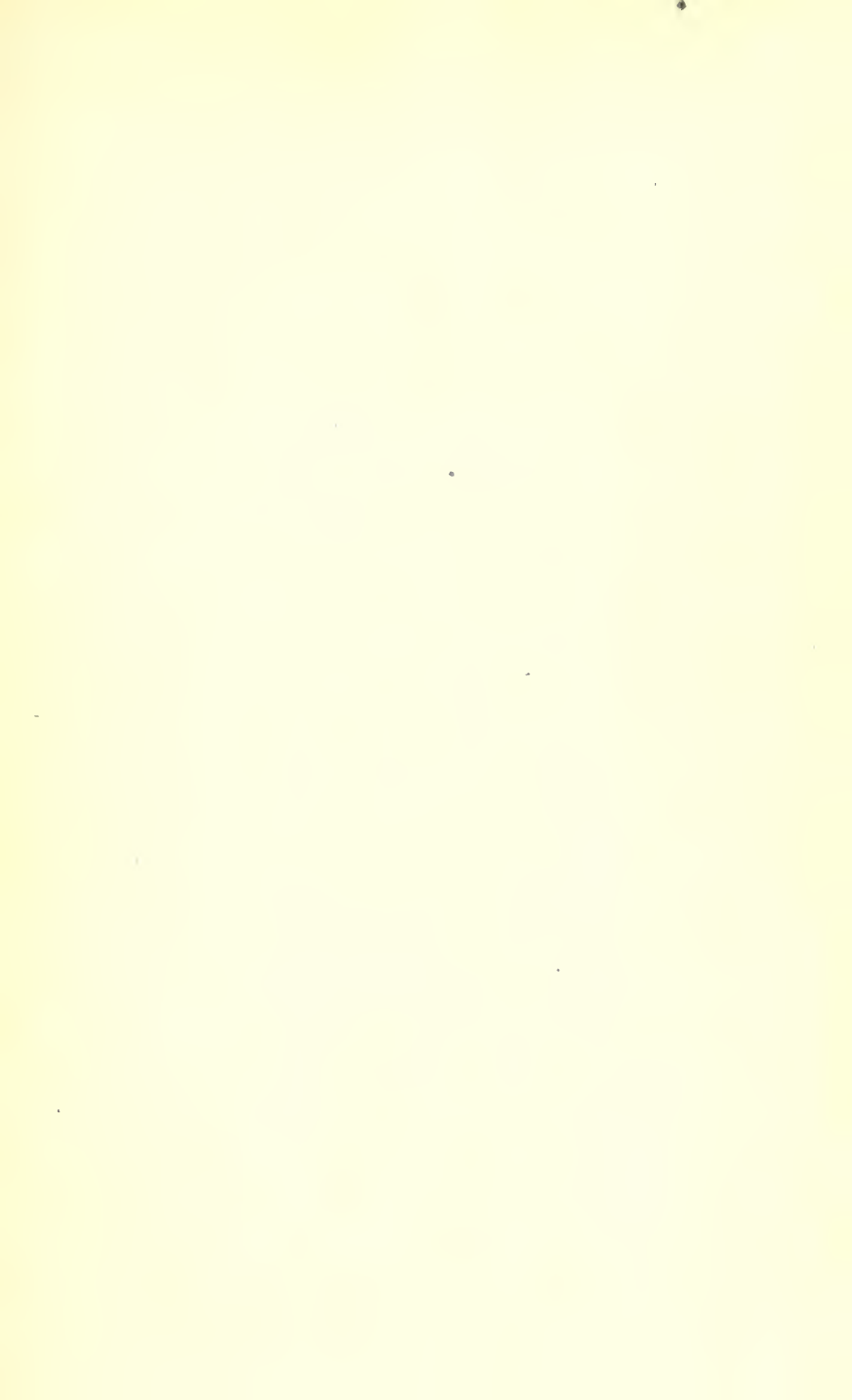

HISTORICAL SKETCH

“The Western North Carolina Conference shall include all North Carolina west of the North Carolina Conference, except Savannah Church, in Alleghany County, North Carolina; and also that part of North Carolina lying north of New River, and including that part of Virginia lying south of that river in the loop in Grayson County, Virginia; including all the territory in Carroll and Patrick Counties, Virginia, south of the crest of the Blue Ridge, and west of the Dan River.” (Discipline, 1939, paragraph 1418).

This territory is identical with that of the Western North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South. All three branches of Methodism forming The Methodist Church are included in this new Conference. From the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church are thirty-nine ministers and 11,901 church members. The North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church contributes seventy-four ministers and 22,361 church members. The Western North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, adds 377 ministers and 167,028 church members. This gives the new Conference 490 ministers, with twenty-eight others on trial, and 201,290 church members.

Conference By-Laws

1. District Conferences shall be held annually in each District.
2. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually four delegates to the District Conference.
3. Lay delegates from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.
4. The Conference Journal shall be furnished to each minister and lay delegate of the Annual Conference free; and except those copies necessary for official use, all other copies of the Journal shall be sold at twenty-five cents each.
5. An amount equal to 9% of each pastor's salary shall be assessed for the salary of the District Superintendent. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer; and he in turn to forward the funds to the Conference Treasurer not later than the 25th of each month. The Conference Treasurer shall pay the salary to the District Superintendents.
6. An amount equal to 10% of the pastor's salary shall be the assessment for the support of the Children's Home. (For 1939-40, this does not apply to former Methodist Protestant congregations.)

(NOTE: All of these by-laws were adopted by the 1939 session of the Conference.)

WHEREAS, these Commissions acting jointly did produce, propose and present to the three churches a Plan of Union; and

WHEREAS, these three churches, each acting separately for and in its own behalf, did by more than the constitutional majorities endorse and adopt this Plan of Union, in accord with their respective constitutions and disciplines, and did effect the full consummation of union in accordance with the Plan of Union; and

WHEREAS, these three churches in adopting this Plan of Union did authorize and provide for a Uniting Conference with certain powers and duties as therein set forth; and

NOW, THEREFORE, we, the members of the Uniting Session of these Annual Conferences, the legal and authorized representatives of The Methodist Episcopal Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and The Methodist Protestant Church, in Conference here assembled on this the twentieth day of October, 1939, do solemnly in the presence of God and before all the world make and publish the following Declarations of fact and principle:

THE DECLARATIONS:

I.

The Bishop: The Methodist Episcopal Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and The Methodist Protestant Church are and shall be one United Church.

The Delegates: We do so declare.

II.

The Bishop: The Plan of Union as adopted is and shall be the constitution of this United Church, and of its three constituent bodies.

The Delegates: We do so declare.

III.

The Bishop: The Methodist Episcopal Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and The Methodist Protestant Church had their common origin in the organization of the Methodist Episcopal Church in America in 1784, A. D., and have ever held, adhered to and preserved a common belief, spirit and purpose, as expressed in their common Articles of Religion.

The Delegates: We do so declare.

IV.

The Bishop: The Methodist Episcopal Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and The Methodist Protestant Church, in adopting the name "The Methodist Church" for the United Church, do not and will not surrender any right, interest or title in and to these respective names which, by long and honored use and association, have become dear to the ministry and membership of the three uniting Churches and have become enshrined in their history and records.

The Delegates: We do so declare.

V.

The Bishop: The Methodist Church is the ecclesiastical and lawful successor of the three uniting Churches, and through which the three Churches as one United Church shall continue to live and have their existence, continue their institutions, and hold and enjoy their property, exercise and perform their several trusts under and in accord with the Plan of Union and Discipline of the United Church; and such trusts or corporate bodies as exist in the constituent churches shall be continued as long as legally necessary.

The Delegates: We do so declare.

VI.

The Bishop and the Delegates: To the Methodist Church thus established we do solemnly declare our allegiance, and upon all its life and service we do reverently invoke the blessing of Almighty God. Amen.

The Hallowing of Union: (Here let the people be seated and bowed in prayer).

Bishop Clare Purcell

The Bishop: In the name of the Father, our God, by whose favor we live in this heritage of faith:

To the honor of Jesus Christ, the Son of the living God, our Lord and Saviour;

To the praise of the Holy Spirit, source of light and power;

We consecrate this communion of faith that is the Methodist Church.

The People: Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of Hosts: heaven and earth are full of thy glory. Glory be to thee, O Lord most high.

The Bishop: We consecrate this Church

For the worship of God in praise and prayer;

For the ministry of the Word;

For the celebration of the Holy Sacraments;

The People: God is a Spirit, and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth.

The Bishop: We consecrate this Church

For the guidance of childhood;

For the sanctification of the family;

For the training of youth in faith and knowledge;

The People: Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth.

The Bishop: We consecrate this Church

For the edifying of the body of Christ;

For the cure of souls that doubt;

For the persuasion of those who have not yet believed;

For the evangelization of the world;
For the promotion of righteousness, Christian unity and good-will;

The People: All souls are mine, saith the Lord. Inasmuch as ye did it unto the least of these, my brethren, ye did it unto me.

The Bishop: We consecrate this Church
For the redemption of characters;
For brotherhood with all men;
For the ennobling of this life and the deepening of the assurance of the life eternal.

The People: The ransomed of the Lord shall come to Zion with songs and everlasting joy.

The Bishop: We consecrate this Church
In grateful remembrance of all who have loved and served the cause that is here consummated;
In loving memory of those who have fared forth from this earthly habitation;
In high hope for those who shall share in this heritage of faith in days to come.

The People: Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of hosts! Heaven and earth are full of thee. Heaven and earth are praising thee, O Lord most high!

The Bishops and People: Having part among the people of God and the Church Universal in the inheritance of apostles and prophets, fathers and teachers, martyrs and evangelists; we give thanks unto the Father who hath made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in light. Compassed about by so great a cloud of witnesses, we do here and now consecrate the Methodist Church to the worship of God and the establishment of His Kingdom among men everywhere, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE SERVICE

This Service is based on the Declaration of Union Service of the United Church of Canada, and on the Declaration of Union Service of the British Uniting Methodist Conference. It was arranged by Dr. Oscar Thomas Olson, of the Epworth-Euclid Methodist Church in Cleveland for the Committee on Order of Worship at the Uniting Conference consisting of Bishop Ivan Lee Holt, President H. L. Feeman and Dr. Olson.

"Because it is our deep conviction that the church must bear every moral and spiritual responsibility imposed by the critical circumstances of our times, because furthermore we are earnestly devoted to the Divine Cause which Jesus called the Kingdom of God—a fortunate relationship which involves the brotherhood of all mankind—and because we are convinced that the war method is opposed to the program and purpose of Christ, as members of the Western North Carolina Methodist Conference, in session at Greensboro, October 20, 1939, we recommend:

"First, that all our churches, ministers, and people give themselves to earnest prayer and sacrificial effort that the peace of our country may be maintained.

"Second, that we give ourselves to sincere prayer for all those in every country engaged in war, remembering that they, too, belong to God, Jesus having taught us to say, **Our Father**, insisting that all should be members of one religious family.

"Third, that the members of our Conference covenant to pray to Almighty God that His spirit may so guide the President and the Congress of the United States that they may sincerely do everything in their power to prevent our nation from becoming involved in any international conflict, and so to guide our own national affairs as to make it easier for the nations now engaged in war to reach an early, just, and honorable settlement of their difficulties.

"Fourth, that letters go from the Secretary of our Conference to our President and various congressional representatives, setting forth the earnest appeal contained in these resolutions.

"Fifth, that a period of our own Conference be given to intercession in this behalf.

Ballot Ordered: W. J. Plint moved that the first ballot for delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences be taken, and it was so ordered. The Secretary announced that the Conference clerical membership is 490, and therefore this Conference is entitled to 7 clerical and 7 lay delegates to the General Conference and 16 delegates of each order to the Jurisdictional Conference. ACTION PROPOSED FOR THE SEVERAL ANNUAL CONFERENCES OF THE METHODIST CHURCH RELATIVE TO CHURCH EXTENSION WORK

"WHEREAS, Section 2 of the Report I of the Committee on Enabling Acts, page 367 of The Daily Christian Advocate of the Uniting Conference, states that all Annual Conferences are to 'elect the Boards which the Discipline requires to act until their successors are elected following the Jurisdictional Conference, to adopt the programs and plans of service for its Boards,' and

"WHEREAS, all the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, except the Arizona and Northwest Conferences have loan funds which under the Constitution of the Board of Church Extension, Paragraph 507 of the 1938 Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, are to be administered by the General Board of Church Extension, the Conference Boards having the right of appropriation, and

"WHEREAS, it will be necessary for the Annual Conferences to take action authorizing the Board of Missions and Church Extension to approve applications from churches within the Conference to the General Board and do all the work heretofore done by the Conference Board of Church Extension as auxiliary to the General Board, and

"WHEREAS, the Constitution of the Board of Missions and Church Extension adopted by the Uniting Conference, Paragraph 855, Article 6, provides for the Section of Church Extension as a part of the Division of Home Missions and Church Extension, and

"WHEREAS, the Section of Church Extension of the Board of Missions and Church Extension is to administer the work of church extension in the Methodist Church,

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

AFTERNOON SESSION

Memorial Service: At 3:00 p. m. the Conference convened in Memorial session, with C. C. Weaver presiding. The prayer was led by H. P. Powell. The names of the following ministers, who have died during the year, were read: from the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, R. S. Howie, T. C. Jordan, J. P. Morris, O. P. Routh, A. L. Stanford, and T. E. Wagg; and G. F. Millaway of the former Methodist Protestant Church. Their memoirs were read by H. C. Sprinkle, J. G. Wilkinson, R. E. Hunt, John Green, W. L. Sherrill, C. C. Weaver, and A. D. Shelton, respectively. The memorial address was delivered by G. T. Rowe. The address follows:

These seven comrades, whose names have been called, have answered to the roll call for the last time on earth. As brief sketches of their labors and accomplishments have been read, we have been reminded of another roll of worthies, that is recorded in the eleventh chapter of Hebrews. After giving the exploits of the latter, the writer says, "These all died." This must be said, not only of those upon that list and of these of whom we are now thinking, but of all who have been, and are, upon the earth. "It is appointed unto men once to die."

We remember these brethren today, deliberately calling them to mind and pausing for a little while to think of what they meant to us, to their parishoners, and to the world. They are tenderly loved by many, and respected and honored by all. By and by, however, their names will be forgotten, as the names of all in

course of time will be. Of the two billion people now living upon the earth, not one will be living a century and a half from now, and in a millennium or two the names of all will be forgotten, except perhaps a few that will linger upon a page in history.

There is another saying: "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints." We do not know where our departed brethren are, except that they are with God. Neither do we know what they are doing, except that they are doing God's will.

While they tarried among us as pilgrims and sojourners, they preached and lived the gospel of God. Their very presence kept reminding people of the existence of an invisible world. By both precept and example they set the feet of many in the right way. They kept a sense of brotherhood alive, and softened the manners of the people in all the communities in which they lived. They stood for a principle of life, and a way of living, learned from Jesus Christ. They knew and loved the Christian God and proclaimed his character and purpose to the world. They learned early in life that no merely human ideal of nation, race, or class would suffice. When other philosophies failed, as fail they would, as men reached the logical conclusion, "We are ruined," they declared that the only hope for a bewildered world is in a saviour God.

Their vocation determined for them an occupation which was indeed a loved employ. They often thanked God for having called them into the Christian ministry. Though they were taxed in mind and heart as men of no other vocation are, they got results. Many would say of each of them, "He led me to the light." Like a great benefactor of our state who said, "All I am, I owe to my Godly father and to the Methodist circuit riders,"—many would say of each of these, "The fact that I am a Christian today is due to the faithful message and devoted life of this man who was my father in God."

Not only did they get results, they are in themselves results. To what end is the incessant activity of God if not to produce intelligent, trustful, obedient children who know and love to do his will? Everything upon earth is destined to pass away, except the souls of men and women who become worthy to survive and pass over into the "building of God, the house not made with hands eternal in the heavens."

If they were with us today, and could speak one more message, what they would say would be a warning and an exhortation to us who have further time for service before us. They would speak as the ancient prophet, "Seekest thou great things for thyself? Seek them not." They would beg us not to allow any impure motives or desires for worldly success or ambition for place to mar our ministry. Their exhortation to each of us would be, "Be thou faithful, faithful to God whose we are, faithful to the gospel which we preach, faithful to the people who have been committed to our trust." "Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life."

Benediction was given by C. C. Weaver and the session was adjourned.

RESOLVED: That each district superintendent be instructed to appoint a district Treasurer whose duty it shall be to receive from the charges of the district the payments on district superintendents' salaries, and to remit same to the Conference Treasurer not later than the 25th day of the month.

RESOLVED, second: that the Conference Treasurer be instructed to remit to each district superintendent as soon as these monies are received from all districts, a pro rata check based on the total collected from the eleven districts.

Journal Publication: P. N. Garber reported for the Committee on the Publication of the Journal. (See Appendix.)

Introductions: L. L. Gobbel introduced H. G. McEntire, Treasurer of Greensboro College, and J. B. Craven presented Miss Nina Troy.

Advocate: M. T. Plyler spoke on the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

Conference 1940: Minute Question 32, "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" was called, and E. H. Blackard invited the Conference to meet in 1940 in Wesley Memorial Church, High Point. The invitation was referred to the Conference Entertainment Committee.

Resolution: C. S. Kirkpatrick presented the following resolution which was adopted:

“RESOLVED: That the Committee on Entertainment are hereby authorized to change the methods heretofore operating in the three Conferences, and to set up new plans both as to place and methods of entertainment, seeking efficiency and economy.

Bishop Straughn Presiding: Bishop Purcell called Bishop Straughn to the chair and also to speak on “The Methodist Advance.”

Reports: R. M. Courtney and J. G. Huggin, Jr., presented the report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension and the report of the Board of Education, respectively, and these were adopted. (See Appendix.) G. I. Humphreys, President of High Point College, and Dr. Sharpe, President of Pfeiffer College, were presented to the Conference. The report of the Distributing Committee was submitted and adopted. (See Appendix.)

C. C. Benton received 230 votes, and was elected, and W. A. Rollins received 34 votes. This completed the election of delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Memorials: C. W. Bates, for the Committee on Memorials to the General Conference, made his report, which was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Brotherhood: C. C. Weaver and O. V. Woosley spoke of the work of the Conference Brotherhood, and urged ministers and laymen to join; and as a result H. G. Allen announced that 18 ministers had joined, and that the cost of each call had been reduced to \$3.00.

Reports: The report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, presented by O. V. Woosley, was adopted, the report of the Committee on Accepted Supplies, read by G. R. Stafford, was amended and adopted; and the report of College Place Church, brought by W. A. Lambeth, was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Resolution of Thanks: G. R. Combs presented the following resolution of thanks, and it was adopted by a unanimous rising vote:

Deeply mindful of the unusual demands made upon the hospitality of our host city by this greatly enlarged Conference of the now united Church, we, the members of the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, wish to express to the host churches and the people of Greensboro our sincere thanks for their gracious hospitality and their unfailing courtesy during the session of our Conference now drawing to its close. Nothing has been spared to make our stay in Greensboro a joy to our hearts. Our prayers are that the blessings of heaven may abide and abound upon the people of this lovely city.

We wish further to record our appreciation to the daily press of this city and the state for the efficient and accurate publicity given to the proceedings of the Conference. We would especially commend the superb reporting of the proceedings and spirit of the Conference given by Mr. Granbery Dickson, city editor of the Greensboro Daily News.

We thank Professor Walter Vassar and his inspiring choir for the excellent contribution made to the worship periods of the Conference sessions, President Luther L. Gobbel and the staff of Greensboro College for their generous courtesy to the members of the Conference, and all others who have had a part in making this historic session of our Conference a delightful experience to us all and a memory we shall cherish through the years.

It has been a delight and an inspiration to have in the Conference the presence and the co-operative fellowship of three of the Bishops of our united Church: Bishops J. H. Straughn, Wallace E. Brown, and Clare Purcell. These brethren have given to us a fine demonstration and an inspiring example of the enlarged fellowship and spontaneous goodwill that now prevails among the people called Methodists in the United States of America.

Put Democrat Parsonage under jurisdiction of Laurel-Barnardsville Quarterly Conference.

Change name of Leicester (M. E.) Charge to Leicester-Bell.

Change name of Leicester (M. E., South) Charge to Leicester-Grace.

Change name of Asheville—First Church (M. E.) to Asheville-French Broad Avenue.

Change name of Asheville Circuit (M. E.) to Oteen Circuit.

From Etowah Circuit (M. E.) take English Chapel and attach it to Brevard Circuit.

Change the name of Brevard Circuit to Rosman Circuit.

Take from Etowah Circuit (M. E.), Etowah and Fannings Chapel and attach to Mills River.

Put Etowah parsonage under jurisdiction of Mills River Quarterly Conference. From Etowah (M. E.) take Upward and attach to the Flat Rock Charge, thus absorbing the Etowah Charge.

Charlotte District: From Matthews-Indian Trail Charge take Indian Trail and place with Stallings, Antioch, and Beulah of the Mecklenburg Charge of the former M. P. Church, thus forming the Indian Trail-Stallings Charge.

Matthews becomes a station.

Take New Hope from the former Mecklenburg Charge of the M. P. Church and place with Bethel, Mill Grove, Union Grove, Unionville and Zion of the Monroe Circuit, forming the Unionville-New Hope Charge.

Monroe Circuit ceases to exist as a charge.

Mecklenburg Charge of the former M. P. Church ceases to exist as a charge.

Restore Mount Moriah Church to the Peachland Charge.

Take Smyrna from the Marshville Charge and place on the Prospect Charge.

Take Zoar from the Mecklenburg Charge and place on the Weddington Charge.

Take West Monroe from the Monroe Circuit and place with the North Monroe-Grace Charge.

Elkin District: Dissolve Boone Circuit (M. E.), placing Liberty and Piney Grove on the Watauga Circuit.

Place Friendship Church (M. E.) with Boone.

Place Bethel (M. E.) with Todd Circuit in the Statesville District.

Discontinue Salem Church on the Watauga Circuit.

Take Lansing Church from Helton Charge and place with Warrensville.

Take Fairview, Green's Chapel, Grier's Chapel, and Bethel churches from Lansing Charge and place with Helton, absorbing Lansing Charge.

Laurel Springs Church on the Creston Charge goes with the Holston Conference.

Take Charity and Millers Creek churches from the Moravian Falls Charge and place with the Wilkesboro Circuit.

Take Hane's Grove from Jonesville Charge and place with St. Paul Charge.

Take Elbaville from the Mocksville Circuit and place on the Advance Circuit.

Take Cornatzer from Advance, Zion from Davie, and Chestnut Grove from Harmony and place on the Mocksville Circuit.

Gastonia District: Take Palm Tree Church from South Fork Circuit and place it with Casar Circuit.

Take Fairview Church from Lincolnton-Bess Chapel and place it with Lowesville Circuit.

Greensboro District: Combine the two Methodist churches in Cedar Falls and take West Bend from Asheboro Circuit and add to the Richland Charge.

Combine the two Methodist churches in Liberty and make a station called Liberty, the remaining churches to be known as the Liberty Circuit—a new charge.

Combine the two Methodist churches in Gibsonville and continue the name Gibsonville.

From the Mt. Zion Charge of the former M. P. Church take Mt. Pleasant and Mt. Zion and add to Randolph-Mt. Vernon Charge.

Place Barnett's Chapel with Midway.

Divide the Ward Street-Archdale Charge and make two stations, each church bearing its former name.

Take Whitsett from Gibsonville and with Shady Grove place on Brown Summit Circuit.

High Point District: Attach Bethany Church (formerly M. E.) to the Linwood Charge.

Attach Piney Grove Church (formerly M. P.) to Central Church, Denton (formerly M. P.)

Attach Cid Church (formerly M. P.) to First Church, Denton (formerly M. E., South.)

Marion District: Place Sunshine Church (M. E.) with Bostic Charge.

Place Golden Valley Church (M. E.) on the Sunshine Charge.

Place West Marion (M. E.) with Cross Mills, calling the charge Cross Mills.

Dissolve Linville-Montezuma Circuit (M. E.), placing Altamont and Johnson's Chapel with Linville Falls Charge.

Place Linville and Forest Home churches with Elk Park.

Merge the membership of the M. E. and the M. E. Church, South, at Montezuma.

Take Rhodhiss from the Statesville District, and place with Grace in the Marion District, forming a charge to be known as Grace-Rhodhiss.

Place Burkes Grove (M. P.) with Valdese.

Discontinue Arneys Chapel and Fairview on the Table Rock Circuit.

From Micaville Circuit take Bakersville. With Bakersville merge Bakersville M. E. To this add Oak Grove from the Micaville Circuit, Glen Ayre and Bethlehem from Bakersville-Tipton Hill M. E. and Penland from Spruce Pine—thus constituting the Bakersville Charge.

From Bakersville-Tipton Hill M. E. take Tipton Hill and Red Hill and join them to Celo, Martins Chapel and Windom, thus constituting the Micaville-Tipton Hill Charge. From Spruce Pine take Penland, thus making Spruce Pine a station.

Salisbury District: Create a new charge called Midland, composed of Mills Grove, Pine Bluff, Center Grove, and St. Pauls.

Create a new charge composed of Oakboro, Loves Chapel and Loves Grove to be called Stanfield.

Take Mt. Mitchell from the Kannapolis Circuit and make the Mt. Mitchell Station.

Place Shiloh with Bethpage making a charge to be called Bethpage, thus abolishing the Kannapolis Circuit.

Take Pine Grove from the Albemarle Circuit and put with Main Street, Albemarle.

Place Palestine on the Albemarle Circuit, thus making this charge consist of Bethany, Palestine, Stony Hill, Union Chapel, and Porters.

Take Friendship from Friendship-Loves Grove, Bethel from Tabernacle, Mt. Tabor from Pfeiffer, and Oak Grove from Salem and make the Friendship Circuit.

Take Rocks Grove from Granite Quarry and put with Main Street-Rowan.

Place old Providence Church under the control of Central Church, Albemarle, Quarterly Conference.

Take Mt. Pleasant, Cold Springs and Friendship from old Mt. Pleasant Circuit and create the Mt. Pleasant-Cold Spring Charge.

Statesville District: Take Fairmont from Union Grove-Zion and place with Olin. Take Turnersburg and Mt. Bethel from Olin and Clarksbury from Cool Springs and place with Harmony.

Place South River with Stony Point.

Place Smith Chapel with Union Grove-Zion.

Place Wesley Chapel with Stony Point, thus absorbing Smith-Wesley.

Take Shiloh from North Newton and place with Balls Creek.

From Highland-Rhodhiss take Rhodhiss and place with Grace Chapel.

From Bethel-Fairgrove take Fairgrove and place with Highland, and also add Mt. Bethel Church to Highland.

Waynesville District: Combine the two Methodist churches in Clyde, making the Clyde Charge.

Add Morning Star, Long's Chapel, from Canton Circuit (M. E.), and Piney Grove from Clyde Circuit (M. E.), making a charge to be called Morning Star.

Add Rockwood, Harmony Grove, and Liberty from Clyde Circuit, and Beaver Dam and Arnon Plains from Canton Circuit (M. E.), making a charge to be called Rockwood.

Add Elizabeth Chapel, Dellwood Circuit, to Long's Chapel at Junaluska, making a charge to be called Long's Chapel-Elizabeth.

Add Maggie from the Clyde Circuit (M. E.) to Dellwood Charge.

Add Meadow Grove (M. E.) to Bethel Charge.

Change name of Franklin Circuit (M. E.) to Louisa Circuit, containing Louisa, Gillespie, Thomas Chapel, and Warley's.

Take Ogden from Murphy Circuit and add to Hayesville.

Take Peachtree, Tomotla, and Marble from Murphy Circuit, and Brasstown from the Hayesville Circuit and make a charge to be called Peachtree.

Add Culberson, Unaka, and Reid's Chapel from Murphy Parish (M. E.) to the Murphy Circuit.



REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

We recommend:

1. That the apportionment for the Children's Home at Winston-Salem remain at an amount equal to ten per cent (10%) of the pastor's salary for the current year, and that the fifth Sunday offering be continued as a free-will offering to the Home. The above is to apply only to former Methodist Episcopal Churches and the former Methodist Episcopal Churches, South.

The former Methodist Protestant Churches will for the present direct their contributions to the Orphanage at High Point as in the past.

2. That the General Work and the Conference Work total \$265,308.00.

3. That the following net amounts be deducted from the above total before division:

5. An amount equal to .09% of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the support of the district superintendent.

6. The former Methodist Protestant Board of Church Extension brings into the Conference an indebtedness of about \$4,000.00. This debt is being assumed by the Conference Missions Board and this Conference is asked to request the Conference Treasurer, Mr. J. H. Allen, to pay to the Treasurer of the Missions Board all money which he now has on hand for church extension.

7. We recommend that the Minutes of the Conference be sold at 25c each. The proceeds to go to the Annual Conference Expense Fund.

8. We recommend the election as Conference Treasurer Mr. E. O. Cole for a term of four years at a salary of \$600.00 a year.

9. In view of the fact that the necessary information is not available at this time to make a proper distribution to the various districts, the Commission on World Service and Finance requests of the Conference that it be granted an extension of one week within which time a proper distribution will be made to each district. The assessments for each district, based on memberships and financial records, will then be placed in the hands of each district superintendent.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

I. THE LOCAL CHURCH SECTION

With continued faith and increasing devotion to the cause of Christian Education, we look with fresh enthusiasm toward the coming Conference year and respectfully suggest the following:

1. That the promotion of Missionary education be continued in all church schools through the fourth Sunday programs and offerings to the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise.

2. That all pastors and church school leaders be urged to cooperate with our director of Children's Work in planning and conducting Vacation Church Schools.

3. That the summer assemblies at Lake Junaluska and the Christian Adventure Camps at Camp Carlyle be continued according to the plan of former years and that our employed staff be given all possible support in the promotion of these enterprises.

4. That Young People's Day be observed in all our churches.

5. That Church School Day be given added emphasis. This day provides an effective opportunity for acquainting our membership with the purposes and

plans for Christian education. It further makes possible a larger service by our employed staff. During the past year in one district every church observed the day and sent an offering to the conference treasurer. We hope that all the districts during the coming year will follow this example.

6. That the program of leadership training conducted through camps, institutes, schools and Epworth Training Conferences be supported with interest and enthusiasm by pastors and other church leaders.

7. That a Board of Education be organized in each local church. Wherever such a Board has been in practical operation, the program of Christian education has been stimulated. In those churches where leaders are not familiar with the work of this Board, it is important that they write to the Conference office and ask for guidance early in the new Conference year.

8. That literature for classes and other groups be selected with unusual care. During the coming year literature will be supplied by the respective publishing houses of the three former churches now merged, and local churches may place their orders according to their usual plans. It is suggested that because of its importance in the Youth Crusade, "The Epworth Highroad" be given a wider use among young people in all churches.

9. That we recognize the importance of evangelism through church schools and that teachers and leaders be encouraged to fulfill their responsibilities for reaching the members of their classes. After several years of declining church school enrollment, we rejoice in the wholesome increase this year in each of the three uniting groups.

10. That the Youth Crusade be kept in the foreground each month of the year. With encouraging success behind them, Methodist youth are now ready for a definite advance and in every church they must be given full opportunity to make it. Under the direction of our Bishops, plans for the winter months will soon be promoted and it is earnestly hoped that in every district the full co-operation of pastors and young people's leaders will be given.

11. That the Extension Program of this Board, offering special aid to rural and industrial churches, be given a place of prominence throughout the Conference. In this field there is an outstanding need as well as many bright opportunities and this Board has found it possible to re-employ a full-time Extension Secretary. The work under his direction may well be called the most significant work now being planned for the coming year. Your Board nominates Rev. C. P. Bowles and Dr. L. L. Gobbel for membership on the Jurisdictional Board of Education.

II. SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES SECTION

Your Board recommends that in addition to the \$5,000 apportioned to High Point College by the Board of Education:

1. That the General Board of the M. E. Church, South, be earnestly requested to co-operate with the General Boards of the M. P. Church and the M. E. Church in providing support for High Point College during the coming year equal to that received from the General Board of the M. P. Church last year.

2. That High Point College be granted the privilege of appealing to churches, organizations, and individuals that have hitherto been supporting the college or to any others who may be interested for continued support during the coming year.

3. That the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church be advised of the action of this Conference concerning High Point College with a view to securing the closest co-operation possible in behalf of this institution which belongs jointly to the two Conferences.

High Point College is a four-year co-educational institution founded in 1924 by the former Methodist Protestant Church. It has offered the best of educational advantages to many hundreds of young men and young women, bequeathing to them both an educational and spiritual heritage.

Pfeiffer Junior College, Misenheimer, North Carolina, is owned and operated by the organization which succeeds the Woman's Home Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church. This college, of which Dr. W. S. Sharp is the president, has a staff of twenty-four well trained workers. Thanks to the generosity of Mrs. Henry Pfeiffer, the school has an excellently equipped group of buildings. It had its origin as a mountain school first located at Lenoir, North Carolina in 1889. It was moved to Misenheimer in 1907. The college offers a standard two-year college course with a rich program of religious education. Rates are kept low and a self-help program enables all students to work out part of their expenses. We commend this excellent institution as worthy of the support and patronage of all our people.

We recommend that Rev. S. W. Taylor be elected for membership on the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

We recommend that thirty per cent of the fund appropriated to the Board of Education by the Commission on World Service and Finance be allocated to the local Church Section and seventy per cent to the Schools and Colleges Section, the latter being distributed as follows:

We recommend that High Point College receive the total per cent collected on the \$5,000 apportioned to this institution.

The remaining funds are to be divided equally between Brevard College and Greensboro College.

The division of these funds is designed to give each cause and each college as nearly as possible the same amounts that were received last year from the churches now in the bounds of this Conference.

We recommend the following appointments: O. L. Simpson, Associate Editor, Church School Publications, General Board of Education; H. B. Trimble, Professor Emory University; G. T. Rowe, P. N. Garber, Professors Duke University; R. A. Smith, Professor Greensboro College; C. H. King, Executive Secretary, Board of Education; M. T. Hipps, Director Young People's Work, Board of Education; E. D. C. Brewer, Extension Secretary, Board of Education; G. I. Humphreys, President High Point College; P. E. Lindley, Professor High Point College; Paul S. Kennett, Professor High Point College; N. M. Harrison, Promotional Secretary, High Point College; F. L. Gibbs, Executive Secretary, General Board of Education, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; W. J. Humeycutt, student Boston University; M. B. Stokes, Jr., student Boston University; C. D. Stokes, student Yale University; J. C. Reichard, student Duke University.

The Methodist Church in Western North Carolina has a fine background of achievement as its inheritance from the three former churches which are now united. With a sense of appreciation and also of obligation, we now take up the work of another year fully resolved that we must conserve all the values in the field of Christian education which have been handed us from the former churches. Nothing of significance must be lost. While certain mechanical matters will be changed and certain details dropped, the Methodist Church must build upon the well-laid foundation and the devoted service of other days. As a Board we pledge to our employed staff our prayers and our desire to co-operate in every phase of their work. We covet for them the same support from every preacher and every layman in this Conference.

REPORT NO. 2 OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Having studied the program of lay activities as recommended by our General Board of Lay Activities in the light of the situation and needs of the Western North Carolina Conference, we make the following recommendations:

1. That the doctrine and practice of **Christian stewardship** be emphasized through
 - a. Sermons,
 - b. Courses for young people and adults in the church school, leadership schools and classes, and our Pastors' School.
 - c. The effective distribution of pamphlets and books on Christian stewardship, and,
 - d. A program on stewardship at one of the quarterly meetings of the District League of Stewards.
2. That the **benevolences**, the **adequate support of the ministry**, and all other **legitimate financial claims** upon our people be systematically handled through a sound financial system, including:
 - a. A thorough, annual every-member canvass to secure a pledge from every member;
 - b. A careful follow-up of all pledges during the year;

- c. Regular weekly offerings on the part of every member of the church;
- d. The payment of ministers on a monthly basis;
- e. A monthly balancing of the budget;
- f. A goal of at least one-half of the acceptances on benevolences be paid by the time of the District Conference;
- g. Thoroughly explaining to all our church members, and especially to our official boards, the church's program for world redemption and their obligation to accept their full share in this program.

3. That each district, through the leadership of the district superintendent and the district lay leader, organize a **District League of Stewards** with quarterly meetings of the League, and use it and all other means available for continuous emphasis upon the importance of the office of steward in the Methodist Church.

4. That **lay speakers** be used to present the program of the church to congregations, group meetings, and conferences, and to conduct religious services where the pastor cannot be present, and in needy areas.

5. That Laymen's Day be observed the second Sunday in June.

6. That the fullest possible co-operation be given the Commission on Evangelism and all efforts being put forth in our midst for the reaching of the unreached.

7. That the cause of temperance be stressed and encouragement and aid be given all the forces and agencies in our state and nation working to overthrow the liquor traffic and restore prohibition and achieve temperance and sobriety.

8. That preachers and laymen resist the tendency to legalize gambling.

9. That renewed efforts be made in behalf of world peace. To this end we go on record against sending our boys to any foreign country to engage in warfare.

10. That attention be called to the provision in our creed concerning conscientious objectors, as follows:

"The Methodist Church, true to the principles of the New Testament, teaches respect for properly constituted civil authority. It holds that government rests upon the support of its conscientious citizenship, and that conscientious objectors to war in any or all of its manifestations are a natural outgrowth of the principle of good will and the Christian desire for universal peace; and holds that such objectors should not be oppressed by compulsory military service anywhere or at any time. We ask and claim exemption from all forms of military preparation or service for all conscientious objectors who may be members of The Methodist Church. In this they have the authority and support of their Church. However, we recognize the right of the individual to answer the call of his government in any emergency according to the dictates of his-Christian conscience."

—Discipline of The Methodist Church, 1939, paragraph 1695 (15).

We nominate A. J. Kirby as Conference Lay Leader, and recommend his election.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

We recommend a continuance of the Golden Cross Society for securing continued contributions for an enlargement of services to be rendered by our hospital at Elkin. We nominate for your confirmation Rev. L. B. Abernethy, director of the Golden Cross activities, and Rev. R. M. Courtney, treasurer of the Golden Cross funds.

We nominate for your confirmation Rev. E. O. Cole, director of homes for retired ministers, his activities to particularly center in securing such homes as will be needed and in assisting in any possible way in the use of them. We recommend that the Conference Board of Trustees be authorized to legally hold such property until your Board of Hospitals and Homes can legally qualify for holding and administering property designated for homes of retired ministers.

We recommend for nomination: Rev. L. B. Abernethy, O. V. Woosley, and Mrs. W. C. Hammer for membership on the Board of Hospitals and Homes for the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

Beginning in March of this year and continuing at intervals until the present time, committees representing the three Methodist orphanages in North Caro-

lina, the Methodist Protestant Children's Home at High Point, the Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem, and the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh, have made a careful study of our orphanages and the needs of the boys and the girls who live in them. After full and free discussion the committee of eighteen representing the Trustees of the aforesaid institutions unanimously agreed on a plan of operation for the ensuing year, which in turn has been presented to the Boards of Trustees of the three institutions, and they have acted favorably upon it.

Our Board recommends to this United Annual Conference for confirmation the following plan of operation:

1. That because of necessity and of preference the three orphanages operate during the ensuing year as they have been operated.

2. That they look to the same constituencies during the ensuing year for similar support as heretofore secured and that the cultivation for securing this financial support be limited to the constituencies sponsoring them during the Conference year of 1938-1939.

3. That if about \$6,000 income previously realized by the Methodist Protestant Children's Home from agencies outside the state of North Carolina is not available during the ensuing year, the Trustees of the Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem, and the Trustees of the Methodist Orphanage, at Raleigh, agree to make up this deficiency, not exceeding \$6,000, on a contributing basis of 33.275% for the Trustees of the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh and 66.725% for the Trustees of the Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem.

4. That it is further agreed that the Board of Trustees of each of the three aforesaid institutions will be responsible for only the debts incurred in running their own institutions during the Conference years of 1938-1939 and 1939-1940 and will not be expected to assume any possible indebtedness of the other institutions.

MINUTES OF THE CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

The Western North Carolina Conference Brotherhood met in thirty-first annual session in West Market Street Methodist Church, Greensboro, N. C., October 19, 1939, at 3:00 p. m., with the President, H. G. Allen, in the chair. A hymn was sung and J. L. Ingram led in prayer.

The Secretary read the minutes of the Executive Committee meetings in Salisbury, December 6, 1938, and in Charlotte, September 26, 1939, and the minutes of the Brotherhood Commission meeting in Statesville, June 26, 1939. H. M. Wellman moved that the recommendations contained in these minutes be adopted, and the motion carried unanimously by a standing vote. The following resolutions and amendment to the Constitution are the important matters thus adopted:

RESOLUTION: "WHEREAS, A Joint Commission, consisting of representatives of the Brotherhood, and of the former Methodist Episcopal and Methodist Protestant Churches in Western North Carolina, as authorized by the Brotherhood meeting in October, 1938, met in Statesville in June, 1939, to determine the Brotherhood's policy toward new members in view of the unification of Methodism; and

"WHEREAS, this Joint Commission passed the following motion: 'that any active clerical member of the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church be permitted to join the Brotherhood by paying, or signing a note for, one dollar for each call issued by the Brotherhood since the time he was admitted into full connection into his respective Conference, provided that he join within twelve months after this is adopted'; and

"WHEREAS, it seems to the Executive Committee of the Brotherhood to be advisable for the period covered by this motion to waive the payment of the initial mortuary fee of five dollars usually payable within sixty days after joining;

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

"1. That the Brotherhood by its action today approve and declare in full force and effect the plan above described;

"2. That anything in the Constitution of the Brotherhood which is contrary to this plan be waived for a period of one year, this period to end with the close of Conference, 1940;

"3. That immediately after the close of Conference, 1940, the Constitution be restored to full force and effect."

AMENDMENT NO. 3 TO THE CONSTITUTION: "Hereafter, on the death of a beneficiary member, each surviving beneficiary member shall be assessed three dollars, instead of five dollars as heretofore; provided, that this amendment shall become effective only upon the authorization of the Executive Committee."

RESOLUTION: "WHEREAS, It is expected that the union of Methodism will bring into the Brotherhood many new members; and,

"WHEREAS, An increase in income to the Brotherhood of four hundred dollars in the case of each call would make it possible to lower the assessment fee of a beneficiary member to three dollars at each death without reducing the present benefit of twelve hundred dollars;

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Executive Committee of the Brotherhood be authorized and empowered to declare in full force and effect Amendment No. 3 to the Constitution, whenever said Executive Committee shall find that sufficient new members, both clerical and lay, have been added to make possible the lowering of the assessment fee without reducing the benefit." (Note: This was done on October 23, 1939.)

Edwin L. Jones was elected Conference Lay Director for the Brotherhood.

The Secretary and Treasurer made the following report: "Six brethren have died during the year: Brothers T. C. Jordan, O. P. Routh, T. E. Wagg, R. S. Howie, A. L. Stanford, and J. P. Morris. Payments have been made to the beneficiaries of each, and it is confidently expected that sufficient funds will come in during Conference to complete the payment of the benefit of \$1,200 to each. (Note: This was done on October 25, 1939, leaving a balance of about \$900.00 in the treasury.) As authorized by the Brotherhood last year, an audit was made of the Treasurer's books by Carbis Walker and Associates of Winston-Salem. The audit covered the period beginning June 25, 1934, when the present Treasurer took over the accounts, and ending April 30, 1939. A copy of the detailed audit report is herewith offered for inspection by the members. There follow salient quotations from it: "The scope of our examination included a comprehensive test of receipt and disbursement accounts as maintained by the Brotherhood's Treasurer, Rev. C. C. Herbert, and a verification of assets and liabilities. . . The Treasurer's records were neatly and efficiently maintained for the period under review. . . The excess of assets over liabilities, shown as surplus, amounted to \$7,325.99 which included the face value of notes and accounts due from members."

A Nominating Committee, consisting of P. N. Garber, E. L. Kirk, C. S. Kirkpatrick, W. B. West, and W. O. Weldon was appointed, and it retired to prepare a report.

Edwin L. Jones, Conference Lay Director for the Brotherhood, was presented and he spoke briefly.

The matter of re-admitting former members now superannuated was discussed and on motion of W. M. Curtis, this matter was left to the Executive Committee with power to act.

P. N. Garber presented the report of the Nominating Committee as follows: President, H. G. Allen; Vice-President, R. C. Goforth; Secretary and Treasurer, C. C. Herbert, Jr.; Assistant Secretary and Treasurer, F. C. Smathers; members of Executive Committee: C. C. Weaver, Paul Hardin, Jr., W. J. Plint, L. E. Mabry. The report was adopted.

On motion of H. M. Wellman, a rising vote of thanks was given the officers, and the Executive Committee, for their efficient work.

The benediction was pronounced by C. M. Pickens.

REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION

At Chapel Hill the Wesley Foundation conducts a Bible class for students in the church school, a Youth Fellowship Hour in the evening, and offers a worship service at eleven o'clock on Sunday mornings. Formal receptions at intervals during the year, less formal socials and good fellowship dinners are featured at appropriate times and seasons.

Students are visited in the dormitories, assisted in planning and carrying out a well conceived program, and welcomed into the homes of the members and of the minister of University Church.

The Foundation endeavors to secure voluntary enrollment in its membership, involving a contribution to the budget and taking part in a selected activity of the organization.

The response of the students to the opportunities thus presented is gratifying, but leaves much to be desired. Initial enrollments and attendance are hard to maintain.

The minister has only voluntary, unpaid assistance in the effort to serve eight hundred Methodist students and five hundred settled members of the University Church. At College Place, Greensboro, a highly trained, experienced young woman is employed especially to work with the students of W. C., U. N. C. A rich and varied program is carried out at a point of positive efficiency. Hundreds of students attend the Bible class and Fellowship Hour, and crowd into the auditorium to take part in the morning worship.

Student response to religious opportunities at College Place amply justifies the present movement to enlarge the facilities of the church building and equipment.

For carrying on this work and improving it in every way possible the Commission is asking the same appropriation from the two Conferences as last year, that is, \$2,300.00 from each Conference. (This paragraph was referred to Commission on World Service and Finance.)

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE OF THE WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE AND THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE FOR COLLEGE PLACE CHURCH

At the meeting in October, 1938, of the Western North Carolina Conference held in Charlotte, North Carolina, the Conference approved the recommendation of the Committee on College Place Church, Greensboro, North Carolina, that the two North Carolina Conferences co-operate in the raising of \$50,000 to liquidate the indebtedness on College Place Church and to enlarge the church building in a manner sufficient to meet its present needs.

The Western North Carolina Conference also very generously donated \$700.00 toward the payment of the salary of an assistant pastor for College Place Church, in order that the regular pastor might have time to devote to the campaign to raise the \$50,000.

Very little, as yet, has been done in the Western North Carolina Conference toward the raising of this fund. Pamphlets, setting forth the work of College Place Church and its opportunity for service, if it were relieved of debt and its facilities expanded, have been distributed in this Conference. The cause also has been represented in most of the District Conferences.

The pastor of College Place Church has been actively engaged in the Conference in laying the foundation, through district meetings and personal visitations, for a campaign to raise the \$50,000.

The membership of College Place Church has generously responded to the effort to raise this fund by pledging \$4,345.39; \$925.00 of this amount has been paid. From three other sources \$472.00 has been received, making a total of \$1,397.00 paid in.

The Board of Church Extension of our branch of the church has graciously offered to send two men to our two Annual Conferences to help raise the \$50,000, preferably during the month of February, 1940. The Board will pay the salaries of these two men. Their expenses are to be paid out of the money raised during the campaign.

The Board of Missions of the Western North Carolina Conference was requested to appropriate \$800.00 and the North Carolina Conference, \$600.00 toward the carrying on of the campaign.

The Joint Committee on College Place Church, therefore, makes the following recommendations:

1. That the offer of the Board of Church Extension be accepted and that the month of February, 1940, be fixed as the period for carrying on the campaign.

2. That the Joint Committee on College Place Church for the year 1939-1940 consist of five persons from each Conference, the present local Committee of College Place Church, and the district superintendent of the Greensboro District as an ex-officio and additional member of the Western North Carolina group; that the Bishop of the North Carolina Conference be requested to nominate these five persons for election by the North Carolina Conference; and that the Bishop of the Western North Carolina Conference be requested to nominate these five persons for election by the Western North Carolina Conference.

3. That the Board of Missions of the Western North Carolina Conference be requested to appropriate \$800.00 toward the carrying on of the campaign.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY MINUTES

The annual meeting of the Historical Society of the Western North Carolina Conference was held in West Market Street Methodist Church, Greensboro, at 7:30 p. m., Wednesday, October 18th, 1939, W. A. Jenkins, President, in the chair.

The opening song service was led by Professor Walter Vassar of Greensboro College. Methodist Hymnal numbers 227, "Come We That Love the Lord," and 370, "O For a Heart to Praise," were sung. E. C. Widenhouse read the Scripture

lesson, Ephesians 3:1-7. Prayer was offered by F. L. Gibbs of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, the Executive Secretary, Department of Religious Education of the former Methodist Protestant Board of Christian Education.

The minutes of the previous year's session at Charlotte were read and approved. The Society instructed the chair to appoint a Committee on Nominations of officers for the coming year. The Committee appointed consisted of G. R. Stafford, W. L. Sherrill, and R. C. Goforth. After consultation this Committee reported nominations as follows: for President, Rev. R. L. Ownbey; for Vice-President, Rev. J. Elwood Carroll; for Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. W. G. McFarland; for membership on the Executive Committee, Rev. A. W. Plyler to succeed himself. The report was adopted by the Society and the above named were declared elected.

The following resolution was presented by G. R. Stafford and adopted by the Society:

"Realizing the need of preserving the records of local Methodist history in some available form, be it

"Resolved, that the President of the Historical Society of the Western North Carolina Conference appoint a committee of three to study the feasibility of having the Conference designate an official depository for local church records somewhere in North Carolina, this committee to report at the 1940 meeting of the Society.

"Presented by Garland Stafford, R. C. Goforth, W. A. Kale, and R. B. Shumaker."

The chair appointed G. R. Stafford, P. N. Garber, and J. Elwood Carroll to serve on the committee thus authorized.

An offering amounting to \$22.73 was taken. Of this sum \$16.12 was paid the Advocate Publishing Company, of Greensboro, in full payment of the final balance due on an old account for printing. A balance of \$6.61 remains in the Society's treasury.

C. W. Bates spoke briefly of the final activities of the Joint Commission on Methodist Co-operation in North Carolina.

Formal addresses of splendid interest were then presented as follows:

"A Sketch of the History of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference" by W. A. Parsons;

"The Western North Carolina Conference, 1890-1939, Fifty Years" by S. B. Turrentine;

"A Sketch of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church" by J. Elwood Carroll.

With the singing of Hymn 278, "Lead On, O King Eternal," and the benediction given by W. A. Parsons, the Society adjourned.

Memoirs

ROBERT S. HOWIE

The Reverend Robert S. Howie was born in Mecklenburg County in the year 1869. He was the son of the late John Newton and Sophie Cruse Howie, pioneer residents of that county. These forbears were of "The salt of the earth," and that salt did not lose its savor in the scion. Spending his early years in an ideal country community, where the church and the home were rightly evaluated, he imbibed from childhood those principles and qualities of life that enter into the making of real Christian character.

He was admitted on trial into the Western North Carolina Conference at Statesville in the year of 1894 and appointed by Bishop A. W. Wilson as student to Trinity College, now Duke University, receiving his A. B. degree from that institution in 1895. This same year he was married to Miss James Cornelia Cunningham, the product of another fine Christian family, in the same community where Mr. Howie had been reared. In the fall of 1895 this hopeful young itinerant couple went to their first pastoral charge, the Charlotte Circuit, in their native county. Four successful years were spent on this first charge. Following this quadremium Mr. Howie's pastorates included Methodist churches at Webster, Franklin, Catawba, Statesville, Davidson, McAdenville, Charlotte, Madison, Albemarle, Asheville, Mocksville, Maiden, and Mount Airy. In the year 1921 he was made presiding elder by Bishop U. V. W. Darlington, serving the Waynesville District in this capacity for three years. Not having special taste for district work, at the end of the third year, he did the rather unusual thing by coming off the district and returning to the pastorate on his own motion.

Robert S. Howie was a man of pure mind and high ideals. His words were chaste and his purposes noble. His devotion to his family was beautiful. To his wife who, though never physically strong, shared with him the burdens and joys of the itinerant life, he ever showed the tenderest consideration. His children, Mrs. Paul Green and Miss Naomi Howie, both of Thomasville, the latter having served for the last twelve years as a missionary in China, and an only son, Robert, a business man in Charlotte, shall ever "rise up and call him blessed."

He was a good gospel preacher. His sermons were always scriptural and marked by an originality of thought and interpretation that interested his hearers. His unique manner of delivery was all his own.

In his friendships he was never over demonstrative, but sincere and true, and he was loved by his brethren.

While in Mount Airy in 1933, ill health forced him to retire. After that time he resided in Thomasville where he endeared himself to hundreds of people. Confined in his home for two months as a result of heart trouble, at last, on Monday afternoon, August the 14th, he heard his Master's final call and went home to his reward. On Wednesday afternoon, in the presence of a large congregation in his home church, "Old Harrison" on the Pineville Circuit, the simple but beautiful funeral ceremony was said. The Reverend C. M. Pickens, pastor of the family at Thomasville, assisted by the Reverend L. P. Barnett, local pastor, was in charge of the service. Many of the preachers of the Western North Carolina Conference stood by, with sympathetic hearts, as the body of this hero of the cross was quietly laid to rest alongside the ashes of many of his friends and loved ones who had preceded him to the grave. Robert S. Howie lived and died in the Christian faith which he had for so many years preached to others, and we know that all is well.

THOMAS CHANNCEY JORDAN

Thomas Channcey Jordan was born in Statesville, N. C., April 2nd, 1868, and died January 18th, 1939.

Educated in the Statesville schools and Trinity College, now Duke University. When a young man he served four years in the U. S. Army teaching a government post school part of that time. At the time he felt the call to preach he was engaged in the mercantile business in Phoebus, Va. He served two pastorates in the Virginia Conference, Manassas, Va., four years, and Newport News two years.

On June 12, 1901, he was married to Miss Etta Warfield Ingle of Maryland. To this union two children were born: Esther M. Jordan, now Mrs. Robert McRay Arledge of Hendersonville, N. C., and Thomas C. Jordan, Jr., of Marion, N. C.

Brother Jordan joined the Western N. C. Conference at Gastonia in 1901. He served the following charges: Andrews, 1901; Sylva, 1902-04; Summerfield, 1905-07; Spray, 1908-11; Lilesville, 1912-13; Reidsville, 1914-16; Rutherfordton, 1917-20; Mt. Zion, 1921-22; Bethel, Asheville, 1923-26; Spindale, 1927-28; Burnsville, 1929; Wilkesboro, 1930-32; Salem, 1933-34; Acton, 1935-36; Skyland, 1937. He was granted the superannuate relation in 1937.

Brother Jordan was a born gentleman. Modest in demeanor, gentle in manner, humble in spirit, sincere in heart, courageous in faith, consecrated to the work of the ministry. A preacher who loved the people and preached a gospel which they gladly heard. His gentle spirit was charged with true courage and wonderful energy. He was ready to defend the right at any time regardless of the cost. He took his appointment at the hand of his Bishop in the spirit of humility, and discharged his duty without bitterness or complaint. I never heard him make the least criticism of the church and he was always loyal to it, in a very marked degree. So ends a good life.

The funeral services were held in the Hendersonville Methodist Church and were in charge of his pastor, Reverend D. E. Camak, assisted by Dr. W. A. Lambeth and Reverend W. L. Hutchins. A large delegation of his brethren from the immediate vicinity and other parts of the Conference attended. The Interdenominational Ministerial Union of Asheville, of which Brother Jordan was for a number of years the faithful Secretary, was also well represented. His body rests in Oakdale Cemetery, Hendersonville, N. C.

"One by one we miss the voices of the preachers we loved so well to hear,
One by one their kindly faces in the darkness disappear:
No one knows the door that opens,
Through which they pass beyond recall;
Soft as loosened leaves of roses
One by one we see our preachers fall."

G. F. MILLAWAY

Rev. George Franklin Millaway was born in Guilford County, North Carolina, on March 19, 1861, and departed this life from his home near Greensboro, on March 22, 1939, his age being 77 years, 3 months and 3 days.

On December 20, 1888, he was united in marriage with Miss Mary Washington Andrews, with whom he lived happily for a little more than fifty years, they having celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on the 20th of last December.

He attended the public schools and Oak Ridge Institute. He was at Oak Ridge during the administration of those two great educators, Profs. J. A. and Martin H. Holt. Coming under the influence of those great men perhaps shaped his life for a more useful career.

He was admitted to the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church at Winston-Salem in November, 1890, and continued to serve most acceptably until his health failed in 1931.

On Sunday of the High Point Conference of 1931, he preached the ordination sermon and was superannuated on the following day, a very unusual experience for any one.

His first charge was Cedar Falls Circuit, where he served four years. Other charges served by him were the Randolph Circuit, the Liberty Circuit, Burlington, First Church; Winston-Salem, First Church; Greensboro, St. Paul, Tabernacle Circuit, Mt. Pleasant Circuit, and Concord, First Church.

He was a man who was popular with his people, and served long pastorates. His preaching was evangelistic and effective. He was in great demand as a revivalist. His appeals to the unsaved were almost irresistible, and hundreds of people were converted under his preaching.

His greatness was seen in his consecration. He radiated a holy influence. He thought of his body as the temple of the Holy Ghost. He thought of the members of his body as instruments of righteousness. He thought of his time as holy unto the Lord. He assiduously cultivated his mind to the glory of God and this he kept up till the last.

Not only was his greatness seen in his consecration, but in his humility. He was sure of his call to the ministry, and he looked to God to supply his every need. He believed that "sufficient unto the day, is the evil thereof."

He was great in his enthusiasm. With him, the King's business required haste. Whatever he did, he did it with all his might and this was especially true in his revival work.

And finally, his greatness was seen in his courage. No sacrifice was too great, no cup was too bitter, no cross was too heavy, no problem too difficult, no danger too great for him to brave, if it were for his Lord and Master.

In the pulpit, he was fearless. He believed in declaring the whole counsel of God. He loved the praise of God more than the praise of men. Solomon said, "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace." That statement was never more beautifully exemplified than in the sickness and death of Rev. G. F. Millaway.

JAMES P. MORRIS

James P. Morris, son of George W. and Nancy Geer Morris, was born in Rutherford County, North Carolina, April 5, 1873. He was educated in the schools of his native county, and at Rutherford College. He studied law at Wake Forest College and practiced his profession at Rutherfordton for a number of years. During this time he represented his county in the Legislature one term.

In 1912 Brother Morris definitely decided to answer a long-felt call to the ministry. He was licensed to preach by the Morganton District Conference, and that fall was appointed as supply pastor on the Spruce Pine-Bakersville Charge. At Charlotte, in 1913, he was admitted on trial into the Western North Carolina Conference, and returned to the Spruce Pine-Bakersville Charge, where he finished out the quadrennium. The other charges served were, in the order named: Marion Circuit, Spruce Pine (the second time), Watauga Circuit, Madison, Draper, Walnut Cove, Hickory Grove, Cramerton, Gold Hill, Dudley Shoals and Rutherford College. He was finishing up the third year of, possibly, his most successful pastorate when God called him home October 7, 1939. His death was the result of a fall nearly three weeks before. Loved ones and friends did all they could for him, and he seemed to respond to treatment, but the shock was too great for his frail body, and gradually he slipped away.

As evidence of the satisfactory work done on this, his last charge, the official board had unanimously asked for his return for the fourth year, and, realizing the possibility of physical handicap, the group of superannuates located at Rutherford College, had offered to take over his work if he were not able to do it.

Brother Morris was a good gospel preacher. His legal training caused him to be a bit tedious, in the estimation of some, as he laid the foundation for his message, but his careful preparation of his "case for the jury" got results as is indicated by the number of people received on profession of faith on every charge he served. One of the chief joys of his ministry was his work among the young people. Wherever he went he devoted his best talent to the solution of their problems. He won many of them for his Master, inspired them by his devoted example, and sent them out into lives of service. Many among us made a larger number of friends than did Jim Morris, but none made friends that were more devoted.

Brother Morris had suffered much for many years, and many times he had to draw on a depleted stock of reserve strength in order that his work might be done. He was never satisfied until he had done his best. He would have lasted longer had he thought of self more.

Like so many Methodist preachers Jim was most fortunate in the woman he chose as his life's companion, for Mary McFarland, to whom he was married December 24, 1902, not only proved to be a faithful wife and helpmeet, but an inspiration through all the years. Many lives have been cheered and transformed, and many communities have been blessed because these two servants of God passed their way. He has answered the roll call in the conference of the saints. She, with the habit of scattering sunshine, is left to carry on, leaning on the personally tested promise, "My grace shall be sufficient."

The funeral, attended by a great host, was conducted at Rutherford College by the writer of this memoir, assisted by Rev. J. C. Cornet, district superintendent

of the Marion District, and Dr. A. T. Abernethy, one of his former teachers. His body was laid to rest in a crypt of the mausoleum in Woodlawn Cemetery, Charlotte, N. C.

ORION PEDELLAR ROUTH

Rev. Orion Pedellar Routh, son of Joshua Marion Routh and Sallie Hannah Routh, was born near Liberty, N. C., Randolph County, May 25, 1867, and departed this life March 22, 1939, at his home near East Bend, N. C.

Brother Routh was married to Miss Anna Catherine Kinyoun May 25, 1900. Sister Routh was a strong support and helper in his work, laboring side by side with her husband to bring lost souls to Christ and still lives to bless all who come under her Christian influence. To this union was born four children which survive him: Mrs. M. L. Zimmerman, Lexington, N. C.; Mrs. E. L. Varner, High Point, N. C.; M. Kinyoun Routh, East Bend, N. C.; and William H. Routh, High Point, N. C. At the age of 12, Brother Routh was converted at Grays Chapel Camp Ground and united with the M. P. Church at Grays Chapel and nine years later preached his first sermon at the age of 21 in the same church. The summer before he was taken up to his Heavenly Home he was invited back there to their home-coming and, at the age of 71, preached his last sermon on earth, in the same church he was saved in and where he preached his first sermon fifty years before. Brother Routh attended school at Liberty High School and Yadkin College and taught several years before he entered the ministry. Brother Routh was an active minister for forty years, serving 39 years in the pastorate and one year in the evangelistic work.

Brother Routh served the following charges in the M. P. Church: Pee Dee, 1893-94; Albemarle Sound, 1895-96; Ivey, 1897-98; Mocksville, 1900-1900; Evangelist Work, 1900-01; Spring Church, Va., 1901-03; Jamestown, 1904-05; Grays Chapel, 1906-08. Here he finished his work in the M. P. Church. In the fall of 1908 he joined the N. C. Conference and the same fall, at the request of Rev. J. M. Huggins, presiding elder of the Statesville District, he was transferred to the Western North Carolina Conference and served the following charges: Olin, 1909; East Bend, 1910; Stoneville, 1911; Hickory Circuit, 1912; McDowell, 1913-14; Danbury, 1915-18; Dobson, 1919; Jonesville, 1920; New Hope Academy, 1921-23; Deep River, 1924-25; Shepherd, 1926; Dudley Shoals, 1927-28; Hickory Circuit, 1929; Old Fort, 1930. In the fall of 1930, Brother Routh was superannuated and remained in that relationship until death. He possessed a strong and beautiful Christian character. He was quiet and unassuming, never trying to make a show of his religion, yet how sweet and real was his experience with Christ. He believed in living a pure, sinless life in this world. He was a Methodist preacher who seemed to be going on to perfection and one of many who reached that glorious experience in this present world.

Brother Routh and family moved to their farm, soon after he was superannuated, near East Bend, N. C., where they lived sweetly and quietly together until God called him to a house not made with hands eternal in the heavens. He was always thoughtful of his pastor and faithful to East Bend Church where he taught the Bible class as long as he was able to attend church.

On Wednesday afternoon, March 22, at his home that he loved so well, overlooking the Yadkin River, while he and his good wife were there alone, he looked up toward heaven, and said, "I want to go through that door up there." His wife said, "Mr. Routh, what door?" He said, "There is but one door to go through," and like a baby going to sleep, he went away without a struggle.

His funeral was conducted in East Bend Methodist Church, March 23, at 2:30 p. m. by Dr. W. A. Lambeth, Rev. W. L. Hutchins, Rev. J. L. Ingram, Rev. W. F. Ashburn, Rev. R. S. Truesdale, and Rev. W. M. Rathburn. His body was laid to rest in East Bend Cemetery.

ALFRED LELAND STANFORD

A pall of sadness fell upon Lincolnton, and upon many other towns where he had preached, when the sudden death of Dr. Stanford was announced. He returned August 25, 1939, from a visit to relatives in Winston-Salem and beyond, so depressed that he called his physician, who, upon examination, found no serious symptoms. At 11:30 o'clock that night he fell to the floor and in a few minutes his heart was still. He lived nobly, wrought wisely, and left a record for useful service that few pastors have ever excelled. His was a fruitful ministry. He was not only an earnest gospel preacher but a pastor who loved his people, made their interests his interests, watched over his flock like a good shepherd, knew by name every child of the congregation, and they all loved him, was deeply interested in the spiritual life of the young people, guided them along the narrow way and was a big brother to them all. He was a faithful pastor, going from house to house carrying hope to the distressed and cheer to the lonely. He spared not himself, but day or night, through cold or heat, he went to comfort cast down and needy souls. He never turned his face from any poor man for he knew no difference between the humble and the well-to-do.

He was a fervent and earnest preacher, forgetting himself, standing humbly behind the cross, as a voice, telling the story of redemption through Christ Jesus, urging believers to strive for lofty Christian experience and for sinners to turn to God and the better life.

He excelled in evangelistic work for every sermon carried the evangelistic note and it was his rule to hold frequent revival services in his church.

Every church he served was built up in spirituality, in membership and high efficiency. He had many calls from pastors to conduct revival meetings and during his long ministry aided pastors in many churches throughout the state from the mountains to the sea, and also in other states, resulting in thousands of conversions and additions to the churches, not including those in his own pastorates.

"He excelled as a builder. On the Boone Circuit, his first charge, he built a new church at each of his seven preaching points; at Leaksville he built the present church and the parsonage beside it. The spacious educational building and handsome parsonage at Gastonia were constructed during his pastorate, as was also the beautiful church and parsonage in Shelby when he was pastor there. During his two years at Tryon Street, Charlotte, he began and completed the magnificent First Methodist Church, now occupied by the united Tryon Street and Trinity Churches. A sixty thousand dollar addition was made to Broad Street Church, Statesville, during his quadrennium there and substantial improvements were made to the church property in all the other charges which he served, the last being the educational building erected in Lincolnton where he concluded his labors. No pastor of our church in this state has made such a record as a church builder.

He possessed superior gifts—a combination of gifts—wonderful success in winning souls to Christ, a pastor par excellence and organizer and leader in substantial, constructive work. Few are those who possess all of these gifts. He excelled in each of them.

I first knew him when his pastor in 1894. Then he was a student in Trinity College, now Duke University, preparing for his work as a minister. He was then a local preacher. When he completed his college work, he was assigned to the Boone Circuit where he served for four years, three years as a supply, then admitted into Conference on trial he finished his four years at Boone in 1900. He then served as pastor at Leaksville, Norwood, Wadesboro, Hendersonville, Lexington, Hickory, Gastonia, Shelby, Tryon Street, Charlotte, Statesville, Salisbury, Monroe and Lincolnton, making in all forty-two years of faithful service.

He was born near Wentworth, Rockingham County, North Carolina, May 14, 1872, son of H. W. and Matilda Ellington Stanford. Married to Miss Ethel Caroline Wall in Chester, S. C., January 10, 1928. In June, 1928, the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on him by Asbury College, Wilmore, Ky.

He was a devoted husband and father and his family life was beautiful. The wife and two little daughters, Carolyn and Mary Wall, survive.

He died August 25, 1939, and on Sunday (27th) the funeral service was conducted in the Lincolnton Church by the Rev. Claude H. Moser, the district superintendent, assisted by Rev. B. Wilson, Rev. Chas. Stokes and the writer. A great multitude attended the service, including about forty of his ministerial brethren. The body was taken to Chester, S. C., for burial. Rev. Marvin Wharton

pastor of Bethel Methodist Church in Chester, assisted Brother Moser in the committal service there.

Brother Stanford was a warm-hearted, friendly man who loved people and his passing brings sorrow to many hearts. May grace and peace in full measure fill the hearts of the sorrowing family.

THOMAS EUGENE WAGG

Rev. Thomas Eugene Wagg was born in Jefferson, Ashe County, North Carolina, January 15, 1855, and passed away at his home in Rutherford College, May 15, 1939—being in his eighty-fifth year. He was the son of Dr. James Wagg and Elizabeth Duvall Wagg, his father being a practicing physician and local preacher—a man of ability and wide influence in his section. For a few years Brother Wagg practiced dentistry, but soon felt the insistent call of the ministry and made answer with such devotion that for more than forty years it was his whole work and his great delight.

He joined the Holston Conference in 1885, but at the second session of this Conference he transferred to it and was active in its ministry until his superannuation in 1924.

Brother Wagg was twice married. His first wife was Miss Mary Ellen Burkett. From this union five children survive. His second marriage was to Miss Harriet Moore and of this union seven children survive. He was buried in Morganton, North Carolina, May 16, 1939. Reverends W. L. Scott, W. A. Newell and J. P. Morris conducted the service.

It is easy to sum up the bare facts of a man's life, but it is very hard to sum up his work and character. In his very great modesty, Brother Wagg would be the last to demand fulsome praise or an excessively high appraisal of his work. But it is my conviction that any man who lives as loftily as did Brother Wagg deserves to have his name enshrined somewhere in records that are permanent, and as one who was close to him through many years, I can speak with certainty about his work and life.

In the first place, he was a preacher—sure of his call, sure of his message. And he was an exceptionally good preacher—careful in preparation and earnest in presenting his message. He called himself “an old-fashioned” preacher. By this he did not mean one who had lost step with his age, for he never did; rather he meant that things that he found to be fundamental when he became a Christian remained fundamental with him to the end. He had very accurate and definite views on economic and political questions, but he used his pulpit for things he thought more important. To him it was a sounding-board from which to announce his faith in a living Christ and Christ's adequacy to save even the lowest. He never took his message lightly, but proclaimed it, to use an old phrase, “as a dying man to dying men.” He felt it was an inescapable obligation on him to persuade men to accept the life of righteousness and to warn them that any other life was futile and foolish. His preaching was fashioned at the forge of experience and glowed with the heat of spiritual fire. I have heard him many times and I never heard him preach a poor sermon, nor one that did not show most painstaking preparation; and he would have died rather than have descended from the high level on which he believed his message should be placed. Yes, he was first and always a preacher and one of the best.

Again, he was an itinerant preacher. When he promised to go where he was sent, he meant it. And how he went! When he came into this Conference he told the Bishop he wanted to serve his own people, those of mountain and Piedmont North Carolina, and this was largely his field. In our Conference he served circuits, stations and three districts—all three difficult from the standpoint of travel—Franklin, Morganton and North Wilkesboro. He traveled over rough, muddy roads in cold and rain, but only the years finally told on his body; his spirit remained as young and eager as ever. He was called to be a minister and to be an itinerant and he responded to the full measure of strength to both.

So much for his work, but what of the man? Here he was truly great. Clean from boyhood, no hint ever was whispered against him. He stood for righteousness and he lived righteously. Tender in his dealings with the wayward, toward himself relentless in his requirements on his own character. There was “nothing against him” on the records of the Conference for more than fifty years and he

carried with him when he went to give his account the unspotted record of a Christian gentleman.

But he was other than preacher and itinerant. He was a brother beloved, with a brother's understanding heart. He was a friend whose loyalty never failed. He was a churchman who loved all that his church did. He was a faithful husband and devoted father. Call the roll of the higher virtues and check his character against it. He will grade high on every one of them.

Intellectually alert, he kept his interest in public and church affairs to the end. He was brought up just at the time when passions of men ran high and war hatred was still rife, but its bitterness did not enter his soul. He rejoiced at the approaching consummation of Methodist Union, having long since been convinced that such union would hasten the coming of the Kingdom.

Years ago the prophet Micah asked a question which was surely not simply rhetorical, "And what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy and to walk humbly with thy God?"

If this be the standard of God's man, then Thomas Eugene Wagg was one of them. I quote from a beautiful tribute written by one of his sons:

"One thing about his last day is significant. For several days before he died, the chain of the Blue Ridge mountains, cast in bold relief on a clear day and easily visible for miles from the porch of his home, had been shrouded in mist. On the morning of his funeral a light rain fell, but by afternoon the day was a brilliant, beautiful spring day, as gorgeous as spring days can be. His last service was conducted in the last church he had a definite part in building. As the cortege wound its way over twisting roads from Rutherford College to Morganton, the mists on these mountains lifted. Once again Grandfather raised his face into the bright heavens above. Table Rock stood like a sentinel guarding an immense portal, literally suffused in brilliant sunlight. The whole chain of mountains stood like soldiers at attention as the little cortege moved along. His mountains had not failed him, and those who rode behind this man of God experienced anew the lasting qualities of the simple love and the quiet, eternal faith that lived within him."

Daily Proceedings

FIRST DAY—THURSDAY, OCTOBER 19, 1939

Centenary Methodist Church, Greensboro, N. C.

Opening: The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church met at 10:30 a. m. today for its sixty-second annual session. Bishop Wallace E. Brown presided. After the Conference sang the hymn, "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah," Bishop Brown led in prayer.

Roll Call: The Secretary of the last Conference session called the roll of ministerial members. The Secretary of the last lay Conference called the roll of lay members.

Elections: The Secretary, the Treasurer, the Statistician and all their assistants were elected by the Conference. (See list of these officers on the last preceding page.) E. M. Graham was elected Reporter to the Secular Press.

Greetings: Rev. C. S. Kirkpatrick, pastor of Centenary Church, brought cordial greetings, bidding us welcome to the building and conveniences. The Bishop responded, speaking the appreciation of the Conference.

Rev. C. C. Herbert, Jr., represented the Brotherhood of the Western North Carolina Conference and invited our preachers to become members.

Rev. A. W. Plyler represented the North Carolina Christian Advocate and requested the co-operation of the preachers in circulating it.

Rev. W. P. King represented the Nashville Christian Advocate and invited our patronage.

Mrs. Wallace E. Brown spoke by request of the Conference and she took occasion to say that she was glad to be in our Conference again.

District Superintendent: The character of W. J. Plint was passed and he read a report of his work for the year.

Transfers: Under Question 21, the Bishop announced the transfer of Walter H. Pavy from the Maine Conference.

Under Question 37 he announced the transfer of H. H. Shaw, a probationer in third year's studies, to the Virginia Conference; of Charles W. Martin, a probationer of the first year, to the Holston Conference; of J. R. Kirby to the Northwest Iowa Conference; and of Paul A. Barker to the Northwest Indiana Conference.

Withdrawn: The Bishop read a letter from C. C. Williams requesting that his name be removed from the list of members of the Conference and of the church. The request was granted. (Question 39.)

Louie A. Lewis' credentials were presented and he was permitted to withdraw from the Conference. (Question 39.)

Questions 23, 25, 26, and 34: None were received on credentials. None were continued on trial. None have been discontinued. The character of each preacher was examined in open Conference.

Full Membership: Under Question 27 and 28, Albert W. Wellons was advanced to studies of the third year, was recommended for ordination as a deacon, and was elected to full membership.

Graduate: Under Question 30, Vance A. Lewis was graduated from the course of study and elected to elder's orders, to be ordained at the North Carolina Conference. Lowell C. Stevens was also graduated and elected to elder's orders.

Under Question 32, Miss Ruby Bailey, local preacher, having completed the course of study, was graduated and elected to elder's orders.

The Conference adjourned to meet at 2 p. m. Bishop Brown pronounced the benediction.

FIRST DAY—THURSDAY, OCTOBER 19, 1939

AFTERNOON SESSION

After the singing of two hymns and after prayer by V. A. Morton and Y. D. Poole, the Conference entered on the business before it.

Full Membership: Albert W. Wellons was asked the questions prescribed by the Discipline. His answers being satisfactory, he was welcomed into Conference membership by Bishop Brown.

Accepted Supplies: Question 35 was called. The Committee on Accepted Supplies recommended that T. W. Bryant, G. E. Keeler, J. W. Smith, and A. A. Somers be made accepted supply pastors. This was done.

To clear up a seeming irregularity, J. J. Wood, the Secretary of the District Conference, was authorized to change the record to show the reception of A. A. Somers from the M. E. Church, South, as a local preacher.

Under Question 37, the accepted supplies were listed in their proper years in the courses of study.

Various Questions: Question 2 was answered, "Yes." Question 3 was answered, "None." Under Question 5, Bishop Brown called attention to the Uniting Conference requirement that the churches should continue to send connectional funds to the same Treasurers as heretofore until after the next General Conference. Dr. Plint suggested that the new Conference might provide for sending such moneys through a Conference Treasurer. Questions 13, 14, 15, 16, and 17 were referred to the new Conference.

Sale of Lot: C. M. White requested that the Conference authorize the Directors of Incorporation to sell a vacant lot at Nina in Cherokee County.

Introductions: Dr. L. L. Gobbel, President of Greensboro College, was introduced. He invited the Conference to a reception at the college this afternoon.

Walter H. Pavy, recent transfer from the Maine Conference, was introduced.

Condolences: The Secretary was instructed to send to Rev. W. L. Hart an expression of sympathy in the death of Mrs. Hart. Also he was instructed to send similar expression to those bereft in the deaths of Mr. R. C. Kennedy, Mrs. R. F. Reynolds, Mr. A. D. Hester, Mrs. J. B. Tucker, and Mrs. Lucy Dry.

The Conference then adjourned until 9 a. m. Friday.

SECOND DAY—FRIDAY MORNING

The Conference assembled at 9 a. m. Bishop Brown conducted the worship service, basing his remarks on Paul's sentence, "In Him who strengthens me I am able for anything." He urged that we follow the leadership of Christ. The Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

Checks: The Bishop announced the receipt of a check for \$236.00 from the Board of Pensions and one of \$60.00 from the Chartered Fund. These were for the benefit of the Conference claimants.

Visitors: Dr. Paul N. Garber, of Duke University, spoke of the Conference records at Duke University and invited us to make that the depository for any Methodist records of value. J. J. Wood moved that we accept this offer with thanks. The motion prevailed.

Dr. W. S. Sharp, of Misenheimer, set forth the progress and purposes of Pfeiffer College.

Dr. I. S. McElroy spoke of the work of the American Bible Society and called attention to Universal Bible Sunday, December 10.

Mr. J. B. Ivey, of Charlotte, spoke kind words of greeting to the Conference.

Boards and Committees: Dr. W. J. Plint made nominations of various Boards of Trustees and Directors. They were elected. (See Boards and Committees.) The Trustees of the Statesville District Parsonage were instructed to sell that property and apply the proceeds, after the claim of the Board of Home Missions is satisfied, to the parsonage debt of the Boulevard Church.

The Trustees of the Asheville District Parsonage were instructed to sell and to apply the proceeds to the French Broad Avenue Church, Asheville.

The Trustees of Graham Collegiate Institute were instructed to sell and to apply the proceeds on the debt of the Marshallberg congregation.

Minute Fund: An offering of \$26.10 was received, paying in full the deficit in the Minute Fund of last session.

Received on Trial: Under Question 24, upon recommendation of the Committee on Conference Relations, W. Earl Armstrong was received on trial and placed in the class of the first year.

Retired Relation: Under Question 42, upon recommendation of the Committee on Conference Relations, J. M. Wall and S. N. Bumgarner were granted the Retired Relation. Each of them spoke of his appreciation of the fellowship of his brethren and of his love for the work. The names of the others in this relation were called and their pastors spoke of their loyalty to the church and to the Christ. The pastors were requested to convey to these brethren the cordial greetings of the Conference.

The Conference took five minutes recess.

Tokens of Esteem: Vernon A. Morton, representing the Conference, spoke to Bishop and Mrs. Brown of our appreciation of their kindness and faithfulness through the eight years that they have been with us, then presented to them a Seth Thomas clock with chimes as a token of our abiding affection. Bishop and Mrs. Brown responded happily, assuring us of their continuing interest and friendship.

Y. D. Poole, in a few chosen words, presented to Dr. W. J. Plint, retiring District Superintendent, a beautiful desk set as a token to him from the preachers of the district. Dr. Plint responded with appreciation and good will.

Tabulated Reports: Under Question 4, the Treasurer's report was read by totals and ordered printed. The Statistician's report was read by totals and ordered printed. A committee was appointed to revise these reports, entering items that may yet come in. W. J. Plint, C. M. White, and Z. V. Arthur are the committee.

Auditing: The Auditing Committee, C. J. Winslow and E. W. Mills, reported that they had examined the accounts of C. C. Benton and W. J. Plint, District Superintendents; of R. F. Reynolds, Treasurer of the Conference Board of Stewards; of W. H. Pless, Conference Treasurer; of O. M. Vernon, Treasurer of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension; and of W. A. Parsons, Secretary, and that all were found correct.

Legal Document: The Secretary read a legal paper declaring that the Western North Carolina Conference and the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church are the legal successors of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference in directing every spiritual interest and every property interest formerly under the control of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference. There were fifty-eight persons present and voting. Fifty-eight voted in favor of the adoption of this paper and none against it.

Property Interests: S. W. Johnson moved that \$20.68 remaining from the sale of the Broad Creek property be applied to improvements on the Statesville District parsonage. This was agreed to.

The Board of Directors of Incorporation were instructed to dispose of the Murphy parsonage property at their discretion.

Treasurer of Home Missions: O. M. Vernon, Treasurer of the Board of Home Missions, presented a report of Receipts and Disbursements. The receipts for maintenance were \$1,760.15 and for Church Extension, \$550.00. The disbursements were the same as the receipts.

Board of Stewards: Under Questions 9 and 10, it was ordered that the report of the Board of Stewards be accepted without reading. R. F. Reynolds read a report of the Endowment Fund.

Bishop Brown named a Distributing Committee consisting of C. M. White, W. J. Plint, and W. A. Parsons to carry out the provisions of paragraph 1312 of the Discipline.

Appreciation: J. L. Thornburg, in behalf of the laymen, spoke in appreciation of the work of Bishop and Mrs. Brown, also of the associations with members of the Conference.

Bishop Brown requested the Secretary to express to the pastor and congregation of Centenary Church our thanks for the use of their building.

Minutes: C. O. Newell moved that the Secretary and the District Superintendent be authorized to incorporate in the official minutes any necessary items that may have been overlooked. This was agreed to.

The Journal of Friday's session was approved without reading. The Secretary was authorized to edit the Journal of the entire session. The Journal, as edited and approved from time to time, was made the official record of this Annual Conference.

Final Adjournment: C. M. White read the resolution of final adjournment. (See Resolutions.) This was adopted. Bishop Brown led the closing prayer.

Certificate: The foregoing is the Official Journal of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church in its sixty-second and final session held in Greensboro, N. C., October 19-20, 1939.

Reports

(a) DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT, 1939

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

We come to our last mile as the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference. God has been good to us. Pastors and laymen have been loyal and faithful. However, we must not conceive of this as a time to relax; rather it is a time for re-consecration to larger tasks in a larger field.

The year has passed quickly. For busy folks, time is always swift in its flight. And, you have been busy. We rejoice in your victories. May God bless you and equip you for the tasks that lie before us as a United Methodism.

The condition of our Conference is much better than one year ago. Spiritually in particular, financially as well. More conversions have been reported; more pastors will report in full; others much more nearly in full than one year ago.

Among the twelve charges of the former Asheville District, under our supervision, four reported pastors paid in full in 1938. Six or more promise to report in full in 1939 and pastoral support will approximate ninety per cent of claims. World Service among these same charges was fifty-nine per cent in 1938; this year it will be slightly over sixty per cent of askings.

Among the sixteen charges of the former Statesville District, under our supervision, ten paid pastors in full in 1938, eleven or more promise to report in full in 1939 and pastoral support will approximate ninety-seven per cent of claims. World Service was seventy-five per cent of askings in 1938 and will be near seventy-eight per cent of askings this year.

The Asheville charges report over three hundred conversions and one hundred and seventy-five additions. The Statesville charges report just under two hundred conversions and one hundred additions. We have asked that all membership rolls be revised carefully as a large number have died. Our losses may largely offset our gains, but there will be some gains in membership. Those charges not under our supervision may change this result.

Most of you will find yourselves in larger fields and from a slight to a substantial increase in support. This will mean larger responsibilities and privileges. We pray that each may prove equal to every occasion. We believe you will. We have faith in you and we believe in God, who will help each of us to do our best.

We cannot close without expressing a word of appreciation of Bishop Brown. We thank him for his kind words and his praise of the splendid work you as pastors and laymen have been doing.

We come with a strangely palpitating heart to thank you for your loyalty and devotion. Pastors and laymen have vied to make things pleasant for us. We have tried to do our best, but our best has been far short of our desires. We commend you to Almighty God, who is able to keep you and present you faultless before His throne.

Resolutions

UNITING THE BLUE RIDGE-ATLANTIC CONFERENCE

of the

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH

with the

WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OR THE NORTH CAROLINA
CONFERENCE

of the

METHODIST CHURCH

WHEREAS, the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church, each according to the constitutional provisions of their respective denominations, have united to form the Methodist Church; and

WHEREAS, in the Declaration of the Union under date of May 10, 1939, the regularly elected delegates to the Uniting Conference called for the purpose of completing the act of union, did, in the city of Kansas City, Missouri, on the above date, declare as follows:

"The Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church, in adopting the name 'THE METHODIST CHURCH' for the united church, do not and will not surrender any right, interest or title in and to the respective names which, by long and honored use and association, have become dear to the ministry and membership of the three uniting churches, and have become enshrined in their history and records.

"The Methodist Church is the ecclesiastical successor to these three uniting churches, and through which the three churches as one United Church shall continue to live and have their existence, continue their institutions, hold and enjoy their property, exercise and perform their several trusts under and in accord with the Plan of Union and Discipline of the United Church and such trusts or corporate bodies as exist in the constituent churches shall be continued as long as legally necessary"; and

WHEREAS, the properly constituted delegates to the said Uniting Conference did define the powers of Annual Conferences and describe their geographical boundaries, by which description it is provided that there shall be two Annual Conferences in the State of North Carolina, to be known as the North Carolina Annual Conference and the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, in accordance with boundaries defined in the Discipline of 1939; and did provide that Conferences or portions of Conferences, together with their corporate boards, institutions and associations of whatever nature, lying within the aforesaid geographical limits shall automatically constitute the new Conference thus formed; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with permissive legislation of the several denominations thus merging, many of the local churches, and our Conference, are bodies corporate under the laws of the State, and whose Directors, or Trustees, are elected or confirmed by the merging Conferences, or one of them.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: By the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, that each local church now incorporated under the laws of the State of North Carolina in which it is located and operating under the authority of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church is hereby authorized to continue to function through its existing corporation and become amenable to the Western North Carolina or the North Carolina Conference, within the bounds of which such said church exists, and any authority of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference

of the Methodist Episcopal Church is hereby delegated to the Western North Carolina or the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the incorporation of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church is hereby continued until such time as the Western North Carolina Annual Conference and the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church shall decide it shall be surrendered or amended.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That any authority over, or any functions of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in behalf of any board, institution or association now held, or any duty required by any instrument or organization of such board, institution or association, to be exercised by the said Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, or any privilege now enjoyed by said Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, be hereby delegated, transferred and surrendered to the Western North Carolina Annual Conference or the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.

We hereby CERTIFY that the above resolutions were passed by the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in regular session in Centenary Methodist Church, Greensboro, North Carolina, on October 20, 1939.

WHEREAS, the business of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church is now completed:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the said Blue Ridge-Atlantic Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church be dissolved; and that we, together with the other Conferences involved, viz: the Western North Carolina Annual Conference or the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, proceed to merge into the new Western North Carolina Annual Conference or North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, whose boundaries are defined by the Discipline of 1939, as authorized by the Uniting Conference, held in Kansas City, Missouri, May 10, 1939.

MINUTES OF THE 112th AND FINAL SESSION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST PROTESTANT CHURCH

The 112th and final session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, began in Grace Church, Greensboro, Rev. J. Elwood Carroll, pastor, Wednesday, October 18, 1939, at 10:00 a. m.

The Conference sermon was preached by E. O. Peeler, pastor of the Ann Street Church, Concord. Subject: "Paul's Central Message."

The bar of Conference was fixed to include the pews across the auditorium beginning with the third window forward. The Conference program was distributed and adopted.

On motion, the name of Rev. G. F. Millaway was transferred to the roll of the honored dead.

Bishop Purell and the members of his cabinet were escorted to the front of the church. Bishop Straughn presented Bishop Purell, who in turn, introduced the members of the cabinet. Bishop Purell spoke briefly,

after which he and his cabinet took seats to hear the report of President Pritchard.

With Bishop Straughn in the chair, the President submitted his annual report. The message was referred to the proper committee and his official character passed, the Conference standing in appreciation.

H. F. Surratt, Secretary of the Conference Faculty, submitted a partial report recommending acceptance of the transfer of Dr. G. I. Humphreys, President of High Point College, from the Maryland Conference. Conference so voted. Bishop Straughn escorted President Humphreys to the platform, and the latter spoke briefly. Conference voted to adjourn for committee work immediately after the submission of pastors' reports this afternoon.

On motion, conference voted to give Capt. A. M. Rankin an honorary seat within the bar.

S. W. Taylor spoke of the "History of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church," written by J. Elwood Carroll, Conference Historian, which has just come from the press.

Conference adjourned with benediction by F. W. Paschall.

AFTERNOON SESSION

1:45. After a brief song service conducted by E. Lester Ballard, Conference Chorister, a business session was entered into.

The Secretary spoke of the Combined Minutes and answered a number of questions with regard to them.

The election of officers was entered into. The President stated that the United Conference had ruled that the Presidents of Annual Conferences should remain in office until the Conferences were merged, so an election was not necessary in his case. On motion, the Assistant Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Conference for the election of C. W. Bates, as Secretary. The Secretary addressed the Conference, expressing appreciation for the twenty-five years of service. Conference stood in recognition.

The following were re-elected to their respective offices with the casting of the unanimous ballot by the Secretary: E. G. Cowan, Statistical Secretary; J. H. Allen, Treasurer; Paul S. Kennett, Keeper of Records; J. Elwood Carroll, Historian; J. L. Trollinger, Press Representative.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for the election of W. L. Ward as lay member of the Stationing Committee. The Secretary chose F. W. Paschall as his assistant.

On motion, M. A. Coble and Edward Suits were elected to succeed themselves as Conference Trustees; S. W. Taylor was re-elected a member of the Boundary Committee; and W. A. Davies and W. F. Redding, Jr., were re-elected to the Board of Church Extension.

A list of Trustees of High Point College whose terms expire this year was submitted as having been re-elected by the Board of Trustees of High Point College, and on motion, Conference approved the elections.

At the request of R. M. Andrews, his name was deleted from the list of Trustees of the College, his term having expired.

On motion, the members of the Committee on Financial Recommendations were re-elected, as were the Committees to Audit the Books of the Conference Treasurer and of the Business Manager of the Herald.

On motion the Conference voted to continue the officers and directors of the Pastors' Summer School.

On motion, the order of the day—submission of pastors' reports—was postponed to hear Bishop Straughn.

On motion of G. L. Curry, Conference voted to purchase a copy of "The History of Yadkin Collegiate Institute" and place it in the High Point College Library.

It was voted that the pastors should make a separate statement as to Appreciation Year receipts and credits, and hand to the Secretary of the Conference.

The Roll of Charges was called, and the pastors submitted their reports.

Dr. L. L. Gobbel, President of Greensboro College, was introduced and invited the members of the Conference to a reception at the College tomorrow afternoon. On behalf of the Board of Lay Activities he also invited the lay members of the Conference to a banquet at the College Friday afternoon.

C. L. Spencer pronounced the benediction.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT

7:30. There was a joint session of the Historical Society at West Market Street Church at this hour.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 19

9:00. President Pritchard called the Conference to order and the roll was called. The devotional service was in charge of Bishop Straughn. The minutes of yesterday's sessions were read, corrected and approved.

President Pritchard called Geo. R. Brown to the chair and asked to be excused from the Conference room for a meeting with the Stationing Committee. The members of the Superannuated Fund Society were excused for a meeting.

At 10:00 the order of the day was a meeting in the interest of the Children's Home. Rev. A. G. Dixon, Superintendent of the Home, presented Capt. A. M. Rankin, who read his report as Treasurer of the Home. The Superintendent then read his report. On motion, both reports were adopted, the latter by a rising vote of appreciation. The report of the Special Committee of Fifteen to Devise Plans for Operating the Homes for the next Conference year was submitted and adopted.

The Secretary read a letter from Dr. R. L. Shipley, Editor of the Methodist Protestant-Recorder, and was authorized to make suitable reply.

The Conference then entered into a meeting in the interest of High Point College. Dr. G. I. Humphreys, President of the College, submitted his report, which was adopted by a rising vote. Dr. Humphreys introduced Dr. F. W. Stephenson, Secretary of the Board of Education, Department of Educational Institutions, who spoke and in turn introduced Dr. W. F. Quillian, General Secretary of the Board of Christian Education of the former M. E. Church, South, who spoke to the Conference. The report of the Treasurer of the Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference was submitted and adopted.

At the suggestion of Bishop Straughn, Conference authorized the President to appoint a Distributing Committee on Conference Claimants to work with like committees from the other Conferences in the state. The committee consists of Geo. R. Brown, J. D. Williams, and R. C. Stubbins.

An Ad Interim Committee was also authorized to make such adjustments as may be necessary in the work of uniting the Conferences. The committee is as follows: S. W. Taylor, R. M. Andrews, J. E. Pritchard, the latter being named Chairman.

Rev. E. A. Shenk and Dr. G. W. Haddaway were introduced to Conference.

At 11:30 Conference adjourned with prayer by J. S. Williams.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

1:30. The President called the Conference to order and asked Geo. R. Brown to take the chair.

Mrs. R. M. Andrews submitted her report as President of the North Carolina Branch of Woman's Work. The report was accepted with a rising vote of appreciation for the work the women of the Conference have done through the years.

A partial report of the Conference faculty was submitted, recommending the election to elder's orders and membership in the Conference of Jesse Leo Pittard and Sulon Gurney Ferree, they having met the Disciplinary requirements. The Certificate of Election follows:

This is to certify that on the recommendation of the Conference Faculty, Jesse Leo Pittard and Sulon Gurney Ferree, having complied with the Disciplinary requirements, were elected to the office of elder and to membership in the North Carolina Annual Conference of the (former) Methodist Protestant Church, sitting in Grace Church, Greensboro, N. C., Thursday, October 19, 1939, subject to ordination on Sunday, October 22, 1939.

Revs. J. I. Ingraham, T. B. Johnson and W. L. Loy were introduced to Conference and were invited to seats within the bar.

C. E. Ridge submitted the report of the Committee on President's Message. Conference adopted the report with a rising vote of appreciation to the President.

R. M. Andrews spoke for the Committee on Financial Recommendations. The apportionments for World Service are to remain as last year, and to be paid to the Conference Treasurer. The items for Annual Conference claims are to be merged as far as possible with those of the new Conferences. One per cent of pastors' salaries is to be raised for delegates' expenses to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

Dr. F. W. Stephenson, who is representing the items of the World Service Budget, addressed the Conference.

Dr. W. P. King, Editor of the Nashville Christian Advocate, was introduced and spoke briefly.

The report of the Committee on Rural Church was presented and adopted. The report of the Conference Council of Religious Education was presented by the President of the Council, T. J. Whitehead. The report was adopted with a rising vote of appreciation to him and Dr. F. L. Gibbs, Secretary of the Department of Religious Education of the General Board, who was presented to Conference.

The report of the Treasurer of the Superannuated Fund Society was submitted. W. M. Howard presented the name of D. R. Williams for the

superannuate relation, which was granted. Brother Williams spoke a brief word of appreciation.

Dr. G. W. Haddaway, Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions, and Dr. F. L. Gibbs, Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, addressed the Conference.

The report of the Directors of the Pastors' Summer School was submitted and adopted. On motion, the Directors were made a committee to confer with the proper committee of the new Conference as to the continuation of the school at High Point College.

Conference adjourned with prayer by T. F. McCulloch.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 20

9:00. President Pritchard called the Conference to order. It was voted to dispense with the Roll Call. Conference voted to make Dr. C. E. Forlines, President of the Westminster Theological Seminary, and a former member of this Conference, an honorary member. The minutes were approved.

The Conference Trustees were excused for a meeting. Rev. H. G. Allen was introduced and spoke of the Brotherhood in the Western North Carolina Conference, as did Mr. Edwin L. Jones, a lay member of that Conference.

The following reports were read and adopted without amendment: Conference Trustees, Auditing Committee of the Herald, Financial report of the Conference Trustees, District Parsonage Trustees, Treasurer of the Roberts Bequest, Treasurer of the Fuller Bequest.

J. E. Carroll, pastor of Grace Church, brought greetings from Dr. S. K. Spahr, a former pastor, but who is a member of the Pittsburgh Conference. The Secretary was asked to make suitable reply.

The report of the Committee on Methodist Protestant-Recorder was read and adopted. J. S. Williams, Chaplain of the Mission of the Good Samaritan, Asheville, and a member of this Conference, asked that an item concerning that work be placed in the Journal. The Conference stood in recognition of Brother Williams' work.

R. C. Stubbins spoke of the life and work of Rev. T. F. McCulloch, a superannuated member of this Conference. Brother McCulloch was presented to Conference. Rev. Homer Casto, Superintendent of the Bethel Home, Weaverville, a member of this Conference, was presented and spoke briefly.

A motion prevailed that Conference recess until 1:15. The benediction was pronounced by J. S. Williams.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

1:15. Geo. R. Brown called the Conference to order. The song service was led by T. O. Pender, delegate from Mebane.

The Secretary called attention to the card of admission for the uniting session tonight at West Market Street Church.

The Committee on the Methodist Protestant-Herald submitted its report which was adopted.

The Conference Treasurer read the names of the ministers who have paid their Mutual Benefit assessment, and submitted a partial report for his office. He was given permission to file it later.

A partial report of the Conference Statistical Secretary was read. It was voted to make such disposition of the complete report as may be found convenient.

The report of the Committee on Missions was read and adopted.

Rev. L. S. Helms was granted a superannuate relation to the Conference. The same relationship was likewise given T. M. Johnson. Many of the brethren spoke in praise of Dr. Johnson's life and work. J. S. Williams escorted him to the chancel and Conference stood in recognition.

Dr. C. E. Forlines, President of Westminster Theological Seminary, addressed the Conference with particular reference to the need of books for the Library in order to standardize the institution.

The report of the Superannuated Fund Society was presented and adopted as read. The Boundary Committee submitted its report. The report was amended to attach Mt. Ebal Church to the Denton Charge. The report as amended was adopted.

Dr. J. S. Williams stated that he and Dr. T. M. Johnson entered Western Maryland College together in the year 1889—fifty years ago.

The report of the Committee on Fraternal Relations was submitted, and Conference stood as an expression of appreciation. The final report of the Conference faculty was presented and adopted as read. The report of the Committee on Christian Education was read and adopted.

On motion, the Boundary Committee's report was reconsidered and the reference to Chase City ordered stricken out. The report was adopted as amended.

The report of the Committee on Official Character was adopted as submitted. The report of the Adjustment Committee was adopted.

Rev. L. C. Larkin, D. D., Superintendent of the Rocky Mount District, was introduced.

An offering amounting to \$16.05 was taken for the church janitor. It was voted that the historical records of the Conference should be kept at High Point College, and be made available to any who might have need of them.

It was voted that the Committee on Publishing the Conference History might borrow from the Debt Retirement a sufficient amount to meet the cost of printing, the money to be replaced as the books are sold. Conference voted that any money above the cost should be given to the Conference Historian, the writer of the History.

Conference took recess while awaiting the report of the Stationing Committee. Conference reconvened with Geo. R. Brown in the chair, and President Pritchard read the list of appointments, after some remarks by Bishop Straughn and himself. On motion, the report of the Committee was adopted.

The Secretary was authorized to write the minutes of today's session and incorporate them in the Journal.

On motion, the Press Reporter was authorized to release the report of the Stationing Committee to the press, subject to revision by the successor Conferences.

The motion to adjourn prevailed. The closing prayer was given by Bishop J. H. Straughn, Conference joining in the Mizpah benediction. Conference adjourned at 5:45.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE ONE HUNDRED AND TWELFTH SESSION OF THE N. C. ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE FORMER METHODIST PROTESTANT CHURCH, ASSEMBLED IN GRACE CHURCH, GREENSBORO, OCTOBER 18th-20th, 1939

Dear Brethren:

Grace be to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. (Romans 1:7.) By the grace of God we are permitted to assemble in our final session of the Conference as a separate denomination. As we meet we are deeply conscious that this is our last and that soon we are to enter into a new relationship. While we are going out of business as a Conference and as a denomination, I trust that we are going into a relationship that shall enable us to do greater things than we have done as a separate denomination. By the very nature of things this has been a year of severe testing on the part of Conference officials and also a year of more or less confusion and indecision. The Uniting Conference was held in Kansas City, Missouri, from April 26th to May 10th, and the three denominations, The Methodist Episcopal Church, The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and The Methodist Protestant Church were officially merged into one denomination to be known as The Methodist Church. In working out the details for such a momentous task it was but natural that there should be various interpretations as to procedure in carrying out the will of the Uniting Conference. This work has required much travel and many conferences and the work is not finished yet. Some of it will be finished here this week and some of it will be finished during the new Conference year. Adjustments will be made from time to time during the next several years.

Official Acts

On November 17th Joseph Coble was released from the Spring Church Charge and the same day he was appointed pastor of the Glen Raven Charge.

On November 17th J. E. Garlington was appointed pastor of the Spring Church Charge.

On November 18th W. M. Loy was appointed pastor of the Mt. Zion Charge.

On November 24th Herbert Garmon was appointed pastor of the Shelby-Caroleen Charge.

On December 12th I appointed Rev. C. E. Anderson, an ordained minister of the Eastern Conference, as pastor at Gibsonville.

On June 5th I gave a letter of transfer to the Maryland Conference of Rev. C. E. Forlines, D. D., the President of the Westminster Theological Seminary.

In this classification of official acts I have not listed the holding of many Quarterly Conferences, from two to three preaching services almost every Sunday, many group meetings of our men and many meetings with the cabinet of the Bishop of the Western N. C. Conference as well as conferences with District Superintendents in the various districts, both in the Western N. C. Conference and the N. C. Conference of the former M. E. Church, South. Suffice it to say that the year has been a terrible strain on the physical part of your President. Not only this, but it has been exceedingly difficult in that we were trying to hold our own organization together and to carry on our own program and at the same time trying to prepare our people and our churches for the new Conference which is soon to be organized. In this I have been conscious of the fact that we were operating under our own discipline and at the same time there were things coming up constantly which the discipline did not contemplate and these matters had to be adjusted. This made it necessary for me to assume responsibilities far beyond those of any other President of this Conference. But in all of these things I have tried to do the best possible, both for the present and for the future, trusting for Divine guidance in it all.

Translated

On March 22, Rev. G. F. Millaway, one of our honored superannuates, a man who had rendered outstanding service to the kingdom and to our church, was relieved of his sufferings and went to join the large company who have through the

years passed on to be with their Lord. An obituary committee has been appointed who will bring a suitable tribute to the Conference.

Honor Roll Churches

Early in this Conference year we launched the Appreciation Year campaign, which ran throughout the whole church, for World Service in full by April 30th. In this campaign we asked the churches to major on raising World Service the first part of the year, leaving the latter part of the year for other interests. The campaign proved quite a success and enabled the General Boards to pay off a great deal of their indebtedness. However, from the Conference standpoint it did not work so well, for the poor crop conditions in some sections and the marketing holiday in others worked a hardship on both pastors and the Annual Conference interests. In the Appreciation Year campaign the Conference committee was ably assisted by Dr. Taylor, Chairman, and Dr. Gibbs, Secretary of the Southeastern Area of the General denomination. Quite a good many churches received certificates for raising World Service in full:

Statistics

Ordinarily the President of the Conference sends out a report a couple of weeks before the annual session and gathers a good many statistics, both as to finances and membership. At the time these statistics are sent in, the reports are incomplete and by the time the statistics are tabulated they are completely out of date and are incorrect. Inasmuch as the financial reports are later this year than usual, and due to the further fact that I could not get everything done that ought to be done, I did not send out blanks for the fourth quarterly report and shall content myself with the report of the Statistical Secretary, whose reports are supposed to be complete for the year.

Churches Dedicated

During the year I have dedicated three churches, Spencer, North Kannapolis, Harmony Grove on the West Forsyth Charge, and the Oak Grove Church on the Cleveland Charge. In addition to these I dedicated the educational building at Concord Church on the Saxapahaw Charge. While I was not able to be there on account of illness, the beautiful new building of Friendship Church on the Fallston Charge was dedicated by Bishop Clare Purcell. I am sure that all of us in our own hearts congratulate the good people of these churches on this splendid achievement.

Our Church Buildings

As we go into Methodist Union it might be well for us to pause for a moment and think about the kind of material equipment which we are taking into the new Conference. The past few years have been noted for improvements to church buildings. On almost every hand churches have been painted, on the outside and refinished on the inside, Sunday school rooms have been built, church grounds have been made more beautiful by grading and the planting of shrubbery, so that one going over our Conference now for the first time in ten years would hardly recognize a great many of our buildings. It is true that some of our buildings are yet in need of repairs but on the whole much has been done. I think it is safe to say that our Conference was never in better condition to go on with its work than now. This, to my mind, proves that we are not dying and that we are not being driven into Methodist Union. But it does mean that our churches are more nearly ready for the Methodist Advance which we are expecting to take place with the merging of the Conferences.

Revivals

During the year some good revivals have been held with gratifying results; however, I would not classify the year as a whole as being one of outstanding revivals. A great many of the brethren have reported rather disappointing results

in their meetings. While this is true it does seem that our towns and cities and in some cases the rural communities are being filled with independent tabernacles and tents and the people seem to be flocking to them. I have been trying to solve this mystery and am wondering if we in our churches have not taken the emphasis off of evangelism and have placed it on other things. Any way, the matter of saving souls was on the heart of our Lord and it is still the business of the church to be seeking for the lost. We never can afford to get away from this thought. We may build great churches but if we fail to reach the lost we have not measured up to what our Lord requires of us.

Our Institutions

As we are about to merge the Conferences we naturally think of our institutions for which we have sacrificed and prayed. It is gratifying that our Children's Home has had a good year. The children generally have had good health and the management can rejoice that the year closes with very little indebtedness. The next year, by the very nature of things, will be a testing time for this institution which has done so much for dependent children and which has done so much for all of us in that we have had the responsibility of caring for it. As much as the home has done for the children I sometimes think it has done more for the rest of us. It is always more blessed to give than to receive.

While we are rejoicing in the achievements of the Children's Home we also rejoice in the great success that has come to High Point College. This institution has had one of the most remarkable careers in the history of North Carolina. It has been but fifteen years since the first class entered there and now it has an enrollment of 450. Surely this is something of which we are proud. May it continue to grow and prosper.

Our Church Paper

One of the most painful things about Methodist Union in North Carolina is the loss of the Methodist Protestant Herald. For forty-five years it has made its weekly visits to our homes and it has become a member of the family in a great many cases. For forty years it was edited by its founder, that great man, Dr. J. F. McCulloch, two years by myself and the last three by Dr. R. M. Andrews. But soon its voice will be silent as it will be impossible to carry it on without our separate organization. But we thank God for what it has done and trust that the Christian Advocate may in some way take its place among our people.

Boundary Changes

I had hoped that it might be possible for us to take our charges into the new Conference with our boundaries practically as they have been. However, the nearer we come to the time of merging, the more impossible this seems. From time to time we have set off churches as stations and in some cases have assigned the same man to two or three separate charges. Under the new system this will not work so well. No District Superintendent can afford to drive to these small churches to hold Quarterly Conferences. In most cases these churches will have to be attached to other charges and the names of the stations discontinued from our roll of appointments. In certain cases I have consented to recommend certain mergers which I will present to the Boundary Committee for their action. They will report back to you.

And now, lest I make this report too long, I shall leave many things unsaid. A great many subjects will be covered by the new Conference and it is unnecessary for me to discuss these things.

But before I close let me say that I am thankful that the Methodist Protestant Church and the North Carolina Annual Conference ever existed. This grand old church has furnished us a church home. This Conference has been dear to us and as we leave it behind and go into the new we shall ever cherish its members and thank God for the fellowships which we have enjoyed throughout the years. Soon, some will go to the Upper South Carolina Conference, some to Virginia and the remainder will be divided between the two Conferences in North Carolina. We shall not see each other's faces very often again but we shall still be joined in heart and hope to meet again on the other shore if not here. With gratitude to our Father for His blessings and with deep appreciation of every courtesy on your part, I am,

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SPECIAL ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE OF FIFTEEN

The special Orphanage Committee of Fifteen, having decided that it will be necessary to continue to operate the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh, the Children's Home at High Point and the Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem during the ensuing Conference year, appointed a sub-committee to recommend ways and means of financing the three stated child-caring institutions during this period of time. The Committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That the Methodists in the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences, formerly known as Methodist Protestants, be directed to continue their cultivation and encouraged to secure liberal contributions from their own people for the support of the Children's Home at High Point.

2. That the Methodists in the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences who were formerly members of the Methodist Episcopal and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, agree to supplement, if necessary, through their established channels, contributions of the Children's Home at High Point with an amount not exceeding \$6,000, on a contributing basis of 33.275% from the North Carolina Conference and 66.725% from the Western North Carolina Conference.

3. That the Board of Trustees of the Children's Home, Inc., Winston-Salem, and the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Orphanage, Raleigh, and the Board of Trustees of the Children's Home, High Point, shall not be responsible for the indebtedness of any institution incurred during the present year except the one they direct.

4. That all cultivation and solicitation of funds for each of the three stated institutions for the ensuing Conference year, 1939-1940, be limited to the constituencies sponsoring them during the Conference year 1938-1939.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF HIGH POINT COLLEGE

Dear Brethren:

Last year I gave report to the last official session of this Conference as a Methodist Protestant Conference. It was in the way of a valedictory. Perhaps this might be said in the way of a salutatory—for it is really a report to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, a Conference to live for three days and then be merged with the Western North Carolina Conference, that part of it within the area of the Methodist Church. Be that as it may, one thing is certain—we will never be together again just as we are today, and it is not likely we will ever again hear a report read in open Conference by a President of High Point College because such reports have not been the custom in the Conference with which we shall merge.

I am glad to report that our regular enrollment for the first semester totals 456. This is 17 more than a year ago. Anticipating the usual additions to be made at the second semester, we will probably reach a peak registration of 475 for this year. (Extension and Summer School students for the calendar year will reach a high of 750.) For the past five years, ending last June, the total regular session enrollment increased 184—67%. North Carolina students increased 127—48%. Out of state students have increased 57—570%. This year there are 90 students from 18 states other than North Carolina. Of the 366 students from this state, 186 are from Guilford County and in this number High Point has 151.

In religious affiliation, there are 264 Methodists—57.8%. The Baptists rank second with 88. Altogether there are 21 religious groups with a total of 192 other than Methodists.

For the fifth consecutive year we report that expenditures for current operations were less, by an appreciable margin, than student income.

Our first mortgage obligations are \$143,900.00, of which there are bonds outstanding to the amount of \$11,500.00. Our secondary obligations are in note form, amounting to \$51,526.00. \$20,300.00 is at 3%; \$7,200.00 is at 4%.

The total value of lands and buildings, as agreed upon by appraisers 18 months ago, is \$632,923.00; of equipment and furnishings is \$71,077.00. Equipment and furnishings have been added since then amounting to \$4,000.00. The additions to buildings and equipment since 1930 amount to as much as our first mortgage obligations.

In addition to the regular college property, since 1932 we have purchased the Andrews property at a cost of more than \$14,000.00; the property at 901 Montlieu Avenue in 1937, valued at \$4,000.00. By arrangement with the Trustees of the Conference, the parsonage at 909 West College Drive will be deeded to the College, subject to the obligation due Mrs. H. A. Garrett. These three residences represent values at replacement figures, conservatively, I think, of \$30,000.00, in which we now have equities of \$13,000.00.

The total indebtedness, first and secondary, on both college and residence properties, amounts to \$212,425.00. This is \$105,000.00 less than March, 1936, which was the peak of our indebtedness and before we purchased the Montlieu and College Drive properties, and before the Library was erected, Woman's Hall, and Gymnasium additions were made and the Stadium built. The total valuations are \$734,500.00. The total debt, therefore, is less than 30% of conservative values.

I report that S. W. Taylor, Mrs. M. J. Wrenn, A. M. Rankin, W. A. Lambeth, R. M. Cox, C. W. McCrary, H. F. Hunsucker and L. F. Ross have been elected to serve as Trustees until 1943.

I ask the Conference to approve the selection of these Trustees, and to appoint P. E. Lindley, P. S. Kennett and N. M. Harrison for work with the College. These three ministers from this Conference total 41 years of consecutive service at the College.

To the brethren who remain in the Western North Carolina Conference, as my lot shall be, and to the brethren who will go to the North Carolina Conference, to one and all I say, "God be with you." And to all I say: No matter in which Conference your lot is cast, High Point College will still be yours because it will belong to both Conferences. And from you, within both Conferences, as

from our new brethren in both Conferences, the College asks your prayers, your co-operation, and your support. In all things we covet your loyal devotion as we give to Methodism in the Old North State a gift in which we have justifiable pride, hoping and believing that it will be a source of pride and joy for all time to all of Methodism in North Carolina.

High Point College has assumed as secondary obligations the Robbins, Pickett, Burrus Estate, Hanner and High Point College notes.

The Andrews note is secured by the Asheboro Street lots in Greensboro, valued at \$4,500.00, but which are now in the process of being sold.

The Board, on April 19, 1939, deeded in fee simple and without remuneration, but subject to the indebtedness of this Board at that time, the property generally known as the Methodist Protestant Children's Home to the Trustees of the Methodist Protestant Children's Home, Incorporated.

The Board of Education of the Methodist Protestant Church in North Carolina, Incorporated, in its annual meeting held at High Point College on the afternoon of October 11, 1939, decided to liquidate and dissolve as soon as practical.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

It is the purpose of this report to recognize the valuable work now being accomplished by our Boards, institutions, and churches in the field of Christian Education and further to suggest in part what shall be the procedure of our church during the transitional period in helping to build the new church program of Christian Education.

To High Point College, Westminster Theological Seminary, and our Boards of Christian Education we express gratitude for the exceptional work they are now doing. Too, we would recognize and express appreciation to those responsible for the splendid contributions to our church through the Missionary Record, the Methodist Protestant-Recorder, and the Methodist Protestant Herald. Especially

are we grateful to the General Board of Christian Education for its very thoughtful gifts regularly to our institutions.

Recalling the action of our Uniting Conference in Kansas City to the effect that World Service programs of the three Methodist Churches be supported by the respective churches until the first General Conference and realizing the importance of the World Service finance as a means of support for our institutions, we suggest that special emphasis be given to the observance of certain days during next year. These days we suggest to be Young People's Day, Easter, Children's Day, and Rally Day, and that the offering received on these days be directed to the interest of our World Service budget, and the thank offering days, November and February. Regarding the recommendations by the North Carolina Council of Religious Education, we concur in these recommendations and suggest further that the various agencies of Christian Education of our Conference co-operate fully with similar agencies of the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences.

Since the Publishing Houses of our church are being continued, at least for the present, we strongly urge our churches to continue their use of our former Methodist Protestant Sunday School literature until there shall be published a new Methodist literature. We further urge all pastors, teachers, and leaders to acquaint themselves fully with the wealth of new promotional materials of the Methodist Church, which are being issued by the National Boards of Christian Education of the United Church.

Finally, recognizing the need of proper direction and guidance in the field of Christian Education, we urge every church to set up a Board of Christian Education whose purpose shall be to direct the Christian Educational program of the church, endeavor to elevate the standards of religious work, and to train for more efficient teachers, leaders and officials.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE PASTORS' SUMMER CONFERENCE AND SEMINARY EXTENSION SCHOOL

The school was held this year June 5-10, only five days instead of ten as heretofore.

High Point College made the very low rate of \$5.00 for board and room for the five days, with no charge for wives of ministers attending.

The class room attendance, including those who came for the full time and those who came for only a part of the time, was 62. Of these, 9 took the course for credits. Several wives of ministers attended, some of whom sat regularly on classes. Each of the three uniting churches was represented in the school.

Dr. M. J. Shroyer and Dr. J. N. Link were the instructors in the Seminary Extension courses.

The school also provided a daily lecture course, with the following speakers on the program: R. L. Pope, Thomasville; A. J. Kirby, Gastonia; Dr. Paul N. Garber, Duke School of Religion. One period was devoted to Echoes from the Uniting Conference, and was participated in by quite a number who attended the Conference.

A devotional period was observed each evening from 7:00 to 7:45.

The receipts for the school total \$100.00. This includes registrations amounting to \$37.00 and a balance of \$63.00 carried over from the previous year.

The total expense of the school was \$88.75. This includes postage and printing, a small travel expense of lecturers, and an honorarium paid to the Seminary of \$75.00. The balance in the hands of the Treasurer is \$11.25.

It is gratifying that Dr. L. B. Hayes and Dr. W. A. Parsons have been added to the Board of Directors of the school. They have met regularly with the Board and their advice and co-operation has been very helpful.

The future of the school will be determined by the Conference of the new church, of course, and will, we think, be handled by the Board of Education. It is the opinion of those who have been closely connected with the school that it should be continued, and this desire has been passed on to those who will most likely handle the matter in the new church, a group meeting held recently in the interest of the school having ordered that to be done.

Your Directors recommend, therefore, that this Conference set up a committee to confer with the proper authority in the Conference of the new church, as to the future of the school. We have information that this will be the proper procedure, and that such a committee will be the proper procedure, and that such a committee will be heard by the Board of Education of the new church, after the Conference of the new church is organized Friday night.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL UNION ADJUSTMENT COMMITTEE

WHEREAS the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church was a member of the General Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and

WHEREAS the General Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church at its quadrennial session held in High Point, North Carolina, in the year 1936, adopted a plan of union with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to form the Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS overtures were sent to the Annual Conferences from said General Conference and the said Annual Conferences did ratify the said Plan of Union and elected delegates to a Uniting Conference to consummate the union and formation of The Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS at the Uniting Conference held at Kansas City, Missouri, beginning April 26, 1939, the Annual Conferences of the three former Methodist denominations were authorized to hold a final session to close out their affairs and to prepare for merging Conferences to follow, and

WHEREAS in pursuance of said authorization the North Carolina Annual Conference is now in session and desires to carry out such authorization,

BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That a special Ad-Interim Committee to be known as the Ad-Interim Adjustment Committee be appointed, composed of the following: J. E. Pritchard, Chairman; S. W. Taylor, R. M. Andrews, J. N. Wills, Geo. R. Brown, Mrs. R. M. Andrews, T. J. Whitehead, W. L. Ward, and F. R. Stout.

2. That this Conference delegate to this committee full and plenary powers to adjust and correlate the various phases of the program, responsibilities, obligations, and objectives of this Conference, as such are and may be committed to the several committees, boards, and societies, in relation to the other Conferences in this area. This work being necessary and imperative with relation to the merging of Conferences for and in the United Methodist Church.

3. That all the societies, boards, and committees in and of this Conference be authorized and directed to follow such procedure as this Special Committee may direct; and sign, execute, and deliver such papers as may and shall be necessary to carry out and confirm the recommendations and reports of this Committee.

4. That the Chairman of the Committee shall inform the Bishops within the Conference area of this action of this Conference, and that this Committee is empowered to confer and be ready for any and all negotiations required.

5. It is fully understood and conformed that this Adjustment Committee is this Conference Committee Ad-Interim and as such shall and does fully represent this body, and will and does speak and act for and on behalf of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

COMMITTEE ON RURAL CHURCH

During the past few years the Committee on Rural Church has been interested in observing the changes and developments which have been taking place in rural churches.

In some places the changes have not been very noticeable, especially when measured by a short period of years, while other places have made very great improvements in both the physical equipment and in the church program. If one will compare the rural churches of twenty-five years ago with those of today, he will realize that much progress has been made.

We are pleased with the many improvements which we have seen and heard of being made during the past year, but we shall not be satisfied until we have made our churches more attractive in both their physical equipment and in the type of program executed. We, therefore, believe that too much cannot be said or done about a program of continued progress.

If the Christian religion is to continue to be an exponent of such virtues and beauty and purity, then the Christian church must become an example of such virtues. We believe the church should be the cleanest and most attractive place in any community. The pastor and church officials should see that the church grounds are made attractive and well kept. They should also see that the building is kept clean and dusted, with the best possible heat and ventilation. A well-heated church will aid greatly in maintaining a good attendance through the winter months, while a well-ventilated church will aid in keeping the attendance up during the summer.

We find that many of the rural churches are putting on a much broader and finer program of work in the church and community than ever before. We are beginning to realize that the rural church has a large field and a great opportunity to render a fine service to Christ's Kingdom.

We would encourage the ministers who serve in rural churches to read more of the fine literature which is being published in the field of rural church work. Study the program of the church more carefully and endeavor to use all of the available resources.

REPORT OF BOUNDARY COMMITTEE

The Boundary Committee makes the following recommendations:

The First Methodist Protestant Church of Danville, Va., having voted to disband, we concur in their action and recommend that the matter be referred to the District Superintendent of the Methodist Church of that area.

We recommend that all requests for mergers where two or more of the former denominations involved in union are concerned, be referred to the District Superintendent of the district from which such requests come, this applying in case where several churches are involved.

We concur in the action of the Gibsonville, Siler-City-Liberty Churches in merging in their particular fields.

That Porter and Pine Bluff be attached to the Albemarle Charge and that the names of the charges be dropped from the Conference roll of the Conference.

We recommend that Greer's Chapel be detached from Shiloh Charge and attached to Spencer-China Grove. That Yadkin College be detached to the Lexington Charge and that the name Chase City Charge be discontinued from the Conference roll of churches. That Union Ridge be detached from Forsyth Charge and attached to North Davidson Charge. That Burke's Chapel and Shiloh be detached from Connelly Springs Charge and that the Superintendent of the Marion District be requested to supply these two detached churches. That Mt. Ebal Church in Davidson County be attached to Denton Charge.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS

The unwritten story of Missions in the former Methodist Protestant Church would read like a novel if written by one who could reveal the soul of those who, over the years, have given their thought, means, and very life that the Gospel of Jesus Christ might be known to the far ends of the earth. While sections of our church may have been classed as non-missionary, yet when we review the multitude of missionary enterprises carried on by our church over the more than a century of her history, we certainly have cause for pride. With a membership less than two hundred thousand, reaching from the Atlantic to the Pacific, we have been able to support a missionary for the sixty years we have been at work in Japan, and it has been upwards of seventy-five years since the first missionaries from Methodist Protestant Churches went to Africa. With three foreign fields, a half dozen or more enterprises at home, along with a multitude of aided churches are sufficient to attest the missionary fervor of our denominational history. These missionary enterprises have been the moulds through which we have been able to express the soul of our church life.

As a church we are coming to a close of our illustrious missionary history and the stream of our missionary zeal is being fused with two other streams of larger proportions, the currents of which will carry us to shores which we have not known. Entering our missionary horizon are strange voices, personalities, for whom we have never prayed specifically and cause for which we have never worked. This is truer in the case of the members of the former Methodist Protestant Church than the other two churches.

That the merging of our missionary work may be a happy one to all concerned and that a history of our missionary life may be preserved, we make the following recommendations:

1. That each pastor faithfully try to raise the full amount of his charge's World Service apportionment this year.

2. That we begin at once to acquaint ourselves with the missionary literature of the New Methodist Church.

3. That pastors and church leaders become familiar with section 1069 in the New Methodist Discipline relative to the organization of the local Church Missionary Council.

4. That a history of missions in the Methodist Protestant Church be published by the Board of Missions.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Grace Church, Greensboro, N. C., October 19, 1939

The Conference Council of Religious Education has endeavored to serve the local churches to the best of its ability and it goes into the new church with a good record of high standards sought and held in this educational phase of the Conference program.

One of the best Leadership Education Schools of its history was held at High Point College in June this year when 133 young people, together with a faculty of 16, assembled for a week of intensive study and recreation. In addition, a number of local churches have conducted classes in Leadership Education for smaller groups.

Sixteen Vacation Church Schools were held in local churches this year and two united with other churches in Vacation Schools, in both cases furnishing teachers in the united effort.

Again we are grateful to the Duke Foundation for the services of Mr. Sidney R. Crumpton, who spent ten weeks in rural churches conducting Vacation Church Schools during the day and Leadership Education classes at night. Mr. Crumpton rendered very fine service.

We submit the following recommendations:

1. That the office equipment belonging to the Conference Council and also some Vacation School text books be donated to the High Point Children's Home.
2. That all records of this Council be turned over to the keeper of records of the Annual Conference to be kept with other historical material.
3. That the balance in the treasury of the Council be given in a ratio of three to one to the Boards of Education of the Western North Carolina and North Carolina Conferences, respectively.
4. That the same method of assessing the Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies for the support of this work be continued this year.
5. That careful consideration be given the holding of an experimental Leadership Education School at High Point College this year to take care of the young people who will not be able to attend Junaluska.

We recommend that cash and securities belonging to permanent fund located on Guilford Avenue, in this city, be turned over to the successor Conferences, as may be determined by the Distributing Committee, to become a part of the permanent fund.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON METHODIST PROTESTANT HERALD

Your Committee has held several meetings since its appointment about the middle of the year with the two-fold purpose constantly before it, namely: First, to exert every effort possible to make the Herald self-supporting for this year; and secondly, to arrange for the merger of the Herald at the close of this year with the North Carolina Christian Advocate. In the latter we have succeeded, but in the former we have not.

The Bookkeeper of the Herald reports that of today there are in hand or immediately expected monies to the amount of \$290.00. Obligations include: For Editorial service for the entire year, \$400.00; for printing and mailing paper, a balance of \$569.12; for printing and mailing the final issue for next week, \$64.00; and for the Bookkeeper for next week, \$3.00; thus making a total due of \$1,036.12. This amount due, less cash available, leaves a balance due of \$746.12.

Representatives of your Committee appeared before the Board of Publication of the North Carolina Christian Advocate and that Board generously voted to take over the Herald mailing list and fill all unexpired subscriptions upon our termination of publishing the Herald with next week.

Your Committee recommends:

1. That the sum of \$746.12, or an approximate amount thereof, as the necessity may demand, be paid out of the Debt Retirement Fund in order to balance the account of the Herald.
2. That the Herald suspend publication with the issue of next week, with the understanding that the unexpired subscriptions are to be filled by the N. C. Christian Advocate.
3. That we request all charges that have not paid the Herald subsidy for this past year do so immediately and send the money to Treasurer Allen.
4. That we express appreciation to all individuals who have made special donations to the Herald and encourage others yet to do likewise.
5. That we stand in tribute to the editors of the Herald, especially in memory of the founder, the late Reverend J. F. McCulloch, D. D.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE TRUSTEES

There is submitted herewith the report of the Treasurer, which explains itself.

Inasmuch as the report of the Treasurer of the Board of Church Extension shows an indebtedness of \$3,700.00, we recommend that the Treasurer of this Board pay over to the Treasurer of the Board of Church Extension the amount received from the sale of the Rocky Mount House, \$1,000.00, for use in liquidating the indebtedness of that Board.

A Committee has been appointed, with authority to dispose of the house on Ross Avenue, bequeathed to this Conference by the late Mrs. T. M. Johnson, for the benefit of superannuates. When this shall have been done, there will be no further reason for the existence of this Corporation, and we recommend that the officers thereof be instructed to have the same dissolved.

We recommend that, if not already done, this Conference elect three members of the Board of Trustees, to serve for three years, as provided by the charter. Further, that the present Trustees be instructed to take the necessary steps to keep the Corporation alive, so long as it may be necessary.

We recommend that the Treasurer, after paying \$1,000.00 to the Treasurer of the Board of Church Extension, as provided in the foregoing, shall pay to the Treasurer of the Superannuated Fund Society, the remainder of such money as he may have on hand, for investment in a permanent fund; and that the note and mortgage on the Pearson Street property, and any money that may be received in payment of the principal indebtedness, be likewise paid to the Treasurer of the Superannuated Fund Society; it being understood that said Treasurer is to turn such funds over to the proper Board of the Western North Carolina Conference, for investment or distribution, as may be ordered by this Conference, in such action as may be taken in regard to the funds and other assets of the Superannuated Fund Society.

Adjournment: The business of the morning being completed, M. T. Smathers moved that the Conference adjourn to meet at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon. The benediction was pronounced by A. W. Plyler and the Conference adjourned at 10:35 o'clock.

SECOND DAY—FRIDAY, OCTOBER 20, 1939

AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions: At 2:00 o'clock W. A. Stanbury, at the request of the Bishop, called the Conference to order; and after the Conference had sung "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord," L. B. Abernethy led the prayer.

Minutes Approved: Fletcher Nelson reported that the minutes of the morning session were correct, and the minutes were approved.

Reports: The report of the Board of Christian Education was read by J. G. Huggin, Jr., and after brief addresses by Dr. M. T. Plyler and Dr. W. P. Few, the report was adopted. E. O. Cole, Conference Treasurer, read his report, but asked that the Conference authorize him to complete his work and furnish the Secretary with the completed report. The Conference approved. The Board of Finance was given time to complete its report. (See Appendix.)

Bishop Purcell Took the Chair and Minute Question No. 6, "Who are admitted into full connection?" was called. After being examined by the Bishop, J. M. Brandon, Jr., A. J. Cox, H. G. Hardin, D. B. Mullis, and M. C. Reese were, by a vote of the Conference, admitted into full connection.

Minute Questions: The Secretary was authorized to fill in the statistical facts for Minute Questions 25-49 as those facts may be received. In answer to Minute Question No. 3, "Who are supernumeraries?" "no one" was the answer. For the answer to Minute Question No. 24, see the report of the Committee on Conference Relations.

Anniversary Board of Lay Activities: With A. J. Kirby in charge, the congregation sang "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord," and L. L. Gobbel led in prayer. Special music was rendered by the Greensboro College Glee Club under the direction of Professor Vassar. Reports I and II of the Board of Lay Activities were read by Paul F. Evans; but these involved matters for the United Annual Conference, and consideration was deferred. Dr. C. K. Vliet, Secretary of the Commission on Benevolences, delivered an inspiring address on "The Benevolences."

Bishop Purcell Resumed the Chair, and gave in reply to Minute Question No. 52, "Where are the preaches stationed this year?" this answer, "They remain at the appointment of last year until the last session of the United Annual Conference."

Offering: On motion of W. L. Hutchins, an offering amounting to \$195.15 was taken for the brethren who were superannuated at this session of the Conference. The money was turned over to W. L. Hutchins for distribution.

Resolutions: W. A. Stanbury moved that the United Conference be authorized to complete any business that may be left incomplete from this Conference, and the resolution was adopted.

The following resolution was presented by C. M. Pickens:

**RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO DISSOLVE THE WESTERN NORTH
CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST
EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH**

WHEREAS, the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church, have now joined each with the other under a Plan of Union to constitute a united church known as The Methodist Church; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the Plan of Union, the properly constituted delegates by action of the Uniting Conference held in Kansas City, State of Missouri, on May 8, 1939, established and bounded a successor Conference as follows:

Western North Carolina Conference shall include all North Carolina west of the North Carolina Conference, except Savannah Church, in Alleghany County, North Carolina; and also that part of North Carolina lying north of New River, and including that part of Virginia lying south of that river in the loop in Grayson County, Virginia; including all the territory in Carroll and Patrick Counties, Virginia, south of the crest of the Blue Ridge, and west of the Dan River. (Paragraph 1418, "Discipline of the Methodist Church," 1939.)

WHEREAS, the Uniting Conference duly constituted by the three uniting denominations instructed and authorized all their annual Conferences to close their affairs and dissolve prior to December 31, 1939:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, assembled in its fiftieth session, at Greensboro, N. C., this 20th day of October, 1939, does hereby through and by the adoption of this resolution discontinue and dissolve this aforesaid Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as an ecclesiastical body, said dissolution to become finally effective, however, only when all its effective members and all its superannuated members shall have been duly recognized as legal members of a legally constituted successor annual Conference, known as the Western North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, organized in harmony with said Plan of Union.

The resolution was adopted by unanimous vote, and H. C. Sprinkle presented the following resolution:

**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CERTIFICATION OF THE WESTERN
NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE MEMBERS TO THE
SUCCESSOR ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH**

WHEREAS, the consummation of the Plan of Union by which the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church have united to form The Methodist Church, has made necessary the dissolution of the Western North Carolina Annual Conference as an ecclesiastical body when the successor Conference occupying the territory covered by the said Western North Carolina Conference shall have been organized in harmony with the Plan of Union; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that the successor Conference shall have a properly authenticated list of the members of the said Western North Carolina Conference who are eligible to membership in the successor Conference:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Secretary of the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, be and is hereby directed to prepare and deliver such a list to the Secretaries of the successor Conference, certifying the membership and standing of the ministerial members of the said Western North Carolina Annual Conference who are entitled to membership in the said successor Conference under and in harmony with the legislation of the Uniting Conference of the three aforesaid denominations, which met in Kansas City, State of Missouri, April 30-May 10, 1939; and that the said certificate shall indicate the order, standing and relation of the said members as follows: (1) The effective elders and deacons; (2) the superannuated members; (3) the supernumerary members; and (4) those in the admission on trial class. He is directed to certify all superannuated members in the said Western North Carolina Annual Conference to membership in the said successor Conference, such certification to state clearly that it is given pending the report of the Distributing Committee, established by the legislation of the Uniting Conference and given final jurisdiction in the allocation of the Conference membership of superannuates. And he is further directed to certify all local preachers whose licenses are now effective in the Western North Carolina Annual Conference.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Western North Carolina Annual Conference hereby requests the presiding Bishop to attest with his signature the above authorized certification.

WHEREAS, the Uniting Conference, composed of delegates from the three churches, called pursuant to the "Plan of Union" has met and has adopted the "Declaration of Union," declaring that the said three churches are and shall be one church; and

WHEREAS, the Western North Carolina Annual Conference is one of the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and by the action of the Uniting Conference is to be consolidated with parts of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, all of which Conferences occupy substantially the same territory; and

WHEREAS, all business of this Conference for the current Conference year has been concluded and the time has come for the complete union of the said three Conferences and the continuation of their united work as a single Conference of The Methodist Church which will be known as the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of said church:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Western North Carolina Annual Conference, as a Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, be and it is hereby adjourned sine die.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

I. LOCAL CHURCH

At the close of another fine year of work in the local church, your Board is happy to report certain outstanding accomplishments under the direction of the Conference staff. The program of Christian Education has reached more persons and brought larger results than we dreamed about a year ago. In the field of leadership training, 104 schools, or an average of two per week, were held during the year. In these schools 4,878 persons were enrolled, and 3,765 completed their work with credit.

One noteworthy achievement is the increase in Church school enrollment. Last year as a result of the Aldersgate Celebration, the enrollment increased 9,185, the largest annual increase since 1923.

Deserving special notice is the work done in Vacation Church schools. In both large and small churches 305 such schools were held during the summer. About 70 of these schools were held in churches where no work of this type had ever been done. Not only are we pleased with the number of these schools, but also with the high standard of work done. More than 17,000 children were reached.

Too much cannot be said concerning the significance of the young people's work during the year. The Youth Crusade has brought fine results in both town and country. In February and March through a series of Youth Rallies, a total of 5,000 young people were brought together and the Crusade was begun in earnest. In the succeeding months through retreats, camps, assemblies, young people's unions, young people's revivals, and the personal activities of the Conference Director of Young People's Work, the Crusade has gathered momentum until we feel that it is of great significance in our church.

To the adults of Western North Carolina we give credit for the substantial increase in the amount of money contributed to the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise and the Church School Day offering. We now have 48,069 adults enrolled in the more than 800 church schools.

We wish to praise the steady and effective work of our staff and to thank them for another year of fine service.

II. SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

Your Board had before it reports from the trustees of Duke University, Greensboro College, Brevard College, Rutherford College, and the J. B. Cornelius Fund, Inc.

These reports showed that the three institutions supported by the Conference have made commendable progress during the year, and the Board recommends that each continue to receive the support determined upon in establishing an educational policy for the Conference, it being understood that all increase of educational work brought about through the union of the three Methodist Churches be taken care of through provision of additional funds.

Duke University had an increase in the student body, both in the regular session and the Summer School session, and also added materially to the number of teachers. Greensboro College also had a marked increase in the number of students, and came through the year with the balance on the right side of the ledger, adding materially to its property during the year. The Greensboro College report states that the merger of Davenport College and Greensboro College has been effected, and that "the charter of the merged institution, Greensboro College, Incorporated, was issued by the Secretary of State under date of December 28, 1938, exactly one hundred years after the chartering of Greensboro Female College." Though in need of larger endowment and further equipment, Brevard College has continued to operate successfully in carrying out the aims for which it was established.

We recommend that the following resolution be adopted in compliance with a request received from the Trustees of Brevard College:

"RESOLVED: That the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at this 1939 annual session, hereby specifically authorize the Board of Trustees of Brevard College, Incorporated, to convey and authorize the conveyance by the corporation's proper officers, by fee simple deed, to the United States of America, all the right, title and interest, the same being a one-half undivided interest of Brevard College, Inc., in a tract of land containing 100 acres, more or less, lying and being in the County of Transylvania, North Carolina, on Cross Mountain of the Blue Ridge range and being more specifically described as follows:

"BEGINNING at a large pine on said ridge, thence (with the crest of the Blue Ridge) South 23° East 38 poles to a chestnut, thence North 67° East 14 poles to a chestnut oak, thence North 45° East 28 poles to a white oak, thence East 20 poles to a stake, thence North 60° East 20 poles to a chestnut, thence North 52° East 23 poles to a pine, thence South 79° East 16 poles to a hickory, thence South 58° East 20 poles to a black oak, then North 56° East 12 poles to a black gum, thence South 85° East 24 poles to a stake, thence (leaving the crest of the Blue Ridge) North 37° East 79 poles to a stake (in the Meigs and Freeman line), thence North 40° West 115 poles (with the Meigs and Freeman line) to a stake, thence South 45° West 225 poles to the beginning.

"RESOLVED, FURTHER: That any conveyance of said interest in said land by Brevard College, Inc., under authority of this resolution, shall be made for such considerations and upon such terms as the Board of Trustees of Brevard College, Incorporated, in its discretion and judgment, may determine or approve."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

The literature of a people gives a better understanding of their life than do their historical documents. Likewise literature exercises tremendous influence upon a peoples' history. One of the most vital functions of a Methodist pastor is to make good Christian literature available to his members and to encourage them to read. Mr. Wesley and his pioneer preachers did this constantly.

Pastors will wish, first, to keep themselves alert by reading the best books and periodicals. Groups of men in cities and counties can increase the scope of their reading by sharing their books in a circulating library. We recommend the use of a Conference Book Exchange as a means of sharing books. We recommend three new books as being especially timely and interesting:

Cady H. Allen: "The Message of the Book of Revelations."
 Andrew W. Blackwood: "The Fine Art of Conducting Worship."
 William P. King: "Right and Wrong in an Age of Confusion."

Every pastor will want the quarterly professional magazine, "The Pastor," upon his desk for constant reference.

Since there is a shortage of libraries in most of our communities, churches can render valuable service with church libraries. People will be glad to give or lend books to the library if it is properly administered.

The discussion of good books and articles at fellowship meetings, young people's meetings, class and circle meetings will stimulate interest in reading.

Our church, through its several agencies, publishes literature of the highest quality. The Cokesbury Press gives to the world the writings of the great Christian leaders throughout the world. Our church school publications have long been used by other denominations as well as our own.

Let us remind our people that when they buy from our Methodist Publishing House they contribute to the support of our superannuate preachers and their dependents. The Book Committee appropriated \$100,000 for Conference claimants this year. Our Conference received \$4,640.56.

The following periodicals of our church should be made available to every family.

"The Upper Room," a devotional guide.

"Tidings," a quarterly of the Commission on Evangelism.

Both of these are sent to pastors on consignment.

"The World Outlook," a splendidly edited magazine on world Christianity.

"The Christian Home," unexcelled for parents, especially parents of young children.

"The Christian Advocate," essential to an intelligent understanding of our church as a whole. This excellent periodical has enjoyed a healthy increase in circulation this year.

THE NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

We rejoice that our North Carolina Christian Advocate approaches its eighty-fourth anniversary with an increase in income from subscriptions. It is a vigorous and effective force for civic righteousness and Christian progress in our state, as well as the best source of information on North Carolina Methodism. We join the Methodist Board of Publication in recommending:

FIRST, That the General Boards of the Methodist Church give substantial aid to our church paper, by advertising or otherwise;

SECOND, That the Conference Boards, especially the Boards of Education, the Woman's Boards, and the Orphanage Boards, devise the best possible means to aid the Advocate.

THIRD, That during the coming year active steps be taken to incorporate into the household of the North Carolina Christian Advocate the loyal and devoted Methodists of the former Methodist Protestant and Methodist Episcopal Churches, as well as many members of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, who do not now take and read the Advocate.

We recommend that J. W. Moore, whose term of office on the Methodist Board of Publication has expired, be elected to succeed himself.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

During the past year emphasis has been placed on mission study classes, zone meetings, and district institutes. The district missionary secretaries, in co-operation with the Conference Missionary Secretary, are proving very effective in carrying forward the work of missions.

Under the supervision and with the support of the Board, chaplains have been working at the U. S. Veterans' Hospital at Oteen and at the W. N. C. Tubercular Sanatorium at Black Mountain.

Dr. A. W. Wasson, Foreign Secretary of the General Board of Missions, reported to the Board that the work on the foreign fields is going forward in spite

of adverse conditions. Our three hospitals in China are now operating, and almost all of our churches are having regular services. Reports from all our foreign fields indicate gratifying loyalty and devotion on the part of all our missionaries.

It is gratifying to know that the general section of the Board of Missions is sending out four new missionaries—one to Cuba, one to Africa, one to Brazil, and one to the Orient.

The work at the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital is eminently satisfactory. We submit the annual report of the hospital.

Our Board rejoices that the congregations are building better parsonages and providing them and those already built with modern conveniences.

In recent years the increased demand for funds to carry on the work of our entire connection has caused the Budget Commission to reduce the percentage for the Boards of Church Extension. And so the Boards can no longer make either the number of donations, or donations of the size made in former years. And we feel that first consideration should be given to the mission fields where new enterprises are being promoted. The General Board suggests that in other places the askings be for loans instead of donations, and that a church should not ask the Board of Church Extension for aid until it has reached the limit of the ability of the local congregation to meet its own need.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE SUPERANNUATE ENDOWMENT FUND

1. The Trustees are pleased to report that the income of the Endowment for the current year is somewhat larger than the last year, but on account of the necessity for a reserve for certain back taxes and necessary repairs on some of the real estate taken over, the net income to the Conference Treasurer is only slightly above the check for the preceding year, as shown by the Treasurer's report, hereto attached, and filed for record.

2. That under the authority of the Conference at its last session in Charlotte, the Trustees have incorporated the Endowment Fund, under the name of "Super-

annuate Endowment, W. N. C. Conference, Methodist Church, Inc.," a copy of the Articles of Incorporation being herewith filed with the Secretary as a Conference record of the charter.

3. That it is advised that the number of Trustees of the corporation be increased to nine, and the following persons are nominated for election as Trustees of the Endowment, for the following periods, and until their successors are elected, to wit: J. B. Ivey, M. D. Stockton and W. R. Cuthbertson, until the Conference session of 1941; James A. Bell, J. E. Lambeth, and R. G. Stockton, until the Conference session of 1942; and W. C. Houston, J. H. Little, and J. S. Bell, until the Conference session of 1943.

4. That the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Trustees has caused to be prepared a full statement of all cash in bank or on deposit, notes, bonds, or securities, which, with an itemized list of the real estate, constitutes all the assets and properties of every kind and nature of the Superannuate Endowment fund in the hands of the Trustees; that this statement has been examined by Mr. J. L. Hoyle, an experienced professional Certified Public Accountant, who certifies to the accuracy and correctness of said statement; and your Trustees ask authority to deliver the said assets and properties to the new corporation treasurer, upon the execution by such treasurer of a bond in such sum as the Trustees of the corporate Endowment may deem reasonable and sufficient for the honest and faithful care and custody of said funds.

5. That on account of the activities of the Federal Government in making loans on real estate, it is becoming increasingly difficult to secure desirable first mortgage real estate loans, and the interest rates on government bonds are so low as to make the returns from such investment negligible, the Trustees therefore would recommend that they be authorized to invest in the stock or bonds of industrial and commercial corporations having a consistent record in the payment of interest or dividends for such time as to indicate the efficiency and solvency of such corporations; and for the same reasons above stated, the Trustees feel that some expert assistance in the handling of the funds is very desirable, if not necessary, and they, therefore, ask that they be authorized to employ some active and efficient trust company, duly licensed to do business in North Carolina, to assist in the investment and management of the Endowment Fund, subject to the supervision and approval of the Trustees, and upon a satisfactory contract as to services and compensation of such agent.

6. That the adoption of this report be construed as the affirmative action of the Conference, in ratification of the incorporation, in the election of the Trustees, and the broadening of the subjects of investments as outlined in this report.

CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

Our Children's Home continues to serve the boys and girls who have a right to look to the Methodist Church for an opportunity to grow and develop normal Christian lives. Its service has extended continuously throughout the entire year. Our foster family is happy in the security you enable your Children's Home to afford. At present there are 403 boys and girls enrolled. During the year fifty-five have been satisfactorily placed elsewhere, each of these placements coming after careful investigation. About half this number have been returned to rehabilitated homes. The others have been placed in further training or at remunerative and sustaining work. The output of our Home is continually in demand.

Thirty-nine new boys and girls have been accepted during the year. Quite a number of applications are still on file. We are making investigation relative to the merits of their claims as fast as conditions will permit. While not nearly all of the boys and girls who apply for admission into the Children's Home are accepted, none is left without hope and some assurance. Many of those applying do so through their next friend in the hope that they can secure the benefits the Children's Home offers rather than have to take a second choice. We continually keep in mind not only the needs of the applying children but also the financial load our constituency will be called upon to assume.

Some two years ago our mothers' aid department was transferred to the Social Security Program promoted by federal, state and county authorities. Each one of our mothers' aid cases was enabled to secure an aid for dependent children grant. In some instances these grants were and are still not sufficient to take care of the needs involved and we have found it necessary to supplement what the civil authorities have granted. At present we have only four mothers' aid cases, enrolling fourteen children.

We continue to live on a balanced budget. Contributions from our Methodist constituency show a slight increase from year to year. But for this fact we would not be able to continue to provide for the number of children we now serve, since our endowment income has declined quite perceptibly during the past two years. Whether it is a credit to us or not, it is a matter of fact that our daily per capita cost is less than the other leading child caring institutions within our area. This situation is made possible not through a denial of any needed service to the children but because of a less amount of overhead expense.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON SPIRITUAL LIFE

Throughout the years of its existence this Commission has kept in view the fact that the church is a corporate body, always under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, and that its membership is composed of a vast number of individual souls, having the form of Godliness and seeking its power.

Your Commission has had no permanent machinery for promoting intense cultivation of its field; for that reason our activities have been confined to the sessions of the Annual Conference. On this occasion we are entering upon a new era. Gradually, slowly, but surely old irritations and inhibitions pass away, and in their place comes an increasing sense of brotherhood. This integrating movement in the church should release new energy for the development of a larger life within the brotherhood. Growth should be through love and not through rancor; for this reason we anticipate an upsurge of spiritual power in the heart of our Methodism, which will find expression in the life of our people. It is good that we shall all be born again. The kingdom of God comes not by observation but through new life, born of the Spirit.

Methodism began its life in America by seeking to spread Scriptural holiness through all these lands. It lacked everything which men would desire for growth, for progress or permanence. Through the providence of God we have been richly endowed with all the non-essentials. Surely the time has come when we should place our emphasis upon the inner sanctification, not only of the souls of men, but of every function of the church; that the church we love shall give expression to this ideal in its every department. We believe that the very machinery of the church and its operation through the product of men's limited abilities may be sanctified when those who operate it are sanctified.

That all these organizations of the church may be dedicated more completely and purely to this basic purpose of our religion we call upon all who lead, as teachers and officers from those highest in the councils of the church to the humblest in the least local church to seek God in prayer and in quiet, to look to Him for direction in the performance of their official functions and to re-dedicate their lives daily and hourly to a faithful and loving care for the lives of all those with whom they come in contact; for only by such seeking and such faithfulness to the person and message of our Lord will creative energies be released into those channels which our church has provided for the spiritual growth of its members, young and old.

It is no less important that the humblest Methodist in all this land enjoy his religion; for this is the one joy that inspires all other joys; lights the fires upon every altar; shines upon the ark in every temple and binds men to the vast purposes of Almighty God. With this deep, abiding sense of joy and peace heaven is even now at hand; without it men cannot live; without it the church shall perish from the earth. We ask that you join with us in the re-affirmation of our faith in the God of our salvation, through whose imminence and power the crowning glory of the church shall be revealed.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD

We present the following resolutions:

Whereas the spread of the Gospel by means of the distribution of the Holy Scriptures is a responsibility of the Christian Church, and whereas the American Bible Society has been for many years the agency of the American churches in thus extending God's Kingdom, we, the Western North Carolina Conference, do hereby endorse the work of the American Bible Society, and commend it to our pastors and people for their prayerful support.

During the past year the total distribution of the American Bible Society has exceeded 6,980,000 volumes, of which over 312,000 were Bibles, 529,000 Testaments, and 6,137,000 Gospels and other portions.

The circulation in the United States was 171,094 Bibles, 283,227 Testaments, and 2,915,047 Gospels and portions—a total of 3,369,368, a slight increase over last year. The circulation abroad has totalled 3,610,000 volumes, which number includes 1,395,000 distributed in China under very adverse circumstances. 5,455 volumes for the blind, and "talk book" records have been sold or granted to blind persons at a cost seven or eight times the amount received for them.

The income of the society last year was \$114,768 from churches and \$108,364 from individuals.

Your Bible Board is keeping on hand at Charlotte, for convenient distribution, a supply of the volumes of the four Gospels and the Book of Acts, which can be purchased at the nominal price of one cent each. We have distributed several hundred of these, and hope to increase this to many thousand during the next Conference year. Copies can be obtained in any quantity from Mr. J. B. Ivey at Charlotte.

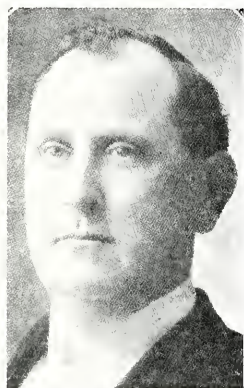

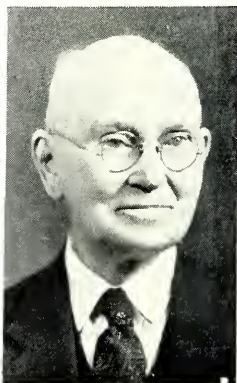
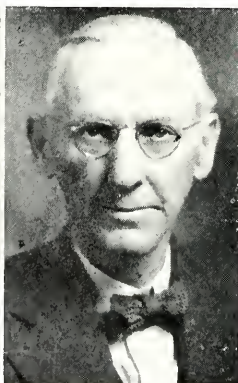

Conference By-Laws

1. Resolved, That the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, in session in the City of High Point, North Carolina, this the twenty-second day of October in the year of our Lord, 1940, authorizes the Cabinet to suggest the size of and nominate the members to the Boards, Commissions, and Committees of this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline makes specific provisions otherwise.
2. District Conferences shall be held annually in each District.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually four delegates to the District Conference.
4. Lay delegates from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.
5. One copy of the Conference Journal shall be furnished without charge to each minister, lay delegate and minister's widow of the Annual Conference; and except those copies necessary for official use, all other copies of the Journal shall be sold at twenty-five cents each.
6. An amount equal to 9% of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the salaries of the District Superintendents. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer, and he in turn to forward the funds to the Conference Treasurer not later than the 25th of each month. The Conference Treasurer shall pay the salary to the District Superintendents.
7. An amount equal to $8\frac{1}{4}\%$ of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the Conference Claimants' Fund.
8. An amount equal to $2\frac{1}{4}\%$ of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the Episcopal Fund.
9. An amount equal to 10% of the pastor's salary shall be the assessment for the support of the Children's Home. Fifth Sunday offerings shall be continued as a free will offering to the Home.

(NOTE: All of these by-laws were adopted by the 1940 session of the Conference.)

Retired Ministers: The names of the retired members of the Conference were called, their characters were passed, and by vote of the Conference their names were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications for the same relation. The names of the supernumeraries, whose characters were also passed, were referred to the same committee for the supernumerary relation.

Publication of Journal: P. N. Garber, Chairman of the Committee on the Publication of the Conference Journal, made the report for that Committee. The report was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Order of the Day: On motion of R. C. Goforth, Wednesday morning, 10:00 o'clock, was set as the time to receive the report of the Board of Temperance. A. J. Kirby moved that the afternoon session today be a regular business session of the Conference, and the Conference approved.

Report: T. R. Wolfe presented the report of the Committee on the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund, and the report was referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

Memorial Service: At 11:30 a. m. the Memorial Service was begun, with Bishop Purell presiding. G. T. Rowe led the prayer. In answer to Disciplinary Question 42, "What ministerial members have died during the year?" the Secretary answered: J. M. Downum, W. A. Newell, A. S. Raper, J. T. Ratledge, T. J. Rogers, J. H. West, and A. H. Whisner; and the memoirs for these deceased brethren were presented by Paul W. Townsend, G. T. Rowe, J. L. Ingram, L. B. Hayes, S. B. Turrentine, E. P. Billups, and A. C. Waggoner. The memorial address which follows was made by H. C. Sprinkle, Jr.

It is not mere tradition or sentiment which leads this great Conference to set apart an hour to do honor to the preachers who have died. Among our most valuable spiritual possessions are ennobling memories. There is an immortality of influence which makes the victorious lives and heroic achievements of great and good men a source of strength to those who come after them. When an American youth visits that corridor in the national capitol, for example, where the States of the Union are represented by statues in honor of their foremost citizens, pioneers and reformers, soldiers and statesmen, doctors and teachers, men and women who helped to build the nation, he is likely to be a better citizen. He comes away from such a place with the feeling that he has had a rendezvous with the spirit of America. And a comparable feeling must have come to our hearts today, quite apart from the personal attachments which make this occasion peculiarly meaningful to many of us, as we have heard the roll call of our brethren who have died since last we met. We have been keeping tryst with the spirit of this annual Conference, with the spirit of Methodism, with the spirit of our Christian faith. We owe it to ourselves to do honor to these men.

But we cannot do justice, much less honor, to these our departed brethren unless we remember, above all that they have accomplished, the prevailing purposes which they served and the faith which they sought to share. There have been stout hearts and gifted minds among us, and they have given us leadership and vision. There have been great souls among us, and they have wrought worthily and well. There have been eloquent voices that have claimed men's hearts for God. We need not underestimate the good that they have done nor the successes which they have achieved. But the true greatness of these men is measured by their faith. The goodly heritage which they received from the fathers and have left to us lies in the realm of ends, of ideals, and of spirit. And I am persuaded that in doing them the simple justice to remember this important truth about them we shall be rendering them the highest honor of which we are capable.

For it is the outstanding fact about these men that they dared take seriously the Christian standard of greatness. Their lives were dedicated to One who said, "Whosoever will be great among you, let him be your minister, and whosoever will be chief among you, let him be your servant."

Our young people delight in singing a hymn which begins,

"Are ye able," said the Master,

"To be crucified with me?"

"Yea," the sturdy dreamers answered,

"To the death we follow thee."

The heroes whose names are honored here today are worthy to be remembered because there was a time they were just such sturdy dreamers and made just such a daring answer to the Master's challenge as that which this song of youth recalls.

Moreover, as the bloom of youthful enthusiasm faded into the bronze of midday toil, as these men faced the difficult problems of God's men in a world where evil is real and where human weakness and ignorance and sin are sober, costly facts, as they came through storm and calm to the eventide of life, these were hearts that still could sing,

In the cross of Christ I glory,
 Towering o'er the wrecks of time,
 All the light of sacred story
 Gathers 'round its head sublime.

When the woes of life o'ertake me,
 Hopes deceive, and fears annoy,
 Never shall the cross forsake me;
 Lo! it glows with peace and joy.

Yes, the greatness of these men was the greatness of their faith. It is a kind of greatness which the world little understands, for theirs was a faith in the way of the cross. And such a faith implies that no higher honor, no more glorious achievement, no more illustrious distinction could come to any man than to be a servant, a servant of one's fellow man, a minister of Jesus Christ.

Those whose names we honor today were not only men of a daring faith, but they were men of one prevailing purpose and loyalty. They gave their best to the service of the church. If the standard of greatness by which they chose to be judged is not the standard which the world accepts, it was their purpose to build and serve the one divine institution through which the world could be taught Christian standards of living and thinking.

I fancy that none of these men was altogether satisfied with the Methodist Church to which they gave their allegiance in their youth. For one thing, they regretted the divisions which separated them from their brethren of like faith; and they were fortunate and happy to live to see three great branches of our Methodism united. They must have felt that there were many other ways in which their church fell short of the ideal. But they loved their church, and they somehow felt that theirs was the church of the living God. They saw in the Methodist movement a still greater church, mightier in spiritual power, more perfect in obedience to the will of Christ, more winsome in appeal to burdened, sinful men. They doubtless yearned for the appearance of that glorious church "without spot or wrinkle or any such thing": but these dreams and yearnings did not keep them from giving their best, oftentimes to struggling little societies under their care where spots were to be removed and wrinkles to be ironed out. Indeed that dream of the church triumphant was the inspiration for their service to the church militant. Their faith in the divine origin and the divine goal of the ideal church gave them power to deal with the human problems and to see the human values in the visible institution with all its human imperfections. They prayed and planned and toiled and gave their lives to make their church what it ought to be and what it could become only through the labor and loyalty of good men.

Together these seven men who are graduated from their earthly labors in the class of 1940 contributed 245 years of full-time service in the ministry of the church. One gave fifty years, another 49, another 43, and the others gave all they could. Only one of these men was privileged to die before retirement because of age or disability; only one, and he for good reason, gave less than 29 years of service as a preacher. With the exception of the latter, the average term of active service for the group was forty years. What is to be remembered most, however, is not the length of their service, but the loyalty of their lives which these terms of service represent. These were men whose daring faith found expression in a practical way through loyalty to the church. To them it seemed not only logical but natural that it should be so.

The third fact about these men whose names are on our lips and whose remembrance is in our hearts today is almost too obvious to mention. Indeed it is a fact so obvious that we might miss its significance, and for that reason I dare to refer to it especially. Not only were these men of faith, and not only did their faith find its expression in lives of loyal service to the church; but their service to the church led them into a peculiarly intimate community which is the brotherhood of Methodist preachers in an annual Conference. Now membership in an annual Conference of the Methodist Church implies faith in the way of the cross, and it certainly implies loyalty to the church; but there is something more which enters into this relationship. And I do not refer simply to the common experiences and mutual understandings which draw men of a profession together. Our plan of work requires that the preachers who belong to the same annual Conference must share in a most intimate way the plans and labors, the successes and failures, the opportunities and the disappointments of every other member of that Conference. During the lifetime of these brethren whom we remember today, the very successes of our church in meeting the needs of all sorts and conditions of men in the midst of rapid economic, social, and cultural changes, have imposed tests upon our preachers which only the finest spirit of Christian brotherhood could meet. And they have striven to maintain and hand down to us that spirit which alone will enable us to meet the further test of welding into one living brotherhood those who were members of the three Conferences now united. Those of us who as young preachers knew the affectionate interest and kindly fellowship extended to us by some of these whom we miss today will always honor them for their efforts to build the brother spirit in our Conference.

And as we honor these preachers for their faith, their loyalty to the church, their brother hearts; so we would remember the wives and widows of our preachers. And this year our memorial service would not be complete without a tribute to one who was not a preacher, not even a member of this Conference, but a layman whose interest in our cause and whose life of gentle greatness has meant much to our Conference and to the whole church. No clearer example of the kind of faith and life and spirit we have been seeking to describe could have been given than that of William Preston Few.

The Secretary announced that during the year two heroines of the parsonage, Mrs. A. R. Surratt and Mrs. J. C. Moek, have died.

The Benediction was pronounced by S. B. Turrentine, and the session was adjourned at 12:30 p. m.

Afternoon Session

Anniversary Session: The afternoon session was called to order at 3:00 o'clock by Bishop Purcell. This was the anniversary of the Board of Lay Activities and of the Board of Temperance. Bishop Purcell asked A. J. Kirby, Conference Lay Leader, to preside. The prayer was led by R. C. Goforth, Chairman of the Board of Temperance. Mr. Kirby explained the purpose of the joint meeting of the Board of Temperance and the Board of Lay Activities; and Paul F. Evans made the report for the Board of Lay Activities, which report was adopted, electing A. J. Kirby Conference Lay Leader. (See Appendix.)

Bishop Waldorf: Bishop Ernest L. Waldorf was presented, and gave the address on the subject, "Dawn or Dusk," based on II Peter 1:19.

Benediction: The benediction was pronounced by R. M. Hauss, and the meeting was adjourned.

SECOND DAY—WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1940

Seating Reserves: The Conference authorized the Roll Call and Credentials Secretary to substitute reserve delegates for principal delegates, and to print the list in the daily minutes.

Minutes Approved: F. O. Dryman, for the Committee on Daily Minutes, reported that the record of the morning and evening sessions of yesterday is correct, and the Conference approved the report.

Deaths: M. T. Smathers announced that news of the death of the mother of Byron Shankle had just been received, and called attention of the Conference to the death of Bishop Wallace E. Brown. The Conference stood in memory and sympathy.

Reports: The Secretary announced the receipt of the report of the North Carolina Pastors' School, the Treasurer's report of the School, and

the statement of the Duke Endowment Fund, and these were ordered printed in the Conference Journal. (See Appendix.)

Financial Plan: Dr. Costen J. Harrell, author of "The Financial Plan of The Methodist Church," was presented to the Conference, and he explained this plan.

Committee on District Conference Records: The Conference authorized Bishop Purell to name a Committee on District Conference Records, and he appointed G. A. Stamper, C. C. Benton, E. Lester Ballard, W. L. Ward, and Zeb F. Curtis.

Introduction: Mrs. Ernest L. Waldorf was escorted to the front by E. H. Blackard and presented by Bishop Purell to the Conference.

Resolution: J. B. Ivey offered the following resolution, and it was adopted:

"Realizing the great good accomplished by the American Bible Society through the many years of its existence, and knowing that its continued usefulness is dependent on the support of the churches, we reaffirm our confidence in this great agency in spreading the Word of God throughout the world, and pledge our hearty support to the American Bible Society.

"Inasmuch as we do not have a Bible Committee, we request that the Bishop and Cabinet appoint such a Committee to continue through this quadrennium.

Secretary Emeritus: G. Ray Jordan paid a tribute to W. L. Sherrill, and the Conference by unanimous vote made Brother Sherrill Secretary Emeritus for life.

Order of the Day: At 10:00 o'clock the order of the day, the consideration of the report of the Board of Temperance, was called. R. M. Hauss read the report, and the Conference granted Honorable Paul R. Ervin the privilege of the floor, and he delivered a stirring appeal to the preachers and laymen, urging that they fight fearlessly the liquor traffic. The report was adopted, and then Bishop Purell spoke of the importance of this matter. (See Appendix.)

Education: J. G. Huggin, Jr., presented Reports 1 and 2 of the Board of Education. Both reports were adopted. (See Appendix.)

Introduction: C. E. Miller, Methodist Publishing House, and Dr. W. P. King, Editor of the Nashville Christian Advocate, were presented; and each spoke of the cause he represented.

Disciplinary Questions: Question 28, "Who are admitted on trial?" was called, and the following, having been duly recommended by their respective districts, were by vote of the Conference admitted on trial in the traveling connection: Greensboro District—John Frank Cagle; High Point District—Raymond Odell Brown; Salisbury District—Sherrill Bost Big-

gers and Lee Roy Speneer; Statesville District—Wade Robert Bustle; Waynesville District—William Ed Andrews and Joseph Temple Shackford; and Winston-Salem District—Simeon Byron Nifong and Charles Denny White.—(9).

Question 29, "Who have been continued on trial?" was called, and F. W. D. Bangle, G. W. Bumgarner, A. J. Clemmer, Jr., J. R. Hamilton, C. L. Heckard, G. A. Hovis, J. A. Lindsay, R. V. Martin, R. W. McCulley, J. L. McGalliard, McM. S. Riehey, C. B. Ross, G. M. Sehreyer, and H. H. Wood, having passed the course of study, their characters were passed and they were advanced to the class of the second year. W. Earl Armstrong was not before the Committee, his character was passed, and he was continued in the class of the first year. W. W. Hager of this class was, at his own request, discontinued.

Question 31 (a), "Who are elected and ordained deacons this year?" was called next. C. W. Avett, E. D. C. Brewer, J. W. Fowler, Jr., H. D. Garmon, E. W. Hardin, J. J. Holmes, E. H. Lowman, J. E. Rink, W. C. Sides, Jr., and P. F. Snider, who had passed the course of study and were recommended by the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, were advanced to the class of the third year and elected deacons. M. B. Shives and C. D. Stokes were continued in the class of the second year.

Question 32, "What members are in the studies of the third year?" was called, and J. M. Brandon, Jr., A. J. Cox, H. G. Hardin, Jr., N. A. Huffman, D. B. Mullis, M. C. Reese, and P. R. Question 34, "What members have completed the studies of the fourth year?" was called. W. F. Beadle, W. F. Eaker, L. S. Furr, P. L. Green, E. M. Hoyle, A. F. Phibbs, E. C. Preece, P. L. Shore, Jr., R. J. Starling, and P. R. Taylor, having completed the course of study, their characters were passed, and they were elected elders. H. E. Jones was continued in this class.

Questions 35 (a) and 36 (a) were called, and answered "No one."

Order of the Day: The reception of the class into full membership was set as the order of the day for Thursday at 11:00 a. m.

Evangelism: The report of the Commission on Evangelism was read by H. P. Powell and adopted. (See Appendix.)

Ministers Retired: R. B. Templeton, A. B. Dennis, M. L. Chappell, D. L. Earnhardt, J. A. Burgess, J. M. Varner, B. M. Crosby, and W. H. Pless were, on motion of their District Superintendents, referred to the

Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications for the retired relation, giving partial answer to Question 38.

Location: Answering Question 43, W. A. Kerr was, at his own request, granted voluntary location.

Council of Churches: Ernest J. Arnold, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Council of Churches, was introduced to the Conference, and spoke of the work of the Council. On motion of W. A. Stanbury, Bishop Purcell was authorized to appoint seven members to serve on the Council; and the following were appointed: J. B. Ivey, Carl H. King, P. E. Lindley, W. A. Stanbury, J. J. Wood, C. C. Weaver, and J. Elwood Carroll. B. V. Hedrick and J. Clyde Auman were named alternates.

Resolution: The following resolution was offered by W. A. Stanbury and adopted:

"Recognizing the fact that, in times of unrest and conflict, no one person or group of persons can express the conscientious convictions of all our people, we take this opportunity earnestly to suggest:

"1. That in this period of spreading war throughout the world, and in this era of increasing fears, suspicions, animosities, condemnations, and national and international struggles for places in the sun, as well as boasts that 'our enemies must be destroyed,' or 'blasted off the earth,' we call upon our ministers and members to maintain a calm and fraternal spirit.

"2. That we confess our personal and national sins, and express our sympathy and humbly intercede for all who are misled, oppressed, persecuted, imprisoned, exiled, or made mad by the passions always fanned to blazing heat in war.

"3. That we urge Congress and the executive branch of our government to seek by all right means to avoid war and prevent this nation from becoming involved in war; and likewise we urge that all proper measures be taken to preserve democracy, free speech, and free conscience, and to protect and promote the Christian way of life among nations as well as within them.

"4. That we continue to pray for world peace, to plan and work to prevent the further spread of the war mind and of war itself; that we hope and pray and labor for the rebuilding of national and international structures in ways which will better serve the security and peace of mankind; and, finally, that we seek to know and apply the mind of Christ in all circumstances and to all problems, whether personal, social, economic, political, or international.

On motion of W. A. Stanbury, the last few minutes of the morning session were set aside as a period for a prayer for peace, to be led by Bishop Purcell.

Appeal: An appeal from the Quarterly Conference of the Morganton Circuit regarding the decision of the Marion District Board of Church Location and Building was presented by G. R. Stafford; and on motion of

J. C. Cornett the appeal was referred to the Board of Missions and Church Extension for decision.

Trustees: A. B. Dennis made a motion involving the trustees of the Asheville District parsonage, named at the last session of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference, and the matter was referred to the Conference Trustees for study and report.

Resolution: J. W. Fitzgerald offered the following resolution, and on motion of M. T. Smathers, it was referred to the Board of Missions and Church Extension:

“Resolved: That the Section of Church Extension, as provided in Paragraph 1038, Section 3, of the Discipline of The Methodist Church, and as provided in a resolution adopted by the Western North Carolina Conference in session at Greensboro, October 21, 1939, and recorded on page 39 of the Minutes of said Conference, be composed of not more than one-third of the members of the Board of Missions and Church Extension. Provided that there be one lay member for each clerical member, and provided further that no more than two members of the section be members of the Executive Committee.

Introductions: R. T. Amos, Chairman of the local Entertainment Committee, Fred N. Tate, and Miss Lorena Kelly, missionary to the Belgian Congo, were presented to the Conference.

Adjournment: Bishop Purcell led in a prayer for peace and pronounced the benediction. The session was adjourned at 12:30 p. m.

THIRD DAY—THURSDAY, OCTOBER 24, 1940

Morning Session

Devotions: At nine o'clock the morning session convened, with the Conference quartet singing the Call to Worship. The congregation then sang, “Jesus, Wherever Thy People Meet,” and George R. Brown led the prayer. Bishop Purcell continued the devotional messages on “Prayer,” reading John 17:1-26.

Minutes Approved: F. O. Dryman reported that the Journal of yesterday's session was correct, and the report was approved.

Telegram: A telegram of greetings was announced from William K. Anderson, Educational Director of the Commission on Courses of Study.

Minute Questions 38 and 5: In answer to Minute Questions 38 and 5, "Are all ministerial members blameless in their life and official administration?" and "What are the reports of the District Superintendents?" the names of the District Superintendents and other ministers of the Asheville, Charlotte, Elkin, Gastonia, Greensboro, High Point, Marion, and Salisbury Districts were called. The District Superintendents made their reports, as did the pastors, and their characters were passed.

Reports: The reports of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, and of the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc., were presented by O. V. Woosley and A. W. Plyler, respectively, and the reports were adopted. (See Appendix.) During the consideration of the latter report, the Bishop asked E. H. Nease to take the chair.

The Bishop resumed the chair, and by common consent the order of the day was deferred until 11:30 o'clock.

Report: The report of the Commission on World Service and Finance was read by R. M. Stockton, and J. B. Craven spoke regarding provisions in the report relative to College Place Church and District Superintendents' salaries. The report was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Resolutions: The following resolutions were referred to the new Commission on World Service and Finance:

ASSESSMENT FOR DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' SALARIES

"That we abolish the present 9% assessment on all charges for salaries of District Superintendents, and levy a graded scale of assessments on pastors' salaries as follows:

Charges paying \$1,000 or less	4%
Charges paying over \$1,000, up to \$1,999	8%
Charges paying \$2,000, and up to \$2,999	10%
Charges paying \$3,000, and up to \$3,999	12%
Charges paying \$4,000, and above	16%

"Provided, however, that this rule, or scale of assessments, shall be flexible, and each district shall make special adjustments to meet special cases.

"That the incoming Commission of World Service and Finance be instructed to consider the possibility of making the appropriation to our colleges a separate, and, as far as possible, a continuing appropriation, distinct from the regular appropriation to the Board of Education.

A resolution by R. M. Hardee regarding the use of the radio for our District and Conference work was referred to the Board of Missions and Church Extension for its consideration.

The report of the Joint Committee on College Place Church was read by W. A. Lambeth and referred to the Board of Missions and Church Extension for study and report.

Treasurer Elected: W. A. Lambeth made the motion that the Joint Committee on College Place Church be continued, and that C. W. Phillips be elected Treasurer of the College Place Fund. The Committee members from this Conference are: L. B. Abernethy, N. V. Stockton, B. L. Smith, M. Lee Ralls, L. B. Hayes, W. A. Lambeth, D. B. McCrary, F. M. Brown, and the Chairman of the College Place Board of Stewards.

Order of the Day: On motion of John W. Hoyle, Jr., the evening session of today was made a regular session of the Conference, and the consideration of the report of the Committee on Objectives was set as the order of the day for Friday, at 11:00 a. m.

Full Connection: The hour for the Order of the Day having arrived, C. W. Avett, E. D. C. Brewer, J. W. Fowler, Jr., H. D. Garmon, E. W. Hardin, J. J. Holmes, E. H. Lowman, J. E. Rink, W. C. Sides, Jr., and P. F. Snider were called to the chancel. Bishop Purell addressed the class briefly and asked the disciplinary questions, after which, by vote of the Conference these men were admitted into full connection.

Board of Education: The following were nominated by the Board of Education as members at large: G. T. Rowe, J. B. Craven, W. A. Kale, J. G. Wilkinson, and R. T. Amos, and they were elected.

Introduction: W. S. Sharp, President of Pfeiffer College, presented Mrs. W. H. C. Goode, of the Woman's Division of Christian Service of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, and she spoke regarding the work of Pfeiffer College.

Orders: On recommendation of the Cabinet, C. D. Stokes was elected to deacon's orders under the Missionary Rule; C. D. Stokes and C. W. Clay, on recommendation of the Cabinet, were elected elders under the Missionary Rule, and M. B. Stokes, Jr., on recommendation of the Cabinet, was elected an elder under the Seminary Rule.

Re-admission: G. N. Dulin, for the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, presented the recommendation of that Committee that Marvin W. Mann be re-admitted into the traveling connection of the Virginia Conference. The Cabinet presented the following resolution:

"Whereas, the Staunton District Conference of the Virginia Annual Conference has recommended Marvin W. Mann, of Paint Bank, Va., for re-admission into the traveling connection, and that of the Virginia Conference, and Whereas, it is necessary for him to have a recommendation by the annual Conference from which he located, at his own request, therefore be it Resolved: That the Western North Carolina Annual Conference recommends to the Virginia Annual Conference that it re-admit Rev. Marvin W. Mann into the traveling connection.

"This is the unanimous request of the Bishop's Cabinet.

The Conference voted unanimously for this re-admission. The Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications also recommended that M. B. Shives be continued in the class of the second year.

Bible Board: The Cabinet nominated the following for the Bible Board: Clerical—C. M. White, C. M. Pickens, J. L. A. Bumgarner, B. Wilson, A. D. Shelton, T. M. Johnson, J. R. Duncan, C. G. Isley, J. W. Blitch, O. B. Williams, and Ebenezer Myers; and Lay—Mrs. S. M. Garren, J. B. Ivey, Mrs. M. L. Mast, F. C. Todd, J. M. Gibbs, W. B. McEwen, H. F. Nanny, W. L. Blackwelder, R. C. Bunch, Charles Rhodarmer, and E. C. Foy. The Conference approved these.

Resolution: The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

“Resolved: That it become a rule of this annual Conference, in session, that no proposal for the raising or expending of money shall be authorized by the Conference until the proposal has been referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance or to some other appropriate Committee for its study and recommendation.

Reports: The reports of the Treasurer of the Board of Conference Trustees, the Committee on General Indebtedness, Superannuate Endowment, and Treasurer of Superannuate Endowment were presented and ordered printed in the Conference Journal. The report of the Wesley Foundation and of the Committee on Accepted Supplies were read and approved. H. A. Dunham made his report as Treasurer of the Board of Education, and the statement was ordered to record. (See Appendix.)

A letter from I. L. Shaver was noted, and the Secretary was ordered to make suitable reply.

Discontinued: On motion of E. M. Jones, W. E. Armstrong was, at his own request, discontinued.

Gift: J. H. Armbrust announced that Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Ivey had made a gift of \$10.00 to each minister's widow of the Conference.

Hour of Meeting: On motion of E. H. Blackard, the Conference voted to begin the morning session tomorrow at 8:30 o'clock.

Adjournment: At 12:30 p. m. the session adjourned.

Evening Session

Devotional Service: Bishop Purcell called the Conference to order at seven-thirty o'clock and led the devotions. The High Point College choir sang "God So Loved the World" (Stainer), and the prayer was made by R. M. Andrews.

Sermon: Bishop Purcell presented Bishop Ernest L. Waldorf, who preached the ordination sermon on "Some Leading Questions."

Ordinations: The Secretary presented C. W. Avett, E. D. C. Brewer, J. W. Fowler, Jr., H. D. Garmon, E. W. Hardin, J. J. Holmes, E. H. Lowman, J. E. Rink, W. C. Sides, Jr., and P. F. Snider to be ordained deacons, and they were ordained by Bishop Purcell. In this service the collect was led by S. W. Taylor, the Epistle was read by C. C. Benton, and J. E. Rink read the Gospel.

The Secretary then presented W. F. Beadle, W. F. Eaker, L. S. Furr, P. L. Green, E. M. Hoyle, Jr., A. F. Phibbs, E. C. Price, P. L. Shore, Jr., R. J. Starling, and P. R. Taylor to be ordained elders. The collect, Epistle and Gospel were read by elders G. T. Bond, E. M. Jones and W. L. Hutchins, respectively; and assisting Bishop Purcell in the laying on of hands were Bishop Waldorf and the following elders: R. M. Andrews, E. M. Jones, John Hoyle, Jr., L. B. Hayes, and P. L. Shore. In each ordination the wives and other close relatives and friends of the candidates were asked to stand with them for this service.

Bishop Waldorf: In his closing words to the Conference, Bishop Waldorf spoke of his great appreciation for the opportunity of attending and speaking to this Conference. Bishop Purcell responded fittingly.

Benediction: Bishop Purcell pronounced the benediction and the session was adjourned at 9:30 p. m.

FOURTH DAY—FRIDAY, OCTOBER 25, 1940

Morning Session

Devotions: The Conference was called to order at 8:30 a. m. and the devotions were led by Bishop Purcell. The prayer was made by W. J. Plint; and the Bishop commented on Hebrews 11.

Journal: F. O. Dryman reported that the Journal of yesterday's sessions was correct and the Conference approved the report.

Introductions: Dr. C. E. Forlines, President of Westminster Theological Seminary, J. S. Williams, Chaplain of the Good Samaritan Mission, and Dr. J. M. Ormond, were introduced; and each spoke to the Conference of the institution he represented. W. A. Stambury addressed the Conference on the work of the Conference Brotherhood.

Conference Historical Society: R. L. Ownbey presented the following resolution which was adopted:

“Resolved: That in accordance with the 1940 Discipline of The Methodist Church, Paragraph 471, the Historical Society of the Western North Carolina Conference shall be recognized as an integral part of the Conference; that hereafter the annual meeting of the Society shall be held at an open session of the Conference, and its proceedings be made a part of the Conference records.

On motion of the Treasurer, the Conference referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance for study and report the question of the expense and salary of the office of Statistical Secretary.

Offerings: On motion of J. S. Hiatt an offering amounting to \$144.10 was taken and distributed equally to the eight brothers retiring at this Conference. An offering of \$40.80 was made for the janitors.

Question 38 was resumed and the names of the ministers of the Statesville, Waynesville, and Winston-Salem Districts were called. The District Superintendents made their reports and the characters of all the ministers of these Districts were passed. The Bishop expressed his joy over the fine reports from all of the Districts this year.

District Treasurers: J. B. Craven offered the following resolution and it was adopted:

“Resolved: That each District Superintendent be instructed to appoint a District Treasurer, whose duty it shall be to receive from the charges of the District the payments on District Superintendents’ salaries, Bishops’ claims and Conference claimants’ apportionments, and to remit same to the Conference Treasurer not later than the 25th of each month.

“Resolved: Second, that the Conference Treasurer be instructed to remit to each District Superintendent as soon as the monies are received their *pro-rata* amounts due from the monies received for District Superintendents, and to handle the Bishops’ fund and the Conference claimants’ apportionments in accordance with the method of handling other General and Conference funds.

Substitution on Board: O. M. Vernon was substituted on the Board of Missions and Church Extension for Fred Hobson.

Craven Presides: Bishop Purcell called J. B. Craven to preside.

Reports: The following reports were presented and adopted: No. 1 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, No. 2 of the same Board, District Conference Records, Board of Conference Claimants and Statistician were made by R. M. Courtney, I. L. Roberts, E. L. Ballard, W. C. Houston, and J. G. Winker, respectively. Dr. W. C. Houston presented a report of the Superannuated Fund Society of the Annual Conference of the Metho-

dist Protestant Church in North Carolina as information. (See Appendix.) W. B. West spoke to the report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

College Place Church: The report of the Joint Committee on College Place Church, which was referred on yesterday to the Board of Missions and Church Extension for study, was presented and adopted. (See Appendix.)

Resolution of Appreciation: The resolution of appreciation was offered by R. L. Ownbey and it was unanimously adopted by standing vote. It follows:

Conscientious Objectors: W. O. Weldon presented the following resolution which was adopted:

"Whereas, Paragraph No. 1712, Section 16, of the Discipline of The Methodist Church, reads as follows:

"The Methodist Church, true to the principles of the New Testament, teaches respect for properly constituted civil authority. It holds that government rests upon the support of its conscientious citizenship, and that conscientious objectors to war in any or all of its manifestations are a natural outgrowth of the principle of good will and the Christian desire for universal peace; and holds that such objectors should not be oppressed by compulsory military service anywhere or at any time. We ask and claim exemption from all forms of military preparation or service for all conscientious objectors who may be members of The Methodist Church. In this they have the authority and support of their Church. However, we recognize the right of the individual to answer the call of his government in an emergency according to the dictates of his Christian conscience."

"And: Whereas this law of our church neither commends nor opposes conscientious objection to participation in military service, but gives its backing to any individual member who takes this position,

"Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the ministers of this Conference prepare themselves to counsel, advise, and support any members of their churches whose Christian convictions demand that he not participate in military service of any form.

Bishop Purcell resumed the chair.

Objectives: The report of the Committee on Objectives was read by Fletcher Nelson and was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Retired Ministers: G. N. Dulin, for the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, offered the report, and it was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Disciplinary Questions: To each of the following disciplinary questions the answer "None" was given: 23, 26, 27, 40, 41, 46, and 47.

Conference Quartet: Bishop Purecell spoke words of appreciation for the services of the Conference Quartet; and W. A. Lambeth presented Miss Imogene Miles, Miss Elizabeth Oliver, Mrs. J. F. Kirk, John Hoyle, Jr., and the Conference Secretary and praised them for their work in preparing the list of appointments. Bishop Purecell told of the excellent work of W. A. Lambeth as Secretary to the Cabinet.

Conference Approval: By almost unanimous vote the Conference voted its approval of holding the Conference sessions between Sundays. The Bishop announced that one of the brothers, who has had great expenses during the year and must make a long move, needs a new automobile, and asked any who would help to secure this car, to send check to him or to the Conference Secretary. By common consent the Secretary was ordered to print the list of District Boards and Boundary Changes in the Journal without these being read. The Boundary Changes follow:

4. From Mills River Charge take Etowah Church and Shaw's Creek, and from Rosman Charge take English Chapel Church and form them into a new charge to be known as Etowah Charge.

5. From Oteen Charge take Bethel Church and attach to the Swannanoa Charge; take Vance Street, Black Mountain, and attach to Black Mountain Station; take Mt. Zion Church and attach to Mill's River; take Nesbitt's Chapel and attach to Fairview; discontinue Boiling Springs and transfer the membership to Fletcher; place the parsonage under the jurisdiction of Swannanoa Charge, thus absorbing Oteen Charge.

6. From Marshall Charge take Flint Hill Church and attach to Weaverville Circuit, discontinuing Flint Hill as a preaching appointment; discontinue Alexander Station as a preaching appointment.

7. Change the name of Flat Rock Charge to East Flat Rock.

8. From Sandy Charge take Brick Church and attach to Leicester-Grace Charge.

9. Separate Saluda-Tryon into two charges, one to be called Saluda, the other Tryon.

Charlotte District:

1. Take Zoar from the Weddington Charge, leaving Zoar to be supplied.

2. Change the name of North Monroe-Grace Charge to North Monroe. Put Grace Church on the Unionville Charge.

3. Take New Hope Church from the Unionville-New Hope Charge and place it on the North Monroe Charge.

4. Change the name of Unionville-New Hope Charge to Unionville Charge.

5. Take Oak Grove Church from Marshville Charge and put it on North Monroe Charge.

6. Take Center Church from Unionville-New Hope Charge and place it on the Marshville Charge.

Elkin District:

1. Take Dunkirk Church from the Wilkesboro Circuit and place with the Moravian Falls Charge.

2. Take Bethel Church from Helton Circuit and place with the Warrensville Charge.

3. Change name of Wilkesboro Circuit to Millers Creek Charge.

4. Take Roaring River from Moravian Falls Charge and place with the Jonesville Circuit.

5. Take Ebenezer Church from the Jonesville Circuit and place with the Traphill Charge.

6. Dissolve the Surry-Yadkin Charge (M. E.), placing Pink Hill Church with Bryant Memorial Charge.

7. Change the name of Ararat-Mountain View to Bryant Memorial Charge.

8. Take New Home, Mount Olive, Shady Grove, from the Surry-Yadkin Circuit, and East Bend, Prospect, Mt. Pleasant, and Macedonia Churches from the Yadkinville Circuit and form a new charge to be called the East Bend Circuit.

9. Take Level Cross and Stanford Churches from the Surry-Yadkin Charge and place with the Dobson Circuit.

10. Take Cornatzer Church from the Mocksville Circuit and place with Advance.

Gastonia District:

1. From the present Fallston Charge take Hebron, Knob Creek, and Laurel Hill; and from Belwood Charge take David's Chapel, Kadesh, and St. Peters, and make a charge called Belwood.

2. Take Fallston Church on the Belwood Charge and unite it with Friendship Church on the present Fallston Charge.

3. From the present Fallston Charge take Friendship, and from Belwood Charge take Lawndale, Palm Tree, and Double Shoals, and make a charge called Fallston.

4. Unite Bessemer City former M. E. and M. E., South, churches at Bessemer City; and unite Smyrna M. E. and Concord M. E., South, churches, the charge to be called Bessemer City.

5. From Casar Charge take Big Hill, Palm Tree and Reep's Grove; and from South Fork Circuit take Zion; and from the present Fallston Charge take Macedonia, and make a charge called Vale. Discontinue Ledford's Grove on the Casar Charge.

6. Take New Home from Casar Circuit and add to Cleveland Circuit; and from Cleveland Circuit take Lawndale and add to Fallston.

7. From Cramerton take South Point and add to Lowell Circuit.

8. From Crouse Circuit take Laboratory and add to Lincoln-Bess Chapel.

9. Take McAdenville from Lowell Circuit, Bessemer M. P. Church from Shelby-Caroleen, and Mt. Olivet from Bessemer Circuit and make a charge called McAdenville.

10. Absorb Shelby-Caroleen Charge by adding Caroleen to Marion District, Shelby Church to Lafayette Street, and Bessemer to McAdenville.

11. To Stanley add Trinity Church (new).

12. Take Penley's Chapel M. E. Church from Bessemer Circuit and add to Cherryville Circuit.

Greensboro District:

1. Take Mitchell's Grove from Guilford Circuit and attach to Moriah.

High Point District:

1. Detach Pisgah from Asheboro Circuit and attach to Why Not Charge.

2. Attach Fairview Church to Denton Central Charge.

3. Detach Mt. Zion, Mt. Shepherd, and Tabernacle Churches from Randolph-Mt. Vernon Charge; and Pleasant Grove, Cid, and Clarksbury Churches from Denton, First, Charge, and form a new charge to be known as West Randolph.

4. Attach Mountain View Church to West Randolph Charge.

5. Delete the word "Randolph" from Randolph-Mt. Vernon Charge, and form Mt. Vernon Charge from the following churches: Mt. Vernon, Mt. Gilead, Mt. Pleasant, Ebenezer.

6. Constitute a new charge to be known as Hillsboro, composed of Hillsboro Church.

7. Attach John Wesley Church to Richland Charge.

Marion District:

1. Linville Falls: Transfer membership of Johnson's Chapel at Altamont, thereby discontinuing Johnson's Chapel. Transfer North Catawba to Concord, thereby absorbing the North Catawba Church.





6. WHEREAS, the law of the church, as set forth in the Discipline of 1940, makes it mandatory, with no alternative, that the apportionment for Conference claimants be placed by each pastoral charge, and pro rated with collections, for pastors, District Superintendents, and Bishops; and, WHEREAS, the Discipline recommends that the "Annuity Rate" be established at not less than one per cent of the average salary in each Conference, and since the average salary in this Conference is approximately \$1,900.00 according to the provisions set forth for calculating same in the Discipline, The Commission on World Service and Finance recommends for adoption by this Annual Conference:

(1) That an amount equal to $.08\frac{3}{4}\%$ of the pastor's salary be assessed to each pastoral charge for the Conference Claimants Fund.

(2) That this Annual Conference instruct the Conference Claimants Committee to reserve and apportion so much as is deemed necessary each year, an amount equal to 5% of the total collected, for necessitous and emergency cases, where years of service do not provide decent support when added to any private income of resources.

(3) That 5% of the total collected each year be set aside during the quadrennium now beginning in order to accumulate a reserve fund.

(4) That after these two deductions are made, that the remainder of all collections, and incomes from publishing house, endowment, and any other sources, be paid to superannuates, their widows, and dependents, in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline, and solely on a basis of years of service in the effective ministry.

(5) That where years of service in the effective ministry exceeds forty years, that the "Annuity Rate" thereafter for each year of service shall be reduced by one-half, and that when the "Annuity Rate," the amount from the Duke Fund, and the General Fund bring the total to a Conference claimant to \$1,000 a year, then the "Annuity Rate" shall not apply so as to increase the amount beyond \$1,000; and \$1,000 shall constitute the total pension available to any claimant and that 70%, the amount fixed by the Discipline, shall be the maximum paid to or received from Conference Claimant Funds by any widow of a deceased minister, but that up to a \$1,000 Annuity for retired ministers and 70% thereof for widows of retired ministers the "Annuity Rate" as defined by the Discipline shall be in full force and effect.

7. An amount equal to $.02\frac{1}{4}\%$ of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the Episcopal Fund (assessment, \$13,563.00).

8. That an amount equal to 9% of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the support of the District Superintendents.

9. We recommend the election as Conference Treasurer, Mr. E. O. Cole, at a salary of \$1,000.00.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

CHURCH EXTENSION

The Section of Church Extension of the Board of Missions and Church Extension commends the pastors and congregations of our Conference who have paid off debts on churches and parsonages during the past year. We rejoice to see that many new enterprises are being promoted, and we are in sympathy with all these projects.

We desire, however, to call attention to the fact that the income of our Section is so limited as to be by no means adequate for aiding all who come to us. Our Section has been perplexed and embarrassed at this meeting by the fact that we have been besieged by a number of applications unequalled by any previous record, applications asking of us a total of donations amounting to more than three times the sum of money at our disposal. We deplore the apparent belief that ours is a committee so rich in funds. Obviously we cannot grant all these requests. We feel that a congregation should not ask aid of us except in emergency, and we recommend that wherever possible, the askings be for loans instead of for donations.

We desire to urge the pastors who seek our aid for parsonages or churches to see to it that the deeds to the property concerned be written so as to contain the "trust clause" as required by paragraph 777 of the Discipline. Where this clause is not contained in the deeds to the property our section is prohibited from giving assistance. Furthermore, we cannot consider applications that are incomplete.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF EDUCATION

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO THE WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE CONCERNING THE AFFAIRS OF RUTHERFORD COLLEGE

At the last session of the Western North Carolina Conference, held in Greensboro, the Board of Education appointed Honorable D. E. Henderson, of Charlotte, and Honorable Charles A. Jonas, of Lincolnton, to serve as Commissioners to study and make recommendations concerning the affairs of Rutherford College. After a year of study and investigation, and after four meetings held as follows: November 1, 1939, at the office of D. E. Henderson in Charlotte, attended by Dr. W. A. Stanbury, Chairman of the Board of Education; Mr. H. A. Dunham, Treasurer of the Board of Education; Mr. George F. Ivey, Treasurer of Rutherford College; Dr. C. C. Weaver, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Rutherford College; Carl H. King, Executive Secretary of the Board of Education; and D. E. Henderson, Commissioner appointed by the Conference Board of Education; September 18, 1940, in Efrid's Dining Room, Charlotte, attended by Dr. W. A. Stanbury, Mr. George F. Ivey, Rev. H. C. Sprinkle, Sr., Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Brevard College; Rev. C. M. Pickens, Dr. C. C. Weaver, Carl H. King, Mr. D. E. Henderson, Rev. J. G. Huggin, Jr., Secretary of the Board of Education; and Rev. J. Elwood Carroll, member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Education; September 21, 1940, in the Ivey Dining Room, Charlotte, attended by Mr. George F. Ivey, Rev. H. C. Sprinkle, Sr., Rev. C. M. Pickens, Dr. C. C. Weaver, Carl H. King, D. E. Henderson, and Dr. E. J. Coltrane, President of Brevard College; and October 8, 1940, at Mr. D. E. Henderson's office in Charlotte, attended by Mr. George F. Ivey, Rev. H. C. Sprinkle, Sr., Rev. C. M. Pickens, Dr. C. C. Weaver, Rev. Carl H. King, and Mr. D. E. Henderson—the Board of Education makes the following recommendations based on the report of D. E. Henderson and Charles A. Jonas, Commissioners:

1. That the Duke Endowment, amounting to approximately \$53,000.00, in favor of Rutherford College, be transferred for the use and benefit of Brevard College, Inc., at Brevard, N. C., as an endowment, since the educational program formerly carried on by Rutherford College is now being carried on by Brevard College, under the supervision and direction of this Conference, but that the net income from said endowment be paid over to the Trustees of Rutherford College to assist in the liquidation of the said college until such time as the Western North Carolina Conference shall take further action with regard to same.

2. That the Higgins Fund and property belonging to said fund be transferred from Rutherford College to Brevard College, Inc., as an endowment for the use and benefit of Brevard College, but that one-half of the net income from said fund be paid over to the Trustees of Rutherford College to assist in the liquidation of said college until the further action of the Western North Carolina Conference.

3. That the Centenary Fund and property belonging to the same be transferred to Brevard College, Inc., and be set up as an endowment, the net income from which shall be used for the benefit of Brevard College, until the further action of the Western North Carolina Conference.

4. That the \$10,000.00 of Rutherford College bonds secured by mortgage on the property of said college and now in the hands of the Board of Education remain in the hands of the Board of Education until the further action of the Western North Carolina Conference concerning the same and the E. M. Cole Endowment, but that the income from said bonds be paid over to and used by the Trustees of Rutherford College to assist in the liquidation of said college, until the further action of the Western North Carolina Conference.

5. That the Board of Education, through its representatives, co-operate with the Board of Trustees of Rutherford College in bringing about an adjustment of the indebtedness of Rutherford College, and that the physical property of Rutherford College and its financial affairs be liquidated at the earliest time possible, and within such time as the Western North Carolina Conference may hereafter designate.

6. That all other matters and things pertaining to Rutherford College be subject to the further action of the Western North Carolina Conference.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF EDUCATION

I. THE LOCAL CHURCH SECTION

The past year was one of growth and outstanding achievement on the part of our Conference staff and the fine body of local church leaders. Enrollment in church schools has been increased, the field of leadership training has been expanded, the work with children and young people has attracted the attention of workers in other Conferences and of the leaders of united Methodism. Such an excellent spirit of co-operation has existed among the leaders of the three uniting denominations that the values brought to the united church by these bodies have been conserved, and already substantial progress has been made under the new organization. We are genuinely thankful to our Conference staff for their excellent leadership and tireless service throughout the year.

One of the most noteworthy achievements was in the field of vacation schools. During the summer there were held 467 such schools. This is an increase of 155 over last year. In these schools 24,517 children were enrolled. Since 1931 the number of vacation schools has increased from 27 to 467. Four schools of special interest were: three for Negroes in Elkin, Andrews, and Salisbury, and one for Indians on the Cherokee Reservation.

The youth program was the greatest in the history of the Conference. In addition to the usual camps and assemblies there were the Youth Rallies held in February and March, attended by more than 6,000 young people, the large Epworth Training Conferences, and the work of the Youth Caravan serving in seven communities during the summer. Youth Crusade Week was widely observed.

In the extension work significant results may be seen in the enlarged training program and in the co-operative undertakings with the Colored Methodist Episcopal leaders. Our Extension Secretary has given a new type of leadership and inspiration to circuit charges which should produce fruitful results in future years.

The adult program has not been stressed but the Conference school reached a fine group and the adult offerings to the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise were unusually large.

The results of the training work for the year are the most impressive for the past ten years, with approximately 8,000 persons enrolled in formal training activities, 6,000 of whom completed their work for credit.

The staff workers have done their respective tasks expertly. Each field worker deserves high praise. We especially commend Mrs. John F. Kirk, office Secretary, and Mrs. Earl

Brewer, her assistant, for the efficient manner in which they have performed multitudinous and exacting duties.

II. SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES SECTION

Your Board had before it reports of the Board of Trustees of Duke University, Greensboro College, Brevard College, and High Point College. These reports showed commendable progress during the year, both for quality of work done and in the student body.

At the request of the Trustees of Greensboro College, we recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

"BE IT RESOLVED: That at the request of Greensboro College, Inc., said college is hereby authorized to erect a central heating plant on its campus in Greensboro, North Carolina, in accordance with plans and specifications chosen, or to be chosen by its governing body; and in order to finance the project in whole or in part, said college, through its proper officers, are authorized and permitted to borrow a sum not exceeding \$55,000.00, and to issue bonds for said borrowed money, bearing interest not to exceed three per cent per annum with maturity dates and other terms agreeable to the Trustees of said college; and to secure said bonds by a mortgage deed of trust covering the property of the college as follows:

"The lands of Greensboro College in Greensboro, North Carolina, bounded on the north by West Market Street; on the east by Cedar Street; on the south by McGee Street; and on the west by College Place, and the buildings situated thereon, and the equipment of the college in said buildings located, or so much of said property as may be necessary or requisite for the purposes aforesaid.

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the bonds issued by the authority of this Resolution shall be the obligation of Greensboro College, Inc., but not of this Conference."

DR. W. P. FEW

In the death of President William P. Few of Duke University, the educational and religious life of our Conference, state and section has suffered a loss greater than any of us can now appreciate. He was a man of rare and statesmanlike insight into the problems and realities of education. His leadership, though always modestly given, was eagerly looked to and followed, not only in the region where he lived, but throughout the nation as well.

His name will always be thought of in connection with Duke University. Though his mind and personality were the creative and directing forces in the greatest material development that any institution of learning has experienced in the South, spiritual matters were always first in his thought and concern.

In his distinguished career as teacher in Trinity College beginning in 1896, as President of Trinity College from 1910, and of Duke University from 1924, his qualities of real greatness were revealed as probably nowhere else. From the beginning he was resolved that in the great expansion of buildings, departments, teaching, research and general university facilities, the spiritual and Christian should not be lost sight of, but should be kept at the heart of everything. He lived to see his hope and prayerful ambition at least measurably realized. Especially close to his heart always was the School of Religion, which has already sent so many young men into the ministry of the church.

The Methodist Church in North Carolina, where he was Lay Leader of the North Carolina Conference, in the wider circle of the Southern States, and finally in world-wide Methodism, received the benefit of his untiring service. And yet it was perhaps in his own home church in Durham, in association with his pastor and fellow Christian laymen, and in the interdenominational church, meeting from Sunday to Sunday in the University Chapel, that Dr. Few did his most faithful and beautiful service.

Wise, simple, loyal, good: how poor and worn by use these great words seem! But they describe our noble and now departed friend. God grant we may see his like again—though how rare such men are! And may his service, contribution, and ideals be preserved and cherished always, both in the larger world of education, in Duke University, and in the church to which Dr. Few gave so much in love, leadership, and inspiration.

His body lies in the crypt of the University Chapel; his spirit lives and will forever live in all that is Duke University.

DR. W. M. ALEXANDER

The sudden death of Dr. W. M. Alexander came as a great shock to the entire church. Through his diligent and patient service as Secretary of the Section of Schools and Colleges in the General Board of Education he kept the Pastors' Schools on a high plane and insisted that the educational work carried on by the church must be able to meet the requirements of thorough scholarship and at the same time be genuinely Christian. When the Conferences in North Carolina were undertaking to work out an educational policy Dr. Alexander rendered them invaluable service in arriving at a satisfactory conclusion. Always amiable and brotherly, his advice contributed greatly toward the solution of the many educational problems arising in connection with Methodist union. Though he has departed from our midst, he has left an indelible impression, and we confidently hope that his ideas of Christian education may remain with us permanently and determine the policies of the church for all time.

REPORT—NEW BOARD OF EDUCATION

I. THE LOCAL CHURCH

"The Division of the Local Church shall develop a comprehensive and unified program of Christian Education which shall lead to a knowledge of the Holy Scriptures, the Christian religion, and the Christian Church."—Paragraph 1120, *The Discipline*.

In keeping with the spirit of this statement the Conference Board, the members of our employed staff, and the large corps of local church leaders are setting themselves to the tasks of the coming year with expectant hearts and determined wills. We suggest the following lines of activity:

1. *Evangelism*. We concur with the statement of our Conference Commission on Evangelism that no program of evangelism should be considered merely as a means of adding names to church rolls. We call our church school officers and teachers to the task of leading children, young people, and adults to a deeply-felt experience of Christ which will become the guiding principle of their lives, and which will find expression in loyalty and service to the church and the kingdom of God, without which the purpose of the church school is defeated. Furthermore, we recognize that educational evangelism is not the only method which should be employed in reaching the unchurched people of our communities. It is one of several helpful methods and is most necessary in the program of an effective church today.

2. *The Church School Advance*. It is expected that the union of Methodism will bring definite advances in all areas of the church's program, but advanced positions cannot be maintained without the careful, persistent, consecrated efforts of faithful pastors and workers in local churches. Let it be our purpose to develop a consecrated staff of workers in each church and through their work to bring "every church member into the church school and every member of the church school into active service in the church."

3. *Fourth Sunday Offerings in the Church School*. In past years the offering for the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise on the fourth Sundays has brought considerable revenue into the treasuries of the church. Now, by order of the General Conference (1940 Discipline, paragraph 846) a fourth Sunday offering, now known as World Service Sunday Offering, is to be paid on the General and Conference benevolences. In order that there be no loss of income to the church as a result of the changed channels through which this money goes, we recommend that each local church contribute to the General and Annual Conference benevolences a sum not less than the combined amounts given during the previous year for the General and Annual Conference benevolences and the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise. The staff of the Conference Board of Education will continue to promote World Service Sunday, but the offering is to be sent to E. O. Cole, Conference Treasurer.

4. *Vacation Schools*. The vacation church school offers our best opportunity for increased time for Christian education. We may well set as a goal a vacation school in every church. Miss Elizabeth Oliver will continue to give guidance and leadership to this work.

5. *Church School Rally Day.* This day is the only occasion of the year when a special offering is taken solely for the cause of Christian education in the Conference. The expansion of the program conducted by our Conference staff depends largely upon the income from this source.

6. *Some other specific emphases.* We recommend continued promotion of the following items:

- A. Summer camps and assemblies.
- B. The youth carvans.
- C. Training work.
- D. The use of Methodist literature.
- E. Work with young adults.
- F. Interpretation of opportunities and responsibilities of church school superintendents.
- G. Work with small rural and industrial churches.

We recommend the confirmation of the following members of the staff:

- Carl H. King, Executive Secretary.
- E. D. C. Brewer, Extension Secretary.
- Miss Elizabeth Oliver, Director of Children's Work.
- Mrs. Agnes E. Kirk, Office Secretary and Assistant Director of Youth Work.

II. SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

1. We recommend that Student Recognition Day be observed by each local church, on the Sunday between Christmas and New Year's Day.

2. We recommend that Race Relations Sunday be observed on the second Sunday in February by each local congregation and that a special offering be taken for the support of educational institutions for Negroes, such offering to be sent to Mr. H. A. Dunham, Asheville, Treasurer of the Board of Education, and that Mr. Dunham transfer the entire amount to the proper Treasurer of the General Board.

3. We recommend that Methodist Student Day be observed on the second Sunday in June by each local congregation, and that a special offering be taken for the Student Loan Funds of the Methodist Church, the offering to be sent to Mr. H. A. Dunham, Treasurer of the Board of Education, and that Mr. Dunham transfer the entire amount to the proper Treasurer of the General Board.

4. We recommend that the amount realized on the appropriation for Schools and Colleges by the Commission on World Service and Finance be allocated as follows:

and that the remainder be divided equally among Brevard College, Greensboro College, and High Point College.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Since the liquor interests of the whole country are using the press, radio, motion pictures, and other agencies to make drinking attractive and to increase the consumption of alcoholic beverages, we urge our pastors, members of the official boards, teachers, and church members to expose this vicious propoganda, and to fight the liquor interests with every legitimate method. We specifically recommend:

1. That Temperance Sunday be observed throughout the Conference.
2. That the cause of temperance be presented at each District Conference.
3. That we co-operate with the Temperance Committee of the North Carolina Council of Churches, and the United Dry Forces of North Carolina. We respectfully request our Bishop to appoint a member of the Board of Temperance as an official member of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

4. Since a large number of our young men are being called into military service without the proper safeguard against intemperance, and other social vices, we recommend that the following resolution be forwarded to the President of the United States, the Secretaries of War, Navy, and Division of Aviation:

"We respectfully urge that the military and naval authorities enact such regulations as will prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors in or near all military camps or posts, as was done during the previous World War, so as to adequately safeguard the moral and physical well-being of the men called for service to their country."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

It is the unanimous opinion of the Board of Lay Activities that much progress has been made in Western North Carolina during the past year. We commend the laymen and ministers for the good work that has been done. New churches and parsonages have been built, old debts have been liquidated and a new emphasis has been given to equipping parsonages to make living conditions better for our pastors. We heartily endorse this emphasis.

1. Stewardship is the very heart of our program. In fact, it is the heart of our religious experience. We cannot get away from the fact that this is God's world. He is the giver of every good and perfect gift. We may temporarily hold titles to property but God holds the eternal title. He has, however, made us his co-laborers in the building of a better world. We believe that stewardship is so vital in the program of our church that we suggest:

- a. That more preaching be done on the subject of stewardship.
- b. That courses in stewardship be taught in adult and young people's classes in the local church.
- c. That one of the four meetings of the District Board of Stewards be devoted to a stewardship program.
- d. That an Institute for Stewards be held in each District where a competent person can be secured to conduct it.

2. The benevolences, the adequate support of the ministry and all other financial claims of our church, should be handled through a sound financial system, including:

- a. An every-member canvass in every church in the Conference.
- b. A careful follow-up of all pledges during the year.
- c. The payment of ministers on a monthly basis.
- d. A monthly balancing of the budget.
- e. A goal of at least one-half of the acceptance of benevolences be paid to the Conference Treasurer by the time of the meeting of the District Conference.
- f. A program of information and inspiration before the first Quarterly Conference when the vote is taken on the acceptance of the askings.

3. That each District, through the leadership of the District Superintendent and the District Lay Leader, organize a District League of Stewards with quarterly meetings of the League and through this League emphasize the importance of the office of a Steward in the Methodist Church.

4. That lay speakers be used in congregations, group meetings, and conferences where the pastor cannot be present and needs our help.

5. That Laymen's Day be observed in every church in the Conference.

6. That all the aid possible be given to the Commission on Evangelism.

7. That we pledge unyielding resistance to the liquor traffic in any and all forms and urge a militant program against intemperance. We are convinced that education against intemperance, the support of kindred agencies and a vote cast only for good and honest men for public office can accomplish the goal of a sober nation.

8. That preachers and laymen throw their influence against the tendency of legalized gambling.

9. That an effort be made to get the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* into the home of every Methodist and that an effort be made to get a large number of subscriptions to our General Conference organ.

10. That a renewed effort be made in behalf of world peace.

11. That our Brotherhood be presented to the laity of our Conference and that the laymen be urged to join.

The Board of Lay Activities of the Western North Carolina Conference appreciate the support, co-operation, and sympathy given to the lay leaders of the Conference by a large majority of the District Superintendents, and ask for a continuation of such support. Recognizing the District Superintendent as the key man in the District and recognizing that he has a more intimate knowledge of its needs than any other person, this Board wishes to request each District Superintendent in the Conference to give his full support and guidance to the Laymen's Work, and to assist the District Lay Leader by pointing out specific opportunities for service.

We nominate A. J. Kirby as Conference Lay Leader, and recommend his election.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

I. HOSPITALS AND HOMES FOR RETIRED MINISTERS

The Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital at Elkin, through donations to the Golden Cross, has been enabled to minister during the past Conference year to 270 full charity patients. Surgeons and physicians at this hospital have operated upon 642 patients; and administered help to 993 other patients. In addition, 2,385 patients have been treated in the out-patient department. For this work the Trustees of the Hospital have expended \$71,797.75. The valuation of the Hospital is placed at \$200,000 and carries no indebtedness.

We recommend a continuance of the Golden Cross Society for securing contributions for an enlargement of services to be rendered by the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital. We nominate for your confirmation Rev. L. B. Abernethy, Director of the Conference Golden Cross activities and Superintendent of the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital, at an annual salary of \$1,500 and necessary expenses. We nominate Rev. R. M. Courtney Treasurer of the Golden Cross funds, to serve without salary. We recommend the confirmation of the following Trustees for the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital for a term of three years: R. P. Hanes, Dr. J. L. Doughton, R. A. Doughton, E. G. Click, and Dr. C. C. Weaver.

We nominate for your confirmation Rev. E. O. Cole, to serve without salary, as Director of Homes for Retired Ministers, his activities to center in securing such homes as will be needed and in assisting in any possible way in the use of them.

We ask the authority of the Conference for permission to incorporate the Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Western North Carolina Conference in the event there proves to be any need for such action.

II. HOMES FOR CHILDREN

The Western North Carolina Conference owns and operates through a Board of Trustees a Home for Children at Winston-Salem. In this Home are enrolled 410 boys and girls. Its capital assets amount to \$1,642,776. It carries no indebtedness. With the merging of Methodism seventy-six additional boys and girls now living at the Methodist Protestant Children's Home at High Point have come under the direction and guidance of the Conference, making a total of 486 children and youths who look to our Methodist constituency for an opportunity to make good in life.

Accepting an invitation extended by the Board of Trustees of The Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem, for merging the interests of the Methodist Protestant Children's Home, Inc., at High Point, with The Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem, the Trustees of the Methodist Protestant Children's Home, Inc., at High Point, after careful evaluation, unanimously adopted the following resolutions:

"RESOLVED: That this Board of Trustees of the Methodist Protestant Children's Home, Inc., does adopt the following as its desire for procedure:

"1. That the children in this home, from the North Carolina Conference area, be released at once to the Methodist Orphanage in Raleigh, N. C.

"2. That the Children's Home at Winston-Salem agree to accept transference of the other children as fast as it can arrange to care for them, and undertake to complete transference by June 1, 1941.

"3. That this Home continue to operate as now till June 1, 1941, the support for the same coming from the allocation of funds by the Conference as the needs shall be relative to numbers kept here during the months while transference is carried out, and that the management of the Home be in accordance with Conference approval.

"4. That this Board of Trustees sell that parcel of land lying south of the High Point-Greensboro highway and bordering said highway, this tract of

land now being free of any and all encumbrance, and give net proceeds from such sale to the Children's Home at Winston-Salem.

"5. That, in view of the mortgage now on the rest of our property as an indenture underwriting a Bond Issue—which mortgage doubtless will not be liquidated for some years—and recognizing the obligation of the former Methodist Protestant people to their interests as vested in the college, and further realization of the fact that our property assets here in a large measure have been made possible by the loyalty and generous attitude of the citizens of High Point, this Board therefore deed the remaining land which we possess to the Trustees of High Point College, Inc., subject to First Mortgage Bonded indebtedness and to the indebtedness of the Board of Education of the Methodist Protestant Church in North Carolina, Inc. (as of the date on which said Board of Education did transfer title to this Board) together with all personal property of whatsoever kind, with the following stipulations:

- "a. That all children from the Winston-Salem and Raleigh Homes matriculating at High Point College shall be given free tuition;
- "b. That all young men from the Winston-Salem Home be given special consideration for self-help jobs on the farm and at the dairy, thus enabling them to earn their room, board, and matriculation fees, which would make the cost of college training practically free;
- "c. That, since the tract of land lying east of the Deep River Road and north of the High Point-Greensboro highway was acquired and the Penny Brothers Building erected thereon for the care of orphan boys, this property shall be kept intact with the Penny Brothers Building to be used always under its name to house these young men mentioned in the above paragraph, and other needy, worthy and ambitious boys as may be aided in securing an education at High Point College through jobs at the dairy and on the farm;
- "d. That the administration building be used in some way in connection with the educational program of the college as may now exist or hereafter may be planned.
- "e. That the Trustees of the college, when the mortgage holder is willing to give release to portions of the property, deed to the Trustees of the Winston-Salem Home, if they desire to accept same, that parcel of land lying north of and bordering the East Lexington Avenue, beginning at a point 50 feet east of the Superintendent's House and extending to the west boundary of the property and extending north from said avenue to a depth of 200 feet, subject to the street assessment thereon.

"6. Any and all property coming into the hands of this Board of Trustees by bequest or otherwise after the merger is effected is to be given to the Children's Home at Winston-Salem, also any residue from any endowment.

"RESOLVED: That the transfer of properties as stated in sections 4 and 5 be made in October and after the adjustment of the Conference."

The Board of Trustees of The Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem, in their meeting held September 19, 1940, unanimously accepted these resolutions, with the exception that July 1, 1941, was substituted for June 1, 1941, in paragraphs 2 and 3, which changes were in turn accepted by the High Point Children's Home authorities; with the further exception that the Board of Trustees of The Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem, declined the option on the East Lexington Avenue, High Point, property because of the fact that the street assessments against this property made it worthless to them.

Pursuant to the action of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Protestant Children's Home, Inc., at High Point, the Board of Trustees of The Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem, in their meeting of September 19, 1940, adopted the following resolution to be submitted to the Western North Carolina Conference for approval:

"The Board of Trustees of The Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem, recommends to the approaching sessions of the Western North Carolina Conference that a continuance of the ten per cent apportionment of the pastors' salary for the current year be levied on all charges in the Western North Carolina Conference and in addition that the fifth Sunday offerings be continued as a free will offering from the church schools in the Conference, the apportionments and offerings to be applied to the maintenance of the Children's Home at Winston-Salem, with a just and fair proportion being applied to the Children's Home at High Point until such time as a complete merger is consummated.

"The Board further recommends that the ten per cent apportionment and all fifth Sunday offerings from all charges and churches in the Western North Carolina Conference, together with such other contributions as may be made, be remitted to the Treasurer of the Children's Home at Winston-Salem; that the financial responsibility for the support of the children remaining at High Point Children's Home until July 1, 1941, be recognized by The Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem; and that Dr. A. G. Dixon be designated Superintendent of the High Point institution until July 1, 1941, subject to the direction and control of the Board of Trustees of The Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem."

Acting within the authority granted them through their charters, the Boards of Trustees of the two involved Children's Homes have already begun the process of merging the two institutions. All the children enrolled in the High Point Children's Home from within the boundaries of the North Carolina Conference, twelve in number, have been transferred to the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh, leaving ninety-seven children at the High Point Children's Home who were admitted from within the boundaries of the Western North Carolina Conference. Twenty-one of these children, all that could be accommodated, have been transferred to the Winston-Salem Children's Home, leaving seventy-six at the High Point Children's Home. It is expected that some twenty or more of the children and youths can be satisfactorily located before July 1, 1941, thus leaving around fifty-five children to then be transferred to the Children's Home at Winston-Salem.

Pending the time of complete merger, satisfactory arrangements have been entered into by the Superintendents of the two involved Homes for administering all matters connected with the welfare of all concerned.

The Board recommends the appointment of Dr. A. G. Dixon to the Superintendency of the High Point Children's Home at a salary of \$1,800 per year and living expenses, this appropriation to include payment for the services rendered by his good wife.

The following Trustees of The Methodist Protestant Children's Home, Inc., at High Point, are submitted for confirmation, these Trustees being needed to properly transfer and liquidate the property of The Methodist Protestant Children's Home, Inc.: J. M. Millikan, Dr. J. E. Pritchard, Dr. R. M. Andrews, George T. Penny, J. C. Penny, J. W. Montgomery, V. W. Idol, Mrs. W. C. Hammer, J. D. Ross, J. Norman Wills, Harry B. Finch, Lonnie McPherson, Mrs. H. C. Nicholson, Mrs. R. M. Cox, Mrs. A. G. Dixon, Dr. S. W. Taylor, Bishop J. C. Broomfield, and Dr. W. S. Sharp.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

We, your Commission on Evangelism, believe that in the midst of world-wide confusion and despair, we, as representatives of a Gospel of Redemption, have the answer to the world's deepest need.

However much we would look with sympathy upon the nations of the world, and however much we would like to commend ourselves, or to "compare ourselves with ourselves," the fact remains that such a collapse as the world now faces has been preceded by a moral and spiritual collapse. In our efforts to arrive materially and economically, we have missed our way spiritually, and "the way, the truth, and the life," taught us by the Man of Galilee as our only way to God, has been too often neglected.

We believed that the religion of Jesus Christ has something to say to those who will listen at such a time as this. If this word is to be said, it must be spoken by those who have given themselves to Jesus Christ and to His Church. It must be said with renewed conviction and power. Without compromise we must experience, practice, and teach that quality of faith in the Son of God upon which the Church of Jesus Christ was established, and "against which the gates of hell shall not prevail."

This Church of Jesus Christ should again lead people to ask, "What must I do to be saved?" Then it will dawn upon us that we, through Christ, have the only answer to this question that will satisfy. If we fail them, to whom will they go?

We, therefore, offer for your consideration and adoption the following:

1. That we give ourselves to the holy task of calling our people to the re-dedication of their own lives to Christ and His Church, claiming the promise of God to His people: "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."

2. That we concern ourselves about evangelism as an experience of God in the heart, rather than a method by which people are enrolled upon our church registers. We recommend all methods by which people are led into a definite acceptance of Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

3. We urge that wherever and whenever possible, district-wide and city-wide simultaneous evangelistic services be held.

4. That we no longer allow ourselves to close the doors to the Kingdom of God before or after any regular scheduled meetings. But rather do we recommend that we give ourselves to the creation and the cultivation of an atmosphere in which it will be the normal experience for people to find God and to commune with Him on any day of the year.

5. The members of the Commission offer their services for representation at the District Missionary Institutes and the District Conferences that we may encourage our people in this, our holy task.

6. That the Secretary be authorized to solicit and accept suitable advertising material for the Journal.

7. That the Secretary be given the sum of \$300.00 for his services as Secretary and for the editing of the Journal.

We verified Receipts and Disbursements with statement from Bank of Cornelius; and checked notes, stocks and bonds with securities found in safety deposit box of the Treasurer, with the exception of the notes in the hands of the Southern Real Estate and Insurance Co.

GENERAL COMMENT

During the period under review, five \$1,000.00 bonds of Elizabeth City were purchased for \$4,837.78; one hundred shares of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. for \$16,879.27; and twenty shares of the Statesville Cotton Mills Co. for \$2,039.00; \$6,200.00 was invested in new loans, secured by real estate mortgages, and \$3,203.75 was collected on old notes.

The amount and the date to which interest has been paid on the various notes is shown in Schedule No. 1. No interest has been paid on the last two notes for several years, but the notes are carried at face value until final settlement is made.

COMMITTEE ON OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

The era of transition which has characterized Methodist Union is coming to an end. The organisms through which the impact of United Methodism's spirit and power is to be made manifest have come into being. It now remains for our laymen and ministers to gear the machinery to the task and to move out with diligence, confidence and devotion. Perhaps in the Providence of Almighty God Methodism came into the world for just such a tragic hour—a world torn by conflict and threatened with a new avalanche of paganism—and, at the threshold, a new Methodism re clothed and ready.

The new life of which all of us are aware must be harnessed for constructive tasks, must be guided by definite objectives and policies. The local church—its minister, its laymen, its program—is the very heart of the problem. That is an observation which is obvious enough and one which too many of us are willing to grant and unwilling to do anything about. The local church must become aware of the urgency of this hour and its possibilities. In the local church, Methodism fails or succeeds. Through the local church, Methodism delivers its impact upon the world. Although your Committee on Objectives and Policy would not set forth a program for the local church, we dare set before it some very practical objectives, all of which are within the realm of possibility when approached with zeal and faith.

1. EVANGELISM

Evangelism is the first task of the living church. In a day when we are victimized by the attitude, "Well, it will come out alright somehow," let us not be lulled into an easy complacency. In a day when individuality is being lost in a mass of regimented life, let us not lose sight of Jesus' estimate of the worth of the individual. Let us renew our faith in the power of the Cross to bring men into the transforming experience of redeeming love, and in the power of transformed men to bring about a new society which embodies God's Fatherhood and man's brotherhood in process of realization.

All that is general—but, break it up into practical ways for getting our evangelistic task done, and one faces among other things:

- a. Evangelistic preaching for a verdict.
- b. Organized and directed lay evangelism.
- c. Personal evangelism—seeking out individuals here and there, inside and outside the church—for prayer and consultation.
- d. Set periods for meditation and prayer—so necessary to keeping one's heart and mind sensitive to God's leading.
- e. A tireless expansion of our teaching program which involves increased enrollments, better qualified teachers, modern physical equipment, and a spiritual end in all of the educational process.
- f. A recognition of the importance of youth in the church. They constitute the material out of which the church of tomorrow is built.

2. WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Methodism owes many of its outstanding achievements to the faithful, untiring and sacrificial service rendered by its women. The new organization for women is very fittingly called *The Woman's Society of Christian Service*, in recognition of the scope and spirit of its activities. Sufficient time has already elapsed for every pastor to have a society formed in each church, and where such a society has not been formed, your Committee insists that the pastor take the necessary steps to lead the women of such church into this larger field of usefulness. In addition, let every minister be alert to help preserve the gains already made and to help direct the society through these formative stages of growth.

3. BENEVOLENCES

Let no man interpret our plan of voluntary acceptance of the benevolences to mean that the support of the benevolences is optional. It is a matter of high privilege and

inescapable responsibility, and we must translate our love of Christ and our brotherly affection into a more costly sharing of our material possessions.

Last year our Conference accepted \$69,000 less than our proportionate share needed for the legitimate program of our church—\$69,000 less than we were asked to accept. The gap between the askings and the acceptances must be closed. There is no significant forward movement possible in our church until we lift the level of our benevolent giving. Our benevolences will suffer until we make the causes represented in them so alive that churches now accepting far less than the askings will steadily increase their support. Then, too, conspicuous examples of liberality are contagious. Let us exercise great care just here. We must understand our financial set-up and our people must understand it. An informed constituency responds intelligently and generously. Let every church make a real effort to accept the asking and, where that is impossible at present, let the church make reasonable advances until the day shall come when acceptance of the askings in full will be the rule instead of the exception in our Conference.

4. CHURCH DEBTS

During recent years church debts have been a source of embarrassment to many congregations. While the Committee is not ungrateful for every effort to provide comfortable parsonages and adequate and inspiring houses of worship, it must point out that burdensome debts frequently undermine morale and make impossible an adequate and comprehensive church program.

Within the last several years many of our churches—some of them hopelessly in debt, so considered—have brought faith, determination and courage to the task and have triumphed gloriously. Unhindered and unhindered, these churches now take their places in the ranks of a marching and militant Methodism.

Is it too much for this Committee to ask that thought and effort be given to the problem of liquidating the indebtedness on every Methodist Church in this Conference? During these days just before the transition from an economy of plenty to one of scarcity, let every church gird itself and venture forth in conquest of its debt. It can be done. It must be done. It will be done.

And just this word: When churches need to undertake a building program let them do so to the glory of God. But, brethren, let them be scrupulously careful to observe the Disciplinary requirements, thereby taking every precaution necessary to safeguard the vital interests of our Methodism and our people.

5. REPORTS OF OTHER COMMISSIONS AND COMMITTEES

We approve all the reports submitted by the Commissions and Committees to the Annual Conference, and recommend to our clerical members that they make a thorough study of these reports are presented in the Journal. These reports in large measure represent the aims and objectives of our church for the quadrennium, and will be of invaluable help to the pastor and the officials in formulating an intelligent and aggressive program for the local church.

6. OTHER INTERESTS

Alongside of the tasks to which the foregoing objectives call us, we would place other interests of our church which are equally deserving. In these days when much of what we are offered to read is what one might expect from an explosion in a garbage can, it is necessary that we keep before our people the fact there is still a direct line between character and the library table. Among many magazines and periodicals that we might recommend, all of which are worthy of a place in a Christian home, we mention our *N. C. Christian Advocate*, the *Upper Room*, the new *Christian Advocate*, and the *World Outlook*. We insist that our people and ministers make their circulation a point of conscience and reserve for their presentation a scheduled date on the calendar of the church.

With a sense of justifiable pride, your Committee lifts up the healing ministry of our church—and too few of our churches have had a part in it. Could we not for once—even for a quadrennium—every church of us, have a part in bringing healing to sick bodies through the Golden Cross enrollment?

No institution of our Methodism is rendering a more needed ministry than our orphanage. As a whole, the work it does and the cause it represents appeals to our hearts. And yet, your Committee is insistent that every church in our Conference have the opportunity of mothering and fathering these boys and girls of ours.

These objectives your Committee has dared to hold up are not new. From time to time we have pointed here and there through resolutions and recommendations—and with avail. But the time is now when all of us need urgently to do something about all of them. They are brought to you for you to do something about. You will adopt them, no doubt, but that is not enough. For then you may kill them if you desire and bury them in the dry ink of the printed age. And—if you want to—yonder removed from the work of committees and the rush of Conference—if you want to—yonder in distant dell or in clanging cities you may make them living realities in the minds and hearts of men and women. Courage will be needed, and hope—patience and love—prayer and faith—and with all a deal of honest work. Facing the dawn of Methodism's new day we move out undergirded by a great faith and overarched by a great purpose. In the evening glow of setting sun, please God, let there be silhouetted against every church, the reward of a task well done.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION

As a result of church union, the past year has been a period of readjustments by North Carolina Methodists. With remarkable promptness the Methodist Episcopal people transferred their loyalty and support to the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*. And the Methodist Protestant people led in a movement to consolidate the *Methodist Protestant Herald* and the *North Carolina Advocate*. Their plan for union of the two papers was accepted by the management of this paper, and the people at once joined gladly and heartily in the support of one paper.

Your Board with pleasure announces that all North Carolina Methodists are now united upon one paper and with equal interest and enthusiasm have joined in the support of one *Advocate*. This union has not only enlarged the constituency of the paper but also has increased the support thereof. This last year has been one of the best in the history of the work of this Board of Publication. And the future is full of promise. What money we are able to make goes into the *Advocate*. If we had a larger income, we could make a bigger and better paper.

This coming year we are committed to furnish special help to the women of the church in promoting the promising work of the Women's Societies of Christian Service in both North Carolina Conferences. To this end we expect to enlist the women of all our churches in a co-operative effort for extending the circulation of the *Advocate*. In that way we can be of larger service in the work of the churches. Two full pages, finely edited, devoted each week to the Woman's work, should prove of inestimable value in every church and community.

With the co-operation of the District Superintendents and the District Lay Leaders we could render a larger service in the work of our village and country churches. Mr. W. A. McGirt, Lay Leader of the Wilmington District, has pointed the way to help circulate the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* in weak country churches. Other districts might follow the example of the Wilmingtonian in the great and promising field of the country church.

The plan adopted last year to increase the circulation of the *Advocate* met with gratifying success and this Board has decided to continue a similar plan for the ensuing year.

The Auditor's report shows that the net profit this year from operations is \$762.07. Income from rental property, \$386.11. Net profit for the year, \$1,148.18. The net results are approximately the same as for last year.

Rev. M. T. Plyler and Rev. A. W. Plyler were re-elected Editors and Business Managers of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*.

The term of office of the following members of the Board expire with the current year:

Rev. H. C. Smith, representing the North Carolina Conference.

Thomas C. Hoyle, representing the Western North Carolina Conference.

These men were nominated by the Board to succeed themselves.

We request that this Conference elect Thomas C. Hoyle as member of the Methodist Board of Publication for a period of five years.

It is with deep sorrow that we record the death on the morning of October 16, 1940, of Dr. William Preston Few, the Chairman of this Board. For many years he had been one of the most useful and devoted members of the Board. He was never too busy to give his services for the advancement of our publishing interests. We shall sorely miss him.

REPORT OF WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION

Through the Wesley Foundation the two Annual Conferences in North Carolina are sponsoring the church life of 1,450 Methodist students at Chapel Hill and at Greensboro, where 650 of these students attend the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. There are several other state colleges where assistance is greatly needed. It is devoutly hoped that the near future will bring resources enabling proper attention to be given to every Methodist student who attends a state school. There are about 3,000 young people from our Methodist homes in these schools in North Carolina. There is no more promising field for intensive Christian cultivation.

The work at College Place Church for W. C., U. N. C., students may be reported as follows: Miss H. Louise Panigot, from Vanderbilt University, is the new Wesley Foundation Director; 345 affiliate members are enrolled; Christian instruction is given in Sunday classes and dormitory Bible classes; the spiritual life is cultivated through the Sunday worship services and through distribution of the *Upper Room*; Christian service is emphasized through the raising of a considerable student financial budget, and through charitable visitation in homes and institutions of need; Christian fellowship abounds in frequent social features, especially for new students, and through happy visits in local homes on the invitation of College Place families.

The report from Chapel Hill is encouraging. Without the service of a paid director, the program is in the hands of a Council of a dozen very capable students. The pastor accepts much of the administrative responsibility. There is a student Bible class in the Church School, a Vesper Fellowship hour, and the students participate definitely in the worship services of the church as ushers, members of the choir, and workers in the Church School. Informal social fellowship is frequently enjoyed in the parlors of the church, and occasionally a more formal dinner or banquet is given. Students lead in some features of community social service.

There has been a decided improvement in the type of program offered, and a gratifying increase in the number of students participating, particularly in the Sunday morning worship service.

The twenty-second session of the North Carolina Pastors' School was held concurrently with the session of the Rural Church Institute at Duke University, June 3-8. Nine credit and three non-credit courses were offered. The number of credit students was 169. Those auditing classes and not receiving credit were 227.

In the daily schedule in addition to the classes there were two general assembly periods, a morning worship, and two forum discussions. All of these were well attended. The chief public speakers were Bishop Purcell, Bishop Peele, Bishop Straughn, Dr. Robert E. Speer, and Dr. L. C. Wright.

CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD MINUTES

The Western North Carolina Conference Brotherhood met in thirty-second annual session in Wesley Memorial Methodist Church, High Point, October 23, 1940, at 4:30 p. m., with the President, H. G. Allen, in the chair. The hymn, "Blest Be the Tie," was sung, and L. D. Thompson led in prayer.

The Secretary read the minutes of Executive Committee meetings in Greensboro, October 23, 1939; Charlotte, November 16, 1939; and Charlotte, September 17, 1940. The Secretary read his report as follows: "Seven brethren have died during the year: Brothers A. S. Raper, J. T. Ratledge, J. H. West, T. J. Rogers, W. A. Newell, A. H. Whisner, and J. M. Downum. Payments have been made to each of the beneficiaries, and sufficient funds are now in hand to complete the payment of the \$1,200.00 benefit to each. All except 55 eligible preachers have joined the Brotherhood. We now have approximately 425 clerical members." The report was accepted.

The President introduced W. A. Stanbury who delivered a most inspiring address on "Why a Preacher Should Belong to the Brotherhood."

The following Nominating Committee was appointed: L. D. Thompson, R. F. Huneycutt, H. C. Sprinkle, Jr., J. E. Carroll, and Reid Wall.

The Nominating Committee named the following officers: President, H. G. Allen; Vice-President, R. C. Goforth; Secretary-Treasurer, C. C. Herbert, Jr.; Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, F. C. Smathers; Director Laymen's Division, E. L. Jones; members of Execu-

tive Committee—H. G. Allen, R. C. Goforth, Paul Hardin, Jr., C. C. Herbert, Jr., L. E. Mabrey, W. J. Plint, and C. C. Weaver. The report of the Nominating Committee was adopted and these officers elected.

On motion, Dr. Stanbury was requested to have his address published in the *Advocate*. Dr. Stanbury was also asked to present the Brotherhood to the Conference. Various members joined in a general discussion of the merits of the Brotherhood, and the meeting adjourned with a verse of "Blest Be the Tie" and prayer by O. E. Croy.

Memoirs

James Monroe Downum

I would like to give you a few personal glimpses that you may have some intimation of the kind, faithful, and courageous spirit of one of whom it might be said,

“His life was gentle, and the elements so mixed in him
That nature might stand up and say to all the world
This was a man.”

My beloved friend, James Monroe Downum, was born shortly after the middle of the nineteenth century and gave the world a heroic life of unstinted service and amazing devotion for more than four score years. He attended Old Trinity College, and for four years made an average of 98½, a scholastic record that probably will never be excelled in the life of Duke University. He entered the North Carolina Conference in 1885 and performed notable work in the charges which he served in the next twenty-four years.

Then in 1909 he became a member of the faculty of the Appalachian Training School at Boone. It was here that I knew him and had the privilege of serving as his pastor for nearly four years. Mr. Downum was connected with the college for thirty-one years as teacher and registrar. For a great number of years he was chaplain of the college. During the early years of his service he did almost weekly preaching somewhere in the county. He watched the school grow and assisted in her growth and development from an enrollment of about one hundred to a great teachers' college of a thousand students.

When he chose to devote himself to the teaching profession he gave himself to this great work with a zeal and faithfulness which characterized him in every endeavor throughout life. Many a young man and young woman through the years could have said with reverence, “Thou art a teacher come from God.”

He had identified himself so closely with the college and the town of Boone that the place is not the same without him. I can see him walking the street now as of old, with a smile and a friendly word and a handclasp for every one. When the coldest Sunday comes, and the North wind blows the snow in bitter gusts around the Methodist Church, we still look to see the form of James Monroe Downum, braced against the storm, coming up from the college to God's house that he helped build and loved so well.

Mr. Downum has achieved a two-fold immortality. He dwells in a noble tenement not made of clay, and he lives on in the hearts and lives of thousands of men and women who were his students and now rise up and call him blessed.

Faithful and courageous soldier of the Cross, well done. Many, many times you inspired us to look up and take new courage and begin again.

“He who would valiant be
'Gainst all disaster
Let him with constancy
Follow the Master.
There's no discouragement
Will make him once relent
His first arrived intent
To be a pilgrim.

“Since, Lord, thou dost defend
Us with thy spirit,
We know we at the end
Will life inherit.
Then fancies flee away!
I'll fear not what men say,
I'll labor night and day
To be a pilgrim.”

William A. Newell

Reverend William A. Newell was born in Cabarrus County on the 24th day of April, 1874. His acquaintance with the Methodist ministry began in infancy, because every preacher coming into the vicinity of Boger's Chapel enjoyed the hospitality of the Newell home. His mother was a woman of amiable disposition and strong faith and character, and his father, W. G. Newell, was an outstanding citizen, who labored constantly for the welfare of his community and served his church as a faithful steward all his mature life.

The member of the household who came to be known as "Mose" was a precocious child, learning to read at home before he was old enough to enter school. After attending the public schools of his county and enjoying a year of tuition under Reverend J. P. Kennedy at Georgeville, he entered North Carolina College at Mt. Pleasant, where he completed two years of college work and taught a public school for four months all in one year. After a year of study in Rutherford College he was graduated from that institution as a member of the class of 1896.

During the year following his graduation, Brother Newell was a traveling salesman, and it was while carrying on his work in this capacity that his interest was turned toward the field of education. Entering the community around Morgan's Mill in Union County he was attracted by the vast stretches of virgin forest, and the citizens of the section induced him to undertake the building of Morgan Academy. He labored with heart and brain in erecting the buildings and establishing the school, and although he remained less than two years, "people still remember him as the man who did more for that community than any other person who ever lived in it." He continued to teach during the next two or three years, and his concern for education remained with him as long as he lived.

Brother Newell received license to preach in 1902, and entered the Conference at High Point in 1903. His first appointment was Elk Park, where he remained for four years, working faithfully as a preacher and as a citizen of the community. In 1906 he was sent to the Tryon-Saluda Charge for another quadrennium of faithful ministry and community service. At Tryon he met Miss Bertha Payne, whom he soon persuaded to become his wife. Of kindred heart and mind, this couple worked together with perfect mutual understanding for the church and for a good world and built a Christian home as nearly ideal as can be hoped for on this earth.

The next appointment was Haywood Street, Asheville. During his third year here, 1913, Brother Newell, at the request of the Bishop and Presiding Elder, gave two days of each week to supervision of work at Weaverville College, and in September of this year he consented to give up his pastorate and become President of the college. After pouring all his energy of mind and body into this institution for over two years, he resigned in February, 1916, expecting to remain without a regular appointment until Conference. However, when the pastor of Hot Springs-Marshall was compelled to give up his work on account of ill health, he was pressed into serving that charge until Conference.

Brother Newell's last pastorate was peculiarly happy. After many years of heavy work, he found the less complicated life of this lovely mountain city, with its cultured people and loyal church members, bringing relief to tired nerves and overtaxed mind and body. He had spent two happy years here and was well into the third, respected, revered, and loved by his congregation and the whole community, when his body, always frail and driven with too great energy, became critically affected, and he had to go to a hospital. After a few days of illness, he passed quietly and triumphantly on the 26th day of February, 1940, to his eternal home. The funeral service was conducted at First Church, Morganton, on February 28, by Reverend J. C. Cornett, and the service at the grave in the church yard of Boger's Chapel was conducted by Bishop Clare Purcell, assisted by Reverend Earl Edwards, the pastor, in the afternoon of the same day.

William A. Newell was venturesome, self-reliant, inventive, original, aggressive and progressive in thought and action. He was a man of strong impulses, and he himself declared that it was only through Divine grace that he was able to control and subdue his natural inclinations. He had a warm heart and a clear head. He preached the great and vital truths of religion as he saw them with his mind and as he felt them in his heart. He loved God, and he loved his fellowman. He was honest, sincere, humble, and brotherly. Without affectation, he was so great that he could afford to be natural. He was a preacher

of majestic faith, being at his best when presenting the experienced realities of the Christian life and the assurances of a heavenly world. He was a faithful pastor when in charge of a congregation, and as a Presiding Elder he cared for the welfare of his preachers more solicitously than for his own. He tasted life in all its joy and sorrow, its comedy and tragedy, and lived it to the full. He finished his course with joy.

Albert Sidney Raper

Albert Sidney Raper, son of Elisha and Paulina Tesh Raper, was born in Davidson County, December 24th, 1868, near Mt. Olivet Methodist Church. His was truly a Christian home, the holy influence of which made him and marked him as a man of God.

At the age of seven, under the powerful ministry of the Rev. Charles Phillips, the little boy felt his heart moved toward the ministry. Eight years later, he became a happy Christian and joined Mt. Olivet Church.

He attended public schools in Davidson County, and went to Yadkin and Trinity College, receiving a liberal education and preparation for his life work. He was licensed to preach in 1890, and in 1894 Bishop Wilson gave him an appointment to the Hot Springs Charge as supply pastor. The next year he taught school, in his home community, at Enterprise Academy. In June, 1897, upon the death of Brother J. W. Roberts, he was appointed to Bessemer City Charge to finish the year's work.

In 1897 he was admitted at Asheville on trial in the Annual Conference; and for the next several years he served the following charges: Winston Circuit, 1 year; Watauga Charge, 4 years; Wentworth Charge, 4 years; Greensboro Circuit, 4 years; Bryson City, 1 year; Randolph Circuit, 4 years; Epworth, Concord, 4 years; Park Avenue, Salisbury, 2 years; Brevard Station, 1 year; Brevard Street, Charlotte, 2 years; Dallas-High Shoals, 2 years; Lafayette Street, Shelby, 2 years; Erlanger, Lexington, 2 years; Denton, 2 years; Stoneville-Mayodan, 1 year.

On October 18th, 1898, Brother Raper was happily married to Miss Ada Olivia Spauha, who continued with him as co-worker in the ministry for 28 years, and who by her fine leadership, gifts and Christian graces, added great power and effectiveness to his ministry. She quit the strife-land, for her life-land, during their ministry at Shelby, dying May 26th, 1926.

On August 18th, 1927, Brother Raper was united in marriage to Miss Annie Belle Loop, of Lexington, Route 4, who with loving zeal joined him in the good work of the ministry. The widow, with a little 10-year-old daughter, Olivia, survive the good minister who passed peacefully to rest November 2, 1939. He was buried at Mt. Olivet near the sacred dust of his ancestors.

Radiant in spirit and ready of speech, Brother Raper stood firm for his deep convictions and the faith of his fathers; he had a holy zeal for his hereditary morality, and he hit hard at the heart of the red dragon. He had a warm heart and his criticisms were in the interest of a clean Christian character, as he saw it. He was loyal to his church in all her program. Youthful in vision and vitality, his voice was ever against evil, and strong in support of his holy faith. He was fervent in spirit, serving the Lord. He was a good minister of Jesus Christ. We cherish his memory, and rejoice in his good ministry.

John Thomas Ratledge

After thirty-eight years in the ministry, Brother J. T. Ratledge passed away at his home near Madison, North Carolina, on November 9, 1939. He was seventy-one years of age, having been born April 9, 1868, in Davie County, North Carolina. He was married in June, 1903, to Mary Susan Dalton. To this union were born two daughters, Maude, and Annie Ruth, by whom he is survived, along with three sisters: Mrs. J. M. Richardson, of Harmony, N. C., Mrs. C. W. Booe, of Winston-Salem, N. C., and Mrs. S. O. Stimpson, of Statesville, N. C.; and three brothers: A. D. Ratledge, and M. G. Ratledge, of Mocksville, N. C., and Rev. A. P. Ratledge, of Sylva, N. C.

After having received his education at Old Trinity College (now Duke University), Brother Ratledge taught for several years in the schools of Davie County. In 1901 he joined the Western North Carolina Conference at Gastonia, North Carolina, and during twenty-nine years of active ministry served the following charges: Danbury, 1901-1905; Lewisville, 1905-1909; Arcadia, 1909-1913; Advance, 1913-1914; Mooresville, 1914-1918; Catawba, 1918-1921; Walnut Cove, 1921-1924; Wentworth, 1924-1928; Pleasant Garden, 1928-1930. Because of ill health he took the superannuate relation in 1930, and lived near Madison, North Carolina, until the time of his death.

These are but some of the bare facts of the life of Brother Ratledge, and tell little of the man. To evaluate the man himself is a challenging task. The primary fact about him was the sweetness of his spirit which shone through everything that he did and said. His greatest ministry lay in simple associations, and his contribution to those who were privileged to know him was immeasurable. He was mentally alive and awake, and up to the time of his death was interested in ideas and not afraid of pursuing them in his thinking and conversation. Somehow he finished every discussion and every conversation standing at the foot of the Cross, looking up into the face of his Friend and Lord, for in Jesus Christ he found the answer to all questions, the solution to all problems and the final meaning of all things.

As a preacher, Brother Ratledge was fearless and direct, and in his very simplicity, profound. There are preachers whose countenance, whose spirit and whose very presence lend a majesty and meaning to words that they cannot have coming from the lips of ordinary men; preachers whose utterances convince and convict because of the character of the men themselves. Brother Ratledge was such a preacher. Men heard him and repented. Men heard him and believed. Men heard him and loved the Lord.

Young people and children recognized in him a spirit kin to their own—a spirit alive to the world about him; to the world within him; to the world above him. They loved him because he loved them, as indeed he loved everything alive and young and growing. After his retirement from the active ministry, when he came to live at his little home near Madison, he planted a garden. God loved a garden, and walked in His garden “in the cool of the day.” Jesus loved a garden, and met His Father there often. In his garden Brother Ratledge communed and worshipped, and came very close to his Father and his God. Out of it he went into the world where men toil and sorrow and sweat, carrying with him something of the freshness and cleanness and sweetness that he found there, and in his company men found rest and refreshment. His was a daily comradeship with the Holy Spirit. There was something in his face and in the touch of his hand that told men that he was a son of God. He “wist not that the skin of his face shone.” When he came to the end of the way, he simply stepped out upon the promises of God, hand in hand with Jesus Christ.

“Scarce had he need to doff his pride,
Or shed the dross of earth;
E'en as he trod
That day with God,
So walked he from his birth—
In simpleness, and gentleness;
Honor, and clean mirth.”

Thomas Jefferson Rogers

Thomas Jefferson Rogers, son of James Marshall Rogers and Nancy Belk Rogers, was born in Monroe, N. C., January 4, 1861; he was converted and joined the Methodist Church in early life; and attended Union County schools and Rutherford College.

On April 11, 1894, he was happily united in marriage to Miss Lillian Kate Wiseman of Rutherford County, North Carolina. Brother Rogers was admitted on trial into the Methodist itinerancy at Greensboro in 1889, during the last Annual Conference of North Carolina Methodism before the division into two Conferences, the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference. He was admitted into full connection at the second session of the Western North Carolina Conference, at Asheville, in 1891.

During his active ministry he served the following charges: Henrietta, 1889-1890; Mountain Island, 1890-1892; Marion, 1892-1896; Waynesville, 1896-1900; Newton, 1900-1901; Mooresville, 1901-1905; Rutherfordton, 1905-1909; Lincolnton, 1909-1913; Ramseur and Franklinville, 1913-1914; North Wilkesboro, 1914-1916; West Greensboro, 1916-1920; High Point, Main Street, 1920-1923; Madison, 1923-1927; Kernersville, 1927-1931.

Throughout his active ministry he rendered efficient service in the various departments of the pastorate. Included in constructive work he began the new church building at Lincolnton, had erected the educational building of Main Street Church, High Point, and effected the building of present parsonage of West Greensboro Charge. He was an efficient pastor. The statement has been made that Brother Rogers' "particular ministry was predominantly evangelistic in character, and he was widely known for the large number of conversions made in evangelistic meetings, and at the same time he was considered very effective as a pastor." The tribute is paid that he received 3,600 members on profession of faith in his own pastoral charges.

He was known as progressive in his labors, and for ten years attended the summer school for pastors at Duke University.

After having thus faithfully served for forty-two years in the active ministry, he retired in 1932 on account of ill health. During these years of retirement he was regular in attending church services and Sunday school unless prevented by infirmity or illness.

During the recent period of illness Brother Rogers indicated that he was aware of nearing the end. Following a critical illness of about two weeks, this faithful servant of God, on Saturday afternoon, January 6, 1940, gently passed from the Burrus Hospital, High Point, unto the larger life beyond.

On November 13, 1935, the wife, who had devotedly shared in the itinerancy, preceded her faithful companion to the "Father's house of many mansions."

Surviving are the following children: Mrs. Hilda Stansbury, High Point; Mrs. Helen Sampson, Greensboro; Miss Virginia Rogers, High Point; Mrs. Kathleen Tate, High Point; Mrs. Marguerite Rossiter, Washington, D. C.; Mrs. Marion Joyce, Greenville, S. C.; T. Baxter Rogers, Indianapolis, Ind.; W. Kilgo Rogers, Lincolnton; Thomas J. Rogers, Jr., Greensboro; and John G. Rogers, Greensboro.

Also surviving are two brothers, J. P. Rogers, Monroe, and S. A. Rogers, Clarkton; a sister, Mrs. John Carr, Monroe, and eight grandchildren.

Brother Rogers has bequeathed to his family and friends a rich legacy of priceless spiritual values. "A good name is rather to be chosen than great riches, and loving favour rather than silver and gold."

He was not unmindful of Paul's admonition to Timothy: "But watch thou in all things, enduring afflictions, do the work of an evangelist, make full proof of (or fulfil) thy ministry."

He has "come to" his "grave in a full age, like as a shock of corn cometh in in his season." How rich are God's promises to the wise for faithful service: "And they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever."

May "the Father of Mercies, and the God of all comfort, who comforteth us in all our tribulation," richly comfort and sustain every bereaved heart.

Joseph Henry West

"A tall cedar has fallen
And many hearts are sad."

These words expressed the feeling of the people of Brevard when they heard that Rev. J. H. West, beloved former pastor and leading citizen, had passed away.

The Rev. Joseph Henry West, the son of Henry West and Caroline Plemmons West, was born in Gilmer County, near Dalton, Georgia, March 17, 1862. When he was ten

years of age his father moved to Buncombe County. He received his education in the Buncombe County Public Schools and at Weaver College.

In 1881 he married Miss Laura Gillespie of Buncombe County. This union was blessed with four sons and one daughter. The oldest son, A. M. West, is a merchant in Hickory; the second son, Rev. Walter B. West, is pastor of the First Methodist Church, Salisbury; the third son, Claude, is connected with the Bird Roofing Company, Charlotte; and the fourth son, Henry, is Promotion Manager of the Chevrolet Company, Charlotte. The daughter, Mrs. W. A. Trotter, lives in Reidsville. Mrs. West died in Brevard in 1933. On December 18, 1935, Mr. West married Miss Florence Kern, of Jackson, Mississippi, and Brevard. After his retirement in 1938, Mr. and Mrs. West made their home in Brevard.

Brother West joined the Holston Conference at Morristown, Tenn., in the fall of 1889 and was appointed to the Hixon Charge. The next year the Western North Carolina Conference was formed from a part of the Holston Conference and the Western section of the North Carolina Conference and Brother West was appointed to the Old Fort Charge. At the Conference in 1939 he was one of the twenty-three living charter members of the Conference.

During the forty-nine years of his active ministry he served the following charges: Old Fort, Mills River, Monroe Circuit, Stanley Creek, Wadesboro, First Church (Concord), Weaverville, Morven, Reidsville, Brevard, Junaluska, Randleman, and Fletcher-Mills River. He served one term of four years each on the following Districts: Morganton, Waynesville, and Mt. Airy. He also served two years as a field worker for the Children's Home at Winston-Salem. As a Presiding Elder he was a capable and able leader, always esteemed highly by the men with whom he worked. His winsome and gracious personality, his spirit of kindliness, his outstanding ability as a preacher, and his abiding interest in civic affairs combined to make him a beloved and popular pastor wherever he served. For a year prior to his joining the Conference he was a local preacher; thus was accorded to him the unusual privilege of being a minister of the Gospel of Jesus for an even half-century; and in evaluating that ministry, no higher and certainly no more deserving tribute can be paid him than to say, using the phrase of the late Bishop McDowell, that he was a "good minister of Jesus Christ."

The cause of Christian education was always dear to Brother West's heart. He was a life-long friend and supporter of Weaver College. When it was apparent that Weaver and Rutherford Colleges would be merged, it was largely through his influence that the merger was consummated at Brevard. Through untiring personal efforts he was instrumental in raising funds for reconditioning and equipping the girl's dormitory which was named West Hall in his honor. At the time of his passing he was an active Trustee of Brevard, and greatly beloved by both faculty and students.

"The good die young" is a saying that originated with the ancient Greeks; rightly interpreted, it means that at whatever age the good die, they remain young in spirit. This spirit was typified in Brother West by an exceptional physical vigor, and ardent love for the great-out-of-doors, and a wholesome interest in athletic activities. Although he was approaching the four-score milestone, he never lost his youthful zest. He possessed a fine and discriminating sense of humor that enabled him to cast aside all worries and cares; and yet, he was calm and imperturbable in the face of a crisis. He never lost faith in the goodness of God and was always magnanimous in his attitude toward his fellow men. His jovial disposition and unbounded optimism made him a friend of the children and youth as well as of the mature and aged. He never crossed life's deadline. He was indeed "a happy man who carried the spirit of laughter through a care-sick world."

The year of his retirement was one of the happiest and most fruitful years of his life. He was active in his church and at the time of his death was Chairman of an important committee to raise funds for a new hospital in Brevard. We miss his gracious presence, but we shall keep ever fresh in our hearts the memory of one who mastered so well the secret of the fine art of living. The words used by Chief Justice Hughes in describing the life of Oliver Wendell Holmes, Jr., fittingly summarized the character of this good man:

"His was the most beautiful and rarest thing in the world—a complete human life!"

Allen Hammond Whisner

Rev. Allen H. Whisner was born October 15, 1869, near Berkeley Springs, W. Va. He began his education in the public schools of that section, and in 1895 received the A.B. degree from Randolph Macon College, Ashland, Va. Following this he taught for several years and then served one year in the United States Army during the Spanish-American War.

His first appointment in the Western North Carolina Conference was to the North Asheville Church in 1899, during the first year of which he married Miss Nora Duke, of Memphis, Tenn. However, during his second appointment, at Salisbury, N. C., he was forced to give up active work because of a spinal arthritis contracted during his year of military service. The next fifteen years were spent in Martinsburg, W. Va., and Washington, D. C., in constant effort toward the regaining of his health, and in 1922 it was so much improved that he was appointed by the Conference to the Fairview Circuit, near Asheville, N. C. Here he spent a successful year, but during his next appointment his health again gave way and he was then retired to the superannuate relationship of the Conference. For several years after this he remained in North Carolina, but finally found the climate of Florida more helpful in maintaining at least a semblance of health. The last five years of his life were spent there where he made many friends, not only personally, but through his writings, both prose and poetry. After an acute illness of only ten days he passed away quietly and happily on April 18, 1940, secure in the love of his Saviour. He was laid to rest in Roselawn Cemetery, Lakeland, Florida, the services being conducted by his very close friend and pastor, Rev. J. B. Reed. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Nora Whisner, of Washington, D. C., and two daughters, Miss Elisabeth F. Whisner, of Washington, and Miss Wilhelmina L. Whisner, of Philadelphia, Pa.

Throughout his life Mr. Whisner had a very keen sense of the responsibility of his calling as a minister of the Gospel, and was extremely conscientious in fulfilling what he conceived to be his duty. Because of this he was not always understood by others, and the way of grace was often-times rough. But despite a lifetime of what would seem more than his share of pain, suffering, disappointment and frustration, he still found, especially during those last five years, a very real joy in living and in fellowship with his Lord. This is evidenced very clearly in his writings as he turned more and more to them as the only means he had left of helping others and serving his Lord. Quoting his own words:

EVENING PRAYER

"Day is dying in the west while dark
 The shadows gloom in all my evening sky;
 But Thou hast never left my side, and Thou
 Wilt still be with me in the darkest night.
 Thou'rt even closer to me in the dark
 Than in the day. I only need reach out
 My hand by faith and know that Thou art there.
 No dreadful doubt nor anxious fear shall fright,
 Nor failure of the past withhold my hand
 From task assigned if Thou but work with me.
 I pray Thee guard my lowly bed and grant
 Refreshing sleep, that with tomorrow's dawn
 The waking day may find my task begun,
 And dewy morning's promise bright and fair."

Historical Sketch

“The Western North Carolina Conference shall include all North Carolina west of the North Carolina Conference, except Savannah Church, in Alleghany County, North Carolina; and also that part of North Carolina lying north of New River, and including that part of Virginia lying south of that river in the loop in Grayson County, Virginia; including all the territory in Carroll and Patrick Counties, Virginia, south of the crest of the Blue Ridge, and west of the Dan River.” (Discipline, 1940, paragraph 1418).

This territory is identical with that of the Western North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South. All three branches of Methodism forming The Methodist Church are included in this new Conference. From the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church came thirty-nine ministers and 11,901 church members. The North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church contributed seventy-four ministers and 22,361 church members. The Western North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, added 377 ministers and 167,028 church members. This gave the new Conference 490 ministers, with twenty-eight others on trial, and 201,290 church members. The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference had held 62 sessions, the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, 112, and the Western North Carolina, 50. Historical Society Minutes

The annual meeting of the Historical Society of the Western North Carolina Conference was held in Wesley Memorial Church, High Point, at 7:30 p. m., Monday, October 21st, 1940, R. L. Ownbey, President, in the chair.

The music for the opening devotional service was led by the Young People's Choir of the First Methodist Church, Asheboro, directed by Everett C. Faulkner. Hymn 256, "Faith of Our Fathers," was sung, prayer was offered by H. P. Powell, the 103rd Psalm was read by Paul Hardin, Jr., and the choir sang an anthem, "O Lamb of God, I Come."

The minutes of the 1939 session at Greensboro were read and approved. They showed a balance of \$6.61 remaining in the treasury and all bills paid in full.

The President appointed Paul Hardin, Jr., J. B. McLarty, and H. C. Sprinkle a Nominating Committee. This Committee retired and later returned, presenting its report which was adopted by the Society, thus electing J. Elwood Carroll to be President for the ensuing year; Paul N. Garber, Vice-President; W. G. McFarland, Secretary-Treasurer; and C. M. Pickens succeeding himself on the Executive Committee.

J. T. Stover, who has been a member of Conference since 1875, was presented by the Chairman as one of the spiritual fathers of our group.

J. G. Wilkinson read report of the Committee appointed last year in regard to a common depository of Methodist records. The report discussed the transient situation today in regard to these matters and asked to be continued another year. The Committee, consisting of G. R. Stafford, P. N. Garber, and J. Elwood Carroll, was continued.

In view of the new legislation of the 1940 Methodist Discipline, concerning historical societies, the chair was authorized to appoint a Committee to bring before Conference a resolution for Conference recognition of this Society. H. C. Sprinkle, Paul Hardin, Jr., and R. L. Ownbey were appointed to serve on this Committee.

W. L. Sherrill delivered an interesting address on the topic, "Lincoln County Methodism."

The President announced that in view of the small unused surplus in our treasury, no collection would be taken this year.

The Asheboro choir sang "Open Our Eyes," the benediction was given by Dr. Ownbey, to which the choir responded with a "Seven-Fold Amen."

CONFERENCE BY-LAWS

1. Resolved, That the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, in session in the City of High Point, North Carolina, this the twenty-second day of October in the year of our Lord, 1940, authorizes the Cabinet to suggest the size of and nominate the members to the Boards, Commissions, and Committees of this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline makes specific provisions otherwise.
2. District Conferences shall be held annually in each District.
3. Lay Delegates :
 - (1) Each pastoral charge shall elect annually four delegates to the District Conference.
 - (2) Lay delegates from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually; and the regular and the alternate delegate shall be elected by the third Quarterly Conference of the charges, if not earlier. The District Superintendents shall report the names of such delegates and alternate delegates to the Conference Secretary not later than September 1st of each year.
4. Conference Journals :
 - (1) Each Conference claimant shall receive one copy without charge.
 - (2) Each ministerial and lay member of the Annual Conference shall receive a copy without charge. Too, all others serving pastoral charges shall be sent a copy without cost.
 - (3) Journals shall be sent to the pastoral charges on the basis of the number of copies sold the previous year.
 - (4) Pastors will sell the copies at 25c each and immediately send the money to the Conference Treasurer, E. O. Cole, 1225 The Plaza, Charlotte; and all unsold copies shall be returned to the Conference Secretary, E. H. Nease, 517 Hawthorne Lane, Charlotte.
 - (5) Price of copies by mail shall be 35c.
5. An amount equal to 8% of the pastor's salary shall be assessed the pastoral charge for the support of the District Superintendents. The Conference Treasurer will pay the salaries of the District Superintendents.
6. An amount equal to 8¾% of the pastor's salary shall be assessed the charge for the Conference Claimants Fund.

The memorial address, which follows, was delivered by W. A. Lambeth.

"APPRECIATIVE AND AFFECTIONATE REMEMBRANCE"

The tributes of appreciative and affectionate remembrance, to which we have listened about our fallen brothers and sisters, have lifted us out of the ordinary and toward the excellent.

Animals do not seem long to remember their dead. The mother cow will for a time low for her calf, which has been sold to a butcher, but she will not seem to continue her remembrance of the calf for many days. Only human beings long remember their beloved

dead. The tributes to which we have just listened have lifted us out of the usual and toward the noble.

Methodist Annual Conferences have long had the yearly wholesome habit of remembering in deep appreciation and affection their fallen brothers and the wives or widows of their comrades. May this blessed custom, which has served to make us into better persons than we would otherwise be, never cease to be observed annually at our Methodist Conferences!

Such an annual observance causes personal integration of ourselves, instead of allowing us to have scattered personalities. When we are remembering our dead in appreciation and affection, we seem to become more thoroughly unified and integrated.

John Burroughs used to seek and love a quiet spot in nature, saying, "I came here to find myself; it is so easy to get lost in the outside world."

At such a service as this, where we try to forget ourselves and pay appreciative and affectionate tribute to those whom we have loved and lost, it ought to be easy to find ourselves and become more completely unified and integrated. Certainly, I believe that all of us now have only one thing in mind, that being our appreciation and affection for our fallen heroes and heroines.

This annual period of appreciative and affectionate remembrance is intended to comfort the hearts of those who are bound by blood and love to our fallen comrades. Such help as we can give one another is a debt of love each one of us mutually owes.

Robert Browning wrote, speaking of last year's sunsets:

"Gone are they, but I have them in my soul!"

If each one of us can say, speaking of last year's sunsets and of our fallen comrades, "Gone are they, but I have them in my soul," surely there will come into the hearts of their loved ones here a little trickle of comfort.

"O memories that bless and burn!"

"O for the touch of a vanished hand,

And the sound of a voice that is still!"

This annual service of remembrance always results in inspiring our human hearts. When we recall the heroism of our comrades, a stir of admiration and of inspiration takes place in our breasts.

Professor Garber has called our attention to the self-abnegation of the pioneering Methodist preachers. Bishop Francis Asbury in bronze, mounted on a tired horse near Sixteenth Street and Harvard, Washington, D. C., symbolizes the determination and sacrifice of the men who blazed the pioneering religious trails across the continent, those heroes who never let the early settlers forget almighty God. Opie Read wrote of them: "If in the canebreak you hear two sticks snap, one was broken by a bear, and the other by an itinerant of the Methodist Church!"

While such facts about the pioneering Methodist preachers fill me with admiration, amazement, and inspiration, I feel like saying with emphasis that not all the privations and sacrifices of Methodism were experienced and endured by the circuit-riders of the later part of the 18th century and the first part of the 19th century. There is a story of self-sacrifice and heroism back of every preacher, and every preacher's wife, whom we are specifically remembering today.

The Methodist ministry is still no place for a man or woman who has no iron in his blood. The itineracy necessarily requires obedience, hardship, and sacrifices in 1941, just as it did in 1784. The annual spectacle of several hundred men taking their appointments to different fields of labor from one Bishop, assisted by eleven District Superintendents, is always thrilling and awe-inspiring to me. Theoretically, at least, these men have stood aside and taken no part in the decision. They have trusted the honesty, the integrity, the common sense, and consecration of the Bishop and his comrades. The Methodist itineracy requires annually that such trust and confidence be given our leaders in authority.

Yes, our comrades were called upon to make relatively frequent changes of address. Oh the pain of separation from friends whom they had come to love! The children's friendships and their public school classes had to be broken. Think of the inconvenience and of the financial expense of moving on to other fields of labor! The soul of the

itinerant family was tried at every Annual Conference, due to suspense and sometimes dread and occasionally fear. The demand for heroism and self-sacrifice is well-nigh constant throughout a consecrated Methodist preacher's life.

Their self-abnegation leaves behind them, however, remembrances which inspire the souls of their living brothers and their families. Our annual service of precious remembrances makes stronger our faith that life is gloriously worth while.

Our dead comrades seemed to have believed mightily that there is no life which cannot be made eminently worth while and worth living. Consequently, they kept a buoyant faith in life and refused to become cynical, no matter what happened. Because of strong will power and a frequent sense of the invisible presence of God in their souls, they were able to face gallantly what must be faced.

Now we know that there is such a thing as carrying on and carrying through and finally finishing, with a shining countenance and without sourness or bitterness!

May we go home from this service with our hearts freshened in the belief that life, no matter how hard, is surely and always worth living!

Our service of sacred remembrance is intended to increase the determination in all our hearts to stand by the united Methodist Church and the Christian religion. The prime objective of Methodist preachers has not been changed since the Christmas Conference in Baltimore. At the very beginning of our denomination, the objective was stated in these marvelous and surprisingly accurate words: "To spread Scriptural holiness throughout these lands and to reform the continent."

The persons whom we are remembering today kept faith, let us believe, with that great and wholesome objective of original American Methodism.

Like the young preacher in the "Bonnie Briar Bush," they spoke a good word for Jesus Christ! They talked, like the Master, about the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man. They tried to make our Lord's dreams about divine Fatherhood and human brotherhood come true. Because they lived and spoke thus, this world is better and safer than it would otherwise be for human beings to live in. They were links in the strong chain which has helped to hold this world together, spiritually and morally, since the days of our illustrious founder, Mr. Wesley.

But their work has not been completed. They left an unfinished task. There is a far-off, divine event toward which the whole creation moves. While they helped much to move people toward that distant goal, their unfinished task has now been left to you and me. The finest way of remembering them is for us now to take up the lighted torches which they had to drop and carry them forward toward the Master's still distant goal for humanity.

Therefore, let me summons you to buckle your belts a bit tighter and, with old-time Methodist fervor and determination, set out to bring in the age that ought to be! May there be within our breasts the deep conviction, with reference to human society, that whatever ought to be will be some day!

"God buries His workmen, but continues His work!" May we follow in their train!

Our annual service of appreciation and affectionate remembrance is intended to make more sure the conviction we have about the immortality of the human soul.

Sabatier said that mankind is incurably religious. He might have said, also, with equal accuracy, that mankind is incurably immortal. The instinct of religion and the instinct of immortality are both native to the human heart.

"Here sits he shaping wings to fly."

Once I saw liberated from their coops in Salisbury, early one morning, 5,000 homing pigeons. After circling about the express station for a few moments, flying in ever widening circles for a time, those pigeons gained their sense of direction and set off at a rapid rate for Brooklyn, New York. They knew where their home was! They went back to Brooklyn in order to rejoin their mates there!

After the death of Elizabeth Barrett Browning, her husband, Robert Browning, wrote: "O thou bride of my soul, I shall clasp thee again!"

While flying over the enemy lines, June 14, 1918, Quentin Roosevelt was shot down by a German plane. The news of his son's death was a severe blow to Theodore Roosevelt at Oyster Bay.

The old colored servant has told that he saw Mr. Roosevelt go out to the barn, sometime later, just to look at Quentin's pony. Mr. Roosevelt did not know that the old servant was looking, when he went to the stall, ran his hands through the thick mane of the pony, and put his head on the neck of the animal, as tears of grief rolled down his face.

It wasn't long, however, before Mr. Roosevelt got possession of himself and said: "When you train a boy to be an eagle, you can not expect him to remain a sparrow."

Within a few months, Mr. Roosevelt wrote an article for a magazine which he entitled: "The Great Adventure." By this he meant that life's greatest adventure is the adventure of death.

When Suzannah Wesley was about to die, she called her children around her bed and said: "Children, as soon as I am released, sing a song of thanksgiving."

With such a mother, full faith in God, in good works, and in immortality, no wonder John Wesley could say: "My people die well!"

So mote it be, for you and for me! Amen.

That the Bishop of our Conference be authorized to name a committee of three to frame a letter to our President, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, expressing the approval of this body of assembled American citizens for him to give all aid possible under the Lend-Lease bill to the Russian people who at this time are attempting to stem the tide of aggression against their country.

Report: The Conference ordered the report of the Wesley Foundation Commission printed in the Journal without reading. Similar action was taken regarding the Treasurer's report of the same Commission. (See Appendix.)

Retired: In answer to Minute Question 38, the names of the supernumerary, except Q. L. Joyner, who withdrew, and of the retired ministers of the Conference, were called, their characters were passed, and they were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the same relation. The names of Homer Casto, J. S. Williams, O. P. Ader, G. A. Stamper, T. J. Huggins, A. G. Dixon, H. H. Robbins, and H. O. Huss were referred to the same Committee for the retired relation.

District Superintendents Report: In further answer to Minute Question 38, the names of the District Superintendents were called. These gave condensed reports of the work in their Districts, and their characters were passed.

Class Advanced: In answer to Minute Question 33, "What members are in the studies of the fourth year?" C. W. Avett, E. D. C. Brewer, J. W. Fowler, Jr., H. D. Garmon, J. J. Holmes, E. H. Lowman, J. E. Rink, W. C. Sides, Jr., and A. W. Wellons, having passed the third year course, their characters were passed and they were advanced to the class of the fourth year. P. F. Snider remains in the class of the third year, but his character is passed.

Elected Elders: Question 34, "What members have completed the studies of the fourth year and are elected elders?" was called. J. M. Brandon, Jr., A. J. Cox, H. G. Hardin, Jr., N. A. Huffman, H. E. Jones, D. B. Mullis, and M. C. Resolution Referred: A resolution affecting the Commission on World Service and Finance was announced by G. R. Combs, who asked that it be referred to the Commission for study and report; and the Conference ordered the reference.

Board of Education: The report of the Board of Education was read by J. G. Huggin, Jr., Section I on the Local Church and Section II on Colleges were adopted. Consideration of Section III, relating to Rutherford College, was deferred until Thursday. (See Appendix.)

Committee Appointed: On nomination of M. T. Smathers, F. O. Dryman, J. S. Gibbs, L. R. Akers, Jr., C. W. Kirby, and W. G. McFarland were named as the Committee on District Conference Records.

Duke Endowment: Bishop Purell presented Dr. J. M. Ormond of Duke University, who called attention to the report of the Duke Endowment Fund, and outlined the requirements for receiving aid from this fund. The report was ordered printed in the Conference Journal. (See Appendix.)

Transfers: Answering Question 25, the Bishop announced the transfer of J. H. Barnhardt, A. M. Smith, and C. O. Plyler, elders, from the North Carolina Conference into this Conference.

Reports: L. L. Gobbel read the report of the Board of Lay Activities and the report was adopted, thereby electing A. J. Kirby Conference Lay Leader and L. L. Gobbel Associate Lay Leader. The report of the Board

of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School was ordered to record. (See Appendix.)

Order of the Day: On motion of J. G. Huggin, Jr., the consideration of Section III, Report of the Board of Education, was made the order of the day for Thursday morning immediately following the World Service hour.

Adjournment: Benediction was pronounced by H. C. Sprinkle, Jr., and the session adjourned at 12:30 p. m.

FOURTH DAY—THURSDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1941

Morning Session

Devotions: The Conference was called to order at 9:00 a. m. and G. I. Humphreys led the devotional service. The prayer was made by H. G. Allen, after which the Conference sang Hymn No. 317, "From Every Stormy Wind That Blows."

Journal Approved: S. M. Needham, for the Committee on Daily Minutes, reported that the Journal for yesterday's session is correct. The Conference approved the report.

The Conference Brotherhood was emphasized by H. G. Allen.

Substitutions: For the Cabinet, M. T. Smathers nominated C. C. Benton in place of F. F. Frisbie, deceased, on the Committee on Publication of the Conference Journal, and he was elected.

Resolutions: The following resolutions, presented by the signers, were adopted by the Conference:

Garber, for the Committee on the Publication of the Conference Journal, presented that report and it was adopted. R. M. Stockton presented the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance; and after explanation by O. V. Woosley, C. M. Pickens, et al, and addresses by Dr. H. W. McPherson, Secretary of Institutions of the Board of Education, and Dr. Karl K. Quimby, Cultivation Secretary, Board of Missions and Church Extension, the report was adopted. (See Appendix).

Adjournment: After the benediction by Bishop Purell, the Conference adjourned at 1:15 p. m.

Afternoon Session

Conference Called to Order: By singing the Hymn, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord," the Conference was convened; and the prayer was led by John W. Moore.

Reports: The reports of the Committee on Conference Relations, the Board of Hospitals and Homes, Trustees of Superannuate Endowment Fund, and Committee on Accepted Supplies were read by G. N. Dulin, O. V. Woosley, J. B. Ivey, and E. P. Billups, respectively; and were adopted. The reports of the Advisory Committee on General Indebtedness, the Conference Trustees, and the Treasurer of the Board of Education were ordered to record. (See Appendix.)

Characters Passed: Completing Minute Question 38, all the names of ministerial members not heretofore called were called and there being nothing against them, their characters were passed. Charles W. Clay spoke interestingly of his work in Brazil.

Resolution: The following resolution was adopted:

In face of the fact of the growth and development of our rural churches in North Carolina and because of the aid received from the Duke Endowment, there is a growing need for uniform facts in the historical records of our rural churches.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That this Conference instruct the Conference Secretary and two other members, to be appointed by the presiding Bishop, to consult with

a like Commission from the North Carolina Annual Conference and Dr. J. M. Ormond in working out a concise report form for the rural churches, which form, if approved by the presiding Bishop and his Cabinet, shall be used for the two Conferences in 1942.

Evening Session

Ordination Sermon: At 7:30 p. m. the Conference was convened with the singing of the hymn "Come Holy Spirit, Heavenly Dove." The prayer was led by C. M. Pickens, after which the chorus choir of Centenary Church, under the direction of H. Grady Miller, sang the anthem, "Ho! Every One That Thirsteth," by MacFarlane. Dr. H. C. Smith, pastor of Duke Memorial Methodist Church, Durham, North Carolina, preached the Ordination sermon. The congregation then sang the hymn, "Lord, Speak To Me."

Ordained Deacons: The candidates for deacon's orders were called and presented by the Secretary; and the Bishop asked the parents and wives of the candidates to stand with them. Bishop Purcell, by the imposition of hands, ordained F. W. Dowd Bangle, G. W. Bumgarner, A. J. Clemmer, Jr., A. M. Faulkner, J. R. Hamilton, C. L. Heckard, J. A. Lindsay, R. V. Martin, R. W. McCulley, M. W. Nesbitt, McM. S. Richey, C. B. Ross, G. M. Schreyer, M. B. Shives, and H. H. Wood deacons in the Church of God. In this service the Epistle was read by T. M. Johnson, elder, and C. B. Ross read the Gospel.

Immediately thereafter, the candidates for elder's orders were presented. They are J. M. Brandon, Jr., A. J. Cox, H. G. Hardin, Jr., H. E. Jones, D. B. Mullis, and M. C. Reese. These were ordained by Bishop Purcell, who was assisted in the imposition of hands by W. A. Stanbury, C. M. Pickens, H. C. Smith, and T. M. Johnson, elders. M. A. McLean, whose ordination by the Congregational Church had been accepted by the Conference, stood with the class, took the vows of ordination, and by his request was also ordained by the re-imposition of hands. Journal Approved: S. M. Needham, for the Committee on Daily Minutes, reported that the minutes for Thursday morning and afternoon sessions are correct. The report was accepted. He then offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Your Committee asks for authority to examine and pass on the Journal for Thursday evening and this morning (Friday) sessions and issue to the Secretary a certificate of findings to be published in the Journal.

Reports: H. F. Duncan read Sections I and II, and I. L. Roberts Section III of the Report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension. W. B. West gave a detailed explanation of the problems confronting the Board; and the report was adopted, Section by Section, and then the whole report was adopted. (See Appendix).

F. O. Dryman presented the report on District Conference Records, and the report was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Introductions: The Bishop presented Dr. C. K. Brown, pastor in Washington, D. C.; Dr. G. H. Caldwell, pastor in this city; Rev. W. S. McLeod, a pastor in Raleigh; and Dr. Robert N. Brooks, Editor of the Central Edition of the Christian Advocate, New Orleans, all representing the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, Central Jurisdiction. Dr. Brooks addressed the Conference, and Bishop Purell responded.

Resolution: The following resolution was offered by the signers thereof, and it was adopted:

This Conference authorizes Trustees of Cruso Church, Wesley Chapel, now under the direction of Pigeon Valley and Webster Charges, respectively, to dispose of said properties and that any proceeds coming from such transaction be turned over to Conference Trustees.

The report of the Commission on World Peace was read by E. M. Avett and adopted. (See Appendix.) Then the following resolution was adopted:

"We rejoice in the large measure of success which attended the appeal for a Compassion Day offering of a million dollars. The response of the people was most heartening,

and suggests that Methodism is not on the way out, but on the way up. We are grateful to God for His help, and to the Bishops and others who led us in this great undertaking.

"We recognize that this work is not done, but only splendidly begun. Needs continue and increase in these days of widespread conflict and desolation. In particular, the work of the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief, appointed by the General Conference for this quadrennium, is a continuing work, and apart from the offerings of any special day should enter into the regular month-by-month program of all our churches.

"We earnestly hope that this privilege of sharing with the refugees, the prisoners, the needy and desolate of many lands shall be presented to our people; that we invite them to specific prayer, and set the example in our own pulpit administrations, especially by observing the day designated as World Communion Sunday, and that we seek by the use of thank-offering boxes in the church and in the homes, by the devotion of communion offerings, or by such other means as we and our people may agree upon, to maintain their steady interest and help for this outstanding duty and opportunity of the present day for Overseas Relief.

Objectives: Bishop Purcell read and explained a sixteen-point plan of objectives for the new year, and the Conference unanimously approved the objectives. (See page 3.)

Pickens Called to Chair: It was necessary for the Bishop and his Cabinet to retire, and the Bishop asked C. M. Pickens to preside.

Reports: Dr. W. C. Houston presented the report of the Board of Conference Claimants, and it was adopted. (See Appendix.)

E. P. Billups announced that R. M. Dellinger and W. C. Eastridge, supply pastors, have enrolled for the course of study for admission on trial, and that T. G. Williams, supply pastor, is in the class of the third year in the course of study.

J. G. Winkler moved that the condensed statistics go to record without reading, and the Conference ordered this.

Junaluska: W. A. Lambeth spoke on the Assembly at Junaluska.

Golden Cross: The second Sunday in May was designated as Golden Cross Sunday for the Conference.

Offerings: An offering amounting to \$51.84 for the janitors was taken. The offering for the brethren retiring at this Conference amounted to

\$259.61. Following the offerings, the Conference was led in singing several hymns by J. P. Hipps and J. O. Ervin.



REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

We recommend:

1. That the apportionment for the Children's Home at Winston-Salem remain at an amount equal to ten per cent (10%) of the pastor's salary for the current year, and we urge that additional fifth Sunday and special offerings be contributed in not less than the following total charge quotas, including the 10% apportionment:

12%	for charges paying the pastor less than \$1,500.
15%	for charges paying the pastor \$1,500 to \$2,500.
18%	for charges paying the pastor \$2,500 to \$3,500.
21%	for charges paying the pastor \$3,500 to \$4,500.
25%	for charges paying the pastor over \$4,500.

2. That the General Work and Conference Work total \$266,276.65.

3. That a net amount of \$6,000 for Annual Conference expense and a net amount of \$811.98 for Jurisdictional Conference expenses be deducted from the above before division.

4. That our apportionments be divided as follows:

5. The appropriation of \$5,500 for College Place Church is made with the provision that the North Carolina Conference appropriate their proportional part.

6. Whereas, the Board of Christian Education has requested and recommended that the Western North Carolina Conference raise \$10,000 to help take care of the self-help program at Brevard College for the ensuing year:

We recommend that February 15, 1942, or as near thereto as practical, shall be set aside as Brevard College Day, at which time the needs of Brevard College shall be presented to each church and a free-will offering taken for this purpose.

7. In view of the increasing cost of living, we recommend that a systematic effort be made to increase the pastors' salaries on all charges paying less than twenty-five hundred dollars. We urge that the Conference Lay Leader and Board of Lay Activities co-operate with the District Superintendents in arranging group meetings during the first two weeks after Conference, which all Lay Leaders and local Boards of Stewards shall be asked to attend, and that the matter be presented by the District Superintendent and the District Lay Leader in the most effective manner possible; making the quota an increase over last year of at least fifteen per cent on charges paying less than twenty hundred dollars and ten per cent on charges paying between twelve hundred and twenty-five hundred dollars.

Having in this Conference approximately one hundred men whose salaries are less than twelve hundred dollars, your Commission on World Service and Finance strongly insists that in the face of the present cost of ordinary necessities, this Conference, led by the laymen and the District Superintendents, should make a concerted and adequate effort to carry out these recommendations.

8. That an amount equal to $8\frac{3}{4}\%$ of the pastor's salary be assessed to each pastoral charge for the Conference Claimants' Fund.

(a) That the Annual Conference instruct the Conference Claimants' Committee to reserve an amount equal to 5% of the total collected, for necessitous and emergency cases, where years of service do not provide decent support when added to any private income of resources.

(b) That 5% of the total collected during the ensuing year be set aside in order to accumulate a reserve fund.

(c) That after these two deductions are made, that the remainder of all collections and incomes from Publishing Houses, endowment, and any other sources, be paid to superannuates, their widows, and dependents, in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline, and solely on a basis of years of service in the effective ministry.

(d) That where years of service in the effective ministry exceeds forty years, that the "Annuity Rate" thereafter for each year of service shall be reduced by one-half, and that when the "Annuity Rate," the amount from the Duke Fund, and the General Fund bring the total to a Conference claimant to \$1,000 a year, then the "Annuity Rate" shall not apply so as to increase the amount beyond \$1,000; and \$1,000 shall constitute the total pension available to any claimant and that 70%, the amount fixed by the Discipline, shall

be the maximum paid to or received from Conference Claimant Funds by any widow of a deceased minister, but that up to a \$1,000 annuity for retired ministers and 70% thereof for widows of retired ministers, the "Annuity Rate," as defined by the Discipline, shall be in full force and effect.

9. An amount equal to 2¼% of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the Episcopal Fund.

10. Referring to the resolution submitted to the World Service Commission by the action of the Conference last year in regard to a graduated scale for the support of the District Superintendents:

We beg to report that we have given the matter careful study and deem it unwise to make any change in the middle of a quadrennium.

11. We recommend that the salaries of the District Superintendents remain at \$4,800, and that an amount equal to 8% of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the support of the District Superintendents.

12. We recommend that the salary of the Treasurer of the Conference be made \$1,500, if handled on part-time basis, and \$1,800 if on a full-time basis for the ensuing year. This salary is all-inclusive; that is, it is to include whatever the Treasurer may see fit to pay for clerical help.

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Report No. 1

Never in the history of our world has there been a greater need for emphasis upon missions in all of its aspects than today. In the face of widespread devastation upon three continents, of human suffering that staggers imagination; in the face of unrivaled bloodshed, of ravaging poverty, of bereavement without a name; in the face of desperate pleas for relief, physical and spiritual, from twice ten thousand voices, the command to "go into all the world" comes to us with compelling insistence. Today, when Hitler's "new order" is coming perilously near success, it is no time for Christians to forsake hope in the reign of Christ around the world.

The response of the Board of Missions and Church Extension to our share of the task forced upon us by the exigencies of the hour is embodied in the items which follow.

MISSIONARY EDUCATION

We deem it to be our responsibility to see that every means at our disposal be employed to create a vivid consciousness of the appalling needs of the day. To this end we urge a larger distribution of the finest of missionary literature which is available without cost from the various Boards of The Methodist Church. We recommend a persistent campaign throughout the Conference for the purpose of placing the *World Outlook*, *The Methodist Woman*, and *The Pastor's Journal* in our homes. We further commend to our local churches the numerous implements of visual education now at our disposal. We call special attention to motion pictures, colored slides, picture sets, phonograph records, and plays.

WORLD SERVICE

The Board recommends that every effort possible be made to enlarge World Service giving in our churches. We are pleased to note the greatly increased number of churches

participating in the monthly fourth Sunday offerings to missions. We express appreciation to the Board of Education for its interest in this cause of the church school and urge continuance of its policies encouraging larger participation of our churches in this worthy enterprise.

We observe with alarm the announcement by our General Board of Missions and Church Extension that there has been a decrease in World Service giving, for the first four months of this fiscal year, of over \$180,000.00. Our own Conference, we regret to say, has played a part in this retreat. We earnestly solicit the support of our church leaders in a vigorous campaign to wipe out the blot upon our record.

THE SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

We commend the women of our church for their aggressive response to the call to service. We mark the splendid spirit of co-operation and fellowship existing within the new Conference Society. We regard the raising of \$121,000.00 by some 23,000 members from approximately 600 Societies within the bounds of the Conference as a significant achievement for the cause of world-wide missions. We share with them the belief that if an enlarged vision of our responsibility to human need is attained, the appeal must be registered not merely with the adult section of our church but with the Children's and Young People's Divisions as well. We make special mention of the progress made during the year in the organization of Wesleyan Service Guilds for employed women. We rejoice in the increasingly important position the women of the church are occupying in the total program of Christian service.

MISSIONARY INSTITUTES

We recommend that the plan adopted last year for the conducting of simultaneous Missionary Institutes in the several districts be again put into effect, with such modifications as are necessary to suit individual situations. After consultation with the Bishop and his Cabinet, we suggest November 30, 1941, as the date for the Institutes.

We are pleased to report a substantial increase in the number of people being reached by the Institutes, and commend the work of our Conference Missionary Secretary, the District Superintendents, and the District Missionary Secretaries in making this increase possible.

NOMINATIONS

The Board nominates the Rev. L. B. Abernethy for appointment as Conference Missionary Secretary; the Rev. W. G. McFarland for membership on the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School, replacing Dr. E. K. McLarty; and the Rev. J. W. Fitzgerald, the Rev. R. C. Goforth, and Mr. Paul Evans for membership on the newly-formed Commission on Town and Country Work.

STUDY BOOK

The Board urges that special efforts be made to secure a wide-spread distribution and use of the new mission study book, "The Methodist Meeting House," by Dr. Paul N. Garber, one of the members of our own Western North Carolina Conference.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND NEEDS

The Board acknowledges, in a number of charges, local assumption of increased financial responsibilities, making possible the assignment to more needy areas of funds once allotted to these charges. With the help of small apportionments a number of new charges are again this year being created by division of circuits. There is an acute need for further division of excessively large circuits where pastors are engaged in the near hopeless task of meeting the exacting demands forced upon them. These situations are crying for relief. We deplore our helplessness in the face of them and hopefully await the further awakening of our people to a very real missionary responsibility at home.

We are distressingly conscious of numbers of areas in our Conference where pastors are laboring heroically, though handicapped for want of adequate support. To the correction of this lamentable condition, to the end that every pastor of the Conference shall have

adequate support well above the bare subsistence level, we urge our constituency to become aroused.

CHURCH EXTENSION

The Section of Church Extension gives hearty congratulations to those pastors and congregations of our Conference who have liquidated indebtedness on churches and parsonages during the year. We note with satisfaction the new projects of building and the improvements that are being promoted at the present time. In the success of all these enterprises we are profoundly concerned.

We are, however, by our limited income, unable to assist all who come to us for aid. And we desire hereby to refer the pastors to the ruling of our Discipline which restricts us from aiding with donations any church or parsonage that is not classed as a missionary charge. Such non-missionary projects should come to us, if they must come at all, for loans instead of donations. Furthermore, we request the District Superintendents to discourage their pastors from seeking from this Board aid for any church which is receiving help from the Duke Endowment. We believe that our help should go to those needy locations where Duke Endowment funds are not available.

We take this opportunity to insist that the pastors induce their laymen adequately to protect all church property by fire insurance. The pastors are also urged to follow the Disciplinary requirement of including in their deeds to church property the trust clause as found in paragraph 777 of the Discipline. Our Board is prohibited from giving aid where the title to the property is not so secured.

After much effort to understand the needs of the many applicants coming to us at this time, our section attempts to distribute to the very best advantage the funds at our disposal. We are, therefore, approving the following donations:

BOARD OF EDUCATION
Report No. 1

THE LOCAL CHURCH SECTION

Paragraph 1120 in the 1940 Discipline says, "The Division of the Local Church shall develop a comprehensive and unified program of Christian Education which shall lead to a knowledge of the Holy Scriptures, the Christian religion and the Christian Church." The report of the employed staff to the Conference Board of Education shows that worthy achievements have been realized toward a realization of that goal. The challenge of the unattained, however, leads us forward with the hope of even greater accomplishments next year. We request that the forces of Christian education be definitely aligned with the following program emphases during the year ahead.

1. *Evangelism.*—The Christian evangelist is a person who brings the good news of salvation through Christ. He may be a layman or an ordained minister. His primary approach may be either the revival or the process of Christian education, or both, depending largely upon the time and talent he has to give and on the Christian experience he has to share. It should be said again and again that Jesus came both preaching and teaching. When He was confronted with the multitude, He preached. When He planned for the preservation and the promulgation of His ideals for the Kingdom of God, he selected a small group of intimate followers and taught them the mysteries of the Kingdom. These two approaches, expressed in the great commands—"Go—preach," and "Go—teach," are basic in any constructive program of evangelism. Through weekly pulpit messages and pastoral visits, in periods of study and meditation, and in seasons of special revival services, the preaching ministry makes its appeal. In the Christian home, the church school,

the Christian college and in the activities of various Christian character-building agencies, the leaven of the teaching ministry is at work. The effectiveness of either approach is determined largely by the success of the other. They are interdependent. Let us all, ministers and laymen alike, purpose in our hearts to be better Christian evangelists in our respective fields of service this year.

2. *The United Christian Education Advance* is being sponsored by the North Carolina Council of Churches, The Methodist Church, and more than forty other Protestant denominations working through the International Council of Christian Education. For any degree of success in this movement, there must be co-operation between pastors and church school workers in the same church; among the Methodist churches of a community, District and Annual Conference; and among the different Protestant churches of a community, county and state. Therefore, be it resolved that we endorse the purpose of the United Christian Education Advance and call upon all the local churches in our Conference to co-operate in this Protestant effort to reach every person with Christian teaching.

3. *World Service in the Church School* provides an excellent opportunity for education and for giving to the benevolent causes of The Methodist Church. Up to October 4th, 507 church schools of the Conference gave \$22,601.92. We urge the pastors, superintendents and members of the other 631 church schools to take advantage of this opportunity to increase our giving to World Service during 1941-1942. Continuous promotion will be carried on from the Conference office in Salisbury.

4. *The Co-operative Plans for Missionary Education of Children and Youth* present a challenge and an opportunity to every agency of the local church. Let us apply ourselves diligently to an interpretation and an application of these plans in each church this year.

5. *The Church School Rally Day Offering* provides a chance to relieve the financial embarrassment of the Board of Education. This year, for the first time in fourteen years, the net amount available from appropriations for Greensboro College is less than \$5,000. For the past six years both Greensboro and Brevard Colleges have received an average of \$5,614.13. Each of these schools has a decrease of \$927.79 in comparison with the net amount received from appropriations last year.

The local church work has also experienced a decrease in income of approximately \$1,636.96 as a result of the discontinuance of the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise and of the inauguration of the new financial plan. A liberal Church School Day offering would relieve the situation in the local church section and thereby release more money for the colleges. This year 251 schools responded with a total offering of \$2,239.94—an increase of \$43.51 in offering, but a decrease of nine in the number of churches responding. We urge pastors, superintendents, and members of the other 887 schools to take advantage of Church School Rally Day as an opportunity to assist in financing the Conference program of Christian education during 1941-1942.

6. *The New Methodist Literature* is available; the *Methodist Youth Fellowship* and *Young Adult Fellowship* are now organized. Each of these should be a part of every local church program. No Methodist school can render its best service without Methodist literature. Neither can any Methodist Church train its youth for membership and service in the church without the Methodist youth program. For leadership and financial giving, young adult groups contain vast potential possibilities for every local church.

7. *The Church School* needs to be organized and made to function in keeping with the plans designated in the 1940 Discipline. We now have a united Methodist Church. Many obsolete patterns should be destroyed. We should begin to put new and better procedures into new patterns. Let us urge our leadership and general church school constituency to become acquainted with and to follow the Discipline of our church. This approach will revitalize the work of our Sunday schools, local church Board meetings, training schools, Epworth training conferences, young adult fellowship, camps, assemblies and caravans, missionary education, and vacation church schools. We should be satisfied with nothing less than every church a school in vital Christian living.

8. *The Rural Church* is a valuable part of North Carolina Methodism. The Duke Foundation, good ministers, and a progressive rural constituency have made significant progress in our rural sections. There are, however, many small rural and industrial

churches which continue to need the guidance our extension program has given for twenty years. These churches deserve assistance which calls for patience, time, well-tested methods and materials, a thorough understanding, and much skill. A well organized and functioning Commission on Town and Country Work will enlarge the service to and increase the efficiency of these churches.

Considerable progress has been made in getting new church markers displayed and this emphasis should be continued until the job is complete.

9. We recommend that the Executive Secretary, in consultation with the District Superintendents, select District Directors of Children's Work, Youth Work, and Adult Work. We also recommend that Conferences on Christian Education with District Directors of Children's Work, Youth Work, and with Young Adults be held at Sunny Acres for the purpose of planning our work in these respective areas for the year.

10. We recommend the following persons for membership on the Board of Education: C. C. Herbert, Jr., and Mrs. O. D. Nelson.

11. We request the appointment and confirmation of the following staff members:

Carl H. King, Executive Secretary and Director of Youth Work.

Mrs. Agnes E. Kirk, Office Secretary and Associate Director of Youth Work.

Miss Elizabeth Oliver, Director of Children's Work.

Earl D. C. Brewer, Extension Secretary and Director of Young Adult Fellowship.

Report No. 2

SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES SECTION

Your Board had before it the reports of the Boards of Trustees of Duke University, Greensboro College, Brevard College, and High Point College. These reports indicate significant progress during the year in the several phases of their programs.

EDUCATION STATISTICS

Duke University.—Officers and teachers, 455; students, 3,716; Summer School enrollment, 2,457; endowment, \$35,505,373.23; plant and equipment value, \$30,219,285.61; value of loan funds, \$2,040,106.73; value of scholarship funds, \$348,885.76; value of special funds, \$714,909.39.

Greensboro College.—Officers and teachers, 44; enrollment, 443; value of property, \$728,824.48; endowment, \$459,393.48; indebtedness, \$40,000.00 (heating plant bonds.)

High Point College.—Officers and teachers, 38; student enrollment, 492; Summer School enrollment, 136; Extension School, 80; value of property, \$886,616.03; indebtedness, \$203,368.89.

Brevard College.—Officers and teachers, 30; enrollment, 336; value of property, \$298,236.31; endowment, \$61,241.84; increase in value during year, \$10,491.29; indebtedness, \$31,491.29.

Pfeiffer Junior College.—Enrollment, 200; value of properties, \$600,000.00; indebtedness, none; endowment, \$300,000.00.

We rejoice in the election of Dr. Robert L. Flowers to the Presidency of Duke University, after serving more than fifty years in continuous service of Trinity College and

Duke University. We pledge to him our ardent and enthusiastic co-operation in the services of Duke University for Christian education.

DEAN PAUL N. GARBER

We note with pride the fact that Dr. Paul N. Garber, a member of the Western North Carolina Conference, has been elected Dean of the Duke University School of Divinity. Our prayers and support are with him in the direction of the education of our young ministers.

DUKE SCHOLARSHIPS

The fact that Duke University is endeavoring to raise special scholarship funds for students from North Carolina and the adjacent territory is a noteworthy project and to it we offer our co-operation.

We recommend the following special observances:

- (1) Student Recognition Day on December 28, 1941 (evening service).
- (2) Race Relations Day on February 8, 1942 (morning service).
- (3) Methodist Student Day on June 14, 1942 (morning service).

An offering is to be taken on Race Relations Day and on Methodist Student Day and forwarded to H. A. Dunham, Asheville, N. C., Treasurer of the Conference Board of Education.

We recommend that the amount realized on the appropriation for Schools and Colleges by the Commission on World Service and Finance be allocated as follows:

and that the remainder be divided equally among Brevard College, Greensboro College, and High Point College.

F. L. Gibbs, General Board of Education.

We note the decision of the Board of Trustees of Brevard College to continue that institution permanently at the present location and to increase its usefulness through a largely expanded program in which they are now receiving remarkable encouragement.

A tragic fire in which a faithful official, H. G. McEntire, lost his life, has made it necessary for Greensboro College to remodel the damaged Main building and provide a library building, plans for which are already being worked out.

High Point College is awake to the need of liquidating the debt upon the institution and providing an endowment through which the present income may be supplemented. The Board recommends that the Conference endorse and assist in carrying to consummation the present plans of these three institutions.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 3

RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING THE AFFAIRS OF RUTHERFORD COLLEGE

At the last session of this Annual Conference, at High Point, N. C., the following action was taken with reference to the affairs of Rutherford College:

1. It was recommended that the Duke Endowment, amounting to approximately

\$53,000.00 in favor of Rutherford College, be transferred for the use and benefit of Brevard College, Inc., at Brevard, N. C., as an endowment, but that the net income from said endowment be paid over to the Trustees of Rutherford College to assist in the liquidation of said college until such time as this Conference shall take further action with regard to same.

2. The Higgins Fund and property belonging to said fund was transferred from Rutherford College to Brevard College, Inc., as an endowment for the use and benefit of Brevard College, but that one-half of the net income from said fund also be paid over to the Trustees of Rutherford College to assist in the liquidation of said college, until the further action of this Conference.

3. The Centenary Fund and property belonging to the same was transferred from Rutherford College to Brevard College, Inc., as an endowment.

4. The \$10,000.00 of Rutherford College bonds, secured by a mortgage on the property of said college, now in the hands of the Board of Education, were directed to remain in the hands of the Board of Education until the further action of this Conference concerning the same, and the E. M. Cole Endowment, but that the income from said bonds was to be used by the Trustees of Rutherford College until the further action of this Conference.

5. That the physical property of Rutherford College and its financial affairs be liquidated at the earliest time possible and within such time as the Western North Carolina Conference may hereafter designate.

Now, after a thorough examination and careful consideration of all the affairs of Rutherford College as they relate to the church and other institutions, the Board of Christian Education has definitely concluded that the time has come when the affairs of Rutherford College should be settled without delay, to the end that ultimately the good name and good-will of Rutherford College can be merged with Brevard College. It is, therefore, *recommended*:

(a) That both the Duke Endowment and the income therefrom be transferred to Brevard College, Inc.

(b) That one-half of the net income from the Higgins Fund, which has heretofore been paid to Rutherford College, be transferred and hereafter paid to Brevard College, Inc.

(c) That the net income from the Centenary Fund and property belonging thereto, which has heretofore been paid to Rutherford College, be transferred to and hereafter paid to Brevard College, Inc.

(d) That the \$10,000.00 of Rutherford College bonds, now held by the Board of Education of this Conference, be transferred to Brevard College, Inc., and that the income from said bonds be hereafter paid to Brevard College, both the bonds and income to become a part of the E. M. Cole Endowment, which is being set up at Brevard College by this Conference in lieu of the \$10,000.00 of liberty bonds which Mr. E. M. Cole formerly set up as an endowment at Rutherford College.

(e) That the Board of Trustees of Rutherford College, either by sale or other legal proceedings, sell and dispose of all of the physical property belonging to Rutherford College, and that the proceeds therefrom be applied on the indebtedness of Rutherford College, to the end that the assets of Rutherford College may be liquidated by said Trustees within six months after the adjournment of this Conference.

(f) The name and the good will of Rutherford College be retained by its Board of Trustees, subject to the further action of the Western North Carolina Conference.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE**I. THE METHODISTS: A TEMPERATE PEOPLE**

Our Methodist Church is committed to the cause of temperance. Our strength in this cause is rooted in the individual loyalty to the ideal and practice of temperance by our men and women, our youth and our children. Let us, during the coming year, in every church in our Conference, wage an intensive campaign to the end that we may have sober, self-respecting members and law-abiding communities.

1. Let us elect and use a Board of Temperance in every church.

2. Your Board recommends that we observe the fifth Sunday in May, 1942, as Conference Temperance Sunday.

In preparation of this day, let the cause of temperance and plans for the observance be presented at every District Conference.

In connection with the observance, let us present temperance through all the channels we can use. Let us have Temperance sermons, worship services, dramas, posters, community rallies, forums. Then let us use Temperance Units available for the church school classes, and Temperance courses in vacation schools, Christian workers' training schools, summer camps and assemblies. Let us also give encouragement and support to the public school temperance courses.

3. We recommend a wider circulation of the *Voice* of the Board of Temperance of The Methodist Church, and of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, which is always the militant champion of this cause.

II. LAW ENFORCEMENT

Every attempt to legalize liquor in the counties within our Conference bounds has been defeated. Let us now call upon our Methodist people, as Christian citizens, to move out of the lines we have been holding so that we may wage an aggressive offensive for the honest enforcement of the laws we have.

To this end we pledge co-operation with law enforcement officers, with the United Dry Forces, with the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and with the Temperance Committee of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

III. THE SHEPPARD BILL

Some of the finest young men of our land are now in the military services. They are at a plastic age in their character development. They are the youth upon whom our nation stakes its future security and progress. As we give them from our homes and churches to

the service of our government, we have the right to ask that government to surround them with the most wholesome influences possible. No government that permits the environs of army camps to swarm with dives and saloons is playing fair with the men or with their parents who gave them.

Senate Bill No. 860, known as the Sheppard Bill, is designed to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors in the vicinity of military camps. The liquor traffic has a strong lobby organized to defeat this bill.

"The responsibility is now upon the pastors of our churches. We must meet it with prompt, positive, persistent appeals to the men and women in the pew to demand prompt action by our Senators and Congressmen. If our church people call for protective legislation for our men in uniform against the liquor traffic, as we did in 1917, the legislation will be secured. Otherwise it will not. The time for action is now."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Your Board of Lay Activities is pleased to report evidences of progress in many aspects of the total program of lay activities in the Western North Carolina Conference. In co-operation with the pastors and District Superintendents, lay leaders—charge and district—have been active in cultivating our church membership, through Institutes, District Leagues of Stewards, and other agencies, for a more intelligent appreciation and loyal support of the church's mission and ministry to a distressed and confused world.

We note with satisfaction the organization of functioning Leagues of Stewards in more of our Districts, the holding of laymen's rallies in three centers of the Conference—at Asheville, Charlotte, and Winston-Salem, with Dr. John R. Mott, Edgar T. Welch, and Bishop Purcell as principal speakers; a disposition to pay debts on churches and parsonages, and to accept a large share in the task of world service.

Your Board, however, feels the need of intensified efforts to bring the laymen of the Conference to a more widespread and sacrificial support of the total program and of all the agencies and institutions of our church. To this end we recommend:

1. *Stewardship:*

- a. That one or more Institutes for Stewards be held in each District wherever practicable.
- b. That at least one of the meetings of the District League of Stewards concentrate upon the significance and implications of stewardship.
- c. That adult and young people's classes in our church schools be encouraged to devote one quarter to a study of the elective course on stewardship.

2. *Finances:* In the spirit of Christian stewardship and in response to the realization of world need for the Christian gospel of hope and salvation and for the Christian ministry of teaching and healing, we call upon the laymen of the Western North Carolina Conference to (1) support our ministers more adequately, (2) accept as nearly as possible 100% of the askings for World Service, and (3) contribute more generously to all other financial claims of our church. To these ends we suggest:

- a. A program of information and inspiration *before* the first Quarterly Conference when the vote is taken on the acceptances of the askings.
- b. As a goal, the payment by the time of the District Conference of at least one-half of the benevolences.
- c. The payment of ministers on a monthly basis.
- d. An every-member canvass in every church annually, and a careful follow-up of all pledges during the year.

3. *Our Institutions:* Our institutions are of the church and should be preserved and supported by the church and be thus recognized as the laymen's chief opportunities to help fulfil the Great Commission. Specifically we urge all our people:

- a. To attend church and church school.
- b. To lay more stress on evangelism.

- c. To give better support to our Children's Home by paying not only the 10% assessment but by contributing generously on the fifth Sundays to the caring for our orphans.
- d. To subscribe to and read our general organ, *The Advocate*, and our Conference organ, *The North Carolina Christian Advocate*.
- e. To support, through the Golden Cross and other avenues, the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital at Elkin.
- f. To join the Conference Brotherhood.
- g. To support our church colleges by sending young people to them as students and by aiding them in their announced plans for building up their plant and endowment funds.

We call special attention to the needs at Brevard College, where efforts are being made to strengthen this institution, and at Greensboro College, where a recent tragic fire makes necessary the restoration of Main building and the construction of a library building. High Point College and Duke University are commended also as worthy of all the assistance we can give them.

4. We urge, furthermore, the observance of "Laymen's Day" in every charge on the fourth Sunday in February, and the observance of "Laymen's Week" immediately preceding "Laymen's Day."

5. We suggest the values of a larger use of lay speakers and the possibilities in the plan whereby larger churches assume responsibility of furnishing lay speakers for rural churches in order that each church may have a service every Sunday wherever the preacher and the congregation so desire.

6. We renew our unyielding resistance to the liquor traffic and urge a continuous, militant, educational program against intemperance.

Your Board nominates A. J. Kirby as Conference Lay Leader and report the election of Dr. Luther L. Gobbel as Associate Conference Lay Leader, Paul F. Evans as Secretary, and Thomas C. Hoyle, Sr., as Treasurer of the Board.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

I. HOSPITAL

The Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital, assisted by donations from the Golden Cross and the Duke Endowment, has been able to care for 531 free patients during the past year; 3,130 days of free care having been given these patients.

There have been 1,438 admissions to the hospital; and the total days of care, including free patients and free days, have been 12,107. A total of 674 operations have been performed. In addition to this work, 3,373 out-patients have been treated.

For this work the Hospital has expended during the past Conference year the sum of \$54,411.96, exclusive of professional fees.

We request the appointment of Rev. L. B. Abernethy as Director of the Golden Cross and Superintendent of the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital at an annual salary of \$1,500 and necessary expenses. We request the confirmation of Rev. A. C. Gibbs to serve as Assistant Director of the Golden Cross and Rev. R. M. Courtney as Treasurer of the Golden Cross, both to serve without pay.

We request the confirmation of the following Trustees for the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital for a term of three years: Rev. L. B. Abernethy, R. O. Lindsay, A. L. Butler, and Charles G. Ashby.

II. HOME FOR CHILDREN

The merging of the former Methodist Protestant Children's Home at High Point with The Children's Home, Inc., at Winston-Salem, is now complete. The two families are well united. The children are happy and well provided for.

There are now 440 children enrolled. As soon as necessary investigation can be made and sufficient assurance of financial security can be obtained, the enrollment will doubtless include 450 children, the maximum number the Home is now in position to accommodate.

The construction of the Wrenn Memorial Building has been delayed pending a proper liquidation of the Wrenn estate and more favorable conditions for securing building materials. The Stockton Building and the Brooks Building have been completed and are now occupied. All of the twenty-two brick buildings on the campus are in a good state of repair and the children who live in them dwell in safety and security.

The total enrollment of children during the past year numbers 537.

In order to comply with requirements connected with the proposed sale of some Mooresville property willed to the Children's Home by Rev. John W. Jones, deceased, we request the confirmation of the following resolution:

"Whereas, John W. Jones, of the City of Mooresville, North Carolina, by his last will and testament, devised a lot, measuring 133' by 215', with the improvements thereon, on North Main Street, in the City of Mooresville, North Carolina, to the Trustees of The Children's Home of Winston-Salem, North Carolina, belonging to the Western North Carolina Conference, M. E. Church, South.

"Whereas, by resolution of the Board of Trustees of The Children's Home, Inc., adopted March 23, 1939, the disposition of the property was referred to the Finance Committee.

"Whereas, the Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees of The Children's Home, Inc., negotiated a sale of said property to R. J. Holshouser and wife, for the sum of \$2,500.00 to be paid in cash.

"Now, therefore, be it resolved that the sale of the property to R. J. Holshouser and wife, is in all respects confirmed and the proper officers of The Children's Home, Inc., are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute proper deed vesting title to the property in R. J. Holshouser and wife."

We request the confirmation of the following Trustees: Dr. G. Ray Jordan, to fill out the unexpired term of Bishop W. W. Peele, term expiring in 1943; Dr. J. E. Pritchard, in place of Dr. T. F. Marr, deceased, term expiring in 1947; J. M. Millikan, in place of John Paul Lucas, deceased, term expiring in 1947; and the confirmation of the following re-elected Trustees for terms expiring in 1947: G. F. Ivey, E. R. Bucher, Thurmond Chatham, Rev. R. M. Courtney, and B. S. Womble.

III. HOME FOR AGED

For the purpose of making investigation relative to the feasibility of establishing a home for the aged to be sponsored by the Western North Carolina Conference, we request the confirmation of the following Committee: Rev. E. O. Cole, J. L. Snyder, and Mrs. Thurmond Chatham.

IV. MISCELLANEOUS

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

I

In this day of world crisis our people need the gospel of Jesus Christ as never before. The moral character and spiritual strength of our nation will be tested to the core during coming months, and nothing short of a religious awakening of the most far-reaching and thorough-going kind will suffice. Your Commission, therefore, suggests that in every local church in our Conference there should be an earnest and prayerful effort at mass evangelism during the coming year. We feel that our larger churches especially should lead in a new emphasis upon this type of evangelistic work. We believe that personal evangelism should be planned and carried out in every effective agency of the local church, especially the church school, the official Board, and the Woman's Society. We urge the use of visitation evangelism and church loyalty campaigns. We recommend the use of the excellent literature prepared by our General Commission on Evangelism, especially the *Upper Room* and the quarterly periodical, *Tidings*. We feel that evangelism is the heart of all our work, and that we should look forward to the time when we shall be able to have a full-time Director of Evangelism for our Conference.

II

During the past year your Commission sought, with the generous co-operation of the Boards of Lay Activities and Missions, and under the able leadership of our Bishop, to inaugurate a Conference-wide program of evangelism in connection with the observance of Spiritual Mobilization Week. Three great one-day conferences were held on successive days in March in Asheville, Winston-Salem, and Charlotte; and large numbers of our church leaders gathered to hear nationally-known speakers, prominent among whom were those who brought messages of inspiration for evangelistic endeavor. It was the hope of your Commission that District-wide retreats preceding these regional meetings and the observance of Spiritual Mobilization Day following them in the local churches would launch a vast program of evangelistic effort throughout the Conference. Important results were achieved; but we believe that more careful planning, more general participation, and more intense spiritual preparation in the local churches would result in a much greater effectiveness for such a Conference-wide program. Your Commission, therefore, recommends that the Conference endorse the following plans and program for the coming year:

(1) Believing that our ministers and laymen need and would welcome practical instruction in methods and plans for present-day evangelism, we suggest that the Bishop and the Conference Commission be authorized to secure the co-operation of our General Commission on Evangelism in order to hold a series of one-day regional conferences in accessible centers of population for the purpose of teaching and outlining effective methods of evangelism in the local church.

(2) We recommend that these regional meetings be followed by district meetings in which the preachers of each district shall be called together by the District Superintendent for the purpose of devising and working out a yearly program of evangelism in each local church in the district.

(3) We recommend that the Bishop and his Cabinet be requested to meet with the Commission on Evangelism as soon as possible and not later than January 15 in order to set up the regional and district meetings aforementioned.

(4) We recommend that the Conference endorse a request of the Commission that the Commission on World Service and Finance set apart for the promotion and carrying out of this Conference program of evangelism a sum of money not exceeding three hundred dollars.

III

Your Commission has had before it the report of John Church, General Evangelist. We recommend his re-appointment to that work. We have also considered the request of John W. Groce that he be approved as Conference Evangelist for the coming year. The Commission recommends his approval and appointment for the coming year as a Conference Evangelist.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD PEACE

We see results and forget sources. We are sensitive to effects and forget causes. Harvests are taken for granted and seed time may be overlooked.

"The fruit of the spirit is love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance." These flavors are combined in one fruit. Its source is the Christian Spirit. Its growth is conditioned on cultivation.

That which grows cannot be made. A synthetic peace is unnatural and short-lived. The spirit of peace can find expression in the rules of conduct between nations and individuals.

We are under the dark shadow of war. This shadow is not cast by so-called pagan peoples but by supposedly Christian nations. This great plague has swept across most of the world. If we want a cure, we will have to look to the Divine Healer.

Rapid transportation and the ether waves have brought the nations of the earth into one community. The fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man, as taught by Jesus, anticipated just such a world as the one in which we live.

Our age needs to realize more that isolation is impossible and selfishness is destruction. The race of man is a unit in the sight of God. If we are children of the heavenly Father, we must see all men as brothers. Our Gospel has never been fully explored. There are in its storehouse those graces of spirit to fit every condition of the race.

We must go back to the Gospel of Christ, for there can be no permanent peace between nations until there is peace between man and God. To the church has been given the key. Will she unlock the door of the Spirit? Its growth will bring fruit that satisfies and saves the race from suicide.

May our prayer and work for peace not be selfish or short-sighted but rather let us pray and open our hearts to the Divine Spirit who will guide us in all things pertaining to life.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD

Your Bible Board, feeling that the Word of God is at once our necessary food for spiritual life, our source of comfort and encouragement in time of distress and trial, our strength and stay in temptation, our light for guidance in a world darkened by sin, and our offensive weapon to fight successfully the battle against the forces of evil, do urge the hearty and conscientious adoption of the following recommendations:

1. That both the ministry and laity give increased time and effort to the personal study and meditation of the Word of God, for the enrichment and development of personal religious experience.

2. That the chief aim of the preaching ministry of us all be the preparation and delivery of sermons that are inspired by and built upon the Holy Scriptures, thus obeying the injunction of the Apostle Paul "To preach the Word."

3. That in every county and community, serious study be given to the possibility of arranging elective courses of Bible study in the regular curriculums of our public schools, and, where possible, actively begin such courses of study.

4. That in every possible way our people be encouraged and led into a greater love and reverence for God's Word, using as means to this end the reading of the Bible among the people during pastoral visitation, and the distribution of both the Scriptures themselves and of such literature as the *Upper Room*, which encourages the reading of the Scriptures. We heartily commend the American Bible Society in its great work in this matter of the spreading of the Scriptures.

Your Board feels that if the high aims as outlined in such reports as that of Evangelism, Missions and Church Extension, and Christian Education are to be achieved, that they must be largely based upon the more full and effective use of the Holy Bible.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

This Corporation, jointly owned by this Conference and the North Carolina Conference, has had a fairly successful year. Its main business, as you know, is the publication of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*. There are now 10,000 subscribers within the bounds of the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. The property of the Corporation consists of the plant, 429 West Gaston Street, Greensboro, N. C., and equipment, valued at \$150,394.63, and other property valued at \$7,670.47. The plant is in good physical condition and is adequately insured.

Owing to recent decisions of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, we are now compelled to pay taxes upon our property, and that with rising prices has greatly increased operating expenses. In spite of that, our income for the last fiscal year exceeded our operating expenses by \$953.92.

A religious paper cannot depend to any appreciable extent upon its advertising and if we are to break even next year, we must secure a larger circulation. The Methodist homes in North Carolina which do not take any religious paper afford a wide market for our wares, and the clerical members of the two Conferences can help their charges by an active campaign to increase the circulation of the *Advocate*.

The job department of this Corporation is prepared to do excellent work, and Methodist preachers and laymen alike are invited to compare our work and prices with those of other printing establishments. Kindly give us a trial.

Dr. W. K. Greene of Duke University has been elected President of the Corporation succeeding our late lamented President, Dr. W. P. Few. Other officers are: Rev. A. J. Hobbs, Vice-President, and Thomas C. Hoyle, Secretary.

The term of office of James E. Lambeth has expired, and the Corporation nominated him to succeed himself. We, therefore, ask that the Western North Carolina Conference elect him to that position.

The Corporation elected Dr. M. T. Plyler and Dr. A. W. Plyler as Editors of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and business managers of the Corporation, and we respectfully request Bishop Purcell and his Cabinet to appoint Dr. A. W. Plyler as one of the Editors and Business Managers.

In order that we may have an enlarged circulation of the *Advocate* we recommend that this Conference adopt and pursue the following course:

1. That a quota of at least one new yearly subscription for every fifty members of each church, or charge, be secured in the two Conferences.

2. That in securing such quota the *Advocate* be put on a par with all other interests of the church, such as Missions, Orphanages and Conference claimants, so that the people may profit by the larger circulation of their church paper.

3. That the pastors have the full co-operation and support of the Woman's Societies of Christian Service and of the Boards of Lay Activities in circulating the *Advocate* in each and every church, so that this, the 87th year of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, may be the best in all its long history.

REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION

During the school year of 1940-41, the Wesley Foundation has served the two Annual Conferences in North Carolina by making substantial contributions to the support of church work for students at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. In feeling happy over encouraging reports from these two student centers, we must not forget the Methodist students in three state school situations where neither of the Conferences contribute to the support of spiritual cultivation. Something should be done to provide the resources which would enable your Commission to help develop an adequate program for all the 3,000 young people from Methodist homes who are attending our state colleges and universities.

At the University Church in Chapel Hill the students are showing appreciation of the beauty of the sanctuary and the social rooms, since they have been re-decorated. There are nerally 900 Methodists among the students, with a notable increase of young women. Besides the activity of students in their own Bible Class and Student Forum, there is much service rendered in the more inclusive program of the church. Students assist as ushers, members of the chorus choir, members of Church School Committees, and as members of the campus-wide Inter-faith Council. The Woman's Society of the Chapel Hill Church supplements the Student Fund in bearing the expenses of social gatherings. A card register of Methodist students, kept in the pastor's study, enables a visiting committee of the local church to make helpful contacts on the campus.

College Place Church, Greensboro, has supervision over the 685 Methodist young women who are enrolled in the Woman's College of U. N. C. Miss Louise Panigot is serving her second year as Wesley Foundation Director. Working with her is a nucleus of fifty-five students who are members of the several councils which develop a truly remarkable program of worship and service activities. In addition to the usual youth activities in church life there may be mentioned the following features, from among many: the Wesley Players giving sacred drama; the service program exercising local charity and supporting a native minister in the Congo; the student budget, handling \$200.00 annually; and co-operation in Methodist student work on a state-wide basis, and all programs of inter-denominational effort. Refugee students from Europe have found a Methodist welcome at Greensboro and the Student Council at College Place is helping to provide for two of them from student funds.

CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

The Western North Carolina Conference Brotherhood met in thirty-third annual session in Memorial Auditorium, Centenary Methodist Church, Winston-Salem, October 22, 1941, at 3:00 p. m., with the President, H. G. Allen, in the chair. The hymn, "O For a Thousand Tongues," was sung. A scripture lesson was read responsively, and Dr. J. E. Pritchard led in prayer. A chorus from the Winston-Salem Teachers College sang two numbers.

The Secretary read the minutes of Executive Committee meetings held in Statesville December 10, 1940, and September 16, 1941. He also read his report as follows: "The Brotherhood has lost more clerical members this year than ever before in its history. Ten brethren have died: Brothers T. F. Marr, N. M. Modlin, J. H. Brendall, Sr., J. L. Reynolds, G. G. Adams, F. F. Frisbie, J. C. Umberger, J. R. Anderson, Parker Holmes, and W. C. Dutton. The members, however, have responded with unusual promptness to the calls. Already we have been able to send at least nine hundred dollars of the twelve hundred dollar benefit to each of the widows, except in the case of the most recent death which occurred a very few weeks ago. Funds have been received at Conference to pay the total benefit to all the widows. Only 39 eligible preachers are not now members. During the year about 135 new lay contributors have been added, because of the splendid work of Mr. Edwin L. Jones, Conference Lay Director."

Mr. Edwin L. Jones was presented to the meeting. He spoke briefly, urging the preachers to solicit new lay members.

The following Nominating Committee was appointed: J. W. Moore, J. M. Barber, S. M. Needham, W. Q. Grigg, and H. C. Sprinkle. This Committee named the following officers for the new year: President, H. G. Allen; Vice-President, R. C. Goforth; Secretary-Treasurer, C. C. Herbert, Jr.; Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, F. C. Smathers; Director Laymen's Division, E. L. Jones; members of Executive Committee—H. G. Allen, R. C. Goforth, Paul Hardin, Jr., C. C. Herbert, Jr., L. E. Mabrey, W. J. Plint, and C. C. Weaver. On motion, these were elected unanimously.

Dr. Paul N. Garber, Dean of the Duke Divinity School, was presented and he delivered a forceful and inspiring address. His central thought was that the high moments of the Christian church have always come when the principle of Brotherhood was practised. He traced the course of Brotherhood through the Christian centuries, and pointed out particularly its vigor in the early days of American Methodism. In conclusion, he stressed the importance of our maintaining the principle of Brotherhood in the present dark day by active participation in the Conference Brotherhood.

J. W. Moore moved that President H. G. Allen present an invitation to the preachers to join the Brotherhood at the Conference session on Thursday morning. The motion carried.

The meeting adjourned with the singing of hymn, "Blest Be the Tie," and prayer by Rev. R. J. Parker.

Historical

1. Historical Sketch

“The Western North Carolina Conference shall include all North Carolina west of the North Carolina Conference, except Savannah Church, in Alleghany County, North Carolina; and also that part of North Carolina lying north of New River, and including that part of Virginia lying south of that river in the loop in Grayson County, Virginia; including all the territory in Carroll and Patrick Counties, Virginia, south of the crest of the Blue Ridge, and west of the Dan River.” (Discipline, 1940, paragraph 1418).

This territory is identical with that of the Western North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South. All three branches of Methodism forming The Methodist Church are included in this new Conference. From the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church came thirty-nine ministers and 11,901 church members. The North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church contributed seventy-four ministers and 22,361 church members. The Western North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, added 377 ministers and 167,028 church members. This gave the new Conference 490 ministers, with twenty-eight others on trial, and 201,290 church members. 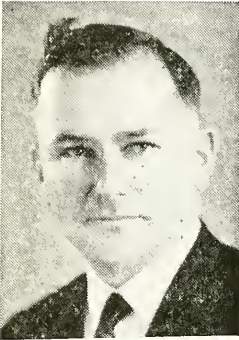

GILREATH GILDEROY ADAMS



The Reverend Gilreath Gilderoy Adams, son of A. M. and Robena Triplett Adams, was born in Mooresville, N. C., January 11, 1893. As a boy, he learned to respect the office of the ministry by an impressive and rewarding companionship with his grandfather, the Reverend T. L. Triplett, by whom he was impressed and inspired to choose as his life's motto:

"O Master, let me walk with Thee
In lowly paths of service free."

Following service in the United States Army in 1918, he continued his preparation for the ministry, graduating from Rutherford College in 1919, and Trinity College, now Duke University, in 1921.

He was admitted into the Western North Carolina Conference at the annual session in High Point in the fall of 1921.

Brother Adams served faithfully the following charges: Norwood Circuit, 1921-1925; Stanley Circuit, 1925-1927; Field Secretary of Epworth League work, 1927-1930; Gold Hill Circuit, 1930-1932; Cramerton, 1932-1934; Bessemer City, 1934-1936; Matthews, 1936 until the time of his death, June 1, 1941. He served a total of five years as Field Secretary of Epworth League work, and for eleven years he was dean of the Young People's Conference.

While serving the Norwood Circuit, Brother Adams was married to Gertrude Falls, June 28, 1923. To them were born two sons, Gilreath Gilderoy Adams, Junior, and Nelson Falls Adams, who, with Mrs. Adams, survive.

Those congregations to which Brother Adams was appointed during the years of his ministry remember him as a rare personality and a devoted servant of his Lord. In many of their hearts there will abide a sense of the sacrament of his royal manhood.

As a servant of God he walked reverently and courageously. He was a man of quiet, but impressively tender spirit. There was about his very presence a virtue that greatly enriched the lives of those who moved within the influence of his Godly walk, which, after all, was his greatest sermon.

Both in his life and in his death Brother Adams was an inspiration to his brethren in the ministry. Those of us who were present for his funeral, at which Bishop Purcell spoke, were deeply moved as the following hymn, one of his favorites, brought to us a new challenge to rededicate our lives to that type of ministry of which his life was an example:

"Rise up, O men of God!!
Have done with lesser things;
Give heart and mind and soul and strength
To serve the King of kings.

"Rise up, O men of God!
His kingdom tarries long;
Bring in the day of brotherhood
And end the night of wrong.

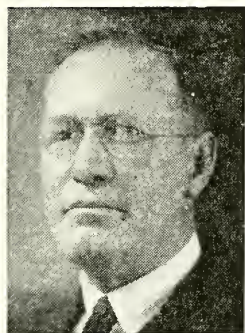
"Rise up, O men of God!

JOHN ROGERS ANDERSON



John Rogers Anderson, son of John and Addie Anderson, was born at Sunnyside, Henry County, Georgia, on July 5, 1875, and departed this life at Randleman, N. C., July 7, 1941, his age being sixty-eight years and two days. In early life Brother Anderson became a Christian and joined the former Methodist Protestant Church. While yet a young man he felt that God had called him to preach and he began to prepare for his life's work. He was licensed to preach and was admitted on trial in the Georgia Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church in 1899. In 1903 he was ordained and admitted into full connection. His zeal for the work of the ministry caused

him to rise rather rapidly in the work of the conference. He was an evangelistic preacher and his sermons were accompanied with spiritual power. Both in his early and his latter days he did a great deal of preaching in revival meetings and he had the great joy of seeing a large number of people come to the altar of the church and of seeing them saved.

His ability was recognized by the Georgia Conference in that he served as its president three five-year terms, making fifteen years in all that he had the responsibility of being at the head of his conference.

In 1926 Brother Anderson transferred to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church. His first pastorate in N. C. was at Albemarle where he served from Nov., 1926, to Nov., 1930. In Nov., 1930, he was assigned to the Welch Memorial Church in High Point where he remained for one year. In Nov., 1931, he returned to Albemarle where he served until Nov., 1934. From Nov., 1934, to Nov., 1936, he served at Lincolnton, and in Nov., 1936, he was assigned to the Mt. Hermon Circuit where he served until Nov., 1939. In Nov., 1939, he was assigned to the Randleman Circuit where he served until the time of his passing. During Brother Anderson's second pastorate at Albemarle he led the forces of the church in building the beautiful new brick church building which still stands as a monument to his energy and leadership.

Wherever he served Brother Anderson made many true and lasting friends. His people felt that he stood for the things that were right and they stood by him. As an evidence of the esteem in which he was held by the people of his native state and as a further testimony of his interest in lost souls he made an annual pilgrimage to Georgia to preach in a camp meeting where he labored years ago.

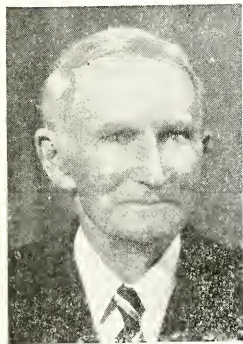

JOSEPH HENRY BRENDALL



Joseph Henry Brendall was born May 6, 1858, near Franklin, North Carolina, county seat of Macon County, the son of Amanda Jane Saunders and Joseph Woodberry Brendall. He was the eldest son in this family of eight children; therefore, much of the responsibility of the farm rested upon him. With the help of the love of the soil which was rightfully inherited from his Dutch ancestors, he made a good job of farming. In early manhood the father of J. H. Brendall suffered two strokes and became an invalid for life. The management of much of the home and farm in the trying period about the War between the States became the lot of this man whom today we tenderly remember. But his management of the farm was good; the indebtedness was removed and, with some little money left, J. H. Brendall decided that he would give attention to a long felt desire to answer what he believed to be a call into the ministry of the church. Living in the days of hard work and poor schooling, he had learned most of his education at the knee of his sainted mother who called upon him for recitations and closely graded her son's progress. Through the life of his good mother he became very familiar with the Holy Scriptures and constantly read them when a mere youth. This being about the only book in the home, most of his reading and educational lessons came from the Scriptures. In them he was well versed.

Upon reaching the age of nineteen, J. H. Brendall enrolled in the schools of Franklin, North Carolina. Being one of the old type boarding schools, this industrious young man found work and, by time spent during odd and late hours, succeeded in getting successfully through the high school course.

Soon after finishing high school he began to teach in an elementary school in his own neighborhood. From the inspiration and persuasion of a Metho-

dist minister, J. H. Brendall decided to enter college. Leaving home on foot, with little money on his person, but endowed with the ambition of youth, he traveled on foot one hundred and twenty-five miles of mountain land and enrolled in Hiwassee College in Tennessee, entering the college at twenty-two years of age. He divided his time while at Hiwassee College by teaching in the public schools and studying at the college. Upon completing the four-year course for the A. B. Degree and definitely deciding to give his life to his Lord and His church, this man, in a desire to completely prepare himself for the important task ahead, proceeded to study three additional years while preaching in the surrounding community and after that time he was awarded his M. A. Degree.

Joseph Henry Brendall joined the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1883 and was admitted into full connection in 1885. This was the beginning of a long and fruitful ministry for his church. It was broken only once and that was when he did further study in college at the University of Indiana from which he was awarded his Ph. D. Degree in 1907. From his admittance into the Holston Conference in Chattanooga, Tennessee, to his superannuation in 1929, J. H. Brendall served his church in three conferences—the Holston, the Saint Louis, and the Western North Carolina. Twenty-five different appointments were given him as his privilege to declare the gospel of his Christ. He was superannuated in 1929 by his conference at his request. For eleven years this grand preacher of the old day became the “superannuated beloved” to the people in the Muirs Chapel community, near Greensboro, where for eleven years he was their friend, adviser, and comrade in the upward way. Always was he glad to do his bit in whatever way the local church called him to serve, by opening church school, offering the prayer, or as long as physically able, preaching to them on various occasions. From the day he entered the conference on trial to the day of his death elapsed a period of fifty-seven years. Glory, glory, glory, for the strength and mind and heart to serve the King of kings far beyond a half-century. Many can be the laudatory remarks about this man—many are the words that can be said in singing his praise, but sum it all up this way: “Here we bow to the memory of a great man—great because of the depth of his consecration and the height of his faith in God. Great because in his heart he heard a call from his Master and with his life for over a half-century he answered that call.” Gone now to be in that land where justice and mercy shall be abundant; but he shall be not a stranger to them for they were part of the equipment which he used in proclaiming his message.

To tarry for a little while yet is his good and faithful wife, Mrs. Sara Tritt Brendall, who shared with him for long, long years the joys and heart-aches, yea, deep sacrifices of yesterday's Methodist preacher. Six children came into their home, two of whom carry the mantle of the ministry today in the same conference which, for forty-six years, their father actively served. I refer to the Reverend J. H. Brendall, Jr., of Winston-Salem, North Carolina, and the Reverend Earl Hall Brendall, of Belmont, North Carolina. Mr. Harley Brendall is at home with his mother on the Muirs Chapel Road in Greensboro. Mrs. Lillian Brendall Davis lives at Summerfield, North Carolina, and Marvin C. Brendall lives in Tryon, North Carolina.

WILLIAM CLARKE DUTTON

William Clarke Dutton was admitted on trial in the W. N. C. Conference in 1931. He was educated at Emory & Henry College (2 years), Emory University (1 yr.), and Duke University (2 yrs.). His native home was Cedar Springs, Smith County, Virginia. His home church was old Blue Springs, which a couple of generations back had nurtured a famous old circuit rider saint, Robert Sawyers Sheffey. The diminutive Dutton appeared not only to have grown up in and absorbed the traditional spirit of the older saint, but also to have inherited the full mantle of his evangelistic fervor and his powerful faith. Brother Dutton came to this conference already aflame with evangelistic zeal, and he never lost it until it

literally consumed his physical energy. For nine years it did not seem that he ever wholly relaxed in his relentless effort to capture another soul.

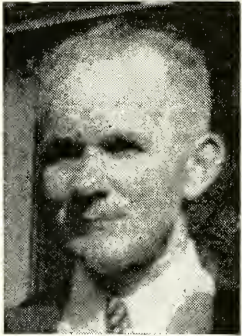
The charges he held were: Summerfield, 1931; North Monroe-Grace, 1932-7; Midway, Kannapolis, 1938-9. During these nine years he received 807 members into the church, 662 of them on profession of faith. However, the zenith of his splendid evangelistic work was reached during his last two active years at Midway. There within two years he received nearly 400 members, most of them on profession of faith. But he was at the same time heavily engaged in a large building enterprise, the erection of an adequate edifice of worship for the fast growing congregation. It was while he was carrying along together these two exacting phases of his pastoral duties that he suffered nervous exhaustion, and a subsequent collapse. From this illness he failed to recover, although he was given full leave of absence from duty.

Death came to Brother Dutton at his paternal home in Virginia on Sept. 26th, 1941. He was born in 1900 and was aged 41 years. He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Flora Black Dutton, and three children, Ruth Clarke, 8; Stella Flo and Alma Jo, twins, 3. The funeral service was conducted at Blue Springs Church by Rev. A. C. Gibbs and Rev. L. F. Strader, assisted by the local pastor, and with a number of the Wytheville District ministers attending. Interment followed in the family plot there

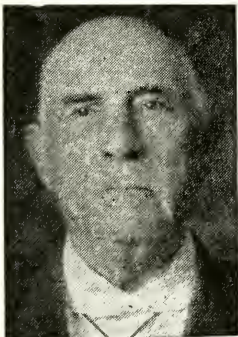

PARKER HOLMES

The announcement of the death of Rev. Parker Holmes on Sunday, September 7, 1941, brought sorrow to his many friends throughout this and other states, for he was loved by all who knew him.

He was born in Columbus County, N. C., November 4, 1857, son of George W. and Sarah Nye Holmes; spent his earlier life on the farm; was educated in local schools and Trinity College (now Duke University); was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference at Greensboro in 1889 and assigned to Summerfield Circuit, and in 1890 after the Western North Carolina Conference was organized, he returned to Summerfield for another year.

At the Asheville Conference in 1891 he was ordained deacon by Bishop Charles B. Galloway and at the Charlotte Conference in 1893 was ordained elder by Bishop W. W. Duncan.

The charges he served for one year only were Weddington, Brevard Street (Charlotte), Mooresville, Newton and Salisbury; but he broke the record by serving four full years at Asheboro, Wadesboro, Hickory, Thomasville, North Wilkesboro, Forest City and Walkertown, besides four years as presiding elder of Marion District and six years at Central Terrace, Winston-Salem, after which he retired from active service, making a total of forty-five years of very effective work.

It will be noted that thirty-eight of these years were spent on only nine separate charges, which gives clear proof that his labors were abundant and appreciated by the people who gladly kept him as long as the church law permitted.

Few preachers have made such a splendid record. He was a Mason and a member of the Pythian order. About 1905 the degree of Doctor of Psychology was conferred on him by the Chicago School of Psychology.

He was happily married December 20, 1892, to Miss Alice Virginia Dwiggins of Stokesdale, who was a worthy helpmeet, giving him constant inspiration and wise counsel and support through the long years of their married life.

Brother Holmes possessed a magnetic personality. He had countless friends and he "held them by hooks of steel." He believed in people and they believed in him. Having firm faith in God he necessarily had firm faith in humankind. His cheerful spirit carried sunshine into every circle he entered and gave him such a grip on the people that he bound them into closer fellowship and loyalty to the church, to more generous giving and wider outlook. His influence in every field of his activity reached beyond his own denomination, for he made friends among all sects and those affiliated with no church. Many of the latter listened to his pleading, forsook the evil and led model lives thereafter. He was a wonderful pastor who knew his people and knew all the children by name. He knew also how to organize his forces and get them to work.

The record shows that during his ministry thousands were added to the church on profession of faith and by certificate. He found in nearly every charge many who had lost touch with the church by change of residence and indifference. He cultivated and led many of these to active Christian service. He loved the lost and sought for those who needed to know that purity of heart was introduction into the presence of God, because only the pure in heart can see him.

The influence of his life cannot be altogether expressed in figures, for hidden beneath his outward work was that silent influence for good which God alone beheld.

He was a builder who built his people up in faith and character and then led them in forward movements. When he saw the need for a better temple of worship he started out with faith to build it, by first uniting his people for a building campaign.

In Hickory he found a heavy church debt, raised the money to pay it and had the church dedicated. Then he convinced the congregation to give liberal aid to build Fairview Church in West Hickory and it was built, paid for and dedicated during his pastorate there. He built the present church in North Wilkesboro and practically a new parsonage there. At Walkertown the commodious educational building was constructed and paid for. Church property was generally freed from debt before he moved to a new charge.

He did splendid work on the Marion District where new church enterprises were undertaken and old debts cancelled.

One of his great achievements, if not the greatest, was the building of the church in Thomasville during the money panic of 1907-1909. He completed the church, put in a pipe organ, and both were dedicated in August of the third year by Bishop James Atkins of Asheville.

Brother Holmes had great faith and the Lord crowned his efforts with success. He had the pleasure of having dedicated seven churches during his active ministry.

As a preacher, pastor, church builder and community leader he made a notable record and few men in the ministry have excelled him in consecrated service. When he retired from active work in 1934 he moved to Forest City, where he and Mrs. Holmes found welcome as beloved friends, and it was there he passed to his eternal reward September 7, 1941.

For several years past he was feeble in body but patient in spirit and strong in faith; so when the end came there was peace and glorious victory.

He left to his family and to society the rich heritage of a good name.

Besides his wife he left six children: Edison Holmes of Sanford, Mrs. G. C. McDaniel of Forest City, Robert Holmes of New York, Dr. Frances Holmes of McCausland, Los Angeles, California, Dr. George Holmes of Winston-Salem, and Mrs. E. H. Douglas, Jr., of Newburgh, N. Y. The funeral service was held in our Forest City Church on Monday afternoon, September 8, conducted by the pastor, Rev. W. H. Groce, Rev. J. C. Cornett, Rev. C. H. Peace, Dr. W. W. Ayers of the Forest City Baptist Church and the writer, after which the body was buried in the nearby Pleasant Grove Church graveyard.

THOMAS FRANKLIN MARR



Thomas Franklin Marr, the son of Benjamin Franklin Marr and Mary Garden Marr, was born at Brushy Creek, Macon County, now Swain, on August 18, 1863. He attended school in Macon County and spent two years at Hayesville College, an outstanding academy in operation at that time at Hayesville. Being denied the privilege of a higher education, by rigid self control and discipline his mental powers so unfolded and his sympathies so broadened and deepened that he became one of the truly educated men of his generation. In recognition of his attainments Trinity College conferred upon him the Doctor of Divinity degree at the June commencement in 1904.

On June 6, 1889, Dr. Marr married Miss Kannie Zachary of Cashiers, N. C. Mrs. Marr died on December 2, 1915. On January 29, 1918, he married Mrs. Julia Redwine Price, of Monroe and Charlotte, North Carolina. Surviving are

Mrs. Marr, Mrs. Frankie Marr Lewis, of Atlanta, Ga., a daughter by his first wife; and Roy F. Marr, of St. Petersburg, Fla., an adopted son.

Dr. Marr was licensed to preach in 1885, was received into full connection in the Holston Conference in 1888, and was ordained elder in 1890.

During his active ministry he served the following charges: Highlands, 1886-87; Glenville, 1887-88; Brevard, 1888-90; Hayesville, 1890-91; Bryson City, 1891-93; Bethel, Asheville, 1893-94; First Church, Salisbury, 1894-98; Waynesville District, 1898-99; Centenary, Winston-Salem, 1899-1901; Tryon Street, Charlotte, 1901-05; Wesley Memorial, High Point, 1905-07; Winston-Salem District, 1907-11; Trinity, Charlotte, 1911-15; First Church, Salisbury, 1915-16; Charlotte District, 1916-17; Hawthorne Lane, Charlotte, 1917-20; Educational Secretary, 1920-21; Salisbury District, 1921-25; Waynesville, 1925-26; Albemarle, 1926-30; and Marion, 1930-31. Upon retirement in 1931 he made his home in Brevard, N. C. During the years of his retirement he remained active as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Children's Home and Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Duke University.

Few ministers have had richer or more fruitful ministries than Dr. Marr; and few have lived to see their dreams more completely realized. While he was greatly beloved as a pastor and an able leader as a presiding elder, his greatest service was given to the church in the field of social service and of Christian education. Dearest to his heart, of course, was the Children's Home. He was elected president of the Board of Trustees of the Children's Home, Inc., on November 18, 1910. At the beginning of his administration there were less than one hundred children in the Children's Home, all being crowded into repaired wooden buildings of the abandoned Davis Military Academy. So wisely did he direct the policies of that institution that the campus acreage was doubled and greatly improved, twenty-one substantial brick buildings were constructed, nearly five hundred children enrolled and the Children's Home won recognition as one of the largest and best equipped homes for children in the entire Methodist Church in America.

Dr. Marr was also a member of the Board of Trustees of Rutherford and Trinity Colleges. In June, 1906, he was elected vice-president of the board of trustees of Trinity College, and helped develop that institution from a small college to a place of commanding leadership among our large universities. His last official act was to attend the Board of Trustees meeting in June, 1940, and up to the time of his death he had a comprehensive understanding of all problems relating to the University.

As a man, Dr. Marr was honest, sincere, humble and brotherly. He was a man of sound judgment. "If you want advice, see Dr. Marr," was a saying that became proverbial throughout the Conference. As a presiding elder he inspired confidence in his men by making them feel that they could accomplish things worth while. The secret of his success was that he loved his men. He was widely read, a keen student, and encouraged his men to become students. He was a gifted preacher and possessed a keen insight into the teachings of Jesus. Courteous, thoughtful, kind, and sympathetic, he was in every respect a Christian gentleman.

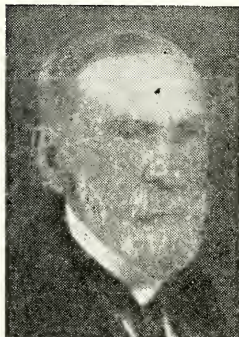
The life of a great and good man has come to a close. We feel keenly our loss, but we rejoice in the triumph of his Christian faith. At Robert Browning's funeral, Burne Jones felt that the service was all too gloomy. "Much would I have given for a banner or two," he wrote, "and much would

I have given if a chorister had come out of the triforium and rent the air with a trumpet." Banners and trumpets, symbols of victory. How fittingly do they accompany the departure of this great Christian!

THOMAS FILMORE McCULLOCH



Thomas Filmore McCulloch was born near Pleasant Garden, in Guilford County, North Carolina, July 28, 1851. He was the oldest of a family of six children.

He was educated in the public schools of his county, Yadkin College, and the University of North Carolina, a member of the class of 1884.

He joined Tabernacle Methodist Protestant Church, Guilford County, at the age of nine years, and as a boy in his teens he was elected superintendent of the Sunday School at his home church. He was also granted license to preach by this church.

In November, 1873, he was married to Miss Eleanor Coe, daughter of Wesley A. and Martitia Wood Coe,

and granddaughter of Rev. John Coe, one of the pioneers of the Methodist Protestant Church in North Carolina. Mrs. T. F. McCulloch went to her reward in 1934. To this union were born six daughters, all of whom are noble Christian characters and faithful workers in the Methodist Church. It is also interesting to note that all of them are members of Calvary Methodist Church, Greensboro. The daughters are: Mrs. H. A. Garrett, Mrs. J. Frank Coble, Misses Velna, Pearl, Mary Wills and Sarah McCulloch.

He was admitted to the Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church in North Carolina in 1878. He was ordained the following year in 1879.

During his years as active pastor he served the following charges in the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church: Monroe, 1877-78; Orange, 1879-81; Granville, 1882; Flat Rock, 1883; Roanoke, 1884; Greensboro, 1885-86; Cedar Falls, 1887; Asheboro, 1888-90; Randolph, 1891-92; Uwharrie, 1893; Lincoln, 1894-96; Davidson, 1897-98; Alamance, 1899-1900; Orange, 1901; Lincoln, 1902-04; Stanly, 1905-06; Fairview, 1907-08; Lincoln, 1909-11; Caroleen and Glen Raven, 1912; Guilford, 1913; Spring Church, 1914-15; West Forsyth, 1916-17; Mocksville, 1918-20; Davidson, 1922.

After serving the Davidson Charge he was superannuated, but he continued to preach when an opportunity presented itself. He gave forty-five years of faithful service to the ministry.

Rev. T. F. McCulloch was studious and alert as long as he lived. He never grew old. He always championed the cause of prohibition and was an advocate of Methodist union. He emphasized Sunday School work on his charges, and as a result, won the hearts of young people wherever he went. He was a man discreet in his habits, neat in appearance, kind and gentle in manner and firm in his convictions for the right.

On the afternoon of August 20, 1941, Rev. Thomas Filmore McCulloch, aged 90 years, having faithfully used all the talents entrusted to him, was called to enter into the joys of his Lord. The funeral service was held in Calvary Methodist Church, Greensboro, August 21, 1941, where Brother

McCulloch had been a charter member for sixteen years. The body was tenderly laid to rest in the Tabernacle Methodist Church yard, ten miles south of Greensboro.

N. M. MODLIN



In the midst of the great Civil War Rev. N. M. Modlin was born. To be exact, he was born on January 5, 1863, in Guilford County, North Carolina. His parents were Clark Modlin and Martha Robins Modlin.

On June 22, 1884, he was married to Miss Alice Wilson at Haw River, North Carolina. To this union there were born eleven children, five of whom are still living—B. M., M. E., Vern, Bertha, and Pollye. His good wife remained with him until June 10, 1923, when she passed to her reward. On January 4, 1933, he was married to Mrs. Ollie Morris, who gave to him more than eight years of unremitting care and attention, and who still abides with us.

Brother Modlin was brought up in the tradition of the Methodist Protestant Church, having been educated at Yadkin College, North Carolina, which was then the conference college of Methodist Protestantism in North Carolina. In line with this training he joined the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church in 1889, his ministry thus covering approximately a half century of service. For thirteen years he served as a pastor in this connection, and then transferred his membership to the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. During this period he served the following charges: Lincolnton Ct., Leicester Ct., Table Rock Ct., Rock Springs Ct., Morganton Ct. (twice), Cliffside, Plateau, Polkville, Denton, and Fines Creek.

After his retirement in 1923 he lived in Lincolnton, N. C., where his life so endeared him to those who knew him that his last years were happy. He died December 26, 1940, passing away peacefully in his sleep during the night. His funeral was conducted in the First Methodist Church at Lincolnton, with Rev. L. D. Thompson in charge, assisted by the Reverends E. M. Jones, E. L. Kirk, J. W. Combs, and D. H. Rhinehardt. He was buried in Lincolnton.

Brother Modlin was first of all a Christian gentleman. He strictly enforced on himself the requirements of a Christian and was firmly convinced that those who profess to be Christians should not lower their standards of moral living under any circumstances. He believed that the vows that he took as a minister and as a member of the church were to be observed and not trifled with.

His greatest delight, however, was in preaching. He felt that he was called to preach and that call was not to be taken lightly. I dare say that in these days when a preacher's work embraces so many other things than preaching, he might not have been happy in the modern ministry, but he was happy as a preacher. He delighted to preach, and preached when called on. When he was not in the pulpit he was to be found in the pew, for he loved his church and was never happier than when present at her services. He has left behind a record which doubtless has already won a well earned "Well done."

WILLIAM ALEXANDER PATTON



William Alexander Patton was born March 22, 1856, at Marion, Va. His father, John McClung Patton, was of the Patton lineage of Westmoreland County, Va., but had moved to Marion for a business enterprise. John McClung Patton, a Mr. Reed, and Cyrus McCormick were makers of the famous wheat fan and other farming implements. The Patton home thus established in Marion, Va., became the birthplace of W. A. Patton, two sisters now deceased, and Reed Patton of Bridgeport, Conn.

The Pattons were church-goers and citizens of a high order. John McClung Patton was elected the first mayor of Marion, Va., when it was incorporated.

He was elected on a prohibition ticket and the town has voted "dry" ever since that day in 1872. W. A. Patton thus had a great example before him. "Will's" father was a loyal Presbyterian, his mother an Episcopalian. At Marion they joined the M. E. Church, South, together. Very soon their home became the stopping place for Methodist preachers. It was not unusual for a number of preachers to spend several days there in fasting and prayer before going to district or annual conferences. Because of these factors "Will" got a taste of something sustaining, though he and his brother and their sisters were orphaned while yet of a tender age.

W. A. Patton made his mark in the architectural world before he began his ministry. After his father's death the children had gone to live in Fairfield. From Fairfield "Will" returned to Marion where he learned carpentering, finishing work, and cabinet building. His skill was in demand in Marion. At the age of twenty-eight he came to Ashe County, N. C., to finish a house for Mr. Calvin Graybeal. He married Rose Ellen Graybeal, the daughter of Calvin, and remained in N. C. following that event of January 9, 1884.

Twelve years after marriage Mr. Patton ceased fighting the call to the ministry which he said that he had felt from early youth. The Bible, a book which he had not neglected through the years, began to bear fruit through his interpretation of it, and through his life.

The time which he had spent using his skillful hands was not wasted though he began to preach when past the age of forty. One Mr. Barlow who grew up in Ashe County, N. C., and who was for a time Western Agent for the Royal Typewriter Co., sent Rev. Mr. Patton a typewriter as a gift and a letter from which the following excerpt is taken:

July 13, 1929

"One of the very first vivid impressions made upon me in my childhood by a personality other than my father was made by a tall, lithe, friendly man who could make pretty things with smoothing planes, saws, and hammers. Moreover he could command other men in his employ, not by force of his authority over them, but by his leadership, kindness and personal winsomeness. He was a fellow who, though he worked hard at his job, had time to take an intelligent and helpful interest in the doings of others—even in the little boys who (ordinarily) were charged to keep in the background. Indeed this same man first brought to me something from the out-

side world, something in the way of skill with tools. The very shavings which fell from his smoothing plane excited in my young mind flights of imagination altogether different from those of any of his helpers."

The letter tells further of the magic with which the house went up. And it is related further how, to this boy, even the way in which this master builder chewed tobacco was decent. There is also described the lad's anguish of soul at seeing the master-builder kneeling before some preachers whom he frankly declared were not half so good as Patton. His hero was being ordained.

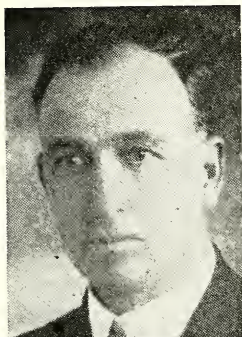
The years were to prove that W. A. Patton had at last found his proper sphere. This story of his ministry is practically coincident with the history of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former M. E. Church. His strong and well cared for body enabled him to serve actively for thirty-two years. He preached altogether for thirty-five years.

He was a leader among men. He served as District Superintendent for twelve years. The minutes of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference show that the work grew steadily under his supervision. He was an evangelistic preacher, winning 1,000 converts by 1916, a period representing half of his fruitful years. He was not dogmatic except for the right to be dogmatic. He read men's hearts from the hovel to the mansion and pointed them to the way. He loved children and they called him Granddaddy Patton. He loved men and he watched them play baseball almost as eagerly as he watched them come to the altar. He loved God with all his heart, soul, mind and strength and his neighbor even as himself. Someone said of him: "He is an elegant gentleman." Another who knew him intimately said: "He did not impress one especially as an orator but he soon held you spellbound by his personality and apt sayings. His illustrations were clear and fitly placed. His life was clean, honest, transparent. His mind was a well filled store, orderly, direct, lucid. He was at home in the pulpit, in the councils of the church, or around the fireside."

W. A. Patton, born March 22, 1856, converted 1876, licensed 1896, joined the conference 1898, deacon, 1899, elder 1902, retired 1929, died Nov. 11, 1940.

Rev. Mr. Patton is survived by his wife and daughter Ollie who live at the Patton home at Lansing, N. C.; by Walter, John, sons; and Mrs. Edgar A. Farmer, daughter, all of Lansing, N. C.; Prof. Wm. Henry Patton of Epworth, Ga.; and Mrs. C. S. Bumgarner and Rev. Mrs. J. L. A. Bumgarner of Millers Creek, N. C.

JOSEPH LETCHER REYNOLDS

Joseph Letcher Reynolds was born in Buncombe County, North Carolina, January 26, 1879. On the morning of February 20, 1941, death invaded our active ranks and claimed another of our faithful and beloved ministers. When the news of his going broke upon our ears, we knew that while a strong body had failed and finally fallen, a brave and noble spirit had returned unto God who gave it.

His entire life was given to service; first in the teaching profession where he labored for a number of years. But he felt somewhat as Paul, the Apostle, "Woe is me if I preach not the Gospel." So he started preaching and received his local preacher's license in Asheville, North Carolina, March 24, 1921; he was admitted on trial into the W. N. C. Conference the same year. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Denny in Statesville, October 18, 1923, and ordained elder by Bishop Denny in Winston-Salem, October 21, 1925.

During his fruitful ministry of twenty years in our conference he served the following pastoral charges: Sandy Mush, Jefferson, Wilkesboro, Burnsville, and he was in his fifth year on the Acton Charge when he was called to his heavenly home. He was a man who was popular with his people, and served long pastorates. His preaching was evangelistic and effective, and he was in great demand as an evangelist. His appeal to the unsaved was almost irresistible, and hundreds of people were converted under his preaching.

Brother Reynolds was married to Miss Sue Mackey of Old Fort, N. C., December 29, 1910, who, "hand in hand and heart with heart" labored with him in the service of Christ until his work was done. To this union were born six children—Helen, Sarah, John, Lucille, Ruth, and Joe, who, with the widowed mother, survive.

The funeral service was conducted in West Asheville Methodist Church on Saturday, February 22, by Dr. M. T. Smathers, District Superintendent, assisted by Rev. T. A. Groce, Rev. A. C. Tippet and Rev. L. V. Hall. The church was filled to capacity with friends, including a large number of ministers, gathered to pay their tribute of love and esteem in memory of a brother and pastor who had wrought long and well in the service of his Lord. His body was laid to rest in Riverside Cemetery, Asheville, N. C., not far from the home of his childhood.

He was a man of God who found his chief joy in going about doing good. No home was ever too poor and humble for him to enter in the name of his Christ. Truly a good man has gone from us, but we shall be comforted by our faith in Him who is the resurrection and the life, and in whom we have life everlasting.

These words of Edgar A. Guest represent the spirit of our departed brother:

MY CREED

"To live as gently as I can;
 To be, no matter where, a man;
 To take what comes of good or ill
 And cling to faith and honor still;

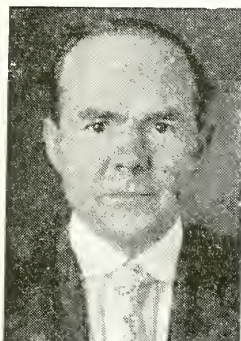
To do my best, and let it stand

JOHN CRITTENDEN UMBERGER



John Crittenden Umberger, son of Charles Wiley Umberger and Eliza Martin Umberger, was born in Giles County, Virginia, May 8, 1874. In early manhood he moved with his parents to Mt. Ulla, N. C., which became the permanent home of the Umberger family and the home of J. C. Umberger except for the years of his ministry. He joined Knox Chapel and soon the church through his efforts was getting the benefits of a year-round church school. Through the years, he held every office and served in every position of the local church.

Having been born of a preacher family, Brother Umberger found such joy in the work of the church that he began to consider the ministry as his life calling. Consequently, he was licensed as a local preacher at Statesville in 1905. Realizing that an entry into the traveling connection required not only a call but also a preparation to meet it, he began training in college and university. Building upon two years of farm training at V. P. I. prior to 1900, he took some studies at Rutherford College, and after one year entered Trinity College, now Duke University, graduating in 1914. He then went to Emory University, Ga., for his theological training, earning his B. D. degree from that institution in 1916. His admission on trial into the Western North Carolina Conference the same year replenished the ministerial ranks with a man having preparation afforded by only a few of his day.

In 1917 Brother Umberger was married to Miss Beulah Dwyer of Fort Worth, Texas. She was a faithful helper as he attended to the pastoral duties on the following charges: Gibsonville, Franklin Circuit, Highlands, Woodleaf, Westford in Concord, Bethel in Anson County, Peachland, East End Gastonia, Marshall-Hot Springs, Old Fort, and Macon Circuit.

His ministry, 1916-1932, was not lengthy. Sixteen years often compose little more than one third of an itinerant preacher's service. But he began at the age of forty-two. His charges, nevertheless, saw him respond to their challenge with faith, hard work, and sacrifice. He had deep insight to the problems of

rural church life. Particularly was his skill developed in working out means of paying church debts. At the end of his service in 1932 his health was not good, and he retired with his family to the farm at Mt. Ulla. During his retirement he passed through extraordinary sorrows, but he bore them with fortitude. In trouble, he could rejoice that he was allied with God. His attitude was:

“Then, welcome each rebuff
That turns earth’s smoothness rough,
Each sting that bids nor sit nor stand but go!”

He was a cooperative attendant at Knox Chapel, giving the pastor any assistance he could.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Beulah Umberger; three children—Dwyer, student at State College, Raleigh; Margaret, student at Greensboro College; and John of Mt. Ulla. He leaves three sisters and two brothers—Mrs. J. M. Terrell, who has spent forty-five years as a missionary to Brazil; Mrs. J. J. Edwards, wife of a deceased Methodist minister; Miss Brooke Umberger of Mt. Ulla; O. T. Umberger of Statesville; and Kent W. Umberger of Mt. Ulla.

Brother Umberger was critically ill for five months. He died at the Lowrance Hospital in Mooresville, June 20, at the age of 67 years. Funeral services were conducted the next day in Knox Chapel by the pastor, Rev. Y. D. Poole, assisted by Reverends J. S. Hiatt, J. W. Hoyle, J. C. Reichard, and the writer. Several other ministers were present. Burial followed in the church cemetery.

STANDING RULES

Rules of Order and Procedure for the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. The Rules of the preceding Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference insofar as they may apply, otherwise Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, shall govern the procedure of this Annual Conference.

II. ORGANIZATION

2. (1) The Secretary: The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually by the Conference, at its first session; and on nominations arising from the floor.
3. (2) Assistant Secretaries: The Secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
4. (3) The Treasurer: The Conference Treasurer shall be elected, on nomination of the Commission on World Service and Finance, at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference. He shall serve for the quadrennium, or until his successor be elected and qualified. (See Discipline, 1940, Paragraph 838.)
5. (4) Statisticians: The Conference Statistician shall be elected annually by the Conference on nomination of the Cabinet. There shall also be two assistant statisticians from each District, nominated by the several District Superintendents and approved by the Cabinet as a whole. It shall be the duty of the Conference Statistician, in keeping with paragraph 228 (13) of the Discipline, 1940, to supervise the work of the District Statisticians in compiling the statistics as the Conference may order.
6. (5) Auditor: The Auditor (or auditors) shall be elected annually by the Conference on nomination of the Commission on World Service and Finance. (See Paragraph 801, Discipline, 1940.)
7. (6) Conference Stenographer: The Conference Secretary shall employ the Conference Stenographer.
8. (7) Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given the above officers for their services and also the method and/or amount for meeting expenses of said offices. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts from the Conference Expense Fund.
9. (8) Boards, Commissions and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members to all

Boards, Commissions and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.

10. (9) Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the Resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. The Committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers; and this shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
11. (10) Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of four ministers and three laymen. This Committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference, following the General Conference, and shall serve for the quadrennium. It shall be the duty of this Committee to advise with local entertainment committees, and, as the Conference may direct, to determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions.
12. (11) (a) Committee on Memoirs: The ministers who are selected to write memoirs for deceased members of the Conference shall constitute the Conference Committee on Memoirs. From this number the Cabinet shall designate a chairman for the session.
(b) Memorial Service: There shall be held annually a memorial service at a time which the Program Committee shall determine. Each minister preparing a memoir shall be given two minutes to give a personal testimony to the deceased brother about whom he has prepared the memoir. The memoir will be printed in the Conference Journal. There shall be one main speaker, selected by the Program Committee, to deliver the Memorial Address.
13. (12) Committee on Daily Minutes: A Committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report to the Conference for approval.
14. (13) Courtesies and Resolutions: At the first session of the Conference annually there shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions.
15. (14) Conference Journal: At the first session of the Conference, following the General Conference, there shall be elected a Committee on

Publication of the Conference Journal, This Committee shall be composed of three ministers and two laymen and shall serve for four years. The duties of this Committee shall be to advise with the Editor of the Conference Journal and make recommendations to the Conference regarding the publication of the Journal.

16. (15) Bible Board: The Conference shall constitute a quadrennial Bible Board. This Board shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

17. (1) All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (typewritten if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary before the report or resolution shall be read to the Conference for consideration.
18. (2) Any amendment offered to any paper and all motions of more than a single sentence must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary.

IV. MINISTERIAL CHARACTER

19. Ministerial character shall be passed in open Conference; provided that the Conference may order an executive session of the ministerial members to consider questions relating to matters of ordination, character and Conference relations. (See Paragraph 465, Discipline, 1940.)

V. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

20. (1) Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually by the Quarterly Conference at least 30 days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
21. (2) The District Superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference from his District at least 30 days before the Annual Conference session and shall immediately transmit the completed list to the Conference Secretary.

VI. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND STATISTICS

22. (1) Each pastor shall complete table II of his annual report to Conference immediately after the last Sunday in September, and transmit that table to his District Superintendent not later than October 7th.
23. (2) Tables I and III shall be completed and turned in not later than the first day of the Conference session. The District statisticians may receive these reports.

24. (3) Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
25. (4) Table III shall be made out in even dollars only.
26. (5) Tables I, II, and III shall be printed in the Conference Journal only by charges.
27. (6) A fourth table of individual church reports, as approved by the Annual Conference, shall be compiled by the statisticians from the pastors' reports. This table shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

VII. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

28. (1) Editor: The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility for editing the Conference Journal in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference and under the direction of the Conference Committee on the Publication of the Conference Journal.
29. (2) Number Printed: The number of copies of the Journal printed any year shall be determined by the demand and sales of the previous year.
30. (3) Bids for Printing: The Editor shall be required to receive at least two bids from reputable printers for the publication of the Conference Journal before awarding the contract for the printing. (This paragraph shall become effective for Conference Journal of 1943.)
31. (4) Journals shall be sent to the charges on the basis of the number for which that charge paid the preceding year.
32. (5) Each Conference claimant shall be sent one copy of the Journal each year without charge.
33. (6) All other copies (See paragraph above), except those used strictly in Conference business and those sent to General and Conference Boards and Commissions, shall be sold at 25c each, or single copies by mail 35c each.
34. (7) Each District Superintendent shall serve as an agent for his District from whom the pastors may receive additional Journals if needed and to whom they may return unsold copies.
35. (8) The District Treasurers will receive the money from the charges for the Journals sold; and the District Superintendent will be charged with the responsibility of having a check-up of Journal accounts by the meeting of the District Conference. Pastors shall be expected to pay for Journals not returned by the meeting of the District Conference.

VIII. DISTRICTS

36. (1) There shall be eleven Districts in this Annual Conference.
37. (2) A District Conference shall be held annually in each District.
38. (3) Each pastoral charge shall elect annually four delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex-officio delegates.
39. (4) The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician, as early in the Conference year as possible, an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conferences Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges.
40. (5) The District Superintendent, as early in the Conference year as possible, shall furnish the Bishop and the Conference Treasurer a schedule of the salaries of the pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences.

IX. AMENDMENTS

41. These Standing Rules may be, by a two-thirds vote, amended on the next day after an amendment has been presented in writing; provided, the rules fixing the number of Districts and concerning the Conference Journal may be amended by a majority vote; provided further, a change in the number of Districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

X. WHEN RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

42. These Standing Rules of the Western North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference, except for Rule 30 (3) which rule does not become effective until the Journal of 1943 is being considered for publication.

Objectives for 1942-1943

1. Vigorous advances in and intensification of every phase of the regular church work with especial emphasis upon Bible study, evangelism, religious education, missionary cultivation, the Children's Home, the Golden Cross, Christian literature, education in stewardship, and woman's work.
2. Proclamation of a positive Christian message of comfort and hope through faith in the love of our Father, and of the ultimate triumph of the forces of righteousness.
3. Daily prayers among all our people for a just and permanent peace, for our men and women in the service and for the chaplains who minister to them, for our country and those in authority over us, and for the subjected peoples of the world.
4. Unremitting and aggressive opposition to the liquor traffic, both legal and illegal, and to the immoral conditions existing in our military areas.
5. Full co-operation with other Protestant churches in the Christian Education Advance.
6. Observance by all of our churches of the Week of Dedication, February 28 through March 7, with a free-will offering from our people on March 7 for Methodist war emergency work at home and abroad.
7. An offering for the Fellowship of Suffering and Service on each Communion Sunday.
8. Liquidation or substantial reduction of all local indebtedness.
9. Increase of 10% to 25% in acceptances of World Service apportionment and of Conference Benevolences.
10. Twelve or more great books read by every pastor in addition to devoted Bible study.
11. A minimum increase of 10% in salaries of all pastors receiving less than \$2,500.00 this year to meet the higher costs of living.

COMMITTEE ON DISTRICT CONFERENCE RECORDS—F. O. Dryman, J. S. Gibbs, L. R. Akers, Jr., C. W. Kirby, W. G. McFarland.

Bishop's Address: The opening address of the Conference was given by Bishop Purcell. Sections of this address were referred to proper Committees of the Conference. W. B. West made the motion that the Bishop be requested to have the address printed for general distribution. The motion was put by the Conference Secretary and unanimously adopted.

Standing Rules: W. A. Stanbury, for the Committee on Standing Rules, presented the report of the Committee and it was unanimously adopted. (See Section of the Conference Journal on Rules of Order and Procedure, Page 6.)

Question No. 10, "Are all ministerial members blameless in their life and official administration?" was called, and the name of W. C. Clark was called, his character was passed, and his name was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the supernumerary relation. The names of the retired men were called, their characters were passed, and they were referred to the same Committee for the retired relation, with the exception of W. H. Pless, who was left effective. The following were also referred to this Committee for the retired relation: L. B. Abernethy, R. M. Andrews, G. R. Brown, L. W. Colson, C. H. Hill, A. O. Lindley, W. F. McDowell, E. K. McLarty, Sr., A. W. Plyler, J. R. Warren, and J. D. Williams, by the retirement law of the church; and E. D. Ballard, J. H. Barnhardt, J. N. Randall, and C. M. White, because of ill health.

Question No. 23 (a), "Who have completed their studies of the first year?" was called; and G. M. Carver, W. D. Corriher, A. M. Faulkner (D), W. F. Heffner, J. P. Hornbuckle, Jr., J. H. Melzer, I. R. Miller, G. E. S. Miller, S. B. Moss, M. W. Nesbitt (D), R. H. Nicholson, R. H. Stamey, W. R. Thompson, and F. A. Wright, having passed the course of study, their characters were passed and they were advanced to the class of the second year. G. F. Conley was continued in the class of the first year.

Question No. 23 (c): The names of F. W. D. Bangle, G. W. Bumgarner, A. J. Clemmer, Jr., J. R. Hamilton, C. L. Heckard (E), G. A. Hovis, J. A. Lindsay (E), R. V. Martin, R. W. McCulley, McM. S. Richey, C. B. Ross, G. M. Schreyer (E), M. B. Shives, P. F. Snider, and H. H. Wood, were called, their characters were passed, and they were advanced to the class of the fourth year. J. W. Crawley remains in the class of the third year.

Elected Elders: Partially answering Disciplinary Question 23 (d), C. W. Avett, E. D. C. Brewer, J. W. Fowler, Jr., H. D. Garmon, J. J. Holmes, E. H. Lowman, J. E. Rink, W. C. Sides, Jr., and A. W. Wellons, having passed the course of study, were advanced out of the studies. Their characters were passed, and they were elected elders.

Sabbatical Leave: C. B. Way and K. G. Holt were, by unanimous vote of the Conference, granted Sabbatical leaves for the year.

Board of Publication: The report of the Methodist Board of Publication, Incorporated, was read by the Conference Secretary for the information of the Conference and was ordered published in the Conference Journal. (See Appendix.)

The Methodist Publishing House: Dr. A. R. White, from the Richmond Branch of the Methodist Publishing House, was presented to the Conference by Bishop Purcell and spoke briefly to the Conference. He handed to Bishop Purcell a check for \$3,514.65 as this Conference's part for Conference claimants in the profits of the Publishing House. Bishop Purcell thanked Dr. White. He then recommended several books and also urged the ministers to make a special study of the Bible this year.

Constitutional Amendments: The two constitutional amendments handed down to the Annual Conferences by the General Conference of 1940 were read by the Secretary, and the consideration of these amendments was made the order of the day for Wednesday morning, immediately following the devotions.

Admitted on Trial: In partial answer to Disciplinary Question 19, Carl William Dennis, Asheville District; Joseph Clere Phillips, George Harlan Needham, Charles Eugene Shannon, and Howard Charles Wilkinson, Charlotte District; William B. A. Culp, Salisbury District; and John James Powell, Statesville District, being duly recommended, were admitted on trial.

Memorial Service: Led by Bishop Purcell, the Conference Memorial Service began at 11:30 o'clock. The prayer was led by R. L. Ownbey. In answer to Question 11, "What ministerial members have died during the year?" the names of the following were given: J. E. Abernethy, D. A. Bailey, E. N. Crowder, D. V. Howell, J. W. Long, R. L. Melton, M. F. Moores, A. L. Rayle, G. A. Stamper, J. L. Teague, J. M. Wall, and E. K. Whidden; and tribute was paid to these by L. B. Hayes, Geo. R. Brown, F. C. Smathers, E. H. Blackard, W. L. Hutchins, J. E. McSwain, M. T. Smathers, E. M. Jones, W. M. Smith, W. L. Hutchins, B. A. Culp, and G. M. Carver, respectively. It was announced that the following heroines of the parsonage have died this year: Mrs. R. S. Abernethy, Mrs. D. F. Carver, Mrs. J. J. Edwards, Mrs. G. W. Hardison, Mrs. G. D. Herman, Mrs. I. L. Sharpe, Mrs. W. L. Sherrill, Mrs. J. H. Trolinger, and Mrs. A. H. Whisner. E. K. McLarty delivered the following memorial address: dress:

"OUR PEOPLE DIE WELL"

"Our people die well" is now a famous and familiar observation of Mr. Wesley. I think we do well to remember and cherish this saying of his for it has far-reaching significance. Augustine said, "It is not of importance whether life be long or short but it is of importance how a man dies."

May we not say of these our brethren in the ministry who have died this year—and of these sisters also—that they died well? I am sure we can.

We are all interested in the experience of death for it is certain to come to all of us. No one has any thought of escaping it. The most certain thing in life is death. God deliberately gave a place to death in His economy for this world, and God is good. "Sometime we'll understand."

What does it mean to die well? Can we transport ourselves, in imagination, to that old Roman prison where Paul is incarcerated? He can hear the horses feet and the wagons rumbling over the cobble stones near his cell. They are coming for some condemned man to take him out to the place of execution. "They may be coming for me," says Paul. "If so, it will be a swift passage into the presence of my Lord, and that would be the best of all. On the other hand, I may be set at liberty again. Then it would be my privilege to preach the glorious gospel of the blessed God of which I can never be ashamed. Then I could visit the churches and strengthen the brethren, and they need me so much. I find myself on the horns of a dilemma. If it were given me to make the choice, I don't know what it would be. For me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." He looks at one and smiles, then he looks at the other and smiles at the prospect. Death could never be a catastrophe to him. In either case it would be gain. To him life was Christ and death was more Christ, or gain. The Philippians were in tears over the prospect of his early martyrdom but he was undisturbed. He looked at death squarely in the face with unclouded face, unabashed and unafraid. That is something of what it means to die well.

Dr. Myer was informed that he had only a few days to live. And this is what he wrote to a friend: "I have just heard to my surprise that I have only a few days to live. It may be that before this reaches you I shall have entered the Palace. Don't trouble to write. We shall meet in the morning. With much love, Yours affectionately." On his eightieth birthday someone asked, "How is John Quincy Adams today?" The grand old man stood erect in his true dignity and, with a twinkle in his eye, replied: "John Quincy Adams himself is very well, thank you. But the house he lives in is getting a bit dilapidated. It is tottering on its foundations; its walls are badly shattered; its roof is worn. Its foundation trembles with every wind, and I think John Quincy Adams will have to move out before very long—but he, himself, is very well, thank you." How serene and beautiful!

Then those who die well render a great service to the cause of humanity. For there are multitudes who all their lives are held in bondage to the fear of death. Witnesses to the death of the martyrs were profoundly impressed by the way they died. It is a matter of record that many who were deputized to put the martyrs to death, when they saw how they died, adopted Christianity on the spot and died with them. A proverb arose in the church that the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the church. Tertullian wrote, "Every man who sees a martyr die is moved with some misgiving, and is set on fire to learn the reason; he inquires and is taught, and when he has learned the truth, he instantly follows himself as well. None would have wished to be killed, unless he was in possession of the truth."

Stephen died well and we think that his triumphant death won Saul of Tarsus to the Christian faith. That angel face and dying prayer quite vanquished him. They burned their way into his own heroic soul and brought him to the feet of the Saviour. Socrates died well. The venerable Bede spent his last hours on earth finishing his translation of the gospel of John, chanted the Gloria Patri and went away. John Wesley, himself, died well. Stevens' *History of Methodism* gives us a vivid description of his triumphant death. They came from far and near to visit him. They prayed and sang and shouted together. Almost his last words were, "The best of all is God is with us." But John Wesley was not always unafraid of death. We recall the lesson he learned from the Moravians in that stormy voyage on the Atlantic.

But Jesus Himself is our example in dying well. When He bowed His head and died the centurian, standing over against the cross, exclaimed, "Surely this was the Son of God." Most likely his acquaintance with Jesus had covered only a few hours at the last. Perhaps he was in command when the arrest was made in the garden. He witnessed Him as He stood before Caiaphas, Pilate and Herod. He directed the scourging and led Him to Calvary. He had seen many condemned men put to death. He had seen them die spitting at their executioners and cursing Rome, but he had never seen one die before praying for

his enemies. Surely man never died like this man. "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit." He had heard the charge made against Him that He claimed to be the Son of God. Now he was convinced that the claim was true and that a tremendous blunder had been made. He had arrested Jesus in the garden but Jesus arrested him by His death.

The whole of life is implicit in dying well. Dr. Glover says that the Christians out-thought, out-lived and out-died the pagans. If they out-thought them and out-lived them, certainly they out-died them. If a man wants to die the death of the righteous, he must first live the life of the righteous. Life is a unit. Life is one connected whole. The whole of life involves the past, the present and the future. We are accustomed to say that time obliterates the past. It does no such thing. Our past remains part of ourselves. The past persists in the present and, together with the present, makes the personality what it is. Our yesterdays have made us what we are today. Then the personality projects itself into the future. A well-spent past makes for a gloriously peaceful present and a hopeful future. An ill-spent past makes a disturbed present and an anxious future. May we call in Paul again as a witness? Paul, what about your past? "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Life to me has been like a great battle field. I have been a good soldier of the Lord Jesus Christ. I put on the whole armor of God, the shield of faith, the breastplate of righteousness, the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit. I have been left for dead on the field. I have been in perils on sea and on land. I bear branded in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus. I have finished my course. Again life has been to me like a race for the Marathon prize. I have run the race seeing Jesus at the end of the race-course holding in His own hands the crown of righteousness for me. I have kept the faith. I have suffered the loss of every earthly possession, my social standing, the respect and confidence of my people, the affection of my family, but I have kept the faith." Tell us about your present, Paul. "I am already being offered. I am now pouring out the last drops of my life blood in sacrifice. The time of my departure is at hand. There isn't a cloud in my sky. I have a peace that passeth understanding and a joy unspeakable and full of glory." Now tell us of your future prospects. "Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day; and not to me only, but also to all them who have loved His appearing. My life policy has matured and henceforth I have only to draw on the bank of heaven through eternity. He is coming to receive me and I shall be forever with the Lord."

I know that other worldliness is under the ban at the present time. We are told to quit gazing into the future and give attention to the present. We can no longer sing the songs our fathers sang and enjoyed. They sang, "In the Sweet By and By" and "O Think of the Home Over There" and "I Want to Go There, I Do" and "There'll Be No More Sorrow There" and "I'm a Pilgrim." Now we sing, "This Is My Father's World" and "Where Cross the Crowded Ways of Life." Far be it from me to attempt to criticise these great hymns adversely. I love them. This is our Father's world and we have the high privilege of working to make it the best possible world. We must free it from war, selfishness and greed. But I protest against the blackout of the unseen world. They tell us to forget our dreamlands and seek reality here. What some of them mean by reality is dirt, pigs, granaries, factories, mines and banks. They forget that the things that are seen are temporal, but the things that are not seen are eternal. Reality is not in the things that are seen. There is no permanency here. Scientists tell us this world is destined to pass away. Some day it will be cold and dead, a monstrous mummy. This is not the important world. The true values are in the unseen world. This life doesn't make sense unless there is a life beyond death. No other belief has so affected the human family as the belief that this life is not all. Death is necessary to enter the true life. In death we enter a new career. The reason people die well is because in life they look at death as an adventure into the unseen. Death ends the old life and birth begins the new. Death can never be a tragedy to one who realizes that he is taking the best of life with him. He leaves nothing of value behind. Our treasure is in heaven where moth and rust doth not corrupt. And it doth not yet appear what we shall be. The joy of old and young is in what we shall be.

I think we should be given a brief respite occasionally to peep over the rim of the

world and take a look at the Celestial City. I think we should be allowed to stand with John on Patmos and look with him through the storm-tossed clouds of earth and view the multitudes clad in garments of white. I think we should be allowed to hear the song of Moses and the Lamb sung by the angel choir and join in the Hallelujah Chorus. Paul led a very busy life but he seems to have taken time off to take a look at the house not made with hands and the things that eye hath not seen nor ear heard that God hath prepared for them that love Him. And when he left this earth he stepped into the red glory of a gorgeous sunset and passed out of sight . . . Going home, going home to be forever with the Lord.

"Let me die the death of the righteous and let my last end be like his."

May we always be able to say, "Our people die well."

THIRD DAY—WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 21, 1942

Morning Session

Devotions: Bishop Purcell called the Conference to order at 9:00 o'clock and led the devotions on the theme, "We Preach Christ."

Leave of Absence: M. T. Smathers, J. S. Hiatt, W. A. Rollins, J. R. Church, and G. B. Clemmer were excused from the day's session.

Admitted on Trial: The following men were admitted on trial: W. C. Eastridge, J. T. Melton, L. A. Scott, C. C. Sharpe, Jr., J. E. Caldwell, and A. C. Kennedy, Jr.

Elected Deacons: W. E. Andrews, S. B. Biggers, R. O. Brown, W. R. Bustle, J. F. Cagle, S. B. Nifong, J. T. Shackford, L. R. Spencer, and C. D. White, having passed the course of study and having been recommended by the Committee on Conference Relations, their characters were passed, they were advanced to the class of the third year, and elected deacons. J. W. Crawley, an elder, serving as a chaplain in the Navy, was continued on trial in the class of the third year. J. L. McGalliard was, at his request, discontinued. J. C. Phillips and H. C. Wilkinson of the Charlotte District, C. W. Dennis and O. C. Orr of the Asheville District, and J. J. Powell of the Statesville District, duly recommended, were elected local deacons.

Woman's Work: Bishop Purcell presented Mrs. C. C. Weaver, Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and she spoke briefly of the Woman's work in this Conference. Mrs. Weaver then presented Mrs. C. B. Dawsey, Jr., the rural church worker for the Conference; and then presented to Bishop Purcell an honorary life membership in the Woman's Society of Christian Service. The Bishop responded with words of appreciation.

Introductions: Rev. I. S. McElroy, American Bible Society; Dr. L. L. Gobbel, Greensboro College; and Dr. B. L. Schubel of the Board of Pensions of St. Louis, were presented to the Conference and each spoke to the cause he represented.

Standing Rules: W. A. Stanbury moved the reconsideration of the report of the Standing Rules Committee adopted yesterday, and the Conference passed the motion; and the report was amended to allow those preparing memoirs for deceased ministers two minutes each instead of one minute each for personal tributes.

Service of Recognition: Led by Bishop Purell, a Service of Recognition for retiring and incoming members was held. E. K. McLarty, Jr., sang "The Lord's Prayer" by Malotte, and E. H. Nease, A. W. Plyler, S. B. Biggers, and R. M. Andrews assisted in the service. The Bishop presented certificates of retirement to the men who retire this year. After the Bishop had spoken briefly to the class for full membership and had administered the Disciplinary vows, W. E. Andrews, S. B. Biggers, R. O. Brown, W. R. Bustle, J. F. Cagle, S. B. Nifong, J. T. Shackford, L. R. Spencer, and C. D. White were, by unanimous vote of the Conference, admitted into full membership. There were thirty retired ministers present for this service, and their total number of preaching years was 1,247. Several retired ministers made brief talks. The Secretary was asked to write letters of greetings and love to J. T. Stover, J. E. Thompson, and Z. Paris, who, because of illness, could not be present. A letter from D. W. Haga was read to the Conference.

Constitutional Amendments: The Secretary read the following proposed constitutional amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church:

AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE METHODIST CHURCH
CONCERNING BISHOPS

At its first quadrennial session, held in Atlantic City, New Jersey, April 24-May 6, 1940, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3), the vote being six hundred and seventy-five (675) for to none against, on Wednesday, May 1, 1940, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their action, the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church:

Amend Paragraph 35, Article II of the 1939 Discipline of the Methodist Church, which reads as follows:

"The Bishops shall be elected by the respective Jurisdictional and Central Conferences and ordained or consecrated in the historic manner of Episcopal Methodism at such time and place as may be fixed by the General Conference," by striking out the words "ordained or" so that the paragraph when amended will read as follows:

"The Bishops shall be elected by the respective Jurisdictional and Central Conferences and consecrated in the historic manner of Episcopal Methodism at such time and place as may be fixed by the General Conference."

There were 269 members of the Conference present and voting. Two hundred and sixty-eight voted for the amendment and one against, and the Bishop announced that the Conference had approved the amendment.

The Secretary then read the following proposed amendment:

AMENDMENT NO. 2 TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE METHODIST CHURCH
CONCERNING CENTRAL CONFERENCES

At its first quadrennial session held in Atlantic City, New Jersey, April 24-May 6, 1940, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3), the vote being six hundred and fourteen (614) for to none against, on Monday, May 6, 1940, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their action, the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church:

Amend Paragraph 17, Article II of the 1939 Discipline of The Methodist Church, which reads as follows:

"The Central Conferences shall be composed of as many delegates as shall be determined by a basis established by the General Conference. The delegates shall be ministerial and lay in equal numbers; the ministerial delegates to be elected by the ministerial members and the lay delegates by the lay members of the Annual Conferences," by adding to the paragraph the words "or the Provisional Annual Conferences," so that the paragraph as amended will read as follows:

"The Central Conferences shall be composed of as many delegates as shall be determined by a basis established by the General Conference. The delegates shall be ministerial and lay in equal numbers; the ministerial delegates to be elected by the ministerial members and the lay delegates by the lay members of the Annual Conferences, or the Provisional Annual Conferences."

Two hundred and eighty members of the Conference were present and voted on this amendment, and 280 voted for the amendment and none against. The Bishop announced that the amendment had been approved by this Conference.

Ministers from Other Evangelical Churches: Earle LeBaron presented credentials as an elder in the Disciples of Christ Church; and Homer H. Dubs presented credentials as an elder in the Evangelical Church. Having subscribed to the doctrines and Discipline of The Methodist Church, by vote of the Conference these men were admitted into full membership on recognition of their credentials, with the understanding that they will take the vows with the class to be ordained elders on Thursday evening.

Journal Approved: S. M. Needham, for the Committee on Daily Minutes, reported that the Journal for the Monday evening and Tuesday morning sessions had been examined and found correct. The Conference approved the report.

Introductions: Bishop Purcell presented Bishop Edwin F. Lee, ex-Governor Clyde R. Hoey, and Dr. W. F. Quillian to the Conference; and announced that Bishop Lee and Mr. Hoey would speak later in the day. Dr. Quillian, representing the General Board of Missions and Church Extension, spoke of the need for increased support for our mission causes.

Reports: J. A. Bell presented the report of the Trustees of the Superannuate Endowment and the report was accepted. (See Appendix.) W. A. Kale read Report No. 1 of the Board of Education and it was adopted. (See Appendix.) C. S. Kirkpatrick offered the report of the Conference Entertainment Committee for the information of the Conference and asked that consideration of the report be deferred until tomorrow.

Resolutions: The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved: That the Conference request Dr. A. W. Plyler to publish in the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* the paper read by him in the Historical Association meeting on Monday evening, entitled "An Inside View of Methodist Journalism."

This Conference will ever feel increasingly grateful to Mr. James A. Bell, an honored member of First Church, Charlotte, who some twenty-five years ago conceived the idea of an endowment fund for the benefit of the retired ministers, their widows, and dependent children. Mr. Bell actively labored for years with others to secure funds for this cause to supplement the meager fund then available and, assisted by other good business men, handled the fund successfully; therefore,

Resolved: That we, in Conference assembled, desire again to express to Mr. Bell (and others co-operating) our deep appreciation for all that he did for this worthy cause and that we cannot find words sufficient to convey our Christian love for one who has in such substantial fashion proved himself a genuine friend to our ministers in need of material support.

Resolved: Further, that the Secretary send a copy of this resolution to Mr. Bell.

FOURTH DAY—THURSDAY, OCTOBER 22, 1942

Morning Session

Worship Service: At 9:00 o'clock Bishop Purcell called the Conference to order and led the devotional service, using the theme, "The Eternal Church."

Daily Minutes: For the Committee on Daily Minutes, S. M. Needham reported the Journal of the Wednesday session to be correct; and the Conference approved his report.

Education: Report No. 3 of the Board of Education, concerning the consolidation or merger of Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College, was presented to the Conference by W. A. Kale and was unanimously adopted. (See Appendix.)

WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE
ASSEMBLED AT CHARLOTTE, N. C.
OCTOBER 22, 1942

Upon motion of Dr. G. Ray Jordan, Chairman of the Board of Education for the Western North Carolina Conference, duly seconded, the report of the Board of Education relative to the merger of Rutherford College and Brevard College, Inc., and the consolidation agreement between Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College, including the proposed charter of Brevard College Corporation, be and the same are hereby adopted as the act and deed of this Conference, and the nomination of the persons named in the charter of Brevard College Corporation are hereby duly elected as Trustees of Brevard College Corporation, upon the terms and conditions set out in said charter.

Rev. H. C. Sprinkle is hereby authorized and directed to call the aforesaid Board of Trustees together for the purpose of the election of officers, and the transaction of such business as may come before said Board.

That the aforesaid charter shall be filed with the Secretary of State, as provided by law, and the said Trustees are hereby authorized and directed to take such steps and to do such things as may be necessary in order to carry out the action of this Conference, and to operate and carry on the business of Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College as merged into Brevard College Corporation.

This Conference most earnestly requests and recommends that the Duke Endowment now in the hands of The Fidelity Bank of Durham, N. C., for the use and benefit of Rutherford College be hereafter held by said Trustee for the use and benefit of Brevard College Corporation, and the Trustees of Brevard College Corporation are authorized and directed to do any and all things necessary, to the end that said Endowment may be transferred to Brevard College Corporation, to the same extent as heretofore held by said Trustee for the use and benefit of Rutherford College.

Done at Charlotte, N. C., this the 22nd day of October, 1942.

This motion by G. Ray Jordan was unanimously adopted. Mr. Kale then presented Report No. 2 of the Board of Education, on Schools and Colleges. After an address by G. I. Humphreys relative to High Point College, the report was adopted.

Chaplains: O. Y. Kirkpatrick, Chief Pharmacist, United States Navy, retired, was introduced to the Conference and spoke of the need for and the work of Chaplains in the Navy. Bishop Purcell read the following telegram: "Please remind Western North Carolina Conference that the plan sponsored by the Council of Bishops for the Fellowship of Suffering and Service included not only World-wide Communion Sunday but sharing all Communion offerings throughout the year. Needs of over-seas relief and camp service both pressing. Also four hundred additional Methodist Chaplains called for by Army and Navy this year. Greetings. (Signed) Herbert Welch and A. W. Leonard."

Chaplains Sprinkle, Shumaker, and Schreyer of this Conference, and Duncan of the Virginia Conference, were presented by Bishop Purcell. They, and Chief Kirkpatrick, were given ovations. The Secretary was instructed to send a message from the Conference to each of the Chaplains from our Conference.

Introductions: Bishop Purcell introduced the Reverend Prince A. Taylor, Bennett College; Dr. R. W. Winchester, District Superintendent,

Greensboro District, N. C. Conference of the Central Jurisdiction; and Dr. E. L. Mills, Chicago. Rev. Mr. Taylor stressed Race Relations Sunday in relation to Bennett College, and Dr. Mills spoke of the Christian Advocate. Dr. Winchester told the Conference of the Harry Hosier Memorial Association and the Conference gave him an offering of \$143.53 for this cause.

Conference Session, 1943: The report of the Conference Entertainment Committee as read by C. S. Kirkpatrick on yesterday was brought before the Conference as the Bishop called Question 42, "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" An amendment was offered by E. H. Blackard and accepted by the Committee. The report was ordered read by the Secretary, and after comments by W. A. Lambeth, the report as amended was adopted. (See Appendix.) M. T. Smathers invited the Conference to meet in Asheville in 1943, but on motion of C. C. Weaver, the Conference voted to refer all invitations to the Conference Entertainment Committee.

Week of Dedication: Paul Hardin, Jr., for the Committee on the Week of Dedication, presented that report and it was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Missions and Church Extension: After a statement on the policy of the Board of Missions and Church Extension by F. C. Smathers, Report No. 1 of the Board was presented by W. G. McFarland and adopted. Reports 2 and 3 were read by H. F. Duncan and I. L. Roberts, respectively, and adopted. (See Appendix.)

The following resolution, presented by I. L. Roberts, was adopted:

RESOLUTIONS FOR A REVOLVING LOAN FUND

1. That the Section of Church Extension of the Western North Carolina Annual Conference be and they are hereby authorized to constitute a Western North Carolina Conference Revolving Loan Fund to be administered by the Board of Church Extension, Louisville, Kentucky, the loans from this fund to be granted by the Section of Church Extension of the Western North Carolina Annual Conference.

2. That the funds necessary for this Revolving Loan Fund shall be derived from receipts from the Annual Conference for Church Extension purposes, from bequests, wills, and donations by individuals or churches.

3. That this fund shall be a permanent fund and no part of the Revolving Loan Fund shall be donated without the consent of the Annual Conference.

4. That the interest to be charged in each case and the terms of repayment of Revolving Loan Funds of this Conference shall be certified to the General Board of Church Extension, it being understood that some interest shall be paid not later than one year from the time the loan is placed, and that the repayment of the principal of the loan be made according to the increasing ability of the congregation.

Ministers Retired: G. B. Clemmer, for the Committee on Conference Relations, reported the ministers recommended by that Committee for the supernumerary and the retired relations. (See Appendix.) J. S. Hiatt offered an amendment changing the recommendation for B. M. Crosby from the supernumerary relationship to the retired relation. The amendment was seconded by W. A. Rollins; but the Conference defeated the amendment,

voting 31 for to 66 against the amendment. The report of the Committee was then adopted.

Reports: E. O. Cole, Conference Treasurer, read his report and asked the privilege of filing the final report with the Secretary for inclusion in the Conference Journal. The report of the Commission on World Peace was given by G. I. Humphreys and adopted. The Secretary announced that Dr. J. M. Ormond had filed with him a report of the Duke Endowment Fund and this report was ordered printed in the Journal. (See Appendix.)

Letter of Appreciation: On motion of W. A. Lambeth, the Secretary was asked to write a letter from the Conference to E. A. Cole.

Introductions: The following ministers from other Conferences were introduced to the Conference: T. A. Sikes, F. S. Love, J. H. Shore, D. A. Petty, Wanamaker Hardin, and J. W. Frank.

Transfer: The Bishop announced the transfer of A. Wade Thompson, elder, from the Holston Conference. Mr. Thompson was introduced.

Roll Call: The following signed roll cards for this session:

Adjournment: W. A. Stanbury moved that we adjourn to meet at 2:30 o'clock for a business session, and the Bishop asked J. B. Craven to preside at the afternoon session. The benediction was given by C. M. Pickens.

Afternoon Session

Session Convened: At 2:30 o'clock J. B. Craven called the Conference to order, the hymn, "How Firm a Foundation," was sung, and the prayer was offered by Homer H. Dubs.

Reports: John W. Hoyle, Jr., read Report No. 1 of the Commission on Town and Country Work and made the motion that the report be published in the Conference Journal for consideration next year, and the motion prevailed. Report No. 2 was offered by Mr. Hoyle without reading and was ordered printed in the Journal. The reports of the Board of Lay Activities, Committee on Accepted Supply Pastors, Bible Board, Committee on District Conference Records, and Board of Temperance were read by Paul F. Evans, E. P. Billups, J. R. Duncan, W. G. McFarland, and Reid Wall, respectively. These reports were adopted. R. M. Courtney made his report as Treasurer of the Golden Cross and was granted permission to file his completed report later. I. F. Craven asked permission for the Advisory Committee on General Indebtedness to file its report later. H. A. Dunham made his report as Treasurer of the Board of Education, which report was

ordered to record. (See Appendix.) H. F. Duncan offered the following supplement to Report No. 2 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension and it was adopted.

**CORRECTIONS TO SECTION TWO, REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS AND
CHURCH EXTENSION**

The following changes have been requested by respective District Superintendents and recommended by the Board of Missions and Church Extension:

CHARLOTTE DISTRICT

Transfer one hundred dollars from Huntersville to Saint John's, making Saint John's appropriation four hundred dollars.

MARION DISTRICT

Increase appropriation at Avondale from one hundred to three hundred dollars.

Cancel appropriation at Sunshine for one hundred dollars. Add it (one hundred dollars) to Valdese making Valdese appropriation read three hundred.

WAYNESVILLE DISTRICT

Make Webster appropriation conditional. Amount remains same—one hundred and fifty dollars.

The report of the Wesley Foundation Commission was ordered to record without reading. (See Appendix.)

Council of Churches: W. A. Stanbury spoke of the work of the North Carolina Council of Churches and made the motion that Bishop Purcell be authorized to appoint thirteen representatives, in classes of 1943, 1944, and 1945, to the Council.

Order of the Day: W. A. Stanbury made the following motion, which was adopted: That the Conference fix as the special order for 10:00 o'clock tomorrow a brief service of dedication and intercession for the President of the United States and all administering forces and especially for the young men and women from this Conference. The Bishop will be in charge of this special order.

Adjournment: At 3:15 o'clock, following the benediction by S. B. Turrentine, the Conference was adjourned to meet again at 7:30 o'clock this evening for the Ordination Service.

Evening Session

Ordination Service: At 7:30 o'clock Bishop Purcell called the evening session to order and R. L. Ownbey led the prayer. An anthem was sung by the choir of Dilworth Church, after which Dr. William Aiken Smart, Emory University, was presented and preached the Ordination sermon.

The following deacons elect were presented by the Secretary: W. E. Andrews, S. B. Biggers, R. O. Brown, W. R. Bustle, J. F. Cagle, C. W. Dennis, S. B. Nifong, J. C. Phillips, J. J. Powell, J. T. Shackford, L. R. Spencer, C. D. White, and H. C. Wilkinson. The Bishop led the prayers,

read the epistle, examined the candidates, and then ordained them deacons in the Church of God.

The elders elect were then presented by the Secretary. They are: C. W. Avett, E. D. C. Brewer, J. W. Fowler, Jr., H. D. Garmon, J. J. Holmes, E. H. Lowman, J. E. Rink, W. C. Sides, Jr., and A. W. Wellons. The Bishop led the prayer, the epistle and gospel were read by G. Ray Jordan, and the Bishop examined the candidates. The Bishop assisted in the imposition of hands by Elders G. Ray Jordan, W. A. Smart, and R. L. Ownbey, ordained these men elders in the Church of God. Homer H. Dubs, from the Evangelical Church, and Earle LeBaron, from the Disciples of Christ Church, also assumed the vows with this class. The Bishop pronounced the benediction and the Conference was adjourned.

FIFTH DAY—FRIDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1942

Morning Session

Devotions: Using as his theme, "God's World," Bishop Purcell began the morning session of the Conference at 9:00 a. m.

Daily Minutes: The report of the Committee on Daily Minutes, which report declared the minutes of the Thursday sessions to be in good order and correct, was adopted. S. M. Needham, for the Committee, asked permission to examine the minutes of this session and certify to same for publication in the Conference Journal, and the Conference approved his request.

Ministerial Character: The names of all the ministerial members, not called before, were called in open Conference and, with the exception of J. F. Wyatt, who had surrendered his credentials, and T. H. Houck, who had withdrawn from the ministry, their characters were passed.

Service of Dedication: At 10:00 o'clock the order of the day, a service of dedication and intercession for the President of the United States and all administering forces, and especially for the young men and women from this Conference, was held. Bishop Purcell presided and the hymns, "America," and "O Beautiful for Spacious Skies," were sung. G. T. Rowe led the Conference in prayer. W. A. Stanbury made the motion and the Conference unanimously instructed the Secretary to write a letter to President Roosevelt regarding this service.

Retired: E. M. Jones presented the name of P. W. Tucker for the retired relationship, the Committee on Conference Relations recommended that this relation be granted, and the Conference so ordered.

North Carolina Council of Churches: Bishop Purcell appointed the following as representatives of this Conference on the North Carolina Council of Churches: to serve a term of one year—C. H. King, W. A. Stanbury, C. C. Weaver, J. Elwood Carroll; to serve a term of two years—J. F. Harrelson, J. Clyde Auman, W. A. Kale, R. L. Pope, Mrs. C. N. Clark;

to serve a term of three years—P. E. Lindley, R. G. Tuttle, B. V. Hedrick, Mrs. D. E. Henderson; and alternates—J. J. Wood and Edwin L. Jones.

Pastors' School: W. A. Kale presented the report of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School. (See Appendix.)

Thanks: J. A. Bell thanked the Conference for the resolution regarding him, adopted on yesterday; and offered the following resolution, adopted unanimously by the Conference:

RESOLUTION

Whereas, on April 19, 1920, a deed was made to P. T. Freeland and others, Trustees for "Poplar and West 26th Street Methodist Episcopal Church, South," which deed was recorded in the Mecklenburg Registry in Book 429, Page 268; and whereas it appears that said Trustees were then members of old Tryon Street M. E. Church, South, and that the enterprise was probably an undertaking of certain members of Tryon Street M. E. Church; and whereas nothing further was done toward the organization of a church, and the enterprise abandoned:

THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises, it is ordered that the said Poplar Street Church be abandoned as such, and that the lot be attached to the First Methodist Church, Charlotte, N. C., successor to the former Tryon Street M. E. Church, South, and that the surviving Trustees in said deed be authorized to convey or quit-claim said lot to the Trustees of the First Methodist Church, for the use and benefit of the said church, and to be used or disposed of by sale or otherwise as the said church, through its Quarterly Conference, may determine.

Presiding: Bishop Purcell asked C. M. Pickens to preside and he and the Cabinet retired.

Reports: O. V. Woosley, Edwin L. Jones, E. K. McLarty, and Dr. W. C. Houston presented the reports on Hospitals and Homes, the Commission on World Service and Finance, Evangelism, and Conference Claimants, respectively. (See Appendix.) W. A. Lambeth thanked the Conference for the apportionment approved to Lake Junaluska and named noble laymen, J. B. Ivey, George F. Ivey, E. A. Cole, H. A. Dunham, et al, who have contributed so generously to the Assembly. Bishop Purcell, who had resumed the chair, spoke of the fine work done by Dr. Lambeth. E. K. McLarty urged the Conference to make effective the plans for evangelism contained in his report. Dr. Houston urged the laymen to support the Conference Brotherhood, and Bishop Purcell commended the Brotherhood, stating that it is the largest in Methodism. These reports were adopted, each as it was presented. E. O. Cole announced that he would send all needed information to District Superintendents by mail.

Ordination Certificates: The following certificates of ordination were presented:

Rozzelle, an elder, read the gospel. Assisting in the laying on of hands were Frank S. Hickman, J. M. Ormond, M. W. Heckard, C. E. Rozzelle, and A. J. Hobbs. The benediction was pronounced by J. M. Ormond.

District Boards: M. T. Smathers, for the Cabinet, presented the changes in District Boards. (See page 17.)

Conference Trustees: J. B. Ivey offered the report of the Conference Trustees, which was ordered to record. (See Appendix.)

Disciplinary Questions: Minute Question 13, "Who are located?" and 20, "Who are readmitted?" were called, and answered "No one." For the answer to Questions 15 and 36, namely, "Who are transferred to other Conferences?" and "What is the report of the statistician?" see Condensed Minutes.

Minimum Salary: C. C. Weaver, to protect the Board of Missions and Church Extension, and in keeping with the Discipline of the Church, made the motion that this Conference set the minimum salary for ministers for this year only at \$1,000 for single men, and \$1,200 for married men. This motion was unanimously adopted.

Objectives: The report of the Committee on Objectives was, at the request of the Committee, presented to the Conference by Bishop Purcell, and it was unanimously adopted. (See "Objectives," page 11.)

Offerings: An offering to be divided equally among the ministers retiring at this Conference and amounting to \$278.05 was taken. Also an offering of \$82.10 was made for the janitors.

Resolution of Thanks: The following resolution of appreciation was presented by C. H. Moser and adopted unanimously by rising vote:

For weeks prior to the date of the Annual Conference letters have gone out to the pastors and lay delegates from the local Entertainment Committee, Mr. J. Wilson Smith, Chairman. This important pre-Conference work was done with determined accuracy and precision by Mr. J. Wilson Smith and his loyal corps of workers. J. Wilson Smith has distinguished himself in the performance of this most important task.

We appreciate, too, the music rendered by the choirs of First Church, and other churches of the city, the groups from the Glee Club of Greensboro College, E. K. McLarty, Jr., and Eugene Craft, organist of First Church; also the outstanding messages delivered by Dr. A. W. Plyler, Dr. G. T. Rowe, Bishop Edwin F. Lee, Dr. E. K. McLarty, Sr., Dr. Aiken Smart, Dr. F. S. Hickman, Dr. A. W. Hewitt, Dr. H. B. Trimble, Gov. Clyde R. Hoey, and the address and morning devotions given by our beloved Bishop Clare Purcell.

The Methodist Church in North Carolina owes a great deal to Granbery Dickson who, for twenty years, has been giving the daily papers Methodist news, both during the sessions of the Conference, and all through the year.

And last but not least, we appreciate the courteous and efficient service rendered by the janitors of this church.

We have heard for many years that Charlotte is "The Friendly City." No one who has enjoyed the hospitality of the Queen City during this Conference, and other Conferences of the past held in this city, has any disposition to question the appropriateness of this title.

We do feel that this concern has been prompted by an unselfish Christian spirit, and we therefore, pray God's richest benedictions upon Charlotte Methodism, upon all Christian bodies and upon all people who reside here.

Mr. Moser also presented a resolution concerning The Christian Advocate, and it was unanimously adopted. This resolution follows:

THE CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

The Christian Advocate, a National Weekly Publication of the Methodist Church, was established by order of the General Conference. Under the editorship of Dr. Roy L. Smith, and his associates, the *Christian Advocate* now has a paid circulation in excess of 225,000, which is more than the combined circulation of the seven sectional *Advocates* previously published. It has earned a position of leadership throughout the church. While the Board of Publication takes pride in its selection of Dr. Smith as Editor, the Board does not in any way undertake to influence or control the editorial policies of the *Christian Advocate*. Dr. Smith has, however, made a clear statement of his editorial policies which have met with approval, including the stated purpose:

"To promote a calm and poised judgment of events and issues that have arisen, incident to the war; to keep the heart of the church free from the bitterness and hatred which war inevitably engenders; to provide a united front against forces of wickedness and evil which have been turned loose upon the world; and to build up a mind and conscience within the church which would make possible, and popular, such changes of the world's life as may be necessary to insure that peace shall be permanent when it comes."

This is a clear, intelligent and accurate statement of the policies and purposes of the Chicago *Christian Advocate*.

We, the members of the Western North Carolina Conference, commend the *Christian Advocate* as worthy of and entitled to, not only our commendation and approval, but to the entrance into every home throughout our Conference.





Appendix—Reports

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

We recommend:

1. In recognition of facts presented by the Commission on Town and Country Work as to extremely low salaries received by many preachers in our Conference we have increased the apportionment for Conference Missions so that these very low salaries can be further supplemented.

2. We have included \$800.00 in the apportionment for the Board of Missions to be paid from their funds for the following purposes:

N. C. Council of Churches	\$300.00
Commission on Evangelism	200.00
Board of Temperance	300.00

3. That the apportionment for the Children's Home at Winston-Salem remain at an amount equal to ten per cent (10%) of the pastor's salary for the current year, and we urge that additional voluntary fifth Sunday and special offerings be contributed in not less than the following total charge quotas, including the 10% apportionment:

12% for charges paying the pastor less than \$1,500.
15% for charges paying the pastor \$1,500 to \$2,500.
18% for charges paying the pastor \$2,500 to \$3,500.
21% for charges paying the pastor \$3,500 to \$4,500.
25% for charges paying the pastor over \$4,500.

4. The appropriation of \$5,500 for College Place Church is made with the provision that the North Carolina Conference appropriate their proportional part.

5. Whereas, the Board of Christian Education has requested and recommended that the Western North Carolina Conference approve a special Brevard College Day for the ensuing year:

We recommend that December 6, 1942, or as near thereto as practical, shall be set aside as Brevard College Day.

6. That an amount equal to $8\frac{3}{4}\%$ of the pastor's salary be assessed to each pastoral charge for the Conference Claimants' Fund.

(a) That the Annual Conference instruct the Conference Claimants' Committee to reserve an amount equal to 5% of the total collected, for necessitous and emergency cases, where years of service do not provide decent support when added to any private income of resources.

(b) That 5% of the total collected during the ensuing year be set aside in order to accumulate a reserve fund.

(c) That after these two deductions are made, that the remainder of all collections and incomes from Publishing Houses, endowment, and any other sources, be paid to superannuates, their widows, and dependents, in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline, and solely on a basis of years of service in the effective ministry.

(d) That where years of service in the effective ministry exceeds forty years, that the "Annuity Rate" thereafter for each year of service shall be reduced by one-half, and that when the "Annuity Rate," the amount from the Duke Fund, and the General Fund bring the total to a Conference claimant to \$1,000 a year, then the "Annuity Rate" shall not apply so as to increase the amount beyond \$1,000; and \$1,000 shall constitute the total pension available to any claimant and that 70%, the amount fixed by the Discipline, shall be the maximum paid to or received from Conference Claimant Funds by any widow of deceased minister, but that up to a \$1,000 annuity for retired ministers and 70% thereof for widows of retired ministers, the "Annuity Rate," as defined by the Discipline, shall be in full force and effect.

7. We recommend that the Trustees of High Point College be given the privilege of going before the churches of our Conference during the year 1942-43 for the purpose of raising \$10,000.

8. That an amount equal to 2¼% of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the Episcopal Fund.

9. We recommend that the salaries of the District Superintendents remain at \$4,800, and that an amount equal to 7½% of the pastor's salary shall be assessed to each pastoral charge for the support of the District Superintendents.

10. We recommend that the all-inclusive salary of the Treasurer of the Conference be made \$1,500.00. We recommend that E. O. Cole be re-elected Conference Treasurer. We recommend that H. C. Northrop, C. P. A. of Charlotte, be re-elected Conference Auditor.

11. That the General Work and Conference Work total \$267,326.65.

12. That a net amount of \$6,000 for Annual Conference expense and a net amount of \$811.98 for Jurisdictional Conference expenses be deducted from the above before division.

13. That our apportionments be divided as follows:

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Report No. 1

The Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Western North Carolina Conference presents for adoption the following policies and plans of missionary work and education and certain nominations:

I. CONCERNING ADMINISTRATIVE WORK

1. That every charge be urged to accept and pay in full World Service askings and to take part in the Fellowship of Suffering and Service;
2. That more churches be induced to assume World Service specials;
3. That we have heard with interest and sympathy the call to the church addressed us by the Council of Bishops and the General Commission on World Service and Finance in reference to emergency needs; and that in response to this call we pledge the support of this Board, and urge every church to observe the "Week of Dedication" (February 28 to March 7) and to make the requested free will offering on Sunday, March 7;
4. That our splendid program of appropriations for Home Missions and Church Extension be continued and, whenever possible, improved.

II. CONCERNING MISSIONARY EDUCATION

Although much has been accomplished, the goal is yet far ahead. in order to make more rapid progress it is recommended:

1. That District Superintendents, Conference, and District Missionary Secretaries work in closer co-operation, and that each Secretary for his own inspiration and training attend the annual Missionary Conference at Lake Junaluska, sufficient appropriation to be made by the Board for this summer conference expense and for at least a minimum of promotional work by each Secretary in his own field of service;

2. That persistent effort be made to spread the use of the excellent missionary literature available, such as the *World Outlook*, *The Methodist Woman*, *The Pastors' Journal*, and many tracts and pamphlets; and that advantage be taken of the numerous implements of visual education now at our disposal, each District being asked to provide—preferably in its District work assessment—for the purchase and use of a machine for District use in visual education;

3. That in promotion of our Conference missionary program, greater use be made of newspaper publicity and the columns of the *Advocate*;

4. That area, zone, and local missionary rallies with inspirational emphasis and mass attendance be held when practicable, making a larger use of the returned missionary in these gatherings;

5. That continued and increased emphasis be given the annual District Missionary Institute with inspiration and information sharing place on the program; that this should be a leaders' rather than a mass meeting; that a definite start should here be made for the year's work in the local church; that pastors and church Boards be committed to their vital work of missionary education and promotion in the local church in co-operation with the Board of Education in distribution of literature and cultivation through fourth Sunday programs and offerings both in church school and congregation; that each church should organize a Board of Missions, and have a good school of missions.

The Board, with Cabinet approval, authorizes the following schedule for District Institutes in the coming Conference year (in view of the very early dates, let every pastor and layman take notice):

III. CONCERNING CO-OPERATIVE WORK

We recommend that our Board continue its co-operation with other Boards and agencies, such as the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School, the Commission on Town and Country Work, and the newly formed Joint Committee on Missionary Education of Youth constituted by this Board, the Board of Education, and the Woman's Conference; that we commend the women of our church for their aggressive response to the call to service, their splendid spirit of co-operation, and their remarkable record of offerings for missions; and that we invite the informed and skilled help of the women in carrying out our policies, Conference-wide, Districts, and in every local church.

IV. CONCERNING CITY MISSIONS

We express our sincere appreciation to Mr. J. A. Jones and his sons, Edwin and Raymond, for the very substantial sum they have set aside to establish a number of mission centers in the city of Charlotte. We trust that this venture will be the beginning of similar movements in other cities within the bounds of the Western North Carolina Conference.

V. CONCERNING LOCAL CHURCH BOARDS AND SCHOOLS OF MISSIONS

CHURCH EXTENSION

The Section of Church Extension finds much satisfaction in the fact that more and more the debts on parsonages and churches in our Conference are being liquidated, and we heartily recommend that all congregations burdened with debts make a strenuous effort in these prosperous days to clear their church and parsonage property of all indebtedness. By so doing, the Section of Church Extension will be relieved from helping on old debts and be in better position to assist with new projects which should in many places be undertaken.

We desire again to call attention of our pastors to the ruling of the Discipline which restricts us from aiding by donations any church or parsonage that is not classed as a missionary charge. Our Section believes that our aid should go to those needy locations where Duke Endowment funds are not available.

Once more we insist that the pastors induce their laymen adequately to protect all church property by fire insurance.

We desire to emphasize the fact that the Discipline requires that deeds to church property be so written as to contain the trust clause as found in paragraph 777. And our Board is prohibited from giving aid where the title to the property is not so secured.

In order to be prepared for the difficult times which will likely follow the war, the Section of Church Extension is trying to reserve as large a portion of its funds as possible for emergencies that may then arise. Having made a sincere effort to understand the needs of

the many applicants coming to us at this time, and considering the limitation of our funds, our Section attempts to distribute to the very best advantage the funds allotted to us. We report at this time the following appropriations:

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

THE LOCAL CHURCH SECTION

Your Board of Education has heard the reports of the members of the staff and has carefully reviewed the achievements of the past year. Considering the unusual difficulties, it is gratifying to know that with but one exception the report shows progress over the previous year. There is a decrease in the number of credits issued in the formal training program. In regard to the number of vacation schools held, attendance at camps, assemblies and Caravan programs, contributions to World Service, response to Church School Rally Day, growth in the Young Adult Fellowship, and interest in the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the results are most encouraging.

In these difficult days the forces of Christian education, along with other agencies of the church, must face their tasks in a world at war. Naturally adjustments will have to be made to meet changing needs more adequately. In the face of these tremendous challenges, it is the faith of your Board of Education that such adjustments must be made in the nature of advances rather than retreat. If the world of tomorrow is to be Christian, the world of today must be influenced by Christian teaching. In the interest of this dominant faith, we request the prayerful attention of Bishop Clare Purcell, the District Superintendents, the pastors, and the 12,000 officers and teachers in planning for the 165,000 children, young

people, and adults enrolled in more than 1,100 church schools of the Conference. We recommend the following emphases for the year:

1. That we join with other Protestant forces in making the United Christian Education Advance more effective in our homes, our communities, and around the world.

2. That, in order to do its work more efficiently, every Methodist church school be organized and conducted in keeping with the 1940 Discipline.

3. That Methodist literature be provided for every school and that special attention be given to the securing of the right periodicals in right amounts for the right classes.

4. That we provide more opportunities for the training of officers, teachers, and other leaders. Extra effort must be made in these days to place training schools, Epworth Training Conferences, camps, assemblies, and institutes within reach of our people and to enlist them in these activities. Attention is also called to Home Study courses now available through the Board of Education.

5. In consultation with the District Superintendents, to continue to select, train and guide the activities of volunteer district directors of work with children, youth, and young adults. That we hold the usual planning conference with the leaders of the three age group divisions and with members of the Cabinet in planning for and promoting the work throughout the Conference.

6. Dedicate each fourth Sunday to World Service in each church school. Let this occasion teach the people about world-wide missionary work and train them to give systematically to its support. These offerings are credited to the regular World Service and Conference Benevolence acceptance of each church. The total contribution from our Sunday schools this past year was \$31,146.26.

7. Observe Church School Rally Day in every church with a program and an offering. This occasion can be a real rally day for Christian education. The estimated need for this offering is \$3,000.

8. To strive to increase the number and to improve the quality of vacation schools through correspondence, personal contacts, and group meetings.

9. Promote the missionary education of children and youth by use of missionary units in the regular church school literature and in co-operation with the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Board of Missions.

10. Encourage co-operation between the home and the church and pay especial attention to the Nursery and Home Departments.

11. In the field of Christian education, let no opportunity pass to reach children, youth or unchurched adults with the challenge of a decision for Christian living and church membership.

12. That the sub-district organization of the Methodist Youth Fellowship adapt its program to the changing conditions of today and that a full schedule of activities be provided.

13. That our Conference-wide schedule of camps and assemblies be continued in so far as conditions will permit.

14. That we urge all adult classes to support more definitely the World Service program on fourth Sundays and that we encourage the development of a well-rounded program by each Young Adult Fellowship.

15. That we promote Bible Conferences in local churches for the purpose of teaching the Bible and training our people to read it with more understanding in these trying times.

16. That we urge regular attendance at Sunday school and church service by every member of each Methodist family and we suggest that families worship together as a unit when practical to do so.

17. That members of the Conference Board staff strive to render the best possible service through correspondence, personal service, and through group meetings and that all such meetings be planned so as to give a maximum number of contacts with the least possible travel.

18. We request the appointment and confirmation of the following staff members:
Carl H. King, Executive Secretary and Director of Youth Work.

Mrs. Agnes E. Kirk, Office Secretary and Associate Director of Youth Work.
 Miss Elizabeth Oliver, Director of Children's Work.

SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES SECTION

The Board received reports from the Boards of Trustees of Duke University, Brevard College, Greensboro College, and High Point College. These reports manifested acceptable progress during the year, with the following facts of significant interest:

Duke University.—Officers and teachers, 489; students, 3,647; Summer School enrollment, 2,068; endowment, \$38,963,698.96; plant and equipment value, \$30,420,339.04; value of loan funds, \$2,096,622.91; value of scholarship funds, \$366,896.83; value of special funds, \$969,234.88.

Greensboro College.—Officers and teachers, 44; student enrollment, 421; value of property, \$738,542.70; endowment, \$509,982.01; indebtedness (heating plant bonds), \$36,000.00.

High Point College.—Officers and teachers, 31; student enrollment, 448; Summer School enrollment, 123; assets, \$900,318.02; indebtedness, \$191,594.85.

Brevard College.—Officers and teachers, 24; student enrollment, 308; value of property, \$301,954.31; endowment, \$61,240.85; indebtedness, \$30,169.93; Brevard College Day, \$9,746.99.

Pfeiffer College.—Officers and teachers, 25; student enrollment, 200; indebtedness, none; value of property (conservative), \$1,000,000.00; endowment, \$500,000.00.

The report from the Trustees of the Cornelius Foundation, Inc., was received. Total holdings of the Foundation are approximately \$125,000.00. Sixteen girls have been aided at Greensboro and Brevard College during the year. Operation expenses amounted to \$568.10.

We recommend the confirmation of the following Trustees:

We recommend the following special observances:

CONCERNING CONSOLIDATION OR MERGER OF BREVARD COLLEGE, INC., AND RUTHERFORD COLLEGE

Since the action of the 1941 Annual Conference, further investigations looking towards the consolidation of Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College were conducted, and your Board of Education, for this purpose, named a Special Committee, composed of O. V. Woosley, Chairman, C. M. Pickens, G. F. Ivey, A. G. Odell, and William H. Bobbitt. This Special Committee has submitted its recommendations and also its statement of considerations, underlying recommendations, and a copy of its report is submitted herewith. Your Board of Education takes notice that the recommendations of this Special Committee were reached after full consideration of the different interests involved and with the recognition of Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College, and Messrs. Ivey, Spencer, and McGimsey, that concessions would have to be made by each for the best interest of all, and that the recommendations submitted are interdependent and constitute a complete plan, and are predicated upon the underlying condition that Rutherford College is fully released from debt and its merger with Brevard College, Inc., is effected under the conditions fully set forth in the Committee's recommendation.

Your Board of Education further reports that, subsequent to the report of said Special Committee, the Board of Trustees of Brevard College, Inc., and the Board of Trustees of Rutherford College, a corporation, have met, and by vote of the majority of the members of each Board of Trustees, each corporation, subject to legal authorization by the 1942 Annual Conference, has authorized and directed that Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College be consolidated and merged in accordance with the terms of a Consolidation Agreement, hereinafter mentioned, and the Board of Trustees of Rutherford College, subject to legal authorization of the 1942 Annual Conference, has authorized and directed the execution and delivery of a deed by Rutherford College to G. F. Ivey, C. A. Spencer, and J. F. McGimsey, their administrators, executors and assigns, covering all real and personal property and receivables owned by Rutherford College, part of the consideration therefor being the agreement of Messrs. Ivey, Spencer, and McGimsey, to pay or cause to be discharged and extinguished all present outstanding debts and liabilities of Rutherford College, to the end that Rutherford College shall be debt free when it consolidates with Brevard College, Inc., in a manner heretofore stated.

Your Board of Education also reports that Messrs. Ivey, Spencer, and McGimsey have set forth in writing, as per copy filed herewith, their agreement to pay, or cause to be discharged, the present outstanding debts of Rutherford College.

Your Board of Education also reports that the \$10,000.00 Rutherford College First Mortgage Bonds heretofore held by this Board of Education and delivered to Brevard College, Inc., pursuant to action of the 1941 Annual Conference, must be released for cancellation in order that Messrs. Ivey, Spencer, and McGimsey, may effect sale of the Rutherford College real estate.

Your Board of Education approves the recommendations made by said Special Committee, and now recommends for adoption by this 1942 Annual Conference the following:

1. That Rutherford College be and is authorized and directed to sell, convey and assign to G. F. Ivey, C. A. Spencer, and J. F. McGimsey, their heirs, administrators, executors and assigns, all the real and personal property and receivables now owned by Rutherford College, in consideration of their agreement to pay, or cause to be released and discharged, all outstanding debts of Rutherford College.

2. That, upon the release of Rutherford College from liability for the payment of each and all of its outstanding debts, either by payment thereof or by written instruments of release, legally sufficient to protect Rutherford College from any claim of debt, this to be done within 30 days from the adjournment of the 1942 Annual Conference, Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College shall be forthwith merged and consolidated under an agreement of consolidation, now hereby fully approved, an exact copy of which is filed herewith, and by reference made a part hereof, the name of the consolidated corporation to be BREVARD COLLEGE CORPORATION, as set forth in said Consolidation Agreement.

3. That the entire income from the Higgins Fund, the Centenary Fund, and the Bradley Fund, shall be paid annually to Brevard College Corporation.

4. That Brevard College Day shall be continued.

5. That, in the event Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College are consolidated under the consolidation agreement heretofore mentioned, Brevard College Corporation shall raise and pay, annually, beginning with the Conference year 1942-1943, the sum of \$1,200.00, for ten years, a total of \$12,000.00, without interest, or earlier if a practicable plan for raising the money can be devised, to Messrs. G. F. Ivey, C. A. Spencer, and J. F. McGimsey, their administrators, executors and assigns, by way of reimbursing them to this extent for their payment of Rutherford College debts in excess of the debts of Rutherford College payable out of the assets of Rutherford College required by them.

6. That the Western North Carolina Conference continue its present annual appropriation of \$500.00 until such time as the \$10,000.00 E. M. Cole Trust Fund shall be fully established for Brevard College.

7. That, in respect to the \$10,000.00 of Rutherford College Mortgage Bonds, formerly held by the Board of Education and now held by Brevard College, Inc., in connection with the re-establishment of the \$10,000.00 E. M. Cole Trust Fund, these bonds be released and surrendered to Messrs. Ivey, Spencer, and McGimsey, to enable them to cancel the mortgage on the Rutherford College real estate in order that they may effect a sale thereof and convey good title.

Your Board of Education further reports that the Duke Endowment of approximately \$54,000.00, held by The Fidelity Bank of Durham, N. C., as Trustee, for the use and benefit of Rutherford College, should hereafter be held by said Trustee for the use and benefit of Brevard College Corporation, successor to Rutherford College and Brevard College, Inc., since Brevard College, Inc., has been doing the same character of work as heretofore performed by Rutherford College, especially in Christian education and in educating students in the ministry, and that the said work is to be carried on by Brevard College Corporation, and since Weaver College has already merged with Brevard College, Inc., leaving now Brevard College Corporation successor, as the only junior college in the Western North Carolina Conference owned and controlled by the Conference, which institution is in need of the aforesaid Endowment, and therefore, recommends as strongly as it can, that the aforesaid Endowment be transferred to the use and benefit of Brevard

College Corporation. That the process of merger between Rutherford College and Brevard College, Inc., has been before the Conference for sometime, and all other Endowments of Rutherford College have been transferred to Brevard College, Inc., and the final merger of Rutherford College and Brevard College, Inc., could not be completed until now, due to the heavy indebtedness of Rutherford College, which could not be assumed by Brevard College, Inc. That all of the indebtedness of Rutherford College has just now been paid and/or assumed by responsible parties, to the end that Rutherford College is now free of debt and in position to merge with Brevard College, Inc.

CONSOLIDATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN BREVARD COLLEGE, INC., AND
RUTHERFORD COLLEGE, MADE UNDER AUTHORITY OF CHAPTER 408
OF THE NORTH CAROLINA PUBLIC LAWS OF 1933

THIS CONSOLIDATION AGREEMENT, made this 22nd day of October, 1942, by and between BREVARD COLLEGE, INC., a corporation, chartered, organized and existing under the general laws of the State of North Carolina, and having its principal office at Brevard, Transylvania County, North Carolina, party of the first part, and RUTHERFORD COLLEGE, a corporation, chartered, organized and existing by virtue of authority of the General Assembly of North Carolina as contained in Chapter 234, Private Laws of 1915, as amended, party of the second part,

WITNESSETH:

For and in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College have agreed to consolidate, and do hereby consolidate, into a single corporation, whose corporate name shall be "BREVARD COLLEGE CORPORATION," to such full extent that "BREVARD COLLEGE CORPORATION" shall own all property, real, personal and mixed, tangible and intangible, including the corporate name and good-will, and hold the title thereto, and shall succeed to and have all rights, privileges and powers, both of Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College, to the full extent authorized and provided by Chapter 408 of the Public Laws of N. C., of 1933.

It is agreed that the charter or certificate of incorporation of the consolidated corporation, namely, "BREVARD COLLEGE CORPORATION," is as follows:

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION
OF
BREVARD COLLEGE CORPORATION

ARTICLE I

The name of this (Consolidated) corporation is BREVARD COLLEGE CORPORATION.

ARTICLE 2

The location of the principal office of this corporation in this State is at Brevard, Transylvania County, North Carolina.

ARTICLE 3

The objects for which this corporation is formed are to establish, conduct and operate at and near Brevard, Transylvania County, North Carolina, a co-educational junior college and academy to be known as Brevard College, said institution to be established, conducted and operated by the Board of Trustees of BREVARD COLLEGE CORPORATION, hereinafter provided, in trust for The Methodist Church, and under the control and direction of the Western North Carolina Conference of said Church; and said institution is authorized to conduct and operate work facilities and provide opportunities whereby students may earn in whole or in part their expenses while attending said institution. This

corporation is authorized to conduct and operate a farm, a garden, a dairy, facilities for handcraft, needlework, weaving, basketry, and work of similar vocations, a woodwork shop, a machine shop, a garage, and, in general, and all work activities of every kind and character suitable and adaptable for prosecution in large part by the work of the students attending such institution(s); and, in order properly to prosecute said objects and purposes, this corporation shall have full power and authority to purchase, lease and otherwise acquire, hold, mortgage, convey, and otherwise dispose of all kinds of property, both real and personal; to construct, equip and maintain buildings, works, factories and plants; to install, maintain and operate all kinds of machinery and appliances; and generally to perform all acts which may be deemed necessary or expedient for the proper and successful prosecution of the objects and purposes for which this corporation is created.

ARTICLE 4

This corporation shall have no capital stock. Through its Board of Trustees, hereinafter provided, this corporation shall be conducted and operated as a non-profit corporation, for the purposes of Christian education, in trust for The Methodist Church, and subject to the control and direction of the Western North Carolina Conference of said church.

ARTICLE 5

Subject to the control and direction of the Western North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, as hereinafter more fully set forth, the business and affairs of this corporation shall be administered and managed by a governing body, to be known as the Board of Trustees, consisting of Twenty-four (24) members, the original members of such Board of Trustees being the persons whose names and post office addresses in North Carolina are as follows:

Of the Trustees named in this article, the eight first named, to wit: D. B. McCrary, Paul Hardin, Jr., Guy Weaver, H. C. Sprinkle, Sr., R. T. Amos, James B. McLarty, George F. Ivey, and Cecil G. Hefner, shall hold office until their successors are elected by the Western North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church at its regular annual session in the year 1944; the eight (8) next named, to wit: William H. Bobbitt, H. A. Dunham, Claude H. Moser, James E. Lambeth, C. M. Pickens, Mike Ogle, O. V. Woosley, and C. P. Bowles, shall hold office until their successors are elected by said Western North Carolina Conference at its regular annual session in the year 1946; and the eight (8) next named, to wit: Mrs. C. C. Weaver, A. W. Plyler, Mrs. J. H. Pickelsimer, Mrs. E. L. McKee, S. E. Varner, George D. Finch, Edwin L. Jones, and Clyde R. Hoey, shall hold office until their successors are elected by said Western North Carolina Conference at its regular annual session in the year 1948.

The successors of the Trustees above named shall be elected by said Western North Carolina Conference in the following manner:

At the regular annual session of said Conference in the year 1944, and biennially thereafter at the regular annual session of said Conference, e. g., at the annual sessions of said Conference in the years 1944, 1946, 1948, 1950, etc., eight (8) persons shall be nominated by the Board of Trustees of Brevard College Corporation to serve as Trustees

for the term of six years and until their successors are elected. These nominations shall be incorporated in the report of the Conference Board of Education, and shall be submitted to the Conference with that report for approval or rejection. In case the Conference refuses to approve any Trustee nominated by the Board of Trustees, the Board shall nominate another. If the Conference shall reject the second nominee, the Conference Board of Education shall nominate for the vacancy and the Conference shall approve or reject. This shall be the process until such vacancy is filled. The Western North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church shall have power at *any* regular annual session, by a majority vote of its members, to remove from office any one or more of said Trustees; and such removal shall be made, without reference to what otherwise might or might not constitute legal cause for removal, if in its judgment such removal will promote the interest either of Brevard College Corporation or of The Methodist Church.

Vacancies in the Board of Trustees of Brevard College Corporation occasioned by death, resignation or removal, shall be filled by said Western North Carolina Conference for the unexpired term of the member or members who have died, resigned, or who have been removed, at *any* regular annual session of said Conference as provided above.

Members of said Board of Trustees must be at least twenty-one years of age; and at all times at least three-fourths of the members of the said Board of Trustees must be members of The Methodist Church.

ARTICLE 6

The said Board of Trustees shall administer the affairs of this corporation and conduct its business in trust for The Methodist Church, and subject to the control and direction of the Western North Carolina Conference of said Church; provided, however, said Board of Trustees shall have no power to sell, convey, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of, any of the real property owned by this corporation, unless specifically authorized to do so by the Western North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church. This proviso shall not apply to any additional property which the Trustees may purchase for the institution and upon which a mortgage may be placed for any balance of the purchase price.

ARTICLE 7

This corporation is authorized to acquire and receive real and personal property by purchase, gift, devise, or otherwise, and to hold and to administer such property for the benefit of Brevard College Corporation, and in accordance with the uses and trusts, if any, declared in any and all conveyances or other instruments under which said property is acquired. Specifically, this corporation is authorized to succeed to and own all property, real, personal, and mixed, tangible and intangible, and hold the title thereto, and to succeed to and own all rights, privileges and powers, including all powers necessary to administer all trust funds upon the uses and trusts declared in any will, deed, or other instrument, both of Brevard College, Inc., and of Rutherford College, to the full extent authorized and provided and conferred upon such consolidated corporation by Chapter 408 of the Public Laws of North Carolina of 1933.

ARTICLE 8

The said Board of Trustees shall have power to make rules, regulations and by-laws, not inconsistent with law, and not inconsistent with the provisions hereof. The said Board of Trustees shall fix the time and place of holding their annual and other meetings, shall elect the following officers of this corporation, namely: a Chairman of its Board of Trustees; a Secretary; a Treasurer; and such other officers as it may determine. Also, the said Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty, including the President of Brevard College, and such other employees as it may deem necessary. There shall be an Executive Committee, consisting of five (5) members, which Executive Committee shall have the powers and duties fixed by the by-laws and otherwise vested in it by the said Board of Trustees. The said Board of Trustees shall annually elect, from its members, four (4) of the members of this Executive Committee; and these four (4) elected members, together with the President of Brevard College, who shall be *ex-officio* member, shall constitute said Executive Committee.

ARTICLE 9

That ten (10) Trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular called meetings of said Board of Trustees; and it shall be the duty of said Board of Trustees, or of its said Executive Committee, as shall be determined, to fix the salaries of the faculty and of other employees, and to make all contracts and agreements necessary to the business and management of the corporation.

ARTICLE 10

The period of existence of this corporation is unlimited.

It is agreed that this consolidation agreement, when executed and acknowledged in accordance with law, and having attached thereto the written consent of a majority of the present Trustees of Brevard College, Inc., and a majority of the present Trustees of Rutherford College, shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State of North Carolina; and when so filed, the separate legal existence of Brevard College, Inc., and of Rutherford College thereupon shall be merged into Brevard College Corporation, and thereafter shall be only one corporation, namely BREVARD COLLEGE CORPORATION, having as its charter the certificate of incorporation fully set forth above. When this has been done, the powers and duties of the present Board of Trustees of Brevard College, Inc., and the powers and duties of the present Board of Trustees of Rutherford College, shall immediately cease and terminate; and thereafter the said present Board of Trustees and the present officers of the two corporations joining in this consolidation shall exercise no further powers or duties, except to execute such deeds, assignments, conveyances, or other documents, which shall or may be necessary to carry into full effect the terms and provisions thereof.

It is further understood and agreed that Brevard College Corporation, embracing both Brevard College, Inc., and Rutherford College, and constituting a continuation of each of them, shall succeed to and be vested with all rights and privileges vested in Rutherford College by that certain indenture, dated March 15, 1928, executed and delivered by Rutherford College to The Fidelity Bank of Durham, N. C., as Trustee, to which reference is made for its full terms and provisions.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, Brevard College, Inc., has caused this agreement to be executed in its name and behalf by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, attested by the Secretary thereof and its corporate seal hereto affixed, and has caused to be attached hereto the written consent of a majority of its Trustees, all pursuant to resolution adopted by its Board of Trustees by majority vote at a meeting duly called and convened; and Rutherford College has caused this agreement to be executed in its name and behalf by its President, attested by its Secretary, and its corporate seal hereto affixed, and has caused to be attached hereto the written consent of a majority of its Trustees, all pursuant to resolution adopted by its Board of Trustees by a majority vote at a meeting duly called and convened.

Executed by Brevard College, Inc., and by Rutherford College, in the aforesaid manner, and pursuant to the aforesaid authority of the respective Boards of Trustees, pursuant to the authority conferred upon said corporations and the respective Boards of Trustees by the Western North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church at its 1942 session.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

The cause of temperance presents itself to our Methodist people with a greater urgency than ever before. The church and all our people are engaged in a struggle which only the sober and temperate can be strong enough to victoriously survive. Our youth of tender age are faced with the actuality of being thrown into this malestrom. We bespeak and demand for them a leadership and an association strengthened by the full command of all of its faculties, physical, mental and spiritual. The very lives of our sons and our stake in this great struggle require it.

To this end we recommend:

1. That this Conference respectfully petitions the Representatives and the Senators of North Carolina to lend their earnest support to the enactment of any act, which is designed to prohibit the sale of intoxicating beverages within or in the vicinity of military posts. The certain lowering of the draft age to 18 makes this all the more imperative.
2. That copies of this petition be sent to the above mentioned officials and to the President of the United States.
3. We urge the pastors of our Conference to give the members of the churches they serve an opportunity to send similar petitions to our Representatives.
4. We earnestly believe that every pastor and every congregation should maintain the closest contacts with the men who have gone out from them to serve our country. This will strengthen them for clean living as well as bind them to the church and to Christ's Kingdom.
5. We urge our pastors to distribute copies of our Bishop's Address, including the section on the liquor traffic, to the members of our churches.

II. LAW ENFORCEMENT

1. We rejoice that no legal liquor is sold within the bounds of our Conference; but we warn our people that this should not be an excuse to stop the fight on illegal liquor.
2. We call on our church people to provide the local leadership to extend the lines of local option against beer and wine in their respective communities. Encouraging progress has been made in many communities, but all of our people must unitedly begin again the slow but steady process of local education and election.

3. To this end we pledge co-operation with law enforcement officers, with the United Dry Forces, with the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and with the Temperance Committee of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

III. TEMPERANCE EDUCATION IN THE CHURCH

1. Let the Cause of Temperance be presented in the District Conferences and meetings.

2. In the local churches, let us challenge our people to live temperate lives through all the channels we can use. Let us have temperance sermons, worship services, dramas, posters, community rallies and forums. Let us use the Temperance Units available for the church school classes, and temperance courses in vacation schools, Christian workers' training schools, summer camps and assemblies.

3. We recommend a wider circulation of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, which is always the militant champion of this cause.

IV. A PROBLEM OF GREED

Let our people be no longer deceived. The whiskey question is essentially a question of, and a battle against, human greed. Let us insist that our governing authorities take the profits out of the whiskey business.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

It is common knowledge that the world is in an era of confusion and violence. Our homes are being broken up by the war and preparation for it. Many of our most promising young men, members of the Methodist and other churches, are in training camps or on the fighting fronts. Vice is rampant around these camps, and in the war zones. If ever the church had reason to be diligent, it is now. Even before the war came, there had been a slump in the morals of this country. Liquor drinking and social vice were on the increase; and many churchmen seemed to be indifferent, if not complacent. The war has not improved the situation. The average layman thinks that he has done his full duty if he attends the eleven o'clock preaching service, and pays his pledge to the church. He believes that it is the responsibility of the preacher to do the necessary preaching and praying to save the world; and if he does not succeed it is just too bad. This is an unhealthy condition and should not be allowed to remain any longer than is humanly possible.

The object of the church is to redeem men and women; and even the small corner of the world in which we live cannot be made Christian, nor even moral, unless the laity of the church becomes conscious of its duty and performs it. Pardon our presumption, but one of the great tasks of the ministry in the near future is the full utilization of the laymen in evangelizing the world. The Board of Lay Activities has endeavored to direct the thinking of the church along these lines. During this year, we have had distinguished speakers to hold institutes, and make addresses upon stewardship and kindred subjects. In many of the Districts, the District League of Stewards has been organized, and is functioning, although a shortage of gasoline and tires has cut both attendance and the number of meetings. We feel, however, that we have barely scratched the surface of a most fertile field. We have an intelligent and consecrated ministry, and when we have an equally intelligent and consecrated leadership among the laity, we shall be going somewhere.

We recommend that the laymen of our church should:

1. Attend regularly upon divine worship and the church school of their church.
2. Adequately support the ministry and increase the benevolent offerings.
3. Read wholesome literature, especially the Bible and the publications of our church.
4. Keep in touch with our men in the training camps and across the seas.

5. Promote temperance and the proper observance of the Sabbath.
6. Observe Laymen's Day, February 21, and Dedication Week, February 28 to March 7.

We recommend the election of A. J. Kirby as Conference Lay Leader.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

HOME FOR CHILDREN

The Children's Home continues to serve all the orphan and indigent children who have a right to look to the Methodist people of the Western North Carolina Conference for an opportunity to live in their child caring institution. While not every applicant is admitted, every deserving case is being investigated and some help rendered.

The Home continues to be run on a sound financial basis. It is not in debt. The value of its property is listed at \$1,140,777. In addition to this amount the endowment totals \$550,930. During the past year 546 children were enrolled and 166,141 days of care recorded.

Due to careful management and good productive enterprises, our daily *per capita* cost is less than that of similar child caring institutions in North Carolina.

We have seventy-six fine boys in the service of our country. No Children's Home youngster appearing before an examining board has been turned down for physical unfitness. The morale of our youngsters left on the home front is fine and the general welfare of the family is reasonably good.

HOSPITAL

The Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital, assisted by donations from the Golden Cross and the Duke Endowment, has been able to care for 183 free patients during the past year; 2,446 days of free care having been given these patients.

There have been 1,980 admissions to the Hospital; and the total days of care, including free patients and free days, have been 18,392. A total of 765 operations have been performed. In addition to this work, 1,267 out-patients have been treated.

For this work the Hospital has expended during the past Conference year the sum of \$63,642.02 and \$22,364.29 professional fees, a total of \$85,988.31.

MISCELLANEOUS

We request the confirmation of the following Trustees for the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital for a term of three years: Mason Lillard, Thurmond Chatham, W. A. Neaves, and Alex Chatham.

We request the appointment of Rev. W. M. Smith as Superintendent of the Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital and Director of the Golden Cross in the Western North Carolina Conference.

We recommend that an amount not exceeding 25% of the Golden Cross funds raised in a given District be available for use for charity hospitalization in that District.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

The time is and has been for a spell when we ought to stop talking about Evangelism and start doing something about it in a plain, practical and common sense way. Your Commission on Evangelism tried to take a step in that direction last fall, and the Conference adopted the report when submitted in the same easy-going manner in which too many reports are adopted. Although the Commission's report of last fall contained some practical and definite suggestions, there was no Conference or even District-wide attempt to carry these suggestions to their practical fruition. Your Commission feels that its responsibility is considerably more than that of writing the report for each succeeding Annual Conference to adopt.

I.

When we speak of Evangelism we think of conversion, reclamation, rebirth. And we ought to. There are many people who need just that. Likewise, there are people who have been converted who need to grow. Spiritual growth is not something that just happens. Like all growth of which we have knowledge, there is intelligent effort back of the harvest. This means, among other things, that it is our responsibility to be continually suggestive and helpful. The General Commission on Evangelism has placed in reach of all many fine suggestions and material that should be helpful.

Therefore, your Commission recommends most urgently that every pastoral charge make generous use of the excellent materials that have been provided—such means of spiritual growth as: *The Upper Room*, *Tidings*, *The Pocket Prayer Book*, *The School of Prayer*, and *How to Conduct Family Worship at the Table*.

We also recommend that the spiritual possibilities of a watch night service be utilized and that one Sunday during January, 1943, be observed as Covenant Sunday, asking our people to reaffirm the vows of church membership.

II.

Your Commission feels that one of the missing links in our evangelistic endeavor is that of leadership. That our ministers and laymen are usually possessed of the evangelistic heart and head, we are convinced. Also we are convinced that training in evangelistic technique and leadership in simultaneous endeavor would be productive of some of the results we hope and work for. Consequently, in line of the findings and recommendations of the meeting of the Chairmen of the Annual Conference Commissions on Evangelism of the Southeastern Jurisdiction held at Lake Junaluska in August, your Commission recommends:

(1) That our presiding Bishop appoint a Director of Evangelism for each District to work with the District Superintendent in the leadership of simultaneous evangelistic efforts in the several Districts.

(2) That your Commission be given an hour at the next session of our Annual Conference to present its work to the Annual Conference.

(3) That a course on Evangelism be given at the Duke University Pastors' School.

(4) That the Commission on World Service and Finance appropriate \$200.00 for our work next year.

III.

Your Commission is charged with the responsibility of recommending applicants for appointment as Conference Evangelists. We have no disposition to be unnecessarily strict in the requirements of those desiring to enter this important field. We appreciate freedom of thought and action for ourselves and for others as well. But there are certain standards for Annual Conference Evangelists imposed by our church which we are duty bound to safeguard. In harmony with these, we recommend that Dr. John R. Church and Rev. J. W. Groce be appointed as Conference Evangelists.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

Your Committee begs leave to submit the following:

In the midst of a global war, whose far-reaching ramifications no one of us can appreciate or appraise, world peace seems a far off dream. And yet, despite such world conditions, the Church of Christ must still dream dreams and still see visions.

Because the Kingdom of God is first within we can do no less than envision a day when the world shall see peace between nations; and we can do no less than dream of the coming of His Kingdom in human hearts that will spell peace among men of His good pleasure.

But we have the utmost conviction that many things must precede the actuality of world peace and even the possibility of its coming.

We believe that the best foundation for and of world peace lies in the recognition of human worth. A recognition not alone by the individual in relation to another individual, but by every nation as respects another nation. For this reason we know there can never be world peace until oppressed peoples are liberated, and the security of nations assured. To these ends we believe the followers of Christ are committed by the Captain of their Salvation.

We believe that the recognition of human worth demands social justice whereby the rights of the minorities are acknowledged and the majorities sense the obligation of securing such rights; that likewise is demanded economic security whereby the goal of mankind shall be the lessening of physical, material and social ills for all peoples; and also that it demands moral and spiritual uplift for all peoples, which alone comes and grows by the throb of human hearts and the touch of human hands.

We believe that world peace will not be won by the triumphs of arms alone. A cessation of battle and an armistice between combatants can mean a truce—a truce perhaps that may last some years—but back of the triumph of arms and the role that victorious nations may play must reside and abide a fixed determination, within the heart and spirit of victorious peoples, that all nations must share the responsibilities for world conditions and world relations, must willingly assume the obligations involved, and yield allegiance to the purpose of setting and keeping all nations free and a world at peace.

We believe that some day wars must cease and that Peace must reign in our world. We ardently desire, we sincerely hope, we earnestly pray that so it may be. We know that it is more than a dream and greater than even the vision. But we also know that some great things must antedate it. And these things are happening now—toil and tears, sacrifice and suffering, shadows and sorrows, battle and blood, the dead and the dying—and will happen even more and more. But we also know that the philosophy of life that glorifies lust and cruelty and oppression and human slavery can never bring Peace to a world and that nations and peoples that exalt such a philosophy of life do not and cannot forever live. And nothing less than the righteous indignation of all peoples who love freedom and honor humanity can be evidenced against such a view of life. We know that the kingdoms of this world can only become the Kingdom of our God and His Christ as the philosophy of the Gospel of Christ is imbedded in human hearts and exemplified in the government and policies of nations. Only thus can freedom come and freedom live and freedom last, for "if the Gospel make you free, ye are free indeed." And this applies to both men and nations. To such objectives we dedicate ourselves, commit our services and pledge our loyalties that mankind shall be free and a world see Peace.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

This Corporation is jointly owned by the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences. Its main business, as you know, is the publication of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, and this paper has 10,200 subscribers within the bounds of the two Conferences. The assets of the Corporation, as reflected by the audit, is \$111,269.11, after deducting \$84,206.31 for depreciation, and this seems to us excessive depreciation. The Advocate building, built at a cost exceeding \$74,000.00, is in good physical condition and it and the other property are adequately insured.

Owing to war conditions the business has been conducted at a loss, this year, of \$2,788.05. This has been caused by the payment of taxes of \$1,524.00, the increase in costs of material, and the receipt of less money from the job department. We are anxious to get out of the "red" as soon as possible and we are doing our best to reduce operating expenses. After the expiration of the coming year the Board will have only one Editor and Business Manager and we think that other economies can be effected.

The Board desires to observe the spirit of the Retirement Law of the Methodist Church; and the present Editors expect to retire in October, 1943. The Board has already appointed a Committee to find a suitable Editor before that date.

The term of office of Dr. S. B. Turrentine as a member of the Board representing the Western North Carolina Conference has expired and the corporation nominates him to succeed himself.

The Corporation elected the following officers for the ensuing year:

President, Rev. A. J. Hobbs; Vice-President, N. L. Eure; Secretary, Thos. C. Hoyle.

Editors of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and Business Managers of the Corporation: Rev. A. W. Plyler and Rev. M. T. Plyler.

We respectfully solicit from the preachers and laymen of North Carolina Methodism a fair share of their job printing, but since the main business of the Corporation is to publish a religious paper for the Methodists of North Carolina, we would stress the increase of circulation of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*; and following the suggestion of the Editors in their report to us we recommend:

1. That the plan, inaugurated this last Conference year, of one yearly subscription for every fifty members of each church or charge, be continued for next year, so that this quota will extend over two years instead of one, thus allowing each pastor an additional year in which to complete the quota.

2. That our Methodist colleges, societies and Boards be urged to turn all possible business to the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc.

3. That the Methodist laymen of the State and businesses controlled or operated by Methodists in North Carolina be requested to give the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc., a fair share of their job printing.

REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION

COLLEGE PLACE, GREENSBORO

The Wesley Foundation work at College Place, Greensboro, continues under the leadership of Rev. R. M. Courtney, pastor, and Miss Louise Panigot, Director. 100 of the 300 first year students from Methodist homes have become affiliate members of College Place Church. There are 700 Methodists in the student body of Woman's College, U. N. C. A new feature of the work this year is the activity of fellowship groups in the dormitories. Thirty young women are active as leaders in these groups. These leaders are working together with the fourteen members of the Wesley Foundation Council and the Freshman Council. The girls are conducting a project for the underprivileged in an area near the campus. On three afternoons each week there are two club meetings for underprivileged girls, as well as supervised play periods and hand work classes for younger children. Financial support is being continued for a native pastor in the Congo. Total funds handled amounted to \$208.00.

FAIRMONT CHURCH, RALEIGH

Fairmont Church has developed as a church home for Methodist students in Raleigh. It has accepted responsibility for the spiritual welfare of about 700 Methodist students at State College, 100 in the Blind Institute, and 50 at Meredith College. The effective work of the pastor, Rev. H. M. McLamb, and of the Campus Church Relations Committee, with Dr. John W. Cell as Chairman, has developed a student church program which is worthy of the highest praise. This has been done without any assistance from the Annual Conferences, such as has been given to help our workers at the Chapel Hill and Greensboro units of the University of North Carolina. Help is needed and deserved at Fairmont.

CHAPEL HILL

The University Church at Chapel Hill has a greater responsibility to youth than ever, now that "the Hill" is crowded with the young men of the Naval Pre-flight School in addition to the usual student body. Dr. J. M. Culbreth, pastor, is carrying on, with the

assistance of volunteer workers. For a short time during the year Willis Sutton, Jr., was employed as part-time Wesley Foundation Director. Since his departure for army service, the effort to employ a part-time leader has been unsuccessful, and funds have been insufficient to secure a full-time Director. During this Conference year the Wesley Foundation Commission, on behalf of the Annual Conferences, has contributed an amount monthly to help maintain and operate the church plant at Chapel Hill, where Methodist students far outnumber the local members. The part-time worker was supported for two months. The Chapel Hill Church has made a significant forward step in the general situation by assuming entirely the salary of its pastor, without help from any outside source.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE WEEK OF DEDICATION

If our people are to remain firm and faithful in these trying days, it is imperative that additional emphasis be given to prayer and meditation. Furthermore, if the church is to serve our boys in military service, meet its responsibilities in defense industrial areas, face its responsibilities to war sufferers, and provide for our missionaries who face the tragedies of war, it is imperative that additional funds be raised for these purposes.

With these objectives in mind, your Committee endorses the suggestion that February 28-March 7, 1943, be designated as Week of Dedication, at the conclusion of which our people shall be given an opportunity to make a free will, sacrificial offering.

In line with this general program, we make the following specific recommendations:

1. Beginning on Covenant Sunday, January 3, and continuing through this entire period, let our people be urged to observe daily Bible reading, meditation and prayer. A family altar in every Methodist home would result in new spiritual power throughout our Methodism.

2. The observance of the period of dedication shall begin in each local church as early as possible. It may be introduced by three minute speakers at the regular church services, as the meetings of classes and clubs, and other church organizations. It is deemed advisable that these details be committed to each pastor to work out as may be thought best suited to his situation.

3. Sunday, February 21, shall be observed as Layman's Day and shall be made a feature in the preparation for the Week of Dedication.

4. Beginning Sunday, February 28, and continuing through Sunday, March 7, the Week of Dedication shall be observed throughout the Conference. The pastors shall be urged to hold meetings in their several churches throughout the week. They shall be urged to strike the deeper spiritual note of faith and dedication. In towns and cities consideration shall be given to the possibility of one central meeting during the week, bringing together all our Methodist people and securing the service of the best possible speaker. It is recommended also that our women set aside such time during this week for special meetings as may be practicable to cultivate the spiritual objective of the Week of Dedication.

5. Sunday, March 7, shall be Dedication Sunday. Let emphasis be placed upon personal dedication. At the morning and evening services let the offering be taken. In churches on circuits where the pastor does not preach on March 7, let the Lay Leader, or some layman appointed by the pastor, call the people together, lay the necessities on their hearts, and receive their offering.

6. The offering shall be remitted promptly to the Conference Treasurer, who shall in turn remit to Dr. O. W. Auman, the General Treasurer, for distribution among the participating causes, according to the schedule adopted.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON ENTERTAINMENT

Your Committee has taken note of the difficulties attendant upon the entertainment of the Annual Conference, such difficulties having been very greatly accentuated by present conditions. For example, the congregation at Central Church, Asheville, and other congregations of that city found it impracticable to undertake entertainment of the Conference this year. First Church and the other churches, and the city of Charlotte in general, have been so gracious and kind, even under present trying conditions, as to invite the Conference to meet here and have given abundant evidence that their traditional hospitality still lives.

It is plain, however, that it will be necessary to find some method of Conference entertainment more nearly approaching complete self-support, so that local churches and communities may not be subjected to abnormal strain or asked to do services not in keeping with the trend of our times.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends:

(1) That the Conference continue to provide clerical and lay members of the Conference and members of the Boards with meal tickets for lunch and supper each day of the Conference session, as heretofore.

(2) That the local church or churches at the seat of the Conference shall compile a list of rooms available either in hotels or private homes, or in both, sufficient to take care of the members of the Conference, and that the rates at which these rooms are to be had shall be plainly indicated.

(3) That the local Committee on Entertainment shall assist the members of the Conference in selecting rooms and shall give directions for reaching them, providing necessary transportation on the day before Conference meets and on the first day of the Conference session, as far as possible.

(4) That each member of the Conference, clerical and lay, shall be responsible for paying for his or her own lodging and for breakfast each day; provided, that the Conference Entertainment Committee in co-operation with the local committee shall make effort to find free lodging and breakfast for any retired clerical members of the Conference desiring such provision.

(5) That if the Conference does not, at this session, determine where the Conference shall be held for next year, your Committee shall be and hereby is instructed and empowered to fix a place for such meeting and to make the necessary arrangements with the local church or churches entertaining.

An Amendment to Report of the Committee on Conference Entertainment

That we add to the Committee's report the following:

(1) That nothing in this report shall be construed to prevent the Conference or the Conference Entertainment Committee from accepting an invitation for entertainment on the old basis.

(2) That should such an invitation be extended we will abide by the following rules which will be published in the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and also sent to each minister and delegate: in ample time before the next Conference:

- (a) That the local Entertainment Committee be requested *not* to furnish lodging for any one who does not make the request at least ten days before the first session of the Annual Conference,
- (b) That those who request entertainment be honor bound to go to the homes to which they are assigned,
- (c) That those who have unusual requirements be requested not to ask for free entertainment,
- (d) That should the entertaining church be unable to secure sufficient homes that it request the pastors and lay delegates from those churches paying the larger salaries to take care of their own entertainment.

(3) That the Chairman of the Conference Entertainment Committee meet each year with the local Entertainment Committee and be prepared to make suggestions gained out of previous years of the Conference's experience as to the best way to go about entertaining the Conference.

THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Report No. 1

Your Commission on Town and Country Work has made a study of the support of the ministry in the Western North Carolina Conference; and herewith presents to you some of the facts discovered, and also on the basis of these facts makes some recommendations which look toward the alleviation of the more distressing aspects of inadequate ministerial support revealed by these facts.

The current Journal of the Western North Carolina Conference reveals that there are 390 pastoral charges, having a membership of 181,180 active members, paying approximately \$650,000 in salaries to the pastors, exclusive of supplements from the Boards of Missions, the Duke funds, and other miscellaneous supplements.

The Median Charge of the Conference is one having an active membership of 470, paying a salary of \$1,665. The average *per capita* contribution in the Conference for pastor's salary is approximately \$3.50, which subsequently will be referred to as the Conference *per capita*.

Of this total of 390 pastoral charges, 156 or exactly 40% of them, provide their pastors a salary less than \$1,500, including supplements from the Board of Missions, the regular Duke fund, the special Duke fund, and all other miscellaneous resources.

In order to intelligently understand just what the problem is, and to ascertain what is required for its solution, it is necessary to know what these 156 charges themselves pay, exclusive of outside supplements. Your Commission has that data for each individual charge. In this report there is room only for a classification of that data, which is given as follows: Of these 156 charges, constituting 40% of the charges of the Conference there are:

- 37 that pay \$1,250 or more but less than \$1,500,
- 63 that pay \$1,000 or more but less than \$1,250.00,
- 28 that pay \$ 750 or more but less than \$1,000,
- 19 that pay \$ 500 or more but less than \$ 750,
- 9 that pay less than \$500.

No one of these charges provides as much as a \$1,500 salary, including all supplements and appropriations from all sources.

A further fact that makes this situation more distressing is that these 156 charges composing 40% of the charges of the entire Conference contain only 25% of the membership of the Conference. The Conference statistics reveal further that the membership of these charges as a whole pay the Conference *per capita* for pastoral support. The distressingly low salaries are due to the fact this 25% of the salaries of the Conference have to be shared by 40% of the pastors.

A little further statistical study reveals that not only do these 156 charges pay the Conference *per capita* for pastoral salary, District Superintendent, Episcopal fund, Conference Claimants, and Children's Home, but they are below the Conference average on benevolent giving only about 30c per member. What is likewise significant, their per cent gain on profession of faith is about one and one-half times the Conference average.

This condition, which necessitates sending to only 25% of the membership of the Conference 40% of the pastors to receive only 25% of the salary needs some remedy. The pastoral charge arrangement is about the best that the geographical location of the churches will allow. Your Commission believes this distressing situation demands the relief of a Schedule of Minimum Support for the Ministry which the Discipline provides in Paragraphs 556-559, and Paragraphs 810-813.

To provide a straight minimum salary of \$1,500 for all these 156 charges would require in supplements \$47,000 over and above what the Conference now has for such purposes from the Board of Missions and from the Duke fund. Your Commission doubts the possibility of providing such a sized fund in the first place, and in the second place we do not believe it would be wise, were the funds available, to set a straight minimum on all these 156 charges.

A Schedule of Minimum Support for the Ministry calls for further analysis of essential factors involved. The personnel of the ministry appointed to these charges, and the varied character of the charges themselves enter profoundly into consideration. The ministers involved consist, in varying numbers, of members of Conference in full connection, of members of Conference on trial, of accepted supplies doing full-time work, of other supplies employed by the District Superintendents for part-time work, and of members of Conference doing part-time work. Then the charges involved are not all of the same character. They roughly fall into three groups, designated below as groups I, II, and III.

GROUP I

Group I consists of 28 charges which pay less than \$750 in salary. 19 of these 28 charges have insufficient memberships to pay, at the Conference *per capita*, as much as a \$750 salary. Of the remaining 9 charges in this group, 5 barely have memberships sufficient to pay a \$750 salary. These 28 charges represent as many points of Home Mission work.

GROUP II

Group II consists of 28 charges also, which are very varied in character and are grouped together because of two things they have in common. First, they have memberships sufficient to pay, at the Conference *per capita*, salaries of \$1,500 or more; and, second, they don't do it. Beyond these two items they vary greatly. Actually six of them lack only a little of paying \$1,500 salaries, and these, together with several others, could, with a little financial cultivation, be brought to such salaries. The remaining 15 or 16, for a number of various reasons, are likewise so many points of Home Mission territory.

GROUP III

Group III consists of 100 charges which pay salaries of more than \$750 but less than \$1,500, and none of which has a membership sufficient to pay, at the Conference *per capita*, a \$1,500 salary. 66 of these charges are paying more than the Conference *per capita* for salary and 16 more are paying within less than 10% of it. Of the remaining 18, 3 or 4 are so small in membership or so little above a \$750 or both as to approach a mission status.

Supplement

A somewhat simpler analysis groups these 156 charges into two groups as follows:

74 of these charges are, for various reasons and to varying degrees, mission territory. Several of them are now paying almost a \$1,500 salary and these, together with several others could, with some financial cultivation from the Board of Missions, be brought to pay adequate salaries. A little over half of them are, from the standpoint of small memberships, and under development in giving, strictly mission territory. But this is as it should be. A Conference grows by means of branching out and taking in Mission territory, and developing it, and then taking in more. The 74 charges represent about a correct proportion of mission territory for a Conference the size of this. And the Mission Board has funds sufficient to provide adequate salaries for this much work. The real low salary problem in this Conference is in that other 82 charges of these 156 charges.

None of these 82 charges pay a \$1,500 salary or appreciably close to it, and none of them have a membership sufficient to pay, at the Conference standard, a \$1,500 salary. Yet 66 of them are paying more per member for pastoral support than the Conference *per capita*, and the other 16 are in less than 10% of it. Taken as a whole these 82 charges are paying for pastoral support above the Conference average. The low salaries are due to this situation: These 82 charges constitute 21% of the charges of the Conference, contain only 11% of the church membership, and pay 15% of the Conference total salary. Remedy for low salaries in this group is to be found other than in Conference resolutions asking them to increase their salaries. They are now paying one and one-third times the Conference average.

On the basis of the above analysis of the character of the 156 charges paying a salary of less than \$1,500, and in consideration of the personnel of the ministers appointed to these charges, we make the following recommendation:

That the Western North Carolina Conference set a Schedule of Minimum Support of the Ministry, to be reached as rapidly as conditions involved will allow, which will provide a minimum salary of \$1,500 for a member of Conference in full connection, \$1,200 for a member of Conference on trial, and \$1,000 for an accepted supply doing full-time work. (Paragraph 556, 810.)

In order to achieve such a schedule we further recommend:

1. That after consultation with the District Superintendents, relative to those charges which are mission, either by reason of their small memberships or low *per capita* giving,

the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension shall make such regular and conditional appropriations from its regular funds as shall reasonably assure the above minimum salary for a member of Conference or an accepted supply.

2. That the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension, out of a Sustentation fund hereinafter provided, and also out of its regular funds, shall appropriate to those charges paying the Conference *per capita* or near thereto, and more than a \$750 salary, an amount necessary to provide the above minimum.

3. That to raise the fund above mentioned in recommendation 2, the Conference maintain a Sustentation fund as provided in Paragraphs 558-9 and 812-13 of the Discipline, as follows:

- (a) Apportion to the charges an amount equal to 5% of that part of the pastor's salary above the minimum salary set by the Conference. This shall be interpreted to apply to charges paying salaries of \$1,501 or more, provided that charges paying the minimum salary or less be permitted to contribute to this fund on a voluntary basis. (Paragraph 558, 812.)
- (b) Likewise apportion to all effective ministerial members of the Annual Conference an amount equal to 5% of that part of their salaries above the minimum salary set by the Conference (exclusive of house rent allowance where parsonage is not provided). This shall be interpreted to apply to salaries of \$1,501 and above, provided that ministers receiving the minimum salary or less be permitted to contribute to this fund on a voluntary basis. (Paragraph 559, 813.)
- (c) These apportionments shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension.
- (d) The apportionment from the charge and from the pastor shall be added together and reported in the column headed "Sustentation" on Table III of the pastor's report to the Annual Conference.
- (e) This schedule of minimum support and the apportionments to maintain it shall be in effect with the passing of this action.

The above recommended apportionments on charges and pastors and other ministerial members of the Conference would yield a Sustentation fund of approximately \$18,500. This fund, together with the Conference Mission fund and the Duke fund, will enable the Board of Missions to make such appropriations as will reasonably assure a minimum salary of \$1,500 for a member of Conference in full connection, \$1,200 for a member of Conference on trial, and \$1,000 for an accepted supply doing full-time work.

THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Report No. 2

(ADOPTED BY THE W. N. C. CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK, SEPTEMBER 9, 1942, AT HICKORY, N. C.)

We have the following statement about the function of the Commission in the 1940 Discipline, Paragraphs 982 and 1184, Section 2:

"The Commission shall meet annually at least four weeks before the session of the Annual Conference. At this meeting the Commission shall outline a program of Town and Country Work to be presented to the participating Conference Boards and agencies and it shall seek to co-ordinate all such work of the various Boards and agencies."

During the first year of its organized life, this Commission has not had the opportunity to make the necessary studies which would be preliminary to any effort to outline a program of town and country work to be implemented by the Bishop, the District Superintendents, the ministers and the various Annual Conference Boards and agencies. However, it does seem urgent to offer the following observations and recommendations in this field.

1. We call attention to the fact that the majority of our 1100 churches are town and country churches and that most of them are on circuits.

2. We appreciate most deeply the plans and work of all Boards, agencies, paid and volunteer leadership on the Conference, District, sub-district, and local church levels in the interest of the Kingdom of God in town and country.

3. We observe that there has been an increasing number of these churches beautifully and appropriately marked. We feel that it is not out of the range of possibility for all unmarked churches to be marked this year (1942-43). Laymen and ministers of unmarked churches should take this appeal to heart. We suggest, too, that the District Superintendents consider checking on this matter at Quarterly Conferences and that it be included as one of the questions for the District Conference reports this year.

4. We appreciate the efforts of all groups concerned with the matter of raising the salary level of the low-income charges. We commend the studies made in this area and recommend that further action be taken by this Commission and the Conference toward a more adequate solution of this situation.

5. We feel that part of this solution must be a better understanding of stewardship. We recommend that the Board of Lay Activities and the Board of Education co-operate in working out a more definite and aggressive program of stewardship education.

6. In this same connection we need a more vital program of missionary education in these churches, making use of study classes, leaflets, slides, films, fourth Sunday programs, and other available resources. We call upon the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Board of Education, and the Board of Missions and Church Extension to co-operate in intensified efforts toward this end.

7. In spite of travel difficulties, we recognize need for personal visitation and cultivation work in town and country churches. This cultivation by paid and volunteer con-nec-tional workers on the Conference and District levels is expensive in time and money. We recommend, therefore, that every effort be made among these workers to co-operate, and co-ordinate their contacts with town and country churches. An example of what may be done along this line is found in the joint promotion of the Methodist Youth Fund by the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Board of Education.

8. In town and country churches in the South we find the highest birthrate in our nation. We urge that every effort be made to bring these children and their parents under the wing of the church. The vacation church school ranks high in its effectiveness, along this line. Every church should provide a vacation school for its children every year.

9. The church has a supreme obligation to lay the foundations for winning the peace. We have some excellent materials available for the study of the bases of a just and durable peace. It would be less than our Christian and patriotic duty if we did not see that every church had full opportunity to study this matter. We recommend that this be near the top on the list of "musts" for this year and that the necessary plans be made to carry it out.

10. We emphasize the absolute necessity for a further evangelistic awakening in our churches, especially those in town and country. We would interpret evangelism in its broadest sense as being both a passion and the methods of bringing new persons to know Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior and of bringing all areas of our lives increasingly to be more Christlike. The Commission on Evangelism and the other agencies concerned will want to make careful and prayerful plans in this connection.

11. Many people are leaving small towns and the country. They are going into war work or into the services of their country. Our church will lose greatly unless her efforts fit new conditions. There should be constant cultivation of ministers and people as to what can be done to keep in touch with their people and how to co-operate with the churches and other agencies in the situations into which their people have moved. Wide

use of the devotional book, *Strength for Service to God and Country*, for example, would be helpful.

12. We urge ministers to co-operate when possible with other denominations in the neighborhood and with various agencies which seek to build a more Christian community.

13. The time is overdue for our church to make more extensive use of radio. Since many members of town and country churches have radios, this can be one of our best methods of cultivation. This matter is not confined to town and country, so we recommend that Bishop Purcell and the Cabinet appoint a Committee at Conference to investigate possibilities in this area during the coming year and report to them.

14. We recognize county papers as valuable educational agents in country life. A recent study of the amount and type of religious news in these papers in our Conference showed that they would give plenty of space to religious news but that the news they got was not very vital or well written. Conference agencies could send occasional releases to these papers, and ministers should use them more extensively.

15. We have an almost unlimited opportunity to provide our people with Christian leaflets, pamphlets, papers and books to read during the long winter nights. We dare not leave all propaganda to pagans! Better use and circulation of our *Advocates* are greatly needed.

16. Too many books and too little money! We recommend ministers' book clubs in counties or Districts as one solution.

17. We give our support to the Rural Fellowship Luncheon at Annual Conference which is under the auspices of the Conference Rural Fellowship.

18. It is our purpose to sponsor a rural church exhibit at Annual Conference this year.

18. We recommend that a copy of these suggestions be made available to each member of the Commission and to the Secretaries of the Conference Boards and agencies involved.

20. We recommend that the Steering Committee carry on such studies during the coming year as will be for the best interest of town and country churches in the Conference.

We recognize that these items represent only a few of the emphases in a well-rounded program of town and country work. Yet we feel that these and other efforts in the same direction are worthy of best planning and most vigorous action of the Boards, agencies, and leaders of the Conference during the coming year.

CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD MINUTES

The Western North Carolina Conference Brotherhood met in thirty-fourth annual session in the First Methodist Church, Charlotte, N. C., October 21, 1942, at 3:00 p. m., with the President, H. G. Allen, in the chair. The audience filled the church. The hymn, "Am I a Soldier of the Cross?" was sung, and Rev. J. P. Hipps led in prayer.

The Secretary read the minutes of the Executive Committee meetings held in Statesville, November 25, 1941, and in Lexington, September 21, 1942. He then read his report, as follows:

"Eleven clerical members of the Brotherhood have died during the past Conference year: Brothers J. L. Teague, J. E. Abernethy, E. N. Crowder, A. L. Rayle, D. A. Bailey, D. V. Howell, E. K. Whidden, G. A. Stamper, R. L. Melton, J. W. Long, and M. F. Moores. The total benefit of \$1,200 has been paid to the beneficiaries of the first four who died, and a large proportion of this amount to the others. Sufficient funds have been collected at Conference to complete the payments to each. We have 445 clerical members and 366 lay members on the mailing list at the present time. Some of these are in arrears with their payments, however, and should be encouraged to pay up."

The audit of the Brotherhood books covering the period from May 1, 1939, to November 30, 1941, and prepared by H. C. Northrop, C.P.A., was submitted for inspection. The audit contained the following comment: "We found the records of the Treasurer neatly and efficiently maintained for the period of review."

The President appointed the following Nominating Committee: W. A. Stanbury, E. L. Kirk, O. V. Woosley, R. F. Huneycutt, L. D. Thompson.

Mr. George Martin rendered a vocal solo, "The Holy City." He was accompanied by Mrs. J. W. Howie.

Mr. Edwin L. Jones, Conference Lay Director, was introduced and he spoke briefly, emphasizing his joy in working on behalf of the Brotherhood, and urging all laymen to join.

Dr. W. A. Stanbury presented the report of the Nominating Committee as follows: For President, H. G. Allen; Vice-President, R. C. Goforth; Secretary-Treasurer, C. C. Herbert, Jr.; Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, F. C. Smathers; Director Laymen's Division, E. L. Jones; members of Executive Committee: H. G. Allen, R. C. Goforth, Paul Hardin, Jr., C. C. Herbert, Jr., L. E. Mabrey, W. J. Plint, and C. C. Weaver. The meeting was opened for further nominations but none were made and on motion these officers were elected unanimously.

Mr. E. L. Jones presented the speaker, the Honorable Clyde R. Hoey, who spoke in a most eloquent and inspiring way of the value of the Brotherhood. Mr. Hoey gave three reasons why laymen should belong to the Brotherhood. (1) The Brotherhood offers a method whereby a layman may contribute to the family of a preacher in an unembarrassing way. (2) Through the Brotherhood, money is given when it is most urgently needed. (3) The Brotherhood gives a minister a feeling of security and stability. Mr. Hoey suggested as a minimum benefit for the Brotherhood \$2,000.00, not too high a goal for the almost 200,000 members of W. N. C. Methodism. He spoke of the joy his contributions to the Brotherhood gave him and earnestly exhorted all laymen to join.

The hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have," was sung, and there being no further business, the meeting adjourned with a prayer led by Rev. R. C. Goforth.

Historical

1. Historical Sketch

“The Western North Carolina Conference shall include all North Carolina west of the North Carolina Conference, except Savannah Church, in Alleghany County, North Carolina; and also that part of North Carolina lying north of New River, and including that part of Virginia lying south of that river in the loop in Grayson County, Virginia; including all the territory in Carroll and Patrick Counties, Virginia, south of the crest of the Blue Ridge, and west of the Dan River.” (Discipline, 1940, paragraph 1418).

This territory is identical with that of the Western North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South. All three branches of Methodism forming The Methodist Church are included in this new Conference. From the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church came thirty-nine ministers and 11,901 church members. The North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church contributed seventy-four ministers and 22,361 church members. The Western North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, added 377 ministers and 167,028 church members. This gave the new Conference 490 ministers, with twenty-eight others on trial, and 201,290 church members. The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference had held 62 sessions, the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, 112, and the Western North Carolina, 50. JOSEPH EDGAR ABERNETHY



If the white soul of Joseph Edgar Abernethy could leave the abode of the blest and enflesh himself again here before us today, he might address us with his favorite form of introduction and say, "My friends." Long before our President made that salutation famous J. E. Abernethy had used it, and when he uttered it every ear became attentive.

We were all his friends and some of us appreciated it more when we recall that he had about him the solitary loneliness of genius. His spirit was broad-gauged and benevolent but he seldom opened his bosom to his associates and he was familiar with none. Yet many of us feel the warmth of his hand clasp and still see the flash of his smile that could light up his serious face like the beam of a searchlight across the night sky. In the firmament of man he was outside the Milky Way—a star of first magnitude that had his own orbit and shined more brightly because it was fellowless. No nebulae or cluster dimmed his light which was an example to us for forty-six years of his public ministry.

During this time he filled the usual number of earlier appointments and then having proved his ability and worth he was in demand for places like Gastonia; Monroe; Mt. Airy; Trinity, Charlotte; Salisbury; and Centenary, Winston-Salem. In most of these charges he put in a full four years and served an equal time as presiding elder of the Statesville District. Everywhere without exception he maintained a high order of ministry. The stainless banner of the Cross suffered no soiling at his hands and the honored title of "Man of God" fit his character like the neat clothes he had on his body. His preaching was no pale compromise with the world; rather it was a blood red and royal redemption proclaimed in the power and demonstration of the Spirit. Evangelism, the genius of Methodism, found in him a great evangel and many souls can call him father. He was a true prince of the pulpit, a powerful promulgator of the Gospel; an artificer of words who strung them on his great themes like pearls on a rosary—and at the end a cross was hung—a Cross on which the prince of Glory died. How he loved to preach! and often there poured from his lighted face streams of thought, beautiful and torrential, like sounding cataracts from his native hills. There remain few among us with his talent for ornamenting the central doctrines of salvation and holy living. Endowed with a voice of strength and resonance, he cultivated it until, when coupled with his deep seriousness and flashing dark eyes, it seemed the very voice of heaven. It was akin to Isaiah's wild seraphic fire and we listened with awe and admiration. He would not permit slovenliness of speech in the pulpit nor shabbiness of attire outside it. With perfect penmanship he wrote out sermons in "long hand" which are yet models of form and substance. No one ever got a letter from Ed Abernethy who was not impressed with the beautiful flourish of his Spencerian pen. The writer recalls his last association with him in a funeral chapel in this city (Charlotte). The deceased was a personal friend and by request Dr. Abernethy delivered the talk. With solemn mein and graceful gesture he launched his address with these arresting words: "If I had my way there would be no death," and for a few minutes he berated the grim monster and gave him a mighty drubbing. Then came the note of victory and he moved on to "conclusions wherein we saw the God within light his face." The grave was robbed of its victim by the shout that life is ever lord of death and love can never

lose his own. In his mouth the words took on meaning. "I am the resurrection and the life and he that liveth and believeth on me shall never die."

His character matched the mountains that cradled him and he belonged to that race of few but fine men who by their sheer ability and genius become the founders of our conferences and the leaders of their generation. Like all strong men he knew the disciplines of hardship and struggle. The saga of human sorrow and divine deliverance is the measure of his days.

"There may be angels, there may be seraphim; I never saw such an one. I never saw the book that he wrote nor life that he lived nor death that he died. But I have seen men; through weariness and pain—use their handicaps as stepping stones to higher things, until they occupied heights of glory compared to which Caesar held the dominion of by a day."

There is a hiatus on the hills where he stood and only a preacher called of God and dedicated to his work can fill his place.

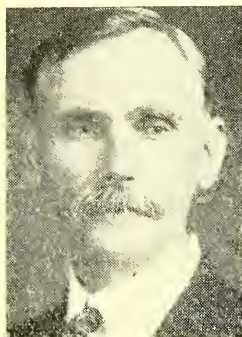
On October, 1923, he answered the call to the Gospel ministry and united with the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in which communion he served efficiently the following charges: Harmony, one year; Marion, three years; Walkertown, three years; Huntersville, seven years; and Palestine, two years. After the union of the Methodist Churches, he was assigned to the Liberty Circuit in Randolph County, which he served faithfully for more than a year when his health failed and he was forced to retire from the active ministry. He often lamented the fact that he could no longer preach the glorious gospel of the Son of God to a dying world.

Brother Bailey was a World War veteran. While in action in France he was so severely wounded that it became necessary to amputate one of his legs in order to save his life. As a result he never fully regained his health. In the last year of his life, he spent much time in government hospitals in the hope that he might be restored to health, but to no avail. On the morning of May 20, 1942, the end came, and his spirit returned to the God who gave it.

On the morning of May 21 a brief service was held in Liberty, conducted by District Superintendent S. W. Taylor, assisted by the writer and Rev. Mr. Andrews, a minister of the Friends Church. The body was carried to the Eagle Springs Methodist Church where, in the presence of a large congregation of friends and admirers, the final services were held. Dr. S. W. Taylor, superintendent of the High Point District, conducted these services. The principal address was delivered by Rev. W. A. Parsons, a life-long friend of the deceased. The body was laid to rest in the cemetery hard by the church in which our brother dedicated his life to the services of his Lord. All of us enter sympathetically into the grief and sorrow of the wife and children, and we devoutly pray the blessings of a kind Heavenly Father to abide with them now and ever more.

EDWORTH NEWTON CROWDER



Edworth Newton Crowder was born near Lawndale in Cleveland County, North Carolina, on November 13, 1865. His parents were William Nelson and Permelia Haynes Crowder. He came into the world at the beginning of the Reconstruction, lost his father when he was six years of age, and spent the years of his youth laboring on a farm in support of his mother and several brothers and sisters.

Amid hardship Edworth Crowder managed to attend Belwood Institute where he received a fair education. At the age of twenty-three he received exhorter's license and was appointed to supply the North Cove Circuit in McDowell County. That year, 1894, he was married to Miss Mary Sharpe Doggett of Forest City, North Carolina. To this union were born six children—Kenneth,

Lucy, Horace, Mary Elizabeth, Willie Lou and Katherine. Mrs. Crowder died May 5, 1939.

In the fall of 1895 E. N. Crowder was admitted on trial at Reidsville, North Carolina. This marked the beginning of a ministry which was continued uninterrupted for thirty-seven years. He served the following charges: Silver Creek Circuit, Saluda Circuit, Clear Creek Circuit, Hayesville, China Grove, Crouse, Mount Holly, South Fork, Shelby Circuit, Ozark and Lowell, Stanley Creek, Randolph, Stony Point, Mooresville Circuit, Rutherfordton, Waxhaw, Hickory Grove, Walnut Cove, Gold Hill, Granite Quarry, and Lowesville.

Because of failing health while serving the Lowesville Charge, Brother Crowder took the superannuate relation in 1932. After retirement he moved to his home in Rutherfordton where he lived until his death on April 5, 1942. He was a faithful supporter of the church in Rutherfordton so long as he was able.

Edworth Newton Crowder's funeral was conducted at First Methodist Church of Rutherfordton on the day following Easter, April 6, 1942. The Rev. C. S. Kirkpatrick, superintendent of the Marion District, assisted by Reverends F. C. Smathers of Rutherfordton and J. L. Hood of the Troutman A. R. P. Church, conducted the service. The body was laid to rest by his companion and two children in the Tanner's Grove Cemetery of Rutherford County.

This minister of Jesus Christ served well the worthy common people of this Conference. He was an earnest and effective gospel preacher, an understanding and faithful pastor, and a member of the fellowship of good men.

Long live his memory and influence.

DAVID VANE HOWELL



Our entire Methodist family was shocked when on May 29 news came that our beloved and trusted brother, Rev. David Vane Howell, the pastor of Brevard Street Methodist Church, Charlotte, had been stricken with a heart attack, and had suddenly been called from his earthly tasks to his heavenly reward. Although Brother Howell was confined to his room for several weeks in the winter, he had recovered sufficiently to take up his duties at the church.

The last rites were held Saturday afternoon, May 30, at the Brevard Street Methodist Church. Rev. G. T. Bond, the district superintendent, was in charge, and was assisted by Howard P. Powell, L. R. Akers, S. M. Needham and Embree H. Blackard. Friends from Charlotte, High Point and other cities where Brother Howell had served

filled the church auditorium. The beautiful floral offerings expressed the high esteem in which his friends held him. On Sunday the body was taken to Mills River Chapel, eight miles from Hendersonville, where Brother Howell had served as pastor from 1932 to 1936. Assisting Dr. Bond in the service at the grave were Rev. J. D. Morris, pastor, and Rev. T. A. Groce.

Such men as D. V. Howell are the glory and crown of the Christian ministry. His life was not marred by a blighting ambition for position and honor. In Christ-like devotion to his task he embodied those qualities which Jesus said characterized the men of the Kingdom. Those who knew him and had the privilege of working with him realized that he was "poor in spirit," "meek," "merciful," "pure in heart," and was numbered among those who "hungered and thirsted after righteousness." Judged by the standards Jesus used in testing greatness our brother is among the greatest in the Kingdom. Without such faithful, loyal, devoted and pure hearts as was his, the Kingdom of God would falter and fail.

Brother Howell was admitted on trial into the Western North Carolina Conference in 1915. Because of his devotion to his task and his zeal for the Kingdom, he had a succession of most happy and successful pastorates. During his twenty-seven years of active ministry he had five four-year pastorates. He was beloved by all his people. During his confinement in High Point with a broken leg, and during his recent illness in Charlotte, he carried on from his bed an aggressive program. In spite of his illness he brought his church to one of the most successful peaks of its history. He had magnetic ability to inspire loyalty among those whom he served. His own generous giving to the benevolent causes of the church led his people to measure up always to their responsibilities. He served the following charges: Murphy Circuit, 1915-16; Highlands, 1916-18; Waynesville Circuit, 1918-22; Danbury, 1922-23; Bryson City, 1924-28; Candler Circuit, 1928-32; Mills River, 1932-36; Calvary, High Point, 1936-40; Brevard Street, Charlotte, 1940-42.

Brother Howell was a student and a wide reader. Very few of his brethren read more books or kept better posted on modern methods of work than he. Significantly, one of the books beside his bed at the time of his death, unopened, was "The Conquest of Death."

One of Brother Howell's greatest contributions to the church was a Christian home. In 1914 he was married to Miss Maggie Jaynes of Haywood County, who survives him. To them were born five children: Lucille, Hugh, Clara, Martha and Ruth. The beautiful relation in the home which existed between husband and wife, parent and children, is worthy of emulation. Out of modest salaries he sent three of his children through college, and the fourth through the sophomore class. These children have caught the father's sacrificial spirit and have banded

themselves together to insure the completed education of the two younger sisters.

Our brother was not afraid of death. Knowing by what a slender thread he held on to life, he faced the end sustained by the same faith with which he had comforted others. We shall miss him in the ranks of our itinerant brotherhood on earth, but with confidence we believe we shall joyfully labor together again in God's triumphant church above.

He joined the Western North Carolina Conference at Monroe in the following November. He served the following Charges: Dobson Circuit, 1902-05; Epworth, Concord, 1905-09; Spring Garden (now College Place), 1909-11; Andrews, 1911-12. In the fall of 1912 the officials of the North Carolina Sunday School Association sought and secured his services as Field Secretary, a position he held for seven years, relinquishing his tasks only after declining health made it necessary for him to do so. He entered this field at a

time when the whole Church School outlook was undergoing a period of transition. He pioneered in the field of religious education, finding himself quite at home in the presence of men like Marion Lawrence and H. M. Hamill. More than twenty-five years ago I heard him in a great Sunday School Convention advocate a Superintendent of Religious Education for each county whose work would parallel that of the Superintendent of Public Education. Not in method, but in purpose and objective, we have lived to see his dream come to fulfilment. In his mind and efforts there was no dividing line between evangelism and religious education—they were one. He was extremely interested in both and did the work of both successfully.

There are small areas, as well as nations, that produce men whose name stands for character and personality, who are unique in the realm of life. Such an area was the Piedmont Section of North Carolina and such a man was Walter Long. "Walter Long" then, and still, suggested a jovial, genteel, Chesterfieldian Christian gentleman. His life was pure, his language chaste. He was a guide and an inspiration to the young life in his native section and in his pastorates.

His father, the Rev. Miles H. Long, a local elder in the Methodist Church, was a religious leader in Yadkin and surrounding counties for many years. Prayer was the vital breath of the home in which Walter Long was reared and to talk religion was as natural as to talk of matters pertaining to the farm. Robert Burns knew such a home and it inspired him to write an immortal poem: "Cotter's Saturday Night." James Whitcomb Riley could have found in the home of Rev. Miles H. Long and his wife that type of friendliness and sociability that would have inspired another poem similar to "Out to Old Aunt Mary's." It is still true, as the life and achievements of Walter Long, as well as the lives of his brothers and sisters, prove, that "From scenes like these Old Scotia's grandeur springs."

His big heart and broad sympathies necessarily made him an effective mouth-piece for souls in pain. His presence oftentimes lighted the dark room of the afflicted even into the late hours of night; struggling youth were helped toward the level of their ambitions and beggars were fed at his door.

He was lacking in those educational qualifications now demanded of young men entering the ministry, but his enthusiasm, his high and holy purposes, coupled with an untiring energy, enabled him to overcome any scholastic deficiency in the realm of theological training. He was a student of Prof. Z. H. Dixon of the Yadkinville Normal School from which he received high conceptions of life and its possible achievements. His teacher could show stars in the heavens and inspire his pupils to follow whithersoever they led. As a result of this type of teaching, Walter Long took into his soul elements of courage that made him attempt "the high that seemed too high and the heroic of earth that seemed too hard."

On April 9th, 1907, he was married to Annie L. Miller of Linwood, N. C., who rendered her full share to the usefulness of his life. It can be said of her:

She kept his face turned toward the goal
And made of him a better soul.

Mrs. Long, four daughters, and a host of friends will think of heaven as a joyful abode since he is there.

Again a parting sail we see—
Another boat has left the shore,
A kinder soul on board has she
Than left the land before;
And as her outward course she bends
Sit closer, friends.

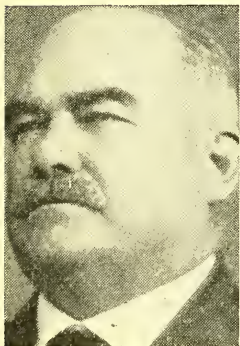
In November, 1901, Brother Melton entered the Methodist Protestant Conference at Henderson, North Carolina. The first four years of his ministry were in the following Methodist Protestant Churches: Plymouth and Edenton, 1901 and 1902; Caroleen Circuit, 1902-05. In 1905 he transferred to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Broad River Circuit, 1905-06; Deep River Circuit, 1906-10; Coleridge Circuit, 1910-14; New London Circuit, 1914-15; Coleridge Circuit, 1915-18; Olin Circuit, 1918-22; Statesville Circuit, 1922-25; Salisbury Circuit, 1925-28;

Woodleaf Circuit, 1928-30; Olin Circuit, 1930-31. Due to ill health Brother Melton retired from the active pastorate at his own request in 1931. He lived in his house at Harmony until a few years ago when he and his family moved to Granite Quarry.

Many children, young people, and adults were brought closer to God and many rural churches and parsonages were built and remodeled under his fine leadership.

Brother Melton was happily married to Miss Jennie E. Baber of Rutherford County. Ten children were born to this happy union. Four of these children preceded their father to the world of rest.

On Sunday morning, September 6, 1942, Brother Melton was ready to go to church in Granite Quarry when God called him home. His good wife and the following fine sons and daughters survive: Misses Maude and Mary Melton of Granite Quarry; Mrs. H. J. Weaver of Hamptonville; Mrs. Fred Poole of Mayodan; Harold S. Melton of Granite Quarry; Paul T. Melton of Greensboro. There are three



grandchildren: Mrs. Cleo Lassater of Hamptonville; Harold Melton, Jr., and Anne Melton of Granite Quarry.

The funeral service was conducted at the Granite Quarry Methodist Church on September 8, 1942, by the pastor, Rev. C. G. Isley, assisted by District Superintendent C. N. Clark, District Superintendent J. S. Hiatt of Statesville, and Rev. J. E. McSwain of High Point.

Throughout his entire life Brother Melton loved to sing. The last Sunday that he attended church he sang "The Ninety and Nine" as a solo. MILLARD FILMORE MOORES



Fifty years is a long time! But in this case it represents, not the span of a life, but the active ministry of one man—Millard Filmore Moores.

Born at Richmond, Kentucky, November 7th, 1871, he grew in wisdom and stature to the age of 18 years when he was converted and called to preach. He was educated in the public schools of his native state and at Kentucky Wesleyan College and Ohio Wesleyan University.

He joined the Kentucky Conference in 1892, when he was only 21 years of age. In 1907 he was transferred to the Western North Carolina Conference, where he rounded out his fiftieth year in the Methodist itineracy in the month of September of this year—having thrown in an extra month for good Methodist measure.

A moment ago I said, "Fifty years is a long time!" It is a long time for the doing of many things. It is an exceptionally long time for the doing of one thing. How tedious and tasteless any task may become in so long a time! Not many persevere so long.

And yet, for fifty years Millard Filmore Moores walked with God among men! And how he walked: with grace and dignity he walked; with gentle firmness he walked amid the reeling times through which he lived. Nothing daunted by the vicissitudes of life, he moved quietly and gently, yet purposefully, along with a singleness of purpose which motivates only those sweet souls who walk with God. In character and courage, strong as a lion was he, but in the course of human events as he dealt with the wise and the prudent, the ribald, the rude, "he took as he found them—and did them all good."

He dealt gently with the souls of men. He was fair in his judgments of men. He loved our frail humanity, and sought to lift up men to that place and circumstance where they could see the face of God. He never faltered from this purpose nor swerved from this course. Until the day of his release, his purpose held that he would go walking with God among men. And with this hope abounding still, he "sighed his spirit toward the other world." How more real and less strange that world should seem to us since he has journeyed there.

Twice he knew the love of women, and entered into that honorable estate which signifies to us the mystical union that is in between Christ and His church. He was first married in 1897 to Miss Sarah Nichols who died in Asheville, N. C., in 1907. To this union was born one daughter, Mrs. Vera Moores Lowry, now deceased. He was again married in 1910 to Miss Ada Buttrick. To this union were born three daughters: Mrs. Ralph W. Mitchell of Spartanburg, S. C.; Mrs. Robert F. Pitts of Glen Alpine, N. C.; and Mrs. C. W. Stewart, Jr., of Maxwell Field, Montgomery, Ala.

Besides Mrs. Moores and the daughters above named, Brother Moores is survived by one brother, Rev. Robert Moores of Salt Lick, Ky.; and three grand children: Ann Moores Lowry, Margaret Ada Mitchell, and Lee Ada Stewart.

The funeral service was held from the Black Mountain Methodist Church in the pastorate of which he laid his burdens down.

Interment was made in the family plot in the City Cemetery in Hendersonville, N. C.

The services were conducted by the Revs. Dr. W. A. Lambeth, L. W. Colson, Dr. D. E. Camak, and this writer, his last District Superintendent.

Brother Moores served long, faithfully, and effectively. He lived nobly and gently. He passed away peacefully. He rests from his labors, and his works do follow him.

ALFRED LAYTON RAYLE

Alfred Layton Rayle, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Rayle, was born at Summerfield, N. C., September 17, 1906.

At an early age, under the Christian influence and training of a Methodist home, he was converted and joined Center Methodist Church.

When he had finished high school he felt the call to preach, and in obedience to this call he sought to prepare himself for the ministry. He was graduated from Rutherford College, and two years later received his A.B. degree from Guilford College.

On May 29, 1934, he was happily married to Miss Pearl Morrow, of Statesville, N. C. To this union were born two children, Carolyn and Ronald.



In the fall of 1934 at the Annual Conference at Greensboro he was admitted on trial into the Western North Carolina Conference. At the Conference at Charlotte in 1938 he was ordained an elder. In his short but fruitful ministry he served only three charges. Three years at Fines Creek and three at Bryson City, both of which are in the Waynesville District. In the fall of 1940 he was appointed to the Stanly Charge in the Gastonia District, where he did a most magnificent and monumental work.

On the night of April 9, 1942, he fell on sleep. At two o'clock in the afternoon of April 11, the funeral service was conducted in the beautiful new church

he had completed, by Bishop Clare Purcell, Rev. B. Wilson and the writer. His body was laid to rest in the cemetery of Bethlehem Methodist Church near Statesville.

Brother Rayle took his call to the ministry seriously, as he took everything else. He was not afraid of hard tasks. He literally believed that if there was a work that should be done, the Lord would lead and open a way for it to be done. He had the spirit of the pioneer Methodist preacher who, when he heard the call, dared to answer and go wherever he was sent and do whatever was to be done. He had the very happy gift and inspiration to see beyond present hindrances and discouragements to the brighter and the hopeful in every task of the church. He would not give up and those who worked with him were so inspired by his faith and courage they could not give up.

In undertaking the building of the new church at Stanley he undertook what seemed to many an impossible and hopeless task. But there never seemed to be a day when he had the least doubt that it could and would be done. He saw the need and felt that the Lord wanted it done and he set his face like flint to do it. Soon he had so inspired faith and confidence in his people that they too believed it could be done. He was never happier than in those days as he gathered materials and found resources for the building of God's house. This faith and determination characterized all his work. He seemed to hate indecision, slothfulness and failure more than anything in the world. He could not see why everyone could not do something.

We think he fell too soon. Out of the very blossom of his ministry and promise he went. In the face of the great need of our world for men of his daring devotion and heroic faith we would have perhaps had it otherwise. But God knew best. A strong, valiant young soldier of the Cross has fallen from our ranks. He fell in the midst of duty.

A few days before he died, he called his devoted wife and companion in the ministry to sit down by his bed and talk over with him his going. He gave instructions about his funeral, advice concerning the children and his wishes for her. Calm, undisturbed and confident, he looked to the close of his short ministry. Although he hoped to the end that he might live to serve longer, he seemed to have completely surrendered everything to the will of God.

In his life and in the hour of death he portrayed that devotion and trust and confident assurance in the love and wisdom of a Fatherly God as found in that verse of the old Methodist hymn:

"O love that will not let me go,
I rest my weary soul in thee;
I give thee back the life I owe,
That in thine ocean depths its flow
May richer, fuller be."

GILBERT ABRAHAM STAMPER



Gilbert Abraham Stamper was the eldest son of George Washington and Sarah Alley Stamper. He was born December 2, 1871, near Shepherds Cross Roads, in Iredell County, North Carolina. On January 27, 1898, he was united in marriage to Miss Rosan Weaver of Concord, North Carolina. This union was blessed with four sons and three daughters: C. A. Stamper and R. H. Stamper of Tampa, Florida; E. H. Stamper of Greensboro, North Carolina; G. W. Stamper of Winston-Salem, North Carolina; Mrs. H. M. Hallenbeck of West Hartford, Conn.; Mrs. William H. Smith of Flushing, L. I., New York; and Miss Jean Stamper of Winston-Salem, North Carolina. These, with the widow, survive.

From boyhood Brother Stamper felt called to preach, but due to lack of finances and limited education he did not respond until 1905 when, at the insistence of his presiding elder, Dr. Dan Atkins, he applied for and received local license. He served the Big Lick Charge in 1906 as supply. Thrilled by the realization of a boyhood dream, he was easily encouraged by Dr. Atkins to apply for admission into the Western North Carolina Conference. He was admitted on trial in 1907. In 1909 he was ordained deacon by Bishop James Atkins, and an elder by Bishop Collins Denny in 1912. He served the following charges: Jackson Hill, 1907-08; Salem, 1909-10; Main Street, Salisbury, 1911-14; Mt. Pleasant, 1915-18; Leaksville, 1919-22; Green Street, Winston-Salem, 1923-24; Hillside Street, Asheville, 1925-27; Centenary, Greensboro, 1928-31; Canton, 1932; Burkhead, Winston-Salem, 1933-36; Central, Spencer, 1937; West Greensboro, 1938-1941. At the close of his quadrennium at West Greensboro, because of failing health, he asked to be retired. He died at his home in Winston-Salem on August 4, 1942. His funeral was conducted in Burkhead Methodist Church in Winston-Salem by Dr. C. C. Weaver, assisted by Rev. W. K. Goodson and the writer. He was buried in the beautiful cemetery in Concord, North Carolina.

Like most Methodist preachers, Brother Stamper was reared on a farm and attended the public schools of his native community. His educational advantages were limited. He did not have the advantages of college training, yet in no sense was he an uneducated man. He did much to overcome the lack of scholastic training through application to study throughout his life. He was an outstanding example of the self-educated man. Being a devout and diligent student, he attained a highly practical education that made him eminently useful, efficient and successful as a preacher of the gospel. He had a quick and discerning mind and a remarkably retentive memory. He was blessed by nature with a fine sturdy physique, good health, a striking personality and a commanding presence.

Brother Stamper's life was a splendid example of devotion to Christian ideals and a revelation of the triumphs of Christian faith. He was faithful to every trust committed to him. His life was a radiant example of the enduring significance of the true and the good. His devotion to his home and family was beautiful and constant. He was kind-hearted, sincere and sympathetic. He was the friend and companion of his children and held their unbounded esteem and love. His life was clean and wholesome. No stain was ever found upon his vesture.

As a pastor Brother Stamper was eminently successful. From the day he entered Conference until the day of his death his serious and earnest devotion to the cause to which he had dedicated himself was a glorious challenge to those who knew him best. He was a ready and willing worker and addressed himself to whatever task assigned him with conscientious devotion. Loyalty to the right and courage to stand by his convictions were dominant traits of his character. He was the very embodiment of sincerity and honesty. He hated hypocrisy and

sham. He had a correct conception of values. He put first things first. No one could induce him to leave the main issues and waste time with non-essentials and trivialities. Perhaps some people, who did not know him well, might have thought he was gruff and hard at times, but he was just the opposite, for he was as kind and tender-hearted as a mother. He was deeply interested in the welfare of the people committed to his charge. Wherever he lived his life was a benediction; rich in loving ministrations; splendid in example of conduct; fruitful in good works. He possessed a fine and discriminating sense of humor that made him an acquisition to any social circle and a source of constant cheer. His effectiveness and popularity as a pastor can be noted from his record. For thirty-four years he was a faithful pastor and twenty-four of these were spent on six charges of four years each.

Brother Stamper was a preacher of marked ability. His preaching ability was his main fort of strength. The pulpit was his throne. It was here he appeared at his best. He loved to preach and he was a preacher whom the people heard gladly. His deep and clear Christian experience, as well as his firm grasp of Christian doctrine, gave a definite content to his preaching, and his gift of utterance enabled him to convey that content to the minds of his congregation. His sermons were always carefully prepared, rich in thought, and delivered with great force and vigor. He had a pleasing and impressive voice. Those who heard him were convinced by his sincerity and earnestness. He never rode any hobbies. As a preacher he was clear, strong, eloquent and invincible. He spoke with the authority of the true prophet and yet with the tenderness and pathos of a real shepherd. To a marked degree he possessed the ability to warm the hearts of men with the message of God. His sermons came from his own heart and reached the hearts of those who heard him. He understood, preached and ably defended the doctrine of the church. Truly he was a great preacher.

When the end came it was not so much the sound of a death knell, but rather a summons to a reward. For thirty-four years he was a faithful minister; a workman that needed not to be ashamed. So after suffering for months, his feet having grown tired with the roughness of the way, he crossed the narrow vale that intervenes between this life and the eternal world and entered into rest. Dying as he had lived, trusting in the Savior he had served and preached, death to him was gain. "Peace to his ashes."

The Western North Carolina Conference has lost one of its best members. He was a brother beloved and will be greatly missed. A faithful minister, a successful pastor, a kind husband, a good father, a splendid citizen, a Christian gentleman has been called home. "A prince in Israel has fallen."

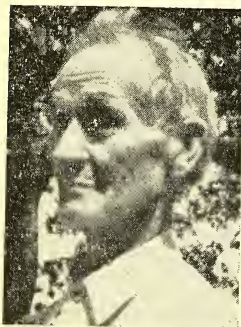

JOHN LAWSON TEAGUE

With the passing of the Reverend John Lawson Teague on January 17, 1942, there was brought to a close the career of one of the most useful Methodist ministers of North Carolina and Tennessee. "Uncle John," as he became affectionately known, was born on March 1, 1886, in Haywood County, North Carolina, the son of the late James Wilson Teague and Martha Adeline Kirkpatrick Teague.

Brother Teague was converted at the age of eighteen and was licensed to preach two years later, on August 30, 1880, at Ferguson's Camp Ground, in Haywood County. He was admitted on trial into the Holston Conference and ordained a local deacon at Bristol, Tennessee, in 1884. At Knoxville, Tennessee, in October, 1886, after



serving a year each at Rossville Mission, Chattanooga, and Hendersonville, N. C., he was received into full connection in the Holston Conference.

The next two years were spent in study at Vanderbilt University. At Asheville, N. C., in 1888, he was ordained a local elder by Bishop Hargrove and was appointed to the Sweetwater Circuit. In the same year he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Summers Conwell, a granddaughter of Bishop Joshua Soule. To this happy union were born five children who survive: W. C., John, Perry, Florence, and Martha (Mrs. T. A. Wigginton). Surviving also is a second wife, the former Miss Ellen Duke Moss of Greensboro, Ky., to whom he was wed on April 12, 1905.

In 1889 Brother Teague transferred to the Tennessee Conference where he served the following charges over a period of twenty-three years: Sandersville, 1889; Manchester and Tullahoma, 1890; Alex Green Circuit, 1891; Castalian Springs, 1892-94; Bethpage, 1895-96; Pleasant View and Ashland City, 1897-99; Montgomery Circuit, 1900-03; Southside, 1904-05; Sango, 1907; Smyrna, 1908-10. One year of this period, 1906, was spent as a supernumerary.

In 1911 he was transferred to the Western North Carolina Conference where he remained active for nine years. He served the Macon Circuit from 1911 to 1914; Webster, 1915-17; Black Mountain, 1918-19. After spending the year 1920-21 as a supernumerary, he was superannuated and remained in this relation until his death. He was not, however, inactive during these years. For one year each he was assistant pastor at Clyde and Junaluska, and pastor at Highlands. Until the last three years, when failing health prevented, he was busy as Sunday school teacher and preacher in various churches of Macon County, where he made his home.

He was known throughout this region of Western North Carolina and was loved and honored by its people. His life and character were a benediction to all. He never failed through a long life, by example and message, to advance the cause of Christ. Many who, under his preaching and teaching, found fellowship with the Master, rise up to call him blessed.

His love for children was evidenced by the fact that late in life he took into his home four motherless little sisters and gave them the advantages of an education and a Christian rearing. These survive to mourn his passing.

He was a man of rare humility and consecration who radiated the spirit of Christ. One did not come from his presence without feeling uplifted and strengthened in faith. He sought not position but service. In many pulpits of North Carolina and Tennessee the people heard him gladly.

The funeral service was characterized by a tender note of triumph. There were no lamentations, but a sweet calm possessed the souls of a concourse of people who filled the auditorium at Union. The old Methodist hymns were sung and the congregation joined in the singing. Anyone familiar with Methodist history would recall the closing hours of Mr. Wesley, who entered Heaven with the melodies of song ringing in his soul. Or his mother who said to her children: "When I am released, sing."

His testimony could not have been more appropriately stated than in the poem read at his funeral at the Union Methodist Church in Macon County:

My outward vision's dim,
 My inward eye is clear;
 My every thought of Him
 Disperses every fear.
 I know life's outcome will be right,
 For now at even time there's light.

Some night, or morn, or noon,
 Life's journey will be done.
 Nor do I fear if soon
 My endless life's begun.
 Then, Oh the bliss of that first sight
 When path and pillow flame with light.

The services were conducted by Revs. J. C. Swaim, J. L. Stokes, and W. L. Hutchins, all of whom had some part in the preparation of this obituary.

JOHN M. WALL



The Reverend John M. Wall, son of Miles and Elizabeth Bruner Wall, was born in Surry County, North Carolina, July 13, 1870. For a number of years he taught school in Yadkin County, but in 1911, feeling that God had called him to a full-time service for Him, he entered the ministry and joined the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, where he enjoyed a fruitful ministry until he was forced to retire because of ill health in 1938.

Brother Wall served the following charges: Ararat, Yadkin, Harmony, Winston-Salem, Walkertown, Bessemer City, and Wilkesboro. During his pastorate the churches were spiritually strengthened. They grew in membership and church property was improved. Not only was he a valuable pastor, but he proved himself of much value to the Conference in many ways. For years he was on the Board of Ministerial Training and greatly encouraged young men entering the ministry through his fine spirit of love and helpfulness. He served also on the Committee of Conference Relations and was, at one time, district superintendent of Winston-Salem District.

He was married to Miss Irena Frances Key March 23, 1893. To this union was born seven children, two of whom preceded their father to the grave. To his home, Brother Wall gave great love and devotion, providing for it in an unusually fine way and educating the children to a far greater degree than he himself was able to enjoy. One of the great joys of his friends was the privilege of visiting with him in his home. Surviving him are the widow; three sons, A. L. Wall of Walkertown, Dr. L. E. Wall of Charlotte, and the Reverend E. A. Wall of Cincinnati, Ohio; two daughters, Mrs. Roxie Moore of Walkertown, and Mrs. Reece Williams of Olin; nine grandchildren, and four brothers, M. W. Wall of Vass, C. C. and T. J. Wall of Ararat, and W. S. Wall of Shannon.

The news of the passing of Brother Wall on May 21, 1942, brought sorrow to a host of friends and hundreds of souls who had been lifted to God through his proclaiming the Word. His preaching was evangelistic, fervid, courageous and effective. He was a man of God, cheerful in the work of the Master and untiring in his zeal for the Kingdom.

In 1895 and 1896 he served Maitland Circuit, Inverness Circuit, and Green Cove Springs, Fla.; 1896-97, Webster, Fla.; 1897-1904 he served Mt. Dora and Eustis Charges, after which he was engaged in mission work in Tampa, Fla., and Chicago, Ill. About 1905 he did

evangelistic work in the Spring Lake and Townsend House Committees. His health was not sufficient to continue in this type of work so he rested four or five years. During this time he preached when able.

During the next few years he was pastor of Fruitland Park, Lake Como and Dania, Fla. Due to ill health he was transferred to the New Mexico Conference where he preached for three years, serving Lovington and San Jon, New Mexico.

In 1922 the Bishop transferred him to the Western North Carolina Conference where he served Emma Charge near Asheville and later Jonathan Charge near Waynesville, N. C. There he was superannuated about 1926.

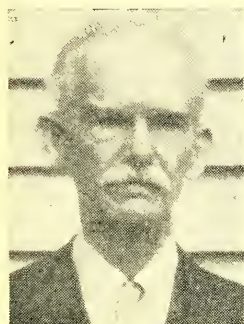
Later he went to Penney Farms, Fla. He was elected teacher of the Men's Bible Class the four years he spent there. He returned to Delwood, N. C., making his home near his son and daughter.

It was his pleasure yearly to attend the old Townsend House Home-coming in Florida, where he usually preached.

His health permitted his attending church and Sunday school on the last Sunday before his death. He often preached and taught the Word until he was called home July 16, 1942.

He is survived by his wife, Stella Norton Whidden; two daughters, Mrs. L. M. Owen of Waynesville, Route 2, and Mrs. D. R. Morrison, Montgomery, Ala.; one son, Wilbur Whidden, of Delwood. Nine grandchildren, six great grandchildren, five brothers, seven sisters, and a host of other relatives and friends mourn his death.

Funeral services were held at Shady Grove Methodist Church on Jonathan Charge at 3:00 o'clock, July 17th. The Rev. G. M. Carver, pastor; Rev. W. L. Hutchins, district superintendent; and Rev. W. M. Robbins, a close friend of the deceased, officiated.



Brother Whidden was a scholar of the Bible. He fought the forces of evil that God hates and stood for the things which God loves. Few questioned his beliefs. His firm stand against those things which are evil and for the things which are righteous made it easier for men to follow him in God's work.

He not only contributed a Christian home, but taught and desired that others would have the same. We shall greatly miss him in the ranks of our itinerant brotherhood on earth, but with confidence we believe we shall joyfully labor together in God's triumphant Church above.
