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#### **Committee on Memorials**

The Memorials Committee is charged with the responsibility of preparing and presenting a report to the State Convention memorializing selected ministers and lay people who have died since the adjournment of the previous meeting of the Baptist State Convention. In addition, the printed annual minutes are dedicated each year to these individual ministers and lay people.

Each year the Memorials Committee works diligently to seek the names of people who should be included in our report. Most of those names come from Directors of Missions in the associations. It is our desire to never "overlook" any individual minister or lay person. Space limitations alone preclude us from

including a much longer list of worthy individuals.

We have included this year five ministers and three lay people. Five of the eight individuals were graduates of Wake Forest College — one of them an honored professor there — Jasper Memory — and another a former chairman of the college's board of trustees — North Carolina Chief Justice Joseph Branch. One of those honored — Miriam Robinson — was a former Baptist Building staff member, director of the state WMU.

Two of the five ministers being memorialized were related to associations — Charles Stevens, director of the New South River Association for 28 years — and Yates Campbell, director of Christian Social Ministers for the Gaston Association.

One minister, Claud Bowen, former pastor of First Church, Greensboro, was also a former president of this state convention. Max Linnens served as pastor of the Boiling Springs Church at the campus of Gardner-Webb College for more than a quarter of a century. Woodrow Robbins was pastor of the Lexington Avenue Church in High Point for 34 years.

All of these individuals — ministers and lay people alike — served their denomination well. But even more important, they served their Lord — providing ministry to literally thousands of people across our land.

#### **Claud Ballard Bowen**

Claud Ballard Bowen was born in 1908 in Winona, Miss. and made a public profession of faith at age 11. He graduated from Merrick High School and Southwestern College in Memphis, Tenn. and Southern Seminary in Louisville, Ky. with a Th.M. and a Ph.D.

In May of 1936, he married Frances Louise Leavell of Oxford, Miss. Two sons and a daughter were born to the Bowens during the early years of their ministry.

He served as the educational secretary at the Foreign Mission Board in Richmond, Va. He was pastor of the Hillsboro Baptist Church, Versailles, Ky., for two and one-half years; First Baptist Church, Opelika, Ala., for two and one-half years; Calvary

Baptist Church, Jackson, Miss., for eight years; and First Baptist Church in Greensboro, N.C. for 25 years.

Dr. Bowen was chairman of the committee to locate a new seminary in North Carolina and was chairman of the sub-committee of Wake Forest College to study the proposition of selling the campus. He was also head of the joint committee to approve the sale of the campus to the Southern Baptist Convention and a member of the first Board of Trustees of Southeastern Seminary. He was later president of the Southeastern trustees for nine years.

Dr. Bowen served as president of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina for two terms, and was a member of the North American Baptist Fellowship. He served as chaplain of the Fire Department in Greensboro for 20 years, a trustee of Moses Cone Memorial Hospital for 20 years, member of the "Youth of the Month" selection committee for 17 years, and member of the Rotary Club. He served as a trustee of Wake Forest University, North Carolina Baptist Hospital, Campbell University, and Mars Hill College.

Five emphases were Claud Bowen's foundation for church growth: children's and young people's work, men's work, Christian recreation, missions and evangelism. In reflecting upon his call to be the pastor of the First Baptist Church in Greensboro, Dr. Bowen said, "It had been my prayer that I could be a builder in the church of my Lord Jesus Christ. Upon this rock I will build my church and the gates of Hades shall not prevail against it. The Rock is: Thou are the Christ, the Son of the Living God."

Claud Ballard Bowen will always be remembered for his love for people and his desire to see them won to Christ.

Joseph Branch

On February 18, 1991, death claimed one of North Carolina's best known Baptists and one of the state's truly great leaders, Retired Chief Justice Joseph Branch of Raleigh.

Justice Branch was a native of Enfield, N.C., and lived and practiced law there until he was appointed to the North Carolina Supreme Court in 1966. While living in Enfield he served four terms in the North Carolina House of Representatives and thereafter served as Legislative Counsel to governors Luther Hodges and Dan K. Moore.

He served with distinction on our state's highest court for 20 years, the last seven years as Chief Justice. The basic

qualities which made him successful in other areas — honesty, integrity, patience, humility and friendliness — contributed mightily to making him one

of North Carolina's greatest jurists.

During the years he lived in Enfield he was a faithful member of the Enfield Baptist Church, serving that church as deacon and Sunday School teacher. Upon moving to Raleigh he became a member of Hayes Barton Baptist church and served it as deacon, trustee and Sunday School teacher.

Justice Branch loved the Baptist denomination. He attended and was graduated from Wake Forest College and its law school. He served Wake Forest as trustee for several terms, twice as chairman of the board, and at the time of his death he was a life trustee of the institution. He was awarded the honorary degree Doctor of Laws by his alma mater as well as by Campbell University and Elon College.

He is survived by his wife, the former Frances Kitchin of Scotland Neck, N.C., a daughter, Jane Branch McRee, a son, James C. Branch, and six grand-children, all of Raleigh; a sister, Mrs. Virginia B. Pope, and a brother, Harry Branch, both of Enfield.

**Yates Woodrow Campbell** 

Yates W. Campbell was born in Catawba County, N.C., on April 11, 1918.

He died April 6, 1991.

Shortly before his death from leukemia, he said: "I know I'm going to heaven. It doesn't bother me to face death, it will be a joyous occasion, a homecoming for me." He moved to Gastonia in 1937 as overseer at a textile mill and instructor at the N.C. Vocational Textile School. He was a student of Gardner-Webb College, Limestone College, Wake Forest University and Southeastern Seminary. Following graduation he served a number of churches in North Carolina.

His call to ministry began in an airplane over Tokyo during World War II. A tail

gunner on a B-29, he made this commitment to the Lord: "I'll give You my best

if You'll just get me home."

In 1972 he was appointed as missionary associate by the Home Mission Board Christian Social Ministries Department and Baptist State Convention, working as director of Christian Social Ministries for Gaston Baptist Association, (counselor to families in crises and resettlement of refugees). He retired May 28, 1983.

He served as chaplain for nine seasons with Gastonia's baseball team, started a ministry with Vietnamese, conducted Vacation Bible Schools for handicapped, led music therapy sessions for the psychiatric unit at Gaston Memorial Hospital, pioneered volunteer mission work in many states and served as chaplain, Boy Scout Camp and New Mexico Boy Scout Jamboree.

Rev. Campbell was a servant of the down and out and a minister to ministers. He lived a faith so simple it was profound. He is survived by his wife, Mary, and three sons.

#### T. Max Linnens

To know Dr. Linnens was to know he was going on a pilgrimage. Of the fine things to be recorded here, no better beginning or summation can be given than to say that he was an authentic Christian disciple.

The call to the ministry, the "mustness" as he described it, came in young adulthood. If God could use this ex-Marine, trucker, and high school dropout, he was willing. His wife, Anne, (whose death came two months after his) joined hands with him as he began what ultimately would be a distinguished academic career at Gardner-Webb and Wake Forest colleges. Pastorates in Chapel Hill and St. Pauls, N.C. followed his graduation from

Southeastern Seminary.

Then for a quarter of a century until his retirement, he was pastor of the Boiling Springs Baptist Church, marking that community by his strong yet gentle Christian character.

Dr. Gilmer Blackburn, Gardner-Webb professor, wrote of his pastor, "He had the temperament and the convictions of a man of powerful spiritual awareness."

We Baptists love to sing the hymn "Higher Ground" but sometimes have trouble staying up there. Dr. Linnens knew no other turf. His love for people was neither artificial nor shallow. He made a real effort to reach out to every person who came his way.

Like the Lord he served, "Preacher Linnens" had great compassion "for the least of these." He just never would hush about what more the Boiling Springs Church could do with its immense resources (talents, time, and money) to minister to human suffering.

A man of balance, he wisely made time for his own family. He found great joy in being out of doors — hunting quail, raising dogs, walking the beach.

And he wrote poetry. In *Legacy For My Children* he told us, "Waste no time with plastic people...Observe the man who has rare mastery, cobbling shoes, building barns, teaching philosophy, walk with one whose face reflects an inner peace...Early learn to love yourself and keep your heart in awe before the God who is all love..."

The legacy T. Max Linnens left is one of learning, growing, living, loving, and serving. This is why we appreciated him and loved him.

**Jasper Livingston Memory** 

"Be strong and of a good courage: be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed: for the Lord Thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest." Joshua 1:9.

These words appeared in large, uneven letters made by magic marker on Jasper Memory's nursing home room wall where he spent his last years almost blind and deaf. This quotation, his favorite, was there for his benefit. But these holy words and this man served as inspiration and hope for all who knew him.

What a great North Carolinian and what a great Baptist! His North Carolina roots were deep, and his Baptist heritage profound. His father, from Columbus County, and his mother, a McNeil and

sister to the poet John Charles NcNeil from Scotland County, were staunch Baptists. His sisters attended Meredith College. One of them, Lelia Memory McMillan, taught at Campbell College and was a missionary to China for many years. He, his father, his son, and a brother attended Wake Forest College.

His close knit family included many whose names are revered among North Carolina Baptists: Livingston Johnson, Fannie Memory Johnson, Foy Johnson Farmer, Wingate Johnson, Lois Johnson, Leila Memory McMillan, Mary Lynch Johnson, and others. His beloved wife was Margaret Durham, daughter of Dr. Charles H. Durham, long-time minister of the First Baptist Church in Lumberton.

His credentials, though, are not dependent upon others. His crown of glory is starred with six decades of devotion to the men and women of Wake Forest University. He was graduated from Wake Forest and returned in the 1920's after graduate study at Columbia University and employment with the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction. He continued to serve Wake Forest through the 20's, the 30's, the 40's the 50's the 60's and the 70's. He served Wake Forest presidents from Poteat through Scales. When President Francis P. Gaines took the presidency of Washington and Lee University, "Fessor" Memory declined an attractive offer to accompany him. Jasper Memory's commitment to Wake Forest was far stronger than the lure of worldly attractions.

His services to the school included Glee Club Director, Alumni Secretary, Director of the News Bureau, Director of Placement Services, Dean of summer Sessions, Tennis Coach, Professor of Education and general booster of all Wake Forest causes. He was many things to many people. He was all things to Wake Forest, not the least being that of fund raiser during the depression, enabling the school to remain open. He was truly a man for all seasons with talents in many fields. How many, many people have attended Wake Forest functions to be thrilled by his booming voice leading with enthusiasm, "Oh Here's to Wake Forest"! Similarly, how many have been touched and moved as he would lead the group in singing "Dear Old Wake Forest"?

He was a positive-thinking, active Christian who recognized that his call to

service was in nurturing Wake Forest in the spirit of its great motto: "Pro Humanitate." He walked among the mighty, but his dedication was to the lowly. It was his joy to help the lonely, discouraged students who were homesick and far from home. He never tired of tutoring and coaching the student who couldn't grasp an equation or parse a sentence. To the almost destitute student who could see no way of staying in school, help always seemed to materialize from Professor Memory. There are scores of former students throughout this State and Nation now ministers, physicians, school administrators and teachers, lawyers, judges, senators, congressmen and solid citizens who benefited from this man's caring. It is doubtless true that many of them could not have accomplished what they have been able to accomplish in life without having had the boost along the way from Professor Memory.

He was a happy warrior in God's Glorious Host, a tireless laborer in the

Christian Vineyard of service to mankind.

He died in the spring of 1991. His son is Dr. Jasper Durham Memory, vice-president for research and services of the University of North Carolina. His granddaughter, Margaret, teaches mathematics at the University of Alabama. His grandson, William, is a graduate student at Columbia University.

We are mandated "to do justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with God." Jasper Livingston Memory did this for 90 years. How much richer North

Carolina is for his having lived among us!

#### **Woodrow Robbins**

This able pastor, preacher, teacher, soul winner, and student of God's Word was known as a man of deep Christian convictions, a person of wisdom and wit with a spirit of enthusiam, encouragement, and enjoyment. Woodrow had a real zeal for the Lord and the Lord's work in so many areas of church and community life.

Woodrow was born in rural Brunswick County, North Carolina, where he was reared, but where he would later serve as pastor of several part-time Baptist churches (1940–1947). In World War II he served through the Conservation Corps in Stokes County. After the Lord called him to preach, he pursued his education at Columbia Bible College/Seminary in

Columbia, South Carolina, and Wake Forest College. On February 6, 1943, he and his "dear Theo" were married, and from the union was born their daughter, Robbie Ann. While serving those part-time pastorates in Brunswick County, Woodrow was called as pastor of Lexington Avenue Baptist Church, High Point. He remained at Lexington Avenue for 34 years providing loving, energetic leadership. Upon retirement in 1981, he served several churches as a interim pastor. At the time of his death, February 2, 1991, Woodrow was pastor of the Colonial Baptist Church, Trinity, North Carolina. He was laid to rest at Goshen Baptist Church, Leland, North Carolina, where he was ordained to preach in 1941.

Woodrow was a friend to missions at home and abroad. He led in the formation of the Central Baptist Association of High Point in 1958, and in the years to follow he would serve as moderator and on most associational committees. In the 1960's he took mission trips to Cuba and Guatamala to preach under the auspices of our Foreign Mission Board. For several years he served as a member of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina from the Central Baptist Association.

His deep convictions often surfaced in the community as he championed causes that would enhance righteousness and morality. His strong belief of the Bible as God's Word was his posture both in the pulpit and market place. He served with distinction as chaplain of the High Point Civitan Club from 1956–1981, and on three occasions as district chaplain. In the early '70's the High Point City Council appointed Woodrow Chaplain of the Fire Department where he was highly regarded and respected. As Assistant Chief Max Moffitt stated, "He attended funerals...visited fire fighters who were sick or injured...and led in Bible study on Sunday mornings. He was a fine man and a good friend."

Two of the highest compliments I ever heard were made of Woodrow Robbins:

"He made EVERYBODY feel important when he talked to them."
"Well, High Point will never be the same, but neither will Heaven!"

Miriam J. Robinson

Miriam Robinson came to North Carolina in the spring of 1955 to become executive secretary of Woman's Missionary Union, succeeding Ruth Provence, who had returned to South Carolina following nine years of effective leadership in North Carolina. Miriam was born in Marion, North Carolina, November 25, 1911, but her family moved to Florida when she was young. She spoke lovingly, gratefully of her mother, of attending missionary society meetings with her as a child, and of observing her sacrificial ways of saving money for the mission offerings.

She was graduated from Florida State University, and earned a masters degree from Teacher's College, Columbia Univer-

sity, New York, in Speech Education, and from Carver School of Missions and Social Work in Louisville, Kentucky, in Religious Education. Later she returned to teach worship and speech at Carver School. Her students admired and loved her, recognizing not only the warm and personal interest she had for them, but also the earnest striving for an always growing spiritual life that influenced all her relationships and work.

The leadership she gave North Carolina Woman's Missionary Union dealt with many organizational changes, but always these changes were the expression of a vision she had for missionary education for the whole church, for prayers offered faithfully for missionaries, and for the work of witnessing being done worldwide. Woman's Missionary Union leaders in local churches as well as in other areas of responsibility felt her encouragement to be and do their best, ever growing in Christ-likeness. She was the example for them.

It was her vision that led to WMU and Brotherhood cooperating in the beginning of World Missions Week at Caswell each summer — a family mission experience — and her dream that saw Camp Mundo Vista become a reality.

She said of her work in North Carolina: "My personal philosophy and goal was to give emphasis to the spiritual motivation which must prompt all Christian service."

Miriam died in Tallahassee, Florida, September 27, but she lives on in the memories and lives of those who know her devotion to her Lord Jesus.

#### Charles A. Stevens

Charles Stevens, until his untimely death in July, 1991, was a *friend* in the best sense of that word. While a pastor, he led churches to envision the Will of God for them and to pursue the resulting dreams with creativity and hilarity of spirit. Parishioners in all of those churches remember his helpful and compassionate pastoral care of them in times of joy and disappointment.

In 1963 the New South River Association of churches called him to be director of missions. For 28 years, until his retirement in April, 1991, this gifted and committed spirit shared his vision of Kingdom work, his passion for people and his love of his Lord in a memorable way. The accom-

plishments in creative and effective ministry will be judged as "unique" for a long time.

No pastor or lay person who ever shared his spirit will easily forget the obvious and courageous love that was offered. He genuinely and effectively loved people.

Just three months into his retirement, amidst dreams and plans for continued ministry with his beloved wife, Lucille, Charles was struck and killed by a motorist driving while impaired. In that terrifying and incredible instant this great and gentle spirit was silenced.

He is survived by his wife, Lucille of Fayetteville, daughters, Jennifer (Mrs. Dennis Myers) and Jocelyn, (Mrs. Dan Andrews) and son Charles Jr. and four grandchildren.

Our individual and collective pilgrimages through life are influenced by various and wonderfully memorable friends. The thought of these ever dying is incredulous, to say the least. We who yet mourn the passing of Charles Stevens are left to gather the rich and challenging legacy that he has left — one that enriches our lives and challenges us to trust God and dream magnanimously — for the blessing of our lives and to the blessing of all who share pilgrimage with us.

To Charles, we say, "Thank you. The memories of your life well-lived stab at the darkness of our grief like brilliant shafts of light and we are blessed. Until THEN..."

#### Constitution

#### **PRFAMBLE**

For the declaration of its fundamental purposes and the permanent guidance and control of its activities, this body does adopt the following as its Constitution, to wit:

#### Article I. Name

The name of this body is the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

#### **Article II. Purposes**

The purposes of this Convention shall be to assist the churches in their divinely appointed mission; to promote missions, evangelism, education, social services, the distribution of the Bible and sound religious literature; and to cooperate with the work of the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### **Article III. Authority**

While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, this Convention does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any other Baptist body, whether church, auxiliary organizations, association, or Convention.

#### **Article IV. Composition**

This Convention shall be composed of:

- A. Those messengers who have been duly elected by cooperating churches, have been duly registered by the Committee on Enrollment, and are in attendance at the annual session.
  - 1. The number of messengers to which a cooperating church is entitled may be determined on either a numerical or financial basis:
    - a. On a numerical basis: every cooperating church shall be allowed two (2) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, beyond the first one hundred (100) members.
    - b. On a financial basis: every cooperating church giving five percent (5%) of undesignated budget gifts through the Cooperative Program shall have two (2) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every two percent (2%) beyond the initial five percent (5%).
    - 2. Messengers shall be resident members of a cooperating church.
  - 3. A cooperating church shall be one that financially supports any program, institution, or agency of this Convention, and which is in friendly cooperation with this Convention and sympathetic with its purposes and work.
  - 4. No church shall be entitled under any circumstances to elect more than ten (10) messengers; and
- B. The officers of this Convention, the members of the General Board, the editor of the Biblical Recorder, the President of the Woman's Missionary Union, and the President of the North Carolina Baptist Men.

**Article V. Meetings** 

This Convention shall convene annually on Monday after the second Sunday in November no earlier than 6:30 PM and no later than 7:15 PM. In case of emergency or unusual circumstances, the General Board is empowered to change the time or place of meeting, cancel the sessions of the Convention, or call a special meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present when the vote is taken.

#### Article VI. Officers

The officers of this Convention shall be a President, a First Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, an Assistant Recording Secretary, an Executive Director-Treasurer, three Trustees, and Parliamentarian(s). The President shall appoint the Parliamentarian(s), who will serve at the pleasure of the President.

A. President, Vice-Presidents and Trustees

The terms of the President, the Vice-Presidents, and Trustees shall commence at the conclusion of the annual session at which they are elected and continue until the close of the next annual session of this Convention. The President and Vice-Presidents may not be elected for more than two (2) consecutive terms in the same office. A vacancy in the office of President shall be filled by the Vice-Presidents succeeding to the office in order of their rank. The President shall serve as an ex officio non-voting member on all Convention committees.

B. Recording Secretary and Assistant Recording Secretary
The terms of the Recording Secretary and the Assistant Recording
Secretary shall commence on the first day of May following the annual session at which they are elected and continue until the first day of May in the following year.

A vacancy in any of the above mentioned offices (in A and B), except that of President, occurring between sessions of this Convention may be filled by the General Board.

- C. Executive Director-Treasurer
- 1. In cases of a vacancy in the office of Executive Director-Treasurer, the General Board shall nominate a person to this Convention to fill this office.
- 2. Opportunity shall be given to receive additional nominations from the floor of the Convention.
- 3. The person receiving the majority of votes cast shall be declared elected. Upon election the Executive Director-Treasurer shall hold office for an indefinite period, with retirement to take effect based upon policies established by the Executive Committee and approved by the General Board.
- 4. In case the position of Executive Director-Treasurer becomes vacant between sessions of this Convention, the General Board, upon the recommendation of its Executive Committee, shall name an acting Executive Director-Treasurer to serve until the next regular session of this Convention.

The Executive Director-Treasurer is the chief executive officer of the General Board staff, the chief budget officer of the General Board staff, the chief professional adviser of the General Board and its committees, the Executive Director-Treasurer of the General Board and this Convention, and one of the denomination's spiritual leaders, providing statewide guidance and inspiration.

The Executive Director-Treasurer shall serve as an ex officio non-voting member on all committees and shall aid the committees by furnishing information, printed materials and needed guidance for their work.

#### Article VII. Trustees of the Convention

The General Board shall nominate three (3) trustees to be elected by this Convention in annual session. These trustees may succeed themselves, if nominated and elected, and will continue in office until their successors have been elected. The trustees shall hold title to the property of this Convention and convey and use the same as directed by this Convention, its General Board or Executive Committee. They shall execute obligations only in behalf of and as ordered by this Convention. They shall have the powers granted to trustees of religious societies by the laws of the State of North Carolina, but subject always to the limitations imposed by this Constitution and by action of this Convention, its General Board or Executive Committee. They shall require the treasurer of this Convention to give suitable bond, with corporate security and in adequate amount as determined by the General Board, and they shall cause such bonds to be safely kept. The trustees are authorized to remove the treasurer from office should he fail for a period of ten (10) days or longer to maintain such a bond. The trustees shall make full, detailed reports to the annual session of this Convention and at other times if requested by the General Board. They shall safely keep the seal of this Convention and affix it only as authorized by this Convention, its General Board or Executive Committee. The seal shall be circular in form and shall bear the words:

"Trustees of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina Incorporated 1893. SFAL."

The trustees shall keep full minutes of all their meetings and preserve the same in permanent form. They shall elect their own chairperson and secretary. Any vacancy occurring in their membership between sessions of this Convention shall be filled by the General Board.

#### **Article VIII. The General Board**

A. Membership

- 1. One (1) member shall be elected from the area of each District Association; one (1) additional member from each District Association with a resident membership of twenty-thousand (20,000) to forty-thousand (40,000); and a second (2nd) additional member from any District Association with a resident membership of more than forty-thousand (40,000); ten (10) members-at-large to be elected, one (1) from each region of the state, to be nominated by the Committee on Nominations; with a limit of one (1) member from any church and three (3) members from any association.
- 2. The President and First and Second Vice-Presidents of this Convention shall be ex officio voting members of the General Board and its Executive Committee. These members, selected by virtue of their Convention offices, shall not be used in determining the number of

members from a District Association or church.

3. The Executive Director-Treasurer and the Recording Secretary shall be ex officio non-voting members.

4. The state Woman's Missionary Union President and the North Carolina Baptist Men's President shall be ex officio voting members.

5. Members of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention, from the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, who are not then serving as elected members of the General Board shall be ex officio non-voting members of the General Board.

6. No one who is employed by this Convention, the General Board or any institution or agency of this Convention, whether the salary be total or supplemented, shall be eligible for membership on the General

Board except as an ex officio member.

7. In the event members move from association or region from which they were elected, their membership shall immediately terminate. The membership of those moving from the state shall be terminated upon the date of the move from the state.

In the event a member is absent for three (3) consecutive meetings of the General Board without giving advance notice of the absence to the Recording Secretary of the General Board, the membership shall immediately terminate.

8. Any vacancy on the General Board occurring between annual sessions of this Convention may be filled upon recommendation of the Committee on Nominations. Those elected shall serve through the remainder of the calendar year. This Convention shall at its next annual session fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

#### B. Election

1. The Committee on Nominations, as directed by the Bylaws of this Convention and in keeping with Baptist policies and practices, shall present to the annual session a slate of nominees for election, and after opportunity for further nominations from the floor is given, the members shall be elected by this Convention in session.

2. Board members shall be elected for a term of four (4) years with, as nearly as may be possible, one-fourth (1/4) of the membership being elected at each annual session, provided, however, that any such board member who shall have been elected to fill a vacancy of less than two (2) years, shall be eligible to be re-elected to a full term.

3. No person shall be eligible to succeed himself/herself on the General Board after serving a full term of four (4) years until one (1) full

term has elapsed.

#### C. Powers and Functions

Except as specifically limited by the Constitution, the General Board shall have the power to act for this Convention in the interim between sessions, and shall have general supervision of all agencies and institutions fostered and supported by this Convention.

D. Agency of the General Board

FRUITLAND BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE. The Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute is an agency of the General Board. The Institute exists to prepare persons for whom study in a college or seminary is not presently appropriate for the Christian ministries into which they are called. It further serves to encourage some to further training in college and/or seminary.

## Article IX. Institutions, Agencies and Councils of the Convention

- A. Institutions and Agencies
  - Educational Institutions
    - a. Campbell University
    - b. Chowan College
    - c. Gardner-Webb College
    - d. Mars Hill College
    - e. Meredith College
    - f. Wingate College
  - 2. Social Service Institutions
    - a. Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc.
    - b. North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc.
    - c. Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.
  - 3. Agencies
    - a. Biblical Recorder, Inc.
    - b. North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc.
- B. Trustees and Directors of the Convention's Institutions and Agencies The charter of every institution or agency owned or supported in whole or in part by this Convention shall contain the following provisions:
  - 1. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall elect the trustees and directors of the institutions and agencies listed above for terms of four (4) years. At the first election by this Convention, one-fourth (1/4) of the board of trustees or directors shall be elected to serve for one (1) year, one-fourth (1/4) for two (2) years, one-fourth (1/4) for three (3) years, and the remaining one-fourth (1/4) for four (4) years. At each subsequent regular annual session of this Convention, one-fourth (1/4) of the board of trustees or directors of the institutions and agencies listed above shall be elected by this Convention to succeed the retiring members of said board.
  - 2. The trustees and directors shall be responsible to this Convention for the operation of its institutions or agencies in accordance with Baptist principles; report of work done and undertaken shall be made annually to this Convention; any change in the charter of any institution or agency which would affect, alter or change the purpose of the institution or agency or the relationship of the institution or agency or its board of trustees to this Convention shall have the prior approval of this Convention. No program shall be inaugurated which might involve this Convention directly or indirectly in a debt, without securing the prior approval of this Convention.
  - 3. The members of the board of trustees or directors of the institutions and agencies listed above shall be residents of the State of North Carolina and members of churches cooperating with this Convention.
  - 4. If for any reason a member of a board shall cease to be a member of a church cooperating with this Convention or shall remove residence from the State, membership on any board shall be thereby terminated. Any vacancy on a board may be filled by recommendation of the Committee on Nominations to the General Board until the next regular annual session of this Convention, and this Convention shall at its next regular annual session fill the vacancy for the unexpired term. The board

of trustees or directors of the institutions and agencies listed above by affirmative vote of three-fourths (3/4) of the entire membership given in regular annual meeting or in a special meeting called for the purpose, shall have the power to remove from office any trustee or director of such institutions and agencies listed above for cause considered sufficient by such board, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee or director, and opportunity to be heard by the Board. This Convention shall have the right to remove any trustee or director for cause considered sufficient by this Convention, but only after reasonable notice to such trustee or director, and opportunity for the trustee to be heard by this Convention. Notice of such contemplated action and hearing by this Convention may be given by the Executive Committee of the General Board of the Convention

- 5. The trustees or directors of the institutions and agencies of this Convention shall be elected by this Convention after receiving nominations from this Convention's Committee on Nominations or from the floor. The trustees and directors of all institutions or agencies owned and supported by this Convention shall make an annual report to the above committee of all vacancies to be filled.
- 6. The members of the boards of trustees and directors of the institutions and agencies of this Convention shall be distributed as widely as practicable. The term of office of a trustee who has not resigned, died, become disqualified, or been removed shall not expire until a successor shall have been duly elected and qualified.

No individual shall serve on the board of an institution or agency of this Convention who at the same time is holding membership on the board of any other institution, agency, or on the General Board. No individual who is employed by this Convention, the General Board or any institution or agency of this Convention, whether the salary be total or supplemented, shall serve on the General Board or the board of trustees or directors of any institution or agency.

C. Agencies

1. Biblical Recorder, Inc.

The *Biblical Recorder* is the journal of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. According to its charter, the publication is "to maintain and safeguard the inalienable rights and privileges of a free press, these rights and privileges being consistent with the traditional Baptist emphasis upon the freedom, under Christ, of both the human spirit and Baptist churches." The *Biblical Recorder* shall be operated by sixteen (16) directors who shall serve four (4) year terms. One-fourth (1/4) of the directors shall be elected annually by this Convention.

2. North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc.

The Baptist Foundation shall be operated by twenty (20) directors who shall serve for four (4) year terms. One-fourth (1/4) of the directors shall be elected annually by this Convention. The purposes of the Foundation shall be to receive, hold, and administer donations of money and property which charitable-minded persons may leave to it from time-to-time.

- D. Councils of the Convention
  - Council on Christian Higher Education
     The Council will work with the Executive Director of the Council

to provide an effective program for the six (6) Baptist colleges, without in any way hindering the trustee operation of any one of them.

- a. The Council shall be composed of the members of the General Board comprising the Christian Higher Education Committee, together with the president, dean, and chairperson of the trustees of each of the colleges and universities receiving funds from this Convention, and as ex officio voting members: the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist State Convention, the President of the Baptist State Convention, the President of the President of the Woman's Missionary Union, the President of North Carolina Baptist Men, and the Executive Director of the Council on Christian Higher Education. The President, Dean and chairperson of the Trustees of Wake Forest University will have associate, nonvoting membership on the Council. The chairperson of the General Board Committee on Christian Higher Education shall be president of the Council. The duties and powers of the Council shall be fixed by the Bylaws of this Convention.
- b. Representatives on the Council from the colleges will not have voting power in the allocations of funds. No member of the Council who occupies a salaried position with this Convention, its institutions, or its auxiliaries shall have a vote on appropriations that may be made to the institutions; and all appropriations agreed upon shall be subject to the approval of the General Board.
- 2. Council on Christian Social Services

The Council will work with the Executive Director of the Council to provide a well-integrated program for Children's Homes, Retirement Homes, and the Hospital, without in any way hindering the trustee operation of any one of them.

- a. The Council shall be composed of the members of the General Board comprising the Christian Social Services Committee, together with the President of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc.; the President of the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.; the President of North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc.; the Director of the School of Pastoral Care; the President or Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of each institution; and as ex officio voting members: the Executive Director-Treasurer of this Convention; the President of the General Board; the President of Woman's Missionary Union; the President of North Carolina Baptist Men and the Executive Director of the Council on Christian Social Services. The chairperson of the General Board Committee on Christian Social Services shall be President of the Council. The duties and powers of the Council shall be fixed by the Bylaws of this Convention.
- b. Representatives on the Council from the institutions will not have voting power in the allocation of funds. No member of the Council who occupies a salaried position with this Convention, its institutions, or its auxiliaries shall have a vote on appropriations that may be made to the institutions; and all appropriations agreed upon shall be subject to the approval of the General Board.
- 3. Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs (20 regular members, 7 ex officio members)

- a. Eight (8) members from the General Board. Chairperson of this committee shall be one (1) of the eight (8) members of the General Board, a member of the Executive Committee of the General Board, and President of the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs.
- b. Twelve (12) additional members elected from over the state on a four (4) year rotating basis to be nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by this Convention.

Four (4) of the twelve (12) are to be from the staff and faculty of Southeastern Seminary, North Carolina Baptist Social Service Institutions, and North Carolina Baptist Colleges and Universities. The other eight (8) are also to have an interest in and understanding of the field of practical Christian living.

c. There are to be seven (7) ex officio members. They are: President of the General Board, Executive Director-Treasurer, Executive Director of the Council, Editors of the Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children, and two (2) college students elected by the

state student convention for a two (2) year term.

d. Representatives on the Council from the institutions will not have voting power in the allocation of funds. No member of the Council who occupies a salaried position with this Convention, its institutions, or its auxiliaries shall have a vote on appropriations that may be made to the institutions; and all appropriations agreed upon shall be subject to the approval of the General Board.

e. The Council shall have an Executive Committee with authority to carry on the work of the Council between regular sessions. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Executive Director of the Council, the President of the Council, and three

(3) members-at-large elected by the Council.

#### **Article X. Concerning Debts**

All borrowing by this Convention for its own use, or for its institutions or agencies, or borrowing by any institution or agency of this Convention, the payment of which would require an extension of time beyond the close of the subsequent fiscal year, shall be authorized only on the following terms and conditions:

- A. The General Board shall have authority to borrow money in anticipation of current revenue, provided that any unpaid balance of such borrowing at the end of the current fiscal year shall be provided for in and made a part of the budget for the subsequent fiscal year.
- B. Neither this Convention, nor any institution or agency, owned or supported in whole or in part by this Convention, shall accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any gift, grant, or aid from the Federal or State governments or any governmental agency, except for definite and full services rendered by the institution or agency and by and with the approval of this Convention or its General Board.
- C. No institution or agency of this Convention shall encumber its property or change its status with respect to this Convention without authority from this Convention. Institutions and agencies of this Convention, subject to the approval of the General Board, shall have authority to borrow money in

anticipation of current revenue, provided that any unpaid balance of such borrowing at the end of the current fiscal year shall be provided for in and

made a part of the budget for the subsequent current year.

D. Any and all resolutions which propose the borrowing of money shall set forth all pertinent facts and a definite schedule for repayment. Such requests shall be sent to the Executive Committee or General Board by October 1 of each year for recommendation to this Convention. These recommendations shall be included in the General Board's report and subject to the rules concerning the adoption of this report.

E. Notice of any and all contemplated borrowing shall appear in the Biblical Recorder in three (3) separate issues in advance of the meeting of this

Convention during which it is proposed that action be taken.

#### Article XI. Fiscal Year

This Convention's fiscal year shall close on the Friday after the last Sunday of the year.

# Article XII. Adoption or Termination of Activities; Establishment or Termination or Severance of Institutions, Agencies or Councils

A. Adoption or Termination of Activities

Proposals concerning a new work or activity not already being carried on by this Convention or termination of any current work or activity shall be presented to the trustees, directors, or members of the appropriate agency, council, or committee for action or recommendation as may be necessary. If the new work shall not be undertaken for lack of funds, lack of authority, or for any other reason, or if the current activity shall not be terminated as requested, the proponent may present the same to this Convention at its regular meeting as set forth hereinafter in Paragraph C.

B. Establishment or Termination or Severance of an Institution, Agency

or Council

Proposals concerning the establishment of a new Institution, Agency, or Council, or the termination or severance of any Institution, Agency or Council shall be presented to this Convention in annual session. If this Convention, by majority vote, agrees that the proposal should be further considered, the procedures of Paragraph C below shall be favored.

C. Proposal Referred to General Board

Upon presentation of a proposal of Paragraph A above, or upon the vote of this Convention to further consider a proposal under Paragraph B above, this Convention's president shall refer the proposal to the General Board for a detailed study. No final action on any such proposal shall be taken at the Convention at which such proposal is first made.

#### **Article XIII. Auxiliaries**

The Woman's Missionary Union of North Carolina and the North Carolina Baptist Men are recognized as auxiliaries of this Convention.

#### Article XIV. Relationship with Wake Forest University

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and Wake Forest University shall have a fraternal, voluntary relationship under which Wake Forest University is autonomous in governance. In order to facilitate that relationship, the University will have associate, non-voting membership on the Council on Christian Higher Education, and will be represented by the same officers as schools which are members of the Council. The Board of Trustees of Wake Forest University shall be elected by that Board in accordance with such procedures as that Board may prescribe. Wake Forest University shall not share in the distribution of Cooperative Program Funds.

#### **Article XV. Amendments**

This Constitution may be changed or amended on the Tuesday of any annual session of this Convention by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the registered messengers present and voting when the vote is taken, provided that notice of any and all amendments to the Constitution shall appear in the *Biblical Recorder* in two (2) separate issues in advance of the meeting of this Convention in which the proposed action is to be taken.

#### Article XVI. Validate

The adoption of this new Constitution shall not invalidate any action validly taken by or in behalf of this Convention or any of its institutions or agencies prior to the date this new Constitution becomes effective.

### **Bylaws**

The work of this Convention shall be governed by the following bylaws:

#### I. Duties of Officers of this Convention

A. The President

The president shall preside over the deliberations of this Convention and discharge such other duties as are imposed upon the president by this Convention or as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body. The president and vice-presidents shall serve as a nominating committee of three (3), chaired by the president, to recommend a Committee on Enrollment and a Committee on Committees to the General Board for their election at its January meeting. The president may appoint other committees when so directed by the body. The president and vice-presidents shall serve as ex officio voting members of all Convention committees, the General Board, and its Executive Committee.

#### B. The Vice-Presidents

1. In the event of the death or incapacity of the president to serve, the vice-presidents shall succeed the president in the order of their rank; and so succeeding shall have and discharge the duties incumbent upon the president.

2. The vice-presidents shall serve on a nominating committee, chaired by the president, to recommend a Committee on Enrollment and a Committee on Committees to the General Board for their election at its January meeting and shall serve as ex officio voting members of all

Convention committees, the General Board and its Executive Committee.

C. The Recording Secretary

The Recording Secretary shall record and preserve the proceedings of this Convention and shall prepare the copy for printing. The Assistant Recording Secretary will assist the Recording Secretary during a Convention year. In case of resignation or death of the Recording Secretary, the Assistant Recording Secretary will succeed to the office of Recording Secretary.

- D. The Executive Director-Treasurer
- 1. The Executive Director-Treasurer of this Convention shall promote the whole program of this Convention, including Missions, Evangelism, Higher Education, and Social Services and may serve as adviser to all the institutions, agencies, and committees of this Convention. The Executive Director-Treasurer shall work under the direction of and be subject to the authority of the General Board and shall have administrative supervision of such work as shall be assigned by this Convention and/or its General Board.
- 2. In carrying out the responsibilities of each and all these functions, the Executive Director-Treasurer shall:

a. Coordinate and evaluate General Board programs with the help of the General Board and its Executive Committee;

b. Advise and otherwise assist the General Board, this Convention and their committees and subcommittees, including the provision of direct staff help in planning meetings, preparing agenda, presenting analyses, facts, and recommendations;

c. Plan, coordinate, and supervise the entire budgetary process (formulation, authorization, and administration) under the direction of the Executive Committee and where appropriate, this Convention;

- d. Assume responsibility for the administration, coordination, and direction of General Board staff, including the recommendations of all divisions and department heads, organization of professional staff, development of professional staff position descriptions, and preparation of personnel policies;
- e. Encourage staff members to make their fullest contribution to the work of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina;
- f. Work on a cooperating basis with the heads of all Boards and Agencies of this Convention;
- g. Promote participation in and support for all North Carolina Baptist and Southern Baptist Convention programs and represent the General Board, as appropriate, to the denomination and the public.
- 3. As Treasurer, the Executive Director-Treasurer shall receive all funds sent for the objectives of the Conventions, and make acknowledgements of the same in the manner as the General Board may determine for the faithful performance of these duties. The Executive Director-Treasurer shall sign all checks which shall be countersigned by the Business Manager. However, in the event that either is unable to perform this duty because of disability or other cause, the Executive Committee shall designate someone to sign checks on behalf of either officer, each of whom shall be bonded in such amount as shall be determined by the General Board. The Executive Director-Treasurer shall forward at least once a month all contributions to their destinations and shall make an annual report of all receipts and disbursements which shall

be published in the minutes of this Convention, and upon retiring from or leaving office, shall deliver to the successor all money, papers, books, and other property belonging thereto.

4. The Executive Director-Treasurer shall supervise the work of the

General Board staff.

E. The Parliamentarian(s)

The Parliamentarian(s) shall advise and assist the Presiding Officer of this Convention with respect to all matters involving proper parliamentary procedure. The Rules of Order for this Convention shall be those laid down in Robert's "Rules of Order," but in cases where the meaning may not be clear the President shall exercise discretion, subject to appeal to this Convention.

# II. Convention Committees

A. Categories

- 1. Committees nominated by this Convention's president and vice-presidents:
  - a. Committee on Enrollment
  - b. Committee on Committees
- 2. Committees nominated by the Committee on Committees, which shall also nominate the chairperson of said Committees:
  - a. Committee on Resolutions
  - b. Committee on Nominations
  - c. Committee on Convention Program, Place and Preacher
  - d. Committee on Local Arrangements
  - e. Committee on Memorials
  - f. Historical Committee
  - g. Committee on Trustee Orientation
  - h. Committee on Cooperation with General Baptists
  - Special Committees

B. Membership

1. Membership on Convention committees shall not bar one from serving as a member of the General Board, or as a director of any agency of this Convention, or as a trustee of any institution of this Convention.

2. The terms of office of all standing Convention committees shall begin at the adjournment of the Convention at which they are elected and shall terminate upon the adjournment of the Convention at which their successors are elected, unless otherwise designated.

3. No person shall be eligible to succeed himself/herself on the Committee on which he/she is serving, or any other standing committee, except as hereinafter provided, until one full term has elapsed, provided

he/she has served a full term.

C. Vacancies

Vacancies occurring in committees between sessions of this Convention shall be filled by the General Board upon the recommendation of the President and Vice-Presidents, and the General Board shall report its action for Convention approval at the next annual meeting of this Convention. When the Chairman of a standing committee resigns or moves out of the state between sessions of this Convention, the vacancy shall be filled through nomination by the current Committee on Committees and elected at the next regular meeting of the General Board's Executive Committee.

#### D. Reports

- 1. All Committees shall report either by oral report or written report at the next annual session of this Convention.
- 2. Nothing contained in reports to this Convention shall be construed as an action of this Convention except the recommendations which are definitely listed and adopted by this Convention.
- E. Duties and Membership of Convention Committees:
- 1. THE COMMITTEE ON ENROLLMENT shall consist of nine (9) members, three (3) of whom shall have served the previous year. Its duties shall be to provide for the registration of messengers and visitors prior to and during the Convention. This Committee shall make a report to the assembled messengers upon the call of the President and shall serve as a committee on credentials.
- 2. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES shall consist of fifteen (15) members. Its duties shall be to nominate for election by this Convention the committees listed below, and such other committees as may be assigned to it. This Committee shall also nominate the chairman of all such committees.

It is desirable that at least twenty-five percent (25%) of members nominated to all committees of this Convention shall come from churches with a resident membership under four hundred (400). No one shall be nominated to serve on more than one (1) committee at the same time. It is desirable that no church shall have more than six (6) members serving at one (1) time on committees. Any addition beyond six (6) must be individually justified by the Committee on Committees to this Convention.

The Committee on Committees shall include in its report as a minimum the name, church, hometown, association, occupation, and sex of each nominee, the name of the committee on which the nominee is to serve together with such summary information as will make clear to this Convention the diversity and breadth of representation provided by the slates of nominees.

The above committees shall upon election by the General Board begin their work no later than March 1.

3. THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS shall consist of fifteen (15) members, ten (10) of whom shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by this Convention to serve two (2) year terms, five (5) of whom will rotate off each year.

The five (5) remaining members shall be nominated by the chairperson of the Executive Committee from the General Board, with at least two (2) of the five (5) from the Executive Committee, and elected by the Executive Committee for one (1) year terms, after its organizational meeting in January.

The Committee on Resolutions shall be responsible:

- a. For reviewing all properly submitted resolutions;
- b. For presenting to this Convention for its consideration all appropriate resolutions;
- c. For recommending appropriate committees or groups or the formation of special committees to study special concerns arising out of resolutions that go beyond the scope of the Committee on Resolutions.

All resolutions to be presented to this Convention shall be submitted to the Committee on Resolutions in writing at least thirty (30) days prior to the Convention, and shall be published in the Biblical Recorder prior to the Convention. Exceptions may be made in the case of emergency resolutions dealing with developments such as national disasters or public tragedies. Also, by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the messengers present and voting at the Convention the rules may be suspended and a resolution taken up for immediate consideration.

4. THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS shall consist of fifteen (15) members, serving three (3) year terms, five (5) of whom shall rotate off each year. No individual who is employed by this Convention, the General Board, or any institution or agency of this Convention, whether the salary be total or supplemented, shall serve on this committee.

This committee shall nominate persons to serve on the boards of trustees and directors of all agencies, institutions, the General Board, and the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

It is desirable that the Committee shall nominate at least twenty-five percent (25%) of the members to the various boards, institutions and agencies from churches with resident membership under four hundred (400). No person shall be nominated to serve on more than one (1) board at the same time. They shall also nominate members for vacancies for the twelve (12) members-at-large of the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs and such other nominations as may be delegated to the Committee by this Convention. It is desirable that no church shall have more than six (6) members serving at one time on Convention boards. Any addition beyond six (6) must be individually justified by the Committee on Nominations to this Convention.

- a. The Committee shall begin to function upon election. It shall meet as often as needed to prepare recommendations for vacancies and shall begin not later than July 1 to prepare recommendations for the annual meeting of this Convention.
- This Committee shall invite through letter the institutional and agency heads, churches and associational leadership to submit recommendations for vacancies for their respective institutions, agencies or General Board occurring annually or between annual sessions of this Convention. The Committee shall invite individuals through the Biblical Recorder to submit recommendations. All recommendations shall be accompanied by biographical material, including general assessments by personal and church references. Recommendations and supporting material shall be submitted early enough for the Committee on Nominations to acknowledge and carefully evaluate each recommendation and make an informed decision based upon character, churchmanship, and special skills required by the particular institution. All such materials shall be kept by the chairperson of the Committee on Nominations during the period of active work up to and until the time of the Convention, and all such materials received from churches and individuals shall be shared upon receipt with the particular institution involved. After this Convention has taken action on nominations, the chairperson will

forward all biographical materials to the new chairperson of the Committee on Nominations.

c. When the Committee meets to do its work, it shall give careful consideration to those who have been recommended from the various sources indicated above and to the fact that the trustees of each institution or agency are close to that institution or agency, have expert knowledge of its needs and possibilities, possess a deep interest and concern for the institution or agency, and know the men and women who can best serve the institution or agency.

The Committee on Nominations shall:

(1) Consult with the representatives of the Board of Trustees of Convention institutions and agencies for the purpose of determining the specific trustee skills needed.

(2) Consult as needed with persons making recommendations with respect to their recommendations for membership on the General Board and the Boards of Trustees of institutions and

agencies.

- (3) Share with the institutions, agencies and associations its proposed nominations prior to notification of these nominees. This is for the purpose of further consultation if further consultation is deemed necessary by either the Committee or the Boards of Trustees or associations.
- (4) Then it shall be free to follow its own best judgment in making nominations to this Convention or the General Board. The Committee should strive to select and nominate the best representatives of our Convention from the vast resources available to the Baptists of North Carolina.

Special emphasis should be given to:

(1) Stability of effective leadership, thus assuring the continuous work of Baptists;

(2) Demonstrated active churchmanship, thus assuring

effective Baptist State Convention representation;

(3) A cross-section of membership, thus assuring representation of churches of various sizes and types, a variety of professional and educational backgrounds, geographical areas, different age groups, and both lay persons and ministers. It is desirable to avoid the concentration of leadership in too few places.

d. Consent of the nominee to serve shall be secured by the Committee prior to the recommendations to this Convention or the

General Board.

e. The full report of the Committee shall be published in the *Biblical Recorder* at least four (4) weeks prior to the annual meeting of this Convention. The report shall include as a minimum the name, church, hometown, association, occupation, and sex of each nominee, the name of the institution or agency on whose board the nominee is to serve, together with such summary information as will make clear to this Convention the diversity and breadth of representation provided by the slates of nominees.

The name of any person to be nominated from the floor of the Convention and the name of the nominee intended to be displaced shall be published in the *Biblical Recorder* at least one (1) week prior to this Convention's annual session. In addition, biographical material relating to any person proposed to be nominated from the floor of this Convention shall be given to the institution or agency involved and to the Committee on Nominations at least one (1) week prior to such session.

5. The COMMITTEE ON CONVENTION PROGRAM, PLACE AND PREACHER shall consist of twelve (12) members serving three (3) year terms, four (4) of whom shall rotate off each year. This committee shall be

responsible:

a. for recommending the preacher for the next annual session of this Convention;

b. for recommending to this Convention a place of meeting, when necessary;

c. for the program of the current year and preliminary plans (speakers and theme) for the next annual session; and

d. for all other matters in connection with the annual session

not provided for in the Constitution and Bylaws.

- THE COMMITTEE ON LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS shall consist of nine (9) members, serving one (1) year terms, who are residents of the area where the convention will be held. This committee shall be responsible:
  - for supervising all arrangements with the local auditorium including furniture and needed equipment;
  - b. for working with Convention staff, Program Committee, and the Committee on Enrollment of this Convention in arranging for display booths, sound system and other arrangements necessary for the sessions of the Convention:
  - c. for the Teller Committee (subcommittee of Local Arrangements). The chairperson of the Committee on Local Arrangements shall appoint three (3) members of the Committee on Local Arrangements to serve as the Teller Committee. This subcommittee will receive and count all ballots on votes taken during the Convention. The Teller Committee chairman will report results on all votes to the Convention president or presiding officer.

7. THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS shall consist of six (6) members, serving three (3) year terms, two (2) of whom shall rotate off

each year. The Committee shall be responsible:

for preparing a report memorializing ministers and lay leaders who have died since the adjournment of the previous annual session of the Baptist State Convention; and

b. for recommending names of those to whom the Annual of

this Convention is to be dedicated.

8. THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE shall consist of twelve (12) members, serving four (4) year terms, three (3) of whom shall rotate off each year. This committee shall be responsible:

for recommending appropriate measures for the preservation

of Baptist history;

b. for seeking to preserve the minutes and records of all Baptist bodies, churches, associations, and conventions; historical manuscripts; printed materials, including correspondence; and museum objects;

c. for encouraging the writing and publication of high-standard histories of individuals, churches, associations, and conventions;

d. for recommending which historic sites, including buildings, should be properly marked and preserved when these are related to

Baptist history;

- e. for working in close collaboration with the historical researcher employed jointly by the Baptist State Convention and Wake Forest University, who works directly with the Baptist Collection in the Wake Forest University Library;
- f. for cooperating with the Historical Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention; and

for reporting annually to the Baptist State Convention.

- 9. THE COMMITTEE ON TRUSTEE ORIENTATION shall consist of nine (9) members, serving three (3) year terms, three (3) of whom shall rotate off each year. The Committee shall be responsible:
  - a. for planning and promoting an annual orientation program for trustees and directors of Convention institutions and agencies;
  - b. for preparing a brief manual of instruction for use by trustees and directors of Convention institutions and agencies; and

c. for revising this manual as occasion requires.

- 10. THE COMMITTEE ON COOPERATION WITH GENERAL BAPTISTS shall consist of six (6) members, serving three (3) year terms, two (2) of whom shall rotate off each year. The Executive Director-Treasurer, the President of this Convention, a college student, and the Director of the Department of Cooperation with General Baptists shall serve as ex officio voting members. These members shall form a Joint Committee with a comparable group from the General Baptist Convention. This Joint Committee shall be responsible:
  - a. for studying and recommending periodically to their respective groups areas of cooperative work and activities and projects that will strengthen our common fellowship as well as advance the work of our Lord.
  - b. for serving in an advisory capacity to the Department of Cooperation with General Baptists.

. Special Convention Committees:

When a resolution goes beyond the scope of review of the Committee on Resolutions, the Committee on Resolutions shall study the situation to see if there is a committee or group already in existence which could appropriately attend to the matter proposed; and, if there is such a group, it shall, upon recommendation of the Committee on Resolutions and vote of this Convention, be referred to them. Otherwise, the Committee on Resolutions may recommend that a special committee be set up by this Convention.

# III. Eligibility for Membership on the General Board, on Boards of Trustees and Directors of Institutions and Agencies of this Convention

Members of the General Board and Trustees and Directors of any institution or agency of this Convention shall be members of churches cooperating with this Convention. The term of office shall begin on January 1, following the meeting of this Convention at which members were elected; and shall end on December 31 following the Convention at which their successors were elected, unless sooner terminated.

In no case shall a member of any board serve a continuous term of more than four (4) years, provided, however, that any such board member who shall have been elected to fill a vacancy of less than two (2) years, shall be eligible to be re-elected to a full term. No individual who is employed by the General Board, an institution or agency of this Convention, whether the salary be total or supplemented, shall serve on the General Board or Board of Trustees or Directors of any other institution or agency.

A member of a board of any institution or agency of this Convention having completed a full term of office shall not be eligible for re-election to membership on the same board until the elapse of one (1) year, but shall be eligible for immediate election to membership on the board of any other institution or agency of this Convention.

A member of the General Board having completed a full term of office shall not be eligible for election to the General Board until the elapse of one (1) term, but shall be eligible for immediate election to membership on the board of any other institution or agency of this Convention.

# IV. The General Board

- A. Powers and Duties of the General Board
  - 1. The General Board shall:
  - a. have charge and control of all work of this Convention in the interim between sessions of this Convention, except those activities committed specifically by charter to the Boards of Trustees of its institutions and agencies;
  - b. have the power to act for this Convention in the interim between sessions of this Convention; and any action taken during the interim shall be binding on this Convention and reported fully to this Convention at its next session;
  - c. make and approve all appropriations at its January meeting, and thereby implement the budget as adopted by this Convention;
  - d. take no action to contravene any action of this Convention nor to launch any new institutions; however, it may provide for the expansion of any phase of work which its income and resources may make possible. It shall have the responsibility of bringing to this Convention for its consideration recommendations concerning any phase or work that is being done or that should be undertaken in order that this Convention may have an overall picture of the total program of North Carolina Missionary Baptists. Upon any proposal being referred to the General Board under Article XII, paragraph C of the Constitution, the General Board shall structure a study that shall provide full information to this Convention, prior to its next regular session, including:
    - (1) an analysis of the need for the activity, Institution, Agency or Council;
      - (2) alternate approaches available to this Convention;
      - (3) a feasibility study, showing costs, both immediate and

long-range; and

(4) availability or lack of resources.

- 2. The General Board shall make a report to this Convention of its activities during the year. The Board shall have its report printed and ready for distribution at the first session of this Convention, including reports from Education Institutions, Hospitals, Children's Homes, Retirement Homes, Baptist Foundation, *Biblical Recorder*, Council on Christian Higher Education, Council on Christian Social Services, Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs and all other institutions and agencies of this Convention.
- 3. Allocation of Funds. The General Board shall recommend to this Convention the budget allocations of Cooperative Program undesignated gifts for each objective of this Convention, and the amount or percentage of Cooperative Program funds to be allocated to Southern Baptist Convention causes.

4. Audit. The General Board shall employ a certified public accountant each year to make a complete audit of the books and accounts of the treasurer and controller, and it shall employ or cause to be employed a certified public accountant or accountants, to make annual audits of all institutions and agencies of this Convention.

A copy of the annual audit of the General Board and of each institution or agency receiving funds from this Convention shall be presented to the Executive Director-Treasurer of this Convention; the audit of the General Board and a summary of the other audits shall be presented to the Recording Secretary not later than thirty (30) days after the close of the fiscal year for inclusion in the *Annual* of this Convention and, at the discretion of the General Board, in the *Biblical Recorder*.

The Executive Committee of the General Board and the Executive Director-Treasurer shall have the authority to provide the forms which will indicate what items should appear in said summary.

- 5. The General Board shall elect a Committee on Enrollment and a Committee on Committees at its January General Board meeting.

  B. The Organization of the General Board
- 1. MEETINGS. The General Board shall meet three (3) times a year. The first and third meetings shall be in January and September on Tuesday and Wednesday following the fourth Sunday. The mid-year meeting shall be on Tuesday and Wednesday following the third Sunday of May, or a more convenient time recommended by the Executive Director-Treasurer and General Board president and voted on by the Executive Committee in the March meeting. In cases of emergency a meeting may be called by the Executive Director-Treasurer and the President of the Board or by request from a majority of the General Board members.
- 2. OFFICERS. At the January meeting of the Board the following officers shall be elected and they shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified: a President, a Vice-President, and a Recording Secretary.
- 3. DIVISIONS OF GENERAL BOARD. At the January meeting all of the work of the General Board and Convention shall be organized and promoted under the following divisions:
  - a. Executive Committee

- (1) Woman's Missionary Union
- (2) North Carolina Baptist Men
- b. Business Management
  - (1) Baptist Assembly
  - (2) Building Operations
  - (3) Caraway
  - (4) Data Services
- c. Missions
  - (1) Associational Development
  - (2) Chaplaincy and Language Missions
  - (3) Church Extension
  - (4) Cooperative Ministries and Seminary Extension
  - (5) Special Ministries
- d. Evangelism
  - (1) Personal Evangelism
  - (2) Evangelism Development
- e. Church Programs
  - (1) Church Building Planning
  - (2) Discipleship Training
  - (3) Church Music
  - (4) Sunday School
- f. Christian Higher Education
  - (1) Administration and Finance
  - (2) Correlation and Instruction
  - (3) Christian Emphasis and Church-School Relations
- g. Christian Social Services
  - (1) North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc.
  - (2) Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.
  - (3) Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc.
- h. Christian Life and Public Affairs
  - (1) Executive Committee
  - (2) Other Committees as needed
- i. Youth and Campus Ministries
  - (1) Commuter Student Ministries and Career Development
  - (2) Specialized Student/Church Ministries
  - (3) Student Ministries
  - (4) Youth Ministry
- j. Stewardship
- k. Communications
- Special General Board Committee Services Rendered
- 4. COMMITTEES OF THE GENERAL BOARD. The General Board shall organize the following committees to assist in the planning and implementing of the work of this Convention as charged to the General Board.

The Executive Director-Treasurer and the Executive Committee shall name a Committee on Committees to nominate members of these committees and will present recommendations in the January meeting of the General Board.

These committees will meet for organizational purposes at the January meeting of the General Board, at which time they shall elect

their own chairperson, and at other times as specified or as called by the committee chairperson, the Executive Director-Treasurer or the division director.

General Board President and Executive Director-Treasurer shall serve as ex officio voting members of all committees.

- a. Executive Committee
  - (1) The Executive Committee shall:
  - (a) receive and thereafter recommend to the General Board all requests for change of status by a North Carolina Baptist college or university after first referring such requests to the Council on Christian Higher Education for study and report as the Council deems appropriate;
  - (b) initiate and recommend matters concerning business management, budget and finance, and also fix the compensation of all employees and salaried officers of this Convention, between annual sessions;
  - (c) receive and act on all recommendations concerning the employment, supervision and retirement of personnel. Retirement for personnel will be based upon policies established by the Executive Committee and approved by the General Board;
  - (d) once a year, not later than April, invite heads of all institutions and agencies of this Convention and of the General Board Divisions to present written evaluations of their needs and requests for the next fiscal year to the Budget Committee; and
  - (e) prepare a budget to be presented at the pre-convention session of the General Board.

To facilitate this duty of the Executive Committee, the Business Manager and Controller of the General Board shall make regular financial reports to the Committee, and along with the Business Management Committee recommend bookkeeping and accounting policies to the Committee.

No new position shall be created on the General Board staff until this Executive Committee has received a comprehensive economic impact study for that position and has decided that it is economically feasible.

- (2) This Committee shall serve in a dual capacity as the General Board ad interim deciding on routine and emergency matters between sessions of the General Board, and as a survey and policy committee, reviewing, correlating and recommending policies and programs to the General Board.
- (3) The Executive Committee shall consist of twenty (20) members serving one (1) year terms, and shall be composed of the president of the General Board, the vice-president of the General Board, the president of this Convention, the first vice-president of this Convention, the second vice-president of this Convention, the state WMU president, the president of North Carolina Baptist Men, the chairpersons of the Councils on Christian Higher Education, Social Services Institutions, Christian

Life and Public Affairs, the chairperson of the Business Management Committee, the six-program (6) advisory committee chairpersons, and three (3) members-at-large from the General Board.

The President of the General Board shall serve as Chairperson of the Executive Committee and ex officio voting member of its subcommittees.

The Executive Committee as constituted the year previous shall remain intact until the January meeting of the General Board at which the Executive Committee will be reconstituted.

(4) Constitution and Bylaws Committee (subcommittee of the Executive Committee)

Constitution and Bylaws Committee shall consist of three (3) members of the Executive Committee, appointed by the chairperson of the Executive Committee who shall also appoint the chairperson. The Committee shall be responsible for study ing the Constitution and Bylaws and making recommendations for amendment as needed.

(5) Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held at least once per quarter or at such other times as may be called by the Executive Director-Treasurer or the President of the General Board, or both.

(6) Budget Committee

(a) The Budget Committee shall consist of nine (9) members, appointed by the chairperson of the Executive Committee, who shall also appoint the chairperson, serving one (1) year terms and shall be constituted as follows:

[1] Three (3) persons from the Executive Commit-

tee, one of whom shall serve as chairperson;

[2] Three (3) persons, not members of the Executive

Committee, from the General Board;

[3] Three (3) persons who have expertise in budget, finance, and Baptist life from this Convention at-large. No one who is employed by this convention, the General Board or any institution or agency of this Convention, whether the salary be total or supplemented, shall be eligible for membership on the budget committee except as an ex officio non-voting member.

(b) The Budget Committee shall:

[1] study, formulate, and recommend the budget for the support of all programs funded by the General Board;

[2] present its proposal to the Executive Committee for approval, then to the September meeting of the General Board and with the approval of the General Board, present the budget to this Convention in annual session.

b. The Business Management Committee

(1) The Business Management Committee shall consist of (15) fifteen members, seven (7) of whom shall be at-large members elected by the General Board for four (4) year terms and eight (8) of whom shall be members of the General Board.

The members will serve on a rotating basis, and will include people with expertise in law, accounting, finance, insurance, management, and the ministry. The Director of the Business Management Division shall serve as an ex officio non voting member.

The Committee will meet within six (6) weeks following the election in January each year in order to organize the committee, and at other times as called by the chairperson, the Executive Director-Treasurer or director of the Business Management Division.

Any member who misses two (2) consecutive meetings without acceptable reason shall be automatically replaced.

(2) The Business Management Committee shall:

- (a) counsel the director of the Business Management Division in procedures of:
  - {1} Bookkeeping and accounting;
  - {2} Financial reporting;
  - {3} Annual audit;
  - {4} Convention equipment maintenance and replacement;
    - {5} Purchasing procedure by staff;
  - (6) Insurance coverage on Convention's Property; and
- (b) assist the director of the Business Management Division in his duty to execute the financial instructions of the General Board regarding the appropriation of all funds received by this Convention.
- (c) shall seek annual proposals from insurance consultants and/or brokers, to secure adequate insurance coverage for the property of this Convention. This will include the use of emergency funds to assure the first twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) liability on a property or casualty loss incurred (this insurance deductible may be increased as the emergency fund increases).
- (d) shall make such recommendations to the Executive Committee and the General Board as shall be necessary.
- (3) Subcommittees

The chairperson of the Business Management Committee appoints all subcommittees and their chairpersons and shall serve as an ex officio voting member.

- (a) The Emergency Fund Committee:
- {1} shall report, following the audit, to the Business Management Committee for its recommendation of transfer of no less than ten percent (10%) and not more than seventy-five percent (75%) of the income received in excess of expenditures during the previous year;

{2} shall continue approved appropriations until the fund reaches ten percent (10%) of the Cooperative Program budget;

(3) Guidelines for use of these funds are:

(aa) to assist any institution or agency where a

real emergency exists. (An emergency which threatens the continuation or will seriously hamper the work of the institution or agency; funds are not available from any source either internal or external; the need is long-range.);

(bb) to cover any unfunded programs due to shortfall in Cooperative Program funds where the need is urgent and cannot be met within other

budget adjustments;

{cc} to fund any new programs that are deemed to be of primary importance by the Executive Committee, the General Board and Executive Director-Treasurer; and

{dd} to finance the purchase of a fleet of cars for eligible staff members with the provision that a plan be established whereby the Reserve Fund will be reimbursed on a regular basis, following approval of the Executive Committee, the General Board and the Executive Director-Treasurer.

Interest on advances or loans should not be required in every instance, but may be charged on the type of loan involved.

(b) Assemblies Committee

{1}The Assemblies Committee shall consist of five (5) members of the Business Management Committee serving one (1) year terms. The Committee will meet quarterly and as needed when called by the chairperson or the division director.

{2}The Assemblies Committee shall:

{aa} work with the Business Management Division in the administrative functions of the North Carolina Baptist Assembly at Caswell and Caraway Conference Center and Camp;

(bb) work with the director of the Business Management Division and the assembly managers in formulating annual program-budget proposals;

{cc} maintain through-the-year supervision of budget administration including the formulating of needed financial adjustments for the Business Management Committee's consideration;

(dd) study property improvement proposals and formulate evaluation proposals for the Business Management Committee; and

(ee) receive and study quarterly programbudget progress reports.

Program Advisory Committees

The Program Advisory Committees shall consist of General Board members and shall meet at least three (3) times each year in connection with the General Board meetings and as called by the chairperson of the committees or division directors. In addition, the committees will work with the directors of the division in the

formulating of program-budget proposals.

- (1) Committee on Missions shall:
- (a) have a minimum of ten (10) members elected by the General Board;
- (b) work with the director and staff in promoting the total program of mission ministries and mission activities in North Carolina and with the Director in formulating program-budget proposals.

(2) Committee on Evangelism shall:

- (a) have a minimum of ten (10) members elected by the General Board;
  - (b) work with the director and staff in promoting the total program of evangelism among Baptists in North Carolina.

(3) Committee on Church Programs shall:

- (a) have a minimum of ten (10) members elected by the General Board;
- (b) work with the director and staff in providing the churches with trained educational leadership for the total church membership. Such programs will involve cooperation with the Sunday School Board and other boards and agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (4) Committee on Stewardship shall:
- (a) have a minimum of ten (10) members elected by the General Board;
- (b) work with the director and staff in promoting the total program of individual and church stewardship and the support of missions through the Cooperative Program.

(5) Committee on Communications shall:

- (a) have a minimum of ten (10) members elected by the General Board;
- (b) work with the director and staff in planning and promoting communication ministries and services of news releases, publications, and art services.

(6) Youth and Campus Ministries shall:

- (a) have a minimum of ten (10) members elected by the General Board;
- (b) work with the director and staff of this division in special youth ministries related to the churches, the campuses, and youth careers.

d. Special General Board Committee

The Services Rendered Committee shall:

- (1) consist of twelve (12) members, to be nominated by the General Board Committee on Committees, serving four-year (4) terms on a rotating basis, with substantial representation from the General Board and its Executive Committee;
- (2) study and make recommendations to the General Board concerning requests received from institutions and agencies with regard to the use of public funds in accordance with Article X. B. of the Constitution of the Baptist State Convention; and in considering such requests to give continuing study to the implementation of the constitutional provisions and guidelines in regard to

"services rendered" on an equitable basis for all institutions and

agencies of this Convention;

(3) adopt its own guidelines for carrying out its duties and review the same from time-to-time in the light of changing circumstances in the area of public funding on the state and federal levels and in accordance with the decisions of the United States Supreme Court as such may affect the work of the Committee;

(4) make reports to the Executive Committee and General

Board as its work may require;

(5) meet as necessary upon notice by the chairperson and after requests are received from the institutions and agencies requiring review by the committee.

Agency of the General Board

FRUITLAND BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE. The Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute shall be responsible to the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina as an agency of that board.

a. BOARD OF DIRECTORS. The operations of the school shall be the responsibility of a Board of Directors, who are elected by the

General Board.

(1) MEMBERSHIP ON THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

The Board of Directors shall consist of twelve (12) members, each serving a four-year (4) term. One-third (1/3) of the members shall be elected each year at the January meeting of the General Board, and those rotating off the Board shall serve until their successors are elected at the January meeting. The President of the General Board, during its September meeting, shall appoint three (3) members of the Executive Committee to serve as a nominating committee for the purpose of suggesting nominees for the Board of Directors to the General Board.

One-third (1/3) of the membership shall be chosen from the alumni of the Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute who may or may not be presently serving as members of the General Board.

One-third (1/3) of the members shall be chosen from

those presently serving on the General Board.

One-third (1/3) of the members shall be chosen at large from among members of cooperating North Carolina Baptist churches not presently serving on the General Board.

If for any reason a member of the Board of Directors shall cease to be a member of a church cooperating with this Convention, or shall remove residence from the state, membership on the Board will be thereby terminated. A member whose General Board membership is terminated due to a relocation within the state may continue his/her membership on the Board of Directors until that term expires. Vacancies on the Board shall be filled by nominations from the General Board's Nominating Committee, or the Executive Committee between sessions of the General Board.

No person shall serve on the Board of Directors for more than two (2) consecutive terms, and may not be reelected to the Board until one full term has elapsed. No person shall serve on the Board of Directors who at the same time is employed, either partially or fully, by Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute or by any institution or agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

(2) RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

The Board of Directors shall be responsible to the General Board and ultimately to this Convention for the operation of Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute, and for all administrative and policy decisions of the Institute in the regular and proper performance of the task of the Institute.

The Board shall report annually to the September meeting of the General Board, and a synopsis of this report shall be given to the annual session of this Convention.

The Board shall be responsible for submitting an annual budget to the Budget Committee to be included with the budget of the General Board for approval by this Convention in annual session.

The Board has the responsibility for administering the budget. The Board shall have the responsibility for all personnel matters of the Institute except the selection or dismissal of the President of the Institute.

The Board of Directors shall be responsible to the General Board for the fiscal operation of the Board, and shall make periodic financial reports to the General Board, including independent annual audits.

All properties shall remain in the trusteeship of this Convention, and no debt shall be incurred without the approval of the General Board.

The Board of Directors shall be free to secure endowment for Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute in accordance with policies of this Convention and its institutions and agencies.

- b. PRESIDENT OF THE INSTITUTE. A President of the Institute shall manage the affairs of the Institute under the direction of the Board of Directors. For the employment or dismissal of a President of the Institute, the Board of Directors shall recommend action to the General Board. The President shall have the responsibility for recommending all other personnel matters to the Board of Directors.
- c. CHANGE OF STATUS. Any change of status regarding the purpose of Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute shall require approval by this Convention in annual session, upon recommendation of the General Board.
- d. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS. All other considerations regarding Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute not specified in these Bylaws shall be in accordance with the 1986 Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute Study Committee Report and shall be in harmony with the expressed intent of that document.

# V. The Council on Christian Higher Education

- A. The duties of the Council shall be as follows:
  - to devise ways and means for the proper correlation of the work

and programs in the several educational institutions supported by this Convention;

- to study the needs of the institutions and their ability to meet these needs, and upon the basis of its findings shall recommend to the General Board allocations to the institutions of such funds as may be made available by this Convention or the General Board for Christian Higher Education;
- 3. to examine the budget requests made by each institution and present them to the Executive Director-Treasurer;
- 4. to formulate and promote plans for increasing interest and support for these institutions and to make reports in detail to the General Board concerning all its work and findings;
- 5. to study all requests of the Executive Committee with regard to a change of status by a North Carolina Baptist college or university and to make such report to the Executive Committee as the Council deems appropriate.

B. Executive Director

- 1. The Council on Christian Higher Education in cooperation with the Executive Director-Treasurer of this Convention shall nominate and the Executive Committee shall elect an Executive Director.
- 2. Duties and responsibilities of the Executive Director of the Council are as follows:
- a. The Executive Director shall be responsible to the Council on Christian Higher Education, to the Executive Director-Treasurer, and to the General Board and shall work in cooperation with all divisions and departments in an effort to secure full support for this Convention's program of higher education.
- b. The Executive Director shall, in cooperation with the business manager and controller of the General Board, work toward promoting a uniform method of bookkeeping for all institutions of higher education in an effort to understand and interpret all their budget needs.
- c. The Executive Director shall work towards correlating the programs of the several educational institutions and securing their cooperation and shall formulate plans for promoting an interest in and support of Christian Higher Education.

C. Meetings

The Council shall meet at the call of the President at least three (3) times during the Convention year; it may meet in special session at the call of the President and Executive Director, or any five (5) members.

# VI. The Council on Christian Social Services

A. Duties

The duties of the Council shall be:

- 1. to consider problems common to all of the social service institutions, and keep the needs of these institutions before the General Board and the Baptist people of North Carolina;
- 2. to examine the budget requests made by each of the social service institutions and present them with recommendations to the Executive Director-Treasurer.
- B. Executive Director

1. The Council on Christian Social Services in cooperation with the Executive Director-Treasurer of this Convention shall nominate, and the Executive Committee shall elect, an Executive Director. The Executive Director-Treasurer will serve as acting Executive Director of the Council until the position is filled or when a vacancy may occur.

2. Duties and responsibilities of the Executive Director of the

Council:

The Executive Director shall be responsible to the Council on Christian Social Services, to the Executive Director-Treasurer, and to the General Board, and shall cooperate with all the Divisions and Departments in order to create a better understanding of all the problems involved in providing for the needs of these social service institutions. C. Meetings

The Council shall meet at the call of the President at least once during the Convention year. It may meet in special session at the call of the

President and Executive Director, or any five (5) members.

# VII. Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs

A. Description of Emphases and Activities

1. Objective

The Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs shall assist North Carolina Baptists in the propagation of the gospel by:

a. Helping North Carolina Baptists to become more aware of the ethical implications of the Christian gospel with regard to such aspects of daily living as family life, human life, moral issues, economic life, and daily work, citizenship, public affairs, and related

fields; and by

b. Helping them create with God's leadership and by His grace the kind of moral and social climate in which the North Carolina Baptist witness for Christ will be most effective. This emphasis in the field of applied Christianity is to be pursued with the full awareness that the chief concern of the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs is in the area of Christian social ethics which is understood to mean the application of Christian principles in everyday living. Its primary program assignment is in the area of Christian moral development among North Carolina Baptists.

2. Program

- a. Makes systematic long-range plans for emphasis on Christian social ethics in the life of the North Carolina Baptist Convention and its institutions and agencies. These plans may include such things as suggested methods, suggested organizational patterns, and suggested themes.
- b. Plans and conducts specialized seminars in the field of Christian ethics. Specifically, these seminars for leadership may deal with such subjects as family life, human relations, moral issues, economic life, daily work, and citizenship. These seminars may be both statewide and regional as required by circumstances. Such plans for seminars should take cognizance of other North Carolina Baptist Convention institutions and agencies having interest in any of these areas.

c. Plans and conducts a Christian social ethics literature service, including pamphlets, tracts, booklets, posters, etc. This material is to be produced by the Division in cooperation with the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission and Joint Committee on Public Affairs to assist in the implementation of the program of Christian moral development.

d. Plans and conducts seminars in the dangers of alcohol, provides literature and research and serves as the official channel of action on the question of sale or use of alcohol among our people.

e. Provides for a liaison committee or person that would work with our General Assembly of North Carolina and our national Congress on legislation on matters that may vitally concern the life and work of our Baptist people.

f. Plans and provides articles, mats, quotes, factual data, pictures, and similar material on current pertinent moral and social issues for use by state Baptist papers and other mass media outlets in North Carolina.

#### 3. Information

a. Assembles basic materials such as books, pamphlets, and articles so as to qualify as a source of authentic information on all matters pertaining to the field of Christian social ethics, including alcohol, gambling, pornography, and other items.

b. Assists editors, scholars, teachers, writers, and other specialists in need of special information on Christian social ethics for the

writing projects in which they are engaged.

c. Provides a mail answering service to North Carolina Baptists and others in search of information on social problems.

4. Study and Research

a. Maintain a program of study covering the field of Christian social ethics in order to provide reliable help to North Carolina Baptists.

b. Provides monographs, papers, and studies for North Carolina Baptist leaders, institutions and agencies needing service in the field

of Christian social ethics.

c. Determines by means of opinion sampling, interviews, etc., the thinking of North Carolina Baptists on moral and social issues so as to be able to render service where the need is greatest. The research survey facilities of existing agencies should be used when possible.

5. Consultative and Advisory

a. Provides associations and churches with ideas by which achievements in Christian social ethics can be measured.

b. Provides counsel as requested in the field of applied Christianity to other North Carolina Baptist agencies and departments.

c. Serves in a liaison capacity with non-North Carolina Baptist groups in the field of social ethics.

(1) Consults with organizations working in alcohol education, public safety, and other areas of social concern.

(2) Presents North Carolina Baptist insights for consideration in the planning of programs by the state government on children

and youth, aging, housing, employment, public health, and other matters pertaining to social welfare.

- (3) Brings to bear Baptist statements, convictions, and insights in the field of Christian ethics upon important policymaking groups, compilers of yearbooks, various welfare organizations, etc.
- d. Encourages the inclusion of Christian social ethics in the study programs of various Baptist groups, such as assemblies, encampments, conferences, colleges, or wherever the need may develop. It shall be the duty of this committee to study developments in the area of church-state relations, to be alert to developments within the state and nation which violate or compromise the historic Baptist position of a free church in a free state. It shall attend conferences and seminars where these matters are being discussed. It shall report to the Baptist State Convention on any developments in this area and otherwise keep our people informed. This Council shall recognize that its primary responsibility is to speak to our people rather than for them.

#### 6. Relationships

The Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs should work directly as a staff and service agency with the North Carolina Baptist Convention and its institutions and agencies. It may work directly with the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission, the Joint Committee on Public Affairs, and with other North Carolina organizations through whom it may render indirect service to the associations and churches and their leaders. Its staff may on invitation, conduct associational and local church conferences in order to validate plans and techniques. The Council may relate its emphasis on Christian social ethics to Baptist associations, churches, and leaders through printed media. The Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs shall designate three (3) of its members for nomination for Trustees of the Christian Action League. The Council shall cooperate with the Christian Action League in its efforts to combat alcohol and other social evils.

#### B. Personnel

- 1. The Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs in cooperation with the Executive Director-Treasurer of this Convention shall nominate, and the Executive Committee of the General Board shall elect an Executive Director and other personnel, as needed. The Executive Director-Treasurer will serve as acting Executive Director of the Council until the position is filled, or when a vacancy may occur.
- 2. Duties and Responsibilities of the Executive Director of the Council. The Executive Director shall be responsible to the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs, to the General Board, and shall cooperate with all the Divisions and Departments in order to create a better understanding of all the problems involved in providing this Christian ministry.

### C. Reports

The Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs shall make a full report to the September meeting of the General Board and to this Convention at its annual session

#### D. Meetings

The Christian Life Committee of the General Board shall elect its chairperson at the January meeting of the General Board. This chairperson

becomes President of the entire Council and a member of the Executive Committee of the General Board.

The Council shall hold at least two (2) full meetings during the year, one (1) during the spring months, and one (1) prior to the annual session of this Convention. Additional meetings may be called by the President and Executive Director of the Council when conditions warrant it.

E. Budget

Budget funds for the work of this Council will be recommended by the Council and approved by the Executive Committee of the General Board. Expenditure of budget funds will be supervised by the committee of the General Board, under the guidance of the Executive Director-Treasurer.

# VIII. THE DISMISSAL OF TRUSTEES OF INSTITUTIONS OR AGENCIES

In the event that it should become necessary for this Convention to consider removal of a trustee, it shall be done in the following manner:

A. This Convention will automatically refer the matter to the Executive Committee of the General Board for consideration and action.

B. The Executive Committee will first seek to solve the problem through

the regularly elected Board of Trustees.

C. If it becomes necessary for the Executive Committee to act in behalf of this Convention, the trustee in question shall have charges presented in writing, be given adequate time for reply, and be allowed counsel.

D. The Executive Committee will report its action in full to the General Board subject to the approval of this Convention in its next annual session.

# IX. AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

These Bylaws may be changed or amended by a majority vote of the registered messengers present and voting at any session of the Annual Convention after the Monday night session, provided that the amendment to the Bylaws shall appear in the *Biblical Recorder* in two (2) separate issues in advance of the meeting of the Convention in which the proposed action is to be taken. In the event the required notice has not been given, these Bylaws may be changed or amended by a two-thirds (2/3rds) vote of the registered messengers present and voting at any session of the Annual Convention after the Monday night session.

# X. Quorum

The quorum of this Convention shall be the number of registered messengers present at any session of the annual convention.

# MONDAY EVENING — NOVEMBER 11, 1991

1. The North Carolina Baptist Wind Ensemble presented pre-session music beginning at 6:30 p.m.

2. The 161st annual session was called to order at 6:45 p.m. by President Gene Watterson using a gavel from First Church, Shelby, presented to him by Executive Director Roy Smith.

3. Charles Storey, director, Church Music Department, Cary, led the assem-

bly in singing "To God Be the Glory."

4. Johnson Dorn, pastor, Flint Groves Church, Gastonia, led responsive

reading and gave the invocation.

5. The president recognized Mary Lloyd Frank, council member of the City of Asheville, representing Mayor Kenneth M. Michalove. She brought greetings and extended a welcome to messengers and visitors.

6. J. Charles Allard, pastor, First Church, Morehead City, chairperson, Program/Place and Preacher Committee, introduced its members and reported that the order of business was planned so that each day would merit attendance of all messengers. He moved that the program as printed be adopted. (See Nos. 7, 26, 27)

7. Malbert Smith, pastor, Greystone Church, Durham, moved that the program be amended to have election of the president and two vice-presidents at 10:25 a.m. on Tuesday and that election of the recording secretary and assistant recording secretary be at 2:10 p.m. Tuesday with any run-off elections that may be necessary. John Hewett, pastor, First Church, Asheville, seconded the motion. (See Nos. 17, 26)

8. Speaking for his motion, Mr. Smith said he believed all elections should

be held on one day when more messengers could be present.

9. Bill Horton, layperson, West Asheville Church, Asheville, asked Mr. Smith to add to his amendment what he had been expected to present. Mr. Smith responded that his amendment would stand as read. Therefore, Mr. Horton moved that the Smith amendment be amended to add that the 1991 budget discussion and vote would be at 4:00 p.m., Tuesday instead of on Wednesday. (See Nos. 7, 16)

10. Mr. Horton spoke in favor of his amendment to the Smith amendment stating that when important business is conducted, it should be when most of

the messengers can be present, which would be Tuesday.

11. Mr. Allard spoke against the Horton amendment to the Smith amendment, explaining that the committee was addressing the problem of messengers leaving after the Tuesday business sessions; that attendance on Wednesday mornings is 1,000 or less; and that something has to be done to make all sessions of the convention important. He urged support of the program as printed.

12. Don Taylor, layperson, Merrimon Avenue Church, Asheville, spoke in favor of the Horton amendment to the Smith amendment saying that the budget

should be presented when the majority of messengers could be present.

13. John Hewett, pastor, First Church, Asheville, spoke against the amendment to the Smith amendment saying that although he was in favor of having all elections on Tuesday, he was against wholesale dismantling of the program as prepared by the committee.

14. Todd Morris, pastor, Mount Beulah Church, Gaston Association, spoke in favor of the Horton amendment to the Smith amendment, urging that voting on the most important issues be held in one day in fairness to those who

cannot afford to attend three days.

15. Ed Vick, layperson, First Church, Raleigh, spoke against the Horton amendment to the Smith amendment stating that consideration of the budget would need more time than could be fit into an already crowded Tuesday schedule.

- 16. In a vote taken by standing, the Horton amendment to the Smith amendment failed. (See Nos. 7, 9)
- 17. Vote on the Smith amendment by standing was not decisive so a ballot vote was taken. (See Nos. 7, 26)

18. Janet Long, First Church, Franklin, member of the Tellers Committee,

explained the procedure for ballot voting.

19. Ronnie C. Owen, pastor, Mount Čarmel Church, Asheville, chairperson, Enrollment Committee, reported that as of 6:30 p.m. 2,592 messengers had been registered with 162 visitors.

20. Betty S. Ferrell, First Church, Black Mountain, chairperson, Local Arrangements Committee, reported on plans for the convenience and well-

being of messengers and visitors.

21. First Vice President Randall Lolley recognized persons attending the convention for the first time and remarked that the number appeared to be about one-third of those present. He also introduced presidents, trustees, and directors of institutions and agencies; representatives of the Southern Baptist Convention: Ray and Evelyn Benfield, European Baptist Convention; Dan Euliss, Home Mission Board; Gwenn McCormick, Sunday School Board; Lamar Tribble, Foreign Mission Board; Quenton Pugh, executive director, Baptist Convention of New York, and four colleagues; pastors and staff members who moved to the state during the past year; persons who retired during the year; seven past presidents of the Convention, and visitors.

22. Mr. Benfield spoke on behalf of the Foreign Mission Board and European Baptists expressing appreciation for and asking continued financial

support and prayer for missions work.

23. Second Vice President Bruce Whitaker introduced O. D. Martin, director, Stewardship Division, Cary, who reported on the Sao Paulo partnership now in its fourth year of a five year project. He said that 1,840 N.C. Baptists have gone to Sao Paulo to participate in the project. Those present were recognized. Following his report, the Baptist Singers sang the national hymn for Brazilian Baptists, "Minha Patria." David Campbell, missionary to Sao Paulo, brought greetings and expressed appreciation for the partnership.

24. Second Vice President Whitaker introduced Maurice G. Cook, Hayes Barton Church, Raleigh, coordinator, N.C. partnership with Poland, who reported 750 state Baptists have participated in the project, 100 persons going in the past year. Following a video presentation, Ewa Korytkowska of Poland,

brought greetings and expressed appreciation.

25. Second Vice President Whitaker introduced Nancy Curtis, Woodhaven Church, Apex, executive director, Woman's Missionary Union of N.C., and state coordinator, New York/N.C. partnership. She reported on the partnership and introduced Quenton Pugh, executive director, New York Baptist Convention who told of accomplishments of the partnership and challenges facing it. He introduced Glenn Igleheart, New York partnership coordinator, Michael Anderson, Greater Syracuse Association, and James Arrant, Hudson Association, all of whom spoke briefly.

26. Ms. Long, Tellers Committee, reported results of voting on the Smith motion: 1,574 or 57 percent for, 1,188 or 43 percent against. Six ballots were improperly marked and one incorrect ballot was used. (See Nos. 7, 17)

- 27. Mr. Allard, Program/Place and Preacher Committee, read the order of business revised to comply with the Smith motion (See No. 7) and moved its adoption as an amendment to his original motion (See No. 6). The motion carried.
  - 28. Mr. Storey led the assembly in singing "O God Our Help in Ages Past."
- 29. Second Vice President Whitaker introduced Gene L. Watterson for the president's address.
- 30. Music was presented by the N.C. Baptist Singers, directed by Mr. Storey and Neal E. Eller Jr., associate, Church Music Department, Cary: "Rejoice and Be Glad" Govenor (men and women); "Sing for Joy" Pote (men); "Alleluia! He Lives Today" arr. Hirt (women); and "He is Life" Beebe (men and women).
- 31. The president expressed appreciation for the concern and support given him during his recent illness and surgery. In his address he likened the troublesome times of 2 Kings 6, 7 to the problems of Southern Baptists today: erosion of family life, the rising drug culture, dramatic spread of disease, explosion of pornography, rise of cults and political difficulties in the Southern Baptist Convention. He called for commitment to face the issues rather than a donothing attitude. (Full text in The Biblical Recorder, Nov. 30, 1991, p. 8)

32. Troy Hamrick, layperson, Ardmore Church, Winston-Salem, gave the benediction.

# TUESDAY MORNING — NOVEMBER 12, 1991

- 33. Pre-session music was presented at 8:30 a.m. by James Good, organist, professor of church music, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, and Larry Keesler, pianist, minister of music, First Church, Mount Airy.
  - 34. The assembly was led by Mr. Eller in singing "O Worship the King."
  - 35. Mr. Dorn read Scripture and gave the invocation.
- 36. First Vice President Lolley recognized E. Glen Holt, president, General Board, who gave an overview of its work. He reported that this year the Board had granted Chowan College authority and final approval for its return to a four-year college. The second oldest of Baptist colleges in the state, Chowan was founded in 1848 as a four-year school but for the last few years has operated as a two-year school. He recognized its president, Dr. Jerry Jackson for a report on Chowan's plans and hopes in this new endeavor.
- 37. On behalf of the General Board, Mr. Holt moved that North Carolina Baptist Hospitals Inc. be empowered to borrow fifty-five million dollars (\$55,000,000) for future facility development The resolution follows:

# Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees (the "Board") of the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated (the "Corporation"), a private nonprofit corporation that owns and operates certain hospital facilities in Winston-Salem, North Carolina (the "Hospital") has determined the need for a capital expansion of the Hospital consisting of the construction, acquisition, and installation of a new emergency department and dietary facility (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Board has also determined that a need exists for a skilled nursing/intermediate-care facility because of federal reimbursement policies under the Medicare Program and the Prospective Payment System that mandate the discharge of patients prior to the time that a number of patients are able to resume independent living arrangements;

WHEREAS, as affiliate of the Corporation, the North Carolina Baptist Hospital Endowment, a North Carolina nonprofit corporation (the "Endowment"), proposes to construct, acquire, equip and operate a 170-bed free-standing skilled nursing/intermediate-care

facility ("Skilled Nursing Facility");

WHEREAS, the Endowment has requested that the Corporation assist the Endowment with the design, development and construction of the Skilled Nursing Facility and finance for the Endowment the costs for the acquisition, construction and installation of the Skilled Nursing Facility in the amount of approximately \$5,000,000;

WHEREAS, the Board has identified the need to finance up to \$50 million in connection with the Project and up to \$5,000,000 to finance for the Endowment the costs of the Skilled Nursing Facility;

WHEREAS, the construction, acquisition and installation of the Project by the Corporation and the Skilled Nursing Facility by the Endowment will inure to the advancement of the purposes for which the Corporation was formed; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD:

RESOLVED, that the Board, in support of the design of the Project, authorizes the officers of the Corporation to apply to the North Carolina Medical Care Commission (the "Commission") for approval of the Project, any certificates of need required in connection with the Project, and a loan in an amount up to \$55,000,000 to be financed through the issuance of hospital revenue bonds issued by the Commission to pay a portion of the costs of the Project and to provide funds to the Corporation with which to finance for the Endowment the costs of the Skilled Nursing Facility and, to the extent permitted by law, initial working capital needs thereof.

RESOLVED, that the officers of the corporation are authorized to engage consultants, investment bankers, architects, accountants, engineers, and attorneys in connection therewith;

however, final Board approval to proceed with construction of the Project shall be obtained after final costs are known.

RESOLVED, that any one of the President and the Vice President, Financial Management of the Corporation is authorized to execute and deliver on behalf of the Corporation any and all agreements, instruments, schedules, certificates, or other documents necessary or convenient in connection with the carrying out of the purposes of this resolution, and any one of the Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Corporation is hereby designated and authorized to witness or attest to the execution and delivery of, and as necessary, to affix the Seal of the corporation thereto; such execution and delivery to be conclusive evidence of the authorization and approval thereof by the Corporation.

RESOLVED, that the President and the Vice President, Financial Management of the corporation are authorized to negotiate with the Endowment the terms of a loan or advance by the Corporation to the Endowment to finance the costs, including initial working capital requirements, of the construction and start-up of the Skilled Nursing Facility provided that the terms of repayment of the loan or advance shall provide generally for payments of principal and interest by the Endowment to the Corporation in amounts and at the times sufficient to repay when due the principal of and interest on the portion of any loan obtained by the Corporation from the North Carolina Medical Care Commission to finance such loan or advance to the Endowment.

RESOLVED, that the Corporation is authorized and directed to fulfill all obligations under the terms of any agreements, certificates, or other documents executed and delivered in connection with this resolution.

- 38. Len Preslar, president, Baptist Hospitals, Inc., spoke in favor of the motion. A video presentation portrayed this healing ministry of N. C. Baptists.
  - 39. The motion to borrow by the hospital \$55,000,000 carried unanimously.
- 40. Mr. Holt gave background information on the Institutional Relationship Study Committee. Lamar Brooks, pastor, Winter Park Church, Wilmington, chairperson, reported that a thorough study is underway and urged that Baptists communicate with the committee their questions, suggestions and concerns. The committee will be available for this purpose throughout the convention.
- 41. Mr. Holt recognized David Odom, chairman, Budget committee, who announced that his committee also would be available throughout the convention for discussion regarding the budget.
- 42. Mr. Holt recognized Tom Womble, associate for business management, Cary, who reported on financial receipts to Nov. 6, 1991. (See full financial statement in General Board Report.)
- 43. On recommendation of the General Board, Mr. Holt moved that the following be elected trustees of the convention: Gerald Arnold and Gayle Parker, both of Raleigh, and Associate Justice John Webb, Wilson. The motion carried.
- 44. Mr. Womble read the report of trustees of the Convention which was received as information.
- 45. Executive Director Roy J. Smith stated that Judge David Britt has served as trustee and chairman of the trustees of the Baptist State Convention for many

years and has been a friend, confidant and counselor to the Convention leadership. He moved that this convention express its appreciation to Judge David Britt for his many years of distinguished service. The motion carried.

46. Mr. Holt said the General Board report would be continued during the

afternoon session and on Wednesday morning.

47. Gwenn McCormick, Southern Baptist Sunday School Board, brought greetings and presented President Watterson with complimentary copies of the New American Commentary and The Doctrine of the Bible.

48. Mr. Owen, Enrollment Committee, reported that as of 9:30 a.m. Tues-

day, 4,923 messengers were registered with 347 visitors.

- 49. Mr. Allard reported changes in the program caused by vote of the convention on Monday evening, calling attention especially to the time for elections.
- 50. Mr. Storey led the assembly in singing "Blessed Assurance, Jesus Is Mine."
- 51. Women of the N.C. Baptist Singers sang "How Lovely are the Messengers" Mendelssohn/Lyall.

52. Mr. Storey led the assembly in singing "At the Cross."

53. President Watterson explained that a musical interlude was added to the order of business so that election of the president would be at the announced time and after all messengers were registered.

54. The President called for nominations for the office of president.

  - 57. A motion from the floor that nominations cease, carried unanimously.

58. Ms. Long, Tellers Committee, gave instructions for ballot voting.

59. The president recognized former president William E. Poe, layperson, First Church, Charlotte, parliamentarian; and Marian G. Grant, layperson, Pullen Memorial Church, Raleigh, recording secretary.

60. President Watterson introduced John H. Hewett, pastor, First Church, Asheville, and president, Council on Christian Higher Education, who reported on work of the Council and said that Robert Mullinax was recognized in January for 20 years service as director of the Council. For a special presentation on Campbell University, he recognized Daniel A. Linney, chairman of the Division of Fine Arts and Mass Communications, now in his 33rd year of service to Campbell. Jerry Wallace, vice president for Academic Affairs and Provost, read Scripture and led the assembly in prayer. The N.C. Baptist Singers sang "Jesus, Saviour, Pilot Me" — Gould. Speaking briefly were Jesse Mooney Jr., pastor, First Church, Ahoskie, 1991 graduate; Maria and Melody O'Toole, Goldsboro, undergraduates; and Susan Carlisle, Red Springs, third year pharmacy student, Ben Wright, Rolesboro, alumni president, and Norman Wiggins, now in his 25th year as president of the University. 61. President Watterson introduced Sanford H. He said the report has 119 nominations; that 73 percent are from churches with over 400 resident members, 27 percent from churches with under 400 resident members; that 26 percent are

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ministers and 74 percent laypersons; that 77 percent are male and 23 percent female; that the nominees come from 99 different churches and no more than two are from any one church. The motion carried.

The president recognized Mr. Allard, chairman, Program/Place/Preacher committee, who moved that the General Board study the feasibility of changing the convention time to a Friday and Saturday, bring its report and recommendation to the 1992 convention and that such plans become effective with the 1993 convention.

Mr. Allard spoke for the motion saying that for years, there has been struggle for design of the Wednesday morning session of the convention; that messengers have demonstrated by their absence that they do not desire a third day of convention meetings; that good stewardship demands that the traditional meeting time be changed; that more lay people must be included and participate; and that the convention could be held in two days at a considerable financial saving. The president shall annually, in consultation with the vice-presidents, appoint a Committee on Enrollment consisting of nine members, three of whom shall have served the previous year, and a Committee on Committees consisting of 15 members. These committees shall be appointed by January 31. The president may appoint other committees when so directed by the body. The president shall serve as an ex-officio voting member of all Convention committees, the General Board, and its Executive Committee.

- 65. Dr. Freeman spoke in favor of his motion, citing the close vote at the 1988 convention in Fayetteville when the bylaws were changed; that there had been no problems with this in the past; that it degrades the office of president by changing the appointive powers; that it gives the General Board veto power when these committees are appointed; that historically presidents have honorably discharged this duty with a minimum of complaints; that presidents and vice presidents can be more readily changed than members of the General Board who have four year terms; and that the present system leaves all the checks with the General Board, no balance for the convention.
- 66. Leon Smith, pastor, First Church, Gastonia, spoke against the motion saying that to approve it would be to empower one person with authority to set in motion a procedure that could radically change over one million Baptists; that the first vote in Fayetteville in 1988 on changing the bylaws was close but the second vote in Greensboro was not that close; that the General Board is elected by this body and there is no way to be more democratic; that even the president of the United States does not have this kind of power; that the issue is whether N.C. Baptists will be biblical or pontifical; and that the world of Baptists has changed and if the old way is returned, disaster is being invited.

67. Jeff Griffin, pastor, Cornerstone Church, Cary, spoke for the motion saying that Baptists need to go back to their roots, stop being so politically inclined and continue doing what has been done traditionally as Baptists.

68. Billy Honeycutt, Second Church, Rutherfordton, Director of Missions, Green River Association, spoke against the motion saying that the current

bylaws allow broader participation and are serving well.

69. In a vote with ballots raised, the chair ruled that the motion lost by an approximate margin of 3 to 1. A ballot vote was called for from the floor but Dr. Freeman stated there was no need to ballot, it was clear to him the motion had lost.

- 70. Billy Cline, pastor, Merrimon Avenue Church, Asheville, announced that he and John Hewett, Asheville, would be on "Good Morning America" Wednesday morning and asked that the assembly pray that the two would have wisdom so that when the program is over, God would have been honored and Southern Baptists would have a good name. The president led the assembly in prayer.
  - 71. Mr. Storey led the assembly in singing "The Church's One Foundation."
- 72. Second Vice President Whitaker introduced John M. Lewis, retired pastor, First Church, Raleigh, to read Scripture, and Jerry D. Hayner, Forest Hills Baptist Church, Raleigh, for the convention sermon.

73. The N.C. Baptist Wind Ensemble and Baptist Singers presented "The

Mighty Power of God" — Page.

- 74. Dr. Lewis read Ephesians 1:15 and Dr. Hayner preached the convention sermon, citing the lostness of the prodigal son and his joy in going home again where he was accepted, found food, clothing, welcome and love. He said it is time for Southern Baptists to return to basics, start loving again the way Christ loved us all, and start working together again. (Full text printed in The Biblical Recorder, Nov. 23, 1991, pp 3, 8)
- 75. Ms. Long, Tellers Committee, announced results of the ballot vote for the office of president: Billy Cline 2,441 or 48.60 percent; Glen Holt 2,583 or

51.40 percent. Second Vice President Whitaker declared Mr. Holt the next president of the Convention. (See Nos. 55, 56)

76. Terry Lynn Huneycutt, minister of education, Greenwood Forest Church,

Cary, gave the benediction.

79. Second Vice President Whitaker introduced Ernest Upchurch, assistant

recording secretary, and expressed appreciation for his service.

80. Mr. Storey introduced Dr. Good, organist, and Mr. Keesler, pianist.

81. The assembly was led in singing "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."

82. Mr. Dorn led the assembly in responsive reading and prayer.

83. Second Vice President Whitaker presented F. Thomas Jenkins Jr., new

director, Division of Missions, who spoke briefly.

He introduced Ruby Batchelor, Sunset Avenue Church, Rocky Mount, chairperson, Missions Committee, who presented its members and other leaders of work in the Division. After speaking briefly, she introduced Burke Holland, Language and Chaplaincy, who presented Executive Director Smith a plaque on behalf of the Chaplains Commission and the Home Mission Board for 50 years of caring, 1941–1991. Staff members were recognized and a video presentation portrayed ministries of the Division.

84. With First Vice President Lolley presiding, Mr. Holt continued the General Board report, expressing appreciation for the privilege of serving on

the General Board and now as president of the Convention.

85. Mr. Holt recognized Lamar J. Brooks, pastor, Winter Park Church, Wilmington; vice president, General Board and chairperson, Constitution and Bylaws Committee, who gave a brief report with no recommendations.

86. Mr. Holt recognized Curtis Barbery, pastor, Beulah Church, Robbins, chairperson, board of directors, Fruitland, for its report. He reported that directors had undertaken a long range planning process involving programs and facilities; reaffirmed the original purpose of Fruitland to continue to be the finest Bible Institute available for ministers who cannot attend college or for those who are preparing to continue their education on a college level and that it will not become a college; that three buildings are currently under construction; that around 250 alumni returned this year for an Associate Degree in Church Ministry/Religion now being offered.

87. Mr. Holt reported that the General Board granted permission for \$5,000 overage in a special fund to be used for materials to construct a new church in

Sao Paulo, Brazil.

88. Mr. Holt recognized convention staff changes during the past year and persons completing terms on the General Board. (Listed in General Board

report.)

89. First Vice President Lolley called attention to the special offerings separated from the previously combined missions offering: the Retirement Homes in February, the Baptist Hospital in May, State Missions in September, and the Children's Homes in November.

- 90. Mr. Storey led the assembly in singing "I Stand Amazed in the Presence."
- 91. President Watterson asked the will of the body regarding the order of business since the program was 35 minutes ahead of schedule. It was unanimously agreed to proceed with the order of business.
- 92. The president introduced Daniel L. Griffin, pastor, Snyder Memorial Church, Fayetteville, and chairperson, Committee on Committees, who recognized committee members and gave the procedures followed in selecting nominees. He read names of those being nominated and moved adoption of this recommendation. The motion carried.

## TUESDAY EVENING — NOVEMBER 12, 1991

114. The PraiSing II Festival Orchestra presented the prelude for the evening session at 6:30 p.m., joined by the N.C. Baptist Singers and a mass choir. The call to worship was by the orchestra and choir with Scripture and song: "Send Me..." and "Thou Art Holy" — Courtney.

115. President Watterson gave the invocation and led the assembly in reading responsively, followed by the Baptist Singers: "Psalm 46" — John Ness

Beck.

116. Charles Storey, director, Church Music Department, Cary, welcomed messengers and visitors to PraiSing II, an introduction to the Baptist Hymnal released in March. The first PraiSing was in April 1976 under the direction of the late Joseph O. Stroud, first director of the Church Music Department. His widow, Rachel Stroud was present and recognized. Others participating: Charles Gatwood, associate with Mr. Stroud for 10 years and director for 10 years before retiring in 1987; C. Michael Hawn, professor, Church Music, Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest; and special guest Wesley L. Forbis, director, Church Music Department, SBC Sunday School Board, editor of the Baptist Hymnal, and director of the mass choir.

117. On behalf of the Sunday School Board, Nashville, Dr. Forbis presented a pulpit edition of the Baptist Hymnal to Executive Director Smith. Others in the service were: President Watterson; Neal E. Eller Jr., associate, Church Music Department, Cary; James Good, professor, Church Music, Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest; Larry Keesler, minister of music First Church, Mount Airy; David Thomas, minister of music, First Church, Asheboro; an orchestra of 107 musicians from churches over the state; the N.C. Baptist Singers and a mass choir of 500 persons from 155 churches and two Baptist colleges in the

state.

118. The assembly was led by Mr. Storey, Charles Gatwood and Michael Hawn in singing "Worthy of Worship" — Judson; "This Is the Threefold Truth" — Acclamations; "For All the Saints" — Sine Nomine; and "Children of God" — Dailey. The choir sang "Soon and Very Soon" — arr. Mark Hayes; Theresa Batten, Fayetteville, soloist. The assembly was led in singing "Victory in Jesus," reading responsively, and singing "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross," "Alas and Did My Saviour Bleed," and "O How He Loves You and Me." The choir sang "And Can It Be" — arr. Danner.

119. Mr. Storey led the assembly in singing "Majesty" prior to the address by Roy J. Smith, executive director of the Baptist State Convention of N.C. He used Isaiah 6:1–8 as the basis for his emphasis on the importance of worship. He said that every essential spiritual experience occurs in the context of worship; that worship must have priority; that worship involves conviction, confession, cleansing and results in comprehensive commitment.

120. "God, Our Author and Creator" was sung by the assembly led by Mr. Eller, with responsive reading following. Mr. Gatwood led the singing of "Break Out, O Church of God," and the choir sang "Be Strong in the Lord" — arr. C.

Kirkland. The Baptist Singers sang "O Zion, Haste" — Courtney; the congregational hymn of commitment was "Lord, Here Am I" — Beck.

121. Ms. Long, Tellers Committee, reported results of voting for the offices of second vice president and recording secretary: Henry Cook 1,655 or 41.51 percent; Ed Vick, 2,333 or 58.47 percent; Brenda Hicks 1,385 or 35.19 percent; Marian Grant 2,552 or 64.81 percent. President Watterson declared the election of Ed Vick as second vice president and Marian Grant as recording secretary. (See Nos. 101–106)

122. John Hewett, pastor, First Church, Asheville, president, Council on Christian Higher Education, recognized John Weems, president of Meredith College for 20 years, for a report on the centennial celebration of the chartering of the college. He said that Meredith is the largest women's college in the southeast and has more than 10,000 living alumni. A special presentation, including video, portrayed the history and dreams of the institution.

123. Tammy Condrey, president, N.C. Baptist Student Union, student, Mars

Hill College, gave the benediction.

124. "Rejoice, the Lord is King" — arr. Danner, was sung by the congregation and mass choir accompanied by the PraiSing orchestra to adjourn the evening session.

## WEDNESDAY MORNING — NOVEMBER 13, 1991

125. Dr. Good and Mr. Keesler presented pre-session music beginning at 8:30 a.m.

126. With Second Vice President Whitaker presiding, Mr. Storey led the assembly in singing "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord" and Mr. Dorn read Scripture and gave the invocation.

127. R. Hargus Taylor, assistant to the president, Chowan College, Murfreesboro, chairperson, Historical Committee, was introduced and gave the committee report: 200th anniversaries — Bear Swamp Church, Robeson Association, and French Broad Church, Carolina Association; first place, historical drama — "The Mountain Movers" by Connie Mixson, Biltmore Church, Asheville; first place, unpublished manuscripts — "Early History of Reedy Creek Church (Cullom Association), by Donald Godfrey; first place, history of local churches — "Peace and Harmony: A History of Red Hill Baptist Church, 1865-1990," by the church history committee and Walter Woodson Jr.; and "Louisburg Baptist Church" by Gregory Thompson and Judith Parrish.

128. Helen Harris, layperson, Hayes Barton Church, Raleigh, chairperson, Memorials Committee, reported for the committee and introduced its members. Charles DuRant, minister of music, Hayes Barton Church, Raleigh sang "O God, Our Lord, We Seek Thy Guidance." To be memorialized in the Convention Annual are three laypersons: Jasper Memory, Joseph Branch and Miriam Robinson; and five ministers: Charles Stevens, Yates Campbell, Claud Bowen,

Max Linnens, and Woodrow Robbins.

129. Second Vice President Whitaker called for items of miscellaneous business.

130. Roger Williams, Ardmore Church, Winston-Salem, moved that this convention commend the Rev. Billy Cline and Dr. John Hewett for representing N.C. Baptists and Southern Baptists fairly and with Christian dignity on the "Good Morning America" show on television this 13th day of November, 1991. The motion carried.

131. Ted Stone, Grace Church, Durham, moved that the newly-elected president be authorized to appoint a committee of nine members to study fully the opportunities for the convention to become involved in a new ministry of providing drug abuse treatment, and further: that this committee be instructed to present to the next annual Convention meeting a concrete proposal for the Convention's direct involvement in such a ministry. (See No. 142)

132. Mr. Stone spoke in favor of his motion saying there were not enough treatment centers that are Christ-centered and affordable; that Baptists need to be on the front line in the fight against drug abuse and that this is an opportunity for moderates and conservatives to work together in doing a job that needs

to be done.

133. Mr. Allard moved to amend the Stone motion to include AIDS.

134. Mr. Stone spoke against the amendment because he felt that two different subjects were involved.

135. The Allard amendment failed to carry in a vote by a show of ballots.

136. Second Vice President Whitaker stated that the original motion presented a parliamentary problem involving Article 12 of the Constitution.

- 137. Mr. Stone asked to speak before the ruling on constitutionality and said he introduced this motion four years ago; he was asked to send it through the General Board process because the constitution says this is the favored route; that even though the convention approved it, there still are no positive results; therefore, this proposal is now being sent the route of the president's appointing a committee that would be responsible to the convention rather than to the General Board.
- 138. Speaking at the request of the second vice-president, Parliamentarian Poe said there was no intent to avoid making the study Mr. Stone proposes; that the constitution mandates that if the convention agrees that the proposal should be further considered, the convention president shall refer the proposal to the General Board for a detailed study.

139. Second Vice President Whitaker ruled that on advice of the parliamentarian, this motion, if passed, will be referred to the General Board for further

study.

- 140. Mr. Stone moved to appeal the ruling of the chair. A vote by standing was not decisive. (See No. 152)
- 141. At the request of the chair, Parliamentarian Poe explained that Mr. Stone's motion (see No. 131) should be voted on before determining how it would be carried out if approved.

142. Second Vice President Whitaker ruled that vote would be on the original Stone motion. In a vote by standing, the motion carried. (See No. 131)

- 143. The parliamentarian explained that a vote for the motion to appeal the ruling of the chair (See No. 140) would support Mr. Stone's interpretation of his motion. A vote against the motion to appeal would sustain the position of the chair.
- 144. On a point of order, Wayne Tuttle, pastor, Pine Grove Church, Rockingham, stated that this body had voted overwhelmingly for the president to appoint the committee and that overrules the chair according to Roberts Rules of Order.
- 145. The chair expressed disagreement with Mr. Tuttle's statement and called for a vote on the Stone motion to appeal.
- 146. D. Victor Ramsey, pastor, Moyock Church, Moyock, on a point of order, said the substance of Mr. Stone's motion was the mechanism for ap-

pointment of the committee; four years ago he used the process; he was dissatisfied with that process and the point of his motion was not simply that a study be made but that the committee be appointed in a different fashion. He urged that the motion to appeal be passed.

147. Mike Moore, pastor, Silver Lake Church, Wilmington, asked if the question should not be put to the body differently, i.e. shall the body sustain

the ruling of the chair rather than calling for a negative vote.

148. Second Vice President Whitaker ruled that the vote would be on sustaining the chair.

149. Phil McLean, pastor, Mountain Springs Church, Union County, said this body in session has already voted and there is no reason for further voting or debate.

- 150. The chair stated that the parliamentarian advises that this motion is unconstitutional according to Article 12 of the constitution; that action contrary to the constitution cannot be taken. (See No. 131)
  - 151. A motion from the floor for the previous question, carried.

152. In a vote by standing, the body failed to sustain the chair, thus the motion to appeal the ruling of the chair, carried. (See Nos. 139–140)

- 153. George Uribe, Providence Church, Raleigh, moved that no political organizations be allowed to rent space from any of the Baptist campus ministry buildings in North Carolina.
- 154. Jim Scarborough, Pullen Memorial Church, Raleigh, urged that the motion be defeated.
- 155. Tom Austin, Knollwood Church, Winston-Salem, on a point of order, asked that Mr. Uribe define the term "political" or that the chair declare the motion out of order.
- 156. Mr. Uribe said his main concern is that at one of the student centers there is a political organization that organizes political activity, sends students to other countries in support of political action, organizes pickets for and against political candidates, and speaks of political issues affecting our nation.
- 157. Hugh Garner, pastor, First Church, Waynesville, stated that more information about this organization is needed; that many times people categorize peace movements and give a bad connotation to them; that many peace organizations express concern about atrocities in nations of the world; and is this really a political organization or a body of people concerned about the social needs and welfare of all people?

158. In a vote by standing, the Uribe motion failed.

- 159. The second vice president introduced Bill Boatwright, director, Communications Division, Cary. Everett Smith, chairman, Communications Committee, introduced committee members; recognized staff members and paid tribute to early pioneers in communications in the state: Fon Scofield, Jimmy Morriss, Esther Kidd, Frances Riley and others. A video presentation portrayed the work and mission of the Division.
- 160. Mr. Storey expressed appreciation to Mr. Keesler and Dr. Good for their contribution to the music at this meeting, and to Randy Durham, Keith Brown, Cynthia King, Roger Ward and Danny Musten for their work in providing sound, lights, and other arrangements for the convention.

161. The assembly was directed by Mr. Storey in singing "We Have Heard

the Joyful Sound."

162. With President Watterson presiding, Dr. Holt continued the report of the General Board and consideration of the proposed budget for 1992.

163. Dr. Holt moved adoption of the General Board's recommendation on the 1991 Mission Reserve Fund in the Optional Budget:

a. The General Board recommends that the 75 percent (approximately \$30,000) for foreign missions be sent to the Foreign Mission Board to be used for the Soviet Union as the FMB sees best.

b. That the 25 percent (approximately \$10,000) for Home Missions be sent to the Home Mission Board to be used as follows:

New York — \$5,000 New England — \$5,000

164. In a voice vote, the motion carried. (See Nos. 165–183)

165. The president apologized to a messenger who was inadvertently not recognized prior to the vote.

166. Bill Smith, pastor, Viewmont Church, Hickory, on a point of order, asked the president to declare the vote null and void, hear the person at the microphone and take a new vote. (See No. 164)

167. President Watterson said that in order to be parliamentarily correct, a person who voted for this motion should move for reconsideration.

168. Clyde Alderman, pastor, First Church, Roanoke Rapids, said he voted for the Holt motion and would move that it be reconsidered. The motion carried.

169. Tom Austin, pastor, Knollwood Church, Winston-Salem, moved that the General Board recommendation and the Holt motion on allocation of the 1991 Mission Reserve Fund in the Optional Budget be amended as follows: To reallocate approximately \$30,000 recommended for the Soviet Union and reassign these funds to Ruschlikon Baptist Seminary in Zurich, Switzerland; these funds to be sent through the Foreign Mission Board designated for the Ruschlikon Seminary. (See Nos. 170–182)

170. Dr. Austin spoke for his motion to amend saying that the Foreign Mission Board has defunded the Seminary of some \$365,000 that the school had counted on to educate national pastors and missionaries; that if these funds are not made up by individuals, churches and state conventions, the Seminary will be impoverished. He urged adoption of his motion to amend so that North Carolina can help make up part of the deficit.

171. Steve Hardy, pastor, Holly Hill Church, Burlington, and chair of the Foreign Mission Board trustee committee for Europe, Middle East and Northern Africa, spoke against the motion to amend saying it would go against the budgeting process of the Board; that whenever the will of this body is imposed on the will of another body, it is error; that this item will be reconsidered at the Board's December meeting and the issue should not be forced in this way.

172. Ed Beddingfield, pastor, First Church, Sylva, spoke for the motion to amend saying that this action would not be imposing the will of this body on the Foreign Mission Board; that the Board is there to serve Baptists in distribution of mission gifts; that Keith Parker, Brevard, is European Area director and longtime staff member at the Seminary, and his home state in his home area of that state should express support for the Seminary. He urged adoption of the motion to amend.

173. David L. Odom, pastor, Mountain Grove Church, Hickory, chairperson, Budget Planning Committee, stated that when the budget was prepared, the defunding of Ruschlikon had not occurred and its future was not an issue; that at that time, the greatest opportunity was thought to be in the Soviet Union; that if messengers are concerned about the future of the Seminary and

its ministry in Europe, this is the best place to get funds from the budget.

174. Emory M. Bare, pastor, Westwood Church, Durham, spoke against the motion to amend asking for consideration as to where the greatest need is, in Ruschlikon or the Soviet Union, a nation that has been oppressed and closed to the Gospel for 3/4 of a century; that in his opinion, the greatest need is in the Soviet Union.

175. Harry Poovey, pastor, First Church, Monroe, former missionary to Europe, appealed for adoption of the motion to amend; that if respect is not shown for the Seminary and all it does for churches and leaders in Europe the credibility of Baptists in Germany, England and the rest of the western world will be lost.

176. Hubert Garner, layperson, Flat Springs Church, Sanford, moved an amendment to the motion to amend that the money be sent directly to Ruschlikon Seminary, not through the Foreign Mission Board. (See No. 181)

177. Sarah Williamson, layperson, Hayes Barton Church, Raleigh, spoke against the motion to amend, saying that the money should be sent to the Soviet Union to allow that infant work to continue and flourish; that messengers should go back to their churches and encourage gifts to the Seminary, write the Foreign Mission Board and put pressure on it to hold to the commitment to the Seminary and protect the name of Southern Baptists.

178. Sherrill Stevens, First Church, Micro, on a point of order, said that discussion should be on the Garner amendment to the Austin motion to amend the Holt motion. (See Nos. 163, 169, 176) The president, on a point of personal privilege, said that when a messenger asks to speak for or against, he is reticent

to call that person out of order.

179. Harold Causby, layperson, First Church, Shelby, spoke in favor of the Garner amendment to the Austin motion to amend saying that gifts to the Seminary would be credited by the Foreign Mission Board against whatever it may do in December; that sending directly would be best especially if the Board does not refund the Seminary; and that the \$365,000 taken from the Seminary by the Board was now earmarked for projects in Russia and eastern Europe.

180. Mr. Odom, chairman, Budget Committee, moved the previous question.

The motion carried.

181. A voice vote on the Garner amendment to the Austin motion to amend was not decisive. In a vote by standing, the amendment carried. (See No. 176)

182. The Austin motion to amend carried as amended in a vote by lifting ballots. (See No. 169)

183. The Holt motion as amended carried in a vote by standing. (See Nos. 163, 169, 176)

184. General Board President Holt explained procedures used in preparing the proposed budget and introduced Mr. Odom, chairperson, Budget Committee, who reported on work of the committee and introduced a video presentation. Committee members were recognized and appreciation expressed for assistance given by convention staff. He reported that the budget represents a one percent increase over last year; it follows the model adopted last year as proposed by Mark Corts, Calvary Church, Winston-Salem; approximately 65 percent of the basic budget goes to the Baptist State Convention, 35 percent to the Southern Baptist Convention and all gifts are channeled according to this formula unless special instructions are received from churches; churches have an optional formula for channeling cooperative gifts: 65 percent to stay in the state convention, 20 percent to go to the Southern Baptist Convention and 15

percent to go to Southern Baptist ministries determined by N.C. Baptists. Approximately 150 churches chose this option this year giving about \$2 million, a significant help in meeting the budget and providing for partnership work in Poland, New York, and Brazil. The option is different this year, the number of entities is decreased so that more money will go to areas of greater need. A small raise of 1.5 percent and 2.5 percent has been given convention employees, the lowest paid clerical and support personnel to receive the highest percentage raise; the highest paid personnel the lowest percentage. Cuts of 5 percent were made in every program of work of the convention. Mr. Odom moved adoption of the 1992 Cooperative Program budget and State Missions Offering budget as printed. (See No. 194)

185. Sam Brewer, pastor, Tungsten Church, Flat River Association, Oxford, moved to amend the motion to take allocation for the Baptist Joint Committee from the special missions designation and place it in the regular budget of the State Convention instead of in the Southern Baptist Convention portion, in deference to messengers to the SBC in Atlanta who voted to defund the Baptist

Joint Committee on Public Affairs. (See No. 188)

186. Mr. Odom explained that the Baptist Joint Committee allocation is in the optional budget and receives only those gifts so designated. He urged that the item be left as an option.

187. Vann Smith, layperson, Scotts Creek Church, Sylva, stated concerns about the need for persons and churches to look carefully at priorities. The president ruled his remarks a point of personal privilege rather than for or against the motion to amend.

188. The Brewer motion to amend failed in a vote with raised ballots. (See

No. 185)

189. Bob Dutton, Naples Church, Naples, questioned the increase in the contingency item in the budget. Mr. Odom responded that the amount is necessary to take care of unexpected expenses; that all contingency expendi-

tures must first be approved by the Executive Committee.

190. David Blackney, pastor, First Church, Robbinsville, asked if gifts to the alternative budget are counted as cooperative giving. Mr. Odom responded that if a church chooses the option to the Cooperative Program, that money is counted as Cooperative Program giving, in line with the Corts motion approved by the convention last year. Mr. Blackney asked whether gifts sent directly to Nashville as an alternative to augment a shortfall, would be considered cooperative giving or designated gifts. Mr. Odom responded that gifts sent directly to Nashville are not known to the state and therefore not counted but if they are sent through the state designated to the SBC, they are counted as Cooperative Program giving.

191. Kim Crissman, layperson, Providence Church, Stoneville, asked if all full time employees receive the same benefits, insurance, annuity and disability. Mr. Odom responded that all employees receive the same benefits based

on percentage of salary.

192. Ted Miller, pastor, Moravian Falls Church, Moravian Falls, asked about the lack of salary for a position listed in the Business Management Division. Mr. Odom responded that efforts are being made to reduce staff and combine jobs and this position has been eliminated.

193. Gene Booker, pastor, Rocky River Church, Siler City, moved the

previous question. The motion carried.

194. With ballots raised, the Odom motion to adopt the budget carried. (See No. 184)

195. President Watterson expressed appreciation to First Vice President Lolley and Mrs. Lolley and to Second Vice President Whitaker and Mrs. Whitaker for their unselfish service to the Convention during their terms of office. The assembly responded with applause.

196. Executive Director Smith, at a point of personal privilege and on behalf of the convention, expressed appreciation to President and Mrs. Watterson for the leadership they have given to N.C. Baptists during the past two years and presented President Watterson a plaque for his dedication and service to N.C. Baptists as president. The assembly responded with applause.

197. President Watterson thanked Dr. Smith and those present for this expression of appreciation and for the privilege of serving as president.

198. With Second Vice President Lolley presiding, John Rogers, First Church, Buies Creek, chairperson, Resolutions Committee, presented the following resolution on The Baptist Theological Seminary at Richmond: (See No. 209)

WHEREAS, the Baptist Theological Seminary at Richmond has established itself as an institution of higher theological education, already complying with the initial requirements for full academic accreditation through the state of Virginia and the Southern Association of Theological Schools, the primary and accepted agency for accreditation of theological seminaries; and

WHEREAS, the president, dean, and other faculty members of the Baptist Theological Seminary in Richmond have strong and continuing ties with the Baptist of North Carolina, having served as Christian ministers in theological institutions of education and churches in North Carolina for two decades: and

WHEREAS, the Baptist Theological Seminary in Richmond has publicly committed itself to uphold the historical and traditional Baptist perspectives in all its areas of inquiry and instruction, and has further committed itself to innovative educational methods, including the requirements for all students to participate in hands-on-mission involvement and church service as integral to the academic curriculum:

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the majority of messengers present and voting in session at the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina on November 13, 1991, hereby commends The Baptist Theological Seminary in Richmond for its response to the denominational need for variety in theological education for students seeking to prepare theologically for Christian ministry;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED The Baptist Theological Seminary of Richmond be considered as another option when students of North Carolina churches seek theological education for preparation for service in Baptist churches, or when churches seek options for underwriting alternative forms of Baptist theological education;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we ask God's blessings upon The Baptist Theological Seminary of Richmond as it seeks to join the wider theological educative community in preparing people for christian ministry.

199. Gary Gregg, Minister of Eudcation/Youth, Chapel Grove Church, Gastonia, spoke against the resolution saying that this seminary was born out of division and discontent with SBC and N.C. seminaries and schools; that this resolution would not bring unity within the convention; that there are already a variety of colleges and seminaries in the SBC and the state and another is not needed; that if this is considered as a viable option for students and churches, it is agreeing with division and would further drive a wedge of division; that next year N.C. Baptists could be asked to fund this new seminary; and that approval should not be given this indipendent seminary;

200. James Jarrard, pastor, First Church, Wilson, said that theological education in the SBC is not characterized by variety, for each day that variety diminishes; that this resolution does not diminish the work of other seminaries but recognizes that different kinds of theological education are needed; that this body recognizes diversity and affirms newer types of theological education; that this seminary was begun with hope and a desire to provide all theological students as much diversity as possible. He urged passage of the

resolution.

201. Russell Rhodes, Kelford Church, West Chowan Association, Kelford, spoke against the resolution saying it affirms division; that Luther Rice Seminary, Midwestern Seminary and others also have Southern Baptist roots within their membership; that as a student at Southeastern Seminary, his theological education has not been hampered; and that he opposes this resolution because it is a point of division and not of unity.

202. Ann Charles-Craft, Providence Church, Charlotte, spoke in favor of the resolution saying that the Baptist Theological Seminary at Richmond is a seminary built on inclusiveness, founded to focus on global awareness and needs of the global community; that it has an integrative program and is supportive of women, and receives all persons seeking theological education.

203. Mark Harris, Central Grove Church, Clemmons, spoke against the resolution saying that this resolution promotes a seminary that brings diversity; that already there are seminaries that bring a diverse way of seminary education including Luther Rice, Covington, Mid-America and others; and that this resolution would diminish the six SBC seminaries. He urged the body to be forewarned about what is being considered.

204. Mr. Allard, Program Committee, moved that time be extended five minutes. The motion failed.

205. Ted Stone, Grace Church, Durham, on a point of order asked for a suspension of the rules since this resolution was not published in the *Biblical Recorder* in advance of the convention.

206. Second Vice President Lolley stated that the resolution was published in the *Biblical Recorder* in almost the same words as the resolution being considered and the intent is the same, and that 30-day notice was given to the committee in writing.

207. Tim Rogers, pastor, Dawson Church, Enfield, on a point of order stated that the resolution was printed in the Nov. 16, 1991 issue of the *Biblical Recorder* distributed at the convention and not mailed prior to the convention.

208. John Rogers, chairperson, Resolutions Committee, explained that when the resolution was received, copies were sent to all committee members and after their response, it was sent to the *Biblical Recorder* half a day late for publication. To accommodate this, it was to be published and distributed at the convention and it was available on Monday evening.

209. Tom Freeman, First Church, Dunn, moved that this resolution be laid on the table because no matter how the vote may be, there will be division; that this is a divisive issue and in the interest of peace, it should be laid on the table so vote will not have to be taken. The motion carried. (See No. 198)

210. Mr. Allard, Program Committee, moved an extension of five minutes

for additional resolutions. The motion carried.

211. Mr. Rogers, Resolutions Committee, reported that a proposed resolution on Ruschlikon Seminary is no longer needed because of previous action. (See Nos. 169, 176) Messengers were encouraged to write trustees of the Foreign Mission Board their concern.

212. On behalf of the Resolutions committee, Clay Warf, pastor, Temple Church, Durham, moved that the General Board be asked to study the purpose and value of resolutions as well as the specific function of the Resolutions Committee; that their findings and any recommendations concerning the role of resolutions in convention sessions be presented at the Baptist State Conven-

tion meeting in 1992. (See No. 216)

213. Speaking for the motion, Mr. Warf said that in recent years resolutions have diminished and at best, are an opinion poll of the messengers gathered and voting at a particular session of the convention; that resolutions are not binding on any church, they have very few, if any, teeth, yet considerable time and energy is spent on resolutions that frequently do no more than accentuate division; resolutions often receive more attention in the secular press than more substantive matters; that the committee has question about its role, whether to screen out controversial resolutions and serve as a peace-keeping agency or be a means through which any messenger may voice his or her particular concern; and that the entire matter of resolutions needs to be studied.

214. Bob Dutton, Naples Church, Carolina Association, spoke against the motion saying that despite the adversity, despite the varying beliefs of different people, this country was founded on the right of free speech; that a vote for this

motion would be limiting free speech.

215. A motion from the floor for the previous question, carried.

216. The Warf motion carried in a vote with ballots raised. (See No. 212)

217. Bill Caldwell, layperson, Bethany Church, Elizabeth City, moved that the Program/Place/Preacher Committee consider having the next unscheduled convention in the eastern part of the state which would include the Chapel Hill/Durham/Raleigh area. The motion carried.

218. Ed Beddingfield, First Church, Sylva, expressed appreciation that the

convention was held in the western part of the state.

219. Al Lineberry, layperson, First Church, Greensboro, moved that a letter be sent by Executive Director Smith expressing appreciation to the City of Asheville for being an excellent host city. The motion carried.

220. Victor Greene, pastor, First Church, Spruce Pine, moved that the Baptist State Convention respectfully request the trustees of the Foreign Mission Board to rescind their action and uphold our previous printed commitment for

1992 to Ruschlikon Seminary and European Baptists. (See No. 223)

221. Steve Hardy, pastor, Holly Hill Church, Burlington, trustee of the Foreign Mission Board, said a special meeting will be held to reconsider the matter of Ruschlikon; that there are several issues that need further consideration; that there is no need for further contact with the Foreign Mission Board because steps are already underway for reconsideration. Vice President Lolley

ruled these comments would be considered neutral and not for or against the motion.

222. Joel Jenkins, pastor, First Church, Salisbury, spoke in favor of the motion saying that his parents have just returned from a temporary appointment in Europe and that he visited Ruschlikon this summer and saw the good work being done there with students from several countries. He urged adoption of the motion.

223. The Greene motion carried in a vote with ballots raised. (See No. 220)

224. At the suggestion of Timmy Blair, pastor, Piney Grove Chapel, Angier, Vice President Lolley expressed appreciation to persons who served in the Persian Gulf War and those present were asked to stand. The assembly responded with applause.

225. Mr. Allard, chairperson of the Program/Place/Preacher Committee, expressed appreciation to messengers for their attendance at this last session which appears to be better attended than in previous years, to members of the committee, Ruth Williams in the state convention office, and his secretary, Patsy Deese. On behalf of the committee, he moved that the 1992 convention be held in Winston-Salem; that Al Miller, First Church, Clinton, be convention preacher with Robert Winecoff, East Church, Gastonia, alternate. The motion carried.

226. Mr. Owen reported for the Enrollment committee that as of midmorning, 5,319 messengers were registered with 425 visitors. He expressed appreciation for committee members and staff from the convention who assisted.

227. First Vice President Lolley expressed appreciation for President Watterson's dedicated service during his term of office, especially in view of serious illness and surgery during the summer. The assembly responded with applause.

228. President Watterson recognized new convention officers and their spouses and charged them with the responsibilities of office. He said it is a significant honor to be trusted by North Carolina Baptists; that there are Baptists who wish to know they will be treated fairly; that the lines of authority in the convention need to be clearly defined so that people know that it is the church in conference, composed of messengers from those churches; that the General Board is an elected group of servants of this convention and those churches. He paid tribute to the new president and the assembly responded with applause.

229. Mr. Holt expressed appreciation to the outgoing officers for their leadership and thanked the assembly for the confidence and trust bestowed on him through election to the office of president. He promised to try to be fair in the stewardship of this office, balanced in nominations and appointments that are his responsibility; inclusive of all people, men and women, representing the diversity of Baptist tradition. He pledged to be a servant and provide shared leadership with the offices of the convention working together as a team helping Baptists learn to listen to one another, accept, trust and love. These are days of challenge and concern, he said, but there is hope and faith and great promise for the future.

230. The 161st annual session was adjourned with the benediction by Mr. Holt.

### Independent Auditor's Report

Executive Committee of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina

We have audited the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities, and fund balances - cash basis of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina as of January 3, 1992, and the related statements of changes in general fund balances, receipts and transfers by fund, activity of restricted reserve funds, income and expenses of General Board and Convention, divisional summary of department income and expenses of General Board and Convention, and income, expenses, distributions, and fund balances - cash basis of the Education, Social Services Institutions, and Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute funds for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Convention's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as explained in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform our audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the Organization prepares its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements. This basis is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. The funds shown as sent direct on the statement of receipts and transfers by funds, were taken from reports received by the Convention and were not otherwise verified by us. Our examination as detailed by Note 2 was, in some instances, limited to recorded receipts.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matters referred to in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities, and fund balances of the Baptist State-Convention of North Carolina as of January 3, 1992, and its support, revenue, and expenses, and the changes in fund balances for the year then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

The financial information presented in Schedules 1 and 2 has been subjected to the same auditing procedures that were applied for the aforementioned financial statements. In our opinion, it is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole, although it is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and the results of operations of the Convention.

# BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION OF NORTH CAROLINA Notes to Financial Statements January 3, 1992 and January 4, 1991

### SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The Convention prepares its financial statements on the cash basis of accounting. Financial transactions are controlled by a budget passed by the Convention and accounted for within budgetary accounts. Distributions of income to Southern Baptist Convention areas or accounts and other external recipients are charged to the same period as the income.

- (a) Revenue and cost recognition Revenue and related expenses are recorded on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.
- (b) Inventories and prepaid expenses at year-end are recorded at cost. These amounts are not material and are recorded to conform to budget procedures. Expenditures for inventory-type items, prepaid expenses, and fixed asset outlays are recorded as expenses when charged to budgeted accounts.
- (c) Purchases of fixed assets and improvements are budgeted and charged to operating expenses. Assets are recorded at cost in the fixed assets accounts of the general fund with an offsetting fund balance account. Leasehold costs are amortized over the life of the leaseholds or extensions thereof. As required by the Financial Accounting Standards Board in Statement No. 93, depreciation is recorded over the useful life of the asset.
- (d) Notes and accounts receivable not involving income accruals are recorded.
- (e) Investments are recorded at cost. Earnings thereon are added to the investing fund. These earnings are applied to budgetary items upon approval of the General Board.

#### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES: (Continued)

- (f) The Convention contributes to retirement plans for its own employees and shares in the cost of plans of ministers and employees of participating Baptist churches in North Carolina. The retirement plans are administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Required contributions by the Convention for 1991 and 1990, as determined by the Annuity Board, were \$1,617,885 and \$1,600,634, respectively.
- (g) The Convention routinely receives contributions designated for specific uses. From time to time, the Convention or General Board designates certain funds for special purposes. All designations are recorded in restricted fund accounts so that charges to the accounts can be restricted to the designated purposes.
- (h) The Convention is a tax-exempt organization and does not, therefore, have to account for income taxes.

#### 2. FUNDS SENT DIRECT AND RECORDED RECEIPTS:

The funds shown as sent direct on the Statement of Receipts and Transfers by Fund, were taken from reports received by the Convention and were not otherwise verified by us. As a routine procedure, funds are received by the Convention business office from various departments within the Convention covering registration fees, miscellaneous sales, expense reimbursements, and other such items. Our examination of these items was limited to receipts as recorded in the business office receipts books. Our examination of receipts for the North Carolina Baptist Assembly, the Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute, and Caraway Baptist Conference Center and Camp, was limited to amounts recorded in prenumbered receipt books and did not include reconciliations to separate records of registrations, enrollments, and attendance

#### RESTRICTED RESERVE FUNDS:

Restricted reserve fund balances as reflected by Exhibit D amount to \$3,312,090 at January 3, 1992. These funds have been reserved for specific uses due to action of the General Board and Convention, or, in some instances, due to a designation accompanying the funds upon receipt.

#### 4. CONVENTION RESERVE:

The Convention (1976 Annual Session), recognizing the need for reserves to meet emergencies or decreased income, made provision for the establishment of a reserve fund as early as feasible. As a result the Convention Emergency Fund reserve has been set up. The fund's assets are being invested by the Baptist Foundation. The activity for 1991 was as follows:

# 10. NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST ASSEMBLY LOAN APPROVAL:

The Convention in its November, 1986 session approved borrowing up to and not to exceed \$2,000,000 to construct a conference center and two classroom buildings at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly. On August 2, 1989 a \$500,000 loan was obtained from NCNB with 119 monthly payments of \$6,356 including interest at the rate of 8.95%. The last payment on this note is due August 2, 1999. The balance on January 4, 1991 was \$453,563. The Executive Committee of the General Board voted to pay this loan in full at their January meeting. Principal of \$453,563 and interest of \$3,492 were paid on January 31, 1991.

#### 11. CONTINGENCIES:

By action of the General Board in 1979, the Convention is underwriting housing loans obtained from the Baptist Employees Credit Union for new Convention staff employees. The Convention is obligated to make yearly payments of principal and interest on loans up to \$5,000 for individual employees for up to a five-year period, or until the employees terminate employment. At January 3, 1992, the Convention was contingently liable on employee loan balances in the amount of \$24,000. By action of the General Board in September, 1986, the Convention has agreed to underwrite church loans extended through the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. up to a maximum of \$3,000,000 contingent upon written financial and legal documents being presented to the Executive Committee. As of January 3, 1992, the Convention was contingently liable on church loan balances in the amount of \$436,601.

#### 12. COMPENSATED ABSENCES

Employees of the Convention are entitled to paid vacation. It is impracticable to estimate the amount of compensation for future absences, and, accordingly, no liability has been recorded in the accompanying financial statements. The Convention's policy is to recognize the costs of compensated absences when actually paid to employees.

#### 13. FUNDS INVESTED BY BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Convention now relates to Wake Forest University through a fraternal relationship.

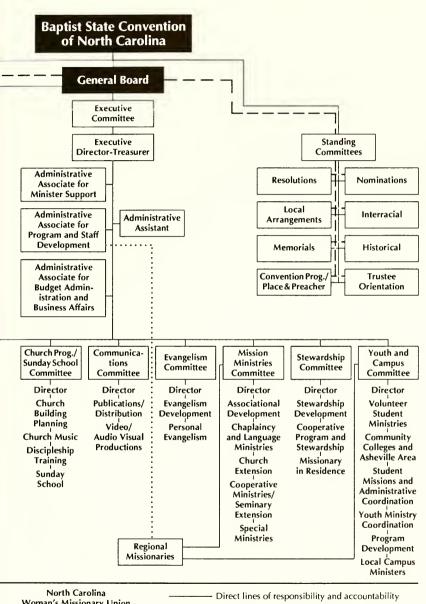

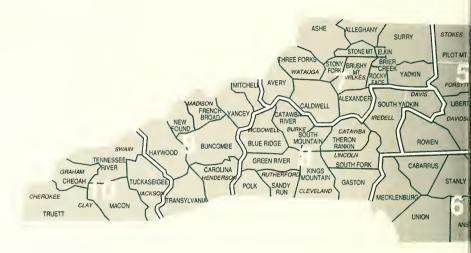

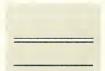
Constitution-specified working responsibilities
