

Pastor's Report November 2, 1995 Mark W. Wethington

As I have entered into a fourth year of ministry at Duke Memorial I possess an excitement, appreciation and optimism about this setting of ministry which is even stronger than when I first arrived. I am thankful for a place of ministry in which many of my gifts can be offered and are also welcomed. I continue to feel as if this particular setting of ministry, being urban and in proximity to a United Methodist seminary, allows my gifts to be used in ways which fulfill my call to ordained ministry and which serve the larger church. I very much enjoy the extending of Christ's ministry through this congregation into the downtown community, through mission involvements in housing, hunger, education, etc, particularly as it relates to the work of Durham Congregations in Action. In addition, my occasional teaching at the Duke Divinity School and our congregation's participation in the Divinity School's field education program (with six interns this year) allows me the opportunity to assist in the preparation of others for ordained ministry. The opportunity to mentor others in preparation for ordained ministry is another special part of the ministry to which I have felt called.

I continue to understand the overall ministry of a congregation under the Wesleyan rubric of the rule of discipleship. That is to say, all that we do comes under the "rule" of piety or mercy. Piety is promoted within this congregation by being attentive each week to serious preparation for Sunday worship; over the past year we have begun to offer an early Sunday morning weekly Eucharist service, acknowledging that it is important to offer to our membership the opportunity for Holy Communion each week; in addition, we offer special services during the higher holy seasons of the Christian year. We have also continued to promote personal growth in the Christian disciplines through Covenant Discipleship groups and other spiritual formation groups. Added to these are two annual Disciple Bible Study groups, along with seasonal short-term Bible studies and other prayer and study group opportunities. The nurturing of members also takes place through individual pastoral care, as well as through our program of Stephen Ministry, a caring ministry provided by trained laity (begun this year under the leadership of Ann Stallings and Sue Clifton). In late January I and five lay people will be going to Scarritt-Bennett Center in Nashville, TN to attend the First Annual Class Leaders Training Event. In accordance with the Book of Discipline P. 269 we plan to appoint and consecrate at least five persons this coming Spring (1996) as Class Leaders, who will be equipped and given responsibility for assisting and guiding others in developing their Christian discipleship.

In the area of mercy we have members very actively involved in outreach ministries both locally and globally. A multitude of members are involved in Habitat for Humanity, in various hunger and housing ministries, visitation of nursing homes, with the West End Community, etc. Outreach ministries of this congregation also include the generous use of our facilities for a variety of community ministries such as the training for Aids Care Teams, housing ministries, Meals on Wheels, Society of St. Andrew, DCIA, Interfaith Hospitality Network, AA, the Coordinating Council for Senior Citizens, etc. In addition to these outreach ministries in which we share there are those which we fully direct, such as the Parents Morning Out program and the Weekday School. Beyond the local community, this congregation continues to sponsor three missionaries, is planning to assist in the resettlement of a Cuban refugee family and will be sending another team of members to Peru early next year in continued support of the covenant relationship with brother and sister

Methodists in that country.


Many of us who are involved in the day by day ministries of this congregation see the enormous potential for ministry which still awaits us. We are enjoying the new families who are finding their way to Duke Memorial. We have sought diligently to find places of ministry for these persons. We also recognize that it is generally a special kind of person who is willing to venture out of suburbia, drive past many other churches and come into this downtown area (an area which others look upon with some fear and anxiety). Our new members are often persons who are particularly attracted to this special setting of ministry. We always treasure the adding of new faces and the creative gifts which each have to offer. Furthermore, we cherish the continued addition of new faces through "inbreeding", as we have added more babies to our flock and look forward to at least one more a month during the next 8 months, as reported to us by parents-to-be.

Although we continue to have many deaths, in part because we have many elderly members, we recognize this cycle as a blessed part of our total ministry. While we mourn the death, we also take seriously the celebration of the resurrection of each of these saints and understand every worship service of death and resurrection to be a confident affirmation of the gift of eternal life. This year we have been especially pained by the sudden death of two young members, Libby Averett and Rick Kaspar; we have offered special care to the spouses and to the children (11 in number) who have suffered great loss. I stand amazed at the follow up care that continues to be provided for these families by many different church members. The love and compassion shared during these times has been an overwhelming affirmation of the healing grace of God.

I cannot say enough to express my deep appreciation to the Staff-Parish Relations Committee of this congregation for their sincere and generous support of me and my ministry and family. And I can only offer praise for all the staff who work so very closely together in an atmosphere of friendship and with the shared joy we all find in being part of Christ's ministry in this place. Everyone goes way beyond what should be expected, often uncovering and offering new talents and creative possibilities for our common ministry. Being in ministry with Bob Irvine and Ann Stallings and with Louis Robinson and Mary Anne Holmes continues to offer delight, and, my appreciation for them and their gifts for ministry increases all the time. The weekly challenge often lies in the coordinating of our various responsibilities for the up building of the whole. And here the addition of Jan Irvine as Program Director has been a splendid blessing; she has done much in these past months to help us bring it all together. And last, but by far not least, I cannot offer enough thanksgiving for the addition of Lisa Brown Cole as a colleague in ordained ministry. She is very gifted in many ways and she brings a joy and enthusiasm for ministry which is appreciated by all. I rejoice in her being here and in the presence of her husband, Billy, and their daughter, Mary Beth. I look forward to equality in ministry with her and to our continued partnership.

Beyond all of these expressions of gratitude I give thanks to God for the strength and vision for ministry which are daily gifts. I continue to pray that all that I do may be done for God's glory. May God continue to bless us and give us growth in the year ahead.
