CONSTITUTION

1. The Association shall be composed of the pastors and of the members, not exceeding three from any church, chosen by the churches, who shall produce letters certifying their appointments. Members thus chosen and convened together with the pastors shall be denominated "The Roanoke Baptist Association," which shall have no power over the churches, nor shall it infringe on any of the rights.

2. The letters from the churches shall contain the number then in fellowship, and of those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded or died since last Association.

3. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, and Auditor, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

4. Other churches, upon petition by letters and by delegates, and after a satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, may be admitted to the body by unanimous vote, when the Moderator shall give the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

5. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion of the Association, whether it may be debated or not.

6. The Association shall furnish the churches with copies of its minutes.

7. The minutes of the Association shall be read and approved and shall be signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association adjourns.

8. Any church not representing itself in this body three successive sessions by letter or by delegates, shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless reasons are assigned.

9. The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church which shall be found disorderly in faith and practice.

10. Visiting brothers from sister churches, or similar bodies, may be invited to participate in our deliberations.

11. At each session of the Association, delegates to the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention shall be chosen by vote.

12. This Constitution is subject to alteration by a majority vote of the delegates at any session.

13. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

14. The Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator.

Rules of Decorum

Believing it best to be governed by certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of the Association, we adopt the following:

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator.
3. The person speaking shall adhere strictly to the subject, and in no way reflect on any other brother.
4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted unless he violate some rule of decorum.
5. No brother shall absent himself from the Association without obtaining permission from the body.
6. The names of the delegates shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
7. The Moderator may give his ideas on any subject before putting it to a vote, but is entitled to vote only in case of a tie.
8. The order of business shall be made at the beginning of each session, and shall be changed only by a vote of the body.

Theme: "The Living Lord in the Life of the Individual"

On Tuesday October the 15th the Roanoke Baptist Association began the thirty ninth session of its existence with the Roanoke Rapids Baptist Church.

The Rev. Guy C. Moore was appointed to lead the congregational singing for the day and opened the session by leading the congregation in singing "In the Cross". The Rev. W. E. Goode, pastor emeritus of Scotland Neck Baptist Church, led in the opening prayer.

The devotional thought was given by the Rev. C. E. Godwin, assistant pastor of the First Baptist Church of Rocky Mount. He read a passage from Ephesians 4:17-32 and led the congregation in praying "The Lord's Prayer".

The address of welcome was given by Mr. Julian Allsbrooke of Roanoke Rapids.

Mr. Charles M. Griffin of Wilson responded.

The Moderator called for all new pastors to come to the platform and they introduced themselves and told their work and location. They were, Paul Lemons, Stantonsburg; E. W. Holmes, Farmville; Wistar Hamilton, Washington; Worth Grant, Weldon; C. W. Kreamer, Halifax Field; and H. L. Coppedge, Macedonia.

All Educational Directors were requested to stand, introduce

themselves, and tell their location. Those responding were, Miss Ethel Guest, Williamston; Miss Elizabeth Hayworth, Washington; Miss Virginia Beall, Tarboro; and Miss Verdie Chapman, Arlington Street, Rocky Mount.

Among the visitors present the following were recognized. The Rev. and Mrs. R. D. Stevenson, West Chowan Association; Mrs. Nell Huggins, assistant to the Pastor, Tarboro; Rev. P. R. Jackson, Field Representative of Wake Forest College; The Rev. Craig Jones, Tar River Association; and Dr. L. L. Carpenter, Editor of the Biblical Recorder, Raleigh.

Our Moderator gave the following address, "Visions of the Roanoke".

"VISIONS OF THE ROANOKE"

Thirty-nine years ago the Baptists of this section had a vision of what they might accomplish by forming an association. They called it the Roanoke. There were 49 churches with 4,603 members. These churches were housed in mostly plain frame buildings, scattered over this large area of mission territory. The main source of income was farming and a bare existence was all to be expected.

There were 23 pastors living within our borders. Not many had degrees and they received small salaries, only \$502.00 average annually. They drove horses for many miles to fill their appointments. They were battling with every sort of difficulty but they were looking forward to better conditions in Eastern Carolina.

Today we have very few of the old "faithfuls" living who struggled through the organization and general set-up. Most of them have gone to their reward and we must keep the faith and go on visualizing. We are in quite a different environment. 79 churches; 18,400 members, modern buildings, many full pastorates with well trained pastors living on the field, paved roads and modes of travel have made the once large areas just a big neighborhood. Many industrial plants with huge payrolls are located in our midst. Farming has become very profitable and we have prosperity. These are dangerous days, yes, I mean dangerous because it takes great courage to resist temptation when our people get into higher brackets materially. We must realize that we cannot pay our way into the Kingdom of God. We paid \$356,586.78 to all causes last year; but we also paid during the month of August \$952633.05 for liquors, (not counting beer). One third of the liquor counties in North Carolina are in our Association.

What were we going to do in the postwar world? We built a whole Associational program on the post war plans. Have we met those objectives? We need to check closely on our lives and get a

clearer vision of what Christ would have us do. Are we satisfied when we should be very much dissatisfied? Surely one of our great sins is sin of neglect.

Where there is no vision the people perish." Zoologists have divided the animal kingdom into two classes, vertebrates and invertebrates, those with backbone and those having none. We as Christians ought to have backbone, strong convictions and moral firmness. We must not sway to and fro with every wind that blows. If we would greatly improve the quality of our membership I believe we would have quantity. I do not believe we would have to stress evangelism so much if all our church members lived up to the **Ten** Commandments that we have recently studied in our Sunday Schools. They would see something different in us from the non-church member. So as I visualize tomorrow's needs I say, (1) Let us not be conformed to the things of this world but be transformed into more Christ-like men and women seeking to know God's will for our lives, and then carry out that will. (2) Organization is always essential and I would suggest that a committee of seven be appointed to rewrite our Constitution and By-laws, and to report to this body one year hence. (3) That the cause of Christ be advanced by our churches lending their full cooperation in the forming of compact fields so that the pastors may live in the midst of their people thereby knowing their thoughts, ideas, and talents that a better program of work be accomplished for Christ and His Kingdom. (4) Every person within our borders have a church building within reasonable distance that will radiate the spirit of consecrated members who want God's House a thing of beauty.

Let us have visions of consecration, growth, and cooperation in tomorrow's world.

The Rev. J. D. Williams of Tarboro then presented the printed program for the day and order of business which was unanimously adopted.

Upon count it was determined that 31 pastors and a large number of messengers from the churches comprising the Association were present, a quorum was declared, and the session was opened for business.

The first item of business was the election of officers. Mr. Coley who had been Moderator for seventeen years made the following address after which the election continued.

RESIGNATION

Just seventeen years ago this morning you elected me to one of the highest positions that Christian people of Eastern Carolina have to offer. I rejoice very much in the fact that you, my home

people, have trusted me through these years. I realized even at the beginning my limitations and have on several occasions offered my resignation, but when you good people re-elected me unanimously each time, I felt that maybe the Lord could use me in His service to some advantage, and therefore agreed to serve to the best of my ability.

As it was not a unanimous election last year I fully realize that I no longer need to stand in the way of a united people. In unity there is strength. No office holder could possibly receive more loyal support than I have received from our 15,000 to 18,000 Baptists during these 17 years.

I am praying that God will guide you in the selection of one who will love Him, and you, and will lead you in a marvelous way.

John T. Coley.

Mr. John T. Coley was elected to succeed himself as Moderator. Other officers elected were, Clyde E. Baucom, Wilson, Vice Moderator; R. L. Collins, Wilson, Clerk-Treasurer; M. M. Johnson, Spring Hope, Auditor.

A motion was made by J. W. Robbins, Sharpsburg, that the Clerk's salary be increased to \$100.00 per year. C. J. Shields, Scotland Neck, placed a second to the motion and it was unanimously adopted.

A motion was made by C. E. Baucom, Wilson, that a committee be appointed to study the present constitution and make recommendations at the 1947 meeting of the Association. R. E. Hardaway, Greenville, placed a second to the motion and it was unanimously adopted.

MOTION

I move that we go on record as favoring the revision of the constitution of the Roanoke Baptist Association as advocated by Brother Coley; (2) that we implement our favor by creating a revision committee of seven; (3) that our moderator be requested to name three of these members, that the Ministerial Association be requested to name three, and that the Woman's Missionary Union of this Association be requested to name one; (4) that this committee be authorized and empowered to consider the revision as suggested by the pastors of this association herewith placed in your hands, and that they bring to us for our consideration at our 1947 annual meeting a revision of the constitution of the Roanoke Baptist Association.

The following committee was appointed to examine an application of a newly organized church. C. E. Baucom, Chairman,

Wilson; J. W. Kincheloe, Rocky Mount; Ira D. S. Knight, Williamston.

An address on "Religious Literature" was given by L. D. Holt, Bethel.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

The first and most important of all reading matter for Christian People to read is the Bible. It is recorded in the Bible that all Scripture is given by and through the inspiration of God. It is God speaking to us. In order for us to hear God's Message through other Religious Literature it is necessary for us to catch the familiar tones of God's Voice that are found in the Bible.

1. The Place for the Bible:

A. In the Home is the place for the Bible. The Home is an Institution of God; it is the basis of society. In God's institution should be God's Book. This Great Book should not be hidden by anything, but remain open speaking its Divine Message.

B. In the hand is a good place for the Bible. The Divine Word should be in the hand of every member of the family every day, so that the Voice of God may be heard and His Message received.

C. In the Head is a better place for the Word. Memory should be stored with the precious passages of truth so that it can support and strengthen in time of temptation. Keep the truth of the Book in mind and depend on it.

D. In the Heart is the best Place for the truth of the Bible. The teachings of the Bible must be accepted and assimilated into the very soul and life so one can say with the Psalmist, "Thy word have I hid in mine heart that I might not sin against Thee." Give the Bible the right place in your life and you will certainly give all good Religious Literature the right place in your life also.

2. Other Material is offered by Men and Women of experience which are not to take the place of the Bible but are to be used in connection with it in order that we may better understand its message. Included in this variety is the Biblical Recorder, the Charity and Children, the Literature of the Sunday School Board, The Commission, and a great number of other Periodicals relative to Christian Matters at Home and abroad.

3. The Value of Christian Literature in the Home is great to the individual, home, Church, and the Kingdom of God. For example our Church places into each home of its membership both the Charity and Children and the Biblical Recorder. We have found that this Literature has done a great Work by informing, enlightening, and inspiring our People in a manner that could not be accomplished through any other source. As a result our people look forward to this

literature and they love the Church and its program more. Their proof of this is their increased interest.

I believe if we, as Christian People, would display Christian literature more, that it would take the place of so much trashy literature that is now being displayed all over this Country and World. Its merit would give it first place.

Our denominational literature upholds the general Concepts of Christian living and makes them available to our people.

It is our duty, responsibility, privilege and task to provide means for greater distribution among our Homes and People.

Dr. L. L. Carpenter, Biblical Recorder Editor, was recognized and spoke briefly of the Recorder, presenting copies to members of churches where there wasn't a Recorder Club.

The hymn "Lead On, O King Eternal" was sung by the congregation.

An address, "I Am a Christian", was given by Dr. Broadus E. Jones, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Raleigh.

"I AM A CHRISTIAN"

Some became disciples to evade punishment for sin. Others because they are afraid of death. Still others because of the uncertainties of "after death." It is worthy of the highest possible motives.

Some motives:

"I Am A Christian" because:

- a. I believe in Jesus Christ.
- b. I believe in the Master's Way of life.
- c. It satisfies the deepest needs and highest aspirations of my soul.

After announcements Rev. Guy C. Moore rendered a message in song, "My Task".

The following committees were appointed by the moderator. Time, place, and preacher, C. J. Shields, Scotland Neck, Chairman; Miss Emily Austin, Tarboro; J. B. Jones, Red Oak.

Resolutions, J. R. Everett, Robersonville, Chairman; Mrs. N. C. Brooks, Greenville; C. B. Peacock, Whitakers.

The annual sermon was delivered by the Rev. J. D. Williams, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Tarboro.

ANNUAL SERMON

REV. J. D. WILLIAMS

Scripture Passage: John 15:1-8

Dr. Ellis Fuller tells of an interesting experience that he had in a crowded hotel dining room. A young man came in and asked to

share his table. While they were talking Dr. Fuller asked the question, "My friend, are you a Christian?" The young man answered this by saying, "I presume I am. I am a member of the church, and I believe everything in the Bible from cover to cover." "But," said Dr. Fuller, "are you a Christian?" The young man answered in a series of statements that were interspersed by the persistent question, "Are you a Christian?" He explained that he did about what he thought Christians ought to do, that he practiced the Golden Rule, that he attended church, that he contributed to the church, etc. Each time he was brought back to the basic question, "Are you a Christian?" Then, by using an attractive young lady at a nearby table as an illustration, Dr. Fuller revealed to the young man that we can know that Jesus Christ is real yet may be unknown to us personally. The young man discerned that he was sitting in the dining room of life with the Saviour, but that he did not really know Him. He summed it up by saying, "I have never met Him, I have never loved Him, I have never placed my hand in His in trust and faith. I have never accepted Him as a life partner. I know nothing of the lordship of this great Master."

The tragedy of it is that many of us are sitting at another table, and though we may point Him out, we never get close to Him in friendship and love. There is a cooling of devotion on the part of many professed Christians.

We read in Hebrews 8:11, "And they shall not teach every man his neighbor, and every man his brother, saying, Know the Lord: for all shall know Me, from the least to the greatest." That is a great promise for a future day, but we may approach the fulfilling of that knowledge of Christ individually here and now as the days go by. Paul took the knowledge of Christ as his life aim, and there is none more worthy. In life hearsay is not as good as experience, and the same thing holds true in the spiritual realm of living. It isn't knowing ABOUT Christ that matters most—but knowing Christ personally.

Jesus said, "Ye are the light of the world," and, "Ye are the salt of the earth; but if the salt hath lost his savor, wherewithal shall it be salted?" Many of us Christians need to be re-salted. This can be accomplished through closeness to Christ, and I offer the following suggestions that are obvious but vital.

1. Daily facing with Christ.

(1) Meditation. We must plan to take time and be with our Lord in secret. It is foolish to leave off this step in the daily communion. What good do a fleeting and almost furtive Bible scanning and a drowsy prayer bring to us? It may be helpful to focus your attention first on an inspiring painting or to gain insight and feeling through a religious poem, or to sing a hymn, or to think on the need of the Lord in your life.

(2) Bible STUDY

(3) Prayer

2. Daily Surrender to Christ.

(1) Repentance daily, because of the daily need for it

(2) Giving up all for Christ

(3) Accepting all for Christ. This may prove more difficult than giving up, because spiritual "blind spots" are in the way of our accepting new revelations or obligations in the place of old training or prejudice.

3. Daily strength for Christ.

(1) Through the joy of being in accord with Christ

(2) Through Bible PRACTICE

(3) Through Christian fellowship

(4) Through constant witnessing

I have engaged in this heart-to-heart talk with you concerning your heart-to-heart relationship with Christ. Such is possible for you. The answer is in your heart and will.

The session was adjourned for lunch with a prayer offered by Ira D. S. Knight.

AFTERNOON SESSION

"The Living Lord's Compassion for Humanity"

The afternoon session opened with the congregation singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" led by Mr. Moore, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Ed. Knott, Roanoke Rapids.

The devotional was led by Wistar Hamilton, Washington. Mr. Hamilton read some verses from Luke 10:27-37 and led in prayer.

E. G. Cole conducted the Memorial Service. He read a list of the names of the members who had passed on to their reward during the year, requested the congregation to stand for a moment of silent prayer, and then offered prayer for their loved ones and churches.

IN MEMORIAM

We pause at this time to pay tribute to the memory of those who have fallen from the ranks in the various churches since this assembly last met. Just here we should like to call the roll of those who have gone to their reward during the last twelve months, and to honor their memory individually. (Roll call).

Now, none of us knows individually and personally all those whom we pause to honor in these moments. But you know some of them. Some of them are held in sacred memory by you, and all of

them by somebody. At least one of them, Dr. William R. Burrell of Williamston, perhaps others, was a minister of the gospel for many years. Some were deacons, while others filled places of leadership of more or less importance, in their respective churches. Still others were lay members, and all of them were to a greater or less degree faithful to their churches and to the cause of Christ.

As I tried to think of a verse of scripture that would be a fitting basis of thought for this occasion, this one came to my mind: Hebrews 11:4: "Through faith Abel offered a more acceptable sacrifice than Cain, and through this faith he had witness borne to him that he was righteous, God bearing witness by accepting his gifts; and through his faith, though he is dead, he still speaks." (Weymouth). This statement is found in the record of another roll-call of the faithful.

The sacred historian gives very little space, in Gen. 4, to the record of Abel's life. But thousands of years later we find the writer of Hebrews paying tribute to the memory of Abel, along with a host of other heroes of faith. And, what was it that called forth that tribute? Not great deeds of valor nor outstanding leadership among men, but simply faith. His faith made for Abel a name that will stand in history as long as time shall last. Through faith he offered the first fruits of his flock to God. Because of his faith God accepted his offering; and bore witness to his righteousness. And the writer says that though Abel has been dead these thousands of years, his voice rings in our ears today, for "through his faith, though he is dead, he still speaks."

Those whose memory we honor at this time have gone from their respective churches and communities. Not all of them were noted for their leadership or spectacular service, perhaps. But they have left their influence among those who knew them. Like the rest of us, their faith, no doubt, was weak at times, but I'm sure we could characterize most of them as men and women of faith, though that faith may have been small. But God honors even a little faith. We couldn't find much to commend in a character like Samson, but God honored his faith, although his was often a misdirected faith. Along with other characters recorded in Hebrews 4, he, too, speaks through his faith. And so those whom we honor today, through their faith they are still speaking.

Therefore, we pay tribute to the memory of our dead. If they have preached the gospel of Jesus Christ; if they have been outstanding as deacons, or teachers, or leaders in any field of service, we honor them for that. Or, if they have been humble laymen or laywomen, We honor them still. But, above all do we pay tribute to their simple faith in God and in our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

(Stand for a moment of silent prayer, followed by the Memorial Prayer, led by Bro. Clyde Baucom, Vice-Moderator.)

The committee appointed to hear the application of the newly organized church reported their findings.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PETITIONARY LETTERS

Your committee had appear before it three members of the Gaston Baptist Church of Northampton County, N. C., who stated that this church had been duly organized in regular Baptistic order since our last meeting adopting a constitution and by-laws, which were shown the committee, and the covenant and articles of faith usually adopted by Baptist churches; that it was worshipping in its own church building and conducting services through a Sunday School, Training Union, and Woman's Missionary Union, and that a budget had been adopted providing for all these activities. These facts were further substantiated by Rev. Gordon L. Price, Pastor of the Roanoke Rapids First Baptist Church which had been sponsoring the mission program that culminated in the organization of the Gaston Baptist Church.

In light of these facts and the further fact that this church petitioned admission into our association through these three members your committee unanimously recommends that the Gaston Baptist Church of Northampton County be received into the full fellowship of the Roanoke Baptist Association with all the responsibilities and privileges entailed therein.

Mr. M. A. Huggins, Secretary of the Baptist State Convention, stirred the hearts of the people with a forceful message on "The Still Sad Music of Humanity".

The session was brought to a close with a prayer being offered by the Rev. Smoot Baker, Trinity Baptist Church, Spencer.

EVENING SESSION

"The Living Lord and Community Problems"

The evening session was opened by the congregation singing, "Savior, Like a Shepherd Lead Us" and "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus".

The devotional was led by Worth C. Grant, Weldon. Mr. Grant read from Phil. 2:1-11 and led in prayer.

An address, "My Part in My Community's Destiny", was presented by E. W. Holmes, Farmville.

The Tarboro Baptist Church Choir rendered the following selections under the direction of Mrs. Gattie Cullom, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. James Barnette, "The Holy City", "Crucifixion" by Stainer, and "I Will Arise and Go to Jesus".

The congregation then sang, "Break Thou the Bread of Life."

The Rev. Paul Lemons, Stantonsburg, presented a very interesting illustrated lecture on "The Lily".

The hymn, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord", was sung by the congregation.

The Honorable J. M. Broughton delivered a very timely and arresting address on "Strengthening the Home Ties".

The session was closed with a prayer being offered by B. M. Whitehurst, Roanoke Rapids.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

"The Living Lord in His Church"

The session was opened by the congregation singing, "Holy, Holy, Holy" and "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah", led by Mr. Moore.

The devotional was conducted by Grady J. Haynes, Hobgood. He read from Rev. 3:1-6 and led in prayer.

The printed program for the second day was presented and unanimously adopted.

The work of the Sunday School was presented by M. M. Johnson, Spring Hope, Associational Director.

The work of the Baptist Training Union was presented by J. D. Williams, Tarboro, Associational Director.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION REPORT

By J. D. Williams, Associational Director

A fine plan instituted by our recent associational missionary, Mr. Leonard Middleton, was the idea of having churches with Training Unions to offer their services to "little sister" churches who had no Training Union work. One "little sister" was assigned to each church. The response was unworthy of the plan and of the need.

I have asked the local directors to send me information about things they did which would prove interesting and suggestive to other unions. At this time I shall read some of the fine things reported.

(The report included ideas such as the Training Union sponsoring a Youth Choir, combining with the evening worship hour to form an integrated service, conducting the evening service twice a month, having a B. T. U. focus month in the church, going to Ridgecrest, conducting services for shut-ins and at the jail, having Youth Week in the church, conducting a Youth Revival in cooperation with all churches in the town, and participation in a program of visitation evangelism. Four were reported as dedicating their lives at Ridgecrest to Christian service full-time. At least three new unions were organized where there had been no work before. A very successful Training Union associational meeting was reported, as well as the group meetings.)

The work of the Baptist Brotherhood was presented by F. I. Robinson, Weldon.

ADDRESS

F. I. Robinson, lay member of Weldon, speaking for the Brotherhood Club of the Weldon Baptist Church, told the gathering something of the activities of the Weldon club and how it had benefitted the church and especially had been a help to the individual members of the club. He also laid emphasis on the fact that this democracy of ours that we loved and cherished so dearly in this country could not succeed in reaching its highest aims and fulfillment as long as there were jealousies; for where there was jealousy there was misunderstanding. Misunderstanding resulting in a lack of the unity necessary for our people to work together for the common good of all.

He also stressed the need for more of the spirit of Christ in our daily living, which gives us the urge and desire to be more helpful and to live more in the spirit of Brotherhood, and that we needed to

read and review more often the lesson of the Good Samaritan. Remembering always that our real friend is he who has mercy on us.

He also urged that more churches organize these Brotherhood Clubs in the hope that Laymen might work together more effectively in advancing the work of the church and Christ's Kingdom on earth.

Several brief reports were given by messengers from churches in which outstanding work had been accomplished. These proved helpful and inspirational.

A hymn, "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned", was sung by the congregation.

An address, "Complacency in Pulpit and Pew", was delivered by Claude F. Gaddy, Raleigh.

Rev. and Mrs. G. W. Bullard, former Missionaries in the Association, were recognized as visitors.

A special number was rendered by Mrs. Everette James, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Bob Atkins, both of Robersonville, "I Know My Redeemer Lives."

The Rev. D. M. Branch, pastor of the Scotland Neck Baptist Church, delivered a very able address on "Making Christ Supreme".

MAKING CHRIST SUPREME

Scripture: Col. 1:9-23

Our subject is "Making Christ Supreme". Our text is Col. 1:18 ". . . that in all things He might have the preeminence." In the beginning of this epistle Paul indicates that all God's activity in human history, from creation to its consummation, has the one purpose of making Christ preminent. *OBSERVE:*

I.

**GOD HAS GIVEN JESUS CHRIST THE PLACE OF PREEMINENCE
IN THE CREATED ORDER**

Beginning with verse fifteen Paul's mighty affirmations beat in upon us like tidal waves, witnessing to the supremacy of Christ.

". . . the image of the invisible God." This is another way of saying what John's Prologue says, "The Word was with God, and the Word was God." The classic statement of this glorious shining forth of God's glory in Jesus Christ is that of Paul in 2 Cor. 4:6 "For it is the God who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness', who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the fact of Jesus Christ." (RSV)

". . . the first-born of all creation." He was antecedent to all

the created order. He transcends time, being beyond and above it. This concept of the eternity of Christ is seen everywhere in the New Testament. He clearly made this claim for Himself. There were those who sought to bind Him within the limits of one generation, to them He said, "Before Abraham was, I am." (John 8:58)

". . . for in him were all things created." Let us again call in the witness of John's Prologue, "All things were made through him, and without him was not anything made that was made."

". . . in him all things hold together." It is His creation, and He binds it to its perpetual existence and unfailing mission. We live in a Christ-centric universe.

". . . all things have been created unto him." He is history's goal. His purposes run through a history which moves to its consummation in Him. The stream may turn and eddy here and there, but no power on earth, or out of it, can keep it from the ocean of His completed purpose. "History is His-story." (J. M. Adams)

Without consulting human wisdom, and without looking to the human will, God has given Jesus Christ the preeminent place in the created order.

II

GOD HAS GIVEN JESUS CHRIST THE PLACE OF PREEMINENCE IN THE SPIRITUAL ORDER

"He is the head of the body, the church." This is the general use of the term *Ekklesia* denoting the whole spiritual community. The writer of Hebrews rightly binds into one the whole of the community of believers of all time. It is said of Moses that he counted "the reproach of *Christ* greater riches than the treasures of Egypt."

This place of supremacy in the spiritual order God has given to Jesus Christ because of three mighty achievements: (1) His resurrection from the dead. ". . . the first-born from the dead." (2) His singular place as Saviour. "For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross." (vs. 19f) (3) His completed work in human personality; that is, completed in prospect. "You . . . he has now reconciled . . . in order to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him." (vs.21f)

As God gave to Jesus Christ the place of preeminence in the created order without consulting with human wisdom, and without placing responsibility upon human will, so He did in the spiritual order. But there is a sphere where the supremacy of Christ waits upon the will of man, voluntarily responding to the call of the highest.

III

MAKING CHRIST SUPREME IN LIFE AND ALL OVER WHICH
WE EXERCISE CONTROL

In the creation of beings in His own likeness God has limited Himself to the role of a Father in His relation to them. He respects our will and personality. The moral and spiritual demands He makes upon us places as responsible creatures in the position of having to decide for ourselves the place Christ shall have in our lives and that which we control.

It is our responsibility as Christians to make Christ supreme in our personal lives. If He is supreme there it means that our business interests will be on a Christian level, and will become sacred. Our social lives also will reflect the beauty of the Christ Spirit. The self we become when daily cares are locked in, or out, will be a Christian self. The purposes of life will also be Christian. We shall be inspired by Christian ideals, and challenged by Christian motives. Our attitudes toward others will reflect kindness and concern. It will be with us as Bunyan said in his farewell sermon: "Dost thou see a soul that has the image of God in him? Love him, love him; say, "This man and I must go to heaven together.' "

As Christians it is our responsibility to make Christ supreme in our homes. This is one of civilization's **MUSTS**. The far-country of marital infidelity and refusal to bear the responsibility of family life is taking a frightful toll of this basic institution. With the present divorce ratio of one for every three marriages we face the threat of a complete break-down of the American home within a decade. **THEN WHAT?**

As Christians it is our responsibility to make Christ supreme in our churches. Many of them are caught in the maelstrom of worldly motives, standards, and methods. There is wide-spread substitution of organization for the Spirit, an activity for devotion. Outside stands the rightful and only true Head of the church, saying, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock; if any man hear my voice and open the door I will come in."

As Christians it is our responsibility to make Christ supreme in the institutionalized expressions of our Christian culture. Every institution which is church controlled should be as definitely Christian in spirit, method, and purpose as the church itself. Such institutions as our hospital, orphanage, and denominational schools should be true to Christ in their ministries. The church controlled school is the most potent single institution we have for good. With our public system of education completely secularized, how essential that our Christian schools be utterly Christian. A recent graduate of a college said this, "College gave us spokes, but no hub. We came

away with knowledge, but no purpose." That **MUST NOT** be said of our Christian schools. There are three things we need to do for our denominational schools in order to strengthen their ministry (1) Provide adequate financial support; (2) Make them thoroughly Christian; (3) Encourage our youth to attend them.

God has made Christ supreme in the created order, and in the spiritual order. His place of preeminence there doesn't wait upon our wisdom or our wills. But it is for us to bring our lives and all we control under His conquering sway; to follow Him until the universe shall ring with the exultant shout, "The kingdom of the world is become the kingdom of our Lord and his Christ; and he shall reign forever, and ever."

W. M. U. CONVENTION

The thirty-ninth annual session of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Roanoke Baptist Association was held with the Williamston church April 4, 1946. The other Baptist churches in the county always act as joint hostesses.

Mrs. Rebecca Tulles, organist, played while the ladies were registering and assembling.

Mrs. C. R. Daniel in calling the audience to attention repeated Psalm 27:14—"Wait on the Lord, be of good courage, and he shall strengthen thine heart, wait I say on the Lord."

The audience then stood and led by Mrs. Daniel repeated in unison our W. M. U. watchword, "Laborers together with God." I Cor. 3:9, and our watchword for the year, "Look unto me and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth; for I am God and there is none else"—Isaiah 45:22. The group remained standing and sang all four stanzas of our hymn for the year "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations."

After the audience was seated Mrs. James Liverman of Scotland Neck stated that the musical devotion planned by the Scotland Neck choir, due to a death would have to be postponed. She also stated that Mrs. R. C. Josey, Jr., had agreed to bring a devotional. Mrs. Josey read some verses from the twentieth chapter of St. John. She then brought a very challenging message.

"We are very proud of our accomplishments. We dare not stop for fear we will lose step with God. The glory of our work, of our societies of the individual lies in going on. God wants us to press forward. He challenges us to—as the knowledge of God spreads over the earth as the waters cover the sea.

America can do more to help restore peace through the spread of the Gospel, than she can economically. She holds the destiny of our Southland—of the world. She can go on economically but we as Christian women must press forward with the Gospel. Many other races are clamoring for the Gospel. We have a great responsibility. In the last ten years the population of the South has increased 110 percent—all denominations have increased more than 100 percent, but the Baptists had increased 313 percent. Do we have a great responsibility? We are to begin in Jerusalem, your little town, and go to the ends of the earth.

We are not to neglect those at our own door, while we carry the

Gospel to far off China and Africa. The underprivileged in the slums are as precious in God's sight as are the wealthiest in the chosen areas.

He died for the Cuban, the German and all others as He died for you and me.

The task seems so impossible. Of the 45,000,000 in the South, 25,000,000 are still unchurched. We may think that our little gifts are so small that they will not amount to anything, but we are leaving God out when we fail to give. "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me"—Philippians 4:13.

When Jesus says "Go ye into all the world—" Matthew 28:19-20 that is what He tells us to do. We seem to forget His promise with this command "Lo, I am with you always." We know that we can depend on Him, but can He depend on us? He chose you and me to tell the message of salvation.

If we took His word seriously when we took upon ourselves the name Christian we would be Home Missionaries—not paid ones. We are bought with a price, Jesus' shed blood. Not only our money, our talents, but our lives are His. Will He be able to say to us "Well done thou good and faithful servant."?

Mrs. Josey closed this message with a prayer of praise and a plea for strength, courage and determination as a nation, as an organization, as individuals to carry God's word to all those who know it not. She asked God's blessing upon the meeting in session, and begged that we might go home with a determination to carry the Gospel as never before.

Just following the period of worship, Mrs. Daniel recognized Mrs. Ira D. S. Knight who brought a most hearty and gracious word of greeting from the church and community.

She said this: "You are welcomed from the place from which you came that we may knit together the work of the Association. We welcome you, because of who you are—we welcome you because of whom you represent—the various groups that you work with, in your dark days, your sunny days, those who could not come. Most of all we welcome you because of whom you serve. "Few words are as diamonds set in gold if they are sincere," so I say—"We welcome you."

A brief response to the greeting was given by Mrs. Daniel. Mrs. Meade Mitchell, who was to have brought this message, was ill.

The children will have to send in registration fees, together with expenses and furnish own transportation. No applications to be sent in before May 1.

"KNOW YOUR WORLD," MISSION STUDY

In commenting on our Mission Study record for the past year, may I say that there has been some progress, but not as much as we would like to have had.

In this day when there is so much information to be had about conditions in the whole world, we should avail ourselves of every opportunity to inform ourselves along "Missionary Lines" as well as along other lines.

Some one has said that "The world begins on your Main Street," and this sums up the vivid way in which our world has, in these recent years, become a smaller place through the development of travel, radio, etc. "No spot on earth in more than 60 hours from your nearest airport."

Well do we know that it is a troubled and bleeding world that begins on your Main Street, a world in sore need of help, of comfort and the ministry of Christ. Christianity is the only bridge that has held unbroken these chasms in the fiery test of war. To the Christian the world is truly, as Wendell Wilkie said "One World," but in the words of one of our ministers I like to say "One Humanity." Christian missions provide the one unbreakable tie that can bind this war torn world together.

We may inform ourselves of world conditions through reading, and, for that reason, it is so important to stress Mission Study, as Miss Thelma Brown in April Royal Service says—"Give Attention to Reading." And I believe Mrs. Una Robert Lawrence puts it "Missionary Reading For World Fellowship" and we need "world fellowship" now more than ever. We are told that interest in books has

increased amazingly in the past two decades. However, the great concern is "What" people read rather than "How much."

The Woman's Missionary Union through its Mission Study Committee gives emphasis and direction to three very far-reaching reading and study programs.

1—The certificate courses

2—The Missionary Round Table Plan.

3—Missionary Reading for World Fellowship.

Miss Austin discussed each of these. Then she told us that she had prepared a sheet giving the standard and some suggestions which she hopes may be helpful to the in-coming mission study chairman.

We have six churches reporting new societies, and the number reporting classes increased from 87 in 1944 to 104. There was almost a 20 per cent increase in attendance over 1944.

The following churches had four or more W. M. S. classes: Bethel, Fountain, Rosemary, Rocky Mount, Roanoke Rapids and Weldon, all except Rosemary having one or more classes each quarter in all W. M. U. organizations. Six Woman's Missionary Societies and six young People's organizations reported as helping with schools of Missions.

Miss Austin's closing words were, "Study, Read, Be Informed." After being informed let the love of Christ in your heart be your guide as to what you will do with this great world problem.

"OUR DEBT TO THE WORLD" — STEWARDSHIP

The nations are looking to America. Mrs. Brooks quoted Mrs. Huggins, State Stewardship Chairman, as saying, "We, as Southern Baptists are beginning the most challenging year in our History. Relief, Reconstruction, Rehabilitation on the one hand—Evangelism and Stewardship on the other!" In 1946, God calls for loyal and generous hearts if we would make Him Prince of Peace.

In 1945 our emphasis was on the Cooperative Program. We made 20 per cent increase in offerings through our W. M. U. Surely with our hearts as burdened as they should be as we hear the piteous cries of need—physical, material and spiritual, from around the world, we shall give gladly and joyously. In this increased giving we should make our increase of 10 per cent above last year's gifts.

Mrs. Brooks quoted here Dr. Dillard, Director of Promotion of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention as saying that Christian Stewardship is the practice of systematic and proportionate giving of time, abilities and material possessions based on the conviction that they are a trust from God to be used in His Service for the benefit of all Mankind.

How are we fulfilling our trust? Dr. Dillard wants a million Southern Baptist tithers for Christ.

In the March Commission Dr. Fred Brown has a splendid article on Stewardship. It is well worth anyone's time to read.

Mrs. Brooks urged that we stress these points:

1—The study of Stewardship

2—The education along this line of our young people that all together we may plan and look forward to a worthwhile church Stewardship Night Program.

3—Be sure to make 10 per cent increase in gifts.

4—Enlist the unenlisted

5—Enlist new people by sharing with them our zeal and interest in being faithful stewards ourselves and so minister to the world's needs. Let us plant in the hearts and minds of our little ones the seeds that will produce missionary-minded adults.

God wants our best. He will not forget the feeblest effort, but He wants our best. He gave up the best that He had that we might have eternal life and that we might have happy, Christian lives here on this earth.

Mrs. Daniel displayed some posters showing progress of our work in 1945. These showed six new societies, all of them doing well.

She said that she sent out sixty-one reports and all except five were returned in a short length of time. She expressed a like for goals and urged a 10 per cent increase. Last year one hundred new tithers were hoped for and there were one hundred forty-nine.

Goal for 1946: 100 more tithers, 25 new organizations, 10 per cent gain in members, Mission study, at least one class in each society, four would be best, have to have two to make standard, An A-1 Association. Nearly every church made twenty per cent increase. An increase in gifts was shown all along the line.

The Association, Woman's work lacked only \$24.75 of making our all-purpose goal for 1945.

At this time the lunch announcement was made.

The audience stood and sang three stanzas of "Jesus Shall Reign."

Mr. Ben Manning played for this and the special selection offered by the Williamston choir—"Hear Our Prayer O Lord." This was very lovely.

Mrs. John Wacaster from the State Office was on the pro-

gram to deliver an address on the subject, "The Urgency of Making Him Known."

She brought greetings from the office force. She said it was her desire to be of help to the great Roanoke and that she would help this time by letting us catch up with the program. She urged that all go home and do what we had heard and had been urged to do and listen to Miss Lide and I will have helped you. Mrs. Wacaster told Mrs. Daniel that she had been a Superintendent and could sympathize with her in the schedule getting behind. She promised to come another time and talk.

Mrs. Daniel presented Miss Florence Lide as the missionary speaker. She, her sister, Miss Jane and her brother, Dr. Frank, were all Japanese prisoners.

Miss Lide said first of all that she hoped to be back in China before too many months. She commented on the morning's program and expressed thanks for all the help we give and all we do. She said that she had been our agent for these thirty odd years in Northern China and that she wanted to come and tell something of what she has been doing. She pointed out the different fields of work on her map of China.

Southern Baptists' youngest "daughter" is Manchuria.

Many of the seventy million have fled into central China. This has really been a blessing to God's program.

There are forty million in the North China mission the size of the state of Georgia. Dr. (D. D.) J. B. Hartwell of South Carolina began the North China mission in answer to prayer. He had been dedicated from infancy to missions. He went out eighty-five years ago. There have been established there eighty-five Baptist churches with twenty thousand members. These are a result of your prayers, your gifts, your interests in the world of God. As we look back on a century of Christianity and toward a new future let us put forth greater effort in these ways as we have never before.

Miss Lide held up her Bible and said, "This is the greatest missionary that we may ever have. It has never been sick, never been interned, never been unfaithful, will never die." One woman said that she would sell her soybean crop and live on two meals a day in order to buy a Bible. Forty years ago the Bible was forbidden, now it is the most popular book.

Dr. Hartwell got to China at the time of the Chinese New Year. At this time all have to pay their debts. He helped minister to the wounded, wounds caused by the bandits who robbed others in order to pay their debts. The board learned of his deeds and of the great medical needs, so began efforts to establish medical work. Warren Memorial Hospital was the first hospital built overseas. It has brought help for half a million. Everyone there has had opportunity for spiritual help. Someone stays there to explain the way of life to every "in patient."

\$100,000 is to be raised by Georgia Baptists to rebuild in a modern way this hospital recently destroyed by fire.

Our schools, said Miss Lide, are doing a great work — through these the missionaries are enabled to get into many homes that otherwise they could not.

Miss Lide told of Mr. Wong's capture as he was going to an educational meeting. The Baptists interceded day in and day out for him in prayer. The Japanese gave him the "water treatment" Miss Lide described this as being very, very painful. Jesus took care of him. The Japanese hung him up by ropes and beat him. The glory of God filled the prison. Mr. Wong said that he never could have found God in any Seminary as he did in that prison. He became really acquainted with God, he testified.

Miss Lide said that there are two hundred and fifty thousand Christians waiting for the missionaries to return. God at different times sent Japanese Christians to take care of Chinese Christians. Christian communities are growing faster than they can be accommodated in buildings and leaders. Not a soul would dare tear down a little church marked as dedicated to God. Different groups of Japanese were sent to do this particular job. Chinese Christians are worshipping there today..

Miss Lide's address was built around R's.

1—Recollections has been taken care of.

2—Reoccupation—We must reoccupy this territory. She told of children mixing mud made of dust they had swept up with grain to stay hunger pains. Communists are still in the saddle is why she and many other missionaries have not been able to return.

3—Rehabilitation—The communists have taken the build-

ing material. In speaking of rehabilitation we mean spiritually—churches and so on as well as houses for dwellings.

Miss Lide told of Standard Oil's slogan "A Light in Every Home," of the American Tobacco Company's "A Light in Every Mouth," but said the missionaries' slogan is "A Light in Every Heart. The missionaries' light has not gone out as have these others, but has grown brighter.

4—Reinforcements. We are looking to you to help in reinforcing the work. Former missionaries must return for their experience—all want to go back. God gave us freedom from war to carry out His will. We are faced with the greatest responsibility and staggering opportunity. The means heretofore of travel in China have not been very good. Many of our boys have widened the narrow Chinese roads. There are eighty thousand more miles of paved road than before. God's hand is in it all. The church stands higher than it has ever stood before. It will not be to the Christian's credit unless he does make a great advance for Christ in China.

God is opening a marvelous door. We will have to stand before God to answer for our failures.

The Generalissimo says that they must have immediately two hundred fifty thousand doctors to save the dying Chinese. Now there is only one for every eight hundred people. Will we do our best to help supply these?

Before the war there were one hundred seventy-seven million illiterate adults. Now forty million more can read. Every "ism" known here has reached China. For example—Jehovah's Witnesses are there.

A campaign put on by Madame Chiang Kai-Shek has helped these illiterate to learn to read. Are we going to supply Christian Literature? Isaiah 11 we have had pictured today. Do you want to have a geater share? "Pour out your hearts in prayer victorious and all thou spendest I will repay."

Mrs. Daniel asked for silent prayer in keeping with the message. Mrs. Daniel closed this prayer still in keeping with the message and included thanks for the lunch which was to immediately follow.

Miss Lide's radiant personality born of a heart overflowing with love for the lost millions and a burning zeal to be busy for

our Master and a plea for our increased help was truly an inspiration and a benediction to each of us who had the privilege of her presence.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was begun with the singing of the hymn "O Zion Haste." The Young People's program began with the devotional by the Williamston G. A.'s.

Jo Ann Peele read the scripture and prayed. The scripture was John 12: 23-25, "And Jesus answered them, The hour is come that the Son of Men should be glorified. Verily I say unto you, Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die it abideth alone, but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit. He that loveth his life shall lose it and he that hateth his life in this world shall keep it unto life eternal."

Matthew 5:13-16. "Ye are the salt of the earth, but if the salt have lost his savor wherewith shall it be salted? It is thenceforth good for nothing, but to be cast out and to be trodden under foot of men. Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hid. Neither do men light a candle and put it under a bushel, but on a candle stick, and it giveth light unto all that are in the house. Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

Between the scripture and the prayer the story of "The White Fire" was told by Barbara Sullivan.

Just following this Miss Ethel Guest, Educational Director of the Williamston church, presented Sunbeams—thirteen small boys and girls of the local church. They marched onto the platform and to Miss Guest's accompaniment sang "I Am The Light of the World"—Sunbeam song with gestures, "Be A Little Sunbeam" and "Jesus Wants Me for a Sunbeam." Others helping with Sunbeams were Mrs. Harold Everette and Hildreth Mobley.

One of the little boys announced "We will sing 'Jesus Loves Me' chorus the way the Cuban boys and girls sing it and the way we sing it."

Then he announced that four girls would sing "The World Children for Jesus." As they sang children in costume came in one at a time.

When these had left the platform Miss Guest presented in

pantomime our hymn for the year, "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations," with Junior G. A.'s. They gave in unison the G. A. pledge. The stanzas were interspersed with scripture by two larger girls standing at either end of the platform. Others entered in costume.

Following another stanza three girls stood further back on the platform, the center one holding a white cross. The girl on each side held large Christian flags. Many nations had part, the children in center covered in darkness dropped swords.

The same two girls came to the front and read together Matthew 28:19-20, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo I am with you always, even unto the end of the world, Amen."

"Our Young People at Work" featured Mrs. C. M. Smith and Mrs. John T. Coley. Preceding their reports Mr. Marshall Whitehurst, pastor of Rosemary church, talked about Royal Ambassador Leaders. He said than an R. A. Leader should be a man. His characteristics follow:

1. What he is
2. What he knows
3. What he does

He should be primarily a Christian, a comrade to the boys—one who likes to lead his boys to something higher. He should be a person with executive ability.

He should know his boys, know how to get his boys to do things. He should know his work, he should lead his boys to Christ. He should lead his boys into definite and particular service. By the standard of achievement he should see that his boys advance in steps.

Other characteristics for this important person—Love, humility,, courage, patience.

Leaders do not always get too much gratitude. How find such a man?

Mr. Whitehurst used his own church as an example. They had a number of boys in service who were active in church work—had definitely decided for Christ—kept the faith while away.

Perhaps in such a group the right man might be found to lead Royal Ambassadors.

Another group from which a suitable man might be selected—young adults, maybe a former R. A.

The third group—perhaps a young man not an R. A., but is willing to be trained, has the aforementioned qualities.

Prayer should be behind whatever group he is chosen from.

Leadership of the Holy Spirit and good common sense should be linked with prayer.

At this time Mrs. C. M. Smith brought suggestions about camp material—blanks and so on. She urged that good counselors volunteer to help with the camp work—mission study, singing, swimming and to help in other ways.

Mrs. Smith stated that she was leaving the office as Sunbeam, R. A. and G. A. Leader for the Association. She reviewed the work—eight years as Sunbeam Leader and five as the “triple duty” Leader.

There are one hundred thirty-two of the organizations now. Gifts also have nearly doubled. She quoted these words from Jesus: “No man having put his hand to the plow, and looking back is fit for the Kingdom of God” Luke 9:62.

How much worse in church if we let go, Mrs. Smith said. Don’t let an organization die. If we do our best when we cross the bar we will not have to be ashamed. Mrs. Smith’s formal report follows. She has served well.

Mr. Finlator expressed his appreciation of having a part in the service—he used as his subject: “The Ebb and Flow of Spiritual Grace.”

Mr. Finlator stated that there is a new edition of the Bible out, that it is very popular and that more laymen than ministers are

buying it. It will soon out date the King James Version, some say, but he isn't sure of that. Mr. Finlator stated that the King James Version will always be his favorite. The old English form is more beautiful, "Wist" is an old English word meaning "knew not." He chose two verses of scripture to leave with us and that contain this word — "Sampson wist not that the Lord was departed from him" and "Moses wist not that his face shone."

All things are either growing into strength or into age. This same is true of religion. There is no noise about it, but there is a constant change. The sun rising or setting, the dawn breaking never made any sound. We do not always realize the changes as they come. Sampson thought that he could play the double life, serve God and live apart too.

Sunday after Sunday people hear sermons and they do not listen as they should. These people are sure that they are pretty good folk. Many Christians do not realize that they have sin. They do not know that somewhere back yonder God has withdrawn His presence from them. Either God's spirit is coming or God's spirit is waning in our lives, not to progress is to regress, not to grow better is to grow less good.

The people withdrew from Moses. When they said to him, "Your face is shining," Moses did not understand. The glow was from within. That best portion of a good man's life is that unnamed unnoticed act. We cannot keep God at a stand still. He must either be coming or going out. As we grow older, we grow in grace or grow graceless. Is God on the increase in our hearts and lives or is He waning? We wist not that He is coming or going.

Mr. Finlator pronounced the benediction.

CONSTITUTION

1. The Association shall be composed of the pastors and of the members, not exceeding three from any church, chosen by the churches, who shall produce letters certifying their appointments. Members thus chosen and convened together with the pastors shall be denominated "The Roanoke Baptist Association," which shall have no power over the churches, nor shall it infringe on any of the rights.

2. The letters from the churches shall contain the number then in fellowship, and of those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded or died since last Association.

3. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, and Auditor, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

4. Other churches, upon petition by letters and by delegates, and after a satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, may be admitted to the body by unanimous vote, when the Moderator shall give the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

5. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion of the Association, whether it may be debated or not.

6. The Association shall furnish the churches with copies of its minutes.

7. The minutes of the Association shall be read and approved and shall be signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association adjourns.

8. Any church not representing itself in this body three successive sessions by letter or by delegates, shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless reasons are assigned.

9. The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church which shall be found disorderly in faith and practice.

10. Visiting brothers from sister churches, or similar bodies, may be invited to participate in our deliberations.

11. At each session of the Association, delegates to the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention shall be chosen by vote.

12. This Constitution is subject to alteration by a majority vote of the delegates at any session.

13. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

14. The Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator.

Rules of Decorum

Believing it best to be governed by certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of the Association, we adopt the following:

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator.
3. The person speaking shall adhere strictly to the subject, and in no way reflect on any other brother.
4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted unless he violate some rule of decorum.
5. No brother shall absent himself from the Association without obtaining permission from the body.
6. The names of the delegates shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
7. The Moderator may give his ideas on any subject before putting it to a vote, but is entitled to vote only in case of a tie.
8. The order of business shall be made at the beginning of each session, and shall be changed only by a vote of the body.

TUESDAY MORNING

"Making Christ Supreme In Personal Life"

On Tuesday morning, October 14th, the 40th session of the Roanoke Baptist Association was called to order in the Scotland Neck Baptist Church by the Moderator, John T. Coley.

The song service was conducted by J. Felix Arnold, Enfield, assisted at the organ by Mrs. W. E. Goode, Scotland Neck.

The opening hymns were, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" and "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross."

The morning devotional was conducted by C. A. Francis, Nashville. Mr. Francis read 1 Corinthians 3:11-28 and led in prayer.

The welcome address was delivered by W. H. McDowell of the host church and Houston Fuller, First Baptist Church, Roanoke Rapids, responded.

New pastors of the association were introduced to the body and were J. Felix Arnold, Enfield; J. Thad Ashley, Associate Associational Missionary and pastor of West End Memorial, Williamstown; C. A. Francis, Nashville; P. C. Harris, Red Oak; E. R. Stewart, Hamilton; E. D. Bergen, Stantonsburg; and Norman L. Blythe, Stoney Creek.

Educational Directors were recognized as follows: Miss Margaret Wactster, Memorial Williamston; Miss Betty Leather, Roanoke Rapids; Miss Lucille Riner, Scotland Neck; and Miss Virginia Beall, Tarboro.

Visitors were recognized and welcomed by the moderator.

The Moderator made some remarks relative to the work done during the past year, gave some suggestions for the coming year, and Ira D. S. Knight, Williamston, led in a prayer of dedication.

D. M. Branch, Scotland Neck, Chairman of Committee on Order of Business, presented the printed program and made a motion that it be adopted as the order of business with necessary changes. The motion was carried.

Under the head of organization the following officers were elected: John T. Coley, Rocky Mount, re-elected moderator. C. E. Baucom, Wilson, re-elected vice moderator. R. L. Collins, Sharpsburg, re-elected clerk and treasurer. W. W. Eagles, Crisp, auditor.

A motion was made by R. E. Stewart, Hamilton, that the clerk's salary be increased to \$150.00. This motion was adopted.

A motion was made by C. E. Baucom, Wilson, as follows:

MOTION

I move that the enrolled messengers, of those that may be enrolled, up to three from each church, constitute for this session the Roanoke Association for the transaction of business.

Motion carried.

The Executive Committee was called into session for the convenience of any who had matters to present to them.

Mr. Arnold then led the congregation in singing, "Faith of Our Fathers."

J. W. Kincheloe, Rocky Mount, gave an address on, "Making Christ Supreme in Personal Life."

As a text Mr. Kincheloe used Colossians 1:27 and Phillipians 4:6. He stated, "The only way to become a Christian is to recognize Christ supreme in body, mind and soul."

He said that the preservation of the human body was a Christian duty and urged that we apply Christian principles daily in relation to our bodies.

As for making Christ supreme in our mind, Mr. Kincheloe recommended clean life living and high thinking for the enthroned Christ.

And the culmination is in making Christ supreme in one's

soul. He said, "We need to live Christ in life and think him with our mind if we are to live with him gloriously in our soul."

By way of summing up the address, he said, "In making Christ supreme in personal life, the individual needed to recognize the enthroned Christ of the physical man, the enthroned Christ of the mental man, and the enthroned Christ of the soul."

The moderator appointed the time and place committee and resolutions committee.

The pastor of the host church made announcements relative to entertainment and while speaking presented one of the oldest members of the Roanoke Association, Mr. R. C. Josey of the Scotland Neck Church.

The congregation stood and sang, "Crown Him with Many Crowns."

Miss Bruce O'Quinn, Music Director, Wilson, rendered a solo, "There's a Green Hill Far Away," assisted by Miss Mary Hunter, Wilson, at the organ.

The annual sermon was delivered by Raymond Clyde Laniel, pastor of the North Rocky Mount Baptist Church.

SERMON

Text— Mark 9:24

Most of us believe something—and, it is important what we believe. Here is a faithful father who believed something about Christ. With such faith, he brought his sick son to the Lord for healing.

Using the personal pronoun in a plural sense, here for us all, let me say:

First: I believe in Christ.

- (a) That He is the Son of God
- (b) That He is the Saviour of men
- (c) That He saved me
- (d) That He is saving people today

Second: I believe in the church.

- (a) Because it is BLOOD-BOUGHT
- (b) Because it is CHRIST-CAUGHT
- (c) Because it is SPIRIT-TAUGHT
- (d) Because it is SCRIPTURAL-WROUGHT

The church is the greatest institution in all the world, and should never be second to any group, lodge, club, pleasure or school meeting. The church must be first in our hearts and our lives.

Third: I believe in Christianity.

(a) In its duties

1. to preach the gospel
2. to teach
 - a. in Sunday school
 - b. in our schools and colleges the Word of God.
3. to heal: here stands the HOSPITALS

(b) in its division

1. from the world
2. from wrong associations

(c) in its direction

1. we are headed towards heaven
2. we are headed away from this world

It is often said that it is a sign of old-age when we talk about heaven; nevertheless, we should think about where we are going. Jesus thought about it, and in His word we have true directions about how to get there.

Therefore, these suggestions I have made in a large way constitute the sum and essence of Christ Our Faith. Let us then, dedicate afresh our lives to Him that we may do all we can in building the church and bringing Christ to the lost.

The session adjourned for lunch with a prayer offered by Mr. Lanier.

AFTERNOON SESSION

“Making Christ Supreme In Our Association”

The afternoon session was opened by Mr. Arnold leading the congregation in singing, “Oh For A Thousand Tongues To Sing My Great Redeemer’s Praise.”

The devotional was led by N. L. Blythe, Stoney Creek Church. He read Romans 1:1-17 and led in prayer.

D. M. Branch, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, made his report.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

At the last annual meeting of the Roanoke Association I was asked to serve as Associational Sunday School Superintendent. The fact that we had then no associational missionary seriously handicapped the promotion of this work. The Sunday School Board, however, is vigorously promoting Sunday School work through the associations of the Southern Convention, and with suggestions and materials furnished from Nashville we were able to go ahead with some promotion.

We planned and held an associational rally at The First Baptist

Church of Tarboro on January 21st of this year. This meeting was well attended, and a large number of churches were represented. The total number in attendance was 271 with 42 churches being represented. An offering in the amount of \$74.26 was taken for Sunday School promotion work in the association. Of this amount \$26.29 has been spent for postage, printing and supplies, leaving a balance on hand of \$47.97.

At the Tarboro rally the following goals were set for the year:

1. Every church cooperating in the team visitation program
2. A religious census in every church community
3. An enlargement campaign in every church
4. A Vacation Bible School in every church
5. At least one revival in each church
6. A teacher and officer clinic in each of the three groups of the association.
7. Establishment of mission Sunday School where needed.
8. Someone from each church attending one of the Sunday School conferences at Ridgecrest.

We do not have the complete records to indicate how near we have come to reaching these goals, but indications are that progress has been made along these lines. For one thing, all the churches with possibly two exceptions, did hold conferences with the team visitors in which plans were made for enlarging and improving the local teaching program. The available reports indicate that more and better Vacation Bible Schools were held than ever before, 51 churches having reported schools. It is fairly certain that others were held which were not reported to Rev. Edward Cole, our V. B. S. superintendent. There have been revivals in practically all the churches and we believe reports will reveal an increase in the number of baptisms over the 968 reported last year. Apparently, more people attended Ridgecrest than ever before.

The trend in Sunday School and Vacation Bible School work has been upward. In 1945 the minutes showed an enrollment in the Sunday School of the association of 13,175; and in 1946 of 14,736. The reported Vacation Bible School enrollment for 1945 was 2,676 and for 1946 it was 4,198. We think this year's report will reveal a similar increase.

The coming of Rev. C. W. Bazemore as associational missionary has greatly strengthened all phases of our work. With his wise counsel and vigorous direction the work of the churches should go forward even more rapidly.

Mrs. C. R. Daniel, Weldon, presented the Woman's Missionary Union Report.

W. M. U. REPORT

In 1947 when I stood before this group for the first time, I closed my remarks with these words from the Book of Rev. 3-2:— "Be watchful and strengthen the things that remain." During the years that have passed those words have ever been before me as I have worked with the women in the Roanoke.

Again the Book of Rev. gives me the key as I try to describe the progress we have made. Some of us are "weak" some "strong", some are "neither hot nor cold." There is evidence of "charity," "faith," "poverty" and "great wealth." But, on the whole, I can say most sincerely that the women of the Roanoke "have borne and have patience and for His name's-sake have labored and have not fainted."

My chief concern in 1944 was the fact that with 78 churches in the Roanoke, there were only 45 Active W. M. S. Today there are 64 Active W. M. S. Two of them are new this year, Gaston and West End. We are proud of this gain, but we will not be satisfied to stop here. Our aim is to have a W. M. S. in each of the 80 churches in this association.

Although the majority of societies have shown a ten percent increase in numbers each year, and notwithstanding the net gain of 19 societies, yet, on the whole our gain in members has not been what it should have been. For there has been a gain of only 56 members.

Our increase in tithers has been very, very good. There were 284 tithers reported in 1944. We now have 740. But with a membership of 2701 I hang my head in shame when I see that there are 2000 members who are not tithers. We can never hope to reach the true fullness of service as long as this is true of us.

With only 740 tithers, our gifts have increased from \$11,588.68 to the Coop. program to \$22,294.53— and from \$23,278.77 to \$42,958.67 to all causes. Only think what a power we could be, the wide world over, if the other 2,000 members were faithful stewards.

I close with Montgomery's translation of II Tim. 2:15: "Strive earnestly to present yourselves unto God, tested and proved worthy by trial, a workman unashamed, ever cutting a straight furrow for the message of truth"— and from II Tim. 14, "Guard the glorious

trust which has been committed unto you, by the aid of the Holy Spirit who makes His home in us."

The task is tremendous! Our sufficiency is God. Under the marching orders of the Great Commission, let us forge ahead to mobilize the full strength of our W. M. U. from this day forward.

P. N. Hutchinson, Rocky Mount, presented the report of the Obituary Committee, reading a list of the names of our beloved dead, and Charles Pearce, Washington, led in prayer.

The Moderator made mention of some free material sent from the American Bible Society and urged the people to take it, read it, and become better acquainted with the work of the Society.

In the absence of the Associational Missionary, C. W. Bazemore, who had been temporarily hospitalized, D. M. Branch presented his report.

REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY

I regret exceedingly, that I cannot be present with you in the fellowship and program of this day. May I send a few words to you in session:

Our association has had marvelous growth in one generation. Forty years ago we had in the Roanoke, less than fifty churches and less than five thousand members. Today, we have eighty churches and over nineteen thousand members. We are largest in area of all the Baptist Associations in North Carolina, and our place is near the top, also in numbers and in giving to all objects in our Baptist program. God has blessed and helped our churches all the way, unto this day that marks our 40th annual session.

We have come a long way but we still have a long way to go, to make Christ our Lord supreme in the objectives and tasks that we set our hearts and hands to, in doing His will.

Let us see how remarkable has been our progress in the last *three* years. In 1944, our churches had a total of 17,576 members. We have gained over two thousand in three years. In 1944 our total Sunday School enrollment was 11,701. Today, we have about fifteen thousand in our Sunday Schools, and still growing.

In 1944, all our churches gave a grand total of \$233,954.00 to all causes, local, and foreign. In the last Associational year that closed in October 1946, our churches gave a grand total of \$451,359.00 to all causes—almost a one-hundred percent increase.

In 1944, our churches gave \$24,641.00 to the Co-operative program. We will do even better this year, for only yesterday, we learned from our State Baptist headquarters that our association has this year, up to September 1947, given and sent to the Co-operative program,

over \$50,000.00, and we still have the rest of 1947 to go. This is a wonderful gain. Every church in the Roanoke Association except one, has in the year 1947, contributed and sent in offerings to the glorious and far-reaching causes embodied in the Co-operative program. This is a fine and inspiring record, and from this we shall go to even greater giving for our Lord's work. Our churches are missionary and evangelistic also. We reported over nine hundred baptisms last year. Most of our churches report conversions in their revival meetings, and through the year also. Pastors have been active and zealous in evangelism.

Now let us briefly view another side of the picture: We still have about sixteen churches with no W. M. U., no organized missionary activity.

Fifty of our churches have no Training Union; no training program of any kind for their members.

Several of our church fields have not as yet, provided a parsonage or home for their pastors. Many of our Sunday Schools have no training courses for officers or teachers.

Some of our goals for the coming year then might be in keeping with our abilities as a great and fast growing Baptist Association:

1. A missionary organization in every church.
2. At least ten new Baptist Training Unions organized.
3. Every church giving to Missions and to Co-operative Program.
4. At least sixty vacation Bible schools in 1948.
5. At least ten A-1 standard Sunday Schools in 1948.
6. Stewardship and tithing emphasized in every church.
7. A Revival meeting in every church in 1948.
8. At least five mission or branch Sunday schoolh in 1948.
9. Association-wide enlargement campaign in every Sunday School month of April, 1948.
10. Association-wide Stewardship and Missions week, early fall of 1948.

May God give us the grace, the strength and the vision to rise up and meet these opportunities that are ours.

The motion was carried.

Several messengers gave brief but interesting reports on the work of their local churches.

B. M. White-Hurst, Roanoke Rapids, gave the Baptist Training Union Report.

Mrs. C. R. Daniel, Weldon, rendered a lovely solo, "Teach Me To Pray."

W. K. McGee, Baptist Hospital, Winston Salem, delivered an address on the work of the hospital, bringing greetings from the staff and relating some experiences in the hospital.

The session was closed with a prayer offered by Ira D. S. Knight, Williamston.

EVENING SESSION

"Making Christ Supreme In Home and Society"

E. W. Holmes, Farmville, led the congregation in the opening song service.

Harold J. Hawkins, Spring Hope, led the devotional, reading from Phillippians 1:27 and 2:1-11, and offered prayer.

W. F. Gentry, Momeyer, presented an address on Religious Literature.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE REPORT

It is useless for me to say in the beginning that the Bible is the most important piece of Christian Literature that we have today because it is the inspired word of God concerning life and the most important issues of life. The Bible is the source of inspiration for the publication of all other Christian Literature that is being published. That is, without the Bible, all other Christian Literature would lose its meaning and rightful place in the hearts and homes of our people, then all other Christian Literature would come into its own. They go hand in hand, the one does not take the place of the other. Each has an important mission to fulfill in the hearts and lives of our people. And that mission is none other than that of God's will known to us and helping us obey that will.

Let us notice some reasons why we believe Christian literature should occupy a place of prominence in our lives and our homes today.

It should be given a place of prominence in our lives and homes because of the power it wields. There are many occasions in the past when the course of the world's history has been changed by the power of the written word. For instance history tells us that in 1831, thirty years before the outbreak of the Civil War, William Lloyd Garrison, a young man who was poor and friendless, wrote

these words: "I shall contend for the immediate liberation of our slave population. I will be as harsh as truth and as uncompromising as justice on the subject—I will not retreat a single inch. I will be heard." Then as a result of the writings of this young man in his magazine called the *LIBERATOR*, the New England anti-Slavery Society was formed in 1832. Then in 1861 the Civil War broke out. A way which came as a natural result of the writings of Garrison and other men of his day.

It is impossible for us to say just how much power is wielded by the written word today. But we know that it is great, and this power can be used in fighting evil and the forces of evil today through Christian Literature if we will let it. It is said that in the historic castle where Martin Luther lived while making his translation of the Bible the guide always points to an ink spot on the wall. History tells us that that spot was made there when Luther hurled his ink pot at the Devil. There is a legend that ever since that day over 400 years ago the Devil has been afraid of ink. And the kind of ink that the Devil of destruction, ignorance and intolerance fears most is that which is used in printing truthful, fearless, Christian literature. Thus with the evils of untruth, right, and Godliness in our land and in our world today we would urge you to use for good the power of the written word that is at your disposal.

Then Christian Literature should be given a prominent place in our lives and homes because of its power to edify or to build up in grace and in a knowledge of God. And it does this by giving information regarding the truth. No true child of God should be satisfied with just being saved. He ought to want to serve God here. And to be able to do that in the fullest capacity one must be well grounded in the truth. There never was a time when truth was needed any more than it is today. There never was a time when it was more necessary if we are to avoid chaos and complete destruction than it is today. The time has come when we must know the truth. A passenger on a steamship was watching with keen interest the skill of the pilot as he directed the boat through the winding channel. He said to him, "You must know every rock, bar, and shoal on the whole route." And he said, "No, I don't, not by a long ways." "You don't," said the passenger, "Well, what do you know?" The pilot very quickly, and with emphasis said, "I know where the deep water is." So, today, we need to know where the deep water of truth is if we are to steer clear of the destructive dangers that abide everywhere in the shallow waters of untruth. And one of the main channels through which this truth may flow into our hearts and homes is Christian Literature.

Then Christian Literature should be given a place of prominence in our hearts and homes also because of the inspiration to live by the truth that it gives. An artist once painted a picture and he set the scene on the darkness of a night background. On the dark

waters of a lonely lake could be seen a man rowing a small boat. The wind was high and it churned the waters of the lake which were raging around the little skiff. Above was a dark and angry sky. But through the darkness could be seen one lone star, and he continued to row on through the storm with all of his might. Beneath the picture the artist had written these words: "If I lose that, I am lost." It is this star of truth that inspires us to fight on in our world of sin and darkness. Let us urge you to take advantage of the opportunities that are ours today to make this star of truth shine brightly not only for ourselves but for others by using God's word and the Christian periodicals that are available for us today. Give these a prominent place in your daily life and in your home.

C. E. Baucom, Wilson, Chairman of a Committee appointed in 1946 to bring "revised constitution" before this session, presented the report of the committee. Copies of the proposed constitution were distributed to messengers and then read by Mr. Baucom. A motion was made that it be re-read and discussed item by item. This motion was carried and Mr. Baucom proceeded to read as instructed. Two or three minor changes were suggested. These changes were made by the messengers on their copies.

The allotted time for this matter expired and attention was called to it. A motion was made that the necessary time be given to this matter and the motion was carried.

After the reading of the constitution, and the corrections or changes made according to the wishes of the body, a motion was made by Mr. Baucom that it be adopted.

MOTION

I move that this constitution and by laws be adopted as a whole and thereby affectuated.

The motion was adopted.

Mr. Holmes then led the congregation in singing, "Jesus Keep Me near The Cross."

The Scotland Neck Church rendered two selections, "I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked," and "Were You There When They Crucified My Lord."

Dr. I. G. Greer, Superintendent of the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina, delivered an address on, "Making Christ Supreme in Home and Society."

Mr. Greer declared, "The chief function of the home is to bring children into the world and rear them." He stated also, "No other institution in the world has a right to bring a child into the world."

Then, in discussing these statements, he said:

a. The greatest adventure in the world is when a man and woman covenant together to bring a child into the world for that child can become the greatest good in the world or can be the greatest tragedy.

b. It ought to be the prayer of every mother and father that they be a good father and a good mother. The greatest tragedy of all is when parents fail in their God given task and privilege.

c. A child has a right to good parents.

d. A child has a right for other people to see the best in them.

1. No one wishes to have their faults always shown.

2. There is a spark in a child. We need to kindle that spark to the saving of the child.

e. Parents need to stop substituting own prejudices with the truth.

f. Every person has a right to have their individual personality known and recognized.

g. We can and should live in the lives of others out in the future.

The session was closed with a prayer offered by W. E. Goode, Scotland Neck.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

"Making Christ Supreme in Our State"

On Wednesday morning the opening session was called to order by the Moderator at 10 o'clock in the Red Oak Baptist Church.

Paul B. Nickens, Plymouth, led the song service and was accompanied at the organ by Mrs. T. J. Faulkner. The hymns were "Come Thou Almighty King" and "Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty."

The devotional was given by L. E. Godwin, Oakdale. He read Ephesians 2:1-14 and led in prayer.

Under the title of "Planned Forum" on the program the following discussions were offered:

- a. Financial program.
- b. Church discipline.
- c. Coordination of church program.
- d. Selection of officers, teachers, and choir members.

The first, "Financial Program," was discussed by Paul B. Nickens, Plymouth.

An Adequate Financial Program For Our Churches

I do not pose as an authority on the question of adequately financing our churches. However, I do have one or two convictions regarding this essential matter. I am confident that one of the greatest sins of Southern Baptists is in the realm of Stewardship. I am also confident that the solution of our financial problems does not lie in the sale of flavoring and Bingo parties, etc.

Now, may I offer just one or two suggestions relative to this matter of financing our churches?

1. First let the Finance Committee together with the pastor set up a liberal budget.
 - (a) Have something in mind. A goal before you.
 - (b) Then try to reach that goal.
2. Second, have this budget adopted by the church.
 - (a) Let the people see and know what's going on
 - (b) An informed church is a progressive church.
3. Third, elect a good financial secretary or church treasurer.
 - (a) A man who knows something about keep records.
 - (b) A man who will submit a monthly report to the church.
4. Fourth, use some envelope system.
 - (a) Some like the weekly duplex
 - (b) Others choose the Unified budget
 - (c) But use SOME SYSTEM
5. And, in the FIFTH place—lead the people to tithe.
 - (a) Let the people see the leaders tithe.
 1. This includes the preacher.
 2. All deacons and church officers should be tithers.
 - (b) Preach stewardship.
 1. Not just special sermons on stewardship.
 2. Bring this vital matter into every sermon.
 - (c) Have a week of training.
 - (d) Send out monthly statements (if you like).
 - (e) Lead the people to see that giving to the Lord is not

paying church dues, nor paying the preachers salary. Giving is an important part of the worship service.

The second, "Church Discipline," was discussed by C. B. Peacock, Whitakers.

Text: Psalm 11:3. "If the foundations be destroyed, what can the righteous do?"

I deem it very important at this time to sound a note of distinction between the "Apostolic and Protestant Church. If what we claim is true, we are members of the Apostolic Church. We do not believe in the religious ideology of man . . . but we exercise faith in Jesus Christ who is "the Head of the Church."

I do not believe it necessary to adopt any set of rules to govern Orthodox Baptist, so long as he conforms to the contents of our Church Covenant. "The grace of God schools us." — The grace of God which is supposed to take away the necessity for discipline, actually produces that discipline. It schools us; and it schools us to do two things: "To renounce," and, "to live alive;" to let go and to take on; to renounce and to realize. And, the thing we realize first of all is self-mastery. A disciplined life emerges out of the grace of God.

Of course you know that I read the Church Covenant.

The third, "Coordination of Church Program," was discussed by Mrs. R. C. Chason, Rocky Mount.

The fourth, "Selection of Officers, Teachers, and Choir Members," was discussed by Worth C. Grant, Weldon.

Messengers were given the privileges of contributing to these discussions and several made many helpful comments and suggestions.

J. Felix Arnold then led the congregation in singing, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing."

Dr. Hoyt Blackwell, President of Mars Hill College, directed a discussion on "Christian Education." He also presented Dr. Allen Easley, Wake Forest; Professor Claude White, Campbell College; and Professor Ben Fisher, Gardner-Webb College. Each of these brought greetings from their respective schools.

Several visitors were recognized and other announcements made.

Harry Wood, Angier, made an announcement relative to a tour of the Southern Baptist Mission Field, offering an opportunity to anyone who wished to join this group.

A hymn, "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing," was sung by

the congregation.

A special number of music, "Rock of Ages," was rendered by a male quartet of the host church.

An address, on the "Cooperative Program," was given by C. E. Baucom, Wilson.

The session was closed by a prayer offered by Oscar Creech of Ahoskie.

AFTERNOON SESSION

"Making Christ Supreme In The Southland And World"

The song service included, "Love Divine All Loves Excelling," "There Is A Fountain Filled With Blood," and "How Firm A Foundation Ye Saints Of The Lord."

The devotional was led by E. R. Stewart, Hamilton. He read the following passages, Matthew 25:34-40, Mark 5:19, Matthew 5:14, Acts 1:7-8, Mark 16:15-16, and Matthew 28:1-20, and led in prayer.

Gaskill reminded us that this year is the 40th anniversary of the organization of Y. W. A. A picture of its organization and work over this period was presented. With this past history of the Y. W. A. Mrs. Gaskill closed with the challenge to each of us, "What about a picture of the future?"

Mrs. J. R. Everette, G. A., R. A., and Sunbeam Leader, discussed "I Like Two Meetings a Month." These children are to be compared to the flower. They are human parts of the church, just as the petals are parts of the flower. We must hold their interest in the church and its organizations, and this can be done much easier meeting twice a month.

Mrs. George Davis had one of the girls who attended camp last summer give a brief report. From this we learned just how much camp means to the young people. A general daily schedule was given in which time was allotted, for devotional, study, handicraft and recreation.

This was followed by Mrs. R. E. Hardaway's talk in which she emphasized the responsibility of the W. M. U. to our young people. We must foster them, and in order to do this we must:

1. Become informed of their needs,
2. Provide leaders and funds for these needs,
3. Work with counsellors and leaders,

4. Love and believe in their organizations.

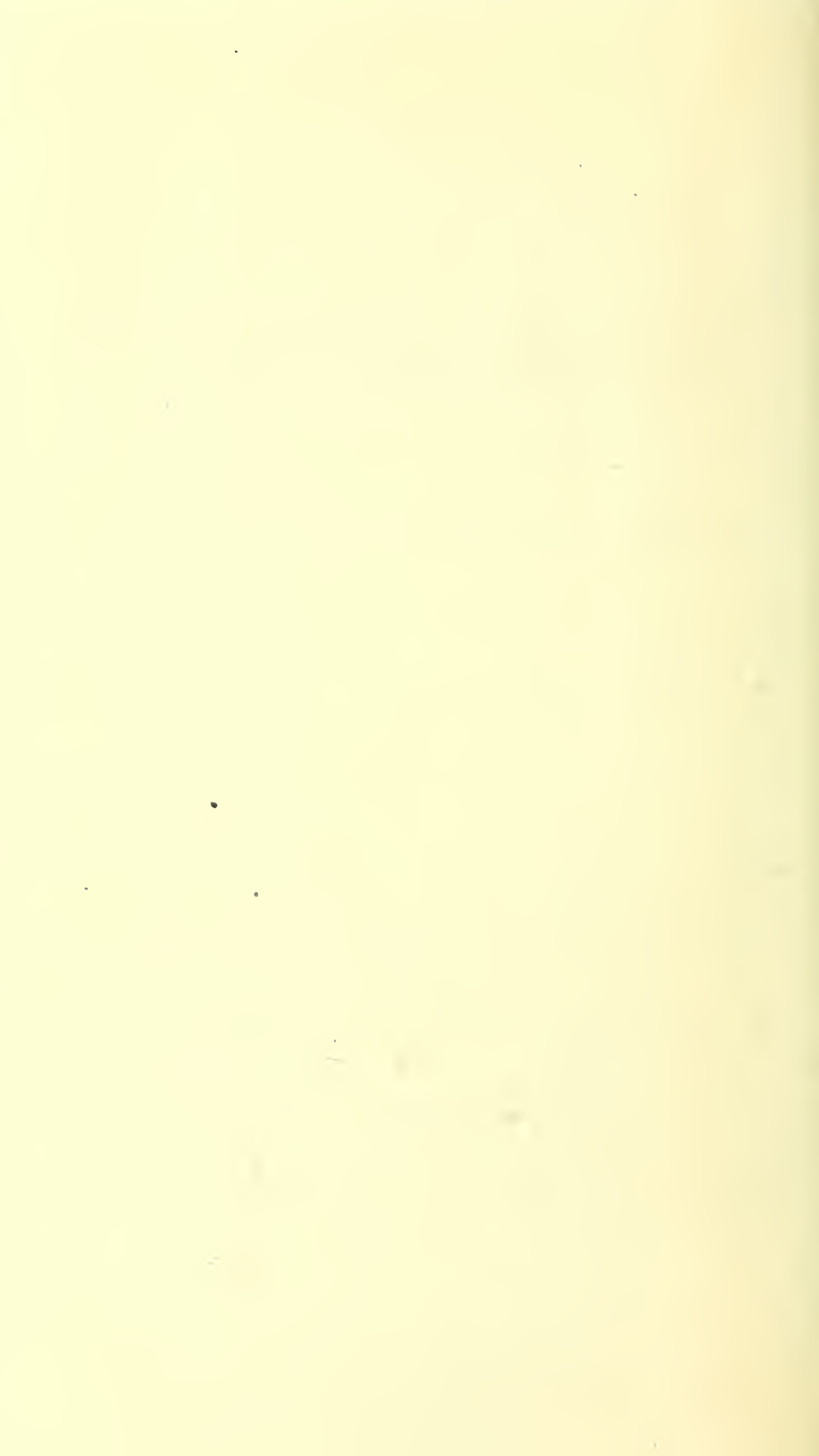

CONSTITUTION

1. The Association shall be composed of the pastors and of the members, not exceeding three from any church, chosen by the churches, who shall produce letters certifying their appointments. Members thus chosen and convened together with the pastors shall be denominated "The Roanoke Baptist Association," which shall have no power over the churches, nor shall it infringe on any of the rights.

2. The letters from the churches shall contain the number then in fellowship, and of those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded or died since last Association.

3. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, and Auditor, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

4. Other churches, upon petition by letters and by delegates, and after a satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, may be admitted to the body by unanimous vote, when the Moderator shall give the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

5. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion of the Association, whether it may be debated or not.

6. The Association shall furnish the churches with copies of its minutes.

7. The minutes of the Association shall be read and approved and shall be signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association adjourns.

8. Any church not representing itself in this body three successive sessions by letter or by delegates, shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless reasons are assigned.

9. The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church which shall be found disorderly in faith and practice.

10. Visiting brothers from sister churches, or similar bodies, may be invited to participate in our deliberations.

11. At each session of the Association, delegates to the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention shall be chosen by vote.

12. This Constitution is subject to alteration by a majority vote of the delegates at any session.

13. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

14. The Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator.

RULES OF DECORUM

Believing it best to be governed by certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of the Association, we adopt the following:

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator.
3. The person speaking shall adhere strictly to the subject, and in no way reflect on any other brother.
4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted unless he violate some rule of decorum.
5. No brother shall absent himself from the Association without obtaining permission from the body.
6. The names of the delegates shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
7. The Moderator may give his ideas on any subject before putting it to a vote, but is entitled to vote only in case of a tie.
8. The order of business shall be made at the beginning of each session, and shall be changed only by a vote of the body.

TUESDAY MORNING

"Christ Is the Answer in Personal and Home Life"

On Tuesday morning, October 12th, 1948, the 41st session of the Roanoke Baptist Association was called to order in the First Baptist Church of Tarboro by the Moderator, John T. Coley.

The song service was conducted by J. Felix Arnold, Enfield, assisted at the organ by Mrs. James Barnette of the host church.

The opening hymns were, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing," "Crown Him with Many Crowns," and "Beneath the Cross of Jesus."

The morning devotional was conducted by Carl L. Ousley, pastor of the host Church. Mr. Ousley read the 53rd chapter of Isaiah and led in prayer.

The address of welcome was given by the Hon. George M. Fountain, Tarboro, and Parks C. Harris, Red Oak, responded.

New pastors of the association were introduced to the body by C. W. Bazemore, Associational Missionary, as follows: S. H. Roberts, Rt. 1, Wilson, pastor of Elm City and New Hope Churches; Stewart B. Simms, Memorial, Williamston; E. Evans Ulrich, Five Points, Wilson; W. D. Morris, Scotland Neck; C. S. Waters, Southside, Rocky Mount; Ralph Fergarson, Robersonville; Carl Lee Ousley, Tarboro.

Visitors were recognized and welcomed by the moderator.

The moderator delivered an address on, "Let's Not Pretend."

ADDRESS

Dear Friends,

I come to you this morning with gratitude in my heart for every remembrance of you, for every accomplishment of the past 19 years. I could as I have been doing, relate many things that we feel proud of, and surely God has wonderfully blessed us in our labors, but you have your minutes. I would that you study and acquaint yourselves with the different phases of our work, now, compared to years before.

Seek out the highlights, center on the things we need to work toward. I do not propose to give figures this morning.

As I come to the close of my term as Moderator, my heart's desire is that I may be able to cause each of us to think. What an opportunity, what a great responsibility is facing the 21,000 Baptists of this great old Roanoke. I am not a pessimist and I am not trying to bring a gloomy message, but I do want to impress upon you a true picture of some things we must consider if we win the Roanoke for Christ.

We call ourselves Christians. What does it mean? "Whoever accepts Christ as his Savior and submits to Him as his Lord, and takes the New Testament as the law of his life is a Christian." Then what is a church? Pendleton says, "A Church is a congregation of Christ-baptized disciples united in the belief of what He has said, and covenanting to do what He has commanded."

Christians make up the churches of the Roanoke and yet we have hardly begun the task of Christianizing all of life. It is possible for the Spirit of Christ to dominate a small area of our lives and the other areas be wholly pagan.

A man may act as a Christian parent but a pagan employer; be Christlike on Sunday but an embezzler on Monday. This ought not to be.

"The acid test of Sunday religion is Monday behavior." Are we thinking straight? We notice a person grab the biggest piece of pie at a dinner. We say he is greedy, but if he supports a government policy of grabbing the biggest part from weaker nations, FEW condemn him. We must learn to be Christlike in all areas. If we buy a piece of sterling we expect it to be of the same material through and through. If we are Christians, then we must be Christlike through and through. Integrity is no counterfeit. It says, "I am what I am." We must pose as what we are. Do not be one thing face to face and give a stab when

back to back. We must accept Christ and live His teachings if we are to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. Let us remind ourselves that we cannot buy our way into the Kingdom. We may give our gifts but unless we give ourselves we are far short of a well-rounded life. **WE CANNOT BUY FAITH, LOVE, SINCERITY OR DEPENDABILITY.**

Many people are not reading their Bible daily but they are reading US in our work and in our leisure. In II Cor. 3:3 we read, "You make it obvious that you are a letter of Christ . . . written not with ink, but with the SPIRIT of the living God." Are we getting anywhere with all our programs unless we note a change in our everyday living? The kingdom of God within a person's heart, or the lack of it, is what determines the character of the person's nature. Jesus rebels against falsity, against pretension and all which is not true.

Do you know any people who go their ways cheating, defrauding, or breaking laws of immorality with no feeling of guilt, or sin, until they are caught? When will we realize that wrong is wrong whether caught or not caught? Do you know any Christians who prefer personal pleasure rather than accept church responsibilities? Did you have any trouble securing your church officers and teachers recently? Did you hear any excuses? One of the Scripture verses most lived up to is "They all with one consent began to make excuses." Will we be doing the same thing at the bar of God? How shall we answer then? Could it be that we have confined our Bible reading to the more comfortable words and have overlooked the stern and inescapable message of judgment that it also brings? We must think.

I ask you what are the motives in your heart? I recently heard a teacher of a large men's Bible class say that his members did not study their lesson nor did they read their Bible. They wanted him to entertain them with a lecture, have a large class and a big offering. Do we read our Bibles because of a deep love and desire to know God's will for our lives, or in order to sign a B.T.U. card? Do we want to live peaceably with other nations because it is the will of Christ or because we are afraid the atomic bomb will blow us into bits? Are we applying the Golden Rule in our dealings with others? Only through Christ, and by precept and example is it possible to win the Roanoke—yea, the whole wide world for Christ. I have more respect for the atheist with no pretense of caring for the teachings of Christ

than I do for a posing Christian who is sweet-coated on the surface but bitter and deceitful underneath. I'm not speaking on Evangelism because that comes later in the program, but I am saying we must see something different in the Christian from the non-Christian before we can expect a great revival. Dr. Stanley Jones tells of a famous doctor who said that if three-fourths of his patients found God they would be well. A great psychiatrist of Hollywood said most of his patients didn't need a doctor, they needed a mourner's bench; they needed God. Of course there are exceptions but I say we are seeking every cure for a lost world, when we could quiet our fears and restlessness by "letting this mind be you which was in Christ Jesus." A deep love and compassion, a surrendered life of humbleness and willingness to serve and be used in doing our Father's will.

You, my friends, compose the very cream of old Roanoke. You are loyal and cooperative, you are a wonderful people to work with, but with more than 200,000 unchurched people in our association who do their Bible reading by watching our daily attitude and conduct should cause us to seek divine guidance for our lives.

Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue and if there be any praise, think on these things.

We must think, my friends. We must act.

LET'S NOT PRETEND.

Under the head of organization Mr. Coley stated that he had served 19 years as moderator and would prefer that another be elected. Gordon L. Price, Roanoke Rapids, was requested to lead in a prayer that the body be divinely guided in the selection of officers for the coming year. A very acceptable prayer was offered.

The Moderator requested all duly appointed messengers to stand. With this group he requested all pastors to stand. Upon the count that 34 pastors were present and the number of messengers standing was sufficient, a quorum was declared and the session was declared ready to transact business.

Gordon L. Price, Roanoke Rapids, placed the name of John T. Coley in nomination as moderator. J. W. Kincheloe, Rocky Mount, placed a second to the nomination. E. W. Holmes, Farm-

ville, placed the name of Clyde E. Baucom, Wilson, in nomination. E. Evans Ulrich, Wilson, placed a second to the nomination.

In the absence of the Vice-Moderator, the Clerk was requested to take the chair and Mr. Coley retired.

Mr. Coley was re-elected by a majority vote. A motion carried that the body unanimously elect Mr. Coley. This vote was taken by standing vote.

Clyde E. Baucom, Wilson, was unanimously re-elected Vice-Moderator; R. L. Collins, Sharpsburg, was unanimously re-elected clerk and treasurer. W. W. Eagles, Crisp, was unanimously re-elected auditor.

Mr. Arnold then led the session in singing, "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross."

Charles B. Howard, Buies Creek, delivered an inspiration address on, "Christ Is the Answer in Personal and Home Life."

Mr. Howard declared that Christ is the answer to all personal needs and to all home needs. He said, "There is no place like the home to teach the Bible; win the lost to Christ; put across a church program; guide young Christians."

Mr. Arnold led in singing, "I Need Thee Every Hour."

C. W. Bazemore, Scotland Neck; Stewart B. Simms, Williamston, and Worth C. Grant, Wilson, were named as a committee to receive petitionary letters from churches wishing to enter the Roanoke membership.

Mr. Arnold, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Barnette, rendered a lovely hymn, "No One Ever Cared Like Jesus," by C. A. Weigle.

The pastor of the host church again welcomed the body and made announcements concerning entertainment for the noon and evening hours.

The Moderator recognized J. W. Robbins, Sharpsburg, and expressed appreciation for him and all older members attending.

Due to an important engagement which necessitated the early departure of the delegation from First Church, Roanoke Rapids, Gordon L. Price, pastor, requested privilege to make a report on the work done by that church. The time and request were granted and he made a very interesting and challenging report.

The annual sermon was presented by Richard E. Hardaway, pastor of the Memorial Church, Greenville.

ASSOCIATIONAL SERMON
October 12, 1948 at Tarboro, N. C.

Subject: "The Missionary Charter of the Church."

Text: Matthew 28:18-19a.

There are still some who may question the wisdom of spending so much money, and of putting forth so much effort, trying to give the gospel to others, especially to those of foreign lands.

So let us consider the "Missionary Charter of the Church" as given us in this command of Christ, which is known as the Great Commission.

I. First, let us notice the source of this commission.

The question of whether the church would be missionary, or not, was not left to the disciples, nor to the decision of the church.

1. The missionary commission was given on the authority of Jesus Himself.

(1) He has the full authority of heaven. *

(2) He also has full authority on earth.

2. The first claim of missions:

It does not come from the need of the lost; nor from the blessings which the gospel is able to confer upon men.

It springs from the direct command of Christ.

II. What we are commanded to do.

1. First, we are commanded to go.

2. We are to make disciples.

3. We are to baptize the disciples that we make.

4. And we are to teach them "to observe all things, whatsoever Christ has commanded us."

III. Jesus gives us His encouragement for carrying out His command.

1. The encouragement is the living presence of Christ.

2. Corollaries that grow out of the promise of Christ's presence with us in our missionary endeavors.

(1) Our missionary work is to be continuous, even unto the end of the world.

(2) "Christ with us" means that we shall not fail.

Our gospel is not a defeatist gospel. It is the gospel of victory over sin and over all unrighteousness. Our Christ is the eternal Son of God, the King of Kings, and the Lord of Lords. "Of His kingdom and peace there shall be no end, and the kingdoms of the world shall become the kingdoms of our Lord and of His Christ."

Jesus has the authority to command and the power to give victory to all who obey Him. He says, "All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth. Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations."

The session adjourned for lunch after a prayer by Mr. Hardaway.

AFTERNOON SESSION

"Christ Is the Answer in the Local Church"

The afternoon session was begun by Mr. Arnold leading the congregation in singing, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord," and "How Firm a Foundation."

The devotional was led by Ralph E. Fergarson, Robersonville. He read the 46th Psalm and offered prayer.

C. A. Francis, Nashville, presented the report of the Obituary Committee. He spoke of their faithfulness and contributions to the Kingdom of God in the Association. C. W. Kreamer, Halifax, committee member, offered prayer.

Under the title, "Planned Forum," the following discussions were offered: "What Readest Thou?", E. R. Stewart, Hamilton.

WHAT READEST THOU?

Some people read much, others not at all. As a man reads, he thinks, and as a man thinks, so is he.

The Bible contains the world's greatest literature. The Bible is the best literature in print. There are the following types of literature found in the Bible: law, history, prophecy, poetry, drama, story, biography, songs, sonnets, psalms, gospels, letters and apocalyptic literature.

The Bible is a library itself, one volume with 66 books; 39 in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament. It covers a period of 1500 years, with 40 or more writers. These as they were inspired wrote the account each of their day. Its unity proves its inspiration. Holy men of old were inspired to write it. The Old Testament was written in Hebrew; the New Testament in Greek. We are commanded to search the Scriptures and read them daily.

Much time is spent in reading the daily, weekly, semi-weekly, monthly papers and magazines. The best papers and magazines should be subscribed to and read. The Church library should be a medium of reading good books. Every home will do well to subscribe to and read "The Biblical Recorder," "Charity and Children," "The Commission," "Home Missions," "Home Life." The Bible should be above all these.

There is much trashy literature, cheap, 25c a year. Much sold on the newsstands, some too vile and vulgar to get passage through the mails, but hauled to newsstands on trucks. We should refrain from feeding the members of our family on cheap, trashy papers, magazines, booklets setting forth jealousy, murder, robbery, falsehood, hatred and immoral living. Parents can control largely what the children and all read in the home.

Then the picture shows. Some see every picture that comes to town. Care in the pictures we allow our children to see on the screens. Not more than one picture out of ten has a wholesome moral. Buy the best literature and set it before our family. Select the best shows if they must see them.

A mother came into the room where Mary was eating rotten and half-rotten apples. The mother did not say, "Mary, quit eating those rotten apples." No, but she went back into the kitchen and selected a nice bowl of ripe, red, sound apples and set them before Mary. Then she ceased to eat the decayed fruit and unwholesome fruit and ate the best. Put before your family the best literature. See that each member of the home has a Bible of his or her own.

"The Men in Our Churches," Norman L. Blythe, Stoney Creek Church, Rt. 3, Rocky Mount.

MEN IN THE CHURCH

A church is strong in proportion to its manpower. A church is never strong unless it has many strong men in it. It will never make great progress for God and His Kingdom until the men in the church go forward for the glory of God.

Some time ago a pastor called his men together. He gave them a chance to air their complaints. As different ones made criticism he carefully wrote it down. One complained about the order of service; another, too much emphasis on giving; another, sermons no good; another, music no good. And on and on until they finally gave out.

Then the pastor said: "I have noted your complaints; you have criticized everything and everyone except my Saviour. He is your Master, follow Him." CHRIST WILL BE THE ANSWER AS OUR MEN SEEK TO FOLLOW HIM IN OUR CHURCHES.

Let us consider a brief outline of our subject:

I. THE NECESSITY OF HAVING MEN IN THE CHURCH.

- A. The great conquests of Christianity have been made by men.
- B. We need men, heads of homes, because they are the spiritual leaders.
- C. Our men have the means of promoting our full church program.
- D. We need young men to fill the ranks. This need is urgent. Our young men need to grow up and be men.

II. WE NEED MEN OF GREAT FAITH.

- A. We have so many who ride on the other fellow's push. They are just barely saved, not saved for service.
- B. We need men like Barnabas of old.
 - 1. A good man.
 - 2. Full of the Holy Ghost
 - 3. And of faith.
- C. In times like this, we need men of courage who will stand for the right. Face the devil and charge him!
- D. We need men full of conviction and missionary zeal. The prayer of every pastor is "Give us God-fearing men who will step up, step out, and carry on!"

III. WE NEED MEN OF ACTION.

- A. When we have men of great faith, that faith will drive them to act, to be doers of the word.
- B. Christian men are fitted for the task.
 - 1. They have the message.
 - 2. They have the mission.
 - 3. They have the means.
- C. There is so much to be done that only consecrated men can do.
 - 1. Have a Christian home.
 - 2. Lead R.A. groups.
 - 3. Teach Sunday School classes.
 - The list is legion; it is so needed now.
- D. There must be a program of service that will challenge each one. For many churches our laymen should do the following things:
 - 1. Back the pastor up.
 - 2. Give thoughtful and constructive leadership in the whole church program.
 - 3. Give their best efforts in personal evangelism.
 - 4. Support all of our denominational program.
 - 5. Witness for Christ by bringing their tithes and offerings into His courts each Lord's Day.
 - 6. Give greater impetus to the missionary enterprise.
 - 7. Make it a point to advertise their church.
 - 8. Greater program of personal growth in the things of God.

Let every man take his place in the Army of Christ.

Let us not lose our manpower. Yea, rather, let us use it for the Glory of God.

"Carry on! Carry on!

Fight the good fight and true;

Believe in your mission, greet life with a cheer

There's big work to do, and that's why you are here,

Carry on! Carry on!

Let the world be the better for you

And at last when you die, let this be your cry:

Carry on, my soul, carry on!"

Several messengers gave brief reports on the work in their churches. These reports were very interesting.

C. W. Bazemore, Scotland Neck, chairman of the committee on petitionary letters, reported that 2 petitions had been received, Darlington, a newly organized church in Halifax County and Turkey Branch, Halifax County, with a letter of dismissal and recommendation from the Tar River Association. Upon a motion made by Mr. Bazemore these churches were unanimously accepted for membership in the Roanoke Association. The Moderator offered words of welcome to the messengers of these churches.

A message in song was rendered by Mrs. B. B. Turnage, Farmville, "The Stranger of Galilee," by Morris, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Carl L. Ousley, Tarboro.

J. A. Neilson, Immanuel Church, Greenville, delivered a message on, "Man's Extremity—Christ the Answer."

The session was closed by a prayer offered by Worth C. Grant, Weldon.

EVENING SESSION

"Christ Is the Answer in Our Association"

The evening song service was directed by Stewart B. Simms, Williamston and included, "My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less Than Jesus' Blood and Righteousness," and "I've Found a Friend."

The devotional was conducted by E. Evans Ulrich, Wilson. He read Eze. 47:1-12 and led in prayer.

C. A. Francis, Nashville, Associate Associational Training Union Director, presented the report of the Training Union in the absence of B. Marshall White-Hurst, Rosemary, Roanoke Rapids, Director.

REPORT OF THE ROANOKE ASSOCIATIONAL BAPTIST TRAINING UNION

Mat. 16:13-19

To most of us the Training Union is but the old B. Y. P. U. under a new name, a name which was added when adults became a part of the program. To many it has remained the organization of young people in the church. As such it is to be sponsored, and if necessary, financially supported, but not to be taken too seriously. Perhaps this fault in our conception caused its leaders to emphasize its basic function. It is a *Training Union*.

As a Training Union in the local church it ceases to function when it no longer trains Christian people in the meaning of church membership. Out of this union should come our Sunday School teachers, W. M. U.

leaders, other B. T. U. leaders, ushers and deacons. Surely out of this organization should come our soul winners. What does a Baptist Church seek to do for its membership, for its community, for the Baptist work at home and abroad? The Training Union *as such* fails if it does not lead in furnishing well trained persons to lead in that work. .

In the text which we have read the Master formed the first Baptist Training Union when He took His disciples to Caesarea Philippi and trained them in church membership. He began as the B. T. U. must begin, with the presentation of the vital question, "Whom do you say that I am?" The answer must always be "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Then the Master began unfolding His larger ministry.

The Training Union starts where Jesus started with personal commitment and then trains *committed* Christians the performing of the various ministries of the church. Only dedicated professing Christians should do this. Others had better not try until the first step has been settled.

It seems to me that until we can have this larger concept of Training Union work that we are not fulfilling the purpose and function of this organization. Until we activate this purpose we have only a social group, a time-"occupier" for the Sunday evening, something which meets just before the evening worship. Surely it emphasizes young people, but it also seeks to train adults as well. It is time now for our churches to use to a greater extent the training arm of the local church.

Now what is the picture of our Training Union work in the Roanoke Association?

First let us consider the meetings held during the Associational year. There were two officers' council meetings. The first met in Rocky Mount to consider the scope of the year's work. The second one met in Nashville at a supper meeting to consider the summer and fall work.

In addition to these two meetings, there were two mass meetings. The first of these was held in Robersonville at which time our work was organized for the year. Rev. C. W. Bazemore indicated "our Training Union opportunities for 1948" and the Union established definite goals. In a conference which came later in the evening these goals were discussed with each age group by capable leaders who indicated ways in which that age group could best attain these goals which pertained to them. At the close of the service Rev. Norman Blythe brought the keynote message, "The Gospel for Today's World." One hundred and ninety-six persons representing 16 churches were present.

The second of these meetings was held in Nashville with over 200 present representing about the same number of churches. At this meeting Rev. Tom Scofield gave a devotional making use of visual aids. Later he led a conference on the Use of Visual Aid Materials in the Training Union. At this meeting the Associational Tournaments were conducted. The Stoney Creek Training Union won the Junior Memory Work contest. Miss Sybil Wood, the Rosemary Church, won the Sword Drill. Miss Ruby Stowe of the Rosemary Church was the winning Better Speaker. Mrs. John B. Moore, New Hope Church, Wilson, won the Adult Bible Readers' Contest. These competed in the later regional contests held at Kinston April 9 and 10.

Second, let us look briefly at our Associational Training Union statis-

ties. Out of 80-odd Baptist Churches in the Roanoke there are only 36 reported Training Unions. Seven of the 36 have all departments in the Union. Only one (New Hope) is A. I. One other church (Roanoke Rapids First) could be A. I. if it could enroll one-fourth of its membership.

We have deposited to our credit \$34.58 in the Roanoke Bank & Trust Co., Rosemary Branch, of Roanoke Rapids. Our sole expenses have been postage and cost of secretarial help.

Third, let us consider some recommendations which may be helpful:

1. Elect a new Associational Training Union Director.
2. Divide Associational Training Union into two districts.
3. Provide greater recognition of the Training Union and its officers.
4. Please plan to send more reports of the work done in Training Unions to local churches.

Norman L. Blythe, Stoney Creek Church, Rocky Mount, presented the Sunday School report in the absence of L. D. Holt, Associational Superintendent, who had recently gone from this association to another field of work.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

During the early part of September of this year, our Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Rev. L. D. Holt of Bethel, left this Association to become the Associational Missionary for the Green River Association. I was asked to serve during the interim until the Association convened and one was elected. The Associational Sunday School Materials including a written report of the Sunday School Activities were turned over to me. I read this prepared report now:

At the last annual meeting of the Roanoke Association I was elected to serve as Associational Sunday School Superintendent. With the cooperation of our Associational Missionary, Rev. C. W. Bazemore, and the Sunday School Board we were able to go ahead with some promotion. We planned and held an associational rally in the First Baptist Church of Tarboro on March 9th of this year. Because of the bad weather conditions, the meeting was not well attended. The total number in attendance was 144 with 28 churches being represented. An offering of \$30.00 was taken, increasing the promotion fund to the amount of \$77.98. Of this amount \$51.50 has been spent for clerical assistance, postage, telephone calls, printing and supplies, leaving a balance on hand of \$26.48.

At the Tarboro rally the following goals were set for the year:

1. Go into each church through the visitation program.
2. Secure a religious census in each church.
3. Promote an enlargement campaign in each church.
4. Promote a Vacation Bible School in each church.
5. A study course in each church.
6. At least one Revival Meeting in each church.
7. A teacher and officers' training clinic in each group.
8. Establishment of mission Sunday Schools where needed.
9. More standard Sunday Schools.
10. Someone from each church attending one of the assemblies this summer.

At this time we do not have the complete records to indicate how near we have come to reaching these goals, but indications are that progress has been made along these lines. For one thing many of the churches did hold conferences with the team visitors in which plans were made for enlarging and improving the local teaching program. The available reports indicate that larger and better Vacation Bible Schools were held than ever before. There have been revivals in practically all the Churches and we believe reports will reveal an increase in the number of baptisms over last year. More of our people attended the summer assemblies than ever before.

The trend in Sunday School and Vacation Bible School has been upward. In 1946 the minutes revealed an enrollment in the Sunday Schools of the Association of 14,736; and in 1947 of 16,276. The reported Vacation Bible School enrollment for 1946 was 4,198; and for 1947 it was 4,988. We think this year's report will reveal a similar increase.

I would like to add that our Associational Missionary, Rev. C. W. Bazemore, has strengthened all phases of our work. With his wise counsel and able direction the work of the Churches should go forward even more rapidly.

NOW LET ME ADD A FEW WORDS OF MY OWN:

Last year we observed the Every Church Visitation program in behalf of our Sunday Schools during the month of February. The Sunday School Board leaders and our state leaders thought it wise to change the time of this program to October because of usually bad weather conditions in February and that four months of the Associational Sunday School year had passed before these meetings. It was decided to have ours in the Roanoke the last week in October where this could be done. If not then, then at a time convenient to the church and the visiting team. If we were to accomplish this, it was necessary for the acting Superintendent to begin the preparations by contacting team captains and churches. This has been done and good response has been achieved. We want to go into all our 82 churches with this program.

There are three perennial goals that we want every Sunday School in the Association to strive for this year:

First, a program to win back all of our absentees.

Second, an enlargement program to meet the needs of local church and community.

Third, better Bible teaching in the classes of our Sunday Schools.

By prayer, visitation, Bible Study and Devotion lets attain these goals for the glory of God.

Now we want to present 10 Specific Aims for the year 1949 in the Sunday Schools of the Roanoke:

1. Enroll 4,000 New Sunday School members.
2. One or more revivals in each church during the year.
3. At least one Sunday School Enlargement program in each Sunday School during 1949.
4. A week of Bible Study the first week in January in all churches.
5. A program to decrease the absentees in our Sunday Schools.
6. More standard Sunday Schools.
7. A Vacation Bible School in each church.
8. Promote one or more Mission Vacation Bible Schools this year.
9. A Sunday School Census and survey in every church.
10. A systematic program of Visitation in every church and Sunday School.

W. M. U. REPORT TO ROANOKE ASSOCIATION

Quote Romans 10:9-15. I know of no passage in the Bible that states so clearly and logically both the plan of salvation and the method of presenting this salvation to mankind. The women of the S. B. C. have always believed this and have wanted so eagerly to have a part in this great work of missions.

And so sixty years ago a small group of these women did meet and organize the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to the S. B. C. We are so proud of that little band of heroic women and proud of all the thousands of women who have followed in their train and prayed and worked and given in the years since then. I think we can safely say that God has smiled on this organization and blessed it for it has grown marvelously during these years.

The W. M. U. of the Roanoke Association has had its part of this growth and we are proud of that. While we are conscious of our shortcomings, mistakes, and weaknesses, yet some progress has been made and we thank God for it and testify that we have found real joy in this service. In the 81 churches of our Association we have 68 missionary societies and 119 junior organizations. We are anxious to increase this number of organizations and I would like to ask each pastor here to help us with this work in his church. In our societies during the year 1947 we gave to the Cooperative Fund \$21,299.13. Add to this the amount given by our young people and we have \$25,174.26. Add to this the amount given through our special offerings and the total for all gifts by the entire W. M. U. is \$41,-

884.00. The membership of our W. M. S. is now 3,234 and if we include our junior organizations our total membership is 5,072. We lay great emphasis on the reading and study of mission books and on our weeks of prayer. In my opinion the climax of the year's work is the Week of Prayer for foreign missions with the Lottie Moon Christmas offering taken at that time. The inspiration and information gained at this time constitute what really might be called a yearly revival in our missionary work.

I have told you that I was proud of our past and proud of our present. Now may I tell how proud I am of the future of our denomination? That is, if we accomplish in the future the daring program as outlined to us by Dr. Rankin. This program has struck a more responsive chord in my heart than anything that we have attempted in many years. I hope you, too, like it. Dr. Rankin tells us that of every dollar given by Southern Baptists only .03½ cents are spent for the foreign mission work. That means that of each dollar we keep .96½ cents within the boundaries of the S. B. C. while only .03½ cents goes for the evangelization of the rest of the world. We have work in 25 foreign countries but in all of these only 619 missionaries at the close of the year 1947 from six million Baptists. These 619 missionaries work in centers or headquarters and we have 119 such centers. Each of these 119 centers needs greatly to be strengthened with both men and material. In many of these countries the need is most urgent that we strengthen and expand right now. They will hear the gospel gladly now but who can tell how long the opportunity will be ours? The iron curtain of a hostile government or the indifference of a people can quickly close open doors. Dr. Rankin is asking that we give, instead of .03½ cents per dollar, that we give ten cents per dollar. Is that asking too much? After spending ninety cents on the work within our boundaries, is it too much to ask that we give ten cents to the rest of the world? Let us see what could be done with that ten cents. Instead of the foreign mission board having 4¾ millions for operations as it had in 1947 it would have ten millions of dollars. Instead of having 619 missionaries in the foreign field we could support 1,750 and give them enough churches, schools, and hospitals to be adequate for their needs instead of handicapping them for the lack of supplies. And our churches would be strengthened and inspired rather than impoverished by this work.

It sounds very practical to me and yet it would take quite a bit of mental adjustment on our parts and a rethinking of missions. We would have to think of missions as an integral part of our program—not as something we did with our surplus money after all the needs at home were met. We would have to think of missions as of vital concern to each church member—not just for the women and children. We would have to think of the churches as called of God to minister to the whole world—not merely to its own locality. Our field is the world and how urgent is the call of that field at this time! Dr. Rankin says that for us to stand still would be to betray our Lord; to retreat would be to crucify Him. Shall we not advance?

The Tarboro Baptist Church Youth Choir, under the direction of Miss Esther Hollowell, Educational Director of the Tarboro Church, sang, "Saviour, Blessed Saviour," by Edward A. Mueller

and "Thee, Holy Father, We Adore," by W. Lawrence Curry. Mrs. James Barnette, Tarboro, accompanied at the organ.

C. W. Bazemore, Scotland Neck, Associational Missionary, directed a program presenting his work among the churches. He presented I. Stuart McElroy, District Secretary of the American Bible Society, who brought greetings from the Society and urged the use of the services and courtesies offered by the Society.

G. W. Bullard, former Roanoke Missionary, now Superintendent of Associational Missions for the State Convention, was presented and spoke of his work on a State-wide basis.

J. Thad Ashley, Williamston, Associate Missionary, was presented and spoke briefly on his observations and work in the association.

Mr. Bazemore concluded the presentation by delivering a challenging message on "Blazing the Trail."

The closing address was given by Paul B. Nickens, Plymouth.

J. W. Kincheloe, Rocky Mount, offered the closing prayer.

(Note: 525 messengers and visitors were present during the first day.)

WEDNESDAY MORNING

"Christ Is the Answer in Our State"

On Wednesday morning the opening session was called to order by the Moderator at 9:45 in the Arlington Street Baptist Church, Rocky Mount.

Stewart B. Simms, Williamston, led the congregation in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," accompanied at the organ by Mrs. James Harper, Rocky Mount.

The devotional was conducted by W. D. Morris, Scotland Neck. He read the 13th chapter of First Corinthians and led in prayer.

W. K. McGee, Baptist Hospital, Winston-Salem, delivered an address on "The Christian Mission of Medicine." He brought greetings from the Hospital Staff, gave a report on the work being done there, and urged that our offerings be enlarged to help in the work of the hospital.

Claude F. Gaddy, Raleigh, addressed the body on "Take What You Want and Pay for It." Mr. Gaddy spoke on temperance and the advantages of education.

Visitors were recognized and welcomed by the Moderator.

Mr. Simms led the body in singing "I Love to Tell the Story."

This marked the termination of Mrs. Coley as the Y. W. A. leader, and she left the message, which follows, with us:

Our children need companionship, guidance, security, understanding, instruction, recreation, confidence and affection, but more than all of these they need Jesus Christ and the stabilizing influence of His church. As they grow into Y. W. A.'s, the needs multiply. They face many problems—the completion of education, choice of vocation, selection of life companion, investment of time and energy as to their place in the church or out of the church. These young people stand ready to say, "Use us or lose us." With 79 churches we report only 24 Y. W. A.'s. The purpose of the church as Jesus taught was to meet human needs. I ask you, are we meeting these needs? If not, why not? A war just over, congested living conditions, loss of confidence, breakdown of homes. Ask any pastor his chief church problem and invariably it is "leadership." So the basis of my call—my last call since we are having a new slate of officers—is a call for more leaders.

Over and over we hear at meetings such as this that we have too many meetings. I've made that statement but since really trying to analyze the situation, I'm sure the real reason instead is "too few leaders." As I have tried to get Y. W. A.'s organized, I have heard again and again, "We have no one to be counsellor." In our Leadership Conference at Wilson some women said, "I only have one night each week at home because of responsibilities in B. T. U., W. M. U., S. S. and Choir, etc." The majority of us here are loaded to the point where we realize we aren't doing any one job well. Now what can we do about it? Usually people do not seek places of usefulness in church. They have to be sought, interested and encouraged. We must show the importance and satisfaction that comes from the Lord's work. Any responsibility accepted for Christ's sake always brings compensations.

Recently we studied Dr. Dobbins' book on "Meeting the Needs of Adults." It meant much to me and really makes one think. Here are a few excuses given by inactive Christians:

1. Too much else to do.

Are we spending our time with less important things or are we really loaded with church work? When we became Christians we committed ourselves to seek first the kingdom of God.

2. Outgrown interest in such things.

Maybe we are adults but we must seek to understand young people. I heard a mother say Sunday that over and over her daughter says, "Mother, you just don't understand." We learn their ways and sympathize more when we work with them.

3. Haven't the ability—others can do so much better.

To be sure our talents are different. Maybe we only have one talent but was not the one talent man rebuked for hiding it? "I can't do everything, but I can do something. What I can do, by the grace of God I will do." We discuss business, politics, and current issues, so it's just an excuse to say we don't have the ability to discuss religious matters. Dr. Dobbins says if we would take a survey of active and inactive, there would be no striking difference in intelligence, ability or sacrificial spirit. Intelligence is not only what one has learned and stored in memory, rather ability to learn. John Dewey said, "Acting with an aim is all one with acting intelligently." To have a mind to do a thing is to foresee a future possibility. It is to have a plan for its accomplishment. It takes time, study, prayer and work, but Jesus didn't make it easy. He challenged disciples to take up cross and follow Him. Peter is an example of Christian growth. From simple life of a fisherman to eloquent preacher at Pentacost and writer of two epistles. His last written words were "to grow in grace and in knowledge of our Lord and Savior." Small percentage of our membership take care of financial support of the church. We should realize our responsibility.

1. I'd rather relax and listen:

Said Dr. Dobbins, "Watch a S. S. class or W. M. U. meeting dismissed and see who listens. Watch two women on the telephone and see how each is trying to talk. Let us remember whatever the past, there is always the rest of life. We're in the business of winning the lost for Christ. How? By showing what Christ has done for us."

A doctor came and settled in a strange city. His practice didn't build up at first because he was not well known. One day he saw a poor blind man and asked him to allow him to operate on his eyes. Soon the man was made to see but told the doctor he had no money to pay for the operation. Said the doctor, "I don't charge anything. What I want is for you to tell who caused you to see." Soon he had more calls than he could make. If we tell the simple story of Christ's love and what He has done for us, showing by our everyday living that His will is first, multitudes will come in to our churches and we'll win a lost world. Jesus said, "Ye must be my witnesses."

It was a pleasure to have Miss Ruth Provence with us. She gave us a splendid address on "For Ye Serve the Lord Christ." Miss Provence stressed the following:

1. That this, our anniversary year, is not a year of celebration but of commemoration for those women sixty years ago, who began this work and for the great leaders down through the years.

2. The work is not ours alone but linked with a Christ in it. No matter how small a church is it can expand and expand.

3. There are goals set and we must help to reach them in our individual communities.

4. We must remember to foster our young people. Not only to foster but give ourselves as counsellors, leaders, etc.

5. Observe family worship.

6. We must give of our money. "America must be Christian" not only for what it means to us, but for what it can do for others. Because of our gratitude and love for what Christ has done for us we should want to extend it to those who do not know Him.

Mrs. A. S. Roberson, Jr., favored us with a solo, "I Walked Where Jesus Walked."

Miss Pearl Todd talked to us on "Serving the Lord Christ in China." With such a wonderful description of the part in the northeastern section of China where she was, it was quite easy for each of us to imagine we were right there with her. Miss Todd especially emphasized:

1. The make-up of our five stations there. The organization is similar to our work here: a station is as our Association and the five stations together are like our Convention.

2. The girls' school there and how they work in harmony through the church program. Only two girls have gone out from the school unsaved and that is a record that we should be proud of, and glad to have had a part.

3. Life in general there along with the many things that they had helped to do away with since our stations had been there. There are only a very few binding feet now in comparison to the number who did only a few years ago.

Rev. L. D. Holt of the Bethel Church talked to us on "Serving the Lord Christ through Witnessing." Mr. Holt impressed us with the idea that we should be glad that we are Christians and to have had a part in this great work we've been hearing about. At the close of Mr. Holt's message he asked God's blessing on us as we adjourned for our lunch hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was begun with the singing of the hymn "Near the Cross."

Mrs. Carl Lee Ousley presented our devotional, using for her scripture, Phillipians 2:1-11. She brought out that the first church established by Paul at Phillipi. It was during his experience in jail that he thought of this first church and wrote a letter, this being the most intimate and personal of all his letters. It was really a love letter from one person to another, telling what to do and how to live.

At this time Mrs. W. T. Ward rendered a solo, "O, Master, Let Me Walk with Thee."

An announcement was made by Miss Provence concerning the American Bible Association. This work was disrupted during the war due to paper shortage and other materials. Now they have the paper and means to print, but need money. There are calls for Bibles around the world. There is a campaign on to get individual memberships to aid in this. We were urged to coop-

erate with this program in order that we might get the word to those desiring it before it was too late. This is the opportune time, and we should not delay, Miss Provence said.

Mrs. N. C. Brooks, retiring chairman of Stewardship, brought us the following message:

“For five years, from time to time, I’ve stood before you trying in my feeble way to emphasize and re-emphasize our Stewardship to God. Whether my attempts have borne fruit in other lives, He alone knows, but most certainly there has come in my own heart and life a deepened consciousness of the meaning of stewardship.

“We have stressed the fact in our conferences often as we have spoken of tithes and offerings, our gifts of money. That while these are quite important they are not all by far. Stewardship goes much farther and centers in the very heart of our being. Quoting from Dr. Truett: ‘Money in the Kingdom of God is not the supreme thing at all. Christ’s cause is to be put first by Christians, not off in a corner and treated as some little step-child unloved and in the way.’ The religion of Christ is not simply a showy business for Sunday.

“When we begin to fully realize these truths we may feel about our tithing like the little Mexican boy that Dr. Everette Gill tells about—‘He was saving his pesos to buy an artificial leg, but he refused to quit tithing because he said that ‘I’d rather go on crutches than see my church on crutches.’”

“Shall we ask ourselves: ‘How crippled is my church? How crippled is the work of God’s Kingdom because of my failure to be a good steward?’

“Let us remember that a Christian is:

“‘A mind, through which Christ thinks; a heart, through which Christ loves; a voice, through which Christ speaks, and a hand, through which Christ helps.’”

THE CONSTITUTION

1. The Association shall be composed of the pastors and of the members, not exceeding three from any church, chosen by the churches, who shall produce letters certifying their appointments. Members thus chosen and convened together with the pastors shall be denominated "The Roanoke Baptist Association," which shall have no power over the churches, nor shall it infringe on any of the rights.

2. The letters from the churches shall contain the number then in fellowship, and of those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded or died since last Association.

3. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director (who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present to assume their duties at the close of the annual session in which elected and serve until the close of the next annual session) and the Associational Superintendent of the Woman's Missionary Union.

4. Other churches, upon petition by letters and by delegates, and after a satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, may be admitted to the body by unanimous vote, when the Moderator shall give the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

5. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion of the Association, whether it may be debated or not.

6. The Association shall furnish the churches with copies of its minutes.

7. The minutes of the Association shall be read and approved and shall be signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association adjourns.

8. Any church not representing itself in this body three successive sessions by letter or by delegates, shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless reasons are assigned.

9. The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church which shall be found disorderly in faith and practice.

10. Visiting brothers from sister churches, or similar bodies, may be invited to participate in our deliberations.

11. At each session of the Association, delegates to the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention shall be chosen by vote.

12. This Constitution is subject to alteration by a majority vote of the delegates at any session.

13. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

14. The Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator.

Rules of Decorum

Believing it best to be governed by certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of the Association, we adopt the following:

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator.
3. The person speaking shall adhere strictly to the subject, and in no way reflect on any other brother.
4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted unless he violate some rule of decorum.
5. No brother shall absent himself from the Association without obtaining permission from the body.
6. The names of the delegates shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
7. The Moderator may give his ideas on any subject before putting it to a vote, but is entitled to vote only in case of a tie.
8. The order of business shall be made at the beginning of each session, and shall be changed only by a vote of the body.

Tuesday Morning

On Tuesday morning, October 11th, 1949, the 42nd session of the Roanoke Baptist Association was called to order in the First Baptist Church of Rocky Mount by the Moderator, John T. Coley.

The song service during the day was directed by Stewart B. Simms, Memorial Baptist Church, Williamston, assisted at the organ by Leonard E. Harris of the host church.

The opening hymns were, "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name" and "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus."

The morning devotional was conducted by W. C. Lamb, Associate Pastor of the host church. Mr. Lamb read some verses of scripture from the 3rd and 4th chapters of 1 Corinthians and led in prayer.

The address of welcome was given by E. F. Duke, Mayor of Rocky Mount, and H. C. Lowder, pastor of the Arlington Street Church, Rocky Mount, responded.

C. W. Bazemore, Associational Missionary, introduced

the following new pastors and denominational worker: J. E. Lanier, Stantonsburg; W. H. Hollowell, Ayden; T. W. McNeely, Pinetops; W. M. Caswell, Bethel; Leonard Earl Harris, Minister of Music, First Baptist Church, Rocky Mount.

The report was unanimously adopted.

A hymn, "Draw Me Nearer," was sung by the congregation led by Mr. Simms.

Dr. I. G. Greer, Executive Vice President of the Business Foundation of North Carolina, presented an address on "Temperance."

Dr. Greer suggested at least two ways in which some people were deluded. 1. "To legalize liquor will put the bootlegger out of business." He said, "It is not wise or natural to get out into the rain to keep from getting wet." 2. All young people of today are drinking. This was stated as being untrue. He held in his hand the picture of 32 All American athletes, beginning with Charlie Justice, each having made a statement that he did not drink strong drinks. They all conceded that they would not be All American if they did.

In answering the question, "Why Should Church People Oppose The Legalization Of Strong Drink?", Dr. Greer stated, 1. Church people should not dignify strong drink because it is evil. 2. The Bible sounds warnings against strong drink placing drunkenness alongside adultery, lying, theft, etc. He stated further that no person should belong to an organization who will not uphold the teachings and principles of that

organization. 3. The liquor traffic thrives and grows at the expense of one's fellowman. 4. We ought to prohibit its sale and use for the sake of our young people.

The pastor of the host church again welcomed the body and made announcements concerning entertainment for the noon and evening hours.

The following motion was made by E. Evans Ulrich, Wilson.

Motion

That the Executive Committee be composed of not less than 17 persons—not less than 8 of which shall be pastors of churches in the Association and the pastors shall be apportioned one from each of the seven counties and one at large.

E. Evans Ulrich

The motion received a second and discussion followed.

An amendment that the pastor of the Scotland Neck Church be named on the Executive Committee for 1 year was offered. After some discussion in clarifying the amendment it was unanimously adopted. The clarification included that the pastor of the Scotland Neck Church may be re-elected to that office on the Executive Committee at the discretion of the body but to tenure of one year at the time.

The original motion was re-stated and the vote taken. There was a slight opposition but the moderator ruled that the proponents were in majority and the motion was adopted.

The congregation was led in singing, "Holy Ghost, With Light Divine."

In preparation for the sermon Mr. Simms sang, "Seal Us, O Holy Spirit."

The annual sermon was delivered by W. B. Harrington, Williamston.

Sermon Note

Using Acts 1:8 as a text Mr. Harrington delivered an able sermon on the power of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles on the day of Pentecost and our great need of the same power today.

The session was adjourned with a prayer offered by Gordon Price, Roanoke Rapids.

Afternoon Session

"Faithful In Our Association"

The hymns used in opening the afternoon session were, "He Leadeth Me," and "Near The Cross."

The devotional period was conducted by J. E. Lanier, Stantonsburg. He read some verses from the 12th and 16th chapters of Luke and some from the 4th chapter of first Corinthians, and led in prayer.

N. L. Blythe, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, was recognized for his report. He presented Paul B. Nickens, Plymouth, Superintendent of Evangelism, and E. G. Cole, Winterville, Superintendent of Vacation Bible Schools, who made reports on their work. Mr. Blythe then made the following report.

Sunday School Division Report

1949 has seen a great growth in our Sunday Schools in the Roanoke. Southern Baptists set a goal of 600,000 new members in the Sunday Schools of the Southern Baptist convention. North Carolina endeavored to enroll 70,000 new pupils. Joining hands with our Southern and State workers, here in the Roanoke our goal was 4,000, almost a 24 per cent increase. It is hoped that our growth has reached the challenging goal.

During the year we have had two Associational wide Sunday School Mass meetings: at Tarboro Baptist Church, 5 November 1948, and 25 March, 1949. The attendance at each was good. Our Fall meeting will be held at Tarboro Baptist Church, 4 November, 1949, 7:30 p. m.

During the last week in October 1948, we had our program of church planning meetings. We had teams to go into 59 churches. Many new classes and departments were planned and many have come into reality. This year I hope we can do even better in our planning meetings.

The financial expenses of the Associational Sunday School work is supported by free will offerings made at the Mass meetings. A complete statement of finances is attached to this report.

The Evangelistic and Vacation Bible School reports will be made by Bro. Paul Nickens, Ludford Memorial and Bro. E. G. Cole, Winterville, superintendents of each respectively and added to this report.

1950 offers a big challenge. Our Sunday School enrollment in our churches as of October last will approach 20,000. This year, the same as last year, we want to add 4000 new members to our

enrollment in our Sunday schools in the Roanoke.

The theme this year, "Take Your Family to Sunday School," is excellent. We need more complete families in our Sunday School. Let this be stressed at every opportunity by each pastor, Sunday School Superintendent and Sunday School worker. To enroll 4000 new members in the Sunday Schools of our Association, a 20 per cent increase in all Sunday Schools must be effected.

The following goals of Sunday School growth are suggested for the Associational year 1950:

1. A Vacation Bible School held and reported in 1950.
2. A monthly offering to the Orphanage from every Sunday School or church.
3. Better Bible teaching in our Sunday Schools.
4. A higher average attendance each Sunday in our church schools.
5. Enroll 4,000 new Sunday School pupils during 1950.
3. One or more revivals in all our churches this Associational year.
7. A census and survey in every church.
8. A systematic visitation program in every Sunday School.
9. A stronger emphasis on preaching attendance in our Sunday Schools.
10. Winning the Lost to faith in Jesus in our Sunday Schools.

Vacation Bible School Report

Lack of information prohibits a complete report at this time on Vacation Bible School work in the Association. However, sufficient data is in hand to indicate that a record has been set this year in the number of schools, the number of pupils enrolled, and no doubt in other phases of the work.

During May, under the leadership of our Associational Missionary, Rev. C. W. Bazemore, clinics were held for Vacation Bible School workers at Rocky Mount and Greenville. These were well attended, particularly the one at Rocky Mount. Plans were made to promote schools in as many churches as could be enlisted, with particular emphasis upon those churches which had not had schools before. Ideas were exchanged, aims were outlined and goals were fixed. And apparently we have gone a long way toward attaining the goals set.

In 1947 a total of 48 Vacation Bible Schools with an enrollment of 4988 were reported in the Association. Last year 52 schools were reported with a total enrollment of 5527. So far this year 57 schools have been reported, and we feel sure that not all reports are in. A number of churches this year had Bible Schools for the first time. Indications are that in total enrollment and attendance, and perhaps in gifts to missions, as well as in the number of professions of faith, this year's records will far surpass those of any previous year. From the scant data available on few more than half the schools reported we can count 65 professions of faith, with as many boys and girls joining the various churches. That in itself is a magnificent factor.

Another noticeable feature about Vacation Bible School work this year is the fact that five Negro schools have been reported. These, no doubt, were sponsored in some way by leaders in white churches. They have set a worthy example for others to follow. There is an open field for real missionary work in many communities. The opportunity to sponsor Vacation Bible Schools among our Negro Baptist Churches presents itself to many churches. Why not take advantage of it?

The time is at hand for churches over our Association to plan their work for the year just beginning. Don't fail to include a Vacation Bible School in your plans for 1950.

Edward G. Cole, Supt. V. B. S.

In the absence of the Associational Training Union Director, C. A. Francis, Nashville, the clerk presented and read his written report.

Training Union Report

Slight gains have been made in the Associational Training Union work during the past year. Out of our 83 churches we have

a total of 43 Training Unions, which shows an increase of seven over last year. However, there are forty churches without Training Unions at all or any organization comparable thereto.

Reports from the various Unions have come in very irregular during the past year, which makes it rather difficult to give a total picture of the work. About nine of the 43 Unions have all departments with one (New Hope) rating A-1. Four of our Unions have shown remarkable increase in attendance. The Junior Unions show the greatest increase and greatest strength, while the weakness rests with the Young People Unions and Story Hour. It has not been as easy procedure to teach adults the need of further training in such a manner in the local churches, but some new organizations have been entered during the past year.

Two officers' council meetings were held during the year. The first met prior to the Training Union Conference in the First Baptist Church, Tarboro, in December, to consider the scope of the year's work. The second met in the Rosemary Baptist Church, Roanoke Rapids in March, prior to the Training Union Rally. Both were supper meetings.

Two mass meetings were held during the Associational year. The organizational and inspirational meeting was held on December 10, 1948, in the First Baptist Church, Tarboro. At this meeting aims and recommendations were set forth by the Director, followed by an open discussion on the problems in our local churches and the needs of youth in our churches. The inspirational address was given by Dr. Clyde Parker, professor of sociology, Meredith College. About one hundred and eighty-three persons were present for the meeting but with very few pastors in attendance.

The Training Union Rally was held in the Rosemary Baptist Church, Roanoke Rapids, March 18, 1949. The purpose of this meeting was to hear the contestants in the various tournaments and to seek eliminations for the regional meeting to be held in Wilson at a later date. In the Junior Memory work the judges selected Peggy Blanford and Carol Strange as the winners, of Rocky Mount. In the Intermediate Sword Drill the judges selected John Bush of Roanoke Rapids (Rosemary Church) as the winner. Joe Congleton, the only contestant in the Better Speakers Contest, was automatically made the contestant to enter the regional contest. Mrs. C. A. King of the Five Points Church, Wilson, was selected as the winner in the Adult Bible reading. At the close of the meeting a religious film was shown on "Simon Peter."

We have deposited to our credit \$26.83 in the People's Bank and Trust Co., Nashville. Our only expense has been postage, cost of secretarial help, and a religious film. This amount by no means allows a Director to travel about for the purpose of organizing new Unions, working with newly organized ones, and serve wherever needed. Nor does it make any allowance for any work

beyond the two yearly meetings. Consequently, A Training Union Director is elected to work but little to work with.

Our churches of the Association are becoming more conscious each year as to how little is actually being done by way of a youth program and by way of training youth to be creative leaders for tomorrow. We know that untrained church members can always remain as possibilities, whereas trained members become actual instruments in the Christian life. No young Christian can be truly loyal who neglects the training of mind, spirit and body for the service of the Master through the church for which he gives himself. This does not mean that our churches will serve as filling stations for boys and girls, but rather that channels will be opened by which and through which they may realize the highest and holiest privilege of life.

Mrs. Leland Kitchin, Scotland Neck, Associational President of the Woman's Missionary Union, presented the Woman's Missionary Union report.

Woman's Missionary Union Report

When I learned a few days ago that I was to have 15 minutes on this program I thought, "That is probably the most important 15 minutes I will have during the whole year and I do not wish to waste one second of it. For I will have the privilege of speaking to the pastors and leading laymen of the Association and as far as I am able I am going to try to make them see our W. M. U. Work."

Therefore I will give very few statistics—only to say that in our 80 churches we have 74 missionary societies and with our G. A.'s, R. A.'s, Sunbeams and Y. W. A.'s, a total of 257 organizations. All of these organizations with a membership of 5,697 gave to the Cooperative Program and special offerings in 1948 the sum of \$48,900. The officers and county leaders are enthusiastic and faithful and for the most part I consider our W. M. U. in a healthy growing condition, but there are some weak places as I will try to show you and for these I am anxious to gain your help and support.

We have certain fundamentals which are the very basis of our work and one of them is to teach and train our young people in the missionary message of the Bible and the missionary work of our denomination. Miss Provences tells the story of a friend of hers who while traveling in Rome met a young Italian, who had left the Catholic church and became a Baptist through the influence of a young American soldier that she had once had in her

Sunbeam band and R. A. Chapter in S. C. She had sowed seed in S. C. and found the fruit in Rome. Italy. And so it is with all who work with young people. They sow a seed and know not when or where that seed will bear fruit. Please help us to find leaders that we may train more of our boys and girls in the Master's work.

Still another fundamental is to teach the principle of stewardship. We are so happy that there is a great movement on by the Southern Baptist Convention to bring all of its membership to accept the principle—The slogan, "Every Baptist a Tither," is not just a catchy phrase but a deep felt need for each individual and for the work of the denomination. The denomination needs it especially now as it is getting into high gear to throw all of its strength behind Dr. Rankin's Advance Program. A year or two ago when this program was first mentioned some people thought it an impractical dream but more and more Baptists are seeing now the tragic need of the world for Jesus in connection with our ability to send messengers to supply this need. The leaders of the Southern Baptist Convention have made comprehensive plans to carry us forward to reach a ten million dollar budget next year. These plans include the teaching of the Stewardship book, "God's Hurry," by Dr. Duke McCall and the taking of a special offering for the Cooperative Program in June 1950. It is this offering added to our regular gift to Cooperative Program that is the hope of our reaching the ten million dollar budget. The plans are made and well made, but they depend on the pastors and laymen to work the plan.

Our offerings are also a fundamental of our work and we take one each quarter. The W. M. U. is auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention and all money collected goes into the regular channels of the denomination except that in N. C. we keep the Heck-Jones offering to use where it seems to us the need is the greatest. For example, the State W. M. U. has just given \$1,500 of the Heck-Jones offering to finish the building of a church for the Cherokee Indians. I saw this church building and need for the additional money and how thankful I was that we had this offering and so glad that I personally had been allowed to see how our offerings are translated from dollars and cents to the work of the Kingdom of God. And how I wish that all Baptists could see that. That beyond these gifts of cold cash, often given most casually, are the life blood and warm heartbeats, the fire and zeal to serve of our missionaries. Men who are giving of their manhood and strength with no thought of self and who are dependent on our gifts for support. To fail them is to fail ourselves and our Lord. I heard Dr. Nordenhang, editor of *The Commission*, say that in the last judgment it would be sad to have to admit to our Lord that we knew of the need of the world for the gospel in our day

and were too poor to help, but that it would be inexpressibly sadder to have to admit that we knew of the need, that we were not poor, and yet did nothing to help.

Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful."

The report was unanimously adopted.

At the invitation of the moderator several messengers gave brief, interesting reports on the work in their churches.

Rev. Sasser, former pastor of the Arlington Street Church, Rocky Mount, was recognized. He introduced Dr. Marvin Revell, Chowan College, who made a brief report on opening of the college and its present activities.

The following motion was presented by C. E. Baucom, Wilson.

Motion

Motion: That this association instruct its Executive Committee to hear suggested needs for associational work in our Sunday School, Training Union and W. M. U. from our elected leaders respectively in these organizations, and that this committee set up an annual budget in light of these needs including these organizations in our over all financial program as an integral part of our associational program of work.

Due to the lack of time, and the importance of the motion, it was postponed until the last item of business in the afternoon.

A male quartet from the Red Oak Church rendered a number, "The Old Road Which Leads Home To God." Mrs. T. J. Faulkner, organist of the Red Oak Church, accompanied them at the piano.

C. W. Bazemore, Associational Missionary, delivered an address on the subject, "Take A Look At Yourself."

Let's Look at Ourselves

One day Jesus asked his disciples, "Have ye eyes, and see not?" And again, we recall how our Lord in Matthew 13:16, said, "Blessed are your eyes, for they see . . ." We need vision, to see our great size, our vast strength, our opportunities, our obligations as Christian people to do the work of our Master in this great Association. In the Roanoke area, God has encompassed us about with fertile farm lands, equable climate, good homes, splendid schools, churches, thriving towns, villages, cities, friendly Ameri-

can-born people as neighbors and co-workers, and a way of life second to none on earth. We have material blessings untold. What we lack so often, is the driving will and abiding purpose to do the will of God in all our lives. We must as faithful Baptist people, win more and more people to our Lord, through our churches and our expanding program of work.

Let us ask and try to answer three questions:

1. What have we done for our Lord, in the Roanoke? Forty-one years ago, we had 49 churches, with about 4,600 members. We have come a long way since then. Now in the past five years, up to the present, (October 1949) we have in our Baptist churches, baptized 6,333 persons into our membership. We have given a total of over \$600,000.00 to missions and benevolences, in the past five years. We have in our churches, given more than \$2,675,000 to all causes, local and outside, in the last 5 years. Sunday Schools, Training Unions, church attendance, membership, missionary organizations, and other phases of all our work, has had a steady upward climb. We are growing.

2. How do we stand at present? We have eighty churches, with about 23,000 members. We have 78 Sunday Schools, with about 19,500 members. We have 73 churches with W. M. U. work organized; and forty-one Training Unions. Our churches and Sunday Schools are holding from 55 to 60 Vacation Bible Schools a year, each summer, enrolling over 6,000 children. Let us remember, that virtually one-tenth of all the people living in North Carolina, live in the counties and area of the Roanoke Association, and we have one-tenth of all the mission field in the entire State. Over one-half of all the 350,000 or more people living in our vast Association, are unchurched. Our fields are "white unto the harvest."

3. What will we do, in the next five years? May we suggest certain goals, set low, conservative and attainable, for we could do even better:

IF each year for the next five years, we can, average twelve additions a year, for every church; average 2 new churches organized each year; and organize 2 new Sunday Schools a year; and 2 new Training Unions a year; — and then, each Sunday School gain 10 percent enrollment each year; and if each church shows a ten percent gain in offerings to all causes each year, then let us see what we will have, at end of 5 years: We will have 27,000 church members; we will have 32,000 Sunday School members; we will have ninety churches, ninety Sunday Schools, and fifty Training Unions; and we will be giving a total of \$960,000.00 a year to all causes, in all our churches.

Your missionary would again point out this fact: we have the people. They are here, living in our midst. They need the Gospel. They need the blessings of Sunday School and church

membership and fellowship. Multitudes are lost without the Saviour. We have the preachers — a body of the finest and truest Pastors to be found anywhere. We have the churches; as we fill them up we can add on and build larger ones. We have the Gospel; and we have our Master's marching orders, to preach, to teach, to reach out, to witness and to win. It is our move, to-day, tomorrow, and on and on in these bright days ahead so full of opportunity. Our Lord Himself has given us clear orders. He has set the task, and He will give the strength. Let us make the coming year the finest year in our Baptist history in this Association.

Condensed Report of Associational Missionary

From October 1948, to October 1949, has been a busy year. Much of the work of an Associational Missionary can hardly be reduced to statistics; however we submit below, a brief statement of some of the activities of your missionary during the past Associational year:

Preaching in regular worship services in the church, 76 services. Taught eleven Study Courses (Sunday School; W. M. U.; Training Union, etc.) Special Programs, addresses; S. S., and W. M. U. groups, B. T. U., etc. 14 times. Additions to churches, new members, in worship and revival services, 63. Calls made in homes, 216. Visits to sick, hospital calls, etc. Conferences with individuals, about phases of Baptist work, etc., 389. Conferences with groups, 106. Special committee conferences, 49. Dedication services attended and participating in, 6. Deacons' Ordination service, five. Enlargement campaigns, 1. Radio broadcasts. Assisted in funerals. Revival meetings conducted, and assisting in, six.

Surveys made for proposed new mission points, new Sunday Schools, 7. Special prayer meetings conducted, 10. Church business conferences, 12. Assisted in organization of 3 new Mission points and new Sunday Schools. Presented 21 special Visual Programs (on screen), on Missions, and specially arranged programs in the churches, W. M. U. groups, etc. Spoke to W. M. U. and Y. W. A. groups, county and local meetings, etc. 12 times.

Traveled 13,109 miles in the work. Arranged for and promoted Vacation Bible School Workers Conferences. Assisted in Vacation Bible Schools. Distributed materials, supplies, advertising for Schools, in every county of Association. Attended Pastors' Conferences; State Convention; State meetings. Taught adults one week at Seaside Assembly, N. C. Training Union Assembly. Prepared and issued 1949 Calendar of Activities, to all churches. Prepared and issued Roanoke Baptist NEWS, periodically through the year. Personally distributed, and by mail, over 5,500 Gospel tracts, portions, and evangelistic literature; and mail-

ed out approximately 3200 letters, parcels and pieces of Baptist literature and correspondents, promoting the work.

Helped churches in locating pastors. Made visits to institutions. Did personal work among unsaved persons. Worked in cooperation with State, Home and Foreign Mission boards, in promotion of all Missionary causes among our churches and Baptist people. Taught Sunday School classes. Promoted every phase of our Baptist work over the Association.

It has been a good year. Our Pastors and our people have worked together in a wonderful way. Our Sunday School superintendents, officers and teachers, have been co-operative and faithful. All our W. M. U. leaders, and groups, have made progress. Now W. M. U. organizations have been set up in churches that had none. Sunday School advances have been very fine. Bro. Norman Blythe, our Sunday School Associational Superintendent, has done a wonderful job through the year. Vacation Bible Schools have enrolled the greatest number of any year in our history, in the Roanoke. Training Union work has gone forward; and yet we need many new Unions organized. Our Pastors have been evangelistic, and faithful in soul-winning.

Our people throughout the Roanoke, have advanced in the stewardship of giving, to all causes. We believe the number of tithers have increased. Our churches gave much more to Co-operative Program first six months of 1949 than in the same period of time in 1948. This means progress. A number of our churches have had to enlarge their buildings. Others plan new or larger buildings, to take care of increases in Sunday School and church membership. God has blessed the efforts of His people in the Roanoke.

From my heart, let me thank you people in all our churches, for your very fine spirit of co-operation; your gracious way of helping in so many activities, as we all work together as "laborers with God." I am unable at times, to answer every call over so wide an area . . . but as the servant of the Lord I will answer every call for service into every church and place I can possibly go. Let us make the coming year the finest in our history.

W. D. Morris, Scotland Neck, presented a motion that a mission fund to help weaker churches be established to be administered by the Executive Committee in connection with the Missions Committee, every church to be requested to contribute an amount equal to 50c per resident member instead of the present 30 cents per resident member, to compose this fund.

The motion was adopted.

The motion formerly stated by C. E. Baucom was recalled for discussion. After a discussion the motion was adopted as stated.

The afternoon session was brought to a close with a prayer offered by Wistar Hamilton, Washington.

Evening Session

"Faithful In Our State"

In the absence of the moderator, C. E. Baucom, vice moderator, presided over the evening session.

Hymns used in the opening exercises were, "My Hope is Built On Nothing Less Than Jesus' Blood And Righteousness," and "Lord, I hear of Showers Of Blessings," led by Mr. Simms.

Dr. Zeno Wall, Superintendent of the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina, delivered an address, "Our Children." Dr. Wall said that last year was one of the great years for the Orphanage in many ways. He stated that 793 homeless boys and girls were cared for during the year through the work of the Orphanage. He also brought greetings from the staff, made a brief report on repairs and adjustments made during the year, and set forth the following challenge: 1. To pray; have a "glorious refreshing from the presence of the Lord," e.g. a revival; talk about the homeless child. 2. Urged that the monthly offering be continued and that such offering be begun in those churches where it isn't being done—that we make plans early for a great Thanksgiving offering for the support of the Orphanage work. He also suggested that a gift of things to eat and use would be appreciated. He told a story of one man elsewhere who drove his truck around to the homes of the neighbors to gather a full load of good things which he carried to the Orphanage. Dr. Wall said maybe someone in this Association might want something like that.

H. W. Baucom, CROP representative, Durham, was recognized and made a brief report on his work and urged full cooperation with this program in our several localities.

Mr. Simms then led the congregation in singing, "I'm Pressing On The Upward Way."

The choir of the host church, under the direction of Leonard E. Harris, sang, "Holy Redeemer." Mr. Harris then sang,

"Repent Ye," by Scott, accompanied by Mrs. Maggie Mae Jones, Rocky Mount. at the organ.

Earle Bradley, Missionary of the State Convention, delivered an address on, "The Great Commission." He spoke with power and said that unless we are a missionary force we will become a missionary field.

The choir of the host church then rendered the "Cherubim-Song" by Bortnyansky.

The closing prayer was offered by H. C. Lowder, Rocky Mount.

Wednesday Morning

"Faithful In Home And Church"

On Wednesday morning the opening session was called to order by the Moderator in the First Baptist Church, Washington.

The opening hymn was, "Blessed Assurance," led by Mr. Simms.

The devotional period was under the direction of W. H. Hollowell, Ayden. Mr. Hollowell read some verses from the 10th chapter of Hebrews and led in prayer.

Under a panel discussion the following discussions were presented.

1. "Faith in Administration," W. D. Morris, Scotland Neck.

Discussion

Introduction:

Webster says: "That Administration is the management of public affairs."

1. There are several things to do that are essential.
 - a). Make a general survey of the church quietly.
 - b). Familiarize yourself with the present setup.
 - c). Learn the people just as fast as possible, not only by name but by aptitude.

2. "Plan your work, and work your plans."

1. CALL THE CHURCH CABINET TOGETHER AND GO OVER THE WORK GENERALLY.

1. Let each Department head know that you are looking to him or her for real consecrated leadership.

2. Try in this meeting to coordinate the entire church program to the extent that there would be no conflicts in the future.

II NEXT GET YOUR SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNCIL TOGETHER DURING ITS REGULAR MEETING.

"Plan your work, and work your plans."

1. Set up your goals for the entire Sunday School. Make them for at least three months. Seek to maintain a high average attendance for this month. Let the goals be challenging.

2. Break goals down by Departments. Let each Department know what the goal is for that department. Break goals down in the department by classes.

3. Set up a program of weekly supervised visitation. Have a

definite time to visit. Assign the visits to the visitors. Expect them to return to the church and make report on the visits made.

III. GET YOUR TRAINING UNION TOGETHER IN THEIR REGULAR BUSINESS MEETING.

"Plan your work, and work your plans."

1. Plan your programs, set up your goals.
2. See that the Training programs work. If some one is not fulfilling his or her place, then replace that one.

IV. CALL IN THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

1. Let the Minister of Music and the Organist know that they have a real contribution to make to the church.
2. Emphasize the fact that they can't wait until Sunday morning to make the necessary preparation.
3. Cooperation is so essential in this department.
4. Good music is a big part of the worship service.

V. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE IS NEXT

1. This Committee is responsible for the collecting and disbursing all funds received into the church Treasury.
2. Submit proposed budget to the church in conference. The church can accept or reject it.
3. Make plans for every members canvass. Enlist every member into Bible Stewardship.
4. Make report to the Church Monthly in Conference, as to the amount of money received and disbursed.

VI. THE DEACONS COME NEXT.

1. The Deacons stand next to the Pastor.
2. Qualifications are practically the same.
3. Deacons are not a ruling Board of Elders.
4. The Deacons are to advise and help where help is needed.
5. The Deacons are the Pastors' Assistants.
6. If a Deacon proved unfaithful to his high calling then he should be replaced wisely.

2. "Faithful in Teaching," Carl Lee Ousley, Tarboro.

3. "Faithful in Preaching," Claude F. Gaddy, Raleigh.

A motion was unanimously adopted to request Mr. Gaddy to submit copies of his address to the Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children.

An address, "Read if you would Lead," was presented by E. Evans Ulrich, Five Points Church, Wilson.

Five minute messages were given on the following subjects:

1. "American Bible Society" E. G. Cole, Winterville, R. E. Hardaway, Memorial Church, Greenville and others.

2. "Library," Miss Mary Gay, Raleigh.
3. "Baptist Student Union," Miss Gloria Blanton, E. C. T. C., Greenville.
4. "Music." Leonard Earl Harris, Rocky Mount. Mr. Harris began his discussion with a solo, "The 23rd Psalm," by Malot and ended it by leading the congregation in singing, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing."

Dr. S. L. Stealey, Professor of Church History, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky., presented an address on, "Faithful in Personal and Homelife." Dr. Stealey emphatically said that each must answer two important questions: 1. With whom and what is our life tied up? and 2. Is it bigger or smaller than Jesus?

B. D. Bunn, president of Chowan College, was introduced.

E. W. Holmes, Farmville, offered the closing prayer.

Afternoon Session

"Faithful To The World"

Leonard E. Harris, Rocky Mount, led the congregation in singing, "There's a Land That Is Fairer Than Day," "What A Friend We Have In Jesus," and "The Old Time Religion."

The devotional period was conducted by W. M. Cassell, Bethel. He read some verses from the 4th chapter of Ephesians and led in prayer.

Dr. Phil L. Elliott, president of Gardner-Webb College, presented an address, "Christ in our Schools." He stated prevalent conditions facing all colleges, especially denominational colleges, and offered a possible solution to the problem by challenging Baptists to increase their contributions to our colleges from 4 to 10 times in order to compete with what the government is preparing to do.

The choir of the host church sang, "This Is God's Love," by O'Hara, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Joe Whitfield.

The closing address on "World Conditions" was presented by Arthur S. Gillespie, Raleigh.

Mr. Gillespie began by saying, "If anyone pays too much attention to all he hears over the radio and sees in the newspaper he will go crazy." He stated that a lot of people could diagnose the sickness plaguing the world but often these people spend so much time diagnosing that they do not give the remedy for its cure. The condition is evident. The world wants a remedy. Christians have that remedy.

1. World conditions:
 - a. This is a troubled world.
 - b. This is a world of challenging opportunities.
2. This business of world missions will ultimately be successful.
3. Jesus Christ announced a program for his own file — liberating people who were shaskled with chain clanging slavery.
4. Jesus indicated the task ahead. "As my Father hath sent me even so send I you." That is still our mission, not in detail but in general, throughout the world.

Whereas the liquor evil continues to be one of the major evils

in our entire Association, be it therefore resolved that every church do all within its power to enlighten the people and especially the youth of the Association concerning the dangers that lie in intoxicating beverages, and that we do all within our power to rid our State and Southland of this menace.

Whereas all the messages which we have heard have challenged us to deeper consecration and greater deeds of service may we return to our several churches determined that in the coming year we shall more effectively and efficiently serve Him who is our Lord and Saviour, even Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

I want to ask that every society appoint one of its best and most efficient women as stewardship chairman. I am sure that every stewardship chairman will feel her responsibility and take the initiative. In other words the chairman will start doing things.

You will find listed on page 6 in your 1949 Supplement to your guide book, suggestions to help you. Get one and study it.

We have accepted a 10 per cent increase in our goals this year. The goal that we are most interested in is a 10 per cent increase in tithers. I believe we'll have no trouble in reaching it if we as stewardship chairmen do our part.

We must plan year-round stewardship activities including:

a. A stewardship class in every W. M. S., followed by intensive emphasis on personal commitment as tithers, with the use of W. M. S. Covenant Cards.

b. Tithing testimonies in circle meetings or general meetings.

c. A presentation to the society of the actual division and disbursements of gifts received by the local church during the past year.

d. Through individual contacts, enlist every resident woman

in giving to missions.

- e. Concrete study of the outreach of the Cooperative Program and of the four special offerings.
- f. Cooperation in Every Member Canvass of the Church.

Let us:

- 1. Keep accurate record of tithers in W. M. S. and Young People's organizations.
- 2. Check your church roll. Give names of non-tithers to circle chairman and let her ask members to enlist them.
- 3. Plan with mission study chairman to have a stewardship book taught in W. M. S. and Junior organizations.
- 4. Have circle stewardship chairman report number of tithers at end of each quarter.

Southern Baptists stand second from the bottom on a list of 21 evangelical denominations in benevolent giving or giving to missions. Let us this year try to remove a part of that odium by making 1949 a year in Stewardship Progress.

Of the 71 Woman's Missionary Societies only 39 reported. Of the 3120 members only 725 are tithers. There were 10 stewardship classes and 8 societies reported promoting stewardship emphasis week; Of the 125 Young People's Organizations 70 reported with 224 tithers, 30 stewardship classes. Do these figures fully represent our work? Was everything reported? Please check and report.

Miss Hilda Mayo talked to us on "The Urgency Of Making Him Known." She emphasized the brevity of time one faces today; one knows not how brief the time might be. In the urging of the task ahead of us, let us give ourselves, our tithes, and our time. Teach the young people for there truly is where our hope lies. Into our churches and even further back into our home.

At this time Mrs. Howard Barnes made the luncheon announcement. After a special "How Beautiful Upon the Mountain," by Mrs. Bernice B. Turnage of Farmville, Miss Hilda Mayo presented Mrs. Bela Undvarnoki (our own Miss Ruby Daniels) who brought us a message on "That the World May Know."

Mrs. Undvarnoki reminded us that though we had not been able to do very much because of the war, we had never realized our European brothers were not in a mission field. We came from there and we're so-called Christians. One of the most important things in making the world to know is to make Europe know.

What we do there will affect the history of the world. It is important politically! She cited many difficulties on this field, but in spite of these our work there is most hopeful. Europe is most strategic and our sister continent must know Christ.

At the close of her address Mrs. Undvarnoki gave the thanks for the fellowship of this day, following which we adjourned for lunch.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session opened with the singing of the hymn "Christ for the World We Sing." Miss Gloria Blanton, Baptist Student Secretary, and a group of students presented the afternoon worship. Psalm 96 was used for responsive reading, with Miss Doris Edwards of Selma as leader. After this Miss Faye Howard, St. Pauls, sang "Prayer Perfect," accompanied by Mr. Slarence Poe Mooring, as a meditation.

Mrs. Howard Dawkins, Divisional Young People's Leader brought us the inspiring message which follows:

A piece of Clay

"I took a piece of plastic clay
And idly fashioned it one day,
And, as my fingers pressed it still,
It moved and yielded to my will.

I came again when days were past
The bit of clay was hard at last,
The form I gave it, it still bore,
But I could change that form no more.

I took a piece of living clay
And gently formed it day by day,
And moulded with my power and art
A young child's soft and yielding heart.

I came again when years were gone
It was a man I looked upon;

And I could change him never more."

Mrs. E. B. Beasley then presented a memorial service to Mrs. Delila Deaton Griffin and Mrs. J. R. McLean.

"Leaves have their time to fall, and flowers their time to wither, stars have their time to set, but death thou hast all seasons for thine own." Someone has said that death travels down the thickly settled highway and loves to aim at shining marks. We felt this was true in the passing of Mrs. Delila Deaton Griffin on February 25, 1949. Her going was a loss to the Woman's Missionary Union of the Roanoke Association where she was serving as associate superintendent of our W. M. U. and leader of the Edgemcombe County Group as well as an active participant and leader in her social society (Pinetops).

For all the duties entrusted to her she was a careful, conscientious worker. Her calm dignity and affectionate friendliness made her felt in any gathering. In her own home she was at her best with an unusual gift for home-making; she gave herself in unmeasured devotion to her husband and her children. From our human standpoint, so useful and beloved a woman can ill be spared from her home, church, community and association. Yet "My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways saith the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts." Isa.: 55:8-9.

Mrs. R. C. Chason of Rocky Mount has written a poem fitting in Mrs. Griffin's memory which I've been asked to read at this time. She says she had in her mind a military funeral and was trying in a small way to make a comparison.

In Memory of Delila Griffin

(Some impressions I received at the service held for her)

I journeyed to a Church House not long ago
To attend the final rites of one we all loved so;
Loved ones and friends were gathered from miles around
To hear the praises that for her life did abound.

The sun was behind the clouds we listened;
All seemed dreary as tear-stained cheeks were glistened;
Then in my heart burst forth a golden sun ray—
For this dear one had reached the end of a perfect day.

Her casket was not flag-draped as a soldier's might be
But dying in the service of her Lord surely had she;
Though no flag of stars and stripes seemed due
There had been a flag in her life of Christian hue.

She has just gone home, having stood the test.

No, she would not tell us to retreat;
For in her life has come victory and not defeat;
Let us lift up our eyes to our God of love
And keep the faith that we may meet in Heaven above.

Along with this tribute to Mrs. Griffin as an officer of our Association, we want to pause today in memory of other comrades who during the past year have entered their permanent home; a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. Particularly our remembering Mrs. J. R. McLean of this church who was called home February 17, 1949. I shall always think of Mrs. McLean when thinking of the First Baptist Church in Wilson. Ever since I began work as a leader I recall Mrs. McLean, her personality, her intellect and loving spirit as she gave herself unsparingly in the interest of His Kingdom. We thank God for her life, for her influence, but most of all for the noble example of daily service for Christ our Savior. May her mantle of unceasing loyalty, unselfish devotion and persevering service fall upon those of us who are trying to hold high His lighted torch.

Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His. It was Tennyson who beautifully and fittingly said of one "God touched him and he slept." Just as fittingly can we say of our W. M. U. friends to whom we pay tribute today, "God touched them and they slept."

CONSTITUTION

1. The Association shall be composed of the pastors and of the members, not exceeding three from any church, chosen by the churches, who shall produce letters certifying their appointments. Members thus chosen and convened together with the pastors shall be denominated "The Roanoke Baptist Association," which shall have no power over the churches, nor shall it infringe on any of the rights.

2. The letters from the churches shall contain the number then in fellowship, and of those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded or died since last Association.

3. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director (who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present to assume their duties at the close of the annual session in which elected and serve until the close of the next annual session) and the Associational Superintendent of the Woman's Missionary Union.

4. Other churches, upon petition by letters and by delegates, and after a satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, may be admitted to the body by unanimous vote, when the Moderator shall give the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

5. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion of the Association, whether it may be debated or not.

6. The Association shall furnish the churches with copies of its minutes.

7. The minutes of the Association shall be read and approved and shall be signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association adjourns.

8. Any church not representing itself in this body three successive sessions by letter or by delegates, shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless reasons are assigned.

9. The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church which shall be found disorderly in faith and practice.

10. Visiting brothers from sister churches, or similar bodies, may be invited to participate in our deliberations.

11. At each season of the Association, delegates to the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention shall be chosen by vote.

12. This Constitution is subject to alteration by a majority vote of the delegates at any session.

13. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

14. The Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator.

15. The Moderator of this Association shall at each Annual Meeting, or 30 days thereafter, name a committee of 9 messengers (one from each County constituting this Association and one at large) whose duty it shall be to bring to the Association at its next Annual Meeting nominations for the following Associational Officers: Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director and the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Superintendent, (the last one to be the one selected by that body in its annual meeting), also for its Executive Committee.

RULES OF DECORUM

Believing it best to be governed by certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of the Association, we adopt the following:

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator.
3. The person speaking shall adhere strictly to the subject, and in no way reflect on any other brother.
4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted unless he violate some rule of decorum.
5. No brother shall absent himself from the Association without obtaining permission from the body.
6. The names of the delegates shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
7. The Moderator may give his ideas on any subject before putting it to a vote, but is entitled to vote only in case of a tie.
8. The order of business shall be made at the beginning of each session, and shall be changed only by a vote of the body.

TUESDAY MORNING

The 43rd session of the Roanoke Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, John T. Coley, in the Rosemary Baptist Church, Roanoke Rapids, at 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning October 10th, 1950.

The song service during the day was directed by Stewart B. Simms, Memorial Baptist Church, Williamston, assisted at the organ by Mrs. Paul T. Overton of the host church.

The opening hymns were, "Come Thou Almighty King" and "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing."

The devotional period was directed by E. W. Price, Weldon. He read some scripture from James 1:2-8 and 4:14-17 and led in prayer.

The address of welcome was presented by W. J. Norwood of the host church.

E. W. Holmes, Farmville, responded.

New pastors of the Association were introduced and presented as follows: O. S. Williams, Red Oak; E. W. Price, Weldon; Tom White, Community Center; W. D. Williamson, New Hope and Elm City; Howard Knight, Hart Village Mission, Tarboro; Esley

Phillips, assistant pastor of the First Baptist Church, Rocky Mount; Arthur Stainback, Stoney Creek.

Educational Directors and Minister of Music were recognized as follows; Miss Elizabeth Draughn, Scotland Neck; Miss Naomi Braswell, Roanoke Rapids; Leonard E. Harris, Rocky Mount.

Among the visitors recognized were a group from the Tar River Association and Dr. B. D. Bunn, Chowan College, Murfreesboro.

The ministers were requested to stand and 34 responded. The messengers were requested to join them and upon satisfactory response from the churches represented the Moderator declared the body ready to transact business.

The Obituary Report was presented by E. R. Stewart, Hamilton.

OBITUARY

Many of our beloved friends, relatives, and fellow-laborers came to their journey's end, finished their work on earth this year, and answered the call to go to be with the Lord.

They have attained the gift and rewards for their faithful services.

"In the midst of life come death."

"It is appointed unto man once to die and after that the judgment."

"And I heard a voice from Heaven saying, write, blessed are the dead, who die in the Lord, from henceforth yea, saith the spirit that they may rest from their labors and their works do follow after them." (Rev. 14:13)

At the conclusion of the report the congregation was requested to stand and after a few moments in silent meditation; H. L. Hawkins, Spring Hope, led in a prayer.

The messenger from the Cherry Chapel Baptist Church, Washington, were recognized. Through their pastor, J. Jeter Johnson, Washington, they made application for membership in the Association. The request was unanimously granted.

The pastor of the host church, B. Marshall White-Hurst made some necessary announcements and welcomed the body. He then presented the printed program and moved its adoption.

An amendment that a period of 15 minutes be designated for miscellaneous business at 11:45 was presented and the motion carried.

The program was adopted with the amendment.

Under the head of organization the following officers were elected: Stewart B. Simms, Williamston, Moderator; E. W. Holmes, Farmville, re-elected Vice Moderator; R. L. Collins, Sharps-

burg, re-elected Clerk; W. A. Bulluck, Rocky Mount, Association Funds Treasurer; W. W. Eagles, Macclesfield, re-elected Auditor.

The Moderator appointed the following committee to bring nominations for Sunday School Superintendent and Training Union Director: R. C. Lanier, Rocky Mount; E. G. Cole, Winter-ville; C. W. Creamer, Halifax.

Mr. Simms was presented as the new Moderator.

Mr. Simms led the congregation in singing, "Lead On, O King Eternal."

An address on "Alcoholism and Alcoholics," was presented by a representative of "Alcoholics Anonymous." Upon request the identity of the speaker was listed "Anon."

Announcements relative to the noon entertainment were made by the host pastor.

The hymn, "Amazing Grace," was then led by Mr. Simms.

Dr. Harris, Rocky Mount, sang, "The Lost Chord," assisted at the piano by Mrs. Hunter Pope, Enfield.

The annual sermon was delivered by Paul B. Nickens, Plymouth.

THE CHURCH IN ACTION

Acts 3:1-8

Int. .

1—One day in the early beginnings of Christianity two men were going up to the temple to pray. As they approached the gate which is called Beautiful they came across one of the city's numerous cripples who had been carried there by some friend or relative so that he might have a good position for asking alms of the worshippers. As these two men, Peter and John by name, came abreast of the cripple he extended a hand and asked for a gift. Simon Peter turned and spoke—"Silver and gold have I none, but such as I have give I thee. In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk." Then miracle of miracles the helpless cripple felt new strength coming into those old ankle bones; new blood surged through helpless limbs, new courage and hope dawned within his soul. The lame man was made whole again.

2—New 1900 years separate us this morning from the marvel-

ous miracle recorded here, but we believe this story has a message for us today. What is the message of this great and stirring story?

I—Well, for one thing it reminds us that Jesus Christ is still at work in the world.

A—Listen as Peter says—“In the name of Jesus—”

1—Peter may not be able to see the departed Jesus but he feels His presence.

2—His bodily form had vanished from sight on Olivet, but the Christ Himself promised never to leave His followers. “Lo, I am with you—”

3—So now it is Jesus accomplishing the miracle through Simon Peter.

B—And does not this miracle remind us of Jesus?

1—We remember Him and the ten lepers; Him and man with withered hand; Him and blind Bartimaeus.

2—He took peculiar delight in ministering to bodies of men as well as souls.

3—Surely we know He is here with Simon. Body invisible, but He is very near.

C—I dare to believe He is still at work in world.

1—I see trees twisted—know tornado passed.

2—I see boats beached—hurricane passed.

3—I see homes transformed, faces brightened; lives remade; souls redeemed—I know Christ still at work in our world.

4—Story of Cafe Owner converted.

II—Again, this story reminds us that Christ's body is now the church.

A—This constant witness of Acts.

1—On day of ascension body of flesh disappeared.

2—His new body is the church.

B—In days of flesh He was cribbed, cabined and confined.

1—When in Nain He could not be in Cana.

2—When among the tombs He could not be in Capernaum.

3—When in Nazareth could not be in Jerusalem.

4—If in Judea not Samaria, etc.

C—But now with visible body gone He is no longer limited to one location at given time.

- 1—When Peter and John healed lame man it was body of Christ doing the work.
- 2—Today His body walks bomb shattered roads of Korea; Behind Iron Curtain; in London, Paris, Berlin, Tokyo, New York, Roanoke Rapids.
- 3—Should not be limited, but how we do limit Him. We are selfish, unwilling, filled with prejudice and greed.
- D—How marvellous it is that Christ able to use us as His body.
- 1—I like to think of first men He called. What if you had been on committee?
- a—Here come a fisherman. But he smells. Uncouth.
- b—Two brothers. Sons of thunder. Too loud.
- c—A Zealot. Revolutionary. Dangerous.
- d—A Quisling. Sly, cunning, subtle. Better pass.
- 2—Yet Jesus took these and they became His body.
- 3—Today out of similar material His body is built. Thank God He can use us with all our flaws, imperfections, weaknesses.
- E—Fellow church members, we constitute body of Christ.
- 1—If you are absent from prayer meeting, Sunday school, worship hours, etc., when could be present, then that part of the body of Jesus may not be in use, and may not be receiving the proper fodder.
- 2—Every time a church member drifts, gets careless, the efficiency of Christ decreases. When church member is negligent, stingy, selfish, prejudiced, the body of Christ is weaker and poorer.
- 3—You are part of Christ's body. Be careful what you say, where you go and what you do.
- III—In third place this miracle would remind us that lame humanity often lies at very door of the church.
- A—Here within shadow of the temple lay cripple.
- B—Today we find same thing in every community.
- 1—We are not to forget the cripples in distant lands. "We've a story to tell—"
- 2—But we must not neglect weak and infirm at home.
- C—I am not now thinking of physical cripples.
- 1—We used to think of man who was sick as always being sick physically. Have learned that mind can grow ill.

If Christian we know that soul can also be stricken.

2—There are spiritual cripples all about us.

a—Good business man with soul gasping for breath.

b—Socially prominent mother whose spiritual life in last stages of tuberculosis.

c—Professional man in grip of spiritual paralysis.

d—Hard working laborer with cancer of sin eating away the moral and spiritual fibres of heart.

3—Within the sound of this church bell there are sin sick men, soul paralyzed women, boys and girls spiritually lame.

D—If these are to be reached Christ must do so through His body—you and me.

1—You are His hands—feet—voice—body.

2—Once in the long ago Jesus visited the Bethany home—Martha said to Mary—“The Master is here and calleth for thee.” He is here this morning calling for you and men.

3—Christ has no hands but our hands to bring men to His side; He has no tongue but our tongue to tell men how He died. Oh, will you respond to His call?

IV—Conclusion:

A—Spiritually lame humanity all about us. God the Father watching from the windows of heaven, hoping we shall reach the lame today as did Peter and John in the long ago.

B—I recall hearing a great story once about a football player and his father.

C—My beloved, let us do our work so well each day that we shall bring a smile of approval to the face of Him whose eye never leaves His children. As the body of Christ let us be found faithful.

The closing prayer was offered by Mr. Nickens and the session adjourned for dinner and fellowship.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The hymns, “On Christ, The Solid Rock, I Stand” and “I Am Thine, O Lord” were led by Mr. Simms with Mrs. Paul Evans of the host church at the organ.

The devotional period was directed by O. S. Williams, Red

Oak. Mr. Williams read I Thessalonians 2:9-13 and led in prayer.

Dr. W. K. McKee, Baptist Hospital, Winston-Salem, presented an address on, "Hospitals."

Dr. McKee brought greetings from the staff and workers at the hospital in Winston-Salem.

He then stated that the amount of money realized from the Mother's Day Offering was about \$10,000 ahead of last year and raised the question, "Should We Have A Hospital?"

In answer to the question Dr. McKee cited a number of current cases to prove that such an institution is necessary. He stated further that our Hospital is a necessary institution because of its ministry in teaching and preparing men and women for Christian work. He concluded by saying that the Hospital was as missionary and evangelistic as any institution in the State Convention.

W. C. Reed, Superintendent of the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina, gave an address on the subject, "The Abundant Life For All."

He brought greetings from the children and staff of the Orphanage.

The address included some interesting stories about the children in our Orphanage and the work being done.

Mr. Reed stated that more money had been spent during the year than received because of a new building and water system installed at Kennedy Home and that our surplus is very low but was confident that the people over the state would rally to replace what had been spent and give all these children an opportunity at the Abundant Life.

A hymn, "At The Cross," was led by E. R. Stewart, Hamilton.

Ralph E. Ferguson, Robersonville, Associational Superintendent of Evangelism, made a report on the plans for the simultaneous revival in our Association next year.

J. C. Canipe, Secretary of Evangelism for the State Convention, was presented by Mr. Ferguson. Mr. Canipe addressed the body on "Evangelistic Crusade for 1951."

First, Mr. Canipe urged that every Baptist Church have an evangelistic program with the other churches east of the Mississippi River next spring.

Second, he urged an effective organization down to the local church.

Third, he urged spiritual preparation—confession of sins,

more earnest praying, seeking the Holy Spirit, and deeper consecration of self for the service of preaching the gospel and bringing the kingdom of God to pass.

W. D. Morris presented a recommendation from the Executive Committee that a tent be purchased for the use of extending our mission effort in our Association.

A motion to adopt the recommendation was unanimously adopted.

A motion was made that an offering be taken on both days of our meeting with which to purchase the tent.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

The first offering was immediately taken and amounted to \$281.04.

W. M. Cassell, Bethel, conducted the devotional period. He read Ezekiel 33:1-9 and led in prayer.

Mr. Peel led in singing, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord."

P. M. Hutchinson, Rocky Mount, presented an address on "Sunday Schools."

The Training Union program was presented by E. E. Ulrich, Wilson and a group from the Five Points Church.

REPORT OF THE ROANOKE ASSOCIATIONAL BAPTIST TRAINING UNION

We report progress in the Training Union Department of the Roanoke for the year closing September 30, 1950. In 81 churches we had 39 with Training Union Departments with 159 Unions and Story Hours.

During the year there have been 4 churches who have organized fully graded Training Unions:

Calvary at Rocky Mount
Cherry Chapel at Washington
Pine Tops
Webbs Chapel at Macclesfield

And additional Units have been added in several of the existing Unions.

The Association is becoming more Training Union conscious, especially in our urban centers, but our greatest need is in the very places where our Training Union work is weakest—in our Rural Churches. Our big necessity is to train our fine Baptist people that in this day of good roads and fine cars—it is not only no longer necessary to keep our churches dark on Sunday night—but it is spiritually wrong.

The solution to dark rural churches on Sunday night is the Training Union, answering three needs—

Instructing our converts that they might grow in grace,
Providing a wholesome place of fellowship for our folks to gather,
Obeying our Lord's command to "Let your light so shine that men may see."

That is our peculiar Training Union function.

The work this year was given fine focus on two occasions—

On December 5 in the "M" night rally at Arlington Street Church, with over 300 in attendance, and on March 13 at North Rocky Mount Church when the Tournaments and Hymn Festival were held.

We had appropriated to the department's use by the Executive Committee \$150. We only drew \$75.00 of that amount. The Financial Report is as follows:

We had hoped that the Churches with new Training Unions would be on the program but in their absence we give you the following report from Calvary Church where they have 100 on roll and an average attendance of 58. Calvary Church is doing an outstanding missionary work with notable results and many conversions. Their pastor told me they have often three cottage prayer meetings in a week, and sometimes two in a night where folks are won to Christ. The personnel for this marvelous job is trained in the Training Union.

Beloved—if we are to do what God expects of us in winning souls in the 1951 Simultaneous Campaign—and then not conserve the results we have a right to expect—that will be a tragic neglect for which we will be answerable to God.

Baptist Training Union is the answer.

Let us be about our Master's business of lighting these church on Sunday night and

Let your light so shine before men that they may see.

Mr. Moderator, I move the adoption of this report.

The program was begun by the Treble Trio of the R. L. C. Choir singing, "Tomorrow May Be Too Late" and "Heart-aches, Take Then All To Jesus." The Trio was comprized of Miss Margaret Tyson, Miss Rita Tyson, and Mrs. W. R. Williams.

The Intermediate Union demonstrated how a weekly meeting of the Union should be conducted. The following members presented the demonstration: W. W. Barnes, Jr., Director, Carolyn Smith, J. R. Boykin, Shirley Rogers, Nancy Rogers, Peggy Batten, Shirley Lamm, Don Barnes, Cutha Linnard, J. D. Batten.

A motion that the report be adopted was unanimously adopted.

A rising vote of thanks was given the host church for their hospitality and entertainment during the day.

A hymn, "O Zion Haste," was sung by the congregation, led by Mr. Simms.

The choir of the host church rendered, "Create In Me A Clean Heart, O God," under the direction of Joseph Parker, Choir Director.

Mrs. Leland Kitchin, Scotland Neck, President of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union, presented an interesting address on the W. M. U., including a brief report on its work in our Association.

W. M. U. REPORT TO ROANOKE ASSOCIATION October 10, 1950

This summer during the W. M. N. week at Ridgecrest I was given a program on the inside cover of which were written these words. "The poet, Robert Frost, in speaking to a university audience included the following lines from one of his poems:

'The woods are lovely, dark, and deep.
But I have promises to keep
And miles to go before I sleep
And miles to go before I sleep.'

A man in the audience asked, "What are the promises you had in mind, Mr. Frost?" And the reply, "I have promises to keep with those who have gone before, my ancestors; promises to keep in this my day; promises to keep to God; and promises to keep to those who will come after." Certainly we have all the promises to keep of which Mr. Frost spoke. We have promises to keep with the unsaved in the homeland and in the lands beyond the seas; we have promises to keep with our young people; we have so many promises to keep. Since then I have been haunted by the phrase, "Promises to Keep" and I keep asking myself "Am I true to these promises? Is the W. M. U. of the Roanoke Association being true to its promises and obligations? Are we as Baptists keeping our promises with the faith of our fathers?"

Tonight I would like to report to you as best I can just what the W. M. U. of the Roanoke Association is doing to keep its promises as Mr. Frost said to the past, the present, the future, and to our God. I believe that the W. M. U. is deeply conscious of its rich heritage from the fine women who have labored so faithfully in it since its organization in 1888. We try to keep alive and green the memory of some of our ladies by naming our offerings for them. Hence, we have the Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong Offerings, the Heck-Jones Offering, named for Miss Fannie E. S. Heck and Mrs. Sallie Bailey Jones. Each year as we bring our offerings we think with love and pride of those who have gone before and who have handed us the torch to carry in this our day.

When I come to the promises to keep in this my day the answer is much more complex—it depends on the yardsticks that we use. If we measure ourselves by our growth from last year we find a year in which we have held our own and made some growth, but nothing spectacular. In our 81 churches we have 75 societies and with our junior groups we have 249 organizations with a memberships of 6,045. These gave last year to Cooperative Program and Special Offerings \$52,085.87 which is almost, but not quite, the ten per cent increase that is our goal. I am very proud, too, of the 437 mission study classes that were held last year by all of our

groups; of the 1417 tithers in our union and of the 3,565 women and young people who took part in directed community missions. Especially am I pleased with the spirit of love, harmony, and enthusiasm that I find in all of our meetings and in the camps and rallies for the young people. I can truly say that it is a great inspiration for me to be superintendent of such a wonderful group as the W. M. U. of the Roanoke Association.

But when I measure our work and how well we keep our promises, not by our growth, but by the world's needs I am frightened. It seems to me that everything I have read and heard at our camps this summer says, "Wake up, Christians of America, wake up! Now is the day to take the world for Christ!" But we do not awake. Dr. Rankin sounds his challenge to "Advance" but can any of us say that we have given up anything to help this advance? Have we sacrificed as much as one hat or the price of one pocketbook that the world might know our Savior? I remember so well the conversation I had with a missionary at Ridgecrest. She said that when she came home on furlough it frightened her to see how comfortable were our churches. "Everyone is so comfortable," she said, "true they are most gracious and polite to me but I have a feeling that I can go so far and no farther." She is a missionary to a Catholic-dominated county and has been given money with which to build a church but can not get government permission to build. "Actually," she said, "we need prayers more than money." I have thought of her so often since then and felt that we were definitely not keeping our promises to our missionaries when we neglect to pray for them and when they feel that they can not reach us behind our walls of comfort.

And what of our young people? One young man, at least, has weighed us in the balance and found us wanting. He graduated last spring from high school and spent this summer working on the staff at Ridgecrest before entering college. His summer at Ridgecrest had made a profound impression on him and greatly deepened his spiritual life. On speaking to his church on his return he said that the church was cold and indifferent and not interested in saving the lost. He challenged each one to put on the whole armor of God and then to fight the good fight. As I heard him speak with all the fire and zeal of youth I saw my generation through his eyes. I realized that much that we did for our young people was done in an indifferent, makeshift manner and that it was really our fault instead of theirs that ball games, band practices, movies, scout meetings, etc. all seemed more important to them than G. A. and R. A. meetings. Here, indeed, we have "miles to go before we sleep."

And do we keep our promises to God? We know that we do not. The miracle of all times is that God still loves us in spite of our blunderings, mistakes, and sins. And how he blesses our feeble efforts in His behalf. Truly in our weakness is his strength made perfect. One illustration of this is in our missionary efforts to evangelize the world. After only 158 years of modern missionary work in foreign lands by our denomination, slow and halting, with many setbacks due to wars and depressions, God has blessed our efforts until we now stand at the threshold of a new era. With our denomination, strong in numbers and wealth, with all the world, ex-

cept those nations dominated by Communism, in a period of transition from their old religion to some other, and interested in the Christian faith, our opportunity and obligation to tell of our Lord and Savior is as great, if not greater, than any generation has ever had before. In the fulness of time it looks as if our generation must go forward or backward. To stand still is impossible. Twenty-five years from now this opportunity and our span of usefulness will be gone. God grant that we may see and respond to the part that we may have in the miracle of missions.

The report was unanimously adopted.

W. D. Morris presented the following resolution:

Now therefore be it resolved:

1. That the Roanoke Association in regular session this 10th day of October, 1950, does express its sincere and deep appreciation to Brother Bazemore for his able and Christian leadership as Missionary of this Association;

2. And be it further resolved:

That a copy of this resolution be presented to Brother Bazemore, and a copy forwarded to the Biblical Recorder for publication;

3. And be it further resolved:

That this resolution be made a part of the Minutes of the session of the Association.

Mr. Bazemore responded with deep feeling.

The closing address was given by Mr. Bazemore on the subject, "Surveying the Roanoke."

“SURVEYING THE ROANOKE”

In days of old, when Indians roamed the forests of East Carolina, they would search out and climb the highest hill they could find, in order that they might see better, in spying out the land. Their vision depended on their altitude. And so it is with us; the higher up we get, the farther we can see. This is true in spiritual things as well. If we climb the Hill of Calvary we can through the eyes of faith, look out upon the world and see the great needs of people hungry for His Gospel. And if we are wise, we then see how our own personal witness must carry this message to all people, beginning where we now are, right here at home in our own community and Association.

In surveying the Roanoke, we must look carefully, and as we look we see so many things, time will fail to name them all. Let us observe a few: Seven counties, each of them well populated. Dozens of towns, villages, and several larger cities; and a vast open countryside of fertile farms, good homes, populated settlements, with people, people everywhere you go up and down over the good highways and by-ways. More than half of all these, our own people, are members of no church. Thousands of people, hundreds and hundreds of families are all about us, ready for the outreach of our Baptist churches, waiting for us to go out and seek and find and bring them in to a place of fellowship and worship and service.

Our Baptist forces have been here a long time. Over a hundred years ago, we read how “circuit-riders,” preachers, missionaries, rode horseback, stage coach, and travelled on foot, over what is now the Roanoke and Tar River associations. They came preaching, teaching, organizing, planting seeds of mission stations, prayer meeting groups, Sunday Schools, many of them to grow into strong churches. They endured hardships, but with compassion and love and zeal they gathered the people together in the name of our Lord. Truly as we look back on their work, we can say “others have labored, and we enter into their labors.” Our work as Missionary Baptists now can go forward more fruitfully and more rapidly because of these consecrated pioneers of our faith.

God has blessed this great Association in a marvelous way. The pattern of life here is permanent and sound. Our people love their homes and they love the good earth. Our people are very largely native American-born souls who love freedom and love free worship. Here then, is a mighty Baptist opportunity, as we have 81 churches, with over 22,000 members; affording a full program of true and satisfying religious life for every person from young to old, as our program of worship and teaching and training and fellowship and service, reaches every individual who will come in and share it. When we fill our churches we now have, we can enlarge them, and build bigger ones. The people are already here, living even in sight of the churches up and down every highway; in every town and village and settlement, waiting to be won into the church and into God’s work.

The past year has been a good year in the Roanoke. For the most part, all of our churches have shown healthy growth. Some have had re-

markable gains in baptisms, in total additions, in stewardship, in evangelism and in strengthening of all phases of our Baptist work. We humbly offer our thanks to God for all of these signs of His favor. But the fields are still "white unto the harvest." Music of the land is not yet possessed.

We have then, the organization for evangelism all set up. We have established churches in nearly every community. Strong, large churches can help to start new ones where needed. We need to have as quickly as possible, a Baptist church within reach of every community and virtually every family of this large association. It can be done. I dream of the day when the Roanoke will have ninety, even a hundred, growing, soul-winning Baptist churches, and we shall keep on growing and working for our Lord. I dream of the day when the Roanoke will stand out far ahead and in the vanguard of Baptist work and progress in this beloved State of ours. Our progress has been wonderful already. Oh, my people, we are the children of God. We are His disciples. Haven't we dreamed away enough precious years, haven't we seen enough golden opportunities slip away forever beyond the twilight's purple rim of time; haven't we the vision and the love in our hearts to see and to begin anew from this hour on, to go out and win and bring in these lost people? They are our neighbors, our friends, over one hundred and twenty thousand of them, in this Association, unchurched, unsaved. Please God, may we be about our Father's business, every day we live!

And when we as Baptists and as faithful witnesses for our Master, have done this glorious task, we shall one day come to the end of the way and cast off the worn-out sandals of this human pilgrimage and lift up our eyes to meet the shining face of the Son of God, who loved us into His marvelous fellowship and called us into His service, and we shall hear Him saying "well done, good and faithful servants, enter now into the joys of thy Lord."

The closing prayer was offered by C. W. Kreamer, Halifax.

Note: 580 messengers and visitors registered during the day.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

The session began in the Williamston Memorial Baptist Church at 10 o'clock.

The song service was directed by Mrs. R. E. Shervette, Enfield, assisted at the organ by Mrs. J. M. Ward, Williamston, and Mrs. Hunter Pope, Enfield, at the piano.

The opening hymn was "Come Thou Almighty King."

J. Jeter Johnson, Washington, conducted the devotional period. He quoted Daniel 6:3 and led in prayer.

W. W. Hamilton, Washington, presented an address on the subject, "Evangelistic Opportunities in the Home."

S. H. Roberts, Rocky Mount, presented an address on the subject, "Evangelistic Opportunities in Reading."

J. Felix Arnold, Enfield, presented an address on the subject, "Evangelistic Opportunities in Music."

C. B. Peacock, Whitakers, presented an address on the subject, "Evangelistic Opportunities in Church Publicity."

The hymn, "How Firm A Foundation," was sung by the congregation.

W. D. Morris presented the following recommendation from the Executive Committee:

RECOMMENDATION

Your Executive Committee in session this the 11th day of October, 1950, recommends first, that the calling of a missionary be left to your Executive Committee (which is your Missions Committee) when a suitable man can be found.

Second, that the Executive Committee be authorized to offer such a missionary a beginning salary not exceeding \$3900 per year.

Third, that we allow the missionary a travelling expense account up to \$600 per year.

Fourth, we further recommend that the committee be empowered to provide rented living quarters near the center of the Association.

The recommendation was adopted.

Clyde E. Baucom, Wilson, moved that the Executive Committee present a proposed budget to the Association for adoption next year.

The motion was adopted.

The second offering to be applied on the purchase of a tent for evangelistic purposes was received and amounted to \$582.83. The balance needed for this purpose was underwritten by the First Baptist Church of Rocky Mount.

Necessary announcements were made by the host pastor. It was stated that Piney Grove and Hamilton Churches were joint hosts with the Memorial Church, Williamston, to the Association.

The hymn, "Near the Cross," was sung by the congregation.

Visitors were recognized and welcomed.

J. Felix Arnold, Enfield, sang, "I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked."

Arthur H. Stainback, Stoney Creek, presented an address on the subject: "Tomorrow We Reap."

TOMORROW WE REAP

Text: Psalm, 126:6—"He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

There are hopes and promises of tomorrow that should encourage us. We have promises that today's labors, teachings and witnessing will bring forth a harvest. Tomorrow means we reap in life and/or eternity. Our text may be translated by the poet to read:

"Tho the sower's heart is breaking
 Bearing forth the seed and shed,
 He shall come, the echoes waking,
 Laden with his sheaves instead."

We can not break the Divine pattern of sowing and reaping nor the facts of time and the power of God. Whatsoever a man soweth today he will reap in like manner tomorrow. There is a positive correlation between the seed sown and the harvest. It is the same in kind and quality. What you would reap tomorrow sow today.

I. HE THAT GOETH FORTH . . . We must not keep our seed in the church as a storehouse for those who seek but we must go forth in witness and teaching. Into the sordidness of the world go . . . go forth in service. Whatever your talent or capacity it is your calling and opportunity. There is danger in not going forth. Souls will be eternally lost because they will not hear the gospel message.

II. AND WEeping . . . Go forth with compassion. There is no place for hard-heartedness and professionalism in the Christian ministry. The tears of a compassionate heart are essential equipment for the soul-winner. The promise and certainty of returning with joy depends on our going forth with compassion. This shows a love for the lost, a consciousness of the value of a soul. Jesus is our example of a compassionate heart in soul-winning. Only those with a heart of loving compassionate for the lost are worthy the honor of being called soul-winners.

III. BEARING PRECIOUS SEED . . . The seed is the Bible, the indestructible, invincible, indispensable, infallible, inexhaustible, inestimable, infrangible, imperishable and inerrant Word of the Living God. It is the only seed we are to sow because it is supernatural in its origin, complete in its structure, united in its testimony, accurate in its prophecy, unique in its message, distinct in its claims, inerrant in its utterances, Divine in its spirit, reliable in its promises and Christ-revealing in its witness.

The world has had thousands of years and much wisdom but it has not found a more excellent way nor a book of equal value. The world has found nothing apart from the Bible to heal the sores of the world, cure broken hearts, inspire life, lift sinners and nothing else that can point the way to God.

IV. DOUBTLESS. Here is a word of assurance. "My word shall not return unto me void."

V. COME AGAIN WITH REJOICING, BRINGING HIS SHEAVES WITH HIM. Tomorrow we will be happy as we reap. God does reward

the faithful witness. No servant in the Lord's vineyard has ever been overlooked. The highest end of the Believer is fruitful service and God will give the harvest and reward. Gal. 6:9 reminds us "And let us not be weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap if we faint not." Hold fast, our harvest will come. No word taught from a compassionate heart will ever be lost.

CONCLUSION: Notice the doing and the reaping. Going forth into the fields to labor. Returning home for the rest and reward. Going forth with tears of compassion. Returning with rejoicing and joy unspeakable at the fact of souls saved. Going forth sowing, teaching, only the Word of God. Returning with souls won by the faithful preaching of the Word.

The more we go, the more faithful we are, the more compassionate we are, the more faithful we are to the Bible, the more will be our joy at harvest time and the more our sheaves in God's eternal reaping day.

The meeting was closed with prayer.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The opening hymn was "My Faith Looks Up to Thee."

The devotional period was conducted by W. D. Williamson, pastor of the New Hope and Elm City Churches. He read John 3:1-16 and led in prayer.

Several messengers gave brief reports of the work done in their churches during the year.

A hymn, "Take the Name of Jesus With You," was sung by the congregation.

The Order of Business was amended to grant 5 minutes for resolutions from the Executive Committee as follows:

1. That the Association instruct the clerk to provide on the second day of each annual meeting of the Association, a statistical digest of the most pertinent information contained in the church letters and distribute it to the messengers. The clerk's salary be increased \$15.00 to compensate for this extra work and whatever expense is incurred for paper, etc., in the preparation.

Recommendation adopted.

2. A rising vote of thanks be given F. T. Paul, Washington, for services rendered through the years as chairman of the Executive Committee.

Recommendation adopted.

3. Whereas Brother John T. Coley has served as moderator of the Roanoke Baptist Association for a period of 21 years;

And whereas he has given unselfishly, even sacrificially, of his

time, energies and means for the promotion and development of the work throughout the Association;

And whereas we have witnessed and experienced growth in the work both numerically and spiritually, during this period;
Now therefore be it resolved:

1. That this Association in regular session on this the 11th day of October 1950, does hereby express its deep appreciation to Brother Coley for his service and leadership.

2. And be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be given to Brother Coley, a copy be sent to the Biblical Recorder, and that this resolution be given prominent recognition in the minutes of this session.

Recommendation adopted.

A gift was presented to Mr. Coley by Mr. Simms in behalf of the Association in appreciation for his services rendered as moderator during the past 21 years.

The choir of the host church rendered two selections, "Bless the Lord, O My Soul" and "Judge Me, O God."

An address, "Christian Education," was presented by Dr. Harold W. Tribble, president of Wake Forest College.

Dr. Tribble said that for some years the Federal Government has been studying the question of education and pushing the levels ever higher. He said this would necessarily impose a burden upon church-supported schools and colleges to keep up with such a program because we do not believe in our schools being supported and operated by any government. He said that he believed we will meet the challenge.

Dr. Tribble concluded by giving a report on the Wake Forest removal project. He challenged us to have a definite part in making Wake Forest equal to any college in the state.

W. M. U. CONVENTION

The Nash county societies were hostess to the Woman's Missionary Union of the Baptist Roanoke Association, Thursday, March 30, 1950, which met in the Nashville Baptist Church for its forty-third annual session, with Mrs. L. H. Kitchin, Associational Superintendent, presiding. Mrs. Kitchin opened the meeting with a few remarks followed by prayer. The congregation then sang "Christ for the World We Sing."

Mrs. N. C. Brooks of Greenville brought a most inspiring devotion on "This Work Is the Lord's." Mrs. Brooks said:

"Our thought for this morning is based on the following scripture: 'For they perceived that this work was wrought of God.' Nehemiah 6:16.

"'For thou also hast wrought all our work in us.' Isaiah 26:12, and this from Mark's gospel: 'And they went forth and preached everywhere.'

"Laboring together with God we are attempting to build as Baptists now and in the days directly ahead a great pyramid of progress, so that we may truly advance with Christ, that we may show to the world 'that the days spring from on high hath visited us. To shine upon them that sit in darkness and from the shadow of death; to guide our feet into the way of Peace.'

"Surely we believe it is of the Lord—this challenge to greater tasks to wide open doors of service in this our world—a world that is weary and sick. Yea, sick nigh unto death with its heavy burden of sin—a world where millions find that all the walls of security and safety they have known have tumbled down about them. This challenge to a big task for God and with God isn't a new thing. Through the pages of the Old Testament men were ever challenged to step out to great and mighty tasks in the name of Jehovah. In our scripture from Nehemiah we find evidence of such.

"Our hearts are both saddened and thrilled as we read the story. The challenge that came to Nehemiah as he dwelt in the Kings' Palace in Babylon where he had been taken by Nebuchadnezzar. We know the story—a familiar one of the Jews being taken captive and carried away from their homeland. When certain brethren went up and inquired about the Jews that had escaped and about conditions in Jerusalem, he was told of the distress and

afflictions of the people; that the walls of the city were torn down; the gates burned and no feeling of security left to them.

“Though living in ease and plenty and serving as cup-bearers to the King, whose favor he had won, Nebuchadnezzar was bewildered. He wept and mourned for his people but more than that he cried unto God in humility and confession; confessing his sins and those of his people and prayed for mercy. It was in this spirit that he made request of the King for permission to return to Jerusalem for a season so that he might rebuild the walls. His request was not only granted but help for the task was given and we hear him say to people ‘Let us rise up and build,’ and again, ‘The God of Heaven, He will prosper us; therefore we, his servants, will arise and build.’

“Severe and overpowering obstacles arose; conspiracies for armed attacks were made and various stratagems were tried to force Nehemiah to leave Jerusalem; and even to take his life, but with great courage that would know no defeat, we hear him say to the workers, ‘Be not ye afraid of them—remember, the Lord is great and terrible,’ and he tells us, ‘So we built the wall, for the people had a mind to work.’

“How goes it with us as we face our challenge to bring Christ to the world? Do we see that it is the work of the Lord that calls for faithful living and witnessing? Can we say with Isaiah ‘Lord thou with ordain peace for us; for thou also hast wrought all our works in us.’

“Today the world cries for help—physical and material help, but so much more is spiritual help needed.

“Shall we see God’s work that needs to be done as we seek to move forward through and by our pyramid of progress? Will we help to make true today those words recorded in Mark 16:20, ‘And they went forth and preached everywhere.’

“The Master comes and calls for thee.”

Following Mrs. Brooks’ prayer, Miss Peggy Bone, soloist, accompanied by Mrs. R. R. Stanfield at the organ, sang “O, Master, Let Me Walk with Thee.”

At this time visitors were recognized; a new church, Cherry Chapel, and those present from there, and the following committees were appointed: Nominating, Time and Place and Courtesy. Their names are given in their reports which appear later in the minutes.

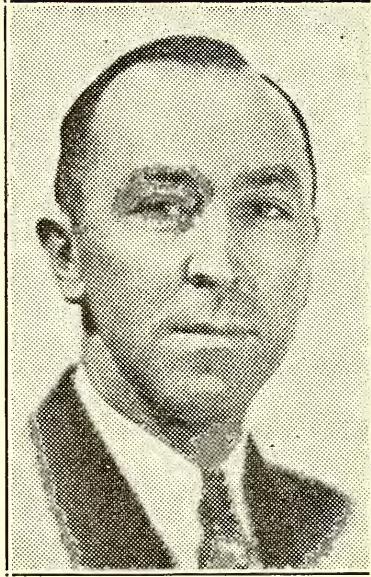

CONSTITUTION

1. The Association shall be composed of the pastors and of the members, not exceeding three from any church, chosen by the churches, who shall produce letters certifying their appointments. Members thus chosen and convened together with the pastors shall be denominated "The Roanoke Baptist Association," which shall have no power over the churches, nor shall it infringe on any of the rights.

2. The letters from the churches shall contain the number then in fellowship, and of those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded or died since last Association.

3. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Association Training Union Director, Associational Brotherhood President (who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present to assume their duties at the close of the annual session in which elected and serve until the close of the next annual session) and the Associational Superintendent of the Woman's Missionary Union.

4. Other churches, upon petition by letters and by delegates, and after a satisfactory examination of their Articles of Faith, may be admitted to the body by unanimous vote, when the Moderator shall give the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

5. Every motion made and seconded shall be left to the discretion of the Association, whether it may be debated or not.

6. The Association shall furnish the churches with copies of its minutes.

7. The minutes of the Association shall be read and approved and shall be signed by the Moderator and Clerk, before the Minutes go to press.

8. Any church not representing itself in this body three successive sessions by letter or by delegates, shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless reasons are assigned.

9. The Association shall withdrawn fellowship from any church which shall be found disorderly in faith and practice.

10. Visiting brothers from sister churches, or similar bodies, may be invited to participate in our deliberations.

11. At each session of the Association, delegates to the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention shall be chosen by vote.

12. This Constitution is subject to alteration by a majority vote of the delegates at any session.

13. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

14. The Moderator of this Association shall at each Annual Meeting, or 30 days thereafter, name a committee of 9 messengers (one from each County constituting this Association and one at large) whose duty it shall be to bring to the Association at its next Annual Meeting nominations for the following Associational Officers: Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational Brotherhood President and the Associational Woman's Missionary Union Superintendent, (the last one to be the one selected by that body in its annual meeting), also for its Executive Committee.

RULES OF DECORUM

Believing it best to be governed by certain rules and regulations in conducting the business of the Association, we adopt the following:

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Not more than one person shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator.
3. The person speaking shall adhere strictly to the subject, and in no way reflect on any other brother.
4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted unless he violates some rule of decorum.
5. No brother shall absent himself from the Association without obtaining permission from the body.
6. The names of the delegates shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
7. The Moderator may give his ideas on any subject before putting it to a vote, but is entitled to vote only in case of a tie.
8. The order of business shall be made at the beginning of each session, and shall be changed only by a vote of the body.

7. Pastors who had moved into the Association during the year were requested to come to the front of the body and were introduced as follows: W. E. Cholerton, W. C. Medlin, Charles F. Laughlin, James H. Blackmore, and L. Bland Taylor.

8. Visitors from other Associations were recognized and welcomed by the Moderator.

9. Mrs. Moye Dail, Immanuel Baptist Church, Greenville rendered a solo, "Beside Still Waters He Leadeth Me."

10. The Moderator addressed the Association (copy of which may be found in reports).

11. The hymns, "Come Thou Fount" and "We're Marching to Zion" were then sung. Necessary announcements were made.

12. The following committee were appointed:

(1) Committee to receive new churches, Wistar Hamilton, Washington, Chairman. (2) Committee on time, place, and preacher, John T. Coley, Rocky Mount, Chairman. (3) Committee on resolutions, Forrest G. Shearin, Scotland Neck, Chairman.

13. A resolution regarding the problem of food in connection with entertaining the Association in its annual meetings was presented by J. Felix Arnold of Enfield, which was adopted.

14. The hymn, "I Am Thine, O Lord" was sung by the congregation.

15. Before the sermon Carl Lee Ousley of Tarboro, alternate preacher, read Col. 1:9-19 and led in prayer.

16. A very heart-searching and inspirational message was delivered by Wistar Hamilton, Washington. The closing prayer was offered by James H. Blackmore, Spring Hope.

Tuesday Afternoon

17. As Mr. Arnold had to return home to conduct a funeral, Mrs. R. E. Shervette, Jr., Enfield, directed the song service for the afternoon, using "Jesus, Keep Me Near The Cross," "Take the Name of Jesus With You" and "Glory to His Name"

18. E. R. Stewart of Hamilton read some scripture from the tenth chapter of John and 2 Tim. 4:1-8 and led in prayer.

27. W. D. Morris made a motion that 5 minutes be given to Rev. Oscar Creech, Assistant to the President, Chowan College, which was duly seconded and carried. Mr. Creech gave a brief

report of the work done in the past and outlined some plans for the future.

28. Mrs. Shervette led in singing, "I love to Tell the Story."

29. E. L. Spivey, Field Secretary of the Baptist State Convention, presented an address on State Missions, and L. Grady Burgiss led in the closing prayer.

Tuesday Evening

30. E. W. Holmes, Farmville, Vice Moderator, presided.

31. The song service was directed by E. R. Stewart, Hamilton, using "Come, Thou Almighty King," "We Praise Thee, O God," "How Firm A Foundation" and "Amazing Grace."

32. G. Durham Ippock, Nashville, conducted the devotional period. He read Job 31:14-40 and led in prayer.

33. E. W. Price, Jr. of Weldon, presented the Training Union Report for Charles E. Neal, which was adopted as presented, (a copy of which may be found in the reports).

34. The Woman's Chorus, Eastern Carolina Teachers College, Greenville, sang, "Gloria Excelsis" by Mozart, and "Holy Art Thou" by Handel with solo part by Miss Jackie Walden, under the direction of Professor Don Hornblot.

35. Miss Gloria Blanton, Student Union Secretary of the College, was presented and gave a brief report of her work among the students.

36. An address on the "Brotherhood" organization was presented by A. L. Cobb, Plymouth. He gave a brief history of the organization, made some suggestions as to how it could be helpful to every church, and urged an organization in every church.

37. The hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus" was sung.

38. The Woman's Missionary Union Report was presented by Mrs. Leland Kitchin, Sr., Associational President, (a copy of which may be found in the reports).

39. Mrs. Kitchin presented Mrs. C. Gordon Maddrey, Ahoskie, President of the State W. M. U. who delivered a masterful address challenging every one to do his best for Missions in all of the world.

40. A motion was adopted to extend the time fifteen minutes in which our Missionary, L. Grady Burgiss, would show some pictures of the work he has been doing.

41. A hymn, "More Love to Thee" was sung and the pictures

were shown and explanations were given by Mr. Burgiss, following which E. R. Stewart led in a closing prayer.

Wednesday Morning

42. The session was opened in the Robersonville Baptist Church at 10 o'clock, E. W. Holmes, Vice Moderator, presiding.

43. The song service was directed by R. L. Adkins of the host church, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Adkins. The opening hymns were, "I Will Sing the Wondrous Story," "Take the Name of Jesus With You" and "'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

44. The devotional period was conducted by W. C. Medlin, Williamston, who read the 4th chapter of II Cor. and lead in prayer.

45. A timely message on the subject of the Orphanage was brought by E. C. Wilkie of the Kennedy Home, Kinston.

46. The Moderator named individuals to the following committees: Memorials, nominations, and Executive.

47. W. D. Morris, Chairman of the Executive Committee, stated that several people had questioned him concerning the purchasing of a house trailer to be used by our Missionary. He urged that some expression be made to determine the mind and wishes of the body on this matter.

After general remarks from the floor E. R. Stewart made a motion that the matter be referred to the Executive Committee for their consideration and if they deemed it advisable to proceed in purchasing a trailer. Attention was called to the fact that there were no funds with which to make this purchase, consequently the motions was lost. After further discussion, R. E. Ferguson made a motion to table the matter until the afternoon to give the people time to think about it. This motion was carried.

48. A report on Sunday School work was presented by E. Evans Ulrich, Wilson, which was adopted as presented.

49. Hymns, "I Am Thine, O Lord" and "My Jesus, I Love Thee" were sung.

50. H. R. Starling, new pastor at Southside, Rocky Mount, was recognized and welcomed by the Moderator.

51. W. M. Cassell, Bethel, presented an address on "Christian Literature."

52. A mixed chorus from Chowan College sang, "A Prayer."

53. J. Felix Arnold of Enfield read the Obituary Committee's

report, which was followed by a short meditation and a prayer led by J. W. Kincheloe of Rocky Mount.

54. The Chowan College chorus then sang, "The Holy City."

55. Oscar Creech was recognized who presented a challenge for some individuals or group to put a heating system in the pool of Chowan College so that the students could use it during the school year.

56. Claude F. Gaddy of Raleigh, Executive Secretary of the Council of Christian Education, brought an appropriate address. W. B. Harrington of Williamston offered the closing prayer.

Wednesday Afternoon

57. Mr. Adkins led the body in singing "Onward Christian Soldiers," "Amazing Grace" and a number of stanzas of "The Old Time Religion."

58. W. H. Hollowell, Ayden, read some verses from the 4th chapter of 2nd Timothy and led in prayer.

59. Under the title, "Our Hospital," W. M. Cassell, Bethel, related a personal experience of recent date relative to aid rendered a patient from Bethel by the hospital and introduced J. H. Pentecost, Assistant to the Chaplain, who spoke on the work of the hospital and challenged continued and enlarged support from all churches.

60. A motion was made and carried that the clerk be instructed to make a digest of church letters next year received before the meeting of the Association. Any letter not received would be left out of the digest.

61. E. R. Stewart, Hamilton, presented some tracts on the Brotherhood.

62. E. E. Ulrich, Wilson, called attention to the Builders Club and urged all who would to enroll immediately.

63. Several messengers gave brief reports on progress enjoyed in their respective churches during the year.

64. The hymn, "Revive Us Again," was sung.

65. The moderator appointed the committee on Order of Business.

66. E. R. Stewart, Hamilton, made a motion which was carried that the 1951 minutes be dedicated to E. C. Shoe a former pastor in the Association.

67. R. E. Ferguson, Robersonville, made a motion that the

tabled item dealing with the purchasing of a house trailer be recalled. The motion carried. A motion was made by J. H. Boyd, Greenville, that the body declare itself interested in the matter. The motion carried. After satisfactory interest was shown, Forrest G. Shearin, Scotland Neck, made a motion which was carried that an offering be received before adjournment to be held in sacred trust by the Executive Committee until the fund be supplemented sufficiently to purchase the trailer and pay for it. Carl L. Ousley, Tarboro made a motion that the details of purchasing the trailer be left to the Executive Committee. The motion carried.

68. The resolution committee presented resolutions 2, 3, and 4 which were adopted, (copies of which may be found in the reports).

69. John T. Coley, Chairman of the Time, Place and Preacher committee made the following report, which was adopted as presented:

Time: Tuesday and Wednesday after the second Sunday in October, 1952.

Place: Tuesday—Enfield Baptist Church: Wednesday—Piney Grove Baptist Church, Martin County.

Preacher: R. E. Ferguson, Robersonville.

Alternate: P. M. Hutchinson, Rocky Mount.

70. Wistar Hamilton, Washington, Chairman of the committee to receive churches, reported that Trinity Baptist Church, Tarboro, had made application for membership in the Association and made a motion that their request be granted. The motion was adopted.

71. Carl L. Ousley, Tarboro, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, made the following report which was adopted as presented: S. S. Supt., E. E. Ulrich; Training Union Director, E. W. Price, Jr.; W. M. U. Supt., Mrs. Leland Kitchin, Sr.; Brotherhood Pres. A. L. Cobb; Supt. Evangelism, Ralph E. Ferguson.

72. A motion was made that L. Grady Burgiss, Missionary, represent the Association at the meeting of the State Convention. The motion was adopted.

73. A motion was made that the Moderator elected represent the Association at the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention. The motion was adopted.

74. Under the title, "Election of Officers," E. W. Holmes, Farmville and Clyde E. Bausom, Wilson, were nominated to be Moderator. Mr. Holmes requested that his name be withdrawn and that Mr. Baucom, who was not present at this session, be elected by acclamation. A motion was made to that effect and unanimously adopted.

75. Mr. Holmes was nominated to be Vice Moderator and elected by acclamation.

76. A motion was made and carried that the Moderator and Vice Moderator be recognized as ex-officio members of the Executive Committee.

77. Due to the fact that Mr. Baucom was named a member of the Executive Committee, after his election to be Moderator, E. E. Ulrich, Wilson, was named to replace him on this committee.

78. R. L. Collins, Sharpsburg, was reelected Clerk; W. W. Eagles, Macclesfield, was reelected Auditor; W. L. Howell, Williamston, was reelected Treasurer.

79. The closing address was presented by L. Grady Burgiss, Associational Missionary.

80. The offering to be used in purchasing a house trailer was received and amounted to \$289.60.

81. The hymns, "Best Be The Tie" and "Lead On, O King Eternal," were sung. The closing prayer was offered by Stewart B. Simms, Richmond, Virginia.

REPORTS

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

I. PREVIEW:

The Executive Committee of the Roanoke Association gives here a brief summary of what it has done to help promote our Baptist work during the past year. As this survey was made and this report was written, it was thrilling to the Committee to know that it had the privilege of having a part in such a wonderful program.

II. REVIEW:

1. **THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE** has held five meetings since the Association last met. These meetings were held in Williamston, Wilson, Washington, Grifton and Rocky Mount. Each meeting was well attended. No group of men in the Roanoke Association could have manifested more interest in the work than those of your Executive Committee.

2. **MISSIONARY**—At the last session of the Association the Executive Committee was charged with the responsibility of calling a missionary to the work in the great Roanoke Association. Your Committee accepted this task with joy and went out for such a person in the spirit of prayer. After much consideration and prayer the Committee decided that it should seek a man to do **PRIMARY MISSION WORK**.

Your Committee interviewed several men and drove many miles in search of such a man. Finally, the Committee learned of our present missionary, The Rev. L. Grady Burgiss. After having a conference with Brother Burgiss, the Committee was led to offer the work to him, and through the providence of God he was led to accept. The Executive Committee feels that Grady Burgiss is the best missionary in the South.

3. **TENT**—At the last meeting of the Association an offering was taken for the purpose of purchasing a tent and its equipment. The offering amounted to \$750. The Executive Committee was asked to purchase the tent. After some investigations were made the Committee found that the tent would cost approximately \$1,500. The Committee immediately mailed a letter to each of the churches in the Association asking for donations to the tent fund. The response was very good. The tent was bought and has been used in three meetings by our missionary. You will see the tent on the church lawn today.

4. At the Wilson meeting of the Executive Committee, The Rev. E. E. Ulrich recommended the program of the Baptist Builder's Club. The recommendation was unanimously adopted and Brother Ulrich was asked to head a committee to promote this work in our Association. The Club has been accepted by the people in the Association in a very fine way.

The money raised through this Club is to help weak, struggling churches, and to promote new work in unchurched areas. It is the hope of the Executive Committee that the Baptist Builder's Club will be accepted as an agency of the Association.

SOME ITEMS TO CONSIDER

1. **TRAVEL EXPENSES:**—Counting the 9,165 miles traveled in the work at 6 cents a mile amounts to \$549.90. The Association's allotment for travel for the five month period was \$250.00. The work at Rocky Mount paid \$52.55 on the extra travel there. This left a net loss of \$247.35 to the Missionary in his travel expenses. Should the Missionary seek to reduce his travel so as to conform to the amount of his allotment for travel? It is hoped that he will not have to travel as much in the winter as in the summer.

2. **A KODAK AND PICTURES:**—Early in the summer, upon the advice of a member of the Committee, the Missionary bought a camera suitable for making color slides of the Mission work of the Association. Total cost of the camera and case was \$36.45, with \$18.95 having been spent for films, making a total of \$55.40 spent.

3. **AN ADDRESSOGRAPH NEEDED:**—The Missionary and his wife spend a day or more each month addressing the 500 or so pieces of mail necessary to send out the Roanoke Baptist Review. An Addressograph could reduce this time to an hour or so.

4. **PLANS FOR THE WINTER:**—Your Missionary's plans for the winter are—

- 1) To seek to strengthen the smaller Churches,
 - A. By visiting and working with them and their Pastors,
 - B. By conducting special services, if desired,
 - C. By leading them to improve their facilities, and
 - D. By making surveys of their possibilities.
- 2) To inform the stronger Churches of our Asso. work and the needs.
- 3) To initiate new work in Greenville, if thought advisable.
- 4) To maintain and strengthen our new work.
5. PLAINS FOR NEXT SUMMER:—
 - 1) To survey more needs of the Association, in various parts.
 - 2) To resume tent work under the direction of the Tent Committee.
6. SOME POSSIBILITIES OF ENLARGING THE WORK:—
 - 1) By using two Summer Workers:—
 - A. One to go before the Missionary and Tent Work, to make surveys, and to prepare for the coming meeting.
 - B. Another to leave with the newly established work until the local leadership gets adjusted to their new work.
 - 2) A house trailer for the Missionary, to allow him to stay on the location of new work for visitation, day-time children's classes and other needed activities, assisted by his wife.
 - 3) *SOME PROBLEMS ATTACHED TO THE ABOVE POSSIBILITIES:—*
 - A. The expense of the necessary room and board of the two additional workers, as well as travel expenses.
 - B. The cost of the house trailer, which would be in the range of \$1,200.00 to \$1,800.00.

(COMMENT:—Perhaps it would be well for the Executive Committee to instruct its Tent Committee, or a Special Committee, to give some study to this matter before it is considered for any action.)

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS:

A. In keeping with the program of the Southern Baptist Convention emphasizing and majoring on evangelism and in keeping with the expressed desire of the pastors in the Roanoke Association, we hereby recommend that the Roanoke Association promote plans for an Association-wide, simultaneous evangelistic crusade beginning on April 20, 1952 and continuing for two weeks thereafter; that Brother Ralph E. Ferguson of Robersonville be asked to serve as general chairman and that our missionary be asked to serve as Associational Organizer for the crusade.

B. We recommend that the Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club be accepted by the Association as a special Missions Agency to secure and disburse funds from its members to assist in the construction, enlarging, repairing and altering of church buildings of cooperative Baptists and to help establish new work within the bounds of our Association. We further recommend that the Executive Committee of our Association be instructed to name a committee of nine members, five of which shall be from its own body and four from the Association at large, which committee shall direct the activities of the Baptist Builder's Club under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

C. Since the Constitution as it appears in the last printed minutes includes two methods for the selection of the Executive Committee, we recommend:

First, that article fourteen (14) be adhered to during and until the close of this session;

Second, that after this session, article fourteen (14) be dropped from the Constitution and that article fifteen (15) be adhered to, by which the Association itself shall elect its Executive Committee.

Third, that the numbering of the articles shall be appropriately changed to conform at all times with the dropping or adding of articles.

D. In view of the dynamic program of the Brotherhood of the South, and wanting to claim its values for the Roanoke Association, your Executive Committee recommends:

First, that we organize for the Roanoke Baptist Association a Brotherhood organization to be recognized along with the Associational Sunday School, Training Union and W.M.U. organizations.

Second, that the Constitution of our Association be amended so as to provide the following:

- (a) in article three following the words "Associational Training Union Director," insert the words "Associational Brotherhood President."
- (b) in article fifteen (15) following the words "Associational Training Union Director," insert the words "Associational Brotherhood President."

Third, that the Nominating Committee for this year and successive years be asked to place in nomination the name of a man for this position.

E. In keeping with the instruction of the Association of its last annual session, the Executive Committee is hereby submitting for your consideration the following proposed budget for the year 1951-52.

MODERATOR'S ADDRESS

You will observe that the Program Committee has scheduled for this hour, an address by the Moderator, which address, I suppose, is to review the work of the past year and lay before this Association a challenge as we look into the coming year.

Let me say, at the outset, that I count it a signal honor to have served you in this capacity. I think my election last year as Moderator of Roanoke Association was the biggest surprise I have ever experienced. The confidence you placed in me deeply humbled me, and repeatedly throughout the year, I have sought wisdom, strength and guidance from our Heavenly Father as we faced various problems and launched new ventures in the Association.

I want to express my sincere appreciation of and love for the fine men who have served effectively and efficiently on the Executive Committee, and for the leaders of every department of our work. Whatever successes we may have achieved during the year, these are the ones who have done the work.

As I look back over the year, I am impressed with the feeling that we have had a good year. The spirit of our people has been fine. The cooperation has been excellent. I think that the reports which shall be given to you by your executive committee and by the leaders of the various phases of our work will reveal that it has been a year marked by progress. We have indeed lengthened our cords and strengthened our stakes. We have witnessed growth in our organizations; new missionary zeal and evangelistic outreach in the entire program.

Three things stand out in my mind as being particularly note-worthy.

First, the calling of our new missionary.

When our last annual session adjourned, you placed upon your Executive Committee the task of securing for the Roanoke Association a new Missionary succeeding Bro. Cyrus W. Bazemore. The Executive Committee asked its chairman, W. D. Morris, Clyde E. Baucom, W. W. Eagles and your Moderator to serve on a special committee to seek out a man for this position. This group gave itself loyally to the assigned task, making a number of inquiries and investigations, contacting several men and interviewing them. As best we knew how, we sought to be led of the Holy Spirit.

In keeping with the spirit of our people at the meeting last year, and in keeping with the missionary emphasis which we proposed for our work this year, we had endeavored to find a man who could effectively major in primary Mission work, establishing new Baptist work in various parts of our Association territory. We wanted our missionary to be a real missionary.

Under God, we believe, we were led to L. Grady Burgiss, pastor of the Baptist Church in Jacksonville, N. C. In his own field, he had led in a most constructive way, witnessing the growth of that church in almost miraculous proportions, leading them to undertake new construction, and also to sponsor and promote a new Baptist work in Jacksonville. When the committee contacted him with reference to the possibility of his coming to the Roanoke, we discovered that there had been in his heart for many years a genuine interest in primary mission work, and a desire to devote his time and efforts to the promotion of this type of work for his Master.

After due and prayerful consideration, we asked him to become our Missionary, and God laid it upon his heart to come. I am happy to be able to formally present to you and introduce to you, for the first time in annual session convened, Brother L. Grady Burgiss, Missinary of the Roanoke Baptist Association. You will hear from him later in the program, but I want him to stand now and be recognized.

It is my conviction that he is one of God's choice servants and that his work here in our midst will be fruitful and profitable. As you come to know him better, and feel the warmth of his Christian spirit, the zeal of his missionary heart, you will love him more and more. My prayer is that God may bless him and his ministry in this Association.

Secondly, the purchasing of our Gospel tent.

Catching the vision which your Moderator and Executive Committee shared concerning primary Missionary work and the need in our Association for a Gospel tent, and being stirred to action by the appeal so ably presented by laymen from our committee, you, the people of the churches in the Roanoke, took two special offerings at our meeting last Fall to start a fund which would be used to purchase and equip such a tent. These offerings were supplemented by direct offerings from a number of our churches, and the tent with its equipment was purchased under the direction of a committee headed by Clyde E. Baucom of Wilson. The tent will seat around 200 people and is made of flame-proof material.

Our missionary proved to be adept at handling tools, and set out to construct most of the items to furnish and equip the tent. A rostrum, a

pulpit and various storage cabinets were constructed in an ingenious manner permitting the folding and dissembling of items in a minimum of time, and storage in a minimum of space. You will have opportunity to observe the tent and its equipment today, for our Missionary has had it raised on the church property here for your inspection, and also to take care of overflow accommodations at this session.

One of the wisest pastors in this Association wrote to me some months ago and said: "I am glad that the tent has been purchased. It is the first really practical step taken in our missionary enterprise for the Association."

I will leave it to Brother Burgiss to tell you in more detail of the use to which he has put the tent during the past few months, but suffice it here to say that it has been dedicated to the glory of God and has been used several weeks already in service for Him.

Thirdly, the creation of the Roanoke Baptist Builders' Club.

Seeking to meet a need which was pressing, and which could not be met in any other manner, your Executive Committee appointed a subcommittee to carefully study and work out plans for the organization of a Builders' club in our Association, the purpose of which would be to solicit funds and administer funds from its members to aid needy and cooperating Baptist churches and groups in the organization of new work, and in the construction of new buildings. The club set a goal of 1000 members, each of whom would give \$2.00 on call, with a maximum of five calls per year.

Brother E. E. Ulrich of the Five Points Church in Wilson proposed the plan to your committee and has served as chairman of the Builders' club committee during the year. Few people of this Association in my acquaintance could have so ably sparked the Club and led it through its infancy as Brother Ulrich. We shall be interested to hear his report this afternoon giving the progress made by the club up to this hour.

I should like to record my firm conviction that through the medium of this Builders' Club, we shall be able to extend a helping hand to many of our smaller churches in their building projects, and that they shall, in turn, be able to minister more effectively to the people of their communities. This club shall be the instrument through which help shall come to organize new work as our Missionary lays the groundwork and brings together a nucleus for the formation of a mission Sunday School or church.

I believe the Lord looks with favor upon the work this Builders' Club is seeking to do, and I commend it to you for your support.

You will be interested to know that requests have come to us from other associations in our State concerning the operation of the club, stating that they were interested in using it in their own territory. A leader of Baptist work in the State of Kansas wrote to inquire about the plan, feeling that it could be put into operation on a state-wide basis to the enlarging and strengthening of the Baptist churches throughout that state.

Best of all, in connection with all these noteworthy advances of the past year, is the fact that they will all be more effective and useful in the work of our Lord during the years to come than they have been during this initial year. Our Missionary has indicated his desire, within the will of God,

to give himself to this work in our midst for years to come, feeling that his best work will perhaps be done after the first years of organizing and developing.

The tent will be used more often, and more efficiently and more effectively next summer and succeeding summers than it has been this past summer. Our Missionary is mapping out plans now for a more effective tent ministry in 1952, and he will present them to you tomorrow afternoon.

The Builders' club, just now coming into its own, just now beginning to disburse funds, will be a blessing in the coming years.

I believe that under the sovereign leadership of God, and with the continued spirit of Missionary and Evangelistic outreach in the leadership of the Association, of its churches, and in the hearts and souls of the men and women throughout the length and breadth of the Roanoke, brighter and more glorious days of service and achievement lie before you than any you have yet known.

We need to say with the Apostle Paul: "One thing I do, forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus." (Phillippians 3:13-14, RSV).

May the Lord let His blessing rest upon this annual session. May He guide our deliberations, controlling our minds and spirits. May we let Him lead us to venture yet further in faith, undertaking an ever-enlarging program of service for Him and in His name.

I believe the Simultaneous Crusade to be the greatest movement ever launched by Southern Baptists. The simultaneous evangelistic program brought the Baptist of the South together in a united effort to win the lost to Christ and eternal life.

I am happy to report that the program was well received by our people in the Roanoke Association and a good per cent of our churches co-operated. People planned, prayed and worked in preparation for this great campaign. We prepared for revival, and God sent a revival in the Roanoke.

Three great rallies were held in preparation for these revivals. One in Rocky Mount March 12th; One in Weldon March 13th; One in Robersonville March 14th. Rev. J. C. Canipe, secretary of evangelism for the state convention spoke at each rally.

Reports were received from 27 of our churches. The reports from these 27 churches show: 454 baptisms; 157 received by letter and statement; 5 surrendered for definite christian service and 180 rededications.

This report from only 27 churches clearly shows that by God's grace the crusade was a great success in our association.

Your chairmen of evangelism feels that much credit for the successfulness of the campaign is due these men who gave of their time and talent serving on committees in their respective counties: Rev. S. B. Simms, Rev. E. R. Stewart, Rev. Paul B. Nickens, Rev. W. W. Hamilton, Mr. Guy Swindell, Rev. J. J. Johnson, Rev. R. E. Hardaway, Mr. J. H. Boyd, Rev. E. G. Cole, Rev. A. H. Stainback, Rev. W. C. Francis, Rev. Carl Lee Ousley, Rev. H. C. Lowder, Rev. S. H. Roberts, Rev. B. M. White-Hurst, Rev. W. D. Morris, Rev. G. L. Price, Rev. C. E. Baucom, Rev. E. Evans Ulrich, Mr. S. G. Chappell.

Plans are now being made for simultaneous revivals in the churches of the Roanoke next spring. Revivals to begin the Sunday after Easter.

BAPTIST BUILDERS CLUB

Born at meeting of Executive Committee at Wilson in the fall of 1950. Committee appointed to formulate plans.

Plans were to solicit a group of 1000 memberships who would pay \$2 into the fund and agree to contribute an additional \$2 on call, such funds to be used exclusively for the purpose of building new, and enlarging, improving or altering existing co-operative Missionary Baptist Churches within the territorial limits of our association. It was agreed that no call for funds would be issued until the funds of the previous call were all allocated to within \$100; and not more than five calls would be issued in any one year. The funds are to be used in their entirety with no deduction for expenses.

The club became active in January 1951 and the kick off presentation was to the Association W. M. U. meeting in this church. The chairman spoke in 18 churches in the interest of the club and contacted every church through the pastors.

From most churches the response has been splendid.

There have been received 715 memberships and a total cash receipt of \$1550.20, some folks paying on advance calls.

The committee has made a grant of \$1550 to Trinity Church at Tarboro to complete their building on condition that they raise a like amount which they did. We anticipate several additional requests notably from Pactolus, Holdens Cross Roads, Grifton and Rocky Mount Fair Grounds Community, but we need to complete our initial organization before we can make further grants.

The chairman is grateful for the fine cooperation he has received from the committee and the churches. He wants to pay tribute also to the untiring zeal of Miss Gertrude Lewis of Wilson who has acted as secretary and has kept an excellent set of accounts, all without compensation.

The entire committee looks forward to a great year of achievement in the building of new churches where so sorely needed in our association.

We are pleased to report that our Churches throughout the Association are becoming more and more interested in attaining the very best in Training Unions. We have attempted this year to impress upon the pastors the need of Unions in their heretofore Sunday-Evening-Darkened-Churches. We have also endeavored to urge Departments to complete the organization of Unions and Story Hours, resulting in fully graded systems. Many Churches have reported the additions of such Unions to the already organized and functioning Departments and it has proven to be most encouraging to note the several Churches that have begun, for the first time, work in the Training Union field, experiencing rich and fruitful harvests at an early stage of development. Then, in addition, the Extension Department of Wake Forest's Baptist Student Union has been most helpful in conducting Training Union demonstrations throughout our territory when an invitation was extended them. Insofar as the Associational Training Union officers were concerned, a course was offered them in Roanoke Rapids early in the year at which time Associate *Biblical Recorder* editor C. W. Bazemore taught the manual for our work. Practically all our officers attended this interesting meeting.

We believe that the ones attending the "M" Night Mass Rally on December 4, 1950 received special blessings as we "mobilized" for Christ. The meeting was held in the auditorium of Rocky Mount's First Church and we were highly pleased with the large representation attending in spite of most unpleasant weather conditions. The second Associational-wide Rally was held at Farmville Church on March 16th as we attended the "Tournament and Youth Rally" there. The beautiful sanctuary was filled to capacity.

May God grant that we become more Training Union conscious as we approach and enter a period in which Christianity will be sorely tested and tried as never before . . . a time in which the child of God ought to be prepared to cope with tempting problems and oftentimes disheartening situations. Training for greater service for the Master comes to Christians through the media of this almost indispensable organization of our Baptist curricula. The most of us feel the tremendous necessity pressing upon us for a shedding of the unnecessary and a rearming for Christ. Training Union answers this call to service!

W. M. U. REPORT TO ROANOKE ASSOCIATION

This is the fourth time I have brought a W. M. U. report to this Association. I remember that in the other three I have done my best in my fifteen minutes to paint a picture for you of the missionary needs of the world and have mentioned the Advance Program each time. I have had a feeling of being constrained to do this since that particular phase of missions was not mentioned anywhere else on the program. But tonight, I rejoice that I have someone here with me who will speak in a few minutes and who can really give you an idea of our world program for missions. Therefore, I am going to limit my report to our work in the Roanoke Association and try to give you a better understanding of our Woman's Missionary Union.

To begin with I would like to thank the pastors in our association for their loyal help and support. You have been most kind and considerate and we appreciate it. And I might add, we are going to ask you for further support.

Let us begin with organizations. In our 82 churches we have a total of 254 organizations, namely 66 G. A.s, 49 Sunbeams, 28 Y. W. A.s, and 34 R. A.s and 77 societies. This means that for missionary societies we now have 5 churches in our organization that have not yet been reached. They are Mildred, Pinetown, South Creek, Stanhope, and Trinity at Tarboro. I have had reports on some of these saying the time was not yet ripe for a W. M. S. but I am asking that you please remember these churches and help us in any way that you can. Actually, however, we really need your help more with the young people's work. For example, in our 82 churches we only have 28 Y. W. A.s. Now, a Y. W. A. is for young unmarried girls from 17 to 25 years of age, about the tenderest and most beautiful period of a girls' life, but one in which she is subjected to marry temptations, and in which she has a tendency to drift away from the church. We believe our program has a steadying influence on her life, teaching her Christian ideals and the joy of Christian service. Many young women dedicate themselves to full time Christian work through the influence of the Y. W. A.

And may I tell here something of a Y. W. A. Camp at Ridgecrest that I attended a few years ago? There were between eleven and twelve hundred fine young Christian girls of this age. And what a good time they had. One of them said to me, "Mrs. Kitchin, I have never been anywhere like this before, I did not know there was such a place. Why, I have not seen a girl smoke or been offered a drink since I was here. I think it is wonderful!" And then the night that the invitation was given to dedicate themselves to full time Christian work! I was like that girl. I had never seen anything like it. I heard the noise of footsteps—almost of marching—and looking around I saw girls answering this call from every direction. From the balconies they came, from the rear they poured, the aisles were full. They crowded on the platform, and when that was full they stood around the platform, thereby indicating that they were giving their lives in complete surrender to God. That service is one of the high spots of my life.

And then on the last night one of the most beautiful services I have ever seen was the candlelight service. After a stirring message we were asked to come forward and light a candle by the large one on the table if we wished to thus publicly show our intention of going home and letting our light shine brighter for our Lord. I think everyone responded to that invitation, and as we walked out into the night with our lighted candles we gathered around Lake Dew and sang our favorite hymns. The beauty of this scene I will never forget. The dark trees in the background, the moonlight on the water, the complete circle of lighted candles reflected in the lake and bringing into relief the faces of the girls so exalted in this moment of high purpose.

Our next weakest group is with the boys for we only have 34 R. A. chapters. And since in some churches we have 2 chapters—one for juniors and one for intermediates—there are 53 churches without a missionary organization for boys. I do not have to say anything to you of the importance of this group. These who in a few short years will be our pastors, our secretaries, our missionaries, our deacons, and our laymen. To neglect them now is inviting denominational suicide. It is a cause of a great deal of con-

cern on my part to see in the churches a tendency toward thinking of missions as a woman's work. I am afraid that some of our boys think of missions as effeminate and somehow connected with an afternoon teaparty. Nothing could be further from the truth. If there is anything in the world that takes sheer, red-blooded, virile courage—physical and spiritual—if there is any cause in the world to which daring young men could pledge their undying loyalty it is missions.

Many of our young men have learned this the hard way as they have fought for their freedom in foreign lands. I am thinking of the young man who became ill in Africa during World War II. He wrote to his mother enclosing a sketch of himself as follows: "Dear Mom, Where x is I had a pain. Simply terrific. No surgeon in our outfit so they flew me over the jungle to a mission hospital. Imagine my feelings when I found the only surgeon was a young fellow about my age but as black as ink. And the only nurse was even blacker. Kitchen table was his only operating table. I thought, 'Good Night! And me so young and handsome!' So they put me to sleep. And when I woke up I felt swell. There was my appendix in a bottle, looking kinda cute, so I thought I'd try to mail it to you. Thought it might be a comfort to have that much of me home safe in Ohio. But no can do in wartime it seems. Sorry.

How come you never told your son and heir about this mission stuff? It's simply terrific. Take this place; no running water, no electric lights. One nurse. One M. D. But everything as clean as a whistle. And this M. D. has a smile straight out of the Bible. Before he operates he closes his eyes. I guess to ask God to please stand by. And he sure does. It's terrific.

Folks get sicker here than they do in Ohio. Sleeping sickness flies bite your toes. Elephants gore your back. Enemies poison your food. So this fellow mends all these broken people back to good as new again. He just loves you into getting better. His voice booms like a church bell. He just gets you. He makes you believe in something you can't talk about. So when I left I gave him all the money I had in my pants. But of course, it was not nearly enough. So now I wish you'd get Pop to go to the top hospital in our town and ask the top surgeon what is the top price for taking the top appendix out of the top millionaire. And then I wish you'd make Pop send it back to this black saint here. For, Mom, he's tops!" Needless to add. Pop did.

I am so glad that this young man has learned "about this mission stuff" even tho it was from an African doctor trained by a missionary—but let us not take such a chance with our boys. Let us give them the best that we have and even a son in the family needs the love and discipline of both father and mother so the boys of our churches need the guiding hand of both the men and women. Help them to become nobler as they repeat their allegiance: "I assert my allegiance to Jesus Christ, my desire to live for Him and serve Him always. 'I will live Pure, speak Truth, Right Wrong, Follow the Christ the King, Else wherefore born?' "

Now, I want to tell you of one more way in which we need help and with that I close. The combined membership of our W. M. U. is in round numbers 5700. Of these 4700 contribute regularly through the Cooperative Program,

for as you know, we no longer keep a record of how much we give through the Cooperative Program but rather how many give. In this way we try to emphasize this offering which we all know is the foundation of our work. But here is where I think we are weakest. Of our 5700 members only 1500 tithe. Of course I am proud of these for that is a good increase in the last few years but when I think of the more than 4000 members that do not, I am very anxious.

We as Baptists claim to believe the whole Bible. We say we do not want any creed save that we find in the Bible. But are we consistent? The Bible plainly teaches that we are stewards of God and that He requires of us a tenth. He promises to bless those who obey that he will indeed open the Windows of Heaven and pour out such a blessing that there will not be room enough to receive it. Suppose all the Baptists in the Roanoke Association tithed. Think what could be done with the money. Every church could afford a building ample for its needs, we could build the new churches that Mr. Burgiss tells us we need, we could have more and better paid preachers and still help support the denominational program at home and abroad. And I believe that God would strengthen us to the extent that we could rise up and drive many evils from our borders with a mighty hand. "If my people which are called by my name shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from Heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOME FOR AGING

The North Carolina Baptist State Convention in its November, 1950, session authorized the committee on the Home for the Aging to make plans for the opening and operation of our Home for the Aging as soon as the committee might find a way to meet the cost of equipping and operating. Because of the drive to raise money for the construction of the new wing to the Baptist Hospital, the Convention instructed the committee for the Home not to expect direct help from the Baptist State Convention during the year 1951.

On January 9, the committee on the Home elected Rev. James M. Hayes, pastor of North Winston Baptist Church, Winston-Salem, superintendent of the Home, and Miss Edna Heinzerling, director of Nurses of the Baptist Hospital, to serve as supervisor of our Home. The committee decided to open the Home for residents when sufficient funds became available to begin.

There are many evidences of the Lord's favor upon the Home thus far. In the first place, He led in making a home immediately available. Ten years ago the trustees of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest College leased a three-story, brick-constructed, fireproof building, with an elevator, for a period of 25 years for \$1.00 a year. The committee on the Home was able to secure this building for 15 years at the same rental price. The building accommodates 20 residents at present. The top floor, if completed, would give space for 16 additional residents. The completion of this

floor would cost approximately \$23,000. With more than 100 applications for admission already received, and inquiries coming almost daily, one can easily see the pressing need of more space.

The Home has been greatly helped by the gifts received - furniture, office equipment, heating system, blankets, linens, towels, and many other items, as well as discounts on supplies necessary to be purchased. Although the Home has been operating only since March 16, yet it now has assets approximating \$50,000, and is not operating in the red.

Our residents range from 67 to 91 years, and come from widely scattered sections of North Carolina - from Franklin to Elizabeth City - the mountains to the sea. Regardless of the sections from which they come, they are a happy, congenial family, all rejoicing in the opportunity to live in the Home. The attitude of all the residents is well expressed in the brief statements of Miss Bertha Callaway, former matron of Mills Home Orphanage: "I would like this good Christian home"; and of Mrs. Carroll: "I wouldn't exchange it for any other."

The Home offers four things to those who come to live there: security, comfort, congeniality, and a Christian ministry. With this sort of program North Carolina Baptists can add years to life, and life to years for those who reside in our Baptist Home for the Aging.

One donor said when he sent his check to the Home: "I believe in this practical kind of Christianity. North Carolina Baptists have waited too long to begin it.' Surely it is practical, for Jesus said: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

The committee on the Home has challenged North Carolina Baptists to build a home adequate to meet the need of the increasing number of old people from 65 years up. Their program calls for a million dollar plant, which would accommodate 270 residents. With the Lord leading and North Carolina Baptists cooperating, such a plant should be built and in operation within a few years.

"Now also when I am old and grayheaded, O God, forsake me not" (Psalm 71:18).

PROCEEDINGS

The Halifax County societies were hostess to the Women's Missionary Union of the Roanoke Baptist Association, Thursday, April 18, 1951, which met in the Scotland Neck Baptist Church for the forty-fourth annual session with Mrs. L. H. Kitchin, Associational Superintendent presiding. Mrs. Kitchin opened the meeting with a few remarks charging the congregation which was followed by prayer. The congregation then sang "O Worship The King."

Mrs. Kitchin then introduced Mrs. Hocutt, Divisional Chairman, from Clayton, North Carolina, and Mr. Josey, Mrs. Kitchin's brother from Charleston, South Carolina, who brought us organ selections during the program.

Mrs. Hocutt brought a most inspiring devotional, "Found Faithful." She recalled a house party at the N. B. Josey home during her college years, and stressed the influence of their family alter prior to breakfast each morning. In meditating on God is Faithful, she asked "How do you know God is faithful? As the song 'Jesus Loves Me For the Bible tells Me So'—from I Cor. 9, 'prayer is the mightiest force in the world.' Nothing lies on the outside of the power of prayer, except that which is against the will of God." "We have sinned and still are, because we have not released the will of God through prayer. Peace is at stake; shall we keep it thus? There is darkness today as there was 2000 years ago. Through the birth of Christ, life came to the world." Mrs. Hocutt then showed a Christmas card on which there was a picture of a colored child. Underneath the picture was written, "My, Child! Wouldn't it be dark if it won't for the stars?" Jesus said, "Do ye unto others as ye would have them do unto you," adding, no doubt, 'and ye will have peace.' Faith functions where intelligence fails." Mrs. Hocutt recalled headlines in the News & Observer the day before of a plane crash. If they had been a few feet higher, they would have made it. Are our prayers in this state? She then showed two pictures of a colored boy, John Ruffin, who was Doctor Hocutt's nurse during his illness. She thought that she might compensate his kindness to Doctor Hocutt by sending him to Shaw University, but his education was interrupted by a call to service. He is now in Korea. These two pictures of him—one at Fort Sumter and one at

Korea—had written on them, the first, a picture in front of a chapel at Fort Sumter, "A friend in Christ"; the second a picture in war-torn Korea, "Faith is a dream all hearts know. I have not seen it, yet it walks with me. I shall face life and death with fearless eyes." She then closed with a prayer for world peace.

Mr. Josey then rendered at the organ with chime variations, "Sweet Hour of Prayer." At this time, the following committees were appointed:

It has been suggested that we have a floating library in our Association. Mrs. William Quinnerly of Ayden reported for the library committee. "Each county leader at her county meeting in May will ask members to bring any books that they might wish to contribute to this. They, in turn, will be turned over to the library committee who will attend to the circulation of them."

At this time, the following visitors and special guests were recognized by Mrs. Kitchin: Mr. and Mrs. Grady Burgiss and son, Sammy, our new Associational Missionary; Mary Frances Goodrich, GA Ranking Assistant; Mrs. Allen from Clayton, who was with Mrs. Hocutt; Miss Marie Epley and Miss Irene Chambers from State WMU Headquarters. Mrs. Kitchin reminded us of Mrs. Beasley's recent election as Vice-President of the State WMU. She has been on the State executive board for several years. We do consider that it is an honor to the Roanoke Association to have three members of the State Executive Board, namely, Miss Em Austin, Mrs. Beasley, and Mrs. Kitchin.

At this time, Mrs. G. C. Taylor, Halifax County Leader, made announcements as to our luncheon hour and also added a word of welcome.

In our enlistment program, Mrs. Edgar Joyner stated that in 82 Churches of our Association, there are 76 WMS. Our goal for 1951 is to reach the six Churches who have no WMS. The responsibility of these Churches with no WMS was given as follows:

Mrs. C. M. Smith, in reporting on the missionary education of our youth, said that of 82 Churches, 19 have no junior organizations. Our goal for 1951 is to organize junior organizations in Churches where there are none. There were no new organizations in 1950. Thirty-nine Churches do not have a Sun Beam; 51 Churches with no YWA; 52 Churches with no RA's. There are many opportunities for your young people's organizations in our Association. The yoke of Jesus, or the yoke of the world—"My yoke is easy and my burden is light"—we may be faithful and not successful. We may look a failure and yet go home victorious.

Mrs. John Coley spoke from her heart instead of giving a statistical report. She said, "Every Church should have a YWA. The only reason given sometimes is not girls, but no leaders. This is not a reason—only an excuse. With material anyone can lead. If we organize and work, it will not die.

COMMUNITY MISSIONS REPORT

Faithfulness in witnessing is a wonderful headline for a community missions report. Soulwinning has always been first and foremost in our program; and this year, as we planned to cooperate with all Southern Baptists in the Evangelistic Crusade, we have endeavored to enlist every W.M.S. and young peoples organization.

In compiling a report for a year's work, one is subjected to conflicting emotions—joy and gratitude for the work well done, and sadness because we have not reached our goal.

For this report I looked back a few years in order to see if we really are going forward. In 1947, fifty-seven organizations reported 575 individuals making definite efforts in soulwinning. For this quarter of 1951 ending March 31, seventy-nine organizations reported 1069 individual workers—a gain of 22 organizations and 494 workers. This is no spectacular increase, but the slow steady growth of enduring strength; I feel sure of this.

Many of our Churches have participated in the crusade and already reports show a great harvest of souls. Winning a person to Christ is just half the task committed to us Christians. Jesus said, "Make disciples," but he also said, "Teach them to observe."

Remember that Jesus said to the man possessed with devils—"Go home to thy friends and tell them how great things the Lord has done for Thee." As mature members of the Church, we must do our part in helping to develop those who are spiritually. Vacation Bible Schools present wonderful opportunities for the new worker, and community missions chairmen are the individuals to suit the right task to the right worker. God grant that we continue to be faithful witnesses for the Master.

The only way to estimate results of Stewardship work is in the amount of gifts and number of tithers. Our report shows an increase in gifts. Surely we can take that as an indication that our members are developing in their concept and practice of the stewardship of possessions as they have brought into the Lord's treasury their tithes and offerings to reach this goal.

During the past year we gained 255 tithers. While this is gratifying we must realize that we are far from reaching the goal of "Every member of W.M.U. a tither."

So many of our members are not tithers and so are still failing to measure up to the first requirement of faithful stewardship of possessions.

I feel that our weakest point is that we are not educating our young people to be good stewards of *not only possessions*, but of *time* and talent. You heard in my report that only 10 societies promoted stewardship emphasis week. Are we failing in our duty to these young people? They are our future builders.

My plea is that you take this business of stewardship more seriously.

“It is not necessary to be wealthy in order to be liberal. Jesus commended the liberality of the very poor widow. Paul, writing of the churches of Macedonia, spoke of the “riches of their liberality” out of “their deep poverty”, adding that “according to their power. . . yea and beyond their power, they gave of their own accord” (2 Cor. 8:2, 3).

Women who do not have a salary, those who have very little money coming into their hands, can nevertheless give “accordingly to their power and of their own accord.” Sometime in your life a contribution of ten cents may be more liberal than one of ten dollars at other times. Jesus knows the true size of each gift we bring.

Will you examine your spirit and feelings as you put tithes and offerings into God’s hands? Will you look not only at what you give but also at how and why you give? Giving to God should be joyous giving. It is high privilege to place a part of what we have made into His hands, to do what it may under His guidance, reinforced with His power. Giving is also fellowship in ministering. In your giving, prove that you abound in this grace also.

The stewardship task is not finished. A new slogan, “Every Tither Win a Tither” challenges to effort in stewardship enlistment. If Southern Baptists are to make the desired advance in world missions, we must advance in faithfulness to stewardship ideals. We must teach good stewardship! We must demonstrate good stewardship! More tithes must be faithfully paid! More gifts must be generously given! Only by such an advance in stewardship of tithes and offerings can we make possible an advanced missionary program to meet the challenge of this day of world need.

First of all I would like to say that all the figures presented in this report are approximately correct. They are not absolutely correct because some of our societies failed to send in their reports, and therefore my figures may be somewhat off. However, to the best of my knowledge, the following facts are true:

- (1) We gained one new W. M. S. this year. Tillery comes to join us again this year, having made a new start during the year and showing real promise already.
- (2) We gave to the Cooperative Program around \$6800 and to the Special Offerings around \$3900.
- (3) During the year we gained 175 members, 790 members in all being reported at the end of the year.
- (4) Our tithers were increased by 59, and we had six churches participating in a Church Night of Stewardship.

- (5) About 60 mission study classes were held with 853 members completing the study.
- (6) We have 10 societies regularly engaged in directed community missions with an average of 479 members participating.
- (7) There are eight societies actively engaged in soul-winning, with an average of 139 members participating.
- (8) As for our fostering activities, we have in the county 8 Sunbeam Bands, 8 Girls Auxiliaries, 5 Royal Ambassadors, and 4 young women's auxiliaries.

I would like to say that I am happy to see the progress being made and earnestly pray that this report, though showing the progress which has been made, will also indicate to all the individual members here from Halifax County the great need for them to take up the Cross and follow Him who said "Ye are my witnesses!"

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. NAME: The name of this body is "Roanoke Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE: It is the purpose of the Association to provide an organization of cooperation for the Baptist churches affiliated with it, and to encourage them to faithfulness in every endeavor which we shall undertake together in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP: The Association shall consist of messengers who are members of the affiliated churches as follows: (1) one messenger from each church and one additional messenger for each one hundred resident members or fraction thereof, up to a maximum of seven messengers, chosen annually by the affiliated churches; (2) the pastors; (3) the duly elected officers of the Association and the current President of the associational W. M. U.

ARTICLE IV. AFFILIATED CHURCHES: Baptist churches which have petitioned for membership and by vote of the Association are accounted to be in fellowship with the purposes and undertakings of this body, shall comprise the list of affiliated churches. The vote of the Association to extend fellowship, or to withdraw fellowship, shall be a two-thirds vote of the messengers present. Failure to report annually to the Association shall raise the question of fellowship.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS: The officers of the Association shall be elected annually by the messengers present at the annual meeting, and shall assume their duties at the close of the annual meeting, and serve until the election of their successors. Officers shall be: Moderator, Vice-moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, (no one of whom may be eligible to serve in the same official capacity for more than five consecutive years); other officers shall be: the members of the Executive Committee, together with the President of the W. M. U. who also shall be accounted an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VI. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: At each annual meeting, or not later than sixty days thereafter, the Executive Committee of the Association shall name a Nominating Committee, consisting of one messenger from each county, whose duty it shall be to bring to the Association at its next annual meeting nominations for all officers of the Association.

ARTICLE VII. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, together with a pastor and a layman from each county where a majority of the Baptist churches are affiliated with this Association, and three members at large. The Executive Committee is charged with the duty of executing the plans and decisions of the Association, including the associational program of missions and extension, and the employment and direction of the associational Missionaries. A full report of its work shall be presented at each

annual meeting, together with plans and recommendations for the promotion and extension of the work of the Association. The Executive Committee shall act for the Association between the annual meetings in conformity with the expressed decisions of the body. A vacancy occurring between annual meetings may be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VIII. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, where not otherwise provided by this Constitution or the Bylaws.

ARTICLE IX. AMENDMENT: This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present, provided: that the proposed amendment has been read to the Association at the previous annual meeting, or not later than the day previous to the vote to be taken on the amendment, and referred to a committee for clarification and correlation.

ARTICLE X. ADOPTION: Upon adoption, this Constitution shall become effective at the close of this the 45th annual session of the Roanoke Baptist Association, and shall supersede any and all previous constitutions and by laws, and cancel any action in conflict with this Constitution.

BY-LAWS OF THE ROANOKE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION*Article 1***MEETINGS**

The meetings of the association shall be held annually at such time and place as may be decided by the association in regular session.

*Article 2***OPENING**

Meetings of the association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

*Article 3***QUORUM**

Representatives from twenty-five of the affiliated churches shall constitute a quorum.

*Article 4***ORDER OF BUSINESS**

An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each annual meeting which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

*Article 5***CHURCH LETTER**

Each affiliated church shall send to the annual meeting of the association, on forms furnished by the clerk, a full report of the church work for the year ending September 30th.

*Article 6***MODERATOR AND VICE-MODERATOR**

The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall preside at all meetings of the association. They shall both be members of the Executive Committee and as opportunity may permit, they shall act as fraternal visitors to the churches throughout the year representing the fellowship of the entire association.

*Article 7***CLERK**

The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association and shall prepare and cause to be published and distributed, as directed by the association or executive committee, minutes and statistics of the association as soon as practical after adjournment. He shall also mail the necessary forms and letters to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the association. A copy of the minutes shall be mailed to the officers, affiliated churches, to each institution participating in the cooperative program, and

such other institutions and individuals as the association or executive committee may direct.

Article 8

TREASURER

The Treasurer shall receive all funds of the association, disburse them according to its order, and present a written report of same to each annual meeting of the association, and additional reports at the request of the executive committee.

Article 9

AUDITOR

The auditor shall examine the books and records of the association and submit a detailed report covering his work at such time as may be required by the Executive Committee or the association.

Article 10

SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The Sunday School Superintendent shall direct and supervise the Sunday School program of the association under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 11

TRAINING UNION DIRECTOR

The Training Union Director shall have charge of the direction and promotion of the Training Union program under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 12

BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood program of the association shall be under the direction of the Brotherhood President subject to the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 13

REVENUE

The contributions of the affiliated churches for the purpose of defraying expenses of the Missionary program and other activities of the association shall be on a resident member basis and shall be in such amount as may be approved by the association from year to year.

Article 14

SALARIES OF OFFICERS

Salaries of the Missionary or Missionaries of the association, as well as any other officer, shall be in such amount as may be provided for in the annual budget and approved by the association from year to year.

*Article 15***BUILDER'S CLUB**

The Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club shall be under the supervision and direction of a committee of nine members to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee, five of which shall be from its own body and four from the association at large. This committee shall direct and supervise the Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club under the supervision of the executive committee. All actions and commitments of the Builder's Club shall be submitted to the Executive Committee for final approval before becoming effective.

*Article 16***STANDING COMMITTEES**

The executive committee at its first session following the annual meeting of the association shall appoint the following committees: Constitution and By-Laws and Finance. The first member named on each committee shall serve as chairman.

It shall be the duty of the committee on Constitution and By-Laws to receive, examine, and make recommendations to the association in session on all proposed amendments to the constitution and by-laws.

It shall be the duty of the Finance committee to supervise the Financial program of the association and report to the executive committee regarding same from time to time. It shall also be the duty of the Finance committee to submit to the executive committee at each annual session a budget giving the estimated revenue for the ensuing term, as well as the itemized proposed expenses for this period.

*Article 17***PROGRAM COMMITTEE**

The program committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the association. This committee shall meet following the close of each annual session and select those who shall write the reports for the next annual meeting. The appointees of the program committee and their assignments shall be printed in the minutes of the annual session.

*Article 18***ASSOCIATIONAL COMMITTEES**

The Moderator, following the convening each annual session of the association, shall appoint the following committees:

1. Committee on place and preacher
2. Committee on resolutions
3. Committee on petitions
4. Any other committees that may be authorized by the association.

*Article 19***MISSIONARY PROGRAM**

The Missionary and extension work of the association shall be under the

direction of the Executive Committee, as well as the Missionary or Missionaries whom they shall employ and direct. The Missionary fund shall be kept and disbursed by the Treasurer as directed by the Executive Committee.

Article 20

MINUTES OF THE ASSOCIATION

The minutes of each annual meeting of the association shall be examined, approved and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before being printed. Said minutes shall be submitted to the first session of the next annual meeting for consideration and approval.

Article 21

VISITORS

Visitors may be invited to participate in the deliberations of the association without the privilege to vote.

Article 22

AMENDMENTS

All amendments or additions to these By-Laws shall be submitted in writing on forms furnished by the association clerk. No amendment to the By-Laws shall be considered by the association until they have been referred to the By-Law Committee. No resolutions adopted by this association shall become a part of these By-Laws.

Article 23

EFFECTIVE DATE

The effective date of these By-Laws or any additions or amendments thereto shall become effective immediately upon passage.

Theme: "Kingdom Building through the Church"

1. On Tuesday morning October the 14th 1952 the 45th Annual Session of the Roanoke Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, Clyde E. Baucom, in the Enfield Baptist Church at 10 o'clock.

REPORTS

SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

As the Sunday School is the recruiting ground for folks to be won to the Lord Jesus Christ and enlisted in his Church, so is the Branch Sunday School the nucleus from which new Churches are established.

The Sunday School department of our association has made marvelous progress this year. A study of the statistical tables compiled from the letters of the Churches will reveal a healthy increase in membership - the spiritual health being demonstrated by the increase in offerings. When Christ is permitted to take his place in one's heart, he automatically rules in the pocket-book also. Reports coming to your superintendent from all over the association applaud the place of the Sunday School in the success of the many revival meetings.

In addition to the numerical growth in the existing Sunday Schools six new Sunday Schools were established this year, four of them as new works under the sponsorship of neighboring churches and two of them as new Sunday Schools in existing churches. The Stokes Church at Stokes and the Pinetown Church at Pinetown both established Sunday Schools. The Stokes Church for many years had been cooperating in a Union Sunday School with a Methodist group in their town but felt that the time was right for a distinctive Baptist Sunday School wherein our precious heritage might be taught; therefore, on November 18, 1951 the Stokes Baptist Sunday School was established. Reports are that each of the two Sunday Schools, Baptist and Methodist, at Stokes are having larger attendance than the Union Sunday School had. Pinetown Church, which had not had a Sunday School, established one in April of 1952. Entirely new Sunday Schools were organized in Edgemont in Rocky Mount, Grifton, Nicholville in Washington, and Pamlico at Pamlico Beach.

During the year also seven new Baptist Churches have been constituted in our association from Sunday Schools. New Baptist Churches are the natural product of Sunday Schools. The Oakview Baptist Church at Rocky Mount, the Edgemont Baptist Church at Rocky Mount, the Grifton Baptist Church at Grifton and the Pamlico Baptist Church at Pamlico Beach are the natural result of the Sunday Schools. The Salem Sunday School which for many years has been a mission of the Hickory Baptist Church was organized as the Salem Baptist Church in January of this year. The Holden's Arm of the Five Points Missionary Baptist Church of Wilson is the result of a two year old Sunday School at Holden's Crossroads and the Nicholville Arm of the First Baptist Church of Washington is a result of the Nicholville Sunday School which is only a year old. Your superintendent is proud to come before you with such a glowing report but is careful to advise you that this must not be construed as a report of the work of the Sunday School Superintendent. A considerable portion of each one of these successes are attributable to the cooperation, to the zeal and industry of the associational missionary. Without his activity under God's direction we would not have these ac-

complishments. The Sunday School Department has plans for the continued cooperative activity for the year ahead following the program of advance by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION

During the past year, the churches of our association have shown an increased interest in Training Union work. Several churches organized unions for the first time and many others have enlarged their work and now have fully graded organizations.

The program this year has had several points of emphasis.

First, we have sought to promote Training Union work in churches which have had no organized training program. It is regrettable that 34 of our 82 churches are in this category. Churches with a strong program were encouraged to help establish the work in churches which had no unions.

Second, we promoted the annual "M" night program. The meeting was held at the First Baptist Church in Scotland Neck, December 10, 1951 with an attendance of 505. An inspirational program on the theme, "Christ Speaks to His Churches" was presented with the Rev. Douglas Aldrich of Raleigh as guest speaker. Let me announce now that "M" night for this year will be held December 8 at the First Baptist Church in Wilson. The attendance goal is 750.

Third, we held the associational tournaments at the First Baptist Church, Rocky Mount on March 17, 1952. Approximately 600 people were inspired by the unusual performance of those who participated in the various contests. Some of our associational winners were successful in the district contest and ranked high in the state finals. This is one of the finest programs which our department is promoting. It includes junior memory work, intermediate sword drills, young people better speech contests, adult Scripture reading, and choir contests for all groups. We urge you to secure the rules now and begin work immediately on the contests for the next year.

Fourth, by means of mailing literature to the pastors and directors we have endeavored to put before the churches the importance of our Baptist assemblies at Caswell, Fruitland, and Ridgecrest. It is hoped that each church will begin making plans now to send a representative group to one of the assemblies next summer.

Fifth, we have sought to encourage each church to hold at least one study course a year. Last year only 23 of our 82 churches reported holding a Training Union study course.

Sixth, we distributed the Southern Baptist Training Union calendar to the churches with the suggestion that each church seek to promote Youth Week, Christian Home Week, Church Loyalty Month, and a class for new church members.

I am sure that each one here this morning realizes the importance of the Training Union. It helps the individual church members to orientate himself in the program of the church. It develops him spiritually, encouraging prayer and the daily reading of the Scriptures. It encourages him to use his talents for the Lord and ministers to his social needs. A program of training is also a great asset to the church. It provides for training potential leaders, giving doctrinal instruction, encouraging soul winning, developing faithful stewards of tithes and offerings, and promoting attendance at the worship services. Not only does the Training Union provide for the individual and his church, it is a God-given means for the promoting of our denominational life and the much needed missionary emphasis.

Let me encourage you to go back to your churches and build bigger and better Training Unions.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOME FOR THE AGING

RESTHAVEN, Winston-Salem, N. C.

Operation of Resthaven was begun March 16, 1951. Soon after the opening, it was filled to capacity, twenty residents. When the news spread of the beginning, applications began to accumulate rapidly. To date, there have been close to 500 inquiries. Had there been rooms available, and all applicants could have made financial arrangement, our Home would have had 200 residents instead of only twenty at present.

There is encouraging prospect of getting the top floor of the present building completed, which will provide space for fifteen additional residents. The cost of this enlargement has been underwritten by a business man of Winston-Salem, who is not a Baptist. This same friend has already donated a television set, and has concreted the basement of the Home.

Our residents range in age from 64 to 92 years, and come from widely scattered sections of our State—Franklin to Elizabeth City. All rejoice in the opportunity to be in the Home. Here are some of their statements:

“I like this good Christian Home and all the family. I would not exchange it for any other in all the world.”—Mrs. J. L. Smith, coming from Franklin.

“This ‘more than we expected’ about this Home makes us all hope and pray that more men and women may come to enjoy its many blessings.”—Miss Ella Moffett, coming from Southern Pines.

“I never thought I would be so happy in my last years of life.”
—John Holt, age 92, coming from Wilson Mills.

In spite of the fact that Resthaven did not receive financial assistance last year from the Baptist State Convention (except a loan which was repaid), it was operated clear of a deficit. How did this happen? By the Lord laying our needs upon the hearts of friends and causing them to respond. Of course, the Home was compelled to charge the cost of keep from the residents who came on the monthly-pay plan. The income from this source, together with that coming from residents giving property or cash for their mainte-

nance, plus donations by churches and auxiliary organizations and friends, enabled the Home to pay its way and to accumulate assets in excess of \$100,000.00.

Beginning the year 1952, with the new Nine Year Program, our Home receives three-fourths of 1% of the funds to be divided. From this source has come less than \$500.00 per month since January of this year. The Home is estimated to receive a total of approximately \$500,000.00 in NINE YEARS. It is apparent, therefore, that slow provision for enlarged facilities will be made to accommodate the hundreds of aging people who want to come to our Home, unless funds come from other sources than our denominational program as it now operates.

Our Home presents a great challenge to North Carolina Baptists to provide adequate facilities. There are probably 100,000 people in our State past 65 years of age, and a large number of these are of Baptist faith. We must make provision as time and finances permit for these aging Baptists. Since Baptists of our State now number more than 700,000 in membership, we are well able to make such provision. If every Baptist would give an average of \$1.00 to our Home in one year, we could raise \$700,000.00 and not one person would suffer hardship. As soon as a practical and adequate plan of support can be agreed upon, it is reasonable to expect that our Baptist Home will be worthily supported.

Many suggestions have been made as to the best plan of supporting our Home. Among them are. (1) Fifth Sunday offerings through the Sunday schools, as the Virginia Baptist Home plan; (2) special day offering, as the Mother's Day plan for our Baptist Hospital; and (3) putting the Home in the local church budget, and appealing to the churches that have no budget for at least one special offering a year.

Either of these plans, supplemented by such special gifts as may come from individuals and corporations, and provision made in wills, would enable the Home to make reasonable progress, and thus enlarge our facilities on the pay-as-you-go plan.

We are closing our report with a statement made by a prominent furniture manufacturer, Mr. B. C. Philpott, of Lexington, N. C.

"I consider this one of the most important forward steps the Baptists of North Carolina have taken in a long time, because it is indeed a great move and one that has been neglected all too long.

Mrs. Philpott and I want to have a part in this fine undertaking, and herewith you will find my check for one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars, which we desire used as a memorial to our son, B. C. Philpott, Jr.

May the Lord continue to bless you in such a noble work."
"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my Brethren, ye have done it unto me" (Matthew 25:40).

VIEWS, REVIEWS AND VISION

Text: John 4:35 "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest."

Jesus had just been in conversation with the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well. As this woman talked with Christ she witnessed a super-natural demonstration of wisdom; someone with whom she was not acquainted, one who was a stranger in her community had told her all things about herself, even things she thought were well hidden. It seems that after her experience with the Son of God in whom was vested the power to fathom the souls of men and the meditations of all hearts, she must have placed her faith in Him as the Saviour of men. For she went into the city and gave her testimony of the experience at the well, she concluded her testimony by saying to the people, "Is not one that can do this the Christ?" She thus became the first woman miss-

ionary, for the record states that many of the Samaritans believed on Jesus because of her testimony.

The disciples upbraided Jesus for talking to such a woman, a lowly Samaritan, an adultress. The disciples seemingly counted her as one unworthy of the love and concern of Christ. Christ saw the Samaritan woman not only as an adultress, but He could see her transformed by Gods grace, He could see her as an ardent witness for the glory of God, He could see her leading people into the Kingdom. Jesus saw her through the physical eye as a Samaritan sinner in need of a Saviour, but Christ also had the spiritual vision to see what she could be. The same thing was true when Jesus walked by the sea and looked upon fishermen busy with their nets. He could see them through the physical eye as rough, ready and rugged men with courage to brave the wind and the waves, but he could also see them through the spiritual eye as men transformed, leaving their nets to bcome fishers of men.

It was Christ's desire that His followers might look upon humanity, not only seeing them under the curse and shackled by sin, but he desired them to have vision to see great possibilities for these people.

To see sinners and just to reckon them hopelessly lost and condemned would mean nothing, but to look upon them with vision seeing them as new creatures, created anew by grace, would be an incentive to labour fervently for the upbuilding and extension of the spiritual kingdom. Seemingly this thought prompted the words of Jesus; "I say unto you, lift up your eyes and look on the fields; for they are white already for harvest."

THIS IS CHRIST'S URGENT MESSAGE AND COMMAND TO THE CHURCH: That the urgency of these words may be impressed upon our minds and hearts, I use these words, "Lift up your eyes and look," as a foundation for three points: **VIEWS, REVIEWS AND VISION.**

I. LIFT UP YOUR EYES AND LOOK UPON THE FIELD:

I challenge you to look, look hard and long, really get a good view of the field which is your community. And then tell me, are not the fields white and all ready for harvesting?

I challenge you to take time to actually see conditions as they are. **LOOK**, and you will see a gradually declining morality, the moral standard of our age is indeed at a low ebb. **LOOK**, and you will see people engaged in social activities and pleasures which are an abomination in the sight of God..**LOOK**, and you will see God's Holy Sabbath being desecrated; His Holy day has been made a holiday, Sunday has been turned into funday, as movie houses are in operation, ball games are in progress, men are playing golf and fishing, families are visiting friends and neighbors, and because of these many activities they do not have time to go to church and worship God on His day.. **LOOK**, and you will see the forces of evil, you will see sin, sin in the lives of people, sin so deeply rooted in their lives that they do not recognize God. They live as though God did not exist. They live with never a thought of eternity. **LOOK**, get a good view of neighbors, friends, relatives fathers, mothers, husbands, wives, sons and daughters lost in sin and on their way to hell except the grace of God intervene. **LOOK**, see them lost. **LOOK** see their need of a

Saviour. And as we look may we know in our hearts that they may never be saved unless we live a life of devotion and seek to win them to Him. "Lift up your eyes, I say, and look on the field, it is ready for harvest. There is urgency in this message. How I do pray for more laborers in the field.

II. WE DON'T REALLY MIND LOOKING HURRIEDLY AND GETTING A FRAGMENTARY VIEW OF THE FIELD AND GENERAL CONDITIONS. BUT THERE IS ONE THING WE CHRISTIANS GLORY IN; WE GLORY IN REVIEWING OUR WORK; WE ENJOY REVIEWING AND POINTING WITH PRIDE TO OUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF YESTERDAY:

How often we hear testimonies that tell of the erection of a church building by a small group of people at great personal sacrifice. How often we hear statements that tell of the great growth of a Sunday School in by gone days. How often we hear of great preparation made and a successful evangelistic campaign last year. How often it is that someone points to an individual and with glowing pride says, "I won that man or that woman to Christ." . . . It's truly wonderful to have accomplished something in other years. It would indeed be tragic if we could not review something good and benevolent in the past. But can we be content to live on reviews? Can we be happy resting on the laurels of past achievements? We might have helped to build a church the laurels of past achievements? We might have helped to build a church We might have helped to swell the Sunday School roll in days gone by, but are we now going out in the highways and hedges to bring people to Sunday School? We might have had a great revival last year, but are we preparing and praying for a heaven sent revival this year?

We might have won a soul to Christ yesterday, but has the prayer of our heart been, "Lead me to some soul today"? O beloved reviews of yesterdays work cannot help conditions of today! We don't need reviews, the urgent need now is for views and vision. "Lift up your eyes and look on the field."

III. AS YOU LOOK BREATH A PRAYER FOR SPIRITUAL VISION TO SEE WHAT CHRIST CAN DO THROUGH YOU:

We as christians know by personal experience the change that can be wrought by the spirit of God in the lives of people, for we are sinners saved by grace. Therefore, I challenge you again, "Lift up your eyes and look." Look with the vision of a person created anew by grace to see what amazing grace can do in the lives of others. . . LOOK, and you will see that Christ has the power to bring the harlot from the street of prostitution to walk the avenue of respectability. . . LOOK, and you will see that His is the power to transplant the drunkard from the skid-row of debauchery to the elevated state of sobriety. . . LOOK, and you will see that His is the power to remove the gambler from the den of iniquity and injustice to a station of honesty and justice. . . LOOK, and you will see broken homes, broken homes that can be happy homes if Christ is the unseen guest and head of each home. . . LOOK, and you will see unhappy people lost in sin, you will see them living in discontent and despondency. . . LOOK, I pray, and have vision to see what these people can be by God's grace! They can be cleansed and saved, they

can be clothed upon with the robe of Christ's righteousness, our experience can be their experience. . . There are no impossible or hopeless cases, "Man's extremity is God's opportunity," "For His arm is not shortened that He cannot save unto the uttermost all that come into Him."

Christian friends, lift up your eyes, get a good view of the field, catch the vision of a great harvest. Know that God can empower you and make of you a winner, Know that as you go forth to your task motivated by the power of His love and directed by His spirit, He can make you fruitful. Know that all things are possible through Christ who strengthens us.

I challenge you: Get busy! give of your best to the master, souls are lost about us and the responsibility rest upon us, the church. People are waiting for us and they will never be saved unless we go to them with the message of salvation.

They are waiting everywhere,
 Where the fields of earth are fair,
 Where the rivers nobly run,
 Where the blossoms seek the sun,
 Where the hills rise high and grand,
 Looking proudly o'er the land—
 Waiting! Waiting!
 They are waiting in the wild,
 Wicked, weary and defiled.
 And the Saviour's healing word,
 They have never, never heard;
 Ever hungry and unfed
 Left without the living bread—
 Waiting! Waiting!

Lift up your eyes and look, then go ye into the field, for the harvest is great and the labourers are few.

Review

During the past year the Executive Committee held six meetings. Each meeting was well attended. The interest and enthusiasm in these meetings was very stimulating.

The progress made in our Association for the past twelve months was due to the fine spirit of cooperation among the various Churches. Your Missionary gave himself unreservedly to the expansion and promotion of the work. Your Executive Committee feels that the pages of this report will serve as a challenge to a greater work for the coming year.

Recommendations

1. We recommend that a Committee of nine people be appointed to study the work of the Association, looking forward to the most progressive plans of operation, and bring a report back to the Annual Session of the Association in October, 1953.
2. We recommend that an offering be taken at each Session of the Association to be used for the Missionary program.
3. In view of the tremendous amount of work that needs to be done in our Association, and in view of the fact that our missionary has been asked to devote all of his time to PRIMARY MISSION WORK, we recommend: That the Association employ an Assistant Missionary to Brother Burgiss to help with the promotion of the work of this large Association.
4. The proposed missionary program will require additional revenue, therefore we recommend that the contribution of fifty cents (50c) per resident member for the support of the missionary program be increased to seventy-five cents (75c) per resident member. The proposed budget submitted herewith has been prepared in anticipation of the increased funds for missionary purposes.
5. Your Executive Committee has felt the need for a revised Constitution and By-Laws to cover the work of the Association for quite some time. We therefore submit herewith a proposed Constitution and By-Laws

that have been prepared by the Executive Committee for your consideration.

Both Student Workers, Howard Williams and David Fletcher, were of great value to the program, and did a good work.

Visible Results of the Summer Program

Thus far the visible results of the Summer Program have been meager so far as organized work is concerned. It was not thought wise to attempt the organization of any Sunday School or Mission at Benvenue, Belvoir or Greenville. At Wilson a Baptist Council was organized, and committees on Location and Leadership were appointed. The Leadership Committee found the necessary leadership for an eight-class Sunday School, but a place to meet had not been found last week. At Weldon Cottage Prayer meetings were set up, and tentative plans were being made for a Sunday School, if deemed advisable by the Weldon Church.

Recommendations for Care of the Tent

Due to the fact that some of the stitching of the tent has suffered from sun damage, it is suggested that the tent be reconditioned before beginning next summer's work. (It would be well to consider creating a Sinking Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new tent.)

Some Things to Consider for Next Year's Work

1. That a house trailer be provided for use with the tent, either through purchase or rental, if the present program is continued.
2. That the work be planned well in advance, preferably during the winter months, and the schedule be announced to the public early.
3. That a minimum of four weeks be allotted to each Mission Project in which the tent is used, and that a total of only three or four projects be attempted during the summer.
4. That in all future cases, where Student Workers are used, definite arrangements should be made, in advance, as to meals and lodging, in order that the missionary not be handicapped by this additional responsibility.

NOTE: Many more details of the work need consideration and discussion, which are not taken up here due to lack of time and space.

A Summary of Work by Our Student Workers

Our two Student Workers, Howard Williams and David Fletcher, were most helpful in the summer program. David did Bible teaching in the meetings at Benvenue, Belvoir and Wilson in the nightly services, and taught also in the Children's Bible Classes in the daytime. Howard was Principal of the three Bible Schools in the tent at Benvenue, Belvoir and Wilson, and taught a class of children also at each place.

In addition to the activities of our Student Workers in the tent they

carried on an extensive visitation program at Benvenue, Belvoir and at Wilson! And the last week in June they spent four days doing visitation in Grifton, which increased the interest and attendance there quite considerably.

A third phase of the work of our Student Workers was supply work in the various Churches of the Association. According to our records Howard spoke 16 times in the four Churches of Grifton, South Creek, Tarboro First and Farmville. David also spoke 16 times in the seven Churches of Grifton, Washington First, Rosemary, South Creek, Tarboro First, Farmville and Winterville. Both of them also preached several times in the tent.

A summary of the summer's work indicates that Howard Williams participated in a total of 72 services in the tent and in Churches of the Association, in addition to the 15 days that Bible School was conducted in the tent. David Fletcher participated in 70 services in the tent and in Churches of the Association, in addition to the 15 days he also helped in the Bible School in the tent.

REPORT OF THE ROANOKE BAPTIST BUILDERS' CLUB FOR THE YEAR

October 1, 1951 through September 30, 1952

The Roanoke Baptist Builders Club has seen the purposes for which it was organized become actual facts during this church year—and reports glorious progress in our Lord's work in our Association. Among the steps forward are the following:

1. The completion of our membership roll to the anticipated 1000 paid in members.

2. The allocation of the initial fund of \$2000.00 (\$2 for each member) to the assistance of new or needy churches in erecting houses of worship. \$1550.00 to Trinity Church at Tarboro and \$450.55 (from the first call) to Darlington Church at Darlington.

3. Allocations authorized from calls No. 2 and No. 3 to the assistance of needy churches; first advising the churches of the allocation so they might proceed in confidence. \$199.45 additional allocated to Darlington from call No. 2 and \$1000.00 allocated to Pactolus Church—\$500.00 each from call No. 2 and No. 3.

4. In the interest of saving postage, calls No. 2 and No. 3 were issued at one time. The results of these calls are very gratifying. 583 of our 1000 members have responded to the calls through September 30th. More have come in since then. Of the one thousand and two persons who have joined the club, I can only recall three who have resigned their membership and they remained in sympathy with the purposes of the club. Their resignation in each case was occasioned by economic pressure. In response to the dual call we sent out in August more than half of our membership has already responded. The lists of the church affiliations of the members who responded and the amounts from each is being placed in the hands of the clerk and not being read in the interest of saving time. Suffice to say that our contributing membership has come from 69 of our 82 churches and from 4 outside of the association. You will be interested in knowing that a Builders' Club has been organized in the Neuse and the Columbus Associations and on a state-wide basis in Kansas—they having been intrigued by our success. Your chairman remembers very vividly the considerable number of donations that were made to the work of the club at the last session of the association and wishes to advise that he is present and open for business.

In the interest of saving funds of the association, we request permission to include two calls in one on future occasions as that seems expedient. This report would not be complete without paying tribute to the loyal, whole-hearted cooperation of the committee and the untiring zeal of Miss Gertrude Lewis of Wilson who has so efficiently kept the records of the club.

The Martin-Plymouth societies were hostess to the Woman's Missionary Union of the Roanoke Association, Thursday April 3, 1952, which met in the Williamston Memorial Baptist Church for its forty-fifth annual session with Mrs. L. H. Kitchin, Associational Superintendent presiding. The meeting opened with the singing of the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," after which Mrs. C. M. Billings presented a most inspiring devotional using the theme, "His Name." She presented the three phases of looking at the Father of mankind; namely: Isaiah 9:6 "the foretelling of the birth of Jesus;" Luke 1:31 "foretelling of the birth and even named;" Phillippians 2:9-11 "gone into heaven but living influence left behind." This influence is foretold in the Old Testament and carried on down through the ages. As an example of the Power of Jesus' Name, Mrs. Billings told of a wealthy man living in the capitol of our nation. He sat alone one cold night reading in the scriptures. All had a good time and in his heart he had a feeling of joy he had never possessed before. There is power in the name of Jesus if we will accept and use it. Mrs. Billings closed with prayer.

this will be had at the same time State Mission program is held.)

At this time the following visitors and special guests were recognized: Mr. and Mrs. Conklin, new pastor and wife of Williamston Memorial; Mrs. Sam Mayo, Missionary to the migrants; Miss Ruth Provence, State W. M. U. Headquarters; Mr. Burgess; Mrs. Billings; Mrs. Gilmer Cross; Mrs. E. F. Harden from Ridgecrest and her daughter, Mrs. Jackson, whose husband is in Korea as chaplain; and Miss Hale Montgomery from Missouri.

Following the roll call of counties Mrs. Kitchin asked those from the two new societies to stand; Salem and Edgemont.

The group voted to work with the Executive Committee of the Association in securing the services of Miss Hilda Mayo. As this could not be settled until the regular associational meeting in the fall we voted to pay \$200.00 plus the \$100.00 we would get from the men on her salary until the fall meeting. The other was to be made up by the committee.

The following churches received standard of excellence:

Arlington Street, Tarboro First, Pinetops, Ludford Memorial, Greenville Immanuel, Farmville and Calvary.

Mrs. Edgar Joyner reported there were 79 societies in the 84 churches. She asked that we have as our goal for 1952 a 10% increase in this number.

Mrs. C. M. Smith reported that 21 of the 23 R. A.'s sent in reports. There are 19 churches with R. A.; two have both Junior and Intermediate organizations. (A-1 R. A. Eagles, Greenville Immanuel and Winterville).

Mrs. R. T. Fountain asked that we go back home and get started on G. A. organizations. Now is the time to start. 52 churches have G. A. and many have both Junior and Intermediate but we need to increase this number.

COMMUNITY MISSIONS REPORT

This is a report of how much has been done toward possessing the land, the land being our own Roanoke Association. May I stress the *at once* from the scripture "Let us go up at once and possess the land for we are able to overcome it." Numbers 13:30. If there is any one thing I would criticize in our reports it is a certain lack of urgency. We are doing more but the progress is certainly leisurely.

This report represents the work of many people. Of many ages, from Sunbeams to our own W. M. S., a host of people who directly or indirectly are witnessing for the Master. Effective Community Missions means

steady, constant, continued, organized service, and the individuals who are responsible for this work are the chairmen of the local societies. Because they have done a good job I am glad to report substantial increase in practically every phase of the work. 1099 individuals made definite efforts in Soul winning this quarter. Last quarter 498 were reported. Even with this increase not half of our women are enlisted in Community Missions. We regret that there has been a definite decrease in the number of organizations studying a book on Soul winning and the Guide.

Let us remember that an informed membership is an interested and effective membership.

Mrs. E. L. Taylor urged that we have more than the required two mission study classes. She asked that we refer to the goals as given in the Guide Book, page 28.

Miss Lelia Higgs reported only twelve stewardship classes and said that this probably accounted for the small increase in tithing. "Get busy about my Father's business not for good reports," was her closing plea.

It was indeed a pleasure to have Miss Ruth Provence bring us a message at this time on "Empowered for Service." She brought to us the sign of Carolina Power & Light Company. "Power and progress in the area we serve." If only we would use that slogan in our W. M. U. work. There is service to be rendered. From the reports today perhaps you have gathered your individual responsibility. May your prayer be, "That the power of Christ may rest upon me." There is infinite power in Christ if only we will harness it to our task.

Mrs. Griffin, President of Williamston W. M. S. made the announcement as to lunch and assuring each one present of a most cordial welcome. The Rev. W. D. Morriss said grace after which we adjourned for lunch.

We were favored by a duet "Hold Thou My Hand," from Miss Sanders and Miss Privette.

Mrs. Sam Mayo then brought us a message on "In His Name Among All Nations." She explained her unique work with the migrants. She and Mr. Mayo follow them as they go from one crop to another. They have a mobile unit house purchased from offerings of Annie Armstrong and Cooperative Program. There are 42 folding chairs. It is possible for them to carry the gospel

to these people now. Many have been saved and in some localities churches have been established for those who come in to harvest the crops. Many of them have taken places of leadership. These people need your help and your prayers. Will you remember them?

Mrs. W. D. Morriss presented the recommendations from the trustees of the training school for the convention in Miami:

1. Plan of work be made in the field of mission and social Christian work.

2. Men be allowed to enter into the classes (no rooms for them).

3. As space is available women of the seminaries be allowed to enter.

4. Name be changed.

5. Budget raised to meet the above.

Mrs. Morriss said that by making adequate institutions for the training of our youth would be great in bringing honor to His name.

Mrs. W. O. Abbitt and Mrs. C. U. Rogers gave responsive scripture reading after which Miss Mary Jane Sanders sang "Jesus" and then Mrs. Abbitt prayed.

Mrs. Gilmer Cross, Young People's leader of the Rocky Mount Division made announcements as to dates of the camps. The Association may bring honor to His name by:

1. Financing.

2. Sending boys and girls to camp.

3. Giving our time and effort.

4. Praying.

The Rev. Grady Burgess, Associational Missionary, brought to our attention some of our needs. It is too late in some areas but not in all. Let us concentrate our efforts and prayers for this responsibility that is ours of the Roanoke Association. He also told of some of the plans for the tent work which has already done a good work. You can help by:

1. Praying definitely and daily for us.

2. Provide food and room for student workers.

3. Financing.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. NAME: The name of this body is "Roanoke Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE: It is the purpose of the Association to provide an organization of cooperation for the Baptist churches affiliated with it, and to encourage them to faithfulness in every endeavor which we shall undertake together in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP: The Association shall consist of messengers who are members of the affiliated churches as follows: (1) one messenger from each church and one additional messenger for each one hundred resident members or fraction thereof, up to a maximum of seven messengers, chosen annually by the affiliated churches; (2) the pastors; (3) the duly elected officers of the Association and the current President of the Associational W. M. U.

ARTICLE IV. AFFILIATED CHURCHES: Baptist Churches which have petitioned for membership and by vote of the Association are accounted to be in fellowship with the purposes and undertakings of this body, shall comprise the list of affiliated churches. The vote of the Association to extend fellowship, or to withdraw fellowship, shall be a two-thirds vote. Failure to report annually to the Association shall raise the question of fellowship. Twenty churches shall constitute a quorum and decisions of those present shall be considered the action of the Association.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS: The officers of the Association shall be elected annually, and shall assume their duties at the close of the annual meeting, and serve until the election of their successors. Officers shall be: Moderator, Vice-moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, (no one of whom may be eligible to serve in the same official capacity for more than five consecutive years); other officers shall be: the members of the Executive Committee, together with the President of the W. M. U. who also shall be accounted an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, together with a pastor and a layman from each county where a majority of the Baptist Churches are affiliated with this Association, and three members at large. The Executive Committee is charged with the duty of executing the plans and decisions of the Association, including the associational program of missions and extension, and the employment and direction of the associational Missionaries. A full report of its work shall be presented at each annual meeting, together with plans and recommendations for the promotion and extension of the work of the Association. The Executive Committee shall act for the Association between the annual meetings in conformity with the expressed decisions of the body. A vacancy occurring between annual meetings may be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: At each annual meeting, or not later than sixty days thereafter, the Executive Committee of the Association shall name a Nominating Committee, consisting of one messenger from each county, where a majority of the Baptist Churches are affiliated with the Association, whose duty it shall be to bring to the Association at its next annual meeting nominations for all officers of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, where not otherwise provided by this Constitution or the By-Laws.

ARTICLE IX. AMENDMENT: This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote, provided: that the proposed amendment has been read to the Association at the previous annual meeting, or not later than the day previous to the vote to be taken on the amendment, and referred to a committee for clarification and correlation.

ARTICLE X. ADOPTION: Upon adoption, this Constitution shall become effective at the close of this the 45th annual session of the Roanoke Baptist Association, and shall supersede any and all previous constitutions and by-laws, and cancel any action in conflict with this Constitution.

BY-LAWS OF THE ROANOKE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION**Article 1****MEETINGS**

The meetings of the association shall be held annually at such time and place as may be decided by the association in regular session.

Article 2**OPENING**

Meetings of the association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

Article 3**QUORUM**

Representatives from twenty of the affiliated churches shall constitute a quorum.

Article 4**ORDER OF BUSINESS**

An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each annual meeting which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

Article 5**CHURCH LETTER**

Each affiliated church shall send to the annual meeting of the association, on forms furnished by the clerk, a full report of the church work for the year ending September 30th.

Article 6**MODERATOR AND VICE-MODERATOR**

The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall preside at all meetings of the association. They shall both be members of the Executive Committee and as opportunity may permit, they shall act as fraternal visitors to the churches throughout the year representing the fellowship of the entire association.

Article 7**CLERK**

The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association and shall prepare and cause to be published and distributed, as directed by the association or executive committee, minutes and statistics of the association as soon as practical after adjournment. He shall also mail the necessary forms and letters to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the association. A copy of the minutes shall be mailed to the officers, affiliated churches, to each institution participating in the cooperative program, and such other institutions and individuals as the association or executive committee may direct.

Article 8**TREASURER**

The Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Association, disburse them according to its order, and present a written report of same to each annual meeting of the Association, and additional reports at the request of the Executive Committee. He shall also furnish the Chairman of the Executive and Finance Committees a report at least ten days before each regular scheduled meeting of the Executive Committee.

Article 9
AUDITOR

The auditor shall examine the books and records of the association and submit a detailed report covering his work at such time as may be required by the Executive Committee or the association.

Article 10
SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The Sunday School Superintendent shall direct and supervise the Sunday School program of the association under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 11
TRAINING UNION DIRECTOR

The Training Union Director shall have charge of the direction and promotion of the Training Union program under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 12
BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood program of the association shall be under the direction of the Brotherhood President subject to the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 13
REVENUE

The contributions of the affiliated churches for the purpose of defraying expenses of the Missionary program and other activities of the association shall be on a resident member basis and shall be in such amount as may be approved by the association from year to year.

Article 14
SALARIES OF OFFICERS

Salaries of the Missionary or Missionaries of the association, as well as any other officer, shall be in such amount as may be provided for in the annual budget and approved by the association from year to year.

Article 15
BUILDER'S CLUB

The Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club shall be under the supervision and direction of a committee of nine members to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee, five of which shall be from its own body and four from the association at large. This committee shall direct and supervise the Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club under the supervision of the Executive Committee. All actions and commitments

of the Builder's Club shall be submitted to the Executive Committee for final approval before becoming effective, provided no allocation of funds may be made by the Builder's Club or Executive Committee unless sufficient funds are on hand to pay all commitments in full.

Article 16
STANDING COMMITTEES

The executive committee at its first session following the annual meeting of the association shall appoint the following committees: Constitution and By-Laws and Finance. The first member named on each committee shall serve as chairman.

It shall be the duty of the committee on Constitution and By-Laws to receive, examine, and make recommendations to the association in session on all proposed amendments to the constitution and by-laws.

It shall be the duty of the Finance committee to supervise the financial program of the association and report to the executive committee regarding same from time to time. It shall also be the duty of the Finance committee to submit to the executive committee at each annual session a budget giving the estimated revenue for the ensuing term, as well as the itemized proposed expenses for this period.

Article 17
PROGRAM COMMITTEE

The program committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the association. This committee shall meet following the close of each annual session and select those who shall write the reports for the next annual meeting. The appointees of the program committee and their assignments shall be printed in the minutes of the annual session.

Article 18
ASSOCIATIONAL COMMITTEES

The Moderator, following the convening each annual session of the association, shall appoint the following committees:

1. Committee on place and preacher
2. Committee on resolutions
3. Committee on petitions
4. Any other committees that may be authorized by the association.

Article 19
MISSIONARY PROGRAM

The Missionary and extension work of the association shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee, as well as the Missionary or Missionaries whom they shall employ and direct. The Missionary fund shall be kept and disbursed by the Treasurer as directed by the Executive Committee.

Article 20**MINUTES OF THE ASSOCIATION**

The minutes of each annual meeting of the association shall be examined, approved and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before being printed. Said minutes shall be submitted to the first session of the next annual meeting for consideration and approval.

Article 21**VISITORS**

Visitors may be invited to participate in the deliberations of the association without the privilege to vote.

Article 22**AMENDMENTS**

All amendments or additions to these By-Laws shall be submitted in writing on forms furnished by the association clerk. No amendment to the By-Laws shall be considered by the association until they have been referred to the By-Law Committee. No resolutions adopted by this association shall become a part of these By-Laws.

Article 23**EFFECTIVE DATE**

The effective date of these By-Laws or any additions or amendments thereto shall become effective immediately upon passage.

Annual Sermon — Roanoke Association

PERPETUATING PENTECOST

W. E. Cholerton, New Hope

Text: "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me." - Acts 1:8

"Ye shall receive power." If there is one thing the world has got plenty of today, it is **power!** It has much more than it can safely use. Men said years ago that there is enough power in a clod of earth to lift St. Paul's cathedral to the top of Mount Everest. That was all right as long as men only dreamed of it. But when that clod of earth became an atom bomb and lifted not a cathedral but a **city**, the dream had become a nightmare. Don't pray for more power! We've got too much **now!** Unless our prayer be for a new kind of power—or perhaps for an old kind of power that the world has called obsolete. Perhaps that is what we had better pray for. For the only way to meet power effectively is with power; and if we would save our world from the grip of evil power that is fastening itself upon it, it will not be by weakness or impotence.

There is a power of atomic proportions which for a long time has been at the disposal of men who would battle with the totalitarian forces of the Black Dictator who rules in the Kremlin of sin. It is a power that centuries ago shook the world and rocked it as no atom bomb could do; that changed the whole outlook of the centuries and profoundly changed men's lives. That was Pentecost. A tiny handful of unimportant men fell under the direct rays of this strange power, and its radio-activity sent them out as with a high contagion that spread to everyone they met.

Oh, that is the secret weapon that the Christian must bring out of his armory if he is going to oppose the mighty power of evil with any chance of success. We need the kind of power today of which the New Testament was full. Can we have it? Can we perpetuate Pentecost? I would say that we **can** perpetuate the power of that great event if we will take the trouble to understand it, and will do some things which **they**, in that early day, were required to do. If we will stop thinking of God as playing favorites, and recognize that He is as able and as ready to show His power in us as in those earthly followers of His whom men now call 'saint'. God is not responsible for our spiritual poverty. He is prepared to endue **us** with power from on high, if we are prepared to meet the conditions. And these are not as mysterious as some think.

I. A: PENTECOST CAME TO COMMON MEN WITH A VITAL FAITH.

If you are looking for a resurgence of Pentecostal power, drop the idea that we must await the coming of a Peter or a Paul—a super-saint. What **was** Peter before the Lord Jesus took hold of him? Or Philip? Or John? They were a sorry enough lot in the days that followed Calvary, hopeless, despairing, finished. Nor had they any better spirit even when the Master was with them. Was there ever a group

of men more representative of our common humanity, our littleness, our frailty? Yet these were the men who, **within a matter of weeks**, were laying the axe about their little world with small regard as to how the chips might fall about them. Something obviously had happened: what was it? "Nothing," says the unbeliever; "nothing but the delusion of a handful of psychopaths." What happened? "The resurrection of the Lord Jesus from the dead!" cried the apostles; "whereof we are witnesses."

In other words, these forlorn, dispirited men had come into possession of a vital faith, that so thoroughly changed them, no power on earth could henceforth silence them. "They went everywhere preaching the Word"; and the gist of their message was, "I have a Saviour; and oh that my Saviour were your Saviour too!" How account for it? They believed something. Common men like ourselves—but they had a faith that was **vital, living**. And **THAT** was the material of Pentecost.

I. B: PENTECOST BELONGS TO COMMON MEN OF ALL AGES WHO POSSESS THE SAME LIVING FAITH.

Pentecost was **not** something that belonged to the Apostolic age only; nor yet something limited to a few select souls in every age—a Paul, a Wesley, a Truett. If that were so, how would you interpret Acts 2: 38, 39? Every common, ordinary man in every period of the Christian era who will possess and be possessed by the faith that motivated the Men of Pentecost may have the experience for himself. There isn't a man in the tiniest rural church too humble to be endued with this power if he will fulfil the simple conditions. It is for each to ask himself before God, "Have I received the infilling of the Holy Spirit? If not, why not?"

The conditions, as Dr. R. A. Torrey so simply expresses them, are: Repent—Confess—Obey—Claim. First of course must come an acceptance of salvation; then public confession of the Savior. But we must go further if we would have this power: there must be full consecration and obedience, fullest allegiance to Him. Then, **ASK** for it. "How much more shall your Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask Him?" (See Acts 4:31, 8:14-16). Pentecost is for you: claim it!

II. A: PENTECOST CAME AS A REVOLUTION WITH POWER.

We are inclined to fear revolutions; for they are apt to disturb peaceable folk. Yet is is a fact that Christianity can only achieve its openly professed aim through revolution. For that aim is the establishment of the world-wide kingdom of God; and that involves very radical change. Peaceable citizens **must** be jolted out of their easy-going way by it. And those who preach it must have the fervor of the revolutionary fanatic; they may not hold back their testimony lest they give offense. They must have the boldness of the revolutionary.

True, this calls for courage—a courage such as few men have! Aye, a courage such as **no** man of himself possesses—a courage you would have looked for in vain even in the Men of Pentecost, **before** Pentecost! But the promise was, "Ye shall receive power **after that** the Holy Spirit is come upon you." Easter Sunday inaugurated the revolution; but Pentecost supplied the power to effect it. And with the infilling of the Spirit of Power came the courage and the passion

to tell their message to the whole world. In short, Pentecost means power, power beyond all our dreams for any true child of God who will claim it; **but**

II. B: PENTECOST CAME WITH POWER FOR A PURPOSE.

And that purpose—service. It is stated concisely in Acts 1:8. Pentecostal power is given for service and witnessing. Let us not make the mistake of some, in supposing that God gives His power to us just to make us feel good. The **one purpose** for which God gives it is to enable poor, weak mortals like ourselves to become fearless witnesses for the truth as it is in Christ Jesus, servants ready at His hand to do His slightest bidding. The Spirit of God came mightily upon Moses because his hand was on a task God wanted done. Even Jesus said, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me"—why? to give Him an excitable feeling? no, but to **do** something: to give healing, sight, liberty, salvation. God gives power to those who are going to **need** it, to **do** something with it. Notice that the first pentecostal outpouring was vitally connected with the evangelization of the world. **IT STILL IS!** And when we are ready to be instruments in that great task, we shall receive power.

We have shown that Pentecost, which came to ordinary men and women possessed of a vital faith, comes still to common folk who are vitalized by the same faith; that it came, and still comes, as an all-absorbing passion, as a power that made and makes of ordinary men flaming evangelists of the truth, fearless witnesses, willing servants of the Master. There is just this left to say:

III. PENTECOST IS NOT SELF-PERPETUATING; IT MAY BE LOST.

And we are not thinking now of that natural loss of spiritual power that follows upon its normal use. That is a common experience with the earnest Christian worker; and constant re-filling with the Holy Spirit is needed. If we will keep the way open for this infilling, it will always be available.

But unfortunately that is not the only nor even the commonest manner in which Pentecostal power, once possessed, is lost. When we are untrue to our consecration, or fail in fullest obedience to Him; when we let sin linger between us and Him; when we become neglectful of prayer, of Bible reading, of good Christian habits, then the inflow ceases to keep pace with the outflow, and our spiritual vitality dries up. To keep vital, fresh, sensitive, **that** is our responsibility. Only so can we perpetuate Pentecost. If we have lost this power, then painfully we must retrace our steps to the place where we failed, and there make our confession and set things right before God. Clear away whatever has clogged the channel, and the glorious power will flow again, and service and witness will once more be blessed.

Perpetuating Pentecost! Yes, it can be done. Nay, it **MUST** be done unless our church work is to end in futility. For only by this power, which swept the first-century church, can we win even a single soul to God. Power from on high! Power for witnessing! Power for service! The Spirit-filled life! Which of us would **dare** face our God-given task without it? What marvels the world would see if we and all the members of our churches were filled to overflowing! Here indeed is the atomic power calculated to change the face of the globe!! And it is ours for the taking.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT TO THE ROANOKE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

October 14, 1953

This past year has been a strenuous one for Sunday School work in the Roanoke Association. The year began with the work under familiar leadership. On January 13, 1953 the Annual Associational Sunday School Rally was held under the leadership of Mr. E. E. Ulrich at the Memorial Church in Greenville. There were 208 people present representing 30 churches. Twenty-six (26) Sunday School Superintendents were present, and fourteen (14) pastors.

On April 16th and 17th two all-day clinics for Vacation Bible School workers were held under the leadership of Mr. E. G. Cole, Associational Bible School Superintendent. One was held at Enfield and the other at Memorial Church, Greenville. These clinics were well attended, with a total of 181 in attendance, representing 39 churches. To date Mr. Cole has received reports from 56 church schools and 3 mission schools. We know that other schools were held, but no report has been turned in. Last year 13 churches did not report schools. This year 10 of those 13 have reported. So if all those churches that had schools last year held them again this year, plus these ten additional ones, we will show a good increase over last year.

During the year, through the untiring efforts of our two Associational Missionaries, devoted pastors, and Sunday School leaders four new Sunday Schools have been organized: Swelton Heights, Calvary (Ro. Rapids), Pender's Chapel, and Chockoyotte. These bringing our number of Sunday Schools to approximately 92, with a total membership of over 23,000. Of these 93 Sunday Schools, 31 of them contain less than 100 members, while there are only 4 having an enrollment of 1,000 and over. Thus about 1/3 of our work is to be found in rural situations.

In May of this year the Sunday School forces received a severe blow by the resignation of Mr. E. E. Ulrich as Associational Superintendent. In feeble attempt to carry on the work an emergency meeting of the "Million More in '54 Committee" was called in Wilson. At that time, under the leadership of Miss Hilda Mayo, plans were laid for our pastors to exchange pulpits on the fourth Sunday in July in the interest of the "Million More in '54 Campaign." Three Associational Rallies were also planned to be held during the week of September 7th. Mr. J. C. Brooks of our State Sunday School Board was secured to lead the panel discussions for these rallies. Along with the 7 members of the panel, secured from the lay-workers in our Sunday Schools, much good was derived by all who attended. The total number of persons attending these rallies held at the Washington, Scotland Neck, and Arlington Street Baptist Churches was 371. These were from 44 churches and 1 mission.

In July, the Executive Committee asked Mr. E. Gordon Conklin to serve as Associational Sunday School Superintendent, filling the vacancy left by Mr. Ulrich's resignation. During the following months much invaluable help was given by Mr. Ulrich, Mr. Clyde Baucom and Miss Hilda Mayo in the planning and promotion of our Associational Sunday School work.

NOW! The future is ours; the program is ours; and God's Command is ours, "Go into the highways and into the hedges, and **Compel** them to come in, that My House might be filled." Our share in this great year of enlistment is approximately 4,600 more people for our Sunday Schools. Your Superintendent is sure that they will be won as you go out in your communities and bring them in one by one.

REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL TRAINING UNION DIRECTOR

I am happy to report that the Training Unions of the Association have by and large shown definite progress during this past year. According to reports received by me, five churches have instituted Training Unions where none previously existed, and almost all of the churches with Unions have reported definite increase. I might say that the Association as a whole is becoming Training Union conscious. Long regarded as a step-child by many churches, Training Union is gradually assuming its rightful place in our church programs.

One thing that has made the work a bit difficult for your Director this year is the failure of many of our Unions to send in their quarterly reports. It would greatly facilitate the work you have given me to do if every Union would send these reports fully and regularly to the State Training Union secretary and to me.

Three **mass meetings** have been held during the year:

(a) **"M" Night.** This meeting, held in First Church, Tarboro, saw the largest Mobilization attendance we have ever had; and the enthusiasm was such as to indicate the growing popularity of this annual mass gathering. "M" Night this year will be held in First Church, Wilson, on December 7. We do hope **every** church in our Association will have at least a car-load there.

(b) **Preparation Night,** held in Scotland Neck on February 17. Attendance was good and the meeting helpful. This meeting was held in conjunction with Enlargement Week. It is hoped that "Training Union Enlargement will keep steady pace this year with the "Million More" advance in Sunday School. We should certainly capitalize on this Forward Movement. But to bring our efforts to a head we shall observe Enlargement Week again in mid-winter.

(c) **Tournament Night,** observed in First Church, Wilson. Attendance was fair, but below expectation; and although some excellent competition was given in such things as Sword Drill and Better Speaking, there was a noticeable absence of music. Not a single choir was present to participate in choral or group singing. Good singing means much in our church services. May we not hope that many of our churches will share this talent with us also this year?

PROMOTION. The Training Union Executive Committee has met each quarter to plan Associational work. These meetings have been well attended, and have proved of real practical help. Considerable literature for promotion of Training Union work was distributed during the year, and Study Courses were encouraged in all the Unions. In this connection teachers were provided where requested, insofar as possible, by the Associational officers, who themselves took an active part in this work.

Miss Hilda Mayo has given valuable assistance in promoting Training Union work throughout the Association. Her presence at all the Training Union executive meetings has been of considerable help in the planning of our work. She has also assisted greatly in the matter of publicity and in the teaching of Training Union Study Courses. The officers wish to express their real appreciation of her constant and willing assistance.

COUNTY UNITS. The large area covered by our Association precludes that close co-operation between Unions so essential to wholesome growth. It seems wise therefore to work through smaller units. Nash County has set the example in this matter by organizing a County Training Union Group, which meets quarterly, and which has already gone far towards encouraging Training Unions in all their 22 churches. Wilson County is in process of organizing along the same lines. It is hoped that other areas will see the advantage of forming similar groups for the promotion of more intensive work. Much of the work of the T. U. Executive Committee during the coming year will consist of promoting this type of workable group.

The Associational Director is grateful to all who have in any way assisted in making his work effective, and earnestly covets the full and sympathetic support of all the leaders of our churches this coming year.

KINGDOM BUILDING THROUGH TEACHING AND TRAINING IN THE CHURCH BAPTIST BROTHERHOOD

In making my report regarding the statistics of our various brotherhoods, I feel as if I should say a few words about the workings of a brotherhood and what it means to a church and the men church members. During the past year, the churches of our association have shown an increased interest in brotherhoods. Several churches re-organized or organized for the first time while many others have enlarged their work. What I have to say this morning may be very feebly presented but I am in hopes that many more churches will make a special effort to organize a brotherhood during the coming year.

First—what is a brotherhood? Well, a brotherhood is a group of consecrated men promoting the whole program of their church and of the denomination. Now you might ask why should there be a brotherhood in every church—So I might say that a church is more complete in its denominational structure with a brotherhood. On the other hand, 65 percent of the men of our churches are idle because there are not enough elected officers to go around. Therefore, the brotherhood is a denominational agency dealing exclusively with men of the church for the exclusive purpose of giving the men an opportunity to have a part in the whole program of the church. A brotherhood will confine a lot of its activities to the program of the church. So you can see how a program can be made to go forward with a group of men back of it and helping the pastor who is their leader. A live brotherhood in your church will do the following things:

1. Backing the pastor—with the men giving him the best helpers in the world, the men of his own church who are brotherhood members.
2. Boosting the work—rejoicing to have part in the greatest work in the world and to encourage everyone else to have a part.

Here are a few activities in which a brotherhood can engage:

1. Furnishing thoughtful and constructive masculine leadership to all departments of church work.
2. Inviting men to Bible school, training union, prayer meeting and Sunday school services of the church.
3. Enlisting new tithers.
4. Holding cottage prayer services.
5. Enlisting the un-listed men of the church.
6. Distributing religious literature.
7. Speaking with un-affiliated Baptists.
8. Visiting the sick and needy.
9. Winning lost men to Christ.
10. Establishing missions stations in unchurched sections of your community.
11. Anything requested by the pastor or the church which has as its purpose the extension of the kingdom through the program of the church.

As the Sunday School is the teaching agency and recruiting ground for people to be won to the Lord Jesus Christ and enlisted in his church, so is the brotherhood a group of working men to establish new Sunday Schools and churches.

As the Baptist Training Union is an organization for promotion of memory work, sword drills, speech contest, scripture reading and choir contest, so is the brotherhood a group of men endeavoring to back up all these leaders and always seeking to build bigger and better training unions.

The brotherhood helps the individual man church member to orientate himself in the program of the church. It develops him spiritually, encouraging prayer and the daily reading of the scriptures. The brotherhoods of our association have made marvelous progress this year. A study of the statistical tables compiled from the letters received from various brotherhoods, reveal very gratifying results.

Since the association cannot report all the activities in their bulletin, several things should be revealed in my report: We have 87 churches in our Roanoke Baptist association at the present time and there are 14 brotherhoods. These 14 brotherhoods have an enrollment of around 779 members. Everyone of them is very active and going forward. I have very reliable information that other churches are interested and making progress in organizing a brotherhood.

I want to thank personally all the brotherhoods in their prompt reply to my request for information. It is not a matter of what activities we can or should support but here are very interesting statements as to just what projects your brotherhoods are sponsoring—they include such items as:

1. Building and equipping kitchens in the church. Men doing the work.
2. Encouraging men to attend and participate in church revivals.
3. Putting proper communion cup racks on back of church pews.
4. Holding services at prison camps.
5. Organizing, supporting and aiding Sunday School missions.
6. Helping establish new churches in the community.
7. Men furnishing transportation for revivals.
8. Men helping with city wide church census.
9. Men visitation for revivals.
10. Assistance in church libraries.
11. Brotherhood making recordings of Bible scripture for near blind.

All these items show that your brotherhoods are at work.

Most of the brotherhoods meet monthly, some twice per month. The supper dinner held along with the monthly meetings seems to be very popular. Men love to eat, don't they?

Most of the brotherhood organizations are new, having been organized within the last three years.

In the Southern Baptist Convention there are approximately 3500 churches with a brotherhood having an enrollment of above 125,000 men.

Let me urge that your church will soon be in this group if you do not already have a brotherhood.

The Net Gain in the Tent Operating Fund was \$147.96, and the cash balance in the Tent Operating Fund as of Sept. 11, was \$197.96, which includes the \$50.00 advanced from the Associational Treasurer at the beginning of the tent season to begin operations.

The total cost for the house trailer rent, insurance and license plate amounted to \$207.96 for the summer, which is not included in the above table of the cost of the tent work.

A REVIEW OF THE MISSIONARY'S ASSISTANT

Last year two Summer Student Workers assisted the Missionary in his Summer Tent Program. No Student Workers assisted him this year. However, his wife and son accompanied him in most of his work this year, and gave much valuable assistance. Mrs. Burgiss worked in a total of five Vacation Bible Schools in connection with the tent work. She was Principal of the schools at Calvary, Roanoke Rapids, and Nicholsonville, Washington; was Supt. of the Junior Department in the tent V.B.S. at Williamston, and assisted in the work at Chockoyotte and South Weldon. In addition to the V. B. S. work she assisted in the evening tent services and with visitation. His son Samuel also was a great help in many ways, in moving the tent and in the evening services.

A REVIEW OF RESULTS OF THE SUMMER PROGRAM

The results of our Summer Program this year have been quite gratifying, for it has been, perhaps, our best season. Tent meetings have been held in connection with the organization of two new churches, and valuable assistance has been given them. However, both of them were operating Sunday Schools before the missionary assisted them with tent meetings. His assistance was beneficial in the organization of the churches though.

The Summer Program of Vacation Bible Schools has been the best ever, with the average attendance in each as given in the above table.

The financial phase of the Summer Program has been gratifying, with a net gain being made at each place, with the total net gain being \$147.96, which compares favorably with last year's net gain of \$95.50.

We believe much more good was accomplished than is immediately visible to the eye, or can be given in any table of figures.

A RECOMMENDATION

Your Missionary wishes to recommend that our present Primary Mission Program be continued, with adequate plans, equipment and financial support, and with needed improvements from time to time.

REPORT OF ASSISTANT ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY

Serving for these nine months in the promotional and educational phases of the associational missionary program, your worker has had the joy and privilege of planning and working very closely with the associational executive committees of the Sunday School, Training Union, and Woman's Missionary Union, as well as with the executive committee of the general association.

Within the field of Sunday School the greatest number of activities has probably been with Vacation Bible Schools. Working with Rev. E. G. Cole, associational Bible School Superintendent, two all-day Bible School clinics were planned for the association. Your worker assisted in enlisting conference leaders for these, and then led the conferences for principals and pastors. It was possible to get a good view of Bible School work in the Roanoke association as she met with faculties of five schools for period of training; served as principal, superintendent and teacher of Juniors, and pianist in three schools; and visited with three other Bible schools. Concentrating on the thirteen churches that had reported no Bible School with either the State Sunday School Department or in their 1952 associational letter, we are happy to say that we know that ten of these churches had schools in 1953. God has richly blessed our efforts with the boys and girls of our association.

In this year of special emphasis on enlistment it has been a privilege to work with the committee on "A Million More in '54" and to assist with plans and programs in the promotion of the three fall Sunday School rallies.

Your worker has met with the associational Training Union committee as it has planned each of the associational activities through the year. Great interest has been expressed as we have begun promoting the organization of county groups throughout the association. It was a joy to have a part in the planning and organizing of the Nash County group. Meeting with nominating committees, program committees, and general planning groups; one is convinced that God has blessed our efforts as we've seen new enthusiasm in the Training Union work.

Probably the major activity with Woman's Missionary Union has been the planning and directing of the R. A. and G. A. Camp for Juniors at Chowan College. A group of 15 deeply consecrated men and

women assisted in the camp program as we led 117 boys and girls in a week of rich fellowship, fun, and missionary information and inspiration. Other outstanding activities have been presenting the book for juniors in the mission study institute, leading the demonstration of young people's work at the associational W. M. U. meeting, conducting the installation service at the Associational Business Woman's Federation meeting, serving with the divisional committee on plans for the R. A. Conclave, and leading the period of dedication following the election of officers at the State W. M. U. Convention.

Some of the other activities of these nine months have been: filling speaking engagements with 13 local groups, 5 county groups, and 1 associational group; discussing methods with 6 local groups and 1 county group; teaching 9 study courses; conferring with numerous individuals about the work; assisting with new organizations in two churches; assisting one church with a survey and census; assisting with one regional Sunday School meeting and one regional Training Union meeting; attending homecoming services in two churches; promoting the two "A" nights, attending regularly the pastors' conferences and the executive committee meetings; assisting in the publishing and mailing of the "Roanoke Review"; assisting with the mailing of the Baptist Builder's Club; and supplying publicity on activities of the association to 14 weekly and daily newspapers within the association.

In the interest of our association and its work it has been a happy privilege to attend the following conferences: The State-Wide Sunday School Leadership Week, Shelby; the State-Wide Vacation Bible School Clinic, Fruitland; the State Sunday School Planning Meeting, Goldsboro; the State W. M. U. Convention, Wilmington; the State W. M. U. Council Meeting, Meredith College; the Associational Missions Conference, Caswell; and the State Sunday School Conference for the Deaf as it met in our own association.

It has been a joy to visit and work in 48 churches of the association. Throughout the work and visitation, your worker has been conscious of promoting every phase of our Baptist Program and has in so far as possible, through announcements and programs, called the people to a support of the entire program.

Days ahead look bright for every organization within our association. Sunday School, with its new emphasis on enlistment, faces the new year with definite plans for better associational organization and enthusiastic planning. Training Union has launched out on an enlarged program of organization and more intensive promotion within each county. Woman's Missionary Union has been delighted with its new camping program and goes into its new year with great plans for its young people. With grateful hearts we say "thank God for work to do and for His guidance through that work."

REPORT OF CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

After making a thorough study of the Constitution and By-Laws and considering certain recommendations from the Executive Committee, your Constitution and By-Laws Committee wishes to make the following report.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That Article IV of the Constitution be amended by striking out all the words of line 5 following the word **vote** through the word **present** and adding at the end of the Article following the word **fellowship**: **Twenty churches shall constitute a quorum and decisions of those present shall be considered the action of the Association.** The amended section to read:

ARTICLE IV. AFFILIATED CHURCHES: Baptist Churches which have petitioned for membership and by vote of the Association are accounted to be in fellowship with the purposes and undertakings of this body, shall comprise the list of affiliated churches. The vote of the Association to extend fellowship, or to withdraw fellowship, shall be a two-thirds vote. Failure to report annually to the Association shall raise the question of fellowship. **Twenty churches shall constitute a quorum and decisions of those present shall be considered the action of the Association.**

2. That Article V of the Constitution be amended by striking out all words in line 2 following the word **annually** through **meeting**. The amended section to read:

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS: The officers of the Association shall be elected annually, and shall assume their duties at the close of the annual meeting, and serve until the election of their successors. Officers shall be: Moderator, Vice-moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, (no one of whom may be eligible to serve in the same official capacity for more than five consecutive years); other officers shall be: the members of the Executive Committee, together with the President of the W. M. U. who also shall be accounted an officer of the Association.

3. That Article VI of the Constitution be amended by inserting the following words after the word **county** on line 3: **where a majority of the Baptist Churches are affiliated with the Association.** The amended section to read:

ARTICLE VI. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: At each annual meeting, or not later than sixty days thereafter, the Executive Committee of the Association shall name a Nominating Committee, consisting of one messenger from each county, **where a majority of the Baptist Churches are affiliated with the Association**, whose duty it shall be to bring to the Association at its next annual meeting nominations for all officers of the Association.

4. That Article VII of the Constitution be designed as Article VI and Article VI as Article VII.
5. That Article IX of the Constitution be amended by striking out all words on line 2 following the word **vote** through the word **present**. The amended section to read:

ARTICLE IX. AMENDMENT: This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote, provided: that the proposed amendment has been read to the Association at the previous annual meeting, or not later than the day previous to the vote to be taken on the amendment, and referred to a committee for clarification and correlation.

6. That Article 8 (Title, TREASURER) of the By-Laws be amended by inserting at the end of the article following the word **committee**, **He shall also furnish the Chairman of the Executive and Finance Committee a report at least ten days before each regular scheduled meeting of the Executive Committee.** The amended section to read:

ARTICLE 8. TREASURER: The Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Association, disburse them according to its order, and present a written report of same to each annual meeting of the Association, and additional reports at the request of the Executive Committee. **He shall also furnish the Chairman of the Executive and Finance Committee a report at least ten days before each regular scheduled meeting of the Executive Committee.**

7. That Article 15 (Title, BUILDER'S CLUB) of the By-Laws be amended by inserting at the end of the article following the word **effective**, **Provided no allocation of funds may be made by the Builder's Club or Executive Committee unless sufficient funds are on hand to pay all commitments in full.** The amended section to read:

ARTICLE 15. BUILDER'S CLUB. The Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club shall be under the supervision and direction of a committee of nine members to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee, five of which shall be from its own body and four from the association at large. This committee shall direct and supervise the Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club under the supervision of the executive committee. All actions and commitments of the Builder's Club shall be submitted to the Executive Committee for final approval before becoming effective, **provided no allocation of funds may be made by the Builder's Club or Executive Committee unless sufficient funds are on hand to pay all commitments in full.**

The proposed amendments to the Constitution only clarify the language and rearrange the sections with no other important changes being made. The proposed amendments to the By-Laws only require the Treasurer to mail a financial report to the Chairman of the Executive and Finance Committee before each meeting and prohibits the Builder's Club or the Executive Committee from making financial commitments unless sufficient funds are on hand to pay them.

All amendments are submitted with the approval of the Executive Committee.

REPORT OF THE ROANOKE BAPTIST BUILDER'S CLUB

The purpose of this club is to render financial assistance in the building program of the weak churches in our association. The money thus given comes from the voluntary gifts of individuals who wish to have a part in this work because of their love and desire to see these churches helped. These offerings are in no way to affect the usual contributions made through the churches and under no circumstances can the members be asked for more than \$10.00 per year.

In an effort to safeguard these offerings and to use them as wisely as possible, it is necessary for both the Executive Committee and the Roanoke Baptist Builders Club Committee to approve an application before any church receives aid.

It was with regret that the Executive Committee and the Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club Committee accepted the resignation of the founder of the Club, Rev. E. E. Ulrich, who resigned because of ill health. Brother Ulrich has done a great work in organizing this club and promoting it until the necessary 1000 members joined. We deeply appreciate the labor, love, and executive ability that he has put into this work, and are grateful that he is yet on the committee.

The new chairman was elected by the Executive Committee and on May 11 she mailed to the membership a letter asking that they send in \$4.00 of the year's pledge at that time. The response was very encouraging. A total of 487 members replied, sending in \$2,282.31. The many notes that accompanied these gifts testified to the joy and eagerness with which the members met this opportunity. This money was used to help Oakview, Pinetown, South Creek, and Stanhope.

On August 25th another letter was mailed asking for \$2.00 of the year's pledge of \$10.00. Again the response was prompt and heartening. To date, September 30th, a total of 317 members have sent \$1,104.00. Of this \$800.00 has been given Edgemont, and \$150.00 to South Creek, bringing to a total of \$500.00 that has been given to South Creek. Again the givers expressed joy in thus having this avenue of service. There is now a balance in the treasury of \$205.60.

There are still other churches on the waiting list hoping to receive aid, and it is with great pride that we see new churches being organized in our association by our missionary, Mr. Burgiss. In order to render more effective service we need more members. In this way we can best help with the great work of primary missions being carried on in our association.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF NINE APPOINTED FOR THE PURPOSE OF STUDYING THE WORK OF THE ASSOCIATION

To the Officers and Messengers of the Roanoke Baptist Association assembled at Wilson, North Carolina, on October 13, 1953.

GREETINGS:

We, the Committee of Nine appointed by the Moderator upon authority of the Association on October 15, 1952, for the purpose of studying the over-all program of the Association, beg to submit the following report.

Your Committee has given prayerful and extensive study to the over-all program of the various departments of the Association. This involved the holding of four meetings. The attendance of these meetings was very inspiring, and there was a very fine spirit of cooperation among the members of the Committee. We have felt the leadership of the Lord in reaching our decisions. At the out-set of these meetings all of the members emphasized the importance of laying aside personal considerations and have gone into our deliberations seeking the leadership of the Lord.

We have been fortunate in having the wise counsel and advice of the Rev. Douglas M. Branch, President of the State Baptist Convention; the Rev. Clyde Baucom, Moderator of the Roanoke Baptist Association; the Rev. W. D. Morris, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Association; and the Rev. Grady Burgiss, Missionary of the Roanoke Baptist Association. The advice and counsel of these experienced Christian leaders has encouraged us to seek the Lord's will in all decisions made by the Committee.

The study of the Committee has revealed some interesting facts which we would like to pass along to the Association for prayerful study in order that we, as an Association, at some future date, may be sufficiently informed to take whatever action the facts submitted herewith may warrant.

We invite a careful study of the information which has been placed in your hands as a part of this report. We hope that each church within the Association will feel free to give a very frank expression concerning the preparation and adoption of a program for the future promotion of the work of the Association in an effort to assist the members of the Committee in reaching such decisions as may be for the best interest of our Lord's work and in keeping with the best Christian thinking of our members.

Information For Study

We enlist for your information comparative data covering the Church members, Gifts to Missions, and Total Gifts of Areas 1 and 2 as indicated in the following map. This is compared with the average Association within the State as indicated by the table below and designated the Average Association in North Carolina.

Observations

1. It is interesting to note that there is comparatively little difference in dollars and cents in the amount of Missionary Gifts from areas 1 and 2. Observe, too, that these figures are based on 1952 reports. Association Mission Gifts have been increased from \$.50 to \$.75 per member since that time.

2. That each area is larger in the number of churches, members, and gifts than the average Association in North Carolina.

3. It will be further noted that the potentialities of Area 1 or 2 as outlined on the attached map (back of book) are much greater than the average Association in the State.

With the assistance available through our State Mission Board, each area could well become the outstanding Association within our State. In view of the facts submitted herewith, your Committee wishes to make the following recommendations for the consideration of the Association.

Recommendations

1. Your Committee is of the opinion that any change in the program of the Association should be given extensive and prayerful consideration in order that the Lord's will may be done. We, therefore, recommend that the Committee of Nine be continued to study further the program and that they be instructed to prepare and bring to the Association in 1954 a definite detailed program to cover the work of all the departments of the Association.

2. We further recommend that the information in this report be given careful study by the members of the affiliated churches and urge that any suggestions concerning the future program of our Association be transmitted through the Chairman of the Committee of Nine for the information and consideration of the full Committee.

3. The Committee solicits the earnest prayers of all our Christian friends as we seek Divine guidance in our deliberations in an effort to reach such decisions as may best promote and expand the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION OF THE ROANOKE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Thursday, March 26, 1953

The Edgecombe County societies were hostess to the Women's Missionary Union of the Roanoke Baptist Association, Thursday, March 26, 1953, which met in the Arlington Street Baptist Church for the forty-sixth annual session with Mrs. L. H. Kitchin, Associational Superintendent presiding. Mrs. Kitchin opened the meeting with a few remarks and prayer following. The congregation then sang "Come Women, Wide Proclaim."

Mrs. W. D. Waters brought a most inspiring devotional taken from Psalm 145 after which Mrs. Ben Arrington, soloist, sang "The Lord Is My Light" accompanied by Mrs. Lyman Jones, pianist. Mrs. E. L. Taylor at this time gave the mission study report saying, "The purpose of the W. M. S. was to distribute information and stimulate interest. A balanced study for the mind and soul is just as important as a balanced diet is to the body. The need for this knowledge of mission study has never been more imperative than now.

Mrs. Paul Waters presented the community mission report. Prior to her report, she payed tribute to the late Mrs. E. Y. Lovelace who was for many years the community mission chairman. Mrs. Waters presented the plan for Daily Vacation Bible School for the colored people in our Association. Roanoke is the first association to have an associational council function. Mrs. Waters expressed the desire that this might be a nest egg for a council for each county.

Miss Lelia Higgs gave the stewardship report. She reported an increase in tithers last quarter, but we are still short of a sizeable goal. Miss Higgs showed posters on books for active groups that have been made by her seven year old niece.

Mrs. Edgar Joyner said that we could boast on being the largest association in the state, but this boast was merely a challenge to us. Out of the 87 churches we have 82 societies. Our challenge for this year is five.

Hour of Prayer for Associational Missions: Mrs. Grady Burgiss, Miss Lelia Higgs, Mrs. E. E. Richards.

Roll call was by counties with each county leader announcing the date of her county meeting at this time.

Mrs. Kitchin, at this time, presented our state W. M. U. president, Mrs. Gordon Maddrey, who spoke on "Pray, Work Yet More." Mrs. Maddrey closed with the congregation standing for a moment in silent prayer after which we sang the hymn "Oh Zion Haste".

Mrs. Gilmer Cross, divisional junor organizational leader, made summer camp announcements. Mrs. R. E. Shervette and Mrs. A. F. Sower sang "This Is My Task" accompanied by Mrs. Hunter Pope at the piano.

Mrs. Whisenhunt from Clayton, presented her sister, Miss Olive Lawton, who spoke to us on "Christ Whom All the Earth Shall Seek." Miss Lawton held her audience spellbound while she presented her speech. She closed her remarks by singing "Oh Zion Haste" in Chinese followed by prayer.

Miss Hilda Mayo presented the afternoon devotional, using verses of scripture alternately with verse of the hymn, "Lord Speak to Me" by Mrs. Paul Wilkins, soloist, and Mrs. E. E. Richards, pianist.

Mrs. W. J. Bateman, young peoples leader, presented her report, "Come Clapping Children's Hands." An informal meeting of the young peoples leaders to plan work for their next quarter; in which a camp for our association at Chowan College was discussed. This camp will be held August 10-15th. Details will be mailed to the leaders at an early date. The committee recommended our association sponsor

this camp and we voted to do so with hope that the camp would be self-supporting. We are still supporting the divisional and state camps.

Mrs. W. D. Marris gave us a few highlights on the Margaret Fund and Training school. She stated that after the Southern Baptist Convention meeting, the training school would be renamed the "Carver School of Mission and Social Work" in memory of Dr. W. O. Carver.

Miss Gloria Blanton from East Carolina College of Greenville, brought us greetings from the Baptist students there. She told us of the church work on the campus through the Baptist Student Center by giving something of a program and proof of the investment in the Baptist union as well as some of the needs. Mrs. Kitchin asked that we make these needs a part of our community mission work in our local societies.

Miss Ester Simmons reported on the B. W. C. Federation. There are now 29 active circles.

Mr. Grady Burgess, associational Missionary, showed us a large map of our work and our needs. He told of the church at Grifton. A motion was made that we have a free-will offering for the Grifton Baptist Church. This offering amounted to \$168.70. The ladies from the Grifton Church expressed their deep appreciation for this expression of our love.

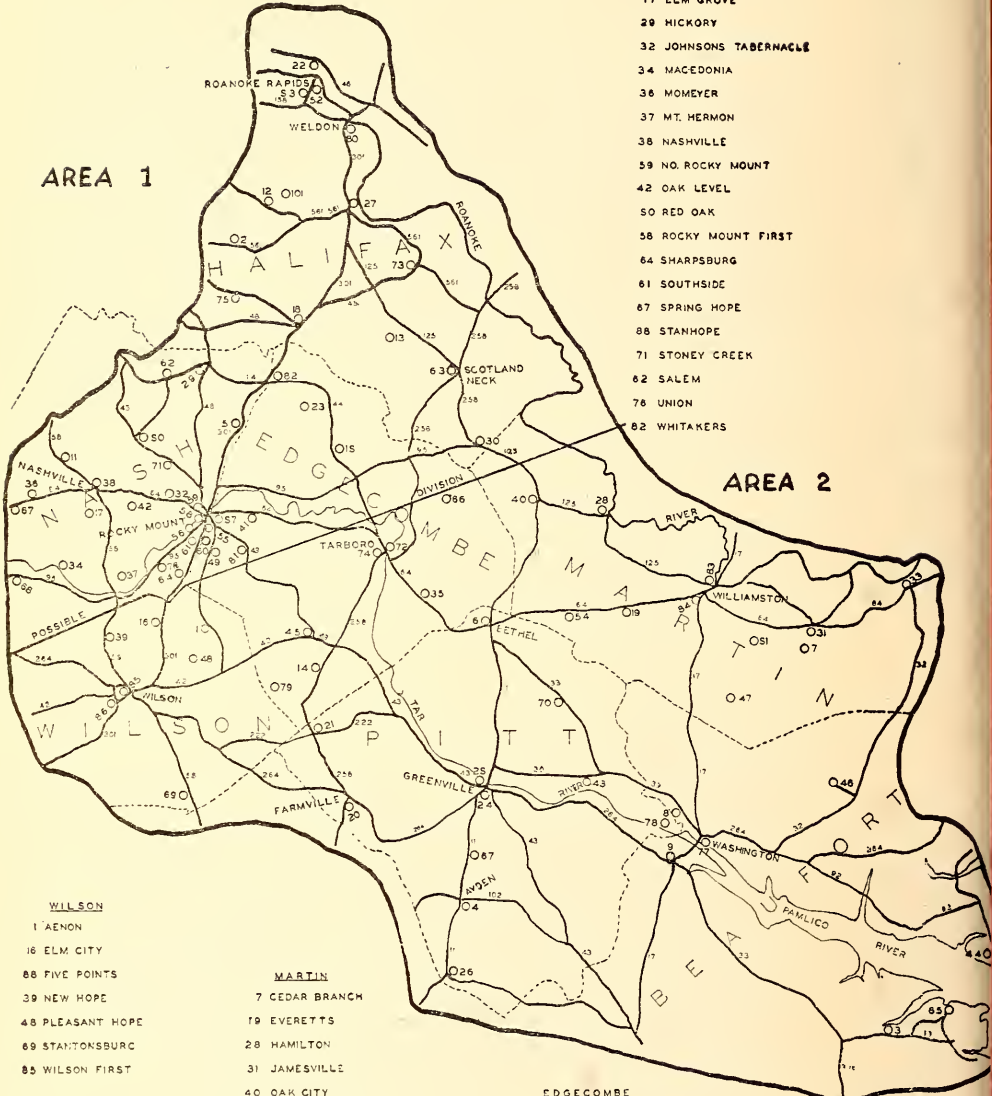

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. NAME: The name of this body is "Roanoke Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE: It is the purpose of the Association to provide an organization of cooperation for the Baptist churches affiliated with it, and to encourage them to faithfulness in every endeavor which we shall undertake together in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP: The Association shall consist of messengers who are members of the affiliated churches as follows: (1) one messenger from each church and one additional messenger for each one hundred resident members or fraction thereof, up to a maximum of seven messengers, chosen annually by the affiliated churches; (2) the pastors; (3) the duly elected officers of the Association and the current President of the Associational W. M. U.

ARTICLE IV. AFFILIATED CHURCHES: Baptist Churches which have petitioned for membership and by vote of the Association are accounted to be in fellowship with the purposes and undertakings of this body, shall comprise the list of affiliated churches. The vote of the Association to extend fellowship, or to withdraw fellowship, shall be a two-thirds vote. Failure to report annually to the Association shall raise the question of fellowship. Twenty churches shall constitute a quorum and decisions of those present shall be considered the action of the Association.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS: The officers of the Association shall be elected annually, and shall assume their duties at the close of the annual meeting, and serve until the election of their successors. Officers shall be: Moderator, Vice-moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, (no one of whom may be eligible to serve in the same official capacity for more than five consecutive years); other officers shall be: the members of the Executive Committee, together with the President of the W. M. U. who also shall be accounted an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, together with a pastor and a layman from each county where a majority of the Baptist Churches are affiliated with this Association, and three members at large. The Executive Committee is charged with the duty of executing the plans and decisions of the Association, including the associational program of missions and extension, and the employment and direction of the associational Missionaries. A full report of its work shall be presented at each annual meeting, together with plans and recommendations for the promotion and extension of the work of the Association. The execu-

tive Committee shall act for the Association between the annual meetings in conformity with the expressed decisions of the body. A vacancy occurring between annual meetings may be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: At each annual meeting, or not later than sixty days thereafter, the Executive Committee of the Association shall name a Nominating Committee, consisting of one messenger from each county, where a majority of the Baptist Churches are affiliated with the Association, whose duty it shall be to bring to the Association at its next annual meeting nominations for all officers of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, where not otherwise provided by this Constitution or the By-Laws.

ARTICLE IX. AMENDMENT: This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote, provided: that the proposed amendment has been read to the Association at the previous annual meeting, or not later than the day previous to the vote to be taken on the amendment, and referred to a committee for clarification and correlation.

ARTICLE X. ADOPTION: Upon adoption, this Constitution shall become effective at the close of this the 45th annual session of the Roanoke Baptist Association, and shall supersede any and all previous constitutions and by-laws, and cancel any action in conflict with this Constitution.

By-Laws of the Roanoke Baptist Association

Article 1

MEETINGS

The meetings of the association shall be held annually at such time and place as may be decided by the association in regular session.

Article 2

OPENING

Meetings of the association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

Article 3

QUORUM

Representatives from twenty of the affiliated churches shall constitute a quorum.

Article 4

ORDER OF BUSINESS

An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each annual meeting which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

Article 5

CHURCH LETTER

Each affiliated church shall send to the annual meeting of the

association, on forms furnished by the clerk, a full report of the church work for the year ending September 30.

Article 6

MODERATOR AND VICE-MODERATOR

The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall preside at all meetings of the association. They shall both be members of the Executive Committee and as opportunity may permit, they shall act as fraternal visitors to the churches throughout the year representing the fellowship of the entire association.

Article 7

CLERK

The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association and shall prepare and cause to be published and distributed, as directed by the association or executive committee, minutes and statistics of the association as soon as practical after adjournment. He shall also mail the necessary forms and letters to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the association. A copy of the minutes shall be mailed to the officers, affiliated churches, to each institution participating in the cooperative program, and such other institutions and individuals as the association or executive committee may direct.

Article 8

TREASURER

The Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Association, disburse them according to its order, and present a written report of same to each annual meeting of the Association, and additional reports at the request of the Executive Committee. He shall also furnish the Chairman of the Executive and Finance Committees a report at least ten days before each regular scheduled meeting of the Executive Committee.

Article 9

AUDITOR

The auditor shall examine the books and records of the association and submit a detailed report covering his work at such time as may be required by the Executive Committee or the association.

Article 10

SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The Sunday School Superintendent shall direct and supervise the Sunday School program of the association under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 11

TRAINING UNION DIRECTOR

The Training Union Director shall have charge of the direction and promotion of the Training Union Program under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 12

BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood program of the association shall be under the

direction of the Brotherhood President subject to the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 13
REVENUE

The contributions of the affiliated churches for the purpose of defraying expenses of the Missionary program and other activities of the association shall be on a resident member basis and shall be in such amount as may be approved by the association from year to year.

Article 14
SALARIES OF OFFICERS

Salaries of the Missionary or Missionaries of the association, as well as any other officer, shall be in such amount as may be provided for in the annual budget and approved by the association from year to year.

Article 15
BUILDER'S CLUB

The Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club shall be under the supervision and direction of a committee of nine members to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee, five of which shall be from its own body and four from the association at large. This committee shall direct and supervise the Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club under the supervision of the Executive Committee. All actions and commitments of the Builder's Club shall be submitted to the Executive Committee for final approval before becoming effective, provided no allocation of funds may be made by the Builder's Club or Executive Committee unless sufficient funds are on hand to pay all commitments in full.

Article 16
STANDING COMMITTEES

The executive committee at its first session following the annual meeting of the association shall appoint the following committees: Constitution and By-Laws and Finance. The first member named on each committee shall serve as chairman.

It shall be the duty of the committee on Constitution and By-Laws to receive, examine, and make recommendations to the association in session on all proposed amendments to the constitution and by-laws.

It shall be the duty of the Finance committee to supervise the financial program of the association and report to the executive committee regarding same from time to time. It shall also be the duty of the Finance committee to submit to the executive committee at each annual session a budget giving the estimated revenue for the ensuing term, as well as the itemized proposed expenses for this period.

Article 17
PROGRAM COMMITTEE

The program committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the association. This committee shall meet following the close

of each annual session and select those who shall write the reports for the next annual meeting. The appointees of the program committee and their assignments shall be printed in the minutes of the annual session.

Article 18

ASSOCIATIONAL COMMITTEES

The Moderator, following the convening each annual session of the association, shall appoint the following committees:

1. Committee on place and preacher
2. Committee on resolutions
3. Committee on petitions
4. Any other committees that may be authorized by the association.

Article 19

MISSIONARY PROGRAM

The Missionary and extension work of the association shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee, as well as the Missionary or Missionaries whom they shall employ and direct. The Missionary fund shall be kept and disbursed by the Treasurer as directed by the Executive Committee.

Article 20

MINUTES OF THE ASSOCIATION

The minutes of each annual meeting of the association shall be examined, approved and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before being printed. Said minutes shall be submitted to the first session of the next annual meeting for consideration and approval.

Article 21

VISITORS

Visitors may be invited to participate in the deliberations of the association without the privilege to vote.

Article 22

AMENDMENTS

All amendments or additions to these By-Laws shall be submitted in writing on forms furnished by the association clerk. No amendment to the By-Laws shall be considered by the association until they have been referred to the By-Law Committee. No resolutions adopted by this association shall become a part of these By-Laws.

Article 23

EFFECTIVE DATE

The effective date of these By-Laws or any additions or amendments thereto shall become effective immediately upon passage.

Out of the Net Gain of \$155.49 in the Tent Operating Fund \$19.00 was paid for labor and hauling to the place of storage, in Farmer's Warehouse, in Greenville, which left a *net gain* of \$136.49. A check for that amount was forwarded to our Treasurer, W. L. Howell, July 15.

No offerings were received in the services held in the Bear Grass School. The expenses of that meeting were cared for by the Martin County Baptist Council.

In a part of the tent meetings this year no offerings were received by the Missionary. The expenses of the meetings were taken care of by the sponsoring Church or Mission, and \$25.00 per week was donated to the Tent Fund for the use of the tent.

Nearly all the preaching in the tent this year was done by the local

ministers, with the services at times being completely in their charge. This was necessary at times because the Missionary was physically unable to meet the demands of such a strenuous program. (The Missionary was ably assisted much of the time by his wife.)

BAPTIST COUNCILS ORGANIZED AND WORKING

The Wilson Baptist Council, which was organized in the tent in 1952, has sponsored a survey and the beginning of a Mission in the Gold Park area of Wilson.

The Washington Baptist Council was organized Dec. 20, 1953, and has sponsored a Mission in West Washington.

The Martin County Baptist Council was organized Feb. 18, 1954, and has sponsored two surveys and a mission project in Martin County.

The Rocky Mount Baptist Council was organized on July 19, 1954.

A joint meeting of the deacons of the Memorial and Immanuel Churches in Greenville has approved a survey of that city in the near future.

MISCELLANEOUS ACTIVITIES OF YOUR MISSIONARY

In the early part of 1954 your Missionary wrote a Historical Sketch of the background and origin of the Association, and made extensive copies of other historical data and information.

He has worked very closely with the Committee of Nine.

He has helped in planning and promoting building programs at South Creek, Pamlico, Calvary, Chokoyotte and Dawsons, having made a number of pencil drawings for their use. Also he has acquainted the above churches with the services and various buildings plans of the Architectural Department of the Sunday School Board.

He assisted in purchasing and equipping a new house trailer.

He has assisted also in the work of the Builder's Club.

A RECOMMENDATION

Your Missionary wishes to recommend that our present Primary Mission Program be continued, with whatever alterations, enlargement or financial support the needs may indicate.

Report of the Associational Director of Christian Doctrine

Daily one is reminded that there could be no associational program of Christian Education without the help and cooperation of the many people who so willingly and efficiently work in their local churches. For each of these we are deeply grateful. The educational worker counts it a high privilege to know and work with this host of dedicated men, women and young people.

Working with the Executive Committee of the Associational Training Union one has been constantly aware of the growth in that organization as two new county units have been formed, making a total of three counties now having regular quarterly meetings of inspiration and information. Added interest has been manifested in state-wide activities as the Roanoke had a larger attendance at the Regional Convention this year than at any previous time, and a greater

number attending the summer assemblies.

Working closely with the Associational Sunday School Superintendent it has been a real privilege to participate in the 6 Sunday School rallies. We were again aware of increased interest in statewide activities as the Roanoke led associations in the number of regular clinicians attending the 1954 North Carolina Sunday School Leadership Conference, with 14 representatives going to Charlotte for the week. A program of visitation has carried the educational director into many local Sunday schools, into 2 monthly officers and teachers meetings, and into the Sunday School class at Park View Hospital being sponsored by the Baptist Student Union there.

One of the main activities of the summer was the five weeks spent in 4 Daily Vacation Bible Schools, serving as principal, secretary, pianist, junior teacher, or intermediate teacher as the occasion demanded. It has been a joy to work with the Associational Vacation Bible School Superintendent, to assist in the three Vacation Bible School Clinics, and to follow up closely the reporting of Bible Schools in the association. All of this has brought a reward in seeing now 91 church schools and 3 mission schools reporting! This means that every church in the association except one had a Bible school this year!

With the associational W. M. U. leaders the educational director has been able to assist in the planning of activities for both women and young people. Probably the high-light of organizational work has been the scheduling of quarterly meetings of the Y. W. A. Council Executive Committee and assisting with plans for two general Council meetings during the year. Ranking high in interesting experiences of the year was the directing of the program of the Associational Junior G. A. & R. A. Camp at Chowan, where 161 boys and girls camped for the week. It was a rich experience to have fellowship with the two missionaries and the group of other consecrated adults who assisted.

Other activities within the association during the year have been: meeting and speaking with 8 county and 12 local groups; teaching 16 study courses; assisting 2 churches with new organizations; assisting with the Associational Training Union Annual Tournament and the Officers and Leaders Council; meeting with Bible School faculties of 5 churches; attending the Associational Federation of Business Women's Circles, 2 G. A. Coronation services, and the Associational W. M. U. Leadership Conference; leading a conference at the Associational G. A. Rally and a panel discussion at the Y. W. A. Council meeting; assisting with plans for 2 Mission Study Institutes; and attending 3 Home Coming Services. The worker has met regularly with all associational organizational executive committees, and with several county committees.

In the interest of our association and its work it has been a happy privilege to participate in regional, state, and southwide activities by attending the Associational Missions Conference at Fruitland for one week, the Annual North Carolina Baptist State Convention, the General oBard Meeting in Greensboro, the State and Regional Planning

Meetings for Training Union, the Regional Sunday School Conference, the State W. M. U. Convention, the State W. M. U. Executive Council meeting at Meredith, the special conference for associational W. M. U. leaders at Campbell the Divisional R. A. Conclave, and the Divisional W. M. U. meeting; serving on the faculty at Ridgecrest Y. W. A. Camp for one week; and leading the conference for the Girls' Auxiliary Counselors at two over-night State W. M. U. Leadership Institutes at Fruitland. Because of a love for the work with young people, one week of vacation time was given to leading the vesper services at the Tennessee Girls' Auxiliary state camp.

Some experiences that have brought additional information and inspiration to the Educational director have been: assisting the State Sunday School Department in an enlargement campaign in the Pee Dee Association; assisting the State Training Union Department by serving on the faculty at Caswell for one week; assisting the Raleigh Association in their Vacation Bible School Clinic! directing the Young People's Speakers Contest and leading a panel discussion at the Regional Training Union Convention; leading a conference at the State Sunday School Planning Meeting; and participating in a panel discussion at the State Vacation Bible School Clinic.

The program of work and visitation has taken the educational director into 71 churches and 1 mission. Always there has been the effort to promote every phase of our Baptist program, through announcements, discussions and programs.

Many days have been crowded with planning, studying, writing hundreds of letters, supplying information to 14 newspapers, assisting with the publication and mailing of the Roanoke Review, and assisting with the mailing of the Baptist Builders Club. There have been many conferences with both groups and individuals, as well as the regular attendance at pastors' conferences and meetings of the Executive Committee of the general Association.

1. Auditor and Executive Committee Member — W. W. Eagles, deceased, succeeded by Joe Eagles, Macclesfield.
2. Executive Committee Member — E. W. Price, Jr., resigned, succeeded by B. Marshall Whitehurst, Rosemary Baptist Church.
3. Baptist Builders Club Committee Member — W. W. Eagles, deceased, succeeded by Joe Eagles, Macclesfield.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Your Executive Committee wishes to recommend that sufficient funds be provided in whatever manner may be decided upon by the Association to purchase a new canvass for the Tent. The Tent suffered severe damage in a wind storm and cannot be used in its present condition.

Your Committee also recommends the adoption of the report of the Committee of Nine as it refers to division of the Association and the plans for the two new Associations.

Your Committee further recommends that Sunday, November 7, be designated as Membership Day for the Roanoke Baptist Builders Club and that pastors be requested to give emphasis to the Club on that day.

Report of the Baptist Builders Club

It is with a prayer of thanksgiving in my heart for the work that we have been able to accomplish that I make the following report of the Roanoke Baptist Builders Club for the Associational Year 1953-54.

The Club has 1059 members, all of whom have joined for the definite purpose of giving financial aid in the building programs of weak churches within our Association. Some of these churches are newly organized with a small membership but with a large vision, while some are older and have outgrown their buildings.

Our plan is very simple. We ask each member to give \$2.00 on call for not more than five calls per year and all of the money thus received goes directly to churches whose applications have been approved by the Roanoke Baptist Builders Club Committee and the Executive Committee. This is very definitely mission work for in the Roanoke Association there are many unchurched people. Our Association led by our missionary, Mr. Burgiss, is attempting to meet this need by establishing new Baptist churches and strengthening those that are weak. Our Club wishes to have a part in this by making a worthy contribution during this period of expansion.

Since its organization the Club has given a total of \$13,900.00. During this year we have given \$7,200 to nine churches as follows:

Realizing that our pastors can be of the greatest assistance in this we respectfully petition that Sunday, November 7, be named as Membership Day for the Roanoke Baptist Builders Club. We further ask that each pastor present to his people on that day the needs of the Club through the Sunday School, the bulletins, and from the pulpit, and that an opportunity be given his people to join the Club.

Notice Regarding Application for Missionary Assistance

In the meeting of the Executive Committee on September 13, motion was made and adopted to include in the Advance Report of the Executive Committee to the Association rules for application of churches for pastoral aid through the State Mission Program. Applications are to be presented to the Executive Committee of the Association in regular meeting on October 26 for approval before being sent to the office of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. Principles

that will be used to guide both the Executive Committee and the General Board are as follows:

The field must be well organized.

The pastor should live on the field.

No aid is to be given where the total membership of the field is over 400, except in institutional cases.

The members must state that they will canvass the membership to see what the members will do toward providing for their own needs.

The amount of aid is to be cut 10% annually in the case of each church.

Preference is to be given to pastors who have no work other than the ministry.

Blanks should be in by December 1 so as to give time for investigation before the meeting of the General Board in January. All applications should have the approval of the Associational Executive Committee.

Preference will be given to churches operating on the basis of an indefinite call to the pastor. (Many churches use the system known as the "annual call.")

No checks are to be sent until the monthly report of the pastor reaches the Raleigh office.

Copy of the church budget is to be attached to the application.

Report of the Committee of Nine

To the Officers, Pastors and Messengers of the Roanoke Baptist Association assembled at the First Baptist Church, Rocky Mount, North Carolina on October 12, 1954.

Greetings:

We, the Committee of Nine, appointed by the Moderator upon the authority of the Association on October 15, 1952, and continued by the adoption of the report of the Committee authorizing its continuation for further study of our program on October 13, 1953, beg to submit the following report: Your committee has continued to give extensive and prayerful study to the work of all departments of the Association, particularly the geographical lines and the many problems they present as well as the difficulty of promoting the work in a successful way over this large area. We have sought the divine leadership of the Lord in reaching these decisions which we bring to you for your consideration.

The members of the Committee have spent much time in analyzing the many important questions brought before us for our consideration and we have sought the counsel and advice of our Moderator Brother E. W. Holmes; Vice-Moderator Brother Dennis H. Holliday; Brother L. Grady Burgiss, our Associational Missionary; and Miss Hilda Mayo, our Associational Director of Christian Education. The advice and counsel of those loyal Christian leaders has assisted the committee in reaching unanimous decisions on the presentation of our recommendations that we submit for your consideration at this meeting. We are mindful of the magnitude of the proposed program but it is our firm conviction, after communicating with all of the affiliated

churches throughout this Association and receiving such an overwhelmingly favorable response to our primary proposal, that we are serving the best interest of the program throughout the Association by the recommendations that we present herewith. We are convinced that these recommendations will expand and promote the Baptist program throughout the entire territory now comprising the Roanoke Baptist Association. We feel confident that our action in this connection will assist us in applying our best efforts for the expansion and promotion of our Lord's Kingdom, not only here in the Association but throughout the world.

Realizing the many problems that will present themselves with a program of the scope and nature recommended herewith, we wish to submit for the consideration of the Association the following resolution.

Resolution

A PROPOSED PROGRAM FOR THE ROANOKE ASSOCIATION

WHEREAS, the Officers, Pastors, and Messengers constituting the membership of the Roanoke Baptist Association in their 45th regular session at Piney Grove Baptist Church on October 15, 1952, created the Committee of Nine for the purpose of studying the overall program of the Association, and

WHEREAS, The Association in regular session on October 13, 1953, by adoption of the recommendations of the Committee of Nine, continued said Committee authorizing and instructing them to study further the program of the Association and prepare and bring to the 47th annual session in 1954 a definite detailed program to cover the work of all departments of the Association, and *WHEREAS*, The Committee of Nine has given extensive and prayerful study to the entire program of the Association and has communicated with each affiliated church within the Association requesting their views on one phase of this most important matter, namely the advisability of dividing the Roanoke Baptist Association, and

WHEREAS, An overwhelming majority of the affiliated churches of the Roanoke Baptist Association have expressed themselves as favoring the program as generally outlined, and

WHEREAS, The members of the Committee of Nine, realizing the many problems that may present themselves as well as the difficulties that may be encountered in formulating and perfecting plans for the successful operation of the proposed program; also realizing the necessity of giving ample assistance and definite assurance to the membership of all of our churches that the purpose of this program is to promote and further expand the Kingdom of our Lord and Savior; further realizing that to accomplish this, the proposal must be presented and put into effect in such a way as least to interfere with our present overall program, as well as to give adequate assistance to our churches in every section in formulating plans and adopting such regulations as will promote the best interest of all churches within the Association;

now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, First, that we create from the territory now composing the Roanoke Baptist Association, two associations to be known by such names as may be mutually agreed upon by each of the affected areas. The creation of the two associations shall be along the geographical lines as indicated by a map of the Roanoke Association attached hereto, designated as Areas 1 and 2 with the following: number of churches, church members, Associational Mission, and total gifts as of September 30, 1953, these figures being taken from the reports of the affiliated churches appearing in the 1953 Associational minutes.

Second, that the churches within each designated area be requested to call a meeting of their members not later than 90 days prior to the annual meeting of the Roanoke Baptist Association in 1955 for the purpose of electing officers and setting up the necessary organization to carry on the work within each area, including the Missionary Program, and that such elected officers of each area shall assume their duties as officers of their respective section or designated association at the close of the 48th annual session of the Roanoke Baptist Association in 1955.

Third, that we instruct the nominating committee to confer with the Officers, Pastors, and Messengers of each area in attendance at this meeting, and bring to this annual session nominations to create a committee of 10 to be elected by this Association, with five members from each area, for the purpose of assisting the leaders and elected officers of each designated area in setting up the necessary machinery for the proper organizing and formulating of plans for the successful operation of each newly formed association. Said committee of 10 shall also make recommendations for the division of property now belonging to the Roanoke Baptist Association and perform such other duties as may assist in the general operation of the program of each area as mutually agreed upon by all concerned; the Committee of 10 to terminate at the close of the 1955 session of the Roanoke Baptist Association.

Fourth, That the Executive Committee be directed to give every assistance to each affected area towards the formulation of plans and the adoption of the necessary program to carry out the terms of this resolution in its entirety, and bring to the 1955 session of this Association such recommendations as may appear to be in the best interest of all concerned after such recommendations have been discussed and mutually agreed upon by the Committee of 10 and the Executive Committee. It is agreed and understood that any recommendations coming from the present organization of the Roanoke Baptist Association shall be in a spirit of cooperation for the purpose of assisting

with formulating a program and shall have no bearing whatsoever on the operation of either Association until and unless approved by the Officers, Pastors, and elected Messengers from each affected area.

Fifth, That we humbly seek divine guidance in the consideration of this program, and pledge ourselves to accept the decisions of this Association in a spirit of brotherly love and go forward with a determination to further extend the program of Christianity among the unsaved people of the Roanoke Baptist Association and throughout the world.

Report of the Sunday School Superintendent

"What does the Bible mean when it says etc.?" is a question that all ministers have asked them from time to time. Today in our local church organization we have the greatest Bible Teaching Potential ever known to man; our Sunday Schools. We in the Roanoke Association have just completed our part in making the great "Million More in '54 Campaign" a huge success. At the beginning of the Associational year we had 22,993 enrolled in our Sunday Schools. When 41 Sunday Schools reported during our spring Half-Million Rallies they had enrolled 1,426 additional persons, or an average of 35 new members per Sunday School. In September at the Pre-Victory Rallies 50 Sunday Schools reported a yearly increase of 2301 additions, or an average of 42.02 persons per church. Whether this average will hold throughout the Association will be known only after all reports are in. If it does, about 3,906 additional persons will have come under the Bible Teaching influence of our Schools this year.

As mentioned above, there were two series of rallies held this past year. One last March with the Washington, Roanoke Rapids, and Wilson churches; and one in September with the Washington, Weldon, and Tarboro churches. Rev. E. E. O'Neal from Yancey Mills, Va., spoke for the March Rallies, while Dr. Donald F. Ackland of Nashville, Tenn., spoke for our September Rallies. In the course of these six rallies we were able to contact by their presence 61 of our 91 Sunday Schools.

In our Vacation Bible School work this year, under the able leadership of Rev. E. G. Cole of Winterville, assisted by Miss Hilda Mayo we had the finest results thus far. As a result of the three Bible School

Clinics planned and held last Spring much advance planning was possible, and all but one of our Sunday Schools reported a Bible School. There were 3 mission schools; Washington, Wilson, and Avalon; 2 Standard Schools; Weldon and Rosemary; and 3 Grade "A" schools, Wilson First, Rocky Mount First, and Farmville.

Now to the year ahead: Our aim is "One To Eight," one person won to Christ for every eight persons on our church rolls. Not only are our Sunday Schools the greatest Bible-Teaching potential we have, but they are the answer to the perpetual problem of soul winning. Within this great group of Christian men, women, boys, and girls there lies the strength of thousands for Christ. Let us put this power to work and make the year 1954-55 the greatest soul-winning year Roanoke Baptists have ever experienced.

Report of the Associational Training Union Director

Five churches in our Association have reported Training Unions where none previously existed. Almost all of the churches with Training Unions have reported definite increase. Slowly but surely, we seem to be winning the battle in our effort to get a Training Union in every one of our Baptist churches.

The program this year has had several points of emphasis.

Three mass meetings were held during the year:

(a) "M" Night was held in First Church, Wilson, on December 8, with the largest attendance ever reported by this Association. No outside speaker was scheduled for this meeting, as each phase of Training Union work was presented by our own people. Mr. Isaac Terrell of Mills Home will bring the address for "M" Night this year. Remember the time and place: December 6, First Church, Wilson, at 7:30 p. m.

(b) Officers and Leaders Council. Stony Creek Church was host for this fine group of Training Union workers. Following a few minutes of group singing and a devotional period, classes were formed for instruction and discussion on Training Union problems and techniques, under the direction of the Associational Training Union Officers. Another council is planned for October 19, at New Hope Church. It is hoped that all of our Training Unions will be well represented.

(c) Tournament Night, observed in First Church, Rocky Mount. Attendance was better than last year, but again was below expectation, I am happy to report that we did have some choral groups this year, and they added much to our meeting. The competition in all age groups was, as is usual, excellent. The Roanoke Association was well represented at Morehead City for the Regional Training Union Tournament, by numbers as well as participants.

Promotion. The Training Union Executive Committee has met

each quarter to plan Associational work. The distance that some of the officers have had to travel made it almost impossible for them to attend all of the meetings. Literature for promotion of Training Union work was distributed during the year, and Study Courses were encouraged in all the Unions.

The assistance given by Miss Hilda Mayo in promoting Training Union work cannot be over emphasized. Her presence at all Training Union meetings has been a great help. She has also assisted in the matter of publicity and in the teaching of Study Courses. The officers wish to express their real appreciation of her constant and willing assistance.

County Groups. I am happy to report that we now have three County Groups in operation. Under the leadership of Mr. Marvin Viverette, our Associate Director, this work had taken a great stride forward. Nash, Halifax, and Edgcombe Counties now hold quarterly meetings to plan coordinated Training Union activities. We earnestly urge the other counties to follow their lead in this most important undertaking.

Looking Forward. As this great Association prepares to divide, I direct your attention to the Training Unions in each area. In one area we find that most of the churches have Training Unions; all three county units are here located; in the othe we find no county units and the Unions scattered. I point this out, not to discourage, but to challenge this second area to strive toward better Training Unions and a more closely united work under Christ.

The Associational Director is grateful to all who have in any way assisted in making his work effective during the past two years, and earnestly covets the full and sympathetic support of all the leaders of our churches this coming year under our new Director.

Report of the Brotherhood President

I am very glad to report that the Baptist Brotherhood of the Association has made a definite progress during this past year. According to reports received by me, we have nineteen (19) Churches with Brotherhoods. In other words, several Churches have instituted Brotherhoods since 1953 calendar year. During the year of 1953 we had an enrollment of 910 members, at the present time with nineteen (19) Brotherhoods we have an enrollment of 945 members.

Most of our Brotherhoods are only one (1) to four (4) years old and most of them have shown a definite increase. I might say that the Churches as a whole are becoming Brotherhood conscious. Several Churches re-organized or organized for the first time, while many others have enlarged their activities.

I want to thank personally all the Pastors and Brotherhoods in their prompt reply for information. It is not a matter of what activities we should support but here are very interesting statements as to just

what projects your Brotherhoods sponsored during 1953. They include such items as:

Reorganization program started for a better Brotherhood.

Sponsored need for new educational building. Beautification of church grounds. Assisted in study courses. Brotherhood members participate in own programs.

Brotherhood built out door fireplace for church. Furnished men helpers for vacation Bible school. Furnished transportation for revivals. Participated in ground breaking for sponsored new Baptist Church.

Held Sunday School classes at hospital. Held pre-revival prayer meetings. Bought 42 new Bibles for bedside tables at Sanitorium Hospital.

Sponsored continuous efforts for Church attendance.

Visited colored prisoner's camp once per month. Furnishes man teacher for at least one Sunday School Class every Sunday.

Takes care of needy cases at Christmas time.

Organizing, supporting and aiding Sunday School Missions.

All these items show that your Brotherhoods are at work.

Most of the Brotherhoods meet monthly, some twice per month. The supper meeting held along with the monthly meetings, still, seems to be very popular.

We did not have an Associational Brotherhood meeting during 1953. Plans were started for a meeting in Rocky Mount on September 2, but due to lateness of getting date agreed upon, so as not to conflict with other calendar dates, we were not able to get the program completed in time.

During the coming year we hope to get definite dates on the calendar for our Brotherhoods.

Nevertheless, the Caswell Assembly Brotherhood was held on July 9-11 and well attended with a good program which served as the same purpose, except it was state sponsored and not just a Roanoke Association meeting.

I understand that proper procedure is being set up for the Brotherhoods of North Carolina to consider taking over the sponsorship of the (R. A.'s) Royal Ambassadors from the Woman's Missionary Union. Mr. Horace Eason, North Carolina State Brotherhood Secretary says we will hear more about this later, along with other dynamic plans for the Brotherhood during the next few months.

During the few minutes I have left please let me make four (4) brief observations about the Baptist Brotherhood as follows:

Meaning of the Brotherhood

Significance of this Men's Movement

Five essentials for a successful Brotherhood

The purpose of the Brotherhood

First, a Brotherhood in a local Baptist Church is a group of men, preferably all of the men in a Baptist Church, seventeen years old and above, banded together for the purpose of promoting the Kingdom of Christ through the Church and the Denomination.

Second, this Men's Movement is significant in my opinion because the primary responsibility for leading and carrying on the program of God is on the shoulders of the men. When a Church begins to call out its manpower and gives definite responsibility to its men such a Church takes on a different spirit and a new color.

Third, a Brotherhood must do five things in order to be healthful, normal, effective and successful, as follows:

The Brotherhood must be organized.

The Executive Committee must meet once a month.

The Brotherhood must have a regular time to meet.

The Brotherhood must have good and appropriate programs.

The Brotherhood must have specific activities.

Fourth, and last, the purpose of the Brotherhood is to harness, conserve and utilize all of the manpower for our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. The Brotherhood program gives our Baptist Christian Men the proper conception of what a redeemed person ought to do and positionizes the men to carry out this conception.

In closing, please let me encourage each and everyone of the churches in our Roanoke Association to consider the organization of a Brotherhood. We have 93 churches, so let's have 93 Brotherhoods.

4. That we exhibit in our everyday life — speech and action — that Holy Boldness to which Brother Conklin challenged us — to the end that the part of the world in which we move, may take note of our association with Jesus — and marvel.

5. That we do hereby dedicate ourselves to vigorous effort in stamping out the alcohol evil, by securing local option elections, by education of our people as to this evil and by renewing our pledges of total abstinence in keeping with the efforts of our southwide forces and our local and state bodies to rid our Association of this terror.

6. That we, through these presents, inform our moderator, Rev. E. W. Holmes, our clerk, Brother Richard L. Collins, our Associational Missionary Brother L. We have nine counties, with only seven working units however, the Martin-Plymouth counties and Pitt-Beaufort counties being combined. From the ninety-one churches we have eighty-five missionary societies; 74 of these held a week of Prayer for Foreign Missions. Our total offering was \$13,920.32. Eighty-three societies reported last quarter; with a total of 4,671 members. Seventy of these groups reported on time. Mrs. Joyner told us that we should constantly be on the alert for opportunities to do our Master's work, that we should pray and study a great deal about our work. She asked that each county delegate three women to go to Fruitland July 5-9 or Caswell July 19-25. The goal for the association being 18 delegates.

Mrs. W. D. Waters continued "Opportunities of Outreach." She showed a cut-out church for each of the ninety one in our association. Some churches had four lighted windows and doors, representing the WMS and the Young People's organizations. Some churches were poorly lighted and some with no light at all. She told us that six new societies had been organized since last year, they being: Calvary, Mildred, Nicholasville, Pender's Chapel, Pinetown, and Swelton Heights. Mrs. Waters gave Miss Hilda Mayo much of the credit for the promotional work in these societies.

She left us with the thought of using the gift that God has given and left in Thee.

Miss Lelia Higgs, our Stewardship Chairman opened her thoughts with a quotation from Dr. Rankin; "The whole future of America depends on what is done now." Placards of Scriptures were shown and quoted to emphasize that now is the time to begin tithing. Many reasons were given as to why we should tithe.

A duet was rendered by two ladies from the Greenville Churches, "Christ For The Whole Wide World."

Mrs. Paul Waters, Community Missions Chairman emphasized the angle of more Vacation Bible Schools among the Negroes. She stated that churches have already raised their own funds to pay the summer worker to help in these schools, rather than the Roanoke Association Treasury paying her. In this way, more schools can be helped. Eight Vacation Bible Schools were assisted last year. Mrs. Waters hopes we will have this many plus four or five more this year. She urged us to use the key that had been entrusted to us.

Hymn by congregation: "A Charge To Keep I Have"

Mrs. John Wacaster, our State Field Representative carried our theme further "Entrusted To Us" in her brief and concise talk. She urged us to be faithful as Christians and then everything else will be alright. She challenged us to be faithful in enlistment. There are 1100 Baptist churches in North Carolina with no W. M. S. in them. She asked that we be faithful in informing ourselves "Study to show thyself approved, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed." If we pray more, we will give more. Learn through programs, magazines, camps, leadership conferences, mission study books. She left us with the idea that our Young People are our best investment as leaders for tomorrow. Give our best to the training of our Young People and the best will come back to us. She told us to glorify our community missions work. Missions and stewardship are Siamese twins. Tithing is a means of saving our souls from covetousness. Prayers of WMU mem-

bers united are powerful. She highly recommended family worship. Let us combine all of these things to help carry the message around the world. She closed her message with a prayer.

Mrs. A. V. Moore, President of the W. M. S. of the host church, invited everyone to remain for the hour of fellowship.

Special music was rendered by Mrs. B. B. Turnage, soloist, and Mrs. A. F. Joyner organist — "How Beautiful Is The Mountain" was the selected title.

Mrs. Robert Standley, a returned missionary from Brazil, was our guest speaker for the day. She and her husband have been studying at South Eastern Seminary at Wake Forest this winter. They will return to their field of duty in the fall. "Go Ye" means that everyone should do something. This is the plan of the Lord. The purpose being to reach every soul who knows not of Christ. The proclamation being, "Declare his glory among the nations his marvelous work among all the peoples," Psalm 96:3. The promise says "Lo I am with you always."

Mrs. Standley told us something of her work in Fortaleza, a city in Brazil of 300,000. There are 235 members in the three Baptist Churches or missions of this city. The Baptists have more churches than all other denominations. She told of the progress of the work there for the past eight years. There were 14 Christians there holding meetings when the first missionaries arrived, The Davises'. The Lottie Moon Christmas offering made possible the first church building. Mr. Davis, being a former interior decorator, helped greatly in erecting a beautiful building. The greatest beauty of this church however was in its spiritual growth. Of 135 members of First Baptist Church, 135 stay for church services, 135 attend mid-week prayer service, etc. This church has all organizations, they being A-1. A Christian school and a clinic are now in operation, in this city of more Catholics than any city in the state. A good will center is now being established. Airplane ministry is being used also. She closed by asking us to pray for the work. After praying to take the R out of pray, then we will pay more so that the work there might go forward. Miss Hilda Mayo closed the morning session with prayer.

The Afternoon Session began with Hymn "O Zion Haste"

Mr. E. W. Holmes had the devotional—"Onward—Tis The Lord's Command," and led in prayer. He is pastor of the host church and also Moderator of The Roanoke Association.

Mrs. Gilmer Cross, our Young People's Leader for the Division, brought announcements about our summer camps.

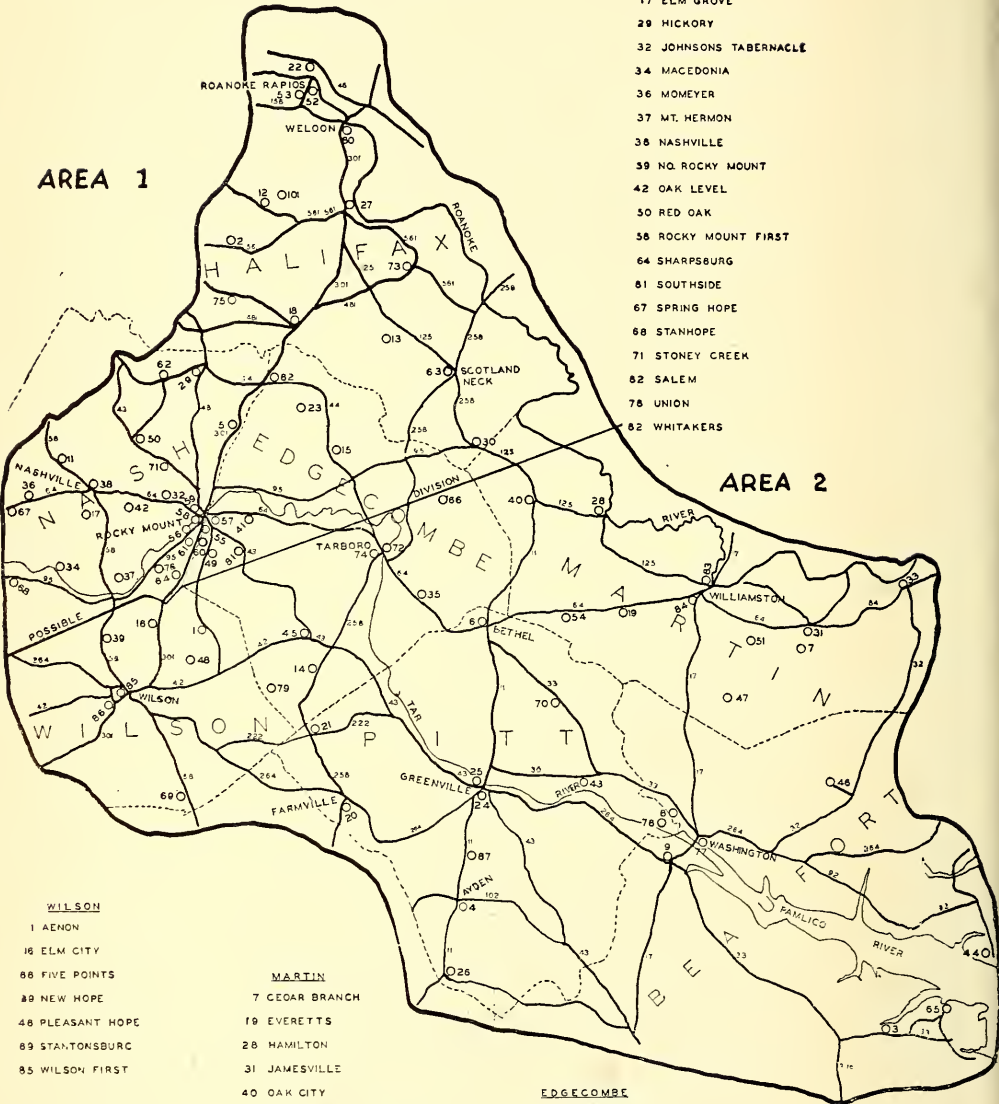

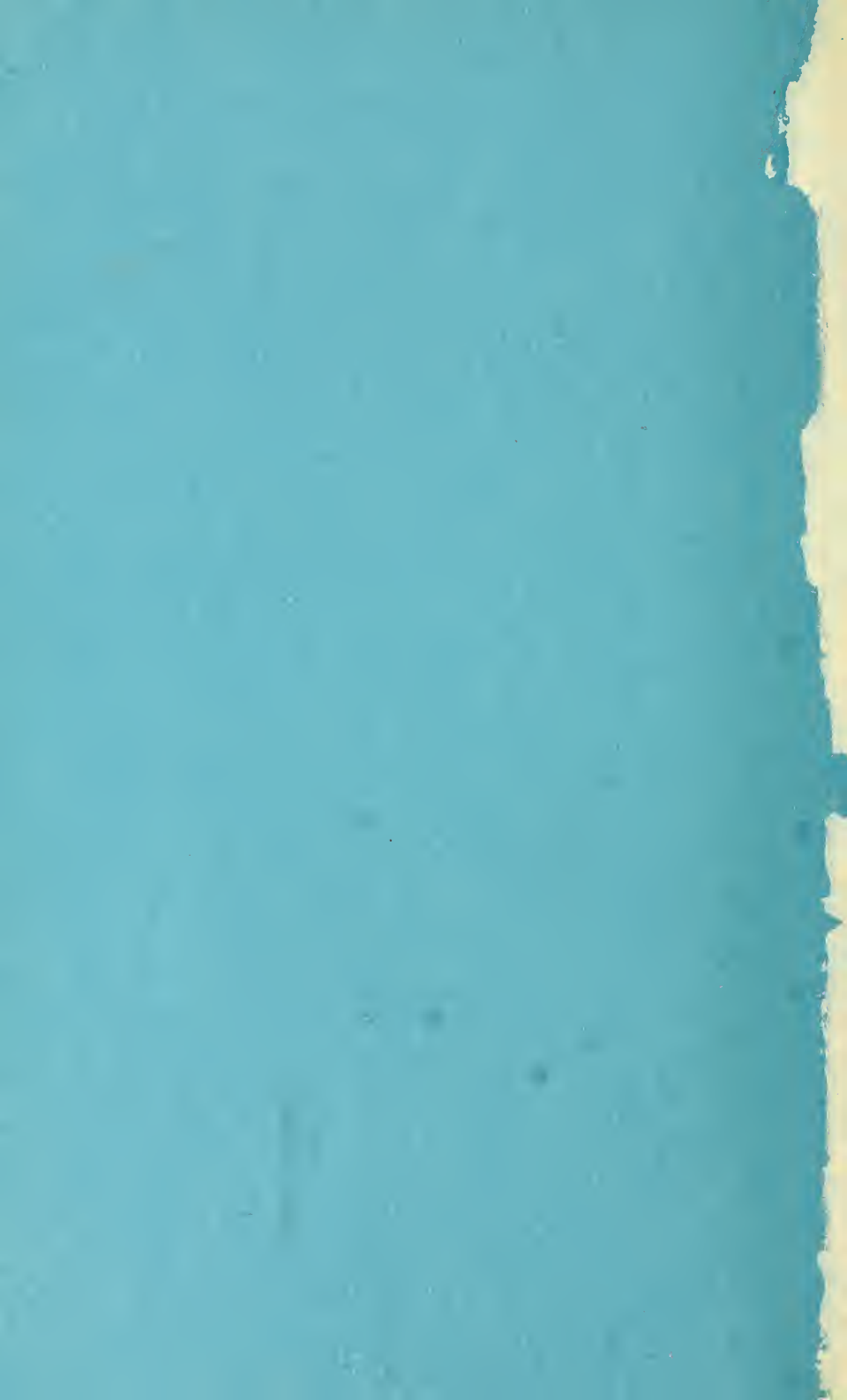

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. NAME: The name of this body is "Roanoke Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE: It is the purpose of the Association to provide an organization of cooperation for the Baptist churches affiliated with it, and to encourage them to faithfulness in every endeavor which we shall undertake together in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP: The Association shall consist of messengers who are members of the affiliated churches as follows: (1) one messenger from each church and one additional messenger for each one hundred resident members or fraction thereof, up to a maximum of seven messengers, chosen annually by the affiliated churches; (2) the pastors; (3) the duly elected officers of the Association and the current President of the Associational W. M. U.

ARTICLE IV. AFFILIATED CHURCHES: Baptist Churches which have petitioned for membership and by vote of the Association are accounted to be in fellowship with the purposes and undertakings of this body, shall comprise the list of affiliated churches. The vote of the Association to extend fellowship, or to withdraw fellowship, shall be a two-thirds vote. Failure to report annually to the Association shall raise the question of fellowship. Twenty churches shall constitute a quorum and decisions of those present shall be considered the action of the Association.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS: The officers of the Association shall be elected annually, and shall assume their duties at the close of the annual meeting, and serve until the election of their successors. Officers shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, (no one of whom may be eligible to serve in the same official capacity for more than five consecutive years); other officers shall be: the members of the Executive Committee, together with the President of the W. M. U. who also shall be accounted an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, together with a pastor and a layman from each county where a majority of the Baptist Churches are affiliated with this Association, and three members at large. The Executive Committee is charged with the duty of executing the plans and decisions of the Association, including the associational program of missions and extension, and the employment and direction of the associational Missionaries. A full report of its work shall be presented at each annual meeting, together with plans and recommendations for the

promotion and extension of the work of the Association. The executive Committee shall act for the Association between the annual meetings in conformity with the expressed decisions of the body. A vacancy occurring between annual meetings may be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: At each annual meeting, or not later than sixty days thereafter, the Executive Committee of the Association shall name a Nominating Committee, consisting of one messenger from each county, where a majority of the Baptist Churches are affiliated with the Association, whose duty it shall be to bring to the Association at its next annual meeting nominations for all offices of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII. The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, where not otherwise provided by this Constitution or the By-Laws.

ARTICLE IX. AMENDMENT: This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote, provided: that the proposed amendment has been read to the Association at the previous annual meeting, or not later than the day previous to the vote to be taken on the amendment, and referred to a committee for clarification and correlation.

ARTICLE X. ADOPTION: Upon adoption, this Constitution shall become effective at the close of this the 45th annual session of the Roanoke Baptist Association, and shall supersede any and all previous constitutions and by-laws, and cancel any action in conflict with this Constitution.

By-Laws of the Roanoke Baptist Association

Article 1

MEETINGS

The meetings of the association shall be held annually at such time and place as may be decided by the association in regular session.

Article 2

OPENING

Meetings of the association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

Article 3

QUORUM

Representatives from twenty of the affiliated churches shall constitute a quorum.

Article 4

ORDER OF BUSINESS

An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each

annual meeting which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

Article 5

CHURCH LETTER

Each affiliated church shall send to the annual meeting of the association, on forms furnished by the clerk, a full report of the church work for the year ending September 30.

Article 6

MODERATOR AND VICE-MODERATOR

The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall preside at all meetings of the association. They shall both be members of the Executive Committee and as opportunity may permit, they shall act as fraternal visitors to the churches throughout the year representing the fellowship of the entire association.

Article 7

CLERK

The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association and shall prepare and cause to be published and distributed, as directed by the association or executive committee, minutes and statistics of the association as soon as practical after adjournment. He shall also mail the necessary forms and letter to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the association. A copy of the minutes shall be mailed to the officers, affiliated churches, to each institution participating in the cooperative program, and such other institutions and individuals as the association or executive committee may direct.

Article 8

TREASURER

The Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Association, disburse them according to its order, and present a written report of same to each annual meeting of the Association, and additional reports at the request of the Executive Committee. He shall also furnish the Chairman of the Executive and Finance Committees a report at least ten days before each regular scheduled meeting of the Executive Committee.

Article 9

AUDITOR

The auditor shall examine the books and records of the association and submit a detailed report covering his work at such time as may be required by the Executive Committee or the association.

Article 10

SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The Sunday School Superintendent shall direct and supervise the

Sunday School program of the association under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 11

TRAINING UNION DIRECTOR

The Training Union Director shall have charge of the direction and promotion of the Training Union Program under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 12

BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood program of the association shall be under the direction of the Brotherhood President subject to the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 13

REVENUE

The contributions of the affiliated churches for the purposes of defraying expenses of the Missionary program and other activities of the association shall be on a resident member basis and shall be in such amount as may be approved by the association from year to year.

Article 14

SALARIES OF OFFICERS

Salaries of the Missionary or Missionaries of the association, as well as any other officer, shall be in such amount as may be provided for in the annual budget and approved by the association from year to year.

Article 15

BUILDER'S CLUB

The Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club shall be under the supervision and direction of a committee of nine members to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee, five of which shall be from its own body and four from the association at large. This committee shall direct and supervise the Roanoke Baptist Builder's Club under the supervision of the Executive Committee. All actions and commitments of the Builder's Club shall be submitted to the Executive Committee for final approval before becoming effective, provided no allocation of funds may be made by the Builder's Club or Executive Committee unless sufficient funds are on hand to pay all commitments in full.

Article 16

STANDING COMMITTEES

The executive committee at its first session following the annual meeting of the association shall appoint the following committees: Constitution and By-Laws and Finance. The first member named on each committee shall serve as chairman.

It shall be the duty of the committee on Constitution and By-Laws to receive, examine, and make recommendations to the associa-

tion in session on all proposed amendments to the constitution and by-laws.

It shall be the duty of the Finance committee to supervise the Financial program of the association and report to the executive committee regarding same from time to time. It shall also be the duty of the Finance committee to submit to the executive committee at each annual session a budget giving the estimated revenue for the ensuing term, as well as the itemized proposed expenses for this period.

Article 17

PROGRAM COMMITTEE

The program committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the association. This committee shall meet following the close of each annual session and select those who shall write the reports for the next annual meeting. The appointees of the program committee and their assignments shall be printed in the minutes of the annual session.

Article 18

ASSOCIATIONAL COMMITTEES

The Moderator, following the convening each annual session of the association, shall appoint the following committees:

1. Committee on place and preacher
2. Committee on resolutions
3. Committee on petitions
4. Any other committees that may be authorized by the association.

Article 19

MISSIONARY PROGRAM

The Missionary and extension work of the association shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee, as well as the Missionary or Missionaries whom they shall employ and direct. The Missionary fund shall be kept and disbursed by the Treasurer as directed by the Executive Committee.

Article 20

MINUTES OF THE ASSOCIATION

The minutes of each annual meeting of the association shall be examined, approved and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before being printed. Said minutes shall be submitted to the first session of the next annual meeting for consideration and approval.

Article 21

VISITORS

Visitors may be invited to participate in the deliberations of the association without the privilege to vote.

Article 22

AMENDMENTS

All amendments or additions to these By-Laws shall be submitted in writing on forms furnished by the association clerk. No amendment to the By-Laws shall be considered by the association until they have been referred to the By-Law Committee. No resolutions adopted by this association shall become a part of these By-Laws.

Article 23

EFFECTIVE DATE

The effective date of these By-Laws or any additions or amendments thereto shall become effective immediately upon passage.

The above figures for the offerings and total cost indicate a net gain of \$53.86 for the summer. To that amount is added \$3.35, which was a refund on electric charges. However, it cost \$40.00 to get the tent taken down and hauled to its place of storage in the Farmer's Warehouse, in Greenville; and repairs on the Audio-Visual equipment amounted to \$12.35, which left a net gain of only \$4.86 for the summer from the tent program.

But despite the small financial gain indicated above we believe it has been a most profitable season of work. Mr. and Mrs. Emil A. Mialik, our summer missionaries, have done an excellent work; for we now have two newly organized churches, the beginning of which had not been projected six months ago, which are direct results of their labors. Following the tent meeting at Easonburg a Sunday School was organized there on June 12, with an enrollment of 50, and on August 21st the Easonburg Baptist Church was organized with 31 charter members. Then following the tent meeting at Blandwood (southeast Rocky Mount) another Sunday School was organized on July 10th, with 73 enrolled. And on Sunday, October 2nd, the Blandwood Mission was organized into the Blandwood Baptist Church, with 58 charter members. These two new churches alone can be considered good returns for the labors of the summer.

And in addition to the above, the First Church, Rocky Mount, has sponsored two excellent projects, the Benvenue and Lakeside Missions. The Benvenue Sunday School was organized on March 20th, with 83 enrolled, and the Benvenue Baptist Church was organized on Sunday, September 11th, with 64 charter members. The Lakeside Sunday School was organized on April 24th with 237 enrolled, and the Lakeside Baptist Church was organized on June 5th, with 223 charter members.

Also the two churches in Greenville, Immanuel and Memorial, sponsored a mission project in the Hillsdale section of the city, and the

Hillsdale Baptist Sunday School was organized on June 5th, with 47 enrolled. The present enrollment is 75, with the attendance above 50.

And services were conducted at Bear Grass in the "Old Mission House" in June and July, and a "Preaching Mission" was established there, with services two Sundays a month.

Your Missionary participated to a greater or lesser degree in the beginning of all of the above projects.

Since this is the final report your missionary will make to the Roanoke Baptist Association, and since the figures are readily available, it may be of interest to some to know the total report for the past four and a half years. We give you those figures below:

The above figures give only a summarization of the Annual Reports to the Association, and do not include many special services, and such figures as the total number of ministers and deacons ordained; as it would take considerable searching of the records to tabulate all those facts. The above is given only as a convenient summarization of the work of the Association and its Missionary during the past four and a half years, since April 16, 1951.

In addition to the above tabulated items your Missionary was instrumental in organizing Baptist Councils in Rocky Mount, Wilson, Washington, and in Martin County, and a Joint Committee of Extension in Greenville; all for the purpose of sponsoring Baptist Missions and Sunday Schools in those cities and areas. And he has served in the field of counselor both to pastors and churches in efforts to find solu-

tions to various problems, and to promote the work generally. He has been instrumental in forming a number of church fields, and securing pastors for them. Also, he has assisted several of our smaller churches in developing plans for enlarging their buildings by the addition of rooms, and has assisted several of our new churches in developing plans for their first buildings, having drawn the plans almost completely for the Grifton Church building.

As your Missionary reviews the past four and a half years he looks upon them as the most fruitful and most joyous period of his entire life. He does not consider the achievements of the past four and a half years to be the direct results of his labors at all; but looks upon them as the result of much labor upon the part of many of our leaders and people, plus a wonderful spirit of cooperation, and the divine blessing of our Lord. He is profoundly grateful that he has been privileged to have a part in such a great and noble work. And he wishes to express to every officer, leader and worker his heart-felt gratitude for the wonderful spirit of cooperation that has prevailed throughout the entire time. The harmony and fellowship have been wonderful beyond words, and the work will be eternally gratifying. "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad."

REPORT OF THE ASSOCIATIONAL DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

October 1, 1954 through Sept. 30, 1955

The Associational Director of Christian Education is grateful for the privilege of working with the host of dedicated people in the Roanoke who so faithfully and efficiently work in their local churches. In this year the educational director has visited and worked in 62 churches. Through announcements, discussions and conferences there has been always the effort to promote every phase of our Baptist program.

In the Associational Training Union work there has been shown a new enthusiasm as the executive committee has met quarterly to plan for activities. The educational director has met with the committee and assisted with plans whenever possible. It has been a joy to teach Training Union Study Courses in 7 churches, and to assist in organizing one new Training Union. Other activities in this department have included assisting with the Officers & Leaders Council, presenting to one local group the Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade, attending with the associational officers the State Planning Meeting, and directing the Speakers Tournament at the Regional Training Union Convention.

It has been a privilege to assist the Associational Sunday School Superintendent in planning the two area Sunday School rallies in the spring and the Area Training School for Sunday School Workers in the fall; to assist one church in organizing a new Sunday School class;

to attend the monthly officers and teachers meeting three times in one church; and to accompany seven people from the association to the State Sunday School Leadership Conference for a week in January.

Working with the Associational Vacation Bible School Superintendent, the worker has assisted in plans for the three Vacation Bible School Clinics and led conferences in these clinics. One of the highlights of the year's work was to serve in Vacation Bible Schools in three churches — Pinetown, Pamlico, and South Creek. Duties varied from serving as principal to that of Junior Superintendent and teacher, Intermediate Superintendent and teacher, and pianist! It was a happy experience to assist the Jamesville church in plans for their very first Bible School and to meet with their faculty in preparation for the school. Results of the work is shown in the fact that this year the Roanoke is reporting Bible Schools in 93 churches and missions.

The educational director had the privilege of attending one of the Brotherhood meetings in the Northern Area. She had assisted this department of work in its publicity of associational, or area, meetings.

A great challenge came in the work with young people under Woman's Missionary Union, as she assisted in plans for the Junior G. A. and R. A. camp, the Y. W. A. Council, the Royal Ambassador Workshop, and the Divisional Royal Ambassador Conclave. Other activities with this department have included: teaching study courses to women of 13 churches, speaking to four local groups, assisting in plans for the Mission Study Institute, assisting in one installation service, conducting two Girls' Auxiliary Coronation Services, attending three county W. M. U. meetings, and assisting with the organization of two Woman's Missionary Societies.

It is always a special privilege to attend some of the "extras" in our churches, and the educational director has enjoyed Homecoming Services in three churches and a Dedication Service with one group. Activities that cannot be classified under any one organization consist of conducting prayer service in one church, attending three meetings of a mission group in the interest of organizing a church, attending the Pastors' Conference, working with the Committee on the Associational School of Missions, meeting with the Committee of Ten, and attending meetings of the Executive Committee of the Association.

Work that has taken the educational director outside the association includes: attending the North Carolina Educational Conference, the Baptist State Convention, the Regional Royal Ambassador Conclave, the Regional W. M. U. Meeting, the Regional Training Union Convention, the State W. M. U. Executive Council, the State W. M. U. Convention, and the Southern W. M. U. Leadership Conference for Young People's Workers in Columbia, S. C.; leading two conferences at the State Y. W. A. Houseparty; assisting the State Sunday School Department with its enlargement campaign in the Bladen Association; and conducting the conference for Young Woman's Auxiliary Counselors in the five State W. M. U. Leadership Institutes.

The "high experience" of the year came in attending the Baptist World Alliance in London. The educational director expresses deep

appreciation to the people of the Roanoke for granting her this privilege. She shall strive to be a good steward of all that was seen and felt during the time of the meetings and as she traveled in European countries.

Throughout the year there have been hours that brought planning, studying, writing hundreds of letters, supplying information to 14 newspapers, and assisting with the publication and mailing of the Roanoke Review. There have been many conferences with both groups and individuals.

This final year's program of the Roanoke Association has brought activities quite peculiar to this particular period. Preparing for two new associations has meant that executive committees in each of the organizations must be ready to move smoothly from the larger association to the two new ones. There has been an unusual experience in working closely with the various committees in preparing for this. Both the Woman's Missionary Union and the Training Union have full executive committees elected and ready to begin work immediately in the two new associations. The Sunday School Superintendent and Brotherhood President for each of the new associations are working on their committees that will begin the work of the new year.

Report of the Roanoke Baptist Builders Club

As we consider the number of new churches in our association and the expansion programs of many of our smaller churches we thank God for so blessing us. The Roanoke Baptist Builders Club is also grateful that it has had a small part in this period of remarkable growth as it has sought to render some financial aid to these churches.

The plan of the Club is to secure members who will agree to give \$2.00 a call for not more than five calls per year, this money to be

used to help Baptist churches in the Roanoke Association in their building programs.

During the year October, 1954 through September, 1955, we have received from 485 members \$6,136.00, which with a balance of \$112.00 has given us \$6,248.00. This money by vote of the Executive Committee and the Builders Club Committee has been given as follows:

We have sent out three calls in 1955 which leaves two calls that the new associations can make before January. We suggest that as soon as is practical each association observe Membership Day thereby seeking to secure new members through the churches and that after this a letter be mailed asking for calls 4 and 5 of 1955.

We thank our members for their loyalty in the past and urge their continued support in the new associations. The work of this club is thrice blessed. It blesses those who give; the churches who receive; and the people to whom the churches minister. Our prayer is that it may be able to serve more and more effectively in the coming years.

Report of the Sunday School Work

One of the greatest teachings of Jesus was a direct result of the needs of the multitudes of people who were ignorant of the real meaning of Biblical Revelation. As it is recorded for us in Matthew 5:1, "And seeing the multitude . . . He opened His mouth and taught them . . ." Since that time the aspect of teaching multitudes of people the Word of God has been the major portion of the educational task of our churches. Today, the Sunday School has that responsibility. It is indeed one of the most responsible tasks that Jesus has entrusted to His disciples. It is therefore with a deep sense of humility that this the last report of the Sunday School activities of the Roanoke Association, as such, is made. Many have been the mistakes, many the lost opportunities, in these 48 years. Yet, in these few short years that this work has been in our Trust, many have been won to Christ as a direct result of the influence of our Sunday Schools.

As we began our year together, it was with the idea that we would make it one of the greatest years for Evangelistic endeavor in the history of Southern Baptists. Therefore, the goal of "ONE TO EIGHT" was adopted in all our churches. In an effort to tie in our Sunday School efforts with this concept, two Associational-Wide Rallies were held in March. One was at Bethel, and the other at Whitakers. The Reverend Junius Foster of Norfolk, Virginia, spoke to 244 representatives of 43 churches on the topic, "The Sunday School and Evangelism."

In April of this year, the Vacation Bible Schools, under the leadership of our Supt. of Bible School work, Rev. E. G. Cole, Winterville, held three Bible School Clinics. As the reports of the summers activities came in, it was found that as a result of His efforts and

the assistance of Miss Hilda Mayo all of our churches had a Bible School this year but ONE.

In October of this year the First Associational-Wide Sunday School Clinic was held with the Immanuel Baptist Church, Greenville. We were led in the teaching periods by three state workers and many of our fine Bible Teachers. Although there were 79 enrolled the average attendance for the week was 45. Of these 45 however, 23 met the requirements for awards.

God has been good to us in this work. As we now face a new future as separate units of the whole, God may continue to use each of us as willing subjects, to carry His message to the "MULTITUDES."

Report of the Associational Training Union

Training in church membership means more than having a Baptist Training Union in your church. To train the members of a church and to supply the teaching needs of the Sunday School as well as all other leadership, a Training Union must have the best leadership *material* a church has to offer. In churches where this has been recognized and where the deacons and officers of the church have found their places in Training Union, great strides are being made and strong, active, well indoctrinated Baptist Churches are the result. Where there is a strong Training Union, there you will find a strong Baptist Church! It is a pleasure to report that we have such Training Unions and others are in the making. It is interesting to note that in the past year one of the oldest churches in our Association and one of the newest, organized a Training Union; Halifax, 116 years old and Lakeside, three months old. If you do not have a Baptist Training Union in your church, take good advice and organize one this new year. Call on your Associational Training Union Officers to help. That is the reason we have them.

Following Hurricane Hazel in October, New Hope Church was host to the Associational Officers and Leaders Council. 89 stout hearted Baptists made their way there and received a blessing.

The First Baptist Church, Wilson, was host December 6 for "M" night. Though the weather was not fit for man nor beast, following one of the worst ice and snow storms of the winter, there were 87 in attendance to hear a stirring message by Rev. W. Isaac Terrell, pastor, Mills Home Baptist Church. The message was the Training Union theme for 1955, "Be strong in the Lord." There were 14 churches represented at this meeting.

February 15 found 85 people at Memorial Baptist Church in Greenville for Officers and Leaders Council. There were 19 churches represented at this meeting. Special emphasis was given on Tournaments, urging participation from every church in the Association which has a Training Union.

Tournaments were conducted at the First Baptist Church, Rocky

Mount, on April 15. 250 were in attendance with 18 churches represented. There were 73 participants including the two choirs. Mrs. Marshal Tatum of Greenville was the Adult Bible Reader winner and represented the Association at the Regional tournaments. Miss Ruth Lassiter, Greenville, was the Young People's Better Speaker winner. Miss Lassiter also won at Regional and represented us in the State finals. Miss Francis Hedgepeth of Community Center was the Intermediate Sword Drill winner, our Regional winner and went to the State Finals where she was second place winner. All 21 participants in the Junior Memory Work were winners and represented us at Regional and State finals. First Baptist Church, Rocky Mount, entered two choirs and both received an "A" rating at local and Regional tournaments. The Roanoke Association can be proud of its Training Unions and its faithful workers through this fine report from our tournaments.

We are always happy to report the news of our Standard Training Unions — New Hope Church continues to be our one Standard Training Union. Here is the best news we have ever heard in this association about any Training Union. Last Sunday night James P. Morgan, our State Training Union Secretary, visited New Hope and awarded this church the Certificate For Meritorious Service for having a Standard Training Union for fifteen consecutive years, ever since it was organized. A similar award was made to O. L. High, Jr., their Training Union Director for having led this Training Union as director all these years. New Hope is the *ONLY* church in this State ever to receive this award, and O. L. High, Jr. is the seventh person ever to receive this award in this state. Mr. High retired after serving fifteen years as director. The November issue of the Training Union Magazine, published by the Sunday School Board, will carry a full story with pictures of this outstanding Training Union and this wonderful group of people at New Hope. May their tribe increase.

The question most frequently asked in the many churches in our Association that we have visited is, "How can we get our deacons and other church leaders into Training Union?" First, tell them about the Baptist Training Union program, explain the purposes and show them how it actually works. They will then realize the power-potential of the Training Union, how their influence through attendance and participation can strengthen those whom they serve, and lead them to be Spiritually Intelligent Christians. If, however, they are not providentially hindered and still will not support the training station of their church, then that church probably needs some additional deacons and officers taken from its *active* members.

The lack of current information about your Training Union prevents your Associational officers from doing their best work. This information is taken from the Training Union Quarterly Reports which take about five minutes to complete. Get in touch with your Director and have him get those Quarterly Reports in promptly. Now that the new Associations have been brought into being we need your co-

operation even more. We particularly need to know your new officers in order for us to get them on our mailing list.

We wish to thank our many friends who have given so generously of their time to make this year's progress possible. Miss Hilda Mayo, our Director of Christian Education, has been untiring in her personal contact and promotion of the work. Special thanks and appreciation go to our Executive Committee without whose help the work could not have been done: Orion J. Peevy, Washington, Associate Director; Miss Janice Murchison, First, Rocky Mount, Secretary; Rev. W. E. Cholerton, New Hope, Chorister; Mrs. E. E. Richards, First, Rocky Mount, Pianist; Rev. B. M. Whitehurst, Rosemary, Pastor Advisor; Jim Lewis Bellamy and T. O. Hickman, Enfield, Adult Leaders; E. C. White, Greenville, Imm., Young People's Leader; Mrs. G. B. Cullom, Rosemary, Intermediate Leader; Miss Norma Cuthrell, Lakeside, Junior Leader; and Mrs. W. D. Fryar, Sharpsburg, Beginner Leader.

Report of the Brotherhood President

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to be able to say that the Baptist Brotherhood has certainly been on the march for the last twelve months.

These figures are not official but they are fairly reliable. During 1953, we had 87 churches in the Roanoke Baptist Association with 14 Brotherhoods having an enrollment of 779 members.

During 1954, we had 93 churches in our Association with 23 Brotherhoods having an enrollment of 945 members.

Today 1955, my latest figures show, that we have 94 churches in our Association with 49 Brotherhoods having an enrollment up in the thousands.

How did this happen? It all came about by the cooperation of each church, each pastor and each layman realizing what a Brotherhood means to a church.

Through this cooperation we were able to hold three very successful district meetings as follows:

On March 18, we held what we called a "Men's Crusade Rally" at the Rocky Mount First Baptist Church. We called this the Northern District Meeting.

It was a supper and program meeting. The supper being good ole barbecue, stew, fried chicken and all the trimmings "Dutch" style. The program was Mr. Horace Easom, State Secretary for Baptist Brotherhood of North Carolina, who spoke on "Evangelism Work" and "Operation Work," of a Brotherhood. We had over 200 present at this meeting and everyone heard an inspiring message.

On April 28, we held a similar meeting for the Southern District at Greenville, North Carolina. This meeting was held at Respass Bar-

becue Dining Room with the sponsorship of the Greenville Memorial Baptist Church Brotherhood.

This was another supper and program meeting, the supper consisting of any type meal you desired.

The program was Mr. Horace Easom who spoke this time purely on Brotherhood Workings and Organization. So you see, we had no discrimination between the Northern and Southern District.

We fed both with the same type meal and same speaker. We had approximately 175 present at this meeting.

Our next meeting was the Region Number 2 Meeting held by our Regional President, Dr. John T. High, at the Rocky Mount First Baptist Church on May 23.

Region Number 2 covers the Northern Roanoke Association. The Southern Roanoke Association, and 2 other Associations.

Dr. High had a very interesting program. After hearing the main speaker, group meetings were held, at which time Regional Officers explained their field of Brotherhood Work and questions were answered.

This was very helpful information for all.

To keep the records straight, I should mention The Caswell Assembly Brotherhood Meeting held on July 9-11 with Mr. Nelson Tull, State Brotherhood Secretary of Arkansas the speaker.

Then, the Fruitland Assembly Brotherhood Meeting held on July 16-18 with Mr. David T. Mashburn, Associate Secretary, Brotherhood Commission the speaker.

We find our Brotherhoods doing a wonderful job in helping their church with various activities. Take for instance evangelism, our Brotherhoods have played a big part in sponsoring the simultaneous evangelism program. The churches and Brotherhoods working together at the same time, spreading the messages in a uniformity manner. This has been a great help and assistance to the successful revivals.

Another activity has been our Brotherhoods participation in the "Observance of Layman's Day." The Brotherhood men have taken the leading roll on Layman's Day, challenging other men to action in the church.

The Brotherhoods are now laying the foundation to take over the R. A.'s (Royal Ambassadors) from the Woman's Missionary Society.

In my previous reports to you I tried to sell you on the idea of a Brotherhood and tell you what the various individual Brotherhoods were doing, which I believe has paid dividends. In this report, I have covered what your organization has done as a whole for the past year.

So in closing, please let me again say that: in 1953 we had 14 Brotherhoods out of 87 churches.

In 1954 we had 23 Brotherhoods out of 93 churches.

In 1955 we had 49 Brotherhoods out of 94 churches.

For your information this means at present in the Northern Dis-

trict we have 23 Brotherhoods with 48 churches and in the Southern District we have 26 Brotherhoods with 46 churches.

May I say a job well done!

We might wish that their names could be read; but since it is almost impossible to get all their names from the church letters which have just been submitted, we, in our Lord's Name, can only commend them as a body to Almighty God who knows them every one.

We thank Him for them, for the Christian fellowship we have had together and for the witness and labor which their lives have borne for our Lord. As good and faithful servants, may they rest from their labors, but may their works follow after them.

In remembering these loved ones who have departed this life, let us be reminded of our own mortality and let us resolve to labor more earnestly while it is day; for the night surely comes upon our earthly life when no man can work.

In remembering these friends, let us be reminded that the visible kingdom is only a part of the eternal kingdom of our Lord. We are surrounded by an invisible host, a heavenly cloud of witnesses; let us, therefore, so labor that the work which they have begun will be completed and that the promise made to them will be fulfilled in us and in those who come after us.

On this day it is also fitting that we remember the countless invisible host of the Lord's saints who through the years have labored in that part of the Lord's vineyard which we have called the Roanoke Baptist Association. Perhaps these lines of William Walsham How will sum up our faith for them all:

"For all the saints who from their labors rest,
Who Thee by faith before the world confessed,
Thy Name, O Jesus, be forever blessed,
Alleluia!

"Thou wast their Rock, their Fortress and their Might;
Thou, Lord, their Captain in the well-fought fight;

**The Forty-Eighth Annual Session
of the
Woman's Missionary Union of Roanoke Association**

The Halifax societies of the Woman's Missionary Union, Roanoke Association, were hostesses for the forty-eighth annual session, Thursday, April 14, 1955. The group met in the Rosemary Church, Roanoke Rapids at ten o'clock with Mrs. Edgar Joyner, the associational superintendent presiding. The program for the day was most unique in the fact that on the entire outside cover was printed a map of the Roanoke Association. When the program was folded, the fold divided our association as it would be after the meeting of the day, into areas No. 1 and No. 2. The meeting opened with the singing of the hymn, "I Love To Tell The Story." Mrs. Joyner introduced Mrs. J. J. Priest of the host church, who brought our devotional thought for the morning. She read from Matthew 28: 1-10. She developed the theme for the day "Go Quickly And Tell." Lois Lyles brought us a message in song "Somebody Needs Your Love," with Mrs. James Barnette at the organ. Our devotion was closed with a prayer by Mrs. Priest, who prayed for the Missionaries on our calendar of prayer for the day. She prayed that each of us would go quickly and tell about Jesus to those in our area or to the utmost part of the world. She stressed the urgency of the matter.

The business session was opened by Mrs. Joyner welcoming each person present and graciously expressing thanks to the Rosemary Church and the Halifax County group for being our host for the day. She also recognized the visiting ministers; our divisional superintendent, Mrs. C. M. Billings; our Divisional Young People's Leader, Mrs. Gilma Cross; our State President, Mrs. Gordon Maddrey and our Missionary speaker, Mrs. W. W. Lawton.

The appointment of committees was next on the agenda.

The other committees were to be appointed at the next Executive Committee meeting in Tarboro on April 28.

The Association voted that messages of love be sent to Mrs. E. B. Beasley, our third vice president of North Carolina Woman's Missionary Union, who was a patient in the Greenville hospital, and to Miss Em Austin, who was a patient in a Chapel Hill Hospital. Miss Em is our beloved representative on the State Executive Committee. Mrs. Leland Kitchin led in prayer for these two and others in our Association who were sick.

Mrs. Joyner was happy to next recognize the societies of our Association who had attained the rating of an A-1 society.

Mrs. Joyner congratulated these groups and asked that God would lead them to even higher work in the future.

Mrs. W. J. Bateman, our Associational Young People's Leader, asked Mrs. A. L. Stancil to give the highlights of the Sunbeam work in our area. Mrs. Stancil mentioned the growth and progress of the work.

She recognized the Sunbeam leaders, whose groups had become A-1 during the year.

Mrs. R. T. Fountain was asked to present the work of the Girls' Auxiliary, she being our Associational Girls' Auxiliary Leader. She called for the Girls' Auxiliary Leaders to stand, whose groups had reached the A-1 goal. She told us there were fifty-nine churches in the Association with Girls' Auxiliary work, one hundred eight Girls' Auxiliary organizations and one thousand thirty eight members. She urged all groups to attend the G. A. Rally to be held at Red Oak in the near future.

Mrs. Mumford, our Associational Royal Ambassador Leader, reported six R-A Chapters were A-1.

Mrs. Jamerson of Williamston, our Y. W. A. leader told us that three Y. W. A.'s had reached the A-1 standard. She was happy to report that five Y. W. A.'s had already been organized during this year.

Mrs. Bateman announced the Associational Division and State camp dates. She reported that three hundred twelve boys and girls went to some Christian Camp last summer. Mrs. Bateman challenged us to send five hundred this summer.

Mrs. C. M. Billings, our Divisional Superintendent, brought us greetings. She commended the Association on the excellent work that has been done. She expressed her feelings of regret (in a sense) of the division of our Association after this meeting today. She reminded us of the fact that in division there is growth, however. She invited all to come to the annual meeting of the Division in the Goldsboro Church this fall. She left us with the thought that with the help of God the possibilities are untold as to what can be accomplished with these two new Associations.

Mrs. Gilmer Cross announced the dates again of the Junior Girls' Auxiliary and Royal Ambassador Camps at Caswell for the Division. She asked for prayers of this group of leaders who will work with these boys and girls this summer. She appealed for leaders to help with the camp.

Mrs. Joyner presented the past year's work in a very unique way, in the form of a scrapbook.

Mrs. S. C. Crisp, the Secretary and Treasurer, read the pages of the book.

Following the business session, "Lead On, O King Eternal" was sung by the group.

Mrs. W. D. Waters, our Associate Superintendent, went into the next section of our program by presenting some of our other Associational workers, Mr. Grady Burgiss, Mrs. Leland Kitchin, our First Vice President of the State Woman's Missionary Union work and also chairman of our Roanoke Baptist Builders Club; Miss Hilda Mayo, our Christian Education Associational Leader.

Mr. Burgiss told us that twelve churches had been added to the Association in four years time, and of another that was located in between two Associations and chose to join the other Association, it being smaller. He stressed to "Advance" or "Go Tell" in our work. He gave some of the early historical background of our Association. In 1769 the fourth Association in our country was organized in the area of Scotland Neck. In 1805 a program of Missions was adopted and in 1827 this idea was reversed in the Kehukee Association. This brought about a division into three groups. The Primitives, The Missionary Baptists and The Christians. In 1831 at a meeting in Robersonville, 13 churches asked for letters of dismissal. They formed the Tar River Association. In 1907 the group had grown to 100 churches and they decided it was best to make another division. The Roanoke Association was formed with 49 churches. Now we have gone forward to 94 churches a second time. The time for dividing has come again. This is a history making meeting today. Mr. Burgiss told us we should feel proud of our Christian heritage.

Mr. Burgiss gave us some of the needs of today. Many rural areas need churches, some new housing projects in cities need church buildings, such as in Rocky Mount, Wilson and Roanoke Rapids.

The summer work was discussed and announcements were made concerning the placement of the tent and trailer. A young couple has been chosen to conduct this phase of our program. This couple seem to really be dedicated to His work.

Mrs. Kitchin began her message by taking us back to 1950, at the time when Mr. C. W. Bazemore, our Association Missionary, left us to join the Biblical Recorder staff. The field was crying for new churches then. It was voted at an Executive Committee meeting to purchase a tent as temporary quarters for the needed work. The Roanoke Baptist Builders Clubs was formed to help the beginning churches with their buildings. The state would help them buy lots and pay pastors' salaries. Here was a plan for the possibilities of helping with the building itself. Mr. Ulrich of Wilson, was named chairman of this club. He found 1000 members, almost single handed, who would be glad to pay \$2.00 to join the club and then not more than four other calls would go out to them each year, at which times they would send \$2.00 more. Mr. Ulrich resigned on doctor's orders, and Mrs. Kitchin is now the chairman. Mrs. Kitchin said that about this time Mr. Burgiss was sent to us by God to lead in this work. He had done a wonderful job. Eighteen churches have been helped by this club in the amount of \$18,150.00. It is odd that of these new churches formed, nine will fall into the new Southern Area of the Association and nine in the Northern Area. At the time that help was being rendered, no regard along this line of division was considered. There is a difference of only twelve memberships in the Northern and Southern Areas, of the 774 total members.

Miss Hilda Mayo led us along the line of thought for the future. She said more new leaders will be needed. "True leadership is not bestowed, but earned," she quoted. She urged all leaders to go to the Mission Study Institutes in the Association and to the overnight Institutes that will be held at Chowan and Campbell Colleges. She urged that we continue our work with the colored Daily Vacation Bible Schools. All activities for the Young People should be carried on also. Dickens said of our children, "They are angels of God in disguise."

The congregation stood for the hymn "Come Women Wide Proclaim."

Mrs. Butler, President of the Rosemary Woman's Missionary Union brought us a message of greetings from the host church and made announcements concerning the lunch that would be served.

Mr. Joe Parker rendered a beautiful solo "From Greenland's Icy Mountains," accompanied by Mrs. James Barnette at the organ.

Mrs. Joyner presented Mrs. Maddrey, our State President. Mrs. Maddrey opened her message by quoting Mrs. Annie Armstrong "Speak To The Children Of Israel That They Might Go Forward."

Mrs. Maddrey urged us to ever study about our mission work. When we study we will feel compelled to do something. There are 27,000 workers in the Southern Baptist territory, with only 315 in the Foreign Fields. Elmer West said after hearing Dr. Theron Rankin quote these

figures that he felt compelled to go to the foreign fields to witness for Christ.

Miss Gladys Keith of the New Orleans mission field, is now a casualty of the indifference of Southern Baptists who have not supported her to their utmost. She is now broken in body, her eyesight being almost gone. Mrs. Maddrey urged that Annie Armstrong offering be sent even this late, so that the Home Mission work might go forward. She wished we could visit these mission fields in our travels. By all means she asked us to read about them in our periodicals, even if we can't go.

Mrs. Maddrey told a story about the George Wilsons, who are missionaries to the Indians in Albuquerque, New Mexico. George was seriously ill, but on the day of his birthday he became so very much better. He attributed this to the prayers throughout the Southern Baptist territory. His name was on the calendar of prayer on that day. Our state offering was shared with this couple. \$200.00 was sent to this Home Missionary Indian.

Following up her opening thought concerning studying about our Mission work, Mrs. Maddrey pointed out that if we have five meetings during our weeks of prayer, then our gifts are more. This has definitely been proven, with an average of from \$5.00 to \$7.00 per member, if the five meetings were held, whereas the average was from 50¢ to \$1.00 per member when only one meeting was held during the week of prayer.

Mrs. Maddrey's message on tithing was alarming in the fact that only one third of the Woman's Missionary Union members of North Carolina are tithers.

She told us there were eight million Southern Baptist members but only nine hundred missionaries.

North Carolina ranked 16th in our per. capita giving to missions last year. Our Canadian brethren support one missionary for each 1000 members. The Seven Day Adventists support one missionary for each 220 members. Our need for missionary personnel is so very urgent. It is desperate in the fact that we do not have enough workers to be sent with the funds that we have. Jesus was our greatest missionary. He laid down his work for us. He gave His all. What work have we done or what has our sacrifice been? Have you ever sold a dress or piece of jewelry for missions, Mrs. Maddrey asked? She showed us a piece of jewelry and a dress that a Chinese Christian had brought as her offering in Tibet. A student now at the Carver School of Missions was at this service in Tibet. She told that this deed alone brought about a revival on the island of Formosa, such as has never been had before.

Mrs. Maddrey pronounced the benediction and gave thanks for the food that we would receive during the lunch hour. The meeting was adjourned for the morning session with this prayer.

The afternoon session of this Woman's Missionary Union meeting was opened with the congregation singing "O Zion Haste."

Mrs. W. O. Abbitt, President of the Woman's Missionary Union

of the Williamston church, brought our afternoon devotion and prayer. She used Matthew 28: 18-20 and Mark 16: 5-8. She asked us to close our prayers by saying "Lord, what will Thou have us do?"

Mrs. J. H. White of the Tar River Association joined us for the afternoon session. Mrs. Joyner welcomed her into the group.

The hospitality committee expressed appreciation to the host church for the beautiful flowers; to the officers for the well planned program; to Mrs. Maddrey and Mrs. Lawton for their inspiring messages; and to the musicians for their beautiful contributions of the day.

The registration committee reported 338 present for the day, Mrs. Butler brought this report.

There was no old nor new business for the afternoon.

Miss Hildo Mayo brought a report for the Business Women's Circles in the absence of Miss Emily Williams, their chairman. She reported 31 churches have B W Circles. There were 162 women at their last district meeting. They are a vital part of our work. They have many talents and abilities to offer to their work, Miss Mayo said.

The nominating committee was composed of Mrs. Charlie Daniels, Mrs. N. C. Brooks and Mrs. J. G. Raby.

Our afternoon speaker, a returned missionary from the Philippines, was introduced by Mrs. Edgar Joyner. She is not only a missionary from a foreign field, but an accomplished soloist also. The Lord has given Mrs. W. W. Lawton so many talents, Mrs. Joyner stated.

Special music was rendered at this time by Mrs. W. W. Lawton, her selection being "More Love To Thee."

Mrs. Lawton began her message by taking us on an imaginary trip to the Philippine Islands. It is 32 hours by air and three weeks by boat. Bataan is on one side of the island and Corregidor on the other. The port city of Manila is very large. Most of the Philippine people are small and most of them speak English. There are many taxis there, as well as many jeeps left there by the American army which have been converted into Jeepnies. They will take you anywhere for five cents.

She told us that the oldest church there is of course Catholic. She related the story of the parade of the black stature in a glass coffin. Doctors, lawyers, and high officials clamor along with thousands of other people to carry a corner of this casket.

There was no Baptist church in Manila when the Lawtons went there. They secured a building, but the owner later returned their rent money. The priest had forbidden this native Chinese to rent to Baptist people. They later rented a house just being built. Hand bills were printed and distributed about their first meeting. No one came, except the Lawton family and their cook. Some people coming

back from mass stopped and looked in. They were invited in to the service. Two small girls came three or four weeks, but suddenly stopped. Mrs. Lawton saw them across the street one Sunday after then and went over to invite them into the service. They shook their heads "NO." She asked if their mother had forbidden them to come. Again they shook their heads "NO." They said that their priest had forbidden them coming. They darted off after that and Mrs. Lawton had never seen them since. The priest at another station in the Philippines had been through the Baptist area and taken their material, even their Bibles which had been burned. The attendance at the Baptist mission dropped from 100-150 to about 20-30 after this priest made his visit.

She told us of a service man from "The Voice Of America" who goes to one mission point for services. He carries his trombone, which is the only musical instrument there. Mr. and Mrs. Lawton teach in the Seminary there.

Of 700 islands in the Philippines, 500 are inhabited. Southern Baptists have work on two of these islands, Luzon and Mendonon. There is one hospital and one church on Mendonon. The President of the Philippine Islands is a Catholic but he is not anti-Christian as the former President was. Let us dedicate all that we have if we are to win the Philippine Islands to Christ, Mrs. Lawton urged. Let us not tell them as we have in the past. "I'm sorry, you'll have to wait," Mrs. Lawton pleaded.

She told us of the primitive ways and customs of the Chinese. They are ignorant of the knowledge of a risen Christ and their religion is heart breaking to those who do know Christ.

She closed her message by asking us to encourage our young people to go and tell of Christ's love and that the power in us would be released.

Mrs. Lawton offered the closing prayer.

The meeting was adjourned.

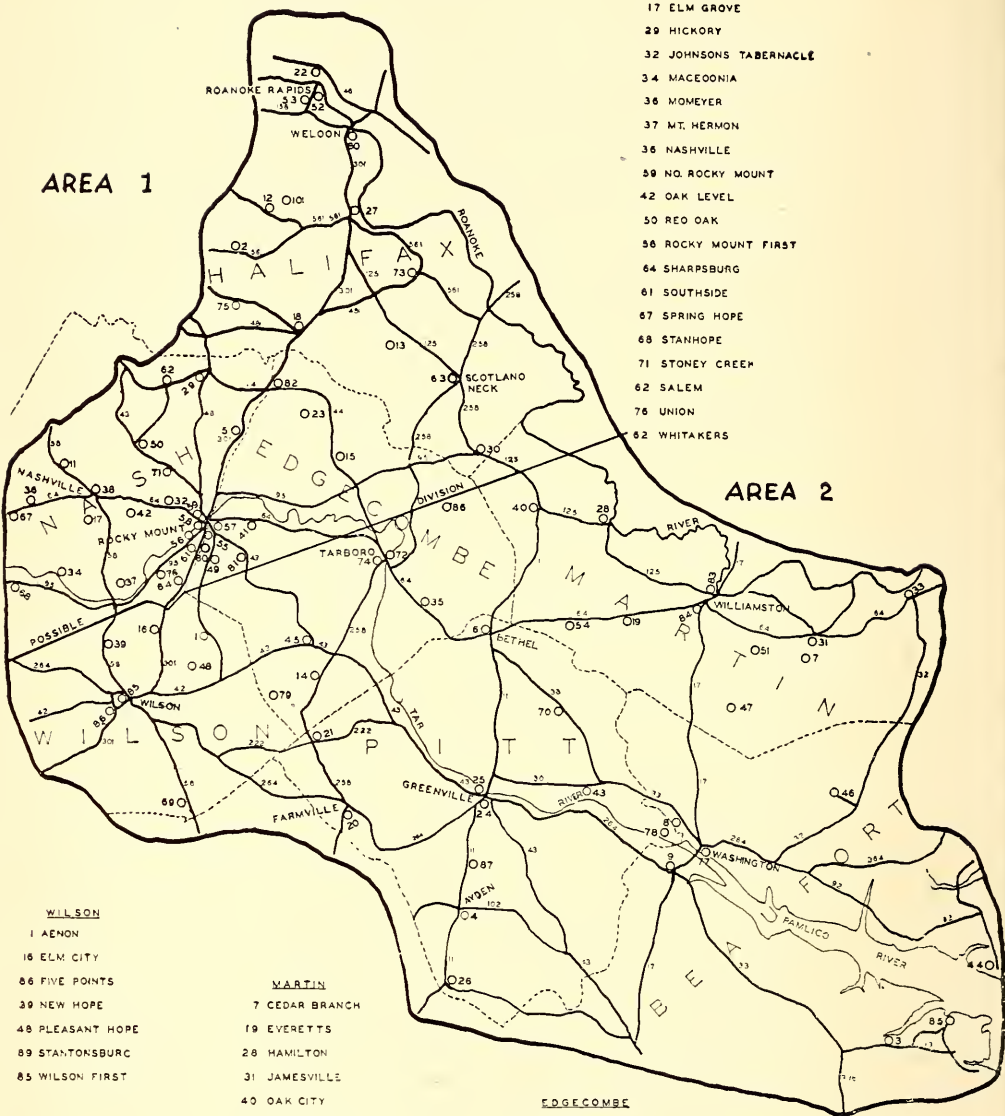

7. Report of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws was presented by Dr. James H. Blackmore. Rev. Daniel H. Jolly, made a motion that the Constitution be voted on by paragraph. The motion was adopted. Article 16, By-Laws, provoked some discussion. Those speaking for or clarifying the meaning or intent of this article were: J. Felix Arnold, Rev. W. D. Morris, Scotland Neck, and Mrs. Lealand Kitchen, Sr., Scotland Neck. The substance of the discussion was that this Article is intended to eliminate much duplication of work on the part of the Executive Committee and the Baptist Builders Club, many of whom serve on both committees, and also to give to the Builders Club Committee more freedom to act on requests for aid. A motion by Dr. Blackmore, that the Constitution and By-Laws be adopted in its entirety, was carried.

8. Report on the "Missionary Program and Personnel" was presented by Danford E. Josey as follows: "Your Committee of Five recommends that we continue in our new association to emphasize with vigor primary missions, that is the winning of the lost to Christ and the establishment of new Baptist Churches and to promote and present the teaching and training program within the churches. As a committee, we do not have the authority to employ missionary personnel, but we recommend that the Executive Committee undertake immediately to secure and employ suitable personnel to initiate and direct this program." This report was adopted.

Constitution

ARTICLE I. NAME. The name of this body is "North Roanoke Baptist Association."

ARTICLE 11. PURPOSE: It is the purpose of the Association to provide an Organization of cooperation for the Missionary Baptist churches affiliated with it, and to encourage them to faithfulness in every endeavor which we shall undertake together in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and to encourage them in the support of the cooperative program of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP: The Association shall consist of messengers who are members of the affiliated churches as follows: (1) one messenger from each church and one additional messenger for each one hundred resident members or fraction thereof, up to a maximum of seven messengers, chosen by the affiliated churches; (2) the pastors; (3) the duly elected officers of the Association and the current Superintendent of the Associational W. M. U.

ARTICLE IV. AFFILIATED CHURCHES: Missionary Baptist Churches which have petitioned for membership and by vote of the Association are accounted to be in fellowship with the purpose and undertakings of this body, shall comprise the list of affiliated churches. The vote of the Association to extend fellowship, or to withdraw fellowship, shall be a two-thirds vote. Failure to report annually to the Association may raise the question of fellowship. Messengers from twenty churches shall constitute a quorum, and decisions of those present shall be considered the action of the Association.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS: The officers of the Association shall be elected annually at the fall session, and shall assume their duties at the close of the fall session and serve until the election of their successors. Officers shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, Chairman of Evangelism, (no one of whom may be eligible to serve in the same official capacity for more than five consecutive years); other officers shall be: the members of the Executive Committee, and the Associational Superintendent of the W. M. U.

ARTICLE VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, Chairman of Evangelism, Chairman of the Builders' Club and the Associational Superintendent of the W. M. U. together with a pastor and a layman from each of the following counties: Edgecombe, Halifax and Nash, and three members at large. The Executive Committee is charged with the duty of executing the plans and decisions of the Association, including the associational program

of missions and extension. A full report of its work shall be presented at each fall session, together with plans and recommendations for the promotion and extension of the work of the Association. The Executive Committee shall act for the Association between sessions in conformity with the expressed decisions of the body, except that the allocation of disbursements of fund of the Builders' Club shall be under the direction and supervision of the Builders' Club Committee. A vacancy occurring between sessions may be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: At each fall session, or not later than sixty days thereafter, the Executive Committee of the Association shall name a Nominating Committee, consisting of one messenger from each of the following counties: Edgecombe, Halifax and Nash, and two members at large whose duty it shall be to bring to the Association at its fall session nominations for all officers of the Association. Additional nominations may be made from the floor at the time these nominations the presented.

ARTICLE VIII. PROCEDURE: The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, where not otherwise provided by this Constitution or the By-Laws.

ARTICLE IX. AMENDMENT: This Constitution may be amended at any session of the Association by a two-thirds vote, provided: that the proposed amendment has been read to the Association at the previous session and referred to the committee on Constitution and By-Laws for clarification and correlation.

ARTICLE X. ADOPTION: This Constitution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption at the first fall session of the North Roanoke Baptist Association.

BY-LAWS

Article 1

MEETINGS

The sessions of the Association shall be held semi-annually in the spring and fall at such times and places as may be decided by the Association in its fall session.

Article 2

OPENING

Meetings of the Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

Article 3

QUORUM

Representatives from twenty of the affiliated churches shall constitute a quorum.

Article 4

ORDER OF BUSINESS

An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

Article 5

CHURCH LETTER

Each affiliated church shall send to the fall session of the Association, on forms furnished by the clerk, a full report of the church work for the year ending September 30.

Article 6

MODERATOR AND VICE-MODERATOR

The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall preside at all meetings of the Association. They shall be members of the Executive Committee and as opportunity may permit they, representing the fellowship of the entire Association, shall act as fraternal visitors to the churches throughout the year.

Article 7

CLERK

The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association and shall prepare and cause to be published and distributed, as directed by the Association or Executive Committee, minutes and statistics of the Association as soon as practical after adjournment of the fall session. He shall mail the necessary forms and letters to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the Association. Copies of the minutes shall be mailed to the officers, affiliated churches, to each institution participating in the cooperative program, and such other institutions and individuals as the Association or Executive Committee may direct.

Article 8

TREASURER

The Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Association, disburse them according to order, and present a written report of the same to the fall and spring sessions of the Association and additional reports at the request of the Executive Committee. He shall furnish the Chairman of the Executive and Finance Committees a report at least ten days before each regular scheduled meeting of the Executive Committee.

Article 9

AUDITOR

The Auditor shall examine the financial books and records of the Association and submit a detailed report covering his audit annually and at such time as may be required by the Executive Committee or the Association.

Article 10

SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The Sunday School Superintendent shall direct and supervise the Sunday School program of the Association under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 11

TRAINING UNION DIRECTOR

The Training Union Director shall have charge of the direction and promotion of the Training Union program under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 12

BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood program of the Association shall be under the direction of the Brotherhood President subject to the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 13

EVANGELISM

The program of Evangelism of the Association shall be under the direction of the Chairman of Evangelism subject to the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 14

REVENUE

The contributions of the affiliated churches for the purpose of defraying expenses of the Missionary program and other activities of the Association shall be on a resident member basis and in such amount as may be approved by the Association from year to year.

Article 15

SALARIES OF OFFICERS

Salaries of the Missionary or Missionaries of the Association as well as any other officer, shall be in such amount as may be provided for in the annual budget and approved by the Association.

Article 16

BUILDERS CLUB

The North Roanoke Baptist Builders' Club, whose purpose is that of aiding in the erection of buildings of Baptist churches and Sunday Schools and improving needy existing ones in this Association, shall be under the direction of a committee of seven members, three of whom shall be from the Executive Committee, and four at large, to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee and representative of the geographical area of the Association. This Committee shall direct and supervise the North Roanoke Baptist Builders' Club and report to the Executive Committee at its regular

meetings. No allocation of funds may be made by the Builders' Club Committee unless sufficient funds are on hand to pay all commitments in full and unless such action is taken by the committee in official session, with at least five members present.

Article 17

COMMITTEE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

At its first session following the fall session of the Association the Executive Committee shall appoint a committee on Constitution and By-Laws, of which the first named member shall serve as chairman. It shall be the duty of this Committee to receive, examine, and make recommendations to the Association in session on all proposed amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws.

Article 18

FINANCE COMMITTEE

At the first session following the fall session of the Association the Executive Committee shall appoint a committee on Finance, of which the first named member shall serve as chairman. It shall be the duty of this committee to supervise the financial program of the Association and to report to the Executive Committee from time to time. Also it shall be the duty of this committee to submit to the Executive Committee prior to each fall session of the Association a budget giving the estimated revenue for the ensuing year, as well as the itemized proposed expenses for the same period.

Article 19

PROGRAM COMMITTEE

The Program Committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association and shall plan and present the program, in printed form, for the sessions of the Association, which, upon the adoption by the Association, shall become its order of business.

Article 20

ASSOCIATIONAL COMMITTEES

The Moderator, following the convening of each fall session of the Association, shall appoint the following committees: (1) Committee on time, place and preacher; (2) Committee on resolutions; (3) Committee on petitions; (4) Any other committees that may be authorized by the Association; (5) Any other committees that may be authorized by the Association.

Article 21

MISSIONARY PROGRAM

The Missionary and extension work of the Association, as well as the Missionary or Missionaries whom they shall employ and direct, shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee. The Mis-

sionary fund shall be kept and disbursed by the Treasurer as directed by the Executive Committee.

Article 22

MINUTES OF THE ASSOCIATION

The minutes of all sessions of the Association shall be examined, approved and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before being printed. Said minutes shall be submitted to the spring session of the Association for consideration and approval.

Article 23

VISITORS

Visitors may be invited to participate in the deliberations of the Association without the privilege to vote.

Article 24

AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote, provided that the proposed amendment has been read to the Association at the previous session of the Association and has been referred to the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws for clarification and correlation; such additions or amendments shall become effective immediately upon passage. No resolution adopted by this Association shall be constructed to become a part of these By-Laws.

Article 25

EFFECTIVE DATE

These By-Laws shall become effective immediately upon their adoption at the first fall session of the North Roanoke Baptist Association.

October 12, 1955

1. On Wednesday morning, October 12, 1955, the first Annual Session of the North Roanoke Baptist Association began in the Rosemary Baptist Church of Roanoke Rapids under the direction of the Moderator, W. D. Morris of Scotland Neck.

2. The music for the day was directed by W. H. Adams, Minister of Music of the First Baptist Church of Scotland Neck. The opening hymn was "O Zion Haste."

3. Rev. B. Marshall Whitehurst, host pastor, read Scripture and offered prayer.

4. Rev. J. Felix Arnold, chairman of the committee of five, moved that the Enfield meeting be confirmed. The motion carried.

5. The host pastor gave a cordial welcome.

6. The following visitors were recognized: W. K. McGee, North Carolina Baptist Hospital; Dr. L. L. Carpenter, Biblical Recorder; Rev. J. M. Hayes, North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging; and Rev. and Mrs. Worth Grant, Sendai, Japan. Each made appropriate remarks.

7. It was reported that 215 messengers had registered and a motion was adopted that these, and others who would join the group later, constitute the organization to transact the business of the Association.

8. Rev. J. H. Blackmore presented the constitution and by-laws. These were approved.

9. A motion was adopted that the printed program be recognized as the Order of Business for the Session.

10. The moderator brought a challenging and inspiring message.

11. A hymn, "Rescue the Perishing," was sung.

12. The moderator appointed the following committees:
Reception of new churches: Gordon L. Price, Ch., G. N. Cowan,
Miss Hilda Mayo.

Resolutions: Rev. Otis Brady, Ch., Rev. Clyde Fox, Rev. Daniel Hux.

Representatives for Institutions: Rev. Felix Arnold, Ch., Rev. H. C. Lowder, Rev. R. C. Lanier.

Time, Place, and Preacher: John Lanier, Ch., Marvin Viverette, Mrs. R. T. Daniel.

13. The report on distribution of property was presented by Rev. J. Felix Arnold. Approved.

14. Rev B. Marshall Whitehurst presented the Program of Associational Missions for the Association and presented our Associational Missionary, Miss Hilda Mayo.

15. The New Associational Missionary made appropriate remarks. Announced an Associational School of Missions March 18-23, 1956. There was discussion from the floor praising Miss Mayo and expressing gratitude for her.

16. Rev. G. Durham Ipock presented a motion that a sum of between \$50.00 and \$100.00 be allocated to buy a gift for Rev. Grady Burgess, our former Associational Missionary. The motion carried.

17. The offering was called for by the moderator. The amount received was \$80.51.

18. The executive committee was directed to handle the matter of the gift for Mr. Burgess.

19. Dr. F. O. Mixon, president of Chowan College, was recognized and made appropriate remarks.

20. A solo was sung by a member of the choir of the host church.

21. Mr. James P. Morgan, State Training Union Secretary for North Carolina, brought the morning message.

22. The benediction and offering of thanks was offered by Rev. Worth Grant, Sendai, Japan.

Afternoon Session

23. The opening hymn was "Blessed Assurance."

24. Rev. Yates W. Campbell read a passage of Scripture and W. E. Goode led in prayer.

25. The proposed budget was presented by the Associational Treasurer, Mr. Forest G. Shearin. The motion to adopt the proposed budget as amended carried.

26. The motion was adopted that in the future the host church feed the Association and be subsidized up to \$150.00 for so doing.

27. The recommendations of the executive committee con-

cerning the proposed budget were adopted.

28. Mrs. L. H. Kitchen gave the report of the North Roanoke Baptist Builders Club. The report with the following recommendations was adopted:

1. Four calls per year be made.
2. A call may be made when the balance in the treasury is up to \$250.00.
3. The first Sunday in November be suggested as Builders Club Day.

- (5) Biblical Recorder—Rev. J. H. Blackmore, Spring Hope.

34. Rev. Otis Brady made the report of the committee on Resolutions which was adopted.

35. Rev. J. H. Blackmore presented the following amendments to the constitution:

Training Union

We now have 53 churches in the North Roanoke Association and 40 Training Unions as of today. Benvenue, less than a year old and with 71 church members, organized a Training Union two weeks ago with 69 enrolled last Sunday night. One of the 13 churches without a Training Union has a membership of almost 400.

The ultimate goal of our Associational Training Union is to have a Standard Training Union in every Baptist church. In order to reach this goal, it will require most of our churches to change their way of filling Training Union offices. Training Union is charged with the responsibility of training church people in church membership. Included in this is training Sunday School workers and other leaders in every phase of church work. This job cannot be done with 'left-overs'. After every other officer within the church has been selected, then what is left—'Lay them to rest in Training Union!' This program of training *must* be done by the finest workers your church has to offer. When this is done, your Training Union Director becomes a friend to every department head in your church. When the Sunday School Superintendent needs a new teacher or laborer, the Training Union director should be able to furnish several. The same is true in every department within the church. Training Union is where every member of the church discovers himself and finds a place of service. Soul-winning is a vital part of Training Union since our enrollment is made up of church members.

Pastors who dislike preaching to empty pews on Sunday night, please take note! Training Union is the best evening-service builder we have. One of the requirements of the eight point record system is that of attendance of the evening service. By building the evening services it makes possible part-time churches becoming full-time churches.

Now, what you would like to know is, how to do it? You pastors and laymen here today, go home and start talking Training Union. If you do not know anything about it, invite someone who does, and let them do the talking. This will put your folks to thinking. Invite some one again, if needed, to get the plans rolling. Select the most capable and faithful leader you have and let the church vote on him. From this point it might be advisable to call in Associational assistance unless there is experienced help close by. Some nearby church with an active training union could be of great assistance. It is just as easy to get started right as it is to start wrong. Training Union has a definite job to do! That job cannot be done with haphazard use of different materials and programs. Follow closely the outlined plans in our Training Union quarterlies and other Training Union materials.

Enthusiasm must be created for the work. Have as many as possible to attend the County and Associational meetings. Efforts are made to get the best speakers and leaders possible for these occa-

sions. Get as many folks as possible from your church to attend the Training Union assemblies at Caswell, Fruitland or our South-wide Assembly at Ridgecrest. Make a special note on your calendar of activities right now for our big "M" Night meeting on December 5 here in the Rosemary Church. Harvey T. Gibson, our former State Training Union Secretary now Director of Administration for Training Union work for the Southern Baptist Convention will be our speaker. This will be an excellent opportunity to renew old acquaintance and acquire inspiration and enthusiasm.

We are expecting 650 for this "M" night meeting and it will be up to you people here today to pass the word around and start making plans to come. Please give this meeting your full support by not planning other events the same night and plan to be here yourself and bring a car-load.

Will we make the North Roanoke Training Union the finest in the State? The answer is up to you!

Message from Brotherhood President

Yesterday, October 11, I made my report to the final Roanoke Baptist Association meeting. At which time I tried to cover some of the actual facts that your Brotherhood accomplished during the past year, 1955.

At present our Northern District has 48 churches with 23 Brotherhoods, which is a fine start. Most of our Brotherhoods are fairly new, from 1 to 5 years old. Therefore, we all have a lot to learn and profit therefrom. Some of our Brotherhoods have not been functioning very well, for these I say let's get down to work, back up our churches and pastors and show them that we mean business.

For those who do not have a Brotherhood in your church, you will never know what it can do until you organize and try it. Therefore, get your pastor, deacons and laymen together, talk it over.

Whether you have a Brotherhood or not, maybe my following observations can be of value, and make you Brotherhood conscious.

First, what is a Brotherhood? Well, a Brotherhood in a local Baptist church is a group of men seventeen years old and above, banded together for the purpose of promoting the kingdom of Christ through the church and the denomination.

Therefore, the Brotherhood is a denominational agency, dealing exclusively with men of the church for the exclusive purpose of giving the men an opportunity to have a part in the whole program of the church. So you can see how a program can be made to go forward with a group of men back of it and helping the pastor who is their leader.

Let us all remember that back in the early days the Bible tells

us about the disciples of "Christ." They were men, all men working for Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior.

The women of the church are always willing to do their part and they do. But it is not intended for them to do the men's job.

Please do not confuse a men's Brotherhood with a social church club. If your Brotherhood is working as a social club, you better get on the right track and go to work. No pastor will get very much help or get very far with just an eating Brotherhood.

If you have a social clique in your church, then do some horse trading for a live Brotherhood.

Back up your pastor and work for the church, not just a few.

I believe your pastor will be lots less reluctant and more enthused over the idea of organizing a Brotherhood if you will live up to the ideals of the Brotherhood. Then, he will dismiss the dreaded fear of this social band that is so easy to wind up with.

A live Brotherhood in your church will be doing a lot of things, such as:

(1) Backing the pastor: Giving him the best helpers in the world.

(2) Taking an active part in "Evangelism:" Help with visitations in connection with revivals.

(3) Taking the leading roll on "Layman's Day:" It is a day to recognize, honor, challenge and use men.

(4) Sponsor R. A.'s (Royal Ambassadors): The W. M. S. is turning the sponsorship of R. A.'s over to the Brotherhoods. If your church has a Brotherhood, all is well and good. But, if your church does not have a Brotherhood, what are you going to do? A Brotherhood can do a much better job than just a group of volunteer laymen.

So with the beginning of a new district let us all turn over a new leaf and work for a successful Brotherhood for the year that is ahead of us.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. NAME: The name of this body is "South Roanoke Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE: It is the purpose of the Association to provide an organization of cooperation for the Missionary Baptist Churches affiliated with it, and to encourage them to faithfulness in every endeavor which we shall undertake together in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP: The Association shall consist of messengers who are members of the affiliated church as follows:

- (1) A. One messenger from each church;
 - B. An additional messenger for each one hundred resident members or fraction thereof, up to a maximum of seven messengers, chosen by the affiliated churches;
- (2) The Pastors;
- (3) The duly elected officers of the Association and the current Superintendent of the Associational W. M. U.

ARTICLE IV. AFFILIATED CHURCHES: Missionary Baptist Churches which have petitioned for membership and by vote of the Association are accounted to be in fellowship with the purposes and undertakings of this body, shall comprise the list of affiliated churches. The vote of the Association to extend fellowship, or to withdraw fellowship, shall be a two-thirds vote. Failure to report annually to the Association shall raise the question of fellowship. Twenty churches shall constitute a quorum, and decisions of those present shall be considered the action of the Association.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS: The officers of the Association shall be elected annually at the fall session, and shall assume their duties at the close of the fall session, and shall serve until the election of their successors. Officers shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Auditor, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, Chairman of Evangelism, (no one of whom may be eligible to serve in the same official capacity for more than five consecutive years); other officers shall be: the members of the Executive Committee, together with the Associational Superintendent of the W. M. U., who shall be accounted an officer of the Association.

ARTICLE VI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, together with a pastor and a layman from each county where a majority of the Baptist Churches are affiliated with this Association, and three members at large. Each county shall be represented by at least one member. The Executive Committee is charged with the duty of executing the plans and decisions of the Association, including the associational program of missions and extension, and the

employment and direction of the associational missionaries. A full report of its work shall be presented at each fall session, together with plans and recommendations for the promotion and extension of the work of the Association. The Executive Committee shall act for the Association between Sessions in conformity with the expressed decisions of the body. A vacancy occurring between sessions may be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: At each fall session, or not later than sixty days thereafter, the Executive Committee of the Association shall name a Nominating Committee, consisting of one messenger from each county, whose duty it shall be to bring to the Association at its next fall session nominations for all officers of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII. PROCEDURE: The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, where not otherwise provided by this Constitution or the By-Laws.

ARTICLE IX. AMENDMENT: This Constitution may be amended at any session of the Association by a two-thirds vote, provided: that the proposed amendment has been read to the Association at the previous session and referred to a committee for clarification and correlation.

ARTICLE X. ADOPTION: Upon adoption, this Constitution shall become effective at the close of this session of the South Roanoke Baptist Association.

By-Laws of the Roanoke Baptist Association

Article 1

MEETINGS

The Sessions of the Association shall be held semi-annually in the spring and in the fall at such times and places as may be decided by the Association in its Fall Session.

Article 2

OPENING

Meetings of the Association shall be opened with a devotional service and closed with prayer.

Article 3

QUORUM

Representatives from twenty of the affiliated churches shall constitute a quorum.

Article 4

ORDER OF BUSINESS

An order of business shall be adopted at the beginning of each session which shall be changed only by a two-thirds vote of the body.

Article 5

CHURCH LETTER

Each affiliated church shall send to the Clerk of the Association prior to Fall Sessions of the Association, on forms furnished by the Clerk, a full report of the church work for the year ending September 30.

Article 6

MODERATOR AND VICE-MODERATOR

The Moderator or Vice-Moderator shall preside at all meetings of the Association. They shall be members of the Executive Committee and, as opportunity may permit, they shall act as fraternal visitors to the churches throughout the year, representing the fellowship of the entire Association.

Article 7

CLERK

The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association and shall prepare and cause to be published and distributed, as directed by the Association or Executive Committee, minutes and statistics of the Association as soon as practical after adjournment of the Fall Session. He shall mail the necessary forms and letters to the Clerks of the Churches affiliated with the Association. Copies of the minutes shall be mailed to the officers, affiliated churches, to each institution participating in this cooperative program, and such other institutions and individuals as the Association or Executive Committee may direct.

Article 8

TREASURER

The Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Association, disburse them according to its order, and present a written report of the same to the Fall Session of the Association and additional reports at the request of the Executive Committee. He shall furnish the Chairman of the Executive and Finance Committees a report at least ten days before each regular scheduled meeting of the Executive Committee.

Article 9

AUDITOR

The Auditor shall examine the financial books and records of the Association and submit a detailed report covering his audit at such times as may be required by the Executive Committee or the Association.

Article 10

SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The Sunday School Superintendent shall direct and supervise the Sunday School program of the Association under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 11

TRAINING UNION DIRECTOR

The Training Union Director shall have charge of the direction and promotion of the Training Union Program under the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 12

BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood program shall be under the direction of the Brotherhood President of the Association and subject to the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 13

EVANGELISM

The program of Evangelism of the Association shall be under the direction of the Chairman of Evangelism subject to the supervision of the Executive Committee.

Article 14

REVENUE

The contributions of the affiliated churches for the purpose of defraying expenses of the Missionary Program and other activities of the Association shall be on a resident member basis.

Article 15

SALARIES OF OFFICERS

Salaries of the Missionary or Missionaries of the Association, as well as any other officer, shall be in such amount as may be provided for in the annual budget and approved by the Association in its fall session.

Article 16

BUILDERS CLUB

The South Roanoke Baptist Builders' Club, whose purpose is that of aiding in the erection of the buildings of Baptist Churches and Sunday Schools, and improving needy existing ones in this Association, shall be under the direction of a committee of seven members, three of whom shall be from the Executive Committee and four from the Association at large, to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee and representative of the geographical area of the Association. This Committee shall direct and supervise the South Roanoke Baptist Builders' Club and report to the Executive Committee at each regular meeting. No allocation of funds shall be made by the regular meeting. No allocation of funds shall be made by the Builders' Club Committee unless sufficient funds are on hand to pay all commitments in full, and unless such action is taken by the Committee in official session, with at least five members present. No church shall receive more than \$1,000.00 at any one time.

Article 17

STANDING COMMITTEES

The Executive Committee at its first meeting following the Fall Session of the Association shall appoint the following Committees: Constitution and By-Laws, and Finance. The first named member on each Committee shall serve as Chairman.

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws to receive, and make recommendations to the Association in session on all proposed amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws.

It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to supervise the Financial Program of the Association and report to the Executive Committee regarding the same from time to time. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to submit to the Executive Committee at a meeting prior to the Fall Session of the Association a budget giving the estimated revenue for the ensuing year, as well as the itemized proposed expenses for this period.

Article 18

PROGRAM COMMITTEE

The Program Committee shall be composed of all elective officers of the Association.

Article 19

ASSOCIATIONAL COMMITTEES

The Moderator, following the convening of each Fall Session of the Association, shall appoint the following committees:

1. Committee on place and preacher,
2. Committee on resolutions,
3. Committee on petitions,
4. Any other committees that may be authorized by the Association.

Article 20

MISSIONARY PROGRAM

The Missionary and extension work of the Association shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee, as well as the Missionary or Missionaries whom they shall employ and direct. The Missionary Fund shall be kept and disbursed by Treasurer as directed by the Executive Committee.

Article 21

MINUTES OF THE ASSOCIATION

The Minutes of all Sessions of the Association shall be examined, approved and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before being printed.

Article 22

VISITORS

Visitors may be invited to participate in the deliberations of the Association without the privilege to vote.

Article 23

AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws may be amended at any Session of the Association by a two-thirds vote, provided: that the proposed amendment has been read to the Association at the previous session of the Association and referred to a committee for clarification and correlation. No resolution adopted by the Association shall become a part of these By-Laws.

Article 24

EFFECTIVE DATE

These By-Laws or any additions or amendments thereto shall become effective immediately upon passage.

**Organizational Meeting South Roanoke Baptist Association,
May 2, 1953**

This meeting was held in the Memorial Baptist Church of Greenville, N. C., on the above date, for the purpose of organizing the South Roanoke Baptist Association. The meeting was presided over by E. W. Holmes, Moderator of the Roanoke Association, and was opened by prayer. The following suggested program was submitted by the Committee of Five:

Organization: Roll Call of Churches and Order of business by R. E. Ferguson.

Report of Committee of Five:

- a. Constitution and By-Laws, Rev. R. E. Ferguson
- b. Report of Nominating Committee, Rev. H. C. Lowder
- c. Missionary Program and Personnel budget, Rev. Carl Ousley
- d. Time and place of first meeting, Rev. R. E. Ferguson
- e. Policy for disposition of property, Mr. Charles C. Powell
- f. Message, Mr. Ben C. Fisher

Upon motion of Rev. R. E. Ferguson, seconded by Guy T. Swindell, the above order of business as shown by the above program was unanimously adopted.

The proposed Constitution and By-Laws, as circulated to all churches, was read in detail by Rev. R. E. Ferguson and upon his motion of adoption the same was seconded by Paul Bailey of Everetts.

Report of Executive Committee

Your Executive Committee, since its election at the Association's Organizational Meeting, May 2, 1955, has held two meetings, and we report here the principal actions of the Committee:

The first meeting of the Executive Committee of the South Roanoke Baptist Association was held on August 9, at the Greenville Memorial Church with nine members present. The Committee was organized by the election of the following officers:

Chairman—Mr. H. S. Johnson, Hamilton

Vice Chairman—Rev. C. E. Baucom, Wilson

Secretary—Mr. Paul R. Waters, Washington

"After organizing the Committee the first item of business was

electing from the Executive Committee the three members of the Baptist Builder's Club Committee to serve with four members to be elected at the Fall Session of the Association, as provided in the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association. The following were elected: Mr. J. H. Boyd, Chairman, Rev. R. E. Ferguson, and Rev. C. E. Baucom.

"A card from Rev. Carl L. Ousley gave notice that he had resigned from the pastorate of the Tarboro Church and would be unable to serve on the Executive Committee. Upon motion duly seconded, Rev. Thomas W. McKneely of Pinetops, was unanimously elected a member of the Executive Committee, to serve in his stead.

"The Executive Committee determined that it was entitled to an additional member (at large), and upon motion duly carried, Rev. Percy B. Upchurch, pastor of Memorial Baptist Church, Greenville, was unanimously elected.

"The Rev. C. E. Baucom stated that he would be disappointed if our Association did not go forward in its Primary Missions Program; that the flame for this type of program must be generated within the Executive Committee since it was charged with the responsibility of undergirding this type of program. He made the following motion:

That the Executive Committee name a strong Primary Missions Committee to work in behalf of Missions, to be charged with the responsibility of formulating definite and workable plans to the end that we go forward with our Missionary efforts; and further that this Committee be instructed to study the Mission needs of our Association and to contact the pastors of various churches to the end that the greatest number would see this need and would cooperate financially; and that this Committee be authorized and instructed to negotiate with Mr. L. Grady Burgiss, as our Associational Missionary, and report to the next meeting of the Executive Committee. This motion was seconded by Rev. R. E. Ferguson, and unanimously adopted.

"The Chairman was instructed to appoint this Missionary Committee, and the following were appointed by him: Rev. Earle J. Rogers, Chairman, Rev. R. E. Ferguson, and Mr. J. H. Boyd.

The *second* meeting of the Executive Committee of the South Roanoke Baptist Association was held with the Hamilton Baptist Church on September 15, with nine members present. The following items of business received attention:

"Rev. Earle J. Rogers reported for the Missionary Committee appointed at the last meeting of this Committee, regarding employment of L. Grady Burgiss as our Associational Missionary. Mr. Burgiss accepted this responsibility with appropriate remarks.

Mr. Burgiss said that it would be necessary for his office to have the following equipment: filing cabinet, typewriter, addressing machine, mimeograph machine and stationery. Upon motion by Rev. C. E. Baucom, duly seconded, the following Purchasing Committee was unanimously elected: L. G. Burgiss, Percy D. Upchurch and H. S. Johnson.

“Mr. H. S. Johnson, Chairman, read a letter from Dr. M. A. Huggins, concerning State help for the Association. The Chairman was authorized to reply to Dr. Huggins and advise that we would need some help from the State Convention, and that he ask for application forms. The Chairman and Secretary were instructed to execute such forms for the next calendar year, and request our Associational Missions needs should be \$1,500.00, as shown by the Proposed Budget of the Association.

“Upon motion of Rev. E. G. Cole, duly seconded, Mr. J. Sam Getsinger of Williamston, was recommended to continue to serve on the General Board of the Convention.

Report of the Sunday School Superintendent to the First Annual Meeting of the South Roanoke Association October 13, 1955

"GO QUICKLY, AND TELL . . ." With these words Jesus sent, through the Resurrection angel, the first great message of His Resurrection. Since that time His disciples have been telling the world the glorious message of the Resurrected Saviour.

Today, as we mark the beginning of a new era in this the South Roanoke Association, we need to feel this same sense of urgency. Indeed, it is not "yet four months until the harvest." The harvest is NOW! Let us not simply "Look unto the fields", but let us "Open Our Eyes And See".

One of the greatest factors in implementing our plans for the future is to use the past as a foundation for future growth. Therefore, let's take a moment to look at the foundation upon which we are going to build.

Back on October 1908, on the 13th day of that month, there were gathered with the other churches of the new Roanoke Association, 20 churches from the area which now comprises the South Roanoke. By 1937, this number from our area had grown to 35. At that time they reported a Sunday School enrollment of 4,806. Only 11 of those churches reported a Cradle Roll, and 4 reported Home Departments. The Wilson Church was the largest Sunday School, Tarboro was second, and Washington was third.

In October 1954, our last recorded year at present, there reported 46 churches from our section to the Annual meeting of the Roanoke. At that time these churches reported a Sunday School enrollment of 10,452. Or an increase in 18 years of 5,646. That meant an average yearly increase of 314 pupils. During this time the Cradle Roll Department increased to 19, and the Extension Department to 14.

What now for the future? The immediate need seems to be for

better trained leaders within the individual churches. Out of the 46 churches of our area there were 12 churches represented at the Associational Training School held last week at the Immanuel church in Greenville. Next fall we want at least one representative from every church. At the present time the Associational organization is beginning to take shape. This year ahead has no limiting qualities as to what may be done, save one: that one is our willingness to DO. We are proud today, let us be prouder when we convene one year from now!

Associational Training Union Report October 12, 1942

It was midday in the Orient. A caravan was hastening on under the blasting heat. Not far ahead was one of the oldest cities in the world. The zealous young man in the lead was hurrying to perform the task. Saul of Tarsus, with papers of authority, was on the Damascus road, bent upon persecuting Christians.

Then something happened! Saul met Christ, the great leader on the way. Christ gave him a conception of an entirely different kind of life, and directed him in another way. Saul followed that great leader, and then became Paul, himself one of the outstanding leaders for Christ of all ages.

Today Christ needs leaders to do in his name the thing that he did for Paul, and which Paul did for others, some of whom may themselves become, as did Paul, dynamite Christian leaders.

God has a definite plan for every life. All are to be good followers, faithful servants, and some are to be leaders, themselves led by Christ.

Human leadership is needed to carry out Christ's program. People in groups do not always know what to do, or how to act; they need leaders. Otherwise no lessons would be taught, no sermons preached, and no Christians trained for the Master's work. Someone must push the work forward and encourage the workers, as well as show the way by staying ahead of the crowd.

Teaching and training are the major fields in the education work of our churches with which Christian leadership concerns itself. "LEARNING TO DO BY DOING" sum up vital principles of the training process in which the leader influences, teaches and guides.

The conditions of today reveal the need for the right sort of Christian leaders. The training organization of the church seeks to meet this need by equipping for the task. Many Sunday School teachers and officers received their training in the Training Union, and a number of those who are engaged as full-time Christian workers received training in this same organization.

The Training Union seeks to enlist and train competent leaders who properly value the opportunities of their tasks. The need for winning the lost to Christ and enlisting all Christians in his program

should challenge leaders to respond to the call, and fit themselves for effective service.

The Baptist Training Union is recognized by Southern Baptists as the Church program for training church members. It is an essential part of the total educational program of a Church. It is set up, controlled and promoted by a Church through a group of General Officers who are elected by the Church and commissioned by the Church for this important task.

The aim of the Baptist Training Union is "TRAINING IN CHURCH MEMBERSHIP". There is no other department of the Church which has this DISTINCTIVE AIM. The duties and privileges of Church membership are so varied and important that it is highly essential that the Church offer this course of training to every one of its members.

One of the greatest needs of every church member is to participate in all of the life and fellowship of his Church. The outstanding need of every Baptist Church is for every member to participate fully in all of its program. The basic method of the Training Union is described in the two words "Individual Participation". This method of individual participation is at the very heart of the Training Union educational philosophy of learning by doing. This explains why every member of every union, Intermediate through Adult, holds an office or serve on a committee. This is why so much emphasis is placed upon taking part on the program, individual daily Bible reading and prayer, individual attendance upon the church services, individual giving to the church, personal soul-winning, and all the other things Training Union members are requested to do.

The Training Union furnishes the element of expansion, in word and deed, which is essential for Christian growth. God gives to each of us certain talents or abilities. Some have special ability for music, some for public speaking, others for leadership and so on. All of the Christian may be greatly refined and developed by the work of the the natural abilities possessed by the Christian may be greatly refined and developed by the work of the Training Union.

Through its weekly meetings, through its socials, through its visitation program, through comradeship in service, and through all of its activities the Training Union cultivates fellowship. It leads church members to form friendship with other church members. It binds them together in bonds of Christian love.

There are many elements in what we call the Baptist spirit. Among these are zeal for the truth, a love for the Bible and an insistence that every person has the right to study and interpret it for himself, insistence upon soul freedom and democracy in Church life, and an abiding missionary spirit. The Training Union produces real Baptists.

Report of Roanoke Associational Brotherhood

North Carolina Baptists are "On the March" in every phase of their work. This is especially true as it relates to their Brotherhood en-

deavor. It is with much delight that we submit to our Association this report of the stewardship of their Brotherhood up to date, keeping in mind that all the Brotherhood movement has done and is seeking to do is to enlist the men of all our churches in an ever-increasing number in supporting more fully and adequately their own local church programs and that of our great denomination.

Meaning and Purpose

A Brotherhood is a group of consecrated Christian men, preferably all of the men in a Missionary Baptist Church seventeen years old and above who have banded themselves together for the sole purpose of promoting the full program of their Church and Denomination. The Brotherhood is built upon four Cornerstones: EVANGELISM, STEWARDSHIP, BIBLE DOCTRINE AND CHURCH LOYALTY.

Its Function

It is a service organization which seeks to harness and utilize the manpower in the Church and to provide an outlet for men to put into action those impressions for Christian witnessing they received while attending the various services of the Church. The following six vital functions carried out by the organization will enable one to see something of its challenges and objectives:

(1) The Brotherhood offers a great Christian fellowship to all of the men.

(2) Programs are planned and offered which will give the men visions of the great program of Christ carried on by the Church and Denomination.

(3) The sponsorship of Royal Ambassadors and Promotion of the Man and Boy Movement.

(4) The Brotherhood offers and endeavors to give every man in the Church a definite responsibility and service to render in undergirding and promoting the full Church and Denomination Program.

(5) The enlistment and cultivation of that large group of delinquent Church Members.

(6) The Brotherhoods seek to lead the men to witness for Christ and win lost souls to the Saviour.

(7) The Brotherhood endeavors through its Education Committee to enlist every home in the Church for the Biblical Recorder and other Denominational Periodicals.

We have in North Carolina nine hundred and seventy eight Brotherhoods at present. During 1955 Horace Easom, State Brotherhood Secretary, has given three-fourths time to the Brotherhood Work and the other to the Baptist Foundation and Wake Forest Program. Brotherhood Retreats were held this summer at Caswell Baptist Assembly, Fruitland Baptist Assembly, and Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly.

According to the records in the State Brotherhood Office there are now 26 churches out of the 47 that have Brotherhood organizations.

Our State Secretary plans to give much time during the coming

year in the Roanoke Association in the support and promotion of the Brotherhood Movement.

With the above report and in line with these suggestions I make the following recommendations:

(1) That Roanoke Association continue to strive toward the goal of "An Active Brotherhood in every Church."

(2) That we cooperate with the State Brotherhood Department in sponsoring and promoting a joint Brotherhood-Royal Ambassador one night clinic in our Association sometime during the year of 1956.

North Carolina Baptist Hospital 1955 Report

Our Baptist Hospital fills an important place in the life and work of North Carolina Baptists. It will probably serve 50,000 patients this year, touching every area of our State.

In addition to this great host of sick people, our hospital pro-

vides an educational program for more than 450 young people who are in training to become nurses, doctors, technicians, pastors and other Christian workers.

The Department of Pastoral Care provides Christian counseling and guidance for the patients, students, hospital staff and personnel, as well as hundreds of others who come to the hospital from over the State for this purpose alone.

It is not easy to estimate the value of these and other services rendered by our hospital to multiplied thousands of people of all ages in the fields of health, education, and spiritual guidance.

The cost of carrying on this program for such a multitude of people is tremendous — more than two million dollars a year. One-half million dollars of this is spent in helping to care for sick people who are not able to pay for the service they need. We are grateful to God for the privilege of sharing in such a work, and we want to thank the Churches of our Association for their part in it.

The opportunities for Christian service and witness through our hospital are truly great. We need to give it a much more generous support through our Mother's Day offerings and the Cooperative Program.

Report of North Carolina Baptist Homes for Aging Associational Year 1955

The North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging began their fifth year of operation March 16, 1955. This has been a year of encouraging progress. Both Homes — Resthaven and Albemarle — have had a continuing waiting list of applicants. As soon as a vacancy occurs there are far more applicants for admission than can be accepted.

This year will be remembered as one of notable enlargement of facilities. Construction of the Administration and Residential Building, costing \$300,000, will get under way, and it should be completed by this time next year. The new building will provide office facilities, dining room, kitchen, chapel, infirmary, recreational and handicraft space, and rooms for forty additional residents, thus raising the total capacity of the Homes to 95 residents.

Two-thirds of the cost of the new building is now in hand, counting the value of real estate turned over to the Homes. Personal and corporation gifts are being received which will further add to the amount on hand.

Memorial gifts may be made in the following ways: A gift of \$300 will furnish a room; \$1,000 will endow — furnish and maintain — a room; \$3,000 will pay cost of building a room. In either case, a memorial plaque — bearing the name of the donor and the name of the person memorialized, or honored — will be placed on the door of a room.

Miss Nettie Pearl Willis gave her home place at Vale, N. C., as

a memorial to her mother, Mrs. Laura Elliott Goode Willis. The property will be sold and proceeds be used to erect a cottage on the permanent site of our Homes. In addition, Miss Willis made her will in favor of the Homes.

Increasing support on the part of our churches and denominational program gives great encouragement. So far this year, our Special Day Offering has reached almost \$70,000. Since many of the churches put the Homes in the budget instead of taking a special offering, and some of the churches wait until the end of the calendar year to send their gifts, a complete report for the year cannot be made at this time. But it is likely that our goal of \$100,000 for the special offering will be nearly reached. In addition, the Homes will receive \$39,850 as their share of the Nine Year Program, according to the estimated budget.

With increasing aid from denominational sources, the Homes are helping a larger number who do not have sufficient funds with which to pay the cost of keep as residents. In fact, about ninety per cent of all the residents are being helped by the Homes — some with about two-thirds of the cost of keep, and others with about one-third. Less than ten per cent of the residents in the Homes have turned over enough assets to pay their cost of keep on the life plan. Regardless of financial condition, an applicant is received into the Homes on the basis of need and room available.

All connected with the Homes — staff and residents — are most grateful for the prayers and support of our friends. "Hitherto hath the Lord helped." Surely all North Carolina Baptists should be grateful for the progress made thus far. Let us all rally to the challenge to render a greater ministry to the increasing number of aging friends who need the services of our Homes.

Presenting An Adequate Program of Associational Missions South Roanoke

As we come today to this historic moment of the beginning of a mission program in this new South Roanoke Association let us consider a *FIVE-FOLD LOOK* at our situation.

First, let us *LOOK BACK* for a moment into the historic background out of which we have come. Our Association and its program of missions had its origin doubtless in 1803 when Martin Ross presented a query to the Kehukee Association in its annual session being held with the Conoho Log Chapel, one mile northwest of Oak City, on Friday before the first Sunday in October. His query was, "Is not the Kehukee Association, with all her numerous, and respectable friends, called upon in Providence, in some way, to step forward in support of that missionary spirit which the great God is so wonderfully reviving amongst the different denominations of good men in

various parts of the world?" This query and its discussion resulted in the appointment of a committee to meet with similar committees from the Chowan and Neuse Associations in June of 1805 for the purpose of devising ways and means of raising funds to send preachers into needy areas in eastern North Carolina. This movement toward cooperative efforts in missionary endeavor later resulted in the organization of the Baptist State Convention in Greenville on March 29, 1830, and in the organization of the Tar River Association in 1831; the Tar River Association being the mother of the Roanoke Association, which in turn is the mother of this new South Roanoke Association.

And when we consider all the conflicts that were endured, the labors that were expended and the sacrifices that were made let us *LOOK WITHIN* ourselves and see if we have the same degree of faith in and devotion to the great task of bringing Christ and His saving Gospel to those who know him not. When the Roanoke Association launched its program of Associational Missions in 1908 it pledged a total of \$3,123.00 to support that program, which was over 12 per cent of their total gifts. If we had supported our Associational Mission program last year on the same percentage basis we would have given approximately \$100,000.00 to that cause.

In addition to looking back at what our pioneer leaders have done, and within to see if our faith and devotion measure up to theirs, we need to *LOOK AROUND* us at some of our present day needs. We still have within the territory of this new South Roanoke Association an area of 200 square miles without a Missionary Baptist Church in it. It is possible to drive for 22 miles along our National Highway No. 17, from Washington to Williamston, through a thickly populated area, and not pass a Baptist Church in that distance. Also we need to consider the fact that we are living in the geographic area which was the cradle of the Free Will Baptists, the Primitive Baptists and the Christians, or Campbellites as they were originally called, and they all have this major doctrinal position in common with us — they baptize believers (by immersion) upon a profession of faith. As we promote our program of missions we do not wish to impose upon them in any way, crowd them, or proselyte their people. It is our desire to minister to those who are not being reached by anyone. This means that our task in many cases will be difficult, and the progress of the work may be slow and costly.

When we consider all these things and the great needs and challenges that confront us we are compelled to *LOOK UP* and cry out "Oh! Lord help us with this mighty task." Therefore we are called upon to spend much time in prayer, as individuals, as churches, and as smaller groups, seeking God's divine blessings upon our plans and upon our labors.

And if we will humbly look to God for help after we have looked back at our historic origin, within us in sincere self-examination, and around us at the many challenging needs, and will give our hearts and our hands to the great task of making Christ known to

those who are not yet reached, then we may *LOOK FORWARD* to the day when we shall be able to see thriving Baptist Churches ministering to the souls of people where such churches do not now exist. And in that view we shall receive ample rewards for our vision and our labors.
