



PROCEEDINGS

September 13, 1991

The Friday Evening Session of the Association began at 7:15 p.m. with musical prelude by Dorothy Brooks.

The congregation sang "I'll Ride On the Clouds", followed by prayer by Rev. Johnny Huffman.

The moderator called the session to order and had the roll call and seating of messengers.

The moderator read a letter from Christian Home Baptist Church requesting membership in Alleghany Baptist Association. Upon motion of Gordon West and second of George Vaughn the church was accepted into the Association. At that time some members of Chestnut Grove Baptist Church had some other questions concerning this action but were advised that the motion had carried.

Special visitor, Roy Holder, consultant with State Baptist Convention, Extension Department, was introduced to give a report on church growth.

Mr. Holder discussed the Spanish work. He advised that he, Gordon West, and Cora Neville rode through the Glade Creek section relative to having a Praxis Team come for the summer. Home Mission funds made it possible to have the Praxis Team come.

The first worship for the new work in Glade Creek is planned Oct. 20, 1991 following Revival Oct. 17-19. Osborne Memorial is the primary sponsoring church. Roy Holder will work with both new groups.

In the absence of Chorister Wilma Foster, Amanda Miller led the congregational singing. The congregation sang "When the Roll is Called".

Rev. George Vaughn moved the adoption of reports for Baptist Men and Spanish Ministry and upon second by Johnny Huffman, it was approved.

The moderator recognized special guests: Roy Holder, Consultant with BSC and The Chapelmen from Pennsylvania.

Special music was provided by The Chapelmen.

Bob Richardson moved the adoption of the Executive Committee Report and upon second of Dewey Hoppers it was approved. The moderator emphasized that there were 54 baptisms in the Association for the past year.

The Treasurer's Report was submitted by Irene R. Wagner, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Rev. Johnny Huffman.

Dorothy Shaw, historian, read the History of Bellview Church and moved its adoption together with historical notes for the season. Second was made by Bob Dolinger.

The congregation sang one stanza of "Just Over in Gloryland."

The moderator introduced Rev. Tom Neville, Asst. Pastor, Liberty Baptist, who brought a very inspiring sermon using Psalms 24.

Following the singing of "Blest Be The Tie" the meeting was closed with benediction by Rev. Russell Mabe, pastor, Osborne Memorial Baptist Church.

Saturday Morning, September 14, 1991

Dorothy Brooks, pianist, presented a musical prelude from 8:50 a.m. until 9:00 a.m., at which time Rev. Gordon West, Pastor, First Baptist Church, Sparta, gave the devotional.

The congregation sang "It Is Joy Unspeakable."

The moderator welcomed the congregation and recognized the following visitors: Bill Clarke and Anthony Allen, Praxis Team Members who had served during the summer.

Missions Development Committee Report was given by Rev. Johnny Huffman, who commented on the progress of the Spanish Ministry. He also commented on the Outreach and New Work Ministry begun by the Praxis Team. Upon motion of Johnny Huffman and second of Russell Mabe the report was approved.

Elvira Crouse, Mission Action and Personal Witnessing Director of Missions Development, moved the adoption of her report. It was seconded by Rev. Gordon West and approved.

Rev. Gordon West moved the adoption of his Evangelism Report. Upon second of Rev. Russell Mabe it was approved.

Elvira Crouse moved the adoption of the WMU Report. Upon second of Shirley Simmons the report was adopted.

The Sunday School Report was approved after motion by Elvira Crouse and second by Ray Simmons.

Upon motion of Bill Shaw and second of Shirley Simmons the NC Baptist Foundation Report was adopted.

The congregation sang "Bringing In The Sheaves".

Rev. Gordon West introduced Anthony Allen and Bill Clarke, Praxis Team members who spoke about their work in Alleghany during the summer. Rev. West then presented each of them with a Certificate of Appreciation from the Home Mission Board and a plaque of appreciation from the Association.

The Youth Committee Report was given by Mattie Blevins. She moved its adoption and upon second by Ray Simmons was approved.

Special Ministries Report was given by Cora Neville with her motion to have it approved.

Annuity Report was moved to adopt by Mattie Blevins and on second of Ray Simmons approved.

Upon motion of Elizabeth Moxley and second of Ray Simmons the Biblical Report was approved.

The congregation sang one stanza of "I'll Fly Away."

Cora T. Neville gave the Director of Missions Report and moved its adoption. She presented an arrangement of roses to Irene R. Wagner, Clerk, in appreciation of her 17 years of service. Rev. Gordon West then presented Cora Neville with a plaque of appreciation from the association. Upon motion of Elvira Crouse the report was adopted.

Flo Rollins, a former resident of Baptist Children's Home gave a very informative report on the Children's Homes.

Special Music was presented by The Chapelmen.

Upon motion of Bill Shaw and second of Tom Neville the budget for 1991-1992 was approved.

Upon motion of Gordon West and second of Ray Simmons the Nominating Committee Report was adopted.

Committee on Committees Report was adopted on motion of Gordon West and second Tom Neville.

In the way of business the following motion was submitted:

"The members of the Constitution Committee, after due consideration would like to state they feel it is a well-written constitution and any changes they would recommend would be so minor that they recommend that we continue to keep our present constitution as it is and not make any changes at the present time."

Upon motion of Elvira Crouse and second of Ray Simmons the motion was tabled.

Elvira Crouse conducted a Memorial Service to our beloved dead.

Rev. Johnny Huffman brought a very inspiring and challenging sermon using Matt. 28:19-20 and other scriptures.

The Chapelmen provided more special music.

The benediction and blessing for the noon meal by Rev. Larry Atwood concluded the session.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

Another year has so quickly slipped away. The Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association has been very busy. The opportunity to be of service to the Lord and our fellowman has come often. We helped many families at Christmas. We had a request for clothes at Butner Mental Hospital in Durham. We've recently been to Kentucky again. Through our clothes closet and food closet we have been able to lighten the burdens of many people. These physical needs were met because of your generous donations of clothing, food, furniture and other items, as well as financial contributions to the Association.

I believe because of our willingness to be of help to those who need, God has also added souls to each church. BELLVIEW BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

Bellview Baptist Church is located on State Road #113, about three miles from the Laurel Springs Post Office.

The first available written record of Bellview is in a Bible that belonged to Alice Long Jones, stating that Sunday school was conducted in 1890 in the Masonic Lodge Hall, which also served as a two-teacher school. It appears that Sunday school was conducted before the church was ever organized.

Bellview Baptist Church was recorded as being established in 1896, with nineteen members, which met in the Masonic Hall, and was listed in the statistical roll of churches in the minutes of the Alleghany-Ashe Association in 1896, 1897, and 1898. The Reverend Frank B. Cheek was pastor, and J. W. Phouts was Church Clerk. Little is known about the activities of the church until about ten years later.

Bellview Church was reorganized on May 9, 1909, with twenty-one members and the present frame building, with seating capacity of around one hundred fifty, was soon constructed. The Reverend George M. Reeves was pastor; Lloyd S. Richardson, Church Clerk; and Shade Plummer, deacon.

The Alleghany Baptist Association was hosted by Bellview Church in 1912, and again seven times throughout the years, with the most recent being in 1982.

Many pastors have served this church through the years since reorganization. Limited services were held from 1953 until 1971. At that time, the Reverend Jimmy Warden was elected pastor. Under Reverend Warden's six year leadership, the church made much

progress in all areas. Following the resignation of Reverend Warden at year-end in 1976, the Reverend Lloyd Burgess was elected pastor in January, 1977, and served until his resignation in October, 1988. The Reverend John Huffman was elected pastor in 1988 and serves to present.

Church Clerks during this time were: Mrs. Juanita Church, who served from 1960 to 1975; Mrs. Virginia Warden, 1975 to 1979; Mrs. JoAnn Church, 1979 to 1984; and Mrs. Brenda Faw was elected and serves to the present time.

Church Treasurers have been: Mrs. Lessie Shepherd, 1975 to 1986; Mrs. Becky Scott, 1987 to 1988; and Mrs. Dorothy Brooks was elected and is presently serving.

Brothers Gary Scott, Leonard Church, and Larry Scott have been ordained as deacons.

Several contributions have been made for maintenance and upkeep of the church and grounds. In 1979, a tract of land was donated to Bellview from the F. U. Taylor Estate, in loving memory of Mr. Taylor. This land has been developed into a fellowship and recreation area with a pavilion, basketball, swings, and a children's merry-go-round. A piano was also purchased in loving memory of Victor Jones.

Noticeable improvements during the past two decades have been the addition of four Sunday school rooms, rest rooms, sanctuary paneled, floor refinished, a new heating system installed, windows replaced, the aisle, altar, and choir area carpeted, new pews added, and a new roof and vinyl siding added. New pulpit furniture was purchased in loving memory of George Shepherd. The most recent renovations, now in progress are: enlargement of the basement to full size with additional Sunday school rooms, rest rooms, and a fellowship hall. New sheetrock and wainscoating brighten the walls of the sanctuary, with indirect lighting, and a beautiful vaulted, dropped ceiling. Also, fans with lights have been added, a handicap ramp at the front, and a new sign erected at the highway.

Bellview continues a tradition of spring and fall revivals, Easter sunrise services, Vacation Bible Schools, Homecomings, church trips, October Festivals, Christmas programs and caroling, Fellowship dinners, Bible study, and visitation. The church also has an active ladies circle.

The present pastor is Reverend John Huffman. Other officers are Brenda Faw, Church Clerk, and Dorothy Brooks, Treasurer. Deacons are Guy Brooks, Gary Scott, Leonard Church, and Larry Scott. Guy Brooks also serves as Sunday School Superintendent.

October 18, Carole Dowell, Church Growth Multiplier, Baptist State Convention, taught the Foreign Mission Study. This time of sharing was very informative, and the group enjoyed refreshments and fellowship together.

Ten "Here's Hope New Testaments" were sent to Broughton Hospital, Morganton, NC for their "Operation Santa Claus" to help Chaplain, Phillip King, in his ministry to distribute scriptures to Mental Health and Retardation and Substance Abuse patients. It was a joy to be partners and co-laborers for God in this ministry.

There was a special Thanksgiving Worship service on November 21, which featured old fashioned attire and church decorations, with refreshments and fellowship following. Nine youth participated with scriptures, poems, songs, and a Thanksgiving prayer.

The church entered a float in the Christmas Parade with a theme of "Pray for Peace" which required more than eighty hours labor, and won first place trophy in the church group.

Forty-two Bibles were sent to Russia through the North Carolina Baptist Men, and we are excited to think that we may have had a small part in the freedom that Russia experiences today.

Discipleship Training for youth and children began in February and continued for thirteen weeks. Adult training is conducted weekly to present.

Enjoyable, inspirational, and helpful events in the church year are as follows: Easter sunrise service and fellowship breakfast, Christmas program, celebration of Mother's and Father's Day, scholarships to graduates, fifth Sunday night gospel singings, Christmas caroling, and New Year's Eve service. honor all the church deacons and their spouses, and gifts were presented to each couple from the WMU.

BAPTIST COLLEGE REPORT — 1991

A "new-old" event is about to take place in North Carolina Baptist life: A Special Committee!

From time to time we Baptists feel the need to take a hard look at ourselves. We do that through the time-honored practice of asking trusted people to serve on a committee for a year, sometimes two. In 1956, for example, "The Committee of Twenty-Five" began a comprehensive study which eventually embraced all aspects of North Carolina Baptist life. That committee reported to a special session of the Baptist State Convention called for that purpose on May 5-6, 1959. Again, "The Committee of Twenty," appointed in 1967, worked for two years before presenting its comprehensive findings and recommendations to the Convention in November of 1969. Both of these committees provided clarity and guidance for North Carolina Baptists which endured for many years.

New times call for a fresh look at ourselves. The "new times" which have taken shape in the Southern Baptist Convention since 1979 have particular relevance for institutions, agencies, their trustees and the Convention. North Carolina Baptist institutions and agencies have rendered distinguished Christian service for a total of 1,108 years! New times call for a new look by a competent special committee.

In May the General Board approved a 17-member "Institutions Relations Committee." Lamar Brooks, Wilmington, is chairman. Other members are: Jean P. Abernethy, Marion; Dot Allred, Gastonia; Curtis Lee Barbery, Bennett; Harold Bennett, Boone; Don Bolden, Burlington; Caralie Brown, Raleigh; Kathryn H. Hamrick, Shelby; John H. Hewett, Asheville; Milton A. Hollifield, Jr., Stanley; John M. Hough, Jr., Salisbury; James H. Johnson, Candler; Robert B. Poole, Elizabeth City; George W. Pullium, Jr., Knightdale; Hobart Smith, Charlotte; A. Eugene Warren, Charlotte; J. L. Wilson, Winston-Salem. Their report is due in November, 1992.

The "new-old" way of study and thought is the North Carolina Baptist, tried-and-true way to confront changing times. We thank these 17 good men and women who will help us to shape the future together in harmony. They request and deserve our fervent prayers.

BCH GIVES CHILDREN A CHANCE!

For an institution that's 106 years old, Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina (BCH) looks strongly to the future!

Three pillars that uphold that futuristic foundation are: 1. The return of the Thanksgiving Offering beginning in November 1991; 2. The success of our "Give a child a chance!" financial campaign, and 3. Baptists' continued support of BCH through the Cooperative Program.

This financial undergirding made it possible for BCH to serve more than 1,200 children and families last year through facilities at 13 locations across the state. Because Baptists cared enough to give, residents like Lynn will go to Wingate College this fall; Chris graduated from UNC-Chapel Hill; Jennifer is in her second year at Haywood Community College and Mark earned a football scholarship to North Carolina A&T. Each of these lives proceeds on firm footing because Baptist Children's Homes was there paved their pathway.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, simply is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life leads to limitless freedom for the children, which leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives.

Baptist Children's Homes provides a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and address them to change behavior. At the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH's "Give a child a chance!" campaign is raising \$11 million over three years to expand Cameron Boys Camp, boost general operating

income and increase endowment. Gifts and pledges through July totaled \$9.3 million and response across the state has been overwhelming and heart gratifying.

Last year Baptist Men of North Carolina helped construct the new Tommy and Jeanie Eller Chuckwagon at Cameron Boys Camp that was dedicated May 19.

BCH celebrated this spring the 20th anniversary of the founding of Broyhill Home, our western-most campus, in Waynesville/Clyde. With the help of J. E. Broyhill and his family, the home was opened in 1971 on 91 hilly acres. It has capacity for 48 children in group care and for eight girls in emergency care.

In August 1990 BCH began the Gregg Children's Center for before and after school care. The Davidson County program offers security to children of working couples, who now don't have to go home to empty houses.

Children's hopes the world over have been bolstered by the 1991 return of the Thanksgiving Offering voted by messengers to the 1989 state convention. While suffering through its 13-year absence, BCH lost more than \$2 million in potential gifts. Our goal this year is \$500,000. Because of a partnership established in December with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil, BCH-North Carolina will donate 10 percent of everything it receives over the \$500,000 goal for work in that desperately needy land.

In August 1990, BCH signed an agreement with Gaston County Department of Social Services to operate two emergency care homes owned by the county. That raises to seven the number of emergency care homes BCH operates. Emergency care, in which a child at risk of abuse or neglect can receive shelter right away, is the service most in demand throughout the state. Children stay a maximum of 60 days while BCH works with the custodian to determine a long-term plan of care.

The Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning from the churches. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our North Carolina churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

Baptist Children's Homes has a 106-year history. But its history is just the knot that ties it to a boundless, unbroken ribbon of promise

that stretches beyond the future to wrap children and families with eternal blessings.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

On September 10, we received a telephone call from Phil Stone, Youth Associate and ASSIST Development Director in our Southern Baptist Convention of North Carolina State Office, with our Sunday School Report, for which we had requested. Phil was very excited to report to us an increase in Sunday School enrollment for our state. In 1989 N.C. had 648,917 enrolled in Sunday School. In 1990, we had 655,748, a plus of 5,831, which is about 1%. In the Alleghany Baptist

Association in 1989 we had an enrollment of 679. In 1990 we had an enrollment of 721. This gave us a plus of 45, which gives us an increase of 7%, the highest percentage of INCREASE IN THE STATE. You are to be commended. I know we can enroll many more if we pray and work toward a goal. Let's set a goal and work hard to reach it. It will bring glory of God.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The year 1991 is significant in the history of Baptist Hospital — it marks the 50th anniversary of its entering a partnership with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University, to form one of the 126 academic medical centers in the nation. Appropriate events have been planned to celebrate this anniversary.

This partnership makes it possible for Baptist Hospital to offer its patients the most advanced technology for diagnosing and treating their health problems. For example, ours is one of 15 medical centers in the nation involved in clinical trials of a new coronary laser which vaporizes plague in blocked coronary arteries. We are one of five centers in the U.S. conducting clinical trials in stereotactic radiosurgery, a procedure in which high-energy beams of radiation from a linear accelerator are focused by computers on brain tumors and lesions to destroy them. This procedure can be done on an outpatient basis. We are one of 24 Comprehensive Cancer Centers in the nation. We are the designated organ procurement agency for northwest North Carolina, and we recently received approval to begin performing pancreatic transplants this year. Early in 1992, we expect to open our new Center for Position Emission Tomography, one of the most advanced radiological services which is capable of measuring the chemical structure of the body. This new diagnostic procedure promises to make possible earlier detection, and hence, earlier treatment of tumors, hopefully, improving the outcome of the treatment.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided Clinical Pastoral Education to 42 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 54,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provided over 21,700 counseling sessions. The Professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to requests for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.

For the first time since 1978, a Mother's Day Offering exclusively for Baptist Hospital Benevolent Care was received in North Carolina

Baptist Churches. At the time this report is being written, results of the Mother's Day Offering appear to be very favorable. The staff and patients at Baptist Hospital are profoundly grateful to North Carolina Baptists for this support.

HISPANIC MISSION

During the last year the work with the Hispanic in the county has had many high and many low points. We started the work with representative of the State Convention assisting us in making a survey of the county. This was to last for three weekends and determine the need for a work directed toward the Hispanic population. At the end of the first days the response was so over-whelming that it was decided that there was no need for further study. The following week services were started at the Bickerstaff work barn at the request of Ruth Bickerstaff. These services continued until December when the workers left the county. At that time we had the assistance of a young Hispanic minister, Noa Batista, who conducted services for us. However, when we attempted to restart in the spring he was unable to continue assisting. We then contacted a retired missionary from Winston-Salem, Sydney Goldfinch, whom we ask to assist. After coming and going with me to talk to the Hispanic around the county Bro. Sydney was very excited about the possibility of opening a new mission field. But due to his wife's failing health he was unable to assist.

At this time First Baptist offered the use of the Graves mission house for us. At this time I was without help and had no one to assist me in talking with these young men. I was left with only one alternative. I started going out and meeting them and trusting the Lord to help me communicate with them. Somehow I have been able to. Since that time the doors to "Iglasia Hispana" have been open every Sunday. More often than not they have not come but I continue trusting God and will continue talking to these young men and making my self available to them. As I continue to work I am reminded that He is not content to have only a few select leaders but desires an entire people to be his holy servant — priests to the world. Allow me to close as I use the words of Edin D. Roels to start my reason and call to missions.

"The goal which one envisions is of such great importance for the mission because one's conception of the goal determines to a

great extent one's motive for participation in the mission . . . Those, therefore, who find in God final goal are impelled to concious mission by the most urgent and compelling motivation possible. These cannot rest until all men praise God, until every tongue confesses the Christ, until every knee bows before him, and until all the ends of the earth have been reached with the gospel of Jesus. For these are conscious that while there is one tongue yet silent, or one knee still unbent, God is not receiving the glory due unto him in and from his creation."

Are you giving glory of God by proclaiming him before man, or is your tongue silent?

The Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. operates four residential facilities for Older Adults around the State — the Albemarle Baptist Home in the Southern Piedmont, the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville, the Hamilton Baptist Home in Eastern North Carolina, and the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem.

In Asheville, 1991 began with a great deal of excitement. After more than five years of trying to receive state approval to build a nursing care bed addition, the Baptist Retirement Homes was awarded a Certificate of Need for 100 medicaid certified nursing care beds for its Western North Carolina Baptist Home on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. Currently the only nursing care provided by the Baptist Retirement Homes is the 85 bed nursing care unit at the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem. The addition of 100 medicaid certified beds will mean that quality nursing care can be offered to Western North Carolina Baptists regardless of their ability to pay for the institutional services that they need.

The 39,000 square foot addition will cost approximately \$2.8 million. At the present time, the Baptist Retirement Homes has raised approximately \$2 million of the \$2.8 million needed to make this long hoped for dream a reality. Baptists across Western North Carolina are being urged to help Baptist Retirement Homes meet the financial challenge of building this new unit on Richmond Hill.

In Winston-Salem, the Brookridge Retirement Community completed its second year of operation. Under the leadership of a welltrained and committed Christian staff, the Brookridge Retirement Community's Independent Living area and Health Care Unit are considered among the finest in the State.

In Albemarle and Hamilton, Assisted Living care is provided to Older Adults in residential settings. The Albemarle and Hamilton facilities offer quality care to Older Adults regardless of their ability to pay for the cost of the care they receive . . . a service unmatched by any other church related long-term care institution in this state.

ANNUITY REPORT

Protection is an instinct each adult has toward his spouse and children.

It hurts to see a child fall or a spouse passed over for a promotion. We want to shield loved ones from the hurts of everyday life.

That kind of protection is impossible, but there is financial protection available to ministers that can provide a life-saving margin for his family in the event of his disability or death.

The good news is it costs him nothing if he is an eligible participant in the Church Annuity Plan.

The Protection Section of the Church Annuity Plan is provided by the state convention, and includes several benefits.

These benefits can mean receiving:

- up to \$67,500 in special survivor benefits if you die prior to retirement, or while receiving a disability benefit.
- up to \$300 a month if you become disabled and unable to perform any gainful employment due to physical or mental incapacity.

Additionally, up to \$35 each month can be credited to your retirement income account during your disability and your survivor benefits will remain.

This valuable family protection is funded from Cooperative Program dollars that match dollars contributed to your account by you and your church.

"The Church Annuity Plan offers significant up-front family protection that leaves your dollars free to build your retirement security. It

is an important benefit that many ministers overlook in the retirement plan," Frank Schwall, senior vice president of Member Services.

The average annuitant in North Carolina receives \$287.43 per month, up from \$234 last year.

North Carolina has 3,396 members making contributions to Annuity Board retirement plans.

It is exciting to think about what has been done to help ministers retire with dignity and to have protection as they plan for retirement. Strong efforts have been made to make all of our churches (and ministers) aware of the opportunities and the need to act on them.

But there is still much to be done!

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

This has been a most eventful year for the cause of Applied Christianity.

With North Carolina facing a 1.1 billion dollar shortfall and with news accounts stating that citizens from North Carolina are spending 100 million dollars annually in the Virginia lottery, it appeared almost inevitable that a lottery bill would pass the 1991 legislative session.

In addition to the economic factors, the gambling industry had 13 lobbyists working the halls of the Legislature daily promoting lottery legislation.

Even though lottery legislation passed the Senate, it was quite evident that the lottery lobbyists could not line up enough votes to get the measure through the House of Representatives. Lottery supporters did not push for a vote, for they knew that the legislation would be dead. Therefore, the proposal will be eligible to be considered in the next legislative session when it convenes in June, 1992.

Between now and then, it is of utmost importance that you secure a commitment from your representatives in the North Carolina House to oppose state-sponsored gambling. The Senate will not be voting on the lottery in 1992 because it has already passed that body.

Key lottery supporters were Senator Ken Royall (D-Durham), Senator George Daniels (D-Caswell), Representative David Redwine (D-Brunswick), Representative Joe Mavretic (D-Edgecombe), Representative Robert Hunter (D-McDowell) and Representative Frank Rhodes (R-Forsyth).

Opponents of the legislation were led by Governor Jim Martin, Lieutenant Governor Jim Gardner, Senate President Pro-Tem Henson Barnes (D-Wayne), and Speaker of the House Dan Blue (D-Wake).

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC.

The Board of Directors and the staff of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation are committed to effective leadership in generating increased perpetual financial support of Baptist causes throughout the state, nation and world. With assets approximately \$27 million (market value) at tahe end of the 1990 fiscal year, the income distribution to Baptist causes is significant each year.

Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income being paid to Baptist causes in perpetuity.

Earned income distributed to Baptist institutions and mission causes during fiscal year of 1990:

\$647,180

Earned income distributed to individuals with Baptist causes named as charitable remainderman during fiscal year of 1990:

\$686,124

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The servicing of individual accounts requires continuous contact with trustors, donors and those designating gifts through Wills. The increased number of requests for assistance in seminars and conferences by churches, associations and individuals has made part-time assistance necessary in regions of the state some distance from the office.

There are continual improvements being made in available charitable estate planning computer software, constant changes in state and federal regulations which affect charitable estate planning and an increased need for technical training and assistance to serve the ever increasing needs of both the development staffs of our institutions and the individuals utilizing the Foundation services. The Foundation continues to provide for these needs to maximize the growth in financial support for Baptist causes.

In 1990, the Foundation moved into a new home. The 6,000 square foot office building was constructed from gifts from individuals and is located on property provided by the Baptist State Convention next to the Baptist Building in Cary. The new facility was occupied in February 1990 and provides much needed space for the work of staff as well as for conferences and meetings. Baptist groups are invited to use the meeting rooms when in the Raleigh/Cary area. We extend an invitation to church groups to call and arrange a visit to the newest building used for the Lord's service by North Carolina Baptists.





The congregation sang "When I Survey."

Mrs. Evelyn Parlier led the congregation in a memorial service remembering the faithful members who had passed away.

Rev. Gordon West sang "But Then Came the Morning."

Rev. Jack Byrd, pastor, Windsor Baptist Church, Cashie, N. C. brought the morning message on the theme "What Jesus Expects of His Church," using Mark 11:15-17 as his text.

The session was closed with benediction and blessing by Rev. Johnny Huffman.

SPARTA FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

One hundred eight years ago Sparta Baptist Church was organized on August 30, 1884, in the old courthouse which was located where the Red Poke Store is now. Under the guidance of the Rev. S. M. Collis, Vice-President of the Western Convention and with the assistance of the Rev.'s William Hall and R. M. Duncan.

There were five members in the organizational meeting: W. C. Fields, Rev. William M. Hall, N. E. Hall, Drucilla Turner and Edna Hall. These charter members signed the Covenant and Articles of Faith of the Baptist Church.

Rev. William Hall was

the first pastor and R. A. Turner the first clerk. In 1886 Rev. T. M. Honeycutt was chosen pastor with W. C. Fields church clerk. Rev.



Honeycutt was a cultured man from Mars Hill who was affiliated with the Western North Carolina Convention.

Having given much thought to the organization of a missionary Baptist Church in Sparta. W.C. Fields negotiated for two lots to be held for the benefit of a church two years before the church was organized.

A frame church house was built in 1886. It was replaced in 1927 with a brick building with Sunday School rooms, a baptistry and a furnace. This was destroyed by fire in January 1940.

Additional land was purchased and relocated the church farther south on Main Street. A much larger brick building was erected and was dedicated in 1948.

Around 1957 the church's growth necessitated expansion and the educational building was begun. This was equipped with electric heat and consisted of a kitchen and fellowship hall.

The church was at a low period from 1913 to 1921 when no services were held and the local membership decreased to two — "Uncle" John L. Joines and wife. They never left, but were forced to worship at the Sparta Presbyterian Church in the interval.

Through the influence of Dr. and Mrs. C. A. Reeves, Professor John M. Cheek and Executive Board of the Alleghany Association an evangelist from the State Board of Missions was secured. The Rev. Herman T. Stevens conducted a two week revival. At the close of the meeting the church door was opened for the reception of members and the rehabilitation of Sparta Baptist Church. Thirteen joined the church and Rev. S. L. Blevins was elected pastor. The growth has been continuous since. Rev. Stevens led another revival in a tent in 1923 when 31 joined the church. This was the greatest revival in the history of the church.

Rev. J. L. Underwood and Dr. G. A. Martin were noted for revivals along with other pastors constantly added to the church membership.

The pews and pulpit furniture of the sanctuary were purchased in 1946 when Rev. F. G. Walker was pastor. The Hammond Electric organ was secured in 1948 for \$2,500. A new Pastorium was built next to the church and dedicated in 1948. Improvements to the church grounds were made in 1949 and shrubbery planted. Parking ground between the church and Jones Street was leveled in 1957 and paved in 1969. The old bulletin board was replaced by a brick one in 1963, soon after Rev. Lewis Williams became pastor. Early minutes indicate Sunday School was started in the "gay nineties". The training union had its beginning in the twenties by Kemp M. Estep. It was revived in the late thirties by Rev. Howard J. Ford, the pastor. The Woman's

Missionary Union was organized by Mrs. N. C. Teague in 1926 while her husband was pastor. The Brotherhood was organized in 1954 while Rev. Jack Byrd was pastor.

The educational wing was added in the late 1950's. In 1968 the name of the church was changed from Sparta Baptist Church to the First Baptist Church of Sparta.

The past two decades have been a time of renovating and upkeep of the building along with a time of spiritual growth. We have seen an upsurge of growth in our youth programs which is evident by the dedication and interest of our young people. All has been possible because of strong and capable leaders.

On April 15, 1983, the steeple was erected and was dedicated June 5, 1983. The carillon was installed later with a 50 bell unit and a keyboard for use in the sanctuary.

In August 1984 we were 100 years old, with Glenn Graves as pastor. Many previous pastors returned during the year to help us celebrate. The church ended the centennial year with the burying of a time capsule containing various papers and items.

God has called two families from our church to the foreign mission field. Rev. Glenn Graves, Cindy and children left our church August 30, 1987 to enter the mission field in the Dominican Republic.

May 1, 1988, Gordon West was called as our pastor. A commissioning service for Ron and Janet Key was held in November 1989. The Keys are currently serving as missionaries in Gambia, West Africa.

In April 14 thru 20 Evangelist Wray Wheeless held a revival, 15 people were baptized on April 21.

Mike Sepaugh was our guest speaker at our fall revival October 11 thru 14, 1990. Followed by a Homecoming celebration with dinner on the grounds. During the morning service, Clayton Fender and Ralph Evans were recognized for their years of dedicated service to the church and named each Deacon Emeritus. We had 177 in Sunday School and 220 in church.

In the past $4\cdot1/2$ years 119 people have been added to our membership. For this we give God the glory.

Each Sunday we were blessed by the messages and dedication of our pastor, Rev. John Huffman. We were fortunate enough to have Rev. Rick Miller for our Fall Revival. Rev. Fred Jennings brought us messages each evening in our Spring Revival. We've been blessed by having several beginning and experienced ministers bring messages on our First Sunday night services.

The Ladies Circle meets each month for prayer and to discuss plans for the church and the needs of the community. The men continue to visit as they can. Baptist Men's Day gave them the opportunity to let the rest of us know their dedication and willingness to show their love of Christ.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Like a marathon runner, Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina (BCH) "hit the wall" in 1991-92, but persevered to finish standing up!

In an exhausting year for staff and a myriad of volunteers, BCH successfully concluded its first statewide fund-raising campaign, received its first Thanksgiving Offering since 1979, dedicated expansion of Cameron Boys Camp, broke ground for the new Fleshman-Pratt Education Center in Thomasville, inaugurated an innovative Bible study program at Mills Home, installed two new pastors at campus churches and solidified programs that have placed it among child care leaders for decades.

These efforts enabled BCH to serve more than 1,300 children and families at 13 facilities statewide, including Chris, named All-Conference nose guard for 2A state champion Thomasville Bulldogs; Sandi, who has enrolled at Gardner-Webb College; Deborah, named outstanding Freshman at Thomasville High after enduring a court battle that sent her father to prison for abuse; Jennifer, who married on the Broyhill campus where she'd lived for seven years; Kathy, who will continue to live at Broyhill while she attends college; and a host of others who are making life-changing commitments because they've received a second chance at Baptist Children's Homes.

In April, BCH successfully concluded its "Give a child a chance!" financial campaign by gaining three-year commitments for \$11.2 million, topping the \$7.5 million goal, and the challenge goal of \$11 million. Significant priorities accomplished in the campaign are: expansion and relocation of Cameron Boys Camp to a more secluded site on its 903-acres of wilderness; ground-breaking for the Fleshman-Pratt Education Center, a model day care facility for infants, toddlers and two-year-olds; a unique Staff Training Institute for child care workers and social workers; and more than \$2.7 million committed for permanent endowment.

And, the first Thanksgiving Offering for BCH since 1979 raised \$510,000, a sum more than \$100,000 greater than that realized through the combined offering with Baptist Hospital and Baptist Retirement Homes. BCH sent \$1,000 from the Thanksgiving Offering to the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil as fulfillment of a promise to donate 10 percent of everything received over the goal to our partners in the south.

In addition, BCH maintained the partnership with our Brazilian counterparts by sending three training teams to Brazil, and hosting a group of Brazilian pastors in Thomasville.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life, often due to alcohol or drug abuse, or having been abused herself, leads to limitless freedom for the children, which leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives. Behavioral problems make it impossible for the child to continue to live at home.

Baptist Children's Homes provide a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and set goals to overcome them, which leads to behavior change and often. At the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH enjoyed a year of tremendous successes, in human terms and in institutional terms, which will allow it to continue to affect change in lives. Success in the "Give a child a chance!" Campaign will help provide a margin of excellence in the future when the pledges are paid. Already, the enthusiasm engendered by the effort have lifted the spirits of staff across the state.

Still, the Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

An increasingly important aspect of our support comes from estate gifts and bequests. More and more people who want their resources to provide new life for children included BCH in their wills.

When Sandi, and Kathy, and Chris, and Barbara come to us, full of potential and hope, we want to be able to continue to tell them North Carolina Baptists care enough to give them a chance!

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Baptist Hospital utilizes the skills and training of more than 5,700 employees to provide outstanding health care in settings as varied as the Brenner Children's Hospital, the Trauma Center, and the J. Paul

Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. Last year, the Joint Committee on the Accreditation of Health Care Organizations said that Baptist Hospital ranks in the top 10 percent of all hospitals in the nation.

During the past year, the hospital admitted 24,000 patients. It performed 16,662 surgical procedures, including 1,020 open heart operations, 29 kidney transplants and 80 bone marrow transplants. The AirCare helicopter flew 742 missions.

Total revenue of the hospital during the year was \$407,280,000. Cooperative Program gifts from the churches were \$656,180, which was applied to the budget of the Department of Pastoral Care. The Mother's Day Offering and other special gifts from the churches totaled \$424,406 and was used for benevolent care for patients who had no other means of paying their hospital bills.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided clinical pastoral education to 55 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 53,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provided over 24,000 counseling sessions. The professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to requests for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.

The various services of the hospital are readily accessible to all North Carolina Baptists and others. A telephone call to the Health-On-Call Office (919-716-2255) can secure an outpatient appointment with any one of the various specialists on the staff or can begin the process of gaining admission to the hospital if that need is indicated.

MAKING LIFE FOR OLDER ADULTS THE BEST OF TIMES

One of the greatest needs facing North Carolina Baptists as they move into 1993 is the ability to provide affordable quality long-term care services to the "Aged Saints" of our Convention.

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life are those individuals in the age category of 85 and older. That age group is growing at five times the rate of any other population segment in Baptist life. The 85 and older age group is also that age group most

likely to need the services provided by a long-term care institution like Baptist Retirement Homes. Unfortunately in 1992 in our State, there were not enough nursing care beds to meet the needs of the growing number of Older Adults who were functionally impaired and needed the services of a long-term care provider. Complicating the shortage problem was the fact that the cost of those beds was high (more than the average North Carolina Baptist Older Adult could pay). And to make matters even worse, in spite of the high cost of those beds, often the quality of care provided through those beds was fair at best. In other words, the greatest problem facing North Carolina Baptist Older Adults in 1992 was the fact that there were simply not enough affordable quality nursing care beds available for use by people like you and me and our Older Adult family members.

Having become aware some years ago of the above mentioned problem, Baptist Retirement Homes (for the last five year period) has been working to develop a system of affordable quality nursing care beds throughout the State for use by North Carolina Baptist Older Adults. New nursing care beds became available in the Piedmont area of our State in 1989 (through the opening of the Brookridge Retirement Community). In 1992, affordable quality nursing care will become available to Western North Carolina Baptist Older Adults through the new Rickman Nursing Care Center being built on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. It is our institution's hope that by 1994 affordable quality nursing care will also be available to Eastern North Carolina Baptist Older Adults as well. Your support has made the above possible.

In 1992, North Carolina Baptists through their gifts to the Cooperative Program and North Carolina Offering for Older Adults made it possible for Baptist Retirement Homes to provide financial assistance to more than 60% of all the Older Adults living in its health care related facilities. In addition, Western North Carolina Baptists contributed more than \$2.5 million toward the construction of the new Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville . . . a new facility that will enable Baptist Retirement Homes to make life for many Western North Carolina Baptists truly . . . the Best of Times.

Thank you North Carolina Baptists for your support. Please continue to pray for our ministry and its ability to meet the ever growing needs of the Older Adults of our Convention.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. ANNUAL REPORT

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, is committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit in serving North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis.

Assets are managed under the direction of the Foundation Board of Directors with interest income being paid either in perpetuity to Baptist causes named by the donor or to the donor (or heirs) for their lifetime (or specific period of time) before the income is then paid in perpetuity to the named Baptist causes.

Earned income distributed and paid to Baptist churches, institutions & mission causes during fiscal year 1991:

\$ 1,100,606

Earned income distributed and paid to individuals (with Baptist causes named as future beneficiaries) during the fiscal year 1991:

\$ 1,062,643

Total market value of Foundation assets, December 31, 1991:

\$36,283,384

During 1991, the Board of Directors, with the assistance of a nationally recognized investment consulting firm, adopted a detailed Investment Policy to govern the types of investments that its fiscal agents may make in keeping with the Christian commitment of the Foundation, as well as attempt to insure that the future spending value of the invested trust fund dollar will keep up with inflation. A study revealed that during the past five years the fiscal agents managing the Foundation assets ranked near the top nationally with other investment managers who operate under investment guidelines similar to the ones provided by the Foundation Board.

The Foundation staff and operations are housed in a building adjacent to the Baptist State Convention Building in Cary. Individuals and church groups are invited to call and arrange a visit of their Trust Agency's office building.

The significance of the Foundation services was illustrated in a recent experience that staff members had while eating in a fast food restaurant in Durham. In taking a seat adjacent to a table occupied by a young black police officer, we observed the enthusiasm of a white

lad of about 4 years of age as he stood talking to the officer. As the mother and a younger child, coming from another area of the restaurant, called for the lad to join them, he walked away from the table 6 to 8 feet, turned around the said to the officer, who was now standing and preparing to leave, "Can I give you a hug?" After an affirmative answer from the officer, the child walked over to the officer, reached around his legs and gave him a hug. The officer confirmed to us that he wished the world was filled with people like this child. The example corresponds to what so many already have done through the Foundation. As they approach the time of leaving this earthly life, they look back affectionately on what the Lord has done for them during their life and decide that they want to leave an expression of their love through an enduring and lasting gift (a "hug", if you please) that will serve the Lord until His return.

EVANGELISM REPORT

After several years of declining numbers of baptisms across the state, we are happy to report that the number of baptisms is on the rise. In 1989, Southern Baptist Churches in North Carolina baptized 22,004 people. During our Here's Hope Simultaneous Revivals in 1990, that number rose to 25,347. That was a 15% increase. In 1991, the number continued to rise to 27,498. That was an 8% increase.

Our Alleghany Baptist Association did its part in making this increase possible. In 1989, the churches of our association baptized 20 people. In 1990, during the Here's Hope Revivals, that number rose to 37 people. That was an increase of 85%. In 1991, we baptized 54 people. That was an increase of 48%.

It is very exciting to see our churches reporting more and more baptisms because that means that we are reaching more and more people for Jesus Christ. We anxiously await the reports from 1992 to see if the trend continues. Let's pray that it does.

To help the people of our association be better equipped to reach the lost in our community, an EVANGELISM WORKSHOP is being planned for September 29. The workshop will be held in the downstairs dining area of the Sparta Restaurant. We will begin with a meal at 6:30 pm. The Rev. Paul Faircloth, Director of Missions for the Yadkin Baptist Association, will lead in the workshop after the meal. The meal is being provided by the Evangelism Department of the

North Carolina Baptist State Convention. In order for us to be prepared for the meeting and the meal, please contact Cora Neville at the associational office (372-2268) or the Rev. Gordon West at Sparta First Baptist (372-8446) no later than September 23, and let us know if you plan to attend. If you do not let us know in advance, there won't be enough food or materials. Mark this date on your calendar and plan to attend.

Though more people are being won to the Lord, this need is still great for Christians to share the gospel with the lost. Let's strive to be prepared when those opportunities come.

OSBORNE MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

Located in the Turkey Knob Community, Osborne Memorial Baptist Church was organized on September 26, 1943. The Turkey Knob School Building was purchased and church services were held there for a short while. At a special conference in October, 1943 it was voted to build a House of Worship. In the Church Clerk's Book #1, the following is recorded:

"Whereas it appears to us that there is a real need for a Missionary Baptist Church in this locality, and after prayer for divine guidance and consultation with brethren from other churches, it is resolved that we now enter upon the organization of a church under the name of Osborne Memorial Baptist Church and that we adopt a church covenant, articles of faith, and rules of order as found in the two first pages of this minute book."

A name for the church was selected by a committee composed of Pauline Osborne, Stella Parsons, Blanche Osborne, Annice Landreth, Evelyn Pettyjohn, and Blanche Young. They selected Osborne Memorial Baptist Church as the name of the organization.

On October 13, 1943, a seven-member building committee was appointed. These members were Bays Parsons, C. E. Brown, Harry Young, Herbert Osborne, J. H. Pettyjohn, Lee Finney, and Clinton Young. The present church building was constructed on property donated by Mr. and Mrs. Andy Osborne near the Osborne Cemetery. Because the United States was engaged in World War II, building materials were rationed. Congressman R. L. Doughton had to secure the necessary special permits needed in order to build the church.

Mr. John M. Cheek, Moderator of Alleghany Baptist Association, an executive committee members, and the Rev. Bryce Barton assisted in the initial organization of the church.

There were twenty-two members enrolled as the charter members, namely, James Leff Osborne, Clinton Young, Ray Parlier, Annarae Pettyjohn, Ozena Landreth, Cam Delp, Evelyn Pettyjohn, Mary Kennedy, Bonnie Lee Brown, Pauline Osborne, Wanzoleen Landreth,

Blanche Young, C. E. Brown, Bays Parsons, Stella Parsons, Phoebe Cox, Carrie Phipps, and J. H. Pettyjohn. Later, other members were added making sixty-three in charter membership. Charter membership was closed June 4, 1944.

Rev. Bryce Barton was elected pastor; Blanche Young, Church Clerk; and Mary Kennedy, Treasurer.

At the Annual Session of the Alleghany Baptist Association in 1944, the church made application for membership in the Association. The request was made by Harry Young, Ray Parlier, and C. E. Brown. The church was graciously accepted into the Association.

Since the initial organization, Osborne Memorial has maintained an active Sunday School, VBS, and other church organizations, always supporting the interests of the Baptist State Convention.

Throughout the years, many improvements have made Osborne Memorial an Up-to-date structure. Sunday School rooms were added in the basement in 1955. Dirt was hauled out by hand, in wheelbarrows. Beautiful stained glass windows replaced the glass windows in 1960. Later a central heating plant was installed. In 1978 the sanctuary was enlarged by adding Sunday School rooms with folding doors. Rooms and hallways were carpeted. Restrooms were added, as was a well for a supply for water. The pews were cushioned with beautiful material in 1981. Extra chairs and tables were purchased for Sunday School Rooms in 1983. Ceiling fans have been installed. A covered porch has been added as well as the driveway and parking lot being paved.

A number of memorials have been made to the church. The communion set was given in memory of Monroe Osborne by his daughter, Mae Hungate. The communion table, the pulpit scarves, table runner and the picture "Head of Christ" were given in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Osborne by their children. The candle altar set was given in memory of Jim Leff Osborne by his children, Dennis and Karla Sue Osborne. The church bell is a memorial to Mr. and Mrs. Andy Osborne, given by their daughter, Pauline Stallings. A podium was given to the church in memory of Teddy Pardue, by his parents Rev. and Mrs. J. T. Pardue. The brown "Church Hymnals" were given in memory of Stanley Osborne, by his mother, Mrs. Katy Finney. Additional "Baptist Hymnals" were purchased as a memorial to Mr. E. C. Minnich.

Osborne Memorial has ordained three ministers: Rev. Brady Farmer, Rev. Jimmy Warden, and Rev. Bob Murphy.

Pastors who have served the church are: Rev. Bryce Barton, Rev. Beauford Hash, Rev. Carlie McKnight, Rev. Hayes McClure and

Rev. J. T. Pardue. The Rev. Hayes McClure's faithful and devoted service covered a period of twenty-eight years. The present pastor is Rev. Russell Mabe.

Those who have served as church clerk are: Blanche Young, Carrie Phipps, Stella Parsons, Ray Parlier, Jim Leff Osborne, Raline O. Elledge, and Dennis Osborne. Those presently serving as deacons are Burton Osborne, Clement Osborne, Dennis Osborne, Ray Parlier, Bays Parsons, Robert Richardson, R. S. Warden, and Harry Young.

The church has furnished an Associational Moderator for the past eight years and the present membership is 128.

The Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association is meeting with Osborne Memorial Baptist Church this year, 1993, as part of their 50th Year Celebration. It is the sixth time in the church's history the Association has met with Osborne Memorial Missionary Baptist Church.

Most of this historical report was originally written in 1967 by Mrs. A. O. Joines, with information supplied by Mrs. Ray Parlier and Mrs. Stella Parsons. Report to the Associations MEETING THE CHALLENGES OF HEALTH CARE - 1993

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our prupose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report, not only basic

facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

PROVIDERS AND RECIPIENTS OF HEALING . . . Our healing team now consists of 5,852 employees. The Medical Center (NCBH and BGSM) personnel total employment is fast approaching 9,000 people making us the second largest employer in Forsyth County. In our 806-bed facility, we had 23,247 inpatient admissions. Our Outpatient Department, physicians' clinics, and other related departments received 490,667 patient visits.

Our chaplaincy division joined with our health-care professionals to provide spiritual and emotional healing. With 15-40 chaplains present at various times, 52,934 ministries were provided to patients, families, staff and groups.

A new department of our Pastoral Care program named the Center for Congregational Health was given birth. Its purpose is to (1) train Intentional Interim pastors; (2) train church leaders; (3) provide a minister's assessment program; (4) establish a Minister's Help Line providing an opportunity for church leaders to receive guidance via a telephone call. The Pastoral Counseling Division opened a new counseling center in Wilmington bringing our total counseling centers to 11 across the state. The centers provided 16,205 counseling sessions.

POINTS OF EXCELLENCE . . . (1) The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations ranks Baptist Hospital in the top 9% of all hospitals in the nation. (2) We performed our first pancrease transplant and first double organ transplant (pancrease and kidney) this year. (3) We are one of only 26 comprehensive cancer care centers in the nation, treating more cancer patients than any hospital from Baltimore, Md. to Atlanta, Ga. (4) Quality infant through adolescence care in our Brenner Children's Hospital. (5) Our neonatal transport team is the largest in North Carolina and one of the 10 largest in the U.S. (6) Our Level I (highest awarded) Trauma Center has 2,100 admissions a year.

SUPERB FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP . . . In the midst of escalating health-care costs, we have a proven record of excellent stewardship. (1) The latest report of the North Carolina Database Commission comparing hospital major services charges vs. Baptist Hospital reveals, for our most frequent diagnoses: Duke - 36% higher; Average statewide - 9% higher (2) We are one of only 17 similar hospitals nationally with a "AA" bond credit rating. (3) Averaging the last two years and the projection for 1993, the Consumer Price Index will average 3.9% and the Medical CPI will average 9.7%. Baptist Hospital

charge increases for the same period will average 3.3%, well under both the above mentioned indexes.

EXPANSION FOR MEETING THE NEEDS OF THE FUTURE . . . NURSING CENTER AT OAK SUMMIT . . . Opening in July, this 170-bed facility provides skilled and intermediate care. The center will be one of only a few in the state to provide care for ventilator-dependent patients.

EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT/DIETARY . . . Under construction at the present time to be completed by June 1995, this facility will total 750,000 square feet. Our current ER was designed to handle 29,000 patients annually, but it is handling more than 40,000. Our new ER capacity will be 70,000 annually. This building will also house three floors of patient private rooms, our Pharmacy Department, and a 35-bed Day Hospital, new kitchen and cafeteria.

J. PAUL STICHT CENTER ON AGING AND REHABILITA-TION... Construction on this facility begins in November of 1993 and is scheduled for completion in January 1996. It will include geriatric care, research, and education; psychiatry; and also provide comprehensive acute rehabilitation services including nutrition assessment, physical, outpatient, speech, and recreational therapy.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND . . . Last year Baptists across our state gave \$422,000 to our annual Mother's Day Offering. All of these monies went toward relieving the financial burden of scores of former patients who have little or no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. The churches and individuals help make this ministry possible and we are grateful.

In conclusion, it is readily seen that this healing ministry we share together says to our patients and their families: "We care about your health-care needs, your spiritual and emotional needs, and your financial burdens, and we express our caring through service."

EVANGELISM REPORT

In 1992, Southern Baptist Churches in North Carolina had a small decline in the number of baptisms; however, the number is still up over five years ago. In 1989, North Carolina Baptists baptised 22,004 people. In 1990, that number rose to 25,347 (15% increase). In 1991, the number continued to rise to 27,498 (8% increase). In 1992, the number dropped to 25,030 (9% decrease).

Our Alleghany Baptist Association has experienced growth in our baptisms. In 1989, our associational churches baptised 20 people. In 1990, that number rose to 37 people (85% increase). In 1991, we baptised 54 people (an increase of 48%). In 1992, the number of people baptised dropped to 41 (a 24% decrease). This past church year, our churches have reported 29 baptisms (a 29% decrease).

Please remember, the number of baptisms represent people who have accepted Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, and have joined with our churches. This means that over the past five years, the churches of our association have reached 181 people for Jesus. What can we do during the next five years? Don't forget, approximately 50% of our county is unchurched. "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." (Luke 10:2.)

In 1995, Southern Baptists across our nation will be involved in simultaneous revivals again. The theme will be: "Here's Hope: Jesus Cares For You!" The message of "Hope" is one that people need to hear. You'll be hearing more about these revivals, and training opportunities to prepare for the revivals, as the time gets closer.

Chris starts college at North Carolina State this fall on a football scholarship. After leading Thomasville to a state championship in 1991, Chris also earned national honor society recognition, was active in the community counseling drug abusers . . . and became a Christian at Mills Home.

Kathy married a Christian young man who was a volunteer at Broyhill Home, where she lived. She continues her education at Haywood Technical College while working and becoming a young wife. She and her husband, Kris, are members at Woodland Baptist Church, where she was active in leading children's programs, even as a Broyhill resident.

Several rows of supportive staff members cried during the wedding when the minister asked, "Who gives this woman to be married?" Child care worker Jim Johnson responded, "Her mother and I do."

"Her mother," was Jim's wife, Vivian. Together, Jim and Vivian helped Kathy develop from an angry and withdrawn child, to a beautiful, confident, Christian leader.

Ashley was growing up too fast . . . and her parents didn't know how to handle it. They wanted to treat her like a child; she wanted adult freedoms. When their constant clashing came to blows, they knew they needed help.

Through the family clarification program at Mills Home, both Ashley and her parents learned the roles they played in the family conflict, and how to listen, forgive and adjust in the future.

"We're very grateful to Baptist Children's Homes," said Ashley's mother, Victoria. "I don't know what we would have done. I don't know what would have happened to Ashley. I've had friends say to me, 'I never knew there was a place like that.'"

Well, there is a place like that.

Thank God.

Baptist Children's Homes in 1992-93 served 1,453 children and their families through programs of intentionalized services at 13 facilities across North Carolina.

Those facilities include four residential care campuses; seven emergency care homes; two homes for behaviorally troubled girls; therapeutic camping for boys; a maternity home; a home for teen-age mothers and their babies and a model daycare facility.

Baptist Churches, through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Program and direct gifts funded about one-third of BCH's \$10 million budget. A significant source of income continues to be from estate gifts from those who remember children in their wills.

BCH's model daycare service took a giant step June 27 when the new \$1 million, 10,000 sq. ft. Fleshman' Pratt Early Childhood Education Center was dedicated. It will accommodate 75 infants, toddlers and two-year olds.

During dedication, Robin Britt, N.C. Secretary of the NC Department of Human Resources, said BCH is "a true model of how young children can be shaped, nurtured and loved," and that "we will be looking at institutions like the Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center as we find models to replicate."

T. Winfield Blackwell, president of the Fleshman-Pratt Foundation, whose lead gift started construction of the building, said, "Think how many children will be raised and shaped by the dedicated staff who serve here, and surely a goodly number will be developed, not only to be good citizens, but active ministers in God's service."

BCH also dedicated a counselor's lodge at Cameron Boys Camp; completed a strategic planning cycle for the next three years; celebrated the 50th anniversary of Odum Home in Pembroke; completed a three-year partnership with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao

Paulo, Brazil; and produced a new video about BCH, available August 15.

Swelling with emotion at the dedication of her new building, Daycare Services Director Mary Lou Dickey promised, "we will not fail" those who trust BCH with their children.

Michael C. Blackwell, who celebrated his 10th anniversary as president of BCH July 1, echoes that promise. "Baptist Children's Homes has been a cutting-edge ministry for North Carolina Baptists since 1885. As a disintegrating society moves the edges further and further, we're honing our ministry sharper and sharper. Thank you, North Carolina Baptists, for your support."

1993: THE BEST OF TIMES

Did you know that:

In 1993, North Carolina reached place number ten (10) among all the states in the United States in regard to the size of its adult population over the age of sixty-five (65)

That one-half of all the people who have ever lived to be sixty-five (65) are now living

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life is composed of those adults eighty-five (85) and older and that by the year 2000 that age category will double in size

That by the year 1996 North Carolina's "Baby Boomers" will be turning fifty-five (55) every 18 seconds

That by the year 2010 one out of every two people living in North Carolina will be fifty (50) years of age or older?

What do figures like those above mean for North Carolina Baptists? They point to the fact that one of the greatest needs facing our Convention as we move into the year 2000 is the provision of quality, affordable long-term care services to functionally impaired Older Adults through the expansion of existing long-term care facilities, and through the development of creative approaches to long-term care such as rural home health services, community day care programs, and respite programs for homebound care providers.

In an attempt to meet the above mentioned need, Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. in 1993:

Opened the Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville, North Carolina (a 100 bed Medicaid certified nursing care facility).

The Rickman Center is a state-of-the-art long-term care facility that has been developed to meet the needs of the poor elderly in Western North Carolina. (80% of the resident population will be recipients of benevolent funding).

Renovated the Albemarle Baptist Home in Stanly Baptist Association and renamed it the Taylor House. The Taylor House has no financial requirements for admission and is designed to provide care to the assisted living level of care resident, regardless of his/her ability to pay for the long-term care services provided.

Developed a new addition to the Brookridge Health Care Unit in Winston-Salem in order to provide an area for small group work with residents suffering from dementia. This state-of-the-art program will enable Baptist Retirement Homes' staff to improve the quality of life experienced by members of its resident community who are mentally impaired.

Baptist Retirement Homes is keenly aware of the fact that without the support of North Carolina Baptists none of the above would have been possible. As a result of the prayers and funding that the "Homes" receives through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Offering For Older Adults, it has been able to offer hope to many Older Adults whose future would have been uncertain without the caring involvement of North Carolina Baptists. CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE of North Carolina, Inc. Report to the Associations - 1993

Do you believe in miracles? They still occur, and we experienced one in the 1993 session of the N.C. General Assembly. No gambling legislation was enacted during that legislative session.

When the legislature came to Raleigh on January 27, 1993, veteran legislature observers admitted that this was the year for a state-operated lottery bill to get out of the General Assembly. Both Governor James B. Hunt and Lt. Governor Dennis Wicker, both former lottery opponents, had endorsed the proposed lottery legislation. Furthermore, there were 42 new House members, and a large majority of them had campaigned supporting the lottery. Out of the key elected state officials, gambling opponents had only one friend, House Speaker Dan Blue, and he made no apologies about his opposition to state-sponsored gambling.

What happened? Concerned Christians began to speak up and

contacted their legislators. By the time Senate Bill 11, The State Lottery Act, had passed the Senate by a vote of 27-23, House members who had campaigned supporting lottery legislation began contacting members of the House Committee on Constitutional Amendments and Referenda to keep the bill in committee.

In the meantime, some 20 workshops were conducted throughout the state educating and motivating the Christian community about this insidious evil under the sponsorship of the League, N.C. Baptist Men, Woman's Missionary Union, the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs, and the N.C. Christian Coalition. Resource leaders included Dr. Norman Geisler, author, GAMBLING A BAD BET; Dr. Patrick Anderson, Professor of Criminology, Florida Southern College; Dr. Paul Jones, Executive Director, Mississippi Christian Action Commission; Bill Brooks, Executive Director, CITIZENS AGAINST THE LOTTERY; from the Baptist State Convention, Doug Cole, Executive Director, Christian Life Council; along with George Reed, Director of Christian Citizenship; and members of Gamblers Anonymous.

In the closing days of the legislative session, Rep. David Redwine (D-Brunswick), who has introduced lottery legislation for the past 10 years, requested that the bill be held over until the 1994 session.

Of course, this will give the \$300 billion gambling industry some 10 months to re-group their supporters. Also it will give concerned Christians the time to get their message to lawmakers that gambling is bad public policy, and such legislation ought to be defeated.

There is also a pari-mutuel gambling proposal (horse racing with off-track betting parlors) before the General Assembly. The Senate Bill has already passed a Senate Committee and is currently in the Senate Finance Committee. The House Bill has also passed a House Committee and is currently in the House Appropriations Committee. Both bills are eligible for the 1994 session.

Someone has said: "The only lesson we learn from history is that we don't learn from history." North Carolina had an experience with pari-mutuel gambling with dog tracks in Currituck and Carteret Counties in the early 1950's. The N.C. Supreme Court closed them down as being a public nuisance.

Perhaps there is no industry that is "riddled" with corruption as much as the gambling industry. Last year we had legislators indicted in S.C. for accepting bribes from gambling lobbyists. some 10 public officials have pled guilty to corruption charges in Kentucky over a gambling "scam", and 12 others are under investigation. In Arizona, legislators have gone to prison due to a gambling scandal. We have

had Governors from West Virginia and from Maryland to go to prison due to gambling scandals in their respective states. Whereever you have legalized gambling, undoubtedly, you will find corruption in government.

This is why it is urgent for committed Christians to contact their legislators and urge them to oppose any gambling proposals.

DRUNK DRIVING: When you deal with politicians, tenacity is a key. For ten years, we have sought legislation that would establish .08 breathalyzer reading as the standard for drunk driving in North Carolina. In the past, we were able to get such legislation through the House, but the Senate was the graveyard. The measure would always be referred to a hostile Senate Committee composed largely of trial lawyers, and that would be "death" to such a proposal.

With a change in Senate leadership, the .08 breathalyzer legislation will become law on October 1, 1993, which will be a useful tool in helping to remove drunk drivers from the highways.

The League continues to assist local communities in combating our No. 1 drug problem, alcohol. Let us know if a liquor referendum is to be held in your area, and we will be ready to help.

Thank you for standing with us in the cause of Applied Christianity through your prayer and financial support.

Dear Fellow DoM:

I am sure you have heard about the flooding on the Mississippi River. I want to let you know about a MAJOR need we have in our association (24 churches, \$32,000 total budget) and encourage you to extend to your churches the opportunity to minister in a very practical way.

One of my churches, Alexandria Baptist Church, is UNDER WATER. Alexandria was the first town, and possibly the only one up to this time, to be completely submerged (over ten feet of water at this time). There are many hundreds of people who had to evacuate from the town and the surrounding farm lands. The IMMEDIATE, EMERGENCY needs of these people are being handled through FEMA, the Red Cross and our association of 24 churches. I Praise God for the people of this association for the way they have responded!

The association is now trying to gear up to take care of the more long range needs of these and others in our three county area of ministry: After the river goes down people are going to try and reestablish themselves. Many will return to their homes and be faced with an overwhelming clean-up job. There are two ways this association is planning to minister during this clean-up:

- 1. Physically helping them as they clean-up and/or rebuild. This should be a wonderful mission project for our association. We would appreciate your association and your churches to also consider becoming directly involved by sending mission teams during the following months.
- 2. Providing some of the basic materials people will need to accomplish the task themselves. We are setting up a central repository to stockpile items which will be needed to get started after the river recedes. Please see the attached list. Of course, people can donate money to buy these materials instead of sending materials in the mail. Either way would be greatly appreciated.

I would ask you to extend this information to your churches. If any would be interested in sending material, money or manpower to help people clean-up and/or rebuild, as a mission project, please give them my name, address and phone numbers:

STATE MISSIONS OFFERING What Is It? Why Should I Support It?

The annual State Missions Offering provides essential, basic support for a variety of North Carolina missions and ministries, including some of the most familiar and popular programs of work across our state. For example:

88 percent of WMU's entire program budget comes from the State Missions Offering. Some programs, like Camp Mundo Vista (GA/Acteens camp), would literally go out of business without the special offering.

56 percent of N.C. Baptist Men's (Brotherhood) program budget comes from the State Missions Offering. Baptist Men's Disaster Relief Van, the Medical/Dental Bus, agricultural mission projects — all are heavily dependent on state missions.

47 percent of the Missions Division's program budget comes from the State Missions Offering. Almost two-thirds of the Language missions' support comes from the offering. Church Extension gets a little more than one-half of its money from the offering.

44 percent of the Youth and Campus Ministries Division's program budget comes from the State Missions Offering. This year's special offering is earmarked for international students, summer mission programs and special projects at UNC Wilmington and Greensboro.

State Missions provides scholarships for Baptist students attend-

ing one of the convention's colleges or universities, help for the new Center for Congregational Health at Baptist Hospital, and support for the conference center at N. C. Baptist Assembly (Caswell).

Baptist associations receive direct assistance from the State Missions Offering. Each association is given an amount equal to 10 percent of the offering collected in that association. If the churches in an association contribute a total of \$40,000 to the State Missions Offering, for example, that association receives back \$4,000.

The State Missions Offering also provides financial support for Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute and the North Carolina Christian Action League.

The 1993 State Missions Offering goal is \$1.8 million. When we fail to reach that goal — last year we only collected around three-fourths of that amount — direct mission programs are simply not funded. A short-fall in the offering leaves the convention no choice. This translates in fewer student summer missionaries, less money for language missions and new church starts, a cut back in work with migrants and other special ministry groups, even less money for Baptist Men's disaster relief van and the medical/dental bus.

The State Missions Offering is not merely an "extra" budget item or money spent on programs unable to be funded by the Cooperative Program. The State Missions Offering supports essential ministries. And without it, many state Baptist ministries — ones churches have growr to depend upon — simply will no longer exist.

A promotional packet for the State Missions Offering (Sept. 12-19) will be mailed to churches (to the pastor's attention) around the first of August. If your church does not receive a packet, contact the Baptist State Convention at 1-800-395-5102 or (919) 467-5100.

9.4% of last year's (1992) State Mission Offering, \$29.45 of the \$325.00 collected from 3 of our associational churches, was sent back to our association. This money was used to help support our summer missionary and 40 persons having been guests at N. C. Baptist Assembly.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. Annual Report to Baptist Associations of North Carolina

June, 1993

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation works diligently in service to Christ as directed by the agency's Mission Statement:

"The North Carolina Baptist Foundation is an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina committed under the guidance

of the Holy Spirit to serving North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis.

And further, the Baptist Foundation Staff and Board of Directors are committed to being scrupulously moral, legal, efficient and accurate in carrying out the intent of each donor and trustor whose funds are placed under management of the Foundation as a means of sustaining a tangible and perpetual involvement in presenting the Gospel, meeting human needs and strengthening all bodies of Christian fellowship where Christ is the Head."

The total market value of the assets of the Foundation at the end of 1992 was \$41,880,638., an increase of almost \$5.6 million over the end of 1991. Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income to be paid to Baptist causes in perpetuity. Additionally, the Foundation offers fund management for Baptist causes on a revocable basis.

Earned income distributed and paid to Baptist churches, institutions & missions causes during fiscal year 1992: \$1,182,203. Earned income distributed and paid to individuals (with Baptist causes named as future

beneficiaries) during the fiscal year 1992: \$1,024,007.

In 1992, and continuing into 1993, the Long Range Planning Committee of the Board of Directors met extensively to lay the groundwork for the Foundation's goals and objectives for the next five years. The previous five years were quite successful with ambitious financial goals being met early on. It is anticipated that the Board's work in evaluating the past and present status and in laying a road map for the future will result in exciting times ahead.

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The office is located in Cary next to the Baptist State Convention building. Visitors are welcome and are encouraged to stop by for professional assistance or just to say hello.

Authorized as Wingate School of Union Baptist Association, 1895; Opened 1896; Chartered 1897.

In 1949 the trustees were first appointed by the Baptist State Convention of N.C.

Wake Forest University

Opened as Wake Forest Institute, February 3, 1834.

Wake Forest College authorized by special session of Convention meeting in Greensboro, July 30, 1946 to move to Winston-Salem.

1992 Annual Report

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). Headquartered in Atlanta, Ga., the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

At the end of last year, 4,868 missions personnel were serving in the United States, the Caribbean, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also had endorsed more than 2,200 chaplains who were serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. More than 2,400 Mission Services Corps volunteers were serving on home mission fields. During the year there were 367,847 baptisms and 1,281 church starts.

Approximately half the HMB's support comes from individual SBC churches through the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1992, gifts to the offering totaled \$37.61 million, up almost 6 percent from the 1991 total. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1993 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$38 million. About 36 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

Home missions is a partnership of the HMB, state conventions, associations, and churches. The HMB's strategy is to help start churches, ministry endeavors, and evangelism efforts that will grow to self-support or be carried on by local churches or associations.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1992:

Chaplaincy Ministries — The 2,293 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported 24,000 professions of faith and 4,600 baptisms.

Alternatives to Abortion — Workers in 23 crisis pregnancy centers received training from the HMB. As a result of the ministry of these centers, 2,164 babies were born and 832 women found faith in Christ.

Church Loans — More than 1,100 churches had active loans totaling \$115 million. These loans purchased, refinanced, remodeled, or constructed 106 buildings and purchased 9 building sites.

Language Missions — Home missionaries and pastors in the Language Church Extension Division serve among 102 ethnic groups using 98 languages and dialects.

Personal Evangelism — During the Southern Baptist Convention in Indianapolis, 1,353 volunteers canvassed 45,235 residences, conducted a religious survey, and shared the gospel with 2,905 individuals, 361 of whom made professions of faith.

Prayer and Spiritual Awakening — A national team began efforts to enhance effective prayer and revival ministries in churches. The Intercessory Prayerline grew from 7,500 calls in 1985 to 130,000 last year.

Volunteers — Over 71,000 Southern Baptist adults, college students, and youth group members volunteered for long- and short-term projects. More than 58,000 volunteers responded to disaster relief efforts in Florida, Louisiana, and Hawaii.

Special Ministries — Southern Baptists minister to seamen in 37 port cities and 200 missionaries are involved in ministries related to college students, resorts, special events, and diplomats.



HISTORY OF MOUNT CARMEL MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH ONE HUNDRED TEN YEARS — 1884 - 1994 GLADE VALLEY, NORTH CAROLINA

The second "Missionary" Baptist Church to be organized in Alleghany County was the one with a Biblical name, Mount Carmel, on August 23, 1884.

Mount Carmel Baptist Church is located two miles north of Roaring Gap, just off Highway 21 near the Cherry Lane Fire Department.

Volume 1 of the Clerk's book, "State of North Carolina, Alleghany County," contains the following entry:

The arm from Long Creek Baptist Church, (Surry Association) met on August 23, 1884, near Woodruff Church. After Divine service conducted by Elders J. K. Franklin and J. A. Jordan, was seated in fellowship. On motion, church door was opened for reception of members, and Elder J. A. Roberts, J. M. Jordan, C. P. McCann, Elizabeth Sparks, and J. F. Rash, joined by letter. The above being found orthodox in Baptist faith constituted a church. C. P. McCann, acting as spokesman for the body, and Elders J. A. Jordan, J. K. Franklin, and W. F. Byrd presbytery. The Clerk's book was a large leather-bound one purchased from the Sunday School Supply Store at Raleigh.

The first-one-room frame structure was built the year of organization and used until it collapsed in a windstorm in 1914. The place of Worship was then moved to the present site owned by the Orange Presbytery which had constructed a one-room combination churchschool building. In June 1928, Mt. Carmel purchased the church building, furnishings, and one acre of land for \$450.00. The church was dedicated in November 1929, when Rev. W. F. Weatherman was pastor. The cemetery was established in 1935. Probably the first improvements were made in 1953 when Mrs. George Crutchfield, R. Jordan, A. C. Caudle, and R. A. Crouse were appointed on a building improvement committee, and the church was ceiled with masonite. Some years later the drive around the church was made, building underpinned, walls painted, electric lights installed, Sundav school rooms added, and hardwood floors laid. A basement was excavated for additional Sunday school space, restrooms, and storage area. A picnic pavilion was constructed on the grounds in 1984. Foley A. and Janie McKnight have twice donated land across the road from the church on August 13, 1986 and again on November 17, 1987, for a new parking lot. Numerous improvements have been made through the years in the form of renovations, expansions, and additions, with the latest ground breaking being August 7, 1987, which resulted in the present beautiful carpeted sanctuary with its padded pews, stained glass windows, lighted life-size picture of Christ, modern sound system and lighting, piano and organ, ceiling fans, vinyl siding, new roof, insulation, expanded Sunday school rooms, central heating system and air conditioning, and the driveway and parking lot paved. The church building bears little resemblance of the original spartan structure our forefathers used for Worship. Rev. Carlie McKnight, former Pastor and honor guest, participated in a dedication service on January 31, 1988.

Mt. Carmel joined the Elkin Association in 1885, and in 1898 became a member of Stone Mountain Association, and since 1910 has been affiliated with the Alleghany Association in which it is geographically located.

Pastors who have shepherded God's people at Mount Carmel are as follows: J. A. Jordan, J. A. Williams, T. M. Honeycutt, J. T. Fualks, A. McKnight, Arthur F. Absher, J. K. Franklin, R. K. Johnson, Grant Cothran, D. J. Roberts, John W. Brown, William Miles, W. L. Hoppers, P. H. Haire, S. Landreth Blevins, W. Franklin, Frank Weatherman, Carlie McKnight, Troy Blevins, Gwyn Blackburn, Fred Blevins, and Everette Shaw, who has served for forty-two years. The church has no living former Pastors.

The church has had the privilege of ordaining ten ministers of the Gospel, and furnishing an Associational Moderator for three years.

Church Clerks who have served are: J. M. Jordan, G. A. Gentry, D. J. Roberts, and Sowell Woodruff, who served from April 1926 to his death. Franklin Royal followed him and faithfully served from January, 1942, to August, 1971, as Clerk/Treasurer and Deacon. The church Scholarship program was established in 1983 and was named in loving memory of James D. McKnight, who served as Clerk/Treasurer from August, 1971 to August, 1978, and was a Deacon also, and Dorothy Shaw has served as Clerk/Treasurer since August, 1978.

Deacons were: C. P. McCann, J. F. Rash, Moses Woodruff, Aaron Cheek, Charlie Hanks, F. W. Royal, Hardin Spicer, Paul Woodruff, Joe Irwin, Stewart Lyons, Howard F. Royal, Walter Crouse, Sr., J. W. Caudle, R. A. Crouse, A. C. Caudle, James D. McKnight, Bill Shaw, James Gillespie, Gary Osborne, Bill Edwards, Wayne Cleary, Larry Atwood, Dennis C. Crouse, Bruce Wood, and Bradley Wooten.

Among the gifts received by the church were: a communion set prsented by the McKnight family in memory of C. S. McKnight, a pulpit Bible by the Will Miles Family in memory of Homer Miles, a lawn bulletin board in memory of J. W. Caudle by Mrs. Mamie Caudle Lemmerman, a communion table for the sanctuary was donated by the Franklin Royal family, an anonymous gift of \$1400.00 to be used for charity, and 100 new Church Hymnals. A beautiful church sign was designed, donated, and installed on Highway 21, by Ray Shaw, and a fifty-four passenger bus was donated by J. D. Higgins.

The church held its Centennial celebration on Sunday, August 26, 1984, with old fashioned attire, special singing, and one of the church's two former living Pastors, Rev. Carlie McKnight, 90 years of age, delivered an inspiring message. "Dinner on the grounds" was enjoyed by patriarchs and youth alike. The Principal Film Company of London, England, filmed the documentary, "Voices of America" on Sunday, June 4, 1989, during a Worship service. The first Church Directory was published in late 1989. Mrs. A. O. Joines, former Associational Historian, had the church records microfilmed to February 17, 1971, by the North Carolina Department of Archives and History, and the microfilm was updated in 1990 at Wake Forest University.

The church has supported various agencies of the Baptist State Convention and the Alleghany Baptist Association through the years. The WMU was organized in 1983, and has been very active in missions, ministering to the needs of the community and surrounding

areas, and reaching far beyond. The Sunday School was organized in June, 1939 for the summer months only, and has continued to function since that time.

Membership has grown from five to two hundred fifty-three. Worship Services are conducted every Sunday at 11 AM, Bible study and youth activities on Sunday nights, and Wednesday night Worship services. There is no way to evaluate the influence of Mt. Carmel Baptist Church, for it has furnished a place of Christian Worship for more than one hundred ten years. As Christians living in these turbulent times, we all realize the importance of having well qualified leaders to properly train our youth, who are heirs to all kinds of problems, and together we can persevere, and shape the destiny of our nation. Let us pray that God will fill us with the Holy Spirit and we will possess the burden to do whatever God has called us to do.

I wish to express my gratitude to past Historians, Mrs. A. O. Joines and Mrs. T. S. Moxley for documenting the early history of our churches and making this report possible.

Report to the Associations MEETING THE CHALLENGES OF HEALTH CARE - 1994

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report, not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

PROVIDERS AND RECIPIENTS OF HEALING — Our Hospital healing team now consists of 5,777 employees. The Medical Center (North Carolina Baptist Hospital and Bowman Gray School of Medicine) personnel total employment is fast approaching 9,000 people making us the second largest employer in Forsyth County. In our 806-bed facility, we had 23,545 inpatient admissions during our fiscal year 1993-94. Our Outpatient Department, physicians' clinics, and other related departments received 523,672 patient visits.

DEPARTMENT OF PASTORAL CARE — Our chaplaincy division joins with our health-care professionals to provide spiritual and emotional healing. With 15 to 35 chaplains present at various

times, 58,747 ministries were provided to patients, families, staff and groups. Mission dollars from the Cooperative Program enabled this ministry to be carried out.

The Center for Congregational Health, in its second year of ministry as a part of our Department of Pastoral Care, continues to expand and strengthen. To date thru 1993, 40 ministers have completed intentional interim training and 29 are in training. The number of churches calling intentional interim pastors continues to increase. The training of consultants for conflicted churches and leadership training for young ministers were both begun.

The Pastoral Counseling Division now operates 12 counseling centers across the state. These centers provided 26,716 hours, a five percent increase over the previous year.

In December 1994, Dr. Dewey Hobbs will retire as Director of the Department of Pastoral Care. His eleven years of leadership and ministry have brought quality and expansion in every facet of the department.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND — Last year Baptists across our state gave \$425,734 to our annual Mother's Day Offering. All of these monies went toward relieving the financial burden of scores of former patients who have little or no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. The churches and individuals help make this ministry possible and we are grateful.

EXCELLENT FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP — In the midst of escalating health-care costs, we have a proven record of superb stewardship.

- (1) The latest report of the North Carolina Database Commission comparing the average of other state academic medical center charges vs. Baptist Hospital for our most frequent diagnoses reveals our charges are 21% lower.
- (2) We are one of only 17 hospitals nationally with a "AA" bond credit rating.
- (3) Averaging the last two years and the projection for 1994, the Consumer Price Index will average 2.8% and the Medical CPI for hospitals will average 8.9%. Baptist Hospital rate increases for the same period will average 1.8%, under both the abovementioned indexes.

MEETING THE CHALLENGES OF THE FUTURE — The health care environment is and will continue to be changing. Baptist Hospital is proactively facing these changes on a daily basis. Below are listed several visions which have recently been or will soon be realized.

Nursing Center at Oak Summit — Opened in July 1993 this 170-bed facility offers four levels of care. It is also one of only a few nursing centers in North Carolina that provides care for ventilator-dependent patients.

Emergency Department Dietary Building — Progressing toward a late 1995 opening, this facility will expand our ED capacity to 70,000 visits annually. It will also house three floors of patient private rooms, our Pharmacy Department, a new kitchen and 900-seat cafeteria, and a 35-bed Day Hospital.

J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation — This building will usher in a new era in rehabilitation at our Medical Center. Housing a total of 128 beds, it will contain a geriatric day hospital which will aid the transition from hospital to home, inpatient rehabilitation nursing units, a psychiatric floor, geriatric research and education. Completion is targeted for 1996.

At home health care — Our Home Health Solutions provides our local region with parenteral nutrition and intravenous antibiotic therapy, chemotherapy and pain management. Home Health Specialists provides nursing care, personal care and physical and occupational therapy.

Center for Research on Human Nutrition and Chronic Disease Prevention — Our continued partnership with Bowman Gray School of Medicine enables our Medical Center to provide the highest quality of research, education, and patient care. Quoting Dean Richard Janeway, "We are trying to prevent the major killers such as cancer, strokes, and heart attacks. With this facility we'll be able to transfer the information straight to the patient's bedside."

Community Hospital Assistance — Developing relationships with community hospital such as Stokes Reynolds in Danbury and Hoots Hospital in Yadkinville enables us to assist them in lowering costs as well as providing quality hospital and outpatient care. We anticipate expanding this endeavor to include other smaller, outlying hospitals. We also have significant affiliate relationships with hospitals in Wilkesboro, Lexington, and Mt. Airy and are in the process of developing other affiliate relationships.

QUALCHOICE OF NORTH CAROLINA — Joining with BGSM and Wake Forest University, Baptist Hospital has developed a managed care plan. Our design is one which offers affordable quality health care while providing the insured freedom of choice. This plan will be opened for public enrollment beginning January 1, 1995.

A CLOSING WORD — We continue to esteem our heritage, celebrate our current capabilities, and strive to position ourselves for the future. Your partnership, prayers, and utilization of our services inspires our dedication to our mission. We are grateful to God and to the North Carolina Baptist family.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA

No matter how much adults try to convince themselves otherwise, children suffer when parents divorce.

Amber suffered. Because she blamed her mother for household turmoil, and because she was young and confused, Amber told her mother she hated her. She stopped communicating and became withdrawn. She chose wrong friends and attempted to take her own life.

In today's atmosphere, when divorce rocks as many marriages as it misses, thousands of children like Amber look for anchors. And in today's atmosphere, just as in the atmosphere of the 1880s, and every year since, Baptist Children's Homes provides that anchor for hundreds of children.

In 1992-93 BCH served 1,469 young people and their families, probably an all-time high.

Through services provided at 13 facilities statewide, BCH offered residential care, maternity care, a home for teenager mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping, model day care, emergency care and behavioral change.

Through the Cooperative Program, church budgets and the Thanksgiving Offering, Baptist churches provided about one-third of

the \$11 million necessary to care for those children. Other revenue comes from payment for services on a sliding scale, foundations and corporations and individual gifts. A significant source of help comes from individuals who remember Baptist Children's Homes, and the children it serves, in their estate planning.

I couldn't handle what was going on at home," Amber said, after a year in the intensive group process at Kennedy Home. "I wanted a way out. I saw (suicide) as the only way. I had totally turned my back on God."

Under the tutelage of Kennedy Home Baptist Church's pastor, Amber has rededicated her life to the Lord and was baptized. She is now memorizing Scripture and doing devotions.

Between her renewed faith and the peer group process, Amber has begun to resolve the differences with her mother. When she graduates from Kennedy Home, she plans to live with her mother and sister.

"Just being able to talk through it with group and with staff helped make it better," Amber said. "They helped me understand mom may have moved out, but she never left me. She's always been supportive."

Working through problems at BCH involves identifying your problems, putting a name to them. That helps a child realize he/she is not a "problem child" but is a "child with problems."

"If I was alive without this place, I wouldn't be in a happy life," Amber said. "I'm really thankful there are places like this.

Amber's gratitude expresses the feelings of hundreds of children each year, and the staff who serves them. Many young people need BCH. Thankfully, many Baptist adults are committed to providing their needs, for Jesus' sake.

As a result of the wonderful support given by North Carolina Baptists, 1994 will be remembered as one of the finest years in the 43 year history of Baptist Retirement Homes. The following are some highlights from the year:

In recognition of its commitment to the spiritual well-being of the residents that it serves, Baptist Retirement Homes hired W. Paul Riggs to serve as Chaplain to the residents of the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem and the Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville.

Reaffirming its commitment to the idea that retirement should be a "step-up" for Older Adults, the renovation of the Taylor House in Albemarle was completed and renovation of the Hamilton Baptist Home in Martin County was begun. When the renovation of the Hamilton Baptist Home is completed in mid-1995, all of the facilities operated by the Baptist Retirement Homes will be "State-of-the-Art."

In recognition of the changing profile of institutionalized Older Adults (47% of the "oldest old" in North Carolina suffer from some form of dementia), a special small group approach to the care for institutionalized Older Adults suffering from dementia was instituted at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem. Through the implementation of this program, Baptist Retirement Homes once again demonstrated its commitment to the principle that everyone has the right to age with dignity and to enjoy a certain quality of life throughout the aging process.

In an effort to provide Older Adults with affordable care, a sub-acute unit was developed at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem... a unit where frail Older Adults can receive such treatments as IV therapy, infusion, wound care, and stroke and bone fracture rehabilitation outside of a hospital setting.

In response to the need to provide quality long-term care services to the ever growing number of frail Baptist Older Adults, Baptist Retirement Homes expanded its nursing services in 1994 to include an additional 100 Older Adults (80% of that group being classified as the poor elderly... men and women who lack sufficient financial resources to pay for the institutional services they receive).



NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. Annual Report to Baptist Associations of North Carolina June, 1994



With the 75th anniversary of the chartering of the N. C. Baptist Foundation approaching, it is exciting to reflect on the fulfillment of dreams of the founding fathers. The prayerful deliberation that led to

the vote in the 1919 Baptist State Convention meeting for the beginning of "a trust agency" envisioned a viable entity which would promote and manage funds given by individuals for perpetual support of several struggling institutions and the mission programs at the heart of this missionary minded denomination.

As of December 31, 1993, the Foundation held \$45,878,748 under management. In 1993, \$1,243,217 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,196,748 was distributed to individuals for a total income distribution of \$2,439,965.

The income distributions for the entire 74 year history of the N. C. Baptist Foundation totals: \$7,009,154 income paid to individuals and \$10,011,893 to Baptist churches. institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$17,021,047.

In 1993, the staff of the Foundation consisted of seven full time employees and two persons who provided part-time service in accounting and legal services. In May of 1994, Rev. Coy H. Jeans, Jr. was employed by the Foundation Board as Western Area Manager of Trust and Endowment Development. Rev. Jeans will serve individuals in western North Carolina through estate stewardship planning to better provide for families and Christian endeavors. He will also work very closely with Associations and churches in the area. We encourage western North Carolina Baptists to contact Rev. Jeans at his office at Marion at 704-652-9548. BAPTIST COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY REPORT



One year and 338 days after Pearl Harbor, the Council on Christian Higher Education was created: November 17, 1943. The first Council meeting occurred January 17, 1944, four months and 20 days before D-Day. Reports to the Baptist State Convention in those years contained many references to World War II and its effects upon churches, communities, the colleges and Baptist work in general. It was a time of weakness and confusion. War was raging in Europe and the Pacific, and the outcome was still in doubt.

In such a time there were visionary Baptists who by faith could see beyond the clouds of war to the needs of peacetime. A Convention committee of 64 members labored almost two years before recommending that the Council be established. Chowan College was closed in 1944, Gardner-Webb College was not yet funded by the Convention, and Wingate College received only \$5,000. The clear aim was to strengthen the colleges, increase their moral and financial support among Baptists, place Christian Higher Education high on the Baptist agenda, and to organize such efforts on a continuing basis.

In 1994, the Council on Christian Higher Education's 50th year of operation, let us give thanks for those pioneer Baptists whose foresight, insight and good works caused North Carolina Baptists to become leaders in the field of Christian Higher Education.

HOME MISSION BOARD, SBC — Christ for Our Nation

1993 Annual Report Summary/Highlights

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). Headquartered in Atlanta, Ga., the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

At the end of last year, 4,882 missions personnel were serving in the United States, the Caribbean, Guam, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also had endorsed more than 2,300 chaplains who were serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. More than 1,700 Mission Service Corps volunteers were serving on home mission fields. During the year there were 1,500 church starts (more than four per day) and 349,073 baptisms.

Approximately half of the HMB's support comes from individual SBC churches through the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1993, gifts to the offering totaled \$36.31 million, about 3 percent less than the 1992 total. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1994 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$40 million. About 36 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1993:

Chaplaincy Ministries — The 2,325 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported more than 24,000 professions of faith and 4,500 baptisms.

Church Loans — Approximately 1,056 churches had active loans totaling \$131.1 million. The Church Loans Division closed 120 church loans totaling \$32 million, including \$3.8 million of refinancing.

Language Missions — Home missionaries and pastors in the Language Church Extension Division serve among 102 ethnic groups using 98 languages and dialects.

Evangelism — During Crossover Houston, the Mass Evangelism Department coordinated 35 street evangelism events, 25 block parties, nine evangelistic rallies, and 68 special Harvest Revivals and events. These activities resulted in 1,253 conversions. The Personal Evangelism Department produced and shipped materials for "Here's Hope. Share Jesus Now." This emphasis will include 60 Days of Soul-Winning, January 9-March 9, 1995.

Volunteers — More than 74,860 Southern Baptist adults, college students, and youth group members volunteered for long- and short-term projects. In addition, several thousand more were involved in disaster relief efforts in the Midwest.

Church Evangelism Development — Over 1 million teens participated in "See You At The Pole," gathering at their flagpoles to pray for the schools of our nation.

Administration — The Home Mission Board broke ground for a new national office building which will be completed in 1995. Customer Services received more than 51,000 calls and shipped almost 5 million pieces of HMB material.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER for the Ass'n, Year 1993-1994

I accepted the Treasurer's office at the last Association Annual Session on September 11, 1993. This only as it appeared no other candidate would accept this office. Barbara Richardson, the Assistant Clerk/Treasurer, completed the Treasurer's records for the current year ending September 10, 1993 on September 22, 1993. I received the Treasurer's records from the Association office, September 28th, and began reviewing the records for the past two years so I could become familiar with the Association's Budget Plans and the Mission Goals.

First, my review revealed that the ending Treasury balance reported for the year ending September 10th did not include \$333.00 received from the BSC that was deposited August 16th. The ending balance for 1993 then had to be corrected to include that deposit. Second, my review revealed that the Budget for the current year 1993-1994 did not include Budget items to pay for the Utilities and Payroll Taxes. Third, reviewing past needs for miscellaneous items there was not a Budget item for these needs. I then prepared a revised Budget to take before the Finance Committee for their consideration to send to the Executive Board for approval or correction. The Finance Committee approved the inclusion of the three items to the current Budget and also had concerns about the amounts of some of the other items in the Budget and approved adjusting these items downward. The Budget for 1993-1994 was amended and approved by the Finance Committee, correcting the total Budget from \$7,189.00 to \$7,044.00. This amended Budget total of \$7,044.00 was the Association Churches support required after deducting the receipts from BSC for DOM Salary, Food Vouchers, and Youth Committee needs. The actual Budget requires is reported as \$11,994.00 less the receipts of \$4,950.00 from BSC.

During this year we have closed an account at the First Citizen Bank and deposited \$43.92 into the treasury. The Mission Church, Cornerstone, account as closed by the Executive Board and \$876.29 was deposited into the treasury. A Safe Deposit Box account at First Union Bank was closed and a Deposit Box was rented at Blue Ridge Bank with a saving of \$20.00. and all banking is done with the Blue Ridge Bank. The Telephone billing from Skyline was questioned for the installations being paid for and this resulted in a reduction of one installation being removed, since it was in the First Baptist offices. Skyline refunded \$111.30 for approximately 5 months overpayment.

By approval of the Executive Board, August 8th, the beginning balance of the Treasury Account was corrected downward by \$800. This was done to accommodate the deposit by Pine Fork made in August 1993 for their 1993-94 support to the Association. The \$800. was then entered in the 1993-94 records.

I acknowledge the support of the Finance Committee and the Executive Board during this current year as we planned the Budgets and tried to give you complete details on record of your financial activities to support the Association.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee, consisting of the Treasurers of each church, met for their first meeting on October 21, 1993. Cora Neville, DOM and Karen Sealey, Clerk, attended as their help in planning is necessary.

The Finance Committee had been assigned certain responsibilities in the Associational Strategy Planning Report which was designed for the Association in 1989 for a five (5) year period. As chair of this Committee I reviewed past records of the Association such as Budget Plans, Treasury activities of receipts and disbursements from all sources, Goals anticipated in the Associational Strategy Planning Report for all Mission opportunities, the current Association Constitution and other records.

The first item that concerned me was the absence of three (3) items in the current 1993-94 Budget. The three items not included were, Utilities, Payroll Taxes, and there was evidence of a need for miscellaneous disbursements. The next item was to have prepared financial reports for the Finance Committee to review and submit to the Executive Board at each quarterly meeting. The next item was to prepare a report for each church's support during the current year; this is necessary to keep informed about the support monies to meet Budget needs. Other items that were interesting enough to plan for was the responsibilities outlined in the Associational Strategy Planning Report.

Our first meeting on October 21 was planned around the above items. We got acquainted as a new Committee and discussed the above items as necessary to submit to the Executive Board for their consideration. Reports that were reviewed were the Receipts and Disbursements, the Churches support, and the current Budget. Recommendations for actions on the reports were discussed and then approved by the Committee.

The second meeting of the Committee was on February 14, 1994. The receipts and disbursements during the current period were reviewed and approved. Other discussions centered around the outline for this Committee in the Associational Strategy Planning Report. Recommendations were made that a listing should be compiled of all

Association Ministries and Missions and distributed to all churches for their use. Recommendation was made that an Association church-wide meeting be planned to educate younger people about the different ministries of the Association, and explain how to do the Mission work. Discussions included Sales Tax Refunds available for the churches, the safe deposit box rental and the DOM salary. The last items during this meeting was to request of the Executive Board to plan the goals of the Association and submit these to the Committee for use in Budget Planning.

The third meeting of the Committee was on August 1, 1994. The current reports of the treasury were reviewed and approved. The agenda for this meeting was the preparation of the Budget for the 1994-95 Association year. Discussions centered on the current reports of the Association finances and then decisions were made for the new Budget. Other considerations for possible needs for funds were then included and the Budget Proposal was approved for submitting to the Executive Board.

Hopefully, this Committee has contributed to the planning for the Association finances, and fulfilled their responsibilities as custodians of the churches support monies. As each treasurer of the churches and churches Executive Board representatives meet and plan, let's be representative of each other's love for our God and Jesus and continue to carry out the Great Commission.

1994 ANNUITY BOARD REPORT TO STATE CONVENTIONS

While the Sunday School Board, Home Mission Board and Foreign Mission Board focus on God's message, the Annuity Board focuses on God's messengers. For over 75 years the Annuity Board has been serving those who serve the Lord. The Annuity Board offers security for pastors, other ministers, eligible church and associational employees and their families.

The Personal Security Program offers up-to-date insurance products to protect against the large and small bumps and scrapes of life. The program includes a Term Life Plan, Personal Accident Plan, Disability Plan and a choice of Medical Plans. This is a flexible program; coverage can be tailored to meet each family's unique needs. Each plan is available alone or in combination with other plans.

Over 22,000 church and associational staff members participate in the Term Life Plan. They have found this Plan provides the protection they need at a cost competitive with comparable plans in the market-place. In this era of rising medical costs, Personal Security Program medical rates have not increased since 1992. Nearly 20,000 Southern Baptist church and associational workers enjoy the protection the medical plans provide.

The Church Annuity Plan provides financial security both before and after retirement. Its Protection Section, funded by state convention Cooperative Program dollars, includes supplemental disability and survivor benefits. State conventions also provide matching retirement dollars for eligible participants. This Plan, designed by Southern Baptists for Southern Baptist churches and associations, provides opportunities for tax savings, competitive investment returns and the flexibility to meet each participant's special concerns. At the end of May 1994, 36,075 participants serving 20,131 churches and associations were active in the Church Annuity Plan.

With \$4.4 billion in assets and over 75 years of experience, the Annuity Board offers its participants security and stability. The Annuity Board recognizes each dollar represents retirement income or life and health protection for a Christian servant in a Southern Baptist church, association, state convention or agency. The Annuity Board's mission is unchanged; it exists to serve those who serve the Lord.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST MEN (NCBM)

1993 was a very busy and good year for North Carolina Baptist Men. NCBM officers are: president - Maurice Cook, Raleigh; vice presidents - Jim Burchette, Raleigh; Harry Harkey, Winston-Salem, and Ernie Stines, Canton. Working with these men are some 150 key laymen across the state to challenge men and boys to a greater Christian commitment and greater missions involvement.

North Carolina Baptists have responded with great compassion to victims of disasters during the past year. Our disaster relief unit and teams ministers in Florida after Hurricane Andrew and in the midwest after the flooding. Close to 3,000 North Carolina Baptists assisted in disaster relief efforts this past year.

The 40-foot N.C. Baptist Men medical bus has been put to great use this year in medical missions in North Carolina. The bus, customized with a full dental office and a physician's area, has been used by Baptist medical persons in our state as a means of mission service. This ministry operates in cooperation with local associations across our state. Many good and positive things have resulted from this bus ministry. Frank Starnes of Raleigh has served as the coordinator of this ministry.

In addition to disaster relief and the medical/dental ministry, there are 10 other ministries of N.C. Baptist Men that are designed to equip, motivate and mobilize N.C. Baptist men and boys to be involved in ministry. Those other 10 ministries are: Aviation Ministries, Agricultural Missions, Family Foundations, Coorectional Ministries, Construction Projects, Lay Renewal, Lay Revivals, Overseas Missions, Resort and Recreation Ministries, and Prayer Support. In addition to these ministries, N.C. Baptist Men's Department works hard to involve men and boys in missions through local church Brotherhood programs (Royal Ambassadors, High School Baptist Young Men, Baptist Men).

Royal Ambassadors/High School Baptist Young Men:

Future:

At our January annual meeting N.C. Baptist Men adopted a new purpose statement. This purpose statement is reflected in our Goal and Objectives.

The goal and objectives of North Carolina Baptist Men is to help Baptist State Convention of North Carolina churches involve their members (especially men and boys) in missions. The objectives for accomplishing this goal are to:

MT. CARMEL

Mt. Carmel established a Building Fund in September with \$1050, and has added \$150.00 each month since that time, along with other donations.

The Pastor has served the church for 42 years and was the visiting evangelist for revival services at Welcome Home Baptist Church in October. He also sings with the Gospel Echoes. His group and the Saved-by-Grace Singers have traveled many miles singing for revivals, homecomings, benefits, funerals, and in other churches.

The church baptized two new members and received 7 others. Five members were lost by death or transfer.

Support was given to various agencies of the Baptist State Convention with special offerings and missions, the Alleghany Baptist Association, two individual missionaries, Alleghany Cares Clothing Closet, and other individuals with special needs.

The church conducts Sunday school and Worship service every Sunday, Sunday night Bible study and youth activities, and Wednesday night Worship service. Spring and fall revivals were conducted, VBS with enrollment of 127 and average daily attendance of 81, Easter sunrise services and fellowship breakfast, New Year's Eve service, Communion, fifth Sunday night gospel singings, and annual Sunday school and church picnic. Flowers have been sent to be reaved families, food boxes for those less fortunate, and fruit baskets to the nursing homes and for shut-ins at Christmas. The church participated in the WCOK Community Christmas Cheer Project by gathering cans and bags of food for the needy, Thanksgiving family night supper, and selected Mother and Father of the year and honored all Mothers and Fathers with gifts on their respective days. Memorial services and grave decoration are conducted annually.

Forty people participated in the Associational drama, "I Dreamed I Searched Heaven For You" performing in a total of 13 different churches, far and near, and were blessed to see many lives changed,

and rededications. The church furnished miscellaneous supplies and decorations needed.

Artist, Robert Saunders, High Meadows Estates, donated a painting valued at \$500.00 to the church. Members, Robert and Barbara Patrick, donated 25 New Testaments for the pews, and Marvin Shaw donated \$460.00 in mowings.

A young man, Bradley Wooten, announced his calling to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and was called to Chestnut Hill to preach in the absence of a Pastor.

Nine youth and chaperones attended the first Western Youth Conference at Mars Hill College with two out of the group making decisions for Christ. The Clerk served on that planning committee which met for 19 months.

The church and community suffered a great loss when Deacon, Alfred C. Caudle passed away after suffering a stroke. He had served as deacon almost 63 years, was very faithful and dedicated to the church, and he will be missed greatly. Many memorial contributions to the church and cemetery fund were received in loving memory of Bro. Caudle and his son-in-law, Carl Gentry, who passed away only 2 months earlier. Another member, Blenard Odell Wilson, also passed away in January, 1994.

The church received grants from United Way of America to help with operating expenses for the food pantry. Foods were obtained from the Food Bank, Winston-Salem, the Scouts food drive, and some purchased locally.

Church youth and leaders were very active by presenting the Christmas play, held youth retreats and cook-outs, made a trip to Grandfather Mountain, participated in the live nativity scene, went bowling, made and entered a float in the Christmas parade and won "Most Outstanding" trophy, had a pizza party, and picnic and puttputt golf. They honored Mothers and Fathers with gifts on their respective days, conducted fund raisers for youth camp such as a spaghetti supper, gospel singings with one youth saved. sold food at auction sales, held bake sales, and had a giant yard sale.

Tribute to Leonis Joines

No history would be complete without paying tribute to a former Associational Historian, Leonis C. Joines, from 1961 to 1972 who November 1993 at the age of 99, went home to be with the Lord.

She was first an educator, a mother and an outstanding Christian church worker, who gave of her God-given talents and abilities to the Glory of God.

Leonis Joines was an organizer, a leader and an orator.

She researched and recorded the history of the Alleghany Baptist Association from its beginning. She also researched many facets of church histories that had eluded other historians.

She preserved copies of the Associational Minutes from its beginning and with the financial help of her family had the original annuals from 1886 to 1964 bound in two volumes. She and her family presented these to the Association. At the time of her death a second set which was her personal set was donated to the Alleghany Historical Society, and is available for reference in the Alleghany Library.

A member of Liberty Baptist Church, she was faithful to the Master's teachings until her death. During her lifetime she probably sent hundreds of cards and letters of inspiration. Her contributions are far too many to mention, but God knows.

GARDNER-WEBB UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF DIVINITY

Thank you for the interest, prayer and support as we have begun the Gardner-Webb University School of Divinity. Let me report our progress to this point by answering the questions we are most often asked.

What is a School of Divinity? Is it purely academic in contrast to the professional education offered by seminaries?

Our purpose is to provide professional education for Christian ministry in a local church. We also help student ministers shape their ministry through courses such as models for ministry, Christian spirituality and religion and personality. Each student meets regularly with a mentor/teacher. We also offer courses in professional areas such as preaching, teaching, worship leadership, church administration, organizational leadership, counseling, evangelism and pastoral care. You can see that we balance classical disciplines with knowledge of practical church leadership and continued personal spiritual growth.

The name "School of Divinity" is usually used when ministerial education is offered by a university. The word "seminary" usually describes a free-standing institution.

Why offer ministerial education in a university?

As a university affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, we can provide an excellent ministerial education based on historic Baptist principles. From the beginning we can enjoy the resources of the university such as the programs for the deaf and/or blind students, and masters level studies in other areas such as psychology and business.

How many students do you have?

The School of Divinity is off to a good start. The first semester (Spring 1993) we enrolled 23 students. The fall and spring semesters of our first full year we had 51 students. Projections for enrollment for the fall indicate that we will continue to grow.

Who are your teachers?

Faculty members with long experience such as Dr. Donald E. Cook in New Testament, Dr. Roy B. Wyatt in Old Testament, and Dr. Robert Lamb in church administration form a core full-time faculty.

Dr. Albert Meiburg directs Clinical Pastoral Education. Other faculty from the university and from churches and agencies along with missionaries in residence also teach.

How are you doing financially?

The strength of the university has helped us launch the School of Divinity. We are grateful for the Theological Education Grants the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina has made available. Many churches and individuals have helped us. The Christian Service Organization is engaged in a drive to secure additional scholarships.

Where do you stand theologically?

We take the bible seriously, believing its message about sin, salvation and grace should be applied to every aspect of life. We take a traditional, inclusive Baptist approach, welcoming both men and women who answer God's call to prepare with us.

The Evangelism Division staff is thankful for the opportunity to serve the Lord through the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. It is a joy to have a part in helping share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with people across North Carolina. It is a privilege to assist our North Carolina churches and associations in evangelism.

Our staff maintains very busy schedules for speaking and training engagements in associations and churches in addition to the many evangelism training and enrichment conferences we offer across our state. During 1994 we have worked hard in helping churches prepare for the major up-coming evangelism event entitled *Here's Hope Share Jesus Now 1995*. In addition to the witness training, spiritual enrichment, promotion, prospect discovery and revival preparation, the evangelism division has been preparing a new brochure entitled "60 Ways for 60 Days". This will provide creative and innovative ways for encouraging Christians to tell lost people about Jesus. The brochure will be mailed to all of our churches in mid November.

The 48th State Evangelism Conference was held at War Memorial Auditorium in Greensboro. The State Evangelism Conference will be held at Calvary Baptist Church in Winston-Salem, February 6-7, 1995.

The summer of 1994 was packed with exciting, fun, inspirational

and evangelistic activities for youth. During our two Youth Evangelism Weeks at Fort Caswell, we had 2100 in attendance and recorded 159 professions of faith. SUPER SUMMER '94 at Carowinds theme park resulted in a record breaking attendance in excess of 31,000. Worship celebrations were held each evening with music, testimony and preaching. More than 233 professions of faith were recorded.

The Summer Student Evangelism Team (WITNESS) presented concerts during four conferences at Caswell and forty (40) additional concerts in associations and churches. They also ministered during two evangelism events at Rockingham and Charlotte Motor Speedways in the fall.

Sixteen Regional Evangelism Conferences were held across the state in October of this year. We are planning to add some new statewide conferences for lay people in 1995.

MINUTES

Friday, September 8, 1995:

The Ninety-ninth Annual Session of the Alleghany Baptist Association opened September 8, 1995 at Liberty Missionary Baptist Church at 7:15 p.m. with a musical prelude by Dorothy Brooks, pianist. At 7:30 the congregation sang "Victory in Jesus". Brother Andy Cleary of Liberty welcomed everyone and gave devotions, quoting John 3:16 scripture, followed by prayer.

Bob Richardson, moderator, called the roll of messengers and alternates; every church was well represented.

Moderator Richardson then recognized special guests, Calvin Knight and Rev. Bill Yates, special speakers; and special visitor, Jim Murphy, new director of Baptist Hospital Ministry.

Calvin Knight reported on NC Baptist Retirement Homes. He stated they began in 1951 with a single retirement home, located in Winston-Salem. They now have four homes - located in Asheville, Albemarle, Hamilton, and Winston-Salem. They offer many different levels of living and care, including "in home care".

Bob Richardson submitted the Moderator's Report. Motion by Dewey Hoppers, seconded by Andy Cleary to approve this report; approved.

The Treasurer's Report, submitted by Paul Saylor, Treasurer, was read by the moderator since Paul was not present. Motion by Dewey Hoppers, seconded by Elvira Crouse to approve; approved by unanimous vote.

The Budget for 1995-96, submitted by the Finance Committee, was also presented by the moderator. Motion by Rev. John Huffman, seconded by Andy Cleary, to approve the Budget. It was unanimously approved.

The Historian's Report, The History of Liberty Baptist Church, submitted by Dorothy Shaw, was read by Elvira Crouse. Motion by Andy Cleary, seconded by Dewey Hoppers to accept the report. It was approved.

The congregation sang the closing hymn of fellowship "Blessed Be the Tie".

Rev. Everette Shaw, pastor of Mt. Carmel, closed with the benediction.

Saturday, September 9, 1995:

The Saturday morning session began at 8:50 with a musical prelude by Dorothy Brooks, pianist.

At 9:00 Rev. Dana Hines, pastor of Laurel Springs, opened with devotions from Psalms 33. The congregation then sang "How Great Thou Art".

Moderator Richardson welcomed everyone.

The W.M.U. Report was submitted by Assistant Director, Elvira Crouse. Rev. Dana Hines made a motion to accept her report; it was unanimously approved.

Cora Neville gave the Vacation Bible School Report and Special Ministries Report. She discussed a class for the mentally retarded; however, none are able to attend at the present time. She expressed the need to do more with them spiritually. A motion was made by Elvira Crouse to accept these reports; they were approved.

Moderator Richardson thanked Stuart Taylor for video taping the meetings; he also thanked Myrtle Taylor for the beautiful flowers displayed in front of the pulpit. He announced regrets that the special singers, the Hayes family from Mt. Airy, could not be there. The congregation sang one verse of "At the Cross".

Elvira Crouse read the Mission Action Report by Edith Cooper. Motion by Andy Cleary to approve her report; approved.

The moderator shared Thank You cards from two children's homes, Cutter Cottage in Thomasville, and Mills Home.

The congregation sang one verse of "In the Garden".

Rosalina Rojas, special guest and pastor of a Spanish church in Dobson, informed the congregation about the Spanish ministry. There are now two missions in Dobson and a temporary mission in Elkin. Approximately 18 attend in Elkin, 25 in Dobson. This year was the first Bible School, with eight children attending.

Joe David Fore, Area Missionary, reported on Campus Ministry and offered his help to our association.

The Finance Committee Report was read by Moderator Richardson. Motion by Clarence Mabe to accept the report. It was unanimously accepted.

The Policy was introduced for discussion. There were no questions. Motion by Rev. Russell Mabe, seconded by Ruth Minnich to adopt the Policy. The vote was unanimous to adopt (copy may be obtained in Association Office).

The Nominating Committee Report was submitted by Gary Scott, chairman. It was mentioned that Barbara Richardson would fill the office of Treasurer until Mrs. Judy Sands is available. Baptist Men and Brotherhood Director positions need to be filled — Cora mentioned that Mr. Sands might be interested. Amanda Miller suggested appointing an assistant chorister for next year. Motion by Irene Wagner to approve this report and election of officers; approved.

Regrets and well wishes were expressed for Brother Fred Lundsford, Church Multiplier, who could not attend due to suffering a heart attack.

The Memorial Service was rendered by Karen Sealey. Those deceased members honored and remembered were: Mr. John Church, Bellview; Mrs. Patricia Holcomb, Mt. Carmel; Mr. Delwyn Orr, Pine Fork; Mrs. Raline elledge and Mr. Ray Parlier, Osborne Memorial; Mrs. Bonnie Goodman, Mr. Porter Fender, and Mrs. Verna Miles, First Baptist Church.

The congregation sang "The Old Rugged Cross".

Rev. Ralph Smith, pastor of Liberty, delivered a moving sermon from the scripture, Isaiah 40.

At the request of Elvira Crouse, the congregation sang two more hymns.

Rev. Russell Mabe, pastor of Osborne Memorial, delivered the benediction and blessing for the noon meal.

This concluded the Ninety-ninth Annual Session of the Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association.

MODERATOR'S REPORT

Praise the Lord for another year of service in Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association. Our association of churches has been busy and successful as you will read and hear in our reports. We have had many souls saved in our revivals and in our drama "I Dreamed I Searched Heaven for You". In a spirit of worship and praise, we reflect on what God has done in our midst through those who have been in His service and obedient to His will. I am privileged to have served as moderator another year; I wish to thank the members of the Executive Board and Committee for their support, love, prayers and spirit of cooperation. HISTORY OF THE LIBERTY BAPTIST CHURCH

Only three other Baptist churches existed in Alleghany County, and seeing the great need of a Missionary Baptist Church in the Whitehead community, some of the good men and women met in New Salem on August 29, 1886, for the purpose of organizing Liberty Baptist Church.

Elder T. M. Honeycutt, whose portrait hangs in the church vestibule, was chosen moderator and Elder W. M. Hall secretary. A list of thirteen persons applying for membership was enrolled. At this organizational meeting the Articles of Faith and Church Covenant

were adopted. Then they proceeded to elect Elder Honeycutt pastor and Ross McHargue as church clerk.

It is evident that the church was ready for business; because on the second meeting delegates were elected to the convention, and at the third meeting the committee on church location reported that half an acre of land had been secured from Meridith Richardson and wife "on the Little River on the east side of the road from W. L. Hoppers store at Air Bellows Gap for five dollars with two dollars off the price." Soon a one-room frame building was constructed and furnished with handmade pulpit, pews, and table. In 1899 an organ was presented to the church by Professor Charles E. Taylor of Wake Forest College.

The same year that Liberty was constituted it was one of the three churches in the county that participated in organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association, with the Pastor as instigator. In 1890 a delegate was sent to the Convention and a monetary gift was sent to the State Board.

For more than a century Whitehead has been a religious center for the people of the area. The first church established in the community was in 1834. It was evangelistic and grew rapidly until the latter part of the nineteenth century when it became anti-missionary. Many of the members withdrew and some became the first members of Liberty. These progressive members favored a more friendly interest in missions, benevolent institutions, secular and religious education that were promoted by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Baptists believe in training, so a Sunday School was organized, supposedly by Joseph F. Cheek, in the early history of the church. This has been maintained through the years, as evidenced by those such as Mr. J. K. Blum, who was a dedicated teacher for many years. The Training Union was organized by Kemp M. Estep and was possibly the first in the association. The Woman's Missionary Society had its beginning in 1924 with Mrs. N. C. Teague, organizer, and Mrs. J. T. Fender the first president. Liberty was among the first to have a Vacation Bible School.

Before the state supported High Schools, the Alleghany Association, with adjoining ones fostered Oak Hill Academy and Mt. View Institute. These were supported by the church with both gifts and students. The early Christian training had a lasting influence, for many have become preachers, teachers, deacons, and church leaders.

The first minister ordained was Franklin B. Cheek in 1890. Later the same year David M. Stamper was "liberated to exercise his gift in public."

The church enjoyed a steady growth until 1909 when the building became inadequate. An additional acre of land was purchased to enlarge the church grounds. The building committee elected was Feilden W. Cheek, T. C. Shepherd, Arthur Fender, and Mack D. Wagoner. The contract for the present building was given to Fielden Caudill. The design is the symbolic church with gothic shaped windows, tall spire over the belfry that supports a huge, sweet toned church bell, supposedly a gift from Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Fender. Additional pews were made from choice chestnut and broad oak boards grown in the virgin forest. A modern pulpit replaced the outmoded one and about 1924 a piano was purchased. The pulpit and communion chairs were presented years later as a memorial to Mrs. Fielden W. Cheek by her son, Foster F. Cheek.

Many crystal springs is the source of Little River that has been used for baptizing, as was the Jordan in Christ's time.

A wise investment was made in 1905 when Whitehead parsonage and 40 acres of land was purchased for a pastor's home, by Laurel Springs, Liberty, New Hope, Pine Fork, and Sparta churches. The old dwelling was soon replaced with a two-story frame house. As

planned by the Association, for rural churches to provide a home for their pastor. Liberty constructed a new home in 1947, and from time to time added improvements.

In years gone by pastors served a number of churches traveling on horseback. To alleviate these hardships the association purchased a car for the pastor, and Liberty participated.

Another acre of land was purchased in 1910 by William Bryan Cheek for a church cemetery. More land was bought to enlarge the cemetery in 1956. A three thousand dollar trust fund was set up in 1945 for the purpose of changing the cemetery to a separate, perpetual care cemetery. The first grave was that of Mrs. William Bryan Cheek in 1911.

Some former pastors have maintained an interest in the home church and have been most generous in its support. Among the gifts have been: a communion service, carpet, song books, offering plates, hard surfacing drive, lawn improvement, and brick church sign. The church was also remembered with sizeable sums of money in the wills of J. T. Fender and Mrs. Edna Johnson.

In 1969 the church, through money borrowed from the Baptist State Convention, had the church lifted from its foundation and moved aside so that a basement with Sunday School rooms, a kitchen, and bathrooms could be built, and a furnace installed. The clerk felt so strongly opposed to the church being mortgaged that she resigned rather than sign the necessary documents. The continued to give strong support, and was re-elected within a short period. The services were held in Whitehead Community Building during the time of construction.

Used pews and pulpit furniture were purchased from a church in Orange County after the work was finished on the church. The electronic organ, given in memory of Randy Cleary, was first used on April 18, 1971.

About 1965, the church had no resident deacons and the pastor invited deacons from another church to assist in the observance of the Lord's Supper.

Ross Wagner represented the Association on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention from 1981 to 1984, as possibly its youngest member, being twenty-one years of age when his term began. Ross grew up in Liberty Baptist Church, finished college, then joined the Mission Service Corps, and has served with Baptist Student Union at the University of Minnesota in Duluth. He has received monthly contributions to help with his support.

Other improvements of the church have been the installation of storm windows, the building of an enclosed pavilion and handicapped entrance, refinished floors, new paint and carpet, and replaced two small furnaces with one large unit.

Easter sunrise services have been held continuously since 1971. Thomas Neville was ordained to the ministry on September 7, 1980.

Mrs. Marie Caudill Holbrook served 30 years as church treasurer. Mr. J. K. Blum served as Association Moderator in 1934 and 1935, and from 1967 through 1970.

Mrs. Leonis C. Joines, member of Liberty Baptist Church and former Associational Historian (1961 - 1972) expired in November, 1993, at the age of ninety-nine. She was an organizer, educator, mother, leader, and orator. She researched and recorded the history of the Alleghany Baptist Association from its beginning, and preserved original Associational annuals (1886 - 1964), which with the financial help from her family, had them bound in two volumes, and presented them to the Association. At her death a second set (her personal set) was donated to the Alleghany Historical Society, and is available for reference in the Alleghany Library. She was an outstanding Christian worker, who gave of her God-given talents and abilities to the Glory of God. Leonis served as church clerk for twenty-three years.

Liberty Baptist Church had its Centennial celebration in 1986 with former pastors on the program.

The church participated in the World Missions conference in 1994, and conducts Vacation Bible School annually.

Mrs. Cora T. Neville serves as Director of Missions for the Alleghany Baptist Association, and a volunteer social worker. She opened a clothing closet to help the needy of Alleghany County and beyond, working out of her home. Later she operated out of many inadequate buildings, and helped to obtain grants of \$73,000.00 for the Alleghany Cares project, where she served as Executive Director, after incorporation on May 12, 1992. The Levi Shores' Building was obtained on August 1, 1992, and many people were served daily. Cora had a dream of a nice warm building, with space to organize, and meet the needs of her clients, and where her volunteer help could work in safety. In September, 1994, Cora faced one of the greatest disappointments of her life, and chose to resign when she learned that the board wanted to start selling some of the clothing that had been given to help the needy. She did not want to have part in a thrift

store, so Cora worked day and night, loving and caring for those whom she served. Alleghany Cares opened in the new building on October 1, 1994, and on November 22, 1994, Cora moved into a small building on Route 21 South and opened to the public in December, 1994, under the new name of John 3:16. She has helped 2902 people (some more than one time) from November 22, 1994 through August 16, 1995. Cora is a kind and giving person with a sympathetic ear and a loving heart, and the immeasurable value of her work will live on in the hearts of those whom she serves.

Pardue, Richard Spera and Ralph Smith (from 1973 to the present).

Nina Crouse WMU of Sparta first organized and installed the officers of a new WMU in March. We support our GA's, Mission Friends and Youth on Missions. We observe Glen Haven Rest Home birthdays with a gift and a visit, conduct a sing-a-long at High Country Nursing Home each Saturday. One member has 300 volunteer hours at the nursing home, some are volunteers at the clothes closet. We provide reading material each month for inmates at the jail, we also place reading materials in the hospital waiting room, laundry mats, ambulance building and other places where people are waiting for services. We sent a box of medical supplies to the Ukraine, a care package to Ron and Janet Key, our missionaries in Gambia, West Africa. We have an adopted child for whom we buy clothes and school supplies. Send birthday cards to the Missionaries' kids going to school in the states. We sent baskets of fruit and health care items to the children's home. We have prayer partners. The women are very mission minded and support the Baptist State Convention, Lottie Moon Christmas offering and World Hunger. Christmas parties were given at each nursing home and lap robes were made for several wheel chair residents of High Country Nursing Home.

We were told at a WMU meeting to celebrate everything we did, we just thank God for each accomplishment and ask him to keep us busy, when there is so much to be done there is no time for celebrating. As we enter into the MOSIAC age of WMU we truly want to be "WOMEN ON MISSIONS".

The Goodman-Mitchell Circle of First Baptist is in its infancy as it was organized in March '95. They attended the Regional Training in Elkin and got some insight as to what the work was all about. They immediately began adding to their membership. They have a card ministry that reaches many unchurched people. They began a prayer chain. They put together 25 personal care kits for the jail inmates including religious tracts. Their president Patty Stacy spent one month this summer in Gambia, West Africa working in a dental clinic. She and her husband not only worked at the dental clinic, their being there allowed the Ron Key family to come home to the states. We have seen growth in this group far beyond our expectations.

The Baptist Young Women of Sparta First are active in a different way from the other two groups. These members are the leaders of the

GA's, Mission Friends and the Youth groups. They help the youth groups sponsor a supper to raise money for camp. They sponsor the fund raiser for world hunger. They light the tree for Lottie Moon Christmas offering. They enlist the brotherhood group in repairing used toys for the Christmas boxes. This group is few in number, but their outreach is extensive.

Pine Fork WMU is a very active part of the church. As our church has been busy remodeling and redecorating, WMU women have played a very active part in these activities. Much emphasis has been put on making our Sunday School room more attractive. Focus has been on adding members to our Sunday School. Outreach in our community has been an important phase of our work. The shut-ins and the elderly as well as sick and bereaved. Food and other means of ministering have been our main focus. We sponsor an underprivileged child, four members attended the Regional Training workshop, also the Associational WMU meeting.

With our building project behind us, we hope our outreach and ministry will be much greater in the coming year.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. 1995 ANNUAL REPORT

The messengers present at the Baptist State Convention meeting 75 years ago, when the establishment of the Baptist Foundation was approved, believed that the services to be provided by the Foundation could benefit both the individuals who would use its services as well as Christian purposes for which the Convention had organized many years earlier.

With a well trained and dedicated staff, the Baptist Foundation is now in position to assist any Baptist church member who has a desire to preserve their estate for their families and provide greater financial service to their church, association, missions, Baptist institutions or the Convention in its program of work.

Those who have become involved with the Foundation thus far, many of whom no longer are alive today are providing critically needed resources for either their family members and/or the Christian causes they dearly love. In many instances their use of a trust or endowment fund has helped reduce income and/or estate taxes and increased the value of assets they left for their families at their death. In addition, they continue to provide for sharing the Gospel with the income from endowment funds they created while they were living.

Many North Carolina Baptists are today enjoying the benefit of increased retirement income through the creation of an annuity trust with the transfer of property or other assets which the Foundation sold and invested under guidance of professional managers. When these trusts were created, the individuals were provided tax benefits which enhanced their estates. In most cases, the income they now receive is greater than that received prior to starting the trust. At some future date of their choosing, the assets in trust will serve the Lord in ways chosen by the donors.

During the past year, an area manager was employed to serve the western portion of the state. A twelve-minute video, "Pillars of the Church", was prepared which shares through personal example how the Foundation can serve every church member. A copy of this video is available by request in writing to 201 Convention Drive, Cary, North Carolina 27511. Personal and confidential assistance is available by calling our office at 919-380-7334 or written request directed to the above address.

The total assets under management by the Foundation at the end of 1994 were \$47,312,575. A total of \$1,241,756 was paid to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes during 1994. The amount paid to individuals from trusts, which will eventually pay to Baptist causes, was \$1,499,098 during the year. During the first six months of 1995, the total performance of the charitable endowment funds under management was 15.3% (annualized).

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

Annual Report to the Associations - 1995

This year has been a significant one for the Christian Action League of N. C. as we gave leadership and support to local communities in their battle against the proliferation of alcohol, provided a voice for Christian morals and ethics in the halls of the legislature and continued our battle against on-going legislation concerning the lottery and other anti-family issues.

1. Legislative Issues:

A. Alcohol

The alcohol industry sought to implement state-wide Liquor-By-the-Drink and beer-wine sales through legislative action. House Bill 599 would have implemented LBD without a vote of the people. The Christian Action League prompted churches to action and strong opposition developed from across the state, the bill was withdrawn and died in committee

B. Lottery

In the 1995 Session of the General Assembly, there were four lottery bills introduced. Several times in the past decade, gambling forces were able to secure the passage of a lottery measure in the Senate, but not in 1995. Lottery legislation was defeated in the Senate by a 28-20 vote. In the House, HB 838 (Lottery for School Buildings) was brought out of committee by an unusual parliamentary move and placed on the House calendar. Calls and Prayers from CAL members and the Christian community were honored when the measure was sent back to committee where it remained until the end of session.

We praise the Lord for this victory and for the fact that N. C. remains the largest state in the nation that has no state-sponsored lottery. However, we request your prayers as the Christian Action League will continue to be on the front-line fighting this battle again in 1996.

C. Abortion

The Christian Action League and other Christian organizations have continuously lobbied for abolition of the state abortion fund. House Bill 229 has passed and will **cut** the **abortion funding** from \$1.2 million to \$50,000 and then to be used only in cases of rape or incest.

For many years we have been working for legislation requiring **Parental Consent** before a minor can obtain an abortion. House Bill 481 was adopted this year providing this "common sense" legislation.

D. Abstinence Education

Another proposal that the Christian Action League has been working on became law this year. House Bill 834 (Teaching Abstinence Until Marriage) is pro-family and supports biblical and moral values. This bill required schools to offer a program encouraging abstinence until marriage and also provides for parental review of teaching materials before comprehensive sex education instruction can be implemented.

2. League Leadership:

Reverend Johnny R. Henderson became the League's Executive Director in July upon the retirement of Coy C. Privette. Johnny brings a wealth of experience to this position. A trustee since 1977, he is the North Carolina Baptist Men's Correctional Ministries Coordi-

nator and serves on the Executive Committee of Prison Fellowship of North Carolina. Also, his church was featured on ABC News last year for its outstanding prison ministry.

We are grateful to God for the prayer and financial support that the League receives from the churches of your association. May others join you as we seek to be the "Salt and Light" in a world hostile to Biblical ethics and morality.

People are reading less than any time in recent history. It is true of secular publications, it is true of wholesome books from respected libraries, it is true of religious publications. We live in an electronic age where many think they know the answers to the issues only to discover they do not. It is impossible to know in depth what is happening when we depend on "60-second sound bites" of news on television or radio.

An informed Baptist is a better Baptist; an uninformed Baptist may be an uninvolved or disruptive Baptist. No democracy, including our local churches, can survive long without an informed, involved constituency which makes decisions based upon accurate information from reliable sources.

The <u>Biblical Recorder</u> should be in every Baptist home in North Carolina. Your support as a subscriber and reader, coupled with your encouragement to others, will enable the paper to better serve the constituency with accurate and helpful information.

In order to save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the Recorder, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. This system lets any congregation have their church news incorporated into the Biblical Recorder which saves staff time, postage and printing costs. Usually, for less than what it costs to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication package to each family in the congregation. Recent and anticipated increases in mailing costs makes CNS a greater value in 1995-96 than when it was started in 1990.

The paper focuses more and more attention on North Carolina Baptists with news, features and inspirational articles which will encourage individuals and churches in their witness and ministry. One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues and be adequately informed. With all the stress and disturbance in the world, "The North Carolina Baptist Way" has become even more important to us than ever before.

1995 Report: BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA

Michael C. Blackwell, President H. Lee Davis, Jr., Chairman of Trustees

For six-year-old Malinda, darkness brought sleepless nights listening to her mother's boyfriend beat her brother and sister — and praying she wouldn't be next, watching her mom choose her lover's whims over her children's needs, and finally, being abandoned on Christmas Eve in pouring rain on a dirt road.

Her darkness, more than just a light switch clicked off, swirled with pain, fear, confusion and despair.

Today, a bright-eyed teenager living at Broyhill Home, one of four Baptist Children's Homes residential campuses, Malinda finally sees light. After becoming a Christian in 1992, she can forgive her mom and let go of her painful past. "Learning to deal with my issues is a lot easier since I became a Christian," said Malinda. "I'm happy here at Broyhill. The people believe in me, support me and are here for me."

Believing in children and families, offering light to pierce their darkness has been Baptist Children's Homes' goal since its beginning 110 years ago.

Serving 1,513 children and families in 1993-94 in 12 facilities across the state, BCH provides intentionalized programs of residential group care, emergency care, therapeutic camping, maternity care, teenage mother/babies, model day care and behavioral change for girls. Gaston County emergency care cottages in Dallas, operated on a yearly contract basis, were not renewed with BCH following Gaston County's decision to change the facilities' direction to a level of service BCH doesn't provide.

Commemorating 110 years of ministry, BCH published *Intent to Serve*, a history depicting the last decade of BCH's child-centered, family-focused services. Each church was to receive a complimentary copy in the Fall of 1995.

Founded in 1970, the Baptist Maternity Home in Asheville celebrated in October 25 years serving over 900 young, unmarried, pregnant women who were given a quiet, supportive atmosphere to make decisions about their future.

A chapter of BCH life closed with the death of alumni, employee and friend Bill Sisk. Investing 52 years of himself, Sisk, who came to Mills Home at age 8 and returned to work on staff 42 years, died May 21, 1995. "An era has passed," said BCH President Michael C. Blackwell. "It's extremely unlikely Baptist Children's Homes will ever see another individual who invests himself so fully in this place as did my friend bill Sisk."

Adding to the light, Baptist churches, through the Cooperative Program, designated gifts and the Thanksgiving Offering funded about one-fourth of BCH's \$12 million budget with gifts totaling \$2,934,304.

Trustee Jim Goldston held his sixth annual Goldston's Carnival for Children raising \$28,633 and providing two fun-packed days of rides, games, entertainment and food for children and area residents. "There is nothing more important in this life than children," said

Goldston. "This is just one thing we can do to show our commitment, to put our feet to our prayers."

Putting words into action described numerous individuals who gave time and effort with special campus work projects.

This year, the Friends of Children committee added a twist to their annual spring bus tour by pulling on gloves and work clothes to help beautify Odum Home in Pembroke and Cameron Boys Camp near Southern Pines.

A team of volunteers from Denver Baptist Church worked at Broyhill Home clearing brush, painting inside a cottage and building a storage shed; and at Kennedy Home tearing down an old gym built in the 1930's, restructing an old picnic shelter into an arts and crafts center, removing old heating equipment from Biggs cottage and renovating family conference rooms in the new gym.

"We pray about these kids, and we pray that we will be an example," said Allen Holmes, Denver Baptist's mission trip coordinator. "This is more important than any building or construction work."

Trustees, intent on strengthening BCH's leadership position and continuing its tradition of giving light to families and children, approved a \$10.1 million campaign, "Light Their Way," to raise money for special projects, operational needs and endowment. The campaign will run September 1995 - May 1997.

Many children, like Malinda, suffer in darkness. Many families linger in pain waiting for answers, waiting for help. Because of Baptists' support, BCH is able to "Light Their Way," offering hope, security and love.

MAKING LIFE FOR OLDER ADULTS ... THE BEST OF TIMES

As a result of the wonderful support given by North Carolina Baptists, 1995 will be remembered as one of the finest years in the forty-four year history of the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. The following are some highlights from the year:

In recogniting of its commitment to the spiritual well-being of the residents that it serves, Baptist Retirement Homes hired Luther Osment of Sylva, North Carolina as its first full-time Chaplain. Reverend Osment's work responsibilities include ministry to the residents of the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem and the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville.

Reaffirming its commitment to the idea that retirement should be a "step up" for Older Adults, the final phase of the renovation of The Taylor House Facility in Albemarle was completed in the Fall of 1995.

The renovation of The Hamilton Baptist Home in Martin County was also begun in 1995 and hopefully will be completed by year end. When the renovation of The Hamilton Baptist Home is completed, all of the facilities operated by the Baptist Retirement Homes will be "state-of-the art."

In recognition of the changing profile of institutionalized Older Adults (47% of the "oldest old" in North Carolina suffer from some form of dementia), the Young Solarium addition was completed in the Fall of 1995. The Young Solarium will house a new small-group program designed to enhance the quality of life experienced by institutionalized Older Adults suffering from dementia.

In an effort to provide Older Adults with affordable care, a sub-acute unit was developed at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem . . . a unit where frail Older Adults can receive IV therapy, infusion, wound care, and stroke and bone fracture rehabilitation outside of a hospital setting.

In response to the need to provide quality long-term care services to the ever growing number of frail Baptist Older Adults who may not need institutionalized care, the Baptist Retirement Homes developed a new home and community based service program, In Home Care, Inc. . . . the new service designed primarily to extend the amount of time that frail Baptist Older Adults can remain in the home environment.

Thank you North Carolina Baptists for helping us make life for Older Adults . . . The Best of Times.

The Christian Life Commission's assignment from the Southern Baptist Convention is one of Christian moral development by emphasizing the application of the principles of the Christian faith in personal and public life. Effort is made to provide Christian ethics services to other Southern Baptist agencies, state conventions, associations, churches and individuals to enable Southern Baptists to deal with the serious moral challenges of our time. The Commission encourages the formation of Christian Life Committees at all levels of Southern Baptist life beginning with the local church.

Through its Washington, D. C. office, open since 1987, the Commission has a moral leadership role in the nation's capital. The staff in Washington includes the Director of Government Relations, the Director of Media and News Information-Baptist Press Reporter and the General Counsel-Director of Christian Citizenship and Religious Liberty Concerns. The Washington staff has sought to fulfill the program statement assigned to the Commission to "bring to bear Baptist statements, convictions and insights in Christian ethics and religious liberty upon important policy making groups"; and to "present Southern Baptist insight for consideration in the planning of federal government programs on children and youth, aging, housing, employment, public health and other matters pertaining to social welfare."

During the past year, the Washington and Nashville staffs have worked diligently to share with Congress and the White House convictions and concerns of Southern Baptists. The staff has corresponded and met with members of both the legislative and executive branches of the federal government on areas of Southern Baptist concern. Salt, a newsletter, is published six times a year to keep Southern Baptists informed on public policy and issues in the administrative, judicial and legislative branches of government. Abortion, drug abuse and pornography are among the isues in which the staff has been involved in the past year. The continuing concern about serious threats to religious liberty posed by recent Supreme Court decisions has been the basis for the Commission to address both legislature and judicial concerns. The Commission continued filing amicus curiae, "friend of the court," briefs in cases involving areas within its program state-

ment. The Commission continued to call Southern Baptists to a greater understanding of the truth that our faith calls us to informed participation in our nation's political process.

The 1995 annual national seminar, entitled "The War of the Worlds: The Struggle for America's Soul," was held at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Wake Forest, North Carolina, February 27-March 1, 1995. The seminar program combined interpretive biblical themes with addresses on subjects such as "What are World Views and Why They are Important?" "The Issue is Truth," "The Struggle for the Right to Be Involved," "The Struggle for the Inner City," "The Struggle for the Media" and "The Battle for Human Life." The seminar also included a discussion of the public policy aspects of critical issues impacting the world.

The Commission has been extremely active in the area of the sanctity of human life by publishing a wide range of materials to assist Southern Baptists in celebrating Sanctity of Human Life Sunday in January. The video, entitled "The Sanctity of Human Life," continues to be received enthusiastically by Southern Baptists. The Commission hosted a consultation on violence at abortion clinics in September 1994, which results in the publication, "Why Killing Abortion Doctors is Wrong: The Nashville Statement of Conscience," which has generated considerable interest among Southern Baptists as well as news media.

Commission staff also served as resource persons in events held in numerous state conventions as well as for other Southern Baptist agencies and entities. The Commission produced a video on race relations and continues to assist Southern Baptists in the observance of Race Relations Sunday. The Commission also continued its assignment from the Convention for education and action on the hunger issue. The film, "What Shall We Do in a Hungry World?", continued to be used significantly to heighten Southern Baptists' awareness on this issue.

The Commission produced a gambling video, entitled "Gambling: The Hidden Realities," which has been widely distributed by state convention offices to associations in several states. The staff has been very active in providing information to state conventions, associations and local churches on the gambling issue. A new video was produced, entitled "Bites Like a Snake: Students Speak on Alcohol and Drugs," that seeks to help churches warn young people about the dangers of alcohol and tobacco.

The circulation of Light, the bimonthly moral concerns journal of the Commission, and Salt, the bimonthly newsletter produced in the

Washington, D. C. office, continues to experience rapid growth. Circulation is currently around 91,150 for each.

The Commission plans to undertake numerous initiatives during the years ahead. These include: expanding the Nashville and Washington, D. C. staffs to increase its ability to fulfill its program statement; sponsoring seminars on the challenging moral and social issues of our time; implementing every means possible to inform, challenge and energize Southern Baptists to become involved with the vast array of moral and social issues confronting our society; and updating, revising and expanding literature and audio/video material available to Southern Baptists on moral and social issues.

In reviewing its program activities for the past year, the Commission remains encouraged and faces the future with faith and hope in furthering the cause of applied Christianity among Southern Baptists. The trustees and staff solicit the prayers of Southern Baptists as it seeks to discern the Lord's will and work in serving Southern Baptists.

The Commission is committed to a complete Gospel for the complete person. It rejects any inherent conflict between the social and salvation aspects of the Gospel. It was never intended that there should be a dichotomy between the two. The Commission believes it is wrong to seek to feed the hungry and not tell them about the bread of life. It is shameful to seek to clothe the naked and not tell them about the whole armor of God. It is a disgrace to seek to house the homeless and not tell them that in our Father's house are many mansions. It is also less than complete obedience or full discipleship to proclaim salvation and not also seek to minister to people's earthly needs.

1994-95 REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMISSION TO THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Education Commission serves Southern Baptists by promoting educational activities and institutions as sources of leadership to help the churches accomplish their missions and goals. This leadership comes not only from the students and graduates, but from the faculties and staff members of the schools.

During the past year, the Commission has sponsored an emphasis, "Educating for Life." The primary concern in this project has been to focus on ways the educational institutions of Southern Baptists help

students in spiritual formation. From chapel services to prayer groups, from local church involvement to overseas missions opportunities, campuses throughout the Convention take seriously this dimension of their task.

The Commission provides specific services to educational institutions, those individuals who serve on the faculties and staffs of these institutions, state convention agencies or persons in positions within the state conventions or structured groups related to educational enterprises, as well as to local Southern Baptist churches and their members. This program provides information, training, and consultation to those who would reinforce educational activities as witnessing activities.

Education has long been recognized as a part of the mission of Southern Baptists to help individuals to grow once they are saved.

If young people are to be effective soul winners or make any lasting impact on their society, they need the tools and skills available in the curricular and extracurricular programs of our educational institutions.

Support — The 69 Southern Baptist-related institutions at all educational levels received funds in the amount of \$94,109,487 from the 18 sponsoring state conventions/fellowships and the Southern Baptist Convention. Of this amount, \$501,400 was given as an addition to institutional endowment funds and \$35,000 for church-related vocation scholarships. Other donations, gifts, and grants for current operations of the institutions totaled \$81,879,362. Endowment funds of all institutions totaled \$1,495,398,757; property values were listed as \$1,433,764,076, making assets for all the institutions total \$2,929,162,833.

Church Vocation Volunteers — Church vocation volunteer students enrolled in the colleges and schools sponsored by the various Baptist state conventions and in the six theological seminaries sponsored by the Southern Baptist Convention totaled 21,422 for 1994-95.

Program Report — For the past seven years the Foreign Mission Board has been assisting a group of forty-three Baptist colleges and universities organized to develop educational exchange programs abroad. Cooperative Services International Education Consortium (CSIEC) currently is involved in about 300 projects with educational institutions in 80 countries, particularly in China, the former Soviet republics and other countries known as "World A" among Baptist missiologists. In September of 1994 these efforts gained strength as the Education Commission, Foreign Mission Board and CSIEC signed a joint agreement that will provide for a director and clerical staff persons. These new staff persons will have offices at the Education Commission in Nashville, Tennessee. It is anticipated that the projects which already number in the hundreds will increase significantly. God will surely bless the stewardship of the dozens of faculty members and hundreds of students who will study, teach and live in places where the Gospel can only be shared by lifestyle evangelism because normal missionary efforts are forbidden.

This is one more way the Education Commission serves the Baptist-related colleges and schools as they help Southern Baptists achieve their goal of taking the Gospel to all the world.

During the year, workshops in legal concerns, alumni affairs, admissions, religious activities, public relations, and development were

sponsored by the Commission to assist institutional staff members in their assigned responsibilities.

The Placement Registry conducted by the Education Commission continues to assist Baptist institutions in identifying prospective faculty members. In the past academic year, 408 prospective faculty members have been listed in the Placement Registry. It has been the purpose of the Commission to expand this service to all Baptist institutions.

The annual Baptist Seminary, College and School Day is observed on the Convention calendar on the third Sunday in February. The emphasis day for the past year was conducted on February 19, 1995. Materials related to the observance of the emphasis day were developed and distributed to all churches and convention entities involved in the emphasis.

Regular publications of the Education Commission include *The Southern Baptist Educator*, published monthly except July and December, and *Guide to Southern Baptist-Related Colleges and Schools*, produced every two years. In addition to these regular publications, several brochures on related educational subjects are produced.

In January, 1993, the Commission published *Southern Baptist Trusteeship* by Arthur L. Walker, Jr. This volume of 106 pages discusses the distinctive role, opportunity, and responsibilities of Southern Baptist trustees elected both by the various state Baptist conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention. A major point stressed by the author is the similarity of the responsibility of the institutional board of trustees to the biblical steward as depicted in the Old and New Testament.

The new book on trusteeship has been marketed through emphases in the annual Baptist Seminary, College and School Day materials, presentations in The Southern Baptist Educator, and workshops and addresses for institutional trustees.

Matters Referred by the Convention — The motion adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Orlando, Florida, June 14-16, 1994 was studied by the Education Commission at its annual meeting, June 26-27, 1994. The following report is made to the Southern Baptist Convention.

In response to the motion by Mike Mitchell (TN) and amended by Craig Kendall (CO) that the Southern Baptist Convention direct its agencies and institutions to maintain fidelity to the Convention, to avoid compromising the integrity of the Cooperative Program, and to decline to receive funds channeled through the Cooperative Baptist

Fellowship, the Education Commission voted to comply with the directive of the Convention.

MEETING THE CHALLENGES OF HEALTH CARE 1995 REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

"Touching Lives With Hope"

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

"THE BAPTIST" — Affectionately known to many simply as "The Baptist", our hospital now employs 5,544 members who comprise our healing team. We are joined with Bowman Gray School of Medicine and thus The Medical Center has over 9,000 employees making us the largest employer in Forsyth County. In fiscal year 1994-95, our 806-bed facilityprovided care for 23,712 inpatient admissions. Our rapidly growing Outpatient Department provided care for 557,511 patient visitors.

A NEW DIVISION PASTORAL CARE AND CHURCH RELATIONS — In May restructuring created a new division with the consolidation of the departments of Pastoral Care and Church/Community Relations. This division consists of four ministry components which are listed below with a brief ministry synopsis:

DEPARTMENT OF CHAPLAINCY AND PASTORAL EDU-CATION — Through spiritual and emotional healing to patients, families and staff, approximately 55,000 ministries were provided by our chaplains.

THE CENTER FOR CONGREGATIONAL HEALTH — This rapidly expanding ministry to churches, pastors and staff, and congregational leaders also enables the training of intentional interim pastors. Also, training is provided for leadership and church consultants. Workshops and other events are held as well.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH AND DENOMINATIONAL RELATIONS — This department serves as the liaison between Baptist Hospital and the churches, associations, and convention, as well as other church groups. By facilitating appointments, policy

interpretation, understanding of our health care services, this function helps keep our vital bond with North Carolina Baptists strong. Mission dollars for benevolent care through this department in excess of \$452,000 were given by Baptists to the Mother's Day Offering. This mission effort helps relieve the financial burdens of patients who have little or no healthcare insurance. This is truly a ministry of renewing hope in their lives and is a source of great joy for us.

PASTORAL COUNSELING — With increasing requests from churches and associations across the state, this ministry continues to expand. Our thirteen strategically located counseling centers provided 27,000 ministry hours last year.

The most recent North Carolina Database Commission report comparing the average of charges at other instate academic medical centers for our most frequent diagnoses reveals our charges are 21% lower. For all hospitals statewide we are 7.7% lower on those same charges, despite treating the mast critically ill patients from across the state.

- QualChoice OF NORTH CAROLINA A managed care plan providing quality healthcare and patient physician choice. Established by The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated and Bowman Gray School of Medicine and Wake Forest University, QualChoice is now expanding to employers in our region.
- ACCREDITATION WITH COMMENDATION This distinction was awarded us by the Joint Commission of Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. With a grade of 96 we earned the distinction as one of America's most highly rated hospitals.
- EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT/DIETARY BUILDING With a
 Fall 1995 opening date this 300,000 square foot facility will expand
 our Emergency Department capacity to 70,000 visitors annually.
 It will also house a 35-bed Day Hospital, as well as a 900-seat
 cafeteria, and will double the proportion of private beds available to
 patients.
- COMPREHENSIVE OUTPATIENT REHABILITATION FA-CILITY — A 64,000 square foot facility scheduled for completion in the Summer of 1996.
- STICHT CENTER ON AGING AND REHABILITATION —
 Housing a geriatric research and education center, geriatric day
 hospital and inpatient acute rehab beds, gero-psychiatry, and
 adult acute psychiatry, a planned completion and opening date for
 this center is the Spring of 1996.
- HOME HEALTH SOLUTIONS AND HOME HEALTH SPECIALISTS Specialists provide at home care such as intravenous chemotherapy, pain management, nursing care, and physical and occupational therapy.
- COMMUNITY HOSPITAL ASSISTANCE Baptist Hospital continues to develop relationships with hospitals and physicians in other communities inviting them to join our expanding healthcare delivery system.

A CLOSING WORD

Historical methods of delivering healthcare are changing in significant ways. We are constantly seeking to position ourselves to develop the methodologies, services, and delivery systems to meet these challenges. In the midst of the multiplicity of changes remain several treasured, time tested constants.
