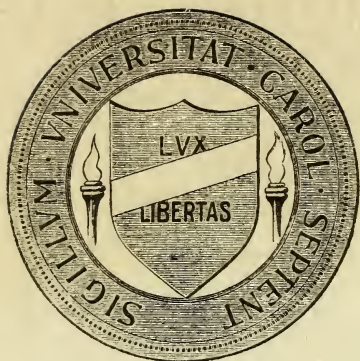

Address of the Rector

With this, our first Year Book, I, as your Rector, send to every member of the Parish a message of appreciation, thanksgiving, and encouragement. I wish here to express my appreciation of your unfailing kindness to me personally, and of your effort to make my work with you a happy work. I wish also to congratulate you on the good work you have been steadily doing, and join you in a thanksgiving to God for His blessing on all our efforts. Spiritually and materially we have much to be thankful for and rejoice in.



The purpose of this book is, first, to show by facts and figures how much we have to thank God for in the past and to inspire us with courage and confidence for the future. It shows what we have been enabled to do, by God's help, for the spread of His Kingdom, and points the way to greater things we yet may do. And, secondly, its purpose is to put into every member's hands a list of all the other members, that we may know each other better as brethren, and especially that we may know the new members and make them feel the true fellowship of the Church.



The material development of the Parish need not be reviewed here. The Choir Room, the improvements to the Parish House within and without, the painting of the church interior and exterior, the Memorials and Thank Offerings given for the equipment of the Church, the Study just built to the Rectory, and other like improvements, all speak for themselves. One item of \$300.00 in cash, laid on the Alms Basin as a Thank Offering, deserves special mention because it cannot speak for itself in a visible way. It was given anonymously, to help pay the debt on the furnace, and by adding something to it from the Parish treasury the furnace has been entirely paid for.



The list of actual communicants has reached the two hundred mark. I reported to the Council on May first 191 active members. Since that date other names have been added

bringing the number up to 200, a complete list of which is printed elsewhere. One hundred new members have been added to the Parish in the past two years, and the outlook for the future promises continued growth.



But whatever of blessing we may have had to call forth thanksgiving and gratitude to God, or whatever of our own efforts in the past we may be justly proud of, I trust you all feel with me that the future calls us to even more earnest endeavor. Added strength means added possibilities, and should inspire us to measure fully up to such possibilities. "Let us attempt greater things for God; let us expect greater things from God."



We can do greater things for God if every member helps. The strength of a parish is measured, not by the zeal and generosity of the few, but by the co-operation of all working together. We shall not realize our actual strength until every individual in the Parish is doing something, however little, regularly and systematically; and I shall not feel that we are doing our full duty as a congregation till every member is giving something and doing something systematically for the Master's work in the Master's Church. Our Lord spoke in unmeasured praise of the widow's mite cast into His treasury, much more than of the rich man's abundance cast in at the same time, and the poorest of us may win the same Divine approval by casting in our mite with the same conscientious fidelity. When all of us, without any exception, are moved by the Holy Spirit to do what we honestly can to show our love for our Lord, we shall come into the full measure of our strength as a congregation of God's people, and merit a fuller measure of God's blessing.



With this end in view, I endeavored recently to move every member of the Parish to have a share at least in the missionary and charitable work of the Church. I estimated the minimum amount we needed for missionary and charitable purposes, then sent out one hundred and fifty letters to one hundred and fifty members, stating the amount needed and the several objects for which it was asked, inviting each to make some contribution. Fifty-five of the hundred and fifty responded. After a reasonable time I sent envelopes of my own accord to fifty-two of the ninety-five not heard from, asking them to use the envelopes for such contributions as they felt disposed to make. Twelve of the fifty-two have contributed through these

envelopes. That makes sixty-seven altogether, out of a congregation of two hundred, who are contributing regularly to the missionary and charitable work of the Church.



In the matter of parochial support the same condition exists. The few are left to do what the many ought to do. Shall we not reverse this condition, and all be found doing something, before another Year Book is printed? Your contribution may not be but five cents a Sunday; but if it is all you can afford, and is given systematically out of love and loyalty to God, it will bring blessing to the Parish and merit for you the same approval bestowed upon the widow and her mite.



In emphasizing thus strongly the material side of our parish life I would not have you think me unmindful of its spiritual side. The one thing that can and will bring about the parish activity I have been speaking of is the unfeigned love of God in our hearts. If such love truly dwells in the heart it will express itself, not only in giving to God's work, but also by worshipping Him in the prayers and praises of His Church. We cannot love truly without showing it, and we cannot show our love to God more truly than by coming regularly to worship in His Sanctuary. If I hope to see every member of this Parish a regular contributor, I hope infinitely more to see every member a regular worshipper before God's Altar, and especially at the celebrations of the Holy Communion. If we come to worship our God and commune in spirit with Him only when it suits our convenience, our love for Him cannot be deep and we cannot in reason expect Him to bless us, spiritually or otherwise. I labor and pray, and I trust you to labor and to pray, for such a measure of the Holy Spirit in our hearts as will move us all both to work and to worship in such worthy way as to merit for us the blessing of heaven.



I cannot close this letter without acknowledging my indebtedness to our beloved Rector-Emeritus for his kindly sympathy, wise counsel, and loyal assistance in every good work I have tried to do since I took charge of the Parish. To him belongs a full share of grateful appreciation for such interest and assistance; and in behalf of the congregation, as well as for myself personally, I rejoice to do him the honor that is his due.

The object of this Guild is to carry out the commands of God to his people—"Reverence my sanctuary"—"Beautify the place of my sanctuary"—"Ye shall keep the charge of the sanctuary and the charge of the altar." All articles used on the altar or in the sanctuary are in the care of the members of this Guild, whose privilege it is to keep them in order, and to prepare and make ready for every service held in the church, under the direct control and supervision of the Rector.

This is no money making Guild. All that comes within the sanctuary or is put upon the altar must be a free-will offering. When the needs are beyond the ability of the members their duty is to make it known to the congregation, who respond by memorials or thank offerings.

The number of members is limited to twelve, divided into four sections, each having charge one week in each month, the whole working together at all the high festivals. None are admitted but those who have been confirmed.
