ALLEGHANY MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION THE ONE HUNDREDTH ANNUAL SESSION

September 13, 1996

Minutes

The One Hundredth Annual Session of the Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association was held at Bellview Missionary Baptist Church in Laurel Springs on September 13 and 14, 1996.

The Friday evening session began at 7:15 with a musical prelude by Dorothy Brooks, pianist, followed by a congregational hymn at 7:30, "To God Be the Glory".

Rev. Johnny Huffman, pastor of Bellview, welcomed everyone to the One Hundredth Annual Session, hosted by his church, which is also celebrating its One Hundredth Anniversary. Rev. Huffman delivered devotions, with scripture from Acts 4:32, followed by prayer.

Moderator Bob Richardson extended greetings and opened the meeting with the roll call and seating of messengers from Bellview, Laurel Springs, Liberty, Mt. Carmel, Osborne Memorial, Pine Fork, and First Baptist of Sparta. Every church was well represented. The moderator explained that Dr. Jim Pollard, the new pastor of First Baptist and also an appointed messenger, sent a letter expressing regrets for his absence, the reason being a mission trip to aid the victims of Hurricane Fran.

Moderator Richardson recognized special guest, Bill Morrow, representing North Carolina Baptist Children's Homes. He stated that special guest, George Reed, who had planned to report on Christian Life, regretfully could not attend.

The congregation sang Hymn #159, "Power in the Blood".

Special music and song was provided by the Bellview Quartet, from Bellview Church.

The Director of Missions Report was presented by Cora Neville, D.O.M. She announced that she would be retiring as Director of Missions in February. Cora extended a welcome to two new pastors in the Association, Rev. Dean Adams of Pine Fork, and Dr. Jim Pollard of First Baptist. Cora stated her appreciation to the Association for adopting a policy last year. She informed that the Executive Board had approved appointing her as "Church and Community Relations Director" at the August meeting. She asked the Association to pray for a new Director of Missions and that the Association office remain open.

John 3:16 Report was also presented by Cora Neville. She commended Jane Taylor for the excellent work she is doing in the Association office. She also expressed her appreciation to all the volunteers.

The Director of Missions Report and the John 3:16 Report were unanimously approved.

Elvira Crouse read a very touching tribute, which she had written, honoring Cora Neville, entitled "Thanks to a Servant".

Moderator Bob Richardson then presented Sister Cora Neville a plaque from the Alleghany Baptist Association in appreciation for her eleven years service as Director of Missions.

Moderator Richardson presented the Executive Committee's Report. A motion was made by Clarence Mabe to approve the report. It was approved.

The moderator explained that the Treasurer's Report was incomplete, but as soon as Treasurer Judith Sands could get the

records back from the auditor, a report would be sent to each church. He stated the auditor, Vickie Bartlett, had called him just prior to the meeting and informed him the records appeared to be correct to the penny. Moderator Richardson stated that, according to the information provided by the Treasurer, the current balance is \$4,143.09.

Dorothy Shaw, Historian, informed that Bellview Church had prepared a wonderful book about their history; Brenda Faw, Bellview's clerk, passed out copies to a representative from each church. Sister Dorothy expressed appreciation to Cora Neville. She also congratulated Bellview on their One Hundredth Anniversary, followed by her presentation of the Historian's Report. Dorothy said that Irene Wagner, former Association Clerk, had raised an interesting question about how the annual sessions have been counted — Dorothy referred to the statistical tables in the annual minute books, questioning whether this is actually the 100th session. She asked Elizabeth Moxley if she could enlighten us. Ms. Moxley responded that it goes back to the Ashe and Alleghany Association, which began in 1886. Elvira Crouse added that the last writings of Mrs. A. O. Joines might also shed some light on this subject.

Bruce Wood made a motion to accept the Historian's Report; there was unanimous approval.

Special guest, Bill Morrow, reported on North Carolina Baptist Children's Homes. He discussed the ways that support from associations such as ours helps many children, physically, mentally, and spiritually.

The congregation sang Hymn #35, "How Great Thou Art".

Rev. Dean Adams, new pastor of Pine Fork, delivered a powerful sermon, using scriptures from Matthew, Chapter 16, and II Timothy, Chapter 112, the theme being: The Bible is an Outline of Life.

The congregation sang the closing hymn of fellowship, "Blest Be the Tie".

The Friday evening session adjourned at 10:00 p.m., with Rev. Dana Hines, pastor of Laurel Springs Baptist Church, delivering the benediction.

ALLEGHANY MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ANNUAL SESSION

Saturday, September 14, 1996

At 8:58 A.M. Moderator Bob Richardson asked me to substitute

for Clerk Barbara Richardson. She was not able to make it to this Saturday Session. I accepted.

Dorothy Brooks, the Pianist, played the musical prelude. At 9:03 A.M. Moderator Bob Richardson went to the pulpit and began to speak. He also read a letter from Dr. Jim Pollard, who was unable to be at the Annual Session of the Year 1996. Dr. Pollard went with several other people to work with relief efforts in the area that was hit by Hurricane Fran.

Rev. Tom Neville did the Devotion at 9:05 A.M., in the place of Dr. Pollard. Rev. John Huffman led prayer. At 9:13 A.M. "Amazing Grace" was sung and then at 9:15 A.M. there was the Welcome and Recognition of Guests by Moderator Bob Richardson. From 9:21 A.M. to 9:36 A.M. were Special Reports by Elvira Crouse and Cora Neville. Elvira gave the WMU report. A motion was made, and then seconded to accept the WMU Report. The motion was passed by a voice vote. Director of Missions (DOM) Cora Neville had good news in her Vacation Bible School Report. For the first time in several years 100% of all associational churches had VBS! No one was attending the Sunday School Class and Extended Session for People with Special Needs. A motion was made, and then seconded by Ray Simmons, to accept Cora's reports. They were passed.

At 9:40 A.M. one verse of the hymn, "The Solid Rock" was sung. At 9:41 A.M. Moderator Bob Richardson mentioned the Mission Action Report by Edith Cooper. A motion was made, then seconded by Irene Wagner to include the Mission Action Report in the Alleghany Baptist Association booklet. The motion was approved.

At 9:42 A.M. The Bellview Quartet, consisting of Tommy Witherspoon, Nancy Church, Gale Church and Leonard Church, provided the Special Music. Tommy Witherspoon played a 12-string guitar. One of the three hymns they played and sang was "Where Are The Children". Please excuse me here for editorializing: This group was good!

At 10:05 A.M. Rev. Fred Lunsford, the Church Multiplier, spoke to us. On Labor Day, 1995, he had a heart attack, which caused him to miss the (Year) 1995 Annual Session. He mentioned this to us. Rev. Lunsford had put together a program, primarily for small churches. He spoke of two different baptizings: Three baptized at one place, and eight people were baptized at another place. He had been a Director of Missions for one association for 26 years. One main point Rev. Lunsford made was: "We need spiritual growth as well as numerical growth". He requested prayer for his wife, that her needs would be met.

At 10:24 A.M. "Victory In Jesus" was sung. From 10:26 A.M. to around 10:50 A.M. were the remaining Reports.

Judith Sands, the Treasurer, gave the Finance Committee Report. A motion was made, then seconded to accept the Treasurer's Report. This motion was passed.

Dorothy Shaw, the Pianist, suggested the idea of having the Office of Assistant Director of Music. Irene Wagner, of Liberty Baptist Church, volunteered. A motion was made by Ray Simmons, and seconded by Odell Crouse, to accept the slate of Officers for 1996-1997. The motion was passed.

Then came the Miscellaneous Business of amending the association's Constitution, concerning the time of the Annual Session, to read ". . . Friday before the second Saturday". Irene Wagner made the motion to make this change. Elizabeth Moxley seconded the motion. This motion was passed by a voice vote.

A question came up: "Is 1996 really the 100th Anniversary of the Alleghany Baptist Association?" Irene Wagner answered the question from a printed 1994 Associational booklet. She wanted to add the "Dates 1887 to 1996" under the "One Hundreth Annual Session", on the front of the booklet.

Moderator Bob Richardson spoke of the need for young people to be involved in the Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association. He also mentioned the point of "right living" from the September 13, 1996 sermon by Rev. Dean Adams.

At 10:51 A.M. Dick Moore, of Sparta First, sang two hymns, to music on audiocassette tape. Then at 11:08 A.M. Evelyn Parlier did the Memorial Service. At 11:16 A.M. "Rescue the Perishing" was sung.

Then at 11:18 A.M. Rev. Johnny Huffman, Pastor of Bellview Baptist Church, delivered the sermon, using Nehemiah 1:1-10 as the text. If I were to give this sermon a title, it may be "The Need for Repentance". Several Scriptures were "hinted at" by Rev. Huffman. He called out three references: Neh. 2:9, 10; Neh. 4:6; and Neh. 6:15.

At 11:58 A.M. the Benediction was given by Rev. Tom Neville.

BELLVIEW BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

Bellview Baptist Church is located on State Road #113, approximately three miles from Laurel Springs Post Office.

The first available written record of Bellview is in a Bible that belonged to Alice Long Jones, stating that Sunday School was conducted in the Masonic Lodge Hall, which also served as a two teacher school. In later years the Lodge united with Sparta, the school consolidated with Nathans Creek, and the building was sold and torn down.

Bellview Baptist Church was recorded as being established in 1896, with nineteen members. The statistical roll of churches in the minutes of the Ashe and Alleghany Association (1896-1897) record Reverend Frank B. Cheek as Pastor and J. W. Phouts as the Church Clerk. Little is known about Bellview until about ten years later.



Bellview Church was reorganized on May 9, 1909, with twenty-one members, and the present frame building with a seating capacity of around one hundred and fifty was soon constructed. The Reverend George M. Reeves was Pastor, Lloyd S. Richardson was Clerk, and Shade Plummer acted as Deacon.

Many pastors have served Bellview over the years. Limited services were held from 1953 until 1971. At that time, the Reverend Jimmy Warden was elected pastor. Under Reverend Warden's six-year leadership, the church made progress in all areas. Following the resignation of Reverend Warden at the end of 1976, the Reverend Lloyd Burgess was elected pastor in January of 1977. He served until his resignation in October of 1988. In the last part of 1988, the Reverend John Huffman was elected pastor and serves to the present.

Brother Gary Scott serves as Chairman of the Deacons, and Brothers Guy Brooks, Leonard Church, Larry Scott, and Gale Church serve faithfully.

Church Treasurers over the last twenty-five years have been: Lessie Shepherd (1976-1986), Becky Scott (1987-1988), and Dorothy Brooks (1988-present).

Church Clerks during this time were: Juanita Church (1960-1975), Virginia Warden (1975-1979), JoAnn Church (1979-1984), and Brenda Faw (1985-present).

Upkeep and maintenance have been an on-going project over the last twenty-five years. In 1979 a tract of land was donated to Bellview

from the F. U. Taylor Estate in loving memory of Mr. Taylor. This land has been developed into a fellowship and recreation area with a pavilion, swings, and merry-go-round. A piano was purchased in loving memory of Victor Jones. New pulpit furniture serves as a loving memorial to George Shepherd. A granite sign at the new drive on State Road #113, is a loving memorial to Maggie Atwood. In the late seventies a need for more room resulted in the first major renovation of Bellview. Four new Sunday School rooms and improvements on the inside began a new era. Since then a full basement with more Sunday School rooms, Fellowship Hall, and Pastor's Study have been added. New sheetrock and wainscoating brighten the walls of the Sanctuary, indirect lighting, and a vaulted dropped ceiling adds to the beautiful of the church.

Bellview has hosted the Alleghany Baptist Association in 1912, 1919, 1927, 1933, 1942, 1953, 1972, 1982, 1991, and 1996 (Bellview's 100th anniversary), and the 100th annual session of the Alleghany Baptist Association.

Bellview and its people have survived the changing times over the last century, and appear to be growing stronger with time.

We are continually grateful to the late Mrs. A. O. Joines, and to Mrs. T. S. Moxley for their previous historical research, and preservation of records, and to Brenda Faw for her valuable help.

She said "My brother and I knew we took precedence over Mom and Dad's ministry, because they were always there for us."

As Women on Missions, may we send out a strong message of hope to the hurting in Jesus' name.

Early on in the church year Mt. Carmel WMU appointed committees to provide food and prepare meals in the homes of members and community people where there was death or sickness. Flowers and monetary gifts were also provided.

A family devastated by fire was given aid and money.

A tape player/recorder was given the small children Sunday School classes.

A WMU member attending the Cancer Awareness meetings, shares her quarterly information with the church, and the importance of early detection of cancer.

The group sponsored Pastor Appreciation Day with a dinner and gifts.

The WMU did all the background work for the new directory and displayed religious materials at a booth in the Fall Festival.

A prayer chain was formed to pray for a Sunday School teacher who was having a bone marrow transplant. During the seven days of his critical condition the prayers continued. Our prayers were answered.

MOUNT CARMEL

The new church address is: 1410 Cherry Lane Road, Glade Valley, NC 28627, as a result of the new Alleghany County Emergency Telephone System 911 implementation on July 1, 1996.

The church conducts Sunday School and Worship Service every Sunday, Sunday night Bible study and Youth Choir and activities, and Wednesday night Adult Choir and Worship Service.

The Pastor, Rev. Everette R. Shaw, has served for 44 years. The church had three baptisms and gained eight new members: Charlie Crouse, age 79; his sister, Ertie Klock, age 88; Betty Wood, Christopher Reeves, Kristin Hines, Connie Van Nostrand, and Rickey and Katherine Crouse. Another five members were lost by membership transfers, leaving the present membership of 247.

The Sunday School enrollment is 105 with average weekly attendance of 60. Vacation Bible School had average weekly attendance of 71 and enrollment of 108. A mission offering of \$224.21 was given to Sister Cora Neville and John 3:16 Clothing Closet.

A new Church Directory was published, and six scholarships of \$150.00 each were awarded to: Wendy Crouse, Meghann Shaw, Wesley Patrick, Donald Ray Crouse, Alicia Andrews, and Forrest Hamm.

Ten youth and three chaperones attended Western Youth Conference at Mars Hill Campus, and Bro. Bruce Wood has served two years on the WYC Committee.

Singers, Saved-by-Grace, Gospel Echoes, Harbor Lights, and Mt. Carmel Youth participated in three Benefit Singing/Auctions to help the sick and less fortunate.

Jason Blevins and friends completed a beautifications program around the church with landscaping and mulch, paint, clearing brush around the cemetery fence, etc. Also, constructed and erected a new outside Bulletin Board. Since this was a scouting project, all labor was donated with the only cost being for supplies. The church sincerely appreciates those people who do so much for others.

The Adult Sunday School Class sent a box of food to North Korea for their Famine Relief Project to help prevent starvation of thousands, following flooding.

Two revivals were conducted. In the fall by the Pastor and Bro. Brad Wooten, and the spring by Rev. Jimmy Warden. The Children's Choir, Young Adult, and Adult Choirs provided special music and songs.

The Food Closet provided a way to reach out to needy people, and 206 persons were served with 147 boxes of food. Many volunteer hours go into shopping, stocking shelves, and packing food boxes.

The church presented "The Last Supper" drama with a cast of 13 men, and communion service followed. The tradition of Easter sunrise service and fellowship breakfast, Christmas plays, Memorial service and grave decoration, Holy Communion, honoring Mothers and Fathers on their respective days, distributing fruit baskets for Christmas, and flowers to bereaved families, have continued.

The parking lot across the road from the church building had gravel added and paving done as a donation (\$5000.00).

Support continues to many agencies of the SBC, State Baptist Convention, Alleghany Baptist Association, Broughton Hospital Cheer Fund, Gideons International, individual missionaries, local missions, and the sick.

New carpet has been installed in all Sunday school rooms, Fellowship Hall, stairs, and hallway, and adds to the beauty of the church interior.

A new state of the art sound system was installed on August 22, 1996, by North Wilkesboro Bible Bookstore and Music Center, Inc. and provides quality sound in the sanctuary.

The church donated \$1800.00 per year for the past few years into a building fund for future use. The value of the church property is presently \$250,000.00.

The Youth and WMU have had a very busy year and accomplished many good things for the church and community; always striving to reach farther and accomplish more.

The group prepared a float and entered in the Christmas Parade in Sparta. The fund raisers have been two Spaghetti Suppers, and a Youth Breakfast on the first day of fishing season. Thirteen attended camp at Mars Hill Campus and visited "Eliada Home for Children" an orphanage for ages kindergarten through 4th grade. They all enjoyed games, songs, and just being friends for an evening; but bringing home precious memories that last forever. They enjoyed touring Linville Caverns on the way back home.

The youth have contributed \$55.00 to the Baptist Children's Homes of NC, and \$150.00 to Cora Neville and John 3:16 Clothing Closet.

A Youth Choir was formed that provides special music and songs on Youth Sunday. They also sing at revivals and benefit singings. They donated money toward a family's medical expenses, and send flowers to the sick and deceased. Also sponsored a cook-out for Rodney Crouse who was going away to school and presented him a

gift of sheets and towels. They worked hard on the beautification project around the church and cemetery.

Monthly activities consist of a Lock-in, Picnic, Bowling, Skating, Putt-Putt, and a trip to R. J. Ranch in Virginia where they conducted Sunday school and Worship services. They also perform in the church Christmas play. Average participation for youth activities and events is 25 - 35 people.

OSBORNE MEMORIAL

Three individuals were baptized during the Associational year.

Osborne Memorial again sponsored missionaries in New Mexico and the prison ministry. A student who is going into the mission field in Eastern Asia was given a one-year sponsorship grant.

The Church enjoyed many activities during the year. A trip was made to the 'Lazy 5 Ranch' in Mooresville.

The young people of the church put on the annual Christmas play, doing a wonderful job as always.

The church joined Mt. Carmel Union Baptist Church for the annual Easter Sunrise Service.

A spring and fall revival was held.

An 'End-of-School' picnic was held at Donnie Musgrove's.

Osborne Memorial held a Vacation Bible School on the first, second, and third Sunday nights in August. A Bible School celebration picnic is being planned.

The Rev. Jimmy Warden was the visiting minister at the annual Homecoming Service.

The church continues to maintain a weekly prayer list.

The young people are working on a church directory which contains everyone's new 911 address.

PINE FORK HIGHLIGHTS

Our church has a new pastor, Rev. Dean Adams. We have seen God really bless our church. Our attendance has grown and the Spirit is really working. We have had new water fountains installed in the church and also in the fellowship hall. Our debt on the fellowship hall has been retired. We had a great Vacation Bible School in June. We had an average attendance of 87. We had two revivals, one in April and another in October. Our homecoming and decoration services were held in August, with special singing by the Harbor Lights. Our W.M.U. has grown this year and is working hard. Pine Fork hosted the annual W.M.U. associational conference for 1996. After meeting many of our church family at a special dinner and preaching a sermon on Sunday morning, we voted overwhelmingly to extend the call to Dr. Pollard and his family. They began their new ministry here in Sparta on June 23. We look forward to them being with us for many years.

During the past year, we have kept our emphasis on missions and outreach. In November, Rev. Jerry Allen led us in our Fall Revival. In April Rev. Rob Roberts led our Spring Revival. Such financial reports consist of Receipts/Disbursements, Receipts/Disbursements to Budget, and Church Support.

However, due to the absence of a full-time Treasurer, no meetings were held from September, 1995 until February, 1996. As previously mentioned in "Report of the Treasurer," I assumed the duties of

Treasurer, and hence Chairperson of the Finance Committee, in mid-fiscal year. The first meeting over which I presided was held February 10, 1996 and consisted mainly of becoming acquainted with the members and requesting their input regarding the type of information and presentation format desired.

1996

In a recent survey released by the Family Research Council, 66% of those polled said that our country was headed down “the wrong track”. When asked whether the nation’s wrong direction could be attributed to the lack of jobs and economic health or a decline in moral values and family breakdown, over 60% indicated the latter. We at the Christian Action League agree that our state and nation need a restoration of biblical, moral and family values. In 1996 we were honored to assist communities in their battles for civic and moral righteousness and to promote laws in the General Assembly that have helped to restore family values to the State of North Carolina.

A. Christian Values

The Christian Action League joined with other Christian organizations to promote Christian Heritage Week in North Carolina, March 17-23. We experienced a wonderful week as presentations and commemorations were held in many churches, schools and communities across our state. The week culminated with an awards ceremony and reception for the winners of the state-wide essay contest and their families. The League provided decorations and programs for the event and hosted the reception at the State Archives and History Building in Raleigh.

The League undertook a project in association with the American Rights Coalition to distribute thousands of copies of the Ten Commandments throughout North Carolina. To date, over 5,000 copies of the 11 x 14 prints have been distributed throughout the state to individuals and churches.

B. Lottery

We saw renewed efforts to push a lottery bill through the General Assembly for a state-wide referendum. Representative Fitch introduced two lottery bills: HD 6060 (Rules Committee) and HB 838 (JII Committee). The League actively lobbied against these bills and both bills died in their respective committees. North Carolina continues to be the largest state in the nation and the only state in the Bible belt with no state-sponsored gambling. Please keep us in prayer as the League faces this battle each year.

C. Sex Education

CAL actively lobbied for HB 834, Abstinence Until Marriage, a law that mandated that abstinence until marriage be the focus in sex education in North Carolina schools and was passed in the 1995 session. CAL and other pro-family, Christian organizations have been working with the Dept. of Public Instruction and State Board of Education in 1996 encouraging them to implement the law through abstinence-based curricula. We have also assisted communities in seeing that this law is properly implemented at the local level,

D. Homosexuality

CAL participated in efforts to get SB 1487 (No Same-Sex Marriage) passed during the short session of the General Assembly. The bill passed both houses and became law.

Alerted our members in the Winston-Salem area about the Family March on June 30 and encouraged them to notify their churches to participate. This march was in response to the homosexual community march held in that city. The Family March attendance was estimated at 8,000.

E. Abortion

The League actively supported Representative Decker's HB 624, a Woman's Right to Know. This bill would have required the doctor to share vital information with the patient about the risks of abortion and would require a 24-hour waiting period. We were disappointed that the bill did not pass this session; however, we will work for its passage again next session.

F. Alcohol

CAL assisted several communities in setting up an organization to combat liquor referendums.

My friends, we are living in times when the Christian community needs to exercise spiritual discernment and stand strong for Biblical principles that further righteousness, strengthen families and bless our state and nation. We are grateful to God for the prayer and financial support that the League receives from the churches of your association that allow us to be on the front lines in this spiritual warfare.

MEETING THE CHALLENGES OF HEALTH CARE REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION - 1996

Hospital Highlights for 1996

Division of Pastoral Care

During this year the 18 to 40 Chaplains present at various times at the Hospital made over 55,000 pastoral contacts.

As of July 1, 1996, the counseling centers will be called CareNet, Inc., of The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. Over 26,000 hours of counseling were provided through the eleven centers across the state of North Carolina. Two additional centers will open in the fall of this year.

The Center for Congregational Health has, since inception in 1992, provided ministry at some level to over 225 North Carolina Baptist Churches.

Mission dollars from the Cooperative Program enabled the above ministries to be carried out and to touch thousands of lives.

Baptist Benevolent Care Fund

North Carolina Baptists joined us in a mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. We channeled every penny of the MDO, which amounted to \$461,647, to help patients who had no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. We are grateful to everyone who made this ministry possible.

Points of Emphasis and Progress

Financial Stewardship — The Medical Center is constantly seeking ways to lighten the financial burden of those who are ill. Recently the room rates were reduced by \$50 per day.

Aegis — This is an alliance of primary-care clinicians who serve patients regardless of their medical plans or HMO/PPO affiliated. "Aegis" means protection or sponsorship: Aegis Family Health Centers is a network of primary care physicians affiliated with The Medical Center. It now has 33 providers in 10 practice sites.

QualChoice of North Carolina — QualChoice is The Medical Center's managed care company. Eighteen months old, it serves approximately 30,500 enrollees, giving quality health-care and patient/physician choice.

Regional Integrated Information Network — RIDS is a regional computer network now in the pilot phases. The network allows providers in the region to exchange patient information electronically, saving

time and money. RIDS is a plan which assists communities in our service area to develop a coordinated continuum of care. In this plan, primary care physicians, community hospitals, nursing homes and other patient care providers link their services with those of The Medical Center. The desired outcome is improved patient care and cost-effective services.

The J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging — The Center devotes itself to the special problems of older adults. When the center moves to its new home in 1996, its services will not only provide specialized health care but will also include a day care program for the elderly that will serve as a link between hospital and home, helping to reduce rates of rehospitalization and premature placement in nursing homes.

A CLOSING WORD

Since its founding in 1922, the Hospital has taken pride in our ministry of service. In doing so, we seek to make tomorrow's patient care and tomorrow's workplace constantly better. That has been our mission historically, and it continues to this day. I firmly believe that our best lies yet ahead, and I am committed to that reality.

ARE RESIDENTS OF BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES PRIMARILY BAPTISTS?

At the Brookridge Community, 70% of the resident population is Baptist. About 90% of the resident population of the Western North Carolina Baptist Home is Baptist. The Taylor House and the Hamilton Baptist Home are primarily composed of Baptist residential populations.

WHAT IS THE COST OF SERVICES? ARE FINANCIAL RESOURCES AVAILABLE FOR THOSE WHO CANNOT PAY?

Fees vary according to facilities and the level of care chosen or required by residents. A full schedule of fees for each facility is available upon request. There are no entrance fees associated with any of the health-related facilities owned and operated by Baptist Retirement Homes. The Hamilton Baptist Home and the Taylor House are among the few not-for-profit, church-related, long-term care facilities in North Carolina with no financial requirements for admission. Contributions received from the Baptist State Convention Cooperative Program and from local Baptist churches across the state are used exclusively to help BRH provide care for those Older Adults in either assisted living or nursing care who are unable to pay the full cost of their care.

DOES THE BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION OF NORTH CAROLINA SUPPORT BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES?

Baptist Retirement Homes is affiliated with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, but is a separate and distinct corporate entity. Messengers of the churches that compose the Baptist State Convention select BRH board members. In 1995, funds received from the Convention Cooperative Program and gifts from local Baptist churches totaled approximately \$1.1 million. All of those monies are being used to support Older Adults living in assisted living or nursing care who lack sufficient resources to pay for the care they receive.

Making Life for Older Adults . . .

THE BEST OF TIMES

The continuing goal of Baptist Retirement Homes is to provide more and better services for Older Adults. During 1996 several developments have moved us toward this goal.

Some new staff members have been added to help provide the kind of total care which residents need and deserve. Tonja Keay has been employed as Vice President of the Health Services Division. Paulette Richmond came as the new manager of the Hamilton Baptist Home. Carla Hyde was named director of the small group program for residents with dementia, a program designed to enhance their quality of life. Patricia Fling is the director of the In Home Care program which began a few months ago. Dr. Earl Watts, an Associate Professor at the Bowman Gray School of Medicine, is serving as the medical director for In Home Care.

Early in the year, renovation of the Hamilton Baptist Home was completed providing a more attractive and comfortable place for residents in that facility. The new Cecil and Gertrude Young Solarium at the Rickman Nursing Center in Asheville will provide space for the small group program for residents with dementia. At Brookridge, renovated space in the Assisted Living section, and named "Stokes Court", will house the new Assisted Independent Living Unit. A new passenger van will facilitate transportation for residents at the Taylor House in Albemarle as they attend church, keep appointments, go shopping, or participate in social/recreational events.

During the year, Baptist Retirement Homes has provide assistance in the planning for Cliffwood, a new continuing care retirement community being built in Fayetteville. Two Fayetteville churches, First Baptist and Snyder Memorial Baptist, have formed a non-profit corporation to lead this project. A 27 acre site has been selected. Plans call for 105 Independent Living units, 20 beds in Assisted Living, and 20 beds in a nursing care unit. All units will be available on a rental basis with no entrance fees.

The James M. Hayes Society has been formed to recognize and thank those persons who remember the Baptist Retirement Homes in their estate planning. Thirty-three charter members constitute this group named in honor of the "Homes" founding superintendent.

Finally, we recognize with deep gratitude those North Carolina Baptists who gave through their churches to support the ministry during the past year. Through the cooperative program, the special February Offering, and other church gifts, the "Homes" received a total of \$1,030,052 during the 12 month period ending September 30, 1995.

The trustees and staff are grateful to North Carolina Baptists for helping us to make life for Older Adults . . . **The Best of Times!**

Since 1834 North Carolina Baptist Colleges and Universities have been privileged to have many splendid presidents. The current presidents are listed on this page. They were elected to take the lead in dreaming, shaping and managing Baptist higher education in North Carolina.

Two colleges, Mars Hill and Chowman, have new presidents. Let us introduce them to you.

Dr. A. Max Lennon was named president of Mars Hill College, effective March 1. Both he and Mrs. Lennon (Ruth Ann) are graduates of Mars Hill. Dr. Lennon brings a rich background in business and higher education to his new task. After earning the B.S. and Ph.D. degrees at North Carolina State University, he served in the administration of Texas Tech University, the University of Missouri, Ohio State University and Clemson University, where he was the president. He comes to Mars Hill from the presidency of Eastern Foods, Inc. in Atlanta, Georgia. Dr. Lennon, an active Baptist churchman, has been a member of the National Fellowship of Baptist Men. In Atlanta they were members of the First Baptist Church in Peachtree City, where he taught Sunday School and was a member of the strategic planning committee. He is on the board of directors of numerous corporations and foundations, among them First Union Corporation and Duke Power. In accepting the presidency of Mars Hill he said, "This is a wonderful opportunity to provide leadership for this college and boldly proclaim our faith in Jesus Christ."

Dr. Stanley G. Lott moved to North Carolina in July to become president of Chowan College. He comes from Louisiana College, a Baptist school, where he was vice president for academic affairs for 15 years. Earlier he has been a faculty member at Tift College in Georgia. Primed for excitement after three hours waiting under a bright summer sky, hundreds of spectators craned their necks and peered toward downtown Asheville June 26 when Michael Owen jogged into view - carrying the Olympic Torch on outstretched arm. Michael, one of 1,422 children Baptist Children's Homes served in 1995-96, lives at Broyhill Home in Clyde, one of 12 facilities BCH operates in North Carolina.

Smiling and waving to the crowds holding aloft tiny flags and cameras, Michael lifted the symbol of international unity and pointed to friends among those who lined the parade route.

The entire Broyhill Home campus showed up, cheering wildly. They ate picnics at the end of Michael's route, and swarmed him when he passed the flame to the next carrier - a bicycle rider.

It could have been a family reunion, or a school scene, or a re-

creation for a movie on family support. But Michael, and most of his supporters, are children who have suffered unspeakable abuses at the hands of adults they trusted to care for them.

And the adults who waded into that mob scene of joy at the end of Michael's run are called of God to help young people like Michael and those who surrounded him deal with those issues, and to overcome them.

As a boy, Micheal was so ashamed of his clothes he ran home from school, never stopping to make friends. Worse, he endured almost nightly beatings from his father. He was 11 years old before he realized other boys weren't beaten every night. Four years later he found the courage to tell his father he was leaving.

"Go ahead, call someone," he yelled. "Leave."

Michael left. After six months in emergency care at Mills Home in Thomasville, he established a more permanent residence at Broyhill Home. Slowly, quietly his emotions mounted within him until one night he erupted and spilled forth his story, the years of secrets and lies, to his child care worker, Betty Porter. "She stayed up with me and we talked a long time," Micheal said. That was his first lesson in trust and unconditional love.

"Broyhill has changed my life so much," Michael said. "For almost a year I didn't trust anybody, but finally I felt a calmness I know was the Lord. Here I found the Lord and now I try to live every day for Him."

Michael's story is repeated hundreds of times each year at Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. Not all are as dramatic as a boy who grew from a punching bag to a torch bearer.

But at four residential campuses, six emergency care cottages, two homes for behaviorally troubled girls, a maternity home, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping and model day care, more than 1,400 children and their families find help in a troubled time.

During the past year BCH received almost \$1.5 million through the Cooperative Program, and \$663,000 through the Thanksgiving Offering. Total church gifts of almost \$3 million comprised 26.2 percent of BCH operating revenue.

BCH is in the midst of a \$10.1 "Light Their Way" Campaign to raise money for operations, capital needs and endowment. At the halfway point in June, more than \$5.4 million had been committed to BCH through the campaign.

Although Michael carries many fond memories of Baptist Children's Homes with him as he heads for college this Fall, his earliest amazements were the secure sleep he got when he laid his head down, and of receiving his first pair of Nikes so he didn't have to be embarrassed by his appearance.

Christ for Our Nation

1995 Annual Report Summary/Highlights

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). With national offices in the Atlanta, Georgia area, the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

As of December 31, 1995, there were 4,857 missions personnel serving in the United States, the Caribbean, Guam, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also has endorsed more than 2,400 chaplains who are serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. Nearly 2,300 Mission Service Corps volunteers are serving on home mission fields. During the year there were 1,458 church starts, the second highest number in 10 years. Southern Baptist churches baptized 393,811 people in 1995, an increase of nearly 15,000 over 1994.

Approximately half of the HMB's support comes from the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1995, gifts to the offering totaled \$38,908,339, the largest in HMB history. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1996 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$42 million. About 35 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1995:

Chaplaincy Ministries — The 2,412 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported more than 27,000 professions of faith. During the year, 179 Southern Baptist ministers were endorsed for the first time by the Chaplains Commission of the SBC.

Church Loans — The Church Loans Division closed 98 church loans totaling \$25 million, including \$3.4 million of refinancing.

Associational Administrative Service — In more than 1,025 associations, 950 associational missionaries have an extremely significant role in leading churches to strategize and work in partnership to evangelize, minister, and start churches in all places and among all people groups.

Language Missions — Home missionaries in the Language Church Extension Division worked among 106 ethnic groups and 98 American Indian tribes, using 106 languages and dialects, in addition to sign language.

Volunteers — Volunteers continue to serve in record numbers and represent more than \$100 million in value to the HMB. In 1995, more than 70,000 persons served as volunteers. Mission Service Corps missionaries, numbering 2,193, represent a cadre of committed people responding to God's call to be personally involved in home missions. They were responsible for leading more than 5,600 people to Christ.

Prayer and Spiritual Awakening — The Home Missions Intercessory Prayerline received 82,000 calls in 1995. Missionary prayer requests were given in more than 178,000 English and Spanish *Prayer-Grams*.

Mass Evangelism — This department assisted in implementing the *Here's Hope. Jesus Cares for You.* Harvest Revivals. An estimated 25,000 to 35,000 churches participated in some portion of the *Here's Hope* emphasis.

Alternatives to Abortion Ministries — As a result of ministries in 37 crisis pregnancy centers, 806 persons prayed to receive Christ and 1,823 babies were born.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FOREIGN MISSION BOARD

The following annual growth levels reflect the combined reports from all foreign mission points as of the start of this year.

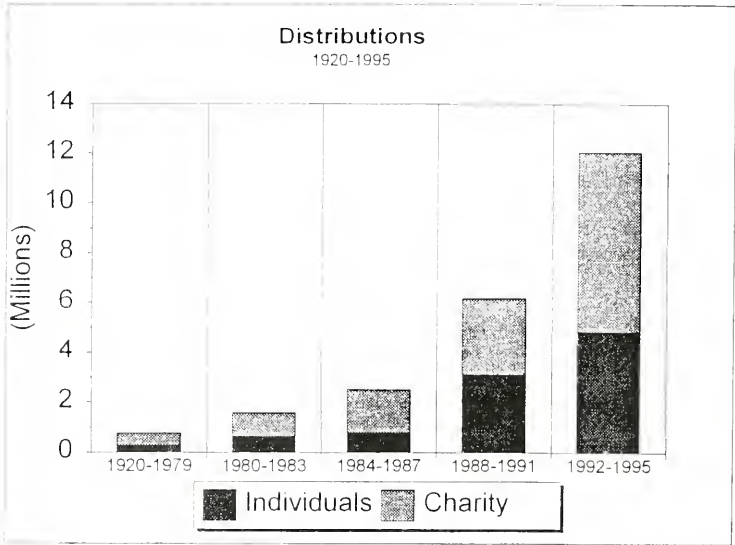
- A record number of newly constituted churches: 2,612

The income distributions for the entire 76 year history of the N. C. Baptist Foundation totals: \$9,673,682 income paid to individuals and \$13,458,579 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$23,132,261.

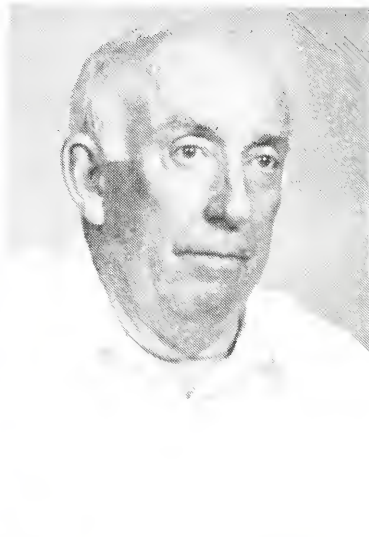

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 12, 1997

After a musical prelude by Dorothy Brooks and solo of "How Great Thou Art" by Dorothy, the congregation sang "To God Be The Glory."

Rev. Dana Hines, pastor of Laurel Springs Church, led the devotional and the opening prayer, and welcomed everyone.

Moderator Bob Richardson conducted the meeting.

The moderator asked for the roll call and seating of the messengers: Bellview - 6; Laurel Springs - 2; Liberty - 4; Mt. Carmel - 5; Osborne Memorial -

Visitors were recognized; among them was special guest, Mr. Jim Murphy, from NC Baptist Hospital.

The Children's Home report was acknowledged and accepted after motion and second.

The congregation sang "Send The Light."

The Retirement Homes report was presented and approved.

The Bellview Quartet sang "After While I'll Rise", "Too Many Miles", "On The Other Side of Jordan", and "Beulah Land."

Moderator Richardson gave the Executive Board report; upon motion and second, it was approved.

Judith Sands, treasurer, gave the treasurer's report; motion was made and seconded to approve.

Dorothy Shaw, historian, gave the history of Laurel Springs Baptist Church, and made a motion for its acceptance; after second, it was approved.

The congregation sang "Onward Christian Soldiers."

Jim Murphy spoke on behalf of North Carolina Baptist Hospital.

Mt. Carmel Youth Group sang "The City of Gold," "Mansion Over the Hilltop," "Our God Is An Awesome God," "Victory In Jesus," and "His Love Lights The Way."

Rev. Billy Felts, pastor of Bellview Baptist Church, delivered a very inspiring sermon based on Nehemiah Ch. 8, emphasizing "Here Am I, Send Me."

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 13, 1997

A musical prelude was presented by pianist Dorothy Brooks.

Rev. Dana Hines, pastor of Laurel Springs Baptist Church, gave the devotional and opening prayer.

Buster Story led the congregation in singing "To God Be The Glory."

Bob Richardson, moderator, welcomed everyone and asked for the guests; there were none present.

Dorothy Shaw presented the W.M.U. report and asked for its approval. After second and vote, it was approved.

The Vacation Bible School report was given by Irene R. Wagner. Upon motion and second, it was approved.

The congregation sang "Holy, Holy, Holy."

The moderator announced that adults on mission will meet Saturday, September 27, at Bellview to complete projects started in August.

Adults on Mission report was given by Dorothy Shaw and moved the acceptance of the report; after second and vote, it was approved.

Laurel Springs Baptist Church provided special music with a duet, "What A Day That Will Be" by Buster Story and Barbara Petty, with Judy Hines at the piano.

Judith Sands, treasurer, gave the Finance Committee report. She explained items in the proposed budget. After motion and second, the report was approved.

Gary Scott presented the Nominating Committee report. He requested that Dorothy Brooks be added as chairman of the Finance Committee. He moved that the report be accepted; after a second, the motion carried.

Statement of Mission was approved with addition to change it as follows: "To partner with our Baptist congregation to mobilize mature believers into the world with the Gospel." The statement of mission will become a part of the constitution.

The moderator explained the pros and cons of the association with only five churches. He explained that he felt a Director of

Missions is needed to be a contact with Cary. Bruce Wood, a member of the General Board, offered to be a contact person for anyone who would need this information.

The moderator was asked about storage space for office equipment and supplies that had been in the association office. He stated that, at the present, it is stored at his home.

Motion was made and seconded, that all churches wish to continue as an association and pledge to support the association in the best manner possible.

A letter of withdrawal from Sparta First Baptist Church was received by the moderator.

The moderator offered to send letters of acknowledgment to Sparta First; also to those officers who had submitted resignations: Loraine Jarrett, D.O.M.; Barbara Richardson, Clerk; Judith Sands, Treasurer; Jane Taylor, Assistant Clerk-Treasurer; and Tom Neville, Vice Moderator. A motion was made and seconded.

Elizabeth Moxley made a report on THE BIBLICAL RECORDER. She explained the benefits of subscribing to it and being made aware of Baptist State Convention activities. A motion and second were made to accept the report.

Wilma Foster remarked that her great-grandfather, F. B. Cheek, helped organize Laurel Springs Baptist Church.

Dorothy Shaw made the remark that she missed the presence of Mabel Richardson, who had attended the annual meetings almost without exception since she was very young until now at age 92. She was unable to attend because of a back injury.

Evelyn Parlier did the memorial service for deceased members, closing with prayer by Rev. Dana Hines.

Buster Story and Barbara Petty, with Judy Hines at the piano, sang "He Touched Me."

Rev. Dana Hines delivered a very challenging sermon based on the text, Romans Ch. 8. He emphasized the love of God which cannot be taken from us.

Meeting next year will be decided at the November Executive Board Meeting.

HISTORY OF LAUREL SPRINGS BAPTIST CHURCH

On July 24, 1891, Laurel Springs Baptist Church was organized by Revs. J. D. Harris and Frank B. Cheek. The charter members selected were John R. Long, J. Lee Lawrence, J. Horton Doughton,

Mary Rose, Polly Long, Josie Horton, and Bettie D. Miller. The Rev. J. D. Harris was elected pastor, J. Horton Doughton clerk, and John R. Long deacon.

For some time, worship services were held in Laurel Springs Academy. In 1898 the members agreed to build a structure for worship. One-half mile north of Laurel Springs Post Office, the land for the site was donated by Andrew J. Reeves, Fielden Miller and Robert L. Doughton. Johnson Weaver and Muncie Steadham were hired to construct the building. The lumber for the framed structure was furnished by J. Horton Doughton.

The building was used until 1930 when it was destroyed by fire. The present brick building was erected in 1932. Windows and doors removed from the old building were used in this building. Ten years later the building was enlarged. A gift of stained glass from the James Williams family, as a memorial to Mr. Williams, replaced the clear glass panes in the windows in 1945. At this time, several acres of land were added to the church property. A hardsurface driveway to the church and cemetery has been built and maintained for several years. In 1973, an addition was built to the church. This contained a fellowship room, a small kitchen, rest rooms and a recreation room in the basement. New doors were installed in the sanctuary. A cross for the pulpit was presented by a frequent visitor. A new coat of paint was applied in preservation of the building. Blinds divided the kitchen and fellowship room. Seat cushions were purchased for the pews in the sanctuary. A new hipped-roof replaced the flat roof on the fellowship room, which has also been used for classes in art and basket making. In 1990 the church was refurbished with new carpeting, light fixtures, and additional cushions for pews. The downstairs was renovated in 1991, and additions included a church office, two Sunday school rooms and handrails for the handicapped. More remodeling was done in 1993 that changed the church building and grounds. A black-topped drive around the cemetery was added. Timber on the church property was sold and the revenue divided equally between the church and cemetery. The steep road bank in front of the church was terraced, improving the church property. Later an extra parking lot was paved, and in 1995 a front portico was added to the east entrance of the church building with walkways at the side and rear. Also, a lighted sign was constructed at the highway entrance, and a new cemetery sign erected, surrounded with attractive shrubs, and a memorial garden added, and a garden bench.

James and Maggie Miller gave a lovely oak table for the foyer and a religious tract rack was a gift of Fred Loggins. A new oak serving table in the fellowship room was crafted and donated by Stacy Davis. An organ was added to the sanctuary, compliments of Southside Baptist Church.

Laurel Springs Baptist Church has ordained one minister, the Rev. George M. Reeves. It furnished moderators for seventeen years. Those were J. Horton Doughton, Dr. B. E. Reeves, Hon. Robert L. Doughton, W. Frank Doughton, and Van F. Miller. Later Robert Myers, Reece Miller, James A. Miller, Wayne Miles, Stacy Davis, and Wayne Edwards were ordained as deacons, and Mrs. Madge R. Shepherd, Elizabeth M. Moxley, and Mrs. Mabel Davis as deaconesses.

Van F. Miller served faithfully as deacon for thirty-five years until his homegoing on April 1, 1981.

The church has financed a child to attend Special Opportunity Camp many times. Contributions were made to Alleghany Hospice, and special treats to the residents of Thomasville Children's Homes. Regular contributions are sent to the Cooperative Program and other interests of the NC Baptist State Convention. A Bible study is taught each spring by the Pastor. Rev. Neal Hatfield conducted revival in 1995 with nine professions and five new members added to the church family, and revival the next year reaped a great harvest with four souls saved, one rededication, and six new members by transfer of letter.

The church celebrated its Centennial in 1991 with various activities including the compiling of a church history, and was blessed to see the Worship Service attendance double in size.

The Rev. B. R. Elledge served the church as pastor for thirty years, and Rev. Dana Hines was elected pastor on January 31, 1993 and continues to serve.

Vacation Bible School was conducted in 1996 for the first time in many years with six youth saved. The youth group and some adults constructed playground equipment as a VBS project.

The Sunday School is growing and two home Bible studies were started by Stacy Davis and Bealer Cudill. The church is needing more space at present and this is a great problem to have.

The membership of the church has embodied ministers, doctors, teachers, a congressman, dentist, nurses and many others in various walks of life who have taken places to help make this nation a better place to live.

**MEETING THE CHALLENGES OF HEALTH CARE - 1997
REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS**

HOSPITAL HIGHLIGHTS — Since opening its doors in 1923, The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated has remained fully committed to the purpose of carrying out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. It is this Christ-like spirit that has led patients such as Helen Keller to write: “When I was coming out from under surgery, they treated me with fine love, and I could feel it. I have been in places where it didn’t matter how many times you pressed the call button, you would just lie there and wait, but the nurses at Baptist

Hospital always came right away. If I ever have to go back to a hospital, this is where I would come.”

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND — Baptist Churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in 1924. In 1996 the MDO amounted to \$456,497.00. It was used exclusively to help patients who had little or no health care insurance or other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From this past year's offering, over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist Churches. May God bless all those who gave so generously.

DIVISION OF PASTORAL CARE — During the year the Chaplains and Staff of the Pastoral Care Department provide worship services in Davis Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday for patients and family members. The Pastoral Care Department staff supervised 65 students during the year. They made more than 50,000 ministry contacts, an increase of 10% over the previous year.

CareNet, Inc. continues to grow. There are now 13 counseling centers located in strategic areas across the state. During the year these centers will provide over 26,000 hours of counseling.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc., continues to expand its assistance to ministers and churches. Programs and assistance offered to churches include Consultants and Intentional Interims working with churches as they face the challenges of today. The Young Leader's Program helps in leadership development, and the Clergy Wellness Program, Turning Point, is designed to foster a holistic growth-approach to the individual minister's life calling.

POINTS OF EMPHASIS AND PROGRESS — J. Paul Sticht Center — In April the J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation opened the doors of a new 240,000 square foot state-of-the-arts building. Here services are provided to older adults. These services include a geriatric assessment clinic, Acute Care for the Elderly clinic, Alzheimer's disease and memory disorders clinic, osteoporosis clinic, geriatric gynecology clinic, a women's health center, education services, and a legal clinic for seniors. It houses a true "Day Hospital" for seniors — the first in the state — which provides therapy, examination and rehabilitation as day-time treatment, eliminating costly overnight stays.

Comprehab — On November 4, 1996, the doors were opened to The Medical Center's new CompRehab Center. The 70,000 square-foot building houses a full spectrum of physical rehabilitation and

related clinical services, including a Sports Medicine Center, Foot and Ankle Center, The Hand Center, Outpatient Physical Therapy Center, Spine Center, and the Neurorehabilitation Center.

Trauma Center — The Medical Center has the only designated Level I trauma center in Northwest North Carolina. In the trauma center our goal is for the patient to be in an operating room 10 minutes after arriving at the Emergency Department. Surgeons, anesthesiologists and staff remain on duty 24 hours a day to handle such emergencies.

Tops in Research — According to a report in the February issue of *Applied Clinical Trials*, Bowman Gray School of Medicine ranked in the top 10 U.S. clinical research institutions.

Qualchoice — Established by The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated, The Bowman Gray School of Medicine, and Wake Forest University, this managed care plan provides quality health care and patient physician choice. QualChoice is now able to offer coverage to ministers and church staffs.

At the sound of a car in his grandmother's carport, Jason looked out the window, and was shocked to see his mother striding toward the house.

She was angry, and Jason shouted, "Lordy, it's momma," as he ran to the back bedroom to call the police.

Just 12 years old, Jason had lived in seven foster care homes and with his grandmother on and off since his father died seven years earlier. His mother's addictions cost her custody of her only son. For whatever reason, tonight she wanted him back.

Out of control, Jason's mother broke open the door and kicked grandmother to the floor. She grabbed her by the hair and "slung me around by the hair of my head," grandmother says, remembering.

Mother shouted for Jason to come out of hiding, and threatened to kill his grandmother. She grabbed a bottle, broke it, and held the jagged edge to grandma's throat, shouting that she would kill her if Jason didn't come out of hiding.

Just then Jason's aunt arrived from a house next door, and held his mother's arms until the police arrived.

Six years later, grandmother beams with pride for Jason, who overcame that tragic, traumatic start in life. Jason garnered academic, athletic and leadership honors in a steady stream at Tuscola High School in Haywood County and is starting college in August 1997 as a freshman at The Citadel.

At Tuscola, he was captain and MVP of the track and cross country teams and a conference champion, vice president for his senior class, Cadet Colonel and ROTC commander in a group of 115 cadets, in National Honor Society, in the top 10 percent of his class, attended leadership events at Western Carolina University and Washington, D.C., and was a peer helper and peer counselor.

At The Citadel he will study political science with a minor in military history and international affairs. He wants a military career as a fighter pilot, then to enter politics after retirement.

Jason credits Broyhill Home, his home since that traumatic night in his grandma's house.

"All the accomplishments of my life have been made possible by Baptist Children's Homes," Jason said at his final awards banquet at Broyhill Home, where he received top honors for the second year.

“Broyhill has made me into a young man with a future, who knows now where he is going and what he wants to do. They’ve opened the doors to enable me to do that.”

As for grandmother, who was desperate to find a place for Jason after the incident in her house, she prays, “every night and I thank God every night that we have a place like Broyhill Home and Baptist Children’s Homes.”

Jason’s story is repeated hundreds of times each year at Baptist Children’s Homes of North Carolina. Not all are as dramatic but every one tells of a young person and a family at the end of an unraveling rope, and of BCH tying a knot in that rope and helping them to hold on.

At four residential campuses, six emergency care cottages, two homes for behaviorally troubled girls, a maternity home, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping and model day care, 1,398 young people found help in troubled times last year.

During the past year BCH received \$1.5 million through the Co-operative Program, and \$724,000 through the Thanksgiving Offering. Total church gifts of \$3.05 million comprised 25 percent of the BCH budget.

In June 1997 ECH successfully completed the \$10.1 million “Light Their Way” Campaign to raise money for operations, capital needs and endowment. Two major priorities of the campaign will be completed in early 1998; the Winifred Lindsay Education/Administrative Center at Odum Home in Pembroke, and the John D. and Amelia W. Johnson Cottage at Mills Home. A third priority, the Hubert M. Craig Lodge at Cameron Boys Camp, has been completed.

A new video, “Families Under Construction” is available to promote the 1997 Thanksgiving offering, which has a statewide goal of \$750,000, the largest ever.

A model program for family preservation has been initiated at Mills Home in Thomasville. Two social workers are on staff to work intensively with families which are at risk of being separated, but who, with help, can overcome their issues and stay together.

Thomasville Area Director Bill Scarlett also is initiating ways for churches and their members to be directly involved on campus, from tutoring, to cooking, to spending early evenings giving personal attention to residents to free staff for more intensive counseling.

Baptist Children’s Homes’ work was featured in November on “The 700 Club” and in December on CNN. BCH also adopted a missions statement this year, which is “helping hurting children, healing broken families.”

Wherever people are hurting and families are strained, BCH strives to heal.

This service provides safe, structured, creative enrichment for seniors diagnosed with dementia-related disorders such as Alzheimer's disease, and provides relief for families giving in-home care to these dear ones.

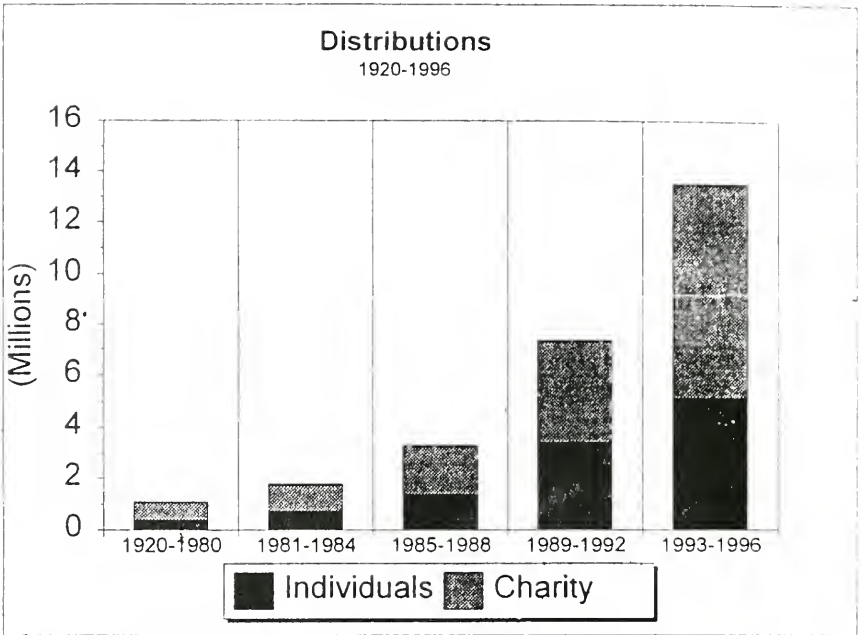

The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased individual collective financial support. The Baptist Foundation is committed to assisting individual church members through creative stewardship methods to provide permanent financial undergirding of these ministries.

As of December 31, 1996, the Foundation held \$60,892,220 under management. In 1996, \$2,600,680 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,259,082 was distributed to individuals for a total distribution of \$3,859,762.

The income distributions for the entire 77-year history of the N. C. Baptist Foundation totals: \$10,932,764 income paid to individuals and \$16,059,259 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$26,992,023.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER

FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1996-97

My first full year as Treasurer has been one of major changes. After Cora Neville's retirement as Director of Missions, Loraine Jarrett assumed this position and the Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association office was moved from The Levi Shores/John 3:16 Building to The BROC Building. Effective July 1, 1997, the office was closed and limited Association business was conducted out of the Director's home.

During the initial transition, I met with Loraine to determine the appropriate placement of certain resource material. Many items were placed in the Director's office where they would be accessible to member churches.

As the fiscal year progressed, a major concern was the decrease in funding compared with previous years. This concern was presented to the Executive Board on January 27, 1997. Churches responded generously; however, expenses soon devoured any headway.

Efforts were made to save wherever possible. A savings of \$3.75 per month was realized when Loraine requested that Skyline Telephone's answering service be discontinued, and the Post Office Box rent for February, 1997 through February, 1998 was paid by Cora Neville in appreciation for its use by John 3:16. Efforts continue to have the Association declared tax-exempt, thereby making it eligible for refund of sales tax paid. To date, this issue is pending.

Even though some small savings were realized, it was not enough to salvage continuation of Association business as previously conducted. Faced with continuing increases in expenses coupled with a decrease in funding, on June 30, 1997, the Executive Board voted to downsize the operation of the Association. Effective July 1, 1997, the formal operation of an office, along with related operating expenses (including phone service), was discontinued. The Committee voted to reduce the Director's hours to correspond with funding pledged by the Baptist State Convention. This reduction in operations was accomplished with the hope of restructuring and, at some future date, returning to a full scale operation.

Citing personal reasons, on May 19, 1997, I tendered my resignation effective August 31, 1997. During the year and a half I served as Treasurer, I have met and worked with some truly wonderful people and greatly value the friendships formed. I would like to thank each

and every one for their assistance and patience as I struggled through the learning process (which, by the way, is still not complete).

I am pleased that Dot Brooks has accepted the position of Treasurer. She has a real love for the Association which I'm sure will be reflected in her work.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE
FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1996-97

The Finance Committee consists of the Treasurer/Financial Officer of each member church; the Association Moderator; the Association Treasurer (who serves as Chairperson); the Association Clerk; and the Director of Missions.

Meetings are generally held two weeks prior to the Executive Committee's quarterly meetings - however, this schedule may be altered according to need. The Finance Committee is responsible for the review of financial reports before presentation to the Executive Committee. Such reports consist of Receipts/Disbursements; Receipts/Disbursements to Budget; and Church Support. The Finance Committee also discusses any pertinent financial business and prepares appropriate presentations to the Executive Board — including a proposed budget for the next fiscal year.

The first meeting of the 1996-97 fiscal year was held on March 10, 1997. Items reviewed included the on-going discussion with the state regarding tax-exempt status. It was determined that a declaration from the IRS would be cost prohibitive and the committee would pursue the issue directly with the state. At this meeting, guidelines were established for the purchase of equipment/supplies — which were later approved by the Executive Board. Also, guidelines for the distribution of food vouchers were discussed.

The next meeting was held on May 8, 1997. Issues discussed included expenses incurred in moving the Association office; upgrade of the computer system; the decrease in available funds; the possibility of additional churches joining the Association; and planning for the 1997-98 budget.

The final meeting of the fiscal year was held on July 29, 1997 for the purpose of preparing a proposed down-sized 1997-98 budget, to be presented to the Executive Board at their August meeting. The

decrease in the number of participating churches (from seven to five), the closing of the Association office, and the reduction in available funds were the contributing factors in this decision.

The Finance Committee has endeavored to assist the Association in carrying out its financial responsibilities. It is my sincere belief that they will continue this role with faith, hope and encouragement in the changing times ahead.

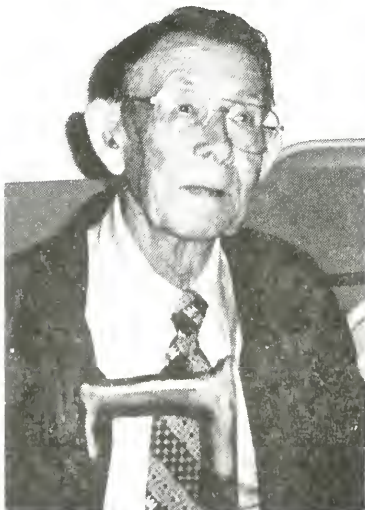

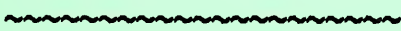

OSBORNE MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

Located in the Turkey Knob Community, Osborne Memorial Baptist Church was organized on September 26, 1943. The Turkey Knob School Building was purchased and church services were held there for a short while. At a special conference in October, 1943 it was voted to build a House of Worship. In the Church Clerk's Book #1, the following is recorded:

'Whereas it appears to us that there is a real need for a Missionary Baptist Church in this locality, and after prayer for divine guidance and consultation with brethren from Other churches, it is resolved that we now enter upon the organization of a church under the name of Osborne Memorial Baptist Church and that we adopt a church covenant, articles of faith, and rules of order as found in the first two pages of this minute book.'

A name for the church was selected by a committee composed of Pauline Osborne, Stella Parsons, Blanche Osborne, Annice Landreth, Evelyn Pettyjohn, and Blanche Young. They selected Osborne Memorial Baptist Church as the name of the organization.

On October 13, 1943; a seven member building committee was appointed. These members were Bays Parsons, C. E. Brown, Harry Young, Herbert Osborne, J. H. Pettyjohn, Lee Finney, and Clinton Young. The present church building was constructed on property donated by Mr. and Mrs. Andy Osborne near the Osborne Cemetery. Because the United States was engaged in World War II, building materials were rationed. Congressman R. L. Doughton had to secure the necessary special permits needed in order to build the church.

Mr. John M. Cheek, Moderator of Alleghany Baptist Association, an executive committee member, and the Rev. Bryce Barton assisted in the initial organization of the church.

There were twenty-two members enrolled as the charter members, namely, James Leff Osborne, Clinton Young, Ray Parlier, Annarae Pettyjohn, Ozena Landreth, Cam Delp, Evelyn Pettyjohn, Mary Kennedy, Bonnie Lee Brown, Pauline Osborne, Wanzoleen Landreth, Blanche Young, C. E. Brown, Bays Parsons, Stella Parsons, Phoebe Cox, Carrie Phipps, and J. H. Pettyjohn. Later, other members were added making sixty-three in charter membership. Charter membership was closed June 4, 1944.

Rev. Bryce Barton was elected pastor; Blanche Young, Church Clerk; and Mary Kennedy, Treasurer.

At the Annual Session of the Alleghany Baptist Association in 1944, the church made application for membership in the Association. The request was made by Harry Young, Ray Parlier, and C. F. Brown. The church was graciously accepted into the Association.

Since the initial organization, Osborne Memorial has maintained an active Sunday School, VBS, and other church organizations, always supporting the interests of the Baptist State Convention.

Throughout the years, many improvements have made Osborne Memorial an Up-to-date structure. Sunday School rooms were added in the basement in 1955. Dirt was hauled out by hand, in wheelbarrows. Beautiful stained glass windows replaced the glass windows in 1960. Later a central heating plant was installed.

In 1978 the sanctuary was enlarged by adding Sunday School rooms with folding doors. Rooms and hallways were carpeted. Restrooms were added, enlarged by adding Sunday School rooms with folding doors. Rooms and hallways were carpeted. Restrooms were added, as was a well for a supply for water. The pews were cushioned with beautiful material in 1981. Extra chairs and tables were purchased for Sunday School Rooms in 1983. Ceiling fans have been installed. A covered porch has been added as well as the driveway and parking lot being paved. A new roof was added and new carpeting in the vestibule and Sunday School rooms. Extra insulation was also added to the church building, and new storm windows.

A number of memorials have been made to the church. The communion set was given in memory of Monroe Osborne by his daughter, Mae Hungate. The communion table, the pulpit scarfs, table runner and the picture "Head of Christ" were given in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Leff Osborne by his children, Dennis and Karla Sue Osborne. The church bell is a memorial to Mr. and Mrs. Andy Osborne, given by their daughter, Pauline Stallings, and recently placed on a new stand with enhanced landscaping in the church yard. A podium was given to the church in memory of Teddy Pardue, by his parents Rev. and Mrs. J. T. Pardue. The brown "Church Hymnals" were given in memory of Stanley Osborne, by his mother, Mrs. Katy Finney. Additional "Baptist Hymnals" were purchased as a memorial to Mr. E. C. Minnich. A "Garden of Gesthaseme" picture was given in memory of Herbert and Fannie Osborne, by their children.

Osborne Memorial has ordained three ministers: Rev. Brady Farmer, Rev. Jimmy Warden, and Rev. Bob Murphy.

Pastors who have served the church are: Rev. Bryce Barton, Rev. Beauford Hash, Rev. Charlie McKnight, Rev. Hayes McClure, and Rev. J. T. Pardue. The Rev. Hayes McClure's faithful and devoted service covered a period of twenty-eight years. The present pastor is Rev. Russell Mabe.

Those who have served as church clerk are: Blanche Young, Carrie Phipps, Stella Parsons, Ray Parlier, Jim Leff Osborne, Raline O. Elledge, and Dennis Osborne. Those presently serving as deacons are: Burton Osborne, Clement Osborne, Dennis Osborne, Bays Parsons, Robert Richardson, R. S. Warden, and Tim Walker, who was ordained this year.

The church has furnished an Associational Moderator for the past thirteen years.

The Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association met with Osborne Memorial Baptist Church in 1993 as part of their 50th Year Celebration. This is the seventh time that the Association has met with Osborne Memorial Baptist Church.

Most of this historical report was originally written in 1967 by Mrs. A. O. Joines, with information supplied by Mrs. Ray Parlier and Mrs. Stella Parsons. Additional information also came from Mrs. T. S. Moxley's report to the 1985 Alleghany Baptist Association. Recent information has been supplied by Dennis Osborne.

"ADULTS-ON-MISSION"

A kind word, a kind deed, a warm smile, speaks volumes about who we are in Christ.

The Alleghany Baptist Association continues to work together in missions here in our county and reach out to state missions and beyond.

In September, 1997, a group of 6 persons met at Bellview Baptist Church to complete projects that were not finished at the August Adults-On-Missions Day. Some others met at night to complete jobs for elderly people.

October brought Adults-On-Mission Day to Laurel Springs Church and they chose Cora's Charities for their project. Some men mowed yards and some washed windows in the community, but the majority of the missions workers helped sort, size, wash, spot clean, and pack Christmas gifts in boxes, working a total of 37 hours.

In November Liberty chose to help again at Cora's Charities since so much needed to be done before Christmas, and 15 volunteers from all the churches worked on a Saturday.

December brought even more need for help at Cora's Charities, and Mt. Carmel chose for all volunteers to go there and help on Friday with preparation, and Saturday when over 500 needy children and families came to the distribution center to receive their Christmas gifts of clothing, foods, fruits, and toys.

Workers from Osborne Memorial also participated in the work days at Cora's Charities.

On December 6, 1997, the Association made a bus trip to Mills Home in Thomasville, with 12 persons making the trip. They toured the campus, church, and museum, and visited the Hagar Cottage for teenage girls. Ms. Barbara Foster was tour guide for the day. Supplies of paper products, apples, goodies, drinks, and other things were donated to the cottage.

April 18, 1998, the Association made a bus trip to Camp Mundo Vista in Asheboro. Eleven persons worked putting up paneling, dry-walling, painting, and putting sealer on paneling, working approximately 40 hours.

Proverbs 16:3 reads, "Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and your plans will succeed."

Week of Prayer and special offering for north Carolina Missions is September 13-20. Nearly 10% of this offering comes back into the county to help with mission work.

October 11th is World Hunger Day. Our churches and people need to work together to do all that we can to alleviate hunger, at home and abroad.

Remember November 15-22 is Week of Prayer and special offering for Baptist Children's Homes. I encourage each church to do something to help the children. By age 18 the average child will witness over 200,000 television acts of violence, including 16,000 murders. The children suffer verbal abuse, road rage, child peer-abuse, gangs, and elder abuse. BE A PEACEMAKER. You can reduce violence by uplifting godly values of respect, love, patience wherever there is neglect, hatred, and rage. Let's pray for our schools, teachers, and students, and be a good community member and a caring Christian at the same time.

Week of Prayer and special offering for Foreign Missions will be November 29 - December 5. John 14:17 states "For He dwelleth with you and shall be in you." We cannot witness from an empty cup. Begin each day reading Matthew 25:34-40. try being God's hands on Sunday, His voice on Monday, His ears on Tuesday, His feet on Wednesday, His eyes on Thursday, His smile on Friday, and on Saturday His heart.

Her voice steady and quiet, Christy delivers her personal story like a letter dropped into an anonymous mailbox at a shuttered house on a nameless street.

Her grandparents' murder had unleashed memories of her own abuse. Family members encouraged her to leave her home and repeatedly told her she was worthless.

"I've had a rough life," she says. "I've been through about anything I can possibly go through."

Christy admits carrying a short fuse and outbursts, physical abuse and a dangerous living situation brought her to Mills Home in November 1997.

She continues her quiet story about coming to Mills Home, about doing well in school, and tutoring two residents in Alumni Cottage. She's glad she can help, because "learning comes easy to me, and I want to help someone if I can."

Julie, her first child care worker at Mills Home, became a real friend who "helped me turn my life around," Christy says, her face at last beginning to brighten. "She was there for me when I needed somebody. My parents weren't there. Nobody wanted me. It was fun being around Julie. She showed me she cared about me and that I could be loved."

She Didn't Plan to See 16

Julie couldn't realize how important her friendship was, or how close Christy came to giving up. Christy admits to two suicide attempts, and believed she would never see age 16.

"I used to dread getting up," she said. "I didn't know if I would get my mouth busted or my arm broke."

Even now, there are days Christy doesn't want to get out of bed. But she does, and she goes to school and earns mostly "A"s and stars on the varsity basketball team, and tutors other residents in math, and went to New York for a summer basketball tournament and is planning to attend college to study a helping profession.

Now she is planning to live, not planning to die. BCH is giving her opportunities to live for.

Christy's story is repeated hundreds of times each year at BCH. Not all are as dramatic but every one tells of a young person and a family at the end of an unraveling rope.

At four residential campuses, two homes for behaviorally troubled

girls, a maternity home, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping and model day care, 1,560 young people found help in troubled times last year.

During the past year BCH received \$1.6 million through the Cooperative Program, and \$752,000 through the Thanksgiving Offering. Total church gifts of \$3.3 million comprised 18 percent of the nearly \$18 million in revenue. Because of a positive investment environment, BCH investments of endowment funds provided 33 percent of revenue.

Buildings Dedicated

Two major priorities of the \$10.1 million "Light Their Way" Campaign were dedicated: The Winifred Lindsay Education/ Administrative Center at Odum Home in Pembroke on Jan. 20, and the John D. and Amelia W. Johnson Cottage at Mills Home on May 12.

U.S. Congressman Mike McIntyre, co-chair of the Congressional Task Force for Responsible Fatherhood, spoke at the dedication of the Lindsay Center. He said BCH has the "purpose, people and passion" to successfully help children and families turn their lives around."

"When we reach out to our children we're making the best investment for tomorrow we could ever make for our country," he said.

Winifred Lee Herbert Lindsay, for whom the Lindsay Center is named, died Nov. 21, 1997.

Primary funds for building Johnson Cottage were given by Phil and Sharon Drake, of Franklin, in memory of Sharon's father and in honor of her mother, a BCH trustee.

"God has given me more than I deserve," Drake said in a brief, emotional address at the dedication. He said giving money to build the cottage was the "easy part" compared to the cottage worker's task of making a difference in children's lives.

Michael C. Blackwell celebrated his 15th anniversary as president of BCH on July 1, 1998.

The video, "A Long Walk Home" is available to promote the 1998 Thanksgiving Offering, which has a statewide goal of \$800,000, the largest ever.

HOSPITAL CELEBRATES 75 YEARS OF SERVICE

In May 1998 the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated celebrated 75 years of service to the community and region. During these years the hospital has been faithful to the vision of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention when the hospital was birthed: to extend the healing ministry which was demonstrated by Jesus Christ. Many challenges have been faced through these years, but the commitment to compassionately strive for innovative excellence has remained the same.

Baptist Benevolent Care Fund

Baptist Churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in 1924. In 1997 the MDO amounted to \$500,747. It was used exclusively to help patients who had little or no health care insurance or no other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From the offering this past year, well over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist Churches in North Carolina. May God bless all those who supported us with prayer and gave so generously.

Division of Pastoral Care

During the year the chaplains and staff of the Pastoral Care Department provide worship services in Davis Memorial Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday for patients and family members. The Pastoral Care Department staff supervised 64 students during the year and made more 53,000 ministry contacts.

The Department of Pastoral Counseling, Care Net, Inc. continues to expand its ministries. There are now thirteen Christian counseling centers located in strategic areas across the state. During the year these professionally staffed centers will provide over 26,000 hours of counseling.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc. continues to expand its mission of helping congregations become healthier communities of faith. **Programs and assistance** offered to churches include: Consultation, Intentional Interim Ministry, and leadership development. **Resources for ministers** include: Young Leaders Program, Turning Point, Interim Ministry Training, Intentional Interim Training.

Facts about Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center

- * With more than 10,000 employees, four restaurants, two banks and a post office that handles more mail than some towns, the Medical Center has been called a city-within-a-city.
- * The Medical Center successfully proposed to Forsyth County Commissioners to purchase the county's indigent health care clinic, Reynolds Health Center. The Center also serves as a primary care training facility for our medical students and residents. Construction is expected to begin in the spring on a \$5 million, state-of-the-art facility.
- * Building strong relationships with community hospitals and other academic medical centers was a hallmark of the past year. Hospital and clinical affiliations grew to 22 by December '97.

Points of Emphasis and Progress

ALS CENTER - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center has opened a specialized center to provide coordinated care for patients with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), often referred to as Lou Gehrig's disease. The Medical Center's ALS program is the only center in western North Carolina devoted to ALS patients.

TRAUMA CENTER - The Medical Center has the designated Level I trauma center for northwest North Carolina. In the trauma center our goal is for the patient who needs surgery to be in an operating room 10 minutes after arriving at the Emergency Department. Surgeons, anesthesiologists and staff remain on duty 24 hours a day to handle such emergencies

TOPS IN RESEARCH - According to a report in the February 1997 issue of *Applied Clinical Trials*, Wake Forest University School of Medicine ranked in the top 10 U.S. clinical research institutions.

RANKED AMONG THE NATION'S BEST - The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated is among the nation's hospitals in nine of 17 specialties, according to rankings published in the July 1998 issue of *U.S. News & World Report*.

NEW HEART VALVE - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center is one of the first centers in the country to offer a new "natural" valve replacement to patients with diseased or damaged aortic heart valves. The Freestyle valve was tested extensively in six centers –including Wake Forest University Medical Center - before being released for general use.

NEWEST TREATMENT FOR EPILEPSY - Wake Forest University Medical Center offers a new treatment for epilepsy – a "pacemaker for the brain" that can help control seizures in patients not helped by medication and are ineligible for surgery.

Bellview is very thankful for this past year and all the blessings God has so graciously bestowed. They continue to pray that they will be faithful to their calling in witnessing and seeking the lost for Christ.

BELLVIEW WOMEN-ON-MISSION

The women meet each 2nd Monday in the month at 7 pm with prayer. They discuss affairs that don't fall under church business meetings, to leave more time for Worship.

Some things accomplished in the past year were: Participated in Association Adults-On-Missions work days, organized a fish fry, churchwide, for the Labor Day Weekend, planned a Fall Festival for October which included a meal and games with the church family participating. In April the women organized and prepared the Easter fellowship breakfast inviting all the church family to attend. Gaye Scott organized a Biblical scavenger hunt for youth and children following the breakfast and before Sunday school time. Another "Share-a-Meal" was prepared and delivered, and workers ate together following the distribution of meals.

The women prepared and served a meal in May to the firemen and ladies auxiliary of the Laurel Springs Volunteer Fire Department for the wonderful work that they do.

In June we organized the pre VBS rally with invitations to all. This consisted of a cook-out, games, and prizes in preparation for Bible School, and prepared food at the end of VBS. In lieu of Father's Day lunch, we surprised the men with a Father's Day breakfast.

The church hosted the Chapelmen Singers from Pennsylvania in July, for a Saturday night singing at the Higgins Center in Sparta, and Sunday morning Worship at the church. The women prepared a fellowship meal at the church in appreciation to the singers.

The women planned another trip to the New River center of Care for the church. This time individual drinks, cantaloupe, and bananas were taken for each resident.

Friendship Sunday was celebrated in the church. Each person was to get a friend to attend Worship on Friendship Sunday and the Pastor recognized each friend. Everyone shared a meal together following the Worship service.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS 1998

It is a joy for the Christian Action League of North Carolina to serve the churches of this great state. We continue to work to inform the Christian community about the moral issues that face our state and nation. Our goal is to address these issues with the principles of God's Word, the cornerstone of truth.

A. Christian Values

* It was the pleasure of the Christian Action League to be one of the sponsors of the Third Annual Christian Heritage Week of North Carolina held March 15-22. The League encouraged schools, churches and communities to recognize, commemorate and learn about the Christian heritage and history of our nation. CAL sponsored a state-wide essay contest for high school students (public, private and home schools) and presented state winners with awards for excellence.

* Continued to promote Christian citizenship throughout the churches and communities of our state. CAL has distributed over 12,000 copies of the Ten Commandments to churches, schools and homes across North Carolina.

* Held a Church Leadership Legislative Day on June 23. The purpose of this day was to have pastors and church leaders to come together and enjoy fellowship, meet and hear some of our legislators and become more aware of how state government and the legislative process works.

B. Gambling

Lottery proponents continue in their efforts to bring a state-sponsored lottery to North Carolina. CAL monitors these efforts and updates the Christian community on lottery information through letters, calls and our fax and electronic mail networks. Lawmakers have continued to receive a barrage of communications from across the state saying that the lottery is a bad bet for North Carolina. CAL also monitored the work of the Legislative Study Committee on Bingo Regulations.

C. Sex Education

Worked with other Christian and pro-family groups to see that the state mandate for Abstinence Until Marriage education implemented state-wide. Also, supported efforts to insure that federal grant money designated to promote abstinence education was used properly. Informed citizens and legislators concerning attempts to fund school-based clinics in North Carolina.

D. Abortion

CAL promoted HB 303 (Ban Partial Birth Abortion), HB 536 (woman's Right to Know before Abortion) and HB 594 (Fetus Death from Criminal Act). We also encouraged lawmakers to maintain funding reductions and restrictions on the state abortion fund. These actions have resulted in only two qualifying abortions being paid with taxpayer funds in the last two years.

E. Alcohol

CAL monitored all legislation concerning alcohol and other drugs. Successfully supported efforts to strengthen DWI laws. Assisted communities in organizing committees to fight alcohol and drug abuse. Worked to defeat legislation that would have approved alcohol sales without the vote of the people. Provided awareness, education and resource materials related to substance abuse problems to churches, communities, etc.

CAL will host a national conference in September of the American Council on Alcohol Problems.

F. Pornography

Promoted and saw artified SB 452-Local Regulation of Adult Establishments. This legislation gives more authority to local communities to regulate and control adult entertainment establishments.

G. Homosexuality

CAL supports efforts to strengthen the traditional family and continues to monitor and inform the public about the activities of those who promote the radical homosexuzl agenda. Successfully lobbied against legislation that would have made homosexuality legal in North Carolina. Offered the video "on Wings Like Eagles", the testimony of deliverance from homosexuality by Micheal Johnston of Kerruso Ministries.

The Council on Christian Higher Education was founded by the Convention in 1944. It was established to assist colleges and churches within the Convention. The Council does not exercise any authority over the Baptist colleges. The competent leadership of trustees, administrators, and faculty guide them as they fulfill their missions. It does, however, study and recommend to the General Board in matters related to Baptist Colleges and the Baptist State Convention.

Four men have led the Council as its Executive Director. Claude Gaddy served as the Council's founding leader. Harold Cole served briefly. Ben Fisher succeeded him. T. Robert Mullinax joined the Council in 1971. Mullinax retired this year from the post he has faithfully guided for 27 years.

The Council and Executive Committee of the General Board invited Wayne D. Wike to become the Council's fifth leader. Wike comes to his post from the pastorate. He has served four North Carolina churches as pastor.

He and his wife, Debbie, are alumni of Gardner-Webb University. In addition, he is a graduate of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and Union Theological Seminary.

Wike has already served North Carolina Baptists in a number of ways. He served on the Committee on Committees, Chaired the Committee on Nominations, and Chaired the General Board Membership Study Committee.

Council members have greatly assisted each one of these leaders through the years. The college presidents, provosts, and chairmen of Boards of Trustees, along with an equal number of General Board members, serve as members of the Council.

The strength of the Council lies in its voluntary concept of community rather than competition. The Council has proven to be a mediating influence in relating the colleges to each other, to the church, and to the Convention.

The Council is currently involved in strategy planning. It is seeking to prepare for the new millennium. The future holds great promise. The Council and its member colleges want to be prepared for it. The Baptist churches in North Carolina will benefit as a result.

Installed new window well covers. Attended WMU at Ridgecrest for training. Sang Christmas Carols for shut-ins. Visited Children's Home. Held two Revivals. Hosted Florida Young People for worship service and attended their Wednesday evening cook-out and prayer meeting. Went

MOUNT CARMEL BAPTIST CHURCH

The church food closet ministry has met short term needs for 160 persons during the past year, and operates by grants, Scouting for Food Program donations, and individual donations of food and money. Volunteer worker shop, stock shelves, and meet the people to pack food boxes.

A Canon Copier was purchased in March and a 4-drawer filing cabinet was donated. A monthly church bulletin and calendar is provided for members and visitors.

A Memorial Garden was constructed for Scott Thomas Palmer, age 13 yrs. with flag pole, memorial marker, rose bushes, and other floral landscaping and completed on May 22nd. The Memorial & Dedication service was conducted on Sunday, May 24th.

A very successful VBS was conducted in early June with 89 enrolled and an average daily attendance of 74. Sunday School enrollment was 105 with average weekly attendance of 57.

Fall revival conducted in October with Rev. Mike Sage, Atkins, VA, was very successful, and spring revival with Rev. Jimmy Warden preaching dynamic messages was spiritually uplifting.

The church celebrated the glorious resurrection of Jesus Christ with an Easter sunrise service and fellowship breakfast. Later Sunday school and Worship were conducted. Mothers and Fathers were honored on their special days, graduation gifts were presented to 5 high school graduates, Memorial service and grave decoration in early July, and Communion service in August. Flowers were sent to 7 families where sickness and/or death had occurred, planted flowers around the church building, and presented the Pastor a Bible for Pastor Appreciation Day. Also, honored all Mothers and Fathers with gifts on their special days in Sunday school, and sang at several revivals and benefits.

Everyone enjoyed a dinner together at Mountain Surf in appreciation for the good job that the youth did with the church Christmas play, and a fellowship bus trip to Dixie Pottery, and a picnic and fun at Deer Creek, along with a lock-in at the church.

One member took part in key leadership training at Ridgecrest.

The annual covered-dish Christmas dinner was enjoyed by members and spouses, in which gifts were brought to take to a church member who resides in New River Center of Care. A fellowship cook-out was enjoyed by members and friends at the church pavilion in May.

The women continued to shower the adopted young person who needed extra special love and care with prayers and gifts until Christmas, and to support agencies of the BSC with mission money.

Mrs. Dorothy Brooks gave the Finance Commi Report and proposed budget for 1999-2000, which w approved upon motion of Everette Shaw and second Bruce Wood.

Bruce Wood gave the youth report which was approved upon motion of Bill Shaw and second of Da Taylor.

Luther Osment spoke representing the Baptist Retirement Homes.

The Auditor's Report by Vicky P. Bartlett was approved upon motion of Irene Wagner and second c Dan Taylor.

There was a suggestion that an Associational Revival be held rotating churches and having the hos pastor of each church preaching for that evening. Up motion of Irene Wagner and second of Dan Taylor, it decided that would be done.

There was special music by Liberty Youth.

Gary Scott gave the Nominating Committee report was approved upon motion of Everette Shaw and d of Bruce Wood. Election of the nominees was onducted.

After discussion of the extra work that Ross er had been doing as DOM and the in-house ing of the annuals and upon motion it was agreed is time would be increased from 8 hours per week hours per week. The motion carried.

The congregation sang "Take the Name of Jesus ou."

Mrs. Evelyn Parlier conducted the Memorial ce.

The Story Family sang special music.

Rev. Bill Yates gave a report from Baptist Hospital delivered the sermon.

After the benediction and blessing, a delicious was served by the ladies of Mt. Carmel at the ry Lane Community Center.

HISTORY OF MOUNT CARMEL MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH

The second "Missionary" Baptist Church to be organized in Alleghany County was the one with the Biblical name, Mount Carmel, on August 23, 1884.

Mount Carmel Baptist Church is located two miles north of Roaring Gap, just off Highway 21 near the Cherry Lane Volunteer Fire Department.

Volume 1 of the Clerk's book, "State of North Carolina, Alleghany County," contains the following entry:

The arm from Long Creek Baptist Church, (Surry County Association) met on August 23, 1884, near Woodruff Church. After Divine service was conducted by Elder J.K. Franklin and J.A. Jordan, was seated in fellowship. On motion, church door was opened for reception of members, and Elder J.A. Roberts, J.M. Jordan, C.P. McCann, Elizabeth Sparks, and J.F. Rash, joined by letter. The above being found orthodox in Baptist faith constituted a church. C.P. McCann, acting as spokesman for the body, and Elders J.A. Jordan, J.K. Franklin, and W.F. Byrd presbyterery. The Clerk's book was a large leather-bound one purchased from the Sunday School Supply Store in Raleigh.

The first one-room frame structure was built the year of organization and used until it collapsed in a windstorm in 1914. The place of Worship was then moved to the present site owned by the Orange County Presbytery which had constructed a one-room combination church-school building. In June 1928,

Carmel purchased the church building, furnishings, one acre of land for \$450.00. The church was dedicated in November 1929, when Rev. W. F. Latherman was pastor. The cemetery was established in 1935. Probably the first improvements were made in 1933 when Mrs. George Crutchfield, R. Jordan, A.C. Middle, and R. A. Crouse were appointed on a building improvement committee, and the church was ceiled with concrete. Some years later the drive around the church was made, building underpinned, electric lights installed, day school rooms added, and hardwood floors laid. A basement was excavated for additional Sunday school space, restrooms, and storage area. A picnic pavilion was constructed on the grounds in 1984. Foley A. and Janie Knight have twice donated land across the road for a parking lot. Numerous improvements have been made through the years in the form of renovations, expansions, and additions, with a ground breaking on August 7, 1987, resulting in the present beautiful carpeted sanctuary with its padded pews, stained glass windows, mounted life-size picture of Christ, modern sound system and lighting, piano and organ, ceiling fans, vinyl siding, new roof, insulation, expanded Sunday school rooms, central heating system and air conditioning, and driveway and parking lot paved. The latest ground breaking was on May 16, 1998, for a new addition consisting of handicap accessible restrooms and hall. A new water cooler was added in the hall. The church building bears little resemblance of the original spartan structure our forefathers used for Worship.

Rev. Charlie McKnight former Pastor and honor quest participated in a dedication service on January 31, 19

Mt. Carmel joined the Eklin Association in 1885, and in 1898 became a member of Stone Mountain Association, and since 1910 has been affiliated with the Alleghany Association in which it is geographically located.

Pastors who have shepherded God's people at Mt. Carmel are as follows: J.A. Jordan, J.A. Williams, T.M. Honeycutt, J.T. Faulks, A. McKnight, Arthur F. Absher, J.K. Franklin, R.K. Johnson, Grant Cothran, D.J. Roberts, John W. Brown, William Miles, W.L. Hoppers, P.H. Hays, S. Landreth Blevins, W. Franklin, Frank Weatherman, Charlie McKnight, Troy Blevins, Gwyn Blackburn, Fred Blevins, and Everette Shaw, who has served for forty-seven years. The church has no living former pastors.

The church has had the privilege of ordaining eleven ministers of the Gospel, and furnishing an Association Moderator for three years.

Church Clerks who have served are: J.M. Jordan, G.A. Gentry, D.J. Roberts, and Sowell Woodruff, who served from April 1926 to his death. Franklin Royal followed him and faithfully served from January 1942, August, 1971, as Clerk/Treasurer and Deacon. The church scholarship program was established in 1983 and was named in loving memory of James D. McKnight, who served as Clerk/Treasurer from August 1971 to August 1978, and was a Deacon, also, and Dorothy Shaw has served as Clerk/Treasurer since August, 1978.

Deacons were: C.P. McCann, J.F. Rash, Moses Woodruff, Aaron Cheek, Charlie Hanks, F.W. Royal, Martin Spicer, Paul Woodruff, Joe Irwin, Stewart Lyons, Howard F. Royal, Walter Crouse, Sr., J.W. Caudle, R.A. Crouse, A.C. Caudle, James D. McKnight, Bill Shaw, James Gillespie, Gary Osborne, Bill Edwards, Wayne Cleary, Larry Atwood, Dennis C. Crouse, Bruce Wood, Bradley Wooten, Michael Golds, and Christopher Reeves.

Among the gifts received by the church were: a communion set presented by the McKnight family in memory of C.S. McKnight, a pulpit Bible by the Will Miles family in memory of Homer Miles, a lawn bulletin board in memory of J.W. Caudle by Mrs. Mamie Caulde Lemmerman, a communion table for the sanctuary was donated by the Franklin Royal family, an anonymous gift of \$1400.00 was to be used for charity, and 100 new Church Hymnals. A beautiful church sign was designed, donated, and installed on Highway 21 by Ray Shaw, and a fifty-four passenger bus was donated by J.D. Higgins. A brass altar set including a cross and two collection plates valued at \$500.00 were received from an anonymous donor. An upright vacuum cleaner from Lillie Mae Halsey, a table for the Fellowship Hall from Rhumell McKnight, and a new outside bulletin board was constructed, and donated by a youth, Jason Blevins, as a 230 hour project to get his Eagle award in Scouting. With help from friends this project included a beautification program with landscaping, mulch, paint, and clearing brush on the church grounds. A \$5000.00 anonymous gift was received to gravel and pave the new parking lot across

the road.

The church has supported various agencies of the Baptist State Convention and the Alleghany Baptist Association through the years. The Sunday School was organized in June, 1939 for the summer months only, and has continued to function since that time. The WM was organized in 1983, and has been very active in missions, ministering to the needs of the community and surrounding areas, and reaching far beyond. The church participated in the World Missions Conference in 1995 and hosted the Missions Fair, presented "The Lord's L Supper" Easter drama, and helped the Association to present the drama "I Dreamed I Searched Heaven for You" in many churches throughout the county. In 1996 a new Church Directory was published, ten youth and their chaperones attended Western Youth Conference at Mt. Hill Campus, and sent a box of food to North Korea for the Famine Relief Project to help prevent starvation. All Sunday School rooms, Fellowship Hall, stairs, and hallways received new carpet, and a new State of the sound system was installed. On January 4, 1997, Bradley Dale Wooten was ordained into the Gospel Ministry. Bruce Wood was elected to serve a four year term on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention, and also served on the Western Youth Conference Committee. Janet Lanigan trained and served as a youth counselor in the Billy Graham Crusade in Charlotte, and nine people from Mt. Crmel attended September 27, 1996 along with 72,500 people. Twelve youth and two chaperones attended Western Youth

conference again this year at Mars Hill. Security lights were installed on the church building, and guard and hand rails installed at the basement steps. The Young Adults purchased and maintains a bus, and adds new landscaping around the church each year.

Membership at present is 224. Worship services are conducted every Sunday at 11 AM, Bible study on the second and fourth Sunday nights at 7 o'clock, and Wednesday night Worship services. The WMU meets on the 3rd Thursday of each month, and the youth meet on the 3rd Sunday evening with Choir practice following. There is no way to evaluate the influence of Mt. Carmel Baptist Church, for it has furnished a place of Christian worship for more than one-hundred fifteen years. As Christians living in these "end" times, we all realize the importance of having well qualified leaders to properly train our youth, and together we can persevere, and shape the destiny of our world. Let us pray that God will fill us with the Holy Spirit and we will do what He has called us to do.

I wish to express my gratitude to past Historians, Mrs. A.O. Joines and Mrs. T.S. Moxley for documenting the early history of our churches and making this report possible.

Three rocks beside her trailer house warned four-year-old Mamie not to tell anyone of the way her father was abusing her.

If she ever told, her father said, those would mark her grave and the graves of her two best friends.

"He had already killed my dog," says Mamie now, 16. "So I believed him."

When authorities discovered Mamie's abuse at the hands of her father, she was taken from him, and he was charged, but released on bond. He came to the house where Mamie was staying to kill the people in the house.

and her. But he was subdued. She heard him through the wall threaten her death while she cowered inside. Mamie's mother, who left the family when Mamie was six weeks old, attended her father's trial, but only "to see if Mamie looked like me." Mamie never saw her.

George and Linda Hogan, believing "every child deserves a childhood," took Mamie in and raised her as their own. They met her while delivering communion elements to her grandmother.

"It's been a struggle, but you do the best you can," said Linda, who suffers with diabetic ulcers. After her 71-year-old husband had a second heart attack, Mamie became too much for the couple to handle.

She lives now at Moody Home, a structured value change home for girls in Franklin, one of 13 facilities operated by Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina.

Shredding the Safety Net

Mamie pressed the boundaries of love, and George and Linda weren't physically able to pull her back to safety.

"I tried to push the boundaries a little further and a little further, to see how far I could push before they snapped. Finally, they couldn't take it anymore," said Mamie.

Baptist Children's Homes serves families who "can't take it anymore," who have children or grandchildren whose behaviors are out of bounds.

In 1998-99 BCH served 1,646 children and their families through 13 facilities statewide. BCH operates residential campuses in Thomasville, Pembroke, Kinross and Clyde; a maternity home in Asheville; a teen mother/baby home in Lenior; value change homes for girls in Franklin and Lenior; therapeutic camping in Cameron; crisis cottages at the residential campuses in Waynesville; and model day care in Thomasville.

Beginning with Easter 1999 and continuing through Thanksgiving 2000, BCH instituted a 20-month institutional emphasis of *"Quality Service Through Quality Relationships."* Michael C. Blackwell, president since 1983, is "committed to keeping our staff and our services fresh and vital to meet ever changing needs."

The emphasis places top priority on relationships to achieve the highest quality of service possible. The QSTQR operating theme will permeate every action, program, and effort within the institution and without.

The word "quality" has been overused and under-realized, and it too often cloaks mediocrity with imaginary value. There will be no such veneer at BCH.

Building and Renovating

BCH moved ahead its Odum Home campus in Pembroke to meet new challenges April 27, 1999 by dedicating two major campus renovations. Space for 100 boys was added to the old "main" building which was named Luther and Audrey Carter Hall, in honor of the donor couple who left their estate to BCH.

The former house was used for a director's residence and was renovated to serve five grils in transitional care and named for longtime trustee and supporters Abe and Jackie Elmore.

Total renovations increased capacity at Odum home from 28 residents to 45. Additonally, 10 day students from Pembroke Middle School will be served at the Winifred Lindsay Education/Administrative Center. These students have issues to resolve that do not require them to be in residential care.

At Cameron Boys Camp May 4, two important staff lodges were dedicated: the A.J. Fletcher Lodge and the Hubert M. Craig Lodge. These lodges provide staff housing, a rare commodity in wilderness setting in which Cameron Boys Camp operates.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL 1999 Report to the Associations

HOSPITAL CARRIES THE TRADITION

In May of 1999, The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated celebrated 76 years of service to the community and the region. During these years the Hospital has been faithful to the vision of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. When the Hospital was birthed, the Convention stated the reason for doing

so was: *to extend the healing ministry which was demonstrated by Jesus Christ.* Many challenges have been faced through these years, but the commitment to compassionately strive for innovative excellence has remained the same.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

Baptist churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in 1924. In 1998 the MDO amounted to \$530,874. It is used exclusively to help patients who had little or no health care insurance or no other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From the offering this past year, well over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist Churches in North Carolina. May God bless all those who supported us with prayers and gave so generously.

DIVISION OF PASTORAL CARE

During the year, the Department of Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education provided worship services in Davis Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday, as well as services in the J. Paul Sticht Center. Chaplain supervisors, residents and interns made more than 50,000 ministry contacts last year. Seventy-five students graduated from the Department's fully accredited Clinical Pastoral Education program. Maurice Briggs retired from the Department in February after 30 years of service. He was known throughout the Hospital

for his pastoral presence and the depth of his sensitivity and care.

The Department of Pastoral Counseling/Care Net, Inc. continues to expand its ministries. There are now 13 Christian counseling centers located in strategic areas from Franklin to Wilmington. During the year these professionally staffed centers will provide over 26,000 hours of Christian counseling.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc. continues to expand its mission of helping congregations become healthier communities of faith. Programs and assistance offered to churches include: Consultation, Intentional Interim Ministry, and Leadership Development. Resources for ministers include: Young Leaders Program, Leadership Development Group, Interim Ministry Training, and Intentional Interim training.

FACTS ABOUT WAKE FOREST UNIVERSITY BAPTIST MEDICAL CENTER

- * With more than 11,000 employees, four restaurants, two banks, and a post office that handles more mail than some towns, the Medical Center has been called a city-within-a-city. We are the largest employer in Forsyth and Guilford counties.
- * The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated has opened *Best-Health*, a community health information center, at Hanes Mall in Winston-Salem. The center will provide a library of books, audio and videotapes, limited Internet access, computer software, and a variety of on-site programs to help area residents become better informed about their health and how to remain well.

- * Building strong relationships with the community is important to us. A recent survey indicates that Medical Center employees donate more than 30,000 hours of volunteer service a year to more than 300 different organizations in our area.

POINTS OF EMPHASIS AND PROGRESS

Gamma Knife - The North Carolina Baptist Hospital Incorporated will have the only one in the state by this fall. Patients with inoperable brain lesions benefit from the availability of this noninvasive procedure that gives the same results as surgery but with no need to open the skull or make an incision. This procedure has been found to be three times more effective in treating recurrent cancerous brain tumors than other radiosurgical techniques. The Gamma Knife uses radiation to destroy tumors, vascular malformations and other benign brain lesions with pinpoint accuracy without destroying healthy normal tissue.

Trauma Center - The Medical Center has the only designated Level I trauma center for northwest North Carolina. In the trauma center our goal is for the patient who needs surgery to be in an operating room 15 minutes after arriving in the Emergency Department. Surgeons, anesthesiologists, and staff remain on duty 24 hours a day to handle such emergencies.

NASCAR - The North Carolina Baptist Hospital Incorporated is working with Motor Racing Outreach (MRO) to serve the fitness and rehabilitation needs of

NASCAR Winston Cup Racing. A mobile fitness and rehabilitation unit is being provided for NASCAR Winston Cup Racing drivers, crews and families.

Ranked Among the Nation's Best - The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated is among the nation's best hospitals in ten of 16 specialities, according to rankings published in the July 1999 issue of *U.S. News & World Report*. These 10 areas are: cancer, cardiology and heart surgery, geriatrics, gynecology, neurology/neurosurgery, orthopaedics, otolaryngology, rheumatology, digestive tract, and urology.

Newest Treatment for Epilepsy - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center offers a new treatment for epilepsy - a "pacemaker for the brain" that can help control seizures in patients who are not helped by medication and are ineligible for surgery.

The earliest version of the *Recorder* was founded in 1833 by Thomas Meredith, who had also been influential in the birth of the Baptist State Convention in 1830. The *Biblical Recorder* was owned and operated as a private enterprise in support of Baptist work in North Carolina until 1938, when the paper was purchased by the Baptist State Convention and incorporated as an agency of the convention.

A number of able editors have served the *Biblical Recorder*, which is widely acknowledged to be in the top echelon of state Baptist papers. The current editor is Tony W. Cartledge, whose tenure began on January 1, 1999.

The *Biblical Recorder* plays a strategic role in promoting God's kingdom work through North Carolina Baptists. On April 22, 1999, the Board of Directors of the *Biblical Recorder* adopted the following mission statement: "***Our Mission is to further Christ's kingdom by providing relevant news, insightful opinions and supportive resources to North Carolina Baptists in a timely and accessible fashion***"

The *Biblical Recorder* belongs to all North Carolina Baptists, and appropriately reflects the geographical, ecclesiological, and theological diversity that is typical of the churches making up the Baptist State Convention.

The editors and staff of the *Recorder* work diligently to offer a fair and balanced presentation of the news that most affects the life and ministry of North Carolina Baptists. Opinions advanced through editorials, letters, and analytical essays help to spark the thinking of North Carolina Baptists who want to make up their own minds about important issues. Feature stories about notable or innovative activities of churches and associations, regular reports on partnership missions efforts, and weekly commentaries on the most popular Sunday School lessons offer ideas, encouragement, and inspiration to readers of the *Recorder*.

To communicate more effectively and to present the most important news in a more timely fashion, the *Biblical Recorder* has developed a popular presence on the World Wide Web. The *Recorder's* website at <http://www.biblicalrecorder.org> offers Internet users an opportunity to read much of each paper's content several days before printed versions arrive. This is particularly helpful during the convention meetings and at other times when frequent updates are desirable. As time and resources allow, additional features will be added to make the website an even more valuable source of information for North Carolina Baptists.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS 1999

It is a joy for the Christian Action League of North Carolina to serve the churches of this great state. We continue to work to inform the Christian community about the moral issues that face

our state and nation. Our goal is to address these issues with the principles of God's Word, the cornerstone of all truth.

Christian Values

- * It was the pleasure of the Christian Action League to be one of the sponsors of the Fourth Annual Christian Heritage Week of North Carolina held in March.
- * Continued to promote Christian citizenship throughout churches and communities of our state. CAL has distributed over 14,000 copies of the Ten Commandments to churches, businesses, schools and homes across North Carolina. Promoted Sanctity of Human Life Sunday and National Day of Prayer statewide.
- * Held a Church Leadership Legislative Day on April 6, 1999. The purpose of this day was to have pastors and church leaders to come together and enjoy fellowship, meet and hear some of our legislators and become more aware of how state government and the legislative process works.
- * Promoted awareness of the worldwide persecution of Christians through faxes, email, and newsletter.

Gambling

Lottery proponents continue in their efforts to bring a state-sponsored lottery to North Carolina. Four lottery bills were introduced this session. CAL monitors these efforts and updates the Christian community on lottery information through letters, calls, and fax and electronic mail networks. Lawmakers have continued to receive a barrage of communications from across the state saying that the lottery is a bad bet for North Carolina schools.

Sex Education

Worked with other Christian and pro-family groups to see that the state mandate for Abstinence Until Marriage education is implemented state-wide. Also, supported efforts to insure that federal grant money designated to promote abstinence education was used properly. Informed citizens and legislators concerning attempts to fund school-based clinics in North Carolina schools.

D. Abortion

CAL monitored SB 349/HB 1066 (Act to Ban Partial Birth Abortion), this legislation would have made this type of abortion a class H felony for anyone who performed this late-term procedure. The bill died in committee. Successfully encouraged legislators to limit the State Abortion Fund to cases resulting only from rape, incest and the life of the mother. In the last four years, only one abortion has occurred under these circumstances using tax-payer funds.

E. Alcohol

CAL monitored all legislation concerning alcohol and other drugs. Successfully supported efforts to strengthen DWI laws. Assisted communities in organizing committees to fight alcohol and drug use. Informed citizens statewide about legislation that would have approved alcohol sales without the vote of the people. Four bills were introduced this session that would have permitted alcohol sales without a voter referendum; SB 17, SB 173, SB 607, and HB 1043. Provided awareness, education and resource materials related to substance abuse problems to churches, communities, etc.

F. Pornography

Worked against HB 1248 which would have allowed individuals to perform in the nude if it "occurs as part of a play, dance, performance or artistic creation that contains serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value." The bill died in committee.

G. Homosexuality

CAL supports efforts to strengthen the traditional family and continues to monitor and inform the public about the activities of those who promote the radical homosexual agenda. HB 884 and SB's 701, 884, and 759 were all introduced to promote the acceptance of homosexuality as an alternative lifestyle. CAL with other like-minded organizations fought these bills and they were defeated. Worked against HB 1398 (Needle Exchange Program) which would have allowed the state to furnish free needles to drug users using tax-payer dollars.

"N.C. Baptists have been involved in Christian higher education literally since the day the Baptist State Convention (BSC) was born," wrote Dr. Jim Royston, Executive Director-Treasurer, Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, for *The Biblical Recorder*.

Dr. Royston's correct. North Carolina Baptists have placed a high priority upon Christian higher education through the years. As a result, a large number of our pastors, staff ministers, and lay-leaders have been educated by one of our Baptist institutions, helping our churches develop as places where the Gospel is treasured and Christ is honored.

Maintaining close ties to our churches and associations is important to our institutions. This is one of the primary missions of the Council on Christian Higher Education. Founded in 1944, the Council seeks to foster good communications between our churches, associations, and institutions of higher learning.

Divinity schools and centers for congregational growth serve as positive demonstrations of our institutions' desire to enhance the life in our churches and associations. Current and future leaders are trained through these facilities.

According to the Executive Director of the Council on Christian Higher Education, Dr. Wayne D. Wike, "North Carolina Baptists are fortunate to have administrators and faculty members who are committed to enriching the life of our Convention."

Gifts to the Cooperative Program assist in helping our institutions fulfill their missions. Members from cooperating churches are eligible, as a result, to be considered for scholarships to attend one of our colleges or universities. In addition, North Carolina Baptists who meet the admission requirements for divinity schools at Campbell and Gardner-Webb Universities are eligible to receive \$8,100 grants toward their theological education. Students who choose to attend another divinity school are eligible to receive \$3,000 toward their educational expenses. All of these are made possible as a result of gifts presented to the Cooperative Program of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

As Dr. Royston wrote, "Baptist colleges are still a priority of our state Convention. It is my hope and dream that more and more students from our churches will attend our schools, and graduate as leaders for our state and nation, as well as for our churches."

Our colleges and universities share Dr. Royston's hope and dream. They, too, believe graduates from our campuses will make a difference in our state, nation, and Convention

very energetic and showed a faith I have never seen before. The neighborhood was very different. Many tall buildings and lots of cement. The Graffiti Mission house is a very touching place. We were invited to help with the after school program which involves 200 children. The workers walk to each school and pick them up, take them to designated areas and have a scripture lesson, help with home work and play games and then walk each child home. We fed 100-150 people on Wednesday night and some waited over an hour for one more piece of chicken. We had a service that night and when prayer time came some of the homeless were praying and it truly touched me to hear them praying for the Kosovow people, the people in Columbine after the terrible high school incident, and for the North Carolina folks who came to help them. We helped feed over 300 on Saturday. We attended their service and sang for them. The guys in the group replaced a shower stall in the mission house, replaced a door in the meeting area, replaced carpet in the student missionary's living quarters, and helped repair leaky pipes in the Spanish Baptist Church. Mary lives by faith. Her rent alone is \$896.00 monthly for her 300 sq foot apartment. Her income is about \$600.00 including her regular church supporters. She came here to visit and spoke at our church in May and many of the association's churches came and the results were terrific. She received about \$1200.00 and many cake mixes from that visit which allowed her to fund several children for summer camp and to buy sheets for the ones that did not have them to take with them. She has written and I have spoken to her by phone. They are still receiving gifts from our area. It is very much appreciated. I found many smiles and hugs and even tears when we left New York. It was a humbling and rewarding experience. I thank God for allowing me that opportunity.

State Evangelism Conference at Calvary Baptist Church in Winston-Salem on January 11 - 12, Dorothy Shaw attended the BSC Annual Meeting at the

Joel Coliseum, Winston-Salem, with nearly 500 in attendance, Bill and Dorothy Shaw participated in the Associational Soul-Winning Training at the Alleghany Inn Conference Room in Sparta where Rev. Bobby Earls, Icard, NC taught a very interesting, informative, and challenging training session. In August, DOM, Ross Wagner, Bill & Dorothy Shaw trained 12 others at Mt. Carmel. The church provided Winter Bible Study on "Joshua Courage For The Future" taught by Dr. James Frazier, retired Pastor and Bible Teacher, with 42 enrolled. Fall Revival was conducted with Evangelist, Mike Sage, and spring revival with Rev. Don Ball preaching dynamic messages. Mike Golds teaches Bible Study on the 2nd and 4th Sunday nights. Each 5th Sunday is designated as Youth Sunday, and children and youth participate in the Sunday School and Worship services. The church WMU, Youth, and Young Adults are very active with mission work throughout the community, county, state, and some international missions. The church supports each group with a monthly percentage of undesignated receipts. Volunteers operate the Food Closet.

Several people donated money and foods for the Associational Mills Home, Thomasville, trip for a cook-out for approximately 60 persons. Many enjoyed that trip from Mt. Carmel. The Pastor ministered to a cancer patient and her family every Sunday morning before Sunday school time for months, and others visited and helped with food, and a love offering was received for them also. The church helped provide food for a family

whose daughter was murdered, and a love offering was received for a family whose home burned. Also helped in benefit gospel singings, suppers, yard sales, and auctions. Alleghany Right-To-Life were sent donations as Mother's Day Honariums and Memorials. The church presented cakes to the oldest and youngest mothers and fathers on their respective days.

Installed two outside faucets and a water filter.

The group mowed an elderly lady's yard during the summer months, bought gifts for four Angel Tree Children at Christmas, presented monetary gifts to many people in need, and flowers for funerals and sickness. A donation was made to the Cherry Lane Volunteer Fire Department toward a new truck, and gave gifts to two new Deacons. Flowers were presented to all Mothers in Sunday School on Mother's Day and gifts to Fathers on their respective day. Also, contributed \$25.00 to Broughton Hospital Cheer Fund, and bought foods to take to the Baptist Children's Home in Thomasville. THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC 1998 ANNUAL REPORT

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in increasing an awareness among North Carolina Baptists of Christian estate stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions, and mission endeavors on a permanent basis. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by

the institutions and General Board staff merits increased financial support. The Foundation accomplishes these objectives by offering assistance in estate planning counsel, Will preparation, planned giving, charitable remainder trusts, endowment funds, and church fund management.

During 1998, the Foundation provided assistance to individuals in establishing 28 endowment funds, and 11 charitable remainder trusts totaling \$1.4 million and received \$3.8 in contributions to existing endowments all of which will ultimately benefit countless Baptist causes on a permanent basis. Programs were provided for 94 churches and associations during the year to promote Make Your Will Month, Christian Estate stewardship, and church fund management. Some \$639,000 from churches came under management to enhance numerous church ministries including scholarships, building funds, cemetery funds, benevolence funds, general operating funds and other various mission causes.

The Foundation employs professional money managers to invest these funds according to investment policy adopted by the Board. Four investment pools are offered: a growth fund, a balanced fund, an income fund, and a fixed income fund. During the third quarter of 1998, the Foundation enhanced its position even more by engaging the services of Salomon, Smith Barney to help select top money managers in the country.

As of December 31, 1998, the Foundation held \$80,874,628 under management. This is an increase of more than \$8 million over 1997. During 1998, \$1,741,923 was distributed to individuals and \$2,772,599 to Baptist work for a total distribution of \$4,514,522. During the 79-year history of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., \$14,217,160 has been distributed to individuals and \$22,305,008 to Baptist churches, institutions, and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$36,522,168.

Mt. Carmel Women-On-Mission contributed \$1000.00 to the church building program. Also, sponsored Pastor Appreciation Day and remembered him on his birthday and at Christmas with love gifts. The church secretary was presented a gift certificate for Secretary's Day.

Two of our members attended WMU Missions Extravaganza at Ridgecrest, and many attended the Winter Bible Study taught by Dr. James T. Frazier at Mt. Carmel. Also, four ladies took Soul-Winning training, learning to witness.

Our mission involvement includes working in the church food closet, buying \$500.00 in clothing, school supplies, and a few toys for several needy children in the lower grades of elementary school. The Bereavement Committee prepares meals in homes of members where death has occurred, and a ham and a package of coffee have been delivered to fifteen homes with death involved. Gifts of money have been made to thirty-four people with sickness, flowers have been sent on occasions, and numerous cards of cheer and sympathy have been sent. Also, monetary gifts have been made to those suffering hardship. Pantry showers have been hosted for five couples, baby gifts sent to three families with new additions, and two housewarming gifts for those fortunate enough to move into new homes. Also, wedding gifts went to two couples.

The WMU hosted a cook-out for all member's family and friends, and enjoyed a Christmas party with a covered-dish meal. Gifts were presented to all mothers in the Worship service on Mother's Day, and to all fathers on Father's Day.

We contribute money to many state agencies, and sent a box of food to Honduras during their crisis after Hurricane Mitch. A box of food will feed a family of four for one month. Also, participated in Operation Christmas Child.

The group earned their money by having a booth in the Heritage Fall Festival, preparing and serving breakfast and lunch during Choose-and-Cut Day, from the sale of cookbooks, and a monthly percentage from the church.

Mount Carmel Baptist Church WMU received a Growth Award in recognition of a 35% increase in total membership for the year, 1997-98 from Irma C. Duke, Executive Director-Treasurer of the N.C. Woman's Missionary Union.

HISTORY OF THE LIBERTY BAPTIST CHURCH

Only three other Baptist churches existed in Alleghany County, and seeing the great need of a Missionary Baptist Church in the Whitehead community, some of the good men and women met in New Salem on August 29, 1886, for the purpose of organizing Liberty Baptist Church.

Elder T.M. Honeycutt, whose portrait hangs in the church vestibule, was chosen moderator and Elder W.M. Hall secretary. A list of thirteen persons applying for membership was enrolled. At this organizational meeting the Articles of Faith and Church Covenant were adopted. Then they proceeded to elect Elder Honeycutt pastor and Ross McHargue as church clerk.

It is evident that the church was ready for business; because on the second meeting delegates were elected to the convention, and at the third meeting the committee on church location reported that half an acre of land had been secured from Meridith Richardson and wife "On the Little River on the east side of the road from W.L. Hoppers store at Air Bellows Gap for five dollars with two dollars off the price." Soon a one-room frame building was constructed and furnished with handmade pulpit, pews, and table. In 1899 an organ was presented to the church by Professor Charles E. Taylor of Wake Forest College.

The same year that Liberty was constituted it was one of three churches in the county that participated in organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association, with the Pastor as instigator. In 1890 a delegate was sent to the Convention and a monetary gift sent to the State Board.

For more than a century Whitehead has been a religious center for the people of the area. The first church established in the community was in 1834. It was evangelistic and grew rapidly until the latter part of the nineteenth century when it became anti-missionary. Many of the members withdrew and some became the first members of Liberty. These progressive members favored a more friendly interest in missions, benevolent institutions, secular and religious education that were promoted by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Baptists believe in training, so a Sunday School was organized, supposedly by Joseph F. Cheek, in the early history of the church. This has been maintained through the years. The Training Union was organized by Kemp M. Estep and was possibly the first in the association. The Woman's Missionary Society had its beginning in 1924 with Mrs. N.C. Teague, organizer, and Mrs. T.J. Fender the first president. Liberty was among the first to have a Vacation Bible School.

Before the state supported high schools, the Alleghany Association, with adjoining ones, fostered Oak Hill Academy and Mt. View Institute. These were supported by the church with both gifts and students. The early

Christian training had a lasting influence, for many have become preachers, teachers, deacons, and church leaders.

The first minister ordained was Franklin B. Cheek in 1890. Later the same year David M. Stamper was "liberated to exercise his gift in public."

The church enjoyed a steady growth until 1909 when the building became inadequate. An additional acre of land was purchased to enlarge the church grounds. The building committee elected was Fielden W. Cheek, T.C. Shepherd, Arthur Fender, Mack D. Wagoner. The contract for the present building was given to Fielden Caudill. The design is the symbolic church with gothic shaped windows, tall spire over the belfry that supports a huge, sweet toned church bell, supposedly a gift from Mr. and Mrs. J.T. Fender. Additional pews were made from choice chestnut and broad oak boards grown in the virgin forest. A modern pulpit replaced the outmoded one and about 1924 a piano was purchased. The pulpit and communion chairs were presented years later as a memorial to Mrs. Fielden W. Cheek by her son, Foster F. Cheek.

Many crystal springs is the source of the Little River that has been used for baptizing as was the Jordan in Christ's time.

A wise investment was made in 1905 when Whitehead parsonage and 40 acres of land was purchased for a pastor's home, by Laurel Springs, Liberty, New Hope, Pine Fork, and Sparta churches. The old

dwelling was soon replaced with a two-story frame house. As planned by the Association, for rural churches to provide a home for their pastor. Liberty constructed a new home in 1947, and from time to time added improvements.

In years gone by pastors served a number of churches traveling on horseback. To alleviate these hardships the association purchased a car for the pastor, and Liberty participated.

Another acre of land was purchased in 1910 by William Bryan Cheek for a church cemetery. More land was bought to enlarge the cemetery in 1956. A three thousand dollar trust fund was set up in 1945 for the purpose of changing the cemetery to a separate perpetual care cemetery. The first grave was that of Mrs. William Bryan Cheek in 1911.

Some former members have maintained an interest in the home church and have been most generous in its support. Among the gifts have been: a communion service, carpet, song books, offering plates, hard surfacing drive, lawn improvement, and brick church sign. The church was also remembered with sizeable sums of money in the wills of J.T. Fender and Mrs. Edna Johnson.

In 1969 the church, through money borrowed from the Baptist State Convention, had the church lifted from its foundation and moved aside so that a basement with Sunday School rooms, a kitchen, and bathrooms could be built, and a furnace installed. The clerk felt so strongly opposed to the church being mortgaged that she resigned rather than sign the necessary documents. She continued to give strong support, and was re-elected clerk within a

short period. The services were held in Whitehead Community Building during the time of construction.

Used pews and pulpit furniture were purchased from a church in Orange County after the work was finished on the church. The electronic organ, given in memory of Randy Cleary, was first used on April 18, 1971.

About 1965, the church had no resident deacons and the pastor invited deacons from another church to assist in the observance of the Lord's Supper.

Ross Wagner represented the Association on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention from 1981 to 1984, as possibly its youngest member, being twenty-one years of age when his term began. Ross grew up in Liberty Baptist Church, finished college, then joined the Mission Service Corps, and has served with Baptist Student Union at the University of Minnesota-Duluth. He has received monthly contributions to help with his support.

Other improvements of the church have been the installation of storm windows, the building of an enclosed pavilion and handicapped entrance, refinished floors, new paint and carpet, and replaced two small furnaces with one large unit.

Easter sunrise services have been held continuously since 1971.

Thomas Neville was ordained to the ministry on September 7, 1980.

Mrs. Marie Caudill Holbrook served 30 years as church treasurer.

Mrs. Leonis C. Joines, member of Liberty Baptist Church and former Associational Historian (1961-1972)

expired in November, 1993, at the age of ninety-nine. She was an organizer, educator, mother, leader, and orator. She researched and recorded the history of the Alleghany Baptist Association from its beginning, and preserved original Associational annuals (1886 - 1964), and with the financial help from her family, had them bound in two volumes, and presented them to the Association. At her death a second set (her personal set) was donated to the Alleghany Historical Society, and is available for reference in the Alleghany Library. She was an outstanding Christian worker, who gave of her God-given talents and abilities to the Glory of God.

Leonis served as church clerk for twenty-three years.

Liberty Baptist Church had its Centennial celebration in 1986 with former pastors on the program.

The church participated in the World Missions Conference in 1994, and conducts Vacation Bible School annually.

Pastors serving the church include: Revs. T.M. Honeycutt, J.D. Harris, James Shumate, James W. Burchett, Callie Blevins, Ezekiel Blevins, J.F. Fletcher, George Reeves, P.H. Haire, W.L. Blevins, W.L. Hoppers, C.H. McKnight, Arthur Absher, R.G. Blackburn, E.A. Barton, Fred Blevins, James Revis, Cleo Whitley, Charlie Freeman, James Durham, Lynn Powers, J.T. Pardue, Richard Spera, and Ralph Smith (from 1972 to present).

Church clerks who have served include the following: Ross McHargue, D.M. Stamper, J.M. Wagoner,

J.F. Cheek, William Reeves, Fielden W. Cheek, R.V. Thompson, W.B. Reeves, W.B. Cheek, Vaughn V. Shepherd, Kemp M. Estep, W.L. Edwards, J.T. Fender, Mrs. E.E. Caudell, James Caudill, Mrs. W.O. McCracken, Mrs. Leonis Joines, William Ketchum, and Walton Joines.

Deacon list is composed of: Stephen Hoppers, D.M. Stamper, J.M. Wagoner, Fielden W. Cheek, H.C. Edwards, W.P. Maxwell, T.C. Shepherd, J.K. Blum, E.L. Wagoner, A.O. Joines, James Caudill, John Blum, F.A. Wagner, Andy Cleary, Clarence Toliver, Dewey Hoppers, Walton Joines, Roger Mabe, Ricky Hamm, and Bill Lane.

The church continues to have 2 revivals most years, Vacation Bible School, Sunday School, worship service and mid-week Bible study.

For several years the church has hosted a youth group from First Baptist Church, Auburndale, Fl. They do the morning worship service, leave their instruments in the church during the week and use the church for their evening vesper services. On Wednesday evening the members of the church are invited to their campground for cook-out before returning to the church for services. There were about 80 attending in the year 2000 and each year several of the young people have been saved. The church furnished lunch for the group this year.

In 1998, the old storm windows were replaced with double-pane windows which greatly improved the looks of the building and helped with heating and cooling

In 2000, a piano was purchased with memorial fund money in memory of Mabel Estep Richardson.

New tables and chairs were purchased for the classrooms.

Tom Neville served for a period as assistant pastor. Roy Houser now serves as assistant pastor.

We are blessed by God in this work because we honor God in relationships.

During the QSTQR emphasis, all BCH staff at every ministry point have made extra efforts to strengthen relationships with the people we encounter. We have incorporated the terms, quality, service and relationships into a plan of action. We have reflected our desire for quality relationships in everything we do in order to deliver quality services that change lives. QSTQR, celebrating the mission...the millennium...the minstry, was BCH's theme from Easter, 1999 through Thanksgiving, 2000.

Through Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, hundreds of children and families are given new hope for their futures...

Children like Linda and her two younger sisters. Linda feared for their well being. It was her responsibility to care for her sisters. Linda remembers moving to a shelter where she finally felt they were safe; there was enough food for the sisters and warm beds. The three children were later placed at BCH. Now, Linda is in a place where others care for her. Linda has discovered God cares for her, too.

The McDonalds found the challenge of being a blended family difficult at times. Their son began to exhibit anger toward his parents. He would challenge their authority and began getting in trouble with some neighborhood kids. The situation was getting out of control. Corey's parents called BCH, where they found a staff willing to embrace their family with hope. Today, Corey has began to deal with his anger, mistrust, and behavior issues. His parents are learning how to better communicate with each other and with Corey.

During the past year, BCH served 1800 children and families through 13 facilities statewide. BCH operates residential campuses in Thomasville, Pembroke, Kinston, and Clyde; a maternity home in Asheville; a teen mother/baby home in Lenior; values change homes for

girls in Franklin and Lenior; therapeutic camping for boys in Cameron; emergency care cottages at the residential campuses and in Waynesville and Asheville; and a model day care center in Thomasville.

In 2000, BCH began a new, innovative ministry caring for developmentally disabled adults and their families. Our Trustees unanimously approved a major undertaking this year by committing more than \$3.5 million to replace, repair, construct and make-much needed improvements at every BCH location. Most of the work is complete. You are invited to visit our campuses and other facilities to see first hand the difference you are helping us to make.

The commitment to quality has been a cornerstone of this institution since its beginning. **"Quality Service Through Quality Relationships"** was a 20-month public demonstration of this cornerstone. The emphasis places top priority on relationships to achieve the highest quality of service possible. Significant growth has been realized during this period. BCH has dedicated new structures at Odum Home, Cameron Boys Camp, Kennedy Home, Broyhill and Mills Home campuses and added new work in Waynesville and Asheville as well as Moody Home, Care House, Noel Group Home. Several significant anniversaries have been observed: the 85th of Kennedy Home in Kinston, the 30th of Baptist Maternity Home in Asheville, the 20th of Cameron Boys Camp, the 40th annual Western Area Conference, and the 115th anniversary of Baptist Children's Home of North Carolina.

To help commemorate BCH's 115th anniversary and to celebrate the impact QSTQR has had on staff and children, approximately 600 children, administrators, childcare workers, social workers and staff were brought together June 28, 2000 from around the state for a day of inspiration, fellowship, food and fun. **"The Family Gathering"** was held at Mills Home where BCH began in 1885. This is the first time all the Baptist Children's Homes' "family" have been together at the same place and at the same time.

Baptist Children's Homes QSTQR emphasis will culminate at Thanksgiving. We invite you to attend BCH's 30 minute presentation at the 2000 annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention in Winston-Salem on Tuesday, November 14, 2000 at 2:10 pm. We encourage you to be part of our ambitious \$1 million Thanksgiving Offering goal. That number may seem enormous, but there is also enormous need. For all the good North Carolina Baptists are doing to help children and families, there is still so much that needs to be done. We are confident our churches will help us meet this important goal!

The support of North Carolina Baptists through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Program, and individual gifts, memorials, honors, bequests and estate gifts help enable us fulfill our mission statement: **"helping hurting children . . . healing broken families."**

During these years the hospital has been faithful to the initial vision of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. When the hospital opened the convention stated the reason for doing so was: to extend the healing ministry which was demonstrated by Jesus Christ. Many challenges have been faced through these years, but the commitment to compassionately strive for innovative excellence has remained the same.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

Baptist churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in 1924. In 1999 the MDO amounted to \$531,452. These funds were used exclusively to help patients who had minimal or no health care insurance and had no other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From the offering this past year, well over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist churches in North Carolina.

SCHOOL OF PATORAL CARE

During the year the Department of Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education provided worship services in Davis Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday as well as services in the J. Paul Sticht Center. Chaplain supervisors, residents and interns made more than 50,000 ministry contacts last year. The Department's fully accredited Clinical Pastoral Education program graduated 65 students.

The Department of Pastoral Counseling, CareNet, Inc., continues to develop its ministries. There are now 16 Christian counseling centers located across the state. The newest center is now open in Greenville and is the staging ground for serving northeast North Carolina. During the year these professionally staffed centers provided 27,293 hours of Christian counseling, making CareNet the largest pastoral counseling system in the United States.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc. continues to develop its mission of helping congregations become healthier communities of faith. **Programs and assistance** offered to churches include Intentional Interim Ministry, strategic planning, staff and team development, and conflict management. **Resources for ministers** include: Young Leaders Program, Leadership Development Group, Interim Ministry Training, and Intentional Interim Ministry training. The Center has served an average of 21 North Carolina Baptist congregations a month during the past year.

FACTS ABOUT WAKE FOREST UNIVERSITY BAPTIST MEDICAL CENTER

- * With more than 9,600 employees, we are the largest employer in Forsyth and Guilford counties.
- * A Certificate of need was granted for a 47,000 square foot Downtown Health Plaza to be built replacing the Reynolds Health Center, which provides health care for underserved people in Forsyth and surrounding counties.
- * Building strong relationships with the community is important to us. A recent survey indicates that Medical Center employees donate more than 30,000 hours of volunteer service a year to more than 300 different organizations in our area.

- * Construction has begun on a 350,000 square foot addition atop Ardmore Tower. This will provide more space for Brenner Children's Hospital as well as addition operating suites and private patient rooms.

ADDITIONAL POINTS OF EMPHASIS AND PROGRESS

New Dental Program For Indigent Children - Baptist hospital has become a major participant in a community partnership to provide dental care for indigent children. NCBH opened a dental clinic on May 8, 2000, where three dentists are treating hundreds of children who previously had little or no access to dental services. Children who had known dental pain as a way of life, or who never had routine services because their parents could not afford it, are now being treated.

Physician Excellence - In 1999, 600 physicians in North Carolina were listed among "The Best Doctors in America"; 95 are WFUBMC physicians.

Nursing Excellence - Baptist Hospital was one of the first hospitals in the nation to receive Magnet Recognition for Excellence in Nursing, demonstrating exemplary nursing leadership and quality patient care from the American Nurses Credentialing Center, the nation's leading nursing credentialing organization.

Ranked Among The Nation's Best - North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. continues to be ranked among America's best hospitals in ten of 16 specialties, according to rankings published in the July, 2000 issue of *U.S. News & World Report*. This ranking reflects the reputation of specialists at NCBH as seen by their peers across the nation.

Newest Treatment For Epilepsy - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center offers a new treatment for epilepsy - a "pacemaker for the brain" that can help control seizures in patients who are helped by medication and are ineligible for surgery.

Since 1833, the *Biblical Recorder* has served North Carolina Baptists as the official news journal of the Baptist State Convention. Founded by Thomas Meredith, the *Biblical Recorder* was owned and operated as a private enterprise until 1938, when the paper was purchased by and incorporated as an agency of the Baptist State Convention.

The *Biblical Recorder* promotes God's kingdom work in accordance with its mission statement: "***Our Mission is to further Christ's kingdom among North Carolina Baptists by providing relevant news, insightful opinions and supportive resources in a timely and accessible fashion.***"

As an agency belonging to all North Carolina Baptists, the *Biblical Recorder* provides balanced news coverage of Baptist news from throughout the state and reflects opinions representative of the diversity that is typical of our churches. The *Recorder* also includes periodic features designed to offer ideas, encouragement, and inspiration to readers.

In keeping with current needs, the *Biblical Recorder* maintains a frequently used site in the World Wide Web. This site (www.biblicalrecorder.org) offers Internet users an opportunity to read much of each paper's content several days before printed versions arrive. This particularly during convention meetings and at other times when frequent updates are desirable. As time and resources allow, addition features are being added to make the site an even more valuable source of information for North Carolina Baptists.

The *Biblical Recorder* works in partnership with the Baptist State Convention and receives annual support from Cooperative Program gifts as an agency of the Convention. This support makes it possible to offer the *Recorder* for just pennies per issue. The *Biblical Recorder* has not raised subscription rates in five years, but a string of steep postage hikes will almost certainly necessitate modest increases in subscription prices beginning in 2001.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS 2000

It is with humble gratitude that the Christian Action League of North Carolina serves the Lord Jesus Christ and the churches of this great state as a Beacon of light, guiding referendums and legislation through the murky waters of special-interest groups and educating God's people about the moral problems in our state and nation. Our goal is to encourage and organize the people of God so that our light will be seen brightly throughout our state, and when we speak, it will be in one accord and will resound loudly.

A. Christian Values

- a. The Christian Action League again co-sponsored the Fifth Annual Christian Week of North Carolina held in March. It was our pleasure to provide awards for excellence to those high school students who won the essay contest on America's Christian background.
- b. CAL has continued to promote and distribute copies of the Ten Commandments throughout North Carolina. To date over 15,000 copies have been mailed.
- c. Promoted awareness of worldwide persecution of Christians (particularly in Sudan) through email alerts and radio.
- d. Participated with the American Family Association in distributing copies of our national motto posters "In God We Trust".
- e. Joined with Family Life Ministries in promoting and distributing copies of Marriage Covenant Certificates.
- f. Participated in the National Day of Prayer.
- g. Set up CAL exhibit at Baptist State Convention and the East and West Districts of the Wesleyan Church conferences.
- h. Worked in the General Assembly to stop a bill that would allow physicians to take immediate custody of a child that they felt had been abused. The bill died in committee.

B. Radio

"Christians In Action", Station WAGO (88.7FM) Snow Hill, started Monday, January 3, 2000. This broadcast consists of a five-minute commentary on issues that affect our lives today. We will begin airing this program on Aug. 7 on New Bern (WAAE, 91.9FM). Our projection is to ultimately reach the whole state.

C. Gambling

- a. Video Poker Machines - The Christian Action League worked round the clock to get video poker banned in this state. We failed getting the ban but were successful in getting SB 1542 to strengthen the law and restrict the operation and expansion of video gambling in the state. We will work vehemently next session in pushing for a ban.
- b. Joined Christian Coaliton in survey on how Gubernatorial candidates stood on lottery/released results in newsletter.
- c. Next session the Christian Action League will be on the front line in the Legislature fighting a state-sponsored lottery.

D. Abortion

- a. CAL has purchased the rights through donations of a surgical procedure on a 21-week old fetus that proves that partial-birth abortion is murder. We want to see this picture used extensively in making our case for the pro-life agenda.
- b. CAL participated in the Right to Life Rally held in Raleigh.

E. Alcohol

- a. Participated in four LBD campaigns since January 11, 2000, and there were three scheduled for a September referendum. We help with their organizational meetings, rallies, and providing educational materials.
- b. Worked in the General Assembly for passage of HB 1499-Interlock/Open Container law. This bill bans open alcohol containers in the passenger area of a motor vehicle on the highway or highway right-of-way. The bill was ratified on July 13.

F. Pornography

Have produced and aired several radio programs to inform the public of the internet pornography crisis. Educate communities on how they can rid their neighborhoods of adult establishments.

G. Homosexuality

CAL monitors and informs the Christian community of the current homosexual agenda through email alert.

The Christian Action League of North Carolina produces a quarterly newsletter *The Beacon* that has a distribution of 21,000. We also send out an email alert every Friday to over 150 members to keep them abreast of current moral, ethical and political issues that affect our state and nation. All services of the Christian Action League are provided at no charge. We depend on God's people to provide for His work.

COUNCIL ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

Baptist State Convnetion of North Carolina 2000

Christian higher education represents one of our enduring values as North Carolina Baptists. From the founding of our Convention in 1830, we have supported Christian higher education. Our churches, associations, and state have benefited as a result.

Last year North Carolina Baptists provided special scholarship assistance to members from our churches who chose to attend one of our affiliated colleges or universities. Sixty-eight of our eighty associations were represented among the hundreds of students who received this special Convention sponsored scholarship assistance.

The institutions matched the Convention's support of these Baptists students through institutional support. For every dollar provided to students through the Cooperative Program, the institutions matched it with \$2.50 of additional financial assistance. Forty-five percent (45%) of the on-campus student populations are Baptists.

In addition to support of undergraduates, North Carolina Baptists assisted 297 divinity school students last year. This financial assistance was made possible through churches giving through optional giving Plans B and C. Members from our churches who have sensed God's call upon their lives to serve as ministers or missionaries are eligible to receive a theological educational grant from the Convention.

If a student pursues their degree from the divinity schools at Gardner-Webb or Campbell, the student is eligible to receive a grant of \$8,100. If a student pursues his or her theological education from other institutions, the student is eligible to receive a grant of \$3,000 for their studies.

Reverend Shane Kirby recently graduated from the M. Christopher White School of Divinity at Gardner-Webb University. Upon graduation, Mr. Kirby said, *"I couldn't be more happy that I was able to receive my master's at a North Carolina Baptist institution. I look at it like the Baptists of this state invested in me. Now, I feel a sense of responsibility to the good people of my denomination to serve them."*

North Carolina Baptists can take pride in graduates, like Mr. Kirby, who want to serve our Lord and his churches in North Carolina.

Without the faithful support of the Cooperative Mission Budget of the Baptist State Convention, opportunities for our members to attend Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, or Wingate would not be possible.

Thank you North Carolina Baptists for your continued support of Christian higher education in our state.

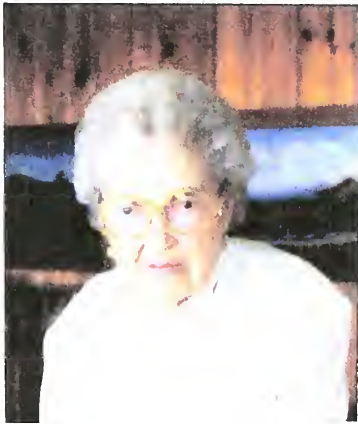

February 15, 2000, volunteer workers began to convert the Picnic Pavilion into a new Fellowship Hall, with kitchen, hall, two rest rooms, and basement, which included central heat and air conditioning. It was nearing completion in late August.

The church received two new members by baptism. Vacation Bible School Enrollment was 109, with mission offerings of \$134.62 each, going to Cora's Charities, Gideons International, and Samaritan's Purse. The Sunday School had 103 with average weekly attendance of 65. Winter Bible Study was taught by Ross Wagner, DOM, with good attendance, and Mike Golds teaches Bible Study on the second and fourth Sunday nights. Fall revival was conducted with Rev. Volunteers shop and stock shelves, and meet the clients.

Dorothy Shaw, Assn. WMU Director, attended W.M.U. Extravaganza at Ridgecrest. Four attended State Evangelism Conference at Calvary Baptist Church in Winston-Salem.

The church received a \$500.00 gift in loving memory of Scott Thomas Palmer's 16th birthday, to be used for youth. A TV and VCR were purchased in his memory. The church cemetery fund received a \$2,000.00 gift from the Effie Lauffer Estate. Many memorials and honorariums were received for the Fellowship Hall.

The church celebrated the resurrection of Jesus Christ with an Easter Sunrise Service, a fellowship breakfast. Mothers and fathers were honored on their special days. Rebecca Todd was presented a Bible for graduation. Memorial Service and grave decoration were observed. Pastor Appreciation Day and lunch, and New Year's Eve service. Youth Sunday is observed every 5th Sunday. The church contributed to agencies of the State Convention, Jesus Video, and local missions such as Gideons, Samaritain's Purse, etc.

The church participated in benefit Gospel Singings, a tent revival, and 21 fruit baskets were delivered at Christmas to the sick, elderly, etc.

Three turkey dinners with all the trimmings were delivered. Christmas carols were sung in 12 homes. A young woman joined the church following the Christmas play and program.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in increasing an awareness among North Carolina Baptists of Christian estate stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions, and missions endeavors on a permanent basis. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased financial support. The Foundation accomplishes these objectives by offering assistance in estate planning counsel, Will preparation, planned giving, charitable remainder trusts, endowment funds and church fund management.

During 1999, the Foundation provided assistance to individuals in establishing 20 endowment funds and 12 charitable remainder trusts totaling \$3.8 million and received \$2.8 million in contributions to existing endowments all of which will ultimately benefit countless Baptist causes on a permanent basis. Programs were provided for 122 churches and associations during the year to promote Make Your Will Month, Christian estate stewardship, and church fund management. Over \$3 million from churches and institutions came under management to enhance numerous ministries including scholarships, building funds, cemetery funds,

benevolence funds, general operating funds and other various causes.

The Foundation employs professional money managers to invest these funds according to an investment policy adopted by its Board. Four investment pools are offered: a growth fund, a balanced fund, an income fund and a fixed income fund. The Foundation uses the services of Salomon Smith Barney to help select top money managers and evaluate performance.

As of December 31, 1999, the Foundation held \$93,355,200 under management. This is an increase of more than \$12.5 million over 1998. During 1999, \$1,864,044 was distributed to individuals and \$3,418,543 to Baptist work for a total distribution of \$5,282,587. During the 80-year history of The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., \$16,081,204 has been distributed to individuals and \$25,723,551 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand total of \$41,804,755.

CONSTITUTION ALLEGHANY MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Revised September 11, 1993 and September 10, 1994

Article I Name

The name of the body shall be the Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association.

Article II Purpose

We associate ourselves to assist member churches in fulfilling the Great Commision of Christ through fellowship, education, and mission involvement, in cooperation with state and national Conventions.

Article III Confession of Faith

The Declaration of Faith of the Alleghany Missionary Baptist Association is found on pages 6 and 7 as an Appendix to the Constitution. Reference The Pastors Manual by J.R. Hobbs, pages 174 through 182.

Article IV Membership

Section A. Churches as Members

- (1) The churches affiliated with this Association shall be churches which use the Holy Scriptures as a statement of their faith and church polity, and require that a person upon his or her profession of faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord be immersed in water to qualify for church membership.

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- (2) The affiliated churches are defined as:
1. One that shares in the missionary spirit of the Association.
 2. Elects and sends messengers to the annual meeting.
 3. Contributes financially each year to the work of the Association.
 4. Provides an annual report to the Association upon forms provided or accepted by the Association.
- (3) A Baptist church desiring to relate itself to the Association may make application to the Moderator of the Association who will then instruct the Credentials Committee to acquire all of the proper information necessary to present the church at the next Association Session. If the applicant church is approved in this annual session the church may come under watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. At the end of one year of watchcare relationship and upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee and approval by the Association in Session, the church shall be recognized as an affiliated church.
- (4) A church failing to provide the Uniform Church Letter or failing to show interest in the Association through financial support and attendance at Associational meetings, or which reportedly violates Section A. (1) of this Article, will be contacted by the Credentials Committee, acting on the instruction of the Moderator. If a satisfactory reason is not given, and there is no evidence of effort to keep alive their fellowship with the affiliated churches of the Association, the Credentials Committee shall bring

its finding to the Association in Session. The Association, by majority vote of its messengers may then withdraw its fellowship from the church. The Association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association at any time.

Section 3. Messengers as Members

- (1) The number of messengers from an affiliated church shall be determined as follows:
 - (a) Every church having fifty resident members shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members thereafter with a maximum of five messengers.
- (2) Voting membership shall be as follows:
 - (a) Duly elected messengers of affiliated churches, as determined under subsection (1), above.
 - (b) Pastors or designees of affiliated churches.
 - (c) The Moderator shall vote only in case of a tie vote of the messengers.

Article V

Relationship to Churches

The association shall act only in an advisory capacity to the churches touching things pertaining to their interest, and shall in no case presume to direct or control them in reference to their government or internal polity. The Association recognizes the complete autonomy of each affiliated church.

Article VI
Association in Session

Section A. Authority

The Association governs itself through messengers and Executive Board members from the churches. Churches are expected to select their wisest, most spiritually mature members as messengers.

Section 3. Annual Session

- (1) The Association shall meet annually on the Friday evening and Saturday morning following the first Monday in September as such time and place as may have been designated at the last regular annual session. In the event of necessary change, the matter of time and place shall be determined by the Executive Board and communicated to the affiliated churches in writing at least seven days before the session is to take place.
- (2) Messengers from one-half of the affiliated churches shall constitute a quorum. In the event that a quorum does not exist, the current officers and budget shall remain in effect until the next official meeting.
- (3) Visitors, not messengers of the Association, may on invitation by the body participate in the debate of the Association, without the privilege to vote.
- (4) The Nominating Committee during the annual session will present the persons who have accepted the nomination to serve as Officers of the Executive Board. The Officers of the Executive Board shall be the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer.

Section C. Executive Board

- (1) The Executive Board shall be composed of the elected officers of the Association and the pastor of each affiliated church, and two elected laypersons from each affiliated church. The chair person of all standing committees shall submit to the Executive Board at each of their meeting, a written report of their activities.
- (2) The names of the laypersons for the Executive Board elected by the churches shall be reported annually to the Association and shall take office following the annual session.
- (3) The Executive Board is charged with the duty of executing the plans and decisions of the Association. A full report of its work shall be presented at each annual meeting, together with plans and recommendations for the promotion and extension of the work of the Association. The Executive Board shall act for the Association between the annual meetings in conformity with the expressed decisions of the Association.
- (4) The Executive Board shall meet on the third Monday of February, May, August, and November. A regular meeting may be rescheduled by the Moderator or, in his absence, the Vice-Moderator, provided that written notice of the time, place, and agenda has been sent to all members at least seven days before the meeting.
- (5) The Executive Board shall be authorized to conduct special meetings if needed upon the call of the Moderator, or in his absence, the Vice Moderator, provided that written notice of the time, place, and

agenda has been sent to all members at least seven days before the meeting. This meeting shall not consider any matter not on the agenda mailed to members.

- (6) The Executive Board shall have the authority to fill vacancies of persons not able to serve and continue on the Committee as they occur during the year.

Article VII

Officers, Employees and Committees

Section A. Duties of Officers and Employees

- (1) It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting of the body punctually at the appointed time, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall nominate to the Executive Board, at a meeting prior to the Annual Session, members of the Committee on Nominations to serve for the following year. Also, he shall serve as presiding officer of the Executive Board of the Association. The Moderator shall serve as ex-officio member of each standing committee of the Association.
- (2) It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, and perform any other function delegated to him by the Moderator, the Association, or the Executive Board.
- (3) It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceeding of the Association and of the Executive Board and serve as its official correspondent. The Clerk shall superintend the printing and the distribution of the record of the

proceedings of the Association and Executive Board: and to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

- (4) It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all funds connected with the work of the Association as directed by it and shall present a quarterly statement to the Executive Board and an annual statement to the Association in Session.
- (5) Director of Missions. The Director of Missions has a single, three dimensional role. These three dimensions are mission strategist, minister to the churches and church leaders, and general leader of the Association. It shall be the duty of the Director of Missions to promote the whole missionary, educational, and social service program of the Association. The Director may serve as advisor to the officers, churches, and committees of the Association. The Director of Missions shall be employed by the Executive Board, which also has the power to terminate employment if the Director's performance is not satisfactory. The Director shall work under the direct supervision of the Executive Board.
- (6) The Assistant Clerk and the Assistant Treasurer shall discharge the duties of the Clerk and the duties of the Treasurer in the event of the absence of the Clerk or the absence of the Treasurer.

Section B. Committees

- (1) Nominating Committee. It is the duty of the Nominating Committee to enlist people to serve on the various committees and in other leadership positions, as prescribed by this Constitution. The Nominating

Committee shall be elected by the Executive Board, upon nomination by the Moderator, at a meeting prior to the Annual Session. The Nominating Committee shall serve for the following year, reporting to the August meeting of the Executive Board for information purposes and to the Annual Session, which shall have the power to act upon that report. The Nominating Committee shall be composed of one representative from each of the affiliated churches.

- (2) Credentials Committee. It is the duty of the Credentials Committee to acquire all of the proper information necessary to present a church to the Association in Session for acceptance into the Association as an affiliated church. This committee shall be composed of a Chair, Vice Chair, and three other members.
- (3) Mission Development Committee. It is the duty of the Mission Development Committee to plan for, promote and provide information and make recommendations to the Association relative to missionary needs which may be met by affiliated effort. Mission Performance Programs may have several components designated by the unique work of the program. The committee shall be composed of Chair, Vice Chair, and three other members.
- (4) Finance Committee. It is the duty of this committee to plan and present to the Association a budget for the coming year. This committee will be chaired by the Association Treasurer and the members of the committee shall be the Treasurer of each affiliated church.
- (5) Ordination Committee. This committee shall be composed of the pastors of each affiliated church and

shall select its presiding chair each year and present the name of the presiding chair to the Association in Session. This committee will serve in an advisory capacity when requested to do so upon a request by a local church to examine for ordination any candidate recommended by the church.

- (6) Youth Committee. This committee shall be composed of the Chair, Vice Chair and three other members.
- (7) Sunday School Committee. This committee shall be composed of the Chair, Vice Chair and three other members.
- (8) Music Committee. This committee shall be composed of the Chair, Vice Chair and three other members.
- (9) Children's Home Committee. This committee shall be composed of the Chair, Vice Chair and three other members.

Section C. Other Officers

- (1) Auditor. An Auditor and Assistant shall be elected at the annual session. Nominees shall be selected by the Nominating Committee and report to the Executive Board as provided in Article VII, Section 3. (1). It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.
- (2) Historian. It shall be the duty of the Historian to prepare for publication in the minutes a historical sketch of the sessions and of the church with which it is held, and to record other facts of present and past history. The Historian shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, reported to the Executive Board, and elected at the Annual Session.

Article VIII
Institutional and Agency Representatives

At each annual session a representative shall be elected to make a report at the next annual session on each of the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian-Education, Baptist Retirement Homes, Inc., Baptist Children's Homes, Inc., Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, Vacation Bible School, Radio & Television Commission, Baptist Foundation, Evangelism, Missions Committee, Christian Action League, Youth & Campus Ministries, Special Ministries, North Carolina Baptist Hospital, Church Training, Stewardship, Council on Christian Life & Public Affairs, Periodicals, the Annuity Board, and any other group or agency which the Executive Board deems necessary. The Institutional and Agency Representatives shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee, reported to the Executive Board, and elected at the Annual Session.

Article IX
Amendments to the Constitution

The Constitution may be amended at any annual session of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers voting providing a notice to amend and a written statement of the proposed amendment be presented to and discussed by the Executive Board at a meeting three months prior to the Annual Session. A copy of the proposed change shall be mailed to each member of the Executive Board.

Article X
Rules of Order

All meetings of this association shall be opened and closed with prayer. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided, by request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized. The member shall confine the address to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. The member shall not speak more than twice on the same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body. When a question is under discussion no other motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall be preference in the order in which they come.
