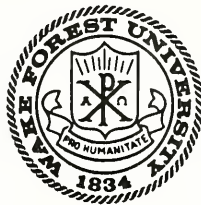

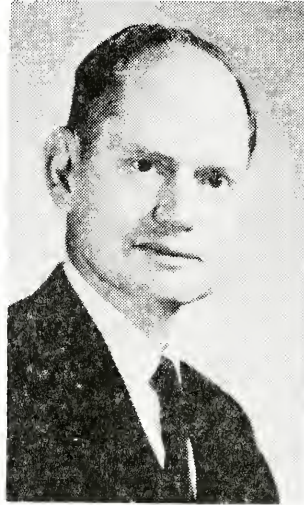

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF JOHN T. WAYLAND**

John T. Wayland is a Missourian and a graduate of William Jewell College, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and Yale University. He has served as pastor of the following churches: First Baptist Church, Monroe, North Carolina; Temple Baptist Church, Durham, North Carolina; Pinlico Baptist Church, Baltimore, Md.; and First Baptist Church, North Wilkesboro, N. C. (1947-1953). He was a chaplain in the U. S. Navy during World War II and served as professor of Christian Education at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary at Wake Forest, N. C. 1953 to 1973. On August 1, 1972 he came to Wilkes Community College as Director of Division of General Studies. He is also Associate Pastor of First Baptist Church, North Wilkesboro, N. C.

PROCEEDINGS OF ALLEGHANY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

80th Annual Session Held Sept. 10 & 11, 1976
Mount Carmel Baptist Church

Friday Evening

Instrumental music was provided by Marjorie Armentrout, pianist, from 7:15 to 7:25, at which time special music was rendered by Sparta First Baptist Church Choir. The annual meeting was then called to order by Rev. Michael Sepaugh, moderator, who welcomed everyone. Mrs. Wilma Foster, Chorister, led the congregation in singing "Stand Up for Jesus." Rev. Everette Shaw gave the opening devotion.

The clerk called the roll of churches and the messengers were seated. Chestnut Grove was not represented due to a revival meeting in progress. Visitors recognized were: Dr. John T. Wayland, Assoc. Pastor, First Baptist Church, North Wilkesboro, N. C.; Mrs. Jim Sanders, Houston, Texas; and Mr. and Mrs. David Fender, Apple Valley, California.

Rev. Mac Warren, new pastor of Pine Fork Baptist Church, was given special recognition. Other pastors attending were: Jimmy Warden, Belview; Everette Shaw, Mount Carmel; Dwight

Leftwich, New Hope; Hayes McClure, Osborne Memorial; and Bobby Elledge, Laurel Springs.

The congregation sang "Work for the Night is Coming." Rev. Jimmy Warden gave the introductory message on the Spirit of the Lord based on scripture passage from 2 Corinthians.

New Hope Baptist Church Choir sang two songs, one of which was dedicated to Mr. and Mrs. David Fender from California who were visiting relatives in the Association.

Dr. John T. Wayland gave a very informative and dynamic doctrinal message on the Trinity with scripture from John 16 for reference.

The congregation sang "Blest Be the Tie" before being dismissed with prayer.

Rev. Michael Sepaugh moved for the adoption of the Executive Committee Report as submitted and Mrs. A. O. Joines seconded it. Mrs. T. S. Moxley presented the Historian's Report and moved its adoption, which was seconded by Mrs. A. O. Joines, and approved.

Mr. Jimmy Mitchell moved for the adoption of the Missions Committee Report as contained in the Book of Reports. It was seconded and approved. Rev. Hayes McClure gave a Vacation Bible School Report and moved for its adoption. It was seconded by Mrs. T. S. Moxley and approved.

The Treasurer's Report was read by Mrs. F. A. Wagner, who moved for its adoption. Upon second of Andy Cleary it was approved. Mr. Jimmy Mitchell called attention to the Sunday School report, emphasizing that the last Sunday in October would be high attendance Sunday. He moved the adoption of the

report and upon second of Mrs. Paul Foster it was approved.

Mrs. Clennel Richardson moved for the adoption of the Training Union Report and upon second of Willie Busic it was approved. Mrs. Paul Foster moved for the adoption of the Brotherhood report and after second by Jimmy Mitchell it was approved.

Mrs. F. A. Wagner moved for the adoption of the W.M.U. report and Andy Cleary seconded the motion. It was carried.

Sandra and Wanda McKnight sang a lovely duet at this time.

Mrs. Jimmy Mitchell moved for the adoption of the N. C. Baptist Foundation Report as submitted and Jimmy Mitchell seconded the motion.

Following the adoption of the Christian Education report, Carlton Mitchell from Wake Forest University brought greetings and information from our Baptist Colleges, asking that we increase the area of awareness in this field.

Mrs. James D. McKnight moved the adoption of a report on Baptist Publications and it was seconded by Mrs. A. O. Joines. It was approved. Woodrow W. Hill from the Biblical Recorder made some brief remarks, advising that Southern Baptists are very well-informed with 33 state news magazines.

Mrs. T. S. Moxley moved the adoption of the Baptist Hospital Report. Following a second by Andy Cleary it was approved. Mrs. Ruby Greenlaw brought greetings and information from our N. C. Baptist Hospital, speaking as a representative and former patient.

Jimmy Mitchell moved the adoption of the Annuity Board Report, which was seconded by Andy Cleary. Rev. Oren Bradley, Supt. of Missions in Surry Assn. represented the Annuity Board and explained some of the Annuity Plans.

Mrs. Paul Foster moved for the adoption of the Children's Homes report which was seconded by Mrs. T. S. Moxley. Rev. Rex Campbell then gave a brief report of the activities of the Children's Homes and invited everyone to attend the area conference at Mills Home in Thomasville the following week.

Rev. Michael Sepaugh moved for the adoption of the Homes for Aging report which was seconded by Claude Roupe. Mr. Ralph Cannon then gave more details about the homes, especially the new Western N. C. Home and announced the ground-breaking there October 10 at 3:30 p.m.

Due to the fact that the proceedings were behind schedule, upon motion of Mrs. T. S. Moxley and second it was decided the reports on Evangelism, American Bible Society and Department of Communications would be postponed to the afternoon session.

Mrs. Jimmy Mitchell moved for the adoption of State, Home and Foreign Missions report. Mrs. Paul Foster seconded the motion. Rev. James Lambert, Area Superintendent of Missions then gave a brief emphasis on the needs in this area of ministry.

Rev. Mac Warren, pastor of Pine Fork Church, preached the morning sermon, an interpretation of the theme for the year, "Let the Church Stand Up."

Rev. Everette Shaw gave the blessing for the noon meal and benediction for the morning session.

Saturday Afternoon Session

The Saturday afternoon session was preceded by instrumental prelude and a duet by Dena and Darrel Blevins. The congregation then sang "Standing on the Promises" followed by a devotional by Rev. Hobert Dowell.

Rev. Hayes McClure moved the adoption of the Evangelism Report seconded by Andy Cleary. Bob Shepherd moved the adoption of America Bible Society Report seconded by Mrs. Paul Foster. Mrs. Claude Roupe moved the adoption of Department of Communications report which was seconded by Dewey Hoppers.

Mr. E. C. Minnich gave the Nominating Committee Report and moved its adoption. Hayes McClure seconded the motion and it was carried unanimously.

Mrs. R. E. Richardson moved the adoption of the Committee on Committees Report as submitted. It was seconded by Andy Cleary and approved.

The moderator announced that a Seminary Extension course on the Life of Christ would be taught by Rev. James Lambert at Sparta, First Baptist Church, beginning October 12 at 7:00 and urged all who could to participate. The cost for materials would be \$2.00 each. It was also announced that an Associational Singing would be held the fifth Sunday in October at Osborne Memorial Church as approved by the Association.

In the absence of a report from the Resolutions Committee, the moderator expressed orally the appreciation and thanks of the Association to the host church for having so graciously provided for the needs, comfort and enjoyment of everyone attending this meeting, and their generous and well-planned hospitality.

Andy Cleary gave the report of Time, Place and Preacher Committee and moved for its adoption. The Liberty Youth Choir then sang some songs.

Rev. Ralph Smith, pastor of Liberty Baptist Church, deliv-

ered a very inspirational message based on a scripture from 2 Thessalonians.

Mrs. Alice Caudill, a surviving 95-year-old twin who has attended all the annual meetings of Alleghany Baptist Association except one, since its beginning, conducted a very impressive Memorial Service.

Following the singing of "Victory in Jesus" the meeting was adjourned with prayer.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee met four times during the year: October, 1975 and February, May, and August, 1976. The spirit of cooperation has been good and a keen interest in the work of the Association has been expressed by the churches. One special meeting was held for all committee members of the association to review together the purposes and objectives of all committees with an interest expressed in having this information printed in booklet form for the benefit of committee chairmen each year. The pastors and chairman of deacons of the churches held a special dinner meeting to share views of what could be done to strengthen the work of the association.

Items of business at the February 16 meeting of the Executive Committee were: reading a letter of appreciation from Dr. W. Perry Crouch, nominating persons for the General Board of State Convention, review need for repairs on "line fence" at parsonage property, plan the pastor-deacon dinner, complete details of committee representation.

The May 17 meeting held special prayer for bereaved families who had lost members in auto accident shortly before that date, reviewed plans for participating in county Bicentennial worship service, discussed the associational scholarship fund and the W.N.C. Baptist Homes Building Fund, plans for the associational program were begun.

At the August 16 meeting, plans were finalized for annual meeting, a seminary extension course on the life of Christ was planned and churches were encouraged to participate in the Rev. Ford Philpot area crusade.

One of the wonderful things about the Association is that we are "Missionary Baptist Churches cooperating in the work of the Lord." Indeed, "let the churches stand up" for Jesus and be the leaders in spiritual awareness.

ASSOCIATIONAL ACHIEVEMENTS FOR 1975-'76

The churches in the Alleghany Baptist Association participated in the county-wide religious service held in the Sparta Elementary School Auditorium in celebration of the Bicentennial on June 27, 1976. The Rev. Michael Sepaugh, moderator of this Association, was chairman of the committee that planned and presented the inspiring religious program for the occasion. As the theme of our Association states, "Let the Church Stand Up" to perpetuate the freedom of religion that has made our country famous for being a Christian nation for two hundred years, may we all be encouraged to go forward in the work of the Lord.

The achievements of each church are reported for this Associational year.

Belview: Four Sunday School rooms have been constructed. An interesting Bible School and Bible Study were conducted. The roof and entrance to the church were painted. The installation of a furnace in the basement is planned in the near future. Choir practice is held each Wednesday night.

Chestnut Grove: Church services are conducted each Sunday. Mid-week prayer meeting and Bible study are held. The Bible School, with an enrollment of 117, was successful. Fruit baskets were sent to the elderly at Christmas. The woodwork on the outside of the church received a new coat of paint and the heating system was put in a good state of repair.

Laurel Springs: The January Bible Study, taught by Pastor B. R. Elledge, was interesting and well attended. A child was sponsored to attend the Special Opportunity Camp. Contributions were made to the Associational Scholarship Fund and to the Asheville Home for the Aged. Some new shrubbery was planted around the church. A new roof and guttering were installed. The Homecoming service on July 25 was well attended with the generous contribution going to the perpetual care of the Laurel Springs Cemetery.

Liberty: Contributions were made to the Associational College Scholarship Fund and the Western Home for the Aged. Bible study and study of mission books were conducted as were regular meetings of the Baptist Women. Wednesday prayer meetings were conducted by deacons. A youth choir was organized and special singing groups were sponsored. A Vacation Bible School was held in June with good attendance. The annual Sunday School picnic was enjoyed by Joines Park on Airbellows. A vacuum cleaner was donated to the church. Cement steps to the basement were constructed.

Mount Carmel: Additional Sunday School rooms have been made by adding a basement to the church. An adequate heating

system has been installed. The parking lot and driveway around the church have been paved. Vacation Bible School was well attended with an average attendance of 90 students.

New Hope: Services are conducted each Sunday. Three new deacons have been ordained. Choir practice is held each week using new hymnals recently purchased. An outstanding revival and Bible School were conducted. A Homecoming service and picnic lunch with special singing in the afternoon was held August 22. One child was sponsored to attend Special Opportunity Camp. Painting and carpeting were completed in two Sunday School rooms and the outside woodwork of the church was painted. Carpeting was put on the porch. An electric range was installed in the fellowship hall. A new lawn edger was purchased.

New River: Worship service is held twice a month.

Osborne Memorial: Vacation Bible School and Bible Study were conducted. Contributions have been made to the various agencies of the State Convention. A child was sponsored to attend Special Opportunity Camp. An altar set, consisting of a cross, candle holders and two vases were presented to the church as a memorial to Mr. Jim Leff Osborne by his children, Carla and Dennis Osborne. The church windows have been repaired and weather-proofed. The church lawn has been improved and a new cement walkway laid.

THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION INC. REPORT, 1976

In a tract that came across the Foundation desk during the past year was a note about the will of the famous financier J. Pierpoint Morgan. It is reported to have contained 10,000 words and incorporated 37 different articles of instruction, all of which were necessary because a vast fortune had to be properly dispersed. What Morgan valued most, however, was indicated by the opening statement of that legal document. It read, "I commit my soul to the hands of my Saviour, full of confidence that, having redeemed it and washed it with His most precious blood, He will present it faultless before the throne of my Heavenly Father. I entreat my children to defend, at all hazard . . . the blessed doctrine of complete atonement of sin through the blood of Jesus Christ once offered, and through that alone."

What a testimony! This wealthy man recognized that of everything he owned, his most valued "possession" was the priceless gift of salvation. Paul, in II Corinthians 12:4, says "I seek not **Yours** but you." As we think of Christian stewardship, we are accustomed to thinking first about giving or raising money. Christian stewardship is not primarily a **means** for raising money, but a plan for making the right kind of man.

During the 1975-76 fiscal year, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation has continued to be used as a channel for Baptists of our state to provide a tangible support for missions in a perpetual way for the years to come. Through a will of a person who had received financial assistance years ago from our Baptist Hospital, a \$29,950 trust was established with the Baptist Foundation to provide income for the hospital's needy patients. The income of the investment for one year will repay what the hospital provided in financial assistance to this person.

Wills still account for a major portion of the assets of the Foundation, but presently the annuity trust accounts comprise \$480,270.73 of the total value of the Foundation assets.

THE CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION

A careful reading of North Carolina Baptist history reveals that the Baptist State Convention was organized primarily for the purpose of establishing a Baptist college. When the Convention was formed in 1830, there were two church academies already in existence, as well as the University of North Carolina in Chapel. However, Baptists wanted their own school. Wake Forest Institute was begun in 1834. Five years later the Institute became Wake Forest College. Thus, Baptists in this state have been closely identified with Christian higher education for 142 years.

Today, the Christian higher education system of Baptists embraces six other colleges in addition to Wake Forest: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith and Wingate. Since 1944, these schools have been guided in their development by the Council on Christian Higher Education of the Baptist State Convention. The Council is the only organization of its kind in the Southern Baptist Convention, and is one of the oldest educational cooperatives in America.

It is not enough that North Carolina Baptists have begun and now support six colleges and one university. The need for colleges and churches to give fresh attention to their partnership and their mutual dependence is always present. North Carolina Baptists continue to support their colleges through the Cooperative Program and the Baptist College Day offering on Father's Day. The colleges continue to provide training for most of the pastors and other church staff persons who lead North Carolina Baptist churches. Pastors have helped the colleges in their efforts to recruit Baptist young people by furnishing the names of high school students for contact by the colleges. The Colleges pledge to North Carolina Baptist youth that financial aid is available to assist them in attending a Baptist college. No qualified student is turned away for financial reasons. Grants, loans and work scholarships are available.

There are 53 colleges supported by the various Baptist state Conventions. The enrollment of the seven North Carolina Baptist colleges comprises about 15% of the total enrollment of these 53 schools. While the Southern Baptist Convention does not own any colleges, there is a strong emphasis by the denomination upon Christian higher education through the SBC Education Commission. In the **Baptist Faith and Message**, adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1963, the following statement occurs: "The cause of education in

the kingdom of Christ is coordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people."

1976 BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

The Old Testament prophet Hosea declared, "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge." Because of a great information void concerning truth, Jeremiah also cried out, "Publish and conceal not."

Just as in Old Testament days, communication still remains one of the most sensitive problems in our churches. Think for a moment — how many problems has your church had that could be traced to a lack of communication? Too many church members are misled because they are uninformed, poorly informed, or misinformed. Churches must take initiative to provide accurate information if work in the local church, association, and convention continue to show progress.

Each year more churches understand the importance of providing the RECORDER for each family. When this is done, members become more responsive because they are better informed. Baptist have made encouraging progress in recent years through bold mission enterprises and this can be traced to better-informed church members. Stewardship gains also go hand in hand with better communications. As an example, 79 of the 80 churches which led their associations in per capita mission gifts last year have a RECORDER club.

Each church needs to look at its budget carefully and then make provision to send the RECORDER to each family. Although nearly 1,100 churches in the state have the RECORDER in the budget, at least 500 more churches should take this step. Such action could be the difference between mediocrity and greatness in your church.

W. A. Criswell, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Dallas, Texas, urges all Baptists to "stay with the state paper. Increase its circulation. Send it to the homes of all people. The reward will be great."

Louie D. Newton of Georgia who has done more than any other person to interpret the value of Baptist State papers, said: "The investment any church can make in furthering the Kingdom of God is to put the Baptist state paper in the homes of the membership. These papers are the packhorses of every phase of denominational life.

If this "packhorse", meaning the RECORDER, is not going

to every family in your church, may this be the year that you take this step.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS — 1976

“Christian stewardship” is a phrase frequently heard in staff meetings at Baptist Hospital. The hospital’s leadership holds to a philosophy of administration based on stewardship and tries to pass this on to all employees. A continuing effort is made to help each employee, whatever his particular job, to realize that he is part of a team involved in a Christian ministry of healing. The difference this makes in the whole atmosphere of the hospital is evident to patients and visitors.

This sense of stewardship demands a continual updating and upgrading of medical procedures to assure patients the highest quality care. One of the most significant recent developments is the creation of a department of Family Medicine. This department provides primary health care for a limited number of families, that is, the kind of all-round, ongoing health care normally provided by a family physician. At the same time the department offers training in family medicine for physicians who will enter this field of practice. This will help to balance the trend of recent years toward increased specialization in the practice of medicine.

Many of the physicians training in family medicine are receiving part of their clinical experience in small towns and rural communities under the auspices of the Area Health Education Centers (AHEC), created by the State legislature. It is believed and hoped that some of them will choose to remain in these areas for their permanent practice.

Improvement of physical facilities is another expression of the hospital’s sense of stewardship. In recent months renovation of the west and south wings of the hospital has been completed; construction has been completed on an addition to the water-chilling facilities; construction has begun on a 4-level parking deck in front of Reynolds Tower which will provide approximately 800 parking spaces for visitors; and construction has begun on a new building to house the new department of Family Medicine.

The Pastoral Care Department continues to make its contributions toward the fulfillment of our stewardship. A chaplain is assigned to each area of the hospital and is responsible for providing a pastoral ministry to patients, staff and visitors in that area. There are capacity enrollments in all phases of

the Clinical Pastoral Education programs. A third satellite has opened in Morganton during the past year.

Mother's Day gifts for the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$405,946.52, compared to a total of \$390,000 for the preceding fiscal year.

1976 ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

Southern Baptist churches depend on the Annuity Board to provide retirement and insurance protection to pastors and others in church-related vocations.

The Board holds in trust retirement contributions from nearly 40,000 persons. Their contributions will be converted into annuity benefits when they retire.

These contributions, taken together, are considered as funds held in trust by the Annuity Board. They now amount to \$401,135,261. While this appears to be a great deal of money, this must be divided among the 40,000 future annuitants and serve their lifetime, post-retirement needs.

Darold H. Morgan, president of the Board, described 1975 as "an excellent year of recovery, growth, and optimism" for the agency. Income from the investment of funds held in trust attained a one-year record of \$23,149,064.

Benefits paid to retirees, widows, and the disabled in 1975 amounted to \$15,734,003. During the Annuity Board's 58 years of existence, it has paid more than \$141 million in retirement and protection benefits.

A 13th Check issued in December, 1975 provided 8,221 annuitants with an extra month's income to help them combat the rapidly rising cost of living. The combined amount of this extra benefit came to \$733,585. It is called the 13th Check because it is over the 12 regular monthly payments.

The Annuity Board helps churches and SBC agencies get the best coverage at the most advantageous rates in life, health, and disability insurance.

In North Carolina 2,667 staff members of 2,140 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program — 2,421 in the Family Benefit Section (Plan A, 1,069 in the Age Security section (Plan B), and 240 in the Variable Benefit section (Plan C).

In each of these services, the focus is on the whole family; the motivation is Christian love; the aim is wholeness and health for the persons served.

To make these varied services available to families and children, a statewide network of facilities and programs has emerged. Indian Beach, Kinston, Pembroke, Fayetteville, Raleigh, Burlington, Wallburg, Thomasville, Charlotte, Forest City, Asheville, Waynesville — each site is a base of operations from which families in need can secure assistance. Furthermore, the staff is prepared to call on the additional resources of religious, educational medical, psychological, recreational, and social service personnel in the communities to help persons grow to their full potential.

No greater investment can be made in the future of God's Kingdom or in the future of America than to invest in children.

Your support of missions through the Cooperative Program is the lifeline of the Baptist Children's Homes. Your special gift at Thanksgiving further guarantees the continuance of Christian child care. The staff and children of the Baptist Children's Homes pledge ourselves to make the most of the opportunity your investment provides.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society, now celebrating its 160th anniversary, is only 40 years younger than our country. As it has grown up with our nation, the ABS has always made sure that God's Word was made available to its citizens to guide them. Pilgrim to pioneer, farmer to factory worker, — the ABS was ready with the Word for everyone.

Highlights of what the ABS and its partners in the Bible cause did in 1975 are as follows:

The New translation of "The Good News Bible", the entire

Bible in Today's English Version, was completed and will be Society's Bicentennial gift to the people of the United States in 1976.

The Good News for New Readers, designed for readers who lack skills in reading is now two years old and growing, reaching more countries, with selections being undertaken in 247 different languages.

In our own U.S.A., scripture distribution in 1975 reached a total of 109,469,781 copies, an increase of 11,181,000 over 1974.

The Bible Society expanded its services to the handicapped in 1975, with the production of a Scripture Selection for the deaf.

Volunteer for the ABS have increased with 14,367 men and women working in all parts of the country, bringing scriptures to churches, hospitals, nursing homes, etc.

The Bible Society contributed over \$5,600,000 to the United Bible Society World Service Budget, giving crucial support to the Bible cause in many parts of the world.

The ABS printed 50,000 copies each of two Scripture Selections in Vietnamese, giving the 130,000 refugees who fled to the U.S. a theme of hope.

Financial Support

As higher costs lead to postponement of projects in many countries, the ABS asks for continued and increased support.

Contributions from churches in 1975 increased 9.4 over last year to a total of \$1,453,920. For this the Society is especially grateful. Nearly 16.5 percent of the total is support from the Southern Baptist Convention a slight decrease from the previous year 1974 — \$254,802; 1975 — \$238,554. The Southern Baptist Convention can help by striving for a level of support \$.03 per member per year. This increase of \$.01 over the present level would provide a total of \$350,000 helping to take advantage of today's opportunities to share the Word.

FLETCHER BAPTIST COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

The Center promotes the total Baptist program through the divisions of the General Board, its institutions and agencies, through assistance to the departments of the General Board, to individual churches and associations, and through radio and television production.

1. AUDIO VISUAL AIDS

A. Film Library

During the past year, the Center booked 12,144 free rental films and filmstrips, and turned down 3,924 because films were already booked for desired dates. The Center encourages planning for a basic film library of audio-visuals at both associational and church levels, with supplementary titles provided by the Center library. At present, this library has over 2600 different filmstrip titles and more than 117 motion picture titles. The Center provides a complete catalogue to churches which contains all film and filmstrip titles, audio tapes and video cassettes.

B. Film Production

Among the films produced this year are a 103 slide set with audio cassette narration on the Institutions and Agencies of the Baptist State Convention and a 159 slide set with audio cassette narration titled **Mission Panorama**, depicting the state mission ministries of North Carolina Baptists.

C. Communications and Sight and Sound Conferences

More than 35 sight and sound conferences were held this year to assist churches in improving sound systems, lighting, and in many cases, to provide special sound systems for the deaf. A number of churches and associations are entering the area of video cassette usage for teaching-training and scheduled conferences with department personnel as well. Conferences were held in the following associations: Buncombe, Mecklenburg, Yates, New South River, Raleigh, Flat River, Mt. Zion, Tuckasegee, Haywood, Wilmington, Catawba River, Chowan, Dan Valley, North Roanoke, Gaston, South Roanoke, and Central, and at Gardner-Webb and Fruitland.

D. Audio Aids

As the tape ministry becomes an integral part of the local church outreach to the homebound, an increasing number of messages are reproduced by the Center. More than 4,800 messages were reproduced this year with messages from the Conference on Evangelism, WMU Annual Session, Church Music Weeks at Caswell, annual Baptist State Convention sessions and the annual Pastor's Conference.

II. TELEVISION AND RADIO

The Center continues to work closely with the radio and television stations in North Carolina, providing Baptist programming to approximately 100 radio stations and seven commercial television stations. The network series, **LIGHT UNTO MY PATH**, a pioneer ministry produced in cooperation with Deaf Ministries, is designed to meet the needs of the deaf, the

aging and unchurched. The statewide network of stations carrying this program includes: WRAL, Raleigh; WLOS, Asheville; WFMY, Greensboro; WBT, Charlotte; and WNCT, Greenville. Also providing coverage for North Carolina are WIS, Columbia, SC and WBTW, Florence, SC. The series is carried on 12 other stations in 9 states, sponsored by a church of convention in that state.

Other productions for commercial television include LIS-TEN, AMERICA!, produced in 13 segments each year, BIBLE STORY TIME, a weekly program for pre-schoolers, LIGHT FOR LIVING, a daily devotional series currently on 6 North Carolina stations, and CHURCH OF OUR FATHERS, a weekly program featuring choirs, church news and guest interviews.

1976 ASSOCIATIONAL STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The faithful stewardship of individual Christians and the missionary vision of our churches, expressed through their support of the Cooperative Program enables Southern Baptists to maintain a growing World Missions Program. The stewardship theme for this year is "Bold Believers in Giving." Through the Cooperative Program we demonstrate our mission commitment.

For the Christian, commitment to the task that Jesus set forth involves a total way of life. This may be referred to as the Christian life style. One man said that as he turned his life over to the lordship of Christ and discovered the demands of discipleship, he suddenly realized that his house, his possessions, and his occupational skills belonged to Christ literally, and that they were to be used in trust to accomplish Christ's mission.

For the church, commitment to the bold mission task calls for a specific life style. Churches are stewards, too. The church must demonstrate a commitment to the mission task in the use of all possessions if it is to be true to the command of Jesus. Every church is challenged to increase annually the percentage of its income given through the Cooperative Program. Churches should consider prayerfully the 15 percentage increase suggested by the state convention for Cooperative Program and the increase suggested by the Association for associational ministries.

As of June 30, 1976 the churches of our association gave \$2,354.12 through the Cooperative Program.

Last year, 1126 churches increased their gifts through the Cooperative Program by 15% or more, and 4 associations in our state had 100 percent of their churches giving through the Cooperative Program.

WE RECOMMEND:

1. That a stewardship chairman be elected in every church in our association.
2. That a stewardship conference or Stewardship Decision Night be held for interested churches in order to make available to them guidance materials for use in their stewardship programs.
3. That every church conduct a stewardship emphasis this year.
4. Every church in the association giving something through the Cooperative Program for world mission support, every month.
5. Every church in the association increasing the percentage of the total budget income given through the Cooperative Program.
6. Every church in the association giving the suggested amount for the support of associational missions, every month.
7. Have a special prayer for some Cooperative Program ministry during every service in each church during the month of October.

**1976 REPORT OF THE
CHRISTIAN LIFE COUNCIL**

The emphasis of the Christian Life Council of 1976 has been twofold: citizenship and family relationships.

In January a bicentennial packet was mailed to every North Carolina Baptist pastor. In addition, a number of sermons and conferences have dealt with Christian citizenship. Six tracts on citizenship were written and printed and are avail-

able for local church use.

A major concern for the Christian home has prompted the Council to distribute over 150,000 pieces of literature relative to the family. Over a hundred sermons on the home were preached and a number of conferences were conducted.

A Workshop for Youth Ministries was co-sponsored with the Youth Ministries Section.

A Single Adult Conference is scheduled for October 29-31 in Charlotte.

One of the most exciting developments is the creation of the Department of Christian Family Life. W. Douglas Cole will head this Department which will be a part of the Christian Life Council.

The Council continues to serve as a research, resource and referral agency for North Carolina Baptists regarding applied Christianity. Dozens of requests are received and answered from Baptists pertaining to everyday life situations.

The Christian Life Council's reason for existence centers on the concept of helping those who call Him "Lord, Lord" to know and do His commandments.

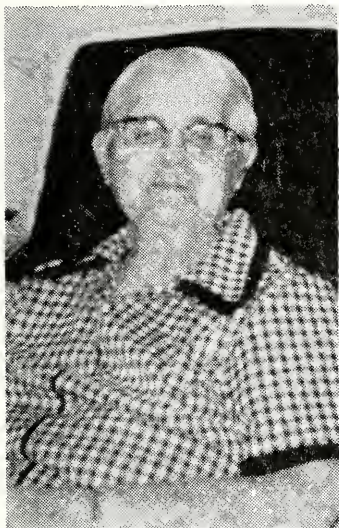

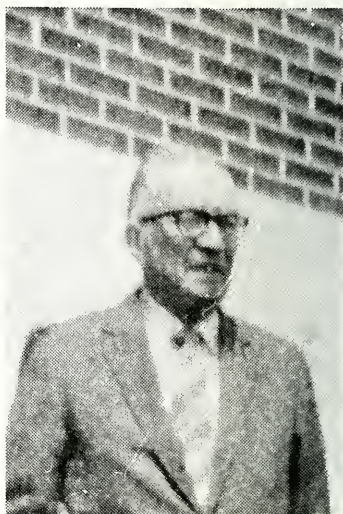

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist Churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereto: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PEROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship, and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each

annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W.M.U. President, Choir Director, and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of the business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, and 1 member, which member shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a smaller Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and distribution of the same; and

to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association ad interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specific authority. It shall make annual reports of the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886)

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head -- the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible -- the Old and New Testament -- is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper

are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator; and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.

3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.

4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided, by request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the

same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

6. When a question is under discussion no other motion of proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.

7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.

8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.

9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized "Parliamentary Practice," preferably Robert's or Kerfoots.



CONSTITUTION

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION ALLEGHANY ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE

We, the women of the Baptist Churches of Alleghany Association, desirous of stimulating the missionary spirit and grace of giving among the women and young people of the churches, and of aiding in the collection of funds for missionary purposes to be distributed by the State and Southern Woman's Missionary Union, the General Board of the State, and Southern Baptist Convention adopt the following constitution:

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of Alleghany Association, auxiliary to the Alleghany Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be three-fold:

(1) To stimulate a broader Christian development on the part of the women and young people of the Association, to train and enlist all in Christian service, especially soul winning.

(2) To receive and distribute missionary information, to provide missionary organization among women, young people and children.

(3) To encourage the earnest cooperation of women and young people and junior organizations in systematic contribution of time and money, at home and abroad.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of the Union shall be composed of Missionary Societies and Young Woman's Auxiliaries, connected with the churches in Alleghany Association.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a Superintendent, an assistant Superintendent, a Young People's Leader, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and Pianist. (Secretary-Treasurer may be held as one office. Pianist is optional.)

Section 2. There shall be six chairmen of Departmental Work; Mission Study, Community Missions, Stewardship, Margaret Fund, Training School, and Literature.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall be composed

of the officers, and the chairman of Departmental work.

Election

Section 4. These officers shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting; preferably after being named by nominating committee that has been selected by the Executive Committee at least a month prior to the annual meeting. This committee should meet as soon as possible, and as many times as necessary to complete list of officers before annual meeting, and report to annual meeting.

ARTICLE V

Associational Meeting

The Associational meeting shall be held annually or at such time and place as the Union decides. It shall be opened and closed with religious exercises, present missionary program, transact business, and hear reports of officers and committees of the organization.

ARTICLE VI

The program shall be arranged by the Superintendent of the Association with the aid of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII

This constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at the annual meeting, provided said amendment has been submitted in writing, signed by at least two members, to the Superintendent two months prior to the action thereon.

BY-LAWS

A. Duties of Officers

1. Superintendent - The Superintendent shall preside at the Associational and Executive Committee meetings; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; shall cooperate with local committee in arranging for annual meeting; shall advance in every way possible the work of the Association; and shall be a general supervisor of all the work of the Associational Union. She shall keep in touch with the Societies by visiting, correspondence, and by sending literature; shall endeavor with the aid of her associates, to organize a W.M.S., Y.W.A., G.A., Sunbeam Band and Chapter of R.A.'s in every church of the Association. She shall send quarterly and annual reports to the State Executive Committee and Divisional Superintendent, and prepare a comprehensive report of the year's work for the annual meeting. She should attend, if possible, the Divisional Meetings and State W.M.U. Conventions and Associa-

tional Conference held at this time. She should also attend the General Alleghany Baptist Association and feel responsible that a report of W.M.U. is given and recorded in the minutes. She shall also endeavor to keep her associational work in line with the State and Southern W.M.U.

2. Assistant Superintendent. The assistance Superintendent shall preside at Associational and Executive Meetings in the absence or disability of the Superintendent, and assist in advancing all the work of the Associational Union.

3. Young People's Leader - The Young People's Leader shall have general oversight of the Junior organizations, striving to organize a Y.W.A., a R.A., a G.A. and Sunbeam Band in each church of the association, visiting and helping foster in every way said organizations. She shall submit quarterly and annual reports to the Superintendent and to the State Young People's Secretary. She shall have charge of the Young People's Hour at the Associational meeting.

4. Secretary - It will be the duty of the secretary to keep an accurate record of annual and Executive Committee Meetings; and notify committees of their appointment and perform any other duties generally imposed on this officer.

5. Treasurer - The treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all money passing through her hands and shall make a report of same to the Associational Union.

6. Mission Study Chairman - The Mission Study Chairman shall promote Mission Study in various churches of the Associations, endeavoring to reach the Societies through their Mission Study Chairman. She shall receive reports of the number of classes held, enrollment, and number of awards given in each organization submitting her report at the Associational Meeting. She shall also make reports to Divisional Chairmen of Mission Study, and to the State Chairman.

7. Stewardship Chairman - It shall be the duty of the Stewardship Chairman to promote the teaching of stewardship in its fullest sense in the Missionary Societies of all grades in the Association following the plan outlined by our State and Southwide W.M.U. Stewardship Chairman. Reports should be made quarterly and annually to Division and State Chairman.

8. Community Missions - The Community Missions Chairman shall urge cooperation with the Community Missions plans of the State and Southern Community Missions Chairman in organizing and directing the community mis-

sions work, in an effort to reach the oppressed and unsaved. She shall present this by talk, playlet, or conference whenever possible, and make an annual report at the Associational Meeting and send reports to Divisional and State Chairmen.

9. Margaret Fund Chairman - It shall be the duty of the Margaret Fund Chairman to encourage the societies to give through the Annie W. Armstrong offering in March and to the Lottie Moon Christmas offering in December, to provide scholarships for missionary children's education in the homeland. She should keep in touch with the State Margaret Fund Chairman and cooperate in every possible way she suggests. She shall receive the Burney Gift from the Societies at the annual Associational Meeting and forward same to state headquarters.

10. Training School Chairman - Training School Chairman can stress various ways in supporting this most worthy institution. She should urge liberal offering to the Heck Memorial offering and encourage programs on this cause.

11. Literature Chairman - The Literature Chairman should urge subscribers to various Baptist papers and magazines and encourage reading more widely. She should take subscriptions for their periodicals at the annual meeting.

12. Executive Committee. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to carry out plans of W.M.U. W. and to transact all business between sessions of W.M.U. It shall meet at least annually and as many additional times as the Superintendent of the Association shall deem necessary. Five members shall constitute a quorum. When a vacancy occurs the Executive Committee shall be empowered to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the time unexpired. This committee shall name a month prior to Annual meeting a committee of three to nominate officers at Annual Meeting.

B. Associational Expenses

The expenses of Associational work shall be provided for by an annual contribution of not more than fifty cents per member from each society, same to be known as Associational Progress Fund.

C. Committees

The Superintendent shall appoint Committees on Time and Place and Resolutions. All of these committees shall be composed of three members each, and shall report during the session.

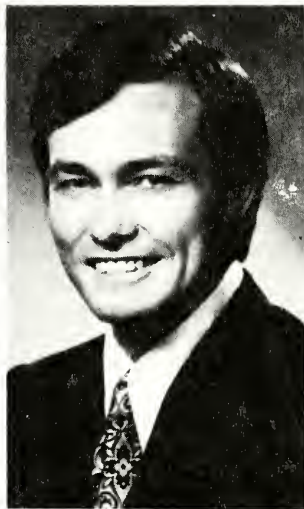

THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC.

I. Statement of purpose

The establishment of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina was approved in 1919 and chartered in 1920. The objectives of this agency of the Convention were clearly stated in its charter:

"1. To promote the making of gifts . . . for the causes and objects fostered by the members of the missionary Baptist denomination in

the State of North Carolina, in their cooperative undertakings, and to provide a way of securing greater uniformity of purposes, powers, and duties of administration in the management and distribution of the gifts so made;

“2. To receive, own, hold, administer, and distribute gifts of any kind . . . to be used for the promotion of the Missionary Baptist cause in general or any specified object of the Missionary Baptist denomination . . .”

II. Organization and Operation

The Foundation is the only agency or institution receiving its total operating budget from the Cooperative Program. Its fifteen member Board of Directors is elected by the Convention, three each year selected for five year terms. The Directors through an Executive Committee has responsibilities for reviewing budget needs and recommending its request to the General Board Budget Committee.

The staff consists of the following employees: the Executive Secretary, Edwin S. Coates; Director of Estate Planning, Sara Ann Hobbs; Staff Assistant, Dianne Babb; Treasurer, Leon Spencer; and the Legal Counsel, Tom Dimmock, a Raleigh attorney, who is retained for frequent consultation and for preparation of contracts, agreements and other matters related to the work of the Foundation.

III. Methods Used

There are three prime methods now utilized through which gifts of possessions can be transferred to benefit Baptist endeavors. The most frequently used, and the source of most assets now held by the Foundation, is the testamentary gift. The charitable remainder trust has proved to be a valuable instrument to encourage lifetime transfers of assets. The third method is through the living charitable trust.

Any new endowment, as administered by the Foundation, will provide permanent financial assistance to our institutions as well as the total Convention mission. As many individuals have stated upon establishment of a trust, they feel that they have become a part of what they are supporting. One Director of Associational Missions expressed with determination, when sharing the Foundation report with the 1975 Baptist State Convention, “Through our investment in the Foundation that supports the Cooperative Program permanently, we now *are* the Cooperative Program.”

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

Baptists of North Carolina are deeply involved in the ministry of Christian Higher Education through the support of six colleges and one university: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wingate and Wake Forest University. During the 1976-77 academic year, 13,733 persons were enrolled in the seven schools. The number graduating in May, 1977 was 2,493.

One strong emphasis of Baptist colleges is the preparation of pastors and other church vocation volunteers. In the fall of 1976 there were 846 persons preparing for church related vocations at North Carolina Baptist colleges.

The recruitment of more Baptist young people is a major concern of the colleges. Pastors and other church leaders are urged to encourage the youth from Baptist churches to attend a Baptist college. During 1977, the pastors have given the names of more than 6,000 prospective students to the colleges through the Council on Christian Higher Education. These students have received information from the colleges and from the Council office.

Most of the students attending a North Carolina Baptist college receive some form of financial assistance. Each of the colleges pledges to assist needy students financially in order to make available the educational experience at a Christian college. An offering is received on Father's Day each year in the junior year of high school. Grants, loans and work scholarships are available for those who need them.

North Carolina Baptist colleges continue to be grateful for generous financial support through the Cooperative Program. The colleges reaffirm their support and partnership in missions with the churches, and offer the services of faculty, students and other campus resources to make the Bold Mission emphasis of Southern Baptists a vital and successful ministry.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION 1977

The beautiful stained glass windows in the front of Davis Chapel at Baptist Hospital has three large panels, each depicting an aspect of Christ's ministry: healing, teaching, and preaching. The window serves as a reminder to the staff that Baptist Hospital has also been commissioned to this three-fold task.

The hospital's primary task, obviously is healing and it attempts to

obtain and use the best personnel and equipment available for the healing task. The medical staff consists of competent, dedicated men and women in all the various specialties of medicine. Persons with rare and complicated medical problems are referred to Baptist Hospital by their family physicians for treatment. Last year 158,863 visits were made in the hospital's Outpatient Department and the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics. There were 22,365 admissions to the hospital for a total of 193,942 patient days. These patients came from 90 counties in North Carolina, from 29 other states and from three foreign countries.

Baptist Hospital is also involved in teaching. In cooperation with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University, it helped to train 1,188 students last year for careers in medicine and allied health fields. In addition, there were 87 graduate students in the basic sciences. The hospital also provided clinical facilities for 483 student nurses from three nearby schools of nursing and for 120 students in other allied schools. The School of Pastoral Care last year enrolled a total of 75 students in various levels of Clinical Pastoral Education.

The hospital also has a preaching in the formal sense at least four times a week in the worship services held in Davis Chapel. In a less formal sense, the Christian Gospel is proclaimed daily by staff, students, patients and others who witness to their faith in word and deed.

In all of these ministries, Baptist hospital is mindful of its Christian heritage and its strong tie with the Baptist State Convention. This tie is maintained and strengthened through the services of capable dedicated trustees who are elected by and are responsible to the Convention. The tie is also strengthened through the financial support from the churches; last year \$294,324 was received through the Cooperative Program and \$405,947, through the Mother's Day Offering.

Several members of the hospital staff have assumed active roles in denominational life at the associational level and the state convention level, as well as in their local churches. For the past five years hospital personnel have assisted in Cooperative Program promotion in at least two associations each year. Staff members are pleased to do everything possible to strengthen the denominational tie, believing that this tie adds a dimension onto the ministry of healing, teaching, and preaching.

Mother's Day gifts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1977, were \$411,225.56 compared to a total of \$405,946.52 for the preceding fiscal year.

1977 ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

New Program Highlights Year

In 1976, the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention recommended a new retirement program which was approved by all the state Baptist Conventions. The new program called the Southern Baptist Retirement Program will go into effect January 1, 1978.

The Board paid \$17,138,343 in benefits in 11,925 widows, retired or disabled members in 1976. During its 59 years of service, the Board has paid more than \$158 million in retirement and protection benefits.

A 13th check amounting to one's month income was mailed for the eleventh time to annuitants. The combined amount of this extra benefit came to \$830,525.

Most members benefit from a decision to increase the interest rate for figuring retirement benefits. Annuitants began receiving larger checks as of January 1, 1977.

For almost 45,000 members, the Board held in trust funds totaling \$472,218,669 for retirement benefits for the year ending 1976.

The Annuity Board also administers life, medical, and disability insurance programs, which reflected increases in membership.

As of now, we only have two churches in our Association participating in the retirement program. I would hope and pray that each one of you as a church would consider enrolling your pastor in this program.

Baptists of North Carolina provide a ministry of love and care to children, young people and their families. The program is more than room and meals and activities and recreation. It's more than buildings and grounds. The care of children is missions . . . reaching out with a helping hand, it is evangelism . . . sharing the joy of life in

Christ; it is love and affection . . . the giving of hugs and kisses and friendship; it is education . . . teaching an appreciation for the finer things in life; it is restoration . . . enabling families to function again.

Campuses at Mills Home, Thomasville; Kennedy Home, Kinston; Odum Home, Pembroke; and Broyhill Home, Waynesville-Clyde continue to serve as centers of service and operation in their respective areas of the state.

Foster Home Care: a state wide program of the Homes, is vital to numbers of children needing special help. Additional foster homes are needed throughout the state. They welcome opportunities to talk with prospective foster parents about this area of service.

Emergency Shelters at Forest City, Charlotte, Burlington and Henderson are meeting a critical need. They provide a ready resource for children who need help immediately. During a period of one to ninety days responsible planning is made for the child's future.

The Maternity Home in Asheville, opened in 1970, has proved to be a much-needed and well received service. More than three hundred girls have been served from throughout North Carolina and beyond. It is recognized for its quality of care and Christian concern.

Social Work and Family Resource Centers enable us to work with families in providing services to children, family rehabilitation, family education in preventive services. These Centers are located at Waynesville, Asheville, Charlotte, Thomasville, Burlington, Raleigh, Kinston, Fayetteville and Pembroke.

The Child Development Center on the Mills Home Campus at Thomasville provides for preschool age children in nursery school education, day care and kindergarten. They welcome opportunities to assist churches any place in the State who want to develop this type program.

Members of the staff are anxious to have members of our churches visit on any of their campuses. To see, observe and to feel in person what it is like to live in a children's home is to appreciate the child care ministry. The staff and children thank all North Carolina Baptists for their dependable support in numerous ways. It is their purpose to keep this a dynamic ministry and to meet the needs of those whom they serve.

The past year in your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging has been one of the fullest and most exciting in the twenty-six years that the Homes have been ministering!

Of keenest interest was the ground-breaking service for the new Western North Carolina Baptist Homes, on the Pearson Estate on Richmond Hill, in Northwest Asheville, last October, when more than a thousand people from our Western North Carolina Baptist Churches, as well as many others throughout the State, were present. It was a thrilling moment indeed when trustees, staff, and residents of the Homes, pastors, and other church leaders latched on to ropes, attaching to a huge bulldozer, pulled together and helped to move the first dirt at the site, heralding the beginning of the construction of your sixth Baptist Home for the Aging.

Construction is now underway for this lovely Western North Carolina Baptist Home, which will initially accommodate 50 people.

Another exciting venture is the construction of four duplex apartments at the site of the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem. These apartments will care for 16 additional persons and will be ready for occupancy in the fall of 1977. 66 more people will be served in our Baptist Homes family in the next two years.

Gifts from our Baptist people have been very encouraging during the past year through the Cooperative Program and through the third Sunday of February offering. These sources supply 35% of the total budget of the Homes and are used continually to supplement the care of the majority of the residents who cannot pay their full cost of care. They are love gifts indeed and are a life-time for those whose needs could not be met without them.

The needs of older persons in our society today are great and are overwhelming. Plans are in the making for an accelerated ministry in our North Carolina Baptist Homes that will touch an ever increasing number of persons.

These plans will call for a greater concern and commitment on our part than ever before. The future of our North Carolina Baptist Homes is as bright as the promises of God, and in that future, the Lord and these older people in our midst, will be looking to you to share in meeting the needs as we reach out and serve more of these dear ones who desperately need help.

EVANGELISM REPORT

The Pastor's Evangelism Planbook 1977-79: *EVANGELISM AND CONGREGATIONALIZING* has already been sent to all churches. It includes various emphasis on The Evangelistic Church on Bold Missions. Additional information on this theme will be shared with pastors and church leaders.

"Bold in Creative Witness" was the theme of the 31st Statewide Evangelism Conference at the War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February 7-9, 1977. About 2,400 pastors and lay persons were present to hear the challenging messages of the evangelistic speakers.

Over 500 youth and adults came to the North Carolina Baptist

Assembly for the Youth Ministry Week — June 13-17, and many different types of decisions for Christ were made public by youth. The emphasis was on youth evangelism, vocational guidance, and recreation.

About 12,000 youth, pastors, and adult leaders are planning to attend the 7th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night - August 19 at the Greensboro Coliseum. Jim Wilson and Larry McFadden of Orlando, Florida were the guest preacher and soloist. All youth who made decisions for Christ are contacted by pastors and adults with regard to specific follow-up counseling.

Thirty-six churches across the state are having one week youth revivals and youth witness training under the direction of four Summer Youth Evangelism Teams. Let us rejoice in all the decisions for Christ made by youth.

Excellent reports have been received on Lay Renewal Weekends and Ministry Evangelism Weekends in various churches. The Division of Evangelism cooperates with the Brotherhood Department in this phase of the work.

Associations and churches are now involved in the Youth Evangelism Strategy which includes these four areas: Leadership Family; Touch Ministry; Discipleship Groups; and Joy Explosion. W. O. W. — Win Our World — has to do with specific witness training for youth in the local churches.

65 Associations have participated in one week Lay Evangelism Schools in recent years with over 14,400 youth and adults receiving lay witness training from 1,175 churches. More lay persons need to become involved in consistent witnessing to unsaved individuals.

Several thousand persons have attended evangelism clinics and conference held in associations across the state. Good reports on revival meetings and city-wide crusades have been received.

The 32nd Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, on February 6-7, 1978.

All the churches in the Alleghany Association had at least one revival meeting the past year.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNICATIONS

The past year has been a high water mark in the history of the Radio and Television Commission. The videotape production sound stage and the training theater were completed and the television

department and related work were moved into the new 32,599 square foot complex in September, 1976. Dedication services were held in April, 1977.

The evangelistic thrust of the Commission is being felt throughout the nation with the launching of the two-quarter hour television series during the first quarter of 1977. In "The Athletes" the claims of Christ are made through the testimonies of athletic stars representing many different sports. Usually "Listen" will be shown in conjunction with "The Athletes." Dr. Charles Fuller of Roanoke, Va., is host and narrator on "Listen" which features a variety of contemporary subjects and closes with a strong Christian appeal.

Plans are to continue production of these series in 1977-78, right along with the "Human Dimension", "Jot", and other television productions. "Jot" has four new episodes scripted, and the Foreign Mission Board has allotted \$80,000 for producing additional "Jot" episodes in Spanish.

Dr. Herschel H. Hobbs, preacher on "The Baptist Hour" for 18 years retired from this ministry in October, 1976. No regular preacher has been chosen at this time and guest speakers will fill the "Pulpit" during 1977. Dr. Frank Pollard, pastor of First Baptist Church, Jackson, Miss., preached the final quarter in 1976 and will preach the last quarter of 1977. Dr. Jaroy Weber, pastor of First Baptist Church, Lubbock, Tx., will complete three quarters of 1977. Dr. Hobbs prepared more than 700 sermons for the program during his tenure.

One of the exciting projects now underway in cooperation with the Baptist Sunday School Board is the Joint Venture Bible Correspondence Program which is being studied as a way to enlist large numbers of people in Bible study through television.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

During the 1977-78 fiscal year, the Brotherhood Commission emphasized mission education, mission commitment, evangelism and leader training.

While enrolment of men and boys in Brotherhood units dropped

by 1.2 percent to 473,309 at the start of the year, the number of churches with Brotherhood work increased by 52 to a total of 15,359.

Churches with Baptist Men's work increased by 408 and those with Brotherhood directors by 316.

In the area of mission education, a long-range plan to provide every Southern Baptist church with mission information and opportunity for involvement in missions progressed on schedule.

The Commission is working with Woman's Missionary Union, Foreign Mission Board, Home Mission Board, and Sunday School Board through a Mission Education Council to complete this project.

The project calls for researching and developing a correlated program design and missions curriculum, a convention-wide plan for mission education, and a national merchandising plan for mission education materials.

The project is designed to help implement Bold Mission Thrust, the effort of Southern Baptists to communicate the gospel to every person in the world by the year 2000.

Working with WMU, the Commission helped sponsor a Bold Mission Leadership Conference at Glorieta Baptist Conference Center which attracted 2039, an increase of almost 25 percent over a similar conference a year before.

An emphasis on the involvement of lay people in denominational activities and vocational witnessing drew 8,500 to Atlanta for 15 vocational breakfasts and a bold mission rally featuring President Jimmy Carter, a leading Southern Baptist layman.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. - 1978

A survey in several counties representative of the cross-section of our state has provided interesting information regarding the seriousness, or lack of seriousness, to which stewardship of estates is considered. Court records and wills were carefully studied in these counties to determine the disposition of possessions for a specific time. Facts revealed were:

1. 30% of the decedants died without a written will.
2. Very little was provided for the church or any charitable cause through the wills that were probated (Six-tenths of one percent was given to *all* charitable causes and only 65 one-thousandths

of one percent was left to all Baptist causes.).

3. 45% of all assets were left either to husbands or wives, 37% of all assets were left to children by parents, and 27% was left to grandchildren or other persons.
4. Projected to a statewide basis for one year, two-thirds of one billion dollars is left in estates each year.
5. Based on resident Baptist population in the state, a tithe of the estates of Baptists that die each year would provide in excess of \$10,000,000 additional dollars annually to the support of Christian missions and ministries carried on by our churches and denomination.

Baptists who believe in Bold Mission endeavors will:

1. prepare a will or have their will updated;
2. provide for their church pledges and commitments to be fulfilled through their will;
3. seriously consider a tithe of their estates to a Christian cause.

During 1977-1978 fiscal year, the Foundation has received \$198,139 in additions to the trust funds being held. Twenty-seven new trusts were established.

The Baptist Foundation staff is available to assist any individual who wishes to have a will prepared or updated. Anyone using Foundation services and who designates through their will a bequest to any Baptist institution or Baptist mission cause can have their will prepared at no cost. Assistance in cost can also be provided for those who desire to have their wills prepared or reviewed by a local attorney.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION 1978

Baptist Hospital continues to find ways of enlarging and improving its care of patients.

During the past year, the Department of Family Medicine moved into new quarters. It is anticipated that with the larger area, the Family Practice Center will provide primary health care for more than 5,000 families by 1980. Also, the teaching program for resident physicians in Family Medicine will increase to 36 positions by 1980. Many of these physicians are expected to enter family practice in North Carolina.

Other improvements in patient care include the installation of a whole-body scanner and the opening of new and larger facilities for

the Intensive Care and Intermediate Nurseries. The body scanner is particularly useful in locating and defining problems such as tumors in the chest, abdomen and pelvic areas; in determining the spread of disease from one organ to another; and visualizing aneurysms in the abdomen. The new nurseries have already played a significant role in reducing the infant death rate and in improving the chances of premature babies growing up without lasting effects from earlier medical problems.

Creation of a new Department of Patient Relations and the employment of a full-time director has also helped to improve the quality of patient care. The primary function of this department is to respond to specific concerns patients have regarding their hospital care and to act in behalf of patients and their families in resolving problems and meeting needs.

A closed-circuit television system will soon be carrying services from the hospital chapel, other devotional programs and educational programs to patient rooms. This system will also be used in staff education programs. The equipment was purchased with funds from the estate of Miss Olivia Hall who worked for Baptist Hospital for nearly a half-century.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to make a significant contribution to patient care as well as in clinical pastoral education, counseling and enrichment events. During recent months the department has begun another satellite center; this fourth satellite is in Charlotte and is operated in cooperation with the Mecklenburg Baptist Association. In April of this year, the Counseling Center received accreditation by the American Association of Pastoral Counselors.

In recent months, the Medical Center Challenge Program completed a successful fund campaign, over-subscribing its \$18-million goal. The final project in this program will be the replacement of the original hospital building, opened in 1923, with a new Focus Building which is scheduled for completion in 1980.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

Baptists of North Carolina support and operate, through elected trustees, six colleges and one university: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wingate and Wake Forest University. The histories of these colleges and the Baptist State Convention have intersected and intertwined since 1834. While not all of

the colleges were begun by the Convention per se, all were begun by Baptists, with strong convictions about the need for Christian higher education. The seven colleges have been in operation for a total of 729 years. Currently, faculty and staff number 1,441. During the 1977-78 academic year, the full-time enrollment of the colleges was 13,000. The total enrollment, including summer school and special students, was more than 19,000.

Baptist colleges serve Christ and Baptist people best when they are truest to their primary mission, Christian education. Christian education is education under Christian auspices for Christian ends. Christian education is Christianity operating in the field of enlightenment. A Christian college is a college founded and maintained and conducted by Christian people in the service of the Kingdom of God.

Because Christians affirm the doctrine of creation, there is no subject of investigation which is inappropriate for Christian education, from Art to Zoology. The telescope becomes the tool of the Kingdom for those who believe that "The heavens declare the glory of God." The historian's pen and the biologist's microscope are welcome allies to those whose quest is "That at the name of Jesus, every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth."

Churches are urged to encourage their youth to attend a Baptist college. Most of the students attending a North Carolina Baptist college receive some form of financial assistance. Each of the colleges pledges to assist needy students with financial aid. Students who need to apply for financial aid should make application to college early in the senior year of high school. Grants, loans and work scholarships are available for those who need them.

North Carolina Baptist colleges continue to be grateful for generous financial support through the Cooperative Program. The colleges reaffirm their support and partnership in missions with the churches, and offer the services of faculty, students and other campus resources to make the Bold Missions emphasis of Southern Baptists a vital and successful ministry.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The year 1977 was one of contrasts for the Annuity Board. The year represented a period of strong demands which resulted from servicing needs of new accounts, a complex asset allocation process, implementation of a new church retirement program and

accounting responsibilities of new investment funds.

Key statistics in 1977 included:

1. A permanent 8.33 percent increase in most annuitants' checks. The increase was retroactive to January 1.
2. A total of \$19,085,316 paid in retirement and protection benefits. Insurance benefits through church, agency and seminarian programs exceeded \$12 million.
3. The enrollment of 545 new churches in the basic retirement plan. New pastors and church employees in Plan A numbered 2,169, and 3,000 members upgraded their program.

Plan A members increased from 27,598 in 1976 to 29,142 in 1977. Enrollment in Plan B rose from 25,412 to 33,062, but Plan C's membership dipped from 5,987 the previous year to 4,885 for the year ended.

In 1977, premium income totaled \$45,603,942 — including relief. Total assets climbed to \$498,977,661, compared with \$473,142,631 a year earlier.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

The programs, services and facilities of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina are being utilized well for the care of children and in providing assistance to families that need their help. North Carolina Baptists and other friends continue to support this ministry through personal involvement, prayer, and financial support. It is the purpose of the Homes to provide quality care and to be worthy of the faith and confidence of their many friends and supporters.

Requests are coming to the Homes from various sections of the state for additional community-based services (such as, emergency care and group homes). This is a wholesome trend in child care. Children can best be served and families strengthened when care can be provided reasonably close to a child's home. The homes have been moving in that direction for several years. They will respond to additional requests for programs and services as financial resources permit.

North Carolina Baptists have reason to be pleased with work that is currently in progress throughout North Carolina. In the Piedmont area, Mills Home, foster home services, emergency care at Burlington and Charlotte, the high adventure program at Wall

Home, the Child Development Center on the Mills Home campus, programs of crisis intervention, counseling, and family education fill a particular need in this area of the state.

They are in constant need of well qualified staff. This is particularly true of cottage parents and foster home parents. Join us in prayer that God will impress upon sufficient numbers of prospective workers that child care is a Christian vocation and that it affords wonderful opportunities for service.

We are deeply grateful for support of the Children's Homes which comes from all churches through the Cooperative Program, special gifts and the traditional Thanksgiving offering.

The forthcoming Thanksgiving offering is extremely important. This will be the last time that our people will have the challenge of making an over and above offering to the Children's Homes at Thanksgiving time. As a part of the Bold Missions thrust, the Thanksgiving offering for the Children's Homes in 1979 will become a part of the North Carolina Baptist State Missions offering to be received each September thereafter.

To bridge the transitional gap next year, the trustees have set a goal of \$1,000,000 (one million dollars) through the 1978 Thanksgiving offering. They are dependent upon their friends for financial support sufficient to carry on this ministry.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

North Carolina Baptists have the following Baptist Homes for the Aging:

1. *Resthaven*, located in Winston-Salem, with space for 16 residents;
2. *The Hayes Home* and the *Nursing Care Unit*, in Winston-Salem with space for 46 residents, and 79 patients. The Nursing Care Unit serves all five of our Homes, and will serve the Western North Carolina Baptist Home. Patients are transferred to this nursing facility when long-term nursing care is needed, either for Intermediate Nursing Care, or Skilled Nursing Care. There is also a duplex apartment complex at the site of the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem, with a space for 120 people.
3. *The Albemarle Home*, in Albemarle with space for 30

residents;

4. *The Hamilton Home*, in Hamilton, with space for 28 residents;
5. *The Yanceyville Home*, in Yanceyville, with space for 31 residents;
6. *The Western North Carolina Baptist Home*, in Asheville, with space for 50 residents, now under construction.

This means that there will be accommodations for 300 people in all of our six Baptist Homes, the apartment complex, and the Nursing Care Unit, when the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville is completed. This lovely facility is now under construction, and it is anticipated that it will be completed and ready for occupancy by February 15, 1979.

Our Baptist Homes for the Aging have received vital support from our more than 3400 Baptist churches through two vital sources through the years:

1. The Cooperative Program, which supplies about 8% of our total budget;
2. The Special Offering which supplies 16% of our total budget.

These gifts are used to supplement the care of the majority of the residents in our Baptist Homes and are a life-line, therefore, to residents who could not possibly pay the cost of care, if it were not for these gifts. We are grateful for these gifts and for every church and every person who has had a part in making them possible.

Since our February, 1978 offering for the Baptist Homes was the last Special Offering ever, we are greatly concerned that our churches and our people continue, in an ever increasing manner, their loyal support for the Homes. The total goal of the State Missions Offering for 1979, in which we will share with our other Baptist institutions, and with the specific causes of State Missions is \$2,000,000. Our Baptist Homes will receive \$300,000.00 from this Offering, if the total goal is reached.

If not, we will not receive that amount. From the time projected until September of 1979 will represent a period of two years. During this period we will most likely have to borrow money to operate the Homes for the Aging, since we normally receive \$300,000 from the Special Offering.

Also, of great concern is the fact that we are scheduled to open the Western North Carolina Baptist Home, in Asheville around February 15, 1979, to accommodate 50 additional people, prior to the September 1979 State Missions Offering and with no additional per cent of the Cooperative Program dollar. In fact, we receive 1 2/10% of the Cooperative Program, and this percent has not been

changed during the 27 years of the ministry of the Baptist Homes for the Aging. Though the Homes receive more money through the Cooperative Program than formerly, in dollars, around \$155,000, the percent of the budget of the Homes provided through the Cooperative Program has dropped 10% to 8%. The needs of the Homes for the Aging are greater than ever, and we are vitally concerned about how those needs are going to be met. It is estimated that we will need additional \$100,000 to operate the Western North Carolina Baptist Home. From whence shall this come? We believe that it will come from our Baptist people, that we are a people on a bold mission for the Lord, that we will trust Him more for our needs, and pull together, in meeting the 1979 State Missions goal of \$2,000,000, that we will give more through the Cooperative Program for all of our Baptist work and causes!

Of interest in our Homes for the Aging in projected growth and service is a new proposed wing to the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem which will house 51 additional patients and residents and bring our total capacity in all of the Homes and the Nursing Care Unit to 351 persons.

The growing edge of our national and state population is in the area of the aging, those 65 years of age and above. We must continue to prepare for them in our churches, our communities, and in our Baptist Homes for the Aging.

Will you join us in our prayers and in our plans for those aging persons who look to us for help!

Christians need to lead unsaved persons to make genuine commitments to Christ and to guide them in their spiritual development. Pastors and church leaders can use the notebook — **Bold Evangelism through the Local Church** — to plan and develop an ongoing program of evangelism. Free notebooks will be available and training sessions will be held in associational evangelism clinics across the state.

“The Evangelistic Church on Bold Mission” was the theme of the 32nd Statewide Evangelism Conference at the War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February 6-7, 1978. Evangelistic speakers challenged about 2,400 pastors and lay persons to involve church members in bold evangelism.

Four summer youth evangelism teams preached in one week youth revivals and directed youth witness training in many churches around the state. One of these teams led youth revivals in Maryland in a joint Bold Mission effort. Genuine decisions for Christ were made by many youth.

Over 9,000 youth and adults attended the largest Youth Ministry Week during July 3-8 at North Carolina Baptist Assembly. All persons participated in specific witness training sessions. The emphasis also included vocational guidance and recreation.

About 12,500 youth, pastors, and adult leaders were expected for the 18th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night — August 18 — at Greensboro Coliseum. Bill Hogue, Director, Evangelism Section, Home Mission Board, Atlanta, was the preacher; Richard and Judy Bradford, Albuquerque, New Mexico, were the soloists, and other youth shared on the program. Follow-up work is always assigned to pastors with all youth who make decisions.

Churches are encouraged to become more involved in Renewal Evangelism. The Division of Evangelism cooperates with the Brotherhood Department in this phase of the work.

Sixty-eight associations have participated in one week Lay Evangelism Schools in recent years with 15,000 youth and adults receiving lay witness training from 1,245 churches. Consistent witnessing to non-Christians is essential.

Youth Evangelism Strategy can help associations and churches train their youth in witnessing to the unsaved and in personal discipleship. Also, YES equips adults to work with youth in evangelism.

Excellent reports on revival meetings, city-wide crusades, and associational evangelism clinics have been received. There has been a good response to associational youth evangelism emphasis.

The 33rd Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held at Cumberland County Memorial Auditorium, Fayetteville, on February 5-6, 1979.

All the churches in the Alleghany Association had at least one revival meeting the past year. Bible schools and Bible Studies were also held in most of the churches.

COMMUNICATIONS REPORT — 1978

Press Relations

Communications prepares and distributes all General Board news releases for the Biblical Record and secular media. The division director, along with the editor of the Recorder, manages the convention news room during the annual session.

Publications

Communications includes the general editorial and design production of all printed materials related to General Board programs, producing Church Leader (bimonthly newsletter), Baptist Diary (calendar and directory), the Convention Annual and all materials related to the annual session.

Audio-Visuals

This year, the audio-visual library booked 10,024 free rental films from a library containing 2600 filmstrips and 164 motion picture titles. All titles are listed in a free catalog available on request.

Audio-visual productions include a video cassette and filmstrip with audio cassette in support of State Missions. Currently in production are video cassettes and filmstrips on ministries to the mentally retarded, the aging, and a filmstrip on trustee orientation. A video cassette series on Exodus was produced for use in January Bible Study, 1978.

Sight and sound conferences were held to assist churches in improving sound systems, lighting, and special sound systems for the deaf, and to encourage wider use of video teaching aids. A statewide Communications Workshop was held in May.

Approximately 3,500 tapes were reproduced on order from the master tape library containing messages from major conferences

and workshops across the state.

Radio And Television

The Division provides 75 radio stations and seven commercial television stations with programs weekly. Included are Religious News Scope (radio), Listen, America! featuring Christian college youth (radio and television), Bible Story Time for pre-schoolers (television), Church Of Our Fathers with guest choirs and teachers (television), Light For Living daily devotionals (radio and television).

Production for the year includes 4,406 radio programs, 2,732 commercial television programs, 728 programs for cablevision and 77 programs for church and associate use — a total of 7,943 programs.

REPORT OF THE STEWARDSHIP CHAIRMAN

I. Cooperative Program

Commitment to Bold Mission Thrust calls for specific action on our part as individuals and churches. Let every church in our association demonstrate its commitment to the world mission task through serving and giving. Every church is challenged to increase, on an annual basis, the percentage of its total budget income given through the Cooperative Program and through the missions budget of the association. As a further guideline, churches should consider

prayerfully the percentage increase suggested by the state convention for Cooperative Program and the increase suggested by the association for associational ministries.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist Churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereto: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PEROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship, and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each

annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W.M.U. President, Choir Director, and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of the business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, and 1 member, which member shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a smaller Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and distribution of the same; and

to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association ad interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specific authority. It shall make annual reports of the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886)

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head -- the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible -- the Old and New Testament -- is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper

are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator; and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.

3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.

4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided, by request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the

same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

6. When a question is under discussion no other motion of proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.

7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.

8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.

9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized "Parliamentary Practice," preferably Robert's or Kerfoots.

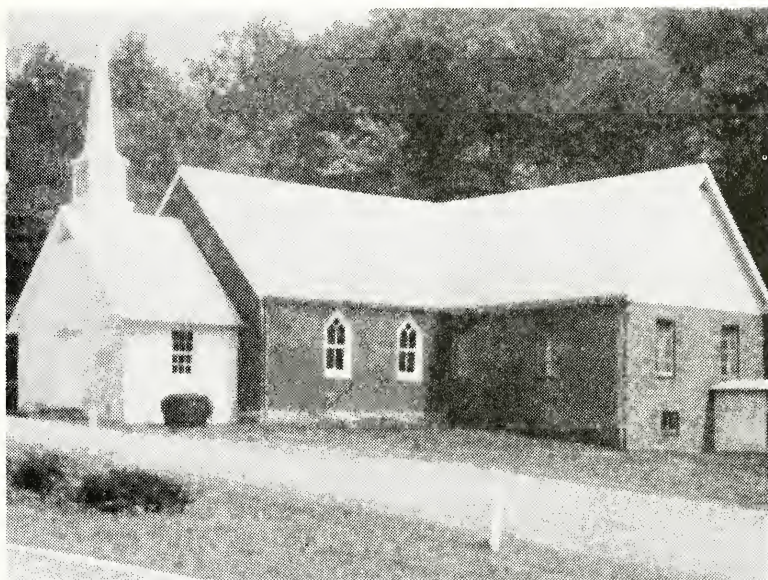

HISTORICAL SKETCH FOR 1978-1979

Churches of the Alleghany Baptist Association have contributed to the various causes of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. Several churches sponsored children to attend the Special Opportunities Camp in July.

Mount Carmel reported a record-breaking Vacation Bible School. Three young men, Gary L. Osborne, Donald J. Shaw, and Randy M. Absher were licensed to preach the Gospel by Mount Carmel Church.

Extra acreage has been added to some church grounds. Improvements and general upkeep of structures, equipment, and grounds have been done by all the churches. Statistics are found in the church minutes.

HISTORY OF PINE FORK BAPTIST CHURCH

Located about three miles north of Laurel Springs Post Office in a grove of trees, where the present church building stands, Pine Fork Baptist Church was organized on October 6, 1898 with twenty-one members. The Reverends D. L. Vaughn, Daniel Roberts, James Shumate, Callie Blevins, Frank B. Cheek, and Ezekiel Blevins were present for the organization.

The Rev. Frank B. Cheek was elected moderator, Rev. Callie Blevins, pastor, and G. Tom Caudill, church clerk. The time selected for church services was the second Saturday and Sunday in each month.

The new church was sponsored by Laurel Springs, Liberty, and New Hope Baptist Churches which were already established in Alleghany County.

John Taylor and G. Tom Caudill were appointed as a building

committee for a church building. John Taylor donated the land for the building and with the help of interested people, a wooden building was erected in 1898-1899. Fifty years later, a deed was made to the church for the land and space for a church cemetery. This was done by a granddaughter of Mr. Taylor.

In 1950 plans were made to replace the frame building with a brick structure. The Rev. Willie Hamm, Robert Hoppers, U. S. Myers, and others composed the building committee. With cooperation and generous efforts of the individual members, the building, containing a sanctuary and two Sunday School rooms, was completed and dedicated in 1955.

The building was remodeled and a wing added in 1965. This provided more rooms for the growing Sunday School and a new entrance to the church. In 1978 another wing was added to the other side of the church. This addition contained two more Sunday School rooms and rest rooms. A well was drilled to furnish water for the structure. The roof on the wing built in 1965 was raised to the level of the new addition, making a more attractive building.

Many improvements have been made on the church grounds. Shrubbery has been planted, driveways repaired, and a new church sign has been erected. A baptismal pool was constructed on the church lawn about four years ago. A chain-link fence encloses the cemetery. A church bus has been used to bring those who wish to ride it to church services.

Pine Fork's present membership numbers 174 with 100 active members. The Rev. Earl Adams is serving as interim pastor at the present time.

Through the past eighty years, Pine Fork Baptist Church has had eighteen pastors and eighteen deacons.

In 1964 the church clerks' book was microfilmed by Wake Forest College, Winston Salem, N. C. along with other clerks' books of the Alleghany Baptist Association. This was done through the efforts of Mrs. A. O. Joines, Associational Historian at that time. Mrs. Joines is due credit for much of the research done in this report.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT TO ASSOCIATIONS — 1979

Since January 1, 1979, the Foundation staff with the assistance from Rev. James B. McQuere, retired Director of Missions of the South Fork Baptist Association, an intensive effort has been made through conferences over the state to familiarize as many pastors as possible of the helpful services provided by the Baptist State Convention through the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. The Foundation is available to assist individual Baptists with their estate planning, regardless of the size of the estate. Many of the most significant and meaningful gifts to support the Christian ministries through the denomination have been directed through the Foundation as trustee. These services are available from the trained staff and their professional support (accounting and legal services) employed for this purpose without cost to individual participants. Where an individual desires to be a part of sharing the gospel beyond his or her life-

time, the establishment of a trust with the Foundation provides a tangible participation in such activities.

The Foundation has been actively engaged in assisting individuals in not only having their Wills redrafted, but also in the preparation and establishment of annuity trusts. Through such a trust, an individual or couple can place in trust assets (such as property, cash or securities) and receive income for the remainder of their lives. After death, the income from the trust will be paid to the donor's choice(s) of Baptist missions work and/or institution. This method of giving provides the satisfying knowledge of being a faithful steward in utilizing resources more completely for the Lord's ministries, as well as, taking advantage of the laws of our land in reducing taxation on resources — both income and estates.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS 1979

Although growth in bed capacity at Baptist Hospital has leveled off at just under 700 beds, there is continuing expansion of the hospital's services. This expansion results from new discoveries made through medical research, and is in response to the health care needs of people.

During the past year a 38-bed rehabilitation unit has opened to offer short-term services and family instruction to the disabled. The chief beneficiaries of this program are patients with strokes, arthritis, burns, long-term casts, joint replacement surgery, brain tumors, spinal cord injuries, hand injuries, and some cardiac problems.

A new six-bed burn unit is scheduled to open soon. This unit will permit the isolation of burn patients in a location where all required services are immediately available.

An automatic clinical analyzer, the first of its kind in the state, has been acquired and put into operation. This fully automated analyzer, which uses computer technology, can perform more than 200 tests. It analyzes blood serum and body fluids and provides results in less than eight minutes. These prompt and accurate results are of

particular importance in critical care areas, such as the emergency room.

Another new ministry is a program of home visitation for children with cancer and their families. A team consisting of physicians, nurses, a psychologist and chaplains ministers to families during three critical periods: when a child has received a recent diagnosis of cancer, when a child is terminally ill, when a child has recently died.

Our chaplains lead worship services in Davis Chapel, which are relayed to all patient rooms by closed-circuit television. They also provide a pastoral ministry to patients, their families and to staff members; provide more than 15,000 hours of personal counselling annually; offer personal growth and enrichment events to hundreds of clergy and lay persons each year; and conduct the largest program of clinical pastoral education in the world. Ministries of the Pastoral Care department are made accessible to people across the state through satellites in Fayetteville, Raleigh, Morganton and Charlotte.

Baptist Hospital has actively participated in the Voluntary Effort to keep hospital costs as low as possible. Our hospital and several of its employees have been recognized and received awards for their cost-saving ideas and efforts. Our patients benefit in that the hospital's room rate increase this year — despite continuing inflation — is only 5%, as compared to an annual increase of 6% in recent years.

In recent months the hospital's oldest building — "Old Main" — has been torn down and a new six-story Focus Building is now rising on this site.

Our hospital staff members have been working with representatives from other denominational agencies and with leaders of the Baptist State Convention to promote the North Carolina Missions Offering. The hospital looks forward to receiving its share of this offering, as gifts from the churches in the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$196,516, as compared to \$388,122 in the preceding fiscal year.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

When North Carolina Baptists call the college/university roll, there are seven reasons to be grateful and proud: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest and Wingate. These are seven of 53 colleges and universities supported and nurtured by state conventions within the Southern Baptist Con-

vention.

According to the latest figures printed by the Education Commission, SBC, of the 134,000 students attending the 53 Baptist colleges in the Convention, almost 20,000 are enrolled in our North Carolina schools. Thus, 15% of all Baptist college enrollments are located in this state.

The 1978-79 year witnessed change and progress. Enrollments were stable; budgets were balanced; Wingate College made history by graduating the first senior class; Campbell, once known as a senior college, announced a name change to Campbell University; the Campbell Law School graduated its first class; and churches all across the state answered the Council's request for names and addresses of prospective college students. In the main, it was a very good year for Baptist colleges.

All North Carolina Baptists are now aware of the current discussions between Wake Forest and the Council Committee to Study the Wake Forest University Proposal. Many hours of study and work have been given by that committee, and this work will continue at least until the Convention meets in Winston-Salem on November 13-14, 1979. The Council will make its recommendation to the General Board, and the General Board will report and recommend to the Convention.

The Council on Christian Higher Education joins in encouraging the churches to elect responsible and informed messengers to the Convention. Decisions made concerning the continuation of the Wake Forest/Convention relationship will affect the life and work of the Convention and Wake Forest for many years to come.

We thank you for supporting the colleges. We call upon the churches to pray for all of our Baptist work, including the colleges. We look toward the crucial decisions in the fall with confidence in North Carolina Baptists, who have been supporting Christian higher education for almost 150 years.

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOMES 1979

The care of dependent, neglected and homeless children; emotionally disturbed children; unwed mothers and their children is the purpose of the Baptist Children's Homes of N. C. The agency has divided the state into five areas — Eastern, Southeastern, Piedmont, South Central and Western. In these five areas various services are offered such as: Group living on campuses; care for children in need of specialized assistance, foster homes, social work services with and without financial assistance, continuing education for college, service to families, technical training and other types of higher education and a demonstrational program of preschool care and development.

The lives of more than 4,175 people were affected in a significant way by the services of the Children's Homes during the past year. The Homes provided care and related services for 1,440 children. Of this number 1,140 received continuing services while 340 received case-work, counseling and referral services. Applications for 79 children were in process of evaluation at the end of the year. The agency is also dedicated to working with other agencies, institutions and programs, in an effort to strengthen wholesome, Christian family life throughout the state. It embraces services directed toward the preservation, conservation and rehabilitation of families, hopefully to avoid the necessity for replacement of children away from their homes.

Modern day child care, as provided by the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is a Christian ministry.

REPORT ON BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

This has been a year of great significance and celebration in the life of our North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging! We would give praise and thanksgiving to God especially, and to our Baptist pastors and churches throughout North Carolina for the victories that we have experienced!

Of outstanding importance has been the completion, dedication, and occupancy of our new Western North Carolina Baptist Home, in Asheville. This lovely new Home, accommodating 50 additional residents, was dedicated to the glory of God on April 29, 1979. Already, there are enough residents who have arrived, and those who have been approved for admission, to fill the Home.

The new apartment complex in Winston-Salem, accommodating 16, has been completed and all of the apartments have either been filled or assigned. With an older apartment, built in 1961, there are a total of five duplex apartments, accommodating 20 persons. With the apartment complex, the six Baptist Homes for the Aging, and the skilled nursing facility, 300 persons can be served in our Baptist Homes. Homes are located in the following places: Resthaven, The Hayes Home, Apartments, The Skilled Nursing Unit, in Winston-Salem; the Albemarle Home, in Albemarle; the Hamilton Home in Hamilton; the Yanceyville Home, in Yanceyville; the Western North Carolina Baptist Home, in Asheville.

Financially, this has been a crucial year in our Baptist Homes, since we did not have our usual 3rd Sunday of February offering, which makes up 16% of our total budget. We have had to move into our endowment funds in order to operate and to keep the ship afloat, since the usual \$300,000.00 that we receive from the Special Offering was delayed until we receive the North Carolina Missions Offering in September. We are looking forward to this offering in a very special way, and it will certainly be crucial in the support of our Homes for the Aging.

Support through the Cooperative Program for our Homes, which supplies about 8% of our total budget continues in a steady and encouraging manner. During the 28 years of the ministry of the Homes, however, the amount of 1 2/10% of the Baptist State Convention Cooperative dollar for the Homes has never been changed.

Through the love gifts of North Carolina Baptists, five out of every six people, who cannot pay the full cost of care, are supplemented. This, therefore, is a ministry of Christian love and compassion at its best in the lives of those dear older people who are in our care.

We trust that you will keep this vital ministry close to your heart and in your prayers, and that your gifts will enable us not only to minister to those in our care, but encourage us to expand this desperately needed ministry in our Convention.

EVANGELISM REPORT

Baptists in search of unsaved and unchurched persons, are joining together in a Statewide Evangelistic Crusade scheduled for 1982. It is expected that the effort will include Simultaneous Revivals with dates and other activities to be announced soon. The Joint Evangelistic Crusade Committee, composed of both white and black Baptists, is chaired by Mark Corts of Winston-Salem, and co-chaired by C. W. Ward of Raleigh. The committee requests prayer support of the churches for this effort to reach every person in North Carolina with the gospel of Christ by the end of 1982.

The 33rd Statewide Evangelism Conference was held at the Cumberland County Memorial Auditorium, Fayetteville, North Carolina, during February 5-6, 1979. Over 2,500 pastors and lay persons were challenged by evangelistic preachers to involve church members more in direct witnessing for Christ to the unsaved.

Many churches from different associations across the state have already participated in Bold Evangelism Clinics, using the notebook - **BOLD EVANGELISM THROUGH THE LOCAL CHURCH** - with the emphasis related to on-going programs of evangelism in the local church. Other associations need to plan a Bold Evangelism Clinic. Every church in all our associations are encouraged to double baptisms by 1982, or sooner.

Pastors and lay persons participated in an important seminar on **GROWING AN EVANGELISTIC CHURCH** during March 26-29 at Caraway Conference Center. The seminar was co-sponsored by the Division of Evangelism and several of the staff of the Evangelism Section of the Home Mission Board. In-depth training sessions placed an emphasis on long-range planning to develop an evangelistic local church.

The Division of Evangelism now has the TELLset and training cartridges to train small groups in direct witnessing. There will be a renewed emphasis on Lay Evangelism Schools with the use of new materials and TELL witness training.

Decisions for Christ are being made by youth and adults as a

result of the Youth Revivals led by four Summer Youth Evangelism Teams in one-week efforts among 36 churches across our state.

Churches and associations are now involved in Bold Revival Planning Clinics, using the *Revival Planbook for the Local Church, Counseling Guide*, and the *Follow-Up Manual for New Christians*. The Revival Planbook can help pastors and church leaders to plan for a more effective revival effort.

HISTORICAL EVENTS 1979-80

Interesting events have taken place the last year in the churches of the Alleghany Baptist Association.

The North Carolina Baptist State Convention celebrated its one hundred fiftieth anniversary in 1980. The Alleghany Baptist Association observed this event at a dinner meeting at Sparta Restaurant. This was attended by some members of six churches in the association. Speakers for the occasion were Dr. O. D. Martin, Jr., State Stewardship Director; Dr. Ray Roberts, Retired Secretary Ohio State Convention; and Rev. Fred Lunsford, Director of Missions, Truitt Association. Inspiring messages were given, stressing the need of "Baptists Working Together" through the Cooperative Program, the Association, and through missions.

The Association observed World Missions Week August 28-31 with 38 churches participating. Both Foreign and Home missionaries spoke at the different churches each night and on Sunday morning, bringing interesting and challenging messages to those attending the services. A fellowship dinner was served each night and Sunday noon at a different church, giving the people an opportunity to visit with the missionaries. Rev. James Lambert, Area Director of Missions, receives our appreciation for arranging the series of services and visitation of these missionaries to the Association. This was a highlight of the year for all the churches.

Belview reports an interesting V.B.S. with an average attendance of 48 students. A child was sent to Special Opportunity Camp. New pews were placed in the church and a picnic area was completed and used.

Liberty hosted a Seminary Extension Class taught by the Rev. James Lambert, Area Director of Missions. Several members from other churches attended and benefitted from these classes. The parking area has been extended and paved. The Sunday School rooms in the basement were improved and painted. One minister was ordained by the church to preach the gospel.

Laurel Springs reports extensive work done on the church building. A child was sponsored to attend Special Opportunity Camp. A

special note-burning service was held in March retiring the indebtedness of the church. Six shut-ins are being sent the *Open Window*. Each year at the Christmas and Easter Seasons, a joint service is enjoyed with the Laurel Fork Presbyterian Church.

Mount Carmel was blessed with an extraordinary V.B.S. in June. The enrollment was 177 with a daily attendance of 130. Three ministers were ordained by the church to preach the Gospel. These were Gary Osborne, Donald Shaw and Randy Absher. The Youth Evangelistic Conference in Greensboro, N. C. was attended and enjoyed by thirteen persons from the church. This was the first participation in this kind of service. Seven new members were added to the church membership by baptism and Christian experience.

First Church, Sparta, had an active year for the youth. A trip was made to Duke University for a day of worship and fellowship. A youth choir of over thirty people planned and rehearsed the youth musical, "Natural High". It was performed in Sparta, North Wilkesboro, Mount Airy, and Mayock, N. C. It was the highlight of the year for many and carried the force of the Gospel. V.B.S. was taught by a dedicated group of teachers and attended by interested students with 75% enrollment attending each night. Four young people made decisions to accept Jesus Christ as their Savior and experienced believer's baptism.

August 15 was an important day for many of the youth as they traveled to Greensboro Coliseum for the Annual Youth Evangelism Night. A radio ministry, "Moments for Meditation", shared with the Sparta Presbyterian Church, is being aired. Throughout the year, our church family has supported the causes of the Baptist State Convention, the Christian Ministry of National Park Services, Community Christmas House, Gideon's International and Light Up A Life: Chapel for the Retarded.

HISTORY OF LAUREL SPRINGS BAPTIST CHURCH

On July 24, 1891, Laurel Springs Baptist Church was organized by the Revs. J. D. Harris and Frank B. Cheek. The charter members selected were John R. Long, J. Lee Lawrence, J. Horton Doughton, Mary Rose, Polly Long, Josie Horton, Bettie D. Miller. The Rev. J. D. Harris was elected pastor, J. Horton Doughton clerk, and John R. Long, deacon.

For some time, worship services were held in Laurel Springs Academy. In 1898 the members agreed to build a structure for worship. One-half mile north of Laurel Springs Post Office, the land for this site was donated by Andrew J. Reeves, Fielden Miller and Robert L. Doughton. The lumber for the framed structure was furnished by J. Horton Doughton. Johnson Weaver and Muncie Steadham were hired to construct the building.

This building was used until 1930 when it was destroyed by fire. The present brick building was erected in 1932. Windows and doors removed from the old building were used in this building. Ten years later the building was enlarged. A gift of stained glass from the James Williams family, as a memorial to Mr. Williams, replaced the clear

glass panes in the windows in 1945. At this time, several acres of land were added to the church property. A hardsurface driveway to the church and cemetery has been built and maintained for several years. In 1973, an addition was built to the church. This contained a fellowship room, a small kitchen, rest rooms and a recreation room in the basement.

Laurel Springs Baptist Church has ordained one minister, the Rev. Geo. M. Reeves. It furnished moderators for seventeen years. These were J. Horton Doughton, Dr. B. E. Reeves, Hon. Robt L. Doughton, W. Frank Doughton and Van F. Miller. The membership of the church has embodied ministers, doctors, teachers, a congressman, dentists, nurses and many others in various walks of life who have taken places to help make this nation a better place to live.

The Rev. B. R. Elledge, the present pastor, has served the church for nineteen years. The church with its small membership, continues to furnish a place of Christian worship for those in the community and others who desire to attend.

This year has been one of growth and blessing to the N. C. Baptist Foundation. With one area of its ministry being to assist Baptists with their estate planning and encouraging mature stewardship of possessions, the Foundation has added more workers in this department.

The Foundation serves as trustee of endowment funds for different institutions and mission causes. They are encouraged by continued giving of individuals both through living trusts and through wills.

It is very important to lead a Christian to a commitment of becoming involved and supporting a segment or all of our Baptist missions in a permanent and tangible way.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

There are seven North Carolina Baptist colleges and universities: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake

Forest and Wingate. Baptist in their roots and their affections, these schools are Baptists' educational mission in our state. There are 53 such colleges, including these seven, related to state conventions within the Southern Baptist Convention.

The highest priority of your Baptist colleges is to serve God and man through Christian higher education. Ours is a secular world which views life and history, and even man himself, as having no overarching purpose.

To this hopeless view of the world, the Christian church through its colleges and universities has an essential message. The message is that creation has purpose, life has meaning and direction and persons created in the image of God have eternal significance.

The task of the Christian college is large and complex: searching for answers to perplexing problems; guiding the lives of youth who have been greatly influenced by the values of a secular society; and interpreting this task in love and with reason to those who do not always understand the difficulty of the college task.

Your North Carolina Baptist colleges see themselves as you see them, as a valuable part of Christian missions. They operate out of the conviction that God's Holy Spirit leads persons in the discovery of truth, that through the Bible God has given us a sufficient guide for faith and practice, and that man is a sinner by nature who cannot save himself or redeem the world in which he lives.

Baptist young people are sought and welcomed by Baptist colleges. We call upon the churches, through pastors and other leaders, to encourage Baptist youth to apply for admission to Baptist colleges. When they do, a creative blending of Christian education, financial assistance and spiritual guidance will help to shape them as tomorrow's leaders in the church, community, state and nation.

BAPTIST PUBLICATIONS

Don't just read good books and publications — read the best. Biblical Recorder is one of the oldest and best state papers of any in the Southern Baptist Convention. It speaks out on social and moral issues which affect our lives. It is the state's only publication presenting the full Baptist program, including evangelism, missions, benevolence and Christian education.

Articles are written by devout men and women on what Baptists believe and why, as well as news from fellow churches and associations in N. C. Comments on the Sunday School lessons are very helpful to teachers and pupils, for they are written by well-informed clergy and students of the Bible. The numerous pictures portray the image of persons, churches, etc. The Chinese are quoted as saying, "A picture is worth a thousand words."

The Recorder is a weekly paper published forty-eight weeks in the year at Raleigh. Subscription rates are reasonable compared to current publications. It is only \$3.50 a year, if included in the church budget; and \$4.50 if subscribed to by 20% of resident members of a church.

The Commission is the Baptist foreign mission journal. The Mission magazine keeps one informed about home missions. Home Life is a family magazine and contains a special program suggested for family devotions.

Other good publications sponsored by the Southern Baptist Convention are the Sunday School and Training Union, Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union literature, which are used by our churches.

Keeping the Bible and the best publications available for the family to read will fulfill the need and give an opportunity to develop Christian growth. In II Timothy 2:15 we read: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

During the past year, our hospital has again received accreditation for the maximum period, two years, by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. Only about one-third of the hospitals in the nation receive the full two-year accreditation.

Our hospital is constantly upgrading its staff, facilities and equipment. In recent months, a carbon dioxide surgical laser has been added. The laser emits an invisible beam of light which vaporizes tissue, cutting and coagulating at the same time. It is used now for delicate surgery of the larynx, upper respiratory tract, and lung. It has potential, also, for surgery of other internal organs.

New ultrasound equipment provides improved accuracy in determining location and degree of blocked arteries. The department

of dentistry is being expanded to meet an increasing need for specialty dental services. An occupational therapist has been added to the staff to help patients recover functional skills lost through accident or disease. A new instrument has been acquired for testing infants with suspected hearing loss.

The staff and trustees continue to make every effort to keep operating costs as low as possible. In this connection, our hospital recently became a charter member of the Sun Alliance, an organization of 22 large hospitals in nine southeastern states. A primary purpose of the alliance is to keep operating costs (and consequently, patient charges) as low as possible through group purchasing of capital equipment, the development and sharing of comparative data and management information, and possible group arrangements with specialized consultants.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to provide a pastoral ministry to hospital patients and their families, individual and group counseling in crisis situations, clinical pastoral education at several levels, and numerous events in human enrichment and development. During the past year, the department has begun a Minister's Care Plan, in which the Baptist State Convention provides financial assistance for ministers and/or their families who seek pastoral counseling through one of the department's regional centers. Also, the position of Chaplain to Medical Students has been elevated to a staff/faculty position.

Construction on the Focus Building, on the site of the Old Main building which was torn down two years ago, is almost complete. Several departments of the Medical Center will be occupying this building in the near future.

The hospital staff is grateful to the Baptists of North Carolina for continuing financial support. During 1979, the hospital received \$400,500 through the Cooperative Program, and \$357,517 through the North Carolina Missions Offering and designated gifts.

The Baptist Children's Homes of N. C., Inc. is an institution of the Baptist State Convention and provides a Christian ministry of child care and family services.

During the past three years, members of the Board of Trustees and members of the administrative staff of the Homes completed an in-depth evaluation of the institution's total program of services. We share three significant statements from that report.

"The advancement of this mission and ministry requires (1) wise and resourceful leadership, (2) a well-trained and highly skilled staff who really care for children, (3) a carefully planned program of child care and family services, (4) appropriate physical facilities, (5) adequate funds and sound fiscal policy, and (6) the confidence and support of an informed and devoted constituency."

"At this time the Baptist Children's Homes of N. C., Inc. is in a position of strength. This strength comes ultimately from God and is discoverable in the commitment, the competence, and the faithful work of His people engaged in this ministry."

"This is not a time for complacency in child care and family services in North Carolina. It is a time for rigorous study, reflective planning, earnest prayer, and courageous action."

Progress is being made in implementing recommendations from the Trustee Evaluation more adequately to make all services of the Baptist Children's Homes readily available to people who need our help anywhere in the State. Nine Family Services areas are being designated as follows: Asheville, Charlotte, Thomasville, Kinston,

Pembroke, Raleigh, Hickory, Ahoskie and Jacksonville.

The lives of more than 4500 people were affected in a significant way by the services of the Children's Homes during the past year. Fifteen hundred of these were children for whom you helped to provide care and related services. While serving children and young people, work was being done with important adults in their lives.

Necessary to the fulfillment of the mission of the Children's Homes are "people" resources, financial resources and spiritual resources. We are blessed with all of these. You, along with many other friends, assure us of your continuing concern for the well-being of neglected and dependent children through your prayers, through your giving and through various types of involvement. Members of our Board of Trustees and members of our staff, with your assistance, are dedicated to a continuing Christian ministry to children and members of their families.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist Churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereto: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PEROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship, and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each

annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W.M.U. President, Choir Director, and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of the business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, and 1 member, which member shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a smaller Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and distribution of the same; and

to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association ad interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specific authority. It shall make annual reports of the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886)

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head -- the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible -- the Old and New Testament -- is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper

are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator; and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.

3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.

4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided, by request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the

same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

6. When a question is under discussion no other motion of proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.

7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.

8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.

9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.

10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized "Parliamentary Practice," preferably Robert's or Kerfoots.
