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

Victory: Built addition to kitchen of Fellowship Hall and added another classroom to Education Department.



One Hundred Sixty-Fourth Annual Session
Liberty Baptist Association
Monday Afternoon, October 7, 1996
COGGINS MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH
Lexington, North Carolina

"Associations: Dream Something New" was the theme for the 164th annual session of the Liberty Baptist Association. A mini-concert of music was provided by Ms. Alisa Jung, after which Rev. David Shaffer led in singing of hymns "At Calvary," "At the Cross," and "Glory to His Name."

Rev. Stuart White, Moderator, called to order the 164th Annual Session, using a gavel which was presented on the 100th Anniversary of the Association. It was purchased by Missionary Arthur Gallimore in Jerusalem and was presented to Moderator G. W. Miller at the 100th Annual Session. The gavel is said to be of olive wood from the Garden of Gethsemane. Rev. R. N. Hardin made a motion, which was seconded by Rev. Allen Lefler, to accept the Book of Reports, with any necessary corrections, as the official record for this Annual Session. The motion was approved unanimously.

On behalf of Coggins Memorial Baptist Church, Rev. Lowell Askins welcomed those present and as Chairman of the Annual Sessions Program Committee, Rev. Askins recommended the adoption of the Program for the 164th Annual Meeting of Liberty Baptist Association, with the following changes: Alisa Jung provided the mini-concert. Rev. David Shaffer is leading the music, in lieu of Anita Bunce. Alisa Jung will be providing the special music at 4:45 pm instead of Anita Bunce. On the evening program, the Hymns are to be at 7:35 pm and each item afterwards will be delayed five (5) minutes. On Tuesday evening, at 8:45 pm, instead of Prayer and Adjournment, we will have Presentation of New Officers and Words of Appreciation by our Director of Missions, Dr. Richard Capps, and then at 8:55 pm, we will be having Prayer and Adjournment. The program recommendation was approved. Rev. Askins said there were two thing which the Annual Session Program Committee felt was important: (1) If you are listed as a speaker on the program, you will come to the pulpit to speak; however, if you are making a motion or speaking to a motion, you should come to one of the microphones situated at the front of the church. (2) If you do come to the microphone for whatever purpose, for the Clerk's records, please state your name and the name of the church at which you are a member. Time at the microphone should be limited to three (3) minutes. Rev. Jack Rose, Chairman of the Nominating Committee nominated Gail Beck as Clerk for 1996-1997. The motion was seconded and carried.

The **Theme Interpretation** was presented by Dr. Peter Hamilton, Pastor of Liberty Baptist Church, using scripture from Philippians 1:3-6. "The key idea in this passage is cooperation. We have a fellowship, or partnership, in the gospel. In I Corinthians 3:9, Paul says we are laborers together with God. So our partnership in the gospel is first of all a partnership with God and secondly a partnership with fellow believers. And for any partnership to be effective, cooperation is necessary: cooperation with God first, leading to cooperation with one another.

Casey Stengle, former manager of the New York Mets, once said, "It's easy to get good players. Gettin' 'em to play together, that's the hard part." The teams that have learned to cooperate with one another for a common cause are the teams that experience the greatest effectiveness in the long run.

Let's look for a brief moment at this partnership that we have in the gospel. I. It is a Spiritual Partnership: 1. It is based on a common experience of salvation through faith in Jesus Christ. This is the true basis of Christian unity. If you know Christ as your personal Lord and Savior, you are my brother, you are my sister. And Jesus has commanded us to love one another as He has loved us.

2. It is based on a common mission, the Great Commission. At Liberty Baptist Church, we have adopted a purpose statement which reads, "We will pursue a loving commitment to the Great Commandment (Mt. 22:37), the New Commandment (Jn. 13:34-35). and the Great Commission (Mt. 28:19-20)." The Great Commandment is to love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and mind. The New Commandment is to love one another as Christ has loved us. The Great Commission is to make disciples of all nations. baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything Jesus commanded. II. It is a Supernatural Partnership: 1. Its originator is God. (1) Individual dimension: repentance from sin and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. (2) Corporate dimension: the church as the body of Christ, the instrument He intends to use to reach a perishing world with the message of salvation through faith in Jesus. 2. Its enabler is God. (1) Individual dimension: the "good work" of salvation which God has begun in the life of the believer and will continue until Jesus comes again. (2) Corporate dimension: the work of God which enables a church to reach the lost with the gospel and disciple the saved. Specific to the Association: the work of God which enables churches to work together for a common cause. Key ingredients of this spiritual and supernatural partnership: 1. Consecration: a growing relationship with Jesus Christ, resulting in individual integrity and accountability, to God first and then to one another. Communication: face-to-face, heart-to-heart, open communication based on Biblical standards: Paul said we are to speak the truth in love. Truth without love is hateful and vindictive; love without truth has no substance. We need both! 3. Cooperation: churches working together to reach and disciple people for the glory of God. Back to our theme of "Association: Dream Something New." What's new about this partnership in the gospel? In Lam. 3:22-23, the Bible says, "It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because His compassion fails not. They are new every morning: great is Thy faithfulness." God's mercies are new every morning! They were new this morning. We must learn to view each new day as a new opportunity given by God to practice cooperation with one another.

We need to take our partnership in the gospel more seriously than ever before, because the time is short and the need is great. Through the prophet Isaiah, God said, "Behold, I will do a new thing; now it shall spring forth; shall ye not know it? I will even make a way in the wilderness, and rivers in the desert, to give drink to my people, my chosen. This people I formed for myself, they shall shew forth my praise (Isa. 43:19-21). May the churches of Liberty Baptist Association show forth the praise of God by working together in a spiritual and supernatural partnership to take the gospel to a lost and dying world."

Dr. Richard H. Capps, Director of Missions, recognized the **New Pastors and Staff Members for 1995-1996**: Rev. Jeff Ball, Minister of Youth, Southgate; Rev. Garrett Catania, Associate Pastor/Minister of Youth, Liberty; Rev. Kenny Coker, Pastor, Southside; Mr. Billy Griffin, Minister of Youth, Colonial; Rev. Bill Hartley, Minister of Youth, Welcome, First; Miss Carol Hooker, Minister of Youth, Churchland; Rev. George Presson, Interim Pastor, Smith Grove; and Mrs. Pamela Richardson, Minister of Music, Wallburg.

Mrs. Sandy Motley presented the report for the **Davidson Medical Ministries Clinic**. The **Treasurer's Report** was presented by Esther House and it was approved as presented in the Book of Reports. Gail Beck, Associational Clerk, presented the **Executive**

Board report which was approved. Betty Bradshaw, Director of the WMU Leadership Team gave an update of the **Woman's Missionary Union** activities for the year. The **Nominating Committee** report for 1996-1997 was recommended by Chairman Rev. Jack Rose, who also called attention to several positions which are still open. The report was approved as printed in the Book of Reports.

Rev. David Shaffer led the congregation in singing hymns "Have Faith in God," "The

Solid Rock," and "He Lives."

Miscellaneous Business: Judy Wood, Chairman, made the following recommendations from the Constitution and Bylaws Committee: 1. A question arose during the year as to the eligibility of retired bi-vocational ministers serving on the Bi-Vocational Minister Council (Article XI, Section B-Standing Councils). The Bylaws Committee along with many others recognize the valuable contributions of the retired ministers and offer to further define this council; therefore the Bylaws Committee recommends that Article XI, Section B-Standing Councils No. 1 The Bi-Vocational Ministers Council include the wording-the Bi-Vocational Ministers Council Composed of Bi- Vocational Ministers, Active and Retired, Selected by the Nominating Committee. 2. The Executive Board has approved the new positions of Partnership Coordinators. Previously and currently our Association has entered into mission partnerships; therefore, the Bylaws Committee recommends an addition to the Bylaws to be known as Article XI, Section F, No. 5-Partnership Coordinators. Partnership Coordinators shall receive information, work with the Missions Development Council, provide leadership and orientation for partnership project participants as needed. Partnership Coordinators shall prepare a report of work accomplished for the Annual Meeting of the Association. 3. The Finance Committee has recommended to the Executive Board the formation of an Auditing Committee. The primary function of this committee is to make an audit or review of records and receipts of the Association on a quarterly basis, and to give a quarterly written report to the Finance Committee. The establishing and working guidelines of the Auditing Committee has been approved by the Executive Board. The Bylaws Committee recommends that the Auditing Committee function for one year as recommended by the Finance Committee and approved by the Executive Board. We further recommend that the Finance Committee is to make a final recommendation to the Executive Board regarding members, functions, and responsibilities of the Auditing Committee. Upon final approval by the Finance Committee and the Executive Board, the Bylaws Committee will then make recommendation for inclusion into the Bylaws. 4. The Finance and the Auditing Committees will be monitoring and reviewing all financial records monthly and quarterly respectively. Currently our Bylaws require an annual audit. The Bylaws Committee understands the financial obligation of an annual audit (\$1,000's) and the need for flexibility in recommending the most effective and appropriate inspection of our financial records; therefore the Bylaws Committee recommends that Article XIII, Section C-Audit begin with the phrase An Annual Audit or Review of the Financial Records of the Association shall be conducted. 5. The Executive Board has approved a change in the wording of the Bylaw Article XI, Section A, No. 4-Finance Committee. The Finance Committee and the Auditing Committee will become active in monitoring financial records monthly and quarterly respectively; therefore the Bylaws Committee recommends that the phrase "annually recommend to the Executive Board an independent firm to perform the annual audit of the financial records of the Association" be deleted and replaced with review and monitor budget line item expenses. Items 1-5 were unanimously approved. As information for the record: 1. The Bylaws Committee recommends that the Finance Committee define the position of Assistant Treasurer along with procedures of responsibility. Upon approval by the Executive Board, the Bylaws Committee will later recommend inclusion

into the Bylaws. **2.** The current Bylaws do not provide for the filling of a vacancy on the Nominating Committee between the annual meeting and an Executive Board meeting; therefore, the Bylaws Committee recommends that the Committee on Nominations consider an appropriate method to fill an unexpired term on the Nominating Committee. It is our suggestion that they nominate an alternate to the Nominating Committee. This sixth person will serve only if there is a vacancy on the Nominating Committee during the year. Upon approval by the Executive Board the Bylaws Committee will later recommend the Bylaws change accordingly.

Moderator Stuart White gave praise to the Lord for His hand of healing to Mrs. Leonard

(Polly) Rollins and also to Rev. Earle Rogers.

An interesting and informative report from **North Carolina Baptist Hospital** was given by Jim Murphy. The **Hispanic Ministries Council** report was presented by Council Director, Brenda Emmons. Dr. Richard Capps acknowledged to the Association that the work of the Hispanic Ministries is largely due to the dedication and commitment of Brenda Emmons.

Rev. Markus Sink, Pastor of Park Place Baptist Church read scripture from Philippians 3:7-21, after which Ms. Alisa Jung provided special music. Rev. Fred Miller, Pastor of Floyd Baptist Church, presented the **Annual Sermon**. The closing prayer for the afternoon session and the evening meal was offered by Mr. Robert Cook.

Monday Evening, October 7, 1996 COGGINS MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH Lexington, North Carolina

The evening session was opened by a mini-concert of inspirational music by "The Byrds" and afterwards Rev. David Shaffer led the congregation in singing hymns "Standing on the Promises," "Victory in Jesus," and "Praise Him, Praise Him."

Theme Interpretation was presented by Dr. Ronald Pierce, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Thomasville. "Trust in the Lord and do good; dwell in the land and enjoy safe pasture. Delight yourself in the Lord and He will give you the desires of your heart. Commit your way to the Lord." Psalm 37:3-5.

Several years ago, General Motors had as its motto "if you can dream it, we can do it." I like that motto: "If we can dream it, we can do it." Dreaming and doing belong together like a hand in a glove. In all of our dreams there must be the realization that dreams alone are incomplete. Too often in the local church and association God's people never move beyond the dreaming stage. Many Christians operate with the mistaken assumption that what you think about Jesus is more important than what you do for Him. But our Lord, Himself, warned us that God cuts off useless branches that bear no fruit. He said, "Be ye doers of the word and not hearers only." To dream without doing is to waste one's time and inevitably one's life. But dreaming is an indispensable prerequisite to doing.

We must constantly and consistently strive, as believers, to achieve a balance between faith and action. The Psalmist recognized this and thus began each of the three verses I read a moment ago from the 37th Psalm with a verb - Trust, Delight, Commit. We are called to participate in our relationship with God, and yet only He can give us the desire to do so. God wants us to dream, plan, work, but all that we accomplish comes from Him.

I am personally persuaded that to a large extent life is perceived and lived out according to the dream that possesses it. What we envision ourselves accomplishing is often just about what we accomplish in this life. If we set goals and objectives and strive for them, most of the time we reach them. If we determine to simply settle for whatever fate has in

store for us, we will likely mire down in the muck of "mediocrity."

"Strong lives are motivated by dynamic purposes; lesser ones exist on wishes and inclinations. The most glowing successes are but reflections of an inner fire." Kenneth Hildebrand. Attitude is such an important part of everything we undertake to do in life. In his book, entitled <u>To Dream Again</u>, Dr. Robert Dale says, "Dreams have impact. You can dream people into becoming."

The Bible is replete with examples of persons who, with God's help, turned dreams into reality. Joseph was a dreamer who encountered every imaginable form of adversity, but he rose above it all to become Pharaoh's right hand man. David dreamed of slaying the Philistine giant, Goliath, and made the tremendous transition from a shepherd lad to becoming King of Israel. And surely the greatest dreamer of them all was our Lord Jesus Christ. He dreamed of ushering in the kingdom of God with an unimpressive crew of twelve pulled from the common ranks of ordinary life.

There must come a time in the life of each individual, each church, and each association when the dream is turned into reality by means of deeds done, or it ceases to be a dream and degenerates into a vague, never to be realized wish. Now is the time for the dreams that we have for Liberty Baptist Association to be turned into reality. To be sure, we cannot accomplish our dreams, nor would we even attempt to do so, without acknowledging our dependence on the Lord for help and guidance. With that assurance we can, and should, launch forth on exciting and bold ventures of faith.

Our dreams must be fueled by the power of the Holy Spirit and focused so that we might channel our energy into those areas where we can make a real difference in the lives of people.

Multiple opportunities lie before us if we will but choose to venture forth and "dream something new" as individuals, as churches, and as an association.

We have committed ourselves to be participants in the North Carolina Baptist partnership with South Africa. What a wonderful opportunity we have over the course of the next five years to cooperate with our sister churches in the Central Association in this exciting endeavor for our Lord. Two trips are already planned for 1997, and that is only the beginning. Let us pray as we embark on this adventure of faith that this partnership would be the greatest in the history of North Carolina Baptists in terms of advancing the cause of Christ's kingdom.

Also, let us dream and develop ways by means of which our churches can reach the 45% of our population in Davidson county who attend no church. Let us make use of resources such as the "People Sharing Jesus" material to train and mobilize our church members so that they can effectively engage in "lifestyle evangelism."

Our Director of Missions, Dr. Capps, has defined an association as "a family of fellowship on mission together to reach and minister to people in any way possible." That tells us who we are and what we are to be about as God's people. Our identity and our intention must be clear to us before we can accomplish much for the Lord.

All across America, we see the moral deterioration of our society and the demise of the family, as we have known it. In 1960 the divorce rate in the United States was 16%. In 1995 it was up to well over 40%. Let us dream of reclaiming our lost heritage. Of the 35 million households with children under the age of 18, one-third of them are headed by single parents-usually the mother. Let us dream of reaching these single parents, of involving them in the life of our churches. In doing so, they will be strengthened spiritually and will be equipped to provide strong leadership in the home for their children.

Let us dream of reaching the unreached generations among us. Only 31% of the "baby boomers" (those born between 1946-1964) are active in our churches and only 34% of the "baby busters" (those born after 1964). This means that among adults age

20-51 only 32% (less than 1/3) are actively involved in a local church. Let us dream of reaching them and let us remember that while "theology is sacred, methods are strategic."

<u>Conclusion</u>: As the old saying goes, "we are out in the weather together" in all of our efforts to be the people of God in our local churches and in this association. Whatever is accomplished will not be done by one or two or a few. It will be accomplished only as we demonstrate unity, harmony, and mutual commitment to attaining the goals which God has set before us.

The rapid growth of the first century church was due in large part to the unity which existed among those early believers. Three times in the first two chapters of Acts we read the words—"with one accord." (1:14, 2:1, 2:46)

And the goals which we set for ourselves must be worthy ones. Dr. Vance Havner used to say "we Christians have a knack for giving first rate devotion to second rate causes." The goals we set must challenge us to put forth our very best efforts in the Lord's service. There is always a certain amount of faith to be exercised in the accomplishment of God's will for our lives. That is a given.

Let us not be fearful of dreaming something new. Let us not be afraid to call upon our God in order that we might behold His mighty power and marvelous grace at work in our lives, and in the lives of those to whom He has called us to minister. Remember, He is the God who sits on His throne and says "Behold, I make all things new." He is the God who has implanted hope within our hearts and given unto us that dream that shall never die—the dream of heaven. Someday we shall stand in His presence and all the promises He has made to the faithful shall be utterly fulfilled. Let us fix our minds and our hearts on that ultimate dream even as we move forward in a purposeful manner to carry out our mission as God's people in the here and now.

Vernelle Greene, Historian, shared the history of Coggins Memorial Baptist Church. Freda Tricarico, Director of the Sunday School & ASSISTeam Council gave her report and also invited those who are associated with Sunday School activities to attend an important meeting in March.

Michael Rinehardt, Chairman, presented the **Finance Committee** report and recommended the Budget for 1996-1997. A new numbering format has been instituted for all records which will enable the Treasurer to more clearly identify income and disbursements. After some discussion the Budget was adopted as presented. Mr. Rinehardt also noted that a complete audit of the Association records has been completed by the firm of Daniel, Taylor, Carrick & Co., CPAs.

On behalf of the **Missions Development Council**, Rev. R. N. Hardin recognized Rev. Roy Queen to give his testimony about his involvement in the mission work with St. George's Baptist Church of Grenada and the construction of pews during a trip to Grenada this past summer. He also shared some slides which were made on this trip.

Betty Bradshaw shared her testimony about the trip to the Christian Activity Center in East St. Louis and the Vacation Bible School which was sponsored by our association. Evva Spurgeon told of her trip to Grenada in which all of the Baptist churches of Grenada had Vacation Bible Schools. After these testimonies, R. N. Hardin presented recommendations from the Missions Development Council and the Executive Board as follows: I. South Africa Partnership-That we work with Central Baptist Association in a joint committee cooperation to plan and carry out trips to South Africa. Chairperson will be Rev. Stuart White (Liberty), and Vice Chairperson will be Dr. James Baucom (Central). (Information was detailed in the Book of Reports concerning each Trip.)

II. Watchcare/Membership requests: 1. <u>Association Membership:</u> Central Baptist Church, Lexington NC - Rev. Chris Bitterman, Pastor. Meeting in a Fire Station on Hwy

8 in Lexington with an average of 50+ on Sundays. Has given financial support to the general fund and fully participated in appropriate meetings. Was constituted as a church on September 29, 1996, and has also filed a church letter (Annual Church Profile) with the Association. 2. Watchcare: Amity Baptist Church, Wallburg NC - Rev. Dalton King, Pastor, Church is located on Hwy 109 South of Wallburg. Have full program of ministries. Has attended LBA training events during the year. Church voted in unity and with a spirit of celebration to ask for watchcare membership. Has filed a church letter (Annual Church Profile) with the Association. III. Dismissal Requests: 1. Tyro Baptist Church, Tyro. Has voted to withdraw from Liberty Baptist Association. Pastor now independent. Removed from BSCNC and SBC. Community Baptist Church, Lexington. Has voted to withdraw from Liberty Baptist Association. Called an independent pastor. Removed from BSCNC and SBC. IV. Joint recommendation of Evangelism Council and Missions Development Council: That we cooperate with other Associations in the Triad in encouraging our churches to participate in the Bill Glass Greater Greensboro Crusade, Greensboro Coliseum, May 25-June 1, 1997. V. BSCNC Cooperative Missions Day Celebration:

- 1. Saturday, January 18, 1997-Celebration Banquet for all participating churches.
- 2. Sunday, January 19, 1997 AM service of participating churches with guest speakers from the BSCNC staff.
- 3. Pastors of churches will be sent Participation Forms in late October to be returned by November 25, 1996. For Information: Future Executive Board meetings will be held in member churches. Please write the Missions Development Council Director, Rev. Gary Myers, 400 Kennedy Road, Thomasville NC 27360, with an invitation from your church to host this event. All recommendations presented by the Missions Development Council were approved unanimously.

Rev. David Shaffer led in singing of hymns "I Stand Amazed in the Presence" and "How Great Thou Art." Rev. O. D. Martin, BSCNC gave an interesting update and challenge for the **South Africa Partnership Ministry.** Special Music was provided by the Coggins Memorial Baptist Church Choir led by Mrs. Anita Bunce. The evening message was presented by Rev. Milton Hollifield, BSCNC. Moderator Stuart White asked those present to join hands recognizing that we are one in Christ. Prayer was offered by Dr. Brooks Hunt and the evening session was adjourned.

Tuesday Afternoon, October 8, 1996 LAKEVIEW BAPTIST CHURCH Linwood, North Carolina

Rev. Allen Lefler, Pastor welcomed everyone to Lakeview Baptist Church, and led the congregation in singing "Are You Washed in the Blood."

The **Theme Interpretation** was presented by Rev. Galen Johnson, Pastor of Victory Baptist Church. "On a Thursday night in Jerusalem, Jesus told his friends that he had been anticipating having this supper with them, for he knew that it would be his last meal before his betrayal to the Jewish authorities and cruel death on a Roman cross. Jesus, therefore, asks his companions to remember how his body will be mangled and his blood splattered the next time they share bread and the common cup. He also says that a person in this very room will be the one to turn him in to his eager executors. Stunned, Jesus's disciples interrogated each other to determine who it is who will fulfill this somber prediction. But as each person defends why he cannot be the betrayer, they all become so boastful in congratulating themselves for their virtue that a contest breaks out over "which of them should be accounted the greatest" (Luke 22:24). One man may have said,

"I can't be the traitor; I always attend prayer service," and then another might have chimed in, "Yea, but you don't always study your lesson ahead of time like I do," and so a debate ensued as to who was the greatest of them all. In the meantime, no one is remembering that this is the last night they will have with Jesus. Jesus finally speaks up to put a stop to the arguing, saying that kings may debate among themselves who is the greatest, but among Christian friends, that should not be so. As for himself, Jesus reminds them, "I am among you as he who serves" (Luke 22:27).

According to principle, the Baptist Association is also among us as one who serves. In 1749, the first organized Baptist association in America, the Philadelphia Association, issued "An Essay on the Power and Duty of an Association," which affirmed that "An association is not a superior judicature," but rather assists and edifies the churches in their unique circumstances for ministry. The association reminds its member churches that they are not in competition against each other to determine which is the greatest, but to encourage each one in its own ministry setting, and to pool together their resources for missions and outreach which they might not be able to perform on their own. Therefore, I call upon the Liberty Baptist Association to remain true to its calling as one who serves. Show to us that associational leaders are not nearly so pleased when churches contribute to the association as when the association can assist its churches. Remind us that the true gauge of a successful church is not who baptizes more than someone else, but who is faithful in equipping the saints to "grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 3:18). Assure our smallest churches that their ministry is equally as indispensable for advancing the cause of Christ's kingdom on earth as is that of the largest churches with the most programs. In the association, let there be no greater nor lesser, and may the association facilitate this by giving ear to those churches whose voices are small, and by helping those voices to be heard in their communities.

Truthfully, small churches are sometimes less than fully enthusiastic about their associations. It is not because they disapprove of the association, its activities, or its leadership; it is that they feel overlooked because they do not have the man power or finances to give to the association as do other churches. It is for these churches, especially, that the association must ask not what can be done for it, but what it can do for them. Serve them, Liberty Baptist Association, by helping to supply them with the vision and resources

necessary to fulfill their dreams.

In Luke 14, Jesus tells of a man who invited several people to a supper he had prepared, but when it was time to eat, they all sent their regrets. One person had to tend to some property he had just bought; another wanted to examine some oxen he had purchased; yet another was a newlywed, and you know where his priority was. But the lord of the feast would not have his dream of a merry banquet dashed, and so he made what might look like a decision of desperation. He told his servant, "Go out quickly into the streets and lanes of the city, and bring in hither the poor, and the maimed, and the halt, and the blind. Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in, that my house may be filled."

Small churches realize that this is their calling. They do not expect to have the city's best-known businessmen to join their church; they know that they must reach those in the highways and hedges, the poor, maimed, halt and blind. Yet, they may not know how to speak the gospel of Jesus Christ as effectively, or to as much result, as they would like. This is where the association can help. I can think of several trailer park areas on the outskirts of Thomasville where I live where a Vacation Bible School on the premises might be a wonderful way to compel those who live there to come to the table where the bread of life is served. What one church might not be brave or capable enough of doing alone, churches in association can. What if associational leaders were to work to identify such

areas where an on-site VBS or Bible study could be done, and then, with a pledge of assistance, ask nearby pastors and churches if they would pool together their people and gifts and become Christians on mission together? I believe that such would be an endeavor at least as significant as those which our association supports in the slums of East St. Louis and the fields of South Africa. 4. Volunteers/Mission Teams for inner city-low income housing/mobile home parks-weekly and summer ministries-Bible clubs, activities. We have street kids in Davidson County who need clothing, food, and concern.

5. Increase networking so that each church provides the name of a layman to be our communicator to their church, to inform the men of our churches when they are needed to

help with disaster recovery or Handyman ministries.

6. Church teams to provide ministry in resort areas of High Rock Lake and the

Veterans Memorial rest stop.

7. Churches building Christmas theme floats and giving a Christian witness in all Christmas parades in our County, sharing Gospel tracts and candy with the crowds as our youth witness through the floats.

8. Literacy ministries to help those who do not read to learn how to read the Bible

and English as a Second Language in a year-round language ministry.

9. Development of Hispanic Ministries in our county on a year-round basis in Thomasville/North Davidson. We have a Hispanic outreach in Lexington at North Lexington Baptist Church.

10. Increased ministry involvement to County Fair workers and Special Events/

Festivals in our County.

LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION REPORTS ALPHA PREGNANCY SUPPORT, INC.

Abortion is more than a hot political issue. With the political campaigns ongoing, abortion is used as a football. It is rather, a life and death issue. When girls come to Alpha Pregnancy Support, the debate is not relevant at that time. They must face squarely the seriousness of abortion. We seek to help them make the right decision.

A little background...The National Birth Control League was formed years ago opening the way to a new morality and freer sex. Then came the decades of the 60's and the 70's that produced venereal diseases and increased teen pregnancy rates. Women were granted the right to abortion on demand according to Roe vs. Wade. In 1992, there was the opportunity to overturn that decision in the Supreme Court with Planned Parenthood vs. Casey. The majority ruled that the right to kill babies was guaranteed by the fourteenth amendment. This literally sealed the fate of countless millions of unborn babies. According to some constitutional scholars, this was one of the most important rulings in the history of the Supreme Court. While the Supreme Court sits in their seats of justice, the issue of abortion filters down to you and me here in Lexington/Davidson County. Silent murders are going on daily-1.6 million babies are aborted each year.

The most recent statistical survey reveals in Davidson County, 433 (induced) abortions out of 2,212 pregnancies. Ratio 1 to 5. Most abortions in Davidson County occur between the ages of 10-24. These abortions do not occur only in the lower class or less educated girls, they cross all ethnic, social, education and religious backgrounds, not a respecter of persons. Why so many abortions? 97% of all abortions are performed as a means of birth control, because pregnancy is an inconvenience, or so they believe. Abortion is also a money making procedure for the medical community. Abortionists can make \$750-\$1000 per hour performing abortions. Abortion is murder whether it's done in the doctor's office or in the back alley.

Abortion is a reality in Davidson County. . . where do girls turn when they find themselves in a crisis pregnancy? They surely cannot wish the baby away-they must decide how they are going to deliver it-dead or alive. At Alpha Pregnancy Support we shoulder up these girls. We're not a medical clinic nor do we give medical advice. We do discuss abortion with them. . . we do not ever recommend abortion. We give them the facts. . . they have to decide. . . we cannot make the decision for them. This is a big life decision. If they think they don't have options, we show them the options. We want them to know

they don't have to face the problem alone. We offer alternatives that is, carrying the baby to full term, then the option of keeping the baby or adoption.

All our services are free and confidential: free pregnancy tests; counseling; clothing and furnishings for babies and moms; cribs and car seats; information about pregnancy, abortion, adoption, prenatal care/postnatal care; transportation to and from doctors; referrals for medical care; referrals for housing.

You know that we exist as a non-profit Christian organization...not affiliated with any one denomination. Funded by donations only. . .not subsidized by any federal, state, or county agency. . .no government assistance. Supported by churches and individuals. We operate on a modest budget.

The central mission of APS is to share the gospel of Jesus Christ and to help these girls realize that aborting a child is an act of sin. If they come to us and have already aborted a child, we help them understand that through Christ there is forgiveness and freedom from guilt. With abortion comes emotional trauma; women and girls are confused, feel isolated, feel rejected, feel a severe loss. As with any crisis, God is there.

We are here on the front lines to point these girls to Jesus Christ, to encourage them that He heals both emotionally and physically. We are on the cutting edge of the Missions field in Davidson County. . .you are sharing in mission work as you support our ministry.

This year alone, we have had more than 75 opportunities to witness.

Each dollar you give and each prayer you send up to our Father for this cause is bringing us closer to His kingdom. I don't think we can put a price tag on human life. . .whatever it takes to stop the shedding of innocent blood. . .whether it is praying these girls will come to APS or if it takes us going into the schools to teach our young people about abstinence until marriage. . .whatever it takes, we need to be busy about this work.

We have never lived this day. . .perhaps this would be the day that our Father would split open the skies and that His Son would come to claim His own. . .I pray that when He returns, we would be able to present to Him the many little lives in our community that were not snuffed out. . .that were not used up as a sacrifice for someone else. I believe God desires that each child grows to know Him and to glorify Him on earth.

God says CHOOSE LIFE. . . Deuteronomy 30:19.

BROTHERHOOD

It is my privilege to report to Liberty Baptist Association on the work of Baptist Men's groups. It is encouraging to report an increase in the number of volunteer individual's involvement and an increase in the number of churches participating in ministry and missions of our Brotherhood organizations.

- 1. <u>Flood Areas West Virginia</u> Requests from West Virginia flood areas resulted in days of assistance with mud-outs in Alderson, WV and rebuilding the interior of a home in Marlington, WV.
- 2. <u>Evangelism Tent Ministry</u> A team of men have volunteered to assist in this ministry and have spent time in training to help manage, develop, and grow the Baptist State Convention Tent Ministry.

- 3. <u>Camp Mundo Vista Renovations</u> During this past year we had approximately 100 volunteers work on this project, many of these people working on several occasions. There are twenty (20) cabins to renovate, eight (8) have the interior completed with the additions of bathrooms in each cabin in varying states of completion. The goal for 1996-97 is to finish all work on these eight cabins and begin with the next unit of four. There is a need for workers in all areas of this construction. This is an ideal place to learn and practice your additional skills. There are qualified people always available to assist you. This work is scheduled from September 1 through April 30 each year, until the completion of the project. Camp Mundo Vista will become one of our most outstanding camps for girls anywhere. Can we, WMU and Baptist Men, depend on you for assistance?
- 4. <u>Roofing Homes of Needy Families</u> Churches throughout our association have reroofed homes this year, and we have joined together to re-roof homes. At the present time, we have roofing projects on-going with additional requests in process. Our goal next year is to meet all these needs as they occur.
- 5. Wheel Chair Ramps This ministry to our handicapped has and continues to accelerate, by a need for ramps for those required to use walkers, in addition to wheel chairs. In many cases with these people, medical expenses have drained life savings prompting our involvement.
- 6. <u>Hurricane Andrew Assistance</u> Current reports indicated approximately 800 families remain homeless in South Florida due to the destructive force of hurricane Andrew in 1992. We have had teams from our association, this year, to render assistance in that area once again.
- 7. <u>Hurricane Fran Assistance</u> As this report is being written (September, 1996), our members continue to assist in the eastern half of North Carolina with clean-up and repair of destruction caused by hurricane Fran earlier this month. We have had numerous teams respond to this disaster request.
- 8. <u>Angel Tree Program</u> On a continuing basis, assistance is being provided to children of prison inmates at Christmas with an effective witness for Christ as the Salvation message is emphasized. Churches throughout our association have sponsored boys to attend our Camp Caraway Angel Tree week of boys camp. One counselor said "We had more cursing, more fighting during this week than all other weeks, but wait, we also had more conversions to Christ." Sponsorship of these boys is paying rich dividends. Praise God, we are changing this world.

Christians making themselves available to God, in what He is doing, does change this world for better.

- 1. Secretary's salary based on \$8.66 per hour 28 hour week. Social Security is 7.65%. The Secretary's hours were reduced by 2 hours per week to allow an increase in the Retirement line item #304.
- 2. No Staff salary increases were given for 1996-1997.
- 3. Clerk's salary will be paid as a single payment by August 31 each year.
- 4. Treasurer's salary will be paid as a single payment by July 31 each year.
- 5. Each church is requested to give consideration to support Associational Missions by a percentage of undesignated income. The request is for a maximum of 5%. Each church is encouraged to begin at a percentage and increase the percentage by 1/2 to 1% a year until the goal of 5% has been reached. This will allow our Association to be self-supporting in all our ministry endeavors. To reach this budget, each church will need to give an average of 2 1/2% of undesignated income to LBA.
- 6. This year's budget represents 5.2% decrease of the 1995-96 Budget.
- 7. The Challenge Budget Section (201C-222C) will be funded only if all expenses of the General Fund Budget have been met and funds have been given in excess to fund these items.
- 8. Item 364 represents 5 annuals per church. If churches wish to order more than five, they may be purchased for \$3.00 each.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

Liberty Baptist Association (the Organization) was organized in 1832 and was incorporated November 21, 1994, and is a nonprofit organization. The purpose of the Organization is to assist the churches of Liberty Baptist Association in their divinely appointed mission and in cooperative relationships with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Southern Baptist Convention, and other Baptist entities to promote and provide opportunities for individual and collective participants in missions, evangelism, ministry, education, social services, and distribution of the Bible.

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the cash receipts and disbursements basis of accounting. Under that basis, the only asset recognized is cash, and no liabilities are recognized. All transactions are recognize as either cash receipts or disbursements, and noncash transactions are not recognized. The cash basis differs from generally accepted accounting principles primarily because the effects of outstanding dues and obligations unpaid at the date of the financial statements are not included in the financial statements.

Revenue Recognition

Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted or restricted, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions.

Contributed Services

The Organization receives a substantial amount of contributed services donated by its members in carrying out the Organization's ministry. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for those services.

Income Taxes

The organization is exempt from federal and state income taxes under Internal Revenue Code 501(c)(3) and N.C. General Statutes Chapter 55A.

NOTE B - RETIREMENT ARRANGEMENTS WITH STAFF EMPLOYEES

The pastoral staff of the Organization participates in the Church Annuity Plan of the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Organization contributed 14.4% and 13.8% of eligible compensation to the plan for the years ended August 31, 1994 and 1995, respectively. The expense to the Organization under this arrangement for the years August 31, 1994 and 1995 was \$6,450 each year.

DAVIDSON MEDICAL MINISTRIES CLINIC

"Dream Something New"

Dreaming is what made Davidson Medical Ministries clinic (DMMC) a reality. Had Dr. Jim Slyman, a local Ophthalmologist, not dared to dream of a place where people in Davidson County with no health insurance and limited financial resources could receive free medical and dental care; where seniors living on fixed incomes could get help with the overwhelming expense of their medications; a dream where people of the community, businesses, and churches would come together to provide the financial support and manpower to meet the need...without this extensive cooperation Davidson Medical Ministries would not exist.

But Dr. Slyman dreamed. Others joined the dream and shared the vision. Today DMMC has more than 3300 active clients. We continue to be open two nights per week, on Mondays and Thursdays. On average we see 15-18 medical patients, 6-9 dental patients, and fill 150-175 prescriptions per clinic. We have completed 1/2 of our fiscal year and have seen 400 medical patients, 150 dental patients, and have filled 7,000 prescriptions.

Davidson Medical Ministries is dreaming again. With this fiscal year, our Board of Directors (All Volunteers) have agreed to a capital campaign of \$1,430,460.00 over a three year period. The campaign, called "Bridge to the Future" has a three part agenda:

1. Obtain our operating budget.

2. Secure enough money for a building/renovation project.

3. Finalize an endowment fund of \$1,000,000 for future funding.

First and foremost, DMMC must obtain the amount of our annual operating budget. This is \$250,000.00. We could not ask people to give to the capitol campaign and to our annual fundraising. Through this campaign it is all linked together.

Secondly, our lease is up on our building in 1997 and we are out of space. We have been told we could not purchase our property, so adding on to it is out of the question. We have also been told that we would not be able to renew another long term lease. We need more room in our pharmacy and in storage. Currently, our board is investigating other possibilities. We may need to buy and build or buy and renovate. Either way, part of this campaign will meet the material needs. Volunteers will be greatly needed in the manpower areas.

Thirdly, we must develop a more secure financial base. Our goal of \$1,000,000 endowment fund will secure a large portion of the pharmacy budget by just using the annual interest and leaving the principle in tact.

DMMC has dared to dream again. Our goals are big, but not impossible. The question at hand will be whether you and others like you dream with us.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

October, 1995 thru September, 1996

The past year has been filled with many activities, mission projects, sharing, giving and some difficult times. But, our reasons for praise and rejoicing far outweigh any difficulties we have encountered. Consider these wonderful events: 1. The Vacation Bible School mission trip to Christian Activity Center, East St. Louis, IL on June 15-22, 1996, was very successful. Over 156 children were enrolled and this number grew even larger before the end of the VBS week. Many decisions for Christ were made. Thirteen people from our Association participated in this trip. A second trip to Christ Activity Center on June 22-30, 1996, was to assist in construction and repair needs. Eleven people participated in this trip. 2. June 2-11, 1996, seven people traveled to Grenada for the sole purpose of constructing pews for St. George's Baptist Church. They also took with them Bibles, imprinted with the church's name, which were presented as a gift through the efforts of our Woman's Missionary Union. On July 27-August 4, 1996, a second team of 16 people went to Grenada to conduct Vacation Bible Schools in ALL of the churches of Grenada. Commissioning services were held for all those participating in mission trips and team members were presented certificates. 3. The Orientation trip to South Africa, our newest Partnership, was February 18-28, 1996. Dr. Richard Capps, Director of Missions; Rev. Stuart White, Moderator; and Rev. Gary Myers, Chairman of the Missions Development Council represented Liberty Baptist Association on this most significant planning trip. Mission trips are planned for February 13-27, 1997 and May 29-June 12, 1997 to South Africa. 4. Our churches are participating in a MAPS/Vista study to learn the needs of our County and how to reach those thousands of people who do not know Christ as their Lord and Savior. 5. Our office has become the receiving point for the used literature from all our Association's churches. The literature is separated, categorized, packed and distributed to several prison units, to New York, and for beginning churches to use in their libraries. 6. Our Brotherhood has been busy with clean-up projects as a result of Hurricane Fran, other storm damages; roofing projects, and especially at Mundo Vista. Several events have been sponsored by the Brotherhood for Royal Ambassadors-Lads, Crusaders and Challengers. 7. Our WMU sponsored a Toy Store for the first time last year, providing at least 10 toys to more 275 needy families. A host of volunteers were involved in this effort and several churches provided areas for toy storage, sorting and distribution. 8. There were 288 Prisoner Gift Bags distributed to the Davidson Correctional Institute in Lexington. Each bag included a New Testament and Gospel tract. Many volunteers and churches combined together to make this a most successful effort. 9. Our Youth Ministries Council sponsored a Youth Celebration in March of 1996 at First Baptist Church in Thomasville and plans are well under way for the Youth Camp which will be at Camp Cheerio on November 15-17, featuring Michael Capps. 10. Our Missions Development Council and the Executive Board unanimously voted to accept Central Baptist Church into the Association as a member church after a period of watchcare. 11. The Missions Development Council and the Executive Board also voted unanimously to accept Amity Baptist Church of Wallburg for Watchcare in our Association. We praise God for these churches.

We have so many positive things to be thankful for, so many reasons to praise God for His goodness. It is my prayer that 1996-1997 will be the time when Liberty Baptist Association will impact our Davidson County, the state of North Carolina, the United

States, and as far away as South Africa, for the Lord Jesus Christ. I hope everything else will be put aside and this can and will be our sole purpose, to honor the Lord by winning souls to His Kingdom.

HOST CHURCHES HISTORIES Coggins Memorial Baptist Church History

Liberty Baptist Association met on September 29, 1981 at Coggins Memorial Baptist Church. This history is an update of church events since that time.

Coggins Memorial ordained Timothy Robbins, a member of the church family, into the gospel ministry on October 11, 1981, making a total of six ministers to come from our church family. On that date Margaret Byrd was again hired as church secretary, after having resigned in 1976 in order to rear her family. She continued to serve in this capacity for a total of sixteen years. The church was approached in February 1982 with the need for a meeting place for south Lexington senior adults. Therefore, a community-wide group called the "Ageless Wonders" was begun as a ministry and means of fellowship to this age group and remains active today.

Feeling the need to begin further expansion, the church purchased a vacant lot on Harrington Avenue next to our parsonage in January 1983 to be used however the church

desired. The house on this property was later bought by the church in 1988 to be used as rental property. We not only felt the need to expand our church property but also felt a great responsibility to minister to the needs of world hunger. In 1982 we had sent expensive and much-needed well drilling equipment to Serenje, Zambia along with a shipment of Bibles. World hunger problems had become a major concern to our church family. Coggins Memorial voted in July 1983 to purchase 78 acres of prime land at a cost of \$127,929.00 for use as a world hunger crop-growing facility with future plans for the SBC to use this as a training center for agricultural missionaries. This property included a twelve-room lodge, 2 lakes, a large airplane hanger and airstrip, as well as a lovely, picturesque chapel. This facility, called "Agro-Care Ministries," provided years of enjoyment and a place for the church family to fellowship and also served as a major gardengrowing project. It also temporarily housed a group of homeless teenage girls under the leadership of Ron VanLandingham and his wife, Shirley. Despite the hard work and efforts by Coggins Memorial on this project, the SBC later chose another site to help fund and use for their farming facility. This was a major setback for our ministry. The church voted on August 13, 1989 to discontinue the "Agro-Care Ministry" and to dispose of all its properties. This was sold to the Cambodian community to be used as a cultural center and other lots were sold to various individuals. The church financed these sales and all monies from the sale of this property are used for world and local hunger needs and are distributed on a semi-annual basis to various groups such as the Foreign Mission Board World Hunger Relief, Samaritan's Purse, Ecumenical Ministries, Salvation Army and other organizations dealing with the problems of hunger. For this reason, Coggins Memorial is proud to have been a part of the "Agro-Care Ministry" project. Although the initial goal of training agricultural missionaries never came to fruition, our church has been able to contribute thousands of dollars to world hunger which in itself has proved to make the vision of "Agro-Care Ministries" a success. Our church family and other friends are grateful for this wonderful opportunity to serve.

Coggins Memorial voted in April 1986 to send Dr. & Mrs. Dearl Bunce to Togo, Africa as minister/teacher team. Dr. & Mrs. Bunce resigned this ministry at Coggins on September 5, 1989, and Rev. Horace Buchanan was chosen as Interim Pastor. Rev. Lowell Askins was called as Pastor on June 24, 1990. On December 29, 1991, groundbreaking ceremonies were held for a new sanctuary and a history-breaking \$152,000.00 was received at an initial pledge rally and dinner held in order to begin work on this project. Construction began on April 7, 1992 and was completed in May 1993 at which time we celebrated and worshiped together in one of the most beautiful, inspiring sanctuaries one could ever hope to see. On August 25, 1994, Rev. David Shaffer was called as Associate Pastor. Rev. Askins and Rev. Shaffer have proven to be a dynamic team who have led Coggins Memorial to great things through the past few years through God's leadership. On August 21, 1994, we voted to begin a child development daycare program using the educational building facilities after accepting a grant from Smart Start of \$110,000.00 for renovations and materials. The daycare facility was opened on August 28, 1995 with a beginning enrollment of thirty-six children. Mrs. Linda Russo was hired on July 23, 1995 to serve as Child Development Director and has proven to be a great blessing to this ministry. This is a tremendous ministry which is already establishing a reputation as a top-quality daycare for ages birth through preschool as well as after school care.

Coggins Memorial has a wonderful, colorful history beginning in 1949 and God continues to bless mightily to this very day. This "work of faith" which began so long ago has great blessings to come as long as we continue to give God the glory and follow His leadership with every step we make and every breath we take.

Lakeview Baptist Church History

Lakeview Baptist Church began in a service station on Old 29 and later moved into a garage across from Carl Hanes Grocery on Highway 150. It was constituted as a church in 1944.

Under the leadership of Rev. Zeb Thompson, one and three fourths acres of land was purchased from Mr. Holland Michael for \$500 on what is now Lakeview Church Road. Lumber cut from the land was used as the framework for the church and with the help of Mr. Michael, and other dedicated church members, the church was built in 1946. This year commemorates the 50th year for Lakeview.

In 1947, Rev. Zeb Thompson resigned as Pastor. In September 1947, Rev. J. O. Dunn became Pastor.

The first homecoming was held in the new church on June 6, 1948. At this time the church was debt free. In the early fifties land was purchased across the road from the church where the parsonage is now built. In 1953 the church ceiling was raised and four new Sunday School rooms were added.

Rev. Dunn resigned on July 14, 1957 and Rev. Wesley Taylor became Interim Pastor. Rev. Paul Gales from Albemarle was called as Pastor on December 11, 1957 to January 3, 1960. On April 3, 1960, Rev. Hubert Nelson from Lexington, was called as Pastor. During his pastorate a building committee was elected on May 1, 1960 to start on plans for a parsonage. By the end of 1960 the parsonage was completed with an estimated cost of \$10,000.

On May 31, 1961, Rev. Nelson resigned. Rev. Thomas Tuggell became new Pastor on July 2, 1961, until his resignation in September 1962. November 11, 1962, Rev. M. T. Morton was called to be Pastor until his resignation in April 1966.

In May 1966, Rev. Robert Williams was called as new Pastor. During his pastorate an additional three classrooms were added and one new bathroom. In April 1973 the church voted to pay off the parsonage. In December 1973 aluminum siding was put on the church. New pews were installed in the sanctuary in August 1979. In February 1982 a much needed air conditioning system was installed in the sanctuary. Because of poor health, Rev. Williams had to resign on July 25, 1982, after serving as Pastor for 16 years. We are truly grateful for his service to the church during his pastorate.

On August 1, 1982, Rev. Edward M. Pigg from Rodgers Park Baptist Church in Kannapolis, NC became Interim Pastor. On October 10, 1982, the church called Rev. Pigg as Pastor.

In March 1983 a P.A. system was installed in the sanctuary. Under the direct leadership of Rev. Pigg, a complete renovation of the sanctuary began. A new baptistry was installed, new carpet was installed and the choir rebuilt. A much needed and prayed about acre of land adjacent to the church was bought in July 1985. In August 1985 a fellowship building began on this land. It was finished by April 1986 and a Dedication Service was held on July 18, 1986. In the fall of 1988, the church parking lot was paved.

On March 15, 1992, Rev. Pigg resigned as Pastor to accept a pastoral position at Bethlehem Baptist Church in Concord, NC. Rev. Bill Freeman was Interim Pastor from June 1992 to December 1992.

Rev. Allen Lefler, from Poplar Grove Baptist Church, was called as Pastor on January 24, 1993. Under the leadership of Rev. Lefler, Lakeview has continued to grow. In April 1993, new carpet was installed and the pews recovered in the sanctuary. In September 1993 another air conditioning system was installed in the church. A much-needed lighted sign was erected in front of the church in June 1994. A picnic shelter was built beside the fellowship building in May 1996.

Lakeview has continued to grow with a church membership of 291 and a Sunday School membership of 130. The Lord has bestowed many blessings on Lakeview Baptist Church and our prayer is that God will continue to use our church to spread His word as we grow not only in numbers, but in spirituality.

MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL REPORT

Our 1995-1996 Missions Development Council has diligently sought to honor our Savior through missions involvement this past year. We want the excitement of missions to continue in this new year. Some of the highlights of our year have been:

Cooperative Agreements for 1997

(1) Migrant Ministry-\$800; (2) Cambodian/Language Missions-\$3,000 for Pastor Support. (If a full-time pastor is employed, this amount could increase to \$6,000.); (3) Central Baptist Church-\$1,800 to \$2,000 Pastor Support; (4) Vista Church Scholarships-\$1,600 to assist smaller churches so they will be able to participate.; \$1,000 was obtained for the expenses of the Retreat at Caraway in April of 1996; (5) LBA Food Pantry-\$2,000 to establish Food Pantry in LBA office for area churches.

<u>Long Range Strategy through the MAPS study of our Association</u> The Retreat on November 11 at Caraway involved a presentation by Charles Fox, BSCNC, on the maps and vista information studies. There was a discussion of 50 lifestyle groups and discussion of generational types. The results of this study will help our Association determine where we are headed in the year 2000.

Partnership & Summer Mission Activities (1) Christian Activity Center, East St. Louis, IL-On June 14-22, 1996, 10 persons from Carolina Memorial, Summerville, Abbotts Creek, Denton First and Rich Fork composed a VBS team. Commissioning Service was held for this team on June 9, 1996 at Carolina Memorial. On June 22-29, 1996, a repair and construction team from Abbotts Creek went to CAC. (2) Grenada-June 2-9, 1996, six persons from Abbotts Creek and Reeds went to Osbert James' church, St. George's, to build church pews and present gift of hymnals. The WMU sponsored the purchase of these hymnals. On July 24-August 4, 1996, 16 persons from Lakeview, Welcome First, Abbotts Creek and Carolina Memorial went to Grenada to hold VBS classes in all of the churches on the Island. A Commissioning service was held at Abbotts Creek on July 14.

South Africa Partnership February 18-29, 1996, Dr. Richard Capps, DOM; Stuart White, Moderator; and Gary Myers, Director of the Missions Development Council participated in the Orientation Trip to South Africa. This is a modern, beautiful country and communications are excellent. Food was plentiful and available everywhere. They are open to the gospel and everyone else. Durbin is known as the capital of Islam. Stanger will probably be the home base for future trips and is north of Durbin. There are three areas which we will be working with: (1) BASA Association, which is the East Indian Association, North Coast area; (2) Zulu churches, and (3) white churches of the Baptist Union. Liberty Baptist Association entered into partnership with Central Baptist Association to work together in the BASA/North Coast area. A Partnership Committee was

established composed of a Partnership Coordinator, MDC Director, Member-at-Large, and the DOM of each Association (four from LBA/ four from Central). This Partnership Committee will plan, coordinate, and recommend all future trips to South Africa. The four people from LBA are: Stuart White, South Africa Coordinator; Gary Myers, MDC Director; Ronald Pierce, Member-at-Large; and Richard Capps, Director of Missions.

We are requested by the National Fellowship of Baptist on Mission, Brotherhood Commission, Memphis, Tennessee to become a packing/sending location for Home and Foreign Mailings of books, literature, etc. for North and South Carolina. Used church literature is already being sorted, packed, and shipped from the LBA office to men and women's prison facilities.

We had the joy of seeing Central Baptist Church fully constituted and participating in the life of our Association, as well as being able to receive Amity Baptist Church under watchcare.

It is always a note of regret to see churches leave our Association and we experience this through the request of Tyro Baptist Church and Community Baptist Church.

Thank you, Liberty Baptist Association, for your prayers and support for this council. We ask for prayerful support in this new year. BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION OF NORTH CAROLINA REPORTS

Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina - 1996

Evelyn Alexander, Chairman of the Board

Primed for excitement after three hours waiting under a bright summer sky, hundreds of spectators craned their necks and peered toward downtown Asheville June 26 when Michael Owen jogged into view - carrying the Olympic Torch on outstretched arm. Michael, one of 1,422 children Baptist Children's Homes served in 1995-96, lives at Broyhill Home in Clyde, one of 12 facilities BCH operates in North Carolina.

Smiling and waving to the crowds holding aloft tiny flags and cameras, Michael lifted the symbol on international unity and pointed to friends among those who lined the parade route.

The entire Broyhill Home campus showed up, cheering wildly. They are picnics at the end of Michael's route, and swarmed him when he passed the flame to the next carrier a bicycle rider.

It could have been a family reunion, or a school scene, or a re-creation for a movie or family support. But Michael, and most of his supporters, are children who have suffered unspeakable abuses at the hands of adults they trusted to care for them.

And the adults who waded into that mob scene of joy at the end of Michael's run are called of God to help young people like Michael and those who surrounded him deal with those issues, and to overcome them.

As a boy, Michael was so ashamed of his clothes that he ran home from school, never stopping to make friends. Worse, he endured almost nightly beatings from his father. He was 11 years old before he realized other boys weren't beaten every night. Four years later he found the courage to tell his father he was leaving.

"Go ahead, call someone," he yelled. "Leave."

Michael left. After six months in emergency care at Mills Home in Thomasville, he

established a more permanent residence at Broyhill Home. Slowly, quietly his emotions mounted within him until one night he erupted and spilled forth his story, the years of secrets and lies, to his child care worker, Betty Porter. "She stayed up with me and we talked a long time," Michael said. That was his first lesson in trust and unconditional love.

"Broyhill has changed my life so much," Michael said. "For almost a year I didn't trust anybody, but finally I felt a calmness I know was the Lord. Here I found the Lord

and now I try to live every day for Him."

Michael's story is repeated hundreds of times each year at Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. Not all are as dramatic as a boy who grew from a punching bag to a torch bearer.

But at four residential campuses, six emergency care cottages, two homes for behaviorally troubled girls, a maternity home, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping and model day care, more than 1,400 children and their families find help in troubled time.

During the past year BCH received almost \$1.5 million through the Cooperative Program, and \$663,000 through the Thanksgiving Offering. Total church gifts of almost \$3 million comprised 26.2 percent of BCH operating revenue.

BCH is in the midst of a \$10.0 "Light Their Way" Campaign to raise money for operations, capital needs and endowment. At the halfway point in June, more than \$5.4 mil-

lion had been committed to BCH through the campaign.

Although Michael carries many fond memories of Baptist Children's Homes with him as he heads for college this fall, his earliest amazements were the secure sleep he got when he laid his head down, and of receiving his first pair of Nikes so he didn't have to be embarrassed by his appearance.

Making Life for Older Adults...

The Best of Times

The continuing goal of Baptist Retirement Homes is to provide more and better services for Older Adults. During 1996 several developments have moved us toward this goal.

Some new staff members have been added to help provide the kind of total care which residents need and deserve. Tania Keay has been employed as Vice President of the Health Services Division. Paulette Richmond came as the new manager of the Hamilton Baptist Home. Carla Hyde was named director of the small group program for residents with dementia, a program designed to enhance their quality of life. Patricia Fling is the director of the In Home Care program which began a few months ago. Dr. Earl Watts, an Associate Professor at the Bowman Gray School of Medicine, is serving as the medical director for In Home Care.

Early in the year, renovation of the Hamilton Baptist Home was completed providing a more attractive and comfortable place for residents in that facility. The new Cecil and Gertrue Young Solarium at the Rickman Nursing Center in Asheville will provide space for the small group program for residents with dementia. At Brookridge, renovated space in the Assisted Living section, and named "Stokes Court," will house the new Assisted Independent Living Unit. A new passenger van will facilitate transportation for residents at the Taylor House in Albemarle as they attend church, keep appointments, go shopping, or participate in social/recreational events.

During the year, Baptist Retirement Homes has provided assistance in the planning for Cliffwood, a new continuing care retirement community being built in Fayetteville. Two Fayetteville churches, First Baptist and Snyder Memorial Baptist, have formed a non-profit corporation to lead this project. A 27-acre site has been selected. Plans call for 105 Independent Living units, 20 beds in Assisted Living, and 20 beds in a nursing care unit. All units will be available on a rental basis with no entrance fees.

The James M. Hayes Society has been formed to recognize and thank those persons who remember the Baptist Retirement Homes in their estate planning. Thirty-three charter members constitute this group named in honor of the "Homes" founding superintendent.

Finally, we recognize with deep gratitude those North Carolina Baptists who gave through their churches to support the ministry during the past year. Through the cooperative program, the special February Offering, and other church gifts, the "Homes" received a total of \$1,030,052 during the 12 month period ending September 30, 1995.

Usually, for less than what it cost to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication package to each family in the congregation. Recent and anticipated increases in mailing cost make CNS a greater value in 1996-97 than when it was started in 1990.

The paper focuses more and more attention on North Carolina Baptists with news, features and inspirational articles which will encourage individuals and churches in their witness and ministry. One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues, and be adequately informed.

BAPTIST COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY REPORT 1996

Since 1834 North Carolina Baptist Colleges and Universities have been privileged to have many splendid presidents. The current presidents are listed on this page. They were elected to take the lead in dreaming, shaping and managing Baptist higher education in North Carolina.

Two colleges, Mars Hill and Chowan, have new presidents. Let us introduce them to you.

Dr. A. Max Lennon was named president of Mars Hill College, effective March 1. Both he and Mrs. Lennon (Ruth Ann) are graduates of Mars Hill. Dr. Lennon brings a rich background in business and higher education to his new task. After earning the B.S. and Ph.D. degrees at North Carolina State University, he served in the administration of Texas Tech University, the University of Missouri, Ohio State University and Clemson University, where he was president. He comes to Mars Hill from the presidency of Eastern Foods, Inc. in Atlanta, Georgia. Dr. Lennon, an active Baptist churchman, has been a member of the National Fellowship of Baptist Men. In Atlanta they were members of the First Baptist church in Peachtree City, where he taught Sunday School and was a member of the strategic planning committee. He is on the board of directors of numerous corporations and foundations, among them First Union Corporation and Duke Power. In accepting the presidency of Mars Hill he said, "This is a wonderful opportunity to provide leadership for this college and boldly proclaim our faith in Jesus Christ."

Dr. Stanley G. Lott moved to North Carolina in July to become president of Chowan College. He comes from Louisiana College, a Baptist school, where he was vice president for academic affairs for 15 years. Earlier he had been a faculty member at Tift College in Georgia. Dr. Lott earned two doctorates, one in systematic theology from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, and the other in higher education administration from the University of Georgia. An ordained Baptist minister, he has held two pastorates in Louisiana. Mercer University president Kirby Godsey said, "Stanley Lott is one of the finest educators and leaders in higher education today." Dr. and Mrs. Lott (Johnnye) were long-time, active members of Emmanuel Baptist Church, near Louisiana College. Upon his election the new president said, "I look forward to joining hands with all who are part of Chowan College. I am eager to join North Carolina Baptists in their efforts to spread the gospel and to preserve historic Baptist principles."



The Baptist Foundation is committed to assisting individual church members through creative stewardship methods to provide permanent financial undergirding of these ministries.

As of December 31, 1995, the Foundation held \$55,608,452 under management. In 1995, \$3,144,471 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,125,383 was distributed to individuals for a total distribution of \$4,269,854.

The income distributions for the entire 76 year history of the N.C. Baptist Foundation totals: \$9,673,682 income paid to individuals and \$13,458,579 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$23,132,261.

HOSPITAL HIGHLIGHTS FOR 1996
DIVISION OF PASTORAL CARE

DIVISION OF PASTORAL CARE

During this year the 18 to 40 Chaplains present at various times at the Hospital made over 55,000 pastoral contacts. As of July 1, 1996, the counseling centers will be called CareNet, Inc., of The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. Over 26,000 hours of counseling were provided through the eleven centers across the state of North Carolina. Two additional centers will open in the fall of this year.

The Center for Congregational Health has, since inception in 1992, provided ministry at some level to over 225 North Carolina Baptist Churches.

Mission dollars from the Cooperative Program enabled the above ministries to be carried out and to touch thousands of lives.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

North Carolina Baptists joined us in a mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. We channeled every penny of the MDO, which amounted to \$461,647, to help patients who had no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. We are grateful to everyone who made this ministry possible.

POINTS OF EMPHASIS AND PROGRESS

Financial Stewardship - The Medical Center is constantly seeking ways to lighten the financial burden of those who are ill. Recently the room rates were reduced by \$50 per day.

Aegis - This is an alliance of primary-care clinicians who serve patients regardless of their medical plans or HMO/PPO affiliated. "Aegis" means protection or sponsorship: Aegis Family Health Centers is a network of primary care physicians affiliated with The Medical Center. It now has 33 providers in 10 practice sites.

QualChoice of North Carolina - QualChoice is The Medical Center's managed care company. Eighteen months old, it serves approximately 30,500 enrollees, giving quality health-care and patient/physician choice.

Regional Integrated Information Network - RIDS is a regional computer network now in the pilot phases. The network allows providers in the region to exchange patient information electronically, saving time and money. RIDS is a plan which assists communities in our service area to develop a coordinated continuum of care. In this plan, primary care physicians, community hospitals, nursing homes and other patient care providers link their services with those of The Medical Center. The desired outcome is improved patient care and cost-effective services.

The J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging - The Center devotes itself to the special problems of older adults. When the center moves to its new home in 1996, its services will not only provide specialized health care but will also include a day care program for the elderly that will serve as a link between hospital and home, helping to reduce rates of rehospitalization and premature placement in nursing homes.

A CLOSING WORD

Since its founding in 1922, the Hospital has taken pride in our ministry of service. In doing so, we seek to make tomorrow's patient care and tomorrow's workplace constantly better. That has been our mission historically, and it continues to this day. I firmly believe that our best lies yet ahead, and I am committed to that reality.

STATE MISSIONS

Baptists have an enviable history of missions work. Over 200 years ago the first Baptist missionary was sent to India as a foreign missionary. From that humble beginning with William Carey, Baptists have carried the gospel to the far reaches of the globe.

Southern Baptists continue to work toward fulfilling a giant goal we set years ago-to take the Gospel to every person in the world by the year 2000. We are closing in on the new century. Only four years remain for us to reach our goal. Where to start?

We must reach the peoples of the world by first reaching the people of North Carolina. North Carolina is our primary mission field. In this state of over 7 million people, approximately half are not associated with a church.

In addition, there are many desperate people among us who have lost their way and whose only hope is for someone to reach out to them in the name of Jesus Christ. The homeless wander the streets of our cities. Inner-city neighborhoods are ruined by merchandisers in illegal drugs. Our prisons are bulging to overflow. Thousands of single parents are trying to find their way in a society that appears hostile to them.

The Missions Division of the Baptist State Convention is committed to reaching our primary mission field for Christ. In 1995 we started eighty-two new units of work. Many of these units were started among language groups. That North Carolina is becoming home for thousands of ethnics is illustrated by the fact that in Charlotte fifty-two languages are spoken.

Some of the new units of work were started in apartment complexes and trailer parks. In a few years, over half the population of North Carolina will live in multifamily housing, that is, in apartments, modular units, and condominiums. Managers of these facilities are anxious for us to bring the Gospel to their residents because they know the Gospel makes better residents. Changed lives lead to changed communities.

North Carolina is a favorite destination for people seeking leisure activities. Equestrian activities, golfing, fishing, boating, racing-you name it in leisure activities and North Carolina has it. Reaching these people requires that the church go beyond its walls with innovative approaches, like offering church services at times other than Sunday morning at 11:00.

The Missions Division receives its operating budget through two sources: the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering. Each dollar we receive is invested in mission work and through our state missionaries. Each dollar helps us reach our primary mission field, North Carolina.

Thank you for your generous support. Pray for us each day that the Lord might provide us with the means for reaping the harvest that is before us.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION REPORTS

FOREIGN MISSION BOARD

Fall 1996

We will lead Southern Baptists to be on mission with God to bring all the peoples of the world to saving faith in Jesus Christ.

As in all past years, our Lord has abundantly blessed the work of the Foreign Mission Board through countless ways. We wish to thank all Southern Baptists for their roles which undergird the FMB. Without the concerted, cooperative effort of all Southern Baptist churches, the work and mission of the FMB would be only a shadow of its present position.

We are distinctly privileged to follow our Lord's command found in the Great Commission. Each year brings us closer to taking the gospel to all nations (best rendered as ethno-linguistic people groups.)

The following annual growth levels reflect the combined reports from all foreign mission points as of the start of this year:

- A record number of newly constituted churches: 2,612
- Total number of countries where missionaries reside: 131
- Total number of baptisms overseas: 287,806
- Number of new people groups touched by the gospel: 41
- Baptisms among least-reached peoples: 6,548
- Total number of missionaries: 4,129
- Total number of short-term volunteers: Over 15,000
- Total number of newly appointed missionaries: 544
- Record amount of Lottie Moon Offering: \$89.9 million
- Increase in enrollment in discipleship programs: 74%
- Number of new cities opened to the gospel: 528

Southern Baptists support the Foreign Mission Board in multiple ways. Daily prayer assistance tops the list. Likewise, sacrificial giving through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering has provided innumerable opportunities to spread the gospel. As missionaries preached, taught, healed and counseled, you were there. The Foreign Mission Board counts it an honor to partner with you to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ to every shore.

HOME MISSIONS

HOME MISSION BOARD, SBC

Christ for our Nation

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). With national offices in the Atlanta, Georgia area, the HMB's purpose is to service Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, to start and grow New Testament congregations, and to minister to people in the name of Christ.

As of December 31, 1995, there were 4,857 missions personnel serving in the United States, the Caribbean, Guam, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also has endorsed more than 2,400 chaplains who are serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. Nearly 2,300 Mission Service Corps volunteers are serving on home mission fields. During the year there were 1,458 church starts, the second highest number in 10 years. Southern Baptist churches baptized 393,811 people in 1995, an increase of nearly 15,000 over 1994.

Approximately half of the HMB's support comes from the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1995, gifts to the offering totaled \$38,908,339, the largest in HMB history. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1996 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$42 million. About 35 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

The following is a summary of program/ministry highlights from 1995:

Chaplaincy Ministries - The 2,412 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported more than 27,000 professions of faith. During the year, 179 Southern Baptist ministers were endorsed for the first time by the Chaplain Commission of the SBC.

Church Loans - The Church Loans Division closed 98 church loans totaling \$25 million, including \$3.4 million of refinancing.

Associational Administrative Service - In more than 1,025 associations, 950 associational missionaries have an extremely significant role in leading churches to strategize and work in partnership to evangelize, minister, and start churches in all places and among all people groups.

Language Missions - Home missionaries in the Language Church Extension Division worked among 106 ethnic groups and 98 American Indian tribes, using 106 languages and dialects, in addition to sign language.

Volunteers - Volunteers continue to serve in record numbers and represent more than \$100 million in value to the HMB. In 1995, more than 70,000 persons served as volunteers. Mission Service Corps missionaries, numbering 2,193 represent a cadre of committed people responding to God's call to be personally involved in home missions. They are responsible for leading more than 5,600 people to Christ.

Prayer and Spiritual Awakening - the Home Missions Intercessory Prayerline received 82,000 calls in 1995. Missionary prayer requests were given in more than 178,000 English and Spanish *PrayerGrams*.

Mass Evangelism - This department assisted in implementing the *Here's Hope, Jesus Cares For You* Harvest Revivals. An estimated 25,000 to 35,000 churches participated in some portion of the *Here's Hope* emphasis.

Alternative to Abortion Ministries - As a result of ministries in 37 crisis pregnancy centers, 806 persons prayed to receive Christ and 1,823 babies were born.

OTHER REPORTS AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Dear friend of the Bible cause,

I want to thank you for your interest in the mission of the American Bible Society and our efforts to produce and distribute the Word of God at home and around the world. If you have been a partner with us in this work, I am forever thankful to you for all of the generous support that makes our Bible translation and distribution possible.

Because ABS has changed its accounting calendar to a new fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, our financial report covers 18 months through June 30, 1995. However the min-

istry narrative reflects only 12 months, from July 1, 1994 to June 30, 1995.

But whether talking about 12 months or 18 months, what moves me most is the occasional opportunity I have to see, first hand, expressions of joy on the faces of people whose lives have been changed by reading the Word. I am often brought to tears by the precious privilege - to share in the high calling of bringing God's Word to spiritually hungry people all around the world.

Not long ago in Cairo, Egypt I visited a neighborhood referred to as "garbage city," where city garbage is dumped directly into people's living quarters for sorting. In some of these homes the people live and sleep with the garbage. Well, Christianity has broken out in "garbage village." It is now the site of one of the world's largest churches. The Bible Society of Egypt has had a tremendous impact in serving this Christian witness of

this church, literally salvaging lives from the surrounding refuse.

Here at home I've had repeated opportunities to appear on the QVC home-shopping television network to talk about our new Contemporary English Version Bible. The producers had prepared me for a poor response, after all it was 7 o'clock in the morning (4 o'clock am on the West coast) and they had never featured a religious product in this secular forum before. In the first 15 minutes they had received 5,000 Bible orders. The response had the QVC people jumping out of their seats.

I began taking live calls on the air. Some people questioned why yet another translation was needed and, I would tell them, "Because parents love their kids." What good is it, I would ask, if parents are in love with the book of books but their children can't read or understand it. Reading the CEV will encourage kids to fall in love with the same God

that their parents have grown up loving.

If you love God's Word as much as I do, you will be encouraged to know how effectively ABS has used the support of thousands of dedicated Christians to share God's message of salvation. We continue to explore innovative ways to increase the scope and impact of our ministry. But our purpose has remained unchanged since 1816 when the American Bible Society was founded to provide quality Bibles at affordable prices.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

In a recent survey released by the Family Research Council, 66% of those polled said that our country was headed down "the wrong track." When asked whether the nation's wrong direction could be attributed to the lack of jobs and economic health or a decline in moral values and family breakdown, over 60% indicated the latter. We at the Christian Action League agree that our state and nation need a restoration of biblical, moral and family values. In 1996 we were honored to assist communities in their battles for civic and moral righteousness and to promote laws in the General Assembly that have helped to restore family values to the State of North Carolina.

<u>Christian Values</u>

The Christian Action League joined with other Christian organizations to promote Christian Heritage Week in North Carolina, March 17-23. We experienced a wonderful week as presentations and commemorations were held in many churches, schools and communities across our state. The week culminated with an awards ceremony and reception for the winners of the state-wide essay contest and their families. The League provided decorations and programs for the event and hosted the reception at the State Archives and History Building in Raleigh.

The League undertook a project in association with the American Rights Coalition to distribute thousands of copies of the Ten Commandments throughout North Carolina. To date, over 5,000 copies of the 11 x 14 prints have been distributed throughout the state to individuals and churches.

B. <u>Lottery</u>

We saw renewed efforts to push a lottery bill through the General Assembly for a state-wide referendum. Representative Fitch introduced two lottery bills: HB 6060 (Rules Committee) and HB 838 (JII Committee). The League actively lobbied against these bills and both bills died in their respective committees. North Carolina continues to be the largest state in the nation and the only state in the Bible belt with no state-sponsored gambling. Please keep us in prayer as the League faces this battle each year.

C. Sex Education

CAL actively lobbied for HB 834, Abstinence Until Marriage, a law that mandated that abstinence until marriage be the focus in sex education in North Carolina schools and was passed in the 1995 session. CAL and other pro-family, Christian organizations have been working with the Dept. of Public Instruction and State Board of Education in 1996 encouraging them to implement the law through abstinence-based curricula. We have also assisted communities in seeing that the law is properly implemented at the local level.

<u>Homosexuality</u>

CAL participated in efforts to get SB 1487 (No Same-Sex Marriage) passed during the short session of the General Assembly. The bill passed both houses and became law.

Alerted our members in the Winston-Salem area about the Family March on June 30 and encouraged them to notify their churches to participate. This march was in response to the homosexual community march held in that city. The Family March attendance was estimated at 8,000.

E. Abortion

D.

The League actively supported Representative Decker's HB 624, a Woman's Right to Know. This bill would have required the doctor to share vital information with the patient about the risks of abortion and would require a 24-hour waiting period. We were disappointed that the bill did not pass this session; however, we will work for its passage again next session.

F. Alcohol


CAL assisted several communities in setting up an organization to combat liquor referendums.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Pursuant to §55A-2-02 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the undersigned corporation does hereby submit these Articles of Incorporation for the purpose of forming a conprofit corporation.

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of the corporation is LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE II DESIGNATION

The corporation is a charitable or religious corporation within the meaning of N.C.G.S. §55A-1-40(4).

ARTICLE III REGISTERED OFFICE AND AGENT

The street address of the initial registered office of the corporation is Route 8, Box 510, Bud Kanoy Road, Thomasville, Davidson County, North Carolina, 27360-7839, and the initial registered agent at that office is *Dr.* Richard H. Capps, Director of Missions.

ARTICLE IV INCORPORATORS

The names and addresses of the incorporators, acting as representatives of the mempers of Liberty Baptist Association are as follows:

ARTICLE V MEMBERS

The corporation shall have one class of members as provided in the bylaws. Members shall be received, rejected, or withdrawn as set forth in the bylaws. The Baptist churches which are members of Liberty Baptist Association immediately prior to the incorporation thereof automatically shall become members of the corporation.

ARTICLE VI DISSOLUTION

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the board of directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for religious purposes as shall qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the

Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue law) as the board of directors shall determine. Any such assets not disposed of shall be disposed of by the District Court of the County in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE VII PURPOSE

The purposes for which the corporation is organized are:

A. to assist the churches of Liberty Baptist Association in their divinely appointed mission and in cooperative relationships with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Southern Baptist Convention, and other Baptist entities to promote and provide opportunities for individual and collective participation in missions, evangelism, ministry, education, social services, and distribution of the Bible;

B. to engage in any lawful act or activities for which corporations may be organized under

N.C. General Statutes Chapter 55A;

C. to engage in any lawful activity within the purposes for which the corporation may be organized which is incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the corporation;

D. to operate exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE VIII INITIAL DIRECTORS

The number of initial directors shall be One Hundred and Thirty-Four (134), and the initial directors shall be the duly-elected representatives from each member church of Liberty Baptist Association.

ARTICLE IX GOVERNMENT

- A. The government of this corporation is vested in its members who are represented in the manner set out in its bylaws. The members retain the right of self-government in all phases of the spiritual and temporal life of the association.
- B. Churches received as members of this corporation as set out in the bylaws shall constitute the membership ("the members"). The members shall be represented by messengers as provided in the bylaws and shall have the sole authority to adopt and amend the charter and bylaws, approve budgets, receive and discharge members, govern and conduct the affairs of this corporation.

C. All internal groups, committees, directors, officers, agents, and/or employees created and empowered by the association ultimately shall report to and be accountable to the members and shall have such powers and duties as set out in the bylaws.

D. This association is autonomous and independent and is a sovereign and democratic association of Baptist churches under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. As such, the association is subject to the control of no other ecclesiastical body and does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any member church, auxiliary organization, or other Baptist body.

ARTICLE X ELECTION AS 501(c)(3) CORPORATION

No part of the net earnings or receipts of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes as set forth in these Articles of Incorporation.

No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), or (b) by a corporations, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE XI PERSONAL LIABILITY

Personal liability for all directors for monetary damages arising out of an action or actions, whether by or in the right of the corporation or otherwise for breach of any duty as a director is eliminated except with respect to acts, omissions, liabilities and/or transactions described and defined in North Carolina General Statutes §55A-2-02 (b).(4)(i).(ii).(iii), and (iv).

ARTICLE XII EFFECTIVE DATE

These articles will be effective upon filing.

BYLAWS OF LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I NAME AND LOCATION

- A. The corporate name of this nonprofit corporation shall be "Liberty Baptist Association". The principal and registered office of the Corporation shall be at Route 8, Box 610, Bud Kanoy Road, Thomasville, 27360-7839, Davidson County, North Carolina.
- **B.** All reference to "Association" or "Corporation" in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or other official action of the Association, shall signify the legal organization of Liberty Baptist Association as established in the Articles of Incorporation. Liberty Baptist Association as it has existed heretofore, for all legal and administrative purposes fully is incorporated into Liberty Baptist Association, a non-

profit corporation. References to votes of the membership shall have reference to a vote of the members of this Association as prescribed in Article VII F of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

The purposes for which the Corporation is organized are:

- A. to assist the churches of Liberty Baptist Association in their divinely appointed mission and in cooperative relationships with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Southern Baptist Convention, and other Baptist entities to promote and provide opportunities for individual and collective participation in missions, evangelism, ministry, education, social services, and distribution of the Bible;
- **B**. to engage in any lawful act or activities for which corporations may be organized under N.C. General Statutes Chapter 55A;
- C. to engage in any lawful activity within the purposes for which the Corporation may be organized which is incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the Corporation;
- **D**. to operate exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE III ELECTION AS A 501(C)(3) CORPORATION

- A. The Corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 50l(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law).
- **B**. No part of the net earnings or receipts of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes as set forth in the Articles.
- C. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IV GOVERNMENT

A. The government of this Association is vested in its members who are represented in the manner set out in its Bylaws. The members retain the right of self-government in all phases of the spiritual and temporal life of the association.

- **B.** Churches received as members of this Association, as herein provided, shall constitute the membership ("the members"). The members shall be represented by messengers duly elected by each member church and certified to the Association in its Annual Church Profile (Church Letter), and the number of messengers shall be determined as follows:
 - a. Six messengers from each church for its first one hundred members or fraction thereof;
 - b. One additional messenger from each church for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof above 100 and up to 1,000 members;
 - c. One additional messenger from each church for each additional one hundred members or major fraction above 1,000 members;

The members represented by messengers as aforesaid shall have the sole authority to adopt and amend the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, approve budgets, receive and discharge members, govern and conduct the affairs of this Corporation.

- C. All internal groups, committees, directors, officers, agents, and/or employees created and empowered by the Association ultimately shall report to and be accountable to the Association and shall have such powers and duties as hereinafter set out.
- **D.** This Association is autonomous and independent and is a sovereign and democratic association of Baptist churches under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. As such, the Association is subject to the control of no other ecclesiastical body and does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any member church, auxiliary organization, or other Baptist body.

ARTICLE V PROPERTY

- A. The title to all property shall be in the Association.
- **B**. The securing and maintaining of real, personal, and mixed property by this association shall be for the express purpose of providing facilities for and the engagement upon the missionary, educational, and benevolent interests of this association as historically have been espoused and practiced thereby and as are expressed in its charter and bylaws, which practices and documents are deemed the standard for uses and practices upon and with regard to such property.
- C. Real property shall not be mortgaged, conveyed, transferred, or encumbered without the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII,F., at an annual meeting or a special meeting duly called for such purpose and stated in the meeting notice.
- D. This article shall not be amended, altered, or repealed except by a three fourths vote of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII, F., at an annual or special meeting duly called and then only in the event that such proposed amendment, alteration, or repeal has been given in writing to the Moderator and Executive Board and has lain on the table for a period of twelve months, and no article shall be voted upon until the period aforementioned has elapsed, any other provisions herein to the contrary notwithstanding.

ARTICLE VI MEMBERS

A. Record of Members: The members of this Association shall be composed of the Baptist churches who are members of Liberty Baptist Association on the date these Bylaws are adopted. The Clerk shall attach hereto a list of such present members

which shall remain a part of the official records of the Association maintained at all times in the office of the Association. A current list of members shall be maintained at all times in the office of the Association.

B. Organization of New Work Missions/Churches: The Association by its nature and definition is an organization whose primary purpose is missions. In furtherance of these functions, the Association will attempt to develop and foster new work missions/churches and will remain available and will be resourceful in assisting groups or churches in their own development respectively of and as Baptist churches. The Association is mindful and responsive to the autonomous nature of the structure of its members and desires to inculcate in watch-care groups and churches their own independence while utilizing, without compulsion, the well-intended and well-respected practices of existing Baptist churches in historical Baptist precedence, all of which can be helpful during the organizational phases. To those ends and to effect these purposes, the Association will consider, promulgate, and maintain suggested guidelines for establishing and assisting new work missions/churches in their efforts. These guidelines shall be developed by the Missions Development Council and approved by the Executive Board.

At such time as a group comes under watch care of the Association, a sponsoring church (member of the Association) shall be recommended by the Missions Development Council in consultation with the Director of Missions and actively shall support such mission/church with any resource assistance required. The sponsoring church will work in cooperation with the Missions Development Council and a Liaison Committee shall be formulated and shall be comprised of the following: Two persons from the sponsoring church; Two persons from the new mission/church; One person from the Missions Development Council; and, Ex-officio, the Mission Pastor, Sponsoring Church Pastor, and Director of missions.

The Liaison Committee shall meet monthly and no less than bi-monthly during the formation period of the mission/church and shall assist in every reasonable manner with the development of the mission/church on behalf of the Association. In the event a sponsoring church cannot be secured, the Missions Development Council shall be responsible for the sponsoring thereof on behalf of the Association. The mission/church shall remain under watch care of the Association until such mission/church is ready to constitute a self-supporting church and has fulfilled watch-care requirements.

- C. Admission of New Churches: Any church seeking admission to the membership of the Association shall petition the Association in writing at least three months prior to the annual meeting of the Association. The Executive Board shall refer such petition to the Missions Development Council for its study of the petitioning church's covenant, articles of faith, history, practices, cooperative spirit, its relations to other churches of the Association, and its willingness to abide by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Association. A written report setting out its findings and recommendations for action at the next annual meeting of the Association shall be submitted by the Missions Development Council to the Executive Board. Final approval for membership shall be contingent upon a one-year period under a watchcare relationship after which determination will be made by a three-fourths vote of "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in VII, F., in annual meeting.
- D. Privileges of Membership: Members through their messengers ("Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F.), and members through their messengers ("Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F.,) only, are entitled to vote in all elections and all questions submitted to the Association. Recognizing the value

of voluntary association among churches of like faith and practice, members are afforded opportunity to work in mutual, cooperative fellowship with other churches, especially those of Baptist faith, to advance the gospel of Christ, to promote Christian principles of justice and righteousness in personal, social, and community life, to promote the spiritual welfare of all persons, to disseminate the work of God to the people of all nations through evangelistic, educational, and charitable missions.

- E. Requirements of Membership: All members reasonably are required to submit a completed Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Annual Meeting; send messengers to the annual meeting; and, contribute to the financial program of the Association. Only members of the Association shall determine whether member churches have fulfilled requirements for membership.
- **F. Termination of Membership:** The membership status of any member shall be terminated by written request of the member seeking termination addressed to the Association. Failure reasonably to meet requirements of membership as set out in paragraph E above for a period of two consecutive years after contact by the Missions Development Council to ascertain the desire of the member church shall subject any member church to termination. No member may be expelled or suspended, and no membership may be terminated or suspended, except in a manner that is fair and reasonable and is carried out in good faith, and in compliance with the following procedures:
 - 1. The Executive Board, by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of members present at a special meeting, duly called, must recommend termination of the subject member church.
 - 2. Such recommendation, in writing, must be mailed to the subject member church and each member church sixty (60) days in advance of a special meeting of members.
 - 3. The subject church shall have full and ample opportunity to present its position at such meeting.
 - 4. Termination of membership shall occur only upon a three-fourths (3/4) vote of individuals entitled to vote.
- **G.** Watch-care Affiliation: Watch-care affiliation for a period of one year shall be required for each church applying for membership in the Association. Each church under watch-care affiliation shall submit a quarterly report and an Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Association.

ARTICLE VII MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

- A. Annual Meeting: The annual meeting of the Association shall be held on Monday and Tuesday following the first Sunday in October for the following purposes: to elect officers of the Association, standing committees, and special committees; to receive annual reports; to approve budgets; to conduct any other business matters which properly may come before the annual meeting; and, to share in worship and fellowship.
- **B.** Special Meetings: Special meetings for the transaction of business may be called by the Executive Board provided sufficient notice is given members to allow for two Sundays between the call and the meeting.
- C. Emergencies: In emergencies, any change in the time and/or place of meetings shall be determined by a vote of two-thirds of the Executive Board present when the vote is taken.
- D. Presiding Officer: The Moderator shall preside at all meetings of members. In the

absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator shall preside. In the absence of the Moderator and Vice Moderator, the Clerk shall preside. In the absence of the aforementioned officers, the Treasurer shall preside. In the absence of all officers, the body may elect an acting moderator.

E. Quorum: Seventy-five (75) "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII, F., shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any annual

or special meeting of members.

F. Voting: Messengers who have been duly elected by a member, have been certified in its annual report to the Association, and are duly registered and present shall be collectively referred to as "Individuals entitled to vote" and shall be entitled to one vote at any meeting of members. No proxy or absentee voting shall be permitted. All voting shall be by show of hands, *standing vote* or voice vote except when there are contested matters in which case the vote shall be by ballot. Parliamentary procedure utilizing Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed.

ARTICLE VIII EXECUTIVE BOARD

- A. Board of Directors: All reference to "Executive Board" or "Board of Directors" in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or other official action of the Association shall be synonymous and shall include conferring of powers as are provided by the Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, and the North Carolina Nonprofit Corporation Act.
- B. Membership: The Executive Board membership shall consist of the following:
 - 1. One lay-representative elected by each member church and certified to the Association in its Annual Church Profile (Church Letter),
 - 2. The active pastor of each member,
 - 3. The church treasurer of each member,
 - 4. Officers duly elected by the Association, to-wit: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer;
 - 5. Standing Committee Chairpersons and Standing Council Directors as named in Article XI, A and B.
- C. Officers: The officers of the Executive Board shall be the same persons elected by the Association as Moderator (President), Vice Moderator (Vice President), Clerk (Secretary), and Treasurer.
- **D. Meetings:** Regular meetings of the Executive Board shall be held at least quarterly. The first meeting, which shall be designated as the *annual* meeting, shall be held as soon as possible after the annual meeting of the Association, and the last meeting shall be held as nearly as possible to the next annual meeting of the Association for approval/endorsement of various Reports of the Association for the annual meeting.

Special meetings may be called by the Moderator whenever the need arises and the Moderator shall call a special meeting when requested in writing by ten (10) members

of the Executive Board.

- **E. Quorum:** Twenty-five (25) members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- **F. Duties:** Except as restricted by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws or other official action of the Association, the Executive Board shall manage the general business and activities of the Association between annual meetings; shall call special meetings of the Association when necessary; shall elect an independent auditor to conduct the annual audit; shall fill and/or approve any vacancies which occur in the officers,

Executive Board, Committee on Nominations, Nominating Committee; Standing Committees or Councils; and, may elect the Director of Missions when a vacancy occurs in accordance with Article X,E.2. of these Bylaws. The Executive Board shall present a written report of action taken to the Association in its annual meeting for ratification and approval of action so taken between annual meetings.

G. Contracts: The Executive Board may authorize officers to enter into contracts or execute and deliver instruments on behalf of the Association, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances subject only to limitations provided herein.

H. Loans: No loans shall be contracted on behalf of the Association and no evidence of indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a resolution of the Executive Board. Such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

- I. Depository: The Executive Board shall have the power to (a) select one or more banks to act as depositories of the funds of the Association; (b) determine the manner of receiving, depositing, and disbursing the funds of the Association; (c) designate the person or persons authorized to draw on the bank accounts of the Association; (d) approve the form of checks to be used in drawing on such bank accounts; and, (e) change such banks, the person or persons drawing on such accounts, and the form of checks at will.
- **J. Removal:** Board members, as well as officers of the Association, may be removed by majority vote of the Association at a properly called business meeting, with written notice to members setting out the specific purpose of the meeting.
- **K.** Death, Resignation or Termination: In the event a Board member shall expire, resign, or for any reason be removed from the Executive Board, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE IX OFFICERS

- A. Officers Generally: There shall be a Moderator who shall also serve as Moderator and Chairman of the Executive Board and President of the Corporation. There shall be a Vice Moderator who shall also serve as Vice Moderator of the Executive Board and Vice President of the Corporation. There shall be a Clerk who shall also serve as Clerk of the Executive Board and Secretary of the Corporation. There shall be a Treasurer who shall also serve as Treasurer of the Association and of the Corporation. Whenever used in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or in other official action of the Association, the words "Moderator or "President;" "Vice Moderator" or "Vice President;" or "Clerk" or "Secretary" shall be synonymous.
- B. Moderator:
 - 1. Election and Term: The Moderator shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of the Association for a term of one year and may be re-elected for a one-year term. The Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election as Moderator for a period of two years after having served two one-year terms. The term of office shall begin at the close of the annual meeting and shall continue through the close of the next annual meeting or until a successor is elected.
 - 2. Duties: The Moderator shall
 - a. preside at the annual meeting and any special meeting of the Association;
 - b. serve as President of the Corporation;
 - c. preside at all meetings of the Executive Board;
 - d. perform such other duties as are specifically prescribed in these Bylaws and as may be delegated by the Association;
 - e. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the

Executive Board for election at its May meeting;

- f. appoint other committees when so directed by the Association or Executive Board; and
- g. serve as ex officio member of all committees except the Committee on Nominations.

C. Vice Moderator

- 1. Election and Term: The Vice Moderator shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year and may be re-elected for a one-year term. The Vice Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election as Vice Moderator for a period of two years after having served two one-year terms. The term of office shall begin at the close of the annual meeting in which such election is held and shall continue through the close of the next annual meeting or until his successor is elected.
- 2. Duties: The Vice Moderator shall
 - a. preside at meetings of the Association and Executive Board in the absence of the Moderator or at the pleasure of the Moderator;
 - b. serve as Vice President of the Corporation;
 - c. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting; and
 - d. perform such other duties as may be specifically prescribed in these Bylaws and as may be delegated by the members.

D. Clerk

- **1. Election and Term:** The Clerk shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.
- 2. Duties: The Clerk shall
 - a. serve as Secretary of the Corporation and of the Executive Committee;
 - b. maintain at all times a current list of members of the Association;
 - c. maintain and preserve the files, records, and documents of the Association in proper order at all times for examination of the Executive Board;
 - d. send report forms to members at least one month before the annual meeting of the Association:
 - e. prepare a composite record of the member information included in the annual report submitted to the Association and distribute copies thereof at the annual meeting;
 - f. supervise the printing of minutes of the Association and distribute to the members as soon as possible after the annual meeting;
 - g. preserve the files, records, and documents of the Association and, upon election of a successor, relinquish such files, records, documents, and other property belonging to the Association and in the possession and control of the Clerk to the duly elected successor;
 - h. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting; and
 - i. preside at meetings in the absence of the Moderator and Vice Moderator at the pleasure of the moderator.

E. Treasurer

- 1. Election and Term: The Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.
- 2. Duties: The Treasurer shall
 - a. serve as Treasurer of the Corporation;
 - b. have custody of all funds of the Association;

- c. maintain at all times up-to-date, orderly records of all receipts and disbursements;
- d. disburse funds by check in accordance with the budget and direction of the Association or Executive Board;
- e. prepare quarterly financial reports and distribute copies to the Finance Committee and the Executive Board;
- f. prepare a financial report and distribute copies at the annual meeting;
- g. serve as a member of the Finance Committee;
- h. cooperate with the firm making the annual audit;
- i. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting; and
- j. preside at meetings in the absence of the Moderator, Vice Moderator and Clerk at the pleasure of the moderator.

ARTICLE X STAFF

- A. Staff Positions: The staff of the Association shall be composed of the Director of Missions, Administrative Secretary, and such other persons who shall fill staff positions as may be created by the Association. The Personnel Committee shall make recommendation for the creation of any staff position. A current list of staff positions shall be maintained by the Personnel Committee. A job description for each staff position shall be prepared and shall be revised periodically by the Personnel Committee, approved by the Executive Board, and furnished to all candidates considered for the position and the person filling the position. Staff positions may be combined from time to time at the discretion of the Executive Board and the combined position held by one person.
- **B.** Election/Employment: Except in the case of the Director of Missions, the staff members from time to time shall be employed for indeterminate terms by the Association or Executive Board at a regular meeting upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- **C. Termination:** With the exception of the Director of Missions, termination of the relationship between a staff member and the Association shall occur within a reasonable and announced period after written notice of termination delivered to the staff member on behalf of the Association and to the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board on behalf of the staff member. Termination of the staff member by the Association shall be initiated and acted upon by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- **D. Vacation and Leave:** Requirements for vacation and leaves, record-keeping, expense reimbursement, work schedules, and other employment matters shall be outlined in the Policy Manual and Benefit Plans. Such manual shall be prepared, reviewed, monitored, and amended from time to time by recommendation of the Personnel Committee to the Executive Board; and the staff shall be subject to the provisions thereof from time to time; provided, nothing therein contained shall be interpreted to be in derivation or in violation of the provisions of the Bylaws, and such Policy Manual and Benefit Plans must remain consistent with the purposes and intent requirements thereof.

E. Director of Missions

1. Search Committee Procedure: When a vacancy occurs in the position of Director of Missions or the Director of Mission furnishes notice of intent to vacate the position, a Search Committee composed of the officers of the Association and five members of the Associational Council elected by the Associational Council shall meet as soon as possible, determine their procedure, establish a profile, prepare application forms and

reference questionnaires, and shall diligently seek to find a Director of Missions who, by calling, training, and ability, is qualified spiritually, mentally, and physically to lead the work of the Association. The Moderator shall serve as Chairperson of the Search Committee. Members of the committee may be reimbursed by the Treasurer for any necessary and reasonable travel and subsistence expenses which are incurred in the performance of their duties. The candidate to be recommended by the Search Committee may be interviewed by the Associational Council before election by the Executive Board or the Association in Annual Meeting.

- 2. Election/Employment: When the Search Committee has selected a potential employee and is ready to make a report and recommendation to the Association, such recommendation shall be made to the Annual Meeting of the Association or, between annual meetings, to the Executive Board. Upon a vote being taken, the Director of Missions presented must receive at least three-fourths of all votes cast. If the Director of Missions fails to receive the required three-fourths vote, the Moderator shall declare the nominee not elected/employed and shall refer the matter, without debate, to the Search Committee for further investigation and further recommendation under the foregoing procedure.
- 3. Duties: The Director of Missions shall
 - a. fulfill all duties under the direction of the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board;
 - b. serve ex officio in a supervisory capacity on all committees and councils of the Association unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws;
 - c. promote the work of the Association and denomination;
 - d. cooperate with members, their pastors, officers, committees and councils of the Association:
 - e. present oral reports to the Associational Council, Missions Development Council, and Executive Board meetings;
 - f. present a written report to the annual meeting of the Association;
 - g. assist the Clerk in preparation of the composite record of members from information submitted in their annual report to the Association;
 - h. assist the Clerk in preparing the annual minutes of the Association.
- **4. Termination:** The Director of Missions shall be employed for an indeterminate term. The Director of Missions shall give reasonable notice of intent to resign or retire to the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board. The Director of Missions may be removed by an affirmative vote of three-fourths of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as heretofore defined in Article VII, F., at a meeting properly called with ten days written notice to the Director of Missions and written notice of the meeting to the members as required by the Bylaws.
- **5. Interim Director of Missions:** The Executive Board, in consultation with the Personnel Committee, shall be responsible for the employment of an Interim Director of Missions when the Association is without a Director of Missions.
- **6.** Extended Leave or Absence: During any extended leave or absence of the Director of Missions for medical or other appropriate reasons and with advice of the Personnel Committee, the Executive Board shall make such necessary, temporary or emergency decisions as reasonably shall be required.

ARTICLE XI COMMITTEES AND COUNCILS

A. Standing Committees:

Except as hereinafter provided, Standing Committees of the Association shall be as follows: Annual Meeting Program Committee; Auditing Committee, Building and Grounds Committee; Bylaw Committee; Finance Committee; Historical Committee; Hunger Awareness Committee; Liaison Committee; Memorials Committee; Nominating Committee; Ordination Examining Committee; Personnel Committee; Place and Preacher Committee; and, Resolutions Committee shall have membership and general responsibilities respectively as follows:

- 1. Annual Meeting Program Committee: The Annual Meeting Program Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Chairman of the Place and Preacher Committee, Director of the Music Council, Pastors of the churches hosting the Annual Meeting, and three persons. The Annual Meeting Program Committee shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting, send a copy of the printed program to all persons on the program at least ten days prior to the annual meeting, present the printed program for adoption at the opening of the Annual Meeting, and serve through the Annual Meeting when adjustments on the program are necessary.
- 2. Auditing Committee: The Auditing Committee shall consist of three persons. The committee shall make an audit or review of the records and receipts of the Association on a quarterly basis. A report should be made to the Finance Committee one month after the end of each quarter in writing as to findings, needed adjustments and suggestions. The committee will meet at least four times a year with the Treasurer as ex-officio member to review the quarterly updated Finance Reports and records. The Annual Audit Report or Review is to be made in writing to be in the Book of Reports as a part of the Finance Committee report. The report needs to be completed by September 30 to be presented at the Annual Meeting. The Auditing Committee shall have the option of recommending a Review of the Financial Records or a complete Audit of the Financial Records. The Auditing Committee shall recommend to the appropriate Executive Board Meeting, prior to the Annual Session, whether a review or complete audit of the Financial Records is needed. The Auditing Committee is responsible for doing the necessary research to answer any questions concerning Financial Records that may be raised by member churches, messengers, or Executive Board members within a reasonable period.
- **3. Building and Grounds Committee:** The Building and Grounds Committee shall consist of three persons. The Building and Grounds Committee shall plan for adequate maintenance, repairs, alterations, improvement, and housekeeping of the physical properties of the Association; upon request of the Director of Missions, assist in considering approval for special use of the facilities of the Association; and, prepare and submit an appropriate budget request for consideration and inclusion in the proposed budget.
- **4. Bylaws Committee:** The Bylaws Committee shall consist of three persons, preferably one of whom shall be an attorney. The Bylaws Committee shall consider requests for amendments, alterations, or revisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws and shall make recommendations to the Association with respect thereto; and, periodically review and make recommendations for amendments, alterations, or revisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws.

- **5. Finance Committee:** The Finance Committee shall consist of the Treasurer and five persons. The Finance Committee shall study, formulate, and recommend a budget adequately to support the program of the Association; formulate plans for promotion of the budget and cooperation of members in meeting budget needs; review the quarterly and annual financial reports of the Treasurer; review and monitor budget line item expenses; present periodical reports of contributions to members of the Association; and, present a written report to the Annual Meeting of the Association.
- **6. Historical Committee:** The Historical Committee shall consist of a Historian and two persons. The Historian shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year and shall serve as Chairperson of the Historical Committee. The Historical Committee shall collect and preserve historical data of the Association; encourage and promote the preservation of historical data by each member; and, present a written report to each annual meeting of the Association. The Historian shall serve as a member of the Media Library (TACMO) Council.
- 7. Hunger Awareness Committee: The Hunger Awareness Committee shall consist of three persons. The Hunger Awareness Committee shall keep abreast of hunger needs throughout the world and shall apprise the Association of these needs and from time to time, upon approval of the Executive Board, shall lead special projects within the Association to meet specific needs.
- 8. Liaison Committee: A Liaison Committee shall be formulated as needed for new work missions/churches and shall be comprised of two persons from the sponsoring church as defined in Article VI, B; two persons from the new mission/church; one person from the Missions Development Council; and, Ex-officio, the Mission Pastor, Sponsoring Church Pastor, and Director of Missions. The Liaison Committee shall meet no less than bi-monthly during the formation period of the mission/church and shall assist in every reasonable manner with the development of the mission/church on behalf of the Association.
- 9. Memorials Committee: The Memorials Committee shall consist of three persons. The Memorials Committee shall prepare and read a report of individuals who have expired since the last annual meeting as reflected in the Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Association furnished by the members and shall conduct a brief, appropriate Memorial Service for such individuals during the Annual Meeting.
- 10. Nominating Committee: The Nominating Committee shall consist of five individuals recommended to the Annual Meeting by the Committee on Nominations and shall meet as often as necessary to fill vacancies and prepare nominations for the Annual Meeting of the association; seek to fill all positions with the best qualified nominees, avoiding the nomination of one individual for more than one position and distributing obligations and privileges of service to member representation; contact all nominees and secure consent before making recommendations to the Association or Executive Board; recommend to the Association during the Annual Meeting the officers, chairpersons, directors, and members of each standing committee and council, and the institutional/agency representatives, unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws; recommend to the Executive Board individuals to fill vacancies of committees and institutional/agency representatives which may occur between Annual Meetings of the Association.
- 11. Ordination Examining Committee: Each church of the Association shall have the exclusive right to ordain for the ministry without Associational involvement. However, member churches shall have the option to utilize the Association of the

ational Ordination Examining Committee as hereinafter set out. The Ordination Examining Committee shall consist of five persons. The Ordination Examining Committee shall receive requests from churches within the Association who wish to examine a candidate for ordination to the Gospel ministry; cooperate with the church requesting examination in setting a mutually satisfactory date for examination; question the candidate for ordination; report its findings to the church making such request for examination; approve for ordination only the candidate who has received a call to serve in an ordained Christian ministry of any kind including, but not limited to that of a member church of the Association, or Baptist churches outside the Association; to serve on the mission field, or to serve as a chaplain in the armed forces or a public institution; and, shall have the option to summons pastors and one lay person from any or all cooperating member churches of the Liberty Baptist Association.

12. Personnel Committee: The Personnel Committee shall consist of five persons. Except as otherwise provided in Article X,E., the Personnel Committee shall receive applications, interview applicants, contact references, and carefully investigate applicants considered for staff positions; shall recommend to the Executive Board the prospective employee; shall prepare, periodically review, revise, and recommend changes in job descriptions to the Executive Board; shall make recommendation to the Association in the event of need of a new staff position; shall prepare, periodically review, revise and recommend changes to Personnel Policy Manual and Benefits Plan; periodically evaluate personnel performance and make necessary recommendations to the staff; consult with and perform duties assigned by the Executive Board and as set out in Article X of these Bylaws; establish a salary plan and prepare budget requests with respect to all personnel matters including salaries and fringe benefits and submit such budget requests to the Finance Committee of the Association.

13. Place and Preacher Committee: The Place and Preacher Committee shall consist of five persons. The Place and Preacher Committee shall solicit and receive invitations for the place or places of meeting for the next Annual Meeting of the Association, recommend the place or places of the meeting, and recommend the preacher and an alternate preacher to preach the annual sermon at the Annual Meeting of the Association.

14. Resolutions Committee: The Resolutions Committee shall consist of five persons. The Resolutions Committee shall review all properly submitted resolutions which may be reworded for clarity, combined with like issues into one resolution, or rejected if previously addressed or are inappropriate; present all appropriate resolutions to the Association for consideration; prepare and present resolutions of appreciation and other resolutions deemed appropriate; and, notify persons submitting resolutions of the disposition thereof.

B. Standing Councils

Except as hereinafter provided, the Standing Councils of the Association, shall be as follows: Bi-Vocational Ministers Council; Brotherhood Council; Christian Life and Public Affairs Council; Discipleship Training Council; Evangelism Council; Family Ministry Council; Hispanic Ministries Council; Media Library Council (TACMO); Missions Development Council; Multi-Housing Council; Music Council; Pastoral Ministries Council; Seminary Extension Council; Senior Adult Council; Single Adult Council; Stewardship Council; Student Ministries Council; Sunday School Council; Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team; and, Youth Ministries Council with general responsibilities respectively as follows:

- 1. Bi-Vocational Ministers Council: The Bi-Vocational Ministers Council shall be composed of Bi-Vocational Ministers (active and retired) selected by the Nominating Committee. The President of the Bi-Vocational Ministers Conference shall be an ex officio member. The purpose of this Council is to address needs of Bi-Vocational ministerial staff.
- 2. Brotherhood Council: The Brotherhood Council will assist churches in involving men and boys in missions; helping churches engage men and boys in missions activities; helping churches prepare to teach missions to men and boys; helping churches lead men and boys to pray for and give to missions; helping churches lead men and boys to develop personal ministry; and, helping churches interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.
- 3. Christian Life and Public Affairs Council: The Christian Life and Public Affairs Council will assist churches in awareness of critical moral and social issues and in leading in Christian action to meet those needs; in applying the gospel to all areas of life; in demonstrating responsible concern for society; in broadening cooperative efforts and emphases; and, in mobilizing and equipping the constituency to be on mission in regard to moral and ethical concerns. Areas of involvement include family life, race relations, citizenship, hunger, and other special moral concerns. The council shall endeavor to provide an annual event of training in an area of moral and social concerns.
- **4. Discipleship Training Council:** The Discipleship Training Council will assist churches in starting, improving, and expanding Christian discipleship through their Discipleship Training programs to help churches equip church members for discipleship and personal ministry; teach Christian theology and Baptist doctrine, Christian ethics, Christian history, and church polity and organization; equip church leaders for service; and interpret and undergird the work of the church and denomination.
- **5. Evangelism Council:** The Evangelism Council will lead the Association (as churches and as programs) to address the priority of evangelism in its area and will include in its program church evangelism committee development; evangelism strategy development; mass evangelism; personal evangelism; rural and small church evangelism; metropolitan evangelism; specialized evangelism; renewal evangelism; and, evangelism prospect discovery. The council will coordinate with other appropriate councils and member churches Festival Ministries and special event ministries for evangelistic outreach in the association.
- **6. Family Ministry Council:** The Family Ministry Council will assist churches in development of family ministry programs and the conduct of family ministry activities which can be accomplished best on the Associational level. It will seek to minister to the distinctive and diverse needs of families .
- 7. Hispanic Ministries Council: The Hispanic Ministries Council will plan, coordinate, and provide ministry to the migrant/seasonal workers in the Association which may include, but shall not be limited to, Bible Study, special trips, medical and dental care, fellowship meals, as well as other needs that may arise. This council will plan, coordinate and provide ministry to permanent Hispanic residents.
- **8. Media Library Council:** (Also known as TACMO-The Associational Church Media Library Organization). The Media Library Council (TACMO) will assist churches in the establishment, development, and improvement of church media library services and educate persons in the use of media and provide media and media services to support the church in the achievement of its mission.

9. Missions Development Council: The Missions Development Council will lead the association (as churches and as programs) to address the priority missions frontiers in their area through work with Church Missions Development Councils, missions survey and analysis, church extension, language missions, church and community ministries, volunteer chaplaincy ministries, interfaith witness, black church relations, and, special ministries.

The Missions Development Council will be responsible for credentials-acceptance of new churches as more specifically set out in Article VI, C; church extension/new work; language missions; literacy missions; migrant ministry; festival ministries (in cooperation with Evangelism, Woman's Missionary Union & Brotherhood Councils); partnership ministry (State, Home and Foreign); mission projects (church and community ministries); seminary extension; volunteer chaplaincy; interfaith witness; disaster relief (in cooperation with Brotherhood Council); assist churches, as requested, with internal problems; assist groups seeking to organize a new church and work with the Liaison Committee as set out in Article VI, B, and such other duties as may be delegated by the Executive Board. The Missions Development Council shall plan and coordinate mission ministry projects in consultation with the councils and committees of the Association as needed. The council will make member churches aware of project needs and help secure volunteers.

10. Multi-Housing Council: The Multi-Housing Council will seek to involve churches in multi-housing ministries through on-call chaplaincy; group Bible studies; Backyard Bible Clubs/Mission Vacation Bible Schools; recreational activities; special events with music, drama, puppets, etc. It will develop relationships with multi-housing managers; provide training to churches in methodologies and strategies to reach such complexes; and, will make regular reports and recommendations to the Missions Development Council.

- 11. Music Council: The Music Council will seek to enhance the redemptive mission of churches through establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving their music ministries. It will provide musical experiences in congregational services; develop musical skills, attitudes, and understandings; witness and minister through music; interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.
- 12. Pastoral Ministries Council: The Pastoral Ministries Council will assist churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministry, vocational guidance, church administrative services, and Christian weekday education; conduct special projects and activities which enable churches to accomplish their mission, proclaim the gospel to believers and unbelievers, care for the church's members and other persons in the community and interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination. It will minister to the distinctive needs of pastors, deacons, church staff persons, church council, church officers and committee members, church vocations volunteers, and church weekday education staff. This council will include a Church Administration Consultant, Weekday Early Education Consultant, Vocational Guidance Consultant, Deacon Ministry Consultant, and Minister Support Consultant.
- 13. Seminary Extension Council: The Seminary Extension Council will seek to provide college-level theological education to ministers and laypersons and basic theological education to ministers who lack formal education. It will provide curriculum materials, administrative services, promotional materials, training materials for director and teachers, academic records, and certification of centers and teachers.

- 14. Senior Adult Council: The Senior Adult Council will plan activities and ministry projects for member church senior adults and will communicate any appropriate state and national conferences and Chautauguas to member churches. This council may include any elected leader of a member church senior adult organization.
- 15. Single Adult Council: The Single Adult Council will plan activities and ministry projects for member church single adults and will communicate any appropriate state and national conferences to member churches. This council may include any elected leader of a member church single adult organization.
- 16. Stewardship Council: The Stewardship Council will assist churches in development of individual and corporate stewardship, interpretation of Biblical teachings on stewardship, and elevation of individual giving and corporate mission giving in light of those teachings.
- 17. Student Ministries Council: The Student Ministries Council will assist the program of Baptist student ministries at the colleges within the Association or area; assist churches in establishing and supporting ministries with students; and, provide continuing training for workers with students in the churches in order to minister to the needs of college students in the churches and on the campuses in the area.
- 18. Sunday School Council: (Also known as ASSIST: Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team). The Sunday School Council will assist and challenge churches to improve and enlarge all areas of their Sunday School through planning, training, administration activities, consultation, program interpretation, and cooperative projects. It will encourage and assist churches to reach persons for Bible study, teach the Bible, witness to persons about Christ and lead persons to church membership, minister to Sunday School members and nonmembers, lead members to worship, and interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.
- 19. Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team: The Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team will assist churches in promoting missions, establishing, enlarging, and strengthening Woman's Missionary Union work, teaching missions, engaging in mission action and personal witnessing, supporting missions, and participating in the work of the church and the denomination
- **20. Youth Ministries Council:** The Youth Ministries Council shall plan youth related ministries for the Association including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

C. General duties of Standing Councils:

The Director and Council members of each council shall keep informed of materials, programs, and events related to the specific area of interest indicated by the title of said council; shall assist in training leadership and promoting the specific interest area within the Association; shall cooperate with other councils of the Association in coordinating emphases and assisting churches in their divinely appointed mission opportunities individually and collectively. Each council shall meet as often as necessary (at least quarterly) to fulfill its responsibilities in keeping with standards established by the Association for its respective organization. A written report from each council shall be made to the Annual Meeting of the Association. The Director of each respective council shall serve on the Associational Council of the Association.

. Election and Term:

The Standing Committees and Councils listed in Sections A and B of this Article, except the Woman's Missionary Union Council and Director, and the Chairperson/Director respectively thereof shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at the Annual Meeting of the Association. The term of office shall be one year beginning at the adjournment of the Annual Meeting in which the election was held.

Other Committees and Councils:

The Association may create such other committees and councils, not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation and these Bylaws, as may from time to time be required, and in furtherance thereof, the Executive Board shall be empowered to establish and appoint interim standing committees and councils. The Nominating Committee shall give recommendations to fill these new positions to the Executive Board. At the next Annual Meeting of the Association, messengers shall consider whether to amend these Bylaws by their inclusion as new standing committees and councils.

Special Standing Committees, Councils, Auxiliary, &

Institutional/Agency Representatives:

Special Standing Committees, Councils, Auxiliary, and Institutional/Agency Representatives of the Association shall be the Committee on Nominations, Associational Council, Woman's Missionary Union and Institutional/Agency Representatives, whose membership and responsibilities are as follows:

- 1. Committee on Nominations: The Committee on Nominations shall consist of three persons who shall be nominated by the officers and elected by the Executive Board at the meeting prior to the September meeting. The Committee on Nominations shall serve until the annual meeting when its report is made to the Association. The duty of the Committee on Nominations shall be to nominate the Nominating Committee at the Annual Meeting and to recommend to the Executive Board individuals to fill any Nominating Committee vacancies during the year. In the event of a vacancy between any Executive Board or Annual Meeting, the Committee on Nominations shall appoint a replacement to begin immediate interim service until election of a nominee for the term of office at the next Executive Board or Annual Meeting following the vacancy occurrence.
- **2. Associational Council:** The Associational Council shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, and Directors of all Standing Councils as set out in Article XI, B. The Council shall plan and correlate the calendar and program activities of the program councils of the Association and make any needed recommendations to the Executive Board/Annual Meeting.
- **3.** Woman's Missionary Union: The Woman's Missionary Union of Liberty Baptist Association is an auxiliary of Liberty Baptist Association and elects its director, officers, and council. These elected officers are included for information in the Reports of the Association and the Director of Woman's Missionary Union serves on the Standing Council and Executive Board with full voting privileges. The Woman's Missionary Union is governed by their own Constitution and Bylaws.
- **4. Institutional/Agency Representatives:** One person to serve as the Institutional/Agency Representative within the Association shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association for a term of one year. The representative will receive information from the respective institution/agency during the year and shall prepare a report for the Annual Meeting of the Association.

- **5.** Partnership Coordinators: Partnership Coordinators (Foreign, Home, State, Associational Missions) shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association for a term of one year. Partnership Coordinators shall receive information, work with the Missions Development Council, provide leadership and orientation for partnership project participants as needed. Partnership Coordinators shall prepare a report for the Annual Meeting of the Association of work accomplished.
- **6.** Assistant Treasurer: The Assistant Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected for a term of one year. The Assistant Treasurer shall be eligible for re-election each year. In the absence of the Treasurer due to illness, emergency or resignation, the Assistant Treasurer will be responsible for signing checks, maintaining records, make deposits, and paying bills that are due. The Assistant Treasurer shall function for the Treasurer as requested by the Treasurer within reason in carrying out the duties of Treasurer as an officer of the Association only under emergency, illness, or resignation circumstances.

ARTICLE XII

ADOPTION & AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS & CORPORATE DOCUMENTS

A. Adoption:

These Bylaws shall be considered adopted and in immediate effect when a majority of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F., at an annual meeting or a special meeting shall vote in favor thereof. This vote shall be taken not less than thirty days after mailing a copy of these Bylaws to each member.

B. Amendment:

These Bylaws, the Articles of Incorporation, or any parts thereof may be amended, altered, or repealed only by a majority vote of "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F., at the Annual Meeting or a special meeting of the Association.

C. Preservation:

A copy of all original corporate records, including but not limited to the Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws, and Personnel Policies, shall be maintained at all times by the Clerk in the office of the Association; and copies of the same shall be kept in separate locations. All amendments to said documents or to any provisions thereof shall be prepared promptly after adoption by the Association; and the Secretary shall cause the same and copies to be typed or printed in proper form and attached to the originals of respective documents and kept as above stated.

ARTICLE XIII GENERAL AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

A. Fiscal Year:

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from September 1 to August 31.

B. Reports:

Reports of officers, committees, councils, and church letters to the Association shall cover the period from September 1 to August 31. All reports for the annual meeting shall be in writing for inclusion in the published Book of Reports and shall be limited to 250 words.

C. Audit:

An annual audit or review of the financial records of the Association shall be

conducted by an independent accounting firm elected by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Finance Committee.

D. Records:

The membership rolls, minutes of meetings, and annual reports shall be available at all reasonable times for all reasonable purposes.

E. Policy Manual:

The Policy Manual shall contain documents of procedure and the adopted Budget and Nominations Report not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation and these Bylaws from various committees and councils that have been recommended to and approved by the Executive Board and/or Annual Meeting. These policies will be governing rules and procedures of the respective committees and councils of the Association. They may be amended by the Executive Board and/or Annual Meeting by a simple vote of persons present provided a quorum has been met.

F. Seal:

There shall appear within the center of the Corporate Seal of the Association the words "Corporate Seal," around which shall appear two concentric circles within which will be inscribed Liberty Baptist Association of North Carolina, 1832. Such seal, as impressed on the margin hereof, is hereby adopted as the corporate seal of the Corporation.

G. Gender:

The use of terms in these Bylaws that may in other contexts tend to denote gender is intended to be neutral as to gender. The masculine shall be deemed to include the feminine and the feminine deemed to include the masculine.

H. Majority:

Unless these Bylaws or The General Statutes of North Carolina otherwise require a different number, a majority of those in attendance at any general or special meeting of members or the Executive Board with a quorum present shall be required to effect any action.

Stuart White gave report on to South Africa Partnership Ministry, after which Rev. Ron Pierce, a member of the February teat to South Africa, shared about experiences. Reflections on South Africa: Trip Dates: February 13-1997, Liberty and Central Baptist Associations. Team Leader: Dr. Ronald S. Pierce, Senior Pastor, Fi Baptist Church, Thomasville. South Africa has made an amazing transformation, seemingly overnight, frobeing a proponent of racial segregation to an advocate of multiracial tolerance. There is a remarkable spin of cooperation in South Africa, and we can only pray that this spirit will continue to exist as the citizens that country travel the difficult road that lies ahead.

Earlier this year I served as group leader of a team of six who traveled to Richard's Bay, South Afric February 13-27. Other members of our team were Clyde Crook, First Baptist, Thomasville; Marcus Campbe Pastor of Conrad Memorial in High Point; Bryon Tabor, Charles Mackintosh, and Gary Green of Fa Baptist Church, Archdale.

Richard's Bay lies approximately 100 miles to the Northeast of the city of Durban on the Indi Ocean. It is located in the Zwazulu Natal territory. The trip to South Africa is a lengthy one. It took of group 30 hours to arrive in Richard's Bay. The 14 1/2 hours flight from Miami to Capetown is one of longest flights in the world. Our trip took us from Greensboro to Charlotte to Miami to Durban to Richar Bay. We traveled a total of more than 20,000 miles. The weather was tropical. February is the middle summer over there. Daytime temperatures were in the 90s and evening temperatures were in the 80s we extreme humidity. Our mission was to work with the Richard's Bay church and to do evangelis outreach into the schools of the area through puppet shows, archery demonstrations, and proclaiming gospel in a variety of ways. While we were there we had opportunity to share our faith with children in sev schools. We also were given the opportunity to preach in four of the churches in the area and to provide so instruction and training for the members of the Richard's Bay church.

For a period of ten days, we shared with school groups, daycare groups, Bible study groups and wentire congregations. Out of the more than 4,000 children with whom we shared, more than 500 me personal decisions for Christ. In a school assembly at Richardia Primary School, of the approximately a children present nearly 300 responded to the invitation to receive Christ. We were given permission to follow-up counseling after the assembly with those who responded. At the Brackenham Primary School predominantly Indian school, the entire student population of more than 800 children attended an outded puppet show in 100 degree heat. The students carried their chairs on their heads as they came outside a gathered in the hot sun. We were not allowed to offer an invitation but were well received. At the end of a program, we were invited by the principal of the school, who was Hindu, to come to his office for teal thanked us profusely for coming and for sharing "our gospel" with the children of the school.

I was amazed at the strict discipline in the schools. The children were extremely polite and w

ehaved. We held assemblies and did puppet and archery presentations for groups ranging in size from 50 800. And in each of those situations order was maintained in a remarkable way. I cannot help but contrast to what I see in so many of our schools here in America.

After our programs, the children would line up to speak to us and see our autographs. We told them we were not that important but Jesus was. They wanted our autographs anyway. We handed out crosses,

merican flags and other small items which we had brought along with us.

We also held a youth rally on our last Friday in Richard's Bay which drew nearly 250 children and oung people to the church. Many of those present made decisions for Christ as well. Dozens of children ave their hearts to Christ on that occasion.

We were hosted by families from the Richard's Bay church. They were kind and hospitable to us and any of them possessed a wonderful sense of humor. We became great friends as we labored together and swe grew in our understanding of one another. They shared with us their hopes for their country and talked great deal about their present frustrations and fears.

The sheer beauty of the country of South Africa is striking. It boasts a wide range of natural tractions from its borders: the rocky coast of the Cape, the rich farmland and rolling hills of the Transvaal, e majestic peaks of the Drakensburg range and the wide beaches of Zululand. The country also has more an 300 game and nature reserves, which help to make it one of Africa's premier travel destinations. It is

uly a land of contrast and enchantment, in many ways vast and untamed.

The diversity of the landscape mirrors the diversity of its people. There are 12 official languages in outh Africa (think about the debate over Spanish usage here). Cultural differences are less important there an here. Whites still play a prominent role (most are of Dutch or British extraction), but 72% of the citizens South Africa are black or "colored" (that indicating a mixture of white/black/Indian or some other racial akeup).

I met some of the most intelligent and articulate people there I have ever met. I also saw countless hers living on the hillsides in grass huts and in lean-to shacks with tin roofs. In Zulu territory, mud huts ad crude one room structures dot the hillsides and the children gather along the roadside to play. I met ung men who had only gone to school for three or four years and others who were high school graduates uping to attend the university.

In Capetown, the first sight I saw as our plane descended was a gigantic squatter camp where tens thousands live in abject poverty. This in the midst of one of the most beautiful resorts in the world. apetown, as you know, was one of the finalists for the 2004 summer Olympics. So prosperity and poverty ist side by side. That accounts for much of the instability that you see in the country today. Unemployment a tremendous problem and so is underemployment. Unemployment is extremely high in South Africa, aching 80% in some areas. Recently, the Richard's Bay Coal Terminal hired seven new workers. They had are than 1,000 persons apply for these jobs. The people there can't believe that in the window of most of a fast food restaurants there is a "Help Wanted" sign and that our unemployment rate is only about 3 reent.

The "substrata" of underemployed workers is a real dilemma. You see, those who have no jobs sell zir services to anyone who will employ them—they work as maids, gardeners, lawn maintenance workers, and they are paid at a rate of 20 to 40 rand per week. The exchange rate is approximately 4.5 rand uals one dollar. So, you can see that we are talking about working for between five and ten dollars per tek. The base tax rate is 35% with everyone earning over 18,000 dollars paying 45%. Only 15% of the pulation pays taxes.

Apartheid left deep scars just as slavery did in this country. The new government faces many allenges. Most of those we spoke to gave high marks to President Nelson Mandela. Many of them are neerned, however, that changes will not be implemented fast enough to avoid anarchy. The black majority mbers about 30 million and the white minority numbers only about 5 million. But most of the qualified, shly educated people are white and most of the resources are still in their hands.

My impression is that the jury is still out concerning whether South Africans will have the patience stay the course while change that would benefit everyone is enacted. Much of the need of South Africans 1 be summed up in the words Education and Economics. But alas there is a great need and that is Spiritual 2d and it is the most compelling of all.

Muslim influence is very strong in South Africa. A large percentage of government officials are

Muslim. A recent issue of the <u>Biblical Recorder</u> carried an article on the front page about the strong Muslin effort to convert South Africa into a Muslim state within the next decade. One cannot help but feel that Sou Africa stands on the verge of something dramatic—good or bad. We, as North Carolina Baptists, have to privilege and responsibility of helping to influence the future of this picturesque and formidable country at its people for our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

The highlight of our trip so far as I am concerned was the beautiful and creative people we met. It made some wonderful friends. I have received several faxes from the family I stayed with since I arrived bathome. Following are excerpts from one of them which I received two weeks after arriving back in Nor Carolina: "What a lasting impression you have left on our lives here in Richard's Bay. So much has happen since you left and the effects of your ministry are still being felt. What a privilege it was to have you stay in o homes and share Jesus with us. Some of us were in tears when you left. You see you crept into our hearts at it is sad to think we may not see you again. Who knows what the future holds? Thank you for your wonderfuninistry into our lives. We hope to be able to take up the tremendous opportunities provided through the partnership to extend God's Kingdom and work in this area."

On the morning of our team's departure, my host family—the Van Rooyens gave me a <u>knobkierie</u> crooked wooden stick with a fistlike knob which serves as a handle) with the word "SIMUNYE" written on It was made by a Zulu man in the area. The word means "we are one." They said to me, "We are one in Lord Truly we are, and it is a gift that I shall always treasure.

I certainly hope that some of you sitting out there this evening will have the same opportunity the Clyde Crook and I had to go to South Africa. As this partnership continues I am praying that more doors we open and that we in the Liberty Baptist Association will respond in the spirit of Christ to the needs are requests which will come our way during these coming years.

The higher sense we have of our own responsibility the more considerate we are in judging others, and the more we sympathize with them in their struggles and trials. The world is moving so fast; everyone is known by a number, and the church is the only place where loneliness is taken seriously. It is aloneness that yields to despair! William Morris says: "Fellowship is life, lack of fellowship is death; fellowship is heaven, and lack of fellowship is hell." One person alone is no match for powerful armies, whether they be armies of entrenched evil or armies of the powers of darkness in our own souls. "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one for another." (John 13:35). "I have showed you all things, how that so laboring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the word of the Lord Jesus, how He said, It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 20:36). The heaviest burden becomes supportable when shared with loving sympathy. Unless the fellowship in the Christian assembly is far superior to that which can be found anywhere else in society, then Christians can talk about the transforming love and power of Jesus til they are hoarse, but people are not going to listen very hard. The basic problem in the Southern Baptist Convention is that from the top to the bottom we have replaced the role of servanthood with pride, popularity, and prestige. Too many of us want to be "at ease in Zion" before we ever get to glory.

3. "Cast thy burden upon the Lord, and He shall sustain thee."

And tribulations of this life. When the burden of care was proving too much even for a rugged man like Moses, God gave him a promise: "My Presence shall go with thee, and I will give thee rest." (Exodus 33: 14). There is no sorrow, no pain, no frustration, no grief, which He cannot weave into His pattern, though its threads may have been spun by evil, ignorant, or foolish hands, and when the whole pattern is spread before our eyes, we shall have no complaints. Marveling at the Weaver's skill, we shall repeat the words of Mark 12:11: "This was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes." We live in daily agony of mind and of spirit because we do not cast our care on God: "Casting all your care upon Him, for He careth for you." (I Peter 5:7).

"If the world from you withheld of its silver and its gold,

And you have to get along with meager fare,

Just remember, in His Word, how He feeds the little bird;

Take your burden to the Lord and leave it there!"

Special Recognitions: Rev. R. N. Hardin expressed appreciation to Rev. Leonard Rollins for his service as Director of Missions and as a pastor in Liberty Baptist Association. The Missions Development Council recommended that Rev. Leonard Rollins, retired Director of Missions, serving liberty Baptist Association from 1963 to 1992, be named Director of Missions Emeritus, with all the nonors and privileges of the said office. A Certificate was presented to Rev. Rollins. Recommendation was seconded and passed unanimously. The Missions Development Council also ecommended that the Liberty Baptist Association Conference Room be named "The Leonard L. and olly W. Rollins Conference Room, in recognition of faithful service as Director of Missions from 963 to 1992, and Office Secretary from 1965 to 1992." Recommendation was seconded and carried nanimously. A plaque was presented to Rev. Rollins and he expressed appreciation to the Association on behalf of him and Polly. The Mission Development Council further made ecommendation that the Media Center of the Liberty Baptist Association be named "The Roxie King Beeson Media Center, in honor of all the work done by Mrs. Beeson to establish a functioning Media Center and Library for the Association." Recommendation was seconded and passed unanimously. plaque was presented to Mrs. Beeson, who was also accompanied by her family. Mrs. Beeson xpressed appreciation to the Association for this honor.

Miscellaneous Business: Dr. Ron Pierce, Chairman of the Annual Sessions Program committee, moved the adoption of the Book of Reports and the minutes of the meeting as the official eport of the meeting. Motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

The afternoon session was adjourned after prayer by Rev. R. N. Hardin.

The evening session was preceded by an organ concert by Wayne Garner. Afterwards, Mary Martin led in singing hymns "Standing on the Promises of God" and "Send the Light." Mrs. Vernelle Greene, Associational Historian read the history of **Holloways Baptist Church.** Dr. Richard Capps was recognized to give the Director of Missions report.

Director of Missions Presentation-"Risk Something New"

Matthew 10:5, 15: Jesus sent out the 12 disciples with these instructions-"Go to the lost, meet the physical needs of the hurting-go two by two, house to house. Spend your time with those who respond. Leave and shake the dust from your feet for those who do not respond-they will have their divine judgement."

Opportunities continue to provide challenge of ministry in the days ahead as we carefully discover what God wants us to be about in His vineyard - Liberty Baptist Association.

- I. A prison ministry of Christmas gifts has grown into an opportunity to teach graduate level Biblical courses to a group of prisoners at Davidson Correctional Center. One of the men came up to me on registration night and declared his desire to understand what it means to be called of Goa to ministry. Now he is finding out. Our first course is "Formation in Ministry." A wife of one of the prisoners called to see if she could study along with her husband. She purchased a set of materials so they could share the course content together. He is sharing with her the class lectures. Cost per prisoner per course is \$30. Continuing contributions are welcome. Now we have an added opportunity of beginning work with the Women's Prison through Christmas gifts as well. Who knows what opportunities this will open for us in future ministry.
- II. A request came in the Spring for the possibility of a service of worship for the vendors or Sundays at 8:30 am at the U.S. Flea Market, Linwood-185. As services began, attendance at U.S. Flea Market in Linwood has amazed me. We have averaged between 10-25 persons each week including children. During this time, a vendor died and his widow has become active. Four vendors shared their desire to continue the services since, as active members of their churches, they were greatly missing a time of worship on Sundays. Prayer requests are given as needs are shared-i.e one vendor who is a grandmother has a grandson in prison in Rocky Mount, another requested prayer for a month for her son's health problems. At the second Sunday of the services, the group took up a "love gift" for the speaker. The speaker requested the group consider giving the gift to the Seminary Extension Prisoner Project at Davidson Prison. Each Sunday since, the group has averaged gifts of \$15-\$45. If this continues, they will have made it possible for two full courses to be taught for the 15 prisoners. This is certainly an unexpected blessing from our "risking something new."
- III. I am grateful for the churches that participated in our area <u>demographic study of ou</u> <u>Association</u>. We discovered who the unchurched people groups are and what lies ahead to help discover what is needed to reach these persons. Demographics are a marketing tool to discove persons who live in a particular area as to their faith involvement and all the primary interests of their lives. In discovering the differences in persons in our churches and the unchurched without called a divergence gap (barriers to involvement), we can have a greater opportunity to develop strategies and ministries to assist our churches in reaching these unchurched persons.
- IV. At our Missions Development Council Retreat with Bobby Stafford, BSCNC, held Septembe 8, 1997, three major areas of concern surfaced which will generate future recommendations at later time from information gleaned from the MAPS Study. Information for LBA churches:
 - (1) The need to provide training/equipping/resourcing for our churches to reach the ag segment of 18-44 years olds in the population area of our Association. This is the fastes growing segment of the unchurched.

- (2) The need to establish new churches for the cultural diversity that exists in our Association as well as discover areas where no Baptist churches exist...Anglo, Hispanic, African-Americans, Asians. 45% of our Association's area population go to no one's church.
- (3) Assist our churches in facing constant change. Population growth will be 5-8% in the entire area of LBA. Projected population will go, in next 20 years, from 136,000+ to 166,000+...30,000 new people. At our present ratio of churches to general population-that results in the need for five new churches during this time period to simply keep up with growth. The retreat revealed our primary divergence issues are these:
- (1) Our churches have an older segment (54-up) membership percent than the general population of the Association. We are facing the loss of at least 2-3 generations to faith belief/active church participation...a serious concern. Our church memberships grow older as the general population grows younger.
- (2) Age differences/generations require a balance in worship traditional, praise, and contemporary, especially to reach persons ages 18-44.
- (3) Population growth in every area of the Association creates a particular challenge to reach the secular mindset of today. Children of the 60's, who left the church, have raised a generation of children who have no faith and no interest in church attendance.
- (4) Increases in ethnic population groups will continue. The largest groups in LBA now are the Hispanic and Asian peoples.
- (5) Generational clashes are real. How we do church is in a state of change. Generational contrasts as to "how we do church" are...doing versus talking; program studies versus Biblical application to life; mission projects versus uninvolved support of missions (send our money rather than go ourselves) and others. Generational differences are real and a growing source of potential conflict.
- our goal for the next three years will be to do all we can to meet the challenges before us with tentionality as we serve our churches.
- 1. Dwight Reagan-Missionary to BASA Association, Durban, South Africa, called to bring reetings to our Annual Meeting from the BASA Association (East Indian churches). At their nnual meeting, they discussed requesting the following in the near future:
 - (1) Three (3) Construction Teams to work on a single project over 8-10 weeks consecutively.
 - (2) Associational Education Consultation
 - (3) Sunday School Team for age level training.
- II. Rev. Brian Jardine will be with us Friday, October 10-Wednesday, October 15. Rev. Jardine the North Coast/Natal-KwaZulu Coordinator and President of Baptist Union of South Africa. He ill be speaking Sunday, 8:30 am at North Lexington; 10:00 am-Carolina Memorial Baptist Inurch; 11:00 am-Oak Hill Memorial Baptist Church; meeting with our WMU Council; 6:00 pm-toner's Grove Baptist Church; and 6:00 pm, Wednesday at Park Place Baptist Church.

<u>onclusion:</u> Thank you for the hundreds of volunteers who help LBA churches be on mission to each people. Thanks for the total financial support of \$160,481 of which \$118,297 provided our ssociational Budget needs. Praise the Lord for your faithfulness in giving-the largest gift to any BA Budget support in our history. "Risk Something New" is the very heart of the Gospel. God rant us His leadership and presence as we serve together as His vessels in the mission field called iberty Baptist Association. I covet your prayers as I seek to be as effective as I can in serving our hurches, pastors, staff ministers, and the mission needs about us.

UDGET EXPLANATIONS AND INFORMATION

Secretary's salary based on \$8.66 per hour - 28 hour week. Social Security is 7.65%.

No Staff salary increases were given for 1997-1998. DOM requested increase life insurance-\$762.00 transferred from Missionary Housing. Missionary Housing decreased by \$1,000.

Clerk's salary will be paid as a single payment by August 31 each year.

Treasurer's salary will be used to provide software support of our financial accounting system. This is a gift back to the Association from the Treasurer.

Each church is requested to give consideration to support Associational Missions by a percentage of undesignated income. The request is for a maximum of 5%. Each church is encouraged to begin at a percentage and increase the percentage by 1/2 to 1% a year until the goal of 5% has been reached. This will allow our Association to be self-supporting in all our ministry endeavors. To reach this budget, each church will need to give an average of 2 1/2% of undesignated income to LBA.

This year's budget represents 2.5% decrease of the 1996-97 Budget.

Item 364 represents 5 annuals per church. If churches wish to order more than five, they may be purchased for \$3.00 each.

"Risk Something New" at Davidson Medical Ministries Clinic

isk Something New" may be a theme for the Liberty Association, but it is a state of being at vidson Medical Ministries Clinic (DMMC). In the almost 6 years that we have been in eration, change and risk seem to go hand in hand. I believe that everyday I open my doors I sk," actually I "trust" that the staff, volunteers, and funding necessary to care for our clients will there.

isk" according to Webster means: 1. "chance of defeat, injury, loss, etc.; 2. expose to risk; 3. ur the risk of." As I reflect on these meanings as they relate to DMMC, I find my self estioning the chances we take and the impact it will have on the lives of the people we reach.

we risk exposure? I think that we do. Every time I get emotionally involved in the lives of clients, I risk exposure. So, do I just perform or ask my staff and volunteers to perform on a ely clinical basis? I think not. These are the lives and health of individuals (people) who often re no one else to care for them. Instead we try to listen and understand how it would feel to re no money, no insurance, and to be sick. Not just a cold sick but really sick; to have insulin bendent diabetes, or high blood pressure. To need medications on a daily basis that, without it, ald cost you your life. Tell me how to do that without risking something of yourself? Tell me you would want to?

we chance defeat, loss or injury? Sometimes! We must substitute risk for faith as we look at sissue. Each day I have to believe that money will come in to keep our doors open; that unteers will come to provide the talents needed to perform our many tasks. Each month, I st work to make these things happen. Letters to churches, speeches at civic and church ups, tours to prospective volunteers and/or contributors, endless phone calls to recruit and edule volunteers—these are only a few of my daily tasks. At this juncture I must pause to say: ank You, Lord" for meeting our needs.

we incur the risk....? Gladly. The alternative is not pretty. If we don't do what we do, then are will people go? To the emergency rooms? Maybe. But, who will pay? We will with our dollars or they will incur more bad debts which only makes getting out of a poverty situation re impossible. What about their medicines? Even if they go to the doctor, what good is it if y don't have their medication? Knowing that you have diabetes is only part of the problem. I must also know how to eat, be encouraged to exercise and be able to take your medication y. If not, then knowing you have diabetes is a possible death sentence or life imprisonment. I face amputated legs or at the very least poor circulation and wounds that won't heal. Your neys stop working correctly and the need for dialysis could be in your future. And your vision vly goes away. That's what happens when you don't incur the risk.

Davidson Medical Ministries we are trying to make a difference. We impact the lives of ple in need. So far in the six months of this fiscal year we have seen 594 clients in the medical ic, 228 in dental clinic, and 3,205 in pharmacy clinic. Many of these number represent the e people, as we see them on a regular basis and provide medication monthly. We have filled 139 prescriptions at a customer value of \$539,889.71. We have provided \$70,222.00 in lical/dental services. Lexington Memorial Hospital has provided \$10,862.00 worth of ratory and radiology services.

Our budget this year is \$305,280.00 with \$170,000.00 allocated for the purchase of medications. continue to receive money only from private sources. We are not a United Way agency and receive no country, state or federal funds. Davidson Medical Ministries continues to be owned and operated by the people of Davidson County for the people of Davidson County. We churches to put us in their budgets, we ask businesses to pledge an annual amount. We do an antiletter campaign to individuals asking for a one time or monthly gift. We write grants to private foundations. We accept memorials and honorariums and make the appropriate acknowledgement.

"NEW" is the exciting part of what's going on at DMMC. In reality there is always something n Volunteers frequently ask: "What have you changed this week?" That's because we are commit to doing things the best that we can with what we have to work with. So nothing is written in st and everything is subject to change. Everything except our mission!

DMMC is embarking upon some new and exciting tasks. It should come as no surprise to any that knows us that we need a new or refurbished facility. Not because what we have is not g enough, it's simply not big enough. We need more space. We hope to either build onto our exis building or to build a completely new facility. In an effort to do that DMMC is looking at feasibility of a \$3-5 million dollar capital campaign. Now that is a risk and a leap of faith!

In order to keep our doors open in a long term setting it is becoming increasingly clear that we make the develop a funding base that will meet at least a major portion of our budget on an annual basis. Only way this will happen is to have an endowment large enough that will produce that kind income. The recent gift that DMMC received from the late Dorothy Shell was applied to endowment as will any and all other major gifts of that kind. This will allow their gift to keep helping for years to come instead of being used in one annual budget. It can certainly make difference for many years.

Lastly, I must tell you about our expansions. DMMC has always known that we are only scratch the surface of what really needs to be done in indigent health care for our county. But we continually striving to do more. Beginning in January, if all goes well, we will begin a partners with Davidson County Community College providing nursing services two days a week in addit to the two medical clinics we already have. Nursing students and instructors will be using our fact to assist our clients with expanded services. Only God knows where else this could lead. ultimate goal is to have our clinic open everyday.

Thank you for your time as I share my dreams and some of my realities with you. I thank you your continued support as an association, in your local churches and as individuals. I hope th have provided you with just a glimpse of what is happening in our world. I also hope that it sparked a place in your heart to examine what you could do on an individual basis or as a chu group to help us continue to help people.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

e fields ARE "white unto harvest" with a population in excess of 136,604 (144,806 in the year 00) and 45% of those persons unchurched. There is opportunity for all churches in our sociation to reach people.

e have completed much of our MAPS/Vista Demographic Study Church Project as a pilot oject of NC with assistance from the BSCNC. Demographics are a marketing tool to discover rsons who live in a particular area as to their faith involvement and all the interests of their lives. It have discovered the difference in persons in our churches and the unchurched without. This called the divergence gap...what concerns keep people from faith involvement. Our goal is to be equip our churches over the next six years to become far more sensitive to the needs of the churched of our area. Challenges learned from the study are:

- (1) Generational differences: Needs as to worship (traditional, praise, contemporary); Study of the Bible; and Ministry Project Involvement. Generational differences are genuine and a source of growing conflicts in churches.
- (2) Primary concern to do all we can to reach persons 18-45 the fastest growing unchurched segment of our population.
- (3) The challenge of increased culturally diverse populations in our Associational Area the need of new ministry points, especially for the Hispanic population, and new church starts for these persons.

e South Africa Partnership will be growing in years ahead. The Natal and BASA Associations or opportunities for ministry. Rev. and Mrs. Dennis, Jones, IMB Missionaries, Durban, SA, are visit LBA October 7-9, 1997. Rev. Brian Jardine, Natal Province Coordinator and President of Baptist Union of SA, will be in LBA churches October 10-15, 1997.

r continued focus of work with the **Christian Activity Center**, **East St. Louis**, **IL** is our primary rth American Mission Board project. We hope to continue to provide VBS next summer in the r churches and one mission in **Grenada**. A special word of thanks for all that our churches did providing Bibles, Hymnals, VBS supplies, and school supplies for these efforts.

have begun two new mission ministries for our Association this past year. We have begun a **nday Morning Vendor's Worship Service at the U.S. Flea Market, Linwood.** We have raged 15 to 30 in attendance since we began in June, 1997. The vendor's have taken a "love ring," averaging \$17-\$29 per week, each Sunday we have been there for our Seminary Extension bks for prisoners.

second new mission project is the **Seminary Extension Prison Studies** on Tuesday evenings Davidson Correctional Center for Men, Lexington. The project consists of 16 courses to be taught at the next four years. The Project Description is as follows:

- Courses will be taught on Tuesday evenings. Each course will cost approximately \$30 per prisoner (a total of \$510 for each course). Text books will be housed in LBA office and used as often as needed.
- 2. Each course will be for 14 weeks 2 hours each with a 15 minute break each session. Total time 2 hours, 15 minutes, for 27 hours of instruction.
 - 3. Teaching outlines, set of text books, and pre-printed tests are provided at no cost to each teacher.
 - Each class will have a minimum of 10 students.
 - 5. Classes will be taught in the Prison Classrooms at Davidson Correctional Center.
 - 6. Each teacher will complete a volunteer application and a one time volunteer orientation at the prison.
 - BSCNC will provide per course a compensation for teachers and provide 1/2 the registration cost per prisoner.

HOST CHURCHES HISTORIES Center Hill Baptist Church History

The Center Hill Baptist Church was established as a direct result of a revival held in the Fall of 207 at the Center Hill School House by Rev. S. D. Swaim, who was then Pastor of Jersey Baptist hurch. He was assisted by Rev. E. L. Weston of Cooleemee. At the close of the revival on October 3, 1907, a council met for the purpose of organizing the Center Hill Baptist Church. It was named honor of the school which was located on a hill a short distance from where the church now stands.

In this same meeting, a building committee was appointed which consisted of Marcellus allimore, A. V. Miller and T. M. Sheets. This committee began action immediately. Marcellus allimore gave one acre of land and another was purchased from him for \$16.00. About this time I people joined the new church by letter and 14 others were received as candidates for baptism.

The first church was a white frame building. The church was lighted by four kerosene lamps ispended from the ceiling and was heated with two cast iron stoves. There was a "pump organ" ith feet pedals for the music. The original building was later brick veneered and eight Sunday chool rooms added along with a basement. In 1957 an Education Building was erected with 28 assrooms.

In August of 1974 the old church was torn down to make way for a new sanctuary to be erected the site of the original building. On August 10, 1975 the first morning worship service was held the new sanctuary.

The first complete history of the church was recorded in the Liberty Association minutes in 1966. e History was again recorded in the Associational minutes with updated information in 1982.

On August 15, 1982 at the Annual Homecoming, the 75th Anniversary of the church was served with special services. In September of that same year the church hosted the second day of e Associational Meeting.

In 1983 a lot adjoining the church parking lot was purchased and the whole area was paved. A Il time youth worker was hired for the Summer months that year.

In March, 1984 the last payment was made on the church loan for building the sanctuary.

\$70,000 was borrowed in August of 1975 to finance the building of the new sanctuary.

In June 1985 a new Allen organ was installed in the church sanctuary. In August of the same year, chimes were installed as a Memorial to Charlie Wall, Jr. by the family. These chimes play at different times during the week and before services.

In 1988 a controlled sound system was installed in the sanctuary. The same year the Pastor went again on a preaching mission with a group from the Liberty Association to Southern Brazil.

In 1989 a Youth Director was secured to work on weekends during the Summer months. By 1996 the floor covering in the Fellowship Hall had been replaced, along with the air conditioning unit, and the heat and air conditioning system for the sanctuary had also been replaced. New roofs had been placed on the church, Fellowship Hall and the parsonage. The chimes were updated to make it possible to play from CDs, giving a larger range of music at a lower cost.

Since the beginning of the church it as been lead by 16 Pastors. The Liberty Association Annual Meeting has been hosted by the church in 1914, 1940, 1957, 1966, 1982, and again in 1997.

In 1997 the Women on Mission Organization purchased a commercial gas cook stove for the Fellowship Hall. On October 18, 1997, the church will be 90 years old. A Founders Day Celebration is planed for Sunday, October 19, 1997.

The church today is in a very progressive area, surrounded by housing developments, as well as many large businesses. What a challenge for the future!

Holloways Baptist Church History

Sometime in the late 1700s, probably around 1795, Holloways Baptist Church began as an arm, or mission, of Jersey Baptist Church which was at that time a member of the Yadkin Association that covered a large area of Northwest North Carolina. As was true of most other churches of that era, worshipers met only once a month, having to share pastors with others churches in the area who served as many as four churches at a time. In 1799 the Yadkin Association was scheduled to meet at Jersey, but as they had no meeting house that year, they met at Holloways instead.

At some point, Yadkin Association transferred the membership of Holloways from Jersey to Toms Creek Baptist Church which had been constituted as a church in 1811. The earliest record of that transfer is found in the Toms Creek minutes of March 1820 where reference is made to the "arm at Holloways." In January 1831, less than two years before the split between the missionary and primitive factions in the Baptist church which formed the Liberty Baptist Association, Toms Creek granted letters of dismissal to the members at Holloways so that they could formally organize themselves into Holloways Baptist Church. When the split occurred in late 1832, a majority of the membership supported the mission cause and held on to the house of worship, but the church clerk, supporting the anti-mission effort, held the early church records. As the numbers of those who withdrew continued to diminish over the years, they probably ceased to exist as an organization sometime after 1850, and those early records have been lost to posterity.

Land donated by Mr. William Holloway became the site of the first church building, or meeting house, which was constructed of logs in 1831. This is also the site of the present structure. The construction date of the present sanctuary building is unknown. As it was being built, Mr. Robert Frank Shirley sat quietly at a meeting concerning new windows for the church. After much thought, he spoke up and said, "I'll give money for the first stained-glass window." Others soon followed suit and the church got its new windows.

Before the Civil War, slaves belonging to white church members and free blacks were also included in the church membership, there being no colored (or black) churches in this section of the county at that time. Over the years the church maintained a good record among the churches of the

Liberty Association for good, solid work and Christian giving. This was, no doubt, due to the leadership of Deacon W. Franklin Stoner who was active in the work of the association and made it a point whenever possible to attend the annual sessions of the association and the Baptist State Convention.

The year 1900 proved to be an eventful year as the Woman's Missionary Union was organized under the leadership of Mrs. J. F. Peters. In this same year, members from the Southmont Community left Holloways Church to form Stoner's Grove Baptist Church. Holloways and Stoner's Grove shared both pastor and parsonage until 1962 when the present parsonage was built and a full-time pastor was secured by Holloways.

In 1939 other members left Holloways Church to form Mountain View Baptist Church, and in 1942 Floyd Baptist Church was formed from another portion of the Holloways membership.

Around 1928 Sunday School rooms were added to the existing sanctuary. This new addition at first housed the community school which was later relocated to Southmont. In 1969 additional classrooms were added and a baptistery was installed; baptisms were previously held at High Rock Lake and, in later years, in neighboring churches. In 1972 the present building was air conditioned, and extensive renovations were made to both the interior and the exterior in 1975 when a brick reneer was applied to the building.

A decision to increase the total church plant by the addition of a fellowship/educational building was made in 1990 with construction scheduled to begin in 1991. The addition was completed in the all of the same year with no outstanding debt. Upgrading continued with the purchase of a new

organ in 1995 and the installation of new carpet in the sanctuary in 1996.

Pastors who have served this church since the split in 1832 include Eli Carroll, Alfred Kinney, Aaron Yarbrough, John A Cornish, Pinkney Oliver, Hezekiah Morton, S. A. Roper, J. H. Booth, Henry Sheets (twice), William Turner, Thomas Carrick, J. M. Bennett, John R. Miller, Solomon Davis Swaim, Clyde C. Eddinger (twice), R. N. Hardin, William F. Bowen, Jr., Heyward Calvert, Samuel H. Murphy, Ronald Chapman (interim), Ronald Blakley, and Roy J. Queen. R. N. Hardin s currently serving as interim pastor.

Holloways Baptist Church has previously hosted the annual meeting of Liberty Baptist Association in 1833, 1840, 1852, 1858, 1872, 1880, 1894, 1928, 1950, 1971 and now in 1997.

MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL REPORT

BSCNC Cooperative Missions Weekend - January 18-19, 1997: The weekend began with a Banquet, which was attended by members of participating churches and BSCNC staff members, was held on January 18, 1997 at Carolina Memorial Baptist Church. Dr. Roy Smith, Executive Director/Treasurer of BSCNC was speaker. Churches which participated with BSCNC speakers on January 19, 1997 were as follows: Amity Baptist Church-Mr. Mark Abernathy, Carolina Memorial Baptist Church-Mrs. Wendy Edwards; Center Hill Baptist Church-Dr. Roy Smith; Colonial Baptist Church-Dr. Tom Womble; First Baptist Church, Denton-Dr. George Shore; Holloways Baptist Church-Rev. Talmadge Williams; New Friendship Baptist Church-Rev. Robert Stewart; North Lexington Baptist Church-Rev. Doug Cole; Oak Hill Memorial Baptist Church-Rev. Tom Jenkins; Reeds Baptist Church-Rev. O. D. Martin; Rich Fork Baptist Church-Rev. Bobby Stafford; Smith Grove Baptist Church-Mrs. Irma Duke; and Wallburg Baptist Church-Rev.

<u>Disaster Relief Storage Building</u> - There needs to be a permanent facility on LBA property for the Disaster Trailer. A motion was made to defer this matter to the Brotherhood Council to research the possibility of constructing a building, and also to work with the Building and Grounds as to the location.

Kim Dickey (Carolina Memorial member) was appointed as a Missionary to China. A Commissioning Service was held for Kim on December 15, 1996 at Carolina Memorial. A Project was initiated by MDC to assist with sending videos which may be used in her English teaching classes. She is in need of videos like "Andy of Mayberry," "I Love Lucy," etc.

<u>Cooperative Agreements-1998</u> Requests have been made to BSCNC for the following assistance: <u>Cambodian Mission Support</u>-\$6,000; <u>Hispanic Ministry Support</u>-\$6,000; <u>Central Baptist Church-Church Planter Support</u>-\$10,000; <u>Festival Ministry/Resort Ministry Support</u>-\$600; <u>Hunger Ministry Project-Rural Churches</u>-\$2,000; and <u>Church Pastoral Assistance</u>-\$5,200-Rev. Charles Tanner, Trinity Baptist Church, Arcadia.

South Africa -February 13-27, 1997 - Commissioning Service for the six people on the February Team was held on January 19, 1997 at First Baptist Church in Thomasville with Rev. O. D. Martin, BSCNC, as speaker. The trip was successful with the team being able to share in the schools-a youth rally resulted in 250 kids accepting Christ. A total of 550+ first time decisions were made. Dr. Ron Pierce, who headed the team, visited the Zululand University and discussed the possibility of having an exchange program for professors, and maybe a student exchange also. Clyde Crook, member of Thomasville First, went from LBA as well. The team spoke in five of the area churches.

<u>Summer Mission Projects:</u> <u>Christian Activity Center, East St. Louis, IL</u> - June 28-July 5, 1997. Eight (8) people served as Counselors at the CAC Camp. <u>Island of Grenada</u> - July 26-August 3, 1997. Twenty-Four (24) people held Vacation Bible Schools in the four churches and one mission of Grenada. Many items were collected from our LBA churches for use in East St. Louis and in Grenada.....teaching supplies and school supplies.

Seminary Extension-Davidson County Correctional Center, Lexington - Classes were begun with 16 inmates participating. BSCNC is funding the teacher's salary and one half the cost of registration (\$36.00). Many donations have come from our churches who sponsor the prisoners at a cost of \$30 each. This will continue as an ongoing project need for at least four years. Pastors/Staff Ministers are serving as teachers.

<u>Vendor's Sunday Services</u>, <u>U.S. Flea Market</u>, <u>Linwood NC</u> - The MDC endorsed various pastors, staff ministers, and lay persons to lead in a Sunday morning worship time at 8:30 am for the vendors of the flea market. Hymnals for this ministry were donated by First Baptist Church, Denton. This will be a continued opportunity as long as the vendors wish our presence.

MAPS/Vista Study & Strategic Planning Retreat - The Retreat was held at the LBA office or September 8, 1997 with Bobby Stafford, BSCNC, Consultant. Results of the Demographic study, in which ten churches participated, were shared by Dr. Capps. Dr. Richard Capps reported the following information gleaned from our 10 Church MAPS/Vista Demographic study.

- (1) Growth between 1997-2010 will average 5-8 1/2% in every area of the Association.
- (2) Population will increase from 136,604 to 144,806 (2000); 157,772 (2010); 169,675 (2020).
- (3) Culturally diverse groups will grow by 11%.
- (4) Baptist preference among the unchurched is between 28-37% in all areas. Many people car be reached.
- (5) Six (6) new churches are needed for Anglo and ethnic population growth in next 20 years.
- (6) Significant needs for the next six years:
 - (a) Greatest need of population to be reached 18-44 year olds who are unchurched.
 - (b) Growth will occur in all areas of the Association. Be conscious of new church planting

needs as new population areas/housing patterns emerge.

- (c) Need for a greater balance of traditional, praise, and contemporary worship to reach the secular minds of today's unchurched.
- (d) Significant Hispanic population growth in next five years.
- (e) Generational differences are creating a climate of conflict in our churches. Emerging younger generational leaders are uncomfortable with current church practices.
- (f) Largest population of the unchurched is 15-44. Largest church population groups in many of our churches 55-69.
- (g) Renewed vision of reaching the unchurched.

Bobby Stafford led the group in an exercise of dreaming/revisioning what the Association must be about in it's work. After much discussion, three Focus Points emerged. They were:

- 1) Enhance awareness and needed responses to reach the primary target group of 18-44 year olds who are unchurched.
- Assist existing congregations in facing change, evolving methodologies, and the need for a new vision in reach people with the Gospel.
 Begin to strategically target areas of culturally diverse populations (Anglo, Hispanic)
 - Begin to strategically target areas of culturally diverse populations (Anglo, Hispanic, Cambodian, and African-American) where new churches are needed. Developing new Missions, Bible Study Groups, Cell Groups, and securing sponsoring churches would be a primary focus.
- t was decided to follow up these major areas with further refinement and developing work plans in accomplishing these focus points this next year.
- LBA Meeting Change Proposal Approved and recommended change to the Executive Board for a change in the meeting schedules of the Association, with messengers to serve on a year-round basis. (Copy of the proposed change is found on page 33-34 of the Book of Reports.)
- New Church Recommendation-Amity Baptist Church, Wallburg Met with the Pastor, Rev. Dalton King and church members. The church unanimously requested membership in Liberty Baptist Association and the MDC recommends that they be accepted into the Liberty Baptist Association at the Annual Meeting October 6, 1997.

Report from Minutes of Missions Development Council

SOUTH AFRICA PARTNERSHIP MINISTRY

Partnership Missions is not new to North Carolina Baptists. With previous involvement in Togo, Brazil, the Ukraine, and now South Africa; we have an understanding of Partnership Missions. One thing we know is that each partnership is unique; no two are the same! We also know that perceptions of partnership vary from place to place.

The Partnership in South Africa is a "first" for Baptists there. This may be one of the reasons why the requests are slow coming to us. We do know that our Partnership is a "response" artnership: that is to say, the request must begin with churches in South Africa. Please pray for the hurches and leadership in South Africa that they will be led by the Holy Spirit to make specific equests.

To this point we have had four requests for teams to go to South Africa from Liberty/Central associations. Two of these requests were honored while two others did not materialize. Dr. Ronald fierce and Mr. Clyde Crook, both from First Baptist Church of Thomasville, along with others from Central Association, responded to a request from the Richard's Bay Baptist Church. A couple from Central Association also responded to a second request. We regret that there has been some onfusion concerning two other requests and thus these did not materialize.

Leadership from South Africa and North Carolina are meeting this week in North Carolina; opefully this will help us in the partnership. Rev. Brian Jardine from South Africa is one of the

person's visiting from South Africa. He will be with us for the next couple of weeks. Rev. Jardine will be in Liberty Baptist Association from Friday, October 10 through Wednesday October 15. There are still a couple of days available for meeting and hosting him. If you are interested, please contact either Dr. Capps or me.

Rev. Dennis Jones and his family, missionaries to South Africa, are furloughing and will be our guest speaker Tuesday Evening for our closing session. He and his family will be in our Association for a few days. Please pray for Dennis as he serves our Lord and Baptists in South Africa.

Please pray for believers in South Africa. Pray especially that they may be open to Divine Leadership in this most crucial time in their country. It has been stated that South Africa is "open for evangelism." This is good news but it is also bad news. The good news is that people can be won to Christ. The bad news is that people can also be won to cults and false religious groups.

Please pray for churches and their leadership that they will request that Believers from Liberty Baptist Association "come over and help them." I also ask that we pray that a spirit of willingness to help may prevail among us.

Thank you for loving Christ and sharing his love with others! Thank you for past ministry and for what you will do in the future. May the challenge before us be met by a faith equal to the task.

BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION OF NC REPORTS

Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina - 1997

At the sound of a car in his grandmother's carport, Jason looked out the window, and was shocked to see his mother striding toward the house. She was angry, and Jason shouted, "Lordy, it's momma," as he ran to the back bedroom to call the police.

Just 12 years old, Jason had lived in seven foster care homes and with his grandmother on and off since his father died seven years earlier. His mother's addictions cost her custody of her only son. For whatever reason, tonight she wanted him back.

Out of control, Jason's mother broke open the door and kicked the grandmother to the floor. She grabbed her by the hair and "slung me around by the hair of my head," grandmother says, remembering.

Mother shouted for Jason to come out of hiding, and threatened to kill his grandmother. She grabbed a bottle, broke it, and held the jagged edge to grandma's throat, shouting that she would kill her if Jason didn't come out of hiding. Just then Jason's aunt arrived from a house next door, and held his mother's arms until the police arrived.

Six years later, grandmother beams with pride for Jason, who overcame that tragic, traumatic start to life. Jason garnered academic, athletic and leadership honors in a steady stream at Tuscola High School in Haywood County and is starting college in August 1997 as a freshman at The Citadel.

At Tuscola, he was captain and MVP of the track and cross country teams and a conference champion, vice president for his senior class, Cadet Colonel and ROTC commander in a group of 115 cadets, in National Honor Society, in the top 10 percent of his class, attended leadership events at Western Carolina University and Washington, D.C., and was a peer helper and peer counselor.

At The Citadel he will study political science with a minor in military history and international affairs. He wants a military career as a fighter pilot, then to enter politics after retirement.

Jason credits Broyhill Home, his home since that traumatic night in his grandma's house. "All the accomplishments of my life have been made possible by Baptist Children's Homes," Jason said at his final awards banquet at Broyhill Home, where he received top honors for the second year. "Broyhill has made me into a young man with a future, who know now where he is going and what he wants to do. They've opened the doors to enable me to do that."

As for the grandmother, who was desperate to find a place for Jason after the incident in her house, she prays "every night and I thank God every night that we have

a place like Broyhill Home and Baptist Children's Homes.

Jason's story is repeated hundreds of times each year at Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. Not all are as dramatic but every one tells of a young person and a family at the end of an unraveling rope, and of BCH tying a knot in that rope and helping them to hold on.

At four residential campuses, six emergency care cottages, two homes for behaviorally troubled girls, a maternity home, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping and model day care, 1,398 young people found help in trouble times last year.

During the past year BCH received \$1.5 million through the Cooperative Program, and \$724,000 through the Thanksgiving Offering. Total church gifts of \$3.05 million comprised 25 percent of the BCH budget.

In June 1997 BCH successfully completed the \$10.1 million "Light Their Way" Campaign to raise money for operations, capital needs and endowment. Two major priorities of the campaign will be completed in early 1998; the Winifred Lindsay Education/Administrative Center at Odum Home in Pembroke, and the John D. and Amelia W. Johnson Cottage at Mills Home. A third priority, the Hubert M. Craig Lodge at Cameron Boys Camp, has been completed.

A new video, "Families Under Construction" is available to promote the 1997 Thanksgiving offer, which has a statewide goal of \$750,000, the largest ever.

A model program for family preservation has been initiated at Mills Home in Thomasville. Two social workers are on staff to work intensively with families which are at risk of being separated, but who, with help, can overcome their issues and stay together.

Thomasville Area Director Bill Scarlett also is initiating ways for churches and their members to be directly involved on campus, from tutoring, to cooking, to spending early evenings giving personal attention to residents to free staff for more intensive counseling.

Baptist Children's Homes' work was featured in November on "The 700 Club" and in December on CNN. BCH also adopted a missions statement this year, which is "helping hurting children, healing broken families."

Whenever children are hurting and families are strained, BCH strives to heal.

DIVISION OF EVANGELISM, BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION 1997

With joy I report that North Carolina Baptists are continuing to experience progress in our evangelism efforts. Both our full time staff and field staff consultants are leading a variety of evangelism training events in many associations as we encourage churches to learn and use creative methods for doing evangelism. As a result of the prayers and labor by the members of North Carolina Baptist churches empowered by God's Spirit, baptisms in this state increased again for the third consecutive year. Based upon data taken from the Annual Church Profiles (ACP) and subsequent inquiries, total baptisms reported in 1996 were 25,674. This is a 1.9% increase over 1995. Many of our churches failed to submit an ACP and their baptisms are no recorded in this report. In addition to the numerous training events we conduct across the state each year, we also present a traditional statewide evangelism conference. The purpose of this event is to offer spiritual enrichment and motivation through dynamic preaching and outstanding music. This conference encourages church leaders to emphasize the important of evangelism. In 1998 the State Evangelism Conference will be held at War Memorial Auditorium in Greensboro, February 2-3.

In cooperation with the Southern Baptist Convention, our theme for 1997-2000 in evangelism will be CELEBRATE JESUS 2000 (CJ 2000). This is a four year plan to share a gospel witness with every person in the United States. The emphasis for this strategy will be: 1997 Prayer, 1998 Personal Witnessing, 1999 Proclamation and 2000 Preservation. Promotional packets related to CJ2000 have been mailed to churches. Local associations have both a packet and a video to assist in this emphasis. Our goal is to touch every home in North Carolina with a gospel witness before the beginning of 2001. In addition to the Evangelism Division staff, special assistants known as Field Staff Consultants have been trained to help associations and churches in N.C. develop strategies which will enable them to achieve this goal. These specialists are available to assist in association or church evangelism planning, training and implementation.

When we recognize that 45-50% of the more than 7 million residents of North Carolina are not actively affiliated with any church, do we realize that we must penetrate our culture with the gospel of Jesus? The staff of the Evangelism Division is available to help reach these people with the message of Christ's redeeming love. Often, most newer members in our churches are coming who have no relationship with Christ. Look around your community! Discover where the unchurched are! Determine their physical and emotional needs. Develop attractive innovative ministries which will give you the opportunity to meet their spiritual needs through the power of Christ.

We are continuing in our efforts with the North American Missions Board (NAMB), Communication Services and Public Relations of Baptist State Convention to develop a plan which will allow us to broadcast more spot announcements via radio and television. This will enable us to highlight both a Christian message and our North Carolina Baptist work.

PERSONAL EVANGELISM

The work of our Personal Evangelism Department continues to grow under the creative and resourceful leadership of Nelson Searcy. Recently available is a new electronic magazine which contains articles, book reviews, educational materials, facts and trends in evangelism, success stories from local church evangelism activities and ideas you can use. Subscribe today by sending an E-mail request to nsearcy@bscnc.org or call our office.

WITNESS TRAINING-- Exciting plans are being made to provide opportunities in 1998 for more Christians to become confidently equipped to effectively share their faith. Numerous personal witnessing approaches can be learned through BWR, CWT, WIN Schools, One-Day Soul Winning Workshops, People Sharing Jesus and others. To schedule a seminar or training program, contact the Evangelism Division.

JESUS VIDEO - Another new and creative way for sharing the Gospel is available by using the new JESUS video produced by Campus Crusade. This 2 hour film presents the story of Christ and then tells how the viewer can receive Jesus as Savior. Copies of this video can be purchased through the Evangelism Division for \$5.00 each when purchasing more than 5 copies. It is available in several languages at an additional cost. This is an excellent way to saturate a new community, reach language groups or share the gospel with a friend through a video presentation. Individuals may wish to give copies to a video store to be placed in this family video section.

YOUTH EVANGELISM-- More than 2,600 youth and their leaders attended the Youth Evangelism Spring Thing and the two Youth Evangelism Weeks at N.C. Baptist Assembly. During these conferences, more than 2,050 youth were trained to share their faith. Also, a total of 704 decisions were recorded which included 177 professions of faith, 465 recommitments, 25 special service and 37 other. SUPER SUMMER 1997 at Carowinds, another special youth evangelism event of the Evangelism Division, was very successful with more than 26,000 in attendance despite the rains and flooding resulting from hurricane "Danny." More than 2,822 youth recorded spiritual decisions during the worship celebration including 563+ professions of faith.

The Personal Evangelism Department began offering a collection of ten Youth Evangelism Seminars (Y.E.S.) designed to assist associations and churches in reaching lost and unchurched youth in their areas. Many of these conferences were conducted across the state in 1997. Our staff is available and desirous to help association and church leadership plan youth evangelism events in your area.

STUDENT EVANGELISM TEAMS-- Our two student evangelism teams maintained their normally busy summer schedule of music and ministry for state, association and church youth events. They performed each day during our Youth Evangelism Weeks, Single Adult Evangelism Retreat at Caswell and SUPER SUMMER at Carowinds. The EVANGELS conducted three-day Youth Happening events for 16 associations and churches. Their ministry activities included music, drama, Bible studies, testimonies, recreation and personal evangelism. WITNESS presented 35 concerts in 29 churches in addition to their daily music and testimony concert ministry in youth conferences at Caswell, Mundo Vista, Baptist Children's Homes, and resort areas. Many youth responded during the invitations presented at each concert. Contact the Evangelism Division to request one of these youth evangelism teams for the summer of 1998.

COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY CAMPUS EVANGELISM— We continue to work with the Youth and Campus Ministry Division and BSU Campus Ministers in offering witness training to Christian students on campus. Cooperative plans are also in process for a major statewide evangelism event which will target college students.

SINGLE ADULT EVANGELISM-- Each spring we sponsor an evangelism retreat at N.C. Baptist Assembly. In June, 210 singles of various ages enjoyed this conference which included equipping seminars, worship services and free time.

EVANGELISM DEVELOPMENT

We continue to expand the work of our Evangelism Development Department. During his tenure as a full-time employee, Ed Bullock opened new doors of partnership with N.C. Baptist Men as we moved three laity ministries under the Evangelism Division umbrella and joined efforts with the Baptist Men's Division. These are: North Carolina Baptist Lay Witness Foundation (NC BLWF), Lay Renewal and Prayer for Spiritual Awakening. At the end of 1996, Ed Bullock retired from full-time status with the Evangelism Division, but continues to work part time as a Consultant. Some of his responsibilities include Executive Director of the Lay Witness Foundation and staff liaison with Lay Renewal. His voice mail is Extension 562.


EVANGELISM STRATEGIES- In July of 1997 we produced a new three volume set of training videos which accompany Darrell Robinson's third edition book Total Church Life. This is an excellent tool for developing a church vision which focuses on reaching people with the Gospel. We also offer a seminar entitled "Developing a Strategy For Evangelism In the Local Church." We are encouraging churches and associations to develop joint mission partnerships and crossover events to strengthen evangelism in selected local areas. Reaching the Cities, Towns and Villages is a strategy we have created to identify one or more people in every post office community who will lead a nucleus group of people in their respective areas in a mission of acquainting every person in their locale with the plan of salvation. Through computer technology, we now have the capability of supplying a church with a map of their community with designations indicating where church members, visitors and in-active residents are located.

MASS EVANGELISM, through the ministry of vocational and bi-vocational evangelists, has increase in 1997. We provide a training and fellowship conference annually for our N.C. vocational evangelists. Another aspect of mass evangelism relates to our large tent. Numerous associations and churches working in cooperation endeavors use this tent each year for mass evangelism events. In 1998 we will produce an attractive color booklet to help present the Gospel to some of the 25 mission tourists who visit N.C. each year. As a part of CJ2000 Baptist associations are encouraged to begin establishing plans now for area wide evangelistic crusades in 1999.

INTERFAITH WITNESS- With the fast growing international population of our state and nation, tremendous needs exist for helping Christians understand the spurious beliefs of non-Christian religious groups. This aspect of evangelism is rapidly becoming most important. Our division offers training in interfaith witnessing which can enable Christians to know how to share the Gospel with sincere religious people who have unknowingly been deceived. In addition, we maintain a list of specialists who have been certified to lead interfaith witnessing conferences in churches.

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in generating endowment to enhance their permanent financial support. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased individual collective financial support. The Baptist Foundation is committed to assisting individual church members through creative stewardship methods to provide permanent financial undergirding of these ministries.

As of December 31, 1996, the Foundation held \$60,892,220 under management. In 1996, \$2,600,680 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,259,082 was distributed to individuals for a total distribution of \$3,859,762.

The income distributions for the entire 77-year history of the N. C. Baptist Foundation totals: \$10,932,764 income paid to individuals and \$16,059,259 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$26,992,023.

Meeting the Challenges of Health Care

Report to the Associations



HOSPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

Since opening its doors in 1923, The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated has remained fully committed to the purpose of carrying out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. It is this Christ-like spirit that has led patients such as Helen Keller to write: "When I was coming out from under surgery, they treated me with fine love, and I could feel it. I have been in places where it didn't matter how many times you pressed the call button, you would just lie there and wait, but the nurses at Baptist Hospital always came right away. If I ever have to go back to a hospital, this is where I would come."

Baptist Benevolent Care Fund

Baptist Churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in 1924. In 1996 the MDO amounted to \$456,497.00. It was used exclusively to help patients who had little or no health care insurance or other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From this past year's offering, over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist Churches. May God bless all those who gave so generously.

Division of Pastoral Care

During the year the Chaplains and Staff of the Pastoral Care Department provide worship services in Davis Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday for patients and family members. The Pastoral Care Department staff supervised 65 students during the year. They made-more than 50,000 ministry contacts, an increase of 10% over the previous year.

CareNet, Inc. continues to grow. There are now 13 counseling centers located in strategic areas across the state. During the year these centers will provide over 26,000 hours of counseling.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc., continues to expand its assistance to ministers and churches. Programs and assistance offered to churches include Consultants and Intentional Interims working with churches as they face the challenges of today. The Young Leader's Program helps in leadership development, and the Clergy Wellness Program, Turning Point, is designed to foster a holistic growth-approach to the individual minister's life calling.

Points of Emphasis and Progress

J. PAUL STICHT CENTER - In April the J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation opened the doors of a new 240,000 square foot state-of-the-arts building. Here services are provided to older adults. These services include a geriatric assessment clinic, Acute Care for the Elderly clinic, Alzheimer's disease and memory disorders clinic, osteoporosis clinic, geriatric gynecology clinic, a women's health center, education services, and a legal clinic for seniors. It houses a true "Day Hospital" for seniors - the first in the state - which provides therapy, examina tions and rehabilitation as day-time treatment, eliminating costly overnight stays.

COMPREHAB - On November 4, 1996, the doors were opened to The Medical Center's new CompRehab Center. The 70,000 square-foot building houses a full spectrum of physical rehabilitation and related clinical services, including a Sports Medicine Center, Foot and Ankle Center, The Hand Center, Outpatient Physical Therapy Center, Spine Center, and the Neurorehabilitation Center.

TRAUMA CENTER - The Medical Center has the only designated Level I trauma center in Northwest North Carolina. In the trauma center our goal is for the patient to be in an operating room 10 minutes after arriving at the Emergency Department. Surgeons, anesthesiologists and staff remain on duty 24 hours a day to handle such emergencies.

TOPS IN RESEARCH'- According to a report in the February issue of *Applied Clinical Trials*, Bowman Gray School of Medicine ranked in the top 10 U.S. clinical research institutions.

QUALCHOICE - Established by The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated, The Bowman Gray School of Medicine, and Wake Forest University, this managed care plan provides quality health care and patient physician choice. QualChoice is now able to offer coverage to ministers and church staffs.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

According to Dr. James Kennedy of Coral Ridge Ministries, approximately 6 million crimes are committed in the United States annually. Murder arrests of teens are up 92% since 1985; the number of 13-15 year-olds arrested for murder nearly doubled between 1982 and 1992; 1.6 million cars are stolen each year, American spends \$39 billion a year on police protection, \$29 billion on prisons and \$10 billion on legal and judicial costs for criminal cases; drunk drivers cost us \$110 billion a year, and drug abuse cost \$40 billion a year. With these alarming statistics, the Christian Action League of North Carolina is constantly working to restore moral and biblical principles to our state and nation through the legislative process and the public education system and by assisting communities in our state with local battles for civic and moral righteousness.

A. Christian Values

- It was the pleasure of the Christian Action League to sponsor the Second Annual Christian Heritage Week in North Carolina, March 16-22. The League encouraged schools, churches and communities to recognize, commemorate and learn about the Christian heritage and history of our nation. We mailed information about a League sponsored essay contest to be written on America's Christian Heritage to all high schools (public and private) in the state and hosted an awards ceremony and banquet for the top state winners of that contest in Raleigh.
- Lobbied for an promoted SB-442. The American History Act. A bill that would allow public school teachers to read or display historical documents even though they contain religious references. This bill passed the legislature and is now a law.
- The League continued a project in 1997 to distribute copies of the Ten Commandments throughout North Carolina. To date, over 10,000 copies of these prints have been distributed.
- Promoted Sanctity of Human Life Sunday.
- Presented copies of Dr. Billy Graham's speech to the May 5, 1997, Joint Session of the General Assembly on audio cassette to members of the Legislature and offered copies through our newsletter. Dr. Graham has been honored for his tremendous worldwide contributions to religion, morality, racial equality and family.
- Promoted and worked for the passage of HB 511, Evolution Not Taught As Fact.
- Published The Beacon newsletter quarterly with circulation of 22,000. Kept concerned citizens informed on moral issues via e-mail, fax networks, church and civic club presentations.

B. Lottery

Lottery proponents felt this was the year to bring a state-sponsored lottery to North Carolina The League, through letters, e-mail and faxes, kept the Christian community updated on lottery information and encouraged its members to contact their legislators. The lawmakers receive barrage of letters and calls from across the state saying that the lottery was a bad bet for Nortl Carolina. The League will continue to monitor this issue as the session nears an end, but as of today the lottery seems to have been defeated for another session.

C. Sex Education

Worked with other Christian and pro-family groups to see that the state mandate for Abstinenc Until Marriage education was implemented state-wide. Also supported efforts to insure that federa grant money was used to promote abstinence education.

D. Abortion

The League lobbied for and encouraged its members through Legislative Alerts to write in support of HB-303 and SB 536 (Ban Partial Birth Abortion), HB 594 (Fetus Death from Criminal Act) and HB-536 (Abortion/Woman's Right to Know). We offered the video "Reversing Roe" through our newsletter. This video tells the story of Norma McCorvey (Jane Roe) of the infamous Roe vs. Wade Supreme Court case who after 25 years and 35 million aborted babies tells of her transformation from an abortion industry pawn to a pro-life Christian.

E. Homosexuality

CAL supported efforts to strengthen the traditional family and addressed the radical homosexual agenda. Successfully lobbied against legislation that would have eradicated present N.C. law making homosexuality illegal. Offered the powerful and emotional video of Michael Johnston "On Wings Like Eagles." This video tells of Michael's 11 years in the homosexual lifestyle and his struggle between right and wrong and about forgiveness and grace. Michael is founder of Kerusso Ministries, an organization to help others struggling with this sin.

F. Alcohol

Monitored all legislation concerning alcohol and other drugs. Successfully supported efforts to strengthen current DWI laws. Worked with communities in helping them set up an organization to combat liquor referenda. Lobbied against SB 838 (ABC Tourism Resorts Permits); SB 837 (Sports Club ABC Permits); SB 447 (Lumberton Economic Development District) and HB 651 (Interstate Economic Zones). These bills allow alcohol sales without the vote of local citizens. Provided awareness, education and resource materials related to substance abuse problems to churches, communities, etc.

G. Pornography

Lobbied for SB 452 (Local Regulation of Adult Establishments) and notified citizens to contact their legislators and encourage them to vote for this legislation that would give local governments more control in regulating these establishments.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF

LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Pursuant to §55A-2-02 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the undersigned corporation does hereby submit these Articles of Incorporation for the purpose of forming a nonprofit corporation.

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of the corporation is LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE II DESIGNATION

The corporation is a charitable or religious corporation within the meaning of N.C.G.S. §55A-1-40(4).

ARTICLE III REGISTERED OFFICE AND AGENT

The street address of the initial registered office of the corporation is Route 8, Box 610, Buc Kanoy Road, Thomasville, Davidson County, North Carolina, 27360-7839, and the initial registered agent at that office is Dr. Richard H. Capps, Director of Missions.

ARTICLE IV INCORPORATORS

The names and addresses of the incorporators, acting as representatives of the members of Liberty Baptist Association are as follows:

ARTICLE V MEMBERS

The corporation shall have one class of members as provided in the bylaws. Members shall b received, rejected, or withdrawn as set forth in the bylaws. The Baptist churches which are member of Liberty Baptist Association immediately prior to the incorporation thereof automatically sha become members of the corporation.

ARTICLE VI DISSOLUTION

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the board of directors shall, after paying or makin provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of th corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation, or to such organization or organization organized and operated exclusively for religious purposes as shall qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the correspondir provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue law) as the board of directors shall determin Any such assets not disposed of shall be disposed of by the District Court of the County in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operate exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE VII **PURPOSE**

The purposes for which the corporation is organized are:

A. to assist the churches of Liberty Baptist Association in their divinely appointed mission and cooperative relationships with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Southe Baptist Convention, and other Baptist entities to promote and provide opportunities for individual and collective participation in missions, evangelism, ministry, education, social services, and distribution of the Bible;

- to engage in any lawful act or activities for which corporations may be organized under N.C.
 General Statutes Chapter 55A;
- C. to engage in any lawful activity within the purposes for which the corporation may be organized which is incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the corporation;
- D. to operate exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE VIII INITIAL DIRECTORS

The number of initial directors shall be One Hundred and Thirty-Four (134), and the initial directors shall be the duly-elected representatives from each member church of Liberty Baptist Association.

ARTICLE IX GOVERNMENT

- A. The government of this corporation is vested in its members who are represented in the manner set out in its bylaws. The members retain the right of self-government in all phases of the spiritual and temporal life of the association.
- B. Churches received as members of this corporation as set out in the bylaws shall constitute the membership ("the members"). The members shall be represented by messengers as provided in the bylaws and shall have the sole authority to adopt and amend the charter and bylaws, approve budgets, receive and discharge members, govern and conduct the affairs of this corporation.
- C. All internal groups, committees, directors, officers, agents, and/or employees created and empowered by the association ultimately shall report to and be accountable to the members and shall have such powers and duties as set out in the bylaws.
- D. This association is autonomous and independent and is a sovereign and democratic association of Baptist churches under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. As such, the association is subject to the control of no other ecclesiastical body and does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any member church, auxiliary organization, or other Baptist body.

ARTICLE X ELECTION AS 501(c)(3) CORPORATION

No part of the net earnings or receipts of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be listributable to its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes as set forth in these Articles of Incorporation.

No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any andidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from ederal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), or (b) by a corporations, contributions o which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE XI PERSONAL LIABILITY

Personal liability for all directors for monetary damages arising out of an action or actions, whether by or in the right of the corporation or otherwise for breach of any duty as a director is eliminated except with respect to acts, omissions, liabilities and/or transactions described and defined in North Carolina General Statutes §55A-2-02 (b),(4)(i),(ii),(iii), and (iv).

ARTICLE XII EFFECTIVE DATE

These articles will be effective upon filing. IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, we have hereunto set our hands, this the 21st day of November, 1994.

BYLAWS OF LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION ARTICLE I NAME AND LOCATION

The corporate name of this nonprofit corporation shall be "Liberty Baptist Association" The A. principal and registered office of the Corporation shall be at Route 8, Box 610, Bud Kanoy Road, Thomasville, 27360-7839, Davidson County, North Carolina.

All reference to "Association" or "Corporation" in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws B in Amendments, or other official action of the Association, shall signify the legal organization of Liberty Baptist Association as established in the Articles of Incorporation. Liberty Baptis Association as it has existed heretofore, for all legal and administrative purposes fully is incorporated into Liberty Baptist Association, a nonprofit corporation. References to votes o the membership shall have reference to a vote of the members of this Association as prescribed in Article VII F of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

The purposes for which the Corporation is organized are:

- to assist the churches of Liberty Baptist Association in their divinely appointed mission and i A. cooperative relationships with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Souther Baptist Convention, and other Baptist entities to promote and provide opportunities fc individual and collective participation in missions, evangelism, ministry, education, socia services, and distribution of the Bible:
- to engage in any lawful act or activities for which corporations may be organized under N.G B. General Statutes Chapter 55A;
- to engage in any lawful activity within the purposes for which the Corporation may b C. organized which is incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the Corporation
- to operate exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, includin D. for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exemp organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE III ELECTION AS A 501(C)(3) CORPORATION

The Corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 50l(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law).

No part of the net earnings or receipts of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes as set forth in the Articles.

No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IV GOVERNMENT

The government of this Association is vested in its members who are represented in the manner set out in its Bylaws. The members retain the right of self-government in all phases of the spiritual and temporal life of the association.

Churches received as members of this Association, as herein provided, shall constitute the membership ("the members"). The members shall be represented by messengers duly elected by each member church and certified to the Association in its Annual Church Profile (Church Letter), and the number of messengers shall be determined as follows:

- Six messengers from each church for its first one hundred members or fraction thereof;
- b. One additional messenger from each church for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof above 100 and up to 1,000 members;
- One additional messenger from each church for each additional one hundred members or major fraction above 1,000 members;

The members represented by messengers as aforesaid shall have the sole authority to adopt and amend the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, approve budgets, receive and discharge members, govern and conduct the affairs of this Corporation.

All internal groups, committees, directors, officers, agents, and/or employees created and empowered by the Association ultimately shall report to and be accountable to the Association and shall have such powers and duties as hereinafter set out.

This Association is autonomous and independent and is a sovereign and democratic association of Baptist churches under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. As such, the Association is subject to the control of no other ecclesiastical body and does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any member church, auxiliary organization, or other Baptist body.

ARTICLE V PROPERTY

The title to all property shall be in the Association.

- B. The securing and maintaining of real, personal, and mixed property by this association shall be for the express purpose of providing facilities for and the engagement upon the missionary, educational, and benevolent interests of this association as historically have been espoused and practiced thereby and as are expressed in its charter and bylaws, which practices and documents are deemed the standard for uses and practices upon and with regard to such property.
- C. Real property shall not be mortgaged, conveyed, transferred, or encumbered without the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII,F., at an annual meeting or a special meeting duly called for such purpose and stated in the meeting notice.
- D. This article shall not be amended, altered, or repealed except by a three fourths vote of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII, F., at an annual or special meeting duly called and then only in the event that such proposed amendment, alteration, or repeal has been given in writing to the Moderator and Executive Board and has lain on the table for a period of twelve months, and no article shall be voted upon until the period aforementioned has elapsed, any other provisions herein to the contrary notwithstanding.

ARTICLE VI MEMBERS

- A. Record of Members: The members of this Association shall be composed of the Baptis churches who are members of Liberty Baptist Association on the date these Bylaws an adopted. The Clerk shall attach hereto a list of such present members which shall remain a par of the official records of the Association maintained at all times in the office of the Association.
 A current list of members shall be maintained at all times in the office of the Association.
- B. Organization of New Work Missions/Churches: The Association by its nature and definition is an organization whose primary purpose is missions. In furtherance of these functions, the Association will attempt to develop and foster new work missions/churches and will remain available and will be resourceful in assisting groups or churches in their own development respectively of and as Baptist churches. The Association is mindful and responsive to the autonomous nature of the structure of its members and desires to inculcate in watch-car groups and churches their own independence while utilizing, without compulsion, the well intended and well-respected practices of existing Baptist churches in historical Baptist precedence, all of which can be helpful during the organizational phases. To those ends and the effect these purposes, the Association will consider, promulgate, and maintain suggested guidelines for establishing and assisting new work missions/churches in their efforts. Thes guidelines shall be developed by the Missions Development Council and approved by the Executive Board.

At such time as a group comes under watch care of the Association, a sponsoring churc (member of the Association) shall be recommended by the Missions Development Council i consultation with the Director of Missions and actively shall support such mission/church wit any resource assistance required. The sponsoring church will work in cooperation with th Missions Development Council and a Liaison Committee shall be formulated and shall b comprised of the following: Two persons from the sponsoring church; Two persons from the new mission/church; One person from the Missions Development Council; and, Ex-officio, th Mission Pastor, Sponsoring Church Pastor, and Director of missions.

The Liaison Committee shall meet monthly and no less than bi-monthly during the formatio period of the mission/church and shall assist in every reasonable manner with the developmer of the mission/church on behalf of the Association. In the event a sponsoring church cannot be secured, the Missions Development Council shall be responsible for the sponsoring thereof the hassociation. The mission/church shall remain under watch care of the Association until such mission/church is ready to constitute a self-supporting church and he

fulfilled watch-care requirements.

Admission of New Churches: Any church seeking admission to the membership of the Association shall petition the Association in writing at least three months prior to the annual meeting of the Association. The Executive Board shall refer such petition to the Missions Development Council for its study of the petitioning church's covenant, articles of faith, history, practices, cooperative spirit, its relations to other churches of the Association, and its willingness to abide by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Association. A written report setting out its findings and recommendations for action at the next annual meeting of the Association shall be submitted by the Missions Development Council to the Executive Board. Final approval for membership shall be contingent upon a one-year period under a watch-care relationship after which determination will be made by a three-fourths vote of "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in VII, F., in annual meeting.

Privileges of Membership: Members through their messengers ("Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F.), and members through their messengers ("Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F.) only, are entitled to vote in all elections and all questions submitted to the Association. Recognizing the value of voluntary association among churches of like faith and practice, members are afforded opportunity to work in mutual, cooperative fellowship with other churches, especially those of Baptist faith, to advance the gospel of Christ, to promote Christian principles of justice and righteousness in personal, social, and community life, to promote the spiritual welfare of all persons, to disseminate the work of God to the people of all nations through evangelistic, educational, and charitable missions.

Requirements of Membership: All members reasonably are required to submit a completed Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Annual Meeting; send messengers to the annual meeting; and, contribute to the financial program of the Association. Only members of the Association shall determine whether member churches have fulfilled requirements for membership.

Termination of Membership: The membership status of any member shall be terminated by written request of the member seeking termination addressed to the Association. Failure reasonably to meet requirements of membership as set out in paragraph E above for a period of two consecutive years after contact by the Missions Development Council to ascertain the desire of the member church shall subject any member church to termination. No member may be expelled or suspended, and no membership may be terminated or suspended, except in a manner that is fair and reasonable and is carried out in good faith, and in compliance with the following procedures:

- 1. The Executive Board, by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of members present at a special meeting, duly called, must recommend termination of the subject member church.
- 2. Such recommendation, in writing, must be mailed to the subject member church and each member church sixty (60) days in advance of a special meeting of members.
- The subject church shall have full and ample opportunity to present its position at such meeting.
- 4. Termination of membership shall occur only upon a three-fourths (3/4) vote of individuals entitled to vote.

Watch-care Affiliation: Watch-care affiliation for a period of one year shall be required for each church applying for membership in the Association. Each church under watch-care affiliation shall submit a quarterly report and an Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Association.

ARTICLE VII MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

Annual Meeting: The annual meeting of the Association shall be held on Monday and

Tuesday following the first Sunday in October for the following purposes: to elect officers of the Association, standing committees, and special committees; to receive annual reports; to approve budgets; to conduct any other business matters which properly may come before the annual meeting; and, to share in worship and fellowship.

B. Special Meetings: Special meetings for the transaction of business may be called by the Executive Board provided sufficient notice is given members to allow for two Sundays between the call and the meeting.

C. Emergencies: In emergencies, any change in the time and/or place of meetings shall be determined by a vote of two-thirds of the Executive Board present when the vote is taken.

D. Presiding Officer: The Moderator shall preside at all meetings of members. In the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator shall preside. In the absence of the Moderator and Vice Moderator, the Clerk shall preside. In the absence of the aforementioned officers, the Treasurer shall preside. In the absence of all officers, the body may elect an acting moderator.

E. Quorum: Seventy-five (75) "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII, F., shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any annual or special meeting of members.

F. Voting: Messengers who have been duly elected by a member, have been certified in its annual report to the Association, and are duly registered and present shall be collectively referred to as "Individuals entitled to vote" and shall be entitled to one vote at any meeting of members. No proxy or absentee voting shall be permitted. All voting shall be by show of hands, standing vote or voice vote except when there are contested matters in which case the vote shall be by ballot. Parliamentary procedure utilizing Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed.

ARTICLE VIII EXECUTIVE BOARD

A. Board of Directors: All reference to "Executive Board" or "Board of Directors" in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or other official action of the Association shall be synonymous and shall include conferring of powers as are provided by the Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, and the North Carolina Nonprofit Corporation Act.

B. Membership: The Executive Board membership shall consist of the following:

- One lay-representative elected by each member church and certified to the Association in its Annual Church Profile (Church Letter),
- 2. The active pastor of each member,
- 3. The church treasurer of each member,
- 4. Officers duly elected by the Association, to-wit: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer;
- 5. Standing Committee Chairpersons and Standing Council Directors as named in Article XI, A and B.
- C. Officers: The officers of the Executive Board shall be the same persons elected by the Association as Moderator (President), Vice Moderator (Vice President), Clerk (Secretary), and Treasurer.
- Meetings: Regular meetings of the Executive Board shall be held at least quarterly. The first meeting, which shall be designated as the *annual* meeting, shall be held as soon as possible after the annual meeting of the Association, and the last meeting shall be held as nearly as possible to the next annual meeting of the Association for approval/endorsement of various Reports of the Association for the annual meeting.

Special meetings may be called by the Moderator whenever the need arises and the Moderator shall call a special meeting when requested in writing by ten (10) members of the Executive

Board.

- Quorum: Twenty-five (25) members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- **Duties:** Except as restricted by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws or other official action of the Association, the Executive Board shall manage the general business and activities of the Association between annual meetings; shall call special meetings of the Association when necessary; shall elect an independent auditor to conduct the annual audit; shall fill and/or approve any vacancies which occur in the officers, Executive Board, Committee on Nominations, Nominating Committee; Standing Committees or Councils; and, may elect the Director of Missions when a vacancy occurs in accordance with Article X,E.2. of these Bylaws. The Executive Board shall present a written report of action taken to the Association in its annual meeting for ratification and approval of action so taken between annual meetings.
- Contracts: The Executive Board may authorize officers to enter into contracts or execute and deliver instruments on behalf of the Association, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances subject only to limitations provided herein.
- **Loans:** No loans shall be contracted on behalf of the Association and no evidence of indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a resolution of the Executive Board. Such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.
- **Depository:** The Executive Board shall have the power to (a) select one or more banks to act as depositories of the funds of the Association; (b) determine the manner of receiving, depositing, and disbursing the funds of the Association; (c) designate the person or persons authorized to draw on the bank accounts of the Association; (d) approve the form of checks to be used in drawing on such bank accounts; and, (e) change such banks, the person or persons drawing on such accounts, and the form of checks at will.
- Removal: Board members, as well as officers of the Association, may be removed by majority vote of the Association at a properly called business meeting, with written notice to members setting out the specific purpose of the meeting.
 Death. Resignation or Termination: In the event a Board member shall expire, resign, or for
 - **Death, Resignation or Termination:** In the event a Board member shall expire, resign, or for any reason be removed from the Executive Board, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE IX OFFICERS

- Officers Generally: There shall be a Moderator who shall also serve as Moderator and Chairman of the Executive Board and President of the Corporation. There shall be a Vice Moderator who shall also serve as Vice Moderator of the Executive Board and Vice President of the Corporation. There shall be a Clerk who shall also serve as Clerk of the Executive Board and Secretary of the Corporation. There shall be a Treasurer who shall also serve as Treasurer of the Association and of the Corporation. Whenever used in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or in other official action of the Association, the words "Moderator or "President;" "Vice Moderator" or "Vice President;" or "Clerk" or "Secretary" shall be synonymous.
- . Moderator:

H.

1. Election and Term: The Moderator shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of the Association for a term of one year and may be re-elected for a one-year term. The Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election as Moderator for a period of two years after having served two one-year terms. The term of office shall begin at the close of the annual meeting and shall continue through the close of the next annual meeting or until a successor is elected.

2. Duties: The Moderator shall

- a. preside at the annual meeting and any special meeting of the Association;
- b. serve as President of the Corporation;
- c. preside at all meetings of the Executive Board;
- d. perform such other duties as are specifically prescribed in these Bylaws and as may be delegated by the Association;
- e. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting;
- f. appoint other committees when so directed by the Association or Executive Board;
- g. serve as ex officio member of all committees except the Committee on Nominations.

C. Vice Moderator

1. Election and Term: The Vice Moderator shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year and may be re-elected for a one-year term. The Vice Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election as Vice Moderator for a period of two years after having served two one-year terms. The term of office shall begin at the close of the annual meeting in which such election is held and shall continue through the close of the next annual meeting or until his successor is elected

2. Duties: The Vice Moderator shall

- a. preside at meetings of the Association and Executive Board in the absence of the Moderator or at the pleasure of the Moderator;
- b. serve as Vice President of the Corporation;
- c. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting; and
- d. perform such other duties as may be specifically prescribed in these Bylaws and as may be delegated by the members.

D. Clerk

1. Election and Term: The Clerk shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.

2. Duties: The Clerk shall

- a. serve as Secretary of the Corporation and of the Executive Committee;
- b. maintain at all times a current list of members of the Association;
- c. maintain and preserve the files, records, and documents of the Association in proper order at all times for examination of the Executive Board;
- d. send report forms to members at least one month before the annual meeting of the Association;
- e. prepare a composite record of the member information included in the annual report submitted to the Association and distribute copies thereof at the annual meeting;
 - supervise the printing of minutes of the Association and distribute to the members as soon as possible after the annual meeting;
- g. preserve the files, records, and documents of the Association and, upon election of a successor, relinquish such files, records, documents, and other property belonging to the Association and in the possession and control of the Clerk to the duly elected successor; and
- h. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting.
- i. preside at meetings in the absence of the Moderator and Vice Moderator at the pleasure of the moderator.

Treasurer

- 1. Election and Term: The Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.
- 2. Duties: The Treasurer shall
 - a. serve as Treasurer of the Corporation;
 - b. have custody of all funds of the Association;
 - c. maintain at all times up-to-date, orderly records of all receipts and disbursements;
 - d. disburse funds by check in accordance with the budget and direction of the Association or Executive Board;
 - e. prepare quarterly financial reports and distribute copies to the Finance Committee and the Executive Board:
 - f. prepare a financial report and distribute copies at the annual meeting;
 - g. serve as a member of the Finance Committee;
 - h. cooperate with the firm making the annual audit; and
 - serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting.
 - j. preside at meetings in the absence of the Moderator, Vice Moderator and Clerk at the pleasure of the moderator.

Assistant Treasurer

- 1. **Election and Term:** The Assistant Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.
- 2. **Duties:** The Assistant Treasurer shall, during periods of incapacity or absence of the Treasurer, perform the duties assigned to the Treasurer in paragraph E. 2 as required and shall assist the Treasurer as directed and required by the Treasurer.

ARTICLE X STAFF

- **Staff Positions:** The staff of the Association shall be composed of the Director of Missions, Administrative Secretary, and such other persons who shall fill staff positions as may be created by the Association. The Personnel Committee shall make recommendation for the creation of any staff position. A current list of staff positions shall be maintained by the Personnel Committee. A job description for each staff position shall be prepared and shall be revised periodically by the Personnel Committee, approved by the Executive Board, and furnished to all candidates considered for the position and the person filling the position. Staff positions may be combined from time to time at the discretion of the Executive Board and the combined position held by one person.
- **Election/Employment:** Except in the case of the Director of Missions, the staff members from time to time shall be employed for indeterminate terms by the Association or Executive Board at a regular meeting upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- **Termination:** With the exception of the Director of Missions, termination of the relationship between a staff member and the Association shall occur within a reasonable and announced period after written notice of termination delivered to the staff member on behalf of the Association and to the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board on behalf of the staff member. Termination of the staff member by the Association shall be initiated and acted upon by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- Vacation and Leave: Requirements for vacation and leaves, record-keeping, expense reimbursement, work schedules, and other employment matters shall be outlined in the Policy Manual and Benefit Plans. Such manual shall be prepared, reviewed, monitored, and amended from time to time by recommendation of the Personnel Committee to the Executive Board; and

the staff shall be subject to the provisions thereof from time to time; provided, nothing therein contained shall be interpreted to be in derivation or in violation of the provisions of the Bylaws, and such Policy Manual and Benefit Plans must remain consistent with the purposes and intent requirements thereof.

E. Director of Missions

- 1. Search Committee Procedure: When a vacancy occurs in the position of Director of Missions or the Director of Mission furnishes notice of intent to vacate the position, a Search Committee composed of the officers of the Association and five members of the Associational Council elected by the Associational Council shall meet as soon as possible, determine their procedure, establish a profile, prepare application forms and reference questionnaires, and shall diligently seek to find a Director of Missions who, by calling, training, and ability, is qualified spiritually, mentally, and physically to lead the work of the Association. The Moderator shall serve as Chairperson of the Search Committee. Members of the committee may be reimbursed by the Treasurer for any necessary and reasonable travel and subsistence expenses which are incurred in the performance of their duties. The candidate to be recommended by the Search Committee may be interviewed by the Associational Council before election by the Executive Board or the Association in Annual Meeting.
- 2. Election/Employment: When the Search Committee has selected a potential employee and is ready to make a report and recommendation to the Association, such recommendation shall be made to the Annual Meeting of the Association or, between annual meetings, to the Executive Board. Upon a vote being taken, the Director of Missions presented must receive at least three-fourths of all votes cast. If the Director of Missions fails to receive the required three-fourths vote, the Moderator shall declare the nominee not elected/employed and shall refer the matter, without debate, to the Search Committee for further investigation and further recommendation under the foregoing procedure.

3. Duties: The Director of Missions shall

- a. fulfill all duties under the direction of the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board;
- serve ex officio in a supervisory capacity on all committees and councils of the Association unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws;

c. promote the work of the Association and denomination;

- d. cooperate with members, their pastors, officers, committees and councils of the Association;
- e. present oral reports to the Associational Council, Missions Development Council, and Executive Board meetings;
- f. present a written report to the annual meeting of the Association;
- g. assist the Clerk in preparation of the composite record of members from information submitted in their annual report to the Association;
- h. assist the Clerk in preparing the annual minutes of the Association.
- 4. Termination: The Director of Missions shall be employed for an indeterminate term The Director of Missions shall give reasonable notice of intent to resign or retire to the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board. The Director of Missions may be removed by an affirmative vote of three-fourths of the "Individuals entitled to vote," a heretofore defined in Article VII, F., at a meeting properly called with ten days writteen notice to the Director of Missions and written notice of the meeting to the members a required by the Bylaws.
- 5. Interim Director of Missions: The Executive Board, in consultation with the Personne

- Committee, shall be responsible for the employment of an Interim Director of Missions when the Association is without a Director of Missions.
- 6. Extended Leave or Absence: During any extended leave or absence of the Director of Missions for medical or other appropriate reasons and with advice of the Personnel Committee, the Executive Board shall make such necessary, temporary or emergency decisions as reasonably shall be required.

ARTICLE XI COMMITTEES AND COUNCILS

Standing Committees:

Except as hereinafter provided, Standing Committees of the Association shall be as follows: Annual Meeting Program Committee; Auditing Committee, Building and Grounds Committee; Bylaw Committee; Finance Committee; Historical Committee; Hunger Awareness Committee; Liaison Committee; Memorials Committee; Nominating Committee; Ordination Examining Committee; Personnel Committee; Place and Preacher Committee; and, Resolutions Committee shall have membership and general responsibilities respectively as follows:

- 1. Annual Meeting Program Committee: The Annual Meeting Program Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Chairman of the Place and Preacher Committee, Director of the Music Council, Pastors of the churches hosting the Annual Meeting, and three persons. The Annual Meeting Program Committee shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting, send a copy of the printed program to all persons on the program at least ten days prior to the annual meeting, present the printed program for adoption at the opening of the Annual Meeting, and serve through the Annual Meeting when adjustments on the program are necessary.
- 2. Auditing Committee: The Auditing Committee shall consist of three persons. The committee shall make an audit or review of the records and receipts of the Association on a quarterly basis. A report should be made to the Finance Committee one month after the end of each quarter in writing as to findings, needed adjustments and suggestions. The committee will meet at least four times a year with the Treasurer as ex-officio member to review the quarterly updated Finance Reports and records. The Annual Audit Report or Review is to be made in writing to be in the Book of Reports as a part of the Finance Committee report. The report needs to be completed by September 30 to be presented at the Annual Meeting.

The Auditing Committee shall have the option of recommending a Review of the Financial Records or a complete Audit of the Financial Records. The Auditing Committee shall recommend to the appropriate Executive Board Meeting, prior to the Annual Session, whether a review or complete audit of the Financial Records is needed. The Auditing Committee is responsible for doing the necessary research to answer any questions concerning Financial Records that may be raised by member churches, messengers, or Executive Board members within a reasonable period.

- 3. Building and Grounds Committee: The Building and Grounds Committee shall consist of three persons. The Building and Grounds Committee shall plan for adequate maintenance, repairs, alterations, improvement, and housekeeping of the physical properties of the Association; upon request of the Director of Missions, assist in considering approval for special use of the facilities of the Association; and, prepare and submit an appropriate budget request for consideration and inclusion in the proposed budget.
- 4. Bylaws Committee: The Bylaws Committee shall consist of three persons, preferably one of whom shall be an attorney. The Bylaws Committee shall consider requests for amendments, alterations, or revisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws and shall make recommendations to the Association with respect thereto; and, periodically review and make recommendations for amendments, alterations, or revisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws.

- 5. Finance Committee: The Finance Committee shall consist of the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer and four persons. The Finance Committee shall study, formulate, and recommend a budget adequately to support the program of the Association; formulate plans for promotion of the budget and cooperation of members in meeting budget needs; review the quarterly and annual financial reports of the Treasurer; review and monitor budget line item expenses; present periodical reports of contributions to members of the Association; and, present a written report to the Annual Meeting of the Association.
- 6. Historical Committee: The Historical Committee shall consist of a Historian and two persons. The Historian shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year and shall serve as Chairperson of the Historical Committee. The Historical Committee shall collect and preserve historical data of the Association; encourage and promote the preservation of historical data by each member; and, present a written report to each annual meeting of the Association. The Historian shall serve as a member of the Media Library (TACMO) Council.
- 7. Hunger Awareness Committee: The Hunger Awareness Committee shall consist of three persons. The Hunger Awareness Committee shall keep abreast of hunger needs throughout the world and shall apprise the Association of these needs and from time to time, upon approval of the Executive Board, shall lead special projects within the Association to meet specific needs.
- 8. Liaison Committee: A Liaison Committee shall be formulated as needed for new work missions/churches and shall be comprised of two persons from the sponsoring church as defined in Article VI, B; two persons from the new mission/church; one person from the Missions Development Council; and, Ex-officio, the Mission Pastor, Sponsoring Church Pastor, and Director of Missions. The Liaison Committee shall meet no less than bi-monthly during the formation period of the mission/church and shall assist in every reasonable manner with the development of the mission/church on behalf of the Association.
- 9. Memorials Committee: The Memorials Committee shall consist of three persons. The Memorials Committee shall prepare and read a report of individuals who have expired since the last annual meeting as reflected in the Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Association furnished by the members and shall conduct a brief, appropriate Memorial Service for such individuals during the Annual Meeting.
- 10. Nominating Committee: The Nominating Committee shall consist of five individuals recommended to the Annual Meeting by the Committee on Nominations and shall meet as often as necessary to fill vacancies and prepare nominations for the Annual Meeting of the association; seek to fill all positions with the best qualified nominees, avoiding the nomination of one individual for more than one position and distributing obligations and privileges of service to member representation; contact all nominees and secure consent before making recommendations to the Association or Executive Board; recommend to the Association during the Annual Meeting the officers, chairpersons, directors, and members of each standing committee and council, and the institutional/agency representatives, unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws; recommend to the Executive Board individuals to fill vacancies of committees and institutional/agency representatives which may occur between Annual Meetings of the Association.
- 11. Ordination Examining Committee: Each church of the Association shall have the exclusive right to ordain for the ministry without Associational involvement. However, member churches shall have the option to utilize the Associational Ordination Examining Committee as hereinafter set out. The Ordination Examining Committee shall consist of five persons. The Ordination Examining Committee shall receive requests from churches within the Association who wish to examine a candidate for ordination to the Gospel ministry; cooperate with the

church requesting examination in setting a mutually satisfactory date for examination; question the candidate for ordination; report its findings to the church making such request for examination; approve for ordination only the candidate who has received a call to serve in an ordained Christian ministry of any kind including, but not limited to that of a member church of the Association, or Baptist churches outside the Association; to serve on the mission field, or to serve as a chaplain in the armed forces or a public institution; and, shall have the option to summons pastors and one lay person from any or all cooperating member churches of the Liberty Baptist Association.

- 12. Personnel Committee: The Personnel Committee shall consist of five persons. Except as otherwise provided in Article X,E., the Personnel Committee shall receive applications, interview applicants, contact references, and carefully investigate applicants considered for staff positions; shall recommend to the Executive Board the prospective employee; shall prepare, periodically review, revise, and recommend changes in job descriptions to the Executive Board; shall make recommendation to the Association in the event of need of a new staff position; shall prepare, periodically review, revise and recommend changes to Personnel Policy Manual and Benefits Plan; periodically evaluate personnel performance and make necessary recommendations to the staff; consult with and perform duties assigned by the Executive Board and as set out in Article X of these Bylaws; establish a salary plan and prepare budget requests with respect to all personnel matters including salaries and fringe benefits and submit such budget requests to the Finance Committee of the Association.
- 13. Place and Preacher Committee: The Place and Preacher Committee shall consist of five persons. The Place and Preacher Committee shall solicit and receive invitations for the place or places of meeting for the next Annual Meeting of the Association, recommend the place or places of the meeting, and recommend the preacher and an alternate preacher to preach the annual sermon at the Annual Meeting of the Association.
- **14. Resolutions Committee:** The Resolutions Committee shall consist of five persons. The Resolutions Committee shall review all properly submitted resolutions which may be reworded for clarity, combined with like issues into one resolution, or rejected if previously addressed or are inappropriate; present all appropriate resolutions to the Association for consideration; prepare and present resolutions of appreciation and other resolutions deemed appropriate; and, notify persons submitting resolutions of the disposition thereof.

B. Standing Councils

Except as hereinafter provided, the Standing Councils of the Association, shall be as follows: Bi-Vocational Ministers Council; Brotherhood Council; Christian Life and Public Affairs Council; Discipleship Training Council; Evangelism Council; Family Ministry Council; Hispanic Ministries Council; Media Library Council (TACMO); Missions Development Council; Multi-Housing Council; Music Council; Pastoral Ministries Council; Seminary Extension Council; Senior Adult Council; Single Adult Council; Stewardship Council; Student Ministries Council; Sunday School Council; Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team; and, Youth Ministries Council with general responsibilities respectively as follows:

- 1. **Bi-Vocational Ministers Council:** The Bi-Vocational Ministers Council shall be composed of Bi-Vocational Ministers (active and retired) selected by the Nominating Committee. The President of the Bi-Vocational Ministers Conference shall be an ex officio member. The purpose of this Council is to address needs of Bi-Vocational ministerial staff.
- 2. Brotherhood Council: The Brotherhood Council will assist churches in involving men and boys in missions; helping churches engage men and boys in missions activities; helping churches prepare to teach missions to men and boys; helping churches lead men and boys to pray for and give to missions; helping churches lead men and boys to develop personal ministry; and, helping churches interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.

- 3. Christian Life and Public Affairs Council: The Christian Life and Public Affairs Council will assist churches in awareness of critical moral and social issues and in leading in Christian action to meet those needs; in applying the gospel to all areas of life; in demonstrating responsible concern for society; in broadening cooperative efforts and emphases; and, in mobilizing and equipping the constituency to be on mission in regard to moral and ethical concerns. Areas of involvement include family life, race relations, citizenship, hunger, and other special moral concerns. The council shall endeavor to provide an annual event of training in an area of moral and social concerns.
- 4. Discipleship Training Council: The Discipleship Training Council will assist churches in starting, improving, and expanding Christian discipleship through their Discipleship Training programs to help churches equip church members for discipleship and personal ministry; teach Christian theology and Baptist doctrine, Christian ethics, Christian history, and church polity and organization; equip church leaders for service; and interpret and undergird the work of the church and denomination.
- 5. Evangelism Council: The Évangelism Council will lead the Association (as churches and as programs) to address the priority of evangelism in its area and will include in its program church evangelism committee development; evangelism strategy development; mass evangelism; personal evangelism; rural and small church evangelism; metropolitan evangelism; specialized evangelism; renewal evangelism; and, evangelism prospect discovery. The council will coordinate with other appropriate councils and member churches Festival Ministries and special event ministries for evangelistic outreach in the association.
- 6. Family Ministry Council: The Family Ministry Council will assist churches in development of family ministry programs and the conduct of family ministry activities which can be accomplished best on the Associational level. It will seek to minister to the distinctive and diverse needs of families.
- 7. Hispanic Ministries Council: The Hispanic Ministries Council will plan, coordinate, and provide ministry to the migrant/seasonal workers in the Association which may include, but shall not be limited to, Bible Study, special trips, medical and dental care, fellowship meals, as well as other needs that may arise. This council will plan, coordinate and provide ministry to permanent Hispanic residents.
- 8. Media Library Council: (Also known as TACMO-The Associational Church Media Library Organization). The Media Library Council (TACMO) will assist churches in the establishment, development, and improvement of church media library services and educate persons in the use of media and provide media and media services to support the church in the achievement of its mission.
- 9. Missions Development Council: The Missions Development Council will lead the association (as churches and as programs) to address the priority missions frontiers in their area through work with Church Missions Development Councils, missions survey and analysis, church extension, language missions, church and community ministries, volunteer chaplaincy ministries, interfaith witness, black church relations, and, special ministries.

The Missions Development Council will be responsible for credentials-acceptance of new churches as more specifically set out in Article VI, C; church extension/new work; language missions; literacy missions; migrant ministry; festival ministries (in cooperation with Evangelism, Woman's Missionary Union & Brotherhood Councils); partnership ministry (State, Home and Foreign); mission projects (church and community ministries); seminary extension; volunteer chaplaincy; interfaith witness; disaster relief (in cooperation with Brotherhood Council); assist churches, as requested, with internal problems; assist groups seeking to organize a new church and work with the Liaison Committee as set out in Article VI, B, and such other duties as may

be delegated by the Executive Board. The Missions Development Council shall plan and coordinate mission ministry projects in consultation with the councils and committees of the Association as needed. The council will make member churches aware of project needs and help secure volunteers.

- 10. Multi-Housing Council: The Multi-Housing Council will seek to involve churches in multi-housing ministries through on-call chaplaincy; group Bible studies; Backyard Bible Clubs/Mission Vacation Bible Schools; recreational activities; special events with music, drama, puppets, etc. It will develop relationships with multi-housing managers; provide training to churches in methodologies and strategies to reach such complexes; and, will make regular reports and recommendations to the Missions Development Council.
- 11. Music Council: The Music Council will seek to enhance the redemptive mission of churches through establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving their music ministries. It will provide musical experiences in congregational services; develop musical skills, attitudes, and understandings; witness and minister through music; interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.
- 12. Pastoral Ministries Council: The Pastoral Ministries Council will assist churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministry, vocational guidance, church administrative services, and Christian weekday education; conduct special projects and activities which enable churches to accomplish their mission, proclaim the gospel to believers and unbelievers, care for the church's members and other persons in the community and interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination. It will minister to the distinctive needs of pastors, deacons, church staff persons, church council, church officers and committee members, church vocations volunteers, and church weekday education staff. This council will include a Church Administration Consultant, Weekday Early Education Consultant, Vocational Guidance Consultant, Deacon Ministry Consultant, and Minister Support Consultant.
- 13. Seminary Extension Council: The Seminary Extension Council will seek to provide college-level theological education to ministers and laypersons and basic theological education to ministers who lack formal education. It will provide curriculum materials, administrative services, promotional materials, training materials for director and teachers, academic records, and certification of centers and teachers.
- 14. Senior Adult Council: The Senior Adult Council will plan activities and ministry projects for member church senior adults and will communicate any appropriate state and national conferences and Chautauguas to member churches. This council may include any elected leader of a member church senior adult organization.
- 15. Single Adult Council: The Single Adult Council will plan activities and ministry projects for member church single adults and will communicate any appropriate state and national conferences to member churches. This council may include any elected leader of a member church single adult organization.
- 16. Stewardship Council: The Stewardship Council will assist churches in development of individual and corporate stewardship, interpretation of Biblical teachings on stewardship, and elevation of individual giving and corporate mission giving in light of those teachings.
- 17. Student Ministries Council: The Student Ministries Council will assist the program of Baptist student ministries at the colleges within the Association or area; assist churches in establishing and supporting ministries with students; and, provide continuing training for workers with students in the churches in order to minister to the needs of college students in the churches and on the campuses in the area.
- 18. Sunday School Council: (Also known as ASSIST: Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team). The Sunday School Council will assist and challenge churches

to improve and enlarge all areas of their Sunday School through planning, training, administration activities, consultation, program interpretation, and cooperative projects. It will encourage and assist churches to reach persons for Bible study, teach the Bible, witness to persons about Christ and lead persons to church membership, minister to Sunday School members and nonmembers, lead members to worship, and interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.

- 19. Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team: The Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team will assist churches in promoting missions, establishing, enlarging, and strengthening Woman's Missionary Union work, teaching missions, engaging in mission action and personal witnessing, supporting missions, and participating in the work of the church and the denomination.
- 20. Youth Ministries Council: The Youth Ministries Council shall plan youth related ministries for the Association including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.
- C. General duties of Standing Councils: The Director and Council members of each council shall keep informed of materials, programs, and events related to the specific area of interest indicated by the title of said council; shall assist in training leadership and promoting the specific interest area within the Association; shall cooperate with other councils of the Association in coordinating emphases and assisting churches in their divinely appointed mission opportunities individually and collectively. Each council shall meet as often as necessary (at least quarterly) to fulfill its responsibilities in keeping with standards established by the Association for its respective organization. A written report from each council shall be made to the Annual Meeting of the Association. The Director of each respective council shall serve on the Associational Council of the Association.
- **D.** <u>Election and Term</u>: The Standing Committees and Councils listed in Sections A and B of this Article, except the Woman's Missionary Union Council and Director, and the Chairperson/Director respectively thereof shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at the Annual Meeting of the Association. The term of office shall be one year beginning at the adjournment of the Annual Meeting in which the election was held.
- E. Other Committees and Councils: The Association may create such other committees and councils, not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation and these Bylaws, as may from time to time be required, and in furtherance thereof, the Executive Board shall be empowered to establish and appoint interim standing committees and councils. The Nominating Committee shall give recommendations to fill these new positions to the Executive Board. At the next Annual Meeting of the Association, messengers shall consider whether to amend these Bylaws by their inclusion as new standing committees and councils.

F. Special Standing Committees, Councils, Auxiliary, & Institutional/Agency Representatives:

Special Standing Committees, Councils, Auxiliary, and Institutional/Agency Representatives of the Association shall be the Committee on Nominations, Associational Council, Woman's Missionary Union and Institutional/Agency Representatives, whose membership and responsibilities are as follows:

1. Committee on Nominations: The Committee on Nominations shall consist of three persons who shall be nominated by the officers and elected by the Executive Board at the meeting prior to the September meeting. The Committee on Nominations shall serve until the annual meeting when its report is made to the Association. The duty of the Committee on Nominations shall be to nominate the Nominating Committee at the Annual Meeting and to recommend to the Executive Board individuals to fill any Nominating Committee vacancies during the year. In the event of a vacancy between any Executive Board or Annual Meeting, the Committee on Nominations shall appoint a replacement to begin immediate interim service

until election of a nominee for the term of office at the next Executive Board or Annual Meeting following the vacancy occurrence.

- 2. Associational Council: The Associational Council shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, and Directors of all Standing Councils as set out in Article XI, B. The Council shall plan and correlate the calendar and program activities of the program councils of the Association and make any needed recommendations to the Executive Board/Annual Meeting.
- 3. Woman's Missionary Union: The Woman's Missionary Union of Liberty Baptist Association is an auxiliary of Liberty Baptist Association and elects its director, officers, and council. These elected officers are included for information in the Reports of the Association and the Director of Woman's Missionary Union serves on the Standing Council and Executive Board with full voting privileges. The Woman's Missionary Union is governed by their own Constitution and Bylaws.
- 4. Institutional/Agency Representatives: One person to serve as the Institutional/Agency Representative within the Association shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association for a term of one year. The representative will receive information from the respective institution/agency during the year and shall prepare a report for the Annual Meeting of the Association.
- 5. Partnership Coordinators: Partnership Coordinators (Foreign, Home, State, Associational Missions) shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association for a term of one year. Partnership Coordinators shall receive information, work with the Missions Development Council, provide leadership and orientation for partnership project participants as needed. Partnership Coordinators shall prepare a report for the Annual Meeting of the Association of work accomplished.
- 6. Assistant Treasurer: The Assistant Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected for a term of one year. The Assistant Treasurer shall be eligible for reelection each year. In the absence of the Treasurer due to illness, emergency or resignation, the Assistant Treasurer will be responsible for signing checks, maintaining records, make deposits, and paying bills that are due. The Assistant Treasurer shall function for the Treasurer as requested by the Treasurer within reason in carrying out the duties of Treasurer as an officer of the Association only under emergency, illness, or resignation circumstances.

ARTICLE XII

ADOPTION AND AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS AND CORPORATE DOCUMENTS

A. Adoption:

These Bylaws shall be considered adopted and in immediate effect when a majority of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F., at an annual meeting or a special meeting shall vote in favor thereof. This vote shall be taken not less than thirty days after mailing a copy of these Bylaws to each member.

B. Amendment:

These Bylaws, the Articles of Incorporation, or any parts thereof may be amended, altered, or repealed only by a majority vote of "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F., at the Annual Meeting or a special meeting of the Association.

C. Preservation:

A copy of all original corporate records, including but not limited to the Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws, and Personnel Policies, shall be maintained at all times by the Clerk in the office of the Association; and copies of the same shall be kept in separate locations. All amendments to said documents or to any provisions thereof shall be prepared promptly after adoption by the Association; and the Secretary shall cause the same and copies to be typed or printed in proper form and attached to the originals of respective documents and kept as above stated.

<u>ARTICLE XIII</u> GENERAL AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

A. Fiscal Year:

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from September 1 to August 31.

B. Reports:

Reports of officers, committees, councils, and church letters to the Association shall cover the period from September 1 to August 31. All reports for the annual meeting shall be in writing for inclusion in the published Book of Reports and shall be limited to 250 words

C. Audit:

An annual audit or review of the financial records of the Association shall be conducted by an independent accounting firm elected by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Finance Committee.

D. Records:

The membership rolls, minutes of meetings, and annual reports shall be available at al reasonable times for all reasonable purposes.

E. Policy Manual:

The Policy Manual shall contain documents of procedure and the adopted Budget an Nominations Report not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation and these Bylaw from various committees and councils that have been recommended to and approved b the Executive Board and/or Annual Meeting. These policies will be governing rules an procedures of the respective committees and councils of the Association. They may be amended by the Executive Board and/or Annual Meeting by a simple vote of persor present provided a quorum has been met.

F. Seal:

There shall appear within the center of the Corporate Seal of the Association the word "Corporate Seal," around which shall appear two concentric circles within which will be inscribed Liberty Baptist Association of North Carolina, 1832. Such seal, as impressed on the margin hereof, is hereby adopted as the corporate seal of the Corporation.

G. Gender:

The use of terms in these Bylaws that may in other contexts tend to denote gender intended to be neutral as to gender. The masculine shall be deemed to include the feminine and the feminine deemed to include the masculine.

H. Majority:

Unless these Bylaws or The General Statutes of North Carolina otherwise require different number, a majority of those in attendance at any general or special meeting members or the Executive Board with a quorum present shall be required to effect a action.

The active pastor, or if none; the Interim pastor of each member church; or if neither, the church secretary (italics denotes change in wording). This recommendation was approved as presented.

Rev. Stuart White, Director of the Discipleship Training Council, gave the report which was approved. Jo Ann Roumillat, Chairman of the Finance Committee, thanked those members of the Finance Committee and the Personnel Committee for their services, and the churches for their financial support. The 1998-1999 Budget has been increased 11.5%. Primary increases are for increased hours of work for the Associational Secretary, Moving Expense for a New Director of Missions, Mileage for the Administrative Team and Associational Secretary, Maintenance increase for necessary repairs and updating of Associational Office, and an added amount for Office

Equipment to update the computer system. Motion was made and passed to accept the proposed budget.

Rev. Morris Hollifield, Chairman of the Administrative Leadership Team gave a report of their activities since appointment on July 28, 1998. The other members of the Administrative Leadership Team are: Mrs. Charlotte Cook, Rev. Charles Dickens, Dr. Brooks Hunt, Rev. Davis McGuirt, and Mr. Bill Reece. Following a motion for adoption, the Moderator expressed appreciation to the Administrative Leadership Team for their work and the congregation gave a round of applause. The report was consequently approved.

Mike Russell led in singing "Hark, the Voice of Jesus Calling." A love offering was taken for Missionary Jimmy Joseph during the singing of this hymn. Dr. Dan Hutchins, Pastor of Reeds Baptist Church and Seminary Extension Coordinator, gave a report on the **Prison Ministry and Seminary Extension Program**, which was adopted. Dr. Hutchins urged anyone who has a Master's Degree and is interested in teaching a course at the prison to contact him.

Rev. Roy Cantrell, Pastor of Abbotts Creek Baptist Church, introduced Rev. Jimmy Joseph, International Mission Board Missionary, who gave a report on the ongoing ministry in Grenada. He expressed thanks on behalf of the people of Grenada for the contributions given them from our state.

Rev. Stuart White, Chairman of the **South Africa Partnership Committee**, stated that our Association responded to a request from South Africa, and as a result two ladies, Mrs. Betsy Leach and Mrs. Evelyn Reece, will leave on October 6th to go to BASA Association in South Africa. Mrs. Leach and Mrs. Reece shared their personal testimonies. Afterwards Dr. Ron Pierce gave Words of Challenge, Rev. Gary Myers led in a Congregational Responsive Reading, and Mrs. Charlotte Cook had a Prayer of Commitment. Rev. White presented the ladies with South Africa Partnership lapel pins, tee shirts, and notes from various members of the Association which are to be read on the way or upon arrival in South Africa.

An inspirational program of special music was presented by the choir of Carolina Memorial Baptist Church. Mrs. Charlotte Cook, member of the Administrative Leadership Team, introduced Dr. James Royston, Executive Director/Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, who gave the evening message. The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Morris Hollifield.

LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION REPORTS

ADMINISTRATIVE LEADERSHIP TEAM REPORT

Upon recommendation by the Personnel Committee, the Executive Board elected an Administrative Leadership Team during their meeting on July 28, 1998. The Team is composed of six members as follows: Rev. Morris Hollifield, Chairman; Dr. Brooks Hunt, Vice Chairman; Mrs. Charlotte Cook; Rev. Charles Dickens; Rev. Davis McGuirt; and Mr. Bill Reece.

The Administrative Leadership Team held their first meeting on Thursday, August 6, with the Missions Development Council and the Personnel Committee. A second meeting was held on Tuesday, August 25, with focus being directed toward some evident issues of concern. The third meeting was held on Tuesday, September 8, and reports were given by Team members concerning visits with pastors and church leadership. A fourth meeting was held on Tuesday, September 29, with all members present. Reports of contacts were shared, new areas of concern were considered, and work books were distributed for study and preparation toward developing objectives and evaluations. The next meeting is scheduled at the Associational office for 9:00 am on Tuesday, October 27.

Upon invitation, Mrs. Gail Beck, Secretary and Clerk for the Association, has joined the Team for each of their sessions. She has provided invaluable assistance through making records available, keeping minutes of the meetings, doing research on various areas of earlier work, and helping with calendar planning. It was also believed that Rev. Bill Morrow, Chairman of the Personnel Committee, could help this Team clarify objectives. He has met with the Leadership Team on several occasions, and his observations and questions have been most helpful.

The philosophy of the Leadership Team arose out of expressed needs and envisioned opportunities. Shaping this approach began with orientation provided by the Personnel Committee and the first meeting with the Missions Development Council. Through extended meetings, continued prayer, and work with Associational leadership, several standards emerged which have provided boundaries and structure for the work of this Leadership Team. Perhaps these can be summarized as follows:

- The Administrative Leadership Team will work through existing Committees and Councils. It
 does not possess authority nor delegated power to make decisions, change procedures, nor alter
 the course of work already in progress.
- 2. The Administrative Leadership Team will assist elected officers and committees to strive for fiscal integrity in the community.
- The Administrative Leadership Team will seek to visit pastors and churches in an effort to understand the needs and wishes of the Association.
- 4. A directed effort is being initiated which seeks to encourage the churches to work together in harmony to further the cause of Christ, both here and abroad.

Through both expressed needs and occasioned opportunities, conferences have been held with various leaders from the Baptist State Convention of NC. The Director of the Missions Division, the Director of Language Ministries, the Director of Seminary Extension, the New Work Strategist, and the Director of Associational Development have all provided counsel and help in evaluation.

- Several recommendations have been presented to the Missions Development Council as follows:
- In planning for further work through the Flea Market Ministry on I-85 South, the management
 expressed reservations about an organized group conducting regular services. After conversation
 and a vote by the vendors, the recommendation was made that we withdraw from this ministry
 and leave it to the hands of individual ministers.
- 2. The Leadership Team recommended that Dr. Dan Hutchins (Pastor of the Reeds Baptist Church) be elected as the representative to the Davidson County Chaplaincy Association. It is under the auspices of this association that our ministry of Seminary Extension is carried on at the local prison for men. The Summer class was concluded and the fall class will begin on October 6, taught by Rev. Ben Flemming, Pastor of Stoner's Grove Baptist Church. There is a need for additional certified teachers (which requires a Masters degree from an accredited institution, and approval by the Director of Chaplaincy with our State Convention).
- 3. The Leadership Team recommended that Liberty Baptist Association resign its membership in the Thomasville Area Chamber of Commerce. It is believed our witness is impaired by being an active member of the group seeking to make liquor more available. There is also the matter of the cost of membership, which will enable the Finance Committee to shift these funds to other pressing needs. Perhaps through friendship, church influence, and Christian witness, the constituency of the larger community will still have great voice in moral issues.
- 4. The Leadership Team has requested the Personnel Committee to proceed with plans to look towards employing an Interim Director of Missions in January.

The Team is continuing to visit churches, talk with pastors, communicate with church leaders, and seek input from people across the association. An effort has been made to reduce operating costs, and take any possible steps toward greater fiscal responsibility. The Finance Committee, Treasurer, and Auditing Committee have been working toward putting the Association on a sound financial basis. Several churches have increased their contributions and this has provided working capital to meet all monetary obligations.

Your support is deeply appreciated, and your prayers are urgently requested. Thank you for the privilege of serving with you in the Liberty Baptist Association.

ALPHA PREGNANCY SUPPORT, INC.

The Alpha Pregnancy Support center opened in 1991 with two primary goals: To present the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and to offer alternatives to abortion. This center serves the 14 townships in Davidson County and since 1991, 2,249 clients have been served.

From January through September, 1998, we served 220 clients, 70 of whom were new; had 118 opportunities to witness with 21 accepting Christ; and had 40 new births. In 1997, over 30,000 abortions were performed in the State of North Carolina: 5,683 abortions were performed between the ages of 15-19; 247 were teens between the ages of 10-14; and there were 104 abortions reported in Davidson County.

- Free pregnancy tests and pregnancy counseling.
- Referral for Adoption, medical and community service.
- Teen M.O.M.S. (Mothers Offering Mothers Support), and M.O.M.S. classes.

- P.A.C.E. (post abortion counseling).
- Prayer Intercessory Group

 coats for emergency shipment to the poverty stricken areas of North Korea. Several hundred
 garments were collected and delivered to Wake Forest, NC, for packing and shipping. Volunteers
 from our Association were also involved in two large shipments of food to these same North
 Koreans.

- **4.** Angel Tree Program: Our Brotherhood continues to support this worthwhile endeavor. You may sponsor children of prisoners for the Christmas program and Camp Angel Tree.
- 5. <u>Camp Mundo Vista Renovations</u> continue full speed ahead. The hopeful plan is to complete 16 cabins by June, 1999, with only 4 remaining cabins for the year 2000. We meet every Thursday, September through May, and any Saturday you wish to make plans to work. We need your continued support.
- 6. <u>Dead-Bolt Lock Installation for Elderty:</u> This joint effort of Baptist Men and Davidson County Senior Services came to its conclusion on September 2, 1998 when the last of the supplied locks were installed. We now have lost count of the total number of locks installed. Both the installers and recipients have expressed satisfaction and joy with the total results of these efforts.

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DAVIDSON MEDICAL MINISTRIES CLINIC, INC.

Davidson Medical Ministries Clinic, (DMMC), is again honored with the opportunity to provide a report for Liberty Baptist Association. We are most grateful for not only your continued financial support but also your prayer support.

These are exciting times at DMMC. The needs continue to grow as we seek new and creative ways to expand our services to residents of Davidson County.

Last fiscal year, we filled 22,753 prescriptions and had 1,586 encounters in our medical and dental clinics. These services, if purchased by the client, would have cost in excess of \$1.5 million dollars.

This year proves to be just as busy. In 8 months of our fiscal year, we have already filled 15,750 prescriptions. Overall, this will average the same numbers for the end of the year totals as in previous years. It is also important to note that this summer we decreased the number of prescriptions we fill per patient from 6 to 4. This was done in an effort to continue to see new patients and for lack of sufficient finances to purchase meds at an ever-growing cost.

Other creative ways to expand services have included a year of offering Nursing Clinics through a partnership with Davidson County Community College on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Patients have been able to receive individualized care and attention, and the opportunity to network with other resources is more attainable.

As we look to our future, we are excited! DMMC has purchased property on Salisbury Street in Lexington on which to building a new facility. We are currently in a fundraising capital campaign to raise funds for the building. As this project progresses, there will be many opportunities for groups to participate in the building of the new clinic. I'm sure we will be calling on you to help again. There will also be many opportunities for church groups to perhaps furnish a room or purchase necessary equipment. Please keep DMMC in mind as you think of ways you would like to make a lasting impact on the lives of others.

One of the things I am most excited about in the new clinic is the chapel. We are excited about the opportunity that will exist for the local churches, active ministers, retired ministers, and lay people to be involved in the spiritual health of our clients.

As we face our future with excitement and hope, we are also challenged to deal with the present in a realistic manner. Our concern is that funding for our monthly operations not suffer during the focus on the new building. That is where the churches' support will be vital. We must be able to depend on you for continued support. Our goal is that churches will consider 1% of their budget as their gift to DMMC. Just as the cooperative effort of Baptists works throughout the world, the same effort works within our county. If all of us give a little, we can accomplish a lot!

In conclusion, I would remind you that DMMC is only able to do what we do because of individuals who care enough to become involved. We always need willing workers. We need doctors, dentists, pharmacists, nurses, CMA's, dental assistants and hygienists, business people to do eligibility, and clerical help in many capacities. We need people to answer the phone in the mornings, we need people to make appointments and work in the pharmacy in the afternoons. There is something for everyone...We Need You!

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

October, 1997 thru September, 1998

The first meeting of our Associational year, which is the first of September through the end of August, was held at Park Place Baptist Church. The Executive Board met on November 17, 1997, at Trinity Baptist Church, Welcome; on January 19, 1998, at Cedar Lodge Baptist Church, Thomasville; on May 18, 1998, at Victory Baptist Church, Thomasville; and had called Executive Board meetings at Center Hill Baptist Church and Faith Baptist Church in Lexington.

Our Toy Store Ministry made it possible for 107 families, with 242 children, to experience the joy of having gifts at Christmas. Those who distributed these toys to needy families will confirm that it is truly more blessed to give than to receive. Once again we will receive contributions from a toy company that has been so generous in the past. Arrangements have already been made to pick up the toys, using a donated truck and volunteers to help load and unload. You received information pertaining to the Toy Store today and we look forward to receiving your contributions.

There were 295 prisoners of Davidson Correctional Center for Men and 106 at Piedmont Correctional Center for Women, who received gifts from Liberty Baptist Association. Again this year we are collecting items to give to the prisoners. This is a major undertaking. If you don't believe me, just come by the Associational office and look at the tables in the conference room, which will be overflowing and piled high with contributions. A list of needed items was given to you today and I urge you to begin bringing these to the Associational office as soon as possible.

Our Seminary Extension program at Davidson County Prison has been successful and a new class will begin tomorrow night. Rev. Benn Flemming, Pastor at Stoner's Grove, will be teaching this class on New Testament Survey, The Early Beginnings. We will be having a more detailed report on

Seminary Extension later in our program.

On September 12, 1998, the Evangelism Council sponsored an Associational Event at Carolina Memorial Baptist Church. The evening began with a Missions Fair which featured examples and displays of the LBA ministries. Games were available for children. An inspirational Evangelism Celebration followed the Missions Fair.

First Baptist Church, Lexington, hosted the Key Leader Conference on September 22nd. There were 11 separate conferences with classes for those working with children to senior adults; those dealing with grief and in need of support groups; deacons seeking guidance with Family Ministry; Pastors and leaders looking for new worship styles or resolutions of conflict. More than 100 people attended and each felt blessed to have participated and came away with new perspectives for daily use.

On July 28, 1998, in a called meeting of the Executive Board at Faith Baptist Church, an Administration Leadership Team was elected for our Association. These members are: Mrs. Charlotte Cook; Rev. Charles Dickens; Rev. Davis McGuirt; Mr. Bill Reece; Rev. Morris Hollifield, Chairman, and Dr. Brooks Hunt, Vice Chairman. This Team invited me to meet with them and it has been my privilege to assist in any way possible and to keep the minutes of their meetings. Each time we have met the primary goal is to seek the guidance and leadership of God, and to strive with Christian love to search out those things which will be best for Liberty Baptist Association.

This has not been an easy year for our Association. It has been a time of difficult decisions, praying, seeking God's guidance, praying, seeking to do what is best for our Association, and above all, praying some more. HOST CHURCHES HISTORIES

Carolina Memorial Baptist Church History

Carolina Avenue Baptist Church was organized in the summer of 1930 with ten (10) charter members: Mr. & Mrs. H. D. Bradshaw, Mr. & Mrs. Will Beusse, Mr. John Britt, Mrs. Ada Hill, Mrs. Neppie Gordon, Mr. Bud Dennis, and Mr. & Mrs. George England. Rev. R. L. West was the first pastor. The church was admitted to the Liberty Baptist Association in 1931.

In 1947, the church purchased a house on Aycock Street to serve as the parsonage. Rev. Carl Hemphill came as pastor in 1957. The church was richly blessed and a new parsonage was built on Duke Street where the Hemphill's lived.

On March 2, 1959, the church purchased the Siler property on the corner of Liberty Drive and Sunrise Avenue as a future site for their new building. In January 1960, the church had their first Forward Program. This is a program that asks each member to pledge to give a tithe for the following year. By following the Lord and working together, they saw what they could do with their budget for the next year.

In 1961, the church voted to sell bonds to finance their new building. The building became a reality on March 8, 1964, when Mr. H. D. Bradshaw, a charter member, opened the doors for the first time. At that time the church changed it's name to Carolina Memorial Baptist Church.

In 1991, Rev. Stuart White came as pastor. Many changes have taken place since his coming. In 1993, the attendance had increased until it became necessary to begin having two Sunday morning worship services - one at 8:30 am and one at 11:00 am. Since the church was so richly blessed with growth, additional land adjacent to the present property was purchased. In 1994, a ground breaking was held for a new fellowship hall and classrooms. At the same time, renovation on the existing building took place. A Dedication Service was held on May 21, 1995.

In April 1993, the church was incorporated. Also in 1993, a call was extended to the first Youth/Education Minister, Rev. Daryl Triplett, who served until 1996. In November, 1997, Rev. Tim Landreth filled that position. In 1994, the church adopted by-laws.

Because of the wonderful growth in the church, a Growth Fund Committee was formed in 1998 to make plans for retiring the debt of the new addition. Plans could then be made for a new sanctuary that would combine both Sunday morning worship services into one service again.

The present church property is worth two million, five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000), with a total membership of 776.

The church has had ten (10) pastors who are listed below:

Between 1964 and 1998, nine (9) men were ordained as ministers: Bobby Martin, Harold McAlpin, Tom Brinkley, Ken Hemphill, Larry Thompson, David Barton, Daryl Triplett, and Tim Landreth.

The church's first career missionary, Kim Dickey, was appointed on September 10, 1996, and commissioned on October 8, 1996, by the Foreign Mission Board. Many members have served as volunteers in mission projects in both near and far away places. There have been many seeds planted through mission trips, giving of money, and prayers.

On August 30, 1998, the church called Rev. Ken Miller as the first Associate Pastor of Visitation. Rev. Miller will assist the Pastor, Rev. White, with visitation of the sick, hospitalized, shut-ins, and rest home patients.

To God be the glory! Great things He has done!

First Baptist Church, Thomasville History

On August 26, 1859, the Thomasville Baptist Church, composed of nine (9) members, was received into Liberty Baptist Association. The delegates were: Aquilla Jones, S. H. Dorsett, and John Hudson. The Reverend John Mitchell was the pastor.

At the time the church was formed, Thomasville was a thriving seven year old village with a population of some three hundred (300). Businesses consisted of a brickyard, flour and grist mill, two shoe factories, a carriage works, several stores, a new three story brick female seminary, and a hotel. Many beautiful new residences were surrounded by natural groves.

Seeing the need for church buildings in the village, John W. Thomas, founder of Thomasville, gave the Baptist church a lot still occupied by the present church. The frame building was completed in 1862, the membership having grown to twenty-four (24).

In August, 1863, the Liberty Baptist Association held its annual meeting in the new church.

The first report of a Sunday School in the Thomasville Baptist Church was in the 1872 Association minutes. The enrollment was 41. In 1875, H. W. Reinhart was Superintendent of the Sunday School with two teachers and an enrollment of 30.

For the first forty years the church grew very slowly with many short pastorates. For twenty-seven years the pastorate of this church was shared with the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage Church organized in 1891.

In 1896, a Woman's Missionary Society was organized. In April, 1904, the Sunbeam Society was started, and in 1910, the Y.W.A. In 1913, the B.Y.P.U. was organized and entertained the State B.Y.P.U. its first year.

From 1900 to 1910, Thomasville's official population increased from 751 to 3,877, during which decade many factories were built and new families moved into the town. The membership of the church grew rapidly, necessitating a new church building. A large brick building, containing sanctuary and Sunday School rooms, was constructed in 1912-13. The church became debt-free in 1919 and called its first full-time pastor in 1924-1925, Rev. C. H. Trueblood.

In 1912, while the brick building was being erected, the church women formed a Church Furnishing Society. The first money they raised bought green church carpet; then they labored for years to buy the first pipe organ. This organization, after a few years called the Ladies Aid, for fifty years provided the organ's full care; for many years has arranged for flowers to adorn the sanctuary, provided embroidered linen cloths and silver containers for the Lord's Supper observance; silver collection plates; a succession of choir vestments; and met many other church needs.

The year 1934 saw the completion of a growth program consisting of ground floor Sunday School rooms, a new heating plant, acquisition of adjoining property, and the erection of a new brick parsonage. The large debt incurred was paid in full in 1942.

Since 1913 the church has led in organizing Southside, Carolina Avenue, Reid Street, and Greenwood Baptist churches.

In 1951, a special ministry to the deaf was started in the church. One year later the Baptist State Convention employed the Reverend Jerry Potter to devote full time to the work with the deaf ir North Carolina Baptist churches. This service continues to this time.

In 1859, the Thomasville Baptist Church owned less than one-fifth acre of real estate. Now the holdings are approximately two (2) acres. In 1862, a little frame church was built. Now there are three well-equipped brick buildings (the sanctuary, adult and youth buildings), with adequate parking space available. In 1950, the Education Building was started with completion in 1951.

In 1960-63, the new Sanctuary and Adult Education Building were erected. In 1975, the churc's was debt-free. Later that year the adjoining Masonic property was purchased.

In 1983, the Family Care Deacon Ministry was started and in 1985, the church purchased a new van. In 1986, the church purchased the first computers. In that same year, hymnals were donated to Rich Fork Baptist Church when their church burned. During that time First Baptist agreed for Rich Fork to use our church for weddings and funerals. In 1987, a new sound system was purchased

The special ministries of First Baptist Church include: Baptist Men, Royal Ambassadors, Deaco Family Ministry, Deaf Ministry, Fire Station Ministry, Homebound Ministry, Ladies Aid, Pastor Pals, Prayer Warriors, Woman's Missionary Union, Acteens, Girls in Action, Mission Friends, Yout Ministries.

The Missions Development Council was very active in the life of the Liberty Baptist Association during the past year. There was a continued emphasis on Partnership missions with South Africa being highlighted.

1. A great deal of work was done this year on the 1998-2000 Mission Strategy Focus Statements and Work Plans. A retreat was held on March 23 to develop work plans and applications. Bobby Stafford from the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina led in this session.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

"Come Go With Me" was the WMU emphasis for 1997-1998. Woman's Missionary Union challenged Christians to "Go Make Decisions...Follow Christ's Servant Example." Our two goals for the year were: (1) to challenge the church to take a fresh look at needs outside the church walls and start a new ministry and (2) to lead more people to study Christ's response to human needs and follow His example in witness and ministry. Keeping these in mind, WMU planned and carried out many mission projects.

One of our first events was the annual leadership training for the local church leaders in September. North Lexington hosted the meeting on September 15, 1997. During the year, various activities were offered to enhance the local church efforts. Women on Mission sponsored women's prayer celebrations and breakfasts on October 25 at First Baptist Church in Welcome, First Baptist Church of Denton, and Greenwood Baptist. Churches were encouraged to observe the Week of Prayer for International Missions in November, 1997. The missions study topic was holistic ministry to the hungry.

WMU sponsored a North American Mission Study, "Start Something New," which was held February 16 to assist and encourage small churches who do not have their own studies. Center Hill Church hosted the event. This was well-attended with several churches participating, and all agelevel groups were available. Giving to both the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering was encouraged.

Age-level consultants had events during the year. We had 52 people present at the Acteens Lock-In on March 13-14, 1998, at Abbotts Creek Baptist Church. Participants enjoyed inspiring speakers, great singing, delightful puppet shows, and plenty of food. In addition, the National Acteens Convention was held in Louisville, Kentucky, from July 1-4, 1998. Our association was well-represented. During the week, Acteens made over 1,000 quilts for the needy and brought in thousands of baby items to be used at a crisis pregnancy center. They were involved with painting, cleaning, helping with children, and feeding the hungry. Many decisions were made for Christ during the week of worship, music, fun, and testimonies from Acteens and missionaries.

Mission Friends sponsored a day camp on May 16, 1998, at Southside Church in Thomasville. Many children enjoyed numerous activities for learning about missions in Alaska.

Leadership training for the 1998-1999 year was provided for all WMU officers, directors, teachers, facilitators, and coordinators on Monday, August 10, 1998, at Coggins Memorial Baptist Church.

An Associational Missions Fair and Evangelism Celebration was held September 12, 1998, at Carolina Memorial. Booths were set up to exhibit work being done in various Associational ministries and projects. Participants could purchase a meal, play games, and learn about mission efforts in Grenada, South Africa, disaster relief, toy store, literature collection and East St. Louis. It has been our desire to promote and help existing ministries such as Davidson Medical Ministries, Alpha Pregnancy Support Center, Migrant Ministry, Book Link, Toy Store, and Christmas gifts for prisoners in Davidson County.

The Christmas Prison Ministry project was a great success in December, 1997. Donations were received for 290 gifts for men and 109 gifts for women. Another successful project was the Toy Store Ministry. One hundred eight families received toys. Both projects are being repeated for 1998. WMU received many donations to be used by mission team volunteers.

The Associational WMU Leadership Team had the privilege of hosting Rev. Brian Jardine, South Africa Area Coordinator, NATAL Baptist Association, as a guest for our October, 1997, planning meeting. He spoke briefly and gave an overview of the work in South Africa. Our association later received a request from BASA Association in South Africa to send two women to lead a women's retreat and give instruction in Christian family living in October, 1998. Betsy Leach (Abbotts Creek) and Evelyn Reece (Cedar Lodge) volunteered to go.

The Annual WMU Meeting for our association was held at Oak Hill Memorial Baptist Church on April 27, 1998, in conjunction with the Women on Mission Salad Supper. Special highlights were a puppet show by the GAs of Oak Hill and guest speakers Jeanette Walters, Missions Ministries Consultant from the state WMU staff, and others who have shown what it means to "Come Go With Me." Betty Bradshaw, outgoing WMU Director, highlighted our WMU year with the help of Dr. Richard Capps, while Davis and Mary Kay McGuirt from Central Baptist Church provided the theme interpretation. The event was so well attended (over 200 people) that we plan to do it again next year at First Baptist, Welcome, on March 22, 1999.

Associational WMU exists for a specific purpose: to promote and participate in Christian missions through the organizations of WMU in the churches and missions of Liberty Baptist Association. We receive and distribute information to the churches to enhance existing organizations or help to begin new work where God leads individuals to become involved. We thank God for the privilege of working with Him.

Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina - 1998 Sybil Stewart, Trustee Chair

Her voice steady and quiet, Christy delivers her personal story like a letter dropped into an anonymous mailbox at a shuttered house on a nameless street.

Her grandparents' murder had unleashed memories of her own abuse. Family members encouraged her to leave her home and repeatedly told her she was worthless.

"I've had a rough life," she says. "I've been through about anything I can possibly go through." Christy admits carrying a short fuse and outbursts, physical abuse and a dangerous living situation brought her to Mills Home in November, 1997.

She continues her quiet story about coming to Mills Home, about doing well in school, and tutoring two residents in Alumni Cottage. She's glad she can help, because "learning comes easy to me, and I want to help someone if I can."

Julie, her first child care worker at Mills Home, became a real friend she "helped me turn my life around," Christy says, her face at last beginning to brighten. "She was there for me when I needed somebody. My parents weren't there. Nobody wanted me. It was fun being around Julie. She showed me she cared about me and that I could be loved."

She Didn't Plan to See 16

Julie couldn't realize how important her friendship was, or how close Christy came to giving up. Christy admits to two suicide attempts, and believed she would never see age 16. "I used to dread getting up," she said. "I didn't know if I would get my mouth busted or my arm broke."

Even now, there are days Christy doesn't want to get out of bed. But she does, and she goes to school and earns mostly "As" and stars on the varsity basketball team, and tutors other residents in math. and went to New York for a summer basket-ball tournament and is planning to attend college to study a helping profession.

Now she is planning to live, not planning to die. BCH is giving her opportunities to live for.

Christy's story is repeated hundreds of times each at BCH. Not all are as dramatic but every one tells of a young person and a family at the end of an unraveling rope.

At four residential campuses, two homes for

found help in troubled times last year.

During the past year BCH received \$1.6 million through the Cooperative Program, and \$752,000 through the Thanksgiving Offering. Total church gifts of \$3.3 million comprises 18 percent of the nearly \$18 million in revenue. Because of a positive investment environment, BCH investments of endowment funds provided 33 percent of revenue. **Buildings Dedicated**

Two major priorities of the \$10.1 million "Light Their Way" Campaign were dedicated: The Winifred Lindsay Education/Administrative Center at Odum Home in Pembroke on Jan. 20, and the John D. and Amelia W. Johnson Cottage at Mills Home on May

U.S. Congressman Mike McIntyre, co-chair of the Congressional Task Force for Responsible Fatherhood, spoke at the dedication of the Lindsay Center. He said BCH has the "purpose, people and passion" to successfully help children and families turn their lives around."

"When we reach out to children we're making the best investment for tomorrow we could ever make for our country," he said.

Winifred Lee Herbert Lindsay, for whom the Lindsay Center is named, died Nov. 21, 1997.

Primary funds for building Johnson Cottage were given by Phil and Sharon Drake, of Franklin, in memory of Sharon's father and in honor of her mother, a BCH trustee.

"God has given me more than I deserve," Drake said in a brief, emotional address at the dedication. He said giving money to build the cottage was the "easy part" compared to the cottage worker's task of making a difference in children's lives.

Michael C. Blackwell celebrated his 15th anniversary as president of BCH on July 1, 1998.

The Council on Christian Higher Education was founded by the Convention in 1944. It was established to assist colleges and churches within the Convention. The Council does not exercise any authority over the Baptist colleges. The competent leadership of trustees, administrators, and faculty guide them as they fulfill their missions. It does, however, study and recommend to the General Board in matters related to Baptist colleges and the Baptist State Convention.

Four men have led the Council as its Executive Director. Claude Gaddy served as the Council's founding leader. Harold Cole served briefly. Ben Fisher succeeded him. T. Robert Mullinax joined the Council in 1971. Mullinax retired this year from the post he has faithfully guided for 27 years.

The Council and Executive Committee of the General Board invited Wayne D. Wike to become the Council's fifth leader. Wike comes to his post from the pastorate. He has served four North Carolina churches as pastor.

He and his wife, Debbie, are alumni of Gardner-Webb University. In addition, he is a graduate of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and Union Theological Seminary.

Wike has already served North Carolina Baptists in a number of ways. He served on the Committee on Committees, Chaired the Committee on Nominations, and Chaired the General Board Membership Study Committee.

Council members have greatly assisted each one of these leaders through the years. The college presidents, provosts, and chairmen of Boards of Trustees, along with an equal number of General Board members, serve as members of the Council.

The strength of the Council lies in its voluntary concept of community rather than competition. The Council has proven to be a mediating influence in relating the colleges to each other, to the church, and to the Convention.

The Council is currently involved in strategy planning. It is seeking to prepare for the new millenium. The future holds great promise. The Council and its member colleges want to be prepared for it. The Baptist churches in North Carolina will benefit as a result.



The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception i 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies i generating endowment to enhance their permanent financial support. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and Genera Board staff merits increased individual collective financial support. The Baptis Foundation is committed to assisting individual church members through creative stewardship methods to provide permanent financial undergirding of thes ministries.

As of December 31, 1997, the Foundation held \$72,432,412 under management. In 1997, \$3,473,850 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,542,47 was distributed to individuals for a total distribution of \$5,016,323.

The income distributions for the entire 78-year history of the N. C. Bapti: Foundation totals: \$12,475,237 income paid to individuals and \$19,533,109 to Baptist churches, institutions, and mission causes for a grand historical total \$32,008,346.

HOSPITAL CELEBRATES 75 YEARS OF SERVICE

In May 1998 the North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated celebrated 75 years of service to the community and the region. During these years the hospital has been faithful to the vision of the North Carolina State Convention when the hospital was birthed: to extend the healing ministry which was demonstrated by Jesus Christ. Many challenges have been faced through these years, but the commitment to compassionately strive for innovative excellence has remained the same.

Baptist Benevolent Care Fund

Baptist Churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the Baptist State Convention on North Carolina in 1924. In 1997 the MDO amounted to \$500,747. It was used exclusively to help patients who had little or no health care insurance or no other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From the offering this past year, well over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist Churches in North Carolina. May God bless all those who supported us with prayers and gave so generously.

Division of Pastoral Care

During the year the chaplains and staff of the Pastor Care Department provide worship services in Davis Memorial Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday for patients and family members. The Pastoral Care Department staff supervised 64 students during the year and made more than 53,000 ministry contacts.

The Department of Pastoral Counseling, CareNet, Inc. continues to expand its ministries. There are now 13 Christian counseling centers located in strategic areas across the state. During the year these professionally staffed centers will provide over 26,000 hours of counseling.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc. continues to expand its missions of helping congregations become healthier communities of faith. Programs and assistance offered to churches include: Consultation, Intentional Interim Ministry, and Leadership development. Resources for ministers include: Young Leaders Program, Turning Point, Interim Ministry Training, Intentional Interim Ministry Training.

Facts about Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center

- With more than 10,000 employees, four restaurants, two banks and a post office that handles more mail than some towns, the Medical Center has been called a city-within-a-city.
- The Medical Center successfully proposed to Forsyth County Commissioners to purchase the county's indigent health care clinic, Reynolds Health Center. The Center also serves as a primary care training facility for our medical students and residents. Construction is expected to begin in the spring on a \$5 million, state-of-the-art facility.
- Building strong relationships with community hospitals and other academic medical centers was a hallmark of the past year. Hospital and clinical affiliations grew to 22 by December '97.

Points of Emphasis and Progress

ALS CENTER - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center has opened a specialized center to provide coordinated care for patients with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), often referred to as Lou Gehrig's disease. The Medical Center's ALS program is the only center in Western North Carolina devoted to ALS patients.

TRAUMA CENTER - The Medical Center has the designated Level I trauma center for northwest North Carolina. In the trauma center our goal is for the patient who needs surgery to be in an operating room 10 minutes after arriving at the Emergency Department. Surgeons, anesthesiologists and staff remain on duty 24 hours a day to handle such emergencies.

TOPS IN RESEARCH - According to a report in the February 1997 issued of *Applied Clinical Trials*, Wake Forest University School of Medicine ranked in the top 10 U.S. clinical research institutions.

RANKED AMONG THE NATION'S BEST - The North Carolina Baptist Hopsitals, Incorporated is among the nation's best hospitals in nine of 17 specialties, according to rankings published in the July 1998 issue of *U.S. News & World Report*.

NEW HEART VALVE - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center is one of the first centers in the country to offer a new "natural" valve replacement to patients with diseased of damaged aortic heart valves. The Freestyle valve was tested extensively in six centers-including Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center-before being released for general use.

NEWEST TREATMENT FOR EPILEPSY - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center offers a new treatment for epilepsy - a "pacemaker for the brain" that can help control seizures in patients who are not helped by medication and are ineligible for surgery.

1998 ANNUAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

It is a joy for the Christian Action League of North Carolina to serve the churches of this great state. We continue to work to inform uristian community about the moral issues that face our state and nation. Our goal is to address these issues with the principles of God's the cornerstone of all truth.

Christian Values

It was the pleasure of the Christian Action League to be one of the sponsors of the Third Annual Christian Heritage Week of North Carolina held March 15-22. The League encouraged schools, churches and communities to recognize, commemorate and learn about the Christian heritage and history of our nation. CAL sponsored a state-wide essay contest for high school students (public, private and home schools) and presented state winners with awards for excellence.

Continued to promote Christian citizenship throughout the churches and communities of our state. CAL has distributed over 12,000 copies of the Ten Commandments to churches, businesses, schools and homes across North Carolina. Promoted Sanctity of Human Life Sunday and the National Day of Prayer statewide.

Held a Church Leadership Legislative Day on June 23. The purpose of this day was to have pastors and church leaders to come together and enjoy fellowship, meet and hear some of our legislators and become more aware of how state government and the legislative process works.

Gambling

Lottery proponents continue in their efforts to bring a state-sponsored lottery to North Carolina. CAL monitors these efforts and is the Christian community on lottery information through letters, calls and our fax and electronic mail networks. Lawmakers have used to receive a barrage of communications from across the state saying that the lottery is a bad bet for North Carolina.

CAL also monitored the work of the Legislative Study Committee on Bingo Regulations.

Sex Education

Worked with other Christian and pro-family groups to see that the state mandate for Abstinence Until Marriage education is mented state-wide. Also, supported efforts to insure that federal grant money designated to promote abstinence education was used rly. Informed citizens and legislators concerning attempts to fund school-based clinics in North Carolina schools.

Abortion

CAL promoted HB 303 (Ban Partial Birth Abortion), HB 536 (Woman's Right to Know before Abortion) and HB 594 (Fetus Death Criminal Act). We also encouraged lawmakers to maintain funding reductions and restrictions on the state abortion fund. These actions esulted in only two qualifying abortions being paid with taxpayer funds in the last two years.

Alcohol

CAL monitored all legislation concerning alcohol and other drugs. Successfully supported efforts to strengthen DWI laws. Assisted unities in organizing committees to fight alcohol and drug use. Worked to defeat legislation that would have approved alcohol sales ut the vote of the people. Provided awareness, education and resource materials related to substance abuse problems to churches, unities, etc.

CAL will host a national conference in September of the American Council on Alcohol Problems.

Pornography

Promoted and saw ratified SB 452-Local Regulation of Adult Establishments. This legislation gives more authority to local unities to regulate and control adult entertainment establishments.

Homosexuality

CAL supports efforts to strengthen the traditional family and continues to monitor and inform the public about the activities of those romote the radical homosexual agenda. Successfully lobbied against legislation that would have made homosexuality legal in North ina. Offered the video "On Wings Like Eagles", the testimony of deliverance from homosexuality by Michael Johnston of Kerruso ries.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

OF

LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Pursuant to §55A-2-02 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the undersigned corporation does hereby submit these Articles of Incorporation for the purpose of forming a nonprofit corporation.

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of the corporation is LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE II DESIGNATION

The corporation is a charitable or religious corporation within the meaning of N.C.G.S. §55A-1-40(4).

ARTICLE III REGISTERED OFFICE AND AGENT

The street address of the initial registered office of the corporation is Route 8, Box 610, Bud Kanoy Road, Thomasville, Davidson County, North Carolina, 27360-7839, and the initial registered agent at that office is *Dr*. Richard H. Capps, Director of Missions.

ARTICLE IV INCORPORATORS

The names and addresses of the incorporators, acting as representatives of the members of Liberty Baptist Association are as follows:

ARTICLE V MEMBERS

The corporation shall have one class of members as provided in the bylaws. Members shall be received, rejected, or withdrawn as set forth in the bylaws. The Baptist churches which are members of Liberty Baptist Association immediately prior to the incorporation thereof automatically shall become members of the corporation.

ARTICLE VI DISSOLUTION

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the board of directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for religious purposes as shall qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue law) as the board of directors shall determine. Any such assets not disposed of shall be disposed of by the District Court of the County in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE VII PURPOSE

The purposes for which the corporation is organized are:

A. to assist the churches of Liberty Baptist Association in their divinely appointed mission and in

cooperative relationships with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Southern Baptist Convention, and other Baptist entities to promote and provide opportunities for individual and collective participation in missions, evangelism, ministry, education, social services, and distribution of the Bible:

- B. to engage in any lawful act or activities for which corporations may be organized under N.C. General Statutes Chapter 55A;
- C. to engage in any lawful activity within the purposes for which the corporation may be organized which is incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the corporation;
- **D**. to operate exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE VIII INITIAL DIRECTORS

The number of initial directors shall be One Hundred and Thirty-Four (134), and the initial directors shall be the duly-elected representatives from each member church of Liberty Baptist Association.

ARTICLE IX GOVERNMENT

- A. The government of this corporation is vested in its members who are represented in the manner set out in its bylaws. The members retain the right of self-government in all phases of the spiritual and temporal life of the association.
- **B**. Churches received as members of this corporation as set out in the bylaws shall constitute the membership ("the members"). The members shall be represented by messengers as provided in the bylaws and shall have the sole authority to adopt and amend the charter and bylaws, approve budgets, receive and discharge members, govern and conduct the affairs of this corporation.
- C. All internal groups, committees, directors, officers, agents, and/or employees created and empowered by the association ultimately shall report to and be accountable to the members and shall have such powers and duties as set out in the bylaws.
- **D**. This association is autonomous and independent and is a sovereign and democratic association of Baptist churches under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. As such, the association is subject to the control of no other ecclesiastical body and does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any member church, auxiliary organization, or other Baptist body.

ARTICLE X ELECTION AS 501(c)(3) CORPORATION

No part of the net earnings or receipts of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes as set forth in these Articles of Incorporation.

No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), or (b) by a corporations, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE XI PERSONAL LIABILITY

Personal liability for all directors for monetary damages arising out of an action or actions, whether by or in the right of the corporation or otherwise for breach of any duty as a director is eliminated except with respect to acts, omissions, liabilities and/or transactions described and defined in North Carolina General Statutes §55A-2-02 (b),(4)(i),(ii),(iii), and (iv).

ARTICLE XII EFFECTIVE DATE

These articles will be effective upon filing.

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BYLAWS OF LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION ARTICLE I

NAME AND LOCATION

- A. The corporate name of this nonprofit corporation shall be "Liberty Baptist Association" The principal and registered office of the Corporation shall be at Route 8, Box 610, Bud Kanoy Road, Thomasville, 27360-7839, Davidson County, North Carolina.
- B. All reference to "Association" or "Corporation" in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or other official action of the Association, shall signify the legal organization of Liberty Baptist Association as established in the Articles of Incorporation. Liberty Baptist Association as it has existed heretofore, for all legal and administrative purposes fully is incorporated into Liberty Baptist Association, a nonprofit corporation. References to votes of the membership shall have reference to a vote of the members of this Association as prescribed in Article VII F of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

The purposes for which the Corporation is organized are:

- A. to assist the churches of Liberty Baptist Association in their divinely appointed mission and in cooperative relationships with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Southern Baptist Convention, and other Baptist entities to promote and provide opportunities for individual and collective participation in missions, evangelism, ministry, education, social services, and distribution of the Bible;
- B. to engage in any lawful act or activities for which corporations may be organized under N.C. General Statutes Chapter 55A;
- C. to engage in any lawful activity within the purposes for which the Corporation may be organized which is incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the Corporation;
- D. to operate exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE III ELECTION AS A 501(C)(3) CORPORATION

- A. The Corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 50l(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law).
- **B**. No part of the net earnings or receipts of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes as set forth in the Articles.
- C. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IV GOVERNMENT

- A. The government of this Association is vested in its members who are represented in the manner set out in its Bylaws. The members retain the right of self-government in all phases of the spiritual and temporal life of the association.
- B. Churches received as members of this Association, as herein provided, shall constitute the membership ("the members"). The members shall be represented by messengers duly elected by each member church and certified to the Association in its Annual Church Profile (Church Letter), and the number of messengers shall be determined as follows:
 - Six messengers from each church for its first one hundred members or fraction thereof:
 - One additional messenger from each church for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof above 100 and up to 1,000 members;
 - One additional messenger from each church for each additional one hundred members or major fraction above 1,000 members;

The members represented by messengers as aforesaid shall have the sole authority to adopt and amend the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, approve budgets, receive and discharge members, govern and conduct the affairs of this Corporation.

- C. All internal groups, committees, directors, officers, agents, and/or employees created and empowered by the Association ultimately shall report to and be accountable to the Association and shall have such powers and duties as hereinafter set out.
- D. This Association is autonomous and independent and is a sovereign and democratic association of Baptist churches under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. As such, the Association is subject to the control of no other ecclesiastical body and does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any member church, auxiliary organization, or other Baptist body.

ARTICLE V PROPERTY

- A. The title to all property shall be in the Association.
- B. The securing and maintaining of real, personal, and mixed property by this association shall be for the express purpose of providing facilities for and the engagement upon the missionary, educational, and benevolent interests of this association as historically have been espoused and practiced thereby and as are expressed in its charter and bylaws, which practices and documents are deemed the standard for uses and practices upon and with regard to such property.
- C. Real property shall not be mortgaged, conveyed, transferred, or encumbered without the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII,F., at an annual meeting or a special meeting duly called for such purpose and stated in the meeting notice.
- D. This article shall not be amended, altered, or repealed except by a three fourths vote of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII, F., at an annual or special meeting duly called and then only in the event that such proposed amendment, alteration, or repeal has been given in writing to the Moderator and Executive Board and has lain on the table for a period of twelve months, and no article shall be voted upon until the period aforementioned has elapsed, any other provisions herein to the contrary notwithstanding.

ARTICLE VI MEMBERS

- A. Record of Members: The members of this Association shall be composed of the Baptist churches who are members of Liberty Baptist Association on the date these Bylaws are adopted. The Clerk shall attach hereto a list of such present members which shall remain a part of the official records of the Association maintained at all times in the office of the Association. A current list of members shall be maintained at all times in the office of the Association.
- B. Organization of New Work Missions/Churches: The Association by its nature and definition is an organization whose primary purpose is missions. In furtherance of these functions, the Association will attempt to develop and foster new work missions/churches and will remain available and will be resourceful in assisting groups or churches in their own development respectively of and as Baptist churches. The Association is mindful and responsive to the autonomous nature of the structure of its members and desires to inculcate in watch-care groups and churches their own independence while utilizing, without compulsion, the well-intended and well-respected practices of existing Baptist churches in historical Baptist precedence, all of which can be helpful during the organizational phases. To those ends and to effect these purposes, the Association will consider, promulgate, and maintain suggested guidelines for establishing and assisting new work missions/churches in their efforts. These guidelines shall be developed by the Missions Development Council and approved by the Executive Board.

At such time as a group comes under watch care of the Association, a sponsoring church (member of the Association) shall be recommended by the Missions Development Council in consultation with the Director of Missions and actively shall support such mission/church with any resource assistance required. The sponsoring church will work in cooperation with the Missions Development Council and a Liaison Committee shall be formulated and shall be comprised of the following: Two persons from the sponsoring church; Two persons from the new mission/church; One person from the Missions Development Council; and, Ex-officio, the Mission Pastor, Sponsoring Church Pastor, and Director of missions.

The Liaison Committee shall meet monthly and no less than bi-monthly during the formation period of the mission/church and shall assist in every reasonable manner with the development

of the mission/church on behalf of the Association. In the event a sponsoring church cannot be secured, the Missions Development Council shall be responsible for the sponsoring thereof on behalf of the Association. The mission/church shall remain under watch care of the Association until such mission/church is ready to constitute a self-supporting church and has fulfilled watch-care requirements.

- Admission of New Churches: Any church seeking admission to the membership of the Association shall petition the Association in writing at least three months prior to the annual meeting of the Association. The Executive Board shall refer such petition to the Missions Development Council for its study of the petitioning church's covenant, articles of faith, history, practices, cooperative spirit, its relations to other churches of the Association, and its willingness to abide by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Association. A written report setting out its findings and recommendations for action at the next annual meeting of the Association shall be submitted by the Missions Development Council to the Executive Board. Final approval for membership shall be contingent upon a one-year period under a watch-care relationship after which determination will be made by a three-fourths vote of "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in VII, F., in annual meeting.
- D. Privileges of Membership: Members through their messengers ("Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F.), and members through their messengers ("Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F.) only, are entitled to vote in all elections and all questions submitted to the Association. Recognizing the value of voluntary association among churches of like faith and practice, members are afforded opportunity to work in mutual, cooperative fellowship with other churches, especially those of Baptist faith, to advance the gospel of Christ, to promote Christian principles of justice and righteousness in personal, social, and community life, to promote the spiritual welfare of all persons, to disseminate the work of God to the people of all nations through evangelistic, educational, and charitable missions.
 - Requirements of Membership: All members reasonably are required to submit a completed Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Annual Meeting; send messengers to the annual meeting; and, contribute to the financial program of the Association. Only members of the Association shall determine whether member churches have fulfilled requirements for membership.

- Termination of Membership: The membership status of any member shall be terminated by written request of the member seeking termination addressed to the Association. Failure reasonably to meet requirements of membership as set out in paragraph E above for a period of two consecutive years after contact by the Missions Development Council to ascertain the desire of the member church shall subject any member church to termination. No member may be expelled or suspended, and no membership may be terminated or suspended, except in a manner that is fair and reasonable and is carried out in good faith, and in compliance with the following procedures:
 - 1. The Executive Board, by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of members present at a special meeting, duly called, must recommend termination of the subject member church.
 - 2. Such recommendation, in writing, must be mailed to the subject member church and each member church sixty (60) days in advance of a special meeting of members.
 - 3. The subject church shall have full and ample opportunity to present its position at such meeting.
 - 4. Termination of membership shall occur only upon a three-fourths (3/4) vote of individuals entitled to vote.

G. Watch-care Affiliation: Watch-care affiliation for a period of one year shall be required for each church applying for membership in the Association. Each church under watch-careaffiliation shall submit a quarterly report and an Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Association.

ARTICLE VII MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

- A. Annual Meeting: The annual meeting of the Association shall be held on Monday and Tuesday following the first Sunday in October for the following purposes: to elect officers of the Association, standing committees, and special committees; to receive annual reports; to approve budgets; to conduct any other business matters which properly may come before the annual meeting; and, to share in worship and fellowship.
- B. Special Meetings: Special meetings for the transaction of business may be called by the Executive Board provided sufficient notice is given members to allow for two Sundays between the call and the meeting.
- C. Emergencies: In emergencies, any change in the time and/or place of meetings shall be determined by a vote of two-thirds of the Executive Board present when the vote is taken.
- D. Presiding Officer: The Moderator shall preside at all meetings of members. In the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator shall preside. In the absence of the Moderator and Vice Moderator, the Clerk shall preside. In the absence of the aforementioned officers, the Treasurer shall preside. In the absence of all officers, the body may elect an acting moderator.
- E. Quorum: Seventy-five (75) "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII, F., shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any annual or special meeting of members.
- F. Voting: Messengers who have been duly elected by a member, have been certified in its annual report to the Association, and are duly registered and present shall be collectively referred to as "Individuals entitled to vote" and shall be entitled to one vote at any meeting of members. No proxy or absentee voting shall be permitted. All voting shall be by show of hands, standing vote or voice vote except when there are contested matters in which case the vote shall be by ballot. Parliamentary procedure utilizing Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed.

ARTICLE VIII EXECUTIVE BOARD

- A. Board of Directors: All reference to "Executive Board" or "Board of Directors" in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or other official action of the Association shall be synonymous and shall include conferring of powers as are provided by the Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, and the North Carolina Nonprofit Corporation Act.
- B. Membership: The Executive Board membership shall consist of the following:
 - One lay-representative elected by each member church and certified to the Association in its Annual Church Profile (Church Letter),
 - 2. The active pastor of each member, or if none, the Interim pastor of each member church; or if neither, the church secretary.
 - 3. The church treasurer of each member,
 - 4. Officers duly elected by the Association, to-wit: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer,
 - Standing Committee Chairpersons and Standing Council Directors as named in Article XI, A and B.
- C. Officers: The officers of the Executive Board shall be the same persons elected by the Association as Moderator (President), Vice Moderator (Vice President), Clerk (Secretary), and Treasurer.

- D. Meetings: Regular meetings of the Executive Board shall be held at least quarterly. The first meeting, which shall be designated as the annual meeting, shall be held as soon as possible after the annual meeting of the Association, and the last meeting shall be held as nearly as possible to the next annual meeting of the Association for approval/endorsement of various Reports of the Association for the annual meeting.
 - Special meetings may be called by the Moderator whenever the need arises and the Moderator shall call a special meeting when requested in writing by ten (10) members of the Executive Board.
- E. Quorum: Twenty-five (25) members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- F. Duties: Except as restricted by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws or other official action of the Association, the Executive Board shall manage the general business and activities of the Association between annual meetings; shall call special meetings of the Association when necessary; shall elect an independent auditor to conduct the annual audit; shall fill and/or approve any vacancies which occur in the officers, Executive Board, Committee on Nominations, Nominating Committee; Standing Committees or Councils; and, may elect the Director of Missions when a vacancy occurs in accordance with Article X, E. 2. of these Bylaws. The Executive Board shall present a written report of action taken to the Association in its annual meeting for ratification and approval of action so taken between annual meetings.
- **G.** Contracts: The Executive Board may authorize officers to enter into contracts or execute and deliver instruments on behalf of the Association, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances subject only to limitations provided herein.
- H. Loans: No loans shall be contracted on behalf of the Association and no evidence of indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a resolution of the Executive Board. Such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.
 L. Depository: The Executive Board shall have the power to (a) select one or more banks.
 - **Depository:** The Executive Board shall have the power to (a) select one or more banks to act as depositories of the funds of the Association; (b) determine the manner of receiving, depositing, and disbursing the funds of the Association; (c) designate the person or persons authorized to draw on the bank accounts of the Association; (d) approve the form of checks to be used in drawing on such bank accounts; and, (e) change such banks, the person or persons drawing on such accounts, and the form of checks at will.
 - **Removal:** Board members, as well as officers of the Association, may be removed by majority vote of the Association at a properly called business meeting, with written notice to members setting out the specific purpose of the meeting.

J.

K. Death, Resignation or Termination: In the event a Board member shall expire, resign, or for any reason be removed from the Executive Board, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE IX OFFICERS

Officers Generally: There shall be a Moderator who shall also serve as Moderator and Chairman of the Executive Board and President of the Corporation. There shall be a Vice Moderator who shall also serve as Vice Moderator of the Executive Board and Vice President of the Corporation. There shall be a Clerk who shall also serve as Clerk of the Executive Board and Secretary of the Corporation. There shall be a Treasurer who shall also serve as Treasurer of the Association and of the Corporation. Whenever used in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or in other official action of the Association, the words "Moderator or "President;" "Vice Moderator" or "Vice President;" or "Clerk" or "Secretary" shall be synonymous.

B. Moderator:

1. Election and Term: The Moderator shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of the Association for a term of one year and may be re-elected for a one-year term. The Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election as Moderator for a period of two years after having served two one-year terms. The term of office shall begin at the close of the annual meeting and shall continue through the close of the next annual meeting or until a successor is elected.

2. Duties: The Moderator shall

- a. preside at the annual meeting and any special meeting of the Association;
- b. serve as President of the Corporation;
- c. preside at all meetings of the Executive Board;
- d. perform such other duties as are specifically prescribed in these Bylaws and as may be delegated by the Association;
- e. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting;
- f. appoint other committees when so directed by the Association or Executive Board; and
- g. serve as ex officio member of all committees except the Committee on Nominations.

C. Vice Moderator

1. Election and Term: The Vice Moderator shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year and may be re-elected for a one-year term. The Vice Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election as Vice Moderator for a period of two years after having served two one-year terms. The term of office shall begin at the close of the annual meeting in which such election is held and shall continue through the close of the next annual meeting or until his successor is elected

2. Duties: The Vice Moderator shall

- a. preside at meetings of the Association and Executive Board in the absence of the Moderator or at the pleasure of the Moderator;
- b. serve as Vice President of the Corporation;
- c. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting; and
- d. perform such other duties as may be specifically prescribed in these Bylaws and as may be delegated by the members.

D. Clerk

1. Election and Term: The Clerk shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.

2. Duties: The Clerk shall

- a. serve as Secretary of the Corporation and of the Executive Committee;
- b. maintain at all times a current list of members of the Association;
- c. maintain and preserve the files, records, and documents of the Association in proper order at all times for examination of the Executive Board;
- d. send report forms to members at least one month before the annual meeting of the Association;
- e. prepare a composite record of the member information included in the annual report submitted to the Association and distribute copies thereof at the annual meeting;
- f. supervise the printing of minutes of the Association and distribute to the members as soon as possible after the annual meeting;
- g. preserve the files, records, and documents of the Association and, upon election of a successor, relinquish such files, records, documents, and other property belonging

- to the Association and in the possession and control of the Clerk to the duly elected successor; and
- h. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting.
- i. preside at meetings in the absence of the Moderator and Vice Moderator at the pleasure of the moderator.

E. Treasurer

- 1. Election and Term: The Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.
- 2. Duties: The Treasurer shall
 - a. serve as Treasurer of the Corporation;
 - b. have custody of all funds of the Association;
 - c. maintain at all times up-to-date, orderly records of all receipts and disbursements;
 - d. disburse funds by check in accordance with the budget and direction of the Association or Executive Board;
 - e. prepare quarterly financial reports and distribute copies to the Finance Committee and the Executive Board;
 - f. prepare a financial report and distribute copies at the annual meeting;
 - g. serve as a member of the Finance Committee;
 - h. cooperate with the firm making the annual audit; and
 - serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting.
 - j. preside at meetings in the absence of the Moderator, Vice Moderator and Clerk at the pleasure of the moderator.

F. Assistant Treasurer

- 1. **Election and Term:** The Assistant Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.
- 2. **Duties:** The Assistant Treasurer shall, during periods of incapacity or absence of the Treasurer, perform the duties assigned to the Treasurer in paragraph E. 2 as required and shall assist the Treasurer as directed and required by the Treasurer.

ARTICLE X STAFF

- A. Staff Positions: The staff of the Association shall be composed of the Director of Missions, Administrative Secretary, and such other persons who shall fill staff positions as may be created by the Association. The Personnel Committee shall make recommendation for the creation of any staff position. A current list of staff positions shall be maintained by the Personnel Committee. A job description for each staff position shall be prepared and shall be revised periodically by the Personnel Committee, approved by the Executive Board, and furnished to all candidates considered for the position and the person filling the position. Staff positions may be combined from time to time at the discretion of the Executive Board and the combined position held by one person.
- B. Election/Employment: Except in the case of the Director of Missions, the staff members from time to time shall be employed for indeterminate terms by the Association or Executive Board at a regular meeting upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- C. Termination: With the exception of the Director of Missions, termination of the relationship between a staff member and the Association shall occur within a reasonable and announced period after written notice of termination delivered to the staff member on behalf of the Association and to the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board on behalf of the staff

member. Termination of the staff member by the Association shall be initiated and acted upon by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

D. Vacation and Leave: Requirements for vacation and leaves, record-keeping, expense reimbursement, work schedules, and other employment matters shall be outlined in the Policy Manual and Benefit Plans. Such manual shall be prepared, reviewed, monitored, and amended from time to time by recommendation of the Personnel Committee to the Executive Board; and the staff shall be subject to the provisions thereof from time to time; provided, nothing therein contained shall be interpreted to be in derivation or in violation of the provisions of the Bylaws, and such Policy Manual and Benefit Plans must remain consistent with the purposes and intent requirements thereof.

E. Director of Missions

- 1. Search Committee Procedure: When a vacancy occurs in the position of Director of Missions or the Director of Mission furnishes notice of intent to vacate the position, a Search Committee composed of the officers of the Association and five members of the Associational Council elected by the Associational Council shall meet as soon as possible, determine their procedure, establish a profile, prepare application forms and reference questionnaires, and shall diligently seek to find a Director of Missions who, by calling, training, and ability, is qualified spiritually, mentally, and physically to lead the work of the Association. The Moderator shall serve as Chairperson of the Search Committee. Members of the committee may be reimbursed by the Treasurer for any necessary and reasonable travel and subsistence expenses which are incurred in the performance of their duties. The candidate to be recommended by the Search Committee may be interviewed by the Associational Council before election by the Executive Board or the Association in Annual Meeting.
- 2. Election/Employment: When the Search Committee has selected a potential employee and is ready to make a report and recommendation to the Association, such recommendation shall be made to the Annual Meeting of the Association or, between annual meetings, to the Executive Board. Upon a vote being taken, the Director of Missions presented must receive at least three-fourths of all votes cast. If the Director of Missions fails to receive the required three-fourths vote, the Moderator shall declare the nominee not elected/employed and shall refer the matter, without debate, to the Search Committee for further investigation and further recommendation under the foregoing procedure.
- 3. Duties: The Director of Missions shall
 - a. fulfill all duties under the direction of the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board;
 - b. serve ex officio in a supervisory capacity on all committees and councils of the Association unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws;
 - c. promote the work of the Association and denomination;
 - d. cooperate with members, their pastors, officers, committees and councils of the Association;
 - e. present oral reports to the Associational Council, Missions Development Council, and Executive Board meetings;
 - f. present a written report to the annual meeting of the Association;
 - g. assist the Clerk in preparation of the composite record of members from information submitted in their annual report to the Association;
 - h. assist the Clerk in preparing the annual minutes of the Association.
- 4. Termination: The Director of Missions shall be employed for an indeterminate term.

The Director of Missions shall give reasonable notice of intent to resign or retire to the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board. The Director of Missions may be removed by an affirmative vote of three-fourths of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as heretofore defined in Article VII, F., at a meeting properly called with ten days written notice to the Director of Missions and written notice of the meeting to the members as required by the Bylaws.

- 5. Interim Director of Missions: The Executive Board, in consultation with the Personnel Committee, shall be responsible for the employment of an Interim Director of Missions when the Association is without a Director of Missions.
- 6. Extended Leave or Absence: During any extended leave or absence of the Director of Missions for medical or other appropriate reasons and with advice of the Personnel Committee, the Executive Board shall make such necessary, temporary or emergency decisions as reasonably shall be required.

ARTICLE XI COMMITTEES AND COUNCILS

A. Standing Committees:

Except as hereinafter provided, Standing Committees of the Association shall be as follows: Annual Meeting Program Committee; Auditing Committee, Building and Grounds Committee; Bylaw Committee; Finance Committee; Historical Committee; Hunger Awareness Committee; Liaison Committee; Memorials Committee; Nominating Committee; Ordination Examining Committee; Personnel Committee; Place and Preacher Committee; and, Resolutions Committee shall have membership and general responsibilities respectively as follows:

- 1. Annual Meeting Program Committee: The Annual Meeting Program Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Chairman of the Place and Preacher Committee, Director of the Music Council, Pastors of the churches hosting the Annual Meeting, and three persons. The Annual Meeting Program Committee shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting, send a copy of the printed program to all persons on the program at least ten days prior to the annual meeting, present the printed program for adoption at the opening of the Annual Meeting, and serve through the Annual Meeting when adjustments on the program are necessary.
- 2. Auditing Committee: The Auditing Committee shall consist of three persons. The committee shall make an audit or review of the records and receipts of the Association on a quarterly basis. A report should be made to the Finance Committee one month after the end of each quarter in writing as to findings, needed adjustments and suggestions. The committee will meet at least four times a year with the Treasurer as ex-officio member to review the quarterly updated Finance Reports and records. The Annual Audit Report or Review is to be made in writing to be in the Book of Reports as a part of the Finance Committee report. The report needs to be completed by September 30 to be presented at the Annual Meeting. The Auditing Committee shall have the option of recommending a Review of the Financial Records or a complete Audit of the Financial Records. The Auditing Committee shall recommend to the appropriate Executive Board Meeting, prior to the Annual Session, whether a review or complete audit of the Financial Records is needed. The Auditing Committee is responsible for doing the necessary research to answer any questions concerning Financial Records that may be raised by member churches, messengers, or Executive Board members within a reasonable period.
- 3. Building and Grounds Committee: The Building and Grounds Committee shall consist of three persons. The Building and Grounds Committee shall plan for adequate maintenance, repairs, alterations, improvement, and housekeeping of the physical properties of the Association; upon request of the Director of Missions, assist in considering approval for special

use of the facilities of the Association; and, prepare and submit an appropriate budget request for consideration and inclusion in the proposed budget.

- 4. Bylaws Committee: The Bylaws Committee shall consist of three persons, preferably one of whom shall be an attorney. The Bylaws Committee shall consider requests for amendments, alterations, or revisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws and shall make recommendations to the Association with respect thereto; and, periodically review and make recommendations for amendments, alterations, or revisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws.
- 5. Finance Committee: The Finance Committee shall consist of the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer and four persons. The Finance Committee shall study, formulate, and recommend a budget adequate to support the program of the Association; formulate plans for promotion of the budget and cooperation of members in meeting budget needs; review the quarterly and annual financial reports of the Treasurer; review and monitor budget line item expenses; present periodical reports of contributions to members of the Association; and, present a written report to the Annual Meeting of the Association.
- 6. Historical Committee: The Historical Committee shall consist of a Historian and two persons. The Historian shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year and shall serve as Chairperson of the Historical Committee. The Historical Committee shall collect and preserve historical data of the Association; encourage and promote the preservation of historical data by each member; and, present a written report to each annual meeting of the Association. The Historian shall serve as a member of the Media Library (TACMO) Council.
- 7. Hunger Awareness Committee: The Hunger Awareness Committee shall consist of three persons. The Hunger Awareness Committee shall keep abreast of hunger needs throughout the world and shall apprise the Association of these needs and from time to time, upon approval of the Executive Board, shall lead special projects within the Association to meet specific needs.
- 8. Liaison Committee: A Liaison Committee shall be formulated as needed for new work missions/churches and shall be comprised of two persons from the sponsoring church as defined in Article VI, B; two persons from the new mission/church; one person from the Missions Development Council; and, Ex-officio, the Mission Pastor, Sponsoring Church Pastor, and Director of Missions. The Liaison Committee shall meet no less than bi-monthly during the formation period of the mission/church and shall assist in every reasonable manner with the development of the mission/church on behalf of the Association.
- 9. Memorials Committee: The Memorials Committee shall consist of three persons. The Memorials Committee shall prepare and read a report of individuals who have expired since the last annual meeting as reflected in the Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Association furnished by the members and shall conduct a brief, appropriate Memorial Service for such individuals during the Annual Meeting.
- 10. Nominating Committee: The Nominating Committee shall consist of five individuals recommended to the Annual Meeting by the Committee on Nominations and shall meet as often as necessary to fill vacancies and prepare nominations for the Annual Meeting of the association; seek to fill all positions with the best qualified nominees, avoiding the nomination of one individual for more than one position and distributing obligations and privileges of service to member representation; contact all nominees and secure consent before making recommendations to the Association or Executive Board; recommend to the Association during the Annual Meeting the officers, chairpersons, directors, and members of each standing committee and council, and the institutional/agency representatives, unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws; recommend to the Executive Board individuals to fill vacancies of committees

and institutional/agency representatives which may occur between Annual Meetings of the Association.

- 11. Ordination Examining Committee: Each church of the Association shall have the exclusive right to ordain for the ministry without Associational involvement. However, member churches shall have the option to utilize the Associational Ordination Examining Committee as hereinafter set out. The Ordination Examining Committee shall consist of five persons. The Ordination Examining Committee shall receive requests from churches within the Association who wish to examine a candidate for ordination to the Gospel ministry; cooperate with the church requesting examination in setting a mutually satisfactory date for examination; question the candidate for ordination; report its findings to the church making such request for examination; approve for ordination only the candidate who has received a call to serve in an ordained Christian ministry of any kind including, but not limited to that of a member church of the Association, or Baptist churches outside the Association; to serve on the mission field, or to serve as a chaplain in the armed forces or a public institution; and, shall have the option to summons pastors and one lay person from any or all cooperating member churches of the Liberty Baptist Association.
- 12. Personnel Committee: The Personnel Committee shall consist of five persons. Except as otherwise provided in Article X,E., the Personnel Committee shall receive applications, interview applicants, contact references, and carefully investigate applicants considered for staff positions; shall recommend to the Executive Board the prospective employee; shall prepare, periodically review, revise, and recommend changes in job descriptions to the Executive Board; shall make recommendation to the Association in the event of need of a new staff position; shall prepare, periodically review, revise and recommend changes to Personnel Policy Manual and Benefits Plan; periodically evaluate personnel performance and make necessary recommendations to the staff; consult with and perform duties assigned by the Executive Board and as set out in Article X of these Bylaws; establish a salary plan and prepare budget requests with respect to all personnel matters including salaries and fringe benefits and submit such budget requests to the Finance Committee of the Association.
- 13. Place and Preacher Committee: The Place and Preacher Committee shall consist of five persons. The Place and Preacher Committee shall solicit and receive invitations for the place or places of meeting for the next Annual Meeting of the Association, recommend the place or places of the meeting, and recommend the preacher and an alternate preacher to preach the annual sermon at the Annual Meeting of the Association.
- 14. Resolutions Committee: The Resolutions Committee shall consist of five persons. The Resolutions Committee shall review all properly submitted resolutions which may be reworded for clarity, combined with like issues into one resolution, or rejected if previously addressed or are inappropriate; present all appropriate resolutions to the Association for consideration; prepare and present resolutions of appreciation and other resolutions deemed appropriate; and, notify persons submitting resolutions of the disposition thereof.

B. Standing Councils

Except as hereinafter provided, the Standing Councils of the Association, shall be as follows: Bi-Vocational Ministers Council; Brotherhood Council; Christian Life and Public Affairs Council; Discipleship Training Council; Evangelism Council; Family Ministry Council; Hispanic Ministries Council; Media Library Council (TACMO); Missions Development Council; Multi-Housing Council; Music Council; Pastoral Ministries Council; Seminary Extension Council; Senior Adult Council; Single Adult Council; Stewardship Council; Student Ministries Council; Sunday School Council; Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team; and, Youth Ministries Council with general responsibilities respectively as follows:

- 1. Bi-Vocational Ministers Council: The Bi-Vocational Ministers Council shall be composed of Bi-Vocational Ministers (active and retired) selected by the Nominating Committee. The President of the Bi-Vocational Ministers Conference shall be an ex officio member. The purpose of this Council is to address needs of Bi-Vocational ministerial staff.
- 2. Brotherhood Council: The Brotherhood Council will assist churches in involving men and boys in missions; helping churches engage men and boys in missions activities; helping churches prepare to teach missions to men and boys; helping churches lead men and boys to pray for and give to missions; helping churches lead men and boys to develop personal ministry; and, helping churches interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.
- 3. Christian Life and Public Affairs Council: The Christian Life and Public Affairs Council will assist churches in awareness of critical moral and social issues and in leading in Christian action to meet those needs; in applying the gospel to all areas of life; in demonstrating responsible concern for society; in broadening cooperative efforts and emphases; and, in mobilizing and equipping the constituency to be on mission in regard to moral and ethical concerns. Areas of involvement include family life, race relations, citizenship, hunger, and other special moral concerns. The council shall endeavor to provide an annual event of training in an area of moral and social concerns.
- 4. Discipleship Training Council: The Discipleship Training Council will assist churches in starting, improving, and expanding Christian discipleship through their Discipleship Training programs to help churches equip church members for discipleship and personal ministry; teach Christian theology and Baptist doctrine, Christian ethics, Christian history, and church polity and organization; equip church leaders for service; and interpret and undergird the work of the church and denomination.
- 5. Evangelism Council: The Evangelism Council will lead the Association (as churches and as programs) to address the priority of evangelism in its area and will include in its program church evangelism committee development; evangelism strategy development; mass evangelism; personal evangelism; rural and small church evangelism; metropolitan evangelism; specialized evangelism; renewal evangelism; and, evangelism prospect discovery. The council will coordinate with other appropriate councils and member churches Festival Ministries and special event ministries for evangelistic outreach in the association.
- **6. Family Ministry Council:** The Family Ministry Council will assist churches in development of family ministry programs and the conduct of family ministry activities which can be accomplished best on the Associational level. It will seek to minister to the distinctive and diverse needs of families.
- 7. Hispanic Ministries Council: The Hispanic Ministries Council will plan, coordinate, and provide ministry to the migrant/seasonal workers in the Association which may include, but shall not be limited to, Bible Study, special trips, medical and dental care, fellowship meals, as well as other needs that may arise. This council will plan, coordinate and provide ministry to permanent Hispanic residents.
- 8. Media Library Council: (Also known as TACMO-The Associational Church Media Library Organization). The Media Library Council (TACMO) will assist churches in the establishment, development, and improvement of church media library services and educate persons in the use of media and provide media and media services to support the church in the achievement of its mission.
- 9. Missions Development Council: The Missions Development Council will lead the association (as churches and as programs) to address the priority missions frontiers in their area through work with Church Missions Development Councils, missions survey and analysis, church extension, language missions, church and community ministries, volunteer chaplaincy

ministries, interfaith witness, black church relations, and, special ministries.

The Missions Development Council will be responsible for credentials-acceptance of new churches as more specifically set out in Article VI, C; church extension/new work; language missions; literacy missions; migrant ministry, festival ministries (in cooperation with Evangelism, Woman's Missionary Union & Brotherhood Councils); partnership ministry (State, Home and Foreign); mission projects (church and community ministries); seminary extension; volunteer chaplaincy; interfaith witness; disaster relief (in cooperation with Brotherhood Council); assist churches, as requested, with internal problems; assist groups seeking to organize a new church and work with the Liaison Committee as set out in Article VI, B, and such other duties as may be delegated by the Executive Board. The Missions Development Council shall plan and coordinate mission ministry projects in consultation with the councils and committees of the Association as needed. The council will make member churches aware of project needs and help secure volunteers.

- 10. Multi-Housing Council: The Multi-Housing Council will seek to involve churches in multi-housing ministries through on-call chaplaincy; group Bible studies; Backyard Bible Clubs/Mission Vacation Bible Schools; recreational activities; special events with music, drama, puppets, etc. It will develop relationships with multi-housing managers; provide training to churches in methodologies and strategies to reach such complexes; and, will make regular reports and recommendations to the Missions Development Council.
- 11. Music Council: The Music Council will seek to enhance the redemptive mission of churches through establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving their music ministries. It will provide musical experiences in congregational services; develop musical skills, attitudes, and understandings; witness and minister through music; interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.
- 12. Pastoral Ministries Council: The Pastoral Ministries Council will assist churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministry, vocational guidance, church administrative services, and Christian weekday education; conduct special projects and activities which enable churches to accomplish their mission, proclaim the gospel to believers and unbelievers, care for the church's members and other persons in the community and interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination. It will minister to the distinctive needs of pastors, deacons, church staff persons, church council, church officers and committee members, church vocations volunteers, and church weekday education staff. This council will include a Church Administration Consultant, Weekday Early Education Consultant, Vocational Guidance Consultant, Deacon Ministry Consultant, and Minister Support Consultant.
- 13. Seminary Extension Council: The Seminary Extension Council will seek to provide college-level theological education to ministers and laypersons and basic theological education to ministers who lack formal education. It will provide curriculum materials, administrative services, promotional materials, training materials for director and teachers, academic records, and certification of centers and teachers.
- 14. Senior Adult Council: The Senior Adult Council will plan activities and ministry projects for member church senior adults and will communicate any appropriate state and national conferences and Chautauguas to member churches. This council may include any elected leader of a member church senior adult organization.
- 15. Single Adult Council: The Single Adult Council will plan activities and ministry projects for member church single adults and will communicate any appropriate state and national conferences to member churches. This council may include any elected leader of a member church single adult organization.
- 16. Stewardship Council: The Stewardship Council will assist churches in development of

individual and corporate stewardship, interpretation of Biblical teachings on stewardship, and elevation of individual giving and corporate mission giving in light of those teachings.

17. Student Ministries Council: The Student Ministries Council will assist the program of Baptist student ministries at the colleges within the Association or area; assist churches in establishing and supporting ministries with students; and, provide continuing training for workers with students in the churches in order to minister to the needs of college students in the churches and on the campuses in the area.

18. Sunday School Council: (Also known as ASSIST: Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team). The Sunday School Council will assist and challenge churches to improve and enlarge all areas of their Sunday School through planning, training, administration activities, consultation, program interpretation, and cooperative projects. It will encourage and assist churches to reach persons for Bible study, teach the Bible, witness to persons about Christ and lead persons to church membership, minister to Sunday School members and nonmembers, lead members to worship, and interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.

19. Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team: The Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team will assist churches in promoting missions, establishing, enlarging, and strengthening Woman's Missionary Union work, teaching missions, engaging in mission action and personal witnessing, supporting missions, and participating in the work of the church and the denomination.

20. Youth Ministries Council: The Youth Ministries Council shall plan youth related ministries for the Association including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

C. General duties of Standing Councils: The Director and Council members of each council shall keep informed of materials, programs, and events related to the specific area of interest indicated by the title of said council; shall assist in training leadership and promoting the specific interest area within the Association; shall cooperate with other councils of the Association in coordinating emphases and assisting churches in their divinely appointed mission opportunities individually and collectively. Each council shall meet as often as necessary (at least quarterly) to fulfill its responsibilities in keeping with standards established by the Association for its respective organization. A written report from each council shall be made to the Annual Meeting of the Association. The Director of each respective council shall serve on the Associational Council of the Association.

D. Election and Term: The Standing Committees and Councils listed in Sections A and B of this Article, except the Woman's Missionary Union Council and Director, and the Chairperson/Director respectively thereof shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at the Annual Meeting of the Association. The term of office shall be one year beginning at the adjournment of the Annual Meeting in which the election was held.

E. Other Committees and Councils: The Association may create such other committees and councils, not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation and these Bylaws, as may from time to time be required, and in furtherance thereof, the Executive Board shall be empowered to establish and appoint interim standing committees and councils. The Nominating Committee shall give recommendations to fill these new positions to the Executive Board. At the next Annual Meeting of the Association, messengers shall consider whether to amend these Bylaws by their inclusion as new standing committees and councils.

F. Special Standing Committees, Councils, Auxiliary, & Institutional/Agency
Representatives:

Special Standing Committees, Councils, Auxiliary, and Institutional/Agency Representatives of the Association shall be the Committee on Nominations, Associational Council, Woman's

Missionary Union and Institutional/Agency Representatives, whose membership and responsibilities are as follows:

- 1. Committee on Nominations: The Committee on Nominations shall consist of three persons who shall be nominated by the officers and elected by the Executive Board at the meeting prior to the September meeting. The Committee on Nominations shall serve until the annual meeting when its report is made to the Association. The duty of the Committee on Nominations shall be to nominate the Nominating Committee at the Annual Meeting and to recommend to the Executive Board individuals to fill any Nominating Committee vacancies during the year. In the event of a vacancy between any Executive Board or Annual Meeting, the Committee on Nominations shall appoint a replacement to begin immediate interim service until election of a nominee for the term of office at the next Executive Board or Annual Meeting following the vacancy occurrence.
- 2. Associational Council: The Associational Council shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, and Directors of all Standing Councils as set out in Article XI, B. The Council shall plan and correlate the calendar and program activities of the program councils of the Association and make any needed recommendations to the Executive Board/Annual Meeting.
- 3. Woman's Missionary Union: The Woman's Missionary Union of Liberty Baptist Association is an auxiliary of Liberty Baptist Association and elects its director, officers, and council. These elected officers are included for information in the Reports of the Association and the Director of Woman's Missionary Union serves on the Standing Council and Executive Board with full voting privileges. The Woman's Missionary Union is governed by their own Constitution and Bylaws.
- 4. Institutional/Agency Representatives: One person to serve as the Institutional/Agency Representative within the Association shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association for a term of one year. The representative will receive information from the respective institution/agency during the year and shall prepare a report for the Annual Meeting of the Association.
- 5. Partnership Coordinators: Partnership Coordinators (Foreign, Home, State, Associational Missions) shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association for a term of one year. Partnership Coordinators shall receive information, work with the Missions Development Council, provide leadership and orientation for partnership project participants as needed. Partnership Coordinators shall prepare a report for the Annual Meeting of the Association of work accomplished.
- 6. Assistant Treasurer: The Assistant Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected for a term of one year. The Assistant Treasurer shall be eligible for reelection each year. In the absence of the Treasurer due to illness, emergency or resignation, the Assistant Treasurer will be responsible for signing checks, maintaining records, make deposits, and paying bills that are due. The Assistant Treasurer shall function for the Treasurer as requested by the Treasurer within reason in carrying out the duties of Treasurer as an officer of the Association only under emergency, illness, or resignation circumstances.

ARTICLE XII

ADOPTION AND AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS AND CORPORATE DOCUMENTS

A. Adoption:

These Bylaws shall be considered adopted and in immediate effect when a majority of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F., at an annual meeting or a special meeting shall vote in favor thereof. This vote shall be taken not less than thirty days after mailing a copy of these Bylaws to each member.

B. Amendment:

These Bylaws, the Articles of Incorporation, or any parts thereof may be amended, altered, or repealed only by a majority vote of "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F., at the Annual Meeting or a special meeting of the Association.

C. Preservation:

A copy of all original corporate records, including but not limited to the Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws, and Personnel Policies, shall be maintained at all times by the Clerk in the office of the Association; and copies of the same shall be kept in separate locations. All amendments to said documents or to any provisions thereof shall be prepared promptly after adoption by the Association; and the Secretary shall cause the same and copies to be typed or printed in proper form and attached to the originals of respective documents and kept as above stated.

ARTICLE XIII GENERAL AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

A. Fiscal Year:

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from September 1 to August 31.

B. Reports:

Reports of officers, committees, councils, and church letters to the Association shall cover the

period from September 1 to August 31. All reports for the annual meeting shall be in writing for inclusion in the published Book of Reports and shall be limited to 250 words.

C. Audit:

An annual audit or review of the financial records of the Association shall be conducted by an independent accounting firm elected by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Auditing Committee.

D. Records:

The membership rolls, minutes of meetings, and annual reports shall be available at all reasonable times for all reasonable purposes.

E. Policy Manual:

The Policy Manual shall contain documents of procedure and the adopted Budget and Nominations Report not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation and these Bylaws from various committees and councils that have been recommended to and approved by the Executive Board and/or Annual Meeting. These policies will be governing rules and procedures of the respective committees and councils of the Association. They may be amended by the Executive Board and/or Annual Meeting by a simple vote of persons present provided a quorum has been met.

F. Seal:

There shall appear within the center of the Corporate Seal of the Association the words "Corporate Seal," around which shall appear two concentric circles within which will be inscribed Liberty Baptist Association of North Carolina, 1832. Such seal, as impressed on the margin hereof, is hereby adopted as the corporate seal of the Corporation.

G. Gender:

The use of terms in these Bylaws that may in other contexts tend to denote gender is intended to be neutral as to gender. The masculine shall be deemed to include the feminine and the feminine deemed to include the masculine.

H. Majority:

Unless these Bylaws or The General Statutes of North Carolina otherwise require a different number, a majority of those in attendance at any general or special meeting of members or the Executive Board with a quorum present shall be required to effect any action.





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

HISTORICAL EVENTS

Abbotts Creek: Senior Adult group went to Caswell last Fall and in the Spring. Betsy Leach went to South Africa for one month, teaching and sharing. Patrick Moss, Craig Burris and Matthew Dunn from Abbotts Creek and another man from another church (sponsored by Abbotts Creek), went to South Africa for two weeks to work on a church and hold evangelism meetings. Baptist women and men have helped with bills for elderly, and helped with other needs in area. Church voted to enter an Intentional Interim Program and called Rev. Lee Stocks as Intentional Interim Pastor. Members took part in "Operation-In-As-Much" for the second year with over 110 people participating for a one-day community blitz. Church voted to build a house, for the people of Montserrat, on the island of Nevis, at a cost of \$15,000 and will send the people to build the house. Held a Celebrated Heritage month during August with a special room to display special old items from previous church and past members. Rev. David Clemens was called by church as Interim Music Director.

Amity: Held dedication of amphitheater on April 4, 1999, and held first outdoor Easter Sunrise Service in the amphitheater on June 27, 1999. "Churches in Association: Discover the Adventure!" was the theme for the 167th Annual Session of the Liberty Baptist Association.

Rev. Markus Sink, Moderator, led in prayer and called the 167th Annual Session to order. Jeanne Davis, Interim Music Director for First Baptist Church, led in singing "Blessed Assurance." Motion was made, seconded and passed that those members who had registered and who would register throughout the meetings would Constitute the Body. Dr. Ray Howell, III, Pastor, welcomed everyone to First Baptist Church, Lexington.

Chairman of the Annual Session Program Committee, Dr. Ray Howell, III, made a motion to adopt the Program as printed. The motion was seconded and passed. Rev. Lamar Moore, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, nominated Mrs. Gail S. Beck to serve as the Associational Clerk for 1999-2000. Motion was seconded and passed. The Clerk reminded those present that only those registered as messengers would be privileged to vote. In a point of personal privilege, Mrs. Beck thanked everyone for prayers on her behalf because of back problems, and expressed thankfulness that her health had improved.

The Theme Interpretation was to have been presented by Rev. John Deane, Music Director of Summerville Baptist Church, who was unable to the attend meeting. The Moderator recognized the following New Pastors and Staff for 1998-1999: Rev. R. Lee Stocks, Intentional Interim and Rev. David Clemens, Interim Minister of Music, Abbotts Creek Baptist Church; Rev. Roy Cantrell, Interim Pastor, Cedar Lodge Baptist Church; Rev. Leonard Rollins, Interim Pastor, Center Hill Baptist Church; Rev. Billy J. Sloop, Pastor, Central Baptist Church; Rev. Morris Hollifield, Interim Pastor, and Rev. Stephen Livengood, Pastor (as of October 1, 1999), Greenwood Baptist Church; Rev. Darrell Hunley, Pastor, Holloways Baptist Church; Rev. David Crumpler, Minister of Music and Youth, Jersey Baptist Church; Rev. Chris Hawks, Pastor, Lakeview Baptist Church; Rev. Bob Glasgow, Interim Pastor, New Friendship Baptist Church; Rev. Holley Maggard, Minister to Preschool and Children, Rich Fork Baptist Church; Rev. Greg Barefoot, Pastor, Smith Grove Baptist Church; Rev. Chuck Garner, Pastor, Southgate Baptist Church; Rev. Bill Brummett, Interim Pastor, and Rev. John Deane, Minister of Music, Summerville Baptist Church; Rev. Phillip Morrow, Interim Pastor, Victory Baptist Church; and Rev. Mark Blair, Pastor, First Baptist Church, Welcome. Rev. Bill Freeman, Pastor, Clearview Baptist Church; Rev. R. N. Hardin and Rev. Bill Hicks, Co-Interims Pastors; Stoner's Grove Baptist Church; and Rev. David Best, Pastor, First Baptist Church, Thomasville should also have been recognized. (Rev. Roy Cantrell, Rev. Chuck Garner, and Rev. John Deane were listed in the 1998 Associational Annual under New Pastors and Staff; however, they were not introduced to the body at the Annual Meeting.)

The report of the **Acteam/Sunday School Council** was shared by Rev. Stuart White. A Sunday School Clinic was held at Rich Fork Baptist Church on May 18, 1999, with a total of 35 persons in attendance. Rev. White reported that the **Vacation Bible School** was more successful than ever with 41 churches participating, 4,395 enrolled, and 91 professions of faith. Both of these reports were approved as presented.

The **Treasurer's Report** was presented by Mrs. Esther House, who made a motion to accept the report as printed in the Book of Reports. Motion was seconded and passed.

Moderator Markus Sink introduced Dr. Jack L. Gentry, Sr., retired missionary to Taiwan, who has been serving as the Interim Associational Missionary since April, 1999. Dr. Gentry expressed appreciation for the DOM Search Committee and asked that they be continually lifted to the Lord in prayer. He also thanked those who had completed Search Committee Questionnaires. Dr. Gentry expressed his desire to help churches in practical cooperation within churches and between churches for one kingdom, for one Lord, Jesus Christ. The Interim Associational Missionary Report was approved.

Dr. Peter Hamilton gave a report from the **Evangelism Council**. One emphasis of the Celebrate Jesus 2000 is called "praying your friends to Christ" which involves consistent commitment in groups of three to pray for lost individuals. Another emphasis is called "Fasting and Prayer '99." This is an event which will be held in Houston, Texas, accessible locally through satelite. Liberty Baptist Church is set up to receive this and other churches are invited to come for this live broadcast on November 11, 12, and 13, 1999. Rev. Lowell Askins, shared about the F.A.I.T.H. program, which has been implemented at Coggins Memorial. The Evangelism Council report was approved.

Rev. Lamar Moore, Chairman, made a motion that the **Nominating Committee Report** be accepted as printed in the Book of Reports. The motion was seconded and passed. The Nominating Committee has also requested that the Constitution and Bylaws Committee be revised to reflect the report from the Nominating Committee. Rev. Moore thanked those who have so willingly agreed to serve in positions of leadership.

Mrs. Jeanne Davis led in singing hymns "O, For a Thousand Tongues to Sing" and "Love Divine, All Love Excelling." Because of being ahead of schedule on the program, Dr. Ray Howell made a recommendation to amend the program, and have the Administrative Leadership Team report given in the afternoon, rather than at the evening session. A motion was made and passed. The **Committee on Nominations Report** will be given at a later time.

The North Carolina Baptist Retirement Homes report was given by Rev. Calvin Knight, and Rev. Morris Hollifield presented a report from the Administrative Leadership Team. Both of these reports were approved. Moderator Markus Sink expressed appreciation to all the members of the Administrative Leadership Team for their work on behalf of Liberty Baptist Association.

Special Music was provided by Mrs. Peggy Barnhardt, pianist, and Mrs. Mary Martin, soloist. Scripture from Romans 10:1-4 and Romans 10:9-15 was read by Dr. Dan Hutchins, followed by a message from Rev. Markus Sink. To "Discover the Adventure" we must begin with the Gospel. The number one priority and responsibility of our association is to the Gospel and for the Gospel.

Membership: outlines those who are to be members of the Executive Board. Item No. 2 was amended on October 5, 1998, to read as follows: (italicized portion denotes change) The active pastor of each member, or if none, the Interim pastor of each member church; or if neither, the church secretary. Since all member churches do not have secretaries, the Constitution and Bylaws Committee recommends this be changed to church clerk in lieu of church secretary. This will be brought for a vote at a later time.

The **Discipleship Training** report was given by Rev. Stuart White, who said that one of the areas which has been dear to him is the Bible Memory work, through children's Bible Drills, youth Bible Drills and Speakers' Tournaments. The only church participating in Bible memory work is Carolina Memorial Baptist Church. This year, Ashley Metters, a member of Carolina Memorial became a state winner in this area. If any churches of the association are interested in knowing more about the Bible memory work, Rev. White or Rev. Mark Blair, 1999-2000 Discipleship Supporters, will be glad to assist them in getting involved in the program. One young lady from Carolina Memorial, eleven year old Lindsay Hoyle, has been very active in the Bible memory work and Bible drills. She had a heart transplant, and on a previous occasion shared with Rev. White that her favorite memory verse was Psalm 56:3, "What time I am afraid, I will trust in Thee." Her father said she was quoting this verse to her doctors prior to going into surgery at Chapel Hill. This was a verse learned during her Bible memory work and has become a very popular verse at Carolina Memorial. The Discipleship Training report was approved.

Jim Lawson, member of the Finance Committee, gave the report in the absence of Chairman, Raleigh York,

Jr., and recommended that the 1999-2000 Budget be adopted. The report was approved and the recommended Budget was adopted.

Bessie Blackwell, member of the **Committee on Nominations** announced the following people have been chosen to serve on the **1999-2000 Nominating Committee**: Roy Cantrell, Chairman (Cedar Lodge); Mark Blair (Welcome, First); John Gore (Greenwood); Mem Rollins (Thomasville, First); and Janet Sharpe (North Lexington).

Jeanne Davis led in singing a hymn, followed by a report from Chaplain Michael Lee on the **Prison Ministry**. Chaplain Lee expressed appreciation to Liberty Baptist Association for the support and for the gifts given to the inmates at Christmas. Many times these are the only gifts they receive. At present the Chaplain position is part-time, but the Davidson Chaplaincy Association is requesting additional financial support to make it possible for this to be a full-time position at the men's facility.

Rev. R. N. Hardin, Vice Chairman, presented the report from the **Missions Development Council**. A recommendation was made to accept Higher Ground Baptist Church under watchcare for period of one year. Motion was seconded and passed. Currytown Baptist Church has expressed their desire to withdraw from the Liberty Baptist Association. Motion was made, seconded and passed to grant their request with regret.

Rev. Stuart White presented a report from the **South Africa Partnership Committee**. Evelyn Reece shared about the 17 day trip which she and Betsy Leach took to South Africa in October, 1998. They stayed in the home of an Asian-Indian couple, who were most gracious to them. Betsy and Evelyn served in a three-day retreat as teachers to a ladies camp meeting, visited in hospitals, and had opportunity to share in other areas during their stay. Mrs. Reece encouraged people to be volunteers, not only in foreign countries, but also in our own state for the flood victims. The report was approved as presented.

The choir of First Baptist Church provided special music "Just a Closer Walk With Thee," followed by a message from Rev. Tony Cartledge, Editor of The Biblical Recorder. Text was taken from Phillipians 4:10-13. When we believe we can handle all things through Christ, then we have courage to take risks for Christ. As Christians, there are risks we cannot afford not to take.

Meeting was adjourned with benediction by Rev. Morris Hollifield.

Rev. R. N. Hardin led in singing hymn "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus." The Baptist Men/Brotherhood report was shared by Michael Rinehardt, Chairman. He reported that the Baptist Men had served over 600,000 meals in eastern North Carolina. People from our association have been in the forefront assisting with disaster recovery. Those who had already been and those planning to go were recognized. A tractor-trailer load of supplies will be going to eastern North Carolina from our association. Many financial donations have gone from our churches for assistance. In Honduras, the NC Baptist Men, along with the International Mission Board, have agreed with the National Baptist Convention of Honduras, to build approximately 250 homes. The materials will be furnished. What we need is volunteers to go. 56 teams involving 622 volunteers, many from our own association, have gone to Honduras to minister in Christ's name. Five medical teams have seen approximately 5,500 patients. By the end of 1999, we anticipate that more than 1,000 volunteers will have served in Honduras. In the year 2000, we will be focusing on building homes and we need to send ten medical teams. Three dates are available to go to Honduras, March 20-28, 2000, sponsored by Reeds Baptist Church; July 13-21, 2000, Carl Hunt will be taking a group; and on August 1-9, 2000, the association will sponsor a trip. The cost is \$750.00 for each trip. Anyone interested should contact the associational office or the Baptist Men's office in Cary. The Baptist Men/Brotherhood report was approved. A collection of \$470.00 was received to be forwarded to the Baptist State Convention for use in eastern North Carolina.

The **Woman's Missionary Union** report was shared by Judy Yarbrough, Associational WMU Director. Women who are not involved in Woman's Missionary Union were encouraged to become a part of a WMU organization. This is an important area of Christian growth. This report was approved as presented.

The evening message was given by Dr. Ray Howell, II, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Lexington. Scripture was shared from Acts 17:10-14. Rev. Jack Gentry, Interim Associational Missionary, had the service for Installation of the 1999-2000 Officers: Moderator, Rev. LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION REPORTS ADMINISTRATIVE LEADERSHIP TEAM REPORT

The Administrative Leadership Team in the Liberty Baptist Association was an idea pioneered by the Personnel Committee. After prayerful exploration with the Executive Committee, it was determined that six people would be asked to serve. Consequently, on July 28, 1998, the following people were elected to serve: Charlotte Cook, Charles Dickens; Morris Hollifield, Brooks Hunt, Davis McGuirt, and Bill Reece.

In the early days of its inception, the committee met about every two weeks. There was a concerted effort to work with associational committees and councils in order to enhance communication and encourage harmony. Contacts were established with churches without pastors, and the committee resolved to reestablish fiscal integrity in the larger community.

The response of the churches has been most favorable. Several increased their contributions, and all have proved faithful in financial support. This enabled the association to meet all its financial obligations, and to call an Interim Associational Missionary. On March 30, 1999, the Executive Board approved the recommendation of the Personnel Committee and extended a call to Dr. Jack L.Gentry, Sr. to serve as Interim Associational Missionary. He began his duties on April 5, 1999.

With Dr. Gentry's employment, the work of the Administrative Leadership Team moved to another level. Originally, the Team had been asked to serve for six months. In November of 1998, the Executive Board asked that the time of service be extended indefinitely. Dr. Gentry expressed a desire for the Team to remain in place to serve with him for a while until he learned the pastors and churches. Shortly after Dr. Gentry started work, he began visiting pastors and churches, with the goal of visiting each church. That has now been accomplished. The Team members provided someone to accompany the Interim Missionary on each visit. With that accomplished, the Team now meets each month with the Interim Missionary, and serves as an advisory group.

The original group elected to the leadership team remained intact until the spring of 1999. Davis McGuirt resigned as pastor of the Central Baptist Church, and asked to be replaced on the Team. On May 24, 1999, the Executive Board elected Byron Barker to replace Davis McGuirt.

When the Administrative Leadership Team was elected, the Executive Board suggested they be reimbursed for travel at the current rate used by our convention. When the committee met, they expressed the feeling that if each person could assume one's own travel cost, it would enable the Association to recover sound financial advantage more quickly. It was the desire of each committee member to serve the Association effectively. If that has been accomplished, then we believe the intended purpose has been fulfilled and some measure of accomplishment has been achieved.

Perhaps my travel as Chairman of the team has exceeded that of most members, but the following record from my files will provide some insight to the work load that has been assumed.

Miles traveled (July 26, 1998-September 30, 1999)-6,170.3; Telephone calls received: 182;

Telephone calls made: 278; Visits made: 109

The Team is especially grateful for the encouragement and support which you have provided over the past 15 months. If stability has been achieved and any progress accomplished, then let's give the glory to God who has bound us together through His love.

We will be forever indebted to the officers and Executive Board for envisioning a method for effectively leading our churches to greater unity in mission support. The churches of the Liberty Baptist Association are to be commended for their response to mission opportunities, and for the evident commitment to cooperative work in furthering the Kingdom of our Lord. The Administrative Leadership Team has grown close in their efforts to serve the churches. Because of friendships which have been furthered and working relationships which have been strengthened, there will continue to be a growing appreciation for Baptist Associations. Thank you for this privilege of ministry and service.

DAVIDSON MEDICAL MINISTRIES CLINIC, INC.

Once again I am grateful for the opportunity to speak to you on behalf of Davidson Medical Ministries Clinic. I am excited about sharing with you the adventure that we have been on this past year. Last October, after much investigation and contemplation our board of directors stepped out on faith and decided to pursue the building of a new clinic facility. Our little 3,500 sq. ft. home at 25 E. Third Street had not been adequate in keeping up with the demands of our growing client population for some time. Our land owners, after almost 2 years of negotiations, finally said no to the idea of our purchasing the property and renovating our present building. In January DMMC's board launched a \$1.5million capital campaign in an attempt to build a new 9,400 sq. ft clinic.

After 7 months our goal of \$1.5 million had been met. The \$200,000 from the previous campaign of 1996 was used to purchase property at 420 N. Salisbury Street (across from Hedgecock's Builders Supply) bringing our campaign total to \$1.7 million. God truly blessed and told us that this was the right decision. Our building is well

under way and we are hopeful that by the end of 1999 or early 2000 we will move.

The new clinic will have a pharmacy wing, 7 patient exam rooms, 3 dental operatories, 4 eligibility screening rooms, a board room, staff offices, a break room and kitchen for volunteers and staff, clerical and nursing units, a patient education room, a large waiting area and a chapel. We already have all the space accounted for are anxious to move in.

My charge to you today is about the ministry opportunities that will be available when we open the new clinic.

1. Volunteer Service: One of our goals is to expand our service hours. If we are to accomplish this we must have more volunteers. Men and women who will give a few hours per week or month. Daytime volunteers will include those who can answer the phone, file and learn to do client eligibility; professional volunteers like doctors, dentists, pharmacists, and nurses who would rather come during the day instead of at night; nurses, dietitians, financial planners and counselors who would like to hold group or individual sessions for our clients.

2. A Hostess Ministry to our Volunteers: Many of our volunteers come directly from work to volunteer at DMMC. We would like to have a church group, a civic group, a restaurant, or an individual sign up to bring a light meal for our volunteers. We need a volunteer to coordinate this program and volunteers to serve those who serve

others.

3. Chaplaincy Ministry: We want to expand the ministry in Davidson Medical Ministries to include opportunities for clients to talk with a pastor or Christian counselor during the time they are at the clinic. We will have a small chapel where, if volunteers are available, we can talk, counsel and pray with those who desire such an encounter. So many of our clients are in situations that many of us cannot comprehend, yet they live in it daily. Some suffer because of choices they make, others, but by the grace of God; could be us. Everything going on at DMMC is not about the future. There is plenty to keep us busy while we plan and prepare for the future. We are still holding medical, dental and pharmacy clinics on Monday and Thursday evenings from 6-9 pm. We currently have over 5,300 clients registered (not all active, but all served in some way at DMMC). We filled 21,566 prescriptions and saw 1,377 clients in medical/dental clinic last fiscal year, a customer value of\$1,435,784.21. Numbers perhaps you will not remember, but know this: without you much of this would not have been possible.

DMMC is also about being in "association." Over the past 2 years we have developed some partnerships to allow us to expand our services and better meet community needs. DMMC is in partnership with Davidson County Community College Nursing Department to offer a Nursing Clinic on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. We partner with the Davidson County Health Department to provide a home for the children's Medicaid clinic. We partner with the local schools to provide opportunities for students to volunteer and see a healthcare facility in action. We partner with Home Health agencies, Department of Senior Services and have our own specialty clinics to meet certain

pharmacy needs.

Churches work in association with DMMC. You provide manpower as you promote ministry opportunities through volunteerism. You provide purchase power as you give to the work of DMMC through your church budgets and through the association. Your dollars buys the medicines, keeps on the lights, and purchase equipment. And last but not least, you provide prayer power. Many of you have our ministry on your prayer list. You tell me that you pray for me, and the work that God has called me to do. I am grateful. I cannot stand here today and tell you

that there are not times when I want to walk away, that I don't worry about where the money to continue to meet the needs will come from, and that I never get frustrated because so many people are needed to make the clinic happen. I do, because I'm human. But God is good and he has been good to me and to DMMC. He has continued to bless us by allowing us to have wonderful supporters like Liberty Baptist Association and many of your individual churches.

We are grateful for all you do and I thank you on behalf of the clients and staff at DMMC.

The following churches supplied or prepared a meal: Trinity; Jersey; Thomasville, First; Smith Grove; New Friendship; Oak Hill Memorial; North Lexington; Churchland; Amity; Southside; Denton, First; Abbotts Creek; Colonial; Cedar Lodge; Carolina Memorial; Greenwood; First Fellowship; Wallburg; Reeds; Lakeview; and Center Hill for a meal and health kits.

The Medical-Dental Bus came on July 18, 1999, from 2:00 to 7:00 p.m. This ministry was coordinated by Kim Frank. Dr. Herb Davis, Dentist, and Dan Entwistle, M.D., were assisted by Newell Davis, Kim Moss, other nurses and interpreters. A total of 34 men and women were seen by the dentist and doctor. Health kits were given out, as well as clothing from Abbotts Creek church. A hot dog supper was provided by North Lexington Baptist Church.

Average attendance has been ten migrant men. Several professions of faith have been made. God is so faithful! We extend a special thanks to Abbotts Creek Baptist church for hosting this ministry year after year. Our meetings will go into October, 1999.

HOST CHURCHES HISTORIES

First Baptist Church, Lexington

1990- September, 1999

This segment of our history follows the historical sketch included in the minutes of the Liberty Association in 1990. The church voted to use Church Bonds to retire the debt during the renovation of our church facility. The Bonds were offered to the congregation as an investment. Many of the congregation participated.

Each year the WMU sponsors "Christmas in September" for foster children of Davidson County. School

supplies are bought by church members and given to Social Services to distribute.

In the beginning of 1992, two to three mission trips were planned for the next 24 months. One was to send a medical team to Guatemala. Another was to send a construction team to Belize. Each year since 1992 a group of men and women from First Baptist have gone to Belize to help build the Baptist Christian Training Center, to participate in the Belize local church services, and fellowship with the people. In April of 1992, the church was challenged to build two houses- one here and the other in Belize. Since 1992, our church has been involved in helping build several houses for Habitat for Humanity in Lexington, plus the ones our church sponsored.

In early 1992, a committee was appointed to develop and draft a Constitution and By-laws and Articles of Incorporation for our church. The committee examined documents from other churches to get some feeling for their work. A rough draft was drawn up and distributed to the deacons. After some re-writing and consulting and discussions in church meetings, all church families received copies of the proposed By Laws and Articles of Incorporation. The vote to approve the documents was held on October 6, 1993.

Beverly Fulbright asked the church to ordain her to the ministry. She presented herself to the deacons and was

unanimously approved for ordination. Ordination was held on Sunday, July 5.

In 1995 the pastor, Ray N. Howell III, was asked to allow his name to be submitted for second vice-president of the N. C. Baptist State Convention by Friends of Missions.

In 1995 as a churchwide Mission Project during the month of October, members of First Baptist Church had the opportunity to help provide Christmas gift bags with personal items for the Davidson County Men's Correctional Facility.

In 1997 Ray Howell III submitted his name to run as president of the N. C. Baptist State Convention.

Over the years, numerous problems were occurring with our organ, which was twenty-two years old. Different parts were breaking down and it was recommended that these problems be tackled one at a time in the next several years. It was found after thorough research, that it would cost approximately \$238,000 to repair the organ. Donations were made through the church in honor or in memory of someone; a "Womanless" wedding was held, Bake sales held; the Sanctuary choir presented a Broadway Show featuring Rogers and Hammerstein and John Lerner's music with choir members performing; a Silent Auction" was held; Real property was donated to be sold. Many other groups raised money to help defray the cost. The Organ Fund reached it's goal and exceeded it - \$254,240.

On Palm Sunday, March 31, 1996, the Rededication of the Sanctuary Pipe Organ was held. Over the next two year's, different musicians were invited to perform on our new and beautiful renovated organ.

August 1998, Al Martin, Minister of Music resigned after 24 years of faithful service.

In November of 1998, First Baptist Church set out on an exciting and challenging venture, to "Adopt a People." Our church is set to "adopt" the Pattani Malay people of Southern Thailand as a special missions project for the next three year's. This people group, roughly the size of Atlanta's population, has fewer than 100 people who profess Christianity. They have been identified by the CBF as one of the people groups of World A to be included in the Adopt-A-People Ministry. Our church will be lending support through prayer and material aid.

There is so much more that could be included in this summary, which includes the different ministries of the church, especially the young people and their fine leader's who have contributed so much to the on going field of

missions.

Over the past one hundred eighteen years, First Baptist Lexington has faced many challenges. She has sent many young people out into Christian ministries and mission fields, guided by Christian leadership in our church.

Stoner's Grove Baptist Church, Southmont

The earliest records indicate there were several members of Holloways Baptist Church living in the Southmont area. During the years of 1898-1899 Elders J. M. Benett, John R. Miller and W. H. Rich preached at Fairmont School House as they had opportunity.

Records indicate Holloways Church sent out a group which first held a revival in the fork of Highway 8 and Linwood Road. Elder Jeff Lanning was engaged to preach regularly once a month in 1900. Stoner's Grove Baptist Church was constituted March 6, 1900. The church building was started in the fall of 1900 and completed in the spring of. 1901. Much of the material was furnished by brothers Franklin Warfford, James Emmanuel Warfford, John Warfford, and Frank Roach. The land was given by Mrs. Fannie Stoner. This band of 20 members was very active during this period of time.

The Rev. W. H. Rich delivered the first sermon in May 1901. He presented Stoner's Grove Church as a glorious church. The Deacons were J. E. Warfford, B. F. Roach and L. C. Lomax.

The twenty (20) charter members were J. H. Warfford, Mrs. (Maria) John H. Warfford, J. E. Warfford, Mrs. Rebecca Warfford, I. S. Warfford, Sallie M. Warfford, Mrs. John E. Wrenn, Mrs. Fannie Stoner, W. F. Stoner, Mrs. J. D. Lookabill, L. C. Lomax, Mrs. L. C. Lomax, L. A. Voncannon, Franklin Warfford, Mrs. Franklin Warfford, B. F. Roach, Mrs. B. F. Roach and Mrs. Rachel Shoaf. The first pastor was Rev. Jeff Lanning who served until 1909.

During the years of Stoner's Grave Baptist Church five (5) have gone forth to preach the Gospel and minister to people. They were Cicero Roach in 1918, Joe Roach in 1920, Ronald Wall in 1924, Walter L. Warfford in 1929, and H. T. Penry, Jr. in 1955.

During years 1988-1993, land adjoining the cemetery was purchased and a picnic shelter was built. A van was purchased and a garage was built at the parsonage. A large church sign was purchased and erected in 1993. The old educational wing was painted and new carpet laid. The fellowship hall and stairways were panneled in 1995. The carpet in the fellowship hall and kitchen was replaced with tile floor covering in 1999.

INTERIM ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY

April Fool's Day had just passed when I began work as your Interim Associational Missionary. That was six months ago. This relatively brief time has made one thing clear to me that I want to pass on to you. There are more opportunities related to this position than a part-time retiree can attend to. But it's been fun trying.

My basic evaluation of the Liberty Baptist Association is this: A wide door of opportunity is open to you. Great positive good comes from TEAMWORK in *Mission Partnerships, Handyman Ministries*, and *Disaster Relief*. These are practical hands-on ministries that must continue. "Getting a handle" on more spiritual needs such as *Local Church Evangelistic Outreach* and *Discipleship Development* is harder to do. With the help of the Holy Sprit you can do it! TEAMWORK within churches and between churches in meeting spiritual needs is the challenge that is knocking at the association's door.

I acknowledge this challenge with positive expectations. I can be positive because of the reception given me (during these six months) by pastors, churches and elected associational leaders. I recognize some of the reasons for it.

First, the faithfulness and goodness of God are reflected in His people. Second, the many years of service to the association by Leonard and Polly Rollins were a time of high trust and low fear. This is the kind of foundation, and way of relating, that people have not forgotten. Next, your Administrative Leadership Team; Gail Beck, Administrative Secretary; and several other persons in key roles in the association have "kept the faith" during a time that has not always been easy.

Now, a dedicated search committee is at work. They are clear about their task and are working well together. Forty-two questionnaires have been completed and returned (September 29). This is enough to be very helpful, and we hope for more.

The first of three "Town Meetings" was held on September 28th at Reeds Baptist Church. That event was a great encouragement to the search committee.

Sharing your views about the next associational missionary is important. The most important thing you can do is pray now, and keep on praying, that we all will measure up to the opportunity before us.

LITERACY COUNCIL

They are hoping to begin a full time program with Hispanics living in the community, as well as the Migrants.

If you are interested in working with Hispanics or other ethnic groups in your community, Maurine Perryman is certified by the North American Mission Board to teach the Conversational English Workshop to train teachers for the work. Would you like to be a volunteer?

MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL REPORT

1999 has been a very active year for the Missions Development Council. The Council has been working closely with the committees, councils, and agencies in Liberty Baptist Association to enhance the work of God's kingdom.

The churches of Liberty Baptist Association continue to give strong support and emphasis to Partnership missions with South Africa. Several teams have gone to South Africa to assist with mission activities.

The Missions Development Council recommended that an Administrative Leadership Team of six members serve the association in the absence of a Director of Missions. This is a unique concept in associational leadership and has worked well for all of us. This Team has been accepted favorably and received praise from the NC Baptist State Convention. The Council recommended that when an Interim Director of Missions was called, the Administrative Leadership Team remain in place in an advisory capacity to assist the Interim DOM in learning the location of the churches, and to introduce the Interim to pastors and lay leadership of the association. This has worked exceptionally well.

Through the Baptist State Convention's Cooperative Agreements financial assistance has been requested and acknowledged for 2000 for the following ministries: Cambodian Mission and Hunger Ministry, sponsored by North Lexington Baptist Church; Festival Ministries/Resort Ministries to provide float at Christmas Parade and booths at annual events (Everybody's Day, Thomasville; Thresher's Reunion, Denton; Bar-be-que Festival, Lexington); Prison Gift Ministry; and the shipping of used literature to five locations in the United States and to South Africa.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as Vice Chairman of the Missions Development Council during the past year. My sincere appreciation to each member for their many contributions in helping maintain vital mission ministries in Liberty Baptist Association.

Coggins has pledged an additional full support for another Church Planter.

We also sent \$250 to the BASA Association for the support and training of Ministerial Students.

Please continue praying for the NC/South Africa Partnership. Pray that doors will open and that the Lord will call those whom He would have to share in this work.

We also take devotional materials, "good" magazines, books, and Bibles to the prisons in Davidson County (men and women), and in Montgomery County.

From October, 1998 through July, 1999, we shipped boxes of literature for a total of \$794.08. Your literature committee thanks you for being a part of this ministry.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The Liberty Baptist Associational Woman's Missionary Union is an organization which exists to assist the local churches in their missions education programs. The national emphasis for the year was "Transformed." Our objectives were to challenge WMU members to experience the transforming power of God and to participate in mobilizing Christians to share the message of God's transforming love with peoples of the world. Emphasizing the theme of the year, Women on Mission offered a study of the book, <u>TRANSFORMED</u>, by Stuart Calvert, on October 24, 1998, at Mills Home. Women were led through various Biblical examples of the power of God.

FIRST PLACE, a Christ-centered health program with a support group for weight control, along with an emphasis on spiritual, mental, and emotional balance in life, was an area of Women and Adults on Mission where we saw new groups form in 1998-1999. The FIRST PLACE program has nine commitments which help a person draw closer to the Lord and to become the person God created them to be.

Encouraging men and women to become volunteers for missions was an emphasis also. Evelyn Reece and Betsy Leach spent some time teaching in South Africa. In October, our association hosted Anthony and Demor Poliah from South Africa, with several churches acting as hosts. Mrs. Poliah attended a leadership team meeting. Many teenagers and adults also participated in mission work in East Asia, Honduras, Alabama, Florida, East St. Louis, and several other points. We also encouraged praying for Jimmy and Anita Joseph in Grenada and using e-mail: <i in Sijoseph@caribsurf.com>.

Meeting needs of the people of our community was another avenue for us to share the gospel in 1998-1999. Liberty Baptist Association sponsored a **Toy Store Ministry** to bring joy to many children at Christmas. Hundreds of people contributed toys for children from birth to age 12, and 74 families (162 children) were helped in 1998. The **Prisoners' Christmas Gift Project** touched the lives of 395 men and women in the Lexington prison units. Each inmate received a large bag containing a New Testament, hygiene items, gum, candy, writing tablet, pen, and socks. In addition, our association helped **Alpha Pregnancy Support Center** during the year by publicizing their annual fund-raising banquet and walk-a-thon. Several churches had baby showers for the center. Some volunteered at the center, and many churches and individuals contributed financially.

Literacy missions and outreach to ethnic groups, such as Hispanics and Cambodians for which English is a second language, began to increase during the year. Literacy workshops, led by Maurine Perryman, were conducted in May. Several churches have worship services, Sunday School classes, and various ministries for these groups.

The Annual LBA Woman's Missionary Union meeting was held at First Baptist Church in Welcome on March 22, 1999. It began with the Women on Mission's Salad Supper. Charlotte Cook installed new officers for 1999-2000. Special music was provided by the Ensemble of First Baptist Church, directed by Keith Brown, and Evelyn Reece shared about the experiences of her teaching trip to South Africa.

Many WMU members attended the State WMU Annual Meeting at Ridgecrest on April 23-25, 1999.

Acteens Day at Campbell University was well attended by our association. The Campbell Women on Mission group hosted this event. Acteens contributed over 2,000 children's books, distributed to various organizations which help children, such as medical ministries and Christian Activity Centers. Acteens held a lock-in on March 26-27 at First Baptist Church, Welcome; and a "Day in the Park" at Finch Park in Lexington on May 22. Summer camp was attended by many Girls in Action and Acteens members from Liberty Association. Joy Turner and Amy Jenkins, from Welcome, First, were staff members at Mundo Vista. Children in Action and Girls in Action attended a spring event at Mundo Vista called "Passport to South Africa." Mission Friends had a day camp at Churchland Baptist Church on May 22, 1999, with Dr. and Mrs. Jack Gentry, Sr. teaching the children about missions in Taiwan.

Rich Fork Baptist Church hosted the International Mission Study on November 16, 1998. To promote North the Carolina missions, volunteers attempted to contact the pastors of every church in the association to obtain one prayer request for each church. The BSCNC staff in Cary will pray for these during the Week of Prayer in September.

Be transformed! Grow in spiritual power and go make disciples. "Adapt yourselves no longer to the pattern of this present world, but let your minds be remade and your whole nature thus transformed." (Romans 12:2a NEB) Woman's Missionary Union will continue the challenge in the coming year.

BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION OF NC REPORTS Baptist Children's Homes of NC 1999 Book of Reports

Three rocks beside her trailer house warned fouryear-old Mamie not to tell anyone of the way her father was abusing her. If she ever told, her father said, those stones would mark her grave and the graves of her two best friends.

"He had already killed my dog," says Mamie, now 16. "So I believed him."

When authorities discovered Mamie's abuse at the hands of her father, she was taken from him, and he was charged, but released on bond. He came to the house where Mamie was staying to kill the people in the house...and her. But he was subdued. She heard him through the wall threaten her death while she cowered inside.

Mamie's mother, who left the family when Mamie was six weeks old, attended her father's trial, but only "to see if Mamie looked like me." Mamie never saw her.

George and Linda Hogan, believing " every child deserves a childhood," took Mamie in and raised her as their own. They met her while delivering communion elements to her grandmother.

"It's been a struggle, but you do the best you can," said Linda, who suffers with diabetic ulcers. After her 71-year-old husband had a second heart attack, Mamie became too much for the couple to handle.

She lives now at Moody Home, a structured value change home for girls in Franklin, one of 13 facilities operated by Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina.

Shedding the Safety Net

Mamie pressed the boundaries of love, and George and Linda weren't physically able to pull her back to safety.

"I tried to push the boundaries a little further and a little further, to see how far I could push before they snapped. Finally, they couldn't take it anymore," Mamie said. Baptist Children's Homes serves families who "can't take it anymore," who have children or grandchildren whose behaviors are out of bounds.

In 1998-99 BCH served 1,646 children and their families through 13 facilities statewide. BCH operates residential campuses in Thomasville, Pembroke, Kinston and Clyde; a maternity home in Asheville; a teen mother/baby home in Lenoir; values change homes for girls in Franklin and Lenoir, therapeutic camping in Cameron; crisis cottages at the residential campuses and in Waynesville; and model day care in Thomasville.

Beginning with Easter 1999 and continuing through Thanksgiving 2000, BCH instituted a 20-month institutional emphasis of "Quality Service Through Quality Relationships." Michael C. Blackwell, president since 1983, is "committed to keeping our staff and our services fresh and vital to meet ever changing needs."

The emphasis places top priority on relationships to achieve the highest quality of service possible. The QSTQR operating theme will permeate every action, program and effort within the institution and without.

The word "quality" has been overused and under-realized, and it too often cloaks mediocrity with imagined value. There will be no such veneer at BCH.

Building and Renovating

BCH moved ahead its Odum Home campus in Pembroke to meet new challenges April 27, 1999 by dedicating two major campus reno- vations. Space for 10 boys was added to the old "main" building which was named Luther and Audrey Carter Hall, in honor of the donor couple who left their estate to BCH.

The former house used for a director's residence was renovated to serve five girls in transitional care and named for longtime trustee and supporters Abe and Jackie Elmore.

Total renovations increased capacity at Odum Home from 28 residents to 45. Additionally, 10 day students from Pembroke Middle School will be served at the Winifred Lindsay Education/Administrative Center. These students have issues to resolve that do not require them to be in residential care.

At Cameron Boys Camp May 4, two important staff lodges were dedicated: the A.J: Fletcher Lodge and the Hubert M. Craig Lodge. These lodges provide staff housing, a rare commodity in wilderness setting in which Cameron Boys Camp operates.

Biblical Recorder Associational Report July 1, 1999

The Biblical Recorder is the official news journal of North Carolina Baptists. The earliest version of the Recorder was founded in 1833 by Thomas Meredith, who had also been influential in the birth of the Baptist State Convention in 1830. The Biblical Recorder was owned and operated as a private enterprise in support of Baptist work in North Carolina until 1938, when the paper was purchased by the Baptist State Convention and incorporated as an agency of the convention.

A number of able editors have served the Biblical Recorder, which is widely acknowledged to be in the top echelon of state Baptist papers. The current editor is Tony W. Cartledge, whose tenure began on January 1, 1999.

The Biblical Recorder plays a strategic role in promoting God's kingdom work through North Carolina Baptists. On April 22, 1999, the Board of Directors of the Biblical Recorder adopted the following mission statement: "Our Mission is to further Christ's kingdom by providing relevant news, insightful opinions and supportive resources to North Carolina Baptists in a timely and accessible fashion."

The Biblical Recorder belongs to all North Carolina Baptists, and appropriately reflects the geographical, ecclesiological, and theological diversity that is typical of the churches making up the Baptist State Convention. The editors and staff of the Recorder work diligently to offer a fair and balanced presentation of the news that most affects the life and ministry of North Carolina Baptists. Opinions advanced through editorials, letters, and analytical essays help to spark the thinking of North Carolina Baptists who want to make up their own minds about important issues. Feature stories about notable or innovative activities of churches and associations, regular reports on partnership missions efforts, and weekly commentaries on the most popular Sunday School lessons offer ideas, encouragement, and inspiration to readers of the Recorder.

To communicate more effectively and to present the most important news in a more timely fashion, the Biblical Recorder has developed a popular presence on the World Wide Web. The Recorder's website at hhtp://www.biblicalrecorder.org offers Internet users an opportunity to read much of each paper's content several days before printed versions arrive. This is particularly helpful during convention meetings and at other times when frequent updates are desirable. As time and resources allow, additional features will be added to make the website an even more valuable source of information for North Carolina Baptists.

"N.C. Baptists have been involved in Christian higher education literally since the day the Baptist State Convention (BSC) was born," wrote Dr. Jim Royston, Executive Director-Treasurer, Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, for *The Biblical Recorder*.

Dr. Royston's correct. North Carolina Baptists have placed a high priority upon Christian higher education through the years. As a result, a large number of our pastors, staff ministers, and lay-leaders have been educated by one of our Baptist institutions, helping our churches develop as places where the Gospel is treasured and Christ is honored.

Maintaining close ties to our churches and associations is important to our institutions. This is one of the primary missions of the Council on Christian Higher Education. Founded in 1944, the Council seeks to foster good communications between our churches, associations, and institutions of higher education

Divinity schools and centers for congregational growth serve as positive demonstrations of our institutions' desire to enhance the life in our churches and associations. Current and future leaders are being trained through these facilities.

According to the Executive Director of the Council on Christian Higher Education, Dr. Wayne D. Wike, "North Carolina Baptists are fortunate to have administrators and faculty members who are committed to enriching the life of our Convention."

Gifts to the Cooperative Program assist in helping our institutions fulfill their missions. Members from cooperating churches are eligible, as a result, to be considered for scholarships to attend one of our colleges or universities. In addition, North Carolina Baptists who meet the admission requirements for the divinity schools at Campbell and Gardner-Webb Universities are eligible to receive \$8,100 grants toward their theological education. Students who choose to attend another divinity school are eligible to receive \$3,000 toward their educational expenses. All of these are made possible as a result of gifts presented to the Cooperative Program of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

As Dr. Royston wrote, "Baptist colleges are still a priority of our state Convention. It is my hope and dream that more and more students from our churches will attend our schools, and graduate as leaders for our state and nation, as well as for our churches."

Our colleges and universities share Dr. Royston's hope and dream. They, too, believe graduates from our campuses will make a difference in our state, nation, and Convention.

THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC.

1998 ANNUAL REPORT

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in increasing an awareness among North Carolina Baptists of Christian estate stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased financial support. The Foundation accomplishes these objectives by offering assistance in estate planning counsel, Will preparation, planned giving, charitable remainder trusts, endowment funds and church fund management.

During 1998, the Foundation provided assistance to individuals in establishing 28 endowment funds and 11 charitable remainder trusts totaling \$1.4 million and received \$3.8 million in contributions to existing endowments all of which will ultimately benefit countless Baptist causes on a permanent basis. Programs were provided for 94 churches and associations during the year to promote Make Your Will Month, Christian estate stewardship, and church fund management. Some \$639,000 from churches came under management to enhance numerous church ministries including scholarships, building funds, cemetery funds, benevolence funds, general operating funds and other various mission causes.

The Foundation employs professional money managers to invest these funds according to an investment policy adopted by its Board. Four investment pools are offered: a growth fund, a balanced fund, an income fund and a fixed income fund. During the third quarter of 1998, the Foundation enhanced its position even more by engaging the services of Salomon Smith Barney to help select top money managers in the country.

As of December 31, 1998, the Foundation held \$80,874,628 under management. This is an increase of more than \$8 million over 1997. During 1998, \$1,741,923 was distributed to individuals and \$2,772,599 to Baptist work for a total distribution of \$4,514,522. During the 79-year history of The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., \$14,217, 160 has been distributed to individuals and \$22,305,008 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$36,522,168.

HOSPITAL CARRIES THE TRADITION

In May of 1999, The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated celebrated 76 years of service to the community and the region. During these years the Hospital has been faithful to the vision of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. When the Hospital was birthed, the Convention stated the reason for doing so was: to extend the healing ministry which was demonstrated by Jesus Christ. Many challenges have been faced through these years, but the commitment to compassionately strive for innovative excellence has remained the same.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

Baptist churches from all across North Carolina joined us in mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. This annual ingathering of love was approved by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina in 1924. In 1998 the MDO amounted to \$530,874. It was used exclusively to help patients who had little or no health care insurance or no other financial means to pay their hospital bills. From the offering this past year, well over \$200,000 was used to assist members of our Baptist churches in North Carolina. May God bless all those who supported us with prayers and gave so generously.

DIVISION OF PASTORAL CARE

During the year, the Department of Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education provided worship services in Davis Chapel on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday, as well as services in the J. Paul Sticht Center, Chaplain supervisors, residents and interns made more than 50,000 ministry contacts last year. Seventy-five students graduated from the Department's fully accredited Clinical Pastoral Education program. Maurice Briggs retired from the Department in February after 30 years of service. He was known throughout the Hospital for his pastoral presence and the depth of his sensitivity and care.

The Department of Pastoral Counseling/CareNet, Inc. continues to expand its ministries. There are now 13 Christian counseling centers located in strategic areas from Franklin to Wilmington. During the year these professionally staffed centers will provide over 26,000 hours of Christian counseling.

The Center for Congregational Health, Inc. continues to expand its mission of helping congregations become healthier communities of faith. Programs and assistance offered to churches include: Consultation, Intentional Interim Ministry, and Leadership Development. Resources for ministers include: Young Leaders Program, Leadership Development Group, Interim Ministry Training, and Intentional Interim Ministry training.

FACTS ABOUT WAKE FOREST UNIVERSITY BAPTIST MEDICAL CENTER

- With more than 11,000 employees, four restaurants, two banks and a post office that handles mail than some towns, the Medical Center has been called a city-within-a-city. We are the largest employer in Forsyth and Guilford counties.
- The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated has opened BestHealth, a community health information center, at Hanes Mall in Winston-Salem. The center will provide a library of books, audio and videotapes, limited Internet access, computer software and a variety of on-site programs to help area residents become better informed about their health and how to remain well.

POINTS OF EMPHASIS AND PROGRESS

Gamma Knife - The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated will have the only one in the state by this fall. Patients with inoperable or inaccessible brain lesions benefit from the availability of this noninvasive procedure that gives the same results as surgery but with no need to open the skull or make an incision. This procedure has been found to be three times more effective in treating recurrent cancerous brain tumors than other radiosurgical tools. The Gamma Knife uses radiation to destroy tumors, vascular malformations and other benign brain lesions with pinpoint accuracy without destroying healthy, normal tissue.

Trauma Center - The Medical Center has the only designated Level I trauma center for northwest N orth Carolina. In the trauma center our goal is for the patient who needs surgery to be in an operating room 10 minutes after arriving at the Emergency Department. Surgeons, anesthesiologists and staff remain on duty 24 hours a day to handle such emergencies.

NASCAR - The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated is working with Motor Racing Outreach (MRO) to serve the fitness and rehabilitation needs of NASCAR Winston Cup Racing. A mobile fitness and rehabilitation unit is being provided for NASCAR Winston Cup Racing drivers, crews and families.

Ranked Among the Nation's Best - The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated is among the nation's best hospitals in ten of 16 specialties, according to rankings published in the July 1999 issue of U.S. New's & World Report. These 10 areas are: cancer, cardiology and heart surgery, geriatrics, gynecology, neurology/neurosurgery, orthopaedics, otolaryngology, rheumatology, digestive tract, and urology.

Newest Treatment for Epilepsy - Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center offers a new treatment for epilepsy - a "pacemaker for the brain" that can help control seizures in patients who are not helped by medication and are ineligible for surgery.

It is a joy for the Christian Action League of North Carolina to serve the churches of this great state. We continue to work to inform the Christian community about the moral issues that face our state and nation. Our goal is to address these issues with the principles of God's Word, the cornerstone of all truth.

A. Christian Values

- It was the pleasure of the Christian Action League to be one of the sponsors of the Fourth Annual Christian Heritage Week of North Carolina held in March. The League encouraged schools, churches and communities to recognize, commemorate and learn about the Christian heritage and history of our nation. CAL assisted in sponsoring a state-wide essay contest for high school students (public, private and home schools) and presented state winners with awards for excellence.
- Continued to promote Christian citizenship throughout the churches and communities of our state. CAL has distributed over 14,000 copies of the Ten Commandments to churches, businesses, schools and homes across North Carolina. Promoted Sanctity of Human Life Sunday and the National Day of Prayer statewide.
- Held a Church Leadership Legislative Day on April 6, 1999. The purpose of this day was to have pastors and church leaders to come together and enjoy fellowship, meet and hear some of our legislators and become more aware of how state government and the legislative process works.
- Promoted awareness of the worldwide persecution of Christians through faxes, e-mails and newsletter.
- B. <u>Gambling:</u> Lottery proponents continue in their efforts to bring a state-sponsored lottery to North Carolina. Four lottery bills were introduced this session. CAL monitors these efforts and updates the Christian community on lottery information through letters, calls and our fax and electronic mail networks. Lawmakers have continued to receive a barrage of communications from across the state saying that the lottery is a bad bet for North Carolina.
- C. <u>Sex Education</u>: Worked with other Christian and pro-family groups to see that the state mandate for Abstinence Until Marriage education is implemented state-wide. Also, supported efforts to insure that federal grant money designated to promote abstinence education was used properly. Informed citizens and legislators concerning attempts to fund school-based clinics in North Carolina schools.
- D. <u>Abortion:</u> CAL monitored SB 349/HB 1066 (Act to Ban Partial Birth Abortion), this legislation would have made this type of abortion a class H felony for anyone who performed the late-term procedure. This bill died in committee. Successfully encouraged legislators to limit the State Abortion Fund to cases resulting only from rape, incest and the life of the mother. In the last four years, only one abortion has occurred under these circumstances using tax-payer funds.
- E. Alcohol: CAL monitored all legislation concerning alcohol and other drugs. Successfully supported efforts to strengthen DWI laws. Assisted communities in organizing committees to fight alcohol and drug use. Informed citizens statewide about legislation that would have approved alcohol sales without the vote of the people. Four bills were introduced this session that would have permitted alcohol sales without a voter referendum; SB 17, SB 173, SB 606, SB 607 and HB 1043. Provided awareness, education and resource materials related to substance abuse problems to churches, communities, etc.
- F. <u>Pornography:</u> Worked against HB 1248 which would have allowed individuals to perform in the nude if it "occurs as part of a play, dance, performance or artistic creation that contains serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value." The bill died in committee.
- G. <u>Homosexuality:</u> CAL supports efforts to strengthen the traditional family and continues to monitor and inform the public about the activities of those who promote the radical homosexual agenda. HB 884 and SB's 701, 884 and 759 were all introduced to promote the acceptance of homosexuality as an alternative lifestyle. CAL with other likeminded organizations fought these bills and they were defeated. Worked against HB 1398 (Needle Exchange Program) which would have allowed the state to furnish free needles to drug users using tax-payer dollars.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

OF

LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Pursuant to §55A-2-02 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the undersigned corporation does hereby submit these Articles of Incorporation for the purpose of forming a nonprofit corporation.

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of the corporation is LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

<u>ARTICLE II</u>

DESIGNATION

The corporation is a charitable or religious corporation within the meaning of N.C.G.S. §55A-1-40(4).

ARTICLE III

REGISTERED OFFICE AND AGENT

The street address of the initial registered office of the corporation is Route 8, Box 610, Bud Kanoy Road, Thomasville, Davidson County, North Carolina, 27360-7839, and the initial registered agent at that office is *Dr*. Richard H. Capps, Director of Missions.

ARTICLE IV INCORPORATORS

The names and addresses of the incorporators, acting as representatives of the members of Liberty Baptist Association are as follows:

ARTICLE V MEMBERS

The corporation shall have one class of members as provided in the bylaws. Members shall be received, rejected, or withdrawn as set forth in the bylaws. The Baptist churches which are members of Liberty Baptist Association immediately prior to the incorporation thereof automatically shall become members of the corporation.

ARTICLE VI DISSOLUTION

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the board of directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for religious purposes as shall qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue law) as the board of directors shall determine. Any such assets not disposed of shall be disposed of by the District Court of the County in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE VII PURPOSE

The purposes for which the corporation is organized are:

- A. to assist the churches of Liberty Baptist Association in their divinely appointed mission and in cooperative relationships with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Southern Baptist Convention, and other Baptist entities to promote and provide opportunities for individual and collective participation in missions, evangelism, ministry, education, social services, and distribution of the Bible;
- B. to engage in any lawful act or activities for which corporations may be organized under N.C. General Statutes

Chapter 55A;

- C. to engage in any lawful activity within the purposes for which the corporation may be organized which is incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the corporation;
- D. to operate exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE VIII INITIAL DIRECTORS

The number of initial directors shall be One Hundred and Thirty-Four (134), and the initial directors shall be the duly-elected representatives from each member church of Liberty Baptist Association.

ARTICLE IX GOVERNMENT

- A. The government of this corporation is vested in its members who are represented in the manner set out in its bylaws. The members retain the right of self-government in all phases of the spiritual and temporal life of the association.
- B. Churches received as members of this corporation as set out in the bylaws shall constitute the membership ("the members"). The members shall be represented by messengers as provided in the bylaws and shall have the sole authority to adopt and amend the charter and bylaws, approve budgets, receive and discharge members, govern and conduct the affairs of this corporation.
- C. All internal groups, committees, directors, officers, agents, and/or employees created and empowered by the association ultimately shall report to and be accountable to the members and shall have such powers and duties as set out in the bylaws.
- D. This association is autonomous and independent and is a sovereign and democratic association of Baptist churches under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. As such, the association is subject to the control of no other ecclesiastical body and does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any member church, auxiliary organization, or other Baptist body.

ARTICLE X ELECTION AS 501(c)(3) CORPORATION

No part of the net earnings or receipts of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes as set forth in these Articles of Incorporation.

No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), or (b) by a corporations, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE XI PERSONAL LIABILITY

Personal liability for all directors for monetary damages arising out of an action or actions, whether by or in the right of the corporation or otherwise for breach of any duty as a director is eliminated except with respect to acts, omissions, liabilities and/or transactions described and defined in North Carolina General Statutes §55A-2-02 (b),(4)(i),(ii),(iii), and (iv).

ARTICLE XII EFFECTIVE DATE

These articles will be effective upon filing.

BYLAWS OF LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION ARTICLE I

NAME AND LOCATION

- The corporate name of this nonprofit corporation shall be "Liberty Baptist Association" The principal and registered office of the Corporation shall be at Route 8, Box 610, Bud Kanoy Road, Thomasville, 27360-7839, Davidson County, North Carolina.
- All reference to "Association" or "Corporation" in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or other official action of the Association, shall signify the legal organization of Liberty Baptist Association as established in the Articles of Incorporation. Liberty Baptist Association as it has existed heretofore, for all legal and administrative purposes fully is incorporated into Liberty Baptist Association, a nonprofit corporation. References to votes of the membership shall have reference to a vote of the members of this Association as prescribed in Article VII F of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

The purposes for which the Corporation is organized are:

- A. to assist the churches of Liberty Baptist Association in their divinely appointed mission and in cooperative relationships with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Southern Baptist Convention, and other Baptist entities to promote and provide opportunities for individual and collective participation in missions, evangelism, ministry, education, social services, and distribution of the Bible:
- B. to engage in any lawful act or activities for which corporations may be organized under N.C. General Statutes Chapter 55A;
- C. to engage in any lawful activity within the purposes for which the Corporation may be organized which is incidental to and in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the Corporation;
- D. to operate exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE III

ELECTION AS A 501(C)(3) CORPORATION

- A. The Corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and recreational purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 50l(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law).
- B. No part of the net earnings or receipts of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes as set forth in the Articles.
- C. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the

publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IV GOVERNMENT

- A. The government of this Association is vested in its members who are represented in the manner set out in its Bylaws. The members retain the right of self-government in all phases of the spiritual and temporal life of the association.
- B. Churches received as members of this Association, as herein provided, shall constitute the membership ("the members"). The members shall be represented by messengers duly elected by each member church and certified to the Association in its Annual Church Profile (Church Letter), and the number of messengers shall be determined as follows:
 - a. Six messengers from each church for its first one hundred members or fraction thereof;
 - One additional messenger from each church for each additional fifty members or fraction thereof above 100 and up to 1,000 members;
 - One additional messenger from each church for each additional one hundred members or major fraction above 1,000 members;

The members represented by messengers as aforesaid shall have the sole authority to adopt and amend the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, approve budgets, receive and discharge members, govern and conduct the affairs of this Corporation.

- C. All internal groups, committees, directors, officers, agents, and/or employees created and empowered by the Association ultimately shall report to and be accountable to the Association and shall have such powers and duties as hereinafter set out.
- D. This Association is autonomous and independent and is a sovereign and democratic association of Baptist churches under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. As such, the Association is subject to the control of no other ecclesiastical body and does not claim and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any member church, auxiliary organization, or other Baptist body.

ARTICLE V PROPERTY

- A. The title to all property shall be in the Association.
- B. The securing and maintaining of real, personal, and mixed property by this association shall be for the express purpose of providing facilities for and the engagement upon the missionary, educational, and benevolent interests of this association as historically have been espoused and practiced thereby and as are expressed in its charter and bylaws, which practices and documents are deemed the standard for uses and practices upon and with regard to such property.
- C. Real property shall not be mortgaged, conveyed, transferred, or encumbered without the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII,F., at an annual meeting or a special meeting duly called for such purpose and stated in the meeting notice.
- D. This article shall not be amended, altered, or repealed except by a three fourths vote of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII, F., at an annual or special meeting duly called and then only in the event that such proposed amendment, alteration, or repeal has been given in writing to the Moderator and Executive Board and has lain on the table for a period of twelve months, and no article shall be voted upon until the period aforementioned has elapsed, any other provisions herein to the contrary notwithstanding.

ARTICLE VI MEMBERS

- **Record of Members:** The members of this Association shall be composed of the Baptist churches who are members of Liberty Baptist Association on the date these Bylaws are adopted. The Clerk shall attach hereto a list of such present members which shall remain a part of the official records of the Association maintained at all times in the office of the Association. A current list of members shall be maintained at all times in the office of the Association.
- Organization of New Work Missions/Churches: The Association by its nature and definition is an organization whose primary purpose is missions. In furtherance of these functions, the Association will attempt to develop and foster new work missions/churches and will remain available and will be resourceful in assisting groups or churches in their own development respectively of and as Baptist churches. The Association is mindful and responsive to the autonomous nature of the structure of its members and desires to inculcate in watch-care groups and churches their own independence while utilizing, without compulsion, the well-intended and well-respected practices of existing Baptist churches in historical Baptist precedence, all of which can be helpful during the organizational phases. To those ends and to effect these purposes, the Association will consider, promulgate, and maintain suggested guidelines for establishing and assisting new work missions/churches in their efforts. These guidelines shall be developed by the Missions Development Council and approved by the Executive Board.

At such time as a group comes under watch care of the Association, a sponsoring church (member of the Association) shall be recommended by the Missions Development Council in consultation with the Director of Missions and actively shall support such mission/church with any resource assistance required. The sponsoring church will work in cooperation with the Missions Development Council and a Liaison Committee shall be formulated and shall be comprised of the following: Two persons from the sponsoring church; Two persons from the new mission/church; One person from the Missions Development Council; and, Ex-officio, the Mission Pastor, Sponsoring Church Pastor, and Director of missions.

The Liaison Committee shall meet monthly and no less than bi-monthly during the formation period of the mission/church and shall assist in every reasonable manner with the development of the mission/church on behalf of the Association. In the event a sponsoring church cannot be secured, the Missions Development Council shall be responsible for the sponsoring thereof on behalf of the Association. The mission/church shall remain under watch care of the Association until such mission/church is ready to constitute a self-supporting church and has fulfilled watch-care requirements.

- Admission of New Churches: Any church seeking admission to the membership of the Association shall petition the Association in writing at least three months prior to the annual meeting of the Association. The Executive Board shall refer such petition to the Missions Development Council for its study of the petitioning church's covenant, articles of faith, history, practices, cooperative spirit, its relations to other churches of the Association, and its willingness to abide by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Association. A written report setting out its findings and recommendations for action at the next annual meeting of the Association shall be submitted by the Missions Development Council to the Executive Board. Final approval for membership shall be contingent upon a one-year period under a watch-care relationship after which determination will be made by a three-fourths vote of "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in VII, F., in annual meeting.
- **Privileges of Membership:** Members through their messengers ("Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F.), and members through their messengers ("Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F.,) only, are entitled to vote in all elections and all questions submitted to the Association. Recognizing the value of voluntary association among churches of like faith and practice, members are afforded opportunity to work in mutual, cooperative fellowship with other churches, especially those of Baptist faith, to advance the gospel of Christ, to promote Christian principles of justice and righteousness in personal, social, and community life, to promote the spiritual welfare of all persons, to disseminate the work of God to the people

- of all nations through evangelistic, educational, and charitable missions.
- E. Requirements of Membership: All members reasonably are required to submit a completed Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Annual Meeting; send messengers to the annual meeting; and, contribute to the financial program of the Association. Only members of the Association shall determine whether member churches have fulfilled requirements for membership.
- F. Termination of Membership: The membership status of any member shall be terminated by written request of the member seeking termination addressed to the Association. Failure reasonably to meet requirements of membership as set out in paragraph E above for a period of two consecutive years after contact by the Missions Development Council to ascertain the desire of the member church shall subject any member church to termination. No member may be expelled or suspended, and no membership may be terminated or suspended, except in a manner that is fair and reasonable and is carried out in good faith, and in compliance with the following procedures:
 - 1. The Executive Board, by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of members present at a special meeting, duly called, must recommend termination of the subject member church.
 - 2. Such recommendation, in writing, must be mailed to the subject member church and each member church sixty (60) days in advance of a special meeting of members.
 - 3. The subject church shall have full and ample opportunity to present its position at such meeting.
 - 4. Termination of membership shall occur only upon a three-fourths (3/4) vote of individuals entitled to vote.
- G. Watch-care Affiliation: Watch-care affiliation for a period of one year shall be required for each church applying for membership in the Association. Each church under watch-care affiliation shall submit a quarterly report and an Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Association.

ARTICLE VII MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

- A. Annual Meeting: The annual meeting of the Association shall be held on Monday and Tuesday following the first Sunday in October for the following purposes: to elect officers of the Association, standing committees, and special committees; to receive annual reports; to approve budgets; to conduct any other business matters which properly may come before the annual meeting; and, to share in worship and fellowship.
- B. Special Meetings: Special meetings for the transaction of business may be called by the Executive Board provided sufficient notice is given members to allow for two Sundays between the call and the meeting.
- C. Emergencies: In emergencies, any change in the time and/or place of meetings shall be determined by a vote of two-thirds of the Executive Board present when the vote is taken.
- D. Presiding Officer: The Moderator shall preside at all meetings of members. In the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator shall preside. In the absence of the Moderator and Vice Moderator, the Clerk shall preside. In the absence of the aforementioned officers, the Treasurer shall preside. In the absence of all officers, the body may elect an acting moderator.
- E. Quorum: Seventy-five (75) "Individuals entitled to vote," as hereinafter defined in Article VII, F., shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any annualor special meeting of members.
- F. Voting: Messengers who have been duly elected by a member, have been certified in its annual report to the Association, and are duly registered and present shall be collectively referred to as "Individuals entitled to vote" and shall be entitled to one vote at any meeting of members. No proxy or absentee voting shall be permitted. All voting shall be by show of hands, standing vote or voice vote except when there are contested matters in which case the vote shall be by ballot. Parliamentary procedure utilizing Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed.

ARTICLE VIII EXECUTIVE BOARD

A. Board of Directors: All reference to "Executive Board" or "Board of Directors" in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or other official action of the Association shall be synonymous

and shall include conferring of powers as are provided by the Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, and the North Carolina Nonprofit Corporation Act.

- B. Membership: The Executive Board membership shall consist of the following:
 - 1. One lay-representative elected by each member church and certified to the Association in its Annual Church Profile (Church Letter),
 - 2. The active pastor of each member, or if none, the Interim pastor of each member church; or if neither, the church secretary.
 - 3. The church treasurer of each member.
 - 4. Officers duly elected by the Association, to-wit: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer;
 - 5. Standing Committee Chairpersons and Standing Council Directors as named in Article XI, A and B
- C. Officers: The officers of the Executive Board shall be the same persons elected by the Association as Moderator (President), Vice Moderator (Vice President), Clerk (Secretary), and Treasurer.
- D. Meetings: Regular meetings of the Executive Board shall be held at least quarterly. The first meeting, which shall be designated as the *annual* meeting, shall be held as soon as possible after the annual meeting of the Association, and the last meeting shall be held as nearly as possible to the next annual meeting of the Association for approval/endorsement of various Reports of the Association for the annual meeting. Special meetings may be called by the Moderator whenever the need arises and the Moderator shall call a special meeting when requested in writing by ten (10) members of the Executive Board.
- E. Quorum: Twenty-five (25) members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- F. Duties: Except as restricted by the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws or other official action of the Association, the Executive Board shall manage the general business and activities of the Association between annual meetings; shall call special meetings of the Association when necessary; shall elect an independent auditor to conduct the annual audit; shall fill and/or approve any vacancies which occur in the officers, Executive Board, Committee on Nominations, Nominating Committee; Standing Committees or Councils; and, may elect the Director of Missions when a vacancy occurs in accordance with Article X,E.2. of these Bylaws. The Executive Board shall present a written report of action taken to the Association in its annual meeting for ratification and approval of action so taken between annual meetings.
- G. Contracts: The Executive Board may authorize officers to enter into contracts or execute and deliver instruments on behalf of the Association, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances subject only to limitations provided herein.
- H. Loans: No loans shall be contracted on behalf of the Association and no evidence of indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a resolution of the Executive Board. Such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.
- I. Depository: The Executive Board shall have the power to (a) select one or more banks to act as depositories of the funds of the Association; (b) determine the manner of receiving, depositing, and disbursing the funds of the Association; (c) designate the person or persons authorized to draw on the bank accounts of the Association; (d) approve the form of checks to be used in drawing on such bank accounts; and, (e) change such banks, the person or persons drawing on such accounts, and the form of checks at will.
- J. Removal: Board members, as well as officers of the Association, may be removed by majority vote of the Association at a properly called business meeting, with written notice to members setting out the specific purpose of the meeting.
- K. Death, Resignation or Termination: In the event a Board member shall expire, resign, or for any reason be removed from the Executive Board, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE IX OFFICERS

A. Officers Generally: There shall be a Moderator who shall also serve as Moderator and Chairman of the

Executive Board and President of the Corporation. There shall be a Vice Moderator who shall also serve as Vice Moderator of the Executive Board and Vice President of the Corporation. There shall be a Clerk who shall also serve as Clerk of the Executive Board and Secretary of the Corporation. There shall be a Treasurer who shall also serve as Treasurer of the Association and of the Corporation. Whenever used in the Articles of Incorporation, in the Bylaws, in Amendments, or in other official action of the Association, the words "Moderator or "President;" "Vice Moderator" or "Vice President;" or "Clerk" or "Secretary" shall be synonymous.

B. Moderator:

- 1. Election and Term: The Moderator shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of the Association for a term of one year and may be re-elected for a one-year term. The Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election as Moderator for a period of two years after having served two one-year terms. The term of office shall begin at the close of the annual meeting and shall continue through the close of the next annual meeting or until a successor is elected.
- 2. Duties: The Moderator shall
 - a. preside at the annual meeting and any special meeting of the Association;
 - b. serve as President of the Corporation;
 - c. preside at all meetings of the Executive Board;
 - d. perform such other duties as are specifically prescribed in these Bylaws and as may be delegated by the Association;
 - e. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting;
 - f. appoint other committees when so directed by the Association or Executive Board; and
 - g. serve as ex officio member of all committees except the Committee on Nominations.

C. Vice Moderator

- 1. Election and Term: The Vice Moderator shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year and may be re-elected for a one-year term. The Vice Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election as Vice Moderator for a period of two years after having served two one-year terms. The term of office shall begin at the close of the annual meeting in which such election is held and shall continue through the close of the next annual meeting or until his successor is elected
- 2. Duties: The Vice Moderator shall
 - a. preside at meetings of the Association and Executive Board in the absence of the Moderator or at the pleasure of the Moderator;
 - b. serve as Vice President of the Corporation;
 - serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting; and
 - d. perform such other duties as may be specifically prescribed in these Bylaws and as may be delegated by the members.

D. Clerk

- 1. Election and Term: The Clerk shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.
- 2. Duties: The Clerk shall
 - a. serve as Secretary of the Corporation and of the Executive Committee;
 - b. maintain at all times a current list of members of the Association;
 - maintain and preserve the files, records, and documents of the Association in proper order at all times for examination of the Executive Board;
 - d. send report forms to members at least one month before the annual meeting of the Association;
 - e. prepare a composite record of the member information included in the annual report submitted to the Association and distribute copies thereof at the annual meeting;
 - f. supervise the printing of minutes of the Association and distribute to the members as soon as

possible after the annual meeting;

- g. preserve the files, records, and documents of the Association and, upon election of a successor, relinquish such files, records, documents, and other property belonging to the Association and in the possession and control of the Clerk to the duly elected successor; and
- h. serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting.
- preside at meetings in the absence of the Moderator and Vice Moderator at the pleasure of the moderator.

E. Treasurer

- 1. Election and Term: The Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.
- 2. Duties: The Treasurer shall
 - a. serve as Treasurer of the Corporation;
 - b. have custody of all funds of the Association;
 - c. maintain at all times up-to-date, orderly records of all receipts and disbursements;
 - d. disburse funds by check in accordance with the budget and direction of the Association or Executive Board;
 - e. prepare quarterly financial reports and distribute copies to the Finance Committee and the Executive Board;
 - f. prepare a financial report and distribute copies at the annual meeting;
 - g. serve as a member of the Finance Committee;
 - h. cooperate with the firm making the annual audit; and
 - serve with other officers to recommend a Committee on Nominations to the Executive Board for election at its May meeting.
 - preside at meetings in the absence of the Moderator, Vice Moderator and Clerk at the pleasure of the moderator.

F. Assistant Treasurer

- 1. **Election and Term:** The Assistant Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year.
- 2. **Duties:** The Assistant Treasurer shall, during periods of incapacity or absence of the Treasurer, perform the duties assigned to the Treasurer in paragraph E. 2 as required and shall assist the Treasurer as directed and required by the Treasurer.

ARTICLE X STAFF

- A. Staff Positions: The staff of the Association shall be composed of the Director of Missions, Administrative Secretary, and such other persons who shall fill staff positions as may be created by the Association. The Personnel Committee shall make recommendation for the creation of any staff position. A current list of staff positions shall be maintained by the Personnel Committee. A job description for each staff position shall be prepared and shall be revised periodically by the Personnel Committee, approved by the Executive Board, and furnished to all candidates considered for the position and the person filling the position. Staff positions may be combined from time to time at the discretion of the Executive Board and the combined position held by one person.
- B. Election/Employment: Except in the case of the Director of Missions, the staff members from time to time shall be employed for indeterminate terms by the Association or Executive Board at a regular meeting upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- C. Termination: With the exception of the Director of Missions, termination of the relationship between a staff member and the Association shall occur within a reasonable and announced period after written notice of termination delivered to the staff member on behalf of the Association and to the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board on behalf of the staff member. Termination of the staff member by the Association shall

- be initiated and acted upon by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee.
- D. Vacation and Leave: Requirements for vacation and leaves, record-keeping, expense reimbursement, work schedules, and other employment matters shall be outlined in the Policy Manual and Benefit Plans. Such manual shall be prepared, reviewed, monitored, and amended from time to time by recommendation of the Personnel Committee to the Executive Board; and the staff shall be subject to the provisions thereof from time to time; provided, nothing therein contained shall be interpreted to be in derivation or in violation of the provisions of the Bylaws, and such Policy Manual and Benefit Plans must remain consistent with the purposes and intent requirements thereof.

E. Director of Missions

- 1. Search Committee Procedure: When a vacancy occurs in the position of Director of Missions or the Director of Mission furnishes notice of intent to vacate the position, a Search Committee composed of the officers of the Association and five members of the Associational Council elected by the Associational Council shall meet as soon as possible, determine their procedure, establish a profile, prepare application forms and reference questionnaires, and shall diligently seek to find a Director of Missions who, by calling, training, and ability, is qualified spiritually, mentally, and physically to lead the work of the Association. The Moderator shall serve as Chairperson of the Search Committee. Members of the committee may be reimbursed by the Treasurer for any necessary and reasonable travel and subsistence expenses which are incurred in the performance of their duties. The candidate to be recommended by the Search Committee may be interviewed by the Associational Council before election by the Executive Board or the Association in Annual Meeting.
- 2. Election/Employment: When the Search Committee has selected a potential employee and is ready to make a report and recommendation to the Association, such recommendation shall be made to the Annual Meeting of the Association or, between annual meetings, to the Executive Board. Upon a vote being taken, the Director of Missions presented must receive at least three-fourths of all votes cast. If the Director of Missions fails to receive the required three-fourths vote, the Moderator shall declare the nominee not elected/employed and shall refer the matter, without debate, to the Search Committee for further investigation and further recommendation under the foregoing procedure.
- 3. Duties: The Director of Missions shall
 - a. fulfill all duties under the direction of the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board;
 - b. serve ex officio in a supervisory capacity on all committees and councils of the Association unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws;
 - c. promote the work of the Association and denomination;
 - d. cooperate with members, their pastors, officers, committees and councils of the Association;
 - e. present oral reports to the Associational Council, Missions Development Council, and Executive Board meetings;
 - f. present a written report to the annual meeting of the Association;
 - g. assist the Clerk in preparation of the composite record of members from information submitted in their annual report to the Association;
 - h. assist the Clerk in preparing the annual minutes of the Association.
- 4. Termination: The Director of Missions shall be employed for an indeterminate term. The Director of Missions shall give reasonable notice of intent to resign or retire to the Personnel Committee and the Executive Board. The Director of Missions may be removed by an affirmative vote of three-fourths of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as heretofore defined in Article VII, F., at a meeting properly called with ten days written notice to the Director of Missions and written notice of the meeting to the members as required by the Bylaws.
- Interim Director of Missions: The Executive Board, in consultation with the Personnel Committee, shall be responsible for the employment of an Interim Director of Missions when the Association is without a Director of Missions.

6. Extended Leave or Absence: During any extended leave or absence of the Director of Missions for medical or other appropriate reasons and with advice of the Personnel Committee, the Executive Board shall make such necessary, temporary or emergency decisions as reasonably shall be required.

ARTICLE XI COMMITTEES AND COUNCILS

Standing Committees:

Except as hereinafter provided, Standing Committees of the Association shall be as follows: Annual Meeting Program Committee; Auditing Committee, Building and Grounds Committee; Bylaw Committee; Finance Committee; Historical Committee; Hunger Awareness Committee; Liaison Committee; Memorials Committee; Nominating Committee; Ordination Examining Committee; Personnel Committee; Place and Preacher Committee; and, Resolutions Committee shall have membership and general responsibilities respectively as follows:

- 1. Annual Meeting Program Committee: The Annual Meeting Program Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Chairman of the Place and Preacher Committee, Director of the Music Council, Pastors of the churches hosting the Annual Meeting, and three persons. The Annual Meeting Program Committee shall prepare a printed program for the Annual Meeting, send a copy of the printed program to all persons on the program at least ten days prior to the annual meeting, present the printed program for adoption at the opening of the Annual Meeting, and serve through the Annual Meeting when adjustments on the program are necessary.
- 2. Auditing Committee: The Auditing Committee shall consist of three persons. The committee shall make an audit or review of the records and receipts of the Association on a quarterly basis. A report should be made to the Finance Committee one month after the end of each quarter in writing as to findings, needed adjustments and suggestions. The committee will meet at least four times a year with the Treasurer as exofficio member to review the quarterly updated Finance Reports and records. The Annual Audit Report or Review is to be made in writing to be in the Book of Reports as a part of the Finance Committee report. The report needs to be completed by September 30 to be presented at the Annual Meeting. The Auditing Committee shall have the option of recommending a Review of the Financial Records or a complete Audit of the Financial Records. The Auditing Committee shall recommend to the appropriate Executive Board Meeting, prior to the Annual Session, whether a review or complete audit of the Financial Records is needed. The Auditing Committee is responsible for doing the necessary research to answer any questions concerning Financial Records that may be raised by member churches, messengers, or Executive Board members within a reasonable period.
- 3. Building and Grounds Committee: The Building and Grounds Committee shall consist of three persons. The Building and Grounds Committee shall plan for adequate maintenance, repairs, alterations, improvement, and housekeeping of the physical properties of the Association; upon request of the Director of Missions, assist in considering approval for special use of the facilities of the Association; and, prepare and submit an appropriate budget request for consideration and inclusion in the proposed budget.
- 4. Bylaws Committee: The Bylaws Committee shall consist of three persons, preferably one of whom shall be an attorney. The Bylaws Committee shall consider requests for amendments, alterations, or revisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws and shall make recommendations to the Association with respect thereto; and, periodically review and make recommendations for amendments, alterations, or revisions of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws.
- 5. Finance Committee: The Finance Committee shall consist of the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer and four persons. The Finance Committee shall study, formulate, and recommend a budget adequate to support the program of the Association; formulate plans for promotion of the budget and cooperation of members in meeting budget needs; review the quarterly and annual financial reports of the Treasurer; review and monitor budget line item expenses; present periodical reports of contributions to members of the Association; and, present a written report to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

- 6. **Historical Committee:** The Historical Committee shall consist of a Historian and two persons. The Historian shall be elected annually at the annual meeting for a term of one year and shall serve as Chairperson of the Historical Committee. The Historical Committee shall collect and preserve historical data of the Association; encourage and promote the preservation of historical data by each member; and, present a written report to each annual meeting of the Association. The Historian shall serve as a member of the Media Library (TACMO) Council.
- 7. Hunger Awareness Committee: The Hunger Awareness Committee shall consist of three persons. The Hunger Awareness Committee shall keep abreast of hunger needs throughout the world and shall apprize the Association of these needs and from time to time, upon approval of the Executive Board, shall lead special projects within the Association to meet specific needs.
- 8. Liaison Committee: A Liaison Committee shall be formulated as needed for new work missions/churches and shall be comprised of two persons from the sponsoring church as defined in Article VI, B; two persons from the new mission/church; one person from the Missions Development Council; and, Ex-officio, the Mission Pastor, Sponsoring Church Pastor, and Director of Missions. The Liaison Committee shall meet no less than bi-monthly during the formation period of the mission/church and shall assist in every reasonable manner with the development of the mission/church on behalf of the Association.
- 9. Memorials Committee: The Memorials Committee shall consist of three persons. The Memorials Committee shall prepare and read a report of individuals who have expired since the last annual meeting as reflected in the Annual Church Profile (Church Letter) to the Association furnished by the members and shall conduct a brief, appropriate Memorial Service for such individuals during the Annual Meeting.
- 10. Nominating Committee: The Nominating Committee shall consist of five individuals recommended to the Annual Meeting by the Committee on Nominations and shall meet as often as necessary to fill vacancies and prepare nominations for the Annual Meeting of the association; seek to fill all positions with the best qualified nominees, avoiding the nomination of one individual for more than one position and distributing obligations and privileges of service to member representation; contact all nominees and secure consent before making recommendations to the Association or Executive Board; recommend to the Association during the Annual Meeting the officers, chairpersons, directors, and members of each standing committee and council, and the institutional/agency representatives, unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws; recommend to the Executive Board individuals to fill vacancies of committees and institutional/agency representatives which may occur between Annual Meetings of the Association.
- 11. Ordination Examining Committee: Each church of the Association shall have the exclusive right to ordain for the ministry without Associational involvement. However, member churches shall have the option to utilize the Associational Ordination Examining Committee as hereinafter set out. The Ordination Examining Committee shall consist of five persons. The Ordination Examining Committee shall receive requests from churches within the Association who wish to examine a candidate for ordination to the Gospel ministry; cooperate with the church requesting examination in setting a mutually satisfactory date for examination; question the candidate for ordination; report its findings to the church making such request for examination; approve for ordination only the candidate who has received a call to serve in an ordained Christian ministry of any kind including, but not limited to that of a member church of the Association, or Baptist churches outside the Association; to serve on the mission field, or to serve as a chaplain in the armed forces or a public institution; and, shall have the option to summons pastors and one lay person from any or all cooperating member churches of the Liberty Baptist Association.
- 12. Personnel Committee: The Personnel Committee shall consist of five persons. Except as otherwise provided in Article X,E., the Personnel Committee shall receive applications, interview applicants, contact references, and carefully investigate applicants considered for staff positions; shall recommend to the Executive Board the prospective employee; shall prepare, periodically review, revise, and recommend changes in job descriptions to the Executive Board; shall make recommendation to the Association in the event of need of a new staff position; shall prepare, periodically review, revise and recommend changes to Personnel Policy

Manual and Benefits Plan; periodically evaluate personnel performance and make necessary recommendations to the staff; consult with and perform duties assigned by the Executive Board and as set out in Article X of these Bylaws; establish a salary plan and prepare budget requests with respect to all personnel matters including salaries and fringe benefits and submit such budget requests to the Finance Committee of the Association.

- 13. Place and Preacher Committee: The Place and Preacher Committee shall consist of five persons. The Place and Preacher Committee shall solicit and receive invitations for the place or places of meeting for the next Annual Meeting of the Association, recommend the place or places of the meeting, and recommend the preacher and an alternate preacher to preach the annual sermon at the Annual Meeting of the Association.
- 14. Resolutions Committee: The Resolutions Committee shall consist of five persons. The Resolutions Committee shall review all properly submitted resolutions which may be reworded for clarity, combined with like issues into one resolution, or rejected if previously addressed or are inappropriate; present all appropriate resolutions to the Association for consideration; prepare and present resolutions of appreciation and other resolutions deemed appropriate; and, notify persons submitting resolutions of the disposition thereof.

B. Standing Councils

Except as hereinafter provided, the Standing Councils of the Association, shall be as follows: Bi-Vocational Ministers Council; Brotherhood Council; Christian Life and Public Affairs Council; Discipleship Training Council; Evangelism Council; Family Ministry Council; Hispanic Ministries Council; Media Library Council (TACMO); Missions Development Council; Multi-Housing Council; Music Council; Pastoral Ministries Council; Seminary Extension Council; Senior Adult Council; Single Adult Council; Stewardship Council; Student Ministries Council; Sunday School Council; Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team; and, Youth Ministries Council with general responsibilities respectively as follows:

- 1. Bi-Vocational Ministers Council: The Bi-Vocational Ministers Council shall be composed of Bi-Vocational Ministers (active and retired) selected by the Nominating Committee. The President of the Bi-Vocational Ministers Conference shall be an ex officio member. The purpose of this Council is to address needs of Bi-Vocational ministerial staff.
- 2. Brotherhood Council: The Brotherhood Council will assist churches in involving men and boys in missions; helping churches engage men and boys in missions activities; helping churches prepare to teach missions to men and boys; helping churches lead men and boys to pray for and give to missions; helping churches lead men and boys to develop personal ministry; and, helping churches interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.
- 3. Christian Life and Public Affairs Council: The Christian Life and Public Affairs Council will assist churches in awareness of critical moral and social issues and in leading in Christian action to meet those needs; in applying the gospel to all areas of life; in demonstrating responsible concern for society; in broadening cooperative efforts and emphases; and, in mobilizing and equipping the constituency to be on mission in regard to moral and ethical concerns. Areas of involvement include family life, race relations, citizenship, hunger, and other special moral concerns. The council shall endeavor to provide an annual event of training in an area of moral and social concerns.
- 4. Discipleship Training Council: The Discipleship Training Council will assist churches in starting, improving, and expanding Christian discipleship through their Discipleship Training programs to help churches equip church members for discipleship and personal ministry; teach Christian theology and Baptist doctrine, Christian ethics, Christian history, and church polity and organization; equip church leaders for service; and interpret and undergird the work of the church and denomination.
- 5. Evangelism Council: The Evangelism Council will lead the Association (as churches and as programs) to address the priority of evangelism in its area and will include in its program church evangelism committee development; evangelism strategy development; mass evangelism; personal evangelism; rural and small church evangelism; metropolitan evangelism; specialized evangelism; renewal evangelism; and, evangelism prospect discovery. The council will coordinate with other appropriate councils and member churches Festival

Ministries and special event ministries for evangelistic outreach in the association.

- 6. Family Ministry Council: The Family Ministry Council will assist churches in development of family ministry programs and the conduct of family ministry activities which can be accomplished best on the Associational level. It will seek to minister to the distinctive and diverse needs of families.
- 7. **Hispanic Ministries Council:** The Hispanic Ministries Council will plan, coordinate, and provide ministry to the migrant/seasonal workers in the Association which may include, but shall not be limited to, Bible Study, special trips, medical and dental care, fellowship meals, as well as other needs that may arise. This council will plan, coordinate and provide ministry to permanent Hispanic residents.
- 8. Media Library Council: (Also known as TACMO-The Associational Church Media Library Organization). The Media Library Council (TACMO) will assist churches in the establishment, development, and improvement of church media library services and educate persons in the use of media and provide media and media services to support the church in the achievement of its mission.
- 9. Missions Development Council: The Missions Development Council will lead the association (as churches and as programs) to address the priority missions frontiers in their area through work with Church Missions Development Councils, missions survey and analysis, church extension, language missions, church and community ministries, volunteer chaplaincy ministries, interfaith witness, black church relations, and, special ministries.

The Missions Development Council will be responsible for credentials-acceptance of new churches as more specifically set out in Article VI, C; church extension/new work; language missions; literacy missions; migrant ministry; festival ministries (in cooperation with Evangelism, Woman's Missionary Union & Brotherhood Councils); partnership ministry (State, Home and Foreign); mission projects (church and community ministries); seminary extension; volunteer chaplaincy; interfaith witness; disaster relief (in cooperation with Brotherhood Council); assist churches, as requested, with internal problems; assist groups seeking to organize a new church and work with the Liaison Committee as set out in Article VI, B, and such other duties as may be delegated by the Executive Board. The Missions Development Council shall plan and coordinate mission ministry projects in consultation with the councils and committees of the Association as needed. The council will make member churches aware of project needs and help secure volunteers.

- 10. Multi-Housing Council: The Multi-Housing Council will seek to involve churches in multi-housing ministries through on-call chaplaincy; group Bible studies; Backyard Bible Clubs/Mission Vacation Bible Schools; recreational activities; special events with music, drama, puppets, etc. It will develop relationships with multi-housing managers; provide training to churches in methodologies and strategies to reach such complexes; and, will make regular reports and recommendations to the Missions Development Council.
- 11. Music Council: The Music Council will seek to enhance the redemptive mission of churches through establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving their music ministries. It will provide musical experiences in congregational services; develop musical skills, attitudes, and understandings; witness and minister through music; interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.
- 12. Pastoral Ministries Council: The Pastoral Ministries Council will assist churches in the development of pastoral ministries, deacon ministry, vocational guidance, church administrative services, and Christian weekday education; conduct special projects and activities which enable churches to accomplish their mission, proclaim the gospel to believers and unbelievers, care for the church's members and other persons in the community and interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination. It will minister to the distinctive needs of pastors, deacons, church staff persons, church council, church officers and committee members, church vocations volunteers, and church weekday education staff. This council will include a Church Administration Consultant, Weekday Early Education Consultant, Vocational Guidance Consultant, Deacon Ministry Consultant, and Minister Support Consultant.
- 13. Seminary Extension Council: The Seminary Extension Council will seek to provide college-level theological education to ministers and laypersons and basic theological education to ministers who lack formal education. It will provide curriculum materials, administrative services, promotional materials, training

materials for director and teachers, academic records, and certification of centers and teachers.

- 14. Senior Adult Council: The Senior Adult Council will plan activities and ministry projects for member church senior adults and will communicate any appropriate state and national conferences and Chautauguas to member churches. This council may include any elected leader of a member church senior adult organization.
- 15. Single Adult Council: The Single Adult Council will plan activities and ministry projects for member church single adults and will communicate any appropriate state and national conferences to member churches. This council may include any elected leader of a member church single adult organization.

16. Stewardship Council: The Stewardship Council will assist churches in development of individual and corporate stewardship, interpretation of Biblical teachings on stewardship, and elevation of individual giving and corporate mission giving in light of those teachings.

17. Student Ministries Council: The Student Ministries Council will assist the program of Baptist student ministries at the colleges within the Association or area; assist churches in establishing and supporting ministries with students; and, provide continuing training for workers with students in the churches in order to minister to the needs of college students in the churches and on the campuses in the area.

18. Sunday School Council: (Also known as ASSIST: Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team). The Sunday School Council will assist and challenge churches to improve and enlarge all areas of their Sunday School through planning, training, administration activities, consultation, program interpretation, and cooperative projects. It will encourage and assist churches to reach persons for Bible study, teach the Bible, witness to persons about Christ and lead persons to church membership, minister to Sunday School members and nonmembers, lead members to worship, and interpret and undergird the work of the church and the denomination.

19. Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team: The Woman's Missionary Union Council/WMU Leadership Team will assist churches in promoting missions, establishing, enlarging, and strengthening Woman's Missionary Union work, teaching missions, engaging in mission action and personal witnessing, supporting missions, and participating in the work of the church and the denomination.

20. Youth Ministries Council: The Youth Ministries Council shall plan youth related ministries for the Association including retreats, rallies, and volunteer training.

- C. General duties of Standing Councils: The Director and Council members of each council shall keep informed of materials, programs, and events related to the specific area of interest indicated by the title of said council; shall assist in training leadership and promoting the specific interest area within the Association; shall cooperate with other councils of the Association in coordinating emphases and assisting churches in their divinely appointed mission opportunities individually and collectively. Each council shall meet as often as necessary (at least quarterly) to fulfill its responsibilities in keeping with standards established by the Association for its respective organization. A written report from each council shall be made to the Annual Meeting of the Association. The Director of each respective council shall serve on the Associational Council of the Association.
- D. <u>Election and Term</u>: The Standing Committees and Councils listed in Sections A and B of this Article, except the Woman's Missionary Union Council and Director, and the Chairperson/Director respectively thereof shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at the Annual Meeting of the Association. The term of office shall be one year beginning at the adjournment of the Annual Meeting in which the election was held.
- E. Other Committees and Councils: The Association may create such other committees and councils, not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation and these Bylaws, as may from time to time be required, and in furtherance thereof, the Executive Board shall be empowered to establish and appoint interim standing committees and councils. The Nominating Committee shall give recommendations to fill these new positions to the Executive Board. At the next Annual Meeting of the Association, messengers shall consider whether to amend these Bylaws by their inclusion as new standing committees and councils.

F. Special Standing Committees, Councils, Auxiliary, & Institutional/Agency Representatives:

Special Standing Committees, Councils, Auxiliary, and Institutional/Agency Representatives of the Association shall be the Committee on Nominations, Associational Council, Woman's Missionary Union and Institutional/Agency Representatives, whose membership and responsibilities are as follows:

- 1. Committee on Nominations: The Committee on Nominations shall consist of three persons who shall be nominated by the officers and elected by the Executive Board at the meeting prior to the September meeting. The Committee on Nominations shall serve until the annual meeting when its report is made to the Association. The duty of the Committee on Nominations shall be to nominate the Nominating Committee at the Annual Meeting and to recommend to the Executive Board individuals to fill any Nominating Committee vacancies during the year. In the event of a vacancy between any Executive Board or Annual Meeting, the Committee on Nominations shall appoint a replacement to begin immediate interim service until election of a nominee for the term of office at the next Executive Board or Annual Meeting following the vacancy occurrence.
- 2. Associational Council: The Associational Council shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, and Directors of all Standing Councils as set out in Article XI, B. The Council shall plan and correlate the calendar and program activities of the program councils of the Association and make any needed recommendations to the Executive Board/Annual Meeting.
- 3. Woman's Missionary Union: The Woman's Missionary Union of Liberty Baptist Association is an auxiliary of Liberty Baptist Association and elects its director, officers, and council. These elected officers are included for information in the Reports of the Association and the Director of Woman's Missionary Union serves on the Standing Council and Executive Board with full voting privileges. The Woman's Missionary Union is governed by their own Constitution and Bylaws.
- 4. Institutional/Agency Representatives: One person to serve as the Institutional/Agency Representative within the Association shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association for a term of one year. The representative will receive information from the respective institution/agency during the year and shall prepare a report for the Annual Meeting of the Association.
- 5. Partnership Coordinators: Partnership Coordinators (Foreign, Home, State, Associational Missions) shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association for a term of one year. Partnership Coordinators shall receive information, work with the Missions Development Council, provide leadership and orientation for partnership project participants as needed. Partnership Coordinators shall prepare a report for the Annual Meeting of the Association of work accomplished.
- 6. Assistant Treasurer: The Assistant Treasurer shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected for a term of one year. The Assistant Treasurer shall be eligible for re-election each year. In the absence of the Treasurer due to illness, emergency or resignation, the Assistant Treasurer will be responsible for signing checks, maintaining records, make deposits, and paying bills that are due. The Assistant Treasurer shall function for the Treasurer as requested by the Treasurer within reason in carrying out the duties of Treasurer as an officer of the Association only under emergency, illness, or resignation circumstances.

ARTICLE XII

ADOPTION AND AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS AND CORPORATE DOCUMENTS

A. Adoption:

These Bylaws shall be considered adopted and in immediate effect when a majority of the "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F., at an annual meeting or a special meeting shall vote in favor thereof. This vote shall be taken not less than thirty days after mailing a copy of these Bylaws to each member.

B. Amendment:

These Bylaws, the Articles of Incorporation, or any parts thereof may be amended, altered, or repealed only by a majority vote of "Individuals entitled to vote," as defined in Article VII, F., at the Annual Meeting or a special meeting of the Association.

C. Preservation:

A copy of all original corporate records, including but not limited to the Articles of Incorporation, the Bylaws, and Personnel Policies, shall be maintained at all times by the Clerk in the office of the Association; and copies of the same shall be kept in separate locations. All amendments to said documents or to any provisions thereof shall be prepared promptly after adoption by the Association; and the Secretary shall cause the same and copies to be typed or printed in proper form and attached to the originals of respective documents and kept as above stated.

ARTICLE XIII GENERAL AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

A. Fiscal Year:

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from September 1 to August 31.

B. Reports:

Reports of officers, committees, councils, and church letters to the Association shall cover the period from September 1 to August 31. All reports for the annual meeting shall be in writing for inclusion in the published Book of Reports and shall be limited to 250 words.

C. Audit:

An annual audit or review of the financial records of the Association shall be conducted by an independent accounting firm elected by the Executive Board upon recommendation of the Auditing Committee.

D. Records:

The membership rolls, minutes of meetings, and annual reports shall be available at allreasonable times for all reasonable purposes.

E. Policy Manual:

The Policy Manual shall contain documents of procedure and the adopted Budget and Nominations Report not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation and these Bylaws from various committees and councils that have been recommended to and approved by the Executive Board and/or Annual Meeting. These policies will be governing rules and procedures of the respective committees and councils of the Association. They may be amended by the Executive Board and/or Annual Meeting by a simple vote of persons present provided a quorum has been met.

F. Seal

There shall appear within the center of the Corporate Seal of the Association the words "Corporate Seal," around which shall appear two concentric circles within which will be inscribed Liberty Baptist Association of North Carolina, 1832. Such seal, as impressed on the margin hereof, is hereby adopted as the corporate seal of the Corporation.

G. Gender:

The use of terms in these Bylaws that may in other contexts tend to denote gender is intended to be neutral as to gender. The masculine shall be deemed to include the feminine and the feminine deemed to include the masculine.

H. Majority:

Unless these Bylaws or The General Statutes of North Carolina otherwise require a different number, a majority of those in attendance at any general or special meeting of members or the Executive Board with a quorum present shall be required to effect any action.
