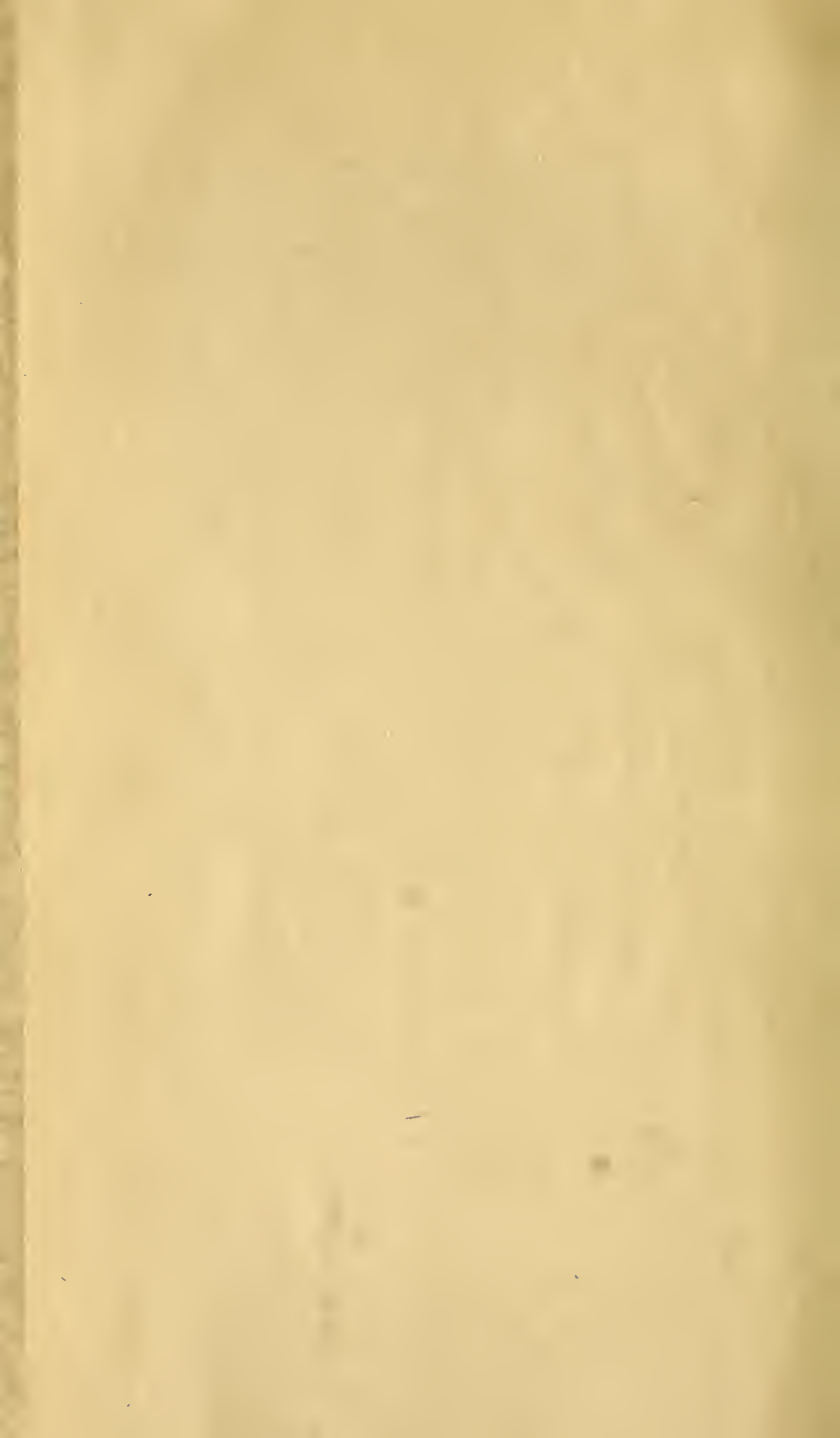

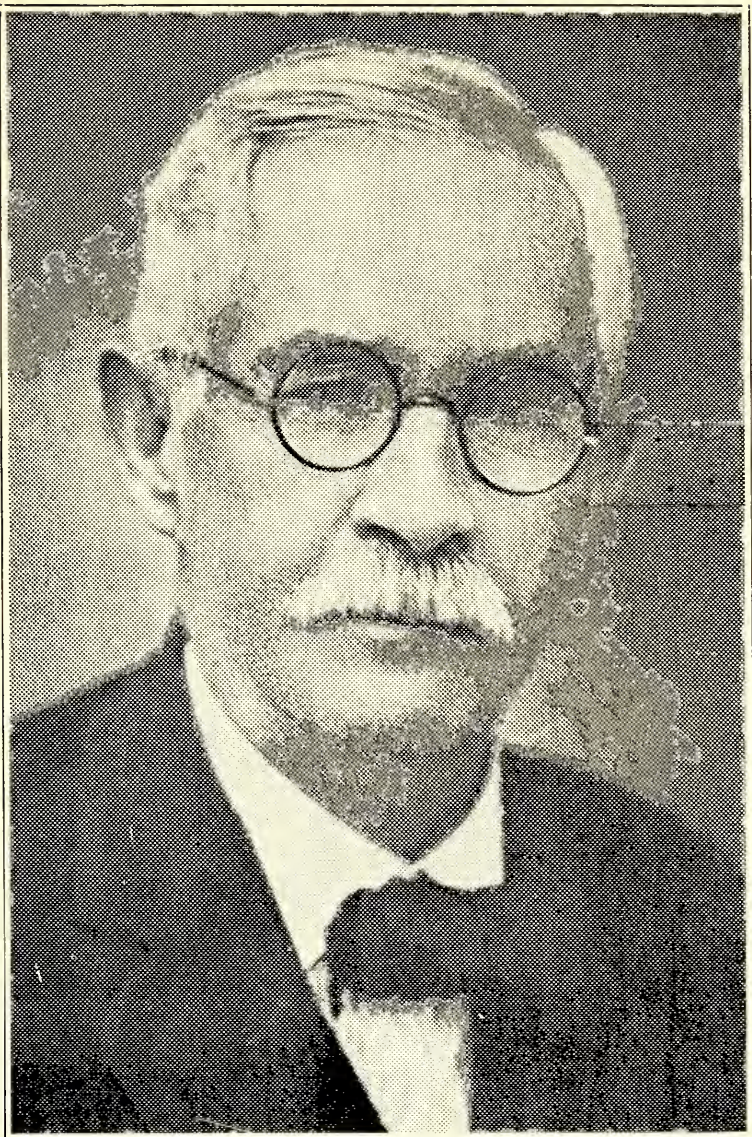

Born in Scotland (formerly Richmond County) North Carolina, August 29, 1859, the son of Duncan and Catherine Livingston Johnson. Educated at Spring Hill Academy. Married Flora McNeill Johnson, January 28, 1885. Children: Mrs. Charles F. Lambeth, Gerald W. Johnson, Mrs. B. W. Parham, Mrs. William D. Webb, and Miss Lois Johnson. Following brief teaching and mercantile career entered newspaper field first as Editor of *The Laurinburg Exchange* and in early 1895 founded *The Red Springs Citizen*. In September, 1895, he was called to Thomasville to become Editor of *Charity and Children* which post he occupied until his death which occurred at his home in Thomasville in the early morning of December 27, 1934. Buried at Riverton, Scotland County, in old Spring Hill Church Yard.

CONSTITUTION

I. NAME AND OBJECT

SECTION I. This body shall be known as the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

The object of the Convention shall be to promote Missions, Education, Social Service, the distribution and study of the Bible and sound religious literature; and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in its work.

II. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be composed of not more than three representatives from each white association in the State and not more than one representative from each co-operating church for every fifty members or fraction thereof and of the officers and members of the General Board of the Convention and of the Life Members so declared under the previous Constitution: *Provided*, that no church have more than ten representatives and no one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member in good standing of a Missionary Baptist Church co-operating with the Convention.

III. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Convention shall meet annually on Tuesday after the second Sunday in November.

IV. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a General Secretary, a Treasurer (the General Secretary may be elected as Treasurer at the discretion of the Convention), three Trustees of the Convention, and five Directors of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. The President, Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, General Secretary, and Treasurer shall be elected as the Convention may determine, the Trustees of the Convention and Directors of the Baptist Foundation, in the manner provided by their respective charters. The terms of office of President and Vice-Presidents commence at the conclusion of the session at which they are elected and continue until the close of the next Convention.

SEC. 2. The President shall preside over the deliberations of the Convention and discharge such other duties as are imposed upon him by the Convention or as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all Committees unless the Conven-

tion shall otherwise direct. In case of his absence or incapacity one of the Vice-Presidents shall act in his stead.

SEC. 3. The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the proceedings of the Convention and have the same printed and distributed.

SEC. 4. The General Secretary of the Convention shall have administrative supervision of the work of Missions, Education, Benevolences, and all other general training activities of the Convention. He shall employ a reputable auditor or firm of auditors each year to make a complete audit of the books and accounts of the treasurer and book-keeping department and report to the Executive Committee of the General Board, which shall receive and pass upon said report and have it published in the minutes of the Convention and in the *Biblical Recorder* or the then recognized denominational organ.

SEC. 5. The Treasurer shall receive all funds sent to him for the objects of the Convention, make acknowledgment of the same once a month in the *Biblical Recorder* or the then recognized denominational organ, give a bond to the Trustees of the Convention in such amount as they may determine for the faithful performance of his duties and prescribe the terms and conditions of said bond. He shall also forward at least once a month all contributions to their destination; at every meeting of the Convention he shall make a full report of his receipts and disbursements, and upon retiring from his office, deliver to his successor all moneys, papers, books and other property belonging thereto.

SEC. 6. The Trustees shall take and hold the title to any and all property acquired by and belonging to the Convention. They shall require a sufficient bond from the Treasurer. In case he shall refuse or neglect to give satisfactory bond within thirty days after his election the Trustees shall have power to elect a successor. The said Trustees shall elect a chairman and secretary and report annually to the Convention the work done by them. They shall receive and make such conveyances of the properties of the Convention as directed by the Convention. During the interim between sessions of the Convention the said Trustees may receive and convey the property of the Convention upon the advice and direction of the General Board.

V. GENERAL BOARD

SECTION 1. The General Board of the Convention shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention, *ex officio*, and forty-eight members from the State at large. The Convention shall elect one-third of the members from the State at large to hold office for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years, but as the terms expire the successors shall serve for terms of three years. * **That retiring members of the Board be ineligible for re-election until**

the following meeting of the State Convention. No one in the employment for pay of any Institution or Board fostered by this Convention shall be eligible to membership on this Board. The General Board shall fill all vacancies in its membership between the session of the Convention until the session of the next Convention, when the vacancies shall be filled by the Convention itself in the manner provided by its laws.

SEC. 2. The General Board shall have charge and control, except when otherwise directed by the Convention, of all work of the Convention, including Missions, Education, Benevolences, and all other general activities, in the interim between the sessions of the Convention. Any action by the General Board during the interim between the sessions of the Convention vitally related to the work of the Convention shall be binding upon the Convention: *Provided*, it shall not relate to any matter previously committed to some other agency of the Convention with power to act. But any action of the Board during the interim shall be reported fully to the Convention at its next session.

SEC. 3. The General Board shall report to each session of the Convention upon the work done in each department, viz.: Missions, Education, Benevolences and all other general activities. The Board shall have its report printed and ready for distribution at the first session of the Convention; all reports from Educational Institutions, Hospitals, Orphanages, Baptist Foundation, and all other institutions or agencies of the Convention shall report to the Convention through the General Board.

SEC. 4. The General Board of the Convention shall meet in regular session in December and June of each year, and in cases of emergency at the call of the President and General Secretary of the Board or any five members.

SEC. 5. At the first December meeting of the General Board the work of the Convention shall be divided as follows: Missions, Education, Benevolences and Training Activities. The membership of the General Board shall be divided into four committees of twelve each and the work as above outlined shall be assigned to these committees. Each committee shall organize itself by the selection of a chairman and a recording secretary. All appropriations for the work of the various departments of the General Board shall be made by the General Board; but each committee shall make to the General Board definite and specific recommendations as to all appropriations.

SEC. 6. The General Board shall select an Executive Committee consisting of the Chairman of the Committees on Missions, Education, Benevolences and Training Activities, the President of the General Board, and two other members of the General Board. The Executive

Committee shall meet at the call of the General Secretary and shall have general direction and oversight of all the work of the General Board in the interim between the sessions of the Board and such other matters as shall be assigned to it by the General Board.

SEC. 7. The General Board shall be successor in law to all legal obligations heretofore incurred by the Board of Missions and by the Board of Education.

SEC. 8. At each December meeting the General Board may select such other departmental assistants as may be needed.

VI. TRUSTEES OF CONVENTION'S INSTITUTION

SECTION 1. The charters of all institutions owned and supported by the Convention shall contain the following provisions as nearly as may be and conformable to the number of trustees to be elected, that is to say:

a. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall elect the trustees of said corporation and their regular term of office shall be four years. At the first election by the Convention one-fourth of the board of trustees shall be elected to serve for one year, one-fourth for two years, one-fourth for three years and the remaining one-fourth for four years. At each subsequent regular annual session of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina one-fourth of the members of the Board of Trustees of said corporation shall be elected by the Convention to succeed the members of said Board retiring.

b. The members of the Board of Trustees of said corporation shall be residents of the State of North Carolina and members in good and regular standing of a Missionary Baptist Church co-operating with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

c. Removal from the State or ceasing for any reason to be a member in good and regular standing of a Missionary Baptist Church co-operating with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be equivalent to a resignation from said Board of Trustees. Any vacancy on the Board shall be filled by the remaining members until the next regular annual session of the Convention and the Convention shall at its next regular annual session fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

d. The term of office of a trustee who has not resigned, died, become disqualified, or been removed shall not expire until his successor shall have been duly elected and qualified.

e. The Board of Trustees of said corporation by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of its entire membership, given in regular annual meeting or in a special meeting duly called for the purpose,

shall have power to remove from office any trustee of such corporation for cause considered sufficient by such Board, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee and opportunity to him to be heard by the Board.

f. The Baptist State Convention shall have the right at any time to remove from office any trustee for cause considered sufficient by the Convention, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee and opportunity for him to be heard by the Convention. Notice of such contemplated action and hearing by the Convention may be given by the Executive Committee of the Convention.

SEC. 2. The Trustees of all institutions, benevolent, educational or otherwise under the control of the Convention shall be elected by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and shall hold office for the term to which elected, unless sooner terminated. When any vacancy shall occur in any Board of any such institution a nominating committee elected by the Convention shall nominate to the Convention Baptists to fill such vacancy. The Trustees of all institutions owned and supported by the Convention shall make annual report to the nominating committee of any vacancies. Each Board shall have the right to make any suggestion to the nominating committee it may see fit regarding such nominations, and all nominations made by the committee shall be passed upon by the Convention. The Convention shall have the right to adopt the report of the nominating committee and elect the trustees thus nominated, or to substitute the name of other trustee or trustees in lieu thereof, or recommit said report for further consideration as the case may be.

VII. GENERAL ITEMS

SECTION 1. Individuals, churches, and associations, or others desiring the assistance and co-operation of the Baptists of the State in any work not already fostered by the Convention should present the question to the agency under which it should be properly placed. If the agency should refuse to take it up, it may be presented to the Convention under miscellaneous business or a special order.

SEC. 2. The members of the Boards of the Convention and Institutions affiliated with the Convention shall be distributed as widely as practicable, both as to territory and individuals.

SEC. 3. The Convention year shall close December 31 of each year.

SEC. 4. The compensation of all paid officers and employees of the Convention, the General Board, and its committees shall be fixed by the Executive Committee subject to review by the General Board at its next meeting.

SEC. 5. No institution or agency affiliating with the Convention shall

encumber its property or change its status with respect to the Convention without authority of the Convention or its General Board.

That except as may be necessary in the reasonable anticipation of current revenues and payable out of the same, or for the purpose of funding or refinancing any indebtedness of the Convention now outstanding, neither the Convention, nor its General Board shall have the power to create any debt or obligation binding on the Convention; and no other board, agency or institution of, or affiliated with the Convention, shall have the power at any time to create any debt or obligation binding on the Convention.

SEC. 6. If for any reason, it shall be necessary to select a place or to change the time or place of the meeting of the Convention after the Convention adjourns, the President, Recording Secretary and the General Secretary of the Convention shall be a committee with power to make necessary change or changes.

SEC. 7. This constitution may be changed or amended on any day of any annual session of the Convention by two-thirds vote of the members present when the vote is taken, provided notice of the contemplated amendment or change shall have been announced on a previous day of the Convention.

BY-LAWS OF THE GENERAL BOARD

I. THE PRESIDENT AND RECORDING SECRETARY

The President of the General Board, in addition to the regular duties incumbent upon such officers, shall appoint special committees to investigate and report upon any matters which concern equally all departments of the work of the Convention. The Secretary shall record all proceedings in correct form and preserve the same.

II. OFFICERS, SECRETARIES AND DEPARTMENTAL ASSISTANTS

At the annual December meeting of the General Board, there shall be elected the following officers, who shall serve for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified: President, Vice-President and Recording Secretary.

At the same time the Board shall elect all Departmental Heads and such other assistants as may from time to time be deemed necessary, and shall fix compensation of its Secretaries and other employees.

III. QUORUM

Seventeen members shall be required to constitute a quorum of the Board. Five shall be required to constitute a quorum of any Depart-

ment. Four shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Committee of the General Board.

IV. THE WORK OF THE GENERAL BOARD

The work of the General Board shall be apportioned among its four divisions, in so far as may be practicable, as indicated below. The General Board, the Executive Committee of the General Board and the General Secretary (48 members exclusive of the President and Secretary of the Convention, who are *ex officio* members) :

1. *Department of Missions*—(12) Secretary of Missions—Division of (1) Field Work; (2) Evangelism; (3) Negro Work.

2. *Department of Training*—(12)—Secretary of Training—Division of (1) Sunday Schools—Secretary; (2) B. Y. P. U.—Secretary; (3) Student Activities.

3. *Department of Benevolences*—(12)—Secretary of Benevolences—Division of (1) Orphanage; (2) Hospital; (3) Ministers' Relief.

4. *Department of Education*—(12)—Secretary of Education—Division of (1) Educational Institution; (2) Ministerial Education.

5. *Department of Woman's Missionary Union*.

The Executive Committee shall have power in its discretion, to modify, enlarge, diminish, or otherwise alter the divisions of the work of the Board as it may from time to time deem advisable or necessary, the changes so made to be reported to the next regular meeting of the General Board for its consideration.

V. UNDESIGNATED GIFTS

The General Board at its annual meeting shall determine the percentage of undesignated gifts that each object of the Convention shall receive, including State and South-wide, provided always that any allocation of such funds shall not violate any order with respect to the same previously made by the Baptist State Convention.

VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee shall have power to borrow money and execute notes on behalf of the General Board for the purpose of meeting the obligations of said Board, and to do and perform any act incidental to or necessary in the execution and discharge of the work of the General Board: *Provided*, the Executive Committee shall not incur obligations for any object in excess of the budget fixed by the General Board. Notes may be executed in the name of the General Board and on its behalf by the Chairman of the Executive Committee attested by the General Secretary, and when so executed by authority of the Executive

Committee duly give, shall be the binding obligation of the General Board.

The Executive Committee of the General Board shall meet in regular session at ten a.m., on Tuesday following the first Sunday in each month, but it may meet in called session at any other time upon call of the General Secretary.

VII. SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

His duties, together with all other Departmental Heads, or Assistants, shall be determined from time to time by the General Board.

VIII. EXECUTIVE SESSION

The General Board may by a majority vote of the number present, go into executive session at any time for the purpose of considering such matters as may claim the consideration of said Board.

IX. AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a majority vote of the members attending said meeting.

X. PUBLICATION

These by-laws, together with any amendments that may be made thereon, from time to time, shall be printed in the Minutes of the Baptist State Convention.

They were each assured by President Wall that the Convention was happy to welcome them into the fellowship of the Baptist State Convention.

12. President Wall recognized General Secretary Huggins who brought as a matter of information at this time his report included and previously distributed in printed form under the title "Advance Report of the General Board", calling special attention to the twenty-two Convention Objectives adopted by the 1933 Convention. (See page 72, Section 104). The Convention joyfully noted that objective sixteen is within our reach. Secretary Huggins said that on November 11, 1934 he announced at the New Bern Convention total gifts received at \$327,039.00. Between that date and the close of 1934 the churches gave an additional \$114,287.00. Reading a telegram just received from the Raleigh office it was found that \$362,114.00 had been received through the morning of November 12, 1935. Brother Huggins made this observation: "If you good pastors will send to us \$137,886.00 between this date and the close of 1935 we will attain our goal of One Half Million Dollars annual income of designated and undesignated funds."

13. A. I. Justice, Hendersonville led the Convention in a prayer of thanksgiving for the noble work of the pastors, workers, and churches during the past year as reflected in the report read by Secretary Huggins.

14. Editor J. S. Farmer, read as a matter of information a report on the *Biblical Recorder* to be followed by a discussion of this publication in which Brethren W. G. McGee, Burlington, J. Clifton Allen, and R. E. Hardaway, Lenoir, took part.

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER

On the first of last January the *Biblical Recorder's* second century of service to the Baptists of North Carolina was begun. Possibly no issue of the *Recorder* in its long history has been more acceptable than the Centennial issue, which was the first one of this year.

Our subscription list stands almost exactly the same as a year ago, which is 10,600. The need of increasing the circulation is more urgent than a year ago. Though we have made our best effort to increase

the circulation, counting the losses of the summer months, we have not been able to make any gain. If the *Biblical Recorder* is to render the service which was in the mind of Thomas Meredith when he founded the paper, and which has been in the mind of every editor from then until now—namely, to help the Baptists of North Carolina carry forward their work in a substantial way—we *must* increase the circulation. We again ask the Convention to authorize its General Board to co-operate with the Biblical Recorder Publishing Company in this effort. We hope to make a thorough canvass of the Baptists of the State for subscriptions during the coming year, but to do this we must have the co-operation of the pastors and churches.

If denominational ownership will cause the Baptists of North Carolina to put the *Recorder* in the homes of our people, the Biblical Recorder Publishing Company is ready any day to sell the *Biblical Recorder* to the Convention on terms satisfactory to both parties. The future development of our people is dependent upon the right sort of information concerning the Kingdom of Christ. With this in view, we once more urge the importance of this Convention giving serious thought to authorizing its General Board to join the Biblical Recorder Publishing Company in an effort to increasing the *Recorder's* circulation.

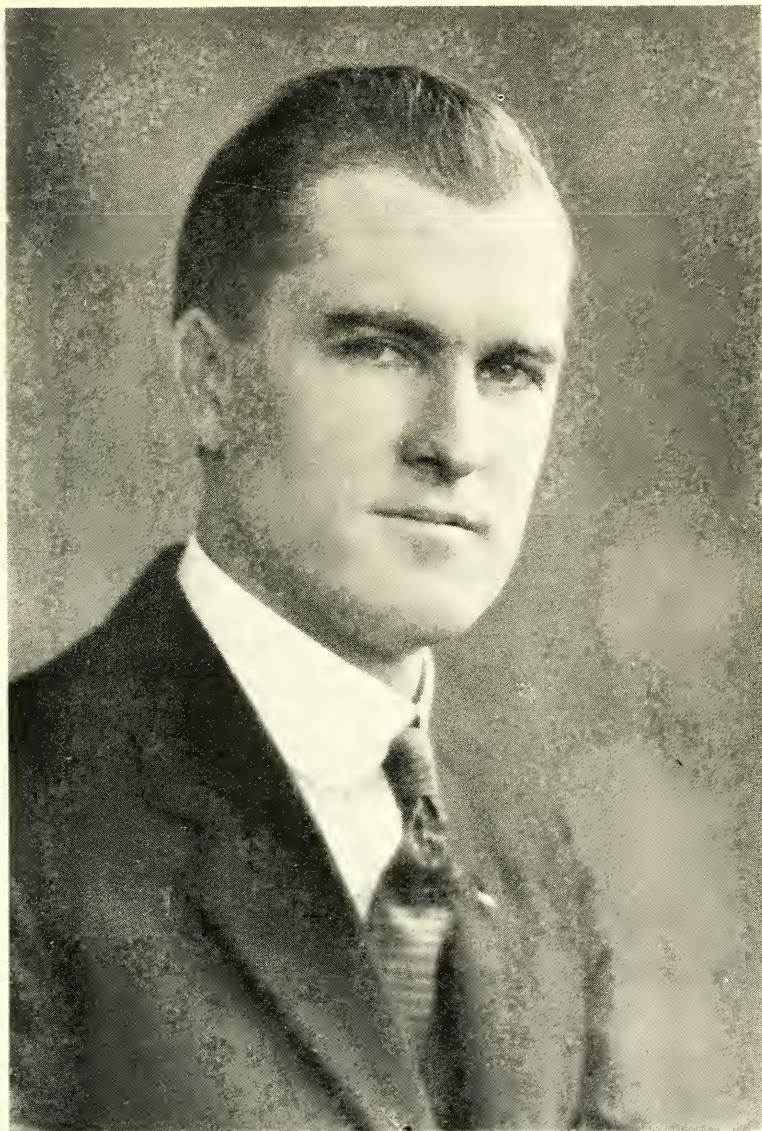

WARD BLOWERS EDWARDS

In 1926 he was elected President of Chowan College and thus served until his death which occurred in the early morning at Lakeview Hospital, Suffolk County, Virginia, September 7, 1935. Buried in Cedarwood Cemetery, Weldon, North Carolina.

23. A great Foreign Mission Hour followed, first by the reading of the report by State Board Member J. Marcus Kester, Wilmington, who next introduced Foreign Mission Secretary Charles E. Maddry, Richmond. Prior to Dr. Maddry's address he asked the following North Carolina Foreign Missionaries and workers, home on leave or furlough to come forward and be presented, each speaking briefly. They were Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Tipton, Brazil; Miss Naomi E. Schell, Tobita, Japan; and Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Olive, China.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

We are glad to report still greater progress in our foreign mission work during the past year. In fact, the past year has been the best year since the period of decline and depression came upon us. In many ways we seem to be facing a new day for our work.

First of all, we would record the new encouragement, or spirit of encouragement, which has come into our missionaries and workers in the Far East where about half of our work is done. The Commission to the Far East to which we referred last year accomplished a great work. Dr. and Mrs. J. B. Weatherspoon and Dr. and Mrs. Chas. E. Maddry composed the commission. As a result of a careful, personal survey of the work in that section, and the personal touch, and the reorganization, all the workers feel that a new day has dawned for the work in that part of the world.

Because of the Executive Secretary's visits to the fields of Europe and Palestine last summer and to the Far East last winter and spring, the work has been reorganized in a very definite and efficient way. The work is grasped and understood as it has not been in many years. This means greater efficiency for the work, and marked advance we believe and hope.

Then, too, we are glad to report nearly two thousand more baptisms on the various fields the past year than the previous year. There were 15,969 baptisms in 1934, and 17,794 in 1935. Roumania heads the list with 6,050 baptisms, and Brazil comes second with 4,634 and China with 4,115, the North China Mission alone reporting 2,475. Africa had 1,065 baptisms. So the work goes forward in this vital way.

And this fall, for the first time in several years, the Board was able to appoint a number of new missionaries and send them forth. Twenty-three were appointed in person at the October meeting of the Board. Some others, the sons and daughters of missionaries already on the field, were also appointed, after special examination by special committees. Then there were several reappointments of those who for several years have been home. In all thirty-three were sent forth to the work. This number however does not yet bring us up to normal as there have been several deaths and resignations and retirements in the past year. Our number now stands at 398, which is much below what we had a few years ago.

And, our new day is further seen in the reduction of our debt which for many years has hampered the work. During the year through sale of property, and through the Hundred Thousand Club, and through the Wade Bryant Plan, the debt has been reduced some four hundred thousand dollars, and now stands at \$508,500.00. Plans are definitely made whereby we hope that by the year 1938 we shall report no debt on the work.

During the summer our Executive Secretary and others expect to survey the work in South America. Also Dr. Truett, of our Convention, now President of the Baptist World Alliance, expects to visit the Far East. These visits ought to further strengthen the forces and advance the Kingdom. These visits together with the Centennial celebrations both in China and in America ought to bring clear dawn for a mighty century just ahead in bringing in God's Kingdom, or at least preaching the Gospel to all nations.

Our Board appreciates all that the churches are doing in North Carolina, which while it does not lead, stands along in the forefront in its support of this eternal cause.

24. After this great spiritfully filled service Brother A. J. Terry prayed and the sessions of Tuesday closed.

WEDNESDAY—Morning Session

25. Assembling at 9:00 o'clock, Brother Seefeldt led the Convention in the singing of "Holy, Holy, Holy", and thereafter B. W. Spilman, Kinston, read the Scripture and prayed.

26. The Tuesday's Journal was read, adjusted and confirmed.

27. Mrs. Estelle Fox and B. L. Mullinax, Asheville First Church, sang "Nearer My God to Thee" with Forrest C. Feezor, Raleigh, offering another prayer of devotion.

28. Fifty Years of Baptist Orphanage work in North Carolina was unfolded at this time when I. G. Greer, General Superintendent of the North Carolina Baptist Orphanage opened the hour and was followed by:

(a) Wiley Jarrell, a fourteen year old lad from Davidson County and an Orphanage boy since two years of age, who gave the report.

(b) Next the Superintendent presented Mrs. Mary Yarborough, age sixty, who on November 11, 1885, was received at the Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville as Mary Presson, our first orphan. Mrs. Yarborough spoke briefly.

(c) Two other children from the Mills Home, Sammie Brafford, of Cumberland County, age six, and Paul Smith, Caldwell County, age four, sang.

(d) Miss Mary Misenheimer an Orphanage Graduate of the Class of 1921, and originally from Stanly County and a Graduate of Meredith College in 1926, who is pursuing her Master's degree at Duke University spoke to the Orphanage report and brought the message of the hour.

(e) Other Orphanage graduates followed when Miss Hazel Martin, Director of Music, North Carolina School for the Blind, Raleigh sang "O Love that Will Not Let Me Go" accompanied by violinist Mrs. Ruth Hood Vause and Pianist Carl Hood, Asheville.

(f) Responding with Brother Greer leading the Convention sang "Faith of Our Fathers" whereupon the report of the Orphanage revealing one-half century of service was adopted. (See Page 105, Section 127).

29. A change in the order of business received the approval of the Convention when a report on the Southwestern Seminary would be received on this date at the eleven o'clock hour, following recommendation by Order of Business Chairman, Wm. Harrison Williams.

RESOLUTION NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Whereas, the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc., issued bonds or notes in the sum of \$125,000.00, all of which said amount has been paid except \$64,000.00; and,

Whereas, the hospital at Winston-Salem, N. C. has been overcrowded for a number of months and many days not able to enter all who came; and,

Whereas, the offices in said hospital are all over-crowded, the first floor of said hospital now being crowded with filing cabinets for want of room in the offices; and,

Whereas, the fifth floor of the hospital building, once used for interns and nurses' quarters, has been opened up for patients, leaving only two small rooms on the first floor for interns, the hospital being in need of not less than four rooms for interns; and,

Whereas, the Superintendent of Nurses and a number of nurses are living now in private homes due to the fact that the hospital does not have room for them in the hospital building or nurses' home; and,

Whereas, the small dining room, with a capacity of about 46 is forced to accommodate about 80, which necessitates the serving of six meals a day instead of three; and,

Whereas, the hospital's small storage rooms are entirely inadequate

and churches and individuals are now wanting to furnish quantities of canned fruits and vegetables, with nowhere to store them; and,

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. is desirous of securing authority from the North Carolina Baptist State Convention to re-finance the bonded debt of the said North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. in order that the Board of Trustees of the hospital may enlarge the hospital if they find they can do so without in any way involving the Baptist denomination or the Baptist State Convention in any further debt; and,

Whereas, the said Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. is desirous of obtaining authority from the North Carolina Baptist State Convention to re-finance, if the hospital can effect a substantial saving, even in case the hospital is not enlarged.

In consideration of the premises the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc., respectfully asks, as follows:

1. For authority from the North Carolina Baptist State Convention to re-finance the bonded debt of the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, (which was \$125,000.00 and is now \$64,000.00) in order that the Board of Trustees of said hospital may enlarge the hospital if they find they can do so without in any way involving the denomination or North Carolina Baptist State Convention in any further debt.

2. For authority from the North Carolina Baptist State Convention to re-finance, if the hospital can effect a substantial saving, even in case the hospital is not enlarged.

President, and the work of the Baptist women in the State a committee composed of B. W. Spilman, D. H. Wilcox, J. M. Justice, T. H. King, and C. M. Wall were named by the President to submit a suitable resolution recognizing this service. The resolution as afterwards submitted reads:

Fifty Years Service of Mrs. Wesley N. Jones and the
North Carolina Women's Missionary Union

Whereas, the Baptist Woman's Missionary Union is Auxiliary to the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and,

Whereas, as a State-Wide organization it completes this year fifty years of unusual service and,

Whereas, Mrs. W. N. Jones, of Raleigh, has been actively identified with this work since its organization.

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina place on record an expression of deep appreciation for the splendid services rendered by the Woman's Missionary Union of North Carolina under the capable leadership of Mrs. W. N. Jones.

That the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina place on record an expression of deep appreciation for the services rendered by Mrs. W. N. Jones and by the women who through the years have labored in the W. M. U. of the state.

Prior to 1886, according to the available records, there were ten missionary societies among the Baptist women of North Carolina.

In January of that year a group of fifteen interested women met in Raleigh in the office of Rev. C. T. Bailey, D.D., editor of the *Biblical Recorder*, and organized the Woman's Central Committee of Missions. Two young women, members of the First Baptist Church, Raleigh, teachers in a mission Sunday school near the south end of Fayetteville street, were selected to lead this new movement. Miss Fannie E. S. Heck was chosen president and Miss Sallie Bailey, corresponding secretary.

Miss Bailey was the only daughter of Rev. C. T. Bailey, D.D. In 1887 she was married to Wesley Norwood Jones, a rising young attorney of Raleigh. A large volume would be necessary to record the splendid services rendered by this consecrated husband and his noble wife.

Beginning with no funds, no office, no definite program, no study courses and often with slight interest on the part of the friends of the movement and open hostility on the part of many who should have been deeply sympathetic with it, the young corresponding secretary of the Central Committee gave herself unceasingly to the task of setting forward the work.

During these fifty years Mrs. Jones has been at the very heart and center of this work. She served as corresponding secretary only two years the first time but was again called to this important post in 1900.

In 1891, in Goldsboro, the state Woman's Missionary Union was organized. In various capacities Mrs. Jones has given of her time,

her talents, her money to this work. She has served faithfully and well through the years. As corresponding secretary, treasurer, state vice-president for the Southern Baptist W. M. U., trustee of the Training School, vice-president of the State W. M. U. and since 1916 as president of the State W. M. U. she has rendered an outstanding service.

Her ability, her wide information in the missionary field, her humble self-sacrifice, her whole-hearted devotion to the work combine to make her an ideal leader.

The marvelous growth of the work of the W. M. U. in the state is a tribute to her and to the loyal, faithful host of women who with a whole-hearted support have willingly followed her leadership.

To Mrs. Jones and the faithful women associated with her the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina expresses grateful appreciation.

51. Acknowledging this recognition Mrs. Jones read the report and upon motion to adopt Mrs. Edna R. Harris, Raleigh, W. M. U. Corresponding Secretary and Miss Mary Currin, Young People's Leader, spoke to the report to be adopted thereafter.

52. In keeping with the report of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation as adopted (see page 25, section 21) Eugene I. Olive submitted a resolution and upon motion by Brother Olive the resolution was adopted.

Resolved that the Directors of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation be authorized to make all necessary procedure to secure amendments to the Charter of the Foundation so as to provide:

a. For a change in the time of the annual meeting of the Directors to the Tuesday following the second Monday in October, in place of the present date.

b. To give the Directors more definite authority to compromise and adjust debts or obligations owing to the Foundation or any of its trust funds, whenever in their judgment and discretion, such adjustment or compromise is in the best interest of the Foundation and its funds.

c. To increase the number of Directors from 5 to 15, three members being elected each year for a term of five years and to provide for an Executive Committee of the Board of Directors.

53. A special selection was given by the Mars Hill Orchestra.

54. E. McNeill Poteat, Raleigh read the report to Memorialize Congress on the subject of War. The report which follows which carries a minority report as to certain provisions was upon motion by Brother Poteat adopted by the convention.

To the Southern Baptist Convention :

RESOLUTION UPON THE SUBJECT OF WAR

Following the presentation of the annual report of the Social Service Committee of the North Carolina State Baptist Convention, the following resolution was adopted :

"We recommend the appointment of a committee to memorialize Congress on this subject, to secure the widest publicity in the secular and religious press of America, and to present appropriate resolutions at the next meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention".

Pursuant to the foregoing instructions the committee presents herewith to the Southern Baptist Convention the resolutions as agreed upon by the majority of the committee appointed.

1. Recalling the celebrated Baptist tradition concerning the freedom and supremacy of the conscience, we believe that certain attitudes recently advocated by high officials of our government make imperative the reaffirmation of this doctrine. The imposition of the test of military service as a qualification for citizenship, the requirement of military training in certain of our tax-supported institutions and the treatment of those who conscientiously object to such forced instruction are denials of the right of the individual to follow the dictates of conscience in the matter of war.

2. We believe that the war system which seems to be the chief reliance of the nations for the settlement of international disputes is not only futile, but irreconcilably opposed to the mind of Christ; and that Congress should therefore devise at once policies controlling the manufacture and sale of munitions, policies that pronounce the government unwilling to use the army and navy to protect the properties of our national abroad; and policies that will assure the world of our determination to make no use of our military services except in defensive action. In the event of future war we would like to insist that all the services incident to the conduct of war be conscripted by the government in order that no profit shall be made out of war. It is unthinkable that while the nation is prosecuting a war, human life should be conscripted and destroyed, and that in that very destruction, money profit

should accrue to any enterprise or individual furnishing the sinews of combat.

MINORITY REPORT

There was a third paragraph which the majority of the committee could not conscientiously sign. It is affixed hereto as a minority report.

3. We further believe that the root of the war system and its wide spread implications for confusion and evil, is the competitive economic order under which our world is trying to operate. So long as personal profit dominates business, competition—beneficent if possible, ruthless if necessary—will be the method of all economic operations. This we have come to feel makes it difficult—if not impossible—to apply thoroughly the mind of Christ to our social complex. We therefore would urge our people to give themselves seriously to thought along these lines, with a purpose of amending or modifying the present economic order that it may definitely come under the domination of the mind of Christ Jesus.

REPORT SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS

There are certain drifts in our national life that are distinctly reflected in the life of our State. It would not be difficult to adduce evidence from widely separated areas that support the assertion that there is much uncertainty about great social issues, and perhaps a somewhat retrograde tendency in some of the efforts to modify and correct this wide-spread social restlessness.

The three areas anxiety is most acute are those of political activity, economics and national defense. Statutes have been passed in sixteen states during the last twelve months requiring an oath of allegiance to

the Constitution and a periodic salute to the national flag by every state employee and public school teacher and student. This book harmless enough until it is seen to go to the absurd excesses that have occurred in Massachusetts, and until it is found to be another symptom of the hysteria that seems to grip certain public officials. Congress had eighteen anti-sedition laws before it during its latest session, all of which have the effect, virtually, of destroying the rights of free assembly, free speech, and a free press as they have been guaranteed by the U. S. Constitution and cherished as a great American tradition.

So far as this national tendency is observable in North Carolina it is not, we believe, due to insincerity or malice on the part of those who sponsor such sentiments. We believe, however, that their advocacy is definitely subversive of the elemental freedom which lies at the base of our democratic structure. We call therefore on the North Carolina State Baptist Convention to deprecate by official resolution the activities of the variously called 100% American organizations that seek to abrogate the civil liberties under which all of us have a right to live. This means, specifically the use of the National Guard to suppress strikes; the statute which virtually denied political groups other than the two dominant parties the use of the ballot; the apparent abridgement of the constitutional right to the writ of Habeas Corpus by prisoners indicted for alleged political crimes; the application of gag-rule against political agitators; and the inhuman and brutal treatment of prisoners as it has been indulged in some penal institutions and detention camps.

It is difficult often to disentangle political action from economic causes and consequences. But we believe that since North Carolina is the second largest agricultural state in the South, and is being industrialized faster than any other Southern state, we ought to be alert to discover how and where economic interests within and without the state—particularly those concerned with tobacco, cotton and alcoholic beverage manufacture—tend to exert undue and unwarranted pressure on political action in the state, in order that our protest may be widely and intelligently made.

We view with growing concern the tides of indifference to the alcohol-beverage evil that more and more threaten to engulf the Christian conscience of the state. The sinister and persistent influence of the advertising of alcoholic drinks, particularly the use of wholly erroneous statements which purport to be scientifically exact and that seek—in the name of health—to enlarge the consumption of alcohol—such advertising being increasingly prominent in the daily press of the state—is an ominous sign needing alert attention and decisive rebuke. The consequences of this are seen in increasing drunkenness and the ghastly loss of life from motor-car accidents, and a laxity of social restraints that permits convivial drinking on an increasingly larger scale. A similar criticism

might be made of the advertising of cigarettes. We urge, therefore, that this paragraph of the report be regarded as a pronouncement of the North Carolina State Convention supporting the prohibition movement; as calling on our people to stand resolutely against the manufacture, sale and use of beverage alcohol, and as a forth-right protest against the perfidious advertising that misleads and corrupts the public mind regarding the use of alcoholic beverages.

We deplore both the use of indecent and profane language in our daily press which seems to be occurring with increasing frequency, and the printing of news-pictures which in some instances are inelegant if not infrequently revolting. We would call on the Press of the State to undertake to restore that independence and dignity which made the American newspaper great in former years, and the loss of which is at once partly the cause and the index of the decline of the public morale.

We believe that the past six years have fairly demonstrated that our economic order is not only faulty, but prolific of much of our political and moral unrest. We feel, therefore, that Christian people ought to give careful thought to the relation of the Christian Evangel to the fields of economic theory and practice, in order that a more just distribution of the rewards of honest labor may be effected. To this end we suggest a study of the Coöperative Movement and the possible organization of coöperatives. This movement is gaining considerable impetus both in our state and the world at large, and we would commend the efforts of our government already made in that direction.

We cannot permit the program of the Federal government to further militarize our youth by the establishment of High School R. O. T. C. units without grave misgiving; and we would respectfully urge again our protest against the military courses in our state schools being continued as a compulsory feature of college curricula. To what measure this military program is reflected in our common tolerance of the staggering federal budget for military and naval expenditure we do not know; but we cannot forbear to repudiate the mind that asserts either the need or the wisdom of such peace-time outlay.

We note with satisfaction a distinct improvement in the quality of motion picture production, due, we believe, to the nationwide protest over the past two years against salacious and demoralizing performances. We would express our satisfaction that the tendencies in modern government seem to be focusing concern on the dispossessed and the victims of economic displacement. We are gratified to observe a better understanding of our obligations toward the Negro as a citizen with political rights equal to our own, and commend the efforts of those who are working for the growing improvement of race-relations in our commonwealth, not forgetting—in the meantime—that we are far from having accomplished our whole duty therein.

One need that grows annually more acute is the care of the men and women discharged from our penal institutions. At the present time between four and six hundred are turned back into civilian life every month from our state penitentiary, prison camps and institutions for delinquent youth. This makes an annual total of about 6,000 persons who must either find a place in a social stratum that will aid them in the recovery of their respectability and establish them as useful citizens, or in a stratum that will confirm them to a life of further crime and delinquency. Over a period of ten years that means sixty thousand persons bearing the stigma of a criminal penalty passing back into society, to be assimilated as an asset or cast out as a liability. So far as we know there is no organized effort to deal with these discharged prisoners from the day they leave the custody of the state until they reestablish their social contacts. Since the critical period in the life of such persons is the first few days of their long-hoped-for freedom, we recommend that the Convention make definite provision for a study of our obligations to this group, with a view to the presentation of a plan for dealing vigorously with the problem.

We believe that the Gospel has two foci of concern; one is the love of God as mediated through Christ, and the other is the love of man for man as revealed by Christ. The Christian experience is autonomous; it stands in its own individual right. It is also social; it lays obligations on individual Christians to act in a specified Christian manner. We must not allow anything to dispute or falsify our independent experience of Christ. At the same time we must explore and employ the spiritual forces of love, mutual aid, and coöperative service, to the end that every area of our common life shall be sanctified and enriched by the power of the divine Grace.

To such fraternal relations with other Christian groups as this obligation compels us we would gladly offer our support and participation; and to such personal commitments as the full gospel demands of us as individuals, we do gladly yield ourselves in the name of Christ.

56. The Convention adopted a resolution submitted by J. M. Page which read:

PROHIBITION RESOLUTION

Whereas the Liquor Forces secured the enactment of a bill in the last General Assembly of North Carolina legalizing liquor stores in seventeen counties of North Carolina;

And whereas this has caused an increase of immorality and crime shown by court records;

And whereas the liquor forces are seeking by every effort and means to secure legislation in every County of the State;

Therefore Be It Resolved, that we the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina pledge our personal influence and active effort in every honorable way possible to prevent the enactment of a liquor law allowing liquor stores in every county of the State, and to secure the repeal of the present liquor law by which intoxicating liquors are sold in the seventeen counties; that we pledge our united support and financial aid to the United Dry Forces of North Carolina which has done a valiant and effective work and to the W. C. T. U., to the end that the balance of North Carolina may be kept dry and the black spot in these seventeen counties may be removed.

57. An offering in the amount of \$19.55 was received in the interest of the United Dry Forces of North Carolina upon motion by F. M. Hilliard, High Point.

58. At this time J. M. McKaughan, Sherwood, gave notice that he would on tomorrow introduce a resolution to change the opening date of the Convention from Tuesday after the 2nd Sunday in November to Tuesday after the 3rd Sunday in January.

59. Upon motion by E. C. Kolb, the Convention instructed the Committee on Committees to report out a special committee of five to make a study of what might be done with reference to former prisoners and report at the next Convention.

60. With prayer by A. J. Barton the session stood adjourned.

THURSDAY—Morning Session

61. President Wall requested that the morning session open with Brother Seefeldt leading the Convention in the singing of "Break Thou the Bread of Life".

62. The morning worship continued with N. C. Teague, Winston-Salem leading with Scripture and prayer and the convention singing "My Jesus I Love Thee".

63. Wednesday's Journal was read by Secretary Deane and approved.

64. Arthur J. Barton, read the following resolution, moved its adoption and was ordered recorded upon motion by Brother Barton and the direction of the Convention.

FUNDAMENTAL BAPTIST BELIEF AND DOCTRINE

Whereas, it is always appropriate for any Baptist body to reaffirm any fundamental Baptist belief and doctrine, and

Whereas, owing to certain tendencies in some sections of our country we deem it especially appropriate at the present time to reaffirm our Baptist position on the vital matters dealt with in these resolutions, now therefore,

Be it resolved by the North Carolina Baptist State Convention in annual session assembled in the City of Asheville, N. C.,

(1) That we hereby reaffirm our belief in, acceptance of and devotion to the plain teachings of the New Testament that a local congregation of baptised believers, covenanted together for public worship, for the observance of the ordinances and for the proclamation of the gospel constitutes and it alone does constitute a New Testament Church;

(2) That we reaffirm our belief in, acceptance of and devotion to the New Testament teaching that such local congregation of baptised believers is the only ecclesiastical body recognized in the New Testament and that such body is autonomous and complete and has full authority over all its affairs;

(3) That to such body is committed all authority over all ecclesiastical acts, such as the ordination of elders and deacons, the calling and settling of pastors, the administration of the ordinances and the decision of all questions and the transaction of all business which concerns its interest and work, as it acts under Christ the head of the Church;

(4) That Baptist Associations and Conventions are only means and agencies of cooperation through which the churches may act for the better accomplishment of the missionary, educational and benevolent tasks committed to the churches by our risen Lord;

(5) That associations and conventions do not have and under no conditions should attempt to exercise authority over the churches or to interfere with them in the performance of any and all of their functions as New Testament Churches;

(6) That the agencies and agents of this convention be and they are hereby instructed scrupulously to regard the principles set forth in these resolutions and jealously to respect the autonomy, independence and rights of each Baptist Church in all of these matters and not to advocate any theory or program that would in any way conflict, or seem to conflict, with these fundamental Baptist principles;

(7) That concerning the ordination of ministers we deem it would

be a violation of these principles for any Baptist body, local or general, aside from a Baptist Church, to set up ordaining presbyteries or to undertake to exercise any authority over the churches in such matters;

(8) On the other hand, with no assumption of authority, we express the hope that our Baptist Churches will exercise the care and caution enjoined in the New Testament concerning the ordination of ministers, and we believe that the spirit of proper comity among Baptist Churches would forbid that any one church shall proceed with the ordination of a minister, though it has the right so to do, without inviting neighboring sister churches to send elders and deacons to help form the presbytery and sit in council with the church concerning so vital and important a matter which must needs affect our whole denominational life.

65. At 10:30 this morning the report on the Report of the General Board will be received following the suggestion of General Secretary Huggins.

66. A report on the Laymen's Convention Committee was received as read by John T. Coley, Rocky Mount, with Secretary Huggins presiding. The report was adopted upon motion by Brother Coley after the General Secretary introduced and Walt N. Johnson, Mars Hill, spoke to the report.

THE LAYMEN'S CONVENTION COMMITTEE

At the last session of the Convention it created a committee to be known as a Layman's Convention Committee, and consisting of R. N. Simms, Chairman, Raleigh; John T. Coley, Rocky Mount; T. A. Avera, Rocky Mount; Grover H. Jones, High Point; John D. Berry, Raleigh; Dr. C. H. Durham, Lumberton; M. Leslie Davis, Beaufort; Dr. Ira D. S. Knight, Durham; Dr. William Harrison Williams, Charlotte; and Judge Johnson J. Hayes, Greensboro.

Early in the year the committee met to consider the wisdom of calling a general state meeting. After canvassing the situation it was decided to promote such a meeting, but instead of referring to laymen

only it was decided to call it a "Baptist Men's Meeting", and invite both pastors and laymen; and Greensboro was selected as the place for the purpose.

Accordingly much time was spent in arranging a program and preparing for the meeting. It was held on April 2 and 3, 1935; and we are happy to report that it was a great success from every viewpoint. Baptist men came from almost every section of the state. More than 700 were in attendance. Three sessions of about three and one-half hours each were held. A rich and varied program was presented, with every person present to perform his appointment.

Without question the men went away aroused and stimulated to attempt greater things in their churches and for the Kingdom at large.

Subsequently similar meetings for men were held in various sections of the state, notably in the Kings Mountain, Stanly and Johnston Associations.

We recommend that a committee, which we believe should be called "Baptist Men's Convention Committee", be named by this Convention. We further recommend that the committee be asked to promote next year a series of Baptist men's meetings in various sections of the state and also, if they think wise, one general meeting, possibly at Ridgecrest during the summer.

67. Sunday School Secretary Perry Morgan was requested and he presented T. L. Holcomb, Executive Secretary of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., successor to I. J. Van Ness, who brought a stirring address on the work of the Board.

68. Reading for the Committee to Report on the General Board's Report. Arthur J. Barton, Chairman, submitted the following which was sanctioned by the Convention upon motion by Brother Barton.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD

We, your committee, respectfully report as follows:

1. The committee would express its hearty appreciation and satisfaction at the general features of the report indicating growth in the several departments of our common work. Undoubtedly this increase is due in good measure to the sacrificial labors of the Board, of the General Secretary, and of all the workers both in the office and in the

field. On the other hand we could not claim that all the growth is due to the Board and its servants, or even to the Convention. The committee recognizes the fact that the growth in our Baptist enterprises depends, and must depend, upon the initiative, spirituality, consecration and aggressiveness of our Baptist pastors and churches. It is a commonplace to say that we can never have a strong, cooperative Baptist life without well organized and consecrated Baptist churches. We rejoice in every sign of progress and hope that the several items of progress given in the report are but the earnest of a larger and better day which is dawning for our Baptist people in North Carolina and for all their work.

2. Concerning the appropriations for Forest Avenue and Boone churches, (see pages 76 ff) the committee has taken into account and given careful consideration to all of the factors in each case.

We recommend that the Board be authorized to appropriate \$20,000 to assist the Forest Avenue Church, Greensboro in the erection of its educational building, the amount to be paid in four equal, annual installments of \$5,000 each, with the provision that if the progress made by the church in its building enterprise should justify and its income of current funds should enable the Board so to do, the whole amount may be paid in a shorter period of time.

We recommend that the sum of \$1,500 a year, over a period of ten years, be appropriated to assist the Boone church in its building enterprise, with the same provision as to payment of the whole amount that we recommend concerning the Forest Avenue church.

3. Concerning the general recommendations of the Board, (see page 116, section 134) of the Advance Report, your committee would recommend that 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 9 be adopted as presented.

Concerning No. 6, we recommend that the Board be authorized to employ, within its discretion and as its income may justify, three general missionaries.

Concerning No. 8, we recommend: (a) that the Board be instructed to cooperate wholeheartedly with the management of the *Biblical Recorder* for the largest possible increase in the circulation of the *Recorder*; (b) That the President of the Convention be, and he is hereby authorized, to appoint a committee of seven wise and discreet brethren to confer with the Biblical Recorder Publishing Company looking to the possible purchase of the *Biblical Recorder* by the Baptist State Convention. Your committee does not believe that denominational ownership is a cure all for all of the problems of publication and circulation of our Baptist papers, but since the editor of the *Recorder* has several times indicated before the Convention the willingness of the owners of the *Biblical Recorder* to sell the *Recorder* to the Convention, we deem it wise for the Convention to appoint such committee as we

here recommend, that the whole matter may be gone into carefully and a report brought to the next meeting of the Convention.

Concerning No. 9, we would add this special word to express the hope that with undivided mind and heart our people may set themselves to the task of reaching the goal, or objective, of \$600,000 for our common enterprises during the year 1936.

69. It was the order of the Convention upon motion by D. H. Wilcox, that future reports of the Committee on Social Service and Civic Righteousness be included as a matter of information and study in the Advance Report of the General Board.

70. As the special order Eugene I. Olive, Chairman of the State Promotion Executive Committee presided and opened the discussion on the Co-operative Program (see pages 108 ff) and was followed by General Secretary Maloy A. Huggins, and Promotion Secretary Perry Morgan.

In turn the three State Missionaries J. C. Pipes, in the Western, Charles H. Dickey, of the Central, and M. O. Alexander, of the Eastern sections of the State brought most encouraging evidences of a new enlistment among the Baptist people of North Carolina.

At the request of Brother Pipes, Luther Van, of Spruce Pine, of the Mitchell Association, and Otto Parham, Asheville, of the Buncombe Association, attested to the work as outlined by Brother Pipes and Brother Alexander, heard able testimony of similiar work in his area from W. P. Crouch, Morganton, of the Catawba Association, W. R. Grigg, Marion, of the Blue Ridge Association, Charlie Parker, Winston-Salem of the Pilot Mountain Association, and J. P. Davis, Burnsville, of the Yadkin Association.

71. President Wall well expressed the feelings of the Convention to the wives of our State Workers for the sacrifice they

are making in giving their companions so much of the time to the Baptist Cause and Christ in the State.

72. A topic "Why I Believe in the Co-operative Program" was the subject of an address heard here from F. M. Powell, Professor of Church History, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville.

73. J. R. Robbins, Harris, evangelistic singer, led in the singing of "Amazing Grace".

74. A committee at the 1934 State Convention was authorized (See page 42, section 49, 1934 annual) to study and report on the tenure of office of Board and Trustee members. This Committee now through the Chairman J. L. Peacock read the report with reference to the change in the Constitution effecting the election of Board Members or Trustees, which follows in two divisions:

A RESOLUTION

DIVISION I

Your Committee held two meetings and discussed thoroughly the Resolution presented by Brother Gardner and the Amendment presented by Brother Arch Cree.

Your Committee first considered the Resolution and were unanimous in the opinion that it would make for the welfare of the Convention to adopt the Resolution. In discussing the Amendment, there was some difference of opinion. In order that the Committee might have the fullest information possible, we called in several representatives of our various Boards to ascertain what effect the system of rotation might have on the efficiency of the personnel of their Boards. Each representative was positive that rotation would be unwise, and in some cases disastrous. All agreed that the work of their Boards would suffer were the system of rotation adopted.

Your Committee, therefore, unanimously recommends the adoption only of the Gardner resolution.

We suggest that our Institutions be purged of Trustees who do not function. We recommend that the Committee on Nominations investigate the members of the Board as to their interest and efficiency and that if it is found that a member is absent from two consecutive meetings of the Board without excuse that he be dropped from the Board.

We further suggest that the Committee on Nominations seeks to have a wider representation on our Boards by selecting members from various parts of the state.

A RESOLUTION

DIVISION II

Resolved that Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

That retiring members of the Board be ineligible for reelection until the following meeting of the State Convention.

Upon motion by T. H. King, the resolution as presented under Division was adopted as was the resolution as recorded under Division II after motion by J. L. Peacock.

75. At 12:00 o'clock, noon, Millard A. Jenkins brought his second and last address.

76. T. L. Holcomb, Nashville, Tenn., offered prayer and the session adjourned.

77. "Come Thou Fount" was the song that opened the Thursday afternoon session and then C. R. Pittard, Apex, brought the devotional thoughts.

An amendment to the amendment was offered by J. Ben Eller, that the motion by Brother Moore apply to the elections of 1936;

Whereupon the amendment to the amendment received the approving vote of the Convention, and thereafter the Convention passed the amendment as offered by Brother Moore;

Moreover the report of the Committee to nominate Trustees of the Convention, Its Institutions, and Members of the General Board was duly approved.

79. Vice-President R. E. Brickhouse, Warrenton, now

presiding announced the time for the election of the Convention officers.

(a) It was the unanimous vote of the Convention that Recording Secretary Deane, cast the vote for President of the Convention for Zeno Wall, Shelby, upon motion by J. A. Snow, Wingate. The Secretary cast this vote and Brother Wall re-assumed the chair expressing in his splendid way feelings of deep appreciation.

(b) B. G. Early, Kinston, moved the election of John T. Coley, Rocky Mount as First Vice-President; J. P. Harris, moved that W. D. Poe, Oxford, be Second Vice-President and on motion by L. P. Smith, that B. E. Morris, act as Third Vice-President, these nominees were duly elected on one vote the Convention Vice-Presidents, after Sam F. Hudson, Red Springs, had moved that the nominations close.

80. The Convention being appraised on Wednesday, J. A. McKaughan, Sherwood, now offers a resolution that will change paragraph III, Section I, of the Constitution to read: "The Convention shall meet annually on Tuesday after the second Sunday in January."

It was the vote of the Convention to commit upon motion by J. Ben Eller, Greensboro, and that a Committee of five be named to study the proposed change and report at the next annual session. (See page 25, Section 22).

81. Oscar Creech, Ahoskie, reported at this time that the General Board had received as a matter of information the report of its own Committee with reference to the North Carolina Council of Churches and the report had been tabled and that any action upon this work would come from the Convention. This report was received and ordered recorded.

82. Messrs. B. L. Mullinax, E. J. Davis, Ray Ingale, J. B. McIntosh, Asheville First Church Quartet sang, "Tell Me the Story of Jesus".

83. The work of State Mission under the direction of General Secretary Huggins (See pages 79 ff) was related here with Brother Huggins presiding. In this order came the following workers presenting different phases of the work.

(a) T. W. Bray, Pleasant Garden, spoke on "What the Convention is Doing for the Missionary Pastors and Churches."

(b) The aid being given to Mission Church buildings was the general theme of J. B. Benfield, Morganton.

(c) Missionary W. H. Fitzgerald, to the Cherokee Indians in the West, spoke on the work in that field.

(d) Then followed Wayne Williams, Oteen, Pastor to the Soldiers at the Federal Government Hospital.

(e) Brother Huggins touched upon the work being done for the people at Samarcand and the State Sanatorium, by E. M. Harris, Aberdeen.

(f) The report on Student Work was reported by Miss Cleo Mitchell, Student Secretary.

(g) Miss Winnie Ricket, State B. T. U. Secretary and her Assistant Miss Mabel Starnes appeared with their activities.

(h) Sunday School Secretary Perry Morgan gave his report and his associate in the work Leonard L. Morgan was recognized as was approved workers Mrs. C. D. Bain, Dunn and Mrs. John B. Lane, Lenoir.

(i) W. C. Summerville, Superintendent of the Negro General Baptist Convention of North Carolina, presented the work of his brethren.

(j) M. O. Alexander, Board Missionary concluded the discussions.

84. Thereafter A. J. Barton, Wilmington moved and the Convention ordered that the resolution adopted by the Negro General Baptist Convention in Wadesboro, October 31, 1935 be recorded.

A RESOLUTION

Whereas the white Baptists of this State of North Carolina have manifested a pronounced interest in the moral and spiritual development of the colored Baptists of this commonwealth, as shown in the financial aid they are giving us, and helping to make it possible for us to carry forward our religious activities through the Rev. W. C. Somerville, our Superintendent of education and missions.

Therefore Be it Resolved, that we as members of this convention, tender sincere thanks and express our profound appreciation of the fine spirit of Christian liberality as shown in the financial help which is being given the colored Baptists of the State; and in the meantime, we are praying for a closer cooperation in the expansion of the kingdom of grace.

Song: "On Jordan's Stormy Banks."

85. The reports from the Baptist Bible Institute, New Orleans and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louis-

ville were respectively given by Wilson W. Woodcock, Greensboro and Faculty Representative F. M. Powell, Louisville, Ky.

86. Secretary Charles B. Deane read the following telegram:

89. Prayer was offered by Wm. Harrison Williams and the Thursday afternoon session adjourned.

THURSDAY—Evening Session

90. The closing session of the Convention convened with the singing of "Jesus Saves" and thereafter W. H. Covert, Forest City led the worship service and W. A. Ayers, prayed.

91. The Committee on Resolutions made its report through Forrest C. Feezor and was adopted as follows upon motion by Brother Feezor:

REPORT COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Your Committee examined carefully the resolutions placed in its hands.

First, That with reference to the resolution presented by the Trustees of the North Carolina Baptist Hospital, Inc. (see page 36, section 48) that if any refinancing or contemplated enlargement be done

that it will not create any new debt for which the Baptist State Convention is directly or indirectly responsible.

Second, We approve the resolution with reference to the proposed article of amendment to the Federal Constitution to prohibit sectarian appropriations.

Third, The North Carolina Baptist State Convention herewith expresses its deep appreciation of, and sincere gratitude for, the many courtesies extended to the Convention and its members by the First Baptist Church and all the Baptists of Asheville; the many homes and hotels, by the Press, by radio and civil authorities, by the Police of the City of Asheville, and by the faculty and students of Mars Hill College.

92. The Secretary was instructed upon motion by A. J. Barton that the part of the resolution pertaining to sectarian appropriations be transcribed and forwarded to each member of the North Carolina delegation in Congress.

93. Chairman Don C. Young, of the Committee on Enrollment announced the final enrollment with seven hundred sixty registered delegates and forty-five visitors.

94. R. E. Brickhouse read for the Committee on Publicity its report and moving its adoption the Convention so ordered.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLICITY

On behalf of your committee it may be said that in no year in this decade have the activities of our Convention been so well publicized.

To make this report brief: Before we came to Asheville advance publicity matter was sent out to 150 papers in every county of North Carolina.

During the Convention Asheville's *three* newspapers have given us the magnificent total of about forty full columns of publicity composed of Convention news stories and pictures.

At the same time the *Raleigh News & Observer*, the *Greensboro News*, and the *Charlotte Observer* have featured the proceedings of this Convention daily on their front pages.

On top of that this publicity department has worked in closest cooperation with the United States Press, located in this city, and that news disseminating agency has broadcast our proceedings here to the uttermost ends of the state.

In addition to that the Associated Press has carried daily reports, and it is safe to say that two millions of people in North Carolina have had an opportunity to know what we have been doing here. It may be added that all this publicity has cost us nothing, and that the state press is always anxious to receive and disseminate anything of interest that we do.

97. A mixed quartet from the First Church composed of Miss Lucile Fitzgerald, Mrs. E. J. Davis, B. L. Mullinax and Frank Gough, sang "Nailed to the Cross", with Miss Kathryn King, organist accompanying.

98. The Committee on Memorials brought its report through the *Chairman*, T. L. Sasser, which included the submission of the names of the honored dead (see page 63) and that the likenesses of the following brethren Archibald Johnson, John D. Berry and W. B. Edwards be placed in the 1935 Annual. M. A. Alexander moved that the report be adopted and that the Annual be dedicated to Archibald Johnson, forty years Editor of *Charity and Children*. The Convention so approved.

99. A report of the Trustees of the Convention was read by M. A. Huggins and approved by the Convention upon motion by Brother Huggins.

* The Executive Committee upon invitation of the Churches of Durham voted that the 1936 Convention be held in that City at the First Baptist Church.

**REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BAPTIST STATE
CONVENTION OF NORTH CAROLINA**

The Board, composed of W. L. Poteat, Wake Forest; R. L. McMillan, Raleigh; and F. H. Brooks, Smithfield; was organized with W. L. Poteat, Chairman and R. L. McMillan, Secretary.

During the year we have given considerable time and effort in connection with the will of O. L. Pittman, of Edgecombe County. There is involved in this estate a substantial sum of money and the Trustees claim that under a proper interpretation of the will they are entitled to a portion of the same for Convention purposes. The matter has been in litigation for more than a year. The Superior Court rendered a decision in favor of the Trustees of the Baptist State Convention. An appeal was taken to the Supreme Court, from which a decision is expected to be handed down soon.

As required by the Constitution we found upon examination that the Treasurer is bonded for \$25,000, the bookkeeper, Miss Esther Ivey, for \$10,000, and the bookkeeper of the Debt Service Fund, Miss Margie Murchison, for \$10,000.

100. North Carolina Representative of the Home Mission Board Ira D. S. Knight brought the report for the Home Mission Board and prior to its adoption Brother Ellis Fuller, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Atlanta, brought the feature message of the evening on Home Missions.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

"The New South" is a phrase made famous by Henry Grady, who resided in Atlanta, Ga., the city of the headquarters for our Home Mission Board. This Board is aware of the New South of today. It is in the process of becoming unshackled so that it can continue to accept every challenging opportunity. Our Home Mission Board defines its tasks as: First, "the preaching of the gospel to those who have it not in the isolated and neglected sections outside the normal reach of the churches; and, second, any and all of the missionary and evangelistic tasks in the homeland which either because of their size, their universality, or their difficulty require the impact of the whole denomination for their solution and can, therefore, best be handled by a southwide agency. In short, Home Missions is the denomination as a whole taking the gospel in all its fulness to the people of the homeland, Cuba and Panama."

Geographically our Home Mission task is not changing but there are changing opportunities. The old frontiers of Home Missions have passed away. The geographical frontier is giving place to the social, racial and economic frontier. The wide expanse of the prairies of the West is being replaced by the industrial centers and rapidly growing cities. City missions, evangelization of the foreigners, work among our brothers in black, good will centers and rescue missions, missions to the Jews, missions to the deaf and dumb, missions to the Indians, missions in the mountain sections, mission work in Cuba and Panama, all these are cast into a new mold and are demanding a new appraisal and a new approach.

The Home Mission Board is aware of this new day. Its missionary activity is guaranteed by an honorable agreement with our creditors. There are about 250 missionaries and workers in the sanatorium, schools and goodwill centers. There are 598 mission stations maintained, 5 goodwill centers, 2 rescue missions, a seamen's institute; 29 schools are operated by Home missionaries in Panama, Cuba, and the homeland. Property is furnished for 8 mountain schools free of charge to local boards of trustees. A tubercular sanatorium in El Paso, Texas, is being successfully operated. A building and loan department has loaned nearly one and one-quarter million dollars to churches. During the past year this Board has conducted its enlarging work without borrowing a penny for operating expenses and has also paid off a substantial amount of its indebtedness. Last year the Home Mission Board placed 36 new missionaries in the field and opened 76 new missions. But best of all is the record of 3,740 conversions and baptisms during the past year.

The glorious record of the past few years and the call of new opportunities and obligations should elicit new and larger financial support from every member of our denomination. The population of the South has increased two and a half million during the past five years. Gains in all religious faiths have only increased one and one-third million during the same period of time. Today there are over 24 million unchurched people in the south. Today there are more foreigners than Negroes in our big southern cities. Our own Dr. E. P. Alldredge writes, "No other great denomination in America today is face to face with such wonderful opportunities for racial service and reconstruction as are vouchsafed to Southern Baptists; and no other great denomination is putting forth so small and so insignificant an effort to seize these vast opportunities as are Southern Baptists."

Surely we will catch the vision of the new, industrial, enlarging South and arise in our strength to give new and greater support to our alert, efficient, aggressive and Christ-honoring Home Mission Board.

101. A motion by A. J. Barton authorized the President and Secretary of the Convention to pass upon and confirm that portion of the Journal not approved by the Convention.

102. In these closing moments President Wall expressed again the feelings of deep appreciation to the many good people who have contributed to this great Convention and called to the platform the Host Pastor of the Convention, E. Gibson Davis, while the Convention stood in sincere gratitude.

103. The motion for final adjournment was made by T. H. King and following prayer by Ira D. S. Knight, Durham, the One Hundredth Fifth Annual Convention of North Carolina Baptists adjourned.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD

This is the fourth report of the Board prepared by the present General Secretary. In each of the previous reports a note of optimism was sounded. Results have proved that our optimism was well founded. We record our gratitude to God for His favors showered upon us, and for the enlarged and enlarging vision of our people. In 1934 we made a substantial advance over 1933, in fact an advance of about thirteen per cent; and in 1935 that advance continues, and at about the same rate. We confidently look for an even greater advance in 1936. Our expectation is due both to our optimism and to encouraging reports which come to us from all parts of the state. We thank God and take courage.

In 1933 the Convention adopted twenty-two objectives. We can measure, at least in part, our progress in terms of these objectives. This procedure will enable us to get a fairly accurate glimpse of many phases of our work, as well as the progress which we are making.

A. OUR OBJECTIVES

In parenthesis we give the figures for last year and for the year preceding, in so far as this is possible. The figures in the first parenthesis are for the year immediately preceding; and in the second parenthesis the figures for the next preceding year, etc., are given.

1. **Every church with a pastor.**

It is estimated that on October 1, 1935 160 (175) (200), churches were without pastors. Probably there are at all times at least 150 pastorless churches.

2. **A revival in each church—at least one each year.**

Accurate figures are not available, but the Minutes of 1934 show that 1,797 (1,792), churches reported baptisms while 613 (593) did not. Taking the state as a whole, 19,670 baptisms were reported in 1934, 20,038 in 1933, and 23,342 in 1932.

3. **Every church with a Sunday school enrollment at least as large as the church membership.**

For the year 1934 863 (810) (912) of the 2,384 Sunday schools in the state met the requirement.

4. **Every church with a B. T. U.**

As of October 1, 1935 1,050 (1,043), (975) of the 2,410 churches had a B. T. U. organization.

5. **Every church with a W. M. S.**

As of October 1, 1935 1,484 (1,100), (1,118) of the 2,410 churches had a W. M. S.

6. At least 500,000 members by 1940, with all church rolls corrected.

The Minutes of 1934 show a membership of 450,770 (440,602) (433,046). The net gain in membership is about one half of the total baptisms. It is known that many churches, more than formerly perhaps, are correcting their rolls.

7. Every Association with a representative Promotion-Executive Committee, or its equivalent, that functions throughout the year, led by the Moderator or the Chairman of the Promotion-Executive Committee, who will visit and encourage the churches.

Probably about 40 (33) of the 70 associations are meeting the requirement in whole or in part. Only a few moderators, however, visit the churches.

8. A ten days school, or schools, for Christian workers held each year with an attendance of at least 1,000.

In the three pastors' schools provided at Meredith, Chowan and Mars Hill about 225 (192) pastors were enrolled.

9. At least 2,500 college students enrolled in our Baptist colleges.

For the school year ending June 1935, there were enrolled 2,415 (2,229) college students. This does not include 691 (651) which were enrolled in the Wake Forest-Meredith summer school at Wake Forest and Mars Hill.

10. Two general state missionaries giving their full time to the development of our churches, missionary instruction, forming fields, et cetera, especially in the rural churches.

Beginning with January 1, 1935, the Board employed one General Missionary, M. O. Alexander.

11. A club of Charity and Children in every Baptist Sunday school.

For the calendar year 1934, 772 (678), (781) Sunday schools had a club of Charity and Children.

12. Twenty-five thousand subscribers to the Biblical Recorder, including every pastor, every Sunday school superintendent, every W. M. S. president or leader, and every B. T. U. leader or director.

As of the first week of November 1935, the circulation of the Biblical Recorder was 10,500 (10,400), (8,000). Of the 1,175 ordained ministers who were pastors, 605 (727), (582), were taking the Recorder; 97, (97), (78), of the 550 ordained ministers not in the pastorate were taking it; 410 (396), (317) of the 2,384 Sunday school superintendents, and 395 (377), (302) of the 1,100 W. M. S. presidents were taking it.

13. Every institution and agency of the Convention living within its income.

This objective has been reached. If the educational institutions collect only one half of the amounts due them by students, they will have no deficit for the year ending June 30, 1935. An exception to this statement is Campbell which will show a loss of \$4,152.

14. **No borrowing by the Convention, or its institutions or agencies, of any funds for any purpose, except in anticipation of current income.**

No funds for current support have been borrowed this year.

15. **A fifty-fifty division of distributable or undesignated funds as between State and Southwide objects.**

For 1935 the Coöperative Program (Undesignated), receipts are divided on the 60-40 basis. 60 for State and 40 for Southwide objects.

16. **An annual income, designated and undesignated of \$450,000 for the fiscal year 1934; \$500,000 for 1935; \$550,000 for 1936; \$600,000 for 1937, \$660,000 for 1938; \$725,000 for 1939 and \$800,000 for 1940.**

Our total income for 1934, designated and undesignated, was \$441,325.87. Thus we fell short of our goal by only about \$9,000. With real effort we can reach our goal of \$500,000 for 1935.

17. **Every church contributing through the Coöperative Program, including both designated and undesignated funds.**

For 1934 1,796, (1,648), (1,607) of the 2,410 churches reported funds given through the Coöperative Program, or to some object in the Coöperative Program, leaving 614, (737), (767) that made no contribution.

18. **Every church and Sunday school contributing to the Orphanage.**

For 1934 1,920 (1,728), (1,686) churches made some contribution to the Orphanage, leaving 490, (657), (688), that did not.

19. **Every Sunday school contributing and remitting to the Orphanage once each month.**

During 1934 269, (230), Sunday schools met this requirement, leaving 2,115, (2,155) that did not.

20. **Every church making a Thanksgiving offering for the Orphanage.**

Including all offerings received in December 1934, it appears that 1,659, (1,515), (1,056) churches made an offering on or about Thanksgiving, leaving 751, (870), (1,348) that did not.

21. **Every church and Sunday school making an offering on Mother's Day for the Hospital.**

On Mother's Day 1935 about 1,706 (1,308), (1,062) churches and Sunday schools made an offering to the Hospital.

22. **Every church making a remittance to the Convention Treasurer at least once each month.**

For the year 1934 359, (215), (197) churches met this requirement, a gain of 144 over 1933.

106. B. REPORT OF GENERAL BOARD MEETINGS

The Board has had three meetings during the year, one on December 17, 1934, one on April 2, 1935, and one on June 13, 1935. In accord with the Constitution of the Convention the important actions of the Board during the year are here recorded.

1. The principal item which claimed the attention of the Board in its December meeting was adoption of the budget for 1935. We do not publish here the budget figures for the reason that actual expenditures for each department of the work will be published in the Convention Annual. Suffice it to say the budget was carefully and conservatively made and we are living within our income.

2. The last Convention ordered that all undesignated funds be divided sixty per cent for State objects and forty per cent for Southwide objects. The Board divided the sixty per cent for State objects as follows: Christian Education, Debt Service 42%; State Missions 13%; Hospital 4%; Ministerial Education 1%.

3. Upon recommendation of a special committee surety bond for the Treasurer was fixed at \$25,000; bonds for the bookkeeper, Miss Esther Ivey, and that of Miss Margie Murchison as bookkeeper of the Debt Service Fund, were fixed at \$10,000 each.

4. At the call meeting held in Greensboro on April 2 a committee was appointed to meet with representatives of other denominations in order to explore the possibility and consider the wisdom of some sort of closer coöperation with several of the religious groups in the state. The committee was composed of W. R. Cullom, L. R. Varser, W. H. Williams, Oscar Creech, T. D. Collins, J. Clyde Turner, Mrs. E. I. Olive, E. M. Poteat, Jr., Zeno Wall, M. A. Huggins, I. G. Greer, and L. E. M. Freeman.

5. At this same meeting, by vote of fourteen to eight, the following resolution was adopted, and sent to the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention:

Whereas information has been presented to us showing that many of the states of the Southern Baptist Convention are compelled to inaugurate some debt paying plan within the next one to four years for meeting obligations incurred by them, and,

Whereas we believe that the interest of all our work, State and Southwide, will be better served through a coöperative effort which provides for a sharing in the promotion and receipts of the Hundred Thousand Club, thus promoting unity and strength, and,

Whereas, our own state debts in North Carolina are relatively larger than the debts on the Southwide Boards and institutions, and North Carolina has been compelled to undertake definite commitments for the retirement of its indebtedness, thus making it difficult and probably unfair to our creditors to enter into a campaign for cash in which our state objects do not share,

Therefore Be It Resolved:

1. That we request your committee to adopt a recommendation to the Southern Baptist Convention that the Hundred Thousand Club Movement be projected on a coöperative basis as between the Southern Baptist Convention and the several State Conventions.

2. That we approve the fifty-fifty basis of division as an ideal, but inasmuch as conditions vary in the states, that the Convention instruct its Executive Committee to work out a plan with each state that will be fair to both Southwide objects and State objects.

6. At the June meeting of the Board the following recommendations of the General Secretary were adopted:

1. That we ask Brother Perry Morgan to give his full time to Promotion beginning September 1 and running through about the middle of December.

2. That we ask J. C. Pipes of Asheville to help us for three or four months in the associations west of the Blue Ridge.

3. That we invite C. H. Dickey to come with us for full time for the last four months of the year, dividing his time between the promotion of the work in a few associations and giving us the publicity we need, utilizing the Recorder, Charity and Children, the daily papers and in particular the county papers, as well as the radio.

7. The Board heard the report and recommendations of the committee which had been appointed to visit the Forest Avenue and Boone fields for the purpose of investigating the church building needs at these two points. We give here for the information of the Convention the report of this committee, together with the recommendations:

We, your committee, with the exception of Dr. Cree who was sick and could not go, visited the Forest Avenue field and the Boone field on May 30 and 31, 1935. We spent several hours at each place and canvassed the situations pretty thoroughly. We found the following conditions existed:

Forest Avenue Church

1. The church has a membership of about 500. The church has grown in every way in recent years under the capable leadership of Wilson Woodcock. More recently there has been a fine growth in the Sunday school under the leadership of Dr. J. T. J. Battle, the superintendent.

2. The plant is old, dilapidated, unattractive, too small, and situated on an unpaved street less than a block from the tracks of the Southern railway.

3. In the last three years the local congregation has purchased a most desirable lot and most of the necessary excavation has been done, all at a total cost of around \$10,000.

4. The Board has made no investment there in the church plant, although it has been helping for some time on pastor's salary. In this connection it will be remembered that we have an investment of some fifty or sixty thousand at Chapel Hill, ten to fifteen at Cullowhee and about eighteen at Boone. Also we are this year helping the church at Wingate and the church at Murfreesboro to take care of their indebtedness.

5. There are four or five hundred Baptist girls at the Women's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and the location for the proposed church building is on the edge of one of the most substantial residential sections of Greensboro. Moreover, it is a growing section.

Boone Church

1. The educational plant which was completed some two or three years ago is quite adequate to the needs at Boone. As stated above, the Board has made an investment of about \$18,000, and at the present time owes a balance of about \$1,200 on the previous commitment. The con-

gregation at Boone owes a total of about \$7,500 on the educational plant, with the \$1,200 still due by the Board as a part of the \$7,500 outstanding.

2. The old church with its auditorium has been abandoned and is not now being used. The auditorium in use in the present educational building is wholly inadequate.

3. The committee of the Boone church estimates that with the use of the material in the old church, brick, timber and windows, the auditorium can be completed at a cost of about \$20,000, including labor which will be donated. The completion of this auditorium will provide an adequate church building for years to come. It will be attractive and useful.

4. It should be added that while we aid in the payment of the pastor's salary at Chapel Hill, Greensboro and Cullowhee, we do not pay anything on pastor's salary at Boone, nor is it contemplated that the church will need our help for this purpose.

5. We consider this situation one of the most challenging in the state. There are about a thousand students there during a greater part of the year, as they have around eight hundred to a thousand students during the summer. Any money expended there would, in our judgment, be a fine investment. The students are predominantly Baptist in membership or preference.

Recommendations

1. *Forest Avenue Church:* We recommend that during each of the years 1936, 1937 and 1938 the Board undertake to set aside \$5,000 a year, or a total of \$15,000, to be used in the construction of an educational plant for the Forest Avenue Church. It is believed that the local congregation will be able to raise or borrow for a short time a sufficient amount to construct the building, which it is estimated will cost in the neighborhood of \$40,000. The plans for the complete plant, which have been adopted by the congregation and paid for, contemplate a building that will cost from ninety to ninety-five thousand dollars. Concerning the construction of the completed plant we would recommend that this matter be held in abeyance until such time as the educational plant shall be built and paid for.

2. *Boone Church:* We recommend that the Board undertake to pay to the treasurer of the Boone church for the purpose of completing the plant a total of \$13,500, to be paid over a period of ten years beginning with November 1936; for the years 1936 to 1940 \$1,500 a year and for the years 1941 to 1945 inclusive \$1,200 a year. With this amount from the Board the committee from the Boone church would be responsible for all interest payments on any amount they might have to borrow to complete the plant, the Board in no case being responsible for any interest payments.

The Board approved the report of this special committee, but no action was taken on the matter because of the provisions of Art. VII, Section 5 of the Constitution of the Convention. In lieu thereof the General Secretary was instructed to include these recommendations in his report to the Convention for consideration by that body.

8. Dr. Cullom, for the committee on inter-church coöperation, submitted a verbal report, and at his suggestion the committee was continued and instructed to make a definite report at the meeting of the Board just preceding the meeting of the State Convention in November.

9. The Board records here, with regret, the loss of R. W. Prevost of Andrews, who left the state to accept a pastorate in Knoxville, Tenn., and J. L. Carrick, who has accepted a pastorate in Virginia. At the June meeting of the Board John R. Jester, in view of his intention to leave North Carolina, submitted his resignation to the Board. Because of his long and faithful service as President of the Board and because of his deep interest in the work of the Convention, appropriate resolutions were adopted and spread upon the minutes of the Board. We record also our keen sense of loss at the home going of Brother John D. Berry in August. For more than twenty-five years he served as a member of the General Board, first as a member of the Board of Missions and later a member of the General Board. He was likewise for a long period a member of the Executive Committee of the Board. In these places of service he gave the best he had, proving a faithful steward always of the trusts committed to him. Appropriate resolutions were also adopted recording appreciation of his services and a keen sense of loss in his home going.

A. HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

During the twelve months ending September 30, 1935, we have forwarded for all southwide objects \$148,803.53, including both designated and undesignated funds. During a corresponding period ending September 30, 1934, we forwarded \$120,208.34, a gain of \$28,595.29. In this amount is included \$6,195.79 designated for the Baptist Hundred Thousand Club. Undesignated funds for southwide objects, after deducting \$25,000 annually for Southern Baptist Convention Bonds, are divided as follows:

Of course all designated funds, without any deduction whatever, go direct to the object specified. It is interesting to note that about 11.8 per cent of all money received by Southern Convention Boards and agencies is given by North Carolina Baptists.

B. STATE MISSIONS

We rejoice to state that State Missions came to the end of 1934, not only with no debt but with a credit balance of about \$5,500. This was made possible because of a greatly reduced budget during the past three years, and because the offering for this particular object was the largest since before 1927.

We are operating during 1935 on an enlarged budget, by virtue of the action of the 1934 Convention. No debt, however, is anticipated. We make herewith a brief report concerning what has been undertaken, together with some brief comments upon the State Mission Program as a whole.

1. The Convention last year authorized the employment of "one general missionary, and possibly two" to hold revivals, promote the Every Member Enrollment, and "in general to assist the General Secretary in every way possible to promote every interest of our coöperative work." When the Board met in December, it was thought wise to employ only one. Accordingly Brother M. O. Alexander, then pastor of the First Church of Thomasville, was called to this important task; and on January 1 he entered upon his duties. We record here our tribute to the zeal and intelligence which he has shown in every phase of the work which he has undertaken, as well as to his unusually fine coöperative spirit. His report, which appears below, reveals, partially, his activities and achievements during the first nine months of 1935.

1. Report of M. O. Alexander, General Missionary

Your General Missionary, M. O. Alexander, came with us on January 1, 1935, and has since that time been engaged in a varied work.

He has held five meetings, four (4) of eight days each and one (1) of fourteen days, with the following churches: Brookford, Washington, Rosemary, Siloam, Carrboro.

Attended eleven (11) Pastors' Conferences.

Attended two (2) Pastors' Schools of five days each.

Visited special meetings, spring associational meetings, pastors' associational conferences, etc. (32).

Supplied twenty-nine (29) pulpits.

Visited on their fields forty-four (44) of our Missionary Pastors.

Visited and conferred with eighteen (18) churches requesting appropriations for building purposes, either repairs or to apply on debts.

Visited and spoke to fifteen (15) associations in their annual meetings.

Met with nineteen (19) Associational Promotion Committees and planned with them for Stewardship Schools in the churches of their associations, together with other promotion plans and the Every Member Enrollment.

Delivered two hundred and nine (209) sermons and addresses during the year, and held innumerable conferences with churches and organized groups.

The Board has received from the churches helped, as a direct result of meetings \$369.11.

2. Missionary Pastoral Assistance

We give below a summary of the work done by our 70 missionary pastors from October 1, 1934 to September 30, 1935. Let us bear in mind that we had 86 in 1930, 47 in 1931, 40 in 1932, 48 in 1933 and 56 in 1934. Thus we are on the incline again. Of particular interest is the work which Brother E. M. Harris is doing at Sanatorium and Samarcand. It is not possible to record in figures the true significance of this work. It is of deep and abiding human interest, and Brother Harris rejoices to minister to those who are sick at Sanatorium and to those at Samarcand who have fallen by the way. The summary follows:

4. Indian Work

We report the continuance of Rev. and Mrs. M. C. Lunsford among the Indians of Robeson County, and record our appreciation of the splendid work which they have done and are doing there.

During the year Rev. W. F. Sinclair resigned the work at Cherokee and accepted the pastorate at Robbinsville and general mission work in Graham County. Dr. W. H. Fitzgerald took up the work at Cherokee soon after the resignation of Brother Sinclair. By patience, tact and perseverance, and by virtue of his deep interest in the Indians, he is beginning what promises to be a genuinely substantial work among them. The appropriation for these two fields is now \$2,800.

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Fitzgerald of Cherokee send the following word about the work there:

Looking back over six months' labor here we can thank God and take courage. The Indians have a lean toward religion, as such, in tradition and by missionary contact, but not sufficiently evangelical and zealous of good work. Spiritual tide is low. Organization is difficult. Coöperation is hard to secure. They got much conservatism from our forefathers. Better teaching must come slowly. The Indian cannot be pushed or hurried. A spiritual awakening is our hope. Young people are showing interest. We have some prospective young preachers. Have organized B. T. U., W. M. S., Sunbeams; had D. V. B. S. and Training School. We need help. Would some Sunday school like to be a big brother to one of our churches?

5. The Work With Our Negro Brothers

You authorized last year the resumption of some coöperative work among our Negro brothers. The Board was authorized to "make an

appropriation sufficient to cover at least one half the salary of an able man." This the Board did. The search then began for the man. The General Baptist State Convention, which is the name of the Negro State Convention, at length proposed the name of W. C. Somerville, then pastor at Rocky Mount. To this we agreed. After declining the work for a time he finally accepted and entered upon his duties on March 1. One cannot record in figures the far-reaching effect of his work. However, the brief summary given below does show that he has given himself with abandon to the strenuous task of arousing, enlisting and unifying the great host of about 250,000 Negro Baptists of the state. This report covers his activities from March 1 through September 30. What a gratifying report! His task has been:

To establish confidence among our churches in the General Convention.

To develop good will and fellowship among our constituency.

To build up a steady support of the objects for which our Convention stands.

To provide for the training and development of the membership.

To outline and promote sane evangelism.

To visit and have personal contact with as many ministers as possible.

To assist in the organization of Daily Vacation Bible Schools and Leadership Training Courses.

To hold Ministers' Conferences in an effort to arouse the ministers to a support of the Convention's program and greater usefulness.

During the 7 months period Brother Somerville has:

Traveled 15,818 miles, preached 76 sermons, delivered 121 lectures, visited 187 ministers, spoken to approximately 15,575 persons at various meetings, visited 19 associations and conventions, held 27 Ministers' Conferences.

6. The Oteen Mission

We record again our appreciation of the distinguished work which Brother Wayne W. Williams continues to do at Oteen, both in the hospital and in the church. Moreover, his contacts and influence with the pastors in the western part of the state is wholesome and helpful to the whole State Mission enterprise. Concerning the work at Oteen, we rejoice that other states appreciate the work he is doing to the extent that they are having some share in its maintenance. A brief report from Mr. Williams follows:

Mingled lights and shadows, like sunshine and rain, have fallen across our pathway during this, the ninth, year of our ministry to the sick soldiers on this unique mission field. Through the years it has been a blessed privilege to bring a little sunshine into shadowed lives in the name of the Christ who said, "I was sick and ye visited me." Our ministry is a twofold one.

First, there is the work within the hospital itself. There are 800 patients, all of them tubercular. They come from practically every state of the Southern Baptist Convention. Baptists outnumber all others—approximately forty per cent. The boys die on an average of four a week. During the year that is past sinners have been saved; saints have been comforted; the gospel has been preached over the Government radio station to every bed; Christian literature has been distributed; letters have been written home to loved ones; the dead have been buried; relatives and friends have been brought to and from the trains, and many other services too numerous to mention have been rendered.

Second, there is the work among the wives and children of the men in the community adjoining the hospital, many of whom have come to be near their dear ones in what often proves to be their last battle. This is, in our humble opinion, just as important as the work within the hospital proper. Five years ago, we built a little church to serve the families of the men. Here many of them find salvation, comfort, and strength. We have now 240 members, an average of 150 in Sunday school, and five B. T. U.'s. During the summer a gracious revival was held, B. E. Morris, Statesville, doing the preaching. A fine group of thirty-five were baptized, most of them sons and daughters of the disabled veterans.

114. 7. Pastors' Schools and Conferences

The Convention in its last session committed the whole matter of providing for Pastors' Schools and Conferences to the Board, with the authorization that a representative committee be appointed who after study "will determine upon the best plans for reaching all of our pastors."

Accordingly a special committee was appointed to work in conjunction with the General Secretary. The result was that 14 pastors' conferences were held in various parts of the state. It is hardly too much to say that probably no more significant meetings have been held in many years. The Secretary was assisted by Walt. N. Johnson, General Missionary M. O. Alexander, and missionary pastor J. C. Pipes. About 400 pastors attended these meetings.

Then, for the first time, three pastors' schools were held, one at Meredith, one at Mars Hill, and one, in connection with the Assembly, at Murfreesboro. The program directors were T. H. King, H. W. Baucom and J. L. Carrick. To these the thanks of the Board are due in generous measure. The faculty was superb, and the platform hours were challenging and inspirational. By special arrangement we supplied the Duke school with two platform speakers, viz, E. M. Poteat, Sr., and Walt. N. Johnson, and they in turn sent us H. W. McLaughlin and James Moffatt.

In spite of such an array of talented teachers and speakers, and in

spite of a very low rate for room and board, only about 225 pastors availed themselves of this unexcelled opportunity. Surely every pastor ought to set aside one week in which he can join with his fellow pastors for meditation, study and fellowship. He owes it to himself, to the work, and to God. We must find a way—must search until we find it—to bring together all our pastors into these quiet places of understanding, of vision, and of fellowship.

8. The Pastors' Circulating Library

We record here a brief word about a new feature which has been undertaken, as a part of our State Mission Program. The idea was suggested to the General Secretary last year by Brother D. J. Robinson, pastor in the West Chowan Association. Why not establish a circulating library in the office at Raleigh so that pastors, who were unable to buy some of the books they wanted and needed, might have access to such books? Indeed, why not? As we thought upon it and as we realized that probably eighty per cent of our pastors, especially rural pastors, do not have sufficient income to keep them fit for Kingdom service, the idea took root. It was presented to the Board in the December meeting, and a small appropriation was made, so that a start might be made and postage furnished for transporting the books from the Raleigh office to the pastors. An appeal was then made to pastors who had books which they could give or lend. To date about 500 have been acquired, all of these as gifts or loans. Space forbids a list of those who have made gifts or loans. Mention should be made, however, of the fact that the widows of several pastors have given a part of the books left by their husbands. Our thanks are due them, and we here list their names: Mrs. C. M. Billings, Mrs. T. W. O'Kelley.

Up to October 15 about 450 books had been loaned, most of these going to pastors who in these trying years have been unable to satisfy their thirst for the printed word.

9. Sunday School, B. T. U. and Student Work

The Program of the Sunday school department continues under the vigorous and consecrated leadership of Perry Morgan and L. L. Morgan. We call attention again, in particular, to the Sunday School Revivals. In another part of this report, it will be seen that the number of non-coöperating churches is being reduced. This, in no small measure, is due to these Sunday School Revivals. To be sure it is a sort of by-product, but it is none the less a very valuable by-product. In securing better and larger Sunday schools, in training better teachers, and in many other ways, these revivals are without question a very vital part of our aggressive Sunday school program.

Substantial progress is the order also in the B. T. U. department. We record our appreciation of the far-reaching service which Miss Rickett and Miss Starnes are rendering. Your attention is called especially to the increase in the number of unions, to the emphasis which is being placed upon the study of missions by our young people, and upon the use of religious literature. Our young people deserve the best; and we believe they are getting it.

Miss Cleo Mitchell remains on as sole full time representative among the thousands of students in the colleges. She needs to give her full time at Greensboro; and we need greatly to place a full time representative at Boone and at Duke in the very near future.

The reports of these three departments follow.

117. (1) REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

Perry Morgan, *Secretary of the Department*

The world's greatest preacher and best teacher, Jesus Christ, placed teaching the gospel next to preaching the gospel. He said "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." It is in obedience to His command that churches maintain the Sunday school.

Teaching the scriptures is a charge of major importance committed to New Testament churches.

The Apostle Paul writing to Timothy says "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness; that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works. I charge thee therefore before God, and the Lord Jesus Christ, preach the word; make full proof of thy ministry."

The Sunday school has rendered a ministry that has been a powerful barrier to error and doubt. It has counteracted a flood of evil influences which have threatened through the years to engulf every vestige of Christianity as a vitalizing force in the world. It is a channel through which Christians commit to faithful men the things which they have heard of Him whom to know aright is life eternal.

Characterizing the Year

The year has been one of unusual, not to say strange characteristics. Some of the characteristics of the year are:

1. A YEAR OF EXCEPTIONAL OPPORTUNITY. The opportunity to improve the quality of teaching done in the Sunday school. The New Training Course has been available to all for instruction in the doctrines of the Bible and in the faith of our fathers, for mastery in teaching method, for intellectual and cultural values needed to make full proof of the ministry of teaching.

2. IT HAS BEEN A YEAR OF GENEROUS RESPONSE ON THE PART OF THE CHURCHES. The objectives of the Sunday School Department have been accepted with great favor by the churches. To teach the word and make the word vital in the lives of people, win the lost and make virile vigorous and useful Christians are seen as great objectives by all.

3. A GRACIOUS RESPONSE BY INDIVIDUALS. An unusual characteristic of the year has been the hearty response given by individuals to do volunteer work in the field of teacher training.

4. THE STATE OF PUBLIC HEALTH HINDERED SOME MAJOR PLANS. June the first saw many of our Sunday schools closed to all departments and classes up through the Juniors. On this account attendance by Intermediates, Young People and Adults was cut down considerably. Our people were almost paralyzed with fear of the epidemic of infantile paralysis which swept through the state. About six hundred cases were reported. The schools have not yet regained all of the pupils. Never before has Sunday school attendance been suspended so completely on any account in North Carolina.

5. VOLUNTEER PROJECTS UNDERTAKEN. Much of the fear caused by the epidemic of poliomyelitis subsided by the beginning of September. After that time we were privileged to resume field operations and Simultaneous Volunteer Training Schools were conducted in six Associations.

6. NUMEROUS CALLS FOR HELP UNANSWERED. During the year many urgent calls for help came to the Department that were never answered because there was no one to go. They came from every section of the state and from every type of church in rural as well as urban sections.

7. A TIME OF RENEWED INTEREST IN BUILDING CHURCH HOUSES. Many congregations have remodeled and enlarged their Sunday school equipment. Some have built new houses providing for larger Sunday school attendance. The return of a measure of prosperity to rural churches has quickened interest in church building. Likewise several city churches have launched building projects.

8. THE TREND IN PUBLIC MORALS HAS BEEN DOWNWARD. Witness the change in attitude toward liquor and the sale of beverage alcohol. Hardly had the liquor interests recovered from the shock they received when our state voted 184,000 majority in favor of retaining the Eighteenth Amendment to the Federal Constitution when a presumably dry state legislature passed laws allowing sixteen counties to establish liquor stores. Drunkenness is increasing daily. The mania for speed on the public highways coupled with the drinking of alcoholic beverages is taking an immense toll of human life. Our government seems impotent in the face of the mad rush for alcohol and speed. The Sunday school has done much in the past to stem the tide of intemperance. It must function now as never before.

9. THE YEAR HAS BEEN ONE OF CHALLENGE TO MORAL FORCES. We are

learning that moral forces and leaders cannot slumber serenely while evil stalks abroad in the land. They must awake to the fact that they should seize upon the Sunday school and bring it to a state of efficiency that will enable us to combat the flood of evil that threatens to engulf the forces of right and stamp out Christianity as a vital force in the world. "Awake, awake, put on strength; hearken unto me, ye that know righteousness, the people in whose heart is my law."

An All-South Conference

The Fifth Southern Baptist Sunday School Conference was held in the City of Raleigh, January 1-4, 1935. More than three thousand people from all the states in the Southern Baptist Convention attended the sessions.

No State Conference Held

No State-wide meeting was held this year because the Fifth Southern Baptist Sunday School Conference was held in North Carolina so near the beginning of the year.

State Convention, Charlotte, January 21-23, 1936

That our people may not lack anything in inspiration for their Sunday school work there will be held in the City of Charlotte, at the First Baptist Church, January 21-23, 1936, an All-State Convention for Sunday school workers. The key note of the Convention will be "Jesus taught them, saying"—

Some Major Activities in the Department

Rural Enlargement Campaigns and Sunday School Revivals were conducted in three Associations with success. These were the Union, Sandy Creek and Randolph. Enlargement Campaigns and Sunday School Revivals scheduled in the Liberty and Beulah Associations were cancelled on account of the epidemic of infantile paralysis in the state. However, seven of the churches in the Pamlico Association had fine results in Enlargement. They were Belhaven, Engelhard, Fairfield, North Lake, Rose Bay, Swan Quarter and Sladeville. A church was constituted at Sladeville as a result.

In the 96 churches taking part in rural Enlargement Campaigns 5,210 people were reached for study in training classes using the book "Building a Standard Sunday School." A religious census made revealed 26,730 possibilities for the Sunday schools, an enrollment of 11,843, an average attendance for the previous three months of 6,873, a resident church membership of 10,744, number of people nine years of age and over not church members 8,616, number of officers and teachers found was 1,223. In these Campaigns 256 new Sunday school classes were set up and 767

new teachers and officers were enlisted and put to work to enlist more people in Bible study.

Owen, Ruth Preslar, Mabel Stroup, Flora Mae Cavenaugh, Bill Dancy, Maude Jones, Lois Morgan, Billie Ruth Currin, and Ruby Daniel. Dr. B. W. Spilman and Secretary J. N. Barnette gave valuable help in preparing our workers for the Campaigns. We are greatly indebted to Superintendent I. G. Greer and all the other workers at Mills Home for the privilege of spending four days, June 19-22, on the campus in a period of intensive study and training for the work prior to going on the field.

2. VOLUNTEER TRAINING SCHOOLS. William B. Batts, Superintendent, Nash County Sunday School Association, which embraces twenty of the sixty-nine churches of the Roanoke Association planned and conducted training schools using volunteer teachers. More than five hundred people were enrolled in the training classes. Vance A. Browning led the Tennessee River Association in its third year of volunteer schools with class attendance exceeding 1,500. Fred Jarvis led twenty of the thirty-nine churches in the French Broad Association in Volunteer Schools. A. G. Hamrick and J. A. Hunnicutt led thirty-four churches in the Sandy Run Association in a week of training, using local volunteer teachers. In the Kings Mountain Association thirty-eight of the churches held training schools simultaneously. Volunteer teachers led the classes. More than five hundred teacher training awards were granted in this one project. J. W. Costner, Superintendent, was the leader. Twenty churches led by J. T. Allen held simultaneous schools in the Raleigh Association. In the Liberty Association Walter L. Warfford led a similar group. G. C. Hewitt of the South Fork, D. L. Friday and David E. Bobbitt of the Gaston were the directors of volunteer schools in these Associations. A total of 175 churches took part in this type of school.

3. SPECIAL CAMPAIGNS AND SINGLE PROJECTS. While attention was given to rural work the Department of Sunday School Work has not neglected urban sections. A number of city churches have held Enlargement Campaigns. Conferences, weeks of training in schools and colleges, Associational Conventions, district rallies, assemblies at Chowan College and in the South Yadkin Association at Harmony have claimed the attention of the Sunday School Department.

Conference for Associational Superintendents

A constructive conference was held at the First Church, Concord, October 3-5 for Associational Superintendents. Secretary J. N. Barnette of Nashville and State Field Worker John Maguire of Montgomery, Alabama, rendered valuable service. The Sunday School Board at Nashville gave financial assistance.

Vacation Bible Schools

The season began auspiciously in this field. On the first of June there were fine prospects for 140 schools. Thirty-two schools were going when the epidemic of poliomyelitis struck the state. Some of them suspended at the end of the second day while nearly all of them closed at the end of the first week. They did not open again. Plans made for schools by nearly a hundred churches did not materialize. A survey shows that forty-eight schools were held. Again we had the support and financial assistance of the Sunday School Board at Nashville in promoting this work.

Surveying the Needs

A survey of the Sunday school field reveals some urgent needs.

1. **TRAINED WORKERS ARE NEEDED.** Awards given for Teacher Training during the year number 5,756. There should be a training class in every church.

2. **EQUIPMENT.** Every school should be equipped for better teaching. Many of the small churches have scant equipment such as class rooms, chairs, blackboard, teacher training books, libraries, song books, and musical instruments.

3. **LEADERSHIP IS NEEDED.** Lack of leaders is evident in many churches large and small. There is urgent need for consecrated but vigorous leadership that is trained and has a vision of the Sunday school task.

4. **MORE WORKERS ARE NEEDED.** A division of labor is a paramount need. Too few are engaged in the work. To every man *his* work. Talents are tucked away in a napkin. Pastors are urged to be good overseers and take heed to all the flock dividing out the work.

5. **A LARGER PROGRAM.** A larger program that challenges the whole of the church membership. A program that includes teaching, training, visiting, evangelism, preaching more often in many churches, giving to Missions and benevolences, and Annual Enrollment of all of our people in all of our work.

6. **A NEW CONCEPTION OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.** A conception that will make our people Sunday school-minded. A revelation of what the Sunday school really is and what it can be used to accomplish in bringing in the Kingdom of our Lord.

7. **A NEW VALUATION OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.** The work of the Sunday school is to disseminate and diffuse truth. Jesus said "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free." The march of truth is central in Sunday school work. It is essential in Christian education that seeks to make desirable changes in human character and conduct. It is a means of preparing the way for evangelism, making evangelism more effective and following up evangelism making it more fruitful.

Its objective is to win the lost for Christ, help Christians acquire valuable knowledge, develop right attitudes, make right choices, live the abundant life, and to develop Christian character.

8. A PROPER APPRECIATION OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL. An importance needs to be accorded the Sunday school such as never before given it for what it has done and for what it can do if properly used to magnify preaching, promote preaching attendance, secure universal study of the Bible, teach the great Christian doctrines, teach and train in Missionary practices, proagate distinctive Baptist principles, build citizenship, teach regard for law and authority and stabilize human society.

9. A RENEWED ACCEPTANCE OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL. The churches should accept the Sunday school with renewed assurance that no institution, religious, educational, fraternal, or otherwise is doing more to combat evil, correct error, right wrongs, extend purifying influences, and determine the destiny of the human race than is the Sunday school.

10. THE HORIZON EXTENDED. There are needy and destitute places where Sunday schools should be organized. The circle should be enlarged. Expansion, multiplication, growth, extension, and progress have always been fundamental principles and preëminent characteristics of Baptists. To cease our activities at this point will be contrary to the pioneer Baptist spirit of progress and to the heroic conquering ideals of other years.

Look out! See the throng
That battles hard against the wrong,
Lift the light, hold it high!
View their struggles, hear their cry!
Tell it out! Shout the word!
Let the message loudly heard
Speak "salvation's of the Lord."
Tell the story face to face
To hungry souls in lonely place,
Not of one's self, but by His grace.
Salvation's had in the Christian's race.

Other Duties Assumed

Coupled with Sunday school work the Secretary of the Department is charged with heavy duties as Statistical Secretary. It is a tremendous task that consumes much of his time during September, October, November and December. The Secretary also has given much time in the fall months to general work assisting the Mission Secretary in promoting the Convention's program of Enlistment.

Workers in the Department

The Sunday School Department is located at 200 Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh. Perry Morgan is completing his sixteenth year of service. Field Worker L. L. Morgan is in his tenth year with the De-

partment. He is faithful, loyal, efficient, wise, experienced, highly trained, a very useful servant of the Lord, and a hopeful, enthusiastic, upward-looking, untiring and zealous worker. Miss Bessie Morgan continues as Office Secretary. She is experienced, capable, and is highly appreciated by the Department leaders. Mrs. M. D. Herndon, Gastonia, resigned as Approved Extension Department Worker. Mrs. C. D. Bain, Dunn, continues as Approved Elementary Worker; Mrs. John B. Lane, Lenoir, remains with the Department as Approved Intermediate Worker; Mrs. A. V. Washburn, Goldsboro, and Mrs. F. A. Bower, Albemarle, continue as Qualified Elementary Workers.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That the Sunday School Department be given larger appropriations for field operations and more workers as soon as financial conditions will justify the same.

2. That in view of the pressing needs for advancing all of the present workers be continued in the Department of Sunday School Work.

3. That all of the pastors give their best support to plans of the Department to hold a great State Convention in Charlotte, January 21-23, 1936.

4. That the plan of conducting rural enlargement campaigns and revivals be continued on a coöperative basis by the Training Commission of the General Board, the Sunday School Board, the State Sunday School Department, the District Associations and the churches. That sufficient appropriation be made to finance at least ten Associational Revival and Enlargement Campaigns using forty specially selected workers, chosen by the State Sunday School Secretary, from a group of experienced workers and students in our schools, colleges and seminaries.

5. That North Carolina Baptist Sunday School workers join the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in making July 19-24, 1936, a really worth while week of Sunday school leadership training.

3. Our debt to the Sunday School Board for the support given through Dr. I. J. Van Ness the retiring Secretary and Dr. T. L. Holcomb the new Secretary in providing financial aid, special workers, free literature, etc.

4. Genuine affection for our co-workers in all departments of the work at Convention headquarters, and a great host of pastors and other

church leaders throughout the state who have opened their homes and hearts to us as we have gone up and down the land seeking to promote the work.

5. Our debt to the Biblical Recorder and its editor for space in the paper to record facts about the work and news notes concerning it.

We come to the end of the year with thankfulness. We face the new year with assurance and a desire to commit that which we have heard of Him to faithful men that they may be able to teach others the scriptures given by inspiration of the Holy Spirit.

118. (2) REPORT OF BAPTIST TRAINING UNION

The past year has been one of marked progress for the Department of Baptist Training Union work. Throughout all the activities of the Baptist Training Union we have tried to emphasize spiritual values above every thing else. We would express our appreciation to those who are associated with the department. Miss Mabel Starnes has worked tirelessly and effectively in practically every section of the state. Her life has been dedicated to the task during these three years. Mrs. J. E. Tharrington has served faithfully in the home office and her quiet loyalty has been a constant source of inspiration to us as we have gone over the state.

Fundamentals of Baptist Training Unions

Throughout the year we have tried to emphasize fundamental principles of the work. We enthusiastically adopted the name "Baptist Training Union" as the name of that department of church work which includes all B. Y. P. U.'s and B. A. U.'s. The training program in the local Baptist church for training church members is now called the Baptist Training Union. In Associations it is called the Associational Baptist Training Union. But it should be kept in mind that the individual units in the Baptist Training Union are still B. Y. P. U.'s and B. A. U.'s, as they have been. We recommend that our workers everywhere use the whole name "Training Union," instead of the initials, B. T. U.

The aim of this organization, "Training in Church Membership," is still the same. If a union is to realize its aim there are definite objectives which it should attempt to reach. They are loyalty to Christ, church loyalty and denominational loyalty.

Ridgecrest

This year we were forced to cancel our State Baptist Training Union Convention-Assembly at Ridgecrest because of the infantile paralysis

epidemic. However, we were happy to have over three hundred of our young people and their leaders at Ridgecrest in August for the Southwide Leadership Assembly. The churches who had representatives at this meeting profited greatly from the enlarged vision of the representatives.

Fourth Southwide Training Union Conference

The Fourth Southwide Baptist Training Union Conference will be held in Birmingham, Alabama, December 31, 1935-January 3, 1936. We are expecting to have two hundred of our North Carolina young people there for the meeting. One feature of the meeting will be the celebration of the Fortieth Anniversary of the founding of Southern B. Y. P. U. Dr. Van Ness and B. D. Gray, two members of the committee which called the first Southwide B. Y. P. U. meeting in 1895, will be there along with other pioneers. The program will be varied and interesting. Kagawa, of Japan, will draw thousands. Associational leaders, church directors, pastors and young people are urged to go.

Regional Conventions

In the spring we will hold our tenth series of annual regional meetings. We are grateful for the splendid work our regional officers have done in 1934-'35. Meeting places and dates for 1936 are: Eastern, March 20-21, Goldsboro; Southern, March 27-28, Rockingham; Central, April 3-4, Green Street, High Point; West Central, April 10-11, Shelby; Western, April 17-18, Cullowhee.

Study Courses

A number of study course books have been added in each department of the work. In addition to the regular courses, during the past year a B. A. U. course of study has been planned. Below we list the books that are in this course.

VI. The Church Member and the Social Order. (Book not ready.)

VII. The Church Member and His Bible: Book—Our Doctrines, Tribble.

VIII. Christian Witnessing: Book—The Fine Art of Soul Winning, Hamilton.

IX. The Stewardship of Possessions: Books—1. Our Lord and Ours, Burroughs. 2. Our Church and Ours, Burroughs.

X. The Church Member and Missions: Book—Witnessing at Home and Around the World.

Beginning on October 15, 1935, the study course awards will be issued from the Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tennessee. Requests for awards, however, will still come to the Baptist Training Union Department of our State, where a copy will be kept and another sent to Nashville. All awards will be free of charge.

Associational Work

Our Associational Baptist Training Union work makes it possible for us to touch the leaders in various churches. Leadership classes in different Associations have made possible more effective work in local churches. The extension work in our Associations has resulted in many new unions, a large number of study courses and a general strengthening of Training Union work. It has also been easier for us to foster our denominational program with our young people, where the Associational unions functioned as they should.

(3) STUDENT WORK

By CLEO MITCHELL

"Statisticians universally agree that in America today there are, in round numbers, 1,000,000 college students. Of this one million college students, away from home and the home church, 100,000 are Southern Baptist students," says Mr. Frank H. Leavell. He says further, "From them will come, in large numbers, the trusted leaders, dependable pioneers, and faithful workers for all phases of denominational activities in the years just ahead. It is more than gratifying that they have heard the voice of their denomination, have accepted the program of religious activity provided by their denomination, and are faithful in fullest coöperation and enthusiastic promotion of that program."

In coöperation with the Department of Southern Baptist Student Work, North Carolina Baptists seek to minister to the spiritual needs of the thousands of our own college young people. "A composite statement of the philosophy of the approach of Southern Baptists to their students," according to Mr. Leavell, may be given in the following sentences. "They approach the students through the churches in the college centers, making

the church the central unit of activity in and through which all possible religious activity is directed. They ask students to join the local church while in college. They afford what literature and leadership is necessary to make the religious activities alluring and effective. They give them the best of whatever they give and expect the best in return. They seek to match the physical and intellectual development of students with a corresponding spiritual development. They encourage scrupulous fidelity of students to the local church. They seek to lead them to maintain affection for their church as they did before going to college, and as they should maintain after college days and throughout life.

With such loyalty preserved through the college years, thereby bridging the four year chasm of the college experience, the more privileged of their youth will return to their homes, to their churches, to their district associations, and to their states to dedicate their best and their all to the advancement of the Kingdom of God throughout the world. Such is our aim." The eternal verities of God's Word are uncompromisingly held up and we find an acceptance of these in the students' daily living.

A normal church life is promoted then through emphasis on local church membership, personal soul winning, stewardship and missions. The organized Sunday school classes, Baptist Training Unions, Young Woman's Auxiliaries, and groups of special workers afford training and development in all phases of the denominational program. During the past year on fourteen of our college campuses Baptist Student Unions have functioned. The newest of these organizations is the one at E. C. T. C. On the campuses where summer sessions were held the same plan of work—linking the student with the church—was continued. Many college students last summer proved valuable assets in their local church program and in conducting study courses in near by churches.

The Baptist students of North Carolina working through the Baptist Student Unions of the local campus coöperate in a State Baptist Student Union organization. Last year Bob Costner, student at Mars Hill, served most effectively as president. The far reaching program of the recent North Carolina B. S. U. Convention, held in Raleigh October 25-27, attested to the harmonious coöperation of student, state denominational, and Southern Baptist leadership. For the coming year Al Martin, student at Wake Forest, has been elected as president.

Throughout the South, churches in increasing numbers are observing "Student Night at Christmas." This event, the last Sunday night of the year, has won its way into the regular program of scores of churches in our state. Suggested programs may be secured from the Department of Southern Baptist Student Work.

At Woman's College, University of North Carolina, we have three hundred and fifty Baptist students this school year. Already nearly three-fourths of them are actively enlisted in the denominational pro-

gram. About one-fourth have placed their letters in local Baptist churches, and the majority are contributing regularly to the Coöperative Program. Plans are in operation for worthy mission love offerings at Christmas and in March. Special emphasis is being laid on spiritual values. As an aid and encouragement to daily Bible reading, B. T. U. Daily Bible Readers' leaflets have been given to each Baptist, and Baptist preference, student. Daily prayer for specific changes in the lives of individuals and in the group as a whole are offered by prayer mates and the group prayer meetings. Study of Christian leadership, soul winning, missions and doctrines, in the year's program is already bearing fruit in student life. The Baptist Student House, adjacent to the campus, is indispensable to the promotion of the program. It serves as office, as a meeting place for organization business meetings, prayer, Y. W. A. socials, study courses and the like; and as a "home away from home" for each student.

In the denominational program with our college students today a definite need is for student secretaries. Mr. Frank Leavell, Executive Secretary of the Department of Southern Baptist Student Work, states regarding this: "Spiritual force demands spiritual leadership. Spiritual forces among youth especially demand leadership. Accordingly the greatest need of the B. S. U. work for its further usefulness is spiritual leadership. For such leadership we look to trained workers of post graduate experience. Such workers we designate as student secretaries. This demand for student secretaries manifests itself in three areas: (1) On the local campus; (2) In the state; (3) Southwide. This group of workers is steadily growing from year to year. This investment by Southern Baptists in character, culture and Christian growth is an investment for both time and eternity." In North Carolina at the present time we have only two student secretaries: Miss Marguerite Mason at Meredith College and Miss Cleo Mitchell at Woman's College, U. N. C. A daily schedule of this "spiritual coach" may include interviews with students concerning personal problems of doubt, convictions, vocational choice, and practical Christianity; interviews with leaders concerning organization plans and problems; definite planning for each unit organization—Sunday school classes, B. T. U.'s, Y. W. A.'s, and study courses; conducting prayer meetings; teaching classes in various denominational training programs; planning recreational activities; serving as friend and adviser to each student; magnifying the church and representing Christ on the campus.

The problems and needs of our college constituency are urgently challenging. We must meet the challenge or face the future with many of our college trained youth lost to the Master's service. When we adequately present Christ and His program to the college youth we find him responding with loyalty and faithfulness to the religious leadership

of his own denomination. Thus with youth and maturity clasping hands in the Master's service we can go forth to make vital the B. S. U. Convention keynote, "Sharing Christ with a Waiting World."

Department of Education

A. REPORT OF THE COLLEGES

120.

1. Wake Forest College

The chief items of interest for the session 1934-35 were:

1. The largest enrollment in the history of the College—1024.
2. Completion of the New Physical Education Building.

3. Alterations to the old gymnasium so that the main hall houses the Social Science Department, thereby turning over to the Law School the entire second floor of the Library Building. The ground floor of the old gymnasium now houses the Student Center, consisting of the College Book Store, "W" Club, student offices for all publications, namely, Old Gold and Black, The Student, and The Howler, offices and assembly room for the B. S. U. the Student Council, barber shop, and a large central lobby. This Student Center is serving a great need. The old gymnasium thus becomes one of the most useful buildings on the campus.

Additions to the faculty for the present session are as follows:

Dean Dale F. Stansbury and Professor Walter H. Coulson have been added to the Law Faculty, Doctor H. D. Parcell to the French Department, and Professor M. J. Haygood to the English Department.

121.

2. Meredith College

Our registrations for session 1935-1936 number at this date 503. This is approximately what it was same date a year ago. Of this number 403 are boarding students, 69 are day students, and 31 are specials. They register from two foreign countries and fourteen states. Seventy-six counties of North Carolina are represented.

Miss Janie Parker, who had held so efficiently the position of Assistant Dean of Women, resigned at the close of the session of 1934-1935. To succeed Miss Parker the Trustees secured Miss Hazel Clark of New Jersey. Miss Clark has had special training for that work as well as successful experience in the administration of such an office. She has made an excellent beginning at Meredith.

Miss Elizabeth Foster comes to us to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Miss Carolyn Peacock as instructor in English. Miss Foster has two degrees from the University of Texas and has had further study at Yale. Her experience in teaching includes faculty con-

nections both at the University of Texas and the University of Maine. She is giving excellent satisfaction.

Miss Virginia Branch, of our Music Department, is away this session and Miss Mary Lee, who is a graduate of that department, is supplying the place most acceptably.

Miss Carolyn Wray, a graduate of Meredith College, has been added to our teaching staff as instructor in ancient languages and psychology. She is making an excellent start.

Operating expenses have been met in full. There is no deficit. Last year the faculty took a cut of ten per cent in salaries. It is hoped that it will be possible to pay full salaries throughout the current session.

3. Chowan College

Chowan College opened this fall with an enrollment equal to that of last year. There is an increase in the number of dormitory students. Though it was necessary for us to open school without a president, due to the sudden death of Dr. Edwards, work has gone along smoothly. Students and faculty have exhibited a fine spirit of coöperation.

During the summer a number of the dormitory rooms were renovated. New floors were laid and the walls and woodwork were painted. Also, some changes are being made in the heating plant to insure more efficient heating of the buildings and to make it possible to heat the water in the swimming pool.

4. Mars Hill College

ENROLLMENT: On October 15, 1935, the enrollment is 568—in junior college 494, Academy 56, special 18; while the 1934-35 enrollment was 535. Thirty-eight are ministerial students, and six are children of missionaries.

FACULTY: Miss Pierce is away on leave for study at Cornell completing work for the Doctor's degree. Miss Gregg is out for the fall term on account of illness. Miss Annie Brackett, former teacher and pupil, is supplying in the English department and Mr. C. H. Beale, graduate of Richmond and Peabody colleges, is taking overflow classes in the department of history. Mrs. Thomas Rogers is acting Dean of women for the present session.

SUMMER SCHOOL: The opening of a division of the Wake Forest-Meredith Summer School at Mars Hill is a significant event. Under the direct supervision of Professor B. Y. Tyner of Meredith College, assisted by Dean Carr of Mars Hill, excellent work was done. The faculty was capable, the students enthusiastic, and the enrollment (212) encouraging for a new undertaking. There is a large place in Western North Carolina for this liberal arts summer school.

IMPROVEMENTS: The W. F. Robinson Memorial Infirmary costing \$10,000 was occupied, though only partially furnished, at the opening of

the session, and a new heating system for the Gymnasium and Administration building was installed during the opening weeks. New equipment has been purchased for the library and the grounds have been beautified. A thousand dollar gift for the endowment, donor unknown, is acknowledged and \$2,000 are in hand as the beginning of a fund for a new Girls Home.

INTANGIBLES: Some things cannot be tabulated or computed—the value of the good-will of our friends, the loyalty of former students, spiritual tone, the indefinable thing called atmosphere, and the faith that sees and holds on. In these things we hope that real progress has been made. There is need to enlarge the place of our tent and to strengthen the stakes, and the coöperation of our friends everywhere is coveted as a program of enlargement is envisioned.

5. Campbell College

In its first year the new administration has endeavored to uphold the traditions and standards of Campbell College, and at the same time has been laying plans for a more glorious future. The responses coming from alumni and friends everywhere indicate a loyal devotion to the institution and a deep seated conviction that it holds a permanent place in our denominational program.

Outstanding events and developments during the present Convention year are:

1. Payment of the last thousand dollar note due the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company, leaving the college free of debt.

2. Loss by death of our legal adviser and faithful trustee, John C. Clifford, of Dunn.

3. Selection of the following new members of the faculty to replace resignations: Alexander Burkot, graduate of Dickinson College and graduate student of the University of Berlin and the University of North Carolina, teacher of Modern Languages; C. P. Stasavich, graduate of Lenoir-Rhyne College, teacher of high school mathematics and assistant coach; Miss Mildred Moore, B.M., Meredith College, instructor in piano; Miss Rilda Mae Hill, B.S., Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, instructor in shorthand and typewriting.

4. Introduction of a new pupil guidance program. A new cumulative record card designed by the American Council on Education forms the basis for giving the faculty advisers detailed information concerning every pupil.

5. Formulation of plan for launching a campaign to secure a substantial endowment for the college.

We are grateful for the coöperation of Secretary M. A. Huggins and other denominational leaders, who have rendered invaluable aid in establishing the new administration.

C. OUR DEBT

We are grateful that we can report a substantial reduction in our educational debts. It is hoped that during the calendar year 1935 we shall reduce our bonded and note indebtedness by at least \$40,000. In addition we are reducing the indebtedness to Campbell and Wingate. We do not give here a full report as the audited account of the Debt Service Fund for the calendar year 1935 will appear in the Minutes of this Convention when they are printed.

We are happy to report that we have been able to set aside month by month into the sinking funds the amount required by the agreements entered into two years ago when our big bond and note indebtedness was refinanced. In a word, we are paying debts and at the same time we are maintaining the faith and credit of the Baptist State Convention. The load is heavy but our people are carrying it with a smile. One of these days we are going to rise up in our strength and get these debts behind us. We do not propose to forget our obligations to our creditors. Neither do we propose in the meantime to forget our obligations to others who are in need of support, hospital care, or those people in our state and elsewhere who need the gospel preached to them, and who cannot wait—must not wait—until our debts are paid in order to hear it.

For lack of space, this report must be confined mainly to the work in North Carolina. However, attention should be called to two or three

matters about our general work in which the Baptists of the South have a common interest.

You will be gratified, I am sure, to know that the plan for coöperation with the Foreign Mission Board in the relief of its disabled missionaries is now in operation, and that 413 of these are now participants in its Annuity funds, and 22 are on its pension roll, of whom two are now living among us. A similar arrangement also has been perfected with our orphanages for relief of their retired workers, but this is not expected to become effective until next January.

Space does not allow an explanation of the several Annuity plans now being operated by the Board, whereby 46 men and women are already receiving annuities, having passed the required age of 68, or because of physical infirmities beforehand—the men receiving \$500.00 and widows \$300.00 annually. It is earnestly hoped that not only our ministers, but our churches as a body will acquaint themselves with the several annuity plans and coöperate with pastors by enabling the latter to participate in such plans.

You will observe that it is not yet certain whether our old ministers or their widows can participate in the advantages offered by the Federal government's Old Age Security Plan. As finally passed by the House, this measure was so amended as to exclude all salaried officials of churches; so it may turn out that several of a church's *members* may participate in the benefits offered by the government, while its aged and helpless *minister* is excluded. But, in any case, this Federal plan will not become fully effective for several years. Meanwhile, let it be remembered that the government is already providing for its officials and many of its workers when they become disqualified for self support by age or infirmity. Can the churches of our Lord afford to do less for *their* helpless servants? And does not a denomination in ordaining a man assume moral responsibility for his support, not only during his period of service, but after age or infirmity has rendered him helpless?

It may be added that Secretary Watts is trying to perfect a plan which will offer better advantages than those promised by the government.

The Board's only available funds for Relief allocations come from its 3½% of the churches' contributions through the Coöperative Program, together with income from a small Reserve Relief Fund which it is trying to build up. All such funds are applied directly to relief, without any reduction for operating expenses. Exceptions to this statement are that Georgia, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, South Carolina and Virginia receive incomes from special trust funds held by these several states.

As to our State, the figures speak for themselves, and they do not tell a pleasant story; for while we have eighteen more on the list of

beneficiaries than last year, this has been made possible by *reducing existing allocations*, so that the average monthly allocations of \$6.65 two years ago have now fallen to \$4.75 for men and a few cents less for women.

The figures also tell us that in spite of improved conditions, North Carolina contributed to the Board last year nearly one-fourth less than the year before, and only four-fifths as much as it received from the Board. Moreover, only four of our sister Southern States contributed less in proportion than we did.

The following comparisons only darken the picture. According to statistics gathered by Secretary Watts, the Southern Methodists, with only 8,000 active ministers, have 3,422 on their relief rolls, while Southern Baptists, with 22,800 ministers, have less than 1,500. Northern Baptists, with half as many ministers as have Southern Baptists, are paying relief money to 600 more than we are; and Southern Presbyterians, with one-tenth as many ministers as we have, are paying relief benefits to one-third more veterans than we are. These comparisons are odious—so odious that it pains me to present them. But my hope is that they may shame us all into some worthy action.

As it seems to me, our first concern should be the creation of a *denominational conscience* on this subject, as we have been doing with gratifying success on missions, orphanage work, etc.; and for this service we must depend largely on our pastors, as we have depended heretofore in other matters. It will seem to them at first a delicate matter. So it seemed to Paul at first; but he soon saw his error, apologized for it, and then strongly urged this duty upon the churches at Corinth and Galatia and on his assistant, Timothy.

So, will our pastors pardon a few suggestions from one no longer able to share the burden with them?

It might be well for them first to quicken their own consciences by a prayerful study of I Cor. 8:8-14, Gal. 6:6, and I Tim. 5:18; and then ponder the wide implications and applications of Deut. 12:19: "See that thou forget not the Levite as long as thou livest on earth."

Then give the subject a good hour in your annual conferences, and that not once, nor twice, but until the denomination begins to awaken.

Take measures to inform your people on this subject, about which they now know next to nothing, and, therefore, can be expected to do nothing. As to means of disseminating this information, seek to put into their hands the varied literature which the Board has on hand and will send freely on application. This literature includes short dramas, which many churches and Sunday schools, led by their women, would doubtless help to put on.

Consider setting aside at least one Sunday morning service a year for this subject in all our churches.

Stress especially the Board's Service Annuity Plan, and seek to induce your churches to coöperate in enabling their pastors to participate in it. The present percentage in annual contributions would not raise a decent support in a hundred years.

Finally, study the plan in operation among the Episcopalians, whereby each church voluntarily sets aside one-sixth of its pastor's salary annually for an old age pension fund.

Your combined wisdom, I am sure, will enable you not only to decide on the wisdom of these suggestions, but to suggest other lines perhaps; and you may be sure Secretary Watts will gratefully welcome your suggestions.

127. B. REPORT OF BAPTIST ORPHANAGE OF NORTH CAROLINA

The year 1935 brings the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina to the close of a fifty years' experience in orphanage work. These checkered years have met with temporary defeats as well as gratifying victories.

By adopting and pursuing a wise financial policy you have accumulated assets valued at approximately \$1,500,000.00. All this has been done without asking the Baptist State Convention for a dollar. At the present time your orphanage is not paying one cent of interest, and except for current bills, all of which we hope to meet with your Thanksgiving offering, the Home is free from debt. The greater part of our endowment fund and practically all of our buildings have come as direct gifts from individuals. Many of those generous-hearted, Godly men and women who made it possible for orphan children to have homes are now living in their mansions eternal in the heavens. The once-a-month collections, the gifts of produce, and the Thanksgiving offerings have made it possible for you to touch human life at its greatest need. You can ill afford to abandon or invade a policy that has worked so well. As a memorial to those who laid this foundation, and on behalf of the children who are still looking to you for hope, we ask that you reaffirm your faith in this financial policy, and pledge your all to make it even more inclusive and effective than it has been in the past.

At the present time there are many sources of income for our Current Fund. Individual gifts continue to come from many who love the children and desire to support them. Some send liberal gifts and ask that their names be kept secret and the gift published as merely from "a friend."

The interest from the Endowment Fund is used to help support the children and pay current fund expenses. This income is a big help in our work. In 1934 this amounted to \$28,928.69. We cannot expect as good a yield in the future. Interest rates on bonds and other securities

in endowment funds are lower than they have been. The income from this source will necessarily be less.

Undesignated gifts in wills are a great help. From time to time friends remember the Orphanage in their wills, and request the money be used as the trustees think best. In this way we may have a fund for repair work and for meeting other pressing needs. Profits from Charity and Children and Job Work are used in the current fund. The income from "Gifts in Kind" is a great blessing. This refers to gifts other than cash, such as produce, clothing, grain and groceries. In 1934 gifts of this kind amounted to about \$8,000.00.

Each year we receive a check from the Duke Endowment. This gift for 1934 amounted to \$13,483.20. We are grateful for this aid. It always comes at the time when it is most needed.

Our greatest source of income for current funds is from the Baptist churches and Sunday schools of North Carolina. In 1934, out of the total receipts from all sources amounting to \$176,659.12, we received from churches and Sunday schools \$112,172.26. This came from once a month offerings by the Sunday schools and from the Thanksgiving Day offerings by the churches and Sunday schools.

For the first time in the history of the orphanage, this year our farms have produced enough feed and grain for our poultry, hogs, dairy herd and other livestock.

It has been necessary to draw heavily on the treasury recently in order that we might paint and repair buildings, and make other necessary improvements. According to the auditor's report the expense bill in caring for your large family averages around four hundred dollars a day.

The orphanage is not rich. It will never be rich except in the happy experience and consciousness of knowing that within its folds there are hundreds of children who have been rescued from the barren peaks and shifting sands of want.

The health of the children has been unusually good, but the Father has seen fit to take three of our faithful workers. Mrs. Annie Wartman, who for many years served as kitchen matron at the Hutchinson Building, went to her reward May 7, 1935. On March 15th, Mr. Mack Edinger, faithful carpenter at Mills Home, laid down his tools and went to be with the carpenter of Nazareth. Archibald Johnson, who for 39 years had so ably edited *Charity and Children*, on the evening of December 29th fell on sleep. For many years Mr. Johnson had been one of the most prominent members of the Baptist State Convention. He had courage enough to champion any righteous cause and had religion enough to change his position if he found he was in the wrong. No greater friend of the orphan child has lived in any generation.

G. Stanley Hall has well said, "To know, love and serve childhood is the most satisfying and soul filling of all human activities. It gives our

lives a rounded out completeness found in no other service. No other object is so worthy of service and sacrifice, and the fullness of the measure in which this is rendered is the very best test of a nation, of a race, or of a civilization."

As we reflect upon the achievements of the past, it is a temptation to linger with those who have made it possible for us to come to this hour. It is an even greater temptation to sit down and enjoy things as they are, but yonder is a broken home, a woman and children, victims of circumstances over which they have no control. More than four hundred children are knocking at your door. Shall we respond to their call? Yes, every fiber of our religious nature impels us to march straight to the child who has been swept from his moorings and robbed of his birth-right. It was such a spirit as this that prompted Henry Van Dyke to write:

"March swiftly on. Yet err not from the way
Where all the nobly wise of old have trod,—
The path of faith, made by the sons of God.

"Follow the marks they have set beside
The narrow cloud-swept track, to be thy guide;
Follow, and honor what the past has gained,
And forward still, that more may be attained.

"Something to learn, and something to forget;
Hold fast the good, and seek the better yet;
Press on, and prove the pilgrim—hope of youth."

128. C. REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL, INC.

Smith Hagaman, *Superintendent*

Grateful for divine blessing, we come to the close of another year of greatly enlarged service of our Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem.

During the year, a number of needed improvements have been made to our equipment, including the installation of a new and up-to-date lighting system for the operating rooms, a new and improved dishwasher, metal spring chairs for the patients' rooms, and every patient and nurse now lies on a rebuilt spring mattress. The cost of these permanent improvements was \$3,148.30.

On Friday, October 11, 1935, we admitted for treatment the 30,000th patient. We shall have this year about 3,600 patients; of this number, about one-half will be service, or free patients.

A comparative statement of the last three years will give a fair idea of the increasing service being rendered by the Hospital.

Average number of patients per day for

and the average is now running above 90.

There has also been a gratifying increase in Mother's Day offerings:

Also, a relative increase in the number of churches contributing on Mother's Day is noted:

We have received from Duke Endowment for last year (1934) \$9,274.00. The four per cent received from the Coöperative Program is not sufficient to meet the installments on the Construction Bonds of the Hospital. We are, therefore, dependent upon other sources for current expenses.

One of the greatest needs of the Hospital at this time is more room. We trust that this may, in some way, soon be provided.

We earnestly insist that every Pastor, Sunday School Superintendent, and Church Leader shall lay this work on the hearts of our people.

Under our present arrangements, Mother's Day—the second Sunday in May—is the only day in the whole year given to the cause of the sick and suffering of our state. We are praying you that it shall be seriously observed in every church and Sunday school.

We trust that the W. M. U.'s, the Y. W. A.'s, and other church organizations of our women, who are so nobly aiding us by furnishing large quantities of linen, will increase these in proportion to the rapidly increasing number of patients.

IV

Coöperative Program

129.

A. DIVISION OF RECEIPTS

As stated elsewhere in this report, the undesignated money of the Coöperative Program is divided sixty per cent for state objects and forty per cent for southwide objects. We have been earnestly hoping that our income would increase to the point whereby we could divide fifty-fifty. It would rejoice all of us to make this division for 1936, but with the present outlook, and in view of the commitments we have made, it would not be the part of wisdom to make that division at this time. Moreover, we are to remember that practically every object in the Coöperative Program, save the Debt Service Fund, receives during the year substantial designations. For example, in 1934 the several objects received special designations as follows:

State Missions	\$18,502
Foreign Missions	50,836
Home Missions	15,071
Education Aid	1,300
Ministers' Relief	2,054

These designated amounts were sent to these several objects in addition to their per cent of the undesignated money.

In this connection, however, it is gratifying to report that the Co-operative Program as a plan by which and through which we may work to the best advantage of all our objects grows in favor. Many of our smaller churches are just now learning how to send money through the Coöperative Program. It will be noted that we use the word "through" instead of "to." We believe this plan will grow in favor with our people as our pastors and church leaders take a little more time to explain it definitely to them. We make our offerings not "to" the Coöperative Program but "through" it. It is merely a channel through which our beneficence flows. We need to think of folks and their mental, spiritual and physical needs. It is to them that our beneficence flows through the Coöperative Program.

130.

B. PROMOTION PLANS

We are now in the midst of the most intensive effort we have made in years to promote the every member enrollment and canvass of our membership. From the mountains to the sea for the past few months we have sounded out the challenge, "A Stewardship Revival in Every Baptist Church in North Carolina." We have hoped that with all our efforts there would be at least one thousand of these revivals held. The blue print of the plan contemplates the assembling of the church together for a week of study and meditation on the great themes of discipleship, stewardship and missions. We believe now that these revivals will be held in more than a thousand churches. We have kept away from the use of the term, "Mission Schools," inasmuch as that term fails to convey the complete idea which we have had in mind. We cannot get our people to go very far in the support of missions and other objects until they have made a committal of themselves as disciples and stewards. Moreover, we have urged the adoption not only of a worthy budget for the Coöperative Program objects but also an enlarged program for the local church. We do this because it is our conviction that at the present time fully eighty per cent of our pastors, particularly those in the rural churches, are not receiving an income sufficient to keep them fit for Kingdom service.

We record our gratitude because of the growing sense of stewardship in an enlarging number of church members. Many of our churches are

pressing the "Prove me tithing campaign" as they have never done before. We are certain that the number of tithers in our churches is increasing with gratifying rapidity.

We repeat here what is stated elsewhere in this report, viz, that the Board in its June meeting provided for an increased staff during the last months of the year in order to promote these Stewardship Revivals. Perry Morgan has virtually dropped the Sunday school work for the last four months of the year, and has devoted his time to the promotion of the work in about twenty associations. General Missionary M. O. Alexander has been giving his full time to about twenty-two associations. Charles H. Dickey, who came with the Board September 1, has been giving about half his time to similar activities, while the other half has been devoted to general publicity. J. C. Pipes gave the greater part of the month of August in visiting associations and in making preparation for these Revivals in the western part of the state. Since September 1 he has given his full time to a group of about fourteen associations in the Asheville area. To these servants who have given so largely of their thought and effort we record our deep and abiding appreciation. In our opinion the every member enrollment and canvass promises to be the most thorough and successful in our history, certainly since the close of the Seventy-Five Million Campaign. This means an enlarged budget for the local church, and along with it a greatly increased budget for missions. It is believed that fully fifteen hundred churches have accepted or adopted for themselves worthy objectives for 1936; and it is heartening to know that on the whole these objectives are some twenty per cent higher than the amounts actually being given in 1935.

In preparation for the work the General Secretary prepared a booklet which is called "Baptist Working Toward a World Program." It is an extension of the little book, "Baptist at Work," which we used in 1934. Up to this time we have printed 20,000 of these booklets; and in addition to this we supplied Mississippi with 5,000 copies.

We call attention also to the fact that we are using an enrollment card which challenges the church member not only to set for himself a personal program of giving but also a program of service. It is interesting to note that the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention has printed 100,000 of the cards we are using for distribution among the several states in the Southern Convention.

We call attention again to the fact that the Coöperative Program, broadly conceived, contemplates not only the giving of undesignated money, but provides also for special days on which offerings are made for special objects. It is true that money given on these special days goes to the object specified, but at the same time these special days are observed as a part of our general Coöperative Program plan. These special days follow:

Home and Foreign Missions—Some Sunday in March.

Hospital—Mother's Day.

Christian Education—Some Sunday in June.

Old Ministers' Relief—Some Sunday in August.

State Missions—Last Sunday in October.

Orphanage—Thanksgiving.

These days should be observed in all our churches, and the appeal should be made (1) to those who have made a subscription and who are contributing systematically. These should not be pressed, but merely asked to make an offering, and "over and above," if their hearts prompt them. But what of the sixty to eighty per cent of our members who make no pledge at all and contribute with no regularity? Even in our most progressive churches there is a group of twenty-five to fifty per cent of the membership who make no subscriptions. How are they to be reached for our Mission objects unless these Special Days are observed? It is, therefore, suggested that after the Canvass or Enrollment is completed a list of those members who will not make a subscription be made. We suggest the formation in each church of a Missions or Coöperative Program Committee composed of the following: Chairman, the Superintendent of the Sunday school; other members to include the chairman of the board of deacons, the president of the W. M. S., the president of the B. T. U., and the presidents and teachers of the larger classes in the Sunday school. The names of those who made no subscription, or who contribute irregularly, should be divided among the members of this committee. Then when the special days come each member who has not subscribed should be challenged to do something for each of these objects.

The last Convention elected a special Promotion Committee composed of one member from each association. This committee, with about fifty associations represented and about seventy-five in attendance, met in July at Thomasville as guests of the Mills Home. Three sessions of several hours each were held. In these meetings we discussed fully and frankly some of the most vital problems that face us, particularly with reference to the enlistment of all of our people in all our program. We are happy to record that plans were inaugurated which are bringing most gratifying results.

We urge the continuance of this large committee, and we would urge also the hearty coöperation of the pastors and church leaders in the associations to the end that we may move forward all together in an all embracing, all inclusive program.

131. **REPORT OF THE BAPTIST BOOK STORE**

(Owned jointly by the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn.,
and the North Carolina Baptist State Convention)

Net sales for the year ending December 31, 1934 amounted to \$37,-286.33, with a net profit of \$4,001.45.

The amount paid out to the two boards owning the Book Store in dividends during the year amounted to \$2,898.63, one-half of this amount having been paid to each board.

It may be seen from this that the Book Store is operating on a paying basis. The total net worth at December 31, 1934 was \$14,096.65, with no unpaid bills. During the ten years under the present partnership a total profit of \$24,487.38 has been paid out to both boards. One-half of this amount, \$12,243.69, has been paid the North Carolina Board, which means that the Book Store is a distinct asset and a denominational investment.

The Book Store handles all supplies for every department of the church, as well as a complete line of general and religious books and Bibles. By means of the catalogues at our disposal, we can secure any book in print.

132. **REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST
HISTORICAL COMMISSION**

The Commission takes pleasure in reporting the publication in May 1935 of the first volume of the *History of Wake Forest College* by G. W. Paschal. This covers the period 1834-1865. It is a volume of nearly 700 pages, documented and indexed, and constitutes the definitive history of the institution for this interesting period. It may be ordered from E. B. Earnshaw, Bursar, Wake Forest, N. C.; \$2.00 for the regular edition, \$5.00 for de luxe edition. Dr. Paschal is now engaged in writing the second volume, which will bring the history of the College up to date.

We would also urge our Baptist people generally to secure and read Dr. Paschal's *History of North Carolina Baptists*, which may be ordered

from M. A. Huggins, General Secretary and Treasurer of the Baptist State Convention, for \$1.00 a volume and postage, about twenty cents.

Important additions continue to be made to the "North Carolina Baptist Historical Collection" in the library of Wake Forest College. During the past year the following valuable collections have been added by gift: From J. T. Riddick, Durham, N. C., 504 books and pamphlets; from Mrs. W. C. Tyree, Oxford, N. C., her late husband's library of more than 600 volumes; from Dr. Arch C. Cree, Salisbury, N. C., 111 volumes. The donors are due the thanks of the Commission and the Convention.

Your Commission would again urge upon the churches and their clerks and pastors the importance of collecting and depositing their church record books in the shelves and cabinets of the Collection in the library of Wake Forest College. This provides safety from fire and vermin, and insures their preservation. Here they can be consulted at any time by any who may be interested. In our Collection are the record books of about one hundred of our churches, some of them dating from 1772. The Baptist churches of our sister state of Virginia have done much better; more than 500 of them have deposited their church record books in the library of Richmond College.

We should like also to urge any who may have them to donate to the Collection any old documents, letters, manuscripts and papers, Minutes of Association and Convention, books on church history, or other matters of denominational interest. They may send them by express, collect, to the Wake Forest College Library.

133. REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION YEAR ENDING OCTOBER 28, 1935

At the end of the fiscal year ending October 28, 1935 the North Carolina Baptist Foundation was administering trusts as enumerated below in the aggregate amount of \$134,615.71, as compared with the total value at the end of the year 1934 of \$133,906.96 and \$134,692.32 for the year ending October 31, 1933. The slight gain in the past year is due to changes in value brought about by exchange of securities.

Of the total assets of the Foundation \$27,591.40 is either not producing income because of the present nature of the property or because of prior life interests. Of the remainder, income totaling \$4,296.00 was received from property valued at \$104,517.10 or at a rate of 4.11%.

The expenses of administration were as follows:

The Wachovia Bank and Trust Company for acting as Fiscal Agent for the Foundation received a commission of 5% on the income from the various trusts or as shown above \$266.99. This is 6.2% of the net income distributed to beneficiaries.

There is now on hand Cash Principal not invested of \$281.38 and Cash Income Balance, as yet undistributed, of \$2,225.83.

One trust fund in the total amount of \$1,689.08, the proceeds of which are designated for the Mills Home, has been reduced to \$1,139.08 by a

withdrawal by the donor for his own use of \$550.00. The income from this fund was also paid to the donor at his request.

One new trust fund has been set up under the will of D. P. Bridges in the amount of \$1,000.00 the income of which is to be divided equally between Wake Forest College, the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and Meredith College.

Certain questions have arisen in connection with the estate of T. F. Pettus, the estate of T. B. Parker and certain loans from the trust funds, involving an interpretation of the powers of the Directors under their Charter. In order to clarify this matter the Directors have adopted a resolution asking that action be taken by the State Convention, authorizing amendments to the charter of the Foundation. The adoption of these resolutions by the Convention is recommended.

The charter provides that the annual meeting of the Directors shall be held one week prior to the Annual State Convention. This makes difficult the preparation of the report to the Convention and its inclusion in the printed report of the General Secretary. It is requested that the Convention take action authorizing the holding of the annual meeting on the Tuesday following the second Monday in October in each year.

The Board of Directors now consists of Dr. Z. M. Caveness, Raleigh, Chairman; Dr. Joseph L. Peacock, Tarboro; J. D. Wilkins, Greensboro; Rev. Herman T. Stevens, Asheboro; Theodore S. Johnson, Raleigh, Secretary.

Rev. Herman T. Stevens has tendered his resignation, because of changing his residence to Virginia, and it will be necessary for the Convention to elect some one to fill out his unexpired term.

At the last State Convention reports were made concerning the establishment of a Board to care for the needy, aged and infirm. It is the opinion of the Directors of the Foundation, that the powers of the Foundation are adequate for the purposes and objectives set forth in the report on this subject and we believe the Foundation can effectively administer any funds set aside for this purpose.

We wish to reiterate that, with the improvement which has already taken place in financial conditions, the Convention through its officers, committees and executive staff should make every effort to bring the Foundation, its purposes and methods earnestly before the Baptists of the state to the end that they may utilize its facilities for gifts, bequests, annuities, and other forms of endowment, for any of the purposes for which the Convention has established the Foundation.

VIII

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the DIVISION of Undesignated Funds as between State and Southwide objects be fixed at 60-40 for the fiscal year 1936, and that the General Board be asked to divide the sixty cents for state purposes so as to properly safeguard our debt funding commitments and at the same time conserve and promote in the best manner possible all our work.

2. That the Convention authorize the continuance of the work with our Negro brethren begun so auspiciously this year.

3. That the Convention authorize the continuance of the plan of pastors' conferences and schools, and that the Board be authorized to make as liberal financial provisions for this work as possible; furthermore, that the Convention urge the pastors to take advantage of the opportunity offered in these conferences and schools.

4. That the Board be authorized and instructed to continue the work among the Indians in Robeson and Swain counties until such time as the Home Mission Board finds it possible to resume the work in whole or in part.

5. That the work at Oteen be continued and if at all possible enlarged, and that the other states in the south having patients in the hospital be urged to share in the work as they are doing during the present year.

6. That the Board be authorized at the earliest possible moment to employ one or more additional general missionaries, and that these missionaries give their time to revivals in the churches desiring their services, to the promotion of the Every Member Enrollment in the fall season, and in general to assist the General Secretary in every way possible to promote every interest of our coöperative work.

7. That the Convention authorize and instruct the Board concerning the proper steps to take in aiding Forest Avenue (Greensboro) and Boone churches to complete their building program.

8. That the Convention authorize the General Board to take such steps as seem necessary, in conjunction with the management of the Biblical Recorder, to substantially increase the subscription list of the Recorder during 1936.

9. That we set our goal for 1936 at \$600,000, this amount to include all Designated and Undesignated funds and all funds for the North Carolina Baptist Orphanage, and that we ask the coöperation of all the churches, all the associations, and the Woman's Missionary Union as we attempt to reach this objective.

135. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

In January 1936, the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to this Convention, will complete a half century of service. It seems fitting at this time that we give a summary of some of the things that we have accomplished in this period.

From ten organizations we have grown to 2,913 including 1,819 young people's societies. Our membership is over fifty thousand and yet we have only one-third of the women and young people in our churches enlisted.

Our gifts have increased from less than one thousand dollars a year to nearly two hundred thousand, and the total amount given by the Woman's Missionary Union during this century to missions and benevolence is nearly five million dollars.

Our organization is most complete, consisting of an Executive Committee with six officers, and sixteen members living in or near Raleigh—five Divisional organizations, and organized work in sixty of our Associations. In fifty-eight of these Associations we have young people's organizations working most effectively.

In the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to our Southern Baptist Convention our North Carolina Woman's Missionary Union stands third in gifts—our young people's societies second, in number of organizations third and in members fourth.

A most important factor in the development of our work has been the special offerings of the Woman's Missionary Union. There are five of these—the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, preceded by a week of prayer early in December; the Annie W. Armstrong Offering for Home Missions in March also preceded by a Week of Prayer; and an offering in August each year for our Woman's Missionary Union Training School in Louisville, Kentucky, and for the Margaret Educational Fund for the education of the children of our missionaries. In September each year we make a special offering for our State Mission work. This offering this year amounted to \$5,904.80 and will not be completed until the present quarter closes. We observe not a week of prayer in connection with this offering but a day of prayer. In addition to these offerings which are observed by our Southern Union, North Carolina has a special offering of its own—the Heck Memorial Offering in June each year in memory of Miss Fannie E. S. Heck, for twenty-nine years the President of our Union. This offering is appropriated by the Annual Meeting each year to meet some special need of our mission work.

Our plan of work is regular and systematic gifts to the Coöperative Program, and special offerings as an expression of love and willingness to sacrifice for the work of the Kingdom.

The aim of the Union has not changed through the years; as stated by our President in the very beginning of our work it is, "to stimulate the missionary spirit and the grace of giving among the women and children of our churches and of aiding in the collection of funds for missionary purposes." How well we have succeeded is told by the present status of the work.

We have built our organization on Prayer, in the life of the individual and in the society; on Bible study realizing the need of our knowledge of God's will for our lives, and in our organizations; on Mission study that we may be informed as to the progress of the kingdom in the world; on Personal Service, remembering the example of Him whom we serve; and on Stewardship not only of gifts, talents and time, but a stewardship that recognizes God's ownership and that the words of Paul "Ye are not your own for ye are bought with a price" should be a vital factor in our lives.

The future lies ahead. We face it without fear, believing the development of young people in our missionary societies will bring to us a trained leadership that will meet the problems and opportunities which will come in such a way as to bring far greater results than those of the first half century.

Ours has been the joy of service, the results have been far greater than we had faith to expect fifty years ago.

With hearts full of gratitude to God for His many blessings, His guidance through the years, the promise of His abiding presence, and with heartfelt appreciation to all who have shared in the labors of our Woman's Missionary Union we respectfully submit this report.

Dear Sir:

We have audited the books and records of the Convention for the twelve months ended December 31, 1935 and in the following tabulations we show the Revenue and Expense of the General Fund, together with all Cash Receipts and Disbursements for the other funds.

Exhibit "A" shows the Revenue and Expense of the General Fund, together with the distribution of the Revenue after paying expenses chargeable to the undesignated revenue.

Exhibits "B" to "G", inclusive, show the cash transactions of all other funds for the year, and Exhibit "H" is a summary of the net Debt of the Convention on December 31, 1935.

All Cash Receipts were found to have been promptly deposited in the bank and Disbursements were found supported by cancelled checks, invoices, etc., and expenses were properly classified. Our examination did not disclose any evidence of irregularities and we believe the funds have been carefully and honestly handled and properly accounted for.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY

We gratefully acknowledge our gratitude to God for his blessings upon us during the year. Throughout the state there has been evidence of a return of prosperity. Bountiful harvests with attendant good prices for farm products and a general increase in business of all kinds have brought new hope and heart to our people. With pleasure we record the fact that our church people have responded in a fine way to the call of the world. They have shared their blessings with others beyond last year. Many more than formerly have given a good account of their stewardship by sharing their blessings with others through the Mission enterprise.

The greatest hindrance to all activities was the epidemic of infantile paralysis which swept through the state during June, July, August and September. More than six hundred cases were reported. Hundreds of the churches were closed to the children and Sunday school operations were suspended during the summer. On this account many young people and adults remained away from church, thereby causing a slump in contributions or gifts, as well as Bible school and preaching attendance.

In spite of the epidemic of Polio contributions show a fine increase. A glance at the Statistical Tables will reveal appreciable gains in gifts. The finest progress, however, has been in spirit, attitudes, and outlook. One feels it in all the churches, in Associational meetings and all general gatherings in city, town and rural churches. A feeling of optimism prevails everywhere in denominational circles. Secretary M. A. Huggins has led us all in a great and far-reaching program of teaching. Emphasis has been placed on the study of our distinctive Baptist doctrines, along with renewed study of the subjects of stewardship, discipleship and missions.

We state, and shall repeat it until the truth of God's Word shall become real to our people and a vital thing in their lives, that what is needed most is that God's people tithed their income in support of the work of the Kingdom. The principle of the tithe will, if practiced, enable God's children to preach the gospel around the world. If North Carolina Baptists had tithed their net earnings this year they would have given into the Lord's treasury more than twelve million dollars. We face the old issue of whether the material shall control us instead of the spiritual. "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his soul?"

The "prove me" plan or tithing movement is gaining favor with many of the churches. Tithing is the one salvation to all our financial difficulties. We repeat: "Let the churches be constant in teaching the people what to do with material things entrusted to them. Our conviction is that most people love their churches and possess the desire

to have a part in giving them worthy support, also that they will respond to a financial program that is worthy of their support. They are not afraid of the money question when it is presented in the light of the truth of the Scriptures and with a challenge to rise up and meet world needs.

"Evangelism" should be our battle cry in the New Year. There are still myriads of lost people around us. They are wholly without a Saviour.

The number of baptisms for the year is 18,768. No baptisms were reported by 653 churches. Thirty-five Indian churches reported 59 baptisms.

GIFTS

All figures are given for the Associational year and not the calendar year. Gifts to all Missions, Education and Benevolences total \$516,022.21. This sum is a gain over last year of \$20,203.98. For all local work as debts, buildings, fuel, lights, pastoral support and other operating expenses the sum given was \$2,195,003.11. The sum represents a gain over last year of \$161,732.80. The total of all gifts to all causes is \$2,711,025.32. The total gain in contributions to all causes is \$181,936.78.

CO-OPERATING CHURCHES

Churches contributing to denominational objects number 2,209. This number is an increase of 150 over last year. Only 227 failed to contribute to one or more of the Convention's institutions.

PER CAPITA GIFTS

The per capita gift to all causes, local and outside is \$5.91. Gifts to denominational causes alone are \$1.12 per capita.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

There are 2,430 Sunday Schools with an enrollment of 384,254. Gain in number of schools is 46. Perry Morgan is Secretary of the Sunday School Department. L. L. Morgan is Field Worker. Mrs. C. D. Bain, Dunn, is Approved Elementary Worker. Mrs. John B. Lane, Lenoir, is Approved Intermediate Worker. The headquarters office is 200 Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh.

The epidemic of infantile paralysis caused all but 65 of about 150 schools planned not to be held.

There are 2,641 organizations with 60,703 members. Winnie Rickett is Secretary of the Department. Mabel Starnes is Field Worker. The headquarters office is at 200 Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Woman's Missionary Union reports run from January 1 to December 31, and 1935 reports cannot be compiled before this annual of North Carolina State Convention goes to press so the figures below are of 1934.

In 1934 there were 2,913 organizations of Woman's Missionary Union reporting. The roll is revised each year and when no report is sent during the year the organization is dropped from the roll until it does report. The membership in these organizations totaled 52,185. Organized work was done in fifty-nine Associations, each one holding its separate annual meeting. Eleven hundred and ninety-two organizations made at least four points on the Standard of Excellence and 388 made all ten points. Eighteen hundred and two mission study classes were held, with thirteen hundred and seventy-four seals awarded. The 1934 Heck Memorial Offering, \$3,831.57 was appropriated as follows: Equipment of Yang Chow Hospital, China, \$1,000.00; Single Women's Missionaries' Home, Wuchow, China, \$1,000.00; Helen Dozier's Passage to Japan and First Year's Salary, \$1,500.00; Supplies for Alda Grayson's Work in Kathleen Mallory Hospital, Laichowiu, China, \$300.00.

The total contributions for the year, \$181,946.16.

CONSTITUTION

I. NAME AND OBJECT

SECTION 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

The object of the Convention shall be to promote Missions, Education, Social Service, the distribution and study of the Bible and sound religious literature; and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in its work.

II. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be composed of not more than three representatives from each white association in the State and not more than one representative from each co-operating church for every fifty members or fraction thereof and of the officers and members of the General Board of the Convention and of the Life Members so declared under the previous Constitution: *Provided*, that no church have more than ten representatives and no one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member in good standing of a Missionary Baptist Church co-operating with the Convention.

III. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Convention shall meet annually on Tuesday after the *third* Sunday in November.*

IV. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a General Secretary, a Treasurer (the General Secretary may be elected as Treasurer at the discretion of the Convention), three Trustees of the Convention, and five Directors of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. The President, Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, General Secretary, and Treasurer shall be elected as the Convention may determine, the Trustees of the Convention and Directors of the Baptist Foundation, in the manner provided by their respective charters. The terms of office of President and Vice-Presidents commence at the conclusion of the session at which they are elected and continue until the close of the next Convention.

SEC. 2. The President shall preside over the deliberations of the Convention and discharge such other duties as are imposed upon him by the Convention or as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all Committees unless the Convention shall otherwise direct. In case of his absence or incapacity one of the Vice-Presidents shall act in his stead.

SEC. 3. The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the proceedings of the Convention and have the same printed and distributed.

SEC. 4. The General Secretary of the Convention shall have administrative supervision of the work of Missions, Education, Benevolences, and all other general training activities of the Convention. He shall employ a reputable auditor or firm of auditors each year to make a complete audit of the books and accounts of the treasurer and bookkeeping department and report to the Executive Committee of the General Board, which shall receive and pass upon said

report and have it published in the minutes of the Convention and in the *Biblical Recorder* or the then recognized denominational organ.

SEC. 5. The Treasurer shall receive all funds sent to him for the objects of the Convention, make acknowledgment of the same once a month in the *Biblical Recorder* or the then recognized denominational organ, give a bond to the Trustees of the Convention in such amount as they may determine for the faithful performance of his duties and prescribe the terms and conditions of said bond. He shall also forward at least once a month all contributions to their destination; at every meeting of the Convention he shall make a full report of his receipts and disbursements, and upon retiring from his office, deliver to his successor all moneys, papers, books and other property belonging thereto.

SEC. 6. The Trustees shall take and hold the title to any and all property acquired by and belonging to the Convention. They shall require a sufficient bond from the Treasurer. In case he shall refuse or neglect to give satisfactory bond within thirty days after his election the Trustees shall have power to elect a successor. The said Trustees shall elect a chairman and secretary and report annually to the Convention the work done by them. They shall receive and make such conveyances of the properties of the Convention as directed by the Convention. During the interim between sessions of the Convention the said Trustees may receive and convey the property of the Convention upon the advice and direction of the General Board.

V. GENERAL BOARD

SECTION 1. The General Board of the Convention shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention, *ex officio*, and forty-eight members from the State at large. The Convention shall elect one-third of the members from the State at large to hold office for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years, but as the terms expire the successors shall serve for terms of three years. That retiring members of the Board be ineligible for re-election until the following meeting of the State Convention. No one in the employment for pay of any Institution or Board fostered by this Convention shall be eligible to membership on this Board. The General Board shall fill all vacancies in its membership between the session of the Convention until the session of the next Convention, when the vacancies shall be filled by the Convention itself in the manner provided by its laws.

SEC. 2. The General Board shall have charge and control, except when otherwise directed by the Convention, of all work of the Convention, including Missions, Education, Benevolences, and all other general activities, in the interim between the sessions of the Convention. Any action by the General Board during the interim between the sessions of the Convention vitally related to the work of the Convention shall be binding upon the Convention: *Provided*, it shall not relate to any matter previously committed to some other agency of the Convention with power to act. But any action of the Board during the interim shall be reported fully to the Convention at its next session.

SEC. 3. The General Board shall report to each session of the Convention upon the work done in each department, viz.: Missions, Education, Benevolences and all other general activities. The Board shall have its report printed and ready for distribution at the first session of the Convention; all reports from Educational Institutions, Hospitals, Orphanages, Baptist Foundation, and all other institutions or agencies of the Convention shall report to the Convention through the General Board.

SEC. 4. The General Board of the Convention shall meet in regular session

in December and June of each year, and in cases of emergency at the call of the President and General Secretary of the Board or any five members.

SEC. 5. At the first December meeting of the General Board the work of the Convention shall be divided as follows: Missions, Education, Benevolences and Training Activities. The membership of the General Board shall be divided into four committees of twelve each and the work as above outlined shall be assigned to these committees. Each committee shall organize itself by the selection of a chairman and a recording secretary. All appropriations for the work of the various departments of the General Board shall be made by the General Board; but each committee shall make to the General Board definite and specific recommendations as to all appropriations.

SEC. 6. The General Board shall select an Executive Committee consisting of the Chairman of the Committees on Missions, Education, Benevolences and Training Activities, the President of the General Board, and two other members of the General Board. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the General Secretary and shall have general direction and oversight of all the work of the General Board in the interim between the sessions of the Board and such other matters as shall be assigned to it by the General Board.

SEC. 7. The General Board shall be successor in law to all legal obligations heretofore incurred by the Board of Missions and by the Board of Education.

SEC. 8. At each December meeting the General Board may select such other departmental assistants as may be needed.

VI. TRUSTEES OF CONVENTION'S INSTITUTION

SECTION 1. The charters of all institutions owned and supported by the Convention shall contain the following provisions as nearly as may be and conformable to the number of trustees to be elected, that is to say:

a. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall elect the trustees of said corporation and their regular term of office shall be four years. At the first election by the Convention one-fourth of the board of trustees shall be elected to serve for one year, one-fourth for two years, one-fourth for three years and the remaining one-fourth for four years. At each subsequent regular annual session of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina one-fourth of the members of the Board of Trustees of said corporation shall be elected by the Convention to succeed the members of said Board retiring.

b. The members of the Board of Trustees of said corporation shall be residents of the State of North Carolina and members in good and regular standing of a Missionary Baptist Church co-operating with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

c. Removal from the State or ceasing for any reason to be a member in good and regular standing of a Missionary Baptist Church co-operating with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be equivalent to a resignation from said Board of Trustees. Any vacancy on the Board shall be filled by the remaining members until the next regular annual session of the Convention and the Convention shall at its next regular annual session fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

d. The term of office of a trustee who has not resigned, died, become disqualified, or been removed shall not expire until his successor shall have been duly elected and qualified.

e. The Board of Trustees of said corporation by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of its entire membership, given in regular annual meeting or in a special meeting duly called for the purpose, shall have power to remove

from office any trustee of such corporation for cause considered sufficient by such Board, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee and opportunity to him to be heard by the Board.

f. The Baptist State Convention shall have the right at any time to remove from office any trustee for cause considered sufficient by the Convention, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee and opportunity for him to be heard by the Convention. Notice of such contemplated action and hearing by the Convention may be given by the Executive Committee of the Convention.

g. *That no individual shall serve on any Board, or Institution, who is at the same time holding membership on any other Board or Institution.**

SEC. 2. The Trustees of all institutions, benevolent, educational or otherwise under the control of the Convention shall be elected by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and shall hold office for the term to which elected, unless sooner terminated. When any vacancy shall occur in any Board of any such institution a nominating committee elected by the Convention shall nominate to the Convention Baptists to fill such vacancy. The Trustees of all institutions owned and supported by the Convention shall make annual report to the nominating committee of any vacancies. Each Board shall have the right to make any suggestion to the nominating committee it may see fit regarding such nominations, and all nominations made by the committee shall be passed upon by the Convention. The Convention shall have the right to adopt the report of the nominating committee and elect the trustees thus nominated, or to substitute the name of other trustee or trustees in lieu thereof, or recommit said report for further consideration as the case may be.

VII. GENERAL ITEMS

SECTION 1. Individuals, churches, and associations, or others desiring the assistance and co-operation of the Baptists of the State in any work not already fostered by the Convention should present the question to the agency under which it should be properly placed. If the agency should refuse to take it up, it may be presented to the Convention under miscellaneous business or a special order.

SEC. 2. The members of the Boards of the Convention and Institutions affiliated with the Convention shall be distributed as widely as practicable, both as to territory and individuals.

SEC. 3. The Convention year shall close December 31 of each year.

SEC. 4. The compensation of all paid officers and employees of the Convention, the General Board, and its committees shall be fixed by the Executive Committee subject to review by the General Board at its next meeting.

SEC. 5. No institution or agency affiliating with the Convention shall encumber its property or change its status with respect to the Convention without authority of the Convention or its General Board.

That except as may be necessary in the reasonable anticipation of current revenues and payable out of the same, or for the purpose of funding or refinancing any indebtedness of the Convention now outstanding, neither the Convention, nor its General Board shall have the power to create any debt or obligation binding on the Convention; and no other board, agency or institution of, or affiliated with the Convention, shall have the power at any time to create any debt or obligation binding on the Convention.

SEC. 6. If for any reason, it shall be necessary to select a place or to change the time or place of the meeting of the Convention after the Convention

adjourns, the President, Recording Secretary and the General Secretary of the Convention shall be a committee with power to make necessary change or changes.*

SEC. 7. This constitution may be changed or amended on any day of any annual session of the Convention by two-thirds vote of the members present when the vote is taken, provided notice of the contemplated amendment or change shall have been announced on a previous day of the Convention.

BY-LAWS OF THE GENERAL BOARD

I. THE PRESIDENT AND RECORDING SECRETARY

The President of the General Board, in addition to the regular duties incumbent upon such officers, shall appoint special committees to investigate and report upon any matters which concern equally all departments of the work of the Convention. The Secretary shall record all proceedings in correct form and preserve the same.

II. OFFICERS, SECRETARIES AND DEPARTMENTAL ASSISTANTS

At the annual December meeting of the General Board, there shall be elected the following officers, who shall serve for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified: President, Vice-President and Recording Secretary.

At the same time the Board shall elect all Departmental Heads and such other assistants as may from time to time be deemed necessary, and shall fix compensation of its Secretaries and other employees.

III. QUORUM

Seventeen members shall be required to constitute a quorum of the Board. Five shall be required to constitute a quorum of any Department. Four shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Committee of the General Board.

IV. THE WORK OF THE GENERAL BOARD

The work of the General Board shall be apportioned among its four divisions, in so far as may be practicable, as indicated below. The General Board, the Executive Committee of the General Board and the General Secretary (48 members exclusive of the President and Secretary of the Convention, who are *ex officio* members):

1. *Department of Missions*—(12)—Secretary of Missions—Division of (1) Field Work; (2) Evangelism; (3) Negro Work.

2. *Department of Training*—(12)—Secretary of Training—Division of (1) Sunday Schools—Secretary; (2) B. Y. P. U.—Secretary; (3) Student Activities.

3. *Department of Benevolences*—(12)—Secretary of Benevolences—Division of (1) Orphanage; (2) Hospital; (3) Ministers' Relief.

4. *Department of Education*—(12)—Secretary of Education—Division of (1) Educational Institution; (2) Ministerial Education.

5. *Department of Woman's Missionary Union*.

The Executive Committee shall have power in its discretion, to modify, enlarge, diminish, or otherwise alter the divisions of the work of the Board

as it may from time to time deem advisable or necessary, the changes so made to be reported to the next regular meeting of the General Board for its consideration.

V. UNDESIGNATED GIFTS

The General Board at its annual meeting shall determine the percentage of undesignated gifts that each object of the Convention shall receive, including State and South-wide, provided always that any allocation of such funds shall not violate any order with respect to the same previously made by the Baptist State Convention.

VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee shall have power to borrow money and execute notes on behalf of the General Board for the purpose of meeting the obligations of said Board, and to do and perform any act incidental to or necessary in the execution and discharge of the work of the General Board: *Provided*, the Executive Committee shall not incur obligations for any object in excess of the budget fixed by the General Board. Notes may be executed in the name of the General Board and on its behalf by the Chairman of the Executive Committee attested by the General Secretary, and when so executed by authority of the Executive Committee duly give, shall be the binding obligation of the General Board.

The Executive Committee of the General Board shall meet in regular session at ten a.m., on Tuesday following the first Sunday in each month, but it may meet in called session at any other time upon call of the General Secretary.

VII. SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

His duties, together with all other Departmental Heads, or Assistants, shall be determined from time to time by the General Board.

VIII. EXECUTIVE SESSION

The General Board may by a majority vote of the number present, go into executive session at any time for the purpose of considering such matters as may claim the consideration of said Board.

IX. AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a majority vote of the members attending said meeting.

X. PUBLICATION

These by-laws, together with any amendments that may be made thereon, from time to time, shall be printed in the Minutes of the Baptist State Convention.

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER

We report a good year in which we have made a net gain of 3,000 subscriptions. We have budgets in fifty-one of the seventy associations. The number of budgets is 249, and 130 of them are paid in full for the year.

The triangular effort by this Convention, our local churches, and the Biblical Recorder Publishing Company appealed to our pastors and churches. Our thanks are due and are here tendered to Secretary M. A. Huggins for aiding in our special effort to increase the circulation of the *Recorder*. He loaned us Rev. Chas. H. Dickey for the first six months of this year. Mr. Dickey aided our new circulation manager, Rev. R. F. Terrell, in getting acquainted in eastern North Carolina.

Our Baptist pastors have rendered distinct service in putting the *Recorder* in the budgets and thus reducing the price of the paper to their members from \$2.00 to \$1.50 per year. Their efforts are crowned with the results mentioned above. We take this occasion to thank each pastor and the representatives in the various churches for the fine service rendered during this year.

Mr. Terrell, a native of Virginia and on the staff of the *Baptist Courier*, of South Carolina, for ten years, came with us the first of the year and immediately set about the task of changing our individual subscription plan to that of budgets in the churches. We consider the results reported above as a splendid beginning. We anticipate a larger increase during the coming year.

18. After singing "There is a Name I Love to Hear", John R. Link, Windsor, led the devotional service, worshipfully assisted with the playing of Mrs. Carpenter at the organ. This worship period closed with the singing of "O Master Let Me Walk With Thee".

19. Secretary Huggins led off in presenting the next order, Christian Education and Training. W. Perry Crouch, Raleigh, newly named Secretary of the Department of Christian Education, continued the theme to be followed by these divisional heads.

(a) Sunday Schools was the topic discussed by the Secretary, L. L. Morgan. (See page 66, section 123).

23. Trustee Wm. Louis Poteat read and thereafter moved the adoption of the report from the Convention trustees and accepted as follows:

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION OF NORTH CAROLINA

The Board, composed of W. L. Poteat, Wake Forest; R. L. McMillan, Raleigh; and F. H. Brooks, Smithfield; was organized with W. L. Poteat, Chairman and R. L. McMillan, Secretary.

In our report last year we called attention to the time and effort that had been given in connection with the will of O. L. Pittman, of Edgecombe County. We pointed out that the matter was in litigation and that the superior court had rendered a decision in favor of the Trustees of the Baptist State Convention. The matter was carried to the supreme court and there the higher court ruled in favor of the Trustees. The net amount of the estate which came into the hands of the Trustees was \$7,500.

In accordance with the terms of the will we have transmitted to the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina \$2,500 and to the Trustees of Gethsemane Baptist Church in the Roanoke Association \$2,500. We hold \$2,500, given by the terms of the will for the purpose of State Mission work in the Roanoke Association, subject to the disposition of the General Board of the State Convention.

In connection with the issue of bonds known as Meredith College bonds, Mr. Wilson Lewis of St. Louis resigned as individual trustee, and the Trustees agreed to the appointment of Mr. W. C. Bitting, Jr.,

in his stead. All this was done in accordance with the terms of the indenture.

As required by the Convention we found upon examination that the Treasurer is bonded for \$25,000, the bookkeeper, Miss Esther Ivey, for \$10,000, and the bookkeeper of the Debt Service Fund, Miss Margie Murchison, for \$10,000.

24. A discussion of the resolution adopted in connection with the report of the Committee to nominate Trustees of the Convention, Its Institutions and members of the General Board at the 1935 Convention (see page 54, section 78) insued with W. H. Moore, Wadesboro, asking for an interpretation. The chair ruled that it was the intent of the Convention that beginning with this Convention no individual would serve on two or more Boards or Institutions.* Song: "My Hope is Built".

25. Arch C. Cree, Salisbury, brought to a close this session that had for its theme *The Church in Service to Its Membership and Community* with an address on the subject, "The Church in Service to the Community".

26. Adjournment thereafter came when A. J. Barton, Wilmington, prayed.

WEDNESDAY—Morning Session

The Church In Service to the People of the State

27. At 9:00 o'clock, Horace Easom led the audience in singing "Jesus Saves" and "I'll Go Where You Want Me to Go", whereupon Vice-President John H. Coley, Rocky Mount, now presiding called upon Nane Starnes, Asheville, who led the morning devotions assisted in prayer by E. Gibson Davis, Asheville and by Edward E. Rutledge, Charlotte, who sang, "I Have a Savior".

28. The latest registration figures were read by the Secretary totalling 554.

29. C. B. Deane, Rockingham, read in behalf of the Baptist Historical Commission its report (see page 90, section 138) and moved its acceptance to be approved after Mrs. Ethel T. Crittenden, Librarian, Wake Forest College spoke on the priceless Baptist Collection at Wake Forest and other features in the report.

30. In the absence of the Secretary of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, M. A. Huggins made mention of the report (see page 91, section 139) and upon his motion the report was adopted after brief comments from Oscar Haywood, C. L. Dowell, and Wilson Woodcock.

31. Reversing a former ruling President Wall inserted this statement:

After further thought, the Chair wishes to revise a ruling made hastily yesterday, with the request that this ruling be made a matter of record in the proceedings of the Convention.

The motion passed last year, that there shall be no duplication in the personnel of the Boards and Committees of the Convention, was intended to establish a policy to be effective *when* and *as* such policy could become operative without doing violence to or contravening any former act of the Convention. In the nature of the case such motion could not be retroactive concerning the term of office of any person already elected for a definite period of service on any Board and properly and legally serving under the Constitution of the Convention and the Charter of any institution.

If there had been no constitutional provision concerning the personnel of Boards and Committees, this motion would have established a rule. In that case, as terms of office expired from year to year the policy sought to be established by the motion could have been duly regarded

by the Committee on Nominations and made operative by the Convention in its elections.

But the Chair would now remind the Convention of a fact that was overlooked both by the Chair and by the Convention when the motion referred to was adopted, namely, that the evident intent of the motion referred to is virtually embodied already in the Constitution. Art. VII, Section 2, provides that the Boards of the Convention and of Institutions affiliated with the Convention shall be distributed as widely as practicable both as to territory and individuals. Manifestly, the adoption of a motion, affecting a matter imbedded in the Constitution, could not displace or take precedence of the Constitution itself. The motion should have taken the form of a Constitutional Amendment.

The Chair would suggest that if it is the will of the Convention to establish a fixed rule that in no case shall the name of any individual appear more than once on the roster of the Boards of the Convention and of Institutions affiliated with the Convention, it would be proper to amend Art. VII, Section 2, by changing the wording to this effect.

The Chair would also remind the Convention that under Art. VII, Sec. 7, providing the method of amending the Constitution, such amendment may be adopted at this session, within the discretion of the Convention, if the brother who made the motion last year, or any other member of the Convention, gives proper notice during today's sessions so that final action may be taken at any session tomorrow.

32. Immediately W. H. Moore, Wadesboro, gave notice that on tomorrow he would offer a resolution to amend the Constitution to the end that no individual be named on more than one Board or Institution of the Convention.

33. At this hour the Department of Missions was the regular order with General Secretary Huggins presiding and leading the discussions. Prior to the adoption of the report (see page 57, section 106), the Convention heard the General Secretary comment upon Missionary Pastoral Assistance, Missionary Pastors, Progress in Church Building, and the work among Robeson County Indians. Missionaries M. C. Lunseford and Mrs. Lunseford to the Indians received the Convention's recognition.

(a) Next, E. M. Harris, Aberdeen, spoke of the work he is doing at the State Sanatorium and at Samarcond as projected in a small degree by the State Mission Board.

(b) He was followed by W. C. Somerville, General Secretary of the Negro Baptist State Convention in a report on the work among the Negroes expressing thankfulness for the splendid aid given the Negro Baptists by this Convention.

34. Then came M. L. Skaggs, Buie's Creek, who made the report as *Chairman* of the Committee to recommend a Program to aid Former Prisoners, and adopted upon motion by the speaker.

A PROGRAM TO AID FORMER PRISONERS

Many thoughtful people are raising significant questions regarding the group of our population who have served time in our penal institutions. They would like to know what becomes of the prisoner who is released from our institutions. Your committee has tried to approach this problem in a spirit of helpfulness toward this unfortunate group.

I. The conditions facing us—

The magnitude of the problem of the former prisoners is challenging, and it is growing. There were 3.73 times as many prisons committed to prison in 1932 as in 1920; however, there was an increase in population from 1920 to 1930 of only 23.9 per cent. The number of

prisoners released in 1931 was 5,466. For 1934, the number was 7,236; and for the first half of 1936, 9,970. By far the greater number of these were young men, and the tragedy is that the average age is decreasing. The average age of prisoners committed from 1913 to 1926 was approximately 26 years. The average for the last five years is about 23 years. Of all white prisoners committed from 1917 to 1922, 23.5 per cent were 20 years old or younger.

The economic conditions surrounding the released prisoners are a vital factor in their rehabilitation. Of the white prisoners discharged during the five-year period following 1917, 80 per cent of their families were near the poverty level, 90 per cent were receiving aid from some other source, and 67.1 per cent were unemployed. About three-fourths were unskilled laborers. More than half of the prisoners committed during January, February, and March, 1936 had no vocational training. The result almost invariably is either casual employment, unsuitable employment or positive unemployment. Most of the average crimes the prison records reveal for the biennium were committed in urban sections. This is a challenge to the church people of our cities.

The church relationship of the prisoners is of great interest to us. Most of them belong to our denomination, and for two major reasons: first, there are more Baptists in North Carolina than any other religious sect; and, secondly, the prisoners belong to the lower economic level. Of all the white prisoners incarcerated from 1917 to 1922, 92.5 per cent were not members of any church. Of all prisoners in chain gangs in 1927, more than 50 per cent had been members of some church. The drink habit was connected with 56.1 per cent of the crimes of all white prisoners released during the five year period after 1917, and 97.4 per cent of these used alcohol beverages after their release. Direct contacts by a representative of our churches would have saved a great many of this number.

The educational status of the prisoners is a revelation. One-fourth of them have had no educational training. Of the families of the 1917 to 1922 group two-thirds were not sending their children to school. Of the 4,820 prisoners incarcerated during the first three months of this year (1936), 1,062 have had no schooling. Many of the prisoners can be saved yet because of their low age and the brevity of their sentences.

It is important to note that the tendency toward crime is cumulative. Juvenile delinquency was found to exist among most of them. The greater number of them came from disrupted homes where evil influences were weighing ever heavier on their lives. Approximately 32 per cent of those discharged are soon returned to prison, almost half of them having committed at least two more crimes since their release. They simply have not repented.

The released prisoners of our state are being neglected. Their after-prison life is simply a continuation of their pre-prison life. Their prison life has had little effect on them for the better. It has neither reformed them nor deterred them from crime. Our regular church services are not reaching them. Our social clubs are not reaching them, and the legally established agencies responsible for them are not reaching them because of their inadequacy. The present Commissioner of Paroles states that the situation is still deplorable.

II. Our present efforts to aid the former prisoners—

Our denomination is making no direct contribution to the moral and spiritual salvation of this group.

III. A suggested program—

1. At the earliest possible moment employ a paid worker who would:
 - (a) Do personal work among the former prisoners.
 - (b) Co-ordinate the work of the churches on this problem by associations.
 - (c) Contact parole and penal authorities.
2. Urge the State to broaden the field of vocational training for our prisoners.

3. Give fuller support to the parole system.
4. Make an appeal to the public at large to help us in this challenging task—through the Press, other denominations and civic clubs.
5. Encourage our churches to work with the families of the former prisoners.
6. Secure specialists in this field to speak to our Brotherhood meetings, Sunday School classes, etc.
7. Encourage employment of the prisoners.
8. Organize "Big Brother" clubs in our Sunday Schools.
9. Co-operate with county Welfare Organizations in salvaging the prisoners.
10. Urge the State to provide better supervision of probationers.
11. Insist upon better enforcement of the compulsory school attendance law.
12. Develop a more tolerant and sympathetic attitude on the part of our people toward the former prisoners. Let us teach them to "hate the sin but love the sinner." We must exercise something of the spirit of the Galilean and say to these human tragedies, "We are your brothers and your sisters, 'Go thou and sin no more'."

35. In keeping with the order of Business the Convention at this 11:00 o'clock hour, November 11, 1936 stood silently in a Memorial or Armistice Day Service with Mrs. Carpenter playing "Taps" at the organ. Cleveland Holland, World War Chaplain afterwards offered the prayer.

36. Special musical selections were next offered by the Kennedy Home High School Choral Club under the direction of John Biggs Alderman. The numbers included "The King of Love My Shepherd Is", a reading "I Am Music" by Miss Elizabeth Smith, and closed with "Holy Is the Lord". Miss Bertha Earp and Mrs. J. C. Pate assisted at the organ and piano, respectively.

37. The regular order now appeared with B. W. Spilman, Kinston representing Eastern North Carolina, B. E. Morris, the Piedmont section of the State and Wayne Williams, Western Carolina, who assisted the General Secretary in discussing State Mission Opportunities.

38. "Hymn of Love", was the song here sung by the forty-eight boys and girls from the Kennedy Home.

Song: "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross".

39. O. T. Binkley, Chapel Hill, preached the noon hour sermon and his theme was "The Church at Worship."

40. Adjournment followed after prayer by R. N. Simms, Raleigh.

WEDNESDAY—Afternoon Session

"The Church In Service to Those In Need"

41. "Pass Me Not" was the opening song of this session and E. H. Potts, Elizabeth City, led the devotions.

42. Vice-President B. E. Morris was presiding at this time and announced the latest registration at 738.

43. In keeping with the will of the 1935 Convention (See page 55, section 80) the Convention heard the Committee report, being an amendment to the Constitution changing the Convention's date of meeting. *Chairman* T. H. King, Clinton, read and moved the adoption of the amendment which upon vote became a part of the Constitution as follows:

That in Article III, Section 1, the word *second* in the second line be omitted and the word *third* be inserted.*

44. There was received, with President Wall now presiding, from another special Committee named at the 1935 Convention, (see page 57, section 88) a report *IN Re The Biblical Recorder*. This report follows, read and upon the motion of J. L. Peacock, Tarboro, accepted:

* Under Constitutional Authority, Article VII, Section 6 the 1937 Convention will meet on Tuesday after the second Sunday in November.

REPORT OF BIBLICAL RECORDER COMMITTEE

The Biblical Recorder Committee cannot make a complete report to the Convention this year.

Your committee was unfortunate in having its chairman, Dr. Charles H. Durham, resign two months ago. Up to that time no meeting of the committee had been held. When a new chairman had been appointed, steps were immediately taken to call the committee together. Three meetings have been held, one of which was held in conjunction with the Directors of the Biblical Recorder Publishing Company.

At that meeting a proposition was made that will require further consideration.

Your committee would, therefore, ask that the committee be permitted to continue for another year and that any vacancy which may occur be filled by the president of the Convention, keeping the number of the committee at seven.

Your committee endorses the Triple Plan for increasing the number of subscribers to the *Biblical Recorder* and urges the pastors and churches of the Convention to adopt the plan as outlined by the field representative, R. F. Terrell, that the paper may accomplish its purpose in disseminating information concerning the work of the Convention and our missionary enterprises at home and abroad to the Baptists of the state.

Greer read the Orphanage Report (see page 84, section 133) and moving its adoption offered first a quartet of Mills Home girls, Ruby Byerly, and Mary Belle Jarrell, Davidson County, Elma Harward, Wilkes County, and Della Mae Watson, Johnston County, who sang "The Heart that was Broken for Me", and then introduced Johnson J. Hayes, Greensboro, who discussed the orphanage report to be adopted in due course by the Convention.

46. Again the Kennedy Home High School Choral Club sang, using the song, "The Holy City".

47. A discussion of the Baptist Hospital Report (see page 86, section 134) read by Smith Hagaman, Superintendent, was opened by Miss Myrtle Barnette speaking primarily on the opportunity of the Nurse, followed by Mrs. Mae Matthews and J. A. McKaughan, recent Winston-Salem patients. who happily endorsed this report here adopted with great praise for the attention and relief they received while confined in the hospital.

48. The Relief and Annuity work was received here when B. Frank Hasty, Field Representative of the Annuity Board, made his appointed speech. The discussion was carried further by A. D. Kinnett, Burlington and C. E. Baucom, Concord. An extra period of time was voted the guest speaker to touch on the National Social Security Law as it relates to the Relief and Annuity plan.

49. A special resolution in the interest of Calvary Baptist Church, Raleigh, accepted by the General Board and not now included in the Advance Report of the General Board, was offered here as a matter of information and referred to the Committee to Report on General Boards Report. (See page 94, recommendation 7).

50. Chairman J. F. Carter, Winston-Salem, made the report for the committee on Place and Preacher and received the approval of the Convention to-wit:

Place: To be determined by the General Board or its executive Committee.

Preacher: Ralph A. Herring, Winston-Salem.

Alternate: A. D. Kinnett, Burlington.

51. A. J. Barton, moving adjournment, prayer was offered by R. L. Lemons and the session closed.

WEDNESDAY—Evening Session*The Church In Service To The People of America*

52. After singing "Faith of Our Fathers" the convention heard devotions as offered by C. E. Baucom, Concord to be continued with the choir of the host church singing under the direction of J. T. Holland.

53. Other committees from the Committee on Committees were here named and by motion of A. D. Kinnett, *Chairman*, accepted. (See page 22, section 22).

54. President Wall, Shelby, recognized his townsman and North Carolina's next Governor and a prominent Methodist, Layman Clyde R. Hoey, who was welcomed to the platform while the audience stood in greeting and acknowledgement from Mr. Hoey.

55. Under the presiding offices of Vice-President W. D. Poe, Oxford, and thereafter with President Wall in the chair, Charles E. Brewer, Raleigh, as Chairman read the report from the Committee on Social Service and Civic Righteousness, and upon motion to adopt by the Committee, Chairman Eugene Olive, North Wilkesboro, offered certain amendments. A prolonged discussion followed, to be ended after M. A. Huggins moved that the report and amendments be carried to the Thursday morning session for disposition; moreover such motion was withdrawn in favor of J. A. McKaughan's motion to be adopted which referred the amendments back to the Committee to the end that a revised or new report be submitted Thursday Morning at 9:15. President Frank Graham, of the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, upon invitation then spoke on the general theme of Social Service.

56. The Choir of the host church again sang, this time "Seek Ye the Lord".

57. In presenting the regular order Ira D. S. Knight, Durham, State Representative of the Home Mission Board read the Board's report to be adopted upon his motion following the Home Mission Address by Noble Y. Beall, Atlanta, Board Missionary to the Negro.

REPORT ON HOME MISSION BOARD

The missionary movement among our churches sets before us the task of making real the vision of Jesus Christ concerning the Kingdom of God. It desires to bring all people into a conscious relationship to God and to one another, living together in Christian and brotherly love. The Home Mission Board is one of the several agencies of Southern Baptists engaged in this comprehensive enterprise of exalting God and Jesus Christ.

The Home Mission Board is delighted to report real progress during the past year. Two years ago this Board had 200 missionaries. Today they have 313. This is great progress but we should have 1,000 missionaries in the field during the next several years.

General advancement is necessarily dependent upon financial increase. The income of the Home Mission Board during 1936 has been nearly 11 per cent above the amount of money received during the previous year. All interest on the indebtedness has been paid and \$91,151.20 has been paid on the principal of indebtedness. All financial obligations have been met with cash during this year. This encouraging financial statement does not mean that ample funds are being received. Much more money is needed to carry forward this imperative work. But this encouraging financial situation does mean that the Home Mission Board is determined to carry on its work within its income on a cash basis. By this same policy the Home Mission Board will continue to conduct its work.

The budget adopted for 1937 calls for the expenditure of \$407,999. This Board will continue the established policy of not making any direct and specific appeals for designated funds. Designations that are

made without solicitations, but given as the response of the heart to the appeals of great spiritual needs, will be received and accredited as among the highest type of missionary giving.

In all of our consideration of the Home Mission Board finances, especially when we think of debt, we should not fail to remember that this Board has a Church Building loan fund of approximately one and one-third million dollars.

The greatest appeal of our Home Mission Board is not an appeal for money only. It is an appeal to our people to realize that we are living in a changing and rapidly growing Southland. Industry, with its changing social complex, is rapidly making a new South. The foreigners in our midst are a mighty challenge to our missionary zeal. These will not have a chance to know Christ if we do not enlarge our missionary program. This foreign problem in our midst should be realized. Within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention there are thirty million people of native white parentage. The foreign and alien peoples within our Southern boundaries are approximately 5,000,000. Our Home Mission work also includes the four western provinces of Cuba, wherein live two and one-half million people, and also the fifty thousand living in the Panama Canal Zone.

The foreigner in our midst is one of our greatest Home Mission opportunities. Last year, for the first time in our national history, more foreigners left the shores of our nation than came into the United States. More than one hundred thousand went back; only forty-six thousand came. Every one of the one hundred thousand who returned to his native land, returned as a missionary. But did we send them back as Christian missionaries? Much of our foreign mission problem can be solved by the Home Mission Board being given the means whereby they can save the foreigner in our midst.

A brief report cannot include extended reference to the work among our deaf mutes, Indians, Jews and Negroes, nor the work done through our City Missions and Good Will Centers, nor the helpful work among the mountaineers. This vast missionary enterprise cannot continue upon the Christian zeal and momentum of the past. Each rising generation must be fired with new zeal. The successes of the past demand increasing activities in the present.

The immediate expression to the increasing activity of the Home Mission Board is the recent election of Dr. Roland Q. Leavell as Superintendent of Evangelism. He will begin his work January 1, 1937. This new work will be done in co-operation with the Sunday School Board. His salary is being provided by the Bottoms Trust Fund, of the Home Mission Board. It should be the prayer of all Southern Baptists that the leadership of Dr. Leavell will be used for a new evangelistic awakening within our borders which shall overflow to the uttermost parts of the earth.

We thank God for the sane, aggressive, Christian leadership of Dr. J. B. Lawrence. We rejoice in the crown of success which is placed upon the labors of all the faithful Home Mission workers. Gratitude is given to the W. M. U. for the work they have made possible through the Annie W. Armstrong offering each month of March. Praise is also given to the debt payments made possible by the One Hundred Thousand Club. But every individual Baptist should realize that the chief financial support for all of the mission work of our denomination comes through the individual offering of every individual Baptist, every week of the year, to the comprehensive Co-operative Program.

58. Clyde R. Hoey, Shelby, offered prayer thereafter and this session ended.

THURSDAY—Morning Session

59. Horace Eason led with the Convention singing "Take Time to Be Holy".

60. C. E. Ruffin, Ellerbe led the devotion.

61. President Wall recognized J. M. Hilliard, High Point one of the Convention's oldest and most faithful messengers from year to year.

Song: "Come Thou Almighty King."

62. J. Clyde Turner, Greensboro offered a special prayer for the program of this day.

63. A. J. Barton, Wilmington, moved and the Convention instructed the Secretary to forward to Wm. D. Upshaw, Asheville, a message and associated with this thought a prayer was offered by Brother Barton.

64. The Convention received from Charles E. Brewer, Chairman, under a previous order (see page 30, section 55) the report of the Committee on Social Service and Civic Righteousness, together with the amendments to it referred. This report again provoked extended debate and after the Conventions vote on the amendments not included in the report the original report with the approved amendments were accepted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS

Thoughtful observers note with growing apprehension certain tendencies of our time. One of these is the world-wide large-scale preparation for war. Nothing like it has ever been known. Former optimism has given place to gloom and fear. Although in recent years our own country has avoided the threat of war, we look with growing concern upon our warlike preparations. And we express the conviction that our leaders should cultivate mutual understanding with all nations so as to make war less probable. Particularly do we voice our concern over such facts as those revealed by the Senate investigation of munitions manufacturers, and we urge that effective steps be taken to curb their sinister influence.

*[We voice strongly the conviction that as Christians we can have no part in the crossing of International Boundaries in war. We protest vigorously against compulsory military training of our youth, and we urge the nationalization of the manufacture of all munitions.]

Another cause for apprehension is the great increase of crime. Recent disclosures show that criminals are highly organized and that they operate on a scale hitherto unknown. In the decade from 1924 to 1934 the number of persons confined in penitentiaries and reformatories more than doubled, their being 158,000 in 1934. The average jail population in the United States is 200,000. The cost of fighting crime and protecting society against criminals is said to reach the staggering annual total of \$14,000,000,000. It is of grave importance that so little is done to reclaim criminals while in prison, or to rehabilitate them after release. We believe that efforts along these lines should be encouraged.

*[1. At the earliest possible moment employ a paid worker who would:

- (a) Do personal work among the former prisoners.
- (b) Co-ordinate the work of the churches on this problem by associations.
- (c) Contact parole and penal authorities.

2. Urge the State to broaden the field of vocational training for our prisoners.
3. Give fuller support to the parole system.
4. Make an appeal to the public at large to help us in this challenging task—through the Press, other denominations and civic clubs.
5. Encourage our churches to work with the families of the former prisoners.
6. Secure specialists in this field to speak to our Brotherhood meetings, Sunday School classes, etc.
7. Encourage employment of the prisoners.
8. Organize "Big Brother" clubs in our Sunday Schools.
9. Co-operate with county Welfare Organizations in salvaging the prisoners.
10. Urge the State to provide better supervision of probationers.
11. Insist upon better enforcement of the compulsory school attendance law.
12. Develop a more tolerant and sympathetic attitude on the part of our people toward the former prisoners. Let us teach them to "hate the sin but love the sinner". We must exercise something of the spirit of the Galilean and say to these human tragedies, "We are your brothers and your sisters, 'Go thou and sin no more.'"

The administration of justice is of prime importance to social welfare. Laws are made for the general good. Most persons are law-abiding. A small part of the population is actually lawless. We commend certain of our judges for their impartial and effective handling of cases tried before them and their manifest concern for society. We believe that heavier penalties should be administered for such crimes as drunken driving, driving after revocation of license, and for violation of the liquor laws. We hope that greater efforts will be made to insure certain and swift penalties for guilty persons. In line with this, we strongly deprecate legal malpractice which obstructs justice by unnecessary delays, gross abuse of the right of appeal, and the use of legal technicalities to clear the guilty. We believe that such revision of court procedure as will check abuses and provide for more effective administration of justice is highly desirable.

The present liquor situation in America is tragic in the extreme. By the free use of money, by false propoganda, and by campaign promises, soon to be forgotten, the prohibition amendment was repealed. The United States government then became the advocate of the liquor business, openly fostering the use of alcoholic liquors for the sake of revenue. In our own state, the last legislature in its closing days, overriding the will of the people as expressed by 184,000 majority in the last election, treacherously destroyed our temperance legislation and provided for the operation of liquor stores in several counties of the state. The results of this unwarranted action are seen in the great increase of drunkenness, particularly in the wet counties. In the past year over six thousand drivers' licenses have been revoked, most of them for drunken driving. The menace of the roads is due in some degree to beer sold in hundreds of places where even in the days of the saloon it was not found. A highly financed advertising campaign is keeping alcoholic beverages before the public. We deplore the fact that some of our daily papers in the state are a party to this effort at wholesale debauchery. Particularly do we condemn the deliberate effort to induce women and youth to drink. We urge our ministers and the denominational press to keep our people informed about the evils of drink and about the present issue. Especially do we commend the State Department of Education for its effort to provide suitable temperance instruction in the schools. The United Dry Forces of the state are carrying on their work under the leadership of Mr. Cale Burgess of Raleigh. We express to him our appreciation for his unselfish service in the cause of temperance and we urge our people to support his organization in its work.

We note with satisfaction the improved quality of moving pictures. This is doubtless due to the efforts of certain agencies advocating reform. The improvement came gradually as it appeared that the public appreciated clean shows. We believe that all Christians should discourage the production of salacious plays and those that feature crime. This can best be done by not

patronizing them. We also believe that they should co-operate in all practical ways to secure further improvement in the quality of screen plays.

The secularization of the sabbath is a matter of grave concern. Indirectly it is of great social importance. Christian citizenship is the highest citizenship. The best Christian citizenship depends on worship and active support of the church and its activities. Sabbath desecration interferes with these, thus handicapping the church in its efforts to Christianize the social order by developing Christian personalities to function in society. We strongly urge our people both by precept and by example to help save the sabbath for its God-given purpose.

We believe that, on the whole, race relations are improving. The right of Negroes to act as jurymen is now definitely conceded. Participation in court procedure will be beneficial to them and will tend in time to overcome hurtful race prejudices. We condemn mob action, especially that which involves lynching. If national action in this matter is to be long deferred, the states must handle the lynching problem more effectively. The success of the G-men in dealing with crime shows what could be done in dealing with lynchers. We urge our officials and officers to put forth every possible effort to stamp the blot of lynching from our civilization.

We are chiefly concerned with the moral and spiritual phases of our life. But these are closely related to economic conditions. A large percent of our population have too little income to allow them to develop personality in wholesome ways. The poor and defenseless are put at great disadvantage by the economically powerful. This is a matter of serious concern to Baptists.* [We believe that this condition will persist until our social order can be brought under control of the Christian stewardship motive. We believe that Baptists should give this matter serious consideration in an effort to find a more Christian economy.] We are still largely rural. Our country churches depend on the quality of country life. Whatever seriously affects farm life affects our churches. We view with alarm the growth of tenancy, enhancing as it does the problems of soil depletion, education of a mobile population, and the matter of church affiliation. We look with favor upon any efforts made to improve country life.

We note with much interest the launching of a movement to combat venereal diseases in state and nation. Too long have Christians been indifferent to this evil, the extent of which was revealed for the first time in the selective draft for the World War. It has now reached such proportions as to be a real menace to our civilization. We hereby express to the State Board of Health our hearty approval of its work.

Our changing civilization and the lowering of moral ideals are working havoc with the American home. Some of the best features of the older family are gone, probably never to return. Regular worship and religious training are largely things of the past. Divorce, itself, a symptom of more radical evils, is rapidly increasing. The family as an institution is becoming more and more unstable. We affirm our conviction that Christian principles alone can save the family and the home for their high social purposes.

Finally, we express our firm belief that these and all other social ills can be successfully dealt with only by the recognition of the saving power of Jesus Christ and hearty acceptance of Him by Christian people as Lord of their lives.

65. In keeping with proper notice W. H. Moore, Wadesboro, moved and the Convention accepted this additional amendment to the Constitution.

That Article VI, Section 1, be amended by the addition of the following paragraph, to be designated as paragraph G, to-wit: **That no individual shall serve on any Board or Institution who is at the same time holding membership on any Board or Institution.**

66. At this hour W. Perry Crouch, Secretary of the Department of Christian Education introduced the topic Christian Education, which first included a discussion of the Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., by its General Manager J. O. Williams, afterwards Wilson Woodcock, Greensboro, and Nane Starnes, Asheville, spoke for the Baptist Bible Institute and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, respectively. These speakers preceded J. B. Weatherspoon, of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, who addressed the Convention on Christian and Theological Education.

Song: "Jesus, I My Cross Have Taken".

67. Reports (see page 77), came from our Baptist Colleges at this time as General Secretary Huggins introduced these representative speakers: W. R. Cullom, Wake Forest; Charles E. Brewer, Meredith; Robert L. Moore, Mars Hill; and Leslie H. Campbell, Campbell.

68. The General Secretary made mention of Wingate Junior College and Boiling Springs, two additional State Baptist Schools, and recognized their Presidents: James B. Little and George Burnette.

69. W. P. Few, President of Duke University, was recognized and warmly welcomed at this time.

70. R. W. Simms read the following resolution to be adopted by the Convention.

GOLDEN JUBILEE OF CAMPBELL COLLEGE

WHEREAS, Campbell College has entered upon its Fiftieth Year of continuous service; and

WHEREAS, the Golden Jubilee of the College will be celebrated in June, 1937; and

WHEREAS, thousands of students have been the recipients of the educational and character-building benefits made available to the sons and daughters of North Carolina; and

WHEREAS, the students and graduates of Campbell College are rendering conspicuous service in all walks of life; in the vocations; the professions and as workers in the life of the Baptist Denomination, and as inspirational leaders among the Baptist Clergy of the State and Nation; and

WHEREAS, the College with the vision of larger service to mankind is projecting its program of expansion and endowment for the future,—

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the North Carolina Baptist State Convention in its 106th Annual Session, convening in Durham, North Carolina, that the felicitations of the Convention are hereby tendered to Campbell College, not only for the Golden Jubilee Year, but for the future, that beckons to an enlarged and ever expanding service to the Denomination and to the Southland.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the State Convention which sponsors and fosters the College as an important division of its educational life, with its congratulations on the half century, pledges its sympathetic interest and co-operation, as the spirit and ideals of Campbell go forward down into the Century.

71. In further recognition of this celebration, President Wall named R. N. Simms, Raleigh; D. B. Bryan, Wake Forest; and Eugene Olive, North Wilkesboro as a committee to attend the Golden Jubilee of Campbell as personal representatives of the Convention.

72. "Christian Education and the World Situation" was the subject address that closed the discussion on Christian Education by Sankey L. Blanton, Wilmington and afterwards upon motion by J. S. Farmer, Raleigh the report of Christian Education was adopted.

73. M. A. Huggins under miscellaneous told of efforts put forth by Charles H. Dickey and himself in securing an option on the George W. Truett Homestead, of 80 acres, in Western North Carolina and solicited the interest of the Convention in the acquisition of the property for North Carolina Baptists. A collection was received toward the purchase price of \$2,500.00 and upon motion by J. S. Farmer, the Convention instructed the General Secretary to take such additional steps as necessary that title to the property be perfected in the Convention.*

74. The sermon coming at this noon hour was preached by Ralph A. Herring, Winston-Salem whose subject was "The Home, the Source of Christian Leaders."

J. W. Lynch, Wake Forest prayed and the session ended.

THURSDAY—Afternoon Session

The Church Enlisted In World Wide Service

75. A. Lincoln Fulk, led the devotion accompanied by Mrs. Carpenter at the organ after Horace Easom led in the singing of "I Gave My Life for Thee".

76. On behalf of the Publicity Committee, Chairman Charles H. Dickey read and on his motion the report that follows was approved.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLICITY

During the past conventional year this department has had access to nearly all of the one hundred and fifty newspapers in this State, together with the two great press associations. Items of interest have constantly gone out over the wires and through the mails to these mediums of news dissemination. It may be fairly said that the State has been kept rather well informed about what the Baptists of North Carolina have been doing.

The news gathering organizations in this State have been most generous with the space which they have constantly placed at the disposal of our denomination. It can be said as of today that we have reached that place in our publicity work where the newspapers of this State are glad to publish anything when we have anything to say. Their treatment of this convention has demonstrated that.

For the year that lies out ahead of us it may be said that one hundred and fifty newspapers, two big press associations and all the radio broadcasting stations in the State are at our reasonable disposal.

77. In keeping with the positive position of North Carolina Baptists, Johnson J. Hayes, Greensboro, read and upon his motion the following resolution which was unanimously passed.

Believing as we do that legalizing liquor in any form—under whatever device or name—will inevitably result in increased consumption of liquor with all its attendant evils, and will neither stop nor check bootlegging, we the messengers in attendance at the Baptist State

Convention, most respectfully and earnestly petition the General Assembly of North Carolina, in accordance with the expressed will of the voters of the State, to make it unlawful to manufacture or sell intoxicating beverages within this State. It is our considered judgment that revenue to be derived from legalizing the traffic is unworthy to be compared to the wealth wasted, lives marred, character impaired, homes molested, and spirits crushed.

A copy of this resolution shall be sent by the Secretary of this Convention to the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of our next General Assembly.

78. W. D. Poe offered the report for the Needy, Aged, and Infirm Committee and confirmed hereafter by his motion.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON AGED AND INFIRM

Your Committee desires to re-emphasize the suggestions made in its 1934 report to the effect that we owe a distinct duty to render helpful assistance to the Aged and Infirm. In view of the unsettled situation as to the governmental pension program, we deem it unwise to make any specific recommendation upon this question at this time. This further delay is, in our opinion, the best course to pursue, lest there should be a duplication or a conflict in plans and purposes. We do urge, however, that the local churches give special attention to their needy old people so that their last days may be made as happy as possible.

It is our further opinion that this subject should be kept before the Convention until the situation is more settled and a definite program can be adopted.

Our investigation discloses that more than 400 homes for the Aged and Infirm are now operated in 40 states by 25 different denominations. The Baptists have 20 such homes.

Some of these homes are small, sheltering less than 25 persons; some have more than 200 people each; and a number of the homes are maintained solely for ministers and their widows, and other church workers. Our Methodist brethren have 45 such homes, but none of them are exclusively ministers' homes.

More than half the homes have no entrance fee. Some have a fee, but do not refuse admission to any worthy person when resources permit. About half the homes have a provision for life members, with a fixed payment made by the applicants or by others for them. More than 27,000 aged people are cared for in these homes at a cost of more than eight million dollars annually.

One Home describes its benefits as follows:

"Each person is given a cheerful, well-furnished private room, with furnace heat and electric lights. Also, the use of the pleasant living rooms, freedom of the grounds, and every privilege that goes with real family life. Each member is guaranteed comfortable support, wholesome food, competent medical care and nursing, and at death, Christian burial . . . unless interment is otherwise provided."

North Carolina Baptists waited a long time before they undertook the care of the orphan child. Many fatherless and friendless children were bound out by the Courts and countless others went hungry and cold and unlettered. Now everybody is interested in the orphan. We have been made richer in soul by the love and money we have given to these children.

Equally helpless with the orphan are the worn out and penniless men and women of our land. And we cannot claim soul honesty until we have volunteered our assistance to these silent old people who are too feeble to work, too poor to live decently, and too proud to beg. A Baptist in a poor house, by whatever name it is called, raised a question that is difficult for us to answer. We cannot divide the Gospel into

evangelistic and social. The Gospel is for the whole man, it matters not where or when his need is.

We recommend, therefore, that:

The Convention name a Committee to confer with life Committees to be appointed by the Orphanage Trustees and by the Hospital Trustees and that this joint Committee report with recommendation on this subject at the next Convention.

79. At the request of Secretary Huggins the Convention advised that this order be observed *In Re* the recommendations of the General Board. *A RESOLUTION

Resolved by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina that for the purpose of refunding certain outstanding bonded and note indebtedness of the Convention, in accordance with the report and recommendation of its General Board pertaining thereto, which is made a part hereof, and which was adopted at this session of the Convention, the Trustees of the Convention be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to issue a note or notes in the name of the Convention to the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company in the principal amount of \$350,000, same to bear interest at 4%, and to be payable over a period of five years ending not later than December 31, 1941; and further that the Trustees of the Convention be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to issue in the name of the Convention bonds or notes to the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company, or other lending source, in the principal amount of \$450,000, same to bear an interest rate of not over 5%, and to be payable over a period of fifteen years, with however no principal payments to be made during the five year period ending December 31, 1941;

And for the full and prompt payment of the principal and interest of such notes and bonds herein authorized to be issued when and as due, the full faith, credit and resources of the Convention are hereby irrevocably pledged;

That the General Board be and it is hereby fully authorized and empowered to do all things whatsoever that may be necessary to perfect the said notes and/or bonds as to substance and form, the maturities thereof to be in accordance with said report and recommendation of the General Board adopted at this session; and that the General Board is hereby instructed to allocate and appropriate from the receipts and expected receipts on January 1 of each year, during which any of the bonds and/or notes herein authorized are outstanding, a sum sufficient to pay the interest and principal payments on such refunding notes and/or bonds falling due for the then current year;

That the Trustees of Meredith College be authorized and instructed to secure the notes and/or bonds to the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company or to some other lending agency with a first mortgage or deed of trust on the physical property of Meredith College, exclusive of

endowment, and exclusive of lands acquired in connection with endowment funds, and exclusive of a portion of the campus property suitable for professors' homes, if such portion of the campus property is not necessary to be included in order to obtain and secure the loan;

That the Convention hereby pledges to the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company and to the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company, or other lending source, that all sums thus allocated and appropriated shall constitute and enjoy a first claim upon the incomes and revenues, received or to be received, by the convention, excepting only incomes and revenues designated for other specific purposes.

92. The Co-operative Program of Southern Baptists occupied the remainder of the afternoon session with General Secretary Huggins presiding and calling upon Eugene Olive, Chairman of the Promotion and Enlistment Committee for the Committee report and thereafter J. C. Pipes, W. Perry Crouch, M. O. Alexander, and Walter L. Johnson brought most encouraging statements from our North Carolina Baptist Field of Activity.

93. Following, J. E. Dilliard, Nashville came speaking upon the subject "Why I Believe in the Co-operative Program," and thereafter the Convention sang "Break Thou the Bread of Life" and adjourned when J. C. Powell prayed.

INTRODUCTION

In making this report, which is the fifth report of the Board prepared by the present General Secretary, we express our deep thanksgiving to God for His unfailing blessings upon us. Our faith in Him grows continuously, and our confidence in the Baptist people has never been greater.

We rejoice to be able to record in this report some of the achievements of the year. We believe that these achievements have been more substantial than in any recent year. Gracious revivals have been held in hundreds of our churches, and many members have been added. The progress in Sunday school work, as revealed in this report, has never been more marked, while the work of all other departments, B. T. U., B. S. U., work among our men, etc., has produced gratifying results. Our institutions are crowded with students. Moreover, we have been reducing our obligations to our creditors; at the same time we have been meeting our obligations, in part at least, to the people of the state, the southland, and the world. It appears now that we shall reduce our obligations to our creditors around \$50,000 during the current year, and at the same time increase our gifts to all mission and benevolent causes.

It appears that our income will be some eight to ten per cent in advance of the income of 1935. While this advance is not as great as we had hoped, it will be remembered that during the early months of the year we had an unusually severe winter. The result was that for the first three and a half months of the year we made no gain over 1935. We undertook an enlarged budget for this year; and that is what should have been done. Present indications are, however, that we shall come to the end of the year without a deficit anywhere along the line.

We rejoice to record the passing of the financial depression. We know that God has wonderfully smiled upon North Carolina. As a token of gratitude and as an expression of our abiding interest in the great causes we cherish and foster, we ought to, and must, make a great advance during the year that is ahead. We speak here not only of a financial advance but also a spiritual advance. Are we out of the financial depression? The answer is, yes. A more important question is: Are we coming out of the spiritual and moral depression into which we slumped prior to the financial depression in 1929 and 1930? No more important question faces our churches and Convention now than this.

While we point with pardonable pride to substantial achievements all along the line, we know that our gains are small in comparison with what we ought to be doing. We must go forward with a great program of evangelism here in the state, in the south and in the world. We must win men and women who are *outside of our churches* and who are lost to God. An equally important task is winning the men and women *in our churches* who are now lost, apparently completely lost, to His Kingdom. When we think of the great tasks ahead of us there is no place for pride, but rather of humility and a deep resolve to seriously undertake the challenging tasks that await us. Evangelism and stewardship must go hand in hand in our thinking, in our planning, and in our activities.

In 1933 the Convention adopted twenty-two objectives. We can measure, at least in part, our progress in terms of these objectives. This procedure will enable us to get a fairly accurate glimpse of many phases of our work, as well as the progress which we are making.

I. OUR OBJECTIVES

In parentheses we give the figures for last year and for the years preceding, in so far as this is possible. The figures in the first parentheses are for the year immediately preceding; and in the second parentheses the figures for the next preceding year, etc., are given.

1. Every church with a pastor.

It is estimated that on October 1, 1936, 150 (160) (175) (200), churches were without pastors. Probably there are at all times at least 150 pastorless churches.

2. A revival in each church—at least one each year.

Accurate figures are not available, but the Minutes of 1935 show that 1,783 (1,797) (1,792), churches reported baptisms, while 653 (613) (593) did not. Taking the state as a whole, 18,768 baptisms were reported in 1935, 19,670 in 1934, 20,038 in 1933 and 23,342 in 1932. The 653 churches reporting no baptisms have a combined membership of 76,210. It is interesting also to note that these 76,210 members gave to denominational causes \$49,522, or a per capita of 67 cents a year. In other words, the per capita gifts of the churches reporting no baptisms is only about one half of that for the state as a whole.

3. Every church with a Sunday school enrollment at least as large as the church membership.

For the year 1935 854 (863) (810) (912) of the 2,430 Sunday schools in the state met this requirement.

4. Every church with a B. T. U.

As of October 1, 1936, 950 (1,050) (1,043) (975) of the 2,436 churches had a B. T. U. organization. (This would indicate that we had fewer B. T. U. organizations than last year, but the drop in number brought about by revision of the mailing list, and all organizations not heard from over a given period are being dropped from the list.)

5. Every church with a W. M. S.

As of October 1, 1936, 1,156 (1,153) (1,100) (1,118) of the 2,436 churches had a W. M. S.

6. At least 500,000 members by 1940, with all church rolls corrected.

The Minutes of 1935 show a membership of 458,517 (450,770) (440,602) (433,046). The net gain in membership is not quite one half of the total baptisms. It is known that many churches, more than formerly perhaps, are correcting their rolls.

7. **Every Association with a representative Promotion-Executive Committee, or its equivalent, that functions throughout the year, led by the Moderator or the Chairman of the Promotion-Executive Committee, who will visit and encourage the churches.**

Probably about 45 (40) (33) of the 70 associations are meeting this requirement in whole or in part. Only a few moderators, however, visit the churches.

8. **A ten days school, or schools, for Christian workers held each year with an attendance of at least 1,000.**

In the three pastors' schools provided at Meredith, Chowan and Mars Hill about 250 (225) (192) pastors were enrolled.

9. **At least 2,500 college students enrolled in our Baptist colleges.**

For the year ending June, 1936, there were enrolled 2,419 (2,415) (2,229) college students. This does not include 1,029 (691) (651) which were enrolled in the Wake Forest-Meredith summer school at Wake Forest and Mars Hill.

10. **Two general state missionaries giving their full time to the development of our churches, missionary instruction, forming fields, et cetera, especially in the rural churches.**

The Board now has three general missionaries, M. O. Alexander, J. C. Pipes, and Charles H. Dickey.

11. **A club of Charity and Children in every Baptist Sunday school.**

For the calendar year 1935 733 (772) (678) (781) Sunday schools had a club of Charity and Children.

12. **Twenty-five thousand subscribers to the Biblical Recorder, including every pastor, every Sunday school superintendent, every W. M. S. president or leader, and every B. T. U. leader or director.**

As of the last week of October, 1936, the circulation of the Biblical Recorder was 13,200 (10,500) (10,400) (8,000). Of the 1,182 ordained ministers who were pastors 625 (605) (727) (582), were taking the Recorder; 105 (97) (97) (78), of the 525 ordained ministers not in the pastorate were taking it; 440 (410) (396) (317) of the 2,430 Sunday school superintendents, and 425 (393) (377) (302) of the 1,156 W. M. S. presidents were taking it.

13. **Every institution and agency of the Convention living within its income.**

Chowan, Meredith and Wake Forest had small deficits. They are so small, however, it may be said that all institutions are living within their incomes.

14. **No borrowing by the Convention, or its institutions or agencies, of any funds for any purpose, except in anticipation of current income.**

No funds for current support have been borrowed this year.

15. **A fifty-fifty division of distributable or undesignated funds as between State and Southwide objects.**

For 1936 the Coöperative Program (Undesignated), receipts are divided on the 60-40 basis, 60 for State and 40 for Southwide objects.

16. **An annual income, designated and undesignated of \$450,000 for the fiscal year 1934: \$500,000 for 1935; \$550,000 for 1936; \$600,000 for 1937; \$660,000 for 1938; \$725,000 for 1939 and \$800,000 for 1940.**

Our total income for 1935, designated and undesignated, was \$493,785.51. Thus we fell short of our goal by only about \$6,000. With real effort we can reach our goal of \$550,000 for 1936.

17. **Every church contributing through the Coöperative Program, including both designated and undesignated funds.**

For 1935 1,877, (1,796), (1,648), (1,607) of the 2,436 churches reported funds given through the Coöperative Program or to some object in the Coöperative Program, leaving 559 (614), (737), (767) that made no contribution.

18. **Every church and Sunday school contributing to the Orphanage.**

For 1935 1,944 (1,920), (1,728), (1,686) churches made some contribution to the Orphanage, leaving 492, (490), (657), (688) that did not.

19. **Every Sunday school contributing and remitting to the Orphanage once each month.**

During 1935 218 (269), (230), Sunday schools met this requirement, leaving 2,212, (2,115), (2,155) that did not.

20. **Every church making a Thanksgiving offering for the Orphanage.**

1,752, (1,659), (1,515), (1,056) churches or Sunday schools made a Thanksgiving offering in 1935 to the Orphanage, leaving 684, (751), (870), (1,348) that did not.

21. **Every church and Sunday school making an offering on Mother's Day for the Hospital.**

On Mother's Day 1936 about 1,508, (1,706), (1,308), (1,062) churches or Sunday schools made an offering to the Hospital.

22. **Every church making a remittance to the Convention Treasurer at least once a month.**

For the year 1935 328, (359), (215), (197) churches met this requirement.

105. II. REPORT OF GENERAL BOARD MEETINGS

The Board has had two meetings during the year, one on December 16, 1935, and one on June 11, 1936. In accord with the Constitution of the Convention the important actions of the Board during the year are here recorded.

1. The principal item which claimed the attention of the Board in its December meeting was the adoption of the budget for 1936. We do not publish here the budget figures for the reason that actual expenditures for each department of the work will be published in the Convention Annual. Suffice it to say the budget was carefully and conservatively made and we are living without our income.

2. The last Convention ordered that all undesignated funds be divided sixty per cent for State objects and forty per cent for Southwide objects.

The Board divided the sixty per cent for State objects as follows: Christian Education, Debt Service 42 per cent; State Missions 13 per cent; Hospital 4 per cent; Ministerial Education 1 per cent.

3. A resolution was passed authorizing the borrowing of sufficient funds to retire the mortgage on the property of Boiling Springs College, the amount of the mortgage being \$16,000. (Subsequently \$16,000 was borrowed from the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company at an interest rate of 5 per cent, same to be paid during 1936, 1937 and 1938.)

4. A resolution was adopted authorizing the restoration of salaries of the administrative and departmental staff to the 1932 level "as funds are available and under the direction of the Executive Committee." (Due to severe weather during the first part of the year, which in turn affected seriously the receipts of the Convention, the salaries have not as yet been restored in accordance with the resolution. It is, of course, the definite policy of the Board to live within its income.)

5. The Board accepted with regret the resignation of Perry Morgan as Sunday School Secretary, and appointed a committee to draw up suitable resolutions in recognition of his work.

6. The matter of the selection of a Sunday School Secretary to succeed Perry Morgan was left open, a special committee being appointed to report at a later date.

At the June 1936 meeting of the Board the following matters were determined upon.

1. The Board heard the request of Wake Forest College for an appropriation of \$9,000 for current support; also a similar request from Chowan College made through President Roy R. McCulloch. These requests were referred to the Education Committee of the General Board for study.

2. Upon motion the following recommendation from the Executive Committee was adopted:

The Executive Committee of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention recommends the appointment of a Secretary of Christian Education, under whose supervision shall be promoted the activities of the Sunday School, Baptist Training Union, Baptist Student Union, and the enlistment of our men.

3. Following this action Mr. Claude F. Gaddy of Raleigh was elected to this position, and L. L. Morgan was promoted to the position of Sunday School Secretary. (Mr. Gaddy did not see fit to accept the position, and at a subsequent meeting of the special committee, to whom was given power to act, there was called to this position Rev. W. Perry Crouch, then pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church of Morganton. Mr. Crouch accepted and began his work with the Board on August 1.)

4. A resolution was passed authorizing the borrowing of \$15,000 for the purpose of reimbursing Southwide Objects for money due them. (Subsequently, \$15,000 was borrowed, at an interest rate of 5 per cent and payable during the years 1936, 1937 and 1938, from the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company of Raleigh.)

5. The Board adopted the general promotion plans for the fall. (These plans will be found outlined in another section of this report.)

III. DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

106.

A. HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

During the twelve months ending September 30, 1935, we have forwarded for all Southwide objects \$173,819.90. During a corresponding period ending September 30, 1935, we forwarded \$148,803.53, a gain of \$25,016.37. For the year ending September 30, 1934, we forwarded \$120,208.34. Undesignated funds for Southwide objects, after deducting \$25,000 annually for Southern Baptist Convention Bonds, are divided as follows:

Of course all designated funds, without any deduction whatever, go directly to the object specified.

B. STATE MISSIONS

We rejoice to report that State Missions came to the end of 1935 not only with no debt but with a credit balance of about \$12,000. This was made possible because of a greatly reduced budget during the past four years, and because the offering for this particular object was the largest since before 1927.

We are operating during 1936 on an enlarged budget, by virtue of the action of the 1935 Convention. No debt, however, is anticipated. We make herewith a brief report concerning what has been undertaken, together with some brief comments upon the State Mission Program as a whole.

We call attention to the enlarged and enlarging task of State Missions. We are now undertaking ten separate activities in the work. A glance at the outline of the work as recorded in the following pages presents the varied tasks of State Missions. The report, however, shows one task of State Missions which, in reality, we have not as yet undertaken, viz.: A Ministry to the Prison Population. Surely at the earliest moment possible this work should become a definite part of our State Mission Program.

The Convention of 1935 created a special committee to recommend a program for aiding former prisoners. Dr. M. L. Skaggs is the chairman of the committee. He has given much study to the subject, and we believe his report will be read with great interest and profit.

It must be remembered, too, that State Missions is a sort of S. O. S., that is to say the *Service of Supply* for all other objects. Our failure to provide for an adequate and aggressive State Mission Program will soon result in our failure along all lines.

1. GENERAL MISSIONARIES

We record here with enthusiasm our appreciation of the effective and sacrificial service of the general missionaries, M. O. Alexander, J. C. Pipes and Charles H. Dickey. Mr. Alexander and Mr. Pipes have given their time largely to the churches, partly in evangelistic meetings but mostly in holding stewardship revivals. For the first six months of the year Mr. Dickey gave his time to assisting the management of the Biblical Recorder in an effort to increase the circulation. A partial result of his efforts will be found in the increased circulation of the Recorder as given elsewhere in this report. During the second six months of the year he has been giving his time partly to publicity for the Convention and partly to stewardship revivals.

Day and night these Convention servants have labored. We are advancing along all lines, and this advance is due in part to their efficient service. We record not only our deep appreciation but also submit a summary of their activities during the year.

109. (a.) REPORT OF M. O. ALEXANDER, GENERAL MISSIONARY

Beginning with November 1, 1935, this report covers in outline my activities to October 31, 1936.

In the fall of 1935 Stewardship Schools were conducted in eleven associations, reaching definitely more than eighty churches. During the Convention year I have

Assisted 16 churches in church revivals.

Supplied pulpits for our pastors in 12 churches.

Delivered 18 special addresses on our promotion work.

Assisted in 9 Pastors' Conferences.

Addressed 7 Men's Meetings.

Assisted in 2 schools for pastors.

Attended 6 meetings of associations in special conferences, visited 11 associations in annual meetings.

Attended meetings of 3 special committees with reference to our Statewide work and 2 with reference to Southwide work.

Attended 3 conventions, the General State Convention, the State Sunday School Convention and the Southern Convention.

Spent one week in conference of all state secretaries of the south at Ridgecrest.

Visited many of our state missionaries on their fields and assisted 6 of them in special meetings.

Worked in 14 associations with promotion committees in preparation for Stewardship Schools this fall. These schools are in progress as this report is written, having been completed in 3 associations.

I suggest that all of our pastors use James 2:14-20 in their preaching. The least of all of our problems is the problem of finances.

110. (b.) REPORT OF J. C. PIPES, GENERAL MISSIONARY

Your General Missionary, J. C. Pipes, came with us on September 1, 1935. Since then he has been engaged in varied work.

He has held four meetings: One of 6 days at Brookford, three of 10 days each at Pine Branch, Roan Mt. and West Canton.

Attended four Men's Meetings: Marion, Asheville, Bryson City and Boone, respectively.

Attended 3 Pastor's Conferences of 2 days each at Bryson City, Andrews, and Boone.

Attended 13 Preliminary Associational meetings in the spring.

Attended one Pastors' School at Mars Hill.

Supplied in 15 pulpits.

Held personally or supervised 128 Stewardship Revivals in 12 associations.

Visited and spoke in 11 associations.

Delivered 278 sermons and addresses during the year and held innumerable conferences with groups arranging for Stewardship Revivals, etc.

In the four meetings held there were 165 professions of religion and renewals.

The Board has received from the churches helped as a direct result of meetings \$264.98.

111. (c.) REPORT OF C. H. DICKEY, PUBLICITY DIRECTOR

Came with the Board September 1, 1935, and began work of publicity and field undertakings. After the Convention at Asheville spent the remaining part of the weeks until the holidays in holding Stewardship Schools, doing the Convention's publicity work and visiting the churches and associations.

For the first six months of 1936, the time was spent in the interest of the Biblical Recorder. Traveled almost constantly over the State between Charlotte and Wilmington, between Winston-Salem and Elizabeth City, between the Virginia and South Carolina lines. During this time, promoted the club plan, spoke in many churches, interviewed scores of pastors and, at the same time, looked after whatever publicity matters we deemed advisable.

Beginning with June, 1936, I have given my time exclusively to the Convention work. Attended many pastors' conferences, men's meetings and the Raleigh and Chowan College Summer Schools for pastors. In August, began my work in the 12 associations assigned me and since then have been holding preliminary meetings, visiting associations, and holding and promoting Stewardship Revivals.

During the Convention year, reported the Asheville Convention to the State press and have, from time to time, furnished the daily press, the press associations and the weekly press whatever items we deemed advisable. In addition, have edited a full page on the Biblical Recorder for much of this time.

112. 2. MISSIONARY PASTORAL ASSISTANCE

We give below a summary of the work done by our 63 missionary pastors from October 1, 1935, to September 30, 1936. Let us bear in mind we had 86 in 1930, 47 in 1931, 40 in 1932, 48 in 1933, 56 in 1934, and 70 in 1935. We are on the incline again.

114. 4. THE WORK WITH OUR INDIAN BROTHERS

We report the continuance of Rev. and Mrs. M. C. Lunsford as workers among the Indians of Robeson County, and record our appreciation of the splendid work they have done and are doing there.

It will be remembered that some years ago the Home Mission Board found itself unable to carry on the work among the Cherokees in Swain County. At that time our General Board came to the rescue. During that period W. F. Sinclair and W. H. Fitzgerald served under our Board, after the resignation of J. N. Lee. At the first of this year the Home Board informed us that they were ready to assume the responsibility for the work there. Brother Fitzgerald was retained and is carrying on the work in a fine way.

115. 5. THE WORK WITH OUR NEGRO BROTHERS

Rev. W. C. Somerville, who made his first report to the Convention last year, has done a most effective and far-reaching work during the current year. We record our joy because of the progress which the Negroes are making under his excellent leadership. His report, a summary of which follows, is encouraging to us all. His task has been :

1. To awaken and vitalize the Christian consciousness of the Negro Baptists of North Carolina in the Kingdom of God.
2. To frankly and sincerely face the present-day problems which confront the ministers of Christ, the membership of our churches, and the larger problems of the Kingdom.
3. To establish good-will and confidence among our churches in the Convention program.
4. To develop the spirit of racial good-will throughout the state.
5. To inculcate the spirit of consistent giving by the churches to the Convention objects.
6. To develop denominational love and pride.
7. To unify all of our work into a regular consistent organization.
8. To enlarge and make more effective a consistent program of religious education, missions, and evangelism.
9. To organize Daily Vacation Bible Schools, Leadership Training Courses, and Teacher Training Courses.
10. Make periodical visitations to the various ministers in order to inspire them in Kingdom Building.

During the past twelve months I have :

Directed a Baptist Conclave in August which brought more than 3,500 church representatives to Raleigh.

Preached 146 sermons.

Delivered 253 lectures.

Attended 27 Associations.

Visited 326 ministers.

Spoken to approximately 23,000 persons at various meetings and traveled 27,635 miles.

With the continued support of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, I hope to achieve the following objects during the future :

1. To bring to fruition a program of unification among our various organizations.
2. To enlarge our program of religious education throughout the state:
 - a) Hope to secure the service of an assistant who will give his full time to Sunday school and B. Y. P. U. work.
 - b) To have a commission appointed to study religious educational needs in each section of the state.
3. To urge a continuous growth in regular and consistent support of Missions and Christian Education.
4. To continue a ceaseless effort to raise the moral, educational, and spiritual development of our clergy and laity.
5. Plan for our Baptist Conclave of 1940.
6. To conduct a ministers' school at Shaw University during the month of June.

6. THE OTEEN MISSION

We record again our appreciation of the distinguished work which Brother Wayne W. Williams continues to do at Oteen, both in the hospital and in the church. Moreover, his contacts and influence with the pastors in the western part of the state is wholesome and helpful to the whole State Mission enterprise. Concerning the work at Oteen, we rejoice to report that other states appreciate the work he is doing to the extent that they are having some share in its maintenance. A brief report from Mr. Williams follows:

In the mountains of Western North Carolina, six miles east of Asheville, is located the U. S. Veterans Administration Hospital for the treatment of tuberculosis among World War veterans. Situated on a sunny plateau, with "Hemorrhage Hill" in the background, and surrounded on all sides by the em-purpled hills, it is beautiful in its setting.

Eight hundred brave men and women, wards of a grateful nation, are confined in this great institution. They are fighting now a greater battle than that of Flanders Fields. Daily, hourly, the drama of life and death goes on. Somewhere in America, the sun sets every evening on the fresh-made grave of some World War veteran who has "gone West" in one of Uncle Sam's hospitals.

For fifteen years, first under the Home Board and more recently under our State Board, Baptists have been ministering to these men and their families, many of whom live hard by the reservation, in the name of the Great Physician. Visiting the sick, burying the dead, saving sinners, comforting saints, preaching the word, distributing Christian literature, corresponding with loved ones back home—these and many other activities have kept us busy and happy during this, the tenth, year of our sojourn on Oteen Hill.

7. AID TO THE DEAF

We have provided for a ministry to the deaf in our state. The program, as well as the appropriation, is small, but we record our appreciation to W. R. Hackney of Charlotte and G. C. Wilder of Asheville for their efforts. The amount expended provides only about enough to cover traveling expenses. These men, however, have touched a great many points in the state during the

past year, and the reports which they send in are most encouraging. We should by all means continue this work. Mr. Hackney says:

The reception and attendance has been fine. The deaf attend the meetings with enthusiasm often coming long distances. They seem to get great joy and blessings out of the meetings, and feel that the Church is interested in them.

The need is great for more permanent work in this field.

It is said that there are some three thousand of these people in the state. It would be conservative to say that not more than five hundred of these people are ever contacted by church meetings and their various kinds of assemblies. Herein we can say "where are the ninety and nine?"

A great number of these people are Baptist by inclination, coming directly or indirectly from Baptist families.

Up to October 1st, your Missionary has held seventeen services with an attendance of 610. In these services, seven have been converted.

We are hoping and praying that this work will be enlarged, and be made permanent.

118.

8. SANATORIUM AND SAMARCAND

We record our appreciation to Rev. E. M. Harris, pastor at Aberdeen. An appropriation was made this year to enable Brother Harris to visit as often as possible Sanatorium and Samarcand. His work there has been highly significant. A good start has been made, and it is hoped that we can carry this work on even more successfully. A brief report from Brother Harris follows:

The work at Sanatorium and Samarcand is different from all other State Mission work. There is no church organization of any denomination at either place. Both institutions are maintained by the state but are quite different in their purpose and service. They are mentioned here in the same report because the same pastor ministers at both places.

At the Sanatorium there are 500 tubercular patients and they come from all sections of North Carolina. Possibly most of them are church members and some were quite active in their churches back home. They greatly appreciate the efforts of your representative to bring a little sunshine and Gospel cheer into their lives. Two Sunday schools are maintained by the institution and some minister preaches there every Sunday. It is hard to tabulate your representative's work but he preaches at the Sanatorium every month, has prayer service in rooms and wards occasionally and makes many visits to individual patients. There are frequent requests for personal visits to loved ones. We welcome such requests.

At Samarcand there are 170 girls from 9 to 18 years of age. These girls are all wards of the state, sent there by the courts of North Carolina. We preach there regularly every month and make special visits when an occasion presents itself. Our Woman's Missionary Society has asked the privilege of organizing a Y. W. A. among the Baptist girls. Birthday greetings are sent to each Baptist girl. An unusually large percentage of the girls are either Baptist or Baptist inclined, placing a great responsibility upon us. This is indeed first-hand mission work. The vital need here is for some one to show a real interest in them.

119. 9. THE PASTORS' CIRCULATING LIBRARY

In this library we now have about 500 books. We have continued to send out books on request all during the year, thus rendering the pastors a very valuable service. We had hoped to make an expenditure for some new books, but have not been able to do it.

We would urge the pastors to send to the office in Raleigh any books they can spare which they think would be helpful to their brother pastors. We would urge them also to avail themselves of this service. The office in Raleigh agrees to send two books to any pastor requesting them. The Board will pay the postage. The only expense to the pastor is postage for returning the books to the Raleigh office. A card to the General Secretary will bring full information.

120. 10. PASTORS' SCHOOLS AND CONFERENCE

We are happy to report that about a dozen Pastors' Conferences were held early in the year. These are quiet two day meetings, and in our opinion no more effective meetings are held during the year. We trust the Convention will continue these, and urge all pastors to attend them. The meetings this year were attended by about three to four hundred pastors.

In accordance with the authority and plans provided by the last Convention, we had three Pastors' Schools, one at Meredith College, one at Mars Hill College, and one at Chowan College. The program directors were T. H. King, G. C. Cox and J. L. Garrick. To these men the thanks of the Board are due in generous measure. At Mars Hill Dr. Hersey Davis and Dr. B. W. Spilman led the group in New Testament interpretation and expository preaching. The attendance was larger than ever before, about one hundred in fact. It is hoped that at least two hundred will be at Mars Hill next year. At Meredith and Chowan Dr. E. M. Poteat, Sr., and Dr. Spilman composed the faculty.

The platform hours at Meredith were superb, with such speakers as Dr. Frederick W. Norwood of London, Dr. Sun of China, our own Dr. Sampey and Dr. Yates and Dr. Franklin of Crozer.

We trust the Convention will authorize the continuance of these schools, and that the pastors will attend them in increasing numbers.

121. IV. DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We are beginning to see Christian Education as one great task whether it is undertaken by churches in their church buildings, or whether it is undertaken by Christian colleges on their campuses. Moreover, it is the same task, whether it is carried on by the agency of the Sunday school, the B. T. U., the B. S. U., the W. M. U. or the Brotherhood. Then also it is becoming increasingly clear that we have in our educational efforts much duplication. In fact the work of some of the agencies which have grown up overlap at several points. We believe the time has come to make a start in an effort to avoid this overlapping. There is urgent need for coördination, simplification, and correlation.

With this in mind the General Board in its June meeting announced a change in the present set up of our work and provided for a secretary of Christian Education, whose duties it would be to think in terms of and work

out a program, gradually of course, in line with the ideas stated above. To this position Rev. W. Perry Crouch, then pastor of Calvary Church in Morganton, was called. He began his work with the Board on August 1. He has a fine appreciation of the task involved and has given himself to it with abandon, although for sixty or ninety days he has given his time in large measure to stewardship revivals in the churches. It is proposed that he shall have general oversight of the Sunday school, B. T. U., B. S. U., and men's work; or in other words, that part of the whole Christian education program which must take place in the churches themselves. It is not proposed that he devote his energies to the administrative and financial problems of the colleges.

122.

A. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE CHURCHES

The first of August, at the request of the General Board, I came to the work of Secretary of the Department of Christian Education. I came to the work with the consciousness of the enormous opportunities that are ours to serve in this capacity. I pledge to North Carolina Baptists my best in a program which we hope will reach and help every Baptist church in North Carolina.

The reports from the different divisions of our work will follow in detail. We hope you will read them carefully.

The Sunday School work suffered a distinct loss in the resignation of the beloved Perry Morgan. Mr. Morgan had served North Carolina Baptists long and well, and they loved him. However, Mr. L. L. Morgan has been elected Secretary of our Sunday school work and has brought a great report to the Convention this year. Particularly is the Summer Campaign work notable. We hope to add a field worker to this division of our work soon.

The Training Department has likewise suffered a loss in the resignation of Miss Winnie Rickett. For four years she had been B. T. U. Secretary and was loved by people all over North Carolina. However, Miss Mabel Starnes was named Associate Secretary and has carried on the work most effectively. At least one other worker is needed in this department at once and we hope to take care of this need soon. The B. T. U. Department under Miss Starnes' leadership has had a splendid year as her report will indicate.

In addition to the workers in Sunday school and B. T. U., Miss Velma Preslar is office Secretary and will also do field work in these two departments and in Baptist Student work.

Miss Cleo Mitchell continues in the work as Student Secretary at the Woman's College of the University, at Greensboro. Meredith employs a full time Student Secretary, and we are helping in the support of Mr. Lon Robinson, Student Secretary at Wake Forest. Student workers are greatly needed at Cullowhee, Boone, East Carolina Teachers' College, Chapel Hill, and State College, Raleigh. It is our hope that we can add these workers soon.

We are outlining a program among the men of our state for the spring of 1937. Through group meetings of various kinds, we hope to reach at least 25,000 laymen during next year.

In all of this work we hope to bring a closer spirit of coöperation and where possible, correlation. Some definite plans for correlation of work, particularly meetings involving Sunday school, B. T. U., and Promotion are now

being tried in some of our Associations. We hope that this will be the beginning of a vitalized and coördinated program of education in our churches.

The reports of the different divisions of our work follow:

123.

1. DIVISION OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

L. L. MORGAN, *Secretary*

It is with a deep sense of gratitude to God that we come to make this annual report of our stewardship of the matters entrusted to our care. God has been good and our people have been kind and coöperative in all of our work. Interest in Bible Study and teaching has grown steadily throughout the year, and progress has been made along many lines. For lack of help we have had to say no to many challenging calls from needy places throughout the state.

WE EXPRESS OUR THANKS: 1. To our General Secretary, the General Board and to the Sunday School Board for the financial assistance which made a great year possible.

2. To that loyal and capable group of summer workers, and to the hundreds of volunteer workers who have so faithfully helped us during the year.

3. To the Biblical Recorder for space in the paper where week by week we keep before our people interesting facts about our work.

WORKERS IN THE DEPARTMENT: Sunday School Secretary, L. L. Morgan, is now in his eleventh year with the Department and in his first year as Secretary. Mr. Perry Morgan's leaving February 1st has more than doubled the office responsibility. However, it has been possible for us to conduct twenty-two Sunday School Revivals, attend eight Conventions and make more than forty speeches at Associational meetings and rallies.

Office Secretary, Miss Bessie Morgan, now in her tenth year, is a devout Christian worker. Her task is to run the office in the absence of the Secretary, and while he is here coöperate in the work. She has handled nearly 17,000 awards and literally hundreds of pieces of mail during the year.

APPROVED AND QUALIFIED WORKERS: For a number of years, by courtesy of the Sunday School Board, we have been permitted occasionally to use Approved and Qualified workers in the different departments. They receive pay for only the weeks they work. The workers now are as follows: Mrs. C. D. Bain, Dunn, Approved Elementary Worker; Mrs. A. V. Washburn, Goldsboro, and Mrs. F. A. Bower, Albemarle, Qualified Elementary Workers; Mrs. W. Perry Crouch, Raleigh, Approved Intermediate Worker; Mr. James Morgan, Durham, Approved Young People's Worker, and Mrs. M. D. Herndon, Gastonia, Approved Extension Worker.

PROMOTIONAL PROJECTS: State Sunday School Convention. January 21-23 at the First Baptist Church, Charlotte, more than 2,000 of our people from every section of the state gathered for a great Sunday School Convention. The personnel of the program was the best in the Sunday School field, and our people were greatly helped in solving their problems.

Associational Officers Training Conference. By courtesy of the Sunday School Board, 800 of our Associational leaders met at Hickory for a two-day training conference March 19-20. Under the same plan our 1937 conference will be held January 21-22. The place will be announced later.

Ridgecrest Conference. The South-wide Sunday School Conference at Ridgecrest, July 19-26, was well attended by our North Carolina folks, and almost every section of our state was represented. We are fortunate to have this conference in our state each year, and we urge that more of our people attend next year.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS: We now have a record of approximately 180 Vacational Bible Schools that were held during June, July and August. This is a good increase over last year's record when we were crippled by the infantile paralysis epidemic, and also over our 1934 total of 102. With the financial assistance of the Sunday School Board we secured the services of Mrs. John B. Lane, Mrs. A. V. Washburn and Mr. M. L. Jones for the promotion work in March and April. To them is due most of the credit for such a fine record.

TEACHER TRAINING AWARDS: The most encouraging thing about our work is the fact that 16,678 awards have been issued from October 1, 1935, to October 1, 1936. This is a gain of 10,922 over last year and the largest number of any year in the history of our department.

ASSOCIATIONAL TRAINING SCHOOLS: J. W. Costner of Lawndale, Superintendent of Sunday School work in the Kings Mountain Association, conducted a week of simultaneous training in forty-three churches, September 13-20, using volunteer teachers within the association. Fifteen hundred people were enrolled in the classes and more than six hundred awards were given.

Miss Ruth Tucker conducted a similar project in the Randolph Association with twenty-two churches participating and William B. Batts conducted one in Nash County with seventeen churches taking part. We really seem to be on the threshold of a new era in training work. The Associational organization is our greatest avenue of approach.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S-ADULT AND EXTENSION CONFERENCE: Mr. William F. Phillips and Miss Verda Von Hagen of Nashville, Tennessee, assisted us in a City-Wide Young People's Adult and Extension Conference at the First Baptist Church, Charlotte, October 4-9. More than three hundred and fifty people were in our conferences and nineteen churches were represented.

OTHER WORK: Aside from our regular force and our summer workers, others have been called in at different times during the year to the extent that sixty-five extra weeks' work have been given to our department through the courtesy of the Sunday School Board and volunteer workers.

WE REQUEST: 1. That the Sunday School Department be given a field worker as soon as financial conditions will permit it.

2. That the plan of conducting Sunday School Revivals be continued, and that sufficient appropriations be made to finance at least ten projects in 1937.

3. That Pastors and Superintendents join us in a concerted effort to enlarge our Sunday School space, improve our teaching, and train our leaders.

SUMMER WORKERS IN THE EAST: The following associations were assisted by twenty-one of our finest and most efficient young people during the weeks of June 13-August 16: Atlantic, Miss Ramona Brock; Bladen, Mildred Brooks; Brunswick and Dock, Zula Rogers; Cape Fear-Columbus, Ethelene Cain;

Central and Raleigh, Elma Currin; Chowan, Lewis E. Ludlum; Eastern, A. T. Usher; Johnston, Katherine Martin; Little River, Neva Harper; Neuse, Ruth Yates; New South River, Bill Dancey; Pamlico, Charles Wagner; Randolph, Ruth Tucker; Roanoke, Mr. and Mrs. O. Jack Murphy; Robeson, Flora Mae Cavenaugh; Sandy Creek, John Lambert; Tar River, Louella Brown; West Chowan, Ann Downey; and the Wilmington, Maude Jones.

The service rendered by these faithful workers cannot be tabulated except in part. The vision, encouragement, inspiration and organizations, cannot be recorded. We report a few facts:

2. DIVISION OF BAPTIST TRAINING UNIONMiss Mabel Starnes, *Associate Secretary*Mrs. J. E. Tharrington, *Office Secretary*

This is the first report to be made by the Associate Secretary, who has served for four years as field worker in the Baptist Training Union Department. Miss Winnie Rickett, Secretary of the Department, was married June 2, 1936, to Rev. J. Winston Pearce. The department lost by her resignation one who has for eleven years rendered invaluable service to the young people of North Carolina. Constantly alert, deeply consecrated and zealous in her work, she was worthy of the trust imposed in her by the Baptist State Convention. Mrs. J. E. Tharrington, who has been the capable and efficient office secretary for eleven years, has been indispensable during these days of extra work and strain.

We herein give an account of our work for the past year. The first half of the year's work, however, is not complete, because of the sudden resignation of the secretary of the department.

GENERAL OBJECTIVES: Many in our state do not yet fully appreciate the real purpose of the Training Union work in our churches, so we herein quote the general objectives for which our Training Union exists and for which we are striving.

1. To establish the Baptist Training Union more thoroughly in the thinking of our people as the church program for training all church members, and as an essential element in the Christian educational program of every Baptist church.

2. To make substantial progress in the enlistment of all our people in all our church and denominational life through a permanently effective means of enlistment, namely, the training process.

3. To present God's challenge to our young Christians to meet the demands of the new day with a complete dedication of lives to the Master in any life calling into which He might direct them, and to be ready at all times to respond to His call to preach the Gospel at home or in the uttermost parts of the earth, or to enter any other field of Christian service as a vocation.

4. To fortify our people with the truth and to equip them better through Christian training to meet the issues—social, racial, economic, political and religious—of the complex age in which we live.

EVIDENCES OF ENLARGEMENT AND GROWTH—*Associational Enlargement Endeavors:* January 26-31 was given to an Associational-wide study course at Gastonia for the Gaston County Association. Mr. W. A. Harrell of Nashville, Tennessee, assisted the State leaders in this project. Inclement weather conditions defeated the plan for enlargement, but about thirteen churches participated with an attendance of approximately two hundred. The week was considered most helpful, especially in laying a foundation for future development.

March 1-6 an Associational study course was held in Buncombe Association. Approximately thirty churches participated and the attendance ran to around five hundred. Mr. E. E. Lee and Mr. W. A. Harrell from the Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tennessee, assisted in this project also.

March 22-27 a district school was held for the churches of the Burlington district of Mount Zion Association. The State leaders were assisted by local talent. Several churches were reached and the week's work registered a success.

September 27-October 2 a City-Wide Study Course and Enlargement Week was directed by C. Aubrey Hearn of the Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee. It proved to be a great success and during the week more than eight hundred young people were enrolled in the classes in various churches.

November 1-6 an Associational-Wide Study Course will be held in Robeson Association. The services of Mr. J. E. Lambdin of the Sunday School Board were secured. More than sixty churches of the association will participate and hundreds of young people will be enlisted.

Summer Extension Work: For six weeks during the summer the Associate Secretary tried an experiment never attempted before by the department. The volunteer services of twelve college students were secured for six week's work in six mountain associations. A week's work was given to each of the following associations: Surry, Avery, Liberty, Three Forks, Alexander and Brushy Mountain. During these six weeks the young people taught 85 study courses in 37 different churches, but contacted about 60 churches, organized 35 new organizations, visited in 250 different homes and reached more than 2,500 young people during this time. It was a noble service they rendered and the department wishes here to again express deep gratitude for the services rendered by this group, who were: Fred Lipe, Asheville; James Brown, Asheville; Ted Jollay, Durham; Daphne Penny, Raleigh; Wila Marks, Rockingham; Edith Johnson, Murfreesboro; Eloise Guy, Statesville; Helen Melton, Hendersonville; Mrs. John Cashion, Wilkesboro, and Zubie Ingle, Statesville.

Twenty workers were placed in twenty associations in the eastern section of the state for nine weeks. These workers reported 74 study courses taught, 691 awards, and 2,074 people reached. This was another great step in enlargement.

State Leadership Conference: On July 3rd, the First State Leadership Conference for Associational officers was held at Ridgecrest. Approximately five hundred associational leaders and officers attended from the sixty-one associations organized in Baptist Training Union work in North Carolina, leaving only two organized associations not represented in the conference.

It would be impossible to estimate the value of this conference. The South-wide leaders, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Lambdin, Mr. W. A. Harrell, Mr. Aubrey Hearn and Dr. Clay I. Hudson, were present and conducted conferences and worked very definitely with our state leaders and associational leaders concerning their problems and making plans for greater growth and development. The Sunday School Board furnished free transportation for all associational officers, which enabled so many to come. We are grateful for this help from our Sunday School Board.

The following goals for the next five years were set by the leaders attending the State Leadership Conference:

College Engagements: Baptist Student Union presidents, Baptist Training Union directors and college presidents have been most coöperative in planning and encouraging the study courses on the various college campuses. The Associate Secretary has given a week to each of the following colleges: Campbell, Western Carolina Teacher's College, Appalachian State Teachers' College, Mars Hill and Chowan colleges. Conferences and training camps have been held on other campuses. During these engagements some 900 students have been enlisted in the classes, representing about 600 different Baptist churches.

The Regional Tours: Beginning on April 26 the Associate Secretary started on a tour of all twenty-one associations of the Southern and Central Regions, and contacted 107 churches with associational leaders, pastors and young people's leaders. At North Wilkesboro, Erlanger and Concord, 36 other churches of the 20 associations of the West Central Region were met. The main object of the tour was to stimulate interest in the Training Union work; to see that every association was completely organized, to help with problems and to bring inspiration. Delegations to the State Leadership Conference were planned and detailed instructions given to associational officers. Approximately 1,200 pastors, leaders and officers attended these meetings.

Local Church Engagements: Local church engagements have been emphasized. Many weeks have been given to this phase of the work. The object has been not only to strengthen the work of the local church, but to prepare it for leadership in doing extension work in the association.

REGULARLY SCHEDULED MEETINGS: The annual meeting of the State B. T. U. Convention Assembly was held at Ridgecrest, July 5-10. The attendance ran about a thousand, and those who registered numbered six hundred. The program consisted of a series of study courses, a Bible study hour, con-

ferences dealing with social justice, war and peace, home ideals, economics, and similar issues, inspirational messages, and supervised recreation in the afternoons. Great hours of consecration were experienced and hundreds of young people dedicated their lives to the service of the Lord.

Mr. Perry Morgan says: "It was one of the most deeply moving, most helpful assemblies I have ever attended."

Dr. C. J. Allen wrote: "The young people came away with a stronger conviction as to the reality of Christ, the urgency of His work, the supremacy of His church, and the sufficiency of His Spirit."

First Regional Conventions: The Regional Conventions held in the spring showed an increased attendance and set new high standards for better programs. The Eastern convention met in Goldsboro, the Southern at Rockingham, the Central at High Point, the West Central at Shelby, and the Western at Sylva. The average attendance at these meetings was about three hundred.

The Regional Conventions for 1937 are scheduled as follows: Eastern at Elizabeth City, March 12-13; Southern at Lumberton, March 19-20; Central at Burlington, March 26-27; West Central at Mount Airy, April 2-3; Western at Hendersonville, April 9-10.

A word of appreciation should be expressed here for the Regional presidents who work so faithfully and so earnestly the year round in promoting the interest of the Training Union work, traveling hundreds of miles at their own expense to speak in associational meetings, to teach study courses and to organize new unions. These gallant young men who serve as regional presidents are: Eastern, Rev. James Smith, Williamston; Southern, Mr. Truby Powell, Lillington; Central, Mr. James Morgan, Durham; West Central, Mr. Wyan Washburn, Shelby; Western, Rev. Nathan Brooks, Bryson City. With the very limited state force the work would have been terribly handicapped had it not been for the service rendered by these officers.

Associational Conventions: In the Baptist Training Union organization of the State there are 72 associations, two of these being Indian, Burnt Swamp and Cherokee. Sixty-one of this number have Baptist Training Union associational organizations which function in varying degrees. All have held annual conventions, a majority hold quarterly district meetings. In many of them the officers are endeavoring to reach every church with a training union, teaching study courses and setting up goals for enlargement and growth.

OFFICE: The most rigid economy has been practiced in the use of literature, stationery and postage, but at the same time we have sought not to weaken the effectiveness of our work. There has been much to do getting out necessary periodic material, and free literature mailed to new unions and others on request. Thousands of letters of personal correspondence have been sent. The Baptist Training Union page of the Biblical Recorder has been edited each week by the department.

THE YEAR'S RECORD: Owing to the fact that Training Union officers are usually reelected every six months and young people do not send lists of new officers, it is hard to keep an accurate record of unions in the state. The mailing list was revised very recently and unions from which we had received no reports for the past three or four years were dropped from the list. Therefore,

we make the following report, which may suggest a falling off in our work but which is not really the case:

We express the most earnest urge and burden of our heart in the desire that the time will soon come when the contributions to the Coöperative Program will increase to the extent that the Baptist Training Union Department of North Carolina may be equipped with a leadership adequate to meet our possibilities throughout the state.

3. DIVISION OF BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

Cleo Mitchell

"The development of student religious work in the South as well as throughout the nation," according to Frank H. Leavell, Executive Secretary of the Department of Southern Baptist Student Work, "is decidedly by the various denominations whereas in former decades inter-denominational leadership was largely responsible for the promotion of student religious work. We find today that the various denominations are promoting their own programs, putting into it an investment of money and life which was formerly unthought of. Within the past year there has been a gratifying activity on the part of State Mission Boards in establishing, for the promotion of Baptist Student Union Work in their states, a B. S. U. Department of State Mission activity." In North Carolina a department of Christian Education, of which student work is a part, has been established with W. Perry Crouch as Secretary. Two new Student Secretaries on local campuses have been placed—Miss Mildred Kichline at Meredith College, and Zon Robinson at Wake Forest College. The Student Secretary, or "Spiritual Coach," on the local campus is truly the arm of the church reaching the students and always linking them to Christ and His church. Our goal is such a coach on each campus in North Carolina.

In coöperation with the department of Southern Baptist Student Work, emphasis has been laid within our program in North Carolina on certain principles. We "approach the students through the churches in college centers, making the church the central unit of activity in and through which all possible religious activity is directed." Emphasis is laid on local church member-

ship and a normal church life while in college. In the denominational program we are seeking "to match the physical and intellectual development of students with a corresponding spiritual development." The Baptist Student Union, which serves as a connecting link between the church and the campus, is composed of the same unit organizations as found in the local church; namely, Sunday School, Baptist Training Union, and Young Woman's Auxiliary. On many campuses we find, for the promotion of spiritual development, students, who plan to do full time religious work, having regular meetings of that group for practical discussion and for inspiration. On our campuses where there is a B. S. U. we find prayer mates—two or more students—meeting daily for prayer that the will of God may be done in their lives, on the campus, and in the world. The Baptist student leaders of our colleges are sufficiently concerned about the religious conditions on the campus to come to college several days before the opening of the fall session to plan and pray definitely for the year's program. Such pre-session Council retreats are held where there is a B. S. U. In each year's program personal evangelism and training in all phases of Christian activity are included. In North Carolina we have Baptist Student Union organizations on fourteen campuses.

Last April the Baptist Student Union of Woman's College, Greensboro, was hostess to all the Baptist Student Union Councils in the state for a day of intensive training—and in September a state retreat of B. S. U. presidents and adult leaders was held for the first time in Raleigh. The entire denominational program was presented so that these interested leaders might promote such on the college campuses of North Carolina.

During the summer, there were functioning Baptist Student Unions on the campuses where summer sessions were held. In this way teachers became informed of the denominational program for college students and can interest high school seniors in such a program before they enter college; and regular college students are kept in close touch with the church during the summer months.

At Ridgecrest Southwide Student Retreat in June representatives from North Carolina colleges, to the extent of our assigned quota, found new zeal, instruction, and inspiration for advancing Kingdom work. In the five year program of the Sunday School Board, North Carolina students have gladly pledged their services. During the past summer scores of our choice, trained college youth served churches of our state by teaching study courses, conducting Vacation Bible Schools, helping in organizing training and missionary organizations and teaching Sunday school classes. This host of volunteer workers proved a decided asset to Kingdom work through our denominational agencies.

A dependable state B. S. U. organization has been maintained throughout the past several years. Al Martin, student at Wake Forest College, has served most efficiently during the past year. The annual convention held in Greensboro, October 23-25 set a new mark in student work in our state by placing emphasis in student living on seeking to know and live the keynote, "The Will of God."

At Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, we have more than four hundred Baptist and Baptist preference students this year. Already

half of them are actively enlisted in our church organizations. About a fourth have placed their letters in local Baptist churches and plans are under way for at least half to definitely pledge to missions and the support of the B. S. U. program on the campus. Daily personal evangelism is another goal for the year. Already one conversion and baptism have taken place among our group. The year's program comprises Student Sunday School Classes, B. T. U., Y. W. A., daily prayer meetings, study courses in each unit organization, Christian recreation, promotion of Foreign Mission and Home Mission Offerings, group discussion of present youth problems, and daily help to students in spiritual development.

To answer the quest of the thousands of our eager, earnest, Christian youth in North Carolina colleges, our denomination is seeking to give the highest and best in Christian training and development. The present and future will reveal the results of our program through the service of the Christian leadership being trained today.

126. 4. REPORT OF BAPTIST MEN'S CONVENTION COMMITTEE

R. N. Simms, *Chairman*

In 1935, it will be recalled, we had one general meeting for men in Greensboro. The attendance was around seven hundred. In 1936 there were provided nine regional meetings. The attendance at these meetings was in the neighborhood of two thousand. We feel that the program was unsurpassed, and while we were somewhat disappointed in the attendance upon these meetings, we feel that on the whole they were well worth while and resulted in getting a great, great number of our men to think more seriously upon matters pertaining to God's Kingdom.

As we look to 1937, we are inclined to favor a program which will provide for a great men's meeting in each association in the state, or as nearly that as possible. We would suggest that these meetings be held on Sunday in some church located near the center of the Association, and that an effort be made to reach hundreds of our men who cannot come to one central state meeting, or even a regional meeting. We have found that many of our men cannot possibly get away from their duties during the week and it is for this reason we are suggesting that these meetings for 1937 be held on Sunday. It is believed that in sixty meetings of this sort we can reach possibly 25,000 men.

We cannot speak with certainty, but plans are under way to provide for Laymen's Week on the Ridgecrest program. In the event this is worked out, we would urge hundreds of our men to avail themselves of this opportunity next summer. We would not allow ourselves to get away from the idea of a great state-wide meeting for our men, but in view of the prospect of a week at Ridgecrest we suggest the associational meetings instead of the one central state meeting. In other words, the week at Ridgecrest would provide an opportunity equivalent to the opportunity our men would have in a state-wide meeting.

We record again the faith we have in our men once they are brought to get a wider Kingdom vision. We do know that the great task ahead of us is to reach our men so that they will be led to release the power they now control for the support of every Kingdom interest.

127. B. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE COLLEGES

1. REPORT OF THE COLLEGES

(a.) WAKE FOREST COLLEGE

For the academic year 1935-1936 Wake Forest College reports: (1) An enrollment in the regular session of 995. (2) An enrollment in the combined units of the summer session of 981, an increase over last year. (3) Admission of the Law School to membership in The Association of American Law Schools, and approval of the Law School by the American Bar Association. (4) Alterations, excavation, additional structures, and improvement of the Gore Athletic Field and the street approaching it.

The internal organization of the College presents two rather definite achievements for the year:

1. The recognition of the growing demands upon instruction in the junior and senior classes. As a result of large numbers of junior college transfers the registration of courses in the last two years of the college has been increased. The departments have been very conscious of these demands and have modified their organization accordingly. This larger opportunity in the junior-Senior years is regarded favorably.

2. For the first time the enlargement of the physical plant has made possible definite organization of the departments of instruction around centralized offices as headquarters and adjacent classrooms for the use of each department. Each department is now located with definite conveniences. This unity is proving to be highly satisfactory to the departmental staffs as well as the convenience of students. This has been accomplished in some instances by assigning an entire building or entire floors or definite areas to the several departments.

Additions and replacements to the faculty for the ensuing year are as follows:

In medicine—Dr. R. P. Morehead and Dr. Herbert C. Tidwell; in English—Dr. Edgar E. Folk and Dr. Guy A. Cardwell; in physics—Dr. Sherwood Githens; in biology—Instructor Bruce Perry. Mr. Zon Robinson has been added as assistant to the chaplain and secretary of religious organizations.

(b.) MEREDITH COLLEGE

Up to date there have been enrolled for the session of 1936-1937, 528 students. Of these 35 are specials, 427 are boarders. The student body includes five daughters of ministers on the Foreign Field. There are 13 states represented. Students come from 72 counties of North Carolina.

After ten years of service in our office of Dean of Women, Miss Caroline Biggers resigned to accept a like position at Mars Hill College. The work of Miss Biggers was done with wonderful fidelity and efficiency and the students who came under her care will long remember her with unflinching affection. To fill the vacancy thus created Miss Mary Susan Steele was elected. Miss Steele is a graduate of Meredith, taught here for five years, holds the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from Cornell University, and was head of the English department of Judson College for ten years, being also academic dean for the last three years. She has taken up with real enthusiasm the duties of the office and we anticipate for her a highly successful administration.

Prof. Edgar H. Henderson succeeds Miss Florence Hoagland, resigned, as Professor of Philosophy and Psychology. Mr. Edgar H. Alden succeeds Miss Charlotte Armstrong, resigned, as Associate Professor of Violin. Miss Louise Lanham fills the vacancy made in the resignation of Miss Elizabeth Foster as Instructor in English. Mrs. H. A. List has been employed to carry on the work begun by Miss Hoagland in Oral English and Dramatics. Miss Mildred Kichline takes the place vacated by the resignation of Miss Marguerite Mason as Religious Secretary. Miss Lucile Johnson is beginning the work of Registrar as a separate office. Miss Lois Byrd is directing our News Bureau. Miss Virginia Branch returns as Instructor of Piano, after leave of absence for a year. All of these who have left us rendered excellent service and made great places for themselves in our life. Those who come bring the best of credentials and we give them hearty welcome.

There is a delightful spirit on the campus—enthusiastic and coöperative.

(c.) CHOWAN COLLEGE

At the close of the school year 1935-36 Chowan College was facing the absolute necessity of entering into a program of improvement and expansion. Such a program was demanded in order to do efficient work, to meet the needs of the youth of northeastern North Carolina, and to meet the accepted standards of schools and colleges.

The enrollment on October 15, 1936, was 113, approximately the same that it was one year ago. This enrollment has been maintained in spite of the fact that Chowan College changed its financial policy to the effect that financial inducement is not offered to any student to attend college, with the exception of a sixty-five-dollar valedictorial scholarship. Students are required to pay their expenses in advance. No student gets in debt to the College.

The faculty of Chowan College has been increased and strengthened. Dr. Athey G. Gillaspie, who holds the Ph.D. degree from Duke University, has succeeded Miss Sara K. Liggett as head of the department of science. Dr. George W. F. Stripling, who holds the Ph.D. degree from the University of Illinois, has succeeded Miss Sara E. Martin as head of the department of modern foreign languages. The following additions have been made to the faculty: Mr. London A. Sanders, who holds the M.S. degree from the University of Tennessee, and who has had advanced training in commercial work, has been secured as commercial teacher. Mr. Ray Frank Fehrman, who holds the M.A. degree from the University of Kentucky, has become the assistant in the departments of science and history. Miss Sara Ann Bruce, graduate of Coker College, who has done considerable advanced work in physical education, has been secured as physical education director. Miss Dorothy Evans, who holds the B.S. degree from the School of Library Science of Simmons College, Boston, Massachusetts, has been secured as librarian. Miss Carolynne Gay, who holds the B.A. degree with a major in home economics and science from Blue Mountain College, Mississippi, has been secured as dietitian.

Improvements have been made in equipment. The library has been rearranged and is being brought up to date. The kitchen has been renovated and new equipment secured. The main building has been rewired, many rooms renovated, and other repairs made on buildings. Definite progress is being

made in the College's campaign to secure improved and larger equipment. It is expected that the College shall, within three years' time, be equipped to take care of a student body of 275, and that it shall ultimately be equipped to accommodate a student body of 300 to 350.

(d.) MARS HILL COLLEGE

Enrollment: The present enrollment, October 1, 1936, is 615—565 college students, 40 academy, and 10 special department students. These come from 80 North Carolina counties and from 25 states and foreign countries. Every county west of Raleigh except two are represented. There are 39 ministerial students.

Workers: Two new members of our staff add strength to our group—Miss Carolyn Biggers becoming Dean of Women, a position similar to the one held at Meredith for the past eleven years, and Mr. Fred Dickerson, who has been coach at Lees-McRae for three years coming as assistant coach and teacher in the academy. Miss Ella J. Pierce has won the Ph.D. degree from Cornell and returns to her place in the English department. Mr. J. B. Huff, who was out most of last year on account of illness, is again at his post. For many years now there have been few changes in our teaching force. Seventeen of our teachers live in homes of their own.

Needs: The College has outgrown its quarters. There is imperative need of a modern science building, a fire-proof dormitory to care for a hundred young women, and a dining room large enough to accommodate our group at one sitting. It is hoped to have one of these under way before the session closes.

Summer Meetings: The Mars Hill division of the Wake Forest-Meredith summer school lasts nine weeks and reaches more than 300 students. The School for Ministers though lasting only a week reaches more than a hundred pastors, and the Retreat conducted by Dr. W. N. Johnson has for ten years helped scores of ministers.

(e.) CAMPBELL COLLEGE

This year marks the close of a half-century of notable achievements. From a community school opening with twenty-one students on January 5, 1887, in a one-room building, the institution has grown into a junior college of wide reputation, known especially for its loyalty to fundamental Christian principles. In material equipment it has now a thirty-two-acre campus with eleven buildings, valued at \$425,000, approximately. On October 15 we have 426 high school and college students, or approximately sixty more than last year on the same date. All standing indebtedness against the institution, save a small balance due by the Convention on the purchase price, has been paid and current bills are met promptly. With a rich heritage in equipment and friends, and with an enviable reputation for providing well-rounded educational advantages, the administration faces the second half-century confidently. For many evidences of the full coöperation and moral support of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention and Secretary Huggins, we are deeply grateful.

Outstanding developments during the past Convention year includes:

(1.) New Department of Home Economics. This is one step in a program of vocational training to meet the needs of our constituency, largely ru-

ral, for a fuller life. Registration in this department for the first year numbers forty.

(2.) Campaign for \$250,000 as Golden Jubilee Foundation for Endowment and Expansion, celebrating fiftieth anniversary.

(3.) Religious emphasis. A major objective for the year is to direct students in a re-study of Christian principles as applicable to campus activities and subsequent life.

(4.) New Teachers: Miss Mary Eliason, M.A., University of North Carolina, replacing Miss Evelyn Snider, on leave of absence; Miss Elma Black, M.A., Duke University, replacing Mrs. L. B. Reavis; Miss Amanda K. Martin, B.A., and graduate student of University of Tennessee, Home Economics; Mr. Falk Johnson, M.A., Wake Forest, teacher of English, replacing Mr. Zon Robinson; Rev. Norfleet Gardner, M.A., Th.M., Bible, replacing J. F. Blackmon, resigned. B. P. Marshbanks, formerly Dean, has been made Business Manager; Mr. R. L. Poplin succeeds Mr. Marshbanks as Dean.

3. OUR DEBTS

We are again grateful that we can report a substantial reduction in our educational debts. In 1935 we reduced the principal indebtedness by \$38,000. It is expected that we shall reduce the debt in 1936 in the amount of about \$50,000. We do not give here a full report as the auditor's account of the Debt Service Fund for the calendar year 1936 will appear in the Minutes of the Convention when they are printed.

On December 1, 1936 the Convention will owe about \$800,000. This is huge, but it will be recalled that at one time the debt was nearly \$1,200,000; and in 1932 and 1933, at the depth of the depression, the debt was about \$950,000.

We are happy to report also that steps have been taken and progress has been made toward a rearrangement, or refinancing, of our indebtedness so as to secure a lower rate of interest. We believe that this Convention should authorize and instruct the General Board and the Trustees of Meredith College to do all things that may be necessary to refinance our indebtedness so as to provide for a lower interest rate and to work out a plan of yearly payments so that all institutions and agencies may share in the program. We must not forget our obligations to our creditors, but at the same time we must not forget our obligations to the present generation.

Under two or three later Annuity Plans, seventeen, including missionaries, are now receiving pensions through the Relief Board.

The above tabulation gives practically all necessary information as to the Board's relief work in the State and a few items with regard to its annuity operation.

For the whole South, the Board aided last year 1,065 ministers and widows together with about 150 children. As usual, our State received from the Board more than it contributed. The average allocation for a whole year amounted to—guess what? Around \$70.00; not a month, but a whole year. And who are these men and women receiving this pitiful dole? They were all set apart according to what Baptists regard as the Scriptural plan namely, under the authority of Baptist churches to preach the Gospel and serve those churches.

Are they all worthy of assistance? Maybe not, but before any applicant is taken on for relief he must answer and sign on a printed form 38 questions on every conceivable fact bearing on the applicant's worthiness. Similar questions are sent to the widows.

This blank when properly filled out, must be signed by the applicant and his pastor, and then by the Executive Committee of the applicant's Association. Finally, if the present writer is not satisfied, he endeavors to investigate doubtful points by private inquiry. He is grateful to report that in all his years of connection with the Board he has found among the hundreds of applicants only two doubtful characters.

From whence does money thus allocated come? From the Coöperative Program came last year \$42,377.89 from the entire Southern Baptist Convention, which alone would have averaged about \$40.00 per applicant. But this sum was augmented by \$17,678.69 from special designations, and \$5,917.16 from the earnings of small invested funds in six of these states. The balance came from the Relief Board's Relief Endowment and Reserve Fund, which amounts to \$7,512.13, making a total of \$73,485.87 for all the needy veterans and their widows in the South. This amount, I am told, shows that Southern Baptists contribute per capita *yearly* and not monthly, two cents apiece, one postage stamp, for the care of their aged preachers.

But you must not think that our leaders are satisfied with such a showing or that they are making no steps to improve it. After years of disjointed unorganized efforts in the several states individually the Southern Baptist Convention in 1918 organized a General Relief and Annuity Board, which during its seventeen years of service has paid out in Relief and Annuity to our veterans \$2,656,000.82, and meanwhile accumulated total holdings of \$4,212,678.89. But of this sum only \$448,559.64 is available from its earnings for direct relief purposes. So discovering several years ago that the funds available for relief from all existing sources were wholly inadequate, yielding only \$70.00 a year for an average allocation, our vigorous, virile and aggressive Secretary, Tom Watts, began to devise plans to increase the pittance now given.

First were the two Annuity Plans, now known as the "Old" and the "New," whereby under the former ministers could be relieved from infirmities at the age of 68 and receive \$500.00 a year, and their widows \$300.00. Then came the second, the "New Annuity Plan" under which the age of retirement was reduced to 65, the general benefits, as I recall, being about the same. Under both these plans the minister unaided was to bear his share in creating the annuity which with prevailing salaries few pastors were able to do, although fifty-two pastors and widows are now annuitant in our state under those plans and are receiving yearly a total of \$22,000.00. So the Board has devised several other plans only two of which—the most practical and promising to my mind and apparently to Dr. Watts—I mention here. These are called the "Two Contributory Plans."

Under the former, called the "Service Annuity Plan," the pastor contributes 2½ per cent of his salary and the church 8 per cent. This plan, Dr. Watts says, the pastors seem ready to accept but the churches have been very slow to undertake the 8 per cent of salary required. However, the plan is being pressed and is in operation. In fact, a small membership has been enrolled on a completely funded and actuarially sound basis with a small surplus. This

amounted, December 31, 1935 to \$49,209.59. This plan depends on age, length of service and salaries received, so that young men could not hope for full annuity at once and older men could not hope to receive much from it.

The second of these plans, called the "Age Security Plan," which also involves the coöperation of the pastor and the church, requires that the pastor contribute 3 per cent of his salary and the church 3 per cent. Though the other plan is preferable of course to pastors, the second, says Watts, "will do better for our employees and their families." It is really a modified form of the Service Annuity and in some respects is complementary to the Federal Contributory Plan.

It promises more than the latter in these respects: it provides for widow's pensions; for orphans and for permanent and total disability; and under it the annuitant has the privilege of withdrawal of individual dues, none of which promises are made by the government.

It is earnestly hoped that all our pastors and as many of the laymen as have opportunity will study the details of these plans as they appear on pages 223 and 224 of the minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention for 1936.

There is space here to refer to only one other plan now under operation, that of the Gift Annuity, which is open to everybody. The proposed annuitant may turn over to the Board any amount, not as a gift but as a purchase price of an annuity, the Board to pay an agreed annual income to the annuitant and keep the gift after his death. This is a sort of investment which has two excellent points: first, the donor's gift is aiding the denomination while he lives; and second, it pays a larger annuity than any other safe investment known to the writer. This the Board is able to do because it doesn't have to pay taxes on such funds.

The Board is devoting much attention to plans for annuities to orphanage workers, and is considering a workable plan for pensioning workers in all denominational institutions.

133. B. REPORT OF BAPTIST ORPHANAGE OF NORTH CAROLINA

I. G. Greer, *General Superintendent*

Again we come to you to render an account of our stewardship. We will do this in a brief report of the year's work rather than in an extended discussion of child welfare.

We have had another good year. Not one of your large family of adopted children has been taken by death. During the past five years you have ministered to 1,025 children in your immediate family without the loss of a single child. Surely this unparalleled record should cause us to pause and lift our hearts in gratitude to the Great Physician. Your staff of workers, composed of consecrated men and women, have worked together with Him in safeguarding the health and lives of these children. They have had the advantage of the combined effort of medical science and love coöperating in their behalf. This has cost money, but there is not a Baptist in the state who loves the Giver of life and humanity that would change the record.

While we are grateful for the preservation of the lives of the children, the Father did call home one of our efficient workers, Mr. T. H. Hilliard, who for 27 years had looked after the water and lights of the Mills Home.

We report with deep sorrow the passing of one of our most loyal and helpful trustees, Mrs. H. B. Moore, of Gastonia. This Convention never appointed a trustee who rendered a more unselfish and valuable service than Mrs. Moore gave to the Orphanage which she loved.

Let me pause here to pay tribute to my fellow workers. Never has any one been surrounded by a more loyal and coöperative group of men and women. During my four years' connection with the institution there has never been the least discord to mar the harmony of the work which is our common task. All have proven themselves both ready and willing to sacrifice any personal ambitions or views in the interest of the child in the midst.

Our farms have yielded a bountiful harvest this year. These crops, supplemented by the generous gifts of produce from our friends will reduce the usual large outlay of money for these products.

Your children have educational advantages equal to any in the state. We are offering courses in music, business, home economics and vocational training that will enable them to succeed after they have left the home that you are providing for them. At the present time 22 of your boys and girls are in college, making good.

The religious life of the Orphanage centers in and radiates from two well organized churches, one at Mills Home and one at Kennedy Home. The entire support of these churches comes from the membership which is made up exclusively of the workers and children on the grounds. Last year these churches gave nearly twice as much to outside objects as they did for local support. The pastors had the privilege of baptizing 146 children.

North Carolina Baptists should honor the memory of those master builders in Orphanage work who inaugurated and defended the wise financial policy that we have pursued throughout the years. The once-a-month offerings in the Sunday schools, supplemented by gifts of produce and the Thanksgiving offerings in the churches, has enabled you to care for more children than the Baptists of any other Southern state. This policy has also made it possible for you to accumulate property now valued at approximately one and a half million dollars, without a cent of indebtedness except current bills which we hope to pay out of the Thanksgiving offering. A policy that has worked so well should not be invaded nor abandoned. The fact that once a month the giver has the opportunity of contributing directly to the orphan child has not only made possible the financial support of the Orphanage, but it has kept alive the spirit of giving in the hearts of our people, and stimulated them to support other objects as well. As a denomination we should not permit any financial policy to obscure the child.

Our thoughts are now beginning to turn towards the Thanksgiving season. It has been necessary to spend heavily this year in order to strengthen the physical equipment of your institution. A great Thanksgiving offering has never been needed more than it is needed now. Through me more than seven hundred children offer you the privilege of enriching your spiritual lives. You will, I am sure, accept the challenge, as you have always done, in the name of Him who said: "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

C. NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITALS, INC.

Smith Hagaman, *Superintendent*

Profoundly grateful to Almighty God and to its multitudes of friends, the Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem is now closing its greatest year of service to sick and distressed humanity.

During this Convention Year 4,000 patients have entered for treatment—the largest number in any year of its history. We have now reached the limit of its capacity. We estimate that we would have had a thousand more patients this year if we had had room. Of this total number treated 1,800 were part pay and free service, that is to say about 45% of patient days were free. These patients have come from practically every section of the State.

At least 3,000 children have been gladdened this year by the return of the 1,000 Mothers who have been cared for in our hospital. When we take into consideration the fact that each patient is in most instances but one of a family, then we have directly ministered to 20,000 people, and the further estimate that at least fifty kinsmen or neighbors have been anxiously interested in the recovery of each patient: we conclude that the hospital has in a very vital way touched the lives of at least 200,000 people this year.

During the year some changes were made in the personnel of our Staff—Miss Beatrice O'Dell is now instructress in our School of Nurses. Miss Edna Heinzerling, who was Superintendent of Nurses during almost the entire life of the Hospital, was on account of her health forced to resign, and Miss Ruth Council was secured to take her place.

We have enrolled in our Nurses Training School 32, and the Hospital has a staff of 66 well trained doctors and surgeons.

During the first ten months of the calendar year we have received from the Coöperative Program \$7,084.20. This was applied to the bonded debt of the Hospital. We have received from the Duke Endowment \$14,218.00, and from Mother's Day Offerings \$12,125.02, and still due us from Raleigh from Mother's Day Offering \$6,000.00. (A more complete report of receipts and disbursements will be given at the close of the fiscal year when audit is made.)

We are pleased to report receipts of quantities of hospital linens furnished by the W. M. U.'s and other church organizations.

During the year we have been able to refinance our bonded debt, thereby saving \$2,500.00, and a further saving by securing a lower rate of interest. We have further been able through favorable consideration of friends to reduce local indebtedness in the amount of \$13,000. In addition to the above we paid on bonds and street assessments \$9,276.00 thereby reducing the hospital indebtedness this year in the amount of \$24,776.

We have added this year \$2,000.00 worth of new equipment.

As this report indicates, the hospital is in need of additional patient and other space. We are encouraged to believe that we shall have this in the near future, and without expense to the denomination. Sick people cannot be placed on a "waiting list."

Our Mother's Day offering is largely the hope of our sick who are unable to pay for treatment. We trust that we shall have an enlarged service by our W. M. U.'s and other organizations in supplying hospital linen.

VI. CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

A. DIVISION OF RECEIPTS

As stated elsewhere in this report, the undesignated money of the Coöperative Program is divided sixty per cent for state objects and forty per cent for southwide objects. We have been earnestly hoping that our income would increase to the point whereby we could divide fifty-fifty. At the moment we do not see that we can make any change in this sixty-forty division of funds for 1937. Certain negotiations, however, are now pending which may make it possible for us to increase the southwide share of the Coöperative Program receipts from forty to possibly forty-three or forty-four per cent. In December when the General Board meets to plan the work for next year, we shall be able to see further than we can now see. With this in mind we think it would be wise for the Convention to instruct the Board to raise the percentage from forty to forty-three or forty-four if at all possible.

We must bear in mind, however, that other objects in the Coöperative Program,—all save Debt Service—receive during the year substantial designations. In 1935 the several objects received special designations as follows:

State Missions	\$28,435.37

These designated amounts were sent to the several objects *in addition* to their per cent of the undesignated money.

B. PROMOTION PLANS

We are now in the midst of the most intensive effort we have made in years to promote the every member enrollment and canvass of our membership. From the mountains to the sea for the past few months we have sounded out the challenge, "A Stewardship Revival in Every Baptist Church in North Carolina." We have hoped that with all our efforts there would be at least one thousand of these revivals held. The blue print of the plan contemplates the assembling of the church together for a week of study and meditation on the great themes of discipleship, stewardship and missions. We believe now that these revivals will be held in more than a thousand churches. We have kept away from the use of the term, "Mission Schools," inasmuch as that term fails to convey the complete idea which we have had in mind. We cannot get our people to go very far in the support of missions and other objects until they have made a committal of themselves as disciples and stewards. Moreover, we have urged the adoption not only of a worthy budget for the Coöperative Program objects but also an enlarged program for the local church. We do this because it is our conviction that at the present time fully seventy per cent of our pastors, particularly those in the rural churches, are not receiving an income sufficient to keep them fit for kingdom service.

We have tried to sound out the challenge all over North Carolina this fall that the time has come for a great advance. By a great advance we mean an advance of at least 25 per cent. We know that prosperity has returned to North Carolina and that our people can do this if they will. Moreover, we have

tried to keep certain definite objectives before the churches. We repeat the objectives here:

1. A Stewardship Revival in each church sometime during the fall months.
2. The purpose of this revival must be to lead all the members into vital touch with the living, reigning Jesus, and then to lead them to make a committal of themselves to Him as Disciples and Stewards.
3. These Disciples and Stewards must be brought to the point where EACH one of them on EACH Lord's Day will make a worthy offering—and do it as an act of worship—through the Coöperative Program, thus having a share in the support of EACH and all objects which Baptists cherish.
4. These Disciples and Stewards must be led to tithe their income. At least let one objective be this, certainly as a starting point.

"At least a Tithe from at least a Tithe of our resident church membership."

In preparation for these Stewardship Revivals we have prepared certain material which we know is being widely used, (1) A booklet, "Baptist Working Together," revised and prepared by the General Secretary; (2) A chart for use in the churches; (3) A tract for use in preparation for the every member enrollment with the title, "My Church and I, What Are We For?"; An enrollment card which challenges each church member to set for himself a program of spiritual living and scriptural giving. We know if churches will use this material correctly, and if they will major upon discipleship and stewardship and a worthy program, that our people will respond in far greater measure than they have been doing.

It will be recalled that the Convention some years ago created a committee composed of one member from each association, known as the Committee on Promotion and Enlistment. In June of this year this committee had a very enthusiastic meeting in Thomasville, covering a two day period and with members present from about fifty associations. At this meeting the promotion plans, to which we referred above, were thoroughly discussed and adopted. Without going into detail we give here a resolution adopted by this committee, and which is now passed on to the Convention for its action. The resolution follows:

WHEREAS our State Secretary finds it most difficult for him, his associates, and representatives of the Convention's institutions, to meet with the associations in annual meeting as they are now scheduled to be held, and WHEREAS we believe it will be most helpful to the work of our State Convention if certain associations would change their annual meetings from October to August and September and WHEREAS such a change would be economical both in time and money. THEREFORE be it resolved, that we the State Promotion Committee in meeting assembled on this the 10th day of July 1936, at Thomasville, North Carolina, do memorialize the Baptist State Convention to request the associations to do adjust the time of the annual meeting as to conform to a schedule to be worked out by our State Secretary which will assure our State Workers an opportunity of attending a larger number of the annual meetings of our associations in the state.

At the meeting of the Board in June further steps were taken to provide for an intensive effort this fall in an effort to arouse our people to have a share in all the program. The plans adopted and carried out provided for a division

of the state into five regions. To these regions the general missionaries, M. O. Alexander, J. C. Pipes and Charles H. Dickey, together with Mr. Crouch, the newly appointed Secretary of Christian Education, were assigned. Moreover, the Executive Committee invited Mr. Hugh Johnson, a layman of Raleigh, to work in one of the districts during the fall months. These brethren have labored unceasingly in the associations and in the churches to provide for and hold Stewardship Revivals.

Thus we have undertaken an intensive and far-reaching program. We believe it is going to prove eminently successful.

We call attention again to the fact that the Coöperative Program, broadly conceived, contemplates not only the giving of undesignated money, but provides also for special days on which offerings are made for special objects. It is true that money given on these special days goes to the object specified, but at the same time these special days are observed as a part of our general Coöperative Program plan. These special days follow:

Home and Foreign Missions—Some Sunday in March.

Hospital—Mother's Day.

Christian Education—Some Sunday in June.

Old Ministers' Relief—Some Sunday in August.

State Missions—Last Sunday in October.

Orphanage—Thanksgiving.

These days should be observed in all our churches, and the appeal should be made (1) to those who have made a subscription and who are contributing systematically. These should not be pressed, but merely asked to make an offering, and "over and above," if their hearts prompt them. But what of the sixty to eighty per cent of our members who make no pledge at all and contribute with no regularity? Even in our most progressive churches there is a group of twenty-five to fifty per cent of the membership who make no subscriptions. How are they to be reached for our Mission objects unless these Special Days are observed? It is, therefore, suggested that after the Canvass or Enrollment is completed a list of those members who will not make a subscription be made. We suggest the formation in each church of a Missions or Coöperative Program Committee composed of the following: Chairman, the Superintendent of the Sunday school; other members to include the chairman of the board of deacons, the president of the W. M. S., the president of the B. T. U., and the presidents and teachers of the larger classes in the Sunday school. The names of those who made no subscription, or who contribute irregularly, should be divided among the members of this committee. Then when the special days come each member who has not subscribed should be challenged to do something for each of these objects.

We must undertake a goal next year of at least \$500,000 for Coöperative Program objects, plus \$150,000 for the Orphanage. Surely we are well able to do this. For each of the years 1920-1924 inclusive about 300,000 Baptists in North Carolina gave nearly a million dollars each year. Surely with 450,000 Baptists now we ought not to undertake anything less than this goal of \$650,000. We can do it if we will. It is largely a question of providing a real Stewardship Revival in each church and making an honest effort to place a straightforward challenge on the heart of each and every church member.

137. **VII. REPORT OF THE BAPTIST BOOK STORE**

(Owned jointly by the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn.,
and the North Carolina Baptist State Convention)

Net sales for the year ending December 31, 1935 amounted to \$40,471.51 with a net profit of \$4,355.21.

The amount paid out to the two boards owning the Book Store in dividends during the year amounted to \$2,818.54, one-half of this amount having been paid to each board.

It may be seen from this that the Book Store is operating on a paying basis. The total net worth at December 31, 1935 was \$15,633.32, with no unpaid bills. During the eleven years under the present partnership a total profit of \$27,305.92 has been paid out to both boards. One-half of this amount, \$13,652.96, has been paid the North Carolina Board, which means that the Book Store is a distinct asset and a denominational investment.

The Book Store handles all supplies for every department of the church, as well as a complete line of general and religious books, song books, and Bibles. By means of the catalogues at our disposal, we can secure any book in print.

It is our desire to serve North Carolina Baptists promptly and efficiently, and we covet your continued patronage and support.

VIII. REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Commission is glad to report that there are many evidences of an increasing interest in matters of Baptist history in the State. Many churches are celebrating their centennial anniversaries which are made occasions for papers on the history of the churches; these are often prepared with much care and are valuable contributions to our history.

Important additions continue to be made to the "North Carolina Baptist Collection" in the library of Wake Forest College, which has now become one of the largest and most valuable libraries of Baptist books, documents and records in the world. During the past year 3,247 volumes were contributed to the Collection; of these 627 were donated by Mrs. W. C. Tyree of Oxford, N. C., from the library of her lamented husband, and 987 volumes were donated by the family of the late Dr. Len G. Broughton from his collection, part of which was acquired during his pastorate in London and comprises many rare and valuable books.

It should also be mentioned that to the Collection there have recently been added the books and pamphlets on the history of our own and other denominations from the library of the late Judge T. M. Pittman, part of it, in accord with the desire of her husband, by donation from Mrs. Pittman. Judge Pittman had spent a life time of devoted and sacrificial labor in making this collection, which was probably the most valuable private library on Baptist history ever assembled.

Scholars and others interested in our Baptist history are making larger use from year to year of our Collection. Its importance is indicated by the fact that by request a duplicate card catalogue of it has been placed in the Library of the University of North Carolina.

Your Commission would again urge upon the churches and their clerks and pastors the importance of collecting and depositing their church record books and documents and published articles and letters in the Collection in the Wake Forest College Library where they will be carefully preserved in a fireproof building and in steel cabinets, catalogues and made readily available for the use of members of the churches and all others who may be interested in our history. In this way they could preserve these same records which are now in constant danger of loss from fire, vermin and lack of proper care, and which cannot often be found when needed. Clerks of Associations are also urged to send to the Collection copies of their minutes year by year. Those who write sketches of churches also should send copies. These and other donations to the Collection should be sent to the Wake Forest College Library, care of Mrs. C. C. Crittenden, Librarian.

139. IX. NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation on October 1, 1936, was administering trusts as enumerated below in the aggregate amount of \$133,829.88, a decrease from the sum reported for the previous year of \$185.83. This is partly accounted for by the fact that the report for this year covers only eleven months, and shows a decrease in income received, and therefore of cash income on hand, and otherwise by slight changes due to changes in the investments.

It will be noted from the above list that total income was received and distributed to beneficiaries in the amount of \$4,479.53, which represents a net

return after all expenses of administration of slightly less than 4.3% on the value of income producing assets.

As shown on the statement of assets, there is on hand as of the date of the financial report, \$471.59 uninvested cash principal and \$1,465.68 cash income balance not yet distributed to beneficiaries.

The last annual Convention authorized the enlargement of the Board of Directors, from five to fifteen members, and elected new members to these positions. One meeting of the whole Board was held in Raleigh on January 9, 1936, with six members present. At this meeting, the By-Laws were amended to provide for an executive committee of five members, and elected Dr. Z. M. Caveness, Chairman, Dr. J. L. Peacock, Mr. J. D. Wilkins, Reverend A. J. Smith, and T. S. Johnson to that committee.

The executive committee has held several meetings through the year, as required for the handling of routine matters in connection with the administration of these trusts. The members of this committee have given careful attention to their duties.

It is a matter of very great regret that Dr. Z. M. Caveness, who has been a Director of the Foundation since its establishment and its Chairman for many years, finds it necessary to withdraw his name as a candidate for reelection to the Board. His long and faithful service has brought his fine business ability to the service of this important trust, and especially, through the years of the economic depression, he has meant very much to the progress of the work. He richly deserves the sincere thanks of the entire denomination for his fine example of unselfish service. His place will be difficult to fill.

The Board of Directors of the Foundation will convene on Saturday, October 24, 1936, for the regular annual meeting.

From year to year, at the close of this report, the Secretaries and the various Boards of Directors have repeatedly urged upon the Convention, and upon the Baptists of the whole State, the great possibilities for service which may be realized through the means of the Foundation. At the risk of vain repetition, we dare again to assert that the Baptists of North Carolina should conduct a vigorous and continuous campaign to direct the attention of possible donors to the services available and the advantages that undoubtedly accrue to the denominational interests through the agency of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation.

Sixteen years of service proves that through this means trusts will be safely and wisely administered, investments and funds will be faithfully handled, a reasonably high rate of return be secured, and regular incomes made available to the beneficiaries. Small trusts as well as large ones will be given equal attention, and, together with others, make an aggregate contribution to denominational activities, which will be most effective.

One person, properly qualified, could in a few years secure additional bequests and gifts, the return from which would soon repay the incident expense.

We repeat, the Convention should adopt and carry through an aggressive support of the Foundation work.

XI. RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the division of undesignated funds as between State and Southwide objects be left to the decision of the General Board when it meets in December, with, however the instruction to the Board to increase the percentage to Southwide funds if it is at all possible to do so; that the General Board be asked to divide the per cent allocated for State objects so as to properly safeguard our debt funding commitments and at the same time conserve and promote in the best manner possible all our work.

2. That the Convention authorize the continuance of the work with our Negro brethren which has been so auspiciously begun.

3. That the Convention authorize the continuance of the work among the Indians, and if possible inaugurate some work which we may call "A Ministry to the prisoners, whether in prison or on parole."

4. That the Convention authorize the continuance of the work of the general missionaries, now being so ably done by M. O. Alexander and J. C. Pipes.

5. That the work now being done at Oteen, Samarcand and Sanatorium be continued; and that with reference to the work at Oteen we ask the other states of the Southern Convention, from which veterans come to the hospital at Oteen, to continue their coöperation in the support of Wayne Williams as our missionary there.

*6. On December 31, 1936 the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina will owe bonds and other indebtedness in the amount of about \$800,000. Of this total amount the bonded indebtedness, about \$745,000, is represented by serial and sinking fund bonds and notes.

As now financed our minimum debt requirements for the next five years are as follows: 1937, \$98,405; 1938, \$104,567; 1939, \$88,516; 1940, \$86,588; 1941, \$79,540.

The Board believes we could easily meet this schedule of debt payments. However, all the indebtedness carries an interest rate of 6% save two notes held by the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company which bear 5%.

For some months past we have been negotiating in an effort (1) to secure a lower rate of interest and (2) to arrange our debt payments, if possible, so that we can meet our commitments without serious difficulty and at the same time include in our program those institutions which are now receiving nothing.

This Board now comes with the proposal that the Convention authorize and instruct the General Board to proceed with the refinancing or rearrangement of our outstanding indebtedness. The proposal which we present provides for a loan from the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company of \$350,000, payable over a five year period, with an interest rate of 4%, with the principal payable through said period of five years as follows: 1937, \$60,000; 1938, \$65,000; 1939, \$70,000; 1940, \$75,000; 1941, \$80,000.

The proposal further provides that the Convention borrow \$450,000 from the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company, or some other source, at an interest rate not to exceed 5% per annum, payable over a period not to exceed fifteen years, with interest only to be paid during the first five year period, and while the loan to the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company is being repaid.

* Convention resolution of authorization adopted. (See page 41, section 91).

At the end of this five year period, and during the subsequent ten year period, the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company loan, or the loan from other source, may be called at such rate as may be agreed upon between the Executive Committee of the General Board and such corporation.

The proposal provides further that the Trustees of Meredith College give to the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company, or such other loaning corporation, a mortgage or deed of trust on the physical property of Meredith College to secure the loan.

The proceeds from these two loans will enable the Convention to call all outstanding 6% bonds, notes and other indebtedness of the Convention and at the same time cancel the present mortgage on Meredith College.

It is proposed that in the new arrangement the annual payments will be so arranged that they can be easily met out of Co-operative Program funds; further that the loans shall be made with the understanding that they are callable at such rate as may be agreed upon after giving of sufficient notice by the Convention, said notice not to exceed six months.

We recommend that the Convention adopt this report, and in so doing adopt a resolution authorizing and instructing the General Board and the Trustees of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina to do all things necessary to perfect the arrangements outlined above, and also authorize and instruct the Trustees of Meredith College to give mortgage on the property of the college as outlined in the foregoing paragraph; in addition that the General Board be instructed to allocate and appropriate from the receipts and expected receipts on January 1 of each year a sum sufficient to pay all interest and principal on these loans falling due for the current year; that for the prompt payment of principal and interest the Convention pledge to its creditors that all sums thus allocated and appropriated constitute and enjoy a first claim on all revenues received or to be received by the Convention, excepting only incomes and revenues designated for other special purposes."

7. Whereas Calvary Baptist Church at Raleigh, North Carolina, now has a membership of 146, is in a vigorous and growing condition, and is strategically located near the new city auditorium at a place which should be maintained for church purposes by the Baptists; and,

Whereas, the new Calvary Baptist Church organization has taken over and is now occupying the property formerly owned and occupied by Southside Baptist Church; and,

Whereas this property is encumbered for approximately \$24,000 indebtedness due the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company; and

Whereas the church anticipates that it will be able to obtain a refinancing arrangement whereby the principal indebtedness will be reduced to \$15,000 to be retired at the rate of \$500 annually for the first five years, and \$1,000 annually for the next five years, said indebtedness to bear interest at six per cent per annum or less, and

Whereas the church anticipates that it will be able to pay the principal installments as the same mature, but will not be able to pay and discharge the interest payments, and have requested the State Board to make interest payments during the said ten year period; and

Whereas the said church will not be able to effect such refinancing without the coöperation of the General Board, and

Whereas, in the opinion of the General Board the payment of the interest charges as aforesaid during the ten years, will be a wise and proper expendi-

ture in the interest of State Missions, and can be made out of the current annual revenues of the Board or Convention available for State Mission purposes;

Now, therefore, the General Board recommends that the State Convention authorize the payment out of its current annual revenues the interest charges accruing on said \$15,000 new loan for Calvary Baptist Church as above described in the principal sum of \$15,000, upon compliance with the conditions above set forth, said interest charges not to exceed \$900 per annum.

Provided, however, that Calvary Baptist Church agree to repay the State Mission Board whatever sum may have been expended on said loan in the event the church cannot successfully operate and has to be liquidated and sold.

8. That we set our goal for 1937 at \$500,000 for the Coöperative Program including both designated and undesignated funds; that we set our goal for the Orphanage at \$150,000; and that we ask the coöperation of all the churches, together with all their agencies, and all the associations as we attempt to reach this objective.

141. REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The year 1936 has been memorable in our Woman's Missionary Union history because of the Anniversaries that we have observed.

First, and very important to our constituency was the Fiftieth Anniversary commemorating the organization of our Union in Raleigh on January 6, 1886. This anniversary was an important feature of the program of our Annual meeting held in Raleigh, March 10-12. We were fortunate indeed to have with us on this memorable occasion Mrs. W. J. Cox, Treasurer of Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to Southern Baptist Convention; Miss Kathleen Mallory, Corresponding Secretary of our Southern Union; Dr. John L. Hill, Editor of Home and Foreign Fields, Nashville, Tennessee; Miss Blanche Sydner White, Corresponding Secretary W. M. U. of Virginia; Dr. Charles E. Maddry, Corresponding Secretary Foreign Mission Board, Richmond; and five foreign missionaries—Dr. H. H. McMillan, Soochow, China; Miss Alda Grayson, Laichow Fu, China; Miss Katie Murray, Chengchow, China; Miss Naomi Schell, Tobata, Japan; and Miss Lucy Wright, Hwanghsien, China.

The Fiftieth Anniversary of our organized work marked also fifty years of active service of our beloved Mrs. Wesley N. Jones. Since she refused reëlection she was made President Emeritus for life and we still rejoice in her guidance.

All through the year, the Fiftieth Anniversary of the organization of the Sunbeam societies was featured, particularly on the program of our young people. An increase in the number of Sunbeam Societies was noted and a worthy gift to kindergarten work in Soochow, China, was taken as a special objective for the year.

The Henrietta Hall Shuck Centennial was widely observed in our State. Mrs. F. Y. O. Ling, Corresponding Secretary of our Woman's Missionary Union work in Central China, was an honored guest at the G. A. House Party at Meredith College in June and at the meeting of the Mt. Zion Association held in Mt. Pisgah church. Those who were so fortunate as to hear Mrs. Ling's tribute to Dr. and Mrs. Matthew T. Yates at this their home church will never forget the joy and inspiration of her message.

The Literature Department of our Southern Union also had an Anniversary

this year. From a small beginning by Maryland Baptists this department has grown until the past year the record showed 1,023,447 free leaflets distributed through the State W. M. U. offices; 81,275 stewardship cards, tithing and offering boxes; and offering envelopes, \$1,045,130. Miss Mallory says: "If asked what agency is the chief promoter for the utilizing of this vast quantity of free literature the answer should inevitably be the stimulus of the Unions three monthly missionary magazines each of which is entirely self-supporting—*World Comrades* with a paid up subscription of 17,697 among Sunbeams, Girls' Auxiliaries and Royal Ambassadors; *The Window of Y. W. A.* with a circulation of 9,072; and *Royal Service* for Woman's Missionary Societies use through its 75,562 renewals and new subscriptions as secured in 1935." North Carolina women subscribed for 8,365 copies of this magazine.

Another Anniversary, that of the death of Luther Rice, was observed on September 25 in Columbia, South Carolina and at his grave near Pine Pleasant church in the Edgefield District. Mrs. Edna R. Harris and Miss Mary Currin represented the North Carolina Union on this occasion. Special programs on Luther Rice were used in a number of societies.

An effort is being made to enlist North Carolina women in membership in the One Hundred Thousand Club. A goal of 2,000 paid-up memberships during 1936, and the same number in 1937 is our objective.

Six scholarships have been given to the Woman's Missionary Union Training School in Louisville, Kentucky, and interest has increased in the work of our Margaret Fund for aiding in the education of the children of our missionaries.

Twenty-five hundred dollars of the Heck Memorial Offering was given this year to the work of Dr. H. H. McMillan in Soochow, China; and \$1,000 to Dr. J. L. Lake for the leper work on Tai Kam Island.

There are still many churches that have no Woman's Missionary Union organization and we will continue our efforts to enlist these churches. A comparison of W. M. U. and State Convention Minutes show that nearly all of the churches that are contributing to missions have W. M. U. organizations. Increased emphasis is laid on what we sometimes call our W. M. U. Fundamentals: Prayer; Study both of the Bible and Missions; Stewardship—the grace of giving; Personal Service—manifestation of Christian Fellowship and Soul Winning; and Missionary Education of our young people. No department of our work is more vital than that of our young people. To stimulate greater interest each group of organizations has been given special publicity through a definite "Focus Week" devoted to their special needs and activities. In addition gatherings have been held in their interest; the Y. W. A. Camp at Ridgecrest, the G. A. House Party at Meredith, and the R. A. Conclave at Dunn. Each of these has yielded splendid results both in increased interest and deepened spiritual life. We believe that all activity in Kingdom work is based on love for Christ and the realization that we have a task committed to us by Him.

Dear Sir:

We have audited the books and records of the Convention for the twelve months ended December 31, 1936, and in the following tabulations we show the Revenue and Expense of the General Fund, together with all Cash Receipts and Disbursements for the other funds.

Exhibit "A" shows the Revenue and Expense of the General Fund, together with the distribution of the Revenue after paying expenses chargeable to the undesignated revenue.

Exhibits "B" to "G", inclusive, show the cash transactions of all other funds for the year, and Exhibit "H" is a summary of the net Debt of the Convention on December 31, 1936.

All Cash Receipts were found to have been promptly deposited in the bank and Disbursements were found supported by cancelled checks, invoices, etc., and expenses were properly classified. Our examination did not disclose any evidence of irregularities and we believe the funds have been carefully and honestly handled and properly accounted for.

Just below is a summary, not audited, but prepared from the reports of the various institutions, showing the total of all income for Convention objects for the calendar year 1936.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY

L. L. MORGAN, *Secretary*

The year 1936 opened with severe cold weather and many of the churches could not have services for several weeks during January and February. Of course, this greatly reduced the funds sent in during the first quarter. However, taking the year as a whole, conditions have steadily improved and splendid gains have been made in every phase of our work.

We have had less trouble getting reports from all the associations this year than ever before, but there is still room for improvement. In some cases the association clerk could not furnish us with complete and up-to-date information about the churches for the reason that the church clerk did not furnish him with the information in the Church Letter sent to the association.

One can readily see the importance of keeping a faithful record of all that the church does during the year and of sending this information on to the associational clerk from whose report we make up the records of the Baptist State Convention and pass them on to the Statistical Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention to become a part of the records of the Baptists of the world. The value of these reports is, of course, determined by their accuracy.

BAPTISMS

We received during the year 18,848 members by baptism. This is a gain of 80 over 1935. There were 666 churches in the state that did not have a single baptism during the year. We can save ourselves only by saving others. Hence a church that is not definitely in the business of winning the lost and training the saved is doomed. Thirty-five Indian churches reported 86 baptisms.

CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

There are now 2,451 churches with a membership of 465,698. Last year we reported 2,436 churches and a membership of 458,517. This represents a gain of 15 churches and 7,181 members. There are 35 Indian churches with a membership of 2,773.

GIFTS

All figures are given for the associational year and not the calendar year. Gifts to all Missions, Education and Benevolences total \$567,530.91. This sum is a gain over last year of \$51,508.70. For all local work such as debts, buildings, fuel, lights, pastoral support and other operating expenses the sum given was \$2,341,226.70. This sum represents a gain over last year of \$146,223.59. The total of all gifts to all causes is \$2,908,757.61. The total gain in contributions to all causes is \$197,732.29.

CO-OPERATING CHURCHES

Churches contributing to denominational objects number 2,222. This number is an increase of 15 over last year. Only 229 failed to contribute to one or more of the Convention's institutions.

PER CAPITA GIFTS

The per capita gift to all causes, local and outside, is \$6.25. Gifts to denominational causes alone are \$1.22 per capita.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE CHURCHES

The Department of Christian Education in the Churches is made up of the Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Divisions, Laymen's Work, and Student Work. W. Perry Crouch is Secretary with headquarters at 200 Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh.

DIVISION OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

There are 2,437 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 391,194. The gain in number of schools is seven. The gain in enrollment is 6,940. Thirty-five churches do not have Sunday schools. One hundred seventy-nine Vacation Bible Schools were held during the year. This is a gain of 109 over last year. L. L. Morgan is Secretary of the Sunday School Division. Mrs. C. B. Bain, Dunn, is our State Approved Elementary Worker. Mrs. W. Perry Crouch, Raleigh, is Approved Intermediate Worker. James P. Morgan, Durham, is Approved Young People's Worker. Ben F. Favell, Charlotte, is Approved Adult Worker, and Mrs. M. D. Herndon is Approved Extension Worker. The headquarters office is 206 Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION DIVISION

There are 2,506 organizations with 57,638 members. N. C. Brooks is Secretary and Miss Mabel Starnes is the Associate Secretary. The headquarters office is at 205 Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Woman's Missionary Union statistical report runs from January 1 to December 31, and 1936 reports cannot be compiled before this Annual of North Carolina State Convention goes to press so the figures below are for 1935.

In 1935 there were 2,984 organizations of Woman's Missionary Union reporting. The roll is revised each year and when no report is sent during the year the organization is dropped from the roll until it does report. The membership in these organizations totaled 53,801. Organized work was done in sixty-one associations, each one holding its separate annual meeting. Eleven hundred and ninety-one organizations made at least four points on the Standard of Excellence and 420 made all ten points. Fifteen hundred and seventy-four mission study classes were held, with 15,648 seals awarded. The 1935 Heck Memorial Offering of \$4,230.00 was appropriated as follows: \$1,000.00 for Chinese Church, Harbin Manchuria; \$1,000.00 Shanghai University; \$500.00 Eliza Yates School for Girls; \$500.00 Old North Gate School for Girls; and \$1,720.35 Woman's Missionary Union Training School Scholarship Fund.

Total contributions for the year was \$198,214.53.

CONSTITUTION

I. NAME AND OBJECT

SECTION 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

The object of the Convention shall be to promote Missions, Education, Social Service, the distribution and study of the Bible and sound religious literature; and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in its work.

II. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be composed of not more than three representatives from each white association in the State and not more than one representative from each co-operating church for every fifty members or fraction thereof and of the officers and members of the General Board of the Convention and of the Life Members so declared under the previous Constitution: *Provided*, that no church have more than ten representatives and no one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member in good standing of a Missionary Baptist Church co-operating with the Convention.

III. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Convention shall meet annually on Tuesday after the third Sunday in November, *except in those years when the meeting date will fall in Thanksgiving week; in which case the Convention shall meet annually on Tuesday after the second Sunday in November.**

IV. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a President, a *First Vice President*, a *Second Vice President*, a *Third Vice President*,** a Recording Secretary, a General Secretary, a Treasurer (the General Secretary may be elected as Treasurer at the discretion of the Convention), three Trustees of the Convention, and five Directors of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. The President, Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, General Secretary, and Treasurer shall be elected as the Convention may determine, the Trustees of the Convention and Directors of the Baptist Foundation, in the manner provided by their respective charters. The terms of office of President and Vice-Presidents commence at the conclusion of the session at which they are elected and continue until the close of the next Convention.

SEC. 2. The President shall preside over the deliberations of the Convention and discharge such other duties as are imposed upon him by the Convention or as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all Committees unless the Convention shall otherwise direct. In case of his absence or incapacity one of the Vice-Presidents shall act in his stead.

SEC. 3. The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the proceedings of the Convention and have the same printed and distributed.

SEC. 4. The General Secretary of the Convention shall have administrative supervision of the work of Missions, Education, Benevolences, and all other general training activities of the Convention. He shall employ a reputable auditor or firm of auditors each year to make a complete audit of the books and

accounts of the treasurer and bookkeeping department and report to the Executive Committee of the General Board, which shall receive and pass upon said report and have it published in the minutes of the Convention and in the *Biblical Recorder* or the then recognized denominational organ.

SEC. 5. The Treasurer shall receive all funds sent to him for the objects of the Convention, make acknowledgment of the same once a month in the *Biblical Recorder* or the then recognized denominational organ, give a bond to the Trustees of the Convention in such amount as they may determine for the faithful performance of his duties and prescribe the terms and conditions of said bond. He shall also forward at least once a month all contributions to their destination; at every meeting of the Convention he shall make a full report of his receipts and disbursements, and upon retiring from his office, deliver to his successor all moneys, papers, books and other property belonging thereto.

SEC. 6. The Trustees shall take and hold the title to any and all property acquired by and belonging to the Convention. They shall require a sufficient bond from the Treasurer. In case he shall refuse or neglect to give satisfactory bond within thirty days after his election the Trustees shall have power to elect a successor. The said Trustees shall elect a chairman and secretary and report annually to the Convention the work done by them. They shall receive and make such conveyances of the properties of the Convention as directed by the Convention. During the interim between sessions of the Convention the said Trustees may receive and convey the property of the Convention upon the advice and direction of the General Board.

V. GENERAL BOARD

SECTION 1. The General Board of the Convention shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention, *ex officio*, and forty-eight members from the State at large. The Convention shall elect one-third of the members from the State at large to hold office for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years, but as the terms expire the successors shall serve for terms of three years. That retiring members of the Board be ineligible for re-election until the following meeting of the State Convention. No one in the employment for pay of any Institution or Board fostered by this Convention shall be eligible to membership on this Board. The General Board shall fill all vacancies in its membership between the session of the Convention until the session of the next Convention, when the vacancies shall be filled by the Convention itself in the manner provided by its laws.

SEC. 2. The General Board shall have charge and control, except when otherwise directed by the Convention, of all work of the Convention, including Missions, Education, Benevolences, and all other general activities, in the interim between the sessions of the Convention. Any action by the General Board during the interim between the sessions of the Convention vitally related to the work of the Convention shall be binding upon the Convention: *Provided*, it shall not relate to any matter previously committed to some other agency of the Convention with power to act. But any action of the Board during the interim shall be reported fully to the Convention at its next session.

SEC. 3. The General Board shall report to each session of the Convention upon the work done in each department, viz.: Missions, Education, Benevolences and all other general activities. The Board shall have its report printed and ready for distribution at the first session of the Convention; all reports from Educational Institutions, Hospitals, Orphanages, Baptist Foundation, and all other institutions or agencies of the Convention shall report to the Convention through the General Board.

SEC. 4. The General Board of the Convention shall meet in regular session

in December and June of each year, and in cases of emergency at the call of the President and General Secretary of the Board or any five members.

SEC. 5. At the first December meeting of the General Board the work of the Convention shall be divided as follows: Missions, Education, Benevolences and Training Activities. The membership of the General Board shall be divided into four committees of twelve each and the work as above outlined shall be assigned to these committees. Each committee shall organize itself by the selection of a chairman and a recording secretary. All appropriations for the work of the various departments of the General Board shall be made by the General Board; but each committee shall make to the General Board definite and specific recommendations as to all appropriations.

SEC. 6. The General Board shall select an Executive Committee consisting of the Chairman of the Committees on Missions, Education, Benevolences and Training Activities, the President of the General Board, and two other members of the General Board. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the General Secretary and shall have general direction and oversight of all the work of the General Board in the interim between the sessions of the Board and such other matters as shall be assigned to it by the General Board.

SEC. 7. The General Board shall be successor in law to all legal obligations heretofore incurred by the Board of Missions and by the Board of Education.

SEC. 8. At each December meeting the General Board may select such other departmental assistants as may be needed.

VI. TRUSTEES OF CONVENTION'S INSTITUTION

SECTION 1. The charters of all institutions owned and supported by the Convention shall contain the following provisions as nearly as may be and conformable to the number of trustees to be elected, that is to say:

a. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall elect the trustees of said corporation and their regular term of office shall be four years. At the first election by the Convention one-fourth of the board of trustees shall be elected to serve for one year, one-fourth for two years, one-fourth for three years and the remaining one-fourth for four years. At each subsequent regular annual session of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina one-fourth of the members of the Board of Trustees of said corporation shall be elected by the Convention to succeed the members of said Board retiring.

b. The members of the Board of Trustees of said corporation shall be residents of the State of North Carolina and members in good and regular standing of a Missionary Baptist Church co-operating with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

c. Removal from the State or ceasing for any reason to be a member in good and regular standing of a Missionary Baptist Church co-operating with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be equivalent to a resignation from said Board of Trustees. Any vacancy on the Board shall be filled by the remaining members until the next regular annual session of the Convention and the Convention shall at its next regular annual session fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

d. The term of office of a trustee who has not resigned, died, become disqualified, or been removed shall not expire until his successor shall have been duly elected and qualified.

e. The Board of Trustees of said corporation by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of its entire membership, given in regular annual meeting or in a special meeting duly called for the purpose, shall have power to remove from office any trustee of such corporation for cause considered sufficient by

such Board, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee and opportunity to him to be heard by the Board.

f. The Baptist State Convention shall have the right at any time to remove from office any trustee for cause considered sufficient by the Convention, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee and opportunity for him to be heard by the Convention. Notice of such contemplated action and hearing by the Convention may be given by the Executive Committee of the Convention.

g. That no individual shall serve on any Board, or Institution, who is at the same time holding membership on any other Board or Institution.

SEC. 2. The Trustees of all institutions, benevolent, educational or otherwise under the control of the Convention shall be elected by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and shall hold office for the term to which elected, unless sooner terminated. When any vacancy shall occur in any Board of any such institution a nominating committee elected by the Convention shall nominate to the Convention Baptists to fill such vacancy. The Trustees of all institutions owned and supported by the Convention shall make annual report to the nominating committee of any vacancies. Each Board shall have the right to make any suggestion to the nominating committee it may see fit regarding such nominations, and all nominations made by the committee shall be passed upon by the Convention. The Convention shall have the right to adopt the report of the nominating committee and elect the trustees thus nominated, or to substitute the name of other trustee or trustees in lieu thereof, or recommit said report for further consideration as the case may be.

VII. GENERAL ITEMS

SECTION 1. Individuals, churches, and associations, or others desiring the assistance and co-operation of the Baptists of the State in any work not already fostered by the Convention should present the question to the agency under which it should be properly placed. If the agency should refuse to take it up, it may be presented to the Convention under miscellaneous business or a special order.

SEC. 2. The members of the Boards of the Convention and Institutions affiliated with the Convention shall be distributed as widely as practicable, both as to territory and individuals.

SEC. 3. The Convention year shall close December 31 of each year.

SEC. 4. The compensation of all paid officers and employees of the Convention, the General Board, and its committees shall be fixed by the Executive Committee subject to review by the General Board at its next meeting.

SEC. 5. No institution or agency affiliating with the Convention shall encumber its property or change its status with respect to the Convention without authority of the Convention or its General Board.

That except as may be necessary in the reasonable anticipation of current revenues and payable out of the same, or for the purpose of funding or refinancing any indebtedness of the Convention now outstanding, neither the Convention, nor its General Board shall have the power to create any debt or obligation binding on the Convention; and no other board, agency or institution of, or affiliated with the Convention, shall have the power at any time to create any debt or obligation binding on the Convention.

SEC. 6. If for any reason, it shall be necessary to select a place or to change the time or place of the meeting of the Convention after the Convention adjourns, the President, Recording Secretary and the General Secretary of the Convention shall be a committee with power to make necessary change or changes.

SEC. 7. This constitution may be changed or amended on any day of any annual session of the Convention by two-thirds vote of the members present when the vote is taken, provided notice of the contemplated amendment or change shall have been announced on a previous day of the convention.

BY-LAWS OF THE GENERAL BOARD

I. THE PRESIDENT AND RECORDING SECRETARY

The President of the General Board, in addition to the regular duties incumbent upon such officers, shall appoint special committees to investigate and report upon any matters which concern equally all departments of the work of the Convention. The Secretary shall record all proceedings in correct form and preserve the same.

II. OFFICERS, SECRETARIES AND DEPARTMENTAL ASSISTANTS

At the annual December meeting of the General Board, there shall be elected the following officers, who shall serve for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified: President, Vice-President and Recording Secretary.

At the same time the Board shall elect all Departmental Heads and such other assistants as may from time to time be deemed necessary, and shall fix compensation of its Secretaries and other employees.

III. QUORUM

Seventeen members shall be required to constitute a quorum of the Board. Five shall be required to constitute a quorum of any department. Four shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Committee of the General Board.

IV. THE WORK OF THE GENERAL BOARD

The work of the General Board shall be apportioned among its four divisions, in so far as may be practicable, as indicated below. The General Board, the Executive Committee of the General Board and the General Secretary (48 members exclusive of the President and Secretary of the Convention, who are *ex-officio* members):

1. *Department of Missions*—(12)—Secretary of Missions—Division of (1) Field Work; (2) Evangelism; (3) Negro Work.

2. *Department of Training*—(12)—Secretary of Training—Division of (1) Sunday Schools—Secretary; (2) B. Y. P. U.—Secretary; (3) Student Activities.

3. *Department of Benevolences*—(12)—Secretary of Benevolences—Division of (1) Orphanage; (2) Hospital; (3) Ministers' Relief.

4. *Department of Education*—(12)—Secretary of Education—Division of (1) Educational Institution; (2) Ministerial Education.

5. *Department of Woman's Missionary Union*.

The Executive Committee shall have power in its discretion, to modify, enlarge, diminish, or otherwise alter the divisions of the work of the Board as it may from time to time deem advisable or necessary, the changes so made to be reported to the next regular meeting of the General Board for its consideration.

V. UNDESIGNATED GIFTS

The General Board at its annual meeting shall determine the percentage of undesignated gifts that each object of the Convention shall receive, including

State and South-wide, provided always that any allocation of such funds shall not violate any order with respect to the same previously made by the Baptist State Convention.

VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee shall have power to borrow money and execute notes on behalf of the General Board for the purpose of meeting the obligations of said Board, and to do and perform any act incidental to or necessary in the execution and discharge of the work of the General Board: *Provided*, the Executive Committee shall not incur obligations for any object in excess of the budget fixed by the General Board. Notes may be executed in the name of the General Board and on its behalf by the Chairman of the Executive Committee attested by the General Secretary, and when so executed by authority of the Executive Committee duly given, shall be the binding obligation of the General Board.

*The Executive Committee of the General Board shall meet upon the call of the General Secretary, or any four members. If practicable, at least one meeting shall be held each month.**

VII. SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

His duties, together with all other Departmental Heads, or Assistants, shall be determined from time to time by the General Board.

VIII. EXECUTIVE SESSION

The General Board may by a majority vote of the number present, go into executive session at any time for the purpose of considering such matters as may claim the consideration of said Board.

IX. AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a majority vote of the members attending said meeting.

X. PUBLICATION

These by-laws, together with any amendments that may be made thereon, from time to time, shall be printed in the Minutes of the Baptist State Convention.

PROCEEDINGS

WILMINGTON, NORTH CAROLINA

Tuesday Afternoon, November 16, 1937

1. Assembling in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church, Wilmington, at 2:00 o'clock, Tuesday afternoon, November 16, 1937, North Carolina Baptists convened in their one hundred seventh annual session.

2. A consciousness of keen sadness however, marked the conventions proceedings in the realization that the beloved President, Wm. Louis Poteat, Wake Forest, would be unable physically to attend and in his absence Vice-President Robert N. Simms, Raleigh, called the Convention to order and requested Immediate Past President, Zeno Wall, Shelby, to offer a special prayer for Dr. Poteat and the Convention.

3. Thereafter, Recording Secretary Charles B. Deane, Rockingham, read the following communication from revered and honored Dr. Poteat:

Wake Forest, North Carolina
November 15, 1937

Sisters and Brothers of
The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina:

Permit me once again to tell you of my deep appreciation of your call a year ago to the presidency of this important body, of my devotion to the great causes for which it stands, and of my faith in the all-conquering Christ, our Master, and to assure you that no slight impediment could hold me back from undertaking here the responsibilities of that call. I have in fact been looking forward to this association with you with enthusiasm and exhilaration. But I am happy to hand the gavel to the first named of your vice-presidents, Brother Robert N. Simms, who will have the able assistance of his associates, Brother Hoyt Blackwell and Brother Arthur J. Barton, upon whom I myself was expecting heavily to rely.

I commend you to the inspiration and guidance of God with the suggestion of this motto for your session:

Nothing small, nothing timid for our great Master in this needy world.

At the request of Vice President Simms, Vice Presidents Arthur Barton, Wilmington, and Hoyt Blackwell, Mars Hill, came to the platform and after the singing of "All Hail The Power of Jesus Name," led by L. C. Pinnix, Burlington, Director of Music during the sessions, with Mrs. Pinnix as accompanist, the Convention proceeded to the transaction of business.

6. Vice President Simms released the Enrollment Committee, heretofore chosen by President Poteat: R. H. Satterfield, *Chairman*, Miss Vivian Grant, A. L. Benton, T. W. Hearne, W. L. McSwain, Nane Starnes, H. B. Anderson. Song: "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing."

7. M. L. Bannister, Oxford led the opening devotion with the Convention joining in the singing of "More Love To Thee, O Christ."

8. **Enrollment:** Reporting for the *Committee on Enrollment* R. H. Satterfield, Wilmington, *Chairman* stated that at 2:00 o'clock 420 delegates had registered and his motion passed wherein the present registration and those who register will constitute this the one hundred seventh annual Baptist State Convention.

9. Host Pastor, Sanky L. Blanton was recognized and following his words of welcome presented his Baptist Ministerial Colleagues in Wilmington whose cooperation and assistance in planning for this Convention was highly praised.

McMillan, Wake Forest who will cover the Convention proceedings. Visitors (See page 53) were here, and at other times during the sessions welcomed by the presiding officers.

12. The Convention proceeded with the election of the following officers:

Recording Secretary: A motion by John R. Miller, Raeford, passed whereby Hugh A. Ellis, Wilson cast the vote of the convention for Charles B. Deane, Rockingham.

General Secretary and Treasurer: T. H. King, Clinton, offered the motion that authorized Charles B. Deane to cast the vote of the Convention for Maloy A. Huggins, Raleigh, which was done.

Statistical Secretary: By virtue of D. H. Wilcox's motion Charles B. Deane cast the convention vote for Leonard L. Morgan, Raleigh.

13. *Chairman* E. Norfleet Gardner, Dunn, presented after a few minor changes the Order of Business, now being followed and was accepted upon his motion.

"We would, first of all, record our gratitude to God for His continued blessings upon our Baptist people.

In many respects, probably in most respects, this year 1937, is the best year we have experienced in, perhaps, a decade. We believe the spiritual condition of the churches, taken on the whole, offers a reasonable ground for encouragement. Hundreds of gracious revivals have been held; there are fewer pastorless churches than in many years; there are signs of a spiritual awakening; and there is a growing interest in New Testament stewardship.

. . . The per member annual support of all convention objects during the decade 1910-1919, inclusive, was \$0.93. For the decade 1920-1929, inclusive, the amount was \$2.46. For the eight year period 1929-1937, inclusive, the amount was (about) \$1.26. The present advance *must* continue if we are to reach by 1940 the level of giving attained during the decade 1920-1929."

Clyde Turner, Greensboro, offered a special prayer for our Foreign Missionaries, especially those in China, and after the recognition of the Missionaries and Children of Missionaries present, Harold Schaly, of Porte Legge, Brazil, now a Wake Forest student brought a great message from Latin America and about his conversion through our Brazilian Missionaries. Thereafter the report was adopted.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

There should be sustained and signal gratitude in our hearts to our Lord Jesus for His blessings upon the work of Foreign Missions as carried on by Southern Baptists. In spite of constantly recurring obstacles there has been progress.

In 1927 your Foreign Mission Board had 544 missionaries on its roll. In 1934 there were only 377 in active service. Since 1933 there have been appointed 90 new missionaries and reappointed 28, making a total of 118 replacements. There are at present 415 active missionaries. There are 56 retired missionaries on the pension plan.

Your Board has work in sixteen countries. In all these countries our Lord is blessing the work and in some of the countries many souls are being added to His Kingdom.

In these 16 countries there are now 1,715 churches, of which churches 961 or over half are self-sustaining. There are, in addition to the 1,715 churches, 2,798 outstations. The total membership on all fields is 203,674 with 2,250 Sunday Schools having an enrollment of 109,580. Last year there were 14,882 baptisms.

With these items of general information, this report would call attention to some discouraging features that face your Board. Then the report will call attention to some encouraging features:

Discouraging features:

First the present war in China, with its terrible destruction of property in many sections where we have work.

Second, persecution in Rumania. A decree has been passed by the Rumanian government to close every Baptist church in that country. Protests have been made by the State department in Washington and by the British Government and by the Archbishop of Canterbury. This decree was to have gone into effect last month, but further study is being given to the decree and the protests that have been made, and as yet our churches are still open.

Third, persecution in Italy. Our work in Italy is hedged about by governmental restrictions that embarrass and retard the growth of Baptist work in that country. The future for our work in Italy is not at all bright.

Fourth, the greatest need in our mission work today is for the increased income on the part of the Foreign Mission Board. We cannot properly man the fields where we have work with the missionary personnel of less than 500. Until we can build our missionary force back to this number, our work will be seriously handicapped.

Encouraging features:

First, our debt reduction. On January 1st, 1933, we owed the banks in Richmond \$1,110,000. Today we owe \$339,500.

Second, increased receipts of the Board. During the past year there was received for the first time in a number of years more than \$1,000,000. In 1933 we received just a little more than \$671,000.

Third, the increase in the Lottie Moon Offering. In 1933 we received \$175,000 plus. This last December the women of the South gave \$292,000 plus.

Fourth, the increase in our missionary personnel. During the lean years our number was decreased from 544 to 377. We have now built the number back up to where we have 415 missionaries.

Fifth, the unparalleled opportunities for the preaching of the Gospel in all of our mission fields. Especially was this true in China before the present war, in South America and in most of the countries in Europe.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE PURCHASE OF THE BIBLICAL RECORDER

The members of your committee on the Purchase of the Biblical Recorder, even though they have been active, regret that they cannot make a final report at this time.

We have been engaged in full, frank and friendly conference and negotiation with the directors of the Recorder Publishing Company for the past fourteen months.

Certain important matters, especially some unfilled contracts of the Recorder Company, now outstanding, and the present indebtedness of the Baptist State Convention, make it unwise and unadvisable for us to come to a definite and final conclusion at the present time about the matters in hand.

We hope and believe that a basis of sale and purchase satisfactory to both parties can be reached by which the Convention can purchase both the *Biblical Recorder* and the Recorder Building not later than January 1, 1942.

Agreement has been reached between the directors of the Recorder Publishing Company and your committee that negotiations shall continue to this end in the same frank and friendly spirit which has heretofore obtained.

We, therefore, recommend that the Convention continue the committee.

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER

The Biblical Recorder Publishing Company has closed a good year. We have not secured quite so many new clubs this year as last, but this was to be expected. We now have budgets in 308 churches.

Our collections for this year, both for subscriptions and advertizing, are somewhat more than for last year. Mr. R. F. Terrell is devoting all of his time in the field, seeking to increase our circulation, and thus enable the RECORDER to render a larger service. Mr. Terrell's time is devoted to an effort to increase the number of subscriptions and thereby decrease the price from \$2.00 to 1.50 on the budget plan.

Secretary M. A. Huggins suggested a goal of 25,000 subscriptions to the RECORDER, and that this number shall include all pastors Sunday school superintendents, W. M. U. presidents, and B. T. U. leaders.

The Biblical Recorder Publishing Company is glad to cooperate with this Convention in any definite movement to enlarge the RECORDER'S usefulness. We hope the Recorder Company and this Convention will unite in an earnest effort to increase the RECORDER'S circulation to 25,000 by January 1, 1942.

40. Under open discussion E. F. Sullivan, Hickory, W. K. McGee, Thomasville, and R. H. Satterfield, Wilmington, spoke upon the valuableness of and how to increase interest in the *Recorder*.

41. Continued from last year, the committee on Needy, Aged, and Infirm, submitted a final report through *Chairman* E. D. Poe, Oxford, and upon his motion it was approved.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEEDY, AGED, AND INFIRM

Your committee desires to re-emphasize the suggestions made in former reports to the effect that we owe a distinct duty to render helpful assistance to the Needy, Aged, and Infirm. We do urge that the local churches give special attention to their needy old people so that their last days may be made as happy as possible.

Our investigation disclosed that more than 400 homes for the Needy, Aged, and Infirm are now operated in 40 states by different denominations. The Baptists have 20 such homes.

Some of these homes are small, sheltering less than 25 persons; some have more than 200 people each; and a number of the homes are maintained solely for ministers and their widows, and other church workers. Our Methodist brethren have 45 such homes, but none of them are exclusively minister's homes.

More than half the homes have no entrance fee. Some have a fee, but do not refuse admission to any worthy person when resources permit. About half the homes have a provision for life members with a fixed payment made by the applicant or by others for them. More than 27,000 aged people are cared for in these homes at a cost of more than eight million dollars annually.

North Carolina Baptists waited a long time before they undertook the care of the orphan child. Many fatherless and friendless children were bound out by the Courts and countless others went hungry, cold, and unlettered. Now everybody is interested in the orphan. We have been made richer in soul by the love and money we have given to these children.

Equally helpless with the orphan are the worn out and penniless men and women of our land. And we cannot claim soul honestly until we have volunteered our assistance to these silent old people who are too feeble to work, too poor to live decently, and too proud to beg. We cannot divide the Gospel into evangelistic and social. The Gospel is for the whole man, it matters not where or when his need is.

We recommend, therefore, that:

The local church give sympathetic attention to the needy, aged and infirm in its area.

That the Convention follow up this interest in and responsibility for our needy old people.

That the Convention ask our General Secretary and the *Executive Committee* of our General Board to investigate the possibility and advisability of getting the Home Mission Board to release the beautiful property of Fruitland Institute to the Convention with a view to making a home for some of the people comprehended in this report.

44. There is given below a remarkable musical program splendidly rendered by one-hundred thirty-five boys and girls from the Kennedy Home, Kinston, under the personal direction of John B. Alderman, with Miss Elizabeth Smith giving the readings and Mrs. T. V. Mosley accompanying at the organ.

45. Permission was granted *Chairman* Zeno Wall, by the Committee to Nominate Trustees of the Convention, its Institutions and Members of the General Board to substitute the names of R. A. Kelly and M. L. Bannister for T. L. Johnson and Mrs. Wade Bostick who were absent.

Song: "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus"

46. The Baptist Hospital message came from the *Superintendent*, Smith Hagaman, through an address on the subject "Ministering in our Baptist Hospital." Incident to this message D. H. Wilcox, Winston-Salem discussed the necessity of providing for more beds.

47. By common consent with the approval of the Committee on order of Business the report of the Baptist Foundation (See Page 97) was received at this time through T. A. Avera, Rocky Mount.

48. In the absence of J. T. Watts, Dallas, Texas, the work of the Relief and Annuity Board was introduced by E. Norfleet Gardner, the State Representative of the Board who read the report (See page 89) and was followed by General Secretary Huggins who emphasized Recommendation 8 (See page 99) in the Report of the General Board which would provide for a Retirement Allowance for every bona fide Baptist Pastor, under conditions suggested.

Song: "Love Divine, All Love Excelling"

49. Song Director Pinnix and Mrs. Pinnix sang "Jesus Lover of My Soul" accompanied by Mrs. J. F. Warren, Wilmington.

50. A sermon on the topic "The Abundant Life" was delivered at this noon hour by J. Clyde Turner, Greensboro, who also offered the prayer prior to adjournment.

WEDNESDAY—Afternoon Session

Topic: "*Some Factors in Church Security*"

51. After singing "Near The Cross" and "I Need Thee Every Hour" led by Edward E. Rutledge, Charlotte, assisted by Mrs. Rutledge at the piano, Gordon, L. Price, Roanoke Rapids, led the afternoon devotion.

52. I. S. McElroy, Richmond, Va., was presented by M. M. Adams, Southport, who spoke in behalf of the American Bible Society.

53. There was received at this hour greetings from the Seminaries:

Baptist Bible Institute, New Orleans, being represented by Wilson Woodcock, John B. Lowe and J. F. Stegall.

Southwestern Seminary greetings came through Baker J. Cauthen, and Mrs. Cauthen from Fort Worth.

W. Hersey Davis, Louisville, Faculty representative, brought greetings from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and followed with an Historical address on the subject "The Christian's Competency in Spiritual Relations."

54. B. E. Morris, Durham, read in the absence of George W. Paschal, Wake Forest, the report on the Historical Commission (See page 96).

55. Enrollment reported at 4:00 o'clock this afternoon by Enrollment Chairman Satterfield was 735.

56. A special musical number was presented here by the Kennedy Home High School Chorus.

Song: "My Hope Is Built."

57. The Convention received with Vice President Hoyt Blackwell presiding the report on Social Service and Civic Righteousness through the *Chairman* Arthur J. Barton, upon whose motion the report as amended by common consent was approved.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS

Your Committee reports as follows:

Owing to the crowded condition of the Convention program and the limited time allotted for the presentation of this report by the Committee and the consideration of and action upon the report by the Convention, your Committee deems it unwise and impracticable to enter into a general discussion of the several topics to be considered. The Committee is therefore limiting its report to formal resolutions, which express its own convictions, and which the Committee hopes may express the mind of the Convention and have the Convention's approval, concerning the several vital and important matters which it seems to the Committee should claim our attention at the present time. The Committee recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

I. Concerning Government and Fundamental Rights.

1. That we reaffirm our belief in and devotion to the basic principles of government and human liberty which are expressed in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States, and upon which our government is founded.

2. That in keeping with these principles the function of government is to recognize the inalienable rights of the citizen and to protect him in the free exercise of these rights, and that the government has no right to undertake any regimentation of the citizens that would limit or abridge human freedom, civil or religious.

3. That it is the duty and obligation of the citizen to give patriotic support to the government in all worthy enterprises so long as the government recognizes these principles and that conversely it is the duty and obligation of the citizen to do all in his power to keep the government true to these principles and to resist in every way possible all governmental policies that would infringe upon these fundamental rights.

II. Capital and Labor.

1. That the terms Capital and Labor as commonly used are misleading and suggest a wholly unnecessary antagonism.

2. That we rejoice that under our American system of freedom, in which individual initiative and prowess have free play, we have been able to build a great civilization with large aggregations of wealth, both individual and corporate, which make possible our great industries and gives labor its largest and best opportunities for remunerative employment; and that our per capita wealth is more widely distributed among the citizens than in any other nation, and that living conditions

with the laboring masses, while not perfect or satisfactory, are better than in any other nation in the world.

3. That we recognize the right of ownership and the right of capital to investment and to a reasonable return upon investment; that all men should recognize that ownership is trusteeship and that all property, whether large or small, should be administered unselfishly and for the good of humanity.

4. That we recognize the right of labor to organize and to engage in collective bargaining to the end that labor may have a fair and living wage, such as will provide not only for the necessities of life but for recreation, pleasure and culture.

5. That there is no necessary clash or conflict between capital and labor and that they should work harmoniously with each other for the good of each, and for the good of the general public.

6. That we condemn all violence on the part of labor or capital and all arbitrary and illegal acts that violate fundamental principles and human rights; all questions and contentions between labor and capital ought to be settled in the American way by conference and arbitration.

III. The Legislature and Child Labor.

1. That we approve and applaud the action of the General Assembly of North Carolina, 1937 session, enacting a Child Labor Law prohibiting the employment of minors under sixteen years of age at gainful occupations, but recognizing the right of minors to engage in domestic or farm work under the direction and authority of parents or guardians, and making other provisions limiting and regulating the employment of minors, such as prohibiting employment of minors by any concern or establishment engaged in the manufacture or sale of beer or other intoxicating liquors.

2. We likewise commend and applaud the repeated refusal of the Legislature to ratify the so-called Child Labor Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, under which, if ratified by the necessary number of states, the Federal Government would "have the power to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age." While exploited as intended to protect children this amendment would really place in the hands of the Federal Government the complete control of all young people up to eighteen years of age, destroying, in principle and we fear ultimately in practice, all parental authority and making children the wards of the government. Nothing could be more un-American or destructive of the home life of our people or could militate in a more definite or radical way against the well-being of the children and youth of our nation. We hope the Legislature of North Carolina will continue to stand firm and to resist every effort to induce it to place the stamp of its approval upon such a measure.

IV. The Liquor Situation.

1. We declare a-fresh our unalterable opposition to the whole liquor traffic and to the license system by which this most blighting and corrupting traffic is fastened upon our body social and body politic.

2. That we stand unalterably for total abstinence on the part of the individual and for prohibition by the government, local, State and National, and that we declare relentless war upon the liquor traffic, both legal and illegal, until it shall be banished.

3. That we cannot but express our hearty disapproval and condemnation of the acts of the North Carolina General Assembly, by which it ignored the will of the people as expressed at the ballot box, and usurped the rights of the people by fastening the liquor traffic upon North Carolina, in violation of the sentiments and wishes of an overwhelming majority of North Carolina citizens. These things the General Assembly has done in the following respects: (a) It licensed the sale of 3.2 beer; (b) It increased the alcoholic content of permitted beer to five per cent; (c) It passed the New Hanover and the Pasquotank Liquor Bills

by and under which seventeen of the wet counties in North Carolina established liquor stores to debauch not only their own citizens, but as far as possible the citizens of the State at large; (d) It passed the "Amended Alcoholic Beverage Control Act" at the 1937 session under which any county in the State that has a wet majority can by vote establish liquor stores. Each and all of these acts by the General Assembly were done in the face of the unquestionable fact well known to the Legislature that the State of North Carolina as a whole was utterly opposed to the liquor traffic. The Legislature thus ignored the well known sentiments of our people; disregarded the unity, integrity and authority of the State, and subjected the State as a whole to the will of a few wet counties in a matter of great economic and moral moment which materially affects the whole people; (e) In keeping with a fundamental principle upheld by a long line of court decisions the majority of citizens in any political unit, however small, have the right to banish from their midst a recognized evil, even when such evil is licensed or tolerated by the larger political unit of which the smaller is a part. But no political unit has a right to establish and maintain an evil against the will of the majority of the larger political unit. This is the right of local option. This principle was put in reverse and utterly violated by the Legislature of North Carolina when it permitted wet counties to establish liquor stores.

4. That we express the conviction that every member of the Legislature who advocated and supported this usurpation of the rights and powers of the citizens of North Carolina, and helped to fasten the nefarious liquor traffic upon our people, should be promptly, effectively and permanently retired to private life by the expression of the will of the people and of the people's protest against such unjustified and high-handed procedure.

5. That we express our great pleasure in what appears to be the rising tide of prohibition sentiment, as indicated in the state-wide dry victories in Georgia and Tennessee, the latter by such overwhelming majority, and in the great number of dry victories in local option county elections in all of the states where such elections have been called. We hope and believe that an aroused public sentiment, outraged by the increasing crimes and highway fatalities brought by the liquor traffic, and the increasing disregard of law and decency by the traffic, shall soon again and permanently place upon the liquor traffic the brand of the outlaw, which it so richly deserved.

6. (a) That this Convention earnestly recommends to our North Carolina Baptist people, both pastors and churches, that the churches take a firm and consistent stand against all individual indulgence in the use of intoxicating liquors and against all participation in their sale by members of the churches, and that we seek as rapidly as possible to educate our people against the folly and sin of such use and sale, and that as rapidly as possible our churches shall be relieved of the open shame and burden of church members in any way connected with the unholy traffic; (b) That our churches be urged to give their full moral support to the prohibition cause, and to give a more liberal financial support to dry organizations which stand for the united action of our people against the liquor traffic.

V. Gambling and the Modern Dance.

1. That we deplore the widespread mania among our people to indulge in gambling and in games of chance. Millions, even billions, of dollars in money are being squandered and the moral stamina and character of our people are being undermined by the gambling mania. Thousands of our people are being subtly corrupted by such lotteries as the moving picture "Bank Night" and similar prize schemes operated by merchants, usually in violation of law. Christians ought everywhere to abstain from all forms and phases of this evil.

2. We disapprove and condemn the modern dance as a means of social amusement. We recognize that it is demoralizing and that it tends

toward immorality. This Convention hereby would express its conviction in this important matter and its will and desire that no college or school of any grade, or other institution of any kind whatsoever, owned and maintained by this Convention, shall at any time through its faculty, boards of trustees, or other agents, promote or allow promoted dancing in its buildings or on its premises, or elsewhere under its official auspices. The Baptists of North Carolina cannot give their sanction or approval to a custom so clearly calculated to injure and demoralize character, which we seek in the name of Christ to build in all that is highest and best.

VI. Marriage and Divorce.

1. That we deplore the course pursued by our Legislature in the last several years in so amending our statutes governing marriage as to remove nearly all the safeguards and restrictions which at one time existed, and to make possible all manner of ill-considered and reckless marriages, even midnight drunken marriages, such as the one that even now fills our news columns and covers us with shame.

2. That we urge upon the next session of the Legislature the enactment of a wise, sane, constructive marriage code which shall at least embody provisions prohibiting the performance of any marriage ceremony before a suitable period of time has elapsed after the granting of the license and the publishing of the banns, and further that will require a health certificate to be presented by each party to the marriage before a license can be issued.

3. That it is the duty of North Carolina in the exercise of its prerogative and authority properly to safeguard marriage whatever may be the custom of other states, and however many couples may go to adjoining states to be married.

Unanimously adopted and presented by the Committee.

58. At this hour Eugene I. Olive, North Wilkesboro, brought an address upon the subject, "The Church and Social Wrongs".

59. Zeno Wall, Shelby, offered the closing prayer of this session.

WEDNESDAY—Evening Session

Topic: "Christianity and National Security".

60. Following the singing of "He Leadeth Me" and "Holy Ghost with Light Divine," J. L. White, Jr., Elizabeth City, brought the worship service with the Convention joining in song, "Nearer, Still Nearer".

61. Giving due notice as required by the Constitution John Arch McMillan, Thomasville, advised that on Thursday he would offer a resolution to amend (Article IV—Officers) with particular reference to the office of Vice-President.

62. Recording Secretary Deane was authorized under motion by T. C. Johnson, Kinston, to forward to J. M. Hilliard, High Point, who for 50 odd years had never previously missed attending this Convention, the good wishes of this body.

63. "Christianity in the Realm of Economics" was the theme of special address delivered by M. I. Skaggs, Buie's Creek at this time.

64. A message of love and devotion was unanimously voted by the Convention, upon motion by M. A. Huggins, to be conveyed by Board Representative Forrest C. Feezor, through the Foreign Mission Board, to our Missionaries in Countries where they are now faithfully standing by their posts of duty under tremendous difficulties and imminent danger of the loss of life, and if practical that the Board cable this message.

65. Immediate adoption followed the introduction of the following resolution presented by H. S. Satterfield, Wilmington.

I move that the N. C. Baptist State Convention go on record as sponsoring a state-wide appeal for funds to be used for the purpose of relief, in the form of food, clothing, and medicine to be administered by our missionaries on the field; to the end that they shall not be forced to stand empty-handed in the midst of suffering on the part of those whom they love, and to the end that their heroism shall be matched by our unselfishness, and Christ shall be glorified in the exercise of Christian mercy in this great crisis.

66. Robert and Albert Simms sang "Have Thine Own Way Lord" accompanied by Mrs. Pinnix.

67. Home Mission Board Representative Ira D. S. Knight, Durham, read a report on the work of the Board which was adopted upon his motion after the address by the Home Board's Representative an Italian, J. F. Plainfield, West Tampa, Florida.

REPORT ON HOME MISSION BOARD

The Home Mission Board is lifting up Christ in the homeland among the Indians, the foreigners, the Negroes, the under-privileged in the cities and congested industrial sections, and in Cuba and Panama. In all of its departments of work the Board has 327 missionaries working in 850 mission stations. During the past convention year we have placed in the field 35 new missionaries and have opened 36 new mission stations.

Home Mission work among foreigners in our midst includes, first those people who were born in other lands and their children—Mexicans, Italians, Cubans in the United States, Europeans, and Chinese; and, second, native Americans who speak another language, chiefly the French-speaking people of Southern Louisiana and the Spanish-speaking people of New Mexico. These are fields that challenge us to the task of evangelizing more than 5,000,000 people. Among these foreigners the Board has 105 missionaries who supply 224 churches and mission stations.

Two faithful missionaries, assisted by a number of volunteer workers, are doing their best to give the gospel to 45,000 deaf-mutes. There have been organized for the deaf 116 classes in important centers.

Home Mission work among the Indians is located in North Carolina, Alabama, Florida, Mississippi, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Arizona. The total Indian population is 200,000. Many of these Indians have never heard a gospel sermon. Among the 40 tribes we have 62 missionaries who serve 289 churches and mission stations.

The present extent of our mission work in Panama is the Canal Zone, the two terminal cities, and the surrounding territory. In this field the Home Mission Board has 8 churches. 7 of these churches are composed of West Indian Negroes who were brought to the Canal Zone from Jamaica during construction days and have remained after the Canal was completed.

The Cuban field of the Home Mission Board includes the four western provinces of the island, with a population of 2,500,000. We now occupy 30 important centers in these provinces. There are 50

churches and 80 additional mission stations, making a total of 130 places of work, where 72 missionaries labor.

In New Orleans and Jacksonville the Home Mission Board maintains 2 Rescue Missions. Good-will centers are located in Christopher, East St. Louis, and Herrin, Illinois; and also in Birmingham, Baltimore and New Orleans. These Rescue Missions and Good-will Centers are doing a much needed mission work.

Dr. Noble Y. Beall, general missionary, and Rev. J. K. Hair, teacher in the Bible Department of Benedict College, Columbia, S. C., are our white workers among the Negroes. Our Home Mission Board cooperates with the Home Mission Board of the National Baptist Convention in the employment of 10 other missionaries. These workers last year opened 8 new missions, and preached regularly in 118 churches and mission stations.

Three years ago the Board began the tremendous task of evangelization in the mountains where little progress in religious life has been made for generations. Seven missionaries are now at work. Last year five churches were organized in these mountain sections.

Missionaries of the Home Mission Board are operating three schools in the homeland, not counting the eight mountain schools which are being run by local boards of trustees in property owned by the Board. These schools are the Anglo-Mexican Institute, El Paso, Texas; Acadia Academy, Church Point, Louisiana; and Mexican Baptist Institute, Bastrop, Texas.

Rev. Jacob Gartenhaus is the Board's lone missionary to 500,000 Jews in the South. His message of our responsibility to this race is receiving a wider and more sympathetic hearing each year.

The Department of Evangelism has been reestablished with Dr. Roland Q. Leavell as superintendent. The immediate reception and results of this new department testify to the great need.

The Home Mission Board also owns and controls the Southern Baptist Sanatorium, El Paso, Texas. This should be transferred to the Hospital Commission, and steps are being taken for the consideration of this transfer. The Board also has a building and loan department with \$1,084,060 loaned to churches.

The Board has endeavored faithfully to perform its stewardship by pushing the mission work, and at the same time handling its finances so as to retire the indebtedness. Practically one million dollars have been paid on the principal indebtedness since 1928. This calendar year the Board will pay at least \$150,000 on the principal.

The Home Mission Board gives its unqualified endorsement to the Hundred Thousand Club and sincerely hopes that it may be pushed to a successful consummation.

North Carolina Baptists have the right to be humbly grateful that they gave through the Cooperative Program to the Home Mission Board, during the calendar year 1936, more than any other state in the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Home Mission Board is not in the field for special designations, nor does it feel that it can conscientiously approve and promote by approval a movement for any particular Home Mission project so long as the Home Board is a part of a Cooperative Program of Southern Baptists and participates in this program with the implied understanding that our influence and effort as a denominational agency is to be used in the promotion of the Cooperative Program of Southern Baptists.

This Board does not want to suppress the religious impulses of any individual, for it believes that religion is a spontaneous expression of an inward dynamic towards righteousness, which dynamic is the result of the indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit. Therefore, it gladly accepts all gifts of money coming from individuals, when these gifts are the voluntary expression of the spiritual impulses of the soul.

The spirit and goal of the Home Mission Board may be correctly appraised by the remarks of the Secretary, Dr. J. B. Lawrence:

"I do not hesitate to say that, right now, the evangelization and

Christianization of the homeland is the most important and imperative task before Southern Baptists.

This is evident when we consider the menaces and dangers that now threaten the civilization of America and the world. These are so imminent and mighty that unless we marshal all our forces to meet them we will be overwhelmed and that right speedily. We must set ourselves heroically to the preaching of the gospel of Jesus Christ if we would save our country from becoming the center of an essentially pagan civilization.

Do we fully realize what is taking place here in the homeland? The forces at work are mighty and sinister. Communism, atheism, Sabbath desecration, lawlessness, the liquor traffic, race prejudice, and worldliness and materialism are undermining the spiritual foundations of our civilization. There is also the modern world spirit, the passion for possession, the revolt against tradition, the throwing off of the restraint of authority, crass materialism, racial antagonisms, and the castes of labor and capital, together with atheistic communism and a distinct drift toward anti-religious sentiments.

We cannot meet these mighty opponents of the cross of Christ in isolated groups. We must bring to bear upon the problems that confront us the impact of the whole denomination. The Home Mission Board ministers here.

68. Wm. Harrison Williams prayed and the session adjourned.

THURSDAY—Morning Session

Topic: "Christianity and Security in North Carolina."

69. Director Pinnix led the convention in singing "Holy, Holy, Holy," and "Jesus is All the World to Me".

70. The worship service was conducted by J. Ned Taylor, Winston-Salem. Song: "Blessed Assurance, Jesus is Mine".

71. Under Miscellaneous J. L. Peacock, Tarboro, made a brief statement upon the Baptist Foundation and Frank Hasty, spoke on the Relief and Annuity Board of which he is a field representative.

72. In keeping with previous notice John Arch McMillan introduced a Constitutional Amendment and upon his motion it was adopted to-wit:

"That in Article IV, Officers, Section 1 in line one after the word "President" omit "three Vice-Presidents" and insert "A First Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Third Vice-President".

73. J. A. McKaughan, Winston-Salem, submitted the following resolutions:

I. That the Committee on Social Service and Civic Righteousness be authorized and instructed to see if any way can be found to have its report presented yesterday published in pamphlet form for general and free distribution.

II. That the Committee on Social Service and Civic Righteousness be recognized as the authorized agent of the Convention to represent the Convention in all legislative and civic matters.

III. That said Committee be authorized within its discretion to secure a well poised and vigorous man to give all his time to the work of temperance, prohibition and civic righteousness as the representative of the Convention.

IV. That the Convention request Arthur J. Barton, Wilmington, to confer with Cale K. Burgess, Raleigh, of the United Dry Forces and with his cooperation arrange to call a meeting of interested citizens in North Carolina who are opposed to the liquor traffic and perfect an organization to continue and conduct an active program against the liquor traffic in every form whether legal or boot-leg.

Resolution number one was passed by the Convention upon motion by C. A. Upchurch, Raleigh.

On motion by J. A. McKaughan and Oscar Creech, Ahoskie, resolutions number two and four were referred to the Committee on Resolutions. (See Section 79, Page 38).

And resolution number three was referred to the General Board upon the motion of J. L. Peacock, Tarboro.

74. Department of Christian Education in the churches was the special order introduced by Secretary W. Perry Crouch, Raleigh, who called upon the following Divisional Heads who spoke their reports:

(a) L. L. Morgan, Raleigh, Sunday School Secretary, responded and recognized John B. Lane and Mrs. Lane and Mrs. Perry Crouch his associates.

(b) Nathan C. Brooks, Raleigh, Baptist Training Union Secretary, followed and at this time Secretary Crouch recognized Baptist Student Secretaries Zon Robinson, Wake Forest, and Miss Mildred Kichline, Meredith; also Caesar Herring, State B. S. U. President and Miss Laura Bateman, B. S. U. President at W. C. of U. N. C.

(c) Miss Cleo Mitchell, Greensboro Secretary Division of Student Activities and Miss Velma Presslar, Raleigh, Office Secretary and Field Worker closed the discussion on the Department of Christian Education on the College Campuses and in the Churches.

75. A Quartet composed of David Morgan and Archie McMillan, Wake Forest and Robert and Albert Simms sang "The Spacious Firmament on High".

76. There was presented at this point the following resolution by Arthur J. Barton, Wilmington, and upon motion it was referred to the Committee on Committees:

That a committee of fifteen from the State at large and representing as proportionately as possible all sections of the State be appointed to consider the advisability of enlarging our hospital program by the establishing of two additional hospitals one to be located in the South Central section and the other in the Eastern section of the state and to report at our next annual session.

77. General Secretary Huggins took charge of the Department of Missions Report (See Page 62) and after his introductory remarks various phases of the State Mission Program were discussed and emphasized by Departmental Personnel, Pastors and Laymen:

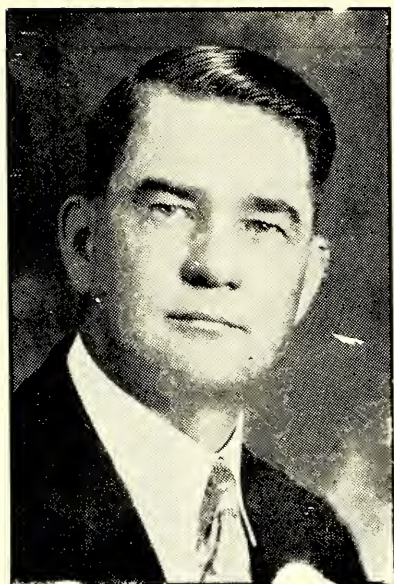

78. Zeno Wall, Shelby, requested and it was the pleasure of the Convention to recognize Mrs. J. Marcus Kester, Wilmington, wife of the beloved and late J. Marcus Kester, former pastor of Host Church.

79. The Resolutions Committee submitted through C. H. Durden, Charlotte, Chairman the following resolutions in lieu of those referred to them under a previous order (See Section 73, II, IV, page 37) and they were adopted upon motion of J. A. Easley, Wake Forest.

First: That the North Carolina Baptist State Convention express again our opposition to the liquor traffic in all its forms, legal or illegal.

Second: That we are in sympathy with all moral forces set for the doing away with this evil.



JOHN MARCUS KESTER

Born at Kings Mountain, N. C., April 26, 1887, the son of John and Margaret (Byrd) Kester. Student at Mars Hill College, graduating in 1910. In 1912 he finished Wake Forest College with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Studied at Newton Theological Seminary, Newton Center, Mass., 1912-1915. Did graduate work at Oxford, England, 1915. In 1933 Wake Forest College conferred on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. Married Miss Anna Elizabeth Lawson at Boston, June 14, 1915. Children: Gwendolyn Elizabeth; John Marcus Jr.; Evelyn Grace; Andrew Truett; Melvin Edwin; Robert Woodrow; Katheryn Christiana; Howard Emerson; Carolyn Marcia, and Marilyn Ann. At the time of his death, April 1, 1936, he was pastor of the First Baptist Church, Wilmington, and the North Carolina Representative on the Foreign Mission Board, which Board he served as Educational Secretary for two and one-half years prior to the beginning of his pastorate at Wilmington on September 1, 1924. His ministry included pastorates at Wilson and Shelby and he was an author of several religious booklets. Interment was made in Oakdale Cemetery, Wilmington.

80. Richard K. Redwine, Hickory, having previously given constitutional notice submitted the following amendment to the constitution and upon his motion it was approved, to-wit:

"That Article III, Meetings, Section 1 be amended as follows: That in line two after the word "November" a comma be inserted and this language added "Except in those years when the meeting date will fall in Thanksgiving week; in which case the Convention shall meet annually on Tuesday after the second Sunday in November."

81. Committee on Committee, *Chairman* Eugene I. Olive, submitted for the Committee and upon his motion the special committee authorized under (Section 76, Page 38) was released and approved (See Page 23).

82. "Beneath the Cross of Jesus" was the quartet number rendered by L. C. Pinnix, Louis S. Gaines, Charles Jollay and Albert Simms.

83. Vice-President Arthur J. Barton presided during the hour for the special address "Christ and Race" to have been delivered in person by Wm. Louis Poteat, Wake Forest; in the absence of the author his pastor, J. Allan Easley read President Poteat's manuscript.

84. The motion of T. H. King, Clinton, received enthusiastic support requesting the *Biblical Recorder* to print the President's address, and that if possible, the General Board have it printed in pamphlet form.

85. A vote of appreciation was voted J. Allan Easley, Wake Forest for the splendid reading of the address upon motion by Hugh A. Ellis, Wilson.

86. In keeping with the spirit of this address on "Christ and Race" John T. Wayland, Durham, submitted the following memorial which received the Convention's approval and by common consent it was agreed that the Memorial would be so worded as to be directed to the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention or to the steering Committee of the Baptist World Alliance.

A MEMORIAL

The North Carolina Baptist State Convention to the Brethren of the Southern Baptist Convention, Fraternal Greetings in Christ:

We, the members of the N. C. Baptist Convention, in session at the First Baptist Church in Wilmington, N. C., November 16-18, 1937, are happily anticipating the fellowship in Christ to be enjoyed at the meeting of the Baptist World Alliance in Atlanta, Ga., in August, 1939. In this fellowship as official delegates will be found Baptists of all races. It is our earnest desire and hope that this meeting of our brethren in Christ from many lands, held within the bounds of our Southern Baptist Convention, shall make a large contribution to interracial understanding and fellowship.

We humbly suggest that the Southern Baptist Convention assure the committee on arrangements of the Baptist World Alliance of its sincere purpose to cooperate to the end that the Christian fellowship of Baptists shall not be at all impaired, but, under God, rather strengthened and deepened in the spirit of our common Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

87. The prayer of benediction was offered by W. C. Summerville, Raleigh.

REPORT OF PUBLICITY COMMITTEE

The Publicity Committee wishes to express its appreciation of the inestimable services of the late Rev. Charles H. Dickey and to record its heart felt regret at his passing.

A few weeks ago the Committee asked J. A. McMillan, Thomasville, to undertake the publicity work for its Convention. He accepted after securing the assistance of David Morgan and Archie M. McMillan from the staff of *Old Gold and Black*, Wake Forest College, as reporters.

Not only has this committee furnished reams of Convention news but it has tried to interpret the proceedings of this body in such a way as to give a true sense of proportion and to avoid any traces of sensationalism. That this policy is in accordance with the desires not only of members of this Convention but also of editors over the State is attested by the fact that releases of unprecedented length have been eagerly received and used by the twenty leading dailies and eighty principal weekly County papers in North Carolina. Moreover, the two chief news agencies in America, the Associated Press and the United Press, have distributed this information not only throughout this state but throughout all the United States and over the world.

The following itemized report gives some idea as to the scope and quantity of the work done in North Carolina alone. This does not include material used by denominational papers or news printed outside the State. The quantity is indicated in number of words printed.

93. In memory of those departed this life since the last Convention, James B. Willis, Hamlet, *Chairman of Memorial Committee* spoke and J. M. Kincheloe, Rocky Mount, prayed, and upon recommendation of the committee the Convention voted that the 1937 Annual be dedicated to Charles H. Dickey, formerly of Raleigh and for several years the active publicity man and servant of the Convention.

94. The Cooperative Program of Southern Baptist was presented at this hour with *Promotion and Enlistment Chairman* Eugene I. Olive presiding. First to speak was General Secretary Huggins, followed by staff workers who have worked in Eastern Carolina, M. O. Alexander; in Central Carolina, W. Perry Crouch; and in Western Carolina, J. C. Pipes. These were followed by Grover H. Jones, High Point, who brought an inspirational message on the Cooperative Program.

95. Missionary John Lowe, Richmond, was recognized and he spoke out of the regular order.

96. Under the regular order A. D. Kinnett, Burlington, in presenting his address on "Baptist Working Together" first offered prayer and requested the singing of "Ninety and Nine" by L. C. Pinnix, accompanied by Mrs. Pinnix.

Song: "There Is a Fountain, Filled With Blood."

97. Election of Convention Officers:

(a) Prior to the election of the Convention Presidents and Vice Presidents, Vice President Simms requested General Secretary Huggins to preside who in turn asked J. Clyde Turner, Greensboro, to officiate. John Arch McMillan, Thomasville, announced it was the desire of President Wm. Louis Poteat that his name not be placed before the body. Thereafter Ira D. S. Knight, Durham, nominated Robert N. Simms for President, and after H. S. Brinson, Lewiston, moved that the Nominations close, J. Clyde Turner was directed, and he cast the vote of the Convention for the nominee.

Chairman Turner recognized Forest C. Feezor, Raleigh, President Simms pastor, who spoke words of commendation upon his election.

(b) Coming up next under the amended Constitution was the election of the 1st Vice President. Arthur J. Barton, Wilmington, was placed in nomination by L. R. O'Brian, Asheboro, and Recording Secretary Deane cast the Convention vote when nominations closed on John Arch McMillan's motion.

(c) George W. Paschal, Wake Forest, was named the 2nd Vice President by virtue of the Convention-vote cast by the Recording Secretary upon A. D. Kinnett's nomination and J. A. McMillan's motion.

(d) Upon the nomination of M. L. Bannister, Oxford, Hoyt Blackwell, Mars Hill, became the 3rd Vice President, when Ira D. S. Knight, Durham, moved that nominations close and the casting of the Convention's vote by the Recording Secretary.

98. President Simms was welcomed to the chair and responded and then called to the platform the newly elected Vice Presidents for their response.

99. Upon the motion of W. R. Cullum, Wake Forest, the report of the *Committee on Place and Preacher* as submitted by *Chairman* R. E. Breckhouse, Warrenton, was accepted which report revealed a strong invitation from

the Baptist Churches of Raleigh, together with urgent requests from the Mayor of the City and the Chamber of Commerce.

101. The Convention joined in the suggestion of the General Secretary that the Committee on Order of Business for 1938, if they deem it wise, consider building the program around the theme "The Impending Spiritual Revival."

102. W. L. Griggs, Charlotte, offered the following resolution and it was accepted by the Convention, upon the motion of Ira D. S. Knight, Durham.

RESOLUTION

That the Baptist State Convention respectfully request the General Board and our beloved General Secretary M. A. Huggins to carefully consider the advisability of creating as soon as practical a Department of Evangelism with a Superintendent whose duty it would be to direct a program of sane evangelism throughout the State and whose salary would be paid out of the general funds of the Convention.

108. The choir of the host church presented a special selection with a quartet composed of Mrs. L. W. Brinson, Miss Myrtle Burris, Vernon E. Cheek, W. E. Snokenburg, leading in the song "Thou Will Keep Him In Perfect Peace."

109. C. B. Deane, Rockingham, read the report coming from the Trustees of the Convention and was confirmed by the Convention upon the motion of J. L. Carrick, Mufreesboro.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION OF NORTH CAROLINA

The Board, composed of W. L. Poteat, Wake Forest; R. L. McMillan, Raleigh; and F. H. Brooks, Smithfield; was organized with W. L. Poteat, Chairman and R. L. McMillan, Secretary.

In accordance with instructions of the Baptist State Convention, session of 1936, the Trustees executed and delivered to the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company, Raleigh, N. C., a note in the sum of \$350,000. The note was dated December 21, 1936, and bears interest at 4%, and is payable as follows:

In accordance also with instructions of the Convention, the Trustees executed and delivered to the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company bonds in the amount of \$450,000 and designated as "Trustees of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, Meredith College, 5% Refunding Bonds." These bonds are serial bonds, forty in number, each in the principal sum of \$11,250, with interest from date, namely, February 1, 1937, at 5% the total aggregating \$450,000. The first of these bonds is due and payable May 1, 1942, and one each of the bonds is due and payable each three months thereafter until all are paid.

During the year the Trustees affected final settlement of the estate of O. L. Pittman and turned over the net amount, in the principal sum of \$7,500, to the Baptist Foundation.

The Trustees received also the J. Q. Adams Fund, established under the will of Wm. D. Adams, in the principal sum of \$2,000, and this likewise was turned over to the Baptist Foundation.

As required by the Convention we found upon examination that the Treasurer is bonded for \$25,000, the bookkeeper, Miss Esther Ivey, for \$10,000, and the bookkeeper of the Debt Service Fund, Miss Margie Murchison, for \$10,000.

110. Committeeman Yancey C. Elliott, Brevard, read the Report of the Committee to Report on General Board's Report, (See Section 121, page 56 ff), and upon his motion to adopt M. A. Huggins, observed that the report should be amended to include a recommendation adopted by but not included in the Report of the General Board to be designated as recommendation number 10, to-wit: "That the Convention make an annual appropriation to Campbell College of \$9,500.00 until it receives the legacy from the Rich Estate, *Unless* in the meantime it shall be found that the income of the Convention will not permit this to be done which fact is to be determined by the State Secretary in consultation with the General Board." The amendment followed by the Committee Report were adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO REPORT ON GENERAL BOARD'S REPORT

Your committee has examined with care the report of the General Board made to this Convention, with respect both to its factual content and its recommendations.

We commend the Board for its action in its June meeting in undertaking an appropriation to the educational institutions for current support, particularly in view of the fact that for many years past no institution has received any money whatever for current support. We are glad that once more every institution and agency we have is now receiving some help from the Cooperative Program.

We rejoice in the evidence of substantial achievements in every department of the work fostered by the Convention and by its General Board.

It is our desire to call particular attention to the faithful and untiring services and notable achievements of Mr. M. A. Huggins and all those associated with him in the work of our denomination.

We recommend that the report as presented, together with its nine recommendations, be adopted without a single change. Particularly we wish to commend recommendations 7 and 8 as worthy progressive steps, and urge full cooperation of the churches in the attaining of these goals.

116. The Convention authorized the likeness of the late J. Marcus Kester, Wilmington, former pastor of the Host Church, to appear in the 1937 Annual, upon motion by H. S. Satterfield.

117. 1st. Vice President Barton presided during the final recognition and response from the Host Pastor, Sankey L. Blanton, and upon the suggestion of the 1st Vice President the Convention voted its thanks and admiration to President Simms for his splendid presiding officers.

118. Prior to the final address of the session by Hoyt Blackwell, Mars Hill, on the subject "Christ and the Emerging World Culture," the Convention sang "Thou Will Keep Him In Perfect Peace."

119. The *Biblical Recorder* was asked to print this address upon motion by Ira D. S. Knight, Durham.

120. Adjournment was in order upon the motion by W. R. 121.

INTRODUCTION

We would, first of all, record our gratitude to God for His continued blessings upon our Baptist people.

In many respects, probably in most respects, this year, 1937, is the best year we have experienced in, perhaps, a decade. We believe the spiritual condition of the churches, taken on the whole, offers a reasonable ground for encouragement. Hundreds of gracious revivals have been held; there are fewer pastorless churches than in many years; there are signs of a spiritual awakening; and there is a growing interest in New Testament stewardship. The net gain in total membership may not be as large as in many former years. This circumstance should not be alarming, however, since it is well known that many churches have undertaken a revision of their church rolls. We know of one large church recently which removed from its rolls four to five hundred names. A better index of the vitality of the churches is the number of baptisms. Another evidence of interest is the fact that scores of churches are repairing and beautifying their buildings, or making additions to them. The Board, with only a small amount in the budget for Church Building Aid, has been flooded with requests for help.

At best, however, the spiritual condition of the churches is a qualitative matter and must, accordingly, rest largely upon intangible evidence. When we turn to the quantitative aspects of the work of the churches and the Convention we have abundant evidence of substantial achievements on every hand. The increase in gifts for all the objects which the Convention fosters shows about twenty per cent advance over the year 1936. We believe this to be the greatest advance made in any single year during the past fifteen years. We have been advancing steadily since the low year of 1933; but the advance this year is the greatest we have experienced. Surely there is ground for deep gratitude and pardonable pride. There is no room, however, for complacency. We ought to consider seriously some facts.

The per member annual support of all Convention objects during the decade 1910-1919, inclusive, was \$.93. For the decade 1920-1929, inclusive, the amount was \$2.46. For the eight year period 1929-1937, inclusive, the amount was (about) \$1.26. The present advance *must* continue if we are to reach by 1940 the level of giving attained during the decade 1920-1929.

Consider again. One in a position to know has given the following analysis of the membership of the average church:

Five per cent do not exist.

Ten per cent cannot be found.

Twenty-five per cent rarely, if ever, attend church.

Fifty per cent contribute little or nothing to the church.

Seventy-five per cent never attend the mid-week prayer service.

Ninety per cent do not have family worship.

Ninety-five per cent never make a definite effort to win a lost soul to Christ. We record this analysis here in the hope that the responsible leadership of the churches will face, honestly and realistically, the issues involved.

Consider again. Those who have spiritual insight and those who deeply care know that vital religion today faces a crisis. For heretofore the issues have been in the main between different kinds of religion or between different interpretations of it. Now, however, the issues seem to be between religion of any kind and a pagan materialism. Recently a church was asked to increase its support of missions for another year. A leader of this church expressed the opinion that this could not be done because termites were attacking the foundation of the building, and something had to be done about it. These visible enemies are to be feared. But infinitely more to be feared is that invisible enemy, pagan materialism, which is attacking the very vitals of the church itself.

We repeat again. There is abundant reason for gratitude and for a pardonable pride in the achievements of the year. There is no room for complacency on the one hand nor for pessimism on the other. Rather there is a clear call for an honest diagnosis and an heroic effort to prescribe and apply the remedy which is available. A spiritual awakening is a prime necessity now.

We may go a step further in an effort to measure the progress we are making. This we may do in terms of objectives which were adopted in 1933.

122.

I. OUR OBJECTIVES

In parentheses we give the figures for last year and for the years preceding, in so far as this is possible. The figures in the first parentheses are for the year immediately preceding; and in the second parentheses the figures for the next preceding year, etc., are given.

1. Every church with a pastor.

It is estimated that on October 1, 1937, 100 (150) (160) (175) (200), churches were without pastors.

2. A revival in each church—at least one each year.

Accurate figures are not available, but the Minutes of 1936 show that 1,785 (1,783) (1,797) (1,792), churches reported baptisms while 666 (653) (613) (593) did not. Taking the state as a whole, 18,849 baptisms were reported in 1936, 18,768 in 1935, 19,670 in 1934, 20,038 in 1933 and 23,342 in 1932.

3. Every church with a Sunday school enrollment at least as large as the church membership.

For the year 1936 783 (854) (863) (810) (912) of the 2,437 Sunday schools in the state met this requirement.

4. Every church with a B. T. U.

As of October 1, 1937 1,097 (950) (1,050) (1,043) (975) of the 2,451 churches had a B. T. U. organization.

5. Every church with a W. M. S.

As of October 1, 1937, 1,176 (1,156) (1,153) (1,100) (1,118) of the 2,451 churches had a W. M. S.

6. At least 500,000 members by 1940, with all church rolls corrected.

The Minutes of 1936 show a membership of 465,698 (458,517) (450,770) (440,602) (433,046).

7. **Every Association with a representative Promotion-Executive Committee, or its equivalent, that functions throughout the year, led by the Moderator or the Chairman of the Promotion-Executive Committee, who will visit and encourage the churches.**

Probably about 50 (45) (40) (33) of the 70 associations are meeting this requirement in whole or in part. Only a few moderators, however, visit the churches.

8. **A ten days' school, or schools, for Christian workers held each year with an attendance of at least 1,000.**

In the three pastors' schools provided at Meredith, Chowan and Mars Hill about 300 (250) (225) (192) pastors were enrolled.

9. **At least 2,500 college students enrolled in our Baptist colleges.**

For the year ending June, 1937, there were enrolled 2,778 (2,419) (2,415) (2,229) college students. This does not include 982 (1,029) (691) (651) which were enrolled in the Wake Forest-Meredith summer school at Wake Forest and Mars Hill.

10. **Two general state missionaries giving their full time to the development of our churches, missionary instruction, forming fields, et cetera, especially in the rural churches.**

We have two general missionaries, M. O. Alexander and J. C. Pipes.

11. **A club of Charity and Children in every Baptist Sunday school.**

For the calendar year 1936 671 (733) (772) (678) (781) Sunday schools had a club of Charity and Children.

12. **Twenty-five thousand subscribers to the Biblical Recorder, including every pastor, every Sunday school superintendent, every W. M. S. president or leader, and every B. T. U. leader or director.**

As of October, 1937, the circulation of the Biblical Recorder was 12,600 (13,200) (10,500) (10,400) (8,000). Of the 1,137 ordained ministers who were pastors 620 (625) (605) (727) (582) were taking the Recorder; 100 (105) (97) (97) (78) of the 640 ordained ministers not in the pastorate were taking it; 430 (440) (410) (396) (317) of the 2,437 Sunday school superintendents, and 440 (425) (393) (377) (302) of the 1,176 W. M. S. presidents were taking it.

13. **Every institution and agency of the Convention living within its income.**

Chowan College shows an operating deficit of about \$5,500; that of Meredith is about \$1,900.

14. **No borrowing by the Convention, or its institutions or agencies, of any funds for any purpose, except in anticipation of current income.**

No funds for current support have been borrowed this year.

15. **A fifty-fifty division of distributable or undesignated funds as between State and Southwide objects.**

For 1937 the Co-operative Program (Undesignated), receipts are divided on the 60-40 basis, 60 for State and 40 for Southwide objects.

16. **An annual income, designated and undesignated of \$450,000 for the fiscal year 1934; \$500,000 for 1935; \$550,000 for 1936; \$600,000 for 1937; \$660,000 for 1938; \$725,000 for 1939, and \$800,000 for 1940.**

Our total income for 1936, designated and undesignated, was \$526,213, 96. Thus we fell short of the goal set by about \$24,000.

17. **Every church contributing through the Co-operative Program, including both designated and undesignated funds.**

For 1936 1,949 (1,877) (1,796) (1,648) (1,607) of the 2,451 churches reported funds given through the Co-operative Program or to some object in the Co-operative Program, leaving 502 (559) (614) (737) (767) that made no contribution.

18. **Every church and Sunday school contributing to the Orphanage.**

For 1936 1,969 (1,944) (1,920) (1,728) (1,686) churches made some contribution to the Orphanage, leaving 482 (492) (490) (657) (688) that did not.

19. **Every Sunday school contributing and remitting to the Orphanage once each month.**

During 1936 305 (218) (269) (230) Sunday schools met this requirement, leaving 2,132 (2,212) (2,115) (2,155) that did not.

20. **Every church making a Thanksgiving offering for the Orphanage.**

1,726 (1,752) (1,659) (1,515) (1,056) churches or Sunday schools made a Thanksgiving offering in 1936 to the Orphanage, leaving 1,202 (684) (751) (870) (1,348) that did not.

21. **Every church and Sunday school making an offering on Mothers' Day for the Hospital.**

On Mothers' Day 1937 about 1,937 (1,508) (1,706) (1,308) (1,062) churches or Sunday schools made an offering to the Hospital. Notice that the number making an offering on this day is the same as the year, viz., 1937.

22. **Every church making a remittance to the Convention Treasurer at least once a month.**

For the year 1936 417 (328) (359) (215) (197) churches met this requirement.

123 II. REPORT OF GENERAL BOARD MEETINGS

In accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, we report here the principal actions of the General Board taken at its meetings in December, 1936, and June, 1937. We omit from this summary some matters which are recorded elsewhere in the report.

1. At the December meeting of the Board Rev. Nathan C. Brooks, Jr., then pastor at Bryson City, N. C., was named, upon the recommendations of a special committee, as B. T. U. Secretary. Mr. Brooks came with the Board from a successful pastorate. He is unusually well trained for this task. His training was received at Wake Forest College and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Following that he was for some time assistant pastor at

Broadway Church of Knoxville, Tenn. He has all the qualities of mind and heart and mental alertness needed for this work. In fact he is eminently fitted to lead the training forces in our state on and up. The Board felt fortunate in being able to secure him for this important place.

2. In adopting the budget the Board raised the salaries of all general workers about ten per cent, thus restoring salaries to the level of the year 1932, or, to be more specific, the first half of that year. The auditor's report, which will be attached to this report prior to its publication in the Minutes, will give information as to the salary paid each of the general staff workers.

3. A committee was appointed to visit, study and report on the proper disposition of the boyhood homestead of George W. Truett, which the Convention ordered the Board to purchase last year. The committee named was composed of Perry Morgan, E. Gibson Davis, R. K. Redwine, Broadus E. Wall and J. R. Morgan.

4. At the June meeting of the Board Mr. John B. Lane and Mrs. John B. Lane were called to become field workers with the Sunday School Division of our general work, at salaries of \$1,800 and \$600, respectively. Prior to this time Mr. Morgan was the only full time worker in this division. The Board was able to call this talented and consecrated couple into the work because of the cooperation of the Sunday School Board, which Board agreed to pay the State Convention \$2,400 a year in lieu of the \$1,800 previously expected.

5. The Board adopted a plan which provides for a retirement allowance for all employees of the Board. The plan provides for the payment of three per cent of the salary of each employee monthly, the employees in turn paying three per cent of their salaries. The plan provides that upon the age of retirement, and after twenty-five years of service, the employee will receive about half of the average salary received during his term of employment with the Board.

6. The Board committed itself to active participation in the Hundred Thousand Club. On motion it was agreed: (1) That division of the funds be upon the basis of 50-50, that is, half for state debts and the other half for south-wide debts; (2) that the program be launched not later than July 1, and that all members of the general staff engage in the promotion thereof; (3) that at least five thousand members be secured at the earliest possible time, and that a goal be set for each association. Finally it was provided that present members of the club, whose gifts are now going to southwide objects, shall be privileged to designate what, if any, part of their gifts should go to state objects and what part to southwide objects.

7. The following actions were also taken:

"The recent action of the Executive Committee was approved relative to the appropriations made by the 1935 Convention to Forest Avenue Church upon motion by R. K. Redwine, provided definitely: (1) that the total sum given shall not exceed \$50,000; (2) that with the final appropriation from the Convention of its share of \$50,000 such sums of money shall have been paid or secured by the Church to assure a completed building; (3) that the General Secretary will be furnished with full and complete plans and purposes by the Forest Avenue Church from time to time for the benefit of this Board, which will assure the Convention that the membership can go forward with the enterprise, and upon the failure so to do the General Secretary shall not make the payments as designated.

"A motion by J. R. Morgan carried with the provision that an additional sum of \$375 be appropriated during this calendar year to the Negro work, with the right reserved to the General Secretary, with the approval of the Executive Committee, to revise the amount downward if it appears necessary in order to balance the budget.

"The following general outline for the promotion plans this fall were adopted as worthy of our churches' active support upon motion by A. P. Stephens: (1) that we set our goal for 1938 at \$550,000, including gifts to the Hundred Thousand Club, but exclusive of all gifts to the Orphanage; and that the goal for the Orphanage be set at \$150,000; (2) that we attempt, as a part of our promotion plans, to secure at least 5,000 members of the Hundred Thousand Club; that we attempt also to secure 40,000 tithers in North Carolina, and that we embody this goal in the following challenge: 'At least a tithe from at least a tithe of our membership'; (3) that we call upon all our agencies and institutions to lend their efforts toward getting this \$550,000 subscribed this fall.

"J. Henry Highsmith spoke in complimentary terms of the Baptist Annual, edited by C. B. Deane, the Convention Recording Secretary, and made a motion that he be paid the sum of \$200 with an additional sum of \$25 for expenses, totaling \$225, for this service. The motion carried."

III. NEXT STEPS

1. We believe the time has come when the State Convention ought to undertake a program which will ultimately provide a *Retirement Allowance* for every bona fide Baptist minister, and other denominational employee, when the age of 65 or 68 has been reached. The Annuity Board is attacking the problem but of necessity the approach is to the individual church. A number of our North Carolina churches have entered this individual plan, and we commend them heartily. They have laid a foundation on which we hope to build further. But we believe that to approach the problem on a state-wide scale, rather than from the standpoint of individual churches, will be much more effective. It would take many field secretaries, covering a period of years, to reach our churches as individual units. The State Convention plan would make an appeal to all churches at the same time. This group plan would overcome many weaknesses of the individual plan. For instance, (1) it would be less expensive; (2) it would remove the personal element, which has caused many of our best ministers to hesitate to present the question to their churches; (3) and it would provide for the continuance of premium payments in the case of a minister moving from one church to another. It is clear to us that the Convention can and ought to adopt a plan which will provide that an annual fund be secured from which there would be set aside monthly, quarterly or semi-annually, for the benefit of each pastor wishing to participate and willing to co-operate, an amount equal to the sum which the pastor himself would pay.—within reasonable limits, of course. It is believed that a small percentage of the Co-operative Program, plus a worthy offering once a year from the churches, would provide the annual amount necessary. It may be that only an humble beginning can be made now; but we believe it ought to be made. Every institution and agency we now have had such a beginning; and some began without Convention aid. Their continuance, however, has depended upon the support,

moral and financial, of the Convention. We believe the Convention ought to take the lead in this worthy enterprise now. And we have been informed that other Conventions are taking a similar attitude in the matter. (See Recommendations).

2. Our institutions and agencies are not receiving the support from the Co-operative Program which they so greatly need. Multiplied thousands in our churches are contributing week by week but the amounts are small. Hundreds and thousands of our Baptist men and women who are able to give large amounts have not been led, and apparently will not soon be led, to contribute weekly in proportion to their ability. Another plan ought then to supplement and complement the Co-operative Program. These individuals must be approached for large gifts, and by one who has the "gift" for such a task, in an effort to secure the funds necessary for endowment, buildings, and special projects. There are many of our people, and some who are outside our churches, whom God has blessed richly. It is believed that some could be led to provide for an institution or agency in their wills; some could provide insurance policies, some could give large amounts in cash, and some could create Living Trusts. Moreover, it appears that the taxing policies of the Federal and State Governments would prove advantageous to such an undertaking on our part.

In short, the fields appear ready for harvest. No single institution or agency, however, acting alone is perhaps able to put in the field a man capable of doing well the job we have outlined. It appears, therefore, to us that wisdom suggests a co-operative plan whereby each institution and agency would contribute annually to a general fund an amount agreed upon in advance, but subject to revision, the total amount to be large enough to secure the best available man. In approaching men and women who could make large gifts he could present not one proposition but perhaps a dozen. Moreover, it is believed that a man could be secured who would be wise enough to see the needs of all the institutions and big enough not to press the claims of any one institution over another. Also such a man would not interfere in the least with any particular prospect or proposition which in the judgment of any institution could best be handled by itself acting alone. We believe that this plan, or something similar to it, should be put in operation as soon as possible. (See Recommendations).

125. **IV. DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS**

A. HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

During the twelve months ending September 30, 1937, we have forwarded for all Southwide objects \$183,420.64. During a corresponding period ending September 30, 1936, we forwarded \$173,819.90, a gain of \$9,600.74. For the year ending September 30, 1935, we forwarded \$148,803.53. Undesignated funds for Southwide objects, after deducting \$25,000 annually for Southern Baptist Convention Bonds, are divided as follows:

B. STATE MISSIONS

We are operating during 1937 on an enlarged budget. In fact we expect to expend more in 1937 than we receive, due to a balance on hand at the close of 1936. We anticipate no debt, however. Even so we are expending only about half as much as we were expending about ten years ago.

We call attention to the enlarged and enlarging task of State Missions. A glance at the several activities as recorded in this Section B of this report will give one a comprehensive idea of the varied tasks of State Missions. Moreover, a study of the following facts offers abundant evidence that we have a gigantic task ahead of us if we are to take North Carolina for Christ.

1. North Carolina, when compared with the other 48 states of the Union, ranks first in homicides, ninth in rape, thirteenth in auto thefts, seventeenth in burglary.

2. There are perhaps two hundred thousand members of Baptist churches who are doing little or nothing to advance His Kingdom in North Carolina and elsewhere.

3. There are perhaps two hundred thousand church members, that is to say, about one-half the total membership, who do not attend with regularity any Sunday school at all.

4. Probably two-thirds of our young people are wholly without any definite and specific training in the churches.

5. There are probably two hundred and fifty thousand Negro Baptists in the state for whom their white brethren are doing but little by way of encouragement and support.

6. There are scores of places in North Carolina where probably no religious services at all would be held were it not for the help that State Missions is trying to extend; and there are many places where religious services ought to be held but cannot because the State Convention does not have the funds with which to provide those religious services.

7. There are nearly ten thousand prisoners in the State Prison system, hundreds of whom are being released every month, but for whom our Convention and churches are doing nothing, or next to nothing, to set their feet again in the right path.

The Convention of 1936 authorized the Board to inaugurate, if possible, "A ministry to the prisoners, whether in prison or on parole." We must report now that due to lack of funds this work could not be begun. Surely, however, we should begin this work at the earliest possible moment.

127.

1. GENERAL MISSIONARIES

We record again our appreciation of the effective work of General Missionaries M. O. Alexander and J. C. Pipes. We are advancing along many

lines, and this advance is due in large measure to their efficient and sacrificial services. In the main they are giving their time to Church Revivals, to Pastors' Revivals, conferences and schools, and to leadership meetings in the several associations.

Since the last Convention Rev. Charles H. Dickey, who until January 1, 1937, was also a General Missionary, has passed. We record here our lasting appreciation for his distinguished services to the Convention. In particular we are appreciative of his services as Publicity Director. For many years he reported the annual meeting of this body for the daily press. Due to the quality of his work and to the very close contact he had with the men in command of the news-gathering agencies of the state, our Baptist Program was presented to the people of the state in admirable fashion. Moreover, the page in the Biblical Recorder which he wrote had a quality about it which made it at once both effective and readable. We record our appreciation all the more readily because it is now known that he labored under difficulty during most of the sixteen months when he was an employee of the Convention. He was not a well man; and yet his close associates heard no complaint from him at any time. Surely the Convention sustained a severe loss with his passing.

We submit here a brief summary of the activities of Missionaries Alexander and Pipes.

128. (a.) REPORT OF GENERAL MISSIONARY M. O. ALEXANDER

This report covers in briefest outline my activities from November 1, 1936, to October 31, 1937.

I am happy to report a fine spirit of willingness to co-operate everywhere I have touched our work. There are, I think, some very definite indications of a spiritual awakening in many of our churches.

The people of our denomination and churches have received me kindly, and have been a great blessing to me personally. I am encouraged to give my best to our Lord and to our Baptist cause.

129. (b.) REPORT OF GENERAL MISSIONARY J. C. PIPES

A brief report of my activities during the year, October 1, 1936-September 30, 1937, follows:

During the fall of 1936 eight Stewardship Revivals of six days each were conducted in associations in western North Carolina.

Assisted in the Stewardship Revival in the Mount Zion Association, in Durham.

Aided in Stewardship Revivals in East Belmont and Siler City churches.

During the spring attended and spoke in several Men's Meetings.

Conducted during the spring seven one-week meetings.

During summer and early fall conducted twenty-one preliminary associational meetings.

Attended and spoke in fourteen annual associational meetings.

Attended and spoke in one regional B. T. U. meeting, one W. M. U. meeting, one Sunday School Convention.

Held twelve one-day associational meetings in which plans were made for Stewardship Revivals.

Conducted two Preachers' Revivals of one week each in the Tennessee River and Tuckaseegee Associations. In these two meetings thirty-seven preachers were enrolled and a number of laymen and women attended.

Supplied in ten churches during the year in addition to the above activities.

Numerous conferences were held with individual pastors and churches concerning their problems.

In closing let me make this general observation of the work in the territory where we labor. The general outlook is good. Our people seem to have the spirit of discipleship. They are seeking to know the will of the Master, and we believe with a desire to do His will. There is a better day for Baptists in the land. The Lord has decreed that the Kingdoms of this world are to become the Kingdom of our Lord and his Christ.

3. CHURCH BUILDING AID

The Board is extending every aid possible to a few churches as they attempt to build, to lift debts, and, in a few instances, to provide much needed repairs. Years ago a program was begun looking toward the erection of a first class church building in each of the educational centers of the state, or hard by the campus of each school. Only one of these has been completed and paid for, viz., the one at Chapel Hill. The plant at Boone is completed though not paid for. The one at Cullowhee is incomplete and the need for about \$5,000 with which to complete it is very urgent. The same may be said for Pullen Memorial in Raleigh, although the amount needed there is much larger, perhaps \$25,000. In accordance with the action of the Convention we have paid \$5,000 of the \$20,000 promised to the Forest Avenue Church in Greensboro, and another \$5,000 is on hand for this purpose. We are aiding the churches at Murfreesboro and Wingate as they attempt to lift burdensome debts.

In addition to these, we hope to aid about a dozen others during the current year. We do not publish the list because some requests have not been approved. It seemed the part of wisdom to wait until the amount of the special State Mission offering, a part of which does not reach the Board until about December 1, is known. We ought to add that already we have requests for aid in 1938 which total far more than we are likely to receive for this purpose. In fact we could expend very profitably three to four times as much as we are receiving.

4. WORK AMONG THE INDIANS

We record again our appreciation of the work of Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Lunsford among the Indians of Robeson County. The work among the Cherokee Indians in Swain County is provided for by the Home Mission Board. We give a brief report of the work of Mr. and Mrs. Lunsford from October 1, 1936 through September 30, 1937.

5. WORK WITH OUR NEGRO BROTHERS

We record again our joy because of the progress which the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina is making under the leadership of Rev. W. C. Somerville. We are happy to have a small part in making this program possible. In July the Board took another step, thus making it possible for this Convention to employ another man, Rev. J. H. Clanton, who is giving his time largely to Sunday school work. We record here a brief report of the work of Prother Somerville and of Brother Clanton.

My task and achievements may be summarized as follows :

1. To seek to enthrone the Lord Jesus in the lives of the Negro Baptists of North Carolina and make them conscious of their task in the Kingdom Program.
2. To make a careful study of our present Negro Baptist organizations in North Carolina.
3. To win the confidence of both ministers and laymen (The General Secretary is under a fiduciary bond).
4. Co-operated in holding a Minister's Conference-Institute at Shaw University in June which was largely attended and will become an annual feature of our program.
5. Put into operation our Unified Program. This plan seeks to have each of our local churches send up a monthly contribution to the office of the General Secretary, who apportions all undesignated funds: 30% State Missions, 30% Foreign Missions, 40% Christian Education. (This program was put into operation on January 1, 1937 and to date we have 205 churches that have accepted the plan). Sixty-four percent of these churches have responded with financial contributions to the amount of \$2,509.51. The significance of this is seen in the fact that there has been an increase in our total collections this year over that of last year of \$2,921.96.
6. Our entire state program has been organized into departments such as departments of: Religious Education, Missions, Training, Benevolence, Women's Work, Publication, and Evangelism.
7. We have sought to put special emphasis this year upon the development of our christian educational program:
 - A. We have employed Rev. J. H. Clanton to give his full time to the development of our Sunday School work. This was made possible through the generosity of the Baptist State Convention which has undertaken to contribute \$750.00 per annum towards his salary and expenses.
 - B. The program of our regular State Sunday School Convention has been changed so as to make it a Sunday School Worker's Conference. During the recent month of August excellent service was rendered these workers by Miss Velma Preslar, Mrs. C. D. Bain, and Mr. Claude Gaddy of the Baptist State Convention.
 - C. At our General Convention a committee will report as to plans and methods in organizing the Baptist College students in the various Colleges in North Carolina.
 - D. Consideration will also be given towards the organization of our boys between the ages of 8-16.
8. The spirit of racial good-will appears to be on the increase throughout the state. Our white brethren have been most cordial in their consideration of our work, and my brethren are deeply appreciative of the same.
9. These are definite signs of moral and spiritual growth among our congregations throughout the state.
10. During the past twelve months I have:
 - Preached 150 sermons
 - Delivered 248 Lectures
 - Visited 686 ministers
 - Spoken to approximately 30,000 persons at various meetings and traveled 26,972 miles.

11. With the continued support of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, I hope to achieve the following objectives during the future::
1. To increase the number of churches supporting our Unified Program.
 2. To continue towards the complete coordination of all of our denominational work in the State.
 3. To enlarge our program of Religious Education so as to have a staff of trained Sunday School and B. T. U. officers in each local church—Bro. Clanton has a well planned program looking towards this end.
 4. To continuously work towards the moral, intellectual, and spiritual development of our clergy and laity so as to speedily usher in the Kingdom of our Lord and His Christ.

134.

6. THE OTEEN MISSION

Rev. Wayne Williams continues his faithful ministry to the sick at Oteen. For this work the Board is making an appropriation of \$660. In addition we are happy to report that several states, from which patients in the hospital there come, are also making appropriations as follows: Alabama \$45; Georgia \$100; Florida \$100; South Carolina \$75; Tennessee \$100; Virginia \$100.

A brief report of Pastor Williams follows:

With the signing of the armistice on November 11, 1918, the greatest war in history came to a close. Its repercussions, however, are still being felt around the world. One of its most pathetic phases was the large army of sick and disabled men left doomed to early death or long invalidism. There are at present 55,000 of these disabled American World War veterans, confined in seventy-five large government hospitals, covering the nation from coast to coast.

In the mountains of Western North Carolina Uncle Sam maintains the largest tubercular institution in the entire Veterans Administration System. There are 875 beds. The men die on an average of four a week. Their families, many back home and many of them living on Oteen hill near the hospital, carry on with anxious and troubled hearts.

For many years Southern Baptists—and since 1930, North Carolina Baptists—have furnished a ministry of evangelism and comfort to these sick soldiers and their families. Through the Oteen Baptist Church and through daily visitation in the hospital by our representative, we are endeavoring to bring a little sunshine into shadowed lives. The gospel is being preached and taught to them; Christian literature is distributed; letters are written home to loved ones; sinners are saved; saints are comforted, and the program of the meek and lowly Jesus carried out in their midst.

135.

7. AID TO THE DEAF

We have provided a small sum in the budget for a ministry to the deaf in our state. Mr. W. R. Hackney of Charlotte gives part time to this work, largely as a labor of love since our appropriation hardly covers traveling expenses. Mr. Hackney has visited groups gathered, mostly on Sundays, in Concord, Kannapolis, Winston-Salem, High Point and Salisbury. In meeting these groups he has traveled 612 miles and had in attendance in his classes 77 persons. This covers only the period from January through September of this year.

136.

8. SANATORIUM AND SAMARCAND

Rev. E. M. Harris, pastor at Aberdeen, carries on with a ministry to the sick at Sanatorium and to the girls at Samarcand. Brief reports follow:

At the Sanatorium, one will find about 500 hopeful tubercular patients to whom we try to bring a little more hope and Gospel cheer. Many of them are confined to their beds and listen-in as the services are broadcast. Great numbers are able to attend the preaching services and Sunday School. All are appreciative of any attention paid them. In addition to the preaching services held every Sunday by a local pastor, a Sunday School is maintained and conducted by the members of the Institution. Personal visits and prayer meetings are a part of your representative's duties. Those in charge are glad to have the pastors visit the patients. If friends will write us about their loved ones at Sanatorium, we would be glad to look them up and render any service possible.

137.

SAMARCAND

This year we have baptized 45 girls at Samarcand, placed Bibles in all the cottages, furnished Baptist catechisms for all the Baptist girls, and once each month have helped preaching services in the Chapel. Aberdeen deacons and the pastor, at the request of the Church, observe the Lord's Supper with our Baptist girls once a year. The Superintendent and her helpers at Samarcand co-operate in every way possible with us in our work. When a Baptist girl leaves the Institution, we are given her address. We then write the pastor of her home town and ask him to follow up the work. This necessitates quite a bit of correspondence on our part during the year but we feel the effort is worth while. The greatest need of the Samarcand girls is to realize that somebody cares for them and believes in them.

During the past summer a special project at East Carolina Training School at Rocky Mount was undertaken. In this institution there are about 150 boys. At the request of the management, Mr. Jesse Wester, now in the seminary, was sent there for about twelve weeks during the summer. He lived with the boys, played with them, taught them, and preached to them. The superintendent, Mr. Samul E. Leonard, was high in his praise of Mr. Wester as a man, and of his influential work with the boys.

Also we mention the fact that the state is opening another sanitarium near Black Mountain. It is hoped that we can begin there at once a work similar to that which Brother Harris is doing at Sanatorium.

138.

9. PASTOR'S CIRCULATING LIBRARY

In this library we now have about 500 books. We have continued to send out books on request all during the year, thus rendering the pastors a very valuable service.

We would urge the pastors to send to the office in Raleigh any books they can spare which they think would be helpful to their brother pastors. We would urge them also to avail themselves of this service. The office in Raleigh agrees to send two books to any pastor requesting them. The Board will pay the postage. The only expense to the pastor is postage for returning the books to the Raleigh office. A card to the General Secretary will bring full information.

139.

10. PASTORS' SCHOOL AND CONFERENCES

During the early part of the year about fifteen one and two day conferences were held. The general theme of these conferences was "The Impending Spiritual Awakening." Probably no more important meetings are held during the

year than these quiet conferences. About four hundred pastors attended. We believe they should be continued. In some associations they are being lengthened to a week. It is our hope to plan and conduct several one-week meetings next spring in several associations in the upper Piedmont and mountain associations.

We provided three regular Pastor's Schools last summer of one week each, one at Mars Hill, one at Meredith, and one at Murfreesboro. The program directors were Rev. G. C. Cox, Rev. T. H. King and Rev. Oscar Creech, and to these the thanks of the Convention are due. We are indebted also to Dr. Hersey Davis, Dr. B. W. Spilman, and Dr. Walt N. Johnson, who did some very effective teaching. In fact we doubt if it was surpassed anywhere. Notable addresses were made at Mars Hill by Dr. W. R. Burrell, Dr. Olin T. Binkley, Dr. Ralph H. Herring, and others; and at Meredith by Dr. W. L. Poteat, Dr. Sparks W. Melton, Dr. Charles E. Maddry and Dr. Bernard C. Clausen. At Chowan the Pastors School was combined with an Assembly.

While the attendance at Meredith and Chowan was relatively small, that at Mars Hill was most gratifying. Thanks to the contributions made by the men in the more than fifty Mens' Meetings held in the state, we were able to pay the expenses of about seventy pastors, most of whom attended the Mars Hill school. Considering the attendance and the spirit manifested at Mars Hill, we doubt if any work of more far reaching importance is being done by the Board. We hope for an attendance of at least two hundred at Mars Hill and two hundred at Meredith in the summer of 1938.

140. V. DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

It will be recalled that we are attempting to think of Christian Education as one great task, whether it be undertaken by the churches in their buildings, or by Christian colleges on their campuses. Under the present set up, Sunday School, B. T. U., B. S. U., and Brotherhood work is accordingly combined in one department which we call *Christian Education in the Churches*. As Secretary of this Department Mr. Crouch has aided in the planning of the work of the Sunday School and B. T. U. Divisions, and has given some time to their work. His personal attention has been devoted largely, however, to B. S. U., to the Brotherhood, and to the promotion of Stewardship Revivals in the churches. In the B. S. U. he has the able assistance of Miss Velma Preslar who has also given, in addition to office work, some time to the Sunday School and B. T. U. Divisions.

We are working slowly to a closer coordination and combination of all these divisions of our work. We believe we are going in the right direction. In fact the problem is one of a redirection of varied activities into a well integrated whole. Mr. Crouch has shown an unusual grasp of the problem involved, and has given his time and thought day and night without stint. We ask for sympathy and patience as we try to build a great Department of Christian Education in the churches. It will be noted that we divide the work of the department into A and B. The report of Mr. Crouch and the several divisions of this department follow.

141.

A. THE DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE CHURCHESW. Perry Crouch, *Secretary*

The first full year of work, as promoted by the Department of Christian Education in the Churches, has passed and we have every cause to be grateful. There are many indications that every division of the work has made progress.

There has been an attempt to promote the work in such a way that the local church could have a well-rounded program of work. It has not been our policy at any time to do away with existing organizations now fostered by the agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention, but rather to bring these organizations into a closer relationship. We have sought to eliminate conflicts in meetings and emphasis. We have sought to strengthen the divisions of the work that were lagging in interest. A definite program of work has been begun among the men and the students.

In the report on Men's Work, you will notice that some 55 Associational Men's Meetings were held in March, April and May, attended by at least 6,000 men. These meetings have brought a renewed interest on the part of our men in all the work of Baptists. This year we hope to have these associational men's meetings again, and in addition, one state-wide rally in some central location.

For the first time we have undertaken a definite promotion of student work in the state. There has been a student organization for many years, but for the last six years or more, there have been only two adult student workers, a student secretary at Meredith, employed by the college, and Miss Cleo Mitchell at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, supported by the Baptist State Convention. Both of these were local campus secretaries. The past year, I have given part of my time in a definite promotion of student work. I have been ably assisted in this work by Miss Velma Preslar, who has acted as office secretary and student field worker. Miss Cleo Mitchell continues as campus Student Secretary at W. C. of U. N. C. Other details will be given in the student report.

The Division of the Baptist Training Union has been greatly strengthened in the coming of Nathan C. Brooks, Jr. as Secretary, the first of the year. Mr. Brooks, with the able assistance of Miss Mabel Starnes as Field Worker and Miss Mary Lou Wall as Office Secretary, has brought a renewed interest in this division of our work. Particularly were the regional conventions, the summer assembly, and the summer rural work most encouraging. The greatest program in years is being outlined for this division of our work for the coming year.

The Sunday School Division has been greatly strengthened by the addition of Mr. and Mrs. John B. Lane as Field Workers. Mr. L. L. Morgan has shown his ability as a great Sunday school leader, as his report for the first full year in which he has been Secretary of that division will show. There has been an increase of over 10,000 awards in teacher-training work. There has been a large increase in the number of Vacation Bible Schools held. The summer rural program was one of the strongest yet put on.

Twelve regional conferences on better Sunday school methods and teaching are being planned for January and February, in addition to the regular program of this division.

We hope that, in addition to the work in each of these divisions, some progress has been made in unifying and correlating our work. The church and the

church program as a whole are being magnified. The entire group work in the Department of Christian Education are working together in a beautiful spirit, to help the local pastor build a well-rounded educational program for his church.

The reports in detail follow:

142.

1. DIVISION OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

L. L. Morgan, *Secretary*

Our division of the work has experienced a satisfactory advance along all lines during the past year, and in some phases of our work progress has been highly pleasing. With a deep sense of gratitude to the Father who gives all good things we submit this second report of your present Secretary.

We Express Our Thanks For: The unerring leadership of the Holy Spirit; the hearty support and cooperation of North Carolina Baptists; the loyal and unselfish service of our efficient co-laborers; the delightful and sympathetic counsel of our General Secretary, Mr. M. A. Huggins, and our Secretary of Christian Education, Rev. W. Perry Crouch; the heads of other departments of the Board; the generous and liberal attitude of our Baptist Sunday School Board; and to Rev. J. S. Farmer, Editor of the Biblical Recorder for the opportunity of keeping our work before our people through the pages of our Baptist paper.

Personnel: Sunday School Secretary, L. L. Morgan, is now in his twelfth year with the Sunday School Division of our work. Field Workers, Mr. and Mrs. John B. Lane, came to us as full time workers the first of May, and have made a wonderful start in the work. We are fortunate to have this consecrated, faithful and efficient couple back in North Carolina. Office Secretary, Miss Bessie Morgan, now in her twelfth year is indispensable in the office. She not only helps with Sunday School work, but compiles all the information for the Statistical Tables to be printed in the Baptist State Convention Annual.

Approved and Qualified Workers: Through the courtesy of the Sunday School Board we are permitted to use the following workers as much as our limited budget will allow: Mrs. C. D. Bain, Dunn, Approved Elementary Worker; Mrs. A. V. Washburn, Goldsboro, and Mrs. F. A. Bower, Kannapolis, Qualified Elementary Workers; Mrs. W. Perry Crouch, Raleigh, Approved Intermediate Worker, and Mrs. Clyde E. Baucom, Concord, Qualified Intermediate Worker; Mr. James P. Morgan, Durham, Approved Young People's Worker; Mr. Ben F. Favell, Charlotte, Approved Adult Worker; and Mr. John B. Lane, temporary Approved Extension Worker.

Promotional Projects: The Sunday School Board made it possible for more than 1,000 of our associational leaders to meet at Shelby for a great two-day conference January 21 and 22. Sixty-four associations out of seventy-two were represented. Under the same plan, our 1938 conference will be held February 3 and 4 in the First Baptist Church, High Point. We should have our greatest meeting there because it is in the center of the state and comes at a season of the year when business men can attend.

More than three hundred of our Sunday School leaders attended the South-Wide Sunday School Conference at Ridgecrest July 25-31. The value of this conference to our work cannot be estimated. We urge all pastors and

superintendents to join us in an effort to interest more of our people to attend the Ridgecrest Conference each year.

Vacation Bible Schools: Approximately 254 Schools have been reported to our office to date. We hope to go beyond that by the end of the year. Only three states in the South, Tennessee, North Carolina and Kentucky, have ever gone beyond 200 Schools in one year. We express appreciation to the Sunday School Board for financial help and to Mrs. A. V. Washburn for leading in the promotion of this work. Miss Neva Harper, Rocky Mount, Miss Ruby Williams, Lillington, Miss Elizabeth Draughan, Dunn, Miss Ellen Daniel, Salisbury, and Mr. R. R. Campbell, West Jefferson, made distinct contributions to the work by conducting several schools in each of their associations.

Teacher Training Awards: The report of training work from October 1, 1936 to October 1, 1937 from the Educational Department, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee, gives North Carolina the following record: 17,980 diploma books, 7,451 other books, 918 diplomas, 143 red seals, 51 blue seals, 48 gold seals, 43 post graduate certificates, and 8 post graduate diplomas, making a grand total of 26,642 awards issued. This is a gain of 9,964 over 1936, and an increase of 20,886 over 1935.

Associational Training Schools: Vance A. Browning in the Tennessee River Association, led twenty-four churches in a great training program in July. One thousand nine hundred thirty people were reached during the week, and 364 awards were issued. J. W. Costner in the Kings Mountain, for the third consecutive year, led every church in his association in conducting one or more classes in September. More than fifteen hundred people were reached during the week and 665 awards were issued. Similar projects were put on by Rev. E. T. Parham in the Mecklenburg Association, A. W. Kincaid in the Gaston Association, and A. L. Jarrell in the Rowan Association. It is really marvelous what one man can do in an association if he has the vision and will give himself completely to the work. Our greatest opportunity is through local people in the district association.

Whole Weeks Worked: During the year our Approved Workers and others called in at different times have put in 135 whole weeks on the field. Most of this was made possible through the courtesy of the Sunday School Board. Our regular force and our summer workers actually worked in the field 203 full weeks. This is a total of 338 weeks. It would take one person six and one half-years to do this much work if he worked every day.

Summer Work in the East: Miss Zula Rogers of Mamers spent ten weeks in the following associations during the time of June 9-August 15: Bladen, Robeson, Columbus, Dock, Brunswick, Wilmington, Eastern and New South River, and she reports splendid progress with the work. Under her leadership 1,662 people were reached and 31 classes taught.

Summer Work in Piedmont and Western North Carolina: It was our privilege to have 62 different workers assist us with our Association-Wide Enlargement Campaigns in Piedmont and Western North Carolina during the summer and fall. In this type of work we feel that our best results are obtained. The young people that help us each year are the "salt of the earth." We thank the Lord that our Christian Colleges are giving to us each year young men and young women who are consecrated and trained to lead in our churches. The following table reveals some of the results of the summer's work:

The future of Our Work: It is the desire of the Sunday School Division of our work to be of service to every Baptist Church in North Carolina. With the limited number of workers we have, it would take us more than twenty years to reach all of our churches with a training program if we tried to do it alone. Hence, we must contact the churches through state and associational meetings. The Association-Wide Enlargement Campaign, the Association-Wide Study Course, the City-Wide Conference and Enlargement Campaigns, all offer wonderful opportunities. Never before have we had as many calls for help. We urge that as soon as possible our budget be increased to take care of the increasing demands that are made upon us.

Our goals for 1938 are:

1. Every association organized for Sunday School work.
2. Eight thousand increase in enrollment.
3. Thirty-five thousand training awards issued.
4. Seventy-five Standard Sunday Schools.
5. Three hundred Enlargement Campaigns.
6. Every association represented at our Associational Officers' Conference at High Point, February 3 and 4.
7. Four hundred at Ridgecrest for the Sunday School Conference in July.
8. Fifteen Association-Wide Study Courses, with five hundred classes taught by local leaders.
9. Every section of North Carolina reached with a departmental conference and at least six thousand officers and teachers contacted and helped early in the year.
10. Four hundred Vacation Bible Schools.

Let us join hands, hearts and prayers and go forward.

2. TRAINING UNION DIVISION

Nathan C. Brooks, Jr. *Secretary*

PERSONNEL

In January the new Training Union Secretary came from the pastorate to the Department of Christian Education. From the beginning, Mr. Crouch, the Department Secretary, and Miss Starnes, the Training Union Associate, have co-operatively sought to help the new worker to become familiar with as well as useful in his responsibilities. Much of the year has naturally been devoted to getting acquainted. Thus far, the new secretary has worked in thirty-four of the seventy associations.

Mrs. J. E. Tharrington, for more than eleven years the beloved and efficient office secretary, resigned effective February first, at which time Miss Mary Lou Wall, of Raleigh, took charge of the office work. To Mrs. Tharrington the North Carolina Baptist churches owe a debt of appreciation for the gracious and quiet manner in which she served them for so long. Hers was largely an unseen, though nevertheless useful, ministry. Miss Wall has already shown herself to be a worthy successor to Mrs. Tharrington.

Miss Mabel Starnes, who has faithfully and zealously served the Convention for five years, has continued her efforts in her capacity as Associate Training Union Secretary. Her familiarity with the work, and her knowledge of the personnel over the state, has contributed in a large measure to the Training Union program of the Convention during the year.

In addition to the full time Training Union workers, attention is called

to the large host of individuals who are serving the Convention without remuneration. Among these are: Dr. John Wayland, Durham, President of the State Training Union Convention; Robert Le Gwin, Wilmington, Vice-President; Mrs. J. L. White, Elizabeth City, Story Hour Leader; Mrs. O. L. Faber, Charlotte, Junior Leader; Miss Marie Roberts, Charlotte, Intermediate Leader; Miss Cleo Mitchell, Greensboro, Senior Leader; Rev. J. L. Willis, Roanoke Rapids, Adult Leader; James Morgan, Durham, Central Regional President; Rev. John Link, Windsor, Eastern Regional President; David Mashburn, Mount Airy, North Central Regional President; W. E. Garrison, Lincolnton, South Central Regional President; Rev. Troy Jones, Red Springs, Southern Regional President; and Rev. Yancey Elliott, Brevard, Western Regional President. Serving faithfully with these are the Training Union Associational officers in most of the associations of the state.

PROGRAM

With some slight modification, the 1937 program has been similar to that of other years. Special effort has been made to correlate all plans with those of other divisions of the State work. The Secretary assisted the Sunday school forces for two weeks during the spring; he participated in several of the men's meetings; and during November and December much time will be given to assisting with Stewardship Revivals.

Some features of the year's work were:

Regional Conventions: Six regional conventions were held, rather than the usual five. These met during March and April in Elizabeth City, Burlington, Lumberton, Mount Airy, Lincolnton, and Hendersonville, with more than 2,000 people attending. Informal conferences with pastors during these meetings proved of great value to the State workers.

Associational Officers' Conference: The second Statewide Associational Officers' and Workers' Conference, Statesville, April 12-13, was not so largely attended as the first one which was held at Ridgecrest in 1936. Promoted jointly by the Sunday School Board and the North Carolina Training Union, this meeting was attended by some three to four hundred associational officers and Training Union workers from different sections of the state.

Associational Campaigns: The accompanying chart (Training Union Chart No. 1) relates statistical information concerning the simultaneous enlargement campaigns conducted in eight western North Carolina associations, June 19-August 13. Included also are figures concerning work done at the same time in the eastern part of the state by Miss Mary Mull. Financial limitations alone prevented the use of a larger force of workers in this effort. This type of work brings impressive returns for the money invested. A similar effort was made in the South Yadkin Association the week of November 7-12.

Ridgecrest Assembly: There were 833 full paid registrations at the State Assembly, Ridgecrest, July 11-16. Between 1100 and 1,200 persons participated in this successful meeting. Several conversions and a number of dedicated lives testify in part to the value of this annual assembly.

College Engagements: During the year conferences, study courses, and chapel engagements were scheduled on many of our college campuses. Cullowhee, Mars Hill, Appalachian, Woman's College of the University of North

Carolina, Boiling Springs, Wingate, Campbell, Wake Forest, and Meredith have been reached in one way or another. October 12-15, Mr. W. A. Harrell, Nashville, Tennessee, accompanied the Secretary to several of these schools.

Local Engagements: In addition to the many general contacts, much time has been given to conferences, study courses and enlargement campaigns in local churches from Edenton to Asheville.

Office Work: In the office, Miss Wall has assisted with the large correspondence, carefully checked the mailing list, mimeographed many letters and bulletins, assisted in the preparation of the weekly column in the Biblical Recorder, and mailed free literature in response to numerous requests.

Summary Statistics: Training Union Chart No. 2 is a statistical summary of the condition of the work in North Carolina, October 20, according to the office records.

PLANS

In the light of the year's work and experiences, plans are being formulated for 1938 with the following items in mind:

1. Pastors and leaders must be brought to think in terms of a *church training program* rather than in terms of a young people's training effort.
2. The church training program should not be a Sunday-night effort, but a seven-day-to-the-week training program.
3. Local and Associational Training Union leaders need to plan a long term program rather than "live from hand to mouth."
4. Constructive criticisms and suggestions from the local churches must be encouraged and evaluated.
5. In keeping with past experiences, Regional Conventions, the Associational Officers' Leadership Conference, the Ridgecrest Assembly, and Associational Enlargement Campaigns will be continued as desirable features of the Training Union program.

APPRECIATION

We wish to express our grateful appreciation to all of those who have contributed in one way or another to the work of the year. Above all, our prayer to the Father is that our thanksgiving for His past blessings may express itself in finer and more fruitful service in the future.

3. DIVISION OF BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

PERSONNEL

Mr. Crouch has just finished his first year of work, and even though he has been able to give only a small part of his time to this phase of the Department's activities, he has visited campuses twenty-two times, spoken often to student groups, attended three student conventions, promoted three important conferences with student and adult leaders, organized one new B. S. U., and written literally hundreds of letters in the interest of the work with our Baptist students.

Assisting him in the office and on the field is Miss Velma Preslar, who, during the last year, has made thirteen campus visits, teaching study courses and conducting conferences with the officers of the religious organizations on the campus.

OUR STATUS IN NORTH CAROLINA

On fourteen of the twenty-five campuses in our state, there are Baptist student organizations. These are at Appalachian State Teacher's College at Boone, Boiling Springs, Campbell, the University of North Carolina, Chowan, Duke University, Eastern Carolina Teachers' College at Greensboro, Mars Hill, Meredith, State College, Wake Forest, Western Carolina Teachers' College at Cullowhee, the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, and Wingate.

Full-time Student Religious Secretaries are at work on only two of these fourteen campuses. Miss Mildred Kichline is employed by Meredith College for the students there. Miss Cleo Mitchell is employed by the State Mission Board to work on the campus of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. Our State Mission Board also helps pay the salary of Mr. Zon Robinson, who does part-time student religious work at Wake Forest.

These "spiritual coaches" are at work enlisting students in local church activities, and planning for the meeting of spiritual needs on the campuses.

JOIN-THE-CHURCH DAY

Each fall, soon after the opening of schools, the churches in college centers, working with the Baptist Student Unions, observe Join-the-Church Day. Reports thus far this year show that almost 700 students have joined a local church in the college center. It seems that the Baptist Student Union is helping develop a conscience about church loyalty.

OFFICERS' PLANNING CONFERENCE

In January, 1937, the state B. S. U. officers, the local B. S. U. presidents, and the Student Secretaries met in Raleigh for a Planning Conference. The time was given to definite planning of the year's activities, and was helpful in unifying effort and ideals, and promoting certain important features of the year's program.

The night session furnished the occasion for reorganizing a Baptist Student Union on the campus of State College.

STATE TOUR

Dr. Frank H. Leavell, Executive Secretary of Student Work in the South, visited North Carolina in February, and he and Mr. Crouch were on twelve campuses for chapel and for conferences with the B. S. U. Council members.

SPRING RETREAT

Between eighty and 100 students met in Greensboro in April to study the work of the B. S. U. in preparation for this year's duties. They were the newly elected B. S. U. officers from the different campuses.

EVANGELISTIC EMPHASIS

An important event in the Baptist Student Union's yearly calendar is Evangelistic Week. Throughout the year stress is put on evangelism as the Christian's highest privilege, and through Christ-like living, prayer, and definite soul-winning effort the unsaved students are sought for Christ.

The Master's Minority Movement on the campuses is proving itself a powerful force in evangelistic effort, as well as a help in deepening spiritual experience. It is not an organization, but a movement to which students may voluntarily attach themselves if they desire to go forward in a deeper devotional life. One of its priorities is the choosing of prayer-mates, based on Matthew 18:19. Throughout our state and over the South there are many of these who have "coupled up" to pray things through together.

RIDGECREST STUDENT RETREAT

In June, 122 North Carolina students joined 1,100 others from the South in the annual Student Retreat at Ridgecrest. While there, students were converted, had faith strengthened and doubts removed, heard God's call to definite Christian service, made high resolves, and now are seeking to translate those thrilling impulses into practical campus Christianity.

BAPTIST WORLD YOUTH CONFERENCE, ZURICH

Two North Carolina Baptist students, one from Meredith and one from Wake Forest, joined almost 1,600 more from almost every country in the world at an International Conference of Baptist Youth in Zurich, Switzerland, in August.

VOLUNTEER SUMMER WORK

On all the campuses last year were students who volunteered their services to churches who would plan to use them during the summer vacation months. Twenty-six of these, representing nine different colleges, went as "home missionaries" with the Sunday School and Training Union Departments into eighteen different associations last summer. The value of their service cannot be reckoned.

Neither can any estimate be made of the help given by students who returned to their own churches to be the pastor and Sunday School superintendent's ally.

THIS YEAR

Practically all the colleges in the state have opened with a larger enrollment this year than ever, and Baptist Student Councils report that more are being enlisted in Sunday School and the Training Union than ever before.

Many of the Councils had a Pre-school Retreat when the officers of the Baptist Student Union and the unit organization leaders met on the campus before the freshmen arrived and made plans, set goals, worked out a calendar for the year, and prepared themselves in mind and heart for the work ahead.

The campaign for Baptist Student Magazine subscriptions is meeting more success than heretofore. One small school reports that one-fourth of its enrollment are subscribers. This indicates the important place it holds in student life.

As this report is being written, plans are being completed for the annual State Student Convention to be held in Boone. Approximately 350 North Carolina students will meet together over the week-end in search of the most worthwhile things. Dr. Walter P. Binns, Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Roanoke, Virginia, Mr. William Hall Preston, from the Southside Student Department at Nashville, and Dr. Herbert Gezork, former Baptist Young People's Leader in Germany and now of Furman University, will be the out-of-state speakers. The general theme for the Convention is "Today and Tomorrow With Christ."

PRESSING NEEDS

The strategic need in our work with students now is for more Student Secretaries. Two of the secretaries now at work are on Baptist campuses. That means that the host of Baptist students on the campuses of our large state and private institutions, almost three-fourths of the total number in the state, are without Baptist leadership.

Almost 1,000 of these students are in our teachers' colleges. Another thousand are at the University and State College. In other words, 2,000 Baptist students in state schools, and only the 421 at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, have the help of a "spiritual coach" during these four years when life attitudes and habits are being fixed.

Our prayer is that soon the way may be made for North Carolina Baptists to place consecrated Christian Baptist Student Secretaries at these places to work at the task of connecting our college Baptists with the local church and with Christ.

Dr. M. E. Dodd said, "Our students are vast and vital. We can't do too much for them."

146. 4. REPORT OF BAPTIST MEN'S CONVENTION COMMITTEE

During the last convention year there have been special meetings for men held in fifty-five of the Associations. These meetings were usually, if not all, held on Sunday afternoon, with the idea of causing as little interruption as possible to the Sunday-morning services of the various churches. The attendance has been very good. In some cases it was very large. Approximately 6,000 men attended and about 300 took part on the programs. Practically without exception the reports from the chairmen were enthusiastic and to the effect that the meetings had been most helpful and urging that similar ones be held next year.

We believe that these meetings for men ought to be and are important enough to the churches to justify holding them in the morning as well as having an afternoon session. It is true that this would take many men away from their own local church services, but surely for such a purpose and only once a year this would be fully justified. We believe that such a course would

bring a new sense of importance and responsibility to the laymen of our churches and would so stimulate their interest and activities as to far more than repay their missing one stated service of their own churches. Such associational meetings should be held at a convenient location for access and where a large auditorium would take care of the crowd that should attend. No effort should be spared to make the program entries short, interesting, inspiring and practical.

A state-wide meeting was held in July, 1937, at Ridgecrest in conjunction with the South-wide Baptist Brotherhood Week. One day was given to North Carolina Baptist men. It was said that this was probably the best day of the week in attendance and program of general interest. The attendance was not what it should have been. We are satisfied that a state-wide meeting should be held nearer the center of the state and at a different season.

We believe it is time for us to hold another state-wide meeting in the spring at a central location, with the hope of having present over one thousand representative men from all sections of the state.

We therefore recommend:

First. That the Convention approve the holding of associational meetings during the next convention year, and approve their being held in the forenoon as well as the afternoon, at the option of the local associations.

Second. That the Convention approve the holding of a state-wide meeting in the spring at some accessible location, at such time as may be approved by the Executive Committee of the General Board.

B. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE COLLEGES

We report one change in the status of the colleges. Beginning with the present, 1937-1938 session, Chowan is operating as a junior college. The Board of Trustees, finding that it was impractical to carry on as a four-year college, brought their problem to the General Board in its June meeting. A decision was reached embodying a fourfold program as follows:

1. The Board would recognize Chowan as a junior college in the Convention system of schools.

2. The Board would undertake to provide an income of \$8,500 for the year 1937-1938, and \$10,000 a year as soon as possible, provided that the churches of the Chowan and West Chowan Associations would send all funds contributed by the churches for the Co-operative Program directly to the Treasurer of the Convention.

3. The college would undertake to lead all the churches of these two associations to make a special offering to the college for equipment some time during the year.

4. The college and the churches of these two associations would cooperate with the Convention staff in association-wide Stewardship Revivals in the Chowan and West Chowan associations during the fall of 1937.

In addition to the action just given the Board in its June meeting voted to undertake an appropriation to all the schools, except Meredith, for current support. These amounts follow: Wake Forest \$9,000; Mars. Hill \$5,000; Campbell \$5,000. This action we trust will meet with the cordial approval of the Convention and of all the churches. It means that for the first time in nearly a decade the Convention is undertaking to provide something for

the schools out of the Co-operative Program. These amounts ought to be increased just as soon as possible. This is particularly true of Campbell College, for a lack of stable income probably prevents Campbell from securing membership in the Southern Association. If the Board can meet its commitment, and if adequate equipment can be secured, Chowan could possibly at an early date gain entrance into this association. Surely our schools ought to be surpassed by none in the quality of work offered. The standing of Wake Forest, Meredith and Mars Hill is of course widely recognized. We should, however, look to the time in the near future when the Convention can appropriate to Wake Forest at least \$25,000 a year, to Meredith at least \$15,000 and to each of the junior colleges at least \$10,000 a year. We are easily able to do it now. The reports of the colleges follow.

(a.) WAKE FOREST COLLEGE

Wake Forest College reports for the academic year 1936-1937:

(1) An enrollment in the regular session of 982.

(2) A combined enrollment in its summer session units of 949. The total enrollment in both the regular session and the summer session units was 1,931. The total number of degrees awarded for the year was 194. Of these seventeen received the LL.B. degree; twenty received the B.S. degree with major in medicine; 155 received the Bachelor's degree in the college of liberal arts; two received the M.A. degree.

In the physical plant notable additions were made to the athletic fields. With the aid of generous friends the Groves athletic field for use in baseball was graded and used for the first time and lighting equipment was added on the Gore athletic field for use in evening football games. These additions have added greatly to the attractiveness and utility of these playing fields.

The internal organization of the college presents three rather definite achievements for the year.

(1) The faculty adopted a program that ran through the entire year of studying the work of the college by departments. Each department analyzed its own needs, its achievement and proposed necessary modification.

(2) The recognition of the growing demands upon instruction in the junior and senior classes. As a result of large numbers of junior college transfers the registration of courses in the last two years of the college has been increased. The departments have been very conscious of these demands and have modified their organization accordingly.

(3) The enlargement of the physical plant has made possible definite organization of the departments of instruction around centralized offices as headquarters and adjacent classrooms for the use of each department. Each department is now located with definite conveniences. This unity is proving to be highly satisfactory to the departmental staffs as well as the convenience of students. This has been accomplished in some instances by assigning an entire building or entire floors or definite areas to the several departments.

For the ensuing year there are only two changes in the faculty personnel. In medicine, Associate Professor L. L. Chastain has been added; in law, Assistant Professor Brainerd Currie replaces Mr. Coulson resigned.

(b.) MEREDITH COLLEGE

The enrollment up to October 15 is 562. Of these 451 are boarders, eighty-five day students, and twenty-six specials. There are representatives from eighteen of the states of our country and two register from foreign countries. Seventy-six counties of North Carolina are represented.

New officers and teachers for this year are as follows: Miss Anna May Baker, Dean of Women; Mrs. Vera Tart Marsh, Assistant Dean of Women; Miss Maude Clay Little, Assistant Professor of Sociology and Economics; Miss Sallie B. Marks, Assistant Professor of Education and Psychology; Miss Betty Adkerson, Director of Physical Education; Miss Nancy Blaire Eliason, Instructor in Biology; Miss Norma Rose, Instructor in English and Latin; Mrs. LeRoy Allen, Instructor in Modern Languages; Dr. Harry E. Cooper, Director of Music; Miss Katherine Eide, Instructor of 'Cello and Theory; Miss Mary Lee, Instructor in Piano; Miss Ada Margaret Pfohl, Assistant Librarian; Miss Nell Barker, Secretary to the Bursar and Treasurer; Miss Edna Frances Dawkins, Secretary to the Dean of Women; Miss Margie Stallings, Dining Room Hostess. Those who have withdrawn rendered good service and carry with them our best wishes. Those who come bring the best of credentials and receive cordial welcome.

Our student body is the largest we have ever had at Meredith and the spirit of faculty and students is delightful.

(c.) REPORT ON CHOWAN COLLEGE

On February 15, 1937, the Board of Trustees voted to close Chowan Senior College at the end of the college year. This was necessitated because of the lack of funds to make the Senior College equal to the requirements for standardization. Later it was decided to endeavor to organize the institution into a Junior College.

On June 11 Dr. J. L. Carrick was elected president of the Junior College to be and was given the task of setting up the new organization. This was perfected and is now functioning.

A new faculty was secured with each of them possessing either an M.A. or a Ph.D. degree. Thus the new college is offering two years of standard academic work, home economics, and a first-class business school.

The fall term opened with sixty-seven students enrolled. The student body is composed of our best boys and girls drawn from rural homes, and many would be deprived of any college education were it not for the low rates of this school.

There has been a number of improvements made to the physical equipment and much more will be done before the year closes. The prospects seem bright for the future of the institution as a Junior College, and it is believed that the new organization can best fill its place as such both to its constituency and to the denomination. The greatest need of the institution is a new dormitory for boys, a new home economics building, increased apparatus for our various laboratories, and further painting and repairing of the present plant. With these improvements the student body should be doubled next year.

(d.) MARS HILL COLLEGE

Numbers. The enrollment this fall is 662—625 college students, thirty-seven high school and special (forty-six of this number are ministerial students) drawn from eighty-two counties in this state and from twenty-four other states and foreign countries. The Mars Hill division of the Wake Forest-Meredith Summer School had 333 in attendance, most of whom remained for the full nine weeks. The ministers conference under the direction of Secretary Huggins reached 150 pastors and through them many times that number of churches. The college endowment is now nearly \$120,000, carefully invested and growing slowly.

Items of Progress. Six acres north of the old campus came into possession of the college a few months ago, a beautiful site for future dormitories and park for young women. Shelving and other equipment for the library have been put in, all needed for the natural growth, imperative in providing for the accessions made possible by a grant of \$6,000 from the Carnegie Foundation. Steam heat has been installed in the auditorium and Treat home for young women. There are few changes in the faculty now that nearly a score of them live in their own homes, thus maintaining a beautiful spirit of unity and purpose.

The New Dormitory. The plea of heart-hungry young women for admission when there was no room, and gifts of cash from friends for the erection of a girls' home amounting to \$30,000 seemed to the trustees the call of God to proceed with its erection, and so the contract has been let for a modern, fireproof building to accommodate 120 young women. This building will cost \$80,000 and the trustees have launched it on faith that God will in due time make possible its completion.

(e.) CAMPBELL COLLEGE

At the past commencement Campbell College celebrated the close of her first half-century of steady progress with congratulations from its friends and official representatives. Feeling that a great past unless followed by an even more glorious future is nothing short of disgrace, the school administration, aided by the prayers and support of its friends, aspires to greater service in the years ahead.

To date there are enrolled this year in the high school and college groups 400 students. While this registration represents a slight decline in the number of day students, every dormitory room on the campus is filled, including a residence rented by the college for an overflow of girls.

The Convention should be advised of the imperative nature of two needs now affecting the life of the institution. More dormitory space for boys and for girls is required to accommodate those now seeking admission. While classrooms, library, and dining hall facilities are ample to provide for 150 additional students, with greater economy in administration, dormitory space is lacking. At present the college is under the necessity of constructing a dormitory for girls, which is fire-proof and modern in equipment, out of the current income of the students.

The second pressing necessity is for an endowment fund, or some other permanent source of annual income. An endowment of \$200,000 is a min-

imum requirement for membership in the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. The maintenance of our own respect and the reputation of our Baptist system of schools demand that we qualify for admission into this highest accrediting agency, which, in our opinion, is only conditioned upon the satisfaction of this financial requirement.

We regret to report the death during the year of Mr. W. S. Strickland, who for many years was a faithful member of our Board of Trustees, appointed by the Baptist State Convention.

OUR DEBTS

Following the authorization and instructions of the last Convention we proceeded to borrow \$350,000 from the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company at four per cent interest, payable as to principal as follows: 1937, \$60,000; 1938, \$65,000; 1939, \$70,000; 1940, \$75,000; 1941, \$80,000. Already we have paid \$42,000 of the \$60,000 due this year and have on hand a large part of the \$18,000 due in December. In addition we borrowed \$450,000 from the Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company at five per cent interest. Of course we have met promptly the interest on this loan, and no principal is due until 1941. We owe another small loan of \$14,000, which we did not pay inasmuch as we secured on this loan a rate of four per cent interest, and inasmuch as we did not wish to be placed under a strain at the time when we were beginning payments of principal and interest on the two large loans. We expect, therefore, to reduce the principal of our indebtedness this year by at least \$60,000. The Baptist name is a good name; and one of these days the Convention, out of debt, will rejoice because of the efforts which were made to preserve inviolate the faith, the honor and the credit of a great people.

While as members of our associations and the State Conventions, we may not feel that we are immediately concerned with the operations of the General Annuity Board, as members of the Southern Baptist Convention we should be deeply interested in all the operations of that body, but especially in the work of its Relief and Annuity Board, since this is the only agency that attempts to provide for our aged and infirm ministers and their widows and orphans. The above table, therefore, attempts to give the outstanding facts in the work of that Board for the past year.

In the *Christian Century* of last July 21, appeared an article headed "Wanted: Rich Men's Sons," and its first sentence read: "Above the door of every theological seminary there ought to be burned the words, 'Wanted: Rich Men's Sons. The poor are warned to keep out.'"

This article was so preposterous that as far as I could see, it received scant notice from either preachers or laymen; and of the few replies published, only one gave it even partial support; so far was it from the teachings of Scripture on the interdependence of the New Testament preachers and their churches, and the practically unbroken history of the Christian ministry in all the evangelical churches of all times, and still today!

As a class, Christian ministers are not only not rich, but receive salaries too small to permit adequate provision for old age or loss of health; and in many, if not most cases, too small to afford many necessities even in their prime. To meet this situation, the Relief and Annuity Board was organized.

This Board, of course, does not propose to enrich the ministers, but to release them, while still in their prime, from anxiety for themselves and their families in old age, and thus enable them to devote their full time and energy to the various demands of their pastorates.

While the Board is still far below its ideals, in the eighteen years of its service its achievements are marvelous. With a few scattered beneficiaries in all the South at that time, assets of \$106,428.52, and an outlay of only \$1,397.00 for relief and no annuities; its last annual report showed a relief roll of 1,200 who received nearly \$85,000.00. A Relief Reserve Fund of

\$451,244.05, an Annuity Fund of \$3,769,083.98, and a Contingent Reserve Fund of \$253,322.97; making a total investment of \$4,473,901.00; and 2,484 throughout the South now receiving annuities. With gratitude to God for such a showing, let us also express grateful appreciation of the vigorous and prudent leadership of its two Secretaries who made it possible, William Lunsford and T. J. Watts.

After many years of utter neglect, followed by more or less desultory local efforts by the several states in the South, the Annuity Board was created and began by direct relief work alone, supported by contributions from the churches; but it soon saw that these were wholly inadequate to meet the needs of the thousands of aged ministers and their widows in the South. Nor did the three per cent of the Co-operative Program, later voted by Southern Baptist Convention, fully relieve the situation, and even after nearly nineteen years' trial, allocation as per capita is still around \$6.00 per month: \$6.00 to house, feed and clothe a man and his family; and the per capita contribution of Southern Baptists is still only two cents a year! Yes, and even less, for as the above table shows, nearly one-half of the amounts for relief contributed by North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention, respectively, was given by the W. M. U. of the state and the South, respectively. Let us pause to thank this noble body for this characteristically gracious and generous service.

Nor does the plan of support from church contributions seem to have worked much better in the other large Protestant denominations—Northern Baptists, Presbyterians, Congregationalists, Lutherans and Disciples whose monthly allocations to their aged ministers averaged \$10.00.

Our Relief Board was not slow to see that some other plan must be found; so that in a few years it proposed two Annuity Plans involving the participation of both pastors and churches. The first of these, based on length of service, did not meet the general approval of the churches, since it involved a guarantee by them of eight per cent of the salaries they were paying. So a second plan was soon proposed, called the Old Age Annuity Plan, which required a guarantee of three per cent each by the pastor and his church; and this plan is still being worked.

There is not space here for the details of these plans further than to say each proposes to provide for the participating Annuitant \$500.00 annually, and \$300.00 annually for widows and orphans; but no one above sixty-five years of age is eligible for Annuity membership. All who are interested, whether ministers or laymen, should write Secretary Watts' office, 2002 Tower Petroleum Building, Dallas, Texas, for fuller information.

The larger Protestant denominations above mentioned, I learn, are all now following some similar Annuity Plan, and manifestly we must do likewise, in view of the proven and pitiful inadequacy of our direct Relief Plan.

But after three or four years of trial, only eighteen churches in North Carolina have enlisted with their pastors under the present Annuity Plans. But many, if not most, salaries are too small and their pastors too poor to permit such enlistment. So Secretary Huggins contemplates proposing to our approaching convention a plan whose details are not yet definite, but which will make the Mission Board, instead of the individual church, the other contracting party, and lessen the cost to the contracting pastor.

And yet, by reason of age limit and other causes, the direct Relief Plan must still be continued for many years. Meanwhile, it is earnestly hoped that in all our gatherings both ministers and laymen will urge the churches to co-operate in the far better Annuity Plan.

Meanwhile, let it be recognized and remembered that, while its title would indicate that its only concern is for old ministers, widows and orphans, and only these are benefited by its service, as a band of our fellow servants, it is no less interested in the welfare of the churches and its service reacts to their benefit. For it may be said in general that whatever benefits pastors also benefits churches. In so far as their efforts promote the interdependence of pastors and churches, they tend to promote their mutual fellowship, affection, and co-operation. And it may be said in particular that if a pastor does not seek to become a better pastor from being relieved of anxiety for himself and his family in old age, and from knowing that his church is helping to give such relief, there is something wrong somewhere, and his church might do well to consider changing pastors.

B. REPORT OF BAPTIST ORPHANAGE OF NORTH CAROLINA

I. G. Greer, *General Superintendent*

With deep gratitude we bring you another chapter in the history of orphanage work in North Carolina. Owing to the rapid changes and untested experiments in the social, economic, political and industrial life of the country, it is necessary to be constantly on the alert as to the best trends in child welfare. Leaders in this field differ widely as to the best methods of caring for the dependent child. There are those that claim that for every homeless child there is a childless home where it can be placed, and therefore the orphanage should be abandoned. As proof of this statement there appeared recently in a widely read magazine an article that quoted an official of the Child's Bureau in Washington as saying:

"Rich men bequeath fortunes to found homes for homeless children. We don't need these impressive monuments to their memories, we don't want them. We know the best place for a child is a foster home or adoptive home. But there are these memorial institutions, they must be filled with children." On the other hand there appeared about the same time a bulletin issued by the Child Welfare League of America that carried the following statement:

"Children's institutions and child caring agencies, state, county, municipal and private are expected to continue to carry the loads they now have, and to meet those new demands which each day brings. It is wholly clear that with the fullest development of tax supported child welfare services the private agency has as important a role to play as ever, indeed, a more important one than ever before. The private agencies not only have their own definite job to do, but are continually called upon by public agencies to help plan, guide, interpret and carry on their work."

Criticizing these viewpoints will get us no whither. We have dedicated ourselves to the task of trying to find the best solution to the child welfare problem. While doing this, however, we have no disposition or power to declare a moratorium on the physical, mental and spiritual growth of more than 800 boys and girls.

So we may be assured that we are engaged in a work that is permanent and worth while. Whatever changes may take place, the child will be present year after year confronting us with certain fundamental problems that, if well solved, will call for the combined wisdom and efforts of a consecrated people.

May I here pay tribute to the loyalty and efficiency of the Board of Trustees and the man and women who compose the orphanage staff. Something more than character and goodness is needed for one to become a good orphanage worker. He must be capable of seeing and feeling the child's deepest emotion and then know how to deal with it. He must see in every child that comes, no matter how warped and shackled it may be, the possibilities of a man or woman fit for the kingdom of God.

We have had another good year. Our health record is unparalleled. The general attitude of the children and employees toward the school, church and orphanage life as a whole is most gratifying. As usual, Charity and Children with the job department has been an asset to the orphanage treasury and is able to report a substantial profit. Under scientific management our farms have produced the following:

Since we can grow these much cheaper than they can be purchased on the market we have affected a great saving to the orphanage treasury.

The daily expense of caring for more than 850 children is \$452.14. So far we have not had to borrow any money this year. But the current bills now piling up in the treasurer's office remind us that we are going to need a most liberal Thanksgiving offering. If enough Sunday schools would contribute each month enough to take care of our daily expenses, we could use the Thanksgiving offering for much needed repairs and the erection of new buildings.

During January under the leadership of Dr. B. W. Spilman, individuals will be given an opportunity to contribute to the erection of a library building at Kennedy Home.

The pastors of the Kennedy Home and Mills Home churches have this year baptized ninety-six boys and girls into the fellowship of the churches.

At the present time there are twenty-eight orphanage boys and girls attending college. They are making very satisfactory records.

As usual our constituency has been very generous in supporting the children. We acknowledge with deep gratitude the many gifts in kind that have been recognized each week in Charity and Children, the bountiful donations of canned goods, regular and irregular contributions from individuals, Sunday schools, churches and the Duke Endowment.

The Heavenly Father has been gracious this year in sending bountiful crops and making it possible for our industrial plants to run without major interruption. In keeping with His blessings you once again will have the privilege of enriching your spiritual lives by remembering the children at Thanksgiving time.

C. NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITALS, INC.Smith Hagaman, *Superintendent*

On May 28, 1937, the Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem completed its fourteenth year of ministry to sick and distressed humanity. During these years, 38,000 patients entered for treatment.

In many ways this has been the greatest year in its history—greatest in number of churches contributing and in amount contributed.

About 5,000 people applied for treatment during this year. Of this number about 1,000 could not be taken for want of room. This situation suggests the very urgent and immediate enlargement of this hospital. No hospital case was turned away as long as we had an empty bed.

We have just completed an addition to the Nurses' Home which doubles its capacity. This addition was made at a cost of \$28,047.30, largely provided by local friends of the hospital. This enlarged Home has enabled us to enter an unusually large class of thirty first-year students. Making a total of forty-eight in training. It has also enabled us to bring into the Home about twenty graduate nurses living in private homes.

The hospital has received during the year:

From Duke Endowment.....	\$13,404.00
From Co-operative Program (ten months).....	\$ 8,026.81
From Mothers' Day Offering.....	\$22,651.43

Of the number of patients treated during the year, about 1,700 were "service" patients. That is, paid little or nothing.

During the year the hospital returned 1,000 mothers to their families, treated more than 100 preachers, missionaries and members of their families—most of which was free.

We estimate, conservatively, that this hospital and its staff of sixty-six doctors have rendered \$160,000 in free service during this year.

We gratefully acknowledge receipt of quantities of hospital linen furnished by W. M. U.'s, and other church organizations. Also, a number of loads of vegetables and canned fruits from numbers of churches, particularly from the western section of the state.

We are much gratified to see a very marked growth in interest and support of this hospital throughout our state.

Until a change of "plan of support," we shall be largely dependent upon the Mothers' Day offering for providing hospital treatment to these large numbers who cannot pay.

VII. CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM**A. DIVISION OF RECEIPTS**

The Co-operative Program funds are divided at present sixty per cent for state objects and forty per cent for southwide objects. When, however, designations are considered, southwide objects receive about forty-three per cent of all the money given, designated and undesignated, by the churches. We look eagerly to the time when we can safeguard our debt commitments and at the same time make such a distribution of the funds as will provide for southwide objects at least half of the total given by the churches. We can do this if and when the Co-operative Program funds are increased

by about thirty per cent, or if and when we can secure eight to ten thousand members of the Hundred Thousand Club. For this increase we labor continually, and if the present increase continues we can probably make the division referred to in 1939. For the moment we believe it wise to instruct the Board to increase the percentage for southwide objects by three or four per cent if possible.

B. PROMOTION PLANS

During the fall of 1936, we sounded the call for a great advance, meaning an advance of at least twenty-five per cent. The churches have responded, not with a twenty-five per cent advance, but with what now appears to be about a twenty per cent advance. For this we are grateful.

We also pleaded for a Stewardship Revival in each church, and asked that each church seek to secure "a tithe from at least a tithe of the membership." Hundreds of churches provided for these Stewardship Revivals and thousands of church members declared their intentions to tithe.

We are continuing the program this fall and are pressing it vigorously. We mention three or four steps which we have taken in an effort to enlist the membership of the churches.

1. In June the Convention Committee on Promotion and Enlistment held a meeting at Meredith College during the Pastors' School. Members of this committee from about fifty associations were present, and plans for promotion were outlined and adopted.

2. Following this meeting, we planned and held Preliminary or Leadership meetings in sixty-nine of the seventy associations. These were by far the most important promotion meetings we have had in years. We estimate that eight to ten thousand church leaders attended these meetings. The enthusiasm manifested was most encouraging. In them an effort was made (1) to check on what the churches had done for the Co-operative Program objects during about ten and a half months of the associational year, (2) to make plans for the annual meetings, and (3) to lead the churches to adopt objectives, goals, or aims, for the next year. It is believed that twelve to fifteen hundred churches will be working next year under the stimulus of a definite financial objective.

3. Material for use in Stewardship Revivals has been prepared. (a) The General Secretary has prepared a new booklet of eighty pages with the title, "Fellowship in World Service," and with the sub-title, "Under the Lordship of Jesus." Twenty thousand were printed. As of November 1 twelve to fifteen thousand have been distributed. (b) A chart, designed to keep before a church its financial objective, has been printed and distributed widely. (c) A tract, designed to carry information and an appeal to church members to support the program of the church, and with the title, "My Church and I, What Are We for?" has been prepared. (d) Enrollment, or every member canvass cards, have been prepared. The new card, which is strongly recommended, issues a clear cut appeal for a complete stewardship declaration.

4. Five association-wide Stewardship Revivals have been planned in the following associations: Pilot Mountain, Piedmont, Mount Zion, Chowan and West Chowan. These began in the Pilot Mountain on November 1 and will continue through December 12. To these efforts all, or nearly all, of the

staff members will devote themselves. In addition about seventy-five pastors have very generously agreed to give a week of service.

5. In so far as time would permit, Mr. Alexander, Mr. Crouch and Mr. Pipes have met with pastors in several associations in an effort to help them prepare for Stewardship Revivals in their churches. Let us keep the following challenges before our people:

"A Stewardship Revival in every church.

"At least a tithe of the membership giving at least a tithe of their income.

"An enrollment of all the members of all the churches in a program of *spiritual living* and *scriptural sharing*.

"At least three per cent of the membership of the churches enrolled as members of the Baptist Hundred Thousand Club in a special 'over and above' effort to pay the debts of both State and Southern Convention objects."

We call attention again to the fact that the Co-operative Program, broadly conceived, contemplates not only the giving of undesignated money, but provides also for special days on which offerings are made for special objects. It is true that money given on these special days goes to the objects specified, but at the same time these special days are observed as a part of our general Co-operative Program Plan. These special days follow:

Home and Foreign Missions—Some Sunday in March.

Hospital—Mothers' Day.

Christian Education—Some Sunday in June.

Old Ministers' Relief—Some Sunday in August.

State Missions—Last Sunday in October.

Orphanage—Thanksgiving.

These days should be observed in all our churches, and the appeal should be made (1) to those who have made a subscription and who are contributing systematically. These should not be pressed, but merely asked to make an offering, and "over and above," if their hearts prompt them. But what of the sixty to eighty per cent of our members who make no pledge at all and contribute with no regularity. Even in our most progressive churches there is a group of twenty-five to fifty per cent of the membership who make no subscriptions. How are they to be reached for our mission objects unless these special days are observed? It is therefore suggested that after the canvass or enrollment is completed a list of those members who will not make a subscription be made. We suggest the formation in each church of a Missions or Co-operative Program Committee composed of the following: Chairman, the Superintendent of the Sunday school; other members to include the chairman of the board of deacons, the president of the W. M. S., the president of the B. T. U., and the presidents and teachers of the larger classes in the Sunday school. The names of those who make no subscription, or who contribute irregularly, should be divided among the members of this committee. Then when the special days come each member who has not subscribed should be challenged to do something for each of these objects.

For next year we ought to undertake a goal of at least \$550,000 for all Co-operative Program objects, designated and undesignated, and at least \$150,000 for the Orphanage, or a total of \$700,000. We are able to do it. Often we hear it said, "So many of our people are doing nothing for the

Kingdom." And that is true. It is also true that only a very few are doing anything which demands real self-denial. If only half of our people gave ten cents a week, on an average, we could raise next year not \$700,000 but more than \$1,000,000. And if we can get back to the level of giving attained in any one of the years 1919-1930, we would raise about \$1,000,000. Surely we can if we will. Provide a real Stewardship Revival in each church and it will be done.

158. VIII. REPORT OF THE BAPTIST BOOK STORE

(Owned jointly by the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., and the North Carolina Baptist State Convention)

Mrs. Roger Marshall, *Manager*.

Net sales for the year ending December 31, 1936, amounted to \$40,293.59 with a net profit of \$3,808.69.

The amount paid out to the two boards owning the Book Store in dividends during the year amounted to \$4,745.26, one-half of this amount having been paid to each board.

It may be seen from this that the Book Store is operating on a paying basis. The total net worth at December 31, 1936, was \$14,696.75, with no unpaid bills. During the twelve years under the present partnership a total profit of \$32,051.18 has been paid out to both boards. One-half of this amount, \$16,025.59, has been paid the North Carolina Board, which means that the Book Store is a distinct asset and a denominational investment.

The Book Store handles all supplies for every department of the church, as well as a complete line of general and religious books, song books, and Bibles. By means of the catalogues at our disposal, we can secure any book in print.

It is our desire to serve North Carolina Baptists promptly and efficiently, and we covet your continued patronage and support.

IX. REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HISTORICAL COMMISSION

During the past year The North Carolina Baptist Historical Collection in the Library of Wake Forest College has been enlarged by the addition of 1,302 contributed manuscripts, church record books, copies of minutes of denominational bodies, and published books, including the valuable collection of the late Professor J. T. Alderman, contributed in accord with his purpose by Mrs. Alderman. Another valuable contribution is that of Rev. W. P. Campbell of Elm City. The Library is assembling and binding in separate volumes for each Association the minutes of the Baptist Associations of the State; already thirty-five volumes have been bound and others will be bound as the files of the minutes for the several Associations become complete. Those who have minutes of any of the Associations can greatly help in this work by sending them to the Wake Forest College Library.

On request a duplicate set of catalogue cards of the Collection has been placed in the Library of the University of North Carolina. The Collection continues to be used by those interested in our Baptist history, especially those who are writing doctoral dissertations. A recent work of value is the mas-

ter's thesis on "The Biblical Recorder," by Mr. H. M. Stroup, a student of the college.

The Commission wishes to express approval of the work of the History Committee appointed by the Southern Baptist Convention. The express function of this Southwide committee is to stimulate interest in our Baptist history. It is now planning to have a general catalogue made of all Baptist libraries in America. It asks the co-operation of our Baptist people and especially of Baptist State Conventions, and urges that an hour be given at the annual meetings of these bodies which shall be definitely devoted to the discussion of the Baptist history of the State. Our Commission expresses the hope that our North Carolina Baptist State Convention will ask its program-makers to provide this hour at its future meetings, being convinced that these historical discussions would be most interesting, and of great value in stimulating a proper interest in our denomination and its work.

Let us again urge on all who have church records in their possession to deposit them in the Wake Forest College Library where they will be easily accessible to all interested parties and be safe from fire, vermin and other destructive things. We hear that at times valuable records which should properly be in our Baptist Collection are allowed to go to the libraries of institutions of other denominations. This ought not to be. Surely, all materials relating to the history of North Carolina Baptists ought to be in our own Baptist Historical Collection.

X. ANNUAL REPORT NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

On October 1, 1937, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation was administering trust funds in the total amount of \$153,309.19, an increase over the previous year of nearly \$20,000.00.

The assets of these funds may be classified as follows:

The net income represents an average return of 3.95 per cent on the active investments.

Over \$26,000 carried on the books as principal is real estate, which is either undeveloped or in which the Foundation holds only remainder interest.

The commission paid the Fiscal Agent for handling all the investments of the Foundation was \$257.49, which represents 5.14 per cent of the net income, 3.16 per cent of the gross income. If the transactions made in exchange of investments are considered, the commission represents approximately one-third of one per centum. The services of the Fiscal Agent have been eminently satisfactory; and special thanks should be tendered Mr. LeRoy T. Martin, Trust Officer, and his efficient staff, who have given painstaking care to this work.

During the year the bonds of Meredith College and the State Convention were called for redemption and sold, the proceeds being invested elsewhere. Building and Loan Association four per cent paid up stock was purchased and the remainder loaned on notes secured by Deeds of Trust.

Trust Fund No. 749-9, established by Mr. C. P. Spruill as the Spruill Memorial, the proceeds designated for the Mills Home, was recalled as provided originally and the principal, \$1,139.08, and accumulated income in the amount of \$128.17, were paid to Mr. Spruill, thus closing this fund.

During the year, the life estate of Mr. E. J. Hurdle in the farm in Edgecombe County was terminated by his death. The Foundation thus acquires the remainder interest in one-half of this property. Steps are now being taken to effect a division of the property and to determine the further policy of the Foundation in relation to this property.

The Foundation has sold the stock held under the will of P. D. Camp, in the Camp Manufacturing Company, at par value, and reinvested a portion of the proceeds.

Three new trust funds have been established during the fiscal year. The O. L. Pittman Fund, in the principal sum of \$7,500, was transferred to the Foundation by the Trustees of the State Convention. The J. Q. Adams Fund, established under the will of W. D. Adams, in the principal amount of \$2,000.00, was likewise transferred to the Foundation by the Convention Trustees. Upon the final settlement of the estate of Miss Henrietta S. Jarman, the Foundation received two funds, both in the principal sum of \$4,580.31, one for the benefit of the Baptist Orphanage and one as a loan fund for Meredith College. In addition to the principal endowment, accumulated income amounting to \$724.97 in each account is ready for immediate distribution to the Orphanage and to the College, as soon as the transfer of funds has been completed.

This the seventeenth year of the Foundation finds it in sound condition, with no delinquent loans and showing what is believed to be a most satisfactory rate of income. This proves even more conclusively the wisdom of this method of handling various denominational endowments. Safe, secure, faithful to the declared purpose of every donor, we believe that this institution has great possibilities for development. For years this statement has been made in each annual report, but the Baptists of the State, as a group, do not realize fully the opportunity.

If all the institutions and agencies of the Convention would contribute a small sum, a proper person could be chosen and set to work in the State to secure gifts, trusts, endowments, bequests, for the benefit of any or all in-

terests as the donor would care to indicate. These gifts could be made direct to the beneficiary or to the Foundation, in large or small amounts. We are convinced that the returns from this work would far exceed the cost, and recommend that the Convention, by resolution or by authorization of the Trustees of the Convention, take necessary and proper steps to effectuate this work.

XI. RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the division of undesignated funds as between State and Southwide objects be left to the decision of the General Board when it meets in December, with, however, the instruction to the Board to increase the percentage to Southwide funds if it is at all possible to do so; that the General Board be asked to divide the per cent allocated for State objects so as to properly safeguard our debt funding commitments and at the same time conserve and promote in the best manner possible all our work.

2. That the Convention authorize a continuance of the work with our Negro and Indian brethren, and that the appropriations be made as generous as the income of the Convention will permit.

3. That the work now being done at Oteen, Sanatorium and Samarcand be continued, and that a ministry for the sick at the sanitarium near Black Mountain be provided; and that with reference to the work at Oteen we request the other states, from which veterans come to the hospital, to continue their co-operation in the support of Wayne Williams as our missionary there.

4. That the Convention authorize the Board to undertake as soon as possible "A ministry to the prisoners."

5. That the Board be authorized to aid in the best manner possible, and in so far as income permits, the people who have moved and are moving into the several Government Resettlement Areas in the state.

6. That the Convention authorize the continuance of the work of the general missionaries, now being so ably done by M. O. Alexander and J. C. Pipes.

7. That the Board be authorized to work out a plan which will place in the field the best available man whose duty it will be to solicit large contributions in the form of gifts, wills, Living Trusts, and insurance policies, for our several institutions and agencies; and that all the institutions and agencies of the Convention be asked to co-operate, in so far as it is possible, with respect (1) to providing the salary and expenses, (2) to selecting the man, and (3) to furnishing him with full information as to needs and prospects.

8. That the Board be authorized and instructed to make a survey, formulate a plan, and work out a tentative agreement with the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention looking towards the creation of a fund which will provide a Retirement Allowance for every bona fide Baptist pastor who wishes to participate and who is willing to co-operate at, say, sixty-five years of age; and that the plan be presented to the 1938 Convention.

9. That the Convention authorize the Trustees of the Cullowhee Baptist Church to borrow a sum, not exceeding \$6,000, for the purpose of completing

their church plant; and that the General Board be instructed to set aside out of its current revenues for church building a sum sufficient to retire the loan within a period not to exceed ten years.

162. REPORT ON WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Mrs. J. Clyde Turner, *President*

Last year when we made our report Woman's Missionary Union had just completed fifty years of splendid service. We entered this new period of history conscious of the challenge presented by the accomplishments of the past, but, with the motto "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts," we have gone seriously about our task and are grateful to report a sustained and increasing interest along all lines.

Mrs. Wesley N. Jones, President Emeritus, has continued her wise and helpful activity in the organization to which fifty years of her life have already been consecrated. As we met last year Miss Elsie Hunter, the valued treasurer for seventeen years, had just passed away. Miss Ora Alford, already familiar with the work, was appointed to fill her place. The other officers have remained the same and this faithful group has directed the activities of Woman's Missionary Union throughout the year.

Our policies remain unchanged. From the beginning it has been the aim of our organization to instill missionary ideals and principles into the hearts and lives of our constituency. Beginning with prayer and instruction the stewardship of life and means have followed. Our financial report, included in that of the State Mission Secretary, shows a substantial increase of more than \$20,000 over last year. North Carolina Union usually ranks third among all the states in gifts. This record has been maintained and we reached first place in gifts to Home Missions. Each year a definite increase in gifts is required in order to reach the standard of an A-1 organization. This year it was decided that this increase should be based on gifts made through the Co-operative Program. Special offerings will still be stressed as heretofore and special Seasons of Prayer observed as outlined by the Woman's Missionary Union of the South. In last year's Lottie Moon Christmas Offering we assumed a larger amount than was allotted to our State and were gratified to be able to designate \$7,000.00 for the completion of Mr. H. H. McMillan's plant in Soochow, China. This gift was made by our Woman's Missionary Union in honor of Mrs. Wesley N. Jones, for whom the chapel is to be named.

We are glad also to report an increase in number of Tithers, Mission Study Classes and A-1 organizations.

A definite goal of 2,000 paid up memberships in the Hundred Thousand Club has been adopted and we are working towards this goal.

During recent years we have been privileged to see definite results of mission work in the person of native Christians who come to this country for further study. At our Annual Meeting in Charlotte we had with us Dr. Y. C. Ching, pastor of Old North Gate church in Shanghai, who was studying at Southern Baptist Seminary in Louisville, Dr. Ching's message and personality made a fine impression on our women. His deep gratitude for the life and work of Matthew T. Yates stimulated interest in this mission and especially in the Old North Gate church. This is the church founded by Dr. Matthew T. Yates,

and the field in which so many North Carolina missionaries have labored. Because of this association and the pressing need for the removal of church to a new location where they can erect more adequate buildings, it was decided to give \$4,000.00 to this cause through the Heck Memorial Offering which is our yearly love gift in honor of Miss Fannie E. S. Heck.

Another definite product of mission work is Miss Kazue Murata, student at Meredith College, preparing to teach home economics in our girls' school at Kokura, Japan. It is the joy of Woman's Missionary Union to provide for her expenses during her two years residence here.

The Margaret Fund provides scholarships for the education of missionaries' children, and in addition to regular scholarships the Elizabeth Lowndes scholarship recently created is awarded to the senior who has been outstanding both in character and in scholarship during the three years of college life. We rejoice that Archie McMillan has won this honor with a scholastic grade of 96.5 and the qualities of character and influence required to attain it.

The work of our Young People under Miss Mary Currin has gone steadily forward. Each grade of organization has a special week called Focus Week, when the aim is to keep the needs and accomplishments of this group before the church. In addition, each also has one special state-sponsored meeting during the year. This year the G. A. House Party and R. A. Conclave were held at Meredith College in June. Both were well attended and yielded spiritual results in reconsecration of lives and in definite surrender to Christ. We bespeak the encouragement and support of pastors and churches for this work.

Our Y. W. A.'s participated in the Southwide Camp at Ridgecrest and returned with new enthusiasm and inspiration for more consecrated lives. In a day when so many influences draw our young people from the church too great emphasis cannot be put on these organizations.

We are preparing to join in the Jubilee Celebration of our Southern Union in 1938. This preparation has been inaugurated with a season of heart searching designed to produce a fuller consecration and a renewed dedication to Kingdom activities. We look forward to 1938 as the greatest year we have yet had. We covet your interest, your support, your prayers as we go forward in His service.

AUDITOR'S STATEMENT

We have audited the books and records of the Convention for the twelve months ended December 31, 1937, and in the following tabulations we show the Revenue and Expense of the General Fund, together with all Cash Receipts and Disbursements for the other funds.

Exhibit "A" shows the Revenue and Expense of the General Fund, together with the distribution of the Revenue after paying expenses chargeable to the undesignated revenue.

Exhibits "B" to "G", inclusive, show the cash transactions of all other funds for the year, and Exhibit "H" is a summary of the net Debt of the Convention on December 31, 1937.

All Cash Receipts were found to have been promptly deposited in the bank and Disbursements were found supported by cancelled checks, invoices, etc., and expenses were properly classified. Our examination did not disclose any evidence of irregularities and we believe the funds have been carefully and honestly handled and properly accounted for.

Just below is a summary, not audited, but prepared from the reports of the various institutions, showing the total of all income for Convention objects for the calendar year 1937.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY

L. L. MORGAN, *Secretary*

All figures in the statistical tables are given for the associational year and not for the calendar year. Associations began meeting July 20 and continued through November 4. There are seventy associations and two Indian Associations as Associate Members of the Convention.

A glance at the figures will reveal improvement in almost every phase of our work. We have made considerable gains in finances during the year. Our increase over last year's receipts was about twenty per cent. The recent session of the State Convention held in Wilmington was one of the best in the history of our work. It was encouraging to note the spirit of fellowship, faith and hope that permeated the discussions of Baptist affairs and Kingdom work in general. We congratulate the program committee upon its ability to muster such an array of talent to serve on the program.

BAPTISMS

We received during the year 19,453 members by baptisms. This is a gain of 605 over 1936. The number of churches reporting no baptisms was reduced from 666 to 632 this year. Thirty-three Indian churches reported 157 baptisms.

CHURCH MEMBERS

There are now 2,468 churches with a membership of 471,554. Last year we reported 2,451 churches and a membership of 465,698. This represents a gain of 17 churches and 5,856 members. There are 33 Indian churches with a membership of 2,667.

GIFTS

Gifts to all Missions, education and benevolences amount to \$639,267.95. This represents a gain of \$71,737.04. For all local work such as debts, buildings, fuel, lights, pastoral support and other operating expenses the sum given was \$2,618,313.50. This sum represents a gain over last year of \$177,086.80. The total for all gifts to all causes is \$3,257,581.45. The total gain in contributions to all causes is \$248,823.84.

COOPERATING CHURCHES

The number of cooperating churches contributing to denominational objects is 2,268. This is an increase of 29 over last year. Only 200 failed to give something to one or more of the causes fostered by the Convention.

PER CAPITA GIFTS

The per capita gifts to all causes, local and outside, is \$6.91. Gifts to denominational causes alone are \$1.36 per capita.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE CHURCHES

The Department of Christian Education in the churches is made up of the Sunday School and Baptist Training Union Divisions, Laymen's Work, and Student Work. W. Perry Crouch is Secretary with headquarters at 200 Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh.

DIVISION OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

There are 2,421 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 385,265. We have suffered a loss of 16 schools and 5,931 members. Revision of rolls and several churches failing to report to the associational clerks is responsible for most of the loss. Two hundred and seventy Vacation Bible Schools were held during the year. This is a gain of 93 over last year. L. L. Morgan is Secretary of the Sunday School Division and Mr. and Mrs. John B. Lane are Field Workers. The headquarters office is 206 Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh.

TRAINING UNION

There are 1,119 Training Unions with 56,110 members. This figure represents the number of churches with Training Union work. Many of them have several Baptist Young People's Unions. Nathan C. Brooks, Jr., is Secretary of the Division and Miss Mabel Starnes is Associate Secretary. The office is located at 205 Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Woman's Missionary Union statistical report runs from January 1 to December 31, and 1937 reports cannot be compiled before this Annual of North Carolina State Convention goes to press so the figures below are for 1936.

In 1936 there were 3,076 organizations of Woman's Missionary Union reporting. The roll is revised each year and when no report is sent during the year the organization is dropped from the roll until it does report. The membership in these organizations totalled 57,584. Organized work was done in sixty-one associations, each one holding its separate annual meeting. Twelve hundred and thirteen organizations made one of the three grades on the Standard of Excellence and 529 made all ten points. Two thousand and sixty-two Mission Study classes were held, with 13,588 seals awarded. The 1936 Heck Memorial Offering of \$5,258.77 was appropriated as follows: \$2,500.00 for Rev. Hudson McMillan, Soochow, China; \$1,000.00 to Leper Work on Tai Kam Island; \$100.00 to Rev. Shuichi Ozaki, Japanese ministerial student at Seminary, Louisville; \$600.00 for Expenses of Miss Kazue Murata, Japanese student at Meredith College; \$634.34 to W.M.U. Training School. The last three items appropriated by W.M.U. Executive Committee.

Total contributions for the year was \$218,331.11.

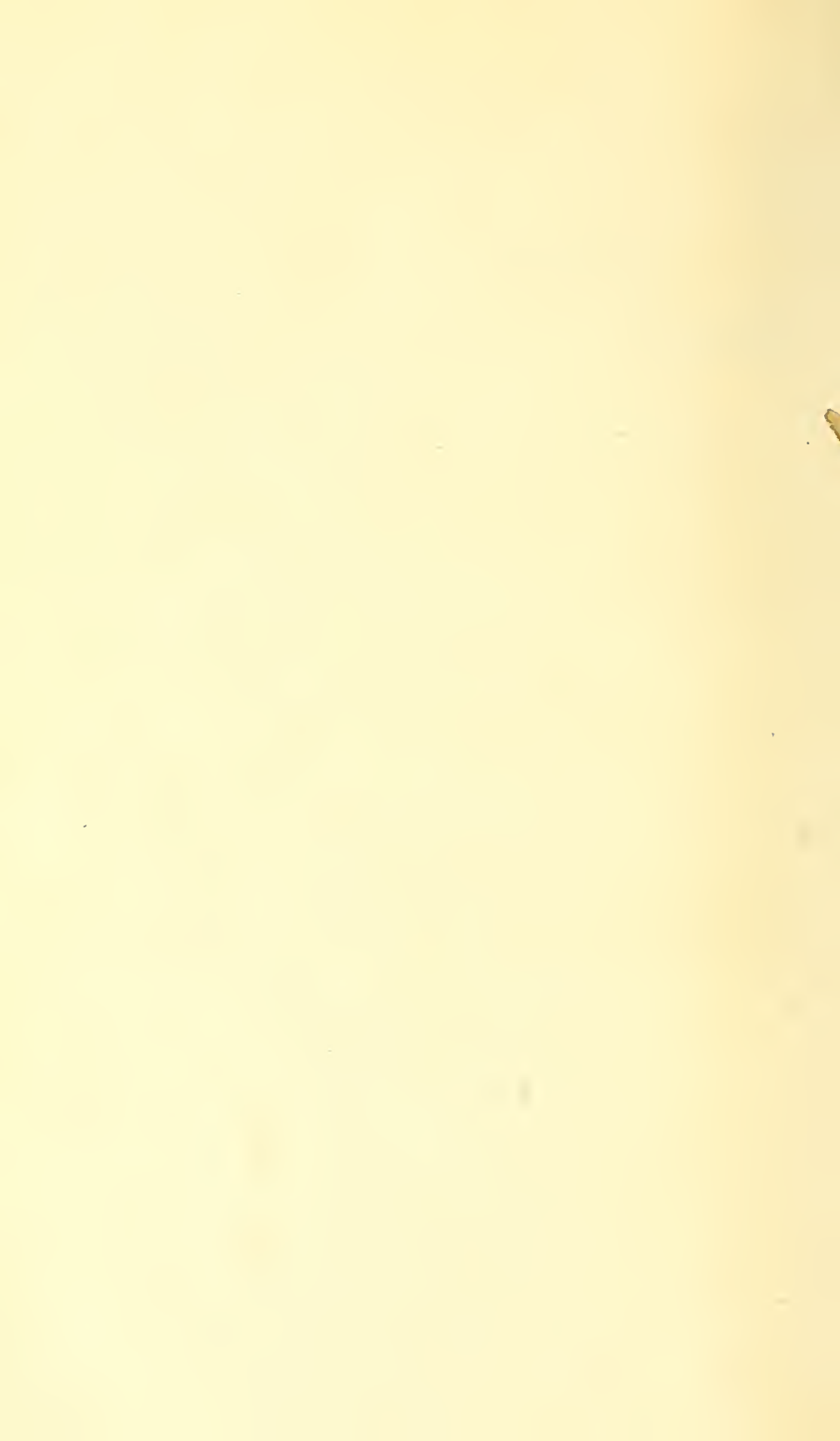
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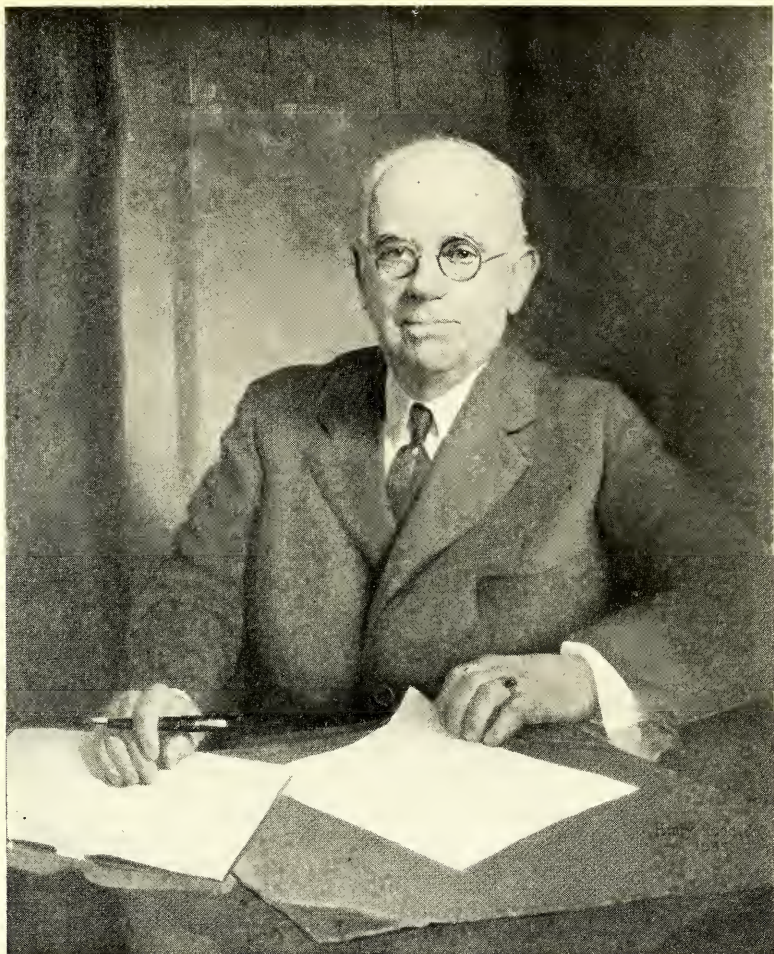

Tutor Wake Forest College 1878-1881; and Professor of Biology 1881 to near time of his death. President Wake Forest College 1905-1927. President Emeritus 1927 to 1938. He received the degree of Litt.D. from Mercer University; the degree of LL.D. from the University of North Carolina. Duke University, Baylor University, Brown University. President North Carolina Baptist State Convention 1936-37. He was the author of a large number of articles and of six books: *Laboratory and Pulpit* (1901), *The New Peace* (1915), *Can a Man Be a Christian Today?* (1929), *The Way of Victory* (1929), *Stop-Light* (1935), *Youth and Culture* (1938). CONSTITUTION

I. NAME AND OBJECT

SECTION 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

The object of the Convention shall be to promote Missions, Education, Social Service, the distribution and study of the Bible and sound religious literature; and to coöperate with the Southern Baptist Convention in its work.

II. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be composed of not more than three representatives from each white association in the State and not more than one representative from each cooperating church for every fifty members or fraction thereof and of the officers and members of the General Board of the Convention and of the Life Members so declared under the previous Constitution: *Provided*, that no church have more than ten representatives and no one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member in good standing of a Missionary Baptist Church coöperating with the Convention.

III. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Convention shall meet annually on Tuesday after the third Sunday in November, except in those years when the meeting date will fall in Thanksgiving week; in which case the Convention shall meet annually on Tuesday after the second Sunday in November.

IV. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The officers of the Convention shall be a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Third Vice President, a Recording Secretary, a General Secretary, a Treasurer (the General Secretary may be elected as Treasurer at the discretion of the Convention), three Trustees of the Convention, and five Directors of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. The President, Vice Presidents, Recording Secretary, General Secretary, and Treasurer shall be elected at the Convention may determine, the Trustees of the Convention and Directors of the Baptist Foundation, in the manner provided by their respective charters. The terms of office of President and Vice Presidents commence at the conclusion of the session at which they are elected and continue until the close of the next Convention.

SEC. 2. The President shall preside over the deliberations of the Convention and discharge such other duties as are imposed upon him by the Convention or as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body. He shall appoint all Committees unless the Convention shall otherwise direct. In case of his absence or incapacity one of the Vice Presidents shall act in his stead.

SEC. 3. The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the proceedings of the Convention and have the same printed and distributed.

SEC. 4. The General Secretary of the Convention shall have administrative supervision of the work of Missions, Education, Benevolences, and all other general training activities of the Convention. He shall employ a

reputable auditor or firm of auditors each year to make a complete audit of the books and accounts of the treasurer and bookkeeping department and report to the Executive Committee of the General Board, which shall receive and pass upon said report and have it published in the minutes of the Convention and in the *Biblical Recorder* or the then recognized denominational organ.

SEC. 5. The Treasurer shall receive all funds sent to him for the objects of the Convention, make acknowledgment of the same once a month in the *Biblical Recorder* or the then recognized denominational organ, give a bond to the Trustees of the Convention in such amount as they may determine for the faithful performance of his duties and prescribe the terms and conditions of said bond. He shall also forward at least once a month all contributions to their destination; at every meeting of the Convention he shall make a full report of his receipts and disbursements, and upon retiring from his office, deliver to his successor all moneys, papers, books and other property belonging thereto.

SEC. 6. The Trustees shall take and hold the title to any and all property acquired by and belonging to the Convention. They shall require a sufficient bond from the Treasurer. In case he shall refuse or neglect to give satisfactory bond within thirty days after his election the Trustees shall have power to elect a successor. The said Trustees shall elect a chairman and secretary and report annually to the Convention the work done by them. They shall receive and make such conveyances of the properties of the Convention as directed by the Convention. During the interim between sessions of the Convention the said Trustees may receive and convey the property of the Convention upon the advice and direction of the General Board.

V. GENERAL BOARD

SECTION 1. The General Board of the Convention shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention, *ex officio*, and forty-eight members from the State at large. The Convention shall elect one-third of the members from the State at large to hold office for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years, but as the terms expire the successors shall serve for terms of three years. That retiring members of the Board be ineligible for reelection until the following meeting of the State Convention. No one in the employment for pay of any Institution or Board fostered by this Convention shall be eligible to membership on this Board. The General Board shall fill all vacancies in its membership between the session of the Convention until the session of the next Convention, when the vacancies shall be filled by the Convention itself in the manner provided by its laws.

SEC. 2. The General Board shall have charge and control, except when otherwise directed by the Convention, of all work of the Convention, including Missions, Education, Benevolences, and all other general activities, in the interim between the sessions of the Convention. Any action by the General Board during the interim between the sessions of the Convention vitally related to the work of the Convention shall be binding upon the Convention: *Provided*, it shall not relate to any matter previously committed to some other agency of the Convention with power to act. But any action of the Board during the interim shall be reported fully to the Convention at its next session.

SEC. 3. The General Board shall report to each session of the Convention upon the work done in each department, viz.: Missions, Education, Benevolences and all other general activities. The Board shall have its report printed and ready for distribution at the first session of the Convention; all reports from Educational Institutions, Hospitals, Orphanages, Baptist Foundation, and all other institutions or agencies of the Convention shall report to the Convention through the General Board.

SEC. 4. The General Board of the Convention shall meet in regular session in December and June of each year, and in cases of emergency at the call of the President and General Secretary of the Board or any five members.

SEC. 5. At the first December meeting of the General Board the work of the Convention shall be divided as follows: Missions, Education, Benevolences and Training Activities. The membership of the General Board shall be divided into four committees of twelve each and the work as above outlined shall be assigned to these committees. Each committee shall organize itself by the selection of a chairman and a recording secretary. All appropriations for the work of the various departments of the General Board shall be made by the General Board; but each committee shall make to the General Board definite and specific recommendations as to all appropriations.

SEC. 6. The General Board shall select an Executive Committee consisting of the Chairman of the Committees on Missions, Education, Benevolences and Training Activities, the President of the General Board, and two other members of the General Board. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the General Secretary and shall have general direction and oversight of all the work of the General Board in the interim between the sessions of the Board and such other matters as shall be assigned to it by the General Board.

SEC. 7. The General Board shall be successor in law to all legal obligations heretofore incurred by the Board of Missions and by the Board of Education.

SEC. 8. At each December meeting the General Board may select such other departmental assistants as may be needed.

VI. TRUSTEES OF CONVENTION'S INSTITUTION

SECTION 1. The charters of all institutions owned and supported by the Convention shall contain the following provisions as nearly as may be and conformable to the number of trustees to be elected, that is to say:

a. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall elect the trustees of said corporation and their regular term of office shall be four years. At the first election by the Convention one-fourth of the board of trustees shall be elected to serve for one year, one-fourth for two years, one-fourth for three years and the remaining one-fourth for four years. At each subsequent regular annual session of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina one-fourth of the members of the Board of Trustees of said corporation shall be elected by the Convention to succeed the members of said Board retiring.

b. The members of the Board of Trustees of said corporation shall be residents of the State of North Carolina and members in good and

regular standing of a Missionary Baptist Church coöperating with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

c. Removal from the State or ceasing for any reason to be a member in good and regular standing of a Missionary Baptist Church coöperating with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be equivalent to a resignation from said Board of Trustees. Any vacancy on the Board shall be filled by the remaining members until the next regular annual session of the Convention and the Convention shall at its next regular annual session fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

d. The term of office of a trustee who has not resigned, died, become disqualified, or been removed shall not expire until his successor shall have been duly elected and qualified.

e. The Board of Trustees of said corporation by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of its entire membership, given in regular annual meeting or in a special meeting duly called for the purpose, shall have power to remove from office any trustee of such corporation for cause considered sufficient by such Board, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee and opportunity to him to be heard by the Board.

f. The Baptist State Convention shall have the right at any time to remove from office any trustee for cause considered sufficient by the Convention, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee and opportunity for him to be heard by the Convention. Notice of such contemplated action and hearing by the Convention may be given by the Executive Committee of the Convention.

g. That no individual shall serve on any Board, or Institution, who is at the same time holding membership on any other Board or Institution.

SEC. 2. The Trustees of all institutions, benevolent, educational or otherwise under the control of the Convention shall be elected by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and shall hold office for the term to which elected, unless sooner terminated. When any vacancy shall occur in any Board of any such institution a nominating committee elected by the Convention shall nominate to the Convention Baptists to fill such vacancy. The Trustees of all institutions owned and supported by the Convention shall make annual report to the nominating committee of any vacancies. Each Board shall have the right to make any suggestion to the nominating committee it may see fit regarding such nominations, and all nominations made by the committee shall be passed upon by the Convention. The Convention shall have the right to adopt the report of the nominating committee and elect the trustees thus nominated, or to substitute the name of other trustee or trustees in lieu thereof, or recommit said report for further consideration as the case may be.

VII. GENERAL ITEMS

SECTION 1. Individuals, churches, and associations, or others desiring the assistance and coöperation of the Baptists of the State in any work not already fostered by the Convention should present the question to the agency under which it should be properly placed. If the agency should refuse to take it up, it may be presented to the Convention under miscellaneous business or a special order.

SEC. 2. The members of the Boards of the Convention and Institutions affiliated with the Convention shall be distributed as widely as practicable, both as to territory and individuals.

SEC. 3. The Convention year shall close December 31 of each year.

SEC. 4. The compensation of all paid officers and employees of the Convention, the General Board, and its committees shall be fixed by the Executive Committee subject to review by the General Board at its next meeting.

SEC. 5. No institution or agency affiliating with the Convention shall encumber its property or change its status with respect to the Convention without authority of the Convention or its General Board; *provided that this section shall not prohibit the Convention or its General Board from purchasing the Biblical Recorder, including the building, land, and the paper, and incurring such indebtedness as may be necessary for this purpose, not to exceed \$65,500.00.**

That except as may be necessary in the reasonable anticipation of current revenues and payable out of the same, or for the purpose of funding or refinancing any indebtedness of the Convention now outstanding, neither the Convention nor its General Board shall have the power to create any debt or obligation binding on the Convention; and no other board, agency or institution of, or affiliated with the Convention, shall have the power at any time to create any debt or obligation binding on the Convention.

SEC. 6. If for any reason, it shall be necessary to select a place or to change the time or place of the meeting of the Convention after the Convention adjourns, the President, Recording Secretary and the General Secretary of the Convention shall be a committee with power to make necessary change or changes.

SEC. 7. This constitution may be changed or amended on any day of any annual session of the Convention by two-thirds vote of the members present when the vote is taken, provided notice of the contemplated amendment or change shall have been announced on a previous day of the convention.

BY-LAWS OF THE GENERAL BOARD

I. THE PRESIDENT AND RECORDING SECRETARY

The President of the General Board, in addition to the regular duties incumbent upon such officers, shall appoint special committees to investigate and report upon any matters which concern equally all departments of the work of the Convention. The Secretary shall record all proceedings in correct form and preserve the same.

II. OFFICERS, SECRETARIES AND DEPARTMENTAL ASSISTANTS

At the annual December meeting of the General Board, there shall be elected the following officers, who shall serve for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified: President, Vice President and Recording Secretary.

* Amendment passed 1938 Convention (see section 45, page 37).

At the same time the Board shall elect all Departmental Heads and such other assistants as may from time to time be deemed necessary, and shall fix compensation of its Secretaries and other employees.

III. QUORUM

Seventeen members shall be required to constitute a quorum of the Board. Five shall be required to constitute a quorum of any department. Four shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Committee of the General Board.

IV. THE WORK OF THE GENERAL BOARD

The work of the General Board shall be apportioned among its four divisions, in so far as may be practicable, as indicated below. The General Board, the Executive Committee of the General Board and the General Secretary (48 members exclusive of the President and Secretary of the Convention, who are *ex officio* members):

1. *Department of Missions*—(12—Secretary of Missions—Division of (1) Field Work; (2) Evangelism; (3) Negro Work.

2. *Department of Training*—(12)—Secretary of Training—Division of (1) Sunday schools—Secretary; (2) B. Y. P. U.—Secretary; (3) Student Activities.

3. *Department of Benevolences*—(12)—Secretary of Benevolences—Division of (1) Orphanage; (2) Hospital; (3) Ministers' Relief.

4. *Department of Education*—(12)—Secretary of Education—Division of (1) Educational Institution; (2) Ministerial Education.

5. *Department of Woman's Missionary Union.*

The Executive Committee shall have power in its discretion, to modify, enlarge, diminish, or otherwise alter the divisions of the work of the Board as it may from time to time deem advisable or necessary, the changes so made to be reported to the next regular meeting of the General Board for its consideration.

V. UNDESIGNATED GIFTS

The General Board at its annual meeting shall determine the percentage of undesignated gifts that each object of the Convention shall receive, including State and South-wide, provided always that any allocation of such funds shall not violate any order with respect to the same previously made by the Baptist State Convention.

VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee shall have power to borrow money and execute notes on behalf of the General Board for the purpose of meeting the obligations of said Board, and to do and perform any act incidental to or necessary in the execution and discharge of the work of the General Board: *Provided*, the Executive Committee shall not incur obligations for any object in excess of the budget fixed by the General Board. Notes may be executed in the name of the General Board and on its behalf by the Chairman of the Executive Committee attested by the General Secretary,

and when so executed by authority of the Executive Committee duly given, shall be the binding obligation of the General Board.

The Executive Committee of the General Board shall meet upon the call of the General Secretary, or any four members. If practicable, at least one meeting shall be held each month.

VII. SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

His duties, together with all other Departmental Heads, or Assistants, shall be determined from time to time by the General Board.

VIII. EXECUTIVE SESSION

The General Board may by a majority vote of the number present, go into executive session at any time for the purpose of considering such matters as may claim the consideration of said Board.

IX. AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a majority vote of the members attending said meeting.

X. PUBLICATION

These by-laws, together with any amendments that may be made thereon, from time to time, shall be printed in the Minutes of the Baptist State Convention.

23. The Convention Sermon was preached by James B. Willis, Hamlet, who used as his theme, "The Joy of Being Needed," from the text basis Mark 11:3. R. E. Hardaway, Lenoir, read the Eleventh Chapter of Mark prior to the delivery of the Annual Sermon.

24. Joel S. Snyder, Fayetteville, offered the prayer that closed the session.

TUESDAY—Afternoon Session

25. "O Worship The King" was the opening song of this session. It was followed by a devotion period led by Wynman E. Wood, Swannanoa, and thereafter the Convention sang "Have Thine Own Way Lord."

26. A duet number "Pray Softly" was given by Misses Frances Dixon, South Boston, Va., and Louise Pruitt, Hickory, Meredith College Students.

27. Secretary W. Perry Crouch, of the Department of Christian Education in the Churches presented this phase of the work and read the Report. (See section 118, page 79.) He was aided in the presentation of the report by these divisions of the work.

Sunday School. A message "Sunday School Reaching the Unsaved" was given L. L. Morgan, Secretary, and prior thereto he presented John B. Lane and Mrs. Lane; Mrs. W. Perry Crouch; Mrs. C. D. Bain, and Miss Bessie Morgan, field and office aides.

Training Union. "The Spiritual Laboratory in our Church Life" was the subject brought by Nathan Brooks, Secretary, who prior to his message introduced Miss Josephine Turner, who takes up the work of Miss Mable Starnes, resigned, and Miss Mary Lou Wall, office Secretary.

Student Work. Miss Velma Preslar, Student Field Worker, delivered a message on "Our Students Are Ready to Accept the Challenge." She was assisted in presenting this division by Miss Cleo Mitchell, Student Secretary of W.C. of U.N.C., Greensboro, and Miss Ann Downey, of E.C.T.C. Miss Dora Bostick was presented as the office secretary.

28. Clyde R. Hoey, Governor of the State of North Carolina, was recognized and upon invitation brought greetings to the body.

29. Representative B. A. Bowers, Gastonia, of the Sunday School Board read his report. He moved its adoption, and prior thereto W. F. Powell, of the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., spoke to the report.

REPORT SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

The aim of the Sunday School Board is to teach the Word of God to our people and all of our prospects.

Dr. Moore says "In our attempt at accuracy both in interpretation and in application we insist that each and every lesson exposition shall be: (1) Biblical, true to the Bible; (2) Baptist, consistent with the doctrines of our denomination; (3) Evangelistic, likely to lead to the salvation of people who study and are taught it; (4) Devotional, calculated to deepen the spiritual life; (5) Developing, designed to inspire and equip for Christian service; (6) Missionary, inculcating the sentiment and the spirit of the Great Commission; and (7) Practical, contacting and connecting helpful with life."

The Board has experienced growth along all lines. New workers have been added to the force. Many new and helpful books have been published. Scores of helpful tracts are put at the disposal of pastors and churches free.

The Board's work among college and university students, south-wide conferences and the annual assembly at Ridgecrest is far reaching and greatly helpful.

"It should be known by all of our people that the Sunday School Board is a missionary agency. All of the literature published by the Board has a definite missionary emphasis.

"The Sunday School Board is definitely evangelistic in all of its operations. This is seen in the following phases of its work.

"The various lesson writers are evangelistic in the preparation of the lesson material. The monthly periodicals present various articles on evangelism, and at intervals issue special editions in the interest of evangelism.

"This interest in evangelism is seen in the Study Course Books which are published and used throughout the entire organization." Also in special conference held in each state.

The Board contributes to Sunday School and Baptist Training Union work in each state of the Southern Baptist Convention territory. The total amount for last year was \$146,647.80. North Carolina's share of this gift was over twelve thousand dollars. The most of this donation was used for the salaries of Sunday school and Baptist Training Union workers.

During this year, from January 1 to November 1, 1,522 new Sunday schools have been organized. Three thousand five hundred seventy new Training Unions, 2,152 new Cradle Rolls, and there were 3,179 Vacation Bible Schools conducted. During the past year our Sunday school enrollment had a net gain of 38,351, while the gain in enrollment in the Baptist Training Union reached 49,015.

Be it understood. We could mention only a limited number of the achievements of the Board in this brief report.

30. The first special message on the Convention Theme was brought at this hour by Sankey L. Blanton, Wilmington, whose subject was "The Essential Nature of First Century Christianity."

31. A prayer by I. M. Mercer closed the session.

TUESDAY—Evening Session

32. This session was opened with the singing of "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing" to be followed by the devotion led by W. D. Morris, Elizabeth City, and J. L. Carrick, Murfreesboro, offered prayer.

33. A special musical selection was rendered by the choir of the host Church with Mrs. Glenn Lassiter as Directress assisted by Miss Gladys Ricks, at the organ. The number was "Send Out Thy Light."

34. Mrs. J. Clyde Turner, Greensboro, President of the Woman's Missionary Union, read the report of the Union. (See section 133 page 109.) It was adopted upon her motion following a discussion of the work of the W. M. U. by Mrs. W. N. Jones, Raleigh.

35. At the request of Ira D. S. Knight, Durham, Forrest C. Feezor, stated that sixty-four years ago on this day (November 15, 1874), ten members from the First Baptist Church of Raleigh assembled and organized the Tabernacle and host church.

36. State Representative Knight of the Home Mission Board read his report. It was adopted upon his motion following the address on the work of the Home Mission Board by its representative J. W. Beagle, Atlanta, whose theme covered "The Purposes, Policies and Work of the Home Board."

HOME MISSION BOARD REPORT

The very last recorded words of our Divine Redeemer, before the ascension, commissioned His disciples to "be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost parts of the earth." By this commission Jesus Christ established what we call City, State, Home and Foreign Missions. These should always remain inseparably linked together.

Dr. J. B. Lawrence, Secretary of our Home Mission Board, recently wrote, "I wish always in speaking of Home Missions to relate the Home Mission Board and its work to other missionary enterprises in such a way as to cause no one to think of Home Missions in contrast with, or in opposition to, whether else we are doing in the mission field as a denomination." It is, therefore, with this conception of missions that we should approach the task of Home Missions.

"The task of Home Missions," Dr. Lawrence recently wrote, "Is the preaching of the Gospel to the Indians, foreigners, Negroes; the evangelization of the Jews; ministering to the underprivileged groups; taking the message of life to the deaf; and helping to reach the unchurched in our cities. . . . Our mission program must not overlook the twenty-nine nationalities here in the homeland. Christ has not overlooked them. There are no preferred nations in the atonement of Christ."

In obedience to the commission of Christ, the small Jerusalem band of 120 disciples, have grown until today they number eight hundred million, or thirty-eight out of every one hundred people in the world. The fidelity of Southern Baptists to the commission of Christ in our homeland has also reaped a great harvest. We confess our sins of omission and the slighting of our stewardship, but we give glory to God for the results which have been accomplished.

The Home Mission Board has tasted the joy of going on. The Lord has richly blessed our missionaries in every field. Today we have 340 missionaries working in nearly 900 mission stations. Last year 50,000 people were personally interviewed about their soul's salvation in addition to the multitudes who heard the Gospel in the 36,600 sermons and addresses delivered by our Home Board missionaries.

The detailed reports from the various divisions of our Home Mission enterprise are always enlightening. The work among the foreign-speaking people in the Southland is rapidly growing; eighty-eight missionaries are engaged in this work in 211 churches and mission stations; last year 1,999 conversions were reported in this division only. The work among the Chinese is a separate division; three mission workers reported 29 conversions. Our mountain mission work engages eight missionaries serving in 19 churches and mission stations; these workers reported 162 conversions last year. Among the 45,000 deaf scattered over our convention territory we have six workers in 120 mission stations; this division of our enterprise reported 79 baptisms last year. The Dyess Colony, a government project in Mississippi County, Arkansas, has two Home Board missionaries serving four churches and mission stations; this new enterprise is making rapid progress in the days of its beginning. In St. Louis and Granite City, Ill., three missionaries are working in four mission stations. Another type of city mission work supported by our Home Mission Board are the fifteen Good Will Centers of activity wherein six workers are employed; 105 conversions were reported last year from these centers. There are also three centers of rescue work in New Orleans, La., and Jacksonville, Fla.; only eternity can record the great work these centers are accomplishing. Within our Southland 65 missionaries are working among the Indians;

they minister to 124 churches and mission stations; last year they reported 1,107 conversions.

Of the 14,000,000 Negroes in the United States 11,000,000 live within the borders of our Convention. In this field of opportunity our Board supports 16 workers in 69 churches and mission stations; this co-operative enterprise is rapidly opening new avenues for greater leadership and service. The opportunities in Cuba are increasingly beckoning to us. Cuba is still a new mission field as yet hardly touched by Gospel influence. Our Cuban missionaries are working through 133 centers in churches and mission stations. In the Panama Canal Zone six missionaries serve in nine churches and mission stations as they endeavor to reach the sixty thousand West-Indians who were brought there during the construction days.

Mention must be made concerning the fruitful work among the Jews. The Department of Publicity is also rapidly proving its great service not only in news distributing, but in the work of mission propoganda. The department of Mission Study offers 13 mission study books, published by the Home Mission Board, in connection with many other coöperative advantages. Special mention must also be made concerning the department of Evangelism. This department is emphatically placing upon the hearts of Southern Baptists the only imperative in the great commission "make disciples."

All of the various types of work done by our Home Board missionaries in Panama, Cuba and our beloved homeland during last year, saw as its fruition over five thousand conversions. It is not our privilege to glory in deeds done. It is ours to look forward, catch greater visions, and press onward with new consecration. North Carolina Baptists rank second in the list of states contributing to the general fund of the Home Mission Board. The great host of Southern Baptists have unquestionably shown their commitment to the tasks of the Home Mission Board. Three human factors have so mightily made possible the glowing record of achievement that they deserve special mention: I refer to the Bottoms Trust Fund, given by Mrs. Ida M. Bottoms, of Texarkana, Arkansas, which contributes over \$55,000 per year to Home Missions; and the Annie W. Armstrong offering of the W. M. U. which last year contributed through the March week of prayer about \$131,000. The One Hundred Thousand Club has also greatly aided in reducing the principle indebtedness of the Board. During the last decade the indebtedness of the Home Mission Board has been reduced approximately one million dollars.

The chief source of the financial support of the Home Mission Board is the coöperative program. Dr. J. E. Dillard has recently said, "Without Home Missions the program would fall to pieces. If you should cut Home Missions out of the coöperative program the program would bleed to death. . . . Home Missions is necessary to the success of Foreign Missions. If we do not win our own homeland for Christ, we cannot win foreign lands. . . . We must bear in mind that the best way to increase our receipts for the Home Mission Board is to stand steadfastly behind our coöperative program."

The challenge of Home Missions today is a call to new tasks on new frontiers. It is a call to live for the lost of every tribe and nation who live in our midst. It is a challenge to prove the reality of our mission passion and love for the peoples of lands afar to which we are sending foreign missionaries. It is a challenge to live in conduct and character as Christ lived—for others. The Home Mission Board accepts the challenge and girds itself for the task of bringing the Kingdom of God in our beloved Southland.

May each individual Southern Baptist sacrificially support this Christ-commissioned, kingdom-building enterprise.

WEDNESDAY—Morning Session

38. At 9:00 o'clock the session convened and the Convention sang "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" and "Amazing Grace."

39. J. D. Simons, Louisburg, led the devotion assisted by A. D. Kinnett, Burlington, who offered a prayer.

40. At this time the Convention was advised of the sudden death of Vance Browning, of Bryson City that took place early this morning in his hotel room. It was noted that he was in attendance upon the sessions of the Convention and was one of the most active Baptist layman in the State. President Simms called upon J. Ben Eller, Greensboro, to offer a prayer following silent meditation in recognition of the passing of this beloved and faithful servant of the Convention.

A Committee composed of Hoyt Blackwell, T. F. Dietz, J. R. Morgan, W. N. Cook, J. H. Harwood, Nane Starnes, Perry Morgan, and Nathan Brooks were named as a special Committee to represent the Convention at the funeral.

41. There was received as a matter of information, at this time a report on the *Biblical Recorder* by N. A. Dunn, President of the Biblical Recorder Publishing Company, Raleigh.

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER

Early in the year—February 27—the *Biblical Recorder* lost its faithful editor and business manager. Rev. J. S. Farmer, who had been with the company for more than thirty-five years. He left his work here to enter into the rest prepared for the people of God, and we have sorely missed him. None of us could take his place; yet we have labored as best we could, and the great God has blessed our efforts.

The general business conditions in North Carolina have not been quite as good as they were in 1937, the cotton crop being much below last year's crop with the price also low, and many of our industries having been shut down for a good part of the year. Hence money is scarce, and it has been hard for many of our subscribers to pay for their papers. And yet, notwithstanding these conditions, our friends have been loyal and our subscription list is a little larger than it was a year ago. The church clubs have showed a substantial increase, and we now have 489 clubs, the largest number that we have ever

had. We expect to close the year with a little profit, and we are very grateful to all of our subscribers for making this possible.

The *Recorder* is now closing its 104th year, and those of us who are trying to carry it on desire to coöperate with the Convention in every way. We believe the *Recorder* has been a great blessing to our people through the years, and we want to see it render the greatest service possible in the years ahead.

42. The Convention having been served on yesterday with due notice by M. A. Huggins with reference to a proposed amendment to the Constitution he now submitted the proposed amendment to wit:

That the period at the end of Section 5 of Article VIII be changed to a semi-colon and these words be added: "*Provided* that this section shall not prohibit the Convention or its General Board from purchasing the *Biblical Recorder*, including the building, land, and the paper, and incurring such indebtedness as may be necessary for this purpose, not to exceed \$65,500.00."

43. A discussion followed the reading of the proposed amendment, and it was agreed upon motions by M. A. Adams, and seconded by J. A. McKaughan, Winston-Salem, that the amendment would not be put to a vote until the report on the purchase of the *Biblical Recorder* had been received and passed upon.

44. J. L. Peacock, *Chairman* of the Committee to Consider Usefulness or Wisdom of Purchasing the *Biblical Recorder*, read the following report as signed by the Committee, to wit:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PURCHASE OF BIBLICAL RECORDER

After three years of conference and negotiations with the Biblical Recorder Publishing Company, your Committee is able to bring a final report which we hope may meet the approval of the Convention.

We wish to express and record our grateful appreciation for the fraternal and coöperative spirit which has been manifest by all parties in our continued negotiations. Of course, the directors of the Recorder Publishing Company have naturally and of necessity considered the whole matter as a business proposition, and yet at no time has there been any wide divergence of views nor any sharp or disagreeable angles. Your committee has all along recognized and expressed our sense of obligation to the *Biblical Recorder* for the fine and indispensable service it has rendered to all our denominational agencies and interests and has sought to deal with all questions involved in the negotiations in a liberal Christian spirit. On the other hand, the Directors of the Recorder Publishing Company have recognized that while it was a private corporation its success has depended upon and been made possible by the sympathetic attitude and support of the denomination, which has recognized the *Biblical Recorder* as our medium of publicity and has recognized the Recorder Publishing Company as a quasi denominational agency.

At the very first meeting of the Committee it was decided and agreed upon that it would not be to our advantage for us to purchase the *Biblical Recorder* separate and apart from the Recorder

Building. So, from the first the negotiations have concerned and looked to the purchase of both.

We have now agreed upon price and terms by which, if approved both by the Board of Directors and Stockholders of the Recorder Publishing Company and by the Convention, we will purchase, and the Recorder Publishing Company will transfer to the Convention both its present site and building, known as the Recorder Building at 121-123 W. Hargett Street, and the name, subscription list and good will of the *Biblical Recorder*, with its present printing contract with the Bynum Printing Company, which contract has about three years yet to run. Mr. N. A. Dunn, President of the Board of Directors of the Recorder Publishing Company, has agreed to recommend to the Board of Directors and Stockholders of the Company the sale at the price and upon the terms agreed upon, and your Committee has agreed to recommend and does hereby recommend to the Convention the purchase at the price and upon the terms hereinafter set forth.

The total price of the purchase of the *Biblical Recorder* and Recorder Building is to be \$65,500.00, which your Committee believes to be entirely reasonable, and at which your Committee believes the Convention will be making a thoroughly sound and profitable business and denominational investment. The terms of sale agreed upon are as follows:

The notes for all deferred payments to bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum, payable annually.

Your Committee recommends to the Convention the purchase of the *Biblical Recorder* and the Biblical Recorder Building at the price and on the terms just stated.

If the Convention shall give its approval to the foregoing your Committee recommends that the present Committee on the Purchase of the *Recorder* be continued and instructed to proceed with the transfer of the properties to the Trustees of the Convention and that the present Committee be enlarged to fifteen, which enlarged Committee shall proceed with the selection of an editor and other officers for the management of the *Biblical Recorder* and the Biblical Recorder Building.

At the conclusion of the reading of the report, J. L. Peacock moved that the report be adopted. A discussion of the report followed with George W. Paschal speaking against the acceptance of the report. General Secretary M. A. Huggins and A. J. Barton spoke in favor of the report. The motion to adopt having been seconded the majority vote of the Convention favored the report as read and it was adopted.*

45. The question of the adoption of the proposed amendment presented by M. A. Huggins, Raleigh, came up for final consideration. The Convention by more than a two-thirds vote thereupon adopted the Amendment (See Section 42 page 35).

46. By common consent the next item was a special message from L. R. Scarborough, Seminary Hill, Texas, President of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Song: "Lead On, O King Eternal"

47. A report was received from the Committee on Social Service and Civic Righteousness through the Chairman, A. J. Barton, Wilmington. On the question to adopt the report on the motion of A. J. Barton, Oscar Haywood, Mount Gilead, stated that item ten in the report should be eliminated, and made a motion to that affect. John T. Wayland, Durham, a member of the Committee stated that he did not approve of item ten and requested to be recorded as voting against that section. The motion of Oscar Haywood was put to a vote and at his request for a division it was noted that a majority of the Convention did not favor the elimination of this section. Thereafter the Convention by a majority vote accepted the report as a whole, to wit:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS 1938

Again this year, because of the crowded condition of the Convention program and of the limited time allowed for the presentation and consideration of this report, we are limiting the report to a few simple, direct resolutions concerning some vital matters which ought to claim our attention at the present time.

We recommend the adoption of the following:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST CONVENTION,

I. CONCERNING RACE RELATIONS.

1. We recognize and deeply regret human weakness and frailty which express themselves in universal racial antipathies and friction. Racial frictions are by no means limited to the South, nor to the relations of the White man and the Negro. The most flagrant expression of racial antipathy at the present time is found in the universal prejudice against the Jew and the terrible persecution now inflicted upon the Jews by Germany, Poland and other countries. We rejoice that the gospel of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ offers an adequate remedy for racial hate, and we believe that only as this gospel is preached and accepted by all nations can we hope to see racial hatred disappear and to see all races living together in peace.

2. We rejoice to believe and to recognize the fact that in North Carolina, and throughout the South, the spirit of harmony and co-operation between the white and colored races is steadily and surely increasing. This is manifest in many ways and in many places. Prejudice is being broken down on both sides; white people are coming to have greater freedom of approach and are using this freedom to help the less fortunate race and their efforts are bearing good fruit.

3. We recognize that there is yet much to be done to secure for the Negro a greater degree of justice in the courts, a more equal opportunity to labor and earn a livelihood and to receive a more

adequate wage for his labor, and to secure for him more equal and adequate opportunities; and we pledge ourselves as citizens and Christians to strive to secure for the Negro race these things, and other fundamental human rights.

II. LYNCHINGS.

1. We recognize that lynchings are not wholly the result of racial hatreds, but in many cases they are. We record our satisfaction that the number of lynchings has been steadily declining in recent years. There were only eight lynchings in the United States in 1937, and thus far this year there have been only three. We pledge ourselves as citizens, as Christians and as ministers, to continue to use all of our influence and to put forth every effort to the end that this form of barbarism may be entirely banished from our State and our land.

III. FREEDOM OF RELIGION.

1. That the North Carolina Baptist Convention reaffirms its devotion to the basic American and New Testament doctrine of the absolute freedom of religion and the absolute separation of church and state.

2. That this principle always and everywhere forbids all government subsidies to religion and religious institutions and all governmental authority over or control of the free exercise of religion.

3. That we urge upon all our Baptist people and institutions the vital importance and necessity for their being alert and sensitive in such matters and refusing all governmental aid, however indirectly offered, and of resisting the bestowal of such aid upon any interest or institution of any and all other denominations.

4. That the Convention give its approval to the proposal to amend the Constitution of the United States so as to prohibit the appropriation of public funds to sectarian institutions by any unit of government.

5. That if and when such amendment shall be again offered in Congress the Committee on Social Service and Civic Righteousness is hereby authorized to use its influence in every proper way to secure the adoption of such amendment.

IV. GERMAN PERSECUTION.

1. That the North Carolina Baptist Convention, representing four hundred thousand white Baptists, condemn and it does hereby condemn and deplore, the present policy of the German Government which it pursues in relentless and inhuman persecution both of Christians and Jews on purely religious and racial grounds.

2. That we believe the government of the United States, without any general repeal or revision of its immigration laws, should somehow find it possible so to modify the application of these laws as to offer asylum to these persecuted and outraged people regardless of the immigration quotas fixed by statute.

V. THE THREAT OF THE RUMANIAN GOVERNMENT AGAINST RELIGIOUS FREEDOM.

1. That the North Carolina Baptist Convention, representing four hundred thousand White Baptists, hereby expresses its deepest disapproval of the indicated purpose of the Rumanian Government to put into effect December 15 next an ordinance No. 26208, which would make it impossible for Baptists or other free church people to have

churches, maintain public worship and carry on the preaching of the gospel. In behalf of our fellow Baptists of Rumania, numbering seventy thousand, and in behalf of our fundamental and deeply cherished religious principle of freedom of conscience in all matters of religion, and in keeping with the Rumanian Constitution which guarantees entire freedom of conscience, we appeal to the Rumanian authorities to revoke the above named ordinance entirely and promptly, and so to announce to the world.

2. That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Rumanian Minister at Washington, D. C., and also to Hon. Cordell Hull, Secretary of State of the United States.

VI. WORLD REFUGEES.

That the Christian churches have a definite responsibility and a rare opportunity to act in the spirit of Jesus in caring for the castaways and refugees who wander hungry and homeless through many lands. Among them are the seven hundred thousand persons in greater Germany, over half of them Christians—if that makes any difference; seventy thousand devotees of Democracy, Sudeten Germans who would not bow the knee to the dictator, now homeless in Czecho-Slovakia; other Czecho-Slovakians who will be homeless as Hitler tightens his grip on their land; threatened Baptists in Rumania; Millions of hungry and homeless Chinese who must be fed until the harvest of 1939. Dr. Charles E. Maddry, Secretary of our Foreign Mission Board, has addressed to our people an appeal in favor of the Chinese which must not be denied. Other reputable American Christian leaders are calling for help for the harassed and persecuted in Europe. Our own problems in the United States are tremendous, but if America would once more aid the oppressed in many lands she would rise to new heights of greatness and would reap the harvest of her generosity for generations to come.

VII. PEACE AND WAR.

Christianity and Democracy need each other for the fullest expression of both. The American people want their country to do two things; stay out of war, and be an influence for peace everywhere. For the purpose of attaining this dual goal we favor the following:

1. The removal of the economic causes of war. We commend the cultivation of good relations with Latin America. Mr. Hull's trade treaties have been, we believe, the most practical move for peace of all those carried out by our government. We recommend that the van Zeeland report on International Economy be called out of hiding and that the President call a world economic conference, the principal end of which would be to remove the economic causes of war. We submit that it is far better to work together in the removing of the economic cause of war, which we think is the greatest single cause, than it is to enter upon an armament race which threatens as always to end in war, and which, according to leading and impartial economists, will invariably upset the economic structure of any nation which indulges therein and threatens the liberties of the people as they are pauperized in the manufacturing costs of unproductive goods.

2. The second major movement for world peace which we must support as Christians, and in which we should not wait for our government to lead, is the caring for the millions of refugees of the world as stated above. We commend most heartily the action of our country and that of Great Britain pointing to the establishment of a haven for these harassed human beings.

3. We are of the opinion that North Carolina Baptists need to be better informed on certain questions concerning world peace and recommend that systematic study of them be made in the churches. For example: Should the present neutrality bill be strengthened in order to keep America out of war? Should a Constitutional amendment requiring a popular referendum before foreign wars can be waged be adopted? Shall an all-time embargo on the export of munitions be effected? Should the United States lead in the rebuilding of world peace machinery, with the re-making of the League of Nations as a body which represents the will of all peoples, providing for peaceful change after the hearing of the grievances and demands of all, strong and weak? We are convinced that the world needs an informed Christian conscience, articulate and unafraid to guide it through the present crisis and at all times.

4. We recommend that a copy of this resolution on "Peace and War" be forwarded to the Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States, and to Honorable Cordell Hull, Secretary of State.

VIII. ELECTION LAW REFORM.

1. That the North Carolina Baptist Convention hereby takes notice of the recent and numerous cases of dishonest ballots and election frauds within our State; that we regard a free and untainted ballot as the very foundation of all Democratic Government; that we hereby declare our earnest belief that the Legislature of North Carolina at its next session should make such amendments to the revisions of our election laws as to safeguard elections and to protect the name of our State from further such scandal.

2. That particularly we regard the Absentee Ballot Law as opening the way for all manner of irregularity and corruption when administered by dishonest and unscrupulous men, and that we believe that this law should be repealed, recognizing that the benefit it bestows upon honest citizens, who of necessity must be absent from their polling places on election day, is more than offset by the fraud and evil which the law makes possible.

IX. RESTORATION OF THE RIGHTS OF THE PEOPLE.

1. That we hereby again express our hearty disapproval and condemnation of the acts of the North Carolina General Assembly by which it ignored the will of the people as expressed at the ballot box and usurped the rights of the people by fastening the liquor traffic upon North Carolina in violation of the sentiments and wishes of an overwhelming majority of North Carolina citizens.

2. That we appeal to the approaching session of the General Assembly to correct this flagrant violation of the principles of representative Democratic government by the enactment of a law which will give the people of North Carolina as a whole the right to pass upon the question of whether or not the manufacture, distribution and sale of liquor in any form shall be tolerated anywhere within the bounds of our Commonwealth.

X. A RETURN TO REPRESENTATIVE GOVERNMENT.

Without the slightest thought of political parties, but having solely in mind the fundamental principles of human liberty and individual initiative and action, upon which our American Government is founded and which are embedded in the Constitution, we record our conviction that the American people should go no further toward the centralization of power in governmental affairs, in the regulation

of details of private life, in the regimentation of the citizens and toward the establishment of a totalitarian state, but should return to the simple principles of representative and responsible democratic government, under which our fundamental rights, both religious and civic will not be put in jeopardy.

XI. THE PRESENT DRY ORGANIZATIONS AND PLANS IN NORTH CAROLINA.

1. That we gratefully recognize the patriotic and unselfish services of Mr. Cale K. Burgess, who has for the past several years given so much of his time, strength and money to the dry cause, without compensation for his services, and even without full reimbursement of his funds.

2. That we regard the present dry organizations and plans in North Carolina as inadequate to combat the liquor forces and the liquor lobby in our State.

3. That we believe the dry organizations should be formed on such a basis and should lay such plans as will secure the presentation of the dry cause to the churches of all denominations in a regular and systematic way by strong and capable speakers, and thus call out from the people a much larger financial support of the cause, that we may maintain a more adequate working force, create a deeper conviction among the people, marshal public opinion against the liquor traffic and secure more adequate representation before the Legislature and its committees and secure the repeal of the present liquor laws and the enactment of suitable prohibition measures.

XII. GREATER AND MORE ADEQUATE PRACTICAL EFFORT IN SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS.

1. That resolutions and commitments are good and ought to be continued, but that they are not the measure of our opportunities and obligations in this field.

2. That this Convention instruct the General Board to employ as soon as possible a suitable man to represent our North Carolina Baptist people in the whole field of social service and civic righteousness.

3. That such man should work in close coöperation with the Committee on Social Service and Civic Righteousness.

4. That this Convention express its hearty appreciation to the State Prison system and to its Religious Director, the Rev. E. C. Cooper, for making it possible for our Baptist pastors and others to conduct services in the prison camps throughout the state each Sunday afternoon, and that this Convention respectfully request the Religious Director of the State Prison System to extend further this effective service, if possible, by furnishing to pastors or other religious workers at least a week or two in advance of their dismissal names and home addresses of prisoners whose terms will expire, in order that some assistance may be given them in the work of rehabilitation.

48. Christian Education in the Colleges was the next order and L. E. M. Freeman, Raleigh, spoke for Meredith; Hoyt Blackwell, for Mars Hill, appearing before the Convention for the first time as the new President,

succeeding R. L. Moore; Leslie H. Campbell for Campbell College; J. L. Carrick for Chowan College and Jasper Memory for Wake Forest. The Wake Forest College Glee Club sang "Dear Old Wake Forest," led by Lyman H. Seymour, Director of Music at Wake Forest College.

49. "Christian Colleges and Spiritual Awakenings" was the theme of the special message of the hour brought by Olin T. Binkley, Dean of the Wake Forest School of Religion, Wake Forest.

50. The closing prayer was offered by W. R. Cullom, Wake Forest.

WEDNESDAY—Afternoon Session

51. Following the singing of verses from "All Hail the Power," "Love Divine," "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross," and "Amazing Grace," J. P. Gulley, Mount Olive, led the devotions and prayer was offered by E. P. West.

52. Greetings were received from the Baptist Bible Institute through Wilson Woodcock, Greensboro, the North Carolina member of the Trustees of that institution.

53. *Chairman* J. L. Peacock, Tarboro, read the Baptist Foundation Report included in the Advance Report of the General Board, and upon his motion adopted. (See section 131, page 105.)

54. The special committee to report on the advisability of establishing two additional Baptist Hospitals reported through the *Chairman*, R. N. Simms, Raleigh, which was upon his motion adoption.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER THE ADVISABILITY OF ESTABLISHING TWO ADDITIONAL BAPTIST HOSPITALS

This Committee reports that after its members had had opportunity to consider the matter a meeting was held in the City of Raleigh on Thursday, September 8, 1938, at 11 o'clock, a.m., being at a time which was satisfactory to all members of the Committee, and there were present: R. N. Simms, *Chairman*, of Raleigh; Dr. Wingate M. Johnson, of Winston-Salem; Dr. Thurman D. Kitchin, of Wake Forest; Dr. J. L. Peacock, of Tarboro; Dr. A. J. Barton, of Wilmington; Mr. E. J. Britt, of Lumberton; Mr. B. W. Parham, of Oxford; Mr. Thomas A. Avera, of Rocky Mount; Dr. Arch C. Cree, of Salisbury; Dr. J. W. Suttle, of Shelby and Dr. J. Clyde Turner, of Greensboro. An extended session was held, and after full discussion, and after expression of opinion had been made by all the members of the Committee, Dr. J. Clyde Turner offered a motion that the Committee should report to the Convention as follows, to wit:

"That the Committee met and considered the hospital situation, and it is the opinion of the Committee that it would be unwise to attempt the establishment of additional hospitals at this time."

This motion was unanimously adopted.

This action seemed to accord with the views of the four absent members of the Committee as expressed by them in letters to the *Chairman*.

Resolution to the Memory of WM. LOUIS POTEAT

WHEREAS, on March 12, 1938, the death of Dr. William Louis Poteat ended an intimate and significant relation to Wake Forest College extending continuously through a period of sixty-five years, and a membership in the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina upon whose meetings he was a regular attendant for half a century, participating in its deliberations, contributing often to its programs, and of which he was the honored president in 1937—

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, in annual session assembled, that we do hereby express our profound gratitude to God that He, in His providence, made possible so long and so noteworthy a service to Wake Forest

College, to the Baptist State Convention, and to mankind generally as has been rendered by the late William Louis Poteat;

THAT WE RECORD our grateful tribute to the memory of his exemplary Christian life, to the keenness and nobility of his intellectual powers, to the high quality of his work as teacher and executive at Wake Forest College, to his sober wisdom and his gracious services so widely and so generously shared outside the college, to his faithful and efficient services to this Convention, and to his excellent spiritual discernment;

THAT WE EXPRESS with sincere thankfulness our appreciation of the distinguished leadership he exercised for many years among educators and scientists in North Carolina and throughout the nation; for his valued leadership among and inspiration to truth-seekers in many realms; for the unflinching fidelity and courage with which he followed truth as it was discovered in any quarter; for his uniform Christian courtesy toward all and for his unwavering patience when misunderstood; for his wholesome contribution to religious thought and to the spiritual life of his generation;

THAT WE DO HEREBY ACKNOWLEDGE the everlasting debt of this Convention to his remarkable personality which for more than half a century has made its indelible imprint for good upon Wake Forest College, upon the life and work of this Convention, and upon the Kingdom of Christ to whom he gave freely primary allegiance;

THAT WE VOICE OUR FAITH, in the fine lines of George Eliot, that he abides in the company

"Of those immortal dead who live again
In minds made safe by their presence; live
In pulses stirred to generosity,

In thoughts sublime that pierce the night like stars,
And with their mild persistence urge men's search
To vaster issues,"

That we render our deepest gratitude to the Heavenly Father that he gave to North Carolina Baptists J. S. Farmer, whose long, faith-

ful and efficient services to the best interests of this Convention and the Kingdom of Christ will bear fruit through the years to come;

That we cheerfully and thankfully acknowledge the indebtedness of this Convention to one who was so untiring in his championship of the good and so uncompromising in his efforts to overcome evil;

And finally that we dedicate ourselves anew to the causes for which he so valiantly lived and died.

81. The Committee on Resolutions submitted their report which was read by Sankey L. Blanton and adopted upon his motion.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Since our stay in Raleigh has been made pleasant by the kindness and gracious hospitality of this community and its people generally, we would offer the following:

We express our thanks to the city for the use of Memorial Auditorium; to Hugh Morson High School for parking privileges; to the local press and station WPTF for generous publicity; to our own committee on publicity for work well done; to the Boy Scouts for helpful kindness; and to the police of Raleigh for courteous assistance in many ways.

We would also attempt to express our lasting appreciation to the Pastor and people of Tabernacle Baptist Church of Raleigh, to the Baptists and other Christian people of this city for their unflinching kindness and warm hospitality.

The Convention also wishes to express its sense of loss in the home-going of Vance A. Browning, Bryson City, N. C., who died while in attendance upon the sessions of the Convention. A local and associational Sunday school Superintendent, a faithful deacon of his church, a member of the General Board of the State Convention, and a civic leader, Brother Browning had for a number of years been an influential denominational leader in the State. His contribution to Baptist life has blessed thousands and his influence will continue to be felt in the years ahead. The Convention expresses its sympathy to his family and friends.

82. R. L. McMillan, read the following report of the Trustees of the Convention and it was adopted upon his motion.

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES CONVENTION 1938

The Board, composed of R. L. McMillan and J. R. Weatherspoon, Raleigh, and F. H. Brooks, Smithfield, was organized with J. R. Weatherspoon as Chairman and R. L. McMillan, Secretary.

The Trustees had several meetings during the year, at some of which only matters of routine were considered. The two principal items of business transacted follow:

The Trustees joined with the Trustees of the Lewisville Baptist Church in the execution of a deed of trust, so as to enable the church to borrow money to complete the building. This was made necessary because of a clause in the will devising the land to the church with the provision that it should go to the Baptist State Convention in the event the land should be used for purposes other than a Baptist church. This action was taken with the understanding that the Trustees of the Baptist State Convention be obligated in no way and

join in the deed of trust only to enable the church to borrow the money for the building.

At a meeting on September 21 it was voted to authorize the General Secretary and Treasurer to proceed to have the old bonds and coupons cremated, with the understanding that the cremation certificate be signed by A. T. Allen & Company, the auditors employed to check the old bonds and coupons, by the General Secretary and Treasurer, and by an officer of the Wachovia Bank & Trust Company, or some reliable third party selected by the bank.

As required by the Convention we found that the Treasurer is bonded for \$25,000, the bookkeeper, Miss Esther Ivey, for \$10,000, and the bookkeeper of the Debt Service Fund, Miss Margie Murchison, for \$10,000.

The Trustees express their appreciation for the efficient and highly creditable work of our General Secretary, M. A. Huggins, and his assistants.

83. President Simms named the following Committee to place a remembrance of flowers on the graves of Wm. Louis Poteat and J. S. Farmer, to wit: John Arch McMillan, Eugene I. Olive, Arch C. Cree, George W. Paschall, and W. R. Cullom.

84. The next order was the election of officers of the Convention. Whereupon B. A. Bowers, Gastonia, nominated R. N. Simms, Sr., Raleigh, to succeed himself and there being no further nominations, Secretary C. B. Deane, was instructed and did cast the unanimous vote of the Convention for R. N. Simms, Sr.

85. Nominations were received for first, second, and third vice presidents. The following were nominated: B. A. Bower, Gastonia; Eugene I. Olive, North Wilkesboro; A. C. Reid, Wake Forest; A. J. Barton, Wilmington; Hoyt C. Blackwell, Mars Hill; and Geo. W. Paschall, Wake Forest. By unanimous consent the Convention agreed that the names receiving the highest number of votes would be designated respectively, first, second, and third vice presidents. The balloting revealed that Hoyt C. Blackwell, A. J. Barton, and B. A. Bowers were elected first, second and third vice presidents respectively.

86. E. Gibson Davis, formerly of North Carolina, now pastor at Spartanburg, South Carolina, brought greetings from the South Carolina Baptist State Convention now in session in response to the telegraphic message from North Carolina Baptists.

86A. M. A. Huggins presented the cause of State Missions (see section 106, page 106).

- (a) W. D. Barbee, Moderator, West Chowan Association, told of his efforts in putting the *Recorder* over in his Association.
- (b) The State Missionaries were represented by G. A. Martin.
- (c) W. C. Somerville spoke as the representative of the North Carolina Negro Baptists.
- (d) Special fields:
 1. Wayne Williams told of the work among the World War Veterans at Oteen.
 2. Otis Hagler, Black Mountain, spoke on the activities at the Western North Carolina Sanatorium.

3. E. M. Harris, Aberdeen, closed with a review of the work at the State Hospital and at Samarcond, and

- (e) Missionary and Evangelistic Opportunities in North Carolina;
1. C. H. Cashwell, Snow Hill, spoke for the East,
 2. M. L. Ross, Concord, in behalf of the Piedmont, and
 3. Smoot Baker, Enka, concluded for Western Carolina.

87. Senator Josiah W. Bailey of North Carolina was recognized by the presiding officer and the Senator responded.

88. A brief description of the serious condition confronting Protestant Christianity, including Baptists in Rumania, was related by A. J. Barton, Wilmington, who offered a prayer in behalf of all oppressed Christian people.

89. The newly elected Vice Presidents were requested to join the President on the platform in the closing hour of the program.

90. A special musical selection "Special Conquerors" was rendered by Herbert Alexander, Los Angeles.

91. M. A. Huggins suggested that no Promotion Committee be named but that the General Board would conduct its promotion work through the Associational Moderators, and this course was approved.

92. The President, the Recording Secretary and the General Secretary were directed to perfect the *Journal*.

93. In presenting the work of Evangelism in North Carolina the General Secretary outlined a comprehensive program for the coming year. Following a general discussion requesting cards of those willing to give of their time and services for this work were distributed. Approximately 225 cards were signed and returned.

94. W. G. McGee, Thomasville, called the attention of the Convention to the large number of messengers present for this last session and suggested that it was in his opinion partly due to the arrangement of the Order of Business to begin on Tuesday morning and closing at noon Thursday. He thereafter moved and the Convention instructed the Committee on Order of Business to arrange the program for 1939 to conform to the same order.

95. On motion of W. H. Moore and A. J. Barton, the Convention by unanimous vote expressed its appreciation for the faithful and painstaking work of the Recording Secretary and of the President.

96. The final closing message, "Evangelizing North Carolina," was delivered by J. Clyde Turner, Greensboro.

97. The Enrollment *Chairman*, Carl M. Townsend, reported that a total of 1,025 messengers had registered. It was the general opinion that this was one of the largest attended, greatest and most helpful Conventions held by North Carolina Baptists in many years.

98. After the singing of "Bless Be the Tie That Binds," and "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," B. A. Bowers prayed, and the One Hundred Eighth Annual Baptist State Convention of North Carolina adjourned.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD

INTRODUCTION

99. In presenting this report to the one hundred and eighth session of the Baptist State Convention the General Board records its gratitude to God and its abiding confidence in our Baptist people.

This is the seventh report prepared by the present General Secretary. In each of the preceding reports in recent years we have always attempted to sound a note both of optimism and of challenge. We would do likewise in this report.

IN RETROSPECT

100. As we review the year we desire to call special attention to at least three aspects of our work. In the first place we are impressed with the harmony and unity which apparently exists among the Baptist people in the churches. In our opinion this harmony and unity has hardly ever been superior to what it is now. Moreover it is not a unity which is often associated with inaction. Rather it is the harmony and unity which one feels when a great host is marching forward together. And we are on the march.

In the second place there is a deepening interest in a spiritual awakening. We call attention to the central theme of this Convention in the earnest hope that fires will be kindled during the Convention which will spread far and wide, in fact into the very center of our churches. From many quarters we have had glowing reports of gracious revivals that have both quickened the churches and resulted in many additions to them.

In the third place we note with gratitude the continued increase in the offerings of our people for the support of the objects which we cherish. Last year we were happy to report an increase of almost twenty per cent over 1936. This year we are unable to report any such increase. We are, however, able to report a substantial increase. We must confess that our increase has not enabled us to meet our opportunities in any full sense. At the same time we are grateful for the increase that has come. With many of our people out of work in the past twelve months we could very easily have had a decrease in income.

In this connection it is interesting to note that back in 1933, our lowest year in the past twenty, we set before us certain financial objectives. For example in 1934 we set our goal at \$450,000, with the hope that we would increase some fifty to sixty thousand each year thereafter. Hence the goal for 1937 was \$600,000. We are happy to report that our income was in fact just a fraction short of \$625,000. The goal set for 1938 was \$660,000. It appears now that we shall almost, if not fully, reach that goal in 1938.

IN PROSPECT

101. In a preceding paragraph we spoke of the growing interest in a spiritual awakening, and referred to the program of this Convention. Once again we express the hope that the fires thus kindled will burst into flame

and eventually touch all the churches of North Carolina within the next year. It is our hope that during this Convention plans will be presented and adopted with unanimity and enthusiasm; and that during the coming year every place in North Carolina where a meeting ought to be held will be reached with a meeting that one may characterize as a genuine revival.

In a preceding paragraph we referred to the continual increase of income since 1933. The fact is that in 1938 our income will be about seventy-five per cent higher than in 1933. At the same time we would bring our people face to face with one or two outstanding facts.

In spite of this increase the average Baptist is giving only about half as much as the average Baptist gave thirteen to eighteen years ago. To this add also the fact that on the whole we believe our people are about twice as well informed as to the needs of the objects we support. It seems to us that this situation needs to be faced honestly in an effort to find the remedy and then apply it. We merely give here our own reasons for this situation and make no attempt to discuss them. We mention three reasons: first, the debts on our churches; second, the lost vision of our people, surely in terms of a world program; third, and most important of all, the unreality of God. Surely a spiritual awakening is now a prime necessity, and such an awakening if genuine will lead first to individual spiritual growth and second to an increased support for all our objects. Then also of course it will promote a genuine evangelism in our churches. We must not, however, forget the fundamental fact that a spiritual awakening is not a means to an end but an end in itself, and the heart of a spiritual awakening or revival is a revelation of the reality of God to his people now in the churches. If God becomes real we shall not have to plan largely for evangelistic campaigns. If, however, this revelation of reality does not come it is hardly too much to say that all our evangelistic campaigning will in the long run count for but little or nothing.

I

OUR OBJECTIVES

102. In parentheses we give the figures for last year and for the years preceding, in so far as this is possible. The figures in the first parentheses are for the year immediately preceding; and in the second parentheses the figures for the next preceding year, etc., are given.

We believe a careful study of these twenty-two objectives will provide pastors and others with much of the material they need for presenting to the churches the work of the Convention.

1. Every church with a pastor.

It is estimated that on October 1, 1938, 100 (100) (150) (160) (175), churches were without pastors.

2. A revival in each church—at least one each year.

Accurate figures are not available, but the Minutes of 1937 show that 1,836 (1,785) (1,783) (1,797) (1,792), churches reported baptisms

while 632 (666) (653) (613) (593) did not. Taking the state as a whole 19,453 baptisms were reported in 1937, 18,849 in 1936, 18,768 in 1935, 19,670 in 1934, 20,038 in 1933 and 23,342 in 1932.

3. Every church with a Sunday school enrollment at least as large as the church membership.

For the year 1937, 761 (783) (854) (863) (810) (912) of the 2,421 Sunday schools in the state met this requirement.

4. Every church with a B.T.U.

As of October 31, 1938, 1,222 (1,097) (950) (1,050) (1,043) (975) of the 2,468 churches had a B.T.U. organization.

5. Every church with a W.M.S.

As of October 1, 1938, 1,226 (1,176) (1,156) (1,153) (1,100) (1,118) of the 2,468 churches had a W.M.S.

6. At least 500,000 members by 1940, with all church rolls corrected.

The Minutes of 1937 show a membership of 471,554 (465,698) (458,517) (450,770) (440,602) (433,046).

7. Every association with a representative Promotion-Executive Committee, or its equivalent, that functions throughout the year, led by the Moderator or the chairman of the Promotion-Executive Committee, who will visit and encourage the churches.

Probably about 50 (50) (45) (40) (33) of the 70 associations are meeting this requirement in whole or in part. Only a few moderators, however, visit the churches.

8. A ten days' school, or schools, for Christian workers held each year with an attendance of at least 1,000.

In the two pastors' schools provided at Mars Hill and Meredith about 325 (300) (250) (225) (192) pastors were enrolled.

9. At least 2,500 college students enrolled in our Baptist colleges.

For the year ending June 1938 there were enrolled 2,809 (2,778) (2,419) (2,415) (2,229) college students. This does not include 1,303 (982) (1,029) (691) (651) which were enrolled in the Wake Forest-Meredith Summer School at Wake Forest and Mars Hill.

10. Two General State Missionaries giving their full time to the development of our churches, missionary instruction, forming fields, et cetera, especially in the rural churches.

We have two general missionaries, M. O. Alexander and J. C. Pipes.

11. A club of "Charity and Children" in every Baptist Sunday school.

For the calendar year 1937, 720 (671) (733) (772) (678) (781) Sunday schools had a club of *Charity and Children*.

12. Twenty-five thousand subscribers to the "Biblical Recorder," including every pastor, every Sunday school superintendent, every W.M.S. president or leader, and every B.T.U. leader or director.

As of October 1, 1938, the circulation of the *Biblical Recorder* was 12,653 (12,600) (13,200) (10,500) (10,400) (8,000). Since so many

churches have put the *Recorder* in the budget it is impossible to check on the number of leaders subscribing to the paper.

13. Every institution and agency of the convention living within its income.

All institutions and agencies are living within their income in so far as we know at the moment. For full information see General Statistics, Exhibits A and B, under the general head of Christian Education in the Colleges; also auditor's report published in the Minutes of the Convention.

14. No borrowing by the convention, or its institutions or agencies, of any funds for any purpose, except in anticipation of current income.

No funds for current support have been borrowed this year.

15. A fifty-fifty division of distributable or undesignated funds as between state and southwide objects.

For 1938 the Coöperative Program (Undesignated), receipts are divided on the 60-40 basis, 60 for State and 40 for Southwide objects.

16. An annual income, designated and undesignated of \$450,000 for the fiscal year 1934; \$500,000 for 1935; \$550,000 for 1936; \$600,000 for 1937; \$660,000 for 1938; \$725,000 for 1939, and \$800,000 for 1940.

Our total income for 1937, designated and undesignated, was \$623,032.55. Thus it will be seen that we exceeded our goal by about \$23,000.

17. Every church contributing through the coöperative program, including both designated and undesignated funds.

For 1937, 1,997 (1,949) (1,877) (1,796) (1,648) (1,607) of the 2,468 churches reported funds given through the Coöperative Program or to some object in the Coöperative Program, leaving 471 (502) (559) (614) (737) (767) that made no contribution.

18. Every church and Sunday school contributing to the orphanage.

For 1937, 1,916 (1,969) (1,944) (1,920) (1,728) (1,686) churches made some contribution to the Orphanage, leaving 552 (482) (492) (490) (657) (688) that did not.

19. Every Sunday school contributing and remitting to the orphanage once each month.

During 1937, 340 (305) (218) (269) (230) Sunday schools met this requirement, leaving 2,081 (2,132) (2,212) (2,115) (2,155) that did not.

20. Every church making a Thanksgiving offering for the orphanage.

1,678 (1,726) (1,752) (1,659) (1,515) (1,056) churches or Sunday schools made a Thanksgiving offering in 1937 to the Orphanage, leaving 790 (742) (684) (751) (870) (1,348) that did not.

21. Every church and Sunday school making an offering on Mothers' Day for the hospital.

On Mothers' Day 1938 about 1,913 (1,937) (1,508) (1,706) (1,308) (1,062) churches or Sunday schools made an offering to the Hospital.

22. Every church making a remittance to the convention treasurer at least once a month.

For the year 1937, 406 (417) (328) (359) (215) (197) churches met this requirement.

II**REPORT OF GENERAL BOARD MEETINGS**

103. We call attention to the fact that with this Convention the terms of one-third of the members of the Board expire. Some of these members whose terms are now expiring have served only three years, one or two possibly for two years only, filling out unexpired terms. A few, however, have been on the Board now for a great many years and have rendered faithful and effective service. In particular we would call attention to the long and faithful service of J. H. Highsmith of Raleigh, J. W. Suttle of Shelby, Trela D. Collins of Durham, J. B. Willis of Hamlet, J. R. Morgan of Waynesville, and W. D. Poe of Oxford.

In 1926 when the Board of Missions and Board of Education were merged into the General Board, J. H. Highsmith, W. D. Poe and J. W. Suttle were named to membership on the General Board. These have served continuously since, and during all of that time, if we mistake not, Dr. Highsmith has been a member of the Executive Committee. During a part of the time W. D. Poe has also been a member of the same committee.

J. E. Kirk was also named to that Board, but he has not served continuously during that time.

No one knows quite so well as do these men how much time and thought they have given to the work of the Board, and particularly the work of the Executive Committee during these years. Surely the Convention owes to them a deep debt of gratitude.

In accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, we report here the principal actions of the General Board taken at its meetings in December 1937, and June 1938. We omit from this summary some matters to which reference is made elsewhere in the report.

1. The Board in its December 1937 meeting adopted the following division of funds as between State and South-wide objects: For State objects 60 per cent and for Southern Baptist Convention objects 40 per cent. The State's sixty per cent was ordered divided as follows: State Missions 13 per cent; Christian Education—Debt Service 42 per cent; Hospital 4 per cent; Ministerial Education 1 per cent.

In this connection it needs to be recalled that the Board at its June 1937 meeting decided to divide the receipts from the Hundred Thousand Club, 50 per cent for our State Convention debts and 50 per cent for the Southern Baptist Convention debts. This percentage of division has been followed through 1938. We are happy to add that for the period January 1 to September 1, 1938 the Southern Baptist Convention's share of the Hundred Thousand Club was a little more than for the same period in 1937; and this in spite of the fact that for these nine months of course our state objects have received half of the money designated

to the Hundred Thousand Club. Thus Southern Baptist Convention objects have received a little more than they received under the former plan when they were actually getting all of the receipts. To state it differently, our receipts through the Hundred Thousand Club are about double what they were last year.

2. The Board voted, in view of the possible purchase of the *Biblical Recorder* by the Convention, to instruct the General Secretary and all members of the staff to strive in every way possible to increase the circulation of the *Recorder*, surely by 3,000 in 1938 and looking toward at least 25,000 in 1942.

3. A special committee was appointed to work with the General Secretary in making a careful study of the proposed plan to provide annuities for pastors. This committee was composed of R. N. Simms, Sr., Chairman; Claude F. Gaddy, J. H. Highsmith, R. E. Wall, A. D. Kinnett, E. N. Gardner, and W. D. Poe.

4. A committee of five, B. A. Bowers, Grover H. Jones, J. W. Suttle, R. A. Kelly, and R. E. Price was appointed to consider the situation with reference to the Fruitland Institute property and report to the General Board at its June meeting.

5. A committee composed of Hugh A. Ellis, Sankey L. Blanton and T. C. Johnson was appointed to work with the General Secretary in making a study of the several resettlement areas in the state.

6. Likewise a committee was appointed to work with the General Secretary in studying the church situation at the site of the TVA dam west of Murphy. This committee was composed of J. R. Morgan, Vance Browning, and H. K. Masteller.

7. The budget adopted for 1938 was slightly in advance of that for 1937, the advance being about equally distributed in all departments of the work.

8. In the June 1937 meeting of the Board it was voted to make appropriations to Wake Forest, Chowan, Mars Hill and Campbell for current support. These appropriations were made of course with the proviso that they would not be paid unless the money was available. These appropriations were continued by the Board in its December 1937 meeting for the calendar year 1938. At the present moment the Board has been able to meet only about 60 per cent of the amounts which it was hoped the Convention could pay.

9. At the June 1938 meeting of the Board only routine matters were considered with the exception that the Cullowhee Church was authorized to borrow the sum of \$1,200 in addition to the \$4,000 previously authorized, for the purpose of completing the church building. This action carried with it the authorization that there be set aside out of the Convention's revenue for church building a sum sufficient to retire the amount within a period not to exceed ten years.

10. The Board adopted promotion plans for the fall of 1938 as follows:

1. That we set our goal for 1939 at \$575,000, exclusive of all gifts to the Orphanage, and that the goal for the Orphanage be set at \$150,000.

2. That the state be divided into three districts and that one district be assigned to each of the General Missionaries and one to Mr. Crouch.

3. That we call upon all of our agencies and institutions to lend their efforts toward getting this amount subscribed this fall.

4. That we attempt, as a part of our promotion plans, to secure 40,000 tithers in North Carolina, and that we embody this goal in the following challenge:

At least a tithe from at least a tithe in our membership.

5. That we attempt early in 1939 to secure 10,000 members of the Hundred Thousand Club.

III

NEXT STEPS

104. Last year under the general heading of "Next Steps" we called the attention of the Convention to two advanced steps which should be taken at the earliest possible moment. The first referred to a plan which will provide retirement allowances for all pastors and denominational employees when they reach the age of sixty-five or sixty-eight. In accordance with this recommendation the Board, in its December 1938 meeting, appointed a committee, and we are happy to report that this committee has adopted a plan for presentation to this Convention.

We also recommended, and the Convention adopted, the following resolution:

That the Board be authorized to work out a plan which will place in the field the best available man whose duty it will be to solicit large contributions in the form of gifts, wills, Living Trusts, and insurance policies, for our several institutions and agencies; and that all the institutions and agencies of the Convention be asked to cooperate, in so far as it is possible, with respect (1) to providing the salary and expenses, (2) to selecting the man, and (3) to furnishing him with full information as to needs and prospects.

Following this action of the Convention an attempt was made to get all the institutions and agencies to make an appropriation for the support of this project. In its December meeting the General Board provided in its budget an appropriation of \$1,000 for this purpose. Some of the institutions doubted the wisdom of cooperating in the enterprise; and, when it became clear that our income for 1938 would be less than anticipated, the project was dropped for the moment. It is our hope that at the earliest time possible the Board and institutions will be able

to coöperate in such a way that this far reaching project may be undertaken.

IV

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS

A. HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

105. During the twelve months ending September 30, 1938, we have forwarded for all South-wide objects \$191,050.25. During a corresponding period ending September 30, 1937, we forwarded \$183,420.64, a gain of \$7,629.61. For the year ending September 30, 1936, we forwarded \$173,819.90. Undesignated funds for South-wide objects are divided as follows:

Of course all designated funds, without any deduction whatever, go directly to the object specified.

B. STATE MISSIONS

106. Once again we call attention to the enlarged and enlarging task of State Missions. We record the disheartening fact that we are expending now only about half as much as we were expending during the period of 1925 to 1930. We are operating this year on a slightly enlarged budget, but it is believed that we shall come to the end of the year without any debt.

We have been flooded with requests for help on church buildings, the requests ranging all the way from \$50 to \$1,000. It has been impossible to meet these requests, dozens of which we now have on hand. We have simply had to tell the churches who have pled with us in the midst of their urgent needs for a little help that we saw no possibility of help for them any time soon.

Then too we have been hoping for two years or more to inaugurate a ministry to the prisoners of the state, both those in prison and those on parole. Due to lack of funds we have not been able to undertake this challenging opportunity.

1. GENERAL MISSIONARIES

107. We would be compelled to make use of superlatives if we properly acknowledged the devoted and efficient efforts of our missionaries, M. O.

Alexander and J. C. Pipes. We repeat what we said last year. We are advancing along many lines and this advance is due in large measure to their efficient and sacrificial efforts. They are doing much to vitalize the churches.

We submit here brief summaries of their activities during the past year.

(a) REPORT OF GENERAL MISSIONARY M. O. ALEXANDER

During the past year I have traveled steadily in all parts of our state among the churches and our Baptist people.

This has been, I'm sure, the busiest year of my whole life, and yet I have not been able to answer half the calls for help where help was really needed.

There is joy and inspiration abounding in the fellowship of North Carolina Baptists, and yet the need for nurture and advancement is overwhelming. My time this year has been spent for the most part in the smaller churches in the country and industrial centers.

I have conducted 18 Stewardship Revivals of a week each, and have enlisted many of our pastors in this same work in as many as 30 churches. Pastors' Conferences, associational meetings, special days, etc., have kept me on the go. The demands for help such as J. C. Pipes and myself are trying to render are unending, and the evident needs are equally great. It is hoped that at least one other General Evangelist may be provided this next year.

(b) REPORT OF GENERAL MISSIONARY J. C. PIPES

Below is a report of my activities during the year October 1, 1937, through September 30, 1938:

I have held eight one-day meetings and conferences.

I have directed eight four- to five-day preachers' meetings.

Attended three Pastors' Conferences.

Held and directed fifteen Stewardship Revivals.

Assisted Brother Huggins in three Stewardship Revivals in the Piedmont section of the state.

Attended the Men's Meeting held in Winston-Salem, N. C.

Held one ten-day revival in Macon County.

Attended and spoke in one W.M.U. meeting.

Attended sixteen associational meetings.

Attended the Pastors' School at Mars Hill two weeks.

Attended one week of the Walter N. Johnson Retreat at Mars Hill.

Assisted L. L. Morgan in one Sunday school Revival in Yancey County.

Attended the meeting of the Convention Promotion Committee at Meredith College.

Attended the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Held twenty-one preliminary associational meetings.

Besides this I attended and spoke in a number of churches on the Hundred Thousand Club, and secured a good many memberships. I also attended and spoke in several associational Sunday school Conventions.

I have also supplied a number of times on Sundays in pulpits for pastors.

Let me make this general observation about the work in the territory where we serve. The spirit of our people was never better. I believe there are signs of a great spiritual awakening. More churches are contributing, not large amounts, but something to the Coöperative Program. There is a friendliness toward all our work not manifested before in years. We are not discouraged but are looking for progress throughout the years to come.

2. MISSIONARY PASTORAL ASSISTANCE

108. We give below a summary of the work done by our seventy-eight missionary pastors from October 1, 1937, through September 30, 1938.

4. WORK AMONG THE INDIANS

110. We record again our appreciation of the work of Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Lunsford among the Indians of Robeson County. The work among the Cherokee Indians in Swain County is provided for by the Home Mission Board. We give a brief summary of the work of Mr. and Mrs. Lunsford from October 1, 1937, through September 30, 1938.

Surely the Indian work in Robeson County and Eastern North Carolina was never more promising. Every one of our pastors seems to have caught a new vision and to be filled with the spirit of world-wide missions. Along with this, each seems to have a desire to push forward the whole Baptist Program, including Sunday school work, B.T.U. work, W.M.U. work, etc.

The Lord has mightily poured out His Spirit on the pastors and churches of the Burnt Swamp Association this year. The fires of evangelism have burned with apostolical fervor during much of 1938. More than 300 have been baptized into the fellowship of the Indian Baptist churches, and the end is not yet.

Several houses of worship have been improved during the year, and Harpers Ferry Church is just now beginning a new modern building.

A Sunday school Association has been organized, and the Sunday school work is taking on new life.

5. WORK WITH OUR NEGRO BROTHERS

111. When we reflect upon the work of Rev. W. C. Somerville and Rev. J. H. Clanton among the Negroes of the state we have cause to rejoice. Perhaps, too, we may be pardoned for this rejoicing because of the fact that we are having some part in making it possible for them to carry on what we believe to be a significant work among their people in this state.

Recently the Home Mission Board has made an appropriation of \$450 to help pay the expenses of a teacher in Shaw University. We heartily approve this effort of the Home Mission Board.

A brief summary of the work of Brother Somerville, who is General Secretary of the Negro State Convention, and Brother Clanton, who is Sunday school and B.T.U. Secretary, follows:

In addition to the above we coöperated with Shaw University in Conducting:

An annual Ministers' Conference-Institute at Shaw University. Also we conducted three Ministers' Institutes throughout the state.

We conducted the first College Students' Christian Conference in North Carolina.

This conference was held at Shaw University in April. There were 265 student representatives from ten Negro colleges in the state. We plan to make this an annual feature of our Conventional Program.

The number of churches coöperating with the Unified Program to date is 323, an increase of 94 over that of last year.

I am pleased to note that each month brings us nearer our goal—a Constructive, Christian, Coöperative program of Kingdom extension for our Lord and His Christ. With the continued encouragement from our white brethren, the future of our work is exceedingly bright.

6. THE OTEEN MISSION

112. We have continued with joy an appropriation to let Rev. W. W. Williams, who continues his faithful ministry to the sick at Oteen. We are happy also that other states are coöperating with small amounts in the support of Brother Williams. He makes the following report concerning his work there during the past year:

Much water has gone over the mill since the greatest war in history came to a close twenty years ago. Repercussions of that titanic struggle are still being heard around the world.

The army of American ex-soldiers is steadily diminishing. The World War veterans are dying on an average of 103 a day. The peak in their hospitalization will not be reached until 1945.

We have had another busy year at Oteen. Most of the 875 beds in the hospital are filled at all times. The men die on an average of four a week. There are more Baptists than those of any other faith.

The Oteen church carries on its ministry to the wives and children of the men. A new educational building is under construction. The membership is now 300.

We covet your interest, your sympathy, your prayers.

7. SANATORIUMS

113. The Board is providing a small appropriation to Brother E. M. Harris, pastor at Aberdeen, to enable him to carry on a ministry to the sick at Sanatorium. It is a gracious work he is doing and the Board is paying hardly more than an amount sufficient to pay his travel to and fro. Hence appreciation for his services is hereby expressed. He gives the following brief report of his work during the past year:

Much of the work we try to do at the Sanatorium cannot be tabulated or set down in figures. There is no church of any denomination there. The Sanatorium has nearly 600 patients. Every one of them has tuberculosis in some form. They come from many sections of the state and all walks of life. Some find it necessary to stay only a few months and others for years. The Sanatorium forces conduct a good Sunday school. Some pastor from a nearby town preaches every Sunday. Our Sunday is the second in each month. Many patients are bed patients or confined to their wards, but the services are carried by radio to many of the private rooms, all the wards, and to the prison and colored buildings. In addition to the once-a-month worship service we sometimes hold prayer meetings with different groups, make personal visits, especially as our people back home let us know when their loved ones come to the Sanatorium. We appreciate the increased number of such requests. During the past summer and fall months we have furnished hundreds of dahlias and other flowers to the patients. It is understood with the nurses that your representative is ready to respond to any special request at any hour.

In November 1937 the Western North Carolina Sanatorium at Black Mountain was opened. We are happy to state that the Baptist State Convention had a representative there. Since that time the Board has made a small appropriation to Rev. Ottis Hagler, pastor at Black Mountain, to enable him to visit regularly the sick who are there. We rejoice that we can provide this ministry to those who are sick. It is good to know that the capacity of the sanatorium is being doubled. Brother Hagler sends the following report of his work there:

In November 1937 Governor Clyde R. Hoey dedicated the latest and most modern Tubercular Hospital in North Carolina. This institution is located at Black Mountain and is known as Western Sanatorium. It now has a capacity of 150 beds and a new wing is near completion which will double this number.

Here in wonderful western Carolina come patients from over the state seeking health. Three-fourths of those who come are Baptists. Since the opening of the sanatorium the pastor of the First Baptist Church of Black Mountain has sought to minister and since the first of January he has served as Baptist Chaplain, a representative of the State Mission Program. Regular visitation, distribution of literature, preaching the Gospel, conducting funerals, etc., has been his program.

The Sunday School Board furnishes 100 copies of "The Better Home." A well organized Sunday school is conducted by Mr. Irvin Page, Baptist

layman of the hospital staff. Preaching services are held each Sunday evening in the chapel for ambulatory patients, and also broadcast to the wards.

Your representative desires to be helpful and carry on the Program of the Kingdom in this institution. Please communicate with him whenever your friends and members of your church are to be admitted to Western Sanatorium.

8. SAMARCAND

114. Rev. E. M. Harris is not only ministering to the sick at the Sanatorium, but is also providing a gracious ministry to the girls at Samarcand. The amount we are expending on this work is very small, but at least we are not allowing ourselves to forget the delinquent. We urge that the brief report of Brother Harris' labor there be read by our people.

There are about 170 girls at Samarcand. They are from seven to eighteen years of age, and as you know are wards of the state. At Samarcand they have a good chapel in which worship is held every Sunday. Our day is the third Sunday in each month. During their stay many of the girls become Christians and really try to live the better life. We have baptized 29 upon a profession of faith this year. The Superintendent and management encourage the pastors who minister there to teach the girls of his denomination the tenets of his faith. When a girl returns home or a new home is found for her we try to put the pastor in touch with her. The future of many of the girls depends largely upon the encouragement given them when they return home. They need help and the realization that somebody is interested in their welfare. A little tactful interest may help to make a worthwhile life.

9. PASTORS' CIRCULATING LIBRARY

115. In this library we now have about 500 books. We have continued to send out books on request all during the year, thus rendering the pastors a very valuable service.

We would urge the pastors to send to the office in Raleigh any books they can spare which they think would be helpful to their brother pastors. We would urge them also to avail themselves of this service. The office in Raleigh agrees to send two books to any pastor requesting them. The Board will pay the postage. The only expense to the pastor is postage for returning the books to the Raleigh office. A card to the General Secretary will bring full information.

10. PASTORS' SCHOOLS AND CONFERENCES

116. We continued this year a series of Pastors' Conferences all over the state, a project which we undertook several years ago. We have felt that these quiet meetings are perhaps as significant as any we hold during the year. During the past spring we conducted about fifteen one day meetings, scattered all over the state, thus enabling every pastor to attend one of them.

During the past summer we held two Pastors' Schools, one at Mars Hill and one at Meredith. The school at Mars Hill embraced two weeks, with,

however, special emphasis on the first week when about 150 pastors were present all or a part of the time. Some forty or fifty returned for the second week.

We are able now to see some of the results of this great school for pastors at Mars Hill. We believe, however, that only the years themselves will reveal the full significance of the school there.

Then for one week we provided for a school at Meredith. The attendance was not as large as we had hoped, but was larger than the year before.

In these schools we were privileged to have many great teachers and speakers. We are under particular obligation to Doctors W. W. Barnes and W. T. Conner of the Southwestern Seminary and Dr. Harold W. Tribble of the Southern Seminary.

Plans are already under way to make these schools for pastors larger and better for 1939.

V

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

117. We think it well to record here what we said in this section of the report a year ago concerning the Department of Christian Education in the Churches. We quote: "We are working slowly to a closer coördination and combination of all these divisions of our work. (We refer to the Sunday school, the B.T.U., and the B.S.U.) We believe we are going in the right direction. In fact the problem is one of a redirection of varied activities into a well integrated whole. Mr. Crouch has shown an unusual grasp of the problems involved, and has given his time and thought day and night without stint. We ask for sympathy and patience as we try to build a great Department of Christian Education in the Churches.

We record here with regret the resignation of Miss Mabel Starnes to accept the position of Educational Secretary of the First Baptist Church of Greenville, S. C.

It will be recalled that Miss Starnes was seriously injured in an automobile accident in October 1937 while in line of duty. For many months she was in a hospital undergoing constant treatment and suffering severely. We are happy to report in this connection that the Convention carries compensation insurance for all of its employees. This enabled Miss Starnes to have her hospital expenses taken care of as well as being provided with a small weekly compensation during her long illness. We rejoice that Miss Starnes has regained her full strength and vigor.

At a recent meeting of the Executive Committee of the General Board, when Miss Starnes' resignation was accepted, the following resolutions of appreciation were adopted:

WHEREAS Miss Mabel Starnes since February 15, 1932, has been associated with the Baptist State Convention as one of the Baptist Training Union leaders, and since she has recently been called as Educational Director of the First Baptist Church of Greenville, South Carolina, and because of this large opportunity has tendered her resignation as Associate B.T.U. Secretary.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved by the Executive Committee of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention in session in the city of Raleigh on Friday, November 28, 1938,

First, that we record here our deep appreciation for the unselfish and devoted service of Miss Starnes during these years. She has been a true and devoted servant of the Baptist people of the state, and has given her strength, physical, mental and spiritual, without stint to the development of the young life of our churches.

Second, that we rejoice that she has been restored to strength so that she can undertake this large task, and that we appreciate fully the fact that she received serious injury, causing her untold pain and prolonged illness, while in line of duty; and for this reason her services are all the more appreciated.

Third, that in the new work she takes up we express to her our continued best wishes for the success in that field of endeavor which she attained as a servant of the Baptist State Convention, and that she may have full health and happiness in it. We commend her without reservation to the First Church of Greenville, South Carolina, and to the people who love the Lord everywhere.

Be It Resolved Further that these resolutions of appreciation be made a part of the permanent records of the General Board and through the Board passed on as a part of the report of the General Board to the Convention.

It will be noted that we divide the work of the Department of Christian Education into (A) Christian Education in the Churches, and (B) Christian Education in the Colleges. The report of Mr. Crouch and the several divisions of the work follows:

A. DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE CHURCHES

118. The Department of Christian Education in the churches has completed its second full year's work as a correlated promotional agency for Sunday school, Training Union, Student and Men's Work. We feel that the work of each division has been strengthened and enlarged, and yet all of these divisions brought into closer relationship with each other.

For the past two years, a calendar of activities has been prepared and mailed to all Pastors in the state. This calendar gives the dates of all important district and state meetings of all the divisions of our work. It also gives the main emphasis made by each division of the work, month by month. This calendar will be prepared and mailed to pastors by the first of December of this year.

In February of this year a series of eight regional church conferences were promoted in different parts of the state. Although the larger part of the work of these conferences was for Sunday school workers, there was a definite effort made to give help to the pastors and church leaders in the matter of correlation of all their work into a well rounded church program. A tract was written and distributed, on the work of a church

cabinet. These conferences were attended by over 3,000 pastors and church leaders, and at the request of a great many pastors, will be held again in February of this year. These meetings will close with a great evangelistic rally at the night session.

Another meeting that has greatly helped the workers of our department was a Bi-State Conference of all the workers in our department with all the workers from South Carolina. The meeting was held at Shelby for three day and night sessions. Subjects had been assigned three months in advance for study and for preparation of papers. These papers were presented on various phases of our church educational program. Thus the workers in our Sunday school, Training Union and Student work have thought and planned together for an adequate church program.

In the report on Sunday school work, you will notice we have had 222 local enlargement campaigns in as many different churches in our state. In addition to the enlargement campaigns, hundreds of training schools were promoted and a great many clinics and conferences held. A goal was set for four hundred vacation schools for the year, and with the records to date, there is every indication we will surpass that figure. A strong summer rural program was carried on using about fifty volunteer college students and school teachers and contacting three hundred churches. Already 12,938 training awards have been issued. Certainly Mr. Morgan and Mr. and Mrs. John B. Lane have done a splendid work in our Sunday school division. They have been ably assisted by Mrs. C. D. Bain, and Mrs. A. V. Washburn, and Mrs. W. Perry Crouch who are approved workers.

The Training Union Division has suffered the loss of the services of Miss Mabel Starnes for the past year due to an automobile accident. She has recently resigned her work in North Carolina to accept work in the First Baptist Church of Greenville, South Carolina. Miss Velma Preslar substituted in this division until the first of September. Since that time Miss Josephine Turner has been serving in this capacity. However, the Training Union division has made marked progress during the past year. During the year, much emphasis has been placed on the real place of the Training Union in the educational life of the church. Particularly did we seek to emphasize the enlistment and training of the adult membership of our churches. Some success has been made in this direction as evidenced by the organization of over one hundred new adult unions during this year. We noticed the Department for Adult Education in North Carolina recently asked for an increase in appropriation from \$48,000 to \$293,708 for 1939. If North Carolina feels that adult education in general is that important for the citizens of North Carolina, is it not time we become more concerned about our idle and untrained church members?

A strong summer rural program was carried on in eight Associations. The regional conventions in the spring and the state assembly at Ridgecrest in July were all well attended and results most gratifying.

Several hundred new organizations have been set up this year, and many others have been strengthened and encouraged to have training schools.

Already this year 15,540 Training Union awards have been issued in North Carolina, which is an increase of over six hundred over the figures for the entire year of 1937. Mr. Brooks and his helpers are doing a fine piece of work in this division of our work.

The Student Division has had the best year in many years. During the year, work was carried on through student organizations on fourteen college and university campuses. During the year Miss Mary Nance Daniel and Mr. William Hall Preston from the Southwide Student office in Nashville helped with the work on several different campuses. In April, a retreat for new officers from the various schools was held in Greensboro. Over 150 attended this meeting. The first of May, Miss Ann Downey was added to the student force as Baptist Student Secretary at East Carolina Teachers College at Greenville. She is doing a splendid work among our Baptist girls there. About 120 students attended the Southwide Student retreat at Ridgecrest in June. During September a new Baptist Student Union was organized at Louisburg College. Practically every campus was visited during September and October in the interest of the Fourth Quadrennial All-Southern Baptist Student Conference held in Memphis, Tennessee, October 27-30. Over one hundred students traveled by special train to this conference. The first of September, Miss Velma Preslar was transferred to this division as full-time Student Field Worker. We feel 1939 will be the greatest year we have ever had in this division of our work.

Work among the men is of necessity a much slower work because there are few organizations for men in the Baptist churches of our state. We have not tried to organize local Brotherhoods in the churches, although we have sent out literature on Brotherhood organizations upon request. We have sought to promote Associational Men's Meetings during the spring and summer. Definite reports have been received from twenty-three such meetings with a total attendance of about 2,500 men. In addition to these, a state men's meeting was held in Winston-Salem with over four hundred men in attendance.

I would like to personally express my appreciation to Mr. Huggins, our General Secretary, for his constant advice and help; to Mr. Morgan, Mr. Brooks, and the other fine helpers in my department. They are a consecrated group of Christians giving their best to promote the work of our Lord among the Baptist churches of North Carolina.

1. DIVISION OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

119. The Sunday School Division of our Mission Work has experienced a great year in many respects. To survey the record is to experience a feeling of deep gratitude to God for His continued blessings upon us through another year of triumphant achievement. In almost every line there is evidence of a deeper spirit of interest and coöperation among our people.

Personnel: Secretary L. L. Morgan is now approaching the close of his thirteenth year with the Convention and is in his third year as Secretary of the work. Field Workers Mr. and Mrs. John B. Lane have been with

us more than a year and are very much in demand all over the state; Miss Bessie Morgan, now in her thirteenth year, still carries on in a most efficient and effective manner in the office.

Approved and Qualified Workers: Through the courtesy of the Sunday School Board we have the splendid assistance now and then of the following workers: Mrs. A. V. Washburn, Goldsboro, Approved Cradle Roll and Beginner Worker; Mrs. C. D. Bain, Dunn, Approved Primary and Junior Worker; Mrs. F. A. Bower, Kannapolis, Qualified Elementary Worker; Mrs. W. Perry Crouch, Raleigh, Approved Intermediate Worker; and Mrs. C. E. Baucom, Concord, Qualified Intermediate Worker; Mr. James P. Morgan, Durham, Approved Young People's Worker; Mrs. John B. Lane, Lexington, temporary Approved Adult Worker; and Mr. John B. Lane, Lexington, temporary Approved Extension Worker. All of these have given their best in the promotion of the work.

Promotional Projects: Our State Meeting for associational leaders was held February 3 and 4 at the First Baptist Church in High Point. More than 1,200 people attended this meeting and 65 out of 72 associations were represented. Our 1939 meeting will be held February 2 and 3. in the First Baptist Church of Winston-Salem. February 14-28 our Division of the work participated in a series of eight Regional Church Conferences where most of the emphasis was given to Sunday school work. More than three thousand church leaders were contacted and we consider that one of our best opportunities for service. More than 400 of our Sunday school leaders attended the Southern Baptist Sunday School Conference at Ridgecrest July 17-24. This Conference gave our leaders a wonderful opportunity to secure the best help available. We hope to have six hundred there next year.

Vacation Bible Schools: We set our goal for 400 schools and already approximately 379 have been reported. As the record stands now in the South only Tennessee is ahead of North Carolina. We want to express our appreciation to the Sunday School Board and our State Mission Board for financial help and to Mrs. A. V. Washburn of Goldsboro for leading in the promotion work. Others who made a distinct contribution are: Miss Ruby Williams, Buie's Creek; Miss Neva Harper, Lillington; Miss Elizabeth Draughan, Dunn; Miss Stella Blevins, Grassy Creek; Mr. R. R. Campbell, West Jefferson; Mr. Vardell Watterson, Buie's Creek; Rev. Lewis E. Ludlum, Asheville; Rev. H. Fletcher Lambert, Statesville; Miss Laura Mae Hilliard, Cary; Miss Marjorie Jordan, Cary; Miss Mary Ann Brewer, Pittsboro; and Miss Irene Dixon, Kings Mountain.

Teacher Training: Last year we stated that the awards reported were for the year October 1, 1936 to October 1, 1937. That statement should have read October 1, 1934, when the new course started, to September 1, 1937. For the sake of correction and comparison we are giving the following figures: Grand total for October 1, 1934 to September 1, 1937, was 26,642. The grand total for October 1, 1934 to October 1, 1938, is 39,580. This is a total of 12,938 for the past thirteen months, and 4,580 above the goal we set last year. We should make it 15,000 for 1939.

Whole Weeks Worked: During the year our regular workers with the Approved and Qualified Workers have put in 138 whole weeks with churches

on the field. Our summer workers put in 300 full weeks. This makes a total of 438 full weeks on the field. It would take one person eight and one-half years to do this much work if he worked every day.

Associational Enlargement Campaigns: We were assisted by 71 of the most capable and consecrated workers we have ever assembled in our association-wide Enlargement Campaigns in eastern, Piedmont and western North Carolina, during the spring, summer and fall. They worked in 213 churches and reached approximately 17,860 people in eight weeks. This method of work gets greater returns for the money than any work we do. The table on page 27 reveals some of the results of the work.

Looking Ahead: It is our purpose to make 1939 a banner year in Sunday school work. We can do it if every associational superintendent will join us in a far-reaching program. By the first of January we want to assign ten Vacation Bible School workers to as many associations and help them to plan for a school in every church in each of the ten associations to be conducted in June, July and August. We also want ten associational superintendents to begin planning for a Volunteer Study Course in every church, with local people doing the teaching. Our regular force, along with our summer workers, will conduct eight Association-wide Enlargement Campaigns and try to reach 250 churches in eight weeks. Other associational superintendents and leaders will join us in doing as much training work as possible. Hundreds of church leaders will teach classes during the year if our associational leaders will ask them.

Our Goals for 1939:

1. Sixty associations organized for Sunday school work.
2. Eight thousand increase in enrollment.
3. Fifteen thousand training awards issued.
4. Seventy-five Standard Sunday Schools.
5. Two hundred and fifty Enlargement Campaigns.

2. TRAINING UNION DIVISION

NATHAN C. BROOKS, JR., *Secretary*

120. During the past year several changes have occurred in the personnel and program of the Training Union Division of the Department of Christian Education.

PERSONNEL

Miss Mabel Starnes, the Associate Secretary, was quite seriously injured in an automobile accident in October 1937. For several months, during which her many friends came to realize just what she has meant to the training work in North Carolina, she was confined to hospitals in Statesville and Asheville. Following her recovery, Miss Starnes accepted an invitation to become educational director of the First Baptist Church, Greenville, South Carolina. She began her work there November first. North Carolina Baptists will continue to be grateful for Mabel Starnes. She will be particularly remembered for her contribution to associational work and for the excellent way in which she led in the training work following the resignation of Miss Winnie Rickett.

From January through July, Miss Velma Preslar, who had been serving as office secretary to Mr. Crouch and as student field worker, was a valuable assistant in the Training Union Division. On September first, Miss Josephine Turner, of Clinton, began to serve as field worker. She will continue in this capacity until January first. Both of these young ladies have contributed helpfully to the work of this division of the Department of Christian Education.

In September the addition of two part time workers was announced. Designated as approved workers, these helpers will assist about eight or ten weeks a year, particularly in enlargement work, and will receive remuneration only for the actual weeks of work in which they help. Mrs. Ernest Russell, of Charlotte, is the Junior Approved worker, and Mrs. O. L. Faber, of Charlotte, is the Intermediate Approved worker.

Each of these is well qualified through training and experience to render a valuable service in the training work of the state.

Miss Mary Lou Wall, of Raleigh, continues her effective and efficient service as office secretary.

PROGRAM

The State Assembly, at Ridgecrest, voted to discontinue the election of convention officers, since Training Union work is no longer promoted as an agency separate from the Baptist State Convention. Instead, seven persons were elected to serve with the Regional Presidents as "Assembly Directors." This advisory group will meet during the Baptist State Convention and assist with plans for the 1939 Regional Conventions and the State Assembly.

The accompanying statistical charts give some idea of the progress made in Training Union work during the past year. Chart No. 1 is a summary of the special summer work conducted with the assistance of college students and of teachers. Chart No. 2 reports the development of the work by associations.

Regional Conventions; Regional Church Conferences; a State Associational Officers' Meeting, in Greensboro; a State Assembly, at Ridgecrest; associational and local Enlargement Campaigns; and frequent speaking engagements made heavy demands upon the workers in this division during the past convention year. While participating in this varied program, your state leaders are convinced that the regional church conferences and enlargement revivals were the most fruitful types of work in which they engaged.

A report from the Sunday School Board indicates that from January through September 409 new units were added in North Carolina to which the Sunday School Board contributed free literature for their first quarter of work. These were as follows:

PLANS

Details of the 1939 program of work are being arranged with the following in mind:

1. Adequate *conceptions* of a Church Training Program need to be secured. Scriptural study, need awareness, and thorough familiarity with training programs of the past will help here.

2. Proper *relationships* need to be established. Conflicts, jealousies, overlappings, etc., do not make for growing Christian character and conduct. The Training Union, as an organization, must be in complete harmony with the rest of the church life.

3. *Individual needs* must be magnified. We are not turning out standardized machines, but we are developing individual Christians. This approach

would surely lead to more initiative in program building, and to some specialized courses of study.

4. *Long term planning* is essential. Hand to mouth existence will not suffice. Churches can never have a real, vital training program unless they look ahead, provide ultimate objectives and relate year by year efforts definitely to the larger aim.

5. A *mature leadership* must be enlisted. This is not to suggest that the entire training effort is to be adult centered, or, that youth problems and participation are to be minimized. Nor are we unmindful of the fine contribution of many youthful leaders in the past to the Training Union work. But, the time has come when guidance for the training program must be afforded by a leadership as mature as any in the church life. Only when such leadership has been secured can we expect a substantial advance in Training Union work.

APPRECIATION

As in former years, our hearts are grateful for God's blessings upon us and for the many individuals whose efforts and influence resulted in substantial gains this year.

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3. DIVISION OF BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

PERSONNEL

The past year there has been encouraging progress in the division of the Baptist Student Union. Miss Velma Preslar has been released from other responsibilities to give full time as Baptist Student Union Field Worker, and Miss Ann Downey came, in May, to be Baptist Student Secretary at East Carolina Teachers College in Greenville. Miss Dora Bostick is office secretary of this division. We wish to express thanks to our General Board and to the Baptists of North Carolina for making possible this strengthening of our program.

Miss Cleo Mitchell and Miss Mildred Kichline continue their excellent work as Baptist Student Secretaries on the campuses of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and at Meredith College in Raleigh respectively. Each of them has a Baptist constituency of approximately four hundred. Mr. Zon Robinson is sharing his time with the Baptist Student Union at Wake Forest, offering constructive aid in the work of the organization.

ORGANIZATION

Other campuses having Baptist Student Unions are: Appalachian State Teachers College, Boone; Boiling Springs; Campbell College, Buie's Creek; University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill; Chowan, Murfreesboro; Mars Hill; State College, Raleigh; Western Carolina Teachers College, Cullowhee; Wingate, Louisburg, and High Point College. This means that in round numbers, 4,000 North Carolina Baptist students are kept in touch with the local church at college and with the denominational work through the Baptist Student Union program, while at the same time they are challenged with a call to vital spiritual living. J. Caesar Herrin, a Wake Forest senior, has served as student president of the state organization.

ACTIVITIES

Youth revivals were held under the direction of Mr. Crouch in two churches during the past summer, and a number of others were promoted by different groups of students.

The Southwide Student Retreat at Ridgecrest was a time of decision for many students. More than 140 were in attendance from eleven schools in the state. As a result, organizational work is strengthened, more students are finding help for personal problems through the prayer-mate relationship, more prayer groups are holding trysts on campuses, and more students than ever before have joined a local church.

The Annual Spring Retreat, the inter-collegiate training and planning camp for new Baptist Student Union Council members, drew more than one hundred students together in April for definite study.

Definite Volunteer Summer Work was engaged in by more than one hundred students who rendered an inestimable service to home churches and other churches in their associations through the teaching and assistance in special training courses and through the regular educational activities of the church.

The Southwide Student Conference, held once every four years, will be meeting in Memphis, Tennessee, as this report goes to press. About 130 North Carolina students will attend this quadrennial event, and will participate in the study of major student problems. Dr. George W. Truett; Dr. T. G. Dunning, of London, England; Dr. L. R. Scarborough; Dr. Daniel A. Poling of Philadelphia; and Admiral Richard E. Byrd are some of the outstanding personalities whom our students will meet there.

THANKS

We express gratitude to the Southwide Department of Student Work for their helpfulness in all our work. Mr. Preston and Miss Daniel have given of their time for visits to various campuses in the state, helping to greatly strengthen the program in those places. Also to *The Biblical Recorder* we owe thanks for the opportunity of keeping before you the hopes and works of our division.

FACING FORWARD

As we look into the future we are grateful for the heartening growth of the past few months, and are encouraged by the response of the denomination and student groups in building for a more far-reaching Christian influence among our future lay leadership.

There still remains great need. At State College there are about six hundred Baptist boys; at the University of North Carolina, 550 Baptist students; these and other college situations in our state offer North Carolina Baptists one of their greatest mission fields. Can we not arrange soon to offer them a leadership with time to plan and work toward their enlistment in Church work and development in more Christ-like living?

122. B. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE COLLEGES

In another section of this report we called attention to the effort of the Convention to provide small appropriations to all our colleges, except Meredith, for current support. We do not need to repeat here the facts stated there.

We record with gratitude that all our institutions appear to be in a prosperous condition with increased student bodies and excellent morale. We print here brief reports from them and call attention in particular to the exhibits under General Statistics A, B, and C. In a brief space one can find the principal facts as to enrollment, operating statement, and balance sheet of the several institutions.

(a) WAKE FOREST COLLEGE

Wake Forest College reports for the academic year 1937-1938:

1. An enrollment in the regular session of 976.
2. A combined enrollment on its summer session units of 949.
3. The total enrollment in both the regular session and the summer session units was 1,925.
4. The total number of degrees awarded for the year was 205.

Of these 21 received the LL.B. degree; 19 received the B.S. degree with major in medicine; 164 received the Bachelor's degree in the college of liberal arts; and one Master's degree was awarded.

During the summer another research laboratory in the Medical School was thoroughly equipped through an anonymous gift from a friend of the college and important changes and improvements were made in both the laboratories of Biology and Physics.

The Board of Trustees at its June meeting of this year authorized the organization of a department of music in the college that should carry elective credits. This is in keeping with the practice in other institutions of like character and is welcomed by students and friends of the college as fulfilling a long-felt need. Courses have been organized and are being

operated in band, glee club, sight singing, harmony, and church music. It is the purpose of the college to make this department strong and useful in the preparation of young men for a larger activity in this phase of our cultural and denominational life.

A Federal project in Wake Forest eliminated the railroad grade crossing at the station and cut an underpass directly in front of the campus. In doing this the surface of the highway was lowered about ten feet around the corner of the campus and left a very ugly cut marring its beauty. The college appealed to the State Highway Commission and it assisted in securing a WPA project in grading the banks back into the campus. This created greater visibility on the highway and reduced the hazard to students in crossing. Most of all, the job as it now stands has added great beauty and attractiveness. Beautiful slopes were effected and a good job of sodding done.

In addition to this project we relaid the walks on the campus focusing them at a point near the center. The construction of the underpass and the grading of the campus incident thereto made necessary the construction of a new entrance to the campus directly in front of the underpass. At this point the college arch was relocated. A walk leads from the arch to the center of the campus directly in front of the administration building. The entire project has attracted wide and favorable attention both for its convenience and beauty. All walks are paved with brick.

An important undertaking was launched during the year in the formation of The Friends of the Wake Forest College Library organization. The Raleigh alumni launched the movement in the spring of 1938. Already a number of important gifts have been received. The organization is entirely informal. It has no constitution and no by-laws. There are no dues. Members have one obligation only: an interest in the Wake Forest College Library. Any person wishing to join the organization may do so by communication with Dr. Joseph Quincy Adams, Folger Shakespeare Library, Washington, D. C.

The plan for the retirement of professors went into effect for the first time this year, consequently there were many faculty changes. These are as follows:

Dr. O. T. Binkley became head of the Department of Religion.

Dr. J. A. Easley, Professor of Bible.

Dr. Elton C. Cocke, Assistant Professor of Biology.

Dr. S. C. Fielden, Assistant Professor of Law.

Dr. Roland F. Miller, Assistant Professor of Anatomy.

Dr. Norman C. Giddings, Assistant Professor of French.

Mr. Max L. Griffin has returned as Assistant Professor of English taking the place of Dr. Guy C. Cardwell, resigned.

Mr. George E. Copple has been added to the English staff as an instructor.

Mr. Lyman H. Seymour is serving as Director of Music.

In the Department of Philosophy, Mr. J. A. Martin is serving as Teaching Fellow.

Mr. H. Grady Britt is connected in the same capacity with the Department of Biology.

(b) MEREDITH COLLEGE

The following changes have been made in officers and teachers for the new session:

Miss Betsye Adams, Assistant Secretary to the Bursar and Treasurer; Miss Marian Ball, Dietitian; Miss Margaret M. Cooper, Assistant Professor of Chemistry; Miss Pauline Aiken, Assistant Professor of English; Miss Bessie M. Brown, Assistant Professor of Education and Psychology; Miss Ella McRae Stagg, Instructor in French; Miss Myra A. Williams, Instructor in Biology; Miss Elizabeth Lee, Instructor in Piano; Miss Katherine Moseley, Instructor in Art; Miss Margaret Kramer, Instructor in Biology and Chemistry.

Miss May Crawford, Professor of Piano, is away on leave of absence to return at the beginning of the spring semester. Miss Virginia Branch, who has rendered most satisfactory service in the past, is supplying in her place.

To those who have withdrawn we feel greatly indebted for the excellent work done by them.

Those who are working on our campus for the first time come with the best of testimonials and gratifying experience from fields previously occupied.

Our student body numbers 565 at this date. There are representatives from seventeen states, and from seventy-six of the counties of North Carolina. Four foreign countries are here represented. The spirit on the campus is most delightful and the work is going on in a most satisfactory way.

(c) CHOWAN COLLEGE

Chowan College was able to close its first year as a Junior College without a deficit. The General Board had endeavored to give us \$8,500.00 but was able to give only \$5,500.00. This was necessitated by lack of funds received by the General Board from the churches. Nevertheless, the college was able to close its first year free of encumbrances.

Splendid improvements have been made in the physical plant during the past year. Thirty dormitory rooms have been completely renovated and painted. Four rooms have been completely furnished by friends of the college. The entire second floor of the Administration Building has been painted with the exception of one Society Hall and the Dean of Women's office. The Concrete Cottage, which is occupied by Professor G. E. Burdick and also used as a rooming house for boys, has been completely painted and renovated on the inside. The Science Building has been completely painted and much valuable material has been added to the various laboratories until we have approximately reached standard equipment in all of them. Our Home Economics Department has been equipped with standard equipment both in the Fibres and the Foods Laboratories. Many other improvements have also been made during the year. This was made possible by the generosity of friends and not any money was taken from the current expense account for this purpose.

The fall term opened with seventy-eight students registering, which was much smaller than we had expected. We had received one hundred and two applications and other students not expected came in at the last minute, and if it had not been for some thirty cancellations, we would have had a student body of approximately one hundred and ten this year.

Three new members have been added to the faculty this year along with the Dean of Women. Miss Carrie Elizabeth Spencer, head of the English Department, resigned, was replaced by Professor Wyman C. Lowe. Miss Ella Stagg, head of the Foreign Language Department, resigned, was replaced by Miss Eileen Kelly. Miss Ada Johnson, head of the Home Economics Department, resigned, was replaced by Miss Thelma H. Pearson. Each of these have taken their places and seem proficient in their line. Mrs. Alba W. Dunlap was elected Dean of Women.

Chowan College is now receiving full credit for all work done by our higher institutions in the State of North Carolina, and therefore, with its low cost of standardized training should demand the patronage of its constituency.

(d) MARS HILL COLLEGE

Faculty: More than a score of the teaching staff have a tenure of ten years or longer and almost as many live in their own homes. Miss Elizabeth Ellison was elected to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Miss Zula Evelyn Coon as teacher of voice and public school music, Miss Mary Catherine Logan has come as an additional member of the official staff, and Messrs. J. V. Howell, Falk Johnson, and Raworth Walker were added as full-time instructors in the departments of mathematics, English, and chemistry respectively. All of these are giving excellent satisfaction. The spirit of unity and earnestness of purpose of the faculty is a source of great gratitude.

Student Body: The enrollment this fall—757—is the largest in the history of the college—731 college students, 16 academy, and 10 special. Of this number 55 are ministerial students and two are the children of missionaries. These are drawn from 82 counties of North Carolina, 18 states, and two foreign countries.

Summer Session: The 1938 summer session of the Wake Forest-Meredith Summer School was in many respects the most satisfactory of any of the sessions since it was begun in the summer of 1935. The enrollment was 354 and the spirit was commendable. We believe that the summer school, under the direction of Professor B. Y. Tyner of Meredith and Dean I. N. Carr of Mars Hill, is destined to grow in numbers and in excellence of atmosphere.

Improvements and Progress: Since the meeting of the Convention in Wilmington a year ago, the Edna Corpening Moore Dormitory for Young Women has been completed and furnished at a cost of approximately \$95,000, four new stokers and an electrical dishwasher have been installed, and 1,860 volumes have been added to the Library. Other im-

provements on the campus amounting to several hundred dollars have been made, the grounds have been further beautified, and the Carnegie Foundation has presented the college with a music set to be placed in the auditorium. It is a source of regret that the old Spilman Home had to be razed. This landmark had been condemned for about a half dozen years, and it seemed dangerous to try to use it longer. Mars Hill has never operated with a deficit, and it is our purpose to have the slate clear next spring so that we may move forward with our plans for a modern science building.

Principal Assets: The greater assets of Mars Hill College are less tangible: spiritual tone, atmosphere, devotion of former students, loyalty of patrons and other friends, goodwill, an unfaltering faith in God and man. For all that Mars Hill has we are humbly grateful.

(e) CAMPBELL COLLEGE

With an enrollment somewhat larger than last year, numbering at present 409, Campbell has begun its fifty-second year under perhaps the most favorable conditions in its history. A new fireproof dormitory for girls, nicely equipped with modern conveniences, has relieved somewhat the over-load on old Treat Dormitory. Our dormitories for boys, however, were inadequate to accommodate those admitted, making it necessary to rent some rooms off the campus. Thanks to the unity of purpose in a faculty, which for the most part have stood by the institution for years at financial sacrifice, and to the excellent school spirit in the student body, the outlook is very gratifying.

One of the outstanding achievements of the past several years has been the prompt settlement by Business Manager B. P. Marshbanks of all current expenses, including the final payment to every teacher for the past two years by commencement day. To keep secure the financial reputation of the college without substantial support from endowment not only has utmost thrift been necessary but too often the efficiency of the institution has suffered for lack of much-needed financial appropriations. Thus far the appeal of the administration to its friends and to the Baptist State Convention, sponsoring the work, has lacked that convinciveness necessary to produce sufficient endowment or current support. No let-up in the campaign will come until God's stewards provide for an institution committed to the cause of Christian education in a constituency, many of whom would be denied such privileges in more expensive schools.

During the past year Campbell College has lost two of its most loyal Trustees by death. Rev. B. Townsend, of Rockfish, one of the charter members of the Board, died in July of this year. On June 6 death came almost suddenly to William Morgan, business man and leading church worker of Angier. While mourning their loss Campbell will seek to perpetuate their memory in an institution dedicated to those traditions and ideals for which they nobly lived.

Until a comparatively short time ago a vast majority of our denomination thought and cared nothing about caring for their aged and helpless pastors; and some are still more or less indifferent about the Board's object. A very few of these veterans of the cross, to be sure, were assisted occasionally by generous-hearted individuals, but such assistance was only occasional, irregular, and pitifully inadequate; meanwhile, their denomination as such had utterly ignored them. Speaking for the Baptists of North Carolina—and as far as I can learn, similar sentiments and conditions about this matter existed in our sister Southern States—when I began attending

our State Convention some sixty-five years ago, there was no report on old ministers' relief submitted, and no reference ever was made to the matter. The first such report appears in the Convention minutes of 1878. That report contained three lines, saying: "We think that this matter, under the circumstances, is not a proper subject for discussion." Eleven years later, 1889, the Convention did appoint "nine trustees to collect and disburse funds for the relief of aged and needy ministers"; but these trustees reported at the next session only \$29.89 so collected and disbursed; and that with a white membership in the State of 100,000 Baptists.

But the project had at least found a place in the hearts of the denomination, a project embodying the spirit of life. And in the spiritual, as in the natural world, all life under normal conditions tends to grow. Thus, after some fifty years of effort in the several Southern States, while its growth was naturally slow, it was steady; so that when, after years of arduous and unsalaried efforts by Dr. William Lunsford, the Southern Baptist Convention was induced to take over the movement, these several states, besides caring for their own beneficiaries from year to year, had accumulated and invested funds aggregating \$106,000.00. This sum they turned over to the General Board when appointed and seems to have constituted its financial basis as its beginning.

As results showed, this previous growth was only a beginning. Under the wise and vigorous leadership of Dr. Lunsford, until his death after two years of service, and since then, under that of our own T. J. Watts, no less prudent and vigorous, the advancement of this relief work in various forms among Southern Baptists has been still more steady and rapid.

Of course, continuing the regular relief work that had been formerly carried on by the several states, the General Convention was soon induced to appropriate 3 per cent of its receipts from the Coöperative Program. Painfully aware that its receipts were still so far below its needs, it soon began to try out plans for annuities, which involved the coöperation of the pastors and churches, each party paying 3 per cent of the salary received. This annuity plan seeming to promise the best results, has been pushed as rapidly as possible, each plan being improved from year to year as occasion required, so that the last, the State Convention's Ministers' Retirement Plan, is now being proposed, the details of which cannot be given in this report.

But it is still painfully obvious that a number of our people still feel that all monies given to preachers are more or less pensions and that in spite of Paul's injunction that such support in some form be maintained by the churches. So that we must set about trying to induce all our people to understand the scriptural relations of pastor and church.

Has it ever occurred to the reader that the appointment of deacons at the beginning was meant for the relief of the apostles and their fellow ministers? Not to induce idleness or provide wealth, but as the apostles themselves said, "that they might give themselves to the work of the ministry." And this is the underlying principle of all gifts to ministers as such; to furnish sufficient support for them in life and for their families after their death, to free their minds from the anxieties at the thought

of old age and leaving destitute families. And surely, it is not hard to see that no minister can do his best work as pastor or preacher unless his mind is so free, more or less fully. No one need apprehend undue wealth for ministers from churches or any other source known to the writer; I have seen the statement that the ideal salary is not to exceed \$1,500 or less, according to circumstances.

It must not be expected to remove this evil impression among the churches or the masses immediately or in the near future. Remember, another natural law in the spiritual world, namely that all large growth is slow.

The results of the Board's thirty years of life gives grounds for hope in that and in all other directions. The developments indicate a growth equal, if it does not surpass, that of any other of our great religious enterprises. Beginning with \$106,000.00 its varied invested funds now amount to \$4,500,000.00. Beginning with less than 100 beneficiaries a year, it now has over 2,000. Beginning with no church annuitants, it has now 113 churches in the south that are participating in such annuities with their pastors.

But these figures do not give the whole picture. Twenty years ago the subject of ministerial relief was rarely mentioned in papers, in pulpit or in pew. Now it is referred to as much perhaps by both parties as our other religious enterprises are. Then a large number of pastors shrank from urging the matter of ministerial relief in their pulpits lest they might be suspected of personal reasons. Now our pastors are largely free from such embarrassment. Then the subject was more or less local, depending upon the individual states. Now it has equal rank in the work of the Southern Baptist Convention with any other of that body's enterprises. Its members are appointed by that body, are controlled by it, and their annual reports must be approved by the Convention.

But after all, the Convention still must carry on its direct relief program because so many churches cannot now, or will not, participate in any annuity plan. So many salaries are insufficient to allow such participation on the part of pastors. And for years to come this situation cannot be wholly relieved.

Suffer now a suggestion or two:

In contributing to relief work or annuities let the brethren keep in mind that they are participating in the full program of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Let them remember too they are contributing not to individuals but to the cause. The relation of pastor and people may be different; some being more beloved and more popular, and some may be even really unworthy; but any pastor or church worker who has devoted his or her life mainly to the services of the denomination deserves to be cared for in old age when they must depend upon what they have received from their pastorates or relief, and when their hope of remuneration from other sources is gone.

125. B. REPORT OF BAPTIST ORPHANAGE OF NORTH CAROLINA

I. G. GREER, *General Superintendent*

This is to be a brief report of another year's work, and not a discussion of Child Welfare.

We have come to the end of another Convention year without the loss of a child by death. This is most gratifying when we consider the fact that in North Carolina we have approximately 60 deaths in our white population every day.

We graduated from High School last spring 34 boys and girls. You will be interested to know that every one of these is now either in college or has been placed where he is earning his own living. Among our former graduates, there are now twenty-eight who are pursuing further preparation. Eighteen of these are in standard colleges, making very satisfactory records.

Since the Orphanage was opened in 1885 it has rendered aid to 4,530 children. These men and women, boys and girls, are succeeding in such a way as to amply justify and stimulate continued support of the Orphanage.

The alumni of the Baptist Orphanage have become a distinct asset to the life of community and church.

Cash receipts for current funds this Convention year have exceeded those of last year by approximately \$5,000. This is an increase of about seven per cent.

How to meet human needs in the name of Christianity is daily a most compelling responsibility of the church. The Social Security Act has done much to supply the physical needs of humanity. While doing this, however, the government has presented the church and private agencies two challenges that cannot be ignored. First, there are those who do not come within the scope of the present Social Security Act. These are our responsibility. Our records and continued applications indicate that this group is almost unlimited. Second, the government cannot meet the spiritual needs of humanity. This is distinctly a function of the church. If man is to do no more than to live by "bread alone," then the church might just as well resolve itself into an attribute of the government or a civic club. Surely the church has vision to see these opportunities, and courage enough to meet them.

The needs of the Orphanage have never been greater. In addition to the daily expense of \$580.00, many of the buildings donated by generous souls of a former generation, must soon be repaired or replaced by new ones. The once-a-month offerings from the Sunday schools, the personal gifts of friends and organizations together with a generous Thanksgiving offering would supply these needs.

The Orphanage has one aim: to place within the reach of every child, who is a Baptist responsibility, the opportunity to develop into a strong Christian man or woman. In the accomplishment of this aim every person in the state has an opportunity to enrich his spiritual life by supporting the Orphanage, either directly or through his Sunday school and church.

If we love life well enough to want to live, and live abundantly in the lives of our children, the opportunity is within our reach. Jesus took children in His arms and blessed them. He said, "Greater works shall ye do." Through your Orphanage organization you have the privilege of "going about doing good," in the name of Jesus, by helping feed, clothe, shelter, educate and meet the spiritual needs of these children.

126. C. NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

SMITH HAGAMAN, *Superintendent*

The fifteenth year of the Hospital's service to sick humanity closed June 30, 1938.

To the present date a little more than 42,000 patients were entered for treatment. During the past year about 6,000 of our sick applied for treatment. We were able to provide a bed for 4,056 of these. At the present, we are able to care for only about one-half the number who are applying.

We had during the year over 1,000 mothers, who not only made the fight for their own life and health, but for the protection and joy of more than 3,000 children at their homes; about 100 preachers, composed of pastors, ministerial students, and old ministers who are no longer able to preach—a number of them almost penniless. We had 1,564 patients who paid little, and in most instances, nothing after our investigation showed they were not able to pay.

This free service was done at an estimated cost of \$78,000 with an additional free medical and surgical service of \$117,800 or a total of \$195,800.

We have a staff of 70 medical and surgical doctors, who, in addition to the vast amount of medical treatment rendered, did 2,600 surgical operations.

Our School of Nursing has 61 students in training, which does not include our graduates and special duty nurses on duty.

The number of churches and Sunday schools contributing to Mother's Day were 1,913.

Our Board of Trustees, with the aid of a special committee, are endeavoring to secure sufficient funds to enlarge the hospital to double its present capacity. The hospital is having a gratifying response to this effort to meet the challenge of the multitudes of sick who are asking for treatment and must be denied because of the lack of room.

127.

A. DIVISION OF RECEIPTS

The Coöperative Program funds are divided at present sixty per cent for state objects and forty per cent for southwide objects. When, however, designations are considered, southwide objects receive about forty-three per cent of all the money given, designated and undesignated, by the churches. We look eagerly to the time when we can safeguard our debt commitments and at the same time make such a distribution of the funds as will provide for southwide objects at least half of the total given by the churches. We can do this if and when the Coöperative Program funds are increased by about thirty per cent, or if and when we can secure eight to ten thousand members of the Hundred Thousand Club. For this increase we labor continually, and if the present increase continues we can probably make the division referred to in 1940. For the moment we believe it wise to instruct the Board to increase the percentage for southwide objects by three or four per cent if possible.

128.

B. PROMOTION PLANS

During the past two or three years we have conducted several simultaneous Stewardship Revivals with most encouraging results. This fall we have undertaken a greatly enlarged program, but we are trying to change the name of these efforts from Stewardship Revivals to Fellowship Revivals without changing the general scope and purpose of them. In short we are attempting to so vitalize the churches that they will spontaneously undertake an enlarged program, both for local support and for all the causes we cherish. We are doing all we can to increase the bonds of fellowship in the churches, remembering that genuine fellowship comes only as people enter spontaneously into a great program and share joyfully in its support.

We have planned about 15 of these revivals for this fall. We find that about 20 churches in each of these associations desire to have this revival. This means that we must secure about 300 pastors who will leave their own work for a week and help in some other church. On the whole the response of the pastors has been most gratifying, and we record here our abiding appreciation.

In another section of this report we have called attention to the Promotion Plans adopted by the Board in its June 1938 meeting, and we do not think it necessary to repeat these plans here.

Once again we call attention to the fact that the Coöperative Program, broadly conceived, contemplates not only the giving of undesignated money, but provides also for special days on which offerings are made for special objects. It is true that money given on these special days goes to the objects specified, but at the same time these special days are observed as a part of our general Coöperative Program Plan. These special days follow:

Home and Foreign Missions—Some Sunday in March.
Hospital—Mothers' Day.

Christian Education—Some Sunday in June.

Old Ministers' Relief—Some Sunday in August.

State Missions—Last Sunday in October.

Orphanage—Thanksgiving.

These days should be observed in all our churches, and the appeal should be made (1) to those who have made a subscription and who are contributing systematically. These should not be pressed, but merely asked to make an offering, an "over and above," if their hearts prompt them. But what of the sixty to eighty per cent of our members who make no pledge at all and contribute with no regularity? Even in our most progressive churches there is a group of twenty-five to fifty per cent of the membership who make no subscriptions. How are they to be reached for our mission objects unless these special days are observed? It is, therefore, suggested that after the canvass or enrollment is completed a list be made of those members who will not make a subscription. We suggest the formation in each church of a Missions or Coöperative Program Committee composed of the following: Chairman, the Superintendent of the Sunday school; other members to include the chairman of the board of deacons, the president of the W.M.S., the president of the B.T.U., and the presidents and teachers of the larger classes in the Sunday school. The names of those who make no subscription, or who contribute irregularly, should be divided among the members of this committee. Then when the special days come each member who has not subscribed should be challenged to do something for each of these objects.

129. REPORT OF THE BAPTIST BOOK STORE

(Owned jointly by the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee and the North Carolina Baptist State Convention)

Mrs. ROGER P. MARSHALL, *Manager*

Net sales for the year ending December 31, 1937, amounted to \$43,971.29, an increase of \$3,677.70, or 9.1 per cent over 1936, with a net profit of \$5,445.95.

The amount paid out to the two boards owning the Book Store in dividends during the year amounted to \$3,309.48, one-half of this amount having been paid to each board.

It is to be remembered that the State Mission Board uses the earnings received from the Baptist Book Store for general mission purposes. Moreover, it is to be remembered that the Book Store sells a great many books, and some supplies, to people who belong to churches other than Baptist.

It may be seen from this that the Book Store is operating on a paying basis. The total net worth at December 31, 1937, was \$16,833.22, with no unpaid bills. During the thirteen years under the present partnership a total profit of \$35,360.66 has been paid out to both boards. One-half of this amount, \$17,680.33, has been paid the North Carolina Board, which

means that the Book Store is a distinct asset and a denominational investment.

The Book Store handles all supplies for every department of the church, as well as a complete line of general and religious books, song books, and Bibles. By means of the catalogues at our disposal, we can secure any book in print.

It is our desire to serve North Carolina Baptists promptly and efficiently, and we covet your continued patronage and support.

130. REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HISTORICAL COMMISSION

During the past year The North Carolina Baptist Historical Collection in the library of Wake Forest College has continued to grow by the addition of books, pamphlets, church record books, and other manuscripts. More regularly than before the clerks of associations are attending to the important matter of sending in the annual minutes.

In collecting and preserving materials for our Baptist history the W.M.U. can do a most valuable service, such as the women of the Presbyterian Church are doing for the great collection at Montreat. We should like to urge every Woman's Missionary Society in our Convention at once to set about the following undertakings:

1. Collect all the existing record books of the church to which the Society belongs, and send them for safe keeping to the Wake Forest College Library to be added to the Baptist Collection there.

2. Appoint one of its members to prepare a complete history of its church. Suggestions for planning and writing this history may be obtained by writing to the Chairman of this Commission, G. W. Paschal, Wake Forest, N. C. A copy of every history so written should be sent the Baptist Collection where it would be catalogued and available for all interested.

During the past year several churches have celebrated their centennials, one feature of the programs being the historical address. Copies of all such addresses should be sent to the Baptist Collection.

Of state-wide interest is the sketch of Old Ministers' Relief in North Carolina which is being prepared by Dr. R. T. Vann.

Our Commission takes pleasure again in calling attention of our North Carolina Baptists to the work of the Committee on the Preservation of Baptist History of the Southern Baptist Convention, and invites their coöperation.

131. ANNUAL REPORT NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

On September 25, 1938, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation was administering trust funds in the total amount of \$153,117.83, the assets of which may be classified as follows:

The assets of the Foundation have remained almost stationary during the year. No new trusts have been established. It will be noted in the statement of assets that the cash principal balance is \$16,124.97. Included in this amount is a sum of more than \$11,000, which was realized from the liquidation and sale of the Susan A. Hurdle estate.

The Foundation has carried on its books for several years a sum representing the value of a half interest in the Hurdle estate, subject to a life interest of Mr. E. J. Hurdle.

During the year an advantageous sale of this property was negotiated and the proceeds established as a trust fund.

A difference of opinion arose between the Foundation and the Orphanage as to the final disposition of this account. Several questions arose over the proper interpretation of the will and court orders. The Directors of the Foundation felt that they had no right to release the funds in the absence of specific judicial instructions. The matter was submitted to the Courts and it was ordered that the funds be delivered to the Baptist Orphanage. This the Foundation was quite ready to do, when so authorized, and the assets will be reduced by that amount.

Taking into account the fact that these funds were not invested over a period of several months, and the further fact that real estate in the total value of \$14,800 is productive of no income, the active investments of the Foundation paid a net income to the beneficiaries of \$5,188.50, which is 4.3 per cent return on the investment.

In addition to this net income, \$745.27 of income was reinvested in principal funds and a cash income balance held in the amount of \$1,939.33.

The commission paid the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company, Fiscal Agent, amounted to \$280.84, which represents 5.41 per cent of the net income delivered to beneficiaries and 3.3 per cent of the gross income. The services of the Fiscal Agent have been eminently satisfactory. Many of the transactions involve a great deal of detailed work, which Mr. LeRoy Martin, Trust Officer, and his staff have done with great care and fidelity. The fine quality of this service deserves special mention.

In order to facilitate handling of funds for investment, the Directors of the Foundation authorized a consolidation of funds according to the objects set forth in the bequests. This does not lessen the individual nature of bequests, but greatly simplifies the task of making adequate investments. This has reduced the number of separate accounts from twenty-four to fifteen.

The General Board of the Convention generously arranged to bear the expenses of travel for members of the Executive Committee of the Foundation, and other incidental expenses. This provision has facilitated the work of the Foundation and should be maintained.

This report covers the eighteenth year of service of the Foundation to denominational objects. We believe the investments are stronger and safer than ever before, with a larger proportion of active funds. The return on such active funds is considered very satisfactory and all loans are well secured.

We repeat as we have in every annual report our faith in the great value of the Foundation to the denomination. Providing a method whereby any donor can establish a permanent fund, under careful business-like management, perpetually to aid worthy causes, it ought to commend itself to every Baptist. Many persons delay such bequests and gifts because the sums they can give are small. Any sum can be used, large or small, and when added to other like gifts, they combine to make an effective means of service.

We repeat here the closing sentence of the last annual report, in the hope that by such repetition the hope may be realized and the Foundation will be recognized and used as it should be.

"If all the institutions and agencies of the Convention would contribute a small sum, a proper person could be chosen and set to work in the State to secure gifts, trusts, endowments and bequests for the benefit of any or all interests the donor would care to indicate. These gifts could be made direct to the beneficiary or to the Foundation, in large or small amounts. We are convinced that the returns from this work would far exceed the cost and we recommend that the Convention, by resolution or by authorization of the Trustees of the Convention, take necessary and proper steps to effectuate this work."

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the division of undesignated funds as between State and Southwide objects be left to the decision of the General Board when it meets in December, with, however, the instruction to the Board to increase the percentage to Southwide funds if it is at all possible to do so; that the General Board be asked to divide the per cent allocated for State objects so as to properly safeguard our debt funding commitments and at the same time conserve and promote in the best manner possible all our work.

2. That the Convention authorize a continuance of the work with our Negro and Indian brethren, and that the appropriations be made as generous as the income of the Convention will permit.

3. That the work at Oteen, Samarcand, and at the two sanatoriums be continued; and with reference to the work at Oteen that we request the other states, from which veterans come to the hospital, to continue their coöperation in the support of Wayne Williams as our missionary there.

4. That the Convention authorize the Board to undertake as soon as possible "A ministry to the prisoners."

5. That the Board be authorized to continue to work on the plan which will place in the field the best available man whose duty it will be to solicit large contributions in the form of gifts, wills, Living Trusts, and insurance policies, for our several institutions and agencies; and that all the institutions and agencies of the Convention be asked to coöperate, in so far as it is possible, with respect (1) to providing the salary and expenses, (2) to selecting the man, and (3) to furnishing him with full information as to needs and prospects.

6. That, in the event the Convention adopts a plan providing for the retirement of ministers, whereby the ministers on their part and the churches on their part work together for the creation of a fund for this purpose, the General Board be instructed to make such changes in the division of the Coöperative Program and/or the State Mission Fund as will provide an amount in addition to that paid in by pastors and churches so as to take care of the older men, now retired or on the point of retiring, in so far as this may be possible.

7. That we set as our aim for the year 1939 the sum of \$575,000 for the Coöperative Program objects, designated and undesignated; and that we set a goal of \$150,000 for the Orphanage; that we call upon all the churches and all their organizations to coöperate fully in seeking to attain this desired goal. Further, that we attempt as a part of our coöperative efforts to secure 10,000 members for the Hundred Thousand Club, including the approximately 2,500 we now have; and that the receipts of this club be divided 50 per cent for the debts of the State Convention and 50 per cent for the debts of the Southern Baptist Convention.

8. The committee of the General Board, to which was referred for consideration the matter of a plan for old age annuities for the benefit of aged ministers and all time church workers, respectfully report that it has had

this matter under consideration and given it the best study it could since the matter was referred to it. It is not now able to recommend the adoption of the plan proposed by the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention unless the same be modified in certain particulars which the committee has had under consideration with the Relief and Annuity Board, but concerning which no agreement has thus far been reached.

The committee would, therefore, suggest that the General Board recommend that the Convention take action whereby it will commit itself as favoring the adoption of a suitable plan for annuities for aged ministers and full time church workers, and that it give full authority to the General Board to act in behalf of the Convention in negotiating for and acceptance of a plan which the General Board may find to be satisfactory and acceptable, together with full authority to the General Board to take such action concerning the matter as it may deem proper if and when such a plan is available, and that endeavor be made to put such plan in operation by July 1, 1939.*

133. REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

MRS. J. CLYDE TURNER, *President*

We, the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Union, again record with gratitude the blessings of God upon our work of the past year.

With no spectacular increase the work has gone steadily forward. It has been our aim to strengthen the work along all lines of endeavor. Special emphasis has been placed on the Coöperative Program as a basis of our work and we are glad to report an increase of seven thousand dollars through this channel. Gifts to State Missions also exceeded those of 1936. We failed to reach the high goal set for the Hundred Thousand Club but more than doubled the gifts of the previous year for this cause.

We fell a little below the aim for the Lottie Moon Christmas offering, due probably to the emergency offering of the Foreign Mission Board which came in November, but we went beyond our goal for the Annie Armstrong offering for Home Missions. Detailed financial report is in our 1937 W.M.U. Minutes. We rejoice to report that in total gifts we went \$10,000.00 beyond our goal and \$17,590.00 beyond total gifts for 1936.

In comparison with other states North Carolina Woman's Missionary Union continues to hold third place in gifts and also in total membership. We are gratified to report an increase in organizations, total January 1 being 3,084. We have 225 full graded Unions, 31 of which were A-1 throughout the year.

North Carolina ranked first among the states in the number of organizations observing the season of prayer for State Missions, and we long for the day when she will lead in other phases of the work also.

Stewardship of money has ever been emphasized and one of the aims has been that every resident woman a member of the church shall contribute to missions. For the first time we report fifteen churches where this has been accomplished.

Through the Personal Service department soul winning is especially emphasized and we hope that all organizations will enter prayerfully into the revival plans of Southern Baptists for 1939.

We have continued our support of the Margaret Fund for the education of missionaries' children but in the future this will be cared for through the Lottie Moon offering and the Annie W. Armstrong offering so no special offering will be made for this cause.

Another department of the work especially dependent on the Woman's Missionary Union is our W.M.U. Training School in Louisville. We continue to grant six scholarships to this school and also contribute to running expenses.

When we met last year our beloved Secretary, Mrs. Harris, was taking an enforced rest because of ill health, but she has returned much improved physically and is directing our work with her usual ability.

Splendid reports come from the young people's work, directed by Miss Mary Currin. We would especially commend to you the group meetings planned for each grade of organization, Girls' Auxiliary House Party and Royal Ambassador Camp at Meredith College, Young Woman's Auxiliary Camp at Ridgecrest. Definite results are reported both in increased interest in missions and in the deepening of spiritual life.

North Carolina is taking an active and enthusiastic part in the Jubilee being observed in 1938 by our Southern Union. Mrs. J. S. Farmer is Jubilee Chairman for North Carolina and under her earnest leadership we look for a steady advance in kingdom service.

To our pastors, for their sympathy and help, we give our grateful thanks and pledge our loyal coöperation in the great kingdom program.

We have audited the books and records of the Convention for the twelve months ended December 31, 1938, and in the following tabulations we show the Revenue and Expense of the General Fund, together with all Cash Receipts and Disbursements for the other funds.

Exhibit "A" shows the Revenue and Expense of the General Fund, together with the distribution of the Revenue after paying expenses chargeable to the undesignated revenue.

Exhibits "B" to "G," inclusive, show the cash transactions of all other funds for the year, and Exhibit "H" is a summary of the net Debt of the Convention on December 31, 1938.

All Cash Receipts were found to have been promptly deposited in the bank and Disbursements were found supported by cancelled checks, invoices, etc., and expenses were properly classified. Our examination did not disclose any evidence of irregularities and we believe the funds have been carefully and honestly handled and properly accounted for.

Just below is a summary, not audited, but prepared from the reports of the various institutions, showing the total of all income for Convention objects for the calendar year 1938.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY

L. L. MORGAN, *Statistical Secretary*

All figures in the statistical tables are given for the associational year and not for the calendar year. Associations began meeting July 28 and continued through November 3. There are seventy white associations with two Indian Associations as Associate members of the Convention.

Comparing figures for 1938 with those of 1937 we find that there is an increase in almost every item. Our gain in gifts to all objects during the years is \$220,862.43. The recent session of the State Convention held in the Tabernacle Church in Raleigh was perhaps the best and most largely attended of any session in the history of the Convention. It was encouraging to note the fine spirit of interest manifested in every phase of our work. More than one thousand delegates registered and hundreds of visitors attended. Even at the closing session there was not room to seat all who were present.

BAPTISMS

During the year we received 26,787 members by baptisms. This is a gain of 6,334 over 1937. The number of churches reporting no baptisms was reduced from 632 to 519 this year. Thirty-four Indian Churches reported 369 baptisms. A gain of 212 over 1937.

CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

There are now 2,491 churches with a membership of 489,272. Last year we reported 2,468 churches with a membership of 471,534. This represents a gain of 23 churches and 17,728 members. There are 34 Indian Churches with a membership of 3,133.

GIFTS

Gifts to all missions, education and benevolences amount to \$675,601.46, which is a gain of \$36,333.51. For all local work such as debts, buildings, fuel, lights, pastoral support and other operating expenses the sum given was \$2,802,842.42. This sum represents a gain over last year of \$184,528.92. The total for all gifts to all causes is \$3,478,443.88. The total gain in contributions to all causes is \$220,862.43.

COOPERATING CHURCHES

The number of cooperating churches contributing to denominational objects is 2,218. This is a loss of 50 churches compared with last year. Two hundred forty-eight churches so far as our information is concerned failed to give something to one or more of the causes fostered by the Convention. We feel sure, however, that some of these churches gave something that was not reported.

PER CAPITA GIFTS

The per capita gift to denominational objects for 1937 was \$1.36. For 1938, \$1.38.

The per capita gift to local objects for 1937 was \$5.55. For 1938, \$5.71.

The per capita gift to all objects, local and outside, for 1937 was \$6.91. For 1938, \$7.11.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

There are 2,491 churches, of which 2,453 have Sunday schools. Added to that we have 19 Mission Sunday Schools, making a total of 2,472 schools with a membership of 412,111. So far as the churches are concerned we have:

Last year we reported a loss of 16 schools and 5,931 members. We feel sure now that our loss in membership came as a result of the church clerks failing to count officers and teachers. Dr. Alldredge had more time to secure information and his report gives us a substantial gain. We are perhaps reporting the greatest gain this year of any state in the South with an increase of 51 schools and a gain of 26,846 in membership. There are thirty-four Indian Schools with a membership of 2,947.

TRAINING UNION

Of the 2,491 churches, 1,215 are reported as having some form of Training Union work, as compared with 1,119 in 1937. Of these churches, 867 have a director, compared with the 1937 figure of 747. During the Convention year there was a net gain of 402 units in the churches with training work. Seven of the 34 Indian churches have some form of Training Union activity. The total number of units reported now organized, including the Story Hours, is 3,550—a gain of about 33 per cent in the last three years.

BAPTIST BOOK STORE

The Baptist Book Store is located at Baptist Headquarters, first floor, Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh. Mrs. Roger P. Marshall is manager.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Woman's Missionary Union statistical report runs from January 1 to December 31, and 1938 reports cannot be compiled before this Annual of North Carolina State Convention goes to press so the figures below are for 1937.

In 1937 there were 3,084 organizations of Woman's Missionary Union reporting. The roll is revised each year and when no report is sent during the year the organization is dropped from the roll until it does report. The membership in these organizations totalled 63,644. Organized work was done in sixty-three associations; sixty-one holding an annual meeting separate from general association. Eleven hundred and four organizations made one of the three grades on the Standard of Excellence and 550 made all ten points, being A-1. Two thousand sixty-three Mission Study classes were held, with 12,245 seals awarded. The 1937 Heck Memorial Offering was \$4,492.90.

Total contributions for the year was \$235,890.88.

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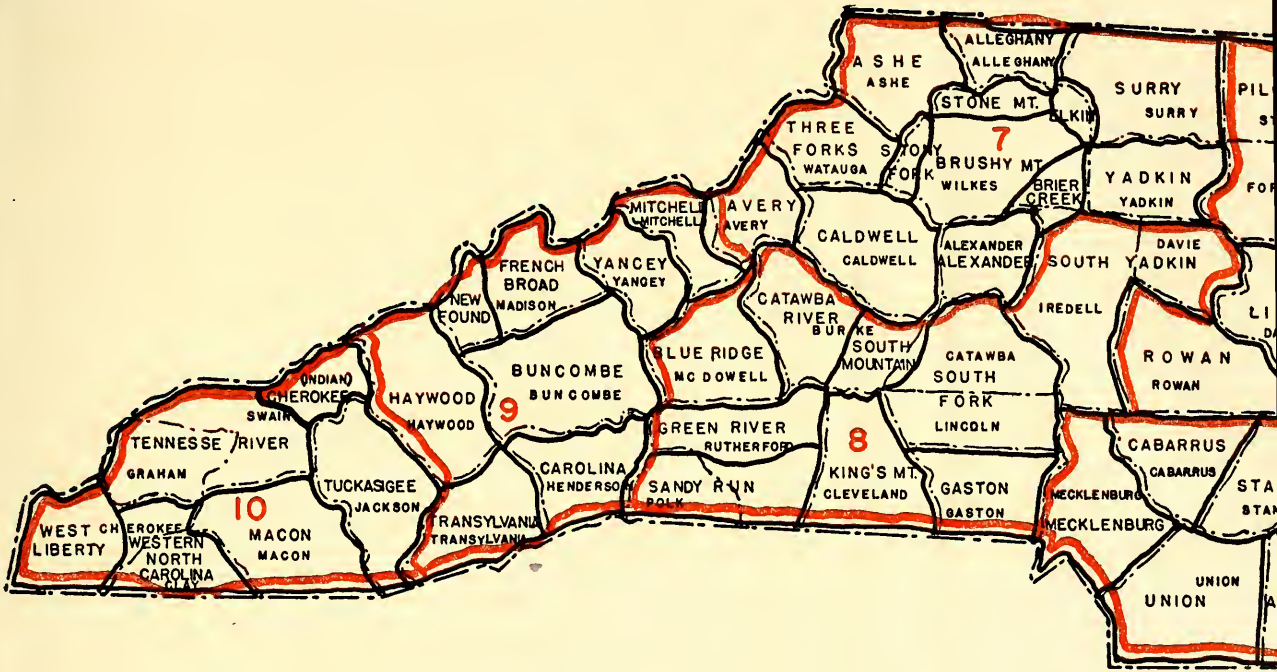
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
