Central Jurisdictional Conferences and by the Colleges of Bishops of Southeastern and South Central it is determined that beginning in 1968 the episcopal residences and Areas will be so arranged that no Area will be composed solely of Annual Conferences formerly part of the Central Jurisdiction.

9. By the adoption of this Resolution the Council of Bishops evidences its readiness to transfer bishops across Jurisdictional lines in order to effectuate the purpose of this Resolution, and the bishops individually affirm their readiness to serve wherever they can be of greatest use.

10. By the adoption of this Resolution each Annual Conference, each Jurisdictional Conference, the General Conference, each College of Bishops and the Council of Bishops express their determination to do everything possible to bring about the elimination of any structural organization in The Methodist Church based on race at the earliest possible date and not later than the close of the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1972. They further express their earnest determination to do everything possible to develop greater understanding and brotherhood in Methodism as well as in the world.

The executive committees of the Interjurisdictional Relations Committees of the North Carolina-Virginia, North Carolina, Virginia, and Western North Carolina Annual Conferences, in a joint meeting, voted unanimously to submit the foregoing resolution to their respective Annual Conferences with a strong recommendation for approval. Therefore, this committee strongly urges you, the members of the Western North Carolina Annual Conference, to support wholeheartedly this resolution which, among other things, reaffirms what this Conference has already voted overwhelmingly to do.

The Effect of Adopting the Resolution—Conferences in North Carolina and Virginia

The adoption of the Resolution by the four Conferences in the states of North Carolina and Virginia will reaffirm the action they took in 1966. In addition, the North Carolina-Virginia Conference thereby approves the transfer of four Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction into the South Central Jurisdiction and six Conferences into the Southeastern Jurisdiction. Action by all of these four Conferences is necessary to approve not only the immediate transfer of Tennessee-Kentucky into the Southeastern Jurisdiction, but also to make possible its immediate merger with the five conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

The Tennessee-Kentucky Conference has not yet voted to transfer and merge. The Resolution not only accomplishes such a merger, but in paragraph three it provides for the rights and obligations by ministerial members both active and retired, covers matters of boards and agencies and provides for equal opportunities for participation in Conference programs and activities.

Cost to the North Carolina Conference of the Merger

There are three areas where there will be added cost to the North Carolina Conference if and when the Negro churches of the geographical area are merged into the North Carolina Conference.

The areas are: Education, Minimum Salaries and Pensions.

Education—The merger of the churches of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference of the Central Jurisdiction with the North Carolina Conference (SEJ) will affect three vital points of interest as related to education.

1. Local church work. Already some integration has taken place on this level. There is an overlapping of Boards of Education but the employed personnel of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference will be taken care of by the Virginia Conference.

2. Student work. This was integrated in 1960 and no additional financial costs will be incurred in the merger.

3. Higher education. Bennett College falls within the area of the two North Carolina Conferences and will, if the pattern is followed, become the responsibility of these two conferences; however, there was a promise by the Virginia Conference group that they would assume some responsibility here.

At present Bennett receives \$10,000 Stimulation Funds from the North Carolina-Virginia Conference. Approximately one-fourth of the membership of the merged conference will be absorbed by the North Carolina Conference. If the apportionment is made on the basis of membership alone, the North Carolina Conference will not be asked for more than \$2,500. The amount could be less as they will get the economically poorest part of the merged conference.

Presumably the merger will bring that much in potential giving from the churches which are received from the North Carolina-Virginia Conference.

Pensions—Net cost \$6,790.

Within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference, there are twenty charges of the Central Jurisdiction. These charges are served by part-time supply pastors, full-time approved supply pastors, and effective pastors. Men who have served these charges and have retired, have accumulated approximately 190 years of claimant service. Under our "Current Income" plan of paying pensions which we now operate by, this would cost \$12,160 per year, with our current rate of \$64.00 per service year. However, these churches have a 17% apportionment on the pastor's salaries. Based on the salaries paid for the year 1966-67 this apportionment would provide approximately \$5,370 towards this liability of \$12,160. This would leave our conference responsible for around \$6,790 to equalize the pensions.

The Pension Board of the North Carolina-Virginia conference has surplus funds amounting to \$250,000. These funds will be divided in some equitable way, possibly based on the number of members within the bounds of the conference.

So far as finances are concerned, our Board of Pensions sees no problem if a merger of the conferences takes place.

Minimum Salaries—The President and Secretary of the Minimum Salary Commission of the North Carolina Conference have carefully studied and compared the salary schedule now in effect in the North Carolina-Virginia Conference with that of the North Carolina Conference and have concluded that not more than \$4,500 will be required annually to bring salaries of the twenty charges in the area up to the minimum of the North Carolina Conference.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

IN MEMORIAM

The Board of Lay Activities was privileged to have as the 1966 Annual Conference Speaker Dr. Lawrence Lacour of the General Board of Evangelism. The theme of Dr. Lacour's address was *New Christians for a New Age*.

Mr. W. Jasper Smith of Rocky Mount was recognized as "Layman of the Year." He is presently serving as Comptroller of North Carolina Wesleyan College and was a former Conference Lay Leader for fourteen years; long rendering a valuable service to the Board of Lay Activities and The Methodist Church. Mr. Smith was presented the award by Mr. Dave O. Speir of Bethel, District Lay Leader of the Greenville District.

Other men given special recognition during the Anniversary Hour of the Board were The Reverend W. H. "Billy" Brown of the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham and Mr. R. L. Cox of Mount Olive. Brother Brown was 92 years of age and attending his 65th consecutive session of the Annual Conference. Mr. Cox has attended each session of the Annual Conference for the past fifty years.

The theme given emphasis by the Board of Lay Activities during the 1966-67 Conference Year was "*The Witness of the Laity*." The results of the efforts in this area have proven most rewarding. We are grateful for everyone and every church who have made the "Witness" possible.

We have enjoyed a great experience in cooperation with the Conference Board of Evangelism in support of the Lay Witness Missions in our North Carolina Conference this year. Only those who have had an opportunity to participate in these "missions" can know of the extent of our feeling here.

Several members of the board were in attendance at the SE. J. Laymen's Conference at Lake Junaluska, July 28-31, 1966. The conference was the largest recorded in the series meeting annually at the SE. J. Assembly Grounds.

"Renewal In the Church for Witness In the World" was the theme of the Junaluska Laymen's Conference. Some of the persons appearing on the program were:

The Witness of the Laity was first given attention at the annual Laymen's Retreat held at North Carolina Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount, the week-end of August 27-28, 1966. This was preceded by a small pre-conference retreat directed by Mr. A. T. "Tap" Hanson of Columbus, Georgia. Mr. Hanson prepared the discussion group leaders for the retreat session under the leadership of Dr. Ben C. Johnson. Dr. Johnson, of the SE. J. Committee on Lay Activities office in Atlanta, has long been recognized as the leader of the Lay Witness Mission Movement throughout the Southeast. The total attendance approached 500 for the retreat meeting at Wesleyan. The Raleigh District led the conference in attendance.

The fourth Annual District Training Sessions for Local Church Officers was held in each of the eleven districts on Sunday afternoon, September 18th. Over 1000 laymen received counsel in the following areas of the board's responsibilities: 1) Church Lay Leader, 2) Methodist Men Officers, 3) Official Board Chairman, 4) Steward, 5) Trustee, and 6) Committee on Nominations.

Laymen's Day, officially recognized by the Church on the second Sunday in October fell on the 18th in 1966. The theme for this Conference Year was "Every Man's Servant," I Corinthians 9:19-23. Perhaps, no other date on the church calendar gains more recognition than Laymen's Day, with the exception of Easter. It is believed that a vast majority of our charges observe the day sometime during the church year.

Too much cannot be said in evaluating the 1967 District Lay Rallies. These great annual meetings have come to be regarded as unique throughout the general church. Perhaps no other comparable meeting holds the attention of our Methodist people as the Annual Lay Rallies of the North Carolina Conference. Approximately 7000 were recorded in attendance in the February rallies this year. This exceeds any previous year by nearly 1000. The Durham District recorded the largest assembly of Methodists ever held on the district level in the North Carolina Conference. Similar records, on their respective district level, were thought to be established in the rallies at Fayetteville and Burlington.

Of special significance was the \$4,000.00 received in the rally offerings. Since 1964 nearly \$15,000.00 has been made possible in Christian Vocational Scholarships, in undergraduate studies, through the rally offerings received.

Bishop Paul N. Garber addressed each of the rally sessions, with one exception. He concluded the meetings with a consecration service for our Certified Lay Speakers. Special words of appreciation are extended to Bishop Garber and members of the Conference Cabinet, for the outstanding support given the board in the sponsoring of the 1967 District Lay Rallies. The cooperation of our total conference organization has lifted the rallies to greater heights of significance than could have ever been possible through the board's efforts alone.

The observance of the No-Silent Pulpit Program, over the past several quadrenniums, has increasingly become the accepted practice in the large majority of our circuit charges throughout the conference. The whole church is grateful to the many faithful Certified Lay Speakers who have made it possible for these Lenten services to be held every Sunday over the years.

On Saturday, April 29, 1967, the Board of Lay Activities held a day long meeting in the Methodist Building in Raleigh. This meeting was called to evaluate the year's activities and lay plans for the STEWARDSHIP emphasis of 1967-68. Out of this meeting exciting plans were proposed in the development of the selected theme: *The Stewardship of the Laity*.

Words fail us in attempting to express our appreciation to all who have supported the work of the board throughout the year. Never have so many done so much to help involve our Methodist people in the total program of the church. For this, we are all grateful beyond expression.

Stewardship

In preparation of the main emphasis of the Board of Lay Activities for the Conference 1967-68 the Conference Director of Stewardship has spent considerable time and effort in the development of the theme; "The Stewardship of the Laity." The proposed plans call for attention given to the following areas of stewardship cultivation during the coming year in the North Carolina Conference: 1) Tithing, 2) Time and Ability, 3) Ministerial Support, 4) Every Member Visitation, 5) Gifts and Wills, and 6) Capital Fund Promotion.

There will be held a Conference-Wide Stewardship Rally in the Memorial Auditorium in Raleigh, Monday, November 6, 1967. This will be joint sponsorship with the Commission on Cultivation and Promotion and should prove to be one of the highlights of the overall conference program for 1967-68.

The director was in attendance at a three day National Stewardship Seminar held in Chicago, March 1967, sponsored by the General Board of Lay Activities. Lectures by representatives of the ten Methodist Theological Schools were heard and discussed on the meaning and interpretation of Christian Stewardship.

Methodist Men

The work of Methodist Men in the North Carolina Conference alternates between the extremes of encouragement and disappointment. We are making headway — it is slow, to be sure — but it is real and we are optimistic that days ahead in Methodist Men are brighter than the past. Evidences of new life, new hope, and new zeal are coming to our attention. District Directors of Methodist Men report substantially increased interest and participation by members of organized clubs, in both Lay Revivals and Lay Witness Missions.

Communications from the districts report an increase of 5% in growth of local organizations. This we feel indicates a favorable trend; reflecting renewed dedication to Methodist Men and the stated objectives of the organization.

We wish to encourage all of our Methodist Men to schedule at least one official visit of the district lay leader and district director of Methodist Men to their local clubs during the conference year. These men have much to share and can be valuable resource persons to the local church in the area of Methodist Men promotion.

Lay Evangelism

Laymen throughout the North Carolina Conference have found a renewed faith and experienced a new spiritual birth through the involvement in the Lay Witness Mission Movement. Fifteen local churches have held "missions", involving 300 lay witnesses to date in the conference. Through these, many of our people have expressed a personal relationship with Christ for the first time in their lives. Some have confessed the "warm heart" experience of Wesley. Indications are that these experiences are sincere and genuine. This gives us reason to hope and pray that, through God's Love, revival will be upon us!

Lay Witness Mission will continue to be given attention through the cooperation of the Conference Board of Evangelism. We have shared an excellent working relationship with the Reverend Howard M. McLamb, Executive Secretary of the Board of Evangelism, and wish to express to him our sincere appreciation for his services in the cooperative efforts on behalf of Lay Witness Missions this year.

Lay Speaking

The training of our lay speakers in the North Carolina Conference continues to vary from year to year among the districts. Some offering the fundamental courses as

prescribed by the General Board of Lay Activities; others, have ventured into advanced studies requiring concentrated effort of study.

Mr. Charles K. McAdams of Methodist College, Fayetteville, has for the past two years led in the latter approach in the Burlington District Training Sessions for Certified Lay Speakers held at Camp Chestnut Ridge.

Mr. Tryon D. Lancaster, District Director of Lay Speaker Training for the Fayetteville District represented the board at the National Workshop for Lay Speakers Training held in Chicago during February of 1967, under the sponsorship of the General Board of Lay Activities. The evaluation of Mr. Lancaster, regarding the National Workshop, should prove helpful in planning future training sessions for our lay speakers in the North Carolina Conference.

Leadership Development

This is a new area being given conference directorship for the first time this conference year. We feel fortunate in securing the services of Dr. Paul Hardin, III of the Duke University School of Law, and former Associate District Lay Leader of the Durham District, as the Conference Director of Leadership Development.

Mr. Hardin's attention this year has been directed to an evaluation study of the board's activities in the area of lay leadership training, particularly as it relates to local church officers given training responsibility by the board.

The Director has attended one National Workshop for Conference Directors of Leadership Training held in Evanston, Illinois, under the sponsorship of the General Board of Lay Activities.

There has been forwarded to the lay delegates attending the 1967 Annual Conference session a copy of the official manual for the Lay Member of the Annual Conference. Attention has been drawn by the Conference Director of Leadership Development to the special significance, and important decisions, facing the members of the 1967 Annual Conference.

METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

Report No. 1

Methodist Foundation, Inc., has completed what we feel to be another successful year in spite of the rather unsettled economic and monetary conditions. Our investments have proven to be wise with excellent stability, our funds are conservatively invested and have stood up well during the fluctuations in the investment markets. Our return on investments continue to be satisfactory.

The Foundation has continued using the advisory services of Moody's Incorporated, and every new investment made is reviewed by their representative.

We would again take note of the fact that there is no meaning in the cold fact of the fiscal activities of the Foundation. Rather, the fact that we are practicing good stewardship and generating funds for the church's program, make the effort worthwhile.

The Committee on Annual Conference Corporations, in their report on page 220 of the 1966 Annual Conference Journal, requested Methodist Foundation, Inc., to amend its charter to include a control clause. This has been done by the addition of the following:

"Under the jurisdiction, control and direction of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church."

Also requested, was the inclusion of an amendment clause. This has been done as follows:

"To alter or amend the charter of the corporation only upon the prior approval of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, said approval to be sufficiently evidenced by a recital thereof in said proposed amendments."

Section III of the charter has been appropriately amended to include the above provision and the amendment was approved by the Foundation in regular session, April 19, 1967, and has been filed with the Secretary of State of the State of North Carolina. The original will be retained in the files of the Corporation.

We wish to pay tribute to John M. Dozier who has left during this past year to

accept a position in Minnesota. John is to be complimented for his outstanding leadership in the work of Methodist Foundation and The Methodist Church. His guiding hand has been of invaluable assistance to the Foundation in its most formative years and a pattern of dignified business procedures has been set with goals attained and other goals set forth of which our conference can be justly proud. We shall miss John but his spirit lives on in the work and progress of our Methodist Foundation.

COMMISSION ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION

John Wesley made "the press a servant of the church," according to the preface of our Methodist *Discipline*.

Methodist Information is the agency of the North Carolina Annual Conference that seeks to communicate the work of Tar Heel Methodists to the world.

Over 100 newspapers serve the North Carolina Conference. MI subscribes to a clipping service which weekly provides us with ready information on the life and work of our church's thrust in eastern North Carolina. A number of churches and ministers are doing a significant job in sharing their ministry and relevance with the larger community through public relations.

The director would like to commend the district directors who work faithfully in publicizing the district conferences, the district lay rallies, Christian Workers' Schools and other noteworthy events throughout the year. We are particularly grateful for the shared responsibilities during Annual Conference as we utilize radio, television and the press in pre-conference and Annual Conference coverage.

As director we have cooperated, when requested, with those conference agencies and boards that have sought publicity for certain programs and emphases. Special publicity releases for Christian Vocations, the Department of Gifts and Wills, and the annual Conference of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Annual Conference Youth Session, the Lay Retreat, Pastors' Conference on Evangelism, and the World Methodist Conference and others have been handled by the director. In addition, we have arranged for a 30-minute television appearance for Bishop Garber to share his episcopal experiences in the Geneva Area last summer. The director reported during a half-hour television interview on Channel 9, Greenville, on the World Methodist Conference.

During the coming year, a public relations training workshop is planned for the district directors of Methodist Information. We believe that the guidance and training afforded on this district level will better equip our directors to do their jobs more adequately and imaginatively. We expect to draw upon the experience of the national MI staff as well as the editors of two of our dailies, Ashley Futrell of Washington and Bill Horner of Sanford, who are district directors.

We shall invite to this workshop those pastors and laymen interested in this phase of our church's work.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION AT GREENVILLE, N. C. 1966-67

It is with pleasure that we present to you at this time the major developments in our Wesley Foundation program this year and the highlights of our ministry at East Carolina College for the year 1966-67. These remarks are made, mindful of the fact that many individuals — students, ministers, and laymen — are to be commended for their support and occasional prodding, providing insight and guidance for the task at hand.

Program Areas

Coffee House: The most gratifying developments in our program this year have been the growth of the coffee house ministry and the encouraging response to our Sunday Morning worship services. Both programs have provided considerable opportunity for experimentation.

Following the approval of the Long Range Planning Committee's recommendations last year, an architect was employed and the downstairs recreation room converted into what is now the "Catacombs." Between 600 and 1000 persons (students, faculty and townspeople) have visited the Coffee House this year. Beyond the initial appeal of the coffee house as just "a place to go" has been the meaningful meeting between persons which has taken place and the growing number of counseling opportunities growing out of this encounter.

Worship: From 75 to 100 persons have participated in morning prayer this year. This has probably been the most meaningful phase of the program leading us to discuss more recently the possibility of converting the auditorium for this purpose. This program has progressed with the support and helpful advice of the other Greenville ministers.

General: Another aspect of our program is the weekly gathering for supper in the middle of the week. Although we usually just meet, eat and talk, more of this time is being used for special programming. A foreign film series has highlighted the session this spring.

The student council meets weekly to evaluate student interests, hear gripes and project plans for the coffee house and other phases of our program. Presently, we are making plans for our annual spring retreat in April.

A number of groups have used our facilities this year including sororities, fraternities, service organizations, and Sunday school classes. A large number of students use the study and cooking facilities weekly at the Center. A "Day of the Campus" was well attended in the fall by the Campus Ministry Secretaries of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Wesley House

Last year the Board purchased and rented to some 16 male students the house adjacent to the Student Center. The idea behind our original move to purchase this property was future physical expansion. Anticipated enrollment in 1975, for example, is 15,000 plus, although a more realistic figure is probably 12,000 plus. Presently, however, we are having little trouble renting the house and its proximity to our Center provides us with the opportunity for associating with a group of students at the many levels of their college experience. A senior or graduate student is employed to live in as house resident receiving for this service a room with private bath and entrance.

Assistantship

Two years ago a Methodist program assistantship was established to provide the Director with secretarial assistance and someone to help with general oversight of the building and the program as needed. For compensation, the couple was provided with living quarters (including utilities) plus a \$50.00 monthly stipend. For these two years we have received the services of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Brinn in this position and have been extremely pleased with the results of this relationship. The personnel committee is in the process now of reviewing applications from graduate student and faculty couples for this position next year.

United Ministry

Through the Campus Minister's Association, plans are now unfolding for an experimental drama troupe this summer. A professional director has been employed and the Director has been asked to serve as stage manager for the troupe which will travel to some forty churches in Eastern North Carolina. The purpose of this program is to encourage the use of drama as a means of communicating the Christian faith. While

the program is being underwritten financially by the Presbyterian Church, U. S., other denominations are providing token support. Approximately 10 Methodist Churches in our area will have the opportunity to host this group at no financial cost to them.

Aside from these specific plans, the Campus Ministers gather weekly to discuss common goals and to project program areas of mutual interest and concern. (Participating denominations: Methodist, Presbyterian, Lutheran, Baptist, Episcopalian, and Catholic.)

REPORT OF THE MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

I

The Minimum Salary Commission recommends for the conference year 1967-1968 that the minimum salaries of our ministers who are serving pastoral appointments on a full-time basis be as follows:

Single Ministers

First year in Conference	\$3700
Second year in Conference	3800
Third year in Conference	3900
Fourth year in Conference	4000
Fifth or more years in Conference	4200

Married Ministers

First year in Conference	\$4000
Second year in Conference	4100
Third year in Conference	4200

Fifth or more years in Conference	4500

Married Ministers With One or More Dependent Children

First year in Conference	\$4500
Second year in Conference	4600
Third year in Conference	4700
Fourth year in Conference	4800
Fifth or more years in Conference	5000

The Commission recommends that all student ministers serving appointments in our Conference shall be eligible for the following Minimum Salary support:

Single	\$3000 plus travel*
Married	3200 plus travel*
Married with one child	3500 plus travel*
Married with two or more children	3700 plus travel*

Undergraduate students already under appointment may continue to receive the same level of salary support as is currently being provided, in keeping with the level of 1965-1966, until they receive their A.B. degrees, or its equivalent; or they may receive support in keeping with the new schedule for student ministers, whichever is greater.

A further exception will be made for student ministers attending other approved seminaries. Additional assistance may be provided, up to a maximum of \$500, dependent upon the personal needs of such student ministers.

When a student pastor graduates either from college or Divinity School and begins to serve as a full-time minister, his minimum salary shall be equal to the requirements of his new status and will be paid him from the first day of the first full month served full time.

The Commission recommends that retired ministers, serving as Retired Supplies and receiving Minimum Salary assistance, may receive up to \$3000, including travel and utilities, regardless of the amount of their pensions.

The Commission also recommends that a maximum of \$6000 be permitted during 1967-1968 for Special—Church situations, any support above Minimum Salary levels to be provided by the Duke Foundation and/or the Board of Missions.

*Travel allowance is based on the distance of student's parsonage from the school he attends. When the parsonage is 25 miles or less, it shall be \$100; when the parsonage is more than 25 miles but less than 50 miles, it shall be \$200; when the parsonage is more than 50 miles but less than 75 miles, it shall be \$300; when the parsonage is more than 75 miles but less than 100 miles, it shall be \$400; and when the parsonage is 100 miles or more from school, \$500 shall be a maximum travel allowance.

II

Principles Governing the Use of Minimum Salary Funds

The commission urges each charge receiving Minimum Salary funds, its minister, and district superintendent so to administer the affairs of the charge that it may move as rapidly as possible toward full financial support.

To enable the conference, the commission, and the superintendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned the following principals and procedures are set forth:

Aid to Charges

1. All requests for financial assistance on pastors' salaries for the succeeding year shall be presented by the district superintendent to the secretary of the Commission on Minimum Salary not later than five days after the May Cabinet meeting.

2. Minimum Salary aid provided by the conference shall not be used to raise the salary above the minimum set by the conference.

3. The family or marital status of the pastor at the time of assignment to the charge shall govern the amount paid the minister for the entire conference year.

4. In considering the salary for a charge, we call attention to the fact that the Commission on Minimum Salary must count salary, travel, utilities, bonuses, and expense allowances as salary in making appropriations to the charge.

a. We stress the importance of reporting all such contributions, so that all ministers involved may be treated alike.

Dividing Charges

5. The Commission on Minimum Salary suggests that, as a general practice, no appointments be made with a membership of less than 200, if the charge is to expect Minimum Salary Support.

a. Divisions of circuits should be on the basis of mutual agreement by all the churches on the circuit rather than simply from the desire of the larger church to withdraw for its own benefit and advancement.

b. If a new charge is to be served by a student pastor, that fact should be given the charge before it agrees to its new status.

6. When the division of a charge is considered necessary and minimum salary is to be requested for either of the new charges resulting from such division, such project shall be presented to the secretary of the Commission on Minimum Salary not later than five days after the May Cabinet meeting, so that a satisfactory evaluation can be made by the Commission. Without its approval the Commission shall not be obligated to provide minimum salary support for either of the charges resulting from such division.

7. In the division of circuits where one church seeks to become a station, it is recommended that such church assume all salary obligations and its proportionate share of World Service and Benevolences.

a. It is recommended that the remainder of the division pay 80% of pastoral support, and its share of World Service and Benevolences.

b. The Commission on Minimum Salary further recommends that each charge which has received, or shall hereafter receive Minimum Salary aid, shall make every reasonable effort to reduce this aid by 20% each year until the charge has accepted full self-support. The district superintendents are to inform all charges receiving, or to receive aid in the future, of this regulation. This requirement must be kept in mind in preparing for any requests.

c. When a charge has been established as a student appointment and desires to be served by a full-time minister, this change may take place at such time as the charge shall pay 80% of the amount needed to provide such full-time ministerial support and shall agree to reduce the aid by 20% each year.

d. When there is a division of a charge forming one or more student appointments, the student appointment must pay 80% of said salary.

A New Church As A Charge

8. When a new church is to be established and becomes a new charge, the district superintendent shall present for study the complete details of the proposed project not later than five days after the May Cabinet meeting. These details shall be presented to both the Conference Board of Missions and the Commission on Minimum Salary. If such new church is approved by the Board and Commission, the Commission shall provide Minimum Salary assistance and the Board shall supplement the salary to make it adequate, and shall assist the new charge in providing living quarters for the minister

and a place to meet and worship. It shall be understood that each year the new charge shall accept more of the budget until its becomes self-supporting. We require that each new church shall become self-supporting in a period of ten years or less, or assume circuit status.

a. Exception will be made if charge has made reasonable effort to become self-supporting and is willing and able to increase salary at least \$300 annually, increase its World Service proportionately, and reach full support within five more years.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

Report No. 1

GENERAL STATEMENT

Our Board has under its supervision more than 165 men who are in the process of becoming prepared to render effective leadership in the pastoral office. In making our recommendations to the conference, we are guided by the Discipline, the recommendations of the district committees, and the leadership of Christ's Spirit. We aim to be fair to the individual and to the local church in the decisions we reach.

Our Board is composed of some of the most consecrated ministers in our conference. These men give freely of their time to aid in this work. Each spring they leave their own work to devote three days interviewing the candidates for the ministry when we meet at Goldsboro and Durham. This year, at their personal expense, they are presenting a copy of two books to each candidate who appears before this Board for the first time and who is approved. These books are: "With the Holy Spirit and Fire" by Samuel Shoemaker; and "Recapturing Pentecost," by Harold E. Luccock.

After the 1967 session of our conference, all who seek admission on trial will be required to have an A.B. degree or its equivalent from an accredited college or university. However, all who were admitted on trial under Par. 325-3 may proceed to full conference membership.

Approved Courses Of Study School

One of the important tasks of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications is to supervise the Approved Supply Pastor in his course of study. This is a four-year program which requires love, patience, and encouragement from Board members. The Discipline requires these men to take these courses in the Approved Courses of Study School at Duke or Emory. The Duke School will be held from July 10-August 4. Scholarship aid of \$100.00 is available for each man who attends the four weeks, and \$50.00 for those who attend two weeks for "License to Preach" or "Introductory Studies."

Spring Meetings

Spring Meetings for interviewing candidates will be held two days at St. Paul Church, Goldsboro, April 1 & 2, 1968, 9:00 a.m.; and one day at Duke Memorial Church, Durham, April 3, 1968, 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m.

Recommendations

1. That "Studies for License to Preach" be taken through the Correspondence Department of Ministerial Education at Nashville, or at the Approved Courses of Study School for two weeks at Duke or Emory.

2. Part-time Approved Supply Pastors are required to complete a minimum of one-half year of the course of study each year until all four years are completed. (Par. 318)

3. Courses of study are to be taken at Duke or Emory as required by the Discipline (par. 317). Under unusual circumstances this work may be taken by correspondence from the Nashville office but only when authorized by the Conference Board.

4. All local preachers who were licensed after May 1, 1956, are required by the Discipline to complete one-half year of the course of study each year (Par. 307.2). When this is not done, he loses his local preachers license and must start over again by taking the course on License to Preach using the current study course. The entire Introductory Studies and four-year course shall be completed in a maximum of 12 years from time of first enrollment. (Par. 317.3). District committees are expected to closely supervise this work.

5. May 19, 1968, will be Ministry Sunday in the Methodist Church; according to the Discipline (Par. 352.20), it is the duty of every pastor "to preach on the meaning of Christian vocation and the call and challenge of the ministry and other types of

full-time church work, and to advise with youth, students, and young adults about their educational and vocational plans." Every pastor should take the lead here. If our church is to make a dynamic witness to this generation, it must have a ministry called of God, adequately trained, and in sufficient numbers to meet the challenge of the critical hour.

6. The Orientation Workshop for pastors new to the North Carolina Conference is performing a very important service. It is provided free, early in July. All pastors in this classification are now required to attend.

7. We recommend that each church use the new "Manual for Pastoral Relations Committee."

The One Percent Ministerial Education Fund

The Board requests the continuation of the One Percent Educational Plan and insists that each church include this item in its annual budget. Many of our men are being helped by this fund. The fund is divided as follows:

1. One half is held in the conference to be administered by our board to provide scholarship through service loans to ministerial students in seminary, and pre-ministerial students in Methodist colleges.

2. One half to be forwarded by the Conference treasurer to the treasurer of the Southeastern Jurisdiction. He distributes this portion of it to the Candier School of Theology and the Duke Divinity School according to a formula based upon the number of Methodist students in candidacy for the B.D. degree who were enrolled in each seminary during the 1960-64 quadrennium.

REPORT OF METHODIST MINISTERS' CREDIT UNION

The Credit Union movement, born in Germany because a mayor was concerned about the economic troubles of his people, first made its appearance in North America in 1900, when a French-Canadian journalist decided action was needed to combat the economic plight of his neighbors and friends in Quebec.

It was from a Canadian Credit Union C. E. Hix, Jr. gained the vision of a Credit Union to serve the Methodist ministers of North Carolina. He and twenty-four other ministers organized the first Credit Union in the world for the sole purpose of serving Methodist ministers. Our founders believed that ministers could and would help each other if given a chance.

Our task is greater than ever in today's changing economy. There is much evidence that our members are determined to make the Credit Union idea of serving each other work. Since February 1, 1960, our Credit Union has grown from \$1,204.02 in assets to \$326,373.08 as of April 30, 1967. The fact that the assets were increased by \$65,823.12 in the past twelve months, as compared to \$31,781.05 in the previous twelve months when money was not so tight, speaks eloquently of the dedication of our members to the idea of helping each other in time of need.

Last conference we called on you to raise the assets to \$300,000.00 by January, 1967. The assets were over \$307,490.00 on January 1. This growth took place because more people were participating. Our membership increased, but the greatest growth was in the activity of our members. The activity is increasing in 1967 as shown by the table below.

The share accounts of our 775 members range from \$5.00 to \$10,000.00. There is room for much growth in our current membership. Some 265 have less than two shares each and another 94 have less than three shares.

Our Board of Directors declared a 4% dividend on all shares of record December 31. This was the fifth year at this fine rate. When you add the Life Savings Insurance premiums paid for you by our Credit Union, our insurable shares have earned a return of 5.08%. This is the highest return ever earned on shares in our Credit Union.

The increase in 1966 earnings on shares was in the form of new insurance benefits provided for you. Accidental Death, Dismemberment, and Loss of Sight benefits have been added to the basic Life Savings coverage. Accidental death doubles your basic coverage, in case of accidental death. (Basic coverage may be as high as \$2,000.00 determined by the amount of your shares and your age at time of purchase.) The Dismemberment and Loss of Sight benefits provide for the payment of a sum equal to the basic coverage upon sustaining certain losses and half the basic coverage for certain other losses. The basic coverage remains in force under the terms of the Life Savings Policy after payment for loss.

Deposit accounts were made available in the latter part of 1966. Six such accounts were opened by December 31. Two belonged to Credit Union members, two to non-members, one to a conference organization, and one to an organization of credit unions. This total amounted to \$9,570.74. These accounts have increased to 23 with a total of \$32,747.25. These deposit accounts do not earn Life Savings Insurance, but they do earn 4½% per annum compounded or paid quarterly. These accounts are preferred claims of the Credit Union. We would encourage our members to build their shares to \$2,000.00 so as to qualify to open a deposit account. We invite churches, laymen, and organizations to invest in our deposit accounts at a guaranteed rate of 4½% per annum paid quarterly or compounded. Accounts may vary from \$100.00 to \$5,000.00.

As great as the past has been, we cannot rest on our accomplishments. We must move

on. The only way to render greater service is through investment of more resources, concern for others and money. Neither is enough alone. We invite you to invest your money and we urge you to spread the Credit Union philosophy, "not for profit, not for charity, but for service."

We challenge you to carry your Credit Union forward. Let us reach \$375,000.00 in assets, \$325,000.00 in share and deposit accounts, and 750 active members by December 31, 1967.

Our Credit Union is sharing in another pioneer venture. Our president represented us at an informal sharing session during General Conference in Chicago where the Association of Methodist Credit Unions was begun. Your treasurer has been named to the Committee of Eighteen to bring this organization to completion at General Conference in Dallas. Rev. Donald Foster of the South Carolina Conference Credit Union is chairman of this committee.

We wish to thank each person who has helped in any way to make this report of progressive service possible. We note with sadness the loss by death of two members who have had a part in it—the Reverend W. D. Caviness and the Reverend Holland L. Hale.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

GENERAL STATEMENT

The genius of the Methodist Church is found in its world-wide vision. The North Carolina Conference Board of Missions accepts the challenge of the world-wide church, and throughout the past year has attempted to create an awareness of the world mission of the church throughout our Conference. We are grateful indeed to the individual churches in our Conference for their continuing interest in the mission of the church and the financial support that has been made available through Advance Specials, as well as the benevolent program in our Conference budget. The Conference Board of Missions also accepts with joy the responsibility of Church Extension within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference, and has watched with interest and care the development of three new churches during this Conference year. In some of the areas of our Conference where the population increase is being felt keenly, we have had a chance to expand the resources of the local church to meet the increased needs. This year has been a year of growth within and without the Conference.

This year's report contains a record of accomplishments, as well as an estimate of the dreams for the future. The Board has met regularly and the Executive Committee has attempted to meet the responsibilities between sessions of the full Board. The

members of the Board have been most gracious in their contribution of time and talent. The Board recognizes the fact that there are many areas where we have not been able to meet the needs, but we have attempted to do the very best we could with the resources available to us.

Once again we express our deep appreciation to the Reverend LaFon C. Vereen who has represented the Board as Executive Secretary for another year. Mr. Vereen's interest in missions and Church Extension, and his devotion to duty, has been responsible in a large measure for the successes we have enjoyed in this year. His tireless energy and devotion have led him to work beyond the time assigned, to give aid and render assistance wherever and whenever there was a need. We recommend most heartily the reappointment of Brother Vereen as Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions of the North Carolina Conference. We recognize that none of our efforts would have been possible without the love and cooperation of Bishop Garber and the eleven district superintendents. We record here our thanks to them for their cooperation and interest. We are appreciative of the dedication of our Missionary Secretary, Dr. J. E. Garlington, for his interest and enthusiasm. We are grateful to the Reverend Rufus Stark for developing a program of Mission Studies and Cultivation. As he has explored a new area for us, we have found a true basis for cooperation with the Woman's Society of Christian Service in developing a unified program of missionary education. Mrs. S. A. Dunn, President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and her officials have rendered valuable assistance in consolidating and unifying the missions efforts of the Conference and the Woman's Society. We would like to express our deep appreciation to Dr. T. Marvin Vick, who for the past eight years has given of himself unselfishly to the Board of Missions, as its president. We also express our appreciation to the district missionary secretaries for their splendid work in helping to carry on the work of missions within the district.

Following in brief outline, we present to you our report for the year.

II

WORLD MISSIONS

World Service: Once again we would like to quote for your guidance and information, Paragraph 1176 of the 1964 Discipline, "The supreme aim of missions is to make the Lord Jesus Christ known to all peoples and all lands as their divine Savior, to persuade them to become his disciples, and to gather these disciples into Christian churches, to enlist them in the building of the Kingdom of God, to cooperate with these churches, to promote World Christian fellowship, and to bring to bear on all human life the spirit and principle of Christ."

The Conference Board of Missions accepts the responsibility for the accomplishment of this portion of our Discipline. We recognize full well that the mission of the church reaches into every area of life today, and it must be understood to represent the relationship between two individuals as well as the relationship that exists between nations and peoples of the world. It is through our World Service giving that we initially undergird the great missionary effort of the church. In our World Service program, which is one of the seven benevolences of our Conference, we make available the initial monies that are necessary to operate the Board of Missions of the general church, and to enable the representatives of the Board of our Church to be sent to the many fields of operation throughout our world today. We are appreciative of the interest that the North Carolina Conference has shown in World Service, and we commend to you the importance of increased giving in this area of our program. The more we give to World Service, the more we have to undergird the changing needs of our world.

Missionary Conference: The Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church is sponsoring two Jurisdictional meetings. The School of Christian Missions is to be held at Lake Junaluska, July 20-26. We urge each district to send two youth delegates to the Youth and Missions Conference to be held, July 20-26. The North Carolina Conference Board of Missions in cooperation with the Woman's Society of Christian Service, will hold the Conference School of Christian Mission at Methodist College, Fayetteville, August 7-11.

Missionaries: We are grateful to the many individuals and families who today represent us throughout the world as missionaries from the North Carolina Conference. These missionaries represent members of our Conference on special assignment to the mission field. We are grateful for the many churches that are, as the moment, underwriting the work of these missionaries and are hopeful that in the future we may be able to say some day that we are underwriting and paying the full salary and operational cost for all those who represent the North Carolina Conference on the mission field. If there is any church or any individual in our Conference who would be in-

terested in participating in this specific phase of the missions program, the Executive Secretary would be happy to explain how this may be done.

Advance Specials: Advance specials represent a very exciting and wonderful way to go the extra mile in missionary giving. Advance specials are designated gifts that go directly and in their entirety to the specific missionary or missionary cause chosen by the giver. Mission specials range in amounts from \$10.00 upward to any amount the individual would like to contribute. Today the mission special needs of our church are such that any nation in the world, where The Methodist Church is currently at work, represents a field of opportunity for the one who would give a special gift to missions through this channel. Each church of the Conference is urged to accept at least one mission: special in each of the four areas of our work. One, world, which represents the work of the church beyond the continental limits of the United States. Two, National Missions, which represents the work of our church within the continental limits of the United States. Three, MCOR, which is a special channel for emergency relief to meet those unpredicted circumstances and crises that occur year in and year out throughout the world. And four, within our conference — advance specials, within our conference, there are, year after year, special situations which call for extra-mile giving and offer the opportunity for our additional gifts to extend the Kingdom in these areas.

Our Advance Special program for the year 1967 includes the following: All World Mission operations as designated by the General Board — World, National, MCOR, and Conference.

Our Advance Special program includes the following causes: Lands of Decision, all new Methodist churches (organized since 1932), including parsonages, proposed sites for new churches; tuition scholarships for directors of Christian education; the Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College; Alaska Methodist College; conference missionaries in other lands; work in European area; foreign students to assist them to study in Methodist Colleges in North Carolina; the Wesley Foundation, North Carolina State University; John Wesley, Fayetteville (CJ); Lumbee Indian work.

III

HOME MISSIONS

Church Extension

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Inc., was chartered by the State of North Carolina to facilitate the expansion of Church Extension within the bounds of the Conference.

During the past year your Board of Missions has secured two new sites for churches; Medfield Estates, Garner, and a new site for St. Luke Church, Laurinburg. Our goal this quadrennium is at least one new church in every district.

Ten Dollar Club

Since March, 1954, we have helped to build 68 new churches through the Ten Dollar Club. There are today 18 churches waiting to get on the Ten Dollar Club call. We desperately need new members to the Ten Dollar Club, if we are to keep pace with the population growth in our conference. Since our last report, we have helped the following churches to build their first units:

On September 15 of each year the Ten Dollar Club Committee meets to approve churches to be helped by Ten Dollar Club aid for the ensuing year. Church Extension Sunday will be held February 18, 1968. Our goal is "At Least One New Member Per Church Throughout the Conference."

IV

AID TO CHURCHES

The Board has made eleven construction loans for the building of churches this year, and has assisted in securing two sites for new churches. The Board has helped seven churches to secure loans from the Division of National Missions and has helped three churches in the refinancing of their loans. Eleven churches have been aided with grants totaling \$19,199.14, and five parsonages have been aided with grants totaling \$2,050.00.

Parsonage aid cannot be given for longer than five years and this must be on a graduated scale. In cooperation with Town and Country, Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Board of Missions, a brochure entitled, "A Guide For Building, Furnishing, and Maintaining Parsonages" has been compiled for the convenience of those interested in building parsonages. Free copies of this may be secured from Glenwood Avenue, Raleigh, North Carolina 27605.

V

URBAN LIFE

The North Carolina Conference finds itself caught up in a "changing scene." Many sections of our Conference are becoming urban areas. In such places the role of the church is ever changing. The Urban Life Committee has been at work to develop methods of working in these emerging urban areas. In an attempt to help the pastors of the Conference, the first Urban Life Conference for the North Carolina Conference will be held October 10th and 11th, 1967.

We are entering a great field and one that is going to be increasingly important in Eastern North Carolina in the years ahead.

VI

COMMITTEE ON MISSION STUDIES AND CULTIVATION

This Committee of our Board of Missions is completing its first year of service. The Committee was formed for the purpose of 1) promoting consistently across the Conference effective mission study in every local Church and 2) of cultivating specific follow up action growing out of study. The Committee is a representative group including persons from various Boards concerned with current themes. One major concern is that the excellent training and implementation of mission study developed by our Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service not be curtailed but expanded and enhanced.

The Committee has responsibility for the Conference School of Christian Mission, the primary training ground and for the Fall Mission Study Conferences in each District.

THIS YEAR'S FACTS AND FIGURES

A. The School of Christian Mission — August 8-12

The Session was held at Methodist College around the theme "Affluence and Poverty: Dilemma for Christians." There were 250 in regular attendance and 81 visitors attending at least one day. Plans were made at the School for Fall Mission Study Conference in each District. Mrs. H. C. Turlington served as Dean of the School.

B. Fall Mission Study Conference

Fall Mission Study Conferences were held in each District under direction of the District Missionary Secretary and the District Committee on Mission Study. The following figures represent something of the response:

There were only six Annual Conferences in the Nation which reached more persons and only one Annual Conference offered more training opportunities.

We have no way of knowing at present the degree of study in each local Church, but we expect it to be at a high level.

Offerings were applied to Viet Nam Relief and the Sager-Brown School, Baldwin, La.

PLANS FOR 1967 - 68

A. Conference School of Christian Mission
Weekend of Study — August 5-6, 1967.

Week of study — August 7-11, 1967, Methodist College, Fayetteville, N. C.

This year for the first time our School of Christian Mission is fully cooperative, including representatives for all participating Boards.

Unified theme: "Christ and the Faiths of Men."

Elective Studies: "Japan," "Ecumenicity," "Man and Community."

The School is open to all who wish to attend and will offer two sessions.

Accommodations for men, women, and couples are available at both sessions.

1. The Weekend of Study (Formerly the Guild Weekend). This Session from August 5-6 will offer a concentrated School of Christian Mission. Special Workshops will be provided for Guild members, Commission Chairmen and others. Weekend Study Chairman — Mrs. Joseph Smith.

2. Week of Study (Formerly Woman's Society School of Christian Mission). This Session provides an excellent opportunity in depth study under expert leadership. Special training opportunities will be available for members of local Church Women's Societies as well as training for other local Church personnel. Dean — Mrs. John W. Crawford.

B. Fall Mission Study Conference

Plans will be made for these District meetings at the Conference School of Mission.

VII

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ORGANIZATION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF NEW CHURCHES

1. A suitable survey shall be made under the direction of the District Superintendent to determine present need and future potential before a monetary request, except for the purchase of land, may be made to the Board of Missions.

a. Information on community census may be obtained from Dr. M. Wilson Nesbitt, Director, The Work of the Rural Church, Box 4814, Duke Station, Durham, North Carolina, 27706, and the National Division of the Board of Missions, 1701 Arch Street, Philadelphia, Pa. 19103.

2. We encourage each District to organize a District Board of Missions and Church Extension to assist the District Superintendent in the work of organization and location of new churches.

3. We encourage that purchase of land be made by the District Board of Missions and Church Extension and that the land be made as a gift to the church from funds raised within the District.

4. The norms for our General and Conference Board of Missions:

Number of families x's 500

Operating budget x's 4

% of the total property evaluation (existing and new)

Then add all three figures and divide by 3

5. Pastors and Official Board of new church situations shall have semi-annual conferences with the Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions and the District Superintendent to review progress in building and financial development.

6. Once a loan becomes delinquent and remains so for more than ninety days, no further loans will be considered within the district until delinquencies are liquidated.

7. These recommendations to become effective, 1967 Annual Conference (part of Book of Reports).

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

Report No. 1

One of the most significant programs of this annual conference is its financial support to our retired ministers, ministers' widows, and dependent children of ministers. Therefore we submit the following financial report for the conference year 1966-1967.

1. *Charge Apportionment:* We recommend that the apportionment on the churches of this conference be an amount equal to 16% of the salaries of the ministers appointed to each charge.

2. *Annuity Rate:* We recommend that the annuity rate of \$66.00 per service year for retired ministers, and for retired approved supply pastors who have served not less than four consecutive years of full-time approved service in this annual conference.

3. *Liens:* We remind the ministers of this conference that the Board of Pensions is enforcing Paragraph #1634 and 1624.3,4,5; which states that any charge which does not make payment of its apportionment in full, a lien will be filed against that ministers pension annuity, and the proportionate part of this unpaid balance will be withheld from his pension at the time of his retirement.

Report 2

Report 4

INSURANCE

1. *Hospital Insurance*: The annual conference of 1966 authorized the Board of Pensions to study available Hospital Insurance Programs, and select the program which provided the best protection for our claimants. After a lengthy and careful study, the Board transferred its hospital coverage from H. M. E. P. with Travelers to The Blue Cross Plan with Hospital Care Association of Durham. The new insurance went into effect August 1, 1967. We therefore recommend to the annual conference that our claimants continue to be provided Hospital Insurance through Hospital Care Association, with the Board of Pensions paying the premiums.

U. S. Fidelity and Guaranty Life Insurance Co. offers through Moore and Johnson Co. of Raleigh the following policy:

\$10,000 term life insurance, including waiver of premium in case of disability and accidental death and dismemberment of benefits for the minister;

\$ 1,000 term life insurance with waiver of premium and accidental death and dismemberment benefits for the minister's wife;

Term life insurance for each dependent child, beginning with \$100 for each child less than six months old and graduating upward to coverage of \$1,000 when the child reaches five years of age until the child reaches age 19. Prior to 19th birthday, he has the privilege of converting to his own private policy at the current premium rate.

The policy is in effect with full benefits until the minister reaches retirement or age 70. At the time of retirement, if retirement is before age 70, the amount of coverage is reduced 50% or to \$5,000, and the premiums are reduced 50%. At age 70, the coverage is reduced to \$1,000 of permanent life insurance, which is in effect until death.

At age 65, the coverage on the wife ends. However, prior to age 65, she has the privilege of converting to a private policy at the current premium rate.

The rate for this policy is \$7.14 per month for the family plan and \$6.60 per month for the minister without wife and dependents.

We feel the following is also significant. From the premiums paid to the company, the first year their retention rate is 14.5%; the second year, 2.5%; the third year, 12%. After the retention rate is deducted from the premiums, those funds not paid out in claims will be returned to the Board of Pensions as Cash Premium Receipts.

Therefore, we of the Board of Pensions make the following recommendations:

1. This policy be adopted for the ministers of our conference, except those ministers appointed without annuity claim upon the conference.

2. The insurance policy to go into effect January 1, 1968, subject to approval of at least 75% of the Quarterly Conferences of the North Carolina Conference. The district superintendents will certify such approval, or lack of approval, following the first round of said Conferences. The Board of Pensions is requested to study question of how weaker charges or pastors on minimum salary can be assisted so that those pastors may participate in the insurance program.

3. Each charge make premium payments quarterly, \$21.42 for those ministers with dependents, \$19.80 for ministers without dependents. When a minister changes status or appointments, the charge to adjust premiums accordingly.

4. The premiums for the District Superintendents to be paid from District Funds.

5. Those ministers serving connectional appointments and/or who are related to one of the Boards or Agencies of the conference, for the first year, the premium to be paid quarterly, either by the employing agency or board or by the minister himself. After the first year, we recommend the premiums be paid from the Cash Premium Receipts returned to the Board of Pensions.

The Board of Pensions sincerely believes that the ministers of this conference should be provided this insurance protection.

Report 5

INTERJURISDICTIONAL RELATIONS

The Board of Pensions recognizes that in all probability action will be taken in the very near future which will affect a merger of the churches now residing in our area which belong to the North Carolina-Virginia Conference of the Central Jurisdiction. Consequently we have met with representatives of this conference in order to find out what needs to be done to bring the Boards of Pensions into mutual acceptance of responsibility. The following information is pertinent to this responsibility.

a. The Pension rate per service year in the North Carolina-Virginia Conference is \$35.00. The rate in the North Carolina Conference is \$64.00.

b. The apportionment on the charges in the North Carolina-Virginia Conference is 17% of the pastor's salary. The rate in the North Carolina Conference is 16% of the pastors salary.

c. There are 20 charges of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference within the geographical bounds of our conference.

d. The North Carolina-Virginia Conference is a member of the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund, and provides Death Benefit and Disability Benefit to its members. The North Carolina Conference is not a member of the Minister's Reserve Pension Plan, does not have the Death Benefit. Our Disability is provided for in the Minister's Emergency Fund.

e. The North Carolina-Virginia Conference has a total of 190 Claimant years. In addition there are 317 effective years. This means that under our Current Fund pension program, we begin making payment now only on the 190 claimant years.

f. The total liability of these claimants is \$12,160. With the 17% apportionment on the pastor's salary, these 20 charges will pay, \$5,370 of this amount. This will leave a balance of \$6,790 to be assumed by this conference.

g. The North Carolina-Virginia Conference has a surplus fund of \$250,000 which will be divided proportionately between the Western North Carolina Conference, the Virginia Conference, and the North Carolina Conference. Since no formula has been worked out to date, we do not know how much this fund will provide.

Having considered all these matters, your Board of Pensions is prepared to accept this additional pension responsibility, and to work with the other Boards of Pensions to make the change and adjustment as harmonious as possible.

Report 6

APPROVED SUPPLY PASTORS

The Board of Pensions has been concerned over the definition of an Approved Supply minister as it relates to pension credit. On May 5, 1966 a committee composed of

representatives from The Board of Pensions, the Minimum Salary Commission, the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and the Cabinet met and made the following recommendation:

a. Definition of a student approved supply: "A student approved supply pastor is any approved supply pastor enrolled in college or theological school irregardless of salary."

b. We recommend to the Board of Pensions that a student approved supply pastor receive one-half year service credit for pension annuity for each year served as a student approved supply pastor, to begin with the conference year 1967-1968.

We accept both these recommendations, and recommend they be adopted at this session of our annual conference.

With the adoption of this recommendation, it is very important that the records of Full-time Approved Supply pastors and Student Approved Supply pastors be accurate. Therefore we request that Bishop Garber appoint a special committee, composed of the Conference Secretary, the secretary of the Board of Pensions, and a representative of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications to study the records of men in this category, and make appropriate recommendations to the annual conference.

Report 7

GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend special appropriations as follows: Miss Nannie Pattishall, an amount equal to a dependent child's annuity for 28 years service; Mrs. J. W. Smith, \$600, James E. Mahoney, one year's service credit, \$64.00, O. E. Hall, one year's service credit, \$64.00, Mrs. Innis Bross, \$450.

2. It has been a matter of confusion as to when the last check should be paid when the death of a claimant occurs. We recommend the following guide,

"If a claimant's death occurs after the monthly check has been mailed, his heirs may make use of the check as they see fit. If notice of death comes before the monthly checks are mailed, no additional payment will be made."

3. We request Bishop Garber to reappoint the committee which is making a study of the Minister's Pension Fund. Members of this committee are: two members of The World Service and Finance Commission, one lay and one ministerial; two members of The Cabinet; two members of the Board of Lay Activities; two members of the Board of Pensions, one lay and one ministerial; the secretary of the conference, and the secretary of the Conference Board of Trustees.

4. We recommend an honorarium of \$600.00, plus expenses, for the secretary of the Conference Board of Pensions.

5. We recommend the service records of the following persons be adjusted and that they be given credit for the service years indicated:

J. C. Dunn (1); Frank Parham (1); Clarence Pershing Mason (3); Harold M. Chrismon, Sr. (4); Edgar B. Fisher (1); Van E. Cash (3), and Argel H. Payne (¾). It is understood that this credit is given only for Full-Time Approved Supply service. No Student Supply service merits pension credit, prior to 1967.

6. Becoming a claimant in the North Carolina Conference presents new and sometimes difficult responsibilities. It is the desire of the Board of Pensions for every claimant to be completely informed about the services and benefits to which he is entitled through the Board of Pensions. Therefore, we are holding a workshop, June 27, 10:00 a.m. at the Methodist Building in Raleigh for the benefit of all persons who are retiring this conference year, and for all other persons who have previously retired or become claimants. At

this workshop representatives from Hospital Care Association, the Social Security Commission, the Internal Revenue Service, and the Board of Pensions will present information relating to their particular area which we feel will be of benefit to all our claimants. We will welcome your presence at this workshop.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON PROMOTION
AND CULTIVATION

We are now entering the last year of our Quadrennial Emphasis "One Witness In One World." This has been the most inspiring and meaningful Quadrennial Emphasis that our Methodist Church has yet adopted. This has been a "large" responsibility for our commission to promote and execute through every area and board of our conference, but it has been worth the effort.

For 1967-68 the adopted theme is "It will take every church—every Methodist to meet our goal." This theme carries the fourth stage of the Quadrennial Emphasis which is World Service and benevolence opportunities in the context of Christian Stewardship. Through the stewardship of every church . . . every Methodist we can meet our goal.

Report of Past Year's Activities

1966-67 Program and Activities:

1. Encouraged every pastor to initiate a program of education in his local church regarding our World Service and Advance Givings. January and February were set aside for this task to teach our people the great causes that are supported through this important work. Ample copies of films *Bridges* and *David's World* were purchased and placed in the TRAFCO Library for use in this program.

2. Continued calls for Neighborhood I volunteers were sent out. The need for "One Church" attitude among our people was kept before our conference. Through this Neighborhood I program we hope to reestablish the commitment of Methodist in North Carolina to the "One Church" or connectional church theology. We have reminded our people of the Biblical truth that the word "Churches" was not used by St. Paul. Always he said, "The Church at _____," reminding the people there was not many churches but One Church.

3. Annual Conference Display to tell the story of Advance Specials.

4. Promoted all World Service Specials and emergency calls and appeals.

5. Provided program at Annual Conference to tell our people the results of "Hurricane Betsy Appeal." Dr. Karl Tooke of the General Board of Missions was personally on the scene representing our church to make the emergency aid and assistance.

II. The following are some of the special emphasis in our plan of action for next year:

1. Implementation of the N-1 program in needed areas of each district. Opportunities of small churches or a new mission church who need specific leadership in any area such as music, teaching, visitation, etc. should be made known to the District Superintendents or District Lay Leaders. Each Pastor is asked to analyze his needs and present them to his district superintendent by September 15. The challenge to fill these needs will be sent out to all surrounding churches. We hope by this to bring more of a spirit of "Unity and Mission" to all our people. We hope to erase the distinction between who is "the giver and who is the receiver" and realize that we are One Church making One Witness. District Superintendents are requested to organize a District Committee for Community Action consisting of:

District Superintendent

District Director of Promotion and Cultivation

President of the District Woman's Society of Christian Service

District Lay Leader

District Director of Town and Country

District Director of General Church School Work

District Missionary Secretary

District Director of Christian Social Concerns

District Secretary of Evangelism

Each local church should designate a local church committee (such as the Commission on Missions and/or The Official Board) to study projects needed in each community and to face their own specific needs as well.

2. Annual Conference Stewardship Rally at Memorial Auditorium, November 6. This is for Chairman of Commission on Stewardship and Finance, Church General Fund Treasurer, Church Building Fund Treasurer, Church College Fund Chairman and Treasurer, President of Woman's Society of Christian Service, President of Methodist Men, Church Lay Leader, Chairman of Official Board, Stewardship Secretary, Pastor, and all members of Pastoral Relations Committee and the Commission on Stewardship and Finance. This rally is being sponsored in a joint effort by our Commission and the Conference Board of Lay Activities. It will speak to the task of Ministerial Support. Tithing, and will have a challenging address to the Conference on Christian Stewardship.

3. To show the following film strips to every Commission and Official Board: *David's World, Bridges*. They may be secured through TRAFICO Library, Methodist Building, Raleigh.

4. Acquaint each church with needs of Advance Specials, and observance of all special offerings for National and World Missions. To send out and promote all emergency calls.

Conclusion

Our purpose and goal is to help nurture and create an attitude of "One Witness In One World" throughout our conference. We are not many churches, but One Church. In the words of the great hymn:

"We are not divided,
All one body we,
One in hope and doctrine,
One in Charity."

METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

(*North Carolina Christian Advocate* and The Piedmont Press)

The Methodist Board of Publication, Inc., created jointly by the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences, is responsible for publishing the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and for operating the Piedmont Press.

We are glad to report that both organizations, which operate in conjunction with each other, are closing out a good year. Dr. James C. Stokes, who assumed the position of editor and manager around July 1, 1966, has worked diligently to make the *Advocate* an attractive and informative weekly paper for the Methodist people in North Carolina. In our opinion, this publication ranks among the very best of regional religious weeklies and deserves increasing support from North Carolina Methodists.

The present subscription list stands at approximately 12,000 and in recent months has shown a steady growth, which we feel will continue. Both Bishop Paul N. Garber and Bishop Earl C. Hunt, Jr. and their cabinets have pledged their full support to this end. Many pastors have likewise evidenced increasing interest and support.

The editor has indicated his confidence that within the next year, the number of subscribers can climb to 20,000. This would call for concerted and determined effort on the part of all concerned, including district superintendents, pastors, district directors of the *Advocate* and local church directors.

Since the *Advocate* exists to serve our churches and our institutions and can only serve by being used, we strongly urge our people during the coming conference year to work vigorously for the ever wider distribution of this important agency of our church in North Carolina.

At present the following schedule of annual subscription rates applies:

Every-Family churches—\$2.50 per subscription.

All-Official Board Plan and Club Plan (6 or more subscriptions)—\$2.75.

Individual subscriptions—\$3.00.

This schedule of rates has not increased since 1960, in spite of advancing costs, and we feel that the fifty issues per year are being offered to our people at a real bargain.

We give our approval and support to any proposed club subscription plan worked out whereby the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and *Together* magazine may be made available to our people in a package offer.

We recommend that a period of concentrated promotion of the *Advocate* be planned and carried out by every church and that if other dates are not used, the months of January and February be so designated.

We further recommend:

1. That every church set a minimum goal for this year of subscriptions equal to 5% of its membership (one for each 20 members) as reported in the current issue of the Conference *Journal*.

2. That every church provide a subscription to the *Advocate* for each member of the Official Board, financing this either through the budget or through some other plan.

3. That every church, under the leadership of the pastor, seriously consider and actively work toward making the *Advocate* available to every family, under our Every-Family Plan.

Turning to the Piedmont Press, we would call your attention to the fact that this printing establishment serves not only through the publication of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, but produces a great deal of printed matter for many agencies of the church, including colleges and other institutions, boards and committees, and local churches. This work is done by skilled and conscientious craftsmen at competitive prices. A modest profit from this enterprise is used to make up in part for a deficit from the *Christian Advocate* operation.

From year to year we have urged our churches and church-related institutions to patronize the Piedmont Press. We continue to urge this and suggest that our various Methodist organizations give their job printing, wherever possible, to the Piedmont Press. The *North Carolina Christian Advocate* is the only such publication, to our knowledge, which does not receive a subsidy. However, we need the profits from the Piedmont Press to make up for the deficits in the publishing of the *Advocate*.

Dr. Wilson O. Weldon from the Western North Carolina Conference and Dr. Charles

E. Jordan from the North Carolina Conference are hereby renominated for terms to expire in 1972.

The date of our annual audit has been changed from March 31 to October 31. Therefore, the following report is for only seven months—April 1, 1966 to October 31, 1966.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

For 178 years The Methodist Publishing House, created by the General Conference of 1789 as the publishing ministry of American Methodism, has continuously furnished the services of printing, publishing and distribution to The Methodist Church. That the church has used it is attested by its growth to the largest denominational publishing house in the world.

Noteworthy accomplishments of the past several years bear witness to the continued growth of Publishing House service—*The Interpreter's Bible*, *The Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible*, *History of American Methodism*, *Young Readers Bible*, *Book of Worship*, *The Methodist Hymnal*, and new curriculum materials for children. Each of these publishing achievements is making a significant contribution to the life and work of our church. Continued interest in and use of these publications is exemplified by the fact that 81,555 volumes of *The Interpreter's Bible*, published nearly fifteen years ago, were purchased by churches and individuals in 1966.

Cokesbury, the distributor of materials produced by our Publishing House, reports a fine reception of the new Methodist Hymnal with orders received for more than 2,650,000 copies as of December 31, 1966. The two millionth copy of the Hymnal was shipped in February, 1967.

Total circulation of *Together*, our church's family magazine, now stands at 690,000. Every Methodist church in the North Carolina Conference now has a *Together* agent, appointed by the pastor or official board, to promote use of the magazine as an effective tool in the total work of the church. *Together* agents are now established in more than 15,000 Methodist churches.

During the past year, a number of *Together* promotion campaigns were conducted on the episcopal area level. Results have been good. With the cooperation of our District Directors, increases in subscriptions to *Together* have been reported in almost every district in the North Carolina Conference.

The *Together Area News Edition* program, now in its sixteenth year, lists 32 supplements. The program is an important service of The Methodist Publishing House, designed to communicate news and information at the episcopal area, annual conference, district, and local church levels of our church.

More than 11,000 church libraries are now registered with Cokesbury. Your committee encourages the establishment of a library in every church to promote reading and study among church members.

Other highlights of recent Publishing House activity, as reported in *Focus On Service, 1966*, the Publishing House's annual report to the church, include the following:

—Graded Press received an American Film Festival Blue Ribbon Award for "Dealing With Conflict," a preferred children's filmstrip.

—Total distribution of Abingdon Weekly Church Bulletins amounted to 84,242,100.

—More than 170,000 copies of the *Young Readers Bible* have been purchased.

—Circulation of church school publications average 7,454,738 pieces per quarter in 1966.

—Abingdon published 105 new books during the year; thirteen were Book Club Guild selections.

—Net sales of products, used as a measure of service, reached \$33,827,441.

—The Board of Publication appropriated \$700,000 for the fourth consecutive year for the support of conference claimants. Of this amount, the North Carolina Conference received \$9,523,28.

The filmstrip "The Methodist Publishing House, What Is It? Where Is It?" continues to be a valuable tool for telling the Publishing house story. Copies have been distributed to conference chairmen and district secretaries of publishing interests and to numerous local church libraries. We encourage its use with church groups interested in knowing more about the general publishing work of Methodism.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RULES

Section II: Voting Procedures as amended and adopted by the 1966 Annual Conference.

1. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference *Journal*. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-ninth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

2. Election of Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences: Only clerical members in full connection and elected and registered lay delegates may vote. (Alternate lay delegates may not vote except in the absence of the delegates and then only if they are duly registered in lieu of the delegate.) All votes must be cast in the bar of the conference as determined by the conference; votes must be cast upon the official ballots authorized by the conference; ballots shall be placed by individual delegates in ballot boxes, whereupon the bishop shall declare the balloting closed.

The official ballots furnished to the delegates shall be numbered consecutively and no vote shall be valid unless cast upon the ballot bearing the number designated by the presiding officer for such particular balloting. In the event a ballot is detached, it may be exchanged at the secretary's desk for another ballot bearing the same number. Ballots furnished to lay delegates shall be different in color from those furnished by clerical delegates. Ballots shall be distributed to official delegates by the secretary at the time the presiding officer calls for the first ballot.

REPORT OF THE APPROVED SUPPLY PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1966 session of the Approved Pastors' Supply School was held on the Duke campus July 11-August 5, with Dr. W. Arthur Kale serving as director. The total enrollment was 238. By conferences, the enrollment was: North Carolina, 52; Western North Carolina, 63; Virginia, 39; South Carolina, 17; West Virginia, 37; Holston, 21; Florida, 6; Kentucky, 3; North Carolina-Virginia, 1. The enrollment by courses was: License to Preach, 28; Introductory Studies, 44; First Year, 44; Second Year, 38; Third Year, 38; Fourth Year, 44; Special Students, 2.

The full Methodist Course of Study was offered, including Studies for License to Preach. Members of the faculty were W. Warren Bishop, David G. Bradley, Robert B. Claytor, Earl P. Crow, Jr., Boyd L. Daniels, Frank E. Eakin, Jr., C. Wade Goldston, Frederick Herzog, Jack W. Moore, Mac L. Ricketts, John J. Rudin II, Harmon L. Smith, Donald J. Welch, Howard C. Wilkinson.

Scholarships in the amount of \$75 each were provided by the North Carolina Conference for men from this Conference who attended the full period of the school, the total amount being \$3,481.25.

Plans for 1967 Session

The 1967 school will be conducted on the Duke campus during the period July 10-August 4. The faculty will be composed of Paul Carruth, Robert B. Claytor, Boyd L.

Daniels, James M. Efrd, W. Arthur Kale, Eugene Long, Walter McDonald, Max Polley, McMurry S. Richey, Mac L. Ricketts, John J. Rudin II, Harmon L. Smith, William E. Smith, and Donald J. Welch. The new director for the Approved Supply Pastors' School is O. Kelly Ingram.

For the first time there will be offered this year two courses at the advanced level as proposed and authorized under paragraph 1373.1 of the *Discipline*.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY PASTORS' FELLOWSHIP

A Milestone

This year has been a milestone in the history of the Supply Pastors' Fellowship in that it has become better organized and has actively sought to improve the ministry of its members. Realizing the lack of formal education and experience needed to serve as pastors, the Fellowship has tried to better equip its members for service through fellowship and training opportunities.

The fellowship has been expressed through the meal at Annual Conference and contact with the membership during the year by a newsletter.

The Retreat at Louisburg College

One of the highlights of the year was a Planning Retreat held at Louisburg College in the latter part of August. The Retreat had three purposes:

1. To discuss problems that are evident in the Rural Church.
2. To suggest to the Committee on In-Service Training possible training opportunities designed to meet the need of the Supply Pastor.
3. To recommend suitable times, places, and dates to the Committee on In-Service Training.

The Fellowship at Louisburg College suggested that Clinics be held to help the Rural Supply Pastor in each of three areas:

1. Sex Education for Normal Living
2. Addiction to Narcotics and/or Alcohol
3. Church Administration

The Fellowship at that time expressed the desire to have the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications emphasize the training opportunities open to the Supply Pastor by the various Conference Agencies.

The Supply Pastors of the Fellowship also authorized their Cabinet of Officers to act as an Executive Committee.

Retreat Follow-Up

The Cabinet of the Fellowship met with the Committee on In-Service Training in November and presented the results of the Louisburg College Retreat. They were very appreciative of the suggestions and voted to implement them as soon as possible. It was decided to have a Clinic on Alcohol Addiction during the last week of December at Camp Chesnut Ridge with the Rev. F. Belton Joyner as the Dean of the Clinic.

The Clinic was held under the capable leadership of Dr. Norman A. Desrosiers, M. D., the Clinical Psychiatrist with the Alcoholic Rehabilitation Center at Butner, North Carolina.

The other Clinics will be held as they can be arranged.

Goals For A New Year

It is hoped that more of the Supply Pastors will take advantage of the opportunities presented to them to upgrade the level of their ministry by the Committee on In-Service Training and other Conference Agencies.

In view of the impending change in the Educational Requirements for Admission to Full Connection, it is hoped that the two Senior Colleges of our Conference will fully investigate the possibility of extending the three-year Associate of Arts degree program of Louisburg College into a six-year Bachelor of Arts degree program to aid the Supply Pastor. If such a program could be arranged, two benefits would result:

1. The Supply Pastor will meet the *minimum* educational requirements for admission into the North Carolina Annual Conference.

2. The Colleges will endear themselves to the Rural Church.

According to *The Discipline*, 1964 edition, Paragraph 667, ". . . Full-time approved supply pastors serving charges are eligible for election or appointment to . . . agencies (of the Annual Conference), except those dealing with qualifications, orders, and status of ministers and supply pastors." We thank the North Carolina Conference for

placing a few Approved Supply Pastors on its Boards and Agencies and urge the Conference consider the use of *more* than at present.

The Fellowship wishes to inform and advise all members of the North Carolina Conference delegation to the General Conference that it is in favor of the proposed ASSOCIATE ANNUAL CONFERENCE MEMBERSHIP for the full-time Approved Supply Pastor serving under Episcopal Appointment and favors the EARLIEST INITIATION of this by the General Conference of The Methodist Church.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION FUND

Ministers' *Emergency* Relief Fund

1. The Sustentation Fund is to be used for emergency relief in the form of grants to effective ministers and approved supply pastors serving appointments whose salary is paid by the local church or conference treasurer, and who becomes disabled to the extent that they are unable to continue their work, and whose income is not adequate to meet emergency needs.

2. Emergency appropriations shall be used to bring the disabled minister's income up to a maximum of \$4200 per conference year. If the applicant receives other personal income in excess of \$4200 such additional income shall be deducted from the emergency grant. In no event shall the emergency funds be used to supplement an applicant's income of \$4200 or above.

3. Payment of this \$4200 will be made on the basis of \$350 per month. Payments will be made only during those months the applicant qualifies for Emergency Relief Funds. No Funds will be appropriated without three-fourths approval of the Sustentation Fund Committee.

4. The Sustentation Fund Committee secretary must place all necessary forms in the hands of the Cabinet members at the beginning of each conference year.

5. In all cases the application forms—District Superintendent, the doctor, and the applicant—shall be completed and forwarded to the chairman of the committee before approval of funds will be made except in those special cases as defined in paragraph 7. Any minister expecting to receive Emergency Relief Funds at the beginning of the conference year should make application not later than two weeks before the annual conference convenes.

6. Funds will be made payable within thirty days following committee approval.

7. In cases where application for Emergency Funds occurs during the session of the annual conference, the applicant's District Superintendent, and the applicant when possible, shall present an oral application to a joint meeting of the Cabinet and at least three members of the Sustentation Fund Committee. At this time appropriate action will be taken in keeping with the best interest of the applicant and in the spirit of the Emergency Relief Fund. The written forms must be completed and placed with the committee within thirty days of this meeting.

8. All cases shall be reviewed at the middle of the conference year to determine progress made in each case. It shall be the responsibility of each applicants District Superintendent to see that the progress reports—statements from the doctor and the Superintendent—are completed and placed with the committee. Should this review of the applicants disability reveal that he is capable of resuming work, it shall be the responsibility of the Sustentation Fund Committee to bring this information to the attention of the Cabinet.

9. Should the disability continue beyond one year, we call attention to the fact that the Board of Pensions makes Medical Disability payments, based on a man's service years. We also call attention that it is possible that in some cases retirement may offer specific advantages over Emergency Relief Fund aid.

10. We recommend that the Minister's Emergency Relief Fund be continued as an appropriation equal to one percent of the pastor's salary in connection with the Minister's Retirement Fund. Travel and utility allowances are to be included in the salary apportionment.

11. We recommend that expenses of travel, telephone, postage, etc. for the committee be paid from the Emergency Relief Fund.

REPORT OF THE TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

Your Television, Radio and Film Commission continue to render valuable services to the churches of the Annual Conference through the Walton Memorial Audio-Visual Library, located in the Methodist Building, Raleigh, N. C. Our Librarian, Mrs. Robert Garrison is eager to help ministers and lay people with the film strips and films that are needed to promote the work of the local church. A new Audio-Visual Catalog is in process and will be of the loose-leaf type, so that supplements can be easily inserted. These supplements will be produced annually. We expect to distribute the new catalog in September 1967.

Our Commission is cooperating with General TRAFCO in promoting The Methodist TELEVISION VALUATION Project. The Project plan is for Annual Conferences to set October, 1967 as Television Valuation Month and to ask Methodists to view the new network TV shows (and locally produced programs), to evaluate and discuss their viewing experiences and to communicate with local TV station personnel about the programs. The General Commission on Promotion and Cultivation is co-sponsor of this project.

The Purpose of the Project is (1) to encourage the average person to become aware of the cultural and moral influence of television on him, his children and the society in which he lives, (2) to encourage and help him critically and creatively evaluate his television viewing experiences, (3) to offer him an opportunity to express his opinion about television viewing experiences as part of a nation-wide movement so that he can know that his voice will be heard, (4) to stimulate members of local churches to weave a concern about the impact of television on all people into the fabric of its programming throughout the year, (5) to provide opportunities for church leaders to speak out as individuals and as spokesmen for the Church concerning the creative use of television in today's world, (6) to encourage the television industry to air more creative programs as masses of people communicate their intention to use television more thoughtfully and creatively in their personal lives, (7) to stimulate more creative dialogue between church leaders (at all levels) and broadcast industry personnel, (8) to provide a foundation of knowledge and understanding which will undergird, with both personnel and finances, the broadcasting services and programs of the Church. Resource materials planned are: *Viewer's Guide*—for use in Methodist homes, designed to help viewers understand their role in making TV what it is right now, and now their roles can be changed so that television can more nearly fulfill its potential usefulness to modern society. This guide will be distributed by the District Directors of TRAFCO free of charge. The only cost to the local church will be in mailing them to their church families. Each pastor will receive an order card for the *Viewer's Guide*. The *Program Guide*—a plan book for pastors describes the Project and suggests how the local church may develop its own plan for full participation. This guide will be mailed to each of the pastors from the TRAFCO Library. Posters and a filmstrip with script will be available through TRAFCO for promotion purposes.

We recommend that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, the General Television, Radio and Film Commission of The Methodist Church has launched a TELEVISION VALUATION PROJECT designed to help Methodist use and influence television creatively, and

WHEREAS, your Conference TRAFCO organization believes that Methodist individuals and families in this conference should be encouraged to evaluate the moral, ethical, and cultural impact of television on their lives, and thus to express more responsible their proper role as Christians in determining what is broadcast and what the viewing experience may mean to the individual, and,

WHEREAS, General TRAFCO has recommended that all Methodists in the nation work together toward a concentrated expression of interest and concern in the month of October of 1967; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED: that the North Carolina Annual Conference designate the month of October, 1967, as "TELEVISION VALUATION MONTH" in this Annual Conference; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the ministers and laymen of this Annual Conference, at every level of administration, be encouraged to make it possible for every Methodist member and constituent in the conference to participate fully and creatively in this TELEVISION VALUATION PROJECT, by securing and distributing the free resource materials, and by creating opportunities for personal preparation in every local church in the conference.

September 10, 1967, has been designated as TRAFCO-TV Ministry Fund Sunday. We need the support of every church in the Conference through this fund. One half of the money stays in the Conference and is used for the Walton Memorial Audio-Visual Library. The other half goes to General TRAFCO to help produce Radio and TV programs. The latest of these is WONDER WINDOW, a new Television series for children. If you have TRAFCO-TV Ministry Fund in your budget, how about increasing it a bit. If you will take an offering on September 10, write to TRAFCO, Room 215, The Methodist Building, Raleigh, N. C. for offering envelopes.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Report No. 1

The Commission on Town and Country work has continued to strive toward the improvement of the ministry of The Methodist Church in the town and country areas of the North Carolina Annual Conference. Special emphasis has been placed upon three areas of work this year:

1—A *Local Church Program Analysis Guide* has been developed for the use in an Annual Rural Church Recognition Program sponsored by the Commission on Town and Country Work. Copies of this publication are available upon request. It is the desire of the Commission to help local churches strengthen their program of service and witness through better planning. Churches wishing to participate in the "Rural Church of the Year" recognition program will use the prepared *Guide* in their planning.

2—The Commission on Town and Country Work has been active this year, as in the past, in the In-Service Training Program of the North Carolina Annual Conference. In addition to sharing in the sponsorship of the Pastor's Conference on Evangelism and the Orientation Workshop for Pastor's New in the North Carolina Conference, the Commission sponsored the first District Consultation for Churches with Small Membership. The consultation was held in the Fayetteville District on February 23, 1967 under the leadership of the Reverend Paul G. Bunn, District Secretary of Town and Country Work. Similar consultations are to be held in other districts during 1967-68. The Commission has, also, given financial assistance and personal guidance to the Supply Pastor's Fellowship in its program of in-service training.

3—The Commission on Town and Country Work has worked with all of the boards and agencies of the annual conference with specific interest in developing the best possible program and leadership for the town and country churches of eastern North Carolina.

Report No. 2

Report of the Promotional Secretary

The greatest satisfaction that has come to this writer in the work of the Commission on Town and Country Work this year has been in the development of competent leaders in this vital area of the church's ministry. Several years ago you could count on one hand—and still have fingers left over—the outstanding persons who were knowledgeably informed and committed to the cause of the rural church in the North Carolina Conference. Today, we are fortunate to have a number of resource persons, from varied backgrounds, ranging from former missionaries to qualified laymen with specialized training in rural work, making significant contribution to the overall work of the commission.

The development of responsible leaders on the district level has been most encouraging. The prospect for the future is for a continuance in this direction as District Directors of Town and Country Work are increasingly looked upon as resource persons to give guidance in Town and Country program responsibilities. This will enable the promotional secretary to give the needed time toward effectively coordinating the total effort of the commission's activities.

Since prior to the beginning of the current quadrennium the executive personnel of the commission has been decreased from one full-time promotional secretary; plus one half-time executive chairman; plus one part-time research secretary, to the present one half-time promotional secretary. Under normal circumstances this might have been disastrous for the commission, were it not for the fact that many people have rallied to our support and as a result this "transition period" has not seriously affected the work of the commission.

The commission is still confronted by those of our annual conference who desire to de-emphasize the importance of Town and Country Work. Perhaps, we all need to be reminded that the North Carolina Conference represents one of the most heavily populated rural conferences in The Methodist Church. A total of over 1½ million persons are living in the *rural* areas of our conference.

Another interesting development in recent months has been the reversal of the importance given to dividing circuit charges into station appointments. The trend today appears to consider first the possibility of entering into a form of "cooperative ministry," involving two or more churches with small membership located in the same community or geographical area.

Out of this thinking has been proposed a series of District Consultations on Churches with Small Membership throughout the Southeast. The first of which, was held in the Fayetteville District on February 23, 1967 under the leadership of the Reverend Paul G. Bunn, District Secretary of Town and Country Work. The consultation was sponsored jointly by the Rural Church Committee of the Duke Endowment and the Commission on Town and Country Work. A more complete account of the consultation is covered in Report 3 of the commission.

The 1966 Annual Conference session adopted Report No. 4 of the commission recommending that a Rural Church Recognition Program be inaugurated in each district of the conference to honor those town and country churches making a vital witness in their community and to the total program of The Methodist Church. The commission has prepared for distribution copies of the Local Church Analysis Guide for use in the recognition program. The first awards are to be presented at the 1968 Annual Conference, during the Anniversary Hour of the Commission on Town and Country Work.

It should be noted that Dr. G. Ross Freeman, Associate Dean of the Candler School of Theology of Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia, was the guest speaker for the 1966 Annual Conference Anniversary of the Commission. Dr. Freeman's address emphasized the role of the church in meeting rural needs, and was well received by the conference.

A comprehensive report of the activities and responsibilities of the Promotional Secretary has been covered in a Job Analysis Report as requested by the Interboard Coordinating Council, along with other conference boards and agencies involving executive personnel. A copy of which is available to anyone interested.

Report No. 3

CONSULTATION ON CHURCHES WITH SMALL MEMBERSHIPS

The first Consultation on Churches with Small Memberships was held February 23 1967, at Victory Methodist Church, Fayetteville, North Carolina. Approximately fifty people representing 10 charges in the district attended the consultation. This consultation was a pilot project for the North Carolina Conference and the Southeastern Jurisdiction. In 1967-1968 such consultations are to be held in every district of the North Carolina Conference.

The program consisted of an invocation by Mr. Roy Turnage, Executive Secretary of the Commission on Town and Country Work for the North Carolina Conference; an orientation by Reverend Paul G. Bunn, Fayetteville District Secretary of the Commission on Town and Country Work; two addresses by Dr. Wilson Nesbitt and Dr. Daniel Schores, both of the Rural Church Office of Duke University; and open discussion. Reverend Barney Davidson, Fayetteville District Superintendent, closed the consultation with a benedictory prayer.

The need for a more adequate ministry for the church and a larger work load and salary for the minister was pointed out in detail. Possible answers lay in the following:

- Consolidations
- Co-operative ministry
- Larger parish
- Group ministry
- Ecumenical mergers
- Preaching points

We felt that this consultation was a beginning for future conversation and future consideration of the needs of churches with small memberships.

Below is a list of constructive criticisms drawn up from an evaluation made by district secretaries of the Commission on Town and Country and other key personnel present at this pilot presentation.

1—All agreed that the consultations should be carried out on a sub-district level, around tables, with churches coming on a staggered schedule to discuss their problems and possibilities;

2—All agreed that we need the benefit of qualified resource personnel;

3—All felt that a great deal of time should be given for discussion;

4—Some felt the economic should not be mentioned, or just casually so if at all; however, one response to that was "The economic is one of the few things that can be measured and compared, and a church—like an individual—does express its faith in what it does with its resources."

5—Use a panel of rural ministers and laymen along with highly trained leaders to get at the specific problems of the area.

It is believed that much of the above critical materials should be considered and

employed to make for more effective future consultations of churches with small memberships.

Report No. 4

COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY

Probably the greatest problem facing the North Carolina Conference at the present time is the shortage of ministers. In the nature of things this results in inadequate leadership among the weaker churches (here the best of leadership is needed). Most of these are rural. The causes of this situation are complex. Among them are: 1. the general shortage of personnel in all professions (caused by a smaller percentage of the population in the 22-32 age groupings coming at a time of expansion in the demands for all professional services); 2. the rapid expansion of the number of charges in the North Carolina Conference; and, 3. the relatively poor competitive salary position of the North Carolina Conference when compared with that of its neighboring conferences.

The first cause will continue for some time. It does appear, however, that since older men continue to respond to the call to relate themselves in service to the church, the church must develop strategies to enable it to utilize such within its personnel structures. These would include lay preaching, associate ministries, and specialized ministries.

The rapid pace of charge division in the North Carolina Conference has resulted in 20% of the charges having a membership of under 200; 33% under 250; 44% under 300; and 66% under 400. With such a high percentage of charges of small membership, demands for assistance in reaching even a minimum salary are extremely high. Hence, the conference must rely upon students and other untrained personnel. Whether we are willing to admit or not, a two or three point charge being served by a full-time, trained pastor should receive better leadership than a station being served by a student giving untrained and part-time service.

The non-competitive salary position of the North Carolina Conference is serious. The minimum salary commission of the conference has worked long and hard, and within the limits of possibility set by the problems above, it has pushed to the limits apparently possible. Nevertheless, even the minimum salary schedules projected for 1968-69 will not reach the schedule reached by the South Carolina Conference in 1964. The Virginia and Western North Carolina Conferences are only a little behind South Carolina. With respect to the average amount paid by churches of the conference for total pastoral income, in 1965 the North Carolina Conference ranked 69 among the church's 93 annual conferences as against South Carolina's 16, Virginia's 38, and Western North Carolina's 43. It is, furthermore, interesting to note that when the amount paid for minimum salary, travel, utilities, conference claims, district superintendent's fund, and the episcopal fund is added, the North Carolina's Conference's position is improved from 68 to 59 — a variation of 9 places (the average variation is about 3). The significant figure here is the amount needed for minimum salary. Here, again, the root cause (to a significant degree) is the large percentage of charges of small membership which must of necessity have their salaries supplemented.

In order to begin solving the problems of ministerial leadership and low salaries, the following strategies are proposed:

1. A close, hard look be given to each charge of less than 300 members. We recommend that beginning in 1968-69 conference year steps be made to bring each charge up to a minimum membership of 250 (church extension charges excepted) to the end that by the 1971-72 conference year there be no charge with a total membership under 250 (church extension charges excepted). Such a goal could be accomplished through imaginative use of various types of charge arrangements (see below).

2. An immediate program be developed to utilize trained personnel more effectively through cooperative parishes, extended ministries, larger parishes, group parishes, church mergers, yoked fields, federated churches, and community churches. A major goal of all such undertakings should be that the witness of the church become more effective through making it possible for untrained and/or part-time personnel to work with experienced, trained ministers.

3. The continuation and expansion of the conference's in-service training program. These should include a wide variety of opportunities: weekly courses for ministers, short courses for ministers and laymen, week-end, highly concentrated study for lay-

men in a center, whatever other form energy and imagination make possible. Curriculum possibilities for ministers and laymen are many: theology, church management, education, worship, music, pastoral care, preaching, leadership development, recreation, parish development, team or cooperative ministries, to list a few.

Report No. 5

COMMITTEE ON RECRUITMENT

In order to provide Methodist youth the opportunity of serving within the framework of the Church, it is proposed that the 1967 Annual Conference recommend that a committee on *Youth Services to the Churches* be established in each district of the conference. The Committee shall be composed of the following:

- The District Superintendent
- The District Director of Youth Work
- The District Secretary of Town and Country Work
- The District President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service
- The District Secretary of Missionary Personnel of the Woman's Society
- The District Director of Christian Vocations
- The District President of the Methodist Youth Fellowship
- The District Vice-President of the Methodist Youth Fellowship

The Committee is to find specific areas of need in the district; set up projects; recruit teams of High School Juniors and Seniors; train them for work in the projects, and provide counsel for them.

The purpose of the "Youth Service Committee" is two-fold: 1) to let youth know that the Church needs them, and 2) to provide them with the opportunity of serving. It is proposed that pilot projects be set up in one or two districts of the conference during the 1967-1968 Church Year.

Qualifications for young people taking part in the "District Youth Service" Projects shall be as follows:

- 1—High School Junior or Senior
- 2—Active in his own church, with a desire to serve
- 3—Approval from his pastor; youth counselor, and M.Y.F. President
- 4—Have the ability to get along with others.

The Committee on Recruitment offers the following suggestions:

1) That a good relationship be established between the residents of the area involved in a project and the "District Youth Service" team.

2) Consider the possibility of using Duke Endowment students as counselors.

3) Consider projects in the following establishment areas—

- The Pembroke Area
- The Salemburg Area
- The Raleigh Inner City Ministry
- Among Migrant Workers

4) Responsibility for training of the "Youth Service Teams" to be delegated to the following:

- Committee on Christian Vocations
- The Commission on Town and Country Work
- The Woman's Society of Christian Service
- The Board of Education
- The Duke Endowment

5) Publicity of Projects be given attention through adult and youth conferences; district newsletters; The North Carolina Christian Advocate, and the secular press.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

It is generally known that the Conference lost a valued member of the Board of Conference Trustees in the person of John M. Dozier who had served very faithfully for a number of years as a member of the Board and as Secretary of the Board from 1960 to 1966. Mr. Dozier accepted a high position at McAlester College, St. Paul, Minnesota, which, of course, necessitated his severing his connections with the North Carolina Annual Conference. His departure left a void in our midst which will be difficult for us to fill and we shall cherish his friendship in our association with him.

Our conference treasurer, Marvin J. Cowell, has been appointed as Secretary Pro-tem pending a full board meeting of our Board and election of a permanent secretary.

Acting in accordance with authorization approved by the Annual Conference 1966 reported on page 321 of the 1966 JOURNAL, the Conference Trustees executed a deed-of-trust to the Trustees of the Shiloh Memorial Association of Montgomery County to property formerly occupied by Shiloh Methodist Church. The deed provides that in case of future need of the property for church purposes, this conference may reclaim said property.

The financial statement of the Board of Trustees, submitted by the conference treasurer, showed that funds totaling \$339,199.23 were held by the Board for the Conference at June, 1966. The statement also showed total earnings for the year of \$17,278.22 on funds invested with Methodist Foundation, Inc. The sum of \$7,000.00 was transferred from current funds of the Board to the Board of Pensions at its request.

The audited report of the Conference Treasurer, which will appear in the Conference JOURNAL, will include a report of the current status of the funds of the Board of Trustees.

REPORT OF BOARD OF COLLEGE VISITORS

The Board of College Visitors of the North Carolina Annual Conference made their yearly tour of the colleges in the Conference area this year in April. As in the past, we were greatly impressed by the growth, student life, and program of our schools.

Physical progress is certainly being made. A fine new library will be ready for use when N. C. Wesleyan opens this fall. A new Administration-Fine Arts building is under construction at Methodist College, and an addition to the Student Union is planned. Additional buildings are also being planned for Louisburg.

In our meetings with the Administration, Faculty, and Students of our schools, we were impressed with the fine morale and esprit de corps that seemed present. There appears to be a fine relationship present between these three elements that must make up a school. We feel that this is possibly one of the reasons why there was a noticeable absence of the long-haired, bearded, beatnik types that seem to dominate so many of our college campuses today. This fact is also a testimony as to the fine type of young men and women who are attending our schools.

We feel, however, that further efforts should be made by the pastors and lay people of our conference to encourage more of our best youth to attend these fine schools. While the lower costs of state schools often greatly influence decisions as to what college to attend, a closer comparison would reveal that there is not such a difference as first seems apparent. Certainly we all need to emphasize the close, warm relationships between students and teachers that exist in our three Methodist colleges, that simply cannot be found at our state schools due to their larger size.

Finally, we would urge continued and increased financial support by the Annual Conference of our schools. They are wielding a tremendous influence in our area, and this fine Christian witness needs to be supported and broadened.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The Commission on Christian Vocations is charged with the responsibility to interpret Christian Vocations in general, church-related vocations in particular, and the ministry specifically. "The program, rooted in the local church, will center around three basic considerations: deepening the spiritual disciplines of young people and adults to accept the Lordship of Jesus Christ; development of pastoral and parental encouragement in helping individuals to understand the meaning of vocation and to respond to the needs of service; and conservation of decisions already made for church-related vocations through more effective programs of counseling and guidance.

I. Progress Report for 1966-67

1. We sponsored three "Christian Vocation Rallies" during the past conference year. These rallies were held on the campuses of Methodist College, N. C. Wesleyan College,

and Louisburg College. Senior and Junior-high youth were invited to these meetings. Approximately 700 young people attended.

2. Our District Directors sent each church a copy of the booklet, *Methodist Church Related Occupations and Short Term Projects, 1967*, which lists all church related occupations and short term projects. These were also sent to college and high school guidance personnel.

3. We prepared and, through the cooperation of the cabinet, made available a fourth quarterly conference report blank to be used by each local church committee to report its progress over the past year. One copy is returned to the District Director and then to the Commission on Christian Vocations.

4. Members of the executive committee attended a Regional Christian Vocation Workshop in Roanoke, Virginia.

5. We have encouraged our district directors to offer training to Local Church Committees, to assist in local career days in high schools, and to cooperate with the WSCS and other organizations in their districts in the interpretation of church-related occupations.

II. Plans and Recommendations for 1967-68

1. This commission will conduct "Campus Consultations on Church Related Occupations" on the campuses of Methodist College, N. C. Wesleyan College, Louisburg College, and possibly on other campuses in the conference if time and resources permit. The purpose of these consultations is to encourage those on the college campus who have already decided to enter church related occupations and to encourage others to consider such occupations. The exact time and dates for these meetings will be announced later.

2. We will sponsor a meeting of District Directors of Christian Vocations and WSCS District Secretaries of Missionary Personnel. Means of cooperation in district work and record keeping will be explored.

3. With the approval of the Youth Council and the Board of Education, we will cooperate in a "Weekend Encounter on Church Related Occupations."

4. We will order and distribute the 1968 *Methodist Church Related Occupations and Short Term Projects* booklets.

5. We will attempt to compile and distribute a listing of summer jobs in the local churches of the conference. We will make these available to college students who are seeking such employment in the summer of 1968.

6. We recommend that each district director collect and use the fourth quarterly conference report blanks which were given to each district superintendent as the report of the local church committee on Christian Vocations.

7. We recommend that each local MYF and subdistrict and district MYF have at least two programs on church related occupations during the next year.

8. We recommend wider use of the filmstrips in this area; these are available from TRAFECO.

9. We recommend and urge the observance of Ministry Sunday, May 19, 1968.

10. We recommend that local pastors and district directors cooperate with local school officials in promotion of Christian vocations by consultation with guidance counselors, through career days, and by making Christian vocations packets, booklets, etc. available to these counselors.

III. We Express Our Appreciation To:

1. The presidents, faculty members, and students of Methodist College, N. C. Wesleyan College, and Louisburg College for their warm hospitality and great assistance in our "Christian Vocations Rallies."

2. Rev. Kimsey King, Rev. Norwood Jones, Dr. James Hailey, Dr. Thomas Langford, Robert Versteeg, Rev. George Megill, Mr. Roger Searles, Mr. Leslie Page, Miss Carol Vensel, Miss Charity Holland, and Dr. Howard P. Powell for their immeasurable contribution to the success of our program during this year.

3. The Woman's Society of Christian Service for their assistance and for the scholarships which they make available to those entering church related occupations.

4. The cabinet for their continued support and cooperation and especially for their distribution and collection of the fourth quarterly conference report from the Local Church Committee on Christian Vocations.

5. The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, the Board of Education,

and all other conference boards and agencies who assist us with emphasis upon Christian Vocations.

6. The Conference Board of Lay Activities for its support for the generous "Lay Rally" offerings for scholarships for those entering church related occupations. Application blanks for these funds are available from the district director of Christian Vocations, the district superintendents, or the district lay leader.

7. Our district directors of Christian vocations: H. H. Cameron, J. L. Hunter, J. C. Alexander, Jr., J. S. Epperson, Dennis Ricks, W. T. Owens, H. W. Pearce, J. H. Kinkle, A. W. Winstead, H. S. Garris, Charles M. Smith, as well as the rest of our commission.

REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The Woman's Society of Christian Service with the Wesleyan Service Guild has had a good year.

The Spiritual Life Retreat held at Louisburg College last June was well attended. Over two hundred women received renewal of spirit through the meditations of Mrs. Donald Struchen and the music of Mr. Philip Cartwright.

The School of Christian Mission held at Methodist College last August was a success in the number attending and in carrying out the purpose of the School: to give leaders and potential teachers background and content of the topics to be studied in local churches, and techniques to be used in teaching the studies. For the first time the School was opened to members of the Central Jurisdiction living within the geographical bounds of the North Carolina Conference; fourteen women from the Central Jurisdiction attended.

In February, all officers and secretaries of lines of work of the Conference Executive Committee, with the chairmen of the committees on nominations and public relations attended the meeting of the Jurisdiction Woman's Society of Christian Service in Nashville, Tennessee. We enjoyed the speakers and benefited from the many hours of leadership training we received.

The annual meeting was held in March in Centenary Church in New Bern. Around seven hundred women gained new insight of our work through a varied program of meditations, addresses, and music.

The Woman's Society continues to give active co-operation to the agencies of the Annual Conference, specifically to the Board of Missions, the Commission on Town and Country Work, and the Commission on Christian Social Concerns.

Last September it was felt that one worker could carry the responsibility of both Church and Community workers in the Pembroke Area and Miss Martha Schlapbach left the area. In January of this year, Miss Joan Kiernan left to enter Scarritt College where she is working toward a Master's degree, preparatory to becoming a deaconess, so the participation of the National Division of the Board of Missions has been temporarily suspended in the area. The Raleigh Inner City ministry continues successful work under the leadership of Mrs. Iral Moore, Mrs. George Schock having left last summer. The first year of work for Miss Bernice Ballance as Church and Community Worker in the Salemburg area has been very rewarding.

We are pleased with the financial response the women make to the work of missions. Last year a total of \$243,612.33 was given by the Woman's Societies and Wesleyan Service Guilds, of which, \$219,958.33 was sent to the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church. \$2,500.00 was given as scholarships to four girls from our conference attending North Carolina Wesleyan, Methodist, Louisburg, and Scarritt Colleges, and \$3,000.00 was given as a love offering for the work in the Salemburg area. For the year 1967-68 we have made our largest pledge to missions, \$179,775.00. We anticipate that this, plus our supplementary giving, will bring our total giving to its highest mark.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE REPORT NO. 1

Your Commission on World Service and Finance has considered the needs and requests from the several Commissions, Boards, and Agencies of our Church and is including in this report recommendations we feel are the minimum amounts necessary to continue a basic, sound program. We are mindful of the responsibility which is ours and have sought divine and human guidance in our effort to be faithful in our task and responsibility to our Church. On the one hand we have been shown the tremendous needs which can be fulfilled only by additional funds. On the other hand we feel a tremendous responsibility to our people which compels us to make recommendations we believe are within our capabilities. The increases requested are small, and it is our hope that they will be accepted and paid in full by June 8, 1968.

In making our recommendation to you we call attention to the fact that we stand upon the threshold of the last year of the quadrennium. Next year we will be faced with a request from the General Conference for a major increase in World Service. Should our Conference in 1968 decide upon a major increase, it will necessitate greater increases in all local churches regardless of the formula decided upon by the Conference to determine the amount to be asked of each church or charge.

With faith in Christ and with confidence in those Christians listed as Methodists in our Conference, we make the following recommendations.

I

The ASKINGS by DISTRICTS for Benevolences Fund No. 7 for 1967-1968 are shown in Column A, and ASKINGS for Interdenominational Cooperation Fund are shown in Column B.

Allocations to the charges shall be made by the district superintendent for both Column A and Column B. Fund No. 7 Benevolences shall be distributed thus: Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptances up to the amount fixed in the budget. Any surplus shall be held by the conference treasurer to be expended by the Annual Conference upon recommendation of the Commission. In the event collections under Item No. 7 Benevolences shall fall short, the Commission recommends that the items for Connectional Funds (section III-A) shall be paid in full and likewise in full the items for World Service under Section III-B, Conference Benevolences under III-B, and Other Conference Benevolences III-C, shall be prorated on the basis of remaining receipts. We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance, subsequent to the distribution of these funds, shall be authorized to hear requests and to act upon same within the budget amounts in accordance with the judgment of the Commission by appropriation from any other available funds un-allocated.

At the close of the year the total amount realized from Fund No. 4 is to be divided by the Conference Treasurer as follows: one-half to Ministers' Retirement Fund and one-half for Sustentation Fund (DISCIPLINE 1964, Paragraph 828) for emergency aid to ministers of the conference who may be in special need.

The Commission report of approved requests for supplemental appropriations will be submitted in Report No. 2.

VI

Ministers Blue Cross Plan. The Commission on World Service and Finance recommends that this plan specifically include the district superintendents with the District Work Fund to bear the expense of two quarterly premiums and the plan also to include other traveling ministers appointed to positions with the boards, agencies and institutions with the board, agency or institution paying two of the quarterly premiums. We call attention to the fact that it is provided that the church or charge pay the premiums due October 1 and April 1. The minister bears the responsibility to see that the church treasurer or treasurer(s) make payments on or before October 1 and April 1; likewise the minister bears the responsibility to make his own payment on or before January 1 and July 1. The group contract provides for NO GRACE PERIOD. In completing the statistical report to Annual Conference, the local church payment will be reported under item 54 "Other Current Expenses."

VII

LIMITING AND SUPPLEMENTING PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE BUDGET

1. District Superintendents Fund.

(a) The salary of each of the district superintendents shall be set at \$11,500.00 including travel. Such part of said salary that is paid out by such district superintendent to cover the actual costs of all those utilities applicable to the operation and maintenance of his district parsonage is hereby assigned as housing expense not to exceed the sum of \$800.00 for heat, water, electrical services and residential telephone.

(b) To provide for Cabinet meeting expenses.

(c) We recommend that, beginning with the Conference Year 1968-1969 and continuing each year thereafter, an annual appropriation equal to twelve times the current annuity rate be made to the Conference Board of Pensions for each District Superintendent.

2. We approve the use of an amount up to \$3,000 to be provided by each district for the district superintendent for secretarial help and promotion of the district program.

3. The Commission recommends that each person who has authority to draw checks against an account of a conference agency be required to present annually to the full membership of his agency a complete list of all checks drawn, justifying all checks with the budget approved by his agency.

4. The Commission recommends that each agency whose accounts are not audited in the treasurer's office be required to have an annual audit made and furnish this commission with a copy of it.

5. Under the Church Extension Fund the first \$45,000 is earmarked to be paid to Board of Missions, Inc., for the revolving fund to be used for loans to build churches and/or acquire choice sites for new congregations or to repay money borrowed by Board of Missions, Inc.

6. The Commission recommends that no conference agency's budget incorporate within it funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

VIII

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the conference.

1. Christmas Offering 1967 for District Superintendents' program and/or projects, special projects should be clearly defined in plenty of time to have successful promotion.

2. The Board of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.

3. That the Board of Education be authorized to solicit from church groups and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the camps of the North Carolina Conference.

4. Wesley Foundation Commission for special gifts for the benefit of special works in the state-supported institutions.

5. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, for the privilege of receiving a special offering on Mothers' Day in the churches for the benevolent work of the Home and of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

6. The Methodist Home for Children for the privilege of receiving a special offering at the Thanksgiving season and of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

7. The Methodist Foundation, Inc., as provided in its charter.

8. The Town and Country Commission, Rural Church Fund, for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto

IX

We recommend to charge or church treasurers that they set up a schedule for remitting at a stated time each month and to close their year as early as possible. Final remittance should be mailed by Monday one week preceding the opening of Conference. By use of our data-processing equipment, in this time, we can summarize our current fund receipts and present this to our people at our Annual Conference session.

We recommend that local churches remit in 11 installments commencing on the first Monday in August and terminating the Monday preceding conference. They can be exactly or approximately equal. It simplifies the work of the local church treasurer for these periodic remittances to include one or several items in whole or in part rather than to remit one-eleventh of each and every item.

The pastors bear responsibility to check with their local treasurers for full remittance of all budgeted items and all funds collected as specials and to harmonize their reports to Annual Conference with Conference Treasurer's acknowledgments both received and pending. Pastors should compare and keep on file all acknowledgments and Data Processing reports from the conference treasurer. Errors if detected, should be reported.

We report the issuance of a Fidelity Bond in Employers Mutual Casualty Company of Des Moines, Iowa, to cover the conference treasurer in the amount of \$100,000.00 and to cover the assistant treasurer in the amount of \$25,000.00; others to a minimum of \$10,000.00 in said office. Also to cover others handling funds: Superintendent of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$50,000.00; Administrative Assistant of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$50,000.00; and others to the amount of \$10,000.00 in various offices. Executive Secretary Board of Missions, Inc., \$50,000.00; Inter-Conference Commission on Student and University Religious Work Treasurer, \$35,000.00.

We recommend the continuation of A. M. Pullen & Company as auditors.

In accordance with the action of the 1965 Annual Conference, the closing dates for our conference fiscal year will be as follows:

This change will bring our conference fiscal year in keeping with substantially all other annual conferences.

Report No. 2

SPECIAL RESOLUTION FROM COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE ON SINGLE FIGURE APPORTIONMENT

In accordance with the mandate given by the 1966 Annual Conference, North Carolina Conference Journal, 1966, Page 257 and 258, the Commission on World Service and Finance has made a study of the financial programs of most of the Conferences in the Southeastern Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church. We have considered suggestions made by the Long Range Planning Committee of our Conference.

We have attempted to formulate a financial program which would achieve the following goals:

1. No apportionment or asking be made by the Conference to any Charge based on percentage of Pastor's Salary.
2. All apportionments or askings to local charges should be equitable, with emphasis that no undue hardships be placed upon the small churches.
3. The financial program of the Conference should be simple for local churches and should have some flexibility during a quadrennium.

We, therefore, recommend:

- (a) That a "Single Figure Asking" be made of each Charge based on the "Grand Total Paid" as reported in the most recent Conference Journal beginning with the 1967 JOURNAL, less four items:
 1. Amount paid on Principal and Interest on Old Indebtedness, loans, mortgages, etc.
 2. Paid for Building and Improvements (not including Loans, Mortgages, etc.)
 3. Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.
 4. Conference Capital Expenditures: Colleges, Universities, Seminaries and Wesley Foundations, Camps, Methodist Home for Children, Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.
- (b) That the "Single Figure Asking" include Items 1-7, namely:
 1. District Superintendent's Fund.
 2. Episcopal Fund.
 3. Conference Pension Fund.
 4. Ministers' Retirement Fund and Emergency Relief Fund.
 5. Minimum Salary Fund.

- 6. Pastors' Moving Expense.
- 7. World Service and Conference Benevolences and Other Benevolences.

Also, that the following Special causes be included for specific amounts in the Single Figure Asking.

- 1. Christian Education Sunday.
- 2. TV Ministry.
- 3. Thanksgiving Offering.
- 4. Mother's Day Offering.

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved that the Commission provide each local church with a brief statement of each component part of the proposed budget, and that a sheet showing the amount in per cent be provided each year.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

During the past conference year, your Commission on Worship has sought to expose our people to the Wesleyan traditions and contemporary possibilities of Methodist worship. We have tried to view our work in the context of the total ministry of the total Church.

At our fall Planning Retreat, we studied papers presented at the National Methodist Convocation on Worship, and charted the year's opportunities.

In October, the Commission cooperated in the conference-wide workshop, "Introducing the New Methodist Hymnal."

Members of the Commission joined with personnel from the Board of Evangelism to present five seminars across the conference on "Baptism and Confirmation-Reception." We are grateful for the willing co-operation of the Board of Evangelism in this project. Copies of the Seminar study booklet are available from the Commission Secretary. The theme was "Celebrating God's Love."

Over fourteen hundred boys and girls attended the Bishop's Meeting with Young Methodists, held this year just before Palm Sunday at St. James Church, Greenville, and Edenton Street Church, Raleigh. Bishop Garber spoke on "Full and Responsible Membership," and then visited with the children in small groups. In Raleigh, there were also tours of The Methodist Building and The Methodist Home for Children.

The Commission was represented at the Southeastern Jurisdiction Association of Conference Commissions on Worship, meeting in Columbia, South Carolina.

We are glad that the Commission's suggestion was so well received to open annual conference with the celebration of the Holy Communion.

Our recommendations for the new conference year include:

(1) Our planning retreat will be at Camp Chestnut Ridge, September 21-22, 1967.
 (2) We shall conduct a Seminar on the Funeral Service in each district, between January 8 and January 31, 1968.

(3) In consultation with the Board of Education and the Board of Evangelism, we shall again sponsor the Bishop's Meeting with Young Methodists. Sessions will be held at Edenton Street Church, Raleigh, on March 23; at St. James Church, Greenville, on March 30; and at Hay Street Church, Fayetteville, on April 6.

(4) We encourage our pastors to help provide our Methodist people a common discipline of worship as suggested in the Book of Worship.

(5) We commend the revised Methodist Hymnal to the churches and underline the importance of its careful introduction to the congregations.

(6) There will be an effort to encourage the organization of local church Commissions on Worship, and we shall provide training experience for local Commissions.

CONSTITUTION AND ENABLING LEGISLATION: UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Plan of Union of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church to form The United Methodist Church.

The Constitution of United Methodist Church and Enabling Legislation.

The 1966 adjourned session of the 1964 General Conference, by a vote of 949 in favor and 40 opposed, approved the Proposed Constitution of the United Methodist Church and Enabling Legislation.

In accordance with paragraph 10 of the 1964 *Discipline* of The Methodist Church the General Conference submits the following proposed Constitution of the United Methodist Church and Enabling Legislation to the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Part I

THE CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

The church is a community of all true believers under the Lordship of Christ. It is the redeemed and redeeming fellowship in which the Word of God is preached by men divinely called, and the Sacraments are duly administered according to Christ's own appointment. Under the discipline of the Holy Spirit the church seeks to provide for the maintenance of worship, the edification of believers and the redemption of the world.

The Church of Jesus Christ exists in and for the world and its very dividedness is a hindrance to its mission in that world.

The prayers and intentions of The Methodist Church and The Evangelical United Brethren Church have been and are for obedience to the will of our Lord that His people

be one, in humility for the present brokenness of the church and in gratitude that opportunities for reunion have been given. In harmony with these prayers and intentions these churches do now propose to unite, in the confident assurance that this act is an expression of the oneness of Christ's people.

Conversations concerning union between the two churches and their constituent members have taken place over a long period of years and the churches have a long and impressive history of fellowship and cooperation.

Therefore, we, the Commissions on Church Union of The Methodist Church, and of The Evangelical United Brethren Church, holding that these churches are essentially one in origin, in belief, in spirit, and in purpose, and desiring that this essential unity be made actual in organization and administration in the United States of America and throughout the world, do hereby propose and transmit to our respective General Conferences the following Plan of Union and recommend to the two churches its adoption by the processes which they respectively require.

DIVISION ONE

¶ 1. *Art. I. Declaration of Union.*—The Evangelical United Brethren Church and The Methodist Church shall be united in one church. The united church, as thus constituted, is, and shall be, the ecclesiastical and legal successor of the two uniting churches.

¶ 2. *Art. II. Name.*—The name of the church shall be The United Methodist Church. The name of the church may be translated freely into languages other than English as the General Conference may determine.

¶ 3. *Art. III. Articles of Religion and the Confession of Faith.*—The Articles of Religion and the Confession of Faith shall be those currently held by The Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church, respectively.

¶ 4. *Art. IV. Inclusiveness of the Church.*—The United Methodist Church is a part of the Church Universal which is one Body in Christ. Therefore all persons, without regard to race, color, national origin, or economic condition, shall be eligible to attend its worship services, to participate in its programs, and, when they take the appropriate vows, to be admitted into its membership in any local church in the connection. In The United Methodist Church no conference or other organizational unit of the church shall be structured so as to exclude any member or any constituent body of the church because of race, color, national origin, or economic condition.

¶ 5. *Art. V. Ecumenical Relations.*—As part of the Church Universal, The United Methodist Church believes that the Lord of the Church is calling Christians everywhere to strive toward unity and therefore it will seek, and work for, unity at all levels of church life: through world relationships with other Methodist churches and united churches related to The Methodist Church or The Evangelical United Brethren Church, through councils of churches, and through plans of union with churches of Methodist or other denominational traditions.

¶ 6. *Art. VI. Title to Properties.*—Titles to properties in The Evangelical United Brethren Church and The Methodist Church shall, upon consummation of the union, automatically vest in The United Methodist Church. Nothing in the Plan of Union at any time after the union is to be construed so as to require any local church or any other property owner of the former The Evangelical United Brethren Church or the former The Methodist Church to alienate or in any way to change the title to property contained in its deed or deeds at the time of union; and any lapse of time or usage shall not affect said title or control.

DIVISION TWO—ORGANIZATION

Section I. Conferences.

¶ 7. *Art. I.*—There shall be a General Conference for the entire church with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth.

¶ 8. *Art. II.*—There shall be Jurisdictional Conferences for the church in the United States of America and Canada, with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth; *provided* that in The United Methodist Church there shall be no jurisdictional or central conference based on any ground other than geographical and regional division.

¶ 9. *Art. III.*—There shall be Central Conferences for the church outside the United States of America and Canada, and if necessary Provisional Central Conferences, all with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth.

¶ 10. *Art. IV.*—There shall be Annual Conferences as the fundamental bodies of the

church, and if necessary Provisional Annual Conferences, with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth.

¶ 11. *Art. V.*—There shall be a Charge Conference for each church or charge with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth.

Section II. General Conference.

¶ 12. *Art. I.*—The General Conference shall be composed of not less than 600 nor more than 1,000 delegates, one-half of whom shall be ministers and one-half lay members, to be elected by the Annual Conferences.

¶ 13. *Art. II.*—The General Conference shall meet in the month of April or May once in four years at such time and in such place as shall be determined by the General Conference or by its duly authorized committees.

A special session of General Conference, possessing the authority and exercising all the powers of the General Conference, may be called by the Council of Bishops, or in such other manner as the General Conference may from time to time prescribe, to meet at such time and in such place as may be stated in the call. Such special session of the General Conference shall be composed of the delegates to the preceding General Conference or their lawful successors, except that when a particular Annual Conference shall prefer to have a new election it may do so. The purpose of such special session shall be stated in the call and only such business shall be transacted as is in harmony with the purpose stated in such calls unless the General Conference by a two-thirds vote shall determine that other business may be transacted.

¶ 14. *Art. III.*—The General Conference shall fix the ratio of representation in the General, Jurisdictional, and Central Conferences from the Annual Conferences and the Provisional Annual Conferences, computed on a two-factor basis: (1) the number of ministerial members of the Annual Conference and (2) the number of church members in the Annual Conference; *provided* that each Annual Conference or Provisional Annual Conference, except for the Provisional Annual Conferences of a Central Conference or a Provisional Central Conference, shall be entitled to at least one ministerial and one lay delegate in the General Conference and also in the Jurisdictional or Central Conference.

¶ 15. *Art. IV.*—The General Conference shall have full legislative power over all matters distinctively connectional, and in the exercise of this power shall have authority as follows:

1. To define and fix the conditions, privileges, and duties of church membership which shall in every case be without reference to race or status.
2. To define and fix the powers and duties of elders, deacons, supply preachers, local preachers, exhorters and deaconesses.
3. To define and fix the powers and duties of Annual Conferences, Provisional Annual Conferences, Missionary Conferences and Missions, and of Central Conferences, District Conferences, Charge Conferences and Congregational Meetings.
4. To provide for the organization, promotion, and administration of the work of the church outside the United States of America and Canada.
5. To define and fix the powers, duties, and privileges of the episcopacy, to adopt a plan for the support of the bishops, to provide a uniform rule for their retirement, and to provide for the discontinuance of a bishop because of inefficiency or unacceptability.
6. To provide and revise the Hymnal and Ritual of the church and to regulate all matters relating to the form and mode of worship, subject to limitations of the first and second Restrictive Rules.
7. To provide a judicial system and a method of judicial procedure for the church, except as herein otherwise prescribed.
8. To initiate and to direct all connectional enterprises of the church, and to provide boards for their promotion and administration.
9. To determine and provide for raising and distributing funds necessary to carry on the work of the church.
10. To fix a uniform basis upon which bishops shall be elected by the Jurisdictional Conferences and to determine the number of bishops that may be elected by Central Conferences.
11. To select its presiding officers from the bishops, through a committee; *provided* that the bishops shall select from their own number the presiding officer of the opening session.
12. To change the number and the boundaries of Jurisdictional Conferences upon the consent of a majority of the Annual Conferences in each Jurisdictional Conference involved.

13. To establish such commissions for the general work of the church as may be deemed advisable.

14. To secure the rights and privileges of membership in all agencies, programs, and institutions in The United Methodist Church regardless of race or status.

15. To enact such other legislation as may be necessary, subject to the limitations and restrictions of the Constitution of the church.

Section III. Restrictive Rules.

¶ 16. *Art. I.*—The General Conference shall not revoke, alter, or change our Articles of Religion or establish any new standards or rules of doctrine contrary to our present existing and established standards of doctrine.

Art. II.—The General Conference shall not revoke, alter, or change our Confession of Faith.

¶ 17. *Art. III.*—The General Conference shall not change or alter any part or rule of our government so as to do away with episcopacy or destroy the plan of our itinerant general superintendency.

¶ 18. *Art. IV.*—The General Conference shall not do away with the privileges of our ministers of right to trial by a committee and of an appeal; neither shall it do away with the privileges of our members of right to trial before the church, or by a committee, and of an appeal.

¶ 19. *Art. V.*—The General Conference shall not revoke or change the "General Rules of our United Societies."

¶ 20. *Art. VI.*—The General Conference shall not appropriate the net income of the publishing houses, the book concerns, or the Chartered Fund to any purpose other than for the benefit of retired or disabled preachers, their wives, widows, and children or other beneficiaries of the ministerial pension systems.

¶ 21. *Art. VII.*—The General Conference shall not do away with the following rights, which are hereby defined: In order that The Evangelical United Brethren Church shall be assured of effective representation in The United Methodist Church it is agreed that at the level of the General Conference, Jurisdictional Conferences, and Central Conferences and on all boards and agencies at the Annual Conference, Central Conference, Jurisdictional Conference and General Conference levels, in every instance there shall be chosen, during the first three quadrenniums following union, at least twice the number of representatives coming from The Evangelical United Brethren Church membership as the relative numerical membership in said particular conference would indicate in relationship to the number of representatives coming from The Methodist Church, and further agreed that during such period every General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference, and if practical every Central Conference and Annual Conference, board, or agency, regardless of size, shall have at least one such representative, *provided* that this provision shall not be applied so as to give to representatives coming from The Evangelical United Brethren Church a majority position which, except for this provision, they would not have; and further *provided* that in the Germany Central Conference during the first three quadrenniums following union the relative number of representatives coming from the former Methodist Church and the former Evangelische Gemeinschaft shall be equal. The relative numerical membership shall be computed by taking the membership of The Evangelical United Brethren Church as reported immediately prior to union and the total membership of the particular conference immediately after union. The General Conference may adopt legislative rules designed to carry out the intent and spirit of this provision. At the termination of the first three quadrenniums following union, this Article VI shall be automatically deleted from the Constitution.

Section IV. Jurisdictional Conferences.

¶ 22. *Art. I.*—The Jurisdictional Conferences shall be composed of as many representatives from the Annual Conferences as shall be determined by a uniform basis established by the General Conference.

¶ 23. *Art. II.*—All Jurisdictional Conferences shall have the same status and the same privileges of action within the limits fixed by the Constitution. The ratio of representation of the Annual Conferences in the General Conference shall be the same for all Jurisdictional Conferences.

¶ 24. *Art. III.*—The General Conferences shall fix the basis of representation in the Jurisdictional Conferences; *provided* that the Jurisdictional Conferences shall be composed of an equal number of ministerial and lay delegates to be elected by the Annual Conferences and the Provisional Annual Conferences.

¶ 25. *Art. IV.*—Each Jurisdictional Conference shall meet at the time determined by the Council of Bishops or its delegated committee, each Jurisdictional Conference convening on the same date as the others and at a place selected by the Jurisdictional Committee on Entertainment, appointed by its College of Bishops unless such a committee has been appointed by the preceding Jurisdictional Conference.

¶ 26. *Art. V.*—The Jurisdictional Conferences shall have the following powers and duties and such others as may be conferred by the General Conferences:

1. To promote the evangelistic, educational, missionary, and benevolent interests of the church, and to provide for interests and institutions within their boundaries.

2. To elect bishops and to cooperate in carrying out such plans for their support as may be determined by the General Conference.

3. To establish and constitute Jurisdictional Conference boards as auxiliary to the general boards of the church as the need may appear, and to choose their representatives on the general boards in such manner as the General Conference may determine.

4. To determine the boundaries of their Annual Conference; *provided* that there shall be no Annual Conference with a membership of fewer than fifty ministers in full connection, except by the consent of the General Conference; and *provided* further that this provision shall not apply to Annual Conferences of the former The Evangelical United Brethren Church during the first three quadrenniums after union.

5. To make rules and regulations for the administration of the work of the church within the jurisdiction, subject to such powers as have been or shall be vested in the General Conference.

6. To appoint a Committee on Appeals to hear and determine the appeal of a traveling preacher of that jurisdiction from the decision of a trial committee.

¶ 27. *Art. I.*—There shall be Central Conferences for the work of church outside the United States of America and Canada with such duties, powers, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth. The number and boundaries of the Central Conferences shall be determined by the Uniting Conference. Subsequently the General Conference shall have authority to change the number and boundaries of Central Conferences. The Central Conferences shall have the duties, powers, and privileges hereinafter set forth.

¶ 28. *Art. II.*—The Central Conferences shall be composed of as many delegates as shall be determined by a basis established by the General Conference. The delegates shall be ministerial and lay in equal numbers.

¶ 29. *Art. III.*—The General Conferences shall meet within the year succeeding the meeting of the General Conference at such times and places as shall have been determined by the preceding respective Central Conferences or by commissions appointed by them, or by the General Conference. The date and place of the first meeting succeeding the Uniting Conference shall be fixed by the bishops of the respective Central Conferences, or in such manner as shall be determined by the General Conference.

¶ 30. *Art. IV.*—The Central Conferences shall have the following powers and duties and such others as may be conferred by the General Conference:

1. To promote the evangelistic, educational, missionary, social concern, and benevolent interests and institutions of the church within their own boundaries.

2. To elect the bishops for the respective Central Conferences in number as may be determined from time to time, upon a basis fixed by the General Conference, and to cooperate in carrying out such plans for the support of their bishops as may be determined by the General Conference.

3. To establish and constitute such Central Conference boards as may be required and to elect their administrative officers.

4. To determine the boundaries of the Annual Conferences within their respective areas.

5. To make such rules and regulations for the administration of the work within their boundaries including such changes and adaptations of the General Discipline as the conditions in the respective areas may require, subject to the powers that have been or shall be vested in the General Conference.

6. To appoint a Judicial Court to determine legal questions arising on the rules, regulations, and such revised, adapted, or new sections of the Central Conference Discipline enacted by the Central Conference.

7. To appoint a Committee on Appeals to hear and determine the appeal of a traveling preacher of that Central Conference from the decision of a Committee on Trial.

Section VI. Episcopal Administration in Central Conferences.

¶ 31. *Art. I.*—The bishops of the Central Conferences shall be elected by their respective Central Conferences and inducted into office in the historic manner.

¶ 32. *Art. II.*—The bishops of the Central Conferences shall have a membership in the Council of Bishops with vote.

¶ 33. *Art. III.*—The bishops of the Central Conferences shall preside in the sessions of their respective Central Conferences.

¶ 34. *Art. IV.*—The bishops of each Central Conference shall arrange the plan of episcopal visitation within their Central Conference.

¶ 35. *Art. V.*—The Council of Bishops may assign one of their number to visit each Central Conference. When so assigned the bishop shall be recognized as the accredited representative of the general church and when requested by a majority of the bishops resident in that conference may exercise therein the functions of the episcopacy.

Section VII. Annual Conferences.

¶ 36. *Art. I.*—The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the conference president of Woman's Society of Christian Service, the conference president of United Methodist Men, and the conference lay leader. Each charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. The lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The United Methodist Church.

¶ 37. *Art. II.*—The Annual Conference is the basic body in the church, and as such shall have reserved to it the right to vote on all constitutional amendments, on the election of ministerial and lay delegates to the General and the Jurisdictional or Central Conferences, on all matters relating to the character and conference relations of its ministerial members, and on the ordination of ministers, and such other rights as have not been delegated to the General Conference under the Constitution, with the exception that the lay members may not vote on matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of ministers. It shall discharge such duties and exercise such powers as the General Conference under the Constitution may determine.

¶ 38. *Art. III.*—The Annual Conference shall elect ministerial and lay delegates to the General Conference and to its Jurisdictional or Central Conference in the manner provided in this section, *Articles IV and V.* The persons first elected up to the number determined by the ratio for representation in the General Conference shall be representatives in that body. Additional delegates shall be elected to complete the number determined by the ratio for representation in the Jurisdictional or Central Conference, who, together with those first elected as above, shall be delegates in the Jurisdictional or Central Conference. The additional delegates to the Jurisdictional or Central Conference shall in the order of their election be the reserve delegates to the General Conference. The Annual Conference shall also elect reserve ministerial and lay delegates to the Jurisdictional or Central Conference as it may deem desirable.

¶ 39. *Art. IV.*—The ministerial delegates to the General Conference and to the Jurisdictional or Central Conference shall be elected by the ministerial members in full connection with the Annual Conference or Provisional Annual Conference; *provided* that such delegates shall have been traveling preachers in the constituent churches forming this union, or in The United Methodist Church, for at least four years next preceding their election and are in full connection with the Annual Conference or Provisional Annual Conference electing them when elected and at the time of holding the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences.

¶ 40. *Art. V.*—The lay delegates to the General Conference and to the Jurisdictional or Central Conferences shall be elected by the lay members of the Annual Conference or Provisional Annual Conference; *provided* that such delegates be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The United Methodist Church, for at least four years next preceding their election, and are members thereof within the Annual Conference electing them at the time of holding the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences.

¶ 41. *Art. VI.*—For a period of twelve years following union, Annual Conferences shall not have their names or boundaries changed without their consent; and during such period Annual Conferences formerly of The Evangelical United Brethren Church may in electing delegates to General, Jurisdictional, and Central Conferences and their Super-

intendents of Districts continue their time-honored methods, the provisions of Division Two, Section VII, *Arts. IV and V*; Division Two, Section VIII, *Art. IV*; and Division Three, *Art. IX*, notwithstanding; but nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the elimination of Annual Conferences based on race.

Section VIII. Boundaries.

¶ 42. *Art. I.*—The United Methodist Church shall have Jurisdictional Conferences made up as follows:

Northeastern—Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New York, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland, West Virginia, Delaware, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Province of Ontario.

Southeastern—Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, Mississippi.

North Central—Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota.

South Central—Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico.

Western—Washington, Idaho, Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Alaska, Hawaii, Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia.

¶ 43. *Art. II.*—The work of the church outside the United States of America and Canada may be formed into Central Conferences, the number and boundaries of which shall be determined by the Uniting Conference, the General Conference having authority subsequently to make changes in the number and boundaries.

¶ 44. *Art. III.*—Changes in the number, names, and boundaries of the Jurisdictional Conferences may be effected by the General Conference upon the consent of a majority of the Annual Conferences of each of the Jurisdictional Conferences involved.

¶ 45. *Art. IV.*—Changes in the number, names, and boundaries of the Annual Conferences may be effected by the Jurisdictional Conferences in the United States of America and Canada and by the Central Conferences outside the United States of America and Canada according to the provisions under the respective powers of the Jurisdictional and the Central Conferences.

¶ 46. *Art. V.—Transfer of Local Churches.* 1. A local church may be transferred from one Annual Conference to another in which it is geographically located upon approval by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting in each of the following:

(a) The Charge Conference.

(b) The Congregational Meeting of the local church.

(c) Each of the two Annual Conferences involved.

The vote shall be certified by the secretaries of the specified conferences or meeting to the bishops having supervision of the Annual Conferences involved, and upon their announcement of the required majorities the transfer shall immediately be effective.

2. The vote on approval of transfer shall be taken by each Annual Conference at its first session after the matter is submitted to it.

3. Transfers under the provisions of this article shall not be governed or restricted by other provisions of this Constitution relating to changes of boundaries of conferences.

Section IX. District Conferences.

¶ 47. *Art. I.*—There may be organized in an Annual Conference, District Conferences composed of such persons and invested with such powers as the General Conference may determine.

Section X. Charge Conferences.

¶ 48. *Art. I.*—There shall be organized in each charge a Charge Conference composed of such persons and invested with such powers as the General Conference shall provide.

¶ 49. *Art. II.—Election of Church Officers.* Unless the General Conference shall order otherwise, the officers of the church or churches constituting a charge shall be elected by the Charge Conference or by the members of said church or churches at a meeting called for that purpose, as may be arranged by the Charge Conference, unless the election is otherwise required by local church charters or state or provincial laws.

DIVISION THREE—EPISCOPAL SUPERVISION

¶ 50. *Art. I.*—There shall be a continuance of an episcopacy in The United Methodist Church, of like plan, powers, privileges, and duties as now exist in The Methodist Church and in The Evangelical United Brethren Church in all those matters in which they agree

and may be considered identical; and the differences between these historic episcopacies are deemed to be reconciled and harmonized by and in this Plan of Union and Constitution of The United Methodist Church and actions taken pursuant thereto so that a unified superintendency and episcopacy is hereby created and established of, in, and by those who now are and shall be bishops of The United Methodist Church; and the said episcopacy shall further have such powers, privileges, and duties as are herein set forth.

¶ 51. *Art. II.*—The bishops shall be elected by the respective Jurisdictional and Central Conferences and consecrated in the historic manner at such time and place as may be fixed by the General Conference for those elected by the jurisdictions and by each Central Conference for those elected by such Central Conference.

¶ 52. *Art. III.*—There shall be a Council of Bishops composed of all the bishops of The United Methodist Church. The council shall meet at least once a year and plan for the general oversight and promotion of the temporal and spiritual interests of the entire church and for carrying into effect the rules, regulations, and responsibilities prescribed and enjoined by the General Conference, and in accord with the provisions set forth in this Plan of Union.

¶ 53. *Art. IV.*—The bishops of each Jurisdictional and Central Conference shall constitute a College of Bishops and such College of Bishops shall arrange the plan of episcopal supervision of the Annual Conferences, Mission Conferences, and Missions within their respective territories.

¶ 54. *Art. V.*—The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected or to which they are transferred. Bishops may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision under the following conditions: (1) The transfer of bishops may be on either of two bases: (a) a jurisdiction which receives a bishop by transfer from another jurisdiction may transfer to that jurisdiction or to a third jurisdiction one of its own bishops eligible for transfer, so that the number transferred in by each jurisdiction shall be balanced by the number transferred out, or (b) a jurisdiction may receive a bishop from another jurisdiction and not transfer out a member of its own College of Bishops. (2) No bishop shall be transferred unless he shall have given his specific consent. (3) No bishop shall be eligible for transfer unless he shall have served one quadrennium in the jurisdiction which elected him to the episcopacy. (4) All such transfers shall require the approval by a majority vote of the members, present and voting, of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved after consideration by the Committees on Episcopacy. After the above procedures have been followed, the transferring bishop shall become a member of the receiving College of Bishops and shall be subject to residential assignment by that Jurisdictional Conference.

A bishop may be assigned by the Council of Bishops for presidential service or other temporary service in another jurisdiction than that which elected him, provided request is made by a majority of the bishops in the jurisdiction of the proposed service.

In the case of an emergency in any jurisdiction or Central Conference through the death or disability of a bishop or other cause, the Council of Bishops may assign a bishop from another jurisdiction or Central Conference to the work of the said jurisdiction or Central Conference with the consent of a majority of the bishops of that jurisdiction or Central Conference.

¶ 55. *Art. VI.*—The bishops, both active and retired, of The Evangelical United Brethren Church and of The Methodist Church at the time union is consummated, shall be bishops of The United Methodist Church.

The bishops of The Methodist Church elected by the jurisdictions, the active bishops of The Evangelical United Brethren Church at the time of union, and bishops elected by the jurisdictions of The United Methodist Church shall have life tenure. Each bishop elected by a Central Conference of The Methodist Church shall have such tenure as the Central Conference electing him shall have determined.

The Jurisdictional Conference shall elect a standing Committee on Episcopacy, to consist of one ministerial and one lay delegate from each Annual Conference, on nomination of the Annual Conference delegation. The committee shall review the work of the bishops, pass on their character and official administration, and report to the Jurisdictional Conference its findings for such action as the conference may deem appropriate within its constitutional warrant of power. The committee shall recommend the assignments of the bishops to their respective residences, for final action by the Jurisdictional Conference.

¶ 56. *Art. VII.*—A bishop presiding over an Annual, Central, or Jurisdictional Conference shall decide all questions of law coming before him in the regular business of a session; *provided* that such questions be presented in writing and that his decisions be recorded in the journal of the conference.

Such an episcopal decision shall not be authoritative except for the pending case until it shall have been passed upon by the Judicial Council. Each bishop shall report in writing annually all his decisions of law, with a syllabus of the same, to the Judicial Council, which shall affirm, modify, or reverse them.

¶ 57. *Art. VIII.*—The bishops of the several Jurisdictional and Central Conferences shall preside in the sessions of their respective conferences.

¶ 58. *Art. IX.*—In each Annual Conference there shall be one or more district superintendents who shall assist the bishop in the administration of the Annual Conference and shall have such responsibilities and term of office as the General Conference may determine.

¶ 59. *Art. X.*—The bishops shall appoint, after consultation with the district superintendents, ministers to the charges and they shall have such responsibilities and authorities as the General Conference shall prescribe.

DIVISION FOUR—THE JUDICIARY

¶ 60. *Art. I.*—There shall be a Judicial Council. The General Conference shall determine the number and qualifications of its members, their terms of office, and the method of election and the filling of vacancies.

¶ 61. *Art. II.*—The Judicial Council shall have authority:

1. To determine the constitutionality of any act of the General Conference upon an appeal of a majority of the Council of Bishops, or one-fifth of the members of the General Conference; and to determine the constitutionality of any act of a Jurisdictional or Central Conference upon an appeal of a majority of the bishops of that Jurisdictional or Central Conference or upon the appeal of one-fifth of the members of that Jurisdictional or Central Conference.

2. To hear and determine any appeal from a bishop's decision on a question of law made in the Annual Conference when said appeal has been made by one-fifth of that conference present and voting.

3. To pass upon decisions of law made by bishops in Annual Conferences.

4. To hear and determine the legality of any action taken therein by any General Conference board or Jurisdictional or Central Conference board or body, upon appeal by one-third of the members thereof, or upon request of the Council of Bishops or a majority of the bishops of a Jurisdictional or a Central Conference.

5. To have such other duties and powers as may be conferred upon it by the General Conference.

6. To provide its own methods of organization and procedure.

¶ 62. *Art. III.*—All decisions of the Judicial Council shall be final. When the Judicial Council shall declare unconstitutional any act of the General Conference then in session, that decision shall be reported back to that General Conference immediately.

¶ 63. *Art. IV.*—The General Conference shall establish for the church a judicial system which shall guarantee to our ministers a right to trial by a committee and an appeal and to our members a right to trial before the church, or by a committee, and an appeal.

DIVISION FIVE—AMENDMENTS

¶ 64. *Art. I.*—Amendments to the Constitution shall be made upon a two-thirds majority of the General Conference present and voting and a two-thirds affirmative vote of the aggregate number of members of the several Annual Conferences present and voting, except in the case of the first, second, and seventh Restrictive Rules which shall require a three-fourths majority of all the members of the Annual Conferences present and voting. The vote, after being completed, shall be canvassed by the Council of Bishops, and the amendment voted upon shall become effective upon their announcement of its having received the required majority.

¶ 65. *Art. II.*—Amendments to the Constitution may originate in either the General Conference or the Annual Conferences.

¶ 66. *Art. III.*—A Jurisdictional Conference may by a majority vote propose changes in the Constitution of the church, and such proposed changes shall be submitted to the next General Conference. If the General Conference adopts the measure by a two-thirds vote, it shall be submitted to the Annual Conferences according to the provision for amendments.

ENABLING LEGISLATION

The term "the Plan of Union" shall include:

- Enabling Legislation
- The Proposed Discipline for 1968

The latter includes:

- Historical Statement
- Part I—The Constitution
- Part II—Doctrinal Statements and
The General Rules
- Part III—Social Principles
- Part IV—Organization and Administration

2. The Plan of Union shall be acted upon by The Evangelical United Brethren Church in accordance with the procedures required by its Discipline, namely:

It shall require for adoption a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members of the General Conference present and voting thereon (§ 178) but the "Enabling Legislation" and "Part I—The Constitution" shall require for adopting a three-fourths affirmative vote of the members of the General Conference present and voting thereon and a two-thirds affirmative vote of the aggregate number of members of all the Annual Conferences in North America, present and voting thereon (§ 177). Favorable action by the General Conference and the Annual Conferences shall be deemed in compliance with the church's Constitutional Law and authority to remove from its Constitutional Law all material not covered by the new Constitution and to include to the extent appropriate such material elsewhere in the Discipline.

3. The Plan of Union shall be acted upon by The Methodist Church in accordance with the procedures required by its Discipline, namely:

It shall require for adoption a majority affirmative vote of the members of the General Conference present and voting thereon but the "Enabling Legislation" and "Part I—The Constitution" shall require for adoption a two-thirds majority of the General Conference present and voting and a two-thirds majority of all members of the several Annual Conferences present and voting (§§ 10-12)—unless the Judicial Council shall rule that a three-quarters majority is required. Favorable action by the General Conference and the Annual Conferences shall be deemed in compliance with the church's Constitution and authority to remove from its Constitution all material not covered by the new Constitution and to include to the extent appropriate such material elsewhere in the *Discipline*.

4. If the Plan of Union is adopted by the two 1966 General Conferences:

(A) The Evangelical United Brethren Church and The Methodist Church shall forthwith send to their respective Annual Conferences for action in 1967 the "Enabling Legislation" and "Part I—The Constitution."

(B) The Evangelical United Brethren Church shall make provision for the calling of a special session of its General Conference to meet in 1968 at the time and place of The Methodist Church General Conference of 1968.

(C) The two General Conferences shall make provision for appropriate commissions to continue the study and perfection of "Part IV—Organization and Administration" of the Plan of Union.

5. The Plan of Union having been adopted by the requisite votes of the respective Annual Conferences, in 1968 the two General Conferences shall meet separately for the transaction of any necessary business. Neither such General Conference, acting separately, shall have the right to alter or amend any part of the Plan of Union as adopted by the General Conferences of 1966.

6. Having completed their respective necessary business, the two General Conferences of 1968 shall unite for a Uniting Conference, all voting members of both General Conferences being voting members of the Uniting Conference; provided that, by vote of the Uniting Conference, it may at any time and from time to time suspend its business in order to permit the two General Conferences to meet separately for the preparation of nominations for the boards and agencies of The United Methodist Church or other necessary business. The two churches shall establish a joint agency or commission charged with the duty of preparing an appropriate celebration of unification.

7. The Plan of Union shall become effective when, in the course of the Uniting Conference's service of unification, the president of the Board of Bishops of The Evangelical United Brethren Church and the president of the Council of Bishops of The Methodist

Church shall announce, respectively, that the Plan of Union has been adopted by the requisite votes of their respective churches.

8. The Plan of Union contemplates that the administrative agencies of the church shall be unified and start functioning immediately upon the Plan of Union becoming effective, where necessary or advisable retaining separate units acting under the agency board. In unifying the work of the agencies there shall be, as between the two churches, an equitable distribution of administrative posts and no person presently employed shall be expected to serve at less than such person's compensation immediately prior to union. If, as a result of unification of agencies, personnel are required to change residence, the agency responsible will be expected to make reasonable provision for the costs involved.

9. The objective toward which the new church moves is an inclusive church with no overlapping of Annual Conference boundaries. The Plan of Union contemplates that unification of church structure shall take place in steps as follows:

Step One

(A) Upon the Plan of Union becoming effective all Annual Conferences of both uniting churches will automatically become part of a Jurisdiction or a Central Conference or a Provisional Central Conference of the united church, in each case as shown on the attached schedule.

Step Two

(B) Wherever in a Jurisdiction or in a Central Conference or in a Provisional Central Conference Annual Conference boundaries overlap, the Annual Conferences involved shall designate committees or agencies to study the possibility of, and bring about as soon as practicable and mutually agreeable, the uniting or rearranging of Annual Conferences and Annual Conference boundaries to the end that there shall be no overlapping of Annual Conference boundaries. Whenever in the uniting or rearranging of Annual Conference an itinerant preacher in full connection with a particular Annual Conference shall be transferred to another Annual Conference, he shall automatically be in full connection with such other Annual Conference irrespective of any tests which such Annual Conference may have regarding the admission of new members.

(C) Annual Conferences shall not, for a period of twelve years following union, have their names or boundaries changed without their consent (§ 41, Constitution—Division Two, Section VII, *Art. VI.*). This shall not prevent voluntary action by Annual Conferences and it is anticipated that most, and perhaps all, such Annual Conferences will have taken steps necessary to eliminate overlapping with other Annual Conferences substantially prior to the expiration of the specified time. At the end of the twelve years, if any such Annual Conferences still remain, authority to eliminate overlapping by the redefining of Annual Conference boundaries will vest in the jurisdiction (§ 26, Constitution—Division Two, Section IV, *Art. V*, Para. 4) or in the Central Conference (§ 30, Constitution—Division Two, Section V, *Art. IV*, Para 4), as the case may be; but nothing herein contained shall be construed as preventing the elimination of Annual Conferences based on race.

(D) So far as the Annual Conferences formerly of the Methodist Central Jurisdiction are concerned, efforts shall be made to carry out the "Plan of Action for the Elimination of the Central Jurisdiction" as adopted by the Methodist General Conference of 1964. This Plan of Action outlines and urges a procedure designed to bring about the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction by September 1, 1967. The carrying out of the Plan of Action was entrusted by the General Conference to a quadrennial Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations consisting of twenty-four (24) members, 4 (four) from each Jurisdiction, the four members in each case constituting a Jurisdictional Commission. The General Conference Commission of twenty-four is specifically charged:

10. If by September 1, 1967, for any reason the Central Jurisdiction shall not have been dissolved by the procedures of Amendment IX (§ 47ix), the commission shall draft a plan for its termination to report to the General Conference of 1968.

The 1966 session of the Methodist General Conference unmistakably expressed its determination to bring about not only the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction but also the merger of the separate Negro Annual Conferences formerly part of that Jurisdiction with the conferences of the Regional Jurisdictions and the elimination of any structural organization based on race. The resolution adopted by the General Conference and submitted by it to the other bodies named therein reads in part:

By the adoption of this resolution each Annual Conference, each Jurisdic-

tional Conference, the General Conference, each College of Bishops, and the Council of Bishops express their determination to do everything possible to bring about the elimination of any structural organization in the Methodist Church based on race at the earliest possible date and not later than the close of the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1972. They further express their earnest determination to do everything possible to develop greater understanding and brotherhood in Methodism as well as in the world.

Both renominations desire and intend that union shall in no way delay or impede, but rather facilitate, strengthen, encourage, and hasten such elimination of any racial structure or distinction.

Step Three

(E) The uniting of congregations will be encouraged wherever and whenever a single church can better serve the needs of the community.

11. The Uniting Conferences, by majority vote unless otherwise specified, shall have the following authorities:

(A) To adopt rules of order and make provision for presiding officers.

(B) To amend or alter any part of "Part IV—Organization and Administration" of the Discipline, which had been adopted in principle by the 1966 General Conferences, provided that if, upon a call, by motion of any delegate, seconded by another delegate from the same former denomination and supported by one-third of the members of that denomination voting, the members of the two former denominations shall vote separately, and in case of such vote by denominations no such amendment or alteration shall be effective unless adopted by vote of a majority of the delegates coming from The Evangelical United Brethren Church and a majority of the delegates coming from The Methodist Church, in each case at the time present and voting.

(C) To approve the use of a name or names for the church outside the United States and the translation of the name of the church into languages other than English (see ¶ 2; Constitution—Division One, *Art. II*).

(D) To recommend to the Annual Conferences of the church proposals for Constitutional Amendments so that, the requisite votes having been taken in the Annual Conferences (¶ 64), such Constitutional Amendments can become effective upon the General Conference of 1972 (or of a special session of the General Conference called for an earlier date) having taken the requisite vote (¶ 64). The Constitution, Division Five, *Art. II*, specifically provides that amendments to the Constitution may originate in either the General Conference or the Annual Conferences (¶ 65).

(E) To elect members to the General Conference agencies of the church for the quadrennium beginning in 1968 in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline, ¶ 718.1 which provides for the relative representation in such agencies upon nominations made as follows:

For those members which are to come from The Evangelical United Brethren Church membership, upon nomination by that church arrived at by such procedures as that church may determine and for those members which are to come from The Methodist Church membership, upon nomination by that church arrived at by such procedures as that church may determine.

(F) To establish for The United Methodist Church (a) a fiscal year, and (b) the date to be used as the date of its founding.

(G) Anything in the Constitutional Law of The Evangelical United Brethren Church, the Constitution of The Methodist Church or the Constitution of The United Methodist Church (see ¶ 54) to the contrary notwithstanding to assign bishops originally elected by the Central Jurisdiction, and not already assigned to a regional jurisdiction, and originally elected by The Evangelical United Brethren Church, who will be on the active list and eligible for assignment at the close of the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1968, to the five jurisdictions of the following basis: (A) There shall be assigned to each of the five jurisdictions at least one bishop originally elected by The Evangelical United Brethren Church; (B) The bishops originally elected by the Central Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church and not already assigned shall be assigned so that there shall be one bishop in the Southeastern Jurisdiction and one bishop in the South Central Jurisdiction and one bishop in the Western Jurisdiction; and (C) There shall be assigned to the Northeastern Jurisdiction and the North Central Jurisdiction, in each instance, an additional bishop originally elected by The Evangelical United Brethren Church. The bishops originally elected by the Central Jurisdiction shall be assigned as

recommended by The Methodist Council of Bishops and the bishops originally elected by The Evangelical United Brethren Church shall be assigned as recommended by that church's Board of Bishops. These assignments shall become effective upon the opening of the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1968.

This contemplates that there will come to the Union twenty-nine (29) active bishops originally elected by the regional jurisdictions, five (5) active bishops originally elected by the Central Jurisdiction and seven (7) active bishops originally elected by The Evangelical United Brethren Church, a total of forty-one (41). If before the Uniting Conference of 1968 there shall be a vacancy in the Board of Bishops of The Evangelical United Brethren Church, The Evangelical United Brethren Church shall be entitled in accordance with its procedures to elect to fill the vacancy. If before the Uniting Conference in 1968 there shall be one or more vacancies in the College of Bishops of the Central Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, upon the Plan of Union being adopted by the requisite vote in the Annual Conferences of The Evangelical United Brethren Church and of The Methodist Church, the Central Jurisdiction shall be entitled to a special session to elect to fill the vacancy or vacancies. On the basis of the Plan of Union and within the formula based on current membership, each regional jurisdiction in its 1968 Jurisdictional Conference may if it so desires elect at least one new bishop.

During the interim between the opening of the Uniting Conference of 1968 and the close of the Jurisdictional Conference of 1968, all bishops shall continue episcopal supervision of the Annual Conferences under their supervision at the time of the opening of the Uniting Conference.

At the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1968 each jurisdiction shall be entitled, but shall not be required, to elect additional bishops up to the number allowed. The number allowed shall be the number provided in the formula stated in the *Discipline* of The United Methodist Church (see ¶ 380) plus a temporary increase for the 1968-1972 quadrennium of one (1) (because of the assignment of a bishop originally elected by the Central Jurisdiction) but the prescribed quota otherwise provided for in the *Discipline* shall remain in force and in the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1972 and thereafter new elections shall be made up to the limit of such quota.

(H) To appoint special study commissions or *ad hoc* committees for the purpose of studying and making recommendations concerning creedal statements, statements of social principles, the structure and duties of boards and agencies or any other matters.

Resolution Approving Transfer of Methodist Student Center Property at East Carolina College, Greenville, N. C.

Whereas, legal title to the land and building occupied for several years as The Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College, Greenville, N. C., has been held in the

name of the Board of Trustees of Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church in Greenville, N. C.; and

Whereas, the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the North Carolina Annual Conference, and the Woman's Division of the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church contributed financially to the construction of said building; and

Whereas, the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, likewise contributed to financing the acquisition of the land and the construction of the building; and

Whereas, a separate corporation entitled "Wesley Foundation of Greenville, N. C., Inc." has been chartered under the laws of the State of North Carolina as a non-profit Corporation, and the charter of said Corporation provides that in the event of a dissolution and liquidation of said Corporation, seventy-five per cent of the funds resulting from such liquidation shall be paid to the Woman's Division of the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church, and twenty-five per cent shall be paid to the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church; and

Whereas, the Board of Directors of Wesley Foundation of Greenville, N. C., Inc. has requested that legal title to said land and building be transferred to said Corporation from the Board of Trustees of Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church, Greenville, N. C.;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, in regular session at Saint Paul Methodist Church, Goldsboro, N. C., June 14, 1967, that the request for transfer of legal title of said land and building to "Wesley Foundation of Greenville, North Carolina, Inc." be and the same hereby is approved and confirmed and the Board of Trustees of Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church in Greenville, North Carolina, Greenville District, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, be and it is hereby requested to execute such document or documents as may be necessary and proper to effect changes in the legal title as aforesaid.

Resolution to Establish a
 COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS
 For the North Carolina Conference

Whereas the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church participates in many ecumenical organizations, including the North Carolina Council of Churches and the National Council of Churches; and

Whereas The Methodist Church is now involved in two efforts at church union, namely, the E.U.B.-Methodist merger and the Consultation on Church Union; and

Whereas thirty-eight other Annual Conferences now have Ecumenical Commissions; and

Whereas it is right and proper for the North Carolina Annual Conference to be effectively represented and to receive reports and information about these matters; ,

Therefore, be it resolved that:

1. There shall be a quadrennial Commission on Ecumenical Affairs composed of members of The Methodist Church elected by the North Carolina Annual Conference on nomination of the Bishop and his Cabinet. These shall include the Methodist representatives living within the area of the North Carolina Annual Conference in the General Assembly or on the Executive Board of the North Carolina Council of Churches, in the voting body of the State Assembly or on the Executive Board of the Church Women United in North Carolina, in the General Assembly or on the General Board of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., in the Assembly of the World Council, on the General Commission on Ecumenical Affairs, on any General Conference Committee on Union, and any Official Methodist representative to the Consultation on Church Union or other ecumenical endeavors. Among the foregoing or in addition to them there shall be a member from each Methodist college in the Annual Conference, from the Duke Divinity School, and from the Cabinet. At the beginning of each quadrennium when the Commission is reconstituted there shall be among the foregoing or in addition to them at least one member from each district.

2. The Commission shall:

a. Through its members represent the Conference at ecumenical affairs;

b. Analyze the relationship of the North Carolina Conference to the pronouncements and actions of the ecumenical bodies and channel ecumenical materials to the churches and proper agencies of the Conference; and

c. Report to the Annual Conference on all ecumenical matters.

3. The Commission shall elect a president, vice-presidents to preside over sub-committees as needed, a secretary, and other officers as needed.

4. The Commission on World Service and Finance may make provisions for the support of the work of the Commission including mailing costs and traveling expenses of the Conference's official representatives to ecumenical bodies through a regularly budgeted item beginning in June of 1968.

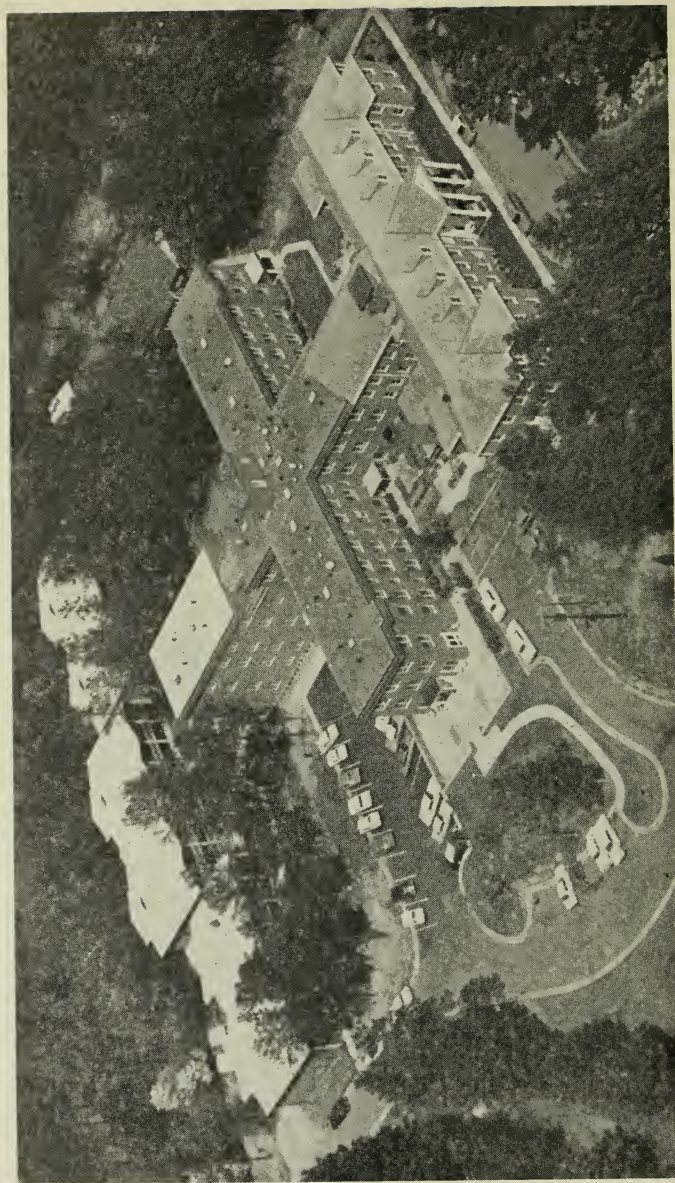
5. Vacancies in membership due to death or resignation between Annual Conferences shall be filled by the Bishop and his Cabinet until the next Annual Conference.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

The scope of our examination is contained in our opening letter. Certain features of the examination are set forth below.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges, as shown by the Treasurer's records, was confirmed directly with the pastors, and minor differences reported to us as of the date of this report were adjusted or satisfactorily explained.

Distribution of income from charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1966 and 1967 sessions of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorizations from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and of the various boards and funds were either inspected or, if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1966-67 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet and were set up from deposits in the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorization for the distribution of 1966-67 collections.
