CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereof: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk - Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W. M. U. President, Choir Director and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of

their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, which member shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a smaller Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday School, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and the distribution of the same; and to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association ad interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specific authority. It shall make an-

nual reports to the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886")

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible—the Old and New Testament—is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the Church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.

3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.

4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided by request of one member and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

6. When a question is under discussion no other motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.

7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.

8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.

9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized, "Parliamentary Practice," preferably "Roberts" or Kerfoots.

Proceedings

The Alleghany Baptist Association met with Sparta Baptist Church, Sparta, N. C. for its 58th Annual Session.

Saturday Morning, September 12, 1954, 10:00 A. M.

The Alleghany Baptist Association opened the first day of its 58th annual meeting with Van Miller, Moderating.

The session was opened with hymns, "Stand Up For Jesus" and "Come Thou Almighty King."

Rev. Jack W. Byrd conducted the devotional.

The following visitors were recognized and welcomed by the moderator.

The report of the Executive Committee was given by Chairman, A. O. Joines. The report was adopted.

The Moderator then read a letter from Bro. Ira T. Johnston of the Ashe Co. Baptist Association about both associations uniting in the interest of securing a missionary.

Report on Baptist publication by Mrs. Eugene Shepherd was read by Mrs. Walter Johnson. Report was adopted.

Report on W. M. U. by Mrs. R. E. Richardson. Report was adopted.

Mrs. Carl Barker, then gave an interesting talk of W. M. U. work in the association.

Report on evangelism by Rev. S. L. Blevins. Rev. W. P. Biggerstaff of the allied church league gave an address of the many evils of beverage alcohol and the money spent in North Carolina for whiskey and beer.

Report on missions by Mrs. A. O. Joines. The report was adopted, by the association.

R. K. Redwine gave an interesting address on the general work of our missions, their needs and benefits.

Hymn by congregation, "Savior More Than Life."

The Moderator then appointed the following committees.

Report was given on Evangelism by Rev. Jack Byrd. The report was adopted.

The Moderator then introduced Rev. C. H. McKnight, who preached the introductory sermon. He read from the 6th Chapter of St. Luke and using these four words for his text; "Can you limit God?"

The morning session was dismissed by Rev. M. H. Kindall.

Recess for Lunch.

Afternoon session opened with hymns by congregation, "I'll Live for Him." Rev. S. L. Blevins conducted the devotional. Rev. C. L. Walker led prayer.

The following visitors were then recognized and welcomed by moderator. Dr. W. K. McGee of Baptist Hospital; Rev. Rexford R. Campbell from Ashe Association; L. W. Sturdivant of New River Assoc.; Zelu A. Caudill of Home for Aged and Eugene Olive of Wake Forest College.

Report on Hospitals by Mrs. Paul Swanson. Report was adopted.

Dr. W. K. McGee then gave an address on the importance of Physical and Spiritual healing of the large number of members from this Association in our Baptist hospital. He also urged that this Association try to give more money to the hospital.

Report on Christian education by H. E. Singletary. The report was adopted.

Rev. M. H. Kendall then brought greeting from Mars Hill College and gave a report of the many nationalities that were enrolled there.

Eugene Olive gave a discussion on the Wake Forest College.

Zeb A. Caudill, Supt. of the Home for the Aged, Albermarle, N. C. then gave an interesting address of the needs, "Spiritual and Physical" our Baptist Aged require.

Report on Vacation Bible School by Rev. W. M. Hamm. The report was adopted.

E. C. Minnich gave a report on the American Bible Society. The report was adopted.

Hymn by congregation.

Report of committee on time, place and preacher, by C. G. Richardson, Chairman, Time, Sept. 10-11; Place, Mt. Carmel Baptist Church; Preacher, Rev. R. R. Campbell.

Rev. R. R. Campbell gave an address on the need of Ashe and Alleghany Associations securing the services of a Missionary. A discussion on this followed.

A motion was made by E. C. Minnich that we cooperate with Ashe Association. A vote was then taken by Association which was unanimously favorable.

Saturday session was then dismissed by Rev. Edgar Castevens.

Sunday morning session September 12, 1954 — 10:00 a. m.

The session opened with the congregation singing hymns "Holy, Holy, Holy" and "I Am Thine O Lord."

The Devotional was conducted by Rev. C. H. McKnight who read from the 4th chapter of Ephesians and took his text from the following words of the 3rd verse: "In the Bond of Peace."

The moderator then welcomed the following visitors.

Dr. and Mrs. Wayland of Wake Forest College; Morris Grant of Baptist Orphanage.

Report of Associational Sunday Schools by Walter P. Johnson. The report was adopted.

After a standing introduction of four young boys from the Orphanage by Morris Grant, he read a few verses from the 1st Chapter of Luke, taking his text from the 36th verse. What Manner of Child will this be? He preached an inspiring sermon.

Report on Orphanages by Mrs. Ray Purlier, Read by Mrs. C. G. Richardson, report was adopted.

Report of resolution committee was made by Mrs. A. O. Joines. The report was adopted.

Hymn by Congregation, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Following this the Sparta Choir sang a special hymn.

The inspirational speaker was Dr. John T. Wayland, former pastor of the 1st Baptist Church of North Wilkesboro and Professor of Religious Education at South Eastern Baptist Theological Siminary, Wake Forest. His subject was "The Supreme Beatitude," using the scripture "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

The 58th session closed with hymn by congregation, "Take My Life and Let It Be." Followed by handshake of fellowship.

REPORT ON AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

"Your English Bible speaks to my head, but my Chinese Bible speaks to my heart." These words of a Chinese student express a missionary principle true in all lands:

Every person must have the Bible in his own language if the Word of God is to speak to his heart.

The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. He uses it in every form of mission work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave and keep on working in a man's heart.

The American Bible Society aids in Bible translation, publishes the scriptures without note or comment and distributes them without profit, usually below cost. In cases of special need at home and abroad, they are given without charge. Scriptures for the blind are supplied in raised-letter systems and on talking book records. The society serves every form of Southern Baptist mission work around the world.

During 1953 the American Bible Society —
— distributed throughout the world more than 15 million volumes of scriptures.

— in the U. S. A. distributed 9,726,391 scripture volumes in 81 languages.

— helped the Japan Bible Society to continue its systematic program of widespread distribution of the scriptures in that land.

— continued to supply scriptures in Korea, through the Korean Bible Society, for civilians, military personnel and prisoners of war.

— strengthened its work throughout Latin America, where scripture distribution by thousands of volunteer workers is producing outstanding missionary results.

— supplied some 500,000 volumes of scriptures for refugees in Western Germany and materials for 400,000 Bibles and treatments in iron curtain countries.

— provided 1,301,145 scripture volumes for our own Armed Forces, bringing the number supplied since 1940 to more than 12 million volumes.

— received gifts which made possible its largest budget — and adopted for 1954 an even greater program to meet expanding needs for scriptures around the world.

Southern Baptists' Part In The Work

In 1953, Southern Baptist churches gave \$102,010 to the American Bible Society.

Gifts from churches of all denominations totaled \$785,897. Southern Baptist gifts continued to stand in second place, exceeded only by Methodist gifts of \$148,724.

REPORT ON BAPTIST PUBLICATIONS

Never before have Baptists had such opportunities to promote the Lord's work through vital christian literature. The printed page is powerful. People tend to become like the things they read and absorb in their minds and hearts. The flood of bad literature has spread over our land, with almost every newstand, drug store, bus station, and even grocery stores, selling objectionable comic books, bad magazines, lurid books and periodicals, that the U. S. mails refuse to carry. This bad literature very often finds its way into Baptist homes, and its pages are filled with seeds of evil. Wider reading of good Christian literature would soon destroy the thirst for the bad. Baptists have a great opportunity — to provide the best reading matter they can get for their homes.

At the top of the list of Christian literature should come the Bible. Other literature from our own presses are the following:

"Charity and Children," a publication from our orphanage.

"The Commission," a publication on Foreign Missions.

"For Home Missions," Open Windows, may be used in our homes for devotional reading.

Literature from our Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., used in our Sunday Schools.

Woman's Missionary Union literature which is so educational for young and old. The Biblical Recorder our state denominational paper is probably the most important publication to N. C. Baptists. It covers the entire field of our Baptist work. Without our state Baptist paper successful promotion of our Lord's work in all Baptist channels would be well nigh impossible. Wise pastors, associational missionaries, consecrated Baptist leaders have over the years promoted its circulation; and they have rejoiced to see the fruits of much good reading. People always do more when they know more. As they read they lead. As they are informed they are inspired. People usually are not interested in, will not support that which they do not know about.

May we earnestly urge all pastors, deacons, superintendents, W. M. U. leaders and others to work faithfully to keep our best literature in every home possible and insist that it be read with diligence.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGES

The Catholics have said that if it were not for Southern Baptists, they could win the entire nation. So as true Christians may we through prayer and meditation, renew our efforts toward all that Southern Baptists stand for. Let us give and give gladly to support our mission work.

Surely there is no worthier cause among these than our

orphanages which are engaged in producing human, rather than financial dividends.

As you know we have the Mills Home at Thomasville, the Kennedy Home near Kinston. These homes are managed by a very balanced board of trustees, with W. C. Reed as superintendent. More than 800 children are cared for through the facilities of the two homes. Altogether this year has been very successful since new cottages have been completed and around 70 more children are being cared for than at this time last year.

Each week "Charity and Children" goes into 40,000 homes. Through this publication we are able to keep informed of the work done at the orphanages.

MISSIONS REPORT

The spirit of missions whether state, home, or foreign is the same. There are two passages of scripture which we should keep in our thinking about missions. Jesus said, "The field is the world." Matt. 13:28, and Paul says in Ephesians 6:12, "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood but against principalities, against powers, against rulers of the darkness of the world, against spiritual wickedness in high places." Jesus was speaking about people who live in the world and Paul was assuring us that winning the world to Christ is a spiritual warfare. Christ spoke of His Kingdom as being world wide. He used the terms, "all the world," "every creature," "the whole creation."

STATE MISSIONS

The object of state missions is to win the people of North Carolina to Christ as Saviour and lead them into church fellowship.

From a very small beginning state mission is now carrying on a large and varied program. Last year our State Convention reorganized for administrative purposes and Dr. E. L. Spivey was selected as secretary of the state missions department. His definite line of work includes various activities. Among them are: Evangelism, missionary pastors, Baptist Student Union, work at institutions, Sunday Schools, Training Union, ministry to silent people, language groups, etc.

A survey reveals that there are two million lost souls in North Carolina. Is it not time to be about our Father's business?

HOME MISSIONS

The home mission board of the Southern Baptist Convention is charged with mission work in the area of the Southern Baptist. It is composed of twenty-two states and four outpost. (Cuba, Panama, Canal Zone and Alaska).

Dr. Courfs Redford is secretary with headquarters in Atlanta. During 1953 the Home Mission Board had 937 regular missionaries who reported 31,849 conversions, and 284 newly constituted churches. Through the years, since its organization in 1845, the home mission board has organized one-third of the churches within its bounds.

The radio hour sponsored weekly is estimated to reach 11,000,000 people listening.

The board is sending missionaries endeavoring to reach the 263,000 Indians, who have a peculiar claim on us because the white man took from them their land and natural resources. The best way to pay this debt is to give them the Lord Jesus Christ, who is a treasure far greater than anything they formerly had.

The Home Mission Board would like to call on Baptist throughout the Convention to size the urgency of home missions task, and pledge anew their prayers and support in meeting the challenge confronting it.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Southern Baptist have a world wide ministry. Foreign Missions is the term applied to the work we are doing in lands other than our own. Space does not permit a lengthy discussion of the work being done in Europe, Africa, Near East, Latin America, the Orient, and Isles of the seas in detail. It includes preaching, teaching, healing and helping those in need. Efforts are being made to train native Christians for places of leadership in the work, then if for any reason missionaries are withdrawn evangelism may go on.

Dr. James Baker Cauthan, of Richmond, Virginia, is Foreign Mission secretary, since the death of Dr. T. M. Rankin.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Baptist of North Carolina have reason to be proud of their efforts in the field of Christian Education. Locally the Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood are doing a wonderful job of Christian Education in our churches, yet the surface has only been scratched.

Baptist in North Carolina own seven colleges with a total

enrollment of 4,771 students. Last year 433 were being trained for the ministry and 236 for Mission Volunteer work.

Wake Forest and Meredith are four year colleges while Mars Hill, Wingate, Gardner Webb, Campbell and Chowany are Junior colleges.

Through the cooperative program, North Carolina Baptist contributed 417,606.00 of the \$4,000,000.00, the total operating cost of these seven colleges, the remaining cost came from students fees, endowments incomes, and other gifts. We only pay half of the operating cost.

It seems that Baptist of this state and south have a wonderful opportunity to continue to forge ahead in the field of Christian Education. May each one of us do our part in this worthy undertaking.

As a consequence, it takes about twenty people in the average church an entire to win one person to Christ and salvation. The result is that progress is to slow, and the impact and influence of our message is not as fully felt as it might be."

Surely the words of Mr. Sullivan are tragically true of us in Alleghany Association. In the coming year let us seek more earnestly to win the lost to Christ. This can be done more effectively by increasing our army of soul winners and by increasing the prospects for evangelism. Let us make this coming year one of our best for Christ.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereof: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk - Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W. M. U. President, Choir Director and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, which member shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a smaller Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday School, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and the distribution of the same; and to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association ad interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specific authority. It shall make annual reports to the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886.")

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head—the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible—the Old and New Testament—is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the Church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.
3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.
4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided by request of one member and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.
5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.
6. When a question is under discussion no other motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.
7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.
8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.
9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized, "Parliamentary Practice," preferably "Roberts" or Kerfoots.

REPORT ON BAPTIST PUBLICATIONS

The printed page has great power. Its message can go to many places where the spoken word and sermons cannot be heard.

Christian Literature is a mighty force for good in promoting the Lord's work and in sowing seeds of righteousness in the minds of people today. The Devil also uses the power of the printed word today

as never used before. There is a vast flood of literature that promotes paganism, worldliness and downright evil thoughts and deeds. Some of these things often get into Baptist homes. This shouldn't be. We should seek out and use good Christian Literature that is to be had today.

We have an excellent variety that comes from the Baptist presses. The Baptists have a fine array of wholesome inspiring literature for all ages. The aim of it all is to inform the people and enlist them in God's work; to indoctrinate them in Baptist truths; to uphold the Bible and its teachings, and to point out the great sweep of Baptist work that claims the finest efforts of all who serve God. Christian Literature must be read in our homes and churches if the whole program of Christ is to be carried out by Baptists working together.

When the North Carolina Baptist Convention was organized in 1830, its main purpose, as stated in its Constitution, was: "The promotion of missions, education, social service, and the distribution of sound religious literature."

Shortly afterwards in 1833, the "Biblical Recorder" was founded, and for a period of 122 years it has borne the true message of Baptist life, growth and thought in North Carolina. No Baptist home in North Carolina is outside the reach of the "Recorder" each week. It should be in every Baptist home in our state.

The Bible should top the list of literature in our homes, and among the literature that comes from our presses beside the "Biblical Recorder," is the literature from our Baptist Sunday School Board used in our Sunday School work. W. M. U., Royal Service, The Commission, a publication on Foreign Missions, "The Home Life," a Christian Family magazine for Home Missions, (Open Windows), "Charity and Children," a publication from our orphanage, and many others.

We must all work together in the will of God as we strive to promote every cause dear to the hearts of our Baptist people.

REPORT OF W. M. U.

There is a mingled feeling of gratitude and regret as this report of Woman's Missionary Union is brought to the Association again. We are indeed grateful to God for leading those persons into more consecrated service which has made possible the gains in membership, giving, observance of seasons of prayer, mission study and community missions.

Our present membership is 119 or an increase of 20% and the same rate of increase is noticed in the amount of our gifts over last year which total \$243.51. Much of the credit for these increases is due the Young People's organizations. There is a new G. A. at Liberty

and three girls from the Association attended the Regional G. A. Camp at Camp Butler this summer, where they had an opportunity to be influenced by religious leaders and missionaries.

The Sparta W. M. S., under the leadership of Mrs. Will Johnson, is to be commended for nearing its goal of becoming standard this year for the first time. The W. M. U. is fully graded except for a Y. W. A. organization.

Our annual meeting was held with Sparta church and we were honored and delighted to have our State W. M. U. President, Mrs. Gordon Maddrey and Miss Carol Leigh Humphries as our guest speakers. Mr. and Mrs. Earl C. James of Elkin were also present and took part on the program.

In June Mrs. Van Miller, Associational Mission Study Chairman, Mrs. C. G. Richardson, Young People's Leader and your W. M. U. Superintendent, attended the Executive Council meeting at Meredith College, Raleigh, and received much information and inspiration.

Community Missions is a very important phase of our plan of work as women allow God's will to be their purpose in their local communities. "They should have an earnest desire to learn what and how to do for Christ and apply the principles of Christ in personal service right where they live and thereby exemplify Christian character in action and proclaim the message of Christ in attitudes and deeds." (Quotation from State C. M. chairman).

Although what we do may seem very small, if we are willing to be used for Christ, He is able to make our little a blessing.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

In North Carolina, in addition to the Southeastern Seminary on the Wake Forest College campus, we have seven Baptist colleges with a total enrollment of approximately 6,000 young people, 750 of whom are training for the ministry and mission service.

Unfortunately, N. C. Baptists are not providing as much financial assistance for the young man or young woman enrolled in one of these colleges as Southern Baptists provide for the seminary student — which is \$535.00. In fact, this year — 1955 — our cooperative program budget is expected to provide an amount which will average a little more than \$150 per student for both operating and capital purposes in our seven N. C. Baptist colleges. The seven include Wake Forest, Meredith, Mars Hill, Campbell, Gardner-Webb, Wingate and Chowan.

Wake Forest will be moved in June 1956 to Winston-Salem and the Southeastern Seminary will then take over all the property of

the campus at Wake Forest. All of these seven colleges are in building and expansion programs, trying to provide for the ever increasing number of students wanting to attend Baptist colleges.

North Carolina Baptists are doing a great deal in providing more for the capital needs of their colleges. May each of us do our part as a North Carolina Baptist.

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Sunday School is the most important organization in the church. The basic principle of Sunday School is the early Christian training of our youth. From our youth of today comes the leaders of tomorrow.

It is gratifying to know that every church in the Alleghany Association has an organized Sunday School and that good work is being done. We need to make the good better and the better best. This can be done by the consecrated efforts of workers, teachers and church members interested in a better Sunday School. The present enrollment is 650 with an average attendance of 400.

In almost every place where a live Sunday School operates, a flourishing, progressive church is seen. It is an organization where every child of God can take part and do something for the Master. It is here that gentleness, kindness, courage, faith and love are taught as assets of a strong moral Christian character.

Let's build better Sunday Schools for better church timber, better citizenship, better service for God and a higher conception of our duty to God and man.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Travel to a desert area in northwest India. Stand with a group of men gathered around a young Christian layman working as a government surveyor. He is using an opportunity to tell the good news of Jesus Christ to men who never heard the Gospel before.

As the young man speaks of the Bible, one of his older listeners asks, "Is that book in my language?" When told that it is, he exclaims, "Young man, get me that book!" Holding the book in his hands and opening his heart to its message of the Savior, he asks the searching question, "Why didn't someone bring us the book long ago?"

The old man's question stirs our hearts to take the Bible to the millions who still wait — and emphasizes this missionary principle which is true around the world:

Every person must have the Bible in his own language if the Word of God is to speak to his heart.

Giving the Bible to the people of the world in their languages is a missionary task. The American Bible Society aids in Bible translation, publishes the scriptures without note or comment and distributes them — without profit and usually below cost — for mission work around the world. For the blind, it supplies Scriptures in raised-letter systems and on talking book records.

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists in their world-wide mission program; it serves every form of mission work at home and abroad.

During 1954 the American Bible Society distributed throughout the world more than 15 million volumes of Scriptures.

Donated 1,360,604 Scripture volumes for the Armed Forces, providing a vital link between the home churches and the members of the Armed Forces.

Continued to supply Scriptures in many strategic areas, such as Germany and other countries along the "fringes" of the Iron Curtain, Africa, Latin America, Japan, Korea and India — and to millions of Chinese in the countries of East Asia and Southeast Asia, outside the Communist-controlled China mainland.

Received gifts which provided for the largest budget in its history and adopted for 1955 an even larger program to serve more of the millions who still wait for the Word of God — keenly conscious that missionary advance, through increased Scripture distribution, waits only for needed funds!

In 1954 Southern Baptist churches set a new record by giving \$112,064 to the American Bible Society and stood second only to Methodist gifts of \$155,109. Gifts from churches of all denominations totaled \$826,721.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY BAPTIST VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS

Brother Moderator and members of the Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association:

We as an associational body, should be ashamed of the fact that we have been so dilitary and negligent in the promotion of our Vacation Bible Schools, here in one of the most prosperous and well balanced counties to its size in the State of North Carolina as wealth and material things are concerned. In that we now have three industrial factories working full time in our county, and also we are still prosperous in our livestock and tobacco farming, which makes us a well balanced county between industry and farming.

We have also built more homes that are beautiful and costly during the past five years than ever before, and at the same time we are neglecting the house of the Lord and not properly training our children in knowledge of the Bible; and the Vacation Bible School is one of our main ways of teaching it during school vacation.

Five days per year is a short time to study the Bible in comparison to nine months for our regular schools, and yet if five men and five women locally from each church would be willing to give three hours per day, this group could work out a joint program, from which children can receive spiritual food for all their future years.

However we should not have as an excuse, the non availability of such a worker from the State Board, but we should realize as individuals our responsibility and accept the challenge, and move forward in the fields of more consecrated, and sacrificial effort in service for the Kingdom of God.

Total schools in county, 5. Total attendance, 215.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The 1954-1955 academic year was for Southern Baptist Educational institutions a period of significant achievements. Most noteworthy are the gains made in enrollment, in cooperative effort and study, in organized financial support and in recognition among Southern Baptists.

Enrollment of regular students in Southern Baptist schools and colleges reached an all-time high of 50,080 during 1954-1955. Cooperative program support of Southern Baptist Educational institutions increased by 19%.

As Southern Baptists we know there is an ever-growing need for increasing the number and enlarging the present theological seminaries. In addition to our five Southern Baptist seminaries, we aid the Seminary for Negroes in Nashville and the Carver School of Missions and Social Work. In these seven institutions there are 5782 students studying for Christian Service. Southern Baptists in this convention year 1955 propose to give to these seven seminaries a total of \$3,095,225.00 from the cooperative program funds for an average of \$535 per student.

REPORT ON HOSPITAL

Our North Carolina Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem ministers to the sick from all parts of the state.

We believe when Christ said to teach all nations he also meant for his Disciples to minister to the sick and helpless according to the teachings of the New Testament, and the work of Christ while here on earth. Now the work is left in our hands. Will we North Carolina Baptists show our brotherly love and compassion for the sick by making the North Carolina Baptist Hospital a monument of love and mercy and an honor to the work of Christ? Our hospital will only be as great as we make it.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

Evangelism as such became an organized and adopted part of our Cooperative Program when the Southern Baptist Convention met at St. Louis in 1947, according to Dr. C. E. Mathews, secretary of Evangelism for our home mission board, an all time record in Baptisms for

Southern Baptist Convention was realized in 1947, with 285,152 and in 1950, 376,085. Last year according to our general minutes there were 35,702 in the State of North Carolina.

In the Piedmont Association there were 1884, the largest addition of any association in the state, but short of what we should be doing, according to the figures it takes a fraction over 22 Baptists in the state to win one soul to Christ. Surely we need to see our one and one-half million lost souls in North Carolina, our thirty-nine million in the South, and near two billion lost souls in the world.

To bring this picture home to us here in the Alleghany Association you have a population of around eight thousand, and so far as we know 60% or perhaps more of them are lost to the saving Grace of our Saviour. Surely today we need to rededicate our lives to the task of Evangelism.

Lift up your heads said Jesus and look on the fields for they are white and ready to harvest.

REPORT ON MISSIONS

The Heart of God as revealed in Christ inevitably leads on to all men. The heart — hunger of men calls for the best, and God is the best. Jesus announced that God's love had given Him to the world that the world should be saved through Him by getting eternal life through faith in Him. He came to give men God and the life of God. Hence Christianity means that "God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto Himself, not reckoning their transgressions unto them, and having committed unto us the message of reconciliation." It is the consciousness of this heart-hunger of all men that must ever constrain those who have fed on the "Bread of Heaven" to go to their fellowmen with the supreme blessing. Only in this spirit do we have Christian missions unmingled.

STATE MISSIONS

The task of State Missions is to win the lost in North Carolina to a saving knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Under our able secretary, Dr. E. L. Spivey, our department of State Missions is carrying on an aggressive program to win the lost in our state.

HOME MISSIONS

Our Home Mission work is directed by Dr. Courts Redford, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of The Home Mission Board. He reports that "the past year closed a special 5-year crusade in Home Missions." The workers of the Home Mission Board have increased from 754 regular and 271 student missionaries.

Some of the results of the 5 years as reported by missionaries of

the Board were as follows:

167,247 professions of faith; 1,440 new churches constituted; 2,974 missions started, and 131,527 added to the churches. During the five years, Southern Baptists have baptized an average of 1,000 persons per day; have added 1,200 per day by letter; have given approximately \$5,000,000.00 per week for the Lord's work and have constituted an average of 11 new churches per week.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Dr. Baker James Cauthen, secretary of our Foreign Mission Board reports that at the end of 1954, 949 missionaries were under appointment. This shows a new gain of 41 for the year. The Board has set a realistic goal 1,000 missionaries under appointment by the end of 1955. He states, "we have every confidence of reaching this immediate goal, with God's help." The times demand that Southern Baptist enlarge their world witness far more rapidly than they have in the past. While our immediate goal is 1,000 missionaries, our long range goal is 1,750 missionaries. Even when this is reached, we shall be only in the initial stages of exerting a worthy witness for Christ around the world.

Christian missions then are becoming even more the method by which the followers of Jesus Christ serve Him in His undertaking, by regeneration and reconciliation to create out of the broken fragments of humanity "one new human race," for "If any man is in Christ there is a new creation. Old things have passed away, lo, they have become new."

ORPHANAGE REPORT

The true greatness of any people is measured largely in terms of the care, the training and religious attitudes it gives its children. At no other time in the history of the orphanage, have the children's needs been more adequately met than they were during the past year.

During the year 1955, our Baptist orphanage cared for a total of 713 children. Services were rendered to 600 other children.

Mary Presson, from Hertford County, was the first child admitted to the Baptist Orphanage on November 11, 1885. Since that memorable day, over 6,000 youngsters like Mary have been admitted to the Baptist Orphanage receiving care and training.

There are two childrens homes, Mills Home at Thomasville with 330 children and Kennedy Home near Kinston with 170 children. For seventy years the Baptist Orphanage has opened its doors to children in need.

We must continue to minister to the needs of these homeless, helpless children. Let us continue to donate liberally to orphanage and

child care funds, thus fulfilling the commands of our blessed Savior when He said, "Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of heaven."

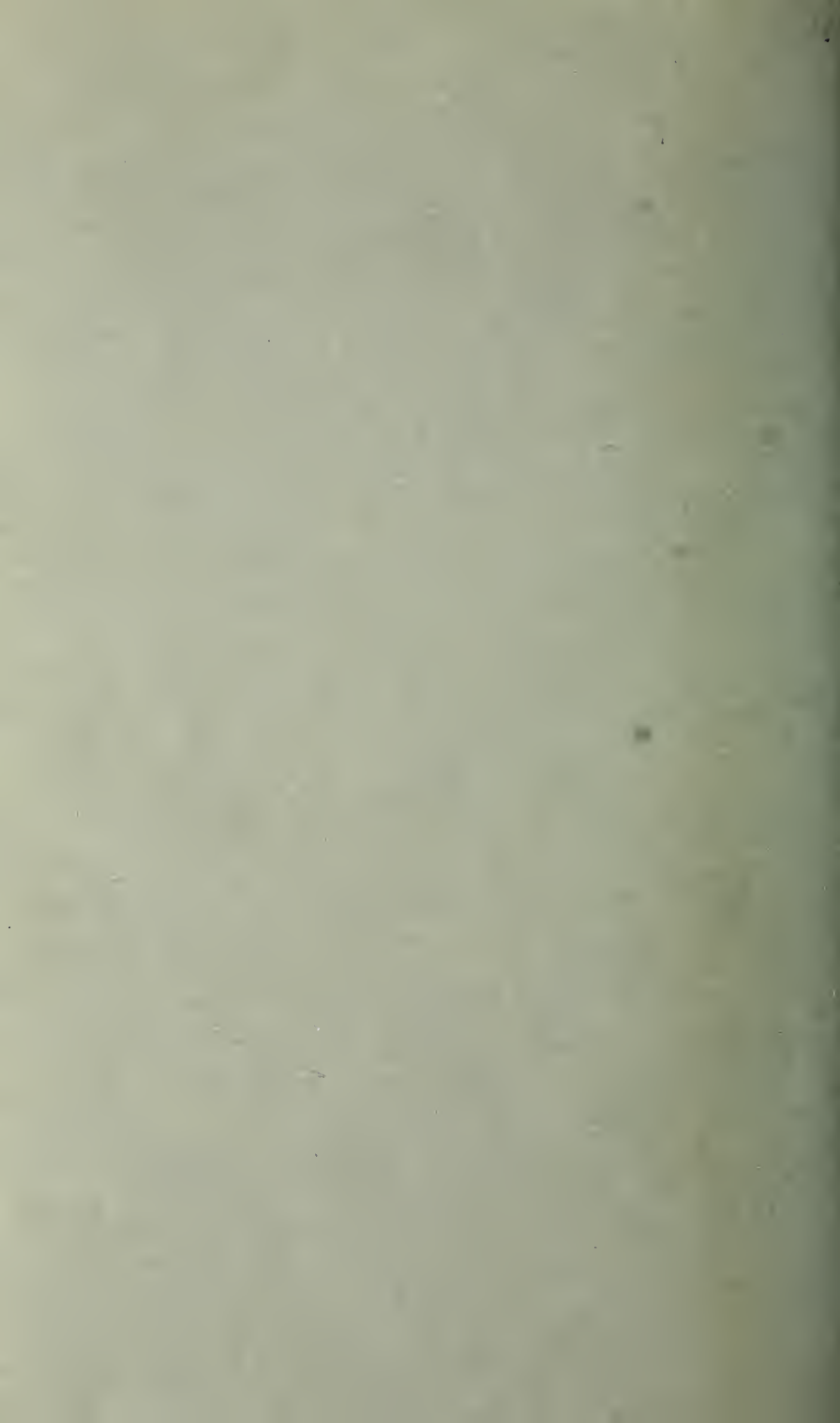

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereof: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time

and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk - Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W. M. U. President, Choir Director and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, which member shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a smaller Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday School, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and the distribution of the same; and to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association and interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specific authority. It shall make annual reports to the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886")

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head—the Father the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible—the Old and New Testament—is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the Church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.

3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.

4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided by request of one member and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

6. When a question is under discussion no other motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.

7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.

8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.

9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized, "Parliamentary Practice," preferably "Roberts" or Kerfoot's.

REPORT OF STATE, HOME, AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

Jesus said unto his disciples, "But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Acts 1:8.

Jerusalem to you and me is our home community, the place we live. Judaea is North Carolina, State Missions. Samaria is the United States, Home Missions. "And unto the uttermost part of the earth," is world missions, Foreign Missions.

Now, all three types of missions is Bible based, now do we carry this great program out? In North Carolina we have a program of State Missions that embodies seventeen different areas of service in the name of Jesus. This work is under the able leadership of Dr. E. L. Spivey, State Mission Secretary. This work includes sponsoring Sunday School And Training Union, missionary pastors, associational missions, institutional work, work among special groups, purchase of church lots, operation of summer assemblies, and winter preachers' schools. A report last year reveals that 60 per cent of North Carolinians are not Christians. May we labour now, for the time will come when we can no longer work.

Also as Southern Baptist we believe in Home Missions. Our Home Mission Board is located at Atlanta, Ga. The Executive Secretary-Treasurer is Dr. Courts Redford. Under the sponsorship of this board we are represented for Christ to the Chinese, French, Indians, Italian, Negroes, and Spanish speaking people here in the United States. It also sponsors work for the deaf, Good-Will Centers, Rescue Homes, and Jewish Evangelism and Migrant Missions. Also we have work in the Panama Canal Zone and Cuba.

We as Southern Baptist are carrying out the last phase of Christ's command on missions through the Foreign Mission Board located at Richmond, Va. Dr. Baker James Cauthen is the executive secretary.

We should not be satisfied with only our State and Home Mission but should choose to launch on a world-wide program of missions. Quoting from an article in "The Commission," a magazine of the Foreign Mission Board, the September issue. "For a message to take to a lost world is no problem. The gospel of Christ Jesus, the world Saviour, is our message. The problem is not a message, but a messenger for every neighborhood on the globe! Despite the progress already made, many of the world's peoples have not yet heard a preacher (missionary) of this saving gospel. Why not? Because we and others equally negligent have not sent missionaries! May we look at some disillusioning facts?

At the end of last year eight and one-half million South-

ern Baptist had only 1,020 missionaries in foreign lands. It took, therefore, 8,000 Southern Baptist to support one missionary.

2. Last year these eight and one-half million Southern Baptist gave a total of \$335,000,000 for all phases of Baptist work.

3. Of this amount only \$43,500,000, or 14.5 per cent, was sent to the state convention treasurers for work carried on in the states, in the homeland, and on foreign fields.

4. Of the total \$335,000,000, or 85.5 per cent, was used by the churches for local expenses or designated by them for local missions (city and associational).

5. And only \$10,832,935, or 3.2 per cent, was given for our foreign mission program in thirty-five countries and territories. (The Board's total income in 1955, including miscellaneous receipts, was \$11,103,268.)

6. In other words, each Southern Baptist gave only \$1.29 for foreign missions in 1955. Can we not find here ample reason for our not sending missionaries that men may hear the gospel and believe on our Lord?"

Alleghany gave in 1955 for State, Home and Foreign Missions \$373 or an average of \$0.61 per resident member of our eleven churches. Or during the same period \$1032 for all causes outside the local church. This would be \$1.68 per resident member. Alleghany Baptist have given \$539.36 for all convention causes during the first six months of 1956. This is a total of \$0.96 per resident member.

Elmer S. West, Jr. wrote an article entitled "Greatest Need in Missions Advance." This appeared in the June issue of The Commission. He concluded by saying, "When concern for missions is cultivated, information is shared, prayers are offered up to God, a challenge is presented and decisions called for—then decisions will be made. Lives will be dedicated, money laid on the altar, and, as a direct result, in some far away place the gospel will be heard and another life will find Christ. Missions is every Christian's business."

May we teach, preach and practice missions so that we may do our part to carry the mission message around the world. Christ is depending on you and me. May we be missionary Baptist.

REPORT OF HOME FOR THE AGING

The Homes are in their sixth, and greatest, year of operation.

Construction of the Administration and Dormitory Building began in February. It should be completed by the end of the year, and ready for occupancy by February 1, 1957.

North Carolina Baptists have good reason to be proud of this new building, which, when completed and equipped will add one-half million dollars to the total value of the Homes. What is more encouraging, there is reason to believe that the total cost of the new building will be paid for by the time it is occupied, if our 3,200 Baptist churches will respond with a generous Special Day offering on the third Sunday of February, 1957.

The added facilities of the new building will make it possible to care for 100 residents—20 at Resthaven, 36 at Albemarle Home, and 44 in the new building. Of this number, less than 10 will be part-time helpers. Moreover, a greater ministry to our aging residents will be possible because of the extra facilities in the new building. Among these will be ample space for craft shops, sun parlors, library, infirmary, and other additional features. In fact, the new building was planned and is being constructed to provide a well rounded program with the most up-to-date facilities.

The Special Day offering this year, to date, is \$88,400.03, including personal and corporation gifts. This amount will be increased by churches late in reporting their gifts. It is encouraging to know that the number of churches responding increases each year. Alleghany Association.

Resthaven and the Albemarle Home have been filled to capacity. When a vacancy occurs, which is rare, there is always a waiting list.

Effort was made in Winston-Salem during June and July to raise \$100,000 for the new building. In addition to the money raised, the response on the part of a large number of splendid business men to help with the campaign was most inspiring. The aroused interest in the program of the Homes will bring increasing results for years to come.

There has been a large number of building memorial gifts. They ranged from \$300 to \$3,000 — \$300 to furnish, \$1,000 to endow, and \$3,000 to pay cost of constructing, a room.

A trustee, Mr. Don G Matthews of Hamilton, gave, in addition to \$3,000 to construct a room in the new building,

\$1,378 to pay cost of excavating a lake on the grounds of the new building.

The year of 1955 was the best in service that our Baptist Hospital has ever had. Our churches gave the largest Mother's Day offering they ever made, and the hospital was able to serve more sick people than ever before. More than 115,000 days of bed patient care was rendered to almost 15,000 patients and more than 100,000 visits were made to the clinics and offices of the medical staff. The new south wing has been completed, and three new type X-ray machines have been installed.

The out-patient department has proved a blessing to thousands that were not able to pay for medical care.

The Baptist program of Christian Education includes:

1. The teaching ministry of the Christian home.
2. The local church with its varied programs.
3. The Baptist schools and colleges, supported by the convention.
4. Our South Wide Seminaries.

Our immediate consideration should be to make provisions for the ever increasing number of boys and girls in Southern Baptist territory. With increasing numbers, comes the need for expanded facilities. In our colleges in the Southern Baptist Convention, there were enrolled more than 55,000 young people last school year.

Here in North Carolina in our seven Baptist colleges, namely Wake Forest, Meredith, Mars Hill, Gardner Webb, Campbell, Wingate and Chowan, we had a total enrollment of 5,921 students last year. More than this number have already been accepted for this college year. North Carolina Baptists are second only to Texas in the number of students enrolled. Each of our seven Baptist colleges is now engaged in expanding its facilities in both class rooms and housing to meet the even growing student bodies.

Every effort is being made to operate good accredited col-

leges at the lowest possible cost, that the doors of education opportunity may remain open for all our young people, who wish to enter.

It is always timely to remind ourselves that we as Baptist must give our whole hearted support to our colleges, which are primarily operated for the purpose of training our Baptist Youth. North Carolina Baptist have made great strides, over the years, in making provisions for their boys and girls who wish to acquire a Christian education. May we continue to support, both with our prayers and our money these fine schools.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

There are many definitions for the word "evangelism," but the one I like most is given by W. E. Sangster in his little book "Let Me Commend." He says, "evangelism is going to the people outside. Again He said, "The son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." On another occasion Jesus said, "Joy shall be in Heaven over one sinner that repenteth, more than over ninety and nine just persons, which need no repentance." This then is evangelism. It required 14 church members in 1954 to win one lost soul to Christ, and in 1955 it took 20 church members to win one lost soul in our association. These statistics speak of more than mere figures. Translated, they represent effort. They are furthermore indicative of our concern for the lost about us. They also accurately gauge our evangelistic zeal and favor. These figures should make us realize that the great masses in our county are yet lost in sin. These statistics should challenge us to greater service as soul winners.

Jesus put this business of soul winning on an individual basis when he said to His disciples, "ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." In these words Jesus commissioned each follower individually. Can you hear Him speaking to you today? — You shall be my witness in your home community — in this county — in this state — and throughout the whole world. Let us be witnesses for Christ. Let's win souls for Jesus. Remember, "He that winneth souls is wise!"

U. and general progress and well being in all their services and accomplishments, so I concluded that the Sunday School is necessary in order to build a higher conception of our duty to our Lord and our fellowmen.

A good way to insure the right enforcement of laws is to elect dedicated men to fill the office. We encourage each church and association to promote a program of education concerning the alcohol problem, and help create a militant spirit against the sale and use of alcohol beverages.

The allied church league is doing a commendable work in encouraging law enforcement and fighting the sale and use of alcohol beverages. Films on alcohol education are available from Rev. W. P. Biggerstaff, 119 Hillsboro Street, Raleigh, N. C. The magazine "Tomorrow" is a strong voice against beverage alcohol and for civil righteousness. The committee on good government led by Rev. Cashwell, Sr. has been effective along these lines and we urge our people to stand up and be counted right where they are in the home, town, country.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereof: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the

developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers; Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W. M. U. President, Choir Director and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, which members shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a small Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday School, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superin-

tend the printing and the distribution of the same; and to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14 It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15 It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16 It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association and interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specified authority. It shall make annual reports to the Association of the general state of missions and the work done

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886")

1st. We believe in one only true and living God: and that there are three persons in the God-head — the Father the Son and Holy Ghost, and these three are one

2nd. We believe that the Bible — the Old and New Testament — is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thur baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of

the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.
3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.
4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided by request of one member and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.
5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.
6. When a question is under discussion no other motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.
7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.
8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.
9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.
10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized, "Parliamentary Practice" preferably "Roberts" or Kerfoots.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The Woman's Missionary Union has had for it's watchword through the years "Laborers together with God," taken from 1 Cor. 3:9. We also try to help carry out Christ's command of: "Ye shall be witness unto me both in Jerusalem and all Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Acts 1: 8.

While considering "Our Jerusalem" to be within the bounds of our own Alleghany Baptist Association we try to lay special emphasis on prayer as the undergirding force in the total life of the organization. This is done through encouraging worship in the home, individual and united prayer. Cottage and church prayer meetings, our calendar of prayer for all our missionaries on their birthdays, especially; and the seasons and weeks of prayer each year for State, Home and Foreign Mission, accompanied with our special offerings for the objects. Also, in the "Jerusalem" of our Association Community missions is carried on in the interest of the salvation of the lost, showing Christian fellowship to those in need or in sorrow and the strengthening of Christian Standards of living in the community. In addition, there is the work among our youth through their organizations and enlistment on which we fall so far short of our goal. We are still praying that others may "Lift up their eyes and look on the fields" and want to join our little band of about on hundred women and young people in this great business for our Lord.

As we think of the "In Judea" of Christ command we consider the same kind of work as it spreads out over our own state of North Carolina; through our gifts to the Heck-Jones Memorial Fund and our State Mission Season of Prayer and offering — which this year is being promoted by the whole church during the week of September 9-15. Last year our offering for these two causes was \$148.13. We hope to make it much more this year.

Our "Samaria" is our Home Mission Field about which we study a mission book each year and observe a special week of prayer as we study the work and give our offering for this phase of our work. The amount last March for Home Missions was \$122.90.

Finally, our minds, hearts and prayers were focused on "the uttermost part of the earth" last November and December by studying a Foreign Mission Book on Japan taught by Mrs. John Wacaster of Cherryville, our State Field Representative of the W. M. U. The first week in December we had our five day season of prayer and studied about our foreign missionaries; making us conscious of the need and how we

could help through our prayers and offerings, which are given each year in memory of Miss Lottie Moon, who gave her life that some of the people in China might know and love her Lord and ours, who gave Himself for us all. Our Lottie Moon Christmas Offering last year was \$494.41. There was an additional gift of \$52.25 to the Middleton Fund to help our own Regional Missionaries as they returned to their work in Chili, South America.

Our total gifts to all mission causes were \$546.66 as compared to \$75.71 ten years ago, but how we need more missionary-hearted women in all of our churches who are willing to say "Here am I, Lord! Use me."

We enjoyed the hospitality and fellowship with the women of Laurel Springs church as we met there for our annual meeting last May and were inspired to carry on by our guest speakers Mrs. A. L. Parker, Greensboro, N. C. State W. M. U. vice-president; Mrs. Robert Stanley, Jr., Missionary to Brazil and Mrs. Roy Davis, Regional Young People Leader, Mt. Airy, N. C. The next meeting is to be held with Sparta church next spring.

Jesus said, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world" Matt. 23: 19-20. Therefore, the Mission Program is Christ commanded, Holy Spirit directed and God planned program for winning lost people to Christ anywhere and everywhere in the world. Man has many methods, but it is God's Program.

As Southern Baptist we have Community, Associational, State, Home and Foreign Missions Program. We believe in winning the world to Christ at home and to the "uttermost part of the earth."

We practice community missions as we minister to those who need Christ and His Message in the home community, through evangelistic meetings, personal visitation and soul winning.

We have a part in associational missions as we aid the work with our leadership, prayers and material support.

Now, may we come to the broader means of missions: First, the State Mission Program that is under the capable

leadership of Dr. E. L. Spivey ministers in four broad areas, namely:

1. Teaching the Word of God and reaching the lost, this includes Sunday Schools, Vacation Bible Schools, Evangelism and Brotherhood.

2. Training the church members for Christian Living, Giving and Service, this takes in Baptist Training Union, Baptist Student Union Department of Church Music, Royal Ambassadors, Assemblies, Rural Church Work, Work with Negroes.

3. Assistance and Service to Pastors and Churches, which include Pastoral Support, Lots for New Churches, Audio-Visual Aids, Preachers' Schools, Church Planning, Fruitland Bible Institute.

4. Care-Concern and Conservation, this includes, Sanatorium Ministry, Baptist History, Student Loan Fund, Silent People, other races, Allied Church League and Church-State Separation.

These are your services through your Convention for the mutual benefit of all people, churches, and institution, to the limit of the resources that you make possible by your prayers and gifts through the State Missions Department.

Second, may we look at Home Missions: This work is under the leadership of Dr. Courts Redford. As we work through our Home Missions Board located at Atlanta, Ga., we minister to Chinese, Italian, Spanish-speaking Indians, Negroes, Jews, Japanese, Russians, and others providing missionaries, gifts and loans to erect church buildings, programs on missions and evangelism, conferences to help workers do a better job, information through films, news, exhibits, Home Mission Magazine, tracts and school of Missions. In 1956, we had 1,163 home missionaries, who won 35,000 lost people to Christ, help institute 400 new churches, and in beginning about 700 new missions and in the conducting of hundreds of Vacation Bible Schools. This work is carried to more people as you and I pray and support Home Missions

Third, may we look at Foreign Missions: This method carries the message of Christ to "uttermost part of the earth." This work is directed by Dr. Baker James Cauthen, the headquarters being at Richmond, Va.

Southern Baptist added three countries to our overseas fields in 1956, making the number of countries and territories 383. Total number of missionaries under appointment is 1,154 includes appointment through May 9, 1957

Our churches need to have a stewardship that is based on the world need for Christ thus making each church a vital supporting base for world Missions.

Alleghany churches gave in 1956 \$379.00 for State, Home and Foreign Missions or an average of \$0.62 per resident member. Or during the same period our churches gave \$1,933.00 for all purposes outside our local church or an average per resident member of \$3.17. May we as Alleghany Baptist follow the Scripture in John 4: 35b "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest" and begin being

Missionary in the fivefold scope of the Great Commission.

Mr. Barton gave a splendid oral report on Evangelism. No written report was available for the minutes.
- 11:30 Temperance — Rev. A. K. Taylor
The report on temperance was moved up and was given at this time by Mr. Taylor. A motion was made and second to adopt the report. Rev. R. M. Hauss, of the Allied Church League, spoke on the report. The report was adopted as follows:

TEMPERANCE REPORT

America must become sober! Of all nations of the earth America can least afford to continue to allow such a free flow of alcoholic beverages. The situation is such that alcohol can do more damage. For instance, we are a melting pot of people of all nationalities and colors, and race prejudice is widespread. Beer, wine and whiskey can and do so often, add fuel to the enflamed hatreds and cause fights and riots that could be prevented if it were not for alcohol. Still further, it is said that "America has implements of the world, and with machinery alcohol will not mix, except to bring disaster. Surely if any nation ever had a crying need for prohibition of liquor, it is America."

It was a dark day in recent American history when someone in a position of responsibility deliberately lied about the intoxicating effect of beer up to 3.2 per cent alcohol. There was a great number of people who wanted to believe this lie, and there were people who knew it was a lie, but they wanted to capitalize upon the weakness of many people. Thus in a subtle way beer became "respectable" in the eyes of many people. The downright cowardly way in which the beer industry is seeking to make habitual drinkers is nauseating to say the least.

There are many facts about our situation with regard to beer, wine and whiskey that cause us to mourn. We spend only three billion of dollars a year to educate and awaken the brain, and nine billion a year on alcohol to impair the brain and put it to sleep. Shakespeare said, "O that men should put an enemy in their mouth to steal away their brains." Someone else has said that all the history of alcohol is written in blood and tears. Beer, wine and whiskey have played a large part in putting America ahead in divorces and juvenile delinquency.

The alcoholic beverage industry has a history of rebellion and lawlessness. The first rebellion against our nation was the Whiskey Rebellion when George Washington was president. We should not be surprised when the liquor industry uses underhanded methods to trap your son or daughter, but we must be on the alert.

It is the clear duty of every Christian to totally abstain from the use of alcoholic beverages and to do what he or she

can to prevent the manufacture, sale, or use of the same.

1:45 Report on Baptist Hospital — Rev. W. M. Hamm.

Dr. W. K. McGee spoke on this report and the adopted report follows:

REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our North Carolina Baptist Hospital is dedicated to the service of those in need of medical service.

Once more it has set a record in its ministry to the sick. Last year it provided 123,000 days of bed care for 15,784 patients. There were 61,000 visits to out patients clinics. Patients came from 92 of the 100 counties in North Carolina. The new Bobalt machine is in full operation, providing treatment for about 35 cancer patients each day.

The Alleghany people received \$3,250.00 dollars of free service at our Baptist hospital last year while the churches only gave \$230.75 for this worthy cause.

I do hope our people will see how much we need to do more for this worthy cause "For as much as ye do it to the least of my brethern, ye do it unto me."

2:00 Report on Christian Education — Rev. Jack Byrd.

Mr. Byrd's report was followed by an address on Christian Education by Dr. Robert Holt. The following report was adopted:

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

North Carolina Baptists can be justly proud of their seven very fine colleges with an enrollment last year of 5,377 students. The enrollment this year will no doubt be even greater.

It is rather interesting to note that there was more than 15 per cent increase in enrollment in our Baptist colleges last year over the previous year of 1955. This is almost double the 8 per cent increase in the enrollment in State supported institutions for white for this college year above that of last. This indeed is a healthy sign. It means that more and more of our fine young people are seeking institutions of higher learning with a wholesome Christian atmosphere. This will make for a better world tomorrow. These young people will receive Christian training in our Baptist Colleges that will influence them throughout all their lives.

We Baptists in Alleghany are happy that we play a role in helping our Baptist colleges to function. We shall continue to support them in every way we can

2:30 Report on Home for the Aging was given by A. O. Joiner. Rev. J. M. Hayes told about the new building at Winston-Salem, and about some of the care the aging were receiving. The following report was seconded and adopted.

REPORT ON N. C. BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING

This, the seventh year of operation of the Baptist Homes for the Aging, has been the greatest year of expansion, thanks to our Lord for His continued favor, and the North Carolina Baptists for their increased support.

The new Administration and Residential Building was opened June 13. All rooms are now occupied, except four in the infirmary, which are reserved for residents who will need them.

The new building increased facilities to 112 residents, counting residents at Resthaven and the Albemarle Home. It, also, added half a million dollars to the value of the assets of the Homes for the Aging.

Another forward step was taken in July when the General Board voted unanimously to accept the offer of Don G. Matthews, Sr., Hamilton, N. C., to give \$50,000 and land on which to build a Home for the Aging in Eastern North Carolina. This fourth Home will probably add space for approximately forty additional residents, thus bringing the total capacity of all the Homes to 150 residents.

Two wills have been probated in Forsyth County in which the Homes were remembered with sizeable gifts when received. Word has come of other will in which the Homes will share.

A total of about eighty-five thousand, (\$85,000) dollars has been received from the February Special Day Offering. This

represents an average gift of ten (10c) per Baptist — 850,000 in number.

The challenge facing the Homes for the Aging at present is to finish paying for the new building, although the Baptist State Convention authorized that the homes might borrow up to one hundred seventy-five thousand (\$175,000) dollars to finish paying for the construction and equipping the new building on Reynolds Park Road. Actually, it was not necessary to borrow but one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars. Surely, with all North Carolina Baptists responding with a generous special day offering on the third Sunday of February, 1958, and with continued gifts coming in from other sources as they have been in the past, this balance of one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars should be paid within the year. Accordingly, if every pastor and superintendent of the Sunday School will urge the members of each church to respond to this worthy cause, the Baptist Homes for the Aging would be free of debt by the end of the year, 1958.

The residents, and all connected with the Homes for the Aging are deeply grateful for the support received in the past, and join with the Baptists of our state in thanking God for His favor and blessings year by year.

The state of health of the residents has been remarkably good, considering their ages, 65 to 97 years.

Every Baptist and every Christian worthy of the name wants the faithful ones who, in many instances, have given their lives to the work in our churches provided for as they face the Sunset. Our denomination has accepted the responsibility for this worthy cause — most of our churches have contributed in a limited way to construction of new administration and residential building which was opened in June. Certainly we need to greatly increase our efforts to care for the needy aging men and women who cannot adequately care for themselves.

The total capacity of all the homes is 112 residents, yet many are being turned away for lack of room. The residents and all connected with the Homes for the Aging are deeply grateful for the support received in the past, and join Baptist of the State in thanking God for His favors and blessings year by year.

REPORT ON VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS

Thus, having eight churches taking part in the Bible School Program.

The average attendance for the school was 36.

May we look forward for the year ahead with a determination to strengthen our churches in this work — both with our physical and financial aid. By full cooperation we can and will see results which will be inspiring to us and pleasing to God.

3:10 Report of American Bible Society — E. C. Minnich.
The report was adopted as follows:

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

"The Bible Speaks Today" is not just a slogan. It is the experience of millions of the people around the world. It is a challenge to action. The Bible must speak to more people in this Southern Baptist World Missions Year — and in all the years ahead.

If the people of the world are to know Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations, they must have the Bible.

Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay when he must leave — and keep on speaking to a man's heart.

The American Bible Society helps missionaries to translate the Bible. It publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost. For the blind it supplies scriptures in raised-letter systems and on talking book records.

During 1955 the American Bible Society — distributed throughout the world more than 15 million volumes of scriptures.

Supplied over 13,000 Bibles and other scriptures to Hungarian Refugees coming to the U. S. A. and joined in supplying more to refugees in Austria and other countries.

Donated nearly one million scripture volumes for distribution by Chaplains to our Armed forces, as a vital link between the home churches and the men in service.

Rejoiced in translation of the Bible into more than 1,100 languages. The entire Bible has been translated and published in 210 languages; a complete Testament in 270 more; and at least a Gospel or other complete book in 629 additional languages.

Southern Baptists Support The Work

Because the Bible Society serves mission work — and because Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for distribution to their people — Southern Baptist churches give to the American Bible Society.

Remembering Hebrews 10:24, "Let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works" — consider these facts and figures:

In 1956, Southern Baptist churches, with 8 1-2 million members, gave \$120,732 to the American Bible Society. Methodists, with 9 1-4 million members, gave \$174,447. They not only led in the total amount of their gifts; they even gave more per member!

In the words of James 3:10, "Brethren, these things ought not so to be."

Southern Baptists can lead in support of the American Bible Society if every church will give. Here are suggestions, based on what many churches are doing:

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

TO ALLEGHANY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Sunday schools have become an almost universally diffused means of religious culture, in connection with church work and Christian activity.

The Sunday school has a definite purpose of teaching the word of God, so that people will turn to God. A church school should belong to the church. It should be supported by the church, and should be under the control of the members of the church.

The pastor, as pastor of the church and its work, is also pastor of the Sunday Schools, its general overseer and advisor; he should attend the Sunday School as often as possible and occasionally preach upon the subject of the Sunday School.

I especially want to advise our Alleghany Sunday Schools to make full use of all our Missionary Baptist literature, written by our scholars. I especially want to recommend to all our adult teachers the use of Broadman's comments, all available quarterlies, and other aids on the general subject of Sunday School.

Our eleven churches this year are 100 per cent in active Sunday School work, I am happy to report. We now have a total average attendance of approximately 450 in the Alleghany Association.

This attendance is good but it is still not good enough, we need more and better transportation and organization in order to carry those to Sunday School who do not have a way to ride. We should share our material gains more generously with those less fortunate than we, or our fortunes might suddenly end.

10:50 Report of Baptist Children's Homes. In the absence of Mrs. Glenn Vestal, Mrs. Paul Swanson read the prepared report. Mr. W. C. Reed, Supt. of Mill's Home told of some of the work being done there to help the needy children. This was an inspiring message.

REPORT OF BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

The year 1956 was another busy one at the Baptist Children's Homes. We were able to admit to our care only one-fifth of the children for whom application was made. There were a total of 813 applications. Of this number only 169 children could be admitted to some phase of our program. Certainly all the other 644 were in need or their applications would not have been signed by Baptist pastors.

Careful research by our Social Service Department, in cooperation with the pastors who had signed the applications, made it possible to place many of these 644 children with relatives or other agencies where their needs are being met. Many others could not be placed and are still waiting for someone to come to their rescue. Our pastors have been most tolerant and cooperative in trying to reach the weight decisions as to which children were in greatest need and should be admitted to fill our few vacancies.

The questions often arises, "How many dependent children should North Carolina Baptists provide for." Probably an exact answer is impossible. Last year we served a total of 751, an increase of 15 over the year before. Of these, 126 were supported in Foster Boarding Homes. Perhaps a conservative estimate is that Baptists of North Carolina should serve about 1,000 children annually. It is, therefore, planned to gradually expand the Foster Home Program until we as a denomination are caring for our proportionate share of dependent children.

Another need is the Indian Orphanage at Pembroke. This Home, which cares for fifteen to twenty children, is located in Robeson County in the Burnt Swamp Baptist Association. Since this home has not been and probably cannot be adequately supported by the local Association, considerable sentiment has developed among North Carolina Baptists for admitting it as a part of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. In view of this sentiment and the pressing need, the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Children's Homes at their regular annual meeting in May, 1957, voted unanimously to recommend to the Baptist State Convention, at its annual meeting in November, that the Pembroke Orphanage be made a part of the North Carolina Baptist Child Care Program. If the convention approves this action, it will necessitate the erection of one cottage at Pembroke at a cost of about \$50,000.00 and an additional operating budget of about \$20,000.00 per year.

The only possible way now for your Children's Homes to get more money to meet these challenging needs is through an increased Thanksgiving offering in November. If every church will increase its Thanksgiving offering ten per cent this will give us the \$20,000.00 to support the children at Pembroke. As our people go beyond this amount in their giving,

we will expand the Foster Home Program and care for some of the 644 children who had to be turned away last year. Surely the Master is not pleased with His servants until they have done their best.

Since our report last year we have built a new swimming pool at Kennedy Home, and a new cottage for boys is under construction. Perhaps a contract for another boys cottage at Mills Home will be let within the next twelve months. These new buildings are erected with special gifts and bequests.

Charity and Children continues to serve North Carolina Baptists in promoting the Kingdom of God. It not only keeps our people informed about their program of child care, but all phases of our denominational work. Here it joins hands with the Biblical Recorder and all Southwide Baptist publications in trying to let the people see what transpires in our conventions, Associations, board meetings, and institutional programs.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereof: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers; Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W. M. U. President, Choir Director and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, which members shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a small Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday School, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and the distribution of the same; and to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association and interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specified authority. It shall make annual reports to the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886.")

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head — the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible — the Old and New Testament — is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.

3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.

4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided by request of one member and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

6. When a question is under discussion no other motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.

7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.

8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.

9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized, "Parliamentary Practice" preferably "Roberts" or Kerfoots.

10:40 State, Home and Foreign Missions Report was given by Mrs. Ray Parlier. Mrs. Parlier moved the report be adopted and Mrs. Paul Swanson seconded the motion. Following the report the Rev. Guy Cain, Northwest District Missionary, brought an interesting message on our Mission work in this district.

REPORT ON STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

Jesus said unto his disciples, "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white unto harvest." John 5:35. And then in Matthew 13:28 we find these words. "The field is the world." So should not we as Southern Baptist be greatly concerned over our State, Home and Foreign Mission work?

State Missions is the Missionary effort on the part of North Carolina Baptist to reach the unsaved for Christ and teach, enlist, and train the saved in giving, living and serving through the churches and throughout the world.

There are 4,500,000 people in the State. Out of this number we have 846,000 Baptist Church members. Perhaps 40 per cent of these are enlisted and are being taught and trained in Christian giving, living and serving. This means that 60 per cent of our church constituency is not dedicated in the Christian profession. It is here that we, as Christians have our primary challenge.

The above interpretation of the purpose and challenge of State Missions demands a varied program of Mission activity. Therefore, many phases of our State Missions' work are promoted through the Sunday School, Training Union, and Brotherhood, Royal Ambassadors, Church Development and Music Departments. Over 2,800 Vacation Bible schools will be reported for 1958 — giving \$50,000 to World Missions. Over 7,000 of our Baptist people attend Training Union weeks at Caswell Fruitland and Ridgecrest this summer.

Since 60 per cent of the people in North Carolina are lost they need the Savior. State Missions provides a Department of Evangelism that seeks to inspire pastors and churches to evangelize their communities. We reported 1,330 more baptisms in 1957 than in 1956. North Carolina Baptist churches baptized more people last year than any other state except Texas.

A growing population demands new and stronger churches. State Missions provides a necessary and significant ministry through aid on some church buildings and the purchase of sites for new churches and some one hundred or more salaries for pastors.

A more highly developed and intelligent congregation demands a better trained pastor. State missions promote Pastor's Schools. Last year 175 pastors received better training at Fruitland. Refresher courses are offered at Mars Hill and Chowan Colleges each summer for pastors.

The sources of support for State Mission work are the Co-operative Program, Sunday School Board, Home Mission Board and Special State Missions.

Now, as Southern Baptist we believe also in Home and Foreign Missions. Dr. C. Redford is Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Home Mission Board which is located at Atlanta, Ga. Registration for Home Mission week, August 11th, reached the highest peak in Ridgecrest history: 2,564. At this time we had reported 1,251 missionaryes, 66 mission pastors, 447 student workers, and 401 chaplains.

All this sounds well, but are we as Missionary Baptist satisfied with this? No, for we must remember that Christ said, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations."

Baker J. Couthen is the Executive Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board which is located at Richmond, Va. He has said that the missionary enterprise is the real hope for

world peace. To me it is a clear expression of the love of God.

Christ is depending on me and you to carry the mission message around the world. May we be Missionary Baptist.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

But we, thank God for the faithful few and keep praying that other women and young people, in all the churches may join us and share in the joy of service through the missionary organizations, as we study, pray, give and witness for our Lord.

In our annual meeting at Sparta church last May, Miss Marian Robinson, our State W.M.U. Secretary; Miss Pearl Todd, retired Missionary to China and Mrs. Earl C. James, Regional Supt. challenged us in their inspiring messages to take time to pray and witness for Christ wherever we are and at all times; that we may be better able to reach out to others. We are to begin at home and "The Bible is the handbook of missions and missionaries." It plainly teaches us that every Christian has a responsibility in his own community, state, country and out to all the world" stated Chester L. Quarles.

Our women and young people received special blessings as they observed the seasons of prayer for State, Home and Foreign Missions and made their offerings to these causes, which last year amounted to about \$450.00 from the approximately one hundred women and young people, twenty-five of them titheers.

2:25 The report on the Baptist Hospital was given by W. M. Hamm in place of C. E. Jones. Mr. Hamm moved the report be adopted. It was seconded by Van Miller.

NORTH CAROLINA HOSPITAL REPORT FOR 1958

Our Baptist Hospital provides a well-rounded program of medical care and training under Christian guidance and influence. It serves our people when they are sick, and need specialized medical care which requires facilities beyond those available in their own communities. The hospital works in full cooperation with our local physicians. It offers a wide range of specialized training in the different fields of medicine and surgery, in nursing, and in various other fields of medical and pastoral care.

Last year the hospital provided bed care for 16,000 patients. There were 120,000 visits to the clinics and offices of the medical staff and chaplain service. Patients came from 92 of the 100 counties of the state. The services of the medical staff were given free to all veterans and the hospital spent more than half a million dollars in providing free care for them beyond that they were able to pay. A service patient pays what he can of the cost of this care to help make up the difference between what he can pay and the cost. The hospital has some assistance from welfare agencies and the Duke endowments for patients who can qualify but it must depend primarily upon the Mother Day offerings. This fund can be used only in

cases of real need and after the patient's family has paid what it can, and all other possible help has been exhausted.

Two factors are forcing the hospital to seek a largely increased Mother's Day support if it is to be able to continue such service to our sick. First, hospital costs everywhere have increased more than 30 per cent in the last five years. Second, as the number of North Carolina Baptists increases the demand for this service increases. Fortunately there has been an increase in the amount of Mother's Day offerings also these contributions have grown by 20 per cent in the last five years.

It is clear that only through greatly increased support by our churches can the hospital hope to continue to give the large volume of free service it has been giving to our people. We believe Baptists of North Carolina will provide the necessary funds if they realize the need. The response has been excellent all over the state in the past.

The most recent achievement of new equipment is the cabalt machines. They give the doctors a new weapon against deep seated cancer. Let us hope the Association will keep increasing their Mother's Day offering.

Dr. W. K. McGee spoke after the report. All the churches of the Association contributed to the hospital through the Mother's Day offering. Three churches gave the same amount as last year. Eight churches increased their offerings.

2:40 The report on Christian Education was sent by H. E. Singletary who could not attend. The report was adopted without reading, and the time was given to Lawson Allen, Gardner-Webb College and M. H. Kendall, Mars Hill College to speak on Christian Education.

3:00 The report on the homes for the aging was moved to this time. Van Miller asked that the report be adopted without reading and the time be given to Rev. J. M. Hayes, Supt. Homes for Aging. This was seconded by Paul Swanson.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING

The Homes For Aging are now in their eighth year of operation — Resthaven opened March 16, 1951; the Albemarle Home, December 7, 1953; and the Administration Building, Winston-Salem, June 13, 1957. The three homes have facilities for 119 — counting residents and helpers. The average number of residents will exceed 100.

Efforts were launched in June to raise \$100,000 to match a gift of Mr. Don G. Matthews, Sr., of \$50,000 and land on which to build a fourth Home For The Aging to be located at Hamilton, Martin County. It is expected that the campaign will be successfully completed this year, and the construction of the new home will then begin. This home will provide facilities for approximately forty residents, giving a total capacity for all three homes of 150 persons.

The homes have had a good year financially. The auditors' report for the year ending September 30, 1957 showed that the income was \$262,924.53. When the new Administration

Building was ready for occupancy, \$103,000 was borrowed to finish paying for construction and equipment. All of this has been repaid except \$20,000. Funds received from the Special Day Offering and the Cooperative Program have helped to meet the current cost of operation. The homes have also received help from individual and corporation gifts. The largest individual gift for the year was \$40,000.

A large number of the residents have been aided financially. Less than ten per cent of the residents have given to the homes assets sufficient to pay their cost of keep for life. Thirteen residents have paid the monthly rate, which is less than the actual cost to the homes. Most of the residents are paying one-third to one-half of their cost of keep. This means, therefore, that the difference in cost is taken from funds received from denominational channels and special gifts by individuals and corporations.

Our program of ministering to the aging presents a great challenge to the 850,000 Baptists of our state. We think, first, of the ever-increasing number of aging friends needing larger dormitory facilities; and, secondly, of doubling the capacity of our infirmary in the Administration Building. It now accommodates fifteen patients, but we should have space for at least thirty. It is estimated that elderly people will become invalids at the rate of ten per cent annually. There have been times when we did not have sufficient room for those who needed to be in the infirmary. Our aging friends must look to our Baptist constituency to meet these pressing needs.

With gratitude to all who have made our present homes possible — churches, individuals and corporations — and with confidence that the Baptists of North Carolina will continue to care for these "old soldiers" of Christ in a deserving way, we look to the future with great hope.

A very true saying in education is "A picture is worth a thousand words." We need to take advantage of all the material available in Sunday School, Vacation Bible school and youth organizations to impress more thoroughly on the minds of both saved and unsaved, the importance of Christian living.

It is a relatively easy job to get most of these materials to use in the church organizations. There are many sources of

these materials for free or just a small cost. Some of the most effective materials are recordings, film-strips and audio-films. These of course need financial assistance but their great aid in helping put across the Christian teaching minimizes this obstacle.

Let us endeavor to use more of these effective means of teaching in our Association.

The Baptists of North Carolina have seven of the finest colleges to be found anywhere. They embody seven marks of a Christian school.

1. Christian ownership — ownership belongs to the Baptist of North Carolina.

2. Christian administration — Christian men and women are elected as trustees and select Christian administrators.

3. Christian faculty — More than 400 competent Christian men and women are employed as teachers

4. Christian students — Most of the students are already Christians. Those who are not are readily helped educationally and personally.

5. Christian Ideals — Christian education translates total knowledge into service to God and mankind.

6. Christian teaching — The basic interpretation that flows from Christian truths enhances every subject taught.

7. Christian service — Men and women graduate from our seven colleges each year. Some are preachers, teachers, missionaries, doctors, housewives, business and professional people who serve mankind over a wide area.

Enrollment last year in our Baptist Colleges was 1-8 of all students in North Carolina's 61 colleges — or 7,634. This is a substantial increase over any previous year. Rooms are not available to take care of Baptist boys and girls who desire to gain a Christian education.

Alleghany Association is proud to report that 4 young men and 4 young women are now enrolled in Baptist colleges of North Carolina.

We should be very happy to have a part in making these colleges available to the young people of our state.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

"Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging: and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." Pro. 20:1

Proverbs 23:29-30 we read, "Who hath woe? who hath sorrow? who hath contentions? who hath redness of eyes? They that tarry long at the wine: they that go to seek mixed wine."

Beverage alcohol has become one of our nation's greatest problems. with more than seven million excessive drinkers in the United States. The question should be to every Christian, "In what way can we help battle this great evil and enlighten the public as to the dangers of alcoholic beverage?"

The allied church league in 1955 adopted a new constitu-

tion for the purpose of furthering the cause of civic and social righteousness.

“As follows—

1. To unite all who believe in total abstinence in a cooperative effort against beverage alcohol in its every form.

2. To provide an efficient agency through which all evangelical churches can work in opposing beverage alcohol and promoting civic righteousness.

3. To work for good government by seeking to elect men of highest character to public office and by encouraging the making of laws that will further civic and social righteousness.

4. To enlighten the public and educate youth concerning the dangers of beverage alcohol and allied social evils.

5. To promote programs for the rehabilitation of the victims of alcoholic beverages, such programs to be in keeping with the other purposes stated above.

ORPHANAGE REPORT

June 30, 1958 marked the culmination of 15 years of progressive leadership by W. C. Reed with the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. Under his supervision the Children's Homes experienced one of their greatest periods of building, growth, and expansion of services. At present, North Carolina Baptists probably provide more services for dependent children than any other similar group in America. Those associated with our child care program have, in the 73 years of its history, developed a program which is recognized as one of the best in the nation.

Dr. W. R. Wagoner, of North Wilkesboro, was elected by the trustees to succeed Mr. Reed. Dr. Wagoner assumed his duties July 1.

The year 1957-58 has been a fruitful one in expanding services. Since October 1, 1957, North Carolina Baptists have directly served a grand total of 753 children. In addition to these, our social workers have been able to place with relatives or other agencies more than 200 children where their needs are now being met. Each application has been investigated by our case workers. During the past year we were able to admit about one-fourth of the applicants as compared with one-fifth admitted in 1956. Through the dedicated resourcefulness of our social workers, many homes were re-established while others were saved from breaking.

North Carolina Baptists have two sources for supporting the Children's Homes: Source number 1 is a combination of the Once-A-Month Offering and the Cooperative Program.

Through this plan the Homes receive a fixed amount. This cannot be increased or decreased except by vote of the Convention. Source number 2 is the Thanksgiving Offering. Every dollar marked "Thanksgiving Offering" comes to the Children's Homes. Last year we asked for an increase of 10 per cent in the Thanksgiving Offering. The churches responded with a 15 per cent increase. This increase of \$31,000 enabled us to support the Indian work at Pembroke and at the same time to considerably expand the Foster Home Program. We have confidence that North Carolina Baptists will continue to remember deserving children at Thanksgiving.

During the coming year a cottage will be erected at Mills Home for boys and a cottage at Kennedy Home for girls. These new buildings are being made possible by special gifts and bequests.

Serious consideration must be given in the near future to more adequate care for the children whose emotional stability has been seriously damaged. North Carolina Baptists have the potential resources with which to meet this growing need.

A bundle of Charity and Children should go into every Baptist church in the state. If your church is not receiving this attractive and informative paper each week, please write Editor Marse Grant at Thomasville immediately and begin a club in your church. All pastors and Sunday School superintendents will receive complimentary copies if they will send their names to the editor.

Most important of all, remember to pray for the children being served by your children's Homes. Some carry heavy burdens which can be lightened with your prayers and material support. The administration and staff members also appreciate every expression of your love and concern for this Christ-ordained ministry.

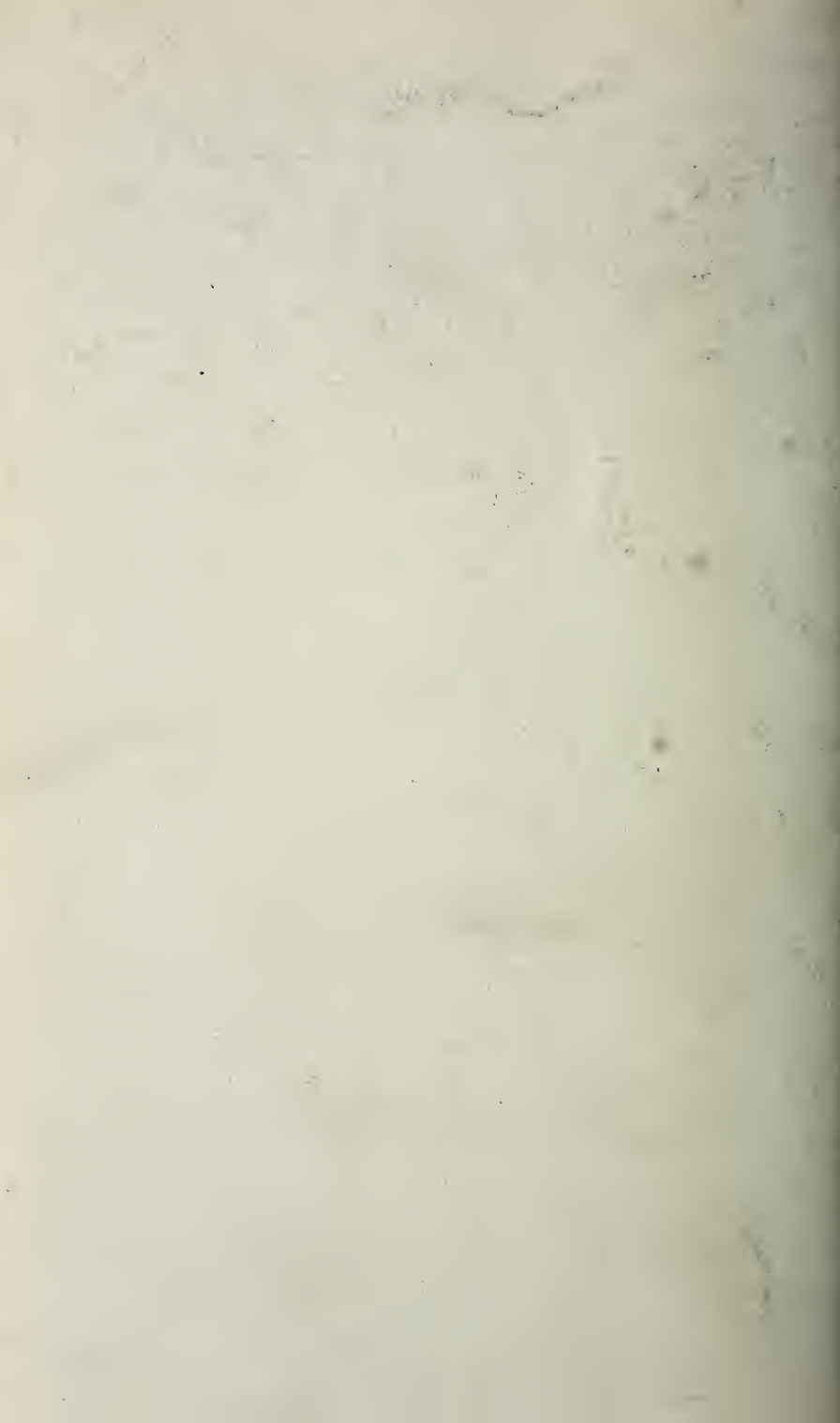

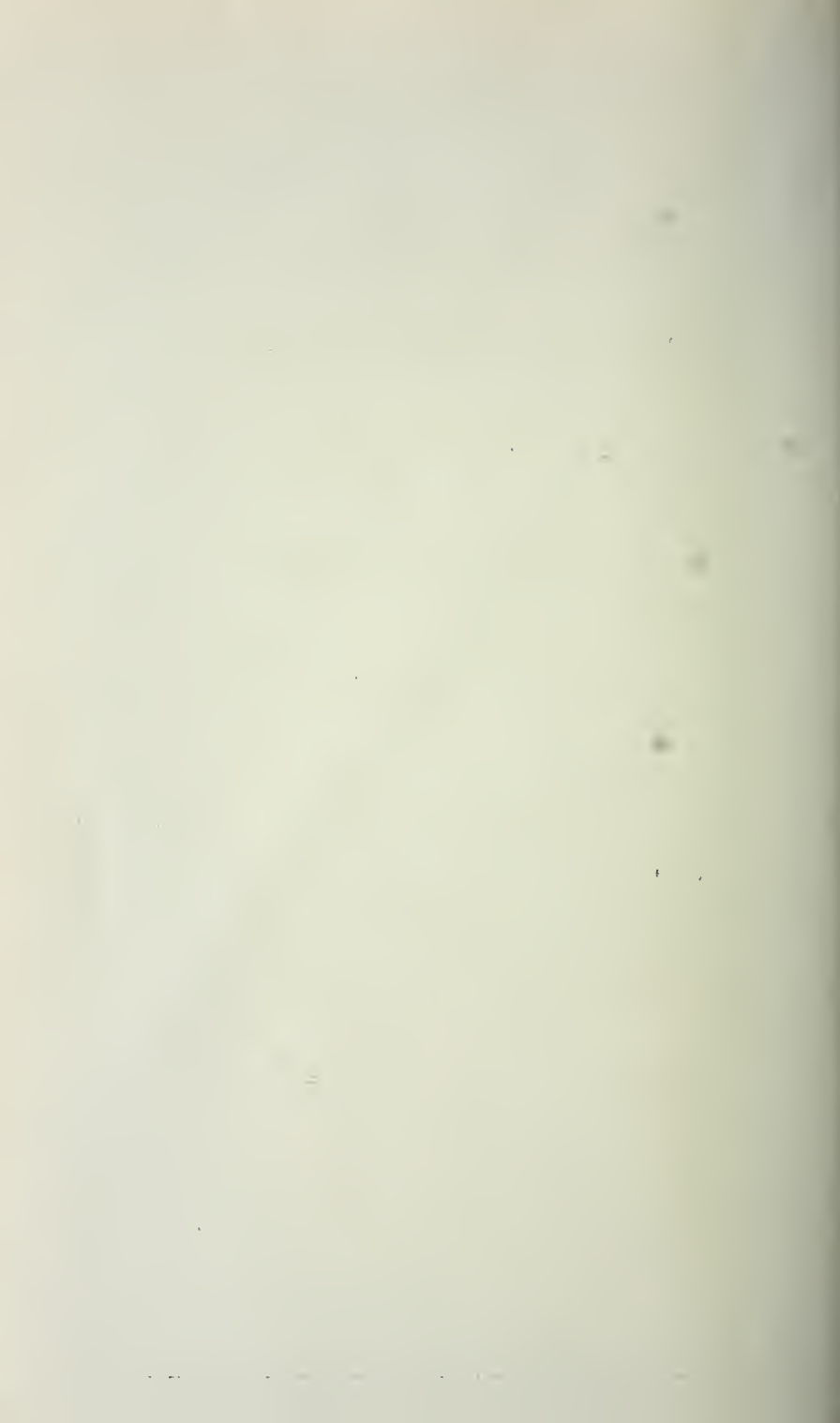

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereof: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Associations shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers; Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W.M.U. President, Choir Director and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with

the pastor of each church, which members shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a small Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday School, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and the distribution of the same; and to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report

at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association and interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specified authority. It shall make annual reports to the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886.")

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head — the Father the Son and Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible - the Old and New Testament - is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the

Church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perservance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgement.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.

3. Brethern invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.

4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided by request of one member and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

6. When a question is under discussion no other motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.

7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.

8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.

9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized, "Parliamentary Practice" preferably "Roberts" or Kerfoots.

REPORT ON STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

Jesus said "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, Baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and, Lo. I am with you always, even to the end of the world." Matt. 28: 19-20.

As Southern Baptist we believe in winning the world to Christ, at home and to the "uttermost part of the earth." This can be made possible by your prayers, and gifts to your State Missions. We have twenty ministries of State Missions to reach and train our people. Sources of support whereby these twenty ministries of State Missions can function effectively and fruitfully in all areas of the State are namely, Cooperative program, Sunday School Board, Home Mission Board and this special State Missions Offering. We will need \$186,000 in this special offering to meet our needs of State Missions. The State mission program under the leadership of Dr. E. L. Spivey in North Carolina, ministers in four broad areas. First, teaching the word of God and reaching the lost. This includes Sunday schools, Vacation Bible schools, evangelism, and brotherhood. Second, training the church members for Christian living, giving and service. This takes in training union, Baptist Student union, Dept. of church music, Royal Ambassadors, summer assemblies and rural church work. Third, assisting and service to pastors and churches which includes — pastoral support lots for new churches, church planning, preachers and Fruitland Bible institute. Fourth, care, concern and conservation. This includes sanatorium ministry, Baptist history, student loan fund, silent people and those of other races.

As we look at home missions, this work is under the leadership of Dr. C. Redford with headquarters at Atlanta, Ga. We now have approximately 1574 missionaries serving under the Home Mission Board. Many people are reached

through more than 68 City missions programs. A special program is planned to reach the language groups in our country. Over fifteen million language people live in this country of which five per cent have been evangelized. We have an opportunity to reach other countries through training, guidance and encouragement for the veteran missionaries. This is your responsibility because they go to the fields for you.

Southern Baptist other field of missions is our Foreign Mission work. This method carries the message of Christ to the "uttermost part of the world". This work is under the direction of Dr. Baker James Couthen, with headquarters at Richmond, Va. We minister as Southern Baptists in thirty-nine countries of the world. The total number of missionaries under appointment including July 19, 1959 appointment — 1355. Each church needs to be a vital supporting base for world missions. The cost of carrying on the Foreign mission board program during the year 1958 was \$30.10 per minute. May each of us as southern baptist do our part through prayer and giving and "God shall Bless our efforts."

REPORT ON THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our Baptist Hospital seeks to serve our people with a complete program of specialized medical care for all who need it. Our people go in great numbers, with all types of serious illness, from all walks of life, and in all financial circumstances, to receive the ministry of our Baptist medical center. A constant effort is made to keep it personal and Christian in its care of sick people.

Last year Service Patients from 95 counties of the State made over 66,000 visits to the 31 clinics of the Out-Patient Department, which is open to families not able to pay the full cost of their medical care. About the same number of office visits were made by Private or full-pay patients. More than 16,000 sick persons were hospitalized for 132,000 days of bed care.

Forty per cent of the hospital service is rendered the patients who go to the Out-Patient Clinics or who enter the hospital through the Out-Patient Department. The services of the physicians are free to all these patients, but the hospital charges must be paid unless other arrangements are made by the family.

Last year the hospital spent well over one million dollars in the care of these Service Patients. The Mother's Day

Fund, along with the welfare funds and assistance from other agencies and foundations, enables the hospital to provide more than half of this service free for our very poor people. The Mother's Day Fund alone, has not covered the full cost of the care of even the most needy.

We need to lay upon the hearts of our members the necessity of the Mother's Day Fund, if our Baptist Hospital is to provide this important service for our poorer people.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

North Carolina Baptist are justly proud of their seven fine colleges with an enrollment of almost eight thousand.

Every year many boys and girls are turned away from our institutions because of lack of rooms. These young people are ours to educate and train. A christian education is the real need for each of these young people. The education begins in the homes and is continued in the churches. To meet the needs of our Baptist churches for trained leaders we must look to our Baptist Christian colleges.

These schools face some serious needs today. They need your prayers and moral support. They need your understanding and your money. Our colleges are dependent upon the cooperative program and voluntarily gifts for their support. Less than fifty per cent of their operating costs are paid by students. To expect them to pay more would make education for many of them prohibitive.

All of these seven colleges are in building or expansion programs. They merit your prayers and your support.

What better investment can we make than the Christian education of our Youth?

- 3:00 Report on Audio-Visual Education in the churches was made by Miss Donna Jones. The motion was made and seconded to adopt the following report.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF AUDIO VISUAL AIDS

The goal of all church endeavors is to reach more people effectively with the Gospel of Christ. Audio visual aids are God-given tools with great power for reaching people with God's message.

Audio visual education is the effort to help people learn through hearing and seeing. The purpose is that people may learn faster and more effectively that which is taught. These aids are to be used as instruments to help attain definite objectives in the teaching process.

The Department of Audio Visual Aids has no program to offer the churches. It seeks only to undergird and strengthen the existing church programs already set in motion. The Department promotes the use of both non-projected and projected visual aids.

Our ministry, a division of Promotion, is divided as follows:

1. We seek to provide an adequate library of both 35mm filmstrips and 16mm sound motion pictures in support of the total Baptist program. All films in the library are free rental to all the churches in the Convention. A large number of teaching and promotional films are added to the library each year. There are film titles to cover every area of Baptist work. Included are films on the work of the Sunday School,

Training Union, Brotherhood, Home and Foreign Missions, Children's Activities, Christian life, Evangelism and Stewardship. Approximately 5,000 films are booked every year.

2. The Department produces each year several 35mm filmstrips and motion pictures on special areas of Baptist work in the state. This year we have produced a 35mm filmstrip in color titled *ADDING LIFE TO YEARS*, depicting the ministry of the Baptist Homes for the Aging in North Carolina. Also, a new 35mm filmstrip in color titled *MISSIONS IN ACTION*, depicting the varied ministries of State Missions. To be released soon will be two 16mm titles in color on the Cooperative Program, *A CHANNEL OF BLESSING*; and a dramatic story of the ministry of Chowan College, *OPPORTUNITY - UNLIMITED*. These films are also free rental to all the churches when booked through the Department of Audio Visual Aids. Other films are in production for the coming year on agencies and institutions of the Convention.

3. Another ministry of the Department is the audio visual aid workshops planned each year upon the request from associations. Complete exhibits and demonstrations are the heart of this service. These workshops may be sponsored by any organization of the association. They are designed to meet the needs of every church leader and pastor. This year, workshops were sponsored by Burnt Swamp, Dan Valley, Neuse and Johnston Associations. These meetings are scheduled for one evening only with double periods.

4. Our services extend into many related fields. We counsel with pastors and committees throughout the year concerning the right types of equipment to purchase in carrying out the church program. We work closely with the Department of Church Architecture in designing audio visual installations which should be incorporated into the building program. These installations include taping facilities, projection systems, enforced sound, translucent baptistry systems, radio loops and television installations both for station and closed circuit use. More than 100 churches are aided each

year in these areas.

5. Special tape recorded messages as presented at the annual convention and the conference on evangelism are made available on a cost basis to the churches of the convention each year. Each year almost 100 churches avail themselves of this service. Taped recorded radio programs are distributed each year to the stations participating in the Baptist Network. Some twenty-five to forty radio stations join the network each year for these programs. The department prepares and presents each week a church-centered telecast over one of the major TV stations in North Carolina. Through these channels, the Baptists receive each year many thousands of dollars worth of news coverage. Many times during the year, special news releases are forwarded to all news outlets.

6. In support of the total Baptist program, the Department of Audio Visual Aids assists all departments and special committees with lay-outs and related pictures for programs, brochures and posters. We have provided many of the pictures appearing in the Biblical Recorder to give emphasis to the Baptist program. Charts and diagrams have been prepared for several departments for special presentations at clinics, conventions and campaigns. The chart and bulletin insert on the cooperative program have been prepared and made available through the promotion department on a free basis to the churches. Graphic Arts is one of the major services of our staff.

7. Finally, we seek to cooperate with every agency and board of the Southern Baptist Convention. We promote the major emphases of each group at the time scheduled on the Baptist calendar during the year. It is our desire to assist every association and every church in winning and developing people in the likeness of Christ. We covet your prayers as we labor in the Lord's work as a department in the division of promotion of our convention.

10:30 Report on Temperance. The Rev. A. K. Taylor was absent. No report was turned in for the minutes. Report on Home for aging. In the absence of Mrs. George Shepherd, Mrs. T. S. Moxley read the following report which was adopted by the association.

REPORT OF BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING

The ninth year of operation of the Baptist Homes for aging began March 16, 1959. All three of the Homes, Resthaven, Albemarle and Headquarters have had a good year, and have been filled practically all the year to capacity — 119 counting residents and helpers. When vacancies occur, there are far more applicants on the waiting list than there are rooms to be filled.

Since the average age of a resident is about 80 years old, there were several deaths during the year, as might be expected. Among the deceased was the oldest resident "Uncle" John T. Holt, formerly of Wilson Mills, N. C. He died July 13, being 99 years of age. Had he lived until February 26, 1960 he would have been 100 years of age. He was a resident of the homes nearly eight years, and for the past two years was a patient in the infirmary of the Headquarters building. He was, indeed, a great soul, and all connected with the homes keenly miss him.

This has been another year of God's favor upon the homes and of encouraging progress. While the campaign to raise funds to build the fourth home in Eastern N. C., at Hamilton has not been completed yet there is good reason to believe that the money will be secured this year and construction will begin. Mr. Don G. Matthews of Hamilton has given the land for the site, and most of the \$50,000 which he promised. He is ready to give the balance when the extra \$100,000 has been raised. With re-organization of plans and persistent effort, the balance needed can and will be forthcoming.

Architectural plans and specifications for the enlargement of the infirmary at headquarter, Winston-Salem, have been prepared and construction of 28 additional bedrooms should begin by September or October.

It brings much joy to report that all indebtedness incurred with construction of the headquarters building has been paid, and that three homes are free from debt, thanks to our Lord and friends of the homes who have helped to

make this possible.

The pressing needs of the homes for aging now are (1) to finish raising the funds to start construction of the Hamilton home and (2) to raise about \$75,000 to cover the balance needed to pay for the additional facilities in the infirmary expansion. So, a total amount of \$150,000 must be raised therefore, to finish these two projects. When they are completed, 60 more bedrooms will be added for anxious and needy residents, thus increasing the total capacity of all the homes to 170 residents.

All connected with the N. C. Baptist Homes are most grateful to the churches, individuals and corporations for the help given to offer our aging friends who live in the homes a program of security, comfort, congeniality and a Christian ministry. Surely the words of our Lord "In as much as ye have done it unto one of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" are applicable to those who help make such services possible.

Also, he paid tribute to Dr. I. G. Greer, former supt. of Mills Home. The following report was adopted:

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOMES

North Carolina Baptists have shown remarkable interest in their Children's Homes during the past year. Numerous church groups have visited the three campuses. Continued financial support has been encouraging. Awakened interest in your Child Care program has been evidenced in many respects.

During the past year members of the Children's Homes staff, under the best leadership available, have engaged themselves in a conscientious study of the entire Child Care program sponsored by North Carolina Baptists. Findings have been gratifying. The program has a commendable his-

tory and is one of the best in the nation. Every effort is being made by the present administration to continue the best care possible for dependent children.

More than 1,000 boys and girls were served by the Children's Homes during the past year. Mills Home, Kennedy Home, and Odum Home provided care for 547 children while 197 lived in Foster Homes. Through financial assistance of the Mothers Aid program 40 children were able to live with their mothers. Supervision and financial help were afforded 30 college students. Resourceful case workers assisted 214 additional children to find homes with relatives and other social service agencies.

Three cottages are currently under construction—one at each of the three homes. The Roy Culler family of High Point is providing funds for a boys cottage at Mills Home. The H. C. Ferebee family of Camden is making possible a cottage for girls at Kennedy Home. The new cottage at Pembroke will provide administrative offices, living accommodations as well as kitchen and dining facilities for the Indian boys and girls.

Significant recommendations relative to the Children's Homes were adopted by the Baptist State Convention in May following a two and a half year study by the committee of twenty-five. They are as follows:

1. That the number of children in foster home care be increased to approximate the number in institutional care.
2. That the Children's Homes begin to develop new types of programs to help children who are not being adequately cared for in other ways.
3. That increased attention be given to families throughout the state by well-trained, mature case work consultants to help avoid family breakdowns.

The convention has voted to bring the Children's Homes into the Cooperative Program on the same basis as all other institutions and objects. Churches may continue to send once-a-month offerings and special gifts. Designated gifts from churches to the Children's Homes will be administered

by the convention in the same manner as designated gifts from churches to other institutions. The homes are encouraged with this improved financial relationship with the convention. For lack of sufficient income the homes operated on a \$22,000 deficit in 1958. The deficit for 1959 will be approximately \$65,000. The only way the homes have of meeting the \$65,000 deficit this year is through a substantial increase in the Thanksgiving offering.

3. That greater emphasis be placed on reading about and studying the cooperative program and giving according to God's plan.

4. May we ask and wait always for divine guidance in all problems concerning our progress in church and associational work.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereof: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W. M. U. President, Choir Director and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, which members shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the

church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a small Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday School, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and the distribution of the same; and to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Association Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sun-

day School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association and interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specified authority. It shall make annual reports to the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886.")

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head — the Father the Son and Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible — the Old and New Testament — is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their scriptural order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator. And that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the Church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's Supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.

3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.

4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided by request of one member and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

6. When a question is under discussion no other motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite

time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.

7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.

8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.

9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized, "Parliamentary Practice" preferably "Roberts" or Kerfoots.

REPORT ON STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

As we think on the mission program of our Lord as given in Acts 1:8 we see the entire field as a unit. Therefore each phase of our mission program in the Association, state, home and foreign field has its all important place in order to carry out the whole of the great commission. "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost." (Matt 28:19)

STATE MISSIONS

State missions is the missionary efforts on the part of North Carolina Baptists to reach the unsaved for Christ. We need to teach, enlist and train the saved in living, giving and serving through the churches.

The state mission program is under the leadership of Dr. E. L. Spivey. There are four broad divisions of services for the mutual benefit of all people namely: (1) Teaching

the word through evangelism in Sunday School, Vacation Bible Schools, etc.; (2) Training the church members through Baptist Training Union, Baptist Students Union, church music, Royal Ambassadors, Assemblies, rural church work, and work with negroes and other races; (3) Assistance and service to pastors which includes: Pastoral Support, Pastor's church schools, and audio-visual aid, church and building, planning and lots for new churches; (4) Conservation and care is concern which includes: Baptist history, silent people, church—state separation, student loan fund, Christian action league and sanatorium ministry. There are nearly 5,000,000 souls in N. C. with less than half saved.

HOME MISSIONS

To make Christ known through home missions means that we must keep as our goal and aims the slogan adapted by the Board of Domestic Missions: "Never live in hope or expectations while your hands are folded in idleness." Now that the century mark is rolling upon this slogan statistics show substantial gain in number of workers and converts.

Dr. Courts Redford of Atlanta, Georgia is the executive secretary of the Home Mission Board. Chinese, Italian, Spanish speaking people; Indians, Negroes, Jews, Japanese and others are ministered to by the 2,000 missionaries. Major attention is being focused on evangelism. Church development, literature films, exhibits, conferences and schools are aids in this worthy undertaking.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Foreign missions carries the message of Christ to the "utmost part of the earth." This work is directed by Dr. Baker Cauthen with headquarters at Richmond, Va.

Southern Baptists are demonstrating a determination to provide financial reinforcements for missions through the cooperative program and Lottie Moon Christmas offerings. During 1958 one hundred thirty-seven missionaries were appointed. This is the largest number ever appointed to Foreign Missions in one year in the history of the Board.

There are now around 1,400 Baptist missionaries in Foreign fields.

We should remember that the increase in world population is outgrowing our efforts to evangelize. Percentage-wise the world grows more non-Christian each year.

May each of us do our part to help win all peoples to Christ throughout the world.

Womens Missionary Union report was made by Mrs. Ben Reaves who moved the adoption of the report. Mr. Frazier seconded the move and the report was adopted.

REPORT OF THE W. M. U. OF THE ALLEGHANY ASSOCIATION

The purpose of Womens Missionary Union is to promote Christian Missions through study, prayer, community missions, and stewardship.

We are grateful for the 46 women enrolled in the W. M. S. organizations, Sparta and Liberty. The Laurel Springs women join with us in mission gifts. Last year we gave \$502.75 to State, Home, and Foreign Missions.

Sparta has a newly organized Sunbeam Band under the direction of Mrs. Dean Richardson with 14 enrolled. One Junior G. A. with 17 enrolled making a total of 78 in all W. M. U. organizations. Five girls attended Regional G. A. Camp at Camp Butner this Summer and three girls went to G. A. camp at Fruitland.

Our annual meeting was held at Laurel Springs where

we were honored to have our State W. M. U. President, Mrs. W. K. McGee and Mrs. Helen M. Hayes, Missionary to Japan as our guest speakers. Mrs. Earle James, district president was also present and took part on the program.

We are grateful for the faithfulness of the present membership, but how our hearts yearn to see the women in the other nine churches in our Association become interested in W. M. U. work and become "Laborers Together With God."

Every good mother wants to share with her children every good thing she enjoys. Every Christian mother wants to lead her children to know God. But, what is being done for the Spiritual enrichment of your children's lives? With only two youth organizations in our Association I fear we are neglecting our wealthier children.

The time is short. Let me urge you to give of your time and talents to the training of our children and young people through youth organizations in our churches.

No report was given for the Childrens Home, however, Mr. Clyde J. Morris, purchasing manager for the Childrens Home gave a splendid talk in the interest of all three schools, Mills Home, Kennedy Home and Odom Home.

At this time we were honored to have special music presented by Mrs. Irwin, soloist and Mrs. Joines, organist. Following this Dr. McGee, from the Baptist Hospital and Mr. William Poole from the home for the aging was recognized.

Mr. W. F. Shepherd gave a report on the Home For The Aging. The following report was adopted.

REPORT ON HOME FOR THE AGING

At the present time there are sixty applicants on the waiting list and new inquiries and applications pouring in daily. We now have a total of 106 residents in our three homes — Resthaven, 20; Albemarle, 34; Headquarters, 52.

Even with our new facilities we could fill rooms up to 500 in the next two years. We are dependent upon the prayers and the financial support of the churches if we are to take care of our older people as God would have us do. During the fiscal year, October 1, 1959 to August 1, 1960, we have received \$82,521.20 from the churches with \$76,352.70 of this amount being contributions of the special day offering in February. Although we are \$123,000 short of our goal we are profoundly grateful to God and to everyone who has had a part in contributing to this worthy cause.

We are grateful for the amount of money contributed by the churches in Ashe and Alleghany, yet if all the churches had taken part in this great cause we would have given much more than the \$509.18 which we did give. May we awaken to the need to support our homes for the aging as well as the entire Baptist Program.

H. E. Singletary gave the following report on the Baptist Hospital which was adopted.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The Ministry of our Baptist Hospital touches every area of our state. Last year it served more than 17,000 bed patients, with 150,000 visits being made to the clinics and offices. They came for examinations, medical treatment, skilled surgery, and spiritual guidance. Many of our homes, most of our churches, and almost all of our communities have been served by this ministry of healing. It touches the family life of about a quarter of a million of our people each year.

Sickness is no respecter of persons or pocket books. It strikes the rich and poor alike - the widow, the orphan, the aged. There are times when they need such specialized care as that available at our Baptist Hospital. The Mother's Day

Fund provides money with which our Hospital gives assistance to those who cannot pay the full cost of their care. Our Hospital almost doubles our gifts with matching funds from welfare agencies and other gifts. In addition to this, the medical staff gives its services without charge to all service patients, except for available insurance payments.

Probably we should ask ourselves if we as Christians should provide such a ministry for our needy, sick neighbors. Jesus and the New Testament writers give us the answer. But do we really want such a ministry? It cannot be provided except at great cost. Our Hospital receives about 3 3-4 per cent of our Co-operative Program funds for payments on the buildings, purchase of expensive equipment, such as heart-lung machines, and for the Department of Pastoral Care. Our Mother's Day Fund provides the money to help pay the hospital bills of needy, sick persons. The amount of this fund determines for the most part the amount of help our hospital can give.

If we are serious about this ministry which was so close to the heart of our Lord, and want our hospital to give help when our people need it, we are going to have to become serious about our giving to the Mother's Day Fund. Our hospital is facing a grave financial problem, and if it is to give free service we are going to have to contribute the money to finance the program.

The only way we can support this work is to plan for it, to make somebody in each church responsible for it, to let our people know about the need, and to challenge them to give of their means. Some of our churches over the state have been doing this, and our people have demonstrated that when this is done they will provide the necessary support. We come to ask you to do it in your church — not for the hospital, but for sick people who are in need.

FRUITLAND BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE REPORT TO THE ALLEGHANY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Back in the early forties, a school for ministers who had not had the privilege of college education began at Boone, N. C., under the direction of J. C. Canipe, then pastor of the First Baptist Church of Boone. In 1946, this school was moved to Fruitland with 46 students enrolled the first year. Last year, there were about 170 enrolled.

Fruitland fills an important place in the lives of many preachers, as well as North Carolina Baptists in general. The men who attend Fruitland come from all parts of North Carolina and nearby states. They have various backgrounds as to education. Some have not been to college, while others have graduated from college and a few from the Seminary.

The program at Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute is designed to help men in the best way possible. It seeks to lead them in cooperation and support of all our Baptist work. Men who have been to Fruitland now serve as pastors, evangelists, and missionaries. Many of them serve as moderators of our Baptist Associations here in the state of North Carolina.

Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute was established by and is supported and controlled by the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. No God-called person is ever turned away for such reasons as lack of finances, or degree of education. Indeed, Fruitland is a school for preachers, with a fellowship which is hard to find anywhere else on earth.

The Report on Christian Education was given by Mrs. Paul Swanson who moved the adoption of the report. The following report was adopted:

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

North Carolina Baptists promote a program of education much wider in scope than that represented in their seven colleges. In the local churches there are numerous activities along with the Sunday school relating to education. All these activities are promoted through a special division known as Church Programs. Through the Southern Baptist Convention North Carolina Baptists share in the promotion and support of the seven seminaries which are administered through trustees elected by the Southern Baptist Convention.

Through a Division of Christian Education in the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina the work of seven colleges is promoted. These are Wake Forest, Meredith, Mars Hill, Gardner-Webb, Wingate, Chowan, and Campbell. In the last year there were enrolled in these seven colleges some 8,100 students. Their annual operating costs were above \$10,000,000, with approximately \$500,000 of

this coming through our Cooperative Program plan of giving. An additional \$600,000 was provided for capital outlay or plant improvements and expansion. Without the addition of new buildings it is not possible for these colleges to enroll many more students than the number taken last year.

Last year, 1959, there were graduated from our North Carolina high schools 42,954 students. Of this number there were 32,441 white high school graduates. It is safe to estimate that of this 32,441 graduates 15,000 were Baptist. Almost exactly one out of three enrolled in some college last September, leaving the other two out of three without college training. So our 15,000 Baptist youth graduating from high school in 1959, 10,000 never enrolled in college. Of this 10,000 ending their education with high school, one-fourth of them were in the upper third of their high school graduating class. Thus, we see that a majority of our Baptist young people will never become ministers, teachers, lawyers, doctors, nor any of the many other professions open only to those having an opportunity to go to college. Of the 8,103 students in our seven Baptist colleges last year, 5,000 were Baptist. There were some 13,000 Baptist students in other colleges.

It is believed that by 1970 we shall have in North Carolina not 15,000 white Baptist boys and girls graduating from high school each year but 30,000; and that we may expect a much larger percentage to go to college. It seems conservative to predict that at least 35,000 Baptist boys and girls will be in college within ten years. The question confronting us is where shall we provide for their college training? Shall we maintain the status quo in our Baptist colleges and ask the state to provide for them through increased taxes, or other denominations to provide for them in their colleges, or would it be better for Baptists to face the facts with vision and courage and provide Christian education for their future leaders? Let us not be afraid to

think together and ask God to guide us to do His will in whatever we do.

ENROLLMENT AND SUPPORT INCREASE

Southern Baptists operate seventy-one seminaries, colleges, and schools. Enrollments or regular students have reached a record high for 1959-60 of 61,194 students compared to 61,086 in 1958-59. In addition there are 8,221 special and extension students, making a total of 69,415.

Graduates from the seventy-one schools from September 1958 to August 1959 totaled 10,006 compared with 10,218 the preced year.

State Conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention increased gifts to the schols from \$14,169,831 to \$14,-729,621. Gifts from the conventions for operations amounted to \$9,280,117 and for capital projects \$5,449,504.

In addition, the schools received \$8,232,505 in gifts, grants, and donations.

The total assets of Southern Baptist educational institutions continue to grow. Property value is listed at \$231,655,841 and endowments at \$79,686,028, or a total of \$311,341,869.

CHRISTIAN SERVICE VOLUNTEERS

This year there are 13,471 students who have volunteered for some church-related vocation as compared to 14,344 in the preceding year.

Ministerial students number 8,233 compared to 9,063 in 1958-59; mission volunteers 2,070 compared to 2,011; educational directors 2,009 compared to 2,173; and church music volunteers 1,159 compared to 1,097.

The report on Baptist Literature was given by Mrs. E.W. Shepherd. The following report was adopted:

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

There are numerous magazines and periodicals which are published regularly by the Southern Baptist Convention in Nashville, Tennessee. Each of these have a specific purpose and use within the Church Program. We are familiar with much of the literature that is available to us yet, we might consider whether we are making maximum use of all that is available to us. For example, The Training Union Magazine, written by people who are trained in this work, with many features easy to follow and easily understood. There are detailed Assembly Programs, and numerous articles by dedicated Christians who share with us their experiences that we may use them to make our programs more effective.

There are publications available to every church group for practically any church function. In the Sunday School Programs there are Quarterly Magazines for each age group and Monthly magazines for the Teachers of the groups.

All Church leaders should make it their responsibility to learn all the literature and see that their church has that which would make it operate more effectively. Every church does not have the same needs and for that reason each church must choose carefully the literature best suited to their needs. For example each church does not have need for the Training Union Magazine or the Sunday School Quarterly for the Deaf but those churches who do have deaf people in their midst should be aware of this literature and use it.

As we think of the importance of Christian literature in our churches and in our homes let us not forget our own Baptist State Paper, The Biblical Recorder. With the many crucial issues coming up in the world almost daily, it is imperative that Baptist people be informed and the best source is our Baptist State Paper. For 2 or 3 cents each week the Recorder can be sent to every home in our churches.

May we make the best possible use of our Baptist Literature in our church, home, and personal life.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PROGRAM SERVICES

The goal of all church endeavors is to reach more people effectively with the Gospel of Christ. Audio visual aids are God-given tools with great power for reaching people with God's message.

Audio visual education is the effort to help people learn through hearing and seeing. The purpose is that people may learn faster and more effectively that which is taught. These aids are to be used as instruments to help attain definite objectives in the teaching process.

The Department of Program Services has no program to offer the churches. It seeks only to undergird and strengthen the existing church programs already set in motion. The Department promotes the use of both non-projected and projected visual aids.

Our ministry, a division of Promotion, is divided as follows:

1. We seek to provide an adequate library of both 35mm filmstrips and 16mm sound motion pictures in support of the total Baptist program. All films in the library are free rental to all the churches in the Convention. A large number of teaching and promotional films are added to the library each year. There are film titles to cover every area of Baptist work. Included are films on the work of the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Home and Foreign Missions, Children's activities, Christian life, Evangelism and Stewardship. Approximately 7,000 films are booked every year.

2. The Department produces each year several 35mm filmstrips and motion pictures on special areas of Baptist work in the state. This year we have produced two 16mm motion pictures, HEARTS ROAD TO RECOVERY for the

Baptist Hospital in support of Mother's Day offering and the SCHOOL OF GRAPHIC ARTS for Chowan College for promotion of this area of their work. Scheduled for fall release, the premiere date being the Annual Convention, will be the new 16mm color sound motion picture on missions depicting the mission needs in the state and throughout the world. These films are also distributed on free rental basis, as are all films, within the convention.

3. Another ministry of the Department is the workshops planned each year upon the request from associations. Complete exhibits and demonstrations are the heart of this service. These workshops may be sponsored by any organization of the association. They are designed to meet the needs of every church leader and pastor. Workshops for the fall months are being scheduled at the present time. These meetings are scheduled for one evening only with double periods.

4. Our services extend into many related fields. We counsel with pastors and committees throughout the year concerning the right types of equipment to purchase in carrying out the church program. We work closely with the Department of Church Architecture in designing "sight and sound" installations which should be incorporated into the building program. These installations include taping facilities, projection systems, enforced sound, translucent baptistry systems, radio loops and television installations both for station and closed circuit use. More than 100 churches are aided each year in these areas.

5. Special tape recorded messages as presented at the annual Convention and the Conference on Evangelism are made available on a cost basis to the churches of the Convention each year. Each year almost 100 churches avail themselves of this service. Taped recorded radio programs are distributed each year to the stations participating in the Baptist Network. Some twenty-five to forty radio stations join the network each year for these programs. The Department prepares and presents each week a church-centered telecast over one of the major TV stations in North Carolina.

Through these channels, the Baptists receive each year many thousands of dollars worth of news coverage. Many times during the year, special news releases are forwarded to more than 350 news outlets, on the average of almost one per week.

6. In support of the total Baptist program, the Department of Program Service assists all departments and special committees in the field of Graphic Arts with lay-outs and related pictures for programs, brochures and posters. We have provided many of the pictures appearing in the Biblical Recorder to give emphasis to the Baptist program. Charts and diagrams have been prepared for several departments for special presentations at Clinics, Conventions and campaigns. The chart and bulletin insert on the Cooperative Program have been prepared and made available through the Promotion Department on a free basis to the churches. More than 100 special designs in this field have been prepared during the year. Graphic Arts is one of the major services of our staff.

7. Finally, we seek to cooperate with every Agency and Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. We promote the major emphasis of each group at the time scheduled on the Baptist calendar during the year. It is our desire to assist every association and every church in winning and developing people in the likeness of Christ. We covet your prayers as we labor in the Lord's work as a Department in the Division of Promotion of our Convention.

The Sunday School furnishes church workers because almost without exception they are those who have been discovered and developed by the Sunday School.

First and foremost the Sunday is important because it is the work of God.

Sunday school teachers are important because a Godly Sunday School teacher is teaching for eternity.

May we in the coming year be more loyal to the teaching program of our churches than ever before, as we, "study to shew ourselves approved unto God."

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

That is where the American Bible Society comes in, to help these people secure the Bibles they need. The American Bible Society is an active

part of Southern Baptist, serving in every form of Baptist work at home and abroad. It helps Missionaries translate the Bibles. It publishes without note or comment without profit, usually below cost.

Last year all the Bible Societies together, distributed over 27 million volumes of Scripture. Many people around the world now wait for the Bible and the support of all churches is needed each year.

Because the Bible Society serves mission work - and Southern Baptists depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for their people - Southern Baptist Churches believe in the Missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

The following is the Brotherhood Report by Dean Richardson which was read by Rev. Jack Byrd and was adopted:

BROTHERHOOD REPORT ALLEGHANY ASSOCIATION

September 10, 1960

A Church Brotherhood: The men of a Baptist church organized for enlistment, education and service.

In a recent editorial entitled "Using Men" I read that "There are still a few die-hards around the Southern Baptist Convention who believe the only contribution men will ever make to their church is to send their wives to the services and pick them up afterwards. Fortunately, the ranks of these believers are rapidly dwindling."

We as members of the Baptist Brotherhood in this association are doing something besides picking someone up after church service. We are beginning this new year by filling our officers' positions with dedicated men and trying to follow the plan of our new Brotherhood organization. It is the new, simplified Brotherhood organizational plan which goes into effect in churches and associations across the

Southern Baptist Convention October 1, 1960. The more than 17,000 churches and hundreds of associations with Brotherhoods will find this improved organizational pattern a big step in making its men's organization a more effective one.

The new structure enables a church to set up a Brotherhood with fewer key leaders. The number of major officers have been reduced from thirteen to eight. They are the pastor, president, vice--president, secretary, Royal Ambassador Leader, Christian Witness Leader, Personal Stewardship Leader and world missions leader.

The associational Brotherhood organizational pattern calls for the same officers with the addition of an advisory council consisting of the associational superintendent of missions, associational moderator and three pastors or two pastors and an educational director.

It is suggested that church and associational nominating committees study the new organizational structure before nominating Brotherhood officers for 1960-61.

The Sparta officers are attending a Brotherhood workshop meeting at the First Baptist Church, North Wilkesboro at 7:00 P. M. September 13. We would like to have as many men as possible from the other churches to join us in the meeting. We would also welcome the men from other churches to meet with us in Sparta every third Wednesday night. We will be glad to work with any of our men in an effort to organize a Brotherhood for each church in the association.

Don't you, as a Christian man, have a desire and an obligation, to devote a portion of your time and talents to Christian Service?

Following is the report on Temperance given by Rev. A. E. Sells. The report was adopted:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

The dictionary defines temperance as "habitual moderation in the indulgence of the appetites, passions, and the abstinence from the use of intoxicants," so the word temperance has its place with the individual, the home, the church, and the general public. It is used here in connection with the use and sale of beverage alcohol. While we need to be temperate in all the other things liquor, beer, and wine is the greater evil, an evil made legal by the government under which we live.

Each year millions of dollars are spent for the purchase of liquor, beer, wine, and each year millions of dollars are spent to cure or try to correct the tragedy that the use of the beverages have caused. We need but to read our headlines daily to realize the terrible curse that follows the use of alcoholic beverages. The broken homes and hearts, the destitute children, murder, and almost every crime we can mention is caused directly or indirectly by alcohol. We are told that the habitual use of alcohol is a disease. Then why build more institutions to care for those who have this disease? Why not band together to stamp out the root or cause of this disease by praying and acting on these prayers to abolish the right to sell the menace to mankind?

Where do we as Baptists stand on this issue? According to our Church Covenant we pledge to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage when we join a missionary Baptist church. However, there can be found on church rolls, throughout our land, names of people who use and names of those who sell alcoholic beverages. These people and all Christians need to listen to the words of John H. Hill who said, "Liquor is the Archenemy of the Cross of Christ because:

Liquor opposes, weakens, and destroys everything that the Cross of Christ stands for.

Liquor enslaves man; the Cross frees man.

Liquor reduces man's efficiency; the Cross stands for man's highest usefulness.

Liquor destroys man's soul; the Cross is God's estimate of the value of man's soul.

Isn't it time for a spiritual and mental awakening to this evil in our land?
